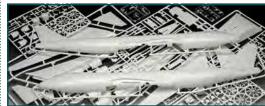

**Jason Brewer** finally gets the chance to build Tamiya's sublime 1:48 P-47D Thunderbolt 'razorback' and enjoys every minute

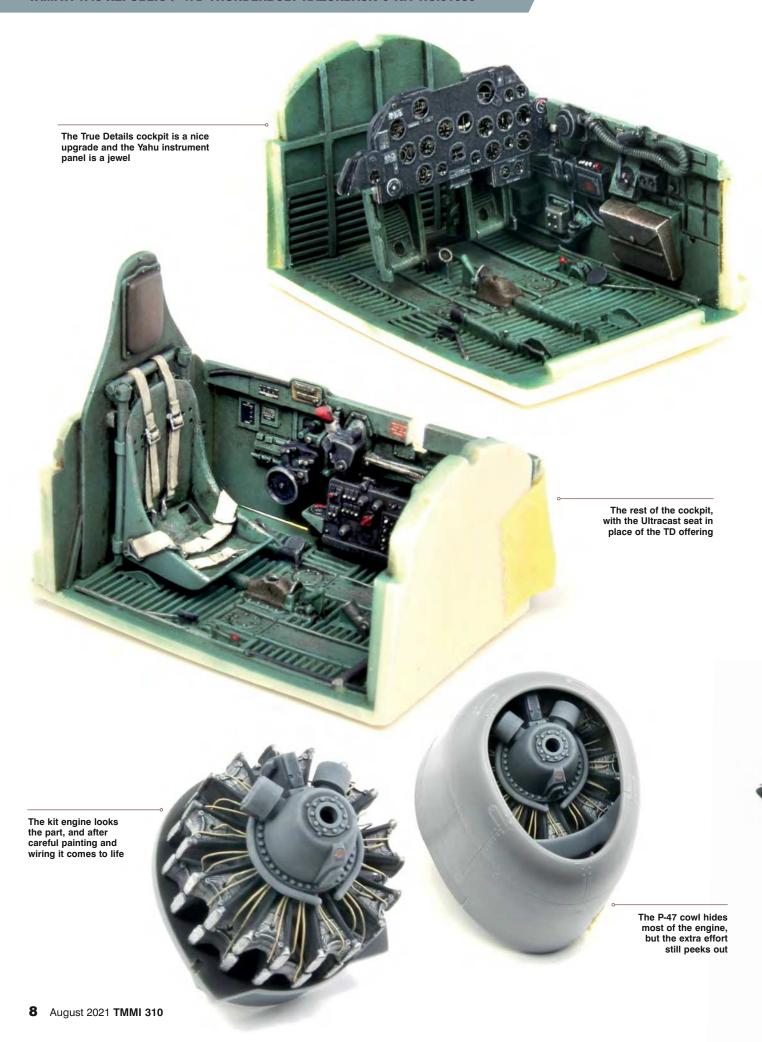

amiya's 1:48 P-47D
Razorback has been
around since 2002
and has a reputation
for being one of the most
enjoyable kits to build. I've
had this one sitting in my
closet for years, and finally
got around to building it.
Armed with an arsenal of
aftermarket to spruce it
up and some unique RAF
markings, I set out to see if
it lives up to the hype.

Starting with the cockpit, I swapped out the kit parts for a set from True Details. TD's cockpits are a little hit or miss, but this one is a gem. It was clearly based on the original kit parts with extra details added, because everything is drop fit. I also opted to use a beautiful instrument panel from Yahu, and a resin seat from Ultracast that is superior to the one offered by True Details. The cockpit was painted with AK Real Colors Dull Dark Green and details were picked out with Vallejo acrylics. A little bit of drybrushing and some AK washes dirty things up, and AK's Matte Varnish seals everything in. •







## **FULL-BUILD: WORLD WAR TWO ALLIED AVIATION**

TAMIYA 1:48 REPUBLIC P-47D THUNDERBOLT RAZORBACK ● KIT NO.61086

Using a diagram from Aero Detail No.14 as a reference, I riveted the entire airframe. With that done, the fuselage was closed up, wings were assembled and attached, and set aside while I tackled the engine. Originally I planned to use a Quickboost resin engine, but it was slightly undersized. Paired with the fact that the cowl of the P-47 hides the engine more than other American radials, I decided the kit engine would do the trick. Wired up and painted it certainly looks the part. The detailed Ultracast prop tops things off.

The roundels, fin flash, tail band and fuselage codes were painted first, then masked in prep for camo. AK Real Colors have become my paint of choice lately and these were used for all of the markings. After the camo was finished, all of the masks were removed and the tail codes were sprayed. I still needed to gloss for decals because decals were used for the playing cards nose art, then everything was sealed under another coat of gloss. **O** 







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• Weathering was kept to a minimum as aircraft from No.73 OTU were used for training and didn't see any combat. A bit of scratching and chipping in the wing root, various colour-washes of AMMO Panel Line Washes, and exhaust stains added with heavily thinned Tamiya acrylics and it looked sufficient worn. AK's Matte Varnish was used for the final finish as it dulls things down but still leaves a nice sheen without going dead flat. Ultracast wheels with block tread were a nice upgrade over the kit parts as well. Tamiya's P-47 certainly didn't disappoint! I wish I had built one sooner, and I look forward to the bubble-tops still waiting in the stash.

## GARBUN MISSIUN

David Hunter builds, paints and carbon-fibres Aoshima's 1:24 Pagani Huayra Pacchetto Tempesta - and lives to tell the tale!



ere is the 1:24 Aoshima Pagani Huayra Pacchetto Tempesta, which has got to be one of the most rewarding and frustrating kits that I have ever built! But more on that later. The original Pagani Huayra (named after a wind god) officially debuted in January 2011. When I first saw the official press release photos I was in awe at its beauty, technology and craftsmanship. Now

some may say it is an ugly brute, however I have been a Pagani fan since Horacio Pagani first released the Zonda C12.

Since its inception, there have been many variants of the Pagani Huayra, some wild and some subtle – if you can call a Huayra subtle – one of these being the Pacchetto Tempesta version. This version has several differences over the standard Huayra, some of these being

a different front valance, rear diffuser and wheels. For modellers like me, the news that Aoshima of Japan were releasing a model of the Huayra was met with great excitement! They then later released the Pacchetto Tempesta version.

When I first received the original release Aoshima Pagani Huayra kit the number of parts quite honestly took me by surprise, as at that time I was relatively new to the hobby, so I closed the box and decided to wait until I could do the kit justice. After a year or so, I saw that Aoshima had released the Pacchetto Tempesta version of the original kit which contained the upgrades mentioned earlier, so I obtained this kit and decided the time was now right to build it which I knew was going to take a bit of time if I was to do it justice!



## O BUILD-UP

Before I started the build-up, I had read on numerous internet forums and social media that this kit was difficult to say the least, with ill-fitting parts and in my naivety, I thought, surely this is not the case. Oh, how you learn! I had looked at numerous photos of the Huayra and could not pin down one car that I would use as a reference, so decided to create my own version when it came to colour and carbon. Speaking of carbon, I decided early on that I would be using the excellent Scale Motorsport Carbon decals throughout the build. I chose their 1:12 Twill Weave Carbon for the majority of the car, with 1:20 and 1:12 scale carbon on other areas. I am also a big fan of the Hobby Design photo-etch and resin upgrade Kits, so the set for

the Huayra was purchased. The engine, gearbox and rear chassis were the first areas I started with as I thought this should be the simplest area, however, with most areas in this kit I soon learned this would not be the case. The engine and gearbox were painted using Zero Paints Metallics as would the chassis, and given a dark colour-wash to add a touch of realism. As the engine block area is pretty basic, I added some styrene rods which were heated and bent into shape to represent various pipes and hoses. For the gearbox, I added over eighty Masterclub resin bolts, each of which were hand drilled and glued into place. This alone almost caused me to put the kit back in the box!

