MUSTANG, THIS IS MAVERICK, REQUESTING FLY-BY...

Tamiya's epic 1:48 F-14A Tomcat has been modified to recreate a pre-launch scene, complete with carrier deck 'shooter' figure

his kit recreates the Grumman F-14A Tomcat (Late Model) US Navy fighter, famous for being the first mass-production and the most-produced model of the F-14 series. The aircraft was in service from the late 1980s to the early 2000s. It is based, naturally, on the F-14A released in 2016 (61114) but with some significant new inclusions. New sprues are provided, carrying the necessary parts to depict the aircraft in take-off mode: wings swept fully forward (supported by an impressive one-piece moulding) flaps and leading-edge slats extended plus new front undercarriage leg in the compressed 'kneeling' position. Please note: this model can not depict the wings at their neutral 'swept back' position.

New features include AAX-1 TCS telephoto camera pod, underwing ALR-45 radar warning antenna and four Mk.82 500lb LDGP (Low-Drag General-Purpose) bombs. The cockpit interior exhibits late-model ejector seat cushions, instrument panel and side console panels.


The kit now comes with a catapult officer figure (called 'shooter') who gives the 'okay' for the operator to release the shuttle plus a printed paper flight-deck sheet. Tamiya provide a decal sheet to help modellers realistically recreate the arcs of dark staining on the upper rear fuselage caused by the wings sweeping backwards, a very cool touch! Of course, these effects can be simulated with paint and weathering materials if the modeller prefers.

The model comes with four markings options: two for F-14As from the VF-32 'Swordsmen', one VF-211 'Fighting Checkmates' plus one VF-154 Black Knights. Overall, this is a very welcome addition to Tamiya's 1:48 F-14 Tomcat range and there will be a full, in-depth article in TMMI soon!
















RIDERS ON THE STORM

As a salute to François Verlinden, **Javier Redondo** creates an atmospheric Mekong Delta dioramic scene for Tamiya's 1:35 'Brown Water Navy' PBR MK.II 'Pibber'



rom the beginning of the intervention in Vietnam, the geographic, tactical and economic disposition of the extensive inland waterways of South Vietnam were for the North American strategists a strategic factor of vital importance. With approximately 39,000 km² of rivers, canals and streams, the lush Mekong Delta region south of Saigon had the highest percentage of population and produced most of the rice crop.

Since the land

communication routes were rudimentary, it was the waterways that allowed easy access to the most important resources in the region. It was obvious that whoever could control the rivers and canals of the Mekong would control the heart of South Vietnam.

Such a mission was assigned to the US Navy, which established a plan in December 1965 to patrol and monitor the area under Task Force 116. Consequently, in March 1966, the Navy began acquiring Patrol Boat River (PBR) as well, known as Pibber, built in the United States by Modutec Marine. The training of the future crews of the Brown Water Navy took place in the training centre of USN Coronado and Mare Island (California). This term was coined by the Navy during the Civil War to name the naval forces that carried out their operations in rivers, lakes and coastal environments.

These units operated

from bases established along strategic rivers, or from Navy ships anchored in the vicinity that served as floating base facilities for each PBR section and in turn, a helicopter detachment. The mission of the PBRs employed during the conflict, from March 1966 to the end of 1971, was primarily to intercept and disrupt enemy arms shipments, but they also took part in infiltration and recovery missions for Navy SEAL commandos. •

Once I had the final measurements of the base, I cut a 38cm x 25cm foam sheet and with the help of a sharp cutter, I shaped the hole where the Pibber would later be inserted. On the right margin I simulated an elevation with the same material and positioned the Buddha's head. With modelling putty, I gave some the shape to the water



Once the putty was dry, I applied a couple of coats of Vallejo Black Primer, ensuring that it completely covered the entire surface. In addition to providing a primed base, being acrylic paint, it would leave a waterproof film that will prevent the resin from infiltrating the foam later and dissolving it



With two-component epoxy resin, tinted with a few drops of Vallejo 879 Green Brown, I applied three coats of about two millimetres, allowing the resin to dry between each of them



When the resin had completely cured, I checked that the boat fitted perfectly in the hole where it would be located. If for any reason the protective tape that has served as a bathtub had given way, allowing the resin to leak, I carefully cut it with a blade and removed it, until it fitted without forcing

3 Two versions were built, the Mk.I and the Mk.II, which differed basically in dimensions and the improved performance in the second version. With a fibreglass hull and aluminium gunwales to resist wear, it mounted two 180hp Detroit Diesel 6V53N engines and Jacuzzi Brothers 14YJ water pump-jet with thrust buckets for reverse thrust that provided a maximum speed of 28.5 knots (53 km/h). The light weight of 8.9 tons allowed it to operate in shallow and overgrown waters.

The armament consisted of a rotating turret armed with twin M2HB .50cal Browning machine guns, a .50cal at the stern, a port

or starboard-mounted M60 machine gun and a Mk.19 40mm grenade launcher, as well as a crew of M16 rifles. The ceramic armour was only installed on the gun shields and bridge as these boats were fundamentally designed to exploit their rapid acceleration, manoeuvrability and speed, to escape difficult situations.

The PBR had a four-man crew. A first-class noncommissioned officer who served as a captain, a gunner, an engineer, and a sailor on board. Each member of the crew was trained to stand in for the other in case of need. They were withdrawn from active duty by the United States Navy immediately after the Vietnam War in the early 1970s. •

This pack of six acrylic paints provides the shades necessary for the realistic reproduction of a leather surface, whether on a WW I flying coat as per the box-art, or on vehicle seats, soldiers' webbing, rifle slings etc. It will take some skill to perfect the effects but it's a good start!










