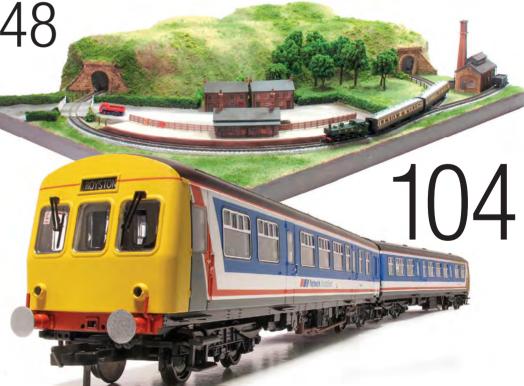














# WHAT'S ON THE DVD

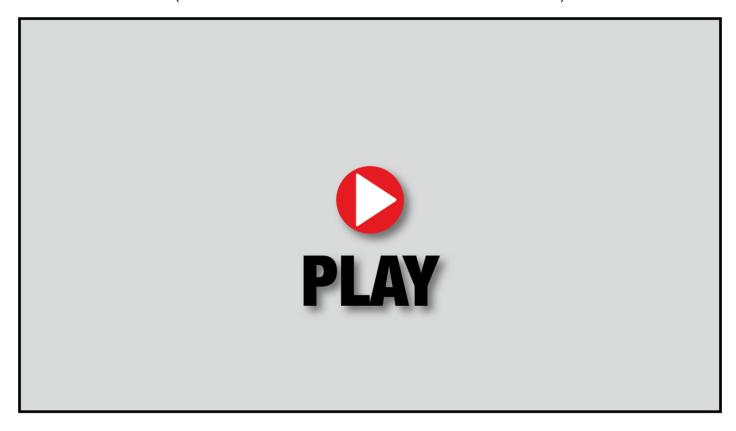
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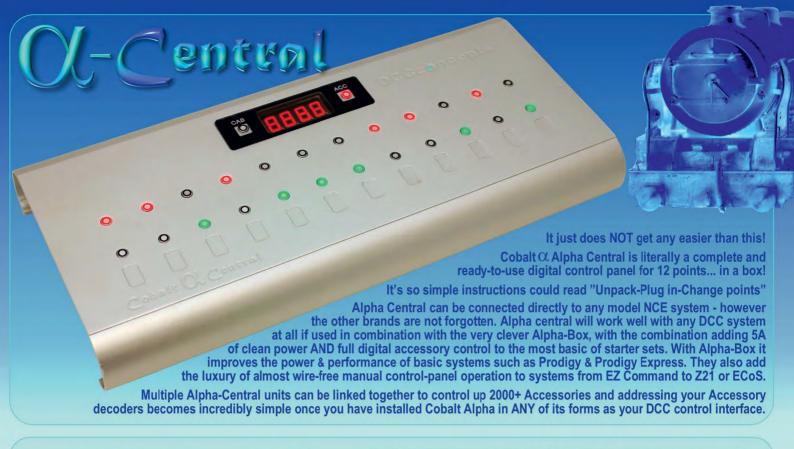

When we're putting BRM together each month we have to maintain a delicate balance between so many competing - and often contradictory - interests. It's not just the various gauges and scales; for each one of those we have to try and cater for many different periods within the more general 'steam' and 'modern image' umbrellas, regional and geographical interests, analogue and DCC, weathering, detailing, kit-building, locomotives, wagons and coaching stock, scenery, electrics/electronics, buildings and countless other subjects that come together in this wonderful hobby.

Don't think I'm complaining; all those interests give us a bottomless pool of material and inspiration from which to draw ideas. However, keeping the balance right can feel like trying to assemble a dynamic, multi-dimensional jigsaw puzzle every four weeks! In many ways, manufacturers such as Hornby and Bachmann have the same problem; their customers are passionate, knowledgeable and vocal about what they want. I'm often asked why 'x' doesn't produce more diesel and electric locomotives, or why 'z' makes so many editions of one particular subject but apparently ignores other versions.

A good example involves diesel and electric era modellers, who often find it difficult to comprehend why manufacturers still give priority to steam era subjects, almost 50 years after the end of BR steam. While there's some evidence of growth in post-1968 modelling, shops and suppliers will tell you that the sales figures speak for themselves. Even where the likes of Hornby produce a gem such as the Class 60, it's more than likely that it will be outsold by the most mundane of 'kettles' (their word, not mine!). In truth, that's why we're getting ever-more esoteric steam locomotives, but comparatively few post-steam types. While D&E modellers are fully committed and willing to spend good money if something is 'right', evidence would suggest they are relatively few compared to their steam era brethren.

That said, I was delighted to see Oxford Rail's new Mk 3s for the first time recently (below). Forty years on from their introduction, it looks as though we might finally get a model that does justice to the pinnacle of BR coach design. With a decent price, it should sell well and encourage Oxford to consider more post-steam projects.

So, next time a new announcement or magazine doesn't precisely match your requirements, take a moment to consider the enormous diversity of our hobby and how you might walk that tightrope.

t all started from an off-the-cuff response to a question from a member of the public at an exhibition. When looking at two 'Lowmac' wagons, loaded with military vehicles, sitting in 'Whitchurch

Canonicorum' yard, he asked "What are they doing there?" My answer was: "Oh, they're waiting to be tripped to

the MoD depot just down the line."

That was it, the seed had been sown and 'Dovington Camp' was born.

Why 'Dovington Camp'? The name is an amalgam of Bovington Camp, the Dorset home of the Tank Museum, and Donnington, the Shropshire MoD depot. The idea was to have both a name and a layout design that was deliberately vague in terms of its location. This would allow a variety of stock to be run and, given the fact that military buildings don't alter much over time, even different periods of operation. Indeed, 'Dovington Camp' started life as a 1960s shunting layout.

#### **LAYOUT DESIGN**

Our first outing was as a 6ft by 2ft layout building demonstration at the 2003 Nailsea & District MRC exhibition. In this form it was, in effect, a shunting plank, with trains being formed and then broken back down into the depot.

MoD depots are renowned for their tight curves - hence the survival of VEA short wheelbase vans into the 1990s - it was possible to squeeze the proverbial quart into a pint pot through the use of Peco Code 75 short radius and three-way electrofrog points and crossings. The result was a lot of trackwork in a small space, with overlapping sidings and a less than obvious run-round facility. The headshunt was designed to allow a shunter and either four 10ft vans or two VGAs, although longer rakes can be handled with some nifty shunting manoeuvres.

Over time a fiddleyard was added, which includes a cassette shelf, allowing a much wider selection of trains to be operated. This is hidden behind the barrack block and parade ground. I like to have an area without tracks, to give context and appeal to visitors who are not as interested in the trains. The 'river board' allowed connection with my other layouts.

After working more closely with my good friend John Anderson on his layouts, the decision was taken to concentrate efforts on what is my favourite era of operations - the colourful years between the creation of Network SouthEast in 1986 and the start of privatisation in 1994.

Today, the layout is 17ft by 2ft 6in and operates with 10-12 trains, which vary according to the region of operations. The chosen year is 1990, in the build up to

#### **LIGHTWEIGHT** CONSTRUCTION

The layout is built on a 6mm ply framework with 9mm ply ends. This is quite lightweight but has stood the test of time. As previously mentioned, trackwork is Peco Code 75, with the main line ballasted using Greenscene fine ballast and the MoD sidings using a mixture of powders to represent the lighter ash ballast often found in such locations.

The inlaid trackwork was created using scrap N gauge rail tacked to copper-clad sleepers, inserted at 6in

intervals between the Peco webbing, using a track gauge to create an inside running rail/check rail. The road surface was created using cork tiles to the sleeper edge. The gaps between tile and rail between the rails were filled with ready-made filler. A piece of plastic card, shaped to 1mm below rail height, was used to create a smooth surface by rubbing it along the rails. This was much more reliable than some other methods I have experienced.

Operation is via traditional DC cab control with two Gaugemaster hand-held controllers. Points are operated using single-pole-double-throw (SPDT) toggle switches and SEEP point motors with built in switching.



#### I about the author

Paul Taylor, 51, from Clevedon, North Somerset. Married with two grown-up daughters. For the last nine years I have worked as an internal auditor in the energy industry, spending lots of time away from home and having to fit modelling around family life. My first train set was given to me at the age of two and my first layout was on the floor of an attic room. After the usual break for courting and getting married, which luckily didn't seem to take too long, I started my first proper layout after moving to Exeter in 1987. With space an issue, 'Penwick TMD' - a 6ft by 2ft N gauge depot and yard - was created to live on top of the bedroom wardrobes. It was soon doing the rounds on the exhibition circuit. Following a move to Clevedon in 1995, 'Whitchurch Canonicorum', a 11ft by 2ft 1960s BR(W) layout in OO gauge followed and developed over the years through many incarnations. 'Dovington Camp' was a part of that story.

# II ask the expert

One of the most eye-catching features of the layout is your collection of British Army vehicles. Where did you find them and are they widely available?

We are often asked about the source of the various Amilitary vehicles to be found across the depot. The standard Bedford MK lorries and Land Rovers are from the JB Models (now Airfix) range, as are the 105mm Field Guns seen as loads in OCA open wagons. The 'Warflats' are waiting to offload a variety of Combat Vehicle Reconnaissance (Tracked) (CVR(T)) vehicles including Scorpion/Scimitar reconnaissance vehicles (Airfix), Spartan Armoured Personnel Carriers (APCs) and Sultan command vehicles. The latter, together with one Warrior APC, an FV432 APC and Ferret armoured cars are all from Cromwell Models' 'Combat Ready' range of simple resin kits. For example, the Warrior is a five-piece kit (hull, two track units, turret & barrel) with bags of detail moulded in that just needs to be brought to life with a paintbrush. Also to be seen



are two Revell Warriors, a Forces of Valor Challenger battle tank and various items from BW Models (whitemetal kits, whilst the engineers' earthmovers are repainted Wiking models.

# TRACKPLAN DOVINGTON CAMP

#### **MILITARY BUILDINGS**

As you will appreciate, getting access to MoD premises for research hasn't been possible and I am much indebted to three main sources of inspiration. Firstly, three excellent Telerail videos of the Bicester, Longtown and Chilmark/Marchwood military railways and secondly, the books The Bicester Military Railway and The Army's Central Railway Workshops (Lawton & Sackett). Finally, I am grateful to Paul Gandy of PG Models, for a selection of images of MoD buildings.

The buildings are, in the main, scratchbuilt using plain and embossed plastic card, but based on real buildings. The fuel tanks are from Ludgershall in Hampshire, the old locomotive shed from Bicester, the flat-roofed stores from the old Second World War Ministry of Supply (MoS) buildings at Norton Fitzwarren in Somerset and the 'open' shed from Ashchurch. The vehicle repair facility is a Faller military kit, built pretty much as intended.

The barrack block started life as a Heljan cruciform US Court House kit. However, I tend to think of these Each grid square represents 1 foot

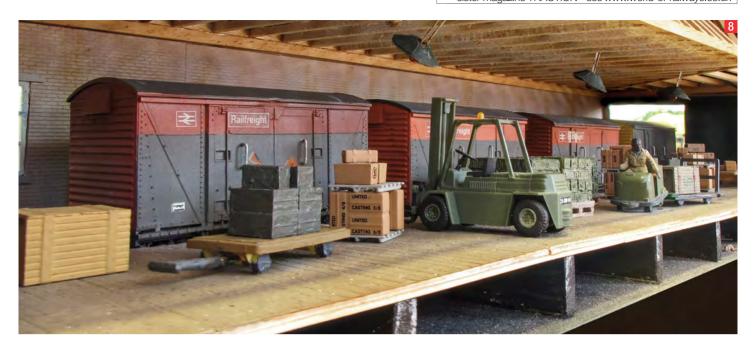

kits as 'a box of useful mouldings' and put them together in ways that were never intended to create something more in line with my requirements - in this case a 2ft 6in low-relief building based on the Territorial Army centre in Bristol.

To add interest, the design includes a shed at the front of the layout where the 'internals' are open to the public to view, something a little different to the norm. It also gives context and purpose to the building and the layout as a whole. I well remember many quizzical looks whilst gluing the roof trusses together from balsa strip! Whilst it was tedious at the time, the overall impression was well worth it. Alongside the shed is an office building with meeting room, office and toilets, all visible to viewers.

#### **ROYAL VISIT**

Having arrived in the Queen's Flight helicopter (a converted Revell Westland Wessex), Her Majesty and Prince Phillip (Preiser figures) are presenting new Regimental Colours. On parade are Airfix bandsmen and Colour Party figures. Being made from the old 1960s polyurethane, they do not take paint well. The solution is an undercoat of Halfords grey primer as a base for Humbrol acrylics.

The soldiers have all had their 1960s Lee Enfield rifles replaced with more appropriate SLRs. Uniforms are generic so that they can represent regiments linked to the area of operation, for example the Scots Guards when we're operating Scottish Region stock.

Another cameo which receives many comments is the archaeological dig, where Channel 4's Time Team is being filmed as they uncover a Roman Villa, with baths and a tessellated pavement (mosaic). As a long-time fan of the programme, I wanted to include a dig as an unusual cameo.

Fans of the programme will recognise many of the early 'cast', gathered round a finds table doing a piece to camera, including Tony Robinson, Carenza Lewis, Robin Bush, Phil Harding and, of course, Mick Aston and his stripy jumper! Elsewhere, Victor is creating a painting of what the villa would have been like circa 240 AD. In true Time Team style, the figures arrived from another dig on my previous layout, 'Whitchurch Canonicorum'. Roman remains were fabricated from DAS clay and statuary finds from various Preiser figures. The mosaic is based loosely on one in Dorchester Museum.

## II ask the expert

The layout is packed with interesting details and cameo scenes - what's your philosophy for keeping exhibition visitors entertained?



John and I have a strong ethos regarding exhibition Alayouts - they should entertain on a number of levels. Firstly, there should be enough content to hold the eye before a single train is placed on the layout. This will ensure that those members of the public without a particular interest in railways will have something to study and keep them amused. Indeed, the use of 'Can you find...?' sheets on the layout will keep both children and parents entertained and get them looking in more detail at the model, especially if there are some more amusing or topical items for them to spot - can you find the rat?

Secondly, once the trains are added, without moving they should hold the eye of the enthusiast or modeller. These should include detailed and different items, improved RTR models, kits or scratchbuilt stock that is more unusual but realistic in both delivery and context. This is John's forte.

Finally, operation should be realistic in terms of rakes, formations and, ideally, not catch the eye for the way in which trains are operated - it should look natural.

Yes, we take it seriously but not too seriously - after all is said and done, it should also entertain us as we play trains for a weekend!

I like to have an area without tracks, to give context and appeal to visitors who aren't as interested in the trains. The 'river board' allowed connection with my other layouts.

#### **FREIGHT** SERVICES

Trains fall into two categories; MoD traffic exchanged at the depot gates and those serving other facilities on 'the branch' which utilise the run-round facility outside the depot.

MoD traffic is handled by specific Speedlink trains, usually hauled by appropriate Railfreight Distribution sector Class 37s and 47s. Wagons include the full range of BR air-braked vans (VAA-VGA), OCA opens, 'Warflats' and 'Warwells', as well as some containerised traffic, which will be correctly paired with barrier wagons as required. Occasionally, Army internal vehicles are transported between depots and some more unusual items are seen, such as the MoD flask carriers for 'safe storage'.

Three MoD shunters are available to work the depot. These are a Ruston 0-6-0 - a modified Silver Fox Class 07 kit on a Bachmann chassis; a repainted Hornby Sentinel 4w diesel and a small 0-4-0DM from a Knightwing kit on a Tenshodo SPUD motor bogie. All are based on photographs of MoD shunters in books.

Other traffic depends on which area of the country is being portrayed on that day's operations but we will always try to represent actual or potential traffic flows for that area. The photographs depict a West Country operation, with flows that would have been seen in Devon at that time. All are powered by an appropriate locomotive.

John is the expert when it comes to detailing and converting locomotives and rolling stock, so the majority of items are super-detailed and weathered to a very high standard and I must thank him for making them available to run on 'Dovington Camp'.

It is this partnership approach that has enabled us to keep redeveloping the layout and keeping it fresh. We each have our preferred topics when it comes to modelling, and thankfully these are complementary. We have several layouts out on the circuit, plus replacements in production.

Finally, I must thank those that have helped and inspired me. John is always pushing me forward and helping me to develop my skills. Thanks should also go to Ellis Johns (military vehicles) and other members of Nailsea & District MRC for assisting with operation over the years. Finally, special thanks to my wife, Julie and daughters Cat and Jen for 'the views of the general public' and for putting up with my mess, even when I left the dining room table looking like it had lost an argument with an angry tiger!

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# SOUTHERN SCENE

'Capel Hill' is my second layout and is a 'what if' design depicting a small Southern Region station and aerodrome. I've made it an imaginary branch line between Folkestone and Canterbury near Capel-le-Ferne, hence the name Capel Hill. It is set around 1956 in the BR early/late crossover period.

The buildings, such as the common wooden panel SR station



building, the road bridge and aerodrome are scratchbuilt. Some of the other buildings, such as the station are from Metcalfe, but have been heavily modified for realism. The layout measures 4ft by 2ft with a small L-shaped extension to facilitate the aerodrome and control is by DC analogue.

I have built a second 4ft by 2ft section as a fiddleyard and the two sections are separated by a scenic break. To use the fiddleyard to its maximum potential I have now started building a small SR London terminus, set in the 1980s with BR blue '4-CEP' and '2-EPB' stock as this is how I remember it. Now with two layouts, each can act as a fiddleyard for the other.