Next was the engine cover. I wanted to achieve the correct gold for the centre section and various other chassis areas, and thankfully Steve Hemming at Zero Paints came up with the gold metallic, which I used on the engine cover and in various other areas as well. It was then onto the carbon-fibre areas, which were decalled with the Scale Motorsport 1:12 scale Twill Weave Carbon, and clear coated with a 2K Clear Coat from Marco Teodoro at Firescale Modeler. •



The gearbox comes in two parts which was really lacking in detail. I used well over eighty Masterclub resin bolt heads here

The engine and gearbox joined together. This was now ready to be fitted to the chassis. The Huavra engine and gearbox is a complex beast! I enhanced this with styrene rod for additional pipework



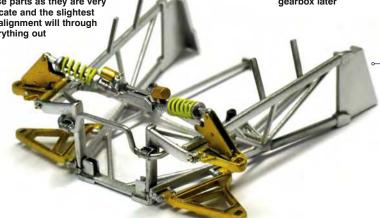
These are all the parts that make up the rear chassis. For anyone building this kit, take care handling these parts as they are very delicate and the slightest misalignment will through everything out

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## **FULL-BUILD: HYPERCAR**

## AOSHIMA 1:24 PAGANI HUAYRA PACCHETTO TEMPESTA ● KIT NO.05599

I used Scale Motorsport carbon-fibre decal extensively here and throughout the model, like elsewhere this was clear coated using a 2K Clear Coat from Firescale Modeler

## O CHASSIS REAR

The next area to be worked on was the rear chassis section. One thing I noted early on was how brittle the plastic used by Aoshima was. The slightest tweak would cause a part to break which was infuriating to say the least, especially the parts that had been painted. On bringing all the rear chassis parts together I noticed that the mounting areas where the parts joined together might need some alterations, so to aid this process, I brought out the chassis plate and started the process of building the rear chassis sections. All the pieces were then assembled without any issue.

Part of the Hobby Design upgrade kit are photo-etch strut tower supports and

metal rivets which are a nice addition to the kit parts. I also got a set of metal springs from Mr Hobby which I then modified to fit the original kit suspension struts.

The exhaust in the kit is produced in a faux chrome which I never like, so this was stripped with the cheapest bleach I could find. It was then onto the exhaust mock-up, where I quickly realised the way Aoshima had developed the mounting for the exhaust silencers bore no resemblance to the actual car. As the Huayra would be displayed mainly in the open position, this just would not do! I therefore re-engineered my own mounting points which I think are much more realistic. The engine,

gearbox, chassis and suspension were then all built up to finish that area.

## INTO THE CABIN

At this stage I needed a break from suspension duties, so it was onto the interior tub. It was in this area that I always like to add extra detail and work to. The full bottom half of the interior tub was the decalled in Scale Motorsport carbon in various scales as in the real car. I then had to decide on the interior colour. I wanted to show off the car's interior in a colour which would be a nice contrast to the dark carbon of the interior.

With this in mind. I chose Zero Paints Ferrari Interior colour called Sabbia (sand). I probably went

a bit overboard with the carbon-fibre on the interior. carbon decalling areas that will never be seen like the roof, using 1:12, 1:20 and the 1:24 scale carbon. The gloss areas were clear coated using the 2K clear coat from Firescale Modeler.

I honestly think to be a scale modeller you need to have a tiny bit of insanity! Other areas that I carbon decalled were the door cards, speaker pods, dashboard, steering wheel, etc. One of the major reasons I bought the Hobby Design upgrade kit was the milled metal parts which included the air vents, which are honestly night and day compared to the kit parts. These were fitted with ease, and I think really lift the interior.

Moving onto the front

suspension area, which thankfully was not as complicated as the rear suspension and again this was assembled and painted with Zero Paints Metallics. Within the frontal area there are numerous vent covers and shrouds and these were again carbon-fibre decalled and clear coated with the same 2K clear coat I've used throughout the build. In the reference photographs I had amassed - and trust me, there were a lot – I noticed that the washer bottle in the front was missing, so this was scratchbuilt attached and plumbed in.

## **BRAKE UPGRADES**

I then went on to concentrate on the brakes. The kit brakes were never going to be up to the task, so thankfully the Hobby Design upgrade kit comes multi-piece photo-etch and resin items which really are much more realistic. As on the brake discs on the real car, these were painted using Zero Paints Carbon Ceramic paint. I painted the brake callipers red and fitted the tiny brake bleed nipples from Top Studio.

Finally, it was onto the area that I had put off for a long, long time! It is my opinion and that of others that this kit was designed to be displayed open. I do not blame the Aoshima designers for designing it this way, however, I wanted to be able to display it open or closed. As I wanted to display it either way, I loosely dry-fitted the body panels. At this point I could have honestly put it back in the box again! The front and rear valances fitted as they should, but when I placed the front bonnet and rear engine cover on, well let's just say there were some big gaps! To overcome this, I added some styrene to the front and rear edges of the bonnet and sanded these back so they were a better fit, not perfect but better.

With the rear engine cover, this required more styrene to be added to the bottom of both sides where it meets the side sills, and at either corner just below the tail-lights. As I wanted to display it open or closed, I cut away the kit mounting points for the front and rear



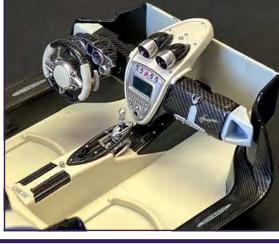
The main tub of the interior. I was told a long time ago, by fellow Tamiya Model Magazine contributor Robert Riley, to treat every area of a model as an individual project. This of the Pagani's cabin area was no different



The central speaker, which again was carboned using 1:12 Twill Weave Carbon from Scale Motorsport. I used a Dspaie Circle cutter to cut the area for the speaker which I used 1:20 Twill Weave carbon The rear speakers were also covered in carbon-fibre decals. With all the carbon in the car I attempted to closely replicate the rear vehicle as closely as possible



The main dashboard and steering wheel assembly For such a small area this really was time consuming. You can also see the Hobby Design turned metal central air vents



The dashboard sitting in there at the time, you can again see the amount of carbon decalling that was done. The cockpit area is very nicely detailed straight out of the box



The colour I chose for the interior was Zero Paints leather interior colour Ferrari Sabbia, this is a nice contrast to all the carbon. and upcoming exterior colour



Another area that will probably never be seen. the seat backs Again these were decalled using 1:12 Twill Weave Carbon from Scale Motorsport. The carbon was laid in opposite directions to copy the real car



The seat backs were again clear coated using 2K from Firescale Modeler, I also added some Top Studio rivet heads

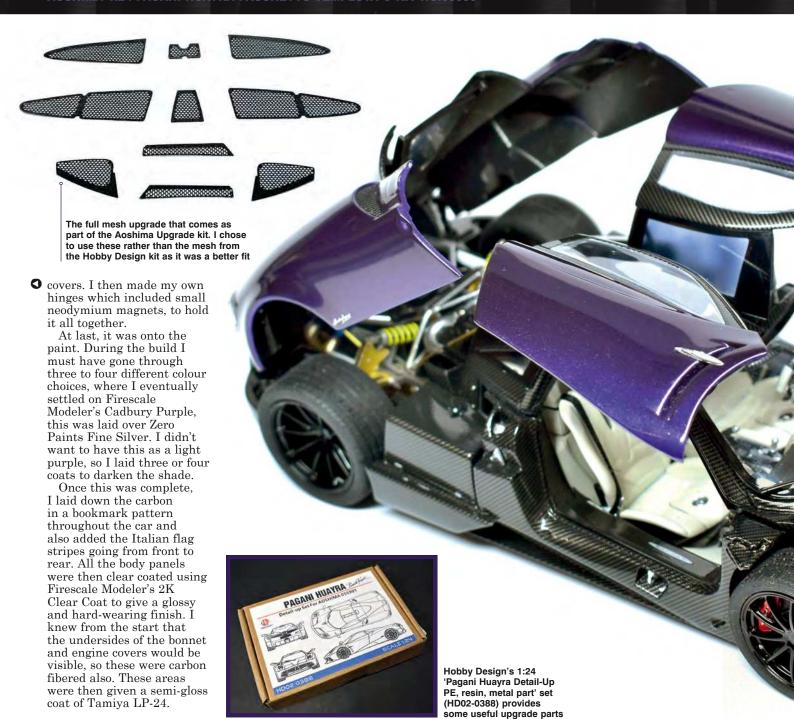

Tamiya have created three new blade types to fit the excellent Modeler's Knife Pro: Narrow Chisel X5 (74159), Scraper X2 (74161) and Scriber X5 (74160). All are made by Olfa in Japan for Tamiya and are thus manufactured to extremely high standards.













