

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and one each of white, clear and satin-plated polystyrene, along with a bodyshell, tyres, metal axle, polycaps, decals and self-adhesive window masks, Tamiya's re-launched Honda City Turbo is, nonetheless, packed with more character than its modest parts-count suggests.

The City's origins date back to 1982, when your Editor was a skinny sixteen year-old lad (oh, time is cruel) and it has seen several iterations since; the 'City-R' (with very nice, '80s retro-wheels), the Turbo (as in this version), the Bulldog (different body)


Cabriolet (the clue's in the name) the re-issued 'City-R' and the current re-release of the Turbo. In most of these versions, the kit comes with brilliant little Honda 'Motocompo' folding, two-stroke scooter that was designed specifically to fit into the boot-space of the Honda City and which wasn't sold separately from the City car. The Motocompo was inspired by the World War II British 'Welbike' folding motorcycle, developed for airborne troops, so it has a very interesting back-story and it has a superb, modernist design.

Despite being forty+ years old, the

kit is every bit as sharp and crisp as it was when new, in fact it's hard to believe its vintage. Coming with the delightful, seven-part Motocompo scooter and groovy driver figure, this model makes an extremely fun and appealing package.










# Supermarine Spitfire Mk.VIII A17002



The excitement is building

was born as a challenge among a group of friends who usually meet at an annual modelling event held in Almería, Spain. Over a few beers we came up with the idea of making the same tank, each one in our own way and with no pressure, just to have fun, and present the results at the following year's meeting.

We chose the 1:48 Tamiya Jagdpanther (32522) because we knew that it was a simple model to assemble, but that it could be a fine one if someone decided to add extra details, and it would be a good canvas for painting, each one with his own style. In addition, the intermediate scale was an ideal compromise for all the participants in the challenge, including both 1:72 and 1:35 enthusiasts.

I had already built this model a few years ago and remembered the experience with pleasure. This time I decided to use quite a few aftermarket products to detail the model extensively. Besides the turned metal barrel or the classic photo-etched parts, this was the first time that I made extensive use of parts produced by 3D printing, taking advantage of the willingness of a modelling friend who owns one of these printers. I also tried a

hard-edged camouflage, a bit different to what I usually do. In this article I present the result of this work, which, I can already tell you, has not been free of certain problems.

# PARTS AND MATERIALS

As I said before, the base kit is Tamiya item number 32522. It represents a Jagdpanther G2, that is, the second version of this tank destroyer with the engine deck as the Panther Ausf. G. This version should have most of the tools and accessories relocated on the engine cover and rear plate, not on the side supports as Tamiya suggests in the instructions and illustrations, although this problem is easily solved.

As in almost all of Tamiya's early 1:48 series kits, the lower hull is a metal part, a strange choice that seems to satisfy the taste of some modellers by adding a sense of weight, but which, in my opinion, only serves to compromise the detail on the sides of the hull, which in this medium is much less fine than in plastic. In any case, this part is barely visible once assembly is complete. The rest of the kit is a typical Tamiya model: straightforward assembly, perfect dimensions and with decent detailing, although open to extra work by the

modeller who wishes to go up the next step.

I decided to make a little extra effort. First of all, I added texture to the large surfaces of the armour with putty diluted in acetone applied with an old brush in a rough manner. Of course, I also used some classic aftermarket elements like the turned barrel from RB model (48B13), metal tow cables from Eureka XXL (ER-4801), a general photo-etched set from Hauler (HLX48074) or the photo-etched Schürzen from Aber (48013). However, an important part of the super-detailing process was tackled by adding parts from 3D printing. Several STL files were acquired on the internet (www.cults3d.com) among them the link-by-link track (pics 1, 2).

# WHICH TRACKS TO USE?

The model supplies the tracks in the 'link-and-length' format and they are easy to assemble, convincingly obtaining the typical Panther track sag. However, Tamiya simplifies these parts so that, for example, the teeth are solid and without detail. They also have ejector marks along the inside face. The 3D tracks have much finer detail, but they are actually designed for 1:35, a scale at which they should even be workable by inserting pins that are

also printed. However, the reduction to 1:48 makes this option impossible, so in the end the links have to be glued. Cyano or epoxy has to be used, which increases the difficulty especially for shaping them around the sprockets and idlers. To make matters worse, the resin printed parts turned out to be







quite brittle, so many links ended up breaking... In short, the attempt to improve this part of the model turned out to be a considerable headache in the end (and with a surprise addition that I will reveal later).


