

Since we returned to the Vintage Model Tractor Market place a year or so go, a steady stream of modellers have either returned to us, or have become our new customers and friends. Young and old, many of you have explored our website, not only from Britain and Europe, but also from as far afield as Wisconsin USA. Some have ordered straight away, whilst others have asked questions, or entered into email conversations before taking the plunge. Feedback to date has all been positive. Initially, we started the ball rolling, by producing subtly improved versions of the I/32 scale tractor kits we launched in the I980s.

Before we could finish an all new model, and due to considerable public demand, our latest release is a reworked version of our original Standard Fordson in 1941 or 1944 form. It comes now with either rubber tyres or steel wheels, along with a host of other tweaks.

We have learnt from feedback that customers would prefer to have their models ready assembled and customised to meet their needs. So from 1st March, 2022, our models will only be available ready made and ideally collected from Tynemouth or a suitably arranged place. Postage, no matter how carefully packaged will be at the buyers own risk.

1936 Ferguson Brown Model A

The first true production Ferguson tractor, featuring their 3 point linkage, was produced for them by David Brown. This model is no longer available.



1937 John Deere Model B

Introduced in the mid 30s, the originals were referred to as "Unstyled". It came in 3 forms, Tricycle (Paired front wheels), BN Single front wheel, or BW, with a wide front axle. Choose solid or spoked wheels, and optional mudguards. The driver featured is available separately.



1943 John Deere Model B

This second version from the early 1940s was essentially the same tractor but with modernised tinwork, hence "Styled". It also came in 3 forms, Tricycle (Paired front wheels), BN Single front wheel, or BW, with a wide front axle. Choose solid or spoked wheels, and optional mudguards. The driver featured is available separately.



1941 & 44 Fordson N

A reworking of our original 1976 kit. This depicts the Fordson N tractor in its early or late WW2 form, as supplied to farmers by the WarAg committees during the war. Available with either Wide or Narrow mudguards, its green livery was apparently for camouflage. Available on steels or rubbers, with low silencer or vertical exhaust and lots of additional detail.



This will be reviewed in the next issue along with the New Holland FR780 forage harvester which comes with both maize and silage pickup heads. Britains

Not all the planned 2021 releases from Britains made it last year, with many of them now expected in the next twothree months. Some of the new items are reviewed in detail this issue, while we can still look forward to the John Deere 7R 350, 8R 370 and 8R 410 tractors, Ford TW20 and a muddy version of the Landrover Defender, all in 1/32 scale. Other 1/32 scale models coming later this year include the John Deere X9 1100 Combine harvester, Massey Ferguson 6S.180 tractor, New Holland T8.435 Genesis and T6.180 Blue Power tractors, JCB 3CX Sitemaster Plus backhoe loader, New Holland 1290 Plus Big Baler and Kane Tri-axle silage trailer. There are also some re-issues including a Kane 16 tonne grain trailer, land roller, Kverneland Plough and NC rear discharge manure spreader.



ROS

It has been a busy time for Ros who have been producing a number of limited-edition models of New Holland tractors with the imminent release of two new models, the Claas 850 Axion tractor and the Kuhn Espro 6000RC seed drill, both models produced in 1/32 scale. The Claas tractor is also being released in a limited edition run of 1000 pieces for Claas as the 870 Axion.



USK Scalemodels



AT Collections

We are still waiting for the Volvo excavator models announced what seems like an eternity ago from AT Collections and while they are likely to turn up within the next four-five months, AT Collections are busy behind the scenes with a number of new projects in development. As the prototypes are finished and photographed, details of the models will be unveiled. So far, four new 1/32 scale models have been announced and will be available in the second quarter of 2022, a Dewulf Structural 30 P trailed three-row belt planter and three Miedema replicas, the MC 980S belt conveyor, ME 100 elevating conveyor and a MH 240 receiving hopper. Last year, Schuco announced a number of new models in both 1/18 and 1/32 scale including die-cast replicas and resin models, some of which were delivered during 2021 with many still waiting to be released. First up is the 1/16 John Deere 620 Tractor with 555 plough from their Precision series due in June, with a number of new releases in the Prestige series, consisting of a 1/16 730 tractor with towed grain drill, 1/32 scale 9R 540 wheeled and 9RX 590 tracked tractors, 1/32 7R 330 row crop tractor with dual rears and three 1/64 scale releases of the John Deere 9R 640 with duals all-round, 9RX 640 tracked tractor and 7R 330 with front and rear duals.

