


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
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Renowned as one of the pioneers of the wing car era, the Lotus Type 78 debuted in the 1977 Argentine Grand Prix to much acclaim for its sleek, aerodynamic form. The inverted gull wing shaping on the underside of its side pontoons generated significant downforce via the "ground effect," without adding significant drag, giving the Type 78 exemplary cornering speed. That year Mario Andretti and Gunnar Nilsson achieved five wins in total. Although they did not become champion, this car's concept was passed on the next season to the Type 79 which got both Driver's and Team's Championships. Bring back your memory of this pioneer - which gave impetus to the wing car era – with our kit!

Tamiya's all-new 1:24 GMA T.50 is here...

t has to be said that Gordon Murray is a true design genius, creating numerous innovative F1 machines when a designer for Brabham and McLaren in the 1970s and '80s. His name has become synonymous with high-end automotive design and even though it's over thirty years old, his 1992 McLaren F1

still sets many standards in car design, as well as fetching prices as high as £22.5 million at auction.


In 2017, Murray launched Gordon Murray Automotive (GMA) with is first car being the T.50, named for 50th anniversary of his career and the 50th car he has designed. With a 3.9-litre V-12 engine

mounted mid-ships in a lightweight and compact chassis weighing in at less than a tonne, it makes a potent performer. The large fan installed at the rear of the body functions as an aerodynamic device that controls six different aero modes, in combination with the internal duct and movable rear wing. It also

features a three-seat layout with the driver's position in the centre with the passenger seats behind it.

After the McLaren Senna released in 2021, Tamiya had to choose an equally significant follow-up, and what better that the T.50? The new model takes some design cues from the Senna, the parts planned











to minimise masking and potential glue-marks, all very much appreciated features for the potential builder.

A concisely detailed engine is included and thanks to the design of the real car's 'bonnet' panels, at least parts of it can be displayed on the finished model; the orange rocker-covers help a great deal here, visually.

A very thorough read-through of the instructions before starting the build will pay dividends, as you'll be able to plan when and how the parts are painted, where the cementing points are and how many elements can be combined for spraying as a whole.

We will, naturally, be

bringing you a fully detailed article on the construction of this staggering new kit, but for now, here are a few images of its parts and the finished thing, built and painted at the Tamiya factory. •

























David Perez brings us an expert's approach to painting and weathering Tamiya's beautiful little 1:35 R35 Light Tank using materials from the 'AMMO' range

n this article I intend to show how, using techniques that are simple to carry out and put into practice, together with a range of suitable products, we can quickly and easily paint a model with complex camouflage and represent different effects of wear, oxidation or dust. These effects can be observed on a regular basis on military or civilian vehicles and offer an operational – but above all realistic – visual aspect. The model chosen for this project is the Tamiya's R35 Light infantry battle tank, serving with the French army. This tank intervened in the first period of the Second World War and equipped the mechanised and armoured divisions of the French army in great numbers.

One of the peculiarities of the French vehicles of this period of time was undoubtedly the camouflage, inherited from the First World War. As a general rule, it consisted of five different shades such as dark green, light green, sand yellow, dark brown and greyish green. All of them were applied in spots of different sizes, which were both outlined and delimited by a line of black paint that was painted capriciously around the perimeter of each of the spots of these colours. Let's see how to get the camouflage colours on and get this little tank weathered up!

In this photograph we can see the assembled Tamiya R35 model. The cast metal effect on both the turret and across large areas of the hull stands out. We also observe the Extra Thin Cement (A.MIG-2025) cement, together with the Standard sandpaper (A.MIG-8563), used in assembling the model, as well as the Thin Surfacer Putty (A.MIG-2047) putty and the precision brush for pigments N8 (A.MIG-8705), both products used to amplify the cast steel texture




To begin the process of painting the camouflage so characteristic, as well as striking, of the R35, I selected the following acrylics and products: Heavy Chipping Effects (A.MIG-2011), acrylics Brown Soil (A.MIG-0076), RLM 80 Olivgrün (A.MIG-0248), RLM 79 Sandgelb (A.MIG-0222), RAL 6011 Resedagrün (A.MIG-0003), Matt Black (A.MIG-0046), Acrylic Thinner (A.MIG-2000), Air Cobra (A.MIG-8625) airbrush and round synthetic brush N3/0 (A.MIG-8611)





