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

erman manufacturer
Eicher began producing
tractors in the 1930s
and by the late 1940s
was fitting their own singlecylinder air-cooled diesel engine.
Over the years the range was
expanded and in the late 1960s
the firm introduced the sixcylinder air-cooled 66 kW (89hp)
diesel Wotan I 3018 tractor.
It remained in production until
the early 1970s.

Weise-toys' Eicher tractor is newly tooled. The tractor's largely metal and beautifully engineered with plenty of realistic working features. It's provided with a detachable front weight block and a drawbar for the rear linkage for attaching trailed equipment.

The tractor has Continental branded tyres front and rear and the front axle provides it with a realistic turning the circle. It's detailed with differential, the driveshaft running down the left-hand side of the engine, mudguards and steering ram.

At the front of the hinged bonnet there's a transparent panel, German number-plate and headlights. Lifting the bonnet reveals the six-cylinder engine. This is detailed with injection pump, filters, air cleaner and six individual fans. On the right-hand side there are two grey silencer boxes and the underslung exhaust. There's a toolbox and wheel blocks on the other side.

On the driver's platform there are patterned footplates. Clutch, two brake and throttle pedals are provided. There's also a diff. lock pedal, lever for engaging the four-wheel drive, handbrake, two gear levers and passenger seat footrest detailed. Behind the steering wheel there's the hand throttle and four dials in the instrument panel detailed. It's well laid.

At the rear the tractor's provided with weise-toys' standard two-point linkage with

a lock under the rear axle to secure it in the raised position. It's strong enough to carry an implement heavy enough to lift the front wheels off the ground. The rear end also provided with an adjustable length top link, hydraulic connectors and European style drawbar. There's also a number-plate and on the mudguards tail lights and reflectors.



Deutz D 45 06 A Tractor with Front-Loader





his D45 06 A model is the third three-cylinder Deutz 06 Series tractor weise-toys has released. Deutz made this 29.8 kW (40 hp) mid-range threecylinder tractor during the 1970s and early 1980s. It was available with two or four-wheel drive and shared parts with other tractors in the range.

Like Deutz weise-toys has based its latest tractor on the tooling used on the earlier models. Common with the

other models is the well detailed footplates, patterned seating, instrumentation panel behind the steering wheel has gauges and hand throttle. For attaching mounted equipment weise-toys has also provided its standard two-point linkage with top link. It also has Continental branded tyres, a linkage drawbar and detachable front weight block.



NC Rear Discharge Manure Spreader

BRITAINS 1:32nd Scale





here are four spreaders in NC Engineering's range of single axle rear discharge manure spreaders with capacities ranging from 7 to 13 cu metres and rated loads of between six and 12 tonnes. Britains' model has not been based on the largest machine in the range but the smaller 10 cu metre spreader. This has a rated load of 11 tonnes.

The model's well-built with metal chassis and plastic body. Other than Wiking's tractors, which need a smaller tractor drawbar pin, the drawbar Britains

has provided should fit most tractors. Also there's a well-proportioned drawbar skid that provides plenty of ground clearance when attached to the tractor. Disappointingly Britains has not provided the support for carrying the hydraulic hoses and PTO shaft. The PTO would have added to the spreader's appearance.

On the body there's patterned silver, they are not transparent, front guard and front screen.

There are also black sidelights with painted lights, an access ladder and at the rear painted tail lights provided. Inside the body

floor has the twin chain conveyor detailed. The chains are black while the slats are silver. This detailing continues on the underside but here it's not painted. At the rear the body's provided with a sliding rear door which lifts and lowers smoothly on its twin rams.

Well detailed the twin vertical spreading rotors are geared together but not driven by the spreader wheels.

Costing under £20 the spreader is a great model.

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NC Power-Tilt 314

BRITAINS 1:32nd Scale



C Engineering offers a range of dump trailers with capacities ranging from 8 to 25 tonnes in its NC 300 Series. There are eight 300 Series trailers with Britains' model being the mid-range 314 with a 14 tonne capacity. They feature a power tilt tail door which allows the trailer to be used with a tail door or open back without having to remove a hinged door.

Britains' model like its NC manure spreader reviewed elsewhere in this issue is robustly built. It has a metal chassis and plastic body. Like the real trailer the drawbar's sprung and with the drawbar eyelet provided it should fit most tractors. Britains has however not provided the hydraulic hosing or its support on the drawbar. Something easily added for anyone wanting to add the extra detailing.

