THE EDITOR'S PAGE COINCE



YOU WOULDN'T think it was possible for the plethora of proposed ready-torun projects to get any better, but in fact it has! October has been a striking month for new announcements

with 10 new models being announced across 'OO', 'N' and 'O' scales - and covering everything from new locomotives through to humble ballast wagons too.

Hornby got the month off to a flying start with its surprise announcement of the Peckett 0-4-0ST for 'OO' gauge. This is by far the smallest locomotive to be revealed so far in its plans for 2016, but it is certainly an interesting departure from its more usual main line steam locomotive projects.

Industrial modelling has certainly increased and with the success of its Sentinel diesel shunter, which was re-released in September with coupling rods (HM101) - and projects from DJ Models covering the Hunslet 'Austerity' and Hudswell Clarke 0-6-0STs there has never been a better time to indulge

in a little industrial modelling. Heljan's recently released Class 05 (HM99) is perfectly suited to this area together with the Hatton's Class 14 and Bachmann Class 03 and 04 diesels - all of which were transferred into industrial service after careers on the main line network.

Also newly announced is DJ Models follow up to the Class 71 - the Class 74 for 'OO' - while the same manufacturer has also unveiled plans for five new wagons in 'N' gauge too.

In 'O' gauge Heljan has quietly revealed that it will be producing a brand new batch of Class 37s for 7mm scale, but this time with centre headcodes - a popular move for sure.

Update covers all these models and more with Dapol revealing plans for a 'OO' Class 59 and 'N' gauge prototype HST at its open day too alongside samples of its new Class 68 for 'OO'.

This packed issue sees three superb layouts featured in full including two that visitors to the highly popular Great Electric Train Show would have seen. Our team of modellers has been hard at work bringing together comprehensive features on Great Eastern section train formations, detailing the Hornby Crosti '9F' 2-10-0, ballasting and more. Plus we are launching a new project layout in this issue - Nigel Burkin's compact Scottish Region model Loch Dhu built in 'OO' scale.

Behind the scenes the *Hornby Magazine* team is getting ready for the busy month of November when we will be out on the road at the Spalding Model Railway Exhibition on November 14/15 with Shortley Bridge and Felton Cement Works. Two weeks later on November 28/29 we will be at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition at the NEC in Birmingham and in a change from our original plan we have decided to extract our office test track Topley Dale for a rare public appearance on the *Hornby Magazine* stand at the event. It will be great to have this model back out in the limelight two years after it was last seen.

We are looking forward to these events and being out with the layouts. They are a big part of what we do here at *Hornby Magazine*.

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DAPOL UPDATES... COLLECTORS AT CLUB



The popular Class 59 heavy freight diesels are Dapol's latest 'OO' gauge project announcement. APOL is set to impress with its plans to produce an all new 'OO' gauge model of the Class 59 diesel electric as well as a special edition model of the prototype High Speed Train (HST) for 'N' gauge. Both were revealed at its annual collector's club open day in early October.

First introduced in the mid 1980s, the Class 59 heavy freight diesels were the first privately owned locomotives to operate on British Rail (BR).

Dapol's new model will cater for the main detail differences between the three Class 59 subclasses with the first round of releases modelling 59002 Alan JDay in Foster Yeoman livery (Cat No. 4D-005-000), 59103 Village of Great Elm in ARC livery (4D-005-001), 59206 John F Yeoman in DB Schenker red (4D-005-002) and 59204 in National Power blue (4D-005-003).

Featuring controllable directional lighting these new models will also include provision for Digital Command Control (DCC)

Heljan is to produce a new version of the highly popular English Electric Class 37 in its 'O' gauge range featuring centre headcodes. First released in 'O' gauge with split headcodes, that version has sold out.

The new centre headcode Class 37 is expected to become available in late 2016 and will feature buffer shrouds, modifications to the roof to suit later built locomotives and a retail price of £649 per locomotive.

Four liveries are proposed covering BR green with small yellow warning panels, BR green with full yellow ends, BR blue with full yellow ends and BR'large logo' blue. The specification will match previous 'O' gauge diesels from Helian incorporating two five-pole motors, rotating roof fans, directional lighting and screw couplings fitted as standard.

sound and the option of a diesel specific smoke unit too. Release is anticipated during the middle of 2016 and the 'N' gauge Class 59 is expected to follow approximately three months after the 'OO' model.

For 'N' gauge modellers, Dapol's announcement of the Class 41 prototype HST power car 41001, as preserved in the National Collection, follows on from development of its popular production HSTs for 'N'. Built at BR's Crewe Works in 1972, this was the forerunner to the production Class 43 power car and has recently been restored to full working order by the 125 Group under the Project Miller umbrella. Dapol's project is expected to be released in mid 2016. All profits from this new 'N' gauge model will be donated to Project Miller for the upkeep of the preserved power car.

The first running sample of Dapol's new 'OO' gauge Vossloh Class 68 diesel-electric has also arrived with the company for evaluation. Six versions of the

new model are planned including 68002 and 68005 in DRS blue (4D-022-001/4D-022-002) 68010 and 68014 in Chiltern Railways silver and grey (4D-022-003/4D-022-004) and 68006 and 68007 in Scotrail Saltire colours (4D-022-005/4D-022-006).

Meanwhile, Dapol's newlytooled 'OO' gauge Class 73 is currently in production following amendments to livery artwork and will be the first model to feature the company's new quieter 'hitorque' motor, which is also due to be fitted to the new 'OO' class 68.

A new quieter motor for Dapol's 'N' gauge models is also currently under development, with the manufacturer's 'N' gauge Bulleid 'Battle of Britain' 4-6-2 being the first model to feature this latest mechanism.

Following a year of consolidation many of the previously announced projects are now progressing once again through the production process (see Table 1).

DJ Models"OO' gauge BR Class 71 electric locomotive is the latest model to progress to the first engineering prototype (EP) stage of the process with a sample arriving for evaluation in October.

This crowd-sourced model features a die-cast metal chassis, coreless motor, factory fitted etched brass works plate, separate cab steps, 21 pin DCC decoder socket, independent cab lights, headcode blinds and marker lights while two body styles have been tooled to cater for as-built and with revised cab roof vents. Priced at £125 for subscribers to this project, each of the first five models will also include a limited edition certificate. Orders are still being accepted.

Built from the late 1890s by Peckett and Sons at the company's Atlas Engine Works in Bristol, these late Victorian saddle tank locomotives had a wide geographical spread and could be found working at industrial complexes across the British isles.


While they appear to be to a common standard design, there were variations including reduced height examples. As industry has

DJ Models reveals five new wagons

With development work gathering pace on its 'OO' and 'N' gauge projects, DJ Models (DJM) has revealed plans to produce five new 'N' gauge wagons covering the ZUV 'Shark' 20ton ballast plough, ZJO/ZJV 'Mermaid' ballast wagon, YCV'Turbot' bogie ballast wagon, Bogie bolster E wagon and a London & South Western Railway (LSWR) road van.

Each model is being developed with a close coupling mechanism, darkened wheels and NEM couplings. In addition, the 'Shark' will feature a set of ballast ploughs, a detailed veranda and will be available in a wide range of liveries including BR black, BR olive green, unbranded EWS maroon and BR engineers' 'Dutch' grey and yellow. With prices set at £19.95 each, this model has already been CAD/CAM designed and is currently awaiting tooling.

Twelve different ZJO/ZJV 'Mermaid' side tipping ballast wagons are planned across four liveries comprising BR black, BR Indian red, BR olive green and BR engineers 'Dutch' grey and yellow.



A removable moulded ballast load will be included with each model. Priced at £19.95 each, this model is currently in tooling and anticipated for release in March 2016.

DJM's 'N' gauge YCV' Turbot' bogie ballast wagon is currently at the design stage and will be produced in BR engineers" Dutch' grey and yellow and EWS maroon livery. It will include separate steps and handrails as well as a removable ballast load. Currently at the CAD/CAM design stage, prices are set at £25.95 each with delivery anticipated for mid-2016.

The 'N' gauge LSWR road van has been developed using laser scan data recorded for Kernow Model Rail Centre's 'OO' gauge model. Available in Southern Railway (SR) brown with large lettering, SR brown with small lettering and BR grey, each model is priced at £22.50. Currently awaiting tooling, a delivery date has yet to be announced.

Finally the Bogie Bolster E, which formed the basis for many of the 'Turbot' bogie ballast wagon rebuilds, has progressed to the CAD/CAM design stage, although at the time of going to press price, livery and specification details had yet to be confirmed.

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contracted over the years, so these reliable industrial workhorses were often sold on to other companies and continued under different owners which has resulted in a large number of potential liveries being carried by the prototypes. Three of the 0-4-0STs have survived into preservation.

Hornby's new'OO' gauge model was due to be announced as part of the 2017 range, but due to the popularity of the manufacturer's Sentinel diesel shunter (HM101), it has now been brought forward with an anticipated release in late 2016. Hornby's design team has

completed CAD drawings following access to works drawings, photographs and a preserved example. A rapid prototype 3D printed model has been produced to check that the overall shape of the model is correct before it can move to the tooling stage.

The Peckett 'W4' 0-4-0ST is still at a very early stage in its development and whilst a large number of liveries are possible, Hornby is inviting suggestions of potential colour schemes through its website.

Prices have yet to be confirmed.

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DJ Models launches

CLASS 74 ELECTRO-DIESEL

HE BR Class 74 electrodiesel has been unveiled as DJ Models next crowd sourced project following successful campaigning to get its Class 71 electric locomotive off the ground – see separate story. Ten Class 74s were converted from redundant Class 71s at BR's Crewe Works in the late 1960s primarily for use on BR Southern Region boat trains between London Waterloo, Southampton Docks and Weymouth Quay.

DJ Models' new Class 74 will feature a similar specification to the Class 71 with a DCC ready die-cast metal chassis, provision for DCC sound installation, coreless motor and close coupling mechanism.

Five versions of the Class 74 are planned initially, all in BR blue, as 74009 (Cat No. DJMOO74-001), 74003 (DJMOO74-002), E6101 (DJMOO74-003), E6106 (DJMOO74-004) and 74010 (DJMOO74-005KW), the latter model featuring a weathered paint finish.



The Class 74 is to be produced in 'OO' by DJ Models as a follow up to its Class 71. 74003 passes through Eastleigh with a London Waterloo-Weymouth Channel Islands boat train on July 16 1977. Railphotoprints.co.uk.

This project is being administered through Kernow Model Rail Centre on behalf of DJ Models and will enable the remaining tooling to be completed, as some elements have already been built in whilst tooling the outwardly similar Class 71.

Prices are set at £139.99 for pristine models and £149.99 for the special edition weathered

model with a £20 discount available for customers who also supported the Class 71 project.

Farish'64XX' undergoes evaluation



Bachmann has received the first engineering sample of its developing 'N' gauge GWR '64XX'0-6-0PT for evaluation.

The 'Pannier' will feature Bachmann's new coreless motor, separately fitted fine metal handrails, NEM coupling pockets and a 6-pin DCC decoder socket designed to accept the company's recently introduced right-angled decoder.

Representing the early style of cab and bunker design, three models will be available as 6407 in GWR green (Cat No. 371-985), 6417 in BR black with early crests (371-986) and 6412 in BR lined green with late crests (371-987).

Prices are set at £89.95, although a delivery date has yet to be confirmed.

Hatton's reveals... final 'King' drawings

The latest set of drawings for Hatton's new'OO' gauge model of the GWR'King' 4-6-0 have been released offering a new look at this high specification model. The model is being produced by DJ Models on behalf of Hatton's.

Delivery of completed models is expected in Spring 2016 with the models featuring a gear driven chassis to all the driving axles in the locomotive, a tender mounted 21-pin Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder socket, smokebox interior detail, alternative step, cab and lubricator fittings for different periods and smokebox door numberplates mounted on separate brackets. Other detail differences include full height and cut down chimneys - the latter to suit preserved locomotives - modifications to the cab roof vents, optional lamps, detailing between the frames and a myriad of separately fitted pipework.

Hatton's Research and Development Manager Dave Mylett said: "These drawings are all but complete, but there are some minor alterations still to be made. These include adding the missing seam to the smokebox top together





with a similar modification to the boiler where the cladding meets. We are aiming to have complete models available in Spring 2016."

