# Welcome

uddenly, it seems model railway programmes on our TV screens are all the rage. Last years' The Biggest Little Railway In The World on Channel Four and Channel 5's The Great Model Railway Challenge put our hobby in the spotlight. This month saw the airing of James May's Big Trouble in Model Britain. Perhaps Wednesday at 9pm on BBC Four isn't prime time, but it opened the nation's eyes to a manufacturer in difficulty, whilst sharing some of the processes in the development of new models. The two episodes provided a 'fly on the wall-style' insight on how its revitalised team is frantically attempting to turn the business around - a new business model for a model business. If anything, it highlighted how the manufacturer that once dominated shelf space with model retailers is now fighting for its existence as it seeks to beat competition, some of which is now from the very retailers it supplies.

In this issue, Phil Parker meets with Digitrains (pages 78-81) to ask beginners' questions in a bid to better explain the basics. Despite its main asset being simplified wiring, the functionality of Digital Command Control (DCC) remains a puzzle to many newcomers to the hobby. There are increasing complications when using DCC, however – as we add more sound and functions

to our models, remembering which button to press and when can prove difficult to remember. On pages 54-57, we look at a method of making life easier for DCC users - computer control. Though only used by a minority of DCC users at present, Bachmann believes it is the future of model railway operation, simplifying control and further reducing wiring.

Choosing a modelling accessory that best matches your needs can be challenging at times, particularly if you're not familiar with all the ranges available. On pages (74-77), as part of a new series, we look at colour light signal options for modellers, their functionality and ease of integration with analogue or digital systems.

Meanwhile, 'Stoke Courtenay' takes centre stage as our lead layout. The beautifullymodelled and neat scenes are perfect examples of real-world escapism with images that take you back to a simpler life in the 1930s. It runs superbly too, as BRM subscribers will see in

the extras menu of BRM TV. John Condon is clearly a talented modeller, and to bring the story full-circle, his passion and interest in the hobby all started with Hornby O gauge clockwork trains in the early-1950s. Enjoy! ■ MULTI-MEDIA EDITOR | Howard Smith

# GET THE LOOK

1: KB Scale (www.kbscale.com) kit-built skip wagons. To make them tip, Giles had to modify the pivots, then devise a way not to gum them up again when painting and weathering! A tipping rail unloads the skips, a system used on the continent and in East Anglia.

2: This Hornby conveyor belt has been used 'back-to-front' and repainted from its original yellow. PVA glue strakes applied to the belt with a cocktail stick ensure the coal doesn't roll backwards.

3: Bagnall 0-4-0ST built from a Roy Link kit, now in the KB Scale range. All locomotives are controlled using a Gaugemaster Prodigy 2 DCC system.

4: Ixion Models Fowler 0-4-0 dieselmechanical locomotive.

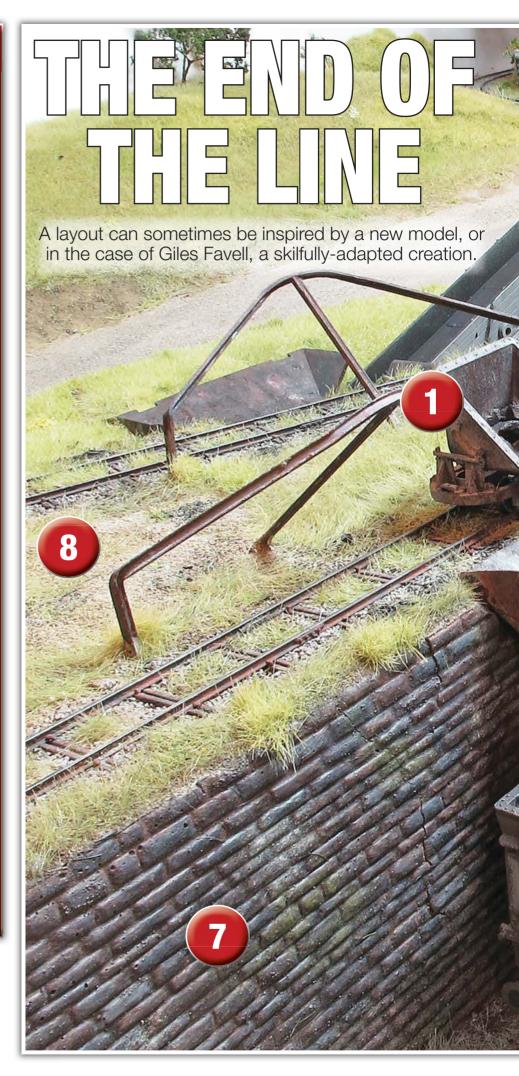
5: Lionheart 16T mineral wagons.

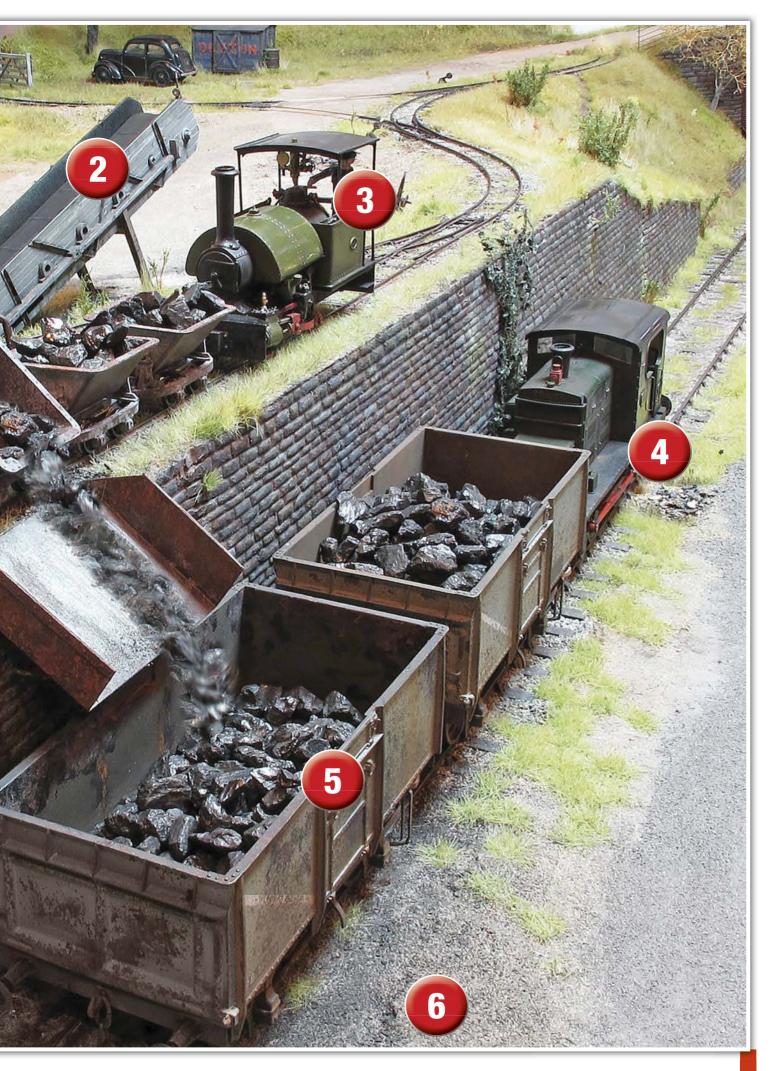
6: All roads are laid using a PVA/Plaster mix. When dry, another thin coat of PVA is applied, followed by sieved ash recovered from bonfires. Different fires produce different grades of ash, so Giles collects and stores these for future use.

7: Starting with a master made from embossed Plastikard, a mould was taken, with the wall cast in Hydrocal - a gypsum product composed mainly of plaster of Paris and a small amount of Portland cement.

8: Electrostatic grass is a mixture of three types – 4.5mm spring, 4.5mm summer and 6mm winter to represent new shoots forcing their way through old growth. A Greenscene Flock-It tool was used for application. With the basic layer applied, Giles spent time adding texture to the greenery.

Giles Favell's compact layout started with a 7mm scale working radio-controlled flatbed lorry. Once made, building a layout for the miniature mechanical marvel to operate on seemed a sensible choice. To make things more interesting, the standard 0 gauge line is fed by a narrow-gauge railway running on 14mm gauge track (014), complete with automatic unloading of the skip wagons. This might only be a little layout at 5ft x 3ft, but it packs plenty of action.





# STOKE COURTENAY

Following a two-decade hiatus, John Condon's finescale Utopia is an outstanding effort, capturing the spirit of a GWR junction station in the confines of a home loft.

I worshipped at the shrines of Gresley and Stanier, whose creations seemed to me the epitome of speed, power and modernity.

dabbling with Hornby and Lima diesels on a contemporary layout for my then teenage son, that was it until I retired in 2011.

#### Starting over

In that year my wife persuaded me that we needed a new roof, and that while we were at it, a proper floor in the loft for storage, with power and light. A few months later, 'Stoke Courtenay' was born.

Living in a semi-detached house with a hipped roof meant that the loft had only one vertical wall. There was therefore an inevitable trade-off between the area available for the layout and its height from the floor. I'm a great fan of viewing models at track level, and eventually compromised at a height of 43in – eye level when seated! – that allowed around 13ft x 12ft for the layout. The question then was what to build?

#### Pick and mix

Having such a limited modelling history and a lot to learn, I considered playing safe by building a branch line terminus – after all, GWR small prairies were among my favourite locomotives. But so were 'Castles', and the cornucopia of enticing RTR models now available were irresistible, pointing me to a junction station. This would provide the best of both worlds, combining all the usual branch line workings with main line running, plus the added operational interest of tail traffic and branch through coaches. Something like Brent on the South Devon main line, junction for the Kingsbridge branch, seemed to fit the bill and, with quite a bit of simplification, filled the space.

Plans were drawn and redrawn, finally being marked out full-size on lining paper on the loft floor, using C&L point and Timber Tracks curve templates. Features of the real Brent that had to be jettisoned included the characteristic siting of the goods shed on a loop and the two goods refuge sidings, resulting in a rather 19th century type of track plan with no facing points on the main line. I also decided that operation would be more satisfying if I re-designated the up line as down and vice versa, so we have to assume that my offstage branch terminus, 'Earlsbridge', is located somewhere on the southern slopes of Dartmoor, rather than near the coast like Kingsbridge. The equally fictitious 'Stoke Courtenay' takes its name from the family of the Earls of Devon.

#### Clever construction

Given that access to the loft is via a ladder and through a hatch, this was never to be

a portable layout. Vague memories of the estimable C. J. Freezer enthusing about the American L-girder system of baseboard support many years ago prompted further research which, following a large delivery from a local timber merchant, enabled me to construct a sturdy and stable structure integrated into the roof timbers and the new floor. The L-girders were each made from two lengths of 2in x 1in softwood, screwed and glued together at right angles. They are immensely strong and can cope with unsupported spans of 9ft, economising on timber and avoiding a forest of baseboard legs. A portion of this infrastructure was dropped to a lower level to allow the landscape to fall below the level of the railway. The surface, of 12 mm MDF supported on 2in x 1in cross bearers, was restricted to those areas where track was to sit.

#### Going finescale

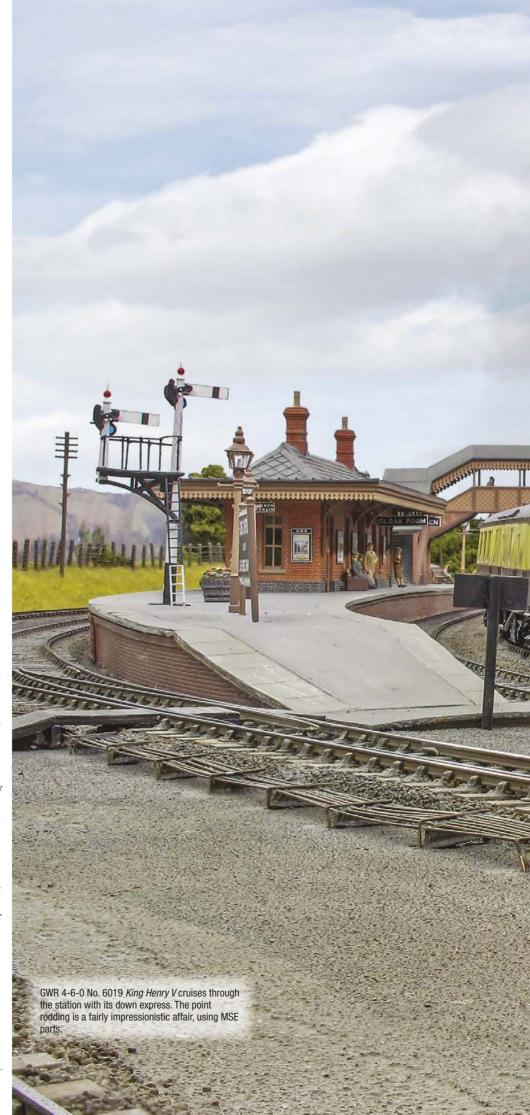
Plain track is from C&L. One of my 'must haves' was proper steam-age track with bullhead rail and fully-chaired pointwork. At the time this meant scratch-building the points, my first big challenge. But before starting this task, using C&L components, I did some research into track standards and came across 00-SF, in which the track gauge through pointwork is reduced to 16.2 mm, effectively EM standards, less 2mm of the gauge. The usual arguments in its favour are that it looks better and gives greater wheel support through crossings, while accepting modern wheels without alteration. All true, but the clincher for me was that it enabled me to use C&L's pre-fabricated crossing assemblies, designed for EM and 00 finescale, saving this lazy man much work.

#### Learning curves

After a false start on my first turnout, I really enjoyed tracklaying, building all subsequent points in situ, the majority on a curve. It was a revelation how firmly Butanone bonded plastic chairs to ply sleepers, yet allowed easy repositioning if necessary, by slicing off with a knife blade and re-sticking. However, confidence failed me when it came to the single and double slips, which were made for me by Stephen Freeman (Borg-Rail). Carr's ballast from C&L was used throughout, thoroughly weathered, with the ash variety in the goods yard.

#### Hands-free operation

Control is by a Prodigy wireless system.

DCC was new to me, and although I haven't exploited all its possibilities, I saw immediately that it would be of immense benefit in the types of operations I had in mind. A power bus formed from 25mm self-adhesive copper tape runs below the baseboards, and every single piece of rail is connected to it by a soldered dropper wire. Points are controlled from the wireless handset via Cobalt Digital motors with inbuilt frog polarity changing. In the early days, point operation would occasionally cause locomotives elsewhere on the layout to slow or stall momentarily, but the installation of a second copper tape bus, specifically for point and signal operation, soon cured this. The signals are heavilymodified Dapol items, operated from push buttons on the layout fascia.

#### Scenics, buildings

Scenery is deliberately a fairly broad-brush. The landscape was formed from an egg box framework of thick cardboard, cut to profile and glued to the baseboard timbers, over which a lattice work of thinner card strips was applied with a hot glue gun. This framework then received a 'glueshell' finish from hundreds of torn-up coarse paper towels, pasted with lashings of cheap PVA. Grass in fields and meadows is from Noch grass mats, joins being disguised by hedges or paths. This is easy and effective, but a coarser texture and colour was needed for cuttings and embankments on the railway side of the fence. This was achieved with a mixture of WWS grass fibres, applied with a static grass applicator from the same firm. Trees, bushes and hedges are mainly from Woodland Scenics products.

From the outset I had a clear idea of the look I wanted for the landscape - sparse, uncluttered, almost austere - conjuring up, I hoped, some sense of wide-open spaces on a two-foot-wide baseboard. This is not the bustling Midlands, or even the fleshpots of Torbay, but the southern fringes of Dartmoor in the depressed 1930s. A key element in achieving this look was reducing the backscene height so the horizon was only about 3½ in above rail level. I also resisted the temptation to add too many buildings, people or motor vehicles and tried to keep colours fairly pale and restrained.

I didn't originally intend to have nonrailway buildings on the layout, but Bachmann's three-quarter low-relief church cried out to fill a corner, and its 'Pendon' pub was irresistible. A Ratio garage kit added a

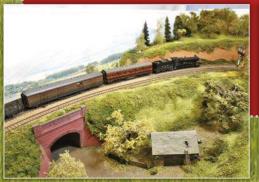




You won't be surprised that layouts taking Brent as their starting point hold special interest for me. Robin Sweet's 'A nod to Brent' brilliantly encapsulates the late 1940s scene on the south Devon main line, with occasional episodes of time travel to the mid-1950s. It's a never-failing source of interest, amusement and good modelling. Where does he keep all those locomotives?

Another variation on this theme is 'Teignbridge', built by 'Ardmore' in Atlanta, Georgia, but beautifully conjuring up the Western Region in Devon in the late-1950s, and including the branch line and terminus as well as the junction station. Its open and spacious aspect is the kind of thing I've been trying to emulate.

Finally, Kevin Phare's 'Little Muddle' portrays a bucolic 1930s GWR branch line in exquisite detail. It's a masterclass in scenic modelling, the result of craftsmanship and observation skills of the first order. Though this aspect of modelling is not where my own main interests lie, or indeed, my skills, one has to say that the results are breathtaking.

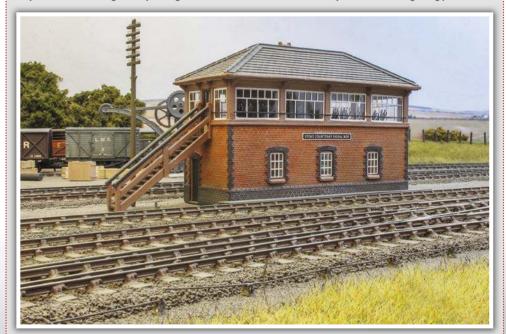
workaday element, and together they give a nod to the presence of a village. The station buildings are from Timber Tracks kits satisfyingly complex and enjoyable to put together. The key is final painting, done by the dry-brush technique - another learning curve. The footbridge is an ancient Hornby kit by Pola, butchered to reduce its height by almost 50%, while the signal box and water tower are both Bachmann commissions for Kernow Model Rail Centre. Some readers might recognise the venerable Ratio goods shed, cattle dock and yard office. Bridges and tunnels are scratch-built from various thicknesses of Plastikard and Slater's stone sheets. They are all based on examples in the various photographic albums of the 1930s

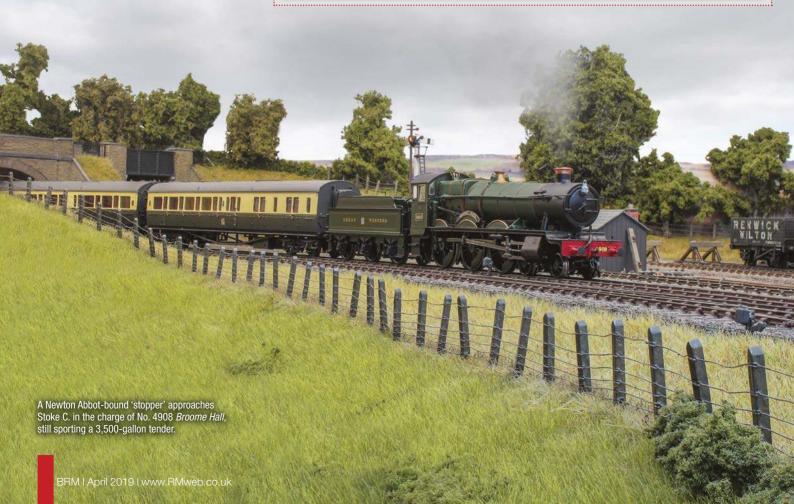

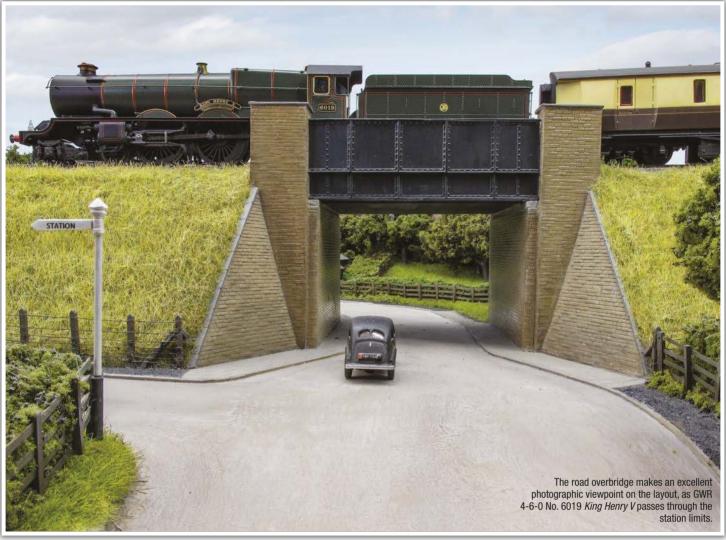
Locomotives and stock, both RTR and kits, are from the usual suspects, but I've been fairly ruthless in acquiring only items which would have regularly been seen in south Devon in the 1930s. I have been less ruthless

#### STOKE COURTENAY SIGNAL BOX

The GWR Type Seven signal box was produced by Bachmann Scenecraft as a special commission for Kernow Model Rail Centre, based on the one at Truro as it appeared around 1970. It therefore needed repainting in Railmatch GWR light and dark stone, and the removal of the cast 'Truro' nameboard. This was achieved by careful abrasion with riffler files, after masking the surrounding brickwork to protect its rather nice finish. A new nameboard.was added, made from Plastikard and lettered by printing out the name in Microsoft Word, white font highlighted in black. I used the closest font I could find to the GWR style, but discovered soon after that by signing up to the online 'GWR elist' the correct font can be accessed and replicated. This has been used for all subsequent lettering, including running-in boards and station signage. As the model comes with a removable roof, I felt it incumbent on me to provide a signalman (Modelu) and some levers. They can just about be seen from some angles so don't quite breach my lazy man's rule of not modelling what I can't see. I believe that the original intention was to produce this model with 1970s style dirty windows. I'm so glad they changed their minds and saved me a fiddly and tedious re-glazing job!







in terms of the vintage and quality of these models. My aim is for atmosphere, flavour, impression, rather than superfine detail or scrupulous accuracy, and I'll take whatever the trade has provided, whether new releases or 1970s models bought via eBay. For now, I'm content to live with top feeds on pre-war 'Pannier' tanks, a B-set with superfluous windows and clerestory coaches without relief panelling, rather than go without them. I always think of building the layout as Phase 1. Phase 2, now under way, might be described as 'tarting up the trains' and it is hoped that some of these errors will be rectified in due course as time and skill permit.