I continued painting the camouflage, this time the spots of the second colour The painting process continued with the RAL 6011 Resedagrün using RLM 80 Olivgrün. Remember that in all airbrushing work with acrylics we must dilute these with a few drops of Acrylic Thinner



Using the N3/0 synthetic brush, I painted freehand the black line that outlines all the contours of each of the camouflage colours, and with this, I had finished the main paintwork of the Renault R35



I painted the 'rubber' bellows that protect the suspension of the roadwheels using Matt Black (A.MIG-0046). The rubber tyres of the wheels were also finished with this colour








To brighten with oil paints, one must apply them on the areas where sunlight would fall, such as the rounded edges of the upper side surfaces of the chassis. In the case of highlighting the RLM 79 Sandgelb, I applied Oilbrusher AMMO Yellow lightened slightly with Oilbrusher White on the rounded edge, using a N1 round brush



Then, with a Synthetic Filbert N4 (A.MIG-8595) brush, I dry-blended the oil paint. It is important not to go too far when blending the oil so as not to remove it completely



To create highlights or intensify the camouflage

tones, I used the following oil colours from the





LIGHTNINGIN



Jeremy Moore takes another look at Tamiya's sublime 1:48 P-38J Lightning, arguably the best scale aircraft model yet created...

eleased in the summer of 2022, Tamiya's P-38J joined the excellent P-38F/G and special boxing P-38H series of kits first released in 2019. Much has already been written about the quality of these kits and I'm happy to report it's all true;, they're simply fantastic in terms of engineering, ease of construction, and overall accuracy. Many of the parts in the P-38J kit are shared from previous releases with parts for the newer version included on separate sprues. One of the more noticeable characteristics of the P-38J (and later variants) were the redesigned engine nacelles that included intercoolers that were previously located in the wing leading edges. Tamiya has perfectly captured the complex shapes of the chin scoops with additional cooling inlets on these redesigned nacelles. So, without further delay, let's get started!

CONSTRUCTION

Prior to beginning work on the kit, I made the decision to build a European Theatre of Operations (ETO) aircraft with D-Day invasion stripes. While there were no external differences in terms of Pacific vs. European based aircraft in WWII, internally the aircraft carried different radio equipment in the cockpit. As luck would have it (and because I can never choose a "simple" build or project?!), the Tamiya kit includes the SCR-274 radio transmitter/ receiver equipment used on Pacific based aircraft. Since most of this is visible through the rear canopy behind the pilot's seat, I felt it was necessary to make it as accurate as possible and needed to source a replacement SCR-522 radio receiver/transmitter found on ETO aircraft. Eduard, fortunately, produces a resin cockpit upgrade for the another series of P-38 kits which contains all of the necessary components for the SCR-522 radios. (At the time of press, Eduard also now produces an excellent 3D printed cockpit which includes both types of radio components.) With these items in hand, I could now begin construction in earnest.

Work began with modification of the cockpit sidewalls using the aforementioned resin components from Eduard. I added wiring and connectors using fine solder wire, disks punched from styrene, and strips of lead foil using reference photos for as much accuracy as possible. All of the various cockpit components were then airbrushed with Mr. Paint MRP-131 US Interior Green.


The nose section was prepared next, and I deviated from the kit supplied armament with brass .50cal and 20mm barrels from Master Model. Since the barrels are mounted from the inside of the nose cone, the kit part was modified by removing the styrene barrels and carefully cementing the mount on the inside. The brass barrels could then be inserted from the outside once final painting was complete. The nose cone, nose side panels, upper wing leading edge inserts, identification light panel, and lower wings are cemented to the centre section next.

