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


COMING SOON FROM TAMIYA! Tamiya 1:16 RC M4 Sherman 105mm Howitzer (Mechanical Steering System)

The 1:16 radio controlled M4 Sherman 105mm Howitzer was Tamiya's first RC model kit, released in 1974. Now, an updated version of it is on the way, featuring a new gearbox which uses a single Type 540 electric motor (two Type 380 motors powered the original kit) which recreates the controlled differential steering system of the actual tank; during WWII, most American tanks featured this steering

Chris Ellis: 1937 - 2025

It is with great sadness that we learned of the death of Tamiya Model Magazine International's founding editor Chris Ellis who passed away earlier in the year. Chris was a prolific author and modeller with some of the modelling hobby's top titles including two stints at Airfix Magazine and other magazines such as Hornby Express and Model Trains. Chris helped launch TMMI in 1985 and edited it until 1991 during a time when the hobby was trying to find its feet again after the recessions of the 1970s. But it is perhaps his seminal work, 'How to go Plastic Modelling' (1968) that Chris will be best and most fondly remembered by generations of modellers. One of the first detailed books that concentrated solely on plastic kits, it ran for several editions and updates, such was its popularity. The last word really should go to Chris - he was a master at writing and influenced so many of today's modelling authors:

"The best modellers, and the best citizens in my experience, are those with the widest interests."






AIRFIX 1:72 Eurofighter Typhoon FGR.4 starterSET (A55016) new tool for 2025

This is a seriously nice 1:72 kit of the FGR.4 variant of the Eurofighter Typhoon, sporting some excellent airframe detail, on the underwing and lower fuselage areas in particular. It would be unfair to say the cockpit is basic – a little spartan perhaps, but with the instrument panel decal and ejector seat – and the pilot – in place it is perfectly adequate for the job. The undercarriage legs are nicely done and their doors are commendably thin. This 'starterSET' kit comes with six tubs of acrylic paint for the jet's main colours, plus a tube of cement and two very decent quality paint brushes. www.airfix.com and good retailers everywhere




AIRFIX 1:48 Messerschmitt BFf109E-3/E-4 (A05120C) new version

The Messerschmitt Bf109 is an evergreen scale modelling subject and every time a new kit is launched, it's worth taking a look at. This 1:48 kit was initially released back in 2010 as the Bf109E-1/E-3/E-4 and it's back once more with decals to finish one of two machines, a Bf109E-3 Wnr.1162 'White 4' as flown by Johann Böhm of 4./Jagdgeschwader 51, France, July 1940; painted RLM70 Schwarzgrün with an RLM02 Grau mottle, over RLM65 Hellblau undersurfaces and fuselage sides. The other scheme is a French-captured 'E-3 in RLM70/RLM71 Dunkelgrün over RLM65 Hellblau with French roundels. www.airfix.com and good retailers everywhere



DRAGON 1:35 Sd.Kfz.250/1 Neu (6476) re-release

This 'neu Art' version was the later variant of the Sd.Kfz.250 halftrack with simplified flat-plate armour giving it a more utilitarian look. Dragon's superb but complex 1:35 Sd.Kfz.250/1 'neu Art' traces its roots back to 1998, arguably the golden era for this manufacturer when they were producing superb armour kits and that quality shows to this day. This is a 'Premium Edition' but with Dragon, it can be tricky to distinguish precisely what this means, but the box is heaving with hundreds of beautifully detailed parts that demand a patient approach to assembly. www.hobbyco.net and good retailers everywhere



AIRFIX 1:72 Gloster Meteor F.8/FR.9 (A04067) new version

Airfix's stunning 1:72 Meteor F.8 from 2022 provides the main structural parts for this new version, which includes the option to build it as the FR.9 photo-reconnaissance machine with a new nose featuring a pair of windows either side and a circular one in the tip. The detail incorporated within this model is fantastic, the cockpit alone being a little masterpiece. The refinement continues throughout the rest of the model with no areas left unattended to, topped off with a new decal sheet for one F.8 – as that version can still be built from the box – and another for the FR.9. Gorgeous. www.airfix.com and good retailers everywhere



BELKITS 1:24 Opel Ascona 400 (BEL-019) new tool

This is an all new kit from Belgian rally-masters Belkits which depicts the famous Opel Ascona 400 car as driven by Jochi Kleint and Gunter Wagner in the 1981 Rallye Monte-Carlo. The Ascona was a mid-sized saloon that began life in 1970 and whose production ran all the way to 1988. In rally service its 2.4 litre straight-four engine was upgraded to 260bhp and was a great success. The kit's main parts are moulded in white with just the clear frame for the windows and synthetic rubber tyres providing some relief. A 'curbside-kit' with superb detail; full build coming soon to TMMI. www.hobbyco.net and good retailers everywhere



1:48 I-135 with Pilots and Ground Personnel (48094) new version

It almost goes without saying that this is a fantastic 1:48 replica of the Polikarpov I-153 biplane fighter; the subtle airframe detail is exquisitely executed, with incredible simulations of the wing ribs and fuselage stringers, rendered to perfection in grey polystyrene. This is a 'Luftwaffe' boxing, so it comes with three markings-options in WW2 German air force colours and insignia. What really brings this release to life, however, is the sprue of seven pilot and ground-crew figures and they are absolutely brilliant, with convincing poses and amazingly sharp detail. www.hobbyco.net and good retailers everywhere



ITALERI 1:48 P-47D Thunderbolt (2835) new boxing

The P-47 Thunderbolt lends itself perfectly to scale model reproduction and there have been many kits of it created over the years. Here we have Italeri's re-box of Academy's basically sound 1998 kit of the P-47D and it makes an attractive presentation, with an ordnance load of bombs, droptanks and rockets and a stunning decal sheet. The kit is not without its issues but the basics are all there and there are some nice features like recessed panel lines across the airframe, openable wing gun bays plus well detailed engine and cockpit. www.hobbyco.net and good retailers everywhere



NUNU 1:24 BMW 320si (E90) WTCC Brands Hatch 2008 Winner (PN24037) new version The World Touring Car Championship features some very cool-looking cars, adaptations (to say the least) from the standard, commercially available vehicles that are transformed by the addition of sponsors' logos and much more. The BMW 320si (E90) depicted in this kit comes with an accurate-looking bodyshell that sits over the typically spartan interior, replicated to perfection here. This is a very 'German' colour scheme with a huge black/red/yellow flag across the roof and along the shoulders, looking fantastic. Detail throughout is excellent and whilst no engine is provided, the bonnet is moulded separately should you wish to add an aftermarket item. www.hobbyco.net and good retailers everywhere