Tractor 'RUSSELLS Centenary'

ccording to Russells, they took inspiration from an iconic Ford 7810 silver jubilee tractor to create a limited edition run of the 1/32 New Holland T6.180 tractor in a blue and silver decoration with blue printing of the logos and 100 years details. Universal Hobbies have done a great job in realising the model which is now available to order. The blue coloured chassis contrasts well with the silver bonnet and cabin. At the front, folding arms on the linkage reduce the length, while fold down to accommodate implements. The front wheels steer, all wheels are freely rotating and the rear linkage is adjustable. The cabin interior in fully kitted out, with all the various levers modelled and highlighted with blue handles. Exterior cabin details include grab rails, screen wiper, side mirrors, a pair of amber beacons and roofline work lights with painted lenses. The Russells logo is printed at the top of the front windscreen with 100 printed on the rear fenders. &

VERDICT



I've been building 1/35 armour models since the 1990s and two years ago, I decided to try other genres using similar modelling techniques. Among other kits acquired for experiments, I bought a Hasegawa 1/35-scale Hitachi ZW100-6 Wheel Loader (ref. 66004). It was not my first construction vehicle (see for example my MiniArt 1/35 Lanz Bulldog build in Model Farmer issue 6), but the first one to be both modern and in 1/35 scale. Initially I wanted to finish it as an entirely civilian, out-of-the-box model, but became inspired by an older MIG Productions resin model of their military wheel loader with add-on rusty armour plates, so my plans changed.

he kit itself is okay with no major fit issues, although there are way too many ejection pin marks that are noticeable and needing of attention. The last one was only noticed after the base colour had been applied, so I had to fill it in and repaint the area. The plastic itself is fine and the parts fit well. They are moulded in several different colours so look rather toy-like before the base coat is applied. Rubber hydraulic hoses are included in the box which is a nice addition with the treaded tyres also made of rubber. To date, there are no resin aftermarket wheel kits to replace them.

The armour plates were cut from plastic sheets and engraved photoetched plates by Aber. The bolts come from one of the many Masterclub's nuts and bolts sets, a cheap and useful accessory for a variety of subjects. Several weld seams were made from stretched sprue, textured with thin glue and a modelling knife. I added headlights on the roof, taken from an Elf kit with superb reflectors. The door handles were not fitted as they would otherwise interfere with the armour plates. The last addition were the tire nipples, lacking on most wheeled vehicle kits, made from stretched sprue to finish off the model.

The Hasegawa decals were a real disappointment, being so bad that some of them dissolved in the water, and those that didn't added silvering that I couldn't fix with varnishes and Micro Set/Sol. Sticking them to clear parts was almost impossible, so I just painted the respective areas with acrylics.

I really liked how the various features of the original have been implemented, from the moving hydraulic cylinders for the loader arms and bucket to the articulating chassis and oscillating rear axle. It was also handy that the kit can be easily disassembled into sub-assemblies for easier painting and weathering.



I started with airbrushing the base coat. My plan was to weather the loader and the dark brown colour would imitate rust. The interior was airbrushed with grey, again using Tamiya acrylics.





The chipped and scratched paint finish was achieved using the hairspray method, airbrushing one or two coats of AK Interactive Worn Effects (AK088) chipping fluid and letting it dry for several minutes. I then sprayed a layer of yellow Tamiya acrylics and after several more minutes, I dampened the model with water and began removing the yellow layer with brushes and other tools, exposing the rust patches, chips and scratches. This method is never very precise or totally controllable (at least in my case) but you can get to the rusty look rather fast. It's better to do that in sub-assemblies than on the entire model at once.

Speaking of colour, the photos show that Hitachi vehicles are mostly painted in orange, but I thought that yellow would contrast better with rusty add-on armour. It wasn't a completely accurate build, and I used some artistic license along the way.

The resulting wear and tear were not precise enough, so I used Vallejo acrylics to fix that using fine brushes and a sponge. Once the tedious process was finished, the model was covered with Tamiya Clear (X-22), diluted heavily with alcohol to obtain a satin finish. The smooth surface helps me to deal with decals, oils, enamels and pigments.



Decals were applied next, using Micro Set/Sol products. I did the best I could, but it must be said that Hasegawa's decals are inferior to the MiniArt decals I had applied on the Lanz tractor.



The interior will be barely visible with the cabin pretty much closed in by the armour plating, so I didn't invest too much effort in weathering it. Dry brush, wash and pigments was enough to get the job done.



A good wash is essential to make the model look truly threedimensional and emphasize the small details and panel lines. With the acrylic base, you can use any product that you like, be it branded enamel washes by AK Interactive, AMMO, Tamiya or others or simply a tube of good oil paint with some added enamel thinner. A mix of brown and black was the correct colour in this case. Oil blending was next. I learned this trick in the last few years and since then, I really enjoy this meditative process. There's no rush here as oils dry really slowly when compared to acrylics. AMMO Oilbrushers are faster than artistic oils, but the idea is the same. You have a lot of time to blend them, and you can easily remove them if you don't like the result. Artist's oil paints must be placed on a piece of cardboard and left for some time to let the cardboard absorb the linseed oil. Oilbrushers work well without the cardboard.

I use a fine brush to put small amounts of oil paint on the model, giving it a few minutes before I start blending it with a cheap, small, round or flat brush that is almost dry. The trick here is to get the proper amount of thinner on the brush. It must not be wet, just a little damp. I remove 99% of the thinner with a paper towel for that purpose. Using this method, I added fake shadows around the details and made slight gradients. Dust and grime can also be done this way. Feel free to experiment with various colours. In this case I used dark greys and browns, yellows, orange and even purple!





Some rust was added using AMMO Enamel Light Rust Wash (A.MIG-1004). This is one of my favourite rust products that give a nice texture to the finish. You can also try other branded rust products or oil paints.



