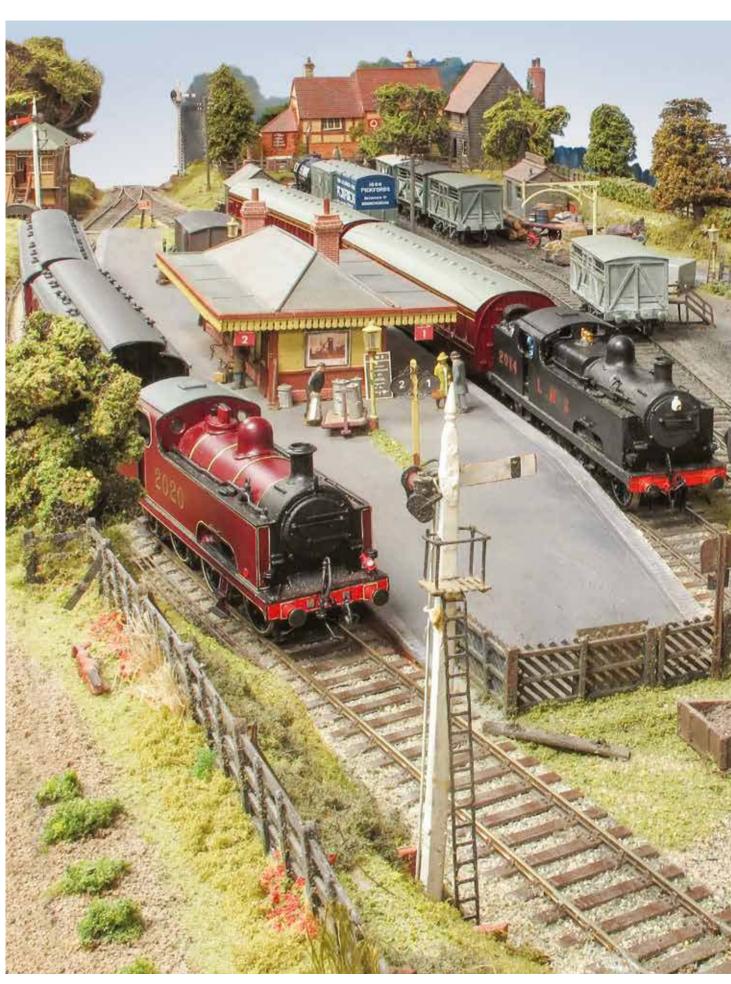
GET THE LOOK

- 1 The EM gauge trackwork is scratch-built by soldering Code 75 bullhead rail to copperclad sleepers. While not as detailed as track made from individual components, the result is robust, reliable and not too difficult to build.
- 2 Fences are from the Ratio range including this distinctive angled version used on Midland Railway station platforms. Details like this allow the viewer to identify the location before a train
- 3 When Broom was built, signals had to be scratch-built from parts now provided by Wizard Models. We have more options now, including RTR models from Dapol, and plastic kits from Ratio, but it's important to check the design as this varied between railway companies.
- Midland 2000 Class are built from whitemetal The 0-6-4T locomotives demand large radius curves thanks to their long wheelbase, so wouldn't be ideal for many layouts. Never a popular class in reality, all were withdrawn and scrapped by 1939.
- 5 Clerestory coaches can be assembled from Ratio plastic kits. Although quite long in the tooth, with care, they make up into respectable models, especially if you add etched handrails and grab handles. If you prefer a metal kit, Comet coach range.
- 6 Most of the buildings on 'Broom Junction' cart beside is a Slater's plastic kit.
- 7 Grounded coach bodies were a very common sight on steam-era lines. You could use an old model with its underframe removed, or the Ratio kit seen here. One benefit of the kit is that a selection of detail items are included in the pack to give the area a bit of clutter. The bicycle poking out from the end is an essential addition for a time when hardly anyone owned
- 8 Crossing the lines with a barrow or trolley would be impossible without this walkway to the end of the platform. Scratch-building by scribing some Plastikard is the easiest way to model this common feature. Be careful to allow for the wheel flanges on the panels between the rails.

BROOM JUNCTION

Set deep in rural Warwickshire, this little station existed largely as an interchange between two country railways, as Charles Stevens explains.

room Junction was one of those rare stations that existed merely to allow passengers to change trains. The station had limited road access, and being situated in a small Warwickshire village, little local traffic was generated. Instead it played a major role in the interchange between Midland Railway's north-south line from Birmingham to Ashchurch and the east-west Midland & Stratford upon Avon Joint (MSJ) route. It also played an important part in the exchange of long-distance goods traffic which used these backwater lines to reduce congestion on more major routes. Until 1942, when a new spur was opened, the junction faced north so that all goods trains from the 'SMJ' heading south had to reverse at Broom. The new spur avoided the station completely and all southbound trains were capable of continuing without stopping.

OUR MODEL

This layout was built by John Cox and based on Broom Junction, but originally called 'Brensham Junction'. He felt it could not be called Broom because of the alterations, compromises and omissions he had made to reality. In April 2015 he passed on the layout and stock to me, as he no longer had space for it in his flat. Construction is very simple, following well-trodden paths, and there is nothing particularly unique in the construction.

But, it was built to a high standard, to EM Gauge, and reflects the norm for a small fiddleyard to fiddleyard layout. It has been exhibited several times locally and will be again in the near future (see page 53 for its next outings).

As you will see from Andy York's excellent pictures there are a number of delightful little details which really bring the layout to life. When the shoot took place, the nameboards had not been changed, they have now!

One of my favourites is the small portable ramp

A pair of Fowler 0-6-4Ts meet at the short island platform, providing connections between the Stratford & Midland Junction line (SMJ) and the ex-Midland Railway line between Ashchurch and Redditch.

for loading livestock, one animal at a time. Not only was this moved around the yard to suit but even from station to station up and down the line as required. None of the small intermediate stations had enough livestock traffic to warrant a cattle dock or permanent loading facilities, so this ramp went where it was needed. Suffice to say, it is glued down on the model and the wagons are shunted accordingly.

COMPACT LAYOUT

Once I'd taken delivery, I took stock of the situation, what I had been given and made some decisions as to the way forward. Fortunately the layout fits in my car and still leaves space for my wheelchair!

I undertook some further research, including a site visit to see what is left at Broom. Considering the line closed in 1962, the bridge remains, but there's little sign of the track and station bar a lot of undergrowth. There are still not many houses about as the area is still somewhat isolated.

I feel that operation of the layout should be as close as possible to what was seen there in the 1930s. You will see from the trackplan that the actual junction with the 'SMJ' is off-scene, and that the bridge marks the end of the modelled area. In reality, beyond the bridge was a scissors type junction, and also a turntable and a couple of exchange/holding sidings.

A little research (see Bibliography) also revealed an unusual pattern of operation for passenger trains. A local train would arrive from Stratford, passengers disembarked, and the train would reverse onto one of the sidings beyond the bridge. Trains from both Birmingham and Ashchurch directions would then arrive to cross in the platform loop. Passengers from Stratford for either direction would then entrain.

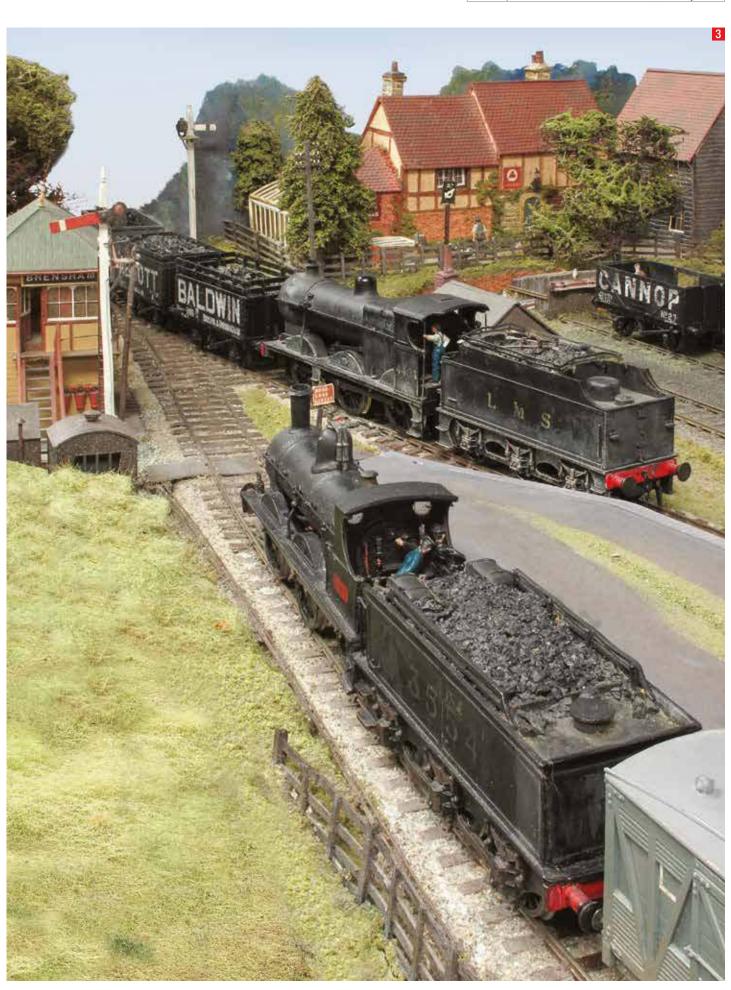
Both long-distance trains would depart, leaving the local train to emerge from the siding. Depending on the make-up of this train the locomotive would either run round using the platform loop or use the turntable after running round to haul its train back to Stratford.

Until 1947, when passenger services ceased from Stratford, this happened about six times a day. This procedure could not be adequately reproduced, as all the viewer would see is the three trains running in and out of the fiddleyards to no apparent purpose.

Further, goods trains from the Stratford direction heading south would have carried out a variant on this procedure, using the turntable to turn the locomotive before continuing towards Ashchurch.

EXTENSION PLANS

Fortunately, some curved baseboards have been donated by Peter Blakeman, one of our group. These will enable the all-important junction to be modelled, and at least

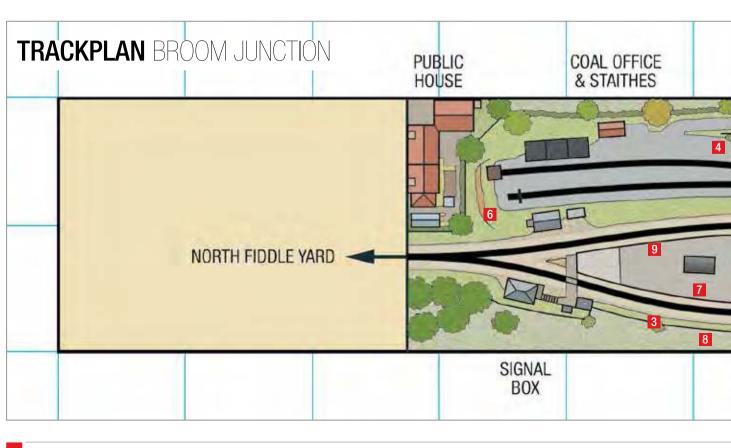

LOWER RIGHT: A redundant van body has found new employment as a goods store on the platform.

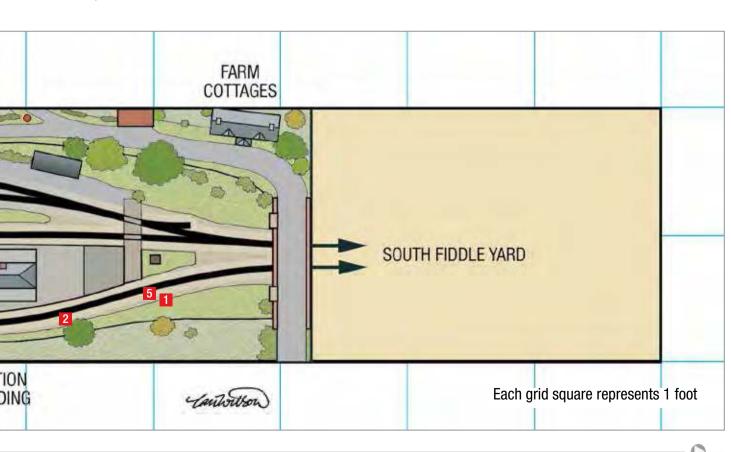




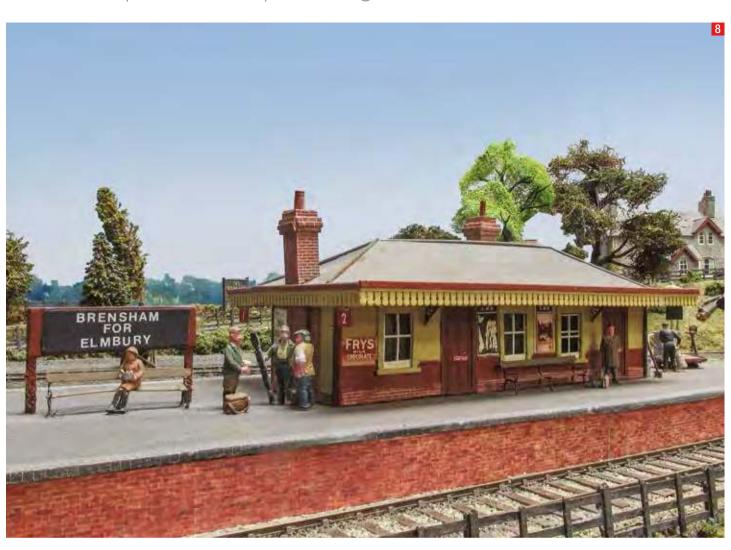

one siding. Thus when we operate the layout the viewer will be able to see the Stratford train held in the siding, whilst the other trains come and go. Further local goods trains will be able to recess whilst faster, more important trains overtake, as was the case from time to time during the working day.

As the model shows, there are virtually no buildings adjacent to the railway, and when the alterations take place, the Inn will remain but the other farm cottages

will disappear to be replaced by an embankment, which is all that remains there today.

In the fullness of time, the fiddleyards will be extended so that longer through trains can be modeled, closer to scale length, but these will have to wait until I have the storage room!

As it stands, the locomotive roster available to use now (see page 54) is sufficient but, railway modellers being what they are, we plan to buy some larger locomotives and convert them to EM. This should not be too much of a problem as the EM Gauge Society provides some very useful materials and information about how to carry out the conversions.

Coaches and wagons are easier to convert, requiring merely a change of wheelsets which can be achieved with little hassle.

The roster has already been increased with more coaches and wagons bought specifically for the expanded operations. Another source has been the estate of John Webb, a good friend and the owner operator of 'Ambergate' (see June **BRM**). A few dozen of his half-complete wagons, all of which are more than suitable, have been donated together with some of his exquisite Midland Railway coaches which required a little finishing and now are available to back date the layout a little further.

JAMES STREET

Steve Wright, creator of this mammoth operational-focused layout, explains how two decades of dedication has resulted in an exhibition favourite.

LAYOUT FOCUS

ames Street' started life as a terminus built for my dad, who sadly passed away, so I kept it and made a larger layout with a high-level four track line and a fiddle yard. Having built the latter, I realised that it took up a lot of space, so I got rid of it, retaining the 'James Street' passenger terminus, and redesigned the rear of the layout to its current form in 2013. I don't have a huge interest in real railways, but I do like to make realistic and interesting-looking models based as much as possible on the real thing.

'James Street' doesn't conform to normal modelling philosophies. It has evolved and developed over 20 years, rather than making a series of layouts that are then scrapped. It has an urban setting, with lines on multiple levels capable of running a large number of realistic length trains at one time. It is designed for all-round viewing at exhibitions to provide interest for both the operating team and the paying public. Trains are always being marshalled in the terminus yards, both freight and passenger, using B & B couplings with their delayed action. Finally, it doesn't have any hidden fiddle yards. Modellers spend a lot on trackwork in these, then hide all their expensive stock away from public view for much of the time. Quite often the fiddle yard section is much larger than the visible part of the layout, which I find a bizarre use of space.

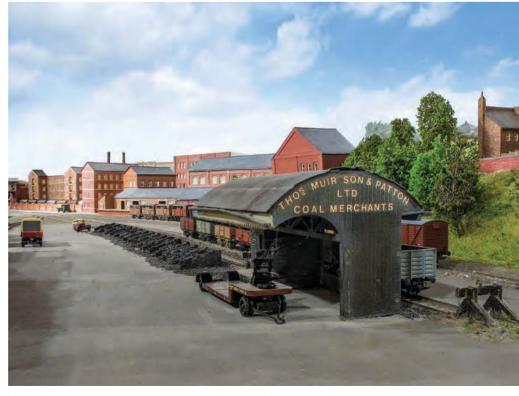
When at home, the layout lives in a garage, in which it just fits width-ways, and about half depth-ways. The remainder of the garage is my workshop for modelling and my hi-fi system (another passion!). The garage has been heavily insulated to enable year-round modelling, with plenty of power points and lighting. However, there are some extra 'scenic' baseboards that cannot be used when at home - these bolt on to the sides of the layout for exhibition purposes, giving a more realistic break of scene to the whole thing. When in transit to and from exhibitions, the individual baseboards are protected by purpose-made plywood packing cases, to prevent damage. The layout just fits inside the van that I bought for that purpose. Due to the complexity of the layout, it rarely gets used fully at home except for ongoing work and any repairs needed now that it is regularly exhibited.

An ongoing project

The layout's construction has taken around 20 years so far; it has also been altered in its overall concept during this time, which sometimes caused my interest to wane a little. In that time, materials and models



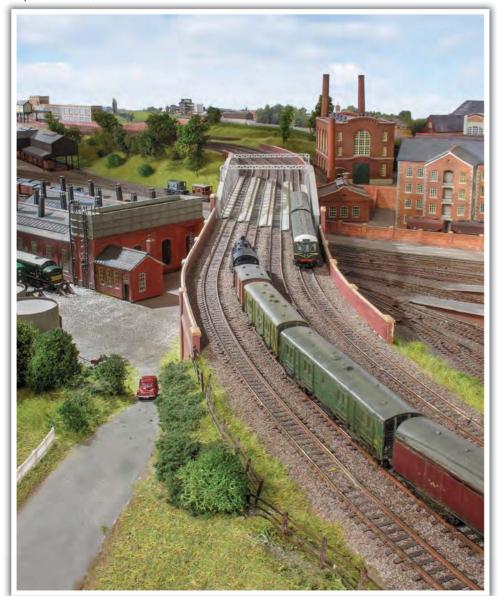

available have changed considerably and I have tried to ensure that the overall standard of modelling has been maintained and improved. I have found it necessary to go back over places modelled earlier and ensure that by judicious updating they match the newer areas.

Once the layout was ready for exhibiting, I needed to find a team of operators. Fortunately, I was able to call on three operators (Dave Cooper, Martyn Daw and Stuart Atkins), who had previously exhibited 'Lynford Junction' with me about 30 years ago. After an appeal to the *N Gauge Journal* for extra operators, Dave Forbes and Nigel Stimpson joined the team. I also met Stuart Devereux and Jeff Gander at my local N Gauge Society Area Group. The operating team live some distance from me; from Ipswich to Bognor Regis, via London and central France!

Transporting, assembling, and stocking the layout takes about four hours to erect, and three hours to pack away. This poses problems at venues with limited access before the exhibition. Experience and the evolution of the layout means I constantly re-design things to save time and space. The control panels were separate, but are now incorporated into the undersides of the baseboards; this not only saves time, but has also enabled better electrical reliability. Given that we are all getting older, I have tried to make the layout as easy to transport and erect as possible. All of the boards travel in wheeled packing boxes, and many are designed to pivot from these transport units onto the frame to minimise heavy lifting. The layout frame is all made from lightweight ply and is very simple compared to many similar structures on other layouts.

