Locomotives with 4-6-2 wheel arrangements are known as Pacifics under the Whyte Notation system. In Britain this wheel arrangement was favoured by the Chief Mechanical Engineers for operating express passenger services until the end of steam on British Rail in 1968. The Great Western Railway only built one Pacific favouring the 4-6-0 wheel arrangement for its express passenger workings.

The most recent Pacific locomotive to be built in the UK was the new build A1 Class 'Tornado' which entered service in 2008 and was built in Darlington from scratch. A considerable number of Pacifics are preserved around the UK with two A4s domiciled in America and Canada respectively.

Graham Farish currently offers four types of Pacific locomotives designed by three of the pre-nationalisation companies.

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

As summer gives way to autumn, many of us return to our railway rooms to press on with layouts and modelling projects. A change of seasons also heralds the start of a new exhibition calendar. While assembling this issue, the **BRM** team attended several excellent shows, not least The International N Gauge Show (now almost universally referred to as 'TINGS') and the Gauge O Guild's 60th anniversary Guildex in Telford.

Both had strong attendances, a major manufacturer presence and generated plenty of news for us to report - see Goods Inwards on p85. Guildex was especially busy this year, confirming the extraordinary recent growth (or is it a renaissance?) in ready-to-run O gauge models. Having started the ball rolling several years ago, Heljan continues to expand in this scale, now adding two steam locomotives and four types of diesel railcar/DMU to its production plan. More new diesels are planned for 2017/18 too.

Whether you're looking for a 'budget' locomotive to get you started, or fortunate enough to be in the market for outstanding RTR brass locomotives from the likes of Lee Marsh, L.H. Loveless (see the 9F above) or Masterpiece Models, your options in O gauge appear to be increasing every month.

Anecdotal evidence suggests numbers of people 'trading up' to the larger scale from OO or N are rising steadily. Today, you can buy a good quality RTR O gauge locomotive such as Dapol's 'Terrier' for little more than the RRP of a OO gauge Hornby or Bachmann 'Pacific'.

Talking of 'Pacifics', the investment by Hatton's in commissioning Gresley A3s and A4s (October **BRM**) from Heljan, and coaches to match, is evidence that 7mm modelling is moving further into the mainstream. If those models and others, such as Minerva and Dapol's GWR Pannier Tanks, Dapol's Class 08 and Lionheart's BR 3MT 2-6-2T are successful, we should see more RTR locomotives coming soon.

It's often said that O gauge models have a 'presence' unachievable in smaller scales, and that's amplified when you add sound and a big speaker to deliver it. With a few exceptions, we're just short of good quality rolling stock to run with these fine models, but that will hopefully change as demand increases. While I'm not quite ready to make the jump to O yet, I can fully understand why many people will be starting 7mm layouts this winter. We look forward to seeing more of them on the circuit and in **BRM** soon. ■



# Showstopping images from the world of model railways

We catch up with **Chris Knight** for an update on this exhibition favourite, which recently underwent a further rebuild following its conversion to DCC.

Long standing **BRM** readers may recall that 'Kensal Green MPD' featured in the May 2003 issue with the story from layout builder Steve Knight. Much water has flowed under the proverbial bridge since - the layout being acquired via some 'horse trading' (much more civilised than grubby cash) by Graham Tavener four years ago. Following around 30 exhibition appearances, the layout was stored until its purchase by Graham.

'Kensal Green' had suffered the usual ravages of exhibition life and being carted around the country for several years; a thorough refurbishment was required. However he had more extensive changes in mind. As an advocate of Digital Command Control (DCC) he realised conversion from analogue control would be hugely beneficial for a Motive Power Depot (MPD) layout and so he undertook a major overhaul with a fair bit of assistance from Steve and other group members.

Some 18 months later and much hard work from all, particularly with the soldering iron, the overhauled layout went on the circuit again and the benefits of DCC were immediately apparent to the operating team - some 50 or so section switches had disappeared for a start!

Naturally for those like myself who had grown up with conventional DC this was a major cultural change but we were soon persuaded to incorporate part DCC operation into our other layout - 'Horfield' (**BRM** February 2016) - as a result. In 2012 the initial upgraded 'KG' was ready for its re-introduction to exhibition life and over the next couple of years it successfully appeared at several events.

Kensal Green had suffered the usual ravages of exhibition life and having been carted around the country for several years, a thorough refurbishment was required - along with more extensive changes.

## FINAL REBUILD?

Not wishing to rest on our laurels, a small change was proposed to add a shed diversion track, followed by some extra pointwork and someone's bright idea to extend the fiddleyard slightly. Ultimately 'New Kensal Green' was drawn up, and had virtually a complete rebuild. The old 'L' shaped configuration was discarded in favour of an extended end-to-end arrangement. The turntable was moved further from the shed and replaced with a vastly improved detailed and 'Westernised' Heljan model.

The coaling stage approach road was turned through 180 degrees and the value of Graham's considerable architectural modelling skills resulted in a terrific new main shed structure. Sadly the original building had suffered in storage. Steve supplied and built a very nice Churchward Models etched signalbox; Dan and Roger contributed with a much detailed Ratio lifting hoist and point rodding respectively.

The Paddington approaches theme was completed by a typical angled truss road overbridge as the terminus end scenic break. The new double track main line



(C&L track) was installed to provide an opportunity to display a greater range of traffic relevant to such a busy location.

Further upgrades included a full-length fluorescent tube lighting gantry, designed and constructed by Steve and partner Martin at MRS, and Graham manufactured a photo-printed backscene depicting a typically murky West London day. Layout illumination has been included through new yard and street lamps, the signalbox and shed received similar treatment, the latter using LED strips.

A feature of the original scheme was a smoke effect generated via a disco fog machine mounted below the shed building, pumping up through tubing to create a (hopefully) realistic 'fug' reminiscent of the era. In practice we found this a rather hit-and-miss affair and

## Ask the expert



**Q** Main line steam locomotive depots often sprawled over large areas, especially those close to major stations and in large cities. How did you balance the need to include all the necessary facilities with the practicalities of space and realistic operation?

**A** At this stage in the story it is perhaps worth recalling Steve's original thoughts when planning the layout. The trackplan was constricted by its original loft situation, and at the outset was conceived as a static diorama to display his expanding BR Western Region locomotive stud. A fictional London area Motive Power Depot was chosen (there was not enough space to consider a prototype location) and because between father and son we had a couple of the large '47XX' 2-8-0s and several '61XX' tanks, the metropolitan area was the obvious choice.

Graham retained the name and scenario on assuming ownership and his thoughts centred perhaps on reinforcing this premise of an overflow shed to Old Oak Common - imagining perhaps a considerably larger quick turnaround servicing facility than that at Ranelagh Bridge, closer than 81A to the terminus, but smaller and with fewer heavy maintenance facilities than OOC.



have more work to do before we will be confident in re-introducing it at exhibitions, although as Andy's photographs show, it can produce excellent results when it works.

### OPERATING EXPERIENCE

'New Kensal Green' made its debut at the Swindon Steam Festival last September when we quickly realised we were too ambitious in trying to run a main line service on the through lines. It involved excessive hand shunting of stock in the small fiddle yards and subsequent transferring to either end provided a hectic, tiring but still enjoyable weekend.

Pleasingly, despite our operating concerns, the layout received many favourable comments. Following further team discussion we realised that a relief lines scenario

go 'on shed'. Access for passenger locomotives is invariably via the approach road next to the offices and protected by a shunt signal. Goods locomotives normally come on shed and depart via the brick arch access supposedly leading to a nearby marshalling yard.

## LOCOMOTIVE STUD

Most of the WR steam classes extant in the late-1950s can be seen earning their keep, although some types such as the '72XX' 2-8-2T and 'Manor' 4-6-0s were rarely seen in London. They appear occasionally to provide extra variety, and some early diesels are also evident. Classes particularly redolent of the area include the numerous '61XX' 2-6-2Ts used on intensive Paddington suburban services, the '97XX' 0-6-0PT with condensing apparatus and of course the big '47XX' fast freight 2-8-0s. The latter were mainly utilised on overnight goods traffic to and from the West Country.

Yours truly provided '8750' pannier tank No. 8763 prototypically finished in BR mixed traffic lined black for ECS duties (see above).


A few BR Standard designs were about on the WR at this time, notably 'Britannias' running out of Cardiff Canton shed. No. 70018 *Flying Dutchman* sporting its Western Region type smoke deflectors (from Jackson Evans) and 'Red Dragon' headboard plus reporting number offers a distinctive outline among the ex-GWR types.

Some locomotives from our stud also work on 'Horfield' and this results in problems with those displaying headcode lamps fixed in place. We assume the relevant firemen are assiduous in performing their preparation duties!

Sadly there was no room in this latest version of the saga to re-site the refuelling point of the original plan. Consequently, diesels now occasionally join steam on shed. Graham was keen to replicate a feature we had introduced on 'Horfield', portraying the changes over the years in both motive power and liveries - so we may see ex-ROD '30XX' 2-8-0 and 'Star' 4-6-0s on shed together, while at other times a double-chimney 'Castle' rubs shoulders with a 'Warship' diesel-hydraulic in


original plain green. The knack, of course, is to create any anachronisms by mixing stock that would never have been seen together on the real railway.

The team is unanimous in congratulating Graham on rescuing a good layout that would probably have disappeared permanently and its reincarnation. This involved many hours of burnt midnight oil but


resulted in the creation of a fine modern DCC layout which I am sure will be enjoyed by many on the exhibition circuit over the next few years.

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

## BUDGET WHEEL CLEANER



 **STAR LETTER**

 Why not make a simple, track-powered locomotive wheel cleaner? There are a number of companies who sell similar items costing upwards of £20.00, but my example costs £3.00 and a little time. It involves the most basic of modelling skills - measuring, cutting, gluing, drilling and soldering.

Whilst this example has been made for OO gauge locomotives, it could easily be adapted to suit other gauges. Whatever size you decide to make, ensure there are no rubber traction tyres fitted to the wheels of

the locomotive you wish to clean.

You'll need two small wire brushes, off-cuts of plastic sheet, thin plywood or MDF, two small insulated crocodile clips and two lengths of 40cm long wire.

Cut off the two handles from your wire brushes and drill a small hole alongside the bristles. Cut three small off-cut pieces of plastic sheet, thin plywood or MDF so that one piece is 5mm higher than the rest to prevent bristles shorting across each side. Thread one length of cable through the hole drilled in the brush head and remove 70mm of the plastic insulation, wrapping the

exposed wire around the base of the bristles. Solder into place and add an insulated crocodile clip to the cable ends.

Turn up the power from your controller, hold the wheels of the locomotive against the two wire brushes for a few seconds and, 'Hey Presto', no more dirty wheels!

## EYESIGHT SOLUTION?

Your article in 'Eyesight Challenges' in April's **BRM** provided a number of solutions for magnifying options all of which have, as the article indicates, pros and cons. Over the years I have tried most but none have really been satisfactory. The solution I have found most effective is variable focal length magnifying glasses, the most stylish of which are provided by Eyejusters ([www.eyejusters.com](http://www.eyejusters.com)). These are fully adjustable between 0 and 3 dioptres so can cater for working at varying distances.

Unlike visors they are comfortable to wear and having the adjustment built in, they save hours of frustration in either lens or spectacles swapping other solutions require. They also provide a much wider field of vision than magnifiers, can be used at the workbench and on the layout (try doing that with a magnifier) and can be used for non-modelling purposes as well

as coping with changing eyesight over the years. I wouldn't be without mine and would recommend them to anyone who is still struggling to find a practical and usable solution. Not a total answer to all, but by far the best I have found.

**Graeme King writes:** Eyejusters appear to me to be a clever idea in a number of ways, albeit with limitations just as with any other device. Given that it is a sliding action of the two lenses that produces the variable overall power, for a good final optical effect each component lens will have to be made to a very high optical standard. If a 'cheap and cheerful' manufacturer were to start making something of this sort I can imagine scope for all sorts of optical aberrations, leading to poor image quality and possible eyestrain. I note that the Eyejusters are not inexpensive. Whilst that may be seen as a disadvantage

by some, it might also, with any luck, be an indication of high quality. The other limitations that I suspect must apply to these are that just like basic, cheap, ready-made reading glasses, they may only cater correctly for those whose vision is optically entirely normal save for the need for close-focusing assistance (not many of us fall truly into that category), and unless I've missed something in the details of the product then I suspect they cater only for an assumed standard distance between the centres of the two eyes. Glasses with the optical centres of their lenses not spaced to match accurately the positions of the eyes of individual wearer can produce uncomfortable effects for some wearers, possibly even double vision in the worst cases.



Always ready for a challenge, **Phil Parker** set out to build a portable layout in a storage box in just two days, whilst entertaining exhibition visitors.

We decided to build a model railway in a weekend, or at least the rest of the **BRM** team decided I ought to try. The plan was to build a model at The International N Gauge Show (TINGS) held in Warwickshire last September. It meant working in N, a scale in which I'd never built a layout before.

With just two days to play with, thoughts of a main line station were out of the question - the model had to be a micro layout, solving the common issue of storage space. The size of the model was determined

by the size of a plastic storage box in which it would fit. You can store the box easily and it's big enough to hold everything as construction progresses, keeping dust at bay and the modelmaking 'mess' confined.


We turned to Gaugemaster for the products we needed as it makes ordering much easier - speed was of the essence and it can supply all the model railway items you need for such a project. It stocks Kato ready-ballasted track which is easy to lay and its integrated ballast saves a few hours work, but it looks too much like plastic from the box. Its

appearance can be improved with weathering though.

All of the techniques used are applicable to larger models, but the great thing with a little project like this is that lessons are learned on smaller, less expensive items and you're sure to finish the project.


An advantage with this project is it provides an all-important circuit of track for testing. Although our locomotive stud is a single GWR pannier tank, by the end of the show weekend, we'd run an M7, 'Warship', Class 33 and a French 'Pacific', all of which performed perfectly. ■

*After a weekend of just 13 hours, trains now run through a landscape, but buildings and detail still need to be added. It's surprising how much time is spent talking to visitors.*





This 70 litre container is sold by the Really Useful Box Company and measures 710mm by 545mm by 190mm. It has a snap-on lid - great for storing a small layout.



AnyRail5 design software proved that by using the smallest radius Kato track, a circuit fitted in the space with a small siding to shunt.



To prove the software wasn't fibbing, I tried out the plan using real track in the bottom of the box - it was a tight squeeze, but it worked.



