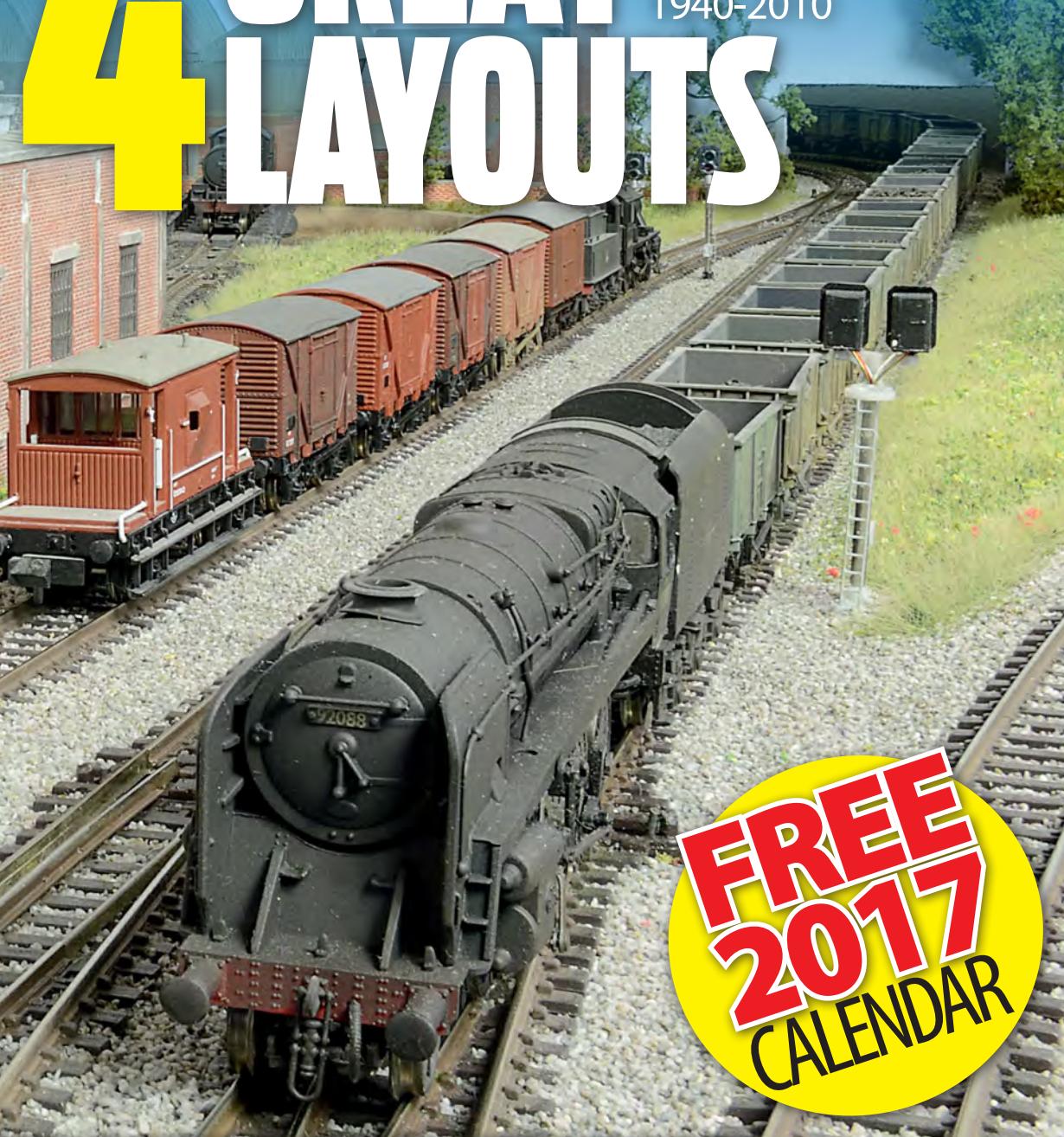

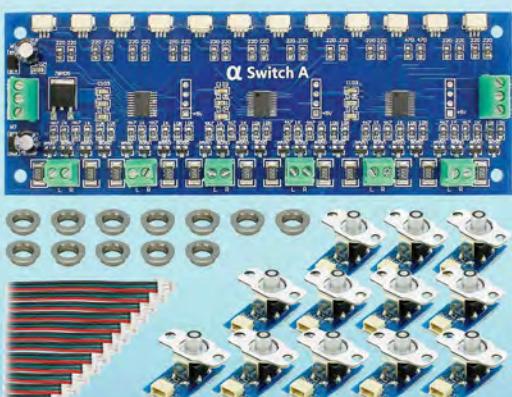

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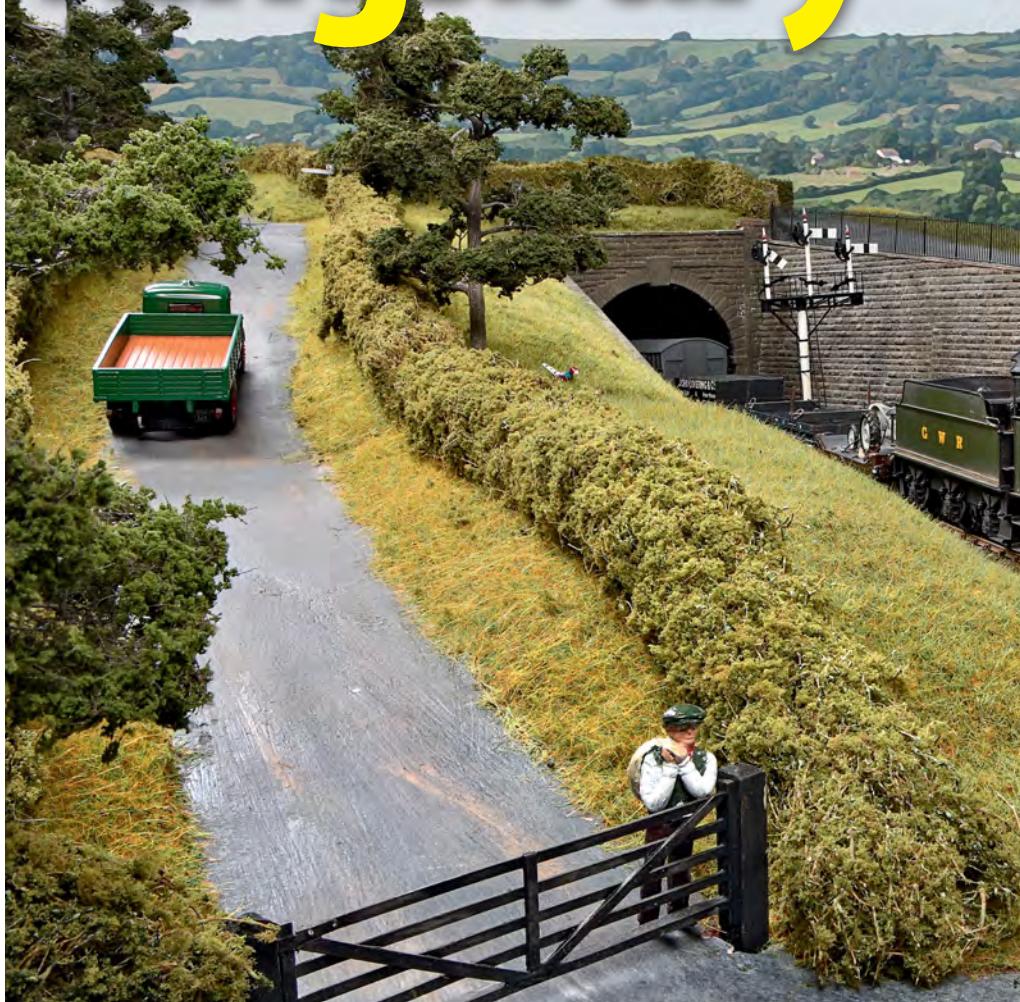

