TAMIYA 1:24 NISSAN FAIRLADY 240Z STREET-CUSTOM • KIT NO.24367

Tamiya's Nissan Fairlady 240ZG's 'Street-Custom' version is here!

amiya released the 'standard' 1:24 Nissan Fairlady 240ZG (24360) in 2021 and it was a perfect replica of this Japanese cult-classic sports car. Now, three years later, we have the funkier-looking Nissan Fairlady 240Z Street-Custom with cropped nose and front spoiler, sports RS wheels and a host of other enhancements that give the car a cooler appearance. The original car's 2.393cc inline-six SOHC engine and triple carburettors is replicated to perfection and it can be observed once the model is complete thanks to an opening bonnet. The later car's lowered suspension is depicted and new decals and metal transfers are included in the box. Let's take a look at the changes between the two kits, there's quite a few! (Listed below).






















ALPHA MODEL 1:24 MCLAREN PI · KIT NO.AM02-0028

Lesley Eyckerman builds the all-resin 1:24 McLaren P1 hypercar from Alpha Model and gives it the carbon-fibre look with decals by Scale Motorsport



i guys, I'm back with another article for this great magazine - this time it's the McLaren P1 from Alpha Model. I'm a big fan of McLaren, mostly their F1 cars, because am a huge Formula 1 fan and the McLaren P1 represents all of this. It's a McLaren with F1 technology all together in a hypercar! Of the 400 examples of this car and its different variants, only twenty-five are road legal. That's what I like most about this car, a true track machine with the

looks of a street car. This car is a beast and looks amazing to me, that's why I had to build it, when Alpha Model released it and the manufacturer was kind enough to sponsor the model for me to build for TMMI (PICI). The body colour is McLaren Genesis Blue from Number5 (PIC2). The carbon-fibre for the exterior is SK Decals and Scale Motorsport for the interior. All these wonderful products where kindly provided for me, for this article.

When I took a look at this model I

noticed how crisp and clean all the resin parts looked. There aren't a lot of castings, but it does come with five photo-etched frets. The decals are high quality and can you can even make a Senna tribute care of it. Flash or pinholes are non existent on these models. So lets get started!

Because this is a resin model it needs a lot of clean-up. It's not like a plastic kit that is just cleaned with soapy water and a good rinse. No, This is different. I started with sanding all the



parts with 600-grit sanding sponges and test fitted the parts along the way. Then I gave it a good clean with an automotive degreaser called M600 from Motip which is similar to panel-wipe. Then I put the resin parts in an ultrasonic cleaner with an all-purpose cleaner called Dasty and set the parts to clean for twenty minutes at a temperature of forty degrees Celsius, then gave it a good wash with soapy water and a very thorough rinse and leave the parts to air dry.

When all the parts were dry, I mounted them on sticks, clamps and whatever I can use to stick a part on with double sided foam tape. I primed the parts with Tamiya grey primer from the 40ml bottle, that I diluted 50/50 with Mr Color Levelling Thinner and gave all the resin parts a few coats of primer and leave them to dry. All parts besides the body parts where painted with Zero Paints Gloss and Gloss black to receive their metal and interior colours or carbon decals later on.

BODYSHELL

The body was also primed with Tamiya grey primer and sanded it to a smooth finish (PIC 3). Before I applied the colour I sprayed all parts with Mr Surfacer 1500 Black and left it to dry (PIC 4). I then gave it a few light coats of McLaren Genesis Blue from Number5 (PIC 5) and gave it a thin clear coat (PIC 6) before applying SK Decals mirror carbon decals.

Because the real car has a lot of carbon-fibre on it, I wanted to do the same thing with the model. The car has a lot of configurations and I went for the most common. You can pick for a fully painted one, which seemed boring to me, so I went with a full carbon detailed version to make it more visually interesting. Not that I

don't like the fully painted one, but it would have been a short article and liked the carbon version more! I started with making templates with masking tape for the interior and floor (PICS 7, 8, 9). After that the interior was painted with Carbon Ceramic Grey and Charcoal Textured paint by Zero Paints for the cabin.

Then I applied the carbon-fibre decals from Scale Motorsport and worked my way up to the door-panels, dash, seats and steering wheel. I used the same for the chassis and gave it a few coats of Zero Paints 1K matt clear to seal them in which worked great. Then I started with the front splitter and worked my way up to the body with SK Decals Mirror carbon. I used a different brand for this, because

they already make the mirror decals with the V in the middle, which makes things a lot easier for me (PIC IO). I used some UMP Extra Strong setting solution to laid down the decals with some heat from my heat gun. Then it was time for a big clean up and applied two thick coats of 2K clear from Number5 and left it to dry for a few days (PIC II).

POLISHING AND PAINT REPAIR

After applying the 2K clear I noticed that there was some dust in the finish. So started wet sanding with 3,000 and 6,000-grit 3M Trizact and started polishing using Number5 medium polishing compound (PIC 12). The result was pretty amazing, but I saw to my surprise I sanded through the clear and paint on the door from the passenger side. So masked off the piece in a way that nobody could see it had been repainted. I gave it a few light coats of McLaren Genesis Blue and finished it with two coats of 2k clear from Number5 and was amazed by the finish. I didn't need to polish anymore.