#### **Refining operation**

After experimenting with various coupling systems, some of which were beyond my skills to get working properly, I settled on small Bachmann tension locks, shortened so that the loop is in line with the buffer faces. Couplings on all vehicles involved in shunting or re-marshalling of trains have

received the 'Brian Kirby' modification, in which a steel staple added to the dropper allows uncoupling over permanent magnets buried in the ballast beneath the tracks. This took some careful adjustment to vehicles, including the addition of a bit of friction, to stop them running back towards the magnets and re-coupling, but I can now shunt the yard, and attach or detach through coaches and other tail traffic remotely from my wireless handset, without physical intervention.

#### **Testing abilities**

There is always more to do, and further incremental improvements are planned. My

current priority is locomotive weathering. I also have plenty of coach and wagon kits to build. By and large, I'm fairly pleased with progress over the past seven years. I can't pretend it's always been easy. I'm clumsy and impatient, and often feel that I'm working at the very limit of my skills or a little beyond, leaving trails of mangled kits and broken bits behind me to the accompaniment of much bad language. But I hope I've shown it possible for us lesser-skilled mortals to build a credible layout with a prototypical atmosphere and a 'finescale' look, by judicious use of what the trade offers, plus ambition and lots of perseverance. I've certainly learned a lot along the way! ■

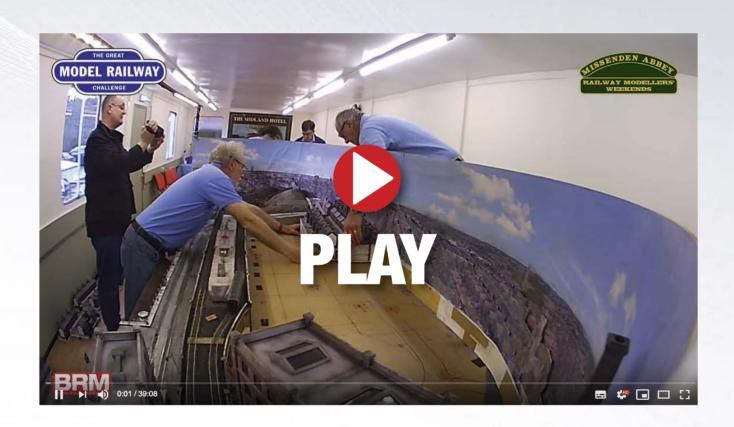

### MY LOCOMOTIVES AND STOCK

At present all locomotives are Hornby or Bachmann, though I'm looking forward to acquiring a Dapol 'Mogul' when it arrives. If Bachmann was to produce a GWR 4-4-0 'Bulldog', I can honestly say that I wouldn't covet any further locomotive types. Coaches include Bachmann and Hornby Collett stock, plus an ex-Airfix 'B' set and a sprinkling of Centenaries, the latter being converted to late-1930s condition by adding 'Airstream' ventilators fabricated from cream self-adhesive labels, with added detail. Other modifications include new bogies for siphons and a new chassis for a Hornby H33 restaurant car. Kits built so far include an old K's Dean 40ft brake van, a Mailcoach K22 full brake and, most pleasing of all so far, two of Slater's superb toplight coaches. I hope they won't be the last. Wagons are also a mixture of RTR and kits and I'm slowly working my way through a stash of unbuilt Cambrian, Ratio, Cooper Craft and Parkside kits to add variety to freight trains. I particularly like the Powsides pre-printed kits for private owner wagons. They also supply transfers only, enabling one to re-livery Bachmann or Oxford Rail wagons for a fairly quick job. All stock is weathered, or at least toned down, with dry-brushing or powders. Crews, locomotive and tail lamps are from Modelu.

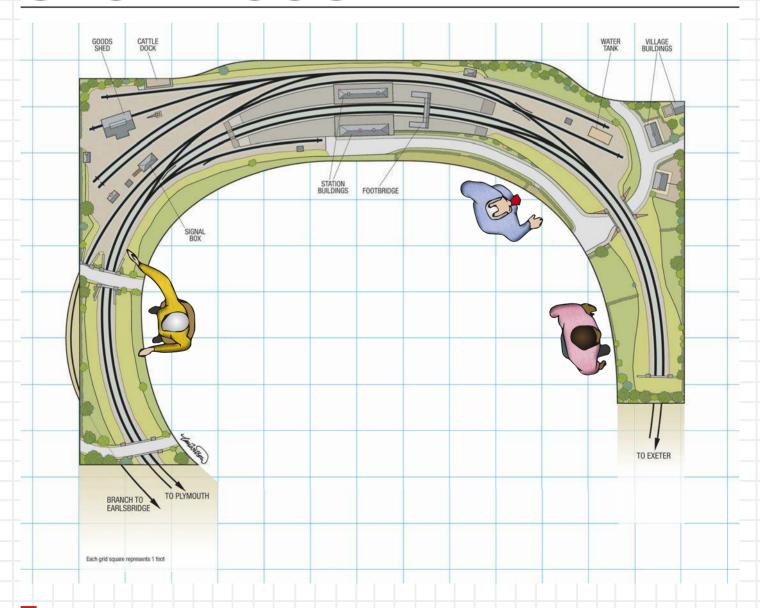

### **Modify Dapol signals**

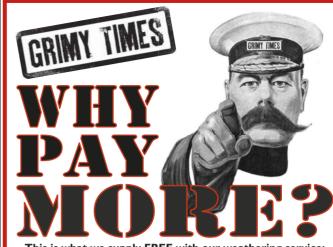
I adapt the Dapol signals by carving off the three strange horizontal ledges around the post and making good, shortening the arm, using a jig, and removing the ear-like excrescence from the spectacle plate that is possibly there to aid manufacturing. The safety basket is added from brass wire which is a tricky bit of soldering, and finally, the signals are given a complete repaint. The vertical white stripe on the arm was applied using white self-adhesive 'Solartrim' - a model aircraft product. This is cut with a double-bladed knife of my own fabrication.

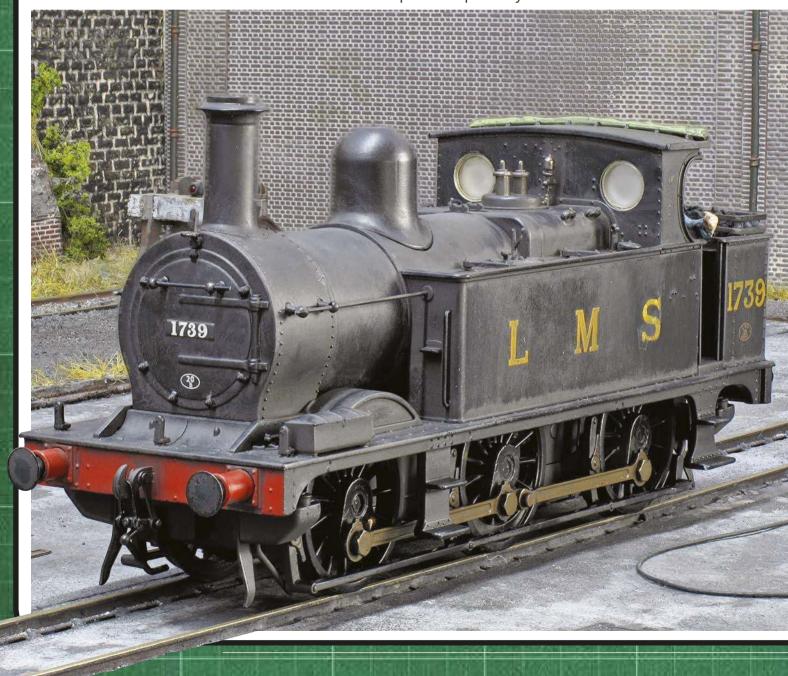

# HOW TO... ENHARCE AN RTR LOCOMOTIVE

Struggling to differentiate your RTR locomotive from the crowd? Michael Russell shares 18 swift transformational tips to improve your fleet.



achmann's 1F model is nicely finished, but from the box, is un-weathered. As such, it looks unrealistic and I wouldn't consider running it on my layout without some attention. Doing your own weathering is very enjoyable and straightforward if a few simple rules and techniques are followed.

This 1F locomotive is in its pre-grouping LMS livery which dates it to Era 3 – pre-1947. Up to the beginning of WW2, labour was plentiful and pride was taken by the crews in the locomotives they manned and the railway company they represented. Even a humble shunting/freight locomotive such as this would have been cleaned as part of its preventative maintenance. From 1940 until the end of WW2, little cleaning of locomotives took place.

I have endeavoured to weather the locomotive to a well-used, but cared-for condition. The basic method is to add

paint, then remove it, thereby replicating the action of dirt accumulating and being removed by locomotive cleaners.

The main problem when weathering is to find good reference material. Preserved locomotives are kept clean and photographs of locomotives from the earliest days until the 1960s are generally black and white, poor in detail and only show part of the locomotive. A locomotive out of use is of little help because it is subject to a different type of weathering. I would still recommend that you look at as much colour material as you can, as well as active preserved locomotives 'in the flesh', but you will have to rely to a certain extent on your experience, and draw on material from several sources, for any individual weathering project.

All the paints used are Humbrol enamel, except where indicated, and the numbers of the tins you need are indicated in brackets.



I'm adding the cosmetic couplings to the buffer beams using superglue before starting the weathering





The crew came away fairly easily by twisting them using a pair of tweezers.

# MICHAEL'S LOCOMOTIVE WEATHERING

- · Good light is essential. Spray outdoors, in a glasshouse/conservatory, or close to a window.
- It's difficult to see how much paint is produced by your airbrush until it has landed on the model. So that you've got some idea, start spraying onto a piece of cardboard, then, holding the brush controls in the same position, direct the airbrush at the model. This is a situation where a 'loo roll' handle
- You will use very little paint when weathering, so only mix small quantities.
- Stop before you think you have finished it's easy to overdo weathering effects. You can always add more if you revisit the locomotive at a later date.
- Keep your brush strokes vertical, never horizontal.
- Before using the locomotive, with everything dry, clean the wheel treads and current collection surfaces. Check that you haven't gummed up the motion and free it before use.
- Be careful using thinners around transfers work on these sections quickly and don't press too hard.



The next step is adding the canvas weather sheet to the cab roof using tweezers and superglue.



There are two screws holding the two halves together, as shown in the documentation provided with the model (and available online).



By using the cardboard tube from a toilet roll as a handle, I managed to avoid touching the body when spraying.



I removed the bunker by undoing the two screws underneath - be very careful here as the handrails are now exposed and are easy to bend out of shape.



Using the screws, I attached the bunker to a piece of cardboard to facilitate handling when spraying.



Brush the model with a soft brush to remove any particles of dust or debris.

Use a soft dry brush and tweezers to remove



Using an airbrush, spray a mix of Humbrol Matt Black (33), Leather (62) and Metalcote Steel (27003) onto the body, chassis and bunker. You'll only need a light coat. If you don't have an airbrush, apply a dilute mixture using a brush.



Before the paint has dried, use a cotton bud moistened with thinners to remove the paint wherever you can reach it. Work on one area at a time and change buds regularly as they become dirty. Mop up thinners from the model using a dry cotton bud. Be very careful to avoid rubbing too hard otherwise you will remove the transfers!





In the cab, wet a brush in thinners and move around the weathering sprayed onto the cab roof and backhead. Use a cotton bud soaked in thinners to clean the gauges, wheels and regulator.



Remove the two screws holding the baseplate in position and remove the wheels. Immediately put the two halves back together temporarily to avoid losing gears and prevent debris reaching the inner workings.



Apply black acrylic paint behind the wheels, and spring. You'll be able to see the outline of the wheel from the spray pattern left behind. Grind up a small amount of black and grey chalk using a file and daub this into the wet paint. Reassemble the wheels and fix the baseplate into position.





Thin acrylic black paint by 50% and paint this onto the cab floor. Apply more of the ground black chalk. Add a small amount of ground orange chalk to the firebox door. Reassemble the bunker to the main body.



Mix up a thin enamel wash of Humbrol Gloss Tan (9) and Metalcote Steel (27003) and apply to the coupling rods. Ensure that you don't add this too thickly and so gum up the motion.

### **TOP TIP:**

Above the footplate the main source of contamination would be soot from the chimney and below it, dust from the brake blocks. Coal dust would affect the cab and bunker area and a general layer of dirt would be deposited on everything. Maintenance and provision of consumables would also influence the finish. Coal would be added to the bunker, water to the side tanks and oil would be applied to all moving parts on a daily basis. The smokebox would be emptied of char and the fire cleaned and periodically removed, through the firehole door on a locomotive of this age. Operating in such a dirty environment, steam locomotives never stayed clean for long.





## FOLLOWING FOOTSTEPS



Last year I decided to revamp my son's layout. I wanted a traditional continuous loop so that I could use it to 'run-in' locomotives and use it as a test track when I make repairs. It also has an annual appearance at the Mansfield Show in March where children get to play for a small donation. George however, wanted an end-to-end layout because he really likes shunting. Here's the plan I devised – a 'best of both worlds'.

So that we can store his layout easily, a 4ft x 6ft baseboard would be hopelessly impractical. I employed the same techniques that I have used with my exhibition layouts to produce three 4ft x 2ft boards which are held together with pattern makers' dowels for good alignment and toggle clamps at the baseboard edges for easy assembly. Taking this further and using the toggle clamps to pass the power from one board to another means there are no interconnecting wires. This works best for DCC, but works equally well for a 'one locomotive in steam' analogue setup

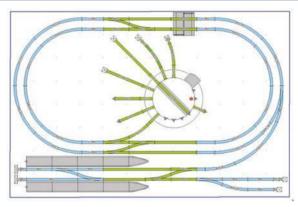

too. The sidings and turntable roads are self-isolating, so spare locomotives can be stored, even on analogue. The centre section with the green track on the plan can be omitted with just the two outer boards connecting together for a quick play, too!

I was using Gaugemaster ballasted foam underlay, which raises the track height by 3mm from the baseboard. I needed a secure way to fix the track ends and I chose to use brass screws adjusted to the correct height with the track soldered to them. This also allowed for slight

differences in baseboard height. The wiring runs along the edges and the screws are used to pass power to the rails. It's all very neat once completed. Proof of how easy it is to set the boards up is that George can do it by himself - no need to disturb dad at weekends.

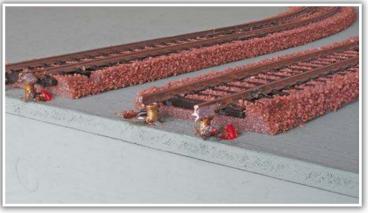
The turntable roundhouse was constructed by using a modified Scalescenes single engine shed kit. He also has a Church from the same company. We plan to continue with the scenics, starting with ballasting over the point underlays and the 6ft gaps between the main running tracks. Roads and static grassed areas will

follow and maybe a removable tunnel section.

Although I have gone to a lot of trouble to make the electrics as robust as possible, George has a few locomotives without motors that he likes to push round like his extensive wooden railway collection. Most of the stock has handdrawn paper faces attached to the fronts and backs, too. As far as George is concerned, a locomotive isn't right without a 'Thomas' face.

### **CONCRETE IDEAS**

Hello.

Phil Parker's article on cattle pens (BRM March 2019), although very informative, omitted a frequent additional component. Dung and straw had to be disposed of, but it was also essential to wash the pens down. To facilitate this, the track was often sunken into concrete to protect otherwise exposed trackwork to rapid deterioration and protect the travelling public from the pungent smell of contaminated ballast. There was a central trough usually leading out to a ditch or road drain.

Howard Smith replies: Hello Keith, well-observed, though in fairness, Phil's article is pertaining to the one seen at Highley which doesn't have such a feature. Known as a concrete apron, these often sloped toward the centre of the tracks. Though a common feature as you describe, not all cattle docks were so equipped, so it pays to observe photographs if readers are in doubt.

### FRENCH READER

Here is my branch line terminus layout with a junction, based on the west coast of France. One line leads to a hidden fiddle yard, another towards a loop. A side line links the port with a boarding point for travellers and local maritime connections. The layout is an 'L-shape'. At the left end is the pier and port, and at the other end, the factories and a tunnel. The main way to the loop passes behind the pier to a turning loop. At the far right of



the layout sits a terminus station.

On the wharf, is the goods service of the port and a small hall for the sale of fish on the spot. In the corner are industrial buildings.

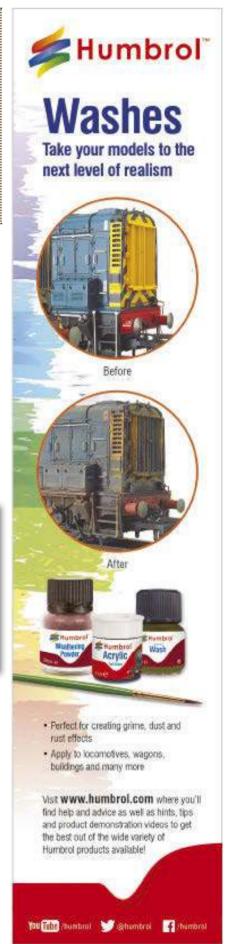
A hill makes a suitable transition between the left and right of the layout.

## YOUR CARD KIT BUILDS

Having been involved for almost 20 years in the restoration and operation of a full-size GWR steam locomotive on a Cotswold heritage line, I recently moved back to Coppull in my home county of Lancaster. In May last year, I joined my local Chorley and District Model Railway Club, a friendly social group, building a 00-gauge layout. Ken, one of the club members, has become a friend of mine and he noticed that I had a keenness for model building and altering. One evening he turned up at a meet and handed me your free Metcalfe small Cottage model kit to make. I had already made a Wordsworth Police Station model and when I finished the cottage, the idea came to me of attaching it to one end of the Police station. This I did and then made a Police Lamp from scratch. which I attached to the front wall, then wired internally to a 3V battery pack.

