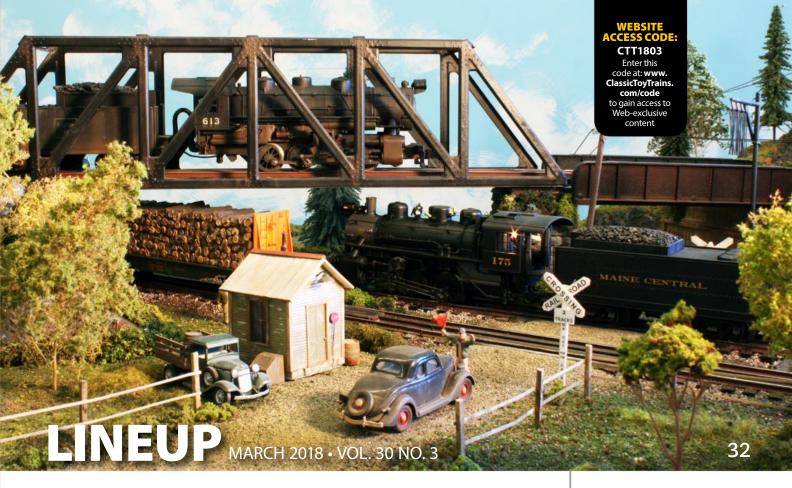

Five big reasons to build a small layout

A 5 X 9-FOOT RAILROAD HAD A KING-SIZED REWARD

e have a treat for you! Much of this issue is devoted to compact layouts – a subject near and dear to many of us. I started out with a "one board" railroad: just a single 4 x 8-foot sheet of plywood.

It featured an oval of track with one switch. It had one structure. Its scenery was nothing more than a coat of green paint. And it seemed like plenty of railroad for 7-year-old me. Many readers I've spoken with also have warm childhood memories of similarly modest railroads.

The O and S gauge builders we profile in this issue work their magic in not much more space than I had. Planning with care and building with skill, they prove compact layouts can, indeed, be plenty of railroad.

There is nothing new about this approach. A postwar Lionel factory-built display is featured on page 28, and an American Flyer display, built by an employee of the A.C. Gilbert Co., is showcased on page 50.

Reader Alan Caddell, whose 5 x 9-foot layout is shown on page 44, said the birth of his grandson, James, rekindled his own interest in trains. By the time James turned 5, Alan was ready to start work. The railroad grandfather and grandson (shown above) built ended up being an incredible bonding experience.

In the cover letter accompanying his article and photographs, Alan set out the following five reasons for wanting to share his story with CTT



readers and encourage others to tackle a similar project:

1 It is never too late (or too soon) to build upon your love of trains, and there's never been a better time to enter the hobby.

A smaller layout is less intimidating for first-time builders.

3 Small layouts inspire problem-solving and creativity.

There are many ways to run trains in a small area!

A layout is a great way to lure children away from tablets and television by providing a fun alternative to digital entertainment.

5 A compact layout is a tremendous opportunity to leave a lasting legacy for children and grandchildren. By working together you can develop a layout that will be passed down, along with the priceless memories associated with its construction.

Thanks, Alan, for reminding us that starting small can pay off in big ways. Do you have youngsters in your family who can use a little time away from the screen? Build a model railroad together!

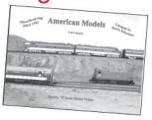

LIONEL'S AUTOMOBILE-CARRYING BOXCARS

Auto-carrying boxcars

I have been a subscriber from the first issue of *Classic Toy Trains* and continue to enjoy it greatly.

The December 2017 issue had a fine article on automobile-carrying railcars made by Lionel ("Automobiles roll on Lionel Lines" by Roger Carp). Prominently mentioned is the no. 6468 double-door boxcar, one of my all-time favorite Lionel cars. I remember poring over a picture of one in a catalog when I was very small. I, of course, have one on my present layout, along with one of the older no. 2458 Pennsylvania RR cars.

I think I first developed a liking for double-door auto-

mobile boxcars as a result of an illustration of one in *The Big Book of Real Trains*. That book, on which I expect many of us cut our railroading teeth, was illustrated by George J. Zaffo.

As an aside, it may be of interest to readers to know that the Lionel Operating Train Society (LOTS) commissioned a convention car from Lionel that approximated the appearance of the Tuscan 6468. The no. 17882 car features an operating end-of-train device. If I am interpreting the data on the car correctly, it was issued as a commemorative of the LOTS national convention in Baltimore in July 1990.

The Flyer K5, a Pennsylvania RR Pacific, is included in the no. 20450 Trail Blazer set and has cab no. 21115. The telltale feature of the K5 is the bell positioned below the headlight on the front of the smokebox. American Flyer did a nice job modeling this distinctive engine.

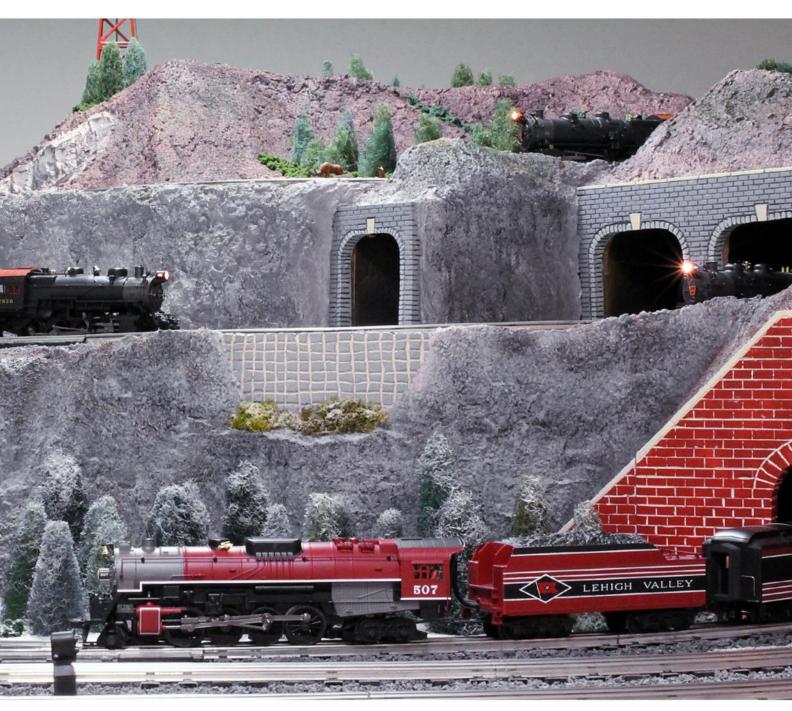

REPLACEMENT OIL **DERRICK BOARD?**

USE A LIONEL CIRCUIT BOARD FOR AN MTH BOARD

I have an MTH no. 455 oil derrick with a burned-out circuit board. I called MTH and was told the oil derrick is no longer produced, so the circuit board was not available. All I have found on eBay are Lionel 455 circuit boards. Can I substitute one of these? If not, what should I do?

- Gary Towner, Warsaw, N.Y.

The circuit board is a simple timer board to operate the pump. My guess is the Lionel version will probably work. The input voltage should be the same. Since the MTH version is a reissue of the Lionel postwar accessory, the coil impedance is probably close. Otherwise you'll need to cannibalize another MTH derrick.



I have a small layout and have been surprised at how dusty it gets. Do you have any suggestions for an easy way to keep it clean? – Eric Hobbie, Malibu, Calif.

This is tough because the answer is pretty much no. Short of covering your railroad with one or more light tarps, you'll discover it will still get dirty. Household dust and particulates as well as whatever may drift in through windows or your HVAC system will congregate on top of freight cars and structures. Layout

cleaning is an ongoing process.

Soft-bristle paintbrushes (household sizes as well as arts and crafts sizes) may be best for swiping dust from the top of locomotives, cars, and structures. Paper towels and cotton swabs will help you root out grime congregating around details and seam lines.

Suction works as well, but keeping figures and unsecured ballast and shrubs from being taken in may be tricky! Small keyboard vacuums cost \$10 to \$20. Most shop vacs will try to pull your structures, people, and detail parts down the hose,

but you still may wish to consider a minishop vac. These are lighter and easier to hoist around a tabletop. Many have about a 11/2-gallon capacity and can be purchased for \$20 to \$30.

Don't forget canned air, which is used for blasting out gunk from keyboards and electronics. These go for about \$7 a can.

Finally, check your housecleaning supplies. Swiffer-brand products are good at lifting dust and cobwebs.

OLD LOCOMOTIVES, NEWER ELECTRICAL POWER?

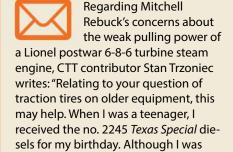
For years I've run postwar trains. I've finally been tempted to buy one of the new locomotives with command-control features. Will my large Lionel and American Flyer transformers be able to run the new locomotives? - Cary Dunn, Syracuse, N.Y.

If your transformers are in good operating condition, they should be able to handle new locomotives in conventional (throttle-control mode) or command mode (18 volts of track power regulated by a handheld controller).

one motor could pull its limited collection of passenger cars, I found it left much to be desired when coupled to a long freight train. That's when I spied a roll of friction (not electrical) tape on my father's workbench.

"Taking a small strip, placing it lightly on a piece of glass so as not to use up too much of its adhesion qualities, I cut strips with a straightedge narrow enough to fit on the drive wheels of the locomotive. Wrapping it around the wheel until it met the other end, I cut it carefully to allow both ends to fit flush on the wheel without an overlap.

"The result was increased traction simply because of the tape's texture and softness - maybe the first traction tire. I still use this trick on my older locomotives. No need to change wheels or worry about extra height. Placing the tape on two wheels is sufficient. And the is when operating locomotives equipped with Lionel's TrainMaster Command Control or Legacy or MTH's Digital Command System *and* you are not operating with the command-control equipment. You'll get the basic sounds, but may not be able to trigger some sounds or features, including remote uncoupling. While those locomotives and their sound systems are designed to operate using conventional transformers, you'll need digital controllers to activate these additional features.

LOOSE WIRE

I recently bought a Lionel no. 602 Seaboard NW2 diesel switcher. I cleaned it up and got it running smoothly; however, the wire leading out of the back of the horn is not connected anywhere. I tried touching it to different solder lugs on the horn relay and then depressed the whistle button on my type-RW transformer, but I could not find the right place to reconnect the wire, as none of them triggered the horn. When I touch the wrong solder lug, the horn sounds constantly without the horn button being depressed. Can you tell me the correct solder lug to reconnect this wire to? - Mike Lurie, St. Michael, Minn.