With the blue portions of the body masked off, the carbon-fibre decalled areas could received their satin finish

INTERIOR ASSEMBLY


The assembly of the interior was fairly easy. I glued in the partition that separates the engine from the interior and glued in the mid console between the seats. The seats where glued in place and added the supplied seatbelts and painted PE parts for the seats (PIC 15). Then I started on the dash, which was pretty straightforward (PICS 16, 17). I glued in the radiator fans and steering console, applied the decals for the knobs and gauges and glued the shifter and steering wheel into place.

FINAL ASSEMBLY

With the interior finished I started to work on the body again. I painted the headliner in the body with a mixture of Vallejo Black and German Grey, to replicate the charcoal effect like the seats. Glued the rear view mirror into place together with the engine cover. Then I glued the dash into the body and fitted in the door-panels and interior tub together with the centre console. This fitted perfectly so removed it all and glued everything into place without any issues. Then I started on the brake assembly. Nothing major, but still worth to dry fit first. I made them into sub-assemblies and

glued them into the body (PIC 19). Then it was time for the fun part of the build, gluing in the clear parts.

As you may know, these are made out of pre-cut clear plastic sheet and are covered with a clear film on both sides. When you take them out of the sheet you automatically remove the first backing sheet. As a reminder I stuck a piece of masking tape on the outside, so I wouldn't accidentally glue in the wrong side. I glued them all in place using Bob Smith Industries Super Gold+ and some of their kicker to speed up the process. Once these were all into place I started installing the front and rear grills before I could glue in the front and rear lights.

The front lights fitted well, but the rear lights were out of shape, so I corrected them using some heat from my heat gun then fitted them to the body. Luckily it was just a few bends. I glued them into place with Tamiya Craft Bond and left them to dry. This gave me time to fit the wheel and tyres with UHU 2k glue and aligned them so

they where all lined up correctly. After this was done, I gave the body a good clean with Tamiya Modeling Wax and installed the dry-fitted rear wing (PICS 20, 21, 22) and side mirrors (PIC 23). I added some mesh parts from the PE fret and finished the build with fitting the PE windshield wiper.

FINAL THOUGHTS

I really enjoyed this build, but was for me the most difficult Alpha Model kit so far. I like the fact that it's pretty straightforward with no fitting issues. Everything is well designed and they always manage to produce a great model, where a modeller can go nuts on. The products that I used for this build were excellent - the coverage of Number 5 paints was amazing. The Scale Motorsport CF decals were great to work with, as were the ones from SK decals. It's great to know these days that these products are available to us and can be used to build a nice model. See you next time!

MACHINE GUNS AT THE READY!

figure sets have undergone a massive improvement in quality, from their poses to the fine details and in some cases they rival resin figures, and they are also extremely good value for money. Tamiya's latest two sets both depict World War Two German army figures from the mid-war period, which means they will be suitable to go with the widest range of tanks and soft-skins in a diorama setting.

Tamiya's original 1:35 'German Machine Gun Troops' Military Miniatures Series figure set (35038) was released in 1974 and has been a popular item for fifty years, so the new, similarly-entitled set 'German Machine Gun Team' (35386) is very a welcome indeed. It's a five-man set this time, with a pair of reclined MG34 gunners, kneeling MG42 and MP40 gunners and a walking figure carrying ammunition cans. A small section of brick wall is also supplied,

on which the MG42 gunner rests his gun. The set comes on four sprues of grey, injection-moulded polystyrene, with small sheet of waterslide decals for uniform insignia.

The detail is fantastic and the highlight is the belt of ammunition being fed into the MG34. It's difficult to mould something this thin in traditional plastic, and Tamiya's designers have done a marvellous job of it. Full-build feature coming soon to TMMI. •




ZUNDAPP

An all new KS600 motorcycle and sidecar ride again

he (Zündapp) KS600 is a classic World War Two German motorcycle design that has becoming enduringly popular as a scale-modelling subject and Tamiya have created an all-new 1:35 miniature replica of this machine, plus sidecar, crew and foot-soldier in this set for 2024. The kit box contains two sprues of dark grey, injection-moulded polystyrene for the bike and sidecar, plus another in lighter grey for the figures, along with a decal sheet of German Army and Air Force markings, plus instrument panel for the KS600. Sadly, there are no extra decals for uniform insignia as supplied with the Machine Gun Team reviewed here, but to make up for that, Tamiya have provided a signpost and base, with the signs themselves printed in colour on the side of the box lid. Trim them out,

glue in place, give them a coat of matt varnish and they'll look pretty good. The limiting factor with injection-




moulded motorcycle kits (in smaller scales) will always be the wheel spokes, and Tamiya has done a decent job of replicating them as finely as possible, without making them too delicate to work with. They are, however, a bit on the thick side and would look a lot better if replaced with 3D-printed parts, or perhaps photo-etched brass. Other than that, this is a superb new kit with top quality figures and superb detail on the motorcycle and sidecar.

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Kev Smith builds, paints and weathers the Das Werk 1:16 Sd.Kfz.25 I/D in his own, inimitable way

n late 1943, the design of the Sd.Kfz. 251 was improved again as the Ausf D was introduced. The body was welded and simplified to speed up production. The two large air intakes were removed and the rear of the hull was completely reshaped. The over-complex clamshell doors were swapped in favour of flat rear amour plate, set at an angle, in which two simple flat hinged doors were mounted. Integral stowage bins replaced the bolt on original boxes that sat on top of the track guards.