Rolling Stock

I provide half (mainly London Midland Region) of the 80 locomotives, 100 coaches and 500 wagons needed, while Martyn provides Eastern Region items, Dave C provides London Midland Region items, and Nigel supplies Western Region through trains. Locomotives represent those on an important, but secondary, main line. Most locomotives are detailed with buffer beam fittings, and we are also adding appropriate headcodes. Trains are used that could be seen in this time period and area. Main line passenger sets are mainly six to eight coaches long, with shorter two-four sets and DMUs for local and inter-regional trains. Freight trains of up to 30 vehicles are made up of shorter B & B-fitted rakes within the train, enable shunting in the yards. Stock is

by the principal N gauge manufacturers, as well as many kit-built items. Most stock is weathered, and this is an ongoing job. The stock used mirrors the mix of vehicles from the Big Four and BR as seen in reality.

Conventional control

The layout is conventional 12v DC. When building started, DCC was virtually unknown, and I have not found a need to change during the life of the layout. Controllers are all hand-built and are individual to each operating position and operator. These control not just direction and speed - many incorporate switches for functions which are commonly used by that operator. The controller may be able to switch electromagnets to operate the B & B couplings, operate pointwork, or switch isolating sections. Extensive use is made of diode route setting, while LEDs are used to indicate the route set, and if there's any conflicting pointwork, these flash to remind the operator to re-set the route after use.

There are seven operators needed; the dockyard; 'James Street' passenger terminus; 'James Street' goods yard; the two-track middle level; the reversing loop and yards; and two operators on the four-track top level. Some areas, such as the locomotive shed at 'James Street', and pointwork connecting the two track to four track lines, need to be able to be used by more than one operator. To enable this, there is some electrical interlocking, but the operators also check with each other that they may use the trackwork required. I normally operate the dockyard, as I'm then outside the layout and can chat to the public about operation and construction without affecting the overall running of the layout.

Trains depart from three areas at 'James Street'; the passenger terminus, the lower goods yard, or the dock yard. The train is then handed over to the two-track operator, who can either circulate it on the middle level double track, hand it on to the reversing loop operator, or stable it in the carriage or freight sidings. The train may also be passed on to the quadruple track operators. These are not the only moves possible; there are many more as the layout also has two reversing triangles. There will also be another option to change locomotives on the middle level once the upper locomotive depot is finished. Complete co-operation is needed by the operators to keep traffic flowing around the layout. It is particularly pleasing to see





multiple trains passing simultaneously on the four-track section, or running parallel with one on the two-track central section. There are plenty of viewing opportunities to observe such moves.

I would have loved to have used 'fiNetrax' pointwork and scale track, but it was not around when the layout was started. However, it would have cost about double the price of the Peco track used, and would have taken a long time to build and lay. There is no doubt the overall effect would have been better, but by how much I'm not sure...I would also have made the reversing loop double track, along with doubling the single line though platform 1 at 'Lynford', as this becomes quite a pinch point at exhibitions. A lot of the little issues that have arisen have only done so since the full operating team has come together and we have worked the layout in earnest at shows. It never gets as intensively used at home as I prefer modelling to operating.

Scenic details

As the layout represents a large town or city, most of the scenery is urban. I like to look at pictures of the real railway and make my

buildings reflect that, rather than use stock items. As a result, I have had to make a large number of buildings and structures - over 25 major and over 100 minor - and while there are a few buildings that have been left as purchased, most are either modified to suit the location or built from scratch. Examples are the large goods warehouse at 'James Street', built from Heljan parts but modelled very loosely on Bishopgate in East London, and the large carriage shed built from five Heljan 613 wagon works kits detailed to resemble typical carriage sheds from across the UK. Many of the townscape buildings are continental or American plastic kits, heavily modified, with flat roofs changed to sloping, roofing tiles changed, with many covered with Scalescenes excellent range of brick papers. I also scratch-built many buildings and structures, such as the terminus coaling tower and ash plant; the former was made from plans in an magazine issue, while the latter was drawn up from photographs as no information could be found, even from the LMS Society.

The backscene is a commercial one by ID backscenes modified to suit, and while certain parts are a little modern, it is the best

one I could find. There is a small country area modelled between 'Lynford Junction' and 'Iona' stations, using a range of differing flock colours and types, with trees made from sea foam. While I built the dockyard and its associated buildings, Martyn has built the model ships and cranes, and is adding figures and cargoes to the area. All stations are named after family members.

The area around 'Lynford Junction' is probably my favourite part of the layout, with the bridges and viaducts around the triangular station providing a refreshing change to most current layouts on the circuit. My operators couldn't see how the vast areas of plywood and track could be turned into something that looked good, but once all of the civil engineering works and detailing was done, the station seemed to fit perfectly in its place. I also like the length of 'Iames Street' terminus, which looks best when viewed at exhibitions from the dock end. I cannot see this in the garage as the dock area is tight to a wall, so the layout can only be viewed from the front.

Developing skills

I have always tried to model to the highest

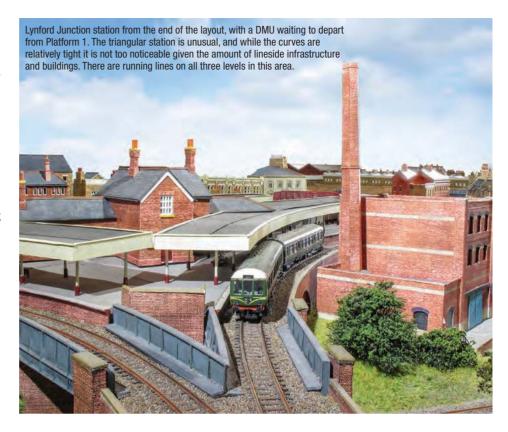

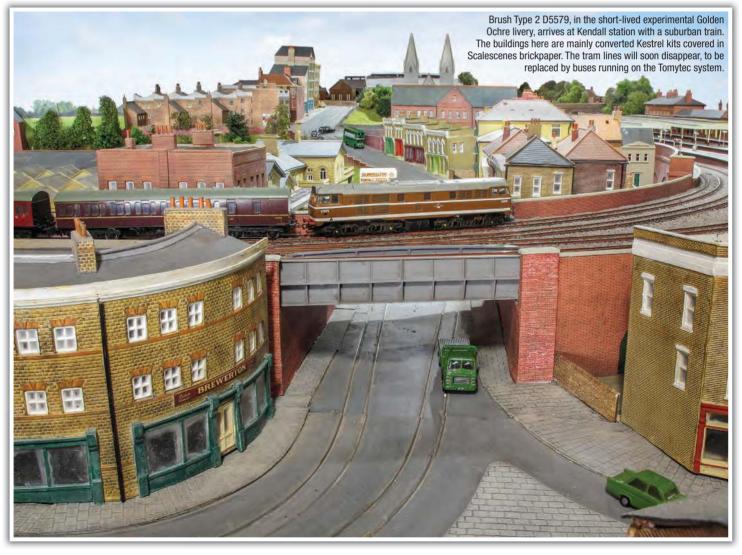


standards possible and have picked up many pieces of advice from other modellers, magazines and the like over the years. My modelling has definitely improved over time, but with getting older, continuing to work in N doesn't help as I now have to use glasses and magnifiers, which I didn't need before!

There are many layouts out there in all gauges that I like for one reason or another, but my biggest draw is to complex layouts that look realistic, and which have been thoughtfully-designed and constructed well. I don't like seeing flat boards, trains charging round tight curves, or unrealistic scenery. I am also a little fed up with small terminus or shunting layouts that all seem to blend into one these days. Some modellers seem to concentrate on sound, DCC, and other details rather than getting the basics right, which is disappointing.

I think it is important to study photographs, books and the Internet to search prototype information and other details. Colour photographs are especially useful, but many photographs available





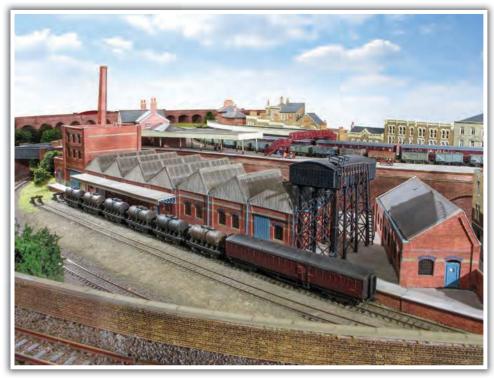
for my timescale are only black and white. Internet Forums have also brought answers to some questions asked. In these days of digital photography, I find it useful to take photographs and then look at them closely. Photographs seem to show any faults or errors better than just looking at the subject. Most of all, try something; it doesn't matter if you don't get it right first time – just try again. Nobody starts out as an expert!

Future projects

As the layout has so far taken about 20 years to build, due to my age, this will be my last 'big project', though I still have enough work to keep me busy for at least two more years! I have redesigned and rebuilt all of the control panels in the last two years after exhibition experience highlighted a few issues, as well as the aforementioned electrical reliability and ease of transport. The road system around the layout was originally to have incorporated a working bus route using buses built on tram chassis, but I have now decided to change this to the Tomix system, and this is also a 'work in progress'.

When these two projects are complete, as well as ongoing detailing work, I intend to extend the harbour area with more berths for ships. I hope to include a coal staithe, a cement berth, a banana unloading berth; and move the oil tanker berth. This will involve not only new baseboards, but also some alteration to the existing harbour area buildings. Martyn is already part of the way with building extra ships and cranes required for this. I also intend to extend the current dockyard trackwork to a new main line, linking it to a new industrial area and colliery; and another locomotive shed area to service this part. This could allow about an extra 200 wagons to be needed... Dave C is also building more of the many signals needed for the layout. These will initially be placed in the more obvious scenic parts of the layout, where their effect will be most seen. I am very pleased with the results of my work, and enjoy exhibiting the layout with my excellent team of operators. I am particularly pleased with the way the team has gelled together, and we always have a good time both at exhibitions and the corresponding nights out.

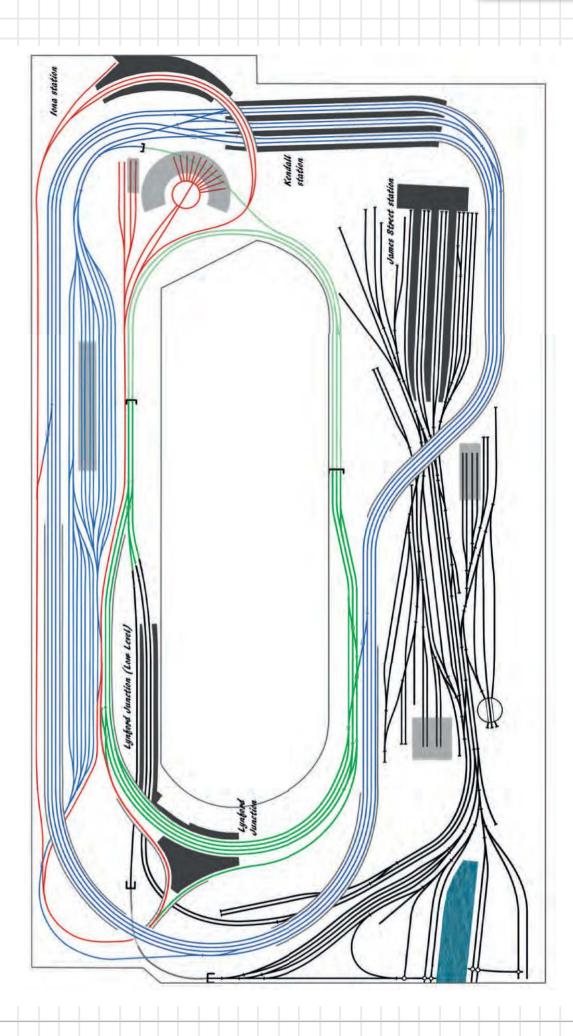

ABOUT THE MODELLER

I live in Essex and am closer to 70 than 60 these days. My dad James and I started with model railways in the 1960s with Tri-ang OO, then I got into Tri-ang TT, which I still think is the perfect scale to work in. After the usual life break, I began again in N gauge as TT wasn't there. Running and reliability were not great, but I persevered and gradually better stock became available. With N, I could get more into a small space, but I always dreamed big, and layouts were started based on 'Finsbury Park', then 'Guildford'. I hand-built all of the points, which took a lot of time, so while doing this I bought another layout to work on and run my stock. This was developed into my first exhibition layout, 'Lynford Junction', while 'Guildford' eventually fell to one side. 'Lynford' was modified a few times, including getting rid of the fiddle yard. I sold it in 1998 and had a spell modelling US railways with my friend Pete Laxton, but then began 'James Street' in the early 2000s.

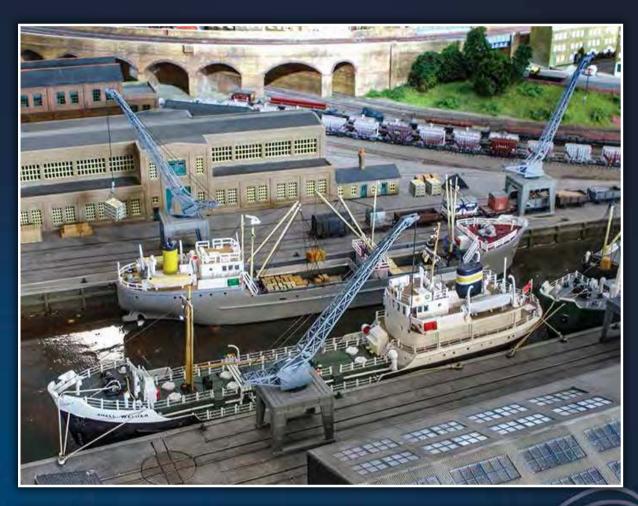

THE BRM 'LAYOUT IN A BOX' PROJECT

ve built many layouts for BRM over the past few years, but the most popular was 'Didsbury Green', a micro layout designed to fit inside a Really Useful Products Ltd. Christmas tree box. I didn't set out to build a micro-layout, but part of the challenge was that it had to be taken to Canada, where it now lives, which meant a strong box was required.

The thing is, I still get asked about it at shows. People liked the size, or at least lack of it. They felt it was a good introduction to the hobby and offered an easier start than

filling a shed or spare room. A couple has even suggested it would suit those living on a canal barge.

With this in mind, we decided to develop another layout to fit in a box. This time, we wanted to avoid building a fiddle yard, but still offer plenty of operational potential. The obvious plan was an Inglenook layout - it needs only two points and a bit of flexitrack, yet these pint-sized shunting puzzles are great fun. 'Casket Yard' has an overall size of 110 x 22cm, which allows it to be stored in a plastic box, keeping the model dust-free, and the materials in one place while building.

All this is good, but where to get the materials from? To help, we have created a complete package including baseboard, track layout!

The result, as you'll be able to see on this month's DVD, is a fun-to-operate model that offers scope for personalisation, something I also look at on video.

The truth is that every time I got to the testing stage in the step-by-step, work stopped for a couple of hours while I enjoyed moving wagons around. For a model of this size, eight wagons is enough and you'll need a small shunter; one of those really pretty industrial ones we've seen appear on the market perhaps, or for the traditionalists, a 'Pannier' tank or 'Jinty'.

Whatever your tastes, 'Casket Yard' will provide you with loads of building and operating fun, as well as teaching you loads of skills that will be invaluable in the future.

TOOLS

Sharp knife

1 and 1.5mm drill bits, and pin vice

Small, flat-bladed screwdriver

The baseboard is made in two halves and once both are assembled, they are glued and bolted together to make a single unit. If you wanted a longer board, you could just buy more modules and bolt them on the ends.

BUILDING THE BASEBOARD



Laser-cut in 3mm thick MDF, the baseboard arrives flatpacked and ready for assembly. Instructions are included and it's worth taking a few minutes putting the kit together without glue as getting things in the right order is important.



A little PVA woodworking glue squirted into each joint is enough to hold the board together. Wipe excess that oozes its way out of the joint with a damp cloth for a nice, neat job. There won't be any need to force parts together; if it won't fit, the chances are you're using the wrong piece, so read the instructions again.



Run some glue along the edges of the backscene and clamp (a bulldog clip is perfect for this) the joint to keep things in line. Although not essential, I like to brace the joint with some strong tape just be on the safe side.



At each end are lozenge-shaped packing pieces to be glued in place. The supplied bolts are very handy to ensure the holes line up properly; just pop them through while the glue dries.



After around half an hour's work, you should have a nice, flat baseboard that is a perfect fit for a plastic box if you want to store it in there.

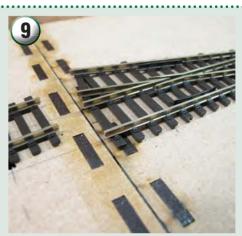
TRACKLAYING



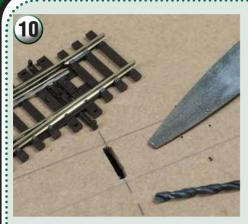
I've drawn a pair of lines 16.5mm apart along the centre of the board to provide a guide for the track. You won't need to do this because the manufacturer has agreed to laser-cut these in on production-run board tops.



Tiny layouts need planning. Every inch matters and you don't have space to waste. Track laying starts with the points being placed in position and then trains moved around to ensure there is enough space for whole numbers of wagons, especially in the head shunt.



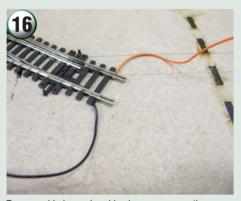
To make things easier, our design has the points straddle the joint between the two boards, so working out where they need to go isn't too hard.



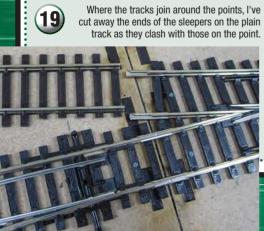
We aren't fitting point motors, but this might change in the future. I've drilled a series of holes where the tiebar will sit. These are joined up to form a slot with files. One day I might need to poke a point motor rod through here and it's a lot easier to make the hole now, even if it's never used.

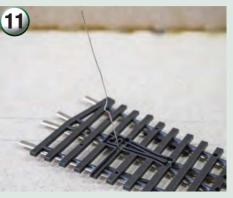


Unless you are very accurate with a hammer, don't try to whack the pins directly in, but use one of the bolts in the kit as a punch. Pin heads should just touch the top of the sleeper. If you bend it, you've hammered the pin too hard.



To save soldering and avoid ugly power connection tracks, we're using Gaugemaster pre-wired fishplates on the end of the right-hand point. These slide on as normal and the wires poke through holes in the baseboard. It works brilliantly, and the connection is almost invisible from the top.

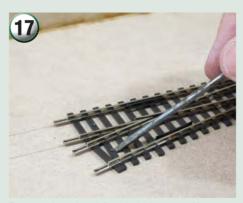




Peco makes provision for electrical switching of the frog. Although I'm not using this, I drill a small hole in the baseboard and poke the wire through just in case.



Track alignment is important for smooth running and a rule placed along the straights will help keep joins neat.



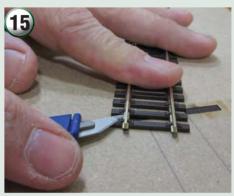
Even experienced modellers don't always get things right. If a piece of track is nailed down in the wrong place, lever the bottom of the sleeper with a small, flatbladed screwdriver using the next sleeper as a fulcrum and the pin will be pulled up enough to grip with pliers to pull out.



Get your eye down to the track level to look along the lines to check everything is flowing smoothly. If you can't get low enough, try using a small mirror placed on the rails to provide a view.



Track is pinned in place so holes need to be drilled in some of the sleepers with a 1mm bit. I find three holes per point enough, with a hole around every six inches in plain track. You might decide to add a few more on curves but this is a useful rule of thumb.



At the ends of the flexitrack, chairs need to be cut from the sleeper to allow the fishplates to slide on. Just run a sharp knife along under the rail and the plastic is neatly cut away.



There are lots of ways to cut Flexitrack to length. I've tried them all and find a pair of Xuron cutters the simplest and neatest option, but you may prefer a fine-bladed saw or cutting disk.



Most importantly, every time you join two pieces of track, push a wagon back and forth over the connection. If it doesn't run perfectly smooth, try to work out why. Lumps and bumps don't fix themselves, so time spent now will make for better operation later.