To finish up assembly of the wings, the ailerons and wingtips are added next along with the inserts for the mounts. The wingtips are of the typical slot and tab arrangement which can sometimes lead to a poor fit resulting in a step, but to no surprise they fit perfectly and integrated well with the overall wing assembly. I deviated from the kit supplied turbochargers and opted for some 3D printed examples from Eduard's excellent Brassin line. To my surprise, however, the Eduard parts did not fit well at all into the wing mounts and required quite a bit of grinding and sanding on both the bottom of the turbochargers themselves and the wing mounts to get them to fit. The result, however, I think justifies the work as the Eduard parts have superior detail and are ultimately very visible on the model. After ensuring both fitted properly, they were removed from the model to be painted separately and placed during final assembly. •

TAIL BOOM TIME

The next phase of assembly, which makes up nearly half of the steps outlined in the instructions, is the construction of the left and right tail booms. The boom structures are essentially mirrored and contain the main landing gear wells in addition to the oil cooler scoops and radiator fairings aft of the gear wells. The oil cooler was assembled next and inserted into the forward section of the boom (sadly never to be seen again), and the radiator fairings aft of the gear well follow. Tamiya provides decals representing the mesh on the forward and aft faces of the oil coolers and it's a perfect solution for any area only visible to the spying eye of an IPMS judge with a torch.

The next step is where I ran into the one and only issue encountered during construction – a rather large gap on the outside of both curved radiator fairing sections where they met the underside of the fairing.

After a serious amount of head scratching, dry fitting, and more head scratching, I couldn't determine the cause of the gap, but I did notice that it definitely needed to be closed in order for the air intake cover to fit properly. Rather than apply traditional thin cement and a clamp, I expedited the process by squeezing the cap closed and applying Starbond medium thick black CA glue followed immediately by some CA accelerator.

The remaining construction steps include the landing gear, gear doors, pylons and drop tanks, propellors, aft cockpit radio rack, and the mounting of the windscreen and rear canopy. The wheels included in the kit are excellent and needed just a little bit of cleanup in the form of re-scribing the tyre tread pattern once assembled. This was accomplished with a fine razor saw and panel line engraver. The underwing pylons were assembled next, and rather than hang drop

tanks from them I chose some Eduard Brassin 1,000 lb. bombs to represent the ground attack role the P-38 became adept at after the Normandy invasion.

After carefully examining some period photos, I determined the pylons required modification in the form of styrene strips on either side to represent the mounting method for bombs; the centre sections of the pylons also needed some careful grinding with a moto-tool to allow the bomb shackles to seat properly. With those complete, the bombs themselves were assembled per the Eduard instructions and given some additional texture by stippling them with Mr. Surfacer 500. With the armament squared away, the propellor components were cleaned up next and prepared for painting and assembly. The propellers are integrally moulded to the spinner plate which, at first glance, looks like it may be difficult to paint separately. Fortunately,


the design of the remaining spinner components overlaps the plate allowing all of the parts to be painted prior to assembly.

It's important to label them in some form once assembled as they are counter-rotating (not identical) and could easily be mixed up once completed. I accomplished this by scratching a R and L on the rear of the spinner plates with a scribing needle. Finally, the canopy components were masked using the masking material provided in the kit. While not precut like some manufacturers, the task is pretty simple with a straight edge and a new hobby blade and the masks save huge amounts of time. I deviated from the instructions by mounting the aft cockpit radio rack, pilot seat, and rear canopy after the basic painting was accomplished. With that, construction was complete, and it was time to prepare the model for painting.






Mottling was created with using precut masks to establish tonal variation and light coats of more LP-11 were misted on leaving some mottling visible



PAINTING AND DECALS

The subject aircraft I chose was a P-38J from the 392nd Fighter Squadron, 367th Fighter Group, 9th Air Force operating from a newly constructed airfield near Carentan, France, shortly after the Normandy invasion. Heavily involved in ground-attack missions, the aircraft from the squadron were predominately in bare-metal finish with invasion stripes. Little did I know how much work would be involved once I chose this scheme...!

The anti-glare panels

nacelles were painted next with Mr. Color C304 Olive Drab with some Tamiya X-22 Gloss added. The base colour was then lightened by adding some Tamiya XF-55 Dark Yellow, thinned heavily with Mr. Levelling Thinner, and airbrushed in the centre of the OD panels for some contrast and variation. Happy with the results, I began preparing and measuring the invasion stripes. The tail booms, in particular, required some careful measuring and attention due to the compound curves and unique

• were masked off first and some Mr. Masking Neo fluid was applied with a piece of sponge to the leading edges of the wings. The white areas were then airbrushed using a mix of Mr. Color C311 FS36622 Gray and C1 White thinned with Mr. Levelling Thinner (my favourite, if you can't tell). The white stripes were then masked off and the black airbrushed with Tamiya LP-5 Semi-gloss Black, again thinned with Mr. Levelling Thinner. After allowing everything to dry, the masking tape was removed and any areas requiring touch-up were addressed. The masking fluid on the leading edges of the wings was then removed by scrubbing with a cotton bud dipped in water resulting in realistic chipping of the paint.

