Nothing emphasised this more than chatting to visitors, who had come along to look at the full-sized railway items, pick up a bargain in the shop, or simply because they had worked for the firm in the past and wanted to nose around to see how things have changed.

One gentleman had booked a trip from Canada with this the centre-piece of his holiday. GET THE LOOK

- 1: Bachmann trackside and permanent way iackets
- 2: If you model the southern, then pre-cast concrete buildings are very much part of the scene. This is a foaman's hut built from a Ratio plastic kit, a tiny model 20 by 15mm in size. Although it's moulded in self-coloured plastic, these can be a bit shiny, but Phoenix Precision paints produce both new and weathered concrete colours.
- 3: Replacing the front plastic tension-lock coupling on a locomotive with a length of wire bent in a U-shape is simple, but greatly improves the look of the model. It allows all the pipes and cables to be fitted on the bufferbeam, while still letting the locomotive couple up to rolling stock.
- 4: Plenty of trackside clutter brings the scene alive. The lever frame, point rodding and trunking are from the Wills range of plastic
- 5: Worn canvas on a van roof is a nice detail and not too difficult to do. The process is fully described in Martyn Welch's book The Art of Weathering, but essentially you start by scribing and painting some planks on the roof. Then blob Humbrol Maskol over the area. Paint the roof grey and once dry, pick the Maskol away to leave a hole in the canvas. It's important to let the paint fully-dry between each step and it's worth practising on an old model first.
- 6: The 06 diesel is a Hornby model detailed with Branchlines and A1 models etched kits. While the Class 06s had been retired from the main works for the railway engineers where older locomotives often found employment.
- 7: Working lights are a prominent feature of this model. There are many suppliers including Kytes Lights who will be at our Peterborough show with a wide range suitable for all eras.
- 8: The high backscene forms a natural scenic break at the back of the layout. Stone arches are from the Wills range but filled-in with brick to give a more modern look. Being picky, they really could do with some weathering, but then a layout is never really finished, is it?

LAYOUT FOCUS

I suppose we have all stood near an unfamiliar railway line and watched trains go by, with little understanding of where they are going to or from. But isn't it more involving and enjoyable when we have some information or prior knowledge about what we are seeing? The same observation can be applied to our models and this gives us something to think about. Do we just run what we feel like running as the mood takes us, or do we try to emulate the real thing and have some sort of plan to guide what we do? If we do have anything guiding what runs and when, then how can we inform the viewing public about what is going on?

I don't want to suggest that there is only one correct answer, but I would suggest that anyone planning to exhibit their layout should at least think about these questions. Most of our ideas on presentation are borrowed from other layouts that we have enjoyed watching so we don't claim any originality.

Introducing St Ruth

St Ruth is a 2mm Finescale layout built by the Midland Area Group of the 2mm Scale Association. It's based on Penzance station in Cornwall with a few creative changes. In our version of reality, the 1938 major rebuild of Penzance was delayed and then overtaken by the outbreak of war so the cramped pre-1938 arrangement soldiered on into BR days. We have also assumed that a branch line (a composite of St Ives and Hayle Wharves lines) left the main line at the terminus.

We operate a mix of stock that worked in Cornwall in the mid- to late-1960s, which means plenty of diesel hydraulics. Regular steam ended at Penzance in 1962, but you may still see an occasional WR steam

locomotive creeping into the mix or even some time-warped interlopers from Ian Smith's Edwardian GWR layout 'Modbury'.

We don't claim to have any superhuman powers - our track is built to 2mm Finescale standards but the vast majority of the models that we run are 'N' gauge, converted to finescale using the wheelsets and other techniques available from the 2mm Scale Association.

Operating Sequence

When we sat down to write the sequence before our first show, we counted 21 down and 27 up trains in the BR working timetable; and that was for a station that in reality had no branch line service. Our fiddle yard has 10 roads available for main line trains so clearly, we needed to do some selective editing. The sequence that we use includes main line arrivals and departures, empty stock moves and also reminders to move the yard pilot clear of an incoming freight or to remove a light engine that will be lurking unseen under the station's overall roof. If we get our skates on then we can run through the sequence at a show in two hours, although in practice it usually takes longer than this.

above the layout to keep them informed about what is happening. As the timetable extends into the evening hours, the main layout lights gradually fade into the sunset to reveal a fully-lit after-dark scene.

Story Telling

We use four LCD display screens to keep everyone informed about what is going on. On the public side, these show the time, the current train, some more information about the train and a list of the next three trains coming up. The operators have two screens behind the layout. These show the same information but have more detail, such as which fiddle yard road to set. Many of them also have a small photograph of some relevant coaches or wagons to help the operators to rapidly identify which train they are supposed to be moving. The fiddle yard also has a full printed copy of the sequence with a low-tech paperclip as a pointer to keep track of where we are.

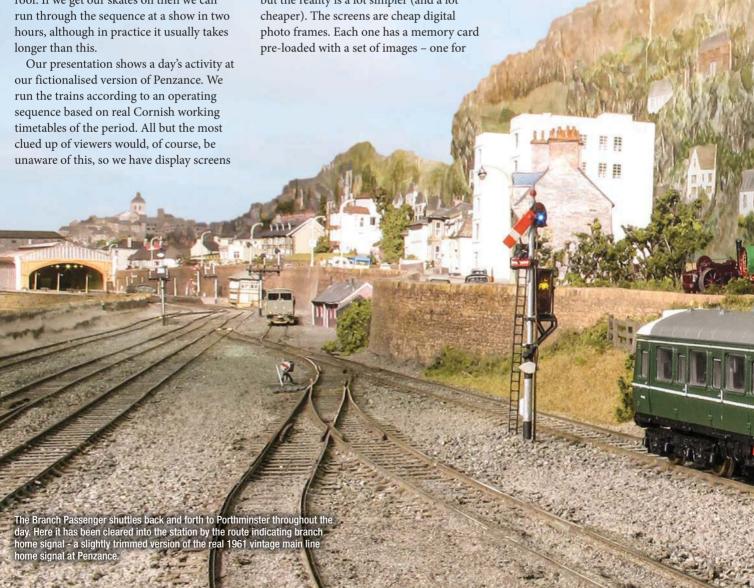
Many people assume that our display screens have a computer controlling them but the reality is a lot simpler (and a lot cheaper). The screens are cheap digital photo frames. Each one has a memory card pre-loaded with a set of images - one for

each movement in the sequence. The images on the public and operators' screens are different but should always be in sync. All of the images were generated from information in a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet, which is the 'master' copy of the sequence.

We have modified the photo frames by attaching wires to the internal circuit board so that we can mimic the 'next' and 'previous' buttons on the back of the photo frame. The photo frames are wired up to a common power supply and a simple control box that allows us to press one button to move all four frames forwards or backwards by one image as we progress through the sequence.

Back Story

The movement of trains is of course not the whole story. We also provide some background information about Penzance,



plus some of the modelling techniques that we have used, on a set of display boards along the front of the layout. This provides something for viewers to read should they wish to and has the added benefit of keeping viewers at a safer distance. Given the choice, we usually prefer to either have no barriers or to place them quite close to the front of the layout so that viewers can actually see the models that we have built.

St Ruth is operated from the rear and our lighting pelmet makes it difficult for the operators to make eye contact with people on the public side of the layout. Whether this as a good or a bad thing is debatable, but it does mean it is difficult for the public to talk to us. We go to exhibitions to educate as well as entertain so interaction with the public is important. We therefore have a well-informed 'front of house' person positioned near to the buffer stop end of the

layout who can take questions and engage any younger customers with a small quiz to find some detailed cameos around the layout.

24-hour Lighting

The main lights are 12V halogen spots. These are angled to provide directional lighting and throw shadows in the same direction along the length of the layout. The shadows on the buildings and other structures highlight details such as window sills, helping to bring life to the layout.

We have a custom-built transformer and controller to supply the light (they draw a good deal of current). As we reach the early evening part of the schedule, we throw a switch on the lighting box that uses a triac circuit to gradually dim the main lights over a time span of about 20 minutes. Although incandescent lights are not particularly energy-efficient and generate heat, they do have the big advantage that their colour changes towards red as they are dimmed which is exactly the right thing for sunset.

Our buildings were unlit when they were first made but most had provision to allow wiring and lighting units to be added to one or more rooms. Naturally the lit rooms also need some interior detail. All of the building lighting is done using LEDs, which are attached to what I can only describe as 'sticks' of scrap PCB that allow them to be

poked through tubes into the building and also give them some stability to stay put once there. A problem with many small white LEDs is that their colour temperature is too cool to represent 1960s incandescent lighting. We have solved this by painting each one with yellow glass paint. It's a bit tricky to do this evenly across several LEDs, but it is reasonably amenable to having a second bite at the cherry, which can either add more paint or remove some paint if it has gone on too thickly.

The building lights are controlled by Arduino micro controllers. This allows us to have lights going on and off at different times so that we avoid spoiling the illusion by having all of the lights switching on or off at the same time. There is one Arduino on each baseboard that provide up to 12 separate lighting outputs. Each Arduino also

has a light sensor hidden somewhere above ground to detect when the main layout lights are dimming.

Building lights are also included in the backscene to help the illusion of a seamless transition from the main model. These come on and go off gradually so they don't distract the viewer.

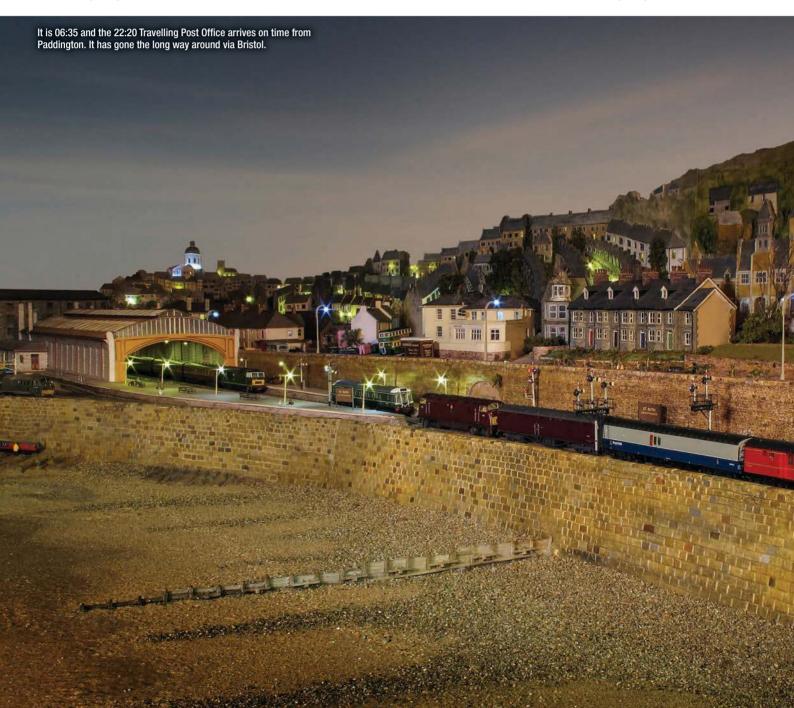
Lighting the way

The street lamps and platform lamps are all scratch-built in brass and use surface mount LEDs to provide the illumination. One of our members conducted extensive Internet research into the style of street lamps seen in 1960s photographs of Penzance – it's a whole subject with a small bunch of dedicated and knowledgeable enthusiasts. Thankfully the same member also volunteered to build a full set of street lamps for us. The lamp

colours vary – the platform lamps emulate tungsten bulbs but the street lamps are much bluer to emulate the blue/green tint of the early mercury lamps.

One of the effects, which is hard to get right, is the pooling of light around the lamps. For the station lamps, the design allowed a single LED to be attached below the 'shade' with its axis downwards; although the pool is too narrow, the effect is clear. For the street lamps, the pooling was achieved by backing a downward-facing LED with a brass or white plastic washer to act as reflector and form the rim of the lamp housing. The top of the lamp was shaped plastic tube and the viewer is invited to think that there is a glass bowl, when in practice most of the LEDs only have thin covering of clear glue.

The hardest to get right were the street



lights in the backscene. Because of the lack of depth, we needed to direct the LED outwards, and then used two or three more hidden LEDs to fill the area that would be lit by the real lamp.

The street lamps are wired to gradually reach full brightness as darkness falls - the real lights took some time to warm up. They are all triggered by the sensor on the station baseboard and there is a system that relays the brightness level from each board to its neighbour using a red LED and a light sensitive diode on the joining faces of the baseboards.

Because the signals are all scratch-built to suit their location and the available routes, we could include a full set of lamps in each one. These consist of tiny surface-mounted LEDs fed by enamelled wire stripped from an old Farish motor armature. The lamp



body is a piece of small diameter heat shrink sleeve with a hole made for the 'lens' before it is shrunk onto the LED. The power feed usually passes up the signal ladder and into the lamp platform. These parts are insulated from the rest of the signal post, which forms the return path for the power.

Coach Lighting

The trains that run during periods of darkness are internally lit. For this we use battery-powered LED lighting kits from Layouts4U. We use their warm white LEDs but these are still too cool for my liking, so we make them warmer by sticking a square of yellow tape to each one. Kapton tape from DCC Supplies or Tamiya masking tape will do the job. Layouts4U can also supply orange LEDs but we found these too orange. The coaches are only lit when they are 'on scene' - the lighting kits include a latching reed switch that we trigger using strong rare earth magnets positioned above the fiddle yard exit. The fiddle yard operator also has a 'wand' to deal with any lights that remain lit when they shouldn't be - this is usually caused by passing close to a locomotive with one of the older Farish motors. Experiments are ongoing with rechargeable coach lighting.

The Future

St Ruth has been on the exhibition circuit for a little over seven years now and during

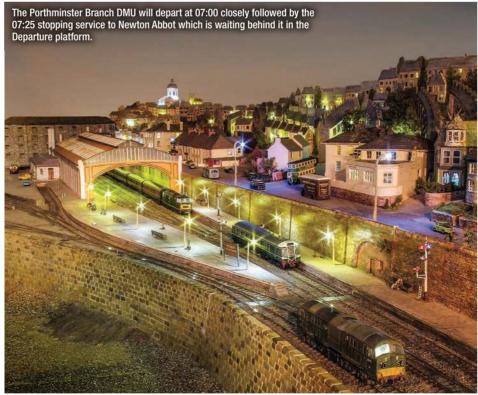

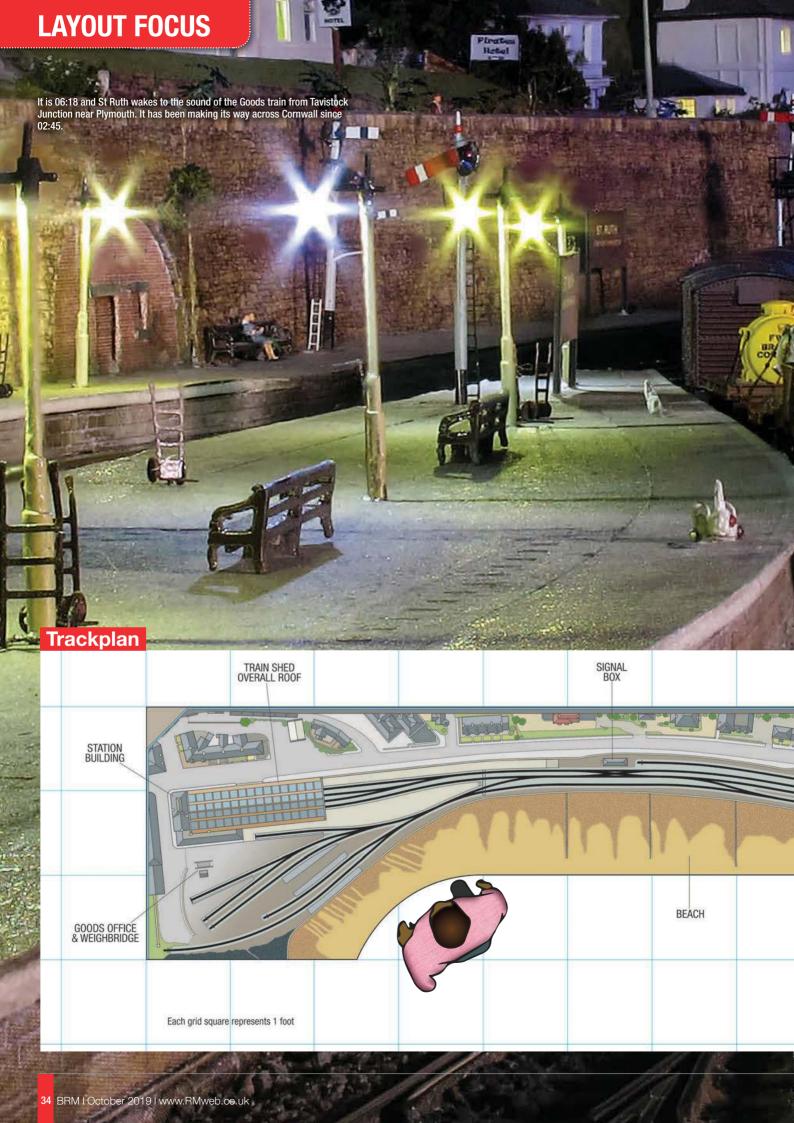

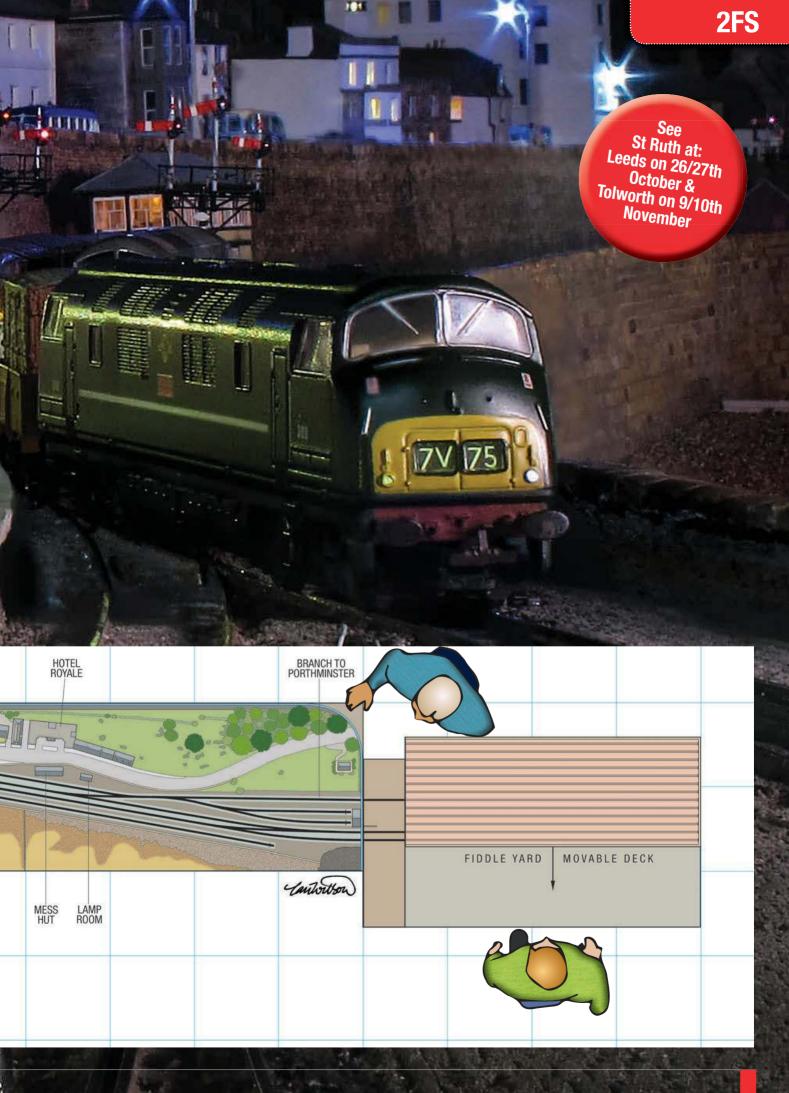
that time we have been continuously improving it. We are still getting plenty of new exhibition invites so our thoughts are turning to how we can further develop it.

