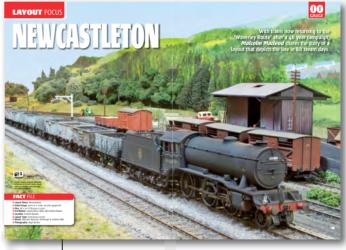

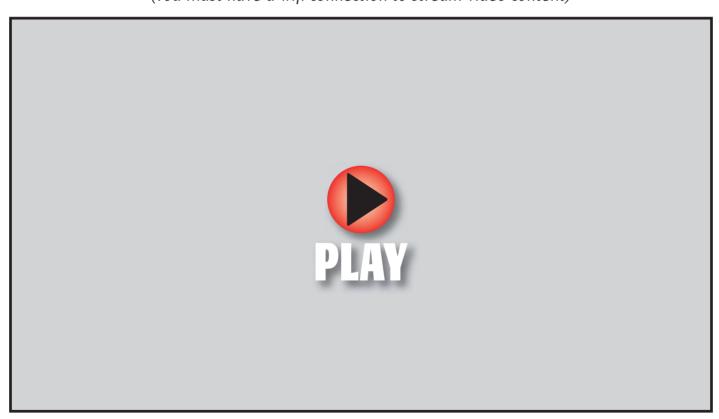






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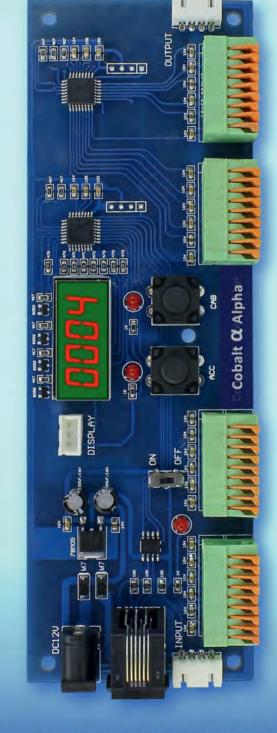
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BRM EDITOR'S COMMENT

WELCOME

hy do we do it? It's a question that I am asked occasionally by friends who aren't railway enthusiasts or modellers. It's a difficult one to answer; everyone has their own motivations, their own very personal reasons for being interested in model railways. Those of us who've been up at 4am to pack a van for a show and don't get home until midnight on a Sunday will also ask 'why do we do this?' but that's a different story! For many of us, one of the prime motivations is to build a layout, to create something that brings back a lost location, happy memories or depicts the colourful modern railway.

For one month only, **BRM** has replaced its usual mix of articles to feature a wider range of quality layouts ranging from Victorian broad gauge in 3mm scale via BR 1950s steam to Sectorisation era diesels in OO and much more. There's something to interest everyone and I hope you find plenty to inspire you and your own projects.

One of our main featured layouts is Edinburgh & Lothians MRC's 'Newcastleton', a re-creation of the famous 'Waverley Route' in the late-1950s and early-1960s. Ever since the bitterly disputed closure of this cross-border main line in 1969, there's been pressure to re-open it. That campaign has finally come to fruition this month with the return of scheduled passenger trains between Edinburgh and Tweedbank. At 30 miles, it's the longest section of line closed by BR to return to use. Having visited the line during reconstruction work earlier this year (see below), I'm really looking forward to my first journey by rail over this highly scenic line - I'm sure many of you are too.

For now, 'Newcastleton' will give you a good idea of the line in its BR heyday and a clue as to why it remained so popular with enthusiasts after closure. How long before we see a layout based on the new 'Borders Railway'?

Equally, but in a very different setting, we expect Bachmann's new London Underground 'S' Stock (reviewed on page 100) to inspire a raft of new layouts set around the capital. LU operates a fascinating network that carries more passengers each day than the entire National Rail system combined, so more attention in model form is long overdue. The opportunities for unusual layouts

featuring side-by-side running with the 'main line', burrowing junctions and urban

cityscapes will be too much to resist

'Practical BRM' will return as usual next month with a wide range of projects for you to try. We'd also like to know what you'd like to see in **BRM** over the coming months.

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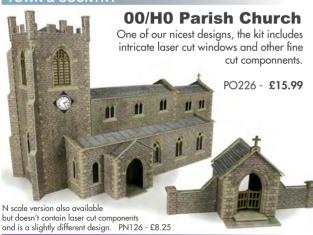

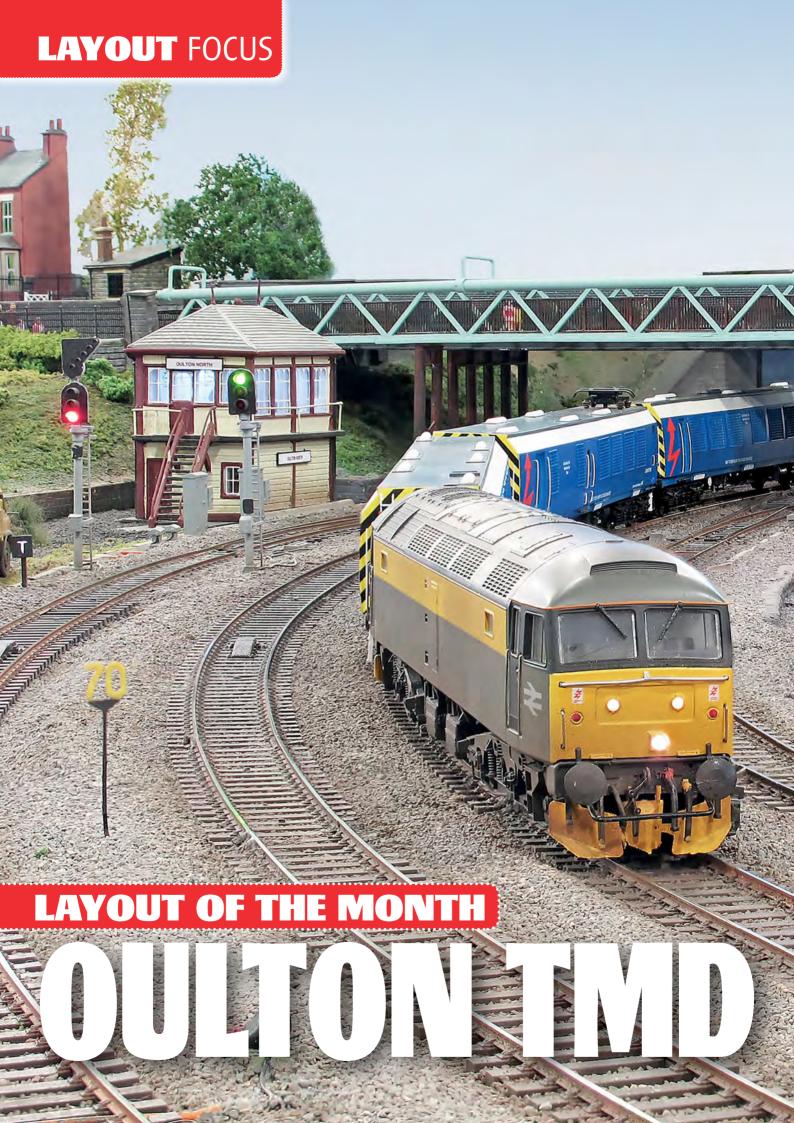

with one major feature; perhaps a locomotive depot, a station, an industrial private siding or factory complex. 'Oulton TMD' has all of these and as a result is a real crowdpuller at exhibitions. **BRM** spoke to owner and builder Allan Cromarty to find out what inspired him and how he did it.

BRM: How did you become interested in railway modelling?

Allan Cromarty: I was 14 when I built my first model railway. I bought a couple of locomotives, some coaches and wagons, along with bits and pieces of track. They were all Hornby and came from Massey's of Trent Vale - a hardware store that also sold model railways.

After about two years I sold it all, but restarted ten years later when time, money and a spare room meant I could build another layout. I continued to collect model railways over the years, eventually building a 30' x 10' layout at home. For the past 15 years I have helped on a trade stand at exhibitions, and have been exhibiting 'Oulton TMD' since 2005.

BRM: What are your prototype influences?

AC: I originally modelled BR steam, then one summer in the late-1980s the job I was involved with meant I was situated alongside the railway line at Cliffe Vale near Stoke-on-Trent. I was there for several months and had plenty of time to view the various passenger and freight trains passing by. I began to take an interest in the current railway scene and decided to change to modern image, modelling in what I consider to be the most colourful time period in BR's history - the change from corporate blue to sectorisation.

BRM: Why did you choose to model in this scale?

AC: Availability of items and cost were the biggest factor in deciding to model in OO gauge. There was still quite a limited range of N gauge items at that time - they were also more expensive. By the late-1980s, Lima was producing a large selection of modern image locomotives and the quality was better than Hornby. As I had a large garage that I could dedicate as hobby room, space was not an issue either, so OO was a natural choice for me.

BRM: When did you start work on vour layout?

AC: After many years of having a large layout at home I decided it was time to try and build a layout to exhibit. Work commenced on 'Oulton TMD' in early-2005. My first invitation was to Alsager Model Railway Show in November of that year; a small exhibition held in the local village

hall and a good show for my first outing.

The layout was quite basic and to be honest, not very well detailed, but while I was there I was lucky enough to be invited to my next show, the Soar Valley MRE in September of the following year. Spurred on by the invitation, I continued working on upgrading the scenery, fitting lights and detailing the locomotives and stock.

BRM: Have any exhibition layouts or model railways featured in magazines inspired specific features on your layout?

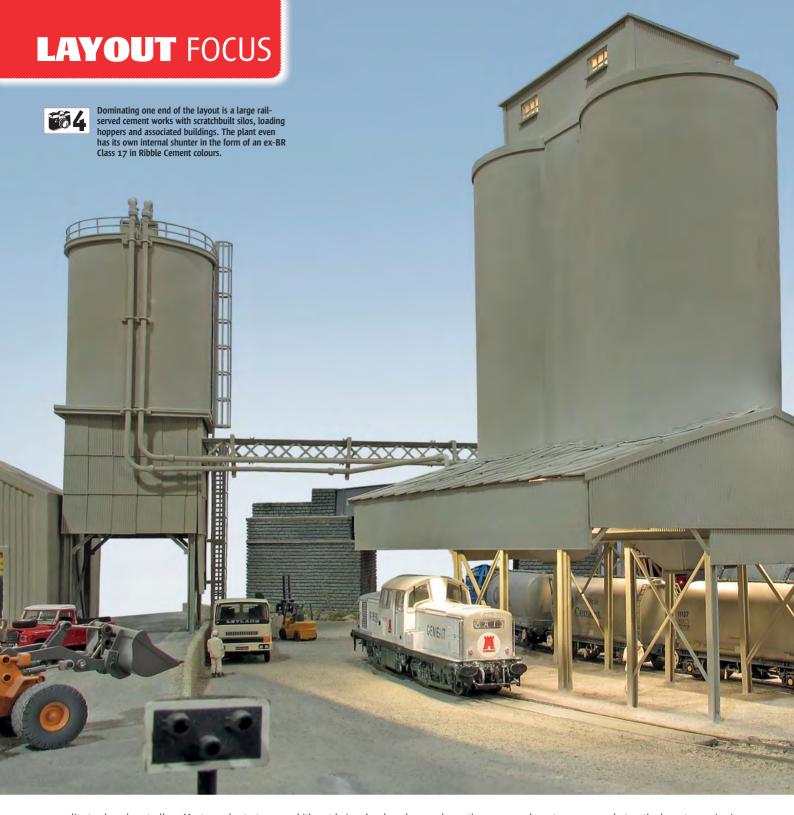
AC: 'Dyserth Road' had one of the biggest influences on how my layout was to develop. I saw and heard it at an exhibition and was immediately impressed with the sound-fitted Class 37s. I decided that was the way I wanted to go. My original layout had been wired for DC with some 20-odd isolating sections. The changeover to DCC from analogue meant a rewire and a panel rebuild, plus the additional cost of the DCC equipment, but the change was well worth it.

BRM: What advice would you have for those starting out in the hobby, or making the transition to a permanent lavout?

AC: There is nothing more frustrating than a locomotive that continually stutters and stalls on points or crossings. The best advice I can give is to

use quality track and controllers. Most people start with a Hornby trainset. The track and controllers are fine to start with, but I would recommend upgrading to either Peco Streamline Code 100 or Peco Setrack if space is tight. I would suggest the use of Peco Code 75 track if you are more confident with the wiring of Electrofrog points. 'Oulton TMD' uses both; Code 100 in the depot and fiddleyard and Code 75 on the front section. The points are also a mixture of Insulfrog and Electrofrog. Both types have been extremely reliable and work well with DCC. In the ten years the layout has been operating I haven't had to change one point!

A quality controller helps too. Before I changed to DCC I used a hand-held feedback controller and a twin track controller, both from Gaugemaster. Both were reliable and controlled the locomotives well, even at slow speed.

As for DCC there are many choices, but I use the Lenz system. It's not the cheapest on the market

and it's not being developed as much as other systems, but I've found it to be very reliable and some components from other manufactures are compatible with it. For example, I use NCE EB1 circuit breakers to create power districts on the layout, so if there is a fault in one section, power to the whole layout doesn't go down!

BRM: What challenges or problems did you face when building the layout?

AC: Wiring was one of the biggest challenges. Every time I extended the layout I needed to build a new control panel. I don't operate the points with DCC but use the conventional way of a CDU and toggle switches. 'Oulton' has five panels, the largest of which is 1m long, operates 23 points and 28 colour light signals!

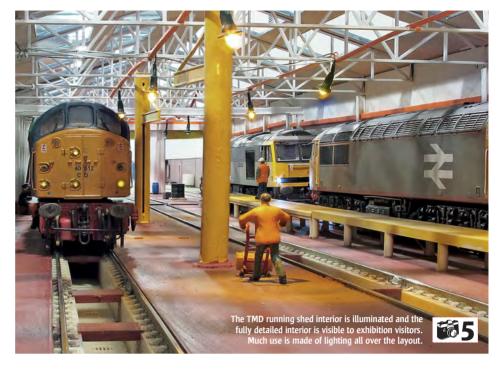
The other problem is operators - or lack of them! At the first show I originally operated the

layout on my own, but as the layout grew in size I soon realised I needed help. While at the Soar Valley show in 2006, one of the SVMRC members offered to help out and still does. I now have a team of eight people, whose assistance is very much appreciated (Thanks lads!). Six of those are members of various model railway clubs. We usually try to have a team of six to operate the layout at exhibitions, unfortunately they sometimes have commitments to their own clubs and are not always available.

BRM: What lessons have you learned from building 'Oulton TMD'?

AC: I don't think anyone has actually taught me how to build a model railway. I started out buying ready-made buildings or kits and I never thought I could build a layout that could be exhibited. I gained experience through trying - and failing - but learning from my mistakes. So my advice would be

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to have a go, do your best and if it doesn't work out the first time, try again until you are happy with the end result.

BRM: What, if anything, would you do differently based on your experiences?

AC: The wiring. DCC needs only two wires - I don't think so!

Yes there are two wires from the controller, but because of the complicated track design and the fact I used Electrofrog points I have had to install quite a few track feeds. There is also a vast array of wiring needed to feed all the colour light signals and all the points as I still prefer to use a CDU and switches to control them.

I must admit that all that wiring is not as neat as I would have liked. I dread the day when a problem occurs as fault-finding will be a complete nightmare! I have thought about rewiring it but

even that would be a daunting task. In future any new layout or extension would be much neater and wired logically to aid fault finding.

BRM: What are your favourite areas of the layout and how were they tackled?

AC: Originally I built everything myself, but as new sections were constructed there was pressure to complete them in time for the next show, so Derek Barnett of Footplate Model Railways helped out. The layout has developed and so, I believe, have my modelling skills. A few years ago I decided to build a large extension to the layout that would consist of an oil terminal and the cement works.

I remember there being an oil terminal at Etruria, near Stoke, in the 1980s. I couldn't find any photographs of it, but found one of the Westerleigh terminal near Bristol which looked similar to the Etruria facility.

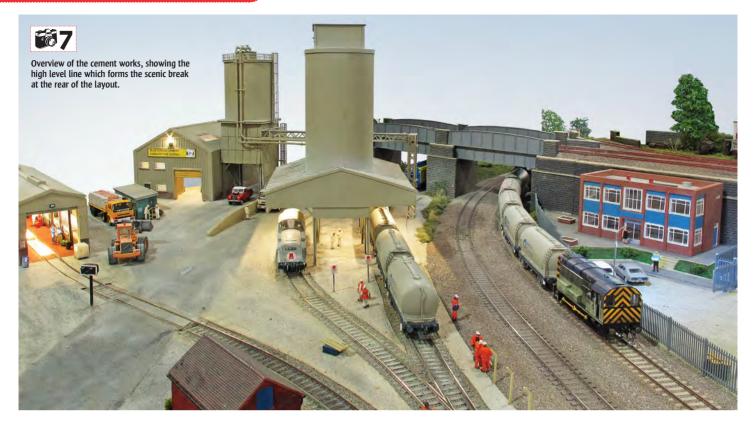
The challenge was to create a model just by using details from the photograph, so with help from Derek we scratchbuilt the girder and angle iron framework from plastic and used brass wire for the handrail that ran over the tanks. Wills chequerplate was used to create a walkway and details and pipework from the Knightwing range were used for added features. I also needed an oil storage tank and this was built from a piece of 4" soil pipe (unused I might add!) with extra details. A road tanker filling point was scratchbuilt, again scaled purely from on a image seen on the internet.

BRM: Have you experienced any problems with rolling stock that needed modification before it would run reliably?

AC: Generally most modern locomotives and items of rolling stock are very good, so other than

weathering I have had to do very few modifications. The exceptions were older Bachmann Class o8s and 37s, which needed additional pick-ups to help them run better.

Working lights were also fitted to the older Bachmann Class 08s, 20s and 37s. With regard to the rolling stock, some of the old Lima PCA cement tanks and Hornby ferrywagons needed better wheels and couplings altered to the NEM type.

I have had problems with Heljan Cargowaggon couplings and they are in the process of being modified. Another problem is that the couplings are not always the same height. To solve this I've bought various couplings, some cranked, some straight, and fitted the ones that work best using trial and error. Occasionally I need to refit the whole unit and use Parkside Dundas NEM mounting blocks (PA34) to reposition the coupling as required.

BRM: What are your plans for the layout?

AC: In November 2015, 'Oulton TMD' will reach its tenth anniversary on the exhibition circuit, but there are still plenty of small jobs that need doing. I want to fit lights to the oil terminal and to some of the vehicles. I am always adding new locomotives and they need detailing and weathering as do any wagons and coaches I buy.

When finances allow, a new sound decoder or two will also be fitted, which will keep Simon, one of our operators happy, as he refuses to run any locomotive that is not sound fitted!

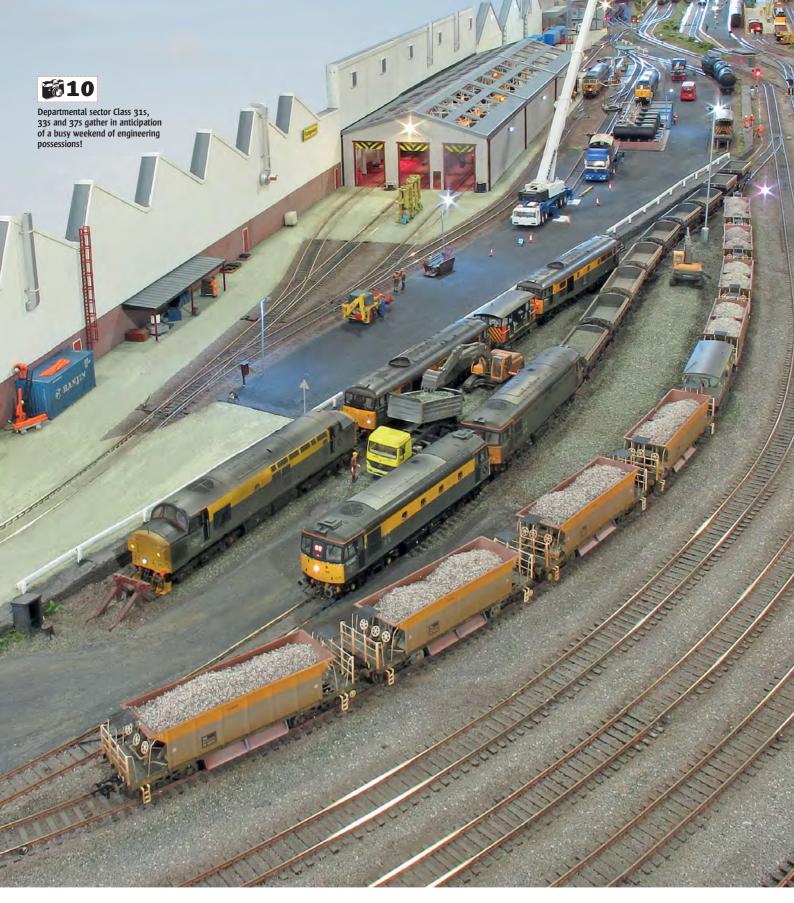
With regards to the layout, I am still undecided whether to extend it again or build a new layout altogether. There is still a lot of interest in 'Oulton TMD', with provisional show appearances booked through to 2017!

BRM: How do you fit your railway modelling around your work and

AC: I am self-employed and have an understanding partner so this gives me a high degree of flexibility







in the amount of time I can devote to working on the layout and prepping it before a show. I try to make sure I have at least one evening per week set aside as a modelling night.

I also plan big, but start small - that's what works for me. If you can design a large layout that can be built in several small sections, you are able to finish and operate one part before moving on to the next. 'Oulton TMD' was only 12' long and 2' wide when it was first exhibited, it is now 28' by 10'!

If you are really struggling to find time to build your own layout I would highly recommend joining your local model railway club.

BRM: When you encounter a problem in your modelling where do you look for solutions?

AC: When Derek was helping me we would generally discuss, or more likely argue about any problems that arose. He has a lot of experience in the model railway world and is always on hand to offer advice, usually along the lines of; "What you want to do is..."

Next would be fellow modellers. I am lucky to be indirectly involved with several local model railway clubs, namely Stafford, Alsager and the Soar Valley club. Not only do some of their members help

operate the layout, but their advice is invaluable. Ashley, of SVMRC advised and worked for two days fitting and wiring up over 100 LEDs during construction of the control panel.

The internet and internet forums are also very useful in finding specific information, and I keep magazines that have articles relating to projects that I may find interesting.

BRM: How do you prefer to buy models?

