The most unconventional Fairey designed aircraft to enter full production, the Gannet was developed to meet a 1945 Royal Navy requirement for an advanced carrier-based turbo prop powered anti-submarine hunter killer. One feature of the Gannet which gave it a unique appearance was its innovative Armstrong Siddeley Double Mamba powerplant. This arrangement saw two gas turbine engines mounted side by side, sharing a common gearbox, but both operating independently, each engine driving its own coaxially mounted, contra-rotating propeller. Another unique feature was the bi-folding wing system, designed







FOR VANUSHED:

A CURIOUS DISCOVERY



he idea was simple enough, at least to begin with. Grab a bunch of readily available kits, combine them into what you hope will be a coherent scene and then paint the results in a way that brings the whole shooting match together. Like I say, it was a simple enough idea... The seed of this concept was a trip to my local branch of Hobbycraft. Perusing the shelves for goodies as I often do, I was taken by Tamiya's 1:48 V-1, a simple kit that I had up until now not built. It was cheap as well, a factor that made any

possible plans well-within grasp. It was not until a few weeks later during a another trip that I saw the kits as part of 'Black Friday' sale that allowed me to buy two and get a third essentially for free, that my plans were finally set in motion.

IN THE BOX

There is no getting away from the fact that Tamiya's V-1 is a very simple kit. Comprising little more than thirty parts, construction will tax no-one. Assembly can be completed in a matter of minutes on the way to painting and yes, decalling. Along with your

'Doodlebug' (my dad called them 'buzzbombs' when they were flying over his head in London during WW2. Ed) the kit also includes a very useful trolley, one of which you can see in my completed diorama. Across the board, detail is neat and tidy and perhaps representative of the levels expected when this kit was released two and a half decades ago. Panel lines are petite. There is an open vent for the pulse jet. Wings, large at the front, smaller at the back, are thin and well-formed. Fit is also noteworthy, most of the parts joining with aplomb, only

the cowling for the pulse jet needing a little filler around its join with the rest of the model.

If one criticism can be made of the kit, it is that it's perhaps too perfect! Examination of Cosford's exhibit revealed a very rough surface, with ragged areas of welding whereas in the kit, those features are replicated as delicate, incised lines. Were I to build another one of these kits, I think I will try and replicate those features, stretched sprue no-doubt working well to convert sunken lines into ones that looked to be raised up. •

ON SET-UP

Having bought three V-1s, I was faced with what to do with them! Obviously, building them all in an identical manner would not have resulted in a very interesting scene, so I set about planning how to make each one different from that next to it. Step one was to build one of them as a complete machine. This would show how these fearsome weapons would have looked in use, wings in place ready to launch. The other two would be built in various states of undress, if you see what I mean. In practice that would mean one would be missing its wings, entirely. The other would have one wing in place, mounting poles slid

through the fuselage. At this point I was still intent on using all three, but that would soon change as it became obvious that they would not all work together. That being so, three became two and my scene started to come together in a more coherent way. This is always an important part of any diorama. It's easy to fall into the trap of sticking with an initial idea, even if that proves to be problematic. Never be afraid to change direction and though you may have bought a kit specifically for your scene (as I did, here) it will never go to waste, that kit often finding its

further down the line. Having whittled my collection down slightly, I stuck with the idea of building one as a complete airframe and then the other with one wing missing. Both kits were built from the box, needing little more than some filling around the pulse jet's cowling and wing joints - the latter, a redundant step that showed itself up following examination of a real V-1 at Cosford. You see, the main wings were not tightly fit against the fuselage, there being distinct gaps betwixt wings and fuselage sides. As you might imagine, this was duly noted for future builds... •



As mentioned in the opening text, I started with the intention of using three V-1s, but couldn't make that work. In these two shots you can see some initial layout ideas, as well as how the base first looked with its righthand corner intact. The base incidentally, was constructed using a picture frame and then the plinth using foam-board, clad with black plastic card

O DIORAMA: LAYOUT AND SUBSEQUENT CHANGES

From the off I knew that I wanted to replicate different areas of concrete and grass. Though I could have gone with one or the other, that didn't seem to be overly interesting, so I chose to have distinct areas of both. I also wanted to create a raised platform on which the dioramas would sit. I'm not

a fan of flat bases, so always try and raise things up towards the view, the extra work helping to create a more dynamic final result. As it turned out, that decision would have a welcome unintended consequence as we will now see...

Models all built, I drew my planned layout onto some paper and then set about posing the individual items to see if I could find a balanced layout that I liked. With that done that to my satisfaction - almost - it became obvious that there would be a sizeable area around the bottom right-hand corner that I would need to fill. Not keen to use a load of random accessories, I decided that my raised base was deep enough that I could cut

away part of the corner and add a scenic area: you see, unintended consequence! It's almost like I plan these things! This comprised some brick walls, concrete floor and steel steps. All of these combined to create an interesting area that not only caught the eye, but also added a degree of depth otherwise missing on my original, flat base.