Fifteen versions of the 'King' are being released by Hatton's covering GWR and BR period locomotives. Each will be customised to represent the particular prototype with prices starting at £169 for a DCC ready model and rising to £179 for a DCC fitted model.



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

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


One of England's most iconic locations – the Western Region main line running through the heart of Bath – is recreated in exacting detail in 'OO' scale by 'The Park Keepers'. Following its recent appearance at the Great Electric Train Show **STEVE JONES** explains how this exhibition layout was created.

T WAS A COUPLE OF YEARS AGO that Dave Simpson of Gas Cupboard Models in Trowbridge summoned four of his most loyal, likeminded modellers – Steve Jones, David Reed, Malcolm Young and Pete Smith – to the shop one evening to announce that he would like to build an exhibition layout and that he would like us to help him.

After a few ideas had been bounced around I said that for some time I had been considering building a layout based on Sydney Gardens in Bath. For a number of reasons it seemed the perfect location to me. The real location is on our doorstep, a magnet for local enthusiasts and a classic location featured in numerous photographs, paintings and even a jigsaw. From a modelling perspective it seemed perfect, being the simplest of track plans (it's basically a double oval), having natural scenic breaks and something that I perceived could be completed within a reasonable timescale. There was also the attraction that with a change of road transport, figures





and signalling, trains from the old Great Western Railway to almost the present day could be run with credibility.


I persuaded the 'Park Keepers', as we have labelled ourselves, to venture out on a field trip to experience the real location and photograph the main features and structures. We soaked up the atmosphere for an hour or so and armed with a collection of photographs of bridges, retaining walls, trees and the prominent house, we retired to contemplate how we would achieve a 4mm:1ft scale model of the location.

David was brought up in Bath and his memory was a vital source of first-hand information, particularly of specific trains, stock and locomotives. For example, David was particularly insistent about the track level in relation to the balustrade. Apparently, when stood in a particular spot, you can just see the top of the wheels of a High Speed Train. This level of detail was both infuriating and inspiring as we strived to achieve the most accurate model within the constraints of a 2ft wide baseboard. Indeed, the mound that David stood on as a boy must have been modelled and re-modelled half a dozen times until it was just right!

WORK BEGINS

Baseboards were constructed by David's carpenter friend who used 3in x 1in softwood and 9mm plywood to provide a sturdy base. Four 2ft x 5ft boards and two 2ft 6in x 6ft boards created a footprint of 15ft x 6ft allowing a 12ft long scenic section and 2ft wide operating well in the centre.

I had been puzzling over how to recreate the imposing stone retaining walls and eventually sent a photograph to John Wiffen of Scalescenes fame to see if he could suggest how we could achieve the distinctive weathering seen on the Bath stone. To my delight within 24 hours John had e-mailed me back a bespoke brick paper which captured the staining evident on the original.



A prototype section of wall was constructed using 2mm thick mounting card and curved formers to maintain uniformity. Having counted and measured the blocks on each section it was possible to recreate

scale sections of wall. Conveniently there were five sections of wall between each of the four bridges, which gave us the spacing between the bridges. In fact, the

only alteration to reality has been at the left-hand (country) end which has had to be compressed slightly to fit the footprint available. This prototype was presented to the group and a production line eventually churned out 14 sections of wall.

Whilst this work was going on, Malcolm was busy making drawings of the bridges, largely from photographic references. One challenge we had been puzzling over was

the ornate railings on "The real location is on Brunel's iron footbridge, our doorstep, a magnet so iconic to the location.

David was sent out with notepad and tape measure to count and measure the real thing for Malcolm to draw,

> and then send to York Modelmaking for laser cutting. Google Earth became a useful tool for Malcolm, who could happily take a virtual tour of the location whenever he fancied to check on accuracy. York


Modelmaking was also commissioned to laser cut the stone balustrades on the skew bridge at the centre of the layout.

Malcolm went on to build basic card structures (which were originally intended as mock-ups) of each bridge and when positioned on the layout gave us a real feel for how we were progressing. The mock-ups were so good in fact that I took them away, clad them in our bespoke papers and weathered them with an airbush and weathering powders before they were fixed in place.

The ornate balustrade which runs the whole length of the scenic section was a critical feature and after unsuccessful trials with scratchbuilding we contacted CW Railways which took Malcolm's two dimensional drawings and created miniature replicas of the real things using 3D printing technology.

SETTING THE SCENE

One important aspect which we all wanted to achieve was the railway running through the landscape. The scenery beyond the to be an important element of the whole project. Further field trips, photographs and Google Earth visits assisted us in building the three dimensional picture to set off the stars of the show - the trains. Basic land contours were formed with scrunched up damp newspaper and plaster bandage, was glued to the base and fine Woodland Scenics scatter fixed to it with hairspray. Static grass from the Greenscene range was

boundary of the railway was naturally going finished off with Polyfilla. A cheap grass mat applied into a bed of PVA glue to give a >>>

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depth of texture and variety; the whole lot having a drenching in hairspray to finish.

There are over 100 trees on the model ranging from large 'feature' trees which we obtained from the Model Tree Shop to small saplings. The majority are sea moss, which although not the most robust material, provides an affordable and effective solution when a large number of trees is required. Together with trees constructed from Woodland Scenics plastic

armatures, more Model Tree Shop products and Woodland Scenics foam bushes, an effective representation of the park was created. A favourite is the Buddleia sprouting along the top of the wall – maybe not so prevalent in the 1960s as they seem to be today but we couldn't resist it.

We are firm believers that a layout should have a decent backscene - and one that is as high as possible while still permitting the operators and viewers to interact. We also like to avoid corners which create unnatural shadows, not to speak of spiders, dust and debris. The technique I employ is to glue thin card along the backscene and form a curve around the corners using a card template. I paint the sky with white emulsion with a hint of blue brushed through the white whilst still wet. I am a fan of photographic backscenes, and on a relatively cloudy day I returned to photograph trees, buildings and views of the city. Those images were printed onto plain paper, the sky trimmed off and were then sprayed with matt varnish to protect them before being mounted on the pre-painted sky. Breaks in the photographs were disguised by careful positioning of trees or Woodland Scenics foam glued to the backscene, helping to blend the backscene with the modelling.

One major feature of the layout is the house which dominates the city end, overlooking the railway. My father-in-law works in the building control office >>>

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

for Bath City Council and he was able to copy drawings of the house. They were reproduced to scale and glued to 2mm mounting board. Windows were cut out and clear laminate sandwiched between another layer of card. Thin strips of sticky white label were used to divide the window panes. The structure was clad in Scalescenes papers and a Will's greenhouse serves as a representation of the conservatory.

Roads and pavements are from the Scalescenes range and all the card/paper structures are treated to a coat of varnish to protect them from moisture.

Be sure to test the varnish you choose as some can have a bleaching effect on the print, wasting a lot of time and effort.

THE PERMANENT WAY


Track on the scenic section is Peco code 75 which when weathered and ballasted sympathetically gives a perfectly acceptable representation of the real thing. Peco's code 75—code 100 converters are used to convert the rail profile to code 100, which runs through the fiddle yard.

Ideally two operators are required, one controlling the up, one the down. Power

is by traditional analogue Gaugemaster controllers. The fiddle yard is set out as five loops (up and down) with additional sidings to increase capacity. In its current form the fiddle yard can hold up to 19 trains but we have always strived to run long express passenger services and freights so plans are afoot to double the size of the fiddle yard and motorise the points to smooth the operation further. Increased capacity will allow more variety like football and pigeon specials with the prospect of 'foreign' engines on Brunel's permanent way.

The chosen era for exhibition running is >>>





balustrades were laser cut by York Modelmaking.

around 1960. I have amassed a collection of British Rail Western Region locomotives and stock for my own layout - Seend (HM95) - and together with others' collections we can roster 'Kings', 'Castles', 'Halls', 'Westerns', 'Warships', 'Hymeks' and the like for passenger turns together with 0-6-0PTs and 2-6-2Ts for local services. There is no set order in which to run trains and we have even been known to do requests at exhibitions. It was great fun however to see a friend's full length First Great Western High Speed Train running through the gardens along with other modern traction recreating the present day - maybe scope for a future photoshoot?

We insist that everything that runs at exhibitions has been weathered to some degree. Steam locomotives must have a crew (Monty's Models generally) and lamps. It really seems to make a difference for spectators: the small details seem to add that little bit of extra credibility which is really appreciated by railwaymen who remember the era for real.

During 2014 the original gang of five was joined by Nick Richardson, a native of the North East and not a dyed in the wool Western Region fan. He professes to be doing missionary work from the North. Sorry Nick - an 'A4' on 'The Bristolian' isn't happening!



ON THE ROAD

Sydney Gardens has ventured out onto the exhibition circuit on half a dozen or so occasions and we were delighted to accept an invitation to the Great Electric Train Show sponsored by *Hornby Magazine* in October this year. For the event, Pete and I constructed a lighting pelmet to improve the overall presentation of the layout. Visitors to the show enjoyed an all-action sequence of Western region traffic. Its reception at the show was excellent and it was a great pleasure to operate throughout the weekend.

It is especially pleasing when a visitor who knows the location is immediately transported there. And for those that don't – one of whom commented that it must have been a great place to watch trains, it was, is and will be in the future even when the overhead electric catenary is installed. The line has recently been closed for major engineering work to lower the trackbed in preparation for the wires and there is a 6ft high temporary fence which blights the current scene. It seemed pertinent that our model depicting the line in what most

would probably consider to be its heyday was conceived literally weeks before the fence went up and views generations of visitors to the park have enjoyed were obscured for no apparent reason.

I'm sure Brunel would approve of the modernisation of his London to Bristol route - after all, he championed innovation and progress. We, though, like things as they were. It will never be the same again but our model of this famous location will keep the nostalgia and history of Sydney Gardens alive for years to come.




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East Anglian train FORMATIONS

There was a huge variety of traffic and motive power in East Anglia. **MARK CHIVERS** shows how to recreate 25 train formations using ready-to-run stock and prototype photographs as their basis.




TRAIN FORMATIONS

HE RAILWAY has long been an important contributor to the economy of East Anglia with lines linking London to major populated areas such as Cambridge, Colchester, Ely, Ipswich, King's Lynn and Norwich as well as coastal resorts including Clacton-on-Sea, Cromer, Great Yarmouth, Hunstanton, Lowestoft and Sheringham. Rural areas were also served along the way and this led to passenger patronage as well as the time-sensitive transportation of agricultural produce to market.

The railway's links to coastal resorts also meant that at certain times of the year it dealt with large influxes of holidaymakers. The ports of Harwich and Felixstowe generated much freight and passenger traffic in addition to already established internal and cross-country freight services. The routes also included a number of named express trains such as the 'Norfolkman' which linked London Liverpool Street and Norwich/Sheringham and the 'Fenman' which operated between London Liverpool Street, King's Lynn and Hunstanton.

This month, we concentrate on typical train formations from the 1950s and 1960s throughout the former Great Eastern Railway territory. Until recently it was difficult to create more than a handful of prototypical 'OO' gauge formations using ready-to-run



models from the main manufacturers due primarily to the lack of suitable motive power, but that has changed with a recent surge of suitable models enabling a much wider variety of trains to be replicated in model form.

Hornby has been particularly busy following its programme of newly-tooled 'OO' gauge models coming to fruition. Previously, the company's ageing Holden 'B12' 4-6-0 represented Great Eastern motive power in Hornby's range, but this has been joined during 2015 by delightful models of the Worsdell 'J15' 0-6-0 (HM94) and Gresley 'D16/3' 4-4-0 (HM101) locomotives,

together with the Gresley 'B17' 4-6-0 (HM67), Thompson 'B1' 4-6-0 (HM56), Thompson 'L1' 2-6-4T (HM41) plus the Gresley 'N2' 0-6-2T and 'Britannia' 4-6-2 locomotives. Bachmann's range of suitable 'OO' gauge models includes the Gresley 'K3' 2-6-0, Thompson 'B1' 4-6-0, Gresley 'J39' 0-6-0, War Department 'Austerity' 2-8-0 and Gresley 'V1'/'V3' 2-6-2T - the latter model currently in the process of a chassis upgrade. Bachmann's long-serving Worsdell 'J72' 0-6-0T is also suitable for use, as a small number were allocated to the area. This model is also currently undergoing a chassis upgrade. Mention must also be made of OO Works' ready-to-run model of the Robinson 'C13' 4-4-2T, a number of which were allocated to East Anglian sheds.