Rope was added to the anchor, which was shaped by moistening the thread - supplied in the kit box - with white glue diluted in water. Once dry, it was painted by applying ochre-toned colour-washes



The canvas that covered the rotating turret when it was not in service was modelled with Magic Sculp and above right, a close up of the name of the boat



The magazines are provided by ETA Diorama Accessories. The cassette tapes are included on Eduard's photo-etched sheet for the PBR



The shield of the .50cal. machine gun on the stern was decorated with an old decal from the scrap box plus various graffiti painted by brush



I tied the tyres in position with fine white sewing thread, later painted with gouache



I applied dry pigments, some filters and various splashes to the awning that covers the cockpit, painted in Tamiya XF-49 Khaki. I improved the detail by adding a lens



I detailed the life ring by adding the rope and its anchors. I painted it with Red 957 from Model Color and applied some chips with a brush using Black 950



I simulated wet areas with Vallejo Wet Effects, applied by airbrush and brush



I shaped the printed paper flag included in the kit by moistening the surface with white glue




To achieve some chromatic variety within the undergrowth, I applied different green tones on the plants. Later, I added gloss varnish to the leaves, simulating the humidity typical of jungle vegetation

FULL-BUILD: MODERN AUTOMOBILE REVELL 1:24 JAGUAR E-TYPE COUPE ● KIT NO.07668

resented at the Geneva Motor Show in 1961, the Jaguar Type E was developed by the British manufacturer on the basis of the Types C and D competition models. The Type E was, for the time, a very modern design. It was the aerodynamicist Malcolm Sayer who designed it, under the control of William Lyons. The evolutions and modifications would be numerous throughout the life of the model, to improve performance, safety, comfort, or even for regulatory issues, particularly in the United States, its main market. One of the major changes was the abandonment of the inline six-cylinder engine in 1971 in favour of a new Jaguar V12 engine.

In 1975, the Type E would give way to the XJS, less sporty and less expensive to build. 72,584 E-Types were produced, constituting one of Jaguar's greatest commercial successes. Its looks and performance, which set it apart from other cars in the same segment, have today made it an automotive myth symbolising the 'Swinging

O REVELL'S ALL-NEW KIT

The general impression of Revell's 2020 release is good, with correctly moulded parts, clear transparencies, very thin chrome and a good level of detail. After studying the instructions, the modeller must immediately choose a left-hand or right-hand drive car, because very early in the assembly a differentiation of parts appears. I advise you to cross out the steps that do not correspond to the option you have chosen, which will avoid many potential mistakes.

The body is made up of four sections: passenger compartment, hood, front sill and rear sill, the latter being moulded with the chassis. After studying the instructions, I quickly understood that I would have to paint these four elements separately, because they are attached gradually, rather than in one piece, so I would be unable to 'slide' the body into place once the chassis and interior are assembled.

A quick dry-fit made sure that these elements fitted together well. I then covered them with a coat of grev primer. A gap in the rear wing had to be filled, but nothing serious, especially since the bumper will hide this area. After the primer was dry, I sprayed the first coat of Tamiya TS-9 British Green. There would be four layers by the end, separated by sanding with 1,000-grit then 2,000-grit sandpaper. The parts representing the structure of the bonnet, nose gear and the engine mount were also painted in TS-9. All these items were be left to dry, protected from dust. •







FULL-BUILD: MODERN AUTOMOBILE

O ENGINE TIME

The famous six-cylinder, 3.8-litre, in-line engine is provided in its entirety by Revell. I applied a matt black undercoat to the engine-block parts as a base for the application different metallic hues to follow. The slightly too-flashy chrome rocker cover was toned down with a coat of matt varnish applied via airbrush. A more realistic polished metal effect is thus obtained.

Making the leads between the ignition distributor and the spark plugs is more tedious than really difficult. You only need to drill 0.3mm holes and then enlarge them to 0.5mm to route sections of 0.5mm electronic wire. I chose yellow, more for aesthetic reasons than historical. There was no set colour for this type of wiring, and other artistic license, I didn't care about the cylinder firing order!

PASSENGER COMPARTMENT

Revell's designers have done a good job in the reproduction of the interior. In agreement with the Editor, I opted for the right-hand drive to be 'British' all the way. In addition to the selection of the corresponding parts by studying the instructions, it is also necessary to make sure to drill the chromed centre console on the correct side to place the handbrake. Once everything is done, we can embark on the assembly of the 'bathtub'.

In fact, the floor of the passenger compartment is moulded onto the chassis, so the first painting phase therefore begins with a long masking session, in order to paint only the appropriate parts in beige. After masking off the edge of the body and the firewall, then preparing the door cards, seats and the large parcel shelf, I airbrushed AS-15 Tan, which I had decanted from the aerosol can. I then sprayed TS-46 Light Sand over the top of the seats and the centre of the parcel shelf to lighten them up and add some relief to these parts.

MOLOTOW CHROME

To finish off the chrome strips on the rear shelf, Revell provides decals to be affixed to raised detail moulded in the part, but applying these thin decals on protruding parts is not very easy, so I painted them with a Molotow Chrome paint-pen; the procedure is explained in photos accompanying this article. I did the same for the vertical part of the parcel shelf and the door cards.

The floor carpets were reproduced with beige flocking from the Ukrainian brand 'USCP' but the shade was too light for my liking and I sprayed over AS-15, just in a light coat so as not to compress the fibres. The preparation of the dashboard does not call for any particular comment, you just have to make sure to use the dial decals corresponding to the chosen driving position. The interior design ends with the addition of two seat belts made of Tamiya masking tape and painted with TS-46, plus with photo-etched buckles from my spares box.


BODY ON

After securing the engine and passenger compartment to the chassis, I installed the main body, without much problem. The final part of the assembly, and not the least, consists in fixing the chrome elements (rear-view mirror, bumper elements, windscreen and headlight surrounds, etc.) and the glass parts to the body.