Precisely, the fragility of the 3D parts was one of the main drawbacks of

their use. In general, their detail is very good, much better than the parts they replace, but their handling is difficult as they tend to break when separated from their supports or when manipulating the model. I suppose that this is aggravated by the fact that most of the time the design

of the parts is intended for 1:35 (or even larger), so the reduction to 1:48 makes them difficult to handle. In any case, in the photos of the model before painting you can see the 3D parts in grey.

Although I didn't want to place my Jagdpanther on any scenic or ground base, I decided to add a figure

to give a sense of scale. I chose a Royal Model tanker (884), which I had fallen in love with since I saw it on the internet. The sculpting of this figure is excellent, although the casting is not so good, and shows marks of the mould lines too pronounced in some parts such as the legs (pic 3). •





I started with a base obtained by mixing Vallejo's Dark Yellow (73.604) and White (73.600) primers. I always try to keep the base colours rather light, as I think a dark model is less attractive. Also, subsequent weathering processes tend to darken the colours. The camouflage scheme is a fairly classic one with large patches of green and brown. In this case I used Tamiya acrylics; for the green I mixed XF-58 Olive Green and XF-21 Sky and for the brown I mixed XF-64 Red Brown and XF-60 Dark Yellow. As you can see, I again lightened the basic colours.

I decided to apply the camouflage with hard edges and for this I used masking putty from Mig Productions. Despite its appearance, this material really behaves like a liquid, so if you leave it too long on the model, as I did (from one day to the next), it ends up 'flowing' and 'dripping' and when I removed it I tore or broke some parts (especially the 3D ones. Again the fragility).

Anyway, I ended up on the verge of a nervous breakdown, the second one after the assembly of

I was going to leave the masking putty for some time, and especially before removing it. Indeed, I did a test, and with the cooling, the masking putty is more rigid and removes better...

After repairing the damage and touching up the camouflage here and there, I added the numerals and the German crosses. On this occasion I used an old sheet of dry transfers that I had kept for years but which worked perfectly, in fact, much more comfortably than conventional decals.

# **GETTING DIRTY**

Before starting the weathering and dirtying treatments I gave a solid coat of Tamiya X-35 Semi-Gloss Clear in order to protect the transfers and have a suitable surface for subsequent work. The appearance of the model at this point was somewhat disappointing. The hard-edged camouflage made it look too contrasty and unreal, like a toy. I wondered if it might not

idea to do a more 'normal' camouflage, with airbrushed blurred edges, which, although perhaps less realistic, would probably have been more eye-catching. Anyway, from this point on, the main objective of all the work that was to follow was to get the three camouflage colours to integrate harmoniously with each other, and for that, in my opinion, there is nothing like oil paints.

But before that, there was work to be done. I started with two or three glazes, each consisting of applying a very diluted solution of ochre-coloured oil paint in a uniform manner, avoiding puddling and accumulations. This technique acts as a kind of photographic filter, adding a patina that begins to unify the colours and the decals. I continued with the chipping. The intention is to make 'concentric' chipping, that is, showing the removal of successive layers of paint, in some cases superimposed on the previous ones, but

smaller. First I made the wear of the outer paintwork, as if the green and brown camouflage colours had been removed, revealing the yellow base. Then, with Vallejo's 'Flesh Shadows' (70.343) I did the chipping and scratches that simulate the appearance of the base primer. Finally, the bare metal chips were made with Vallejo's 'Black Brown German Camouflage (70.822). They always have to be small – very small – and I only use a very fine brush to have total control over where and how to paint them.

Then I applied the oils. In a first phase I use 'Faded Dark Yellow' (Abteilung 502), together with ochres, greys, whites... with the idea of creating tonal variations and a worn appearance of the paint. With the tip of a fine brush I take a very small portion of oil paint and



in a specific place, in a very controlled way. In this case, and with the idea of creating a patina sufficient to dull the contrast between the colours, the application of the oils was more intense, repeating in some areas once the previous layer had dried.

blend it

The work is laborious, even tedious, but in this way one has total control over the location and the intensity of the application. In the second phase, I applied dark oil colours and rust tones (industrial earth, sepia, raw umber, dark red oxide). With them I make subtle 'drips' on vertical surfaces and diffuse irregular stains on the horizontal ones.

After the treatment with the oils, I painted all the details different from the base colour such as tools or exhausts. For these latter I use both oils and pigments, avoiding a uniform look, and tapping with a small stiff-bristled brush to create small rust stains and spots (pic 4).

Some accessories were painted apart, such as the towing hooks and the ends of the towing cables

which were particularly battered. Here the colour 'Black Brown German Camouflage' (70.822) from Vallejo was used intensely, even drybrushing it, and pin-washes of rust-coloured oils were also used to give a more severe worn look. The spare track links were 'abused' with oils and pigments.