## **FINAL TOUCHES**

As the build was at last reaching its conclusion, it was time to do the finishing touches. The Hobby Design kit as I mentioned earlier, comes with numerous milled metal parts, including the round light bezels for the front and rear lights. The kit light lenses fitted into these parts like a treat, as did the light bezels when fitted into the bonnet and rear lights.

I hardly ever use the kit grilles on any of my builds, so these were put back in the box. I then painted the Hobby Design grilles and fitted them to the car, which again really adds another touch of realism to the build. In the past I have had mixed results with Aoshima kit glass, however this time I was pleasantly surprised! The fitment and painting of the glass area

was very straightforward with no issues. It was then onto the last part which was the wheels. These were first painted silver which I didn't like so then painted them black which I think really suits the car better. I added Hobby Design tyre valves which were tricky to fit!

## **CONCLUSION**

This is the part where I would normally recommend a kit, but unless you do not value your sanity, leave this one well alone! I struggled, fought and loved this build in equal measure. Maybe I am doing this kit a disservice but if you have patience and time — a lot of time — a very nice, well-detailed model can be built. So really, hats off to Aoshima for attempting and creating a model of this awesome car.

## **FULL-BUILD: MODEL CAR CONVERSION**

TAMIYA 1:24 FERRARI F40 ● KIT NO.24077



he F40 'cutaway' is a project conceived over fifteen years ago. It was to be part of a collection that included a whole series of famous Ferrari GTs cut in half. The idea was born while starting work on a kit of the Enzo by Tamiya. The contents of the box and the technological configuration of the car (made up of a carbon cell with front and rear appendages) made me think that under the plastic of the bodywork there was actually everything, or at least all that was fundamental, to obtaining an original model: on the one hand, showing the car in its entirety and, on the other, bringing out the structure and mechanics underneath. And this without touching anything, without opening or closing front or rear bonnets. That finished model of the Enzo 'Cutaway' won several modelling competitions and Alberto Balestrini (BBR Models) wanted to photograph it to create his 1:18 model.

Later work on the subsequent Testarossa and F50 was more laborious and required meticulous design as there was no ready and finished 'airframe'. You have to consider that once you have cut a bodywork in half and cut the other components of the kit in half, it is not easy to keep everything else together and to be able to consolidate the material until you have a solid 'finished model'.

With the first three examples (Enzo, Testarossa and F50) built, I started to think about the same concept applied to the F40. Unfortunately, commitments and the vicissitudes of life

did not allow me to start it at the time, but after fifteen years I managed to put into practice what I had thought and a few months ago I completed the model.

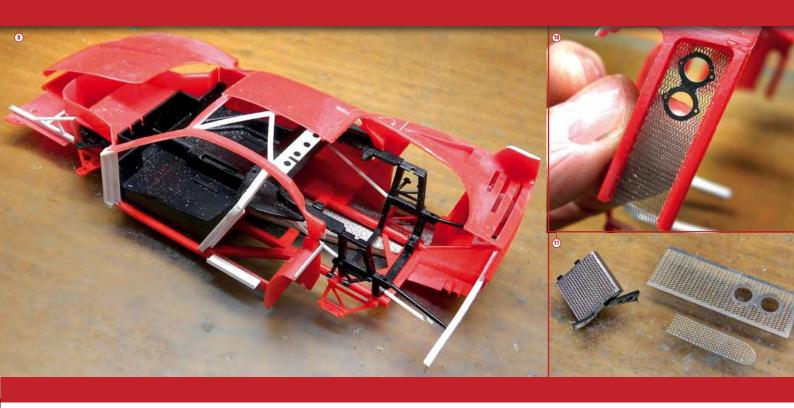
Luckily I still had the original Ferrari manuals in the cupboard and started studying them again. So I got the Tamiya 1:24 kit back and needed to find 'at least' one noteworthy detail set, even just for the brakes. Luckily a Spanish friend sold me a rare detail set from Hobby Design. I then started working...

## RODY

On the bodywork I carefully drew and engraved the centre section line to achieve that important "cut-off" line between the right-hand side: intact bodywork and the left-hand side: structure and mechanics underneath . I also removed the front and rear bonnets. I had to integrate the missing portions of the cabin with plastic card (styrene) and brass wire. The roof was opened and, again with plastic card, I reinforced the perimeter profiles as per the drawings I had available (4). As I progressed with the work, I removed material and components that were not needed and rebuilt everything necessary to obtain a credible "content". The "shell" on the left side was becoming unrecognisable but the technology and mechanics of the F40 were taking shape. The bodywork components,

The bodywork components, already cut in half, were assembled (front part of the model and rear bonnet) and made it solid with





card reinforcements and brass rods: this was done to obtain the maximum possible rigidity and to avoid torsion during the final assembly. The chassis, originally incomplete, was integrated with the tubular section rod and the missing profiles, especially the tail section with an inverted 'L' (5, 6, 7). The pair of small, rear-lateral oil coolers received their plastic card mounts and were adapted to be fixed to the chassis. Along the cutting line, the

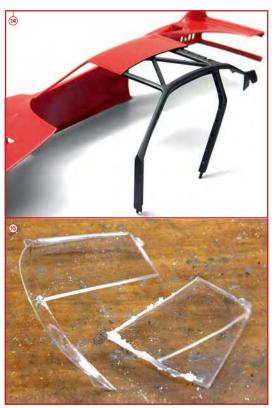
thickness of the plastic was reduced to the minimum possible with the use of files and sandpaper. Some details of the plastic bodywork shapes were improved or modified: the horizontal joint running along the side was accentuated and made angular with a small steel chisel. The front grille was also cut in half (8).

Here's how the car looked during the cutting process (9). At the rear, the mesh was cut into two pieces and the rear lights installed (10, 11, 12). The half-body was painted and the 'struts' for the left-hand side were finished in black (13, 14). The rear window glass, at its base, has a triangular shape that actually belongs to the bodywork part, so it has been cut out and the missing triangle restored to the bodywork (15).

All the gaps between the door and bonnet

panels were accentuated with a chisel to avoid unpleasant fillings from the various paint runs. The transparent parts (windscreen and rear window), after being cut in half, were thinned at the cutting point to the minimum possible thickness in order to restore the naturalness of a 1:24 scale glass. After working with files and abrasive paper of different grades of coarseness (up to 8,000-grit), they were finely polished to remove any kind of scratch.