For tipping the body there are two three-stage rams. Although stiff on the review model it was possible to raise the body into the near vertical position. Lifting the body also lowers the tailgate

ensuring discharge of all the

The trailer has good-looking tyres and the tandem axle allows the wheels to travel over uneven surfaces. At the rear the trailer has NC decals both on the chassis and mudguards.

Overall it's a good trailer and the ideal companion in any construction themed diorama to Britains' JCB Hydradig excavator.

eveloped in secrecy over a three-year period JCB's 10 tonne Hydradig wheeled excavator went in full production in late spring 2016. Costing around £85,000 and designed to meet construction sector needs it uniquely has the engine, a 81kW JCB T4F EcoMAX engine, and tanks in the chassis and not the upper structure. This lowers the centre of gravity improving stability, reduces the counterweight size giving it a tail swing of just 120 mm and allows the operator to see all four wheels from the driving position. Also it's possible to see the stabilisers, dozer blade and trailer hitch from the cab without the need to slew the machine. To meet transport needs it can travel at speeds of

up to 40 km/hr and has a 3.5 tonne towing capacity.

Although it's unlikely many Hydradig excavators will have yet found their way on to farms Britains' new model, costing under £28, will find a role on carpet farms. It's a good model with metal chassis, plastic boom and plastic body panels. Each stabiliser has a ram that allows each to be lifted and lowered independently. However on the review model









the rams were not stiff enough to hold the wheels off the ground. While the twin rams supporting the bulldozer blade were stiff enough to lift the wheels off the ground. There's a drawbar on the blade for towing trailed equipment.

The excavator's fitted with dual wheels and has all-wheel steering. Overall it's well-built but there was excess play on







the steering joints and the wheel position needed adjustment to ensure they were straight.

Britains has provided the excavator with a fully articulated boom with a wide working range. The boom rams are not piped but are stiff enough to position the bucket at any point over the working range. There's also a single ram to slew or offset the boom.

The cab's well detailed.
Externally it's equipped with lights, driving mirrors and a transparent warning beacon.
The beacon looks much better than the painted ones fitted on some models. Internally there's a driver's seat, controls and steering wheel sporting a JCB decal at the centre provided.
However fitting a driver is difficult as the cab door does not open.

Finally the excavator's provided with realistic decals on the boom, cab and chassis. Britains has

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Case IH 620 HD Steige 60th Anniversary

modern 1/32nd lime green Steiger to commemorate the occasion.

Ertl have chosen Case IH's top of the range wheeled tractor the 620 HD articulated tractor to base their green anniversary model on. Steiger tractors were taken over by Case IH in 1986 with the original livery disappearing in favour of Case IH's corporate red and black livery. Even the Steiger completely disappeared until it returned to the bonnet of Case IH's articulated tractors including their Quadtrac in the mid '90s. In recent years however if you're prepared to pay the pennies Case IH will more than obligingly paint you one of their tractors in Steiger green.

The model is based around the previously released Ertl Case IH 580 HD with the biggest core difference being the special livery,

and a few smaller parts picked out in colour. Whilst of the chassis parts, bonnet and axles are metal, the bulk of this model is sturdy plastic. Whilst marketed as an exclusive model, this is nearer being a toy than a highly detailed piece of precision engineering.

The decals too are clear and crisp down the side of the bonnet. Other details picked with the paint brush are the cab mounted GPS receiver,

now and don't contain all that much detail. The bonnet unsurprisingly doesnt open to reveal any engine detail, and conatins some primitive indentations to replicate the grills. The plastic exhaust system and air cleaner looks accurate and does lead us onto a slightly more detailed cab.

Outside the cab is neatly glazed with the windscreen wipers picked out in black, additional work lights also feature along with a GPS receiver and warning beacon. Inside the cab the full armrest of controls are included although the model lacks detail around the steering column and seating area.

The rear linkage all in plastic is typical of most big articulated tractors using a fast hitch and hook system to attach, lift and lower any mounted and semi mounted equipment.

Whilst accurate in representation with moving parts, it's not especially detailed being held together with some not-so-subtle silver rivets and

detailing around the exhaust system in silver, warning beacon and rear mudguard lights. The remaining lighting across the front grill cab roof and light bar across the top of the rear mudguards make use of printed graphics to distinguish them. They look ok, but not especially realistic.