The last weathering step was the outlining around the details, recesses and engraved lines with diluted sepia oil. This enhances the volumes and makes the details stand out. In some areas, a second application of this profiling may be advisable to enhance its effects even further. The model was ready for dirtying.

As usual, I did all the dirtying with pigments. In the lower and running gear areas I deposited small amounts with the brush and soaked them with enamel thinner. Once dry, I retouched very gently these areas by removing here and adding more pigments there. I also added a solution of sepia oil that soaks the pigments, around some details to add depth. Anyway, this area will be mostly hidden by the wheels and side skirts.

The wheels themselves were similarly dirtied with pigments and oils, although less heavily. Previously, I had painted the sprocket teeth, the rim of the idler wheel and the outer edges of the inner wheels with silver and then polished with a smudger impregnated with gun metal pigment (pic 5).

The tracks were initially primed in black. Since as I said above they are somewhat fragile, I tried to manipulate them as less as possible. Thus, I only treated them with dry pigments, gently applied, and some drybrush with a mixture of grey and silver to stand out the details. Anyway, during its manipulation, the threads (there were two sections per side) broke apart a couple of times, and I had some fun installing them in the running gear (third near nervous crisis). Once I managed to had them in place, the outer details of the tracks were then rubbed with a smudger and gun metal pigment.

And then I realised that the tracks were the wrong way round - damn! How could this have happened? No idea. Well, trying to find an alibi for this error, I found some wartime photos of Jagdpanthers with the tracks reversed, and even some speculation that this was an intentional practice at some point. My sanity was somewhat restored.

The side skirts, tow ropes and spare track links were now placed in their final locations. The rest of the model was dirtied with dry pigments and a fine brush. In the horizontal areas I simulated accumulations around the details. Finally, I made some splashes in the lower area with a paste of pigments mixed with solvent, projected with a stiff-bristled brush.


The final touch was the addition of grease and oil stains on the hubs of some of the wheels and in the engine deck area. To achieve this effect, I used 'asphalt' coloured oil, more or less diluted to obtain different degrees of intensity, accompanied by a small touch of diluted gloss varnish to reinforce the effect around the oil and fuel intakes. With the addition of a RB model antenna (48A01), the Jagdpanther was finished.

# CONCLUSION

I have mixed feelings about this model. At some points I had a really good time, especially planning and challenging myself to detail the model with 3D elements, a fairly new medium for me. However, at other times I was a bit frustrated when

I realised how fragile some of these parts were, or the painting process was not going as planned. In the end, I think I more or less managed to get around these problems and the result of all the work done is what I show you in this article. I hope you like it.




taleri certainly do make some bold choices when it comes to subject matter, their 2023 1:32 kit of the Macchi MC.202 Folgore proving the point. Now, to follow this epic model (on which a full-build feature will appear in TMMI) is Macchi's MC.205 Veltro has materialised, a logical next step. Let's have a very quick look at the Macchi 'MC' family: put simply, the MC.202 Folgore (Lightning) was based on the radial-engined MC.200 Saetta (also Lightning) fitted with a Daimler-Benz DB601 engine – as used in the Messerschmitt Bf109E – built in Italy under license by Fiat. The Macchi MC.205 Veltro (Greyhound) was a reconfigured MC.202 with a DB605A engine, the original powering the


Messerschmitt Bf109G-6. The quickest visual identifier of the MC.205 is the presence of a pair of large, cylindrical oil radiators on the lower sides of the engine plus two 20mm cannons protruding from the wings' leading edges. It proved to be a fast and effective fighter and earned the respect of Allied fighter pilots in combat.


Italeri have done another cracking job with the MC.205, packed with detail whilst avoiding it being a thousand-part nightmare that would take months to finish. The airframe breaks down in the conventional manner, with individually-moulded cowlings provided so the miniature replica of the aforementioned DB605 V12 can be seen after completion. The

engine is a little masterpiece, with tubing and wiring included to give it a marvellously busy look. Even if you don't usually incorporate an engine in your aircraft models, it's worth doing so in this case, as it would be a travesty to cover it all up, particularly as the nose guns sit atop the powerplant. Italeri's designers haven't skimped on the engine's surrounding areas either, providing a firewall with oil tanks plus main undercarriage bay/wing spar detail too, which can be seen with the engine cowlings off.

The cockpit is another highlight of this kit, the instrument panel bestowed with a sextet of three-dimensional decals that are applied to injection-moulded backing







panels for an incredibly authenticlooking result. For the seat, you need not turn to the aftermarket for harnesses as Italeri have it covered. A separately-moulded backing panel comes with the shoulder straps incorporated, to which are added photo-etched buckles. Further elements of the belts are formed from photo-etched brass collectively making a very convincing result once superglued in place.