On the relay there are several tabs on the stack of lugs and insulators screwed to the front of it. There should be three on the top of the stack. Two will have a notch in them, and one will have a small hole. The wire from the horn goes to the one in the back with the hole in it.

Reader Al Reitz suggests: "Mitchell might want to consider adding weight to the turbine to help with the lack of traction. He could try fishing weights or a modified weight from a postwar Berkshire. The no. 671-219 ballast weight was mounted over the gearbox to replace the worm cover on later Berkshires to improve performance."

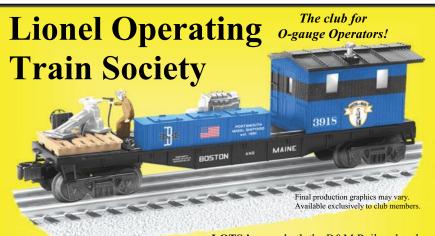

MARX'S NO. 555 COLORADO & SOUTHERN REEFER

group of colorful and inexpensive freight and passenger cars hit the O-27 market in the final years of the pre-World War II era. They were produced through the postwar period, and then carried over into the first few years of the modern era. Yes, 1936 into the 1970s is quite a remarkable run!

Girard Manufacturing Co., owned and operated by toy magnate Louis Marx, introduced the series of six-inchlong models acclaimed for their lithography. The many classic pieces of rolling stock for three rails proved irresistible to children and enhanced the legacy of the ingenious Mr. Marx.

General characteristics

Before focusing on the no. 555 Colorado & Southern refrigerator car, some comments about Marx six-inchlong freight cars are in order.

Over the nearly four decades Marx manufactured its six-inch models, company designers modified them to handle either four wheels or eight wheels. Here, the emphasis is on freight cars equipped with only four.

Marx, like his competitors, offered a broad range of products featuring every common kind of freight car, along with a few specialized types. Boxcars, flatcars, gondolas, hoppers, and tank cars filled the ranks. So did floodlight and crane cars. not to mention items with a

military orientation. Cabooses completed the roster.

Frames varied, with the first having rounded ends without coupler pockets. It gave way to one having square ends with coupler pockets. They were painted black (glossy or dull finish), but silver was known. As for the wheels, they usually were stamped, two-piece parts fabricated out of steel.

The coupler originally used on the Marx six-inch, fourwheel freight cars was the kind known as "tab-and-slot coupler." They could be riveted or twisted (prior to World War II) or punched (associated with production from 1946 to '52).

A plastic knuckle coupler arrived in 1953. That superior type remained the norm all the way to 1972.

Marx cataloged the no. 555 Colorado & Southern refrigerator car from 1937 to '42 and then from 1953 to '54. The 2011 edition of *Greenberg's Pocket Price Guide to Marx* Trains values models with sliding doors at \$15 in good condition and \$50 in excellent. Scarce variations with solid doors and lithographed figures are priced at \$100 and \$250, respectively, based on the roof and frame colors.

A growing roster

The assortment of rolling stock categorized as Marx sixinch, four-wheel models is nothing short of enormous. Moreover, variations in color and lettering often occurred.

What made the freight cars stand out was their eye-catching and detailed decoration. Production supervisors at Girard Manufacturing Co. relied on lithography. Artists created designs often with the name and herald of a railroad, car data, and simulated rivets and ladders, among other details. During manufacturing, laborers printed the design on a flat metal surface. For Marx rolling stock, sheets of steel plated with tin were used.

The group of cars released in 1936 included a refrigerator car, assigned the number 91453 and then changed to 555. Marx lettered it for the Colorado & Southern Ry., a Class 1 line operated independently in Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico from 1898 to 1908. The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy had acquired the C&S after that date.

The 555 stayed in the lineup through 1942, when federal restrictions put an end to the manufacture of miniature trains that used metal. The C&S reefer did not return to production until 1953. After just another year in the roster, Marx deleted the beautifully lithographed car.

Decoration

First decked out in yellow with black markings on the sides and roof, the refrigerator went to a cream body and doors in 1937. By and large, the roof and lettering were blue before the war with a red C&S herald (exceptions to the latter exist). Cars with a red roof and lettering with a blue herald came after the war.

The lithography on the scarcest and most valuable prewar and postwar 555 reefers (blue or red roof) varied from the usual in a rather cool way. One side featured a partially open door with a railway worker in view. The opposite side had a fully open doorway and a different figure on the job. - Roger Carp

I had looked at the sets and determined they were done very well. They featured remote control, with sounds of steam, a whistle, and engineer voices.

Then I started thinking about how, like Father Mike, I had dreamed of getting a particular set when I was a boy in the 1950s. I wanted an American Flyer no. 5002T circus train, which I had seen in the catalog for 1950.

stopped wishing for a circus set.

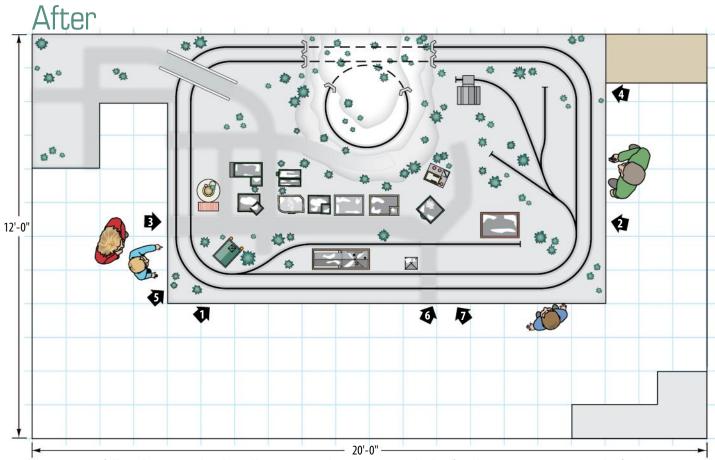

FROM TRACK TO SHINGS SHING TRACKTO

When celebrating the 30th anniversary of *Classic Toy Trains* magazine, we on the editorial team paid tribute to several outstanding layout builders and experts on modeling techniques. Also earning our gratitude and respect were the different photographers whose pictures have enhanced every sort of article and department.

Now the moment has arrived to express appreciation to another type of artist – the illustrators who have executed track plans over the past three decades.

Early on, praise went to Robert Wegner, Terri Field, Rick Johnson, Roen Kelly, and Jay Smith. For the past 15 or so



years, Kellie Jaeger has handled the challenges.

CTT takes pleasure in turning the spotlight on Kellie. She has agreed to share what she does to transform rough sketches into the detailed diagrams readers find so useful.

Where she begins

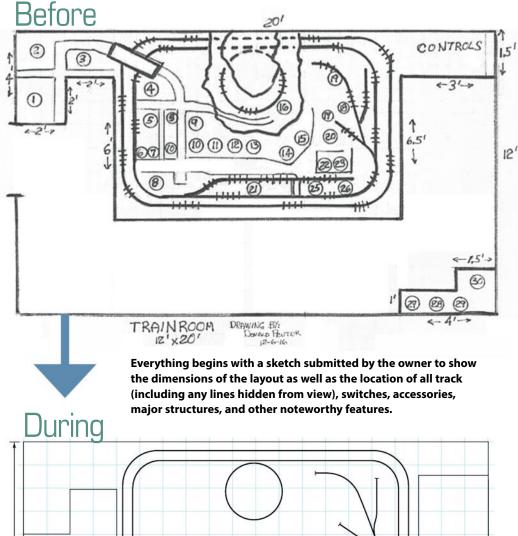
Virtually every proposed article about an O or S gauge railroad for CTT includes a request that the builder provide an illustration showing the location of the main lines, sidings, and spurs. In addition, the drawing should have the dimensions while indicating major areas with accessories and structures.

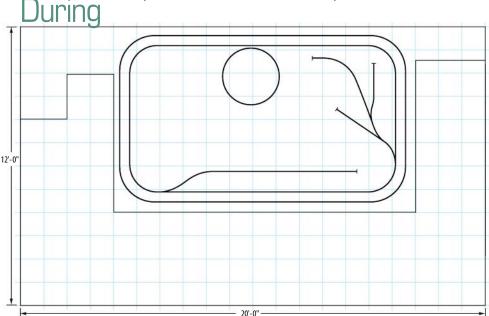
What arrives at our offices varies tremendously in accuracy, detail, and completeness. Anything from hand-drawn sketches on notebook paper to scale diagrams printed using commercial programs installed on personal computers.

After an editor has gathered the relevant materials, along with the edited manuscript accompanying the article, he presents everything to Kellie. Over the next two or three weeks, she'll work her magic.

Kellie looks at the sketches. Typically, she says, this artwork fails to give her sufficient information to move ahead. Then it is time to consult the photos of the layout, comparing what she notices there with the preliminary illustrations. An overall view of the layout is especially important.

From Kellie's observing the pictures alongside the sketches, she can see how accurate the artwork is. She picks out discrepancies as well as unknown spots. Meanwhile, Kellie is asking many key questions about

the dimensions, the sort of track laid, the diameters of curves, and the brand and radii of the switches.

Using Adobe Illustrator

Once Kellie thinks she has enough information, she proceeds to create a plan using

Adobe Illustrator. She has scanned whatever artwork she has been given and relies on that as her starting point. Essential is deciding what scale the drawing will be. Specifically, she says, will ¼ inch or 3/8 inches equal 12 inches?

From this point forward,

Kellie says, she will use that scale to finish the plan. The person designing the article to be published will place and possibly shrink it to fit on the page. The scale ensures the small color images added to the plan of structures, accessories, and other notable features



are in a realistic proportion to everything else put there.

Having determined the dimensions of the final track plan, Kellie conveys this information to the designer of the article. She lets him or her know what her plan will look like so the designer can figure out how and where to place it on a page. At this stage, the plan will be labeled "FPO," short for "For Position Only."

Layers and structures

Kellie adds a background grid and outlines the ground layer of the plan. She draws the various lines of track, not to mention the roads and streets, the rivers and other bodies of water. Major scenic effects, such as mountains, follow.

If the O or S gauge railroad includes elevated levels, then

Kellie will put them in now. She generally uses different colors to indicate each line rising over the tabletop or principal level. Dotted lines note

track that is hidden from view.

Structures find a place on almost every track plan published in CTT. For them, Kellie has assembled over the

years a library of drawings of buildings and accessories developed by the major toy train manufacturers.

When Kellie needs to show a Lionel no. 97 coal elevator, an Ives station, a Gilbert no. 779 oil drum loader, or an MTH bank, she has artwork to use. Then she just inserts the image where necessary.

