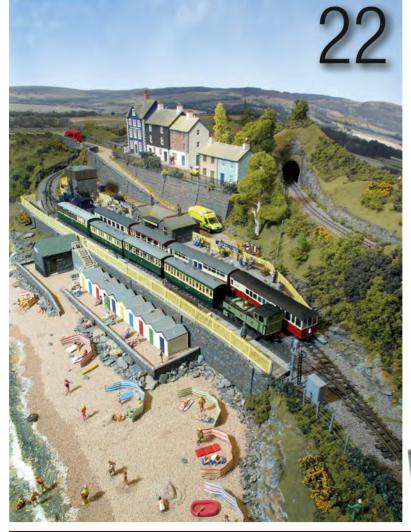


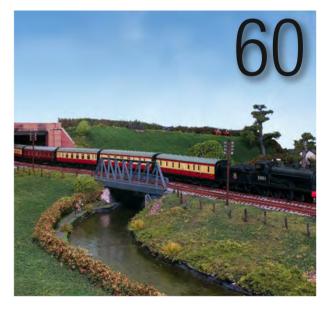


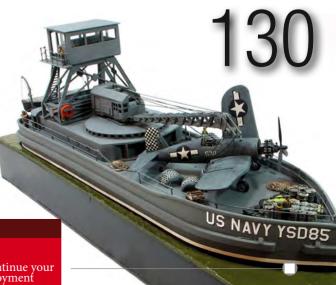
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# Welcome

I decided to model a fictitious preserved tourist railway set somewhere in North Wales. As a result, I could run a wide range of locomotives and rolling stock

y interest in narrow gauge developed after attending the Narrow Gauge South exhibition at Sparsholt College in 2004. Features that particularly appealed to me were the tight radius curves and fairly steep gradients, which looked, and were, so realistic. As the narrow gauge railways of mid and North Wales are so attractive, and the surrounding scenery really magnificent, I decided to model a fictitious preserved tourist railway set somewhere in North Wales. As a result, I could run a wide range of locomotives and rolling stock representing a number of British and overseas railways.

Inspiration for the layout comes from a variety of places that mean something to me. For example, Llanddarog station was inspired by Tan-y-Bwlch on the Ffestiniog. Many will recognise the café, parking area, road overbridge, footbridge etc, but they are set in different positions on the model to fit the chosen trackplan. The girder bridges across the estuary remind me of the standard gauge structures that span the Camel Estuary near Padstow, Cornwall, which was a regular holiday destination for our family.

The name 'Clydach' was selected from a range of possibilities that I found in a road atlas of Wales!

#### Layout design

From the start, I wanted to create a model that would appeal to a wider audience. It's not just for those who are crazy about all things narrow gauge!

I wanted to include some basic features, including:

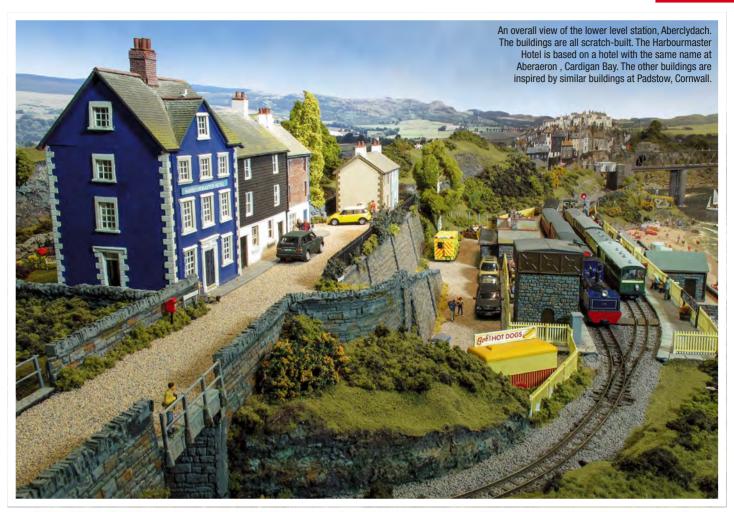
- · A continuous circuit with at least two passing loops.
- · Inclines, so that trains could pass over and under each other.
- A simple trackplan with a limited number of points to maximize reliability.
- · Varied scenery, including a beach, an estuary, hills and countryside.
- Curves of a minimum radius of 12in.
- A system allowing at least two trains that could be operated independently and simultaneously, giving plenty of train movements to entertain the visitors at exhibitions.

The trackplan is a simple figure of eight, with two passing loops where the stations are positioned. Instead of having a traditional fiddle yard, I have included six hidden storage loops.

### **LAYOUT FOCUS**

The Garratt 'Edward Douglas' on the lower level is a Golden Arrow white metal kit running on two N-Drive 0-4-0 chassis. The Garratt crossing the bridge 'Jacob George' is based on a Ceylon Government Railways prototype. The body was built from scratch by Paul Windle, and painted and lined by Richard. It runs on two 0-6-0 Avalon Lines chassis. Four of the Garratts are named after Richard's grandsons, Oliver, Jacob, Edward and Peter



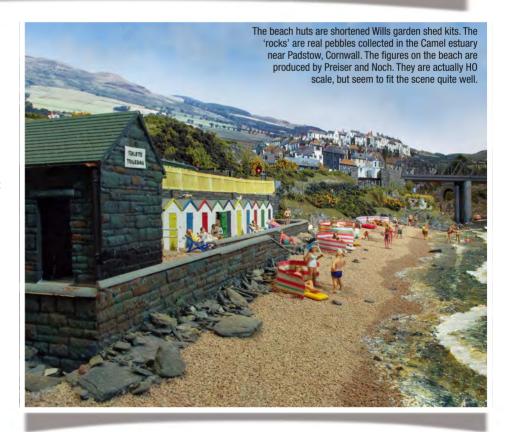


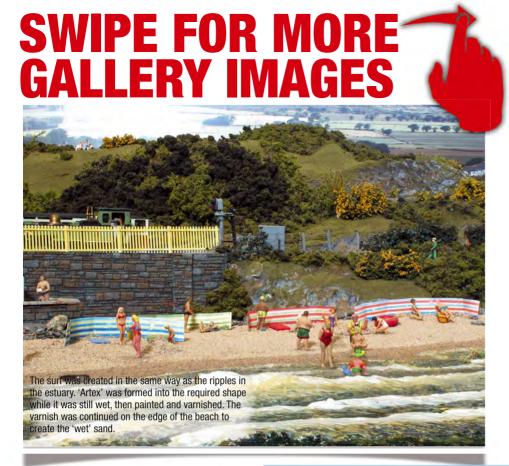
#### Rolling stock

Most coaches are kit-built using either plastic or brass. I usually use Kato N Gauge underframes and bogies for the stock, as I find the running qualities are much better than using the bogies and wheels supplied with the kits. The Welsh Highland Railway freight wagons were created using resin kits supplied by Rob Waller. Locomotives are also largely kit-built, but a couple have been scratch-built. These, and some of the kit-built loco bodies, run on N Gauge chassis from a variety of manufacturers. Painting was done by hand using simple artists' brushes and lining on the locomotives was added using water-slide decals produced by Fox Transfers. Two of the Beyer-Garratt locos were built for me by the late Peter Wallace using Backwoods Miniature kits. The finished locos are great examples of Peter's skill. For extra interest I always add passengers to the coaching stock and loco crew to all engines.

#### Analogue control

Many people comment on the smooth running of the trains and assume that I am



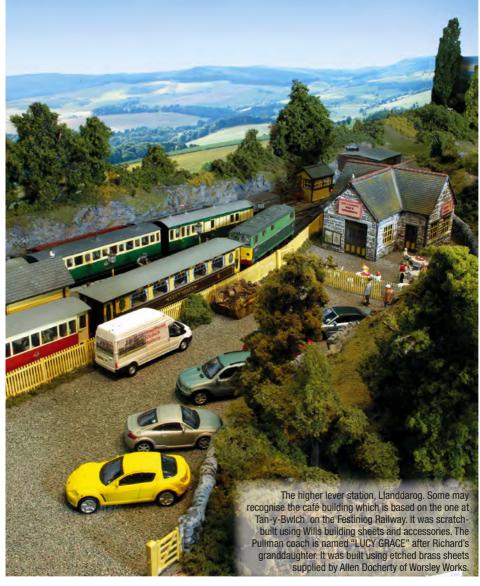


using modern DCC equipment. I actually use Hammant & Morgan Walkabout analogue inertia controllers, running through Gaugemaster electronic track cleaners. These give smooth and reliable slow control, even though they are nearly forty years old! I have not found a better modern equivalent. I did take great care when laying the track and tested everything very thoroughly before any of the scenic work was started. All track is Peco 009. The sides of the rails were painted a dark brown before the track was ballasted. I prefer this to the 'rust' colours that are available, which to my eyes are too 'orange' and bright. SEEP PM1 point motors were used on the scenic boards and Peco side-mounted solenoids were used on the fiddleyard board. The lower level (including the storage loops), and the incline up to the higher level station, Llanddarog, are all controlled by one operator, whilst the higher level track, including the section

#### The Estuary



The most frequent question at exhibitions is "What did you use to create the water in the estuary?" Firstly, the whole area was covered in a layer of 'Artex,' which was stippled with a 1" paintbrush to create a ripple effect. When thoroughly dry, the area was painted using acrylics, using dark blue in the centre and fading to a slightly lighter blue/green at the edges to help create an illusion of depth. The whole area was finished with seven coats of high-gloss exterior varnish, always ensuring that each coat was thoroughly dry before the next coat was applied.

that descends to Aberclydach station, is controlled by a second operator. All of the track in both stations can be controlled by either of the operators by flipping doublepole/double throw switches. These switches also have a 'centre-off' position so that any of the tracks in the station areas can be isolated. The storage loops are isolated by switching the points. I have included one double-pole/ double throw switch, which enables the whole layout to be controlled by one operator if necessary.

#### **Buildings and Scenery**

Almost all buildings are scratch-built using card or foam-board. Wills building sheets were used to provide textures on walls and roofs. Other details were applied before being painted. Woodland Scenics Sub-Terrain products were installed for the track inclines. I used professionally produced photographic backscenes, but superimposed some of my own photos. An example of this technique is behind the estuary bridge, where photos of the harbour at Mevagissey in Cornwall were added. I used a very wide selection of

materials and colours to create groundcover, trees and bushes. I was careful to ensure that the colours of the modelled scenes closely matched the colour and shape of the background scenes. I love including lots of details, which people always seem to really appreciate.

#### Compromises

I have always regretted that the passing loops on Clydach are fairly short and can only accommodate trains of up to four large Welsh Highland-style coaches when being hauled by a Garratt. The same can be said of the hidden storage loops. However, with any layout there are compromises. If loops were any longer, the whole concept of keeping at least two trains moving all the time might have been lost. All the baseboards have been constructed using 9mm ply. If I was starting again, I would probably use a thinner grade of ply for the top surfaces. Whilst the 9mm thickness is sturdy, it is heavy. Also, if the boards were just a few centimetres narrower, they could be carried horizontally through standard doorways!

#### Learned skills

People often say that they would never have the skills to create a model like Clydach. I would have said the same back in the 1990s, and until 2009 I had never attempted building any rolling stock using brass etches. I am grateful to Stephen Sullivan and other members of the Beds & Bucks 009 Group for the help and advice they offered at a soldering workshop they organised in January 2009. Stephen used a Worsley Works brass etch 'scratch-aid' kit as a demonstration piece and managed to get about two-thirds of the coach constructed in the time available. This gave me the confidence to finish the model myself, and that coach still runs on Clydach today, along with many others that I built later.

I have learned a lot from other members of The 009 Society and I would recommend anyone considering modelling narrow gauge railways in the smaller scales to join. Never be afraid to try something new. You will be surprised what you can achieve.

#### Meet the modeller

Clydach was my first narrow gauge exhibition layout. I had built home based narrow gauge systems previously. Like many modellers my interest in model railways started early. At the age of five, I was given a Hornby Dublo three-rail goods train set and was hooked. Several layouts were built with my father to fit in my bedroom. Now in my seventies, I live in Somerset having recently moved from Oxfordshire. I have always been interested in model railways and built a large 00 scale layout in a loft space of our house when living in Bristol. Later, when our children were young, I built another large 00 scale layout in the garage of our

home in Warwickshire. This included a short narrow gauge line as a feeder to one of the standard gauge stations. As family and work pressures increased, there was little time for the hobby, so it was when I retired in 2003 that I really developed my modelling skills. I joined the 009 Society and learned a lot from other members. Through the Society I have made many wonderful new friends, and several regularly help operate my layouts at exhibitions. Clydach was first exhibited in 2010 and has appeared at 37 shows around the country. My second exhibition layout, Wantage Narrow Gauge Tramway was first exhibited in 2012 and has attended 29 shows. I was delighted when Clydach and Wantage were awarded the David Glascott Award for the 'Best Narrow Gauge Layout' when exhibited at the Warley Exhibition at the NEC in 2014 and 2015, respectively. Over the years, Clydach has been awarded a number of 'Best in Shows'. My latest exhibition layout is a scale model of Launceston Steam Railway and was first shown in February 2017. Launceston was later awarded the David Glascott Trophy when it appeared at the 2017 Warley Exhibition.

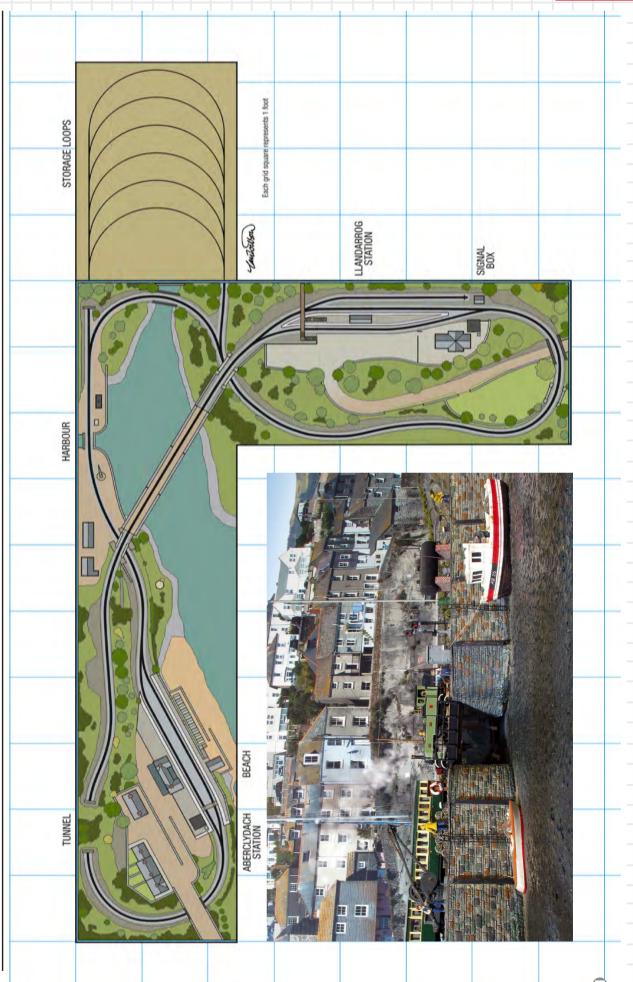

# THE CLYDACH RAILWAY

have always found trees the most difficult to get right. Sea moss was a great discovery, and its use has enabled me to get the 'feel' of trees. Then I saw the model railway 'County Gate'. I bought his 'Scenic Modelling' book and thought this would be the route for me to follow.

I currently have nearly 300 sea moss trees of various sizes on my layout. It is y feeling that we, as modellers of the English landscape, never put enough trees on our layouts to make them look convincing. Look at any photograph of a train going through the countryside and the number of trees visible is amazing. Hence my latest venture into the world of tree-building.

After receiving several requests, here is a step-by-step guide on how I now build my 'prime' trees. By this, I mean those trees that stick out, stand alone or are placed in front of a wood and such. 'Secondary' trees, so to speak, are still made from sea moss.



I use a blended flock for the foliage, as this gives different shades of green and looks more effective on the sprigs. I find that firm, or extra firm hairspray helps to fix the flock to the sea moss sprigs. Photo mount and other spray glues also work, of course.



#### Obtain the armatures

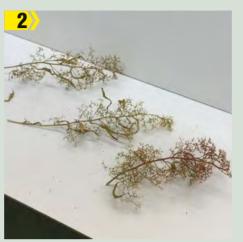
The armatures are a natural product from a sage brush bush, which grows mainly in the desert areas of the USA. They can be costly to buy, especially with the postage, but a friend went to Florida and obtained some for me. The effects can be stunning, though, as the trunks look incredibly realistic, and no work is required on them other than trimming.

A good idea is to microwave each armature for around 30 seconds, as this will kill any bugs in them. It's a natural plant, after all, and you don't know what you might end up 'infecting' your layout with!

#### **Building the tree**



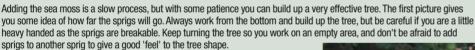
This is the sage brush straight out of the box. Each piece is usually 4in - 6in tall. The next stage is to trim it in preparation for the addition of sprigs and leaves.



The sea moss comes in small bunches. It is trimmed to give sprigs. I find that a small scissors with curved blade is very useful









Spray the tree with your preferred paint. Spray upwards and turn the tree as you're working. In view of the mess and the smell, I tend to work outside for this stage

By using the accelerator the glue sets immediately and goes a white cloudy colour. A face mask and goggles are sensible, as the accelerator can be dangerous if inhaled. As such, a ventilated room is also a good idea.