Having slept on my idea, I decided to remove one of the V-1s and then crop that redundant corner down so that it was no longer an area for accessories to live in but instead, a part of the scenery. Not only did this allow me to build a pleasingly detailed part of the diorama, it created the illusion of depth, something not possible by using a simple, flat plate.



Having cut out the corner, it was rebuilt using flat plastic card sheet for the floor and embossed brick pattern sheet for the walls. The joints between the walls of the diorama and these new parts were carefully filled and sanded to create as smooth a finish as possible. The steps were made from Evergreen channelling and strips of plastic card. A rail would later be added using Evergreen plastic rod.




The concrete hardstanding was a simple rectangle of .5mm Styrofoam. Detail was scribed in with a pencil and the tip of a scalpel. Texture was added with a toothbrush, the bristles of which were pressed to the soft surface of the foam. Groundwork was then added using tile grout and silver sand, the latter held in place with diluted PVA glue



Happy with the shape of the groundwork, I applied some static grass and then the remnants of a destroyed, off-camera structure. VP bricks and rubble dust was used to create the detail around this part of the diorama. Once again, everything was soaked in dilute PVA and then left to dry overnight to set, rock hard



The rails are now in place, as is a small wooden box and further evidence of that destroyed building



THE STARS OF THE SHOW

One decision that was made early on was to limit the additional details to a vehicle, some figures and as little in the way of accessories as possible. Moving away from my Verlinden-inspired themes of recent years, I wanted to ape Shep Paine's work with this one, where the story took precedent over detail. With so much interest already being provided by the V-1s, I figured that I could tell the tale of a group of GIs who've happened upon a rocket site with little more than my chosen items. As it turned out, that proved to be the case, colours and textures around the scene adding the extra levels of interest that I was looking for without the need for anything that might look out of place.

To add life, I turned to another Tamiya kit, this time their 1:48 'WWII US Infantry At Rest' set. Though not specified on the box, this wonderful kit includes not only a scaled-down collection of infantry figures based on their classic Military Miniatures set released during the 1970s, but also a superb Jeep. Having been created using their ancient 1:35 set, detail on the figures is a little soft in places, but they sit look fine once assembled and painted. Also, because they are designed to work together, they do so in a most pleasing way in scenes such as this, little work being needed to create a coherent collection of figures.

The Jeep is excellent; detail is excellent and assembly, quick and easy. As the kit included a set



Before painting could begin, I sealed in the sides of the diorama and then settled the details onto the still soft groundwork to create a natural sit. Once dry, the sides would be sanded smooth and then the parts removed ready for painting. I prefer to do everything in one go, because it ensures that the colours and tones are balanced across the whole diorama. It also allows me to gauge highlights and shadows on all of the parts, so that they look like a unified collection one in place



Having sprayed the whole diorama with a layer of Flat Black car paint, then basic colours were airbrushed on. Concrete was sprayed with lightened shades of Medium Grey; the grass with Deep Green lightened with Yellow Green; groundwork and rubble with Red Brown darkened with Black followed a layer of Flat Earth and then the steps with German Grey



Stones were picked out with Lifecolor Green Stone...



...and bricks with AK 3G Base Flesh

of kit packs, rolled up tarpaulins and jerry cans, I decided to work with them to create a stowed jeep that's seen plenty of action. Some additional parts were also grabbed from the spares box and those, in combination with some Green Stuff tarpaulins, helped to create the busy appearance that you see in the accompanying images. A final touch was to add a wire cutter to the front of the vehicle and some superb jerry cans and their holders from the ever-impressive Hauler range. The resulting model was pleasingly detailed, despite its small size.



Groundwork was drybrushed with AK 3G Ochre Khaki to bring out the texture...



...before repeating the trick over the grass with Brownish Green



The corner in which the steps live was fun paint to paint, acrylics and oil colours working well to bring out the detail. AMMO's Streaking Grime, a very dark green colour helped to add the illusion of dirt around this dark,

The results of my work can be seen here: a diorama base where all the detail can be easily seen. I really like this style of painting and look forward to using it more over the coming months

FINAL THOUGHTS

This was a really fun project! I haven't really built too many dioramas in this scale, so the chance to have a go at one using kits that I had hitherto not built, was an opportunity not to be missed. Using simple kits, materials and techniques, scenes such as this are well-within the grasp of all modellers, so I really hope that you are inspired to have a go at something similar. Who knows, it may, open up a new world of possibilities that you'd not considered how exciting is that! See you next time.