THE EDITOR'S PAGE



THERE are many stunning new models arriving on the scene and this month we've been fortunate to be able to get exclusive first viewings on two of those eagerly anticipated products - Hornby's

gorgeous Holden 'B12' 4-6-0 and Dapol's superb Black Label Gresley 'A4' 4-6-2.

Both are for 'OO' gauge and are sure signs of progress. The 'B12' is synonymous with the Hornby range having first been produced by the manufacturer back in the 1960s. Today's new model is a world away from the original, as you can see on pages 62-65, and delivers a quality product full of detail and brimming with top level performance.

It is encouraging to see locomotives like the 'B12' being selected for ready-to-run models. In the real world, apart from a few forays to other areas, they were mainly used on the Great Eastern section of the London North Eastern Railway (LNER) - and in their final days that sphere of operation shrunk even further. Like the 'J15' and 'D18' which preceded

the 'B12' for East Anglian modellers, this new arrival fills a significant niche and does so superbly well.

On the other hand we have Dapol's new Black Label Gresley 'A4' - a model which takes the concept of ready-to-run steam locomotives another big step forward. With factory installed smoke generator, working locomotive lamps, flickering fire and factory fitted digital sound it is a feature rich streamlined temptation which is sure to win great favour when it arrives this winter.

Interestingly too, this model will only be available in one format: DCC sound fitted. There is no DCC ready, no DCC fitted - just a sound version. That is a bold step, but one which I think will really pay off for Dapol as it has engineered the 'A4' so that it will work on analogue as well, but with digital layout operators at the forefront of its thinking.

This step change in steam locomotive design has been fascinating to watch and we've been itching to get hold of one of these locomotives for testing.

However, there is another enthralling model in this issue at the opposite end of the glamour and size scale - Bachmann's Wickham Type 27 trolley. Until you see this model in the flesh and handle it, it is difficult to appreciate just how small and

dainty this tiny 'OO' gauge model is. We've got our full review of it in this issue together with much more from all the manufacturers.

Plus, we also have a first interview with Hornby's new Chief Executive Officer Steve Cooke who speaks freely about Hornby's difficult start to 2016 and his plans for turning the company around. This was encouraging to hear and we're looking forward to seeing the next steps as Steve and his team continue to look for advice and information from the model railway market.

November is a busy month for the *Hornby Magazine* team, with two exhibitions on the cards. First is the Spalding Model Railway Exhibition on November 12/13 - where we will be showing our 'N' gauge layout West Riding Power - while on November 26/27 we will be debuting a brand new 'OO' layout at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition. We hope to see you there. Happy modelling!

HORNBY PLANS 'OO' BR Mk 1 BSO & FO



First sample of Hornby's new 'OO' gauge BR Mk 1 Brake Second Open.



Also announced by Hornby is the BR Mk 1 First Open for 'OO' gauge.



HORNBY has announced two new additions to its well received range of BR Mk 1 stock for 'OO' gauge in the form of the Brake Second Open (BSO) and First Open (FO). Both will form part of the manufacturer's 2017 range plan.

The BR Mk 1s were introduced in 1951 with the last being built in 1964. Construction took place at Eastleigh, Swindon and Doncaster

with underframes built at Ashford and York. The BSO fleet totalled 181 examples, built between 1955 and 1963 – 163 to diagram 183 and 18 to diagram 184; with the latter featuring Commonwealth bogies. The first BSOs were delivered to the Eastern Region with further vehicles being allocated to the Western and Scottish regions. Liveries included BR carmine and cream, Western Region chocolate and cream, BR

maroon and BR blue and grey.

The FO was introduced in 1951 with 119 built by 1963 to diagram 73. The initial builds were allocated to the Eastern, Midland and Southern regions with vehicles later being seen on all sections of BR.

Both models feature new tooling and they will be released in a choice of BR maroon and BR blue and grey liveries. The specification will match the same

high standards as the first BR Mk 1 vehicles introduced by Hornby from 2013 including flush glazing, metal wheels and NEM coupling pockets. They join the Second Open, Corridor Composite, Tourist Second Open and Brake Second Corridor in Hornby's Mk 1 range.

Release dates and pricing are still to be announced.

Little Loco shows first decorated '15'

The initial decorated sample of the Little Loco Company's 'O' gauge Class 15 (HM107 and HM111) arrived in September.

This version carries all green livery, though the locomotives numbers, British Railways totems and various printed information panels have not yet been incorporated. In addition the Liverpool Street Pilot Special Edition has been replaced with a decal pack allowing standard models to be decorated to this specification. Preserved locomotive D8233 remains as

the flagship Limited Edition.

After positive response to its debut at the Guildex Convention, Telford, for which it was fitted with DCC sound by Hornby Magazine contributor Paul Chetter, a factory fitted sound option will be available across the range, although prices have not yet been finalised.

With fully decorated samples arriving before the end of October, production models are expected to be available in time for Christmas.