REVELL 1:24 Corvette C8 Coupé (07714) 2024 new tool

Revel released this all-new kit of the stunning Chevrolet Corvette C8 Coupé back in 2024 and it looks amazing. It is a full-engine release with a very impressive 1:24 replica of the real car's 6.2 litre V8 engine. When everything is moulded in slightly translucent white plastic, it can be tricky to observe the finer details, but under a bright light it is clear that this kit is superbly well detailed, from the crisp bodyshell to the super low-profile tyres. It's a terrific production and all that sharpedge detail is topped off with decals for USA, Netherlands, UK, Germany, Belgium, France, Austria, Switzerland and Italy-based cars! www.revell.de and good retailers everywhere



MINIART 1:35 Sd.Kfz.234 with MG151 Drilling (40014) new version

Incredibly, this is the ninth variant of the Sd.Kfz.234 issued by MiniArt since its launch in Puma-form in 2024, with previous iterations taking the form of the '234/4 Schwerer Panzerspähwagen, '234/3 2cm Schwebelafette 38 and '234/3 Schwerer Panzerspähwagen 'Stummel' to name but three. The kits are all extensively detailed – even the Puma without interior – with thorough representations of the eight-wheeled suspension, steering and drivetrain, an area of the model that will keep the builder fully engaged for some while. This version comes with the three-MG151 'Drilling' (triplet) turret and looks fantastic. www.creativemodels.co.uk www.miniart-models.com and good retailers everywhere



REVELL 1:32 Bae Hawk T.1A RAF Red Arrows (04284) new decals

Revell's 1:32 Bae Hawk T.1A was launched originally back in 2010 and was received well by the modelling community. Sadly, Eduard's photo-etched sets and canopy masks are discontinued but if you can find them online somewhere, they will add an extra touch of refinement to this already excellent model. 2024 marked the sixtieth anniversary of the Royal Air Force Red Arrows Aerobatic Team and this latest edition comes with a stunning decal sheet that carries the special commemorative markings, along with codes for to depict any one of the aircraft that took part in the 2024 season. Thankfully, the kit plastic is now neutral grey, not red! www.revell.de and good retailers everywhere



REVELL 1:24 Porsche (Cabriolet) 50 Years of the G Model (05646) new version Using the 2021-released Porsche 911 Carrera 3.2 Coupe as a base for the same year's launch of the Targa was an obvious – and inspired – choice and now that we have the full Cabriolet from Revell, the holy trinity of the G-Model 911 can be built to perfection in 1:24. As with Revell's Corvette, the kit comes with a full representation of its engine, in this case a 3.2 litre flat-six, naturally. Detail throughout is wonderful and Revell's designers have really captured the familiar lines of this motoring icon impressively well. 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GIMME A HIGH FIVE!

Tamiya's Renault 5 Turbo Rally is back again, for everyone to enjoy! **Marcus Nicholls** investigates...

re-imagined its iconic '5' in the form of a fully electric car, so Tamiya's re-issue of the equally venerated 1:24 Renault 5 Turbo Rally is perfectly timed and very welcome. The kit first saw the light of day in 1982 and was re-issued back in 2011, so to have the chance to build this brilliant little kit again is wonderful. Last

issue I waxed lyrical about the model, remarking how it makes me smile when I see one and now I actually have the kit in front of me, I am beaming like the proverbial Cheshire cat.

The kit now comes with updated decals and instructions making the assembly and painting processes very easy to follow, although you will need to focus your masking

skills when it comes to painting the body. Tamiya does provide decals for the black and silver pin-striped 'shoulders' of the bodyshell, but the modeller must still apply the main white, yellow and black zones themselves, so get ready with the Tamiya Masking Tape and a fresh scalpel blade to get the sharpest possible result. Areas that in more modern kits would probably be

moulded as individual parts

– the rear wheel-arch grilles
for example – are formed
integrally with the shell, so
extra care will be needed
here to achieve a neat finish.

As I mentioned last month, the inclusion of driver and co-driver figures really brings the model to life, as well showing just how small the car was in reality. Some skills in painting faces and fabrics








will be an advantage but it's worth the practice. With prices currently very reasonable for this model, scoop up a pair and have some retro rally-modelling fun in 1:24! ●
















he Wespe, the German word for 'wasp' due to its compact size and nasty sting (firepower), was developed by Krupp as a modified version of the Panzer II. Entering service in 1942, the Wespe's primary purpose was to provide artillery support to front-line forces in a rapid and mobile manner. Equipped with a 10.5cm howitzer, the Wespe could fire effectively against armoured forces and ground targets. This vehicle was notable for its versatility and the fact that it could be used in a wide range of operational scenarios. The vehicle was designed with a lightly armoured structure, but with armour thick enough to withstand small-arms fire and small-calibre projectiles. Although it was relatively vulnerable to more powerful rounds, its hull capable of housing a 10.5cm howitzer made it an important asset on the battlefield.

The Wespe was based on a Panzer II, but with significant modifications to accommodate the main weapon. The hull was open, with little protection for the crew, making it vulnerable to enemy attacks. With a length of 4.7 metres, a width of 2.2 metres and a height of 1.6 metres, the Wespe weighed about 8.5 tons, a size that allowed it to move easily on the battlefield, while maintaining good firepower.


The engine, a six-cylinder Daimler-Benz of 140hp, gave the Wespe a maximum speed of about 40km/h, sufficient to maintain mobility in operations. The rate of fire was quite fast, with the ability to fire about ten rounds per minute.


CONSTRUCTION

For this project, I chose the Tamiya kit as the main base, integrating it with the Royal Model's upgrade set and the Aber turned aluminium barrel, high quality elements that enhance the level of detail and precision. As often happens when opting for the use of improvement sets, it is essential to carefully compare the assembly instructions of the original kit with those provided in the upgrade set, in this case by Royal Model. This step is crucial to identify the parts that need to be replaced or enhanced, thus ensuring a final result of superior quality.

Furthermore, to ensure accuracy, it is always advisable to have adequate references available. For this project, I consulted the 'Achtung Panzer N°7', a volume dedicated to the Panzer I and II. This publication, full of line drawings, proved indispensable during the detailing phase of the vehicle's radio system, offering me all the information necessary for accurate and realistic work (PICS 1 TO 4). 

PAINTING AND WEATHERING

As usual, I always start with a coat of primer applied with an airbrush, this time I used Mr Oxide Red Surfacer 1000 (PIC 5).