The Eastern Region is also to benefit from more new models in the coming months, although they aren't Great Eastern area locomotives, including Hornby's new Gresley'J50'0-6-0T which is nearing completion together with Heljan's 'OO' gauge Gresley 'O2' 2-8-0.

Covering the transition from steam to diesel, suitable ready-to-run diesel locomotive available from Bachmann, Heljan and Hornby include the classes 15, 16, 23, 24, 31, 37, 40 and 47 together with Diesel Multiple Units (DMUs) such as the Waggon and Maschinenbau railbus, Derby Lightweight and classes 101 and 105.

Rolling stock is well covered including Bachmann's range of Thompson coaches, which are due to be replaced with newly tooled versions soon, together with its prolific range of BR Mk 1s in BR carmine and cream and BR maroon to suit the period. Hornby's 'OO' gauge range includes a selection of Gresley 61ft 6in wooden bodied corridor coaches in BR carmine and cream and BR maroon and its highly acclaimed Gresley and Thompson non-corridor coach range, available in BR crimson and, more recently, BR maroon. The recently tooled BR Mk 1 coaches and Stanier Period III coaches from Hornby, the latter regularly appearing on cross-country services and excursions in the period under review are suitable too. Plus with a wealth of suitable freight vehicles from the main manufacturers, including open wagons, 12ton ventilated box vans, 30ton bogie bolsters, 22ton Presflo wagons, brake vans, there has never been a better time to model East Anglian operations.

Whilst not exhaustive, the train formations listed have been recreated in model form using readily-available 'OO' gauge readyto-run models and represent a snapshot of express, local stopping, branch line and freight services during the 1950s and 1960s, researched from prototype operations. IIm

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

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Ballasting and weathering transforms the appearance of track in any scale. **NIGEL BURKIN** takes



be greatly improved in appearance with a touch of paint and good ballast. It takes a little care and time, but the results are well worth the effort.

Before making a start, be sure that your layout is running smoothly and there are no electrical faults to deal with. Complete scenic details such as cable trunking, point rodding, drains, platforms and signalling bases to avoid the mess and disruption of cutting into hardened ballast to accommodate them later. Make sure that holes drilled through the baseboard for layout wiring are plugged to prevent glue and ballast from draining away through them and on to the floor.

Look at colour photographs of the full size railway to see how the track becomes weathered with rust, grime, oil spillage and coal dust. What colour are the sleepers and how have the rail edges rusted? Does the output of a local mine, cement plant, industry or guarry impact on the colour of the track?

Once appropriate track, wood, dirt and rust colours have been decided upon, start with painting the plastic sleepers in a suitable track then into the next between each application and mixing the colours as it is applied. It's a good way to avoid too much uniformity.

Track painting, like any scenic work, takes time and patience to complete convincingly, so take your time and enjoy the work. After all, there are four rail sides to colour and points add to the time it takes to finish the job. Leave the paint to dry for at least a day before starting ballasting.

THE RIGHT GLUE

Being confident that your ballast will remain in place long after you have gone to the trouble to tease it into place is a matter of using the right adhesives. PVA glue mixed with an equal quantity of water plus a spot of detergent so it resembles the consistency of milk is a time honoured method of gluing ballast into place and is still valid today.

The process is helped by spraying water treated with a drop of detergent onto the ballasted track using a spray bottle before

using a small pipette or syringe to apply the diluted glue mixture. Wetting the ballast (don't soak it) helps to draw the glue mixture into it without disturbing it. A second application of this glue mixture may be required to be sure the ballast does not come adrift.

Special scenery adhesives such as Scenic Cement from Woodland Scenics are another good method and do not need the ballast to be soaked in water to help the glue soak in. Scenery adhesives of this type are formulated to dry quickly, flow smoothly and usually dry with a matt finish. They are applied from the edge of the ballast shoulder with a pipette, relying on capillary action to draw it into the ballast until it is soaked. Once the adhesive is applied to your satisfaction, leave it alone! Avoid poking and prodding because you might do more harm than good.

Having selected ballast, painted the track, selected a suitable adhesive and prepared your working area, it is time to make a start on the job itself. I usually mix two different ballast colours together in a plastic tray and apply the ballast sparingly with a spoon. About 12in to 18in of railway is treated at a time (depending on the size of the layout) so as not to soak too much of the layout with water-based adhesives. The following photographs show the process of making a length of track appear realistic. Etm

STEP BY STEP TRACK BALLASTING MADE SIMPLE



Track is laid on foam or cork underlay to reduce sound and raise the track above the adjacent ground in the same way as the full size railways. The sleepers are painted with a suitable brown colour to remove the plastic shine. Don't use your best paintbrushes for this job.



A mixture of paint colours such as brown, grime and rust are used to paint the edges of the rails, a time consuming task but important in making the track look more realistic.



Once the paint has dried, ballasting can start. I mix two colours of commercial ballast material in a tray and apply it in small quantities using a spoon. Commercial ballast spreaders are available to help modellers ballast large layouts without taking up too much time.



Another old paintbrush is used to brush the ballast neatly between the sleepers and around trackside details. A smaller brush and even fingers can be used to tease ballast into all of the spaces between sleepers. The C&L Finescale track used in this diorama has very thin sleepers making it difficult to get good coverage without covering the sleepers themselves.



Diluted PVA or scenery cement is applied to the ballasted track using a pipette. It is fully soaked in glue and can be left to dry when it appears white as seen in this photograph.




I rely on ballast and scenery glue to permanently secure the track too. Any track pins used to hold track in place during construction of the layout are removed and the holes filled.

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ICRO LAYOUTS have gained popularity in recent years with the increase in quality and performance of ready-to-run rolling stock.

Those short of space have been eager to take up the challenge plus, being small, a micro layout doesn't take an age to complete either.

A recent challenge laid at my door was to build a compact 'OO' gauge layout with a scenic section no bigger than 4ft x 2ft. Those dimensions would make it suitable for small home and apartment living together with making it easily portable for house moves and exhibiting. It would be simple to transport in a family car and quick to set up or take down at shows or for an hour or two of operation at home.

In reality, eight square feet is quite generous for a micro layout, but still challenging enough to find a suitable layout theme that would fit comfortably. As it turned out, inspiration was to be found close to home and that was prompted by a single photograph.

WHY A SMALL LAYOUT?

Compact or micro layout concepts have developed in recent years as space challenged modellers look for opportunities to model something in a very small area. Some layouts can be as small as a square foot or two and employ a number of interesting tricks to make the very best of the available space. Cassette fiddle yards and hidden turntables are some of the tricks employed in layout design. Another feature which explains the growth in popularity of micro layouts is detailing and a great deal of attention can be incorporated into the layout within a reasonable time.

For the budget conscious modeller, the smallest stable of locomotives is all that is necessary, and with today's models being capable of some superb performance and reliability, a collection of three or four appropriate locomotives together with a handful of wagons may be all that is required.


andful of wagons may be all that is required. It can be used as a test bed for new modelling techniques before embarking on a larger layout project too and, finally, as I have discovered, building a small layout in a different scale provides a pleasing change. Backwoods modelling and the rundown type of railway suits micro layouts very well. It is amazing what can be squeezed into a few square feet of space!

AN INSPIRATIONAL IMAGE

Having had the limitations on the layout size set in stone, choosing a scale and concept together with a layout theme came next.

Whilst toying with micro layout themes, a summer 1966 photograph of a Class 20 working the Speyside line came to my attention and it coincided with the release of an early version of the Class 20 by Bachmann. The photograph shows D8032 shunting wagons at the Dailuaine Distillery tramway interchange siding at Charlestown of Aberlour on the old Great North of Scotland Railway (GNSR) route from Boat of Garten to Craigellachie. The location is

Inspiration for a layout concept can come from almost any source – even a single photograph. A seemingly routine image of a Class 20 in original condition shunting a mix of vacuum braked and unfitted wagons at Dailuaine Sidings in summer 1966 has inspired a compact distillery themed layout based on the Speyside line in the 1960s as the latest project for *Hornby Magazine*. Colour Rail.

small and the branch itself immediately dives under a parallel road for the short run to the distillery. The picture provides a lot of detail including an interesting bothy, the track, point rodding from a ground frame and the train itself together with the surrounding scenery.

An idea began to germinate. The layout could have two scenes with the distillery on one side and the interchange siding on the other, separated by a backdrop. The concept would present some track planning challenges, but could work with some suitably sharp micro layout style curves. Before completing the layout design, I had to decide upon some layout design features and for that, out came the books and maps together with plans for several field trips.

RESEARCHING CLOSE TO HOME

I have yet to model anything based on any railway in Scotland (where I now live), so contemplating a Scottish layout theme makes a refreshing change. Before embarking on a field trip, I studied large scale maps held by the National Library of Scotland (maps.nls.uk) to see which locations would be most likely to have useable features which could be brought together. Modelling a complete distillery in the available space wasn't going to be practical so I had to locate structures and track layouts that would fit together convincingly, even though they may be from different sites.

The Highland Railway route between Grantown-on-Spey and Forres together with the GNSR Speyside branch had rail served distilleries with some useful track formations. I looked at the preserved distillery at Dallas Dhu, which is open to the public. Its buildings are attractive and of a suitable size to fit my given space. Dailuaine and Balmenach distilleries were visited because they had branch lines connecting them to the Speyside line.

Anyone contemplating modelling the GNSR route would be delighted with how much remains of the route – now a walking

trail. Many structures and buildings survive, including Grantown-on-Spey East Halt, Carron, Ballindalloch, Cromdale and Blacksboat station. At Dailuaine distillery, the remains of the branch are easily traced across fields and one composite stone and brick arch bridge survives too along with the engine shed in the distillery grounds.

Walking the route I paid particular attention to the site of the Dailuaine interchange siding. This location is an excellent layout design feature with an interesting operational twist which would add interest. The image of D8032 was used as a reference when surveying the site to determine how long the siding might have been and where the distillery branch passed under the railway. The width of the trackbed was determined to verify the likely track layout. Unfortunately, available maps did not show details of the Dailuaine branch track layout.

The distillery branch was worked with an Andrew Barclay 0-4-0ST tank engine called *Dailuaine* until the Speyside line was closed in >>>

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LOCH DHU DISTILLERY

STEP BY STEP BUILDING PLYWOOD FRAME BASEBOARDS



Strips of 12mm plywood were cut to a width of 4in to form the long side members of the baseboard frames. The wood is new and was unpacked and left in the layout room to stabilise for a couple of weeks before work was started.



Cutting strips of plywood is hard work at the best of times. A sticking saw can be eased by dressing it with a thin smear of light oil wiped over the blade. If you prefer not to have to cut long lengths of timber most DIY stores and suppliers offer a cutting service.





Blocks of 18mm x 44mm planed timber were cut as accurately as possible using a tenon saw and mitre box. They will be used as spacers in the long frame members.



The long side members of the baseboard frame were made of beams composed of two pieces of plywood with spacers of planed timber sandwiched between them. One side of each member is assembled first and left to dry.



A second strip of plywood is glued to the blocks of planed wood to complete the frame side which is then very strong and resistant to twisting.



1968. I located several images of the Dailuaine branch and the locomotive itself to assist with research into branch operations. Dailuaine had its own engine shed which makes a lovely layout design feature together with the 0-4-0ST which can be modelled using a body kit from ARC Models and a Hornby 'Pug'. Several distilleries had their own shunting engines, including a Ruston 48DS located at Longmorn Distillery near Elgin which had extensive sidings. Such shunting engines make a nice twist to a layout theme and a few, including the Dailuaine locomotive, were cleared to work on BR metals for short distances.

DESIGN FEATURES

Having completed fieldwork and taken many photographs, the next step was to design the layout. The first scene to be modelled will be the interchange siding, to be renamed Loch Dhu Siding. The plan would be the same as the full size Dailuaine Siding and would feature an industrial locomotive to work the branch.

The opposite scene would feature the distillery with its malting loft, kiln house, still house and mash room. An engine shed for the distillery locomotive would be provided and the one that remains at Dailuaine is ideal. Of all the distillery sites I looked at for the project, I concluded that the buildings of Dallas Dhu would suit the best with the benefit of them being accessible. I also decided to replicate the track formation at Dallas Dhu with an additional siding for the engine shed.