The armament of the Sd.Kfz.251 also changed, to a pair of 7.92mm MG42s that replaced the previously used MG34s. Inside the compartment, layout was much the same as it had been in the Ausf.C, however wood replaced the leather bench seats. The Sd.Kfz.251 continued to be produced throughout the war, modifications and conversions were pressed into service to meet the requirement for anti-tank and fire support platforms. After WW2 the vehicle lived on in Czechoslovakian service (OT-810) with a fully enclosed body and powered

The ever-increasing range of 1:16 models has taken in the Sd.Kfz.251 Ausf.D and the kit reviewed here is the offering released by Das Werk: this workhorse of the German army definitely got but I wasn't expecting it to be that big! After browsing through the contents with a cup of tea, the excitement began to grow, as did the

by a diesel power-pack.

apprehension of building such a big kit. I thought the best way of tackling the project was to treat each component or sub-assembly as a model in its own right, which included the pioneer tools and even the crew seats. It would slow down the build considerably, but, you get out of modelling what you put in.

The model-build started with the chassis tub, which includes the vehicle's battery, air and fuel tanks that are assembled over a number of stages. The suspension is designed to be workable, the torsion bars fitting through the elliptical tubes that strengthen the tub and attached to the frame with a dab of glue. Once I started, it became apparent that to speed up the construction, I could jump forward a couple of steps and put together the fuel and air tanks at the same time.

I was looking forward to painting and weathering the red primer as I don't use this finish as much as I would like. To start, the entire tub and sub-assemblies were undercoated with Tamiya XF-1 Flat Black, over which Mission Models Red Oxide was laid down and I have to say this does achieve a striking effect (PIC 1). The floor of the tub was weathered with a dusting of pigments, with spilt oil effects applied after using (160). When it came to with Tamiya Black, then drybrushed with Mr Color simple but effective way of achieving an authenticlooking finish (PIC 2).

It was around about now that information came to light that the bump-stops for the swing arms on the D variant are wrong and the kit features the earlier configuration for '251s. This was easily corrected by the third, fourth, and fifth bump-stops omitted and the location areas filled. Not sure if this will be visible on the finished model, but it needs to be done if an accurate model is to be built (PIC 3).

HIDDEN AREAS

The reason I weathered the tub floor before cementing the sub-assemblies in positions because is no easy access to the floor once these are in place. Once the final drive, fuel tank, and air cylinders were in position the missing air, fuel line and battery wires were fitted. It was just a case then of weathering these with pigments and spilt oil in the same way as the chassis floor. The majority of the '251's build-time is dedicated to the lower hull and it's a real shame that much of what you see on these pages won't be seen again. Das Werk has given the modeller the choice of a number of panels that can be removed, but in reality, this isn't practical as the panels are tucked away under the armoured roof and would definitely invite damage if they were to be removed repeatedly. I did however leave the gearbox cover unglued and I did cut out the fuel tank cover. Alternatively, most of internal steps can be bypassed and be built from the floor up. This would definitely save a lot of time, but where is the fun in that? (PIC 4).

Keeping with the theme of treating each sub-assembly as a stand-alone, the front axle was built up as per the instructions. After an undercoat of Tamiya XF-1 Flat Black with a little X-9 Brown mixed in, Tamiya XF-88 Dark Yellow 2 was misted over the top to bring out the detail in the spring. Weathering consisted of light chipping with a sponge plus fine scratches, using a sharp blade to carefully reveal the black/brown undercoat (PIC 5).


With the tub interior painted and weathered


and the axle waiting to be attached, it was time to turn my attention to the underside of the hull. The same undercoat mix of brown and black was applied first, then followed with a coat of hairspray (PIC 6). I tend to decant the hairspray into an airbrush so I can control the application of this medium, as I find spraying straight from the can will result in the hairspray being applied too thick, which can lead to too much top coat being removed, leaving large unrealistic patches. This was then followed by a coat of Tamiya XF-88. After being left for around twenty minutes I removed patches of the XF-88 using warm water and with a combination of an old brush and cocktail stick to inflict scratches. A coat of matt varnish followed to protect the weathering up to this point. When fully cured, another lighter coat of hairspray was again airbrushed onto the model, this time Tamiya XF-57. Finally, oil spills and stains followed using a mixture of Abteilung 502 Engine Grease oil paint and black pigment and applied to logical areas (PIC 7).

POWERPLANT

The engine is a model in its own right and the first parts to be tackled were the fans and radiator, both painted and weathered accordingly. The basic engine block was assembled to the point that the plumbing needed to be fitted (PIC 8). The engine was painted in the same base colour of black and brown mix that I had been using up to this point. Over this, a mix of Mig Productions Brick Dust and Gulf War Sand pigments with Abteilung 502 Industrial Earth oil paint (090). The addition of the 090 thickens up the pigments so I was able to stipple the mix onto the lower areas of the engine block to replicate the build-up of dried oil and dust as I did in earlier stages. The same technique was employed on other areas of the engine such as the exhaust (PIC 9). Attention now turned to the leather cushions on the stowage bins (PIC 10).