## O WHEELS...

Cutting the wheel rims and tyres was a most delicate operation. Any mistake or mishap would have been irreparable: tyres cannot be grouted and reconstructing a wheel rim detail ruined by the blade is almost unthinkable. The tyre removal operation required a great deal of patience

and the use of increasingly delicate tools, until polishing (the tyre, without a clean cut, hardly ever becomes smooth again). The rims were painted two-tone: polished aluminium for the outer rim and satin-finished aluminium for the inner spokes. A safety cotter pin was inserted in the single metal nut [16]

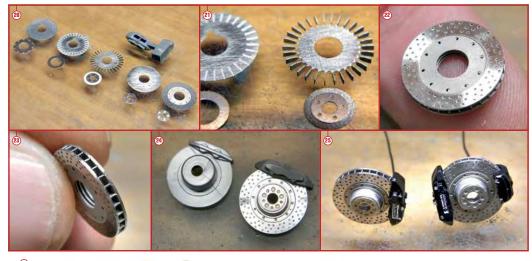


## ..AND BRAKES

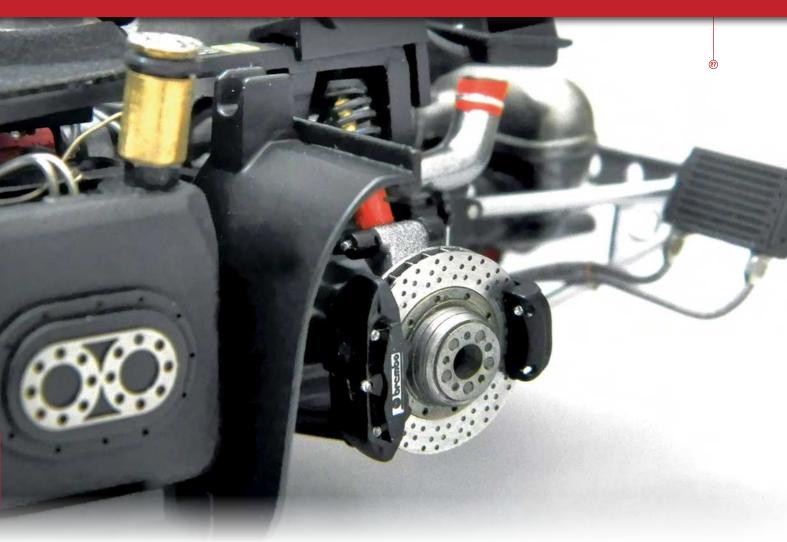
The beautiful components from Hobby Design were modified in order to obtain a credible and good-looking artefact. The disc hub was rebuilt with conically turned washers and the depth of the callipers was increased so that they could fit the disc perfectly (20 to 27). Not to be missed at the end is the hydraulic oil pipe system.

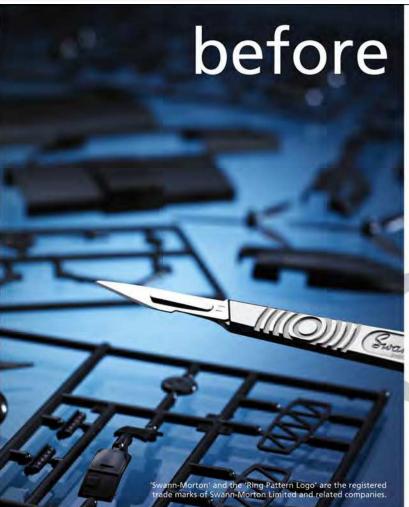
The compartment under the front bonnet was empty, but fortunately the central compartment (used to house a spare wheel or travel bag) was hinted at. The travel bag consists of a plastic card frame covered with a special, very thin leather. Finally, the entire compartment under the bonnet was lined with Kevlar decal (28, 29, 30).

The radiator was fitted with two cooling fans, partly derived from the conversion set, partly constructed from plastic card. From this existing template I built the frame that supports the radiator and the front bonnet hinges with the small cranked air intake that aids brake cooling. The containers for liquids (water, brake oil, etc.), such as the passenger compartment air intake and the brake assist system, have been built using reclaimed metal, resin or plastic components. The tie rods and triangles were improved and the suspension rebuilt with real springs (31 to 35). •









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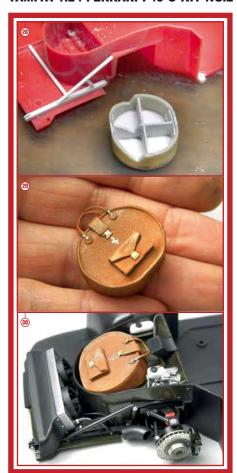
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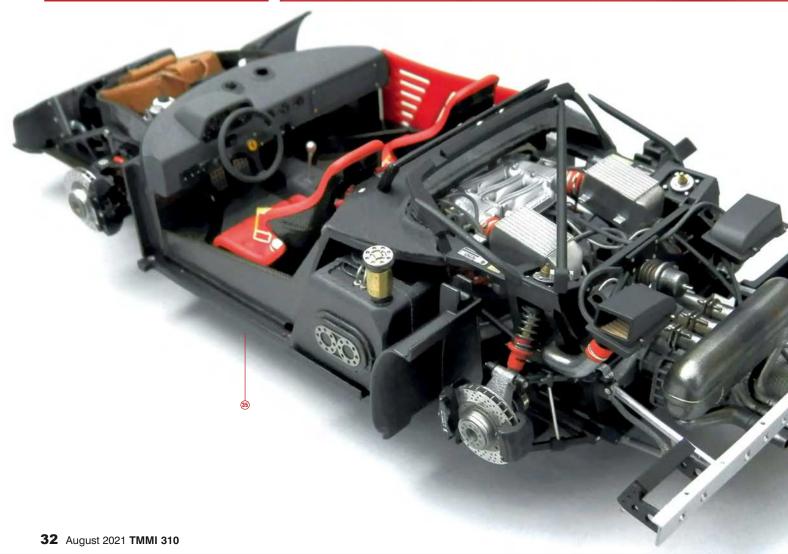


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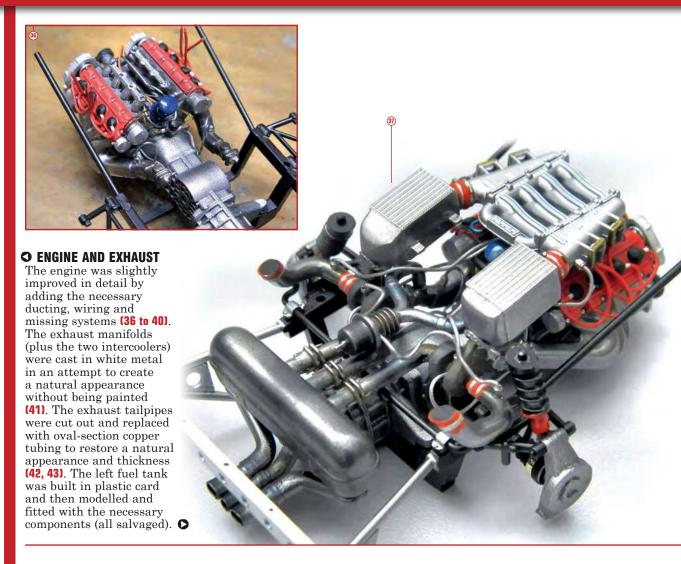

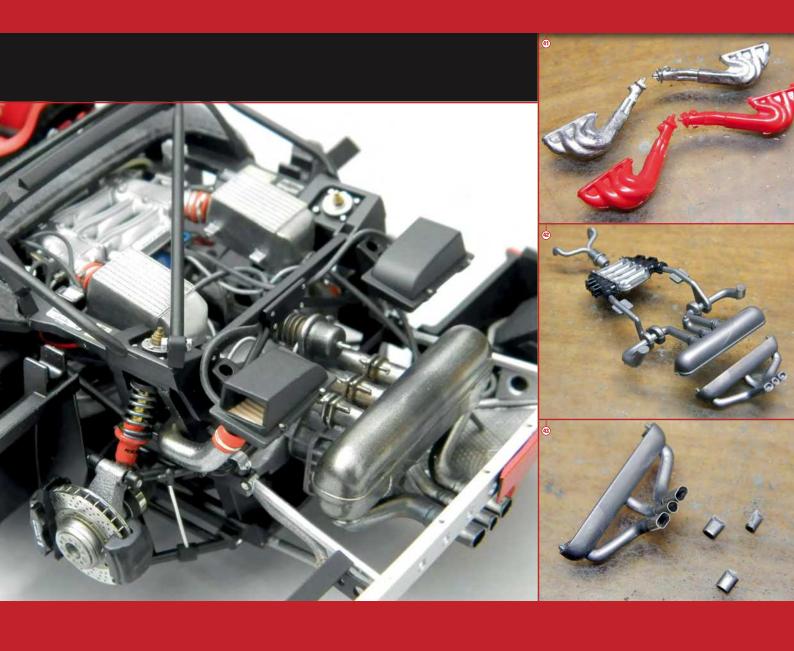
## O COCKPIT

The cockpit remained mostly original. The surfaces were covered with the most appropriate materials: fine velvet for the rear panel and central tunnel; Kevlar decal for the floor and seat backs. Special care was taken with the dashboard: all the air vents were opened up and prepared to accommodate circular adjustable fins, while the instruments have a polished surface like glass. The surface of the dashboard was painted with thick enamel and sprayed from a distance, so as to achieve a velvet-like surface (44, 45, 46).