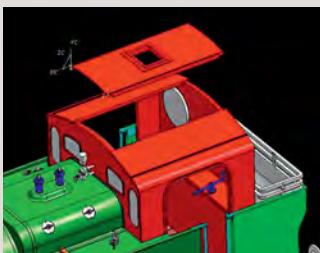
Dapol reveals 'Jinty' for 'O'

Dapol has added a fourth locomotive to its 'O' gauge portfolio with announcement of the Fowler 'Jinty' 0-6-0T at its recent open day.

The specification calls for a die-cast running plate, compensated chassis, flickering firebox effect, removable cab roof, a 21-pin decoder socket and more.

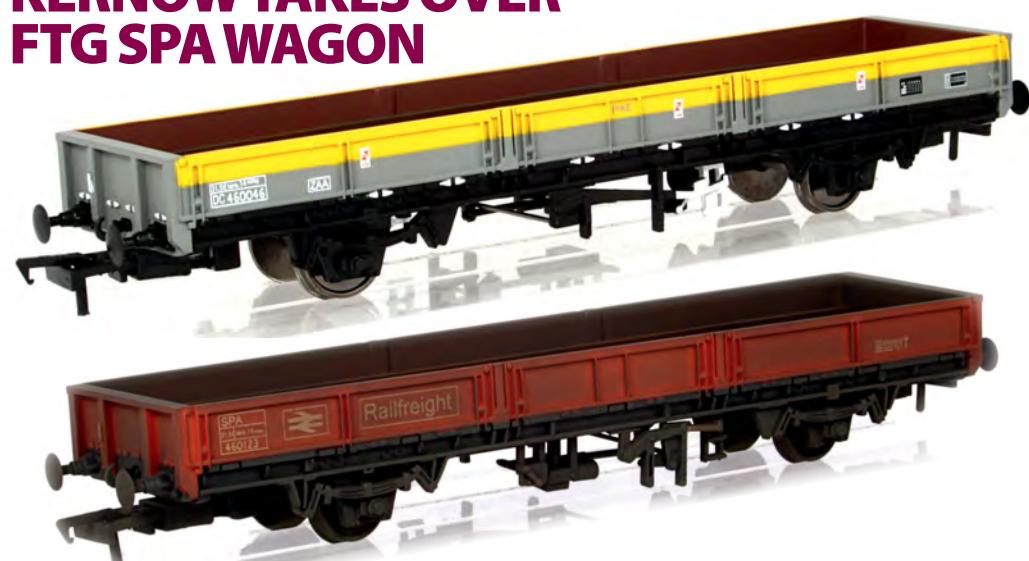
Five main models will be released covering early LMS black (Cat No. 72-026-001), late LMS black (75-026-002), Somerset and Dorset

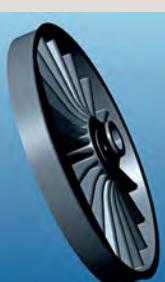

Hatton's plan... THREE NEW WAGONS



HATTON'S of Liverpool has announced that it will be producing models of the Warwell bogie well wagon in 'OO' and 'O' gauge as well as a 'OO' gauge model of the Beilhack snowplough.

All three models are being produced directly by Hatton's at a manufacturing site in China with the Warwell wagons being

programmed to arrive first in the fourth quarter of 2017. The snowplough will follow in the first quarter of 2018.

Both models will cater for detail differences in the vehicles with the 1942 introduced Warwell being produced with original diamond frame and replacement Gloucester GPS bogies. Liveries for the Warwell will stretch from the LNER 1940s

period through to post-2000 Ministry of Defence colour schemes with 'OO' versions priced at £33 in pristine condition and £37 for weathered versions. The 'O' gauge model is priced at £85 with a smaller range of livery options.

The Beilhack snowplough models the Class 40 and 45 bogies converted for the ploughing duties in 1984. Classified ZZA, these

ploughs were seen on test runs out of season as well as in operation during periods of snowfall.

Hatton's new model will be produced in BR yellow, BR yellow with Network SouthEast branding, Railtrack black and Network Rail black. The price per model will be £43.

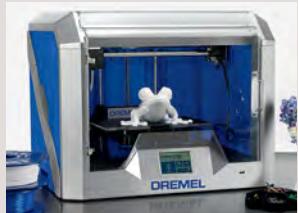

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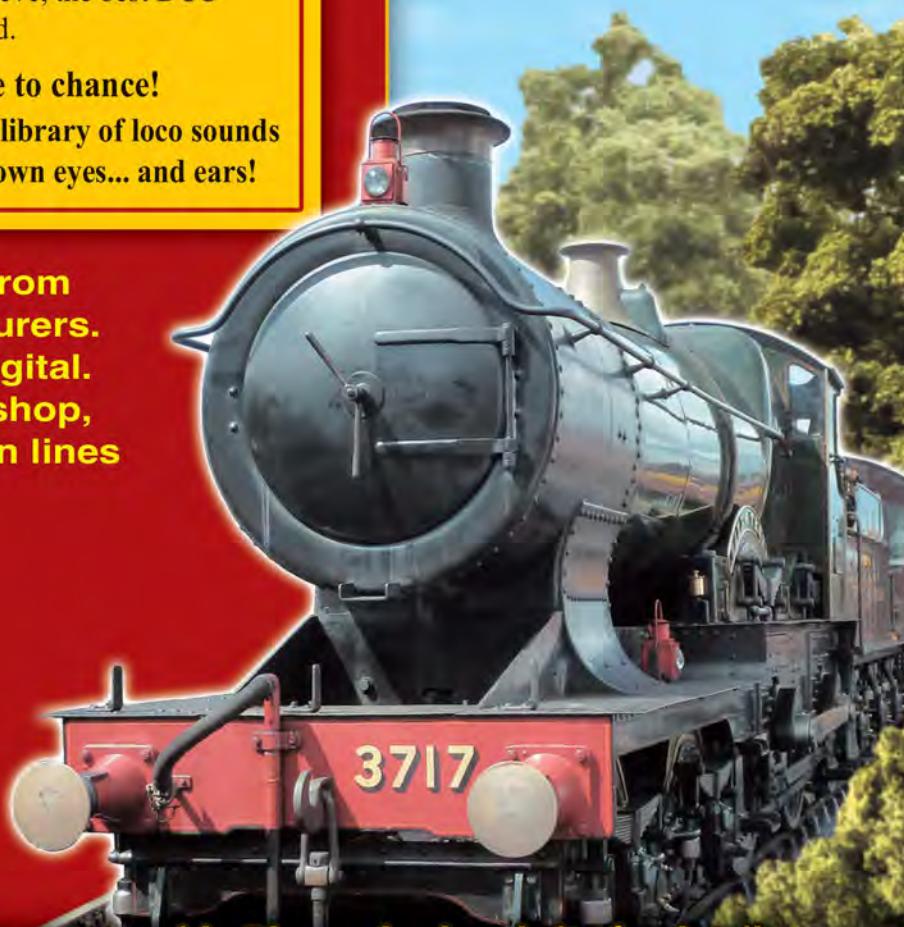