For the classic German yellow-sand, I created a mix of colours from the AK Real Color series. After adding white to the base colour, I lightened the areas most exposed to sunlight. Next, I applied the decals provided in the kit (PIC 6). Using an AK Interactive product, I started the aging process, starting with a filter (PIC 7) and I then applied a first colour-wash with oil-based Cassel Earth (PIC 8). With oil paints, I applied highlights to the vehicle to emphasize some key areas (PIC 9). With an acrylic paint lighter than the base colour, I highlighted details such as rivets, hinges and hooks (PIC 10). To simulate chipping and wear, I first used a sponge and then a 00 brush (PIC 11). To create a base for the mud, which always characterizes the lower parts of real vehicles, I airbrushed a light coat of Tamiya XF-52 + XF-57. •

Last year, Revell celebrated the 25th Anniversary of 'Star Wars Episode I, The Phantom Menace' with the re-release of two excellent replicas of key hardware from the film. Marcus Nicholls takes a look inside the boxes...



MOE RETURNS

ANAKIN'S PODRACER 25TH ANNIVERSARY OF STAR WARS EPISODE I, THE PHANTOM MENACE (05639)


t's quite something to think 'The Phantom Menace' was released in cinemas over a quarter of a century ago, but time flies and here we are, with numerous other Star Wars productions having come along in the intervening years. The 'new' Star Wars films (from Episode I) were met with mixed receptions from the Star Wars cognoscenti but my sons loved them when we got them on DVD and they do feature some extraordinary hardware. Two notable examples were the young Anakin Skywalker's 'Podracer' (spoiler alert; he became Darth Vader) and Darth Maul's 'Sith Infiltrator' and both a striking designs that translate brilliantly into model kits. Revell originally launched Anakin Skywalker's Podracer in their 'easykit' range in 2012 and very welcomingly, they have brought it back for the anniversary. The 'vehicle' (speeder? ground-effect aircraft?) really stood out and the oddly-scaled 1:31 model, whilst 'only' an 'easykit' is actually very nicely done with lots of potential for superdetailing with the addition of 'greeblies' on the engines,

using parts from the spares box. The little figure of Anakin is nice touch and the 'plasma coupling' is moulded in clear, ready for a coat of transparent purple to zhoosh it up. The control vanes are positionable and the box includes basic acrylic paints, Revell's excellent Contacta Professional Mini cement, paint brush and movie poster. A very attractive package that will build into a very cool Phantom Menace scene for your Star Wars display cabinet.


DARTH MAUL'S SITH INFILTRATOR 25TH ANNIVERSARY OF STAR WARS EPISODE I, THE PHANTOM MENACE (05638)


s with the Podracer, Darth Maul's Sith Infiltrator was initially released in 2012 as an 'easykit' production, and as with Anakin's machine, it's an impressive kit with some nice detail touches. Again it is at the slightly unusual scale of 1:120, not that it really matters, because it's the ideal size for a display case of modest proportions. The parts are carried on four frames of grey polystyrene, plus one in clear, a very nice decal sheet, six tubs of acrylic paints of the subject's basic shades, Revell Contacta Professional cement, a paint brush and a film poster. For such a small-scale kit, the interior of Mr Maul's cockpit is remarkably busy and once painted purple-red with the Sith Lord in his seat, it will look great, although mostly


hidden with the dome in place. Great detail all round that will come to life with some suitably creative painting and light weathering treatments.

an edge, equipped them with newer P-51 Mustangs. While most pilots enjoy the license to name their own aircraft, Lt. Bill Whisner — now flying P-51B 42-106449 — was 'compelled' by a command decision to name his Princess Elizabeth in honour of an anticipated visit to RAF Bodney by the young royal. 42-106449 would wear the moniker until it was lost

to flak on a D-Day strafing run while being piloted by Robert Butler.

THE BUILD

In a stroke of luck, a request I received for a P-51 built as Princess Elizabeth coincided with Arma Hobby's release of their new P-51B/C Mustang kits. Though I was already familiar and impressed, with Arma's kits, once the

Mustangs were in hand it was clear the company had outdone themselves.

Moulded in grey plastic, the main parts have a satiny smooth feel and smaller parts are crisply moulded with legible print/ logos moulded on the tyres and rudder pedals. The kit plastic was supplemented with a small PE fret, a masking sheet and thin,




O GETTING FIT

It's become habit for me to start every aircraft build with a full dry-fitting of the major airframe components — fuselage, wing and empennage. Not only is it an early boost to see the full form of the aircraft, it also allows me to identify and address any fit issues early, while enthusiasm is running high. In the case of the Mustang, fit issues were few and far between. Panel lines moulded across joins lined up perfectly and many parts came together with a very positive fit. That being said, I still devoted an hour or two to clean up any slight machining artefacts on mating surfaces with either a scalpel edge or rigid sanding block. Ultimately, it would prove to be time well-spent as no more than a few small dabs of CA were required to fill any joins.

INTO THE 'PIT

Between plastic and photo-etch, the Mustang's cockpit boasts in impressive parts-count of almost thirty pieces, depending on which aircraft you build. I jumped in by removing virtually all the interior parts from their sprues — aside from very smallest or those which benefited from being attached to the sprue to protect their integrity — cleaning each up as needed and grouping by colour. Once sorted, they were all primed with Mr Surfacer 1500 Black along with the fuselage interiors. The interior components were

Details were picked out with water-based acrylics, with all colours custom mixed by eye, followed by a dark oil pin-wash to enhance definition

painted their respective colours, working from custom mixes I prepared, spraying as many as possible to preserve surface and moulding quality. Details too small to airbrush were picked out by brush using colours mixed from AK3G acrylics and set aside.

Prior to painting the cockpit sidewalls, each


interior panel was sprayed with light grey, following a rough zenithal pattern radiating from the cockpit opening/glazing. Interior Green was sprayed over the sidewalls until I had a balance of good colour density while preserving the panel shading. Once dry, the sidewalls were masked off and Tamiya LP-38

Aluminium sprayed per the instructions.

I opted for the Warren McArthur seat type, assembling the pan, backrest and frame/armour plate to the cockpit floor. With the assembly securely glued, I annealed the provided three-part photo-etch harness and worked it into the contours of the seat.

The included photo-etch harness was annealed and formed to the seat prior to its installation, then painted and given a pin-wash



While nigh impossible to see once installed, legible moulded text on the rudder pedals is impressive, nonetheless

Once satisfied with the shape, I primed the belts with Mr. Primer Surfacer, followed by a light tan colour for the belts and a light grey brushed on the buckles. Definition and contour was enhanced with a brown oil wash and the belts set aside. The characteristic wear of the wooden cockpit floor was rendered with a combination of sponge chipping and dry brushing using wood-coloured acrylics.