AC: I use a variety of sources; obviously, Derek at Footplate helps provide the majority of models,

track and accessories I need, but I am also lucky that I attend about 15 model railway shows over the year. That allows me to source most of the other items that I require. I also have two local model shops which are a bonus and of course the internet and eBay fill in any gaps.

I don't tend to go to swapmeets anymore except occasionally the one at Stafford - they work well for picking up locomotives and rolling stock but I prefer model railway exhibitions for their better selection of building materials and accessories that help lift a layout. Footplate of Kidderminster, Express Models for the locomotive and yard lights, South West Digital, DC Kits and Legomanbiffo provide the sound decoders.

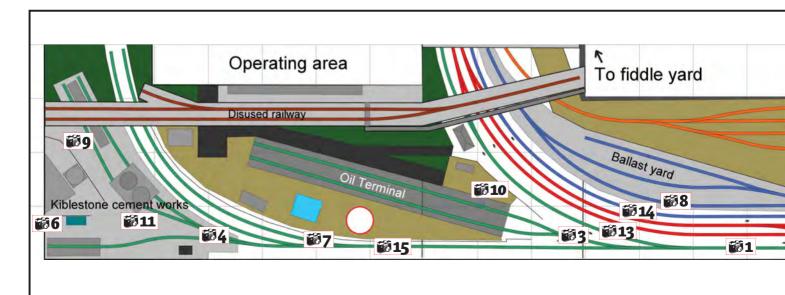
BRM: What developments would you like to see in the hobby?

AC: When I exhibited 'Oulton TMD' at Eurospoor in Utrecht, one question I was asked was; "Why don't British layouts have catenary?"

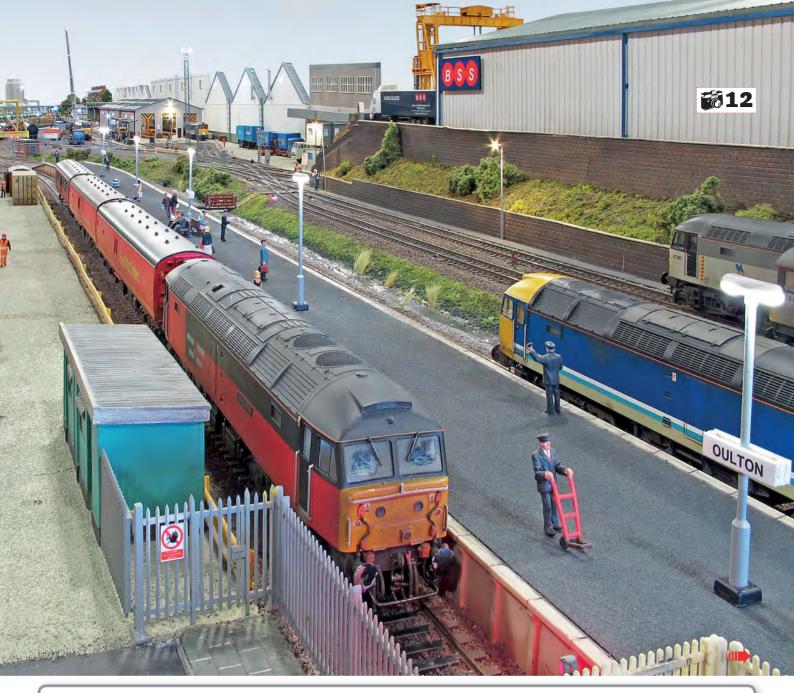
I have to agree that there are not many layouts out there with it installed. I would certainly like to see one of the major manufacturers produce it. Dapol produced one item, but it would be nice to have a full set. I would like to see Bachmann or Hornby upgrade their Class 08s and 20s so they have working lights fitted. More items of rolling stock from the late-1980s and early-1990s would be good for me; one example being Tiphook Rail KPAs and it would be nice to see a Railfreight Construction sector Class 37! BRM



LAYOUT OF THE MONTH OULTON TMD



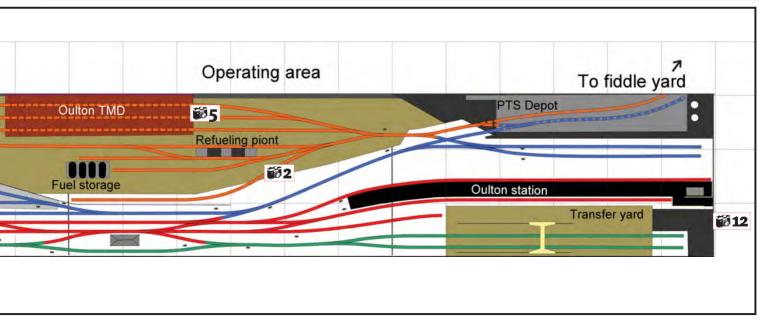

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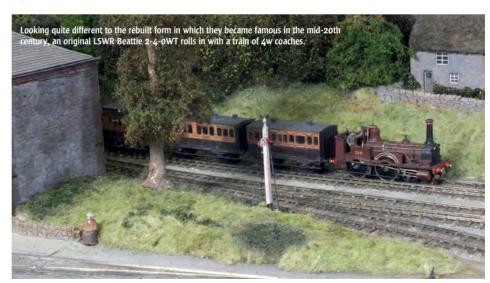


YEOTON WHARF

This evocative 3mm scale mixed gauge layout, built by **Nick Salzman**, depicts a West Country interchange in the Victorian era.

eoton Wharf' is the culmination of over 40 years of railway modelling and a journey back in time in my interest in railways. I have always worked in 3mm scale, starting with Tri-ang TT as a child and gradually evolving to the finescale standards of The 3mm Society.

I had always used the original 12mm gauge, but after visiting an exhibition organised by the Broad Gauge Society I became hooked on the idea of constructing a layout to Brunel's 7' 04" gauge.



This resulted in my purely broad gauge layout, 'Bagborough West', featured in **BRM** October 2006.

That was really a testbed for working in this gauge, where I had to initially make all the gauges before constructing the track and stock from scratch, being the only one mad enough to do it in 3mm scale! The next logical step was to try a mix of

broad and standard gauge, or narrow gauge as it was known at the time!

Following retirement and a move to Devon I developed an interest in the North Devon Railway from Exeter to Barnstaple. It was built to broad

DETAILS LIGHTWEIGHT BASEBOARDS

The baseboards are designed for lightness and portability. The former was achieved by using 2" thick extruded polystyrene sheet surrounded by a frame of 6mm plywood. I bought the polystyrene from Trylon online. The main board measures 44" x 24" and has a 21" x 24" board hinged at each end and fits easily in the back of an estate car. The top surface of the polystyrene was very smooth and wouldn't take any glue or sticky tape. I found that if the surface was roughed up it would glue far better with 'No More Nails'.

gauge and operated by the Bristol & Exeter Railway. The London & South Western Railway (LSWR) acquired it in 1862, as it expanded westwards. The LSWR converted it to mixed gauge and following the end of the broad gauge in 1892 it became a standard gauge line.

I had read that a number of proposals were put forward in the early-19th century to link the north and south coasts of Devon by canal. This sowed the seeds of an idea to model a canal/railway interchange near Crediton, where the railway runs close to the River Yeo and would have been a site where the canal might have been built.

After a number of trials I settled on a plan consisting of a through line and passing loop; off which are broad and standard gauge sidings. Both interchange with the canal, but the broad gauge also serves a maltings and warehouse with wagons moving in and out via wagon turntables.

TRACKWORK

Unfortunately, having opted for a mixed gauge of 21mm and 14.2mm I was unable to make use of the new finescale flexible track produced by The 3mm Society. Instead, the track was made by hand using Code 60 bullhead rail in plastic chairs glued to 1/32" plywood sleepers. The chairs were supplied by Ian Osborne of The 3mm society and the sleepers were cut from a large sheet using a Minicraft circular saw.

The broad gauge sidings were laid with the original baulk road where the bridge rail is laid direct on longitudinal timbers. This was represented by gluing

4mm wide copper-clad strip to the template and then soldering the bridge rail to it. The bridge rail is a 4mm version supplied by the Broad Gauge Society but does not appear out place in 3mm scale.

A trackplan was designed using Templot software and then the templates were printed on the thickest card I could get to go through an inkjet printer. The track was built on the templates and then wired up and ballasted before being stuck to 1/8" cork sheet using double-sided sticky tape. The cork was first glued to the baseboard.

At baseboard joints the rail is soldered to brass pins inserted into the edge of the plywood frame. In practice the track has stood up well to the rigours of exhibiting the layout over a few



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years. The odd section has become unstuck but is soon fixed by with Butanone glue.

WIRING AND CONTROL

All track was wired up at the construction stage. Droppers from the templates pass through the board and are connected to power bus wires underneath. Connection between boards is by D-pluq multi-pin sockets and pluqs.

The only switchable section is the yard, which because of the diamond crossing, is switched between the broad and standard gauges and a centre-off position. The rest of the layout is electrically fed by the position of the points.

There are two PICtrollers selected by cab control. One controls the whole layout whilst the other controls the main running line and passing loop. A simple double-pole changeover switch selects between the controllers. This allows shunting to be carried out while trains are run through on the main line.

The point and signal switches are set into the control panel like a signalbox frame. Provision has been made for LEDs to show the position of points and signals and eventually I plan to interlock the whole panel electrically using relays, but that is for the future.

The level crossing gates are worked by servos. They are actuated via a relay, which also controls the feed to the track leading from the storage yard. This prevents the gates being inadvertently 'run through'. Points are operated by Hoffmann motors supplied by Finney & Smith.

SCENERY

The scenery at the back of the layout was shaped using expanded polystyrene carved and sanded to shape - a really messy job! It was then covered in strips of green paper towels soaked with slightly diluted PVA. When dry, bleached carpet underlay was then glued to it with PVA and when this was dry it was trimmed to size and painted with a very thin wash of green enamel paint. Finally a variety of scatter materials was added to produce texture and variation in colour.

Felt carpet underlay is becoming more difficult to obtain. Since building the layout I have been



Not one of the fevered imaginings of Rowland Emmet or Heath Robinson, but a model of Fairfield, the only broad gauge railmotor ever built. Completed in 1848, it was sold in 1856 and converted into an o-4-oT contractors locomotive.

KEY DETAILS

WAGON TURNTABLE & TRANSVERSER

As an interesting cameo I have made the wagon turntable in front of the maltings operate together with opening doors and a wagon being drawn in and out of the building.

The turntable operates via a multi-stage gearbox supplied by Proops and small microswitches control the limits of movement. Magnets move the wagon in and out of the building, using a rack and pinion gear under the board and a small magnet on the wagon. Much use is made of old Meccano bits to make a guide for the rack. The whole mechanism is set on its own sub-base let into the main extruded polystyrene board.

The doors operate via two servos controlled by a servo board from Heathcote Electronics.

introduced to the use of static grass for the scenery and have been suitably impressed. I will probably use this technique in the future.

I get more comments and questions at exhibitions about the backscene than any other part of the layout. I took a series of overlapping pictures using a digital SLR camera mounted on a tripod. The site was on the western edge of Dartmoor looking towards Bodmin Moor. I was very lucky on the day to have just the right sort of light for the scene to blend well with the scenery on the layout.

The images were stitched together on the computer to form a panorama, which was then resized to fit the length and height of the backscene. It was printed out on a roll of photographic paper and mounted on the backboard. This was time and ink-consuming and if I were doing it again I would consider having the image professionally printed on thin foamboard.

BUILDINGS

All the buildings on the layout are made from card. The main buildings are the maltings and associated warehouse at the front of the layout featuring opening doors and a wagon traverser. They are based on Tucker's Maltings in Newton Abbot.

The stonework was achieved by photographing the building as near straight on as possible, then manipulating the image on the computer. Unwanted bits were cloned out and windows and doors were moved until the desired overall effect was achieved. A test print was done from which the scale could be calculated by measuring the bricks and then reducing the image to 3mm:1' scale. Finally the image was printed on an A4 size computer label, which was then stuck to the card.

The windows and doors were cut out and replaced with properly glazed ones. The stonework was then scribed to give some relief. After the building had

been made and the roof done, all stonework was weathered using powders. The roof is laid with strips of paper slates and individually painted.

The goods transfer shed is based on one on the Cromford canal in Derbyshire. Again it is made of card and the stonework is from the Metcalfe range suitably scribed and weathered. The canal base was carved out of the extruded polystyrene board with a mini router. The base was then lined with plaster and painted with acrylics. This was followed by three to four layers of polyurethane varnish.

Boats for the canal were derived from 4mm scale Craftsman kits, which were photo-reduced to 3mm scale. The stonework for the lock is made from DAS modeling clay glued with PVA to a card base, scribed and when dry painted and weathered.

LOCOMOTIVES & STOCK

At the moment the stock is biased towards the broad gauge as I am still constructing standard gauge stock. Because of the scale and the period I model, all the stock has to be hand-built.

Broad Gauge

B&ER 4-2-4WT No.39 - With an 8' 9" driving wheel, designed by Pearson and built in 1868 at Bristol. It carries the all-black livery of the Bristol & Exeter Railway. Renumbered 2001 by the GWR, it was withdrawn in 1877.

B&ER 2-2-2WT No.58 - Pearson-designed and built by Rothwell in 1859. Renumbered by the GWR as No. 2057 and withdrawn in 1880.

B&ER 4-4-0ST No. 2048 - Built as No. 85 by Avonside in 1872. Absorbed by the GWR and renumbered, this locomotive lasted until the end of the broad gauge in 1892.

GWR 0-4-4T No. 3560 - Built at Swindon in 1889. It was always unsteady at speed. It was converted to 'narrow' gauge and eventually rebuilt as a 4-4-0 tender locomotive.

Fairfield - This combined locomotive and carriage was built by W.B. Adams at the Fairfield Works, Bow in 1848. The only broad gauge steam railmotor, it was sold out of service in 1856 and converted to an 0-4-0 contractors' locomotive.

LSWR 2-4-0 Creedy - A 'Crewe type' locomotive built at Brassey's Canada Works in Birkenhead in 1855 for the North Devon Railway. It came into LSWR ownership when it acquired the line in 1863. It is in the early brown livery of the LSWR.

Standard Gauge

LSWR Beattie 2-4-0WT - In its early form but with an Adams boiler as running in 1878. It is in the later umber livery of the LSWR.

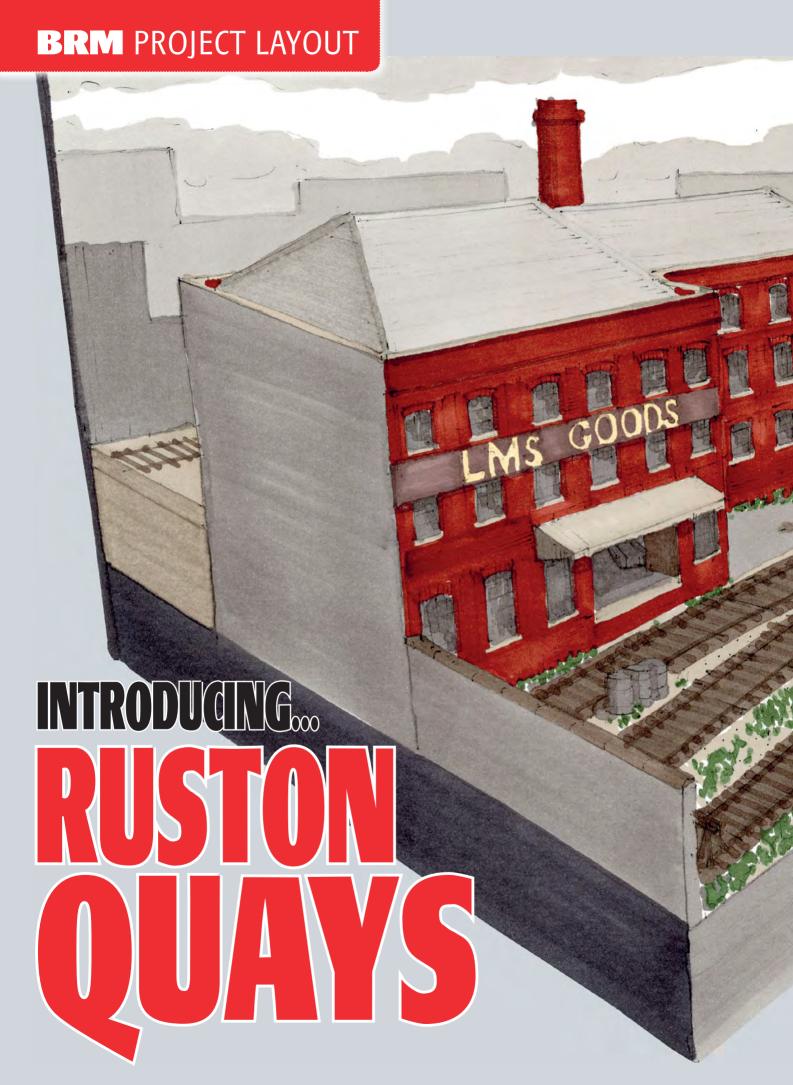
LSWR o-6-o 'Ilfracombe Goods' - As re-boilered by Adams in 1888. It is in dark green goods livery.

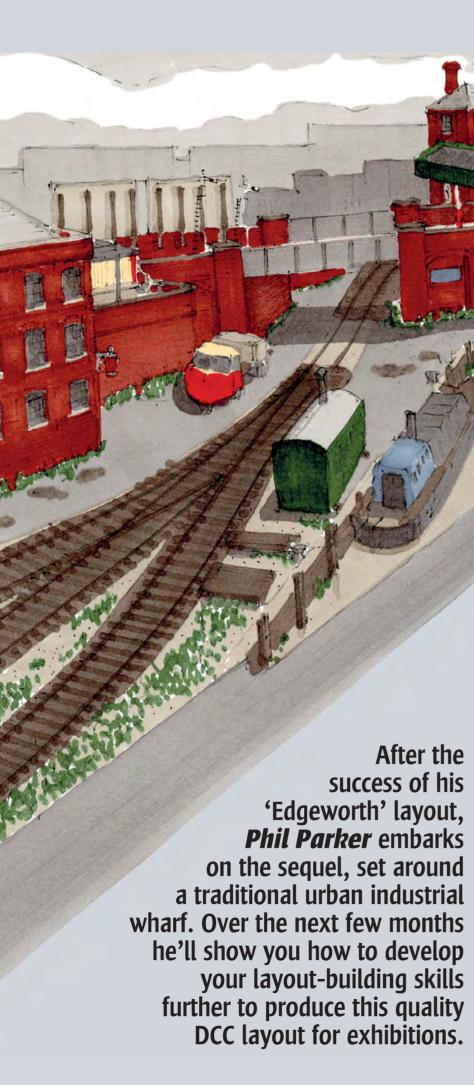
Under construction is an LSWR 4-4-0T 'Metropolitan Tank', otherwise known as a 'Plymouth' tank and will be as rebuilt in 1877.

Broad Gauge Goods and Passenger stock is a mixture of scratch-built vehicles and converted 3mm Society kits. The early coaches are made from brass etches produced from plans by Alan Doherty of Worsley Works. Standard gauge stock is mainly from 3mm Society kits, but the four-wheel coaches and the goods brake vans are scratchbuilt.

I have tried to produce the atmosphere of a railway at the end of the 19th Century set in a rural scene in North Devon - I leave it to you to decide if I've succeeded. **BRM**

INTRO: PAUL A. LUNN, LAYOUT DESIGN EXPERT

Sometime ago I met Phil Parker for the first time. He was encouraging members of the public to have a go at layout operation and welcomed a family who'd been at my design clinic, as a natural follow-on to their experience. In that brief encounter he spoke of his next layout design and, having captured my imagination, we agreed to meet the next day.

I had a previously published idea that I thought would entice him - 'Across the Diagonal' was a twin-level urban layout featured in the book Micro Layouts and would be the catalyst for his next venture.

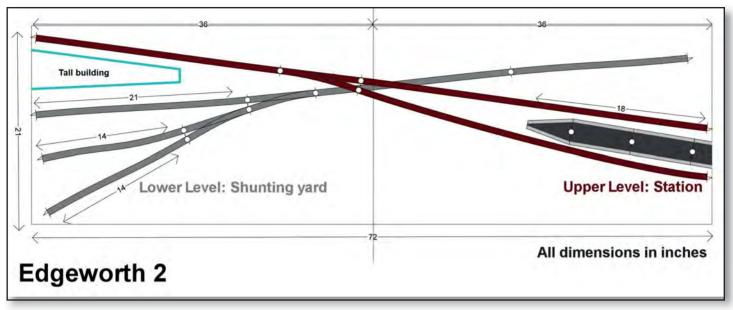
The development you see here is based around the same idea, taking its prototypical inspiration from the North Midlands area and the almost entirely demolished Dewsbury Central in Yorkshire. This was an elevated island platform with gabled canopies and the railway served warehouses at several locations in the town.

We explored a number of changes, especially in track format, including lengthening the low-level sidings, the structures used and some additional scenic features - in particular a partial representation of a canal basin. We've taken considerable time to 'compose' the layout, ensuring there is a balance between the structures, texture and colours.

What you see here is an interpretation of what might be achieved, but not the end result. As a designer you can only do so much at arms' length and whilst I've supported Phil to this point, the next step needs to be undertaken nearer completion. This is about deciding where to place items and the volume that they occupy.

It's especially relevant to what might appear, on the face of it, minor detail - the final position of the grounded coach body, perhaps more to the left or right, how many vehicles should be placed on the layout, their position and relevance to the scene and perhaps most important, the story telling. It also covers such things as canal debris, weeds and potholes in the tarmac exposing cobbles beneath. It's all about trial and error, plonk stuff on, view it from different angles and when you've found the optimum position, glue it down.

BRM PROJECT LAYOUT



My first attempt, at the time named 'Edgeworth 2' was pretty basic, horribly angular and drawn on a computer using AnyRail5. At least I know everything I need will fit on the baseboards.

I need something that is quick and easy to set up and takes the minimum of operator input to keep things moving while I talk to visitors at exhibitions.

f you were enjoying **BRM** early last year, you'll have read about 'Edgeworth' - our project layout built to show that anyone could create an exhibition quality model railway.

The layout has been to numerous exhibitions and proved even more popular than we'd hoped. Modest size and simple construction combined with entertaining operation has inspired several people to have a go at their own version. If all these come to fruition, I'm going to have to apologise to some

exhibition managers for all the identical models on the circuit!

