he railway cuts through the parklands of Tixall Hall. The estate was the playground of Richard Powell Scholefield, who landscaped the grounds and constructed numerous follies, many of which are still visible today; the legacy being the obelisk built to commemorate his daughter, Georgiana. The tunnel mouths are built in a castellated style, their only purpose being to hide the railway from the hall. Visible in the foreground is the grave dedicated to Starlight, Lionel Archibald Forseter's mount who was lost during the Boer War where he insisted the horse should be repatriated.

This is what 'Weaver Hill' represents as a model after 10 years of exhibitions and alterations. The original concept for the model was to build something different. We wanted to build a model that did not incorporate all the usual aspects associated with a modern image model railway. We wanted to create a scene that could be just as recognised by anyone in 19th century as in its current format. The idea started to formulate while taking a canal boat holiday navigating the four counties ring. The canal spends much of its time alongside the

West Coast Main Line.

In 2013, there was an opportunity to attend a local charity model railway show. This was deemed the perfect opportunity to put the ideas into reality. The largest hurdle to attending the show was the four-week deadline needed to complete the model. This did not deter us as we wanted to build something simple with trains passing through the countryside. 'Weaver Hill' was built to a plain, four track main line concept.

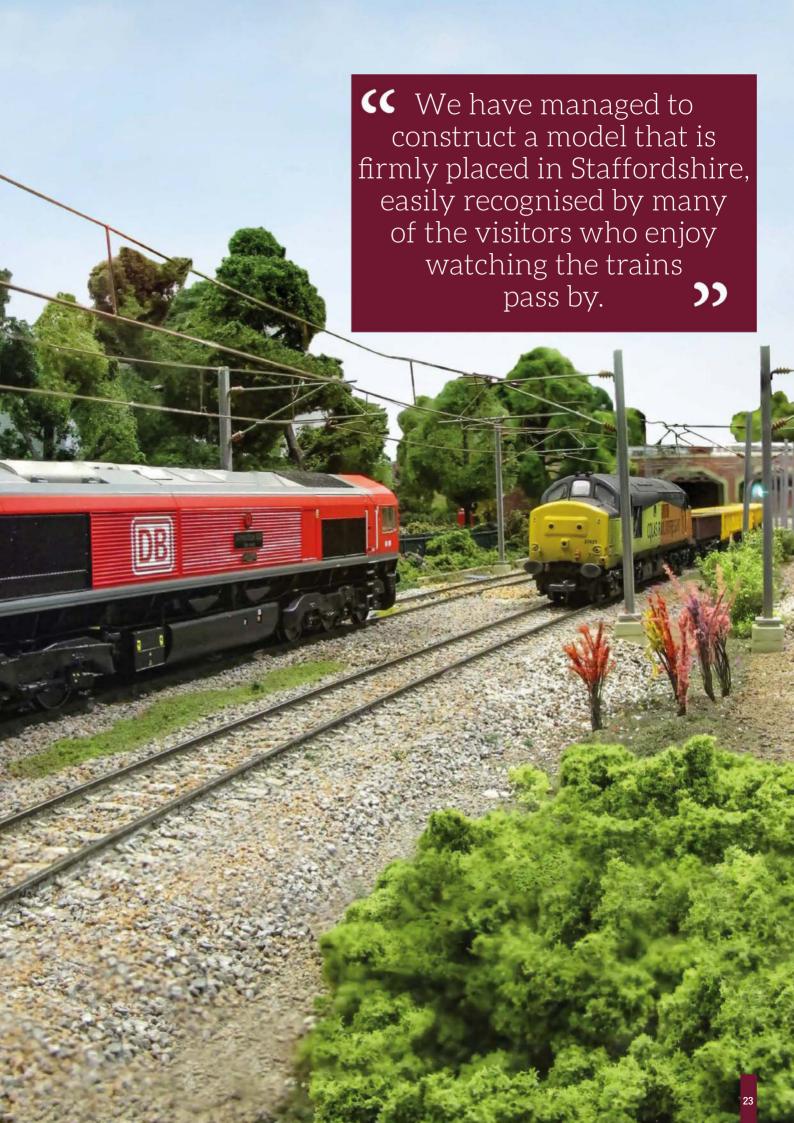
The layout has been built purely for the enjoyment to run trains in a continuous circuit. Our selling point at the shows is being able to showcase the trains passing by. Many exhibition managers choose to add seating in front of the layout to enhance the viewing of the model. From this lower angle, the model takes on another form as the trains pass between the trees, which break up the scene, purposely positioned in front of the railway.

Inspiration for the model has mainly come from the North Staffordshire region. The tunnel portals are the most prominent feature on the model and reflect the castellated architecture of Shrugbrough Tunnel (the 'Gates of Jerusalem').

Our model depicts the WCML as if the LNWR had decided to quadruple the line between Milford and Brocton and Colwich. Visible towards the right-hand end of the layout when viewing, you can see where the old level crossing used to be situated, complete with crossing keeper's cottage. This is a representation of the old Holdiford Road, which now also bridges the WCML at Milford

Layout evolution

On its first outing in 2013, the model looked sparse. Much time has been spent adding to, and upgrading the model. The overhead catenary was the biggest change. We originally used Dapol supports, but these were found to be too flimsy and we have since changed the supports to Peco, along with scratch-built headspans using parts from Sommerfeldt. The trains don't run with their pantographs raised. However, this does not detract in any way from the overall effect. At exhibitions, we often receive favourable comments on the overhead line equipment, making the effort involved even more rewarding.

Continuing the theme of improvements made to the

model, one of the most noticeable changes to the layout is the appearance of the countryside it passes through. Alluded to earlier was the sparse nature of 'Weaver Hill', the railway passing through open countryside, with very little to break up the scene. The tunnel mouths were only of modest brick construction. These were changed to better represent Shugborough and a plastic Medieval castle kit was sourced and converted into the tunnel portals, which are now present on the model. This really has brought this area of the model to life and it's my favourite end of the layout.

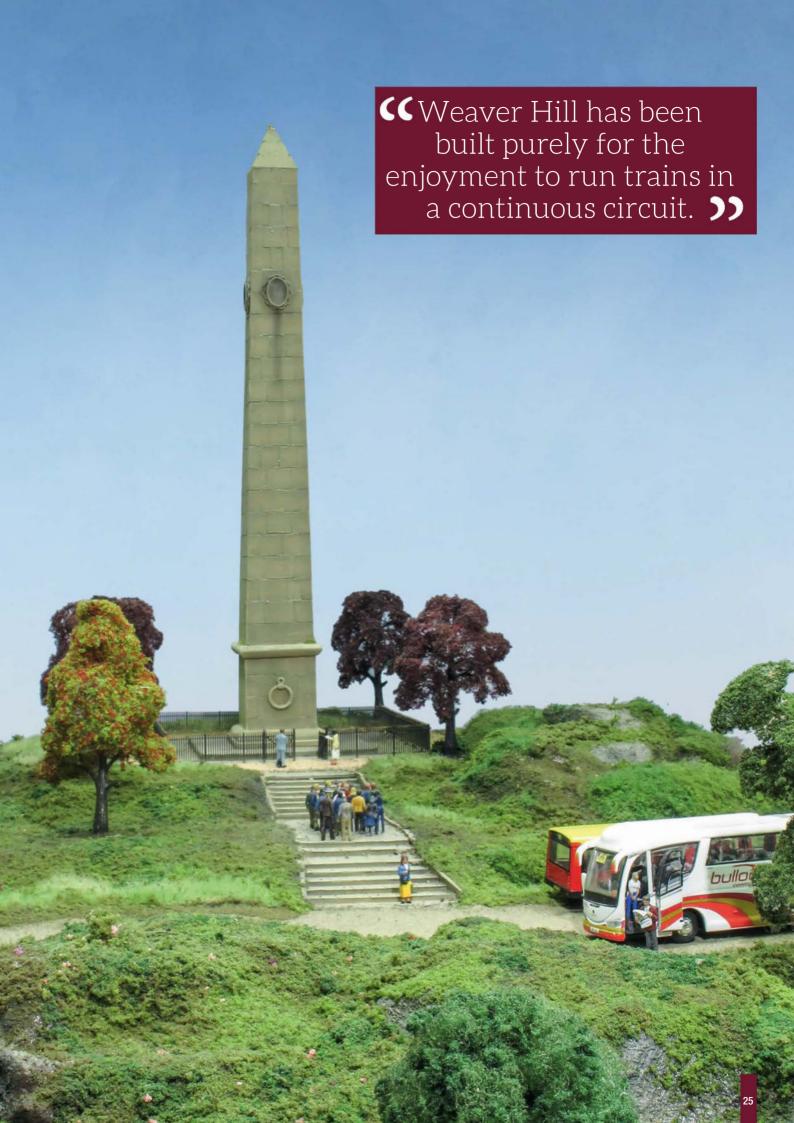
Georgiana's obelisk, which sits above the tunnel, was our take on Hadrian's Arch. This was formed from a block of wood, whittled to form the basic shape. Card was added, one stone block at a time, with the added plaques being created from dolls' house accessories.

The monument was pre-shaded to highlight the stones before layers of varying colours of stone were added over the top. It was then finished with a distinctive copper lighting conductor. We added more follies to the length of the scenic section, which has now transformed the layout from open countryside to estate parklands.

On show

'Weaver Hill' was built to run stock covering a fluid time period, starting from the privatisation of the railways. When we are exhibiting the layout, we ensure that all stock is from the same period, creating a constant time period during the weekend.

The infrastructure on the model firmly places it closer to the present, with the tell-tale 'yellow mushrooms' track-side, suggesting axle counters are present, and LED signal heads. This does not stop Rule 1 being applied now and again – the photographs portray this well with our back-dating to the 1990s. 'Weaver Hill', however, was well received when we ran it in this guise for the first time at BRM's Doncaster Show.

The model is run entirely on DC and, to keep things simple, each line has three fiddle roads associated with it. All points are manually operated in the fiddle yard giving us a good opportunity during a two-day show to achieve our goals. Signals are operated via infrared sensors set into the sleepers, which replace the signal to danger when a train passes over and breaks the light

contact. This initiates a timer to run through the signal sequence – yellow, double yellow and green.

If we were to repeat this project, there would be a lot we would do differently. One of the main frustrations is the constant realignment of joints at the setting up of any show. The fixing of the track and the way the boards are joined would be completely altered to alleviate this problem. We would look at metal dowels to locate the boards, and ensure the track was fixed in place with copper-clad rather than pins.

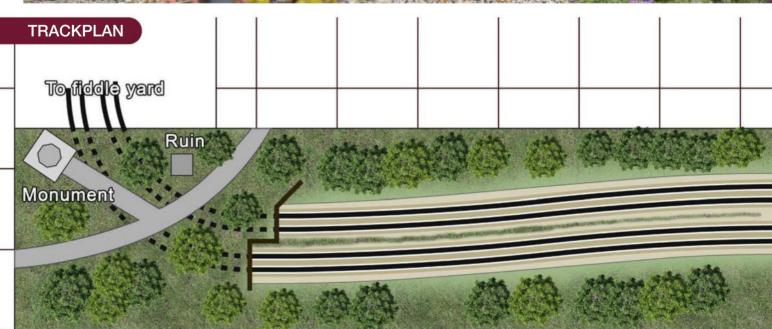
Some of the scenery elements would also be easier to replicate with the availability of bespoke laser-cutting, which would have made the construction of the tunnel mouths and follies easier, but maybe take away that modelling aspect that has made 'Weaver Hill' so enjoyable.

Although 'Weaver Hill' was built to represent any region, and any main line in the UK, we have managed to construct a model placed in Staffordshire, easily recognised by many of the visitors who enjoy watching the trains pass by.

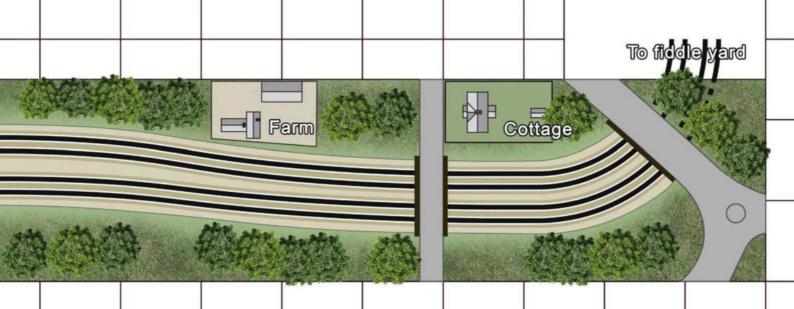

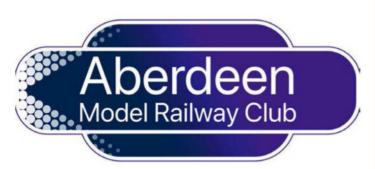

FLORAL DISPLAYS

Seeing the wonderfully-detailed and colourful gardens lining the platforms of Sherton Abbas (April BRM) inspired me to 'revive' the run-down station floral bed on my own layout. And I'm so glad I did! Set in the late 1950s, I have generally gone for a slightly neglected look, but this splash of colour makes a perfect counterpoint to the grimy locomotive shed environs opposite. Particularly before the War and Nationalisation, great pride was taken at many wayside stations in the presentation of flower beds and floral displays – an activity the railway companies encouraged, prizes being awarded for the best-kept locations. The GWR also liked to plant conifers at its country stations - something which later grew a little out of hand at an otherwise picturesque Gara Bridge! On many quiet branch lines, the staff had ample time to attend to horticulture. Even today, some stations are enlivened with hanging baskets and planters, while heritage railways often make a point of recreating former floral glories. Certain locations, such as Midsomer



Norton on the S&D, found fame for their displays, while a spectacular Baynards, on the ex-LBSCR Cranleigh line, became a favourite with film makers - alas, no longer available to them. How about a feature on the horticultural side of Britain's railways and representing it in miniature?

READER MODELLING

CHARRINGTON'S BEDFORD TK COAL LORRY

As part of my Romford Station layout, I wanted to recreate vehicles that plied their trade in the local area. Charrington's operated from the coal yard adjacent to Romford Station. Therefore, the objective of this project was to convert a ready-to-run vehicle into a

Charrington's coal lorry. The model was bought second-hand for approximately £6.00 and was liveried as a Chipperfield's Circus lorry. Like all Oxford Diecast models, it was a good representation of the prototype, but had a less-than-realistic gloss finish.

The first job was to dismantle the vehicle. The model was held together with two screws, and the cab simply unclipped once these had been removed.