The model is shod on chunky hard rubber dual wheels on the standard and very basic Britains and Ertl rims which have been around for while

isn't compatible with any matching implements unless you had the skills to modify any existing larger 1/32nd scale equipment that are available. Completing the rear of the tractor is a swinging drawbar but again this is screwed to the rear half of the casting and remains solid.

The remaining functionality comes within the steering which is relatively fluid thanks to two metail rams forming the articulation

joint, and these work very well.

For fans of articulated tractors looking for an exciting and exclusive display model in the iconic Steiger lime green livery look no further. However i've no doubt some will be put off by the high price tag of £75 for something that is to all intents and purposes more of a toy than a precisely detailed model.





Renault 145.14 ACA Chartres Show Edition

Replicagri 1:32 Scale



ollectors harbouring a desire for a dual wheeled version of Renault's 145.14 with a little more detail than Britains '80s classic toy can finally rejoice. Replicagri who have produced a whole host of wonderful classics from the



likes of International have added to their fine fleet Renaults with this top of the range TX14 model.

Following on from their excellent 120.14 released at the beginning of last year, and later TZ54 series models Repliagri have made a very fine job of replicating the top spec dual wheeler especially for the annual ACA Chartres Show this year.

Renault launched it's TX14 range in the mid '80s with the 145.14 topping the range. The entire range of six cylinder tractors were fitted with 6.2 litre MWM engines with the 145.14 turbo charged to produce 135hp.

First and foremost Replicagri have got the colour and paint finish

correct on this model. Something Britains was unable to accomplish with it's toy version. The light orange paint adorning the bulk of the body work stands out very well from the cab frame, linkage, wheel hubs and weights that have been painted in the correct dark brown. The graphic and lettering too have been printed very precisely.

Given that this model is loaded in detail and moving parts in areas such as the cab, it's perhaps slightly disappointing that Replicagri neglected not provide the model with any engine detail or realistic side panels. Instead they gone

the lighting, and other extraneous features such as the window wipers, and mirrors whilst delicate, are well constructed and accurate. Inside the cab with find the correct two tone grey and green paint scheme whilst the controls too are a correct representation of the real machine. 
Moving to the rear of the model, the wings and extensions are very neat with the external hitch buttons painted onto the right hand side, whilst the left is reserved for the number plate which sadly on

down the easier and arguably more cost effective route of producing complete cast of the chassis and engine area completely diminishing the detail of the engine covers. Whilst the side mounted exhaust, lights and pre- cleaner have neatly situated on the separate bonnet and front cowl this is a mere token gesture to an area of the model that deserves more detail than it has.

The cab is the stand out feature of this model. Opening doors with realistic handles are provided,

my example has excess glue all around the side of it. The rear hitch is standard Repliagri with the lower links moving on a pair of plastic rams whilst the top link is provided separately. Whilst this means basic implements for use with Britains style two point hitches are incompatible, there are plenty of other realistic machines out there that do fit, and the tow hitch means there is no issue with trailed implements either.

In terms of other areas of functionality, the model steers freely

and correctly and also comes with a set of removable dual wheels for the rear. These clamp neatly into the edge of the rear wheels fitting snugly and securely. The clamp is very similar to the ones produced by the likes of Franquet in France.

Overall this is a great looking model, pleasing on the eye with loads of great cab detail, a smart rear hitch, and accurate steering axle. It's just a shame they didn't provide some engine detail and proper covers with the original

base model. At £55 and being a limited edition show model this still represents good value for money too. Well worthy of a place in any classic tractor fan's collection.

ince the days of Airfix producing the now famous and very collectable Ferguson TE20 Tractor kit, modeller's have often pondered the possibility of a new lease of life being injected into the concept of producing a Ferguson TE20 in kit form. Some rumoured that Airfix would reignite their historic

jewel in their archives but the limelight has been somewhat stolen by French model kit maker, Heller. Heller are not new to tractor kit stardom. Some of you may remember the Massey Ferguson 2680 Bobcat kit produced in the 1980's. Of the same scale, this was a decent item and possibly does not receive the plaudits that it deserves. So, nearly 30 years on and Heller are back with a tractor kit. The question is, what do we think of it?