Despite having a fair amount of SR models, over time I've picked up other bargains that are not SR,



but I can get round this by using the older layout as a preserved line, by placing more modern vehicles on it. My plans for the future are to electrify turnouts and potentially go digital!

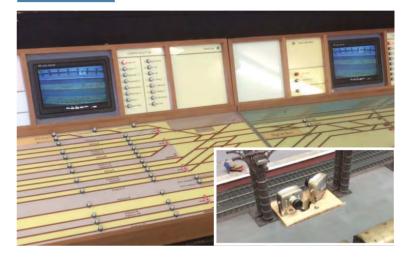

I need to find a suitable set up that will provide visual confirmation that the tracks on an O gauge turntable - 6ft from a baseboard edge - are correctly aligned. Specifically, I would think, a ceiling mounted camera and a small separate stand-alone monitor. The distance between camera and turntable is around three feet for focussing.

My turntable is powered by stepper motor technology, which unfortunately isn't reliable, hence the need for a visual confirmation.

I am sure that some of the excellent layouts that you have featured over the years have made use of remote camera systems, so any help towards identifying reasonably priced makes and especially stockists or showrooms would be most welcome.

There are many camera systems A on the market for your needs, each offering different advantages or potential problems. We approached John Holden of 'Liverpool Lime Street' with your question to discover

more about the system used by its operators on this exhibition layout. He writes

Hello Peter. There are a number of small cameras and monitors available on the internet via eBay, usually sourced from China. They are modestly priced and perfectly adequate for our purpose in model railways. The focal length of these cameras is such that they can be mounted quite close to your turntable, so are suitable for your requirement.

The monitors and cameras are easily interconnected using the standard yellow 'video output' plug on the camera to connect to a 'video input' socket on a cord supplied with the monitor. If the leads provided aren't long enough then extension leads can be made or bought from electronic suppliers.

To power the camera and monitor you'll need a suitable 12V DC power supply. For more information on the system we use on Lime Street or to see the cameras and monitors we use, visit our blog on RMweb.

I'm struggling to connect the three-link couplings on my rolling stock as my eyesight and dexterity isn't what it was. I'm looking for a suitable replacement that's simple to use for my O gauge stock in the garden - what can you recommend?

Your timing is impeccable as a potential solution has landed on my desk from M&M Models & Dorset Kits - the MagClic. Priced at £7.50 per set, this new solution replaces the traditional drawbar and hook with three-links for a chemically-blackened sprung drawbar with magnets fitted to the ends. The magnets can take up to 0.5kg of weight on the drawbar, making them easily capable of hauling up to six heavy brass coaches up respectable gradients if required.

Their main advantage is that they are unobtrusive - beneath corridor connections on coaches they are almost completely hidden. They fit easily to rolling stock, being a direct replacement for traditional couplings - no additional bars, hooks, hoops or other devices are required to fit between buffers or modified bufferbeams. 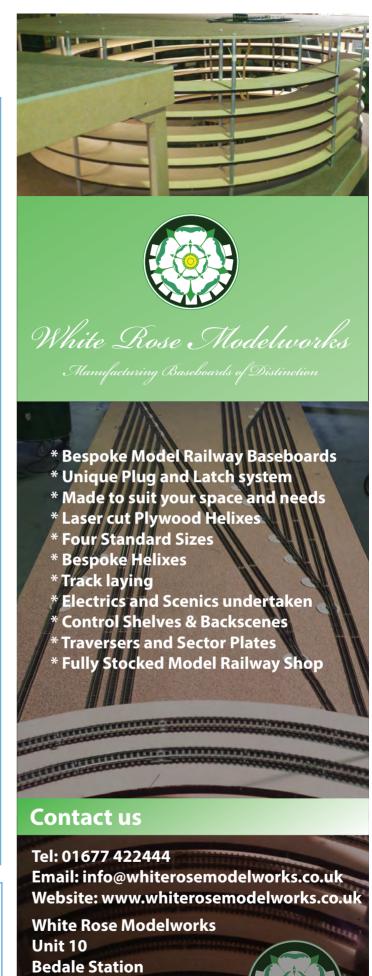

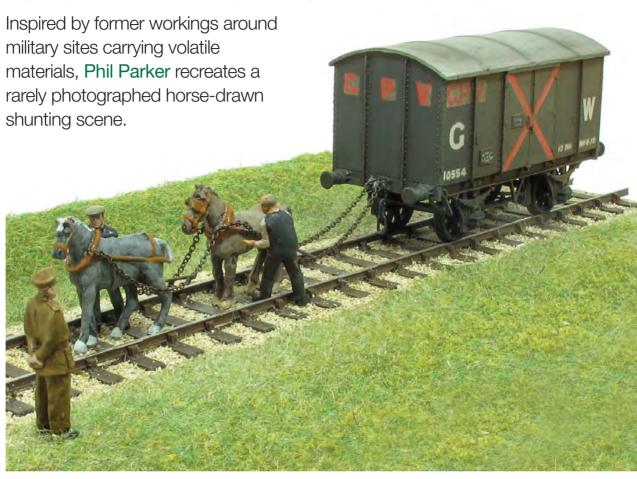

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#### **EILEEN'S EMPORIUM**

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f there is one thing you really don't want around explosive materials, it's sparks. That rules steam locomotives out of shunting vehicle such as gunpowder vans (GPVs). On page 60, Ben Jones describes the rules and regulations associated with moving vans with explosive potential, the main one being the need for a barrier wagon to separate motive power from dangerous vehicles. The safest method of propulsion and one that was particularly popular in military depots was the horse.

Horses were the first means of moving vehicles on the very first railways. A man can move a single vehicle with a pinch bar, but horses working either singly or in pairs could easily haul several wagons at a time. The ubiquitous British 16 ton mineral wagon is the size it is because that's the maximum weight

a single animal can move on level track. Locomotives ousted equine haulage on the mian line in the 19th century, but the last BR shunting horse wasn't retired until 1967. Even the busy Paddington yard was horse powered for years after the First World War.

While not emitting anything likely to set off explosives, horse power wasn't without its dangers. The animals couldn't be shod with iron shoes for fear of sparks being struck on the rails or stone. Instead, they'd operate without shoes having builtup hardness in their hooves. Sidings were ballasted with fine material as granite was too sharp for hooves.

Elsewhere on the network, many private sidings were shunted by horse. If you need to infrequently move a wagon 500 yards, hiring a locomotive with crew could cost £30 a day. Horses were readily available

for hauling loads on the road, so could easily be pressed into railway service, thus saving money.

Modelling horse traction is difficult. Miniature working animals are notable by their absence so a static diorama is the best option. Here, I'm assuming that our GPV a GWR 10t 'Iron Mink', loaded with explosives, is approaching a military depot. An officer monitors its arrival as the shunter controls the horses. I'm assuming it's well loaded - hence a pair of horses.

On a working layout, horses waiting for work and standing in the yard would make an eye-catching scene. You could model them being fed with one of their four meals a day - 6.30am, 9am, noon and in the evening. Railway horses were well looked-after with shiny coats and clean harnesses, so refrain from weathering here.

Horse traction is sometimes demonstrated An hertitage railways, but only on special enthusiast weekends.

The best place to see it in action on a more regular basis is along the seafront at Douglas on the Isle of Man. Its 140 year old tramway is still horse-powered. Earlier this year it was threatened with closure, but has gained a stay of execution for another year. See its website for more details. Wwww.douglashorsetramway.net





Sidings are generally laid using older track unsuitable for main line use, but I'm using DCCconcepts new bullhead 00 gauge track, held with double sided carpet tape.



Flexibility is great when laying track on a layout but here it's a nuisance. Drops of superglue in the rail chairs at each end stop the rails from sliding.



Lifecolor's Sleeper Grime is sprayed over the track, followed by a wash of Frame Dirt. Finally, Cold Light Shade is dry-brushed over the sleepers.



Before the paint hardens, a lollipop stick is rubbed along the rail tops to clean them. It's much easier to clean them at this stage!



A small diorama benefits from ground contour using wall filler, painted with earth colour emulsion paint. Once dry, electrostatic grass is applied.



Chinchilla sand from a pet shop, mixed with Deluxe Materials Ballast Magic represents finer ballast used on horse-shunted sidings.



On the Parkside GWR Z2 GPV kit, work starts by fitting the bearings. A drop of liquid glue in the holes softens the plastic allowing the brass bearing to be inserted.



With both solebars fitted, place the model on a mirror to check the chassis alignment. Gently twist the chassis accordingly until you're happy.



Before starting the body assembly, smooth the moulding pips from the back of each bufferbeam or they won't sit against the under-floor strengthening girders.

# PRACTICAL BRM I MODEL DIORAMA I OO Gauge



Fit the ends and sides paying particular attention to the fit of the corners. A dry test fit isn't a bad idea. When happy, run liquid glue down the inside of each joint.



Plastic rod is supplied for cross-shafts but it's fiddly to cut. Drilling each part with a 0.45mm bit held in a pin vice and using straight brass wire is much easier.



The roof is supplied plain and needs three lengths of the supplied plastic strip fitted across it. Cut each over-length, and fix with liquid glue.



Two sets of waterslide transfers are required for the model. Microscale Micro Sol is used to soften the carrier film and fit the transfers over the lock.



Brushing dark brown weathering powders vertically down the sides provides enough dirt for a wagon that would have been kept reasonably clean.



Our set of whitemetal figures share much DNA with the old Airfix range, except for a military man from Monty's Models. I used acrylic paints so didn't need a primer.



As with the people, the horses are much easier to handle if their hooves are superglued to a wooden stick. Once finished, the joint is easily and cleanly broken.



Military modellers paint horses with a base colour, then a darker shade which is wiped with a sponge leaving it in the sunken areas where you expect to find shadows.



The harnesses are moulded so chains must be stuck to the outside of these. Superglue is enough, made easier by holding the model horizontally or they fall off.

# ask the expert

How do avoid the silver sheen seen around the edge of my transfers?

When applying waterslide transfers to a model, it's often possible to see the transfer film around the edge of letters. This is called 'ghosting' and is caused by microscopic air bubbles that are trapped under the film.



Avoiding this problem requires a smooth surface. This GWR 'Mink' has been sprayed with a matt enamel for a sheen free finish. This leaves a microscopically rough surface.

The model should be painted gloss before applying the transfers. Afterwards, matt varnishing the completed model will restore its matt appearance.

Unfortunately, a rapidly approaching deadline prevented me doing this when I realised the problem with the red letters.

If silvering occurs, little can be done to save the finish. You'll need to remove the transfers and start again.



Finish with a dry-brush of lighter colour on the flanks and raised areas followed by painting the mane, fetlock and feathers (the fluffy hairs above each hoof).

# I back story: horse shunting



Shunting horses at Woodbridge in the 1950s. Note the use of two horses, with chain attached to the drawhook. Occasionally, this would be attached to the underframe sides. The shunter, seen to the rear, releases the brakes.



Another two horses are seen at Woodbridge in the 1950s. Note the terrain around the track which is much better for the horses' hooves than coarse ballast - it allows the animals to apply more pressure when starting heavy loads, as well as being more stable.



Once the wagons have started moving, the danger isn't over for the horses - they have a plethora of chairs and rails to avoid in crowded track areas such as this point by the goods yard at Woodbridge. The task isn't made easier as both wear 'blinkers', avoiding them from being distracted The foreman watches over the events as two station porters appear from the shed with a trolley.



Believed to be a photograph taken at Stoke Bridge, Ipswich in 1930, a handler in typical Great Eastern Railway attire strikes a pose for camera. The tackle worn by the horse seen left carries a brass GER plate.

# If further reading

The Long Haul, Bryan Holden, ISBN 0-85131-395

Although out of print, this book turns up on secondhand book stands regularly. It covers all forms of horse power from the earliest days of railways until 1967 when the last main line railway owned horse retired. Additionally there is information on animals used in industry such as pit ponies.

The cover painting shows 'Charlie', British Railway's last shunting horse. He and fellow shunters 'Butch' and 'Tommy' worked at Newmarket station moving horseboxes heading off to race meets nationwide as well as a small amount of general goods traffic.

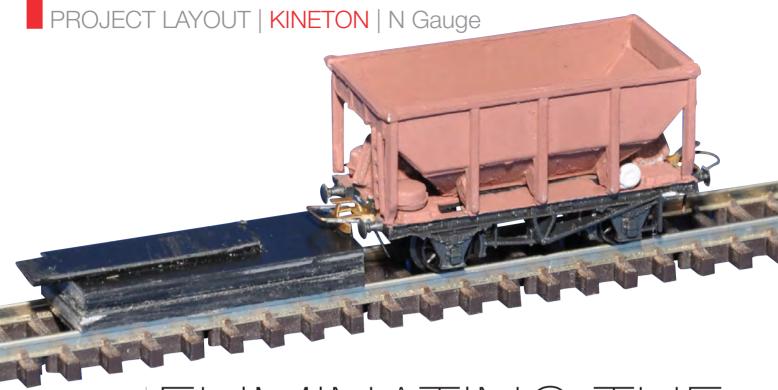
'Charlie' started his life on a farm at Bridgwater before being sold to the railway when six years old. Working initially at Camden Town goods yard, he transferred to Birmingham then Bolton, Bristol, Liverpool and Diss before Newmarket.

He wasn't a large horse at 17 hands (roughly 1.7 metres) tall. Nor was he particularly large at less than 900kg. In comparison, a typical shire horse will be 200kg heavier and at least 10cm taller.

Retiring from BR at the age of 21, his last job was to shunt the horsebox that would take him to his retirement pasture in Somerset on February 21 1967 after 18 years' loyal service. His last days were spent in a paddock shared with two donkeys, several riding ponies and a cow near his birthplace.

# ELIMINATING THE 'HAND OF GOD'

n the first article in this series (**BRM** February 2016), Mike Collins discussed the historical background to the project and identified the standards and objectives the group had set. One of these was being able to shunt wagons in the goods yard without the need for intervention from above - the so-called 'Hand of God'.

When we exhibit our current layout 'Meacham', the most common positive comment made by visitors is that there is always something happening. However 'Kineton' is a much smaller station on what was single

track rural line and so traffic flows will be much lower. Also 'Kineton' is an end -to-end layout with cassette-loaded fiddleyards whereas 'Meacham' is a continuous run that allows trains to be run very quickly one after another. Such rapid running of trains will not be possible or desirable on 'Kineton', if we're trying to operate in a more prototypical manner. Hence the need to have some shunting going on during quiet spells between through trains to keep our viewers entertained.

When 'Meacham' was built it was intended that the sidings would be shunted with the aid of electromagnets and suitable couplings but this was never successfully achieved. In recent years the shunting that has taken

place at exhibitions has required assistance from above. When discussing how we would shunt at 'Kineton' it was felt we should try to use a system that allowed delayed uncoupling as this would allow wagons to be spotted anywhere, not just where the uncoupling mechanism was situated. I was allocated the job of investigating the various coupling systems available that would allow us to do this.

#### **FINER COUPLING**

At several shows I had seen N gauge and 2mm layouts where shunting was undertaken very realistically using DG couplings and electromagnets, without the need for long hooks descending from the sky. DG couplings are quite fine, being fabricated from etched brass kits that may be chemically blackened to produce a unit that is quite unobtrusive compared to the standard N gauge Rapido coupling. However, they looked fiddly to make for someone whose modelling skills were embryonic; therefore the initial experiments were made using Dapol 'Easi-Shunt' couplings purchased by a club member a few months before we started planning 'Kineton'.

'Easi-Shunt' couplings are designed to fit NEM pockets and are made in three lengths. They look similar to Kadee couplings and operate in a similar way. They work with ordinary magnets fitted between the rails, with no electrics required, for their operation. For rolling stock already fitted with NEM pockets, fitting them is simply a case of pulling the Rapido coupling out and pushing in a replacement coupling of the desired length.

Unfortunately, none of the rolling stock we wanted to use had NEM pockets but Dapol does make the 'Easi-Fit' NEM conversion kit. This comprises a conversion block, the NEM pockets and some shims. I set to work on some old wagons, carefully removing the existing coupling housing and filing the base of the chassis to obtain a smooth, flat surface. Using the conversion block I checked the height of the chassis was correct to accept the NEM pocket before gluing them in place. The Easi-Shunt coupling was then a simple push fit.

#### **SHORT** WHEELBASE

In the late steam era, typical goods wagons would have included open planked types, 12t vans and cattle wagons. These all have a short wheelbase and only a short length of underframe extending beyond the axles. Even using the shortest 'Easi-Shunt' couplings, we found that the distance between wagons, when coupled, was unrealistically large and the buckeye design of the coupler did not look right on older vehicles.

It was not possible to set the NEM coupling pockets further back as they interfered with the axles. This was disappointing as the 'Easi-Shunt' system would have been relatively straightforward to fit, especially to newer wagons with NEM pockets and would have avoided the need for more electrical circuits on the layout.

Before taking the plunge and trying to build DG couplings I looked for other systems that might allow delayed uncoupling. MicroTrains (formerly Kadee) makes buckeye type couplings very similar to the Dapol system. B&B and MBD couplings are both very similar to DGs and required assembly.

As I had seen DG couplings used successfully on exhibition layouts but not the others I decided to use

what I knew. An order was placed with Wizard Models for a few pre-assembled DG couplings, a couple of kits and a loop bending jig.