The plan includes one layout design concept which I have always considered to be important for any layout, whether large or small - an operational 'difficulty'. In the case of Loch Dhu Distillery, the operating twist is the interchange siding between BR and the distillery

branch. The somewhat confined nature of the distillery sidings will also need care when spotting wagons at the correct buildings.

BASEBOARD CONSTRUCTION

Past experiments with lightweight baseboard construction have never been successful for me and I prefer strength and durability over a saving of a few kilos of weight. The main board for Loch Dhu Distillery is no exception, being constructed of long members composed of two pieces of 12mm plywood with spacing blocks of planed timber. The resulting frame is very strong and if I had to provide legs for the layout, they could have been made of the same planed timber and slotted into the frame members.

Ultimately, the layout consists of two boards: one measuring 4ft x 2ft for the scenic area and a smaller one for a fiddle yard and service area measuring 2ft x 2ft.

The baseboard tops are composed of 12mm plywood seated on risers of planed timber, leaving a gap of about 15mm above the baseboard frames to allow the installation of manual point controls and space to locate them at one side of the layout. The fascia and backdrop boards would be made of hardboard and the underside assembly painted to seal it from moisture and prevent splinters.

The frames are glued and screwed together whilst the baseboard tops and risers are attached with screws, no glue, so the frames can be recovered if desired. The layout is designed so it can be displayed on a table. The frame design could be fitted with legs of the same planed timber as the spacing blocks, secured with bolts or popped onto a set of trestles. The following series of photographs show how the two baseboard frames were constructed.



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

'Hymeks' went via the Woodhead route

I enjoy reading your magazine every month and I felt obliged to write regarding the letters in HM100.

Firstly, Mr Clark mentions new Western Region diesel-hydraulic moves and he states that the 'Hymeks' were delivered from Beyer-Peacock in Manchester via Derby. Some were sent via the Woodhead route through Sheffield Victoria and the Great Central to Swindon.

One day in early April 1962 I witnessed two brand new Class 35s heading south through Sheepbridge and Brimington station, near Chesterfield on the Great Central loop. These were D7027, commissioned into service at Swindon on April 7 1962, with D7028, commissioned on April 5 that year. The time was early afternoon and a very rare sight. Others may have gone down the Great Central Main Line

too. These would have been on the lower tracks as described in Mr Myall's description of Chesterfield's triple crossing.

Another rarity occurred on April 24 1962 on the Midland Main Line. I saw 'A2' 4-6-2 60516 *Hycilla* on the southbound 8.15am Newcastle to Cardiff. This 'A2' was based at York and probably substituting for a failure. *Hycilla* was withdrawn later that year on November 12 1962.

Passenger trains finished on the upper line at Horns Bridge in 1951. However, there was a freight train which came across the viaduct on weekdays to Chesterfield market place goods yard, usually powered by a Staveley 'J11' 0-6-0. Anyone modelling the three lines here would need to place the time period before 1957 to justify running trains on all three routes.

LTHOUGH I am a steam era modeller, I enjoyed reading your article about adding sound to a Heljan Class 05 shunter (HM101). One thought struck me: the speaker has been fitted inside a closed cab, and so there appears to be no way the sound can easily escape.

The photographs suggest that a hole could be cut in the

cab floor, and then a round speaker fitted there, turning the cab into a decent-sized speaker cabinet, with the sound being projected out of the cab floor.

Are BR green models too faded?

After reading the report in your latest magazine on the new Hornby 'King' (which mostly looks very nice) may I make one criticism that I have not seen before on any of the new BR green locomotives produced by Hornby since possibly the early 1980s?

The colour of the green looks washed out. When Tri-ang brought out its 'Britannia' in 1960 the colour was far superior than those of the last 20 to 30 odd years. I would agree this was maybe their plastic colour but Hornby Dublo from the 1950s had a nice shade of green and Bachmann did until a few years ago. Bachmann's later green is

not as good as its initial versions but still superior to Hornby. BR green itself was quite a deep rich green when new and most models are produced as new I assume if not weathered.

With reference to the report on the new 4-4-0 it was warming to read that there are no traction tyres fitted. Tyres are at best a nightmare after a short while and there should be no need for any in this day and age, especially on a steam locomotive. Again, going back to Tri-ang when it brought out the 'L1' and 'M7' locomotives, these did not have tyres but performed well.



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The West Coast Main Line in the early 1970s was a fascinating location with modern locomotives mingling with steam era stock. **DAVE FORSHAW** modelled this fictitious location in 'N' gauge,



URSHAW North Western is a fictitious station location on the West Coast Main Line (WCML), in North West England. The overhead wires are almost complete as part of the Crewe to Glasgow project, extending the wires from London Euston to Scotland. New four-aspect colour light signalling has recently been commissioned as part of the upgrade.

In Burshaw it is the early 1970s. Steam has gone and is still banned from the main lines. The British Rail corporate blue image is sweeping across the country, but not yet complete. The Total Operations Processing System (TOPS) is yet to be implemented, so all locomotives still carry their original numbers. The D and E prefixes are disappearing as there are no longer any steam locomotive numbers for them to clash with. Some are still in green or electric blue, with varying amounts of yellow on the front ends, as well as the new Rail Blue. Whilst passenger coaches built by the 'Big Four' have all but disappeared, freight is carried by a mix of old unfitted and vacuum braked wagons, working alongside the new generation of air braked stock. ""



INSPIRATION

About six years ago, I was looking at an economic way of modelling a different period to the early 1960s steam-diesel transition I normally model in 'N' gauge, and thought that if I moved the time period forward a few years I could still use some of my existing models. By mixing it with pieces of BR blue stock, which was not very popular a few years ago and often going cheap, a new 1970s fleet could be created.

I grew up in West Lancashire, so for me the real railway was the WCML at places like Preston and Crewe, and their electrics. I already had some old bits of Lima Class 86s, Graham Farish produced a Class 87 and as this was easily convertible to an '86' I could modify some of the locomotives. I remember the blue grey period, not the pre-TOPs part, but I was at least born by the early 1970s,

which is more than could be said for my normal modelling period. The fact that I had never seen this period modelled in 'N' gauge before was also a challenge that needed to be addressed, and, with another rarely modelled feature - catenary, I hoped to create a pretty unusual and interesting layout.

At that time, I also spent extended periods working away from home, and wanted a layout that would fit in a spare room, but could still handle full length trains. Most of the 9mm plywood baseboards (both frame and decking) were recycled from old projects and the station and shed areas already had track and some wiring, which needed only minor changes. This resulted in a 12ft x 4ft layout - small enough to move in a big car and fit in many rooms, but big enough to meet my desire of running long trains.

The same layout would occupy at least 24ft x 8ft in 'OO' gauge, which may be why 'N' gauge is so popular for main line layouts now. The range of high quality 'N' gauge rolling stock is superb now too, with new models coming along all the time, almost at the same rate as their 'OO' cousins.

Travelling on the WCML over the years I have seen effects of the 1960s electrification 'modernisation' in places like Coventry, Stafford and Wigan North Western and wanted to replicate this style. Burshaw is an amalgam of my home village, Burscough and my surname. It is the third of my layouts to use the Burshaw name, with the 'North Western' being derived from the Wigan (London &) North Western station, which was one of those modernised, and provided some of the design cues of a typical 1960s rebuild.

TO WIRE OR NOT TO WIRE

This was a major question. Whilst I would not contemplate running overhead electrics without representing the catenary at all, the thorny question of whether to model the actual wires had to be addressed. In the end I decided not to, mainly on the grounds of the difficulty of keeping the track clean without wrecking the wires. When I looked at prototypical photographs, the wires are practically invisible from normal exhibition viewing distances. All the catenary portals are produced from N Brass etchings, suitably modified to fit their locations. There are 30 portals all folded and soldered together, with droppers and tensioners attached. I spent many an hour burning my fingers. A few Dapol masts complete the setup.

More catenary portals were used as the basis of the signal gantries, using etched railings, also from N Brass, and bits of scrap brass to complete the structures. The four aspect signal heads are all from CR Signals, including the working feathers. These are linked to Heathcote Electronics IRDOT IRDASC-4 modules (HM101), which use infra-red light to detect the train to set the signal red when the train passes, and then use timers to sequence through double yellow, yellow and green. Some additional wiring links to point motor switches forces red aspects on the reversible lines and when the routes are set against a signal. Whilst not totally authentic or fully interlocked, it does mean that it works automatically and is one less thing for operators to concentrate on - I much prefer to run trains!


LOCOMOTIVES

There are very few locomotives that can be used out of the box for the early 1970s period, so some number removal and transfer work is essential. Fortunately the TOPS numbers rub off quite easily with a bit of Brasso on the end of a blunt cocktail stick. Virtually every blue locomotive has been renumbered to remove its TOPS number and reinstate the original, often relocating the BR arrows, and returning the headcode boxes to use as well.

The other major task has been 'unrefurbishing', as most models are tooled in their refurbished condition. Main targets were the nine D400s (Class 50) on the layout, as these were the prime diesel class taking forward trains to Scotland until the wires were finished. The Farish model portrays the locomotives in later life, so the plated over roof sections were reinstated and high intensity headlamps removed before repainting and renumbering.

Dapol Class 86s were the other main project for backdating - a great help in many respects as it is a much better model than a modified Farish Class 87, which was the only viable option when I started this layout. Again they are restored to original condition, removing the Time Division Multiplex and multiple working cables, headlamps and so on. Headcode boxes were reinstated and bogie side frames modified to remove the Flexicoil suspension on most examples. All required a full repaint into electric blue or BR blue, as Dapol has not produced these liveries. The original alloy numbers and totems are Fox transfers and BR arrows BH Enterprises etches. Bits of Lima Class 86s, Dapol Class 86s, Farish Class 87s and plenty of Milliput have been used to create AL1 and AL5 (Class 81 and 85) so far, with more first generation electrics to follow.

A number of the diesel locomotives share chassis with their early sixties green mates. I have collected a number of spare bodies >>>



over the years from various kit building projects requiring donor chassis. About a dozen of these resulting bodies have been painted, numbered and weathered to fit this period, the chassis being 'borrowed' from plain green locomotives not suited to the period. Many diesels stayed green with increasing amounts of yellow on the ends well into the 1970s. So far, the latest dated example I have found is a Class 47 from 1975, complete with TOPS number. Pictures from the same year show maroon station signs still present in Wigan too!

MULTIPLE UNITS

So far for this layout, I have built Cravens Diesel Multiple Units (DMUs) from old Class 101 bodies with Electra Graphics sides and N-Train ends and a new Farish Class 108 chassis. These work alongside plain blue Farish Class 101s and Class 108s. I've recently completed my first 3D printed kit, a Class 128 Parcels unit,

which is propelled by a Dapol 'bubble car' chassis. I've tried to make this model more widely usable so it is green on one side and blue on the other, a technique I will

use again on other models to make them fit two different periods.

Both WCML 25kV EMU classes of the period have been built. The AM4 (Class 304) unit uses altered etched brass sides from a BH Enterprises 'bubble car' kit, with white metal ends bent to create the sloped front and filled to create the correct window layout. It is powered by a Dapol 'bubble car' chassis. The AM10 (Class 310) utilises Farish Mk 2 coach bodyshells, with sides and ends from Electra Graphics and a Class 150 DMU chassis for power. The pantograph and insulators came from a spare Class 87 body.

CARRIAGES AND WAGONS

At the time Burshaw is set the London Midland Region had just taken delivery of its first air-conditioned stock (BR Mk 2d), but most trains are formed from Mk 1, Mk 2a and 2c stock. These are gradually being cascaded to less important work as the new designs take over the prime trains, including the 'Royal Scot', which is usually in the hands of a pair of English Electric Type 4 Co-Cos (later Class 50s).

Burshaw NW is designed to perform the diesel to electric changeover that used to happen at Crewe and then Preston which was often formed of Mk 2a and 2c stock a large number of which have been built from Farish Mk 2fs using Electra sides with additional roof vents and corrected underframe detail. These are now available ready-to-run, but one Mk 2 coach variant I don't expect Bachmann will produce is the Pullman. The eight coach 'Manchester Pullman' is formed of more old Farish

bodies with Electra sides. Mind you, Farish has produced the solo 'Nightcap Bar' (ex-Mk 1 Pullman), which fortunately featured in WCML 'sleeper' trains in the early 1970s





Detailing of the station is impressive with British Rail era station lamps, brute trolleys and more.