Sometimes Kellie can reuse the artwork as she kept it. At other times, she has to modify the colors or sharpen a detail. Take bridges. Over the past century, toy train manufacturers have come up with different types in various scales. Kellie must determine whether she will be adding a bascule, a girder, a truss, or another kind. Should she need a bridge unlike anything in her library, she outlines and illustrates it.

Final touches

Kellie's track plan has all the dimensions, the track on different levels, and noteworthy details (accessories, structures, and names). Before handing the diagram to the editor of the article, she will check it against all the photos of the layout and correct any discrepancies.

By the way, the overall environment on a layout – a desert, forest, or city – will bring it all together. Kellie uses the colors from the types of scenes.

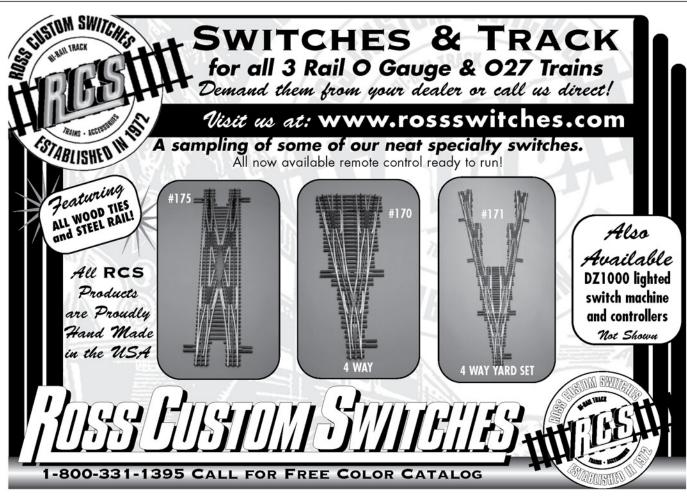
Once she's satisfied with the piece of art, Kellie submits her

"first draft" to CTT's longtime art director, Elizabeth Weber. Lil evaluates it and sends it to the editor of the article. If any revisions are called for, Kellie will do them.

The process concludes with the addition of scattered trees and vehicles. Kellie also puts in figures of adults and children (and occasionally pets) standing alongside the layout.

Last come what are known as "camera pointers." These are the thick arrows with numbers printed inside that correspond to the captioned images in the articles. They let readers know where on the layout each of the photographs was taken.

Sounds pretty technical and demanding, right? Not to Kellie! Even after all these years, she looks at the tasks associated with finalizing a CTT track plan as enjoyable. "It's almost like I get to build a layout along with the stories."

Lionel Lines in the

ne Lionel outfit made in recent years hits the trifecta of collector interest: Its rolling stock is decorated for Lionel Lines, and it is both an uncataloged set and a department store special. It is the Lionel no. 11771 Micro Racers Express, produced exclusively for K-Mart in 1989. The O-27 set is unusual for another reason. Typically, a modern-era department store exclusive set will contain a single specially marked car and the remainder of the train will be standard production items. However, all five items in the Micro Racers Express are unique to this set. This is likely due to its theme,

which is so far off Lionel's beaten path that regular rolling stock would have seemed out of place.

Heading the train is a **no. 18704 2-4-0 Porter steam locomotive**, molded from black plastic and numbered "8704" on the cab. This DC-only engine has an operating headlight and a chrome bell. Lionel

Trains Inc. paired it with a slope-back tender, also in black plastic, with "Lionel Lines" in white letters and a cast-in simulated coal load.

The no. 16508 Lionel Lines Southern Pacific-type caboose is molded in orange plastic on a black plastic frame. A black circle-L Lionel logo dominates the sides of the

caboose, with "6508" and "Lionel Lines" printed below.

Only two freight cars are included in the set. Both are eye-catching and fun.

The no. 16108 Racing Fuel single-dome tank car has a yellow plastic body with black end caps mounted on a black frame. Based on the nos. 6015/9050-style O-27 tank car, it is lettered with "Racing Fuel," a circle-L "Petroleum Company," and "LPC 6108."

The second car is the highlight of the set. The no. 16325 Micro Racers Exhibition ramp car is a highly modified version of Lionel's postwar no. 6343 barrel ramp car. It is molded entirely in red plastic. The "16325" number is printed in white, and checkered flags adorn one side of the ramp body. The railing supports the black-and-white "Micro Racers Exhibition" sign.

The car also includes a standard Lionel canister, molded in black with "Micro Racers Oil" and two checkered flags printed in white. A press-fit disc fastened to the car holds the canister in place.

Four Micro Racers, similar in style to open-wheel race cars like those used at the Indianapolis 500, fit on the ramp. The wheels of the race cars rest in shallow square depressions formed in the surface of the ramp. Even so, the small cars can fly off during operation – a problem easily solved by a dab of adhesive.

In common with Lionel sets marketed in the late 1980s, the rolling stock was equipped with metal wheels and operating couplers. Rounding out the set was a 27 x 36-inch oval of O-27 track, a few telephone poles, and a DC power pack.

The Micro Racers Express was a low-priced item. It sold for around \$60 or \$70 when it first hit the shelves; the price may have been reduced to \$45 or \$50 in the after-Christmas sale.

These days, O-27 enthusiasts can find the 11771 outfit fairly easily and expect to pay \$75 to \$100. When you do encounter the set, take a moment to admire the unusual features of this modern gem.

THE LIONEL NO. D-224 LAYOUT PROMISES LOADS OF FUN IN ONLY 5 X9 FEET By Roger Carp • Photos by Daniel Brown

The theme of this issue of *Classic Toy Trains* is summarized in just two words:

Compact layouts. Articles focus on the enjoyment and interest O gauge railroads covering less than 100 square feet can provide operators.

When it comes to packing fun and excitement in a small area, no one compares with the designers who created display layouts for Lionel during the postwar era.

Evidence of what the Display Department had accomplished appeared in *Lionel Trains*:

Best Layouts & Store Displays, a special-interest publication put out by CTT in 2015. Still, there's always room to celebrate more of those layouts – which is what we'll do with the no. D-224.

→ Displays promoted the line

The D-224 layout, a 5 x 9-foot display made available by Lionel to retail accounts in 1958, carried on a tradition launched by the toy train manufacturer in the pre-World War II decades and advanced after 1952. During the 1950s and



into the '60s, the Display Department typically developed three new layouts each year, plus countertop items and possibly a wall poster.

Presenting the latest accessories cataloged by Lionel was the goal behind each of the compact railroads (their dimensions went from 4 x 6 feet to 8 x 8 feet). New train sets (purchased separately) ran on one to three loops of track on one or two levels while signals and lights glowed.

Because of the need to design and promote the layouts early in the production year, the

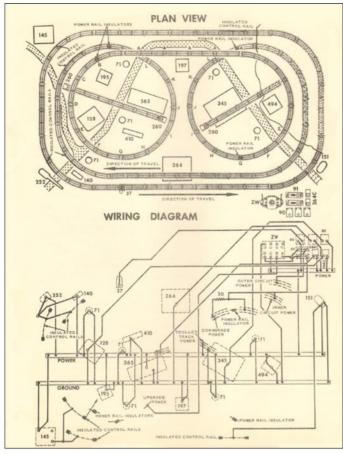
items used tended to come from the previous year. Thus, a railroad offered to the trade in, say, 1956, typically featured the freight loaders and stations most recently introduced in 1955. It could also have wired to its base perennial favorites that had been in the line for years.

◆ Super O track debuts

Shifting focus to the D-224 shows it to have been among the first displays to highlight Super O track, the more realistic brand of three-rail

Lionel in 1958 offered to authorized retail accounts three action-packed Super O display layouts, including the 5 x 9-foot no. D-224. Two trains could be run at the same time for viewers to enjoy when they weren't looking at the accessories.





Lionel sent with the D-224 instructions for how to assemble and wire the 5 x 9-foot display (a single type-ZW transformer handled all the accessories and the trains). Anyone looking to build a compact layout should consider replicating this jewel.

straights, curves, and switches Lionel had announced in its consumer catalog for 1957. Because the track wasn't being produced in significant quantities early that year, the Display Department had to wait. Not until 1958 could it promise Super O layouts.

Boy, did the crew at the Lionel plant exceed the expectations of dealers and customers with three neat operating displays using Super O track.

Start with the no. D-223, a 4 x 8-foot railroad with two loops and a couple of sidings priced at \$235 (without trains). Light towers, bill-boards, signals, freight loaders, and operating

freight cars found homes on the flat surface decorated with green and tan paint, grass, and lichen. A type-ZW transformer handled the power.

Now skip to the no. D-225, an 8 x 8-foot Super O marvel over which three freight or passenger trains might travel on two levels. For a net cost of \$380, a retailer received a spectacular layout filled with operating accessories of all sorts.

In the middle, in terms of size and price, was the D-224. Two trains could traverse what Lionel called an "Eye-catching

over and under trestle arrangement." For \$260, a dealer was able to set up an exciting display given a rugged mountain through which two lines went in and out as well as two nearly symmetrical loops.

♦ Its customer

This is not the first article in CTT to showcase a surviving example of the D-224. Never before, however, has our magazine been able to show the immense wood packing crate assembled by Lionel for shipping the brand-new 5 x 9-foot

display item.

According to the paper label affixed to the crate, this D-224 had in 1958 been dispatched from Lionel's factory in Irvington, N.J., to Pollard's Department Store in Allentown, Pa. A toy buyer there likely had seen the picture and explanation of the 5 x 9 and thought it would be perfect.

◆ The fate of the layout

Daniel Brown, a collector of Lionel displays, shared his D-224 with us. Some of his other layouts appeared in the March 2017 issue.

Daniel wonders whether the fact that the shipping crate for the display survived intact meant Pollard's Department Store never assembled the layout. The fate of his Super O operating railroad probably will never be known; instead, planners can study it as the basis of a great layout.

O GAUGER BRIAN INCH KNOWS THE VALUE OF A SMALL LAYOUT

Modeler Brian Inch can recite

the assets of every brand of O gauge track now on the market. He's familiar with systems of command control and can rate them against conventional modes. Not a locomotive current or vintage escapes his scrutiny. This is a guy who knows the three-rail hobby from all possible angles.

Interesting, therefore, to hear Brian extol the virtues of plywood when it comes to building a layout – a product integral to the toy train scene since at least the close of World War II – which is a lot longer than Brian has been alive! How is it that Brian, who could have used any product as the foundation of his compact layout, considered it a no-brainer to start with a couple of sheets of 4 x 8-foot plywood?