DG couplings are supplied as brass etches which need to be cut from the fret and folded to form a buffing plate, hook and loop brackets. The delay latch is then fitted and bent so that it rests on the hook and when lifted up falls back easily under its own weight. This is tricky at first, but like most tasks of this nature, practice helps!

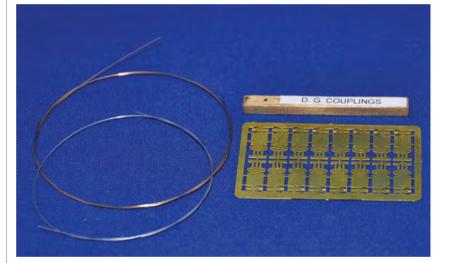
A phosphor bronze wire loop has to be made and I have found the jig produced for this really helps achieve consistency. The next step is to solder a steel dropper wire to the loop.

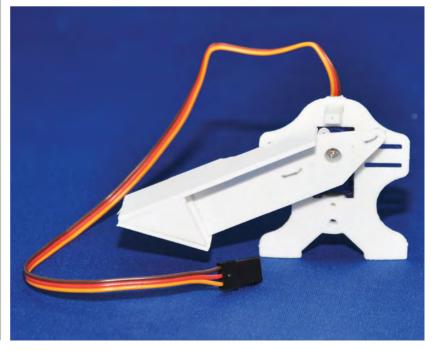
I have seen some DG couplings with a dropper wire soldered to both sides and some with just one. I opted to use just one dropper, 5mm in length, angled back at 45 degrees and in towards the centre line of the coupling. Soldering the dropper to the loop in a consistent manner was difficult until I made a simple wooden jig to hold it at the correct angle and the loop

**BELOW:** A DG Couplings etch with wire for loops.

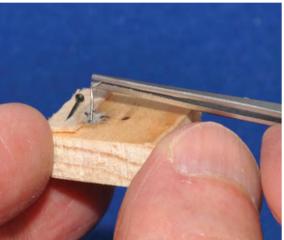
**BOTTOM:** A completed uncoupling actuator.

against it so there was no movement while soldering. The loop is then fitted into the brackets on the base plate. The two ends of the loop are soldered together so they do not pull out in a heavy train. The completed coupling sub-assembly is glued to the wagon using epoxy resin. Instructions are very clear and there are also some helpful posts on the internet. I found a very useful post on RMweb by 'Bryn'. Another post by Guy Hamilton on the 2mm Association Wealden Area Group website shows a method for fitting DG couplings into NEM pockets on locomotives.

Using Guy's method I have successfully fitted a DG coupling (without loop) into the NEM pocket of a Graham Farish Class 08 shunter. His method involves trimming the base plate of the DG coupling to a width that will go into the NEM pocket and soldering a piece of 0.85mm brass wire across it that clips into the NEM pocket. Finally, the coupling is folded to get the buffing plate to the correct height.

It is critical that all couplings are at the same height. A simple gauge was built from styrene sheet that fits between the rails and gives a standard height (4.5mm above the rail head) for the bottom edge of the buffing

To test that the fabricated DG couplings worked, a small Inglenook type test track was built and fitted with a Gaugemaster electromagnet. I was able to demonstrate to the N Gauge group that the system worked and identify couplings that didn't function reliably.

At the Farnham Model Railway Show in 2014, there were several 2mm Finescale Association layouts on display, one of which used rare earth magnets that were moved up under the baseboard when required by a

A prototype actuator was built using a servo mounted on a MERG mount as described in the previous article (BRM September 2016).

The servo 'horn' was replaced by an arm fabricated in styrene with a rare earth magnet bonded to the end. The angle of the magnet relative to arm is set so that, when raised, the magnet lays flat under the track. The movement of the arm, through an angle of about 40 degrees, is actuated by a switch on the control panel and controlled by a MERG servo control board.

When engaged, positional feedback is provided from the servo to an LED flashing indicator on the control panel. This works well and avoids the need to drill a hole in the baseboard for the electromagnet. The delayed uncoupling action of DG couplings means that only six magnets are required to shunt the two goods yards on 'Kineton'. Finally, I'd like to thank Jerry Clifford and his operators on 'Tucking Mill' for their encouragement and advice.

Phil Parker completes the construction of a small N gauge layout designed to fit into an everyday plastic storage box.

ast month, I described how I built an N gauge box layout at The International N Gauge Show (TINGS). The main task was to finish the buildings.

Although I've chosen to build kits, ready-to-use models are available and would speed the process up but at a cost. This is an area where you can trade time for money. I enjoy kit building and it helps to keep the budget low.

I had to scratchbuild the platform to fit the tightly curved Kato track and build a suitable level crossing. Whilst Gaugemaster offers the Kato variant, compatible with its track, it's straight and I need it to fit a curve, so I'm using wood for the

approach ramps and it works well.

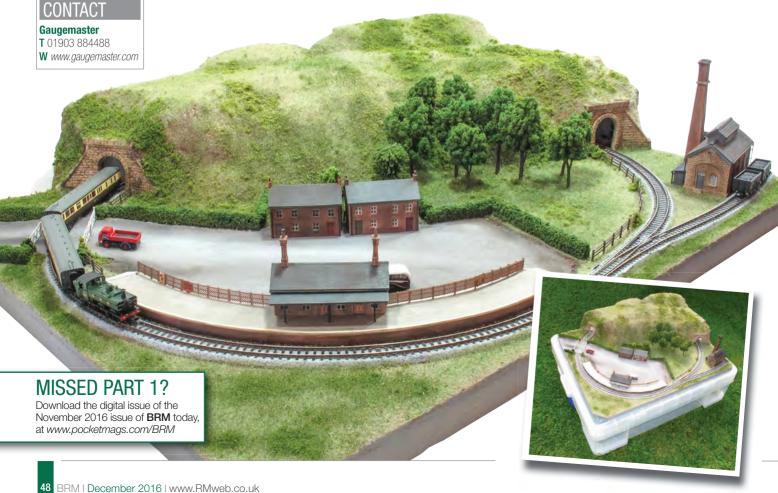
I still needed to find suitable crossing gates and this is where the kit builder wins. There's no rule that you have to use all the parts in a box on a specific model. In this case, I've used parts from a couple of crossing cottage kits. Leftover parts then provide windows and a porch for the station building. Looking in the kit I've used for the factory, there are some useful noticeboards that would look great on the station.

Scenically, the main work has been to fence off the railway where possible. Hedges and wooden fences are required and while these are kits, each has been modified to

fit the scene. Coarse flock powder works wonders at filling gaps or wonky construction and viewers won't notice!

After two days work, I achieved a layout that ran and looked pretty good. Another two days saw the buildings in place and scenery finished to allow paint and glue to dry. The model would benefit from more detail - platform furniture and a few passengers for instance. A few more road vehicles in the station approach would be nice too.

You could have the fun of building this, then pass it to a younger potential modeller as a present they'd have the fun of personalising the model with details.







This is the state of play as we left it at the end of last month's article. Let's focus on adding more scenery and buildings to the layout.



Gaugemaster offers a range of modestly priced building kits in its Kestrel range. Its semi-detached house has crisp mouldings in appropriate coloured plastic.



After assembly, each building is painted with Humbrol pale stone enamel (121), then bricks coloured with pencil crayons. Hard crayons stick to the brick faces better.



The supplied drainpipes are overscale and are more appropriate for 00 gauge. Replacements from 0.9mm thick brass wire look far better.



The finishing touch for brickwork is a dusting with brown weathering powders, working over a plastic tray to collect and re-use spare powder.



Painting the kit windows black, then painting the glazing bars Humbrol 147 (Pale grey) creates a finer effect.
Deluxe Materials Glue'n'Glaze is used to glaze.



The non-platform side of the Kestrel station building is blank. I tacked it into place with superglue so that I could break it away later and rectify this.



Matching windows, doors and a canopy were taken from a Kestrel crossing keepers' cottage kit. Brick Plastic card lintels and Microstrip cills finish the windows.



A set of platform mouldings is included with the station kit. Sadly, they are straight and I need a curve, but I'm sure they'll be of use for a different project one day.



The platform top is marked out on a sheet of mounting card by drawing around the inside of the ballast shoulder on curved track. It took me three attempts to get right.



Strips of mounting card make the sides, which are covered with brick Plastikard. Check for clearances with your longest coaches before gluing into place.



Before gluing the platform into position, I painted the rails on both sides with Humbrol 173, track colour enamel. This will give them a more realistic, weathered look.

Clean the rail tops before the paint dries. Push a wooden lollipop stick along each rail to remove the paint. Rails are then polished with a track rubber.



Along the front of the platform, the gap is filled with granite ballast. You could also use Kato's matching ballast (K24-039) for a perfect result.



Ratio's boiler/pump house kit builds into a good factory. It is based on the firm's engine shed kit, with extra parts included to fill the end doors and windows if required.



Keeping the large doors at one end seemed sensible. It's a flexible kit and multiple models can be joined to make a larger building.



Windows are printed plastic sheet that must be cut to size and glued. Deluxe Materials' Glue'n'Glaze allows re-positioning of the glass without fogging the material.



In addition to the main building, a wooden lean-to, brick chimney and steel water tank are included. These can be positioned by the modeller to suit the site.



As the water tower is open topped, it needs filling and I've used 'Making Waves' from Deluxe Materials for this. The deep layer takes a few days to dry clear.



Kato doesn't offer British-outline buffer stops. Instead, a Peco buffer stop can be used by removing the front and rear lugs on the bottom and gluing it into place.



Kato's trackbed is high, so a level crossing needs 3mm thick pieces of basswood carved out underneath and sanded to shape on top.



Apply the grey powder half of the Noch road system then paint the grey top coat over this and the crossing. It dries lighter than the dark grey seen here.



Roads should only have the slightest surface texture, so I'm sanding them with a coarse abrasive tool. A second coat of road paint completes the job.



Grey art pastels grated on a coarse file then worked into the surface with a cheap bristle brush are useful for weathering.



I used two Kestrel toll road crossing kits as each only contains a single set of gates. Adding a red plastic disc to the centre makes them ideal for the job.



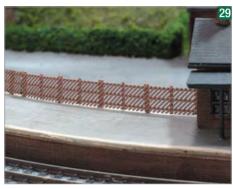
Gaugemaster's GM161 hedge material is ready to use if you want neat hedges. To make them more rustic, I'm trimming them with nail scissors and adding flock powder.



Peco lineside fencing is very flexible, but made of a glueresistant nylon. At either end, a blob of superglue secures them into place, covered by coarse flock.



Mixing hedges and fencing offcuts looks good around the houses. Before fitting, the electrostatic grass is scraped away and replaced with flock for a mowed appearance.



Slater's platform fencing is planted in 1.5mm holes drilled into the surface. Section joints are hidden with advertising boards if required.





on the model. There will be more trains running on this little circuit than cars!



All the buildings are bedded into the surface with puffs The crossing gates must be kept closed for road vehicles of electrostatic grass to hide the inevitable gaps around their bases.

# lask the expert

Do I need an expensive electronic tool to apply electrostatic grass?

Many visitors were surprised to watch me apply electrostatic grass with a puffer bottle rather than an electronic tool. Gaugemaster's GM193 Static Grass Puffer Bottle only costs £4.95 and is very effective for smaller areas, saving you considerable money over an electrostatic battery-powered device.

The polythene bottle imparts a static charge to the nylon fibres as they are 'puffed' through the holes in the plastic cap. As the fibres hit the tacky PVA glue, they stand like real grass.

Although slower over large areas, this is a small layout. Best of all, it can blast grass into the corners around the base of buildings and underneath areas such as the water tank.





Placing the factory at the end of a siding makes a valid excuse to park a few private owner wagons. Even this short section has room for three!



Fences, hedges, road vehicles and billboard signs are now in place. A new owner just needs to make the layout their own - add people or more detail.

riginally built by three talented modellers, John, Peter and Bob over a period of six years, 'Harlyn Road' enjoyed a successful ten-year run on the English show circuit. Its popularity is testament to the skills of the builders and the layout was first featured in the December 2007 issue of BRM.

Two years ago I was fortunate to be able to bring the layout to its new home and embark on some minor changes.

The original premise for 'Harlyn Road' was as a fictitious branch line terminus set in north Cornwall, to the west of Padstow, with a trackplan typical of London & South Western Railway practice. Railway buildings are based on LSWR prototypes, the goods shed from Bodmin, Padstow's station building, the locomotive shed from Sidmouth and the signalbox from Swanage.

As it was made to such a high standard it was a hard decision as to what could be done to improve six years of skilled modelmaking. The initial changes involved the Scottish Diesel & Electric Group's Jim Reid rewiring the layout for DCC sound operation and connecting the goods shed lights that had been fitted, but never powered, allowing me to focus on DCC sound conversions and building new locomotives.

#### **PHASE TWO**

The next phase of development involves new lighting designed by Jim, and following this we will focus on adding working lights to the platform and all other buildings. This will add the option of night running, complementing the effects of coach window lights reflecting on buildings, scenery and platforms as trains

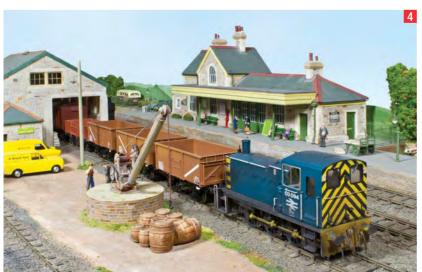


arrive at 'Harlyn Road' station.

By adding lighting we will be able to further enhance the high level of detail. The goods shed features a broken window, peeling window paint, a station cat watching over the yard for field mice and a fully detailed interior including rafters, so lighting is important to bring all this fine detail out.

Looking round the layout we keep discovering neat touches by the builders - a swallow's nest above the locomotive shed door, a fully detailed timber shed

behind the goods shed seems to have some new tools in it each time we look and then there's the fully detailed signalbox interior. As well as lighting these buildings we plan to incorporate miniature cameras to give real time views from trains passing strategic points, displayed on screens behind the layout. This should be ready for the layout's next outing in 2018.

#### **SOUND** WAVE

Introducing DCC sound has changed the remit of the layout from that originally intended. Previously it ran on DC analogue either in 1924 LSWR/Southern guise or as a 1950s Southern Region operation.

In its new DCC sound form the plan is to operate in the 1950s/60s era with the first outing for this new sound era planned for Model Rail Scotland in February 2017.

Researching stock for the 1950s/60s era has uncovered some intriguing workings on SR routes so when combined with a spot of artistic licence we can operate ex-GWR '14XX' 0-4-2Ts and Pannier Tanks with a pair of ex-GWR autocoaches - as loaned in the summer of 1964 to cover for DMU shortages.

There were regular occurrences of ex-LMS, LNER and GWR stock running in Cornwall so we will have similar variety to complement our Heljan SR green and kit-built maroon Mk 1 coaches. The 'Devon Belle' Pullman Car train will pass through too, albeit a little off-route and shorter than normal but it all adds to the fun!

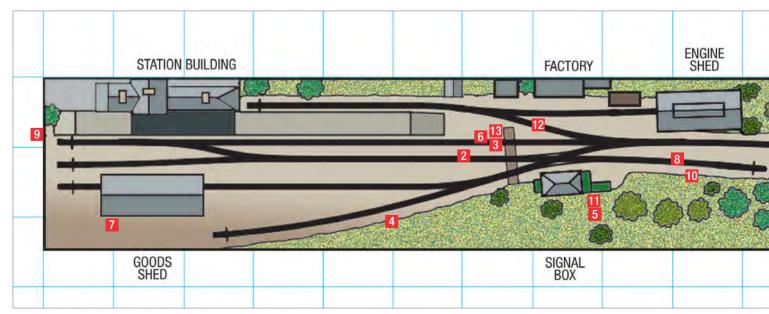

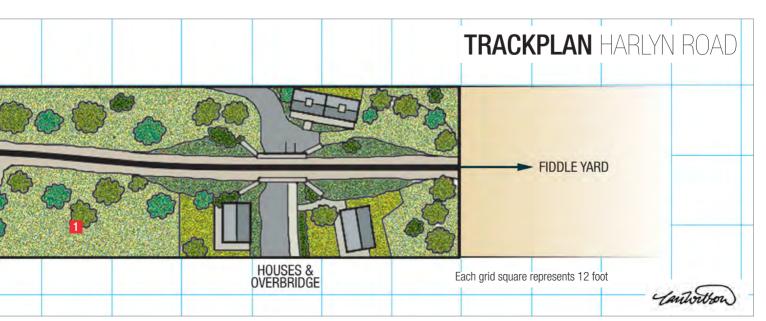




To bolster the 1950s/60s era there is a variety of smaller locomotives which can make appearances including Ivatt 2MT 2-6-2T and 2-6-0 tender locomotives, a BR Standard 2MT 2-6-0 and 4MT 2-6-4T, amongst others. In production is a superb Modern Outline Kit for a Bulleid Q1 0-6-0 which will be fitted with DCC sound and synchronised smoke. This will undoubtedly be a popular feature once the pyrotechnics have been completed.

#### **VALUABLE SUPPORT**

As a part of the Scottish Diesel & Electric Group (SDEG) I am given much welcome support when operating the layout at shows. SDEG members are well known on the exhibition circuit via OO gauge

layouts such as 'Hazelbank', 'Airthrey Park' and 'Welby Lane' (all featured in BRM during 2015/16) but there's an increasing interest in O gauge diesels too. As a result, several BR green diesels have made their way onto the new roster. Initially for the 1950s/60s era we are relying on diesels by Heljan - Classes 20, 26, 31, 33, 40 and Western Region diesel-hydraulics, with a few being 'run in' on their way to their home depots. As well as providing some superb DCC sound effects, cab

lighting and crews it keeps the SDEG operating crew in their element.