The layout laid and wired. I'm confident that the wagon can be propelled from one end to the other, at speed, and not jump or derail anywhere.

TOP TIP

How do I get the layout out of the box?

If you store the model in a box, it's a snug fit. Make up a couple of loops from polythene (old plastic bag will work) and put these around the baseboard. Then you can pull them to lift the model, but they are light enough not to damage the scene when in transit.





Smooth the paper down using a piece of cloth or handkerchief as a pad. This avoids gluey fingers touching the surface and leaving fingerprints.



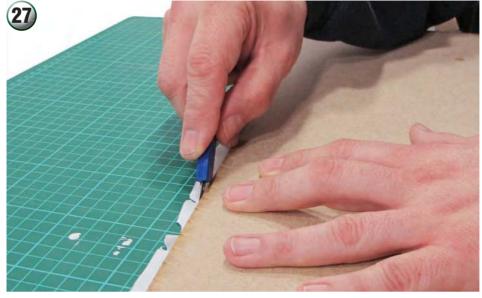
Connect the wires to the screw terminals on the controller and it's time to start running trains. This is a vital step and great fun too. I spend an hour or two testing that everything works with a variety of locomotives and rolling stock, just to make sure all is



Uncoupling ramps clip into the track and must be positioned so the wagons can pass each other when



Using some brown paper, I mask the entire layout so I can spray glue over the backscene and the back of the board. Make sure the area is clean and tidy when you do this. Bits of grit finding their way under the paper will show and can't be removed later.



Trim the sheet with a sharp knife after it's been stuck in place. It's easier to do this now rather than trying to make the sheet the right size, especially if your measuring is as inaccurate as mine.

PRACTICAL BRM



Most layouts, even this one, are longer then a single backscene sheet. I've arranged the joint to be on the right hand side of the model as it will be easy to plant a tree here if I need to hide it later.



Plaster bandage is cut into short strips, then quickly dipped in water before being laid over the paper packing. Overlap the strips and build up at least two layers. Keep a damp cloth handy to remove plaster from the backscene.



The plaster bandage takes several hours to dry - I like to leave it overnight – but can then be painted with brown emulsion to represent earth. This isn't an essential step but if there are any bare patches after the grass has been laid later, at least they will look like earth.



The masking is cut back to the track edges as I move on to building a low hill at the back of the model. Screwed-up paper and masking tape form the basis of the land-form, but you could use expanded polystyrene if you have some



I'm smoothing the plaster with my fingers. It's a messy job, but one that hides the bandage weave. Be careful not to roll up a length of bandage and make a lump. It's often easier to peel this away and discard it than smooth it back down.



Work on the yard starts by coating the area with PVA glue and then sprinkling the Noch asphalt granules everywhere. Pat these down and leave to dry.



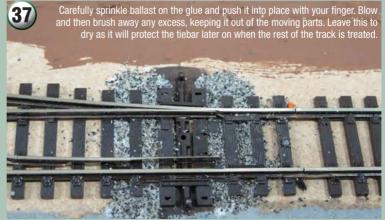
While the plaster dries, I paint the rail sides with Humbrol Track colour (No.173) enamel. Colouring them this way makes the rails look smaller and more realistic. Be careful around the points; don't paint the sides of the switch rails where they touch the others or you'll stop electricity flowing.



Remove the excess granules with a vacuum cleaner and then paint the yard with a Noch Tarmac colour. I felt that using a brush for this (Noch suggests a little roller) might pull up more of the granules, so I used a sponge to dab the paint on.

BALLASTING







At track joints, there can be gaps in the sleepers. Take a spare, cut the rail chairs off and slide it underneath. Don't bother fixing it as the rail will normally trap the plastic sleeper until the ballast is fixed in place.



Now place drops of a 50:50 PVA/water mix with a couple of drops of washing up liquid on the damp stones. The washing up liquid reduces the surface tension so that the mix will flow through the ballast. I find applying the glue on the outside edge of the track is enough - it will find its way to the centre.



Sprinkle ballast over the track and carefully brush it into position. I find that tapping the tops of the rails gently with a wooden brush handle shakes most of the stones into position. Take your time at this stage, neat ballasting greatly enhances the look of the model and on a little layout, tidy working doesn't take long.



Mist some water containing a couple of drops of washing up liquid over the track, keeping it off the backscene. You are aiming for damp ballast, not a pond!



Once the ballast is dry, the uncoupling ramps can be refitted. To allow them to clip into place, the ballast needs to be removed with a small screwdriver. Once happy, I'll use a bit of superglue under them to fix things properly.

GREENERY



Paint the hillside with PVA and allow this to dry slightly so it's tacky. While waiting, half fill the puffer bottle with static grass fibres. Give this a shake, then puff generous amounts over the glue.



Holding a handkerchief over the nozzle, use a vacuum cleaner to remove the excess grass. As well as cleaning up, this will encourage the fibres to stand up straight. Those collected in the cloth can be returned to the puffer bottle for re-use.

PRACTICAL BRM



In the Gaugemaster starter pack, there is some useful grey dust that I dab around the edges of the yard after spreading some thinned PVA glue around. This provides some colour and texture variation for the tarmac. Try to get the dust where vehicles wouldn't be wearing the surface smooth.



It's not just the yard that looks too uniform, the hillsides are a bit plain too. A spray of hair lacquer (don't forget to protect the backscene with paper) followed by a sprinkle of green flock powder gives them some texture and colour.



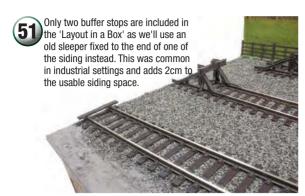


Hedges are ready-made, but too regular for anything found alongside a field. Hack away at them with some scissors to add shape, paint with PVA and then dunk in flock powder.



Lichen is a natural substance that used to be a staple for anyone building model railway scenery. It's fallen out of favour in recent times but is still very useful and there is a packet in the scenery kit. The rubbery structure is perfect for hedges and adding branches to trees, as well as being very resilient to knocks.



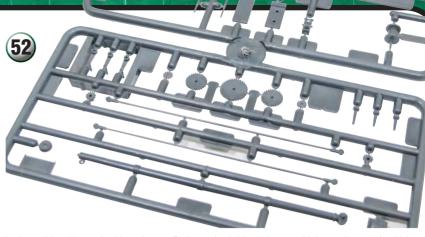




Thread is provided to rig the crane, but it won't hang realistically as it lacks the mass of real rope. The trick is to pull the thread tight, then run superglue on it. As well as ensuring it stays straight, this stops the thread going hairy over time.



Around the base of both models, add a little flock powder to bed them into the yard surface.



In the yard is a shunters' cabin and crane. Both are plastic kits and come with instructions so shouldn't cause problems for modellers. One issue with the crane is that cutting the parts from the sprues is easier with small wire snippers than a knife, although you'll need one to remove any remnants of the sprue.



A yard like this would be too small for a signal box. The points would be moved by hand, but the Wills kit makes an excellent shunters' cabin, or 'bothy'. Leave the windows out until you've painted the model as makes a neat job a lot easier. Don't lose the plastic packing either - you'll need it for the glass.

DCC SIMPLICITY

Being a DCC modeller of the OO Gauge diesel era, I am continually frustrated when it comes to removing the body shells of these rather delicate locomotives in order to fit the decoder and sometimes the speakers.

This task always fills me with dread as I pry, pull and push on the thin plastic body trying to remove it from the chassis. It quite often ends with a broken handrail or damaged paintwork, or even worse a broken body shell on a £300 model. Once done, it's then a fight to clip it back on again without breaking a lug or a plastic locator.

Why oh why can the manufacturers not make it a simple procedure to remove the body by simply using a screw in each corner? Once removed, the body just slides off easily instead of having to break my nails or worse in this risky prying and pulling effort that we have to go through!

This seems to be the case with all of the popular manufacturers; none of them makes it easy. With a little more thought going into the design, surely this could be made easier and less risky?

PLANTING SUGAR BEET

FILLING MADE EASY

Having just read an article in August BRM (Dockside in a Cake Box) and your comments regarding plaster being unsuccessful to fill to rail height, may I comment please? Most plasters and fillers are very hard when dry and therefore hard to finish (one hour to sand a cake box size). Can I suggest a product used in the drywall industry called 'Easyfill'? It is used to fill joints in plasterboard and is so easy to sand, does not shrink or crack and is great for filling to rail level to simulate concrete or general gunk as in engine sheds, etc, or as I have done on my colliery layout that I am building.

Obtained from builders' merchants or DIY shops in 60-minute or 20-minute setting time as a white powder (mix to a soft butter consistency with water), Easyfill is made by British Gypsum Ltd.

Try it, I am sure you will use it instead of 'Pollyfilla', plaster, 'Milliput' (sometimes) and air-dry clay (sometimes). I hope you find this useful.

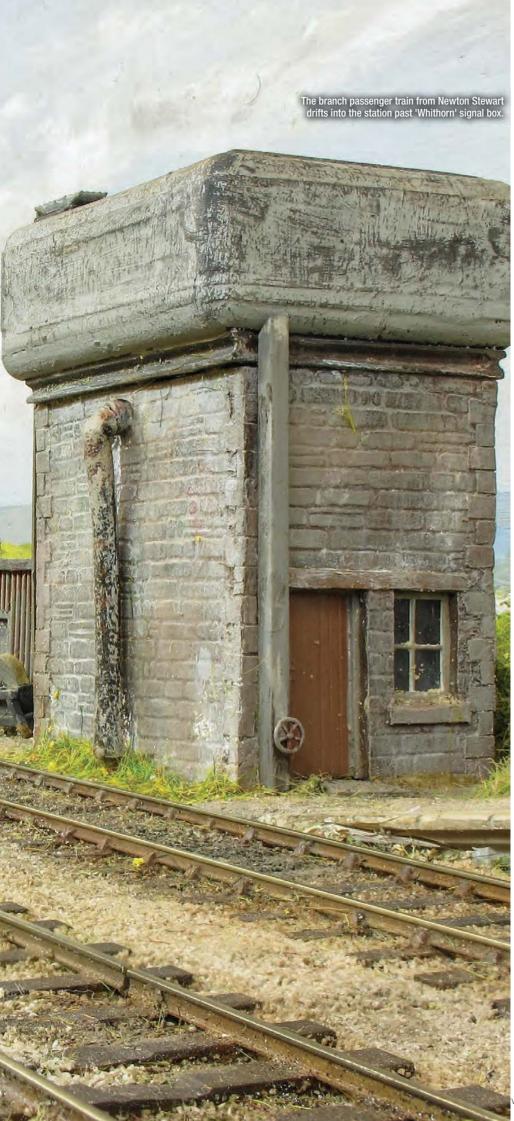


WHITHORN

This finescale layout re-imagines a sleepy terminus on an ex-joint line in Galloway, which harbours great appeal for local freight and passenger services.

n a quiet corner of Galloway in South West Scotland, there ran a nineteenmile-long branch line that was never profitable in all its ninety years existence. Even with nationalisation in 1948, the passenger service on the branch lasted for only two years until 1950. With such a short life, under the auspices of British Railways, there probably wasn't even time to manufacture the Scottish Region light blue totem signs for the station! The line continued on with a goods service three times a week, until the final closure of the branch in 1964. It was one of the victims of the Beeching rationalisation. Nothing remains of the line today, apart from a few earthwork embankments and some cuttings.

The line is the Whithorn Branch, originally known as the Wigtownshire Railway. It ran down to the town of Whithorn from the junction at Newton Stewart, on the now-closed 'Port Road' from Dumfries to Stranraer. When the Whithorn Branch was constructed in 1875, the company directors approached both the Caledonian Railway and the Glasgow and South Western Railway as potential operators. Both companies declined the offer, deciding that there was not enough money in it for them. In the end, an agreement was reached with both companies to operate the branch on a joint basis. This arrangement lasted until 1923, when the LMS took on the responsibilities.

The joint CR and GSWR arrangement to run the line produced the peculiar situation in which the line had CR semaphore signals and GSWR signal boxes.

Modelling Whithorn

So why model such an obscure location? Iain Rice is to be blamed as the line was featured in his book 'Light Railway Layout Designs'. He put out the challenge in the chapter on Galloway that modelling the Whithorn Branch was 'far from being hackneyed in the manner of a similar GW termini'. Thanks to Rice, the die was cast for me to model Whithorn. I had always wanted to model a real location, somewhere in Scotland, and now I had found it. I was also approaching retirement, an opportunity too good to miss to start some serious modelling. In addition, away back in 1961 at the age of sixteen, I had been fortunate to travel down the branch to Whithorn on one of the last steam special trains. When open, Whithorn railway station was the most southerly station in Scotland.

The Rice plan was followed with an early

design decision taken that there would need to be passenger traffic on the model. For me, the running of only a pick-up goods service would likely become a bit monotonous. And being constructed as a light railway, the heaviest locomotives permitted to run on the branch were Caledonian Railway 'Jumbo' 0-6-0 locomotives, or the BR equivalent of an Ivatt 2-6-0 Class 2 locomotive. There was never a diesel locomotive running in revenue service over the branch in all the time of the line's existence. The opportunities for a variety of motive power would have been limited if the prototype had been followed.

The model presumes the line was reengineered at some point, which would then have allowed the running of heavier locomotives. Now a variety of steam locomotives can be seen on the layout, which would never have made it to the real Whithorn. All are based on the motive power that ran on the Port Road and its branches, and include an LMS 2P 4-4-0 and Class 2 Ivatt 2-6-0, a BR Class 4 2-6-4 tank and a Crab. All are from the Bachmann, Heljan, and Hornby stables. As already noted, diesel locomotives never ran on the branch, but on the model a two-car Class 105 DMU, a Class 20, and 26 all make their appearances courtesy of Bachmann and Heljan. There is also a Class 24 from Sutton's Locomotive Works.

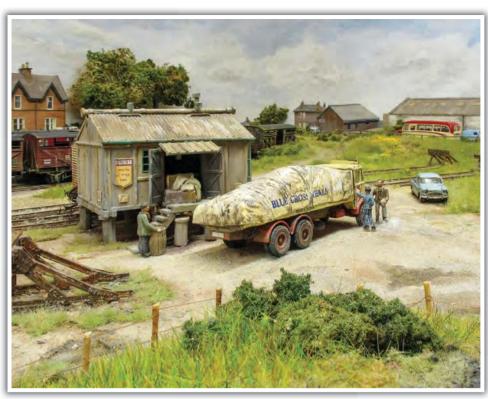
Passenger and goods stock is a mixture of Bachmann and Hornby, all suitably weathered in acrylics and powders.

Gauge conversion

The track was laid originally to EM standards by a P4 colleague. Over time the trackwork has performed extremely well. However, recently joining a small group of skilled railway modellers, who have an award-winning 4mm OO gauge layout, the major decision was taken by all of the team that 'Whithorn' be re-gauged to 4mm OO gauge finescale, using Peco bullhead track.

This decision was helped with the acceptance that the superb quality of the more recent proprietary steam locomotives has made the conversion away from OO gauge that bit more challenging. It was felt that too many compromises were having to be made in any alteration work. On the other hand, re-gauging diesels and rolling stock is, of course, straightforward.

The layout is set out at a viewing height of around 4ft above floor level, and with the higher ground contours at the front of the layout, the difference in gauge is probably not discernible to the majority of viewers.



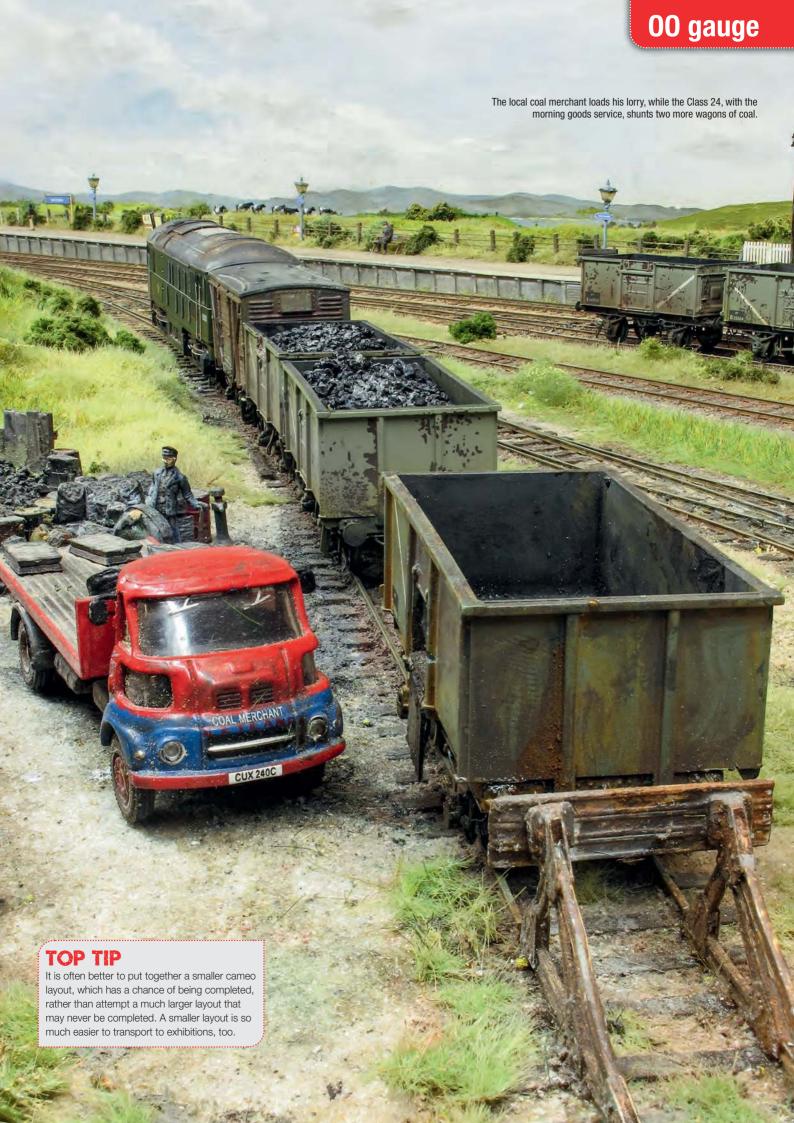
The local agricultural merchant wagon is about to head out from the Provender store to the local farming community with recent deliveries from the railway goods service on the branch.

Control of all locomotives is by the NCE DCC system, and all have the appropriate sound chips on board. The points are controlled by Tortoise motors using switches on a mimic plan of the track layout on the control panel. This is independent from the NCE system. The two lower-quadrant

Caledonian Railway signals are MSE kits, assembled by Stephen Freeman, operated with Cobalt servos. The Caledonian Railway ground shunt signals at the yard entrance are another MSE kit, with integral red and white LED lights, all expertly put together by club member, Chris Manners.



Sprat and Winkle couplings are employed on all rolling stock, with electromagnet uncouplers located at strategic locations to assist the operators in shunting moves.

The layout is operated from the front scenic side. This allows the operator to engage with those viewing it at exhibitions. A second operator runs the fiddle yard. For exhibitions, a sequence timetable is followed, which is useful for both operators to know what happens next. BR operating practice is followed, which adds to the enjoyment of running the layout.

Scenic elements

Another early design decision was that the scenery should dominate the overall appearance of the layout. It was desirable to have the feel of a rural branch line, with trains running through the landscape. The southerly part of Galloway, with its open landscape and low rolling hills, and the Lakeland Fells of England in the distance, had to be recognisable to those who know the area. The hand-painted backscene, created by the author, helps achieve this and concentrates the eye on the layout. N Gauge cattle have been used at the rear of the layout to emphasise the distant perspective of the landscape.

Landscape is not flat, and the variation in ground levels was formed using recycled polystyrene blocks fixed with PVA under a skin of Modroc plaster. The top surface was painted in dark brown oil paint to seal the plaster dust, and then given the static grass gun treatment to build up the varied colours and layers found in nature for the grassed and wooded areas. The period of early summer was chosen as the yellow broom and pink campion are in full bloom to provide colour. Lambs are found on the farm, and the local breed of cattle. Belted Galloways, have been featured, (and recognised by those who know), all to give a local sense of place. Great use has been made on the landscaping of the products by Woodland Scenics and other manufacturers, with acrylic paint and weathering powders. The river was formed with a fine gravel bed overlaid in layers and layers of gloss yacht varnish.