Dust and mud on the lower parts of the chassis were done with enamel and acrylic products. I started with AK Interactive Brown Earth Deposits (AK4063) by generously applying it on the lower parts. Once it had dried, I wiped off the excess. Then I speckled more AMMO enamel and Vallejo acrylic mud effects.



Streaks were applied using several colours of oil paints.



The exhaust pipe was treated separately in a similar way to the add-on armour before applying some yellow over a layer of hairspray. The black exhaust was first airbrushed and then improved with black pigment.



White markings were mostly painted with acrylics using a fine brush with shorter bristles, bought from the shop for makeup products. The numbers were taken from leftover MiniArt decals.



Painting rubber or vinyl wheels is never fun for me as the paint tends to peel off after some time. A fellow modeller advised me to ignore the painting step and apply weathering products directly onto the surface which works fine!



Rusty add-on armour was painted in overall dark brown together with other parts before a brighter rust was sprayed with AMMO acrylics.



Here and there, I sprayed light blue over a layer of hairspray product, followed by speckling of more rust tones from AMMO and Vallejo acrylics to achieve a much richer texture.




Unpainted weld seams look great when you have some burn marks around them. I airbrushed black around the weld seams and then painted the seams with a fine brush which resulted in the nice contrast of shiny metal, burnt areas and overall rusty background.



One of the engraved plates was painted in green and then received some rust over it. Most of the other plates received some streaking using oils.



Use of the hairspray technique for imitating wear and tear. AK Interactive Worn Effects and Tamiya acrylics were used.



Weathering the bucket was very challenging for me. And, frankly speaking, I'm not totally satisfied with the result. Anyway, here are the steps starting with bright rust over the dark brown base.





Not being satisfied with the progress, I changed the inside of the bucket to a darker metallic look with some dust. Heavy dust streaking was done using AK Interactive's enamel-based Deposits and a filbert grainer type brush.



Shiny metal was dry brushed using a dedicated AMMO brush and paint.



The rear side of the bucket received some rust using enamels.



Dust speckles with enamels were added as a final touch.

of JCB models in the past and the latest to be unveiled is the 542-70 AgriXtra Loadall which is a mixture of die-cast and plastic, capturing the aesthetic looks of the cabin, engine compartment and chassis well. The colour match between metal and plastic is noticeable which is a shame, and the chassis is rather simple, with no working steering of the axles. That said, there are some finer details on the model, like the rear light clusters, complete with rear facing work lights, highlighted rear hitch and light clusters fixed to the cabin frame which has a moulded interior capturing the essentials. The telescopic boom extends and lifts, with a rather stiff hydraulic cylinder allowing it to remain in position. There is no hydraulic for the bucket tip function, instead there is a plastic bracket which allows the bucket movement. Attachment

Case IH 956XL

Tractor

he Case IH 956 XL utility tractor was first introduced in 1985 with production running until 1992. It was a 90hp tractor available in either two-wheel drive or four-wheel drive and was powered by an International Harvester D-358 6-cylinder engine.

Britains are about to release a 1/32 scale model of the Case IH 956 XL tractor in a limited-edition production run based on a 4x4 chassis. The model is painted in the familiar red and black decoration with silver wheels. The front axle has steered movement and the driveshaft to the front axle is modelled, with treaded tyres fitted front and rear. Mud guards are fitted over the front wheels and a counterweight ballast is fixed to the front of the chassis. The rear has a linkage to allow implements to be fitted, adjusting from lowered to raised position. The cabin interior has a dark plastic moulding with printed instrumentation on



the front console and replicated control levers with yellow highlighted knobs. Rear indicator and brake lights have been painted on with roof line work lights having silver printed lenses and an amber beacon. There is a mixture of metal and plastic with a good colour match, complemented with crisp printing of the graphics along the sides of the engine bay.





VERDICT



A limited-edition release which looks good with high play value.



The inset grille and bonnet contours have been captured convincingly.



The cabin interior is finished in black with printed instrumentation and highlighted control levers.



The rear linkage allows implements and trailers to be connected.

FRANCE 1945

José Brito takes us back to a peaceful French countryside scene.

THIS SERIES SHOWS HOW TO CREATE A DIORAMA USING VARIOUS TECHNIQUES AND PRODUCTS.

France 1946: the war is over and the world is trying to move on. It's time to reconstruct and look to the future. I always wanted to make a civilian diorama from this period. A diorama full of colour, a quiet scene with people in their usual daily life, animals walking by... I wanted to show that life always prevails and no matter what, we will carry on.

In this series, I concentrate on the diorama with the techniques I use applicable to a wide variety of different contexts. In the first part, then, I'm going to look at the farmhouse, in many ways the centrepiece of the diorama.



The basis for the house was a plaster kit (ref. B1601) from the Polish company, Archetypon. Included is a set of laser-cut window frames, and clearly presented assembly diagrams. Being made of plaster, the components are fairly heavy, so rather than relying on glue to hold them together, I decided to insert metal pins for added strength.



Having drilled holes in strategic places, I secured the pins with Deluxe Materials' 'Roket Rapid CA Glue' and assembled the building using 'Roket Hot Glue'.



Gaps between the various components were filled with 'Perfect Plastic Putty' (diluted with water to allow it to flow into the seams).



With basic assembly complete, I added a floor (made from plastic card) and cut a hole where a tree would eventually be positioned.