Overall, this is an incredibly impressive production, combining excellent injection-moulded parts with photo-etched brass, 3D instrument panels, canopy masks, tubing and wire, plus Italeri's stunning decals. Well worth the asking price.





s an owner of an early 'Z I was quite excited to try and replicate an accurate version of my own car and knew the Tamiya kit would provide an excellent base for the process. The first step was elimination of the front spoiler provided. I grafted the stock lower valence from a Hasegawa kit as the donor. The fit was surprisingly good and with some minor shaping and filling the process was completed without much drama (pic 1).

One detail area I thought I could improve was the front grille and decided to fabricate one from .30 brass stock and soldered together. A fussy process but I was happy with the end result and thought it improved the look immensely (pics 2, 3).

Another area I thought required some attention was adding some detail to the engine bay and engine itself. I fabricated some throttle linkage for the triple Mikuni carbs and added some 3D printed parts (pic 4). The coil, battery, distributor, and valve cover breather were all printed from files from Cults 3D. Distributor and coil wiring were all completed using .30 wire from Model Factory Hiro. Minor electrical connections were completed using the same method (pic 5).

rather than use the supplied rims. They were painted with Tamiya Gloss Black Lacquer and chromed using Alclad 2. The centres were painted in pale gold Alclad (pic 7).

The interior was left completely stock. Instruments decals were applied and a drop of UV cured resin was applied to each bezel adding the illusion of a glass cover. The interior carpet texture was applied using black flocking and a thinned clear water based glue applied to the floor and hatch area.

The flocking was liberally applied, gently pressed into corners and excess shaken out after application. The seats and most interior parts were painted with Tamiya Flat black Lacquer, lightly polished to bring back some of the sheen and graphite from some gentle pencil rubbing added a slight tonal difference breaking up some of the monotony of an all black interior (pics 8, 9).

The tail lights and surrounding valence are typical Tamiya and spectacularly good. Excellent fitment and being created from seven separate parts makes for a fantastic result when completed (pic 10).

The body was up next. Primed with Tamiya primer/surfacer and reduced with Mr Color Leveling Thinner gave





a perfectly smooth surface to apply the base and clear coats (pic 11). The main colour was 'Wimbledon White' by Gravity Paints from Spain and the gloss clear coats were Mr Color GX100 reduced with Mr Color Leveling thinner. This was allowed to cure for one week and then polished using Tamiya compounds and polishing clothes (pic 12).

Normally a weak spot on most automotive models is the chrome trim around windows. It's usually very difficult to accurately replicate the chrome or stainless trim with the embedded rubber gasket and make a neat job. Tamiya's answer to this is the best I've seen. A slight raised edge on the centre of the stainless trim allows you to paint the entire trim black and then use a hard cotton swab to highlight the centre removing the applied black paint. It's a great solution to a very

tricky detail (pic 13).
Overall this was a great, trouble free project. Typical Tamiya quality with excellent parts fitment and engineering that make their models a joy to build, it's difficult to lay too much praise on a kit like this.









orming the subject of the second double-page kit preview on an Italeri release this month is the all-new Lancia Stratos HF Group 4 in 1:12. It's on two pages instead of one because such a major release surely demands the extra space? And what an extraordinary achievement this is – a newly tooled, modern replica ('miniature' is hardly appropriate here because the model is huge) of the iconic (that word again) Group 4 rally car from Italian makers Lancia. The Stratos HF Gr.4 was created with the singular purpose of winning races, appearing first in the early years of the 1970s winning the World Rally Championship in '74, '75 and '76 plus the Targa Florio in 1974, culminating in the vehicle depicted in this kit, the 1977 Monte Carlo winning Group.4 machine of

Sandro Munari and Silvio Maiga.


kit of the Lancia Stratos HF Gr.4, a 1970s rally-dominating legend

The Stratos's design by Bertone was a radically wedge-shaped, lightweight car powered by a transverse, mid-mounted, Ferrari Dino-derived 2.4 litre V6 engine that produced up to 250bhp. Its chassis was a steel space-frame with in-built roll protection, bodied with a fibre-glass shell to keep it light on its feet; in Group 4 configuration it weighed just 880kg. It proved to be a little rocket and ideal for competition.