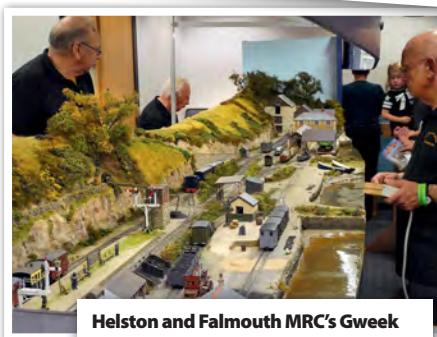

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Peterborough NORTH

PETERBOROUGH NORTH station as it was in the late 1950s is the subject of this layout. It has been shown extensively online through the pages of RMWeb. The layout has been built in a conventional way, so rather than cover the type of timber, screws and glue that I have used I wanted

to provide a different slant on the model.

Picture a small and rather apprehensive boy waiting with a relative just north of Boston station in 1954. A light engine approaches, stops and he is smuggled aboard. The driver is his uncle, and this is to be a short journey through to Boston shed. That was the start of my love affair with railways and this layout is its

culmination. I learned a lot from Uncle Tom and though I then joined the ranks of trainspotters, I always wanted to go further than just writing down numbers.

From 1955 to 1963 I was privileged to observe the last golden years of the steam railway, and I still have memories as clear as if they had happened yesterday. It is hardly surprising then that I have

always wanted to recreate in miniature what I so enjoyed back then.

Geography dictated that would mean the East Coast Main Line (ECML) as that's where most of my memories came from. Of course, if you want to model the big stuff, you need a big space, and for many years I didn't have it. 1996 saw the space arrive in the form of a large loft, »



and I built a layout called Peterborough, though it looked nothing like it.

Come 2010 I got disenchanted with the loft and all the problems they bring, and got my two spare bedrooms knocked into one, giving me a glorious space of 25ft x 10ft to play with. What should I do with it? Well, for once I spent a long time considering options and confronting stark realities. Peterborough North station was the only place that satisfied all my needs, but would need considerable input from professionals, as the track and buildings would need to be custom made. I know all of this would be outside the scope of most, as it was for me for most of my life, but retirement brought the time and funds to allow me to finally realise my dreams.

AGAINST THE RULES

Peterborough North was a place that almost defied belief, in that it totally went against normal rules and common sense. Crescent Bridge to the south, and Spital Bridge to the north form very convenient scenic breaks, so my original intention was to model only that which existed between them. There are up and down main lines, a down relief road, some bays and a couple of lines at the top of the plan. There are lots of sidings too, but the main layout is surprisingly simple.

There was only one up platform face, which every through, stopping and terminating service had to use. The down bays could not be accessed from the up side, the up south bay only took five coaches, while the one at the north end was useless for passenger work. And those two lines at the top of the plan? In the middle was the up slow, and beyond it the down slow. To use the up slow involved a 10mph speed restriction and blocking the whole ECML at both ends. The down wasn't quite so bad, but any train wanting to access the huge yards, most of which were on the up side, had to block the whole ECML to get there. And then, just to add to the

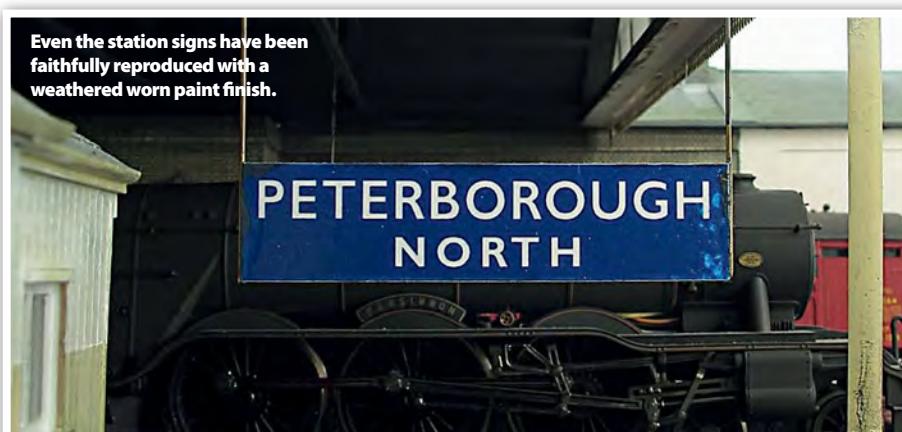

operational headaches, the 'dog leg' curves at either end had a 20mph permanent speed restriction even for non-stop expresses.

We managed to get in all the running lines, but had to settle for a much simplified entry to the down bays. There is compression both in length and width, but I judged that it was not so severe as to remove a good resemblance of the real thing. A lot of sidings had to be left out as well, but one can't have everything.

Norman Saunders of Just Tracks was commissioned to build the track, and architectural modeller Peter Leyland to tackle the extraordinarily complex station buildings, and all the others that would be

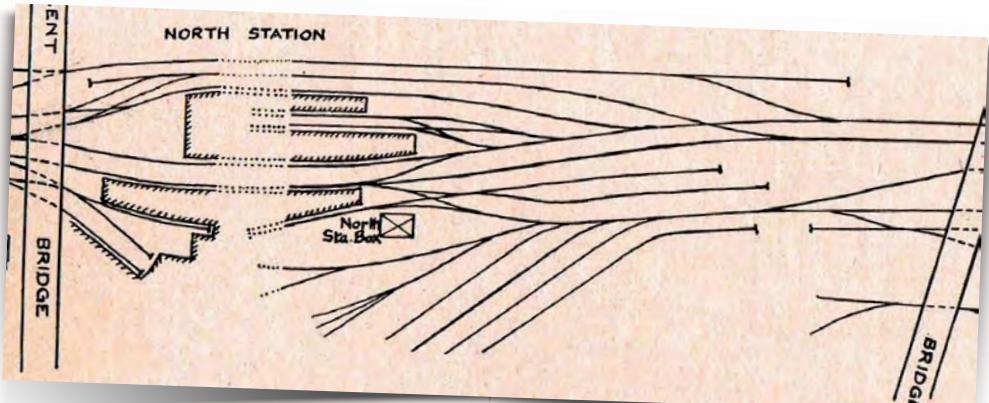




 The interior of Peterborough station is just as beautifully detailed as its exterior. A BR '9F' 2-10-0 heads south under the overall roof with a long coal train.

needed. Both of them, as the photographs show, did a magnificent job, which I could not have even begun to achieve myself.

