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A MESSAGE FROM MR TAMIYA Plastic models are selling!

The worldwide Covid crisis has been devastating for many industries, but with ever more people working from home, traditional hobbies are on the rise. This has actually caused a slight problem for Tamiya, with demand outstripping supply for certain products.

"It [demand] has increased by more than 30% year-on-year. Production is not on time and there are not enough products worldwide," said Mr Shunsaku Tamiya, chairman of Tamiya. "I have been involved in plastic models for more than half a century, but I am surprised that models of ships I designed in my 30s and 40s are also selling. This is the first time for me". According to Tamiya, not only plastic models, radio-controlled models, and Mini 4WD, but also tool nippers, paints, adhesives, etc., are selling out and some are still in short supply. Mr Tamiya speculates "there are fewer people going out and many people have started making plastic models at home."



No sauerkraut and sausages for TMMI this year, our annual visit to Bavaria was curtailed thanks to the Covid crisis causing the 2021 show's cancellation. But there's still plenty of fabulous new models on the way from Tamiya!



MILITARY SCALE MODELS

amiya's original 1:35 Sd.Kfz.2 Kleines Kettenkraftrad was issued back in 1973 and still makes for a fun build. Since those days, moulding technology has evolved to the point where a new kit of this interesting World War Two tractor can offer improved detail and refinement, so Tamiya have created a 100% new model that will come with a trailer and three newly sculpted figures. It's small but spectacular and is certain to appeal to modellers of military subjects from this era.

Following the release of the nearly-new 1:35 Panzerkampfwagen IV Ausf. F last year, Tamiya's designers have made further modifications to create the Ausf.G version of this ubiquitous WW2 German medium-tank.







THE RINKY-DINK PANTHER ISN'T HE A PANTHER EVER SO PINK?



Kev Smith rescues his classic Tamiya 1:35 SAS Land Rover from the 'shelf of doom' and brings it up to date with an Eduard photo-etched set and a paint/ weathering finish in the modern style



he SAS is legendary amongst the world's elite armed forces. Their equipment is equally specialised, none more so than the Pink Panther Land Rover. A total of seventy-two 'Panthers were built in 1968. The conversion from the standard Series IIa long wheelbase Land Rover was overtaken by Marshall of Cambridge, with the type seeing service around the world, most of note is Oman. By 1987 the type was being replaced by the 110 Land Rover Desert Patrol Vehicles with the more powerful V8 engine, as used in Gulf War 1.

EDUARD'S IMPROVEMENTS

The kit starts off with the building up of the chassis. I didn't bother adding any detail to this area, as it would not be seen by the casual observer. So, this part of the build is straightforward and presented no surprises. Next came the front of the Land Rover and this is where the build starts to get interesting. Firstly, the smoke dischargers had extra details added from the Eduard photo-etched set. This was in the way of new mounting plates and the

chains for the tube rubber caps. Also off the etched fret is the front grill. This alone goes a long way to adding finesse to the finished model.

The tripod and pioneer tools get the same treatment with details added from the fret. I improved the SLR rifle pouches mounted on the left and right wings, with the addition of thin metal foil to replace the canvas covers and two straps from the etched set. The other area to receive a breath of fresh air were the jerrycans, the out-dated kit items being replaced with jerry cans from the Italeri accessory set (No.402). The drivers /commander's area was next. Here, the floor received a new non-slip plate and new foot pedals. Dashboard dials and a new sundial were a welcome addition from the Eduard set. Another nice touch is a new radio set. Further improvements included the addition of a scratch-built cam net, this would replace the supplied item. A rolled tarpaulin and a smaller net were draped over the spare wheel that is attached to the front of the vehicle. A rope was hung from the towing eyes on the front bumper finished this area off nicely. •

Next came the rear and the crew area. There was not a lot to add here really, only a handful of details were added to give the vehicle that lived in look. These include scratch built jerrycan holders cut from thin metal sheet, and these were mounted to the body above the wheel arches to the left and right of the gunner's station.

7.62mm ammo boxes were sourced from the internet and were placed in a logical position. Other additions were a scratch-built ground sheet and tarpaulin: both were cut from thick paper, folded, painted and secured into place with super glue. Other items of stowage were added from the spares box. Moving to the exterior areas, and Eduard came to the rescue again with beautify rendered sand channels that

hang off hooks attached to the rear wings. Finally, the large stowage rack that appears on the back of these Pink Panthers was addressed.

After a quick search on the internet, it came apparent that there is a bar that runs across width of the rear of the compartment above the tail gate which the crew attach various items of stowage to. This was cut to length from of appropriately scaled brass rod and fitted to scratch-built fixings that were cur from plastic card. I opted to replace the kit suppled canvas cover as this part is too solid and an unrealistic appearance. I started with sourcing two resin Bergens from the spares box, these were hung from the bar using Tamiya Tape to replicate the straps.

I also sculpted a number

Mini Review...

MINIART 1:35 GERMAN ROAD SIGNS WW2 FRANCE 1944 (35600) шшш.miniart-models.com шшш.creativemodels.co.uk

The clue to what's in the box is in the name of this new product from Ukrainian manufacturer, MiniArt. In side we have three sprues of grey polystyrene mouldings that provide around twenty different sizes and shapes of signboard (two sprues) plus another that carries the support poles (including a telephone pole), all with convincing wood textures. A sheet of decals provides the signs themselves and they are nicely toned down to a scale finish. Very useful indeed

The rear gunner's seat is situated between two large long range fuel tanks. Some seat cushions were left the original state whilst others were painted completely pink. This inevitably would flake off and reveal the original material

of items of stowage from AB two-part putty. The finished items were then hung off the rear and sides of the Land-Rover. Whilst the putty was out, the opportunity was taken to role a new canvas cover from a ball of the putty and placed over this busy area, a second scratch-built cam net was draped over the top of the cover, the addition of which finished this area off nicely. The GP MGs are for me the weakest area of the kit. The butts don't look right at all. I managed to source the ones on the Pink Panther from Dragon figure sets of US Marines (3027). These are far superior to the kit items on offer.