Ken decided that he would make a base diorama for the set-up, so I then built the two Metcalfe garden sheds - one for the Station Officer's house back garden and one for the rear of the police station yard. Ken made all the boundary walls, footpaths, driveways, gardens and the gates for the house and station yards. The three police vehicles and the Sunbeam car are all Oxford Die-cast, and the model police officers I found in a poor state in a 'bits and bobs' box. I repainted them and they are set up as receiving traffic control training.

The extra item in the Police Station yard is a Wordsworth Police Call box, stored awaiting a site elsewhere on the railway layout. I am sending you this short article because, from seeing and reading your item in the February 2019 issue of BRM, I noticed that it appears no-one else has thought about attaching the cottage, (whose shape lends itself to this action), to another building. I have now bought two more cottage models from www. world-of-railways.co.uk and plan to build them attached side-by-side in the future.

I really enjoyed making the **BRM** laser-cut terraced houses kit. I have only ever built plastic kits, so I was eager to see what these were like. I started with the mortar lines, using Tamiya dark yellow, which I watered down so that it would flow between all the bricks. Next, I mixed Tamiya red/brown with a bit more red to get a red brick colour. I applied this colour lightly over the brickwork with a brush at an angle to pick out brick detail. Before it dried, I used kitchen towel which I pressed onto the red brick to remove some of the paint and add a slight texture. Some



of the red brick paint covered the mortar colour, so I applied some more of the dark yellow to these areas, again dabbing off the excess with kitchen towel. For the next layer, I used 'flat earth', which I dry-brushed onto the brick and again, removed excess with a towel. This layer was more to add depth of colour to the bricks. I used more dark yellow to reinstate the mortar lines. The last layer was to pick out areas on the house that would become dirty, like around the windows, doors, roof line and base of the building. For this, I mixed some brown burnt umber acrylic with a very small amount of black. I used the dry-brushing technique, but this time I took almost all the paint off the brush before stippling it onto these areas. I made the chimney darker to imply that smoke and ash had accumulated over time.

I painted the window ledges, door steps and lintels next, using a magnifying glass which has a light function. It helped me get crisp edges, which really adds to the detail of the build. I used white for the first house and Humbrol oak for the second. For the roofs, I wanted a contrast between the two houses by using two shades of grey. I masked off each roof section so I could paint one at a time, which made them look like different slates had been used. I dabbed a small amount of white over each roof to pick up some of the detail and give a weathered look.

When all parts were dry, I then assembled the kit which is when I noticed a gap between the roof and front wall. I decided to cover this by adding a fascia board made from a thin strip of balsa wood, painted black. I continued this around the side walls for a little extra detail. I added a wire drain pipe, the same way as Phil Parker's guide and then a street name to the side wall. It was a fun-build and I would definitely build more of these kits in the future.

I was having a mooch around Smiths, and thought top. I was quite pleased with the result. I then added I'd have a quick browse at the railway magazines. Always being one for a freebie, my eye was drawn to **BRM** and the free laser-cut kit on the cover. I hadn't bought the magazine before and hadn't tried a laser-cut kit either. I have made a lot of Metcalfe buildings, although recently I have been swapping their roofs with Plastikard, so I thought this might be an interesting upgrade.

The kit is beautifully made with few parts. I read the feature about it and decided I'd build it differently. I wanted it to be the end of a part-demolished terrace, so I built the front and left-hand side as per the picture and used the right-hand side as a template to make an exposed interior from card. The laser engraving on the roof is good, but lacks depth, so I swapped it for plastic slate sheet I had lying around. The lasercut roof will go in the spares box because I think it'll make good brick pavers. I nibbled away every other brick on the right side with a hobby tool and scribed mortar lines on the left edge, then rubbed white artists' pastels over the whole building. I then rubbed most of it off, sealed it with matt varnish then rubbed various other shades over the

some water stains, laid Metcalfe paving on a card road and used a bit of static grass. All I've got to do now, is find somewhere to put it! A cracking little kit and a few hours of enjoyment.

Here are some photographs of my two layouts. I have a Great Eastern (GE) section, and a BR steam/diesel-era layout, both in 00 gauge with analogue control, mounted one above another in a garden room measuring 13ft 6in x 7ft 8in.

was born a couple of days after Nationalisation in a nursing home overlooking the north end of Gravelly Hill station on the Birmingham to Lichfield line. An early memory from my pram on the bridge was seeing steamy, smoky monsters heading past the up starter on locals from Lichfield. These LMS locomotives were to be common companions through my childhood. Even the Hornby tinplate I was given was in the lovely old LMS maroon. I later lived within sight of Aston sheds and station. Saltley shed was not too far away, nor were the massive marshalling yards at Washwood Heath on the former MR Birmingham to Derby line. London Midland in a land of smoke, coke and gasworks was my staple diet. Former LNWR and MR were my 'trainscapes'.

Holidays in Yorkshire and relatives in Blackpool and the Nottinghamshire coalfields added to my fascination with the LMS. Therefore, when my son and his family lived for a couple of years in Todmorden, I found the place interesting, even though it had been LYR not MR or LNWR. The mixture of upland fells and the remains of 'dark satanic mills' fired my modelling thoughts. The model press is a constant inspiration helping to fire such thoughts.

'Todmorden Midland' is not a model of the existing station in the town, which was originally LYR and still operates on the Calder Valley line. My Todmorden is what might have existed if the Keighley and Worth Valley line was extended across the moors from Oxenhope towards Heptonstall (my next project) near Hebden Bridge to try to get the Midland Railway into the Lancashire towns north of Manchester and, of course, north Manchester itself. Inevitably, the money ran out - at Todmorden...

### Influential modellers

I blame several brilliant figures for my modelling obsession: David Jenkinson, Peter Denny, P.D. Hancock and W.S. Norris. Oddly perhaps, I should include the boys of Crewe Grammar School MRC whose model of Rugeley Trent Valley LNWR station, some 40 years ago, showed that historical modelling was possible and a range of other obvious influences like Pendon, the model of Aylesbury by Geoff Williams, and Jack Nelson's dioramas. Of course, from over the Atlantic there was John Allen. I was always drawn to models of the railway as a whole; I do not subscribe to the 'locomotives,

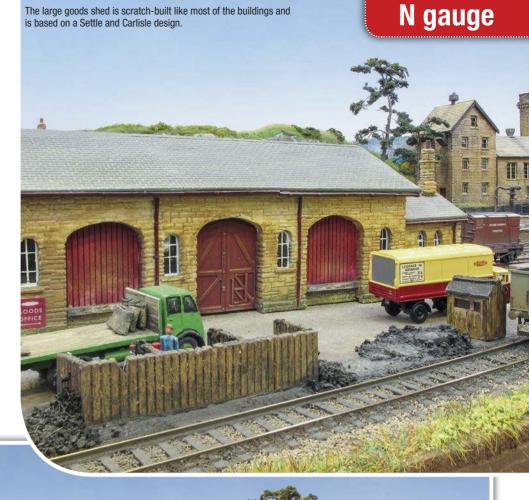
locomotives, locomotives and more locomotives' school of railway modellers and prefer the railway as a whole in an appropriate landscape as a project. However, like many of us, I am a lifelong dabbler and still have some OO gauge, OOn12, O gauge and HOn3 items in boxes upstairs.

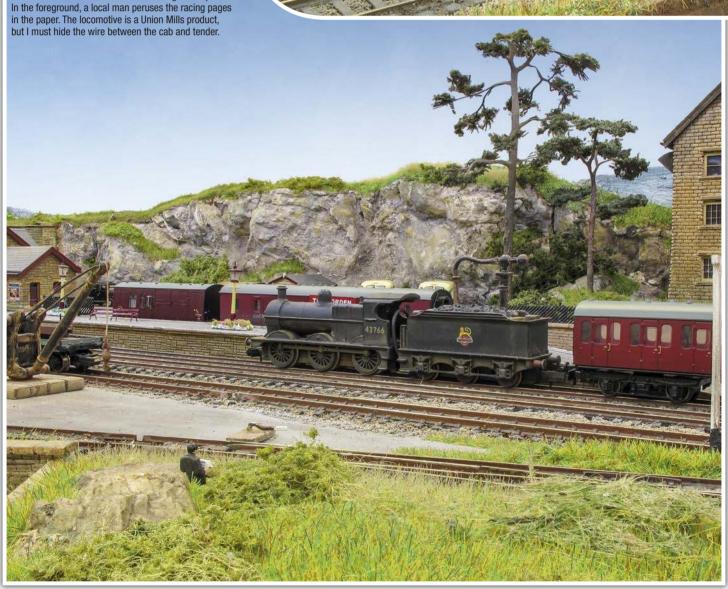
At exhibitions the public love to ask questions and they are usually about the scenic side of things. Cameo scenes of figures, animals and vehicles often draw comment, so I have printed some small leaflets for the kids to find bits and pieces. Usually the parents take over, trying to find things like 'six bicycles' or 'the station master's wife doing the washing'. Mums seem to like this.

### Analogue control

The layout is operated by DC control, the controller designed and built by Warley

0-6-0 No. 43766 arrives under a brooding Scot's pine.

MRC members. Points are operated by SEEP motors – take great care with the placing of three-way points in N gauge and don't have them too near space-constricting features. Stock is a mixture of Graham Farish, Union Mills, Dapol and kit-built items. Luckily, the Graham Farish Fowler 4F and the WD 2-8-0, both common in West Yorkshire, are very good for shunting the yard.

### West Yorkshire influence

Most buildings are scratch-built and based on buildings in the Todmorden area. I did

fancy a big mill building like the surviving one overlooking Summit Tunnel near Todmorden, but found it would be as big as my whole layout! They are largely made from embossed plastic sheet with a lot of bracing. The N gauge Peco embossed stone sheets are very effective. Redutex textured sheets and even Wills 4mm sheets are useful, too. The signal box is the lovely and appropriate MR kit by Ratio. The station, goods shed, stationmaster's house, and water tankhouse are all scratch-built to Settle and Carlisle designs – I have assumed that these

designs would have been used because they were to hand in Derby after the building of the Settle & Carlisle only a few miles north on the MR.

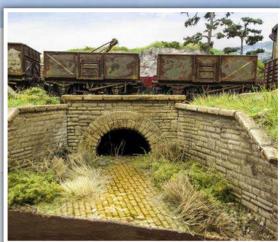
### **Electrical connections**

The fiddle yard has cartridges made of MDF with aluminium angle for rails. These connect to similar aluminium angle on the end of the layout with small bulldog clips to make electrical contact. There aren't electrical bits and pieces in the fiddle yard because power is delivered through from the





The water in the canal was made from a smoothly-painted and carefully-coloured base. It took eight layers of old-fashioned varnish with a few days between coats. The top surface can wrinkle the layer beneath if you rush.





### What we think...

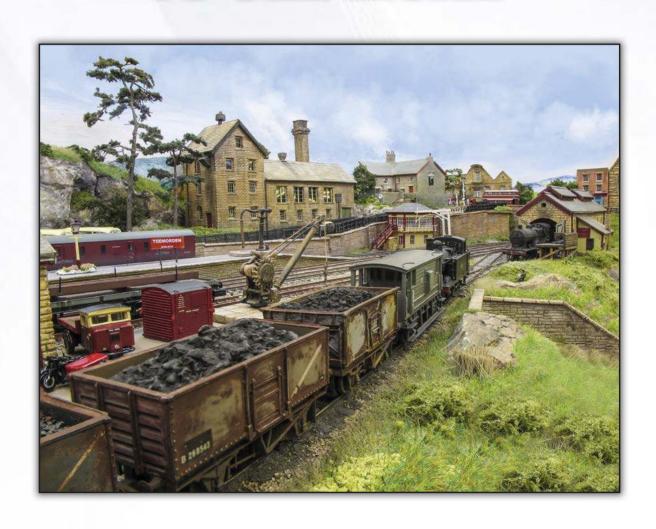


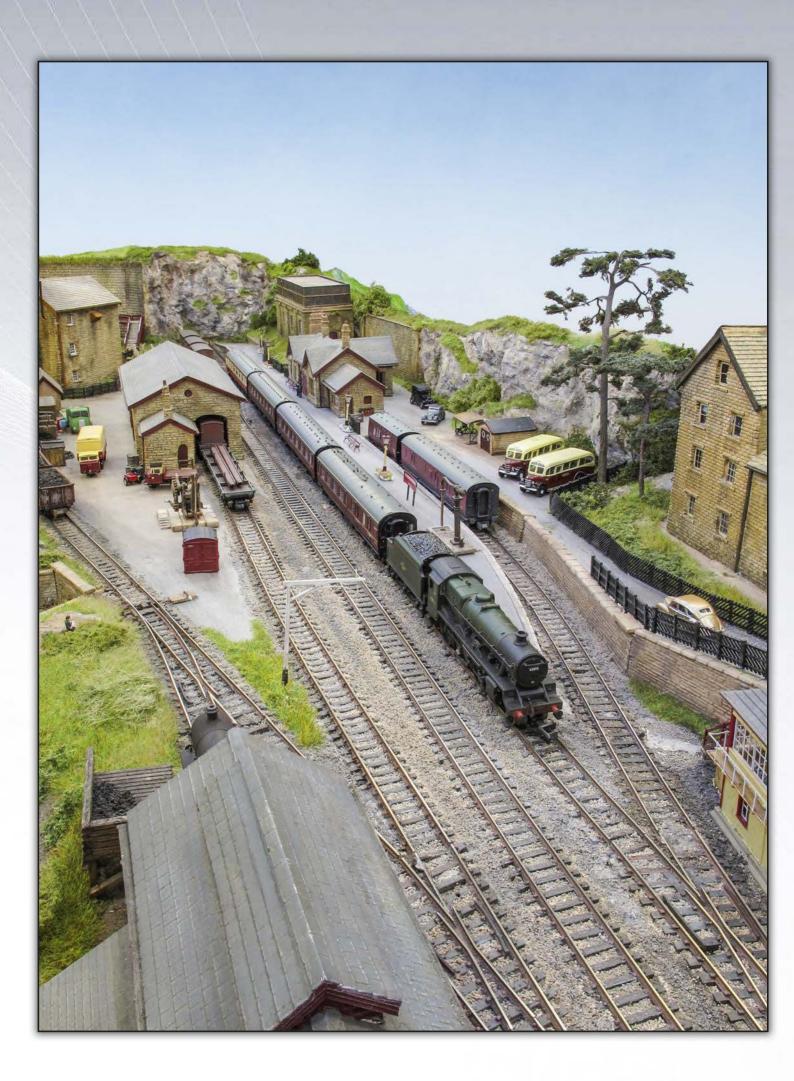
Having visited Todmorden a number of times, Ed's 'what might have been' interpretation certainly captures the locality with convincing stonework. Though perhaps a little clean for the era modelled, the canal and mill are two staples for the Calder Valley area. Though a terminus station, the opportunity to manoeuvre a few wagons around the sidings adds interest. The final touch is the L&YR red frame that surrounds the layout, setting the scene wonderfully.

Morning activity in the yard is overshadowed by Pennine rock faces, hiding the surrounding hills of Calderdale. The 16T wagons are mainly Peco or kit-built and are weathered with acrylic and gouache paints.

main board. This simple fiddle yard system is often of interest at exhibitions to people who love 'nosing' around the fiddle yard end of layouts. An important lesson I learned building Todmorden was to lessen by half the number of soldered joints by having the controls as much as possible on the layout. It avoids long 'D' cable connectors between a control box and the layout. I have done that with my other modern image layout 'Gravelly Oak' which is DCC controlled – more of that another time!

### A speedy exit

The trestles for Todmorden are also used to support 'Gravelly Oak' because the layouts aren't usually out at the same time. Both layouts rest on two self-made trestles that carry 6ft-long runners. I hate the delays at shows caused by screwing and unscrewing. There are just two on Todmorden – they hold the 2ft long fiddle yard board to the 4ft long layout and don't need to be very tight. Underneath the layout is a simple shelf supported on trestle cross members. This carries the control box and is a useful place for dumping 'stuff'.

### Trade support

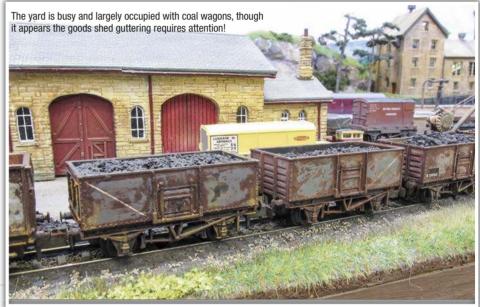
An area for development in N is the couplings which are less than visually effective. I use dental picks to uncouple because I don't mind the 'hand from the sky'. However, I do hanker for the manufacturers

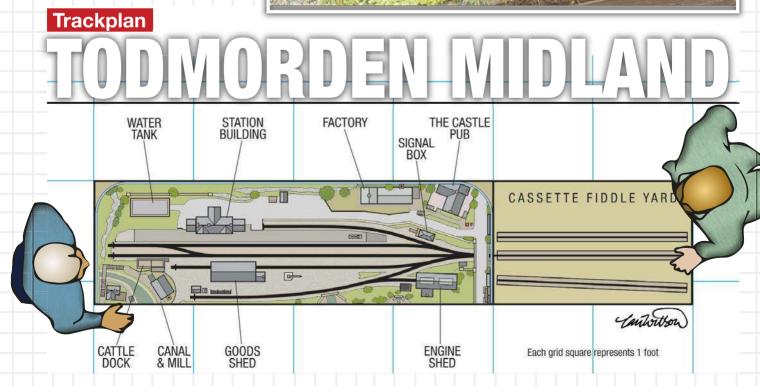
to produce something better than the Rapido battering ram. The current quality of the manufacturers' locomotive and rolling stock products deserves better. It is pleasing that a lot of infrastructure furniture like water cranes, platform seats, barrows and so on is available to add to the layout. Appropriate vehicles by companies like Oxford and Base Toys assist greatly too. Figures and details from firms such as Noch and Graham Farish help bring scenes to life. Suppliers like N Gauge Lines are a great source of all sorts of paraphernalia.

A great support in successfully producing something like this is being a member of a good club. Support, sarcasm, ideas, laughs, operational support and expertise of all sorts builds creativity and friendships. Thanks to members of Warley MRC who have, probably without knowing it, helped me make 'Todmorden Midland' come to life.

### **Next project**

It took most of a working life to get to produce a layout that deserved to be exhibited and retirement surprisingly does not give unlimited amounts of time, but I'm determined to get going on another scene to carry on from 'Todmorden Midland'. It will be based in Heptonstall, which is eastwards from Todmorden towards the Keighley line. I fancy a viaduct and one of those long Yorkshire farmhouses – not bad for a 'Brummie', don't you think?

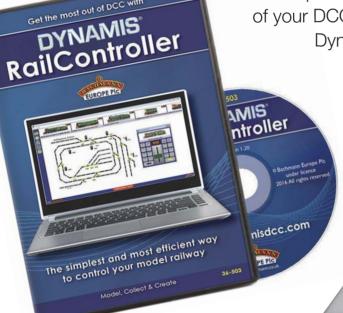

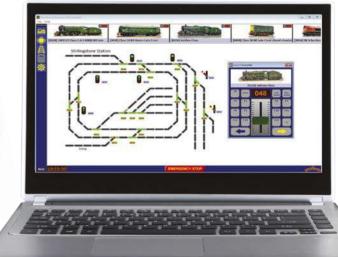

# **HOW TO...** OPTIMISE YOUR DIGITAL LAYOU EXPERIENCE

**BRM** explains why computer control can make the operation of your DCC layout easier, highlighting Bachmann's flagship Dynamis Ultima system and RailController software.







igital Command Control has evolved greatly over the past two decades. From its inception in the late twentieth century, locomotives could be moved and turnouts and signalling operated through individual identification numbers through two wires from the controller to the layout. Since then, the NMRA (National Model Railroad Association) in the United States - creators of the original DCC specification, which the likes of Bachmann and Hornby in the UK have adopted - has enhanced the standard specification to accommodate new functionality. DCC has been developed to such a degree that the operation of model railways has, ironically, become more complicated than ever. From lights to sound and smoke effects on demand at the push of a button, remembering which button to press – and when – can prove challenging. ■

### SIMPLIFYING CONTROL

With the proliferation and affordability of personal computers, several suppliers have developed software products, which link to a variety of DCC controllers. Hornby developed its RailMaster product and Bachmann Europe did the same with its RailController software. Other software packages are available to suit a variety of budgets and promise a great deal, although they require a learning curve to get the most out of them.