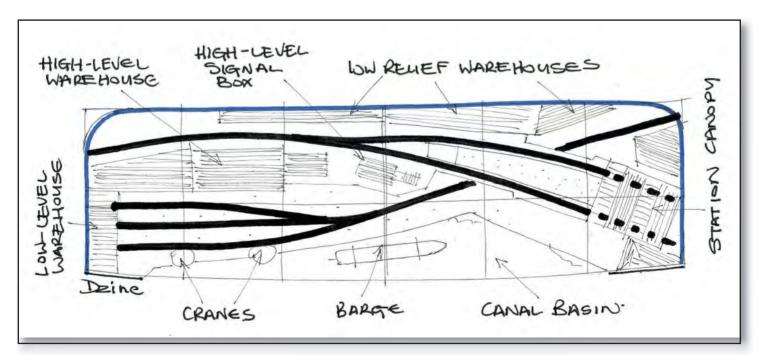
Despite being a seasoned layout builder, there were still many lessons I learnt from the project and so when Editor Ben decided it was time for a follow-up, initially known as 'Edgeworth 2', the result was to be a very different looking beast.

The first lesson was that while I'm used to attending shows as part of a team of operators, with 'Edgeworth', I was usually on my own, at least for the set-up. I'm also on the stand for the entire

day chatting to people and it's difficult to chat and operate trains at the same time. This isn't very different from the position in which most modellers find themselves; the model railway will be built single-handedly and operated the same way. If it needs to be moved, then it's a one-person job too.

So, I need something that is quick and easy to set up and takes the minimum of operator input to keep something moving.

Oh, and Ben said it had to have two track levels and DCC.



Stage 2: Paul Lunn took my plan and drawing in pencil, bent the tracks to increase the apparent running length and make everything look more natural. Compare this to the finished painting and you'll notice that we've removed some of the warehouses to both speed the build and improve some viewing angles.



BRM PROJECT LAYOUT

Urban scenes take longer to build than countryside as there aren't great areas of grassland that can be developed quickly using flock powder, mats or static grass.

My layout building space at home is a 6' worktop so ideally I wanted it to fit there. By incorporating two different levels, I'd actually get twice the track length, albeit as two separate mini-layouts. Packing all of that into a small space suggested to me an urban layout, the opposite of 'Edgeworth'. When land is cheap stations sprawl, but in town they tend to have a more compact footprint.

After a little pondering, the basic plan emerged. On our upper level there would be a terminal station. This will be operated by a Gaugemaster automatic shuttle unit so a DMU or railcar can trundle back and forth, at one end hiding behind some tall buildings. That will keep things moving while I'm chatting to people.

On the lower level will be a shunting yard. To keep things interesting, this will be an Inglenook puzzle (see below) to be operated by visitors to the show using a control panel mounted on the front of the layout.

My first plan was pretty basic. Drawn using AnyRail5 on the computer, it proved that the idea would fit in the space available. What it lacked was atmosphere, being rather too angular. At this point, I passed the plan over to layout design expert Paul A. Lunn for his advice. You can see what he came back with on the previous pages.

Paul took my computer-drawn plan and curved it to produce something that looked much more natural. When he showed me the plan of 'Across the Diagonal', I realised that I'd seen it in the past and maybe this had unconsciously influenced my ideas.

After some discussion, we came up with the design in Paul's artwork. By the time he got out his pencils for the initial sketches, I'd built the

baseboards and laid track which focused both our ideas. However, even with much of the 'hardware' in place, the buildings and scenery left plenty for our imaginations to work on. You can be sure that there were plenty of discussions about our differing ideas. These arty types have to be reminded that someone was going to have to build this thing for real, but then there are plenty of features that might not have made the finished project had pragmatism been the only driving factor!

As drawing proceeded we looked at suitable products to be used so that they appeared on the painting. Urban scenes take longer to build than countryside as there aren't great areas of grassland that can be developed quickly using flock powder or static grass. We'll be doing lots of kit-building, even if the kits aren't built as the manufacturers intended.

One benefit of having a drawing is that I already have a feel for the atmosphere we're looking for. This will be a run-down scene showing a railway in decline. While not the happiest of scenes, I think this it's far more interesting to look at than modelling everything pristine and new.

Our chosen time period will be the classic BR steam/diesel transition period, still the most popular. Steam will have been displaced by DMUs on passenger duties on the high level line. Shunting the yard will be the role of either a Class 03 or small steam shunter. Dock owners like the Port of London Authority and Manchester Ship Canal often had their own fleets of shunting locomotives so we'll be looking at the possibilities for motive power not owned by BR - an excuse to feature some different liveries.

The location is, provisionally, somewhere in the North Midlands/Derbyshire area with red brick buildings, liberally covered in sooty weathering powders. Our canal basin won't be doing any real business anymore but won't be totally derelict either

As you'd expect, there's a lot to do if this layout is to be ready for unveiling at *The National Festival of Railway Modelling* in Peterborough this October, so I'm going to treat the upper and lower levels as separate layouts.

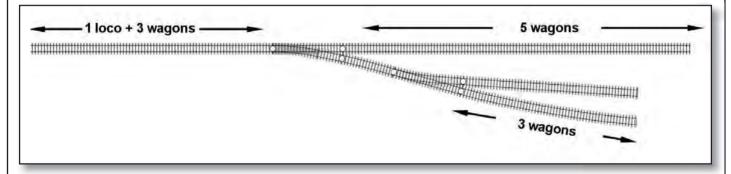
The upper level will use Tillig Code 83 trackwork, kindly supplied by Golden Valley Hobbies, and DC control via a Gaugemaster shuttle unit. The shunting yard below however is to be laid with Peco Code 75 track. We'll use this layout as an opportunity to test a variety of different DCC systems from manufacturers at shows, so that you can see which one you prefer. The points will be controlled with DCCconcepts 'Cobalt' point motors and 'Cobalt S' levers.

It sounds like a mixed bag of parts, but we've wanted to test the German Tillig track system for a while and it will be interesting to compare it with the ever-popular Peco track.

At exhibitions we'll be able to try both DCC and DC locomotives and for many visitors, it will be possible to give them a taste of DCC operation.

'Ruston Quays' will be built over the next few months, serialised in **BRM**. Watch out for updates on *www.rmweb.co.uk* where we'll open up a new thread for questions about the layout. In a few months time we'll have another layout to be proud of, and one that you can try operating at exhibitions in the future. **BRM**

WHAT IS AN INGLENOOK SHUNTING PUZZLE?



Shunting wagons around a layout can be a pleasant activity we can make it a little more challenging.

Invented by Alan Wright, the basic concepts of an Inglenook puzzle originated in the 1950s, but his classic 'Inglenook Sidings' appeared in 1978. The layout was designed to fit in the alcove beside a fireplace (hence the name) 4' long and 1' wide. The rules of the puzzle are simple. You have eight wagons and one locomotive. To start, draw cards from a deck representing five wagons to determine the order they should appear in the final train. Then simply shunt them into order. Don't worry about repetition, there are 6,720 possible different trains to make up.

This wouldn't be such a challenge except that the siding space is limited. You are faced with three sidings, two of which will accommodate three wagons

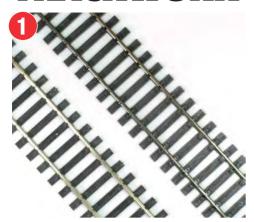
and one with a capacity of five.

Like all good games, the rules are simple, but the challenge isn't. Operators will tie themselves in knots trying to marshal a train but a little perseverance should see most through to completing their task.

STEP-BY-STEP **GUIDE**

TRACKWORK



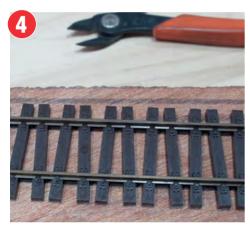
On the left, Peco Code 75, right, Tillig Code 83. The Tillig sleepers are just 1mm longer than the Peco ones and 0.25mm thicker. We're using Peco in the yard and Tillig in the station to compare the two.



Tillig 11/15° point on the left, Peco medium radius on the right. Peco has an over-centre spring in the tiebar for manual operation, whereas Tillig assumes a point motor is fitted that will hold the blades in place.



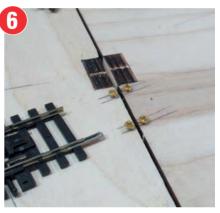
Tillig moulds holes for track pins in the sleepers but not all the way through. It's possible to see the holes from the top, although they don't show in photographs. If you glue the track, rather than pin like me, there's no need for holes. Note that the rails are chemically blackened.



One problem with Tillig is that it's very flexible. The sleepers slide more freely on the rail than Peco, so I spent time sliding them back into place for neatness when they bunched up.



Peco Electrofrog points are supplied with the switch blades wired to power the frog. This relies on excellent contact between the blades and stock rails - not always easy to achieve. It's also possible for a wheel to touch both rails causing a short circuit. Breaking the connections between the rails by levering the wires with a small screwdriver removes this possibility. We'll need to wire the switching through a point motor later. Tillig points are already set up this way.



When crossing baseboard joins, I don't like to rely on the plastic chairs to hold the rail to the sleepers. Careless handling can catch the rail, ripping it out of them, so I place small brass screws under them.

MONTH



With some sleepers removed, the rail is soldered to the screws. A good no-clean flux is best for this as it won't corrode the join later. The best I've found so far is from DCCconcepts.

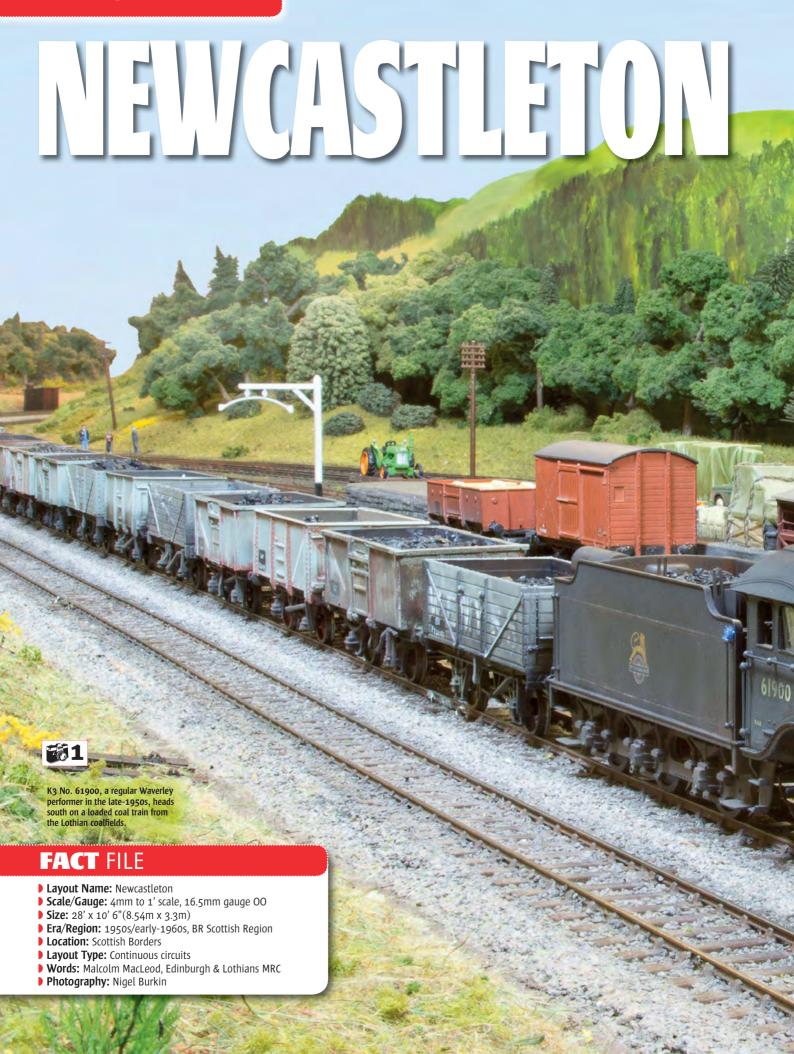


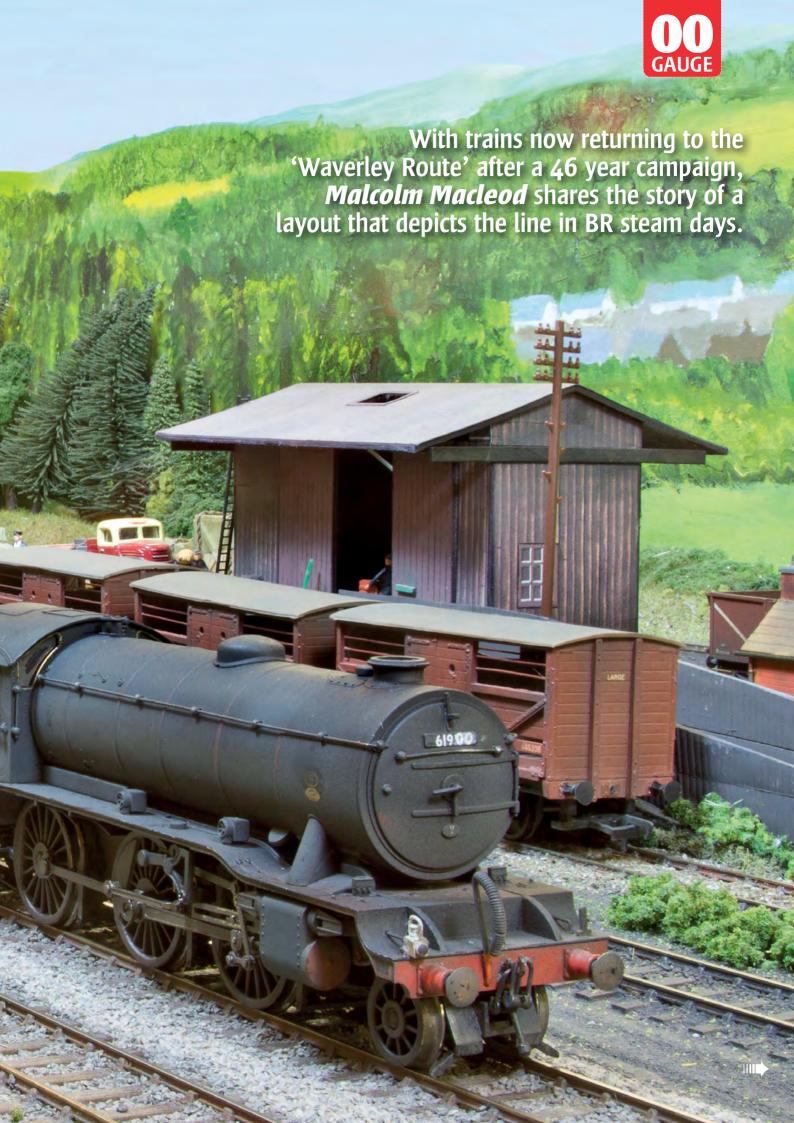
Before soldering, the chemical blacking has to be polished away from the Tillig track using a fibre pen.



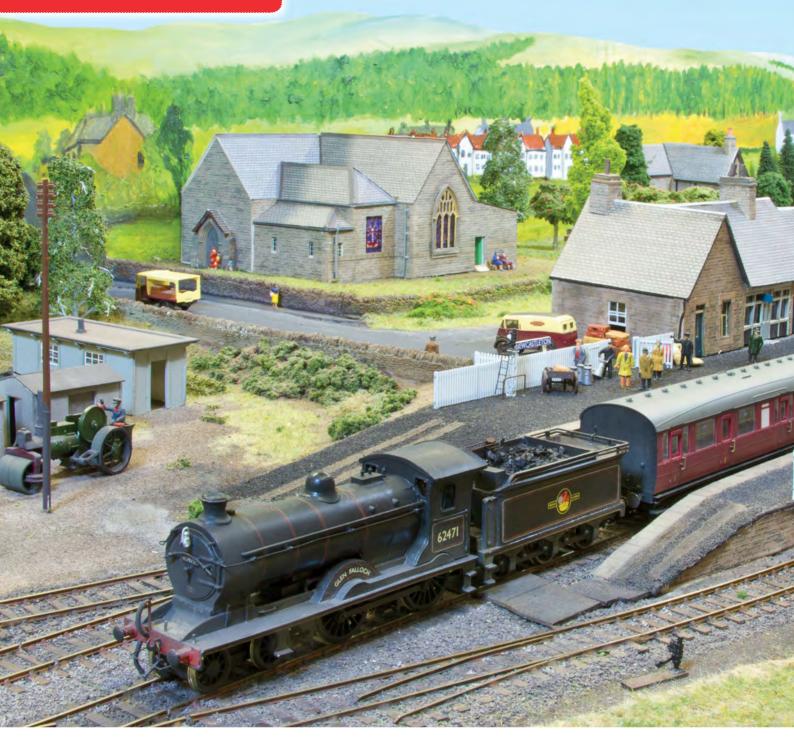
Once soldered, the rails are cut through using a slitting disk or fine saw. The finished touch is to reinstate some of the missing sleepers using leftover scraps of track.

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LAYOUT FOCUS



ewcastleton, also known as Copshaw Holm, is a planned village dating from 1793. The railway station, which opened on March 1, 1862, lay to the northwest just off the central main square. It consisted of two platforms, goods yard - now the site of a caravan park - signalbox, footbridge, level crossing and a stationmaster's house, which today is the only building still remaining. Heading north from Carlisle, Newcastleton was the last major centre of population on the 'Waverley Route' before Hawick, 21 miles away.

The 'Waverley' ran south from Edinburgh leaving the East Coast Main Line at Portobello Junction and running through Galashiels, Melrose and Hawick to Carlisle. The first section from Edinburgh to Hawick was proposed by an independent company, but was absorbed by the North British Railway before opening in 1849. It was extended to Carlisle by the Border Union Railway, opening throughout in 1862. There were connections with the Border Counties Railway to Hexham at Riccarton Junction and a branch line to Langholm at Riddings Junction. The route did not assume main line status until the Midland Railway reached Carlisle from Leeds in 1876.

The railway closed officially on January 6, 1969. The closure was unpopular and there were a number of protests by local residents. On January 5 /6, 1969, the final service train, a southbound sleeper hauled by 'Peak' 60 *Lytham St Annes*, was held up by protests, led by Reverend Brydon Maben. They closed Newcastleton level crossing and stood on the line delaying the train for two hours. Earlier they had also hijacked the local traffic inspector's Land Rover, driven it onto the level crossing and let the tyres down. The minister was arrested and

the-then Member of Parliament for the area, David Steel, who was on the train, was famously roused from his bed to negotiate the minister's release and persuade the crowd to allow the last train to pass.

Part of the 'Waverley Route', between Edinburgh and Tweedbank just south of Galashiels, is reopening in September 2015. Whether the line south to Carlisle will ever re-open and provide Newcastleton with a station again is a matter of debate!

GESTATION

Many, many moons ago Edinburgh & Lothians MRC (E&LMRC) members decided that after other layouts had been completed the club ought to build a large OO main line layout. Large, in the case of the E&LMRC, means 20-30' by 10', something that can be put up in the clubrooms without barring all routes in and out or blocking access to the tea kettle!



For many years Fountainhall on the Waverley Route, the junction for the Lauder light railway, had been the frontrunner. However as luck would have it, just as the club's O gauge 'Puddle Bridge' layout was nearing completion and thoughts were turning to the OO project, onto the Scottish exhibition circuit came an N gauge version of Fountainhall.

Well done East Kilbride MRC; you probably conceived, built and exhibited the layout more quickly than the E&LMRC has ever done but, with our thunder stolen, we started looking for another suitable prototype. We were drawn to Riccarton Junction, which had trains of a length we could cope with, a junction, small locomotive shed and some sidings.

However, it was decided in October 2003 that whilst there was adequate length available in the clubroom, we lacked the necessary width to accommodate the trackplan and associated fiddle

yard; the amount of compression necessary was just too drastic and would have severely compromised the model. So, thoughts turned elsewhere and settled on Newcastleton. Whilst what has been produced is not an entirely accurate model - there is a limited amount of compression - it will be instantly recognisable to anybody who knew the original.

HARDWARE

The baseboards were built using a ply surface screwed to a softwood frame. Most baseboards have one set of legs permanently attached by hinges and when assembled 'piggyback' to their neighbour. Two boards, the first to be put up when assembling

the layout, are freestanding. Two other baseboards, the last to be fitted into place, have no legs and are suspended from adjacent boards.

The plain track is SMP Scaleway and all the points were hand-built using code 75 bullhead rail soldered to PCB sleepers. The track was laid onto a cork base glued to the baseboard top, then ballasted with N scale stone ballast held in place by the classic 50/50 PVA glue and water mix with washing up liquid. All track sections have dropper wires soldered to the side of the track, fed through the baseboard and connected to give electrical continuity. Points are powered by Fulgurex slow-action motors with the exception of the goods yard where the points are mechanically controlled using the traditional 'wire in tube' method.

KEY DETAILS

OPERATION

The club's electrics 'guru' is a retired BR Signalling Engineer. As well as wiring the layout he designed a semi-automatic control system for the storage loops utilising Heathcote Electronics IRDOT (infra-red) detectors. This allows the layout to be run with only two operators if required, though normally a third operator shunts the goods yard from a secondary operating position.

The 12 road yard has six Down and six Up loops, each holding two trains. The operator sets the points, which also routes the power to the loop, and calls the first train from the front of the loop. As it clears the infra-red detector the second train automatically moves forward until it reaches the detector and stops, leaving space for the first train to come into the rear section where it also stops automatically.

Once this train has arrived back the points are changed and the sequence continues with the trains in the next loop. A card index shows when shunting operations or station stops are required and also keeps the two operators in step with each other.

All rolling stock is owned by club members and, as none of us use DCC, the layout has been wired for analogue control using various makes of handheld feedback controllers. The layout can be operated from the main control panel by two people, one each for the Up and Down lines, but a third operator can shunt the goods yard from a secondary operating position.