So, what then was my input to be? I decided that I would aim to run the whole thing as nearly as possible like the real thing. I would work out a sequence timetable to cover all trains between 7.15am and 10.00pm, then I would find out the formations of those trains if I could, and put them together. The next thing would be to source if possible the locomotive duties for the summer of 1958, and to acquire the locomotives and stock to achieve all of this. I should say at this stage that I had been building up stock 



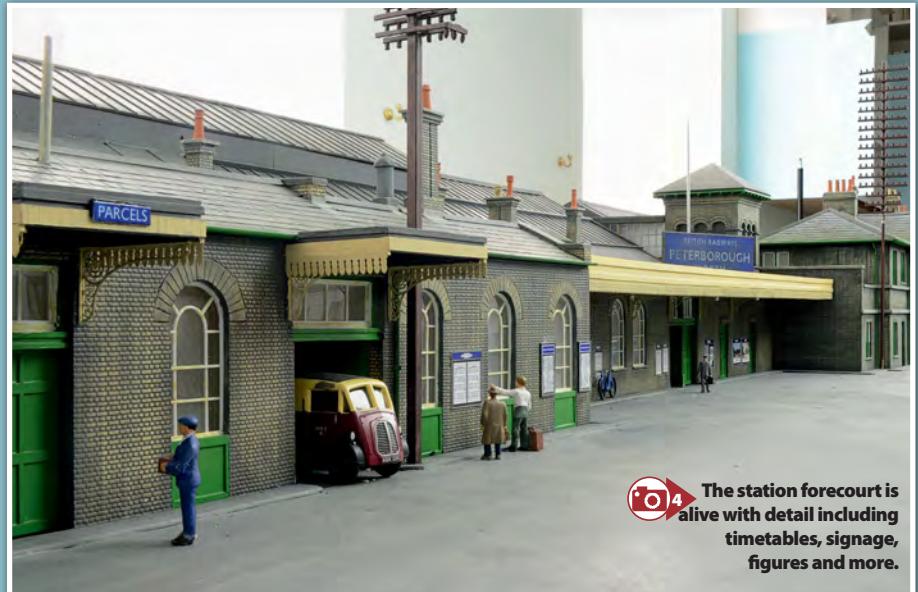
Peterborough schematic track diagram.

over the previous 25 years, so this was not as daunting or expensive as it sounds.

SOURCING TIMETABLES

The absolute necessity was accurate timetables. I've picked up copies of public timetables in the past, but this time I searched the internet for working timetables (WTT), and was able to find the 1958 summer passenger WTT, and a goods WTT from 1957. It was then possible to develop the sequence, which I prepared as a PowerPoint document, and saved to a laptop. In so doing I discovered that there was a working on the up main every seven minutes for most of the day! Copies of the summer 1958 carriage workings were also obtained for all areas save for the East Lincolnshire line. These make fascinating reading, and are packed with information.

Locomotive diagrams proved to be more difficult, but some were gleaned from contemporary magazines and the rest I put together as logically as possible. To give one example, if a King's Cross locomotive passed through northbound on a through working to Newcastle, it would not be seen again until time had



The station forecourt is alive with detail including timetables, signage, figures and more.

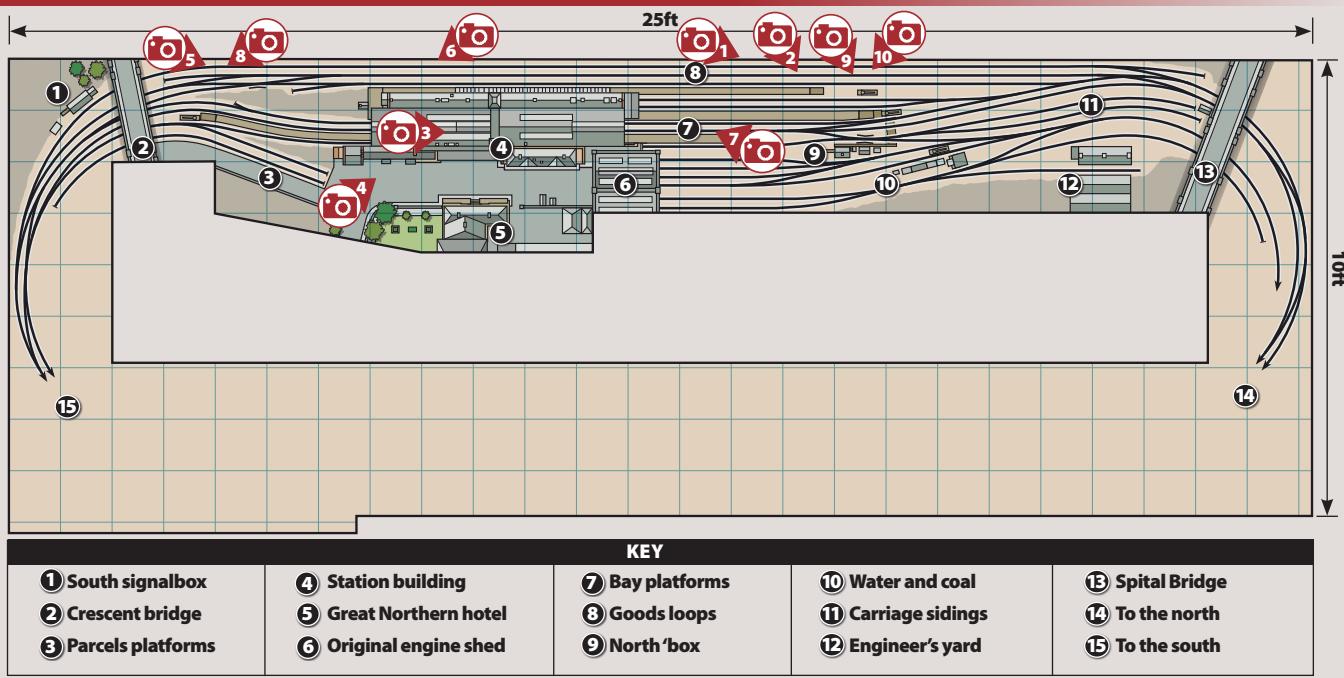
elapsed for it to finish its journey and be turned and serviced, and then get back to Peterborough North. This gave the perfect excuse to have lots of 'Pacifics'! I am aiming for realism and that is destroyed

if a locomotive passes through ostensibly bound for, say, Leeds and is seen again after half an hour has elapsed, particularly if it is travelling in the same direction.