For such a small layout, the baseboard didn't need to be sophisticated. My local hardware store cut me a board measuring 700mm by 540mm from 9mm plywood.




The plywood is pretty stiff but a little extra bracing from 20mm by 10mm softwood isn't a bad idea. It also provided space underneath for the electrics.



Being a tight fit in the box, lifting the baseboard out could prove difficult, so the corners were cut to allow my fingers to slip underneath.



Faller tunnel mouths (272575) are a bit narrow, but British coaches will squeeze through. These came from Gaugemaster and are sold in pairs.




Kato Unitrack points have a tighter radius, so a quick test was undertaken with an O-6-0PT locomotive powered by a 9V battery. All was fine.



The first day of The International N Gauge show (TINGS) soon dawned. My work area was a 6ft long table at one end of the **BRM** stand.



Assembling Kato track only takes a moment's work. You can really play with this stuff as it comes apart easily - great if you like to try out different track plans.



Track sections lock together using plastic clips which snap shut. Chunky rail joiners are the price to pay for this convenience, but it saves having to ballast the track.




Wiring for the point motor plugs in under the ballast. A hole was required to allow the plug through the board, created with a mini-drill.


# PRACTICAL BRM | LAYOUT BUILDING IN Gauge



Rather than pin the track down in the traditional way with pins, I used small pieces of double-sided tape. It held the track firmly in place.



Trimming the tape to the edges of the ballast was simple, it looked much tidier and only takes a few minutes with a sharp craft knife.




Gaugemaster's Combi Controller is ideal for first layouts. Two wires were soldered to the track, then screwed to the terminals. Trains ran 50 minutes after work started.



At the end of the siding, track was trimmed to the baseboard edge with a razor saw. I supported the rail with pliers to avoid damaging the track.



Satisfied that everything was working, the track was protected with low-tack decorators masking tape before moving on to the messy scenic work.



Cutting the polystyrene to shape was made easier with a hot wire cutter. Mine is from Expo Tools and powered by 4 AA batteries in the handle.



Under the hill, polystyrene was cut to allow access to the trains before the layers were fixed together. Black emulsion paint hides the view through the tunnel mouths.



Gluing sheets of polystyrene together was carried out with PVA. Wooden coffee stirrers sped up build time considerably, holding things before the glue dried.



The basic hill wasn't a pretty lump. I couldn't fiddle with the shape at the show and no-one wanted to see me staring at it contemplating its geology.



Plaster impregnated bandage was cut into squares, dipped in water and quickly spread over the hill. I smeared the surface with water for a smoother appearance.



In addition to the bandage, a wall filler hides sudden level transitions. It needs to be thick so either don't add much water to the powder or use a ready mix product.




The Faller tunnel mouths were fitted and blended in with more filler. Any that touched a painted surface was wiped away with a wet rag or a toothbrush when dry.



At the end of the first day, the plaster was dry enough for an earth brown emulsion paint. This soaked into the surface, hiding the glaring white plaster.



I left the show on Saturday with the layout looking like a shiny chocolate cake. The masking was removed from the track so I could paint up to the ballast shoulder.



I started assembling the buildings (more on this next month). They were placed so I could work out where the roads should go, drawing them with a wide marker pen.



I used the Noch road system (ref. 60802), stocked by Gaugemaster. The first stage is a grey powder shaken over PVA glue, then sealed with surface paint.



Such a small layout doesn't need an expensive electronic electrostatic grass tool. Gaugemaster's GM193 puffer bottle worked well at spreading fibres over PVA glue.



To add texture and represent undergrowth, grass was sprayed with hair lacquer then sprinkled with flock powder. The cheapest brands hold the flock for years.



Gaugemaster's GM129 ready-made trees can be further enhanced with the same flock powders as used for the undergrowth, helping to add detail and tone the colours.



Planting the trees required a drill for those on the wooden board, but on the hill they could be pushed into the polystyrene. All bases are dipped in PVA glue first.



The layout fitted in the box nicely and proved that after just two days, an easy to store model railway can be made. See more next month as I add the final touches.

## Ask the expert


**Q** I see you've used polystyrene for the bulk of the landscape. Where can I find this material and how much does it cost?

**A** Polystyrene isn't as easy to find as it used to be - many DIY stores don't stock it. Mine came from a builders merchants and was sold in 25, 50 and 100mm thick sheets, but be warned these are 8ft by 4ft so will need breaking up to fit in the back of your car. The 50mm thick sheet I used cost £9.25 including VAT, leaving plenty for future projects.

Fitting traditional solenoid point motors used to be a time-consuming process. **Ben Jones** tries a couple of recently developed accessories designed to reduce the need for wiring and soldering.

Last month we looked at an advanced DCC point motor from DCCconcepts. This time, we consider a useful device aimed at both DC analogue and DCC modellers using twin-coil solenoid motors. These are the type produced by Peco, SEEP, Gaugemaster and now Hatton's and still widely used on model railways around the UK.

To illustrate the process, I'm using a Gaugemaster PM-10 mounted above the baseboard in a Peco PL-12 adaptor and linked to a DCCconcepts ADS-8fx accessory decoder, which is suitable for use on analogue or DCC layouts. However, the same principle applies to all brands of solenoid motor of traditional or side-mounted design. I've recently fitted Peco PL-11 side-mounted motors to several points and found them easy to set up

using both ADS-2fx and ADS-8fx accessory decoders. Gaugemaster has also just introduced a surface-mounted point motor - the PM-20 - which has standard and decoder-fitted options (see opposite).

Each ADS output is connected to a powerful capacitor discharge unit (CDU) capable of firing two motors, so in theory up to 16 motors can be powered by just one ADS-8fx. Eleven screw terminals are provided for one half of the eight outputs; three to the motor, two to supply track power, one to your point frog (polarity switching is automatic with the ADS), three to a momentary switch (if required) and two per

pair linked to your power bus. The opposing outputs on each pair have nine terminals (omitting power bus connections).

Using the ADS, you can control motors and switch points by selecting the desired accessory ID number on your DCC controller, flicking a switch on your control panel or, as we'll see next month, by illuminated push-button control via DCCconcepts' 'Cobalt Alpha' system.

Programming the ADS is very simple and, using an NCE PowerCab controller, is identical to the method shown last month when setting up a Cobalt iP Digital slow-action motor. ■

*Programming the ADS accessory decoder is simple using an NCE PowerCab, or you can use conventional switches for analogue layouts.*




A Gaugemaster PM-10 solenoid motor - very similar to the established Peco type, but with the added advantage of having screw terminals, rather than solder tabs.




I'm mounting it above the board for ease of maintenance as it is in an off-scene yard. Mark the position and ensure the PL-12 is at the correct distance from the point.




Run three wires (red, green and black are commonly used for point motors) from the ADS decoder to the three terminals on the motor.



The ADS-2fx decoder is powered from the bus (orange/brown), the light green/white wires run to the outer rails, the blue to the frog and red/green/black to the motor.



A close-up of the ADS-8fx showing the screw terminals. The three marked 'momentary' are for conventional switches, if your layout has an analogue control panel.



ADS-8fx mounted under the baseboard and wired. Slide the switch on the relevant terminal to 'SET' prior to setting the decoder ID number - in this case 108.



Key in the desired ID number, press 'ENTER', Press '1' to select 'N(ON)' and toggle backwards and forwards several times to inform the ADS of its new identity.

## Ask the expert

**Q** What easy-to-install options are there for solenoid point motors, either for DCC or analogue use?


**A** For those with a phobia about soldering and electrics, there is an increasing number of options verging on the ideal plug-and-play installation. Gaugemaster's PM-10 (£18.95) tops off the standard PM-10 with an accessory decoder and CDU similar to that used by DCCconcepts' ADS-fx units and makes wiring very simple.

The PM-10D has also been designed to be DC compatible. Installation can be either directly

to track via the sleeper tabs or underboard using the in-built fixing points. Only two wires are required, rather than the usual three. It also has built-in connections for added control panel switches as well as mimic panel LEDs and all terminals have screw connections. The same options are also available with the new PM-20 surface-mounted solenoid motor and PM-20D with decoder. See [www.gaugemaster.com](http://www.gaugemaster.com) for more information.



Slide the switch back to 'RUN' and press 'Select Accy' again. Press '1' to select 'N(ON)' and your motor should change. Adjustments may be required to ensure reliability.



# ASHPETH & LEEFIELD

Over 40 years and several major expansions, **Ged Lee's** modern image N scale layout has evolved into a remarkable empire with huge operating potential.

**R**ailways got into my blood at a very early age and apparently there is no known cure. So, I decided just to live with it, and although I have never regretted the decision it has infected my pockets from time to time. My love of railways started through my uncle who was a locomotive driver on the Cromford & High Peak Railway in Derbyshire. On many occasions he would let me ride on the footplate of the saddle tank he was driving.

I grew up in Chaddesden and fondly remember cycling down to the sidings, with my 'Box Brownie' over my shoulder, to watch 3Fs and 4Fs shunting the vast array of wagons. Whole days were spent on the bridge called 'Five Arches', immediately north of Derby station, where I was fascinated by the sight, sounds and smell of 'Jubilees', 'Patriots', 'Black Fives', 8Fs, and the occasional 'Scot' or 'Britannia'. Brand new 'Peak' diesel locomotives could also be seen turning their wheels for the first time after emerging from the works.

Most of our relatives lived in the North East and holiday visits meant I often had the opportunity to absorb the atmosphere of Newcastle Central. It was so exciting for a boy of 12 to stand next to B1s, V2s and the mighty 'Pacifics' under that roof. As a result, the London Midland and Eastern became my favoured regions of BR. As the diesels took over, I gained just as much pleasure from humble Class 08 shunters, '20s' on MGR workings, Metrovick Co-Bos on the 'Condor' express freight and the mighty Deltics.

A model railway was something I yearned for, but lack of space at home and years away at college made it difficult. A layout did not materialise until I was married and we had a house of our own. I dabbled in OO for a while but my main focus throughout the years has been N gauge.

## STEADY EVOLUTION

I have been modelling N for over 40 years and, although we have not moved home, the layout has moved as it








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


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has grown. It is now 46ft long and the width varies from 2ft to 4ft. There are three double track main lines, five stations, four locomotive depots, three hand-operated turntables, seven tunnels, five freight yards, 231 points and 34 colour light signals.

Over a similar period of time many might have preferred to build several different layouts, but I have enjoyed the challenge of creating and developing one very large railway. The essential elements are in

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
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
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place but it will still take many years to complete all the detailing and scenery, including the installation of several more working semaphore and colour light signals.

Over those 40 years I have collected British outline steam, diesel and electric locomotives, coaches and wagons, manufactured by Minitrix, Lima, Peco, Union Mills, Graham Farish, Dapol, CJM and the N Gauge Society. Various kit-built locomotives have also been



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purchased from Morays, Millfield Models, Nthusiast Resprays and Ian Stoate. As a result, each era, from the 1960s to the present day, can be represented. Periodically, changing the stock to a different era provides a great deal of enjoyment, along with a new operating experience.

For many years the layout did not have an identity, as I could not think of an appropriate name. Now, my two principal stations are Leefield Central and Ashpeth, but it was over 20 years before the layout was christened 'Ashpeth & Leefield'. The story of how the layout has grown is possibly a little unusual. However, it has been, and still is, a fascinating and absorbing hobby. It has always provided me with an immense amount of pleasure.

*We were on holiday in Cornwall when I started doodling, thinking about the space in the loft that had been freed up. On returning home I took some measurements and set to work.*

## FIRST STEPS

I started with N gauge in 1972, shortly after our first child was born. It was 6ft by 4ft, mounted on the wall in the second bedroom, and it lowered on to the bed when in use. As the baby grew the layout had to go, as we needed the bedroom. The only space left for a layout was the small box bedroom so N was the ideal solution. Although the quality of models was not brilliant, I was committed to British outline.

A redundant 6ft 6in by 2ft door was used as the base for the layout. It rested on a couple of drawer units and there was just enough space for it along one wall. The station was called 'Guideford', but, due to the non-standard design, creating the platforms was a bit of a challenge. Eventually I decided to use balsa wood as it could be cut and sanded to the desired shape. Once the platforms were painted and in place I used some secondhand plastic canopies and buildings - they were all that I could afford at the time.

In the mid-1970s there were only a few ready-to-run British N gauge locomotives available. This made it difficult to focus on one region of BR. I started my

collection with a Minitrix 'Britannia', a 'Warship' diesel and Mk 1 coaches, along with an ex-GWR Pannier Tank, suburban coaches and a few wagons from Graham Farish. Modellers of a certain age will, no doubt, fondly remember those models but I know we are all delighted that the details and mechanisms have improved so dramatically over the intervening years.

With the arrival of our second child, a new home was needed. Up to this point, I had not considered using the loft because access was difficult. However, the loft became the new home for the growing layout and Phase Two of its development.

## ROOF SPACE

When we decided to extend our home and add a fourth bedroom, it presented an opportunity I wasn't going to miss as, naturally, it meant that the loft had to be extended as well. After flooring the space and covering the roof with thin plywood boards and insulation, I fixed beams in place to support the railway. This provided clear areas underneath for storage. The original layout, on the door, gravitated into the loft, was extended by 14in and integrated into the new layout by separating the double track main line, under the hill, and re-aligning the tunnels.

In retrospect, I am not sure why I decided to include the door layout as it was, but I'm happy that it is still there as a constant reminder of how the project began.


I added two more boards measuring 4ft 2in by 2ft 9in and 7ft 8in by 3ft 3in, creating three sides of a square. The layout represented a fictional location, probably somewhere south of Leeds. Trains from the Midland and Eastern dominated with occasional excursions from the Western Region.

The original main line was extended around the whole of the new area and became known as 'The Eastern Line'. A second main line, known as 'The Northern & General', was contained on the two new boards. I fixed the track with pins but instead of painting the appearance of ballast on to the baseboard, I used Peco foam underlay. This is good if you only need it to last for a few years but no-one told me that it deteriorates over a long period, falls apart, and makes a real mess, sticking to the track like glue. In the end, when I had completed the whole layout, I had to spend nearly four years lifting and replacing most of the track. I replaced it with polymer-based underlay from Noch and replaced the Peco points with electric ones from Kato Unitrack.

The additional space meant it was possible to install part of a town, a second freight yard, an ordnance depot, two depots, extra loops on each main line to hold freight trains and two more stations. It was now possible to operate four trains at the same time.