Don't rush this bit - work on small areas at a time, and spray your tree with hairspray/glue then sprinkle flock on those sprayed areas. Do this slowly to build up the foliage, and knock off any unwanted flock as you proceed. Be prepared to go back over areas to give the effect you're after. Clean any flock off the trunk with a paintbrush. When finished, give the tree one good spray all over to hold everything in place.



My tree is planted on the layout just behind the farm house and next to the pig sty! Pre-drill a suitable sized hole in your board, place the tree in it but don't glue it yet. Trees, like any plant in your garden, will have their good sides so be prepared to turn yours around in its desired location to get it looking the best. Finally, fix it in place with any normal PVA glue.

This tree took me about 2½ hours to build, including the photo shoot. You can also see a version of the same build in my cakebox challenge diorama 'Long Walk Home' (BRM January). Happy tree building!

# Cakebox

Here's another brace of cakeboxes for your delight and delectation. Cakeboxes are proliferating on RMWeb, and even beyond, but what will you build?

**Entry Name:** 'In the Dock' **Modeller:** Andrew Cockburn

Scale: 4mm:1ft

This is my first entry in the BRM cakebox challenge, deriving its name from the fact that it features part of a goods yard loading dock. The diorama's base was formed from mounting card, while the same material was used to form the loading dock substructure, which was then covered with fine sandpaper for the road surface. The walls are Metcalfe stone sheet, and the grounded van body/store is an old Hornby goods wagon. The hut and crane are Ratio/Wills kits respectively, and the lorry is an Oxford Diecast model. The diorama incorporates two cameo scenes - the lorry being loaded with crates from a goods wagon, also the workman busying himself on a section of abandoned track. n



Here's 'In the dock' when I first started work on it, i.e. a plain piece of 8in x 8in white card which formed the



I then proceeded to lay the tracks, one of which still serves the loading dock, and the other which has seen better days!

#### **RMweb**

You've managed to get a quite a bit in that small space and it appears to me to be deceptively larger than what it is, nice work.

The 'matchstick-like' objects on the left represent sleepers/supports and are formed from strips of balsa on which will rest the van body/store. I've also installed a stone wall at the rear, and painted the sleepers/rails a sort of grimy colour in preparation for it being ballasted. It's starting to look a bit more like a loading dock/goods yard. The next tasks are to do a bit more weathering/painting, plus the addition of other small details.



The dock takes shape. First of all with formers/supports/foundations made from 2in x 1in offcuts, then the walls, which are formed from the same white card as used for the base.



Of course, no goods yard/loading dock scene would be complete without some appropriate road/rail traffic, as well as coarse manual labour. This model shows a fairly busy scene, in which the yard crane is loading crates from a newlyarrived goods van onto the waiting artic, while in the foreground, and in spite of the efforts of the workman, nature appears to be making a determined attempt to reclaim the abandoned track section. Also, 'Tibbles' the cat can be seen observing goings-on intently from the roof of the grounded/storage van, possibly also looking out for something suitable for lunch.

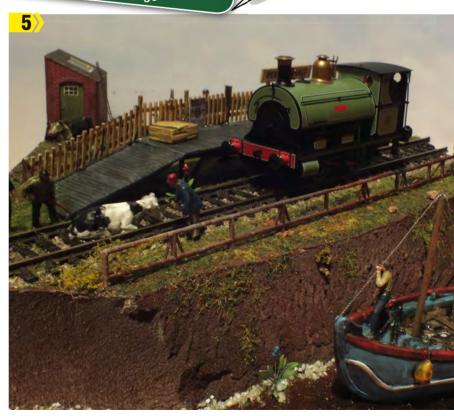

## **CHAPEL RISE**



In October my wife Stacy was discussing Christmas decorations and said she'd like a winter-themed model railway to sit in front of our fireplace during Christmas. It was the green light I required. I instantly went out to the garage and found a bit of wood which happened to be the correct size.

She named the layout 'Chapel Rise' because she liked the name and we live on a road called Chapel Lane.

With the track laid, the next step was the buildings. The row of shops and church were both scratch-built from Plastikard and weathered, then lit. The church is based on the one in the next village to me. Then my wife decided that she wanted a white cottage, so a quick scratch-build one evening resulted in a low relief cottage. Time was tight, so the station building is a resin-cast structure from Bachmann,

however, again I added lights and detail inside.

All the road vehicles are white metal kits built and weathered. The road is laid in clay and the hill is made from foam with plaster bandage over it. Then static grass was used.

The back scene is from ID and works well with the theme. The goal was to have a locomotive run slowly back and forth automatically. I opted for a DCC shuttle by www.blocksignalling.co.uk.

One of the large trees outside the church needed Christmas lights, so 24 micro LEDs were used. My wife held the LEDs and I did the soldering. Then, for the moment of truth, the snow. I didn't want it to be deep so that some ground cover could poke through. I used Deluxe Materials scenic snow and extra hold hairspray.

My children then asked where was Santa, so to keep the family happy he appeared on the station. **James Styles** 

# SAVE YOUR STOCK



I have 20 Bachmann 16 Ton mineral wagons and one brake van as part of the operating fleet for my layout 'Summat Colliery' (November 2013 **BRM**). They were originally stored in their individual boxes and could take half an hour to pack and unpack at a show. The boxes also had to be stored in another box for transport.

I took delivery of a laptop cooler at work – a metal device with two cooling fans that sits under a laptop computer and was about to throw away the box when an idea occurred to me. The box was just about the right height to become a storage box for my wagons. I turned the box inside out, then cut the bottom section off the clear plastic inserts from the wagon boxes. These were glued using UHU glue to the base of the cooler box. Sufficient space was left so that the wagons did not touch each other. Closed cell foam that originally surrounded the cooler was glued to the underside of the lid so that it pressed down on the tops of the wagons holding them in place.

I now have a handy container for all the wagons and brake van that only needs five minutes to pack and unpack. The wagons are only secured by their chassis and top faces, so the weathering on the sides is untouched in transit. A similar approach could be taken to locomotive storage using the latest generation of locomotive boxes.

# **ON/OFF OR OFF/ON?**



I guess that **BRM** can justifiably claim to entertain, inform and educate. In most respects, the article on building a signal box interior (November 2017 **BRM**) fulfilled that claim but for one error. In all signal boxes, the levers are normally parked away from the signalman in the off position. Levers are only pulled towards the signalman when reversing points or pulling off signals to clear for the next train movement. One would always expect just a minority of levers to be pulled to the forward position at any one time. Phil's model is the opposite of this - I hope a correction can be published for the sake of historical accuracy.

**Phil Parker replies:** Paul, thanks for your comments on my signal box build. It's nice that someone is paying attention. I can't disagree that the levers are incorrectly positioned, but they were assembled into the frame upside down. The first few ended up on rather than off because I hadn't spotted the problem. I could have dunked them in nail varnish remover to break the superglue, but the levers don't show in photographs when seen from the front of the box.

# REDFORD JUNCTION

Large layouts often have quite modest beginnings, but Paul Hopkins' imagined scene started out as just a single board.

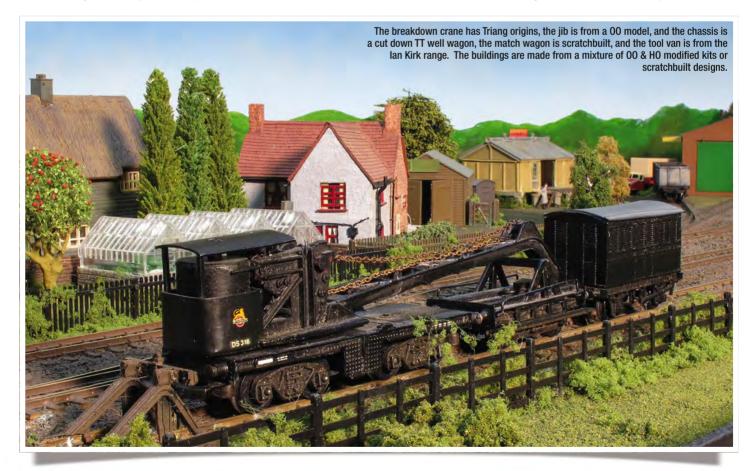
edford Junction has evolved from a board that was originally constructed as my contribution to the 3mm Society South Downs and Solent Groups modular system. Each member owned a module, and these could be added together at running days or for local exhibitions. While that was satisfying, I wanted more from it, so a 10ft by 8ft continuous run layout was built around it that gave a reasonable representation of a model railway. However, the fairly tight curves were inconsistent with the growth in more scale locomotives, which made a further change necessary. The completion of a W Class 2-6-4T, and the need to keep its front steps, made the decision - it had to be a straight layout and something compatible with the Group's modular system.

Designs were hatched and baseboards constructed. The weather over the Easter period was warm and dry, and that allowed the additional boards to be constructed in the garden. The baseboards and scenery were built in the traditional way, and a basic layout was completed in three weeks. The W Class tank locomotive was able to run through the trackwork without snagging, although there was one missing feature - no goods yard. That was remedied in time for the Alexandra

Palace exhibition in 2016, and the layout grew to its current format and is now 27 feet long.

### **Rolling Stock**

The layout is based on a LBSCR planned extension to their Chichester to Midhurst line to connect with the LSWR at Haslemere. In reality the line was never built, but this model is an interpretation of what could have been. Centred around the planned intermediate station at Redford, it assumes an end-on Junction between the LSWR and LBSC systems. The LSWR connection being electrified and served by services from





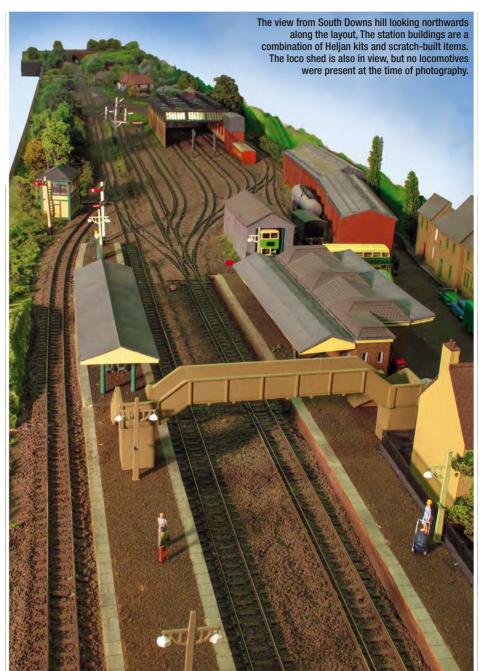
this model is an interpretation of what could have been. Centred around the planned intermediate station at Redford, it assumes an end-on Junction between the LSWR and LBSC systems

Haslemere, Guildford and Waterloo, the LBSC connection retains a rural atmosphere with services from Midhurst and Chichester. There is a motive power depot, a sub shed of Guildford, EMU stabling, and a goods yard to the rear of the loco shed.

All the rolling stock is representative of that era and replicates what could have been seen on a cross country West Sussex railway line. The electric multiple units for stopping services comprise of 2 NOL, (Roxey



(modified from Triang), and the express services 4 COR, 4 CIG and 4 CEP which are all built from etches from Worsley Works. Layouts at exhibitions have to entertain the public and it can be a little boring for some to see a plethora of green rolling stock, and there are times when a second class coach is replaced with a Pullman car in the 4-COR unit, replicating the 4-PUL in the mid 1960's although not exactly the correct formation.

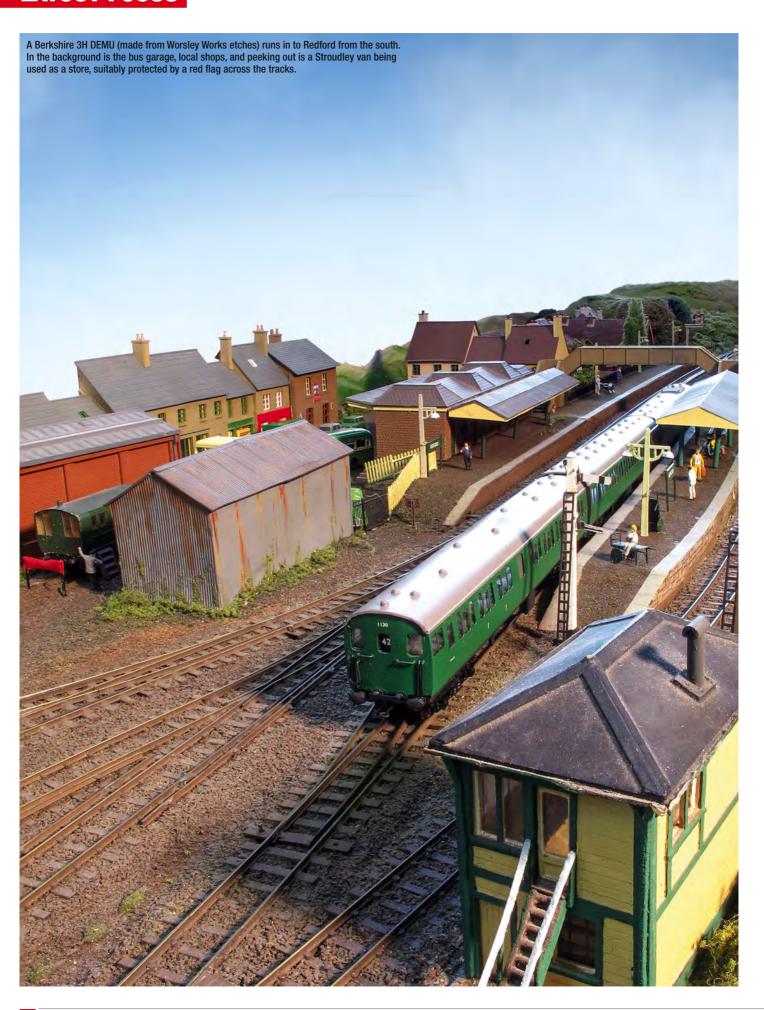


The non-electrified end of the layout is serviced with typical SR branch line locomotives, M7 and H classes with pullpush trailers of various types that are mostly scratch-built, and their replacement DMU's of all three types all built from Worsley Works etches. A variety of locomotives are available for the through services including the original W class and the H2 atlantic both made from 3mm Society kits. Others are kit or scratch-built locos, my favourite being the A1X Terrier. The two Bulleid Pacifics are the only two Triang-adapted locomotives that operate on Redford. Similarly to give some variation the through coaching sets are normally made up of a red & cream Mk1, and ex SECR birdcage sets.

### **Buildings**

Buildings are not my strong point, and I would much prefer to use what is available. There are a few scratch-built examples, and several are adapted from 4mm sources or converted from the Triang TT system. The three road loco shed is an extended and converted building made from Triang, and the water tower utilises some of the parts left over from the shed conversion. The tank itself is a container from an EFE OO gauge lorry, modified to fit.

Most pleasing are the cameos around the layout. The wood yard includes storage shed from a OO gauge Wills kit and a converted scratch-built barn, and the remnants of a windmill that came from a bran bin at



a railway exhibition several years ago. Adjacent to the wood yard is the working level crossing. The gates are scratch-built and mechanically linked to a slide switch that is interlinked to the signals and the track feed to prevent trains running into them. The crossing keeper's hut was made from a 3mm card kit.

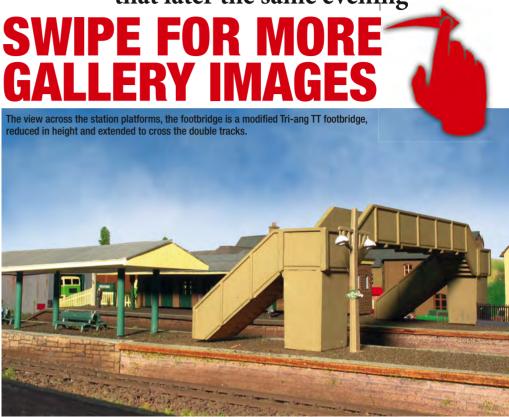
The buildings on the most recent extension include a scratch-built shop and cottages, and a Wills kit, garage. The shell sign at the garage is from the old Minic Motorways range. The Goods shed is a conversion from a Triang TT Diesel Depot.

The area around the station has the local shops which are all made from the old Jouef HO range of kits. Three were converted to low relief to merge to the backscene, three more form another side to the station square. The bus garage was scratch-built, and the Station building is converted from Heljan HO kit of Teignmouth station.

### Scenery

The majority of questions regarding the scenery relate to the river. The river bed was cut into the scenic part of the board and lowered by 1cm, and the banks were formed from polystyrene. The water surface uses

EasyWater, and the vegetation across the layout is mainly from the Woodland Scenics range. The trees have all been scratch-built from wire, string and flock or purchased from various tree suppliers.

### **Counting Chickens**

We were at a show, when one visitor told us that she hadn't seen a chicken coop on a model railway layout before. We remedied that later the same evening, and planted it on the layout the following morning. The through goods needed to have something to make it more interesting, and a wagon has been added with two Isetta Bubble cars in transit. In reality these cars were made at the Brighton works and, since they had no road access, had to be taken out by train. This always makes a good conversation topic at exhibitions.