The chrome parts were fixed with 'decanted' cyanoacrylate glue. It is simply a matter of leaving a drop in the air for about fifteen minutes so that the vapours that cause fogging can evaporate. After removing each part from the sprue, I test-fitted it to check the fit and precisely determine the location on the body where the glue will be applied. This avoids traces of glue if the part moves during its installation.




The rear axle has joined the chassis. Note the red shock springs

The firewall is well detailed, all touched in with a brush after application of the body colour




The 'nose gear' has been installed and details have joined the engine compartment. All the space is taken up under that big bonnet!

The gluing of the door-cards was removed with a




The spoked rims are very nice, the tyres a little less so because of their too square profile. The spokes were helped to stand out with a wash of Tamiya Panel Line Accent Color (Black)











O FINAL STEPS

After painting the window surrounds in chrome, the latter were glued in place. No problems were encountered here despite the delicacy of these components, but care must be taken with the rear window, which must be

glued along its edge. After sanding the edges of the glass at the top and bottom, I put it in place dry, before flowing in – by capillary action – Zero Paints gloss varnish using a fine brush. This method avoids traces of glue on the glass, but does result in a more fragile bond

than with cyanoacrylate.

If one follows the assembly instructions carefully - and despite the rather high number of parts – this kit is easy to assemble. In addition, it provides a faithful and detailed reproduction of the Jaguar E-Type. The magnificent

lines of this monument of automotive design are particularly well rendered. This model therefore replaces all its predecessors, and should, definitely appear in the collections of car enthusiasts.

Spencer Pollard builds Tamiya's re-issued and re-invigorated Lotus Europa in 1:24 and adds his own special touch

he Europa Series 2, or Lotus Type 54, was introduced in April 1968. The S2 used the same 1,470cc Renault engine and mechanical components as the earlier Series 1, but added a number of key refinements including opening electric windows, adjustable seats, a new fully carpeted interior and a polished wooden fascia panel for the dashboard. The most significant change was the switch from fully

bonded construction to the use of bolt fasteners to attach the fibreglass body to the backbone steel frame. While reducing the torsional and flexural stiffness somewhat, the use of a separable body was welcomed by the automotive insurance industry as it greatly reduced the complexity and cost of making repairs to the vehicle.


Early examples of the S2 were externally almost identical to the S1 with the exception of the new

windows. From early 1969, secondary front indicator lamp nacelles were added between the headlights, and larger door handles were used in place of the S1's push-button items. During 1968 a number of Europas (and Elans) were produced bearing black-and-silver Lotus badges on the nose and steering wheel in place of the customary yellow-and-green ones. The official Lotus Cars website states these 'black-badge' vehicles

were to commemorate the death earlier in 1968 of Jim Clark, Lotus's champion Formula One driver, however this is debated by other sources.

Contemporary road tests for the Europa S2 recorded a top speed around 120 mph (195 km/h), 0-60 mph acceleration times of 9.3 seconds, standing 1/4 mile times of around 16.7 seconds, and an overall economy of around 30 mpg (9.4 L/100 km). (Wikipedia) •

O IN MINIATURE

Tamiya's latest incarnation of their Lotus Europe kit was released earlier this vear. First available in 1999 as the 'Lotus Europa Special' the kit was widely praised for its accuracy, detail and ease of assembly. Now, twenty years on, Tamiya has taken the time to update their offering slightly with new decals and then the addition of printed seat straps (with a choice of three maker's designs) complete with etched buckles. Along with the straps, the new additions include etched screens for the nose and engine hood, as well as metal air funnel parts for the engine and then, alternative standard wheels or eight-spoke RS Watanabe designs on which your completed car can sit. You'll also find in the kit a small sheet of chrome 'stickers' that allow the 'LOTUS' name to be added to the rear engine hood, as well as small maker's marks, wing mirror glazing and other superficial details. The only thing missing, though I can understand why as it would only be used on the small rear window, is a masking sheet for the windows - a small omission that does little to dampen the enthusiasm for the rest of the kit. Detail is as you might imagine,

superb and assembly, very easy. For a relative novice to this type of model, seeing a kit that is so easy to build is certainly welcome. Indeed, I would recommend this as one that a beginner could get to grips with, the relative lack of decalling often prevalent within racing car kits, allowing easy finishing with very few colours being needed. Here, that collection was little more that the interior brown and buff shades, some black, pale blue for the outer body shell and a few metallics for the remaining features. Though I used a little masking here and there to aid my progress, that is by no means essential which points further towards the beginner end of the spectrum with this kit!

CLEAN-UP TIME

As assembly progresses vou will find a number of areas that will need to be carefully prepared before paint is applied. The first will be the body shell. All car kits needed to be cleaned up and this is no different, delicate mould lines having to be removed from around the shell before you apply you final finish. You will also need to deal with the car's nose. Here, there is a panel that fits under the nose, one that is smoothed over on the real car. As this is a separate part in the kit, some filling and careful sanding will be required to ensure that any joints are invisible under the paint. For this build, superglue was used to both glue the parts together and then fill any unwanted gaps,

wet 'n dry paper and then Micro-Mesh pads being used to create a perfect finish.

Whilst in the mood to deal with moulding flaws and a little filling here and there, please pay attention to some ejector pin marks that you will find on a number of interior surfaces. The most notable of these are those that are found on the outer face of the engine/cabin bulkhead. Though painted black, this face needs to be smoothed out to remove a number of these unwanted visitors, a curved scalpel blade being used to scrape each away, before sanding the surface smooth with wet 'n dry paper.