To improve the appearance of the damaged sections of the walls, I cut the edges with a small saw, and added exposed brickwork (made from cork). The individual bricks were attached with 'Roket Cyano Glue Gel'.



More of my cork bricks were used to fill one of the window openings. 'Roket Card Glue' was used to fix these in place, and once this had completely dried, I sealed the bricks with a layer of the diluted putty.





The upper floor was made from balsa wood. By attacking it with a sharp blade, I was able to replicate heavy damage, and create the appearance of rotten floorboards.







Support joists were added, again made from balsa wood, and the floor and ceiling fitted.





Rather than using the kit-supplied window frames, I decided to replace these with a better detailed set (ref. 184) from the Czech company, Plusmodel.



I also added further walls to the building using sections of 10 PCF (Medium) Balsa Foam. As well as being a lightweight material, this is both easy to cut and perfectly suited to this type of work.



All the exposed bricks around the building were treated to an initial coat of Panzer Aces Light Rust (70.301). Applying this well diluted would ensure that the paint filled all crevices.



Once cut to the desired size, the new wall was detailed to match the adjoining part of the building. Exposed brickwork was replicated using one of the 'HS Brik Stamps' from Hamann Studios, and further details were outlined with a pencil before being carved and sanded. Satisfied with the appearance, I attached the additional parts to the wall section with 'Roket Cyano Glue Gel' and 'Speed Bond'.



The remaining parts of the building (including the new wall section) received several coats of diluted Vallejo London Grey (70.836).



Once the base coat was dry, I followed with different shades of grey to provide some tonal variation.



A similar treatment was given to the brickwork, this time using a variety of orange and rust tones, and further lightened with an ivory colour.



A piece of K-Line foamboard was cut to the shape of the ground floor area and covered with '3D floor Tiles – Design A' from Reality in Scale's 'Wall & Floor Covering' range. To reflect the damage with the rest of the building, some of the tiles were removed or broken using a sharp blade.



Areas of the exposed concrete were then painted with Vallejo London Grey, and further greys added to vary the tone. 'Roket Card Glue' and 'Speed Bond Glue' were used to fix the floor in place.



To give the impression of mortar between the courses of brickwork, I applied a layer of heavily diluted putty. Once this was partially dry, I removed any excess with a damp sponge, allowing it to remain in the gaps.



Reality in Scale also produce a range of wall papers, historically accurate in design, and ideally suited to this particular project. I chose Wallpaper H (ref. 35124). Having applied 'Roket Card Glue' to specific areas of the interior walls, I then added the torn sections of wallpaper.

Case IH Austoft 8810

An interesting and rather unusual agricultural looking machine replicated nicely in 1/64 scale.

to commemorate milestones and anniversaries are quite popular, and that is the focus of this 1/64 scale Case IH Austoft 8810 sugar cane harvester model produced by Ertl. It is finished in an overall black colour with contrasting white printing of the CASE IH logos and Austoft 75th anniversary markings (1944-2019).

The model is constructed from die-cast and plastic with band style flexible rubber tracks fitted to the undercarriage track frames. At the front, there is an arm that can be adjusted in height with a pair of cutting discs mounted in the pivoting head while incorporated into the chassis is the intake where the crop divider and cutter is fitted.

The high mounted cabin gives a good view of the work area, behind which is the engine compartment with walkways and safety railings replicated. At the rear, there is the discharge elevator which can be rotated by

Claas Lexion 770 TT Combine Harvester

The Claas Lexion 770 Terra Trac combine harvester really captures the essence of the original with a lot of functionality. For a start, the front maize head can be detached from the combine and has folding end sections to reduce the width for safe road travel. The tracks are pivoting for uneven ground and the access ladder integrated into the upper platform can be rotated through more than 90-degrees. The cabin interior is modelled in white with all the main components visible, even the safety railings, beacons and mirrors have been replicated. The discharge chute extends from the stored position and the straw blower at the rear can also be adjusted. &





Same built the Samecar from 1961 till 1965, a small agricultural vehicle for multi-purpose use as you can see.



VINTAGE HIGHLIGHTS Fendt Farmer Tractors

In the last issue, I took a close look at the Fendt Farmer 2 with Fritzmeier cabin and Baas front loader and I now follow up with a look at five more Fendt Farmer replicas, all produced by Universal Hobbies.

have to admit that when the Fendt Farmer models were first released, I didn't take much notice of them, and thought they looked quite ugly, but over time, they have started to grow on me, particularly after I picked up the Fendt Farmer 2 (reviewed in the last issue) and I am now rather fond of the range, picking up the five models shown here over the last 6 months or so with the Fendt Farmer





1/32 - Fendt Farmer 3S two-wheel drive tractor (Item UH5270, RRP £50.00).

1/32 – Fendt Farmer 108LS with Edscha cab (Item UH5314, RRP £59.00).



The Peko cab has been replicated accurately with a good choice of materials to simulate the flexible coverings.



The driver station is nicely detailed to include the console, steering wheel and seat with foot controls also replicated.



The rigid design of the Edscha cab offers good protection to the elements with a fully modelled interior.

