It came as a surprise to many, but the newest addition to Tamiya's 1:48 Aircraft Series takes the form of the Lockheed F-35A Lightning II and it is one amazing model...



preliminary look at this amazing new kit last issue, here are some photos of the kit parts to give you an idea of how they look 'in the plastic', along with Tamiya factory photographs of an assembled but unpainted model. Some discussion has been had over the RAM patterns on the fuselage and whether or not they are overdone; it is clear from handling the kit parts that they are spot-on in the degree of relief and will look perfect once painted, decalled and - dare we say it - lightly weathered! Okay, so these aircraft are generally seen in immaculate condition but all aircraft gradually acquire a certain patina, even the F-35!

The airframe comes moulded in upper and lower halves which include the wings, between which are sandwiched the cockpit 'module' (built up in the first step of the instructions) as well as the astonishing main weapons' bay, which is show here in detail, opposite page. This is an amazing piece of work for two reasons; its sheer busy-ness and a complete lack of ejector-pin marks, which have plagued these types of mouldings in the past. The bay is buzzing with detail and even more is added to it as construction progresses, including axillary systems, pipework and bulkheads. It's a marvellous sub-assembly and almost needs to be displayed on its own.


The engine intakes are designed in such a way as to allow their easy painting while hiding the cemented joints, coming together internally and finished with an intake fan which will be hidden (but good to know it's there). The intakes fit to the forward undercarriage/ lower front fuselage which is then fitted to the upper airframe half.


The internal section of the jet engine is dealt with in typically efficient Tamiya style, building up from just three parts; upper and lower engine 'tubes' and a fan disc. This drops in place behind the completed weapons and undercarriage bays, fully filling the interior of the Lightning II's stealthy airframe.

The engine outlet comprises 'turkey feathers' made up from inner and outer sections which, once mated, are mounted to a ring which in turn is cemented to the internal engine 'pod', making quick and refined work of this area of the model.

A good weapons-load is provided that comprises two AIM-120C AMRAAM missiles, two AIM-9X Sidewinder missiles, two GBU-31 JDAM bombs and four GBU-12 Paveway II bombs. The kit can be-assembled with one of the three ordnance patterns: 'stealth mode', 'air-to-air mode' and 'beast mode', the latter with all underwing pylons and stores in place. •

Unusually, the ejector seat is the last but-one stage of assembly, the canopy being the final step. This makes sense; the seat can be simply dropped into the open cockpit and being fitted last avoids any potential damage being done to the protruding upper section of the sub-assembly. A detailed pilot figure is provided and his use will add a sense of scale to this fighter, which is surprisingly small. The canopy can be fitted in open and closed positions and it's not an 'either-or' option; you can have both, thanks to the inclusion of two clear canopy mouldings and different frames for open or closed modes. It's a 'no glue' procedure so you switch the canopies around at your leisure. We are aiming to bring you, at the very least, the first part of the full-build feature of this incredible kit next month, so keep reading and don't miss out!





# ON HER MAJESTY'S SERVICE

**Spencer Pollard** builds Airfix's new 1:35 Austin K2/Y ambulance kit, aided and abetted by some wonderful aftermarket accessories from DEF Model and Red Zebra Models

nnounced some time ago and then held up thanks to such trifling matters as a global pandemic, this new kit is something that I've wanted to build since it was first announced, so it's great to have finally done so. This is a very nice kit. Though it's not my usual fare, the possibilities that it offered in terms of detail and finish, was something that I knew I would enjoy and as the project developed, that was proven to be the case. Detail is really well-done, moulding quality superb and in the main, the kit fits well and is easy to build. Sure, there are some, shall we say, interesting steps, within the instructions that seem destined to make like harder rather than simplifying the process, but all in all its a kit that anyone can enjoy.

From the box, the kit is neatly presented, carefully detailed and straightforward to build. Designed in collaboration with a Korean manufacturer, the kit bears all of the hallmarks of that company's kits with nothing in the way of over-sophistication, a bare minimum of parts being used to get the point across. Indeed, this kit would not look out of place in a Tamiya box either, the sand-coloured plastic and sharp details, being a very familiar combination.

CONSTRUCTION IS IN THE MAIN, VERY EASY

You can follow the instructions to the letter and arrive at your destination with little fear of pitfalls, the fit of the parts helping immeasurably in that regard. Here though, I deviated from Airfix's suggested steps in order to create larger sub-assemblies that I could paint more easily, especially when it came to the application of the highlights and shadows discussed below.