There are few cars as instantly recognisable as the Stratos and it makes the perfect subject for a model kit release in any scale, and particularly so in 1:12. It's a compact car in reality so the larger scale is ideal for showing off its rakish profile as well as the mechanical areas inside

and underneath. Flicking through the forty-four page instruction booklet allows one to appreciate how comprehensive the kit is, with no area left undetailed. The lightweight chassis builds up element by element to form a rigid frame to which the exquisite V6 Dino engine and suspension are fitted, each step explained in great clarity by the assembly guide. As with any kit, no matter how involving, it is always essential to familiarise oneself with the way the model comes together, so once you have snipped off the engine cover, body and bonnet mouldings and placed them together to see how they look (doesn't everyone do this?) it's time to put them back in the box, make a cup of tea and really give the instructions a good read through.

Italeri have left nothing to chance









here, providing all the bits we would normally go online for, such as engine HT leads, brake lines, battery cables, electrical wiring for the cooling fans, photo-etched metal and fabric seat harnesses, rubber sheet for the mudflaps and more. They even provide waterslide decals for the battery and cabin fire extinguishers, steel springs for the working suspension and in-scale, workable steering. Both doors, engine cover and bonnet are hinged and are openable of course - it would be a shame if they weren't - and the sponsors' decals, well, let's just say they are perfect in terms of print quality, registration and finish.


This will be quite a major project but thanks to a logical parts-breakdown, it shouldn't be beyond the abilities of any level of modeller, except perhaps the complete beginner. Italeri have created another of their large-scale marvels with this release and the finished masterpiece will look absolutely magnificent in the display cabinet.

of 1:48 kits stand out thanks to their incredible accuracy, ease of assembly and levels of detail. When Eduard announced that they were downsizing their 1:48 collection to create superdetailed kits in 1:72 I was more than a little excited, feeling that I would have to build one of the kits as soon as they appeared. This feature is the result of the desire.

If you have ever built one of Eduard's 1:48 kits, this one will appear remarkably familiar. Though obviously smaller in stature, Eduard have essentially replicated their larger kit, offering similar levels of fine detail, the same incredible surface features and overall levels of accuracy. The enthusiast is presented with a kit that pretty much closes the book on this aircraft in this scale. Even 'from the box' the kit offers stunning levels of plastic detail; add many of the additional etched brass and resin parts that Eduard have also created for this family, and you will end up with a show stopper. The possibilities really are endless.

The kit that I ended up with was a 'Dual Combo' offering twelve different aircraft, spanning Blocks D-5 through to D-25, with or without the distinctive tail fillet. The parts supplied only allow you to build one model with the fillet, one without, but thanks to the amazing number of options on the decal sheet, that shouldn't be too much of a problem.

Along with the decals (details of which, later) the kit offers plenty of additional options such as propellers, early and late control surfaces, canopies, weapons, those fins and drop tanks. You will also find canopy masks for both canopies that you will need to use, as well as two etched frets, one a standard set for the P-51D and the other from the early, Block D-5 Variant. All of these options are discussed in detail within the superb instruction book, so you just have to pick your chosen scheme(s) and then work your way through the necessary steps.

Looking closer at the kit, you are immediately struck by the quality of the detail, especially that decorating the airframe's outer surfaces. As with most of Eduard's recent releases, the surface detail shows off their considerable talents when it comes to the recreation of panel lines, fasteners and stunningly delicate rows of rivets. I really don't think it is much of an exaggeration to suggest that Eduard's surface detail is the best out there, especially in this scale. In plastic the delicacy of their rendered features in something to behold; apply paint and some subtle weathering and the results are nothing short of staggering. It all appears to be, well, in scale. Nothing is overblown, oversized or off-putting. It's just as it should be: delicate. •





Away from the surface deal, the finer features such as the cockpit and undercarriage, fare little worse, with plenty to admire. Having built the 1:48 kit, I was initially concerned that the tricky undercarriage bays would be repeated here, but that was not the case, Eduard having simplified everything to little more than a drop-in part that you simply paint and glue in place. Though detail is not quite as comprehensive as that found within the confines of its larger brother's box, it's still more than acceptable for a model of this size.

The cockpit is another highlydetailed area of the kit. Here, you are able to make choices that suit your skill level and therefore desire to take things as far as possible. You can build the cockpit using only plastic parts; add etch to those pieces to elevate the complexity a little further, or as we have here, replace everything with Eduard's exquisite 3D printed BRASSIN cockpit, for the ultimate in miniature detail!

When assembling the cockpit, you will need to once again pay attention to your chosen aircraft, the kit offering different individual details, as well as optional sidewalls, depending on your chosen variant. You will notice as well that some smaller features around the flor of the cockpit will need to be removed as well. This is not that arduous, just a little fiddly thanks to the small size of the pieces being corrected. What is a trial at times is the painting the parts. With tiny detail comes an increased need to bring that detail out with the paintbrush. As you can see in the accompanying images, I tried to paint as much of the detail as possible, AK Interactive's acrylics, a No.1 Kolinsky Sable paintbrush and my trusty Optivisor, all helping along the way.