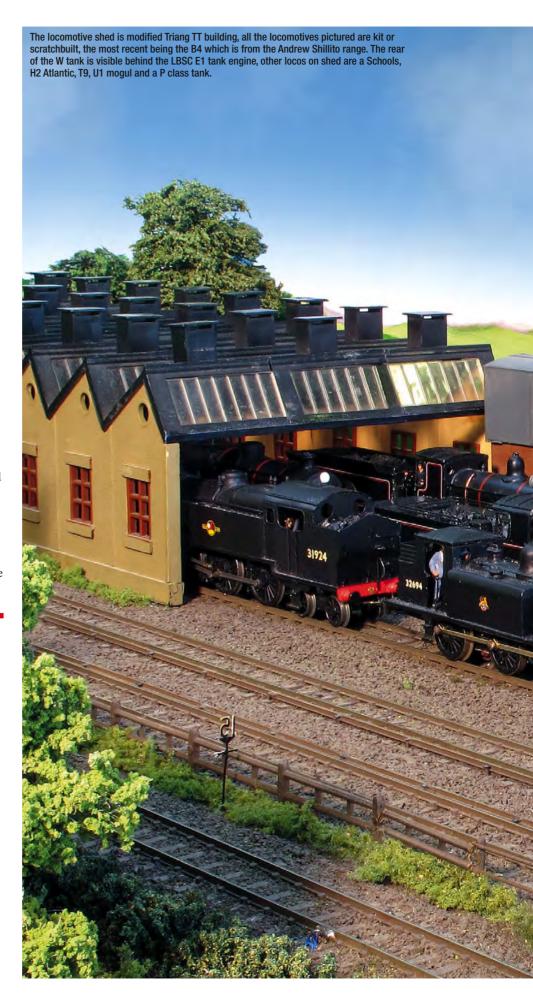
### Lessons learned

You never stop learning, and there's always something on every layout you see. I have found it very helpful being part of the Bognor Regis MRC and the 3mm Society, whose national and local membership have been engaging. I would never have envisaged winning awards when I first started in the scale. A special thanks goes to John James, a good friend who sadly passed away last year who taught me a few tricks in locomotive building, and my operating mates Dennis Bunge and John Wakeman who help with the operation of Redford.

# Meet the modeller



I enjoy the making side of the hobby, to capture the local scene. I originally modelled in OO, but lost interest when the major manufacturers' releases eliminated that need. It was later rekindled with 3mm, though, and I have enjoyed it ever since. I think belonging to a club or society is helpful, and my skillsets improved after I joined Bognor Regis MRC, and progressed further after I joined the 3mm Society. I hope this article will encourage others in the same way.





### Running commentary

I have seen so many layouts where the scenery is of a high standard, but the running performance of the stock is poor and the 'finger from the sky' has to continually prod things along. Hopefully the public does not have to experience that on any of my layouts - in the unlikely event a derailment occurs or the train stops, it is put back on the track or started again. If that happens a second time the train is removed the next time it reaches the fiddleyard, and it does not return until the fault has been rectified.

We operate the layout to a far more intensive service than would be seen on the prototype, with as much variety in the train formations as possible, and we try and keep something moving at all times. The track layout on Redford is ideal for that, and it is possible with enough operators to run three trains simultaneously. That does seem to be appreciated by exhibition visitors.

## Why 3mm?

A friend introduced me to the 3mm Society. The most surprising thing for me was the range of kits and models available. The 3mm Society has quite a good structure too, and my local group, South Downs and Solent, were most encouraging. The centre board of Redford, although much modified, is the original module that I built to join them. As the layout grew, I needed a prototypical location and era, so focused on Midhurst



in Sussex. There are several features on the layout that have come from that locality and the adjacent town of Petworth.

## **Future projects**

Two projects are planned - an extension to another 3mm layout that is due for completion in the latter part of 2018, and a refurbishment to another layout, as well as keeping Redford in good working order. That is in addition to building rolling stock, since I build something new for every exhibition that I attend. And then there is a Brighton Belle and a Southern Double Deck unit still in flat-pack condition that need to be working next year.

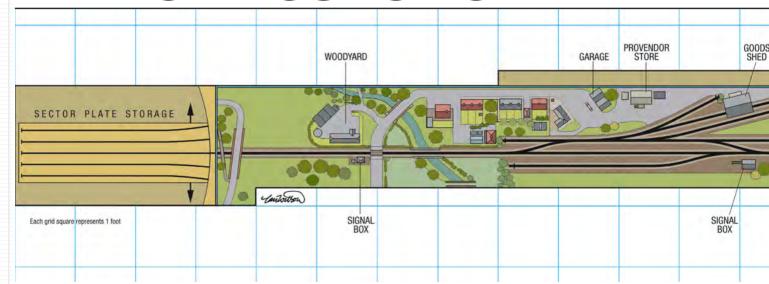

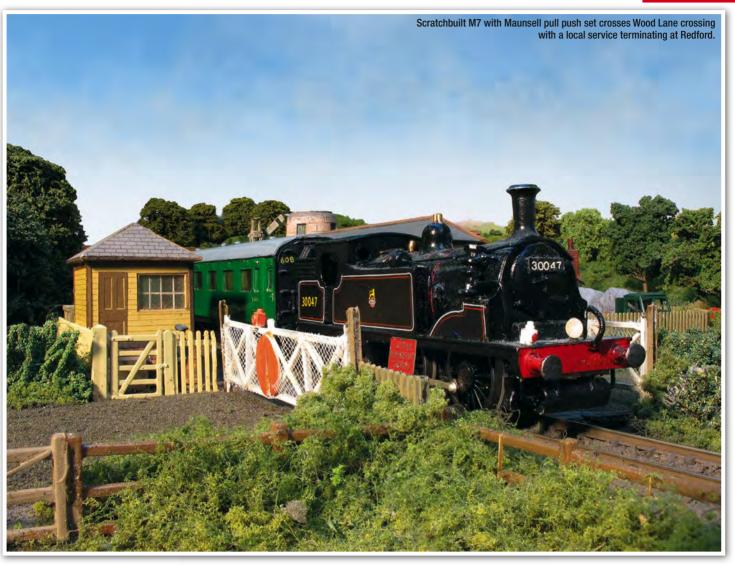


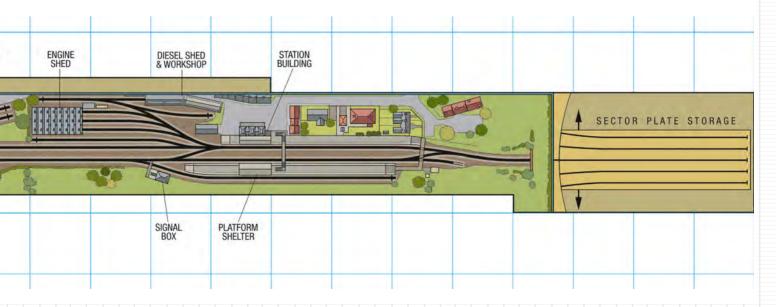
## Trackplan

# REDFORD JUNCTION











Kevin Phare shows how a broken old wagon can add interest and authenticity to a quiet corner of your layout.

he idea for this project came to me from two sources – the first when I came across a damaged Dapol LMS ventilation van that I had put aside for future use, and the second after I found some photographs showing a grounded van used as a store in the Shipton-on-Stour goods yard. This provided the spark for my imagination, and work then proceeded on turning my idea into a reality.

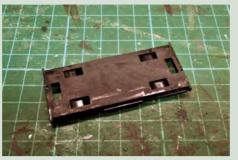
# What we used

Dapol 12T LMS ventilated van Scale Model Scenery sleepers Deluxe Materials Super 'Phatic glue Lifecolor 'Rail Weathering' and 'Weathered Wood' paint sets



The first thing I did was find a suitable area to site this old LMS van. As this pictures shows, I had an excellent area by the goods shed that fitted it perfectly. With the position sorted, I could now work out how to alter the wagon and chassis, and come up with a design for the base.





I needed to separate the van body from the chassis. This turned out to be easy, as when it rolled off the work bench onto my drill case the fixing lugs broke. The plan was to make it look like the wagon had been stripped of all useful fittings and that the roof had been re-covered.



To make a base I used some Scale Model Scenery twohole sleepers that I had left over from a previous build. The end result doesn't look out of place, and any of the two, three or four-hole versions will do. It just depends which railway company you are modelling



Three main supports were made independently, as it is easier to get them square when setting out on a cutting mat. They were then fixed to the underside of the chassis



The van body was painted with a mix of Lifecolor 'Rail Weathering' and 'Weathered Wood' paint sets. Many washes were used, and whilst wet were removed with a cotton bud to leave paint in the recesses. The corners of the base were weathered, and the roof was painted with numerous layers of mid grey washes.



The LMS logo was removed from both sides of the wagon with a glass fibre pen, and the chassis and body was glued together to form one rigid unit.



The next step was to build a platform using sleepers and some off-cuts from a laser window fret, a set of steps from the scrap box suited the height, and the planking/ strutting was cut from the card that came with a shirt that I got for Christmas!



I was not entirely happy with the roof or platform/step colours, so I left the wagon to dry overnight and tackled it again next day. It's worth pointing out that you will not always produce what you're after at the first attempt. If you are not happy with a model, come back to it later. You will be amazed at what you might see differently!



I wanted the roof to look like it had a crude covering of tar paper. To achieve this, I used two-ply tissue paper. I separated the layers and fixed them by applying a layer of glue, laying the sheet over and stippling on some more glue over the surface. I then applied another layer in the same way and built up four layers in total.



To finish this model, the roof has had three extra greyblack washes applied, and the platform/steps have had a much more detailed paint treatment with washes. The van body has also had some of the framing/sliding door gear highlighted.



Here's the grounded van in place. Before I fix it down I will leave it a week or two, just to make sure that I have no further changes of heart. Only then will I detail around and underneath it. The whole process took me about five days, including drying times, and made use of an old or damaged wagon - I daresay that many of us have at least one of those kicking around!



If you haven't heard of The Little Layout Company before, you may well have seen their layouts at exhibitions – either those on display in their own right, or one of the many they have built for their customers. With their burgeoning reputation and a rapidly filling order book, we were nevertheless pleased to discover a small but thriving enterprise built around a family team and friends, and a fullyfunctioning model shop at the front of the business. Little Layout's main man, Neil Mason, took time out of his busy day to talk to us, and we began by asking an obvious question...

**BRM:** You're known for the layouts that you build. They have to be made somewhere, but we didn't know about the shop. Can you tell us a little more about that?

NM: Well, we always said that we'd have to have a model shop to support the layout business, because the layouts themselves take eight to 12 weeks to build. However, we have now decided to dissolve the shop side of the business. This is due to the amount of layouts we have incoming, and the ever increasing calls to do on-site layout builds.

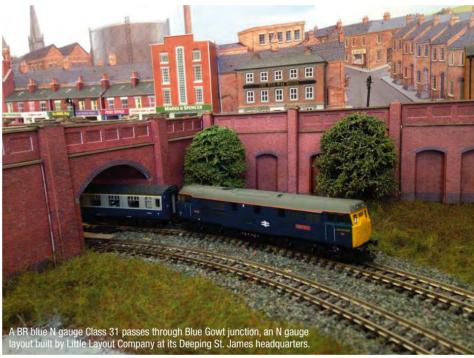
**BRM:** The 'Little' part of the company seems appropriate in many ways. The majority of the layouts that you build are modestly sized and it's a small company. How is it structured?

NM: My wife Lacey takes care of the admin, emails and promotional stuff; my father in-law is the woodworker and he takes care of the trestles and boards. To be honest, without him we wouldn't have what we've

With a name suggesting a very specific service, the Little Layout Company is certainly bigger in terms of its ideas and its output. BRM ventured to their HQ to find out more.



got – he came up with the roll-able trestles idea and he's innovating all the time. I do most of the layout building, but we have a few guys who help us out. A couple work alternate Saturdays – one has a good knowledge of second-hand stock and the other is also good at re-sprays. Then there's James Styles, who has his own World War II layout called 'Operation Abyss', who is really good at scratch-building. He helps out with a lot of the building work for us.

**BRM:** The Little layout Company is a relatively new enterprise, but what were you doing before you formed the company? **NM:** I worked at Frank Perkins Engineering in Peterborough for 12 years. I was running the paint process plant when I left. I was

getting fed up at the end, so I said that whatever I did next it would have to be something I'd enjoy doing, and Lacey encouraged me to give this a go. I've always been a railway modeller, thanks to my dad – I destroyed a lot of his trains when I was younger! I left the hobby in my late teens but picked it back up again in my late-20s.

BRM: Railway modellers often take a break from the hobby, only to return much later in life. You came back quite young, though.

NM: Yes, we're quite a young group of guys, and we try to communicate our enthusiasm to younger people at the shows we go to.

Railway modelling doesn't have quite the same stigma that it had years ago, and we are getting younger customers coming through.



Many clubs have sections for young people too. I think that advances in technology has also helped to bring younger people in.

BRM: What sort of things do you do to encourage younger people into the hobby? NM: We don't go with a lot of the steam-era stuff at shows, and I prefer to stick to what I know, which is the 80s and 90s stock. I think the younger generation knows that stock, and with sound-installed that helps to draw them in more. I like to keep things bright and interactive. That's why we usually do our stands in a U-shape, so people are drawn in and they can meet us and have a go. It's better than us being stuck behind a table.

BRM: When customers come to you with a project, do you find that they already know exactly what they want?

NM: We get a lot of enquiries through the website saying things like "I'd like an N Gauge layout, I've got 10ft x 3ft and I'd like a goods shed." And that's as rough as it gets. We do get left to our own devices quite a lot of the time, but I'll often sit down with a customer, or I call or email them to try to understand exactly what they want. Then I'll go away and try and put that into a plan. I keep them updated on the progress that we make, checking that they're happy with what we're doing. It's hard pricing a layout. We might already have everything we need for it, but I then have to estimate how long it's going to take, which is based on a daily rate.

BRM: Little Layout is a small company. Does that mean you're you only able to work on one layout at a time?

NM: No. At the moment I've got a loft layout in Birmingham, a garage layout in Stamford and we've been asked to look at a Colin Fry layout that's kept in Dublin Castle. The room that it's in was getting damp and the layout has started getting destroyed. It's all in bits, but they want us to go over there

and put it back together in a new purposebuilt exhibition area. We also have a job in Bodmin and a couple up in Scotland, so we're getting out and about all over the place.

**BRM:** There's a fair amount of woodwork underpinning the layouts that you build. Are your baseboards custom-made for each project, or are they modular in any way? NM: Well, because the boards have to be transported, both by us and the customer, we try to keep them to 4ft x 2ft. My fatherin-law has a workshop at home and he cuts the boards and brings them here. I try to keep him working two or three jobs ahead, so if I have an issue where I'm waiting for parts for a layout I can at least start work on something else.

**BRM:** Do your customers exhibit the layouts that you have built?

NM: Yes, several are in circulation. Two went to Kempston recently - 'Elmwood Yard', which is an HO American layout, and 'Passage Lane' which is a 00 gauge layout set in the present day - 'Deeping Lane' was at the Spalding show recently too. Our customers are really good. They like the fact that their layouts are built by somebody else and they're happy to 'advertise' for us as well. Word of mouth recommendations work really well for us.

BRM: Do you scratch-build everything that goes into your layouts?



# **INTERVIEW**



NM: Yes, mostly. I like making industrial things – I'm not very good with houses and station buildings, so I leave James to do those things. Grime and dirt is my speciality. On RMWeb I had a reputation for putting fuel points on everything (laughs) – pretty much every layout I build for myself has a fuel point on it!

**BRM:** Fuel points aside, what sort of layouts do you build for your own pleasure? **NM:** To be honest, I build the show layouts for my own enjoyment. That's why I build them, do a few shows with them, then sell them on and build something else.

However, we had a team meeting after the Peterborough show, and everybody ganged

up on me and said that if I sold 'Stylson Yard' they wouldn't help me anymore, because they think it's the best one that we've built so far.

BRM: You're building lots of different layouts for customers to their own requirements, then. What sort of height do they want, or do you recommend?

NM: I suggest three foot, because it's an average waist height. It's a good height for show layouts too – if you're stood behind a three foot-high layout with a foot high backscene, you can reach forward without having to stretch or go on tip-toes.

**BRM:** You probably have your favourite construction materials, especially having to build so many layouts. Can you talk us through a few of them?

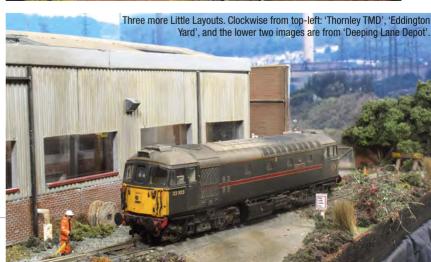
NM: We use 5.5mm ply, 2.5 – 2.75in battens if we're using Cobalt or Tortoise motors – just to get the extra depth and to prevent damage. As I mentioned, we try to build the boards to four x two feet, because they're lightweight and easy to carry. I use 5.5 or 7mm ply for the backscene board. I use ID backscenes, and we'll usually frame them off with a bit of beading to give it a nice finish.

BRM: Do you think your modelling has









developed since you've set up the company? If so, how?

NM: A lot, yes. I've certainly learned many new techniques. I used to swear by seep point motors, and was reluctant to use DCC. Now I've completely gone the other way. I've learned a lot about how to put boards together, and I've learned new techniques for scenery. I might have done things my own way before, but looking through magazines, watching DVDs and speaking to people at exhibitions I've learned different ways of doing things. My skills with an airbrush have improved no end too.

BRM: How do you see the company developing over the next three to five years is there anything you're not doing that you'd like to try, or something that you'd like to do less of?

NM: We're kind of riding a wave at the moment. It sounds strange to say, but we're a bit busier than we'd like to be at this point - that's a good problem to have, though. In the longer term I'd like to have a bigger workshop with a couple of guys working for us full-time. That would take a bit of stress

off me, and I could perhaps put a bit more time into the scenery side of things. I'd also like to work with a few more magazines and books, and do a few tutorials. I don't want to give all my secrets away, though!