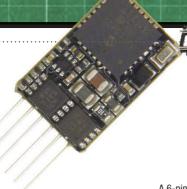
Bachmann married its RailController software with its new Dynamis Ultima controller, both launched at the same time. Since then, enhancements continue to be made to RailController software and Bachmann believes that the future of model railway control will be more computer-based.

### WHY DCC?

Before DCC, the only way to operate a model railway was to apply a voltage to an area of the layout, or the entire thing - usually 12VDC. When you turn the controller knob, every single locomotive on the track to which the controller is connected moves at the same time. To allow more control of certain areas of track on a DC layout, without moving multiple locomotives at the same time, isolating sections must be used. These are areas of the layout where the power to the track is turned off using a switch. The more complex the layout, the more isolating sections are required, hence, more switches. This makes operation guite complicated and unlike real-world operations, usually requires several operators. Once the isolation sections are in place, changing these at a later date with scenery in place can prove difficult.

Today, most people entering the hobby opt for Digital Command Control because of the flexibility it offers.

A major advantage of using DCC over DC is that you can connect just two wires to your layout, insert a decoder into each locomotive

and address each with a unique ID number to control them. Apart from the increased cost of the DCC control unit and having to put a decoder into each locomotive, one drawback is the number of buttons you need to press to control any locomotive, turnout or signal on your model railway.

With the proliferation of sound locomotives with many functions and modellers wanting motorised points and multi-aspect signals, control of these is becoming more complicated.



### HOW DOES DIGITAL COMMAND CONTROL WORK?

DCC uses digital binary signals sent over two wires on a DC voltage that alternate rapidly between negative and positive to encode speed, direction and function data to individual locomotives on the track. Each locomotive contains a decoder chip programmed to a specific ID, which recognises signals for that locomotive. This permits the operation of thousands of locomotives without the need to isolate track sections like analogue DC control.

### WHY COMPUTER CONTROL?

On most DCC controllers, there are only a certain number of buttons that can be incorporated because of space limitations. Locomotives and other devices must be addressed by typing in their ID. An example, using the Bachmann Dynamis controller to control a locomotive is: press the locomotive/accessory button to control a locomotive. Press the Loco ID select button. Enter the ID, then use the throttle control or function buttons. It can be long-winded, and this is where computer software becomes useful. On a program like RailController, just select the locomotive to control from the ribbon, as shown below. This ribbon can be dragged left or right to reveal more locomotives.

A locomotive controller will appear and all you have to do is slide the throttle or press a function button. The functions on a decoder are traditionally listed in numerical order. These are known 'F' numbers (F1, F2 and so on) but the function buttons on the software contain the descriptions of the functions to help the user. Remembering which one to activate is simple and error-free.

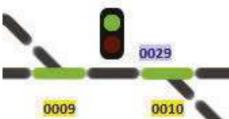

### **ENHANCING ACCESSORIES**

Operating turnouts and signals is simple - a single click on a turnout or signal on the track plan switches it. In the case of multi-aspect colour light signals, these will go through their lighting sequences. You can even set the program up to switch a series of turnouts and signals at the same time, known as relaying. This is ideal for larger layouts where a route might require multiple turnouts being changed at the same time.



With RailController, a visual display of points, signals and IDs is provided, making operation much easier.



With computer control, drawing your trackplan on software removes the need for a traditional control panel and the associated wiring.

### SIMPLE CONTROL

The main feature of most software-based control systems is their ease of use. Operating a layout with even just a handful of trains, turnouts and signals can be challenging using a stand-alone DCC controller. Locomotives and accessories must first be addressed by their DCC ID, which often requires referring to a crib-sheet or memorising lots of numbers. When you add locomotive sound and light functions into the equation, this makes it even harder as you cannot see the descriptions of each button.



### **USING SOFTWARE**

After you create a track plan in RailController, operating turnouts and signals is as simple as just clicking on them. This can be done using a mouse or touch screen. Touch screen monitors are becoming more affordable and a 10 or 13in USB-powered monitor can be sited easily around a layout, making it accessible, yet unobtrusive. Using an interactive track plan like that built into RailController is similar to the way signalmen have operated points and signals on the real railways for decades. You needn't worry about designing or making a traditional layout control panel, either – the screen becomes your control panel.

### **DOUBLE-HEADING**

As with locomotive control, setting up and dissolving 'double-heading' – the operation of two locomotives coupled together, each with a decoder – is straightforward in RailController. RailController allows you to set up to ten multiple headers by dragging the desired locomotives from the ribbon into the centre of the RailController window. Clicking on the number button, one to 10, assigns any one of 10 sets of headers. Another thing to note is that when you add a number of locomotives to a header, RailController will limit the maximum header speed to that of the slowest locomotive.

Packages like RailController make model railway control easier and add useful functions that are difficult to offer in a stand-alone controller because of power and size constraints.

### **RECORDING AND PROGRAMMING**

A powerful feature of some model railway control software packages, such as RailController is the ability to record a range of operations, including running locomotives, setting light and sound functions and operating accessories such as turnouts and signals in real-time. As you operate your layout, RailController will record everything you do. You can then stop recording and RailController will build a program automatically, based on the operations. You can then fine-tune the program or add and remove commands to make your layout do exactly what you want. This can be limited to automating a section of your layout, or the whole thing.

Bachmann believes that computer control of model railways, in one form or another, is the future and it is a positive step that manufacturers are bringing easy-to-use packages to modellers and removing the mystique that surrounds them.



### LOCOMOTIVE FUNCTIONS

RailController is designed to simplify the control of locomotives. All you have to do is to click on any locomotive on the libbon (the group of locomotive images across the top of the main screen, which can be dragged from side to side) and a locomotive controller appears 'on screen'. The controller displays a sliding throttle (known as RealSpeed), an approximation of the scale speed at which the locomotive is travelling (mph or kph), as well as its direction and function options.

Latching functions (functions which are permanently on until they are turned off) are highlighted in green to indicate they are activated. You don't have to remember what a particular function does because each is printed on each button.

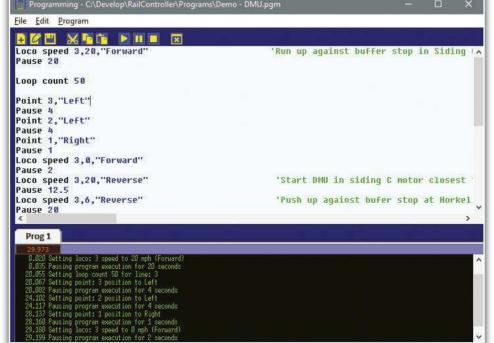
An on-screen controller. Note the throttle (centre), labelled function buttons and directional controls (bottom).

### **ROUTE-SETTING**

Turnouts and signals can be controlled. As well as simply operating a turnout or signal by clicking on its corresponding icon on the track plan, you can also build routes that operate a range of turnouts and signals in a single operation. Building a route is as simple as listing the turnouts and signals on the route and selecting their setting. Once the route is saved, you can operate it at any time. It can be quite magical to watch all of the turnouts and signals change on their own, in preparation for the departure of your train.

# **HOW TO...** MODELA DEGIDUOUS TREE

Michael Russell experiments with military modelling techniques to make more authentic-looking and highly-detailed deciduous trees.

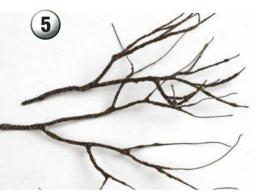


Toothbrush

Being predominantly a 4mm scale modeller, I have often envied the range of scenic accessories available to those modelling in larger scales, particularly the military modelling fraternity. For example, leaves in the 1:32 and 1:43 scales are available in different shapes depending on the tree you're modelling. I therefore jumped at the opportunity to employ some of these items when it was suggested.

I've chosen to model a sycamore tree, as it would be in the autumn. You can adjust the leaf colours as appropriate and these would be even easier to produce for a tree in summer by choosing suitable greens. Punching your own leaves is quite a laborious process on anything other than small trees, therefore these punches are better suited for making leaves that have fallen to the ground.

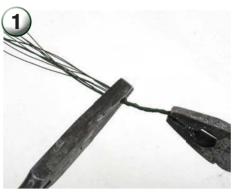
The opportunity to make leaves to your own colour requirements is very useful, but you will need to undertake careful research to get the hues you require. Altering the colours of leaves that have already been applied to the tree is problematic so try and get this right beforehand. Despite this, for dioramas and key locations on a layout, it is always worth the effort of making a tree that is a scenic centrepiece.



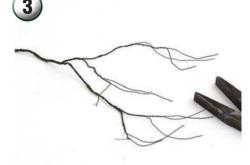
Add as many coats as you need to hide the twists in the wire. Between coats apply fine sawdust to create texture and speed up the cloaking process.



Using a pair of hairdressing scissors, trim the twigs. You're looking to remove those of excessive length and any that are looped.



Take a dozen strands of 0.3mm wire and twist one end together using two pairs of pliers. Ensure that enough of the wire is twisted together to hold all the pieces in place – about 2cm should be sufficient.



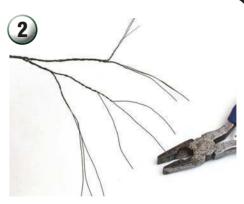
Once you have gone as far as you can with the twisting, shape the branches according to the species of tree and particular example you're modelling.



Take artificial hair and cut tufts measuring 5cm in length. Tousle the hair to break it into individual strands



The trunk is made from the handle of a paint brush. If you use a cheap one, the ferrule can be removed easily by twisting with a pair of pliers.



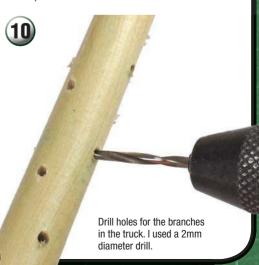
Add branches as you go, splitting the bundles into smaller ones until you reach individual strands. Examine the growth of a tree in-situ to get an idea of its growth pattern.



When you have made a good number of branches, cover them to hide the twists in the wire. I used a mixture of PVA glue with added black acrylic paint and plaster filler. You need the mix to be as stiff as possible, but still capable of being applied with a brush.



Decant carpet glue into a container and paint the ends of the branches with it using an old brush. Now sprinkle the hair in place.



Fix the branches using superglue. Apply Milliput filler to give the trunk a less regular appearance and to tidy up branch ends



Now spray the tree with various greys and browns to get the bark colour you want. You can use either acrylic or enamel paint.

Add more of the bark mixture to the trunk and sprinkle with texture material depending on the tree you are modelling. I used sawdust on this occasion.



Dry-brush a light colour on the bark to create highlights.



The leaves are produced from paper using punches from Green Stuff World. I used item 1416 which produces leaves suitable for a sycamore or maple.



Whilst the wash is still wet, add other darker colours and allow them to merge. This will avoid sharp edges to the colours. The paper will buckle when wet, but this isn't a problem in this instance.



Give the whole tree a coat of Humbrol Acrylic primer – it makes sense to use the grey colour.



Add lichen by flicking the tree with various shades of yellow and off-white.



I coloured the leaves using acrylic paint because it is cheap and readily available. I also wanted something that was waterproof, or at least water-resistant, once dry. Emulsion match pots may also be suitable with a little thinning.

### TOP TIP

Green Stuff World's website has instructions on how to keep your punches sharp and in good condition. www.greenstuffworld.com



When dry, turn the paper over and repeat the previous stage so that both sides of the paper are coloured.



Repeat the previous steps for leaves using other colours. Do a sheet of leaves painted dark umber to represent those that have fallen to the ground and lost their autumnal colour.



Cut the paper into strips, then use the punch to cut the leaves. Do them in batches of the different colours and store in containers until you need them.



Paint the twigs with a tacky PVA glue and sprinkle the leaves in place. Work over a sheet of paper so you can reuse material. Don't worry if areas aren't covered with leaves because autumn trees are often denuded.



The branches are quite flexible and you can gently bend them to gain access to the inner surfaces and aid shaping.



Blend the leaf colours together by spraying them with an airbrush. I decided that my colours were quite a long way out and had to use a lot more yellow to make the tree look right.



Autumn leaves often mark as they decline. If you're modelling a sycamore, flick black acrylic paint at the leaves using a toothbrush and a lolly stick. I used UA734 from the Lifecolor Shades of Black set.



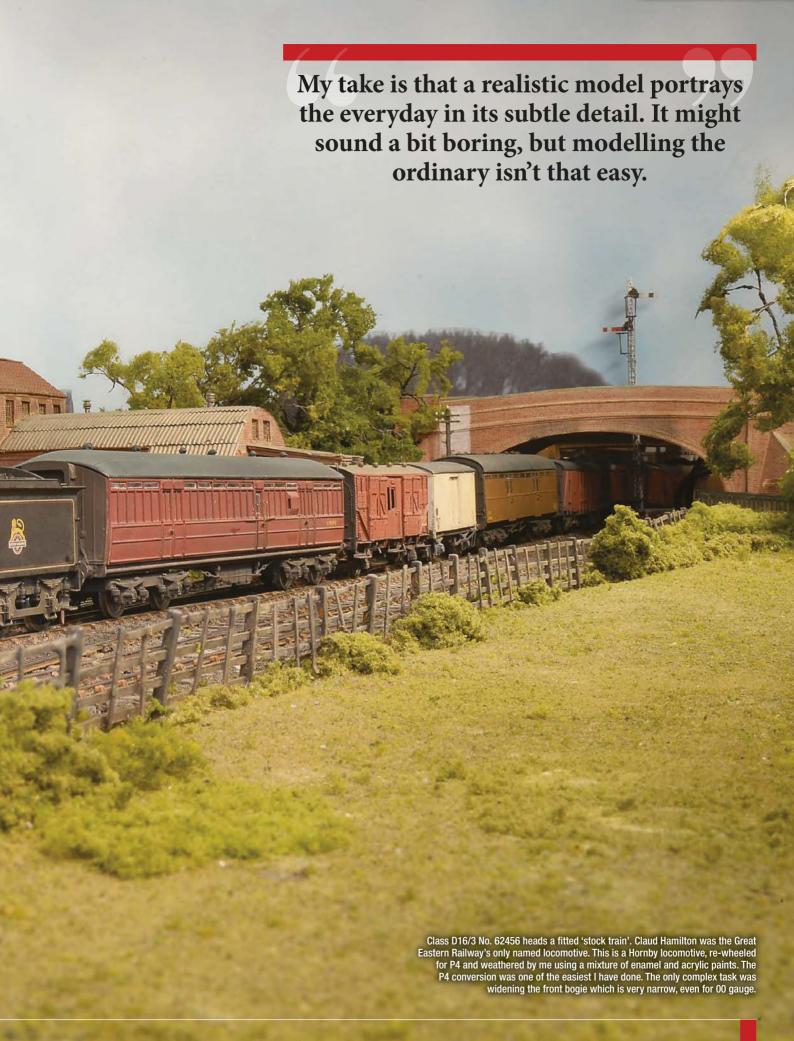


# STOKE BY NAYLAND

Understanding the limitations of a previous exhibition layout was the key to success in the building of David Hawkins' more entertaining Eastern Region model.

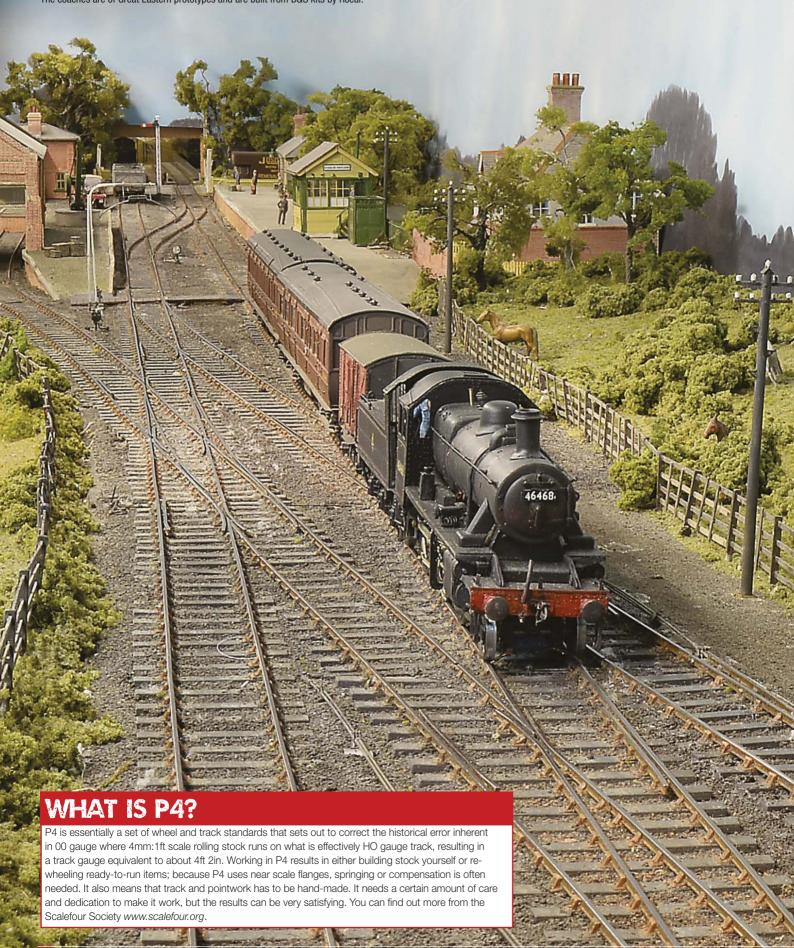

Ivatt Class 2MT No. 46468 leaves Stoke with a Stowmarket local. The locomotive is built from a Comet kit and has split frames, thereby avoiding the need for pick-ups. The coaches are of Great Eastern prototypes and are built from D&S kits by Rocar.



Back in the mists of time, or, 1995 to be precise, my first P4 layout, 'Great Bardfield', was featured in an early issue of BRM, beautifully photographed by Tony Wright. In 2001, I wrote a second article on my plans to build a model of Glemsford, on the Stour Valley line of the old Great Eastern Railway. The contrast in the fortunes of the two layouts could hardly be starker. 'Glemsford' is no more, having gone to that great exhibition hall in the sky, but 'Great Bardfield' is still active on the exhibition circuit after 25 years.

### Learning from mistakes

Stoke by Nayland was, in fact, born from the ashes of 'Glemsford', and tries to address some of the earlier layout's shortcomings which were threefold. Firstly, although 'Glemsford' presented quite a pretty picture, its running qualities, to be frank, did leave a lot to be desired. Secondly, the design of the layout meant that when shunting operations were taking place, much of the movement was offstage and trains frequently disappeared into the fiddle yard, often to the bemusement of the viewing public.

Lastly, and most tellingly, the layout was incredibly dull to operate - Glemsford was a through-station, the smallest station on the Stour Valley line and consequently very little happened. Plenty of trains passed through, a handful stopped, and occasionally a pick-up goods would shunt the yard. Given that most trains didn't stop, operating the station prototypically and putting on any sort of show was quite demanding of the driver and two fiddle yard operators.

When I broke up Glemsford, I retrieved as much from it as possible. So, although the

baseboards and trackwork were scrapped, I saved the buildings, trees, fences and even a few scraps of scenery. The new layout was to run well and be well run (there is a difference). My view is that an exhibition layout should present a convincing picture, be operated meaningfully and, most importantly, continually. On a real railway, a train entering a single line section needs to exit that section before another train enters it in the opposite direction. I have seen it suggested that for realistic operation we should replicate this, but it seems a bit unreasonable to expect our viewing (and paying) public to hang around for 20 minutes between trains.