LANDSCAPE

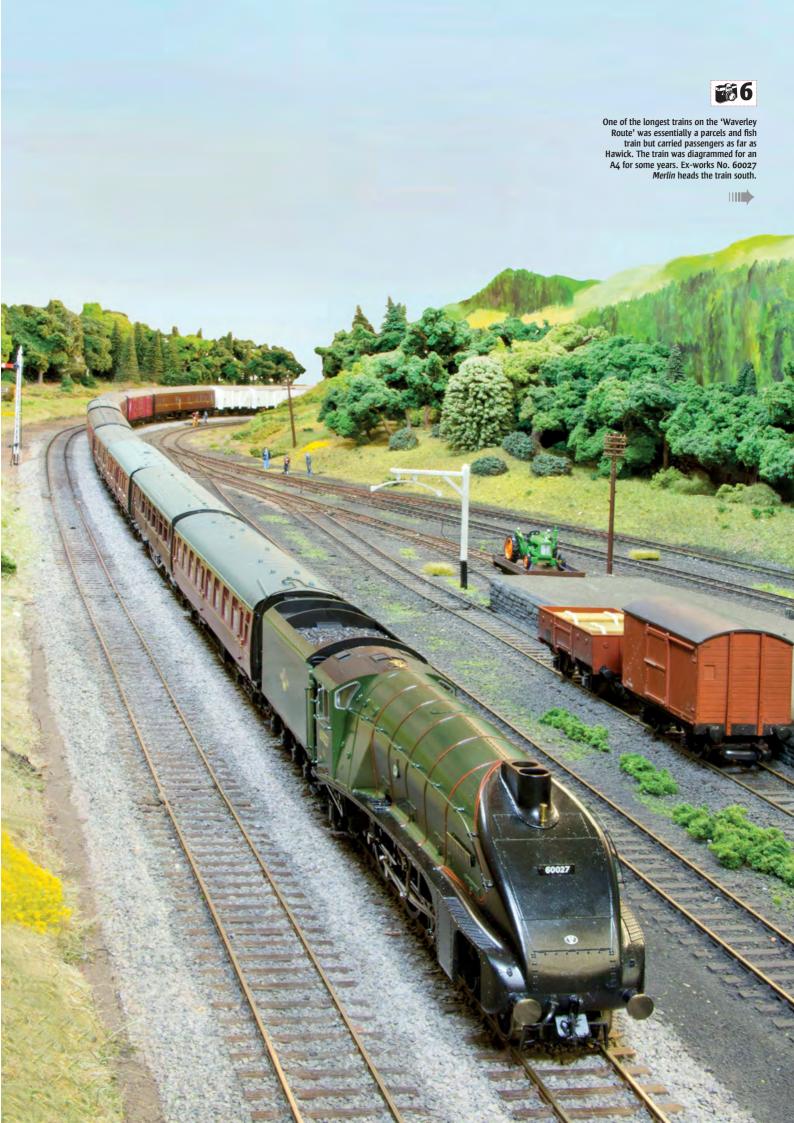
Whilst site visits were made, due to the passage of time since the line was abandoned, it has been necessary to rely on photographs to provide information on the topography in the vicinity of the railway and to enable the painting of a representative backscene.

The landscape was profiled from polystyrene overlaid with bandage and brown and black dyed plaster before suitably shaded flock material was applied. The area around Newcastleton is quite heavily wooded so it was necessary to 'plant' a large number of trees. Some complete trees were purchased from The Model Tree Shop but in order to keep costs - and the Treasurer's blood pressure - down to reasonable levels a production line of members was set up to 'grow' many of the trees ourselves. An armature wire framework was overlaid with glue and or paper painted a suitable base colour and greened using a variety of proprietary foliage.

There are only five buildings of note; namely the station buildings on the Up platform, the signalbox and footbridge at the south end of the Down platform, the stationmaster's house, a goods shed and the parish church - our largest building. Most

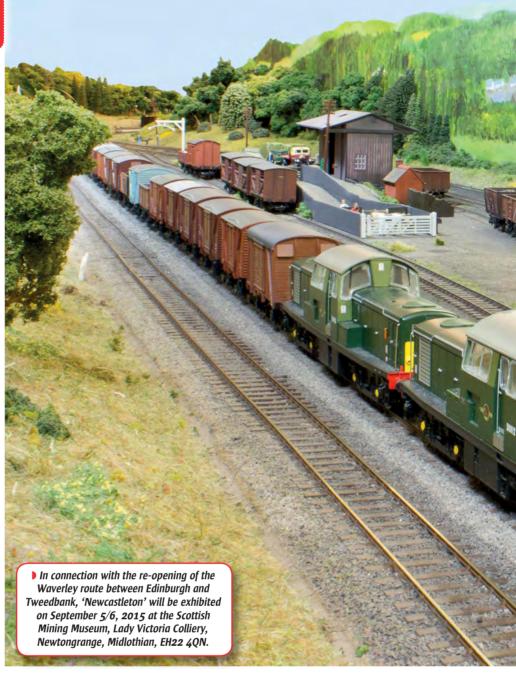
SIGNALS

Our signals are built from Model Signal Engineering components. The standard signals use LNER/ex-North British Railway upper quadrant kits [S4/KE2] built as supplied. Two signals use 45' lattice post kits (S0023); the signal with coacting arms (pictured), which is also fitted with a scratchbuilt bracket to carry the disc signal for the loop, and the signal on the Up platform.

All semaphore signals are operated by relays modified by soldering a wire arm to the armature, but it was decided that, in 4mm scale, operating disc signals would not be noticeable so non-working cast disc signals from the Springside range are used.

All signals are removable to avoid damage when the layout is being transported. The bottom of the signal is fitted to a length of square brass tube which plugs into a square socket fitted tin the baseboard. The signal is lightly spring loaded to return to danger so the connection between the relay and the signal is by a simple push-rod. This means the operating mechanism doesn't need to be connected or disconnected when fitting or removing the signal. The signals are interlocked with the points and with each other where required. Ongoing work is the installation of cosmetic point rodding and signal wires.





were scratchbuilt using mounting card and building papers, however the footbridge was built using a mixture of etched brass parts and scratchbuilding.

Future work includes fully detailing the signalbox and rebuilding the goods shed. Murphy's Law prevailed with the goods shed as no sooner had the existing model been completed than a drawing was unearthed showing that it was built in stone, not timber as had been assumed.

OPERATIONS

'Newcastleton' was conceived to give members' 00 gauge stock a good continuous running facility not available on our branch line layout 'Glendevon'. The layout is operated to a timetable sequence comprising 12 Up and 12 Down trains, reflecting what might typically have been seen from the 1950s through to the mid-1960s. The sequence is based on the 1953 Working Timetable with information on train formations being taken from photographs and various publications.

Some trains were shunted here to allow more important trains to pass. As part of the sequence, a goods train is shunted into the Down refuge siding to allow 'The Waverley' to pass. This was the premier train on the line linking Edinburgh Waverley and London St Pancras via Leeds and prior to 1957 was called 'The Thames-Forth Express'.

The eight-mile, 1-in-75 climb to Whitrope summit started at Newcastleton and banking locomotives were attached here to some northbound goods trains. This features in the sequence with the arrival of a light locomotive from Riccarton Junction which then crosses over from the Up line to await its next duty.

For many years ex-North British Railway J35 0-6-0 No. 64509 was allocated to Hawick shed (64G) specifically for this duty and it's this locomotive which is depicted in this article. Once a goods train has been stopped at the Down starting signal, the banker emerges and couples to the rear. On arrival in the storage sidings the banker is detached and runs into a storage loop to await its path back to Newcastleton.

ROLLING STOCK

The club is able to call on an extensive fleet of locomotives, coaches and wagons most of which actually ran on the 'Waverley Route' during the period depicted. Steam traction mainly comprises of ex-LNER or NBR classes including, A1-A4 'Pacifics', B1, D30/D34 4-4-0s, K3, J35-J37 and J39 0-6-os and V2s, but a BR Standard 2MT 2-6-o and even an occasional ex-LMS 'Black Five' also put in an appearance.

To represent 'progress' a few early BR diesel



classes can be seen, for example Clayton
Type 1 Bo-Bos, which were briefly seen on
the route. This motive power is a mixture of
modified RTR and kit-built and nearly all have
been repainted, renumbered and weathered
with extra detail added to represent
locomotives seen on the line.

Passenger stock comprises Up and Down sets for 'The Waverley' and 'Thames Forth Express', the Up and Down sleepers and three Up and three Down ordinary passenger sets. A number of representative parcels and goods trains are available and can be varied as required.

Freight flows include Down empty minerals balanced by Up loaded minerals, the doubleheaded car train to Bathgate and the daily trip goods working. As with the locomotives, the stock is a mixture of modified RTR and kit-built. Where possible the train formations are based on photographs of trains taken on the line within the period modelled.

When the layout was conceived the reopening of the 'Waverley Route' was just a pipe dream. Is it still a pipe dream that one day the Club will display this layout in Newcastleton on the day trains again run between Tweedbank and Carlisle? **BRM**

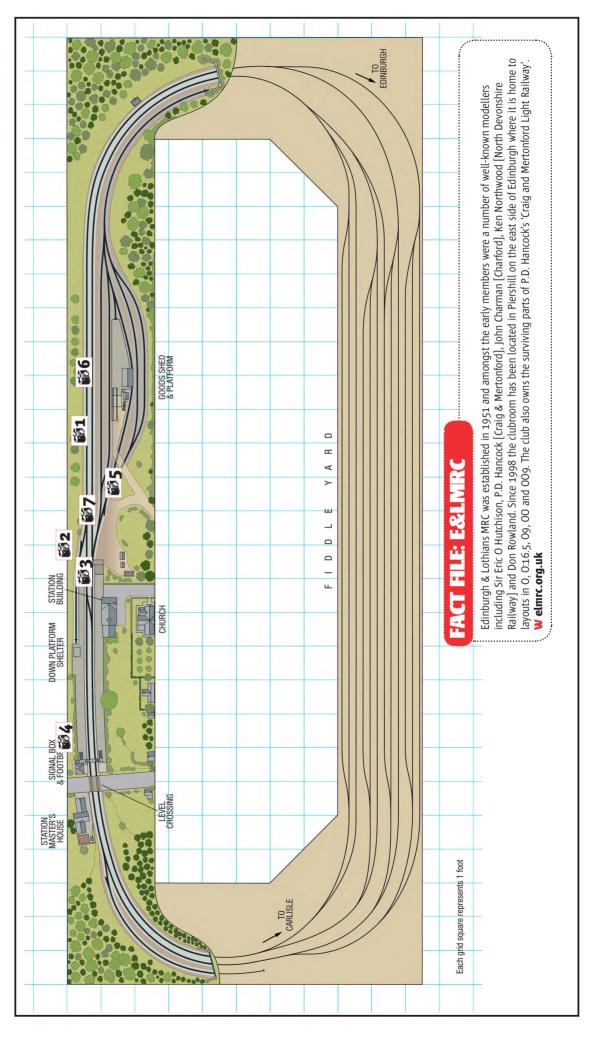


We operate to a sequence comprising 12 Up and 12 Down trains. It's loosely based on the 1953 Working Timetable with additional information on operations taken from the book The District Controllers View No.8: The Waverley Route by Xpress Publishing. Train formation information for 'The Waverley' and the St Pancras-Edinburgh sleeper was taken from *Passenger Train Formations 1923-1983: LMS-LM Region* by C.S. Carter (lan Allan IBSN 0-7110-1606-2). The operators follow a card index system to draw their trains out of the storage sidings in the correct sequence.

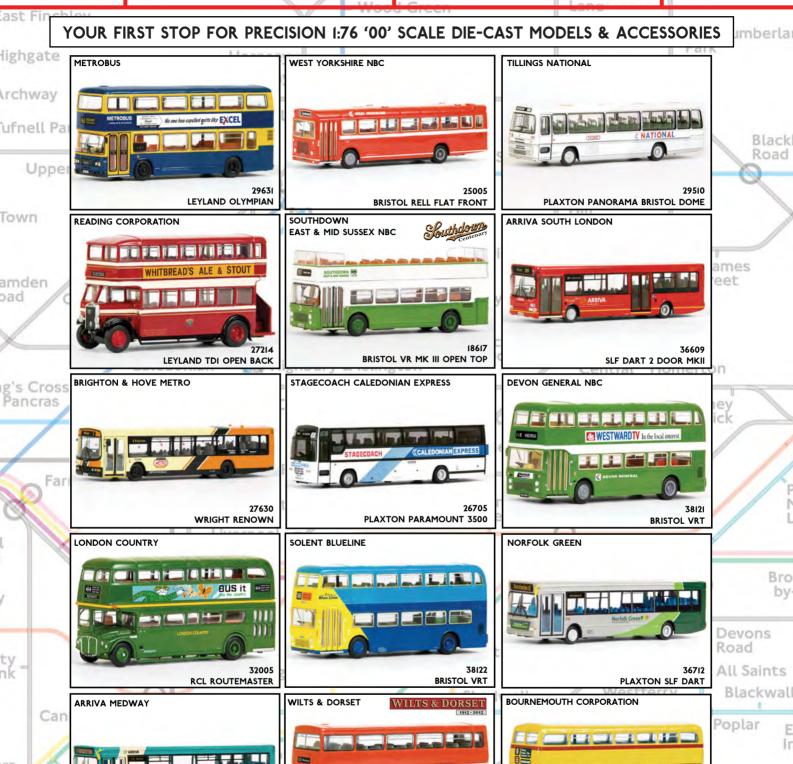

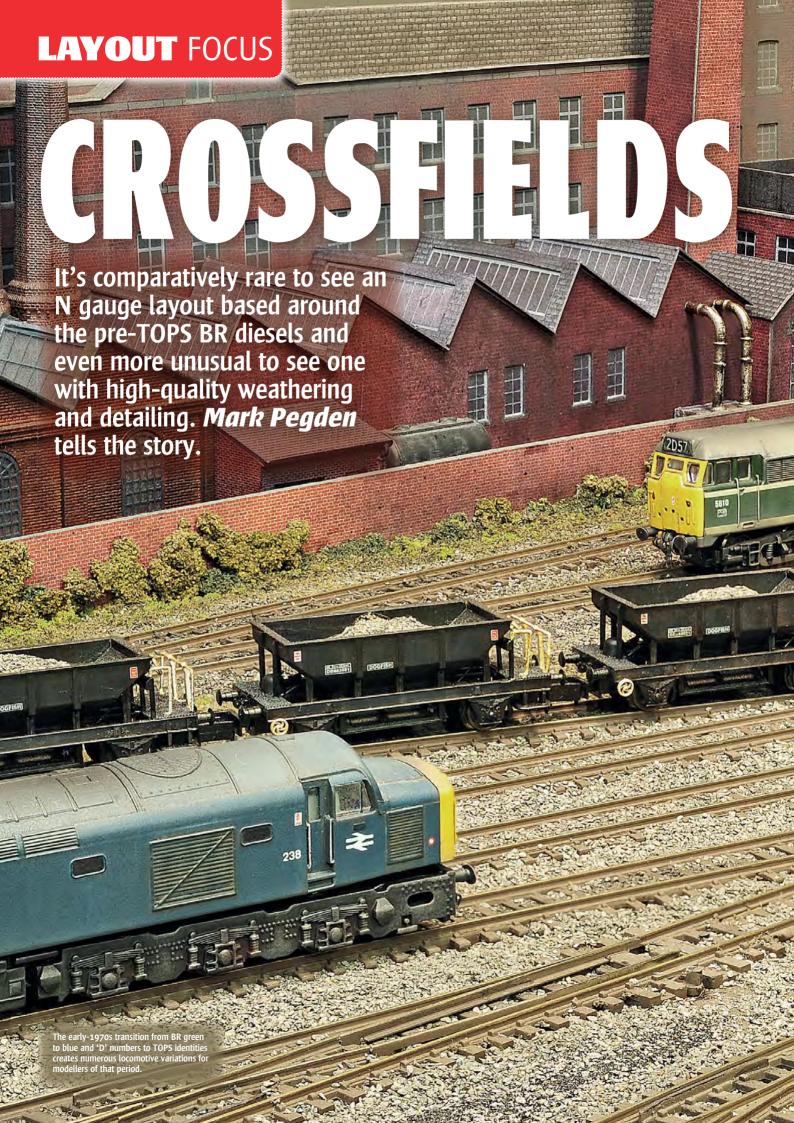
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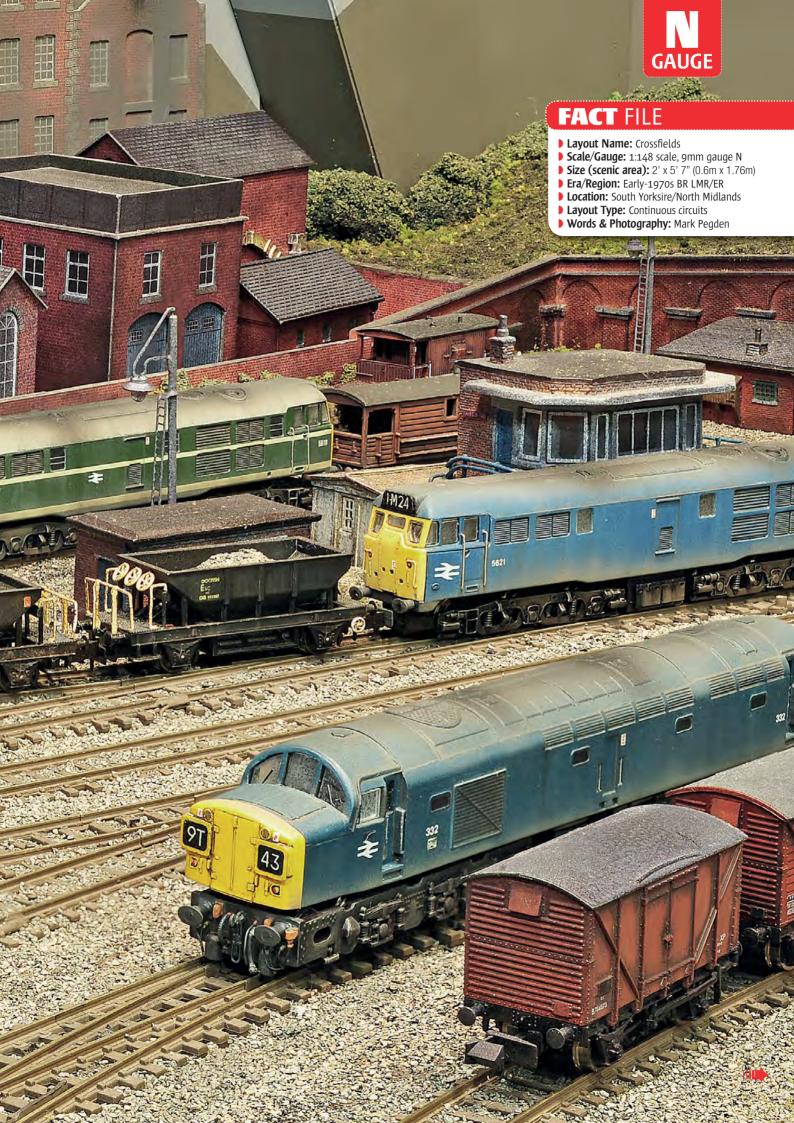

LAYOUT FOCUS

he construction of 'Crossfields' started in 2008 and was designed to be a platform to showcase the BR diesel era between the late-1960s and the introduction of the Total Operations Processing System (TOPS) computer numbers in 1973.

Although a fictitious location, the layout is intended to represent the look and feel of the Midlands/South Yorkshire industrial heartland during that period. As such, endless coal trains and heavy freight workings predominate, hauled by an eclectic mix of period diesel traction. The livery of the day is chiefly BR corporate blue

but some locomotives can still be seen sporting the last vestiges of BR green.

To re-create the atmosphere with a gritty realism, close attention has been paid to consistent weathering of, well, simply everything. In short, 'Crossfields' is no sugar-coated, cherry-on-top, 'Titfield Thunderbolt' of a layout! Think Toton and Tinsley in the early-1970s, long unfitted coal trains and British Rail as recorded in the black and white pages of Bradford Barton's finest books and you get the idea.

It first featured in the gallery pages of RMweb in April 2011 to much acclaim. At that time the layout was

very much geared to simply watching trains go by with a small stabling point and a few sidings to add variety; furthermore it was in operated by DC analogue control.

However in mid-2011, with a rapidly growing stable of locomotives, I started to ponder a redesign of the layout to incorporate a larger maintenance depot. Then one evening, following a five-minute sketch on the back of a Graham Farish guarantee card, the fate of the 'old' layout was sealed. This was also going to be the time to make the switch to DCC. Eight months later, following the great analogue-to-digital switchover, the layout is as you see it now.



(EY) DETAILS BUILDINGS AND BACKSCENE



The majority of buildings are Metcalfe card models that have been kit-bashed in some way. The locomotive shed is built from two kits end-to-end with a scratchbuilt roof. The large warehouse which dominates the horizon, by far the most commented-on building, is built from a total of six kits joined together. All of the buildings are further weathered with dyes, inks and acrylic paints until the level of grime is right.

They give the illusion that the layout is much bigger than it actually is. The outer limits of the backscene are purely made up of simple geometric shapes painted in singular block colours. This unconventional approach creates the impression of depth. Hopefully the effect comes across in the photographs, after all the visible part of the layout is only 0.6m wide and 1.76m long.



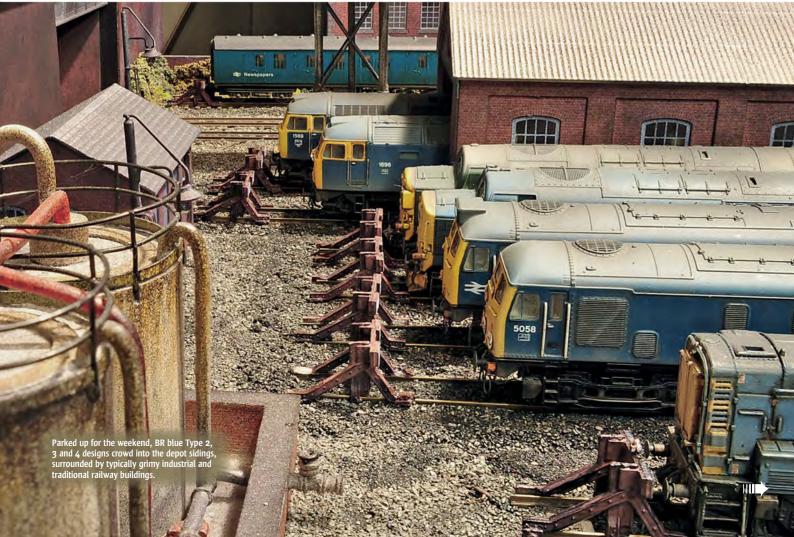

LOCOMOTIVES & ROLLING STOCK

To re-create the look and feel of the era a considerable quantity of period rolling stock was required. This was especially important as the longest of the 15 roads in the fiddleyard are capable of holding up to 46 short-wheelbase wagons. There are currently over 130 16t mineral wagons passing through 'Crossfields' to serve the local coal industry.