The firewall was next on the list. From the reference


















photos I had, I could observe wiring coming from the rear of the driver's instruments and various boxes, but what I couldn't see was where they went. As a compromise, I cut the wires long enough so they could be tucked away from sight. I moved away from the elastic, in favour of black plastic-coated wire for this task (PICS 11, 12, 13).


Another area that I decided to address was the radio equipment. AFV Modeller's 3D-printed set provides the complete Fusprech F radio installation for the '251 and includes the correct connectors and plugs. A neat, colour-coded guide is provided for the correct


cable layout which was followed with thin elastic to replicate the wiring. The set also includes two antenna

• WE'RE GETTING THERE!

The build was gathering pace now. With the internal walls and firewall now painted and weathered, it was time to turn my attention to the fighting compartment floor. This area is one of the most visible of the entire model, so I felt the space should be as interesting as possible. I began with a shadow coat of XF-1 Flat Black, with a mottled over-spray of XF-92 Yellow Brown DAK 1941. The nicely-rendered floor tread plate was picked out with a soft leaded pencil to suggest the wear and tear of the crew movements and later, fine dirt would be employed to add further interest. I've been using real dirt on my models/dioramas for some time now and is a great way to weather AFV models (PICS 16, 17).

The seating arrangements were the final steps to be taken care of before I could close the model up. AFV Modeller's corrected seats replaced the kit parts, which are basic in detail. When it came to painting the padding, I used a wet mix of AK 11318 Dunkelgelb and 11436 Canvas Tone, the two colours applied by brush. Finally, stains were applied to the material using thinned Abt 090 Industrial Earth oils (PICS 18, 19).


ONTO THE OUTSIDE

With the internal area of the fighting compartment completed, it was time to make a start on the exterior of the '251. This is the stage that held the most trepidation for me: I knew the finish I was looking for, but could I translate that convincingly to the large surface of a 1:16 model? Before I could lay any paint down there were a couple of areas that I felt needed to be addressed. I wanted to inflict a little 'battle damage' to the vehicle and I toyed with the idea of 'damaging' some of the stowage bins that run down the side of the hull, but in the end settled with removing part of the front right mudguard. To finish this area the missing support bracket on the remaining section of mudguard was cut from plastic card and it was then a case of drilling out the holes for the missing bolts (PIC 20).





















The choice of undercoat has a huge effect on the top coat, especially when using lighter paints for the finishing layers. I normally tend to go for earthy undercoats for Dunkelgelb finishes, so for this model I decided to go with a red primer undercoat, my thinking being that a model of this scale could take the dark primer coat without effecting the Dunkelgelb layers that can happen in 1:35. To start, I laid down a coat of Tamiya X-9 Brown (PIC 21). Keeping to the same system as the interior, I used an AK Interactive stencil to airbrush on a mottled coat of XF-60, then over the top another a mottled coat of XF-88 (PIC 22). The Olivgrun and Rotbraun colours both came from the AK Interactive 3rd Generation range. Heavily thinned with 3Gen thinner, the disruptive pattern was sprayed in light coats, building them up slowly with a couple of passes with the airbrush, keeping the pattern as subtle as possible (PIC 23).

The aftermarket hasn't caught up (yet) with the popularity of 1:16 releases and this is especially true when it comes to decals. I wanted to build a '251/1 Ausf.D of the Panzergrenadier-Lehr-Regiment 901. Panzer-Lehr-Division and I had

no alternative but to hand-paint the unit and tactical symbols, referring to a set of Star Decals intended for 1:35 models for Panzer Lehr '251s (PIC 24).



I was preparing to start on the tracks when a package arrived in the post. The guys at AFV Modeller had kindly sent me their new 3D printed tracks and road wheels this also included the drive sprockets to compliment the tracks. I have to say that the Das Werk tracks are more than adequate to use from the box, but the injection moulding process has its limitations and it is impossible to recreate all the hollow sections on the tack links in plastic where the 3D process can achieve

this detail easily. The resin tracks fitted together easily and quickly and all that's required was a little dab of superglue on the end of the track pins (PIC 25).

The tracks were initially airbrushed with XF-1 Black over which XF-84 Dark Iron was airbrushed. After being left to dry overnight I then set about weathering them. Keeping with the

dusty finish I didn't want to clog up the links with packed mud and grass, so I opted instead for gentle colour-washes of AK11115 Light Earth and AK11436 Canvas Tone. To break up the overall look of the black track pads I picked out individual pads in different tones of grey using both the AK paints mixed with AK 11027 Rubber Black (PIC 26). •

○ A LITTLE MUSIC?

I always try to give my models a lived-in feel to them, and of course the best way to do this is to add stowage. Amongst the usual jerrycans and ammo boxes I wanted to add some personal possessions to the '251. Whilst researching the build I came across a photo of troops sitting around a gramophone. Ideal, I thought! But finding one proved hard in 1:16... My friend Mike Norris came to the rescue when he volunteered his 3D printing skills. Not only did he send the gramophone, a Panzerschreck was included too (PICS 27, 28).

All I needed to do was find a home for the records. I found images of some era-appropriate albums online, reduced them to scale, then printed them. I also added an internal folder in the gramophone's lid to keep the records in. A pin-up poster was stuck to the inside of the gun-shield, cut from a set intended for HO-OO train layouts.