Operating the layout gave me untold hours of enjoyment but I felt that I wasn't fully exploiting the potential of N gauge. Passenger trains were made up of only three to five coaches, and nine wagons was about the maximum for freight. These restrictions were dictated by the size of platforms and passing loops where trains were held. How could I double the length

## Ask the expert




**Q** One of the problems with many loft layouts is reaching into the furthest recesses of the baseboards to recover derailed trains or keep the track clean. Did you design the layout with this in mind, and if not, how do you keep on top of those jobs?

**A** Along the far wall I attached an 'L' shaped board that was 5ft 8in long and 4ft 6in deep. The narrow part of the 'L' was 2ft 6in wide and the larger part was 3ft 4in wide. This meant that I could just reach across into the corners to lay the track and add the scenery. However, lacking sufficient foresight, I didn't realise what a stretch it was going to be once the scenery was in place. Now, if a derailment occurs in the corners, it is not just 'the hand of God' over the railway, as I have to use a litter picker to retrieve locomotives and/or stock.

Regular maintenance is necessary to ensure smooth operations. The track is cleaned regularly using track rubbers; axle hung track-cleaning pads and a CMX 'Clean Machine' tank wagon (available from DCC Supplies) filled with Deluxe 'Track Magic'. To keep dust down I brush delicate items with a soft paintbrush. Then I strap to my waist a small portable vacuum cleaner, with fine brushes and extension tubes, and carefully vacuum the whole layout.

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of freight trains and lengthen passenger rakes? There was a lot of available space in the main part of the loft that looked tempting. It could be the answer, but the original double leaf external wall of the house was in the way. Or was it?

## BREAKING THROUGH

Developing the railway continued to be a great source of pleasure, and operating it was a therapeutic 'switch off' at the end of a busy week. My son also got involved making many cameo scenes that were gradually incorporated into the scenery. He also made sure that I purchased some items of rolling stock that he wanted to see on the layout, even if they were not British – such as a TGV and Japanese 'Bullet Train'. Still, it kept him interested for several years, until a certain maker of red racing cars became his new passion. Sometimes, though, I would cast an eye into the

original loft and think that if the layout could be extended into there it would almost double in size. Then longer trains and more prototypical freights would be a real possibility.

It struck me that removing bricks from the partition wall to create two tunnels might be possible. I contacted the builder who extended our house, who suggested we knock the wall down to the level of the layout. He decided that most of the wall could be removed but leaving bricks to support the purlins would be wise!

I was able to add a further 14ft to the layout; the width increased to 3ft 6ins for half of the length and then 4ft for the remainder.

Being a 1960s-built house, these trusses were substantial (5ft by 2in) so they coped with the weight. I had exhausted the supply of old doors, so constructed the baseboard from MDF, bracing with 2in by 1in timber and covering with fibreboard. The centre of the large cross trusses, roughly 4ft apart, were removed to create a through walkway.

When I devised this extension, it resulted in the N&G becoming an elongated figure of eight. This certainly added operational interest and was a source of fascination for casual visitors as they tried to work out which tunnels the trains would emerge from.

Creating the hillside was a headache as several removable sections had to be incorporated to gain access to the tracks underneath, in case of derailments.

The raised part of the N&G emerged from Oak Hill, crossed the river mouth on a long viaduct, made from four Faller kits, and descended Leebury Bank into Leefield Central, a large city station with nine platforms. The line continued round the outer reaches of the new boards, finally passing through the small rural station of Oakdale before entering Oak Hill again on the lower level.

A third double track main line, known as 'The Central Line', was created within the confines of the new boards, passing through Leefield Central.



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Extensive carriage sidings and depots for diesel locomotives, electric traction and HSTs were included. The design and location of these three depots had to remain relevant for all of the eras that would be depicted on the layout. One included a roundhouse and turntable that continued to be used by diesels after the demise of steam. Peco Code 80 track, insulfrog medium and large radius points and foam underlay were used again; by this stage I had still not realised my mistake in using the foam underlay.

Large items stored at one end of the loft were no longer needed so that area was cleared and the temptation to extend the railway again was far too great.

## TRACK TRAUMA

Due to work and family commitments, completing this final phase of the layout took considerably longer than I had envisaged. I had noticed that some of the foam underlay on the original part of the layout was breaking up. Something radical had to be done. The only way forward was to lift the track, clean it and replace the underlay. I gradually worked my way round the layout using Noch underlay impregnated with ballast. Hopefully, this will last a lot longer. Track that could not be cleaned properly had to be replaced.

Until now all points had been hand operated resulting in a great deal of stretching across the layout. Lifting the track gave me the opportunity to go for electric points. As my electrical skills were limited, I chose Kato Unitrack points with motors hidden in the ballast base and 'plug and play' installation. Relaying and replacement work was a drawn out process, completed

in stages as funds allowed. I had a variety of static semaphore signals on the layout, but wanted electric colour light signals for Leefield Central.

Some of the platforms required bi-directional signalling so I needed a total of 24 units. I purchased ready-made signals and switches in batches from CR Signals. It was time to face my electrical demons. I'd used a soldering iron to connect wires together but not to connect a complex set of signals.

It was a challenge for me but I thoroughly enjoyed it. The signals were placed in position, wired up to the switches and tested one at a time. Miraculously they all worked until the penultimate one when I encountered a dry joint that I couldn't locate. In the end two switches had to share one power cable. To many modellers this whole exercise would be a simple process but I was really pleased with what I had achieved and am looking forward to installing more signals in the future.

Now that the layout essentials are completed, six trains can be operated at the same time. When shunting manoeuvres are taking place in the yards, carriage sidings or colliery, five other trains can run on the main lines. I need 'eyes in the back of my head', but 40 years of working in the classroom has honed that skill.

Fortunately, thanks to careful tracklaying, derailments are rare. I operate four trains at a time with all six lines running when our N Gauge Society area group is in attendance. It will still take years to complete all of the scenery and signalling but I am not complaining. I thoroughly enjoy every opportunity I have to climb into the loft and lose myself in a fantasy world. Now where did I put that soldering iron? ■



# BUILD A DCC CONTROLLER

Determined to overcome a fear of electronics, **Phil Parker** builds a DCC system in kit form, sold by the Model Railway Electronics Group (MERG).

**A** visit to Pete Waterman's 'Leamington Spa' layout earlier this year was my first introduction to the CANCAB system produced by the Model Electronics Railway Group (MERG). I've never been a big DCC fan; some controllers are huge, covered in buttons or it's hard to achieve the precise driving I get from my Gaugemaster DC handheld controller.

The CANCAB system is different. It has many buttons, but they're contained in a handset little bigger than my DC one. Best of all, control is via a neat metal knob. Ergonomically, it works well.

Checking out the details online later, the first job was to join MERG.

Kits are only available to members, so once joined I headed to the 'Kit Locker' and spent less than £65 for a base unit and handset. For a full DCC system, it's a bargain.


I'm pretty confident with a soldering iron and years ago I dabbled with electronics, but the idea of assembling my controller made me nervous. I needn't have worried. The moment I unpacked both kits it was obvious much time and effort had gone into making them as easy to build as possible. All components are clearly

labelled and stuck to sheets and the circuit boards have component locations marked. Just remove each component and solder it into position - simple.


The instructions are clear and well written and once I got into it I really enjoyed it. Take your time, checking components are in the right places and each joint is as good as possible.

When it came to testing, everything worked. The moment I tuned the LCD display and could read words was a real joy. Shortly afterwards, a locomotive moved. ■

*Electronics are more fun than you'd think when you buy a well thought out kit. I'm heading back to the MERG 'Kit Locker' for more.*




The printed circuit board (PCB) for the base unit. Locations for each component are clearly marked on the side to be fitted. Solder from the back.



One of the biggest challenges is identifying similar-looking components. MERG has made this easy by sticking them to a piece of paper with relevant details.



Larger components are packed in a separate bag. The chips are kept together in a plastic tube for safety and shouldn't be unpacked until required.



The instructions are clear, just follow them to the letter, ticking each step off as you go. I liked being told when a component should be inserted a certain way round.



Resistors are fitted first and provide an excellent introduction to construction - there's no polarity to worry about and they stand up to clumsy soldering efforts.




Where polarity matters, identify the + and - sides of a component. Tantalum capacitors like this have different length leads, the longest being positive.



Electrolytic capacitors are printed with a '-' symbol on the side, the PCB with a '+'. With just two legs it's not hard to work out which way around they fit.



Square components such as the bridge rectifier and chips have a notch in the end to indicate correct orientation. The PCB drawing shows the correct position.



Rather than solder delicate chips to the PCB, dual-in-line (DIL) sockets are fitted into which they are later inserted. An indent shows correct orientation.



Many parts are connected with header pins and corresponding sockets. Pins are supplied on a strip with can be snapped to length.


**Q** Who or what is MERG and why should I buy its kit with lots of components when many DCC systems are ready to use off the shelf?

**A** MERG, the Model Electronic Railway Group, is a UK group set up in 1967 to promote interest in the use of electronics and computers for all aspects of railway modelling. Members are railway modellers with an interest in using electronics in their hobby. MERG has developed a number of kits for its members, from the simple 'Pocket Money Kits' ideal for electronic newcomers to DCC equipment of great sophistication, there is something for all budgets and skill levels.




# PRACTICAL BRM | ELECTRONICS | Any scale




The fiddliest component to make up is the Molex connector for the short circuit sounder. Crimp the wires in the connectors with small pliers.



The short-circuit sounder can be plugged into the PCB. Leave it off until construction is finished otherwise it gets in the way.




Three voltage regulators are fitted to the edge of the PCB. They all look the same, but mustn't be mixed up. A magnifying glass helps to identify them.




Testing starts by connecting the board to a 16V AC feed. The voltage is checked at several points using a multimeter and the regulators checked for excess heat.




The chips can be damaged by static electricity so earth yourself by wearing an anti-static wristband clipped to a nearby water pipe before handling them.



The green light is a big step, indicating the processor is working. If it doesn't light up, turn the power off and check that chips are correctly inserted.




Feed each component leg through ready-made holes in the PCB, ensuring it lies flat on the surface. Masking tape is handy to keep it in place.




A final test is to short-circuit the track outputs. This should set the sounder off and make a yellow LED flash. If this works then you can build the handset.




At first glance the packed handset kit looks simpler than the base unit. That is until you realise that most of the components are in the plastic box.




Heat the joint between board and component leg, then feed enough cored solder to flash around the leg. Avoid creating mountains of excess solder.



A corner of the PCB is removed for later use with cutters. A piece of plastic sheet is drilled to match the fixing holes in the bottom of the board, both are used later.




Construction makes use of surface mount device components such as the tiny resistors and capacitors seen fitted here.




Correct orientation of the chips is essential. Pin 1 is marked by a dimple on the plastic body, hidden by a label. Don't assume the writing is the correct way round.



Each switch clips into the holes in the PCB and is then soldered from the back once you're happy it is sat flush on the board.



Direction LEDs fit flush to the board. The leads are cut off but retained for later use. Make sure these poke through the holes in the handset easily.



The control potentiometer needs modification to fit in the board, all clearly explained. As well as the connections, the body is soldered to the PCB for extra strength.




Surface Mount Devices (SMDs) are tiny electronic components. With care they aren't much harder to fit than conventional components.



Check the joints with a magnifying glass. It's essential that adjacent pins on chips aren't joined and that solder looks shiny and is a fillet, not a blob.




On the back of the board, a piezo sounder is fitted to a couple of header pins. The joints are protected by heat shrink sleeving, heated with the soldering iron.



The display slots over the pins. It's easier to only use the two end pins at first and then put the others in through the holes in the display PCB.



The handset connects to the base unit via an RJ22 socket, fitted to the PCB off-cut using leftover LED legs. This is soldered and bolted to the main PCB.



With everything soldered, we are ready for testing. Clear some space, set up the multimeter and dig out some track and a DCC-fitted locomotive.



Assuming the multimeter checks go OK, adjust the blue potentiometer on the back of the handset board until the display is clear.




Tape the piezo sounder to the back of the case, then bolt in the plastic rectangle cut earlier and use the self-tapping screw provided to hold the back and complete.

## HOW IT'S DONE: ETCHED KIT DESIGN


Continuing our series celebrating the craftsmen and women who make our hobby possible, **Mike Edge** guides us through the highly skilled process of designing etched locomotive kits.



### About the author

Mike Edge started building etched kits in the 1970s and by the 1990s, working professionally, had built examples of most of those available. He was particularly interested in small locomotives (shunters and industrial types), acquiring considerable knowledge of industrials from fellow members of the Leeds Model Railway Society. He identified a lack of kits for industrial locomotives, and set out to rectify that situation. After selling a few etchings for a couple of years, in 2002 the business of Judith Edge Kits was formed - so called because it was her idea, she does most of the work and runs the business; Mike just designs the kits. They do get a little weary of explaining that it isn't a tax fiddle, and although most people now accept that Judith does exist, they do still get calls from customers who aren't expecting a woman to answer! Initially focussed on small diesel locomotives, in particular industrials, the business has since expanded and diversified considerably.

Prototype information for designing a kit comes from a number of different sources. I often use drawings from railway publications (I've found those by D.H. Townsley to be very accurate), which I import direct into my Computer Aided Design (CAD) program to start designing, overlaying lines onto the background drawing. I always check given dimensions against the drawing itself though - they have been known to differ! Scale drawings in magazines can be useful, though a check is needed on both axes since magazine designers often tweak the scale to fit on the page! Side-on photographs can be useful, and if there is an extant



example of the prototype then I will make a sketch and record measurements (left), measuring lengths with a tape measure and angles with a protractor. Sometimes it's easier to take a side-on photograph than measure absolutely everything, and then import that into the CAD program (above) to trace around the edge. General Arrangement drawings are also used, with the caveat that they do not always reflect what was actually built.

## GENERAL PRINCIPLES


Based upon my experiences assembling kits from other manufacturers, I have evolved a number of likes and dislikes with respect to etched kit design. Among my dislikes are:

- Slot and tab construction; they often don't fit because of cusps. I use half-etched lines for locating parts
- Overlays
- Numbered parts on crib sheets, because they take forever to find
- Small parts attached to one another, but not necessarily in the right order
- Lengthy and wordy instructions
- Tags positioned on the inside of a curve, making clean removal difficult
- Removable cab roofs.

When designing the frames, I first check the distance between mainframes; this is important to ensure the fit of such things as vacuum reservoirs. Frame spacers are L-shaped and are located into half-etched lines. The desirability of a suspension system (compulsory for P4 models) led to simple compensation being designed in, with coupling rods being split but not articulated.