We've pretty much ruled out an extension - the current concept works well but any extension would need to deal with the awkward question of where all of those empty coaches and idle locomotives are stored. Modelling Ponsandane and Long Rock has not really engaged our enthusiasm. No doubt they are far more efficient and less awkward than the pre-1938 station, but they offer a lot less interest in return for the space needed. At the moment we are thinking of introducing a circa 1960 timetable and doing the Cornish steam/diesel transition era. It's not a small project though - we need more steam locomotives and yellow warning panels on diesels had not been introduced. so we'd need a whole bunch of new diesels.

Time will tell what happens, perhaps we will see you at an exhibition in the near future...



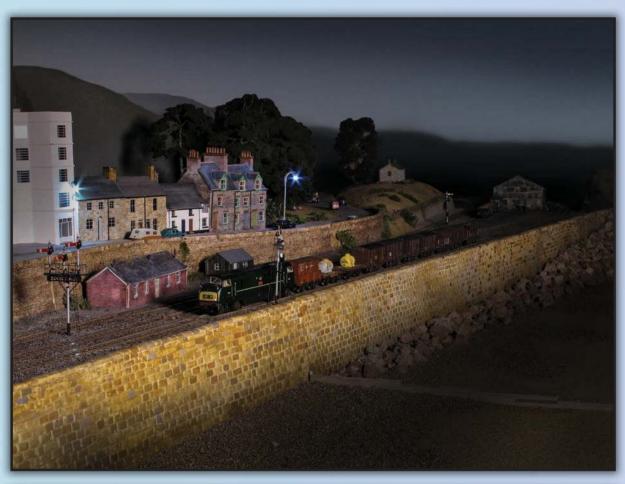


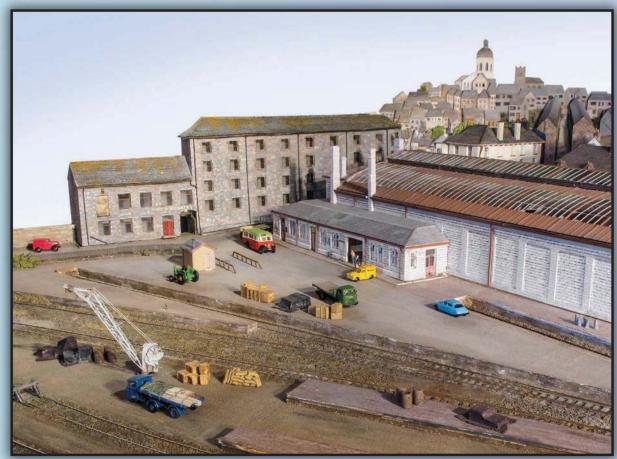

BRIGHTON JUNCTION

On June 1 we had another British Railway Modellers of Australia (BRMA) running session which was held at my house, and Brighton Junction was the main attraction. Brighton Junction is a OO gauge LNER 'what if' layout based on the ECML between Grantham and Peasecliffe Tunnel. The idea is that Brighton Junction was built by the GNR as an overflow for Grantham, but now in LNER days, the trains are far too long for the smaller loops, plus the occasional trains which stop at Brighton Junction are the humble offerings of pickup goods or small goods trains themselves. Although a fictional place, everything is based on LNER practice.

Planning and researching sprang to mind in mid-2016 and construction started just after returning from my second trip to Warley that year. The layout uses Peco Code 100 track cut down to the proper permanent way. Graham Nicholas helped start off by altering some of the track work and then I mimicked his work for the remainder. In September 2018 during the BRMA convention, I had Tony Wright and his wife Mo stay with my family, during which Tony helped me push an already existing idea of an extension to the layout; by removing the curve at the North end, and replacing it with a continuous straight.

This was the first BRMA running session since the new extension and has more or less been completed. Everything ran well, a small short circuit was apparent but has now been fixed. Everybody enjoyed themselves immensely, we had an hour or two of running trains, a short break, tea and coffee, a talk about the meaning of life and then back in for another hour of running trains and friendly chatting. Being 23 years of age, everybody was offering their advice on small or larger matters, which I take in all the time and appreciate immensely, I wouldn't be the modeller I am today without the likes of some prestige modellers, so I thank each and every one of you who has helped me along these past few years.

The layout is coming along fine, track work and wiring is now completed and I am moving on to the scenery side of things. Apart from all that, there is still plenty of stock to build.

COMPUTER-CONTROLLED CUTTER

Ever since I bought my wife a Silhouette Portrait craft cutter for Christmas, I have been exploring ways of using it for modelling. For those who have not yet come across this machine, it is a relatively inexpensive computer-controlled cutter that will cut paper, card, foil and most importantly as far as I am concerned, plain or embossed Plastikard up to about 30in thick.

The Silhouette Portrait is supplied as a package including the machine (which is not dissimilar to a small computer printer), power supply, USB lead, cutting mat, blade and Silhouette Studio software. The software is easily installed and will run on a Windows PC or Mac computer.

Designing the building and laying out the cuts using the software is by far the most time-consuming part of creating a building using the Silhouette cutter. I build using plain Plastikard faced with embossed Plastikard, but considerable thought needs to go into how the pieces and layers fit together.

To speed-up design, I have created a number of template drawings. One holds the shape and size of plain and embossed Plastikard. As the sheets do not fill the whole design area, this enables me to create a design without accidentally placing lines off the sheet. A second template holds the cutting instructions for specific design elements such as Peco or Wills windows. Using the software, correctly-sized rectangles, with reveals if needed, can by created. A cross is added from corner to corner so that the waste material can be removed easily. By copying and pasting a design element from the template into the design, you can be certain that the cutter will create the correct size for the window, door or other design element. Using this method I have been able to accurately cut embossed Plastikard to receive Wills Corner Quoins – a task that would otherwise drive me to distraction!

If creating your own plans and elevations seems a little daunting, the software also allows you to import a scanned drawing. It will then endeavour to trace around the image to define the various lines to be cut.

You can then edit the drawing as if you had drawn it yourself. Working from a photo or Google Street view, a recognisable approximation of a building can be generated in an hour or so.

Once the design is complete, the cutting can begin. The Plastikard must be pressed onto a Silhouette cutting mat. This is tacky on one side and so holds the Plastikard in place during the cutting.

The Silhouette allows you to use registration marks to ensure the cut is accurately loaded into the machine. However, I have as vet been unable to make these work effectively, so instead I set Registration Marks to 'off' and set the Cutting Mat to 'none'. Trial and error has identified the correct positioning of the mat when using my own templates.

The cutting takes a little time, but as this is computer-controlled, the machine can be left to its own devices. If you have opted for multiple passes of the blade and have set the machine for heavy cut, it could take up to 30 minutes for each sheet to be cut.

When the cuts are complete, you are left with a kind of press-out kit for the building, but if the design has been well thought through, assembly should be straightforward. Some of the cuts may need deepening with a craft knife, but this is simply a case of following the cut already made.

Using the Silhouette, I have been able to complete a building easily (except for painting) in a long afternoon. I have used the machine for a number of buildings of prototypes from Dorset, Devon and Cornwall. These form the nucleus of a village street on my Southernbased layout and best of all - every building is unique.

The Silhouette Portrait is definitely the best present I have ever bought for my wife!

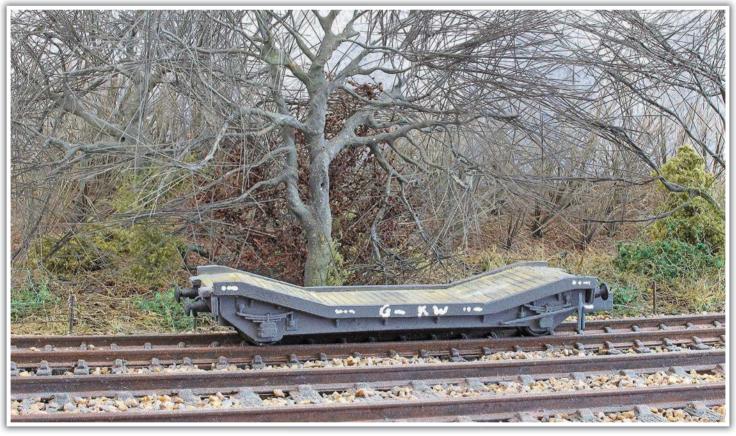

HOW TO BUILD A PLASTIC WAGON KIT

Michael Russell proves that this two-axle wagon from the N Gauge Society is a great introduction into the world of plastic kit construction.



The prototype diagram for this wagon was built in 1923 for the Rhymey Railway, then became part of the GWR and was absorbed into BR. It therefore covers many eras and has broad appeal. Variations on the wagon were common, but they all became varieties of 'Lowmac' under British Rail auspices. You could use these wagons to carry tall loads or as a 'runner wagon' for a crane where it would be used to prevent the jib from hitting adjacent wagons. This simple kit from the N Gauge Society

is ideal for the beginner and could easily be built in a weekend. Being N gauge, it is small, but as long as you are careful, it is no different to building a kit in any other scale. There are few parts in the kit and it is robust, so you're unlikely to damage it during construction. All the parts you need to make a running wagon are included in the kit.

You need to consider your coupling options before you begin, as this will affect the build. You can make alterations later, but it is far easier to get it right from the outset.

SHOPPING LIST

- N Gauge Society Kit 6 (NGSK0060)
- Needle files
- Scalpel
- Super glue
- Wire brush
- Humbrol Liquid Poly



Separate the floor from the sprue by cutting through the tabs at either end. Use a sharp knife and don't cut too close to the floor.



I like to add texture to wooden parts. This can be achieved by using cross length strokes with a brass wire brush to imitate wood grain. You can use masking tape to protect non-metal parts.



To ensure that the coupling isn't glued, add Poly Cement only to the edges of the housing. It will be drawn into the gap by capillary action. Clamp until the glue has set.



Drill the axlebox holes to the size of the bearings. They are 1.66mm in size, so use a 1.6mm drill and wiggle it around in the hole.



Remove the upper mounting tab residue with a file. Start with a coarse file and swap to a finer one as you approach the end of the task. The one pictured to the right shows the result.



Drop the coupling into the coupling housing without using glue, for a trial fit.



Alternatively you can use Peco coupling housings. Push the retaining piece into place to retain the coupling. It is a tight fit and you may have to remove some material to



Only once you have tried each bearing in its hole should you glue it into place. Use cyanoacrylate glue and ensure that the bearing sits square to the base of the axle hole.



Go around the floor with a file to clean up flash from the edges. You can sometimes just run a finger nail along the edges to achieve this. Clean all parts in a like manner.



Now drop the unit into place on the floor of the wagon. Ensure that it is central and pushed back as far as possible to leave room for the buffer beam to be fitted.



The bearings are very small and can roll off your workbench. So as not to lose any components, tip the contents of the wheel bag into a container.



For strength, fit 17.5mm long pieces of 1.5mm styrene and angle to the floor ready to receive the wagon sides. Ensure that these abut the locating blocks.

In a kit with so few parts, it's often quicker to remove parts from the sprues and clean them in one go. Only do this if you have made yourself familiar with the parts and how the finished model will appear. Use a container to hold the pieces so that you don't lose them.





Glue one wagon side into place and glue the centre section of the other. When dry, temporarily fit a wheel set and align the other side so that the bearings are opposite each other.



Use a 0.8mm drill to open up the holes in the buffer housings. Test fit the buffers to ensure that they slide home, but don't glue them yet.



Glue the buffers into place using cyanoacrylate glue. Do not push them fully home, but leave 1mm of the shanks showing



Make finer brake levers from 0.3mm brass wire. Use resin-cored solder and flatten the wire with squarejawed pliers. Use the supplied part as a template.



Remove the wheel sets and mask the wooden areas using masking tape.



Glue both sides fully and ensure that the ends are glued so that the wheels revolve freely. You can use small squares of 0.005in styrene sheet as packing pieces to help, if necessary.



Glue the buffer beams into place ensuring they butt up to the coupling housings and are central.



Add 1.5mm high pieces of styrene to form a box under the floor of the wagon.



Drill a hole in the solebar and attach each brake lever as per the supplied general arrangement drawing, using cyanoacrylate.



Because metal parts have been used, spray with a primer and leave for 24 hours for the paint to harden. Without removing the masking, spray a topcoat using your chosen colour. Grey is correct for GWR livery.



If you want the couplings to lift, you need to modify the buffer beam. The latter is only 2.37mm wide, so you may find it easier to break the buffer beam into two pieces.



Fit the curb rails either side, ensuring they rest upon the supports along the wagon sides.



Apply superglue, then add ballast weight. Leave to set overnight. This will make the wagon run better.



Rather than use the supplied part, depict the vacuum pipe using a stronger piece of bent 0.45mm wire, inserted into a hole in the buffer beam.



Paint the buffers, buffer shanks and vacuum pipes black and the end of the brake levers white.



Remove the masking tape and colour the wooden decking using highly-diluted enamel paint in shades of brown and grey.



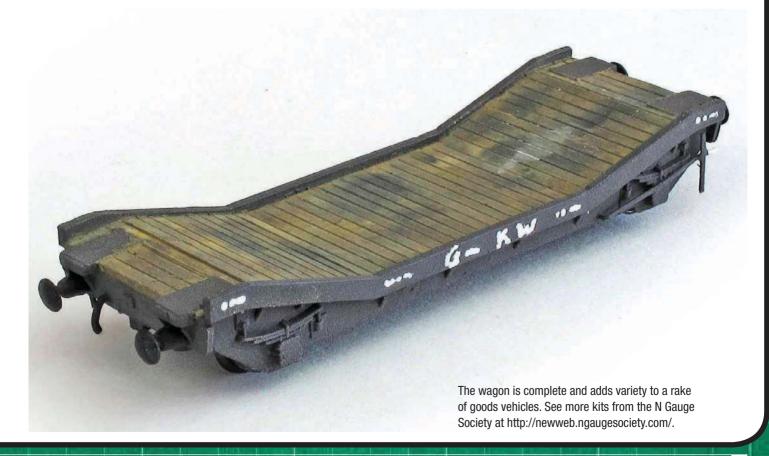
Small amounts of weathering powder can be used to enhance the model. Black around the axleboxes and small patches of rust and green moss on the wooden floor look great.



Represent numbering and lettering using white paint and a cocktail stick. Refer to the general arrangement diagram in the instructions or contemporary photographs.



Refit the wheels and test that the model runs freely. Fit the Peco coupling housings to the floor if you have chosen that option.

Known for his previous layout 'Mutton', Rob Gunstone introduces this new compact tribute to the Somerset and Dorset Joint Railway.

LAYOUT FOCUS Recently transferred to Highbridge, ex-Midland Railway 3F 'Bulldog' No. 43474 arrives at 'Bleat Wharf' with a short freight. Locomotives and wagons are Bachmann ready-to-run and suitably weathered with Humbrol weathering powders.

C Forget motor cars, get rid of anxiety and dream again that ambitious Victorian dream which caused this long railway to be running through deepest, quietest, flattest, remotest, least spoiled Somerset." So said Sir John Betjemen of the dear old Somerset and Dorset Joint Railway as he travelled across the Somerset levels on the Evercreech Junction to Highbridge branch line. His 1963 TV film, Branch Line Railway was part of the inspiration behind my third layout, 'Bleat Wharf', which depicts the terminus of a slightly run-down, goods-only branch 'somewhere close to Highbridge', sometime in the 1950s.

My interest in the S&DJR goes back a very long time, about forty years in fact. I bought my first book on the S&D with money I had for my fourteenth birthday. I still have that copy of An English Cross Country Railway by Ivo Peters, much thumbed but still loved and referred to on a regular basis.

Creating the scene

The construction of 'Bleat Wharf' follows my now standard pattern and uses furniture from a well-known Swedish manufacturer as a basis.

The scenic section is a table top measuring 120cm x 40cm x 5cm with a fiddle yard from a TV table measuring 90cm x 26cm x 5cm. These table tops are light, flat and square and I find them ideal baseboards. The scenic section is boxed-in using 9mm MDF.

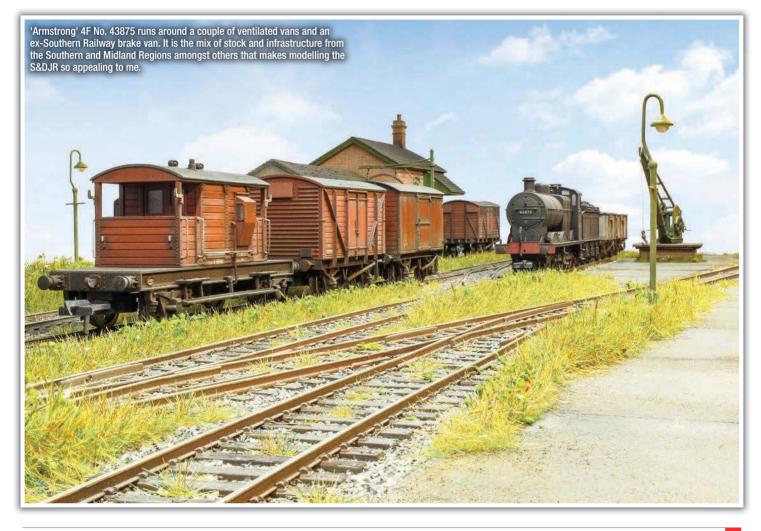
The trackplan is pretty much the same as my previous layout, 'Mutton', with an additional siding for the goods shed. Six small-radius points on the scenic section provide decent enough operational interest. Track is Peco Code 75 Streamline, carefully laid, painted and weathered using Humbrol weathering powders. Once happy with the appearance, the track is ballasted using fine granite ballast, the origin of which is now forgotten. Ballasting has to be my least favourite part of building any layout and for this reason I make a conscious effort not to rush. Tricky to do but time spent at this point will be reflected in the final appearance of the trackwork. I have deliberately left off the buffer stops at one end as I feel this adds to the open feel of the layout. The buffer stop at the other end is a modified Peco item with a wooden beam from strip wood. There are some very fine looking, more prototypical offerings out

there but the Peco items are cheap and easily modified without too much effort. Wiring is as simple as it can be and all points are finger-actuated. Sparks are provided by the now usual Gaugemaster combi.