The buildings have all been scratchbuilt using Plastikard as the base material. The station building was drawn firstly as a three-dimensional computer drawing using Sketch-up, taken from researched photographs. This information was then translated into a two-dimensional drawing

MEET THE MODELLER

Whithorn has not been my first attempt at railway modelling. From a teenager, I have had various layouts, all principally in 4mm. Like many modellers, my professional and family life took precedence for many years, but I always maintained a more than passing interest in the hobby, and regularly read railway magazines. It was only on reaching retirement that I decided I should re-engage with the hobby. To fire my enthusiasm, I purchased a ready-built 4mm EM gauge layout, and I continued to model in EM until the recent decision to re-gauge 'Whithorn'. But that is not to say there will not be another EM cameo layout in future! I have found the benefit of membership of the Wirral and North Wales Model Railway Group a great benefit. Everyone has their own specialist skill to the club's advantage, and it has allowed the inclusion of elements of modelling into my layout which might never have been achieved.

using Autocad from which the model was constructed.

The signal box was constructed using Wigtownshire Railway drawings obtained from the Glasgow and South Western Railway Association. It reflects the GSWR signal box that might have been at Whithorn, taking the signal box at Millisle on the branch as a reference. The box was in-situ right up to the closing of the line. The window frames were custom made by York Modelmaking.

The red brick dwelling, Oswie House, still stands in Whithorn. It is a useful guide to where the station was originally located in the town. For the model, the bricks on the elevations were counted from a Google Streetview image, and the model was built to a smaller scale of 1:87 to assist the perspective. At the scale of 1:76, the house visually overpowered the station area. The Provender Store is a Ratio kit-built model, while the Scottish-style farm buildings are generic.

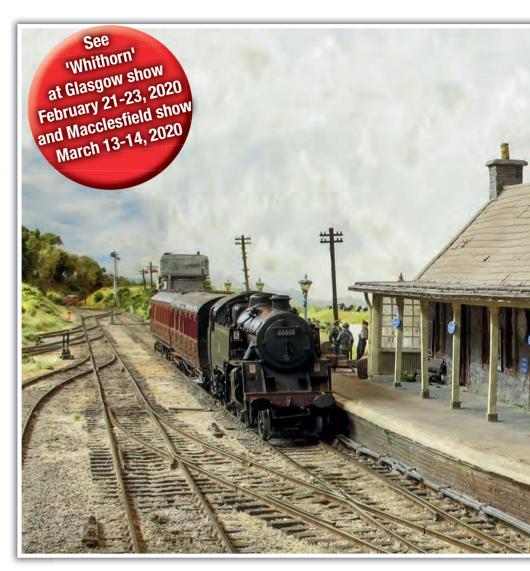
The original creamery at Whithorn was not rail-connected, and the building is now long gone. For more operating options on the model it has been rail-connected. Although no drawings were found for the structure, the model version is a pastiche of the various elements of the original taken from photographs, reflecting the style of the original creamery. The creamery model won a certificate at ExpoEM North 2018 for the best example of use of scratch-building materials. The layout also won 'Best in Show' at that same ExpoEM event.

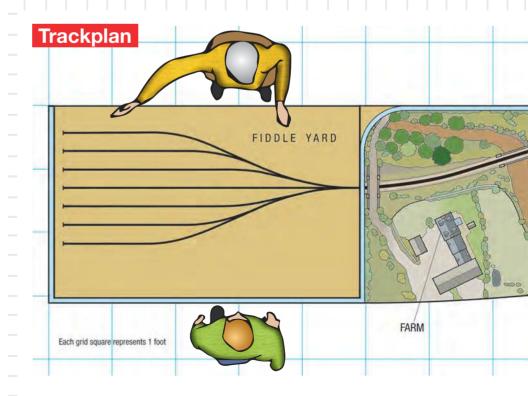
Final thoughts

If asked what has pleased me about this layout, I think it would be the positive reviews the scenery has received at exhibitions. I feel that I have met my original brief of branch line trains running in the rural landscape.

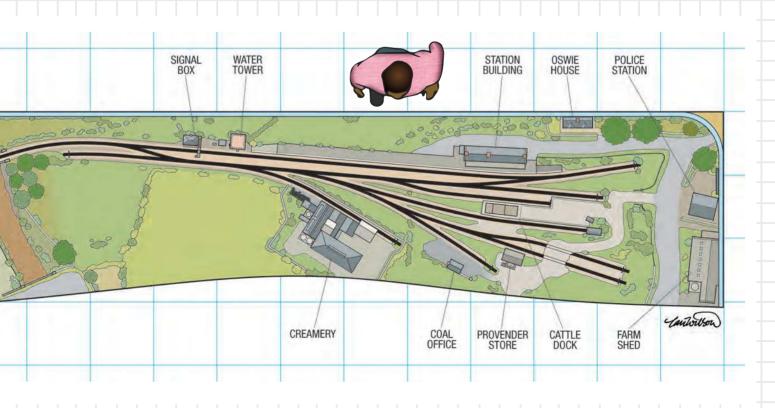
Is the layout completed? That is doubtful - there is always something to be attended to on the scenery, or rolling stock - especially after a weekend's exhibiting!

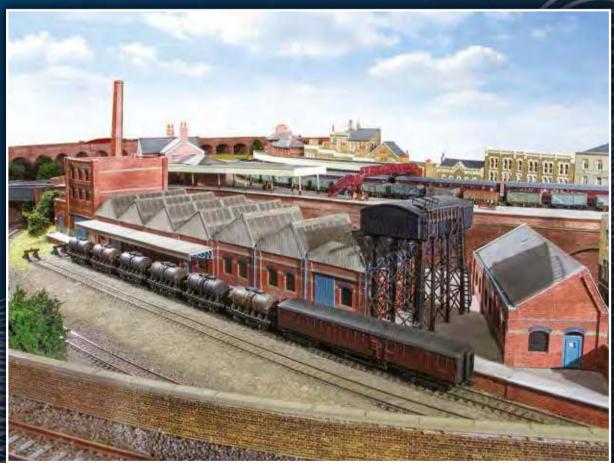

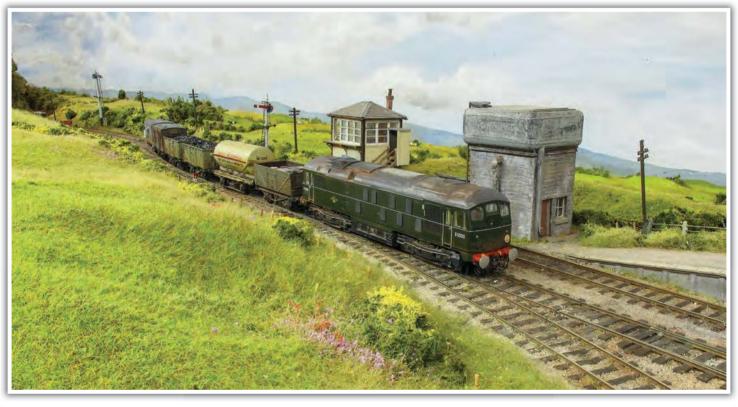




PICK-UP GOODS TRAFFIC AND HOW IT OPERATED

Alisdair MacDonald, creator of scenically-accomplished rural layout 'Whithorn', highlights the benefits of modelling local branch-line operations.

Trom the earliest days of the railways, the transporting of goods and merchandise has been as important as the conveyance of passengers. The movement of goods over the British road network until the 1950s was very much a local affair, over single carriageways and narrow roads. Branch line goods trains then the real lifeblood of many communities and their local industries - fed into the main trunk railway routes across the country. Pick-up goods trains might well have been considered 'the white van men' of their day, dropping off and picking up freight for a great variety of commercial and domestic customers.

Under the 1947 Transport Act, the British Transport Commission was set up by the Labour government to provide for a coordinated, and integrated, transport network throughout England, Scotland and Wales. It included the nationalisation of the railways. The Act provided for British Road Services to be the principal carrier for long distance road haulage work - private hauliers being restricted to journeys of up to a 25 miles radius from their home bases. This restriction on private hauliers was later amended in the 1952 Transport Act, when the restrictive radius limit was lifted.

In the mid-1950s, the incoming Conservative government began to invest heavily on the road network in Britain. Motorways were constructed, new bypasses provided around many towns, and main trunk roads were upgraded. This investment was to the benefit of the burgeoning private road haulage industry, who could now offer a door-to-door bespoke delivery service for customers, and these were often at more competitive rates than those offered by British Railways. The business opportunities for British Railways was further reviewed by the rationalisation in the 1963 Beeching Report.

The halcyon days of the pick-up goods was coming to an end. It would continue to serve the more rural communities of the

country where the road network was not yet improved and where the minor branch lines were located away from the larger centres of population.

Typical operations

Pick-up goods trains were principally found in the more rural areas of the country, operating from the main line junction stations along rustic branch lines. Many of these secondary routes had already lost their passenger services.

The main line freight service would drop off - or pick up - goods wagons for the branch service at the junction station along the main line. The pick-up goods wagons would be sorted by the branch line locomotive at the junction to minimise shunting movements at each station, or yard, down the branch. Destination labels, clipped to the solebar of each wagon, or chalked on the wagon sides, would show the pick-up goods train crew the final destination of each wagon. As most branch line services followed a fairly regular timetabled pattern, the train crew probably had a fair idea where each wagon was heading. Equally, the crew would know which wagons would require to be picked up from the branch sidings for their return journeys back on the main railway network.

A pick-up goods train crew would usually consist of three men - the locomotive driver, the fireman and a guard. The guard would act as shunter, and would be responsible for ensuring that parcels were dropped off, or picked up, at the intermediate stations and sidings along the branch. Many of the goods-only branches were operated by the 'One Engine in Steam' principle. Once the train was on the branch, the crew were out of contact with the main railway network.

The pick-up goods would run at a leisurely pace, many of the wagons would not be fitted with a continuous brake, and those that were fitted would probably not have their continuous brakes coupled up while running on the branch.

Modelling pick-up goods

A pick-up goods train can bring variety to a layout, especially if a branch line terminus is being modelled. The train can often look better if the rake has a maximum of, say, seven or eight wagons with a brake van. In the imagination of the operator, the pick-up goods will have made its way leisurely down the branch to the terminus station, dropping off and adding wagons on the way. Not all wagons in the rake will be headed for the

terminus as these will have been collected up the branch. This gives the opportunity to include wagons in the goods train, which have no relevance to the facilities available at the terminus station. For example, bulk grain wagons could be included that have been collected from a distillery up the line. There might even be empty 16T coal wagons, the odd 12T van, or even a cattle wagon in the rake.

The layout of the trackwork at the terminus on the layout will require a run round loop to avoid the locomotive being trapped. There would not be a second locomotive available at the branch terminus to release the train locomotive. In the shunt moves at the terminus, the brake van would necessitate shunting in such a way that it would end up at the back of the train when it finally heads up the line to the fiddle yard when shunting is completed. The loop could hold the outgoing pick-up goods when it is ready to depart, should a second train arrive in the platform road.

The consist in a pick-up goods train depends upon the set-up of the layout. If the layout is a harbour scene, there might be a need for fish vans, or tank wagons to service the diesel-powered fishing boats in the harbour.

A country branch will have wagons delivering agricultural equipment, fertiliser and also wagons available to take away the farming produce to the town markets. A cattle dock might be provided for a rake of cattle wagons for the movement of livestock, and a Provender Store could be the base for the local agricultural merchant.

A must for branch line operations are 16T mineral coal wagons, either for local industries, or for the local coal merchant. These would be regular deliveries, with return empties back to the main line. On a layout, the operator could remove the coal

loads from these when no-one is looking.

A more modern twist would be to use VGA vans, or similar, which would not require a brake van.

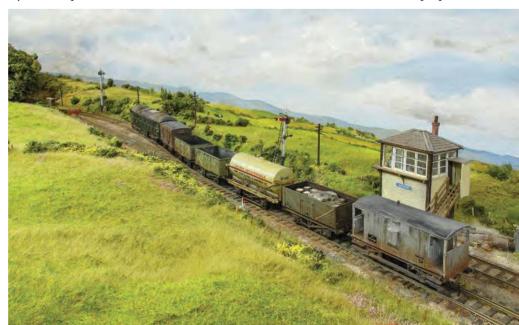
During the steam-era it was normal for pick-up goods to have used smaller locomotives because of line weight restrictions and coal consumption. Pick-up goods services would rarely employ a 4-6-2 'Pacific' locomotive, with the exception of serving intermediate yards on a main line, where a large locomotive might be used on a 'running-in' turn. Depending on regions, ideal locomotives would be an 0-6-0T or Ivatt Class 2 2-6-0. For transitional and diesel-era modellers, an 0-6-0 shunter would suffice, although classes 20, 24, 25, 26 and 27 are suitable alternatives.

Uncoupling considerations

The train crew would work to the simplest of routines for the stock moves in shunting, and for the coupling and uncoupling of wagons. On a layout, the strategic use of uncouplers would make shunting operations that bit easier for the operator. There is a quiet satisfaction in seeing wagons being uncoupled and dropped off in a shunting operation with what appears to be no human involvement. However, care is necessary in locating the positions of the uncouplers to make sure they are in the correct locations. It might be prudent to retro-fit uncouplers to a layout after a few trial shunting moves to enable them to be positioned in the correct location.

Conclusion

A pick-up goods can give a reason and purpose to a branch line layout and its operation. It allows the introduction of wagons which might not have any particular relevance to the layout, while providing an excuse to run short trains with a purpose.





AIRBRUSH ESSENTIALS

Michael Russell troubleshoots common misconceptions with the setup and use of this modelling tool, for more realistic effects on your models.

EQUIPMENT NEEDED

Apart from the airbrush, you'll need an air supply and a lead to connect the two. You'll also need a spray booth situated in an area of good lighting, with access to the outdoors so you can vent the fumes. You can spray outdoors in summer if there is little wind,

but this may be an infrequent luxury, only when the variables of the weather are in your favour

A good quality face mask is essential. You'll also require gloves, paint and thinners to match the paint. Enamel or acrylic

paints are the two common types used. Don't forget the need to handle the model. You may be able to rotate it on a turntable/'Lazy Susan' or improvise a handle from an everyday object. I often find that toilet roll inserts do the job, but you can purchase specialist sprung handles.



irbrushing can seem like a dark art to the beginner, but the secret is to have a basic understanding of how the device works and how to achieve a balance between the parameters involved. To find a problem in any complex system you need to test each, in isolation. Some of the remedies may seem obvious, but it's often simple issues that cause the majority of problems.

HOW IT WORKS

Air is passed over an opening and paint is forced out due to the Venturi Effect. The paint atomises whereby it mixes with the airflow to form a mist. This only happens if you balance the air pressure with the paint thickness, though. The thicker the paint, the more air is required to achieve a spray. In general, I spray in the range of 10 to 20 pounds per square inch (psi).

COVERAGE ISSUES

If your paint is too thin it will be blown around on the surface of the model. Conversely, if it is too thick you will end up with a rough, sandpaper/orange peellike finish. The paint should be about the consistency of milk. All paint, unless it has been specifically prepared for airbrush use by the manufacturer, will require thinning. If you have problems achieving the correct consistency, you may like to use pre-thinned paint such as that provided by Vellejo in its Air Jet range.



TESTING PAINT THICKNESS

Put the paint in first and fill the cup half full. Add thinners to raise the level to about three quarters of the cup. Ensure that your paint is well-mixed in the paint cup. I use old lollypop sticks as stirrers. To test the consistency of your paint, dab some onto a piece of paper. If it spreads out a little and holds its shape, it is just right. If it spreads out and soaks in, it is too thin. If the paint doesn't want to come off the stirrer, or sits in a bead on the paper, the paint mixture is too thick and more thinners must be added. Pour the contents of the paint cup back into the paint pot and start again.



AIRBRUSH TECHNIQUE

It is important to spray correctly. You should start the airbrush spraying before passing it over the model. Keep the airbrush in motion at all times when passing it over the model. Additionally, it is important to get an even coverage. Spray into corners and recesses first to ensure that places where paint is less likely to fall will have sufficient coverage.

If you spray too much paint onto one spot then the paint will run. If this happens, the resolution is to get a lint-free cloth soaked in thinners and wipe the run away while still wet. You will now need to carefully respray this area, being mindful not to repeat your mistake while at the same time blending it in with areas that you haven't over-sprayed. It is not easy to do this and so it makes sense not to over-spray in the first place. Therefore, you should always aim to spray several thin coats rather than one thick one, leaving the model for a few minutes between each coat.

When weathering you sometimes need to spray in one place without moving the airbrush in a sweeping motion. In this case, I start spraying onto a piece of card. Position the airbrush and the card so they are to one side of the place on the model that you want to spray. Spray onto the card, and when you are happy with the level of paint being expelled, move the airbrush slightly to direct the flow onto the model.



COMMON ISSUES

Problem: My airbrush won't spray.

Resolution: Don't overlook the obvious. I was once called out to a supposedly broken personal computer, when the owner had forgotten where the on switch was because they had pushed the device against a wall! So, is the electricity supply working and is the socket you are using okay and is the socket switch turned on? Use a device you know is working to check the socket. Remember that not all compressors make a great deal of noise when in use or if the storage tank is full. Ensure that your compressor is switched on. If you are using a high-powered compressor then use a high wattage rating extension lead and keep the cable run to a minimum. Last, check for leaks in the air-lines. If air is expelled from the connection to the airbrush handle you know that the problem must lie within the airbrush. You can try loosening this connection and listening for the hiss of the escaping air. If the problem is inside the airbrush then the air valve, which is in the handle of the airbrush, could be faulty or require adjustment.

Problem: Air is reaching the airbrush and the trigger moves, but nothing comes out.

Resolution: The most likely cause is that the needle isn't moving with the trigger. Unscrew the rear cover, push the needle home against the seating and tighten the chucking nut. If this doesn't work then your air pressure is too low for the consistency of the paint. Also check that the air inlet in the paint cup lid is not blocked.

Problem: The trigger won't move.

Resolution: Your airbrush has seized solid or has been poorly reassembled. Paint residue is the most likely explanation, but there is a last ditch remedy that you can try. Remove the rear cover, undo the chucking nut and try removing the needle. If it won't come out with moderate pressure then don't force it. Try soaking the tip of the airbrush in thinners for 24 hours. Try something strong like cellulose thinners. (Note this substance gives off strong fumes, so carry out this exercise in a well-ventilated

area such as a garage or shed). If you still can't remove the needle after this treatment, I would recommend returning it to the manufacturer for an overhaul. If it works, proceed to carry out a full clean and ensure that you are more vigilant with cleaning in future.

Problem: I've started spraying and the paint is spattering on the surface or the airbrush has stopped spraying.

Resolution: The nozzle will be clogged with paint or the paint is too thick. You could try increasing the air pressure, but I wouldn't recommended using more than 30psi. You will need to clean the airbrush by following the instructions in my cleaning article that follows and reload with paint. See the hints and tips section for issues that may have caused the problem. Don't take a shortcut and withdraw the needle to wipe it down when the airbrush is loaded with paint, otherwise paint will get past the seal that stops contamination of the airbrush body. If this happens, the only fix is to do a deep clean, which necessitates an almost complete disassembly. This is not so straightforward and may require specialist tools. The other option is a return to the manufacturer or dealer, which is likely to be expensive. So, don't take shortcuts and carry out a paint change and clean only in the prescribed way.