Alongside the trolley for the V-1 I used a spare frame, shortened and then glued back together, as the basis of this scratchbuilt trailer. Plastic card and some rod was used to create the bed and towing handle. The oil drums were from Tamiya's 'German Aircraft Power Supply Unit & Kettenkraftrad' set

Robert Riley's superdetailing and enhancement of Tamiya's classic 1:12 Kremer Porsche 934 'Vaillant' continues with the chassis, suspension and fuel tank...


s there was so much more to show you with this model, we decided to run the article across three issues, not two as initially planned, so here is the second instalment covering the chassis, suspension and fuel tank! There is lots to do in these areas, so planning here is key. Lots of test-fitting of body parts throughout threw up some interesting areas to be aware of, such as the large rear panel shelf in the fuel bay which has many gaps that will need filling, the lower battery/oil shelf needs sealing in, both rear seat edges of the interior have large gaps along with the rear seat panel itself which again needs filling and sealing in, engine bay lower panels will need attention with join lines along with the main rear suspension bar. The required work to gain the ideal clean finish in all areas is very time consuming, with lots of modelling techniques used along the way and a good dose of patience. Doing the work was more fun than it sounded because it gave me the chance to stretch out those modelling fingers and put the skills to the test. •

There aren't many main chassis components, but there are several key areas that will need attention at this early stage so it's a good place to start your prepping






The welding detail was added using shaped two-part epoxy and both were painted and then weathered accordingly



The large oil cooling radiator was reworked by shrinking the main box stock part down, squaring it off then Scalelab24 photo-etched surface detail added and a drain plug to finish off the look



A dry fit of the completed radiator components including the new transfer pipe shows things are moving along nicely and everything is located in the right place



The unit information markings on the outside edge of the radiator are aftermarket decals from BBK. I thought they'd add a touch of realism and interest

The main modification I made was to the front end, side-mounted radiators. The system requires the water to travel up one side of the car, through each small radiator and back down the other side to return to the intercooling system at the rear. They are linked together via a central pipe which is not supplied in the box so a new one must be made - sounds simple, but really it wasn't. Firstly, this required each radiator to have a lower pipe extension crafted onto them

at specific angles according to real references. The main centre pipe was made using a styrene tube heated up and bent to shape. This had to exit the lower rad, follow the contours around the front panel, flow above and along the main large oil cooling radiator and down the other side mirroring the other half. Not only that, it needed to be all in one piece, secured into place safely without hindering any surrounding body panels and fit snugly into the main bodywork to

look like it was always meant to be there. Once complete, this was very rewarding as now the cooling system is linked and all parts can be detailed to taste.

A TOUCH OF COBALT

The moment of truth was here, all the panel prep work was complete. This had been a lengthy process of filler, primer, sand - filler, primer sand and so on and so on until the desired point was reached. So getting to the anticipated main

colour work was a relief. Zero Paints offer up the colour-matched 'Vaillant Green' Cobalt colour in a handy large 60ml jar. This will be enough to paint the whole car inside and out, bodyshell included. They also offer a smaller 30ml jar ideal for 1:24 versions, so if you are choosing what to use, make sure you order the right size!

The Vaillant Green was applied in several light build layers to the whole chassis until a solid uniform level






Zero paints colour matched Vaillant green is the order of the day. A 60ml jar should be enough for you to cover the whole car, inside and out

was reached, then all was sealed in with Tamiya's excellent Semi-Gloss clear (LP-24). I chose to go the semi-gloss route so the main chassis colour finish could be separated from the body gloss, the added details would not be over shadowed by to much gloss sheen and also because it is more period-correct. Once the paint had cured, it was time to mask over the chassis work, leaving the cabin's internals exposed. This was airbrushed in Tamiya's Semi-Gloss Black to complete the look.


SUSPENSION BRIDGE

In order for the following steps to take place, the lower running gear needs to be built up. That includes the suspension and braking •

Once the whole chassis was airbrushed and to keep the finish neutral. Tamiya's Clear (semi-gloss) sealed all the colour work on There are only two main colour changes to apply on the chassis, semi-gloss black for the interior and the Vaillant green for anything else. I worked the green first, masked it over and went in with the black To make the colour work easier in the front compartment, the battery and oil tank shelf was fitted afterwards. This was sealed with epoxy welding and airbrushed in green Rear brake detail. This was a fun area to work on and enhance. Brake lines were added, calliper detailing and new brake pad retaining clips shaped made to finish the look For most of the mechanical parts, using references I went my own route with colour work. This rear trailing arm was no exception and looks great for it



Once the trailing arm was in place, the colour choices against the body contrast each other nicely



With the lower suspension set in place, this is where things really start coming together. Detailing this area before the engine is added will make things a lot easier in the long run

systems. Nothing too complicated here, apart from to ensure when the shock absorbers are built up, they are measured correctly in height according to the direction in the instructions or to your specific taste. All areas that require it will be plumbed in with added banjo fittings, braided hosing, brake lines and other visual enhancements.