106S Turbomatik with Fritzmeier cab still to acquire. Despite being similar in appearance, there are differences and also some good detailing, like on the 3S where the steering wheel moves as the front wheels are steered. The driver station on each model is finished to include all the essentials and this is easier to see on the two models without cabins. The rear linkage detailing is authentically scaled and quite delicate with all five models having a drawbar hitch with pin. On my models, the pins appear to be glued in place and I am not sure if tapping the pins from below will loosen them to allow trailers to be coupled up.

The steering front axles have different steering methods, with the 108LS having hydraulic steering with the others using a bar linkage. Even here, there are differences with the way the linkage operates and the fourwheel drive 5S has the driveshaft to the front axle modelled. The Fendt Farmer models make a great set and are recommended for fans of vintage tractors.



Pacton Curtainsider Trailer

he curtain-side semi-trailer is a perfect logistics vehicle, capable of transporting a vast array of agricultural items, from bags of fertilizer and feed to mechanical parts and everything in between. MarGe have done a good job in bringing the curtain-side trailer to the 1/32 scale collectors, modelled on a

Pacton design with three axles.

The landing legs can be adjusted in height using the metal pins and have pivoting supports with railings running along both sides below the trailer floor where there is a spare wheel carrier and modelled wheel chocks. At the rear, the doors have raised locking handle detailing which is highlighted

in silver although it is a shame that the doors cannot be opened. Along the lower edge of the trailer sides are highlighted tie-down straps, complete with silver finished clasps which do look realistic. Side marker lights and wheel arches with mud flaps add to the realism. At the front of the trailer are the air and electrical hook-up points. &



The trailer is paired here with the 4x2 Mercedes-Benz Actros tractor, also from MarGe Models.



Underside detailing of the trailer includes adjustable landing legs, air bottles and spare wheel carrier.



The rear of the trailer has light clusters made from clear plastic and tinted with red and orange.

Knapen three -axle Walking Floor



VERDICT

A solidly constructed, large and heavy model which includes some nice engineering touches. arGe Models continue to release interesting truck and trailer models in the larger 1/32 scale, the latest of which is the Knapen walking floor trailer which is built on a three-axle chassis frame with adjustable landing legs which use pins to hold them in the raised/lowered position. There are side skirts and to the rear, storage boxes on each side. The front of the trailer has a raised platform which is constructed of a perforated photo-etch panel with access ladders on both sides, complete with safety railings. At the rear, the doors can be fully opened to reveal the interior detailing which includes the walking floor system. The rear lights are inset with

clear and tinted plastic lenses. When unloading, there is a protective cover which can be lowered over the lights which is a nice

touch. A plastic moulded tarpaulin cover is

included in the box, and this clips into place with four flexible straps clipping into place. The trailer can be posed with the cover removed and for this, there is a rolled-up cover which slots into place along the upper edge of the trailer. Knapen graphics and number plate stickers are included in the box. The model is available with a choice of three colours of tarpaulin cover, blue, anthracite or red.

Scania R500 Tractor

Scania is the latest OEM brand to be released as a high-quality replica in 1/32 by MarGe Models, and I have to say they have done a good job in implementing the design of the R500. The Scania R500 prime mover is powered by a choice of nine, thirteen or sixteen litre engines delivering up to 770hp.

he models are available in either 4x2 or 6x2 chassis configurations, with the latter having a linked steering system for the front and intermediate axle. The R-Sleeper Highline cabins can be tilted forward to uncover the engine bay where the modelled 8-cylinder engine block and other components have been replicated. With the cabin tilted, the 4x2 chassis is a little light on the rear end and is tipsy, while the 6x2 is much more stable once the cabin is tilted forward. The cabin interiors include light coloured door panels and trim contrasting with the otherwise dark colours with dashboard, left-hand drive configuration, steering wheel and both driver and passenger seating visible. Both doors can be opened which gives a better view of the details within.





The cabin doors can be opened to reveal more of the finished interior.



Tilting the cabin unveils the engine block at the heart of the chassis.

grille have been implemented convincingly, with textured black panels and raised silver bars with the prominent Scania name. All lights are made from clear plastic with tinting used for the orange indicators. There are two light bars, one low down and one at roof level which each carry four circular lights with inset lights in the roof. Silver treaded steps are located on each side for cabin access, with a step integrated into the side panel for access to the platform behind the cabin where the coiled service lines are located. The side panels have inset marker lights with silver fuel tanks fixed to the sides of the chassis, complete with black ties. The fifth-wheel coupling plate is hinged, and accommodates any of the MarGe Models trailers that have been released to date. Rounding off the rear of the chassis are a pair of yellow wheel chocks, air cannisters and rear lights, again tinted red and amber. The paint finish and printing is to a high standard with both chassis versions available in red, white or dark grey with the 6x2 also released in 'Nooteboom Edition' red. 🦠

As expected from MarGe, the models are very heavy with plenty of metal used in the construction. Detail is very good, and the ability to open the cabin doors and tilt the cabin to view the engine bay are nice touches

apply realistic grease and oil effects with AMMO products on any industrial or farm vehicle using Matt Black acrylic paints, pigments, Oilbrushers, Fresh Engine Oil and enamel thinner.



In this example, we will use the Doosan DX140w die-cast wheeled excavator model produced by Universal Hobbies in 1/50 scale.