The interior decal count is equally noteworthy, with around thirty separate placards, dials, labels and panels depending on the version modelled. Trimmed of their surrounding decal film, each was dipped each in warm water, then applied using Microset and Sol. All conformed perfectly and once under a mist-coat of Mr Hobby GX113 flat varnish, add wonderful complexity and interest to the cockpit.

To finish, the cockpit was built into sub-assemblies, a dark brown-green pin-wash applied to all recesses and details and any excess cleaned away with odourless mineral spirits. While there was no intention to weather the cockpit per se, a light application of dust-coloured oils to the equipment and fuel cell sitting aft of the pilot helped prevent it looking being a black hole through the rear glazings.

With the cockpit complete, the balance of interior components were finished as directed in the instructions and the fuselage closed up. With the fit-work done at the project outset, the majority of seams self-filled with styrene melted by the Tamiya Extra Thin Liquid Cement, with any gaps touched up with a small


beads of CA applied off the tip of a surplus airbrush needle. The joins were given time to harden up, the excess plastic and CA trimmed away and the join finished with abrasives.

WINGING IT


Work on the wing starts with the main gear well.
While nowhere near as high in parts-count as the cockpit, there is still an appreciable level of detail moulded into the sidewalls and stringers—and of course, there's the characteristic silver/zinc chromate yellow ceiling common to many Mustangs.

Deciding that a masked and sprayed approach would provide the most consistent results, I started with a base-coat of Mr Hobby SM201 Super Fine Silver. The Infini cutting template Type A was ideal for slicing strips of Tamiya masking tape to the correct widths, which I then cut into appropriate lengths and applied. Any gaps were touched-up with VMS liquid mask and surrounding areas blocked out with tape and Mr Masking Sol Neo. Together with the sidewalls, these were sprayed with my Zinc Chromate Yellow mix



Time-consuming, however, the end justifies the means. Grime-coloured oils accentuate detail and over a thin matte varnish impart some light surface staining and fluid/dust build-up.

All internals complete, the fuselage was closed up, with most joins self-filling with melted plastic. Dry-fit here, the wings would be left separate until fully finished.

Turning to the exterior surfaces of the wing, while it's well known the Mustang had the majority of its wing panel joins sanded to improve airflow, I opted to not fill the lines Arma Hobby included. The upper and lower wing halves were simply glued in the same manner as the fuselage, letting melted styrene assume the gap-filling duties and sanded to a smooth finish.

PAINT IT BLACK

While the instructions would have the fuselage and wing joined at step twenty, early dry fitting showed the potential to manage each of these as separate sub-assemblies, joining them once each was fully painted and decalled. The only caveat would be the need to dress a join crossing a small panel immediately ahead of the wing root. Easily worth it in my mind. I quickly practiced the movements I believed would be needed to fix the join and finding it more than manageable, made the decision to blaze my own trail.

Both assemblies were primed in Mr. Surfacer 1500 Black and once all joins were found to be in good shape, the primer was sanded to a smooth, dull gloss finish using Godhand sanding sponges (4,000 up to 10,000 grit). The plot starts to go off the track somewhat at this point. Long story short, I proceeded to apply Alclad metallics across the fuselage, masked up and sprayed the invasion stripes, then started removing the masking only to have everything short of the primer coming up with it. Grrr!



The full area of the invasion stripes was sprayed overall white, then the black stripes were masked and sprayed with Rubber Black



Subtle fading and tonal variation was applied to the black by spraying dark grey thinned with Mr. Rapid Thinner through a thin slice of packing foam



The finished result of the invasion stripes on the wings, dry-fit with the fuselage to gauge the effect prior to applying to the vertical surfaces



I opted to design and cut my own masks for the fuselage and tail codes using a Silhouette cutter and Oramask vinyl



While the finished result is not perfect, there's no substitute for painted markings on a natural metal finish, where decal edges can stand out like a sore thumb



The flaps part way through an oil pin-wash to define the rivets along the trailing edge - the flap on the left has been finished while the other awaits its turn



The sizeable air scoop on the Mustang's underside, combined with Arma Hobby's kit design make it a cinch to completely paint and decal the fuselage and wings as separate sub-assemblies



Trimming away excess styrene and superglue. A single, short join per side is all that needs addressing once the wing and fuselage are mated



The panel containing the join was then isolated with masking tape to protect the surrounding surface area



Infini Model's indispensable elastic sanding films, were used first over a rigid round profile to finish the seam, then over a make-up sponge to feather the surrounding paint



The right-side panel filled and blended, or so I thought... Until a coat of primer revealed a small seam still



Until a coat of primer revealed a small seam still in evidence, requiring an application of thickened primer to fill. This was then re-sanded until fully flush



Properly filled, a fresh application of primer revealed no indication of the join and the panel was polished to a dull gloss

With the fuselage down and out while being stripped and repainted, I shifted my focus to the wings. The majority of the wing surfaces were painted in Tamiya LP-38 Aluminium, the exceptions being the ailerons, flaps and the large fuel cell access panels on the underside, along with a couple centreline panels and the gear doors themselves. Forewarned by my

Experience on the fuselage, I instead sprayed these with Super Fine Silver. Fortunately, this proved to be a far more durable finish.

The entirety of the invasion stripe area was masked off and sprayed white, followed by Tamiya XF-86 Rubber Black stripes. To soften the contrast, I added a touch of fading and patina to the black. This involved using thin slices of

polyurethane packing foam, which were held by tweezers just off the model's surface. Through these, Tamiya XF-19 Medium Grey highly diluted with Mr. Rapid Thinner, was sprayed at low pressure. Constantly moving and turning the foam mask as you spray gradually builds a diffuse pattern of lighter colour.

By this point, the fuselage was back on track, having

been re-primed and sprayed an overall coat of Super Fine Silver, with other panels masked and sprayed varying shades from the Super Metallics line. The invasion stripes were similarly masked — remembering this time to mask off the area occupied by the large stars and bars that overlays the stripes — and finished in the same manner as described for the wings.





○ HO, HO, HO-W

It was at this point that I had to start planning how markings were going to be handled. The production process used by DRAW Decals imparts a slightly textured finish to their ink so I was reluctant to use any more of their decals than was necessary. While the kit-supplied decals would cover most of what I need, there still remained the HO-W fuselage/tail code. As it happens, we had recently purchased a Silhouette cutter, so I figured this was the ideal opportunity to put it through its paces. Working from the existing decals, I created new art on Adobe Illustrator and sent it to the cutter. With a few tweaks I soon had a usable file. These were then cut from Oramask, applied to the surface and sprayed Rubber Black. There's a few slight wobbles — as I would much later find, our machine had a loose fitting — but they're apparent only on very close inspection.