PRETTY IN PINK

The painting of the vehicles would vary, with some painted in the NATO green and black pattern, whilst the majority were painted sand pink. The application could vary from vehicle to vehicle but generally the whole land Rover, including most of the underside and under the bonnet was painted. only the lights, number plate, instrument dials and weapons would escape. On some vehicles the seats were painted, others were seen without paint and some with just the seat backs painted. The tyres were often left unpainted but it wasn't uncommon to see the sidewalls painted pink.

For ease of painting, the model was left in the three natural sub-assemblies. First an undercoat of AK Interactive Grey Primer and Microfiller thinned with Mr Colour Leveling Thinner was sprayed onto the model and left to harden for twenty-four hours. Next, the base coat was applied. I used Tamiya X-17 Pink with a touch of Tamiya XF-57 Buff. After three light coats were applied I was happy with how the sub-assemblies were looking, so I could start with the highlights. This time X-17 was used to lighten the central areas of all the panels, leaving a subtle showing of the base coat. Next came the second and

final pass with the airbrush. This was done in the same way as the first, using a mix of X-17 and a touch of XF-55 Deck Tan to blend the prior lavers.

With all the spray-work completed, the next stage was to use different shades of pink, mixed from red and buff oil paints to apply subtle filters to selected areas of the model. Scratches and scuffs were also applied to selected areas with the same mix. Adam Wilder's Light Grey Textured Earth and Light Dry Mud was used to weather the underside, the lower areas of the vehicles body also received a restrained amount of weathering. A

● last pass of XF-57 to subtly blend the upper surfaces of the Land Rover with lower chassis lingering slightly longer around the wheel arches where logically dust would collect. After a final inspection of the work so far, it was time to move onto the final stages.

FINISHING OFF

With the majority of the paintwork complete, all that remained to be done was the detailed painting. The seats were sprayed pink with the rest of the model. I did contemplate painting the seat cushions with a dark


green to break up the overall one colour of the Land-Rover but decided that there would be enough disruption once the stowage had been painted. So, I opted for the worn look. I used Abt 502 Starship Filth oil paint, this lightly drybrushed onto the cushions, and repeated until I was satisfied with the amount of wear. The remainder of the packs and tarpaulins were picked out in differing shades of green to add a bit of contrast to the rest of the model.


Moving onto the rear of the vehicle, fuel stains were applied by hand to around the fuel caps. Fine dried mud was placed onto the floor particularly in the corners, and to the bench area of the rear crew compartment once I was happy that the soil was in the correct position a couple of drops of AK Gravel and Sand Fixer would be sufficient to fix the soil deposits in place. The lights and indicators were the very last details to be painted. Two SLRs were taken from the Italeri Modern Light Weapon Set (6421) to complete the commanders/ driver's station.

CONCLUSION

This model was on my shelf of doom for more years than I care to remember, due mainly to a house move. But I have to say that I really have enjoyed getting this gem of a kit back onto my modelling bench which proved to be a refreshing change from my normal diet of WWII armour. Built from the box, or as I have done, and used aftermarket products combined with a little help from the spares box the model builds into a cracking model that the modeller can't go wrong with.

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FLIGHT OF THE BURNESS OF THE

The roar of an aeroplane engine picked up our little bodies and simultaneously, my friends and I were running to the nearby airfield outside our town. We watched with fascination a large, yellow-orange bird hovering in the white clouds above the field. It was a 'crop duster' and the dream of many little boys came true. So, I just had to build a model of this aircraft!

he Zlín Z-37 Bumblebee is a single-engine, low-flying aircraft developed as an agricultural sprayer, which has found a place in many other areas and countries. The first prototype took off on June 29th, 1963. The power unit consisted of a modification of a Soviet engine. The engines were modified from the original AI-14 to M-462RF with an output of 206kW in the Avia factory. The aircraft began to be mass-produced in 1965 and its production in various versions lasted until 1984. A total of 713 units were produced.

BUILDING EDUARD'S NEW KIT

The box contains two models of the aircraft, some photo-etched parts, a decal sheet offering twelve options, canopy masks,

assembly instructions and a resin figure of a pilot. The parts are cleanly moulded, provided with detailed engraving and riveting. Decals made by the Eduard company with self-adhesive spray masks to cover clear parts during painting. The coloured photo-etched parts complete the cockpit and external detail. The instructions provide a history of the aeroplane with photographs, a list of parts, the construction procedure and twelve colour photographs. The resin figure – depicting the Slovak actor Július Satinský in a Czechoslovak comedy movie 'My sweet little village' – arrives as a pilot 'Stefan' with the machine registration 'OK-HJC' which my dioramic scene represents. D



All we need for construction is basic modelling tools and to stick to the construction process. The parts of the kit are very accurate



O BUILDING

The plastic parts are very fine crafted, but it is important to clean up the parts carefully. I use Tamiya Extra Thin Cement for assembly. Tamiya Sharp Pointed Side Cutters helped me remove parts from of the sprues cleanly, followed by and easy clean-up of the edges with fine sandpaper. I proceeded according to the instructions. I 'fine-tuned', cemented and painted the cockpit, noting that each example of this aeroplane has a different colour of flight controls and instrument panels according to the markings option you choose.

I did not cement the small windows in the centre of the fuselage, I just 'squeezed' them in and they held without the risk of glue smears. I snipped off the halves of the fuselage handles as they would be replaced with photo-etched parts. I then cemented the fuselage halves together.