128 parts are nearty packed into an attractive box advertising the 'little grey' tractor. Naturally, as the kit is French, modeller's have the

option of two builds. The standard Ferguson or the french built FF30. In addition, users can adopt a

swept exhaust system which can simulate further versions of the model in terms of engine spec.







here did not leave too many debilitating features on the parts.

Our kit builder for the model was generally positive about his experience. He suggested time is of the essence though and you will need to set yourself plenty of it with this somewhat tricky built however beginners should not be put off by the complexity. There was a suggestion from him that the instructions in places are actually not quite right or misleading so common sense should take over at







this point. Namely at step 32 when dealing with wheel assembly. Our builder also commented that the tractor is designed (by a Frenchman) so to equip the kit for left hand drive, you will need to tweak the parts positioning slightly. for the rear mirror. He was slightly disappointed by the headlight decals and noted how delicate the rear hitch assembly is. Being a notable expert at kit building, our modeller also added additional functionality to the kit by making the front bonnet lift and close to reveal the engine detail. We do suggest you do not worry about this though if you're an inexperienced builder.

Lastly, on the kit shown here, the tractor parts are painted. Although the parts supplied in the kit come in a fairly authentic grey, a touch of paint tends to the lift the model slightly higher in terms of authenticity.







Tractor MO-Miniatur 1:32 Scale

erman model manufacturer MO-Miniatur have developed a glowing reputation in recent years for producing a fine array highly detailed resin cast range of classics largely centred around 1/32nd Steyr tractors from the '80s.

Whilst functionality, and playability is very low on their list of priorities when producing a model, attention to detail is most certainly at the very top when they produce a model. Not easy given the material they choose to build their 1/32nd scale master pieces with. Resin cast models are notoriously difficult to refine and produce a clean and smooth finish, something that other manufacturers both large and small have found out over the years.

For their latest 1/32nd scale offering MO-Miniatur have teamed up with Swiss model distributers FM-Modellbau to produce Swiss manufacturer Hurlimann's flagship H-6160 tractor from the late '70s / early '80s especially to commemorate the company's 50th Birthday.

The H-6160 was top of a 4 model range of tractors introduced by Hurlimann in 1979 alongside sister

companies Same and Lamborghini. Powered by a 160hp 6.8 litre 6 cylinder water cooled diesel engine the same motor and many other components were used in the almost identical Same Hercules 160, and Lamborghini 1556. The tractors remained in production until 1983.

Using resin as the main building material for the model means the entire chassis, axle housings, and trumpets, front weight block, and hydraulic services are cast as one complete block. Despite this there's plenty of detail carved into the weight block, some rudimentary but none the less

accurate engine detail exists, and the continental style hitch has been clearly picked out at the rear.

The remaining major components of the model, again resin cast have been neatly glued to the rest of the chassis, including lots

The bonnet has been beautifully crafted to incorporate all of the classic early '80s Hurlimann lines right down to the embossed strike through and badge on the front grill. The lights whilst painted on still look accurate and in keeping with the rest of the model. Other extraneous parts here have been modelled very precisely including the engine's ribbed exhaust.

Moving onto the cab, the 1/32nd scale version Mo-Miniatur produced includes all of the styling cues associated with the real deal, from the four cornered lights to the delicately attached mirrors and windscreen wipers. Whilst the cab is fitted with period tinted and smoked glass, this isn't an excuse not to include any internal cab detail. Shine a light in there and it's all there.

The mudguards and floor pan are another separate part to the model and include the correct black mudguard extensions complete with painted lights. The rear linkage whilst primitive and placed ina fixed position is all there, and very well detailed with many of the parts picked out with the paint brush

and the paint finish is excellent.

If your an avid collector of high horse power classics wanting a genuinely exclusive display model, and not remotely concerned by

to heighten the sense of detail.

The wheels and rims are equally superb right down the highly detailed front hubs and lugs on the rear wheels that attach the centres to the rims. They're absolutely spot on and another highlight of this model. The Hurlimann, and model number graphics too have been recreated very accurately,

playability this model cannot be ignored. At £130 it's not cheap, but hurry their might not be long left to acquire one of the 300 that has been produced through the FM-Modellbau website.



Museum Edition

Ertl 1:32 Scale

t's back! Having being discarded from the Britains catalogue a couple of years ago badged as the 3588 and marketed as an £18 toy-cum-model sister company Ertl have resurrected the 1.32nd scale Snoopy

and reincarnated it as the 3388.