It was a case then of taking care of the accessories to populate the crew area. I decided to paint some of the ammo boxes in the tri-colour scheme to add a visual interest after finding examples online (PIC 29). The

kit's weapons are a weak area and as I felt that these are a focal point, I opted to upgrade mine with sets from the AFV Modeller range, made even more impressive with the flexible ammo belt to compliment the weapons (PIC 30).

I did have to rethink my approach to the build, down to the pure size of the model, compared to my usual 1:35 subjects and it was a challenge to accommodate and man-handle the model around my workbench, not to mention the photography. Having said that, this was a project I thoroughly enjoyed and would gladly tackle another. •

The main, lower parts of the fuel tanks are moulded in with the chassis, to which upper 'lids' are added. A little filler was needed around the joint



Some styrene strip and short pieces of copper wire were used to beef-up the fuel tanks' straps. Discs were added to enhance the filler caps and various PE brass bolts were placed on the upper surfaces, following references, although much of this can't be seen on the finished model!



Towing loops were fitted to the read ends of the chassis members, formed from polystyrene rod


The completed chassis with its minor detail-additions on show. The steering is not moveable as standard, but with some extremely careful bending, the front wheels were turned slightly to the left, to add a little animation to the finished model

I decided to add a few minor details using basic materials from my 'box of bits'...




The kit's wheels/tyres are nicely detailed. Flat spots were filed into the contact points to





Although largely hidden when the body is mated to the chassis, the four big ejector-pin marks under the wings just had to be filled and sanded

More noticeable, if one inverts the model, are the series of ejector-pin marks that cover the body's undersurface. They are shallow thankfully, and can be sanded off. Just one left to go here!

The model was airbrushed in sub-assemblies, using my own mixture of olive drab made from Tamiya Lacquer Paint colours. The red cross decals went on perfectly but don't forget to paint the two ventilators on the roof (I forgot) or you'll be in for some next to impossible masking with the decal in position... Colour-washes were applied using Tamiya's superb Panel Line Accent Colors (not easily available everywhere) and the dust on the lower surfaces was airbrushed using mixes of Humbrol Enamels which can be adjusted after application with a white-spiritdampened paint brush.



To allow the cabin's internal window to be easily cemented later on, the frame was masked off with tape to keep it clear of paint



The rear door hinges are quite prominent and on the real vehicle, their fixing bolts are very noticeable, so tiny discs of pewter foil were made with a punch-and-die set and affixed with CA glue

A SUITABLE DISPLAY BASE?


Because of the model's small size, I chose to construct a simple vignette to display it on and to put it into context. It was also done to emphasise that the K2/Y ambulances weren't just used on British air bases, but on the combat front line too, which is why I used German fuel drums and jerrycans to suggest a setting of Normandy, following the June 6th 1944 D-Day Landings.

The base was made from a small (and cheap) photo-frame, to which I added a raised centre section from wood strip. The groundwork was shaped from Tamiya's recently released 'Diorama Texture Clay' which is almost rubbery in consistency and quite odd to handle, but it worked perfectly for this context. I sprayed the frame dark green from a Halfords aerosol (Camouflage Spray Green - Ultra Matt) to make a change from the



The driver's foot pedals are a little simplistic as standard, so larger ones were made from plastic card. If you do this, make sure to reduce the height of the moulded-in pedals by the thickness of the new parts, or the driver won't sit in his seat properly



The headlights were given power cables and later, the lenses were replaced with foil-backed, clear resin items

Spencer Pollard works wonders with Eduard's jewel-like Bf109G-5 in 1:72

f you were to spend any time with me, it would not be long before conversation turned to my favourite kits and my favourite scale to model in. Though I often build kits in larger scales, mostly notably 1:48, if pushed (albeit not very far!) my preference is always 1:72. genuinely love modelling in that scale and whenever I attend a model how, the 1:72 builds are the ones that capture my imagination. It's just the way it is. When Marcus contacted me to suggest I downsize for while in order to build Eduard's latest Bf109G, I leapt at the chance. Having built several 1:48 Gustavs from Eduard, I knew that


I was in for a treat and so that proved to be. Their small-scale offerings are just as impressive as their larger brethren and that laid the foundation for an engaging build. And then I decided to push things just a little

further... From the box, the Eduard Bf109G is a superb kit that offers plenty of fine detail. As a Profipack (and in this case a dual boxing...) the kit includes plastic parts, finely etched details and a set of canopy masks, the latter dealing with the protection of those delicate glazed panels that we all love, so much! Across the board, detail is exquisite. The most striking aspect of Eduard' recent kits is their

surface detail, all engraved panel lines, with rows of delicately incised rivets. You would be forgiven for thinking that that is only apparent in their larger kits: not so. The 1:72 releases are every bit as detailed, as could be seen within this new '109 and their earlier family of Spitfires. Smaller features fare just as well, the cockpit interior being reassuringly complete especially once decorated with those delicate brass parts - despite its diminutive size. Similar points can be made regarding the undercarriage, the separate control surfaces and the frankly astonishing number of variant specific details that pepper the sprues,

ready to fill your spares box once construction of your G-5 or -6, is complete.