### Thoughtful planning

The layout design for Stoke is such that 90% of shunting moves are within view of the onlooker. I have included two industries. a dairy and a granary. This is based on the facilities at North Elmham station in Norfolk. 'Stoke by Nayland' station is entirely a work of my imagination on a line equally fictitious. All this overcomes many of the operational shortcomings of Glemsford. Stoke is situated on an imaginary line from Colchester Crouch Street (apparently a proposed station) to Stowmarket, avoiding Ipswich. Additionally, I have introduced a branch service that starts at Stoke station and leaves the main line for Sudbury, about a mile north of Stoke station. Apparently the Sudbury trains originally started from Colchester, but traffic was so sparse that very soon trains from Sudbury were terminated at Stoke with passengers needing to change trains for Colchester.

Now we have quite a variety of traffic possibilities. Stopping passenger trains (steam-hauled or DMU) are the staple diet, running between Colchester and Stowmarket. Some of these are met by Sudbury branch trains (push-pull sets in the early days, later supplanted by four-wheel railbuses or DMUs). Since there is only one platform at Stoke, branch trains are stabled in the dairy siding between services. Pick-up goods trains, including the Sudbury branch goods, shunt the yard. A particularly nice move, based on North Elmham, is the delivery of empty milk tanks by an early morning passenger and collection of full ones by a late afternoon train. The introduction of DMUs on passenger services through North Elmham ironically resulted in the need to introduce a steam-hauled dedicated milk train, so here is another

possibility. Add the delivery and pick-up of grain wagons, plus the collection of loaded sugar beet wagons on a through-goods train, and suddenly a really interesting operating schedule is possible.

### Motive power

An easy decision was that the new layout would operate along the lines of the Stour Valley route. In the 1950s the Stour Valley line was home to a variety of locomotives, large and small, hauling local passenger trains of only two or three coaches. Fans of the *Atlantic Coast Express* will understand just how appealing this is. This could be seen on local services, locomotives ranging from elderly E4 2-4-0s and J15 0-6-0s to 4-6-0s of classes B2, B12 and B17. Goods locomotives of classes J17, J19 and J20 could also be seen on passenger as well as local freight duties.

Other locomotives included Ivatt Class 2 'Mickey Mouse' and Class 4 'Mucky Duck' 2-6-0s and ex-Great Northern C12 4-4-2 tanks. Moving into the late 1950s, diesels made an appearance mainly in the form of Classes 15 and 31, plus Cravens, Metro-Cammell and Derby lightweights. I already had the nucleus of such a fleet with most of the rest awaiting building or conversion from ready-to-run items.

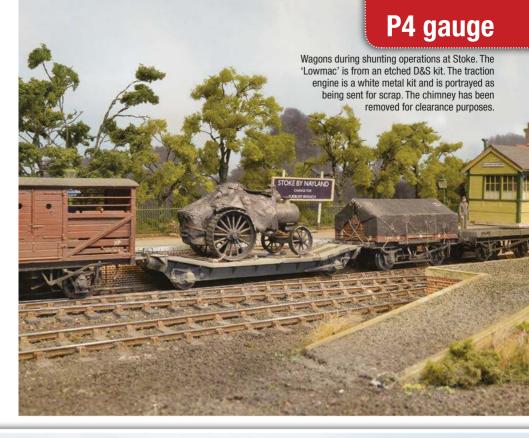
### Stock reliability

Passenger stock currently consists of a motley collection of ex-GER, GCR, NER and LNER corridor and non-corridor stock. There are some 40 wagons, mainly vans and opens, including a couple of grain wagons, 'Lowfits' and 'Lowmacs'. There are six brake vans of GER, GCR, LNER, LMS and BR origin. My current preferred option is to



spring all wagons, but when a kit includes its own arrangements for compensation, I tend to use this. Time is a precious commodity and I am not out to make more work than necessary. Some of the coaching stock is compensated, others sprung, but generally I find that if they are built accurately, rigid bogies are perfectly adequate, even in Scalefour.

My preferred layout style is the diorama, complete with built-in lighting and operated from the front. I find this much more sociable at exhibitions. One thing you will not find on any of my layouts are three-link couplings. I know they are supposed to be correct - if you ignore the giant pole with a dirty great hand on the end of it - but they are very difficult to use on this type of layout and I believe they detract considerably from the entertainment value at exhibitions.

Auto couplings are essential, and I now use Dingham couplings; there is not really room to discuss the 'ins' and 'outs' of them here, but suffice it to say that although, like every system, they have their drawbacks, I find them unobtrusive, easy to fit and reliable.

### Adapting to P4

I find working to Scalefour standards more satisfying than 00 or EM and am prepared to put in the extra effort required. I can't deny that it takes more time and needs that little bit of extra care. Nor can I deny that initially I found it frustrating until I really understood how to build locomotives and what keeps things on the track. In any case, given the nature of the subject being modelled, I need to build most of my locomotives and much of my rolling stock. There are many more suitable ready-to-run locomotives available now, but it is wishful to think that the trade will supply most of what I need. Where, for example, can I buy an E4, a J17, J19 or J20? If you are the sort of modeller who likes making things, then the extra work to build in Scalefour is not onerous.

### Permanent way

The track is built from Exactoscale

### K PY DETAILS

Although many of my locomotives are built from etched kits, an easy way of dipping your toe in the finescale water is to re-wheel ready-to-run items. Here are some conversions I have done with the degree of difficulty from 1 (easy) to 5 (difficult).

LOCOMOTIVE	DIFFICULTY	NOTES
Bachmann DMUs	1	Branchlines sell complete (Class 101 & 105) replacement wheelsets that simply drop in – expect it to take less than 30 minutes.
Heljan Class 15, Heljan German Railbus Bachmann Class 24	2	You need to source P4 standard wheels, remove the keeper plate and fit the new ones. You may need to replace the 2mm axle with a longer one, but generally that is not necessary. Adjust the pick-up to suit the wider spacing. I had to move the axleguards on the railbus to fit the wheels in.
Hornby D16	3	One of the easier steam locomotive conversions (four-coupled, inside valve gear, plenty of room in the splashers for the wider wheel spacing).
Hornby B17	5	More difficult as it involves Walschaert's valve gear and clearances are very tight on the front drivers. I also had to remove quite a lot of material within the splashers to accommodate the new wheels.

Alan Gibson www.alangibsonworkshop.com will sell you the parts to do the D16 and B17 conversion as well as supply downloadable instructions. At the time of writing, they provide this service for 24 ready-to-run locomotives.





B12 No. 61546 coasts into 'Stoke by Nayland' en-route to Colchester. The locomotive was built for me by Steamline Sheffield from a Crownline kit and didn't come cheap. Hornby now produces one at least as good for a fraction of the price, but that's the risk you take when you build from kits. The Thompson suburban coaches are also available from Hornby, but in this case, I built them myself from Comet kits with brass sides. I have never been totally convinced by Hornby's flush glazing.

components and point kits which result in a level of detail we could only have dreamt of thirty years ago. Put simply, the plain track consists of 60ft plastic sleeper panels with separate injection-moulded chairs threaded onto steel rail. The point kits include readymade crossings and point blade units and all the special chairs needed to build an accurate model. At the left-hand (control panel) end, the points are operated by the tube and wire method using a Masokits lever frame. The points and signals on the right-hand board are electrically-operated. Uncoupling is effected by homemade electromagnets operated by spring-loaded switches.

#### **Architectural adaptations**

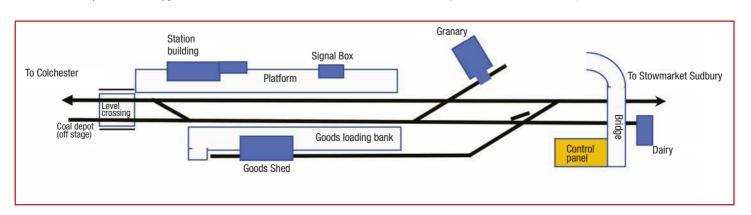
Most of the buildings are from my earlier 'Glemsford' layout and are typical Great

Eastern Railway 1865-style structures with exception of the goods shed which, at the real Glemsford, was built by a private contractor after the line had been open for some years. All buildings are constructed from styrene sheet, with embossed brickwork as appropriate. The cottages behind the platform are a recent addition and are modelled on Great Eastern Railway staff cottages that were built in the 1880s. I made use of drawings produced by the Great Eastern Railway Society and, for the first time, used etched windows and doors produced from my own artwork. This was a much simpler process than I had anticipated, and I only wish I had done this sooner. The only other building of note is the Granary, which is based on an existing example at Marlesford on the long-closed Framlingham branch. I had to shorten the building to fit

the site available, but having discovered that John Constable did much the same thing for artistic reasons when painting Willie Lott's Cottage in 'The Haywain', I feel entirely vindicated. See **BRM** November 2018 for a model re-creation of 'The Haywain'.

#### Convincing scenes

What are the ingredients that contribute to creating a convincing modelled scene? I go to many exhibitions and overhear a lot of views about what makes for a realistic model. A prevailing view seems to be that realism equals lots of stuff (weddings, funerals, car crashes, welders, houses on fire). While that might be fine for some, my take is that a realistic model portrays the everyday in its subtle detail. It might sound a bit boring, but modelling the ordinary isn't that easy and one has to be able to resist



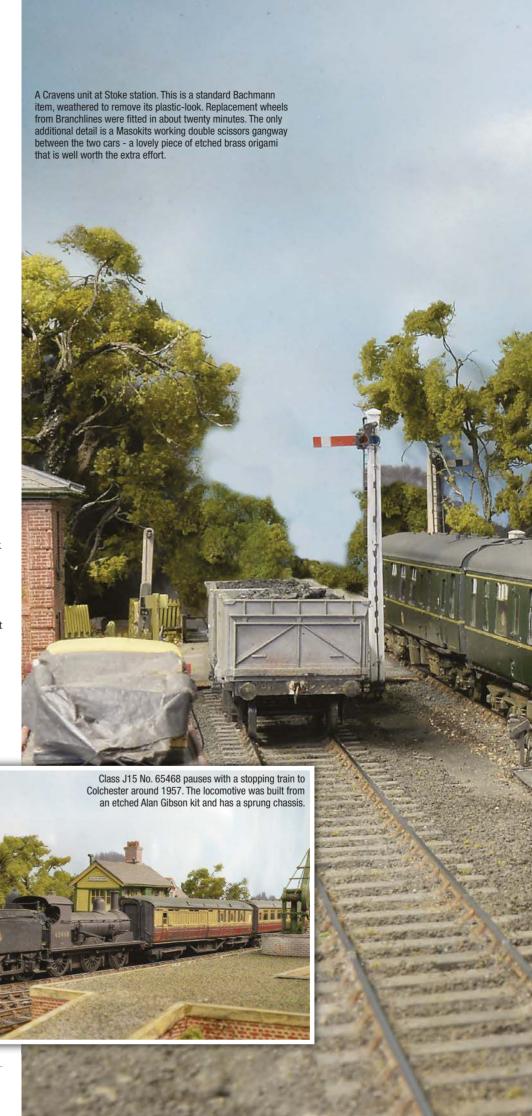

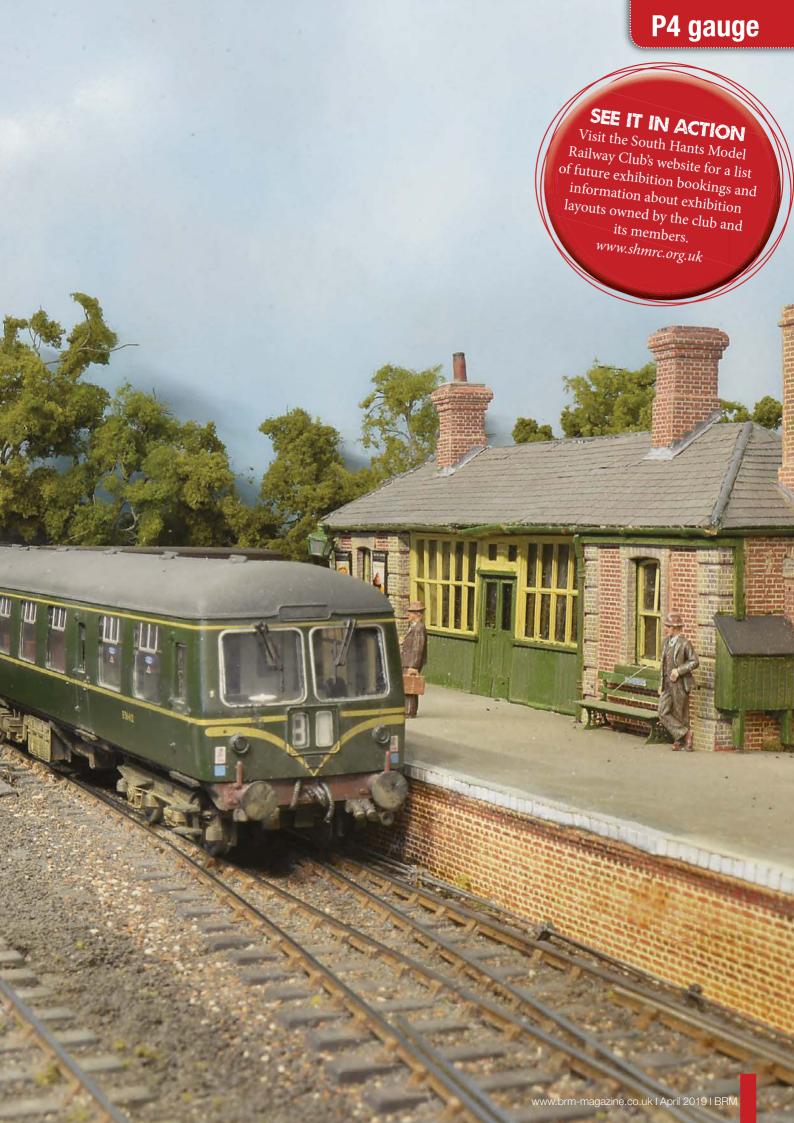
the temptation to put in more 'stuff'. As an illustration, there are not many figures because this is the decaying rural railway scene in the 1950s, and of those none is in an action pose.

There are relatively few road vehicles, but all are appropriate; all my road vehicles are kit-built and have correct number plates, appropriate sign-writing from home-made transfers in some cases, wing mirrors and 'flats' on the bottom of the tyres to give them a heavy appearance. The backscene is photoshopped from photographs of the area and is deliberately subdued and a bit 'fuzzy' to keep it in the background and act as a frame for the model. The goods yard is pretty bare. Generally, freight, apart from coal, wasn't left lying around in the open. Have a look at photographs of BR-era rural goods yards and you'll see what I mean.

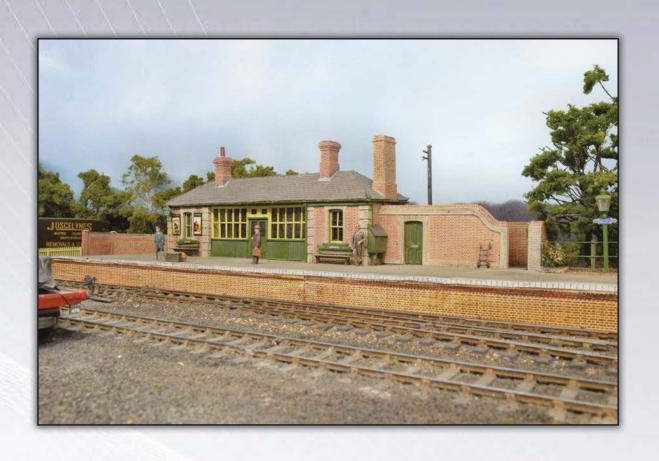
### **Further developments**

I continue to exhibit the layout, usually a couple of times a year. Possible future developments might include working ground signals and I am continually building new locomotives and rolling stock. I am currently about to embark on a new layout, based on Laxfield on the Mid-Suffolk Light Railway which will complement an East Suffolk townscape that I am currently building. Improvements will be even better running and reliability, and the ability to very quickly erect and break down the layout at shows. Currently, 'Stoke-by-Nayland' takes about an hour and I'd like to bring this down to around 30 minutes. Most importantly, I need to ensure that most maintenance can be performed without needing to go underneath the layout - at 72 years of age I'm finding this increasingly

# THE BRM GUIDE TO... COLOUR LIGHT SIGNALS

Recent years have seen a considerable expansion in the number of companies offering colour light signals. Simon Bendall distils the facts on each to make your choice easier.

f all the colour light signals available, it is perhaps those offered by Absolute Aspects that are the most impressive in terms of specification. As this three-aspect O gauge signal with feather indicator demonstrates, considerable thought has gone into the electrical connections.

Until the last decade, if you wanted a colour light signal for your layout, you typically had to turn to continental suppliers for working examples or make do with non-functional plastic kits. In addition, these only bore a passing resemblance to the look of British signals. However, with the growth of DCC prompting a wider use of electronics on layouts, there are now numerous manufacturers offering correct UK-outline signals to suit a range of requirements and budgets.

Of the main ready-to-run model manufacturers,

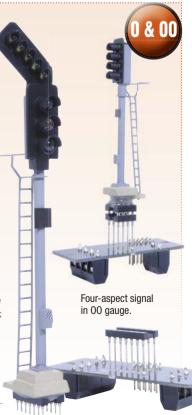
only Dapol has thus far committed to producing working colour light signals. It announced two-, three- and four-aspect designs some time ago, and still in development, these are due to appear in both 2mm:1ft scale (N gauge) and 4mm:1ft scale (OO gauge) at some point. Otherwise, output of a scale appearance from the major suppliers has been limited to dummy offerings, such as Peco's 4mm:1ft scale twin-pack of three-aspect signals and the single four-aspect signal produced by Bachmann as part of its 4mm:1ft scale Scenecraft brand.

Turning to smaller manufacturers, the ranges on offer are happily much more comprehensive, including main signals and, on occasion, other essentials like ground signals. Taking each supplier in turn, their output can be summarised thus:

### **ABSOLUTE ASPECTS**

Illustrated here are two examples of the Absolute Aspects range, encompassing a four-aspect signal (£50.00) in 4mm:1ft scale and a three-aspect version with left-hand 'feather' (£80.00) in 7mm:1ft scale. Although on the pricey side, the quality of the product is clear with a mix of metal components utilised in the construction. The post is well-detailed for example, including baseplate detail, a signal identification plate that can be lettered if desired, and a telephone case complete with appropriate symbol. Each signal is fitted underneath with an integrated circuit chip connector, this mating with a similar connector on the circuit board. A rectangular hole needs to be made in the baseboard to accommodate the chip connector and the signal glued in place. The circuit board is then connected from underneath the baseboard and screwed in place. The design is principally intended for DC use with either a switch for a two-aspect signal or a rotary switch for more complex designs. However, they can be adapted to work with a suitable DCC power supply and control module. W: www.absoluteaspects.com

Shown here are two typical examples of the CR Signals range, these being a four-aspect 'peg' in N gauge with a safety cage on the ladder (£22.00) and a OO gauge three-aspect signal with a safety ring (£21.00). Both feature a substantial base that would need covering with ballast while the signal post extends through the baseboard top, this requiring a 3mm diameter hole to pass the wires and integrated resistors through. The wires need connecting to a rotary switch for DC operation. W: www.crsignals.com



MODEL RAIL UK

Among the signals offered by Model Rail UK is this pair of 4mm:1ft scale examples, these being a two-aspect design with red and green lenses (£10.50) along with a three-aspect version (£11.75). Both feature a brass post and ladder, a whitemetal base and a plastic signal head. Also illustrated is a 7mm:1ft version of the two-aspect design (£12.00), which is largely identical in construction apart from the use of a whitemetal head. The two-aspect 4mm version is also supplied with a telephone case and identification plate to glue to the post if desired. Installation simply involves drilling a hole (3mm or 4mm depending on the scale) in the baseboard to thread the wires and post extension through. Again set up for DC operation, the two-aspect signals in both scales are provided with a circuit board for easy installation, this featuring a diode and resistors. For the three-aspect signal, the modeller is left to sort out the installation with both set-ups requiring a suitable switch as well. Also pictured is one of the signal heads that are available for use with scratch-built posts or gantries, in this case the three-aspect design (£13.00 per pair) is mounted on a brass post. These heads are supplied finished and wired with the modeller left to provide the rest.