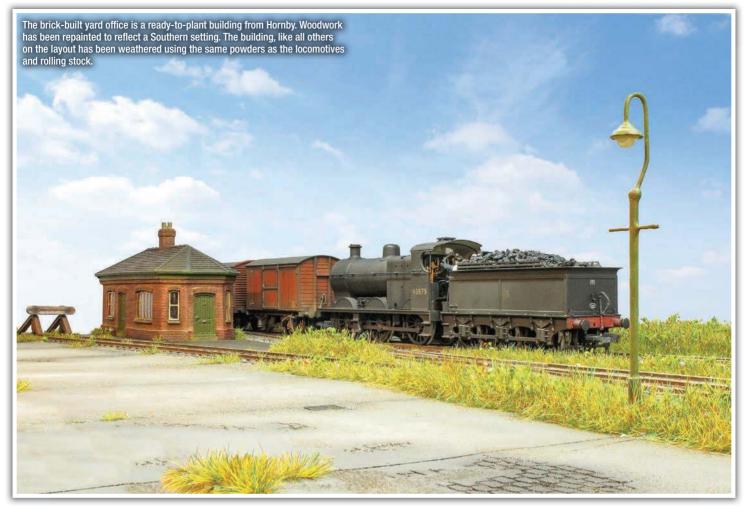
Scenic touches

The ground cover on 'Bleat Wharf' is made using DAS clay laid to the same level as the tops of the sleepers. I find DAS very versatile and some areas have been scribed to represent cobbles, while other areas represent concrete hard standing. The concrete 'look' is achieved by first painting the DAS with mid-grey acrylic spray paint before weathering powders are applied and blended until it looks about right. Variation is added to the 'concrete' in parts that were scribed to suggest the top layer has eroded to expose the earlier cobbled surface. Some of these cobbles have been removed to further suggest the cobbles themselves are breaking up. I have to say, I found this part of the build to be very satisfying.

Considerable use has been made on 'Bleat Wharf' of static grass. To add to the open feel of what is a small layout, I allocated a large area to form a meadow. Layers of static

grass are added to give height and tonal variation. Various bits and bobs are then added to suggest wild flowers, with flocks and leaves also added at this stage. Quite a bit of static grass has also been added to the track bed to give an impression of the area quietly returning to nature due to decreasing traffic. Further weathering is also carried out at this stage, to blend things together.

Buildings are all from the ready-to-plant ranges from either Bachmann or Hornby.

All are repainted to some degree or another with weathering added using the same powders applied to everything else on the layout. By doing this, I hope the layout and stock has a consistent look to it all with no one item leaping out at the viewer. I am particularly pleased with the combining of the Bachmann Great Central Goods Shed with the Bachmann Pendon Wanborough Barn to produce the main buildings to the rear of the layout.



The goods yard also features a yard crane. This was made by combining a Wills yard crane kit with bits from the scrap box along with the brick base from the Bachmann ground frame used on 'Mutton'. The wooden floor on which the crane sits was made from strip wood, scribed and weathered using pastels and powders. Other details include lamps made from copper tube and paperclips adorned with lamp heads from Wizard Models. These have been modified by removing the white metal glass bowl and replacing with half a glass bead. The loading gauge is made up from lengths of Code 75 Bullhead rail, brass angle and wire. Freelance, but I think it captures the look I was after. Once painted it was weathered and plonked in place.

To my mind, one of the peculiarities of the S&D was the mixture of Southern infrastructure with Midland locomotives. Signage is a key element, and those on 'Bleat Wharf' are by courtesy of the excellent etched nickel silver L&SWR signs from Roger Smith. Tricky to paint and weather but well worth the effort in my opinion, especially when a Midland locomotive is alongside.

Rolling stock

Locomotives are from Bachmann and are a variety of ex-Midland Railway or ex-LMS types. A layout representing a backwater of the S&DJR would not be complete without a 3F tender locomotive, or 'Bulldogs' as they were known on the S&D. A 4F or Armstrong also features as does a 3F 'Jinty' or Bagnall. Rule 1 applies to the occasional use of a 1F 0-6-0T which is simply a lovely model, The arrival of the announced Bachmann 1P, another S&D stalwart, is eagerly awaited.

Rolling stock is mostly made up of Bachmann wagons with a few examples from Hornby and Oxford Rail. All have been weathered using powders with the underframes given a dusting of acrylic dark earth from a spray can. I do not possess an airbrush, nor do I intend to buy one. I prefer the medium of weathering powders due in

the main to the ability to blend them and the texture that results. Once satisfied with the finish, all is sealed with a light dusting of acrylic matt varnish. Flicking a soft brush over the metal work afterwards can produce a nice burnished effect that provides further contrast. Tension-lock couplings are retained on all stock, something which some modellers find controversial but again they suit me.

Operation-wise, there is no timetable or card system. I simply make it up as I go along, which is the way I like it. I take my hat off to those who operate to a sequence or use a card system to dictate movements but it is not for me.

What's next?

'Bleat Wharf' is my third small layout in a little under three years. I still have the other two and have no intention to move any of them on. This does provide a bit of a storage issue at present and moves are afoot to provide a home for them where they can be left set up and ready to operate, along with a small workbench, as well as room to expand.

'Bleat Wharf' needs a few details to finish. Guard rails around the yard crane's plinth, a bit of clutter here and there and a some occupation crossings spring to mind.

And what of the next chapter in the Sheep Chronicles? A return to the London and South Western is likely. I would like to build Lamb Regis, the terminus of the branch where 'Mutton' is the intermediate station. Then again there is also Lambston, which will provide a home for a couple of 'Terriers', and not to forget Eweington Burtle, a junction station on the S&D, and the list goes on...

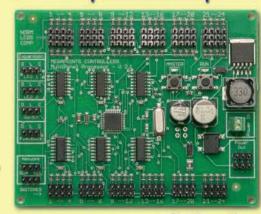

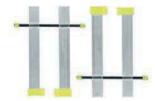

TECHNIQUES FOR BETTER MODELS

Many modelling projects require a similar number of set skills. Howard Smith and Phil Parker outline the most common, to help you become a better modeller.

AIRBRUSHING

espite what many think, airbrushing isn't some strange dark art. When you simplify it, you're literally firing atomised paint at a model. There are only three variables to work with – air pressure, paint volume and paint consistency. Your choice of airbrush should match your application, too – some are more suited to fine detail work, others for spraying large backscenes or terrain.



Airbrushes come in a variety of shapes and sizes. An airbrush is an investment and must be treated as such. Many cheap airbrushes have seals that deteriorate through exposure to solvents and lack availability of spare parts or interchangeable components. Here we've picked five of our favourites.

- 1 Harder & Steenbeck Evolution with interchangeable cup and needle
- 2 Iwata CM-C Plus with moisture trap and lubricant 3 Harder & Steenbeck Infinity with interchangeable cup, needle and nozzles
- 4 Neo for Iwata TRN2 with interchangeable side-load cup
- 5 Sparmax GP-850



This duo of airbrushes from Harder & Steenbeck is an excellent all-purpose choice for the discerning modeller. The manufacturer also produces interchangeable needles and nozzles, compatible with the models to enable finer and more precise spray patterns, or wider and more general-purpose patterns from the same airbrush, saving on your investment. Either of these airbrushes can be considered as single purchase items because of the availability of spares, making repairs straight-forward and avoiding waste. Their seals are long-lasting too, providing you use the correct lubricant when in use. The Evolution is a no-nonsense model, supplied with a 2mL and 5mL cup, though side-feed systems have been available, too. Its Infinity is also supplied with a 2mL and 5mL cup, both with caps to prevent paint from leaking.



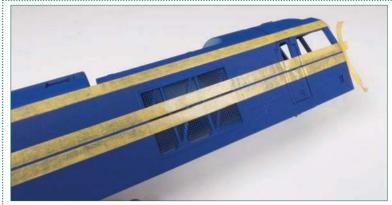
Keeping your airbrush maintained is as important as learning how to airbrush. The needle, cup, and nozzle must be thoroughly cleaned with an appropriate solvent or cleaner after each use to prevent the build-up of paint. Most airbrushes are dismantled in a similar fashion, by unscrewing the rear of the unit and unscrewing the needle clamp. In the case of Harder and Steenbeck airbrushes, the same method is used when changing needle sizes, too.



The needle of an airbrush and its adjustment is one of the key features when airbrushing. It is a fragile component and should ideally be protected by the use of a nozzle to prevent scratching the surface of your work, or worse still, bending the needle. Pulling back the trigger of the airbrush retracts the needle into the body of the unit, increasing the flow of air and paint. The further the trigger is pulled, the more the air and paint mixture will be released. Better quality airbrushes feature a two-stage air/paint release, where the air is released from the nozzle when the trigger is pulled back a little before the flow of paint is introduced. This reduces the tendency for paint to splatter on the work and helps provide a better finish on models.



Whatever the type of paint you choose to use through your airbrush, it must be thinned to the consistency of milk for best results. Under-thinning it will force it to splatter; over-thinning it will make it pool or worse, run on your model. Acrylics, enamels, or two-part paints with activated thinners are the most common types of paint you're likely to encounter, but you must ensure that these are thoroughly mixed without lumps. Be wary of dried paint debris from the edge of the paint tin lid.



Masking is an essential part of airbrushing. You can't expect to rush or skip over this step and obtain great results. Simply put, airbrushing will fire paint across a wide area and you'll encounter a phenomenon known as 'over-spray'. This can be problematic if weathering locomotives because you'll spray everything - glazing included. Modellers' fine masking tape, such as that by Tamiya, can be used in conjunction with a masking fluid like Humbrol Maskol to good effect.



Work from a distance of about a foot when respraying a model, or half that when spraying detail parts with the flow of paint reduced. Spray your work using a methodical approach, avoiding an excessive application, leaving a sufficient drying time. From model scenery to locomotives or rolling stock, airbrushing is a very effective weathering technique and can be used to great effect. Follow these steps and you'll make great progress.

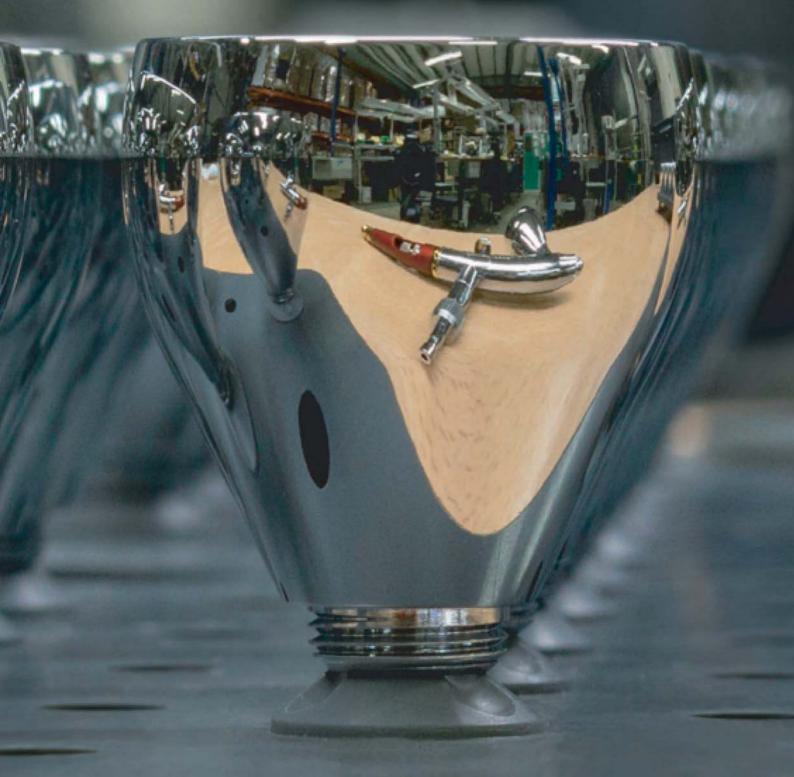

USING ELECTROSTATIC GRASS

Static grass has revolutionised model railway scenery over the last decade. No longer do we rely on ground-up sawdust to represent something that on the prototype is made of individual blades, nor do we have to laboriously plant each one by hand.

The technology is simple, the blades of grass are given a static charge by the grass applicator to scatter them – either an electronic tool or a puffer bottle made of polythene. This fires the fibres at a sticky surface where they stand up straight. Turning a layout green can take a matter of minutes; it's one of those jobs where your model comes to life incredibly quickly.



First, mix your fibres. Real grass isn't one shade so neither should your model be. For high summer, the mix needs to be around 50% beige. Earlier in the year, you'll want less and perhaps a vellower green. Look at photographs as colours vary around the country.



Paint the hillside with glue and let it dry slightly so the surface is tacky. PVA will work, or there are specific scenic glues that dry with a matt finish.

WORKING WITH PLASTIC SHEET

From buildings to wagons or locomotives, these sheets can be used to good effect on models, though the most common procedures used will be the cutting and gluing of parts. Attempting to cut plastic sheet to the uninitiated might require a learning curve because of its smooth nature and the tendency for a knife to slip if not used correctly.

Plastic sheets are sold by a variety of manufacturers, in different colours, and with different thicknesses, though they all respond to the same treatment. There are three stages to working with plastic sheet - the cutting of parts (ensuring that cuts are perpendicular to the surface), the cleaning of parts to ensure a good bond with a solvent adhesive and the gluing of these in their correct location.



Plastic sheet components benefit from a clean before assembly to remove cut witness marks or raised edges left by the passing of the knife. 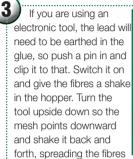

MAKING HOLES

Whether it's wood or brass, quite often you'll need to make a hole in a piece of work when making something. From small holes for handrails to large openings in chimneys, the methods will differ depending on the material you plan on cutting through. One essential is a set of good quality drill bits, while a mini-drill is also a good investment.



For really small bits, the correct tool is a pin vice. Available in several sizes, these hold the drill bit in a set of jaws and then the vice is twisted between your fingers. Try to have as little of the bit sticking out of the nose as possible, because this will minimise flexing and reduce the chances of breakage.



A useful trick to stop the drill bit wandering is to place a piece of masking tape over the spot and starting the drill on this. Start the drilling slowly as the moving bit can chew up the tape.



A more subtle way of opening a hole is to use a broach. Like the reamer, they are twisted and worked into a hole to enlarge it, but as the taper is very gentle, the action is more controllable. Kit builders will use these to open up axle bearings to ensure frictionfree running, handrail knobs where the original hole isn't perfect or holes in etched parts that are too small.

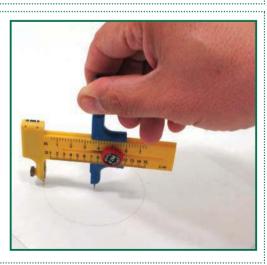


Modellers will need a selection of tiny bits. often under 1mm diameter, and these are easily available in graduated plastic boxes. Be warned, not all packs are created equal. The cheapest versions are made down to a price and can contain lots of bits with badly cut points. I've bought boxes for £5.00 where half the tiny bits are useless. Spending a bit more will usually guarantee a full set of useful ones - ask the advice of the trader. Eventually, you will break several of the bits and rather than have half-empty boxes littering the bench, you'll put the leftovers into a small mixed box for times when a hole roughly large enough will do.



If your hole isn't big enough, it can be opened and kept round by using a tapered reamer. Using one of these tools is simple insert it in the hole and rotate while pushing it gently in. If a precise size is required, keep checking as you work as these things can eat up material very quickly.

For really large holes in thin plastic sheet, you can't drill, but you can cut using a compass cutter. Either buy a proper tool (these aren't expensive) or for more modest holes, an ordinary pair of compasses fitted with points in both arms will work. Rotate the tool many times rather than trying to go through in one go. Don't forget the removed circles, either. These are very useful for making balance weights for steam locomotive driving wheels, when cut to shape.

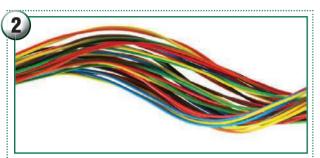

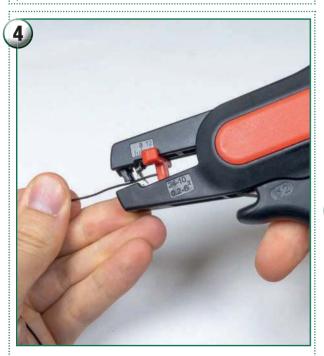


WIRING

When it works, we ignore its existence, when it doesn't, we can be tempted to lose all patience. Wiring is perhaps the railway modellers' least favourite subject to become enthused about, but it's a necessary requirement to permit all of our track-powered models to function. The way you wire your layout is specific to the way your tracks are positioned, hence a 'one wiring diagram fits all' becomes impossible, but there are some common tips that you'll find useful when wiring a model railway.



Using colour-coded wires is vital. Even with a DCC layout, despite it in theory, having no 'positive' or 'negative' rail, you should use a different colour for each. Change colours for your bus cables and bundle these neatly together, away from your running lines. Some advocate the twisting of certain wires to cancel electromagnetic interference on large layouts, though the majority of users shouldn't encounter problems if this isn't observed. For large DC-controlled layouts, many different cable colours are likely to be required, hence you'll need to invest in colour-coded wires with a tracer colour. Their use prevents the necessity of using the same colour for more than one application, making the pinpointing of potential problems in the future much faster.



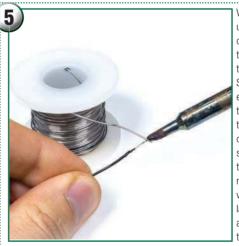
A wire-stripper is an essential tool when wiring your layout. Don't strip cables with a knife as you might cut through strands of the wire, too. This tool makes quick work of cutting cables neatly and stripping wires the correct amount. Its lower part has a guillotineaction cutter, while its top part has an adjustable pre-set cable strip limit. Wiring your layout is so much faster, too.