The chassis is made up using individual parts that must be carefully aligned to create the finished structure A small engineer's square was used to ensure all of the cross-members were square and true DHEATADDH. British Austin K2 Truck Here are the kit wheels in place on the chassis... Though the kit wheels are nicely detailed, a set of DEF Model's magnificent resin wheels were used instead to increase the levels of accuracy and finesse ..and DEF Model's aftermarket replacements. Detail on these wheels is absolutely superb, featuring as they do complete manufactures logos and intricate tread Side by side, the difference between the plastic and resin wheels become all the more apparent More detail has been added to the chassis including the fuel tanks and front mudguards.

The tanks are small and need care to assemble

As you can see here, the kit only offers the option to build a rear-wheel drive vehicle. If you want to build an 'Ice Cold In Alex' machine, you will need to convert it into a four-wheel drive set-up



This involved the building of a complete chassis, the lower floor, cabin and bonnet and then a full-realised ambulance body. My route, though simplifying the painting — to a degree made final construction a little more harrowing, the need to carefully flex that body to wriggle it into place, being rather more trying than I would have liked. That being so, I would suggest that you take a look at the instructions and plot your own course.

As mentioned, detail is very nice as supplied, though there is plenty of scope for additional, finer features. The ambulance bay for instance, though filled with stretchers, is actually rather simplified, the real thing being more complex with lots of handles, brackets and other safety features, not present in the kit.

#### ADDING LITTLE DETAILS

You could of course argue that much of that will be invisible (or at least difficult to see) within the model, but I am sure that modellers will have fun trying to add those little details, either from scratch or via the inevitable aftermarket route that I am sure many companies are already investigating. Indeed, the latter was put to the test here, as we used not only replacement wheels from the DEF Models line, we also took advantage of Red Zebra's superb range to decorate the four stretchers with pillows, blankets and rucksacks, all of which can be seen in our in-progress shots that accompany this feature.

The kit includes decals that allow you to build four different machines, two in overall green, one in a 'Caunter' scheme and the final one in overall pale sand. The choices are as follows:

- Austin K2/Y Ambulance 30 Corps, Motor Ambulance Convoy, Royal Army Service Corps, North West
- Europe, 1944 Austin K2/Y Ambulance British Army, North Africa, 1940
- Austin K2/Y Ambulance British Army, Alexandria, Egypt, 1942
- Austin K2/Y Ambulance Auxiliary Territorial Service, England, 1944 •

Though I liked the idea of the two North African vehicles, I really wanted to create a little vignette and as I had no figures from that theatre of operations and did have from Northern Europe, I consigned those to the 'what might have been' pile and decided on a late-war Katy bedecked in lots – and I mean lots – of 'red cross' markings. The vignette, as you can see, is not yet complete, but I hope to bring you that in a future edition of this magazine.

#### **PAINT TECHNIQUES**

In terms of approach I though that I would stretch out once more with this build and paint it using ideas that I have seen within the fantasy and figure realms, rather than only those used on military vehicles. These are techniques that I had squirrelled away and then used, albeit it tentatively, on my Tamiya Archer and within its accompanying diorama. The idea, in its most basic terms was to paint the model and its future surroundings as if illuminated from a single point of light. This is/ was used to draw the eye of beholder into an area that you want seen first, focus being placed on an interesting detail or feature that defines the model. The Archer's paintwork was thus duly completed to accentuate the interior, gun and figures. Here, that is being used to draw the eye of the viewer into the open ambulance body, where detail that would otherwise be hidden is readily seen.



With the model sprayed in several layers of Tamiya Clear, the deals could be applied. Here are the materials used to apply those decals to this model: Mr Hobby Mr Mark Setter NEO and Mark Softer NEO. The Setter is particularly useful over slightly rougher finishes, the glue that forms part of its ingredients, helping to reduce any air bubbles and silvering, even without the use of a secondary softener, such as Mark Softer



Using the aforementioned solutions, the decals settled down perfectly over the surface detail on the bonnet and then later on, upper roof



With the 'red cross' decals in place, the vents needed to be Here are the completely painted vents. Not a bad match, very carefully masked and then sprayed with red to match I hope you'll agree! their surroundings. This was done with Tamiva Flat Red. lightened very slightly with Tamiya Flat Flesh