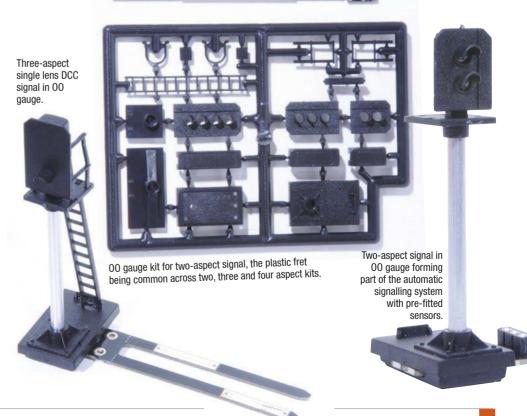

In their basic form, the 4mm:1ft scale Train-Tech signals are supplied as kits with the modeller choosing which signal arrangement is required from a range of two-, three- and four-aspects with optional 'feathers' and theatre indicators. The required LED arrangement is supplied pre-fitted on a long narrow PCB that doubles up as the signal post with a plastic fret also included to give the signal head, ladder, railings and base. Shown here is a home signal with red and green aspects (£10.00). For DCC users, all of the signals are supplied largely pre-assembled but with the ladder and safety railings still needing to be attached. These include DCC decoders inside with two track clips attached, these sliding under the adjacent track to provide power. Illustrated is a modern three-aspect single lens DCC fitted signal (£30.00). Similar ready-built signals are available as part of Train-Tech's automatic signalling system, these having built-in sensors and electronics to give an easy-to-install system. Compatible with DC and DCC, the signal types available include this two-aspect red/green home signal (£40.00).

The company offers four different types of ground signal in both 4mm:1ft and 7mm:1ft scales to the long-lived triangular design, but with alternate lighting arrangements. These encompass the traditional one red/two white style along with the modern two red/two white design. Also available are the limit of shunt variety with two constant red lights and a version with one yellow/two white lights. Again, an identification plate can be fitted and lettered at an additional cost. Pictured here is the traditional ground signal design in both 4mm (£30.00) and 7mm (£45.00). Each ground signal features a stem which is used to fix it into the baseboard by drilling a 4mm hole, passing the wires through and then pushing the signal into place. DC control can be carried out via a single-pole double-throw switch. A decoder must be fitted for DCC control.

### **CR SIGNALS**

CR Signals offers several versions of ground signal in both 2mm (£18.95) and 4mm (£18.00), the traditional BR version being illustrated in both cases. The N gauge design really is tiny with the head being just 3mm wide, while both have a rectangular base that ideally needs burying in ballast to give the correct look. The wiring mirrors the company's main signals with resistors already in place and ready to connect to a switch.

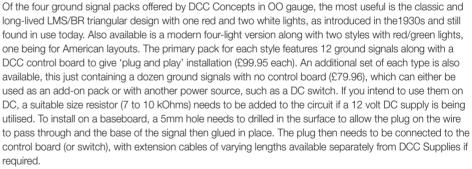

# TRAIN-TEC GROUND SIGNAL

Two traditional BR ground signals are offered by the company, one with red/ white aspects and the other with yellow/ white in both conventional DC and DCCfitted models. This is the latter (£35.00), which is supplied ready-made and wired and is suitable for both DC and DCC with an additional input for a Track sensor to allow it to be automated. The key aspect of this design is that the lengthy circuit board protrudes below baseboard level, requiring a 10mm hole to pass through. There are also DC-only versions of the ground signal (£16) which are much shorter with connections direct to the LEDs. The assembly on both versions is held in place by a two-piece plastic clamp with two height settings available, with wires needing to be connected to the circuit board.

### **ESSENTIAL INFO**

ABSOLUTE ASPECTS: Established in 2011 with the takeover of the Roger Murray Colour Light Signals, the range has remained true to the ethos of its predecessor by producing high-quality signals that are handmade to order using brass and whitemetal components. As well as its standard products, Absolute Aspects accepts commission work for bespoke projects, such as signal gantries. The 4mm:1ft scale range includes two-, three- and four-aspect signals with a wide range of route indicator options along with ground signals, banner repeaters and SPAD indicators, with the options being much the same in 7mm:1ft scale, except for the banner repeaters.

CR SIGNALS: In OO gauge, a number of two-, three- and four-aspect signals are offered along with ground signals. Several route indicator 'feather' options are also available, which are built onto the main signal by the manufacturer when ordered, while the access ladders can be specified with either safety rings or modern safety cages. Separate pre-finished signal heads are available for use on scratch-built signal posts and gantries. The same options are available in N gauge as well, with the addition of dummy non-working signals, available in both readymade and kit form.

DCC Concepts: Four types of 4mm:1ft scale ground signal are offered as part of the Colbalt 'Alpha-Mimic' range, these being designed with DCC control primarily in mind but can be made to work on DC control too in conjunction with its Cobalt Sniffer unit

two-, three- and four-aspect designs along with block signalling packs that include a control board. In addition, pre-wired and finished signal heads are offered for modellers to fit to posts of their own construction. Much the same products are found in the 7mm:1ft scale category, but only covering two- and three-aspect signals.

TRAIN-TECH: The basis of the firm's 4mm:1ft scale signalling range is a series of kits for two-, three- and four-aspect designs, there are also options for 'feathers' and theatre indicators. Similarly, there are kits available for signal heads only and ground signals, all featuring LED lights. These kits can be wired to work on DC or DCC, but are also available pre-assembled offering simple installation for both DCC and automated signal users. Signal control modules are also offered in addition to an automated signal control system, ideal for block signalling where each signal communicates with its adjacent counterpart using a single wire.

BERKO & ECKON: Now owned by Online Models Ltd, the long-standing range has undergone a revitalisation in recent years. The Berko range consists of ready-built signals in both 2mm:1ft and 4mm:1ft scales, while the Eckon brand covers signal kits in 4mm:1ft only. In both cases in OO gauge, the signals are offered with round and square heads with the latter being the style most appropriate to British use, although even then, some of the designs are distinctly continental in their appearance. However, there is a comprehensive selection of two-, three- and four-aspect designs, including examples with route indicator 'feathers', and ground signals as well. The Berko N gauge range is somewhat smaller in comparison, but still feature a selection of two- and three-aspect

# DIGITRAINS

Phil Parker is a Digital Command Control Luddite, claiming it's too complicated. We've sent him to DCC specialist, Digitrains, for a crash course at learning the technology.

et's be honest, the digital revolution has passed me by as far as model railways are concerned. I see DCC-controlled layouts and read about the technology, but it looks horribly complicated. Where do you start, and why?

Digitrains has been trading for nearly 15 years from its Lincolnshire base. You meet them at exhibitions up and down the country and most importantly, they are helpful people. The BRM team decided that I should go and find out more, so I headed to the shop for a chat to see if they can prise the handheld DC controller from my fingers.

**Phil:** My problem is that I don't know where to start with DCC. It all looks so complicated.

Nicole: The first thing we ask when someone comes in to the shop, is why they want to go DCC? Are they unhappy with their layout? A lot of the time they don't really know and are content with what they have already, so we say there is no need to change. We aren't twisting people's arms to go DCC.

An often misconception modellers have is that only DCC locomotives are available.

People see 'DCC-ready' on a box and assume that this means they have no choice and have to go DCC. That's not true.

Phil: What is the advantage of DCC? Nicole: It's basically what we call a 'drive anywhere, park anywhere' system. All your track is powered and you have access to anywhere on the layout with any of the locomotives at any time. You don't have to worry about where the electricity is. So long as the points are set, you can drive. You can have a shunter working in a siding, a locomotive going around on the main line and something else on a second line idling with lights and sound.

Phil: Are people nervous about changing? Nicole: Oh yes, but once you explain the basics, they tend to relax a bit. Most seem

to think that because it's digital, it's going to involve using a computer. If you love computers, you can connect one up to automate your layout, but you don't have to go anywhere near one if you don't want to.

Phil: I already have a layout. Would I need to rewire it to convert to DCC?

Nicole: Not at all. All you do is replace the DC controller with the DCC version – the same two wires feed the track and everything will work. If your control panel has isolating switches on it, make sure all these are in the 'on' position as you want the electricity to get to the whole of your track. After that, you have a digital layout.

Phil: Does this simplify the wiring?
Nicole: Yes. There's no need for those isolating sections. Everything is controlled from two wires. However, we recommend running a 'track bus' - a ring main around the layout and putting connections to the track from this in several places. This is really easy though, and no different from DC where you also need to make sure the track is fed from many places to ensure everything works. It's just easier with DCC. We've wired our test track up this way using copper tape on the board surface so people can see what is going on.

**Phil:** What about points? I'm sure I've read something with Peco instructions about making changes.

Nicole: The thing with pointwork is that when DCC came out, people were running older models with thicker wheels and tighter back-to-backs. On these, it is just possible for the back of the flange to touch the switch blade as it runs through and cause a short.



Very much a Rolls-Royce solution, the ESU Command Station offers all the functions that anyone, even a model railway club with a large layout, is likely to need. The pictures on the touch-screen can even be customised using your own photographs to make locomotive identification a breeze.

Nowadays this is rare because of better wheels and points. We don't recommend hacking points and we never make changes. A lot of people only do this because they have been told to do it, and don't really understand why.

**Phil:** Looking at adverts in magazines, I see the phrases 'DCC-ready' and 'DCC-compatible'. What do they mean?

Nicole: 'DCC-ready' and 'DCC-compatible' are almost the same thing. 'DCC-ready' means the model has a socket ready for a decoder and there is space for it. Some older models can be absolutely chock full of chassis, so fitting a chip is a major job. 'DCC-ready' means the designer has made sure space isn't a problem. 'DCC-compatible' means perhaps no socket is fitted but it's easily accessible with labelled solder points enabling chips to be wired easily. 'DCC-fitted' or 'DCC-onboard' are locomotives already fitted with DCC decoders.

**Phil:** Will some DCC locomotives will also work on analogue DC?

Nicole: They will, yes. Some are arriving from the factory ready so it can run on both, but others need to be setup to tell it to work on DC. If you aren't sure, ask the person selling you the model or check the manufacturer's website for information. Most can work on both.

**Phil:** How do I chose the best DCC controller from the dozens out there? I've seen people looking blankly at a complicated handset.

Nicole: We interrogate them, or at least ask a series of questions; the first of which is, how many locomotives will be on the track at the same time? Some controllers provide more power than others. For example, the NCE Powercab is 2A, Digitrax Zephyr Extra is 3A, and we have some that will provide 6A. If you are only running two N gauge locomotives, the high-power system won't be essential.

We also ask if they prefer a console system or a hand-held controller. On the whole, people prefer hand-helds as they can walk around, and you don't lose the space on the

layout required for a console.

Phil: I've always used a hand-held DC controller and I suppose it wouldn't occur to me to use anything else.

Nicole: That's it. Once you've made that decision it's basically, which ones do you like the look of? Which ones do you like the feel of when holding them? Which ones do you like the buttons on? It's a personal thing.

Phil: It's all about ergonomics then? So, you really need to try a few handsets before you settle on one?

Nicole: We tend to find that if people use a handset they don't like, they won't use it very often and then decide that DCC is bad.

Phil: Of course, it helps if you can visit somewhere that offers a full range. Nicole: Yes, but if you visit an exhibition, take a look at the layouts and see what they are using. Ask the operators how they are getting on with their system, if they like it and if they wish they had bought anything different. These are tools to enable you to drive your locomotives. People at shows are always happy to chat and explain, if it's quiet they might even let you try them out. It's also worth chatting to your friends to see what they're using. If you run on other people's layouts, identical control systems might be a good idea.

Phil: Will all the controllers operate all types of decoder?

Nicole: Mostly. Some, like the Gaugemaster Prodigy Express, Bachmann EZ Command, Dynamis or Hornby Select don't have 28

functions, so you might not be able to operate all the sounds on some locomotives. We always ask as it's important to future-proof your system so it will last you for years to come. Some can be upgraded, but not all. There's certainly no issue taking a locomotive to the railway club or to a friend's track. Decoders will work on all controllers, even if you can't access all the functions.

Phil: One scary thing is the wide variety of decoders available. How do I make sure I get the right one?

Nicole: On the end or back of the box of a 'DCC-ready' model, there will be something to tell you which sort of decoder you need. If the box says you need a 6-pin decoder, that's what you buy. If it says, 8-pin, you'll need one of those. Simply buy the one that fits your budget - we sell non-sound decoders from £12 to £40.

If it's not on the end of the box, then the manufacturer's instruction sheet or website will be able to help. The brand of decoder is often down to personal preference. For example, some people will only buy TCS because they were the first they bought and so they like to stick with them.

Phil: Is there much difference between decoders now?

Nicole: There is some, but much less than there used to be. Our £12 budget range comes direct from China and we think they're great, we haven't had a problem with them. Some people think they won't be as good as a Zimo at £20 and admittedly with one of these you will be able to make your locomotive crawl so slowly you can hardly see it move. Mind you, one of our customers buys the budget ones by the bucket-full as he likes them so much.

Phil: Does the budget range offer all the features? What about sound? Nicole: You can control lights, but not sound. The £12 decoders are ideal for those making their first attempt at fitting a decoder. If you really muck it up, you've not wasted much money. They can also be used just as lighting decoders.

Phil: Does the number of pins on a decoder make a difference?

Nicole: No, it doesn't make any difference. 6-pin and Next-18 pins are the smaller decoders and therefore tend to go into smaller locomotives. 8-pin and 21-pin decoders tend to be bigger and are more suited to OO and O gauge. More pins mean more functionality in theory, but we see 21-pin decoders in steam locomotives with no more than basic

drive and lights. The socket the manufacturer chooses is the one that works best for them, not always based on the functions required.

Phil: So, are they the same?

Nicole: Graham Farish's N gauge 0-6-0T 'Jinty' needs a right-angled set of pins and there is a special decoder for that. Hornby's Peckett needs a 4-pin decoder and the only one of those is available from its spare parts department.

Phil: What's the most common problem people come to you with?

**Nicole:** "My decoder has stopped working and I don't know why. What have I done wrong?"

Phil: That doesn't give you a lot to work with - are you mind readers?

Nicole: Sadly not. Our first question is, "Have you done a decoder reset?" and the response is normally, "What's a decoder reset?"

Phil: What's a decoder reset?

Nicole: Using your controller, you tell the decoder to revert to factory settings. When we say that, we mean as it left us, complete with sound. The important thing is that a factory reset won't lose the sound files, something a lot of people worry about. You can't actually reset it back to as it left the factory. It will revert the locomotive address back to the standard for a new decoder, but at least you can tell the reset has worked.

**Phil:** This brings us to 'CVs', something I've heard about, but don't know much about?

Look at any recent packaging from manufacturers and you'll notice a label that outlines the decoder-fitting suitability or type of decoder fitted. The Hornby J50 in this case is DCC-ready, i.e. has a socket ready to be fitted with a decoder, below, the Bachmann Class 08 is fitted with an eight-pin DCC socket.

Nicole: CV stands for Configuration Variable. They are all the little packets of information on your decoder that you can alter. For example, if your locomotive has a really slow start and takes ages to get up to speed and you don't like this, you can alter the CV that controls inertia.

**Phil:** Will this be in the instruction book? **Nicole:** It is in the instructions that come with the decoder.

**Phil:** Can you break a chip by messing with the CVs?

Nicole: No. You can always reset it.

Phil: Presumably you can do this with the locomotive sitting on the layout, but I've also heard of something called a programming track - is this length of track separate from the layout?

Nicole: Most controllers offer the option of programming on the layout or a programming track. One of the advantages of working off the layout is that the controller can interrogate the decoder and find out what individual CVs are set at. The other is that the signal will be sent at a low power, the locomotive can't be driven then, but there's also no chance at all of damaging the decoder.

**Phil:** A separate yard of track for programming sounds like cheap insurance against

damaging a chip.

Nicole: If you are going to fit your own decoders to locomotives, we would certainly recommend it.

Phil: Sound is a big reason to go digital, but it's another apparently complicated area.

Nicole: There are several ranges of sound decoders. Many are set up for American or Continental models and we do stock those types, but we specialise in UK sounds for locos. We stock LokSound and Zimo – which we can sell pre-loaded with the sounds requested. You ask for a 'Black Five' for example and we'll take a blank decoder and add the sound file.

**Phil:** Can I add the sound myself? **Nicole:** Yes, if you have the correct decoder programmer, bespoke to the brand of decoder, however it is more technical and not for beginners.

Phil: How difficult is fitting a chip?
Nicole: If the locomotive is 'DCC-ready', you just take the body off and plug the decoder into the socket. Older models require you to hard wire the unit and that means getting the soldering iron out. It's not difficult as the decoder only needs to use four of its seven or eight wires – the red and black wires in from the pickups and the orange and grey out to the motor – but a lot of people are nervous about this.

### CONCLUSION

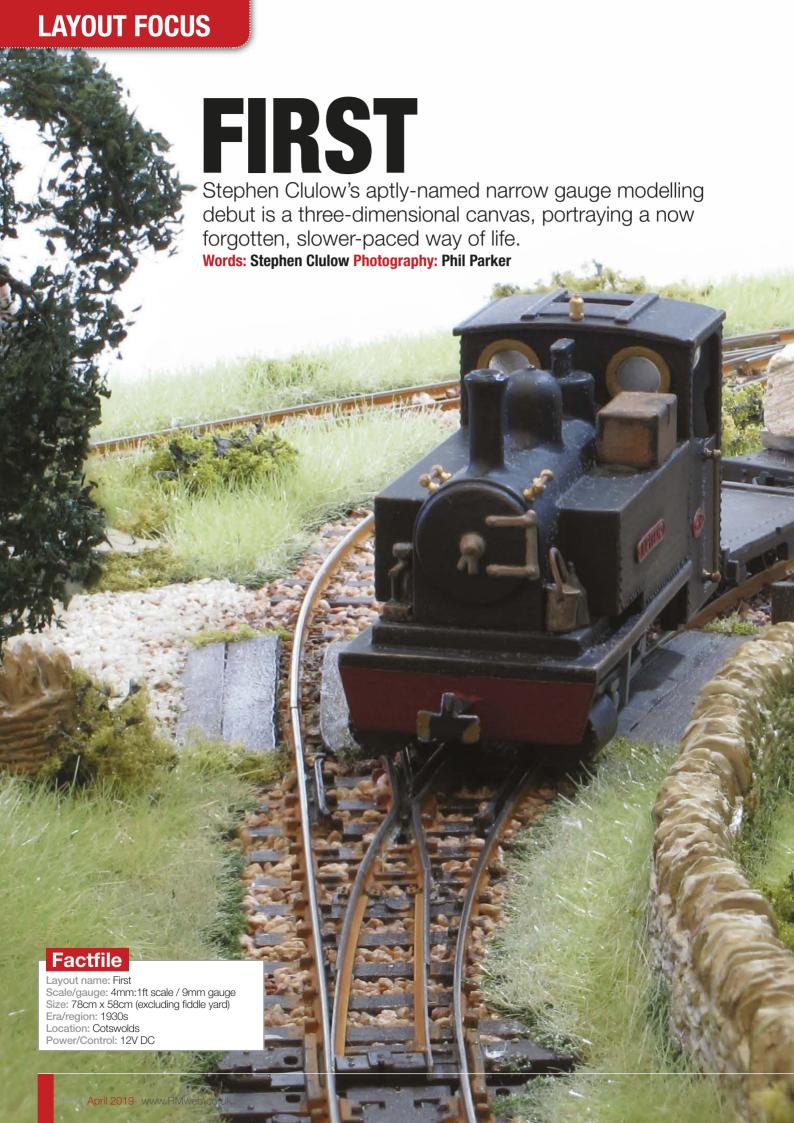
Am I convinced? For the sort of 6ft-long micro layout I tend to build, not yet. If I want sound, I need DCC. I know you can get sound from DC, but if you want proper control, DCC is essential. Diesels with lights, again, digital makes sense. One area I am convinced with is the simplification of the wiring. Running a bus around the layout is simple and adding lots of power feeds from this is a doddle. I could drive the points and signals from the same bus wire.