A very common effect on industrial equipment is the dark grease from the engine which leaks through the panels. Mask the whole panel with masking tape and then spray Matt Black (A.MIG- 0046) diluted with 80% Acrylic Thinner (A.MIG-2000) until you create the stains



After removing the masking tape, finish the effect using Medium Gray (A.MIG-3509) and Black (A.MIG-3500) Oilbrushers, applied with a brush and blended in an irregular way. You can airbrush Fresh Engine Oil (A.MIG-1408) to give a gloss look, as we will see in the following steps.



To represent the grease accumulated in the moving areas of the digging equipment and the hydraulic rams, first spray Matt Black as in step 4. Then add the grease with a mix of 50% Metal Slag pigment (A.MIG-3020) and Dark Brown Oil (A.MIG-3512).



To further strengthen the fresh and shiny appearance of the grease, gently airbrush Fresh Engine Oil (A.MIG-1408) diluted with Enamel Odourless Thinner (A.MIG-2018).



Now we deal with the grease and grime on the chassis and undercarriage frame, especially around the central slew ring. First apply Dark Earth (A.MIG-3007) pigment onto the frame using an airbrush by diluting the pigment with Enamel Odourless Thinner (A.MIG-2018).



The next step is to darken the areas around the slew ring using Matt Black (A.MIG-0046) diluted with approximately 70% Acrylic Thinner (A.MIG-2000).



To give a fresh look to the surface, spray Engine Oil (A.MIG-1408) diluted with Enamel Odourless Thinner (A.MIG-2018).



To spice up the effect, apply small spots using Brown Wash (A.MIG-1000) and the splash technique using an old brush.

Fresh Engine oil with a fine brush in the commonly stained areas. First, apply stains diluted 50% with Enamel Odourless Thinner (A.MIG-2018). Once dried, you can overlap more intense stains with the product less diluted or ...without any dilution.





John Deere 3140 & 3350

Tractors

A year ago, Britains released three re-issue models of the John Deere four-wheel drive tractor, the 3050, 3640 and 3650. Britains have now followed up with the release of a pair of John Deere two-wheel drive tractors, designated the 3140 and 3350. As with the 4WD releases last year, there are some subtle changes between the two models.


he bonnets have the most differences, with both having surface detailing of the engine block which is visible on the sides of the engine bay. Side covers are a different design and colour between the two models and the 3140 has a front counterweight fitted which is absent on the 3350. One has a straight exhaust with rain cap while the other has a curved exhaust stack. The front axle has wheels fitted that achieve a



very impressive range of steering angle and while the wheels are a little wobbly, this does not detract from the overall presentation.

While the rubber tyres are the same, that is not the case with the wheel rims which have a different central structure design and there is a difference to the cabin frame, with forward facing work lights fitted to the 3350.





Small differences are found on the cabins, like the extra front facing lights on the 3350.



VERDICT



A nice follow up to last year's releases, nice mixture of metal and plastic makes them solid models with adequate interior cabin details.



The angle of steer that you get on both models is very impressive.



The interior of the cabins have all the controls highlighted.

CLAAS 3600 FC & 1100 C



Britains release of the new Claas DISCO mowers are modelled on the large-scale 3600 FC front mower and 1100 C BUSINESS rear mower. The front and rear mowers are available separately, each mounted inside the cardboard box with a clear moulding holding them in place. Unfortunately, the plastic cover is glued to the cardboard base and gets damaged when removing the model from the packaging.

nce extracted, the first surprise is the weight of the mowers, with plenty of metal used in the construction and plastic only used where necessary, like with the finer details on the top of the mower frames. The skirts running around the edges of the mower are slightly flexible which is a nice touch and turning the mower over, you are greeted with a contoured MAX CUT mower bar behind which is a rotating tine conditioning drum.

The front mower used a triangular shape connector which fits onto the front linkage of Britains tractors. On the Valtra T254 tractor shown here, the shear weight of the front mower is too much for the front linkage to remain in the raised position, although this is not a problem with the rear mower.

The rear 1100 C BUSINESS mower has a central frame to which the left and right sided mowers are fitted. The hydraulic cylinders used to control the folding movement are stiff in operation, so the mower heads remain in the raised position well. The central frame is cast with the support frame in the lowered

position, so the mowers can sit on the ground when not connected to a tractor and this doesn't really detract when the mowers are in the lowered position behind a tractor.

Detail-wise, Britains have gone to town to produce the full powertrain for the mowers with the driveshafts and linkages all replicated. This is particularly well done on the rear mower where ball and socket joints allow for the folding motion. The rear mower housings also have slight contour adjustment, again fitted with small hydraulics and this really adds to the realism.

he John Deere 4020 new generation row-crop tractor introduced in 1963 with production lasting until 1972. The model from Britains has open sides on the engine bay allowing the surface detailing of the engine block casting to be seen. The model is a mixture of metal and plastic with a very good colour match between the different materials with crisply printed graphics. The yellow seat and armrests catch the eye, high up with steering wheel and central console with printed instrumentation. The rear numberplate is a nice touch, and the dual wheels give the model a more rugged appearance. Interestingly, on the review model, there is a slight difference to the tyre material between the inner and outer tyres, with the outer tyres having a different tread pattern and a shinier appearance. The front wheels have the ability to steer with a fair range of movement possible while the axle has oscillation movement. The hitch is different to the usual design of hitch found on Britains models and has the ability to raise and lower the arms with a rotating drawbar mechanism to connect up trailed equipment which is simple but effective. &