With the invasion stripes wrapped up, the nose markings unique to the 392nd Fighter Squadron were painted next. I made some elliptical masks using a Silhouette Cameo craft cutter and then airbrushed the openings for the machine guns and cannon with

Tamiya LP-5 Semi-gloss Black, and the forward section of the nose with LP-7 Pure Red. With that, the basic painting of the model was complete.

SUB-ASSEMBLIES

The various sub-assemblies to include the propellers and spinners, wheels, landing gear, turbochargers, and bombs were painted next. I started with the turbochargers which were first airbrushed with a base coat of Tamiya XF-9 Hull Red and XF-72 JGSDF Brown. This mix was then lightened with Tamiya XF-78 Wooden Deck Tan, and then airbrushed to create highlights and fading. The mix was then lightened once more with XF-78 and airbrushed again over the centres of the highlighted areas to create even more contrast. They were then given a heavy wash of Black and Sepia oil paint thinned with mineral spirits and set aside to dry. The bombs were painted next beginning with a base coat of Mr. Color C38 Olive Drab 2, followed

by several light coats of hairspray from the can.

Once dry, a light coat of Mr. Color C304 Olive Drab was then airbrushed on and allowed to dry for about 30 minutes. Details such as the fuse spinners and stripes were then painted with AK Gen3 and Vallejo acrylics. I then applied some water on the bombs with a soft brush, allowed it to sit for a few minutes, and then scrubbed them with a stiff brush to reveal the darker paint underneath. A thin wash of AK Interactive Light Dust & Dirt Deposits was applied next, followed by some speckling with a thin mix of brown and black enamel paint. The results closely resembled period photos of bombs being handled by ground crews, which I referenced continuously throughout the painting process.


The landing gear doors and wheels were painted next, beginning with the polished strut areas of the landing gear which were airbrushed with Mr. Color SM206 Super Metallic 2

Chrome Silver. These areas were then masked off, and the remaining areas as well as the wheel hubs and landing gear doors were airbrushed with Tamiya LP-11 Silver. The tires were then airbrushed with Tamiya LP-65 Rubber Black. All of these subassemblies were then given a wash with a mix of Black and Sepia oil paint thinned with mineral spirits, followed by some speckling with the same mix. Finally, the propellers were airbrushed with Mr. Paint MRP-122 RAF Marking Yellow on the tips. These were then masked off and the remaining areas airbrushed with Tamiya LP-5 Semi-gloss Black. The spinner components were then airbrushed with Tamiya LP-11 Silver and the spinner cones with a darkened mix for some contrast consistent with period photos. With that, painting was complete and the model was ready for decals.

Tamiya includes markings for several PTO aircraft, so decals were sourced from



the Eduard "P-38's over Europe" boxing of an older P-38 kit for the ETO subject I had chosen. The decals for 'Moonlight Cocktail' performed flawlessly with the aid of some Micro Set and Sol and settled nicely into rivets and panel lines. I also used the kit provided stars and bars insignia from Tamiya; they were noticeably thinner from previous kit decals and were excellent when applied. If building one of the marking options included in the kit, I would not hesitate to use the decals provided. Once dry, all of the decals were sealed with several light coats of Mr Color GX-100 Super Clear thinned with Mr Levelling Thinner to protect them from future weathering steps.

FINISHING UP

With weathering complete, it was time for final assembly. The landing gear struts and doors were mounted first, followed by the wheels. These were cemented in place with 5-minute epoxy to allow some working time to ensure they were straight and evenly spaced on the

axles. The gun barrels were cemented in place next, making sure they were aligned properly, and the appropriate length barrel placed in each opening. Prior to mounting the overhead canopy, the mirror (which includes an awesome kit supplied reflective decal!) was cemented in place with Ammo by Mig Ultra Glue. The overhead canopy was the last item to be placed on the model using Ultra Glue once again, which is perfect for clear parts and photo-etch With that, the model was complete!