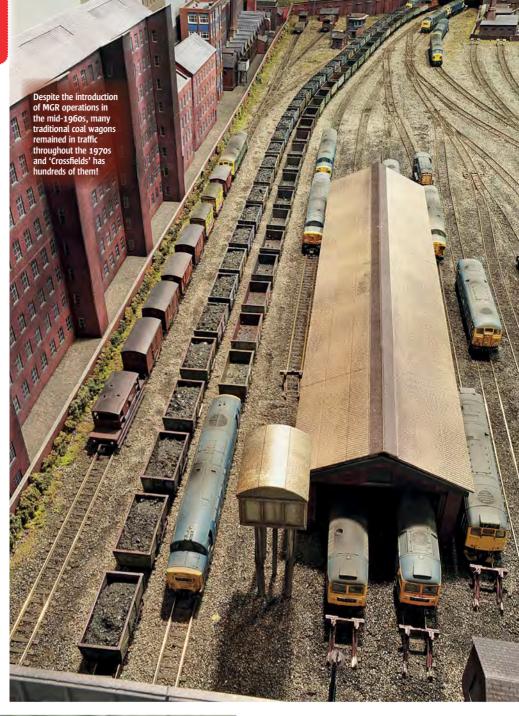
Every single wagon and carriage on the layout is individually weathered and detailed to some degree and no piece of rolling stock is ever run factory-fresh. And then there are the locomotives.

The post-steam, pre-TOPS period is a niche era for all gauges, but in N gauge it's very rare. Ready-to-run offerings are quite limited and more often than not are found to be incorrectly represented in some form. Getting this right was going to be a tall order.

Locomotives had to be re-sprayed, renumbered, 'domino' headcodes changed to four character displays and period details corrected even before the weathering process started. During the early days of construction I was quite happy with my weathering and detailing achievements. My buildings and rolling stock looked the part, but with the locomotives I felt things could be better. I really wanted to push the boundaries and achieve O gauge levels of detail in an N gauge package. So, I contacted Mercig Studios and the transformation of the layout began. Every locomotive you see has been researched from books and online resources and then submitted to Merciq for painstaking recreation. No two are alike and all carry individual idiosyncrasies, just like the prototype

To see a few examples, look carefully and you will see that none of the Sulzer Type 2s are alike; all sport varying configurations of grilles, bodyside valances, number positions and headcodes as well as the prominent snowploughs fitted to Class 24/0 D5027 and Class 25 D5166. 'Peak' D6 Whernside is missing a headcode disc, as seen at Toton in 1971 and D6900 can be seen as an ultra-rare example of a pre-TOPS blue English Electric Type 3 (Class 37) recorded with snowploughs and frost grilles fitted.

Capturing D6900 in this form was only made possible through **RMweb**, when fellow member





and N gauge modeller 'HealeyMills' managed to source a single photograph (thanks Lee!).

When you look at the photographs and cannot tell the scale or when you get accused of modelling in a larger scale and trying to pass it off as N gauge (true!) or when you place a coin alongside a model for scale and you're asked where you get 15' high penny pieces from you know you are looking at as close to perfection as you can get in N gauge.

These are not just models, they're more akin to miniature pieces of artwork. Recognition where it is due, 'Crossfields' wouldn't be the layout it is without the genius of Mercig Studios.

THE FUTURE

In my mind the layout is far from complete and countless details remain to be added. The variety of rolling stock is set to increase as is the fleet of locomotives, especially with the very tempting line up of new models that have been announced.

Keep an eye out on the **RMweb** Gallery pages for Deltics hauling Mk 2s, maybe a 'Midland Pullman' set and as for the arrival of more new Class 20s, I'll say no more! **BRM**

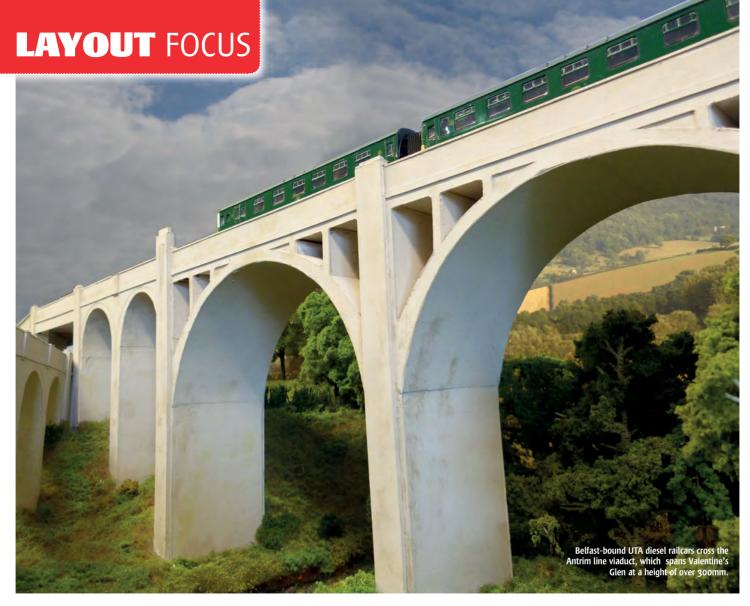

With its white concrete viaducts, this junction north of Belfast is one of the best-known railway locations in Northern Ireland, superbly captured in model form by **Colm Flanagan**.



he story of the 'Bleach Green' layout began in August 2009 when Ken Gillen's wife, visiting a local model railway exhibition, remarked; "You can do as well as anything here, why don't you do something that'll really make heads turn at an exhibition?"

The comment got Ken thinking. He'd built a beautiful model of a Northern Ireland station – 'Cookstown Junction', at home and I had built a considerable number of Northern Irish locomotives and stock. We began to consider on what places on the LMS (Northern Counties Committee) might be a good base for a new exhibition layout. So where? Should we go fictional?

Initially, I met Ken's suggestion of Bleach Green with considerable scepticism. Too big, too difficult, I thought. However, both he and Ian Sinclair (the third member of our 'group') agreed it could and should be done. So we began serious planning.

CIVIL ENGINEERING

It was July 2011 before Ken was able to begin building the 14 boards; the total layout size would be 26' by 12'. The boards were a major undertaking with two main boards at 7' by 3' each. This enabled us to build the viaduct as a single unit.

The plan was to build these two boards as a trolley. The top 'deck' would be the junction, the viaducts themselves would go underneath. We knew the boards would be big and heavy but there seemed no alternative if we were to make the viaduct to scale - a joint on it was not acceptable. As the viaduct boards' would have a depth of nearly 1' (300mm) from track to the bottom of Valentine's Glen, and

a further 1' to the top of the backscene, the layout would have to be somewhat higher than usual, and we finally decided upon 3' 9" as the datum height. The main line would rise some 2.5", the Larne line would dip by the same amount. Continuing the gradient over the viaduct (as per the real thing) wasn't an option as this would make the grades to the rear sidings unacceptably steep.

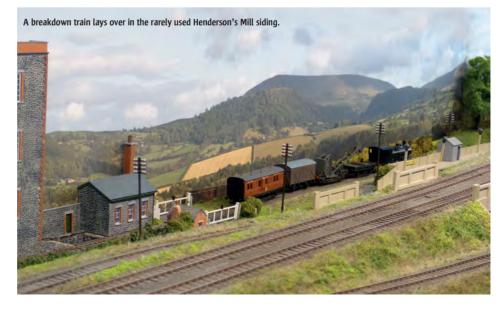
While the line schematic looks simple enough, levels for the track were complex. We decided that a ruling gradient of 1-in-50 would be achievable. One thing in our favour was that in Northern Ireland,

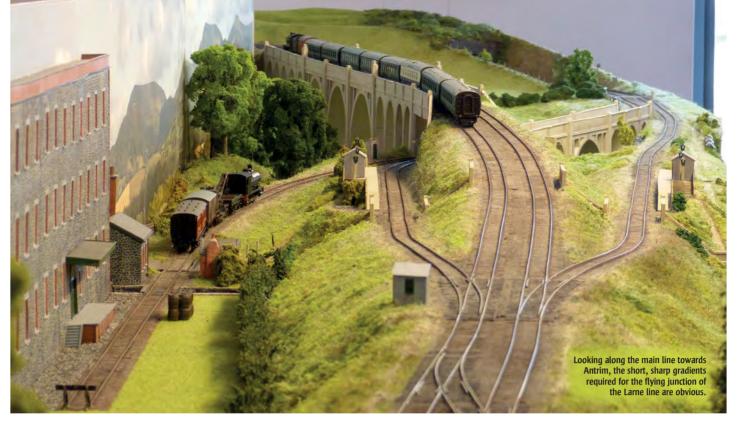
passenger trains were not usually more than six coaches and this would be the determining factor. If our locomotives could manage this, we would be OK.

I had built a number of Ulster Transport Authority (UTA) diesel trains using 'Black Beetle' power bogies. On the flat one could pull up to four free-running trailers, but they wouldn't work on the gradients - I needed to build a few more power cars!

TRACKLAYING AND TESTING

With the baseboard plan agreed discussion turned to track; what should we use? Although true scale Irish





5' 3" track is works out at 21mm gauge, the decision to use 16.5mm gauge was already made. All our previous UTA 1950s/60s era layouts had used this and we would re-use the stock from them on 'Bleach Green'. I was in favour of Peco Code 100 - we like its good running capabilities and robust construction and, if ballasted properly, it can look good. Ken had used Peco Code 75 on 'Cookstown Junction', but eventually Scaleway Code 75 was chosen for its looks. It is however more fragile than the Peco equivalent. One ongoing problem was that we could not set

up the layout in its entirety in the garage, and this caused alignment problems later on.

I began work on Bleach Green Halt, which had two short platforms, capable of taking three 57' coaches. The halt was built of plastic card throughout; one unusual feature is the nameboards which are not, as you'd expect, on top of the concrete fencing, but attached underneath its top edge.

By September 2011 we were able to carry out locomotive tests on some temporary boards with our 'ruling gradient' and - to our relief - the main motive power, the NCC 'Jeep' 2-6-4Ts and 'W' 2-6-0s

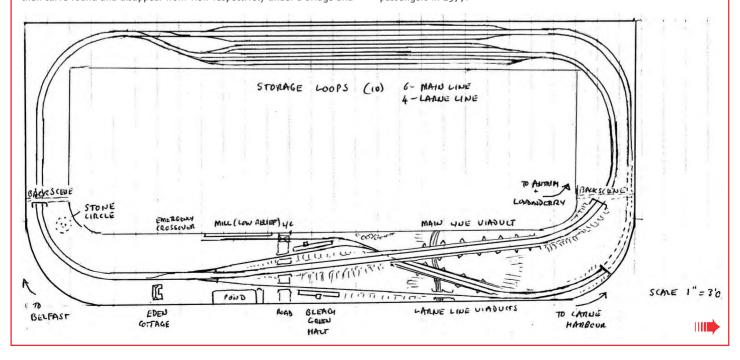
could haul the required six coaches, and more, up the inclines. This was encouraging, so we knew the project was viable from an operational point of view.

Ken was 'Chief Civil Engineer'; the planner and builder of boards and scenery, including the main viaducts which had to be built *in situ*. I planned and laid the track and acted as 'Motive Power Engineer'; I had built most of it over the previous six or seven years anyway. I also built the smaller structures - the halt, the mill, and a few houses. Ian Sinclair was in charge of electrics and signalling. Quite often Ian would be under a board wiring while Ken and I laid

TRACKPLAN

The trackplan on the layout is very simple and follows as closely as possible the original; a double track route emerges from a bridge, and runs towards the viaduct. There is an emergency crossover just before the viaduct is reached; it was rarely used, and on the model the points are not operational. The track then splits, one line (the Down Larne line) burrows underneath the main viaduct, re-joining the Up Larne line just beyond the glen. The Up Larne line joins the Up Main at the same point. Both sets of double track then curve round and disappear from view respectively under a bridge and

into a tunnel. The latter does not exist in real life but is necessary due to space constraints. At the rear are ten hidden storage sidings. We modelled the siding to Henderson's Mill, behind the Down platform of Bleach Green Halt, though in reality it curved in a near 180 degree half-circle away from the main line. The only item of railway interest, other than the viaducts and bridges, is the twin platform Bleach Green Halt, also built of concrete, with tin huts, austere structures which sufficed until the halt finally closed to passengers in 1977.

track on a separate board at the other end of the garage!

By July 2012, the main boards were largely complete and some scenic work had started. Electrics were also installed for DC operation. We already had suitable controllers from other layouts and our financial resources were limited. None of us like multi-way sockets much, so we used audio style XLR pluqs and sockets for the inter-board connections.

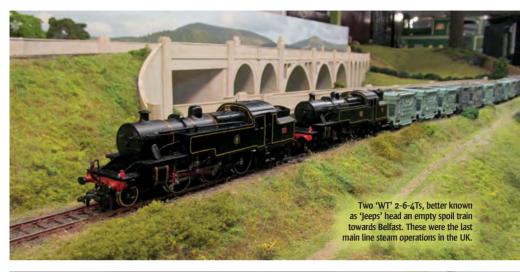
The major remaining wiring work would involve the signalling, which Ian wanted to make working. The platforms and huts at Bleach Green Halt were by now installed and I had completed the low-relief mill building. Our model could not be the correct distance from the tracks, so imagination came into play to create an attractive and typical background scene. We rarely use the private siding serving it.

We couldn't test the layout at Ken's house - there simply wasn't room and in Northern Ireland in September, to try and set it up outside would be tempting fate! Nevertheless on one showery day we set as much of it up as we could. There seemed to be some discrepancies in the levels of some of the end boards and we hoped that when we put it all on one large floor surface they would not be too great.

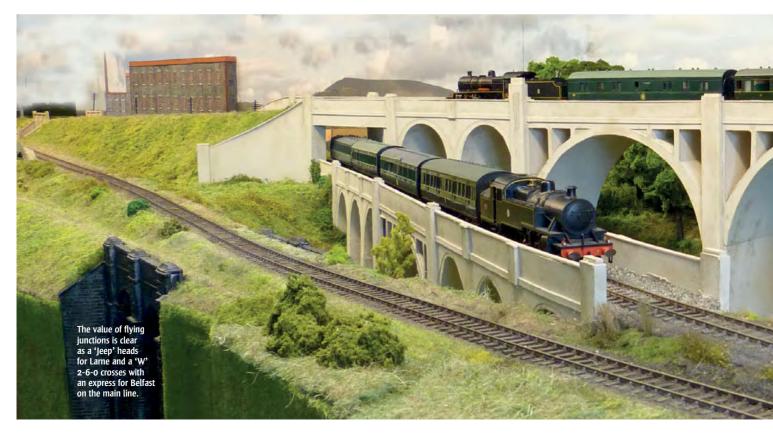
FINISHING TOUCHES

While the running tests were going on Ken had been working furiously on the viaducts to get them finished. They are built of artist's board throughout, painted and slightly weathered. We had some discussion about this; during our chosen period, the 1950s and 1960s, the concrete viaduct had weathered to a dirty grey-brown with lots of 'rust' streaks. We opted for a cleaner look, simply because on balance we prefer it that way! Our trains are all relatively clean for the same reason.

Two other significant structures are the house - Eden Cottage - and the mill, both long gone. We only had an Ordnance Survey map to show us the outline of the house, and I built something which looked like a late-19th century Belfast villa. We discovered from







a visitor to our first exhibition that the real building looked quite different from my effort!

To my great surprise the lady in question produced a photograph, so the current Eden Cottage is as accurate as it's possible to be. The mill was built from plastic card throughout, and styled as a local mill of similar type. We had no useful photographs at that time of what at Bleach Green's mill buildings actually looked like but used photographs of similar structures at Randalstown and Mossley (a few miles away) with their typical stone and brick facings.

In the era modelled, the viaducts stood in countryside. Today, housing in the area is built up right to the bases of the pillars. We are still debating whether to put people on the Halt platforms – none of us ever remember anyone getting on or off there, except one friend who wanted to take a photograph.

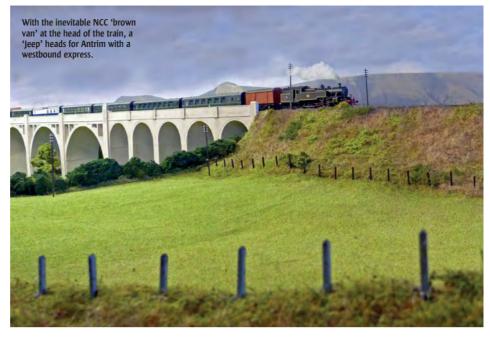
The stone circle is an unashamed flight of fancy, though it is based on a Northern Ireland one. It began life as a little 'build your own Stonehenge'!

LOCOMOTIVES AND STOCK

The layout is based on a general era from 1950 to 1968. The story of NI railways in this period was broadly similar to the rest of the UK and Ireland - railways run by a nationalised organisation - the UTA - steady closures and some modernisation as steam gave way to diesel. However, in Northern Ireland this meant largely 'home-made' diesel railcars; there was no Modernisation Plan here. Many steam-hauled coaches were converted into railcars, and this process continued into the 1960s, when the first diesel-electric types made their appearance.

The UTA chose dark green for coaches and railcars, which was replaced in 1965 by a number of new colour schemes, including the red and light grey which would eventually be carried by the whole Northern Ireland Railways (NIR) fleet. Steam survived in Northern Ireland until 1970; indeed the last main line steam workings in the UK were seen on these viaducts nearly two years after it ended on BR.

Most of the locomotives seen on 'Bleach Green'



were built by the former LMS (NCC), such as the 1930s 'W' Class 2-6-os and their 2-6-4T equivalents, the 'WT' Class, better known as 'Jeeps'. The nickname was given to these versatile machines just after their introduction in 1947, in memory of the go-anywhere US Army vehicle. They bear some resemblance to LMS 2-6-4T designs and were designed at Derby.

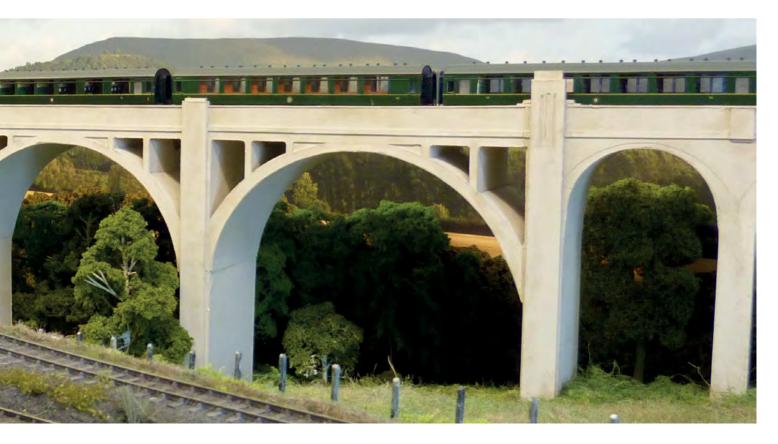
The model 'Moguls' and 'Jeeps' are all converted from Hornby Fowler 2-6-4Ts and carry UTA black lined with yellow and red; attractive when clean, which is how our models are. We've discussed weathering but haven't got round to doing much yet.

The vast majority of traffic is passenger and we've even got a 'Royal Train' which was specially prepared for the Queen's 1953 UK tour. The UTA got rid of most goods traffic in the 1950s and subsequently used diesel railcars to pull what was left - a sight

not seen in the rest of the UK! We run the odd breakdown train or permanent way special and, of course, the famous steam-hauled 'Spoil Trains'. These were operated, ironically, in conjunction with a motorway building programme north of Belfast.

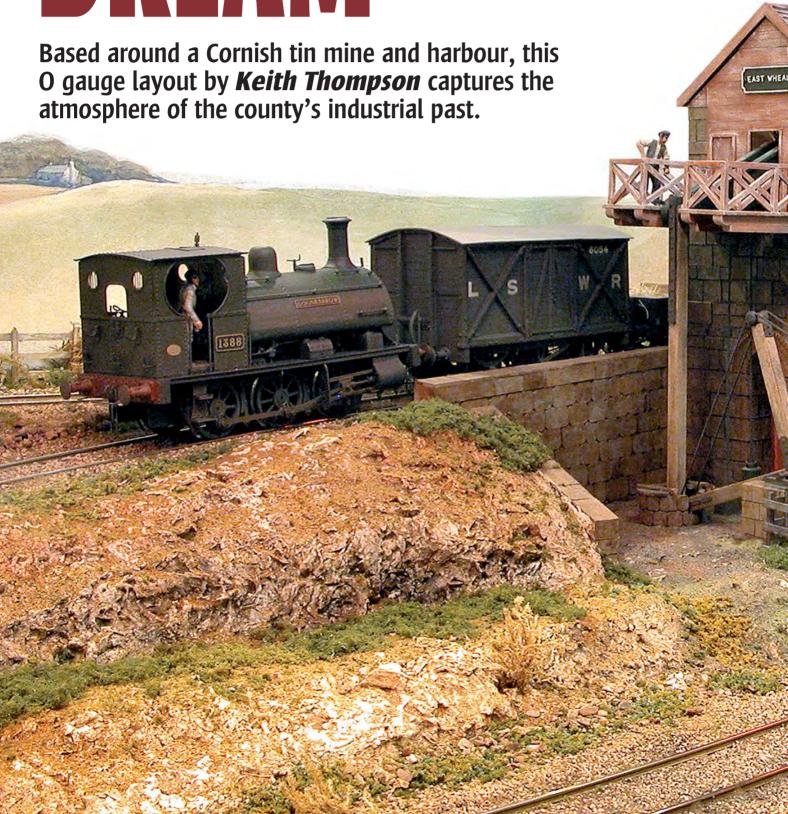
The unique wagons were built by Cravens and were hauled by two 2-6-4Ts in block trains of 20. Thanks to Leslie McAllister of Provincial Wagons, who produced a kit, we can run our own spoil operations.