Surface details were initially accentuated with a wash of raw umber darkened with black. This was flowed around all surface details and then blended in with a soft brush moistened with a little odourless thinner



Here is the rear body after the oil wash treatment and then some work with lighter oils to recreate some faint dirt streaks. Note how care has been taken to ensure that the decals were also weathered to match their surrounding paintwork



That 'red cross' marking on the roof settled down perfectly to look painted-on rather than looking like a decal. Note how the washes have accentuated the ribs under this large marking



The completed rear body. Having weathered the surface of this sub-assembly, some time was taken to ensure that the highlights on the left-hand side were as positive as possible, the framework over its surface being picked out with a light green acrylic. Though I liked it at this point, as we will see later on, I took the paintwork one step further until I was fully satisfied



The stretchers and their racks were fun to paint! Each stretcher was base-coated with Tamiya Khaki Drab and then highlighted over the corner nearest to the open doors with AK 3G Canvas Tone, increasingly lightened with Light Earth. Raw umber washes and then edge highlights applied using Light Earth, added a degree of wear, as well as bringing out the shape of each one



In close-up, that highlighted area is plainly visible, imitating light that is flowing in through the open doors. Note as well, how light streaking has helped impart the look of weave over the surface of the fabric. It's just a shame that so much of this work is not visible within the body of the ambulance!



Though the model had been washed with dark, oil paint shades, I wanted the finish to appear dusty as well. This look was achieved by mixing Humbrol Dark Earth with Khaki Drill, thinning it with around 80% Humbrol Enamel Thinner and then flowing that around raised details. Once touch-dry, the wash was carefully blended-in with a soft brush moistened with a little more enamel thinner



The wheels were base-coated with Tamiya Rubber Black and then the tyres masked off using the masks in the DEF set to allow the hubs to be airbrushed in the same greens as the rest of the model. Once done, everything was washed with the same Dark Earth/Khaki Drill mix used elsewhere, before drybrushing the tyres and raised details with Humbrol Matt Black to bring out the finer detail. A gentle overspray with Tamiya Buff thinned heavily with X-20A Thinner, completed the painting of these superb wheels



A close-up of one of the wheels, reveals how realistic the DEF wheels can be with careful painting and weathering








Though not fully au fait with the ideas and techniques used to complete this method of painting, I do like the results on this model. I'm taken by the stark contrast between light and shade over the surface of the ambulance body for instance, feeling that it makes for a more interesting finish — to me at least than I've created recently when painting vehicles using more traditional steps. It can be disconcerting though. My brain needs to be constantly rebooted to push boundaries further than I am naturally comfortable crossing. Painting areas that are not subtly different in tone, but massively out of step with other parts of the model's surface, is an illusory trick that I'm still trying to pull off whilst at the same time convincing myself that this is the right way to go. Of course, all of this means that you can really only view the model from one carefully crafted position, which is fine if it

Applying the various colour bands around missiles and bombs for military aircraft loads is trickier than it looks and they really need to look neat in order to not ruin the appearance. One simple solution is to use decal strip and here, Fantasy Printshop step in with this sheet of yellow, blue, brown, grey, green and black strips in widths from 0.4mm to 1.8mm. Extremely useful, and for other subjects too!



is in a diorama where you are telling the viewer where the focal point is (usually the front); not so easy if the model is freestanding and thus viewable from all sides!

The final area of experimentation was over the walls of the rear ambulance body. In reality this was a wooden frame covered with canvas and much like a WWI aircraft, it exhibited wrinkles in its surface. Seeing this in one of my reference shots I thought I would have a go at recreating this distinctive feature, oil paints being used to add highlights a shadows that flowed over the surface of the green paintwork in order to recreate the illusion of those much-needed wrinkles. Looking at the completed model I feel that I captured the look I wanted on the side of the model, but perhaps not over the roof. More work is therefore needed on future models to fully capture this illusivelooking construction and finish. D



the front mudguards and bonnet

Earlier on, I wrote that I pushed the finish a little more until I was satisfied. Here is that work in place. The rear body is actually built from wood with canvas stretched over the top. In some of my reference images I could see wrinkles in the fabric, so using neat oil paints (raw umber for the shadows and then sap green mixed with raw umber and titanium white for the highlights) I painted those wrinkles over the surface of the bodywork. This involved an almost drybrushing motion, with only small deposits of paint being applied in flowing lines, until the effect was as you see here