FINAL THOUGHTS

Tamiya has produced yet another excellent model of a very important aircraft from WWII! As I mentioned previously, everything you've ever read about the ease of assembly and excellent details of this kit is absolutely true. While a bit more involved because of its design and multi-engine platform, the kit is well within the capabilities of someone with a couple of models under their belt. Now, for that P-38L...or



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


amiya's 1:48 F-35A Lightning II proved to be very popular (the concluding part of our full-build article is coming soon, honest!), so much so that an all-new kit of the aircraft has been created in 1:72. Firstly, it must be stressed that this is not the Italeri-tooled model that has been marketed previously by Tamiya, but a completely new kit, designed from scratch by Tamiya's design team.

The main objective here was to make the model as easy to build as possible; it has fewer than half the parts of the bigger kit, but without sacrificing detail or accuracy. From a close inspection of the mouldings, it's fair to say that they have achieved – and exceeded – the brief. The model is a stunning little production that offers exactly the right level of complexity to be a satisfying project, without it

becoming a time-sponge as many larger kits can become.

Other than the scale, the main way Tamiya's 1:72 model differs from its 1:48 brother is the exclusion of an open weapons a bay. In the larger model, this area is the focal point of the production and it is certainly a magnificent 'pool' of detail. It does however, take quite a while to paint, so its absence from the 1:72 model will

ICM, UKRAINE

Anyone watching film of the current Russian invasion of Ukraine will notice that both sides wear uniforms with quite complicated patterns. The Ukrainian Pixel Uniform is particularly difficult to untangle in images, and for modellers will be hard to replicate. ICM have come to the rescue with a set of paints specifically designed for figures. The 12ml pots contain a high quality acrylic paint, designed for brush painting, although it is possible to thin for airbrush application. The paints include the four colours of the pixel uniform (Buff, Grey Green, Dark Green and Extra Dark Green), plus Chocolate brown for footwear and t-shirts, and finally a matt varnish to even out the appearance after all of the colours have been painted. The box art includes illustrations on the back to show the pixel pattern and to show painting instructions for Ukrainian troops. With all the current interest in the defence of Ukraine, this set of paints will help modellers get the correct appearance to figures and equipment. A very useful set of matched paints for Ukrainian uniforms. The diagram showing the pixel pattern does not have a scale. CLS






As part of the heroic defence of their nation, the Ukrainian army has made extensive use of anti-tank missiles to repel the invading armoured units. Designed and manufactured within Ukraine, this Stugna-P (Skif) weapon has been extremely effective, with a range of 5km. Unlike Javelin, the Stugna is guided by an operator towards the target, something that can be done remotely. This set from ICM includes the missile and launcher, with a crew of two setting it up, plus the operator with the control unit, and lastly a sentry keeping an eye out for any enemy troops. The parts are moulded in grey plastic and accurately portray the figures with goggles, body armour and pouches typical of the current forces. For added detail, the modeller will need to look at the box art to see how to add cables and carrying straps to the launcher, and the internet provides many other pictures. The quality of moulding is extremely good, and painting the figures and the weapons will be great fun. The figures are naturally limited by the process of injection moulding, and some details such as the definition of pocket flaps can be improved by scraping with the tip of a sharp blade. Some additional straps (such as those on the knee pads) may need adding, but essentially these figures are great to go from the box, and represent figures in warm conditions of summer 2022, as they are in t-shirts rather than overcoats! Superb figures from the current Russian invasion of Ukraine, with everything for a vignette. Some minor fine details can be added where plastic moulding could not manage. **CLS**



The choice of 1:24 scale for figures is unusual, as current releases of vehicles and aircraft tend to be in other scales, but the great advantage of 1:24th is that the figures are large enough to detail without taking up too much display space. These three Wehrmacht figures from ICM include a General, a mid-level officer (the aide?) and a private soldier (the driver?). Each figure is beautifully moulded in the standard parts – legs, arms, front and rear torso, head – with the headgear separate and the two officers given appropriate side-arms. The figures are posed standing, which makes them adaptable for different situations, and they are good enough for individual display. There has been care taken with accuracy in the uniforms, with the boots of the correct type for each rank, for example. The details of each figure would be appropriate for the first half of WW2, before uniforms began to be simplified, with collars, pockets and caps all changing. The quality of ICM's moulding is exceptional, with the officers showing a fine array of decorations, and excellent buckles, buttons, and other details all sharply picked out.