Although Brian started his 4 x 16-foot display in the same way his father or even grandfather might have decades ago, on these two sheets of plywood he has completed scenes reminiscent of life in postwar New England. Superb detailing injects wonder and beauty into the layout.

◆ Humble material

Whether they entered the hobby in the 1950s or the 1980s or perhaps the 2000s, many *Classic Toy Trains* readers got going with a single piece of plywood.

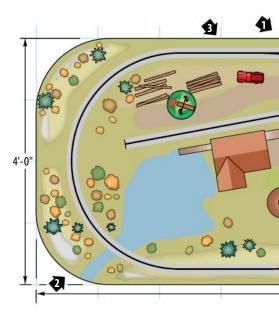
Something about a 4 x 8 sheet of ½-inch-thick plywood turned it into the ideal foundation for a three-rail layout. There is sufficient space in its 32 square feet for a long main line as well as passing sidings or maybe spurs for accessories.

Budding engineers lacking a pair of switches still endorsed the 4 x 8 sheet because they could fashion a figure-8 with its crossover in the middle. With a set of trestles you could lay a main line that rose above on the surface of the board before descending gently to the flat surface.

Lucky were the operators able to find room for a second 4 x 8. By pushing it alongside its twin they created an 8 x 8 empire. Arranging one sheet perpendicular to the other fashioned an L-shaped base of 8 x 12 feet – plenty of room for a double-track main and sidings.

Less commonly, layout builders put the two 4 x 8s end to end. Such a long and narrow layout offered distant if tight runs while reducing the possibility for a few spurs. Brian preferred a 4 x 16-foot design for his current O gauge railroad. A real benefit, he discovered, was being able to

separate the pair of plywood sheets and pack them, one on top of the other, in a van to transport to train shows for display.

♦ Never too tired

With the exception of a few years while attending high school, Brian has been an active O gauge enthusiast since turning seven. His dad played with Lionel trains as a youngster and so eagerly introduced the hobby to Brian. The intention was to find a leisure activity the two of them might enjoy together for many years. As Brian recalled in the May 2012 issue of CTT,

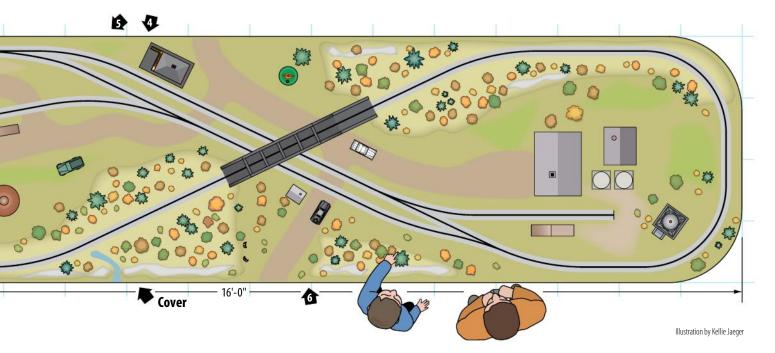
working on upgrading the layout was a terrific bonding experience.

Brian's boyhood railroad lit a fire in his soul he has never wanted to put out. He enjoys every stage of designing and constructing layouts, especially when he can share the time a with his wife, Jessica, their son, Riley, and two daughters, Meghan and Elise. Toy trains have evolved in the Inch household until they have become something the entire family really loves.

The O gauge railroad previously featured in CTT captured the look of railroading, manufacturing, and agriculture

in Maine during the postwar years. Brian and Jessica like residing in Maine and so used that 16 x 20-foot display to give their three youngsters a glimpse of life as it was before they had been born.

Circumstances changed for the Inch family, and Brian realized that three-rail display was simply too large and demanding. In its place, he sought to built a 4 x 16-foot layout that was also going to focus on life and labor in postwar Maine.

◆ The right combination

Gathering pencils and pads of paper, Brian started sketching track diagrams. The confines of his proposed 4 x 16-foot layout became evident but it wasn't long before Brian arrived at a configuration he liked.

It amounted to a figure-8 whose main line crossed over itself right in the center. The lower level boasted a passing siding, along with spurs to the two principal industries: a Coors brewery at one end and a log loader at the other. In Brian's mind there was going to be a nearby spot for an animated sawmill as well.

Anyone who recalls what Brian accomplished on his big layout knows realistic modeling is important to him. He studies the history, economy, railroads, and terrain of Maine so his efforts at replicating them will be convincing and satisfying. Weathering structures, selecting adequate details, and appropriately landscaping the flat lands and rolling hills all become challenges he feels he must conquer.

The drive to create realistic scenes shaped the development of the current railroad. At the same time, Brian admits to a fondness for animated accessories.

"I am dedicated to accurately modeling what life in Maine was like when my dad was growing up," Brian said. "But I also get a kick out of animation. In this case, I enjoy the fact that my operating freight cars and accessories transport logs and beer. At their respective facilities, I've wired sound modules to add fun."

Simple scenery

When on the previous layout Brian had had approximately 320 square feet at his disposal, there had been enough real estate for a fairly elaborate network of track. He went out of his way to list the key features: three main lines, 10 or more spurs, runaround tracks, a crossover, three tunnels, and a long tunnel. Can't forget the huge locomotive-servicing facility complete with turntable and roundhouse.

Now, Brian was claiming an area about 20 percent as big. Into 64 square feet he would have to lay suitable main lines and sidings while leaving space for the manufacturing and agricultural facilities he wanted. Suggesting the handful of scenes captured Maine during postwar days might be the greatest challenge Brian had yet faced as a tried-and-true three-rail fan.

The trick to realizing that goal, Brian concluded, touched on the trains he operated and the scenery he made for them to travel through. Engines, boxcars, cabooses, flatcars, and gondolas painted and lettered for the Bangor & Aroostook, the Boston & Maine, and the Maine Central set the scene. The roster of steam and first-generation diesel (switchers and cab units) reinforce the postwar setting.

Landscapes were more difficult. Brian had much less space in which to capture the look of northern New England.

Mountains, he decided, would not be as prominent on his compact layout as they had been on the previous one. Valleys,

bodies of water, and forests would serve as the prime features attesting to the locale.

Chunks of Styrofoam glued in place and then carved and shaped went on first. Brian covered them with thick paper and plaster before coloring the surface with brown or green latex paint. Ballast, ground foam, and trees completed the process. For water effects, he again used the twopart epoxy marketed by Enviro-Tex.

♦ What he liked

Fortunately for Brian, some of what had succeeded so well on his bigger homage to Brian had trusted the flextrack put out by GarGraves and the turnouts from Ross Custom Switches. Brian felt comfortable returning to those dependable products.

Brian installed cork roadbed, another old favorite. It reduces the sound of passing trains. Also in his list were switch machines made by Tortoise. The result is a network that impresses observers with its realism and operators with its reliability.

Brian has been a advocate of command control since Lionel broke through with its TrainMaster Command Control in the 1990s. As always, his major power source

> is a postwar ZW transformer. But where he once used TMCC to run his fleet, he currently goes with the Digital Command System from MTH as well as Lionel's Legacy to

operate the many MTH models.

postwar Maine fit into the compact version he was working feverishly to complete. What he had liked before promised to bring the same benefits, a fact that deepened his respect and preference for certain items.

Track is the place to begin. In the past,

Personal visions

"I enjoy creating unique structures from original plans and photos," Brian said. "I use the products on the market and end up with something with a basis in reality -



a model of a structure you might have seen in rural Maine in the 1950s."

By reducing the dimensions of his new layout Brian needed only a few structures but made sure they capture postwar New England. A sawmill, a brewery, a switch tower, and a crossing shanty met the requirement. Knowing operating cars blend well with the sawmill and the brewery increased their value.

Off to the show

Faster than imagined, Brian was putting the finishing touches on his 64-squarefoot display. Riley provided assistance and encouragement. He, like his sisters, enjoys the special effects and operating models. All of them have a ball helping their dad uncouple cars on spurs at the industries.



The compact layout advertises what Brian and his custom layout business can do. Yet he transports it to shows for more reasons than promoting his company.

"I enjoy seeing people as they watch the trains travel on the main lines," Brian says. "Dreams are being made, and the future of this great hobby is being taken care of. That's the best of all."

PETER AND MARILYN PERRY'S **8 X 12-FOOT LAYOUT OFFERS** PLENTY OF EXCITEMENT

A track plan published in the

March 2011 issue of Classic Toy Trains helped me develop the idea for my latest O gauge layout. My wife, Marilyn, and I had moved into a new home. Now I was looking for the perfect platform on which to operate my postwar Lionel trains and accessories.

Paging through my copy of CTT, I discovered a trilevel track plan shared by Ray Stuber. It was what I had been searching for, especially because it used conventional power. I was familiar with command control, but wanted to go back to what I'd done as a boy.

♦ Adventure back to the 1950s

The more I studied Ray's plan the more it seemed an ideal salute to the 1950s. In the past, I had built layouts using command control to run big and sophisticated new locomotives. But I felt ready to rethink my planning and use my Lionel ZW 275-watt transformer and three CW 80-watt power sources to work.

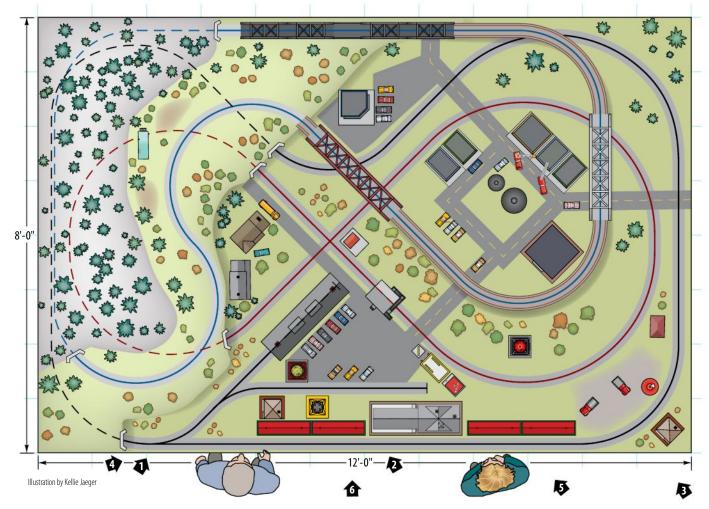
I decided an 8 x 12-foot platform would handle components of Lionel's FasTrack system much better than the 6 x 10-foot display Ray had described in CTT. Three 4 x 8-foot sheets of plywood arranged side-by-side would make construction and wiring much easier. I realized I wouldn't have enough space for the bottom level Ray had shown in his drawings.