This was a really fun model to build. It not only offered the chance to build something a little different in terms of subject matter, it resulted in model that features plenty of detail, inside and out. In terms of a kit, it is everything that I think you could wish for, either built from the box or as seen here, with a little additional detail. It's easy to assemble, fun to paint and captures the look of a K2 ambulance to a tee. What more could you want? I'm really looking forward to building a vignette around this model, but in the meantime I hope you have enjoyed seeing what is possible from the kit and that you enjoy building yours, as much as I've enjoyed tackling this one, this month.



Robert Riley up-details Tamiya's 1994 classic 1:12 Ducati superbike beast

urking in the back amongst the stash, Tamiya's iconic 1:12 Ducati 888 has been sitting there dormant waiting for its turn at the bench. This particular kit has been with me now for around 15 years, it had almost become part of the furniture it's been there that long! For me, when pulling a kit out of my personal collection I have to really feel like building it. Because I know once I start, I get fully immersed in a subject and will spend hours, days, months getting stuck in. My passion for this kit re-ignited because of the Italian hobby company 'GB Models'. I'd seen and followed their future release progress on social media of an upgrade package being designed for this very kit. For those that haven't heard of GB Models, they are a relatively small company that specialises in designing transkits, detail-up parts and decals for 1:12 motorbikes. For me, they are definitely up there with the likes of Top Studio and Hobby Design in what they have to offer in detailing and quality. For further website information, see the Tech-spec at the end of this article. •





What they actually came out with was in fact two separate upgrade packs. Set A comprises a full detail upgrade featuring general photo-etch visual enhancements around the bike, some metal parts and my favourite area of the pack - a direct bike chain replacement with pins, links and cogs. Set B leans towards the front end of the bike focusing on replacing the forks with brass items, replacing the upper yoke alongside fluid bottles, resin parts and other paraphernalia to really push the realism further. Each pack can be applied independently, or as a pair. So in this case, to say I built this model because of an aftermarket offering was definitely true. That and the Ducati 888 is up there with my favourite bikes of all time (pics 1, 2, 3).

#### **METHOD IN MY MADNESS...**

So what's the plan? Take a deep dive into the research vaults, delete all box stock screws where applicable with metal tubing, use neodymium magnets for the body panels, figure out where to apply the upgrades, where to adapt and apply my own enhancements but most importantly – slide a large pizza into the oven and get building!

#### **ENGINE WORK...**

Lots to get stuck into here, the Tamiya main block is a great place to work on but screams for detail. Some of the cooling pipes were re-positioned for a tighter fit later then each pipe was given subtle hose-like texture using a solvent. This melted the plastic and gave a more three-dimensional look. photo-etch Ducati logos were added to various components, the beige distributor housing was detailed and










enhanced, various nuts, bolts and braided hosing added to. Final details included the clutch basket rework and belt cog enhancements from the GB Models pack. The main adaption around the engine was to the throttle

body, this was reworked and enhanced to mirror its real counterpart and finish the look using some creative scratch work. The upper intake tray was wrapped in carbon decal, glossed over then detailed accordingly (pics 4 to 7).













#### **SWINGING THE ARM**

The swing arm is a single or double-sided mechanical device which attaches the rear wheel of a motorcycle to its body. The box stock version is chrome plated double-sided component, this was dipped in household bleach to easily strip it all off. All parts were fitted together, cleaned up then enhanced with Green Stuff two-part epoxy weld lines all over, new chain adjuster detailing, tubing for axles replacing the box screws then airbrushed with Mr Color super metallic chrome silver deliberately going heavy for a polished alloy look. The decals were Shunko replacements as the colouring is much stronger and the print much clearer (pics 8 to 11). •







#### FRAMING UP

The main bike chassis is the backbone of this bike, it will need to support and take the weight of all the different mechanical parts, seat, handlebars, fuel tank and body panels. The box stock framework was adapted pretty heavily with the removal of some internal generic support bars, new ones correctly added in and after lots of trial fit, new brackets made for body panel support containing those neodymium magnets. Once I was happy to continue, the Green Stuff two-part epoxy came back out and weld lines were applied to various adjoining bars around the frame using references from its real counterpart (pics 12 to 19).