Released by Ertl as a Prestige edition model for the National Farm Toy Museum the 3388 commands a much higher price as result, a hefty £60 for something outwardly identical to the original toy. For that you get the NFTM 2017 lettering

printed on the sun roof and that's about it.

Other differences to the original Britains release include red cab interior compared the tan of the original. A towing eye instead of a hook reducing

it's functionality further, and a warning triangle sticker which wasn't

present on the original either.

That said this is still a wonderful model to look at. The glowing red paint finish is superb, and the printed graphics are clear and crisp too. The bulk of the model including the main chassis, bonnet, and cab roof is of rugged metal whilst smaller details such as the link arms, exhaust system, lights and cab detail are all in sturdy plastic.

The chunky super single tyres look purposeful on the excellent and very realistic rims with the wheel nuts and bar axle picked out in both black and silver. As with the original model

because of the towing eye too.

It doesn't get any better when it comes to the steering capability of the model. As with every other variation of this model produced the plastic concertina that mimics the joint cover on the real tractor is made of stiff plastic and as result the model is great for ploughing straight, but not much else. It certainly won't sit in a steerable position.

This model just like the original 3588 really looks the part, and ultimately is a great representation of the real 2 + 2 Snoopy design.

But, it lacks any form of functionality, and this latest release despite being dressed in a Prestige box, with it's National Farm Toy Museum heritage

is still based around an £18 toy with a bit more detail. People with the original will perhaps struggle to justify the £60 price tag. But if you're like me who loves collecting

classic articulated tractors, and has a bit of a soft spot for International tractors, it's another excuse to add another Snoopy to your collection that you simply must have.

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the front half of the bonnet slides forward to reveal the beating heart of the 3388, a nicely detailed version of International's 7.1 litre engine. Some of the engine's features have also been painted including the oil filter.

Moving to the cab the major features look neat and in proportion.

features look neat and in proportion.

The steering wheel feature's a steering knob, and the seat also comes equipped with a moulded and painted seat belt. As with the original model the 3388 comes fitted with a rather cheap and tacky looking plastic three point hitch. As result anyone wishing, or wanting to display any implements



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Red & Blue Zetor **Crystals**

niversal Hobbies third instalment from it's six cylinder Zetor Crystal releases is arguably the most iconic and well known version it has released. The 2wd 12011 in orange and gold. For collectors in the UK this will be the most appealing of the three models of this tractor. Throughout the 70s Zetor's four

cylinder 2wd 8011, and six cylinder 2wd 12011 provided economical power with ample levels of comfort and features for many

livestock farmers in the UK including hydraulic dry disc brakes, open centre hydraulics with lower link draft control, and their own air supply.

Universal Hobbies have done an excellent job at accurately recreating the orange and light gold livery on this model including picking out the mudguard and cab rubber in black. The overall paint finish just like the first two versions is superb.

The 12011's rear wheels return to having the solid centres of the museum edition without the wheel weights of the blue second edition. Cab details, dials, and external features such as the lighting, mirrors, and windscreen wipers have once again been individually picked out

and carefully added to the model in robust plastic. The grills on both the front of the tractor and side panels also replicate the real version and are sharply painted in silver.

Aside from the livery change the biggest difference between this version and the previous two releases is 2wd axle. In keeping with the rest of the model the axle is very accurate, and the build quality is fantastic too. The round bar front axle offers some degree of steering function and whilst not actually suspended it is modelled to represent the suspension fitted to the real machine. As with the 4wd versions front mudguards are a key feature and on my example

do allow the tyres run freely. The tyres themselves are made of soft rubber with realistic tread pattern.

The dished rims too, accurately portray the six stud hubs.

Whilst the other issues of hitch compatibility from the first two releases remain, Universal Hobbies have still produced a fantastic set of six cylinder Zetor Crystal models culminating for the time being with the 2wd 12011 that would look both at home in a display cabinet or in a scenic display. They're all wonderfully well finished and offer great value for money. I certainly wouldn't complain in the slightest if we saw more models released based upon this casting.

Blue Version

As previously mentioned Zetor launched the Crystal in 1969 as part of the "Unified Two" (UR2) series of tractors that were built and shared parts by both Zetor and Polish manufacturer Ursus with the 6 cylinder 12045, and 12011 beingh launched in 1974.