The rest of construction really is a breeze, the instructions guiding you effortlessly through the various steps on the path

Care is needed to ensure that the surface of the body shell is a smooth as possible, wet 'n' dry paper, followed by a polish with Scotchbrite, being needed to remove the mould lines that flow over the wings and edges of the roof and rear quarter panels



The Olympic Blue paint that I applied to the model was mixed from Tamiya Royal Blue, mixed with Sky Blue and Gloss White



This is the result of several dust coats, overlaid with one heavy 'wet' coat, the latter thinned with around 70% Mr. Color Leveling Thinner



Having left the paint to set for a week, the surface was carefully polished with Micro-Mesh and then Novus Plastic Polish. A final once-over with a one-coat car polish, created this amazing finish. The chrome window trim was added using Bare metal foil. Though the finish is really nice, if I was to do this car again, I would mask the trim and spray it in place, because the foil is soft and very easily damaged

to completion. As with most auto kits, this one is moulded in a number of different colours, white, black, chrome and clear. The three standard colours needing little in the way of explanation. The use of white for the body shell is a most welcome aspect of the kit, all chosen colours being easily applied over the top of such a sensibly neutral plastic. The chrome though, does perhaps need a little further work...

CHROME SWEET CHROME

I have a love-hate relationship with chrome-plated plastic. Though I like the way that it allows detail to pop, it never really looks that realistic, though admittedly, Tamiya get closer than most. In this case the plating is done well, the surfaces being smooth and seam lines, that bête noir of most plated parts, are unobtrusive and hidden in the main. Gluing the parts in place is also a trial, care needing to be taken to ensure that location holes and pins are sized perfectly, especially those on a body shell that subsequently receive details. Here, fit is good enough, but even so I spent time dry-fitting everything until I was happy that the fit was perfect and then used superglue

 carefully — to hold parts in place. You'll also see that every part was reworked with overlaid paint to create a more realistic and some cases, weathered, finish. This is certainly something that I can recommend, those plated parts looking more at home if not used as-is.

Along with the plastic parts, the kit includes some metal items, both etched and turned, the latter dealing with the super-delicate air funnels used on the engine. This is a real bonus in this kit, as they allow a wonderful degree of delicacy to be incorporated within the finished model. Be warned though, the seat straps

are a real trial of patience! Combining those etched buckles with straps that you have to cut out, they certainly caused a few curse words within my workshop, the tiny size of some of the hardware causing more than a little consternation! As it was, I decided that I would do them all in one go, so persevered until each strap was complete and ready to use. By working like this, a system was developed, tools being used to smooth the path to the finish line. They look great once assembled and in place, just be aware that this is certainly the most trying part of this kit's construction!

O WHITE, RED AND BLACK. OR BLÚE?

Along with the parts needed to build the kit, the box contains all you need to finish it as well. In terms of basics, Tamiya suggest three different colour schemes that work alongside the two basic interior finishes and then that choice of standard and RS Watanabe wheels. The choices are Cirrus White (TS-26), Gloss Black (TS-14) and Regency Red (TS-8), the interior then being painted in either black, or mixed beige and buff. Each scheme is then trimmed with some superb gold pin striping that really looks gorgeous in place, this trim also being used to decorate the rear fin

that you can decide to use, or in the case of my model, not. Though I liked the choices in the kit. I set out to build something a little different, so hunted for an alternate scheme.

Choices are limited, but given that my favourite colour is French Blue, I was delighted to find a car that was finished in a similar shade, Olympic Blue. In fact, research showed that Europas were finished in a huge number of colours, so you have plenty of additional scope to create something unique. For this build, rather than buy an off-the-shelf colour, I mixed one using Tamiya acrylics, thinned with Mr Color

Leveling Thinner, the paint being applied in thin layers and then one wet coat, all being left for a week to set before sanding smooth and polished with car polish and a soft cloth.

PAINTING AND WEATHERING? INDEED...

Though I like to build model cars, over the years the number that I have completed can be counted on the fingers of two hands. Part of the reason for this is that I've never really settled on a look that I like, and although I admire those that can built and paint perfectly crafted replicas with flawless finishes, I simply don't have the skill to go down that

road. That being so, of late I've tried to recreate cars that look more used, more prototypical if you like, with finishes that reflect their life on the road, warts and all. This model was no different, so although time was spent trying to paint it with a smooth, shiny finish, that was soon dealt a blow thanks to the application of dust and dirt over its lower surfaces and then inside, with washes that impart a feeling of use without it looking like a junkyard dog. Overall, I think that I achieved my aim, the finished model though not perfect, looks to be used, if not entirely, abused!



The Renault engine is a neat little affair, with fine detail in evidence. Its basic finish is Tamiya LP-38 Flat Aluminium with details picked out using Games Workshop and Vallejo acrylics. Oil paint colour-washes and then AMMO weathering solutions added a neat level of grime around the detail, especially that found on the gearbox



the finished model, I tried to create as detailed a finish as possible. A couple of the parts in this shot were not used on the completed engine, but were painted nonetheless. Hey ho! With the rocker cover and

exhausts in place, this little engine is really starting to come together. The cover is actually finished in chrome in the kit, so needs to be carefully oversprayed with satin black and then the detail drybrushed with chrome to bring it out once more. The exhausts were sprayed with Flat Aluminium and then weathered with rusty oil colours, both washed on and then flicked over the surface of the pipes, each layer being blended in with a soft flat brush



Turned metal parts are supplied for the intake funnels, these being used as-is alongside the etched plate that separates each one from the carburettor



I initially planned to strip and repaint them, but instead elected to weather their surfaces to create the illusion of use. This was done by spraying them with flat varnish, some of which was removed with a cotton bud to replicate the look of chrome that had worn way - very simple, very effective! The surfaces were then weathered using the same ideas used over the exhaust pipes, the results being seen here

The fuel tanks are finished in chrome.

Though very little of the exhaust can be seen under the completed model, I had a lot of fun painting and weathering this little fellow!



black, masked and then a metal panel added using Flat Aluminium. Washes of **Humbrol Khaki Drill and Dark** Earth were applied to impart the illusion of use. I may fill this with junk at some point...