All things considered, I could have built the kit from the box and created a very neat little model, but decided very early on that I would create something a little more detailed. Marcus had already sent over a collection of additional parts created for this kit by Eduard, so those could be used. I then discovered that a bespoke PRINT engine was also available, so ordered that as well. I now had a complete collection of parts that I could use to build the model that you see here and will read about, over the next few pages or so. •



• FORWARD PLANNING

Though I will take you through the construction and painting of this model using captioned images, I thought it would be useful before we begin, to discuss the planning that needs to go into a project such as this. Even when building a kit from the box I like to carry out some initial planning, but as I was adding a lot of detail to this one, that seemed to be almost mandatory!

First things, first: read the instructions for the basic kit and then take a look at the add-ons to see what would be needed in terms of corrective surgery. By far, the most work was around the nose. Not only would I have to construct and paint the complex engine, I would have to remove the closed cowling panels from the fuselage halves and then modify the inner wing, gear bays and undercarriage legs. All of this is explicitly laid out in the PRINT engine set, but it does need some care and attention. Removing the unwanted material is straightforward. All of the cuts are along

natural panel lines, so you need to do no more than cut close to them and then trim and file away material until the new parts fit. This will need to be done before you do anything else, the chopped-up fuselage and wings being set aside ready for construction to begin in earnest.


The next stop on your planning journey, is painting, not the exterior panels (though that is important as well..) but those additional parts - and this is where planning really comes to the fore. Spending time with the instructions suggested




One of the additional sets I used was this radio compartment for the rear fuselage. These are 3D printed parts that fit perfectly in place

Initial assembly of the stunning PRINT engine. Modern printing technology has allowed incredibly fine detail to be incorporated into a relatively small number of parts. Assembly might be relatively easy, additional piping and then painting, not so much! Absolute care needs to be taken when removing waste material, the individual parts being tiny and incredibly delicate

that I would be able to assemble the airframe in sections (wings, fuselage, tailplanes) and then paint them as individual parts, thus cutting down on some fiddly masking. The new engine, complete with all of its cowling panels could also be assembled as a complete 'pod' that could be fixed in place during final assembly.

Again, that would mean painting could be carried out away from the rest of the model, which is something I am more than happy to do when I can! All of this once combined created a list of sub-assemblies that I could build, paint and decal and then bring together during final assembly. I love it when a plan comes together!

I took a break from the changes to the airframe to paint a few of the smaller parts. These were attached to a small piece of foam-board with Blue-Tack and double-sided tape, before being airbrushed in acrylics




Painting began with the internal faces of all of the separate panels. These were base-coated with Gunze RLM 02 Grau, washed with Raw Umber oil paint and then highlighted with Vallejo Green Grey, lightened with Panzer Aces Russian Highlight



The interior of the cockpit was base-coated with Tamiya German Grey and then highlighted with a cloudy overspray of Medium Sea Grey. Details were picked out with Vallejo acrylics

The yellow fuel pipe is a finely-moulded, clear part, that breaks with almost zero provocation! Once eventually in place, it was base-coated with flat white and then flat yellow. Detail was brought out with a thin layer of Raw Umber oil paint, thinned with Distilled Turpentine






Before airbrushing the wings in their overall RLM 76 Lichtblau finish, the undercarriage and radiator bays were airbrushed with Mr. Hobby RLM 02 Grau. These would be subsequently masked using Silly Putty, ready for the external finish to be sprayed in place




All surfaces around the model's various open bays, cockpit, wheel, radiator and radio, were sprayed with RLM 76. No more masking of these areas would be needed leading up to the completion of the model




As mentioned earlier, the radio bay features plenty of delicate detail that you assemble and paint. It's just a shame that almost none of this is visible inside the completed model!




The RLM 02 bays contrast nicely with the surrounding RLM 76 panels. Here you can see how much of the wing was painted before fixing it under the fuselage. Fit is so good that you can happily keep all of these large components separate during painting and decalling




The fuselage is now ready to be completed. In order to tighten the fit between the two fuselage halves (remembering all the while not to smooth out the longitudinal seams, upper and lower, as they were present on the real aircraft) I left out the small panel that you seen in this shot. The cockpit, incidentally, can be fixed in place after the fuselage has been assembled and painted



A quick test-fit of the fuselage, wings and that wonderful engine. A little adjustment would be needed before the fit between the engine bulkhead and the forward edge of the fuselage was as tight as possible







The application of the decals was approached with some trepidation, having had issues with Eduard's recent decal releases. In this case I applied them all using Micro Sol and Set and then sat back and waited for them to dry. My chosen scheme was a Bf109G-5/U2, WNr. 27112, flown by Major Walther Dahl, CO of III./JG 3, Bad Wörishofen, Germany, during December of 1943. This was an attractive choice thanks to that overall RLM 76 finish which was very unusual amongst the mottled and camouflaged aircraft, from that period in the war




Here is one of the underwing crosses, the first that I applied. It appears to have settled down nicely without additional help...





...and here is an upper-wing cross after a layer of Microset. Note how well the decal has laid down over the surface detail



Though there has been talk concerning Eduard's upper layer of film and how it can be peeled away, I left it alone. Here, you can see the how the decals look once applied in a traditional way and then oversprayed with a layer of VMS Satin. I'd call that a success!