Immediately after Jim re-wired the layout we took it on its first outing to Falkirk MRC show. With little time to gather enough Southern Region stock we decided to operate it in the preservation era, allowing us to run a massive cross-section of locomotives and stock.

Inevitably the stars of the show were the locomotives with smoke as well as sound and we were honoured to win the Exhibitors Cup. With assistance from my fellow SDEG members we were able to keep the layout a hive of activity all weekend.

Now that we know the preservation era is extremely popular we will plan another outing using this as the theme. It will be ideal as the collection of O gauge locomotives within the SDEG grows it will give everyone an opportunity to run their 'pride and joy' and allow the occasional visiting DCC model from show visitors.

The core roster for this era consists of many kit-built steam and diesel locomotives built by me including some that have been covered previously in magazines. Altering the time frame for the layout allows many different locomotives to appear. One of the models of which I am most proud of is a Martin Finney 'Duchess' built as No. 46245 City of London (see this month's cover). It is probably one of the best 'Duchess' kits available and while it requires some alterations to make

it run, it is nice to be able to show No. 46245 in action.

It was my first model with synchronised smoke and sound recordings taken from 37401 after it was restored by the SRPS Diesel group at Bo'ness. This is probably one of the biggest crowdpullers at shows, belching smoke out

### OPERATIONS | GUNPOWDER TRAFFIC | 1850-2000

# 

Explosive materials require careful handling and strict adherence to railway rules. Ben Jones discovers how such traffic was worked to get a better understanding of how they can be modeled more accurately.

rom their earliest days, railways were used to convey dangerous goods for the many new technologies that came out of Britain's Industrial Revolution. Some of the biggest users were the railway builders themselves as they blasted through the British landscape on an unprecedented scale.

As the 19th century progressed, gunpowder (a generic railway term for a range of explosive substances) and ordnance for military purposes also started to be moved by rail. Despite the obvious dangers of carrying explosive substances by rail, behind steam locomotives spitting sparks and cinders, companies were obliged to accept them under 'common carrier' agreements.

New and ever-more lethal substances, such as trinitrotoluene (TNT), could be extraordinarily dangerous when coupled with early railway practices not least the standard use of wooden vehicles with cast iron wheels and brake blocks. Numerous accidents led a gradual tightening of rules for the transport of explosives by the beginning of the 20th century.

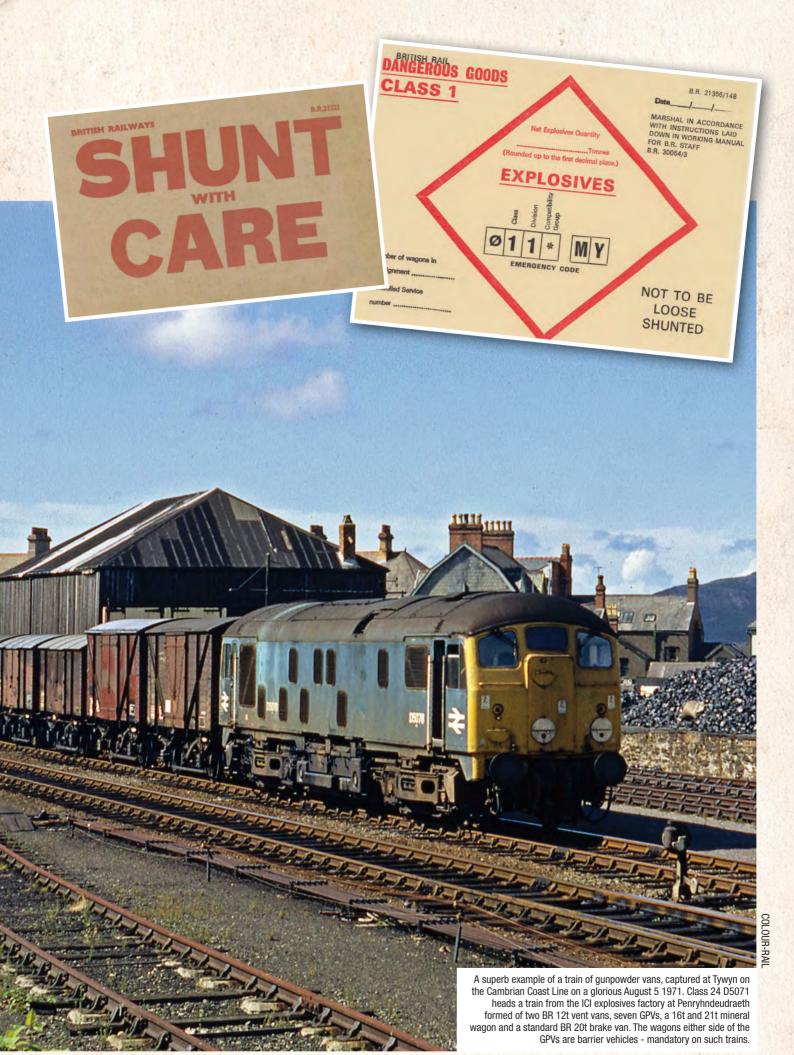
Industries such as civil engineering, mining and quarrying required explosives for blasting. Coal mining, the foundation on which British industry was built in the 19th century, required regular deliveries of dynamite to collieries. This was later modified with consignments moving from explosives factories such as Cooke's/ICI Penryhndeudraeth (open 1884-1995) in north Wales to regional depots and, after the Second World War, to National Coal Board (NCB) stores.

For obvious reasons, explosives factories and munitions stores were built well away from centres of population, often in remote coastal areas. Rail-served locations included the Nobel dynamite factory (later ICI) on the Ardeer peninsula in Ayrshire, opened in 1871. At its peak, this site employed almost 13,000 people and had its own railway station.

#### **MILITARY MOVEMENTS**

Munitions movements related to the military were often classified and are therefore not well documented, even a century later. According to contemporary sources, movements generally occurred at weekends and overnight when the railway was quieter, with fewer

people and fewer trains around.

After a serious explosion at Low Moor, near Bradford, in October 1916, the Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway issued new instructions that 'not more than four vans loaded with gunpowder shall be marshalled together' and that 'two empty open wagons should be between each loaded van,' and 'not more than three empty vans to be marshalled together. The LYR also required a brake van (with guard) for every tenth vehicle. Trains were to travel 'right away' [without being stopped] and operated 'double-block' with continuous reports to control about their progress. (*Platform: Journal of the L&Y Railway Society*, Spring 1985).

Sources for military explosives traffic included the

During and after the Second World War, government-owned munitions factories were known as Royal Ordnance Factories (ROFs) and those responsible for producing explosives such as TNT, Cordite and RDX were known as 'Explosive ROFs'. Rail-served ROFs included Bishopton on the River Clyde, Sellafield, Drigg, Bridgwater, Ranskill (near Retford) and Wrexham.

#### **GUNPOWER VANS**

Following numerous explosions resulting from accidents on the railways, the Railway Clearing House (RCH) set up an enquiry into methods of handling and transporting explosive substances in the late-19th century. The result was an RCH standard design based on the GWR's 'Iron Mink' (an unofficial title) for such traffic.

Gunpowder traffic thereafter required specialist vehicles with steel bodyshells, at a time when the standard material was wood. This gave them greater strength in case of any impact and also protected the contents from sparks and fire. They were lined with timber, had wooden brake blocks and all interior fittings were non-ferrous to further eliminate the risk of sparks.

No more than five could be coupled in any one train, they had to be as far as practicable from the locomotive and any vehicles carrying explosive goods had to be marked 'inflammable'. They were banned from working through the GWR's Severn Tunnel and all loading/unloading had to be undertaken outside goods sheds.

These rules persisted, largely unchanged, until the advent of air-braked wagons in the 1970s. However, the rules were relaxed during both world wars to accommodate the massive increase in traffic.

Over 4,700 'Iron Minks' were built by the GWR between 1886 and 1901 for general merchandise traffic, but should not be confused with Gunpowder Vans (GPVs). The majority were withdrawn in 1933-39 but some survived the Second World War. Only small numbers were used for gunpowder traffic and these had a separate designation, given the telegraphic code 'CONE'. They were built without vents and designed to be entirely dust-proof. Several diagrams were issued as the 'Cone' specification was subtly 'tweaked' over several decades. Z1 vans were introduced in 1897, Z2 in 1913, Z3 in 1924 and Z4 in 1939.

As a result of the RCH standard design, many other railways had vehicles of similar outline to the GWR's GPVs, including the North British, London & South

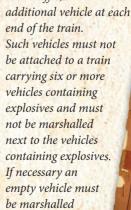
Clause 10 of Rule 240 states that "not more than five vehicles containing explosives must be conveyed by any one train at any one time, and that vehicles containing explosives must be marshalled as near the middle of the train as possible", will not apply.

The maximum load conveyed must not exceed 60 vehicles containing explosives, but if the traffic is conveyed in open trucks bearing an additional special Government label 12in square with a solid

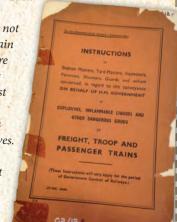
> black circle or disc, 4in in diameter, on a white background fixed to the bottom left hand corner of each side of the truck, not more than 15 open trucks so labelled must be attached to any one train.

If the full number of 15 such trucks are attached, no other Explosive or inflammable liquids may be conveyed on the same train. In calculating the number of vehicles containing Explosives which may be attached to any one train, each truck bearing this special Government label must be counted as four vehicles containing Explosives.

Chemical Defence Preparations (CD) will only be conveyed in freight trains. Each vehicle containing CDP will carry a dangerous goods label and a Government 'CD' label on each side. Such vehicles must be marshalled as near the middle of the train as possible, but in the case of a full train load of such traffic, it will not be necessary to marshal an

Well into the 1990s, numerous MoD depots across the south of England were served by the Speedlink/Railfreight Distribution wagonload network. An important destination for military stores traffic was Ludgershall in Hampshire the destination for Tinsley's RfD grev 47279, captured leaving Andover on April 29 1992. A diverse group of vans includes five VAAs, two VGAs and three VEAs.

BR service, coded CXV (see page 65), until replaced by more modern vehicles in the late-1970s/early-1980s.

Most GPVs were built unfitted, including BR wagons fitted with the Morton two-shoe handbrake arrangement. However, many were subsequently rebuilt with automatic four-shoe RCH vacuum brakes as part of the 1955 Modernisation Plan.

Due to their specialist nature, many GPVs had long working lives. For example, 103 LSWR vans built in the 1880s as ordinary covered goods wagons were converted as Diagram 1701 'temporary' GPVs during the First World War to provide extra munitions capacity. The last LSWR van, No. 61209, lasted until March 1956 and even then continued in departmental service on the Scottish Region as DS61209. It is now part of the NRM Collection.

To modernise its fleet, the LMS built 160 7t gunpowder vans between 1923 and 1939, in two batches. They were painted LMS grey from new, apart from the final 45 which were bauxite. Being relatively new at Nationalisation in 1948, they were later uprated by BR to 11t capacity. Construction changed to 11t vans from 1943 and a total of 55 were built in 1943-48, plus 20 for the LNER in 1943/44 and some for BR in 1948.

The LNER's first gunpowder vans were five 7t vehicles built in 1925 at Dukinfield Carriage & Wagon Works to a standard RCH design for the conveyance of explosives. However, the LNER also inherited older GPVs from its pre-Grouping constituents, including the North Eastern and North British, although these had largely disappeared by 1948. Twenty NBR 7t vans survived into BR days and this vehicle is the subject of a Slater's 7mm scale kit.

For less volatile loads, and items unsuitable for loading into vans, such as artillery shells and torpedoes, a variety of open wagons was employed. These included

standard designs of five-plank and LMS 'High', shockabsorbing opens, LNER 13t steel 'High' and later, BR 'Pipe' wagons (see page 63).

Hundreds of thousands of tons of munitions were moved by the railways during the two world wars. In its April 1942 edition, *The Locomotive* magazine reported: "Some 163 kinds of explosive are listed under ten classifications. Explosives belonging to different families must not normally be mixed together in the same van and in some cases must not be conveyed on the same train.

"Awards of George Medals and other decorations have been made to railwaymen for dealing with munitions trains damaged by enemy action. In one case, when a direct hit was made on such a train, ten men worked right through the night dragging truckloads of explosives clear of danger and all the time explosions were occurring in the damaged trucks and bombs were falling all around them."

#### **POSTWAR OPERATIONS**

Immediately after the surrender of Japan in June 1945, activities at many of the rail-served ROFs reduced or ceased altogether. However, while gunpowder traffic was significantly lower in peacetime, it did not disappear. ICI's factory at Penryhndeudraeth continued to dispatch wagons of explosives for the mining industry until the early-1980s, and for the MoD until the early-1990s. Other military traffic between the remaining ROFs and ordnance depots, and between storage depots and locations such as Marchwood Military Port, near Southampton continues to the present day, albeit at a much-reduced level. Traffic levels increased during times of conflict, including during the Korean War of 1950-53, the Falklands War of 1982 and the Gulf Wars of 1990/91 and 2003. Interestingly, wagons loaded for MoD traffic were not shown on BR's TOPS computer system for security reasons.

By the late-1970s, the surviving BR gunpowder vans were obsolete and non-military explosives traffic was in decline. A small fleet of ex-LMS and BR Diagram 1/260 (fitted and unfitted) and 1/261 GPVs was still on BR's books in mid-1982, but retirement came soon after.

To cater for MoD traffic, 550 12t vacuum-braked 'Vanwides' were modernised between 1977 and 1983 with new 'FAT19' suspension and air brakes. They were largely used for MoD traffic, including ammunition boxes, artillery shells, hand and smoke grenades, mortar bombs, plus many other less dangerous items for stores. In 1984, 25 vans allocated to traffic from the ROF at Chorley were fitted with internal alarms and recoded VFA. VEA/VFAs remained in use until the early-2000s and some can still be seen in use at MoD depots.

A batch of 50 'Pipe' wagons was also modernised and converted from vacuum to air brakes in 1983. Recoded from SOV to ODA, they carried crated equipment, aviation fuel cylinders, and munitions, including missiles and torpedoes that were unsuitable for loading into vans. They were sheeted when carrying dangerous loads. After the abandonment of the Speedlink network in 1991, they were transferred to departmental use.



W105777 is a CXV 'GUNPOWDER' built by the GWR to Diagram Z4, lot 1346 at Swindon in 1939. On September 9 1980 it was still in traffic when spotted at Severn Tunnel Junction.

Short-wheelbase wagons were necessary as many of the MoD depot internal rail networks they served had very sharp curves and were unable to accept more modern wagons such as the OAA/OBA opens, VAA/VBA/VDA and VGA/VKA vans. However, newer types were also used on MoD traffic, particularly the VGA/VKA vans, which are still use today. Over the last 20 years, MoD stores traffic has become increasingly containerised, using both standard ISO 'boxes' and MoD containers with side doors. They are carried on KFA bogie flats (Hornby/Revolution) and PFA 4w flats.

In recent years, MoD traffic has centred on Didcot Yard, with EWS/DB Schenker/DB Cargo radiating out to the remaining rail-served depots at Bicester, Marchwood, Ashchurch and Kineton. Other MoD sites served by rail between the 1970s and 1990s included Trecwn in west Wales, Ludgershall in Hampshire, Glen Douglas on the West Highland Line and Warcop near Appleby. Some sites are still rail connected, but many others were abandoned as depots closed.

While information on such sensitive traffic is, understandably, often difficult to obtain, observation of contemporary workings is possible at locations such as Didcot and Eastleigh, while study of archive photographs will occasionally turn up interesting train formations containing older vehicles and traditional GPVs. A good selection of models and kits is also available to help us add this important and unusual traffic to our model railways.

# PRACTICAL BRM | KITBUILDING | 00 Gauge

# BUILD A 21st CENTURY

A regular sight touring the Network Rail system, this popular inspection saloon provides an unusual and interesting modelling challenge, as Nigel Burkin discovers.

n many ways, inspection saloons are an ideal subject for modellers looking to add something out of the ordinary to a layout. A single coach, powered by a small to medium-sized locomotive can be accommodated on (almost) any layout. Such saloons were never built in large numbers and are a rarity on the modern railway, with 975025 Caroline being the best known.

Modellers have a choice of two kits for modelling 975025 - a sophisticated brass kit by MARC Models and a multi-media kit from Britannia Pacific. The latter is my choice, despite incorrect details such as the roof vents and door lines etched to the bottom of the etched sides which are not a feature of the full size saloon. The BPM kit uses a number of components from the DC Kits range including its long Hastings underframe and the roof. The mix of different materials including brass, plastic and resin for various components makes the choice of adhesive important for a successful build.

'Plasti-Zap' high performance CA glue together with an accelerator was used when putting subassemblies composed of multimedia parts together such as the sides, ends and roof to make up the body shell. Plastic assemblies such as the underframe were assembled with 'Plastic Weld' which works well with the ABS plastic. With a little care, preparation and the correct adhesives, there is no reason why the model cannot be robust.

#### **BODY** BUILDING

Construction of the body is similar to that of DB999508 (BRM January 2015). This time, the brass sides are not rolled but left flat to match

the narrow Hastings Line profile. The kit is constructed as a body assembly and separate underframe or 'roof-on'.