HINT AND TIPS

- Never exceed the air pressure that your equipment was designed for. Check the documentation that was provided by the supplier.
- It is more economical to use a compressor than compressed air canisters.
- Avoid getting cellulose thinners on areas of the airbrush that have rubber seals.
- Acrylic paint dries quickly and even a short spraying session can cause problems. Try using a retarder to lengthen the drying time.
- Use acrylic thinners for acrylic paint rather than water.
- Using a fresh pot of paint for each spraying task will minimise the chance of clogging due to lumps in the paint, although you can pass the paint through a filter to make sure.
- You will never achieve a good finish if you can't see what you're doing - always work in good
- A bent needle is likely to manifest itself in a poor/ dual spray pattern and the only alternative is to buy a new one. Be aware that a dirty airbrush can exhibit the same traits.
- Always ensure the model is primed before spraying or brushing with acrylic paint.

CONCLUSION

You'll need practice to become proficient at using an airbrush, so don't be put off if your initial results aren't what you expected. The potential results are worth the effort. Keep on top of the cleaning and, at least while you practise, any issues are likely to be restricted to those connected with the paint and its interaction with the sprayed surface. Seek the help of a mentor if you really get stuck. Expect to return your airbrush to the manufacturer periodically for a major service and only perform a deep clean if you know what you're doing and have the correct tools. If your airbrush has had a lot of use, some parts may be worn and will require replacement.



AIRBRUSH MAINTENANCE GUIDE

Tired of your airbrush not performing as it should? A service and clean of its fragile internal components might be required, as Michael Russell demonstrates.



n airbrush is unbeatable for a quality paint finish and I wouldn't like to be without mine. They involve more effort than a brush but, as with most things in life, you get out what you put in. So, with a bit of extra exertion, and a small amount of your time, you can raise your modelling to a

What puts many modellers off is the problems that arise after they pick their new airbrush up for the second or third time, because it doesn't seem to behave anymore. This can be frustrating and off-putting.

Likely, this is down to poor maintenance and a lack of understanding of how an airbrush works. This article will deal with the former.

There are three steps to successful airbrush use - keep it clean, keep it clean, keep it clean! The time to perform the cleaning is straight after a spraying session and by that I mean at the end of the day when you come to pack the airbrush away. I cannot emphasise enough the importance of cleaning the airbrush as soon as you have stopped using it, because dried paint is much more difficult to remove. If you've

ever attempted to wash up after you left all the dishes from last night's party then you'll have some idea what I'm talking about! Deal with the issue in a pro-active fashion to ward off problems. Prevention is better than cure.

AT THE END OF A SPRAYING SESSION



Before you disconnect the airbrush from the air supply, you can flush most of the paint away. First, empty any spare paint out of the cup. Then, remove the cup and give it a wine clean with a tissue or old cloth.



Now reattach the cup and fill with thinners to match the type of paint you were last using. Increase the air pressure to 30psi.

whole new level.



Spray the airbrush onto some newspaper until the thinners comes out clean. Ensure that you are wearing your face mask for this operation, as usual.



Now place a finger over the end of the nozzle and spray. This will reverse flush your airbrush causing the air to exit via the thinners in the cup. Be careful not to splash yourself with thinners when doing this - you may wish to reduce the air pressure.



Now empty the cup of thinners, shut off the air supply by closing the regulator and disconnect the air line.

AIRBRUSH DISASSEMBLY



Take the airbrush to a table where you can work more easily, preferably over a large tray to catch errant pieces.



At the opposite end to the nozzle you will find a rear cover; this should unscrew.



You will find a nut that holds the needle in place and allows it to move with the trigger mechanism. Undo this and remove it.



Withdraw the needle by pulling on it away from the airbrush body. Be very careful to pull it in a straight line and don't apply any lateral pressure or you'll bend the needle.



At the other end of the airbrush you'll find a needle cap. Unscrew this.



You should then be able to see the nozzle. Use the special tool supplied by the airbrush maker to remove this. Take care with this part because it is small and easily lost.

CLEANING THE PARTS

You can perform all of the following cleaning steps using a paper towel or cloth (except where I have indicated otherwise) soaked in thinners to match the paint you last



Wipe down the exterior of the airbrush and the exterior of the paint bowl. I always find that I get some overflow from the latter.



An ultrasonic cleaner can be used to clean the nozzle, but unless you can afford, or have access to, one of a decent quality, you might find the results disappointing. Alternatively, just swill the nozzle around in a solution of thinners to match the last paint you sprayed. Cellulose thinners can be used for really stubborn deposits.



The needle should be cleaned by drawing it through your fingers from the thicker end to the tapered end. Be careful when handling this item. The end is sharp and easily bent.



The needle cap can be cleaned by drawing it over a corner of the cleaning material as though it were a napkin ring.



Brush the nozzle cap with a hog's hair brush and wipe clean.



Remove any blanking plug that covers the hole opposite the paint bowl. You can fit the bowl on the right or left based on your preference.



Take a pipette and dribble thinners through the airbrush. Do so through each orifice.



Fit an air trigger to the end of your air-line and blow out any thinners left in the airbrush. Do this at a low pressure (circa 20psi). If you haven't got this equipment, you can use compressed air in a spray can or an air blower as used to clean the sensors of SLR cameras.



Blow out the paint cup feed using the same compressed air source.

REASSEMBLY





Reassembly is a reversal of the disassembly stage. It is important to ensure the needle is fully home against its seating - check this by looking to see that it is poking out of the nozzle. Pull the trigger and ensure that the needle moves back with the action. If you use the airbrush when the needle isn't fully home, paint can enter the body of the airbrush and lead to major issues.

CONCLUSION

These instructions are for a double action Iwata airbrush, but you will find other airbrushes are very similar. Single action airbrushes are even simpler.

If you are about to start using your new airbrush, ensure that you implement this preventative maintenance regime from the outset, that way your airbrush will work as well as the first time you used it.



USEFUL TIPS

- If you are changing paint you only need to perform the first stage 'at the end of a spraying session'.
- To avoid losing any parts during disassembly, use a small tray to hold the items as you remove them. Work over a large tray in case you accidentally drop anything.
- If you bend the needle you have no hope of straightening it and your only option is to buy another. If you can't afford airbrush 'downtime', keep a spare in stock.
- Only use the manufacturer's tools and never tighten more than hand tight.
- I wouldn't recommend using pipe cleaners or other rodding tools. It's too easy to scratch and damage surfaces or leave stray hairs behind which will foment the creation of blockages.
- If you use an ultrasonic cleaner, to prevent damage, don't use it to clean the air valve in the handle of the airbrush.

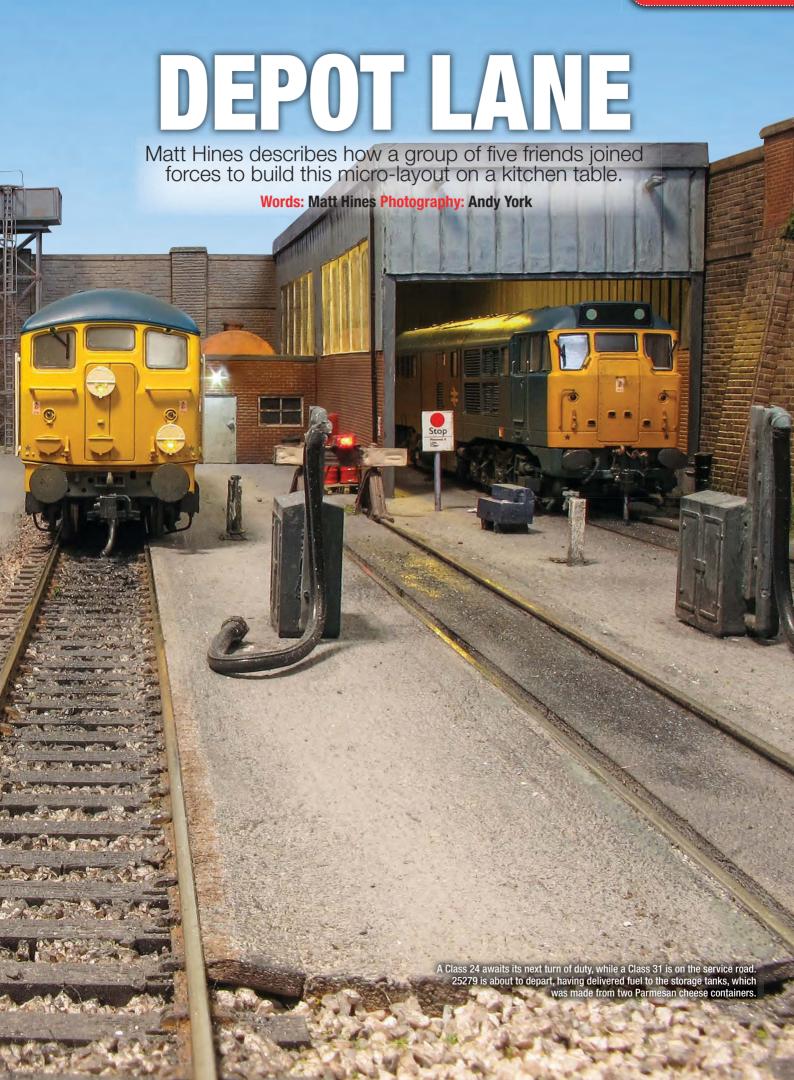

LAYOUT FOCUS

he idea for 'Depot Lane' was conceived in December of 2016, which was to be our first group project. We are all relatively experienced modellers and we have all built our own personal layouts and helped each other, but we had never built a joint project. We had many ideas spinning around for larger projects we could build, but first we decided to create a smaller layout and see if we could succeed in building something together, without strangling each other!

The design brief for 'Depot Lane' was simple - create a layout that would be fairly simple to construct and condensed in size, yet still be interesting for all of us to operate and the public to watch. We discussed many ideas and the key features that we wanted to include. Simon, our in-house design guru, took all these ideas and came up with the plan we have today. Five tracks containing a locomotive maintenance shed, fuel point and storage tracks, all fed from a single sector plate. A single point was also added to create a 'run around' loop, enabling us to shunt tank wagons delivering fuel and add a lot more interest to the layout.

Our 'club room' is actually Shaun's kitchen, with all of our modelling taking place at his kitchen table. This provided us with the first of a rather interesting group of design constraints for this project. Firstly, the layout had to fit onto the table. We also wanted it to be quick to set up so it will serve us well as a test track, but we also wanted it to be easily transportable so any of us could load the layout into the boot of our cars and take it home. The solution was simple - keep the layout to a single board including fiddle yard. When deciding on the length of this board, we actually started by measuring the kitchen table as this would play a major factor in determining the size of our layout. In the end we decided on a length of a little over 4ft and a depth of 14in.

The layout is purely DCC, but when we first designed and built the layout, we were all using different control systems. Since then we have acquired the same system, which is the Lenz Set 100. In terms of connecting the control system up to the layout we use a simple 'phono plug' commonly found in the music and video industries. We have all gone fully 'universal' with this plug with every person now using it. We even went as far as retrofitting them to our own personal layouts. Therefore, any club member can connect his own system to this layout, future layouts and indeed any



without having to alter wiring.

All of the stock found on the layout is diesel traction. However, 'Depot Lane' is multi-era, so we can run anything from 1970s diesels onwards. Typically, a viewer will find common BR blue locomotives, such as Class 20s, Class 25s or Class 37s. In the modern setting, traction examples include, but are not limited to, Class 60s and Class 66s in EWS/DB Schenker liveries or anything DRS. However, because of our clever design, it's been filled with East Midlands Trains DMUs, Mark's RTC experimental stock, and at one point one of my HSTs made an appearance (yes, you read that right!). The greater majority of our stock is from Bachmann and Hornby. All of it is DCC-fitted and the greater majority is fitted with LegomanBiffo sounds.

Depot Lane is multi-era so we can run anything from 1970s diesels onwards.

Weathering our stock is an on-going project. However, where possible we only try to run weathered items on 'Depot Lane'.

Layout design

All of the buildings and scenery are entirely scratch-built. The buildings were completed by myself (fuel point), Shaun (fuel tanks) and Simon (shed and water tower). When we designed the layout, we didn't want anything to tie the layout to a particular era, therefore we opted out of the typical industrial or retail park background and

instead went for a retaining wall. This was constructed by Shaun using only scraps of Plastikard sheet he had lying around. Upon completion of the layout, everything was weathered by myself using an airbrush.

As previously mentioned, the layout can be easily running in any era without having to make any major changes to it. When changing era, all we have to do is swap a couple of road vehicles and obviously the stock. This actually allows us to change the era 'live' while continuously operating the layout at a show. Usually we will start the

day by running our BR Blue stock and, after a couple of hours, we change the stock over. After a few more hours, we swap back and the process begins again. That means that the audience at a show can view the layout several times in a day and see different stock every time! It is for this reason that we don't foresee any reason why this layout wouldn't meet our needs. Even if we retired it from the show circuit, it'll still fulfil our needs as a test track for many years to come.

Final thoughts

Without wanting to burst our own bubble, we are incredibly pleased with the layout. We have regularly discussed the layout and there's nothing that we would change or think we could have done better. We have had much positive feedback from followers on RMweb, the viewing public at shows and also personal visitors, so we must have done something right! What impresses us the most is how much detail, interest and operational fun we have managed to pack into such a small space! We believe our layout is a testament to micro layouts and inspirational to those with not much space to model in.

WHAT IS THE 'MRPG'?

Model Rail Projects Group (or MRPG) is a small band of friends sharing a common interest in model railways. We are a private group, which means membership is by invitation only, consisting of five members. Simon, Shaun, Paul and I (Matt) are the founding members of the group and the builders of 'Depot Lane'. Last year we welcomed our fifth member, Mark, to our merry band. What we pride ourselves on is the fact that first and foremost we are friends, and this comes before any projects or club business, therefore we have no politics creating unnecessary drama. We meet every Monday, where we gather around Shaun's kitchen table and do our modelling. We share our own projects, drink tea, eat biscuits and just talk and have a laugh together. We have all been modelling for varying lengths of time, some much longer than others. But we all have our own skill sets we can bring to the table that enable us to learn from each other.

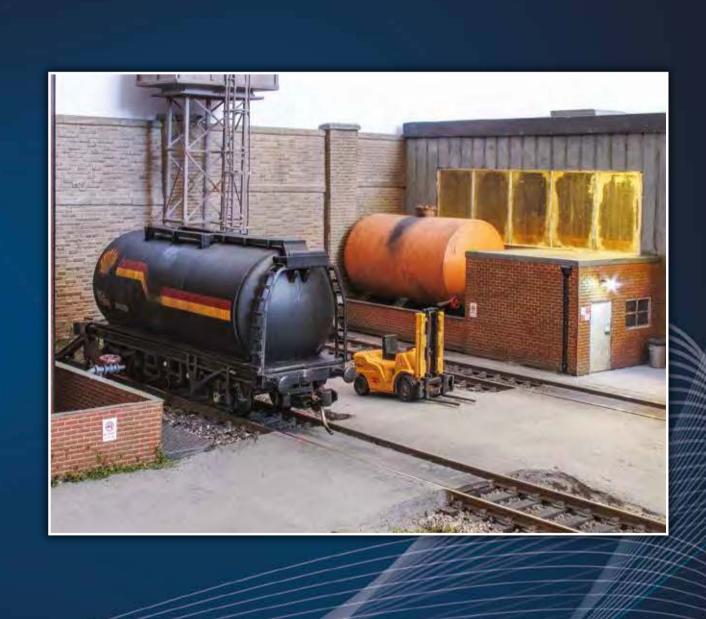

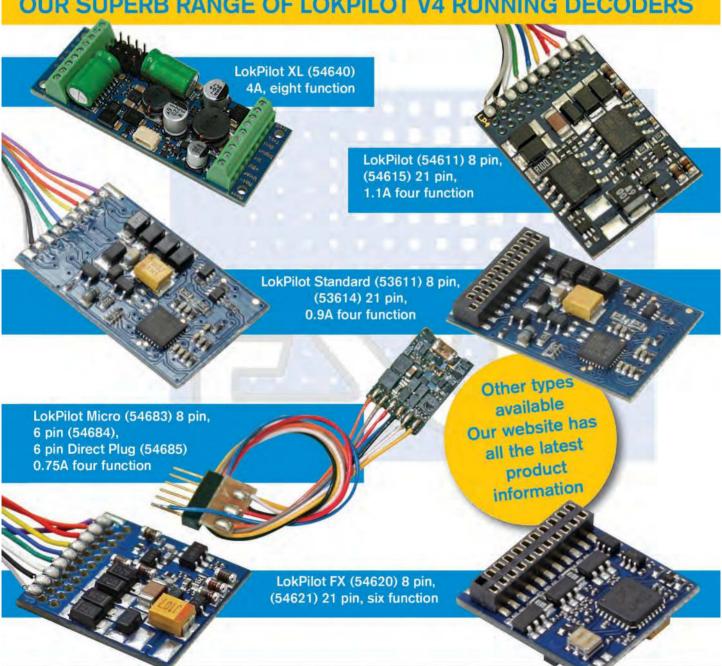

MODEL FOR LESS

Look after the pennies and the pounds will take care of themselves. Howard Smith explores 10 steps to keep our hobby more wallet-friendly.



Preveryone likes a bargain, right? When it comes to non-essential things, like our hobbies, it's nice to know that we can keep these going and make our budget stretch further, even in an era of increasing prices.

The rising cost of model railways hasn't gone unnoticed. Regularly, I receive emails from readers who bemoan the increase in price of RTR locomotives, coaches, wagons or scenic accessory items. It can't be ignored by many, whose modelling skills haven't reached their potential and rely on new accessory purchases to save building an equivalent kit. However, for the savvy modeller, there are many solutions to help reduce your annual modelling spend, and leave a few spare pennies to purchase that 'must-have' new locomotive, coach, or wagon. Here are a few solutions to help make your annual modelling budget stretch just that little bit further.

BE A SAVVY SHOPPER

Retailers are competitive with branded product names, though some more than others. It pays to do your research beforehand. Plan ahead, too – model auctions take place around the country on a regular basis. You don't need to be present to bid – simply visit their websites to place your bid beforehand and/or bid on their websites during the auction as each lot comes up for sale. A glance at the advertisers' section of the magazine will highlight a few auctioneers. It pays to take a look at other larger online auction websites occasionally, too, such as eBay, where second-hand bargains are plentiful.

DIG AROUND

Many model shops have a good selection of products 'front of house', but I've been behind the scenes at many of these and there's a wealth of second-hand bargains to be had. It's often simply a case of asking and making an offer. From damaged, yet easily repairable second-hand items to 'as-new' older items of rolling stock or locomotives which have never been run, it's often a treasure trove that waits to be uncovered, though more often than not, access to these can be restricted, so simply ask - you've nothing to lose. Don't forget to barter on price!





PRE-ORDER

'If in doubt, leave it out' goes the saying. But, if there's a new limited-edition exclusive ready-torun item from a retailer or smaller manufacturer you really want, it's often best to pre-order to receive a discount, these typically vary between 5 and 30%



POSTAGE

Postage is often overlooked. We take it for granted, but if most of the purchases for your hobby are made online – as so many are – it pays to plan ahead to reduce those 'last-minute' small orders where postage soon accumulates. Planning ahead on a project allows you to place a larger more cost-effective order. If you're struggling to make up those last few pounds on your order to qualify for free postage, think about adding modelling consumables such as glues, or non-perishable goods, such as solders or drill bits which are always useful to keep in stock.

RECYCLE

Nothing quite keeps costs as low as something that's free. Ask around and it's surprising how many people have something that's surplus to their requirements. From left-over project off-cuts of plywood lingering in their garage or shed to older die-cast vehicles in their lofts, many are prepared to donate these if they see they can be of use to someone who's enthusiastic.



TRADE

You might be great at building wagons, but not so great at building baseboards. However, someone you know might be great at carpentry, but not such a dab hand at building kits. Many modellers build for each other on an exchange basis at comparable costs, particularly in clubs, and save money accordingly.



SUBSTITUTE

Nothing quite beats a branded model paint for your models for authenticity of colour, but D.I.Y. stores are a good source for acrylic paint, particularly small test tubes that are useful for painting skies or ground terrain before grassing. Many a modeller has ballasted their track sidings with fine Chinchilla sand to represent ash ballast, or used fine twigs from the garden as a realistic base for a tree structure. It has even been known for dirt from the garden to be dried and sieved to make a fine terrain powder, all wallet-friendly options.