BRM: Finally, is there a fantasy project that vou'd like to build?

NM: (without hesitation) Bescot Yard. It's a large yard, with a lot of wagons and a fuel point and that kind of stuff – I like anything that's got industrial filth and dirt. Toton would be great too, but Bescot is probably more achievable.

Well, that's something we'd certainly like to see, although with orders on the books for the next couple of years we might have to wait. In the meantime, The Little layout Company will be at the March MRC and Wood Green shows in March 2018, with more bookings for 2018 TBC and many of the layouts that they have already sold on the exhibition circuit. Keep a look out for them. They're bound to be full of dirt and grime - and they'll probably have a fuel point or two!

akebox dioramas - an idea that came out of a **BRM** planning meeting is **I** now all the rage on RMweb, with all manner of concepts being created. It's nice to see creative modelling and for many, this is their first 'stab' at making something. On my weekly browse through the numerous projects to see what looks good and what has been promised, I set about thinking what I'd do for mine.

In true tradition, it had to stand out and be 'a bit different', words to the annovance of Andy McVittie who says I say that too often! And so began the quest for ideas, with Google at my disposal, to see what I could muster and maximise usage of the small eight square inches. Height in the diorama was at a premium and it was only by chance that a photograph taken from a platform on the London Underground appeared on screen - very modellable, I thought.

Not being a Londoner and with my knowledge of the Underground being somewhat sketchy - apologies Underground fans - I had to brush up on my research and ideas before I set about scratch-building. Half an hour later, I'd decided it was to be a deep tube tunnel cross-section rather than a sub-surface station. My reasoning behind a tube station is that it's a hive of activity with teeming passengers at rush hour, all looking to push so they find their little space. This is rarely modelled in our traditional rosetinted view of the railway network and that was reason enough for me to make a start. Let the bustling commence.

# Shopping List

DCC Concepts Plastic sheet Kytes Lights

Peco IL-120 Individulay Conductor Rail Chairs Redutex 076LV111 Stretcher Bond Brick PVC guttering

Scale Model Scenery BB006 Diorama board Deluxe Materials Plastic Magic Deluxe Materials Roket Cyano Glue





Time is key, so for this diorama I've opted for a pre-cut baseboard from Scale Model Scenery. It comfortably fits within the 8in square by 6in height restriction.



The board edges can be glued using a PVA-based glue, such as Speed Bond by Deluxe Materials. Apply sparingly and leave to dry for three hours.



A length of PVC guttering was sourced from the local DIY centre and is a close match for the size of tunnel required. Cutting it to length I set about tracing the platform position.



Scratch-building is required for this diorama, so I'm using sheets of plastic from DCC Concepts. Their millimetre grid makes cutting of parts fast and accurate.



sheets and is glued. Diorama boards can be sourced from Scale Model Scenery with this additional wall if required.



To support the tunnel, which is to be elevated, three strips of plastic sheet are laminated with solvent glue and left to dry, before super gluing into place.



After each step, a test fit of components is carried out to ensure everything fits as accurately as possible. Here, the cutaway section of the tunnel takes shape.



The platform edge front is added from laminations of plastic sheet which adds strength. I find it's easier to laminate two thinner sheets than cut a thick sheet.



A word of warning with the printed surface of the plastic sheet - solvent glue doesn't penetrate the printed grid overlay easily. It can be removed with an abrasive sanding stick, though.



The platform kicks back into the section of the tube and a test fit for height and level is carried out. As always, measure twice, cut once.



The solvent adhesive used throughout the build is Plastic Magic from Deluxe Materials, available from most model shops. Align the parts closely before applying, then slide them into place.





London Transport New Works Standards 1976 can be found by an online search. They give accurate dimensions from the tunnel bore diameter to sleeper spacing and platform height.



As it happens, the loupe I use for examining model decals on my desk is the correct diameter for the station entrance/exit tunnel. A CD/DVD marker is used for tracing.

In stations, because of the pit between rails, the chairs are cut from this section of DCC Concepts track. The rail is retained for later use



A little clean up is required around each chair to remove surplus plastic. I chose to use a medium grit sanding stick, but a needle file works just as well.



A scale 12mm interval between sleeper centres is respected. The ABS plastic chairs are sanded to act as a key, before individually supergluing into place. The grid helps maintain alignment of the rail.



Peco IL-120 Individual Conductor Rail Chairs are added to custom centre rail plastic supports. The smooth plastic must be sanded and is best glued with superglue.



The fourth rail chair supports are raised on pads, which I've cut from plastic sheet. A 4mm wide strip of plastic is cut, then cut into squares. Fine tweezers avoid finger marks in the glue.

The third and fourth rails are threaded through the conductor rail chairs. In reality, they have a square profile unlike the running rails, but I'm using rail for ease and strength.



Photographs of many underground stations reveal emergency access doors at the end of platforms. A 0.020in piece of plastic sheet is scribed with the side of a scalpel to make the shuttering. Above, panels are made from plastic sheet.



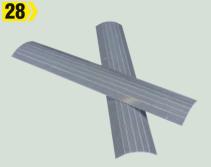
Relay and equipment boxes are another visual part of the underground station scene. Most are fixed flush with metal panelling to avoid dirt and dust from accumulating and to help cleaning staff with their duties.



With the boxes secured, Redutex 076LV111 Old Brick Stretcher Bond self-adhesive sheet is fixed to the tunnel side to represent tiles. Above, the station name running board is test fitted. Note the CCTV camera keeping watch over platform access.



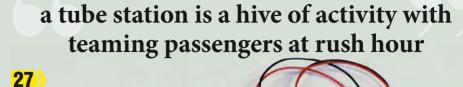
Without lighting, many parts of this diorama won't be visible. I've opted for two packs of 12V warm white surface-mounted LEDs from Kytes Lights.



The access tunnel has a smaller diameter than the main station tunnel, so also needs to be built from scratch. Half-scoring the tunnel sides allows them to bend easily.



The lighting bar is test fitted and its wires are kept tidy with tape. The wires are grouped together and will be connected to a hidden 12V transformer.

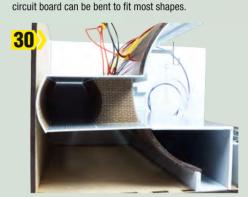




Matching the radius of the access tunnel with that of the station tunnel requires a little trimming and patience, using the guttering as a tracing guide.



A strip of transparent plastic sheet is cut and made translucent by rubbing with a sanding stick on both sides. Fitted between each of the overhead light cut-outs, it will help diffuse light.



Because the tube has strip lighting, not little squares, a custom-made overhead lighting rig needs to be made from scratch. Kytes Lights are self-adhesive and the thin

A test fit – or five – is required until I'm happy with the alignment. This section of the tunnel has yet to be lit, with stairs to the rear to hide the dead end.





The diorama has been taken as far as possible for this issue. An application of white plastic primer helps give paints a much-needed key. I'm using Plastic Primer from Rust-oleum. Masking tape protects the overhead lights.

The lights are tested to ensure they work. Platform benches, commuters and numerous posters and signs have to be applied, but sit tight — that's for next time!

# **PROTOTYPE INSPIRATION**

London's Underground network offers a wealth of modelling opportunities, as Howard Smith validates.

aking a cakebox diorama of the London Underground involved frantic research to familiarise myself with elements that are commonly seen around stations, but also the immediate environment. Here's a selection of photographs from around the network to whet your appetite and give creative ideas.

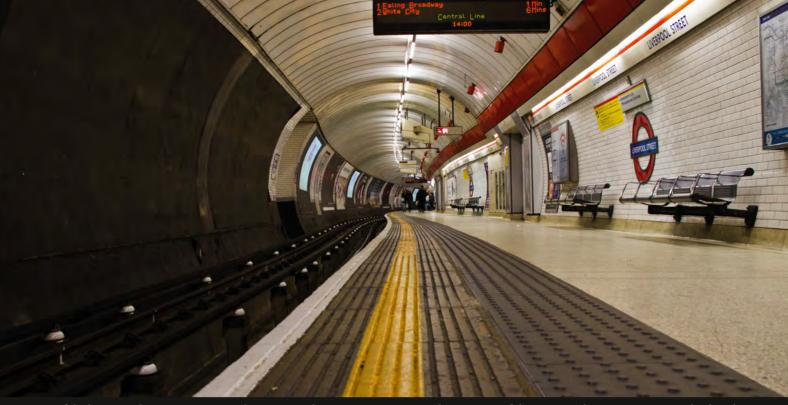


The westbound platform at Gants Hill station, one of the few Central Line stations designed by Charles Holden. The cream tiling is the same as those found at other stations on this tunnelled section of the Hainault branch of the Central Line and was applied during the New Works Programme between 1935-1940. The same features can be seen at the Northern Line station Highgate, as well as Bethnal Green on the Central Line. This tunnelled section had an unusual use as a wartime factory between 1942-1945.



On June 6, 2016, Metropolitan Line S8 Stock 21002 stands at Baker Street Station awaiting departure for Uxbridge. The station is served by five different lines and is one of the original stations on the Metropolitan Railway, opening in 1863. As an homage to Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's fictional detective, Sherlock Holmes, many silhouettes of the character can be found applied to the station's wall tiles and outside a large bronze of the man guards the entrance. ANTHONY ROBERTS

Getting power to and from signals on the underground often involves taking cables across vast distances, but many of these are left exposed displaying their multitude of colours. Seen at Baker Street in December 2009 are these modern colour-coded cables adding a much-needed touch of colour to the black and white habitual colours. Note the mounting hooks, securing brackets and many hundreds of zip-ties - all great ideas to replicate in model form.



One of the busiest railway stations in London, Liverpool Street station serves as the terminus of the West Anglia Main Line to Cambridge, the busier Great Eastern Main Line to Norwich, local and regional commuter trains serving east London and destinations in the East of England, and the Stansted Express service to Stansted Airport. The platform anti-slip edging is clearly seen in this view and is largely to the same standard throughout the underground system. Overhead, the timetable in real time is displayed.

Liverpool Street was built as a dual-level station with provision for the Underground from the outset. Pictured, the tube station opened in 1875 for the Metropolitan Railway, and is served by the Central, Circle, Hammersmith & City and Metropolitan lines.

While building a utility tunnel at Crossrail's Liverpool Street station site, Museum of London archaeologists found skulls in the sediment of the historic river channel of the river Walbrook, believed to date from the Roman period. JOSEPH PEARSON



Advertising is key. A platform packed with passengers eagerly awaiting the arrival of the next train are a key target for loud and vibrant advertisements. Seen at Notting Hill Gate station are these large 48 sheet cross-track posters. Located on most tube stations, they're only present on one side of the station facing passengers. Here, they're interspersed with the station name for a quick reference point. Along the platform side of the station and access corridors, often smaller four sheet posters can be found, some of which are underground maps. Note the CCTV cameras keeping watch over the platforms.



On most model railways, adding lights to coaches or buildings can seem a little unnecessary, given they're viewed in natural daylight most of the time, but if you're modelling the underground, artificial lighting is an integral part of the ambience. It's not just corridors and the main station areas that are lit, look out for advertisements, platform edging and wall wash lighting too – many opportunities for the modeller to create great effects. Safety signs adorn many of the entrances and exits too. Armed with these ideas, you too could create a slice of the London Underground.

# BRINKLOW

Milton Keynes MRS' adaptable layout allows for multiple controls, a variety of stock and even the running of continental trains. Club member Wayne Webb explains further...





the brief was for a continuous run to be controlled by DC and DCC. It had to be simple to operate and it also needed to be able to run continental and American stock



we have tried to show the period when the canal changed from industrial use to pleasure boating in the 1960s



hen Milton Keynes Model Railway Society decided to build a new N Gauge show layout the brief was for a continuous run to be controlled by DC and DCC. It had to be simple to operate and it also needed to be able to run continental and American stock. The N Gauge group looked at a few different plans in around April 2015 and, at this time, I had seen a picture in a book of the main line and canal at Brinklow.

When I started my research, I found out that Brinklow had a station and that it was on the Trent Valley line, which ran between Rugby to Stafford. It was the first station beyond Rugby and was previously known as Stretton. Its name was changed to Brinklow in 1870. Brinklow closed in 1957 but the small goods yard stayed in use until 1961. Only three lines ran through the station and beyond due the proximity of a canal.

Following my research, I drew up a track plan that used the same shape as our other layout 'Dentdale' (see BRM April 2014) which has a nice long sweeping run. Happily, the majority of the group agreed with the plan.

Then, in May 2015 we finally started work on the layout. The space available at the club has dictated its size somewhat, but this has not impacted on the visual presentation of the layout.

### Construction

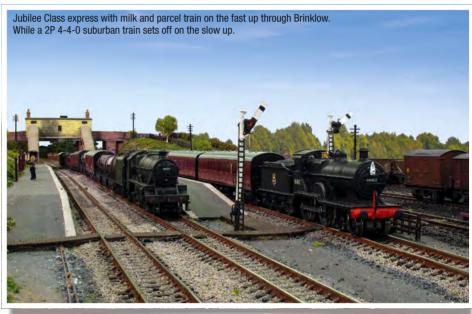
Brinklow's baseboards needed to be light but strong for moving it around at shows. The layout is made up of five sections that are held together by bolts and wing nuts. Other details are as follows:

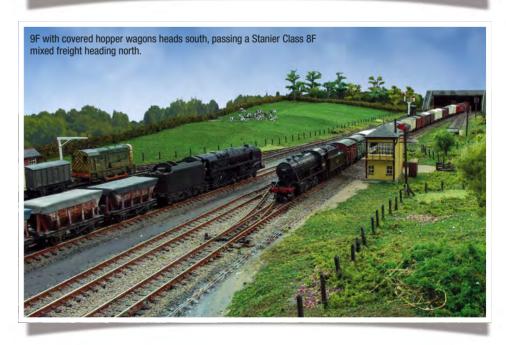
- Each section is three feet ten inches long.
- The construction is built from 12mm plywood for the sides and 9mm plywood for the tops.
- The legs are 44 x 20mm softwood.
- We have used Peco code 80 track throughout because some members have older stock.

There are three lines on the layout and each line is separate, so that DC or DCC can be used at the same time. The lines are colour coded - blue for the down fast and slow line. red for the fast up and green for the slow up. All points connecting the three lines are isolated and there are some dummy points just for show. The only points in use are from the green slow up line, which connects to the goods yard. All point motors are by Seep.

The fiddle yard is made up of nine lines







split into three for each line. Each line is isolated in four places and can hold up to 12 trains allowing a capacity to run either 30 six short trains or 18 long trains. The layout is powered by three Gaugemaster controllers for DC operation and Digital Plus by Lenz for the DCC operation.

### **Buildings**

The Buildings are a mix of kit-built and scratch-built, the latter mostly using cardboard covered in plastic card. The station building is scratch-built. I have also used the Ratio Modular Covered Station Footbridge for both staircase sides and planked plastic card for the staircase side panels, adding glazing bars for the windows. Then I used Deluxe Glue N Glaze for the window glass, all to make it look like the original station staircases.

For the white plaster buildings I used plain white plastic card on top of cardboard. When the building was complete I gave it a coat of PVA and dusted over with weathering powder. When it was dry I painted it white, which gave a good plaster effect.

The signal box is also a Ratio kit with interior and signalman. The goods shed is scratch-built with doors at both ends for the railway to pass through. There is a vehicle loading entrance at one end and an up and down roller door.

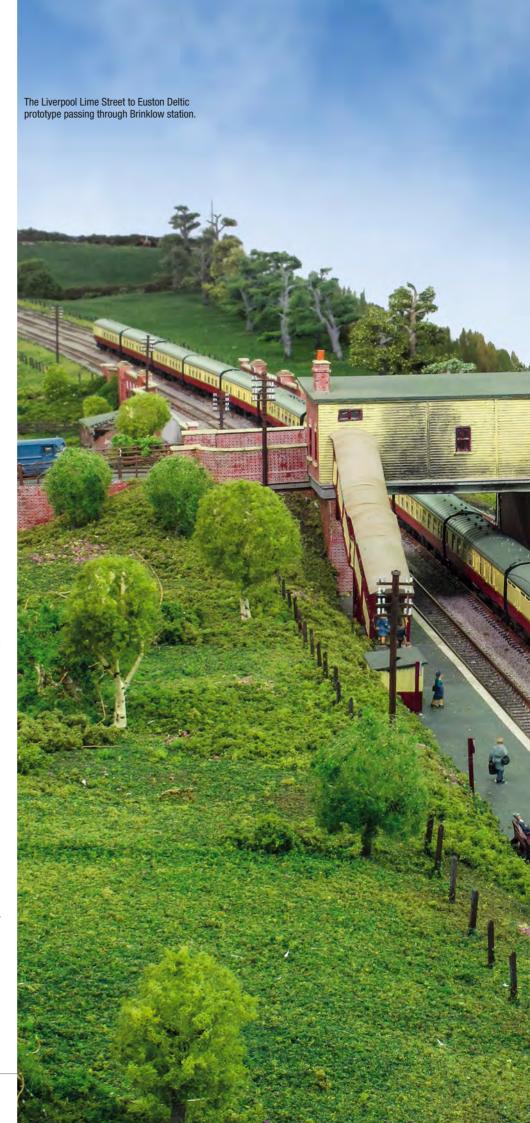
The platforms are made up using Peco edging sections and plastic card on top, and then painted. They were then merged into the landscape, which was formed by cardboard formers and a lattice work on top. They were covered with paper and plenty of PVA glue before being painted green.