We have no plans to make any alterations for now. It needs four quite skilled operators; driving a train takes some getting used to, as the curves and gradients provide traps for the unwary. Too fast and you derail and too slow and you stall! For all that we believe we have created a rather special Northern Irish railway scene, which many of us still remember with great affection. **BRM**



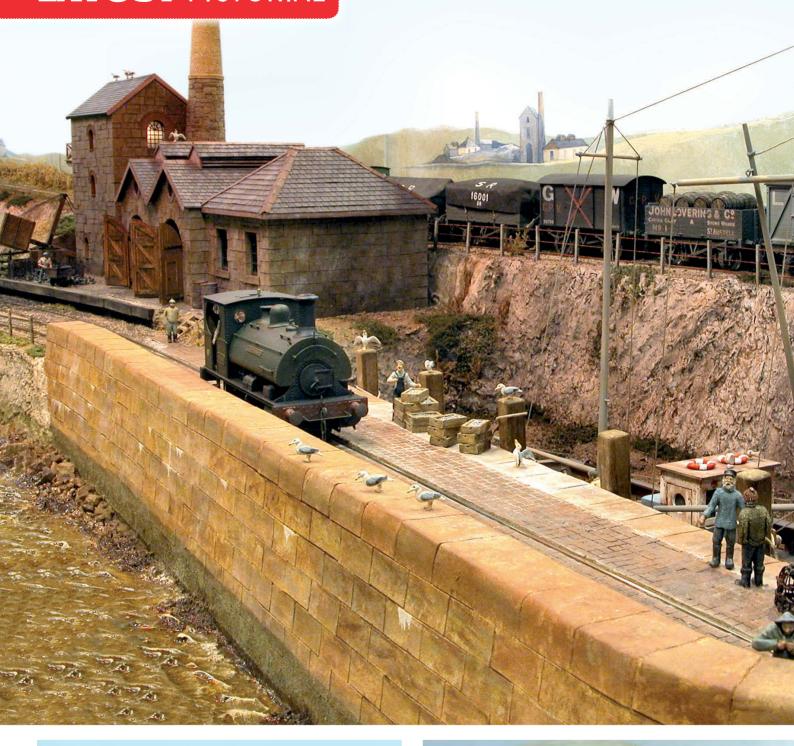

The beam engine is powered by boilers housed in the adjacent building, which are fed by regular deliveries of coal brought in by rail. The boilers are visible through the left hand doors in this view.



Goods traffic is dominated by china clay, but other regular loads include coal for the engine house, fresh fish, stone and, in this case, barrels of some unspecified liquid!





Above 'East Wheal Dream' is somewhere between Newquay and St Agnes on a branch of the CMR that managed to avoid being absorbed by the Great Western in the late-19th century. A CMR 0-4-0ST attacks the steep incline away from the switchback.

Below One of the layout's most intriguing features is a working beam engine, still earning a living and keeping the mine safe in the late-1920s despite the decline of the Cornish mining industry. Many derelict engine houses can still be seen in the county.





The lovely cottages are built in card with individually painted and applied hand-cut stones. Note also the delicate sash windows and beautifully modelled gardens.



Goonbarrow shunts an SR 12t vent van and a GWR long wheelbase van on the low level siding. All locomotives and wagons are kit-built, hand-painted and weathered.





ight wagons are placed on the front two sidings, each has an identity card, these are shuffled, five cards are drawn and placed in a row. The locomotive then proceeds to assemble the selected wagons in the same order as the cards on the rear siding, note that the front sidings only hold four wagons in each, and the headshunt is only long enough for the locomotive and two wagons."

These words were hand-painted by me on a large sign to save having to explain the shunting procedure on 'Littleworth Sidings' at model railway exhibitions.

In the event, visitors were so keen to get on with playing trains, that nobody bothered to read the sign first! It gives an indication of how popular this little layout has been at exhibitions.

It's a formula born of the fact that unlike many other micro-layouts, we allow both adults and children to take control if they want to. There is never pressure to undertake the shunting challenge, just moving the wagons around is sometimes preferred. I can claim no originality for the trackplan as it's just another version of the classic 'Inglenook Sidings' concept (see page 39). If Inglenook is unfamiliar to you then just search online for 'Inglenook Siding Layouts' to access everything you would ever want to know on the subject; their history, concept, layouts, YouTube clips and even a virtual operating site.

For the benefit of modellers not online I will attempt to give a brief summary. In 1926, A.R. Walkley built a minimum space layout that could be used as a shunting puzzle. The idea was revived in the 1970s/80s by Alan Wright and crafted as a switching/shunting game during the course of building several

similar layouts. Apparently it was the 1979 version based on Kilham Sidings on the North Eastern Region's Alnwick-Cornhill branch that received the most publicity. This was a result of articles in the model press, but in particular it featured in a series of layout

Size: At just 4' x 1' it's an ideal second layout. Easy to Store: That's where it got its name from. My version was started soon after I saw Paul Allen's 'Ingleton Sidings' layout (which can be displayed on an

ironing board) at an exhibition.

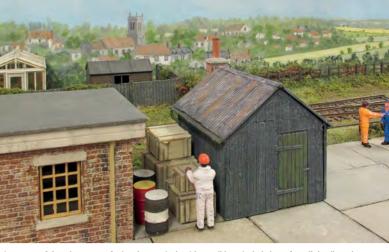
CONSTRUCTION

In true Inglenook tradition, 'Littleworth Sidings' was built in a very short space of time. An assessment of all the leftover timber from layout construction in my garage revealed enough material to build the 4' x 1' baseboard I needed, and a spare. A rummage through more odds and ends provided all the track with more to spare.

I also had some industrial buildings, but my layout had to be urban/countryside so that it could match a wider variety of backscenes. If I could have known then just how much use this little layout would get, I would have used brand new turnouts, motors and track. It's testimony to the durability of Peco Code 75 track that in ten years only the polarity switches have needed to be refurbished.

KEY DETAILS

THE SHUNTING PUZZLE

It's more of a game really. I select eight distinctly different wagons, some have branding such as cement or fruit to enable easy identification. All eight cards are the same size and colour with simple wording such as Van Grey, Tank Wagon Black and so on.

Let's suppose that five cards are drawn and we are ready to start. If the first wagon required is at the nearer end of the siding, then the puzzle will take about ten or so minutes to complete.

If, however, both the first and second wagons are at the buffer stops, then 20 or more minutes is required. The thing to remember is that until that first wagon is directly coupled to the locomotive, no progress can be made. I have found that when the task is completed, it is better to work the wagons back into the siding from whence they came as it is more satisfying than the using the 'hand of god' method. Happy Shunting!



I needed a small nondescript diorama style layout that could accept a variety of hand-painted backscenes I'd produced for my demonstration stand which was on the exhibition circuit at the time.

I was always able to attract the 'arty' types, but I wanted to attract more typical modellers. What better than a small layout that could not only complement a backscene, but could be operated if required? The only downside to this was an occasional clash of interests, but, the idea was very successful overall.

The backscene featured and shown in this article is a hangover from my demo stand. These days I find that lower backscenes are more practical when the layout is invited to an exhibition in its own right.

OPERATION

Even though I intended the layout for analogue operation I have wired it to be just as electrically robust as it needs to be for DCC. That means dropper wires from each rail and polarity switched Electrofrog turnouts.

Reliable operation and smooth slow running is paramount on this type of layout. An ideal locomotive is either a Hornby or Bachmann Class o8 'Gronk' as they both have smooth running five-pole motors, low gearing and plenty of weight.

For more punishing exhibition conditions I use eight dedicated older-style wagons with extra weight added. They are all fitted with slimline tension lock couplings with an additional modification to the coupler hook. This enables the hook to lift even when the couplings are in tension. I've filed off the harpoon shaped hook end to allow it to lift rather than catch on the underside of the adjoining coupling. I've also devised a homemade uncoupler tool so that wagons can uncouple with ease. **BRM**

The BRM team doesn't just write about model railways, we're building them too - across a wide range of scales, eras and locations.

PENMAENMAWR



The layout has yet to be painted, so the plastic finish of the buildings, track and ballast looks out of place. The buildings are scratchbuilt to scale from plastic card with embossed brickwork and have interior lighting and detail.

enmaenmawr is a project I started back in 2009, but due to work and other projects it has slowed considerably the past few years. The layout measures over 40' x $2^{1}/_{2}$ ' and is an O gauge scale replica of the location on the North Wales Coast without compromise. I thought that the ballast sidings, obscure station and dramatic rugged hillside behind it would make a suitable exhibition lavout.

Penmaenmawr's costal location is an excuse to have the odd seagull squawking away in the background, although most would be drowned by the noise of heavy traffic on the A55 that runs parallel to the tracks.

I've chosen to set the model during a specific period - the summer of 1995 - a time when change was afoot, privatisation had begun and many of the trains were locomotive hauled. Class 37s and 31s were common sight along the coast and with many varied and colourful liveries at the time. I think it's one of the best eras to model for diesel fans.

The last 'cross-eyed' Class 37 with bufferbeam cowlings intact and in a terrible state at the time in large logo livery - 37116 Comet, was a regular visitor to the sidings - a model of this is on the 'to-do' list.

ow becoming a reality after many years of wishful thinking, saving and planning, my home layout is at an exciting stage. My railway interests range from British subjects to the railways of Ireland and mainland Europe, but having spent some time travelling in Germany and Switzerland and seen how good the models are, I chose to model a fictional German station on the border with Switzerland, which gives me the best of both countries.

Using a combination of professionally-built baseboards and supports from White Rose Modelworks and trackbed sections precision cut

The bulk of the layout work is now complete
- the baseboards are built, most of the track is
laid and ballasted and many structures are built
- the station building was seen in **BRM** a few
issues ago. Other elements have featured in the
magazine such as the colour light signal, walling
and station plant pots.

The challenge is now to build enough rolling stock to run varied trains on it – look out for my Heljan Mk 1 coach upgrades in **BRM** soon. From first and second generation DMUs to locomotive-hauled passenger trains, nuclear flask trips and ballast trains loading from a working conveyor belt, all with DCC sound, lights and smoke - there should be plenty moving around to keep viewers both young and old entertained.

I'm not quite sure when it'll be finished, but as the saying goes - 'Rome wasn't built in a day'. **Howard Smith, Features Editor**

by industrial waterjet, it's not a conventional approach to layout building, but the results so far are excellent. I'm now engaged in tracklaying and wiring on the lower deck lines. The track power bus and dozens of droppers from the track are in and working well. The next stage is to start fitting and wiring point motors before the rest of the upper deck is installed.

Eventually, the upper deck will feature a station with seven platforms, two departure routes at each end and short stabling sidings nicknamed 'loco pockets' in Germany. These allow traction changes on through trains. Inspired by the half-station on David Segar's 'Waverley West' - look out for it in **BRM** soon - I designed the station on a curve with just the ends of the platforms and station throat showing at each end. Between them will be an upper deck with a scratchbuilt modern transport interchange and station entrance building hiding the tight curves.

This is also my first proper venture into digital control, so a few locomotives have been fitted with decoders to give some experience in setting up and running DCC locomotives.

FOUNDRY LANE

've taken on a small project which is now sat on my shelf. Fellow modeller, Mark Forrest created 'Foundry Lane' - a small shunting plank based on the classic timesaver format with a Black Country theme of a small yard serving an off-scene steelworks. It's a well-made EM gauge model which has been shown at several shows around the Midlands and ExpoEM.

I have a few ideas to bring evidence of the steelworks on-scene and include a representation of a railway structure of which I believe only one example survives - a Midland Railway rail/canal depot at the back of a steelworks in Wolverhampton. The trackplan could also suit a small rural colliery, dockside scene, a shabby preserved railway operation, exchange sidings for an ironstone operation, a wagon works or a small shed operation.

Taking on a layout that someone else has built will require some familiarisation, especially

with
the electrics,
but the hand-built
trackwork is to a high
standard so everything else, if
there are any issues, will be relatively easy
to resolve. I intend to increase the depth of
the layout from its current 14 inches. It only
measures 6' 6" long - so it'll be easy to chuck
into the car if I fancy doing shows with it in the
future

If, like me, you are short on time and not proficient in track-building, keeping an eye open for well-made layouts like this can give a good value leg-up to getting a new project up and running.

MELBRIDGE DOCK

elbridge Dock is my first successful OO gauge exhibition layout and took me 25 years to build. Although I've built others since it first appeared at a show in 1990, it's the one that's most special to me. It's also the one that is still the most entertaining to operate after over 100 exhibitions.

Planned as a small shunting yard that could be set up at home, the overall length had to be limited to 9ft, fiddle yard included and set in the late 1950s to early '60s.

The model was unusual in that the buildings dominated the scene, a real break from all the bucolic branch lines seen elsewhere at the time.



Dock scenes need to be full of bustle. Between the masts of a pair of scratchbuilt 'Clyde Puffers' is a Barclay o-4-oST, built from a DJH starter kit.



This scratchbuilt ex-LNER Z5 0-4-2T hauls a home-made passenger train comprised of two-axle coaches.

The operation is simple enough - trains arrive in the loop and are shunted to place wagons in appropriate sidings, while taking out those that have been stood around for a while.

Despite its age, the layout is still invited to shows. Each time there is a little tinkering - perhaps some scenic tidying or a new vehicle. Spare locomotives live in a display box over the fiddle yard to entertain those who like trainspotting.

It's very old-fashioned by today's standards. The buildings are scratchbuilt, rolling stock is mostly from kits and even the road vehicles were built or modified from diecast models. Modern modellers have access to far more, but if I'm honest, I prefer doing things the slightly harder way – at least it looks different.

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ENGAINE-CUM-HARDY

Robin French's tabletop layout measures under five foot in length, but still has an appeal for beginners with limited space.

or potential modellers, 'Engaine-cum-Hardy' shows what can be achieved on a tabletop, whilst experienced modellers can appreciate the planning of such a layout.

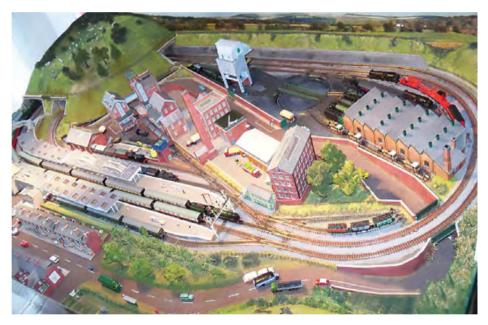
Using analogue DC control, four independent working manoeuvres can be undertaken. Apart from choosing which locomotive to use out of a fleet of 19, two main line passenger trains can travel prototypically at speed on the main lines whilst a goods locomotive shunts wagons in the yard. At the same time locomotives on the shed can also move independently as they prepare for their next turn of duty.

The main line station has four platforms. Platforms 2 and 3 can accommodate two seven-coach trains simultaneously whilst the bay platform (Platform 1) accommodates a branch line DMU. Platform 4 on the far side allows another branch line train to make a through connection with the main line from the opposite direction.

The station also has a goods yard with three sidings and two head-shunt lines. One siding serves the goods shed whilst another siding is for coal. A third (private) siding serves the local brewery, famous for 'Engaine Ales – and part of the Worthington Group with its own company branded wagons.

The brewery has a working turntable where wagons are turned and shunted into four different platforms giving maximum unloading capacity in the limited space available. This was quite common in industrial yards. The brewery dray horses would be used to manoeuvre the wagons on and off the turntable before leaving the yard to make their local deliveries.

The four-road locomotive shed and yard has a much larger turntable with ten sidings leading from it, served by two access roads. All 19 locomotives can be shedded here. The turntable and working coaling tower allows locomotives to be turned, serviced and coaled, ready for their next run. Finally, a 45-ton breakdown crane and snowplough are kept on standby for emergencies.



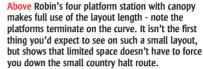

Left Full use has been made of the central space inside the tracks without creating too much clutter. An industrial environment with warehouses makes a suitable scenic break.

Far left A layout overview that makes the track layout clearer. Note the use of different levels to create variations in the landscape - a road passes under the rail bridge, tunnels pass through the hill.

Below left A street scene reminiscent of days gone by is irresistible on a layout. Robin's layout puts this focal point at the very front, exploiting the straight edge along the front of the layout.

Below right A variety of buildings can be seen on the layout, most of which are card kits from Metcalfe. Many are positionned at an angle, helping to break up the squareness of such a small 'tailchaser' layout.



Typically, nine BR Standard steam locomotives can be seen including No. 70000 *Britannia* and 9F 2-10-0 No. 92220 *Evening Star*. Then there is the amazing new-build Peppercorn A1 No. 60163 *Tornado* (back in its trademark early-BR apple green), an 'Austerity 2-8-0, an Ivatt 2-6-0 and no fewer than seven Brighton 'Terriers'.

'Modellers' licence' is freely claimed for the five 'Terriers' in pre-Nationalisation liveries (two are in BR black). These are retained in their original liveries because they are exquisite to watch as they trundle around the layout - their appearance at exhibitions always being greeted with surprise, admiration and affection by everyone who sees them. And that's a good enough reason to retain them.

Although diesels are generally banned at 'Engaine', an exception has been made for a Metro-Cammell three-car DMU, as introduced in the late-1950s.

Finally, 'Engaine' is a fictitious place set in the early-1960s, and so-called because it's an 'N gauge' layout that was come-by being 'hard' to build - although in reality it wasn't that difficult! **BRM**

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EXCURSION TO THE PENNINES

hen my then 14-year old son Matthew asked me if we could build a layout together, I was overjoyed. At last - a father/son bonding experience centred around a big model railway. We could run all my old OO trains and some of Matthew's childhood trains too! What could be better? Then Matt explained; "Actually Dad, I want to do it in N gauge".

I can't even see N gauge, let alone model in it, but not wishing to disappoint the lad, I said "Of course son, whatever you feel is best."

We sold the older OO stock and began looking for locomotives and stock for the new N project. We joined the N Gauge Society at the





St. Albans exhibition in 2010. This proved to be crucial to our success, as most of the suppliers and expertise was then grouped together in one place, save a few important 'cottage industries' that we have sought out for particular items, such as CR Signals and Forgehouses Model workshop for the catenary.

'Branksdowne Junction' is set on an electrified tributary of the West Coast Main Line somewhere high up in the Pennines. Set between tunnels is the small commuter station serving Branksdowne itself with frequent Northern services to and from

Liverpool or Manchester. The town boasts a small speciality chemical works and a vibrant High Street.

The busy yard was a Railfreight Distribution centre but now is home to Network Rail and Direct Rail Services stock.

The layout is all DC operated with section switches, self-isolating points and station stops. All the points in the visible section are operated by rods to make it more reliable and easy to construct.

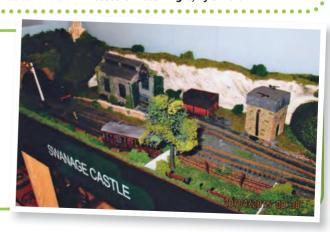
SWANAGE CASTLE

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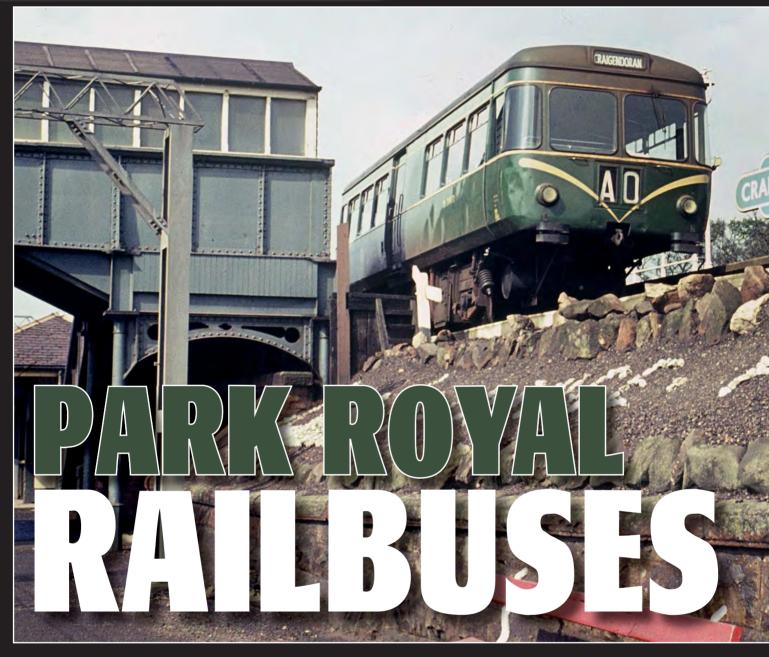

PROTOTYPE INSPIRATION



Designed to be the saviour of rural branch lines, BR's diesel railbuses lasted less than a decade but, as **Ben Jones** discovers, provide lots of potential for modelling projects.

ven before the Second
World War, many branch
lines around Britain were
failing to cover their costs.
For rural districts where
passenger traffic was sparse, railway
companies developed many different
solutions to reduce operating costs;
from steam railmotors and push-pull
trains to railcars powered by internal
combustion engines - at the time a
relatively new form of traction for
railways.

Necessity, as always, proved to be the mother of invention and some of the poorest railway companies - most notably those running narrow gauge lines in north-west Ireland - devised cheap, efficient diesel railbuses that eventually inspired the British railcar revolution. But, as car ownership increased and passenger numbers continued to dwindle, more radical solutions were needed if lines were to stay open.

Under similar circumstances, simple, lightweight railbuses were developed for rural light railways in Germany from the 1920s onwards, for both standard and narrow gauge use. In the early-1950s West German state railway Deutsche Bundesbahn took on the idea and introduced a series of prototype 4w railbuses and trailers.

Much cheaper to operate than conventional trains, the concept was very successful and production eventually ran to more than 800 units of various designs. Economical to run and requiring fewer staff to

operate, they transformed services on secondary and branch lines all over the country. Their low-slung design and retractable steps also meant that they could stop almost anywhere, like a road bus, attracting new business from passengers who could board and alight at small halts and road crossings and buy tickets from the driver.

Despite visits to see the West German railbuses, BR took some years to acknowledge their potential for loss-making rural lines, preferring heavier diesel railcars instead. However, in mid-1956 authorisation was given for an experimental batch of around 20 diesel railbuses for trial use on Scottish, Eastern, Western and London Midland Region lines under threat of closure. Of those, five each were built by Park Royal, Wickham, AC Cars and German company Waggon & Maschinenbau of Donaueschingen and two by Bristol with Eastern Coachworks bodies.

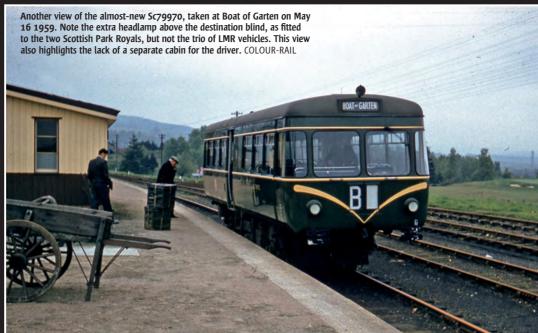
With the recent release of Heljan's OO gauge Park Royal version, it's that design we look at in more detail here. However, much of what follows applies to the other types too, including the WMD and AC Cars vehicles released previously by Heljan.

IN OPERATION

Perhaps most famously known as the subject of an Airfix kit from the early-1960s, the Park Royal railbuses were arguably the best looking of the five designs. One of the country's leading

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bus builders, Park Royal had been involved in building experimental sets of 4w railbuses for the London Midland Region in 1952-57, but built only small numbers of conventional DMUs for BR.