Keep all of your wiring tidy – wires shouldn't be left to dangle loosely underneath, particularly if your lavout is to be made transportable. Zip-ties are a great way of ensuring that cables are kept in neat bundles and are easily traceable.



Labelling your wires is important. Three wires underneath your baseboard that disappear to the underside of the rails in the direction of a point can be difficult to identify when the topside has been ballasted. If your layout is complex and you have crossovers, or a double slip, the problem can be compounded further still. Coming back to these after a few years to trouble-shoot a problem or correct a fault can mean nothing if you're not sure what each one does. A small label on each wire costs nothing and can save a great deal of time later with a multimeter.



When using terminal blocks underneath a baseboard for power distribution, I prefer to twist and tin the wires to protect them before tightening the screws in the blocks. Some say that this can create electrically dead or 'dry joints' with time - I say they're not screwing the wires in tightly enough and cleaning the solder after use. The softer solder allows the screws to 'bite' into the cable better. I've never encountered a problem with wires coming loose or dry joints on layouts that have travelled across and from continental Europe to the UK

Resistance is futile' say all the movie villains, but when wiring a layout, understanding this principle is paramount. Resistance is the ability for a given amount of current to pass through a cable. Think of your model railway controller as a bath full of water that is being filled rapidly. Let's assume that the cable is too thin - the plug hole. The plug hole will only allow a given amount of water to pass through - the current. Too much current through the cable will overheat the cable and in the worst of scenarios might melt the insulation leading to a fire. The correct wire for your layout should be based on

the maximum current being emitted by your controller with a safety margin of around 15%. Tables for these can be found online.

USING WEATHERING POWDERS

Weathering powders should be considered a useful tool when creating realistic models, though not the sole implement. I find the use of powders over pristine paint to look out of place because their coverage can be thin. Weathering powders work best over a matt paint finish, hence if used on an RTR model, I'd advise a little airbrush work beforehand. Consider powders as a semi-permanent form of weathering. They will stay in-situ if left alone, but must be sealed if you intend to handle the model. Buildings aren't much of a problem, but locomotive, coach or wagon sides should ideally be sealed with a quick spray of matt varnish paint.



This building was painted using Lifecolor acrylics on the May 2019 episode of BRM TV. You could leave this building as it is, but weathering powders are particularly good at depicting an accumulation of dry dirt. This might include chimney smoke on buildings or locomotives, diesel exhaust

particulates, brake dust or track dirt. Only apply a little powder to an old brush, testing on a piece of tissue before you touch your model.



Working with weathering powders is a messy job and a great deal of what you apply to your model won't stick permanently as you work your brush over it. Holding a container underneath prevents waste and will allow you to re-use it at a later date.



Avoid applying too much powder at any one time. Stand back from your work and check it before applying too much. Providing you haven't permanently fixed it with a matt varnish, you can wash the majority of powders from models under a tap with water and an old toothbrush if you're not happy with the results.



I regularly mix weathering powders with paint to add texture, or change their colour. Mixing DCC concepts' red oxide powder with Comart's Dry Rust produces an excellent thick matt colour for the painting of bricks; particularly effective when dry-brushing. Alternatively, powders can be mixed with white spirit to create custom washes to fill panel lines to depict a dirty object that has been subjected to rainfall.

BRUSH PAINTING

You dip your brush in a tin of paint, then rub it up and down your model - simple, right? Not if you want a good finish on your model. Painting models isn't like painting emulsion on your walls at home. The model must be clean, the spread of paint must be even and the way it's applied must be methodical. Many a model can be brush-painted, though with the latest RTR models having such an excellent finish, it is best respraying these with an airbrush if a repaint is required.



Applying paint directly to a plastic or brass model without first applying a primer is never advised because the paint can be easily chipped or scraped away with a fingernail afterwards. Apply a primer that is specific to your material, such as an etch primer for brass, either filler or standard primer for plastic or a sanding sealer for wood. Work a brush with soft bristles up and down the piece, following the direction of contours. Never apply too much paint with any one application, use multiple thinner coats instead.



The chemical structure of different paints means that they can react with each other. As a rule of thumb, use the same type of paint from the same brand when painting a project. For enamel paints, branded thinners are recommended for best results, though if you want to use a white spirit to dilute paints, test on an inconspicuous area first. Keep a small piece of material to hand and paint or spray each of the layers in turn that you would do on your model. At least if a reaction occurs, it won't be on your model.



Top coats can be applied before the primer has fully cured to increase the bond between the two layers of paint, though in the case of solvent paints, a few days might be required before the primer is ready to be coated. Ensure an even coverage of paint, avoiding brush lines.

BUILDING CARD KITS

Card kits are an affordable and easy method to rapidly add architecture to your model railway. Ideally suited to beginners, these kits can be enhanced further with a few simple techniques. None require any particular skill, though a steady hand is advised.



Most manufacturers sell brick paper to match their kits. You might be able to cut this out into a decorative shape and use it to cover the corners. Decorative stone quoins cut from plain card can provide the



Viewing a model from normal angles makes the roof more obvious than it is in real life. Printed sheets normally look too flat to be convincing, but scribing along the courses and between each slate improves things a lot. It's not a quick job, but very worthwhile.

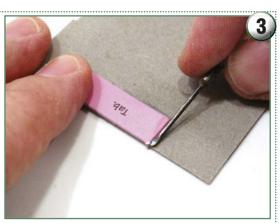


Lead flashing stops rainwater seeping down between bricks and slates on buildings. In model form, it's easily represented using 3mm wide strips of tissue paper and fixed with a tiny amount of PVA. A quick coat of paint will finish the job. Best of all, it covers any less-than-perfect



The classic upgrade for any card kit is to colour exposed edges with a felttipped pen. Try to choose a shade slightly darker than the one on the printing next to the edge. If in doubt, brown seems to work. Colour from the back of the sheet to avoid getting ink on the printed front.

Keep a small screwdriver handy and use it to apply glue to the model. It's also handy to run the tip along like a chisel to scoop up and remove the excess glue if it splurges out of a folded joint. Work quickly though, as removing dried glue is nearly impossible.





Chimneys get dirty and so a stiff brush and Humbrol Smoke colour weathering powder adds the all-important grime. As the card surface is very smooth, matt varnish, lightly sprayed and left to dry, helps adhesion



Downpipes are black painted wire. A stripped old electrical cable is perfect, but the green plastic-coated wire used to tie up plants in the garden works just as well if you straighten it. Fitted on the joint between the gable end and main building, it hides the gap too.

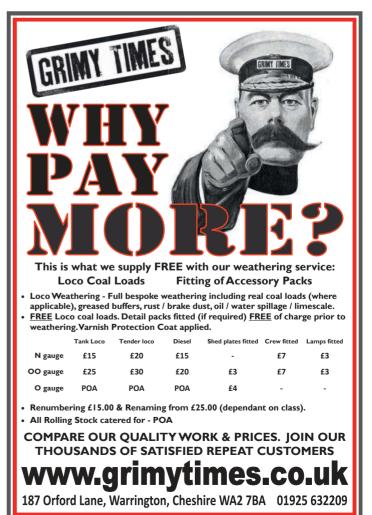

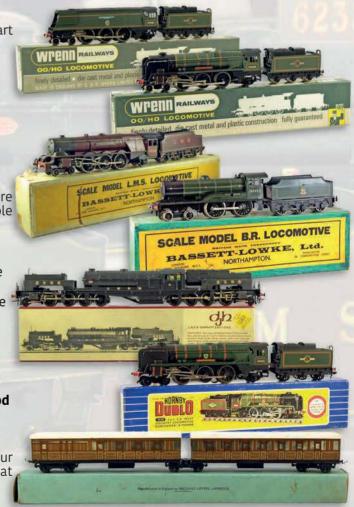

BRM meets...

2MM ASSOCIATION

Andy York meets with Jerry Clifford, a familiar face from this well-established association, often seen promoting its standards at model railway exhibitions.

mm scale pre-dates N gauge by quite a time in the UK. In fact, next year, 2020, the 2mm Scale Association will be celebrating its sixtieth anniversary. When a small group of enthusiasts met for the inaugural meeting at founder member David Byram Wingfield's London flat in April 1960 there was almost nothing available commercially in 2mm scale or OOO as it was known then, save a small range of hand-made components from H.B Whall, the Association's first President.

Skilled modellers had been dabbling in 2mm scale since the 1920s and articles on the work of these pioneers would occasionally appear in the model railway press, but by and large OOO was seen as an amusing gimmick, something for the skilled few rather than a serious scale for building model railways.

This was to change in the early 1960s with the construction of the layout 'Rydes Vale' by Mr H.H Grove and his son Bert, which they successfully exhibited at the Model Railway Club show in Central Hall, Westminster in 1961, '62 and '63. The Groves created a new set of track and wheel standards, since adopted by the Association, which proved

that a 2mm scale layout could be built and perform brilliantly under exhibition conditions.

The aim of the 2mm Scale Association has always been to facilitate modelling in 2mm scale. Since those early years, the Association has gone from strength to strength with a wealth of information, products and support to enable the average enthusiast with a bit of determination to achieve their goals.

Supporting the scale

I asked long-standing member, Jerry Clifford, how much more challenging 2mm scale is compared to N gauge. "Working in 2mm finescale is much easier than you may think. Most 2mm modellers are willing to overlook the small difference between British N gauge and 2mm scale. The latest generation of N gauge models are superb and many can be converted with drop-in wheels, making conversion an easy first step."

The advantages of a smaller scale are obvious, but sometimes not practised, "The great advantage in modelling in such a small scale is that it enables the construction of truly portable layouts, placing the railway



in a realistic landscape setting. It can set the railway in context and capture the spaciousness of the prototype, which is rarely possible in the larger scales.

Although our standards are high, they are also practical. With a few simple gauges (available from the Association), track can be built by a careful modeller. The Association's Easitrac is developing into a comprehensive track system with bullhead rail on both 8ft 6in and 9ft sleepers and wooden and concrete sleeper base options for flatbottom rail along with a growing range of point kits and components. Finescale track and wheel standards have an operational benefit - rolling stock will run through crossings more smoothly as the wheels are supported on the rail at all times, whereas coarser standards have to run the wheel on the flange through crossings.

Proof that 2mm finescale looks good and works well in both domestic and exhibition environments can be seen in the many working layouts featured in the model press and at exhibitions."

I asked why the scale benefits from the pro-active Association, "Members of the Association receive our bi-monthly magazine and newsletter, gain access to our extensive range of products and can draw upon the wealth of experience from fellow members.

The 2mm Magazine concentrates on modelling articles, layouts and product reviews and builds into a comprehensive and invaluable 2mm reference library, while the Newsletter section contains news, comments,



notices of new products, area group events and members' sales and wants which all helps to support the modeller on an ongoing basis."

Products required

With the erosion of traditional model shops with a range of kits and parts within an easy journey, does the Association help the modeller with the 'hardware'? "The Association's mail-order shops offers members nearly 500 different items for sale. Just to give you an idea, we can supply all you need for finescale track, such as templates, jigs, roller-gauges, rail, sleepers and pointwork components. For the locomotive builder, we have locomotive kits, wheels, gears, motors, and detailing parts. Our shops also sell carriage and wagon kits, a range of rolling stock wheels, etched chassis, castings and turnings for buffers, axleboxes and many other detailing parts. In fact, we aim to make available to our members all those otherwise difficult-to-make but essential components that enable anyone (without the need of a workshop) readily to model in 2mm finescale. As you can see, the hard part is mostly done for you!"

Support network

Few clubs have active 2mm scale modellers in the membership and face-to-face contact is often useful in learning the skills as well as a feeling of belonging, "Our Area Groups' meetings offer practical experience of 2mm modelling and a chance to meet other members. The Association's membership of over 850 includes beginners and skilled modellers from all walks of life, so you can be sure of a warm welcome, regardless of your experience or skill level. We have groups in

many parts of the UK, who meet regularly to exchange ideas, give demonstrations or build group projects. In addition, there are groups for members with a common interest, such as narrow-gauge modelling."

Some modellers like to work in their own company or might be too far afield to benefit from the group meetings, though. "There is an internet-based Virtual Area Group, VAG, open to all members, which communicates by email and has a repository for documents, pictures and other material. There is also an active 2mm area on RMWeb with some great modelling that's accessible to everyone, not just Association members".

On the road

You seem to be quite active with your modelling missionary work! "I enjoy demonstrating; our 2mm Roadshows are often in attendance at public model railway exhibitions to promote and demonstrate 2mm scale modelling. But don't just take our word for it, look out for 2mm finescale layouts at shows and see how realistic they are! Even better, come to our annual exhibition which is usually held in early summer; a whole

exhibition of 2mm finescale layouts, demonstrations of 2mm modelling techniques and specialist traders." I can personally vouch for that, having seen some great projects in a far more relaxed atmosphere than a large show. "Members can also enjoy our AGM each autumn, which includes the annual Modelling Competitions and an opportunity to purchase products from the Association Central Shop. Details of all these events can be found on the Association website.

We also have many members who model in scales other than 2FS. British N gauge is very much part of the 2mm family.

FiNe or FS160 is an emerging standard for finescale N of US and European prototypes and uses 2mm Scale Association wheel standards but with the track gauge reduced to 8.97mm. Many Nn3 modellers also use 2mm Scale Association parts for their models, and some 4mm scale narrow gauge modellers have used Association products in their models to great effect".

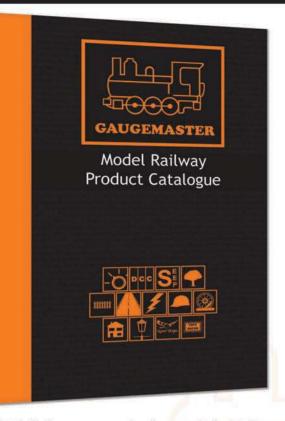

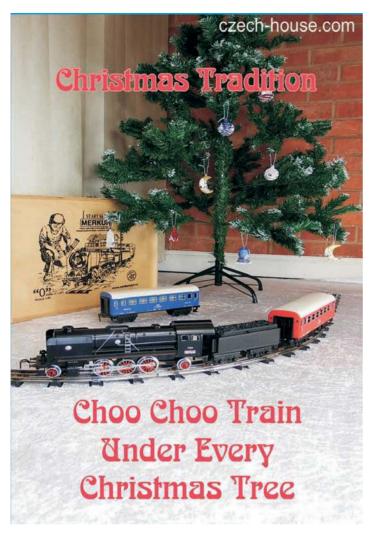

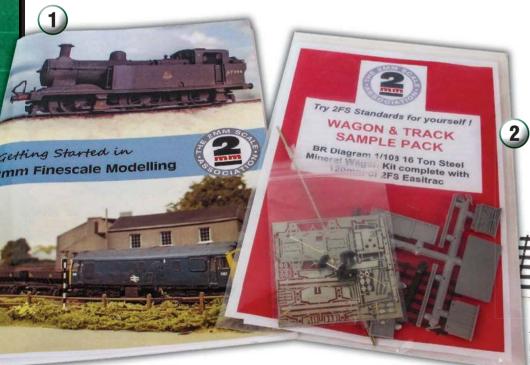
GETTING INTO 2MM FINESCALE

Words & Photography: Jerry Clifford

The 2MM Scale Association's Jerry Clifford, is your guide for initial forays into this set of finer modelling standards.

ur feature layout this month, St. Ruth, demonstrates how 2mm Finescale can be a feasible alternative to N gauge. The main difference is the appearance of the track, but that needn't be as daunting as it seems. The 2mm Scale Association has a great pack for you to start the learning process, including a ubiquitous 16T mineral wagon and a 60ft length of plain track. An ideal weekend project to test yourself and potentially make a big leap forward in your standards. Here are the step-by-step stages required, to help shed light on what are perceived to be some of the trickier aspects.





COME AND SEE THE 2MM SCALE ASSOCIATION AT THE NATIONAL FESTIVAL OF RAILWAY MODELLING AT PETERBOROUGH ON **DECEMBER 7/8 2019**

This is what you get for your money - a complete wagon kit comprising body, chassis etch, top hat bearings (mine included five, one for the carpet gods!), buffers, wheels, wire and vacuum cylinder for the fitted option along with enough Easitrac to make up a scale 60ft length. In addition, there are full instructions on how to build your first 2FS wagon.

The 2mm Association's beginners' guide and sample pack, available from the 2mm Roadshow at exhibitions up and down the country. The kit builds into a 16T steel mineral wagon

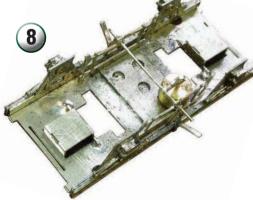


The basic body is about as simple as plastic kits get, two sides, two ends and a floor. Simply glue together with liquid cement.

The basic hand tools required to build your sample pack. You will also need a suitable soldering iron, solder and flux. The brown mat at the back is a lump of Tufnol that I do most of my soldering and assembly on. It is perfect for the job, being flat, hard and heat-resistant and can be had from many of the more specialist tool and material suppliers found at exhibitions.



The holes for the bearings are usually etched a fraction undersize and will need opening out with a reamer. Go gently, remove a little at a time and offer the bearings up regularly; we are aiming for a good, snug fit with no slop. To fix the bearings in place I have a hole in the corner of my Tufnol board so that I can hold the bearing flat against the etch while soldering. As with all soldering, particularly in 2mm, a clean, hot iron with minimal solder is the order of the day.



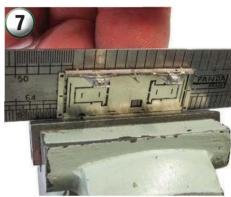
The brakes are another simple fold-up assembly; the long and short tabs ensure they can't be fitted the wrong way around. The door bangers will need to be temporarily bent out of the way to get the wire cross shaft in. The vacuum cylinder can also be fitted at this stage for those building the fitted version along with the little half-etched



I like to solder the solebars and axle boxes to the main chassis etch before folding it to shape. There are two options for these folded, sweated assemblies; either tin the mating faces or use a solder paste or cream. Both methods have merits and I use either, usually depending on whether I can find my solder cream at the time! Both solebars and axle boxes are folded up from either two or three layers. Don't remove the little etched hinges until all is securely soldered in place. The axle boxes are small and I carefully fold them to shape, nudge them into place, add flux then introduce the iron while holding them down with the tip of a scalpel. If all else fails, the Association sells cast and printed axle boxes!



The brake levers are another neat bit of etched origami. The one on the left has been folded and bent to shape, that on the right is still in the flat. The pictures of the finished chassis should make it clear where the bends need to be made, although there are some half-etched dimples on the rear of the etch as a guide. Essentially. the brake lever needs to be able to clear the axleboxes if the brakes were applied - in 2mm they are non-working! The ratchet end can be soldered neatly from the rear where it pokes through the solebar, while the merest wipe of solder is sufficient to fix the handle to the cross shaft. The latter can now be trimmed to length and the door bangers bent to their final shape.