The balance of the markings were then applied. The DRAW Decals set ultimately provided the

Princess Elizabeth moniker, the aircraft codes on the tail and the kill markings, while the kit-supplied Techmod decals covered everything else. Both decal brands are very thin and settle down extremely well with MicroSet and Sol, to the point where any decal edge is barely perceptible over the metal finish.

COMING TOGETHER

Ahead of the finishing touches, the final major hurdle is to join the finished fuselage and wing. As expected, they come together wither without drama, leaving a short 0.5cm join on each side to fill in. Again, melted sprue filled most of the join, with a small application of CA filling any remaining gaps. Any excess was shaved away and the join finished with Infini elastic film abrasives. Once completely smooth, the panel was sprayed Super Fine Silver.

FINISHING TOUCHES

Approaching the end of the build, the outstanding elements were now dealt with. My foam masking technique was again used to impart some subtle tonality to both the prop blades and the tires — the former with a medium grey and the latter an earth brown, providing some variation to the black base colours; the resin exhausts were base-coated in black, then given a coat of Gunze Mr. Metal Color MC214 Dark Iron; and, the canopy components were masked inside and out and sprayed the appropriate colours. Once complete, the various details were added to the model over the course of

several days to allow parts to fully bond before adding the next.

FINAL WORDS

From the moment I opened the box, this felt like an exceptional kit and even now, I still feel it's my favourite project. Full of detail and free of stress — aside from that which I added — it builds into a fine rendition of the iconic P-51. With myriad aftermarket decals available, in addition to Arma Hobby's supplied schemes, I can see myself coming back to this kit frequently. •






○ ENGINE AND GEARBOX


I built both according to the instructions, but I used colours that I found in reference photos, most from the Slovak company MRP. According to the photos, I added hoses, pipes, wires, screw-heads, nuts and many details that the model does not contain. Some details are 3D printed, some purchased, mostly from the company SpotModel, which has a large selection. The products from the company TOP Studio are very nice, without which it is really impossible to detail. Ferrari engines have a beautiful variety of tones across their different parts; my years of experience with cars helped me a lot, so I could use it when weathering. For weathering I used oil paints, AMMO Mig preparations and Tamiya Panel Line Accent Colors (pics 1, 2, 3, 4).


COCKPIT AND FRONT AXLE


When building the cockpit, I followed the instructions for the model and added some detail according to the reference photos, of which there are many on the internet. I mostly added hand controls, hoses and foot pedals, followed by the assembly of the front axle and the brake system hoses. Then I glued together the power unit and the cockpit with the front axle.

REAR AXLE AND EXHAUSTS

Fitting the exhausts is a bit more challenging part of the build, especially the modification of the exhaust mounts. The mini springs on the exhaust are a very difficult matter, especially for modellers with shaky hands. This detail is worth the effort and fortunately, only one spring flew off. I added brake pipes and bolt-heads to the rear axle.











O BODY

Now we get to the body. I sanded the entire body with water, cleaned it and started testing how everything fitted together. I had to make some minor corrections, but everything turned out well. I then sprayed all the parts with MRP's White Surfacer. There were minor irregularities, so I had to fill in with Tamiya White Putty and, after sanding, sprayed surfacer again. After polishing the surfacer, it was time for paint, using Tamiya X-7 Red. After it dried, I polished the paint and applied the decals. After the decals dried, I sprayed 2K clear coat MS Optimal 600. I sprayed several layers, each about twenty minutes apart. The next day I polished everything with Tamiya Polishing Compounds. Finally, I assembled the entire model and took pictures.

I would like to thank my friend Jan Merhaut, a top Czech car modeller, for valuable advice and help in finding companies that offer many details to improve the model. •











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DACHSHUND TRACKS!

Brett Green checks out Italeri's latest addition to its 1:35 Italian AFV family, the Semovente M43 da 105/25 Bassotto 'Dachshund'

he Ansaldo 105/25 M43 was an Italian self-propelled gun designed by Ansaldo and used during World War II and it was the most powerful self-propelled gun built by Italy in numbers during the conflict. The Bassotto, modelled on the general design of the M40 and M41 predecessors, consisted of an M43 hull, i.e. the hull of a M15/42 tank widened and lowered, with redesigned front and side plates that were welded instead of bolted. A fixed casemate with an Ansaldo 105/25 howitzer was bolted onto the hull, with a traverse of 34 degrees and an elevation/depression of +22 to -12 degrees. The main armament was

complemented with a Breda 38 8mm machine gun for close and anti-aircraft defence operated by the commander/gunner, while the radio operator had one Magneti Marelli radio RF1 CA.

The first units to be equipped with the Bassotto were the DCI and DCII groups of the 235th Semovente Artillery Regiment of the 135^a Armoured Division "Ariete II". Each group received twelve units, which were used in the defence of Rome in the days following the armistice of Cassibile that went into effect on 8th and 9th September 1943. They acquitted themselves well in combat. Following the Italian surrender, the


Germans, who regarded the Semovente 105/25
Bassotto as a very good vehicle, captured them and built an additional ninety-one units, renamed StuG M43 mit 105/25 853
(I), which were used against Anglo-American forces.

ENTER ITALERI

Italeri has added a new 1:35 Semovente M43 Bassotto to their long-lived family of WWII Italian tanks and self-propelled guns and it is nice to see this powerful and well-regarded weapon available as a mainstream injection-moulded plastic kit. The kit comprises 433 parts in dark green coloured plastic on eight sprues, twenty-three parts on one photo-etched fret, a turned-metal gun barrel, markings for four vehicles, instructions plus colour painting and marking guide. The imposing parts count is not quite as sizeable as it sounds, with 108 parts marked not for use.

Of the eight plastic sprues, Sprues A and E have appeared in Italeri's 2022-release Semovente M42 75/18, Sprue B has some parts in common with the above-mentioned M42 and the rest are all-new.

The kit is presented in a nostalgic shade of 'Italeri Green'; you'll recognise it if you have built a few Italeri models in the past. Detail is crisp, moulding quality is very good and the plastic



is quite soft and easy to work with. There are some ejector pin marks on the insides of the track links and elsewhere but these will be easy to remove or ignore, depending on your personal preference. I'll probably ignore them. The model features a full interior for the fighting and driver's compartments including seats, transmission, drive shaft, ammo stowage, textured surfaces and much more. This is suitably busy and will look great after careful painting and weathering.