The signals are a mix of kit and scratchbuilt and I plan to build more for the layout. All the signals are static. The point rodding has been produced from thin wire, which is glued on to plastic square section and painted.

### Scenery

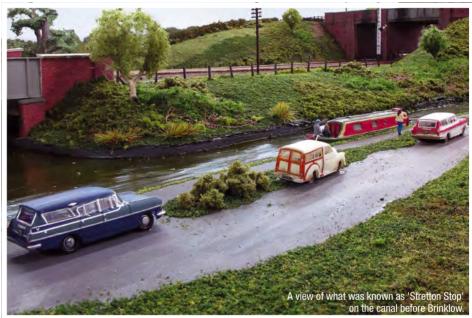
A mix of Woodland Scenics scatters was used and static grass has been added in places. The canal was made by using white plastic card for the base and sides. This was then painted a canal colour of green and given four coats of satin varnish for the water effect. I plan to add more water to the canal.

One of our group made all the tall trees. The smaller ones are all commercial trees of various makes. The backscene was photographed by Bob Taylor at Maidensgrove Common in the Chilterns, which is about five miles north of Henley on Thames. The









# Meet the modeller...



I returned to railway modelling in 2003. I was looking for a new hobby and came across an OO class 31 locomotive, which I remember from my childhood. So I started out building an OO layout, although I only had space for a branch line. I visited a model railway show and came across N Gauge, and I decided that I could do a lot in this scale.

All the vehicles on the layout where given a coat of matt varnish to tone them down and weathered where needed.

### **Stock**

The rolling stock is a mix of Graham Farish, Dapol and Union Mills. You will see Royal Scots, Jubilees and Coronation class locomotives. Also to look out for is the Deltic prototype on its Liverpool to Euston run. Other locomotives include LNWR G2s pulling freight and a LNWR Prince of Wales class in BR early emblem. This is what might have happened, because some of the class were allocated BR numbers but never made it into service.

The layout is run from 1948 to 1963. We have tried to show the period when the canal changed from industrial use to pleasure boating in the 1960s. I have also tried to keep to the same principles I used on 'Dentdale' i.e. keeping the layout simple, not overloaded and making sure there is a feature on each board for the public to look at while watching the trains go by.

### **Finally**

I am pleased the way the layout has turned out. It was a shame that I could not fit the run off section of the fourth line to be a working line by adding more points, but I did not have the room.

My favourite building is the dilapidated building next to the canal. This is becoming a bit of a signature for me, as I have something similar on the front of Dentdale.

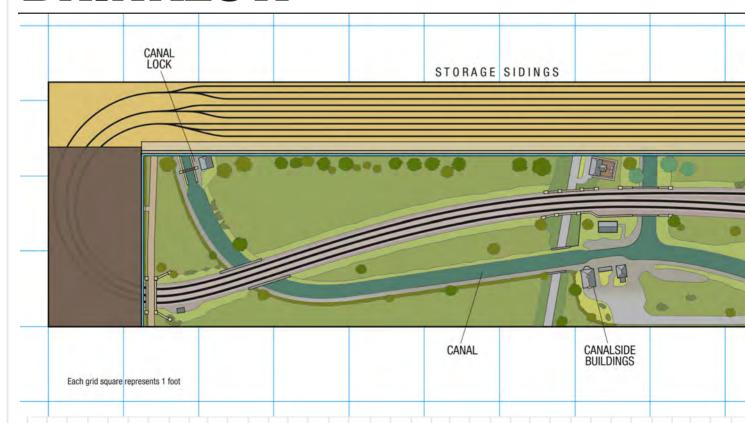

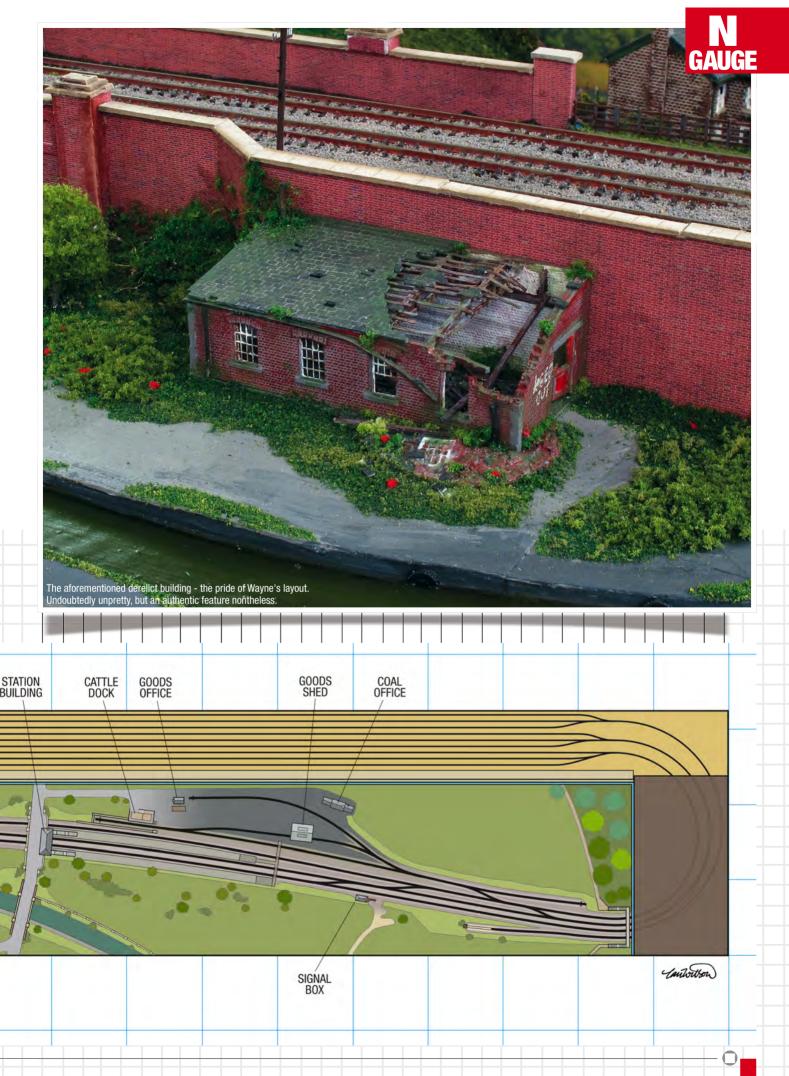

# DIDSBURY GREEN **PART TWO**

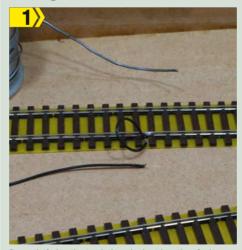
In this episode, Phil finishes the wiring, builds an unusual control panel and makes a start on the scenery.

uilding Didsbury Green has forced me to adapt my usual methods. This layout needs to be as light as possible for transport to Canada in a few months time. Also, I'm having to keep weight reduction in mind, which means no resin buildings, featherweight ground contours and LED lighting rather than bulbs.

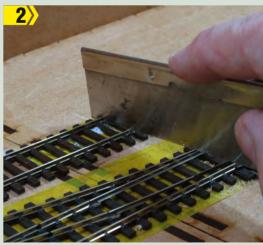
None of this is a problem, in fact it's fun trying different materials and methods some of them might even become part of my standard ways of working. Right up until the point that I spot another interesting way of doing things, of course.

Another new (to me) feature of this model is operation from the front. I prefer to hide the controls behind the model but this layout will be perfect to sit on a shelf for casual operation rather than being set up for a show. I'm keen to avoid a separate panel too, one less thing that can be forgotten when I do show the model.

## Wiring



Power is fed to the track though short lengths of wire soldered to the sides of the rails I showed how to do this on September's DVD. However, the method is to tin both the end of the wire and the side of the rail. Then hold them together and heat the joint. Pre-tinning should mean that the heat is only on for a few second so the sleepers don't melt.



Two electrical breaks are built in by using insulated fishplates. These are bulky and a little unsightly, so I'm cutting through both rails with a razor saw. You may prefer to use a slitting disk in a mini-drill, but this hand tool produces a finer cut. Make sure the track is firmly held down either side and don't rush it.





Rapido's point motors require a 12V DC supply, and most transformers provide 16v AC. Changing this requires a bridge rectifier, a device incorporating four diodes. While making one isn't hard, this Gaugemaster unit is even simpler to use, as no soldering is required.

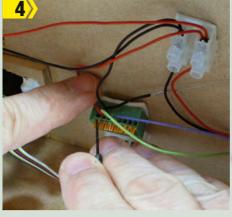




The next job is to stick the wires to the board so they don't get caught when the layout is moved. It makes following the circuits a bit easier, though - red and black for track, everything else is point control. The switches for this will be in the top right as you look at the photo.



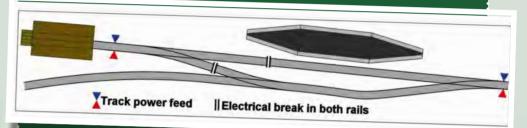
At this stage, the most important thing you can do is run trains to make sure everything electrical is operating properly. If it doesn't, adding scenery isn't going to help. If the loco stops at an electrical break, try lifting it on to the next section as it's easy to get the polarity of the feeds wrong. If this is the problem, swapping the wires



My soldering iron isn't seeing much use on this project, as the point motors include a push-fit terminal. Simply press the lever forward and stuff the wire in the hole. Let go and the connection is made. Track power connections use electrical 'chocolate block' terminals with screw fittings



Both the controller and transformer are plugged in through DIN sockets. To avoid the risk of the connecting the wrong one in, I try to use 5 pins for control and 6 for the transformer. It might sound daft, but building out potential problems is easy at this stage and it's better than trying to fix a loco that's been fed with 16V DC!



# Wiring diagram

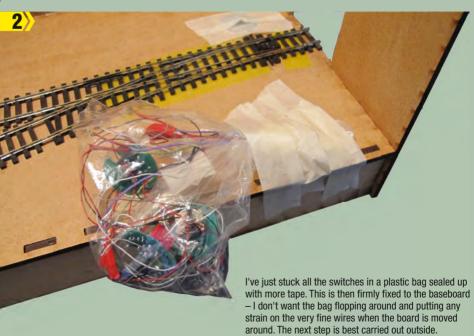
Didsbury is wired for conventional DC control, with power feeds at the toe end of each point (the middle one receives power from its neighbour on the right) and track breaks where points face each other. This avoids short circuits when points are thrown and the polarity of the frog changes.

Everything will still work fine if the layout was to be changed to DCC operation in the future, as the feed from the DCC controller just replaces the analogue feed. Since the controller is plugged in to the front panel, it would even be possible to swap between the two.

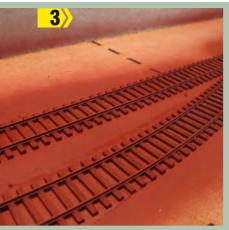
## Ballasting and painting the track



Before painting the track, it's important to protect any moving linkages with masking tape. Cheap decorating tape is good enough for this job, as it's just to stop paint getting in to the pivots. Kitchen foil works just as well if you don't have any tape.



# **PRACTICAL BRM**



Acrylic paint won't stick very well to metal rails, so I've given all the track a spray with car primer. You could carry out all the painting by hand, but aerosols are far quicker and it's a lot easier to get paint in all the corners.



I knew there was a good reason to cut a big hole in the end of the baseboard – it makes it easier to aim the airbrush! Seriously, it's essential to spray from all angles or shiny unpainted sleepers will show up later when looking along the model at eye level. If you don't own an airbrush, aerosol cans of track colour (a dirty brown) are widely available.



Rail tops need to be cleaned soon after painting, ideally before the paint has hardened. Don't use emery paper for this, as you'll scratch the metal and give the dirt a place to hide in the future. Polish with a piece of wood — I'm using a lolly stick, which does the job without damage.



Rapido supplies clear plastic disks to fit over the motor tops for scenery. Feeling that these weren't big enough, I made replacements out of 0.25mm thick plastic sheet. Cutting them in half along the centres of the holes saves taking the cams off the top of the motors. I've glued the plastic down the board, but not the motor in case this has to be replaced in the future.



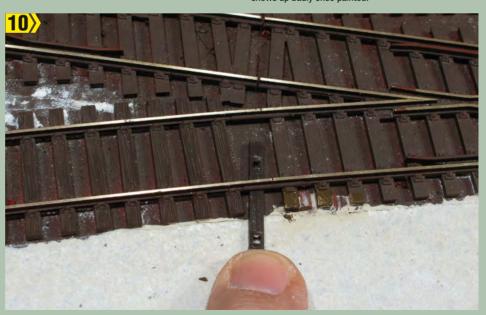
Feeling that the super-smooth baseboard needed a bit of texture, I'm trying out a technique that I picked up from our visit to Pendon. Basically, masonry paint is applied to the board and then DIY wall filler is sieved on to this using a tea strainer until the surface is covered. Howard's cup of lapsang souchong is going to taste a bit gritty, but I'm sure he won't mind.



Any excess filler is brushed and vacuumed away. The results are a bit underwhelming if I'm honest. There is some texture, but not much. Obviously there is more to learn with this technique — maybe a textured paint? It would be fine for tarmac roadways, but I'd like something a bit coarser for the yard surface. I also should have filled the slight depressions where the boards lock together. They are a fraction of a millimetre apart, which really shows up badly once painted.



Ballasting, if carried out carelessly, is a great way to gum up all the points. To keep glue out of the moving parts, I'm fixing the stones near them with Deluxe Materials 'Ballast Magic'. It's a powdered glue that's mixed with the ballast and activated by misting with water. The glue sets in a couple of minutes.



Like most modellers, I tend to keep track offcuts in case they come in handy. Well, there is a spot at a joint where an extra sleeper is needed and this slides in once the rail cars have been cut off. Since it's going under a fishplate, I've sanded the back a little to reduce the height slightly too.



Although one pack of Ballast Magic would be enough for a layout of this size, I'm fixing the rest of the ballast with the traditional mix of PVA and water. Make up a 50:50 solution, add a couple of drops of washing up liquid and then leave in a jam jar overnight so they mix fully. Mist the stones with water and then drip the glue on using a pipette



Sidings and engine sheds didn't see nice clean ballast; they would be laid using second hand stuff made up of stones much smaller than you see on the main line. Sheds were home to prodigious quantities of ash, which got mixed in giving an almost smooth surface. I'm mixing some chinchilla sand with the ballast to represent this, and then laying in the normal way.

### Adding a backscene Expert Tip

I find a spray glue much easier to use than anything painted on the back of the paper. Spending bit of money on something aimed at the graphic design market means the glue sprays as a fine mist rather than the lumpy efforts of cheaper cans which can cause the backscene to bubble where it soaks in.

Best of all, this stuff remains repositionable for a while, so I can peel the paper away if things aren't lined up properly the first time. It's not the cheapest solution, but the backscene is very visible and any problems will stand out like a sore thumb.



Gaugemaster's backscenes are too tall for the back of Didsbury, so I've cut 6cm from the bottom of each. This alters the horizon and I felt that more sky would appear more natural on this layout than a great area of foreground detail which could overpower the 3D part of the model.



Chinchilla sand is, of course, the wrong colour for engine sheds and so it all needs to be painted after drying. Lifecolor acrylics are perfect for this, and are washed over the surface, but any water-based brown paint is useful as a base coat. Let the colours blend together for a more natural effect.



In the corner of the board, the scene is bent to avoid a hard line running down the sky. You only need a very slight bend to avoid this and the results look better in real life and far, far better in photographs.



The entrance from the fiddle yard is easy to cut after fitting by pressing a cutting mat against the end of the board and working with a very sharp knife. Don't push the board into the curved corner as this could be damaged. At the other end, I've just painted the end board white as it has a large hole in it.

### **PRACTICAL BRM**



Operation is from the front of the model, so I need a panel for the point switches. This could be built into a box, but I felt the back of a building would look better. Resin models designed for the backs of layouts would be perfect, but a bit heavy. Digging on a shelf in my local model shop, I found this ancient Heljan kit, which looked big enough for the job.



For the layout's appearance at Warley, I quickly assembled the walls and put in place a sheet of plastic to hold the switches. This worked OK, but was too large for the space. I wanted to block the track entrance a little, but not this much.



Measuring the switches, I worked out that the building could be cut down considerably and still fit everything required. Compared to the original roof top, you can see it's not nearly as long and I've also lopped a couple of centimetres from the bottom too.



This side of the model faces away from the viewers, but it might appear in photos so I've added a bit of detail. Brick offcuts fill in the windows. After all, we don't need to see inside, so these have been coloured with a pencil crayon that's a lighter colour than the rest of the walls. To be honest, this is a pretty crude kit, but that's not a problem the way I'm using it here.



The operator side is a sheet of 2mm thick plastic card screwed to plastic blocks fitted inside the building. It slopes back to make the switches easier to use and more importantly, not stick out beyond the baseboard edge. If they did, the model won't fit in the box.

### Getting started with the scenery



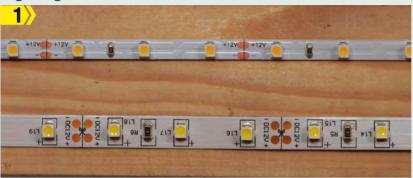
Keeping the weight of this model down is important so, rather than my normal wall filler mix for ground contours, I'm using Deluxe Materials 'Create and shape'. The pot and contents weigh almost nothing, which is perfect for this job. Chatting to someone from the company at a show, mixing the filler with acrylic paint before use was recommended so it takes the colour all the way through. That way, any accidental damage won't show. I'm mixing a small amount of emulsion paint in instead and it quickly turns in to a paste.