The sequence is already 380 moves, »

and I keep adding more, so locomotives can spend a lot of time standing idle, but I've resigned myself to that. I'm not so strict with goods locomotives though. One 'WD' looks very much like another, so they have to work rather harder.

Then we come to the train formations and here common sense had to prevail. The ECML had lots of named trains, all of which had different formations. I've managed to include nearly all of them, though limited to a maximum of 11 coaches. Then there were the other express services, seven or eight

each to Leeds and Newcastle for example. I couldn't afford to do all of those, and would have no room to store them if I did, so I put together one up and one down service for each. They were originally intended to represent all the rest. The

same applied to some local stopping services - one rake had to do the job of all. That's why there is only one loaded

coal train too, and one of empties, though they are long and impressive rakes.

I admit that I didn't think storage through as well as I could have done, initially anyway. I designed an 18-road storage yard, using a well-known

type of plan, though I made sure that each road could be accessed from both up and down sides, so that those named expresses

could be seen travelling in both directions. You will not be surprised to hear that I soon filled the yard to bursting point.

It was about then that the penny dropped. I had built what was effectively an exhibition layout storage yard, but my layout will never leave home, so there are no time constraints so far as assembling and breaking up trains is concerned. I then converted one road in the yard to end into a cassette spur, and at a stroke solved many of my storage problems. I've refined things even more since, with the result that I can now put together a much larger selection of trains, and do so using a minimum amount of stock. This aspect really needs a separate article to do it justice, and with the editor's permission, one will appear in due course.

PETERBOROUGH IN DETAIL

For now, let us return to the other side of the room, and examine the layout in a bit more detail. I've built up a considerable library over the years, and have always snapped up any book about Peterborough as soon as it appeared, as it was always in the back of my mind as a potential model.

I scoured every book and magazine for useful photographs, and supplied as many as I could to Peter Leyland so we could get the infrastructure as correct as possible. As with many locations, most photographs were taken from a few vantage points, and a number of areas, the District Engineer's Department on the up side at the north end in particular, remain elusive and vague.

It soon became clear anyway that I couldn't do it all to scale, given the compression that had to be accepted, and so Peter and I have worked on the basis of putting in what looks right, even if it isn't exactly as it should be. For example, three original buildings still exist right at the back of where the District Engineer's yard »

used to be - it is now a car park, almost inevitably - so I asked Peter to build those, and then positioned them where they gave the best impression as a backdrop. Behind those was a main road and then terraced houses, the top storeys of which could be seen over the perimeter wall. I tried modelling those as a flat backscene, but wasn't happy with the result, and so asked Peter to do them in low relief. As you can see from the photographs, a very satisfactory impression of depth was the result. It is well worthwhile to be flexible and to be prepared to amend plans as things develop.

Peterborough library was very helpful when I contacted them and got out for me every relevant book they could find. They even found a copy of the original 1849 plans for the main buildings. Alas, these were of little practical use as there was a quite major alteration in later years, but it just shows what sort of information is out there if one is prepared to seek it out. Peter had to make all the buildings from photographs, and then scale them to fit the site, an enormous task. You won't fail to notice that there was an overall roof across the main running lines, and that fits to a tolerance of 1mm on the model. By my period that roof was literally falling to pieces and the end screens have been shown as in 1958. Within a couple of years a lot more had fallen off.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

The layout has so far been six years in the making and there is plenty more to do. Spital Bridge has been moved further to the right to give a closer resemblance to the real thing and Crescent Bridge will be replaced too. Then there are some more backscene areas I want to tackle as well, but the basics are well and truly in place. They more than match what I

hoped for when I started the project.

I still remember my first visit to Peterborough North in 1955 and can tell you that the first engine I saw coming under Crescent Bridge was 'A3' 4-6-2 60055 *Woolwinder* soon followed by 'A4' 60030 *Golden Fleece*. I have both locomotives, and can recreate those memories. There is a small crowd of spotters at the end of the down platform and I can join them when I wish and remember those long, lovely and innocent days - how we speculated about a locomotive called *Sandwich*, or mangled *Bois Rousell* into 'Boys Rustle'.

I have finally achieved what for most of my life was a seemingly impossible dream, so my advice would be not to give up on yours. Don't follow my example though. For many years I did nothing as I couldn't have

what I wanted. How I wish now that I had adjusted my sights to what was then possible and built something, even if it was just a small terminus to storage yard affair. I've

said before, whatever you do, do something.

What have I learned during this process? Plan thoroughly, and don't shy away from inconvenient facts. Be prepared to lower your sights if necessary. I've found that having a layout that looks like, and can be run like, the real thing has given me hours of pleasure and motivation that I have never before experienced in over 40 years of railway modelling. Research is necessary, and very interesting, but it can glue you to your armchair if you aren't careful.

Go on and create whatever it is that drives your dream and if you can't do all of that at the moment, why not try to do a bit of it? I hope you have enjoyed your time at Peterborough North in 1958. Is that a chime whistle I hear in the distance? I'd better grab my Tizer and sandwiches and go and see which 'streak' is coming through!

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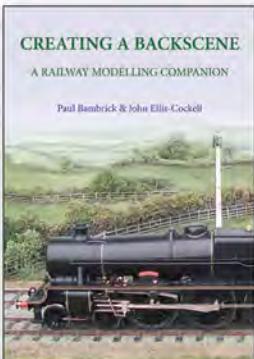


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HORNBY'S NEW VISION

With new direction, new terms of business and a new Chief Executive Officer, Hornby Hobbies is at the start of a bold plan to turn the business around. **MIKE WILD** meets with CEO Steve Cooke to discuss what is next for the hobby brand.



Quality products are at the forefront of Hornby's plans for the future.