The chassis can be bent to shape at this stage. Lightly grip the assembly in your vice with the etched fold line aligned with the jaws and bend down to 90 degrees using a rule or the handle of your square to apply even pressure. Final tweaks can be done between finger and thumb if necessary, to ensure the chassis is twist-free and sits squarely on a flat surface.



The finished wagon is now ready for painting.

ELLASWEET BEET FACTORY

Known for his passion of local Lincolnshire industry, Graham Morfoot introduces his latest creation, based on the workings of a sugar beet factory.

LAYOUT FOCUS

his layout was never in long-term planning mode. A friend offered me a ready-made baseboard, which he had made for an 'O-16.5' layout and due to a house move, it was surplus to his requirements.

My previous layout, 'Caroline Concrete Works', was completed, so with time on my hands and looking for a new project, I had an incentive for building a new layout.

I like to use a local interest when building a layout, ideally with an industrial theme. Past layouts have been a potato railway, peat railway, sleeper works and concrete works, all of which were fairly close to my location. So, with this in mind, a representation of a sugar beet processing factory was the theme. In the town where I live there was once a large 'beet factory', served by a branch from a main line.

A typical sugar beet factory could process 4,000 tons of beet per day, producing 700 tons of sugar, 400 tons of pulp for animal feed, and molasses. The beet is delivered by rail and road, and the campaign lasted about four months annually. Sadly, this factory has long since been demolished and replaced with a power station.

As mentioned above, I was lucky enough to be given the ready-made baseboard,

Code 100, the decision was made. Points are operated with passing contact switches, which power solenoid motors with a Capacitor Discharge Unit (CDU). The track was laid directly on the baseboard and then ballasted with a fine material that represents a stone and ash mixture. There is a raised siding used for a sugar beet discharge facility, which is laid on a compressed foam base. The back-scene board is only 6in high, which does limit the size of buildings and poses a challenge when representing warehouses and factory structures. Good overhead lighting, which is very important for exhibitions, is achieved with LED floodlights suspended on metal brackets.

Setting the scene

The warehouses on each end of the layout are scratch-built using card and covered with printed brick-effect paper. The sugar beet unloading facility, the lorry weighbridge and rail weighbridge office are also scratchbuilt. The corrugated store, Portakabin office, plate-layers' hut and yard office are proprietary kits, as are the oil storage tanks. The newly-erected 1960s office block is 3D-printed. I could not find a kit or readymade model for this, so my son offered to print the front. I gave him a scale drawing and photograph of a prototype. The result is outstanding, but I may be biased.

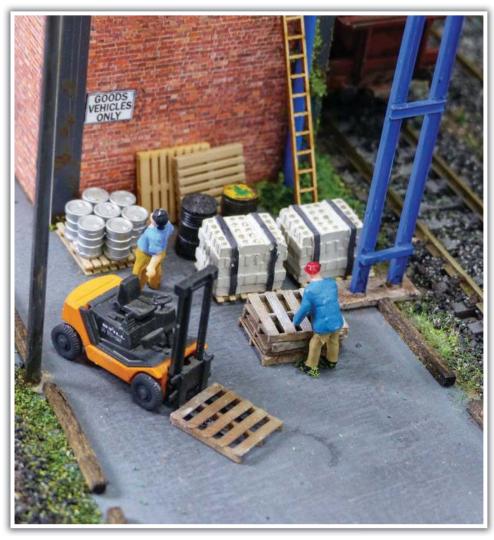
The overhead pipework is made from styrene strips and tube. There is also a small steam locomotive service facility, which consists of a platform holding a coal supply and a water hydrant. Although the control system is DC without onboard sound, I have installed background sound. There is a mini-speaker with a microchip inside one of the warehouses, which gives a background sound of a working factory. Two sound recording modules are placed out of sight at either end of the layout; they have the sound of a suitable steam whistle recorded on them. They are manually-operated from the rear of the layout but could be operated by an electronic proximity detector or a magnet in the locomotive and reed switch in the track.

Daily operation

During the campaign, the sugar beet is delivered from the farms in the district by road and rail. With up to 4,000 tons of sugar beet a day being processed at the local factory, I remember the queue of lorries waiting to discharge could be up to a mile long. Rail traffic results in a steady flow of loaded open wagons of sugar beet. Due

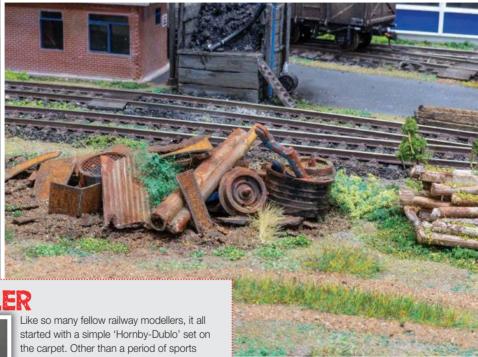
to the restricted length of fiddle yard and sidings, I have to limit train lengths to a locomotive, four wagons and a guard's van. A BR locomotive, usually a J6, Ivatt 4MT, Class 08 or 03 brings the train from an offsite BR yard onto the run around siding. It will then take any wagons for dispatch plus the guard's van off the layout. The company locomotive, a J94, then shunts the wagons to locations on the site. The loaded sugar beet wagons are shunted under a facility which had a manually-operated, highpressure water jet to wash the beet from the wagon. Other than sugar beet, wagon loads of limestone, fuel oil, coal, packaging materials and machinery will be delivered. Outgoing wagons will be loaded with bagged sugar, molasses and beet pulp, and empties returning to the BR yard.

Locomotives are 'out of the box', ready-torun with some weathering. The exception is the J6 which is a Nu-Cast white metal kit. Tony Wright thankfully guided me with its construction. All the wagons are readymade, with various levels of weathering. I use Kaydee couplers with permanent magnets under the track. This usually gives a realistic hands-free operation, provided accurate setting up of the couplings is done when they are installed on the wagons.

This is now my sixth exhibition layout. 'Tates', 'Boston Sleeper Works' and 'Ben Moor Foot Peat' railway now have new homes, which leaves me with 'Billingborough', 'Caroline Concrete' works and this one. The more recent layouts are named after family members, so Ella is yet another. Future layouts are always uncertain and will depend on spontaneous inspiration, but it is usually an industrial theme based in the East Midlands.

MEET THE MODELLER



cars and girlfriends, I have always had a keen interest in railways and modelling. I have modelled in most gauges and scales from OO9, to O-16.5. I particularly enjoy making exhibition layouts with an industrial theme, especially if they have a connection with Lincolnshire. These layouts include a Lincolnshire potato railway - 'Tates', a peat extraction railway, 'Boston Sleeper Works', a concrete works, and this sugar beet factory. I have no immediate plans for future projects, but I still have aspirations to model a narrow gauge railway of Ruston's factory in Lincoln.

The ubiquitous scrap heap is in the front, made from bits from the scrap box, painted a rust colour, then weathered with powders. Behind is a very basic steam locomotive service point, with coal supply and water from a hydrant.

HOW A BEET FACTORY OPERATES

Sugar initially came to this country from the Caribbean and Commonwealth countries. Beet was first grown in the east of England in 1905, due to lower rainfall and warmer temperatures, and to encourage being self-sufficient. The first factory was built at Cantley in Norfolk in 1912. Growing of beet and sugar production increased with a total of 17 factories before closures started in 1980. Today, three factories remain in eastern England, using around eight million tonnes of beet from 3,000 growers to produce 1.4 million tonnes of sugar annually, which is about half the sugar used in UK.

The beet is harvested in the autumn and transported by road to the factory. There used to be rail connections to all the factories, bringing in the beet and other materials used in the production process.

The incoming beet loads are weighed

and tested for sugar and soil content as they enter the factory. Lorries are either tipped or the load is washed out with a high-pressure hose. Railway wagons were also discharged by the washout method.

The washed beet is shredded into flakes, then boiled in water to dissolve the sugar. The beet flakes are then dried and made into pellets and bagged for animal feed.

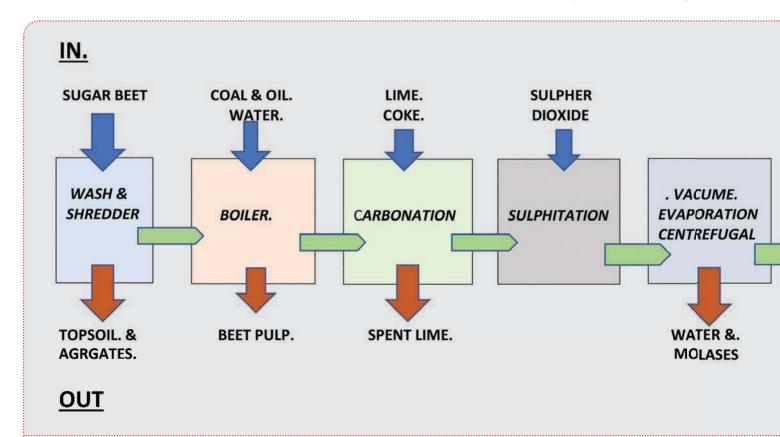
The syrup is carbonated using lime, filtered and then passed through a sulphate tank. The solution is then evaporated to give a strong sugar solution, which is seeded with sugar grains, then passed through vacuum pans to remove more water. A centrifuge finally takes out the last water, a granulator breaks up the sugar and it is then bagged or stored in bulk silos.

As well as sugar, the by-products include aggregate, topsoil, molasses, animal feed and liming products for farms.

Today the factories also produce Bioethanol, a form of renewable energy. Surplus heat is also used for growing cannabis to produce new prescription medicines for the treatment of debilitating childhood diseases.



This office in Spalding is very similar to the one at the Beet factory and seen at many locations throughout the country. It was the local HM Tax Office. I used this picture to make a 3D-printed model used on the layout.



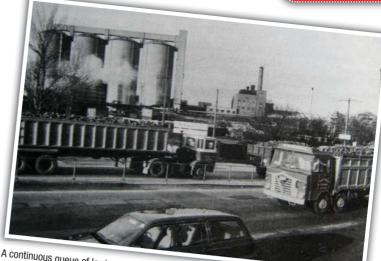

The high-pressure hose operated from a cabin above washed the beet from lorries that weren't able to tip. The beet was washed along a flume to a storage area.



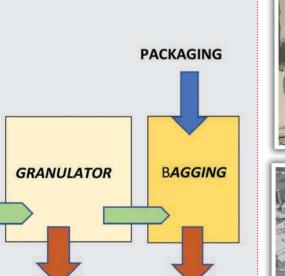
Sugar beet is mechanically lifted from the ground and stored in the field ready for transport to the factory. The sugar content deteriorates once it is lifted, so getting it to the factory is a priority.



A continuous queue of lorries entered the factory during the Campaign (about 3,000 per day), which lasted three to four months in the autumn, often blocking the roads around the



The end result is processed granulated sugar, bagged and stored in a warehouse. In later years, bulk sugar was stored in concrete silos.



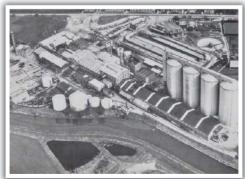

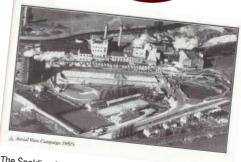

HANDS-ON... SCENIC ADVICE

Howard Smith drops-in on a workshop course hosted by DCC Supplies, aimed at budding modellers looking to fast-track their practical skills.



t's not unreasonable to suggest that most railway modellers seek to improve their skills, no matter what their modelling abilities are. Professional modellers earning a living would much rather complete a project faster, better, or with more ease, too, 'He or she who never made a mistake, never made anything', goes the saying. We learn from

experience, but this can take years to acquire. How many mistakes can a beginner be expected to make? Will it be too offputting? We like to think that BRM - and BRM TV for our subscribers - is great for practical project ideas, tips and advice, but nothing quite beats a one-on-one tutorial with a modelling expert.

Model clubs can be a great way to socialise and learn new techniques, but the learning process can be slow and it relies on members willing to dedicate time with sufficient modelling techniques not to misguide those wanting to learn. Not everyone has a model railway club on their doorstep, either. And as for exhibitions, how much hands-on experience can you be expected to learn over a quick chat?

Luckily, there are other ways to learn new modelling skills. And one option is to join a modelling course for a day or two, which can really help boost your modelling confidence. You choose a course that's relevant to your interests and you learn the relevant skills with speed. DCC Supplies offers modelling courses for up to eight attendees at a time, on subjects ranging from DCC to model scenery.

Attending its Worcester store last month for an interview with its proprietors, Fiona and Andy Forty (BRM September), I had the opportunity to oversee a scenic modelling tutorial led by the dynamic duo of Tony Hill, author of Simple Scenery and Creating Realistic Landscapes and John Lloyd of Greenscene. The two-day course was aimed at beginner or intermediate modellers and led attendees through the cornerstones of scenic modelling.

Sitting around tables to form an arc, the 'students' were keenly listening to an onscreen presentation that was coming to an end, as I entered the room. Tony and John took it in turns to share advice, practical

hands-on guidance and tips with the eight attendees. Work started the day preceding, with square sections of Styrofoam which the group had hollowed-out in preparation for a model pond. All modelling items and tools used were provided by DCC Supplies. Painting the diorama brown, the underside of a clear section of Perspex sheet was also painted by each modeller to represent water lilies, before applying it over the hollowed-out section of the diorama and bedding it in with filler around its edges. Tony shared his techniques for blending the edges between the Perspex sheet and foam, as John circled the group, intervening where necessary.

The learning of skills continued, using a methodical approach and allowing for drying time to cover many of the basics on scenic modelling, including making specimen trees, applying static grass to create various effects (for which John is renowned), creating shrubs, hedgerows and detailing the landscape. A break for a buffet lunch provided by the shop saw the attendees pause on their creations, and offered me with an opportunity to quiz some of them about their interests and aspirations. Interestingly, not all were railway modellers — aspiring diorama and military modellers were present, too.

Mike Wood, a fast-learner judging by the appearance of his diorama, recounted his involvement with the hobby. "It started several years ago when my daughter bought a Hachette ship she'd seen on TV. It took 99 editions and two years to complete!" he exclaimed with a smile and simultaneous sigh of relief. "Seeing that I was interested in models, I was given a Flying Scotsman starter pack from Hornby which I laid on a 6ft x 5ft board. It has been left as it is because I'm looking to make a start with the scenery and add to it", he continued. "I've found both days here to be superb. I've attended railway exhibitions at Warwick and Newbury before, but the one-on-one tutorials you get here are better than a quick exhibition demonstration." His view was met with nods of agreement by others, as they gathered around.

It highlighted to me the importance of such courses. We often acquire new skills slowly, over time and brush over the finer details as we explain how it's done.

These two days were of value to those who attended, not solely because of the extra time afforded to permit the creation of a unique diorama they could take away, but mostly because it was a case of taking them by the hand and physically demonstrating the techniques required. For the newcomer or intermediate modeller seeking to acquire more skills, it proved valuable and I know of at least eight modellers who are about to embark on a journey of better scenic creations.

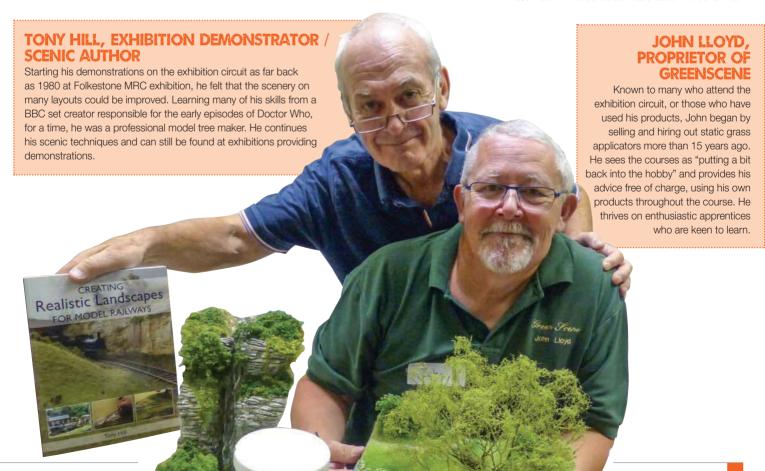

ONE-STEP DIGITAL AUTOMATION

Concluding our series on Bachmann's Dynamis RailController computer software, we explore the use of programmable buttons to simplify complex or repetitive operations.

In the past few issues, we've been taking a closer look at the various features on offer by using model railway software and how easy it can be to set up, in particular using Bachmann's Dynamis RailController. One particular feature that's caught our eye is the Programmable Button command, which allows you to place a button anywhere on your trackplan, select an icon for it and enable it to operate a RailController program, run a locomotive, operate an accessory, set a route, play a sound, alter the view of the track plan, search for a locomotive or operate a turntable.

An example trackplan is provided with the program, which contains a handful of programmable buttons already set up, so you can learn more by studying that plan.

Setting up programmable buttons is straightforward. All you need to do is to go into track plan design mode and click on the programmable button icon on the left of the design window. This will allow you to select an icon for the button. You can either select from the built-in icons or create or download your own. Transparent GIF is the best format to use, although you can use JPEGs, bitmaps and so on.

When you have selected an icon for your programmable button, it will appear on the screen and you can then drag it to any desired position. Double-clicking on the icon will then present you with the parameters box, from which you can select the type of button to add. The default is to run a program. For this, you can select any pre-defined RailController program from the list. This could be a program already supplied with RailController or one that you have written yourself. It may do something very simple like moving a particular locomotive into a siding – the options are endless.

Using the Loco Decoder option, you can quickly set the direction and speed for the desired locomotive. Just enter its DCC ID and tick the Forward box if you want

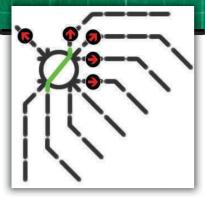
the locomotive to travel forward. Leave it unchecked for reverse. Then enter the speed in DCC speed units (0 to 127) to set the locomotive running. Note this is the DCC speed unit rather than scale speed in MPH or KPH.

You can operate any accessory on your layout with just one button, by setting it up as a programmable button. Accessories include turnouts and signals and, of course, you already have icons on your trackplan for these.

Sometimes, however, you may want to operate something else attached to an accessory decoder that is not a turnout or signal. These may include motorised level crossing barriers, house lights, traffic lights and so on.

One of the more useful functions of a programmable button is the ability to play a sound. You can either select a sound from the list built into RailController or create your own. These can be in MP3 or WAV format.