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O FINAL THOUGHTS

This is the second classic car that I've built from Tamiya within the last year or so and much like the Honda S600 that I completed last summer, I really enjoyed putting together the kit and painting the results. Of course being Tamiya, you expect it to be simple to build and in the main that proved to be entirely so. Detail is similarly impressive and now once finished, the model looks every inch the Lotus Europa Special that it replicates. •



The spoked wheels need to be carefully painted with gunmetal areas between each one. This was done by masking off the hubs, spraying them with Tamiya LP-19 Gun Metal and then removing the paint from the upper edge of each spoke, as seen to the right



As mentioned in the main text, the model was weathered to recreate a car that had been looked after, but had perhaps seen better days



The weathering on the outer surfaces of the body was another step that was remarkably easy to complete, airbrushed layers of dirt (Tamiya Flat Black, Dark Earth and Medium Grey mixed to create a dull dust colour) being sprayed on and then worked away from a cotton bud moistened with white spirit. Oil paints, thinned and flicked on added another layer, with neat oil paint, in this case, AMMO's Starship Filth, being used for the dirt splashes and rainwash

From a personal point of view though, I'm sure that if I built another, I would do things differently. I've mentioned a number of the things in the captions, that rather scruffy dashboard being a particular bone of personal contention. Though hardly visible within the cabin of the car, the images of it make me wish that I had been more careful with the paintwork and maybe masked and sprayed it, instead of painting the trim and detail by hand. Similarly, the close-up images of the Bare Metal trim around the windows reveal just how easily damaged it is and how many times I've had to repair patches that have worn away. I would definitely use paint for these areas should I build another! And finally, though not visible in the images, there is a patch of paintwork where I was a little heavy-handed with my polishing, partly as a result of the softer acrylics that I used, and partly as a result of inattention. Again, that's something to learn from. Overall though I really enjoyed this project and I am now looking forward to building a small vignette for it to live in. If you are looking for something a little different to built, maybe give one of these cars a go. I'm sure that you won't regret it! ●

The Chinook needs no introduction here: it must be the most unmistakable helicopter ever made, in both appearance and sound

and it has distinguished itself in conflicts worldwide, from the Vietnam War to the present day. It has undoubtedly saved the lives of hundreds, if not thousands of soldiers, whether evacuating the injured or replenishing supplies in combat zones. By this token, any new kit of this extraordinary machine is welcome and when it looks as good as this recent offering from Hobbyboss, the welcome is all the more hearty. The model represents the early CH-47A variant that served in South East Asia and as such, it comes with two decal options for US Army machines during the Vietnam War. The painting/decalling guide does not specify which units these markings represent, so a little research by the modeller will be useful here. The kit's cargo bay interior comes with a detailed floor, covered with tie-down points: the ceiling panel and sidewalls are covered with a quilting pattern so there are no 'bare' areas. Naturally, more can always be added by the enthusiastic modeller with a set of good references to hand, but straight from the box, it's good enough for a quick look inside. Each engine is included and again the builder might wish to add pipework and cables. One big plus factor is the provision of photo-etched parts for the intake filter, a big improvement on moulded mesh effect. TMMI











The Westland Sea King really is an iconic helicopter. First produced back in 1969, production of the aircraft continued with upgrades

and variations all the way up to 1995. Used all around the world and for different missions, the Westland Sea King really did prove itself to be a reliable and worthy aircraft. Airfix first released this new tooled model back in 2015, initially releasing the HC.4 variant of this vehicle. Skip to 2018 and we now have the HAR.3/Mk.43 version which was a search and rescue aircraft for the Royal Air Force with the Mk.43 being the search and rescue Sea King for the Royal Norwegian Air Force. This kit really did stand out for being one of the nicest moulded kits released by Airfix, everything just seems to be right, panel lines and surface details don't look heavy, and design looks very well thought out. The model features a fully detailed rear compartment with seating and floor details. What puts a lot of modellers off from building helicopters is the large span of the propellor blades, Airfix have thought of that and allowed the modeller to have the propeller blades in the stowed position, not taking up much display space. Along with the stowed propellor blades, the tail can also be in the folded position. The clear parts are clear as crystal, allowing for the modeller to show off all the hard work put into the cockpit and rear compartment. Airfix really have thought of everything with this kit. Let's just hope that there will be a few more versions of this kit on the way from Airfix. IJT
























The German Sturmgeschutz will be familiar to every military modeller around the world. This particular version, the Ausf.E, was

the last type produced with the short 75mm Stummel gun, and 272 were manufactured between September 1941 and March 1942. This release by Dragon adds to their extensive range of Stugs, and maintains the excellent reputation of the range. In particular, the quality of moulding on this kit is absolutely exceptional, with some of the finest and sharpest detail to be found on any comparable kit. This particular release, termed a NEO Smart Kit, is noteworthy in several respects. The tracks are not the 'rubber band' or individual link style, but instead are 'link and length' with runs of links joined by separate links to conform to curves. This has the advantage of speeding up assembly, but sadly there is a lack of sag that is so often seen on these vehicles. Another feature of this kit is the inclusion of the gearbox and differential as a bonus feature, to add to the fairly complete interior of the fighting compartment. Hot on the heels of ICM's release of the FCM36 tank, used by the French army to oppose the German invasion in 1940, we now have

the version as modified by the Germans and used in Normandy in 1944. The Baukommando Becker, led by a German officer Alfred Becker, built a number of conversions based on captured French vehicles, including ten of the type in this kit. The conversions were largely done over the winter 1943/44, and equipped parts of 21st Panzer Division which defended the Caen area. This particular conversion consisted mounting a 7.5cm Pak 40 on top of the tank chassis, and surrounding it with a massive box structure. The crew had to crouch on a deck, and could not get shelter inside the tank, therefore being very exposed and working in a difficult environment. The kit from ICM uses most of the parts from the FCM36, with additional parts for the conversion. The kit does not include some of the interior detail, such as the radio set, and arguably the model would benefit from a bit of TLC if a modeller wanted to go for the ultimate Marder 1. Some of the weaker parts of the base kit (eg. the tools) are not required, and the new parts give a real sense of the brutal ugliness of the conversion. The tracks consist of lengths of flexible plastic material which can be glued - although muck of the track is hidden on this vehicle. A set of paints is included in the





These batches had different shields, and the kit provides the later style with seven sides - suitable for action in North Africa and the Eastern Front, but not for France in May 1940.