The instruction sheet shows basic positioning and colours of parts, but the majority of modellers will want to consult references for painting details on these impressive figures. Overall, a really great set of figures which look superb individually or as a group. Very good moulding of details and useful poses. Further references will be needed to get the uniforms painted correctly. **CLS**

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
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
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
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It has taken a while to arrive, but Thunder Models new 1:35 Morris C9/B Bofors is here, and what a kit it is...

he Morris-Commercial company was one of Britain's best known car manufacturers, but they also made vast numbers of military vehicles, of which the C8 Field Artillery Tractor (FAT) was one. The C8 was a four-wheel drive, general utility vehicle used widely from 1939 by British and Commonwealth forces during the War and was employed to tow artillery such as the 25-pounder howitzer and 17-pounder anti-tank gun.

With the Morris acting as the base, the developers needed a weapon and they chose one of the most famous anti-aircraft guns in WW2 Allied history, the Swedish-designed Bofors 40mm. This powerful weapon fired a 1.6" (40mm) projectile and had a rate of fire 120 rounds per minute.

The combination, now designed 'Carrier, 30cwt, SP, 4×4, 40 mm AA


(Bofors)' was put into production before the D-Day operations of June 1944 and it served widely in Europe; a total of 1,680 vehicles were constructed.

Thunder Model made us wait for this kit, but now we have it in our hands, it's a little beauty. It arrives in a modestly-sized box packed with eleven sprues in mind-grey polystyrene, one in clear, five resin wheels/tyres, three frets of photo-etched brass, copper wire plus a sheet of waterslide decals. The markings are for one of two machines; one serving with the Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment, 15th Scottish Infantry Division, North West Europe, 1944 plus a vehicle of the 1st Infantry Division, Italy 1944.

The kit parts are numerous and many look delicately in-scale, so some care will be needed when removing them from their sprues, but the


scale-effect will be fantastic. The model comes with a full depiction of the engine, gearbox and chassis, all building up from a mass of small mouldings to create the powertrain and underpinnings. The axles and steering linkages alone will need good tweezers and very restrained applications of cement for construction, but the finished effect will be impressive.

To use that hackneyed model-review phrase, the Bofors is 'a kit all to itself', to the extent that we believe it will be issued on its own at a later date. Here, we have an extremely thorough depiction of this famous 40mm AA gun, from the operators' platform to the barrel's tip. It all looks fantastic and you will be able to see a fully detailed, step-by-step article on its construction soon in Tamiya Model Magazine!






The iconic Mosquito, in its bomber, fighter bomber and photo

reconnaissance roles was one of the first multirole aircraft that saw combat in WW2. Its speed and movability proved very successful against the German Luftwaffe and ground targets. It was unusual in that it was constructed mostly of wood; its lightweight construction made it the fastest operational aircraft in the world at that time. The Mosquito flew with the RAF plus other air forces around the world. Airfix first released their new tool 1:72 Mosquito in 2021 as the bomber version, the B.XVI. It was the first mainstream two stage Merlin version of the aircraft in this scale apart from the ancient Matchbox kit and resin conversions. This new reboxing was released this year, with new parts for the PR XVI version. It comes with some lovely box artwork, familiar with recent Airfix releases. Inside are six sprues in dark grey plastic and one clear, which are much better than the overly thin plastic of past kits. Detail is very good with fine panel lines on the control surfaces. The interior has a nice level of detail especially in this scale as well as the undercarriage with the tyres having lovely moulded treads. The new parts consist of closed bomb bay doors with two clear camera ports, a jig which helps you accurately drill holes in the lower fuselage for the formation lights plus extra camera ports in the rear fuselage and a new canopy with an astrodome. A lovely kit from Airfix