The wings have slit flaps and slots and I achieved a

perfect fit with the precise fine-tuning of the parts. I test fitted the parts 'dry' without cement first and once happy, then I fixed them permanently. The cementing together of the wing and fuselage proved to be an easy procedure.

This was followed by the cockpit glazing. My only one criticism of the kit is the framing of the cabin. The real aircraft has a tubular

construction behind the front plate from the inside. The front plate (sides and forward panel) is unibody in construction.

The front of the Cmelák and the radial engine were more complicated to complete. I assembled the cowling from its three parts and centred it by gluing it with the motor and the front ring in place. I then repaired the panel lines.

I added brake hoses to the main undercarriage legs, according to reference photos. The fit of the undercarriage assemblies is so good, it holds together even without glue. The model can be equipped with additional fuel tanks or a fertilizer applicator on the fuselage underside. Finally, I added the small parts and an antenna on the vertical tail area.

The author sealed the model with a filler on the upper part for inspection. It was then sanded and polished with fine-grit sandpaper and sanding sponges



Unusually, the surface was unified with pink Fine Surface Primer Tamiya in a spray can which gives the yellow colour the orange tint of a real aeroplane



Unconventionally, I based the colour scheme on Tamiya Fine Surface Primer L Pink which gives the yellow a rich shade of orange, like the original. I used the recommended Mr Hobby Mr. Color paints for spraying with their original thinner and GX100 varnish. The main colour is Mr Color C113 according to the instructions, diluted approx. 2:1 thinners to paint. I sprayed several layers carefully and subtly shaded the panels at the end of the process.

I diluted the GX100 Superclear varnish and once dry, applied the decals without the need for setting solutions. Very light weathering was applied using Tamiya Panel Line Accent Color, making a mix of a dirty-coloured solution using black, grey and brown shades. •

uch has been written about the iconic Messerschmitt Bf109 series in historical references and books and magazines. From a modelling perspective the aircraft has received attention from just about every manufacturer in scales ranging from 1:144

to 1:24, with versions from the prototype all the way to the end of the war K-4 series being produced in kit-form.

Tamiya recently added their expertise in the shape of a new-tool 1:72 Bf109G-6 following on the heels of their superb 1:48 release of the same aircraft. Prior to this release, the bar

had been set pretty high with the 1:72 Bf109 series from Fine Molds of Japan. Unfortunately, these kits have become scarce and, when available, command high prices. Without having one of these kits to compare, we'll take a closer look at what the Tamiya kit has to offer.

The box contains just three sprues: two moulded in grey polystyrene and one in clear totalling fifty-two parts. One of the two grey sprues contains just three parts; the left, right, and upper cowling/gun trough. This modular design suggests the possibility of different versions being

produced as the cowling configuration could easily be changed in subsequent kits by just replacing this single sprue. The overall surface detail is superb and very appropriate for 1:72 with fine panel lines and rivets where appropriate.

The clear parts are free from distortion and include the early Revi 12B and later Revi 16B gunsights. A small packet of two poly caps for attaching accessories is also included. Decals are provided for two aircraft and full stencils are included, as well as a set of seatbelts in decal form that are perfectly acceptable for this scale. Overall, the kit looks

exceptional in the box and is typical of what we've come to expect from Tamiya. So, let's get started!

CONSTRUCTION

Typical of most aircraft kits, construction begins with the cockpit. Designed as a modular unit that may be added after the

fuselage haves been the joined, the cockpit is well detailed right out of the box. Cockpit components, the rear cockpit bulkhead, and the fuselage sidewalls were first airbrushed with Mr Color C116 RLM66 Black Grey. Smaller details were then picked out with various shades of Vallejo acrylics. •


After waiting twenty-four hours, they were sealed to protect them from subsequent weathering steps with several additional light coats of GX-100. Once the gloss had dried, the cockpit parts and sidewalls were then given an overall wash with a mixture of Future, tap water and Tamiya X-18 Semi-Gloss Black. Chipping and metal wear were added using a sharpened Prismacolor silver pencil. For an added level of detail, a set of Eduard STEEL pre-painted seatbelts were added and are absolutely perfect for this scale.

AIRFRAME

With the cockpit components set aside, the fuselage halves were joined together and the forward cowling sections added. The modular construction of the upper and lower cowling is quite innovative and needless to say everything fits perfectly. Prior to assembly, the interior of the oil cooler was airbrushed with decanted Tamiya AS-12 Bare Metal Silver lacquer and washed with the same cockpit was mixture. I did make

a substitution for the kit exhausts using a resin set from Quickboost; these would be left off until final painting and assembly to make things a little easier. The cockpit tub was also inserted at this time and, again, fit perfectly thanks to the alignment slots and tabs. The control surfaces and tailwheel assembly were added last completing construction of the fuselage.

Prior to assembling the wings, the interior sections of the wheel wells were airbrushed with Mr Color C60 RLM02 Grey. The faces the radiator housings were airbrushed with decanted Tamiya AS-12 and given a detail wash, and the interior surfaces were airbrushed with Mr Color C117 RLM76 Light Blue. In retrospect, this step might not even be necessary as so little is visible once assembled, but it makes me feel better knowing it was painted! The two upper wing halves were then cemented to the one-piece lower wing, followed by the addition of the lower wing radiator covers and flaps. Once dry, the wing was mounted to the fuselage and fit absolutely perfectly, requiring no filler at all. With that step completed, major assembly was complete, and all in a matter of a few hours I might add!

FINAL ASSEMBLY

This is actually more of a series of painting steps than actual assembly due to the simplicity of the kit design. The main landing gear feature a unique tab system that allow each leg to fit positively into slots in the centre section of the lower wing. This design ensures the proper angle that is so necessary for the look of the Bf109 and also allows them to be left off until the very end to prevent breakage. The landing gear legs were detailed first; the oleo strut portions were airbrushed with Mr Color Super Metallic Chrome Silver and masked off after drying. The remainder of the landing gear legs were then airbrushed with Mr Color C60 RLM02.