An extensive storage yard is positioned to the rear of the layout to accommodate the wide range of trains which are available to the layout. This is semiautomated to allow trains to be moved up in each road without affecting operations on the front of the layout. This is achieved by providing a separate controller for each circuit which is permanently set at a predetermined speed. Once the leading train from a loop has left, the switches are changed over for the next section and the following train moves forward until it reaches the isolated section at the front of the loop. Some loops have three or more sections to allow multiple short trains to be accommodated.

THE SETTING

The scenic part of the layout uses Peco finescale code 55 track work with code 80 in the storage yard. It is ballasted with a mix of Woodland Scenics and Green Scene products. There isn't much greenery on

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the layout, but the few patches use a mix of flocks, static grass and sea moss trees. The structural parts are from Hornby Lyddle End, Knightwing and scratchbuilt from plastic and card. The buildings range from Lyddle End and Scenecraft items, through kits from Peco, Metcalfe, Kestrel and Ratio, to scratchbuilt. Many have been altered to fit the scene. For example, the old steam shed is made of Peco sides with a scratchbuilt roof and the platform buildings are Kestrel kits underneath with scratchbuilt canopies.

All the railway artwork was produced on my PC and printed on photographic paper, or transfer paper. Both the British Railways Gill Sans and corporate British Rail Light and Heavy fonts can be downloaded from the internet for free. This technique was used to create the transfers used on the platform lamps, direction signs, station buildings, buses and so on.

This is the first time I have used a photographic backscene. The quality is

great and much better than the traditional painted watercolour equivalent. Some of it has been mounted a few millimetres in front of the main backscene to add a greater perspective of depth to the layout. The only problem is that it is very easily damaged. It has been sprayed with acrylic matt varnish for protection. This also tones down the normally glossy images. Next time a tougher solution is needed, most likely using a matt finish laminate. Fitting a light timber frame to the 6mm plywood backscene itself has worked well to stop any warping and allowed me to fit small bolts to keep them well aligned.

The period was completed using appropriate vintage vehicles mainly from Oxford Diecast and BT Models all of which have been matt varnished so they blend in better. Sankey Scenics produces some lovely period posters and they had me checking which year films were released and cars launched! This should make it easy to work out when and where the layout is set without a train in sight.

WHAT NEXT?

I've now started dabbling with stock set for the early 1990s period, currently experimenting with motorised Driving Van Trailers (DVT). The best one so far squeezes a Dapol HST power car chassis inside its Mk 3 DVT. Why? It's because the semi-automated fiddle yard requires the power unit to be at the front of the train. I will have a use for those dummy Class 86s after all! It is an easier period to model with lots of ready-to-run stock, but I've already built a Class 323 EMU from a Class 170 Turbostar, again using Electra sides and Etched Pixels brass cab ends.

So an alternative guise for Burshaw NW will appear sometime soon, arguably featuring BR at its best - the sectorisation years prior to privatisation.

Construction of my next project, Preston station, has begun, and will be over four times the size of Burshaw NW at 25ft x 10ft, about the same size as a 'OO' version of Burshaw would be. That's why I model in 'N' gauge!

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
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FULL-SPEC C C S C

Hornby's new Crosti boilered '9F' is an excellent locomotive that falls short of the ultimate levels of refinement in only a few non-critical areas. **TIM SHACKLETON** upgrades and enhances the recent release to create a model he's coveted for half a century.

IKE DUKE OF GLOUCESTER and Cock o' the North before it, Hornby has earned widespread praise for offering this high quality production at an affordable price. Sure, the odd corner has been cut to fit this brute of a locomotive into the RailRoad category, but with each model the basic shape and form is spot on. If you're so minded, there's nothing that can't be put right or improved with a few simple hand tools and a basic set of skills.

Having already tackled *Duke of Gloucester* (HM81) I wanted to see just how much actually needed to be done to bring this powerful

2-10-0 up to the full-on standard of such paragons as Hornby's K1 or 'Britannia'.

This is my fourth Crosti boilered 9F, following on from the superb DJH kit for the rebuilt engine and a rather less successful interpretation (never completed) using a Crownline conversion kit. The first version, however, was the gamechanger. It, or rather the article in the January 1965 Model Railway Constructor that inspired it, was unquestionably the single biggest influence in setting me off down the long, winding road of refining, revamping and reworking all kinds of kit-built and ready-to-


run locomotives. It showed just what could be done with a Kitmaster *Evening Star* if you put your mind to it – the Tyne Dock-Consett air pump version, Crostis, Giesl ejector and the rest were all, suddenly, possible. For a 14 year-old schoolboy, it was a revelation, the start of a lifetime's kitbashing, scratchbuilding and every other form of modelling in which the base model was only the starting point.

Deviating only slightly from what the Model Railway Constructor article suggested, the end result was a reasonable approximation of a Crosti that featured a pre-heater made out of dowelling and elbow shaped steam pipes carved from a pencil. The secondary smokebox door was a button from my mother's sewing basket and I converted the kit's inset BR1G tender to a high-sided BR1B using notepaper. I still have the model but, not wishing to look a complete fool, I'll keep it to myself for now.

Exactly half a century later, how things have changed in terms of what's available over the counter! And yet, for me, the excitement isn't in buying or even running a model so much as building on its potential to push for ever-higher standards. I love nothing more than taking

knives, saws, drills and files to an expensive new locomotive and if the makers haven't quite got something right – as with this Crosti – I'm more than happy to sort it out myself... all this was inspired by an article I read 50 years ago!

Here I've explored the full potential of what can be achieved with the solid base of the new Hornby Crosti '9F' model, but everyone has their own limits. Do what you feel comfortable with and build upon your skills. Whatever you add to a model it will be pleasing to know that it has your stamp on it and that it has taken it up another level. Enjoy...



STEP BY STEP DETAILING A HORNBY CROSTI '9F' 2-10-0






Unless you have very tight curves on your layout, there's no need for the amount of play provided on the driving wheels - on level track it makes the locomotive slew from side to side. Using fibre washers trimmed into a horseshoe shape so they'd slip easily over the axles, I limited sideplay on the front, centre and rear axles. This brought about an immediate improvement in the steadiness of running on straight track. I get my washers from Eileen's Emporium (www.eileensemporium.com) but Peco produces something very similar.


The front pony truck with its built-in steps is basic. It's a choice between replacing it completely with a new pony truck from a Comet or Brassmasters kit, or making a few simple modifications to what we already have. I chose the latter course of action.






Using a junior hacksaw I cut off the steps, followed by most of the actual pony truck casting ahead of the axle bearings. You can still fit a tension-lock coupling if you wish but a '9F' pulling a train while working tender first was an exceptionally rare sight.











To fit the front grab irons I first drilled holes in the front platform using a No. 76 bit in a pin chuck. Drilling slightly oversize allows room for manoeuvre. The grabs themselves are from Alan Gibson 0.33mm brass wire. Not all '9Fs' – including the Crostis – had these grab irons, so check photographs of your preferred locomotive at the chosen period.

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Above: A marvellously evocative study of 92023 – the subject of Hornby's model – on shed and very much in steam at Toton in September 1958. Comparing this image with the model version reveals a number of compromises, especially around the front end. Less immediately obvious is the fact that the smoke deflector on this particular locomotive is much larger than the one Hornby has modelled. Placed in traffic between May and July 1955, all ten Crostis had received smoke deflectors by February 1956 but the one fitted to 92023 was unique. P H Groom.

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After problems with the exhaust beating down on the cab, all the Crostis were fitted with smoke deflectors. Nine of them had deflectors 10ft long but 92023 was experimentally fitted with a smoke deflector 12ft 6ins long, which gave it a very different appearance. You have the choice of accepting the error, renumbering your model or making a new and longer smoke deflector. If you choose the latter course, as I did, removing the existing fitting is a simple pull-out operation.






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STEP BY STEP DETAILING A HORNBY CROSTI '9F' 2-10-0













To improve current collection I soldered extra pick-ups to the tender. First off I glued strips of pre-tinned copper-dad sleeper strip to the tender keeper plate and linked them with bus bars of Alan Gibson's 0.7mm brass wire. The actual pick-ups are made of 0.25mm (10thou) beryllium copper wire — a naturally springy material that I buy from Hobby Holidays (www.hobbyholidays.com).









The wires are soldered to each of the motor terminals, giving 14-wheel pick-up rather than eight. You can't use insulated wire thicker than 0.5mm because the bodyshell is a very tight fit over the chassis and with anything more substantial it wouldn't seat properly when it's replaced.

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


The absence of brake gear is very visible on the Hornby locomotive but less so on the tender. Since the '9Fs' had a distinctive pattern of brake gear with the hangers inside and behind the driving wheels, this has to be modelled accurately rather than just using generic components. My starting point was a selection of etches from Mainly Trains (www.mainlytrains.com).





The brake gear on any BR 'Standard' tender is inconspicuous behind the sideframes but the rear set and its linkages are very visible below the buffer beam, so I modelled just the hindmost pair of brakes using $Mainly \ Trains\ etched\ parts.\ The\ subterfuge\ isn't\ obvious\ -\ omitting\ the\ front\ and\ middle\ sets\ saves\ work$ and, more importantly, avoids the risk of a short circuit.





autumn sunlight. Although I've made quite a few changes to the model as supplied, none of them entailed much by way of extra work.





ORNBY'S popular'00' gauge 2-HAL Electric Multiple Unit (EMU) returns and in new livery for the model of BR green livery with full yellow ends.

Finished as 2603, Hornby's latest release represents one of the first units to be built for the Gillingham and Maidstone third-rail electrification schemes in Kent, featuring Driving Motor Brake Second (DMBS) S10721S and Driving Trailer Composite (DTC) \$121885.

As with first round of releases (HM89), decoration is good, featuring an evenly applied high quality satin paint finish. Straw coloured lettering

and numbers are crisply printed on each side as are the First Class yellow stripes above the windows and labels on the windows of the DTC, BR carriage roundels and no smoking signs on the DMBS. The distinctive black inverted V on the DMBS full yellow cab end, which indicated to platform staff where the guard's compartment was located, is also modelled.

Housed within the guard's compartment, the motor on our review sample performed well while an 8-pin DCC decoder socket is located behind the motor housing beneath the seating moulding. Careful choice of decoder is

Each part requires careful removal from the sheets by cutting through the small locating tabs with a sharp craft knife.

All elements

have been crisply cut and are designed to slot together using PVA glue.

Measuring 90mm x 130mm x 113mm, each kit builds a pair of terrace houses which can be added to further kits, creating a realisticlooking terrace street scene. Excellent and available now. (MC)

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ORNBY'S'OO' gauge BR Class 50 diesel makes a welcome return to the range as 50024 Vanguard in pristine BR'large logo' blue with black roof - a livery carried by the prototype for a short period in the mid 1980s. A second Class 50 has been released in the same livery this month too as 50046 Ajax (Cat No. R3264).

Bearing the hallmarks of previous releases, decoration is superb with a high quality satin paint finish and crisply printed numbers, nameplates, orange cantrail lining, overhead live wire labels, red buffer beam and white cab front handrails.

Whilst retaining the opening cab doors and adjustable side louvres of previous releases, the roof fan remains static on this latest variant of the Class 50. Bristling with detail, unfortunately our review sample

sustained a detached cab footstep and plastic roof fan grille in transit, although both were easily fixed back in place with a spot of glue.

On test our sample ran smoothly, quietly and confidently throughout the speed range and features directional headlights, illuminated roof headcode boxes and red tail lights according to the direction of travel. An 8-pin DCC decoder socket is fitted together with NEM coupler pockets for use with the supplied small tension lock couplings. Body removal is simple too with the Class 50 body featuring a clip fit over the chassis for access to its internal workings.

The Class 50 is one of Hornby's best diesel locomotives and is sure to prove popular in this much-loved livery as this new release was selling fast as this issue closed for press. (MC)







Shedding light on running in

E ALL TAKE GREAT PRIDE in our model locomotives and the detail which has been built into them. This new and innovative product from the Zeller Rolling Road range – supplied by Wealistic Models in the UK - features an illuminated frame which casts light from LEDs on to the running gear of a locomotive.

The concept is based around Zeller's highly successful slide bar rolling road system and it comes with six rollers and a bogie support with the rollers moulded in clear plastic.