It is also pleasing to note that all crew and engine hatches are moulded separately, which means that all your extra work on the interior will be worth the

effort with hatches fixed in the open position. The bogies look good when finished, made up from thirteen parts each and the tracks are link-and-length with a shallow sag moulded into the long top run. Their clean-up is fast and easy and the links-and-lengths fit well; no aftermarket is required here. The only downside is that the long side skirts will hide the nice-looking track sag so you won't be able to admire all of Italeri's handiwork!

The photo-etched fret supplies jerrycan straps and other small details, which is a nice touch. Italeri includes accessories including German and Italian jerrycans, helmets and a nice turned metal 105mm gun barrel. Construction

should be straightforward. The hull and superstructure are both made up from multi-part flat-pack assemblies which ensures nice, crisply raised rivets and other surface detail on the exterior of the vehicle.

Many military vehicles are drab, but that accusation could never be levelled at the M43. Markings are supplied for two German vehicles and two Italian. All the schemes are intricate and colourful and the decals are perfectly printed by Cartograf. A number-jungle and a pair of empty number plates are supplied on the decal sheet if you want to customise your subject. The instructions are well laid out and it is nice to see full colour painting guides.

I am already well down the path of building this model and fit and alignment have been very good so far, while the link-and-length tracks go together quickly and with minimal fuss. Italeri's new 1:35 scale M43 Bassotto is a well-presented model of an interesting vehicle, and will make a suitable companion to their earlier Semovente and Italian tank kits. Definitely Recommended. Thanks to Italeri for the sample.

3D-printed kits are becoming more and more common, so what better way to show off this new technology than by recreating a complex armoured vehicle in 1:35? Welcome to Resin Scales' 1:35 Centurion AX Medium Tank...

ver the last few years or so the release of completely printed model kits has become more and more common. From simple accessories through to fully-fledged kits the equal of many injectionmoulded products, we are now seeing them as part of the hobby's mainstream, rather than mere curios on the periphery. Having already built a number of printed kits over the last few years, I was keen to

take a look at a military vehicle rather than a subject with wings, Resin Scales' Centurion more than fitting the bill.

A little while back Marcus had mentioned that he had this new 3D printed kit in the office and would I be interested in having a go at it. As it was a subject that I'd not from memory tackled before (a Centurion gun tank) and in a medium that was in terms of full kits relatively new, I jumped at

the chance, hoping to slot it into my hectic schedule at the first opportunity. Though it's taken a little longer to do than I had hoped, it's now finished so I'm in a position to show you the kit and how any modeller could get the best from it.

The kit as supplied is complete, highly detailed and in terms of construction, very simple. The production process has allowed the manufacturer to create large sections such as a

one-piece hull, turret shell and track runs, the latter split into two lengths per side, each featuring sag cover the vehicle's return rollers. Detail is exquisite, the turret basket and light guards with their meshed construction for instance, being both incredibly fine and delicate. Wheels are similarly impressive, as is the gun barrel, the latter featuring a carbon fibre tube to keep it perfectly straight. It's all very impressive!



Though the model was impressive enough from the box, I once again turned to the War Thunder game for inspiration, both in terms of details and paintwork. If I have this right, the Centurion Action X (AX) is one of their designs, so there are plenty ideas within the game for colour schemes and details. You may recall last year that I did the same thing with a Tamiya Type 90 MCV, the scheme on that being a digital camouflage rather than the bland green and brown option for on the real machine. The same thoughts came into play with this model, though this

time I was keen to push things a little further with the addition of rockets to the turret sides, something that appears to have been a real modification, taken up by players within the game.

Over the next few pages or so I will take you through some of the stages I completed during assembly and painting of the model. This is by no means an exhaustive look at Resin Scales' Centurion, but it should give you plenty of ideas should you wish to either build this kit, or something similar for your collection. With that out of the way, let us begin!




The tracks are supplied in two long sections that join at the centre point of the road wheels and suspension. You will need to carefully clean-up the castellated joints to allow them to slip together easily, the joints as is, being far too tight and prone to breakage




As with the tracks, the pin and socket joints for the wheels are virtually identical in size, so they don't slip together without using considerable force. A milling bit was used to ream out the holes for the sprockets and then each of the roadwheels, until they slipped together with ease

I initially planned to paint the wheels and tracks separately but found that fixing the tracks in place would be difficult once painted. That being so, everything was glued in place to create a completed hull and turret and then individual side skirts. Though this seemed a daunting prospect when it came to painting, it proved to be relatively easy, focus being only on areas that could be seen and not on areas that would be ultimately, hidden away











A fabric mantlet cover was sculpted using Green Stuff and a handful of silicone sculpting tools




In order to show off some of the suspension detail one of the side skirts was left off. Detail around this part of the model is really impressive, especially when the limited number of parts and simplicity of construction, is taken into account



Having decided that I wanted to add rockets to the side of the turret these had to be scratchbuilt to look similar to those seen in the drawing I was using to inspire my build. The rockets and the mounts were built using some spare missile bodies, bits and pieces from the scrap box and a few scraps of plastic card. Note as well that I used some creative gizmology to give the impression of complexity, odd parts from etched frets being useful when it came to surface detail and pipework



It was difficult to see how the rockets were mounted to the turret so some imagination and adjustments were needed until they looked correct. Power cables were added using lead wire held in place using lead foils 'clips'



And here are the rockets in place. What a difference this makes to the look of the model, eh?





The road wheels were then sprayed with XF-88 Dark Yellow 2. Once dry, the hubs were masked with disks of masking tape, the tyres airbrushed with Rubber Black and then the tracks and surrounding detail with a very dark red brown. Weathering washes and dust, would tie all of this together as painting progressed through to completion

As the finish was going to be sand with black camouflage, the model was first base-coated with Mr Surfacer Mahogany which works really well with both colours. Several thin coats were applied and then left to dry overnight







The base layer of Dark Yellow was applied over the Mr Surfacer in thin cloudy layers. The idea here was to create the illusion of light and shade across the surface of the model


smooth, opaque and free of brush strokes



Chipping was added using a sponge and some of Vallejo's very useful Camo Black Brown acrylic. This was carefully applied to edges corners and other areas, where wear would naturally occur




Having dealt with the darker chips, lighter patterns were added using AK's Dunkelgelb, thinned with tap water and then applied with a No.1 sable paintbrush



ABT 502 oil paints were used to add staining and dust layers over the surface of the model, these effects being applied gradually as weathering progressed