So I ended up building a model railroad I called "East Jabip" without it. By the way, the name came to me as I was struggling for a layout theme. East Jabip is a slang term meaning a remote, out-of-the-way place.

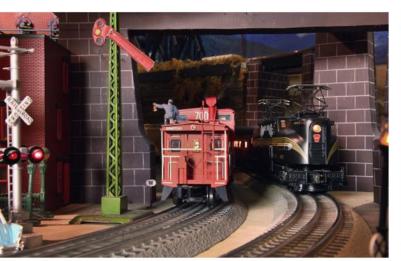

◆ Ready to build

After Marilyn and I had moved into our new home and completed some essential tasks, I launched work on my new O gauge railroad. I taped off an 8 x 12-foot rectangle on the floor of the basement. Then I set up three loops, using FasTrack curved and

straight pieces. I had to make sure everything would fit.

Satisfied with my preliminary work, I assembled the benchwork out of 2 x 6 lumber (sturdier than 2 x 4 wood). On top went sheets of ¾-inch plywood. And over the surface I

put down some sheets of ½-inch-thick Homasote.

The elevated level is supported by 2 x 6 legs standing 11 inches higher than the main level. I checked out how the top loop was going to circle over the two lower lines and

still make it possible for folks to see the action below.

To solve that problem, I fashioned 16 wood piers by hand, each with a height of 10 inches. After painting them, I lined them up in a manner close to what I've seen on Amtrak's line over the Brandywine River in Pennsylvania.

The 2 x 6 piers let me use four of Lionel's no. 62716 short extension bridges and two longer ones (nos. 2122 and 12772). To give that suspended section a more realistic look, I transitioned the FasTrack to Atlas three-rail track.

◆ Linear supports

I'm proud to have found a way to give linear support under the suspended section. Support beams beneath the track and between the piers hold it up,

just as they would in real life. I purchased garden edging trim from a building supply store, ran its desired width through my band saw, and created the corresponding "notches" atop the piers to accommodate the horizontal support beams beneath the rails.

fitted them under the upper loop's facade, placing vertical trim strips where cards met each other following the curvature of the wall.

I made the bearing wall under the elevated straight run at the rear of the layout from industrial-strength foam insu-

Laying track sections where trains will pass each other, especially on curves, demands precision. So I worked hard to integrate odd lengths of Fas-Track on certain curves to avoid problems like sideswiping. Installing shorter straights (varying in length from 1 3/8 to 5 inches) helped me get the track exactly as needed to provide passing trains proper clearance. Things got touchier when I located the piers supporting overhead tracks.

For the bearing wall along the curved upper loop, I took a 5 x 7-inch cinder block card to a copy center to get 12 more reproduced. Next, I glued them to foam core board and

lation board. First, I roughed up the surface using a wire paint removal brush. Then I painted the surfaces to look like they were actually rock walls. Simple yet effective.

First time for scenery

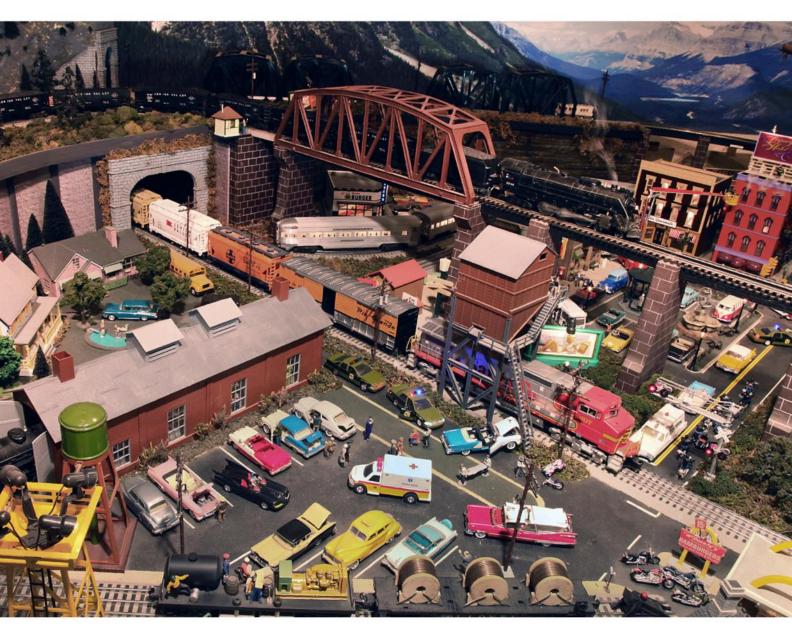
Never had I made mountains for an O gauge layout. I chose window screen applied to vertical wood framing. I scrubbed the protective finish off the screen with hot water and soap before covering it with canned spray insulation.



I completed the mountains by adding six tunnels, including one that's HO scale to simulate a highway. Topping off the neat scene is a 4 x 12-foot horizontal canvas mural depicting Peyto Lake as it sits amid the Canadian Rockies. I got it from Murals Your Way (www.muralsyourway.com).

I made the landforms from canned spray insulation, which made it easy to stick commercial trees into the hillsides. I painted the landforms to blend with the colorful mural.

Then I enclosed the open back side of the mountains with a 1/2-inch-thick piece of 8-foot-long plywood shaped at



the top to conform to the top edges of the mountain. I laid it onto a notched horizontal 2 x 4 attached to the platform's base.

To keep the plywood attached to the back of the mountains, I used stainless-steel screws that I carefully inserted into what I call their "home holes." I then lined up everything with special markings I added. The markings make it easier to replace the side cover should I have to remove it to clear any derailments inside the mountain.

Hand-painted highways, parking lots, a town square, and green moss added to the natural scene as countryside leads to cityscape. Downtown buildings and a special concentration of motorcycles by MTH made it that East Jabip was having quite a hectic motorcycle rally today!

♦ East Jabip

As noted earlier, "East Jabip" refers to any remote, out-of-the-way place. Since my little town looked so nifty and inviting, I decided that because I had always heard of East Jabip yet never knew where it was, this must be the place! Martians, crocodiles, Batmobiles, Sesame Street figures, and graveyard ghosts add to the colorful name.

The highlight of the action involves a car/motorcycle collision answered by emergency equipment equipped with blinking LED lights installed by my friend J. Pearce. A graveyard with a hearse, a coffin, the Grim Reaper, and flying bats looks down over East Jabip. Houses, a swimming pool, a hotel, a motorcycle shop, a general store, a coffee shop, and a tavern make up the rest of the town.

I added smoke to a Lionel hobo camp by installing a smoke mechanism from an HO scale steam locomotive. Operating MTH traffic signals in the center of the town and a

fire at the hotel add notes of realism to the layout as well.

◆ Most exciting time

Marilyn and I love our new "little world in the basement" and enjoy having friends over to witness the action taking place on this very "active" layout. I have to say our latest adventure in model railroading is by far the most exciting.

Anyone interested in creating a nifty new railroad should keep close tabs on articles in *Classic Toy Trains*. The suggestions I discovered in the March 2011 issue set in motion the process that led to this layout for Marilyn and me.

GETTING A LEGACY ON RACK

I didn't have trains as a kid, nor did my friends, but years of watching a seemingly endless procession of rumbling, shrieking, and swaying freight cars from the family station wagon hooked me. It wasn't just the physical presence of the trains that captivated me but also the text adorning the outsides as they blurred by: Cotton Belt, Santa Fe, Air Ride, *Super Chief*, and Fast Freight. My sisters and I would try to count the cars that seemed to keep time with the clang-clang-clang of the signal bells. This was the inspiration for a lifelong interest in trains.

Over the years I considered building a train layout, but there never seemed to be the right moment to justify the time, expense, and space required. That all changed, however, with the birth of James Alan, my first grandchild, who quickly showed a fondness for wooden toy trains.

By the time James had turned five, I was ready to start building a layout with the intention of passing it down to him and hoping he in turn will pass it along to his children. I figured in the interim he would let me play with it.

I was limited to a 5 x 9-foot space, so I felt fortunate to

find a design in the Lionel Track and Power Guide that seemed to offer the best use of that limited size. The track plan included four switches and a few uncoupling/dumping sections. It would keep James' interest after the round-and-round aspect of running the train became rouzines seemed beyond my capabilities, I chose to cover the board with textured paint to resemble sandy soil. I installed Lionel FasTrack and used colored chalks to age the ties and upper areas of the ballast to soften the sterile look of the rails.

The narrow gap between two sets of

track along one side of the lavout was too small for accessories or structures, so I installed an additional section of FasTrack with a bumper on each

end. I figured that even a switcher or handcar moving back and forth was a better use of real estate than shrubs or noth-

The finished board looked huge initially, but I soon learned it would be tough to fit in everything I wanted to include. I painted a road and parking areas for a couple of buildings, but quickly realized it would barely be wide enough for one vehicle and would

dead-end on each end. Also, the small parking lot would make it impossible for vehicles to leave.

After test-fitting the various accessories and structures, I saw that my limited areas of straight track prevented large pieces, such as my lumber mill and culvert loader, from loading or receiving materials. What would I do with the small islands of isolation surrounded by raised FasTrack? If I wanted to include my accessories, I had to find a way around these obstacles.

I wanted to have as many accessories as possible to keep James interested. As a solution, I placed items like the log loader and coal loader where they could access railcars.

But there was no way to place the culvert loader so it could access a car. Instead, I adopted a "fake it as you make it" philos-

ophy and built a mock spur by placing a piece of non-operational track alongside the loader that extends close to the main line.

Gluing planks to FasTrack created a crossing scene crossing gate signalman optional!



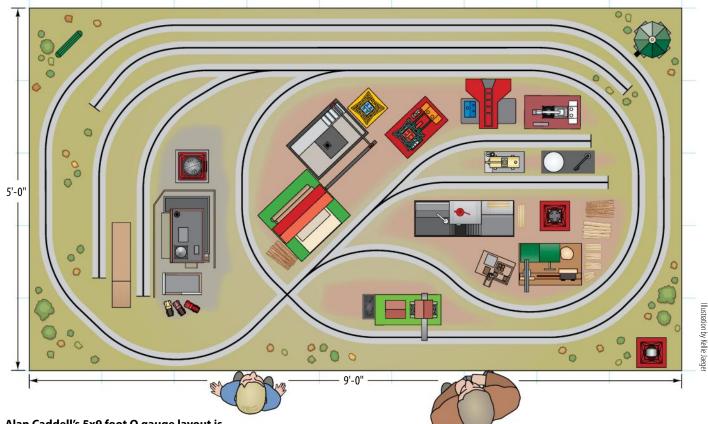
tine. I acquired accessories to add interactivity to the layout.