The main work was focused on altering the trailer and adding a top box above the cab to match the prototype. The trailer was modified using Plastruct and brass strip. The top box was fashioned from Plastikard, and required careful filling with Milliput at the interface with the cab roof. The coal load was a purchase from Harburn Hobbies, which required repainting. A driver was added using a hand-painted Prieser figure. Taillights were added by amending the original model and gluing them to a strip of Plastruct angle. The large wing mirrors were fashioned from 0.3mm brass rod and small pieces of Plastikard with silver foil added. The original transfers were removed with T-Cut and the vehicle was sprayed with Halford's grey primer, then airbrushed with Tamiya dark green - an excellent match for the prototype. Details such as the indicator and brake/headlights were carefully picked out with enamel paints.

The main expense was the decals and lettering. Similar to my model of the London Transport RT bus, I used Fox Transfers. However, the lettering on this model was individually-applied. The number plates were recreated on my computer and printed on a laser jet printer. It was then weathered with a 3:1 mix of Humbrol dark grey and leather. The final touch was to add coal bags from folded chocolate wrappers, which were then

KILLYBEGS

If there's a line you've wanted to model, in a not-so-common scale, why let impracticalities get in the way? Chris Romain didn't...

have always had a fascination with narrow gauge railways and volunteered, briefly on the Ffestiniog Railway on the deviation at Dduallt. I became aware of the County Donegal Railway in the mid-1970s and eventually visited Donegal, where I quickly became heavily involved in the County Donegal Railway Restoration Company, whose mission is to restore a section of the old railway east of Donegal Town. During my numerous visits, I travelled to all parts of the old railway and I learnt all that I could about the history. The restoration of part of the railway is still to be achieved, so I thought that the only way to see the CDR in action was to recreate it in model form. To do this, the model had to be a faithful record of the original, down to every practical detail.

I chose the terminal station at Killybegs fishing village in the far-flung reaches of Donegal as the station had many features, including the only train shed on the system.

I decided to set the date of 1958, just before one of the steam locomotives demolished the engine shed one dark night.

I can't claim to have used new modelling techniques. As a member of the Gauge O Guild for nearly 40 years, I've had the opportunity to read about and see other people's layouts and discovered how they achieved theirs. I have always enjoyed

making things, so scratch-building was the obvious choice. In any case, there are no off-the-shelf models available and certainly nothing in the scale I've chose.

I have been particularly inspired by the layouts by Gordon and Maggie Gravett ('Pompouel'); 'Melcombe Magna' by my friend Mike Baker (BRM October 2021) and the excellent models of Irish railways by Neil Ramsay and John Campbell.

First steps

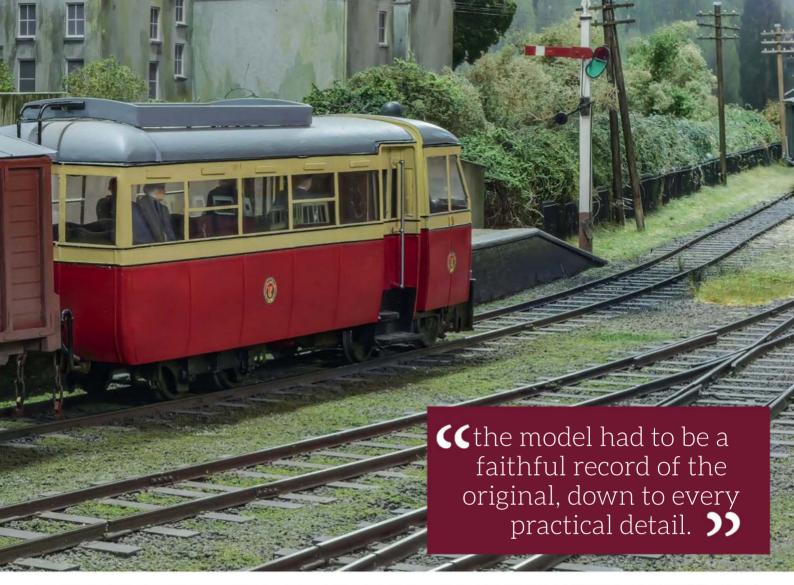
The layout design is based on the terminal station at Killybegs on the County Donegal Railway as at 1958, two years before closure. All traces of the station have since disappeared.

To accommodate the layout, I demolished the old garage at my house and rebuilt it with a highlyinsulated timber-framed shed of greater length. The main layout is along one side of the shed, with a fiddle yard the other side and the two are connected by a 12ft diameter loop outside running under the extended eaves of a purpose-built octagonal shed. The external part of the layout is monitored by four CCTV cameras, in case of derailments or other problems.

The layout was drawn on CAD, based on an historical large-scale Ordnance Survey drawing. Due to space limitations, three compromises were made: omission of the siding to the fishing pier,

reducing the angle of the bend out of the station from 35 to 22 degrees and foreshortening the distance from the station to the engine shed.

The main layout is made up of 1m x 1.2m sections for ease of construction. Each section is made of a baseboard on an egg-crate framework of 9mm plywood, pre-cut to size by a specialist supplier. This is cost-effective if you have a powered router tool. A thin cork sheet was glued to the baseboard before the track was glued down, to reduce noise transmission.

Track is hand-built using Code 143 flat-bottom nickel silver rail, which is correct to scale for the 60lb/yd prototype, soldered to copper-clad sleepers with proprietary cast brass fishplates. Rails are cut to scale 30ft lengths with additional joints to pointwork, and each rail length is connected to the DCC bus for optimum power supply. Points and curved sections were made up on the bench using CAD-generated templates. To maintain easy curves, a mirror was placed on the rails to give a 'worm's eye' view to check the alignment before final soldering of the rails to the sleepers.

The turntable has larger profile rails, cantilevered over the ends to accommodate the later, longer, railcars on converted frames of a scrapped locomotive, all as the original.

The fiddleyard has a three-road traverser and a manual turntable to turn the railcars. All track to the fiddle yard and the garden section is of Peco flexible track.

The main buildings are constructed from foamboard with modelling clay, textured and scribed to replicate the actual geometry of the prototype stonework. The 1200mm long train shed is made of basswood framing with laser-cut thin ply cladding. The roof trusses are made in a jig using brass strips and rods.

All windows and doors are laser-cut ply and the roof slates from adhesive-backed grey card with slates to scale: this saved having to cut 1200 slates individually! Chimney pots are made of cast resin to the design of the prototype.

The water tank has a 'stone' base with an etched brass tank partially filled with thick plywood, painted dark grey and topped up with Magic Water.

As a conservation architect, I have studied weathering of buildings and applied this knowledge to the model, mainly using coloured washes. As the station was on the seashore, I purchased some white-metal seagulls and placed them on roof ridges, with accompanying white stains!

Modelling challenges

Despite having pored over Gordon Gravett's books on scenery, I have struggled with making trees and hedges. The three large trees were bought.

The backscene was difficult to resolve. Ideally, I wanted to model the buildings in the street immediately behind the station, but lack of space

ROLLING STOCK

The rolling stock comprises two steam locomotives, a diesel shunting locomotive, three railcars, six coaches and 15 assorted wagons.

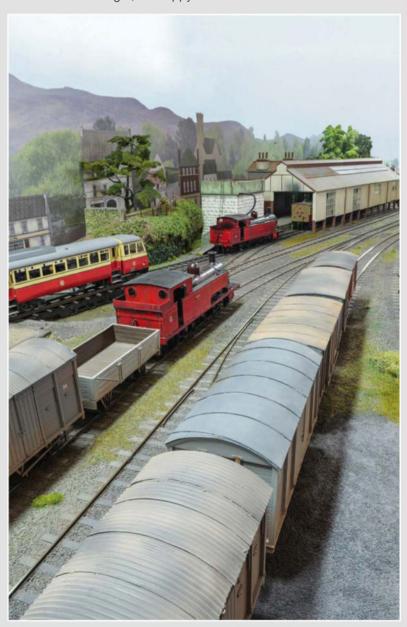
The locomotives are made from photo-etched brass based on my own artwork, with cast iron wheels and coreless motors with highefficiency gearboxes from suppliers. Chimneys and domes are brass, turned on the lathe.

Coaches have etched brass underframes with purchased brass bogie frames and insulated split-spoke wheels. The bodies are a mixture of photo-etched brass, Plastikard, or laser-cut thin ply with laser-cut card beading.

Wagon underframes are of etched brass, compensated and fitted with proprietary wheels. The bodies are made of plastic sections and embossed sheets, while the roofs are mostly of corrugated aluminium sheet, pressed to the correct scale profile. Plain roofs are made of thin nickel silver sheet with soldered beading. Hinges and brackets were made from brass etchings.

All vehicles have sealed roller bearings and 'chopper' type couplings of lost-wax brass castings made from my master with laser-cut steel choppers to allow easy uncoupling using a magnet on the end of a brass rod.

I'm not one for extreme detailing, such as inside motion, but if a model on the track looks right, I'm happy.







precluded it. I drew the surviving buildings, from measurements on site and photographs, while buildings that have disappeared since closure were scaled from many old photographs. I then drew these in 3D to give some degree of perspective and rendered/weathered the images in Photoshop. I was unable to take panoramic photographs of the village and mountains behind as I would need a boat offshore to do that. Instead, I took a series of photographs of mountains in the Dingle Peninsula to make a background, 8m long, also in Photoshop and reduced the saturation levels of distant objects, to give the impression of aerial perspective. The buildings in the backscene are also reduced in scale and the vehicles in the street are O gauge size.

Initially, I printed the backscene on my ink-jet plotter on self-adhesive backed printer paper, but the colours faded, so I had a replacement printed professionally with colourfast ink, at reasonable cost, with much better results.

Pick-ups on the locomotives is a problem yet to be completely solved. I have tried plungers and spring wires, but the two-axle little railcar and shunting locomotive do not run as smoothly as I would like.

Operation of the turntable is not perfect: I have tried indexing it with microswitches, then a photoelectric cell switch and now use a potentiometer switch, but lining the rails up accurately is difficult.

My initial operation of the point motors was using the excellent lever frame by the Scale 4 Society, but linking it to the DPDT switches to operate the point motors was unsuccessful. I solved the problem by changing to toggle switches.

If I were to repeat this project, I would take more time and try to improve my modelling skills generally, especially to make good-quality trees, hedges and vegetation.

Operating Killybegs

From the very beginning, I intended to operate the layout by DCC with sound. Although the locomotives are of large scale, the use of coreless motors and roller bearings on all stock kept the power demand within the capability of OO gauge decoders, and a few simultaneous operations have also helped.

The wireless controller allows very slow movement and smooth starts and stops, and the steam locomotives are fitted with axle-mounted cams to ensure the correct chuffing rate at all speeds. The garden section and fiddle yard are on a separate bus circuit with a power booster.

I did not wish to operate points by DCC as I considered having to input a code to change every point tiresome. Instead, I use toggle switches on a mimic panel.

Very few people now remember the sound of the County Donegal locomotives, but I decided to use decoders programmed with the sounds of a BR Standard Class 4 tank. The railcars have American





'Galloping Goose' decoders, which have good diesel sounds, as well as the horn with a similar tone to the preserved County Donegal railcar at Fintown in Co. Donegal.

The timetable at Killybegs in 1958 comprised three daily arrivals/departures by railcar, often with a van or passenger trailer, and a daily freight operated by steam. Occasional steam-hauled specials with many coaches visited Killybegs. The single-ended railcars and their trailers were turned and they also carried out shunting movements, often with passengers on board.

Naturally, there were long periods of inactivity, which can't be replicated on the model! A day's timetable can be carried out in about an hour on the model.

Activity on the layout isn't so intense now that it is nominally finished, but I continue to add further stock and intend to make a 3D-printed bus, which was often parked in the station yard. I don't intend to dismantle the layout.

Final thoughts

I am particularly pleased with the locomotives and rolling stock, which I think faithfully copy the original. Also, the buildings have generally come up to expectations. The trackwork also has smooth curves with no kinks or dips.

My advice to other modellers would be to make design decisions and plan the layout in detail before building anything. Don't change them during construction, and ensure the track layout has smooth curves, and avoid making your layout too busy: I see many layouts with too much going

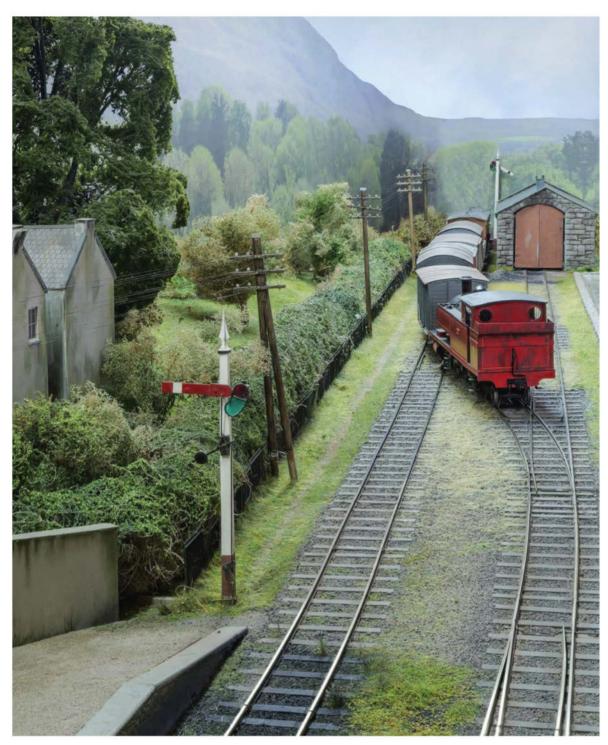

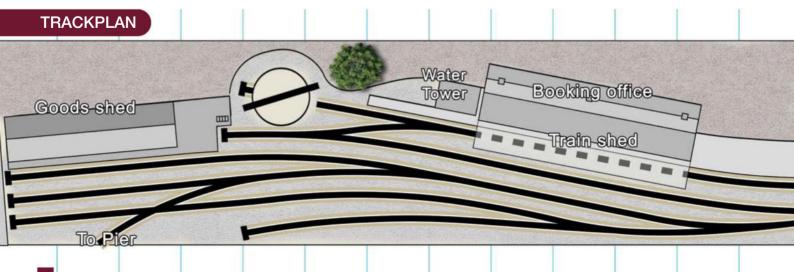

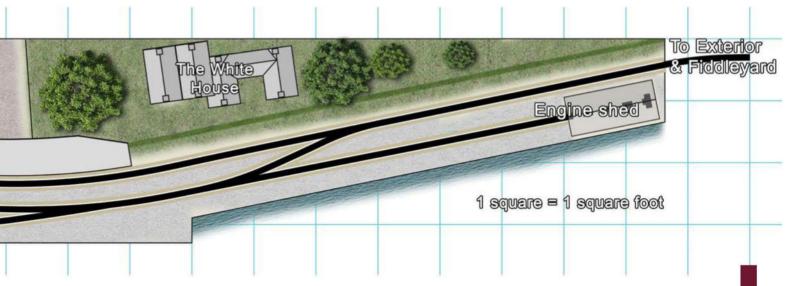

"What's wrong with a bit of sandpaper?" you might ask. Nothing much, is the answer, except that your fingers will tend to follow the surface as you sand. producing a curve, rather than a flat area.