Sometimes, all you that is wanted from a model kit is to be a simple build with a small part count. Revell have answered that call with this release of the A-34 Comet MK.I British world war two tank, and not only have they provided the modeller with a small replica of the vehicle but they have also provided a detailed base for model to be displayed on, nice touch Revell. The kit is presented in a side opening cardboard box with some splendid artwork depicting the tank in a battle. The kit comes out of the box in a plastic bag which contains two grey plastic sprues and a set of rubber band tracks. For the scale, the details are sharp and crisp. The main hull features details such as moulded on towing cables, bolts, and hatch hinges. It is also refreshing to see a one piece moulded main gun barrel. Wheels, thought there are many, are all beautifully moulded and feature nice bolt head details on each wheel. The modeller is provided with the option to make this model with two different camouflage patterns. An overall dark green camouflage and a green and desert yellow camouflage are options from the box. Revell have really done well to put this nice little package together that can be displayed on its very own little base. 


If there is one modelling subject in the armour family that is becoming more popular with time, it is the Howitzer. In the year 2020 Revell released the M109A6 Howitzer, a vehicle that has a very long service history and something that many modellers have been waiting for, for a while. The M109 Howitzer first saw serviced in The Vietnam War. Nicknamed the "Paladin" this vehicle has seen service with many nations, including the USA and NATO. This kit comes in a side opening box, bagged, and includes four grey plastic sprues. Some areas that jumped out straight away was the turret section, with individual hatches that can be modelled opened or closed and even included moulded anti-slip texture on walkways, impressive for the scale. The turret and main gun can be positioned and moved after the model is complete so that it can be displayed in whatever position the modeller sees fit. The main gun barrel and breach is all single piece moulded. The modeller should not have a hard time with the running gear due to their clean moulding and simplistic design. Revell have created all-new moulds for this 2021 release and from an inspection of the kit's parts courtesy of Revell UK (this is a test-shot and is thus subject to change before its production release) we can say were are impressed. The model depicts a 1984 car and comes with a fully detailed engine, very nicely detailed from top to bottom and including the intake manifold with its intake duct and air filter, individually moulded cooling fan and drive-belt plus an excellent

representation of the exhaust system. The suspension is depicted in detail too, with steerable front wheels and lovely replicas of the classic Fuchs wheels.

In the cabin we are offered the choice of a left or right-hand drive dashboard and foot pedal positions: a pair of small location holes in the cabin floor must be opened up for either option, so don't forget to drill them out before assembling this area! The interior is well detailed with excellent miniatures of the seats and hand controls. We didn't have the decals yet for this preview, but the instructions show each dashboard dial is represented by an individual marking, a nice touch.

Hopefully it comes across in the photos here, but

Revell have done a superb job of capturing the outline of the body, crucial to the success of any car model. It looks spot-on from all angles which is extremely encouraging. Revell are also to issue the gorgeous Targa version of this universally desirable sports car and together, they will look great in one's display case.



Paint was next, and I've been using the new AK Interactive Real Colors paints lately. These spray as easily as Tamiya Acrylics and dry to a nice satin finish like Mr Color lacquer without the smelly fumes. The RLM shades are spot on to my eye, they are my new favourite paints. The major markings were all sprayed on with custom masks from Miracle Paint Masks. I used the

cowl emblem decal from the spares box plus BarracudaCast's stencil decals.

Weathering was minimal since this plane was likely to have seen little service, so I limited myself to some minor scratching and chipping plus subtle colour-washes with AMMO's Panel Line Wash. Exhaust stains were always prominent so I didn't hold back there. The final finish was AK's Matt

Varnish which dulls things down but still leaves a nice sheen that doesn't hide the highlights and shadows on the curves and bulges of the airframe. Eduard's new tool Fw190 family is fantastic and I look forward to building many more. I certainly have plenty on my to-do list, and I'm stashing away many kits in the closet! ●

f a model is not available... make one! This article will describe my journey on combining scratchbuilding with some simple modifications to a commercial kit, to create a unique vehicle in Japan's desperate last days of World War 2. While one of the major Axis Powers in World War 2, Japan did not embrace the potential of armoured warfare as other combatants did in terms of effective designs or manufactured numbers. This misjudgment was due in part, to the early adoption of armoured vehicles purely in the role of infantry support

as opposed to direct tank or anti-tank engagements. As a result, there were no suitable hulls available when it became necessary to develop effective large calibre self-propelled gun (SPG).

Japan did deploy SPGs, albeit in limited numbers during WW2 (eg., the 75mm Type 1) compared to her allies such as Germany's Nashorn or Italy's Semovente SPGs. With the need to effectively oppose heavier Allied armour, there was experimentation with larger calibre self-propelled vehicles. As the war neared a potential invasion of the

home islands, the Japanese Navy developed one such vehicle that went beyond the drawing board - the Imperial Japanese Navy's 120mm SPG in April 1945.