My step-by-step demonstrates the construction of the body and how styrene strips are used to strengthen and thicken the brass sides. Note how a rebate is left above and below the window line to allow the fitting of glazing and at the ends to allow the cab mouldings to be fitted.

A small amount of detail work is completed at this stage including drilling holes to accommodate two sets of handrails on each side. Furthermore, the door hinge detail taken is fitted to all doors except the inward-opening guard's doors. Reference photographs are used to check for blanked windows which would be painted body colour.

Rather than the non-Southern region B4 bogies supplied, I chose to use MJT cosmetic bogie sideframe castings, fitted to an etched inner frame. Once the bearings were fitted, the fit of standard 26mm diameter axle wheelsets was pretty tight and would only fit comfortably and be free-rolling by slightly distorting the castings.

The bogies fit the underframe with 8BA screws and are set up to work in different planes as a simple triangular compensation system which prevents wobbling.

DCCconcepts 12mm diameter coach wheels were the best option as they have a solid rear face which is great for wiper pick-ups.

Most of the underframe details are taken from a Southern Pride detailing kit or built of styrene card. It is more of a representation than a truly accurate model as photographs were my only source of reference. Nonetheless, the finished article looks right and fits the model nicely.

Cross members were fitted to the inside of the body as securing points for the body even though they make the fitting of an interior a little awkward.

#### **FINISHING** TIPS

To better match the finish applied to *Caroline* in post-2007 condition, I doctored some Southern Region EMU green to take the hint of yellow out of it. The result is a viridian green as applied to the full size saloon. Following the first coat of primer, the body was checked for blemishes. The simple construction of the body left little filling and finishing to do, so only one coat was necessary.

After a thorough wash and priming of the metal details, the underframe and bogies were finished in satin black and gently dusted with frame dirt colour to represent a grime - but not too much - as this is a 'pet' vehicle! Additional painting included yellow to the edge of the solebar footsteps.

Perhaps the longest part of this project was the detailing. So many small fittings and details were left until after the model received a thin coat of satin varnish to blend in the paints and transfers. I am not keen on modelling more than an impression of an interior. Nonetheless, I cut floors for the two saloons and fitted them around the cross members used to secure the chassis to the body. A representation of the loose tables was made from styrene and painted off-white.

Partitions for the toilet, guards compartment and kitchen were carefully cut to the profile of the interior using a coach end from a DC Kits Hastings DEMU kit and assembled to the underframe. The completed interior panels are cream with brown door panels. The glazing was fitted next together with curtains. I noted that the curtains are lined; creamy white outside and a pink hue on the inside. Ten pairs were cut from 10 thou' styrene, shaped so they did not sit flat on the inside surface of the glazing and fitted with a spot of gloss varnish.

External details include ETS and multiple working equipment fitted to the bufferbeam together

with air brake pipes, door handles; handrails, commode handles, kick plates for the guard's doors, roof mounted air horns, top spot light lenses and windscreen wipers. The cab windows were cut from acetate and fitted with gloss varnish. The windscreen wipers supplied with the kit followed whilst the varnish was still wet. Detailing a model like this requires a lot of time and patience!

I've also fitted working LED running lights and a decoder and consequently I left the installation of some really fine detail until later because I know from experience that even light handling will result in its loss! When I complete a project, I look at it closely and see what I could do differently next time. Care was taken to finish the model as accurately as possible within the limitations of the kit and components. Studying pictures of any model during construction helps to identify poorly executed work and I made some changes as the project progressed. Nonetheless, given the basic nature of the kit, the addition of some extra detailing components together with careful painting has resulted in a good representation of the real Caroline.



# Back Story 975025 Caroline

This former Southern Region General Manager's Saloon has a fascinating history, starting life as S60755, a Class 203 '6-B' DEMU buffet car. It was removed from its set and stored in January 1964 after which it was stripped for spares. It never operated as a buffet car again, being rebuilt in 1969 into the saloon we know today - 975025.

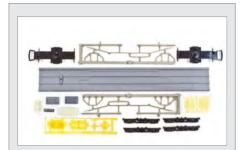
Reconstruction involved the installation of driving cabs, control equipment and rebuilding of the interior to create two open saloons. The control equipment included the then standard BR(S) 27-way multiple working



equipment and waist height air brake hoses enabling it to work with most SR Mk 1 multiple unit stock and Class 33/1s, 73s and 74s. To keep the occupants warm and the galley supplied with power, it was also equipped with Electric Train Supply (ETS). Additional lighting for line and structure inspections was fitted alongside the two-character headcode blinds. Until 1986, 975025 was finished in BR blue and grey. Network SouthEast colours were then carried until refurbishment in 1999 by Fragonset.

During this refurbishment it was fitted with a high-intensity headlight at each end but retained waist level SR jumper cables and air brake hoses and was painted in a version of Southern Region EMU green, including the previously unpainted windowframes, together with full yellow ends and black underframe and bogies. Around the same time, *Caroline* nameplates were applied.

After around six years working with its original push-pull equipment, often powered by a Class 33/1, the saloon saw further modifications which tidied up the ends. Blue Star MW equipment was fitted, making the saloon compatible with conventional diesel locomotives such as Class 37s. The headcode panels were plated over and smaller and neater marker light clusters fitted alongside the headlight. The exploits of 975025 are well documented, including its use as a royal vehicle in July 1981. It has remained a popular vehicle ever since, despite some uncertain years during the chaotic early period of privatisation. Still in traffic, 975025 is one of the only saloons to be passed for push-pull operation. Its Blue Star capability makes it flexible for route inspections and it is seen far and wide across the network, usually powered by a DRS '37/4'.



Bodyshell components include etched sides, cast ends and a plastic roof moulding. The roof vents supplied in the kit are not correct for this project and should be replaced with short shell vents by MJT or No Nonsense Kits.



Strips of 20 thou' styrene are cut to fit the inside of the brass sides to add strength and act as a fixing point for the plastic roof.



To give the adhesive the best chance of bonding styrene to brass, the inside of the sides are burnished and cleaned with a scratch pencil.



A rebate has been left at each end to take the cab casting (A). The styrene strip at the top of each side will be bonded to the roof (B). The lower strip adds depth to the sides (C).



The roof moulding is prepared by rubbing locating pips from the inside surface of the moulding. The rough finish is the perfect bonding surface for CA glue too.



Care is taken to align the rain gutter of the roof moulding with that of the cab castings. Hold the two parts together as the CA glue dries.



Assembly of the body progresses with both cab castings fitted together with one side. Note how the extra styrene strips help to locate and fix the brass sides.



A closer view of the cab to roof to side assembly. A little filler was needed to finish the cab to roof join. The mix of materials makes choosing the right adhesives crucial.

With body assembly complete, the roof vent positions are marked and pilot holes drilled. Note that the handrail knob holes for the guard's door have been drilled too.



The vent holes are opened out with a larger diameter drill just slightly wider than the vent casting spigots. This allows for slight variation in the size of the spigots.



Shell vents are fitted with a spot of CA glue. The slightly larger hole also allows for some adjustment of position so they can be fitted in a perfect line.

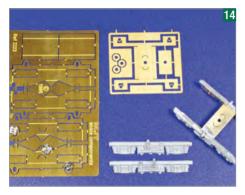
Primed and ready for painting. Only a few details have been fitted such as door hinges (not the inward opening door, even though their positions are etched in the sides).



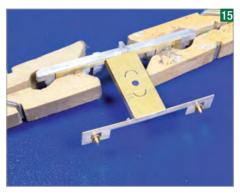
Look for any blemishes at the primer stage. It is much easier to tidy them up now rather than when the model is fully painted and detailed.



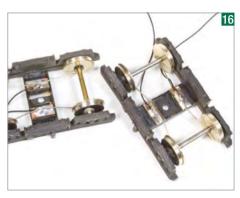
Red-backed *Caroline* nameplates (from Shawplan Models) against green paint will look great on the model and are a neat finishing touch.



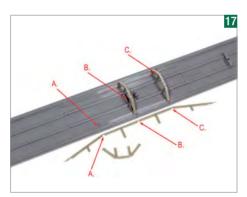
MJT B4(S) cosmetic bogie side frames are appropriate for this model. They were fitted to etched inner frames and both the MJT and Hurst Models frames are suitable.



Hurst bogie frames were folded and soldered up and fitted with 2mm pin point bearings. The side frames were held in place with clothes pegs during soldering.



The completed bogies fitted with current collection wiper pick-ups to supply the marker lights. DCCconcepts 12mm diameter coach wheels are ideal for this job.



The underframe floor is from DC Kits and is moulded in ABS plastic - best assembled with 'Plastic Weld' solvent cement.



Even though the bodyshell is painted and varnished, a great deal of detailing work remains to be done. It's easier at this stage when less handling is required.



This stage of finishing involves the fitting of numerous details, some of which can only be fitted a few at a time and left overnight to allow paint and adhesives to dry.



Bufferbeam and bogie details are added including air pipes and ETS jumper cable equipment. The various details are made of styrene card section and strip.



Two saloons of similar parentage. Both are multi-media kits by Britannia Pacific Models where plastic, brass and resin components are used to good effect.



Lights are fitted to the leading end and wired to a decoder. The marker lights are wired separately to the headlight so their brightness can be independently adjusted.

Set high in the Yorkshire Dales, Roger Sunderland's evocative layout captures the remote landscape of the famous Settle-Carlisle Line in the final years of BR steam.

or 'Carsdale' read Garsdale, but as I had to take liberties with the trackplan to fit it into the available space, I decided to change the name. Hopefully there is enough in the accompanying article and photographs to enable people to recognise a lot from the original Garsdale.

My previous layouts have mostly had an urban theme and been based in West Yorkshire. But, after a holiday in the Yorkshire Dales and a visit to Garsdale I was captivated. It was the only junction station on the Midland Railway's famous Settle-Carlisle (S&C) line, linked by a North Eastern Railway branch to Hawes. A most remote location in the wilds of the Yorkshire moors and a varied timetable with a large amount of goods traffic were just some of the things that made the decision to model it easier.

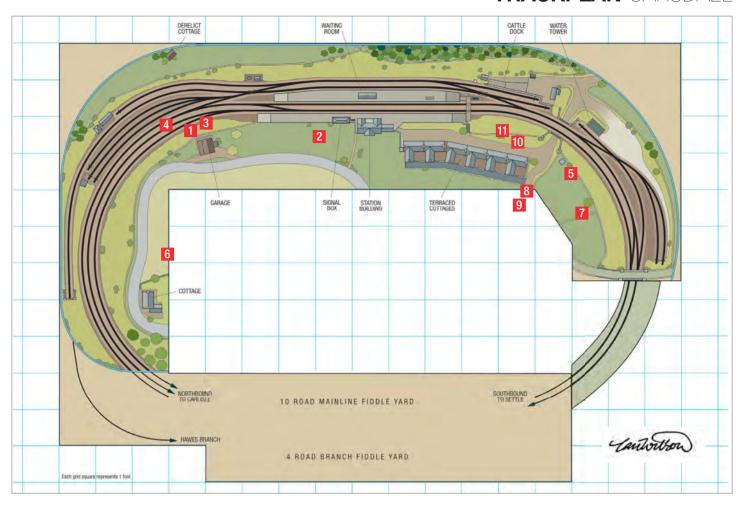
A start was made about four years ago - I'm retired so have a bit of spare time - and a number of plans were drawn up to see what could and could not be included. I decided early on that I would assume the branch to Hawes had survived longer than 1958, which allows for greater operating potential.

#### **FINER TRACK**

Plain track uses C&L flexitrack, while all the pointwork was hand-built on copper clad sleepers using templates drawn on Templot track planning software. Although

# II ask the expert

The S&C is famous for its sweeping curves The S&C is tarrious for its street, in a str How did you capture this look in a relatively small space?

I think there is often a desire from modellers to fill every A svailable space with track but I wanted to try and capture the open feel of this remote landscape, something which I hope is evident.

Baseboards are 6mm ply tops on an 'L' girder system which allows the trackbed to be higher, or lower, than the surrounding scenery. This also makes it relatively easy to incorporate bridges, tunnels, streams and roads. The overriding factor is to make it appear that the railway has been constructed through the landscape, which was, of course, always there. The trackbed height is 4ft 3in from the ground, which gives an interesting viewing height.

I have been modelling for more than 40 years this was the first time I had built my own pointwork. I truly wish I'd had the courage to give it a go much earlier.

The difference, even in OO gauge, is amazing. Improvements include realistic sleeper spacing and the chance to use bullhead rail to name just two. For anybody thinking of having a go, my advice is 'just do it' and banish the unrealistic track formations forced by having to follow generic track geometry.

I recommend the book *Track: How it Works and How To Model It*, published by the 2mm Finescale Association. Its principles are equally applicable to 4mm scale. Ballast is Woodland Scenics N scale as that for OO scale is far too coarse. It's a home-made blend to mimic the real thing.

Control is DCC using the Digitrax system. I looked at a number of different systems before converting to DCC about ten years ago but found Digitrax to be the most comprehensive. All points are operated by Tortoise slow motion motors which have proved to be very reliable.

BELOW: No. 42074 departs for Hawes as a Derby/ Sulzer Type 2 heads for Carlisle with a fitted goods. Roger used C&L track and hand-built points for the first time on this layout - the difference is immediately phylogis The working semaphore signals are built from Model Signal Engineering parts and operated by servos. They are controlled by the excellent GF Controls units. These give a prototypical slow pull off and a lovely bounce on return.

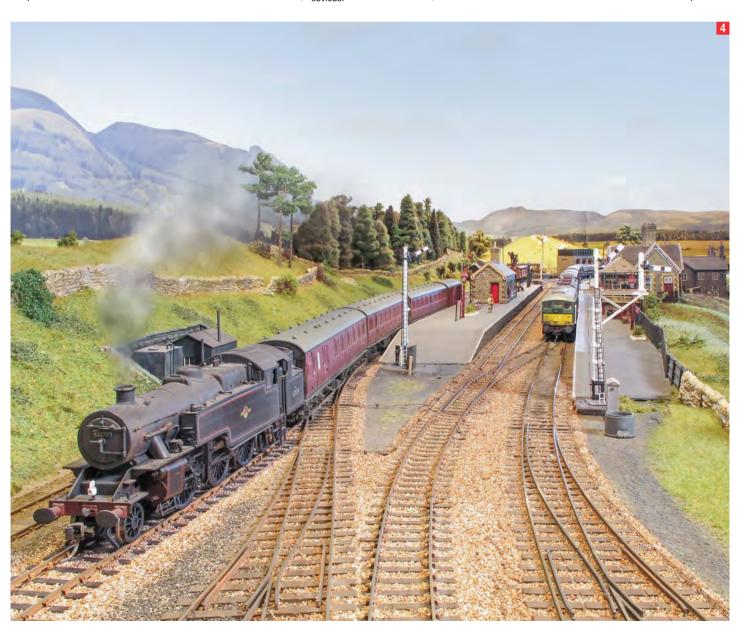
#### **MOORLAND SCENICS**

I could really devote a whole article to this and if you are interested, I'll come back to describe it in more detail at a later date.

The backscenes are from ID and, as far as I know, are from the North Yorkshire Moors. A good deal of trouble was taken to try and match the grass to that shown on the backscene.

A variety of static grasses were used, mainly from Greenscene and Noch. It's important to lay varying lengths of grass to get the desired effect. The spiky tufts are typical for the area.

Dry stone walls were cast from Tiranti basic alpha plaster poured into home-made masters - there are a lot of these! The basic contours were formed from layers of

Celotex which is easy to carve and reasonably dust free.
Although the area is known for being fairly bleak, there are a large number of trees on the layout. Different methods have been used to create these, ranging from adapting shop-bought firs to making my own. Not having a bottomless bank account, the latter method

adapting shop-bought firs to making my own. Not having a bottomless bank account, the latter method was used for the majority. If anyone wants to create really good trees please buy the two books on the subject by Gordon Gravett (published by Wild Swan) as it is well worth the investment. Mine are not yet up to his standards but they're getting there.

#### **MIDLAND BUILDINGS**

At this point I must admit to 'cheating' a little to save time. I enjoy making buildings but I had a number of Hornby Skaledale cottages from a former layout and, although not strictly correct, they fitted the bill for ABOVE: An ex-LMS 'Crab' 2-6-0 'Crab' heads south towards Settle, passing a Metrovick 'Co-Bo' which has been entrusted with a train of 'Conflats' carrying insulated containers. Note how the line is carried on substantial earthworks, just like the real Settle-Carlisle line.

the cottages at Garsdale. They have been heavily modified, built into the scenery and given fully detailed back yards. The main station building is also Skaledale.

Garsdale did not have an MR No. 2 type station building but again I couldn't resist this and to be fair I think a junction station should have had one. The island platform building is scratchbuilt as are the water tower and country garage. The small cottage is based on a Petite Properties kit.

There are various huts and small structures from the usual providers as well as a few I've scratchbuilt. I am particularly fond of the old coach in the yard, which started life as a Ratio kit. Road vehicles are mostly EFE and Pocketbond Classix. All have been weathered to a degree, with drivers, and in the case of the bus, passengers fitted.