Sanding sticks are widely available - those adjacent are from Coach and Wagon Works and are marked with the coarseness of the grit on the paper. You can even make vour own with abrasive paper, lolly sticks and some alue!



ASK Phil What colour should I paint model jeans?

First invented in 1871, 'jeans' as we know them became popular about the same time as British Rail was created, so at least some of the figures on our layouts should be wearing them.

I find Humbrol enamel (144) Intermediate Blue, a good match for new denim. To add a little wear, mix a little Humbrol (64) Light Grey, into the (144) Intermediate Blue, and dry-brush the resulting colour on, once the base coat has dried.



New on the workbench

MiG Panel Line Wash

Plastic kit modellers might have been playing with this for a while, but I've not seen it used for railway modelling. The wash is a very thin acrylic that, when placed in a depressed line (such as between planks on the side of a wagon), is drawn into the line by capillary action. It's important to shake the bottle regularly, as the colour drops to the bottom fairly quickly.

Ideal for adding some ingrained dirt in the recess of our models, 20 different colours are available, although I suspect the Deep Grey will do for pretty much all my weathering requirements.



Ideal for beginners

Gleaning locomotive wheels

It doesn't matter whether you use DC or DCC, good operation requires that locomotive wheels make contact with the rails, without a film of dirt getting in the way.



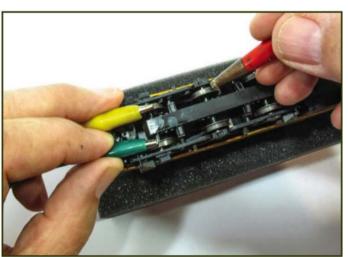
We'll be working with the locomotive upside down, so it needs to be properly supported. Let it fall on the floor and dirty wheels will be the least of your problems! I'm a fan of the Peco (PL-70) servicing cradle. The foam grips both N and OO gauge models gently, but firmly.



Start by examining the chassis for lumps of fluff and detritus picked up from the layout. Old Hornby models with 'Magnadhesion' are particularly good at picking up track pins, which then short the electrics out, but they can be removed with tweezers.



My tool of choice is a fibreglass pencil, readily available from the trade. Twist the end so around 3mm of fibres are sticking out. Don't touch them as they will stick to your finger – remove them from your skin with sticky tape if this happens.

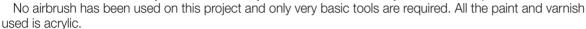


Clip power leads to the back of your controller, or onto the track, and hold them onto the wheels. This should start them turning, allowing you to gently hold the fibreglass pencil on the wheel treads. You should be able to see a difference after a few seconds.

Weather a Land Rover

The Land Rover is surely one of the most iconic British vehicles and can be used on many layouts and dioramas as it covers so many eras. Many farmers own one and it has now become beloved by 4x4 enthusiasts, Being often used off-road, it makes an excellent subject for weathering, although, in this instance, I haven't gone for a particularly muddy look.

This subject started with bright chromium bumpers that really needed toning down. The paintwork was also the gloss enamel finish that is typical of model cars. Some of the changes are to tailor the vehicle, some to age the paintwork and others to add signs of use, all of which are important to achieve the desired overall effect. Pick the ones you want and add your own touch to make your vehicle unique.

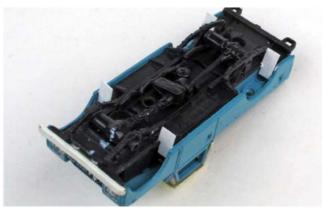

Carefully remove the wheels from the axles. These are a push-fit and can be pulled off. Be careful not to damage the chassis as it is plastic and cannot be used for leverage. Take the tyres from the rims.

Ideal for all skill levels



Mud flaps can be made from 3mm wide 0.020in Plastikard. Stick these on with Poly Cement and paint black. Small detailing such as this can make a big difference to the appearance of a model.



I made several improvements to the model before I started weathering. I painted the indicators orange, the front bumper white, the rear bumper black, the wheels white and more blue on the bodywork below the windscreen.



Brush a dark shade of grey onto the body and rub this off immediately with a cloth so that it stays in the crevices. The gloss finish of the model aids this. Work on a small area at a time.



Paint the underside with a dark shade of grey. Although you might not think that this would be a prominent part of the model, it is surprising what a difference this makes.



Brush the bodywork with a matt varnish to which has been added a small amount of an ivory colour. Use vertical strokes on the bodysides. Don't worry if the finish is patchy, it will look better.



Weather the tyres, brushing with a mud colour and then wiping most of the colour off so that it stays in the recesses. Use an off-black for the spare. I used Lifecolor's vulcanised rubber shade for the latter.

Ideal for all skill levels



Add more weathering underneath. Use rust shades on the exhaust and a darker rust on the leaf springs. Add mud splashing from the wheels onto the mud flaps.



Weather the wheel rims by brushing with a dilute mix of a dark grey. Refit the tyres to the rims and refit the wheels to the vehicle.



For wooden fittings, such as seats and the grille cover, first score lines in a piece of 0.020in plastic card using a wire brush.



Brush with thinners, then apply three shades of brown – light, medium and dark. You want the colours to mix and merge without filling in the grain on the surface.



When dry, dust with grey weathering powder (mix black and white together) to tone down the colours and blend them together. Now cut to size, touch up the edges and superglue in place.

CONCLUSION

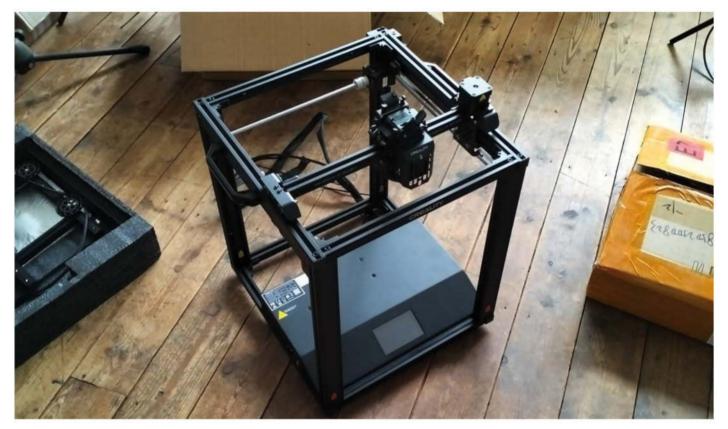
This is a simple project well within the capabilities of the average modeller. Small projects like this don't take long to finish, but give you a sense of achievement that will fire your enthusiasm for more. It is a good stepping stone for larger and more complex weathering projects.



Diary with a 3D printer: Setting up

Before my printer arrived, I ensured that I had a suitable space for its home. It takes up about 2ft square of desktop and the latter must be solid as the printer weighs 12kg. Also, the print head accelerates and decelerates very fast and this leads to a good deal of shaking and vibration that the desktop must cope with. I bought some one-inch-thick hardwood plywood to beef my worktop up, the legs already being screwed to the wall and floor.

3D printers don't come ready to use and a certain amount of construction is necessary. Don't worry, it's not all at component level, but factory-made sub-assemblies. These are precision devices and they need to be because the printing process involves moving the print head through very small movements where accuracy is everything. So, it is vital that you take your time with the build to ensure that everything fits together as well as it possibly can.

You will need a good amount of space to build the printer and a large table is to be recommended. I used the floor of my workshop, which I vacuumed first. Have somewhere to store the box afterwards, but the packing is useful during construction, so don't tidy it away until the build is complete. For the Creality Ender 5 S1 that I was building, you won't need tools, because everything is provided - screwdrivers, spanners, allen keys and side cutters.

The instructions are very good for the physical build, and I started by taking the three layers of foam packing out to see all the contents. The first parts needed for the build are on the bottom layer of the box. There is a cardboard box containing small parts, and I checked these against the contents list to ensure that nothing was missing. An SD memory card is listed as part of the contents, but I couldn't find mine, so perhaps this has changed and you need to buy one. As a result, I had to download software and the manuals from the website.

It took me a few hours to complete the assembly, and I didn't encounter issues as I double-checked everything as I went along. Just follow the instructions and take your time.

Transferring the printer to its permanent home was easy, because although the printer is heavy, two carrying handles are built into the frame, which saves you from accidentally grabbing any of the delicate mechanism on display.

Leave the side cutters and scraper out next to the printer as these will be used regularly. My wife also made a cover for the unit to keep dust off when not in use. Ensure that you use a material that is as lint-free as possible.

The printer has a box-like frame, which should prove to be sturdy, and so I anticipate good results. Next time, I'll be setting up the printer for its first print and testing it out on the basic settings to see what it can do.

Modelling fish vans

Modelling the LNER is much easier these days with all the new 'bells and whistles' that the RTR manufacturers are producing. However, it still requires an amount of kit-building to create a realistic portraval.

I have gone down the route of exploiting what RTR stock is available and kit-building the rest. However, when purchasing the same piece of stock multiple times for a scale length train, it can leave it looking somewhat boring and uniformed. With that being said, there are things you can do to make each wagon look unique with minimal work and expense and the result is having many duplicate wagons looking completely different.

One such instance of too many duplicate wagons was my fish train, consisting of around 12 Bachmann LNER 10T fish vans. This could be remedied by changing all the numbers, but for a quicker alternative, I decided to change only one letter here and there, using my weathering method to hide the differences.

Once these vehicles are placed in a train with various other kit-built LNER wagons travelling at a scale speed, the small changes become unnoticeable. These methods can be used on any vehicle or in any era of your choosing.

I hope these tips help you to improve the magnificent models the manufacturers produce for us railway modellers. Some of the wagons illustrated require a little more time than others, but the results are worth it.

The first wagon is a simple method. It's been weathered to a medium standard with a single number change. Due to Bachmann's numbers being over-scale, the HMRS number is smaller. The trick is to weather the wagon and hide the smaller number. This is a quick alteration that works – it's hard to spot the incorrect size number in a train at scale speed.

Ideal for all skill levels



Wagon 2

In some cases, a wagon could spring a leak on its roof and potentially damage the contents, so a tarpaulin was draped

over the roof and tied down. This would have enabled the wagon to reach its destination with the merchandise unspoiled before being sent for repairs. The LNER tarpaulin is from the Smiths range, turned inside out. It's scrunched up before being placed on the model to give a worn and beaten look. I glue the tarp to the roof only and use the rope to pull tension down the sides, just like you would in real life. The rope is sewing thread that I stole from my sister's sewing box... don't tell her!



Wagon 3

Mimicking the first wagon, this also has a single number change with a lighter weathering effect. One small yet effective

method that brings a wagon to life is chalk markings made by shunters, station staff or dock workers. This can be replicated by using a white pencil sharpened to a very fine point. Paraphernalia would include marshalling yard line numbers, random markings and small instructions, notices or descriptions. Random scribble works well for showing many words. The trick is to keep the pencil sharpened after every use to keep words and letters clear.



Wagon 4

Carrying on with another somewhat clean wagon, this one doesn't have a number change and carries the original factory

lettering. However, it's been weathered to show someone has attempted to clean the wagon while it was being loaded or unloaded, resulting in muck and dirt on the right-hand side where the door would have been if it were open. Often, spur of the moment ideas work best. This wagon could have been a disaster as I wanted to replicate scratch markings from the door sliding across the outside. Using a scalpel, I gently scribed scratch marks horizontally to demonstrate this; thankfully, my crude idea worked.



Wagon 5

This wagon has also received the single number change and been weathered. but this time I have gone for the heavy

approach showing a really grimy in-use look. Once the wagon was heavily weathered, I went along with a cotton bud and thinners and wiped away the enamel paint mix on the numbers, letters and 'NE' branding. This gives off the idea that an employee of the LNER has attempted to clean the wagon with a rag as best he or she could to help identify the wagon better.



Wagon 6

My favourite fish wagon – compared to the other five, this required more work, but it was worth it. The Bachmann fish wagons are in the pre-1937 lettering

scheme, but I wanted to create one in the post-1937 small lettering with the older style showing through the repainted sides. This was achieved by removing the large numbers on the door and the tonnage on the bottom left side with a scalpel, then cleaning the areas with a fiberglass pencil. With the wagon cleaned, I repainted it using Phoenix Precision LNER red oxide paint. Only apply one coat so the larger 'NE' is still visible. I re-lettered the wagon using HMRS transfers with Peter Tatlow's LNER Wagons Volume 4A as a guide.

How to transport rolling stock

Don't you just love opening the box on a new locomotive for the first time? Carefully extracting the model from its plastic cocoon to place on the track. Once run, do you put it back in the box? I prefer not to. Years of exhibiting layouts mean that I want stock storage that is quick and easy to use. I have seen people put every item back in its makers' box, but they tend to be last out of the door when the show is closed.

If you really must keep the boxes, with the stock in more user-friendly trays, you can store them in the loft; out of the way where it's safe. We know that perfect boxes appeal to collectors, so this way avoids rips, bashes and other damage – even collectors benefit from stock boxes.



Modern rolling stock is supplied in plastic clam-shell packing, perfect for keeping it secure on a journey from China. It will happily pass a 'drop test' where a box lands on a hard surface from a height, but at a cost sometimes of making extracting a locomotive, without knocking details off, difficult.



If, like me, you add details to your models, the chances are they won't fit back in the packing without alteration. Here, we have a Bachmann Quarry Hunslet with a crew from Modelu. To get the locomotive back in its box, I've had to carefully cut away the plastic to accommodate them.



The 'Warley Stock Box' is a slot-together cardboard construction with two levels and removable cardboard dividers. As supplied, it is perfect for traditional OO gauge, four-wheel rolling stock, but easy to modify if you need to accommodate longer items. Available from Modellers Mecca, the Bachmann Collectors club, or the NEC exhibition.