James and I began construction in October 2014 of what I named the Suzette Lee Line RR. (Tip: if you want support for your layout, consider naming it after your spouse.) We started on the outer edge by expanding a standard sheet of plywood to form the base. James was able to help with drilling holes and turning some of the screws. It was a special moment when James and I signed our names to the board's underside for his children to see.

♦ Simplified scenery

Because the landscaping I saw in maga-

With a bumper at the end near the loader and the other end concealed by a fence, it appeared to be connected.

Wiring

Having installed the track and chosen where to place the accessories, I began to wire the layout – the most challenging part of the project. I had never realized the effort underneath the layout was at least as equal to that which is visible.

Eventually, I had the underside of the layout wired and moved everything inside. I connected the accessories, hoping they and the tracks would function correctly once I completed the control panel.

◆ The details

With the basic layout finished, I focused on detail work. While I initially liked the effect provided by the textured paint, I realized it was boring. Also, the gap between the FasTrack base and the top of the layout was unrealistic and irksome.

Fortunately, I found some helpful and encouraging tutorials online that showed step by step how to use commercially available products, including ballast, to

upgrade the appearance of a layout.

I started by applying ballast to the outside of the FasTrack. Then I used chalk to blend the lighter-colored stone with the molded sides of the track to give the illusion that differences in color were due to grease, oil, and dirt.

I took James to see real tracks and get a sense of how ballast works and looks so he better understood what I was doing. I then tackled landscaping. As it turned out, the process of simulating vegetation was not overly difficult, and the products I used really enhanced the otherwise flat and

uninteresting corners of the layout.

As I gained confidence, I placed additional vegetation (including some natural foliage I collected) between the tracks and other areas. Soon I realized I had landscaped most of my painted areas!

My narrow, one-directional, and double dead-ended road provided James with something to do since the layout wasn't yet operational. He spent considerable time running a car back and forth and, to my dismay, aggressively up and over the section of FasTrack it led into.

Because the painted road was far lower than the raised track crossing it, it created a barrier to the two buildings and a park-

♦ Getting creative

Problem solving and fakery became fun for me. For example, I felt the Lionel dowel-like "logs" used in the log loader looked unrealistic, especially when I had already cut tree branches to simulate logs.

Since you can't run real branches in the loader, I transformed the loader into a debarking operation where logs are shaved down and then loaded onto cars for further processing. By placing shaved branches and piles of shavings near the scene, it had a plausible explanation for dowels being loaded.

Similarly, I wanted to conceal the raised platform that comes with the Lionel

derailed tank car. I assembled and painted a plastic "chain-link" fence kit and then used a heat gun and wire cutters to deform the fence to simulate dam-

age caused by the tank car crashing through it. The fence, some workers, and a few pieces of equipment hide otherwise inexplicable differences in ground height.

Sleight-of-hand also exists outside the Caddell Coal Co., where trucks await coal to be unloaded from hoppers. While the tower does have access to the hoppers, there is no explanation for how trucks enter or exit the island created by the sur-

rounding track. That said, the crowded area helps conceal this fact, which generally goes unnoticed.

I used mounted photographs of industrial buildings to create a backdrop at the rear of the layout. Using photo editing software, I added names of family and friends to some of the buildings.

I glued on window ledges and frames, ladders, external lights, and other elements to add dimension to the backdrop. I cut out some of the printed windows and replaced them with plastic film in front of LED lights. Finally, I added bill-boards on some of the rooftops.

◆ The control board

The last key task was building the control panel for the switches to the track and accessories. I was frustrated the first time I powered the track after moving it inside months earlier because it didn't work. Fortunately, I had labeled the wiring under the board and was able to figure out what was causing a short circuit. When everything actually worked, I was elated!

I added an oak border to the sides of the layout, which included concealed LED rope lights below to cast a nice glow on the floor. I had metal labels engraved for the control panel switches and one for the oak border reading: Built for James, 2015.

I chose a Lionel ZW transformer and ran power separately to lights, accessories, the main line, and the short back-andforth auxiliary track.

My inexperience with wiring caused me to forgo the use of electrically isolated track on the four sidings. However, using LionChief Plus remote-controlled locomotives enabled me to park short trains on sidings without them being affected by mainline operation.

It took 10 months of part-time work to complete the layout. I learned a great deal in the process and take pride in what I accomplished. Most importantly, I was able to spend substantial time with my grandson on a common project he and I continue to enjoy together.

I know I have done something right when James runs in the house after kindergarten yelling, "Is it train day, Grandpa?" Then he elects to run trains instead of watching television or playing computer games.

Our layout provides the priceless opportunity to create lasting memories and a legacy that holds the potential to be passed down for many years.

ing lot. Although James had no problem "driving" his car up and over the ballasted track, it certainly wasn't realistic.

I solved this problem by cutting, gluing, and weathering strips of wood over the FasTrack to create a rail crossing. James could park a vehicle alongside other vehicles without apparent concern as to how these cars get in and out of Mrs. C's Bar and Grill.

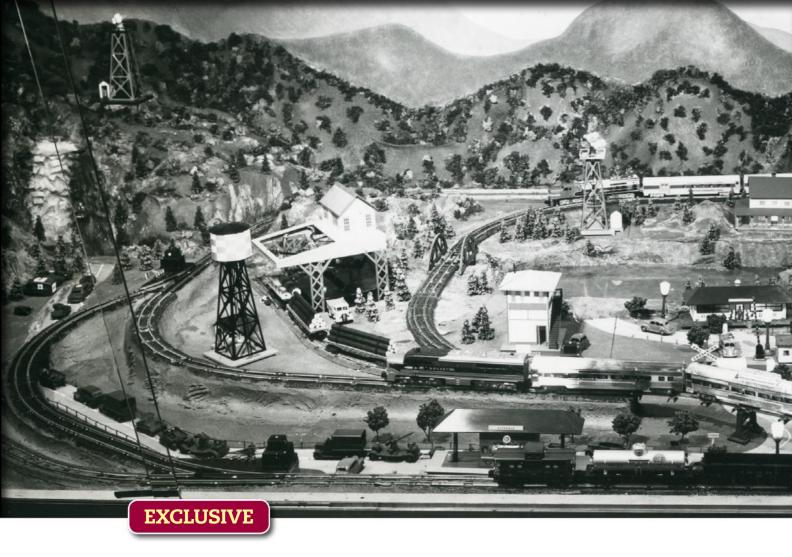

A layout for A.C.

GREAT AMERICAN FLYER DISPLAY BUILDER FRANK CASTIGLIONE CAME TO THE RESCUE

rank Castiglione, an imaginative and industrious builder of displays for the A.C. Gilbert Co. during the years after World War II, loved to tell stories about his days at the toy firm. As readers learned in *All-Star Electric Trains*, the new special-interest publication from *Classic Toy Trains*, Frank contributed to memorable S gauge layouts at three of the Halls of Science associated with the Gilbert Co. He also designed items for television programs.

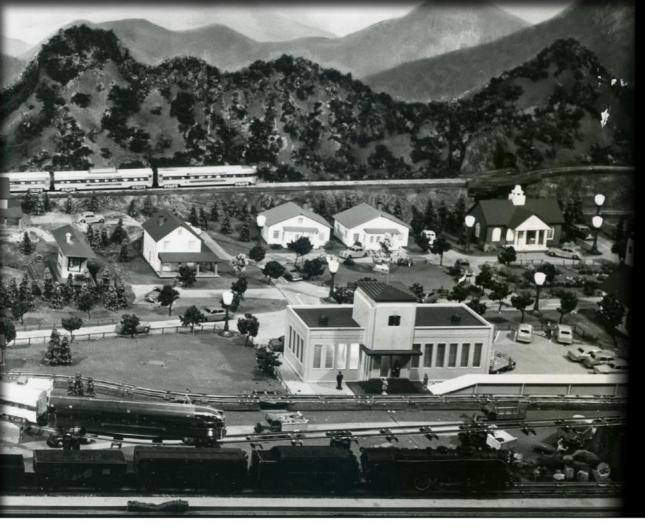
The article about Frank's career left out a few tales. A favorite of his relates to an S gauge layout he had to finish for a friend of A.C. Gilbert. Better, there's also the neverbefore-published plan of that ingenious layout – a project for any American Flyer modeler to tackle.

SOMETHING FOR A FRIEND

One question virtually every American Flyer enthusiast asked when meeting Frank related to whether he had ever met A.C. Gilbert. Frank was pleased to say he had ... and then launched into another fascinating story.

Not long after starting work for the Gilbert Co. in the late 1940s, Frank to his surprise had received a summons to the office of its founder. Mr. Gilbert exchanged pleasantries with his much younger employee before mentioning his friend Electra Havemayer Webb. She and her husband, he told Frank, had accompanied Gilbert on hunting trips. Now she wanted a layout.

What Gilbert probably failed to explain to Frank was something about the background of his friend. Electra Webb, a member of one of the wealthiest families in New York, loved Americana. To preserve artifacts and save relics, she had caravaned throughout New England, acquiring weather

vanes, woodcarvings, and quilts. She bought barns, railroad depots, houses, schools, and even a light-house, having them transported to her estate in Shelburne, Vt.

After the war, Mrs. Webb began exhibiting her treasures in some of the 20 building she owned. Naturally, in the course of amassing an enormous collection of vintage housewares, she had accumulated every sort of rustic plaything.

Fascinated by the hundreds of toys she owned and prepared to show the public, Mrs. Webb concluded any sort of display would be enhanced by an operating layout featuring contemporary electric model trains and accessories. Her friendship with A.C. motivated her to contact him to outline what she wanted for an S gauge railroad.

REACHING OUT TO FRANK

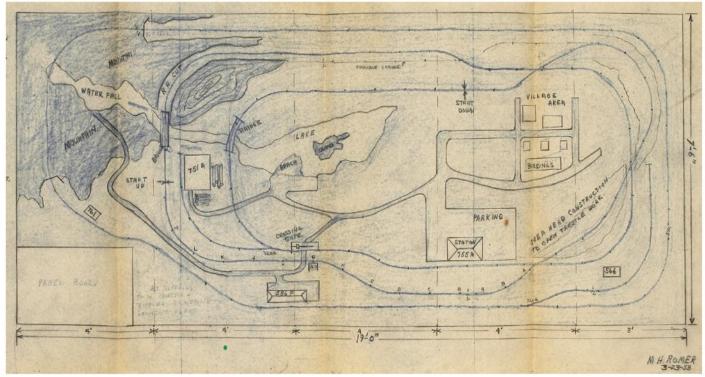
After patiently listening to Mrs. Webb's increasingly growing list of items and special effects, Gilbert paused and tried to figure out how he might gratify her wishes without losing his sanity. The solution to his woes? He contacted Frank.