Matching brass wheels are used in each roller while the LEDs are suitably hidden inside the aluminium channel frame.

The rolling road is suitable for use with any steam locomotive as the rollers can be repositioned by sliding them along the frame to suit different wheelbases. Separate connections are provided for track power from either a DC or DCC controller while the LEDs are connected to mains power using a European style two-pin plug which will require an adapter to work with British three pin plugs.

On test we found our sample to be an excellent means of running in new locomotives. Locomotives remained stable and in position on the rolling road and the light radiating up from the sides enhanced the experience of running in a new model. It is also a great way to display and appreciate the quality of current ready-to-run locomotives.

This is an excellent addition to the range of Zeller Rolling Roads and with the addition of lighting enhances what is already an excellent product. (MW)

C&M commissions Scotrail Class 156 for 'N'

The latest commission from Carlisle based retailer C&M Models is this Dapol 'N' gauge Class 156 two-car Diesel Multiple Unit (DMU) finished in Scotrail Saltire livery. Finished as vehicles 52512 and 57512 from unit 156512, this model represents the prototype up to early 2015 while the franchise was still operated by First Group.

The complicated Scotrail colour scheme has been exquisitely reproduced. Crisply printed Scotrail branding incorporating the Saltire cross is printed midway along each side of the vehicles, while small

First Group logos are neatly printed on each door. The cab ends are equally well executed in yellow and correctly feature the edge of the Saltire livery branding wrapping round the edge together with crisp unit numbers and a representation of the electronic destination blinds.

A limitation of Dapol's tooling results in the cab door panel at each end representing the older style, although this can be easily remedied. Inside, neat touches include lilac seating and white table tops.

Directional head and tail lights are fitted together with Dapol's close-coupling corridor connectors at the inner ends of the units and working Scharfenberg couplers at the outer ends to enable coupling of additional units with a simple clip-fit. A pair of small yellow snowploughs is also included.

It is clear that much research has gone into reproducing this super new'N' gauge release and with just 200 sets available, they are sure to prove popular. (MC)





Finished in Royal Blue livery and pleasing to the eye this design quickly impressed both the public and the engineering community and was within months of its first appearance awarded a gold medal at the 1900 Paris exhibition.

Stratford Works built another 40 'S46s' between 1900 and 1903 in four batches of ten and these were collectively known as 'Clauds' after the first of the series. Rather confusingly they were built in batches of ten with each newer batch being numbered below the previous batch. Almost from the start there were upgrades to the specification. From 1880 onwards the cab was widened from 6ft 3in to 7ft 2in and was fitted with a higher arched roof, the pistons were given tail rods resulting in the space between the cylinders and footplate at the front being covered in, from 'S46' 1870 larger tenders were fitted >>>

and then at the end of 1903 the design was amended to accommodate a boiler with a square topped Belpaire firebox. 70 more were then built incorporating these revisions between 1903 and 1911 and by 1915 work had also started to rebuild earlier engines with the new design of boiler.

All of these locomotives were designated 'S46' by the Great Eastern Railway but after the grouping the London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) would refer to original specification engines as 'D14s' and those fitted with the Belpaire firebox as 'D15s'.

DETAIL VARIATIONS

In 1922 Alfred Hill, who had succeeded Holden as Chief Mechanical Engineer, introduced a scheme to further upgrade the engines, this time by fitting a larger boiler of 5ft 1in diameter, equipped with superheater and Belpaire firebox. The modifications were first tried out on 1805 which in March 1923 emerged from Stratford Works in plain grey livery to become the first of what were soon called the 'Super Clauds', officially the 'H88' class but later to be more commonly known as the 'D16s'.

This variant saw the cab widened again, this time to 7ft 11in, but with the footplating at the rear also widened. The boiler was pitched at 8ft 8in above rail level, some 2in higher than the contemporaneous 'B12' 4-6-0.

A few months later ten new engines, 1780-1789, emerged from Stratford to the same specification but this time in the new green livery of the LNER. These locomotives were



easy to identify as they had the wider footplating throughout, rather than just at the back end as on the rebuilds. This batch also had exhaust steam injectors.

With the new locomotives commissioned further conversions were put in hand with 1818/1846-1847/1853 following. 1813 was also converted but differed from the others in that it was given an extended smokebox

The 'D16/3' 4-4-0s were powerful express locomotives, despite their four-wheel driving chassis. 62530 comes round Coldham's curve with an early morning Cambridge-Newmarket working on May 13 1957. David Hepurne-Scott/Rail Archive Stephenson.

which radically altered its appearance. From that time on all conversions were to this specification and by 1931 40 'S46s' had been altered. At the grouping the LNER gave the short smokebox engines the designation 'D16/1' and the long smokebox type 'D16/2'.

IN SERVICE

When built the 'Clauds' were the principal express engines of the GER and hauled trains from London to Ipswich, Norwich and Cromer as well as boat trains to Parkeston Quay. When the 'B12' 4-6-0s arrived some of them moved on to the Great Northern and Great Eastern joint line for use on fast goods trains. 'Clauds' also appeared on the Southend line at an early date. The class became particularly associated with services to Clacton and Walton-on-Naze primarily because larger engines were prohibited on that route until 1930. By the time of the 1923 grouping around one third of the class was shedded at Stratford with the rest fairly evenly distributed around the rest of the Great Eastern system.

Despite the generally satisfactory performance of the class there were issues with steaming during the 1920s which were put down to the LNER's use of crushing plants which were producing smaller lumps of coal. These tended to be shaken down the steep fire grates of the 'D16s' resulting in a decrease in performance and as a result revised blast pipes, different chimneys and flatter fire grates were fitted.

In May 1932 Edward Thompson, later to become CME of the LNER but then Mechanical Engineer at Stratford Works, fitted a boiler with a round top firebox to 'D15/2' 8848 (the former 1848). This was the same diameter as that used on the 'Super Clauds' but was pitched one inch higher and had a different number of tubes. At the same time the external appearance of the locomotive was altered as the decorative splashers over the coupling

rods were discarded in favour of a simpler design of footplating. The cab was made the same width as used on the 'D16/2' but narrower rear splashers were fitted.

Further improvements were applied to the second rebuild, which was to *Claud Hamilton* itself, and this locomotive was also given new cylinders with piston valves to the latest design and different valve gear. Nine more followed to this pattern as did more conversions to the earlier specification as used on 8848.

Both these variants were known as 'D16/3', as were others that followed which had yet another layout of valve gear and cylinders. Unfortunately the piston valve equipped engines proved to develop rather too much power for their own frames and there were several instances of frame fractures amongst these rebuilds.

There was yet another variant of the 'D16/3' in June 1938 when 8851 emerged as the first of the rebuilds to have the new boiler retaining the original arrangement of cylinders, valve gear, splasher covers and footplating. Eventually 104 of the 121 'Clauds' built became one or other of the versions of the 'D16/3' class, with the last conversion taking place in 1949.


THE EXTINCTIONS BEGIN

Constant rebuilding caused the original 'D14' type to become extinct in 1931 and following heavy work during the war withdrawal of the first of the class took place in September 1945. This was 8868 of Cambridge shed, one of the earlier conversions to 'D16/3', and this was followed by three others including prototype *Claud Hamilton*, meaning that 117 of the class survived long enough to come under the ownership of British Railways.

At nationalisation 22 were allocated to Norwich shed, 16 to Cambridge and 15 to Yarmouth leaving only five remaining at Stratford due to the arrival of more modern engines. However many were still being employed on express passenger work.

During 1949 seven were allocated to the Cheshire Lines, which had recently come under the control of the Midland Region. Crews there disliked London Midland & Scottish Railway (LMS) engines and were pleased to see anything from the LNER, however far from home it was. The engines performed well on expresses to and from Liverpool and remained at Trafford Park for some years thereafter.

Mass withdrawals started in 1955 and by the end of 1959 there were only four left in service. 62524 was at Norwich, 62597/62613 were allocated to Spital Bridge while 62604 hung on at Lowestoft. Three of these went in the first months of 1960 leaving only 62613 which was then transferred to March shed where it was used only sporadically. It was seen on one occasion employed on the Cambridge-King's Lynn express, while a month later

it was hauling slow passenger trains. It continued to be used during the summer when demand was highest but its final working was from March to Peterborough with a Norwich to Peterborough passenger train on September 15. It was withdrawn the following month and, like the rest of the class, was taken away for breaking up.

While none of the original 'Clauds' survived there is a group which is planning to build a replica of one of these famous engines. The Claud Hamilton Locomotive

Group is currently seeking funds to enter the construction stage of what is likely to be a very long and expensive project. A 'D16/2' is planned which if completed will be numbered 8783 and named *Phoenix*. The number has been chosen because the original 8783 was one of two 'Clauds' regularly allocated to Royal Train duties to and from Sandringham.

The 'D16' was a very successful design that not only looked good but worked well. Its constant mechanical evolution ensured that it was never outdated and thus was able to hold its own on prestige services right until its final days. It would be wonderful if we were able to see and hear one working once again if the rebuild project comes to fruition.




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Fitting sound in a 'N' gauge James and the state of the s

PAUL CHETTER explains how to fit sound to the newly released and finely detailed 'N' gauge 'Merchant Navy' from the Bachmann Graham Farish range using readily available decoders and speakers.



HE IMPROVEMENT in quality and detail of British outline 'N' gauge models has exploded recently. By a happy coincidence, the tenders of steam locomotives have become less cluttered internally - and that gives us some real opportunities for Digital Command Control (DCC) in the smaller scale. Though not yet a simple plug and play solution, installing sound in Farish's original condition 'Merchant Navy' is now a viable option providing suitable components are selected.

The miniature Zimo MX648 decoder is the obvious choice since it fits the available space, whilst still allowing room to install a full size 10mm x 15mm cube speaker. This

combination results in smooth motor control with a surprisingly loud sound output.

INSTALLATION

The complete installation is contained within the tender so there is no need to separate the locomotive body from its chassis. Make no mistake though - this is a compact installation and good dexterity and soldering skills will

be required to complete it successfully. You may feel the work is not for you, but the step by step guide shows that it can be done.

The tender body is held in place with four 'pips' in the chassis which locate into four tiny holes in the lower tender sides. Remove by gently prising the top away from the chassis. To create as much space as possible, some minor modifications will need to be made to the tender chassis and bunker which may affect your warranty. For the same reason I removed the very thick shrinkwrap insulation from the decoder, disconnected several wires and soldered the model's motor wires direct to the decoder. If you damage the decoder by doing this the warranty will be void. Zimo, however, will repair out of warranty or user-inflicted damage for a fixed fee of £15.

The cutaway picture shows the general layout but not the coal space that reduces the vertical space available. The lower portion of this was removed to provide the necessary clearance using a minidrill fitted with a burr bit. Sufficient of the bunker remains to support the dummy coal load casting. A replacement false floor could be made if you wanted to go ahead and add a 'real' coal load in place of the metal casting.

The tender has a split chassis design, with each side electrically isolated from the other. This is used to pass power from the track pick-ups to the decoder. It is important to note the screws which fix the 6-pin socket printed circuit board (PCB) to the chassis also complete the electrical connections.

This PCB must be removed and the supporting towers reduced in height a little so an alternative way to maintain these connections is required. I made some small evelets from scrap capacitor leads which could be soldered to the decoder red and black wires and held tight against the chassis halves by the screws.

The inverted cube speaker fits snugly below the rear of the tender top. Unfortunately, there is a raised centre section on the chassis which will partly impinge on the speaker enclosure. One solution would be to reduce the depth of the speaker enclosure entirely. I decided to cut a recess into the enclosure which would then fit around the potential obstruction. Any resulting gaps were sealed with black mastic.

The chassis also has a raised longitudinal moulding along each side to support the tender lower edges. This marginally reduces the width of the space available for the speaker enclosure. To overcome this restriction I tapered the shorter sides of the enclosure with a file, removing just enough material to ensure a flush but firm fit.

With the components correctly wired up and the decoder fully insulated using Kapton tape the tender body was clipped into place on the chassis.

The sound is provided by a custom project I created for Digitrains originally designed for the Hornby 'West Country' – HM71. It incorporates automatic wheelslip sounds if you try to pull away too briskly with a train, realistic levels of inertia and momentum, depending on whether you are in 'light engine' or 'heavy train' mode and a progressive brake force feature which realistically simulates the way in which real locomotive brakes operate.