Sold as a laser-cut flat pack, these stock trays from Scale Model Scenery are stackable and designed around a OO gauge coach, or bogie locomotive length. If your model doesn't fill the slot, place sponge in the end to stop it rattling when the tray is being carried.



Many firms sell foam inserts to fit into readily available, and very strong, plastic crates. This version is from Ten Commandments Models, available in many different formats for both N and OO models. As well as protecting your stock, the crates are stackable, reducing the space required, and dustproof, so the models are kept in the best condition.



I made my own trays using 45mm by 12mm stripwood on a plywood base – with an added layer of 9mm square to accommodate the extra height of vans. Individual pockets are made from 2mm thick Daler board. They are quick to load with stock at the end of a show.

Ideal for all skill levels

Painting coal

Railway wagons had to earn their keep, and the most common load was coal. Read-to-use loads are available for many models, but moulded plastic needs a little help to look like lumps of the black stuff. We've taken Parkside (PA02C) loads designed for Hornby wagons, and made some improvements using real coal, and paint.



Coal isn't really black - it's more a dark grey, so I start with a base coat of Revell No. 9 enamel 'Anthracite', but you could use Railmatch 'Weathered Black' if you prefer. Both look more realistic than a pure black, something you rarely see in real life.



With the paint semi-dry, but not hard (leave it about half an hour), dry-brush with Humbrol 27004, 'Gunmetal' to give the coal a little sparkle. Once dry, you can polish this with a cloth, and it will highlight all the edges, giving the plastic texture.



Finally, to provide the all-important dustiness, brush black weathering powder over the load. This will sit in the hollows, adding more depth to the moulding.



Ignore advice about hitting coal with hammers to break it up - that just makes a mess. Squash lumps with the biggest pliers you can find, and you'll have far more control, and it won't get everywhere!



Cover the plastic load with neat PVA and sprinkle smaller lumps of coal over it. Try not to use dust, which looks unnatural. Coal varies in size a lot, with some collieries producing really large lumps.



Mist the coal with water, then drip some watered-down PVA with a few drops of washing up liquid added, over the load - just like you do with ballast. This should keep it in place forever.

Build a shed for a Wickham Trolley

Not so long ago, the railways didn't like storing equipment outside vulnerable to the weather. Locomotives had sheds, with a roof, and even the humble Wickham Trolley was provided with a small garage to keep it dry when not in use. These shelters sometimes incorporated a platelayer's hut in one end. They make fantastic additions to the station area of a steam- or early diesel-based layout. You can even cheat, and leave the doors shut if you don't have a trolley to display!



How did the Wickham get on the rails?

A Wickham trolley isn't very heavy, and a gang of four could heft it off the track. In fact, this is what they would do once they reached their work site to leave the line clear. The sheds were normally situated at right angles to a siding, the trolleys would be rolled in and out, then lifted onto the track as required.

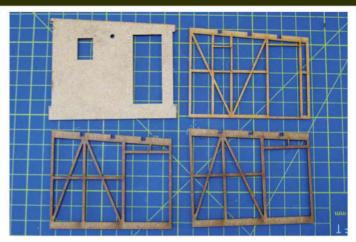


l've built many kits, and none has ever been presented as well as this one. The high-quality card box contains neatly-wrapped parts, and a folder with detailed step-by-step instructions inside.

Ideal for intermediate Modellers



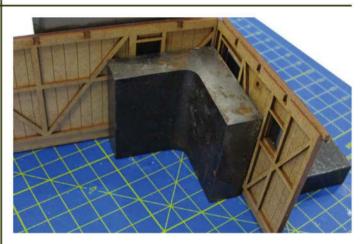
All the main components are laser-cut in thin MDF. Releasing them from the frets is a matter of cutting the retaining tabs with a sharp knife. These can be tricky to see from the front, but flip the fret over, and they are much easier to spot.



Although well designed, you really need your wits about you. Follow the instructions to the letter, checking carefully that you have the correct components for each stage. Some look similar to each other, and with the walls, check that the engraved side is inside the building.



PVA or superglue is recommended for assembly, but I prefer Roket Card Glue from Deluxe Materials for the job. It grabs faster than PVA, but not as quickly as superglue, allowing a little wiggle time when aligning components. It's runny stuff, so needs careful handling, but does everything you need for the main assembly.



The walls need to be located accurately, or the floor won't fit. Engineers' squares are useful, but for model building work, I find these cast iron angles (from Squires Tools) invaluable because they are heavy enough to hold parts where you want them.



When fitting doors into buildings, where I can, I leave them slightly ajar. This hints at the life within, as well as avoiding any worries that the door actually fits the frame, although that's not a problem with this kit.



The modeller needs to supply some O gauge track. I cut a few lengths 125mm long, and removed all but three sleepers. The rail slides into the floor for the trolley to stand on. Bullhead rail would be most appropriate, however, I used flat-bottomed rail, and it works fine.



Painting is kept simple - the building is sprayed with red oxide car primer and then patchily over-coated with Railmatch Sleeper Grime so the oxide shows through in places. This is finished with a dry-brush of Humbol 93, Desert Yellow. Talented painters could really go to town in here, but this gives a pretty good effect.



Despite being difficult to see on the completed model, the office end includes a locker and stove. A few chairs might be useful, and even some figures in the future. Fortunately, the roof can be left removable, so I can come back to it one day.

Conclusion

The kit certainly lived up to the initial first impressions when opening the box. All parts are cut with precision, and none needed fettling to fit. What was required, was care and attention during construction. Check and double-check each stage with a dry run to make sure you have the right parts in the right orientation. It's only the need to really concentrate that makes this an intermediate build - the build is no harder than a Metcalfe kit and the end result is considerably more detailed.

On a layout, I'd treat this as a starting point with much detritus added to the scene - old signs, sleepers, oil drums, that sort of thing. It's the perfect cameo scene that will attract attention. My scene has a footprint slightly smaller than A4, so space shouldn't be too much of an issue.

A selection of Scammells

It all seemed like such a simple project at first. 247 Developments handed me a selection of its new 3D-printed bodies for diecast Scammell trucks at our Doncaster show. All I had to do was 'pop' them onto die-cast models, and the result would be an interesting fleet of road vehicles.

Steam-era modellers should be familiar with the Scammell mechanical horse. Large numbers of them were operated by railway companies to deliver light goods from local stations to customers. Strictly speaking, only the older, boxier cab versions are 'mechanical horses', the more streamlined cabs were known as Scarabs, but the name has stuck. Over 30,000 of all variants were produced by the time manufacturing ended in 1968. Tracteurs FAR in France also licensed the design and made their own version with a Citroën engine.

We tend to assume that the three-wheel tractor and trailer combination was the only option, but Scammell offered a number of other bodies. Oxford Diecast has made a refuse truck version, but to date, that's it. Now, 247 Developments provides several alternatives.

The plan was to buy some Oxford Diecast Scammells, and fit the bodies, but I couldn't find any. One minute the item you're looking for is everywhere, but when you want it – no chance! So, I thought to use the Corgi Trackside version – how different can they be?

Very different, it happens. The Corgi model is slightly bigger than that from Oxford, but not consistently. The measurement from the back of the cab to the mudguards is shorter, even though the cab is bigger. So, the new bodies don't fit. Not without the attention of a razor saw, anyway. It's tricky, because the resin is brittle, and my attempts at shortening a milk float body left me with many broken pieces.

Another alternative, the ancient Airfix, now Dapol, model, is a different size, too. A pity, because despite its age, this is a more-detailed alternative than the metal versions, though its cab windows are wrong.

After a few lucky finds in second-hand cabinets, I managed to acquire Oxford Diecast models, and the replacement bodies are a good fit. With a little work, priming and filler, the way is open to add variety to our fleets. Even the trailers won't be wasted, as they cluttered up many goods yards awaiting their next load.

Something isn't quite right here. You can see that the Oxford model on the left is a bit smaller than the Corgi version on the right. Airfix fits between the two. These are all supposed to be to 1:76 scale...



Some die-cast models are held together with cross-head screws, which are easy to remove. Rivets, on the other hand, need to be carefully drilled out using a bit that is wider than the head of the rivet. An electric screwdriver is perfect for the job because it's slow.



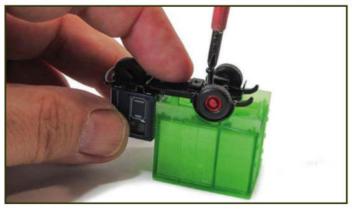
Every die-cast model comes apart differently. This is one of the Corgi models stripped down - the chassis is interesting, being in two halves, clipped together to retain the wheelsets.



A soak in paint stripper for the metal parts will remove the paint. I've left the chassis alone as these don't change colour, so can simply be matt-varnished, but the body is stripped, then primed with car spray paint.



247 Developments bodies are 3D-printed using a translucent resin. I'd recommend a coat of primer, for no other reason than it's difficult to see what you have until there's some colour on it!



In theory, the replacement body should screw to the die-cast model, but the resin is quite brittle, and every time I tried this, the post I was screwing into shattered. Maybe if you tap the hole this would work, but it's easier to use superglue.



The dropside body. Ideal for builders and local delivery firms.



The horse box body. By sanding off the side windows, it could also work as a delivery truck, as I've found photographs of versions with the box over the cab.



The box body is favoured by larger firms who would emblazon the sides with their logos for advertising purposes.



A flatbed body – as with the traditional trailer, loads would have to be roped down or held in place with a tarpaulin.



My favourite – the recovery truck. Prototypes were found in both the Mersey and Blackwall Tunnels where the threewheeler's manoeuvrability made them very useful.

Ballasting track

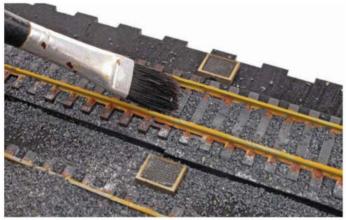
To model the real world, the track on your model railway needs ballast. Here is a quick guide on how to ballast your layout.



Use a measuring spoon to accurately mix seven parts ballast to one part Ballast Magic dry powder glue. As this creates dust, wear a mask. Ensure that the two are mixed well together and do small, separate batches as necessary.



Use a spoon to tip the ballast into place in small quantities. I like to start with the space between the sleepers first.



Use a stiff brush to push the ballast along the track and use a dabbing action to push ballast away from the sleeper chairs.



When all the ballast is in place, spray with ordinary tap water and leave it to set for a few hours. It will look shiny to start with, but will dry with a matt finish.



Drip small amounts of Dark tone onto the sleepers to represent oil and other liquids that have dropped onto the track. Concentrate on areas where locomotives are likely to stand.





LAYOUT I 009 I ASHGATE

here the Rainbow Ends' was the name of a café situated adjacent to the terminus at Ashover Butts of the seven-mile-long Ashover Light Railway. The café was owned by the railway company to provide facilities for visitors. Interestingly, the café was managed by Mabel Holmes. I am not sure if this is any relative but my father, Dennis Holmes, was born only five miles away in Clay Cross. On bank holidays and summer weekends, hundreds of people would journey to Ashover on the "little railway." The railway was built by the Clay Cross Company primarily to service its quarries at Ashover Butts and Milltown/Fallgate but from its opening in 1925, it offered a passenger service to the 13 stations/halts on the line.

I first came across the railway in the late 1950s, when my parents and grandparents would visit the Miners' Arms at Milltown. I would wander down the road to Fallgate yard and, although the railway was officially closed in 1950, a number of wagons had been retained at Fallgate to service the facilities there, motive power

being in the hands of a small Ransomes and Rapier four-wheel diesel and a small Ruston diesel.

The original stock on the line was mainly ex-W.D., the company having purchased four W.D. Baldwins and almost 80 W.D. bogie wagons. Luxury was provided for the passenger services, however, in the shape of four brand new coaches constructed by the Gloucester Railway Carriage and Wagon Company.

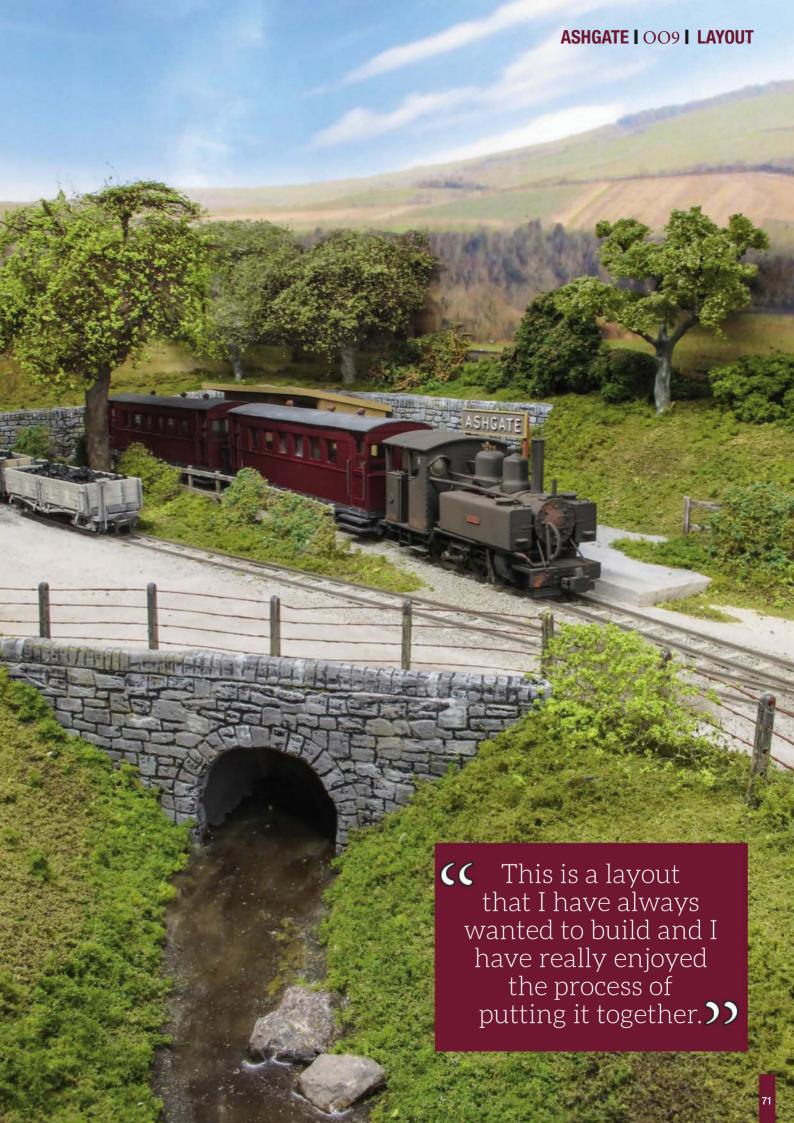
Layout Design

The track layout is loosely based on the facilities at Ashover Butts and Fallgate, which have been combined, hence the name. Ashover Butts comprised a single platform face and a coal wharf. This was located next to a triangle, which enabled passenger trains to arrive in a forward direction, turn on the triangle and leave in a forward direction. The triangle and the runaround facilities in the adjoining quarry complex are provided off-scene by a three-road turntable. Two of the tracks leave the main baseboard through the quarry buildings and the third, a main line track, exits behind

a strategically-placed tree. Hopefully, this creates the illusion that I was looking for.