Of the five railbuses, M79971-973 were delivered to the LMR at Bedford in July 1958 for use on the threatened lines to Hitchin and Northampton. Sc79974 went to the Scottish Region in November 1958, followed by Sc79970 the following February. The latter was initially used on the Aviemore-Elgin Speyside line, while Sc79974 was introduced on the Dalmellington branch in Ayrshire.

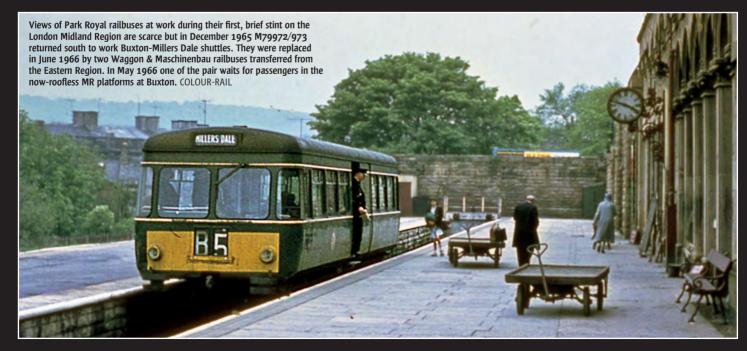
Despite increases of up to 140% in ticket receipts in the early weeks of operation, the Park Royal railbuses were quickly found wanting by the LMR and M79971-973 joined their

sisters in Scotland in February 1960. Made redundant by line closures in Scotland, M79972/973 saw a brief return to the LMR in December 1965, when they moved back south to work between Buxton and Millers Dale. However, they spent just six months shuttling between the Derbyshire spa town and the Manchester-Derby main line before poor reliability again led to their withdrawal.

With its tough operating conditions, steep gradients and harsh weather, the Scottish Region wasn't, in hindsight, an ideal environment for these lightweight vehicles, but ScR management was keen to find ways of reducing costs to keep some of its more isolated lines open. The three ex-LMR Park Royals helped to boost the region's fleet and provide more cover for failures and repairs,

as well as extending operation to two more routes (see p94). The two ScR Park Royals differed from their English sisters in having air-powered retractable passenger steps, for use where no conventional platform was provided. An extra headlamp was also provided above the destination blind. These features were not added to 79971-973 when they moved north.

While the railbuses proved cheaper to run and more popular with passengers than the elderly steam-hauled trains they replaced, reliability and durability were major issues. Failures were common, some railbuses even broke their frames and, weighing in at just 15t, collisions with obstructions on the line could lead to derailments. By March 1960, the British Transport Commission had decided that no more would be ordered.



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PROTOTYPE INSPIRATION

Alongside AC Cars, Wickham and Bristol railbuses, 79970-974 saw use on Lugton-Beith, Damellington-Ayr-Kilmarnock, Aviemore-Elgin, Stirling-Dollar-Alloa, Crieff-Gleneagles, Inverness-Aviemore via Carrbridge and Grangemouth-Alloa services, as well as Craigendoran-Arrochar shuttles. Kilmarnock-Ardrossan-Ayr services and the Darvel branch were added from 1961 after 79971-973 arrived from the LMR.

By January 1966, just ten of the original 22 DRBs were left in service, including all five Park Royals. However, 79972-974 were withdrawn in November 1966, Sc79970 in March 1967 and 79971 in February 1968. The body of the latter was subsequently used as a staff bothy in Millerhill Yard, until the discovery of asbestos insulation led to it being buried in a landfill site in 1984.

COMPLEMENTARY MODELS

Unlike many of the subjects we cover in **BRM** Prototype Inspiration articles, there's no matching rolling stock or locomotives to run with these railbuses. Apart from a rudimentary coupling hook used to rescue them when they failed, the Park Royals could not couple to any other vehicles. However, bearing in mind how unreliable they were, a railbus being towed by a steam locomotive such as a Stanier 'Black Five' would make an interesting addition to a 1960s Scottish Region layout.

There's evidence of Park Royal and AC Cars railbuses working side-byside (see below), both of which are now offered by Helian.

now offered by Heljan. Other suitable models include Heljan's BRCW Type 2s (Class 26/27), Bachmann ScR English Electric Type 1s (Class 20) and Type 4s

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(Class 40), plus a raft of ex-LMS/LNER and BR Standard steam locomotives used in Scotland. Also used alongside the railbuses on the Speyside route were two-car Cravens DMUs, as produced by Bachmann and BR Derby/Sulzer Type 2s (later Class 24/1), due for release by Bachmann in 2016. Don't forget to have a couple of tatty ex-LMS/LNER coaches (nongangwayed or demoted main line corridor stock) and a spare locomotive ready to act as a standby train too!

During their short-lived LMR operations, the Park Royals would have worked alongside Derby Lightweight two-car DMUs and a wide range of ex-LMS steam locomotives (4Fs, 8Fs, 'Black Fives', Ivatt 2MT and 4MT 2-6-os), all of which are available as RTR OO gauge models.

MODELLABLE LOCATIONS

By their very nature, many of the rural lines served by the Park Royal DRBs lend themselves to limited space layouts, but some larger locations also have great appeal. The Speyside line in particular offers more than just a simple branch line halt or terminus. Serving the area's whisky industry, it retained locomotive-hauled freight well into the 1960s and stations such as Craigellachie (see left) and Boat of Garten (see p85) offer plenty of potential for modellers. Three regular

Park Royal haunts that have already been captured in model form are Grangemouth (Falkirk MRC, see the **BRM** 2015 Annual), Alloa built by The Scottish Study Group and featured in **BRM** September 2012 and Millers Dale - which has been the subject of several layouts over the years.

If something a little more isolated is required, one of the specially-built railbus halts could make an interesting working diorama. Bachmann Scenecraft's new wooden platforms (Ref: 44-0010/11) are an easy way to re-create a basic wooden halt, although you'll need to scratchbuild the smaller, even more basic 'platforms' built by the Scottish Region.

Four were built at isolated spots on the Speyside line - Imperial Cottages Halt, Gibley's Cottages Halt, Dalvey Farm Halt and Ballifurth Farm Halt (the names alone give a clue to their remote locations). Look out in **BRM's** forthcoming guide to building a model railway (published in September) for Phil Parker's expert advice on making small wooden structures.

As many people have proved over the years by building and motorising the Airfix kit, Park Royal's short-lived railbuses can provide the spark for a fascinating layout project, or a quirky addition to many 1960s layouts.

RETRO MODELLING: MOTORISING THE AIRFIX RAILBUS

Before Heljan's RTR model, if you wanted a Park Royal diesel railbus, there was always the option of building a plastic kit. Launched by Airfix in November 1960, the model continues in production to this day under Dapol's ownership.

Of course as soon as modellers saw the railbus, they wanted to make the static kit work. The earliest commercial motorising pack came from Eames in the 1960s, but these are rare and unbuilt kits will be snapped up by collectors to be kept in their boxes.

Modern modellers could use the mechanism from a Hornby Class 142, apparently this is a fairly simple conversion but does involve cutting up a model. With plenty of secondhand Hornby models appearing as people upgrade to the Realtrack Models 'Pacers', it's got to be an option if you fancy a challenge.

The Hornby '142' isn't known for it's great running qualities so if this is important, Branchlines manufactures a kit to do the job that will appeal to anyone not worried about a little soldering. I built one a couple of years ago and the results are impressive.

Ancient transfers for the speed whiskers are best replaced with some from Fox Transfers or similar. Raised lines are moulded in the sides to aid lining but I scraped these off and had a go with a bowpen. Transfers might have been better but I found them difficult to apply in a dead straight line without breaking.

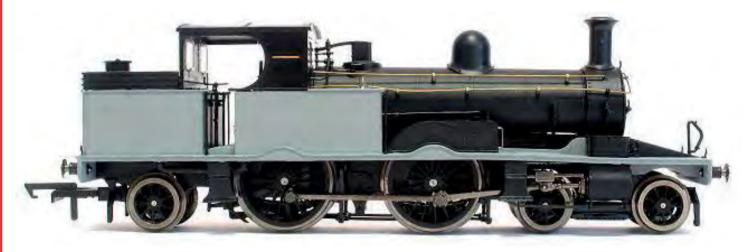

ADAMS 'RADIAL' FIRST EP FROM OXFORD RAIL



he first engineering prototype of the LSWR 4-4-2T Adams Radial from Oxford Rail was unveiled during a showcase event held at the Bluebell Railway last month. The prototype model shows the combination of several tooling options and so doesn't represent a specific





locomotive from the class, but serves as a demonstration of the standards we can expect from this new RTR manufacturer.

This first sample model has been tested for its running qualities over the past few weeks, before it progresses to the next stage of livery samples.

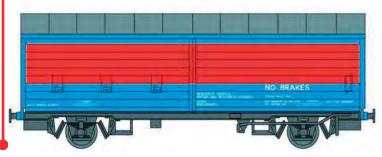

HELJAN LIVERY SAMPLES UPDATE





eljan has released livery sample images of its 'Catfish' and 'Dogfish' ballast wagons. The forthcoming O gauge RTR wagons are being produced to suit its current range of RTR locomotives and are expected to appear at the end of this year.

Both the 19.5 Ton 'Catfish' and 24 Ton 'Dogfish' ballast hoppers are being produced in four liveries; BR engineer's black, early olive green, late olive and 1980s grey/yellow to suit all periods between the mid-1950s until 2002. RRP is £99.95 each.

The Danish manufacturer has also been making progress with its model of Falcon in O gauge. Three livery samples are now being checked - Brush lime green as Do280, BR dark green with yellow warning panels as Do280 and BR Blue with yellow ends as 1200. They are expected to be released early next year, with prices yet to be confirmed.

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HELJAN CLASS 05 SHUNTER

A new diesel shunter is a relatively rare event in OO gauge, so **Ben Jones** was keen to see how Heljan fared with its first move into this diverse but underappreciated topic.



Ithough the superiority of diesel traction over steam for shunting work had been known since the 1930s, the intervention of the Second World War meant that it was the mid-1950s before BR began to introduce large numbers of diesel shunters. At the time, Britain still had many famous locomotive builders capable of designing and constructing suitable machines and they all wanted their slice of the action.

Dozens of different locomotive designs were ordered, some based on proven industrial types, others straight from the drawing board. Although it was one of the country's foremost industrial locomotive builders, Hunslet of Leeds played a relatively small part in the process, delivering just two types totalling 72 locomotives - a 204hp 0-6-0 diesel-mechanical and a class of three 153hp 0-4-0DMs used on quayside tramways in East Anglia. It's the former we look at here, in its final form as delivered in 1960/61.

Eight models are being produced in this first batch, from 'as delivered'

D2574 in plain BR green,
D2578/81/92, D2600 and
Departmental No. 88 in green
with 'wasp' warning stripes and
'as preserved' BR blue D2595 to
industrial No. 2 *Cider Queen* in green.
The latter has a steam locomotive style
chimney added by Bulmers of Hereford,
where it worked in the 1970s/80s.

Shown here (and kindly supplied by Kernow Model Rail Centre) is the Ribble Steam Railway's D2595, which was repainted in non-authentic BR blue in 2008. None of the later '05s' survived long enough to carry corporate blue in BR service, but it sits rather well on this handsome Hunslet design.

D2595 was delivered to York (50A) on January 30, 1960 and saw service from Ardsley and Bradford Hammerton Street before moving to the Scottish Region at Haymarket in April 1967. There followed brief stays at Leith Central and Thornton Junction in Fife before withdrawal on June 8 1968 - a working life of just eight and a half years. However, D2595 was one of the lucky ones, being reconditioned for industrial use by Hunslet and sold to Chadderton Power Station in Manchester in September 1969. From 1981-83 it also worked at Kearsley Power Station before being sold for preservation.

LOOKS

Heljan has selected the D2574-D2618 batch (see fact panel). In terms of looks, it is streets ahead of the kits available previously. There's lots of separately fitted detail, including neatly executed bodyside door handles and rivets, crisply moulded grilles and bonnet top detail, plus separately-fitted wire handrails and finely-rendered radiator shutters with a mesh grille behind.

The gently curved cab roof is also well captured, as are the huge cab



windows and their frames, picked out in silver. Other separate detail parts include lamps (non-working) and lamp brackets, fine windscreen wipers, sand pipes sprung buffers, warning horns, vacuum brake pipes and metal screw link couplings. The four exposed grab handles on the front corners are extremely vulnerable though as the plastic is not flexible. Separate wire conduits to the lower electric lights on each end are a small, but commendable and well-executed feature.

A die-cast metal running plate provides additional weight for traction, and below there's plenty of authentic frame and running gear detail.

The highly visible cab interior is moulded in a creamy yellow, similar to the paint scheme of the prototype, although it would benefit considerably from a little attention from a paintbrush to pick out the dials, gauges and controls on the drivers' desk. Fitting a driver is easy as the cab simply unclips. Separate crew seats and handbrake column complete one of the most impressive areas of the model.

Decoration of our sample was impressive, even down to the non-standard typeface used for the cabside numbers. Beautifully printed worksplates can be seen on the cab doors of certain models, and a moulded 'HUNSLET' makers plate is proudly carried on the nose of the bonnet. At first glance, this appears to be etched metal, but it is in fact moulded.

EQUIPMENT

Unclipping the cab and bodyshell reveals a tightly-packed die-cast chassis encasing a centrally-mounted three-pole motor with gears to the centre axle. Performance is quiet and smooth, with plenty of power for shunting authentic trains.

Standard features include a six-pin DCC decoder socket on top of the chassis block and detachable couplers to fit in neatly disguised NEM pockets.

As delivered, the models have plugin covers over the coupler pockets, but these are easily persuaded out of place with a fingernail if you wish to fit compatible couplings.

With an RRP of £129.95, it's expensive compared to Bachmann's Class 03 - the most direct equivalent in OO. A standard DCC Ready '03' has an RRP of £82.95, - £47 less than its Heljan rival. That said, many retailers are offering discounts, taking the price closer to the £100 mark. One or two fragile areas aside, it's a superb model of an attractive and unusual prototype. **BRM**

quivalent to the much more numerous BR and Drewry 204hp 0-6-0 diesel-mechanicals (later Class 03/04) and sharing the same Gardner 8L3 engine, Hunslet's 0-6-0DMs for BR went through several stages of development between 1955 and 1961. The first batch, numbered 11136-143 under the old BR system (later D2550-57) and 11161-176 (D2558-73) featured a relatively squat cab with a wide flat roof.

A total of 69 locomotives were built and delivered to the Eastern Region in East Anglia (first batch), North Eastern and Scottish Regions (later batches), although D2603-06 were also allocated, briefly, to the London Midland Region. The second batch of locomotives, D2574-D2618 introduced 8" longer frames and modified front steps, a 12" higher, more rounded cab

roof and larger windows, oval buffers and 3' 9" diameter wheels (previously 3' 4").

Early deliveries were painted in the-then standard shunter livery of plain black with steam locomotive style numbers and lion-and-wheel emblems on the cabsides. This subsequently changed to plain green with 'wasp' end warning stripes added from the early-1960s. Only D2554 (later 05001, 97803) from the first batch survived long enough to carry BR blue.

The drastic reduction in goods traffic and move from traditional yards and sidings to more modern railfreight operations from the mid-1960s led to a rationalisation of shunter types and the Hunslet 0-6-0DMs were deemed surplus to requirements, being withdrawn between 1966 and 1968. Four locomotives survive in preservation.

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HELJAN PARK

Heljan's third OO gauge lightweight diesel railbus brings back memories of the old Airfix plastic kit. Ben Jones takes a detailed look.

f like me, one of your first ventures into model railway kit-building was the Airfix/Dapol railbus, this new RTR model from Heljan will be instantly familiar. The company's third venture into lightweight diesel railbuses of the 1960s depicts the Park Royal-built variant. delivered to the London Midland and Scottish Regions in 1959.

Like the Waggon & Maschinenbau and AC Cars vehicles that preceded it, the Park Royal railbus is the perfect self-contained train for smaller layouts set in the steam-diesel transition era. Four liveries are available, Sc79970 in original dark green with 'speed whiskers', Sc79974 in green with small yellow warning panels, M79971 with 'speed whiskers' and M79972 in 1966 quise with small yellow warning panels (pictured). Kindly supplied by TMC for review are the two latter versions.

M79971 was one of three DRBs delivered to Bedford in July 1958 but transferred to the ScR in February 1960, restricting this version to a fairly short period. Even shorter was the six-month move of M79972/973 back to the LMR to work Buxton-Millers Dale shuttles. Destination blinds on the two models

railbus designs had a definite quirky appeal, the Park Royals were regarded as the best looking of the bunch and

> as the prototype carried a conventional tail lamp at the rear. No saloon interior lights are provided.

M 79972

In terms of looks, the models really capture the shape and feel of the prototype. Attention has been paid to the differences between LMR and ScR vehicles, with the two Scottish models having retractable steps under the passenger door on each side and longer handrails to match. These handrails need to be removed before opening the body, as well as the chassis mounted steps, although these were removed in later usage. The additional headlamp fitted to Sc79970/974 is not included.

Step bars are included for the customer to fit to the chassis, but it's recommended that the user does this after opening the body up to fit a decoder (if required).

Body removal is somewhat testing and Heljan's advice is to slide a small

blade into the rectangular recess just outbound of the wheels on the chassis,

insert a card or plastic shim between the body and chassis at each of these four points and pull the chassis out whilst avoiding gripping any more fragile parts of the chassis detailing. It's tricky, and requires careful handling.

The floor is artificially raised to accommodate the underfloor motor and driveshafts to each axle. Installing passengers will be possible, but they will need to be modified somewhat to fit in the seats.

Notable small details include the brass-painted horns under the left-hand side of each cab, two small wire handrails on the cab front, the flimsy 'buffers' with integral lamp brackets and bus-style seats with separate grab handles visible on top. The windscreens give a slight prismatic effect but are commendably flush

with the fine framing, the black rubber seal is very tidy. A look at *BR First Generation Diesel Railbuses* by Evan Green-Hughes reveals this clearly.

The decoration is impressive bar one or two areas that are worth noting. The yellow panels had fuzzy edges on our sample, while the application of the

light green lining was a little untidy on a couple of the rounded cab corners. However, generally the finish was neat and accurately printed, including the British Railways coaching stock roundels, most of the light green lining and vehicle data at the right hand end on each side. With a muted satin finish, the overall effect was convincing on both samples reviewed. Contemporary photographs show that the Park Royals were usually relatively clean and smart (perhaps because they spent so much time out of service and on depot!), so weathering should be kept to a minimum.

This is another successful venture into 'cult' BR traction by Heljan; it's arguably the best looking of its trio of diesel railbuses and will doubtless appeal to modellers far beyond the LMR and Scottish routes frequented by the prototype. Recommended. **BRM**

FARISH HAWKSWORTHS



ithout doubt one of the most stylish groups of pre-BR express passenger coaches, GWR

Hawksworth stock of the late-1940s is now available in N from Graham Farish.

After the introduction of prototypes in 1945, only small numbers were built in 1946/47 before the GWR disappeared. However, construction continued under BR, with a total of 550 built up to 1953. Withdrawals took place between 1965 and 1967. A few survived long enough to receive BR blue/grey - although not for long – while others went on in parcels and departmental service into the 1980s.

To complement its forthcoming 'Castle' 4-6-0, as well as many other recent N gauge steam and diesel locomotives, Graham Farish has developed a family of four all-new Hawksworth vehicles; a Diagram D133 three-compartment Brake Corridor Third, Diagram C82 Corridor Third, E163 Corridor Composite and a K45 Full Brake. Reviewed here are the three passenger coaches in post-1943 GWR chocolate/cream with the company's coat of arms flanked by the words 'GREAT' and 'WESTERN' in sans serif typeface and a dark grey roof. There's no Full Brake (BG) in GWR colours as these vehicles

came later and only carried BR liveries. Crimson/cream will be the only option on the BG initially, but BR maroon and hopefully BR blue versions will follow.

As front-line express coaches, the Hawksworths have a double waistband above and below the vehicle number and class designations applied to each door. Lesser vehicles in this livery had just one fine waistband. Decoration of all three coaches is exemplary, right down to the '1' printed on the glazing of the First Class compartments of the CK. Colours look accurate and densely printed with a pleasing satin finish. Printing is crisp throughout, complementing what is a superb new family of GWR/WR coaches.

The elegant body shape of F.W. Hawksworth's design has been captured beautifully, but it's the added detail that puts these models in the 'Premier League' of N gauge coaching stock. Separately fitted wire water tank filler pipes, gangway suspension arms and various underframe components are worthy of

note, as is the super-fine rivet detail on the roof, underframe and bogies.

The latter are well detailed in their own right, featuring excellent relief in the stepboards, suspension and axlebox mouldings. Free-running pin-point metal axles and wheels with fine flanges are fitted. Rapido couplings are in NEM pockets on a sprung, self-centring cam mechanism. Thanks to this and the extended gangways, 'daylight' between coaches is kept to a minimum on straight track, although the visual effect is still not as complete as Dapol's Maunsell coaches.

A small bag of extra detailing parts includes a set of bufferbeam hoses and two tailboards to fit into the rear gangway of your train.

Anyone wishing to assemble a complete period express train will find that the lack of a suitable RTR catering vehicle (of any GWR design) is the major stumbling block. Despite that, we expect to see sets of these outstanding new coaches on layouts very soon.

LMS CRIMSON 'RADIAL'

achmann's Lancashire & Yorkshire 'Radial' 2-4-2T has been given the full crimson lake treatment - a gorgeous livery from the early years of the LMS. With yellow and black lining, shaded gold numerals on the tank sides and LMS roundels on the bunker he deep satin finish is lush but not 'fairground' gaudy.

No. 10713 entered service in 1895 as LYR No. 1264 and is depicted in mid-1920s condition with a round-

topped firebox, original short bunker and Ramsbottom safety valves. Although many of the class lasted well into BR days, this example was withdrawn and scrapped by the LMS in 1938. Like its LMS and BR black predecessors, the

model has a six-pin DCC decoder socket, detachable couplers in NEM pockets and a smooth-running mechanism. Although pick-ups are only provided on the four driving wheels, our sample ran faultlessly while on test. The substantial die-cast running plate provides plenty of weight and stability for hauling typical secondary and local trains.

This is another lovely step back into the colourful inter-war period before black became the standard garb for smaller locomotives. **BRM**



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SOUND '37' GOES DUTCH



ince it replaced the drab 'General' grey in 1990, BR engineers grey/ yellow has proved enduringly popular with enthusiasts and modellers. Immediately nicknamed 'Dutch' livery thanks to its similarity to Netherlands Railways' standard locomotive colour scheme, it was applied to many different classes of locomotives and all types of departmental rolling stock.