Even on a simple layout, digital would allow me to run more than one locomotive without having to consider where the electricity is flowing – I could just concentrate on where I want the trains to go. The process of converting to DCC isn't hard. It would pay to spend time talking to people at shows before spending money. Getting hands-on time with a controller is essential and I will definitely be asking more questions at shows.

The model railway DCC marketplace is rich with a variety of decoders in all shapes and sizes, from large manufacturers to digital manufacturing specialists.









### **LAYOUT FOCUS**

Inst is a small country station on a narrow gauge line in the Cotswolds. The line is a common carrier where the main goods traffic is livestock, wool, limestone and beer from the local brewery. In the 1930s, services on many narrow gauge lines declined because of competition from road transport. Surprisingly though, the locals found it convenient to travel in slow carriages with hard seats and there is still a good passenger service.

That is the fictional back story, but in reality, 'First' is just that - someone's first layout. Mine to be precise.

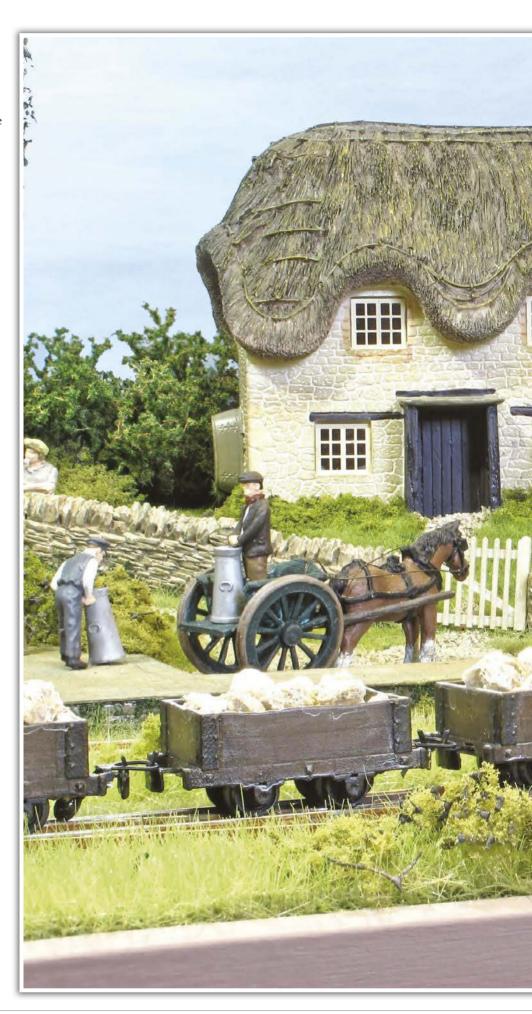
I liked model railways as a teenager, but like many, drifted away from the hobby for several years. I finally decided to build a layout to see if it was something I really enjoyed and became an active modeller as a result.

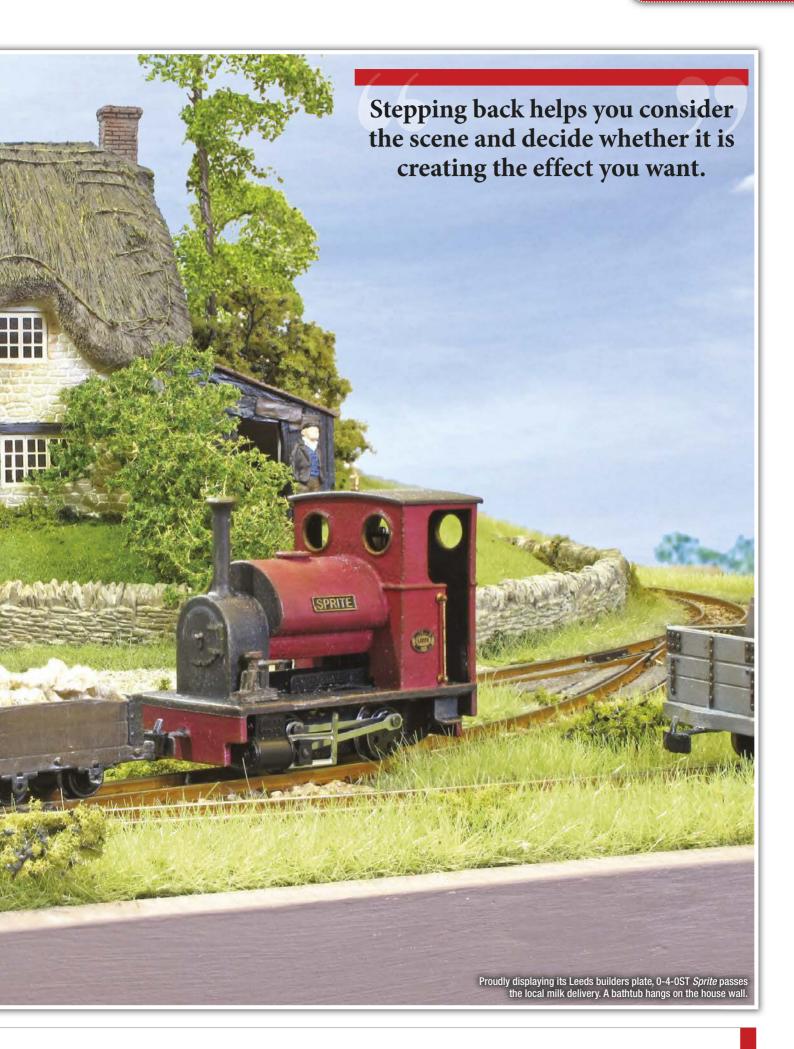
The construction techniques are quite traditional, a plywood baseboard strengthened with a pine frame and the hills are polystyrene blocks cut to shape. These were covered with scatter material, static grass and hedge materials from a range of suppliers and glued with PVA adhesive. As a beginner, there are advantages to sticking to tried and tested methods, and it's easy to find good advice in magazines or online, giving confidence that the approach will work well.

### Maximising potential

'First' is a simple oval layout that has been divided into two scenic sections - a station scene and a countryside scene. This makes good use of the small baseboard by creating a longer run and gave the opportunity to create two very different scenes. The track and the dry stone wall provide a visual link between the two sections. The stone walls are Hornby ready-made wall sections. The mouldings are crisp and detailed and, by combining straight and curved sections, it was easy to fit the wall alongside the track. There were some gaps where the sections joined, but these were easily filled with model filler and the walls were repainted in more subdued tones.

Much of the scenic detailing was bought second-hand, often from dealers' 'rummage boxes' at exhibitions. The grounded van body on the goods platform is a good example. It was a complete wagon, but had a broken chassis and a badly cracked roof. It was disassembled, a door was cut out of one side and moved along the body to create the open door, a new roof was added and it was painted and weathered. Some second-hand

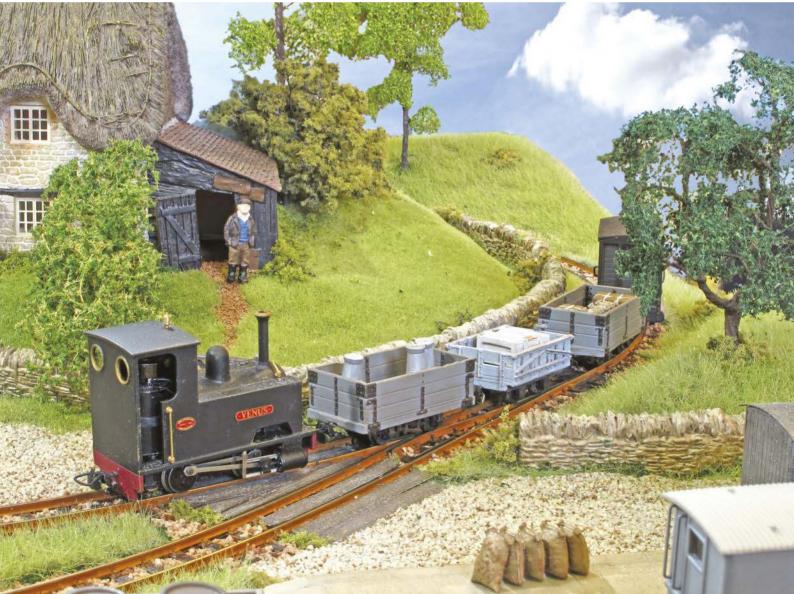
crates and sacks were placed inside the grounded van and on the goods platform to complete the effect.

### Print and detail

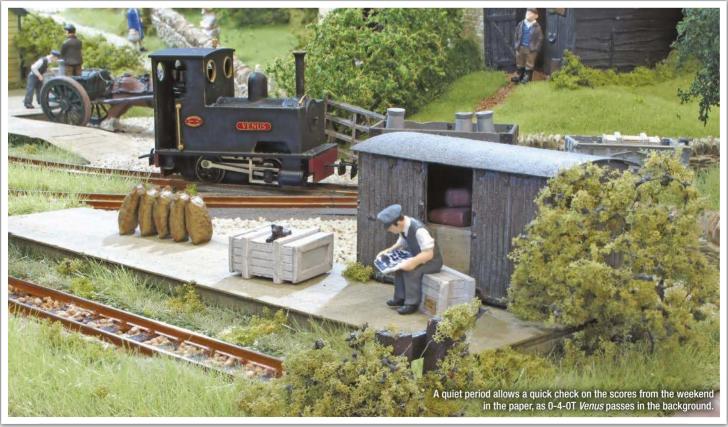
All of the locomotives are 3D-printed bodies on commercially available-chassis. 3D prints can have ridges where the different layers of material have been laid down during the printing process. These were removed by carefully burnishing the print using a sharp knife. The blade was rubbed gently over the surface, along the length of the ridges, to gradually remove the raised parts of the print until a smooth surface was created. The finished locomotive body can look rather plain and it is good to add detail. Handrails, whistles, nameplates and makers' plates have been added to all locomotives, and most of them have additional detailing such as lamps, buckets, locomotive jacks or toolboxes. With hindsight this has been a good approach, the 3D-printed bodies are different from RTR models, the commercial chassis ensure good running and detailing each locomotive to give it an individual character was very enjoyable.



The rolling stock is a mixture of secondhand purchases, kits and 3D-printed wagons. The two three-plank wagons and the brake van were bought second-hand at exhibitions. Second-hand items can be well-priced, especially if they need a small amount of work. In this case, couplings were added and they were repainted. It was a simple and enjoyable job. All rolling stock on 'First', including the locomotives, were painted by hand, using acrylic paints. There are a couple of tricks to getting good results.









Dilute the paint slightly so that if flows more evenly and, while the paint is wet, brush first in one direction then brush at 90 degrees to the original direction to avoid leaving bush marks. In reality, the open wagons would probably have been covered with tarpaulins, but sometimes it's more interesting to be able to see the loads.

### Harmonising effects

The coal stage was made from balsa wood and is the only scratch-built structure on 'First'. Initially, everything on 'First' had an 'as-new' look, but a clean coaling stage looked odd and it became obvious that a working narrow-gauge line would have a weathered appearance. Most of the buildings and rolling stock have been weathered by dry-brushing, usually with a rust colour,

then a dirty brown and finally a wash of diluted black. Dry-brushing and washes are easy to do and create a lightly weathered look which I feel is much more appropriate for 'First'.

The original track plan had a very sharp reverse curve leading to the fiddle yard. The stock had to run very slowly through the curves and even if the operator was careful, there were derailments. The track has been re-laid and a straight connection to the fiddle yard has made operations much simpler and more reliable.

Cassettes made from plastic electrical trunking are used. These are based on an idea by Michael Campbell (Awngate, **BRM** September 2018) and allow the operator to turn or change trains easily and they have proved to be very successful.

### The big picture

When creating the scenery for a layout it's important to take a couple of steps backwards and look at the model for a few minutes. Often modellers are very focused on the individual item they are painting or gluing in place. Stepping back helps you consider the scene and decide whether it is creating the effect you want. When building 'First', one of the most enjoyable elements was experimenting, placing buildings, people and road vehicles in different places and seeing how they affected the look of the model. Often the initial idea wasn't the best one and by testing different options, and stepping back to consider the effect, a much better scenic composition emerged.





Quiet country paths and Cotswold stone walls make pleasant boundaries - no chain-link fencing with razor wire here! Sidings and a run round loop to the left are useful for displaying rolling stock when not in use.

### What we think...



I can still remember a few of the small Lilliput Lane cottages that my mum had on a sideboard in the snooker room growing up. Quaint condensed depictions of a by-gone era of rural life, they centred largely around a small thatched-roof cottage with stone walls and pathways. Stephen Clulow's 'First' feels like an extended version, albeit with more scenery, but it oozes the same atmosphere. The trackplan is very simple with a passing loop and two sidings, but fills the board nicely with enough gently undulating terrain to entertain the most curious of eyes. The layout is neatly presented and the partially-built backscene provides a wider view of the layout than the usual norm. There's a lot to be said for the simplistic nature of such a layout if you're touring exhibitions without a team.

# THE BILLY BOOKCASE LAYOUTS DART 2

Do you need a baseboard for your next modelling project? Do you know your options? Here's a selection for you to consider

aced with three layouts to build for the 'Billy bookcase layouts project', I could have produced a set of identical baseboards using my normal plywood and glue methods, but where's the fun in that?

Instead, for the OO gauge model, I'm trying a laser-cut baseboard kit from Tim Horn. He's recently gained a reputation among railway modellers as a provider of high-quality boards. I'm keen to give one a proper hands-on review, and not just build the kit - this model will be finished and then head out on the road to find out how a few hundred miles bouncing along the motorway affects it.

Next, I use a lot of polystyrene for scenic work, but there are plenty of modellers who

build their entire baseboard from foam. I can certainly see the advantage if the plan is for a layout with undulating changes in the height of the terrain. Hacking away foam is far easier than chopping holes in wood if the track is to run on an embankment or over a river, but is the material stable enough for long-term use?

Finally, the layouts are designed to fit on an Ikea Billy Bookcase shelf, so why not just buy a spare shelf and build on this? It's certainly quick and cheap, but is making a working model on one easy? Let's see...



Opening the box from Tim Horn, first impressions are really good. The parts are cleanly cut from quality plywood - 6mm thick for the main parts and 3mm for cross-braces. Hardware such as screws and bolts is also included. Step-by-step instructions are found on two sheets of A4. The builder only has to supply glue and a cross-head screwdriver.



One thing I've learnt building laser-cut projects is to follow the instructions to the letter. Once parts are glued, separating them when you find your order of assembly doesn't work is a nightmare! The first job is to fit the centre support to the board top, paying attention to the writing telling you which should be the visible face. PVA glue is all that is required so the work is quick and odour-free. All parts slot together perfectly; no need for any fettling to make things fit.



To stop a baseboard twisting, it's a good idea to fit diagonal braces underneath. A couple of lengths are supplied, but I've left these off for now in case they clash with point motors once the track is laid. I'll fit them once these are screwed in place. The holes aren't really for reducing weight, the difference they make is negligible, but they make running wires around a lot easier.



While glue does most of the work, there are a few self-tapping screws to fit. They bite well enough so a manual screwdriver is fine for the job. All holes are drilled and countersunk so there won't be any visible screwheads on the finished board.



Providing a finishing touch to the front edge is a strip of plywood, which can be varnished or painted and glued. This is best left off until the messy scenic work has been carried out because you don't want paint or plaster on it.



The ends are double thickness for strength, but more importantly they're like that so modellers can fit alignment dowels (not supplied) if required when joining several boards together for a larger layout. This is a fantastic feature because fitting dowels requires woodworking skills and tools I don't possess. The bolt shown is supplied and used to clamp the two layers together while the glue dries.

### Foam baseboard



When I opened the box of foam, the first surprise was that it came in 1ft square pieces. I'm sure larger sheets are available, but not through the post it seems. The material I'm using is dark grey Styrofoam with a density of 33kg/m³. There are many choices, so I rang 4D Models in London for advice and was helpfully guided. It's light, strong and cuts well with a knife.



Using an Ikea shelf as a flat work surface, three bits of foam are stuck together using copious amounts of a No Nails-style grab adhesive, suitable for polystyrene, which is far less dense than Styrofoam. It works well, grabbing quickly, but needs several hours to set properly. The steel weights are to keep the top surface flat while this happens.



Doing my best to keep the saw blade vertical, I cut the foam rectangle down to the Billy shelf dimensions using a fine tooth saw. If you have a bread-knife, you could use this instead as the material cuts easily.



The foam is strong, but its surface will dent pretty easily, so add strips of 3mm thick plywood for protection and decoration. I'll trim these to the contour of the scenery

later, hence the higher back and end. More instant grab

adhesive holds it in place easily and I'm careful to make

sure all pieces are vertical.

# TOP TIPS FOR. BASEBOARD CONSTRUCTION

- 1 Nothing is more important than your baseboard, so spend time and money to make sure it is flat, square and solid.
- 2 Consider portability. Can you lift the board on your own? Will it go through the door? If the answer to these is 'no', then consider building several boards to be joined together. Even if you don't plan to take the model to a show, planning ahead will make a house move less traumatic.
- 3 How good a woodworker are you? I'm hopeless, so I have all the wooden parts cut for me either by a timber yard or have it ready in a baseboard kit. Neither is expensive nowadays and well worth the money.

- 4 When choosing materials, how moisture resistant are they? Even if the model lives in a dry, heated room, you'll still be throwing wet glues and plaster at the surface. Soggy baseboards quickly become saggy ones!
- 5 How will you attach a backscene? There are advantages in making this a separate board fixed to the back of the main structure, especially if you plan to use a photographic image. These can be easily damaged, so plan how you will replace it before starting work.
- 6 What will the board sit on? The Billy layouts will use a set of shelves, but larger models need legs constructing. These don't need to be complicated, we are building a model railway not the Forth Bridge, so simple lengths of timber will work.
- 7 What sort of point motors will you use? It might seem too early to think about wiring, but you'll need to allow enough space underneath for your chosen devices.

- 8 If building a series of boards, work out how you will align them before laying any track.
  By using demountable hinges on the sides, or alignment dowels, it's possible to create a layout that can be quickly erected, something especially important for exhibition models.
- 9 If your layout is built for show, consider how you will pack the boards for transportation. Most people pair them face-to-face using some simple squares of wood on the ends. For this to work, both halves of the pair need to be the same length.
- 10 Make the model look nice. Varnish or paint the edges, even if the model is never to leave home. When you show friends and family your model, it should look like something to be proud of, not reclaimed from a builder's skip!

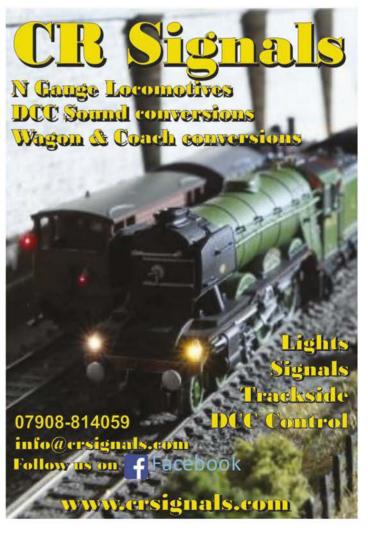

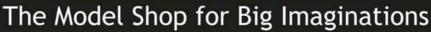

prefer the corporate reverse blue/grey Pullman livery to the Nanking Blue and white livery. There, I've said it now. It probably makes me a heretic in the eyes of some, but as a spotter in the seventies, I can relate to the livery more, even if it was only a distant view of the withdrawn units at Old Oak Common rather than in their prime.

The 'Blue Pullman' in OO and N from Bachmann/Graham Farish still carries an air of prestige six years after the model's introduction, so there is still a degree of excitement when opening the packaging and looking at the ensemble on the workbench. It's a very good product indeed. In an era with more detailed features and functions on models, perhaps you could wish for more, however we will be well-furnished when the

OO gauge digital sound version arrives later this year, just be prepared to pay more for such extravagances.