The turntable option is perhaps the most sophisticated as it allows you to set up multiple buttons around a turntable to set output roads. Essentially, you set up one button per road and you set the DCC port ID and the output road it links to on the turntable icon. A handy sample trackplan is provided with RailController, which shows you how to set up the programmable buttons for each road. Usefully, the icons include arrow buttons that can be placed around the turntable. You may need to play with this feature, employing trial-and-error until you get your turntable operation just right.

Setting up multiple turnouts

You may think that switching turnouts and controlling trains is all part of the fun with a model railway, and while this is true, sometimes when using DCC where you are constantly pushing buttons, a little help can go a long way to making running your layout more enjoyable.

The routes system in the software allows you to list many turnouts and signals to switch automatically at the press of a single button. This can be particularly useful on larger, more complex layouts where controlling multiple trains and turnouts can be daunting.

Using the routes system, you can identify a start and ending point, look at the turnouts in between and set them in the appropriate direction. You can have as many routes as you like and give each a unique name for easy identification.

In the example track plan (right), the route from Sharahau Station to Horkel Halt has been highlighted in red. To set the route, in this case only setting turnouts, we need to set turnout 0005 to the right, 0004 to the left, 0002 to the right and 0001 to the right.

Even setting the four turnouts needed for this route will take a little time when operating manually. Firstly, we need to look at the trackplan and take a few seconds to decide which turnout needs setting and click or touch it if needed. With RailController you can set each turnout and the order in which to fire them and the software will do the rest.

To set up the route, just click on the Tools menu in the software's main screen, then Manage routes. You can enter up to 99 turnouts to switch for the route. Operating the route is simple. On the main RailController window, click or press the turnout button on the left and all of your routes will be displayed in a pop-up box, similar to the example shown.

Clicking or pressing on the route name will instruct RailController to operate all of the previously-programmed turnouts, with a small delay between each one, and in the order listed on the Route Management window.

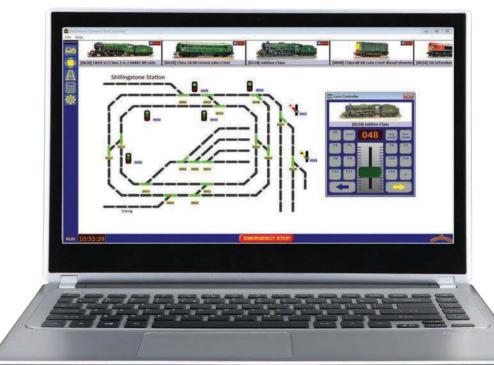


RailController has four built-in on-screen locomotive controllers and you can set them to appear when you start the program. Not only that, you can tell RailController which locomotive to load in each controller. Just ticking up to four locomotives from your roster in the Settings window will do this. Remember, only locomotives that are members of the current group set to control will be loaded.

Another useful tip is to specify how the locomotive controllers are loaded, whether automatically on start-up or not. The default setting is to "Save positions and size". This means that as you call up the locomotive controllers, you are able to position them anywhere you like on your screen, even on multiple monitor systems. You can also resize the controllers and RailController will remember their positions and sizes for the next time you start the program.

If you like to keep your computer screen tidy, with everything in its place, you also have the option of docking the four locomotive controllers. That means that you can have them all in a row horizontally at the top or bottom of your screen or vertically, one above the other, to the left or right of your screen.

As you operate RailController, like



most other Windows applications, if you place a locomotive controller on top of your main RailController screen, then operate something on your trackplan, the controller will naturally now go behind the main screen. This means you will have to refer to the taskbar at the bottom of

your Windows screen or use the Alt-Tab Windows function to bring the controller to the front again. To avoid having to do this, just tick the box "Always on top" to ensure that the controllers never go behind any other window, including non-RailController windows.

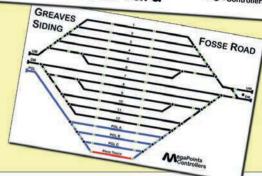

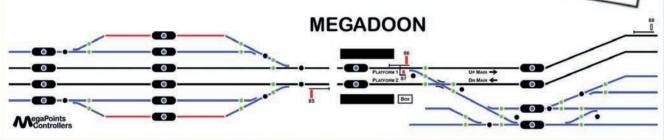

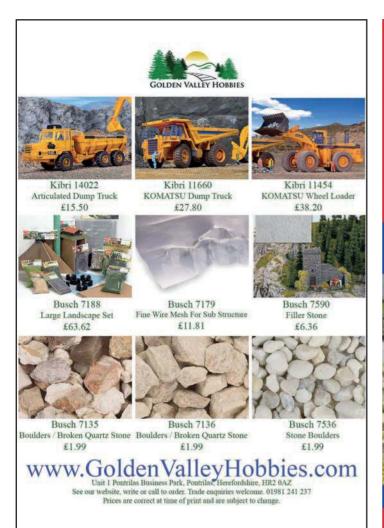

BILLY BOOKCASE LAYOUTS THE N GAUGE MODEL

Phil Parker turns back the clock to the 1970s for his latest Billy Bookcase layout.



topping Train Britain is my favourite railway book. Written in 1983, it describes a series of journeys around the country in an era when what we now call heritage DMUs rattled along branch lines, providing a vital service to asmall number of passengers.

It's the era when I first became properly interested in railways, which was handy

because this was also the last period before the system became less interesting as wagon-load freight and locomotive-hauled passenger trains started to disappear.

When I started the Billy Bookcase project, there wasn't a plan for the N gauge model. I canvassed opinion on RMweb and a number of excellent plans were suggested. If you are looking for ideas, you can certainly find it

there thanks to the efforts of our ever helpful band of modellers.

More recently, I was asked at a show if BRM had ever used Kato Unitrack in a project- the visitor was considering it but as the system is quite radically different to other makes, wasn't sure.

Long-term readers might remember in late 2016. I built a continuous run model that

fitted in a plastic box with this track. At the time, it was handy as the layout was built for speed rather than strict authenticity.

Perhaps it was time to have another go, but see how realistic the track could be made. It's certainly easy to use and, since the point motors are built in to the turnouts, ideal for building on a shelf. The moulded-in ballast looks a bit plasticy though, and the units are awfully tall.

Armed with the list of available track pieces, inspiration from RMweb, and the idea that I'd like to model something from the blue diesel era of the 1970s, I came up with a simple plan. I won't pretend that this is an interesting layout to operate. Truth is, it's more a moving diorama, but shows an era full of nostalgia for people like me.

Presumably that's why we are seeing more layouts set in this period.

Working in N gauge introduces a number of challenges scenically; the main one being not to overdo textures. Tarmac in the small scale is to all intents and purposes, smooth. Grass is short – my normal 4mm fibres being a scale 2ft tall and even ones half that height represent something that hasn't seen a mower for a very long time.

That said, the techniques used here are relevant to other scales, showing just how much we can all learn from each other.

Anyway, it's time to head back to the era of *Slade*, *The Carpenters* and watching *The Sweeny* on TV, before heading off to an unloved station halt where the shelter might keep the rain off, but smells a bit dubious.



A shiny white shelf isn't the greatest base for a realistic model, so I spray a mix of red oxide primer and Railmatch track colour over it. Left to dry, the result is matt and mud-coloured. This step wouldn't be necessary if lkea made mud-coloured shelving, of course.

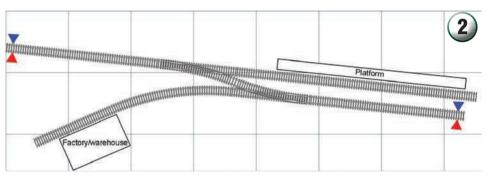

Checking that you can fit enough stock into headshunts and platforms is an essential step. In this case, a Class 20 and long-wheelbase wagon fit with a little shuffling of the plan. Kato track is robust enough for the whole layout to be slid around the baseboard. Once I'm happy, I draw around it with a pencil so it can be removed.



My plan is pretty simple - a single-road station and siding for a factory or warehouse. All this was drawn up using the free version of AnyRail track planning software. Being able to use the correct track modules means at least I know it will fit on the board.







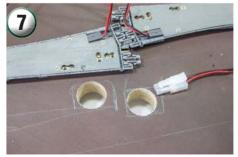
Kato Unitrack is the perfect system for layouts built on a shelf because the operating motors are built into the points so you don't need to allow any space for them underneath. Being able to connect and disconnect the track without damaging it is helpful too, just in case the planning isn't quite as good as it should be.



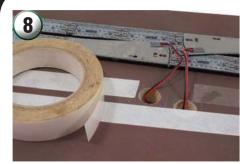
A job easier to do on the bench than on the layout is painting the rail sides dirty brown. The bare metal doesn't seem to take paint very well, but acrylic Railmatch sticks reasonably well. Don't paint the area around the tiebars as it's easy to stop the motor working and then you have to dismantle the unit to remove the paint. Something I found out the hard way!



One thing that, in my opinion, is better under the board are the wires, so to allow a bit of space for them, I fit some rubber feet on to the bottom of the shelf.



Point controls plug in under each motor and are supplied with plugs already fitted to the leads. This means a big hole is required under the board, so I use a 22mm wide spade part in a power drill. Overkill, a smaller hole would work, but this way I don't have to be as accurate with my positioning and the point will cover everything up.



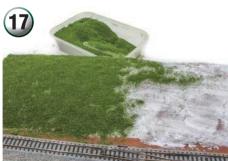
While you can drill and pin the track, double-sided sticky tape works perfectly well. If your baseboard is plywood, carpet tape is a little more forgiving but thin tape from a stationers also works OK.



All the roadways are 2mm thick Daler Board card painted with a mix of Phoenix Precision tarmac and concrete colours. Splodging paint on with pieces of sponge helps the shades to blend and avoid a uniform colour. Dabbing a little talcum powder on the paint as it dries helps a lot too, without producing an unrealistic coarse surface texture



To reduce the visual height of the track, I fill up the gaps between lines with Kato ballast. This is fixed in the same way as normal ballast, a spray of water followed by a PVA/water mix with a couple of washing up liquid drops to reduce the surface tension.



N gauge grass in a field full of cows would be short, so I start with a layer of Woodland Scenics Scenic Glue which has the advantage over PVA of drying matt so we don't end up with shiny mud showing through any gaps. On to this is sprinkled a good, thick layer of mid-green scatter. Put plenty on and then gently push it into the glue with the palm of your hand.



Where the track leaves the baseboard, it needs to be cut to length and I find a piercing saw with a fine metal blade perfect for the job. Work slowly as the plastic ballast can melt and re-join behind the blade if enough heat is generated in the process.



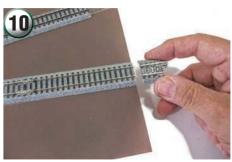
Hills are formed using expanded polystyrene shaped with a Shesto hot wire cutter. Work in a well-ventilated area when doing this as the fumes given off are dangerous if inhaled in large quantities. Although those from a small iob like this aren't a serious issue, better safe than sorry. They don't smell nice anyway.



Although there are track pieces in the range to connect the electrical feeds, 'cheapskates' like me just clean the rail sides and solder wires to the rails, exactly as you would do for any other system.



The big advantage of a little layout is it can be turned upside down to shake the excess scatter off. This can be swept back into the pot for reuse. On a bigger project, use a vacuum cleaner with a handkerchief over the nozzle instead



Don't throw away the piece cut from the entrance track as this will be needed when building a fiddle yard in the future. I haven't built this yet, so the piece is safely tucked away in a bag and taped to the bottom of the model to stop me losing it.



Smooth the contours with some DIY store wall filler. A wet palette knife makes this job a lot easier, and if you can find someone who decorates cakes, they will make an even better job of it as it's the same technique for applying royal icing.



Time for testing. The Kato point switches are an essential part of the system and they need to be fed with 12V DC. Kato controllers have press-stud connections on their sides for this, but I cheated using the controlled output from the back of an old H&M unit. Don't connect to the 16V AC output, though.



Once the scatter is fully dry, another layer of Scenic Glue is applied along the line where the lineside fence will be fixed later. You'll notice that the points have been masked to keep glue and other material out of the moving parts.



A layer of 2mm long electrostatic grass is applied to build up the less well-cared for grass areas. The photo shows it after vacuuming but before the glue is dry, which is why it looks lighter.



To add more texture along the fence line, I cut a mask in some scrap card and spray hairspray through the hole. This creates a sticky surface for more scatter or static grass to be added.



Ratio lineside fence is fitted into holes drilled in the baseboard and fixed with Scenic Glue. I use a blob on some plastic and then dip each fence post; it's easier than trying to squirt small amounts from the bottle.



Time for some 'bodging'. Where the fence doesn't quite touch the ground, especially over undulating surfaces, a little blob of glue on the bottom followed by coarse flock hides the gap and looks perfectly natural.



Concrete posts are square section wood, painted and then fitted in holes. There should be wires between each post but these need to be so incredibly thin in this scale, that I decided to leave them rather than use too fat a material.



Buffers are plastic Peco kits fixed with superglue. The lugs on the bottom need to be trimmed for them to grip the rail sides properly as they aren't designed for Kato



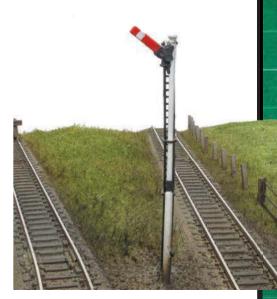
With the tiebars masked, all the track is airbrushed with acrylic paints from the Lifecolor range. Mostly I use Track Dirt, but with rustier and black in some areas. The overspray deliberately covers the grass, fences and anything else close to the trackbed.



Small trees come from the Hornby 00 gauge Skale Scenics range. These have round bases, but I pull them off with small pliers and plant each one in a hole made in the hillside

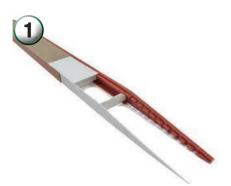


The finishing touch is the addition of a couple of vehicles appropriate for the era modelled. The Citroen 2CV is from Oxford Diecast and Leyland FG van from Base Toys. Blobs of Scenic Glue are strong enough to hold both in place



The signal is a non-working plastic kit from Ratio. It's a bit fiddly to put together but there's no space under the board for a working Dapol version. Let the glue dry properly between each stage

BUILDING THE STATION



Peco platform edging pieces and ramp are glued together to make the front face. Behind this, the rest is made from strips of 1mm thick Plastikard topped with more of the same. Embossed Plastikard bricks and paving slabs finish the model.



The basic shelter needs to be made from very thin material so I'm using 0.2mm thick brass. Cut it with an Olfa cutter, scoring the lines until the metal can be snapped along them. There aren't any plans, but according to the Internet, bus shelters are 7ft tall, so I assume station shelters will be the same. Photographs suggest the panels are square, so I'll improvise.



The biggest challenge provided by the Kato track is that with the moulded-in ballast, because it's quite a lot taller than other makes. If you look at the DMU, passengers will have quite a step up to get in the doors, so both the station and factory benefit from being raised on 2mm thick card.



Finding some Ratio platform fencing leftover from an old project, I remove a few pieces to make it look a bit worn for the back edge. With none for the ramps, I improvise with some Slater's Microstrip, matching the distances between the posts, but just putting on a couple of rails.

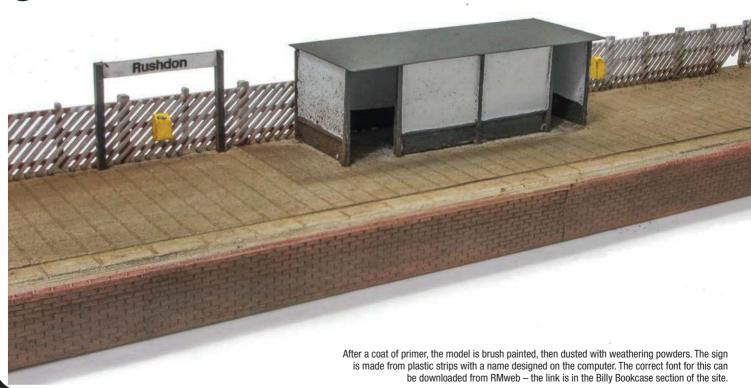


The walls are soldered to a brass roof. Using metal might seem like overkill, but you'd need at least 0.5mm thick plastic for this job, a scale 3in thick, which would make the building look clumsy and yet the model would still



The framing is very fine Slater's Microstrip fixed with superglue. This is much easier than trying to solder wires in to do the job. I know, because this is my second attempt at this shelter and the first is in the bin.





BUILDING THE FACTORY



The starting point for my model is this somewhat battered Metcalfe Models card kit unearthed from a cupboard in my local model shop and bought very cheaply.



My first plan had been to scribe the roof tiles, but when I discovered that sliding a sharp blade along the joints with the walls would release the cardboard roof, I took out the windows and made a complete replacement from corrugated Plastikard.



Using a template made from scrap paper, pieces of Slater's embossed Plastikard are cut out and stuck to the surface with solvent-free UHU. Allowing an overlap at the corners lets me cut these back accurately, once a wash of plastic solvent applied in the corners has dried.



After painting the walls with pale cream (Humbrol 121) and then dry-brushing the bricks with Humbrol No.70, the model is given a generous dose of dark brown weathering powders to make it look suitably mucky.

EXPERT TIP



Changing scales

Working in a different scale to the one you normally model in presents some challenges, but can also be great fun.

My biggest problem is that I don't have the stash of pieces in N gauge that I have for OO gauge modelling. If I need Plastikard or kit bits, I have to plan ahead and buy them in especially rather than just rooting around in a cupboard. I need to be organised.

N gauge initially seems so small, but after a while, you get used to this and your cutting and painting skills improve, something that will pay dividends when moving back up a scale or two (O gauge figures now look massive!) for the next project.

The biggest downside? Needing to wear my reading glasses to see what I'm doing more often. It makes me feel old!

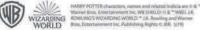








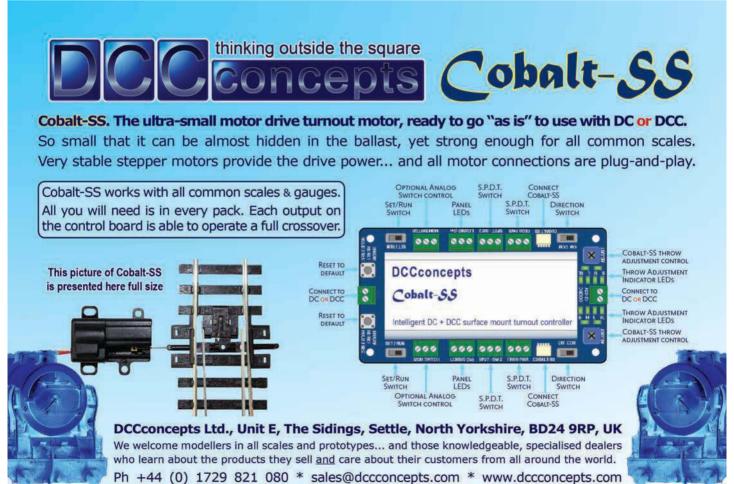

BRM meets...