As soon as I saw the Bachmann W.D. Baldwin Tank, I had to build an ALR-inspired layout. I have two Baldwins, one factory-weathered and one which I have weathered myself, together with a number of W.D. wagons, which are either the Bachmann version or earlier Parkside Dundas kits. All the rolling stock has been weathered and I have also built a model of the ugly duckling locomotive Amos, a Dick, Kerr diesel electric. This is based on a Worsley Works etches and a Dapol Terrier chassis with the middle wheels removed. Coaching stock is constructed from Meridian Models kits and the coaches and the wagon kits have Bemo couplings, but I have fitted Dapol magnetic couplings to the other rolling stock, together with under-track magnets.

The track is Peco Code 55 N gauge track with every other sleeper removed, and this gives a good representation of the ALR permanent way. The track requires careful ballasting and, once this has been sprayed with a buff-coloured paint, it is toned down with a dusting of sieved ash from the fire. The points are similarly Peco, operated by Seep solenoids.

Scenic work

The buildings are mainly scratch-built with the exception of the mess hut and grounded wagon body, which are both Ratio kits. Other buildings are constructed on card mounting board cores with appropriate finishes. For boarding, I use postcard strips and rooves are a mixture of corrugated aluminium and wet-&-dry paper. The main quarry building is principally corrugated aluminium with details added the louvres are Class 20 etched side vents.

As it is Derbyshire, I wanted to incorporate stone finishes. The stone is created by mixing Polyfilla and PVA glue and then scribing the individual stones – very time-consuming, but worth the effort. The water tank is a small piece of copper tube overlaid with thin card that has had rivets embossed on the rear. It is a shrunken version of a tank, which stood in Fallgate yard. To create the stream, I painted a base colour of browns and covered this with several thick coats of varnish. Small stones were set into the varnish and in places, scatter was introduced between the coats to represent weeds.

PORTABLE DESIGN

The layout is designed to be portable and to fit into the back of my car for easy transport. Consequently, it needed to be light. It is built in two sections: the main scenic area is on a single board 4ft 6in long and approximately 1ft wide. All the main controls are incorporated into this board. The fiddle yard is approximately 20in long. The construction is similar to my other layouts utilising 3mm ply, laminated for the front and rear and joined by softwood cross members. The surface is 3mm ply with a cork topping and ply doublers under the point areas for strength. I have incorporated diagonal bracing under the surface to prevent warping.

The boards are mounted on trestles and cross beams, giving a viewing height of approximately 51in. I have installed a lighting pelmet which is cantilevered from the rear of the baseboard on tubular supports, these are also utilised jointly with my other layout, 'Midholme'.



LAYOUT I OO9 I ASHGATE

The scenery follows my normal methods of cardboard formers and glued paper strips, which are painted with weak Polfilla incorporating black or brown acrylic paint. When it has dried, various flocks and other ground cover are built up using diluted PVA. Trees are twisted wire for the main shape, again covered in Polfilla and PVA with teased-out postiche, lightly covered in flock. The backscene is Gaugemaster, sprayed with matt varnish to tone it down. I spent much time trying to blend the scenery into the backscene to create the illusion of depth.

Operation sequence

The control is analogue using a Morley N gauge controller. The wiring is relatively simple as it operates on the 'one engine in steam' principle. The points are solenoid-operated and uncoupling is a mixture of permanent under-track magnets for the Dapol couplers, and some lifting ramps for the Bemo couplers, which are operated by aircraft control push linkages. The ramps are disguised within the track bed - I hope you can't see them.

The layout doesn't operate to a timetable, but I have a sequence of operations, entailing bringing in empty mineral wagons, removing and shunting the full ones, and then taking these off-scene. The mineral operations are interspersed with passenger activity and occasional coal supplies being taken to the coal dock. In all, a sequence lasts about 20 minutes, which hopefully maintains interest for anyone looking at the layout.

In building the layout, I have tried not to cram too much in. It is always tempting to incorporate another siding or more features. On this occasion, I have tried to keep it simple by having the triangle and run round facilities off-scene, and the turntable performs these functions well. I appreciate we all model differently, but what I was trying to create was a small portable layout that I could operate and enjoy myself and hopefully provide some entertainment for other like-minded souls at exhibitions.

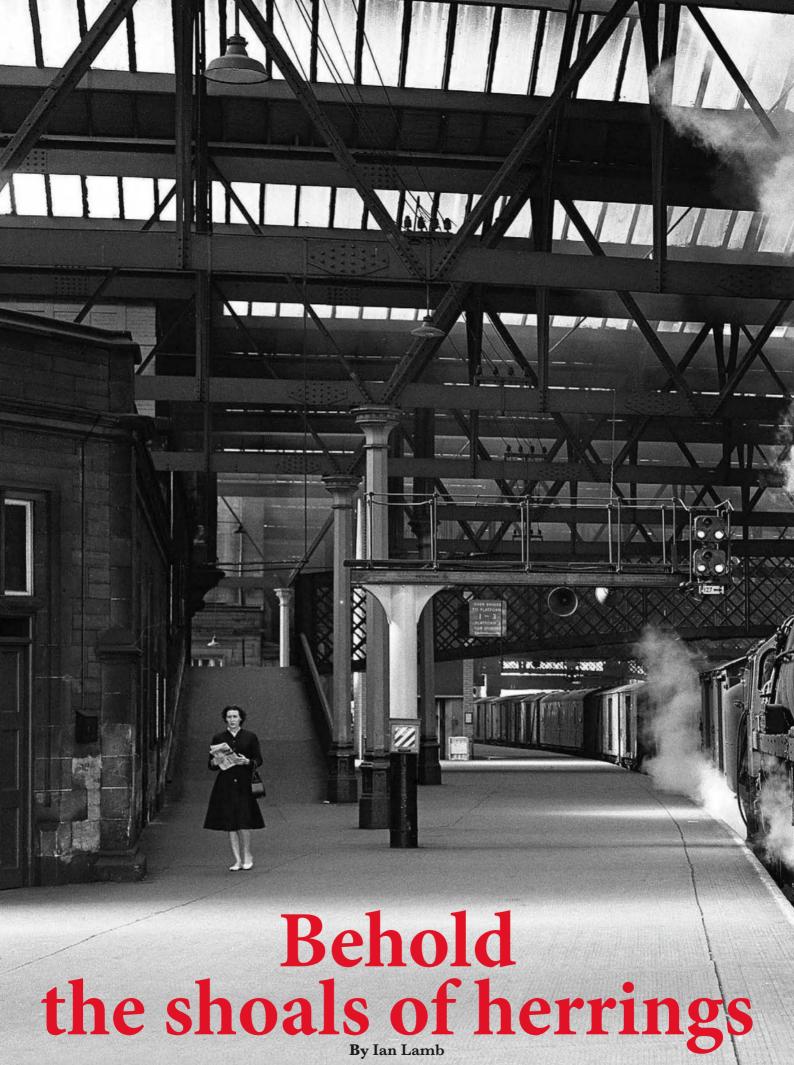


TRACKPLAN











n Highland Railway days, at the height of the herring fishing season, a special express fish train was run daily from Buckie to Liverpool and Manchester via Aviemore – one could say that it was the forerunner of the 4.45pm from Perth – but that route was never going to compete with the better access over Great North of Scotland/North British and Caledonian routes via Aberdeen.

Those of us of a certain age may well be very familiar with Ewan McColl's evocative song, *The Shoals of Herring*, a fisherman remembering his youth and becoming a man on the Scottish sailing luggers that followed the herring in the heydays before WW1. To a certain extent, the song celebrates the massive presence of the Scottish fleet in the Yarmouth fishery and the onshore curing works. Quite apart from the fishermen, the singing of the Scottish herring girls was a familiar setting on the streets and quays of Yarmouth. They were

also famed for being able to gut 46 fish every 60 seconds, all day long.

"With our nets and gear, we're faring on the wild and wasteful ocean. It's there that we hunt and we earn our bread as we hunted for the shoals of herring."

All around the British coastline, there were fishing ports of one kind or another, but on this occasion, concentration is given to the high-speed transfer of fish from the far north of Scotland to London and Lancashire.

Food from the sea in these parts has always been a way of life, but it was the introduction of herring fishing in the 19th century that brought major changes and created an industry. Harbours were developed, boats became bigger, and in addition to exporting catches by sea, the railways distributed large quantities of fish to the home markets.

'Smoking' saved herring from 'going off', the end product being better known as 'kippers'. They were then boxed and sent all over the country as part of normal passenger services.

Buckie's Cluny harbour was built in 1880, and soon became one of the most important herring fishing ports in Scotland. The railway was integral to the life of Buckie. The Great North of Scotland railway station was built adjacent to the harbour and generated a large amount of traffic from the railway, both inbound and out.

Steam fishing boats were on the horizon with

their propensity for 'trawling', which was to cause much argument and animosity among the conservation-minded driftnet fishermen for many years to come. By the turn of the 20th century, the fishing industry in the North-East was very buoyant.

The coming of the railways revolutionised the UK fish traffic. Grimsby's old harbour was rebuilt in the 1850s by two railway companies; the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire, plus the Great Northern. By the 1890s, it was handling a quarter of Britain's fish output. At the end of the Victorian era, whether coast or inland, fresh fish had significantly changed the nation's eating habits. It is said that the 'fish specials' earned the 'saxpence' for the Great North of Scotland Railway, and their shares on the Stock Exchange were known as 'Haddocks'!

By 1912, fish traffic was comparatively small – around 2500T – whereas in 1918, 28,500T were sent from Fraserburgh and Peterhead, mainly due to a large export trade with Germany and Russia. July 2, 1918, registered the peak of traffic, when 16 fish trains ran on the Buchan line. On one occasion in 1920, 14 specials left Peterhead for the south! Extra trains were simply run on telegraphic notice alone!

Once upon a time, there were 700 trawling boats in Grimsby harbour. With all this fish around, 'Fish and Chips' became the 'national dish'! Whitby in particular – as of today – was always considered as the best location for such a meal.

A quote from LNER days at Grimsby Fish dock, "It was still dark on a very cold morning, and the trawlers had off-loaded their catches onto the 'pontoon'. The hubbub and – to an outsider – the chaos of the fish auction began, and the 'lumpers' started their task of barrowing the boxes to the various merchants' premises. The rest of the day was taken up with despatches to customers in all parts of the country.

Empty fish vans were placed in three rows right round the land side of the dock, joined together by bridging boards. Each van bore a number, and each merchant was given a gazetteer showing the appropriate van number alongside the name of each town and village in the country.

For several hours, the constant noise of barrows continued as the 'lumpers' moved the boxes to the vans. Everyone worked to strict time limits. Early traffic for the south-west left about 1pm for Banbury, and a little before that the bridging boards were dropped, doors slammed to and the engine backed on. It might be a 'K3' 2-6-0 or an ex-GC 4-6-0. If this traffic was not in the hands of consignees early next morning, there was the devil to pay."

Fish was big business, and the LNER served more fishing ports than any other. Nevertheless, the LMS also carried heavy loads, some of it from the smaller ports like Oban and Mallaig, of which the latter was the principal reason for constructing the railway extension from Fort William.

That doyen of railway photography - Verden Anderson - has captured so wonderfully the typical atmosphere at Mallaig port as the whole railway involvement in the fishing trade builds up to a climax before heading south with the precious cargo. A decade later would see diesels replace steam motive power, then - in the 1970s - the whole area would be redeveloped, with only the station platform remaining, primarily for passenger

During an attempt to resurrect fish traffic on the Mallaig extension, a trial consignment to Grimsby was run in March, 1987. An Icelandic vessel landed the fish at the rail terminal on March 6 and they were taken south in 11 insulated 'Interfrigo' wagons. They were worked as a separate train to Fort William for attachment to the following day's 06.01 Speedlink service to Mossend. This enterprise was the result of several months planning by 'Icescot', a consortium of Icelandic and Scottish businesses. It led to further similar consignments, until midsummer when the traffic was suspended due to circumstances at the Iceland end.

Throughout its life, the fish trains must have been a logistical nightmare for the railway operating department, never mind acquisition of all the necessary locomotives and rolling stock. North of Aberdeen, most services combined at Maud Junction, usually proceeding double-headed as that saved line capacity, though the length of such trains could cause problems when crossing others further

down the line.

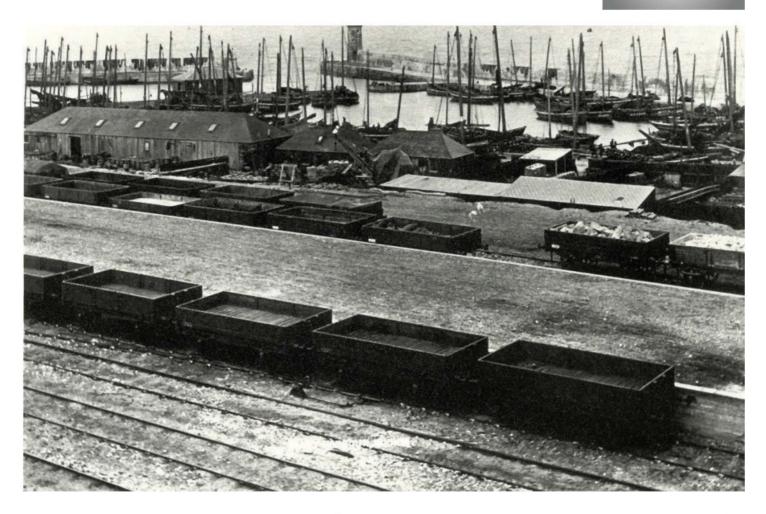
Rolling stock changed over the years. Initially, open wagons conveyed fish in a similar manner to the holds of trawlers that had landed the catch. Gutted fish was boxed, stored in wagons and sheeted over before a vehicle specifically designated for this form of traffic came into widespread use around 1910 primarily because of refrigeration technology. It is believed that in the early- to mid-1950s regular 'XP' vans were packed with ice to keep the fish as fresh as possible. The same was true of Hull exports.