BE WISE

Does your small shunting plank layout require the latest DCC system, or would a more-affordable entry-level unit suffice? Is it wise to build a large layout? Some layouts cost significantly more than others, too, depending on how many buildings or kits you intend to build. Scratch-building keeps costs low and a largely-grassed landscape with little track won't cost anywhere near as much as one with complex track, intricate infrastructure and large buildings - all guite obvious, really. Simply scale your ambitions to your budget.

THIN-OUT

We can hoard many things, some of which we believe might be useful 'one day'. But can we remember every item we have saved for the time we'll need to use it? Where rolling stock or locomotives are concerned, unless these have sentimental value, it might be worth selling to upgrade, or using the proceeds towards a new project. You can list these online, or, visit your local model shop and see if an offer can be made to put against a new item.



TEAM UP

The shared costs of building something in a group, particularly a large layout, make it more costeffective per head. The same applies to locomotives and rolling stock on a large layout, where members can pool stock resources to produce an impressive spectacle. Ploughing your own furrow with the purchase of locomotives and stock can be enjoyable if you have the funds, but don't ignore this option, particularly if you build many different layouts or change your stock regularly.







The Warley National 2019 show was busy, its the atmosphere brimming with excitement as new announcements were made from manufacturers and retailers alike. With many sample products on display and new announcements made, it can be difficult to remember who's producing what and when it's arriving - even if you went to the show!

Here's a round-up...

OXFORD RAIL

Oxford Rail LNER J27 0-6-0

Decorated samples of the J27 were on show, expected to arrive mid-2020. Models will be supplied with a set of etched fire irons and fitted with three-link couplings. A 21-pin DCC decoder will fit in the tender, with provision for a 'sugar cube'-style speaker. There will also be a DCC sound-fitted version.



BACHMANN

Decorated samples of its MR/LMS 1P 0-4-4T locomotive were on show, and an early 3D print of its Quarry Hunslet in 009 was demonstrating progress. Joining this was an engineering prototype of its Class 319 for N gauge, V2 for OO gauge and a decorated sample of its GWR 94XX 0-6-0T.

HORNBY

The manufacturer unveiled plans for five more liveries for its Class 66, ahead of its full 2020 product announcement on January 6. New liveries include:

Partial assembly is required and we're told it can be adapted to handle OO scale containers. Also seen on its stand was a model of the German railgun 'The Leopold', now reintroduced under the Rivarossi umbrella.



ACCURASCALE

Announced was a four bogie, eight-axle KUA nuclear flask wagon, as used between Royal Navy nuclear submarine sites and Sellafield. CAD artwork for the models has neared completion and models are to be retailed as a twin-pack, with the option for a simple conversion to EM or P4 wheelsets.

A 3D-print of its Class 37/6 was displayed, alongside EPs of its forthcoming 'Deltic', PTA/JTA/JUA hoppers nlus 3D-nrints of

its JSA coil wagons.



HELJAN

A first working prototype of Heljan's second OO9 gauge locomotive, the Lyton & Barnstaple 2-4-2 'Lyn' was on display. Announced a year ago, tests have identified modifications required before the model proceeds to the decoration sample stage. Delivery is anticipated for Q3, 2020. On display was also an EP of its Mk. 1 coach with B4 bogies, decorated samples of its forthcoming newlytooled Class 33/0, plus EPs of its newly-tooled (refurbished) Class 31/1 and Class 117.

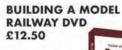

HOW TO... MAKE A CLASS 20/3 FROM AN RTR MODEL

For two decades, these machines have worked a variety of trains. Jack Taylor shares a cost-effective method for converting Bachmann's model into the distinctive sub-class.



irect Rail Services' English Electric Type 2s never fail to turn heads because of their extensive modifications. By 1999, DRS had 15 modified Class 20s on its books: 20301 to 20315 inclusive. Modifications included external long-range fuel tanks, new WIPAC light clusters and reinforced cab windows. Eventually the fleet received DRS' multiple working sockets, mounted in triangular fixtures that gave the locomotives their distinctive 'noses'.

All locomotives gradually received the latest 'Compass' livery, though some were sold or scrapped before repainting. The last three active members of the fleet - 20302, 20303 and 20305 - see use for a few months each year on the York-based RHTT (Rail Head Treatment Train) circuits; this year

reportedly being their last. Many differences between locomotives exist, including 20303 Max Joule 1958 – 1999, with one nameplate unusually residing on the cab front. This oddity persuaded me to model the locomotive in its current state.

For railway modellers, the main RTR manufacturers have been reluctant to produce the sub-class. This allowed accessory manufacturer Shawplan to develop an extensive range of etches to aid the modeller.

After many years of wishlisting, Bachmann announced it will produce the Class 20/3 sub-class, 20 years since its introduction. In the meantime, Class 20 models from Bachmann or Hornby can be acquired for little and combined with etched parts to produce distinctive models.



Any donor model from Hornby or Bachmann will do. Bachmann's model is the most detailed, and this general release of 20217 in BR Blue livery was acquired secondhand. The model can now be disassembled, carefully prizing out all removable details with a screwdriver.

Work in a well-ventilated space when using paints, glues, solvents or fillers to avoid breathing toxic fumes. Working outside is ideal, but a spare room with open windows is also suitable. Leave the model there overnight to allow full hardening/drying. An industry-grade respirator mask must also be used and fitted properly before spray painting.



Modifications began by using a sharp craft knife. All raised detail on each end was removed, leaving a small amount of material for sanding smooth. Any recesses and holes were filled with Squadron Products White Putty, using an old screwdriver to spread the putty.

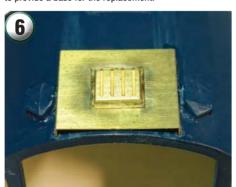
Pieces of styrene can also be superglued in larger holes, such as in the recess left by the nose end headcode panel. All bufferbeam detail (except coupling mount) was flattened to allow a blank canvas for new parts. The Bachmann roof grille surround was superglued in place to provide a base for the replacement.



Having hardened overnight, the filler/styrene can be sanded smooth. After careful rough filing, 240 grit abrasive was used, followed by 1200 grit to achieve a smooth surface. The model and surrounding area should then be cleaned thoroughly to avoid dust inhalation and surface contamination for further work.



The new roof grille mesh is extremely fine. It was positioned and held with Tamiya low-tack masking tape, then superglued around the edge. The frame was bent to shape with finger pressure, and once the curvature had been achieved, it was tacked in place using dots of superglue before gluing around the edge.



A Shawplan NRN aerial pod was modified by cutting off the strip of rivets (to mount to the cab roof) with a sharp pair of scissors. The etch can be folded up carefully using a 'Hold 'n' Fold' tool, then superglued together. Taking reference from prototype photographs aids correct assembly and positioning.

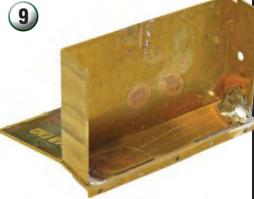


Next, the windows were squared and enlarged with a craft knife, followed by a square needle file. The Shawplan sizing guide must fit, as the etched window frames were then superglued. One cab door was also removed with a craft knife, to represent an open door.





One main external difference on the class 20/3s is the fuel tanks. Produced by Shawplan, the base had the rivet strip folded (Hold 'N Fold tool), revealing two slots into which the side panels mount. This leaves two raised edges, which were removed with a fine needle file (left).



A 400°C soldering iron was used to assemble the tanks. The area was cleaned before soldering using a glass fibre pen, ensuring a good joint. The amount of solder is irrelevant as it is inside the tank, but for external parts, superglue was applied with a cocktail stick.



To mount the tanks, the near-cab grille was removed. This was done with a chisel-bladed craft knife, working cautiously to skim minimal material off with each pass, before sanding with abrasive paper.



All contact surfaces must be cleaned using 1200 grit abrasive and a fibre glass pen. A generous amount of superglue was used to bond the tanks, with less glue used to bond the Shawplan smaller height grille to the body. Refer to prototype photographs to ensure correct orientation.

TOP TIP:

Most parts removed from the locomotive during disassembly will be reused later or added to the spares box. It's important to keep parts safe when stored. An empty business card box, or handy tin lid as illustrated can keep parts safe on the often cluttered workbench.



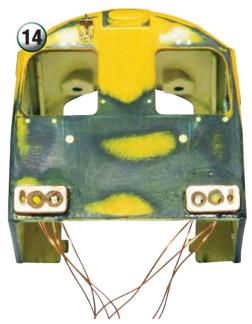
PRACTICAL BRM



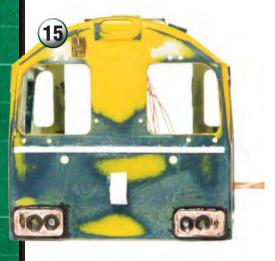
The working light clusters were created using 1mm copperclad sheet, the same shape as Shawplan's light clusters. A knife was used to cut tracks and a pin vice/ drill used to create holes (right), then red and warm white 0603/0402 size surface-mount diodes (SMDs) were soldered into the holes (left). The SMDs must share a positive common for DCC.



Enamelled copper wire (0.3mm) was soldered to each 'pad' on each board. Before soldering, enamel was stripped off the ends of each wire using a knife. A small amount of solder was applied to the end of the wire, which was then fused to the board. Test each SMD with a small 3V cell battery before continuing.



After the wires have been soldered and the units tested, they can be mounted. This requires a hole to be drilled in the location of the cluster to allow the wires to be passed through. The clusters can then be superglued.



A strip of 0.5mm thick, 1mm wide styrene was glued to the cab, along with 3mm styrene multiple working sockets as per the prototype. A Shawplan cab aerial was assembled and added, then the light clusters received a coat of Humbrol matt black paint, applied with a brush, to prevent light bleed.



Light clusters were added to the nose end, using identical 0.5mm styrene pieces for support. Any gaps can be filled and sanded, and the clusters were painted black like the cab end. Buffers from Markits were added, using a 0.3mm styrene square to build up the Shawplan etched buffer back plates.



The cab end was primed separately to the body using a light coat of Halfords grey primer, revealing areas needing attention. Fine (1200 grit) abrasive was used, with the primer acting as filler for small scratches. More black paint was used, as light bleed from the SMDs persisted.







The areas to be painted yellow or red - warning panels (including tank ends) and bufferbeams - received a light mist of Halford's White Primer, giving a better base for the colour. Yellow panels were sprayed using Fiat Golden Yellow. Halford's rattle cans give a superior (automotive grade) high-gloss finish, ideal for transfers.



Working from lighter colours to darker, VW Mars Red was sprayed next. Only the area to be sprayed was exposed using Tamiya masking tape and paper to mask the rest. Final coats must be properly applied with full coverage to all areas, including behind the light clusters, which are red too.



Transfers were from Railtec. Individual elements were cut using a craft knife then soaked in water until they floated free. They were placed with cocktail sticks and dried fully using cotton buds. A light coat of Humbrol gloss acrylic varnish was applied to the entire body after each application had fully dried.



The wires from the resistor boards at each end were soldered to a DCC 21-pin breakout board. For now, directional day headlight operation has been modelled. The wiring diagram for the LokSound V5 decoder (or any other decoder) used can be found on the manufacturer's website.



Using the same procedure, all major body colours were sprayed using Renault Royal Blue and Black. To mask the curves, the tape was stuck to the locomotive first then the profile marked out with pencil, before the tape was removed and the profile cut out using a craft knife.



Humbrol enamel and masking tape was used for the cab cant rail lining. Shawplan windscreen frames and 'Laserglaze' windows were attached with Deluxe Materials 'Glue 'N' Glaze' adhesive, while the nameplate was attached with 3mm double-sided tape and the original handrails were re-affixed with superglue. 1.5mm and 2mm fibre-optic cable was used for light lenses.

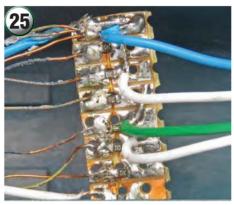


Reassembly came next. New Hornby and Bachmann air pipes and screw couplings were superglued to the cabend bufferbeam whilst Shawplan twin arm windscreen wipers were glued with 'Glue N Glaze'. Drivers from Modelu were glued into the cab, and all details (including bogies and wheels) were brush-painted with Humbrol enamels where appropriate.





Two pairs of Shawplan's etched WIPAC '100' style light clusters were superglued to 0.3mm styrene to build them up, then sanded and drilled to match the etched profile. These were superglued to each end, then black details were hand-painted using Humbrol 33 enamel matt black.



For LEDs to operate safely, they each must pass through a $10 \text{K}\Omega$ resistor as they operate at a small voltage. This was achieved by soldering an 0603 size surface-mount resistor to Veroboard, with the input from the decoder on the right and output to the LEDs on the left.



Superglue was used to re-mount the original handrails, using a 0.7mm drill in a pin vice to open out the holes. Smaller Heljan air pipes and the original coupling hook were added in the same manner, which allows a tension lock coupling to rotate freely.

Directional day lighting was tested at both ends. Because each LED was wired separately to the resistor boards, fully independent lighting control will later be programmed - using the 10 powered function outputs (FOs) - into the Loksound V5.

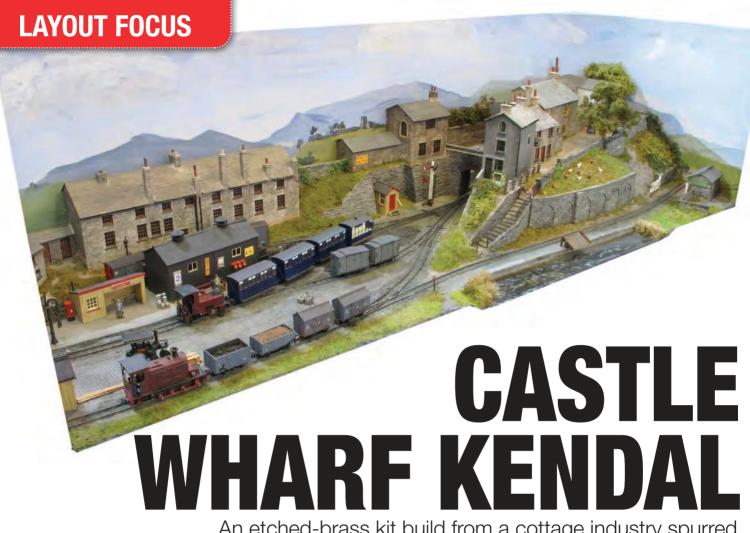

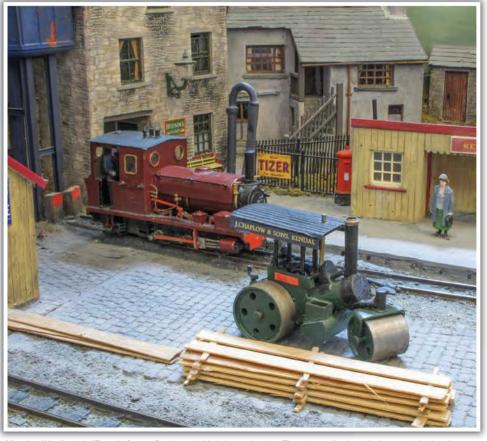
An etched-brass kit build from a cottage industry spurred lan Kirkwood into his first narrow gauge layout adventure.

'aving built a standard gauge light railway layout in 3mm:1ft scale ('Wray', described in BRM, August 2002), I decided to try my hand at narrow gauge. At the Warley exhibition, I spotted the Backwoods Models' stand. Here were OO9 locomotives that really looked the part and apparently ran well. I came away from the stall somewhat poorer, but with a kit for a Barclay 0-4-0T in my hot sticky hand. Just for the fun of building it, you understand; I had no plans for a layout at this stage. The kit was a pleasure to build and the locomotive ran really well. So I built a second that went together equally well and was another reliable runner. I took them to a 3mm Society group meeting where they were much admired. Then I was contacted by one of the group who was organizing a small exhibition - could I bring my two locomotives and perhaps a layout as he had no narrow gauge layouts coming? I agreed

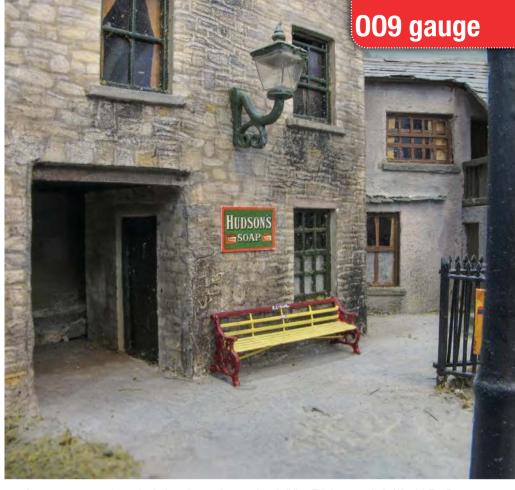

– and was then told the exhibition was just five weeks away! The layout was built in quite a rush.

Scenic work

A critical problem with small layouts is how to disguise the entry to the fiddle yard. I created a bank at the back of the layout with buildings on it, and a bridge under which trains disappear. This is quite effective and actually prototypical – Kendal is very hilly. The basic structure is card mesh made using a hot glue gun, topped with a layer of 'Sculptamold', which gives a strong and slightly rough surface, ideal for the application of ground foam and static grass.

The railway buildings are from a modified kit (engine shed) or Will's sheets. On its first outing the layout had no other buildings. But I came across an article about a scheme to build a standard gauge light railway from Kendal south-eastwards via Kirkby Lonsdale to Arkholme on the Furness and Midland joint line, serving quarries and gunpowder mills and carrying coal and general merchandise to the scattered

LAYOUT FOCUS

farming communities along the route. Colonel Stephens surveyed the route, but money was not forthcoming to build the line. A narrow gauge line would have been much cheaper, so my model is based on the northern terminus of such a line, in Kendal close to the Lancaster Canal basin. Kendal is a lovely town full of old buildings with lots of character. I really enjoy making buildings and all the non-railway ones are based on originals that are or were in Kendal. They are constructed of layers of card, with stonework embossed with a scriber, and painted in dilute artists' acrylics. Making the numerous chimney pots was a good introduction to modelling for my grandson.

Rolling stock

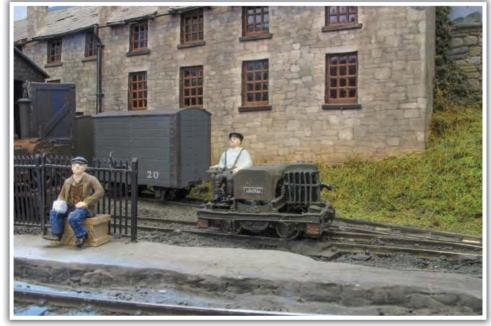
I'm no expert on electrics and the layout is simple 12V DC, using hand-held controllers. Electrics have never been a problem - every running rail has its own separate feed. This means that for a small layout there are a great many wires! As I soldered them, I created a chart that will enable me to find faults easily. One great tip: I seldom clean the track, but before each operating session I rub each rail with an artist's graphite stick, which greatly enhances pick-up.

There are seven locomotives: more than I need but it's wise to have a few spares at exhibitions. Most are kit-built. Carriage and wagon stock is almost all kit-built from

EXHIBITION CRITERIA

The layout was designed very specifically for exhibition and is very seldom operated at home. It was built to a clear set of design criteria, based on my previous experience as an exhibitor.