The centre of the main wheel hubs were airbrushed with Tamiya X-18 Semi-Gloss Black, masked when dry and the rubber tyre portions airbrushed with Tamiya XF-85 Rubber Black. The landing gear doors, along with the drop tank, drop tank mount, and the cover for the centre landing gear mount area were then airbrushed with Mr Color C117 RLM76. The landing gear legs, wheels, and doors could then be assembled carefully with a minimal amount of Tamiya

Extra Thin cement and set aside until final painting was complete.

The canopy windscreen and rear section were added next to the fuselage and masked using one of Eduard's excellent precut mask sets. The centre section of the canopy as well as the internal canopy armour were also masked off and set aside for painting. Finally, the spinner and backplate were airbrushed with Tamiya's excellent LP-1 Gloss Black lacquer in preparation for the spinner spiral decal. The propeller was airbrushed with Mr Color C17 RLM70 Black Green and set aside to dry. With that, the model was now ready for painting.

PAINTING

Prior to painting I decided to use to an aftermarket decal sheet from Eagle Editions for the Bf 109G-6. The subject selected was one from JG 302 and featured yellow wingtips, yellow lower cowling, and a wide yellow fuselage band. These areas were first primed with Mr Color C1 Gloss White to ensure an accurate hue of yellow overcoat. Mr Color C113 RLM04 was then airbrushed over the white and once dry, the areas were masked off in preparation of the main fuselage colours. •

DECALS AND WEATHERING

After allowing the gloss coat to dry overnight, the Eagle Editions decals were applied with the aid of Micro Set and Micro Sol. The white spinner spiral decal, in particular, performed perfectly in adhering to the conical shape of the spinner. Once all the decals had dried, several light coats of M. Color GX-100 were applied to protect them during subsequent weathering steps.


To begin the weathering process, a panel line wash from AK Interactive was applied to all panel lines and rivets. After drying for about thirty minutes, the excess was removed with cotton buds and paper towels. The model and all of its components were then given several light coats of

Winsor & Newton Galeria matt varnish thinned with Tamiya X-20A thinner.


Exhaust stains were then applied via airbrush using Mr Paint MRP-180 Exhaust Stain along the wing root and in selected areas around the upper and lower cowlings. Heavily thinned Tamiya XF-1 Flat Black was also airbrushed in the exhaust areas near the





wing root to create a more realistic appearance.

The wheels were given a wash of light brown enamel paint and the excess rubbed off after drying. Finally, chipping was added sparingly using a silver

Prismacolor pencil in high traffic areas. I've found 'less is more' sometimes when it comes to weathering, especially with chipping and it's very easy to overdo it. The main landing gear legs were now added to

their slots in the lower wing centre section and the centre plate cemented in place over it. The drop tank mount and drop tank were then secured over this area as well using pre-drilled holes for alignment. Smaller details such as the centre canopy, DF loop, pitot tube, and aileron counterbalances were then added to the model. The final step was to add aerials made from stretched sprue painted flat black. With that, the model was complete.

Tamiya has really captured the look and feel of the Bf 109G-6 in small scale with this release. Excellent fit and engineering make it a very quick and enjoyable build and a perfect palette for painting. I'm happy to add the kit to my collection and already have plans to build another; hopefully they will continue the line of 1:72 Bf109s with subsequent versions... I'll build those too! ●





O HISTORY


Sikorsky, responding to a need to replace the ubiquitous UH-1 series designed and built the H-60 range of medium-lift helicopters, the first flight taking place on 17th October 1974. Various versions of the basic airframe with additional strengthening and mission-related equipment have evolved and there are currently many versions in US service (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard). Export success has meant the aircraft has served in numbers with Australia, Brazil, China, Colombia, Israel, Mexico, Slovakia, Sweden, Taiwan, Turkey and there are even export and civilian versions identified as the S-70 with a further twenty or so countries operating these, giving a total estimated to be around 4,000 airframes worldwide. Parts of the aircraft such as the engines and rotor system have been utilised into such designs as the Coast Guard S-92.

CONTENTS

A rather small box is adorned with an image of the Tiger SH-60B dropping a torpedo, it is interesting to note that this image portrays the aircraft in the correct configuration that the kit misses. This refers to the RWR fairing on the trailing edge of the fin and the shallow 'dustbin' on the surface behind the rotor on the top of the aircraft. Opening the box revealed a plethora of plastic and as you delve in it becomes apparent that some sprues only use a small number



Most of the rear cabin is full of boxes and seats and sonar storage and everything is provided in the kit. One omission is that there is only two sets of seatbelts and there are at least four seats in the bird I was building. I used similar looking seatbelts from left over etched brass belts I found in my spares box

of the kit as the parts don't match reality! It's a simple fix though and by reversing a couple of the rotor linkages and consulting good references a good facsimile of the real thing can be achieved

With the assembly taken care of, a little Mr Surfacer Black was applied and any seams cleaned up. Several etched brass parts are also added and once more good reference is needed. In essence the parts swapped over in the assembly were parts C17 cut and re attached so two hinges face one way and the other two face the opposite direction

The completed assembly with the top plate in position. This is (with a little tweaking) all from what is in the box. Some hoses are all that could really be added to enhance this although with the rotors folded not much can be seen

of parts, leaving lots of crossover items.

All of the parts are moulded in a medium grey plastic with nicely restrained surface details although the rivets are represented as divots instead of raised as in real life! Most parts are grey plastic with a further two sprues of clear, one of which was presented in its own stiff card box. All sprues are individually bagged along with a pair of well printed decals sheets and a single fret of etched brass, offering seat belts and grilles as well as other small parts.