Eduard's BF 109 E-3 was originally released in 2020 by special hobby as an E-4. After various releases of different versions of this aircraft by this manufacturer, Eduard came out with their "Dual Combo" using this kit as a basis, using the different versions of the 109 including the E-4, E-3 and E-1. This "ProfiPACK" release depicts the E-3 version. As you would expect from Eduard, the box contains all the goodies you get from this boxing. You get two sprues of light grey plastic and one clear, the surface detail is very refined for a model of this scale. Cockpit detail is amazing and can enhanced even further using the photo etch sheet, which gives you the option of using this medium for the instrument panel, rudder pedals and sidewall detail. In addition, you get a very well detailed engine, plus its bearers if you want to pose the aircraft with cowling open. The wheel wells are well detailed but can be further enhanced by photo etch, undercarriage and the wheels themselves both look good. The ailerons and flaps can be posed either up or down. Clear parts are crisp and well moulded with no imperfections. As with this ProfiPACK release, the instruction booklet is 16 pages long, starting off with a short history of the early 109's, paint call outs use Gunze Aqueous, Mr Colour and Mission models. There are five decal choices covering E-3's between 1939-1940. This is a great little kit with bags of






















P-51D-10 Mustang

variants of the aircraft used the Allison engine. This powerplant had its limitations, especially at high-altitude. The decision to replace this engine with the well proven Rolls-Royce Merlin transformed the aircraft's performance and cemented its place

in aviation history. The definitive version, the P-51D was powered by the Packard Merlin, a two stagesupercharged engine. It went on to see action not only in WW2 but also in Korea until jet fighters took over the roll as the main fighter of the USAF. This amazing aircraft remained in service with some air forces until the early 1980's.Eduard originally released the P-51D as a new tool in 2019. Since then, this kit has enjoyed various releases in either their ProfiPACK or in this case their Weekend Edition. As is standard with this type of release, you just get the basic kit and a decal sheet, but with these latest "weekend" releases you do get more decal options, four in total. Upon opening the box, you are greeted with five sprues of grey plastic and one clear. Moulding quality is very good with recessed panel lines and rivet detail. The parts breakdown is quite conventional and will go together nicely without any surprises, just be careful to choose the correct option for this version, namely, a specific canopy and a later production fin fillet. Decal options are for four machines that flew with the 8th Airforce based in Great Britain. This will be another welcome release of Eduard's P-51 that can be embellished with plenty of aftermarket options if you




elliptical wings and sleek shape, it was fast and manoeuvrable and was more than a match for its German counterpart the BF-109 in the battle of Britain. The Spitfire stayed in production for the entire duration of the war and after, the last aircraft, the Mk 24 coming off the production line in 1948. The Mk IX version that this kit depicts was created as an opponent to the Focke-Wulf Fw-190 and went into production in late 1941.Eduard first released the Spitfire Mk IXc in 2016 in its ProfiPACK boxing. It has been re-released with various boxings containing, either new parts or decals. This latest boxing is Eduard's Weekend Edition, which is just the basic kit and a decal sheet.In the box you are greeted with five sprues of grey plastic and clear sprue. The kit's surfaces are stunning, with fine panel line and rivet detail. Cockpit detail is amazing, especially in this scale. As it's the weekend edition you just get a decal for the instrument panel. Seatbelts are also decals but are very convincing. Sidewall detail are inserts and have been faithfully reproduced. Also supplied are separate ailerons and rudder, the undercarriage is a basic affair but looks the part, tyres are in two halves and could benefit from a resin aftermarket set. The clear parts have an open or closed option and are nicely moulded. Decal sheet includes markings for no less than four aircraft. A great kit and great value for money. RM
















The Italian Navy (Regia Marina) worked on a guided torpedo,

which seated two crew and could be steered into an enemy harbour for detonation under the keel of a target warship. This unique device was the Siluro a Lenta Corsa (slow-running torpedo), soon nicknamed the Maiale (Pig) by its operators. These weapons had a range up to 15 miles, but obviously were a great risk to the crew, and recovery of the men after the raid was extremely difficult. Around 50 Maiale were constructed, beginning in 1939, and the Italians managed to damage several ships in Alexandria harbour. This experience led the British to develop their own 'chariots' which were used very effectively. This kit from Italeri is extremely detailed and a significant etched brass set provides all the fine parts. The kit offers two alternative warheads, the normal and the extended version. The kit was originally released in 2007, but this new outing has additional parts in the form of two seated crew to ride the Pig for an in-action presentation. Alternatively, a realistic support base is provided to show the machine on land. These Maiale were painted dark green and Italeri provide decals for




I started with the body, as this is the most time consuming part. I sanded the body and added a bit of styrene on the trunk as it was too small and leaves a big gap. After smoothing the mould lines and scribing out the panel lines it was time to paint the body. I used Zero Paints Grey Primer and VW Beigegrau (pic I) with a white roof. After that I used Mipa 2K clear-coat for the nice gloss finish.