The main upgrade for me was to rework each brake calliper, the details were enhanced with added brake bleed nipples, self-made brake pads and brake pad retaining clips similar to the references I had. The retaining clips were pretty fiddly to make but worth the work in the end to complete the look. Scalelab24 offer a really nice brake disc set with 3D printed centre hub upgrade in their pack, but because I'd be using different wheels I couldn't use them. Nonetheless, I built them up anyway for display purposes because they were just too good not to. Instead, I opted for Tamiya's box-supplied brake discs using their included PE disc face parts to enhance them further, even these old moulded items still came out superb and really did look the part. I didn't really follow the instructed colour guide, instead opting for my own route using the many references I had, plus a little artistic license of course. You just can't beat the real deal right?s






FILLING IN THE FRONT END

The front of the car is another really interesting place to work on as it houses the large, 120-litre fuel tank, a large oil tank, fire safety systems, electrical components, fluid bottles, braided hosing, wiring, cabling and lots of other important mechanical parts. I'd amassed a vast amount of reference material – including schematics – to really nail the detailing here, so was hugely looking forward to the challenge. Each area was worked carefully and steadily paying attention to the next move after each upgrade.


The fire extinguisher was reworked and enhanced, the main battery was reworked and modernised, the brake master pumps were upgraded and enhanced, fuse box detailing was upgraded and cars heater system upgraded to. The oil tank was stripped of its box supplied chrome, fixed together and cleaned up. Two-part epoxy filler was rolled together in very thin strips and applied around the edges according to references then shaped to look like weld lines. Whilst we're on the subject of weld lines, these were applied in many areas around the cars external parts, internal parts and many mechanical components using the same two-part epoxy method. The oil tank was enhanced further using A/N fittings so the various hosing could be affixed and later routed to their specific locations.

O THAT BIG FUEL TANK

The 120-litre fuel cell is almost a project in itself. The fibreglass shell we see in all 934's is actually an outer protective shell for the tank itself, so seeing fuel through here would probably mean you have issues! Both halves were fixed together and the seam lines cleaned up as best I could. In reality, the fibreglass is wrapped around the cell and then secured into place with nuts and bolts. So to replicate this, several holes were drilled out ready to take more excellent Prime-Miniatures machined hex bolt and nut sets accordingly.

Scalelab24 supplies

photo-etched and 3D printed parts in the detail set for the fuel cell but I wasn't happy with the final look of them, plus the 3D printed parts were a bit coarse. So instead, I reworked what is supplied in the kit by replacing the bolt detail with real ones, reworking the fuel caps and adding in some lovely Decalcas A/N fittings. To attain the fibre-glass look, I adopted the same solvent brush method used on the 'engine tin' and components (last issue). There was a lot more area to cover so took my time and worked each panel side carefully. Again I used light colour passes with the airbrush going heavier in some areas, but this **D**







To finish up the cell are the reworked fuel caps. These were box stock items reworked with etch parts form the Scalelab24 pack and some self-work



Further detailing around cell included the use of many threaded nuts and bolts, an fittings and further colour shading





Reworking the oil tank details begin with the high pressure hose connectors from top studio. These are quite large items on the real tank as they have to transfer a lot of oil








It was easy to go to heavy in this process so my best advice is to hold restraint and go steady on application. Afterwards I airbrushed white lightly over the top to knock the finish back

time I went for Tamiya's Dark Yellow (XF-60), Clear Orange (X-26) for shading and colour depth followed by the use of 'Lifecolor's dry paint pigments for shading and mild weathering. Tamiya's Brown panel liner was applied sparingly to represent mild dirt build-up. To finish the area, brass nuts and bolts were added, fuel cell entry details were affixed into place other small details added for plumbing later. See you again next issue!