"I thought I had been fired!" Frank said when asked about his reaction to getting a call to meet with Gilbert. Then in a deep voice he imitated Gilbert: "I hear you're the display man. Why don't you get this woman off my back?"



But there were plenty of other jobs to do first, which might be why work on the layout didn't begin until March 1954. By then, A. C. Gilbert had chosen Maurice Romer, who was supervising the development of the Flyer line, to

plan the 7½ x 19-foot layout, which had a painted backdrop depicting the Green Mountains of Vermont, and obtain the approval of the demanding Webb.

CHANGES WERE MADE

Frank and other men in the Display Department made the layout a priority. Once they had it done, Frank and John

Wall (the department manager) plus a third worker set out to deliver the display. "We got there early," Frank said, "and the Gilbert truck got in about an hour later. Then Mrs. Webb drove up.

"As I'm carrying the display in," Frank went on, "she lets out a bellow.

"No! No! No! This is not what I ordered!" Frank recalled Electra Webb yelling. "Where are my rolling hills? A. C. promised me!""

Frank tried to defuse the situation, telling Mrs. Webb he wasn't the boss and a flat layout was what he had been told to build. Furious, she demanded to know where the truck was, so the layout could be shipped right back to New Haven. However, the truck had already departed

> for the shop in Connecticut. As Mrs. Webb debated whether to have the state patrol pull over the truck, Wall arrived and learned, "We have a little problem."

The problem boiled down to Mrs. Webb wanting an S gauge layout that modeled the scenery of Vermont. That meant lots of hills, forests, and lakes.

Wall conferred with Gilbert and Romer. He then told Mrs. Webb that the mountains were supposed to be depicted on the backdrop; if added to the layout, they would

overwhelm the S gauge trains and scenery.

Wall's explanation pacified her. Peace reigned until he unceremoniously added, "We'll build whatever you want, but it's going to cost you."

"Suddenly," Frank said with laughter, "Mrs. Webb started screaming at us. At the very top of her lungs she roared, 'I don't care what it costs!""

MONTHS IN VERMONT

And Electra Webb didn't care what the layout was going to cost. Guess who was savior? Frank spent the next few months on the Webbs' estate making sure the Flyer display met all her expectations.

Frank and his fellow workers used traditional methods for building the scenery, with bronze screen and plaster of paris serving as the base and material of the mountains. They built houses and other structures out of pressed cardboard. Meanwhile, an artist painted the mountainous backdrop plus a sky with clouds.

Everything fell into place, and a superb 8 x 12-foot layout took shape. Mrs. Webb had specified it be only 30 inches off the ground so kids could watch the trains and operate all the accessories.

LASTING LEGACY

After Electra Webb's death in 1960, the administrators of the Shelburne Museum struggled to figure out what to do with a display of postwar trains set up amid a collection of toys 50 to 100 years older.

Museum supervisors elected to donate the outstanding S gauge layout to a nearby technical school. The Brandon Training Institute eagerly accepted the gift, putting it to good use for more than a decade. The American Flyer display remained there until wearing out in the 1970s.

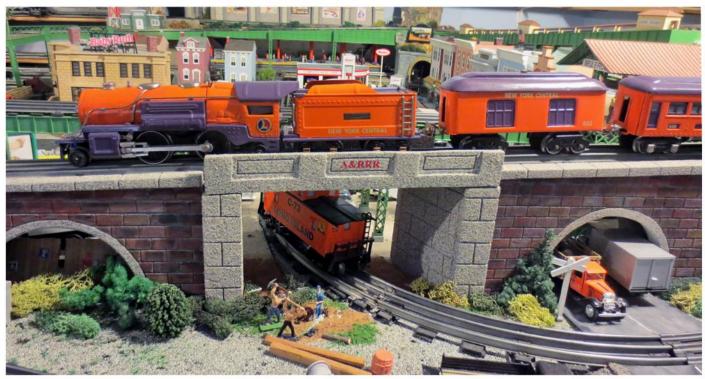

Making the roof fit the car!

ADJUST THE ROOF OF A PREWAR LIONEL PASSENGER CAR

'm a fan of trains in general, and prewar trains in particular. Not long ago I found a Lionel no. 602 baggage car. This common O gauge car was missing its roof. Of course, as any prewar enthusiast knows, that wasn't necessarily a deal-breaker,

because there was probably a mate sitting in a junk box waiting to be noticed.

A friend thought he had a matching car roof and gave it to me, but I discovered it was about ½ inch too short.

We prewar collectors can be resourceful, so I decided to extend the roof! The car was destined for a complete repaint to match the rest of my orange-and-blue New York Central passenger consist. Follow along as I outline a simple project you can try.

Expand the roof perimeter

First, I removed the paint from the edges of the roof.
Then I placed the roof on a flat surface and soldered 3/64-inch brass wire to the perimeter.

Soldering a large area of metal with a soldering iron can be difficult. It takes extra time because keeping the metal hot is challenging.

After soldering, I filed the bottom of the solder smooth and flat. I made sure the wire conformed to the curvature of the roof.

Apply the texture

I used Bondo auto body filler to change the roof curve over the wire extension. This material is also good for filling in any dings or holes needing repair. It can dry in as little as an hour, but I suggest letting it sit overnight.

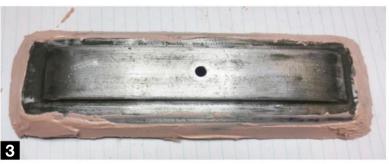
I used 180-grit (or finer) sandpaper to smooth the surface. I also used the sandpaper

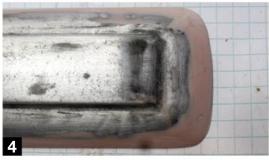

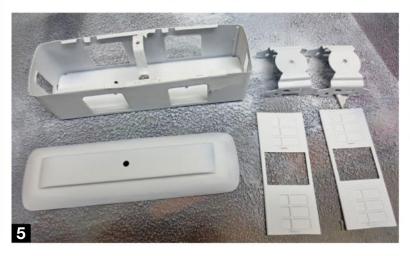

for smoothing the curve on the sides of the roof.

Prime and pick your colors

Next, select a primer. I used an automotive-type primer.

When you apply the primer you may see imperfections that weren't previously as noticeable. If any are crying out to be fixed, don't fret. Just add more Bondo and then sand and prime the roof again.

You can paint your trains any color combination you want. I, however, have a train led by a Lionel no. 259E locomotive I've painted orange and blue and lettered for the New York Central.

I wanted this baggage car to match that one-of-a-kind livery. While I was working on the new roof shape, I stripped the paint from the car and prepared it for its repainting.

I used Krylon spray paints for this project, but you can use the brand of your choice. The roof and doors got a coat of blue, while the car shell got orange. I added gold lettering for the New York Central and car number 602.

Bake the finish

I like the smooth look of a baked-on paint finish for my tinplate cars. Just set the oven temperature at 200 degrees and place the car in a disposable aluminum tray. Let it bake for 30 minutes. When removing the tray from the oven, use oven mitts!

Reassemble the car and trucks. You can feel pride that you have taken a vintage car without a roof – and a roof without a car – and made them part of your operating fleet. – *Gene Maag*



Mobile living

BUILT-&-READY O SCALE MOBILE HOMES BY WOODLAND SCENICS

he three Built-&Ready mobile homes
from Woodland Scenics prove that astonishing things can come in relatively small packages. I will
confess to some confusion
with the idea, but when I
opened the box and saw the
three buildings, I got it.

When I was a kid, a friend of my uncle's suggested he and I come up to his cabin for the day. What I saw was a farmer's field with a fairly large pond dredged out in the middle of a field, and surrounding the lake were 10 to 12 mobile homes people used as weekend getaways. With no good TV signals and maybe only WLW from Cincinnati on the radio,

you really would have been getting away from it all.

There wasn't an Airstream to be seen, but some fairly nice, modest mobile homes. They were not permanently affixed, but the owners had set out – almost in a competition – to personalize their areas with shrubs and flowers and here and there, a birdbath. It was pretty neat. Right there in the middle of a large farm was as pleasant a little neighborhood as you could find. Tornados need not apply!

OPENING THE BOX

We received the nos. BR5861 Grillin' & Chillin' trailer, BR5862 Double Decker trailer, and BR5863 Sunny Days trailer. Thanks to see-through clamshell packaging, I could see clearly how each mobile home was unique. They are all gems, each having the mystique to build a scene around. All the O gauge trailers come ready for use with the Woodland Scenics Just Plus lighting system and cost \$94.99 each.

SKYLINER

The BR5862 Double Decker is a virtual trailer park sky-scraper. Okay, that isn't quite right. But it does mount a small cupola with windows above the bedroom. You can decide whether this is for extra air/ventilation or a spot for the

kiddies to bunk.

One side has two doors, both of which have portholes! One door is at the living room and the other at the bedroom. Both have wood steps. This side also has one large picture window and two smaller two-pane windows.

The opposite side has a picture window and three smaller two-pane windows. There is a door with closed vent slats on the lower half. You can clearly see the wheels beneath the house. There is a TV antenna attached to the side.



The front of the trailer has a four-pane window, with most of one pane taken up by an air conditioner. There are two propane tanks mounted on the frame for the trailer hitch. There is no decoration around the base, and the trailer is on "cement" blocks.

The roof looks aluminum and has two vents. Interestingly, there are two car tires on the roof. Whether or not these are spares for travel or inner tubes for floating on a lake, they add some color.

The trailer's windows all have curtains, but they look wonderfully mismatched. The neatest feature of all is what you can see looking through

the right-side picture window. When the building has power applied, you can see an old black-and-white TV set with a flickering screen. How cool and retro!

Oh, the back end has an oval window looking to the rear as well and a curved wall. Yes, there is a bumper as well as four simulated brake lights.

Extras for this trailer include a picnic table, a horizontal propane tank, a garbage can, and a freestanding water faucet.

Not quite as orderly as the Grillin' & Chillin' model, but much more relaxed.

THE COOKOUT KING

The BR5861 Grillin' & Chillin' model is the trailer equivalent of a country manor. It has a sedate green-and-white scheme. There is a matching striped canopy over the deck. In my mind, this shade of



green screams late 1950s or early '60s.