- Layout and equipment should fit in the back of my Ford Fiesta, leaving room in the front for the driver and one passenger. No need to hire a van: easier for me and cheaper for exhibition managers.
- Only one baseboard. Having no joints avoids alignment problems and reduces setting up time and increases your chances of being first out of the car park at the end of the show...
- This implies a terminus-fiddle yard arrangement, and so most of the operation would be essentially shunting, which might be a challenge in OO9.
- 4. The layout design and the trackplan should have features that sustain interest for the operator over an exhibition. The run-round loop is very short, and one siding faces the opposite way to the rest.
- 5. Operable by one person, from the rear.
- The layout would not have its own support structure but would stand on any suitable table (I have since changed my mind on this).
- 7. The baseboard must incorporate a shelf for mugs of tea essential!
- 8. Running must be reliable.
- 9. Ready-made (Peco crazy) track.
- 10. Automatic coupling and uncoupling using magnets.
- 11. Buildings should be generic and from modified plastic kits. I was inspired by John Bruce's excellent layout 'Lower Peak Wharf'
- 12. The trackplan would be based on the upperyard at Wantage on the Wantage Tramway.
- 13. It would be a tramway and so stock would not have continuous brakes. This makes the handling of trains more complex (because of the need to move the brake to the rear of the train) and thus interesting.
- 14. Period would be approximate: mid-late 1930s; but I would not feel inhibited by this. It is my layout and I'll run what I like on it!



I built the 20HP Simplex standing in the shed road from a Nigel Lawton kit, to prove that I could. The building in the background is a representation of Lowndes Mill, the original K's Shoe factory.

A Hudswell Clarke diesel from a Backwoods kit shunts the yard. The gunpowder wagons are scratch-built from Plastikard. The mill has a fine selection of chimneys.



brass or plastic, with just a few scratch-built wagons. Greenwich couplings are used throughout, operated by permanent magnets embedded in the track.

Final thoughts

You can never have enough hidden sidings, and I certainly don't. It is difficult to get at the sector plate to make adjustments, but I am pleased with the way the exit from the layout is quite well hidden. In general, I am happy with the layout; the overall look seems to have captured something of the atmosphere of Kendal; and I was particularly thrilled to win the Reiner Hendrikson trophy at the big narrow-gauge exhibition at

Swanley. The running is not at all bad for a small-scale shunting layout, and I can spend hours operating without losing interest. I still tweak the scenic details a bit, but I am not going to change it significantly.

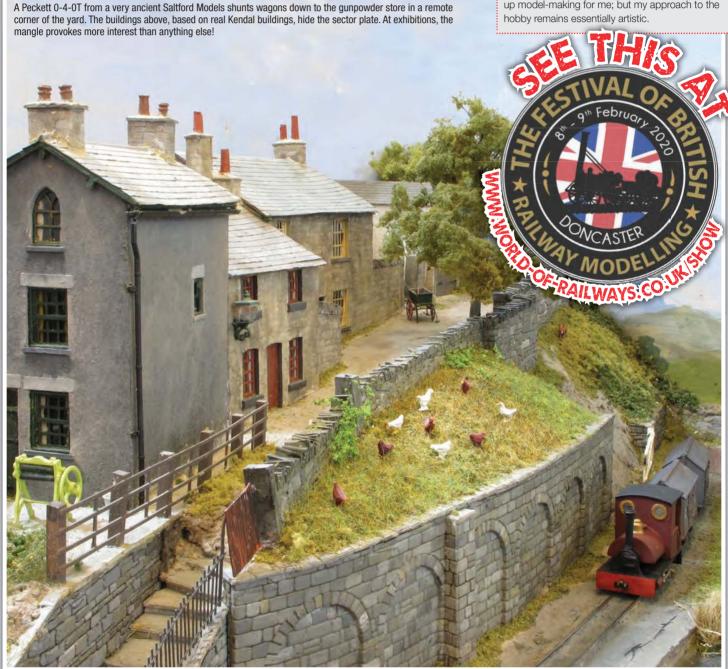
The idea of this little line (the South Westmorland Light Railway) has a lot more mileage in it, and I might at some stage build one of the passing stations on the line. That would be a continuous run, which might have advantages. But my immediate focus is on a Furness Railway Branch terminus in 3mm scale. And I'm rather attracted by the idea of battery-powered radio-controlled locomotives - a layout with no wiring and no pick-up problems has clear advantages!

Now in my 70s, I have been keen on model railways since the age of two. My parents had a friend with a layout in his attic, and I was sat down in the middle of the floor while his pre-War O Gauge electric trains raced round me with their headlamps

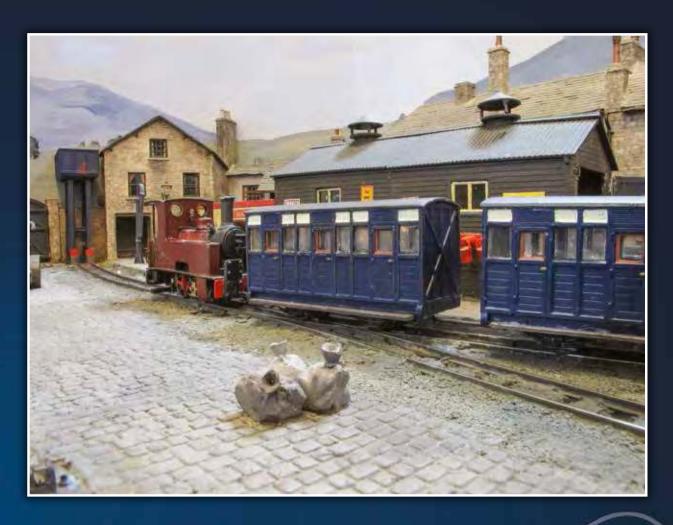

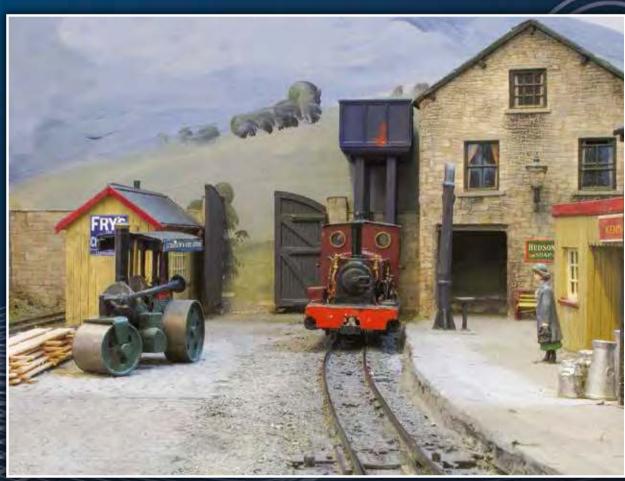

BRM meets...

BRITAIN'S BIGGEST MODEL RAILWAY

Andy York meets Simon George and his monumental Heaton Lodge Junction project for an update on how modellers will be able to see the layout.

AY: Simon, you are now branding your 180ft long O gauge project depicting Heaton Lodge Junction, a West Yorkshire junction of lines near Mirfield where the Huddersfield route diverges from the Calder Valley line as 'Britain's Biggest Model Railway'.

SG: Hopefully, yes, it really will be Britain's biggest model railway. The reason for that is that I really want to turn the template for railway exhibitions on its head. So instead of visiting a model railway exhibition, I want to take this model directly to the public. From the end of 2020, the intention is to position it outside various shopping malls up and down the

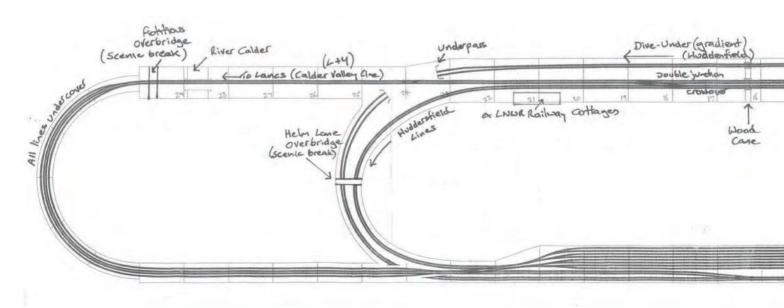
country in its own marquee. It will only be on show during school holidays, so when the public are walking past it on the way to do some shopping, hopefully kids will be pulling their parents in asking to visit 'Britain's Biggest Model Railway'. At the same time hopefully getting new people interested in the hobby, which is another one of my passions.

AY: We are going through a time of increased exposure with the likes of Channel 5's Great Model Railway Challenge and others stimulating an interest in creative hobbies. Model railways is possibly being viewed as a little less nerdy than

it was 18 months ago. New people are showing an interest in what we do.

SG: Certainly, I think if you look at something like Miniatur Wunderland in Hamburg. To a modeller, it's a huge train set with landscapes, towns and an airport that gets 400,000 visitors a year, each paying €15 to go and see it. With Heaton Lodge being branded 'Britain's Biggest Model Railway', hopefully the publicity surrounding that and it being positioned in locations where there's a lot of people walking past, people will tempted to come in and see.

AY: The name is as really big hook to catch people. This is worlds apart from





keen to ask you "How did you do that?" So there is a lot you can communicate to visitors about the practical skills involved.

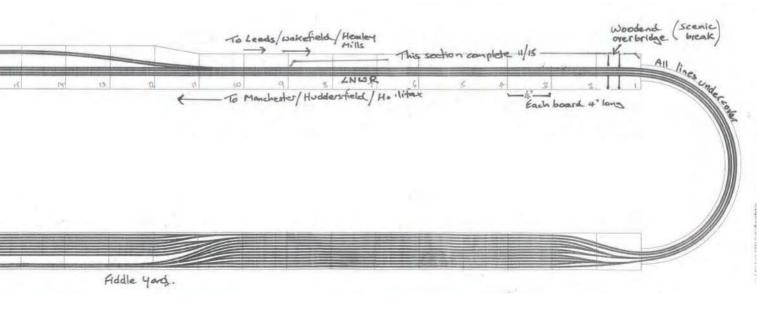
SG: Definitely, yes. As I said to you earlier, I'm not actually a railway modeller; this is the first layout I have built. I did tinker with model railways when I was 12 or 13, but I haven't really done anything since, and that kind of helped me in a way because I didn't buy a book off a shelf and follow the same old processes and techniques to get to what you see here now. There are a lot of things I found out through trial and error and I like to utilise natural materials such as the dead leaves found around the layout, which are actually real leaves ground up, so there are lots of ways you can replicate various things to be found on the layout and I'm quite keen to pass on all those things as well.

a tatty model railway in a seaside town's back street. For us, as modellers, there will be really something to see; this is proper top-notch modelling, not just shaking a few boxes to get something running around.

SG: No, hopefully this will show people what level you can take it to if you really want to, they will then leave via a model shop with train sets and other products geared up to getting new people involved with the hobby. There needs to be some return on the investment, as this has been an expensive exercise as well as taking up an awful lot of time.

AY: There are so many aspects to this, skills-wise, that you have been through while building this layout and I know from the topic on RMweb that many people are





INTERVIEW

AY: This project is about individual skills, it's not a team of modellers or club; this is one man's mad, but brilliant, project. It's part of your youth, history and memories - a very personal project where you have brought those to life.

SG: You've got it in a nutshell, that's what I wanted to achieve. Even if it's not a success on the public circuit, all the way through my retirement I've got a great model railway to play with.

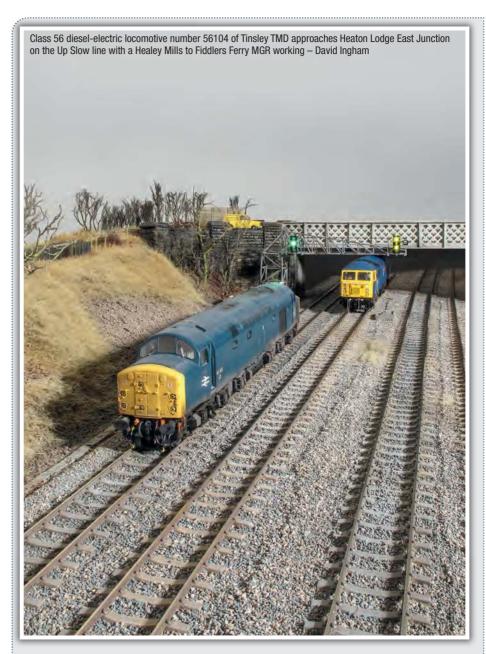
AY: I'm sure there will be many people who are keen to come and see it and hopefully you can get the word out through wider channels as this really does merit the widest possible audience to show what can be achieved. You're planning to have the layout, largely complete, at Warley show in 2020; there are not many exhibition halls which are going to be able to fit this in are there?

SG: Exactly, so that's why it's only ever going to go to Warley show at the N.E.C., simply because that's the only place big enough for it to go in. Once I was well into building the layout, I came up with the business plan of taking the model direct to the public - that's why it's going to be in its own marquee outside big shopping attractions.

AY: I remember certain attractions as a kid nearly 50 years ago, such as the model railway in the cellar at Alton Towers with a few black and white photographs as the only memory. It could well be, in 50 years' time, people will say "Do you remember going to see Britain's biggest model railway?"

SG: I often wonder what would happen to the model in the distant future. It's in its infancy at the moment and it's not yet wholly finished, but when it is, a long time into the future, where would it end up? Who knows?

The interesting thing is that back in the 1960s, British Rail used to have two huge O gauge layouts that they used to take around the country during the period of transformation from steam to diesel or electric just to inform the general public the changes that were happening. So, I'm not the first person to have done this, I've just twisted the concept a bit and, instead of people coming to visit the layout, I want to take it straight to them.



HERE IS HEATON LODGE JUNC

Just west of Mirfield, in what used to be the West Riding of Yorkshire, two trans-Pennine main lines diverge. At Heaton Lodge Junction, westbound trains can take the Standedge Tunnel route via Huddersfield or head for the Calder Valley line.

It was at its busiest during the first half of the last century. It was also where the LNWR's 'New Line' to Leeds began. Opened in 1900, it left the Huddersfield - Leeds line at Spen Valley Junction, about half a mile south of Heaton Lodge, before burrowing under the Calder Valley route in two short single line tunnels. Climbing steeply alongside the existing four tracks, it then headed for Leeds, crossing the Calder on a lattice girder bridge.

Traffic was heavy until the 1960s, when rationalisation began with the closure of the 'New Line' in 1965. Five years later, BR embarked upon a full scale remodelling of the junction, removing two of the four Calder Valley lines, plus a further two heading to Huddersfield.

At around the same time, experimental LMS-installed speed signalling and semaphores were also replaced, together with Heaton Lodge Junction's (originally LYR) signal box. Colour light signalling, including two large gantries, was then installed, all controlled from Healey Mills powerbox located about eight miles east.

The first mile or so of the 'New Line', including the underpass and Spen Valley Junction (now renamed Heaton Lodge South), were brought back into use. It was realigned to curve in the opposite direction and connect with the Calder Valley line. This, BR figured, reduced conflicting movements with heavy freight traffic to and from Lancashire by eliminating a flat crossing.

ATTUN'S PACIFIC

attons production of ready-to-run O gauge A3 'Pacific' is an admirable project bringing a top-link steam express locomotive to market for a similar price as we may expect a mass-market diesel. It's certainly impressive when you've removed the model from its protective packaging and wooden plinth which secures it well in transit, and take the time to admire the vast array of fine detail. O gauge steam locomotives have long been dominated by metal-bodied products, but the economies of injection-moulded plastic have been employed to bring a beautiful-looking model to the shelf at reasonable price and Hattons has worked in consort with Heljan to produce this model in addition to its forthcoming A4. Although the bodywork components are plastic, there is plenty of metal within the chassis construction and weighting in the boiler to ensure that this

model has the mass and performance to tackle what is likely to be expected of it on a layout.

VARIANTS

Hattons has sought to cover the full life of the locomotive class from their introduction in July 1927 when modified from the LNER A1 Class through to Flying Scotsman in current preserved guise under National Railway Museum ownership. The models that cover the early life are presented in LNER lined green and are available as No. 2750 Papyrus when it achieved its speed record for non-streamlined locomotives in 1935 and unnumbered models with corridor and non-corridor tenders. The wartime black austerity livery models include No. 2745 Captain Cuttle and unnumbered versions with the two tender types. The early British Railways express blue period is

covered by No. 60072 Sunstar as reviewed and two unnumbered models with the different tender types. No. 60035 Windsor *Lad* represents the BR green with early emblem era with similarly unnumbered variants. The late crest period from 1958 to revenue-earning withdrawal includes No. 60077 The White Knight and the unnumbered versions. The story concludes with *Flying Scotsman* in late crest BR green numbered 60103 with a corridor tender as currently operated.

THE MODEL

Our review sample is No. 60072 Sunstar. which was built in A1 form in 1924 at Doncaster, rebuilt in 1941 as an A3 and withdrawn in October 1962. The model wears the eye-catching British Railways express blue livery it sported from August 1949 to June 1952.



The model is substantial and weighty at 2.27kg and features a wealth of detail including chemically-blackened O gauge finescale wheels, separately fitted and blackened handrails, screw-link couplings and pipes fitted to front bufferbeams, dummy buckeye coupling and separate buckeye coupling for the corridor tender bufferbeam, and a fully detailed and painted cab interior. Attention to variations is covered with the correct chimney variant for livery/locomotive, turned brass whistles, open frames beneath the boiler with cosmetic inside valve gear, a sprung front bogie, water scoop and sprung buffers. Further separately fitted parts are evident with the smokebox door dart, separately fitted oil lubricators, etched shed plate and separately fitted smokebox door numberplate where applicable, turned brass safety valves, separately fitted drain cocks, fluted 'stamped' connecting rods and etched brass name plates where applicable.

The lack of visible daylight above the front bogie is commendable. As models are available in single and double chimney variants, it's evident that the bore of the chimney doesn't extend into the smokebox something the modeller could benefit from drilling out to improve the looks.

The density of paint finish overall is good with clear white and black lining and faultless lettering and numbering. Oil lubricators are nicely picked out in metallic shades, as is the firebox backhead detail.

The model is driven by a five-pole motor and a large brass flywheel aiding smooth performance inside the locomotive boiler with geared drive to the rear driving axle. Hattons specified that this model should have brass gears, which should remove an Achilles' Heel where nylon gears can suffer under heavy workloads. Some users have reported issues with the valve gear, but Hattons has responded that it is happy to rectify or replace any so affected on delivery.

Hattons has shown a video of the A3 models under test on Pete Waterman's 'Leamington Spa' layout hauling 11-coach trains of kit-built carriages, so I have no reason to doubt the efficacy of its haulage capabilities.

Removal of the tender body with two screws is straightforward for access to fit a decoder in the socket. The removal of the locomotive body is a little more unnerving with the removal of two screws and then lifting the smokebox and boiler up. This disengages the gearbox from the chassis gearing, as the motor, gearbox and flywheel remains within the boiler. Re-seating this and getting the gears to mesh again proved a little problematic.

For DCC provision, the tender body removes with screw terminals for fitting. The tender includes a speaker enclosure area with a Loksound L decoder socket. Space has been provided inside the smokebox beneath the chimney for a speaker to get the

load and footplate fall-plate

sound from the right end of the locomotive.

The connector between locomotive and tender is a six-pin plug and socket electrical connection and a rigid bar with two positioning holes dependent upon layout track radii. While underneath the model, it can be observed that the rear Cartazzi axle arrangement has rigid sides and an axle frame that not only pivots, but has plenty of lateral movement, so should be able to work over fairly tight curves. The front pony truck is pivoted with a spring over its leading axle to reduce the likelihood of it lifting over pointwork. Electrical pick-up is from the driving wheels and the tender wheels.

It is evident Hattons development team and research assistants have put a lot of work into this model, which has turned out very well indeed and we look forward to the A4 which will be arriving in 2020.



CLASS 50

ith its near-30 years' service life on BR, the English Electric Class 50s have always been popular with enthusiasts and certainly popular as models in all scales, and this impressive offering from Heljan in O gauge should prove to be extremely well-received. It is a very fine piece indeed!

Introduced in 1967/'68, these impressive Type 4s were derived from the prototype 2,700hp DP2, though they were very different in appearance. DP2 could be mistaken for a 'Deltic', especially when it was painted in two-tone green, but certainly not the 50s. A lot of the insides were different as well. How long DP2 would have lasted alongside the Class 50s we shall never know, because it was wrecked at Thirsk at the end of July 1967 and subsequently scrapped.