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
We featured Tamiya's sublime little 1:48 M8 HMC back in Issue 329 (March 2023) and since then, the kit has attracted some very neat detail sets. Possibly the most extensive is this resin and photo-etched brass upgrade package from Hauler and it includes internal ammo racks and rounds, driver and gunner's seats, fire extinguishers and other interior parts, plus a whole new floor in PE brass, complete with non-slip pattern. In the turret we have .50cal ammunition boxes, M1 carbines and a whole new M.2 Browning gun. On the hull exterior we are treated to engine grilles, new tools (resin) and brackets (PE), headlight brush-guards and spare track brackets. It's an extensive set that will bring an extra touch of refinement to Tamiya's already lovely little M8. The finishing touch is Hauler's PE brass hedgerow cutter which folds up and fits to the bow plate.

t goes without saying that anyone under the age of fifty has watched at least one Star Wars movie, if not several, or played with the associated merchandise, from console games to LEGO, as a child. I would put money on modellers having most likely built at least one of the many vehicles, figures or spaceships from the Star Wars universe at some point in their hobby lives! Anyone that knows me knows just how much of an absolute super-fan of all things sci-fi related I am, especially in regards to Star Wars. Suffice to say, I have a very understanding wife who puts up with all the collectables I have scattered around the home. So you can imagine her joy when I was given the chance to build this kit! Full disclaimer: the two kits used in this feature were very early pre-production samples at the time of writing this so I had no instructions or decals at the start, but they arrived later on as I was getting towards the end of the build.


Those of you who attended Scale Modelworld 2023 might recognize this build as it was the model that was displayed on the Revell stand over the weekend of the show. As you can see, there is one full complete build of the N-1 with the R5 maintenance droid in the rear compartment and Grogu (AKA The Child) sitting on the lap of the Mandalorian inside the cockpit and rather than having a second ship built - in 1:24 this thing has a rather large footprint – I decided on just a cutaway, showing the alternative version Revell give you of having Grogu in the rear. This build was time-sensitive, only having a week or so to get it over the finish line and on the table in time for Scale Modelworld 2023 so I had to pull out all the stops to get the job done. •







MODEL LOLLYPOPS

As you can see from the photos, I decided to display these models perched precariously on some clear acrylic rods 30cm above the ground. An accident waiting to happen, right? Lots of thought was put into just how I could make it so they can be transported easily to shows etc., without the worry of the entire thing collapsing into thousands of pieces. I could have drilled a great big hole on the underside of both ships and slathered in lashings of epoxy to secure the rods in place, however I finally decided on drilling a small hole though from the inside of the lower fuselage and UV-gluing one M4 bolt and

large washer to add some strength. This would then allow me to simply screw the model on and off as required on a acrylic rod into which I'd previously drilled and inserted some brass threaded fasteners into both ends. That way, once the model was complete, I could unscrew and remove the models safely and quickly from both bases without the worry of damaging them in transport. Some might say it was a bit of overkill but hey, I'm a modeller, and attention to detail is everything, right?

BUILDING THE MAIN SHIP

After a quick overview of the parts, this kit it looks to have been designed in a way that most of the components

can be sub-assembled and the majority of the parts can be painted prior to final assembly. First port of call was to build up both engines and attach the associated fuel lines and forward intake fans. These were installed on the main engines and there is scope here for those of you who enjoy the superdetailing side of things, but for the purpose of this build I kept it pretty straightforward. So, following some reference photos online, the engines were painted up using various metallics and some of the finer details were picked out with a paint brush. A little panel-liner was applied to add some interest to the moulded details and I called it done. 'Bob's your uncle'

as they say! With both the engines assembled and painted, you then need to fit the engines into the lower half of the ship's wing and then glue in place the lower engine cover and then repeat the other side. At this point the instructions call for you to assemble the Mandalorian figure, bearing in mind at this stage you will need to decide which combination of Droid and Grogu you will be going with for your model.

Next was the cockpit area and there are some really nice details on the sidewalls and cockpit floor that you can really go to town on painting up and weathering. But once Mando is in place, not a lot of it can be seen sadly, but I know it's there. Where I



pins adding strength.

Before I closed up the fuselage, I primed and painted a base coat of aluminium from an aerosol. There are several internal box sections full of detail known as greeblies – that were painted up with some light drybrushing applied to highlight the detail. These were then glued in place and can be clearly seen through the open slots in the upper

position so I could now attach the long tail section of the ship and cement it in place. The small attachment for the rear cockpit area was also fitted depending on if building it with the droid or Grogu. Finally, with everything on the ship attached, I was able to fix the lower fuselage in place.

With the main aluminium base colour painted already, all that was left to do was to mask off the cockpit area

ahead and apply the decals. Next came my favourite part – the weathering – most of which was done by airbrush, applying thinned brown and black paints to create all that space dust and grime from all those close calls Mando had in this ship. A few pigments were also used. All that was left to do now was to apply a satin clear coat to protect the model while being manipulated.

SLICE AND DICED

The cutaway ship was built and painted in very much the same way as the main one, so I won't bore you with those details again. The slight difference on this model was the option of where Grogu was situated, plus, I'd taken a razor saw to cut away all the forward and rear portions of the ship! Two pieces of plastic card were glued on the front and rear of the cutaway. All that was left to do was to attach both the canopy sections which just clicked into place with no need for any glue.