COLLECTOR PROFILE

Antoine Van Houtte

Since I was a child, I've been interested in agricultural material and naturally became interested in farm models. It is no surprise that I specialised in Massey Ferguson models as my family has had a long-time relationship with the manufacturer.

t was only in 2015 that I began to create and modify models, making my first modifications on Bruder plastic models in 1/16-scale. I then started to specialise in the smaller 1/32 scale because of the more realistic models in the market, using the Siku models as a base for modifications. The first big conversion was to repaint the Krampe dumper into OVA decoration.

I later began making complete handmade models, starting with basic items like bale forks. In 2018, I registered in agronomic studies and it's there that I began to make more and more models. The coronavirus crisis and the lockdown in 2020 boosted my wish to make models and I took the opportunity to build a Facebook page to

It was made from PVC profiles and plastic sheets, taking about a week to finish. I decided to paint the silage trailer in red to make a beautiful set with my Massey Ferguson tractors. A second Dewa silage trailer is currently in construction.

For the moment, I have built three Dezeure TransLine XL slurry tankers. This model is based on a Siku frame with a PVC tanker body. I created all the stickers used on the model myself. In order to have a standardization of my model's colours, I have one TransLine XL finished in red and two finished in the corporate orange colours of the manufacturer.

To create the OVA brand slurry tankers, road tires. For me, these two tankers may

highlight my models. I gave it the name 'Les miniatures de MF mania' www.facebook. com/Mf1100SeriesByMfMania which is linked to "MF mania", my other Facebook page where I share some of my agricultural pictures.

I research to make models which don't exist on the market including models of Belgian manufacturers like Dezeure, Dewa and OVA. In addition, I look to increase the realism of my models by adding LED light bars, beacon bars or GPS antennas.

This model is the most recent to come out of my workshop. I had the idea to repaint a Ros Challenger RoGator sprayer to convert it into the Fendt brand. Indeed, this miniature has now been released as a limited edition in its usual green colour, so I thought it was better to repaint it in black which matches well with my black Massey Ferguson 6480.

The Grimme GL 420 EXACTA planter. I chose to model this machine because it is a mounted potato planter without wheels, and has a unique design. The small distance between the discharge tubes and ridge forming plates is particular and avoids soil compaction behind the cultivator. I have already built seven of these planters including two for friends.





I based them on Britains NC tankers, painting them in suitable colours before fitting ake a beautiful vintage pair.







In this issue, David Wylie visits one of the CASE IH Red Power Tour events in Scotland to give his first impressions on their entry level Puma X tractor.

In 2018, the CASE IH red power tour covered the length and breadth of the country to showcase and let new and existing customers get hands-on with their tractor range and meet some newly appointed CASE IH dealers. The tour covered the whole of the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland, starting out at Uckfield with Haynes Agricultural back in February and finished with J Low Agri Services Ltd on 5 July in Stirling central Scotland, totalling 30 sites - from dealers to showgrounds - and covering over 5,000 miles.

Whilst high-end tractor performance, automation and smart farming technology is meeting the needs of some farmers, CASE IH have not forgotten about farmers and operators looking for a simpler machine to own and operate. With this in mind, we took the opportunity to drive their entry level Puma X models at one of the last events organised by one of the newest CASE IH dealers in Scotland, at a farm near Cowdenbeath, Fife. CASE IH had brought five tractors and their RB545 Baler to the event, comprising of a 270hp Optum, 175hp Puma, 135hp Maxxum, 120hp Luxxum and their Puma 140hp X model that we decided to test drive.

Puma range

The Austrian built Puma has fifteen tractors in the range, split into three main specifications, the Multicontroller range (5 models from 150 to 220 hp) with Powershift gearbox, the PUMA CVX (7 models from 150 to 240 hp) matched to a continuously variable transmission and three Puma X models available with 140hp, 150hp and 165hp performance driving a six-step semi-powershift transmission. The later are aimed at farmers and operators that are seeking a standard specification suited to the most demanding applications in both arable, contracting and livestock farming situations. The Puma X range is built alongside the existing Puma range and retains a comprehensive list of core features and options and these three FPT engine power ratings include a power boost by their Engine Power Management of 175, 190 and







210hp respectively.

The key changes to the Puma X models are to be found in the cab, where they have a basic operator interface, car like dashboard and digital information display, and a more basic - but comfortable - seat offering. The cab itself has been equipped with features likely to appeal to livestock farmers and arable farmers in particular, with a low-profile roof to aid access into buildings, and an opening right-hand door and left-hand side door of the tractor. At the rear, the standard mechanical remote valves are non-configurable, while the rear wheels are fitted with narrow fender extensions. A two-speed 540/1,000rpm PTO package is the standard offering, and a lighting package, with four halogen roof- mounted work lights. Whilst the standard Puma X has a more basic operating environment, a full list of optional equipment means the new Puma models can be equipped with additional features as required, such as a mechanical cab suspension system.