#### **TYPICAL TRAINS**

Using the vast amount of information and photographs available of train formations on the S&C I've tried to get mine as accurate as I can. Locomotives seen include 9Fs, 8Fs, WD 2-8-0s,

'Black Fives', 'Crab' and Ivatt 4MT 2-6-0s, ex-LNER A3s, the occasional Peppercorn A1 4-6-2 and BR Standard classes including 'Britannias', 'Clans', 4MT and 5MT 4-6-0s. All are represented on the layout along with Derby/Sulzer Type 2s (Class 24/25), Type 4s (Class 45) and Metrovick Co-Bos. There are occasional visitors from the Scottish Region too, in the form of a Clayton Type 1 and BRCW/Sulzer Type 2 (Class 26). All locomotives are weathered to a greater or lesser degree

as I hate to see anything pristine - it just was not like that in the 1960s. All have details added such as coal, crew and headcode lamps. Many of the locomotives are also fitted with sound decoders.

Coaching stock is a mix of Mk 1, ex-LMS Stanier Period III with some Gresley and Thompson interlopers. All stock is weathered but main line vehicles do at least try to show they have had some visits to the carriage washer. I have to confess I'm addicted to parcels stock and have far too many vans, some from obscure kits, others from the main manufacturers.

I also love goods wagons and have built up a large collection. My personal favourite is the permanent way train - one of two on the layout comprising a mix of heavily weathered specialist wagons including a 'Salmon' and a 'Sturgeon'.

All stock is fitted with Kadee couplings. I know opinions differ on these but I've found them to be very reliable, they look good between coaches (although not as good between wagons) and allow hands-free uncoupling and delayed action. Irrespective of any shortcomings they're a vast improvement on the old hook and bar tension locks.

I try to run a variety of prototypical trains based on the working timetable for the 1960s. Main line trains

include the 'Thames-Clyde Express' and 'The Waverley' as well as a number of lesser St Pancras to Edinburgh/ Glasgow services. These were augmented at certain times by relief trains and summer extras. There is also a sleeping car train for which I use a mix of Bachmann Mk 1 and Hornby Gresley sleepers plus a fair few parcels trains.

As well as these are the Bradford-Carlisle 'stoppers', which usually consisted of a couple of Stanier coaches and a Mk 1 plus a couple of vans, often hauled by a worn-out 'Britannia' or, more unusually, a 'Clan'. Goods trains were lengthy, although fiddleyard size limits me to about 22 wagons, fitted or partially fitted. A star

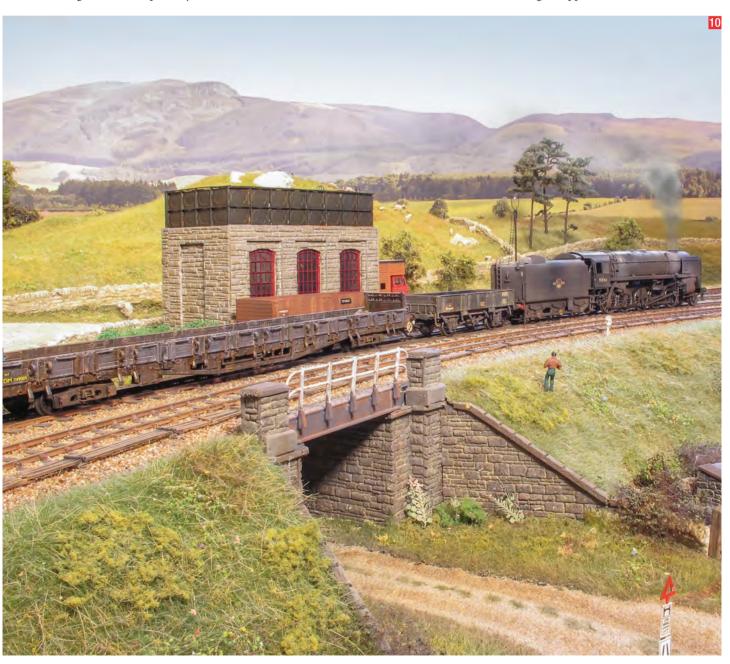

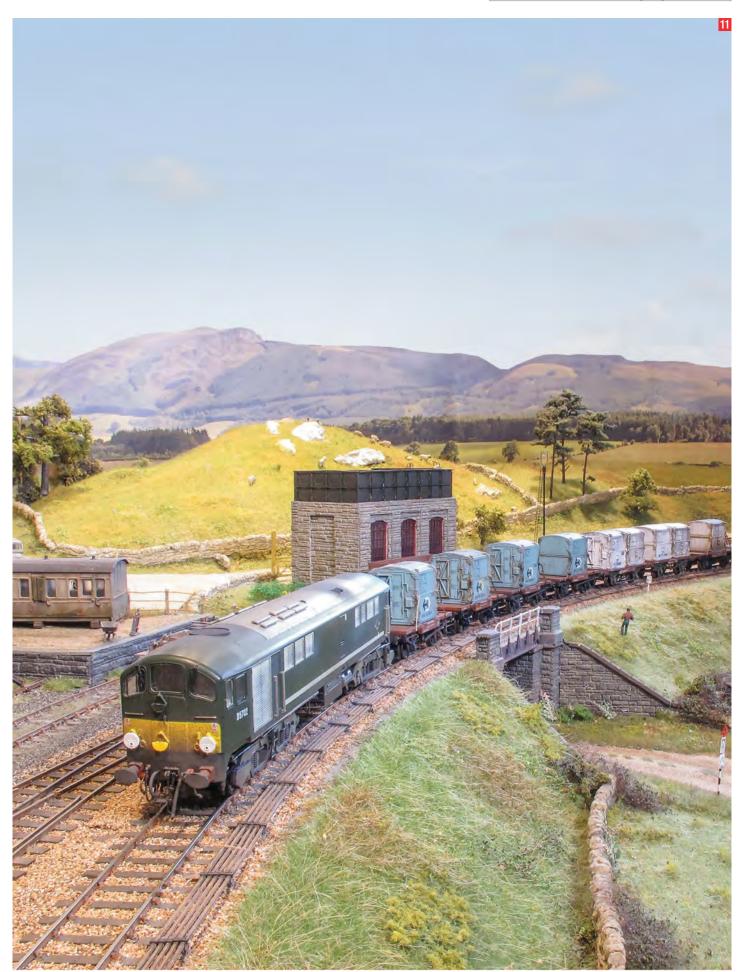
performer was the 'Condor' express container train from London to Glasgow which ran via the S&C hauled by the troublesome Metrovick Co-Bos. This train has also been portrayed (see right).

I've assumed the branch was still running in the 1960s, rather than closing in 1958. Locomotives on the branch are a Fairburn or Stanier 2-6-4T with a set of either Stanier or Thompson non-gangwayed coaches. I can push the era back slightly though and use a J20 0-6-0 or a G5 0-4-4T - both are kit-built models. A 'Derby Lightweight' DMU is a sign of things to come.

The layout is definitely not finished, but are they ever? I am engaged in building a very large exhibition layout depicting Bournemouth West station circa 1960. If you're interested you can follow our progress on RMweb. This is taking a huge chunk of my time now. As well as that, I'm not getting any younger and there are a number of layouts I'd love to have a go at building - so who knows what might happen next?

# MEMORABLE MODELS

Model railway historian Pat Hammond delves into the archives to share the tale of a hugely popular wagon with an explosive reputation.



vividly recall evenings spent with my children fighting intense battles with a whole range of 'Battle Space!' military hardware. Missiles crossed in the skies above the living room carpet to plough **BELOW:** A Tri-ang exploding car, released in 1966 and sporting the Battle Space! livery. The many warning and safety signs were sure to convince younger fans of its self-destructive capabilities.

into rows of Airfix military vehicles and Battle Space commandos lined up at either end of the room.

Lines Bros. - owners of the Tri-ang brand - learned early on that toys needed gimmicks to have appeal. Its military range was full of models that 'did things'. They tried to make them simple to operate, favouring mechanical over electrical operation. As such, they could be sold as self-contained models, ready for use, without buying additional power units.

There had been military models in the Tri-ang Railways range since the Rocket Launcher was





introduced in 1957 but they were not developed into a major series until 1963. By 1965, seven military vehicles existed, most in mid-green carrying NATO

At Margate, Richard Wansworth put forward the move to change the NATO range into 'Battle Space!', expanding it with imaginative re-use of existing freight cars from its North American 'Transcontinental' range. The rocket launcher had been selling well for several years and the helicopter launching car was one of its most successful products - children were crying out for more.

One model from the range was the 'Exploding Car' and like other models, it was a licensed copy of one made by Lionel in the United States. The roof and sides were loosely held together so that it could fall apart

when hit by an object, releasing a sprung hammer which struck a detonating toy-gun cap, producing a loud 'bang'.

It first appeared in the Tri-ang range in the Autumn of 1963 and was bright red, like the Lionel version. At that time, the other military wagons were in NATO green, but in 1966 the range carried the new drab green 'Battle Space!' livery. Specially-designed 'Battle Space!' selfadhesive stickers were applied to each side.

The 'Battle Space!' range was popular and around 42,000 exploding cars were made in 1966 alone. By 1968, demand had fallen and production of the range ended in 1970. Over 100,000 'Exploding Cars' were made over an eight-year period, around 40,000 in red and 60,000 in 'Battle Space!' drab green. The model briefly reappeared in 1982 in the 'Task Force Action Set' but it was too late to renew interest in military models - it was dropped after 4,600 sets were made.

The rarest of the 'Battle Space!' range and sought by collectors is the 'Q Car', released in 1968 as a spin-off from the exploding car. Its 'explosion' was triggered from the track, dismantling the sides and roof, and, as the roof and sides fell away, it revealed a loaded 'red-eye' rocket

ast month I made some simple cosmetic changes to a Bachmann Midland 1F 0-6-0T using little more than paint cutting compound and cotton buds. This month, I thought I'd take on a project involving significant modifications - discarding and replacing parts.

Deliveries of DJ Models' Hunslet 'Austerity'/J94 are well underway. The manufacturer has made a good effort to offer many variants of a prototype that appeared in a large number of guises through its life.

Not offered amongst its batches are those fitted with the reduced height Lambton cab. Locomotives working the Lambton Railway in County Durham had to pass through a narrow bored tunnel to Lambton coal staiths at the Port of Sunderland. To do this, the line had a reduced loading gauge resulting in cab roofs obtaining a curious barrel shape with reduced headroom for footplate crews.

RT Models produces a replacement cab and bunker as an etched kit. Designed to fit the Hornby (ex-Dapol) model, as far as I was aware, no-one had tried it on a DJ Models version - until now.

My locomotive will work on 'Ruston Quays' so doesn't need to be a particular prototype. As such, I'm replacing the standard chimney with a Giesl ejector. This

eye-catching change seems to suit these often-modified locomotives.

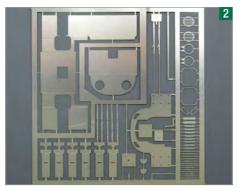
Industrial locomotives, especially in the latter days of steam, were generally filthy. I want to go beyond the basic colour though and replicate the texture of the grime. For this I'm using the latest **BRM** airbrush offer, holding it further from the model and lowering the pressure.

Working on the 'Austerity' didn't give any problems except when fitting the Giesl. As supplied, the tank top is screwed down and the fixing is accessed from the chimney, which needed to be removed. My only option is to superglue it in place, leaving a weak joint that can be broken, if required, to service the motor.





A DJM J94 was generously supplied by Dave Jones - this one failed quality control checks because wrong parts were fitted to the bunker. This won't affect our project.



RT Models' etch cab and detailing parts were designed for the Hornby (ex-Dapol) locomotive, so some components aren't required for DJM's more detailed model.



The DJM injectors have attracted more criticism than any other part of the model. They can be replaced with a set of lost-wax castings from RT Models.



A whitemetal chimney and water filler are available from RT Models too should you wish to change them, perhaps if it has the less attractive 'conical stoker' version.



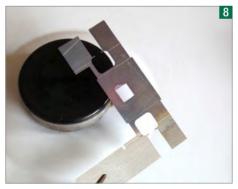
Changing the chimney to a Giesl ejector will result in a significant change to the appearance. These were a popular fitting in industry, but results varied in service.



Dismantling the model to remove the cab. Removing the coupling reveals screws at either end to release the body. A small cross-headed screwdriver is required.



De-soldering the chassis wires and further unscrewing allows me to split the model. Cab removal requires the use of 'waggling' and careful force - it's a tight fit on the tank.



The nickel-silver cab etch has to be softened by annealing. The simplest method is to heat the metal over a gas ring until it discolours, then leave it to cool naturally.



Solder won't stick to dirt or discoloured metal so I'm cleaning parts with fine abrasives and a glass fibre pen. It's time-consuming, but essential for the next stage.



A quick check shows how the cab front - designed for the Hornby/Dapol model - fits. Fortunately, both are the same width and all is well.



The roof and sides are gently bent around a marker pen, then further with small pliers along the fold lines. Match the shape of the cab front, and tack in place with solder.



Fit the back, then fold the bunker using the same methods. Solder joints from the inside and remove excess solder from visible areas with a small chisel, finishing with a fibre pen.

Beading has to be bent and folded to fit around the door. I got as close to the shape as I could and tacked it at the top, working the metal down, soldering as I went.



The rear windows should have horizontal, not vertical bars as per the instructions. These and the front frames can be superglued into place if desired.



The original cab screws to the footplate. By gluing a piece of 60 thou' plastic at the bottom of the bunker and drilling 1mm holes, the original screws can be retained.



Moulded plastic steps aren't as slender as those from RT. These are bent up and soldered. Cosmetic etched strips that represent bolt heads are superglued underneath.



Removal of the original DJM chimney requires brute force and a pair of small pliers to break the glue joint. Don't worry if the part is damaged as it isn't needed.



The RT Giesl base is used as a guide to cut the shape for a 5 thou' plastic strip replacement. Most plastic solvents aren't strong enough, so I'm using some for ABS.

# **■I** Giesl **Ejector**

Invented in 1951 by Austrian engineer, Dr. Adolph Giesl-Gieslingen, the Giesl ejector improves the draughting on steam locomotives by drawing air through a fan shape of small pipes that replace a traditional open chimney. Its inventor claimed a 6-12% reduction in coal and a 20% increase in power. Railway companies using the device - which included East Germany's Deutsche Reichsbahn - paid a licence fee for the privilege. Savings were sometimes less than the fee, resulting in either non-payment or conversion of locomotives back to standard.

On the main line, BR tested 'Battle of Britain' No. 34064 Fighter Command with a Giesl ejector, apparently with appreciable improvements, whereas with '9F' No. 92250 the results were indifferent.

The NCB fitted several 'Austerities' and 'Bagnalls' with Giesls. At Cadley Hill colliery, staff found them easier to clean out, but on the South Shields, Marsden and Whitburn Colliery Railway, crews hated the 'Funkenbanger' as it had to be constantly cleaned to work efficiently. They complained that when the regulator was opened, half the fire would lift from the grate and disappear up the tubes.



Once dry, the plastic is trimmed back to the edges of the saddle tank on the top and front. Model filler is used to complete, also filling the former ladder holes.



Unlike the Hornby model, the DJM Hunslet smokebox top is in the correct location. A stub is provided for a retaining screw. Remove it and glue the tank top to the base.



The Giesl casting is cut down to make it no higher than the cab (8mm), then fixed with superglue. I realised it was leaning forwards, so removed it and re-fitted properly.



BR deco is removed with a paint stripper suitable for plastic as they seem immune to other chemicals. Polishing with a fibre pen works too, but can scratch the surface.



Steps are superglued underneath the footplate where the old versions are cut. New injectors have spigots in the top, so holes have to be drilled in the footplate for them.



Before spraying, masking tape is run inside the cab, which is screwed down. The area under the footplate is covered using aluminium kitchen foil.



Painting starts with a coat of etching car primer. Bare metal must be covered with a fine coat of paint. I ensure it's applied over filler and added parts to hide any gaps.



Using the BRM 'Pro Airbrush' and spray booth - this month's reader offer - a base colour of Humbrol 109 is applied. The colour is bright, but weathering will darken it.



After waterslide transfers are applied, the body is sprayed with satin varnish. Apply several light coats to avoid flooding the body with paint.



Black areas are hand painted with Humbrol 33. Red bufferbeams are brush-painted too. This is easier than masking to spray them individually and works well.



In the spraybooth - vital to extract fumes when spraying indoors - the model is sprayed with a thin mid-brown and rust mix, representing dirt thrown up from the track.



Once dry, black is sprayed along the top for smoke and smuts. A light coat of Humbrol 173 is sprayed. If not cleaned, many things on the railway end up brown.



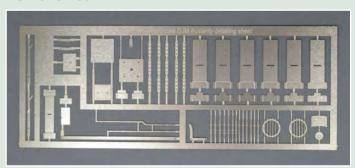
When working, keep turning the wheels with a 9V battery or paint will form clean shadows on the wheels. Don't forget to clean the treads and flanges afterwards!



Dipping a cotton bud in white spirit, dirt can be washed off. Work downwards, replicating the efforts of the locomotive crew wiping their machine with an oily rag.

# I Standard detail

RT Models has released a special detail etch for DJModels' J94/ 'Austerity' which doesn't include cab replacement parts. Most of the parts can be superglued rather than soldered if desired.

Turn the pressure down and lightly repeat the weathering so it appears the locomotive is cared for, but getting dirty. Holding the airbrush further away will give the paint texture.



Tank tops were matt where soot settled. Let matt varnish settle along the top - I'm using an aerosol of Testor's Dullcote - it's the flattest matt varnish I can find.



Where the crew clamber up steps and grab handrails, the paint will wear away - tickle the edges with a nearly dry brush of Humbrol gunmetal (53).