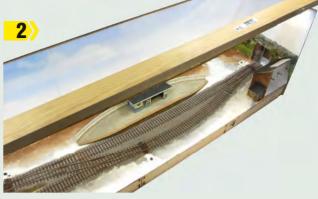
The paste is applied using a palette knife. Once the basic lumps are built up, dipping the knife in water smooths the surface perfectly with no need for sanding afterwards. Deft use of the knife also scrapped any blobs from the slightly shiny surface of the backscene without any damage.

# 00 GAUGE

### Lighting the model



Modern LED strips are an increasingly popular way to illuminate layouts. You can buy them from a roll in any length required and a single 12V supply is enough to drive several metres of lights. I'm testing both cool and warm white versions on the layouts. Since the fascia will be close to the model, hopefully it won't need lots of illumination. Again, weight is a consideration, but several metres of LEDs are lighter than a single incandescent bulb



Before building anything permanent, a test is arranged by taping two strips of light to a piece of wood. The LEDs are 25cm from the top of the baseboard and set close to the front. The light is very directional compared to conventional bulbs and I want to avoid shadows.



With all the room lights off, switching on the cool white set, the model has a definite blue cast. It's also not very well lit up.



Using both strips at the same time looks much better. For a start, everything is brighter as you'd expect, and the colours still have the summer's day feel of the warm whites. There are shadows, but I might be able to reduce these a little by angling the strips on the final fascia panel.



The warm lights seem brighter and with more of an orange hue far more appropriate for a summer's day. Even though I'm still only using a single strip, the light seems brighter too.

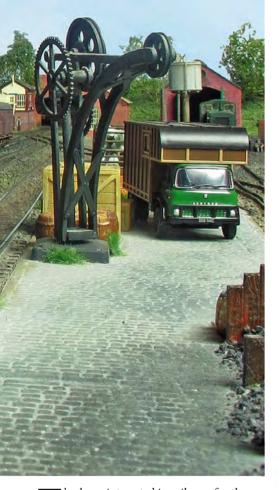

've been interested in railways for the majority of my life. Early layouts were temporary affairs set up on a baseboard using track from Hornby train sets. It would typically be set up for a few days before being packed away again, meaning no scenic work was ever done. Eventually when I was 16 I started building my first 'proper' layout, 'Bostcroft'.

When I was planning the layout I intended it to be set on the ex-Great Eastern section of the LNER. I had grand plans of building a suitable fleet of locomotives from kits, amongst which J15s and D16s. However, as construction began it soon became apparent that this dream wasn't going to be possible. Constraints on my time with education and starting a part-time job meant building the layout was a slow process. Alas, I still haven't managed to build that first locomotive kit.

The layout progressed slowly and as a





result my knowledge and interests changed. I therefore changed its period to the late 1950s instead of the earlier 1930s. This was so that I could include the first Diesel Multiple Units.

When the layout's first exhibition appearance at Boston in 2009, it was a fleet of mainly ex-LMS locomotives that took centre stage rather than the ex-Great Eastern fleet I had originally imagined. However, since then Bachmann and Hornby have showered us Eastern Region modellers with many wonderful locomotives. Therefore the layout now reflects its original Eastern Region origins.

### Solid foundations

The baseboards are constructed from 2in by 1in softwood frames with plywood tops. The track is Peco Code 100, which was ballasted with OO gauge ballast. This has been weathered with washes of enamel paints

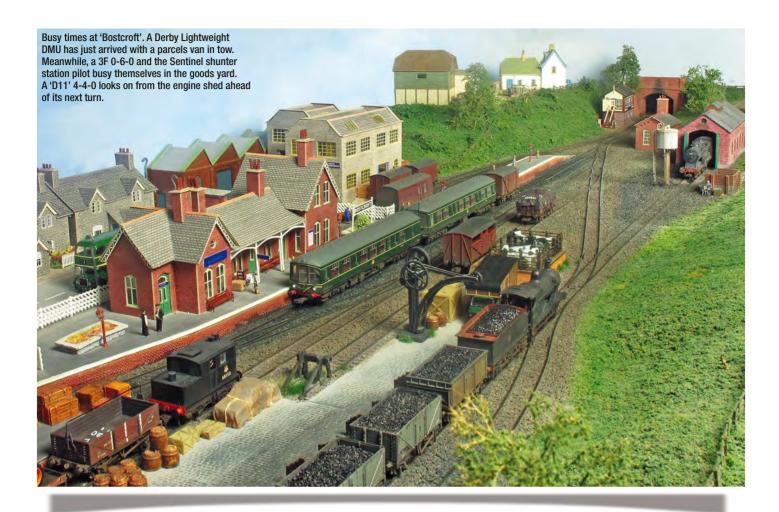
and doesn't look too bad. However, since building 'Bostcroft' I've learnt that a much better appearance can be gained by using Code 75 track and N scale ballast. As a result that's the combination I will be using on future layouts.

The fiddle yard consists of a 4ft long traverser with additional locomotive sidings at either end. It enables locomotives to be swapped without lifting them from the track. The traverser has been built using kitchen draw runners and is moved by hand and aligned by eye. Thus far I've found that no locking mechanism is required to ensure alignment because of the stiffness of runners.

### **Going Digital**

Originally the layout was wired for DC analogue control with a Gaugemaster walkabout controller. This soon changed after joining Boston MRS, where I was shown the

advantages of DCC. The layout was rewired to use the Lenz system. Originally, I used LH100 controllers, but recently I swapped over to the

Roco Multimaus.

Rewiring the layout for DCC was extremely easy. I'd already wired the layout to use the points as isolating sections, thus connecting each pair of rails across the board joints via jumpers. These droppers at the board joints were easily joined together and with the addition of one or two additional droppers the conversion was complete.

I'm often surprised to find that everything works straight away, despite the layout spending large amounts of time in storage.

The only difficulty I've experienced is with the traverser. Originally, I wired all the locomotive storage sidings into the bus with the intention of driving each locomotive into and out of its siding. However, I soon found that when the traverser is moved multiple rails with opposing polarities can easily come into contact with each other. The remedy for this was to make the locomotive sidings electrically dead so that only the main feed track to the on-scene area is live.

This reduces the likelihood of two opposing

rails touching each other, but now means that locomotives have to be manually pushed to their trains rather than driving them.

### Scenic Delights

The ground contours were created using expanded polystyrene. Shaping this into believable slopes was a messy affair with the small white balls getting everywhere. Plaster mixed with water and PVA was spread over the top. The PVA was used to give the final hard shell a little more impact resistance.

The plaster was painted with a brown paint to prevent stark white areas showing though. Woodland Scenics has been used for the greenery, and rubberised horsehair for

the bushes. The trees are from Greenscene. but recently these have been replaced with examples from The Model Tree Shop.

I often get asked about the ploughed field. This was created using a piece of corrugated cardboard box. This was first split in half, then glued down with the corrugations facing upwards. I covered it with real soil from the garden which was sieved to make it finer and remove stones. It was glued with the usual PVA and water mix.

### **Buildings**

The majority of the buildings were built from Metcalfe card kits. The station building, goods shed, warehouse and cottages are all from this range. You will also see the

workshop section of the same range's double track engine shed which originally graced the layout.

I realise such a large facility wouldn't be present at such a small terminus station, so it was removed and replaced with a single road engine shed. This is actually a continental kit that I've anglicised by replacing the pantile roof with a slate version.

The inn and stable are from the Superquick range, whilst the remaining buildings are ready to plant items. The signal box and additional warehouse buildings are from the Bachmann range whilst the weighbridge is Hornby.

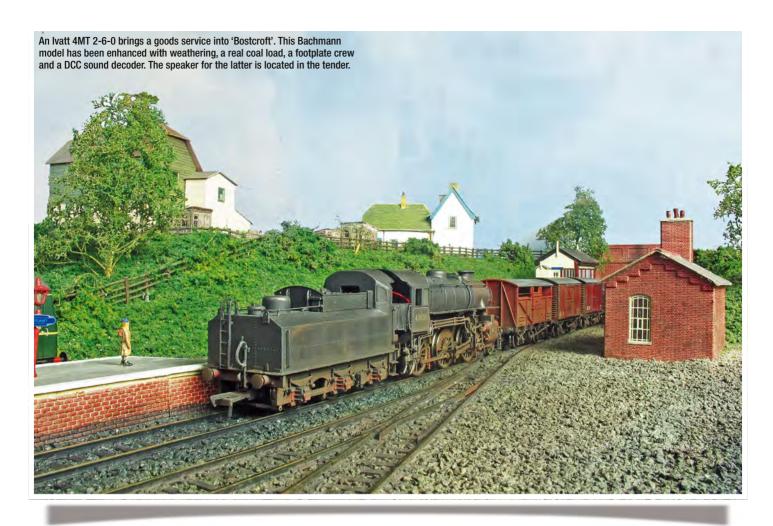
Additional items, such as the yard crane and coaling stage, are from the Ratio and Wills ranges. The detailing bits and pieces are mainly from the Ten Commandments range of plaster castings, and the figures are white metal castings from Langley.

### Operation

The layout is operated to a sequence of arrivals and departures. In this it is much busier than it would be in reality. However, at exhibitions I believe people want to see plenty An overview of the layout, a Class 03 shunter stands on shed while a Class 31 waits with the passenger service. of movement and the sequence is designed to allow for this. The layout is normally operated by two people; one operating the scenic section whilst the other mans the fiddle yard. This ensures the next trains are always ready to roll when needed.

The passenger services consist of two locomotive-hauled services supplemented by DMUs. A two-coach set is used as the branch line passenger. This would run from 'Bostcroft' to the mainline junction, connecting with other services. This service is usually operated by a tank locomotive, which starts the sequence from the engine shed. The coaches start from the yard where they're shunted towards the end of the sequence.

The second locomotive-hauled service is a longer distance passenger service linking 'Bostcroft' to other major towns. This is usually made up of three or four coaches and is hauled by a larger locomotive. A parcels train is also run in the morning, often hauled by a B17 or K3. Towards the end of the sequence the district inspector makes a visit in an inspection saloon.

During the sequence two 'pick-up goods' services are run, one in the morning and the same in the afternoon. I enjoy shunting and tend to be rather fussy about it, ensuring wagons are correctly positioned in the yard and that those with vacuum brakes are at the head of the trains.

In our sequence, it's important that the afternoon pick-up goods removes wagons to make space, otherwise things can get difficult for the operator. There are one or two 'curve balls' added into the sequence like this to keep the operators on their toes.

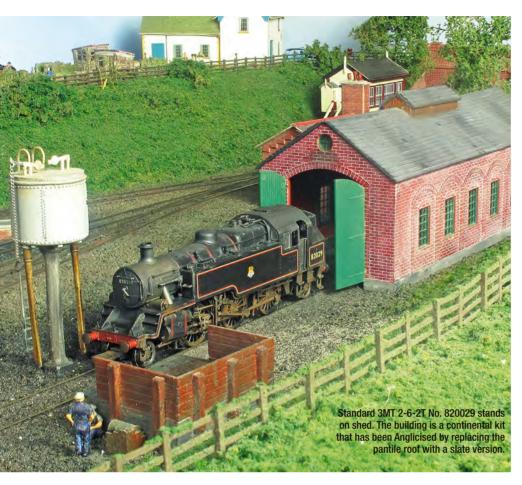
### All change

In the run up to the layout's first exhibition appearance at Boston in 2009 a fleet of mainly ex-LMS locomotives was assembled. This was due to the low availability of suitable ex-LNER types that could easily be fitted with decoders at the time. However, since then locomotives of classes B1, B17, K3, K1, L1, D11, J11, J50, D16 and J15 are available for service. I've also recently purchased a B12, which currently awaits a decoder. Early DMUs are also in evidence as well as a Class 31. All these are running in original all over green liveries without yellow warning panels. Station pilot duties are shared between a Class 03 and a Y1 Sentinel

I've been slowly upgrading my locomotives with weathering, fitting crews and fitting sound decoders. Sound is one of the major attractions of DCC and I've now got locomotives fitted with decoders from South West Digital, Howes, Legomanbiffo and YouChoos. It adds a whole new dimension to the operation of the layout and I get many favourable comments regarding it.

I've also ensured that my short wheelbase locomotives are fitted with stay alive capacitor units. The best example of the success of these is the Sentinel shunter. Previously this would infuriate me by stalling all over the place, but with the addition of the 'Stay Alive' it's now one of the best performing locomotives, so much so that sometimes I've only noticed an electrical problem when a longer wheelbase locomotive stalls.

Passenger rolling stock comprises of Hornby's Gresley suburban coaches, which I've weathered to good effect. I often add tail traffic to these, which comprise various CCT Vans and a milk tank wagon. The parcels train consists of Gresley and LMS full brakes along with a 'Stove R'.



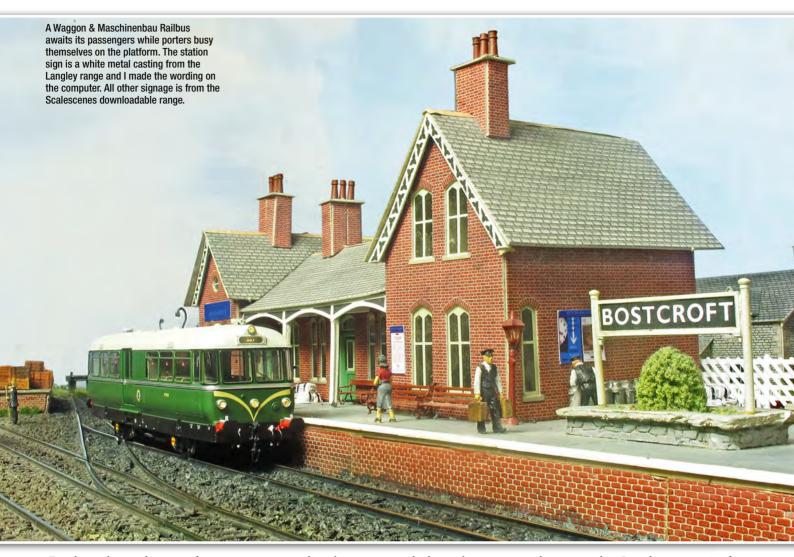
# Meet the modeller

Freight stock is ready-to-run from Bachmann and Hornby. I've added sheeted loads to the open wagons and some of those that look empty carry a folded sheet. One of the vans has been fitted with a sheet to make it look like the roof is leaking. Coal wagons have had loads fitted, but I've made the mistake of permanently fitting them so it looks odd when shunting them.

### Changes and Future

Since these photographs were taken I've carried out a number of upgrades, such as fitting signals and changing the trackplan to a more prototypical layout. At this time I replaced the previously used Insulfrog points with Electrofrog points. The new signals have been built from Model Signal Engineering kits and whilst they aren't operational yet it's on my 'to do' list.

A low-relief warehouse has also appeared at the end of the goods yard with additional greenery in the corner of the layout next to the bridge. This includes a tree that effectively hides the corner in the backscene.

One aspect I wish to address is the

couplings because currently the stock uses tension locks. I'm planning to change these to automatic couplings at some point to remove the 'big hand from the sky'.

I'm thinking these will comprise Sprat and Winkle couplings, but haven't decided yet.

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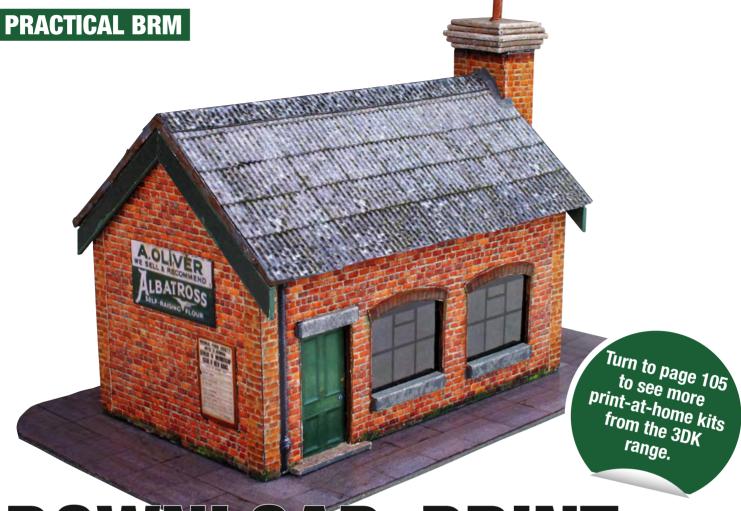

# DOWNLOAD, PRINT AND BUILD

Paper and card kits are a cost-effective way to assemble layout architecture, as Michael Russell proves with this print-at-home kit from Canadian manufacturer, 3DK.

've always been sceptical of cardboard buildings, because those I've used in L the past really did look like they were made from cardboard. That was many years ago, though, and I'm happy to report that modern kits and the improvement in print technology have changed the situation.

You can now make realistic models with a little effort. This downloadable brick office kit from 3DK is a good example of the genre, and is a simple step to make your first building. All you have to do is visit the website, pay a small fee for the kit of your choice and download a .PDF file to print at

home or at your local printers. There's no restriction on the number of times you can print the kit, so it's an economical way to make repetitive buildings such as terraced houses.

Lots of us are lax at reading instructions, but I recommend that you do because they're very good. The terms used are explained by means of a labelled picture indispensable information for a beginner. I had my kit professionally printed on 1mm card and plain paper, but a better option is to print onto A4 self-adhesive labels, then apply this to 1mm card when required.