The most time-consuming area of the frame involved the front-end airbox section. I wanted the front cowl to be easily removed to reveal the detail underneath. However, Tamiya's original build path meant the cowl would be mounted onto the airbox and screwed into the side panels then frame. This wouldn't fit the narrative of my build so the airbox had to be adapted. The two airbox parts were glued together, filled then re-shaped with the front mounts sanded away, followed by the airbox entry points shaped out.

The ECU needed to be mounted higher as the standard gap sat lower than it needed to be. This was relocated then enhanced, detailed and a new cradle bracket made for aesthetics and electronic couplings later. For the front cowl to be secured, I needed to make new mounting brackets. This took some trial and error but eventually a secure even point was found with magnets being the fixer. To finish off at the top end, a brand new speedo panel





was adapted and made courtesy of GB Models and more scratch work. With all the prep done I could finally get the colour work going and get the bike build moving along. Various mechanical and visual details were added that the frame would hold, finishing with the main




power block being secured into place. The final details on this section to be added are the main cooling radiators. The larger upper radiator and lower oil radiator. Both were detailed using photo-etch parts and some scratch work to the lower oil rad to bring it up to date. •





















#### **O EXHAUSTING BEHAVIOUR**

I love working with scale exhaust systems and this one proved lots of fun. Ducati systems look really smart, especially the 888 system with its iconic golden hue. The whole box stock system was built up as one, which made it an easier place to work on giving me a better view on future planned work. Both rear silencers were sanded smooth and the exits bored out further for a more realistic thinner wall. All main pre-moulded pipework detail was sanded away and then re-detailed further for a better more aesthetic look – new repositioned seem lines added, section joining collars, downpipe detail and silencer welding

To finish, hairline thickness exhaust brackets were folded and 6mm retainer springs were added. Now it was time for the all-important colour work. Starting with a gloss black base followed by Mr Color's chrome silver, the base was set. Zero Paints Titanium Gold was the first port of call followed by varying shades

of Copper, Gold, Bronze, and a mixture of Alclad 2 Hotmetal colours going heavier at the heat exchange points and heat separation. Once the main pipes were complete, this was all masked over leaving the rear silencers exposed. They were given a fresh coat of gloss black followed by light build layers of chrome silver to taste.

Once the colour work had cured. they were both wrapped in carbon fibre decal and given generous coats of Mr Color super smooth clear gloss. The finish on these parts would help separate them from the main system giving them their individual purpose on the bike. For the icing on the detailing cake, GB Models offer up photo-etch detail to the cans and frame mounting brackets. These will need rolling to fit the cylindrical shape but is easier than you think to achieve. To finish the entire look, the all important Termignoni logos were applied and we now have an exhaust system fit for the Ducati 888 Corse racer (pics 22 to 24).

#### **LINKING THE CHAIN**

As a direct replacement, GB Models offer up a brand new bike chain and sprocket upgrade. This comprises several photo-etch sprocket components, two chain length faces, a mind-boggling amount of individual chain links and a multitude of turned metal link pins. It's a daunting task ahead that's for sure, but this sort of challenge is really appealing to me as it's a test of patience and skill.

The instructions clearly guide how to build up the chain up so it's worth familiarising yourself with them so you can mentally prepare for the project ahead. The most difficult part of building the chain is keeping the glue fixing down to a minimum, but placing enough down to hold it all in place whilst keeping it a clean process. Once completed however the new chain shines and holds its own over the box-supplied part. A real feat of model engineering design from the GB Models team.










#### HANDLING THE BARS

The front end has really seen its share of work with now the next major step being the forks and upper yoke detail which of course, needs more cutting up and converting. The Tamiya arms were replaced with brass and turned metal items. I converted the brake callipers themselves to make a whole unit instead the half unit supplied in the box, brake discs were thrown away and sharper detailed photo-etch items replaced them. For the upper yoke section, the box stock part was thrown away and a cast metal part replaces it. This was sanded up to a smooth, natural metal finish alongside the fork adjusters, new fluid bottles were fixed and other final details added. The handlebars themselves received some personal extensive rework then once all sections were completed, this whole area was fitted to the frame, wheels mounted up and permanently located (pics 25 to 28).