When I first saw the Grillin' & Chillin' trailer, my mind went back to the street where my grandparents had lived. While it was a residential neighborhood, one of their neighbors had a 1956 Ford painted light green and white (it had previously been pink and white). Wow, the odd memories your brain tucks away, waiting to be awakened!

Below the canopy is a wood deck with a railing and two

recliners and a grill. Yes, there are eats on the barbeque! There is a main entry on the deck, and a picture window and a smaller window enhance both sides of the entry.

There is a side door to the left of the deck. It has a set of wood steps and a trashcan at the bottom.

The opposite side has a back door (no steps), two small windows, and a longer window with a mounted air conditioner. There is also a large vertical propane tank

connected to the trailer. Finally, an old-school TV antenna runs from ground level to an inch or so above the trailer.

The flat roof is aluminum colored and has a step-down at the rear half of the trailer. It has two vents positioned on the middle back side.

The front of the trailer has an eight-pane window. Just below the window are a trailer hitch and two propane tanks. A shrub is planted near the hitch. Lattice-work wraps around the base of the trailer. and plants fill the area in front of the hitch.

The interior is decorated with printed cardstock scenes that look like authentic interiors. The lighting is bright and natural in appearance. All the windows have curtains, and they seem to fit the happy, casual look of the place.

The rear has a two-pane window and a bumper. Also, to remind us that it is, in theory, still a mobile home, there are two simulated brake lights!

The trailer has a freestanding water faucet you can plant in the ground anywhere near the structure.

The Grillin' & Chillin' trailer is casual, but everything about the design suggests there is a place for everything and everything is in its place.

FUN IN THE SUN

The BR5863 Sunny Days trailer makes me happy - even if I want to be grumpy! The bright white siding, along with the carefully applied yellow accents on the body, makes me think "carefree."

The five different "metal" awnings struck me. They're placed over the doors and windows. These suggest the owner isn't going anywhere; this trailer is his or her castle! This notion of being a fixed place in a mobile home park is reinforced by the matching "metal" skirting running all around the trailer. It seems it would take some effort to get this baby rolling again.

The driver's side has a smallish three-pane picture window and two two-pane windows. There are two doors, one with a four-pane window and the other with a singlepane window.

There are two sets of steps. The main entry has handrails.

O GAUGE U.S. AIR FORCE SW8 SWITCHER BY MTH ELECTRIC TRAINS

A large part of my childhood was spent about a mile south of the property line for Patrick Air Force Base in Florida and within easy view of launches from Cape Kennedy. That being said, my family took many visiting friends and relatives from "up north" on the Sunday selfguided drive-through tour of the space center.



The other lacks them, but has a trashcan nearby!

The opposite side has the same three-pane picture window as the other side. There are two other windows: one-and two-pane versions. There is a backdoor with cast-in vents. There is a large vertical

propane tank attached to the side of the trailer.

The rear has a two-pane window, a bumper, and two simulated brake lights.

As with the other trailers, the Sunny Days has cardstock interior decoration and an amazing collection of curtains. Extras for this trailer include two 1950s-style metal lawn chairs, a matching metal table, and a water hookup.

A PARK OR A SINGLE?

These O gauge trailers each tell their own tale. Individually, they would be perfect for that small spot by your layout's river or lake. As a group you could build a unique scene around them as a retirement village or a tourist camp.

Heck, if you're good with a fine brush, you can repaint the trailers. Like weathering freight cars? You could make these candidates for Rustoleum Park! There is no limit to what you may do with half a dozen.

Hats off to Woodland Scenics for coming up with three interesting structures that are similar in concept, but are as different as night and day. – *Bob Keller*

Now I can't imagine this being done today, but they gave you a map and you were on your own – although there were security vehicles parked at intersections to prevent unauthorized detours.

One highlight of the tour was a drive past the facility where Titan missiles were assembled. The main reason I always tagged along was to view two U.S. Air Force diesel switchers used to facilitate movement of the missiles.

Other than seeing a string of U.S. Navy helium cars seemingly parked in the same place each visit, I had no idea how elaborate the center's railway network was until I came to work at Kalmbach Publishing Co in 1996. NASA had its own railway, and at one time as many as three Air Force SW8s were assigned to Cape Canaveral operations. Between 1965 and 2005, they supported 82 Titan launches. The space center's rail line operated 38 miles of track, but it was pared down to 17 and has been dormant since 2015.

The ultimate fate of that rail line may still be determined in the future, since Florida officials have been kicking around an idea to use it as a transit point for container operations at Port Canaveral.

OPENING THE BOX

This is a model of an 800-horsepower SW8 switcher. The Electro-Motive Division of General Motors built 374 of them for North American railroads and indus-

tries between 1950 and '54.

Air Force unit no. 2021 is on display at the Air Force Space & Missile Museum on the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. It is displayed on the track it once used to move Titan rockets for launch.

The SW8 from MTH Electric Trains is the type of diesel you could build a model railroad around. The fact that it can negotiate O-27 curves means you can use it in nearly any role. The model possesses the familiar EMD

outline that dominated the yard switcher market for 40 years. This makes it a prime candidate for a line modeling anything from the 1940s to the 1980s and beyond.

The pilot has front brakeman's steps, and the pilot steps have yellow safety stripes. The model mounts coil couplers.

Handrails on the pilot will help your crew climb aboard. There is a cast-in grab iron as well as cast-in louvers on the battery boxes. Two steps and add-on handrails lead up to the cab door. The deck has cast-in safety tread.

The sides have cast-in door, hinge, handle, and louver detailing. The add-on rail that runs along the engine compartment is painted blue to match the locomotive. The top of the engine compartment has cast-in seam and bolt detailing.

There is a single exhaust stack and a bell by the intake. At some point later in their lives, the Titan locomotive stacks had spark arrestors installed (missing from the MTH model). The horn was also moved from the traditional spot just below the long-hood cab roof to top of the cab. The new add-on horn is a five-chime version and not the old single horn, one-chime style. The five-chime horn is on the 2021 displayed at Cape Canaveral.

Although the livery is uncomplicated, painting and decoration were excellent. The yellow and blue safety stripes were clear and crisply applied.

ON THE TEST TRACK

The sound system is good, replicating the EMD diesel sounds, horn, and bell. The chatter kicks in periodically. I was

ously, it delivers a nice sound package in an affordable model.

Operation was very smooth in all speed ranges. Our command-mode low-speed average was 2.9 scale miles per hour, and the conventional speed was 3.1 scale miles per hour. Our high-speed average was 73.6 scale miles per hour, but it can go much faster. I wasn't watching precisely where my finger was going on the MTH iPhone app and hit the "120 mph" mark. Uff da! The SW8 made it around the layout twice before I got it to slow down!

There are no classification/marker lights on the model, an omission that matches the prototype. The cab is illuminated, and the headlight changes based on direction of travel.

I like this model for the road name as much as because I recall seeing the real unit decades ago. But you don't buy a model just for the memories. The SW8 is a terrific little switcher that can work at low or high speeds with a range of loads in tow. Regardless of the livery, the SW8 will deliver solid performance. - Bob

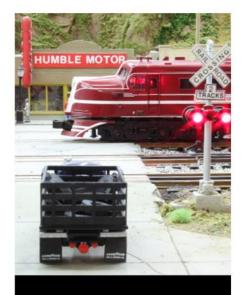

Quick tips

MAKE A TRAIN PENHOLDER



A few scraps of wood and a spare car make a nice pen holder.

e've all got them!
Freight cars that
were gifts and
don't fit our
operations theme, old pieces
we treasure but can't be run
anymore, and oddities picked
up at a show on impulse. Too
good to throw away, and yet
they sit still gathering dust.

What to do with them? Why not make a pen/pencil holder for your workbench? This can be done in an hour or two using scraps of quality wood!

A small one for N scale uses a $1\frac{1}{2}$ x $\frac{3}{4}$ x 6-inch piece of mahogany for the base and a $\frac{3}{4}$ x $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch piece for the receptacle (I cut it from a tomato

stake). I beveled the base on top for looks. Using a 5/16-inch drill, I bored a two-inch-deep hole in the receptacle, and then cut the end at a 30-degree angle where it attaches.

Wood glue and a countersunk wood screw secured the joint. I sealed everything with clear spray. I attached the display car with a bit of wood glue (so I can pop it off if need be). And you are done!

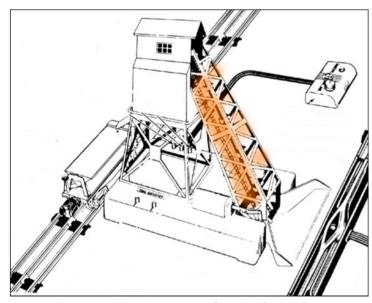
The same process works for the larger model, such as an HO scale 40-foot car or a Marx 6-inch-long four-wheel tin-plate equivalent. For the base I used a 2 x ¾ x 8½-inch piece cut from a birch kitchen cabinet door. I beveled the top and made the receptacle as described, substituting walnut for the mahogany.

After assembling and sealing the model, I mounted it differently than before. I used a countersunk 6-32 x $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch machine screw up through the



base. Over this I slipped a 3%-inch-high plastic spacer to keep from overtightening and deforming the car. A hidden hole to receive the screw was drilled and tapped in the car's underframe and metal weight.

For the spacer for the tinplate car I used a 1-inch-high wine bottle cork drilled through. Marx had already provided a clearance hole in the gondola floor, so I screwed on a nut. Viola! Oh, I did add rubber feet under the base, but these aren't necessary. It's nice to always have a pen or pencil handy. – *Harry Noble*

REDUCE COAL SPILLAGE ON LIONEL'S NO. 97 COAL ELEVATOR

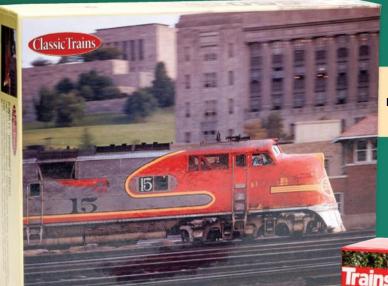
o prevent chunks of coal from spilling on a Lionel no. 97 coal elevator, I first cut strips of thin, flexible clear plastic sheets. I relied on the type used for "windows" in model train boxes (also good are plastic sheet protectors).

Then I attached the thin sheets on three sides of the coal elevator, leaving the front open. I secured them with Goop all-purpose adhesive. This will limit the spread of stray coal to the elevator area and not your layout! – *James Hirvela*

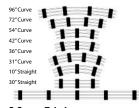