A crew of Monty's Models whitemetal figures are glued into the cab before the top is re-fitted. Lead weight is added to the bunker for a little extra weight.



With the replacement Lambton cab screwed down. handrails made from 0.45mm brass wire are glued either side of the door.



A finishing touch with weathering powders is a rusty patch on the smokebox door where heat has burnt the paint away, followed by more black along the tank top.

ocks aren't something we tend to notice normally; they blend into the background and change little from year to year or with the seasons, unlike organic features such as trees. There are, however, many places where they are the centre of attention, such as the National Trust sites at Brimham Rocks or Malham Cove in Yorkshire.

Formations range in size from small boulders to cliff faces and entire mountain ranges. There are many different types of rock and you should research your location carefully before starting work. The landscape around Blaenau Ffestiniog has been dramatically altered by slate mining.

Although you need to research the type of rock carefully for the area you are modelling, only a few techniques are necessary to model them. They are not difficult to make and because their shapes are irregular, you don't have to be too precise unless there is a certain formation that you just have to model, such as the 'Cow and Calf' on Ilkley Moor.

#### **SUITABLE MATERIALS**

I like to model rocks using a powder filler for the top coating. Although Polyfilla is the best-known brand,

you will find suitable substitutes at lower prices. To reduce weight and simplify construction, I recommend using foam. Many types are available, including expanded/extruded polystyrene, polyurethane, insulation foam and cans of expanding foam. Expanded polystyrene tends to be rather messy and should preferably be cut and shaped using a hot wire cutter. I used some foam offcuts left over from a re-upholstery task. When painting, because subtlety is necessary, I used weathering powders.

If the rock formation is larger than the material you are using then glue it together. Ensure that you use the correct glue and read the instructions carefully to ensure that it will work with your material both to ensure that it will form a good bond and that it won't cause any damage. For the upholstery foam that I used a hot glue gun was suitable.

Although these techniques are quick and easy. If you are really pushed for time, alternative solutions are available. Try using cork bark or even real stone if there are only a few rocks on your layout. If you struggle with shaping, then you can also buy moulds to form rocks from Woodland Scenics. Bear in mind that these will be solid with no foam centre and will therefore weigh more and they'll all be the same shape too.

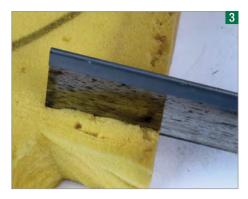
# PRACTICAL BRM I SCENERY I Any Scale



Break the foam into smaller pieces - I found a razor saw ideal for cutting harder and brittle materials or on this spongy foam.



To avoid forming flat surfaces, which look un-natural, start the cut with a razor saw, then rip the piece apart by grabbing each edge and pulling.



Detail the rocks by attacking them with a razor saw. A good way of forming strata is to score a number of parallel cuts close to each other.



Mix filler with water until it is the consistency of double cream. Apply to each piece of foam one at a time using a spatula but it's easier with your fingers. Leave to dry.



Add further detail once your final coat of filler has been added. Cut peaks and remove high points with a file. Add subtle detail using scribes, wire brushes, or toothpicks.



Poke a stick into the foam to use as a handle. Alternatively, you could attach the rock to some card using double sided tape.



Obtain weathering powders in your desired colours, or grate down some charcoal pastel sticks. Rub the powder over the rock. Use a stiff brush to work into the crevices.



Using a brush, add a dilute green/black wash of acrylic paint. You will need to scrub the surface with the brush to get the powder to accept the paint.



Rub in different weathering powders with a brush. Browns, greens and greys work best. Add light grey pastel highlights over the rock detail.



Take an off-white acrylic paint and, using a toothbrush, add random patches to represent lichen. Also, flick the paint at the rocks. Repeat using a light yellow.



If you find your shadows are too dark, your highlights are too bright, or if you've overdone your surface detail, add more base colour to tone it down.



Embed the rocks into your landscape; you don't want daylight showing where they meet the ground. Push the rocks into a bed of filler before it sets then add grass.

# I seven top tips for professional rocks

When sculpting the filler, adding more detail such as fissures will affect the illusion of scale. Therefore, if you're modelling cliffs in 2mm scale, add lots of detail, but if modelling a rock in 7mm scale add little detail

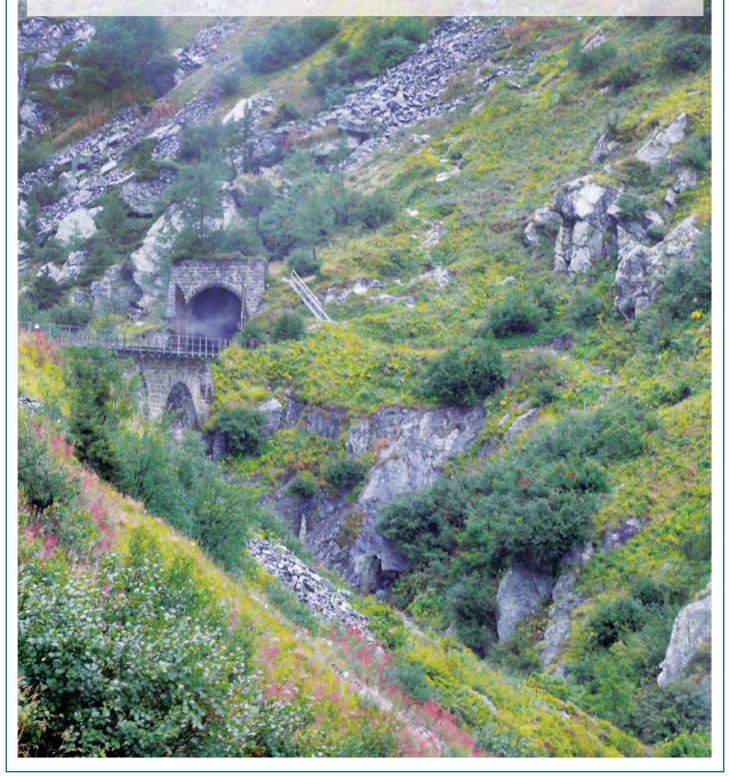
2 Don't make your highlights or shadows too extreme - avoid white or black. Model these with variations of the primary rock colour

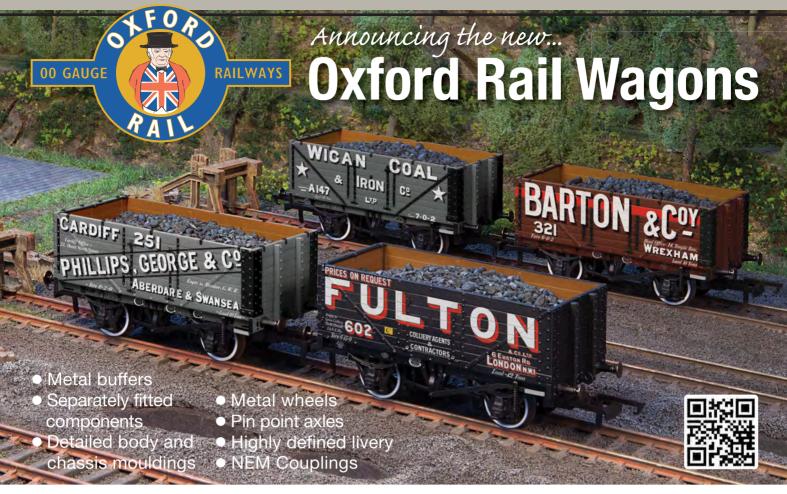
3 Don't forget the effects of weathering - the British climate is damp and the rocks will probably be greener in colour than you might think - especially on the north side where moss and lichen tends to grow

4 Look at the rock formation you are modelling carefully. Would it be easier to model rocks separately, or a single piece of foam carved to look like separate rocks?

Rocks in one formation don't tend to vary much in colour, therefore build your rocks in batches to maintain consistency or be sure to make a careful note of the colours and mixes you used so you can reproduce the same

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Oxford Rail's Mk 3 coaches have made an impressive debut, with the first engineering prototype (EP) samples displaying a high level of accuracy and detail.

Oxford has confirmed that the first two liveries to be offered will be original BR blue/grey and InterCity 'Swift', introduced in May 1987, with three locomotive-hauled vehicles in each guise. BR blue/grey era modellers will get London Midland Region First Open, Tourist Second Open and Restaurant Unclassified Buffet (RUB) vehicles, while the InterCity models will depict FO, TSO and modernised Restaurant First Modular (RFM) coaches for the late-1980s to late-1990s period.

All models feature numerous separate plastic and etched metal parts, most notably on the ends, detailed interiors and elements such as the Central Door Locking (CDL) indicator lights which are specific to certain periods. Oxford has also designed the tooling to depict both original and later style roof end vents. It is hoped to offer interior lighting as standard, although this will depend on whether it can be delivered at an acceptable price. Recommended retail price is expected to be £34.95 when the models are released in the first quarter of 2017.

Development work is also underway on Oxford Rail's next OO gauge model - a GWR Diagram AA1 6w 'Toad' brake van. Sixty-two of these vans were built in 1900-02 for heavy mineral traffic, sharing a body with the standard AA3 4w 'Toad', but ballasted to 24t for extra braking power.

Three versions are planned by Oxford Rail, an early planked GWR version based at Swindon, a later GWR vehicle with metal plating on the lower bodysides

(Bridport) and a BR plated van from Bordesley Junction in Birmingham. RRP is £14.95 and the first releases are expected in the second quarter of 2017.

Also in the pipeline are several new private owner seven-plank wagons, new versions of the LNER sixplank and cattle wagon in LNER and BR colours, an ex-NBR four-plank in LNER grey and a triple pack of weathered BR grey (ex-LNER) six-planks. Weathered and pristine versions of the ex-PO seven-plank will also be offered in BR grey. For full details of the October release programme, see www.oxfordrail.com

For the impending BR 'Carflat' wagon (see page 99), packs of period-specific cars will be offered, priced at £14.95 for four. Cars for the 1960s, 1970s, 1980s and 1990s are planned for release in the final quarter of this year, with the 'Carflats' to follow in early-2017.

Finally, Oxford Rail's first narrow gauge release will be Isle of Man Railway Beyer, Peacock 2-4-0T No. 10 G.H. Wood in 1:76 scale. Originally produced as an exclusive for IoM Transport, the static die-cast model will now go on general release via Oxford stockists.

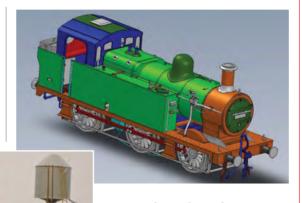

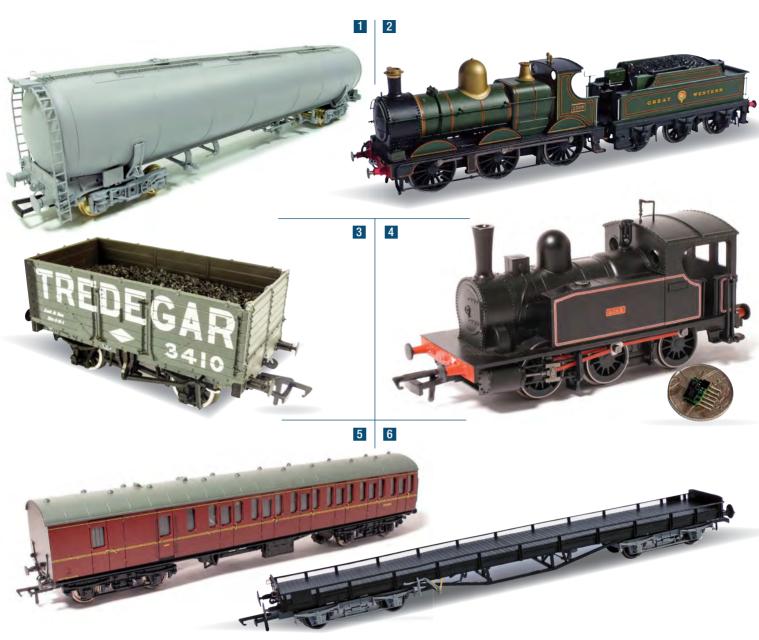

# REVIEWS I BR 1948 ONWARDS I OO Gauge



Bachmann's decision to produce a working Wickham trolley gave its design engineers a real challenge. Andy York looks at the model in detail to see how it has been achieved.

When Bachmann announced in March 2013 that it intended to produce a working model of a Type 27A Wickham Trolley, I wondered if it would just be a novelty item, rather

than a creditable model to the same high standards as the rest of the range. On reflection, it was unfair to have had those doubts. A few compromises have had to be made, but the model is a 'little wonder'.

As British Railways developed after Nationalisation there was a need to provide a more efficient means of transporting permanent way crews, their tools and supplies along the line. Wickham's of Ware in Hertfordshire supplied its first motorised trolleys in 1948 and continued with variations of the design through to 1990. Over 600 were built making the type both numerous and widespread across the whole of the BR network for decades. Many still serve the

same purpose of providing useful transport to working crews on heritage railways as we discovered on the Spring 2016 issue of the **BRM** DVD.

The trolley had the advantage of being a lightweight vehicle that could be easily carried on and off the rails by crews as necessary. A variety of motors was used to power the trolley, one of the most popular was the venerable side-valve engine seen in Ford's Anglia 100E which developed a meagre 36hp but was capable of taking the vehicle up to a heady 30mph. One trolley could easily seat eight to ten workers but space was often taken up with equipment. The trolleys had the capacity to haul a small trailer, but this reduced their passengercarrying capability due to the low power available.

The ability to have a trailer in tow provided Bachmann's engineers with a solution when trying to find space for a motor powerful and reliable enough for a mass market RTR model. There is little or no space for a motor and gears beneath the floor - which is only about two feet above rail level - so the decision was made to include a trailer to accommodate the motor.

As a result, the trolley nicely captures the lightweight, open appearance of the real thing but has a little more bulk below floor level to accommodate the circuit board and a steel chassis to help it stay on the track. The trolley features a planked wooden floor and bench seating. At the front there is an engine cover, the driver's pedals and dials are captured and a very fine windscreen wiper.

A headlamp is situated towards the bottom of the windows although prototype photographs show that these were fixed in various positions on the real thing, so there's an easy opportunity for the modeller to slightly change the outward appearance. At the lower edge of the steel roof there is a representation of the tarpaulin sides gathered up. These would be lowered when the trolley

wasn't in use but there are images of trolleys in use with tarpaulins down in various permutations.

The trolley and trailer are permanently attached with a bar and the necessary wiring. A small coreless motor sits beneath the ballast load in the trailer driving the leading axle. Both wheels on the driven axle have a traction tyre and two spares are included in the package. The model has brass wipers to collect current from all eight wheels which assists its running over point frogs - a major challenge for anything this small!

Although the decoration of both the maroon and yellow versions is plain and simple it is well executed. The trailer would benefit from a little more variety in the ballast colouration, something which the modeller can achieve by adding some ballast granules or paint treatment.

#### **TRACK TESTING**

Our review sample arrived the day before our Peterborough exhibition, giving us an ideal opportunity to test the trolley on Phil Parker's 'Ruston Quays' layout. This uses a Gaugemaster shuttle unit for the upper level and DCC for the lower. Both samples ran faultlessly for several hours, scuttling backwards and forwards and over the pointwork. The instruction sheet supplied with the model suggests that one hour's running-in in each direction is necessary.

Our model was smooth out of the box but became more controllable at very slow speeds after thorough running-in. It has been subsequently tested across short radius insulfrog pointwork without any sign of electrical or mechanical hesitation. To facilitate reliable performance over 'train set' trackwork, the wheels are slightly larger than scale and the tyre width may be a little wider than finescale standards - not ideal, but a sensible compromise.

The size of this model means there's no

space for a DCC interface, although we're sure it will be straightforward to directly wire a small decoder (such as the CTElectronik DCX75) and re-work the trailer load to accomodate. A note warns users not to use the model as an analogue item on DCC systems as the coreless motor can be damaged the DCC signal.

It's a lovely little model which can justify its presence on a good layout and has been produced to a high standard. It is certainly worthy of the effort expended in overcoming the many design challenges.

In the year that we mark the 30th anniversary of Network SouthEast, Bachmann has released several models in N and OO carrying the sector's unmistakable blue, white

and red livery. Perhaps the most significant of these is arriving at Bachmann stockists now. It's significant, not just because it's the first version of the Class 101 DMU to have DCC sound, but also because it's one of the first British outline models to have factory-fitted passengers.

Sections of the modelling community have been calling for seated figures inside coaches and multiple units for some years, but the cost of the figures, and of installing them, was always regarded as a deterrent. However, this NSE '101' is one of several items in Bachmann's 2016 range to feature this development (see page 99). While you need to look closely to see the passengers in detail, their presence certainly eliminates the 'ghost train' effect we see on standard models - from that point of view it's an immediate improvement.

The figures are nicely decorated, featuring a good mixture of men and women, some reading newspapers or magazines, scattered throughout the two vehicles.

I WORDS Ben Jones I PHOTOGRAPHY Andy York A total of 24 passengers (plus a driver in the DMBS cab) represents a reasonable off-peak load for a two-car DMU. Based on HO/OO figures of similar quality from the likes of Noch and Preiser, costing around £1 each, the figures add around £25-£30 of extra value.

Full RRP for the '101' is £269.95 - £30 more than the current price for a Bachmann diesel locomotive with DCC sound - not bad when you consider that it's a twocar unit with additional features. It looks like even better value when you realise that the other new Class 101 for 2016 (in refurbished BR white/blue), DCC Ready and without passengers, has an RRP of £199.95.