In British Railways days, fish traffic was totally composed of insulated vans or containers. Those for the express trains to London had roller bearings and a large 'blue spot' for easy identification. The main fish train from Buchan was due in Aberdeen at 1pm and marshalled into the 1.43pm 'Blue Spot Special' to London. Whenever I could find the time in the late-1940s/early-'50s, I would cycle to Saughton Junction on the western outskirts of Edinburgh to observe the 'Blue Spot Special' - usually Gresley 'V2'-hauled - as it leaned to the sharp curve at fast speed on approach to the myriad of points shortly after accelerating from the Forth Bridge.

However, for most of us, the fish trains really made their name in the 1950/60s, particularly those designated as the 'Blue Spot Specials', or as my dad put it, "The fish got a better journey to London than us passengers!" That comment would seem to be correct from research where a native Buchan

resident explained in the local dialect, "Deid fish get a quicker hurl than live passengers!" In order that the good people of London could have fresh fish as quickly as possible from landing to table, that very valuable load had to cover a distance of around 600 miles in such a short time, but it was worth it.

From the mid-20th century, road vehicles were becoming more competitive. Nevertheless, fish continued as good railway business until the late-'70s, and in the case of the Buchan line, such freight continued until 1979, some 14 years after the passenger services had been withdrawn. Steam was still in vogue in 1960 as the shadow of the new diesels gradually encroached to replace the required motive power. It may only be one train a day that trod the Buchan tracks, but just look at the amount of vans that were conveyed to Aberdeen where even more vehicles were added for the long, but speedy, journey south to London.

Around 70 years ago on the East Coast route, whether a 'Pacific' - more usually a 'V2' - or occasionally a 'K3' locomotive, fish traffic was rightly given over to express speed conditions. British Railways developed the 'Blue Spot' van from LNER designs to enable 'The Fish' to run at express speed.

Not to be outdone in the 1950s/60s, the West Coast train left the Deeside Yard at Aberdeen a few minutes after the 'Blue Spot Special' and headed over to Perth, where normally a Carlisle-based engine would take over the train on its southward

journey.

A steady 75mph was no problem for the motive power, yet - even today - these 'heavy-weight' refrigerated articulated lorries are restricted to drivers' hours and a maximum 60mph, and regularly seem to be stranded at Dover for some reason or other, when that cargo could be so easily transferred through the Channel Tunnel through the night in containerised bogie wagons. Surely, this traffic (not least of all due to the perishable nature of the load) should be successfully run on the railway, in much the same way as Tesco has done with the overnight freight train between Mossend and Inverness and elsewhere?

As modellers, invariably, concentration and accolades tend to focus on locomotives and great

trains, often missing out on the humble goods wagon. Not so in this instance. In recent times, Hornby has gone to great lengths to upgrade wagon stock, especially so with the BR Diagram 800 12T fish van.

My models are predominantly Hornby Dublo/ Wrenn and are around 50 years old. Apart from complete repainting and number change, my rather ancient Hornby (R866) ex-Great Eastern Class B12/3 4-6-0 locomotive had a lot of work done on the body and tender, but benefited enormously from a new chassis in recent years.

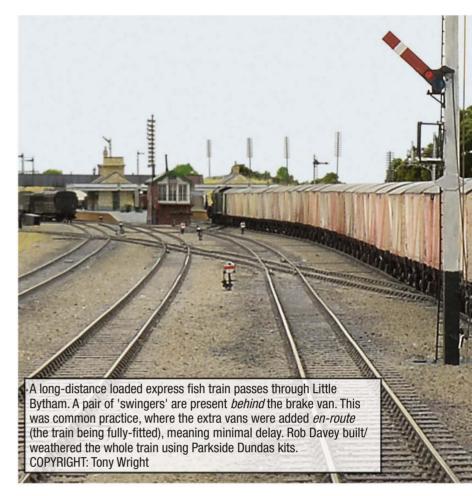
Working conditions throughout the period, when almost all fish traffic went by rail, is admirably recorded by David Bayes of the 'Midland & Great Northern Circle' in the 1970s. "During the height of the herring fishing at Yarmouth in the 1920s, Harry Prince was a leading shunter and worked 12-hour shifts. The season was ending, so the fishing girls returned to Scotland.

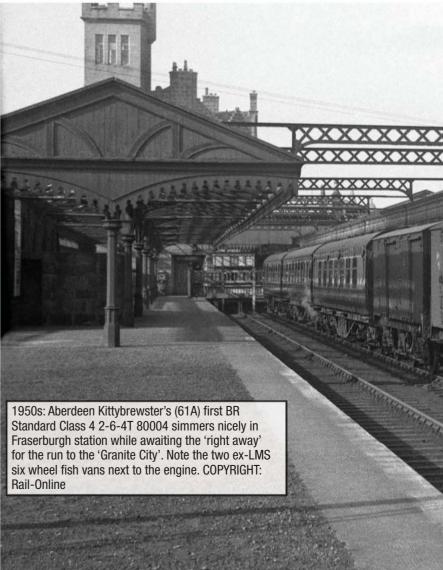
Harry - who was a passed guard - was on a 6am to 6pm turn of duty, was told just before going off duty that four 'Scots Girls Specials' had been run, but a fifth was necessary, and, as no guard was available, he would have to work it to Melton Constable. He protested: stating that he'd had no food since midday, and no money. So, he was given cash to buy food (which meant beer to Harry!).

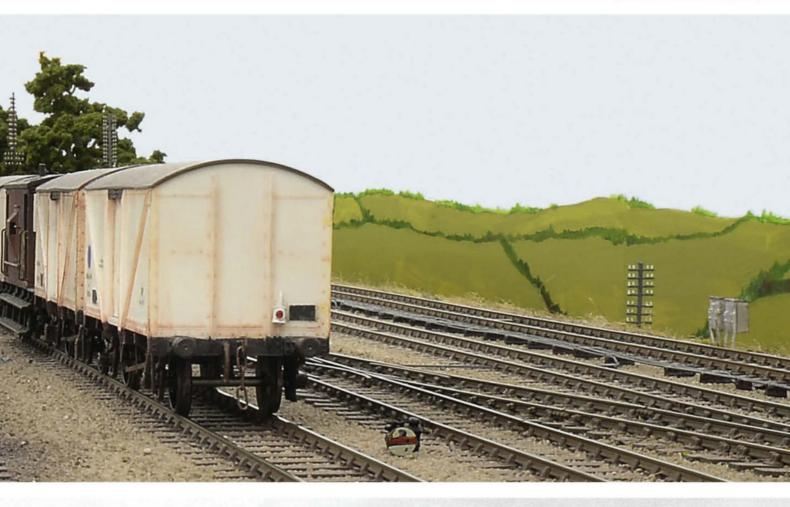
At Melton, they had no relief, so was told he would have to work to South Lynn. Again, he complained and was given money - and the same thing happened at South Lynn and Spalding. Here he protested that he didn't know the road, but was told to get in the brake and go. Harry didn't know where he was, and locomotives were changed at various places en-route, the driver telling him just to get in the brake van, and things would be alright.

He arrived in Edinburgh Waverley late-morning and told his tale to the Station Inspector who took him to the Station Master. Harry was taken to the dining room where the Station Master told the staff to give him all he could eat and pack some food for the return journey. He arrived back at Yarmouth Vauxhall on Sunday after nearly 60 hour's duty! He never returned a guard's journal, and was never asked for one!"

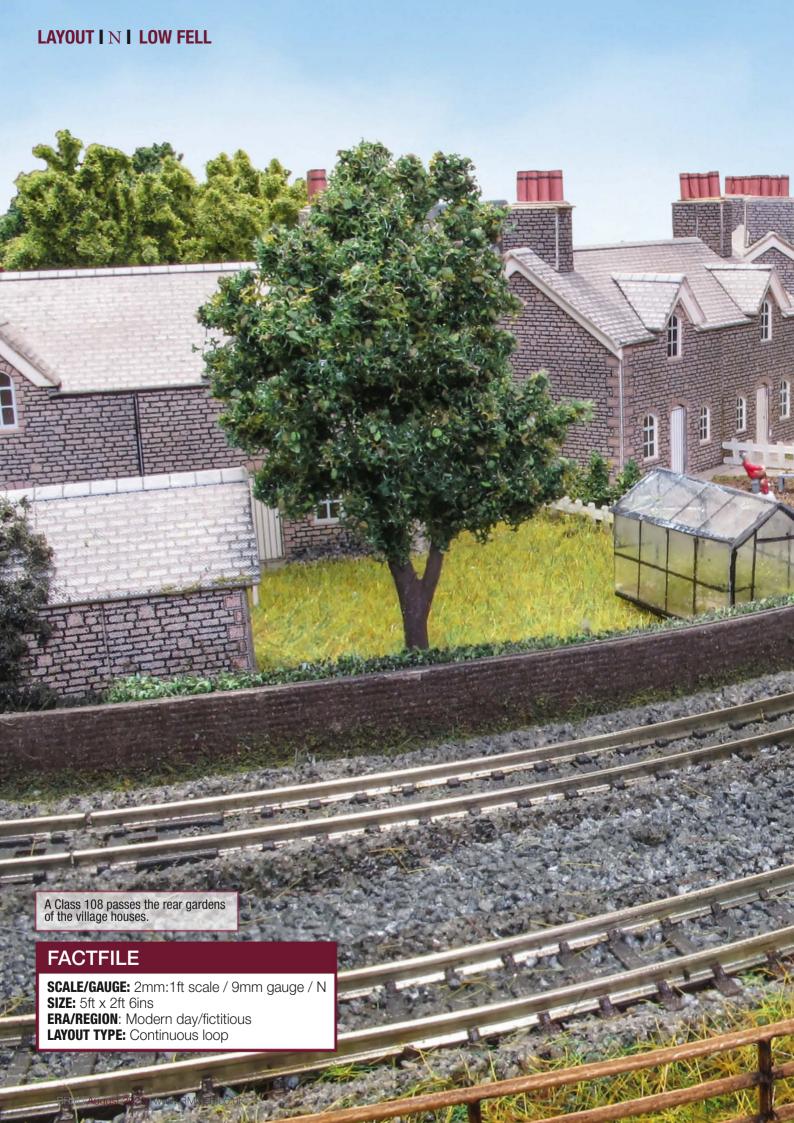
To summarise - in 1880 Wick alone boasted 800 fishing boats in harbour, purely for the herring market, and during late 1963, some 75 vans of fish left Aberdeen daily; amounting to over 40,000T per year being sent by rail. Of this, the quantities from the smaller ports at Peterhead, Fraserburgh, Buckie and Lossiemouth amounted to nearly 7,000T. According to a 2019 survey, Peterhead is the biggest fishing port in Europe, and the town itself (32 miles/51km from Aberdeen) is further from a railway station than any other town of its size in Great Britain.











LOW FELL

Lengthy layout builds not for you? Perhaps recycling an older layout with solid foundations can save you time and money, with greener credentials...

member of our club (Scarborough & District Railway Modellers) bought some rolling stock from someone who was giving up modelling in N gauge. The accompanying layout (now obsolete) was destined for the tip. After a few telephone calls, the layout was given a second chance and brought back to the clubroom. Here, a small group took up the challenge of completing it and preparing it for one of our club's own exhibitions. The group realised that such a small layout could be slotted in almost anywhere at an exhibition and they applied for club funding, were successful, and a new project was started.

The layout was originally called 'Westlands'. The club has another layout called 'Low Fell', however, due to an administrative error (by SDRM) when booking the layout to exhibit at BRM's Doncaster Show (The Festival of British Railway Modelling), we had to swap layout names. While at the Doncaster Show, such was the appeal of the layout that we received four invitations to appear at other shows. To avoid further confusion, the switch of names has now become permanent.

The layout is on a 5ft x 2ft 6ins baseboard. Compact, yet big enough to have an interesting trackplan, allowing plenty of action. It's also a practical size - we point out that this size of layout could easily be stored under a single bed when at home. It is light enough to be simply lifted and placed on a table for operation. Back in the club workshop, it's small enough to be easily squeezed into any available workspace. We made a

plywood cover to aid storage at the club, which made it easy to transport, going to and from shows.

A tricky trackplan

The original trackplan did not allow two trains to run continuously. With show visitors known to prefer layouts that keep something moving, we added a double slip that removed the original trackplan's pinch point. It also allowed more complex manoeuvres to keep operators and visitors entertained.

The layout is a double track with sidings, and a passing loop in one of the stations, which used to be analogue. To give us more chance of running multiple trains at any one time, we also decided to convert it to DCC. This also allowed us to run sound-fitted locomotives. The club has spare Digitrax and Lenz systems available. Either can be used depending on the operators' preferences. We added working signal lights, wired to the point motors. The signals automatically change as the points change, always keeping the correct aspects. The track is Peco. The original points are Insufrog. Any points that needed adding (including the double slip) are Electrofrog.

One or two of the Gaugemaster SEEP point motors have caused concern. They reliably throw the point, but sometimes the in-built accessory switch doesn't always make its connection. Usually, it can be cleared by throwing the point again (and again). The points are operated using a CDU from a panel on the layout simple and relatively foolproof.

Operating fun

We chose to run the layout as a heritage line, that way we were less restricted on what rolling stock we could use and mainly run modern-day heritage stock. We say it is somewhere close to the southern end of the Lake District - Low Fell is one of the mountains in that area. This is not the Low Fell we now know is near Gateshead!

The buildings are a mixture of Metcalfe's kits and resin and the layout is set at the foothill of a mountain, giving the excuse to add a tunnel.

The layout is popular with club members (as well as show visitors). It's easy to operate with two people, quick to set up and pack away again, and fits in the back of an estate car. We think it will be popular at shows for some time - visitors can see what is easily achievable. Good layouts don't have to be massive.

Final thoughts

If we were to do the layout again, we probably would have completed the double loop right around the layout, adding twin tracks through the tunnel.

Our advice for other modellers would be to 'keep it simple, particularly if it's your first layout. We hear of too many who start an ambitious project only to stumble before finishing. Join your local club, ask questions and see what others are doing. Go to exhibitions and seek out those operating small layouts, also ask them how to get started.