Bachmann's latest sound-fitted OO Class 37/o recalls a fairly ordinary 'Dutch' locomotive in typically workstained 1990s condition. It's a useful machine for late sectorisation and early post-privatisation period layouts just about anywhere in the country. The locomotive depicted is Cardiff Canton's 37254, now preserved at the Spa Valley Railway. A South Wales resident throughout its main line career, it was allocated to the well-known Western Region Civil Engineer's pool (DCWA)

in January 1990 and retained its grey/ yellow livery until withdrawal by EWS on January 31 1999.

Bachmann's model is neatly and accurately decorated, complete with silver BR double arrows and Cardiff Canton depot plaques on the cabsides, as carried by the prototype until at least mid-1996. By April 1997 they had been removed and the remains roughly painted over in a darker grey.

Contemporary photographs also show that the locomotive was unusual in retaining its original radiator grille frost shields well into the 1990s, long after they had been removed from most '37s'. Bachmann has included a set of etched metal shields in the detailing pack to allow this feature to be replicated. The pack also contains clip-in miniature snowploughs and bufferbeam hoses/ cables to detail each end as required.

Standard features include all-wheel

pick-up and drive to all six axles, spung metal buffers, NEM couplers and directional LED headcode marker, tail and cab lights, the two latter of which can be switched on and off by sliding switches under the fuel tanks.

In this instance, the 21-pin DCC socket has been used to install a factory-fitted sound decoder and attendant speaker. The Class 37/0 is one of the better examples amongst Bachmann's fleet of sound-fitted models, providing a reasonable representation of the prototype. For the connoisseur, there are better, more comprehensive recordings available from after-market suppliers, but for many people this will do the job more than adequately.

Our sample ran and performed well on test, looking the part on late-BR period engineering trains formed of 'Seacow/Sealion' hoppers, but would look equally at home on Railfreight, Transrail or EWS period freights either singly or paired with other Class 37s.

Although 'celebrity' and named locomotives often receive the most attention from model manufacturers, for obvious reasons, it's good that 'normal' working locomotives are offered too and we look forward to seeing more.

FARISH SR BOGIE LUGGAGE VAN



he growth of high-quality
N gauge models depicting
Southern subjects continues with
this archetypal SR bogie luggage van.
Officially known as a 'Van B', the vehicles
were used for parcels, newspaper and

mail traffic, as well as to transport luggage on express trains to the many holiday resorts and ports served by the Southern.

Bearing a strong family resemblance to the more numerous 4w Parcels

& Luggage Vans (PLVs) and 'Van U' Covered Carriage Trucks, as well as the standard SR 12t ventilated vans, the 'Van B' was introduced in 1938, with 130 built in three batches up to 1953. A small number survived on parcels traffic into the mid-1980s, becoming the last vehicles of pre-Nationalisation design in revenue earning use with BR.

The Graham Farish model has been introduced to complement the company's superb family of Bulleid passenger stock and new locomotives such as the 'Merchant Navy' and Maunsell 'N' 2-6-0. For SR modellers, it will also prove a useful companion for Dapol's Maunsell coaches. However, these vans wandered far and wide, with contemporary photographs showing them in use across England, on Somerset & Dorset lines and even in Scotland in the 1950s and 1960s.

Our sample carries post-1957 BR Southern Region dark green with a mid-grey roof, as applied from the mid-1950s until the advent of corporate blue in the late-1960s. Decoration is

riginally produced as an exclusive for ModelZone, Bachmann's OO gauge Mk 1 Travelling Post Office (TPO) sorting vans have sold well and are now on to their third production run. Although 1960s Royal Mail red vehicles have been produced before, this is the first time they've been offered with representations of the retractable net used for collecting mailbags on the move.

The modifications makes the coach suitable for a considerably longer period of the decade than the previous models without nets, which were restricted to around 1967-69. This opens the model up to modellers of the late BR steam and early diesel era, after the Mk 1 TPO coaches were introduced in the early-1960s.

Despite having previously stated that it wouldn't be possible to fit nets to the sorting vans, Bachmann has



bowed to demand and found a way to do it. And very neat it is too, being assembled from two blackened, finely etched metal mesh pieces. At this point it must be stressed that the net is purely a cosmetic addition and not designed for the collection of model mailbags like the old Hornby/Tri-ang operating mail coach sets!

Also added are neat plastic representations of the four retractable arms that could be swung out to position mailbags for lineside collection at speed. These can be seen either side of the large sliding doors on one side.

Otherwise the model, in this case decorated as W80305, is as previously reviewed with superb levels of external detail and very finely executed decoration. Notable features include the impressive underframe detail and the superfine security mesh behind the many small windows. However, unlike their

Graham Farish N gauge sisters, the side-facing inspection lights still don't work on the OO model.

When the TPO coaches were first released, they were considered an expensive item at £40 each. That now looks like good value for a coach of this quality, especially as the RRP for this revised model has climbed to £54.95. Bring on the matching stowage vans!

to the usual high standard, with legible printing throughout (even the tiny vehicle information at the right hand end of the body) and an excellent matt, but not dull, finish to the BR green.

In terms of shape and detail, the model is very convincing. The extensive planking and external bracing has been crisply moulded, as have various other smaller features such as the handrails, chalkboards, hinges and door straps. Particularly impressive is the grey security mesh behind the glazing of all

four double doors on each side. Fine enough in 4mm scale, it is a miniature work of art in N.

Under the body, there are numerous separately fitted parts, including the underframe trussing, dynamo, battery boxes and brake gear; there's even a representation of the steam heating pipe along one side of the solebar.

Bogies are shared with the existing Bulleid coaches and have free-running metal wheels with pin-point axles. Detachable Rapido couplers are mounted in NEM pockets on a sprung, self-centring cam arrangement at each end.

Two other versions are being offered - an unusual Southern Railway green option with orange panels denoting a vehicle fitted with a stove and a BR blue van for the 1970s/80s. Vehicles built in 1952/53 were delivered in BR crimson, which offers another option for later. All should prove popular with N gauge fans, whether they model the SR or not.

BACHMANN LONDO

Underground train has arrived. Ben Jones tests this revolution in miniature mass transit.

ow often does a new model appear that opens up a whole new genre for modellers? Bachmann's new London Underground 'S' Stock has the potential to do just that.

London Underground is Britain's busiest rail operator, carrying 1.3 billion passengers a year and more people per day than the entire National Rail system combined. But, for enthusiasts and modellers, it's always been a specialist pursuit, with the flame carried by a small band of dedicated fans and kit suppliers. That may be about to change...

The first ever high-quality RTR models of London Underground stock will be available to the public from September 27, at the LT Museum's Acton depot open day, and from the LT Museum shop in Covent Garden from October 2.

However, thanks to the museum and Bachmann, we've been able to take a good look at the models before they are released. Supplied for review is the four-car base pack containing S8 cars Driving Motor 21088, M1 22088, MS 24087 and Driving Motor 21087. Production is limited to 2,000 packs, and indications are that you'll need to move fast to secure one, if you haven't already pre-ordered.

Four additional trailer cars have also been produced (1,000 of each), allowing a full Metropolitan Line eight-car set to be formed. These are M2 23088 (35-995), MS 24088 (35-996), M2 23087 (35-995A) and M1 22087 (35-997). All cars have a five-digit number: the second digit identifies the role of car, the last three digits the set number (001-116, 301-565).

A low-profile mechanism with centrally-mounted motor drives two axles on each Driving Motor (DM) vehicle. A cardan shaft links the motor to gears on the inner bogie. The only visible evidence of the mechanism in the saloon is a capacitor poking through the floor. The fact that Bachmann now has a true low-profile multiple unit mechanism bodes well for future releases such as the re-tooled Class 158.

Brass wiper pick-ups are provided on all wheels, including those of the trailer cars. Trailing wheels are relatively free running and have pin-point axles, while the powered axles have inside bearings. Our set ran smoothly, with the two motor cars well matched, although it was fairly noisy initially.

The prescribed 'running-in' period of an hour in each direction and careful lubrication should help to resolve this.

Despite the small wheels and bogies tucked well under the body, no difficulties were encountered on tight curves or pointwork. A minimum curve radius of 450mm (18") is recommended.

The two motor bogies are more than adequate for a four-car set, but for those using the trains in full '58' formation or with steep gradients, a pair of alternative driving axles with traction tyres is provided. These are easy to exchange by removing the bogie retaining plate.

LOOKS

With assistance from Transport for London (TfL) and design material from Bombardier, Bachmann has produced a very convincing representation of this contemporary Underground train. The clean, modern design has been well captured, especially around the cab front, and the bulbous body profile, taking full advantage of LU's loading qauge, is spot on.

Windscreen wipers are fitted on the three front windows, but otherwise separately fitted detail is fairly minimal. Areas such as the roof-mounted air-conditioning units, underframe equipment and gangways are neatly

moulded, but don't feature separate components such as etched mesh grilles, wire handrails or equipment boxes.

Bogies are neat and accurate and include representations of the pick-up shoes and trip cocks on the DM cars. The underfloor equipment on the two DMs surrounds the mechanism and is cast in metal to provide extra weight for traction. On the unpowered centre cars, the underframe equipment is moulded in one piece, but looks convincing.

Whilst primarily aimed at collectors, Underground fans and visitors to the LT Museum, the set has a number of features designed with the more 'serious' modeller in mind. The interior seating units of the

FACT FILE: LU 'S' STOCK



s part of a massive renewal of rolling stock and infrastructure, London Underground placed a £1.5 billion order with Bombardier for new sub-surface trains, known as 'S' Stock. Introduced in 2010, a total of 1,395 cars formed into 191 trains are being assembled in Derby. Eight-car (S8) trains took over Metropolitan Line services in 2010-12, S7s were introduced on the Hammersmith & City and Circle Lines in 2012-14 and deliveries are now focusing on S7

sets for the District Line. Deliveries are scheduled to be completed in 2016. S8 sets have a mix of seating bays suited to longer-distance journeys and longitudinal seats, while S7 seating is entirely longitudinal benches.

'S' Stock sets are the first LU trains to have full-width gangways between cars, regenerative braking and air-conditioning, as well as many other modern features. Maximum capacity of an S8 set is 1,226 people, although only 306 of those are seated.



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PRODUCT REVIEW



DM cars have a 'break out' section above the decoder compartment, allowing space to fit a speaker for DCC sound; part of the front valance is removable, which should permit end couplings to be fitted and the pick-ups throughout will assist if you plan to fit interior lights. With a little work, it ought to be possible to re-create the main line delivery trips from Derby powered by top-and-tail GB Railfreight Class 205!

Interior seating units with a mix of seating bays and longitudinal benches are one of several features that mark this out as an S8 set. The interior is relatively basic, lacking features such as the many

handrails for standing passengers and glass partitions by each pair of doors, but these could feasibly be added by the keen modeller. Likewise, it was not feasible to model the distinctive full-width gangways within the set, but the grey plastic inner ends could be opened out if necessary.

The large windows make the absence of people very obvious, both in the cab and passenger saloon. A decent smattering of figures inside would help to make it look more realistic, although a rush hour load would require a serious investment in Preiser figures!

One of the defining factors of the 'S' Stock is the extremely bright blue-white

LED headlights, which give plenty of warning of your train's arrival at sub-surface stations. Bachmann has done an excellent job of capturing this with directional LEDs, giving two white headlights and two smaller red tail lights at the rear. Also illuminated are the superb destination displays, which read 'Aldgate' and 'Metropolitan Line' at both ends.

My first impression of the decoration is that the dominant off-white upper body isn't quite 'white' enough. 'S' Stock is usually fairly pristine with a glossy finish to the paintwork, but the model has matt 'dirty white' finish. Apart from that, the printing is very neatly executed throughout. Underground roundels, vehicle numbers and numerous warning notices on the doors are all neat and accurate and even the edges of the stepboards are picked out in yellow.

Although there's currently only one livery available, others may appear in due course - depending on demand - and who knows what TfL has up its sleeve for these trains over the coming years?

As a first venture into mass-produced RTR London Underground trains, Bachmann's '5' Stock is a significant new product that opens up lots of possibilities for OO modellers. Although not designed specifically for the demanding finescale, high-detail market, it offers a good compromise between price, detail and specification that should suit the vast majority of potential purchasers.

If you've always been tempted by the possibilities of modelling the world's oldest underground railway system, this new train is likely to be a catalyst and recognition that from now on, sub-surface doesn't have to mean substandard. **BRM**

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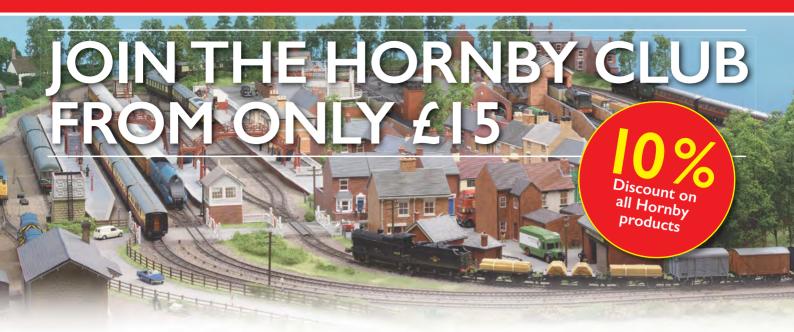
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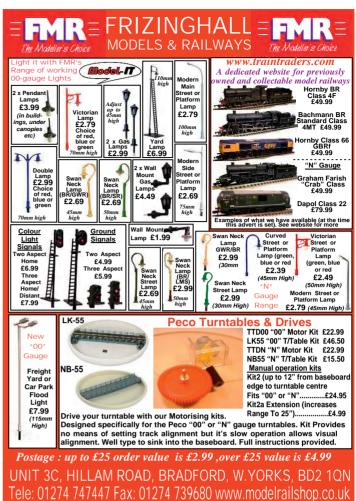
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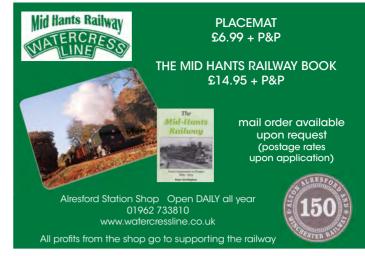
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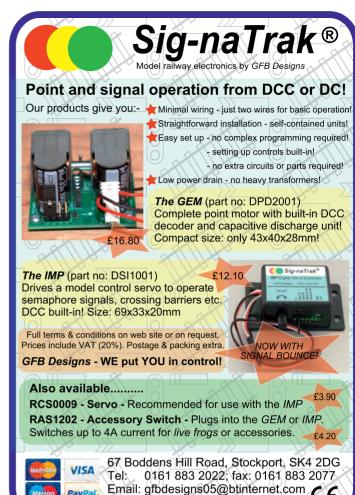
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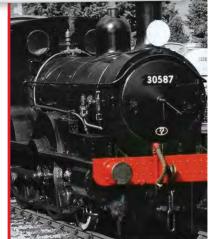
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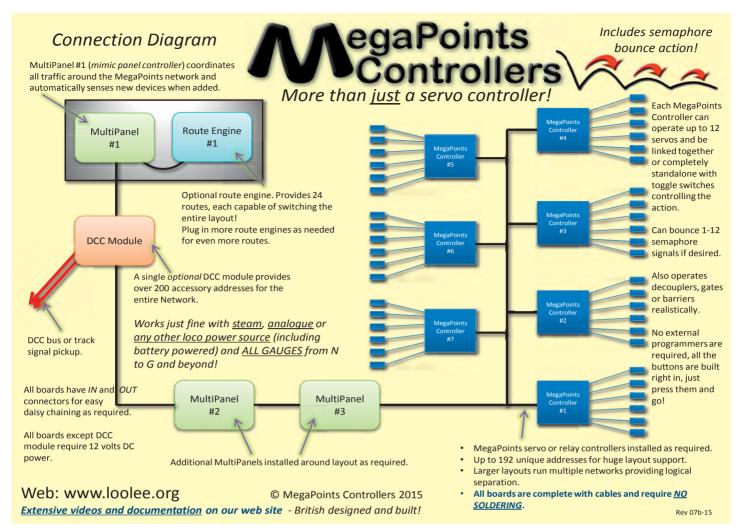
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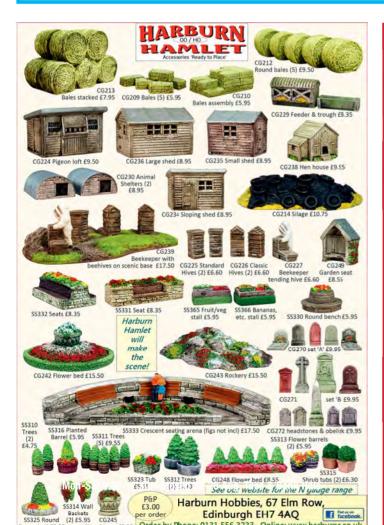
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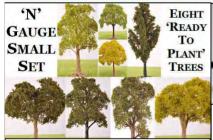
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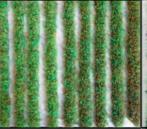
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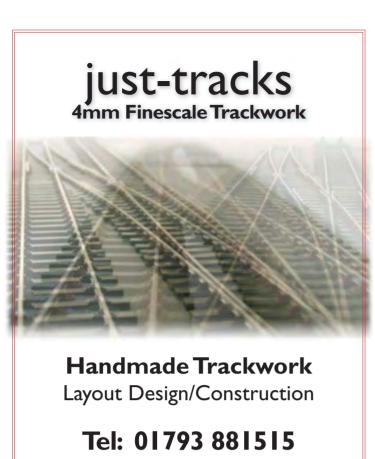
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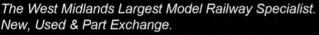




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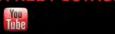
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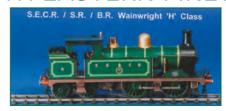
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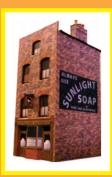
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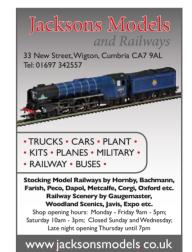
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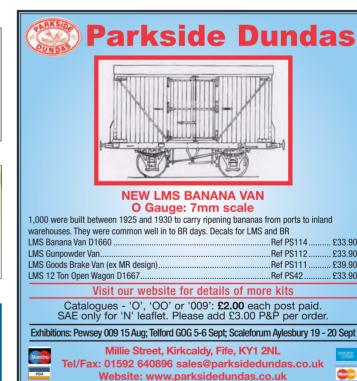


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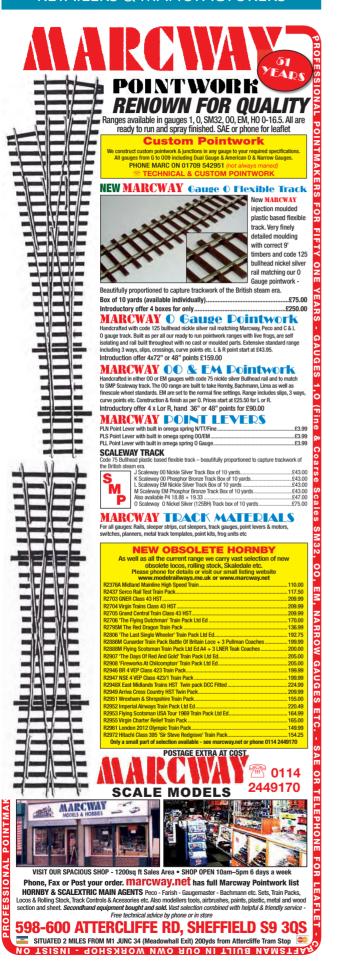
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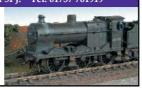
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ou might have noticed that some in the model railway fraternity appear never to be satisfied. For years they ask for a particular model and moan each year when it doesn't feature on manufacturers plans. But, the minute the model is actually announced there are complaints that the particular variant, or even the number they want isn't on the schedule. They will then proclaim that the manufacturer obviously has no idea what they are doing. This ignores the fact that research and development teams spend months, years even, preparing new products and have extensive experience of what sells and, importantly, what doesn't

Once the model has been released then it is time

to 'Cry Havoc' and let slip the 'dogs of war'. Some looking to air their boundless 'knowledge' will give a dozen reasons why they will not buy one, whether they have any interest in owning such a model anyway. Why do so many of these so-called enthusiasts feel that they have to air such negative comments, often without seeing the model first hand?

A new variant on such model moans are those who claim that the manufacturers do not produce enough of each model. When they have eventually decided to spend their money they discover that the model they want is no longer available - 'Quelle surprise!'

Vitriolic postings then follow on various social platforms aimed at the manufacturer and in some cases, specific retailers, complaining bitterly that not enough models are being produced. Being charitable I must assume that there are some who are genuinely aggrieved, however I did overhear one particular modeller who claimed that the locomotive he wanted was 'all sold out' and how disgusted he was, adding that the company richly deserved to go bust!

Later that day, intrigued by his comments, I checked a well-known retailer website for the locomotive concerned and discovered that it had plenty of stock. I can only assume that our complainant either did not have access to the

internet, or else he was just venting because it made him feel the centre of his own universe!

All this may seem rather harsh but I, and others within the industry, find ourselves increasingly at odds with those who continually find fault or apparently complain just for the sake of it.

Personally, I believe it is time that some within the hobby remember what it is they actually enjoy about model railways. If they cannot recall then they should go and find something else to do and find fault with that instead.

As for the manufacturers, they are in business to make money and then plough those profits back into their business so further investment can be made in new models. The days of the same models in catalogues year-in, year-out are long gone.

No manufacturing in any industrialised country functions on ad hoc production runs. Factory schedules are planned six to nine months in advance and therefore orders are placed well in advance of that lead time. Those placing the orders have to use a tremendous dearee of skill and judgement to avoid having too many or not enough of an item produced and it is very rare that a specified quantity will be absolutely correct.

Modelling railways today is very different from what it was in days gone by.

With the market dominated by the over-50s and so many new models being introduced, model railways have become very much a fashion industry and consequently production runs reflect this fact. What is 'hot' one day is soon yesterday's news and manufacturers as well as retailers do not want older products sat on their shelves gathering dust. New products bring people into the shop - literally and metaphorically.

My advice is to save for the model you want - and let's face it, as things stand we have plenty of time for that - place an advance order or buy it as soon as it is available. If this isn't possible then please do not moan at the manufacturer; they probably have much more to lose by having excess inventory than not enough. **BRM**