#### AIRFRAME DELICACY

The airframe fits together perfectly, needing little in the way of fettling or filler. Small panel lines will need to be filled depending on your chosen variant, which though fiddly is far from difficult. As with other kits in this range, control surfaces on the main plane, as well as flaps are separate parts, the tailplanes and fin not offering those additional layers of detail. Surface detail is as mentioned, superb, so care needs to be taken to ensure your assembly is neat and tidy. Delicacy forces a deft touch, so don't be too heavy handed when dealing with seams, because removal of the panel lines and those delicate rivets is an all too possible consequence if you are. •

The decal sheets are superb, offering all of the national and unit markings that you need, as well as appropriate stencils that add that degree of additional finesse that we all like to achieve. I also think it is worth mentioning the painting instructions, each aircraft and their pilot being described in detail. This really helps you to make an informed choice, the background information bringing life to the machines on offer. I was so taken by this that I promised to make the second kit in the box so that I could take advantage of the information and pay homage to another pilot whose story had captured my imagination. Hopefully, if I do that, I will show you the results in a future edition of this magazine!



A number of panels under the nose need to be filled and sanded smooth. This was done using VMS Flexy superglue, smoothed out using Infini sanding pads



As usual, I pre-finished around openings with layers of paint that would cut down on my need to mask them off, later on. Here, the lower wing has been prepared using my mixed aluminium paint (Tamiya LP-38 Flat Aluminium, mixed with Mr Hobby Light Aircraft Grey), followed by panelling, airbrushed with a layer of Mr. Super Metallic Super Fine Silver 2




Though not as detailed as its 1:48 counterpart, the kit's gear bays more than pass muster in this scale. Note the pleasing contrast between the painted bay, the painted wings and that 'natural metal' panel





With the airframe assembled and all seams clean-up, the wings could be sprayed with my trusty aluminium mix. Several thin layers of painted were applied, smoothed over with 1000 grit MicroMesh, to create a perfectly smooth finish




The elevators needed to be sprayed aluminium, so were airbrushed and then masked off with Tamiya masking tape







Neat oil paint, dabbed on and then stroked over the surface of the wings, helped to add a further layer of grime. Note the opening for the gun bay and how some careful trimming of the star & bar marking was needed, to create the impression of a missing panel




A less controlled wash was used to highlight the rivet detail over the surface of the tailplanes. The difference between the shiny natural metal surfaces and the painted elevators, can be seen in this shot




The cockpit is now complete and the windscreen in place. For such a tiny model, the detailing really captures the look of the original to a tee



In this extreme close-up, the way that the decals have flowed over the nose is easy to see. No touching ups were needed where the four decals joined, such was their accuracy and thus, subsequent fit (if that's the correct term!) over the sides of the nose. Incidentally, the anti glare panel had to be masked and airbrushed after the decals had been applied, meaning that I had to use very low-tack masking tape to ensure that I didn't damage those delicate decals. Nerve-wracking, it most certainly was!



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



MiniArt's latest 1:35 M3 Stuart variant depicts the American

here are various anecdotes on exactly how the American M3 Light Tank received the moniker 'Honey' when it entered British service in 1941, but the name stuck and in its desert camouflage schemes it took on a character of its own. MiniArt started releasing their series of 1:35 M3 Stuart kits around a year ago and they were a real eye-opener in terms of detail, inside and out. At least eight variants of this kit are

now listed in the catalogue – with and without interior detailing – and this early-production variant Mk.I is one of the latest to arrive at Tamiya Model Magazine. It comes with a very impressive fighting compartment/ driver's station, engine bay/engine and turret interior, all of which will keep even an experienced modeller busy for weeks; there's a lot of parts and some are tiny, so great care will be needed when removing the parts from the

sprue and during clean-up. The box contains twenty-one sprues of varying sizes in grey polystyrene plus one in clear (periscopes and light lenses) along with a fret of photo-etched brass (engine grilles, headlight brush-guards, dust-skirt framework, idler-wheel rims and more) plus a sheet of waterslide markings carrying decals to finish one of five Honeys. The instruction booklet comprises twenty-eight pages, giving an idea of the complexity of the model,