HORNBY is synonymous with the seaside town of Margate. Its headquarters on Westwood Industrial Estate have long been its best-known home, but a lot has changed in the last 18 months and its recent financial problems have been well documented.

Today I'm taking a short tube ride from the bustle of London's King's Cross station to meet the company's new Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Steve Cooke at its London headquarters to discover how the household name in model railways is being turned around for a bright future.

The London office is one of three locations used by Hornby today with its main development teams for its UK brands located near Sandwich, Kent, and its central distribution warehouse located at Hersden in the same county.

Steve joined Hornby in June 2015 after a career which included high level positions with Sainsbury's and B&Q as well as financial director for a telecommunications business and property businesses. When he joined Hornby, Steve was appointed as finance director first and negotiated the business through the turbulent financial period of late 2015 and early 2016.

Following profit warnings to Hornby's shareholders in February 2016, Steve began his own analysis of what was going wrong and was later appointed as CEO in April 2016. He has since been instrumental in creating a new plan to take Hornby forward and lift it out of the financial troubles that it experienced in the first quarter of 2016.

NEW TERMS

At the beginning of October Hornby introduced new terms for its independent retailers as the starting point of a new business plan, alongside the need for significant cost savings. The first steps in regenerating Hornby's position in the market were a series of face to face meetings with independent retailers by Steve and his team to start learning

what needed to be done to take the business forward, and this is an ongoing process. Confident, calm and clear minded Steve's ability to listen to others and install change comes across, as he talks candidly about the results of his meetings: "The previous terms of business did the damage, together with the way we have traded in terms of the level of discounting and promotion of overhanging stock. There has been a lack of engagement and we haven't done things in the right way or listened to what our customers want. As a priority we are reconnecting with independent retailers, but there is a lot to do to regain their trust."

Hornby's European businesses have made losses and hurt the wider business. "In Europe it has been more a case of stripping out the old cost base and building new capability to support our brands," says Steve: "This operation is more in intensive care than the UK operation, but there are signs of strong brands within that division. We plan to maintain a European model railway business as it is important to Hornby's future."

A new business plan has been created for Hornby which is focused on getting the company back to making profit. Over to Steve: "2017/2018 will be our first year of profit and cash generation while 2016/2017 is a transition year to reach that point."

So, what is changing and how is Hornby going to generate cash? "We will thin out activity across the brands and reduce costs where we can. We have had to look at the situation in black and white to see where we make money and where we don't," Steve says. "The underlying message is that the UK operation is doing okay, but we set sales targets too high for the 2015/2016 period and

that caused us problems."

Essentially, Steve and his team found that during 2015 sales targets being set too high were a root cause of problems. Overstock resulted and was followed by flash sales through Hornby's own channels. That is promised to be a thing of the past as Hornby works to rebuild confidence with independent retailers and customers alike.

Steve expands on the theme: "Following this we have introduced new terms of business, eradicated the level of discounted promotions as seen in 2015 and we will be increasing our level of communication and interaction with all customers."

"We have already picked up that the change in terms with independent retailers is going down well and we will be sticking to our word and trading the way we have set out in the new terms of business - but we have to prove that too. However, there is a big job to be done to rebuild the business and particularly in marketing and sales."

BACK ON TRACK

Hornby has clearly made good inroads into delivering its products over the past 18 months with a steady stream of new locomotives arriving in the shops including the Crosti '9F' 2-10-0, 'J50' 0-6-0T, 'S15' 4-6-0, 'D16' 4-4-0 and 'King' 4-6-0 in 2015 followed by the Adams 'Radial' 4-4-2T, BR Class 71 Bo-Bo and Raven 'Q6' in 2016. Soon they will be joined by the LNER 'B12' 4-6-0 (see Reviews) and Peckett 'W4' 0-4-0ST.

Part of this success has been down to Hornby's changeover to multiple factory sites in the Far East which means it can work through more projects simultaneously. Steve is cautious though: "The way we do things now with multiple vendors is working, and working well on a daily basis but I'm not complacent about that situation and we monitor it closely."

What is next from Hornby and what can we expect from the range in 2017? "The size of the range will vary by brand and we are working

through the 2017 line plans on an ongoing basis to ensure we have the right quantity and types of products," Steve says. "There are going to be reductions, but this needs to be seen against the significant growth in product numbers over recent years. We are going to be pulling it back to where it has been before which gives me confidence - but there will be a reduction compared to 2015 and 2016."

Happily, new announcements for the 2017 range are starting to feed through Hornby's Engine Shed blog including the Wainwright 'H' 0-4-4T in late September (HM112) and most recently extensions to its popular collection of BR Mk 1 carriages to include the Brake Second Open and First Open (see Update) which is a strong sign that the development team is still working hard.

Steve is adamant that he wants the business to walk before it can run again. "It's one step at a time and anything we do we need to do properly. For the moment, we are just going to do the basics and do them well. We are going to play to our strengths."

The reigning in of the 2017 line plans is all about supporting Hornby's need to deliver on the first stage of its new plan: "Then we will decide on further plans for how we continue to improve on serving the market," adds Steve.

FUTURE PRICING

Price points are an important factor, and Steve is aware of this. "Price sensitivity is important, but equally rising costs have to be carried somewhere."

More price rises are on the horizon and Steve and his team are actively following changes in exchange rates following recent increases in the costs of imported goods. He comments: "We recently increased prices by around 10% following the fall in the value of the pound against the dollar. Since then the pound has fallen further and while we are always looking at ways of reducing the impact of this on our customers, we are having to keep this area under constant review."

Hornby is confident in its market position and knows that the Hornby brand is much stronger in the hobby market than the toy market with a 4:1 split in sales. "We are a majority hobbyist business," Steve comments, "but the story does differ between the brands."

Steve is confident of Hornby and its future, seeing its strengths as the great brands and its ability to deliver quality products. He is aware of the past, but seems committed to a bright future for the household name.

Steve has the last word: "We have been in a bad place, but we are feeling good about the future and moving forward. Nothing is an overnight fix, but we are committed to listening and talking to all our customers to make Hornby successful again."

He's in charge of one of Britain's most loved names, and seems to be relishing the challenge of reinvigorating Hornby. Many readers will remember the dark days of the 1980s when releases often lacked in quality compared to their rivals. That's long been a thing of the past – and after a tricky few years, it seems that the future is looking brighter for a manufacturer synonymous with model railways in Britain. There are going to be kinks in the tracks ahead, but the 'right away' has been given and the signals are clear for a sound and exciting future. 