While the body was drying, I could start on the interior, chassis and engine. The little two stroke engine was assembled and fitted into the engine bay. I added a few wires for spark plugs etc (pics 2, 3). The chassis needed a good lowering for the new Fujimi RH Cup wheels (pics 4, 5) and it wasn't an easy job. I removed a few parts and glued some together to make sure the wheels fitted in the lowest position (pic 6). I needed to modify the exhaust too, as it was the lowest part and didn't fit anymore. I made a side exhaust instead, as this looks a bit cooler.

The interior for the Trabant is very simple. I didn't like the seats or steering wheel (pic 7), so I replaced the former for a set from a Nissan Skyline. The door panels were painted in body colour and masked off to paint the inner parts in a nice brown from Vallejo. (pic 8). I also applied checkered upholstery decals to the seats for a retro look The carpet was created with a dark brown interior flocking from USCP (pic 9).








MINI REVIEW ...

HYPERSONIC MODELS 1:48 F-4 PHANTOM STABILATOR UPGRADE SET (HMR48052) FOR TAMIYA www.hypersonicmodels.com

Tamiya's recent 1:48 F-4 Phantom II kit is a wonderful production, but with any kit, small improvements can always be made. Here, Hypersonic Models have provided resin and photo-etched brass parts to gently but effectively enhance the 'stabilator' hinges of the model, adding a more three-dimensional and mechanicallooking effect. A sheet of self-adhesive masks is provided to act as a template when positioning the brass guide rails, an excellent touch. Detailed instructions are massive help for anyone using this upgrade.















The moulded seatbelts didn't looked too bad at all so I used them. After assembling the interior I could fix it to the chassis. So far everything fitted very well. Now the body paint had hardened, noticed there were a few dust spots in the clear-coat that needed to be polished out. I started to sand the body with 3M sanding pads grit #2000 followed by #3000 #6000 and #8000. The most spots were now removed, but the paint was now very dull after sanding. To bring back the nice shine, I used a four-step polishing compound set from Menzerna. With a rotary tool and three grades of polishing pad I started to polish the paint back to its original

I trimmed and smoothed out the bumpers for a better look.

All window trims were painted and I installed the clear parts. A few decals were applied to the windows. Now the chassis and interior were mounted on the body. Everything still fitted pretty well for an older kit (first released in 1990). Now the model was almost complete I installed the last few components like the mirror and number-plates etc. I really enjoyed this simple kit. Everything fitted well and most of the parts are nicely detailed. I built this kit with a nice photo of a real Trabant with the same wheels, which was my inspiration. I even liked this model so much I also bought a wagon version of it!

WAFFEN-SS ON THE


THE WAFFEN-SS ON THE WESTERN FRONT 1940-1945, IMAGES OF WAR SERIES IAN BAXTER, PEN & SWORD www.pen-and-sword.co.uk

By concentrating on the Western Front, the author has been able to focus on a relatively small number of Waffen-SS units, and has succeeded in illustrating the soldiers, the weapons and the environment. This book effectively falls into two halves, the first covering the fighting from 1940 to 1941, in France, Belgium, the Netherlands and then in the Balkan countries. The second half of the book picks up with the Normandy landings in 1944, through to the Allied victory in 1945. The 144-page soft-back book has a few pages of very well written text, but the bulk of the book consists of photos with great captions. Indeed, the captions are generally very accurate and identify vehicles and weapons correctly (only one mistake noticed!). The text in the book does not shy away from the savagery of the fighting, the indoctrinated brutality of the SS soldiers, and the atrocities committed time and


again throughout the war. The book offers some interesting sequences of photos which provide a lot of detail, but most of the pictures are individual shots, providing a wide spread of coverage of events. The photos are almost entirely 'new', with only a few appearing in other publications. The reproduction of the images is good, given the very slightly fuzzy appearance of photography in the field in the 1940's. Overall, this publication gives an accurate and balanced account of the Waffen-SS units in Western Europe, without glorifying the SS or ignoring their brutality. An excellent factual account. CLS







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