**OPPOSITE:** Even though you might have a drawing, quite often some dimensions are not shown or detail is missing so a visit to the prototype is important. Having a drawing to hand for such a visit is useful for taking dimensions and making notes.

**BELow:** Once the key shapes and dimensions have been ascertained, a scale drawing is produced in Turbocad showing front, rear and side elevations, as well as a plan view. This drawing acts as a basis and reference when designing the individual components of the kit.



For diesel locomotives, the engine casing and cab are designed to be bolted onto the footplate with 14BA bolts, since plate frames can easily distort if they are bolted onto a body. Likewise on steam locomotives, cab floors are permanently attached to the frames, precluding the need for a removable cab roof. For the location of smaller, cosmetic parts, use is made of half-etched rivets locating into half-etched holes.

## SUITABLE MATERIALS

All our 4mm scale kits are etched from 15thou brass or nickel silver (NS) sheet, thicker than that typically used in kits, but thick enough to keep the model straight and flat where it should be. Half that thickness is about scale, so wherever possible half-etches are used where the edge of the plate will be visible (for example footplate edges). At 15thou, NS is a bit thin for most frames but is thick enough for a 4mm model so this allows the use of one sheet for the whole locomotive, thus keeping costs down.


Etchings that will need to be rolled or formed to shape are better etched in brass rather than nickel silver





and Both are self-explanatory; that's where they will be etched. Red and blue are used for easy distinction on screen (these are also the colours which used to be used in photographic processes), grey because it's easier on the eye than black. The three white layers are used to cancel out the others where required, for example to add tags or correct errors. They are called 'white' but in fact yellow shades are used so that they can be seen on a white screen. All yellow shades will be turned to white in the final stage, the others all black.


While you can never be sure all parts will fit - that's what test etches are for - CAD does allow you to move individual parts around and check as you go. In the days of hand drawing there was a school of thought that corrections led to problems - if you redrew parts you would add new errors. CAD eliminates this since you only alter the part you want; the rest is untouched.

Once the fret layout is completed, two drawings are created, a back and a front, in black and white with black representing to the etcher everything that should be etched. These are sent to a film-printing company. The films are not sent straight to the etcher, but firstly to me for inspection. This is useful, as if, for example, a tag is missing, a little bit of the black print can be scratched off!

As the final stage, I assemble a test etch (doesn't every manufacturer?), record part numbers on the drawing as

I proceed, and identify corrections to the artwork. After that it is then a straightforward process to amend the artwork and commission the final etchings, leaving only such decisions as "What size box should the kit go in?" before releasing the kit to market. ■



The colours seen in earlier drawings are for on screen visibility only.  
The files sent for producing the etch tool are black and white only. All black areas will be etched. Two files are made, one all parts etched from the front, the other all parts etched from the back. Where these coincide it will be etched through. The tags were changed to white and brought to the front to cancel out the black below.



All the parts are grouped on to a test etch, these are 18" x 12" and this loco takes up about half of it. The other half will be used for another test.

I use the smallest number of tags which will hold the parts safely and avoid as far as possible putting them on the inside of curves.  
The parts are designed to be separated with snips, dismembering the fret as you go.




The parts list is written at this stage, notes on here will form the basis of the written instructions later. This means that part numbers run roughly in line with which I have built the model.

The production etch drawing (still in false colour). Two locos per sheet and space left over used for some other useful bits and pieces.



The other half of the test etch sheet was used for the 440hp 0-6-0. This has many parts in common with the 330hp 0-4-0 and will be released as a kit in the near future.

# FAST & SIMPLE DETAIL TWEAKS

Any RTR model can be improved with extra detail and little effort, as **Phil Parker** demonstrates with a Bachmann Midland 1F 0-6-0T.

**Y**ears of fiddling with old RTR models have given me confidence to alter anything that comes my way. As a penniless young modeller, I was a lot slower to make modifications to a precious locomotive, even though some of them called for improvement.

Modern RTR rarely needs fettling. The exquisite miniatures presented to us are so good at times it can seem there's nothing left for the modeller to do.

The moment I saw Bachmann's '1F' tank pre-production model, I was smitten. Personalising the model to make different than any other bought from a shop isn't hard and requires few tools - fine paint brushes and a cotton bud. The main item to address is the lack of footplate crew. At an exhibition

I found some specific figures for the 1F from MasterPiece. The weathering is simple, a little powder dusted over the model. More fun was buling up the paintwork using mildly abrasive car polish - it's a simple technique used in other modelling hobbies but not so much on railway models. ■

*After a few evenings work this model is better than anything I've built from a kit, and all without burning my fingers.*



Bachmann's Midland 1F 0-6-0T is a lovely model straight from the box but even this little cracker can be improved and personalised by adding a few extra fine details.



The open cab looks better without the moulded spectacle plates running across the inside. Push from the front with a cocktail stick to break the glue joint and remove them.



Place a blob of Deluxe Materials Glue'n'Glaze on the end of a screwdriver and waggle it around the hole to form a skin. Keep the windows horizontal while drying.



To protect the crew, locomotives were fitted with a canvas weather sheet. Many had locally made ironwork on the bunker to support this, but not No. 41661.



Moulded coal never looks realistic, though Bachmann has tried by gloss varnishing it. Crushed with big pliers to a coarse dust, real coal is glued with PVA or Ballast Magic.



MasterPiece Models produce a crew for the 1F, making installation a breeze. Both figures are washed with Citadel Nulin oil into all the folds in the clothes.




Our prototype shot shows a set of fire irons on the tank tops. Springside's set of whitemetal tools is simple to use, just remove the flash before painting.



Railmatch Weathered Black or a dark grey looks better than pure black. When the paint is tacky, roll each tool through Lifecolor black and brown weathering powders.



Looking at this image, the tank sides are shiny. Rather than use varnish, I'm polishing the paintwork with T-Cut and a cotton bud, avoiding the crests and numbers.



Apply weathering powders for rusty brakeshoes. The footplate and boiler top get a dusting of Humbrol Smoke colour powder. Both stick well enough without fixative.



The finishing touch is a headcode lamp from the Modell 3-D printed range. These have a hole in the bottom so they can be pushed onto lamp irons without glue.



A couple of hours work transforms a fine model into something unique and personal. Have a go and you'll find a great deal of satisfaction for little effort and cost.

# DELUXE MATERIALS

Ben Jones meets John and Vivienne Bristow and the Deluxe team to find out how they formulate, manufacture and distribute their wide range of modelling products.

**H**ow many bottles and tubes of glue do you have in your toolbox? Half a dozen? Maybe ten if you regularly work with a wide range of materials? Few of us ever give any thought to the work going on behind the scenes to create chemical concoctions that will stick card to wood, plastic to metal or different kinds of plastic to each other. And don't forget the other compounds that allow us to create fake water, snow or rust, clean rails and paintbrushes, mould our own models and dozens of other essential modelling tasks.

Based deep in a leafy part of Hampshire, Deluxe Materials is one of the best-known suppliers of such materials to the British market. Thanks to innovative products such as Roket card glue, Plastic Magic, Track Magic and Scenic Water, Deluxe Materials is also increasingly well known on the international scene.

We're used to seeing (and using) specialist products from overseas firms these days, but we wanted to know more about a UK enterprise making waves with modellers around the world. And so it is that I find myself surrounded by stacks of boxes and empty bottles in a typical industrial unit somewhere near Basingstoke.

John and Vivienne Bristow are familiar faces at model

shows - boats, radio control vehicles, aero modelling and doll's houses as well as railways - and you might be forgiven for thinking that they're simply salesmen for their range of products.

"I'm a chemist and a modeller," John says. "I've got degrees in chemistry and engineering, but being a modeller gives me an insight into what model makers want. I've had technical papers published and have won awards for some of them over the last 42 years.

A brief tour reveals just how much work the Deluxe team does from a relatively small site. Chemical storage and blending, packing and packaging, research, design of packaging and promotional materials, sales, after-sales assistance and dispatch are all undertaken by John, Vivienne and their team of seven staff.

## FIERCE COMPETITION

How long has Deluxe Materials been around, I ask? "We started as far back as 1974" he continues. "There are three important elements to this business; finding better, more innovative solutions for modelling tasks, looking after modellers and being better than our competitors.

"There's fierce competition out there. We look at what they do and figure out how to do it better. Our new 'Plastic Magic' bottle is a good example. We redesigned it to make it more stable, but we waited until it was complete before tooling the new brushes for it. Unlike other brushes, ours can reach every drop of glue in the bottle and give full value for money.

"We select, refine and formulate the chemicals here, but we don't make them ourselves - they're bought in from specialist chemical producers. We select what we want to make useful products from suppliers in Germany, the UK, the Far East and even Colombia."

Already I can sense that John takes a great deal of pride in his work. Are there any that he's particularly pleased with?

"The products I'm most proud of are 'Track Magic' [a brush-on rail and contact cleaning fluid] and 'Brush Magic' - they required us to think differently. Another good example was in 2010 when we had to reformulate

'Plastic Magic' because of new regulations banning certain harmful chemicals. We used chemicals from the medical industry. No-one else in the world has anything like it.

"We've had to take some brave decisions in abandoning established materials, but we're committed to looking after modellers."

What sets Deluxe Materials apart from its competitors elsewhere in the world?

"Our products have got to work better than anyone else's," says John, although he admits, "that's not always easy. We have the ability and the passion but it's got to be cost effective. The frustrations can be huge when it doesn't come together."

"It's also vital to communicate what we do and why. That's a big task for Vivienne, Suzanne and I."

In full flow now, John continues: "I keep a file of new ideas that we have on the go or awaiting development (33 on the day of our interview, apparently). Some are waiting for the technology, materials or chemicals to catch up while for others we just need the time to develop them."

## DEVELOPMENT TIME

How long does it take to develop a new product from the initial idea to bottles or tubes arriving in model shops?

"It can take a year or more to develop a new product; there's formulation, label design, testing and approval, devising sales and marketing plans, consumer research, refinement and, after all that, manufacturing. Once it's ready, we then have to update the catalogue, communicate with the hobby press and our customers.

"Research is essential. Products evolve as they progress from a working title to a final

brand name. We're extremely thorough; we consult the retail trade, modellers, our distributors and specialist press to gradually 'finesse' a product down to a final look. We also ask for feedback from modellers at the shows we attend to determine the final design of a product.

"Box design is hugely important. We don't just get there on a whim - the design and images are vital when you're selling to dozens of countries in many different languages and cultures. For example, new 'Plastic Magic' is the result of 18 months work."

Bearing in mind the commercial sensitivities mentioned earlier, it's heartening to hear that the end user plays such an important role in determining how Deluxe Materials products work and look. How often does that process throw up surprises?

"We let modellers test products before they're released to find out what they can do - often that includes jobs we hadn't thought of! Modellers can be extremely imaginative but it's good to know about such things before we proceed. Customer feedback is vital."

"But we go even further than that when the products are ready. We produce training material for retailers and distributors; videos, catalogues and sales support from here. This increases their knowledge and confidence in selling our products. We also train sales teams and demonstrate our products to businesses both in the UK and overseas."

Suzanne produces professional documents for training sales staff, which go out via Gaugemaster [UK distributor] and our distributors elsewhere."



# INTERVIEW | DELUXE MATERIALS

## WORKING ABROAD

Talking of Deluxe's overseas business, I press John to tell me more about this growing aspect of the company's activities.

"Around 10% of our sales are now in the United States, and we're working hard to increase that at the moment. The other 90% is in Europe including the UK. On a recent trip to the USA we drove 5,100 miles, training sales staff at Walthers, which is our US distributor and visiting models shops right across the country.

"Most had not heard of us, but were impressed by our products. Some even placed orders there and then, based on a quick demo!"

My visit takes place the morning after the European Union referendum, so inevitably the conversation turns to the possible ramifications of the vote to leave the union.

"We regard ourselves as an international company, based in the UK. Our export activities are supported by the UK Government, but leaving the EU will affect us. It certainly won't make our job any easier; and will affect profitability by reducing efficiency. The EU currently negotiates on our behalf and saves us a lot of work on aspects such as labelling, hazard warnings and conforming to the rules of non-EU partners.

"As well as the USA, we're currently working on increasing sales in Belgium and Poland, we have our first customer in Mongolia and recently received our first order from Iran."



**BRM** readers will be aware of Deluxe Materials products from the various practical articles we've run over the years, but how important is the model railway hobby to the company?

John smiles and says: "Model railways is now our biggest sector, ahead of radio control and aero modelling.

"We've gone to great lengths to encourage relationships with professional modellers, authors and the specialist press. Trusted individuals can act as ambassadors for our brand. When they use and champion our products,

people listen and they give us valuable feedback on them or tell us what else we should be doing."

A common theme of my recent feature visits has been innovation; an unwillingness to sit back and accept the existing way of doing things. Deluxe Materials is another example of a company that is doing well because of a positive attitude to its customers, a desire to make its products better and encourage newcomers to get more from their hobby. That can only be a good thing for modellers. ■

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## PART ONE

## WHAT GOES ON

For more than a century, railway enthusiasts have been organising special trains to visit rarely used lines, sample unusual locomotives or simply have a civilised day out. Such trains offer many opportunities for modellers, as Ben Jones discovers.

**I**t's 1964, there's no internet, no smartphones and no enthusiast 'jungle drums' to tell you what you'll see on your trainspotting day out. But, there are murmurings on the platform end about a special train due through today. No-one knows what might be on the front, leading to wild speculation about what it could be. Amongst the regular diet of 'Black Fives' and '8Fs' there's suddenly an unfamiliar whistle as a large 'foreign' locomotive looms out of the distant haze.

"It's a 'Duchess'" someone shouts, quickly contradicted as another spotter realises it's something even more exotic - a Southern Region rebuilt 'Merchant Navy' heading for Carlisle with a railtour; not something you see every day in northern England!

In an age where we travel much more widely and more frequently than our forefathers, where standardised multiple unit designs and Class 66s roam to every corner of the network, it's difficult to imagine just how remarkable it would have been to see a Bulleid 'Pacific' so far from home, a T9 double-heading with a 'Dukedog' on the Cambrian Coast Line or a Peppercorn A2 at Exeter.

Many of us justify off-region impulse purchases on our layouts by claiming "it's a railtour", but if you're going to run such trains there's plenty of archive material out there to help us do it properly.