The seat mouldings were given a texture to replicate Alcantara (47) and once painted, fitted with five-point harnesses (48 to 50). The seat belts are anchored to the rear panel and sides of the seats while the gear lever is derived from a special haute-couture pin with a silver head. The small photo-etched components are partly from the Hobby Design set and partly salvaged. •

With the addition of the Marine Corps's ISR/Weapon Mission Kit, the KC-130J will be able to serve as an overwatch aircraft and can deliver ground support fire in the form of Hellfire or Griffin missiles, precision-guided bombs and eventually 30mm cannon fire in a later upgrade. This capability, designated as "Harvest HAWK" (Hercules Airborne Weapons Kit), can be used in scenarios where precision is not a requisite, such as area denial. (History via Wikipedia). Brengun have replicated this interesting weapons package in 1:48 for use on Italeri's vast kit of the C-130J Hercules, itself requiring a conversion to the KC-130J variant. Fantastic detail as always.

Also new is a delightful little 1:144 kit of the Japanese Tachikawa-Kokusai Ta-Gō, a cheap and easily-constructed Kamikaze aircraft of which only three examples were built. The kit is tiny, as can be seen from the photos, but it still packed with detail.

Finally, and also in 1:144, comes a fantastic resin model of a WW1 British Mark IV Male tank, which comes with decals for British and captured 'beute' machines.

Often referred to as the best MiG-21 kit on the market, this kit does not disappoint. This is a small model but packs a punch when it comes to details, the surface is littered with crisp panel lines and recessed rivets with complementary raised details that really make this model pop. It is arguable that this little 1:72 kit is more detailed than the larger 1:48 offering. The modeller provided with a full weapons sprue so that they can have a choice of load-outs for their model. Being a weekend edition kit, this is a more simplified version of ProfiPACK which would contain Photo-etch, mask set and multiple marking options, this model however only offers two different marking options and does not include masks or PE. The two options provided to the modeller are great, one of the options is a natural metal finish aircraft in Czechoslovakia markings, and the other is a four tone camouflage aircraft from the Soviet Union. 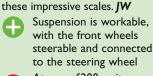

The Ford GT40 racing car has made a comeback on the movie

screen with the recently released film 'Ford v Ferrari', which dramatises the true story behind one of the most famous car races of all time, the 1966 24 Hours of Le Mans. Modellers were very excited when they heard about Meng releasing this kit in 1:12 and of course the likely comparisons with the other 1:12 GT40 made by Trumpeter. The Meng kit comes in a large box with the artwork showing the car Ken Miles drove in the race and you get a colour sixtyone page booklet that breaks down the build into fifty steps. Inside the box we have seventeen sprues in different colours and thirteen larger body parts, clear parts as well as springs, screws, pins and metal rods. Vinyl and a screwdriver are also included. The seats, brake ducts and engine piping are made from a soft vinyl. There are two decal sheets that are printed by Meng and seem to have good register and a nice glossy finish. They include options for either the 1st (black No.2 car) or 2nd (blue No.1 car) from the 1966 Le Mans race. The other sheet provides tyre and dashboard decals. Precut window masks are included, as well as fabric for the seat belts and a small photo-etch sheet. Meng has done a wonderful job in representing this in large scale, and like their Kawasaki Ninja H2R bike, let's hope they continue to bring out kits in

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#### **BRENGUN, CZECH REPUBLIC HENSCHEL HS126A1 SUPERPRAVA**

SCALE: 1:72 • MATERIALS: IM, PE, WS • ITEM NO.BRP72044 The Henschel Hs126 was a World War II German two-seat reconnaissance and observation aircraft of that was appreciated

for its excellent short takeoff and low-speed flight characteristics. Powered by an 838bhp Bramo 323 nine-cylinder radial engine and was armed with a single, forward-firing 7.92mm MG17 machine gun plus a 7.92mm MG15 machine gun in the observer/gunner's cockpit. It was superseded by the Fieseler Fi156 Storch and the Focke-Wulf Fw189. Brengun's 1:72 release is a new-tooled kit for 2021 and comes on four sprues of injection-moulded grey polystyrene, one sprue of clear for the two canopy parts, a small fret of photo-etched brass and a sheet of decals. The markingsoptions offer four aircraft, all from 1938 during the Spanish Civil War, in two camouflage variants. It's a remarkably well detailed little kit, with a five-part radial engine, well appointed cockpit and observer station and excellent airframe exterior. They key to success here is achieving perfect alignment with the parasol wing, which perches precariously over the fuselage, supported by just four struts. Plenty of test-fitting and maybe even a jig (made from cardboard?) will pay dividends in getting things straight up top. The kit comes with a single bomb (150kg?) and again, the detail here is well done. The production style of this model is short-run, so a little test-fitting will be advantageous, but a gorgeous miniature of this earlywar spotter can result, with

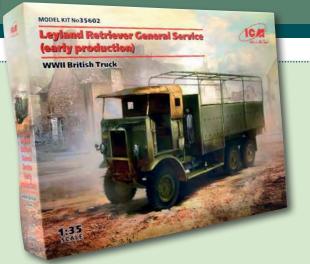












#### ICM, UKRAINE **LEYLAND RETRIEVER GENERAL SERVICE (EARLY PROD.)**

SCALE: 1:35 • MATERIALS: IM, PE, WS • ITEM NO.35602 The Leyland Retriever was a WW2 British 6x4 truck, produced between 1939 and 1945 by Leyland Motors for British Army service. It was equipped with a six-litre, four-cylinder, overheadcamshaft petrol engine that powered the two four axles. ICM released the later variant in 2021 (35600) and now we have the

earlier version which differed in a few areas, most notably the cabover-style cabin, which was equipped with a glazed windscreen and taller side/rear panels on the later design. ICM, as with MiniArt, is somewhat of a wizard with truck kits, offering highly detailed, multipart productions that replicate all the major structures of their subject. In this case, we have an element-by-element chassis, finely moulded leaf springs (sensibly, moulded integrally with the chassis rails for proper alignment), a comprehensively detail engine and full drivetrain. If you have the references, you can add the brake lines for the full effect, but out of the box it will all look pretty spectacular. The tyres are moulded from semi-rigid black plastic and sport early-pattern treads. They look very good and barely need a weighted appearance as can be observed in wartime photos: perhaps just slice off a small amount from their contact areas to replicate the slightest of amount of sagging. The cargo bed is beautifully moulded and the panels of its construction are free from the dreaded ejector-pin marks that can mar these types of model kit structures. The photo-etched radiator grille is the icing on the

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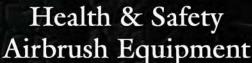


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PARLES-TU FRANÇAIS?

After having released the AMD 178 Panhard, ICM has now turned its attention to the FCM 36. French tank enthusiasts like Marc Génaux appreciate this move!

he FCM 36 light tank is a rarity from the Battle of France in 1940, of which only a hundred were engaged in combat. With the benefit of hindsight, orders cancelled due to the purchase price of the machine being too high were a boon to the French soldiers.

However, if its users generally appreciated the tank's mechanical qualities, in combat it was a complete fiasco against the Panzers. Unable to stop them, they nonetheless offered during two actions of sacrifice on May 14th and June 8th 1940, a day of respite to battered troops, on the verge of defeat, which made it possible to temporarily reconstitute a coherent front line. The FCM 36 had been designed to accompany infantry and had been sent to confront armoured vehicles. We offered the crews a one-way ticket to hell.