BASING IT UP

A Star Wars 'in flight' diorama wouldn't be complete without a dusty Tatooine landscape, so for this I used a some high-density foam. Using my hot wire cutter I carved an undulating landscape, followed by some AK Interactive Sand Texture paste which was spread thinly over the base. Once that was dry, I airbrushed several sandy brown colours to create a little bit of variation and finally, some PVA glue was applied down and some static grass sprinkled on; both the ships were then attached to the acrylic rods all ready for display. I think this is a really dynamic way to display a model like this. And there we have it – Revell's all-new N-1 Starfighter, an impressive model in both size and detail!




The main change is the deletion of the outer machine gun from each wing, with the barrel openings and access panels from the upper halves and their corresponding openings and ejector ports from the lower halves also removed. On close inspection of these areas, one can just make out the revised portions of wing parts, although you have to look closely. For this

preview, we have highlighted these areas in red, opposite page, top. We mustn't forget the other additions to the box; a seated and rather nicely detailed pilot figure on the new sprue 'D' which also carries the final – and tiny – new component in the form of a rear-view mirror (plus a spare) for the top of the canopy. Otherwise, the rest of the model uses the same mouldings as the original

kit and those more familiar with Tamiya's recent aircraft releases might be surprised to find raised and recessed rivets covering the entire airframe. While the raised rivets might be marginally too prominent for the scale, in practice they add an attractive, three-dimensional element to the Wildcat's exterior and will look great under a coat of paint and sympathetic weathering.

NEW INSTRUCTIONS


Interestingly, the instructions have been significantly updated with new and more extensive paint references, plus some assembly sequence changes too. For example, the rudder must now fixed in place right at the end in step fifteen instead of at the beginning in step one, perhaps for ease of handling? Sadly, the 'windscreen' in the 1994 release is now called the 'windshield' (it is an American plane after all) but we must not grumble because Tamiya's kit now comes with some appealing markings options for three very contrasting theatres of operation. As well as the all-new decal sheet, Tamiya provide a sheet of self-adhesive masks which, although needing cutting out from their backing sheet, will considerably ease the painting of the Wildcat/ Martlet's canopy.

TO SUM UP

This release is much more than a simple re-issue. It depicts a whole new version of Grumman's appealingly dumpy fighter and along with the revitalised instructions and fabulous decals, makes it a worthwhile purchase for modellers of iconic WWII Allied combat aircraft.



Effective structural textures/patterns can be seen on the control surfaces






SCALE: 1:48 • MATERIALS: IM, PCM, WS • ITEM NO.40004 Every so often, a kit arrives at Tamiya Model Magazine that truly makes us exclaim 'wow' (out loud sometimes!) maybe because of the boldness of subject choice (ICM's 1:35 CH-54A Tarhe comes to mind), or just the sheer quality of the mouldings and the detail they


carry; the latter is certainly the case with Arma Hobby's new 1:48 Hawker Hurricane Mk.llc and Mk.llc Trop that arrived in the last few weeks. Arma Hobby had already established itself as a serious manufacturer with the 1:72 Hurricane and other subjects and with these 1:48 models they have taken it to a whole new level. As I so often state in TMMI reviews, "the kit comes on three sprues of grey polystyrene" (TMMI passim) but take a close-up look at the fuselage and wing halves - under magnification ideally - and like me, you will be blown away by the level of delicate refinement the mouldings exhibit: it is an major step-up from what is expected from a scale aircraft kit, leaving one to ponder quite how they achieved this level of detail in humble ejection-moulded plastic. Running a fingertip over the wing surfaces, you can feel how subtle the raised and recessed surface detail is and how well it well respond to paint and weathering, so much so I was left itching to start work on the kit, even as my workbench was groaned under the weight of the review kits for this issue. With a model of this calibre there's no general need for photo-etched parts and none are included, but you will need to source your own Sutton Harness, such a distinctive feature of the Hurricane's cockpit: they are represented by decals as standard and are the weakest part of the kit, which is



BRENGUN, CZECH REPUBLIC LETOV Š-16T (TURKEY)