You'll need a steel rule, scissors, the kit printed out onto self-adhesive white labels, 1mm thick card, a craft knife, felt tip pens or acrylic paint and fast-setting glue. A good quality 'self-heal' cutting mat is also recommended.

The windows include a curved section that's more difficult to cut out. I used a ballpoint pen that had run dry to indent the card before making the cut. It's easier to control freehand than the knife. Cut along the score made using a fresh scalpel blade.

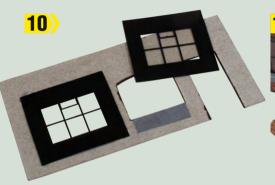
You may find it difficult to get a clean cut on the inside of the arches. You can print these again onto plain paper and glue them as overlays to hide damage.



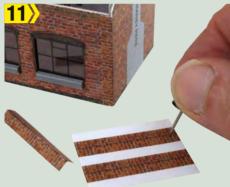
When gluing the internal walls, fit the two gable walls first, ensuring that the walls are centred on the apex of the roof, then add the rear internal wall.



Painting exposed cardboard surfaces, such as around windows and doors, is a small task that has a huge impact on the appearance of any cardboard building. I used neat Burnt Umber acrylic paint straight from the tube for brick areas.



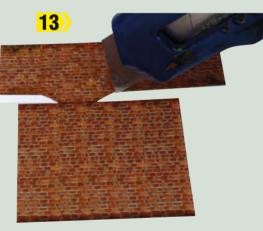
The windows were printed using an inkjet printer onto clear acetate (OHP transparency film). I glued the printed side facing inwards to give increased protection against water splashes. Take a moment to centralise these properly in the frames while the glue is wet.



When fitting the corner covers, mark the centre line with a pin on the printed side. Then, turn over and score between the pin holes. Ensure you get a straight fold and be gentle when handling. Once in place, slide gently until the brick courses align.



Some structures must be glued and left to dry before they can be wrapped in brick paper; for example, the chimney base. If you complete such items out of sequence in one session you can speed up production time, as you won't have to wait for glue to dry.



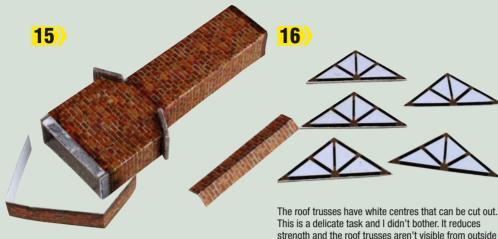
Wrapping the chimney in its brick covering is probably the trickiest part of the build. Cut carefully away from the corners to free the part.

### **Cutting sharp**

It is essential to keep your blade sharp - card blunts knives surprisingly fast. It's better to do this little and often, so I recommend passing the blade over a sharpening stone between each series of strokes used for a cut. Snap-off blades, often used in DIY knives, are ideal and it's a good idea to start with a fresh blade every now and again, and especially if you are working on windows, door apertures or anything curved.



Get the wrapper into place quickly when gluing. Use a seam roller to get an even finish without any rucks.



I found I had a gap at the base of the chimney and a seam visible above the roof line, so I added a wrapper and a spare corner cover to hide these. If you build from more than one set of prints, I recommend using the same printer to match the colour and sizes.

Use rubber bands to hold the roof in place whilst the glue dries.



At the end of the build have a close look for pieces of un-coloured card or paper. I noticed the inside of the bargeboards had been missed, and so touched this area up with a matching acrylic paint.

To make a cut, always use a steel rule and make several light passes with the knife. You need to hold the rule steady to ensure it doesn't move whilst pressing down lightly with the cutting blade. It's a bit like patting your tummy and rubbing your head at the same time! I find it easier to grip the rule from below the bench to pin the work to it rather that then to press down. It'll soon become second nature.

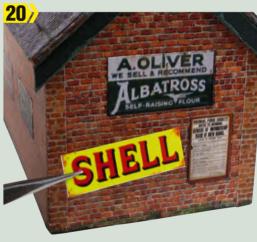

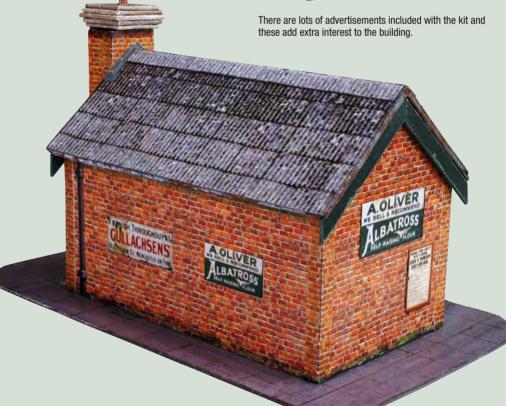


Add flashing from tissue paper around the joints between the roofs and vertical surfaces. I've used silver paper in the past which, whilst being too shiny, moulds well to contours.



I deviated from the instructions and used four trusses in the centre of the building and decided to forego the two on the gable ends. Use a rule to ensure that they are lined up otherwise your roof will be distorted.

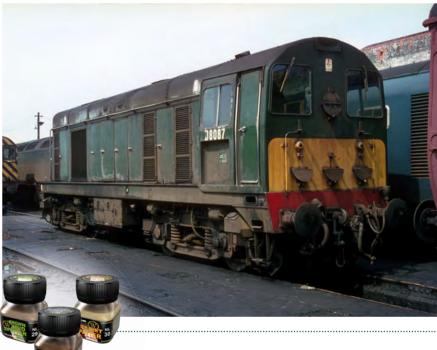

# Howard's Tip

Study the photograph carefully and you'll note that the roof deposits are largely exhaust-related, not dissimilar in appearance to a weathered steam locomotive. The bodysides have adopted a lighter colour of dirt, thrown up from track and ballast dust. A combination of Wilder NL-29 Brown Mud and NL-30 would make a be a good option, but apply in small quantities. The OHLE warning signs have been cleaned, you can use a cotton bud for this, working in a circular cleaning motion whilst the paint is still damp. The same applies to the bodyside doors. Note the cab windows have been cleaned, leaving dirt streaks over the yellow warning panel. I'd use Wilder NL-32 Rainmarks Wash for this.



Weathering in its extreme is seen every autumn on the railway as Railhead Treatment Trains (RHTTs) take to the rails. These are typically top-and-tailed by locomotives of all types, with DRS Class 20s, 37s, 57s, 66s and 68s, Colas Class 37s and 56s, DB Cargo Class 66s and 67s, Network Rail Class 97s and GBRf Class 20s, 66s and 73s having been used in recent times. With two wagons sandwiched in between, the locomotives get absolutely filthy to the point they become brown and it's hard to make out their liveries. The cab windscreens of locomotives coupled directly to the wagons are covered in grime and their wipers can only clean a portion. Seen at Tonbridge Yard in December 2015 is 66744 *Crossrail* sporting its layer of brown dirt; the bodyside number is indistinguishable and the logo is close to being the same. PIP DUNN



Starting with a clean locomotive, you'll only need two colours for this project — Railmatch 2402 Frame Dirt and Wilder NL-31 Exhaust Runs Effect. It's not a difficult project either because the locomotive has an even spread of dirt, so if you're new to airbrushing, here's a project you can try. Achieve the windscreen wiper marks by cutting masking tape to shape and applying before you spray.

Two subtle colours abound on the locomotive above soot and a brown traffic film. To create this effect, it's better to airbrush the locomotive from above and the sides with the overall dark matt grey colour, such as Lifecolor UA723, then leave to dry. Approach the lower sides - particularly the tender - and areas of detail such as steps with the airbrush at close quarters with the needle closed a little for a more accurate spray pattern. Lifecolor UA719 would be a good candidate here. Chassis and tender axleboxes can be picked out by brush with a thinned black satin paint, or Wilder NL-36 NitroLine Old Grease.

Collett-built 0-6-0 GWR tender locomotive No. 2217 pauses at Evercreech Junction with a lightweight train for Highbridge in September 1963. The Collet Goods was a product of a 1930s design, although this example was built in June 1940. With a little over a year left in service the locomotive has already lost its cast numberplates and smokebox number and is covered in a thick layer of grime. In the final few months of BR steam, locomotives were often in a deplorable external state. There was no desire to keep them clean because they could be withdrawn at any time. 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# WARLEY 2017 ROUNDUP

The country's largest model railway exhibition of the year at the NEC yielded interesting announcements in all scales. Howard Smith reports on all the headline stories.

# N GAUGE TILTING APT-P



A surprise announcement at Warley came from model shop Durham Trains of Stanley in the form of an APT-P. Commissioned as an exclusive from manufacturer DJModels, the N gauge models are to be offered in five, six, seven, 10 and 14 car sets. The ten and 14-car sets will have two working power cars for better tractive effort, the remainder, just one. Prices start at £549.95 for the five-car set to £899.95 for the 14-car set.

Shortly after the show, it was announced

on RMweb that its APT-P would also be made available in OO gauge, with prices starting at £649.95 for the five-car set to £995.95 for the 14-car set. Pre-orders are being taken via the Durham Trains of Stanley website, with no deposits required. A percentage of the sale proceeds are expected to go towards the restoration of the APT-P at Crewe Heritage Centre.

A promising specification will see each car tilt between 5 and 10 degrees independently

around curves with cars sharing bogies and power collection from 'as many axles as possible'. Power cars will be fitted with a heavy chassis, but the choice of motor had yet to be made as this issue went to press between a five-pole 'skew-wound' or coreless motor.

Cab lighting, a Next 18 decoder socket with PCB board conforming to MIBA standards, internal painted tables, chairs, kitchen and cab, and darkened RP110.72 profile wheels are to be included as standard. Letters will be printed on the underside of each coach to make train assembly easier. Couplings will be close, but enable trains to negotiate 2nd radius curves.

Crowdfunding for the project is via the Durham Trains of Stanley website and will remain open for six months maximum or close sooner if sign-ups are reached. Payment isn't required until the threshold is reached, upon which a deposit is required and customers will be invited to an exclusive scanning party at Crewe Heritage Centre. A light lunch and hot drink on the real APT-P has been promised, where deposit holders might also experience its tilt mechanism.

Models will be retailed in two or more trays containing four cars per tray, with a printed card sleeve and large clear plastic window.

Durham Trains of Stanley sees this model as part of a new West Coast range in N gauge and is looking to produce models of classes 81, 82, 83, 84 and 85, plus EMU classes 303, 304 and 312 in forthcoming years. ### **DAPOL**

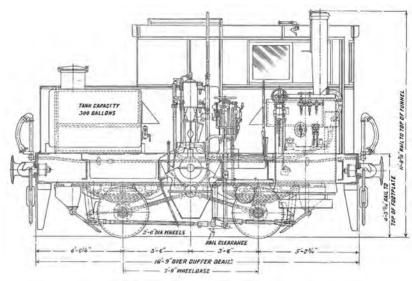
Good news for O gauge modellers came from the show with the unveiling of another locomotive at a highly competitive price, already CAD/CAM designed. Its Y1/Y3 Sentinel shunter is expected to be released at £175, £205 DCC-fitted and £350 with DCC Sound. Seven liveries have been announced, No. 42 in LNER black, No. 68163 (ex-LMS No.23) in LNER black, No. 7164 or No. 7160 in LMS black, No. 68164 in early BR livery, No. 2 Isebrook in GWR livery and No. 14 in NCB livery.

Dapol has released a number of CAD images of the model, revealing an impressive specification to include a die-cast chassis and running plate, sprung metal buffers and articulated screw coupling and a removable cab roof to give interior access when posing a model crew. Inside the cab, a glowing fire light effect in the boiler complements the high level of separately-applied detail - exceptional considering the cab is largely enclosed. A 21-pin DCC-ready socket is to be provided underneath the coal bunker and Dapol's proven motor and gearbox will offer smooth performance and slow running capabilities, essential for this small prototype.

Sentinel, based in Shrewsbury operated from 1906 and manufactured steam-powered lorries and locomotives, however was slow to adapt to the widespread use of the diesel engine, resulting in its takeover by Rolls-Royce. The Y1/Y3 Sentinel was part of a line of shunters it produced, largely based on its road-going lorry. A vertical boiler and chain drive system with adjustable gear ratios are a key feature of the design, which saw widespread use around industrial sites and mainly the LNER. The locomotives were largely replaced throughout the 1940s and 1950s with more modern designs. Dapol's model falls into the highly popular small locomotive category, which is proving popular with O gauge RTR manufacturers.

Seen on a display screen at the stand was a CAD model of the ex-Lionheart GWR 45XX 'Prairie', now to be made with a die-cast chassis and tooled body instead of brass. This second batch offers streamlined manufacturing improvements over its first batch of models, allowing the price to be reduced to an expected £495.00 or £650.00 DCC sound-fitted.

In other interesting news from the manufacturer, development of a new line of Mk. 1 coaches to include a BSK, SO, SK and CK will see five liveries launched; BR maroon, BR (SR) green, BR blue, BR carmine and

cream and BR (WR) chocolate and cream. Its first models will cover the early batch of coaches built between 1951 and 1960 and fitted with BR.1 bogies. Dapol was fast to declare that the later Commonwealth bogie variants built after 1961 will be modelled in subsequent batches - models that haven't previously been made available RTR in decorated form. To be made available with or without running numbers, an eye-watering 45 different coach variants have been announced, with a factory premium of £35 per coach for the fitting of DCC-controlled lighting.

Standard coach fitments include correct exterior and interior profiled sides and roof, which is to be made removable for the placement of passengers and ease of access to the internal workings, detailed window ventilators, underframe detail, body variations, die-cast bogie frames, sprung metal buffers and a close-coupling mechanism. A round door window bar, rounded step edges and correct number of corridor end steps as per period have been promised, whilst two versions of inter-coach cabing (stowed and deployed) and early and late versions of the corridor connector end doors will be represented too.

Dapol has completed the CAD artwork for the coaches and the models are currently in

tooling with first EPs expected to be on-show at the London Festival of Railway Modelling at Alexandra Palace on March 24 and 25, 2018.

Also unveiled at the show was CAD artwork for a lime van, a salt van, 5-plank open coal wagon and two types of 7-plank open coal wagon (a side door and end door). The tooling for these models is currently being produced and production is expected to commence in early 2018, adding to the bread and butter mainstay of Dapol private owner wagon offerings. RRP for the five and seven plank wagon is £44.41, with £49.95 for the salt and lime wagons.

Modellers in OO gauge haven't been neglected with the unveiling of a 34T YCV 'Turbot' bogie ballast wagon, proposed in EWS and engineers vellow/grey liveries, with three running number variants of each. CAD views of the model have revealed a high detail specification, with a wealth of underfloor detail.

The 'Turbot' prototypes re-used the steelcarrying bogie bolster 'E' underframes, being fitted with new sides to convey ballast until mass-withdrawal in the late-1990s and early-2000s. A model of the bogie bolster 'E' is being developed alongside the 'Turbot' by Dapol, with both due for release by Q2, 2018.

# HATTON'S TO PRODUCE **INTERMODAL WAGONS**

Model retail giant Hatton's firmly planted a flag in the soil at the show as it revealed plans to produce models of an FEA Intermodal wagon. Manufactured between 2004 and 2007, the wagons acted as replacement upgrades for previous generations of intermodal flats to cope with the predicted increased levels of containerised traffic of the 21st century.

Also used to carry track panels, the wagons will be offered in OO gauge in both guises, with Freightliner green with or without track panel carriers, GBRf blue, GBRf/Metronet yellow with blue track panel carriers and TransPlant yellow. Hatton's expects the wagons to arrive by November 2018.

Model specification will see separately applied brake pipes and lamp irons, with a detailed underframe to include brake rigging, hangers and pipework. Where applicable, the track panel carriers will be removable and, if desired, could be substituted for 20 or 40ft containers with removable twistlocks. NEM coupling sockets and sprung buffers will also feature.

'Sandite' and 'Water Jet' containers are being produced too, allowing Hatton's to offer Rail Head Treatment Train (RHTT) wagons as used throughout the Autumn and Winter seasons across the entire network on 20 daily circuits to reduce wheel slippage. The 50 prototype wagons are painted black and fitted with a combination of either water tanks, water jetting modules or 'Sandite' modules and soon weather to a brown hue. Two versions are being produced with an additional water wagon, all in a choice of pristine or weathered finish.

Hatton's is producing five versions of the FEA-E and seven versions of the FEA-S single intermodal wagons. Prices start at £32 for single FEA-E wagons without track panel carriers to £126 for a 'Sandite' or 'Water jet' wagon twin-pack with six modules. For full details, visit its website.

# **REVOLUTION**

Revolution celebrated its third year at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition at the NEC in 2017, after a year that has seen significant growth and the successful development of a further four models. On show was a hand-painted model of its Class 92 electric in N gauge in the attractive teal livery of Caledonian Sleeper. The unpowered model was assembled from components sent for assessment. This month, the manufacturer is expecting a second sample with the drivetrain and motor/PCB/lighting arrangements finalised.

Once the second prototype is assessed and approved, the model will be ready for production and the order book will close, expected late spring.

The first moulded samples of RevolutioN Trains' IZA Cargowaggon twin van were on display at the show. Barring a few alterations, the model is ready for livery samples and the manufacturer expects it to enter production after Chinese New Year in Spring 2018.