The class was originally leased from EE, and only the first two were fitted for multiple working to begin with. However, as the rest were so equipped, working mainly in pairs, the 50s' top jobs were on the WCML north of Crewe hauling the Anglo-Scottish expresses to/from Glasgow. With 5,400hp on tap when double-heading, and 100mph capabilities, they were able to accelerate the services until full electrification of the route took place in the early-'70s.

Originally numbered in the D4XX series (after 1968, the 'D' prefix was dropped, there being no steam locomotives on BR by then), they became numbered 50XXX after TOPS was introduced, by which time they were transferred to the Western Region.

The original livery was plain blue (as on the model), but later (as 50s) the large logo BR livery was adopted, with large numbers. By this time the class sported names of famous warships (apart from the celebrity, GWR green-liveried Sir Edward Elgar), carrying on the tradition from the original WR hydraulics. With the introduction of Network South East, several members of the class were painted in the rather garish style

of that operator (with variations). At least one received the 'Dutch'-style colour scheme of yellow/grey for freight work.

They were familiar all over the WR lines of the time, as well as working over some MR routes, and, famously on the Waterloo-Exeter road, where they proved very popular.

The last three soldiered on into 1994, when they were taken out of service. The life of the class had been increased by a full-refurbishment programme at Doncaster (where the class was latterly maintained) between 1979 and 1983, which dramatically increased the availability, but by the 1990s they were surplus to requirements. Amazingly, no fewer than 18 examples have been preserved, and can be seen on hire or on railtours around the country to this day.

And, so to the model, and what a model it is! It appears to match the principal dimensions of the drawings at my disposal and is representative of a class member



showing evidence of being refurbished, with side and roof detail alterations from the originals. It's supplied anonymous, and as a refurbished example should be named. With the BR arrows at only one end each side, it's certainly post its existence on the WCML. Numbers or nameplates can be sourced from a variety of specialist retailers, though some retailers will fit these to models for a small fee upon your request. As a refurbished example, it would be more suitably liveried in large logo condition or in NSE guise. The centrally-mounted front headlamp and plated-over four character train description panel (with two white dots) confirms its refurbished identity.

The standard of finish and attention to detail is exemplary. Regarding the latter, it's astonishing in some cases. Handbrake chains and a speedometer are present on the bogies, and the ends are a mass of separately-applied fittings. Sprung drawhooks are fitted as standard, and the buffers are sprung as well. The latter items even have the strengthening ribs to their rears, but be careful. Despite having keyways (I assume) to prevent the oval buffers from revolving, they can twist a little, making the appearance of them slightly odd. The 'parallelogram' windscreen wipers are beautifully observed. Full cab detail is included, but, strangely, there are no electric warning flashes present. These too can be fitted to the model by the purchaser, matching photographic evidence, if desired. Not having extensive O gauge facilities to thoroughly test this heavy beast, I can only comment that on my test track it was extremely quiet and responsive. Given its great weight as well, I'm sure it'll easily haul the likes of the 'Jumbo' trains (up to 15 coaches-long) the real things hauled on the WR after they were refurbished. It's powered by two powerful motors (more 'engines'

than the original!), and it's recommended that at least a 5A supply be used (it worked fine with my ancient H&M 'Clipper', which isn't 5A). For those who wish to use DCC, the facility for it is designed with screw terminals for ease of installation. A highpower decoder is recommended such as the ESU LokPilot V5 XL or LokSound V5 XL. There's certainly room for a big speaker inside the fuel tanks. The instructions inform us that 'DCC can also be configured to give constant illumination/brightness of the headcode panel and tail lights' using the switches underneath. More details are available on Heljan's website.

Looking at the instructions, I found the positions for the body removal screws incomprehensible, so left well alone. The

body will need removing, of course, for DCC-installation, but I'll leave that to those who know what they're doing! If the body is removed from the chassis, the ETH cables must be disconnected at each end.

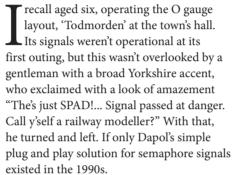
There's a separate pack containing small snowploughs, should the purchaser wish to fit these.

All in all, a quite beautiful model, and one which I'm sure will sell well. I photographed the class throughout its life and wrote a bookazine about the Class 50s for Irwell Press, (ISBN: 978-1-911262-05-3) should anyone be interested. The most difficult part after taking the photographs and writing this review was re-attaching the model by three screws to its wooden transportation plinth. That and lifting its hernia-inducing weight!



DAPOL SIGNALS

Though quite unlike a new RTR locomotive or item of rolling stock, I felt it necessary to review these ready-touse signals in a similar manner - their availability will be widespread from Dapol's numerous stockists, plus, they have working parts and operate!

Mechanical signalling has operated on the British railway network for more than 180 years. In varying forms of design, they replaced flag or hand signals and evolved with safety standard improvements and increasing line speeds. Though slowly displaced by colour light signals from their introduction in the 1920s, the final bastions of BR-design semaphore signals can still be found in sporadic use on some secondary and branch line routes around our railway network.

For the many

Often the preserve of experienced modellers with the ability to assemble an etched brass kit and motorise it, working semaphore signals are seldom seen on layouts, whether located at home or on the exhibition circuit. With LED technology, manufacturers have developed working colour light signals more easily, yet shied away from working semaphore signals which often require more complex motorisation and this, in a 'one size

doesn't fit all' manner, where numerous styles and their positioning on a model railway can vary.

Dapol's signals have everything included and it has chosen a cunning solution to operate these – small servos. These rotary actuators are seldom used en-masse by model railway builders. Stall-action slowspeed point motors are preferred by the majority of modellers seeking operation of their accessories at more realistic speeds, but with the use of servo motors, Dapol can control its accessories more precisely. Where long-distance signals are concerned, that means the prototypical 'bounce' occasionally seen (meaning slack in the operating cable) is replicated.

Installing one of these signals simply requires a 15mm diameter hole to be drilled in the baseboard. The signal base has a screw thread that allows it to be secured to the layout by a plastic nut in a semi-permanent manner, thus, a signal can be removed or replaced, if required, with little fuss.

Clip and play

Dapol's 55 x 41 x 60mm control unit clips to the underside of each signal. It has two internal levers that work on each of the single-effect actuators. The unit isn't overly compact to fit underneath potentially congested baseboards, but take into account that it houses two servomotors, and a circuit board which allows for the fine tuning of the servos and it's a good package. Most importantly, it works reliably and isn't 'Heath Robinson'.

Dapol's signal solution can be powered from a 14V AC or 9-12V DC source. For the purposes of review, I used a simple 9V PP3 type battery and plugged the signal control switches (supplied) into the switch inputs. The switches are supplied with a 30cm length of cable. Dapol is to retail

extension wires for these if you wish to locate your switches further away from your signals - on a control panel, for instance. The manufacturer has been keen to make use of plugs as much as possible, and only the power input wires require the use of a soldering iron.

Scaling up

Available in home and distant versions in single arm, or two-arm iterations for OO and O scales covering the GWR and SR, the signals are intricate, yet solid. More regionspecific styles are being planned by Dapol, and its O gauge signal is only available as a two-arm variant. A warm white LED is constantly-powered and shines through either the red lens for a 'stop' or blue lens, which turns green with the yellow of the LED to make a 'go' - just like the prototypes on which these are modelled.

Though first available from 2013, Dapol has enhanced the operation and ease of these signals with the 'clip-on' control unit, supplied with each signal and configured to be scale and application-specific for throw and number of signals. The signal bounce can be removed by adjusting the two variable dials to the underside of the control

unit, if desired.

electricity flows.

Careful design

At 108mm in height, its GWR right-hand junction signal with two arms is the mostdetailed ready-to-use operational bracket signal on the market and its 153mm-tall O gauge GWR square post signal is equally impressive. The method of transmitting motion to the arms is achieved through a combination of black-painted levers and prebent wire through hoops. They're strong, yet discreet, and painting the wire rods black would further assist in their realism, though avoid applying too much as the wire must be able to move freely through the hoops.

Comparing the signal with photographs of the prototype, they appear very convincing. Further enhancements by modellers could see the weathering of these often-dirty items with a selection of soot and rust stains to the areas representing metal components.

The metal ladders and wire hand rails elevate the quality of the signals to something akin to an etched-brass kit, and the finials atop the posts are authentic. The frames around the lenses are slightly too thick, but this is because of the limitations with tooling and the strength required to

hold them in place. It doesn't detract from their overall excellence and you'll be able to read how these signals can be automated with Train-Tech's new DCC signal controller in BRM, soon.

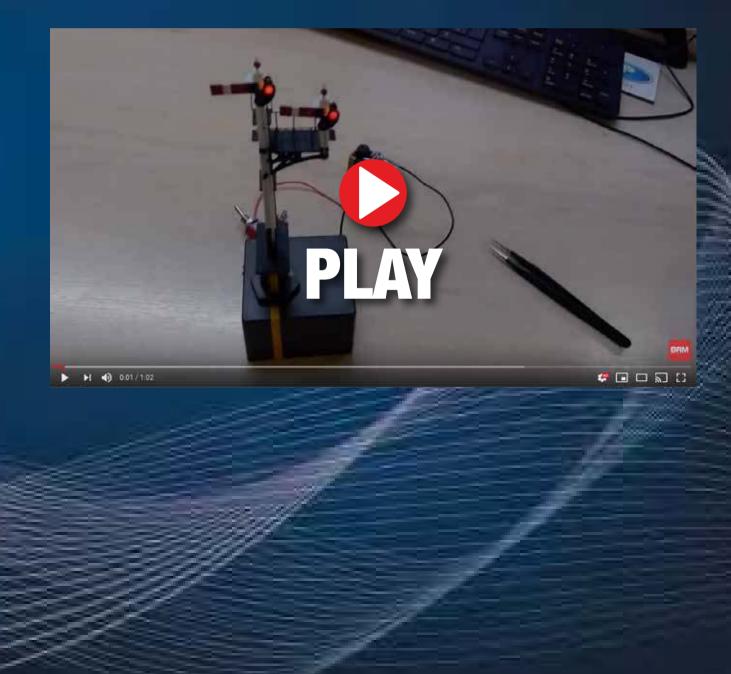

GUY ARA BUS

o know why Rapido Trains has produced an iconic Birmingham bus you have to know about Jason Shron, Rapido's founder, and his history. His student days were spent around the west of Birmingham and, with a love of buses in general, he set out on a personal mission to make a model bus to the same standards as the manufacturer's railway products.

The Guy Arab 'New Look' Birmingham buses first went into service in 1950 in the city's dark blue and cream livery using a chassis from a variety of manufacturers, but with coachwork built by Guy Motors in Wolverhampton. A long-lived classic open-platformed double-decker, the buses saw transition into the paler blue and cream livery of the West Midlands Passenger Transport Executive in the early 1970s, as shown in our review model.

they were announced and have followed the development of the model closely. It represents a step change in standards of a product that is of use to many railway modellers. I'd say half of the layouts at exhibitions feature a bus somewhere and. until now, they have usually been diecast offerings. This Rapido model sets new standards with injection-moulded body components with accurate weld lines, extrusion strips and rivets based on laser scans of the prototype bus at

for one as soon as

Wythall Transport Museum.

The interior is beautifully modelled with no intruding assembly screw pillars. The downstairs 'posh' seats feature moquette transfers to represent the fabric, while upstairs they are a plain, dark-brown, vinyl. The rear platform area is worthy of close examination with separate metal wire handrails and a grab pole with spectacular printing on the used ticket bin on the platform. The front axle and wheels are posable to give more natural positioning on the road with good-looking rubber tyres.

The decoration is to the standard we are used to in the model railway world, which is a step up from thick glossy paints on die-cast models. The printing of lettering and design elements is excellent, with the window ventilators picked out in a metallic silver in a similar fashion to what we are used to seeing on railway carriages. The model is

available with eight different destinations and registrations in the BCT livery and three different ones in the 1970s WMPTE guise.

Each model is available as standard for £39.95 or as a deluxe version with working lights for £49.95. The kit version has LED lights to the roof of the lower and upper decks and working headlamps that give a pleasant, if probably ineffective on the road, glow; but that's how they were! The destination blind also has a dim glow. A separate power supply is required to attach to the two wires under the chassis. A 12V DC supply is recommended but I found a 9V battery was perfectly adequate and I'd probably utilise an old variable DC controller to match the layout lighting. The lighting can be turned on and off easily while the model is in position on the layout with the aid of the included magnetic wand, which can be passed over a reed switch on the offside flank of the vehicle.

Distribution of the model in the UK is by Rails of Sheffield and all of the models are available to purchase on its website. It's great to see products of this standard and I look forward to seeing further models - West Midlands-based of course!

NEW BOOKS as reviewed by Tony Wright



AN ENCYCLOPAEDIA OF BRITISH BRIDGES, by David McFetrich, Pen and Sword.

A couple this month from this prolific publishing house, and this first one is an absolute stunner. With more than a million bridges in the realm, the author has compiled 1,600 separate entries covering over 2,000 different structures. There are over 150 entries explaining (in great detail) about the different types of bridges, a splendid (and educative) glossary of terms, and, among many other fascinating facts, British bridges which are record-holders. All of this is lavishlyillustrated on good quality, semi-gloss stock. It's not all about railway bridges of course, though the significant ones are well-described. It's arranged alphabetically in a very logical format, so readers should be able to find what they're looking for with ease. I'm not sure that the description 'man's mastery over nature' is entirely correct. In my own area of study, the disastrous floods in the Borders in 1948, which washed away many ECML bridges suggests a different interpretation, but the fact that many of the bridges described are hundreds of years old suggests that they're (literally) long-standing. From the earliest pack-horse bridge, through to the mighty Victorian structures and on to the most-modern, this is a wonderful read. For railway model engineers, it should prove invaluable. Perhaps in future we'll see fewer model bridges that would just collapse had they been built in reality! Highly recommended, though the price might be a barrier for some.

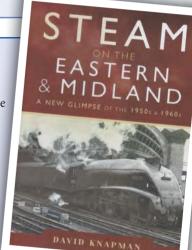

STEAM ON THE EASTERN & MIDLAND, A NEW GLIMPSE OF THE 1950S AND 1960S, by David Knapman, Pen and Sword.

This is the companion volume to the author's Steam on the Southern and Western and it follows a very similar format; basically sections grouped geographically. There is a problem with this straight away because the likes of York and Darlington were never in the Eastern Region in the period depicted by the book. They were in the North Eastern Region, a separate entity (with tangerine BR signs as opposed to ER dark blue) until years later - a difference acknowledged by the writer in his descriptions of Ripon. It's a very personal account, and makes entertaining reading, though some of the captions could do with expanding, and not all are entirely accurate. For instance, the train shown on page 44 has no Thompson carriages in it. The leading vehicle (which has confused the author) is a Gresley ex-Tourist BTO. We're shown which cameras the author used, which accounts for the less-than-sharp images in some cases. In fact, the general reproduction is not generally up to the normal, very high-standard of this publisher, though most of the images are crisp enough to be of help to railway modellers, particularly those (like me) who build locomotives. There are some interesting ancillary scenes as well, and it should make its way on to several modellers' shelves. There's also an interesting book by Pen and Sword describing the 'Railway Haters'; those opposed to



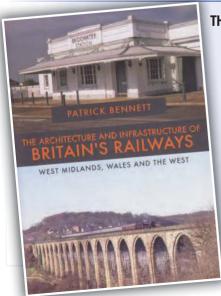
railways, from the earliest times to the present day.





Two more to describe from Amberley this month, this one featuring exactly what it says in the title. Naturally, because of the small format (A5, 96 pages) and the vast geographical area covered, it can only be a snapshot in the form of many all-colour images showing examples of stations, goods facilities, signalling (signal boxes and signalling, of which there are some wonderful examples - talk about ancient and modern in the top picture on page 77!), signage and many ancillary structures. Though the shots are of no great antiquity, many of them now are historic. Structures built by the GWR and the L&NWR naturally predominate, though there are others, especially the Welsh Valley companies and the L&SWR for instance. Much of what's illustrated has already changed or gone, or is due to be gone soon (particularly signals), so this book should have appeal to modellers, especially those who depict non-steam subjects, though there is interest in it for all in my view.

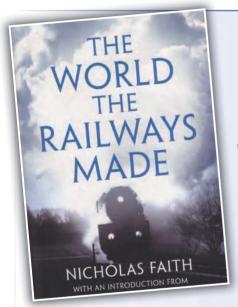


GWR LOCOMOTIVES THE HALL CLASS, by Allen Jackson, Amberley.

This is a useful little volume in the usual Amberley style, this one describing the GWR's most ubiquitous (among many) 4-6-0 Class. Derived from the 'Saint' Class, two cylinder type, 328 examples were built by the GWR and BR (the latter all modified 'Halls') and saw service all over the GWR and BR Western Region lines which permitted their weight (red route). Though mainly pictorial (in both B&W and colour), there is a useful class history, along with several technical details, work patterns and tables. The photographic range is from GWR days, throughout BR days and into preservation (several examples are preserved and some have been donors to new-build projects). To both modellers and railway historians alike, it should be of value, especially at the price and should prove to be a natural complement to those much more detailed histories by other publishers – the books of the Halls by Irwell, for instance. Recommended. There are also other books in the usual format on Industrial railways and old Edinburgh trams from Amberley of interest this month, but, as usual, lack of space precludes full reviews.

THE WORLD THE RAILWAYS MADE, by Nicholas Faith, Head of Zeus.

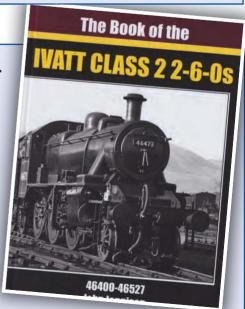
This softback represents outstanding value for money in its 422 pages. It is an epic read and, for once, is not a history of the making of railways. It's a comprehensive account of how the railways affected our world, and no other form of transport has been so revolutionary in that respect. Ever since the dawn of man until the coming of the railways for public transport (the Stockton & Darlington in 1825), the fastest a human being had ever travelled was on horseback, and that was limited by the quality of the steed. Then, in less than a generation, average speeds of 30/40 mph and even up to a mile a minute became commonplace. The story is very well-told, in an entirely unsentimental way. In fact, the author considers too many railway books to be awash with nostalgia (of which, I admit, I'm guilty at times); this is far more hard-headed! Out of my own personal interest (being an ex-art teacher), I found the descriptions of how the railways affected painting of particular enjoyment. Most of the account concerns the world's railway building of the 19th Century, though more recent developments are considered as well. In fact, the book finishes with a most-optimistic picture of today's railways. The social upheaval brought about by the building of railways was unprecedented in world history - including the allowing of 'drunkards' to expand their boundaries into genteel seaside towns! Queen Victoria never went to Brighton again! By definition, I've had to speed read this to meet this deadline, but it'll be my Christmas reading for sure. One question; did the younger Stephenson change the spelling of his name to Stevenson for some reason (description of his picture on page 14)? Thoroughly-recommended.

THE BOOK OF THE IVATT CLASS 2 2-6-0S 46400-46527, by John Jennison, Irwell Press.

This is the latest in the definitive 'book of' series by this specialist publisher, and is fully up to the usual high standards expected. It follows the typical format in its 360 pages of providing a comprehensive history, developments, descriptions of 'Devil in the detail', workings, geographical spread, right through to two pages on every single member of the 128-strong class, all beautifully-presented on high-quality gloss stock. It really is not only a visual treat, but as well-researched a book on a locomotive class as any I've ever read. The author has an established pedigree in that respect. Because the majority of the class was built in BR days (from 46420 onwards) by Crewe, Darlington and Swindon Works, naturally most of the illustrations show the locos at work on British Railways. Though 'only' printed in B&W, livery variations are clearly visible, including the Swindon green painting, despite being mixed traffic locos. For anyone contemplating building a model of this popular class (seven are preserved), this book is invaluable; as it is to all students of locomotive history, whatever their personal preferences. Entirely recommended and exceptional value for money.

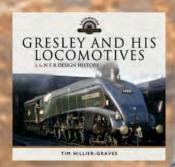