Principle difference of the first release which was based exclusively on the 12045 that exists in Zetor's heritage museum at their factory is the colour scheme. Gone has the exotic vibrant orange, yellow and white livery replaced with an arguably much more subdued but none the less accurate and crisp blue and light grey livery. This paint scheme whilst not common to the UK is representative of the region it was produced for in it's native Czechoslovakia.

Other key differences from the original release are the lighting


arrangement at the front of the tractor and the addition of a pair of very accurate wheel weights attached to the solid rear rims. In place of the out board lights from the museum version are Zetor's iconic embossed in board lights with the Zetor lettering in the centre of them. The lights themselves are individual plastic examples very neatly positioned on the model.

In keeping with the original release all of the cab details, pedals, seats, and controls have been beautifully picked out in sturdy plastic along with the very well crafted front wheel centres and front fenders too.

As mentioned in my review of the first edition of this model, it's biggest let down is the rear hitch which lacks compatibility with any mainstream mounted equipment. A period silage trailer or slurry tanker would look great however

wheels on my example run freely and overall build quality is superb.

perhaps won't be as popular with some collectors, it's still a great looking model of a '70s classic worthy of a place in any classic era display or collection, and at just shy of £50 offers great value for money.











Allis Chalmers vs Allis Chalmers Chalmers

Model Farmer looks at the 1/32nd scale Allis Chalmers articulated tractors that Ertl released earlier this year based on previously released castings. We highlight the key differences between the models.

Back in 2001 Ertl released in association with Toy Farmer a basic but bold and vibrant model of Allis Chalmers's Steiger based 440. 7 years later we saw Ertl produced a much higher detailed limited run of Allis Chalmers 7580 models for the National Farm Toy Show. A tractor that was developed originally in house by Allis Chalmers themselves.

As with many previous Ertl articulated tractor castings they're both back having been re-released

in period Allis Chalmers liveried open fronted boxes priced at a perfectly acceptable £35 each. The question is given that from a distance they outwardly look absolutely identical are they worth adding to a collection of articulated model tractors if you own the original releases. They're a number of subtle differences as we will now discover.

Starting with the smaller 440 it's very clear that sat alongside the original, the newer version is a

darker orange than the first release.
Other details such as the exhaust tops, and lights picked out in silver and black on the first release remain unpainted in the newer

version. 2-0 to the old one then.

However the newer 440 has been fitted with a towing hook making it much easier and a more functional prospect to yoke trailed equipment to it compared to the older examples ring hitch. The tyres too look much realistic on the new model having

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being sourced from the 7580 we will look at too. Whilst the original realistic rims have made there way onto the hubs remain from the original even

more realistic clamped duals and 440 from the 7580 too. The model looks so much better for them too.

The two versions of the 7580 are very much chalk and cheese. As has previously been the case, we see the National Farm Toy Show version loaded with extraneous details attached to the casting including a rear 3 point hitch, wing mirrors and lighting as well as a host of warning decals and individually painted parts. The newer release as we have seen so often before comes equipped with none of these items but does include a towing hitch for trailed implements.

The same darker orange livery seen on the 440 has also been used.

For collectors of articulated tractors these models will be a must. They're bright, vibrant and contain that wonderfully basic Ertl charm that harks back to the articulated tractor toys they produced in the '80s. There's enough differences to make them look great lined up with the original releases, the addition of towing hooks gives them an extra element of functionality. They're great value for money too at £35 each.








Scratch Build: Roadless 98


Model Farmer features this wonderful scratch built tractor model from FTF Member Tabmodels. Using an old Britains Ford 7600 (pre Q cab) chassis, this marvellous Roadless machine is born!

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Farm Diorama Focus: Ja



Here we have a diorama showing the conversion of cord wood into logs by various methods.

Overview of the diorama

The left hand side of the layout represents a farm that is focused on firewood production with a stock of cord wood. The diorama shows the conversion of cord wood into logs by various methods; timber going into billets which are bundled, alternatively the cord wood is directly processed using a firewood processor with associated Log deck into vented 1m³ bags for seasoning.

The diorama shows 2 distinct stacks that would typically be the last years seasoned stock going to be sold and the freshly filled bags stored to allow the seasoning process to happen. The oversized timber is shown sawn into rings, split and loaded directly into a trailer. Once the bundled billets are seasoned they are sawn into the required log length and are shown loaded to a traditional 3-4 ton farm trailer. Bagged deliveries

are made using a Ford transit and a larger flatbed truck. I have managed to capture all these processes in the log yard area of the diorama.