Given the designation "Long Barrel Navy 12cm Self-propelled Gun Carrier", this SPG mounted a Naval Type 10 120mm gun onto the venerable Type 97 Chi-Ha chassis. This gun was a proven anti-aircraft weapon already used aboard IJN Cruisers, and was a reliable coastal defence weapon. The crew consisted of five men: commander. driver, loader, and two gun

crew. The gun could elevate 20 degrees, and decline to -10 degrees, although the recoil would no doubt be an "experience" for the crew on this small hull, particularly if fired broad-side! Speed was very slow at a maximum of 25mph due to the excessive weight of the gun. Only one was built and deployed with the Yokosuka Special Naval Landing Force. The fate of this vehicle is unknown. There is only one photo I have seen of this vehicle, which is widely on the internet if you google "Naval 120mm Chi Ha". (chi ha 12cm SPG) •

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THE KIT(S)


Only one kit of this single SPG exists – the equally rare 1:35 resin conversion kit from Yellow Cat. This kit is hard to find, but still comes up on auction sites from time-to-time (photo 1). Shapeways currently makes 1:72 and 1:35 3D-printed models of the Type 10 gun, which could be mated onto a Chi-Ha hull, but I still prefer working with styrene. Otherwise no other injection or resin kits exist. Due to the rarity of the Yellow Cat kit and its rather soft details, it was decided to use a 'borrowed' Yellow Cat kit as a basis to instead replicate the details by scratchbuilding the necessary parts onto Dragon's Type 97 Chi-Ha in 1:35.

MAIN GUN SUB-ASSEMBLY

I started with the main gun sub-assembly itself, given it was the most complex part of this project, and if done right would set the mojo for the rest of the model. Some specifications on the gun are important in knowing how to model it. The barrel itself was held in a sleeved cradle mounted on a pedestal which permitted a full 360° traverse. The gun used a hydro-spring recoil mechanism attached to the sleeve cradle, with three

large recoil cylinders located on top of the breech with the two outside cylinders housing the recoil springs and the centre cylinder housing the hydraulic recuperator. The elevating hand-wheel was on the right side of the seated gunner, while the traversing hand-wheel was on the left side.

Work began on the central gun pedestal, which was made using .030" (0.75mm) styrene sheet, cut using Shadow Hobby's Thinner Line Circle Cutter. You can also use an Olfa Rotary Cutter, but the Shadow Cutter is much more accurate and a sturdier cutting platform (photo 2). Another circular styrene part was made from .020" sheet, representing the outer guiding ring surrounding the gun pedestal. Rivets were added to this ring using sixteen .030" Tichy Train Group sized bolts (#8019). As a tip, the easiest method I use to make circles from sheet styrene, is to scribe the circle outline using the cutter, (scribing is necessary due the thickness of the plastic) and then scribing several random radiating cuts which will make it easier to assist in the breaking-away of excess plastic leaving circle part remaining. The pedestal has a rod underneath it that is inserted through the hull top and secured by a locking part to allow the pedestal to rotate freely (photo 3).

BIG BARREL

The main gun was scratchbuilt as the Yellow Cat details were too soft, while missing key details of the Type 10 gun. The resin barrel that came in the Yellow Cat kit was pretty much useless due to the uneven diameter and warpage of the barrel. The barrel was the only commercial after-market part used on the gun, with it being replaced with a metal barrel from Magic Models 122mm barrel for the ISU122 (#A-19S). The forward part of the breech was made from two inter-leaved styrene tubes from Evergreen Styrene #232 and #234, with the gun itself inserted into the end of the smaller tube

and re-enforced with tiny circular parts (1:72 wheels from spares box!), to ensure a strong join given the uneven weight caused by the metal barrel. These are some things one must think about when working with different materials of different weight! (photo 4).

The breech was sandwiched with slightly smaller tubing for the top hydraulic recuperator, and two side tubes for the counter recoil springs (Evergreen #227 and #228). The top recuperator tube #227 required another sheath at the rear, made from .010" styrene, glued and held in place with a tube cutter. (photo **5)**. The breech's rear portion was made from square blocks of styrene, with scratch-built details and some 'gizmology' from the spares box. The cradles were re-cast in resin with added styrene details

Final details include the loader's platform bracket, yoke locking device, hand wheels and sighting scope, which were a combination of scratch-built and gizmology from the spares box. It should be noted that the gun also elevates by use of polycaps where the barrel attaches to the cradle sides, along with counter weights hidden in the breech and cradle, to compensate for the length and weight of the metal barrel. The final gun/barrel modifications are reflected in photo 6.





HULL DOWN

While not as complex as the main gun to build, there are required modifications to the Dragon Chi-Ha hull. The turret was obviously not needed as the 12cm gun platform took its place (save that turret to the spares box!). Since the hull machine gun, radio equipment, and other interior pieces were stripped to accommodate internal ammunition storage, the hull modifications were straightforward using the Yellow Cat kit parts as a guide for dimensions:

1: The hull coaxial machine D

gun area was replaced with a re-cast resin flat cover with vision port. Rivets were added from Tichy .025" bolts (\$8018).

2: Due to the size of the gun mounted atop the tank's deck, a bigger working-area for the gun crew was necessary. Three deck platform extensions were added along with two front armoured enclosures, all made from .020" styrene sheet.

3: A fourth platform extension with a raised box to accommodate the height if the jack when lowered, was built on the vehicle's right-rear side, and displayed in the raised position. Hinges were made from photo-etch and small styrene rod.

4: All rear towing cables on the Chi-Ha were omitted, but smaller details were added such as the tiny Anchor (taken from 1/700 IJN Ships anchor part); and new tools and brackets added near the jack location.

The hull modifications are reflected in photos 7 and 8.

AMMUNITION TRAILER

Although the shells were stored inside the vehicle itself, I made an assumption that a standard Japanese ammunition trailer might have been used. The Type 94 Tankette Trailer from Mr. Modellbau (Kit #35323) was used. It was built mostly out-of-box, with the only modifications being as follows:

- 1: A postulated top-lid and hinges that was scratch-built.
- 2: New towing bar from .080" (Evergreen #212) styrene rod.
- 3: New drive sprockets/idlers from the spares box.
- 4: Bolt detail and tow hook added.
- 5: Handles were from the spares box.