Unfortunately only two sets of seatbelts are provided where there is a need for at least three or four. A set of instructions is presented as a small booklet with several erroneous numbers given, little in the way of colours are called out being matched to Gunze/Mr Hobby paints only. Unfortunately my set of instructions had a double page three and four



for some reason. As with previous Kittyhawk kits there are some very nice colour schemes on offer and this is no exception, with five US Navy aircraft and a Spanish version to choose from. For the record they are HSL-41 Sea Hawks, HSL-43 Battlecats, HSL-45 Wolf Pack, HSL-51 Warlords all in lo-viz grey with decorated fins in full colour Also a grey Spanish Navy machine and a white over grey LAMPS bird with no unit or ship identification. Weapons options are limited to large fuel tanks or torpedoes.

CABIN


As we would expect this model was built from the insides out, beginning with the cabin floor. Here there are several holes which need to be made from below using the depressions, just needing to be identified and opened with a suitable drill. I painted the floor with a light grey then masked and sprayed a dark grey to represent the non-slip tape that appears on the real thing. This simple idea adds a lot to the cabin. Over the next few steps seats and instruments are added, here

Both engines are provided and as with other Kittyhawk kits in the past I have chosen to only have one on show. You will still need to assemble them both as they support several parts which will be visible on the completed model



I used the supplied decals over the raised details settled with a hairdryer and plenty of Tamiya Mark Fit 'strong'.

As mentioned there are only two sets of seatbelts and nothing for the back seats. I added some belts from an old set of PE brass which looked right. Further details were added in the way of the sonar operator's station and here I tried something a little different to get a look I was after. I applied some nail polish foils of iridescent dark blue over some appropriate nail foil adhesive and this worked

Building the main landing gear was done from several modular parts which



• well, although it may be just a little too much contrast for the large screen.

Pilot's seats were also fitted at this stage and both needed careful construction as the shock-mount supports are fragile. A forward bulkhead with avionics boxes and a rear bulkhead were installed and I temporarily dropped the roof on top of to align everything. Whilst this was setting I worked on cleaning up the Sonar buoy housing and associated wiring loom. Unfortunately the main instrument panel being so dark will be lost in the cockpit unless you add some contrast and after applying the supplied decal I applied the nail foil screens again, then dry brushed light shades of grey over it to liven it up.

Further seats were added and hung from the roof section before bringing all of the cabin together. I must say that it all fitted without fuss and aligned perfectly first time, this was aided by the preparation of the holes in the floor earlier. In order to dress the bland sidewalls and electronics boxes I applied random Airscale decals to break the monotony.

ENGINES

Kittyhawk has provided both GE T-700 engines and their walled bays. Detail is reasonable and it lends itself to adding hoses and electrical connectors. As I was building this from the box I chose not to with one engine open for maintenance and one closed.

Swift progress is made and the engine exhausts were mounted onto a rear bulkhead. I used the main fuselage as a jig to align everything and liberally applied liquid glue over the inner seam to seal it. This was sanded later and the joint disappeared.

Jumping past the rotor head assembly, the gearbox assemblies were installed, as too were several outer panels which all fitted well. When mounting the intake shrouds over the gear boxes I found the need to remove some material of the forward fairing which stopped the gearbox fitting. This will not be seen again and although not pointed out in the instructions, it can be seen in the drawings. Adding all of the outer panels went

without hitch until I wanted to close up the left engine. This was not the best of fits and needed some filling at the front to blend it in. Missing is the upper IRCM transmitter which should sit on the shelf (part HC-25) and looks like a shallow dustbin. This is not on the kit sprues so the modeller would need to make one.

ROTOR

I hope that you are paying attention here because it's a little complicated! As provided the SH-60 rotorhead will not be correct. You are provided with only one part HD-34 but need two. In order to correct that part I took C-17 and replaced it with HD-33. I also took the rotor control horn off and re-attached it in


Orange which looked close to the images I found on line. These paints were applied with White-Tack 'sausages' as the masking between the colours. A few touch-ups were made and once happy, I gave the entire model a coat of Tamiya X-22 Clear varnish (thinned with cellulose thinners) in preparation for the decals. As you can see I went with the tiger fin scheme and found images of this bird on line within a couple of minutes. I am pleased to report the decals went down without fuss and just a little Mark Setter 'Strong'. Unfortunately there are some missing warnings for footsteps and sensors. Also of note is the rather odd writing on the panel on the starboard side outlining the sailor of the month, which appears in the kit decals to be a random selection of letters. It's a shame as it can be read even with my aged eyes!

FINISHING TOUCHES

With all of the decals completed I left them for twenty-four hours. Then, gently rubbed some white spirit over them with my finger. This softens the top surface and this can be rubbed away to leave just the inks of the decal with no carrier film. All was then sealed with another gloss coat. Weathering was achieved by using very thin enamel paints of various shades of greys. Once run into surface details it was

left to dry for an hour before any excess was removed with a damp paint brush and cotton buds. I also sprayed various greys randomly over the model as well as hand-painting several small touch ups to get the look I was after.

A light dusting of a fading colour – a few drops of Tamiya white and clear highly thinned down - was applied in a random squiggle all over the model. This was then followed by a very thin dusting of Tamiya X-19 Smoke over all of the panel lines. A this stage I started to attach all of the small aerials and lights that would be broken off along with the aerial made from elastic thread. Finally, this one can be called done. I must say that in conclusion this does look very busy and with rotor blades folded, fits into a small space nicely. Well done to Kittyhawk for making these kits, I hope that in time they can make improvements with their instructions.