STEP BY STEP INSTALLING DCC SOUND IN AN 'N' GAUGE 'MERCHANT NAVY'



It might not offer the greatest space for a sound installation, but the new 'Merchant Navy' for 'N' gauge isn't as difficult as you might think to work on.



The drawbar detail shows how the track power is connected between locomotive and tender with brass strips. The black wires are from the decoder socket to the motor.

These screws, shown released, hold the 6-pin connector printed circuit board (PCB) to the chassis and also provide the track pick-up connections. This PCB will be removed to release space and the decoder hard-wired into the chassis for compactness.






Remove the PCB and detach the (black) motor wires ready to solder to the decoder. The supporting towers should be shortened to about 2mm high with a fine file. Be careful not to remove too much as there needs to be enough thread remaining for the screws to tighten correctly.




I made some eyelets from scrap capacitor leads to form the new connections for track power. These represent the five stages of production, the final of which was soldered for strength.



The wire used for the eyelets takes solder readily whilst the screws hold them tightly against the chassis halves. This arrangement provides good electrical continuity for the decoder to access track power. Note the fixing 'pip', the chassis internal side rails and the central raised area.



The thick shrinkwrap insulation, pictured left, was removed from the MX648 sound decoder to reduce the overall thickness. This by itself would not invalidate the warranty if subsequently reinsulated before use.



I removed all unnecessary wires to reduce bulk being careful to avoid damaging the insulation on those which are to be kept. As the 'Merchant' only requires motor, pick up and speaker connections only six wires need to be connected to the decoder.

I re-orientated the purple speaker wires to protect them from breakage and soldered on the motor wires where the orange and grey wires from the decoder were once fitted. These are optional steps as joining the locomotive and decoder wires would be an alternative, though with slightly more bulk to accommodate.



The finely detailed tender body has the cast metal coal load removed to show bunker detail. If you were planning to add a 6-pin standard motor decoder this area could be loaded with real coal.



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This is the bunker moulding seen from below. The base of the bunker takes up a substantial amount of space inside the tender, particularly when it comes to installing sound.





Most of the lower portion of the bunker was removed using a burr bit in a minidrill. A lip was left at the front and rear to support the metal coal load. An alternative would be to create a false floor from plastic sheet and cover it with crushed coal.



The 10mm x 15mm cube speaker, shown here without its enclosure, fits transversely below the tender top.




I made a recess to allow most of the enclosure to fit flush to the chassis floor by cutting out a section as shown here.






I carefully split the enclosure from the speaker then fitted the enclosure to the chassis. Any gaps were sealed with black mastic to create an airtight speaker enclosure – essential for best performance.



I reattached the speaker to its endosure using cyano (super) glue. The distortion in this extreme dose up makes it look as if the speaker is too big to fit, but it does.




This is a view of the fully wired components prior to insulation.



The decoder is wrapped in Kapton tape for insulation in this view showing the general disposition of components before reassembly. I also added some insulation to the tops of the screws and the eyelets for safety.



The decoder can be seen through the bottom of the bunker. If necessary use this access to manoeuvre it into the best position to allow the tender body to be refitted correctly. Then gently but firmly press the tender top back into position until it positively locates on the fixing 'pips' completing the installation.

ew to the increasing range of slide bar rolling roads produced by Zeller and distributed in the UK by Wealistic Models is this smartly finished brass version of its standard product.

Featuring seven rollers with brass wheels, an additional support for pony trucks and front bogies plus power connecting clips this 415mm long rolling road is a superbly finished product. The brass rods clip into the outer supports making it a simple job to change the number of rollers fitted to the unit.

On test we found our sample to be an excellent means of running in new locomotives. The newly introduced central divider halts any potential for steam locomotives to creep along the rolling road keeping them safely and firmly in place. The brass construction also allows soldering to the outer slide bars if desired, although the power connecting clips which plug into the outer support bar take care of this process conveniently.

ALUMINIUM ROLLING ROAD FOR 'O'



'gauge modellers can now take advantage of the Zeller slide bar rolling road system with the introduction of this unit which hosts eight rollers, two outer supports and a divider bar too.

This '0' gauge version is 590mm long, but it is currently only available in aluminium. The central divider stops any potential for a model to creep along the slide bar while on the rolling road while the easy positioning of the eight rollers makes it a simple process to set up for use, no matter what configuration your locomotives have.

It is best suited to diesel models in this format, but could be used with equal success for smaller steam tender engines and tank engines where all wheels can be supported by the eight rollers.

SHEDDING LIGHT ON RUNNING IN



e all take great pride in our model locomotives and the detail which has been built into them. This new and innovating product from the Zeller Rolling Road range features an illuminated frame which casts light from LEDs on to the running gear of a locomotive.

The concept is based around Zeller's highly successful slide bar rolling road system and it comes with six rollers and a bogie support with the rollers moulded in clear plastic. Matching brass wheels are used in each roller while the LEDs are suitably hidden inside the aluminium channel frame.

In service the illuminated rolling road offered the same smooth running characteristics as the standard slide bar products with the added value of being able to see more clearly what is happening with the moving parts of a locomotive. An excellent addition to the range.

HEN A MODEL

by consensus, with consideration given to
the wishes of the majority of the members.

With privately owned and built layouts, there are no such constraints. There are, of course, many factors which dictate an individual's choice, but perhaps the most popular is the urge to create a feeling of nostalgia. That is certainly the case with John Cook's highly evocative Kepier Colliery, a layout which brings his powerful memories back to life.

As a child growing up in the industrial North East, the tracks of the colliery railway network were his playground. In those days when there was little regard to health and safety, the railway lines would run through the middle of the County Durham coalfield villages and, not being fenced off, they became pedestrian thoroughfares for the local populations.

John and his pals would play across the tracks, stepping back for the regular passing of trains. They would marvel at the diminutive little engines straining at every seam as they struggled with their heavy loads shattering the peace with the deafening bark of their exhaust. And, of course, the drivers were not averse to allowing the kids in to the cab. Powerful memories indeed, and ones which inspired John to build this superb exhibition layout.

AMALGAMATION



running from Hetton to Sunderland. Kepier Colliery includes features from a selection of the Durham coalfield sites.

The layout is 18ft x 2ft, with a 16ft scenic length. The baseboards are of 9mm plywood on 9mm plywood frames built in a honeycomb structure, resulting in robust but relatively light boards. The baseboards have integral legs, and the front skirts fold up to make boxes for easy and safe transportation.

The trackwork is SMP with Code 75 pointwork from Peco. The turnouts are operated by solenoid motors from Seep and Peco via push button switches. The ballasting materials include anthracite, ground down coal and granite chips, used in varying proportions appropriate to the different areas of the layout.

The layout is simple analogue control and uses Gaugemaster Model W controllers. The layout can be operated using two for the main viewing area, but we find that general operation only requires one. We also use a hidden locomotive and controller to push wagons through the screens to ensure even movement and no runaways. I made the 16v AC and 12v DC supplies for the controllers, point motors and general lighting using a variety of transformers.

The control panel board uses push button switches and a Capacitor Discharge Unit (CDU) to operate the point motors giving them extra power at the moment of changing over. The motors are a mix of Peco and Seep which include switches to control the live frogs.

VARIED STRUCTURES

By the very nature of the layout subject, Kepier Colliery features an extensive collection of buildings and structures, most of which have had to be scratchbuilt. Most of John's buildings have been built using cardboard as the core material, carefully braced internally to prevent warping and then completed with an outer finish of brick paper which is then treated with weathering powders to create that authentic look. With so many embossed plastic materials available today, brick papers are less popular than they used to be. Kepier Colliery, however,

is a perfect example of how convincing their careful choice can be in portraying the subtleties of colour and texture.

The buildings around the store yard at the left-hand end of the layout are based on those which could be found at Lambton, Hetton and Joicey collieries. The winding shafts are fine examples of John's cardboard structures, covered with brick paper and weathered. A particularly exceptional piece of modelling is the downcast headgear, constructed in Plastruct from original drawings from Walker Colliery. The original headgear was manufactured by the now defunct Grange Iron Work, Durham, and is typical of those the company sent worldwide. The steam winding engine house is another card and brick paper structure with windows from brass frets.

The loading screens, which are based on

a standard National Coal Board pattern, are built using the same materials with much use of plastic section for the lower structure. The railway runs through the screen into a headshunt which is hidden behind a backscene at the left hand end of the layout. A modified Metcalfe kit with the roof re-covered in asbestos cladding embossed plastic sheet provides the basis for the engine shed, which is a good representation of that at Hetton Lyons colliery. That shed provided the servicing facilities for all the locomotives running on the southern section of the Hetton Railway.

The Kepier village scene, which hides the traverser storage yard at the right hand end of the model, is a fine example of mixing scratchbuilt and proprietary buildings to create a totally convincing setting. Suitably modified and weathered

Metcalfe and Superquick kits, a Hornby pub and some old Triang shops blend harmoniously with John's own scratchbuilt chapel, cottages, and working men's club. The cottages are based on the Hetton Colliery housing, examples of which, in reality, have been dismantled and rebuilt at the Beamish Museum.

It is often the finishing touches that captivate the viewer's attention and on Kepier Colliery there is no shortage of fine detail, from trees to pigeon baskets. There is also a considerable number of hand painted figures, all carefully placed to provide a sense of purpose. John's son David has been responsible for the road vehicles which are a mix of kit and modified off-the-shelf items.

AN INDUSTRIAL FLEET


Building up an appropriate fleet of locomotives for a colliery layout is a challenge in itself and even though industrial locomotives are gaining popularity with ready-to-run manufacturers the vast majority on Kepier are built from kits. These have been produced by Brian Walker and John specifically for the layout.

The fleet includes examples of 0-4-0, 0-6-0 and 0-6-2 wheel arrangements with a variety of side and saddle tank designs. Popular in the fleet is the ex-Taff Vale Railway 0-6-2T with its distinctive Lambton cab while a DJH Andrew Barclay 0-4-0ST, Judith Edge Hunslet 0-6-0ST, High Level RSH 0-6-0ST and a Hawthorne Leslie 0-4-0ST are also regular performers. The most unusual locomotive is the Neilson 0-4-0ST which is an ex-Great Eastern Railway engine built from an old Nu-cast kit.

A handful of modified ready-to-run Hunslet 'Austerity' 0-6-0STs from Dapol and Hornby are also part of the fleet – and rightly so as no industrial layout would really be complete without at least one of these distinctive locomotives. With such a large fleet of kit built locomotives John has chosen to stay with analogue control for Kepier Colliery rather than opting for a digital system.

Picking a favourite is always a challenge, but one locomotive in particular holds special memories. "I like all of the locomotives on the layout but if I have to choose, Kerr Sturart 'Victory' 0-6-0T No 41", John said. "I built this from a CSP brass kit to which I attached a Lambton cab. This is a model of one of the locomotives on which I was given rides on the Hetton Railway. This started my interest in colliery railways, hence my layout's theme."







The rolling stock for Kepier revolves around coal wagons. A wide variety of vehicles have been built and acquired for the layout including those easily recognisable by main line BR modellers such as the 20ton hopper while a large number of internal system wagons form the bulk of the fleet. Included are small chaldron wagons together with a wide variety of kit built coal wagons and suitable internal system vans.

OPERATION

The main activity on Kepier Colliery is the transport of mined coal from the screens in colliery owned and BR wagons. The colliery wagons would be primarily delivering coal to staithes for export shipment abroad and for the London market. They would also be supplying local household distribution and to other customers. The BR wagons would be taking coal for delivery to ironworks, power stations and industry.

The empty wagons are returned and fulls taken away. A shunting engine pushes the empties up to a head shunt behind the screens ready to run down by gravity, be filled and made ready for removal by the fleet. Colliery waste traffic is also represented and is taken away in the old black chaldron wagons by Neilson 0-4-0ST No 5 to be disposed of on the pit heap.

Generally colliery locomotives are returned to the shed after bringing empties back and finishing shunting duties.

BR motive power is also represented in the form of a Worsdell 'J27' 0-6-0, an Ivatt '4MT' 2-6-0 or a BR Sulzer Type 2. These are used to take full trains away back onto the BR system directly after returning empties. The guards van is also coupled/uncoupled as required.