The layout is due to be exhibited at SDRM's Spring Show over the weekend of 6-7 April, 2024.

The club is also in the early stages of building a 20ft x 8ft OO gauge continuous run layout that will go to exhibitions. It'll be DCC and be able to be either computer-controlled or operated by regular DCC panel/ throttle operation. Watch this space!

EFE to release new car transporter

News arrived just before this issue went to press that Bachmann Europe is to release models of the Newton Chambers-built car carriers for 4mm:1ft scale under its Exclusive First Editions Rail brand (EFE Rail).

Available as individual models, these are said to be in production with delivery expected later this year. Eight models have been revealed, now available to order from Bachmann stockists, with an RRP of £59.95 each.

Revealed on a Friday June 16, the weekend that ensured left some model railway forum participants questioning if this was re-purposed tooling from a different manufacturer. Tooling is indeed Bachmann, and imagery shared with us highlights the advanced nature of the project, with decorated samples shown below...



Brief history

These double-deck bogie vehicles were built by Newton, Chambers & Co. in 1961 and delivered to British Railways' Eastern Region. 14 vehicles were built to carry six cars each: two in a well between the bogies and four on the upper deck up. Usually

employed on Anglo Scottish trains, these vehicles were built and registered to UIC standards allowing them to work on train ferry services to the continent.

Outshopped in BR lined maroon livery with 'Eastern Region Car Transporter' lettering, the introduction of 'Motorail'

services in 1966 saw them repainted into BR's corporate blue and grey scheme with 'Motorail' branding

Withdrawals commenced during the 1980s and all had gone by the end of the decade.

Received in abundance this month was a selection of samples from Westhill Wagon Works in 4mm:1ft scale from its depot accessory range. Pictured is a cooling group from a Class 08/09, which retails at £9.95 for a pack of two. 3D-printed, it'll require careful painting to highlight detail, not forgetting wasp stripes if depicting more recent times. SLS library re-opens

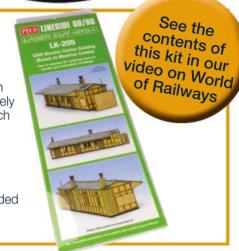


Monkton Combe halt miniaturised

Peco has released its 4mm:1ft scale kit of Monkton Combe halt, priced at £24.95 (RRP) with retailers. Laser-cut from wood, the model assembles using tab-and-slot construction to closely resemble the timber-built prototype, constructed in 1910 by the GWR on its Camerton branch of the Bristol and North Somerset railway line.

Requiring basic assembly – we'd recommend a fast-drying laser-cut kit glue – the model will require painting too, once complete. Detail on the laser-cut models extends to the wood graining of doors and interior flooring.

Using green packaging, over its traditional blue, the kits are perhaps a nod to its greener credentials, using environmentally-friendly wood for the most part in favour of injection-moulded plastic. The latter is used only for round chimney pots. Plastic packaging doubles for glazing material, too.



Waggons for Locomotion

Locomotion Models has revealed exclusive new models, designed and produced by Accurascale, which depict the three different types of Chaldron waggon in the National Collection, representing their evolution from S&DR to Londonderry types.

Available as a single or a triple-pack, models are available to order now for immediate delivery.

DAPOL: EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW

We've become accustomed to model manufacturing of ready-to-run locomotives, rolling stock and some model accessories taking place in the Far East for a few decades, now.

Dapol, however, continues to manufacture some of its products in the UK, and this summer has further invested in new machinery. To find out why and what its new machinery does, we spoke with Neil Morrlle, its Marketing Manager...

Howard: Neil, a big investment for Dapol has just arrived - what is it, and what does it do?

Neil: We took delivery of our new machinery only the other week - it's a sliding-head CNC lathe machine. It has multiple tools, and can machine parts from different angles. Our main use will be to make our own wheels, in-house.

The one thing Dapol hasn't been able

to do, until now, is make our own metal parts. This machine gives us access to that and makes us less reliant on imports.

Because it's so efficient, it allows us to compete on an almost level playing field with production in the Far East.

H: What are the main benefits?

N: We're no longer reliant on China for our wheels. Earlier this year, we received notification that our 7mm:1ft scale wheels were to be delayed by three months from China - that has a knock-on effect for our UK-production, too. Such a problem will soon be a thing of the past. I think you'll see they're better than the wheels we've been receiving until now, too - they're far crisper.

H: Are the wheels to be for rolling stock only? What about locomotives?

N: For now, it's to supply our own rolling

stock demands. It can machine N gauge, OO gauge and will be doing O gauge wheels, too. We can do spoked wheels, three-hole disc wheels – pretty much anything we want.

It will also be producing the axles and bushes and everything else needed. We obviously need to build up a stockpile of parts before we go into full-scale finished production with them.

H: When can modellers expect to see the first items of rolling stock fitted with these new wheels with stockists?

N: Well, we're busy stockpiling OO gauge wheels at the moment, and these will have to be chemically-blackened first, but I think you'll start to see models fitted with them within the next few months.

Skills survey

A new survey of 2000 grandchildren and 2000 grandparents has been commissioned by Legal & General, which shows how grandparents have been the inspiration behind countless hobbies and habits to last a lifetime.

The research highlighted a surge of interest in crafting among young people, with 14% of grandchildren saying that they learnt model building from their grandparents. While cooking and baking was the main inter-generational skill acquired, with 51% saying they learnt from their grandparents, model-making was in seventh place at 14%.

The survey was to understand the role of the grandparent in 2023 and explored the extent to which there are still opportunities for inter-generational sharing. It was split into four themes - hobbies, values, time and influence. The results give an insight into the role grandparents play within families in 2023, and the lessons they pass on.

At a time when many people are worried about screen time, it's perhaps no surprise that tactile hobbies like crafting have become 'cool' in the eyes of a new generation of model-makers. And our grandparents' influence remains important to this story.

Mineral wagon and iron ore hopper for 'O'

Dapol is to produce models for 7mm:1ft scale/O gauge of the Charles Roberts 14T (later uprated to 16T) slope-sided mineral wagon, and 22-24T iron ore hopper.

Tooled and inbound later this year in Q4, photographs of samples have been shown, with models said to be under evaluation at present. Its diagram 1/100 slope-sided mineral wagon is to carry an RRP of £60.00, with its more-complex-shaped diagram 1/162 iron ore hopper sitting a little higher at £70.00 RRP.

Accurascale is expecting decoration samples towards the end of this year and delivery of the finished models in Q3, 2024. Locomotives are to feature 'special presentation packaging'.

The manufacturer's Class 31 tooling suite has been designed to cover 31105 and 31285 and Network Rail's other trio of Brush machines, 31233, 31465 and 31602. As well as the modified cab roofs, functioning spotlights and 31105's additional lamp irons, other never before produced tooling on its initial NR pairing dates these locomotives to the period from 2008 onwards with LED tail lights/washer jet modifications.

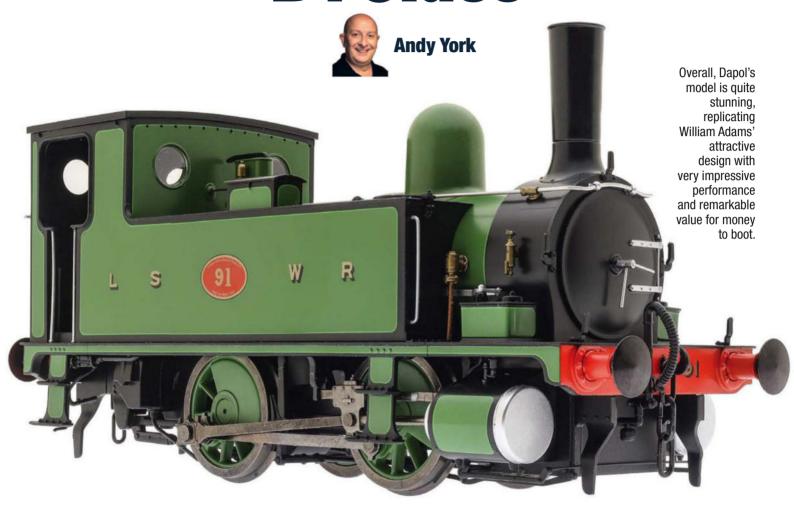








Dapol L&SWR Adams **B4 Class**



ver the years, Dapol has really cracked value for money in the O gauge market and inspired many to dip their toe in the scale for the first time. I can see its new Adams B4 pulling more people in as it's the ideal locomotive for a small harbour or yard layout for those who like the Southern Region.

Five years ago, Dapol brought us the well-regarded OO gauge model of the B4 and this is bigger and better with superb running qualities and performance. With six models to choose from, ranging from the early London & South Western livery of our review sample, through the grouping

years, into British Railways years, with the last example withdrawn from service in 1963. Then, into preservation with Normandy, which has the significant difference of cut-out front and back cab sheets. Detail differences between stove pipe chimney and buffers are catered for, too.

The model is well protected in its box, mounted onto a clear acrylic base with two screws, which makes a useful display stand while not in use. The immediate impression is the weight, a substantial 740g thanks to its die-cast chassis. For a model that is less than seven inches in length, it certainly makes an impression and undoubtedly helps with its haulage capabilities.

The superb running is aided by brass bearings to the driving wheels and a degree of compensation from a front axle that rocks thanks to a central rib over the wheelset.

The buffers are sprung, as are the coupling hooks but quite stiffly and, I must say, everything, down to the fine details, is very solid and robust - it just feels well-made quality. If the model were mine, I would be looking to the custom-made aftermarket for an etched or resin transfer of the prominent tankside numberplate to sit over the well-printed number as supplied.

The only accessory not fitted is the front vacuum pipe (which is simple to attach) as the buyer may wish to fit

740g of weight in a model less than seven inches in length!



a decoder; this is remarkably simple with the smokebox door opening on its hinge, and pulling out the circuit board to fit a 21-pin decoder with space for two 'sugar cube' speakers beneath which sit in the right place for sound, at the base of the chimney.

The cab roof is attached by small magnets for easy removal to see the excellent level of interior detail, which

includes the flickering firebox effect, and to be able to fit a crew.

The RRP of the DCC ready model is £251.51, £285.04 with a Dapol Imperium decoder fitted, and £388.80 with sound fitted, so the prices are comparable with a 4mm:1ft scale large locomotives - it's easy to see why modellers make the move to the larger scale.

Sonic Models 150

onic Models has now delivered its N gauge model of the J50, solely distributed via Rails of Sheffield. It is probably one of the most useful tank engines for the Eastern Region modeller with the class of 52 distributed from Hornsey to Glasgow on yard and light goods duties.

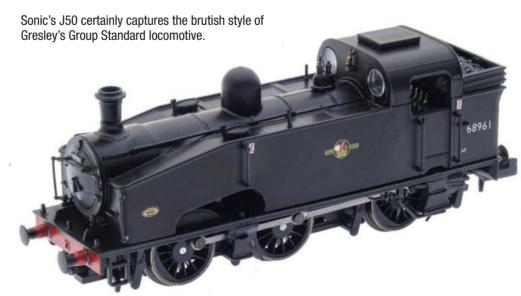
Taking the model from its bright and attractive Sonic-branded packaging, it certainly captures the distinctive look of Gresley's design and scales out across all dimensions. Livery choice is as utilitarian as the prototype's design, all being black, but with the red lined and yellow numbered with red shadowing version starting the chronology from their introduction in 1926, through unlined LNER, British Railways' early emblem and later crest to last withdrawals in 1963. Our review model is in the latest dated style, including electrification warning flashes.

The model feels robust with separately-fitted handrails to the front of the tanks and the cab, as well as the boiler and smokebox. The lamp irons on the front are sturdy distinct

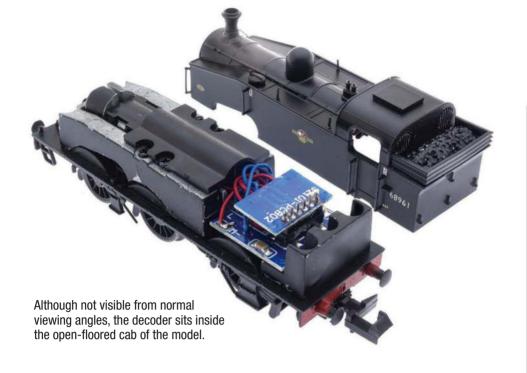
mouldings, while those on the rear of the bunker are cosmetic mouldings. There's a respectable amount of welldefined detail to the top of the tank sides and boiler and the only visual downsides are the pronounced joint in the chimney and the fit of the plated coal rails at the top of the bunker, although these are both acceptable from normal viewing distances. Early era models feature open coal rails, fluted

rods and flush Ross pop safety valves. The livery application is good with the numbers looking quite fine.

There is detail within the cab, but close inspection shows that the circuit board blanking plug is visible in the open floor of the cab; a touch of dark paint would minimise that. To gain access to the model to fit a decoder, it is necessary to remove the four screws at each corner of the underside of the

chassis. Use exactly the right size of screwdriver as these are a very tight fit and took a little persuasion to release. The body then lifts from above the running plate. A right angle six-pin decoder, such as Bachmann (36-556RA), is needed if you are fitting for DCC, although DCC-fitted is an option for a further £20, which may be worth taking.

Inside, it can be seen that there is a respectable amount of weight within the tank area, either side of the small coreless motor, giving a centre of

gravity in line with the middle driving axle, commendable considering how far forward this axle is in the unevenly spaced wheelsets. Electrical pick-up is from the axle bushes and the model performed very smoothly in pick-up and running characteristics on test, capably handling eight Farish Mk.1 coaches.

Overall, I was very impressed with the model for the scale and I'm sure will be a welcome addition for anyone modelling the east in steam or transition era.

Dapol L&SWR Drummond M7 Class

apol has revisited its N gauge M7 model, first released in 2006, to improve several aspects. The body moulding is still largely the same, as it was quite accurate, with improvements to the dome and whistle detail and coal load, which is now removable. The most significant improvements are to the chassis and wheels, with additional weight giving good balance and improved performance, better electrical pick-up, and most of all, a shift from the solid wheelsets to an open-backed wheel, which dramatically improves appearance.

Our review model in lined Southern Railway livery caused me to consult sources to check on the yellow lining as, certainly, white lining edged in black, where appropriate, was the

most common livery. There are some references to yellow lining having been used around 1923/4, but with a lack of colour reference images, it's inconclusive if this was applied to this specific locomotive. From normal viewing distances, the lining is tidy under the cruel magnification above, it's a little awry over the leading axle splasher, but nothing to worry about.