#### A OUICK BUILD? OR NOT...

For the assembly, a weekend will suffice, but if you decide, like me, to make a few changes, it will take a little longer. The hull is made up of mechanically welded panels (and not riveted as on other French

tanks of



time) is very easy to assemble, without any worry about squareness. We can just add some weld lines on the lower parts, less well understood than on the high parts. The running gear is pretty basic.

To facilitate painting, avoid gluing the dual road wheels to their supports (C28-C29 and C38-C39). To improve their appearance, the drive sprockets were fitted with photo-etched screw heads. On the track tensioners I changed the big bolts because they didn't have the right profile. The welds of the tow hooks were redone in stretched sprue. I added a few wing nuts, which keep the small access hatches visible on the armoured undercarriage guards closed (A5-A12).

The top of the hull sports some nice welds, but a few are missing; stretched sprue was used here too. There are still a few bolts to add, this time mainly on the axes of the various hatches. These are hexagonal socket-head bolts, the kind of item you can't make yourself! Luckily, I had kept strips of bolts moulded in the sprues of the Saint Chamond kit. The other bolts also come from Bronco kits or accessories. The tools brackets are quite convincing, but on the other hand, it forces the modeller to present the tank with all its equipment intact, which is far from the

case on the archival photos, often taken after the battle. •



The chains offered in the kit are made of injected plastic with two types of alternating links: open and closed. The modeller must assemble two sections of twenty links





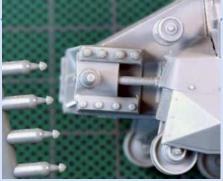
The road wheels are grouped in pairs on the bogies. If only the upper part of the supports is glued, their mobility is preserved, which is always helps at the painting stage. The bolts securing the axles have not been changed at this stage



The turret interior is limited to the barrel breech and the parallel-mounted machine gun. This is not enough to justify the turret hatch being left open



The ends of the axes of the various hatches need to be reviewed. Usually there is a rounded shape on one side and a hexagonal-head bolt on the other. The black-cast conical bolts of the St Chamond Takom tank that I had kept have found their use



The large bolts in the track tensioning system were replaced by others offered as accessories by Bronco. The bottom row has not been altered to show the difference in shape



Wing nuts keep the small hatches closed at the bottom of the undercarriage shield. A 0.4mm hole was drilled to introduce the throttle axle. The road wheel clamp bolts have been changed. They are more realistic than the original moulded ones



The weld lines, clearly visible on the silencers, were redone in stretched sprue. On this tank, the exits face outwards. Pay attention to your reference tank, as they can just as easily be aimed inward



On the side ventilation grilles, over-thick vertical reinforcements were eliminated, the slots have been deepened with a 0.2mm Tamiya engraving point and the reinforcements reconstructed with a thin bead of epoxy carved with the tip of a toothpick. Ready-made 3D printed grids are now available from FC Model Trend (35838)



ICM offers alternative parts for the hatches depending on the chosen configuration (open or closed)



All screw-heads were replaced with Aber photo-etched parts. The lubrication points were redone in brass tubing, those in the kit having neither the correct orientation nor the correct thickness, due to moulding constraints



The handle part of the locking bolts were reworked by sanding a plastic rod to modulate the volume. An Aber chain and a loop were added at each end. The whole thing is quite fragile and will not be glued until the end



Most of the tools in the on-board package are grouped together on the right side. The straps were extended with aluminium strips. Forgotten welds on the body were added



The brackets under the mufflers are completely rebuilt in an L-angle with bolts punched out. A piece shaped photo-etched scrap replaces the only support visible on the engine deck



The cockpit access hatch piston was embellished with bolts and brass rods to enhance its realism. The headlight support was redone and a thin strip of plastic added to fill a space on the front glaze



The original tarpaulin was reworked and the retaining straps extended with aluminium tape. A stud was added in the centre of the big spanner



The overly thick jack support should be sharpened with a round file. The separation between the body and the rear fender was accentuated with a 0.15mm Tamiya engraving point



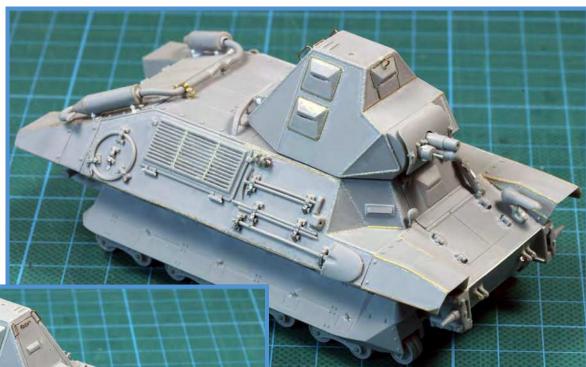
On the FCM kept at the Musée des Blindés in Saumur, there are some panels located at the rear of the lower pontoon. I reconstructed this missing part with plastic



ICM offers a rail that only covers the right side behind the turret. This configuration can be seen on many machines, this rail having to be quite fragile and easily damaged. Originally this rail covers the entire width of the tank. The author reconstructed the missing part by butchering the proposed duplicate ICM half-rail and rebuilt its reinforcement from scratch, oddly unrelated to the tube-based system on the right part



The handles were redone in 0.5mm brass rod. The rear door axle was fitted with die-cut washers and the welds around the vision slots were redone in stretched sprue The barrel shield was refined and a few bolts added to it on the rear face. The lifting ring was redone in brass



Overall views of the assembled kit completed before primer painting





Each track is made up of two flexible sections and the paint tends to flake off easily on this material. Replacing them with resin sections (available from Blitz or FC Model Trend) is an alternative

#### O TOOLS CHAINS AND GRILLES

For this option, either you gently remove the tools, or you redo everything in plastic card. The way of attaching the exhaust is much too simplified. I preferred to redo it with plastic angle-iron, trimmed with a few die-cut bolts. The main air vent of the B13 engine is wrong. While waiting for a fix, I contented myself with putting a minimal point of glue to facilitate future replacement. The side grilles (C27) have the right number of ventilation slots, but the welded vertical posts for reinforcement are way too thick. I removed them with a Tamiya 0.2mm etching tool, which allowed the passage to easily increase the depth of the slots. Then I redid them with epoxy carved once set. with a wooden toothpick.

I mounted all the hatches closed, including the turret hatch whose interior is rather sketchy. The welds clearly visible on the turret

seeming to me this time a little too marked, I sanded them lightly then re-etched with a fine point after having softened the plastic with liquid glue. The cannon shield was refined and a few minor bolts added.

I considered replacing the plastic chains but after putting a few links together, more out of curiosity than out of real conviction, I changed my mind. It works pretty well but I only discovered the catch at the final moment. To properly hang the chains as shown in the vintage photos (and instructions), they must be folded in half and the end links engaged on hooks. However, there is not enough space to slip these two links together! Either the thickness of the links is too great, or the hooks are too close together, or a bit of both! You will see in the photos that I have been cunning to hide the problem, but not solve it.

#### **COMPLEX CAMOUFLAGE** COLOURS

In Track Story No.7 dedicated to FCM 36, we learn that there were three types of camouflage distributed without any logic, observed between the two tank battalions. No logic either between the companies, except at the level of the markings, and more! ICM offers us two machines each with a typical camouflage. Wishing to personalise my tank, I turned to the Blitz brand, a specialist in French equipment, who offer some very nice decals in their catalogue, in particular eight new registrations for the FCM 36. The possible registrations are all in the 30001 to 30100 series (by eliminating the 30064 and 30068

who did not fight).

I opted for the first in the series, the 30001 called 'Le Mistral' with four-tone camouflage in slightly wavy bands and some peculiarities in the markings. The yellow ochre was based on XF-60 Dark Yellow lightened with XF-57 Buff. Sea green was represented by XF-58 Olive Green, brown by a mixture of XF-10 Flat Brown, softened with XF-52 Flat Earth.

of X-35 Semi-Gloss varnish. Weathering consisted of a succession of AK Interactive enamel paints and Abteilung 502 oils. Black or brown Panel Liner Accent Color can be flowed into the slits of the hatches to give them depth. The most delicate phase is fixing the vinyl tracks after painting. The paint flaked in many places and after a tedious assembly, it was necessary to carry out a lot of re-touching. I chose to add a very greasy layer of pastels with fixer to avoid any further untimely flaking

that accompany the model come from an ICM set released at the same time as the FCM 36 kit. I find them rather well done and they give a good perception of the diminutive size of the machine. To integrate them properly, I used an old resin set that had been sleeping in the dust for a long time. So that the FCM would not appear lost and hold the limelight, I wanted a more compact display. Using a cardboard template, I jigsawed a reduced shape with rounded edges, which would work better.