#### WIRING IN

That leaves the final adjustments to finish up the look of the completed chassis work. For the electronic details, I felt a decent representation of working components would look really smart if I hard wired them in. The ultimate aim was to connect a host of electronic cables via a loom to the front mounted ECU loosely following its real counterpart. Battery components are detailed and wired up, new ignition coil packs were made, throttle body wiring, fuse wiring, power cables and speedo control cabling. These were all fed in and around a new loom and then fed into a main connection point to the bottom of the ECU. It's all well and good adding details like this into a model, what you have to take into consideration is to be fully aware of clearance and final fit of later parts. Thankfully lots of trial fit and testing for this particular model along the way ensured the outcome I was looking for was consistent and above all looked right (pics 20, 21).













#### O DRESSING UP

With the mechanical and running gear work complete, it was the turn of that bright red eye catching body panelling. The main adjustment to the bodywork was separating the fuel tank from the rear cowl making it an independent body part (pics 15, 16). That then meant each section; the front fairing, both side panels, seat panel and fuel tank, could be easily removed after completion via the use of magnets. My plan was once removed, visually see the shape of the inner tank and also be able to plumb it in once fitted. Tamiya's 'Smooth Surface' 2-part epoxy was the choice of putty as this is a very pliable putty to use and gives us plenty of time to manipulate and shape to gain the results we are looking for.

It took some shaping and trial fitting to get right as there are lots of components to fit around, but once finished and cured the putty sands really well and holds strong. All body parts were given a pink primer base, sanded smooth and were coated in Mr Color's 'Hermann Red' gloss. The front fairing decal was a bit tricky, it just kept splitting on me so I chose the paint route instead. Lots of templates and masking were involved, some tidy up required but essentially came out well in the end. All other decals were applied, left to cure and finished over with Zero Paints 2k Diamond gloss


clear. Sanded smooth, hand polished back up and final details were added.

#### THE CHEQUERED FLAG

Considering this kit was released in 1994 it really does hold its own against most modern Tamiya releases. The fit is superlative, part detail is great, isn't over complicated and in general a fairly straightforward kit to build. That's probably why it's still easily available to buy today and has to be one of Tamiya's most popular bike releases. I've thoroughly enjoyed my experience with building this kit and I'm almost certain I take place in a long line with others that have to.







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


is one year older than your Editor (but looks a lot fresher) and it is still a marvellous little thing (unlike your Editor). Just four examples of this impressivelooking airliner (plus four of the HP.45 variant) were built at the Handley Page factory in Radlett, England, just nine miles from the Tamiya Model Magazine editorial office, the prototype 'Hannibal' conducting its maiden flight on 14th November 1930. It held the distinction of being the largest airliner in regular use when introduced in 1931. Three served in the RAF and photos can be found showing the type painted in early RAF camouflage colours. The model depicts this amazing machine with remarkable aplomb, with a healthy wingspan of 275mm and lots of surface detail on its airframe exterior. The parts will need a little more clean-up than usual, only to be expected of a kit of its vintage and some planning will be needed when assembling the wings with their struts to ensure everything is aligned, but a moulded plastic jig is provided to help with this task. The windows are supplied in classic modelairliner style as strips of clear polystyrene that locate from within the fuselage. The trick here is to pre-spray a little silver around the window frames then fit the clear parts, close up the fuselage, mask off the windows then spray the rest of the exterior. This way, one need not worry too much about masking accuracy.




#### CRUSADER MK.III WITH BRITISH CREW, EL ALAMEIN 1942-2022

The Crusader tank saw widespread service in North Africa, and showed the advantage of high speed. It was initially dogged with an unreliable engine, thin armour, and poor armament. Nevertheless, the cruiser tank was a good concept in the open expanses of the desert. Gradually the Crusader improved, and by the Mk.III had a 6pdr gun that could hold its own against most enemy vehicles. By the battles of El Alamein, the Crusader was being gradually replaced but still played a prominent role in the battle and pursuit afterwards. When the Italeri kit was first released in 1976 it was quite remarkable, and even today it is highly regarded and much the equal of later kits. The Italeri kit has sharp detail and no flash, and the fit of parts is excellent. The kit offers alternative types of sand-shield, the full shields being correct for late 1942. With this recent boxing, Italeri provide nine figures - three are doubled up to allow the modeller to create a diorama scene. The kit comes with soft 'rubber' one-piece tracks, which are actually very good, and the tank itself builds into a very convincing replica, needing little tweaking. The figures are frankly showing their age, and many modellers will choose to use figures from other sources. Decals for this 80-year memorial of the El Alamein battles include three options for the battle, two from 1st Armoured Division. Overall, this is a very good kit of this famous cruiser tank. CLS