An overhead view as might be seen from a carrier's island looking down onto the deck, with the use of a suitable base from Coastal Kits this result was easily achieved. With all of the rotors folded this model fits into a quite tight space in my cabinet



With the starboard engine covers open this allowed me some scope to dirty the bay up and I used oil paints to simulate an oil leak. This configuration of armed with engine bay open is unlikely but I wanted to show off as much as possible of what can be achieved from the box

As stated I added a paper clip to the fold hinges and managed to disguise them with paint and some grease stains. There are a few hoses in this fold so they could easily be made to look like those although I have not added them in this case



This kit offers plenty of options and detail throughout. The complicated loom of it folded disguises the fact that it's rather simple, but clever at the same time. Built in steps are provided for ground crews to access almost all of the aircraft



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What's in the box?

Tamiya initially launched the 1:24 Lotus Europa kit back in 1999, which in 'Tamiya-time' (like dog-years) it seems about three years ago, such is the quality of the mouldings. It hasn't been re-issued since, so this return is very welcome indeed, particularly as the box now contains a very useful fret of photo-etched nickel-steel parts, such as three grilles with fine mesh pattern, front brake disc facias, body-catches, carburettor backing plate plus buckles for the four-point seat harnesses. A new sprue of white plastic provides new wheels and a rear wing. The carburettor intake trumpets are beautifully machined from aluminium and the Lotus badges and plaques across the rear and sides of the body, bonnet lock, plus wing mirror faces are supplied in the form of fretless, plated photo-etched items with their own adhesive layer so they can be simply pressed onto their locations. The straps for the aforementioned harnesses are printed in red, blue and black on white, self-adhesive vinyl and just need trimming out with a fresh blade, then sticking into place. The model will build up quickly and easily, so the most challenging part will be the application of the classic gold Lotus pinstripes which run across the body and look very delicate!





There was a little confusion in the online modelling communities when this kit was announced, as it was assumed Tamiya had just dropped a new turret onto the existing 1:48 T-34/76 hull to create the up-gunned T-34/85 variant, but it is not so! This model is 100% new from top to bottom, using no parts from the early variant, the kit of which was originally launched in 2005. (In fact, Tamiya also listed a 1:48 T-34/76 in the 1970 catalogue and it is now a collector's item). In this newest release, the diecast metal hull is gone, replaced with a far superior multi-part tub formed from individual panels moulded in kit plastic. This allows the suspension's swingarms and their bump-stops to be replicated in detail, something lacking on the rather basic metal casting. As per the 2005 model, the tracks come in the form of one-piece upper and lower runs, short sections for the front and rear uplifts plus individual links to wrap around the drive sprocket and idler wheels. The tracks are beautifully detailed and are sure to fit perfectly around the running gear. The 85mm gun turret is another multi-part assembly and sports an exquisite cast-steel texture. A single commander figure stands in the turret hatch, and a length of cord is provided for the



towing cable.





Airfix launched their then newlytooled 1:48 kit of the Folland Gnat in 2014 so it's quite a recent kit. The Gnat served as a jet-trainer for the Royal Air Force for around twenty years and it really is a pretty little dart of an aircraft, its diminutive profile sitting low on the tarmac with a purposeful, nose-up stance. Most famously, it served in the RAF Red Arrows display team until 1979 when it was replaced by the BAE Hawk. It was great to see this subject depicted in 1:48; Airfix's 1:72 Gnat has done sterling service for decades but it is a tiny airframe at this scale, so 1:48 is ideal. This latest release comprises the same mouldings as before but with a new decal sheet for three markings-options; a red/silver No.4 Flying Training School, Royal Air Force Valley, Angelsey, Wales, 1968, an overall yellow Gnat of the Yellowjackets aerobatic team, No.4 Flying Training School, Royal Air Force Valley, Anglesey, Wales, 1964 and in overall silver aircraft with red fuel tanks from the Central Flying School, Royal Air Force, Little Rissington, Gloucestershire, England 1961. All three make attractive options. The kit comes on three sprues of grey polystyrene plus one in clear and the surface detail is typical of recent Airfix releases, with recessed panel lines throughout.





The main structural parts of Eduard's 1:72 Messerschmitt Me110 date back to 2012 when it was first issued in Bf110E guise; since then the kit has re-appeared at least fifteen more times as different versions, differing box contents, 'overtrees' and in other incarnations. The latest takes the form of an aircraft - or rather one of twelve aircraft thanks to the extensive decal sheet - that took part in the Battle of Britain, or more specifically, 'Adlertag' (Eagle Day), when the Luftwaffe tried to destroy the Royal Air Force, starting August 13th, 1940. The German air force threw everything but the kitchen sink at this objective but as history records, it failed. The kit is a lovely little thing, coming on six sprues of Eduard's blue/ grey plastic plus a circular sprue of clear parts that form the '110's characteristic 'greenhouse' canopy. As is often the case with Eduard's multi-variant models, there are some parts that will be redundant for this version, so it's essential to study the instructions before cutting plastic. The moulded detail is superb, with fine, recessed panel lines and even finer recessed rivet/fastener lines, enhanced further with a sheet of photoetched bits and a bag of resin castings for the MK101 30mm



cannon fitted to the Bf110C-6.



The Phantom II has long been used as the main fighter of the Japan Air Self-Defence Force, the F-4EI of US Air Force specifications being modified for the Japan Air Self-Defence Force. This is a completely new mould for 2020, with the kit getting onto the market towards the end of the year and into 2021, so it's fresh as a daisy! And what a lovely daisy it is. Fine Molds is a relatively small model manufacturer but the levels of detail and refinement they manage to incorporate in their models is nothing short of spectacular. Their F-4EJ Phantom II is a shining example of this sophistication, the eye-watering detail matched only be the precision of the parts. The central elements of the fuselage are formed integrally with a slide mould, TMMI passim, and the inevitable dividing-lines have been designed to be as inconspicuous as possible. This approach avoids assembly as much as possible too, potentially offering a much 'cleaner' build-up with fewer cementing points. One of the joys of kits like this is there's no need for aftermarket products (with the possible exception of seat harnesses) because nothing needs improving! You can just go ahead and build, enjoying the experience as you go.