The painting of the cobblestones took a little time, but on the other hand, was disconcertingly simple. I prepared a palette with as many shades of grey as possible, going up to red-brown highlights. I started with XF-63 German Grey to which I mixed various shades like XF-83 Grey, XF-69 Black, XF-10 Brown or XF-57 Buff and I randomly covered all the roadway by varying the effects. In the end, I applied several very diluted grey filters to unify the whole. Once can also add a few touches of pastels in the joints and more colour-washes to blend all these colours as much as possible. I had a lot of fun with this nice little kit. I am impatiently awaiting the next France 1940 models in the ICM 2021 release program.

Abteilung 502 oils come into action. To obtain as varied a chromatic range as possible, numerous mixtures were carried out. The sill is heavily soiled. Several layers will be layered in different tones, ranging from ochre like here to lighter shades like Light Mud or Buff

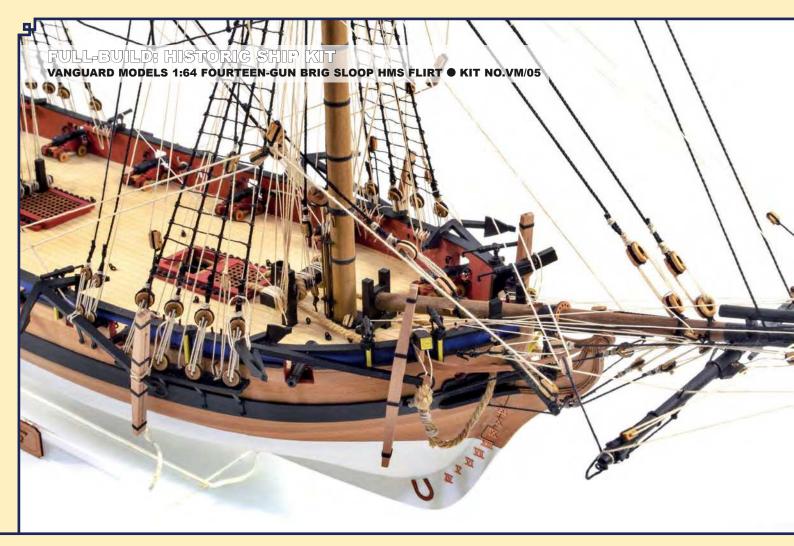

# HMS Brig-Sloop Flirt, 1782

#### James Hatch builds the prototype for the new Vanguard Models 1:64 kit of HMS Flirt

lirt was ordered in 1781 and built by Thomas King, a private shipyard owner based in Dover, with her being launched on 4th March 1782. The term 'Brig-Sloop' means that she was a two-masted vessel, and on the Navy List, sloop was a term given to a vessel which was commanded by an officer with the rank of master and commander. Flirt was 207 tons, the length of her upper deck was just over seventy-eight feet and her breadth was twenty-eight feet, eight inches. She had a crew of around eighty-four men and six officers, with only two of the officers being commissioned; the commander and his lieutenant.

Her armament consisted of fourteen four-Pounder carriage guns and twelve half-pounder swivel guns, but had posts for twenty guns, as the swivel guns could be taken out of their posts and moved and placed in another post. Flirt, along with her sister ship Speedy, were completed too late to see any significant service in the American War of Independence. She then spent most of the years of peace in British waters.

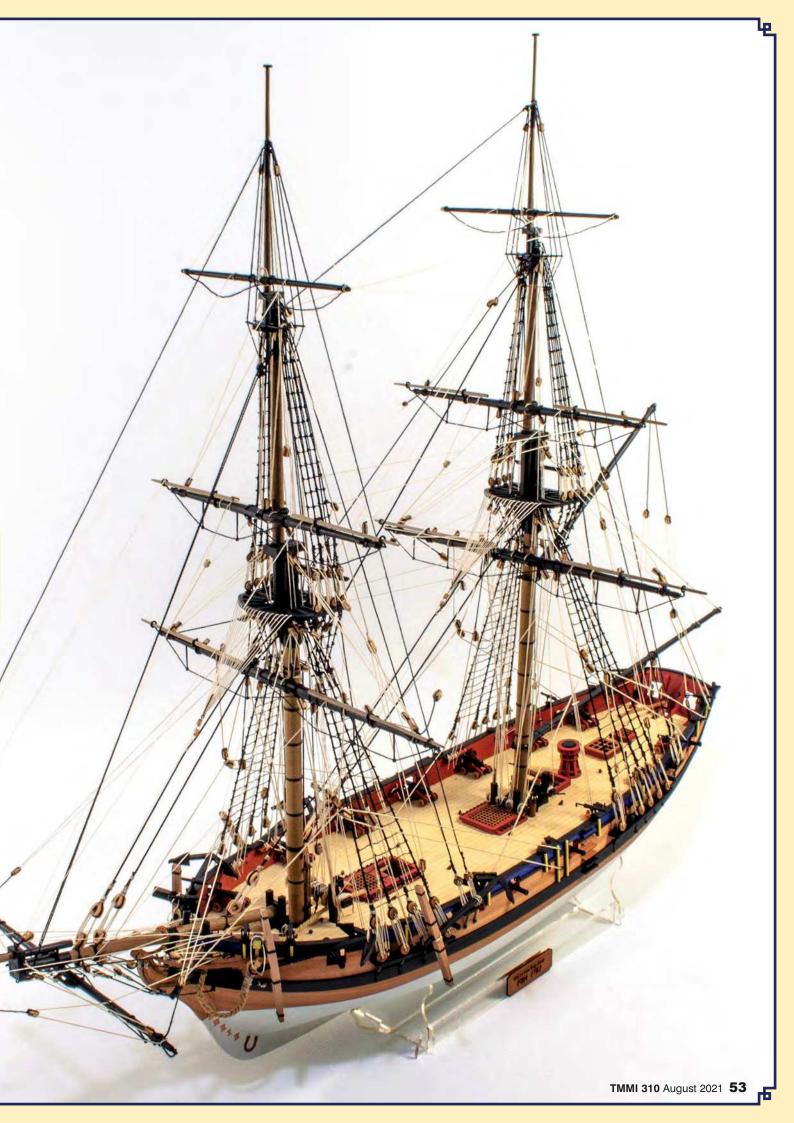
Flirt sailed to Jamaica in 1791, but was laid up in Deptford in November 1792, and did not return to service, being sold

in 1795. Daniel Bennett purchased her and had her almost rebuilt. She was then employed as a whaler in the Southern Whale Fishery. A French privateer captured her in 1803 as Flirt was returning to Britain from a whaling voyage.

This model was built from a converted HMS Speedy kit, working alongside Chris Watton for reference to the changes that needed to be implemented for HMS Flirt. Building Chris Watton's new HMS Flirt prototype took me around ten weeks during the recent furlough period due to coronavirus. That was with me working most days for at least four hours per day and sometimes much longer. I'm not a fast builder, but this should give you an indication as to the amount of time it will take to create a model like this.