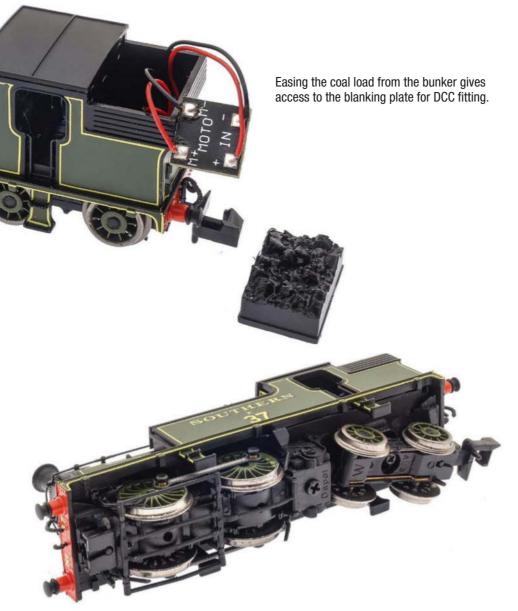
With regard to the green colour of the body, checking sources showed that there were at least five different shades of green around in the transition from pre-grouping to early grouping period and I'm unsure which green this is - it's not Maunsell green (which we are familiar with on white-lined locomotives) but tends towards a shade referred to as 'Moderate Olive'. The Egyptian style of Southern lettering

on the tankside is neatly executed but appears, on close inspection, to have a black shadow to it and to the number, which seems incongruous; however, it's not particularly noticeable at normal viewing distances. As there are a total of seven different livery and number permutations available there are other choices compared to this short-lived

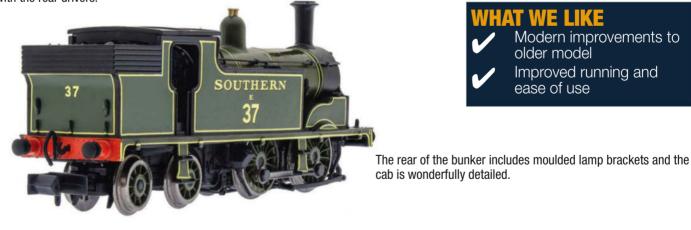
The smokebox door has a moulded numberplate correct for the BR era, but not for the era of this locomotive. An acceptable compromise perhaps, given that further tooling might have been necessary.

As supplied, the review sample sat a tad high at the back end caused by the pick-up contacts from the trailing bogie that brush on plates inside the rear of the chassis. It affected haulage





0-4-4 chassis can be difficult to balance well, but Dapol has the centre of gravity perfectly in line with the rear drivers.



I know Dapol went to substantial lengths to consider decoder fitting but with minimal space and choices available in a small locomotive, and not wishing to impinge on the delightfully detailed cab interior, a pragmatic solution had to be implemented. Wiring from the circuitry is taken to the coal bunker where, once the coal load is

lifted out with a scalpel blade, there is a blanking plate, which the wires can be de-soldered from and hard-wired to a small decoder. If the modeller isn't confident, a DCC-fitted version of each

capabilities. The solution is to splay the contacts a little further and it's a simple fix if anyone encounters the problem. Dapol has acknowledged this issue on its website, with instructions to resolve the issue. The cab roof can handily be removed to install a crew - ideal for taking the detail on these locomotives a step further.

Hornby Scotrail Class 153 👢



here can be few liveries as evocative, or as complex as this. Applied to ScotRail's fleet of five Class 153s, modified to carry extra bicycles and luggage onto West Highland line services between Glasgow and Oban - the vinyls highlight landmarks and many of the picture-perfect scenes of one of the UK's most beautiful scenic journeys.

Working with Scotrail's Class 156s from July, 2021 – also available from Hornby (R2950) - the units are known as 'Active Travel Carriages'. Modified units have 24 seats (20 around tables and four airlinestyle), and can carry up to 20 cycles in racks, or large items of luggage. There are spaces for tandem cycles and an e-bike charging socket, too!

While Hornby's tooling hasn't changed internally or externally to reflect the changes made to the prototype, the exterior carries the distinctive livery. Tampo-printing is a

time-consuming process. Instead, Hornby has opted for a colour-printing process to apply the 'would-be' vinyls to these bodyshells. From normal viewing distances, the livery is convincing, but a closer look reveals areas where the technique struggles the Scotrail logo, OHLE signs, door buttons and Abellio logos, for example.

For what it's worth, the livery is far better than what I, or many others could achieve in model form. But, I feel this somewhat new technique on models calls for a hybrid approach - use it for large complex areas, but retain limited use of tampo-printing for concise details like those mentioned.

Complex liveries are the bane of many manufacturers, and their intricacies would translate into justifiably-expensive models. Hornby's use of this emerging technique proves that a way forward exists, and I suspect we'll see more complex liveries in the coming years.

Hornby Class 08

he Class 08 needs no introduction - the backbone of freight and marshalling yards, station pilots, branch line goods, and later, private industry, and now preservation. The Class has been one of Britain's longest-lived and mostsuccessful locomotives. With a new range launch, it made sense to feature this prototype for space-starved OO gauge modellers who didn't want main line express locomotives. Here, you have ample opportunity to devise a compact shunting layout, without reverting down a scale further to 'N'.

Released in three liveries as its first run - with hopefully more to follow we find BR blue for the 1970s to 1990s era modeller, and DB Schenker red and GBRf/HN Rail for the 2010s era. I'd argue that a BR green livery wouldn't have gone amiss upon launch, however, given the wider appeal to steam-era modellers.

These locomotives are incredible! Detailed to the 'N'th degree in every possible way - take the connecting rods, for instance, their bolts have been scaled-down perfectly. Both early and later builds are featured, too. 08489 and 08623 feature square cab-side windows with a single door handle, with HNRail 08818 featuring the later rounded-style, with two handles, making cab access for crews easier when entering.

Correctly, later builds also feature different 'whistles', revised battery box location with the addition to the lefthand side, and reduced air grilles. All locomotives are smooth runners, with six-pin decoder interfaces, and liverywise are almost perfect, bar a minor wobble to the cab wasp stripes across a running light, common across the samples.

I'm told that this wasn't Hornby's first tooling of the model for the scale, and that it had to go 'back to the drawing board'. But what has resulted is a very worthy model, and is highly recommened.

Rapido Trains SECR 20T brake van

ere's a beautiful model in OO gauge by Rapido, depicting a long-lived ex-South Eastern & Chatham six-wheeled un-fitted brake van in BR days. The original design dated from South Eastern Railway days in 1898. A brief history of these vehicles can be read on World of Railways with our first look at the new model tooling.

Two body variants are available - direct from Rapido, alongside exclusive editions from Rails of Sheffield, Train Times and the Bagnall Locomotive Group, in 12 different liveries.

Designed in the UK from original works drawings, models will complement the existing range of SECR wagons produced by Rapido, and many other ranges, too.

It really is an outstanding model, and looks exactly like the prototype pictured on page 90 of David Larkin's The Acquired

Wagons of British Railways Volume 1, though there is no black background to the brandings on the real example. Rarely have I seen such incredible attention to detail, much of which cannot be seen from normal viewing angles.

Every item of the brakes and their riggings is present, with the brake blocks perfectly in line for OO gauge treads. As expected, users of more-accurate gauges will have to perform alterations. The correctly splitspoked wheels are all true-round and went through handmade and Peco pointwork with perfect ease.

The distinctive buffer shanks are beautifully modelled, though buffer heads aren't sprung. Coupling hooks are provided in the headstocks, above the NEM-mounted tension-locks. Handrail detail is exquisitelydelicate - delicate enough for one side to have come loose in transit, though easily

repaired with a tiny bead of superglue.

The only way to see the fully-detailed interior is to remove the roof; very gently, because it's held in place with tiny spots of glue - be brave, and ignore an ominous 'cracking' sound! Once it's off, the full interior is revealed, but the roof won't stay in place by itself without new glue being applied. I know it would potentially add to the cost, but some form of friction-fit or use of small magnets might have been better. Livery application and brandings are perfect.

At nearly £40.00, this is at the 'high-end' of RTR non-bogied rolling stock, but I still think it represents excellent value for money. All it needs, in my opinion, are the tensionlocks removing, 'proper' couplings fitted and weathering - something I'll be doing very soon! And, as alluded to, these vans weren't wholly confined to the SR in BR days. Highly recommended.





Never have I seen so much detail applied to an area of a model which cannot normally be seen - unless there's a crash or derailment; in which case, don't build a layout where this might happen because this model will be far too good for such unreliable systems!

The roof can be gently taken off to reveal the full interior, but only with care. All that's needed is some overall weathering. I cannot find any prototype shots of brake vans looking quite this pristine.

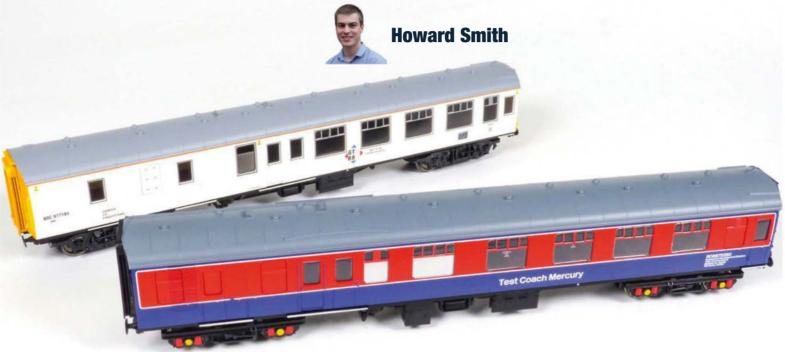

odellers and collectors often crave models that stand out from the crowd - models that make their collections different from those of others. And, though calling on the imagination to make a 'might have been' location is often needed, there are still many real rolling stock liveries, waiting to be applied to models - opportunities are plentiful for the modeller willing to research. Luckily, this month we've taken delivery of three Mk. 1s from Hornby, which has carried out research for us, applying 'stand out' liveries to its toolings for the British Railways Mk. 1s.

As British Rail's Mk. 2 and Mk. 3 coach-building programme was in full swing, it was common for displaced Mk. 1 coaches to be sent for scrap. A number would be re-purposed for further use, however, and it wasn't uncommon to see such vehicles used by the engineers, replacing older inherited stock from the 'Big Four'.

We'll start with a look at 977165 in all-over white, with yellow ends. Depicting the vehicle in its 2000s condition, painted all-over white with security mesh guards across windows, it was used as a staff and generator vehicle, and can now be found preserved on the West Somerset Railway.

Imagery can be found online of the vehicle in use with Balfour Beatty, sandwiched between two Plasser & Theurer GP-Tramms - a short formation, ideal for smaller layouts, and sure to spark interest with modellers. In the early 1990s, this vehicle was painted light blue with a dark blue stripe opportunity for a further livery release, perhaps?

In this guise, the model is a close match to the prototype, though the central window and door have been painted white rather than being flush a requirement of using existing tooling no doubt, though an opportunity for the modeller to improve. So too are the ends, which have incorrect handrails and number of steps. Where everything else is concerned, particularly the livery, the model really looks the part!

In BR blue, with white-painted windows is ADB 977135, a barrier vehicle for moving rolling stock around Wembley yard. The quality of livery application is exceptional here, too, though comparing the model with photographs, there is scope for detail enhancements to coach ends. I couldn't find an image of the vehicle with whitepainted windows - can readers help?

Finally, the best 'til last - Derby's Research and Development division livery, a department responsible for many technical advancements in rail travel. It often required data on the move in test coaches such as this - RDB 975280, Test coach Mercury. Used in the 1970s on the WCML to test sleepermounted transponders prior to the introduction of the APT, the model can be justified at the head of a passenger train, as per photographic evidence.







Though blanked off by over-painting, the door and window apertures remain across these models, where in reality, these were over-plated. A tampo-printed grille to the end of the van highlights the discrepancy. Filling these and repainting is likely a step too far for most modellers.



Tampo-printed window screens reduce glass breakages on a worksite where the handling of infrastructure materials like ballast was commonplace. These are incredibly fine and realistic.

Rapido SR eight-plank open

apido has steadily and speedily brought a range of useful and accurate wagons to market that have, maybe, had a bias towards the Southern and Western Regions, and this now continues into the grouping era.

Choosing an eight-plank design set the Southern apart from most other railway companies and considering some 7,950 were made to Dia.1379 with a 9ft wheelbase between 1926 and 1933 and a further 1,400 made from 1935 to Dia. 1400 with a 10ft wheelbase, it's very surprising that this numerous type has not been produced by any ready-to-run manufacturer to date.

The body of both wagon diagrams are the same and the differences lie in the chassis, with the two wheelbases. Further variations come from the type of braking, the first 3,000 with Morton brakes and subsequently Southern 'Freighter' brakes.

The wagon body features a wealth of moulded detail with its large, lower drop door with and smaller 'cupboard' doors

above and the associated fasteners and chains. The strapping and boltheads are spot on and the interior is planked with grooves indicating the doors. The second plank from the bottom on each side has small mouldings of the tie rings for sheeting the wagon where necessary.

Rapido has a reputation for going all-out on the underframe, and these wagons are no different with underside planking, framing, buffer springs (although the model's buffers are un-sprung as they are a fine spindle type), braking systems and the differentlyspaced W-irons. Twin-spoked and threehole disc wheelsets complete the variations for the permutations of wagons modelled. The brake hangers and door bang bars are etched components, and, despite being very fine, are commendably robust.

The wheelsets each have a bearing in the axlebox, which gives exceptionally free-running - idly spinning the wheels on the desk saw the wheels keep turning for near on 30 seconds, so there will be

very little resistance with a train of these wagons. However, with individual wagons it's normally beneficial that they remain where you left them while shunting, which could be a problem if your track isn't as flat as glass.

The decoration is as good as any manufacturers, with the BRCW maker's plate on the Dia. 1379 wagons worthy of mention for its finesse. There are liveries covering their introduction in pre-1936 SR livery with large lettering, post-1936 with smaller SR letters above the number, their transition into BR ownership and numbering, while retaining SR brown, and onwards to BR unfitted grey and one black example allocated to the Motive Power Department. With this and different numbering, including examples used on the Isle of Wight, there is 31 products for the modeller to choose from in this release - a far cry from when we may have one number in each livery from a manufacturer. Mr. Hardy - you are spoiling us!