The M109 self-propelled howitzer first saw service in Vietnam, serving with the US Army and Marine Corps until withdrawn from the theatre because of mechanical problems. The M109 continued in service, with multiple upgrades, and served with a large number of nations - indeed close to thirty countries still use the M109 in various versions, showing that this weapon system is extremely effective and successful. The Italeri kit first appeared in 1983, and has been upgraded like the real vehicle, and kit 6589 is the most recent offering, giving many options. The kit provides the original short barrel for the M109 and 109G, with the different muzzle brakes as appropriate. The kit also has the much longer barrel for the A2 and A3 versions, plus two types of tracks so that the NATO version can be produced. The great number of options is matched with appropriate decals, allowing everything from Vietnam to the present day. Doubtless we will soon see Ukrainian markings, as thirty vehicles are currently being used there. The quality of the kit does reflect the fact that the original kit is 40 years old, and although updated and improved, the kit has some areas of simplification that would benefit from a little TLC to bring up to current standards. That aside, Italeri give us an excellent basic kit that looks every bit of the powerful weapon that has been so successful. CLS




 ITEM NO.6566 The Czech light tank which became the Pz.Kpfw.38(t) proved to be a very successful chassis, and as the tank became outmoded, the chassis was adapted to carry a range of weapons under the general name of Marder. First produced in 1942, the Marder III H used the German 75mm anti-tank gun, which proved incredibly effective. and initially the gun was mounted in the centre of the hull (version H, 450 produced), later versions mounted the gun at the rear (version M). This kit from Italeri is the H version, which saw very widespread use in Russia and Italy, but also appeared in Tunisia and NW Europe. The Italeri kit first appeared in 1972, and has now been improved with linkand-length tracks, more accurate wheels, and better seats, for example. While some features (eg. the figures) look a little dated by modern standards, the kit itself is still a great looking model, with fine detail and good accuracy. As always, some modellers will wish to add etched parts or additional details, but built from the box the result is a super representation of a very significant vehicle. Very thin and sharp decals are provided for two vehicles in Italy, and two on the Russian Front, giving plenty of colourful options for the final





When the German army realised in the 1930's that an armoured

recce vehicle was needed, three manufacturers offered very similar prototypes: Daimler-Benz and Bussing made 123 of the Sd.Kfz.231, and Magirus made 28 of the Sd.Kfz.232 radio vehicle as provided in this kit. Each manufacturer had specific detail differences between their vehicles, and this model has rather a mix. The 6-wheelers. simply based on truck chassis, were not adequate for the task, and after the Battle of France they were withdrawn from front-line service, to be replaced by the famous 8-wheelers. The Italeri kit of the 6-rad armoured car was first released in 2004, and the latest issue has improved decals for vehicles used in Poland and France. The kit builds into a model that really captures the quirky appearance of these armoured vehicles, and the basic model has plenty of opportunity for additional detailing if desired. For example, the tyres lack some of the precise tread that we have come to expect, the chassis underside is very simplified, and the weld lines are absent in some areas. This does not diminish the model made out of the box, which has the advantage of a quick and easy build, and makes up into an extremely eye-catching replica of the radio version with its characteristic frame antenna. Colour options are rather limited for this vehicle type, essentially Panzer Grey on all vehicles, with some dark brown stripes for the Poland campaign. CLS

What's not to love about this big, beefy late-sixties Chevy musclecar? As always, the history of these cars is convoluted with many engine, interior and trim variations but the basic line is, it's a whopping-great six-litre V8 squeezed into a relatively compact chassis/two-door body that gave it a decent 0-60mph figure (for the time) along with a stirring soundtrack and serious street appeal. Revell's 1:25 kit was issued back in 1990 in the form of the Z-28 Camaro RS and re-released over the intervening years with newly-tooled parts to create other Chevrolet variants. For 2022, Revell has presented us with this all-orange car (other colours can be used of course!), which comes with really nicely detailed V8 powerplant that sits in a fully appointed engine bay, replete with radiator and its shroud, battery, brake mastercylinder, a choice of air-intakes and more; all the modeller needs to add is ignition wiring and other cabling to complete the look. The suspension is well executed, although the inclusion of scale-like steering hardware means the front wheels are not steerable, but it's not a great loss. Given the base-kit's vintage, the detail throughout is exemplary, the stunning bodyshell being the highlight and giving the model the proper 1960s profile. With some careful masking/spraying (or the use of Bare Metal Foil) to get the period window trim looking good, this kit will build into a stunning replica of this 1960s macho classic. TMMI