'golden' model kit subjects that many modellers have been craving for years, this reviewer included. It's an Argentinianmanufactured ground-attack and counter-insurgency aircraft which came to prominence during the 1982 Falklands War (known to Argentinians as the Islas Malvinas). Several were lost in combat, one being shot down by a Stinger surface-toair missile fired by the SAS, but despite this, it was a tough machine that could take a lot of punishment. Like so many close air-support aeroplanes, it has a large canopy for an enhanced downward view giving it a slightly ungainly stance that imbues it with a very distinctive profile and also makes it a terrific subject for reproduction as a scale replica. Kinetic have obliged on the latter point and what a marvellous job they have made of it. It's a surprisingly large airframe in 1:48 with its straight wings yielding an impressive 300mm+ wingspan, tip to tip. One clear and five grey sprues make up the box contents, with a modest photoetched brass fret providing seat harnesses and other fittings. Detail is fantastic, the airframe being rendered with beautifully restrained lines and, hinged service panels, cooling vents and



more.






UK by AV Roe & Co Ltd (AVRO, of Lancaster fame), who subsequently built seventyeight examples, fitting it with an Armstrong Siddeley sevencylinder radial engine that produced 140hp. The first production C.30A (redesignated AVRO 671 Rota) was delivered in July 1934 and twelve were used by the Royal Air Force, arriving in 1934 and 1935, equipping the School of Army Co-operation at RAF Old Sarum near Salisbury, Wiltshire. It's certainly an unusual but very attractive subject for a model and in the military vehicle scale of 1:35, is a nice size too. Eight sprues of grey polystyrene comprise the main structures, with one in clear for the windscreens and a sheet of photo-etched brass in supporting roles. Decals for one of four aircraft are provided, three in camouflage/training colours and one in overall white. For a MiniArt model the parts-count is pleasingly manageable and it looks like it could be completed in a week with some concerted effort. Detail is fantastic and you won't need to buy anything extra, it's all in the box for you! Although it's an autogyro not a helicopter, it will make a nice display-mate for MiniArt's Flettner FL282 helicopter released a few years back.



Here's a MiniArt kit that is a lot more MiniArt than the AVRO autogyro reviewed here! The box is simply exploding with sprues, which, once unpacked from their fiendishly clever factory stacking-and-wrapping, made it impossible to replace the lid to anywhere near the closed position. The model depicts the ubiquitous T-34/85 medium tank but here's the twist, it's in Egyptian Army service instead of the more usually seen Red Army examples. The kit was created in 2020 and is state of the art, with extraordinary levels of detail on each of its many, many components, and this isn't even the 'full interior' release. Although much of the hull's internals still carry surface detailing, items such as the driver's controls, turret basket, engine and more are not provided. As gorgeous as these components are, this may come as somewhat of a relief to many. Being a Soviet-made tank fighting in the Cold War, this incarnation of the T-34 comes with a DShK 12.7mm heavy machine gun and MiniArt's 1:35 replica is a real gem; they could sell heaps of these guns in their own packaging. Also in the box is a four-man tank crew which are posed with great imagination and will really bring this desert-based machine to life. A fantastic kit of a lasting icon with stunning detail.

























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HILL-CLIMBING THE AV

Alessandro Prini converts the Belkits 1:24 Peugeot 207 S2000 into a hill-climb car that competed at the Trento-Bondone event

he Trento-Bondone Hill Climb is a hill-climbing competition that starts in the town of Trento in Northern Italy and finishes on the Monte Bondone mountain. It is organised by Scuderia Trentina of the Automobile Club d'Italia and the first event was held on 5th July 1925. The course is 17.3 km (10¾ miles) in length. It was described as "an absurdly dramatic climb" that begins in the Adige Valley at 275 metres elevation and climbs to 1,650 metres in the Alps at an average gradient of 7.9%. The track is part of

the European Hill Climb Championship and in 2014, the course was recreated in the video game 'Assetto Corsa' by 505 Games.

When thinking about the 1:24 Peugeot 207 S2000 kit from Belkits, I thought it could be a decent working base for a nice model. The proportions were there and with a little work on the fenders, rear-view mirrors and with a set of 18 inch, eleven-spoke Speedline Turini from Reji Model, the project could begin. The livery, as always, was designed by me with AutoCad and CorelDraw.

The lines and proportions of the Belkits bodywork are perfect and the components almost free from the annoying mould separation lines. The assembly phases are almost intuitive and the fit of parts is excellent. The plastic is not great to work with, being too elastic, almost rubbery: this required an internal stiffening of the body with a brass rod to prevent excessive twisting from cracking the paint. The extremely precise fit of the window mouldings required some reduction in thickness and dimensions, in order to

avoid chipping to the paint during insertion into the apertures of bodywork.

The kit includes small accessories such as photo-etched parts, self-adhesive masks for painting the edges of the glazings plus some ribbon for the seat belt straps. The tyres come with the correct tread but the wheel rims are slightly too small and unrefined in appearance. Unfortunately, in my kit, the roll-bar struts (as well as being too thin among other things) were crooked, so I had to cut out some sections and fix them. •

MECHANICAL UNDERPINNINGS

This is a basic kit in this respect: almost nothing on the undersurfaces is present and in the gearbox blocks, differentials and drive shafts that have been represented are only sketchy. At least the exhaust outlets remains visible and are perfectly centred with the hollows in the bumper, protruding sufficiently and are of the correct diameter.