I love this view because it shows off those runs of streaked dirt that I so wanted to apply. You can also see here the splattered dirt that I added to the model, a future that involved nothing more complex than thinned oil paint flicked over the skirts and running gear. The use of lighter and darker shades helps to add interest and create the illusion of use over an extended period of time. Finally, note the rusty turret basket, the brass fire extinguisher and how brighter items of stowage help to differentiate those pieces from their surroundings



The exhausts were tricky to paint, being finished several times before I was happy with the results. In the end I opted to paint them with Lifecolor rust paints, dabbing on different shades using a sponge. A wash over with ABT 502 rust oils and then some earthy shades created the look you see here. The dust that you see over the rear hull was applied using the same methods you saw earlier, though here the layers were deeper and greater in number. Note the exhaust staining as well. This was applied using an airbrush and some very thin, very dark, red-brown Tamiya acrylic paint





long with the UH-1B Huey helicopter previewed this issue, the US M113 armoured personnel carrier is another icon of America's military hardware from the Vietnam War and a much-modelled subject in 1:35. Andy Klein's 'Andy's Hobby Headquarters' brand has cemented itself in scale modelling history with a line-up of AFV kits in 1:16 that are bold, highly detailed and very affordable, considering their size. Until recently, the subjects have been mostly from World War Two, but all that changed with the earth-shattering announcement of the M113A1 last year that caused my jaw – plus the jaws of many other modellers – to drop in delighted astonishment.

The creation of this kit in 1:16 was a dream come true, and is the perfect partner for Tamiya's 1:16 M551 Sheridan static display model.

1:16 might seem huge, but the M113 is a reasonably compact machine in reality, so in 1:16 it's a very manageable project that will fit nicely on the average workbench, with the hull-side measuring around 285mm (11½ inches) in length. The kit comes without an engine, which keeps the purchase cost down and opens the door for aftermarket manufacturers to step in with 3D-print replicas of the Detroit

Diesel two-stroke V6 plus its bay and associated ancillaries. The kit does come with hinged, openable engine access hatch, so it's just a matter of time that this upgrade materialises. The driver's station and crew compartment are beautifully executed however, and await a creative painting and weathering process to bring out the acres of incredible raised and recessed detail. Modellers with knowledge of electronics could add a few strategic LEDs inside to really make it 'shine' in there.

The workable suspension looks straightforward to assemble and the tracks, whilst made up from individual links, should come together quickly thanks to their two-part design. With careful cement application they will remain articulated once built up, making their fitment to the running gear a breeze and will allow the all-important upper-run 'sag'.

This is a '2 in 1' presentation, enabling the modeller to choose either the standard M113A1 or the M113A1 ACAV (Armoured Cavalry Assault Vehicle) with its distinctive bell-shaped gun turret and optional frontal buoyancy cells for the trim vane and frontal hull sides, giving the model a chunkier look. A few holes will need to be drilled to fit these parts so choose your version early and make sure you don't miss those location points as you work through the instructions.

A stunning crew figure is included, depicting a US serviceman in M-1952 flak jacket and CVC T56-6 helmet and goggles, in a standing pose, holding the handles of the included M2 .50cal heavy MG. The figure is moulded in kit plastic and will bring the model to life. Overall then, this is an significant achievement by AHHQ in conjunction with Takom and I am truly grateful for the incredible models they are creating. Expect a full-build feature in TMMI once I have managed to lift my jaw from the floor!

After previously relying on helicopters of Russian origin, after the invasion of Ukraine the country had to turn to other sources and has been operating at least two Black Hawk helicopters in the Intelligence Directorate. These are slightly modified from the standard U.S. type and are very attractive in blue or green paintwork. The kit from ICM is simply incredible, with a degree of fine surface detail that is hard to appreciate with the naked eye. The kit has no flaws in the moulding and assembles very neatly to create a rigid and stable model, with the interior easy to see and enjoy. The intricate passenger seats are very visible when the doors are open and the kit provides these in full detail. Two different instrument panels are provided for the two aircraft options and the modeller needs to decide early on which of the two will be selected. The body of the fuselage is essentially two halves, but note that the correct starboard half needs to be used from the two in the box. The modeller needs to drill out location points on the top of the fuselage for the specific antennas used on this version, but detailed measurements are indicated to get the holes in the right place. In the instruction booklet are templates for cutting the window masks and these can be made from low-tack film as desired. The thin decals are very sharply printed with good register and should go down well onto the paint surface. CLS

LEOPARD 2A7V www.revell.de and good retailers everywhere SCALE: 1:72 • MATERIALS: IM, WS • ITEM NO.03355 Revell issued their 1:72 Leopard in 2A6/A6M form in 2011 to much acclaim and so good was it, it happily forms the basis for

their new Leopard 2A7V – the latest main battle tank in the Bundeswehr's inventory – on release fourteen years later. Having said the new kit is based on the older one, a large amount of the 2A7V is actually totally new, a fact that becomes readily apparent when looking at the parts-plans at the front of the instructions. The redacted areas show how many parts have been replaced by newly-tooled ones, including new upper deck, lower hull sides, turret top half and sides, lower rear hull panel, side armour and much more besides. From sprue G, twenty-four parts are destined for the spares box with just eight used for new version; a mere seven are taken from sprue C's twentyseven or so components, with new sprues I and J carrying the updated mouldings. So, the most visible parts of the tank are the newest and the detail is especially fine in these areas. The tracks and roadwheels come from the initial 2A6 and are still well detailed (a little flash is in evidence) although the recommendation in the instructions to heat the track in hot water in order to bend it around the drive sprockets and idlers seems a little concerning. The track does seem thin enough for this to work, so let's hope they won't snap during the procedure. For the small scale of 1:72, the kit is absolutely crammed with parts - some tiny - with Revell's website stating 189 in total, but the instructions reveal a sensible approach to assembly and the kit will come together smoothly, forming an impressive miniature replica of 'the best tank in the world' for one's display cabinet. TMMI























ARMA HOBBY NAKAJIMA KI-43 II HAYABUSA

www.armahobby.com and good retailers everywhere SCALE: 1:72 • MATERIALS: IM, WS, PCM • ITEM NO.70078 The Nakajima Ki-43 Hayabusa ('peregrine falcon') was a singleengine land-based tactical fighter used by the Imperial Japanese Army Air Service in World War II. The Allied reporting name was