ho's not familiar with those pre-war 'Signal' magazine images of Junkers Ju87B-1 Stukas surrounded by ground personnel, preparing the machine for a new mission? A special feature of this picture is the large shark mouth, which makes this machine so well known. This was the aircraft of the group commander of the II StG77 number S2+AC, Major Alfons Orthofer.

Since I like to build models of aircraft that were in use and were much more worn out than the pre-war machines, I set out to research whether the S2+AC was still in use under Orthofer. Among other things, I found a series of pictures of him in the publication "STUKA Volume one" by Peter C Smith on page 76. There are two photos and a profile showing machines of the staff of the II./ StG.77. According to the publication "Luftwaffe im Focus" by Axel Urbane, Orthofer continued to fly this B-1 variant in service until his death in October. Therefore it was clear to me that the "Shark Stuka" from the Signal publication was in use until October 1942. •









#### SHELL CONSTRUCTION AND COLOUR DESIGN

As you know, the Junkers Ju87 undercarriage was usually shrouded by spats, except in extremely difficult weather conditions, which greatly reduces the effort in this section. Nevertheless, I wanted to add details and have therefore decided to represent one of the two access flaps of the wing weapons in the open state. The set by Eduard for the Airfix kit also includes photo-etch for this section (photo 8).

Like the cockpit, this area was painted and weathered with the same techniques as described previously (*Pictures 9, 10*).

A somewhat unsightly detail that absolutely needs to be fixed is the gap in the wing rear edges. I closed them with 0.2mm thick

plastic sheet, as this unsightly detail easily catches the eye. In addition to correcting this

flaw, I also added the access hatch for the first aid set and the hinges of the fin's servo tabs (photo 11). After a little minor filler-work along the cement lines, which are almost not worth mentioning, the entire model was subsequently re-engraved by me. This is tedious, but in my opinion absolutely recommended, because only then does the Stuka appear realistic in the finished state (photo 12).

The area around the engine also needed a little work, because in addition to engraving and drilling the exhaust pipes, I added an air intake as well as the starter crank insert on the port side (photo 13). Once the airframe construction had been completed, I now came to research and the colours and

markings of this Stuka from the Balkans campaign. As already mentioned above, the "Shark-mouth Stuka" is the sub-variant B-1 with the identification

S2+AC, in use until October 1942, thus already two years in service in the Balkans campaign.



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M107/M110 FAMILY OF SELF-PROPELLED ARTILLERY 1956-1991 DAVID DOYLE, AFV MODELLER PUBLICATIONS www.afvmodeller.com

These tracked artillery weapons played a significant role on the post-war arsenal of US forces and served in many other armies as well. The vehicles have been released in 1:35 by Italeri, but the new release by AFV Club has certainly reawakened interest in the series. This fabulous book in A4 format covers the development of the M107 (175mm) and the M110 (8"), plus the off-shoots in the planned family of vehicles on a common chassis. The 120 pages provide a plethora of factory pictures, detailed close-ups and action photos, which provide a wealth of



really useful information for researchers, modellers and anyone interested in this period of history. The vehicles saw a lot of service in Vietnam and the colour photos will prove particularly for weathering, markings and colour schemes. Whatever scale, any model will benefit hugely from the information contained in this book, given the exposed fittings on the top of the vehicles, just begging for extra wires, pipes and components. This fascinating volume is a vital resource to support modellers. CLS

> The exploits of the Eighth Army across Egypt, Libya and Tunisia are well known and the eventual victory in North Africa is often seen as a great chapter for the British Army. The photos in the 140 page book are largely commonly seen in books about North Africa, although some are real gems. For anyone wanting a very good starting point for their library, this inexpensive book is an excellent



starting point and has much to recommend it. The captions are generally accurate, though a number of errors creep in. However, the overall value of the book, like so many others in the Images of War series, is that it gathers together very useful pictures which will be an inspiration for modellers and diorama builders alike.