The undercarriage and drop-tank are simple details that look great once in place. Wheels were replaced with a set of Eduard's superb resin parts, their heightened detail being seen as a worthwhile investment. Note the stencilling on the drop tank and the gondolas that will be finished of with metal gun barrels



Having completed the cockpit, I decided to add a little more interest by having one of the seat straps hang over the cockpit sill, hence it not being seen in this shot!


○ FINAL THOUGHTS

Having seen a number of these kits built up, I was intrigued to see what they looked like close up and how they would go together for my own collection. When they arrived, it soon became apparent that I was in for a treat, because even from the box I would be rewarded with a lovely little model for my efforts. Adding the extra detail though, was the icing on the cake. When you combine the basic kit with the upgrades seen in this feature, you end up with an incredibly-detailed model that perfectly captures the look and feel of this magnificent aircraft to a tee.

Eduard's range of '109s have always been impressive, their 1:48 kits being an absolute joy. Seeing them repeat that trick in 1:72 not only proved that they are as comfortable in smaller scales as they are larger, it built excitement for future releases such as the P-51 that we will see, shortly.

A fabulous project all told and one that I hope you enjoy reading about, as much as I enjoyed putting it together!


















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
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TAMIYA, JAPAN **TOYOTA SOARER 2000VR-TURBO**

SCALE: 1:24 • MATERIALS: IM, SVT, WS • ITEM NO.24365 Tamiya's Toyota Soarer 2000VR-Turbo – originally released as kit No.24019 into the 1:24 Sports Car Series in 1981 – has found its way back into the re-release schedule, albeit in non-motorised form this time. The real Soarer made its debut in February 1981 too, as Toyota's first 'personal luxury car'. This two-door, hardtop

coupé featured a long nose with short rear deck and sported a highperformance 145hp, inline-six engine, plus a suite of the latest automobile technology for the interior. It's not a bad-looking car in a retro way and as Tamiya's car kits have always been slickly designed, it's a welcome return. The finished model measures 192mm length, 75mm in width and 56mm in height. It's a 'curbside' or engineless kit, and the sliding sun roof - you can choose between the steel type or glass type - can be opened and closed on the model, a neat feature. Another appealing touch is the inclusion of a driver figure, although he is wearing fireproof racing overalls and a fivepoint harness, which seems a little odd for a luxury car, even if it is a performance version. Keeping things firmly in the early 1980s are the decals for the seats' central panels, which are printed in horizontal stripes of brown and beige, to be applied to the seats after they have been sprayed with Tamiya Lacquer Paint LP-75 Buff (more beige). You can feel that velour from here! Despite the lack of an engine, the underside of the model is nicely detailed with suspension parts and exhaust. This kit is a cool re-release for those modellers who might have missed it in the past. It's modestly priced and will make a pleasing, quick-build project for the


ARMA HOBBY, POLAND **HURRICANE MK.IIC JUBILEE**

here before in TMMI but it's worth talking about them again because they are just so superb: a full-build feature on at least one of them will be appearing as soon as we can get one built. This time, we have received the Mk.IIc 'Jubilee' edition, so named to celebrate Arma Hobby's tenth anniversary as a model kit manufacturer. And what a way to celebrate! The three stunning sprues of grey injection-

moulded polystyrene (and one in clear, naturally) are joined in the box by a 3D-printed pilot's seat X2 (one seat plus a spare?), exhaust outlets in two styles plus eight Hispano Mk.I 20mm cannon barrels, two each of two different designs. The 3D parts bring an even more impressive touch of sharpness to the party – as if the kit wasn't crisply detailed enough already - and will really contribute to the refinement of the finished model, the prominent cannon barrels in particular. Arma Hobby also provide the modeller with a sheet of pre-cut wheel and canopy masks, the latter a very welcome inclusion thanks to the multi-panelled design of Sir Sydney Camm's most famous aeronautical achievement. Three decal options are offered, all for UK-based Hurricanes, two of which are camouflaged in green/grey and one in overall black distemper: A: Hurricane Mk.IIc BE500/LK-A. 87 Squadron RAF, Tangmere airfield. Pilots 5/Ldr D.G.. Smallwood i F/L AH Thom B: Hurricane Mk.IIc Z3081/FT-V 'Baron Dhanis'. 43 Squadron RAF, Tangmere airfield. Pilot 5/Ldr D ARG Le Roy du Viver (Belgium)


You may be familiar with Brach Model, as we have reviewed this Italian company's products before in Tamiya Model Magazine and years back we published a full-build article of the original release of the kit reviewed here, the snappily-titled 'Leichter Reihenwerfer (16 Rohre) Auf Somua MCG S307(f)', or roughly translated to English,