#### **Tooling changes**

Previous incarnations of the six-car unit have been in Midland Pullman form, but the two Midland sets were cascaded onto the Western Region in 1967 after the removal of St. Pancras to Manchester services via the Midland main line and Peak District following the completion of the West Coast routes electrification. The two units were modified to run in multiple with each other as a 12-car train, which meant removing the lower part of the nose fairing to expose the coupling hook. Multiple working cables were added, too. Bachmann has replicated

these changes by altering the tooling of the original model, which means we won't see further production runs of the original Midland Pullmans for the foreseeable future.

#### Flip colours

Whether you like this livery or not, it's exquisitely rendered in 2mm scale. I regard Bachmann's decoration as the best in the RTR market and the clarity of the white BR arrows, Pullman branding and car numbering against the pale grey background is spot on. The definition between different coloured areas is perfect. A point to note is that the underframe detail and bogies isn't black, but a deep chocolate tone, something I have failed to notice on contemporary photographs of the Western Pullmans before.

I unclipped the visually intrusive couplings for the review photographs because I think most modellers would remove these for use. Their only purpose together on a large Western Region layout wouldn't that be a sight to see?





Graham Farish supplies a detailing pack containing the horns, cosmetic coupling hook and brake hoses for the bufferbeams, something made easier if you detach the 'rapido' couplings.

The train includes two powered cars, the foremost bogie being the driven one where the motor and gears are hidden in the engine room. The trailing bogie of the power cars also has pick-ups. This setup means it's unlikely layout owners will have problems with hesitancy in use.

The white tables with cosmetic table lamps and white headrest liners are clearly discernible through the clear windows, whilst frosted glazing is featured in the appropriate kitchen cars. The original Midland Pullman trains featured alternate coloured seating from one car to the next in red and blue guises. The seats in this model are all blue following refurbishment.

I was putting each car the right way around within the train, until I realised that the manufacturer has engineered alternating long and short couplings on the vehicle ends. You could place two long couplings adjacent to each other, but you'll find it difficult to connect two short ones together, so it's evident that you've incorrectly orientated the cars.

If you choose to go the DCC route you'll need two decoders, one for each power unit as there is no electrical connectivity between cars. The six-pin decoder can be accessed by unclipping the body from the chassis, easy enough with a couple of plastic shims. The decoder will then sit beneath the roof level over the passenger compartment area. If your decoder has a wiring harness rather

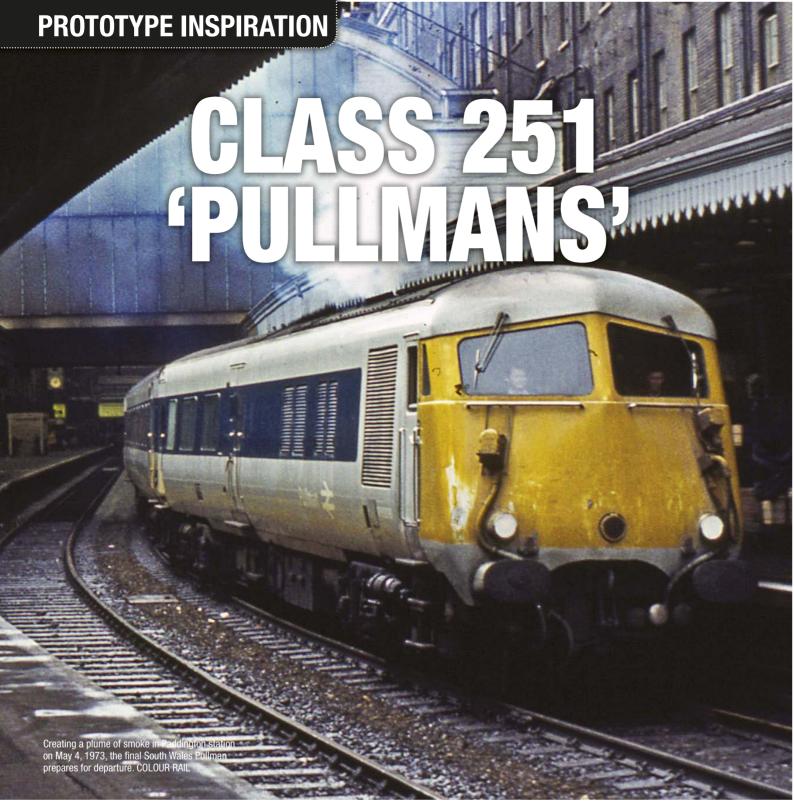

than a direct fit, I'd suggest running the wiring at roof level and fitting the chip in the vestibule end of the car.

This new release is enough to tempt me to turn to N gauge modelling. Imagine long trains behind hydraulics passing a Bristolbound Pullman?





Stephen Rabone, Editor of Traction magazine, charters the rise and fall of British Railway's mid-century flagship diesel multiple unit passenger train.

he 'Blue Pullmans' were undoubtedly one of the star trains of the early-1960s and were built to operate 'deluxe' services between London and various locations on the London Midland and Western Regions. With their stylish profile and their bright blue and white livery, these trains added a touch of glamour to the mid-century railway.

The announcement of their introduction

was made in 1957 - five diesel-electric sets would be built by Metro-Cammell and, as the British Transport Commission had acquired the 'Pullman' name, it was decided to use that for the trains. Whilst the coaches wouldn't be in the traditional Pullman chocolate and cream livery, the coat of arms was retained.

The two sets for the London Midland were of six vehicles and had 132 first class

seats, while the three sets for the Western Region were made of eight vehicles and had 108 first class and 120 second-class seats. Each set was made of two identical half-sets, which would be maintained at different times, giving operational flexibility.

#### Teething troubles

The first set left the Metro-Cammell works in Birmingham in October 1959, with riding

problems soon becoming apparent - this was an issue that was never really resolved. The Manchester Pullman service began in July 1960, with one stop at Cheadle Heath in the south Manchester suburbs. In the layover time in London, the train worked a return service to Leicester. From January 1961, the timings were revised with the train leaving Manchester earlier and arriving in London at 11:00, thus giving businessmen time for meetings before lunch. It also allowed time for the Leicester service to be extended to Loughborough and Nottingham. The new trains gave the fastest service ever to Manchester, with an average speed of 65 mph from Cheadle Heath to London.

#### Western Region careers

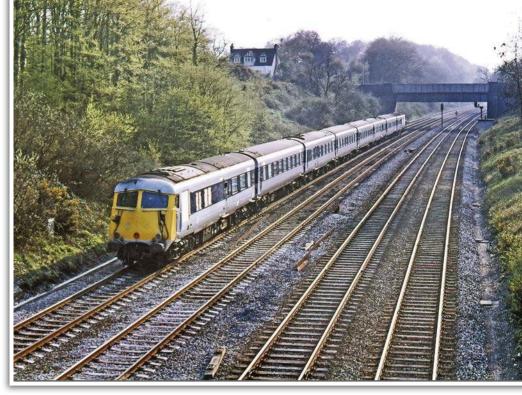
Services on the Western Region started in September 1960 with a morning Wolverhampton Low Level to Paddington service calling at Birmingham Snow Hill, Solihull and Leamington Spa. The set then worked a midday return service to Birmingham before the northbound evening working to Wolverhampton. On the Bristol route, the 07:45 ran non-stop to Paddington, followed by a return trip back to Bristol, stopping at Bath. The final train was at 16:55 from Paddington. By October 1960, stops at Bath had been inserted in the morning and evening services. In 1961, a South Wales Pullman started running non-stop to Cardiff, then calling at the principal stations to Swansea.

#### Modifications and transfer

After the completion of the West Coast Main Line electrification in 1966, the diesel-powered 'Manchester Pullman' service ended and was followed by the ending of the 'Birmingham Pullman' in 1967. It was decided to transfer the two London Midland sets to the Western, where Swindon Works made modifications to the cab ends to give easy access to the couplings. Multipleworking jumper cables were fitted below the windscreens and the word 'Midland' was removed from the bodyside. Some of the first-class areas of the train were downgraded to second class.

A new Oxford service started from March 1967 and they were also used on additional trains to Bristol with both six-car sets being used on the 08:45 from Bristol and 17:45 return service.

Finally, there was an extra service on the Paddington to Swansea route. However, in the summer of 1968, I saw both of the former London Midland sets in use as single

sets: 60090 and 60091 were at Bristol and 60092 and 60093 were seen at Paddington.

From 1967, the new BR corporate livery was applied to the Pullman sets with the livery being the reverse of the standard inter-city stock. The vehicles were painted grey with a blue band along the windows. The cabs had yellow fronts and the BR double arrow and the word 'Pullman' were added in white letters on the grey below the engine compartments grills.

The six-car sets continued to work in multiple until July 1971, but photographic evidence shows that at least one was split up and mixed with vehicles from the eight car sets and was a regular on the Bristol workings.

The Pullmans were withdrawn from service with the start of the summer 1973 timetable, being replaced by locomotive-hauled Mk. 2 stock. All the vehicles were scrapped by either T. W. Ward at Briton Ferry or G. Cohen Ltd at Morriston in 1974 and 1975.

As well as operating on the regular routes on the Western Region, there were several instances of the sets being used for special workings off their normal routes. Football and race meeting specials found the Pullmans, in their earlier years, straying to locations such as Hartlepool and Aintree. I can see no reason why the modeller can't run similar specials using the corporate livery version!

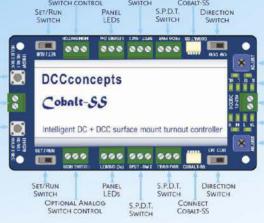

## ACCURASCALE **24.5T HOPPER**

**Words & Photography: Andy York** 



n **BRM** August 2018, we saw Accurascale's first UK wagon arrive in the form of the 24.5T hopper wagon in 4mm scale. As soon as the wagons came to market, Accurascale announced that it was responding to modellers' requests to produce the same wagon in 7mm scale, adding to the increasing number of readyto-run wagons available for O gauge these days.

#### Improved design

The model isn't just a scaled-up reproduction of the OO gauge version, but uses different Computer Aided Design (CAD) work to increase the level of detail on the model. This is most evident inside the wagon, with raised bracing and seam strips. Deep down into the hopper chambers there are joint lines between the main body and lower body parts which give a representation of the opening hopper flaps. Turn the model upside-down and it's clear that the 'senior scale' gives the opportunity to include a more accurate depiction of the outer hopper discharge chutes and operating linkage that wouldn't have been possible in 4mm scale

because of the need for coupling mounts.

The coupling hooks are sprung with an 'instanter' coupling mounted onto the hook. The axleboxes within the W-irons are also sprung, and although the 145g weight of the wagon fully compresses the spring when placed on the track, it will give a degree of compensation over pointwork. The models feature 13in BR self-contained buffers that are also sprung. Packs of additional sprung buffers are also available in sets of four for use on other models or kits priced at £3.95.

Accurascale has captured a variety of markings, numbering and lettering, all from image research. There is visual variety within the range, including representations of hand-painted black backing panels beneath markings. The decoration is to the same high standards as previous models from the stable.

#### **Economy in numbers**

The manufacturer will cannily lure the modeller into buying multiple models with eight differently-numbered and marked wagons available at launch - four are pre-TOPS style numbering (models A-D) and

four feature TOPS markings (models E-H). Individually priced at £49.95, there is also a financial incentive to the modeller to order multiples with a set of four pre-TOPS or TOPS numbered models costing £180 or all eight wagons at a price of £350. Free shipping from Ireland is available on orders over £100.

I can't fault any aspect of the model and I feel the price is great value for what you get; it's not just a bigger model, it's better. Accurascale has hinted that N gauge modellers might have something to look forward to in the future too.

## PULLMAN PROFILE NO.5 THE GOLDEN ARROW Antony M Ford

The author has already written the major parts of the 'definitive' history of Pullmans in this country, and this latest volume in this wonderful series continues the story. The 'Golden Arrow' (the English equivalent of the French Fleche d'Or), and arguably the most well-known Pullman train in the realm, ran from 1929 until 1972 (with an interruption for the War years) between London Victoria and the Kent coast. The format of this splendid volume is the same as the preceding volumes in the series, accurately researched

and full of high-quality photographs, drawings and documents. The 1951 Festival of Britain 'new' cars are extensively shown and the 'shabby' degrading of these wonderful vehicles, when the elegant umber and cream was replaced by BR's corporate blue, is well-illustrated. What happened to the various cars after their Pullman life was over is also shown, as well as the different types of motive power that worked the train throughout its existence. It's a pity that no model manufacturer has produced the 1951 cars. Another recommended work.

## THE DECLINE AND FALL OF THE WESTERHAM RAILWAY A PRELUDE TO BEECHING

This is a fascinating book, revealing the almost underhand machinations of the Department of Transport resulting in the closure of the Westerham branch, despite going against the recommendations of the transport consultative committees. Ultimately, part of the route was obliterated by the M25, one of the 'future' reasons for its closure, especially considering the Minister of Transport at the time, Ernest Marples, was a major shareholder in a motorway-building company. He eventually fled to Monaco, suspected of tax fraud. The author, who sadly died just prior to publication, presents a well-researched account, described as 'explosive' by the publishers. Whatever the rights and (mainly) wrongs of the closure, this book will be of great interest to modellers, showing a wealth of well-reproduced photographs as well as documents. It

would make a fascinating model, whether at the junction off the main to Sevenoaks at Dunton Green or any of the intermediate stations or the terminus at Westerham itself. Hornby's beautiful little 'Class H' cries out for a line for it to run on. Recommended; a fitting tribute to its author.

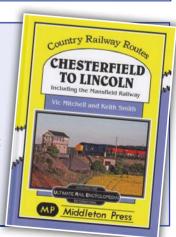

Casserley didn't just point his camera at main lines, and Derek Mundy took an extensive number of pictures of signal boxes). The reproduction of all the visual material is very good and modellers will find this volume of great use.

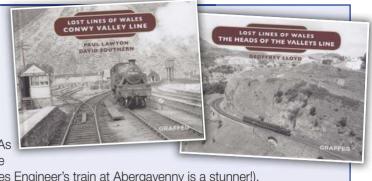

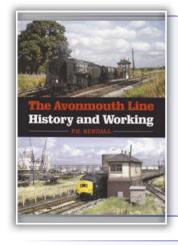

### THE AVONMOUTH LINE HISTORY AND WORKING P. D. Rendali

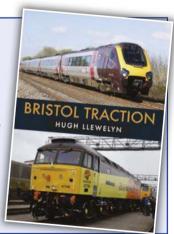
This softback book describes the branch from Bristol to the Bristol Channel from its opening in 1877 to the present day. Despite various attempts down the years to close the line, thankfully it is still open, if a shadow of its former self. The chequered history is well-described (the author had a career on the railways) and extensively-illustrated. Some of the illustrations are a little 'weak' in their reproduction, and the loss of the top of the 72XX 2-8-2T's chimney on page 141 is a poor example of cropping. Very useful diagrams are provided, illustrating stations and sites which will be of great use to modellers, and if anyone wants an excuse to include elephants on their model railways, well, here it is!

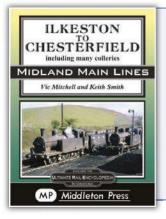

This modest softback, written by a former executive officer in the 'Railways Directorate', illustrates the wide variety of motive power seen in the Bristol area, mainly from the 1980s to the present day (there is one B&W shot of a Warship in 1965), principally in colour. There is much of interest to students of the more 'modern' railway, but the selection would have been much more comprehensive if the earlier, hydraulic classes had been featured in numbers. I know the author uses only his own pictures, but sourcing shots from elsewhere would have been useful in my view. The reproduction is generally OK, though several shots have their shadows completely filled-in. If nothing else, the bewildering array of different liveries will be of use to modellers.







## ILKESTON TO CHESTERFIELD Vic Mitchell and Keith Smith

This is the latest in this long-running series by Middleton, featuring the extensive network of railways in the Notts/Derby coalfield. The usual format is followed of featuring numerous well-reproduced B&W shots and maps, together with informative captions. The photographic range is from pre-Grouping through to 2017. As always with books of this type, where more up-to-date shots are featured one is left with a feeling of great loss, because the surviving railway infrastructure is bereft of interest. That said, as with all the books in this series, it's of great use to modellers.

# TAIL LAMP

Neil Morrlle, Marketing Manager of Dapol Ltd, on the importance of home-grown manufacturing in the British model railway market.

ttending model railway shows gives a valuable insight into the minds of modellers and provides valuable feedback on how we are performing in our audience's eyes. It's interesting times in the model railway industry, things are changing and we are trying hard to keep ahead of this and be innovative in all our chosen markets.

Detail and the specification of features have now gone to new levels. When I see some photographs of models it's difficult sometimes to see what the gauge is. I think this is a testament to healthy competition, with all concerned companies striving to produce the best they can in order to gain a commercial and reputational advantage. Supply chain and remote manufacturing has also become more challenging. Developments in the Far East have meant all companies operating out there have faced supply problems as internal demand in China and voracious demand for Chinese-produced goods has exploded. Coupled with exchange rate pressures, this makes us all at Dapol thankful we have an increasing portfolio of UK-produced product lines to offset some of the adversity that the model railway industry faces.

Dapol has manufactured in the UK for 34 years and the first down payment on our promise to produce more of our products at our Chirk facility has come to fruition with our new range of all newly-tooled O gauge 9ft chassis wagons and vans. It is very pleasing for all of Team Dapol to see and hear the injection moulding machines hard at work, and to see the spray booth and printing machines in full tilt. The cacophony of machinery is only drowned out by the deafening sound of silence of deep concentration on the production line, as nimble and skilled fingers assemble all of the parts to create miniature masterpieces.

The next UK production project is simmering away nicely on the R & D burner with CADs being drawn up to make the necessary tools to produce O gauge four-wheel Stroudley coaches that will complement the multi-award-winning Dapol 'Terrier'.

This promises to be a very exciting prospect for us all and represents a massive step up in complexity levels for the team. The inclusion of electrical components such as pickups, light bars and PCB boards in a model is not something that has happened in our home factory for many years. This is just one of the potential challenges that are bound to arise while we grow our UK production abilities. To overcome this, Dapol will be investing heavily in the training of its current work force, whilst looking to expand our in-house skill sets with infusions of new blood where we feel it is advantageous for us to do so.

Our aim is to be as self-sufficient as possible, with having ultimate control over the materials we use and the products that we produce. We are also aware that there is a huge learning curve to climb and we will take it in manageable chunks to ensure the confidence and skill set of the team continues to go from strength to strength regardless of which challenges come our way. Fortunately for Dapol our Technical Manager is a highly adept teacher and all of the necessary training requirements for any new UK-produced models can be provided in house with little or no impact on current UK-based production schedules. Who knows, one day we might even get to the point where we could think about making our own locomotives in the UK again? This is however some way down the

Future projects for UK production are already being distilled from the ether of the imagination of the product development team. These are unlikely to be restricted to O gauge as Dapol continues to stress its continuing support for all three of the gauges that it produces models for. Our aim is to add at least one new UK-produced product line to our catalogue every year for the foreseeable future. The trick is to not allow the enthusiast inside you always win. Twenty plus British families rely on Dapol to keep a roof over their heads and put food on the tables, so it is vital that we keep the proverbial finger on the pulse of the market and let this dictate which project comes next and when it is most

prudent to proceed.

Undoubtedly, enhancing our home production will strengthen the company and help it deal with the ever-shifting and numerically increasing challenges that we face. These include an increasingly cautious modelling market, with modellers quite rightly making careful choices over which models to spend their hard-earned money on.

We try to ensure top notch quality every time with the products we make in our factory here in Chirk, which should help make this decision a little easier. It allows us to ride out the currency fluctuations that home and worldwide political decisions bring.

Regardless of how jaded we may have become hearing about how Brexit is going to, or in some cases, has started to affect things, we will strive to satisfy the market demand. The simple matter is that the uncertainty of what may or may not happen is, and will, continue to have an impact on our industry as much as it will on others.

Investing in home production also helps Dapol compete with the ever-growing number of players in the market. ■