THE MODEL CENTRE

TMC puts digital at the heart of its business with the launch of its latest website, Debbie Wood pays the team a visit to find out what else is in store.

estled away in the very heart of the North Yorkshire Moors National Park, TMC's idyllic spot is quite possibly the most beautifully-sited model shop in the UK.

Located in the small village of Beck Hole, its stunning backdrop is the ultimate juxtaposition from the company's Manchester Trafford Centre beginnings back in 1998.

The family-run business specialises in custom finish models and prides itself on its premium service. Now, with the launch of its new website, father and son, Chris and Alex Yates plan to take the digital world by storm, reaching even more customers than ever before. With so much going on, we decided to pay the team a visit.

Digital Evolution

Over 95% of TMC's business is mail order and, because of this, coupled with some fierce competition, continuing to develop online has been a key priority.

Over 16 months in the making, TMC's latest rejuvenated website was launched last month and offers far greater communication

for the railway modeller.

"We've got a pre-order policy that's really prominent so that customers know exactly what they're getting; it's all clearly written out for them. We've not only improved the look and functionality of the website, but we've also aimed to make it as easy as possible," explains Alex.

TMC wanted to be competitive online and recognised that it was missing out big by not offering pre-orders, something Chris admits was a mistake not setting up initially.

"There was such a scramble. It was like the gold rush for manufacturers to announce things, almost to stake a claim on it. It meant that products were being launched earlier and earlier, even at artwork or tooling stage, and we wanted to avoid that and advertise only available products. But by taking this approach we were missing out massively to our competitors," Chris explains.

Now TMC has launched a pre-order facility online, but aims to only announce products a year to 18 months in advance. On pre-orders, customers can add all the various features TMC offers into the basket including weathering and DCC, and when the new

model is available, it'll be delivered to the specification they want.

"You have to look at things from the other side of the counter. If you have a budget to work to and you've already spent it on a new locomotive and six months down the line it hasn't arrived and then a year, how is that helping the industry? The customer continues to chase and the retailer is at the sharp end. With our special commissions we like to advertise them when we have a confirmed delivery date," says Chris.

Communication is King

In the initial stages of development, launching a pre-order facility was hot on the agenda, but ensuring excellent communication with the customer has also been a key focus. Back in early 2018, the team at TMC was busy collating all the customer feedback received and quickly realised there was a greater need for more information. Now all products come with a variety of detail including the era the model is from, if it's DCC ready, the number of pins required to make the models DCC ready, whether it's weathered or pristine, and the



expected delivery time.

"The more information we can put on the listings, the more the customer is at ease. So unless they have an issue, and our quality control process eliminates that, it should move as smoothly as possible," Alex explains. "It's all about communication for online. Most of our business is repeat business and we want to shout about the fact we have this new website that makes it easy for the customer to communicate with us."

To help improve things further, another of the website's latest developments is the contact form, which Alex admits, the team will reply to even out of hours, sometimes as late as 22.00 at night!

A good reputation is built on consistently offering quality and surpassing customer service expectations, and TMC has a very strict quality control process. All models are tested as they arrive and it helps to speed the process up massively and reduce the likelihood of anything being returned. Now, with the improvements online, it is also less likely that the weathering isn't exactly what the customer wants either, as they can specify more information.

"There might be an occasion when something hasn't gone exactly right; no one is perfect. It's how you communicate and correct those mistakes that are important because we don't want to lose any customers," Chris says.

"A lot of the customers are very individual and we just try and cater for what they want," Alex adds. "We had a customer the other day who wasn't happy and it wasn't what he wanted in terms of weathering. He was happy to leave it at that, but I persuaded him to send it back and he gave me the exact details of what he wanted and now he's over the moon."

In-house Expertise

Its stunning location to one side, the greatest surprise during the visit to TMC is the sheer amount of stock on display and stored at the site. It feels like a Tardis and to get that amount of variety in such a rural location is quite rare.

When Chris brought the farm in 2005, he had little comprehension of the size that TMC would grow to and he puts all of its success down to the hard-working staff, most of whom have been there since the

"It's about being in the right place at the right time," he explains. "Not locality but at the point of view of coming out of traditional shops and going into an internet



environment, spurred on by some of the staff. They wanted to do it and have been with us since they were teenagers. Continuity and retention of expertise are all part of the ingredients - when you get great staff you don't want to lose them.

When we set out, we never imagined we'd ever grow to the stage we're at and we're probably in the top 10 dealers in the country in terms of stockholding and sales, and that is something we want to build on. But we are of the same mind as some of our suppliers in that we want there to be lots of choices. and we want there to be lots of dealers. We don't want it all, we just want to provide what customers want with good service and a bit of a smile. And that's it really. We have no plans for world domination."

Weathering is an important part of TMC's history and Chris was one of the first to bring it to market. Back in 2000, when catalogues were filled with shiny locomotives and people liked the 'fresh out-of-the-box' look, it was a customer request that led to TMC's first weathered locomotive.

"We were based in the Trafford Centre at the time and we'd sold hundreds of the Duchess of Hamilton locomotive," Chris recalled. "We were converting them from City of Liverpool, changing the numbers on the cabside, on the smokebox door, and putting etch brass nameplates on. They looked lovely, even then when they had the shiny valve gear. Then a guy asked for one but asked that we make it look dirty. He wanted soot on the top, brake dust on the wheels and generally weathered to make it look like it had been in service. I looked at him confused but went away and did it and when we presented the model to the customer, he was over the moon with it. I have to say, it looked fantastic and that's how we started weathering."

Future Products

TMC is constantly building its ranges to broaden what they offer, and exclusives which find the right niche is an important part of the growing the business. Chris

admits that specials don't sell quite as fast as they used to because there are more manufacturers and more choice, so research is essential to ensure new products are successful.

A key new model for the team will be the LNER Class G5 from Bachmann, which was announced at Model Railway Scotland a couple of years ago. TMC commissioned Bachmann to produce a OO gauge model of the G5 with a fitted speaker and firebox LEDs, due to hit the shelves next year.

TMC also has its exclusive Bachmann Class 40 that will be ready for customers in the spring. Despite being on order for nearly 18 months, it was only announced a couple of months ago because TMC doesn't want customers to wait too long.

Another exclusive comission is a Class 25 from Heljan - the last locomotive to wear BR green. The team is hoping to have the new model here in time for Christmas.

"We don't want to be different for the sake of it," Chris concludes, "But we did want to have exclusive products with lots of customisation options and then have this in-house workshop which, as well as all the things you programme, offers customers the complete package.

"There's always been lots of aspects to model railways and what makes them attractive. You learn so many things. Some people are interested in the running, others the electronics, or trackwork, and some people are interested in the scenery. We are simply here to help them on their way to creating the layout they want."

CHELTENHAN ODEL CENTRE L'WESTERN'

surprised myself when I looked back to find when Dapol first introduced its model of the 'Western' and discovered it was early 2013. I will admit that I am biased with my interest in the WR hydraulics, but Dapol's 'Western' is still one of my favourite OO gauge ready-to-run models and the years have not aged or condemned it.

At the research stage, moving toward the CAD development there was a lot of input from RMweb members in analysing dimensions, shapes and the look of a prototype, which had seen several iterations from different manufacturers failing to capture, with accuracy, Misha Black's attractive design.

Cheltenham Model Centre has commissioned Dapol to produce three exclusive editions, all wearing the classic maroon livery with small yellow warning panels. The intent of both the design and the livery was to match BR's Mk.1 coaching stock in use on express services at the time.

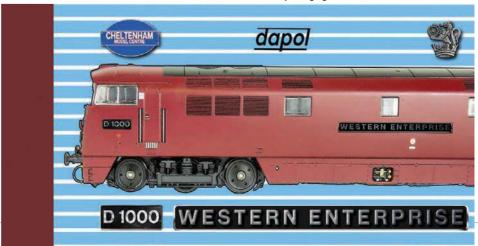
D1000, the first of the class, initially wore its unique Desert Sand livery from delivery in December to 1961 to October 1964 when it was repainted into maroon livery but retained its unique, to the class, cast

aluminium lion and wheel motif beneath the secondman's windows, which has been accurately captured on this model. The model also captures the grille modifications made at this time to the valances below the buffers that were later plated over when repainted into corporate blue livery. The model also correctly features the larger cast nameplates than the rest of the class, which Western Enterprise carried through its life.

D1006, Western Stalwart was released to traffic from Swindon works in July 1962, carrying the all-over maroon livery. It only lasted in this livery for a little of five months before having a small yellow panel added. It was while in this livery that Western Stalwart became the second Class 52, after D1039, to be fitted with a circular Clear View Screen on the driver's side windscreen. The experimental wiper was fitted in November 1965 until removal of the feature in March 1967.

D1039, Western King, was built at Crewe Works and released to traffic in September 1962, carrying the all-over maroon livery with yellow bufferbeams. It was in this condition for less than a year when the more conventional yellow panel was added,

in May 1963, and the yellow bufferbeam reverted to the standard maroon livery. In March of 1964 D1039 appeared sporting an experimental Clear View Screen. Over a period of seven months the experimental wiper was evaluated with mostly poor results; not necessarily because of its ability to clear rain, but the bulky surround was in impediment to a 'clear view'. The screens were removed from D1039 in October 1964.

The production of these models is strictly limited, with 300 models of D1000 and 350 models each of D1006 and D1039, which are now available to purchase at www. cheltenhammodelcentre.com, in store and at its many exhibition attendances.

The model captures the look of the class better than any which have gone before. It has a high specification for its price tag with a purposeful mass of 500g, all wheel pick-up and drive from its smooth and powerful five-pole motor with twin brass flywheels giving exemplary performance. I have a small fleet of these models that have given faultless service over the last six years or so, capable of handling 13+ coach trains.

The model hardly skimps on detail, though, as it comes out of the box with etched roof fan grilles and walkways (correctly offset), fitted etched name and number plates, separately-fitted wire handrails throughout, windscreen wipers, lamp brackets and the most lightly sprung of buffers. The modeller is saved one of the very time-consuming detailing tasks with these exclusive models as the roof panel lifting eyes come pre-fitted, but time can be well spent in fitting the bufferbeam detailing pipes and brake rigging outside the outermost wheelsets, plus cab steps and speedometer cable if layout curves permit the owner to get the best from the model.

Below body level, Dapol have accurately captured the look of the holed disc wheels, which are readily visible on the prototype and still probably the best representation of bogie springing. The model features directional lighting, and cab lighting that highlight the superb representation of the driver's dash and the cab rear.

Access to the innards for fitting an appropriate 21-pin decoder is straightforward with four screws to remove at each corner of the chassis. It is worth noting that the chassis was designed for sound installations with a large space above the chassis block. The black foam can be peeled back from beneath the headcode display to allow insertion of the supplied headcode characters behind the glazed sections. I find these characters a little undersized, so the modeller may wish to source aftermarket alternatives.

Six years on and it's a model I can still love. These latest modifications widen the horizons for modellers - heartily recommended.

BACHMANN 'WESTERN PULLMAN'

♦ The phrase 'rich uncle' has been used for premium train sets before, but most of us won't have such to put one of these sets under the Christmas tree, so we're going to have to take care of ourselves! This is an amazing flagship model for Bachmann with not just the muchacclaimed six-car Pullman at its heart, but it also includes the well-featured Dynamis Ultima DCC system.

The Ultima system may seem overkill for a train set, but it should be considered as the future system for your entire DCC layout. It contains the Dynamis handset and the Pro box, which boosts the power capabilities to three amps with the potential to add further power boosters for a very large layout. Up to four Dynamis handsets can be linked to the same Pro box to cater for multiple operators and additional infra-red receivers to position around a large layout if necessary. The Ultima system includes a USB interface to utilise the evaluation version of the Dynamis Railcontroller Software included within the set. This excellent software allows you to recreate a representation of your layout for controlling accessories such as point motors or signals and control your locomotives or units from a database on a Windows PC. A wonderful feature of this software is the 'RealSpeed' control where you can program movements at selected speeds for specific periods. The database includes all Bachmann and Farish products, which means that if you select a speed of, say

20mph, the software recognises the motor characteristics of a model and accurately reproduces just that. Complex sequences can be built up with comparative ease and be repeated by selecting that macro created by the user. This means that a sole operator of a large layout can start to build up a timetable of movements so that they can just watch trains go by while they enjoy the experience, or take up some yard shunting on a portion of the layout.

This set features a standard oval of track,

ideal for setting the system up and testing all the features and functions of the Pullman unit before setting it free on your layout. We covered the Dynamis Railcontroller software in detail in BRM April 2019 if you would like to delve into the potential of the system further.

Often referred to as a 'Blue Pullman' there were always two distinct variations, the sixcar Midland Pullman, which ran between St. Pancras and Manchester and the eightcar Western Pullmans that ran between

Paddington and Bristol/South Wales.

The previous incarnations of the six-car unit have been in Midland Pullman form, but this model portrays the two Midland sets that were cascaded onto the Western Region in 1967. Soon after arrival, the two units were modified to run in multiple with each other as a 12-car train, which meant removing the lower part of the nose fairing to expose the coupling hook (it was behind a panel in Midland Pullman days) and the addition of high-level multiple working cables. Will we ever see a pair of these running on a layout to replicate the full 12car train I wonder? Bachmann has replicated these changes by altering the tooling of the original model, which means that we will not see further production runs of the original Midland Pullman style of unit for

model reflects the modifications made to the units before this date, with the cutaway section of the nose fairing to permit easier access to the drawbar gear for coupling the units together and the addition of the multiple-working cables to run the electrical and control systems between the two units. A six-car unit comprises of a pair of three different vehicles - a Driving Motor Brake First (DMBF), a Kitchen car (MFK) and a Parlour First (TF). The cars are lettered A-F and have handed electrical connectivity through the special connectors. The connectors between cars C and D are blanks so the two halves operate, in model terms, independently of each other but are paired under the same decoder address and thus respond to the relevant commands together.

Under TOPS classification, the power cars became Class 251, whereas the eight-car original Western Pullman sets had different vehicles – DMBS, MS, TFK and only the TF common to both sets. This is the reason we are unlikely to see eight-car Western Pullman sets in model form anytime soon.

We know this is a good and well-regarded model and, whether you like this livery or not, it is exquisitely rendered in 4mm



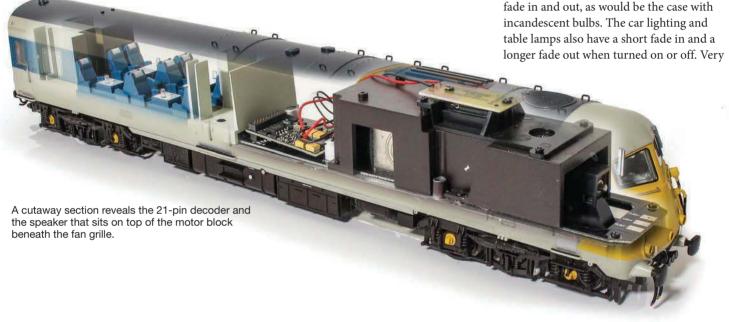

scale. I regard Bachmann's decoration as the best in the market and the clarity of the white BR arrows, Pullman branding and car numbering against the pale grey background is spot on. Not only that, the definition between different coloured areas is perfect. A point to note is that the underframe detail and bogies are not black, but a deep chocolate tone; something I have failed to notice on contemporary photographs until I reviewed the N gauge version of this model in BRM April 2019. I have been fortunate to see some of the stages from the factory

and I have come to appreciate how exacting and how time-consuming some of the processes are. The masking and tampo printing processes are miniature wonders to behold. It is the time taken which makes the quality and the price tag applied to this and other models. When you add the time taken for each of the manufacturing stages and processes, the numbers start to make sense. Even if a kit were available to make such a model, the realisation of how much time would be taken to paint and decorate it to this standard makes it apparent that you would value such a creation at a much higher level than the cost of this model.

Some retailers will inevitably give customers the option of buying the unit without the Dynamis Ultima system, so if that's what you want then hunt around. If you need to justify the price to yourself or others, simplistically you can say that it includes a £300 control system and two £100 sound decoders!

A step onwards from previous versions is the remarkable additional light and sound features of the model. Directional lighting of the head and tail lamps on the nose is a given, but we can add in the controllable coach lights and table lamps too. It is noticeable when selecting the direction of travel of the unit that the head and tail lamps fade in and out, as would be the case with incandescent bulbs. The car lighting and table lamps also have a short fade in and a longer fade out when turned on or off. Very





Bachmann has deployed two Zimo MX644C direct 21-pin sound decoders with a speaker in each of the power cars. No power cars survived into preservation, unfortunately, so the sound files have been synthesised from scratch, referencing archive footage. Also, a basic array of lights and engine sounds will be produced under analogue power.

Turn the lighting on and you'll hear a click of the driver flicking the switch at the leading end of the train. Start the engines in the power cars and one car will start before the other. There are multiple horn sounds to use and different files for different directions determined by which power car is leading the formation. While underway, there are options to increase or decrease the engine revs independent of the speed to assist in giving the impression of a lively start of a heavy train, which gives a pleasing variability to operating the unit with sound. The sounds are truly impressive, certainly

making the greatest impact I have ever seen from an out-of-the-box product.

The accessory pack includes head and tail lamp covers, tension-lock couplings to mount if you wish to run multiple sets and the all-important plastic tongue to assist in coupling and uncoupling the sets together. I have found that it is easier to assemble the two three-car halves of the train on their sides (on a suitable surface). then place onto the track and then bring the two halves together via the electrically blank connectors, as this is likely to cause less damage to the electrical connections. It is unlikely that you will need to access the interior of the vehicles unless you want to carry out further detailing, but the comprehensive instructions do cover this, as matters. You'll want to keep the sound function leaflet to hand to refer to as there are so many functions.

I've enjoyed my brief time with this set immensely. My colleague Phil would prefer to have one in Nanking Blue, but I find this end-of-life livery far more to my taste, but then I love the railway of the 1970s.

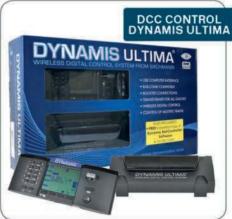

't's rare that we review a model based on a non-British prototype, though when offered the opportunity, on this occasion, we made an exception. Few locomotives gain a reputation that makes them worthy of the railway enthusiasts' 'hall of fame'. This internationally-recognised list sees Stephenson's Rocket, Mallard and Flying Scotsman – among a few others, some would argue – representing the UK. Batting for the US, surely the Union Pacific's 'Big Boy' 4-8-8-4 locomotives must headline? A mechanical testament in man's taming of steam power, these were arguably the heaviest steam locomotives built – weighing more than a Boeing 747 - and a pinnacle in engineering for their time, capable of hauling 3,300T trains up inclines reaching 1.14-in-100.