6: Replacement of the Mr Modellbau resin tracks (which were of such poor quality), with narrowed-down tracks from Techmod's Track Link Set for T40, T60, and T70. While not accurate, I decided it was better to take this option rather than a display a questionable set of tracks on the model.

The trailer modifications are reflected in the photos 9 and 10

PAINTING AND WEATHERING


This tank was painted in olive green (the exact shade is unknown). It was not painted in Navy Grey or camouflaged with any known pattern, and no information was available as to the undercoat colour. I hypothesised that the olive green may have been applied over an earlier Army khaki tan base colour, but this is my artistic assumption given no other information.

I first primed the model with Tamiya Fine Surface Primer White right out of the spray can - necessary given the different materials used on this model. After the primer and some seam issue corrections, I gave the model a coat of Tamiya Dark Yellow TS-3. The deck expansion plates were airbrushed in a primer red-brown (Tamiya Hull Red XF-9), if only to add interest (photos II, I2). Since I wanted the green to appear distressed and interesting, I used the hairspray technique to distress the deck area of the vehicle. The hairspray was applied using L'Oreal Studio Silk & Gloss in two light coats right from the can.

Once dry for a few hours, the olive green is applied over the hairspray using Tamiya's Nato Green XF-67, adding black and white to create a lighter tone and darker shade (photo 13) for a modulated effect. I let this layer dry for about 20 minutes or so, and then "have at it" with a wet stiff brush to simulate wear. Tip: To ensure easy distress of the top colour, I thinned the top paint coat with some Tamiya Retarder to slow the drying time and thus make it easier to distress!

An enamel filter (MIG Green Filter #1508) was used to tone down the contrast along with mist coats of Nato Green followed by an oil-wash of Winsor Newton Raw Umber #884. The effect makes the base less drastic and ready for final weathering with a protective coat of Model Master Acrylic Semi-Gloss (4637).

The vehicle served in the home islands and never saw actual combat. Consequently I kept the weathering modest. The only area where I concentrated most of the









weathering was on the hull deck where crew operated the gun, and the lower running gear. Weathering consisted of four enamel washes and three powder pigments varying from light to darker colours. Finally, the fantastic AMMO by Mig Shaders were used to tighten up the colour depth. These Shaders are pre-mixed and sprayed right from the airbrush to provide a very subtle glaze effect that does not alter the original colours. They are excellent! (photo 14)

As for the gun, close examination of the period photo has led me to believe that the barrel was a different colour with what appears to be some camouflage on the barrel itself. Since the gun was removed from a ship, I concluded that it was painted in Navy Gray (Tamiya IJN Yokosuka Gray XF-91), and may have been camouflaged with a dark green (or brown) colour I again used Tamiya Nato Green XF-67 for the barrel's camouflage. These tanks were devoid of any markings with the exception of the license plate which was taken from the Chi Ha decal sheet as a 'filler' having no other knowledge of the actual plate number. For operational effectiveness, the gun had almost no weathering except modulation and a wash of Raw Umber.

THE TRAILER

This was painted in a base of Tamiya Dark Yellow XF-60 lightened with a bit of white. It is weathered slightly differently than the vehicle consisting of two filters, three washes, and three powder pigments varying from light to dark. (trailer filters, trailer •



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• weathering products) The final detailed painting was done as follows:

1: The rubber-rimed wheels were hand-brushed with Panzer Aces Dark Rubber (#306) – an excellent paint that leaves no brush marks. (photo 15).

2: The tracks were sprayed Maroon TS-11, pre-modulated with random vibrant colours, and then blended with washes and pigment powders, leaving the underlying vibrant

pattern slightly showing through thus giving some colour interest to otherwise mundane dark brown tracks! MIG Dark Steel powder added the final metal wear effect (photos 16, 17). 3: The Jack was painted with AK Japanese Brown. 4: The muffler/exhaust was weathered with Dragoon Weathering Powders with the screen airbrushed with MIG AMMO Shader Light

5: Brass shells are from RB Products 122mm ISU-122 rounds (35P29), coated with Model Master Flat. 6: The rear reflector on the trailer is from MV Lenses

and over-coated Model Master Flat Clear to off-set the gloss then weathered along with the rest of the trailer

The finished model is reflected in the accompanying photos. All in all, this project was a worthy effort, in order to have a

unique one-of-a-kind model of a one-of-a-kind vehicle in my collection of 1:35 Japanese WW2 Armour! I hope you enjoy this model as much as I did making it. ●

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Book Reviews

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БОЕВОЙ ТАНК (BATTLE TANK) www.abteilung502.com

This 130-page landscape hardback book by Vaquerizo and Durán is a real surprise. It looks like so many other similar publications, but turns out to be a real goldmine. The aim of the book is to chart the use of armour by the Soviet forces throughout WW2, and it does this very successfully, with information about particular actions, units involved, and the strategies employed. The book also covers the production of tanks in different factories and generally gives a great overview that will satisfy the majority of readers. There are colour side profiles throughout, and the artwork is extremely accurate in showing the actual appearance of weathered colour schemes. These are some of the best profiles available. However, the absolute marvel of this book is the selection of photos throughout. Each picture has been chosen for the quality of focus and detail, unlike the somewhat fuzzy photos in some other books. The images are full of interest, and provide the reader with a lot of ideas for models and dioramas. The text is very readable, and despite being translated from Spanish, it contains only a few technical errors or proofreading slips. Overall, this book is frankly unexpectedly good and is definitely a 'must-have' for







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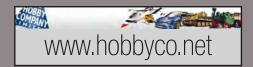