'Oscar', but it was often called the 'Army Zero' by American pilots because it bore a certain resemblance to the A6M Zero. The prototypes of the Ki-43-II first flew in February 1942, entering service December that year. The Ha-25 engine was upgraded with the twostage supercharger, thus becoming the more powerful Nakajima Ha-115 engine, which was installed in a longer cowling. The aircraft fought in China, Burma, the Malay Peninsula, New Guinea, the Philippines, South Pacific islands and the Japanese home islands (history edited from Wikipedia). Arma Hobby's kit of this pugnacious little fighter is all new arriving in an end-opening box filled with two grey sprues of polystyrene, a third in clear, very welcome sheet of pre-cut canopy masks. Arma has established itself as a producer of refined aircraft models and is certainly the case with the Hayabusa. Detail across the airframe is very subtle, with finely recessed panel lines across the comprising a rear bulkhead, individually formed sidewall details, throttle, rudder pedals, instrument panel with raised dial bezels and dial decals, plus clear-moulded gunsight. All the modeller must find is a set of seat harnesses in their preferred medium. The markings are for a solid green/aluminium machine of 59 Hiko-Sentai in New Guinea, 1943/44, a heavily paint-chipped green/bare aluminium aircraft of 54 Hiko-Sentai, Kuril Islands, 1944 and a striking overall bare metal Hayabusa of Hiko Dai 71 Sentai, Japan 1944. It is a lovely little kit with some very attractive features, not least of which is the sheet of canopy masks. Highly




















KIT PREVIEW

TRUMPETER 1:35 UH-IB HUEY • KIT NO.05III



Marcus Nicholls takes a look at the recently released UH-1B Huey utility helicopter from Trumpeter in 1:35

he Bell UH-1 'Huey' utility helicopter is one of those military subjects that needs no introduction from me plenty has been written about them elsewhere – other than to state it is such an icon of the Vietnam War that just the thumping sound of its rotors on approach brings to mind images of Hueys packed with GIs cruising low over rice paddies on their way into combat. Add Creedence Clearwater's 'Fortunate Son' to that soundtrack and the Mekong Delta scene is set.

There have been numerous scale models of the UH-1's various iterations released over the years by a range of manufacturers, including Tamiya, whose UH-1B in 1:100 was launched in the same year as the 'Clearwater song, 1969. But in my opinion, none of the more

modern kits in larger scales have really hit the mark when it comes to detail, refinement and arguably, overall accuracy.

In Tamiya Model Magazine, we don't currently have a great link up with Trumpeter as far as review samples go, so – and I hope you're sitting down – I jumped on the internet, credit card in hand and bought myself this kit, because I just had to have it. Having been somewhat fixated on the Huey since watching 'Apocalypse Now' many, many years ago, I took a chance with this kit hoping it would be the best yet, and from my initial inspection of the box's contents, it looks pretty good, with a few minor exceptions.

Six frames of mid-grey polystyrene carry the main parts of the model, with a clear sprue providing that famous panoramic windscreen, lower bubbles and side windows. A modestly-sized fret of photo-etched brass includes grilles and other small components and very usefully, a sheet of pre-cut, self-adhesive canopy masks is also to be found in the box.


CRITICISMS?

As mentioned, the kit looks very promising but there are a few puzzles. The boxtop artwork depicts different engine intakes to the moulded parts, the inner faces of the flight-deck doors are rather bland and there's no non-slip pattern on the cabin floor. The presence of nose-mounted antennae suggest it is an early-model UH-1B but the early machines had un-armoured seats, which came later, and not provided in the box. The arrangement

of the anti-collision lights on the tail boom is slightly off: The UH-1B had just one light on the tail fin, while the UH-1C had two anti-collision lights on the tail boom on opposing sides and no light on the fin. The kit has all three, so some modification will be needed for complete accuracy in this area.


So, in summary, a generally very appealing production with some excellent detail (although not everyone will like the recessed airframe rivets) with a few areas needing attention. But doing a little research and gathering wartime photos is all part of the modelling process and should be enjoyed, and I can't wait to get started on this new Huey.

love a highly detailed model of a competition car and a Group C machine in particular, because with the vast rear deck open, you can observe the engine and rear suspension in all their glory. Getting a model to that stage, however, takes a lot of work and it can't be hurried either, or the results can look less than optimal. Enter Tamiya, with the re-release of the gorgeous 1:24 Porsche 962C Jägermeister endurance racer which, if you remember, comes with a one-piece body moulded in bright orange with windscreen/side windows and headlight covers moulded integrally. Crucially, there's no engine, just very decent representations of the gearbox and rear structures that can be seen poking out from behind the rear diffuser. The new edition comes with a sheet of pre-cut, self adhesive masks which will be a big help when painting the body. Or, if you really want a weekend project, just leave it in its orange plastic and apply the decals. See? It is possible to build a great-looking model car without it taking weeks! Kit on sale soon.






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EDITOR'S CHOICE

Iridescent foil

I have been contemplating how to achieve the iridescent effect often seen on the optical systems of modern tanks and also on the sensor windows of UAVs and so on. While searching online I came across this stuff, which is extremely thin cellophane (or its modern



equivalent) with an intriguing iridescent effect on both sides. The key here is the foil's transparency, which should allow it to be fixed to dark surface and allow just the multi-colour iridescent finish to show. I shall do some experimentation and report my findings here!

Tamiya's 1:72 F-35B joins the 'Scale Warbird Collection' of fighting aircraft

he Lockheed Martin F-35B Lightning II is operated by the Royal Air Force's famous 617 Squadron 'Dambusters', United States Marine Corps, Italian Navy, Italian Air Force, Royal Australian Air Force, Belgian Air Force, Japan Air Self-Defence Force, and the Republic of Singapore Air Force. The kit encompasses all the astonishing detail and accuracy of its bigger 1:48 cousin, a model that was featured back in Tamiya Model Magazine Issue 339, January 2024.

The new version takes in all the design changes for the B-model, most notably that huge intake door behind the cockpit, the inner face of which is often adorned with the flag of the operating nation. Inside that door, Tamiya have recreated an astonishing amount of detail and the same is true of the '3BSM' (3-Bearing Swivel Module) engine exhaust nozzle that can be positioned in the 'hovering' mode. It is

covered in amazing detail and just needs some creative paint work to bring it to life.


Two modes can be chosen by the modeller: hovering, with open intake door, downward-facing exhaust nozzle, extended undercarriage leg struts and scissor-links, and 'landed' mode, which uses a different set of undercarriage parts in the 'compressed' configuration (with closed scissor-links) to depict the aircraft's weight pressing down on the legs: an important observation by Tamiya's designers. This is another wonderful achievement from Tamiya, and an exquisite replica of this extraordinary fighter and one of the best 1:72 kits ever created.