Motive power for the colliery wagons generally consists of 0-6-2T and 0-6-0T. The smaller 0-4-0s are used for general shunting duties. These shunting duties include movement of box vans, oil tanks, incoming supplies and equipment. Hunslet 0-6-0ST No 8 is generally in charge of the platelayers train.





THE FUTURE

The layout, which started its exhibition life in 2007, has appeared at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition and Model Rail Scotland shows, and has also been well received at many shows in the north of England including Wigan, Wakefield, Blackpool and Kendal.

It has a bright future too with exhibition bookings for 2016 and beyond which will see John travelling to Railex North East and Stafford Model Railway Exhibition in the near future.

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

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

N AUGUST 11 1968
after the famous 'Fifteen
Guinea Special' had run to
celebrate the end of steam,
British Railways introduced
an outright steam ban on
its main line network. For some enthusiasts
that was the end and many turned their
backs on the modernised railway. Others,
however, were not prepared to take the
decision lying down and immediately
started to draw up plans to bring their
favourite locomotives back to the main line.

Strictly speaking British Railways did continue to operate steam locomotives as it was the owner of the narrow-gauge Vale of Rheidol Railway which runs from Aberystwyth to Devil's Bridge at the time and for which it retained the three 2-6-2Ts, but on the main line the very idea that there should ever be any more steam traction met with fierce resistance in the corridors of power.

Five years earlier, however, the famous London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) 'A3' 4-6-2 4472 Flying Scotsman had passed into the hands of businessman Alan Pegler and he had spent a small fortune in having it put through Doncaster Works and restored to its LNER appearance. Flying Scotsman was still running on the national network in August 1968 and was employed on railtour and special work for which a special contract had been signed, a deal which did not expire until 1972. Consequently Flying Scotsman was able to run following its 1968-1969 overhaul, and would have continued to do so had it not been decided that it was to undertake a tour of America in conjunction with the Board of Trade.

BREAKING THE BAN

There was no steam for a couple of years thereafter as the authorities steadfastly refused to entertain the idea of another engine taking over where *Scotsman* had left off but in 1971 GWR 'King' 4-6-0 6000 *King George V,* which had been restored at Bulmer's Railway Centre in Hereford, gained permission to escape captivity.

Bulmer's Chief Executive Peter Prior wanted to run a promotional train of the 'King' and five Pullman coaches round the country and was sufficiently well connected to get his own way. Following a few test runs his train made a four-day trip around the Western Region in October 1971 without any problems and the success of this operation was subsequently enough to persuade British Railways that steam could be accommodated without serious risk to its everyday services.

A new set of rules was then brought in under which all future steam operations had to be run. These moved the emphasis for operation away from BR itself and towards the locomotive owner, imposed a top speed of 60mph and also limited trains to more lightly used routes.

Over the following years more locomotives began to be added to the stud of those available for charter and special work, with one of the most enthusiastic contributors being the National Railway Museum (NRM). A number of its locomotives have been used on the main line over the years and have included such unlikely candidates as the 1873 built London and North Western Railway 2-4-0 *Hardwicke* which steamed for a time in the mid 1970s. The NRM was ideally placed to be able to participate in the main line programme as its York base offered many of the facilities required, having formerly been a motive power depot and having many former senior railway engineers on its staff in the early days.

OPERATING CHALLENGES

The use of steam on the main line was not without its problems. From the outset >>>



the biggest one was the lack of suitable watering facilities as those formerly provided by British Railways were soon decommissioned. Flying Scotsman had been provided with a second tender that vastly increased its range but this solution was not adopted by anyone else. Instead the local fire brigade was often called in to provide water at strategic locations with assistance being given at little or no cost but this activity was subsequently redesignated as a special service allowing the fire service to charge a realistic fee and also freeing them from the requirement to assist at all. As a result of this a small group of contractors has grown which undertake to supply water to steam specials using a fleet of road tankers.

Coal was not such a big problem as most locomotives could carry enough to supply them for a whole day's work. Wherever possible engines were worked back to a base each evening and coal was delivered there, sometimes over great distances due to poor availability of local locomotive quality coal.

PUTTING THE BRAKES ON

A bigger issue which has become more prevalent over the years is the incompatibility of steam locomotives with modern coaches. Since the early 1970s coaches have been built with only air brakes, while almost all steam engines were built only with vacuum operated brakes. There is a further problem in that with heating and air conditioning powered electrically on more modern vehicles steam engines cannot provide power.



Rakes of suitable vacuum braked coaches were kept especially for steam work until comparatively recently, and these were nearly all BR Mk 1s. Indeed, British Rail's own charter division for many years had rakes of dual braked coaches, but these were subsequently disbanded and sold.

With fewer vacuum braked vehicles available and with even fewer drivers trained in their use many steam locomotive owners have taken to fitting their locomotives with train air brakes, a move that has also meant the fitting of compressors and reservoirs. In some cases evidence of this can clearly be seen, particularly on

tenders, some of which have been altered to accommodate the additional equipment.

Other changes to the national system have also involved steam locomotive owners in considerable expense. The introduction of Train Protection Warning System (TPWS) in the early 2000s and later On Train Monitoring Recorder (OTMR) have proved challenging, while Radio Electronic Token Block (RETB) is also required for some routes. The forthcoming European Train Control System (ETCS) signalling is posing challenges of installation which could drastically limit steam's operational sphere in the future. Some locomotives



have also required drastic surgery due to modern changes in the loading gauge. Two of the three preserved 'Kings' have required their cab roofs, chimneys and safety valve bonnets lowering.

CHANGING PATTERNS

Changes such as these meant a gradual switch in the way main line steam is provided. In the early years locomotives were kept in penny numbers in small depots largely by preservation societies but a pattern has evolved where most steam power is provided by a handful of operators, even if the locomotives are owned by individuals.

One of the largest is West Coast Railways which grew out of the former Steamtown Railway Museum in Carnforth and is now a spot hire operator with its own coaches, steam and diesel locomotives as well as extensive engineering facilities. The company provides complete steam trains for short term or long term requirements. Engineering companies such as Ian Riley at Bury also operate small fleets of steam locomotives which they hire out while the larger societies such as the A1 Steam Locomotive Trust and the Princess Royal Locomotive Trust have established quite sophisticated facilities to ensure the future wellbeing of their engines.

Scheduled steam returned to the main line in 1984 when British Rail introduced a service for tourists between Fort William and Mallaig which has continued every year since, although operated by West



Coast Railways since privatisation in 1995. Steam services also returned to the branch line from Grosmont to Whitby in 2007 when the North Yorkshire Moors Railway gained permission to extend its services. There are also regular steam services such as the 'Torbay Express' which runs in the summer months on a Sunday between Bristol and Torbay. Recently the Scottish government has been behind a major initiative to provide a scheduled and regular steam tourist service on the newly-reopened Borders Railway.

There are a surprisingly large number of regular services that run, particularly in the summer months. These include such duties as the 'Scarborough Spa Express' and regular steam workings over the Settle-Carlisle line. Steam is also employed on the British portion of the 'Orient Express' operation with a regular performer being Bulleid rebuilt 'Merchant Navy' 35028 Clan Line and there have been regular services on lines such as the Cambrian

Coast in the past. And of course there are one-off charters which take all sorts of locomotives to parts of the country they might never have been to before 1968.

Main line steam operation today is not without its problems and there have been a number of high profile failures of locomotives in traffic, which have caused considerable issues on the network. Now, as in the early 1970s, there are calls for steam to be restricted to secondary routes and as a result talks are taking place to try and make steam more reliable by initiatives such as limiting loads or by providing banking engines at the rear.

However, the popularity of main line steam means that the fears which some had in 1968 of never seeing an engine in full flight again will never come to pass. Indeed with several new build main line engines in the pipeline – including a Gresley 'P2' 2-8-2 - as well as the potential return of some old favourites the future looks far more positive than in those dark days of August 1968.

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ing Dapol's

Digital sound should be a perfect fit for 'O' gauge. **PAUL CHETTER** finds fitting it in a Dapol 'Terrier' to be a pleasantly straightforward experience.

APOL'S'A1X'0-6-0T is a lovely little model that's full of character and perfect for anyone thinking of taking the step up to 'O' gauge without spending a fortune. After receiving a review sample attention turned to seeing how easy it would be to fit digital sound into the 0-6-0T.

Releasing four screws is all that's needed to separate the body from the chassis and gain access to some very usable spaces within the body. There is on-board provision for a 21-pin decoder. As this is a plug and play

device without external wires, conversion to DCC should be straightforward. Remove the blanking plate from the connector on the locomotive printed circuit board (PCB) and replace with a 21-pin decoder of your choice.

There is a minor complication due to the suppression circuit added to comply with EU regulations. This is provided on a 'mini PCB' located (electrically) between the decoder and motor. Such components can, in some cases, have a detrimental effect on DCC decoders, usually resulting in poorly controlled or 'jittery'

slow speed running. I found this to be the case here. DCC decoders have superior suppression circuits built-in so the simple solution to the problem is to remove the mini PCB and connect the decoder output direct to the motor.

Adding sound only requires the substitution of a sound decoder plus the addition of a speaker. Connecting speaker wires to the two solder pads provided on the locomotive PCB and fitting the speaker completes this straightforward installation.







The four outermost screws, arrowed, should be removed to release the body. As the body is lifted clear, the firebox flicker PCB will be detached from its location across the open firebox doors. Note its position for reassembly.



With the body removed the chassis and locomotive PCB are visible. The blanking plate, for use with analogue systems, is plugged onto the 21-pin DCC socket, and the firebox flicker PCB has been displaced to the right on the connecting leads





The suppression PCB is fitted below the locomotive PCB. This may cause problems with slow running smoothness with a decoder fitted, it did with my example, so I removed it to cure the problem.



Cube speakers have proved to work very well in endosed bodies. I decided to try a new larger version recently introduced by Zimo



The new 13mm x 18mm speaker is shown here with the previously largest



There is plenty of free space available to house this speaker inside the forward portion of the boiler and smokebox.

To maintain the 'no wires' format of the decoder, Dapol has provided a pair of speaker wire solder pads, arrowed, to which I attached the speaker wires. Also shown are the orange and grey wires from the motor direct to the PCB together with the black and red wires from the pick ups.





The general disposition of the components shows the speaker wires connected and the MX644D sound decoder fitted to the 21-pin connector.



the firebox flicker PCB in place using a

small strip of mastic. This gives a firm but pliable grip which can be easily peeled away if the PCB should need to be removed in the future.







The final act before reassembling the body to the chassis was to fit the speaker deep into the boiler, secured with a spot of mastic. Then, having ensured the wires are clear of the flywheel, simply reverse the disassembly steps and you're good to go.



ARWICK-ON-SPA is not modelled on a specific location, but I try to keep with a Midlands theme, with lots of interesting things going on around. It is named after my two home towns, Warwick and Leamington Spa.

The layout is 6ft x 4ft and designed to be versatile allowing me to run 1940/1950s, 1980/1990s and present day rolling stock. It currently consists of two stations, one main line and the other set in the country, a tunnel, a manor, a farm and a full village. The track layout features five sidings and a double track main line around the baseboard. It uses Digital

Command Control with a Hornby Elite controller and features full lighting in all the buildings.

I am currently nearing completion of an extension to the layout, with a rock face, valley and gorge with a river. A new line will run across a viaduct to the main layout. Other plans include a new signalbox, coal bunkers and a water tower. Eventually it will be linked to a storage yard/city station for ease of changing trains. This is all constructed using various modelling techniques, with train liveries painted to something how they looked in their time, passengers and engine crew and lighting installed in each carriage.

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

My return to model railways coincided with the Operation Build It! series in your magazine (HM76-HM83) and although I didn't follow the trackplan I read with interest. I also kept all the kits and so earlier this year I built a small layout to fit on a shelf in a spare room as my first project. I've used several of the buildings and the others are held for future use.

My low relief station building is two copies of the platform frontage of the building in HM78, with the right-hand one cut in half and the parts reversed to give a different pattern of doors and windows. I had a problem trying to make the roof look low relief so this will have to be addressed shortly.

I also used the lineside hut, the platform shelter, the platforms and the signalbox, although I removed some of the glazing bars from the windows. I was going to use the overbridge to disguise the exit to the storage yard, but then in HM87-HM89 you had the three factory buildings. So I decided to group these either side of the running line at the exit, and from my operating position the trains appear and disappear quite naturally.