Puma X 140 Test drive

The engine oil dipstick is easily reached, situated between the front tyre and fuel & AdBlue tanks next to the cab steps. With an easy to reach grab handle and 3 nicely spaced step treads we make our way through the wide cab door frame. Settling into the comfortable air suspension seat, which - as you would expect - has lots of adjustments to suit all frame sizes and rotates to save on neck strain when keeping a regular check on the rear activities. The visibility out the large glass front screen and side doors is outstanding. In the Puma X, the multicontroller LCD screen has been replaced with a simple but highly functional car-type dashboard, which is tucked behind the steering wheel with analogue engine rev-counter, temperature and fuel gauge, and digital LCD display for travel speed and hours worked etc. There is no headland management functionality but it has all the essential controls, such as differential locks, close to hand on the R/H side.

A quick turn to the ignition key fires up the latest generation Stage IV-compliant FPT 140 engine that is said to be durable, fuel efficient and reliable. The Puma range now covers a power band from 140- 240 hp (rated), with all models benefiting from an Engine Power Management boost for PTO, hydraulic and transport work. It produces

additional power when needed, such as when there is a 25hp draw on the PTO or roading in 13th gear and above - from 180 hp to 270 hp depending on the model and engine performance.

The forward and reverse gears are


selected with the lever positioned within easy reach on the control column and the gear ratio on the R/H level adjacent to the armrest. With the clutch pedal released, the Puma X produced a very smooth initial pickup of speed, and this was also carried forward

For the demo day, our Puma X 140 was matched to PÖTTINGER's classic TOP 762 C entry-level centre- swath rake model which was very easy to operative with the large hydraulic leavers in the Puma X model and a simple pull rope for locking and unlocking the folding twin rake arms during transport between fields. Puma X models have three standard spool valves, with the option to add a fourth and a maximum of four mechanical remote valves are available at the rear. Puma 150/165 Multicontroller and Puma 150-175 CVX models have four mechanical or five electronical remote valves available.

The Puma X 140 easily coped with the power demands from the PÖTTINGER swath rake and it was said Puma models (140-175) are available with a ground speed PTO for special trailed equipment and rear PTO speeds of 540/540E/1000 rpm, while the models from 185 upwards offer a 540/540E/1000/1000E rpm package. The rear PTO is driven directly from the engine flywheel for powerful transmission efficiency and has a soft-start engagement, which gradually increases torque on the driveline when sensors detect a high starting resistance, this helps to ensure a smooth





start to protect both tractor and implement. Puma X also has an optional 1,000 rpm front PTO and when combined with the optional front hitch, this would allow - for example a front-mounted mower with a rear unit to boost productivity. The swath rake attached to our demo machine put little or no strain on the rear hitch as it has a 8,257kg lifting capacity which means that even the heaviest attachments can be used without any problems. The hydraulic system uses an axial piston variable displacement pump with a delivery rate of up to 110 l/min - on PUMA X models - for fast and effective operations. A nice feature is the controls for the PTO, hydraulics and a remote valve - positioned on the outside of the mudguards - which can allow devices to be easily attached and removed by one person.

Feedback from farmers - during the design stage - asked for a no frills standard lower cab roof with halogen lights, however, this can be upgraded to more powerful LED lighting package as found on the other tractors in the Puma range. Unlike the rest of the Puma range, the basic X model does not have plug-n-play available to fit Case IH Advanced Farming Systems for fully automatic, integrated GPS/GLONASS guidance however a third party aftermarket system could be an option without autosteer functionality. For a tractor of this size, the turning radius of just 5.45m is good and overall, this latest Puma X is a powerful, comfortable and productive tractor, aimed at farmers and operators that favour a less expensive, complex and upgradable versatile tractor.

Second opinion

Ian Adam who farms the field at Thistleford - where the Red Power demo event took place -operates a mixed fleet including John Deere, Massey Ferguson and Valtra tractors from his home farm at nearby Highholm Dunfermline. His farming operation mainly comprises of Beef cattle, some sheep and he grows cereals - along with making silage for animal feed. Ian also carries out his own drilling and harvesting on 700 acres of land and carries out some contract work too. I sat in the passenger seat with Ian during his demo drive of the Puma X140 to get a second opinion of the Puma X performance and this is what Ian had to say;

1've not really considered a Case IH tractor before; however, I must say I'm impressed with this new Puma X model. The visibility and comfort is very good. I also like the layout of the controls; everything is just nicely placed and easy to reach.

The semi-powershift transmission is very impressive too with nice, fast and smooth shifting, in fact having experienced the Puma X during this short demo drive I'd say that it would suit our farm down to the ground.

This was a well-attended and run event by both CASE IH and their new CASE IH dealer J Low Agri Services Ltd. &

Fordson New Performance Collector's Set 1:32 Scale



The New performance range was launched in 1963 and was to be the final development of the highly successful Fordson range. Improvements included increased power from the engines, uprated hydraulic systems and stronger transmission components. Of course the biggest visual change was the colour scheme which was to become the mainstay ID for Ford tractors for many years.

Although the New Performance range was the finale of Fordson the campaign was one of the largest ever for a tractor launch, the now famous image of the three tractors pictured at the front of Boreham House was used in much of the publicity campaign.