**EARLY OUTINGS**

For many years it was widely accepted that the first privately planned and organised enthusiast railtour was run by the Railway Correspondence & Travel Society (RCTS) from London King's Cross to Peterborough on September 11 1938. It was formed of restored GNR Stirling Single No. 1 and seven vintage 6w coaches recently refurbished by the LNER in connection with the launch of the new 'Flying Scotsman' service in June of that year.

However, recent studies suggest that the Stephenson Locomotive Society (SLS) may have been organising special trains for enthusiasts as early as 1909. The first confirmed SLS railtour visited the extensive Beckton Gas Works internal system on June 27 1925, but a tour of the same facility may have happened 15 years earlier.

The SLS' first main line railtour was actually in the Netherlands in April 1930, but two months later the society arranged for the LNER's 2.27pm Stratford Low Level-Custom House train to be extended to Beckton in connection with another private visit to the giant gas works in east London.

Two years later, the SLS also managed to arrange demonstration runs with the experimental Micheline rubber-tyred railcar for its members, one on the Bletchley-Oxford line and another from Ascot to Alton. Little did they know that they were paving the way for what would become a key part of the railway enthusiast experience.

## POST-WAR HEYDAY

Formed in Cheltenham in 1927, the RCTS organised around 300 railtours between 1938 and 1985, but the 'golden era' for such trains was undoubtedly the 15 years from 1954 to 1969. Along with the SLS, the Locomotive Club of Great Britain (LCGB), Ian Allan, the Talyllyn and Ffestiniog Railway societies and many other smaller organisations, hundreds of special trains were run, taking locomotives to unusual destinations, visiting rarely-used or endangered lines and allowing

enthusiasts to (officially) visit distant locomotive sheds where they could score plenty of rare 'cops'.

Having dipped its toe in the water in 1938, the RCTS was prevented from further outings by the outbreak of the Second World War. But, as early as May 25 1946 it was back with a visit to the Longmoor Military Railway in Hampshire.

September 30 1950 saw its first main line tour on BR, using 'Schools' 4-4-0 No. 30925 *Cheltenham* (for obvious reasons) on a trip from Holborn Viaduct to Victoria via lines in south-east London and Kent.

No. 30925 was used several times on RCTS tours, most famously working over the Great Central's 'London Extension' to Nottingham Victoria with ex-LMS 2P No. 40646 in May 1962 (see page 71).

Tours became more and more ambitious over the years, extending from one to two days or even more. The five-day 'North Eastern' in 1962 and a ten-day tour of Ireland in 1964 were two of the more extreme examples. The joint SLS/RCTS 'Scottish Tour' of June 1962 used no fewer than 21 steam locomotives of North British, Caledonian, Highland Railway, Great North of Scotland, LMS and BR origin over several days

criss-crossing routes north of the border.

Famously, the Scottish Region resurrected four pre-Grouping steam locomotives in 1959 to work such special trains; 'Caley Single' No. 123 (above), Highland Railway 'Jones Goods' 4-6-0 No. 103, GNSR 4-4-0 No. 49 *Gordon Highlander* and NBR 'Glen Douglas' became popular traction for railtours and even ventured south to England on several occasions.

Other famous locomotives liberated from museums to work special trains included GWR No. 3440 *City of Truro* in 1957-61, Midland 'Compound' No. 1000 in 1959, Great Northern 'Atlantics' Nos. 251 and No. 990 *Henry Oakley* for the 'Plant Centenarian' tours celebrating the 100th anniversary of Doncaster Works in 1953 and, of course, GNR No. 1 in 1938.

With no fewer than 24 railtours, 1964 was the RCTS' busiest year. In many cases, these tours were the last train to traverse lines being closed as part of the Beeching cuts.

Locomotives were often specially selected, especially if they were last of their class or goods types that rarely hauled passenger trains. They were normally specially prepared and cleaned for their big day - often by volunteer enthusiasts working through the night. There are far too many examples to mention everything special working, but a few exceptional outings are worthy of a mention.

An Ian Allan Locospotters Club outing to Doncaster Works on April 20 1960 paired No. 1000 and *City of Truro* to work the special train from King's Cross. Unfortunately the GWR 4-4-0 failed on the return leg and had to be removed at Fletton Junction, just south of Peterborough.

On December 2 1962, Beattie 2-4-0WTs Nos. 30585 and 30587 were sent up from Wadebridge to Waterloo to work the 'South Western Suburban' Railtour, along with H16 4-6-0T No. 30517. The tour was so popular that a repeat was run two weeks later.

The 'High Peak' tour of June 27 1964 ran via the Woodhead Route with 'EM1' electric No. 26000 *Tommy* piloting B1 No. 61360 from Sheffield to Manchester. At Parsley Hay, passengers swapped their comfortable coaches for goods wagons for a journey over the Cromford & High Peak Railway with J94s Nos. 68006/012/079 and Fowler 0-4-0ST No. 47006. Due to its unique (if not notorious) features, the C&HPR became a regular destination for tours in the 1960s. On April 30 1967, the last day of operation, the SLS said farewell to the line with a brake van special hauled by Nos. 68006 and 68012.

On June 13 1964, the 'Solway Ranger' took rebuilt 'Merchant Navy' No. 35012 *United States Lines* over the S&C to Carlisle, but the train was also hauled by a 'Black Five', two Ivatt 2MT 2-6-0s, 'Caley' No. 123 and *Gordon Highlander* on a visit to the Silloth branch.

Tours were often fairly sad occasions, marking the end of particular classes or lines. In the late-1950s and early-1960s, pre-Grouping locomotives were becoming a rarity and the final working examples were popular choices to haul tours, either on their home turf or further afield. Many trips also included stops for works visits and depot tours to view locomotives stabled for the weekend or undergoing repair.

Obscure cross-country railways seem to have been a magnet for tours, not least the Stratford-upon-Avon and Midland Joint (SMJR), which was visited by several trains hauled by locomotives as diverse as 'Dukedog' 4-4-0 No. 9015 (April 1955), ex-LNER B12 4-6-0 No. 61572 (October 1963), SR 'U' 2-6-0 No. 31639 and 'Q1' 0-6-0 No. 33006 (March 1965), ex-LMS 3F and 4F 0-6-0s and GWR '61XX' 2-6-2T No. 6111 (September 1964).

From the mid-1950s, as modernisation, dieselisation and line closures began to eat into many older steam locomotive classes, 'Dean Goods', 'Dukedogs', myriad Southern Railway and Scottish 4-4-0s, LNWR 'Coal Tanks', humble 0-6-0 goods locomotives in dozens of forms, Great Eastern E4 2-4-0s and D16 4-4-0s, 'Terriers', O2s and LBSCR 'Atlantics' - to name just a few - had a final day in the limelight.

As redundant steam locomotives started to pass into private hands, a few of those enterprising individuals grasped the opportunity to return their machines to the main line, often repainted into colourful pre-Nationalisation liveries. Locomotives such as *Flying Scotsman*, *The Great Marquess*, *Pendennis Castle* and *Clun Castle* led the way until the BR steam ban of 1968.

Steam traction dominated until 1968, but the RCTS also used 'Brighton Belle' EMUs for a tour of Southern Region lines in 1972 (so popular it had to be run twice), DMUs, diesel and electric locomotives. The various societies also visited lines such as the Romney, Hythe & Dymchurch, the Liverpool Overhead Railway, industrial lines such as ironstone branches in Lincolnshire/

Rutland and Northamptonshire and the many light railways that were disappearing as the 1950s and 1960s progressed.

Once main line steam had finished in August 1968, those still needing their 'fix' redirected their attentions to industrial lines still using steam locomotives and many special visits were organised to experience these railways in action. Railtours evolved to cater for several markets, including preserved steam locomotives in the early-1970s. We'll look at how to model diesel and electric era railtour operations in Part 2.

## MODELLING RAILTOURS

In their early years, railtours were enjoyed by the lucky few who could afford the fares. As a result, they were often short trains formed of whatever spare stock was available (or requested), supplemented in many cases by a restaurant or kitchen car. This makes them an ideal subject for modellers, especially as you can be





fairly flexible about the vehicles used. If you're looking to model a specific railtour, careful research into the formation will be required, although photographs should provide much of the necessary information.

Evidence suggests that vehicles with open saloons, rather than compartments were normally requested for tours. Stanier Period III and Gresley end-door open stock is much in evidence, and from the mid-1950s BR Mk 1 First Open (FO), Tourist Second Open (TSO) and Brake Second Open (BSO) vehicles began to appear. The latter appears in many railtour formations, but is a significant omission from the ranks of RTR models in N and OO. Comet Models can supply a 4mm scale kit.

Maunsell and Bulleid stock appears to have been a common choice for tours originating on the Southern Region, the latter usually mixed with BR(S) green

Mk 1s by the early-1960s. A mix of ex-GWR stock can be seen in photographs of railtours from the 1950s, including Collett 'bow-end' and 'Sunshine' stock, Hawksworth coaches, although photographs suggest WR tours largely went over to Mk 1s by the late-1950s.

One exceptional tour was the Ian Allan-Trains Illustrated 'Pennine Pullman' of May 12 1956, which featured A4 No. 60014 *Silver Link* over the Great Central route from London Marylebone to Sheffield Victoria, EM2 electric 27002 over the Woodhead Route to Ashburys and an immaculate pairing of ex-GCR D11 4-4-0s Nos. 62662 *Prince of Wales* and 62664 *Princess Mary* over the Calder Valley route and back to Rotherwood Sidings. From there the A4 took over again for the return leg via Retford to King's Cross.

Apart from the impressive motive power, what made this train special was the use of seven Pullman Cars and a former 'Devon Belle' observation saloon (plus a Mk 1 FO to replace a defective Pullman Car and Mk 1 TSO to add extra capacity). A reasonable representation of this train could be assembled fairly easily using RTR models released by Bachmann and Hornby over the last few years.

As the popularity of trainspotting grew towards the end of the 1950s, and British families had a little more disposable income, more and more enthusiasts wanted to take part in railtours. Even from a brief scan of contemporary photographs, it's clear that trains grew from four or five comfortable open vehicles (including a restaurant car) into much bigger trains of 12-14 coaches for the most sought-after trips.

Some RTR coaching stock models are suitable, but for greater variety, it's well worth investigating the ranges of kit manufacturers such as Comet Models and MJT.



Excellent photographic records exist of many tours because frequent stops were made to enable participants to alight for a leg stretch and a few 'snaps'. On July 24 1960, the RCTS Sheffield Branch organised the 'Dukeries Rail Tour' to visit various freight-only lines in the Derbyshire/Nottinghamshire coalfield. Ex-LMS 4F No. 44590 and Ivatt 4MT No. 43145 pose in the sidings at Glapwell Colliery, near Chesterfield, as their passengers scale the spoil heaps for a better view. COLOUR-RAIL



## BASIC ACCOMMODATION

While some tours may have enjoyed Pullman standards of comfort and at-seat meals, others were notable for using open goods wagons and brake vans to visit obscure parts of the system. We've already mentioned the Cromford & High Peak line, but tours also ran to destinations such as Wenfordbridge in Cornwall, using ex-GWR '1366' 0-6-0PT No. 1369 and half a dozen BR and ex-GWR 'Toad' brake vans (September 19 1964) and toured the coalfields of Ayrshire and the North East of England in the 1960s.

Many tours of private railways and industrial systems such as collieries, gas works and docks used small locomotives and brake vans or open wagons. These are rarely seen in model form, but would be relatively straightforward to re-create using the many RTR and kit brake vans now available, five or six-plank opens, ex-LNER 13t steel 'High' opens or even BR 16t mineral wagons embellished with groups of hardy figures dressed in tweed jackets and gabardine 'macs'.

Another well-documented trip was organised by the RCTS' West Riding Branch on April 9 1960 and offered participants a unique chance to ride on the Hepworth Iron Company's 1½-mile branch from Hazlehead Bridge, on the Woodhead Route, to Crow Edge, high in the Pennines west of Penistone. Yorkshire Engine Co. 0-6-0T *Hepworth* conveyed more than 100 people in five BR shock-absorbing open wagons up the 1-in-25 incline to the remote quarry, shortly before the branch closed.

## RAILTOUR SPECIALISTS

Certain locomotives and coaches became inextricably linked with railtours, especially those locomotives



revived for special duties. As the range of RTR models has grown in recent years, we've seen models of many of these 'celebrities' released, not least by Bachmann and Hornby for the National Railway Museum. Midland 'Compound' 4-4-0 No. 1000, Great Northern Ivatt 'Atlantic' No. 251, GWR No. 3440 *City of Truro*, LSWR green T9 No. 120 and numerous editions of No. 4472/60103 *Flying Scotsman* have been produced. Rapido Trains is working on a high-quality OO gauge model of GNR 'Single' No. 1 for Locomotion Models, which should appear in 2017.

At the opposite end of the scale, Tri-ang's Caledonian 'Single' No. 123 can be obtained secondhand, along with the two CR style coaches restored for railtours in the 1960s. The other three Scottish Region 'stars' require more work as they're only available as kits. The 'Jones Goods' is an old DJH kit, Nu-Cast offers an ex-GNSR D41 which can be adapted for *Gordon Highlander* while PDK Models and Crownline have produced kits of the D34 'Glen'. The same applies to GNR/LNER 'C2' 4-4-2 No. 990 *Henry Oakley*, which can be obtained in kit form from DJH (see Tony Wright's guide to building a 'C2' in August 2016 **BRM**).

Other suitable OO gauge RTR railtour traction for the 1950s and early-1960s includes Bachmann's forthcoming LNWR 'Coal Tank' 0-6-2T, Oxford Rail's Adams 'Radial' 4-4-2T, the Hornby BR 'Clan', LNER J15, D16/3 and B12/3, Bachmann's GWR 'Dukedog' 4-4-0, LMS 'Super D' 0-8-0, LNER D11 4-4-0, J11 and LMS 3F/4F 0-6-0s plus the various express 'Pacifics' that were (and still are) so popular with 'spotters'.

But it's not just about locomotives; certain passenger vehicles were also particularly suitable and specially

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
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requested for railtours. After the cessation of the 'Devon Belle', the train's two observation cars lived a nomadic life and could often be seen attached to the rear of excursion and touring trains on the London Midland and, later, Scottish Regions. Hornby has produced this vehicle in various liveries, including BR crimson/cream and maroon.