'Light, in-line launcher, sixteen tubes', on the French Somua chassis. Either the prototype and initial-production vehicle can be made from the kit, although the differences are subtle, seemingly limited to the design of the sighting frame and control wheel (?) on the rear deck. This release has been revised from the first batch, now coming with resin launch-tubes, where they were metal originally, cast in with their support frames. The steel rods that link the tubes were also cast integrally but are now separate, which must help with the manufacturing process. Proprietor Luciano Brach is one of the most accomplished creators of resin model kits and he uses the traditional method of master-model and mould, into which polyurethane resin is poured. The components are immaculate and from our aforementioned experience building this model (Military Illustrated Modeller Issue 10, February 2012) the parts fitted together perfectly. Being formed this way also means there is no evidence of the dreaded 'build lines' often seen on 3D-printed parts, a manufacturing phenomenon that is still 3D's Achilles heal, in some cases at least. This kit is stunningly well detailed from top to bottom, a particular highlight being the Somua's distinctive 'rubber' (on the real thing) tracks that are reproduced here to perfection. www.eduard.com www.creativemodels.co.uk SCALE: 1:48 • MATERIALS: IM, PE, WS • ITEM NO.82138 Eduard's newer 1:48 Focke-Wulf Fw190 kits are superb little works of art that are covered with fine surface detail over the airframe exterior and come with an impressive cockpit. Naturally, the modeller can choose to replace the whole thing with one of Eduard's amazing resin replacement cockpits, but in reality, the standard parts are excellent and more than adequate to achieve a good-looking result. The latest Fw190 version to arrive at TMMI for review is the 'A-7, the up-gunned variant with many improvements, too numerous to list here. The kit comes moulded across five sprues of Eduard's familiar blue-grey polystyrene, plus clear canopy parts. In this 'ProfiPACK' edition, we also get a sheet of pre-coloured photo-etched parts that includes cockpit sideconsoles, instrument panel, seat harnesses, rudder pedals, exterior appliqué armour (for specific machines) and other delicate detail components. The all-essential, pre-cut canopy masks are also provided to make the painting of the canopy frame significantly

easier. Six markings-options are provided as follows:

A:WNr.431007, Major Heinz Bär, CO II./JGI Störmede, Germany, April, 1944 B: Hptm. Rolf Hermichen, CO 1./JG11, Rotenburg, Germany, March 1944 C: Oblt. Otto Kittel, CO 3./JG54, Riga-Skulte, Latvia, August, 1944 D: 6./JG300, Holzkirchen, Germany, July, 1944

E: Fw. Klaus Dietrich, Führerjägerstaffel, Rastenburg, Germany, August, 1944 F: WNr. 642962, Major Hans-Gunther von Kornatzki, CO Sturmstaffel I, Dortmund/Salzwedel, Germany, early 1944







While it is true that many of Hitler's allies in WW2 proved to be less effective on the battlefield than the German forces, nevertheless these allies made a great contribution and sacrificed much blood to further the aims if the German leader. There were volunteers from many nations who sympathised with the Nazi aspirations, but specific national contributions came from Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Finland, Hungary, Italy, Romania, Slovakia, Spain and Ukraine.

Each of these contributions is examined in this 112-page book, with brief text and a collection of photographs to illustrate the

armoured vehicles and the appearance of the troops. The bravery and effort of soldiers from each nation are recognised, but so is the lack of modern weapons and the difficulties experienced in opposing Soviet forces without adequate means. This book does much to raise awareness of the different nations, their equipment and their actions on the Eastern Front. Many of the photos have been seen before in print, but often without recognition of which nationality of troops is shown. The lack of industry – and in particular armaments industry – in many of these nations would prove to be a huge factor in the limited effectiveness

of nations that lacked the equipment to fight on equal terms. A much needed book on a neglected subject, which may encourage modellers to consider Hungarian or Romanian subjects, for example. The book gives due recognition to the nine nations that supported Hitler militarily, but understandably, many of the photos have been seen before in print. **CLS**





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
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








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

It may only be a small book but it is packed with colour images that show the jaw-dropping detailwork undertaken by the author and it is inspirational stuff. Very highly recommended.









Marcus Nicholls has built Tamiya's all-new 1:35 kit of the Leopard 2A7V main battle tank

he big news from Tamiya at this year's Nuremberg Toy Fair was the announcement of an all-new 1:35 kit of the Leopard 2A7V main battle tank in the Military Miniatures Series. It's important to note that this is a 100% new tooling which uses no parts at all from the 2003-issued Leopard 2A6 (35242). All

the changes one would expect to see on a 2A7V are depicted in sharp detail and the new kit comes with photo-etched parts for the turret stowage bins and other items.

The tracks are new too, taking the form of upper and lower runs moulded in two halves, with articulated individual links for the drive sprockets and idlers. A pair of crew figures are provided and they can be

fitted with helmets or berets according to the modeller's preference. An aluminium main gun barrel is available for this kit (for separate purchase) and as nice as it is, the kit-supplied item is superbly detailed, one-piece moulding that is more than adequate for the job. In the new model's box, Tamiya provides a sheet of photo-etched steel

parts, the perfect material to replicate the real stowage bins. The model includes a pair of two-part formers or 'presses', to squeeze the metal parts into the correct shape, a really good idea.

The Leopard was painted in the standard NATO three-colour camouflage scheme using Tamiya's LP-60 NATO Black, XF-67 NATO Green and XF-68 NATO Brown colours.

To bring life and scale to the huge, slab-sided Leopard, the installation of the turret crewmen provided with the kit is crucial to the Leopard's final appearance. They are very nicely sculpted with excellent detail.

Tamiya has done a wonderful job with this kit, which I'll say yet again, is 100% new for 2024. It goes together like a dream, is detailed to perfection, but still leaves a few nice things to do for the super-detailers out there. It's an impressive model and it will build into a stunning replica of this beast, arguably the best main battle tank currently in service.