SCALE: 1:72 • MATERIALS: IM, R, PE, WS • ITEM NO.BRP72048 The Letov Š-16 was a Czechoslovakian-made, single-engined, twoseat biplane bomber, designed by Alois Šmolík. The initial prototype flew Prague-Kbely airport in November 1926 and was exhibited

at the Salon de l'Aeronautique in Paris, in December that year. Turkey ordered twelve of the S-16T variant in 1930-31. The type remained in service with the Czechoslovak Air Force until 1936 when it was gradually replaced by more modern aircraft Letov S-328. This is Brengun's fourth iteration of their 1:72 Letov Š-16, first released in 2014 and here presented in the markings of the Turkish Air Force. The first thing that one notices is how large it is! Usually, singleengined biplane models in 1:72 are tiny little things but here we have a wingspan of around 210mm (upper wing) so it must have been an impressive bird to see in flight. The kit parts are moulded in a toffeecoloured polystyrene across two sprues, with resin castings for a new engine and propeller appropriate for this variant to be found in the box. To install the new resin engine cowling, the modeller must chop off the front of each fuselage half using a razor saw, but this isn't as daunting as it sounds and a clear diagram of where to cut is provided in the instructions. This is a shortrun style of model and as such will require plenty of test-fitting and possibly adjusting for it to all come together, so it's not really a beginner's project, but to make up for that extra challenge, we have a very nicely detailed miniature replica of a handsome and esoteric aircraft from the interwar years and when finished to a high standard, it's certain to attract attention in





Arriving on least twenty-two sprues of grey plastic – plus five injection-moulded tyres and a sizeable fret of photo-etched brass – nobody could accuse Gecko Models' 1:35 kit of the Daimler armour car being a simplistic production! Admittedly, a good


number of those sprues are bitsized and carry just wheel hubs, rounds of ammunition and other smaller components, but it is a still an 'impressive boxful of parts' as we so often say and you'll need some quality model-bench-time to complete the project. The Daimler was a successful British armoured car design of the Second World War (that continued in service into the 1950s) that was designed for the armed reconnaissance and liaison roles. It saw action in the North African theatre of operations with the 11th Hussars and Derbyshire Yeomanry and was also deployed to north west Europe; a few examples even reached the South-East Asian theatre. Built by Birmingham Small Arms, it incorporated some of the most advanced design concepts of the time and is considered one of the best British armoured fighting vehicles of the Second World War. Gecko Models have done a marvellous job here and provide the modeller with a full cabin interior that includes driver's station, battery, foot-pedals and final drives, as well full turret internals comprising a radio, ammunition storage and a complete depiction of the QF 2-Pounder main gun. By far the most daunting-looking part of the kit is the suspension and we have read that this is quite challenging to assemble; lots of test fitting will be needed we think. The moulded-in detail is fantastic, augmented by a plethora of photoetched brass parts which will add that all-important touch of extra 'sharpness'. TMMI





ICM's base kit of the Sd.Kfz.251 Ausf.A dates only from 2018, so it's a modern-generation kit of an exceedingly high standard; no


dodgy old moulds repurposed for a new role here. It features some really lovely attention to detail, such as the subtle non-slip pattern on the cabin floor and the open-moulded grille on the engine cover's upper front surface. A full engine is supplied and it can remain (mostly) on show thanks to the separately-moulded access panels. The notoriously fiddly (from a modelling perspective) interleaved suspension is tackled with aplomb, its individual swingarms and numerous, overlapping wheels left off until the later stages of construction to avoid damage during handling. The only 'negative' here is the provision of one-piece, synthetic rubber tracks, although to be fair, they are extremely well detailed and moulded to perfection. It's worth noting that many modellers prefer this type of track and will hesitate to buy a model if individual links are the only option in the box. Also, there are several choices of individuallink Sd.Kfz.251 track available from aftermarket manufacturers, so the modeller can easily choose to buy some to replace the rubber items; not so easy the other way around. This version of the WW2 German halftrack represents a 'krankenpanzerwagen' (ambulance) and so comes with stretchers and what appears to be a water barrel for the interior, along with a sheet of red-cross decals. TMMI




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


MINIART, UKRAINE P-47D-25RE THUNDERBOLT


www.icm.com.ua www.creativemodels.co.uk SCALE: 1:48 • MATERIALS: IM, WS • ITEM NO.48009 You might think Tamiya's sublime, 2002 kit of the Republic P-47D Thunderbolt in 1:48 would universally satisfy the demand by modellers for an accurate, well detailed and easy-to-construct kit of this WW2 USAAF behemoth, but it is over twenty years old now

and calls for ever more detail and complications (clever, enjoyable ones) have multiplied in that time. Enter, then, MiniArt, with their new-tool model of the 'Bubbletop' Thunderbolt, box-fresh for 2023. It's quite the departure for this manufacturer, who are best known (and loved) for their vast catalogue of 1:35 kits of armoured vehicles, figures, accessories and, of course, their still-wonderful vacuum-formed buildings and diorama sets. The Thunderbolt arrives in a large box containing eight sprues of – you guessed it - injection-moulded grey polystyrene with a clear sprue for the canopy plus a sheet of waterslide decals that carries two optional schemes, both for machines of the 8th Air Force, 1944. The box artwork tells us this is a 'Basic Kit' which appears to denote a lack of photo-etched parts, but in reality it's anything but basic. As an example of this, the cockpit is beautifully executed, with a multi-part pilot's seat (moulded in but very well done harnesses) a finely rendered floor (although there is some debate about the accuracy of this part), and individual representations of the throttle, oxygen hose and other small items. The instrument panel is nicely formed and decals are provided for just the dials (a single decal plus individually printed) and a whole decal that covers the panel. We have seen that an 'Advanced Kit' version of the P-47D (with different markings) is on its way - more news on that soon. TMMI





