If you're on the move all day, your train is likely to need some form of catering vehicle. All sorts of kitchen, buffet and restaurant coaches were commandeered for early railtours, many of which can only be re-created using kits – assuming you can identify them correctly from contemporary photographs. Suitable RTR models include the Replica Railways (formerly Mainline) Mk 1 Restaurant Buffet (RBR) or Bachmann/Farish Mk 1 RU and RMB 'miniature buffet'. Hornby's Gresley Buffet car is also suitable, especially in BR blue/grey for 1970s tours. Along with Thompson buffet 1708, these coaches became much requested for enthusiast tours as some of the last surviving pre-BR vehicles in passenger service.

Many modellers spend a great deal of time and effort creating obscure and unusual vehicles for their layouts. Railtours offer many opportunities for scratching this creative 'itch' and recalling favourite days out or famous tours from the 20th century. Next time Pip Dunn looks at the possibilities offered by diesel and electric tours. ■

**E**lectrifying an N scale model railway is not as simple as assembling a few portals and popping them across the tracks, as I discovered when adding 1960s electrification to my 'Dudley Heath' layout. It started with researching the electrification of the West Coast Main Line and culminated nine months later in the final assembly of the last portal. The project was time-consuming, but not excessively challenging from a modelling point of view and reasonably experienced modellers can achieve good results with the N-Brass Locos OHLE kits.

Incorporating portals when layout planning is ideal, but I fitted out 'Dudley Heath' retrospectively, even though OHLE was planned from the start. I did some initial checks on the span of the portals and built station platforms and other structures so they would match the width of the three-track portals. Bridges

were modelled as if being prepared for electrification.

When planning, portal and mast locations need calculating for realistic spans. Take measurements to be sure the right portal kit is chosen for each location. It was apparent that few of the portals on 'Dudley Heath' would follow instructions, each one becoming a bespoke model for its location. Ideas of how to better model the OHLE fittings sprung to mind when building and some earlier builds were reworked to match the improved versions.

A variety of etched brass kits for Mark 1-series 25kV AC electrification portals, cantilever supports and fittings are available from N-Brass Locos in both OO and N scale. The portals are available in light- and heavyweight designs with both tall and short legs for a degree of adaptation. Tall portals are usually fitted with hanging pulley supports and shorter ones have overhead



Modelling OHLE in any scale widens the scope for operating different locomotives and multiple units. N gauge modellers can enjoy state-of-the-art models of electric traction such as the Dapol Class 86, Revolution Trains 'Pendolino' and Graham Farish Class 350.



## Ask the expert

**Q** What considerations should I take into account when planning a layout with OHLE?

**A** Overhead line equipment (OHLE) will have an impact on the layout design, particularly structures relating to the infrastructure. In using the Grand Junction line as my inspiration, I could choose from a variety of full-size bridges and structures to create each scene. One thing that struck me was the extra height of the bridges on the layout, particularly the footbridge at the north end of the station. Allowances have to be made for the height of the OHLE wiring (imagined or real); the pantograph and of course the train itself. Many locations in the Black Country had new structures during the 1967 electrification scheme. Before embarking on electrifying your layout, do the existing structures have enough clearance for wires, pantograph and train?

Spacing of portals and masts (the span) is another consideration: How far apart should they be? It will vary depending on line curvature, junctions, structures and other factors. On plain line with gentle curves, the span can be a maximum of 73 metres, and no less than 13 metres. In reality, spacing masts and portals on a model railway becomes a matter of selective compression. A span of 73m works out at 490mm in 1:148 scale. 'Dudley Heath' is only 2.6m long, which means that only five spans could be accommodated on plain track.

Reducing the span to about a locomotive and half a coach length on plain track introduces the same level of selective compression as the rest of the layout. Furthermore, the closer spacing better suits the sharper curves and tighter junctions typical of a model railway.

The height of the register arms and contact wire from the rail is the next consideration. In scale terms, the maximum is 4.8m (16ft) or approximately 32.5mm. The distance between registration arms and rail should be as standard as possible, even under bridges and structures, something which must be carefully considered when first building the layout.

Clearance should be allowed for line side equipment such as cable troughs, drainage, equipment cabinets and signals so sight lines are maintained. A three-track portal may be a better fit for a double track main line than a two-track portal (unless masts and cantilevered arms are being used). Also, allow for the greater clearances required on sharp curves with Mk 3 coaches and long wagons. A three-track span may be a better fit for a curved double-track main line.

Correctly positioning the hanging register arm assemblies (the vertical mounting pole and registration arm itself) and pulleys on the portal is an important detail which requires study of full size portals. As a rule, the register arms and pulleys are fitted to the side of the portal facing approaching trains; although there are exceptions! Consequently, the assemblies would not normally be all fitted to the same side of the portal unless there are clearance issues (unlikely). There may be some alternating between register arms and pulley assemblies depending on local variations. Lower portals fitted with overhead pulleys will have the register arms assemblies facing approaching trains on high speed plain line.

Register arm assemblies are fitted where there is room, particularly with wiring cross-over at diverging junctions where there is more than two register arm assemblies bolted to the portal to support wires and linkages.

pulley supports or are mounted on raised structures such as station platforms.

One feature common to much of this style of OHLE compared to later Mark 3-series high speed equipment is the separation of the upper support wire from the lower contact wire (encumbrance or system height) which can be as much as 6ft.

Before placing an order, photographs of the Grand Junction line were examined to see how portals were used and which types were used in stations, junctions and plain line situations. Long portals are used to clear station platforms and junctions with more than enough clearance on either side of the permanent way. A lightweight portal can follow a heavyweight and cantilevered masts are inserted where additional support is necessary. As a result, 'Dudley Heath' has a variety of portals and was a kit-bashing paradise.

Bending formers were added to the shopping list to help with folding and assembly of the 20-odd portals. The catalogue numbers of N-Brass Locos portals are in parenthesis:

### PORTALS

- Three-track (86mm span) heavyweight portals (2523)
- Four-track (127mm span) heavyweight portals (2525)
- Twin-track (67mm span) lightweight portals (2530)
- Three-track (92mm span) lightweight portals (2532)
- Four-track (132mm span) lightweight portals (2534)

### OTHER FITTINGS

- Hanging register arm sets (2585)
- Cantilever masts (6ft encumbrance fittings) (2500)
- Bending formers for accurately folding the portal etchings



## INSTALLING PORTALS

I used 2mm diameter brass rod as mounting spigots. Lengths of 30mm were soldered to the legs of each portal. A brass tube with a 2mm inner diameter was chosen to complete a secure mounting method allowing the portals to be easily removed and replaced. Fitting the portals to a layout with scenery and structures in place made measuring the hole positions awkward. If the mounting tube was slightly out, the portal etch would be under stress. Fitting a mounting tube for one leg only, leaving a wider, looser hole for the other worked a treat.

Holes were drilled through the baseboard top with care to avoid equipment underneath. If an area is too congested to allow the desired portal span, consider moving the equipment (such as point motors) rather than compromise on portal spans and fittings.

Each portal is identified with a number plate on the rear leg, identifying which way round the portal should be replaced after cleaning and maintenance. Each mounting hole is identified on a plan with the number of the portal belonging to it.

## ENHANCEMENT WORK


Each register arm etch is supplied as a two-part assembly which is soldered together to give the piece some bulk. Unfortunately, the manner in which the assemblies are laid out in the etch means that some have very short mounting poles to attach to the portal. In the end, I used 0.7mm diameter nickel-silver wire for the

pole, with the registration arm and insulator soldered to the end of the wire. The wire was cut over-length to allow for adjustment.


Working out track centre lines with masking tape for each portal ensured registration arm assemblies were fitted in the correct position. Fittings had to be at a standard height to allow pantographs to be operated in a raised position just below the level of the registration arms. A height gauge made from 40 thou' styrene set the height at 35mm allowing room for error and slightly overscale pantographs.

The kits are a great foundation for modelling more complex structures such as junction portals, those fitted with tension weight pulleys for wire overlap, line isolators and transformer equipment. One of the portals fitted to 'Dudley Heath' has isolators for a diverging line and another has bus bars for energising a second set of wires at the start of a line. There are also single masts with anchors to secure the end of wiring at junctions. NBL components can be used to create these structures together with 0.45mm and 0.7mm diameter nickel-silver wire, H-section brass rod and 10BA screw thread.

Painting the portals depends on era and the age of equipment. Records indicate that Mark 1-series portals were galvanised from new which explains why they have lasted so long. In recent years, portals and masts are painted light grey or patchily painted or primed as if ready for repainting. I painted mine with Phoenix Precision grey etching primer and a coat of light grey. ■



An N-Brass Locos N gauge heavy-weight portal etch. Folding is aided by a mix of half etch lines and holes. Thin tabs hold the etch in the fret which are easily cut.



Prepare each NBL portal etching for either glue or soldered construction by cleaning it with a fibre scratch pencil.



The bending formers supplied by NBL for its portal kits are strongly recommended, along with a bench vice for folding the long thin etchings.



A small bench vice was used to hold etchings and bending formers securely when forming each bend. Use pieces of wood to protect the etch if it has serrated jaws.



The bending former is placed against the lower edge of the half etched line and etched holes. Solder fills as much of the folding holes as possible.



Use an off-cut of plywood to fold the brass around the bending former to avoid distorting it.



All that remains to form this portal span is to cut a piece of plywood to the exact length of the etching to make the last fold and complete the assembly.




The bending former is removed from the portal span. Solder is applied to the join. Note the effect of the fold line holes along the edge of the portal assembly.



Flux is important to allow the 188 degree solder to flow along the join, leaving a thin layer. Wooden clothes pegs make excellent clamps.



Another view of a long four-track lightweight portal span held with clothes pegs whilst the join is completed with solder.




Register arm assemblies and pulleys are soldered together from etched nickel-silver parts. Register arm mounting poles are replaced with 0.7mm diameter wire.



With care to avoid equipment located under the baseboards, a first hole is drilled through the baseboard top for fitting mounting tube.



The completed portals are fitted with mounting spigots of 2mm brass rod which slot neatly into metric brass tube on one side only. A looser hole is made on the other.



The tube (A) is slotted onto the portal mounting spigot (B) to check it slides on and off freely. A jammed mounting spigot is not desirable. Take care when gluing into place.



An engineers' square helps keep the installation square. Add pieces of styrene to the portal legs to represent a concrete mounting plinth.



First installation of portals with clearance checks on the curve. Portals are situated closer together at junctions and curves. Centre lines are yet to be established.



Masking tape is used to indicate the centre line of each track so the register arm and pulley assemblies can be fitted in the correct position, allowing for wire stagger.



Junctions make for interesting portals. This long four-track portal has five sets of register arms, four of which relate to the junction and cross-over of the wires.



19 NBL three-track lightweight portals span the tracks and platforms of the second station on the layout perfectly and give an authentic WCML look.



20 Masking tape has been used to mark in the track centre lines in the station area before the register arm assemblies were fitted.



21 Gauges are one way of fitting register arm assemblies at a constant height from the rail right across a layout and avoiding inconsistencies that might damage pantographs.



22 The etched register arm assemblies were modified with new mounting posts of 0.7mm diameter nickel-silver wire.



23 A centre-line was drawn on the register arm height gauge to position each arm. The top of the gauge is the width of a Dapol pantograph head.



24 Setting registration arms to a standard height allows the operation of the unsprung Dapol pantographs. A gauge sets the height of the pantographs correctly.



25 Single masts are also fitted with mounting spigots which are slotted into a tube set into the baseboard. This allows for easy removal for cleaning and transport.



26 Using the correct OHLE components adds character to a layout and helps create the appearance of a secondary main line in the West Midlands.



27 Portals fitted to plain line are spaced roughly a locomotive and half a coach length apart. The Farish '350' runs south under the twin-track portals.




28 Photographs were an important part of OHLE installation. Numerous images were examined to identify portals that were not straight and level in relation to other structures.

## TEN CONSTRUCTION TIPS

- 1) Use 145 and 188 degree solder together with flux to build the NBL portal kits whenever possible. The resulting assembly will be the stronger for it!
- 2) Use bending formers to assemble the portals - it will make the job so much easier
- 3) If liquid flux has been used with solder to build the etched portals, take the time to thoroughly wash each completed portal and remove traces of it. Clean your tools and bending formers of flux traces at the same time.
- 4) Grade 600 wet-and-dry paper is perfect for cleaning portal assemblies and preparing them for painting
- 5) Some portal kits have half-etch lines in the legs to enable them to be shortened for mounting on platforms. This is a weakness in the design which should be reinforced with solder or glue during assembly
- 6) The register arm etchings are supplied with additional insulators which can be used to further detail the OHLE
- 7) The vertical mounting poles of register arm assemblies may be replaced with 0.7mm diameter nickel-silver wire for a better appearance
- 8) Make height gauges for setting pantograph and registration arm heights to a consistent level
- 9) Apply a tiny drop of silicone lubricant to each mounting tube so portal spigots do not become jammed in place.
- 10) Prime the portal assemblies with etching primer before painting to prevent 'silvering' from paint rubbed away from corners and edges.

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

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# FOUR RAILCARS AND GWR 'MOGUL' FROM HELJAN



An astonishing renaissance in ready-to-run O gauge looks set to continue with Heljan announcing plans to release a GWR '43XX' 2-6-0 and no fewer than four different designs of BR diesel railcar.

In development are 1:43.5 scale models of the Pressed Steel Class 121 single railcar, Class 117 three-car suburban DMU, Swindon Class 120 Cross-Country DMU (two and three car versions) and the Gloucester RCW Class 128 Diesel Parcels Unit (DPU).

Of the quartet, the '128' looks to be furthest advanced with six versions announced covering two Western Region BR green vehicles, BR blue M55994, weathered BR blue W55991 plus 'Version 2' DPUs M55995 in BR blue and Royal Mail red 55993. Delivery is expected in the fourth quarter of 2017 with an RRP of £579.00. Heljan has already offered numerous versions of this popular railcar in OO gauge. Target prices are £579.00 for the single railcars, £800.00 for two-car sets and £1,100.00 for three-car Class 117s and 120s.

Also now confirmed is a GWR Churchward 'Mogul' to follow the GWR 'Large Prairie' due later this year. The '43XX' 2-6-0 will be offered in early GWR and later BR versions covering three GWR liveries (Great Western, 'shirtbutton' monogram and GWR tender lettering), plus four BR models covering plain black and lined green with the early emblem, lined green with the late crest and late crest unlined green. The models are based on

prototypes from the Nos. 4321-99 and 5300-83 series. RRP is £799.00.