Decoration is excellent throughout - Bachmann's designers and its factory really have 'nailed' the application of this complicated livery. The set is presented as a Cambridge power-trailer set formed of Driving Motor Brake Second (DMBS) 51444 and Driving Trailer Composite Lavatory (DTCL) 54068. The destination blinds read 'Cambridge' and 'Royston' - a regular CA Class 101 duty before electrification to the university city was completed in 1988.

Our sample gave a good account of a first generation BR DMU, combining convincing engine sounds with a

selection of other noises including the guard-to-driver communication buzzer, horn sounds and door slam. Pressing F8 changes the engine sound to coasting mode. To get the most from the engine sounds, the model needs to be actively 'driven', switching in and out of coasting mode when appropriate.

Interior LED lights are fitted to both saloons and can be switched on or off using F0, or manually using the sliding switches underneath each car. Exterior lights include marker and tail lights, plus illuminated destination blinds, also controlled using F0. A detailed instruction sheet gives all the necessary information and should be studied before you start running the model.

While Bachmann's '101' wasn't universally admired when first released, it's undoubtedly the best OO gauge model we've ever had of this widely-used DMU. The addition of a sound version and the inclusion of factory-fitted passengers make it an even more compelling package for the Sectorisation era modeller.

ne of a very small number of Mk 1 BGs to carry NSE colours, 92354 represents a vehicle used on Thames & Chiltern locomotive-hauled trains radiating from London Paddington in the late-1980s and early-1990s. Use with Old Oak Common Class 47s and 50s (in NSE and many other liveries), Bachmann NSE Mk 1s and vacuum-braked NSE Mk 2s, or add it to post-1990 mail trains for an extra splash of colour.

Another attractively packaged OO gauge train pack from Bachmann continues the NSE 30th anniversary theme, pairing the excellent '2-EPB' EMU with a typical Southern Region art deco station building dressed up in post-1986 NSE colours. Also included are two Scenecraft straight platform sections, a pack of five postcards, certificate of authenticity and a reproduction Network Card ticket and holder. It's clear that a great deal of thought and preparation has gone into putting this pack together and the end result will appeal to NSE fans and collectors alike.

I first took photographs of Dapol's N gauge A4 when it appeared in early-2013, commenting on it being a fine representation of this iconic class. The initial release was No. 60017 Silver Fox in BR green. Despite a couple of

flaws, overall it was still a fine model, even including (never before in N?) the drive for the lubricators off the rear offside crank pin.

This latest manifestation goes back to earlier times in the life of the class, representing LNER No. 4490 Empire of India in 1937 'as-built' condition. No. 4490 was one of five A4s built for the inauguration of the streamlined 'Coronation' express that year. Named after countries of the British Commonwealth, they were turned out in garter blue with red wheels (the first A4s in this livery). All had corridor tenders, some built specifically for the locomotives and others transferred secondhand from A1/A3s. The new ones were streamlined with bow ends and no beading and the secondhand ones flat-backed with beading. All had a strip welded to the base of the tanks to take a decorative stainless steel strip. This adornment was also carried along the bottom edge of the locomotive valances, complementing the simple, parabolic lining between the black front and the blue sides. Stainless steel Gill Sans numerals and letters completed the job along with the countries' armorial devices/coats of arms carried on the cabsides. No. 4490 (along with *Dominion of Canada*) received a secondhand tender. In turn, garter blue became the standard livery for all the A4s pre-1939, though not all had the stainless steel embellishments.

Dapol has represented this livery very well indeed, capturing the simple elegance of it superbly. The numerals and letters are not in relief, but this would be negligible in this scale. The printing is superlative

indeed and the representation of the stainless steel strips and Indian coat of arms, perfect. The whole colour scheme sits delightfully on the model, which, according to the drawings at my disposal is just about as spot-on as one can get in 2mm:1ft scale.

There is debate about whether the red should extend to the wheel rims or they should be burnished. Prototype examples exist of both. Etched nameplates are fitted, though they're not as crisp as other 2mm examples I've photographed. Correctly, they are painted with red backgrounds. Also correctly, a 1928 corridor tender is attached. However, as with the first release, there is a chimney anomaly. Only four A4s carried double Kylchap chimneys in LNER days. These were Mallard, Capercaillie, Seagull and Peregrine. BR began fitting double chimneys to the rest of the class from 1957. In this guise then, No. 4490 should have a single chimney. I have no record of any of the surviving six A4s ever masquerading as 'Empire' in preservation, so we must assume this model represents it as-built. That being the case, the tender buffer stocks should be black,

However, I think it's the representation of the valve gear (or non-representation) which disappoints the most. On Dapol A4s without valances, all the gear is present - not just the combination lever and union link but expansion link, eccentric rod and eccentric crank as well - as well as that lovely lubricator drive. All the latter-mentioned components of Walschaerts valve gear are omitted on this version. Granted, at top dead-centre, much is hidden behind the valances, but it's clearly evident at bottom dead-centre. This is a return to the original Hornby-Dublo idea of 70 years ago, and is unacceptable in my view on such an otherwise fine, 21st century model. In order to clear the leading crank pin, the connecting rods have a pronounced joggle.

As before, the motor is located in the tender body, driving the locomotive via a prop' shaft and universal

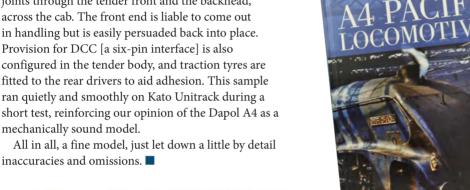

joints through the tender front and the backhead, across the cab. The front end is liable to come out in handling but is easily persuaded back into place. Provision for DCC [a six-pin interface] is also configured in the tender body, and traction tyres are fitted to the rear drivers to aid adhesion. This sample ran quietly and smoothly on Kato Unitrack during a short test, reinforcing our opinion of the Dapol A4 as a mechanically sound model.



This beautifully presented hardback volume adds yet another chapter to the story of this iconic locomotive type. I doubt if any other class has received more attention, so what does this latest book add to the ongoing story of Gresley's masterpiece? For a start, there's a comprehensive chapter covering the years between 1963 and 2015, with reference to the six surviving A4s. When one considers that their respective lives in preservation are now far, far longer than in LNER or BR ownership, then that part of the story is not insignificant. It is accurate and comprehensive and useful for 'postkettle' era modellers.

> The history in general revenueearning service is also accurate and comprehensive, though much of

what's written has been said before. Many of the photographs have (inevitably) been published before but there are several I haven't seen before, including some very fine ones taken by Bill Reed showing examples in BR Brunswick green. I haven't seen the black and white shot of Silver Link being broken up at Doncaster Works before, astonishinaly nine months after its withdrawal. All the images have been reproduced beautifully and show all the variations among the 35 locomotives. In the main, captions are informative and accurate. However, I think extended captions describing details would have been an even greater assistance to modellers; subtleties such as tender detail differences, cylinder drain cocks, AWS, front guard irons and so forth - all invaluable for getting a model right for a given period. More might also have been made in describing the stock hauled by the class. For instance, the magnificent pressure-ventilated carriages forming the 'Flying Scotsman' on page 55, or the steel-sided Gresley twins behind No. 4492 on page 57. That said, anyone interested in learning more about the stock will find a feast of variety to enjoy time after time. In fairness, I can find only one 'real' error in a caption; that describing the shot on page 128, taken at Llandudno Junction on the August 28 1991 where No. 60009 is described as Union of South Africa. For 'political' reasons at the time, the name carried temporarily was Osprey; I was on the train in question. There has never been a book on the A4s which brings the story so up to date. Most usually finish when the final survivors were taken out of BR service. Certainly, many do not have such a comprehensive coverage of illustrations, so well-presented. Even though (like me, as far as I know) you've probably got every book published on the A4s already, this high-quality volume should be on your library shelves as well. It's well written, well presented, well printed and well worth it. I recommend it. (Tony Wright)







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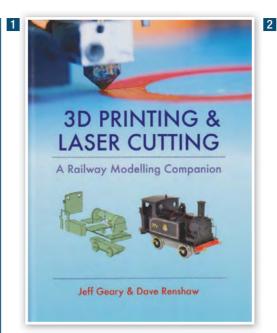
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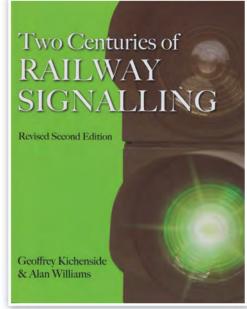
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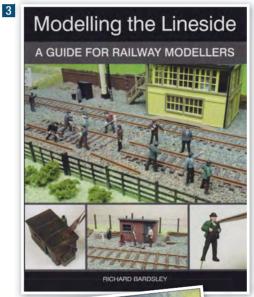
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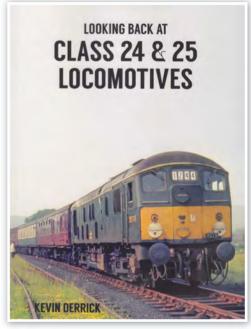

This popular BRM project layout captures an imaginary - but convincing slice of the West Midlands at a time when BR blue was king.

he construction of 'Black Country Blues' was serialised in **BRM** through 2012 and 2013 and recorded in real time on **RMweb** with its own dedicated area (www.rnnweb.co.uk/BCB). This brought contributions from members with memories of the area and its culture, prototype information (especially specific workings), and practical contributions from lineside huts to road vehicles and larger buildings. The project developed its own life and impetus, taking longer than the original 12 months to build, but was the better for it.

The proposal was to produce a slice of the 'Black Country' with a secondary route through typical 1970s scenery. The team reproduced several key structures from the early railways, adhering to principles laid down in the Railway Clauses Acts. The project was a success, not just measured by the destination or end result shown here, but because of the journey the team took. It seemed a simple enough concept - a challenge to construct an exhibition layout against a defined budget but, as with all best plans, it grew beyond that, not just in size but in the size of its team.

The typical scenes from around the 'Black Country' were not necessarily achieved by reproducing specific structures, but through placing items in proximity and including small details. Those who travelled the railways of the area at that time will be familiar with polluted canals bereft of leisure activities, mile after mile of industry from steelworks, indeterminate light industry dependent on the output of the region, relics of previous industrial activity and acres of seemingly abandoned greenery. It was this environment the team sought to capture rather than an identifiable station location.

The layout breaks away from the traditional conventions of passenger services with a station and includes a secondary freight-only route with exchange sidings for an offscene steelworks, celebrating the mundane rather than glamour.

The anonymity of the whole strangely defines what the model is. It could be

Josh wanted to create a realistic layout that was enjoyable to operate. He had acquired a 'job lot' of Great Western rolling stock for a price he couldn't refuse. A branch line terminus seemed a good idea. The most important aspect of a GWR terminus for Josh appeared to be a simple run round facility, large enough to run round his longest train. Sidings for a small coal yard, goods shed and locomotive shed would then follow.

When designing a track plan, he avoided overcrowding, building the station on a curve for visual effect, giving him room for a small tender locomotive to use the platform headshunt. Trackwork on the main board is Peco code 75 with SMP flexitrack and a hand-built point on the creamery board.

Soon after the layout was running, he was invited to exhibit at a local village Nottingham shows, with the layout currently undergoing a refurbishment model railway exhibition. It resulted in invites to Southwold, Warley and

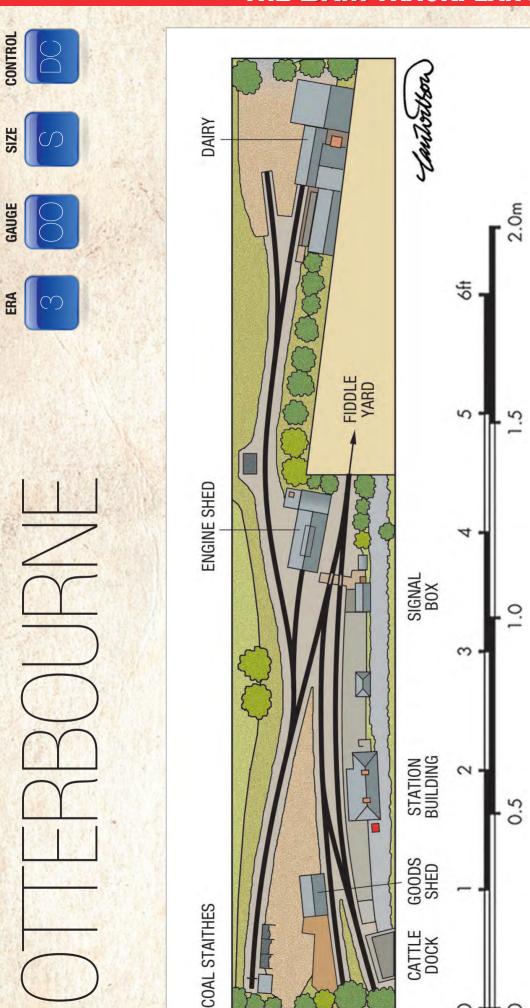

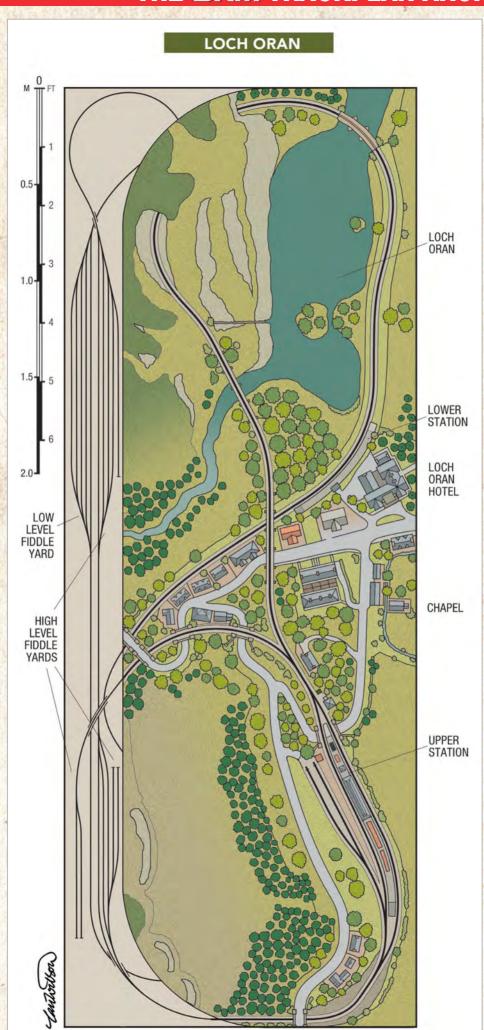

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## OPINION I INDUSTRY INSIDER

Industry Insider welcomes Hornby's change of attitude towards its retail customers but expresses reservations about its new trading terms.



Around four years ago a collection of individuals at Hornby believed that they had the answers to making the company profitable again. Some had no doubt gleaned their expertise from US business gurus but for all their worth if they had simply improved the supply situation the results could have been very different.

The 2012 Olympic debacle did not help from a financial point of view, but producing models as and when promised would have been the key to success. Those in the 'trade', from the humblest magazine editor to the largest model railway retailer recognised this simple solution; get the supply right and the rest will fall

However, as we've seen, rather than tackling the core issue, people who had no experience in the model industry set about not only dismantling Hornby's internal infrastructure, but systematically alienating retailers by reducing their trade margin. At the same time they used the Hornby website to undercut stockists and sell Hornby models direct - often at massive

Unsurprisingly, those retailers started to desert the Margate company in droves, leading to a massive loss in the last financial year. The groans of its frustrated shareholders could only be heard above the tears of despair from Hornby employees. Eventually the penny dropped that, perhaps, their strategy may not be working and it was time for a different approach. Judging by the latest statement from new Hornby CEO Steve Cooke, that is exactly what has happened.

Mr Cooke was appointed in the Spring and more new people have been brought in while many of those who created the mayhem were either sidelined or left the company. With this wind of change sweeping from the top down and stakeholders trying to work out where Hornby's problems lay, someone eventually stumbled on the solution of asking the retailers.

Could it be so simple? Surely Hornby's situation could not be solved just by consulting model railway retailers? But it was, with the result that the company recently distributed a statement to all stockists highlighting that margins would be returned to the industry standard [around 33%] and that Hornby would refrain from slashing prices on its website. Unusually, it also asked retailers to abstain from discounting new Hornby product for a period of time. Not an unreasonable request one would have thought, until you really analyse what Hornby is actually promising its battered stockists.

It's wonderful news that margins have been returned to something like the norm.

However, it seems that with the promise of Hornby selling direct from its website at full RRP it is asking retailers to do the same rather than discount.

Being slightly cynical, if that were to happen I wonder if Hornby would be tempted to hold back new models from

> general distribution in favour of its own site? I am also concerned that it has not given an unequivocal assurance that it will not go back to heavy discounting on direct sales via its website, especially if the end of the financial year looms and it needs to cover a shortfall in turnover. I'm told that there is still a regular factory

sale of Hornby product at Margate, with massive discounts. Great

> news for the modeller, but dire for Hornby stockists within 80 miles of Margate.

I welcome Hornby's efforts to repair the damage it has wrought on its retailers but if I were a stockist I would be looking for more concrete assurances. Has the leopard changed its spots? I truly hope so, but even as I write this an e-mail arrives from Hornby asking me to preorder its new Wainwright 'H' Class direct from the manufacturer.