but the assembly illustrations and very clear and guide the modeller efficiently through the process. The Honda Mugen CR-X PRO. (with full stop) was a special version of the Honda Ballade Sport CR-X, a funky, lightweight sports car first announced in June 1983. 'Mugen' is a famous tuner of Honda cars in Japan and they fitted the Mugen CR-X PRO. with a plethora of performance parts plus a revamped body with air-dam bumpers and blister fenders that featured design work from Mooncraft, the company founded by Japanese car designer Takuya Yura. It also had upgrades to its intake and exhaust system and the suspension: honed on the circuit and often customized even further by its owners, the CR-X PRO. really stood out among numerous custom CR-X cars. Back in 1984, Tamiya launched a brilliant 1:24 replica of this little street rocket, basing the kit on the previous year's less jazzy-looking CR-X. I.5i kit, incorporating the aforementioned aero body-styling parts within the newly moulded shell. The flat-faced wheels of the PRO. were also provided, plus a new steering wheel, exhaust, streamlined wing mirrors and, wait for it, rooftop 'snorkel' vent! The latter is somewhat of an oddity, resembling an oversized mobile phone aerial, but it does add a touch of eccentricity to this groovy Honda. None of the engine upgrades of the real car depicted on the model are included because no engine is provided, the kit's powerplant being restricted to just the lower areas such as exhaust, sump, gearbox and drive shafts. Within the interior, the seats come with decals to recreate tartan-patterned bolsters and headrests, and there are plentiful logo decals for the exterior too; thankfully that includes the red pinstripe that runs around the entire lower bodywork which would be a proper fiddle to paint oneself. Great to see this attractive two-seater back on sale from Tamiya and it looks as







First appearing in 1937, the four-seater cabriolet version of the Mercedes-Benz 320 was a beautiful high-status open-topped car that was typical of the best that pre-war industry could produce in Germany. The car was used by the wealthy and influential members of society and when war broke out these cars were used by high-ranking officers. Indeed, this type of car was being used by Reichsprotektor Heydrich when he was assassinated in 1942. The cars appeared in many colours while in civilian hands, but in military service they were largely dark grey or black. The kit from ICM is the 2-door coupe version and the detail is incredible, inside and out, with very fine moulding of parts. The appearance of the seats and the folded hood is excellent and there is no need to improve these parts. The engine and transmission are complete and only a little added wiring is needed for perfection. The soft plastic tyres have exceptional rendering of the tyre tread and virtually no flash to remove. The modeller is guided on the colours needed for the bodywork, interior trim and seats, to ensure the correct combination. The prominent chrome parts (bumper, trim, hub caps and so on) will need careful painting, but the end result will quite remarkable. The kit does not provide decals for military service, but there are five options for civilian use and sourcing appropriate military markings will be easy. Overall, we have a very attractive car that will look great as part of a diorama, or absolutely stunning on its own. **CLS** 


















#### MINIART, UKRAINE STUH 42 AUSF.G EARLY PRODUCTION, MAY-JUNE 1943

The famous Sturmgeschütz on the Panzer III chassis is extremely wellknown and was one of the success stories of WW2 armour. These Stugs were fitted with a 75mm gun for anti-tank and infantry support roles. However, a significant number (1,300) of these vehicles mounted a 105mm howitzer with a much larger explosive warhead and these vehicles were used to destroy strongpoints that were immune to smaller weapons. The majority of the Sturmhaubitze variants were on the Ausf.G Stug chassis and this kit has features of production from mid-1943. The MiniArt kit is a full Stug kit, with the addition of a new gun barrel to make the howitzer version. The kit is extremely detailed, with numerous tiny parts which need careful handling and it is important to select from the options and variations. The tracks are provided as link-and-length, with exceptionally good moulding and realistic 'sag'. The schürzen armour plates are provided in etched brass, as are the mesh screens on the air vents. The schürzen supports and rails are a little thick, but can easily be made thinner without affecting their strength. There are four colour schemes suggested, two each from StuG.Abt. 245 and 912. Decals are minimal, as was normal on these vehicles from mid-WW2 onwards, but the paint schemes are very varied and attractive. In summary, the model is far more detailed than is typical in this scale, with very good moulding and a whole lot of parts on a small vehicle.