The Gauge O Guild's Guildex at Telford also saw Heljan announce six additional centre headcode Class 37s for O gauge in response to customer demand. Despite the model having an unrefurbished bodyshell with bufferbeam cowlings, the '37/0' will be offered in BR large logo blue, 'Dutch' grey/yellow, Railfreight 'Red Stripe' grey and post-1987 Railfreight triple grey with Coal, Distribution and Petrochemicals sector logos. All are due in the first quarter of 2017 with an RRP of £699.00.

Heljan has announced that the chassis of its Class 03 diesel shunter may also be used as the basis for a Drewry Class 04 in due course. Both will follow the O gauge Hunslet Class 05 0-6-0DM, seven versions of which are now expected in the third quarter of 2017.



## JUST LIKE THE REAL THING

To cater for detail variations, four batches will be produced, starting with the '8750' variants with later cab design, welded tanks and late pattern injectors in GWR and BR liveries. Models will feature more than 200 body components, a high-torque motor with 40:1 gearing, sprung buffers/drawgear and finescale wheels.

## REVOLUTION ROLLS OUT 'B TANK' AND 40FT HI-CUBE' IN N



Revolution Trains is to produce its first steam/diesel transition era model - a 35t 'Class B' fuel tank in 1:148 scale - as well as a 40ft 'Hi-Cube' container for modern intermodal traffic.

The 'Class B' tank is being designed by Colin Allbright, formerly chief designer at Graham Farish, and will be manufactured in China. It will feature a plastic weighted deck, separate photo-etched and wire detail parts and body-mounted NEM couplers with kinematic pivoting sockets. The tooling has been designed to allow both the original and updated suspension types to be modelled.

The design could carry bulk liquids faster and in greater quantities than any comparable design, and hundreds were built between the mid-1950s and early-1960s.

Liveries will be Esso black, Mobil/Charrington red, plain black, 'Regent' and 'Texaco' black and United Molasses blue/brown. They will be available singly or in triple packs, priced at £19.50 and £58.50 respectively.

Revolution is also teaming up with

C-Rail Intermodal to produce 40ft hi-cube containers in N. Now the world's most common container type, the stepping effect seen when they are mixed with standard height containers is a characteristic feature of modern intermodal trains.

Mike Hale of Revolution Trains said: "The 40ft Hi-Cube is a missing link for those modelling intermodal trains in British N, so this product fits perfectly with our ethos of filling the gaps the mainstream manufacturers can't. Although optimised to fit our KFA flat, this model will be compatible with any suitable wagons already available in N."

The boxes will be offered in six versions - Maersk, MSC, UASC, Hamburg Sud, Evergreen and Hanjin - reflecting the most numerous types observed. CAD work is complete and it is anticipated that the containers will be ready early next year. Orders can be placed via the Revolution website now.

At the heart of the system is the UNITY-P 4Amp supply. It will provide power for the UNITY-T push-button turnout controller capable of controlling up to eight turnouts, UNITY-C twin-track controller (due Winter 2016), UNITY-L lighting unit and UNITY-S sound controller (due early-2017). All will feature screw terminals for solderless connection.

# REVOLUTION TRAINS TEA BOGIE TANK



**Crowdfunding** has been treated with some apprehension by the model railway hobby. Many attempts to 'kickstart' model projects have fallen at the first hurdle, but the method seems to have gained some traction recently with N scale modellers. Leading that movement is Revolution Trains, set up by Ben Ando and Mike Hale, well known through their work for the N Gauge Society.

Their record of delivering quality models and some excellent PR work has helped them to overcome the fears of potential customers and push on with several projects, most notably a run of RTR Class 390 Virgin Pendolino EMUs. However, the first Revolution models to reach modellers are TEA bogie tank wagons, being produced in a range of colourful liveries seen over the last 15 years. Although the order book is now closed, we thought they were worth a close look to see what level of design and detail Revolution is delivering.

Kindly supplied by Ben and Mike for review is VTG88143, decorated in the wagon leasing company's dark blue livery. Built from the early-2000s to replace earlier generations of TEA bogie tanks dating from the late-1960s onwards, there are several variants of the new TEAs, but all are visually similar, apart from differences in discharge gear and walkways. Revolution's model represents wagons built for VTG by Greenbrier from 2006. Supplied singly or in selected triple packs, Revolution's TEAs have been produced in VTG grey, VTG red, Freightliner green, EWS light grey, Greenergy blue/green (triple pack) and ex-Freightliner green with VTG branding.

Revolution has worked with Rapido Trains to design and manufacture these models, and the Canadian company's eye for fine detail is immediately evident. Components such as the photo-etched metal catwalks and discharge gear constructed from separate plastic and wire parts really shout 'quality'. However, the flip-side of such fine detail is that the models must be handled carefully. In fact, Revolution recommends

keeping any handling to a minimum.

Our sample showed signs of excess 'flash' on the ladders at one end of the tank - on other models it might not even raise a comment, but the quality shown elsewhere on the TEA made it stand out.


The overall look and shape compares well with published information and components such as the Axiom Rail TF25 low track force bogies are beautifully rendered. Free-running metal pin-point axles are fitted, along with detachable Rapido couplers in kinematic NEM pockets that allow close-coupling and operation on tight curves. Our sample ran faultlessly at the head of a long train - useful as the real wagons operate in block trains of up to 30 vehicles. However, the model's *pièce de résistance* (and apparently the bane of Rapido's life in recent months!) is the decoration, which is simply outstanding. Hazchem warning notices, data panels and instructions, wagon data and Network Rail overhead line warning flashes are crisp and legible throughout. All credit to Revolution and Rapido for achieving such a high standard, despite the inherent difficulties.

These wagons are seen far and wide, working from ports and refineries to terminals in Scotland, Cumbria, the Midlands and southern England. I'm very much looking forward to seeing trains of Revolution TEAs rolling through the landscape on N gauge layouts in the near future. If you've

ordered some of these wagons we're sure you won't be disappointed and, if you model in OO gauge and haven't yet decided whether to reserve some of the larger scale versions, do it before it's too late. ■



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## BACHMANN/TMC BR 9F 2-10-0



**It's been in the range for a decade but Bachmann's BR Standard 9F 2-10-0 is still highly regarded and is, for many people, one of the company's best models to date. Some argue that Bachmann hasn't made enough of it over the years, suggesting that it should be a staple item, rather than something that comes and goes from catalogue. Falling into this camp is TMC, which has put its 'money where its mouth is' and commissioned an exclusive model of class pioneer, Western Region No. 92000, to fill the gap.**

As a plain black, late crest 'Spaceship' with a BR1G tender, there's nothing out of the ordinary about this example, but that's really the point of it. It offers TMC an - almost - blank canvas for its custom finished models (see October **BRM**), as well as an exclusive product for collectors. The model has been finished by Bachmann in early- to mid-1960s condition with overhead line warning flashes, Western Region yellow route restriction dots on the cabside and a Bristol Barrow Road (82E) shedplate. No. 92000 was based at Bristol's former Midland Railway depot from December 1962 to February 1965, having previously been resident at Ebbw Junction, Bath Green Park, Banbury, Old Oak Common and Tyseley. It was withdrawn from Gloucester in July 1965 after just 11 and a half years in service.

*Evening Star* aside, this common variation on the 9F theme has not been offered regularly by Bachmann and so it is likely to be welcomed by modellers of the Western Region and beyond. As befits a heavy goods locomotive, the model is substantially built with a die-cast chassis/frame section and metal running plate, slender metal smoke deflectors, wire handrails and sprung buffers. It has a real 'heft' about it, just like the hugely successful prototype.

Other than the decoration chosen by TMC, the model is unchanged from previous Bachmann 9Fs; performance is excellent with lots of haulage power for prototypical freight trains, an eight-pin DCC decoder sits atop the chassis and its overall looks are superbly accurate.

The 9F predates the trend towards DCC sound and so does not have provision for a speaker or sound decoder. However, TMC can offer sound as an optional extra on request, as well as weathering and renumbering to the locomotive of your choice.

If we have one small niggle with the design of the model, it's the tender coupling bar, which is also a product of its time. Although the simple metal bar has two positions, neither is especially close coupled, leaving a significant gap between the footplate and tender. Perhaps Bachmann could consider modifying this connection if/when it updates the 9F to allow factory-fitted sound?

Whether you run it as delivered, or in weathered condition, it's an ideal model for fast fitted goods trains, long strings of mineral wagons carrying coal or iron ore and unfitted steel or oil trains. WR 9Fs also saw their fair share of passenger work, especially on the Somerset & Dorset, so this model offers plenty of opportunities for all sorts of traffic from the late-1950s to mid-1960s.

Overall though, the 9F is still an outstanding model of an imposing prototype and well worth considering if you model the final years of BR steam, either on the Western Region or elsewhere. Highly recommended. ■

## DAPOL BRCW TYPE 3 Bo-Bo/CLASS 33



Given the popularity, numerical size and versatility of the prototype, as well as the inadequacies of the existing model, it's perhaps surprising that we haven't seen an updated Class 33 in N scale until now.

However, several years after they were first announced, Dapol's 'Cromptons' are now arriving in UK shops.

For the first time, the tooling is designed to allow production of standard Class 33/0 and push-pull fitted Class 33/1 locomotives across their entire career, from introduction in 1960 to the privatisation era survivors. Reviewed here is BR 'Dutch' grey/yellow 33103, in post-1992 condition with high intensity headlights.

As is normal for Dapol locomotives in N, the model is supplied with three sets of alternative couplers, including the company's own magnetic knuckle type, a set of optional bufferbeam details, push-pull buffering plates, optional miniature snowploughs and, specific to Sector era liveries such as this, a set of etched metal BR double arrows. An illustrated instruction sheet explaining how to maintain your model and fit a six-pin DCC decoder is also supplied, along with details of Dapol's unique 'no quibble' mechanical warranty scheme.

It's immediately obvious that this model is in a different league to the old Graham Farish Class 33, which despite Bachmann's best efforts to upgrade it mechanically, was

never one of the Poole company's best efforts. Building on the good foundations it set with the closely related Class 26 and Class 27, also built in Smethwick by the Birmingham Railway Carriage & Wagon Co., Dapol has created a model that is rather more faithful to the prototype.

Instead of rushing to release a model that may have had flaws, Dapol has taken its time with the '33' and even took the brave step of re-tooling the bodyshell after receiving feedback from modellers about pre-production models. The result is a model that captures the character of the prototype well from all angles. The troublesome curves and angles of the BRCW bodyshell, which have bamboozled more than one RTR manufacturer, are pleasingly rendered.

Looking closer, there's some particularly fine work around the cab windscreens where the frames and their surrounds have been moulded in considerable detail. There's also excellent moulded detail on the roof, along the solebar and on the bogies. The latter are excellent, apart from the omission of the extended top footboard of the cab steps, which runs under the cabside on Class 33s, but not on '26s' and '27s'.

Additional details such as etched metal radiator grilles, wire cab door handrails and fine separate windscreens wipers help to reinforce the impression of a quality model. The '33/1' also features Southern Region 27-way jumper cables on the cab ends – fitted in 1966/67 to enable the sub-class to work in multiple with SR EMUs and the '4-TC' trailer sets on the Bournemouth-Weymouth route. Fine cables and hoses are tricky to reproduce to scale in N and while Dapol's look a little overscale, they have been well rendered, even including the characteristic bend in the air pipes when correctly replaced.

Applied from 1991 onwards, 'Dutch' grey/yellow was the final livery for many Class 33s, as they were steadily demoted to departmental duties towards the end of their careers. However, the livery sat well on the BRCW design, as it does on Dapol's model. Our sample was very neatly and accurately decorated, corresponding almost exactly with a photograph of 33103 taken in April 1993. Application of the yellow band over the grey base colour was crisp, as was the printing of many smaller details such as orange central warning lines, Blue Star multiple working codes and cabside numbers.

Also available from Dapol stockists now are original BR green D6571, D6597 in green with a small yellow warning panel, BR green D6561 with full yellow ends, BR blue 33020, 33030 and 33102, 33008 *Eastleigh* in 1980s style BR green, BR 'Dutch' grey/yellow 33046 *Merlin* and Railfreight Construction sector grey 33042. Considering the number of liveries applied to the class since the

late-1980s, including Network SouthEast, EWS, DRS and West Coast Railways red, there will undoubtedly be more versions released soon.

Straight out of the box, our sample displayed superb slow speed running, down to almost imperceptible movement even on a basic DC controller. Dapol recommends running your model in thoroughly for optimum performance, and while ours was smooth and reasonably quiet, an hour's running in each direction helped to settle down the mechanism even further.

Mechanically, the model will be familiar to Dapol customers, employing a five-pole motor driving all four axles via a gear tower on each bogie. Current collection is via all eight wheels and pin-point axles running in brass bearings.

Another impressive feature is the lighting. The SR two-character route code panels are illuminated, with white blanks leading and red blanks at the rear (in direction of travel). This is one of the best treatments we've seen for SR headcodes, helped by the gentle warm-white glow of the LEDs. This model also has bright, cool white LED headlights and the overall effect is excellent. A sliding switch under the fuel tanks turns off the red lights when hauling trains on DC analogue.

In this guise, the '33' is suitable for use with anything from ballast hoppers to sets of Network SouthEast Mk 2s, SR EMUs or even VSOE Pullman Cars. As a true mixed traffic type, the various other versions of the model will handle everything from Dapol's Maunsell coaches in BR green to modern air-braked freight stock, SWT Desiro EMU moves, parcels and newspaper traffic, nuclear flask trains and just about anything that worked over Southern Region lines (and beyond) from 1960 onwards.

However you choose to employ it, this is an excellent addition to Dapol's N scale diesel fleet. We're delighted that this successful and versatile Type 3 has finally been given a 1:148 scale model that does justice to the prototype. Recommended. ■

## OXFORD RAIL LNER/NBR GOODS WAGONS



**Ben Jones** looks at three new OO gauge wagon releases from Oxford Rail, ideal for modellers of the pre-Grouping and 'Big Four' eras.



Announced late last year, this trio of new pre-Nationalisation goods wagons is now on general release via Oxford Rail stockists. Like the company's debut wagon, the Railway Clearing House (RCH) seven-plank open, the intention is to release numerous liveries at frequent intervals over the coming months.

Oldest, and smallest, of the three new models is a Scottish 'Jubilee' four-plank open of late-Victorian design. Shown here is the North British Railway grey version, but several others carrying the colours of Scottish collieries are also available or planned. According to the worksplate, neatly printed on the solebar, NBR No. 55605 was built at Cowlairs Works in Glasgow in 1895. Although the NBR was absorbed into the LNER in 1923, humble goods wagons were not repainted regularly and pre-Grouping liveried vehicles are likely to have been seen well into the 'Big Four' era.