I wouldn't recommend this model to an absolute beginner, unless they have good general modelling skills that they could tailor to such a build. It is certainly more of an intermediate-level project, and one with some of the very finest materials available, such as the pearwood external planking which looks great under a coat of polyurethane varnish. A most enjoyable model to build, and one that looks fantastic when completed. •



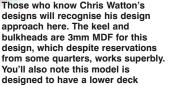

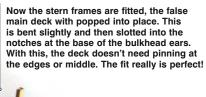
My prototype kit was fitted with ceiba ply, pre-engraved with laser. This





material wasn't found to be very good for laser use, and the final product will have these made from birch ply. The deck is installed in four sections, and leaves options for the modeller to detail this further, if they wish

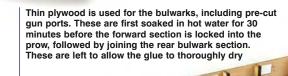




To protect the stern frames, the stern counter and stern board are now glued into place using CA gel to allow some time for positioning the parts. Temporarily fitting the keel post helps to align the stern counter



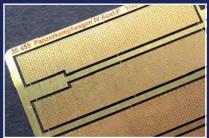
The inner prow is now test-fitted then glued into place on the bow. This has slots into which the first layer of lime planking will terminate. As this part will be seen under final varnish, it's made from a beautiful grade of pearwood, as with all the exterior timbering of this model

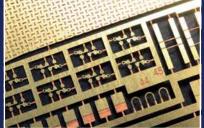


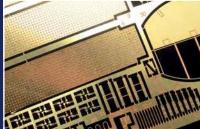

On the sheet, which is concise rather than overwhelming, you will find fender-top anti-slip plates, turret bin lid, engine cooling flaps, tool brackets and other detail upgrades









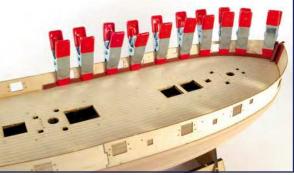
first pear plank on the bulwarks. From here, the hull is planked downwards, towards the keel, tapering and bevelling as we go. I use CA gel to fix these as it gives me seconds to finalise the position and also means I don't need to pin them



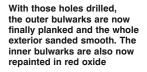
The remnants sanded down, so they are flush with the false deck. Any remains on the bulwarks are also removed and sanded smooth for planking

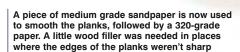


Before the proper deck can be laid down, the inner bow and stern areas of the ship are painted in red oxide paint



My pre-painted inner bulwark planks are now fitted. The problem with this being the gaps I couldn't avoid. These had to be filled and sanded back. Tape was then added to the deck to protect it from a subsequent repainting

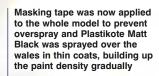






For my prototype, the standard lime deck was supplied. This is beautifully laser-engraved with plank and treenail detail. This is now glued into position with Titebond wood glue, and mini clamps fitted around the perimeter do hold it down





#### FULL-BUILD: HISTORIC SHIP KIT

The hair brackets, cheeks and hawse hole panel are now fitted. The hawse holes themselves are gradually opened up carefully with gradually larger drill sizes. I used a piece of scrap wood behind the hole to prevent the bulwark timbers from splintering outwards



CA gel is now used to finally fit the various swivel port sections and then the sections which run across the gun ports are then snipped out and removed



As a nice contrast to the white hull are the depth markers, horseshoe plate and fish plate. These are painted with copper lacquer and sealed with varnish. The parts are then carefully glued to the hull and more varnish is brushed over them to seal them while work continues



Despite its seeming complexity, the capstan is quite simple to build and fits together perfectly

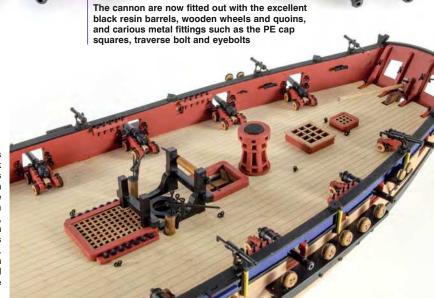


All cannon carriage parts are removed from the pearwood sheets and carefully assembled. The completed units are then airbrushed in red oxide paint along with the newly assembled capstan



Main Bitt/Windlass. All wood parts are painted black. The resin Jeer and topsail bitts windlass is now painted in a wood colour using oil paints, and slotted wooden assembly. The pawls and handles are now added

One of my favourite tasks is to fit out the deck with all of the various assemblies that have been built. Here you see the rear half of the deck with the cannon, grates, bitts, capstan and windlass in place. Evo-Stick PVA was used to secure everything. Also note the belaying pin racks that are now pinned and glued into place





Not all hull planking is complete! The 18' cutter that sits atop the deck, is now built on its own jig and planked with 2mm pear strips, glued with CA gel

The completed launch is a little model in its own right, fitted out with rails, seating, PE floor and various accessories such as oars, pikes and anchors





The crosstrees are assembled and glued to the lower mast tops, and then these fitted to the shaped and squared mast sections, along with the cheeks. On HMS Flirt the series of holes along the front of the mast top, need to be properly opened up as they will be rigged

Both completed masts have black cartridge paper added to the lower sections, to simulate the ironwork straps. These are cut to an even width with a dual Olfa cutter and glued with PVA

This photo shows the hull finally fitted out and ready to add the masts and rigging. The deadeyes are now securely in place. The 18' cutter won't be fitted until the end as it will hinder the rigging



With the main shroud lines in place, the futtock staves and catharpins and now fitted, to stop the shrouds flaring and pulling out of alignment



In this photo, you can see the crowsfeet rigging on the lower mast tops. These are rigged to the main preventer stays, via a photo etch euproe block and 2mm rigging blocks



The upper shroud lines and futtock shrouds are now added and carefully tensioned

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#### T-34 COLORS T-34 TANK CAMOUFLAGE PATTERNS IN WWII

Without question the most important tank of the Second World War, the Soviet T-34 came in many varieties and, surprisingly, was seen in more colours than just overall green. This new title from AMMO by Mig Jimenez comes in portrait format between soft covers and comprises 92 pages of colour illustrations by Igor Donchik, chronicling this famous tank in its manifold manifestations. Somewhat oddly, the book kicks off with eighteen or so pages dedicated to captured T-34s in Wehrmacht service, a chapter this reviewer feels should have taken final billing. This is followed by T-34s in Polish service, then Czech, Finnish and lastly, the Soviet Red Army. Despite the somewhat topsy-turvy chapter order, the illustrations are excellent and the book should provide some ideas when modellers are struggling to find paint schemes that will give their models some individuality. 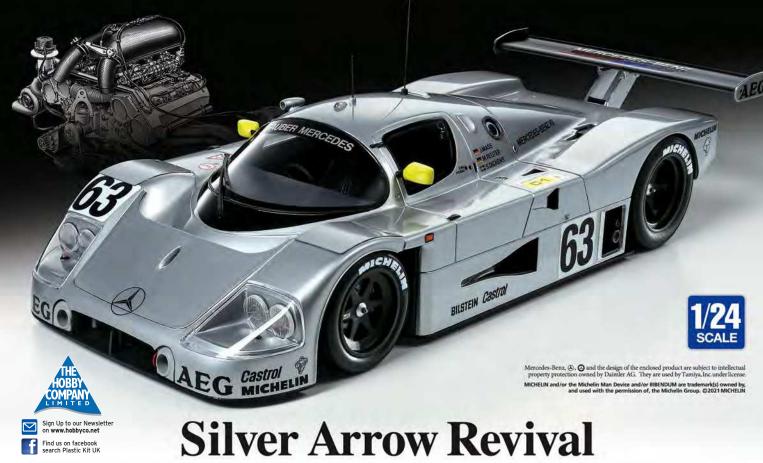






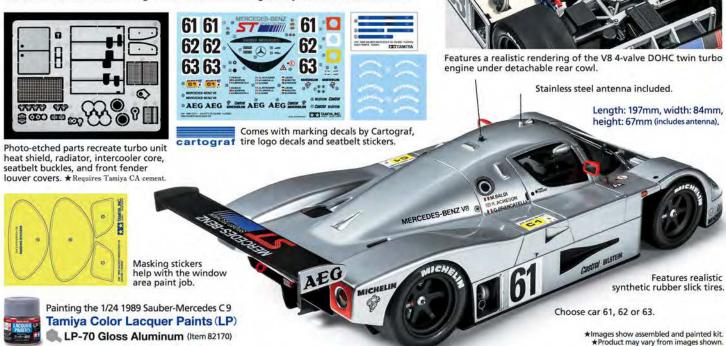






# 1/24 Sports Car Series 1989 Sauber-Mercedes C9 (Item 24359)