The finalised CAD drawings of this model were on show which is ready to go into tooling, however RevolutioN Trains stated that whilst initial expressions of interest were healthy, orders haven't matched expected levels. 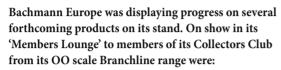

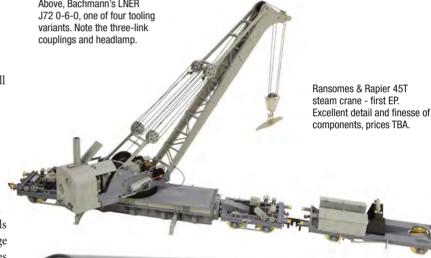

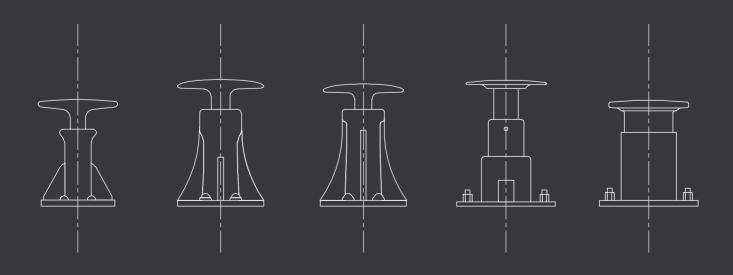

Hatton's has received decorated samples of its 14in and 16in Barclay tank locomotives and we've had the opportunity to look at its 14in tank, *Coronation*, as preserved at Carnforth in the 1980s in lined green livery. Painting and decoration is very good with well-defined twin bands of lining, printed works plates and nameplates, brass-edged cab windows, silver-painted smokebox door darts with painted cab detail. The handrails are separately fitted items and there's a wealth of piping and cabling, although care must be taken when removing the body from the chassis. The brass whistle on the cab chimney is robust and unlikely to be damaged with handling. An accessory pack contains a hook and three-link coupling and vacuum pipes for locomotives so fitted. The chassis is a well-designed block, with easy access to the 6-pin decoder socket in the firebox behind the 5-pole motor. It allows cab detail and leaves space for a sugar cube speaker in the smokebox.

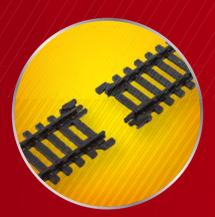
Running has shown the mechanism to be exceptionally smooth and quiet and despite the diminutive wheelbase of the model, it has shown no hesitation over pointwork. # **BACHMANN SE&CR 'BIRDCAGE' COACHING STOCK**



Following on from Bachmann's recent release of the Birdcage stock in BR Crimson, we have the opportunity to take a closer look at the sumptuous South Eastern & Chatham Railway's dark lake version. It's very easy to see where the extra fiver above the plain crimson version goes in terms of painting and decoration!

After manufacturers are happy with the shape and running of any engineering samples they move on to decoration samples, where the colour and finish is looked at. In this case further tweaks to the colouring were made, as it's not a livery we have previously seen offered on ready-to-run coaching stock. The base colour is a slightly purplish brown tone. Initial samples were deemed to be a little too flat and the colour has been adjusted to give, I feel, a good representation of the dark lake livery applied to 4 and 6-wheel LCDR coaching stock on the Bluebell Railway.

I've often admired the art of signwriting craftsmen's work on pre-grouping stock, and that beauty is evident in the lettering and numbering applied to Bachmann's model. Close observation of every individual letter and number reveals that there are laser applications of the five different colours that make up the shadowed gold lettering, with absolutely precise registration; it's quite superb. Difficult to capture in images taken against a plain white background is the pale eggshell finish to the roof, which is similar to the split milk tone of L&NWR coaching stock.

Such has been the increase in interest over recent years in pre-grouping models, be they applicable to the railways of the early 20th century or in preservation, that there will be many modellers who already possess a Bachmann C Class or Hornby H Class, with Hatton's P Class soon to arrive in their gloriously complex SE&CR passenger locomotive liveries.

I am sure there will be many people who buy a set of the three Birdcage coaches in this livery. Not because they are pre-grouping or preservation modellers, but because this model is just so attractive.

# IRISH RAILWAY MODELS CEMENT BUBBLE WAGON



Following the first wagon release from IRM of the ballast wagons, the company's second project has started to arrive with modellers. This is a particularly significant model, as I shall explain later in the review, so even if you are not a follower of the Irish scene please do read on.

Introduced in seven batches from 1964 to 1972, these distinctive Córas Iompair Éireann wagons, with something of a continental air to them, were used to transport bulk cement powder from Irish Cement's plants at Drogheda, Castlemungret and Platin to distribution points all around the CIE, Iarnród Éireann and Northern Ireland Railway's networks through to the end of cement traffic by rail in Ireland in 2009.

The CIE ivory livery of our sample, Set B, is from the later 70s through to the end of traffic, and follows on from the earlier grey and orange liveries that IRM is also producing. In use, however, one livery was barely distinguishable from another due to the coating of cement dust that was normally seen on 'bubbles'.

The model looks right from every angle compared to the photographic reference that I have looked at, which is not bad for a complex but distinctive shape. The seam detail to the tank is very nicely captured, the ladder and etched platform details are excellent and the moulding to the loading hatch and fittings on the top of the tank are very fine. The valves and pipework at one end of the wagon are fine but robust, and the pressure regulator even has the dial detail printed on it. There is absolutely nothing at all to fault on it.

Turning the model over the bottom of the tank and the rounded discharge wells are there, as is all of the discharge pipework and the braking equipment. In my previous review of the ballast wagon I had commented that the axle irons were a touch too thick; that has been addressed on this model and they are much finer. The model has sufficient space between axleboxes to enable modellers of Irish railways to accommodate wheelsets to run on 21mm track with minor work.

In my view, this is probably one of the best and finest ready-to-run wagons I have seen come to the market. The reason why this superb model of a niche prototype is significant is because Irish Railway Models is coming to the UK market. IRM will announce its first products early in 2018 under their new brand name 'Accurascale'. I really am looking forward to seeing what the company can do with some UK prototypes.

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# **BACHMANN D CLASS OPEN BOGIE WAGONS**



Marrow gauge railways can be a nightmare for any manufacturer attempting to introduce rolling stock models. Many lines built their own stock and, since each railway was isolated from others, they didn't share designs. How do you chose what to model?

Bachmann have taken a very pragmatic approach. During World War 1, lots of stock was built for trench railway use and, after the conflict flooded the market, was snapped up by struggling railways across the country. Wagons once filled with armaments and wounded soldiers could find themselves running well into the late 1950s full of potatoes in Lincolnshire, for example.

Now arriving in the country are the first two wagons in the range; a Class D open and bogie ambulance van. Both were produced to a standard design by many manufacturers.

The models share a common plastic bogie moulding fitted with 9mm gauge metal wheels. The prototypical brake standards will impede the swing on extreme curves, but they are perfectly happy on the tightest Peco 009 set track. Berno-style couplings appear to be fitted into metal pockets, although I couldn't seem to extract the units. All are painted to match the bogies – weathered grey on the WD wagons and clean black on the WHR version.

Most of the bodywork is plastic but with die-cast floors to add some useful weight. The van certainly feels heavier than you would expect. Details appear accurate and are crisply moulded.

The big surprise is that both the van side and end doors can be slid open. This reveals racks of stretchers. Correctly, there are two rows at one and only a single at the other. In the past, operating doors have been a bit of a gimmick, but here the plastic runners are scale size yet strong enough to stand up to this. Photos of NG wagons running with doors part open are common and simply setting each wagon differently in a train provides variety.

All the wagons enjoy modern standards of decoration. Both official stencilled lettering and handapplied chalk marks are represented. The weathering is subtle so there is scope to model some of the really filthy and decrepit vehicles that were to be seen.



### **Opinion**

For years, 009 modellers had to rely on kit or scratch-building to produce rolling stock. Those options are still open but they will allow those nervous of making what can be fiddly models to add a narrow gauge feeder line to their existing OO layouts. With RRP around twice that of a kit it's understandably more expensive, but I suspect the crisp mouldings and decoration will win many over. An excellent start to the range.

cut with a knife. I've masked the top to keep the 'water' on the surface. Otherwise, I have not prepared the wood in any way.







Once dry, the water looks pretty good. You wouldn't know that it's only a few millimetres thick. Skilled boat modellers produce some amazing effects but, as I've never done anything like this before, I tend to model still water. I'm very happy with the result and it was certainly popular at the show with several people asking how the look was achieved.

Finally, the tips of the waves are highlighted with White Water Highlight. Squirting some of the paint onto a piece of plastic makes it easier to pick up on a brush.

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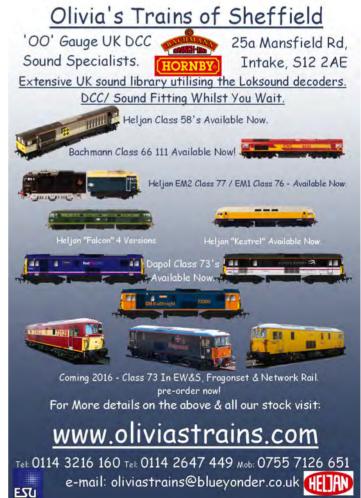






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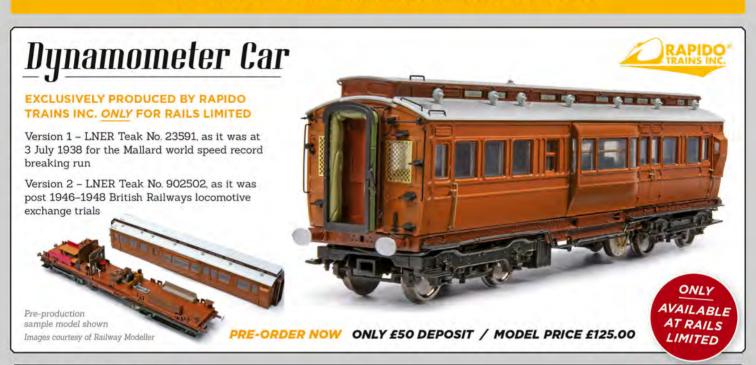
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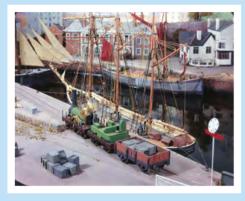


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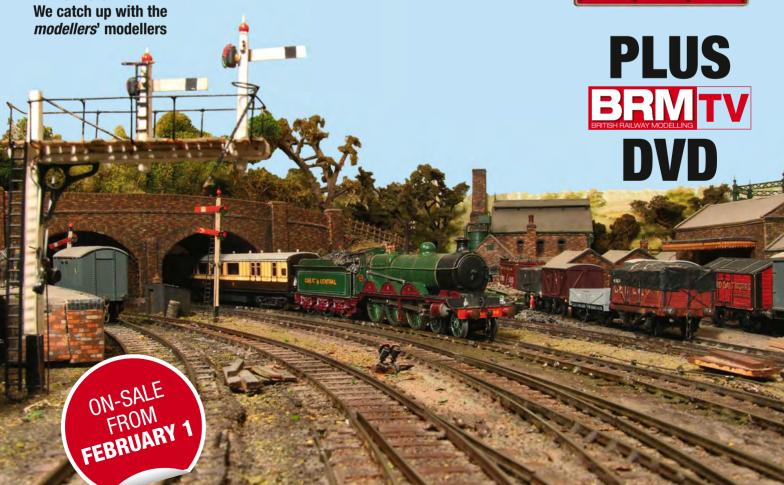


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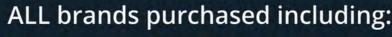
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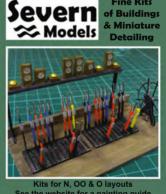


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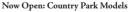
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# TAIL LAMP

Why aren't more RTR locomotives fitted with everything required to ensure smooth running, wonders Michael Russell...



magine my surprise when I found that the advice to slacken the baseplate did indeed reduce the number of times a small tank locomotive stalled. This got me thinking about why that particular tweak often works and what else can be done to stop the number of times I have to employ the 'hand of god'. I feel this is important for two reasons. Firstly, locomotives stalling is a factor that puts me, and I'm sure others, off the hobby. And secondly, there is a trend at the moment towards producing smaller locomotives where current collection issues are more likely due to the limited number of wheels present in the design. Of course, my comments are written on the proviso that you are keeping up with your regular wheel and track cleaning, which is an important factor in good performance.

Slackening the baseplate works because it creates a very rudimentary suspension. Even one wheel that is spring-loaded against the track improves reliability, but although this feature has been factory-fitted in the past, it seems to have fallen out of favour recently.

My best running 0-6-0 locomotive that lacks suspension is a Hornby Class 08 diesel. Why is this superior to comparable models? This seems to be down to the use

of a large flywheel, which, along with very low gearing, is sufficient to iron out any defects in the track work. It also means very smooth running, even when using cheap decoders with rudimentary motor control. Admittedly, most diesels must be a model manufacturer's dream, but I do wonder why more flywheels aren't fitted as standard to all locomotives. After all, flywheels are weighty and so can be fitted without sacrificing this important characteristic.

Pickups need to be maximised, but there are still locomotives being made that lack this feature. Also, I often find that pickups on factory-fresh models don't meet the wheels for the full range of movement and this can cause problems on curves. The last resort is to fit an electronic flywheel, and this works, although there are issues with both space and cost. It doesn't help DC users either, which is perhaps why it hasn't, to date, been factory-fitted.

Diesels and electric locomotives with bogies and steam locomotives with tender pickups are the best 'non-stallers' and so we'll leave those out of the equation, but for all the rest, I don't know of any ready to run locomotives that have all of the anti-stall features, and wonder why that is. Personally, I would rather pay more for locomotives that don't contain any compromises with regard to running quality.

Surely good running is in the manufacturers' best interests. Locomotives that are accommodating for poor track laying skills would gain a greater appreciation rating and therefore sales. The irony is, of course, that new starters in the hobby often buy the cheaper locomotives and track, have poorer track laying skills, and are more likely to suffer from stalling and the detrimental effect on their enjoyment of the hobby. Perhaps even budget locomotives should be factory-fitted with features that maximise their tolerance of less sophisticated track and poorly laid

I will be writing a series of articles showing you how to improve the majority of your locomotives to the point where you never have to endure another stall. It is possible and it's definitely worthwhile!



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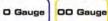

# ALBON METALS

Richard Coleman built this scrapyard shunting layout to display locomotives from the BR Sectorisation era - a favourite of his. A fair amount can be learnt from this compact trackplan.



The sheer quantity of things to look at on this compact layout detracts the eye from an otherwise quite simple trackplan.

lbion Metals is a small, rail served scrapyard set in the industrial West Midlands. It is very loosely based on operations at Bilston which was situated at the end of a long siding from Wednesbury Yard.

Given that this layout is purely a shunting yard, it does have its operational limitations as well as reducing the possibilities to run other types of train with different items of rolling stock. That said, the very nature of this site permits some of the more unusual forms of motive power such as small industrials to be used to full effect.

A simple track plan is used with two exchange sidings and two loading sidings with the use of an industrial shunter to move the wagons around the yard.

#### MORE REALISTIC TRACK

The track used is Peco code 75 finescale, with small radius live frog points - in-keeping with

the shunting theme that this layout portrays. The two storage sidings can be isolated to switch off locomotives at the buffer stops.

N gauge ballast was used on the track and Woodlands Scenic cinders and Carr's ash ballast for general ground cover. Siflor tufts and various scatter powders and ground foam were used for weeds, all glued down with PVA glue. The rails were painted with rust coloured paints and the entire trackwork flooded with lots of thinned down black and 'grime' coloured paints. It is these elements, that when achieved correctly, bring a trackplan to life.

#### SIMPLE LAYOUT OPERATION

Richard operates the layout from the front. Albion Metals was never built for general exhibitions and when at home, it sits on a small table. On the odd occasion when it does attend local shows, it sits on adjustable trestles that are readily available from DLY retailers.

The points are switched using piano wire push rods

# FIDDLE YARD BUILDERS YARD 0 0.5 1.0 1.5 2.0m





The urban sprawl of Central London is one of the least evident areas in which to site a terminus station of small proportions. But, it is possible.



f you are lured by the idea of modelling a railway set somewhere near the 'big smoke', then here is a layout that can get you thinking creatively – Geoff Ashdown's Tower Pier.

Attempting to re-create the inner-city 'muck and grime' of the mid-1950s, when coal fires burned a plenty, the layout is uniformly weathered using sooty tones. It is also very busy architecturally, making the most of every square inch of space. At only ten feet in length by 20 inches in width, the trackplan on this layout really does employ the room available on the baseboards to its fullest, placing all other items into a secondary position.

What makes it so appealing? The urban architecture. Correctly weathered bridges and archways built with London brick adorn all sides of the layout, ridding the need for a

backscene. Every item on the model has to fight for space. The water tower is sandwiched between the track, a canal, a loco crew building and a retaining wall, whilst the signalbox that controls the station entrance is elevated above the rails – its metal frame and stairway being a little different. The short station canopy effectively takes up the most space on this layout, being just under half a metre long in length, but still, it has enough room in width to accommodate two platforms – one even being an island.

#### **SETTING THE SCENE**

What makes London, London? Evidently, the amount of room on this layout is limited, but with some clever designing, Geoff managed to incorporate a road bridge, allowing him to place two red 'double-decker' buses – a hint that this is the London scene and an area not immune to bustling public transport.

#### A SCALE FOR A REASON

Tower Pier has been built to EM gauge, a scale chosen by a need for the trackwork to fit the surrounding area, rather than let the track dictate the situation and placement of structures and other architectural features. This works for Geoff, but whether or not this fits your specific criteria, only you can decide. **BRM**