Some of these wagons, introduced in 1887, survived into the BR period and were seen well beyond their Scottish 'patch' after 1923. With vintage wagons often being transferred to departmental use after their working life was over, there's even potential for suitably delapidated wagons in BR engineers trains.

The model compares reasonably well with published photographs of the prototype in Peter Tatlow's *LNER Wagons Volume 3: The Scottish Area* and conveys the

late-19th century personality well. In that respect, it's a brave but commendable choice by Oxford Rail and will add character and variety to pre-BR coal trains. Fine details include slender turned metal buffers, extensive strapping detail with dozens of rivet heads, separate handbrake levers and just one brake shoe per side.

Dating from after 1923 is the LNER 12t six-plank unfitted open. Although prior to Nationalisation most goods wagons (especially opens) were owned by private companies, the 'Big Four' and their predecessors maintained fleets of general-purpose opens and vans for merchandise traffic. Until now, RTR manufacturers have tended to simply decorate standard PO wagons in railway company colours for this purpose, but this model is the first to specifically depict a 'Big Four' six-plank open.

Although at first glance similar to an RCH five-plank, the longer body betrays the fact that this is something different. The model compares well with published information and features some neatly moulded detail on the body and underframe. Separate handbrake levers and brake gear are joined by neatly modelled tapered buffers with turned metal heads.

The arrangements of the brake gear is not entirely accurate as the prototypes had Morton brakes with two shoes on one side only, rather than two on both sides as modelled. Our sample carries the LNER's simple



mid-grey livery with white 'NE' lettering and numbers. It's perhaps a fraction too light, but most impressive element of the decoration is the worksplate on the solebar which is fully legible. A BR unfitted grey version is also available and should prove popular.

Sharing many of the six-plank's 9ft wheelbase underframe components is an early version of the LNER's standard Diagram 39 'Large' 10t cattle wagon of the late-1920s. By the 1930s 10ft underframes were the norm and the 9ft versions were withdrawn before 1948 due to stability issues.

A 10ft version would allow BR-liveried versions to be produced legitimately but would have required additional new tooling. In the circumstances, this should be an acceptable compromise for most buyers. Presented in LNER bauxite, the model features neat



printing in white on a matt base and a white roof. Again, strapping detail and rivet heads are crisply moulded and the body features ventilation gaps between the lower planks. There are no partitions inside the van, but these could be added along with a few cattle to complete the wagon if required. Although the basic underframe is the same as the six-plank, the cattle van features a different style of brake gear and more intricate detail appropriate to this prototype, although the vacuum cylinder has been omitted. Sadly, it's not entirely perfect in terms of body detail either, with the two sides being identical rather than handed, mirror images of each other. Despite these reservations, we're now well served for cattle wagons in OO with Dapol, Bachmann and Hornby providing examples from the other 'Big Four' companies.

All three wagons feature pin-point metal axles and metal tyres with split-spoke wheel centres and detachable couplings in NEM pockets. As with other Oxford models, the couplings are longer than necessary, pushing the wagons some distance apart when marshalled in a train. Unless your curves are especially tight, shorter couplings will help to improve the effect.

Oxford's *modus operandi* is to supply a steady flow of attractive RTR wagons at reasonable prices and these three fulfil that brief well. Pre-Nationalisation wagon experts may demand more attention to detail, but for most modellers they will be a cost effective and quick way to assemble attractive looking goods trains. ■



## ACCUCRAFT ISLE OF MAN 2-4-0T



Accucraft has been happy for the last few years to fulfil the needs of Manx fans who model in larger scales.

Beyer, Peacock 2-4-0Ts and the Dübs-built 0-6-0T *Caledonia* have appeared every two to three years. All are produced in limited runs and buyers now pay attention to news from the company to ensure they secure these sought-after models. The latest IoM locomotive to arrive is of the largest Manx 'Peacock', No. 16 *Mannin*.

No. 16 was by far the most powerful 2-4-0T on the island, employed on the heavy Port Erin boat train, a job which had previously taken two locomotives either double-headed or banked.

Built in 1926 by Beyer, Peacock & Co. in Manchester (Works No. 6296) it was delivered on March 17 of that year, the last locomotive to be supplied to the Isle of Man. In 1975, it entered the Port Erin Steam Museum, where it resides to this day.

At first glance, this is an impressive model. At 36cm long and nearly 11cm wide it has real presence and not a little weight. Checking details against those published David Lloyd-Jones' book *The Manx Peacocks* shows that it scales out perfectly at 15mm:1ft. The bodywork is made from stainless steel with cast details and brass dome for the owner to polish. Copper pipework really is copper and slightly wobbly as on the prototypes.

There's certainly a wealth of detail, especially under the footplate. While this is taken for granted in smaller scales, garden locomotives are often simplified in this area as they can come across all sorts of unexpected obstacles when running outdoors. A nice touch is the operating lubricator driven via a linkage from the front axle.

Paint finish is excellent with neat lining and an overall satin finish. Indian red seemed to vary considerably on the real locomotives, I'd suggest the real thing is slightly redder but it's been sat in the museum for years and we can't be certain how accurate the paint mix was during its cosmetic restoration.

There are a couple of niggles; for a start, the cab windows are unglazed. This is probably because the live steam version doesn't require it but for the price, some glass in the windows might be expected.

Looking at the chimney there is an anomaly; Manx locomotives carried their number on their in brass numerals. Previous models in the range have been so fitted but not here. I'm assuming that the livery is taken from the prototype in Port Erin Museum which is without numbers.

Every photograph from No. 16's operational career shows them proudly in place.

A 2-4-0 chassis can be challenging in model terms. The long pony truck requires some of the locomotive's

weight to be carried for the correct balance. On this model there is a large sprung plunger sticking up from above the centre of the axle and bearing on the underside of the chassis.

All six wheels pick up electricity from the track and feed a 24V DC Pitman motor in the boiler. Running is steady and smooth when powered by an LGB controller. DCC can be fitted but the modeller will have to hard-wire the decoder. Another bonus is that the smokebox door opens to provide access to the boiler space.

The model will look superb on display, or operate on track with curves of at least one metre radius. Some will query the choice of electric power. If you prefer your locomotives to be powered by live steam, it is available for £225 more.

The model is pricey but you're paying for a limited run of a detailed, hand-assembled model which has an indefinable quality feel. Ownership is a pleasure. ■



# KETTLE PARK

**John Creek** recaptures the atmosphere of a bustling Motive Power Depot (MPD) on the Eastern Region, with a good selection of locomotives.

Little Park Motive Power Depot was built by John Creek from a desire to have a layout to display and run his collection of kit-built and modified RTR locomotives. It was to be of exhibition standard to use as an alternative to his other layout.

The original plan was to build a locomotive depot and carriage sidings, but that was rejected as being too big, 12ft maximum being the requirement of his club's exhibition manager. 'Kettle Park' has two 5ft by 3ft boards screwed and glued to a frame of 2in by  $\frac{1}{2}$ in marine ply, diagonally braced. It gives good rigidity and reduces warping.

The track is Peco Flexitrac with insulated frog points to reduce the number of isolating sections. The layout is divided into three areas, each controlled by a Gaugemaster controller and requires two operators. The fiddleyard is double track and can hold up to ten locomotives, the shed area a maximum of 20 locomotives, with the coaling plant, turntable and wagon repair facility operated separately.

The shed building is based on Scunthorpe's Frodingham depot (36C) using modeller's licence to condense its dimensions. It had five roads with offices and workshops down one side. The model is built using plywood sides to keep it rigid, covered with plain plastic card. The remainder is made from Plastruct plastic sections and weathered. Reference was made to the book *The Illustrated History of Scunthorpe's Railways* by Brian Longbone. Inspection pits are by Peco.

When first built, an area in the middle of the layout was bare, but a magazine article on Boston Docks gave John an idea. Photographed was a small brick office block which was obviously a booking-on, tally clerks' and shunters' building. It was roughly scaled using door gaps, brick courses and window size estimates to reproduce a miniature replica.

The scale 70ft turntable is by Peco and is hand-cranked. He tried numerous options to power it, but could never get it to run smoothly, so resorted to a Meccano worm and gear mechanism. ■



# WARMLEY

**Neil Burgess** relives childhood days spent at Warmley, on the Midland's route to Bath, with his OO gauge layout.

There's more to railways than locomotives, even if that's often the way we get interested and some of us get round to modelling them. 'Warmley' is an attempt to capture that reality. It is a model of a real station, on the Midland Railway's 1869 Bath Extension, which provided the connection between the Bristol-Birmingham line and the Somerset & Dorset Joint Railway.

Neil knew the station as a child, travelling from there on family shopping trips to Bath or later on, train spotting excursions to Mangotsfield and Bristol Temple Meads. The line closed to passengers in March 1966, along with the Somerset & Dorset, but freight lingered on until North Sea gas put paid to Bath gasworks and its need for coal.

Making a model of a real location can be a bit fraught and involve all sorts of compromises. 'Warmley' is no exception and the main one, apart from the inevitable reduction in length, is that the running lines curve the wrong way through the station; the goods yard should be inside the curve, not outside. The layout is viewed from more than 4ft above floor level, making the discrepancy less noticeable.

The layout structure is from 6mm ply, with 'Barry Norman' sandwich girders with ply skins and 2in by 1in blocks of wood to separate them. Track is SMP with points and crossings from bullhead rail soldered to Paxolin sleepers. Power comes from two AMR hand-held units which have stood the test of time. Two GWR block bells are rigged up, obtained from the Signal & Telegraph stores at Dr Day's Road Junction in Bristol many years ago. Landscape is made from expanded polystyrene, shaped with a bread knife and covered with Mod-Roc plaster bandage, then painted with acrylics. ■



### PROS

- Curved platform adds interest on a tail-chaser layout



# TYNEHAM REGIS

**Mike Paginton's** recreation of a fictional classic Great Western branchline terminus by the sea captures the essence of a typical Dorset station.

his layout was envisaged and built primarily for exhibition use and is based on a 'Great Western in Dorset' theme. Although the location is fictional, there is a Tyneham village nestling in the Purbeck Hills, though sadly uninhabited since the Second World War when it was requisitioned for military target practice.

The builders tried to create a variation on the standard GWR branch with an 'L'-shaped configuration, measuring 15ft by 9ft 6in, thus trying to convey a feeling of spaciousness compared to the sometimes fairly cramped track layouts seen on branch termini. This length of run from hidden fiddleyard to Tyneham Regis, with a connecting service back via the junction to the small terminus at Beer, combined with slow running, doubles the length of time trains are on view.

The Phoenix Brewery boasts its own motive power in the form of a modified Hornby 0-4-0T named *Titan*. A separate controller operates the brewery yard, the supplies and empties in sheeted open wagons arriving from Tyneham, the barrels going to the unloading bay at the far end of the yard hidden by a corrugated lean-to. After loading at the other end of the building, the vans are moved by *Titan* and propelled onto the weighbridge before, after a suitable pause, they are collected and positioned at the gated entrance for the pick-up goods to collect.

Tyneham Regis station has a main platform with run round and a bay for the secondary branch to Beer. A small goods yard with coal merchants hut and single road loco shed with the usual coal and water supplies complete the scene.

The familiar GW branch line power and rolling stock are to be seen, the Beer branch train invariably uses a '48XX' 0-4-2T with umbilically connected auto trailer, although occasionally a diesel railcar puts in an appearance. An assorted take of Ratio four-wheelers is usually hauled by a Pannier Tank and excursions are found to run a 'Castle' on a brewery workers outing special, or holiday excursions. The layout isn't run to a timetable - trains have nowhere to go, so must always come back. ■

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

# TAIL LAMP

BRM's 'Industry Insider' welcomes the attention given to our hobby by recent television programmes.



Many years ago, in my youth, an elderly aunt left me a reasonable amount of money. I really wanted to replace the old car that I was driving at the time, but my thoughts turned to buying a state-of-the-art Hi-Fi system (remember them?). Once the money came through I trotted off to the local Hi-Fi specialist convinced that I'd walk out with a music system that would be the envy of all my friends.

When I entered the shop I was approached by an assistant who I suspect regarded me as a timewaster. Nonetheless, I explained that although I knew nothing about top quality Hi-Fi equipment, if he could give me the benefit of his advice I would be able to make an informed judgment before buying.

Sadly he did not make a sale, as his attitude towards me was one of total disdain and arrogance. His underlying approach was one of; 'If you don't know what you want then why should I try and educate you?'

He believed that because he knew more than I did he was somehow superior and that before I could even think about obtaining a top line system I should be aware of my basic requirements. Needless to say I walked out and spent my inheritance on a holiday, girls and everything that went with those two activities. The rest of the money, to misquote George Best, I frittered away.

I have never forgotten my experience in that shop and have always, when approached by any one remotely interested in model railways, spent time talking to them about the many aspects of the hobby and why I find it so interesting. Not all rush off to their local model shops to immerse themselves in all things railways, but over the years there have been a few who have found immense pleasure in the hobby. Others either continue with a mild interest in my latest project or write me off as a lost cause! Whatever the case I think no less of them, be they modellers or not.

Over the last few years I have noticed that there has been

a gradual increase in programmes associated with railways, especially from the BBC, either from an historical position or factual documentaries such as Michael Portillo's journeys guided by an old copy of Bradshaw's.

Most recently, the BBC commissioned three one-hour programmes entitled *Trainspotting Live*. Personally I regarded this as a brave move. Trains, especially those running at night do not always run on time, a fact that was borne out more than once over the three evenings.

The presenters, whose job it was to knit everything together were faced with an almost impossible task. With the events being broadcast live there was no chance of a 'Take 2' and anyone who has been asked to ad lib on occasions would have sympathised with their plight, but unfortunately there were many who didn't.

The whole point of the programmes, as well as others involving the UK's railways, is that they have to appeal to the broadest possible audience. Whether we like it or not, railways are not as popular as football or even fishing, therefore the canvas that the TV producers have to paint on has to be very broad and general. Such generalities can result in a distortion of facts or mild inaccuracies, perhaps even more serious ones. However, the vast majority of people watching are not railway buffs, but casual watchers who might just be inspired to take their passing interest a little further by such programmes.

My message to those who criticise the presenters of these programmes when they don't quite get the terminology right or feel offended by the simplistic approach is remember that we are a minority pursuit. The programmes are aimed at a general populace who are sympathetic enough to take an interest but are without the benefit of our knowledge. And don't forget, even we started out knowing nothing. ■