COCKPIT

The cabin is well set up, as in reality; very simple but equipped with what is needed. In my case, since the car was a time trial, I removed the spare wheel and support but the basic systems were left as-is. As I mentioned earlier, the roll-cage required a couple of cuts to replace two very crooked segments, the heat from the hairdryer not being enough to remove the deformity of the piece.

The dashboard air delivery slots were opened up, the gear lever enhanced with small details (metal knob and transmission rod) and the steering wheel was redone; the real car was fitted with a two horizontal spokes, unlike the three spokes in the kit, so I replaced the central part of the steering wheel by adapting a piece of appropriately worked brass and a pair of metal rods to connect it to the steering column. The velvet-like finish of the dashboard and seats was obtained by spraying the paint thicker than normal at a high pressure. On the navigator's door panel I added an emergency hammer and for the composites I employed various carbon/Kevlar decalling. The display with the ratio indicator on the steering column was added and the control tunnel between the seats was lengthened and widened compared to the original part.

CAR BODY

With practically perfect lines (with some reservations on the front fenders) I had to cut away the portions of the fender that weren't fitted to the EVO, both on the front and on the rear, closing up the gaps with plastic card and putty. The joints in the panels were accentuated as usual with the tip of a modelling knife blade. The horizontal joint that outlines the black

edging was removed from the windscreen as it is too low compared to the reference photos, using was abrasives up to 8,000-grit applied by cloth and polished with paste and polish until perfect transparency had been restored.

The reflectors of the front and rear lights received a classic treatment typical for the chrome: in this case I used a set of paints for real wheels made by Duplicolor

(Tuning line) consisting of gloss black and chrome spray-cans.

The rear-view mirrors were quite different from those in the kit (obviously belonging to the 2008 version). Among the leftovers of thirty years of model making, I noticed that by reworking a pair of Porsche rear-view mirror shells, I could attain the curious shape of the 207 EVO's mirrors. Anyway, I came close enough!

WHEELS

The rims used on this model are made by Reji Model; Speedline Turini 18-inch, eleven spokes. They are well priced but unfortunately, Ì must admit a certain disappointment (oval shaped, too many printing defects, too thin bolts). Finally, each of the five resin bolts were replaced with new parts from KMP (www.kmp-sm.com). •



O MATERIAL TREATMENT AND PAINTING

For kit plastic, as always, a mandatory treatment was required for all components, with an excellent primer by Talken which allows the polystyrene to receive paints without subsequent peeling, micro-cracks or detachments, immediately or over time. After this, several light coats of nitrocellulose white were applied, sanded gently from time to time with mild abrasive papers up to the final shot, which was applied very diluted to restore a natural shine.

DECALS

I decided to make my own decals for this project, using computer-design programmes. The final design was broken down into two files: one for the colour only and one for the white only. As always, 'Fides-Grafica' of Verona took care of the printing process.

I have to thank the driver Fabrizio Ferrari for the cordiality and enthusiasm with which he followed the work despite his

commitments, as well as his willingness to provide me with documentation and explain the characteristics of the car.


Book Reviews

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PANZERWRECKS 23 ITALY 3

The fighting in Italy during WW2 was frequently brutal and certainly involved a wide range of vehicle types on the Axis side. In volume 23 (!) of the fantastic Panzerwrecks book series, attention is turned again to the Italian peninsula, this being the third instalment on destroyed vehicles in the country, the first being volumes 9 (out of stock) and 13. This new release has had its page-count boosted to 128 pages, in the modelling-bench-friendly 280mm by 210mm format and packs quite a punch in the sheer quantity of photographs it provides. We kick off with a KO'd Tiger I near Cisterna which is followed by more Tiger Is in various states of ruin, all making wonderful studies for modelling projects. The Tigers are but one element of this astonishing book, the real highlight being (for this reviewer at least) a series of stunning images depicting the StuG M42 mit 75/34 851(i) (Semovente in Italian service) which make ideal modelling references for Italeri's 'new' 1:35 kit.

To quote the publisher's website; "The Soviet Vienna Operation began on 16 March 1945 when the assault armies of 2nd and 3rd Ukrainian Fronts succeeded in penetrating the Axis defence between Esztergom and Lake Balaton. It ended less than a month later, on 13 April 1945, when all its objectives were achieved, and Vienna was taken. The defeat at Vienna inflicted a mortal blow on the Nazi economy – the Third Reich lost its important economic regions in Hungary and Eastern Austria that were still largely untouched by the war."

This sums up the theme of the title, but what relevance does it have for scale modellers? As it turn out, lots. We are presented with some superb shots depicting Soviet tank troops with the JS-2, a T-34 ARV, a wonderful image of the mighty Soviet M1931 203mm super-heavy howitzer, Lend-Lease Shermans and M3 Scout Cars plus the ubiquitous SU-76M SPG plus many others. The Axis is depicted with multiple views of the usual types; Panthers, StuGs, Pz.IVs etc., but the real stand-out material here is the excellent imagery of Red Army armour and its crews.

This new, 500+ page, hard-backed tome from respected authors Yefim Gordon and Dmitriy Komissarov in Crécy's 'Famous Russian Aircraft' series looks in detail at the Sukhoi Su-25 ground-attack aircraft. The book gets going with a look back at earlier Soviet ground-attackers and naturally, the greatest of them all, the Il-2 Sturmovik, is given a nod. The following chapters describe the development of the Su-25 in great detail, offering the reader an extraordinary insight into the birth of this purposeful-looking aerial attacker. Every conceivable sub-type is examined, accompanied by masses of good quality photographs. The latter are generally modest in size on the page and as such, don't offer a huge amount to the modeller wishing to up-detail their kit, but useful nonetheless. Colour illustrations scattered throughout show the wide variety of camouflage schemes applied to the Frogfoot and a smattering of cockpit views will help to a degree, but this is more of a background than a visual, walk-around guide.

















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