In front of the farm house I have represented a tree surgery company removing conifers, chipping them and a controlled tree removal by the road with the timber winch attached to the top of the tree whilst it is sawn to ensure it falls

away from the road and walls.

The middle of the layout shows a scrap yard with bays at the back to provide segregation of waste types, in the yard there are several working skip trucks and plant equipment. In the front area there is a typical garage with 2 bays, 1 fitted with a vehicle lift and internally the garage is equipment with fixed equipment, benches and tools etc.

Below you will see the scrap yard component of the layout.





The right hand side is a traditional hay harvest scene.

I'm trying to develop perspective into the layout with smaller scales in the rear, starting with a yard area behind the hay field in 1:87 scale, the the grey Ferguson T20 road to the left is tapered to enhance this effect. I need to replicate the tapered road effect on the central road and position smaller scale vehicles to the rear section of the road. I have also started to create a back drop board and this needs

a) The Firewood processor complete with Log deck,

b) Timber Winch with the rope attached to the large conifier,

c) Saw bench behind

d) Timber chipper (Timberwolf styling) behind the unimog, the chipper is based on a Britains sankey trailer chassis.

2) There are a few vehicle based modified items such as:



a landrover on the right hand side road, this is based on the siku 1:87 chipper moulding and mounted on a modified Britains Sankey trailer chassis

My Buildings

- a) Brick and Tile House, but this is not complete the windows are an ongoing project,
- b) The large span Portal frame shed, is of steel construction complete with sheeting rails.
- c) The Dutch barn,
- d) The grey garage fully clad portal frame building with lower concrete block walls and roller shutter doors.

Other scenery builds:

- a) Fuel Tank on support structure at side Left side of dutch barn,
- b) Weighbridge,
- c) Air compressor and receiver at side of Garage, receiver to be painted light blue, behind the VW camper,
- d) Approximately 100 off 1m³ vented log bags all hand made including
- e) 1m³ bundles of 1m long billets of timber most are stock in the dutch barn and are not visible.
- f) Large amount of scaled split logs.

Other items of note:

- a) A yellow Bomford labelled tractor mounted large horizontal splitter is a Ebay purchased scratch built item, b) The Ertl John Deere 3140 with OPU cab is quite rare (I actually have a 4WD John Deere 2040 with the OPU Sekura cab so getting this model was of particular interest to
- c) Mixed scale with 1:87 model in back right hand corner to create perspective to the layout, this theme of smaller scales will be continued across the back section of the layout, as well a the odd 1:50 item in the front area.
- d) The hay and haylage scene has straw coloured bales rather than hay coloured, another item sitting on the to do list.

I work away from my home for long periods of time and only get limited time to physically work on the development of the layout, whilst away I do some vehicle builds and I'm currently working on another 1:32 Airfix Mini in a none standard Orange and Black livery and I also have a 1:32 Revell Unimog to build and be part of the Tree Surgery companies equipment located in the front scene in the future.

to be extended behind the right hand side log yard area again with smaller scale items in the rear fields.

The layout started out based on several 1200 x 600 mm boards. The roads and back area are 1200mm long but with reduced width and the overall layout is approximately 2.9m wide and 1.8m front to back at the moment.

1) I have a few unique scratch build items I have made such as:



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New Holland 8070 has had a lot of work and weathering done to the engine bay and is earmarked for more detail in this area over the winter.



UH Massey Ferguson has had little work done to her bar the doors on the header bin and some weathering. Harry is intending to do some research on this combine if he can find the real thing to clamber all over and photograph (more fun than Googling he says finding the real machine and meeting the owners)



Britains NewHolland TR85 didn't quite make it for this years harvest,Harry is still not happy with the engine bay, the grain bin and has decided to change the tyres at the rear.



Britains John Deere T670i will be revamped at the rear end and more detailed and realistic tow bar added.







Harry's latest project is a Case 2188 Combine. A lot of work has gone into the engine area and with still more work to be done, unfortunately she will not be ready in time for this years harvest photographs.





As well as more detailing work on all his combines, Harry told us he intends to separate as many combines from their head's and build as many header trailers a possible over the winter months. He will be kept very busy. Harry features his models on Facebook regularly and has mad lots of new friend's in Italy.