TAKOM, HONG KONG JAGDPANZER 38(t) HETZER LATE PRODUCTION

The World War Two German Jagdpanzer 38(t) tank-hunter is an evergreen subject for armour modellers and there have been numerous 1:35 kits released of it by Tamiya, Dragon and even Eduard over the years, plus other models in larger and smaller scales. It's still quite a modern-looking design (to this reviewer's eyes at least) and it makes an attractive and tempting prospect for a full-build project, not least because of the complex camouflage applied to certain versions. Takom launched a family of 1:35 'Hetzer' kits in 2023 that includes the early-production type with a full interior (as well the same variant but without the internal parts) with similar approaches for the mid-production and lateproduction kits, the latter reviewed here. Even 'sans innards' the box contains twelve sprues of parts including clear mouldings for the periscopes; a clear hull roof is also to be found on the transparent frame but it is redundant for this non-interior edition. An opaque roof is provided in grey polystyrene, should you worry that the model paint won't adequately cover the see-through moulding. The detail is subtle and restrained and there are some neat touches, such as twopart brackets for the jack which allow it to look much better than if it were a one-part moulding. Just a single piece of photo-etched brass is provided - the engine grille and really, the kit doesn't need any more, although if you were going to town on your Jagdpanzer, the hole-filled tool box (earlier versions only) would look better in PE brass. The tracks are link-and-length and

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ARADO AR234 BLITZ, THE WORLD'S FIRST JET BOMBER


The Arado Ar234 'Blitz' (Lightning) could be described as the world's first purposebuilt jet bomber and it's a fascinating machine. It has puzzled this reviewer that there haven't been more kits of it, with Hasegawa's 1:48 model from 2002 (and subsequent variants and reboxings) probably being the best out there. Fly Model also released a 1:32 model and Dragon and others have released in



1:72, but all quite a while ago. So, when we are building an older kit that might require a little of extra work to bring it up to spec, we will need a good set of references to hand, right? Well, this 2022 title from Classic Publications via Crécy provides that in oodles, in the form of wartime photographs that cover the cockpit interior, bomb bay, fuselage, jet engines and more and much more. Within the 320+, hard-backed pages we find an impressively detailed history of the Blitz, augmented by period images of the people behind the bomber's development, along with reproductions of technical illustrations and stunning, full-page colour profiles by Janusz Swiatlon. Collectively, this books contents offer an insight into the Arado Ar234 that will be hard to beat and as such, it comes highly recommended to all those fascinated by WW2 Luftwaffe subjects and scale modellers alike. Please note, the swastika emblems have been obscured for this review but are present

on the books' cover and inside. TMMI

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
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long with the two 1:20 Porsche 935s re-issued recently, this 1978 kit of the Toyota Celica LB Turbo Gr.5 comes from that golden age of Tamiya releases when we were treated regularly to such racing beasts in scale model form. I was a tender twelve-year old at the time of the kit's original launch and an avid builder of Airfix, Matchbox and Revell 1:72 aircraft models, hanging them from my bedroom ceiling, of course. To me, a 'huge' car kit like this was beyond my means (and ability) so to have it re-released now is a real treat and all the more appealing as it looks like a reasonably quick build with no tricky masking needed: it's blue all over! The model now comes with newly designed slick tyres, Cartograf decals and updated instruction manual to

make it even more modeller-friendly. An amazing-looking car, an absolute Tamiya classic and only around £40. What's not to love? ●

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
EDITOR'S CHOICE

Tamiya Anti-Slip Sticker (0.4mm x 75mm x 150mm, 87227)

My 'choice' this month is a bit of a misnomer as I haven't actually put this product to use yet, but it did strike me as potentially rather useful. It's a 75mm \times 150mm sheet of flexible, rubberised material with a self-adhesive backing and can be cut to shape with a modelling knife or scissors. The suggested uses include non-slip pads for display bases, on steel rulers to stop them moving around when cutting plastic sheet and for making high-grip pads on pliers and tweezers for securely handling small components. I'm certain there are myriad other uses, so I will add it to my modelling inventory and it will be deployed when the need arises!