Hauling ever-longer freight trains at speeds of 50mph became increasingly strenuous for the Union Pacific's 4-6-6-4 'Challenger' locomotives over its main line between Green River and Ogden in Utah. A more-powerful class of locomotive was required. The American Locomotive Company (Alco) devised a new design with an enlarged firebox and increased boiler pressure. An axle was added to each of the driven sets, taking the 4-6-6-4 design of

the 'Challenger' to a 4-8-8-4. The class was a success, though their heavy demand on coal made them less economical as postwar diesel-electrics became increasingly wide-spread. Nine locomotives survived into preservation.

Historic Model

The class of 25, built between 1941 and 1944, was the subject of a model by Rivarossi around 50 years ago and its tooling has been updated several times over the years. Falling under the Hornby umbrella of brands sees the tooling appear in a beautiful, sturdy and large 32in x 8.5in black box – marking the 60th anniversary since the beginning of their withdrawals. Neatly-packaged inside the black foam-padded interior is a 3in-wide front number crest, painted gloss black and silver with a metal stand should you wish to display it. An accessory bag contains a plated lapel badge with the Union Pacific shield – a thoughtful extra.

This celebratory model carries the number 4014, representing a member from the

second order of 10 locomotives in 1941. The final five of the class would be built in 1944. No. 4014 has undergone a recent restoration to main line condition, making this model a timely-release.

Gaining Traction

The key attribute of this locomotive class was its tractive effort. A first port of call before scrutinising the detail, I tested its haulage ability on 90 two-axle wagons, which it handled from a standing start. To test its limit, I increased this to 105, still without wheel slip, though the weight of the train became unstable on the curves. The locomotive's great power is largely because all of its 16 drivers are powered, combined with a locomotive-only weight of 542g.

The locomotive is powered by a large motor, driving worm gears via cardan shafts to two gear towers, one for each of its 'engines', powering the third axle from the front. Strangely, the foremost of these third axles has a traction tyre – something that is being increasingly phased out on new models – overkill, perhaps? Curves of up



to 18in radius don't phase the model, such is the level of articulation. Side-play in the axles of its tender, coupled with a trailing truck and articulated bogie offer freedom to negotiate complex tight-radius points. At full power, the locomotive appeared to run close to, or at its top speed, with plenty of torque.

Scaling Down

Rivarossi's effort to miniaturise this giant of railed steam power remains very acceptable by today's standards. Compromises - chief amongst which, its wheelbase stretched by a scale foot - provide sufficient clearance for model railways. Mould lines are a little apparent, most notably down the centreline of the boiler, safety valves and along the high-pressure steam delivery pipes ahead of the front cylinders, though these aren't so apparent from normal layout viewing distances.

The backhead of these notoriously complex-to-drive locomotives is a one-part moulding - a far cry from Hornby's latest locomotives, but the enclosed nature of the cab keeps it hidden from view. Instead, more recent updates to this model have seen it fitted with cab glazing, anodised valve gear, finer brake gear and refined wheels with reduced flange size. The wheels benefit the locomotive the most - the raised running plate combined with the high axle count makes them prominent below the waistline. The dished front bogie wheels pose a common problem with manufacturers attempting to capture their shape.

Recent iterations of 'Big Boy' have seen a handrails applied, exemplified with this model. The latter are solid wire items and

withstand handling - as does the rest of the detail. An area that has stood the test of time particularly well is the 'pilot deck' - the term used to describe the raised front platform. Curved air-cooling pipes - a feature of earlier locomotives - have a little flash around the edges. The level of detail continues, the protuberant front cow catcher rotating to reveal a buckeye coupling - an impressive feature, though the tooling reveals its age with two air hoses moulded into the plastic.

The application of the satin black over detail is to a very high standard, as is the painting of the safety valves. Prototype photographs show the handrails extend too far on the smokebox door and lack the curvature to the pilot deck. Trimming or replacing with nickel silver wire is a quick cure for discerning modellers. Cab handrails and a spare geared driving axle is provided in the assembly pack.

Collector's Piece

This locomotive is aimed firmly at the collector. A few small flaws aside, in every other respect the model is very palatable by today's standards. Wonderfullypresented in its quality box, Rivarossi's latest 'Big Boy' belies its age. Where it

excels is in its haulage abilities - the very task for which the original class was built. Watching it haul lengthy trains with ease is guaranteed to raise a smile every time it hits your miniature rails. This proves how a good tooling can stand the test of time – particularly important on such an engineering icon as this. I don't model USoutline in HO scale, but would I want this model as a collector's piece? You bet, buddy!





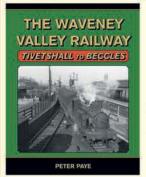

HE WAVENEY VALLEY RAILWAY TIVETSHALL TO BECCLES

PETER PAYE

Opened in part in 1855, the WVR was worked by the Eastern Counties Railway. The line was extended to Bungay in 1860 and the final section to Beccles opened in 1863, when the WVR was absorbed into the GER. The new regime improved facilities, extended some services to Norwich and closed three stations. The 19½-mile cross-country route became an integral part of local life and played an important role during WWI, serving a Royal Naval Airship Station near Pulham Market. Under L&NER ownership the line was to play an even greater role in WW2, the establishment of RAF and USAF bases resulting in a considerable increase in traffic. The

passenger service was withdrawn in 1953 although freight services continued, the route being converted to a light railway but farmers and growers had transferred to road transport. The central section closed to all traffic in 1960, whilst the eastern and western ends survived until August 1965 and April 1966

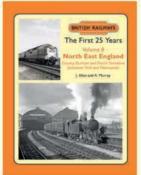

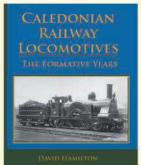

In the eighth book of the series, we start on the ECML north of York and travel up to Darlington, stopping to visit the Works and shed, before continuing to Durham but stopping short of Newcastle. After exploring some of the branch and secondary routes off the main line, we move into the industrial regions. from Sunderland to Hartlepool and Teesside, visiting the new depot at Thornaby as well as the older steam sheds which provided the locomotives that worked the extensive freight traffic. We then turn towards the seaside, starting with the line which forms the bottom edge of our route, between York and the east coast via Malton and what is now the NYMR.



Finally we travel down from Teeside to Whitby and end at Scarborough. Until 1957 the scene had hardly changed from pre-war days but then DMUs arrived and swept away the passenger tanks Dieselisation of main line passenger services started around 1960 and 1961 saw the introduction of the 'Deltics'

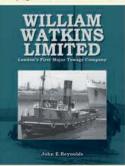


CALEDONIAN RAILWAY LOCOMOTIVES THE FORMATIVE YEARS DAVID HAMILTON

The Caledonian Railway was a major company, requiring a large stock of goods and mineral locomotives, whilst passenger trains varied from expresses linking the major cities to humble tanks operating rural branch lines on relaxed schedules. The first lines of the Caledonian Railway opened in the late 1840s but some of its later absorbed constituents dated from the 1830s. The locomotives varied from the 8ft singles to the numble shunting tank. The author describes all the locomotive built for the Caledonian and its constituents up to 1882. a convenient point to conclude this volume as it marks the retirement of George Brittain. Several significant developments

are covered, as the early engineers struggled to understand the basic principles of locomotive design. Coal took the place of the more expensive coke and the proportions of smokebox, firebox and boiler had to be adjusted. Proper braking had to be installed and even the poor footplate crew had to be treated to more than a thin weatherboard as speeds increased. By treating these early aspects of design in detail, this book will appeal to all those who want to know more about how the Victorian steam locomotive developed.

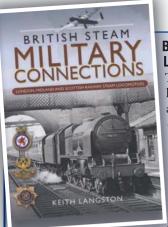

NEW BOOKS as reviewed by Tony Wright



BRITISH STEAM MILITARY CONNECTIONS LONDON, MIDLAND AND SCOTTISH RAILWAY STEAM LOCOMOTIVES, by Keith Langston, published by Pen-and-Sword

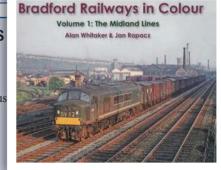
This is a fascinating book, exploring in great detail a subject not often covered in railway books; the close links between the railway and the military when it comes to naming locomotives. It's beautifully produced and printed, on high-quality gloss stock, with every photograph reproduced to a very high standard (some in colour). It's also very well-written; the author having a real grasp of his subject (other than his not knowing the difference between the lamp code for empty stock and an express – page 17). There are numerous views of immense help to modellers showing the individual locomotives carrying the military-themed names. There are also pictures of relevant, formal occasions and of the various characters involved. What I also found most-interesting were the photographs of the numerous warships after which many of the 'Jubilees' were named; the locomotives carrying on the time-honoured tradition of being named after something, named after something else; for instance, the names of mythical heroes/heroines or famous seamen being carried by ships of war,

after which the chosen 'Jubilees' were then named. There are also most-useful histories of the various regiments and members of those armed forces after which many of the 'Royal Scots' were named. I was particularly intrigued by the contemporary correspondence highlighting the LMS' reluctance to name 6127 *Old Contemptibles*. Thankfully, any 'prejudice' was ignored. The day of the £30.00 book (and more) is now firmly with us, though this particular volume represents outstanding value for money. As mentioned, for modellers in particular it is invaluable, and for railway historians it's an absolute must. Indeed, I'm reminded of the 'education' I obtained as a trainspotter, all those years ago, just by learning about steam locomotive names! Thoroughly-recommended.

BRADFORD RAILWAYS IN COLOUR VOLUME 1: THE MIDLAND LINES, AND BRADFORD RAILWAYS IN COLOUR: THE LANCASHIRE & YORKSHIRE AND GREAT NORTHERN LINES, both by Alan Whitaker & Jan Rapacz, published by Willowherb Publishing

These delightful, full-colour pictorial volumes are by a new publisher to me, but they're both a wonderful addition to any railway modeller's or railway enthusiast's library. As expected from Amadeus Press, the printing and production values are all to the highest quality. Unless I'm mistaken, it would seem none of the photographs has been published before. And, what a selection of photographs is presented therein to delight the eye! Most are taken quite late in the piece – really towards the end of steam, with most of the coal-fired motive power being rather run-down and dirty (often running without the names they once carried). New diesels are shown as well, some of these quite grimy, but



also some brand new. This transitional time (now over 50 years ago!) is gaining in popularity among modellers, and these books will be of great help to those who wish to replicate the time. Despite the 'shock of the new', the pictures also show a steam-age railway infrastructure which has all but completely disappeared today; showing, as they do, mechanical signalling, long-closed stations and complex track formations. Without doubt, books to delight the eye, and, for this reviewer, a wonderful trip down memory lane; did I really, like one of the photographers (Derek Phillips), photograph green 'Deltics'? Entirely-recommended.

BRITAIN'S RAILWAYS IN THE 1970s DAVID HAYES

BRITISH RAILWAYS IN THE 1970S, by David Hayes, published by Amberley Publishing.

This is the latest in this popular, pictorial, mainly-colour A5 soft-back series from this publisher. The 1970s was a decade often looked down upon by railway enthusiasts, because it represents the BR corporate blue era (now fondly-remembered?). However, it's a good job that the likes of the author took so many excellent pictures during those ten years, because the variety on show is incredible. It's not just the number of different types of motive power and trains which feature, but also the wide geographical coverage as well. The author/photographer certainly knows his stuff about taking pictures, and the Nikon equipment he used was as good as anything in its day (I had a Nikon F and F2 for my picture-taking, so I know of the high-quality). And, that quality of imagery has been very well-reproduced within the 96 pages. The author's contemporary note-taking appears to be very diligent as well, with accurate dates and locations given. As with many pictures from 40+ years ago, what's also shown is a railway infrastructure now long-gone. For these images alone, I recommend this book to all railway modellers.

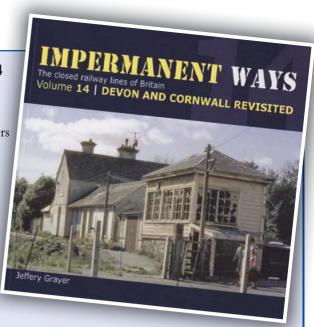

On occasions, there's a morbid fascination for closed, lifted and derelict railway lines. I think it buys into the nostalgia those of a certain generation feel, and this pleasant soft-back certainly taps into that. We should be grateful that photographers pointed their lenses at such abandoned relics - rapidly being reclaimed by Mother Nature. Once-delightful railway locations such as Tiverton, the Culm Valley, Moretonhamstead, Lee Moor, Sidmouth, Seaton and Callington feature within its 127 pages, along with many other sites. Even some stations still open are illustrated, but their current status is now so reduced. The pictures have reproduced well, and the captions are informative and accurate. It's probably highly-unlikely that a current photographer would find anything left at some of the sites to indicate that there ever was a railway present. Remember, many of the images featured herein were taken 50 years ago. A lovely book, if rather sad.

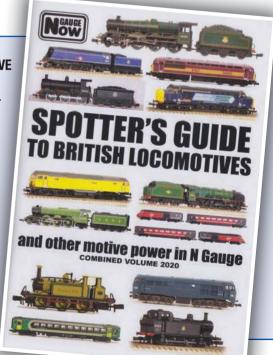
I've mentioned before that, as a past-President of the HMRS I have to express an interest, which means I always praise anything published by the Society very-highly. This lavish volume continues with the highest traditions of works written for the HMRS. It carries on entirely naturally from the previous two volumes on the subject, which described the 4- and 6-wheeled carriages of the London, Brighton & South Coast Railway. For any follower of the 'Brighton', this splendid book is an absolute must for the library; indeed any modeller's or railway historian's library. Once more Amadeus has printed a volume to the very highest standards, on high-quality gloss stock. The informative and accurate text is complemented by scores of rare photographs and excellent drawings. There are also a number of invaluable appendices relating to diagrams, build dates and withdrawal dates of the stock, along with much other useful information. Much of the stock described lasted well into Southern Railway days, so this is not just a book for devotees of the pre-Grouping scene. Some even lasted into BR days, and there are preserved examples still running. I look forward to Volume 4, which also includes Pullman cars. Entirely-recommended.

For anyone interested in N Gauge modelling, this modest volume is an absolute must. Not being a follower of the smaller scale myself, I can only assume it does 'everything it says on the tin, because the coverage appears to be entirely comprehensive. Many of the numerous illustrations appear to be manufacturers' catalogue shots, which (as expected) have reproduced very well. All the variations of each individual model are listed, together with the relevant catalogue numbers. The dates of introduction and current status are also listed. The fact that 54 pages are needed to cover all the various models show how wide the range is. No current prices are given, but these could be obtained by consulting the various manufacturers' websites and catalogues. Most-interesting.

have been involved in the hobby from a very early age, joining The Doncaster ▲ Model Railway Club in 1974. Memories from this time are of Harry Teasdale with his Nonsuch layout, which really entertained the public at exhibitions with rabbits popping out of holes - while at the same time infuriating the more serious club modellers. That was innovation of its time.

Our incredible hobby has numerous aspects that satisfy the many skills and interests of enthusiasts, from collecting models, to building and running layouts from simple to more complex designs. Whatever your skill level or ambition, there is something in this educationally-stimulating hobby to suit everyone. One could argue with the number of new models being released by an increasing number of manufacturers, we are enjoying a very special period for the model railway industry.

This very special period, while very good for the consumer, comes with a number of risks and one has to wonder if it is sustainable. The two big longestablished manufacturers have had their problems but now seem to be getting their act together, meanwhile the smaller and new manufacturers entering the hobby have meant that the variety of product available has never been so great. TMC has no intention of becoming a rolling stock manufacturer but as a long-time commissioner of either limited-edition runs or exclusive tooling, I hope we can continue down that path.

With more players in the market there are more risks. I receive suggestions from customers, or read forum comments about what they would like TMC to do next, which I really welcome but most hobbyists have no idea of what is involved with regard to researching a model, minimum run quantities to make it economically viable, timescales from initial thought to boxes hitting shelves or how the dollar exchange rate can affect the price of a model. Who knows what the next 12 months holds for this country, but I for one will be monitoring the dollar exchange rate because it really could affect the prices paid in our hobby, and not in a good way.

One aspect of the hobby that I used to find frustrating was the perception that model railway enthusiasts were dull and boring. I know an individual who had a serious career in the City who told me the story that when he retired, he was asked the usual, 'What are you going to do with your time now you've retired?'. His answer to the first person was 'Build a model railway', which got a mocking 'really' response. His answer to the second person was, 'Oh I've got something planned that I haven't done since I was 14. It involves carpentry, electronics, painting, studying and recreating the past, plus a few other skills as well'. That conversation went on for a long time. It is pleasing to see that in recent years there have been efforts, with varying degrees of success, by the wider media to represent the hobby in a much better way. I believe this is vital if the younger generations are to take up the hobby, which let's face it, is where our future customers are.

If you go back 20 years, RTR weathering was unheard of. If you go back 15 years DCC wasn't that common, and if you go back 10 years, DCC sound wasn't that common. Now all three account for a significant proportion of sales. I don't know what the next innovation will be, but having had something to do with the introduction of bespoke weathering, my colleagues and I are always throwing around ideas as the hobby thrives on new products and new ideas.

I like to think that TMC has done its bit in investing in the younger generation as half of our team members have been with us virtually since leaving full-time education and we now have school age children on work experience to learn about the hobby. The last one built a working coal drop from Plastikard. Getting the younger generation interested is also key because innovation technology has an important role to play going forward. The demise of the High Street local store, mainly as a result of the internet and unsustainable rent and rates on a low margin business, means that, in my opinion, it is vital that the manufacturers, retailers and model railway societies remain active on social media and internet forums so as to remain visible to all.

I fondly remember my first two locomotives - a second-hand Tri-ang-Hornby Transcontinental Blue Diesel with lights, and R59, a BR standard 2-6-2T in lined green numbered 82004. Then I learnt about retailing during my many years at Hornby before taking the plunge proper with TMC.

I hope there are many good times still to come, including the not-too-long-to-waitfor exclusive LNER G5, where it is great to be associated with a real steam locomotive which is being brought to life by The Class G5 Locomotive Company in Shildon. They are recreating a legend and it's over two thirds of the way there! Railways get in your blood and no wonder with them having had so much to do with shaping the nation, before during and hopefully after our lifetimes. May the very special times we currently enjoy continue for many years to come.