#### MINIART, UKRAINE JUNKERS F13 EARLY PROD.

The Junkers F13 was the world's first all-metal transport aircraft, designed and produced by the German aircraft manufacturer Junkers. Produced shortly after the end of the First World War, it was a cantilever-wing monoplane with enclosed accommodation for four passengers and a two-seat open cockpit. Like all Junkers duralumin-structured designs, from the 1918 J7 to the 1932 Ju46, it has an aluminium alloy (duralumin) structure entirely covered with Junkers's characteristic corrugated and stressed duralumin skin. Internally, the wing was built up on nine circular cross-section


duralumin spars with transverse bracing. All control surfaces were horn balanced. A total of 322 aircraft were manufactured, a considerable quantity for a commercial airliner of the era, and were operated all around the world, accounting for over a third of air traffic in the early 1920s. It remained in production for thirteen years and in commercial service for more than thirty. There were many versions including floatplanes for water landing, skis, mailplane plus different engines. Several survive in various states of repair in museums and a replica of the type was put back in production in the 2010s, taking flight once again nearly a century after the type first flew. (history from Wikipedia). MiniArt's 1:48 Aeroplane Series has recently welcomed an all-new kit of this distinctive-looking machine into its ranks and from our inspection of the parts for this review, it looks absolutely superb. The all-important corrugated pattern of the airframe is captured to perfection, incorporating not just the ribbing but the rivets and panel boundaries too, with exquisite subtlety. The designers have really gone to town with this model, providing not only extensive cabin detailing but the inlinesix Mercedes D IIIa engine. Markings are provided for three FI3s in service in the 1920s; one in yellow as per the box art, plus one in a rather attractive green and one in classic sliver. No sign yet of the aircraft that ferried a certain Führer around Germany in the '30s, but that will surely materialise soon. TMMI





SCALE: 1:35 • MATERIALS: IM, PE, WS • ITEM NO.2609 Takom have release at least eight previous kits of varying versions of the AH-64D Apache helicopter in 1:32 and each one has been a triumph of detail inside and out. The kit comes with phenomenal treatments of the two-seat cockpit, rotorhead and both turboshaft engines but - in this reviewer's opinion at least – the most impressive element of the model is the airframe exterior. It is covered with incredibly fine and evenly-formed raised rivets that do a brilliant job of replicating the real thing in


miniature and somehow they have even managed to wrap them around the curved lower edges of the fuselage without the distortion that usually occurs on this area of a kit. It's extremely encouraging and really makes you want to get stuck in and start building the model! Complimenting the twin engines is a pair of very nicely executed infrared-suppressing exhaust boxes which are multi-part sub-assemblies that come with photo-etched grilles for the most refined effect possible. The General Electric T700-GE-701C powerplants themselves are fantastic and for full realism, will 'just' require the addition of the serpentine pipework by the modeller (as will the open avionics boxes on the side-pods) but this is achievable with the right references to hand. Alternatively, it is surely just a matter of time that Reskit will come up with 3D-printed replacement full engines (plus those side-pods in all likelihood) with all plumbing printed in place, as they already offer the T700 engines for the Black Hawk helicopter in 1:35. In this limited edition release by Takom, we are treated to a special decal sheet for the Royal Netherlands Air Force's Apache Solo Display aircraft, whose orange panels adorned with an Apache warrior's head (is this PC?) certainly contrast with the overall dark green of the aircraft. This is an incredible replica of the deadly Apache; whether you appreciate the additional display team decals is a matter of taste, but the model behind them is a stunning



A NEW HOBBY STORE IN THE LAND OF THE GREAT WHITE CLOUD





## **Model Craft Masking Putty (PMA1000)**

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This is an extremely useful material that allows the user to mask off areas of a model in preparation for painting, providing a flexible and versatile three-dimensional mass to completely block off whole sections at a time. The putty is low tack and won't lift paint, and can be re-used over and over. You can also roll it into a ball and bounce it, because it's very similar to Silly Putty!

he Lockheed Martin F-35B Lightning II is operated by the Royal Air Force's famous 617 Squadron 'Dambusters', United States Marine Corps, Italian Navy, Italian Air Force, Royal Australian Air Force, Belgian Air Force, Japan Air Self-Defence Force, and the Republic of Singapore Air Force. The kit encompasses all the astonishing detail and accuracy of its bigger 1:48 cousin, a model that was featured back in Tamiya Model Magazine Issue 339, January 2024.

The new version takes in all the design changes for the B-model, most notably that huge intake door behind the cockpit, the inner face of which is often adorned with the flag of the operating nation. Inside that door, Tamiya have recreated an astonishing amount of detail and the same is true of the '3BSM' (3-Bearing Swivel Module) engine exhaust nozzle that can be positioned in the 'hovering' mode. It is

covered in amazing detail and just needs some creative paint work to bring it to life.

Two modes can be chosen by the modeller: hovering, with open intake door, downward-facing exhaust nozzle, extended undercarriage leg struts and scissor-links, and 'landed' mode, which uses a different set of undercarriage parts in the 'compressed' configuration (with closed scissor-links) to depict the aircraft's weight pressing down on the legs: an important observation by Tamiya's designers. This is another wonderful achievement from Tamiya, and an exquisite replica of this extraordinary fighter and one of the best 1:72 kits ever created.

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