Ringing the CHANGES

Operating your layout with only a limited selection of classes is entirely prototypical – but how do you make near-identical engines look different? **TIM SHACKLETON** shows how you can do it through weathering effects alone.

WHEREVER you went in steam days, you'd see the same classes over and over again. If you went round the sheds at Crewe or Carlisle in the mid-1960s you could pretty well clear your 'Britannias' – some clean, some more presentable, some absolutely filthy. In the West Riding, where I lived, you'd see an awful lot of 'WD' 2-8-0s – ten of them to one of anything else and, on a Sunday morning shed bash, around the Wakefield area you could reckon on seeing a hundred or more.

Meanwhile on the Southern Region's Bournemouth line, every other train seemed to be hauled by a Bulleid 'Pacific', once again showing an extraordinary variety of external appearance as well as a vast range of detail differences.

The reason for this apparent lack of diversity is that particular classes suited particular needs so well there was little need to change them for anything else. In the East Midlands, for instance, Robinson's 'O4' 2-8-0s dominated coal traffic for

decades because they were perfectly matched to the job. The Beattie '0298' well tanks, as is well known, enjoyed a long-term monopoly of the Bodmin and Wenfordbridge line, while in my neck of the woods, Fowler and Fairburn 2-6-4Ts had a stranglehold on duties such as parcels and stopping passenger services. When the latter were dieselised, traffic was handled by just two classes of Diesel Multiple Unit – Metropolitan-Cammell power twin two-car sets on local workings and three-car BRCW 'Calder Valley' units for longer-distance trains.

Very few locomotives are truly identical – no two Bulleid 'Pacifics' were quite the same and I can bore for England on the detail nuances of present-day Class 66 power! Whatever era you model, operating several examples of the same class is highly prototypical but it needn't lead to a mind-numbing sameness. The more variation you can provide (especially in the way they're weathered), the more realistic the results will be.

On many model railways, however, pretty well every locomotive you see will be from a different class. The weathering treatment, on the other hand, may be much the same on each of them! This isn't how it was by any stretch of the imagination – to sustain interest you need a balance between variety and uniformity, but of course it's your layout and you can run it as you wish.

Taking the Western Region branch line as an example, the chances are that all you'd ever see in the real world would be a 'Pannier' or a 'Small Prairie', with three or four of each (all of them in some way different to one another) allocated to branch duties on a cycle governed by traffic patterns and boiler washouts.

For this step by step guide I'm going to take a couple of Hornby's superb 'Q6' 0-8-0s and use subtle variations in weathering to show how you can emphasise the detail differences between near-identical locomotives. **Fun**



The preserved 'Q6' in close up



Almost 50 years later, while oiling round the sole surviving 'Q6' prior to a firing turn on the North Yorkshire Moors Railway, my friend Alan Whitehouse took these detail shots of the weathering for me. 'If modellers had to prep and dispose their own locomotives,' says Alan, 'they'd be running little other than BR 'Standards'! Rocking grates and hopper ashpans were no more than a disposal crew's dream when the 'Q6' was designed.'



In a scene that could have been captured at any number of North Eastern sheds, from Neville Hill to Tyne Dock, two very different looking 'Q6s' catch the early light as they wait between turns. Slated for withdrawal in the early 1960s, the class lasted well into 1967 because the promised English Electric Type 3s (Class 37) were diverted to the Western Region instead. The surviving 'Q6s' were fettled and patched up but by the time the diesels finally came, many of them were on their last legs.



STEP BY STEP WEATHERING 'Q6S' TO CREATE DETAIL DIFFERENCES

As a pre-grouping design found only in a very specific part of the country, Hornby's Q6 is as niche a ready to run product as you're ever likely to find. The different models feature some intriguing detail variations, such as the two kinds of tender seen on the early and late-crest versions.

2

On my final visit to Tyne Dock shed in September 1967 I was surprised to see one of the last active 'Q6s' looking unnaturally clean after attention from the North East Locomotive Preservation Group. This schoolboy shot was the inspiration for my portrayal of 63443.

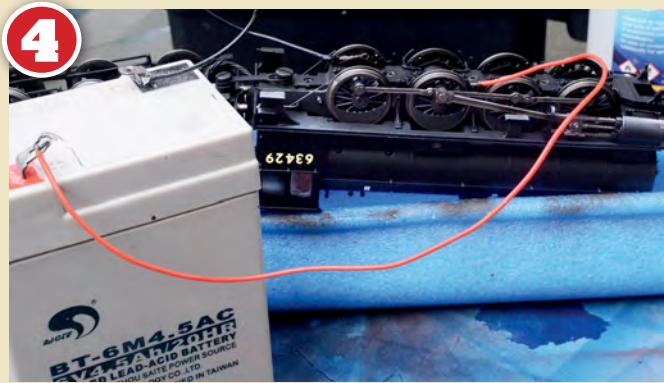

I airbrushed the underframes with an assortment of shades blended from three complementary Lifecolor products – old favourites Frame Dirt (UA719) and Burned Black (UA736) along with a touch of Wood – Warm Base Coat (UA714). Each colour is thoroughly stirred for a couple of minutes with a battery-powered paint mixer. Poor paint preparation, especially with acrylics, is one of the main reason your airbrush becomes blocked.

Between each pass with the airbrush you'll need to turn the wheels round so you don't get a 'paint shadow' behind the coupling rods. I use a couple of leads from a 6v battery. The locomotive can stay inverted in a foam cradle throughout the process of weathering the underframe.

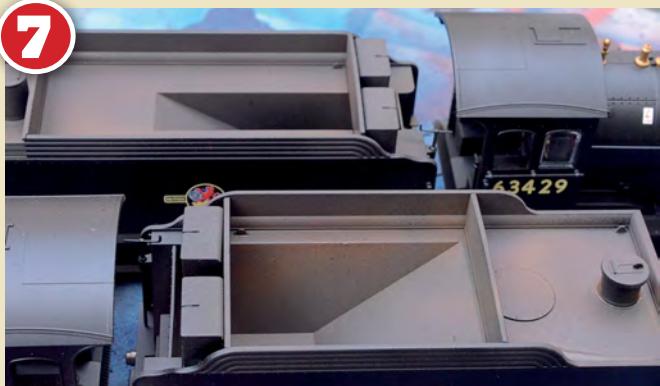
Adding detail weathering to areas such as the front steps. Lifecolor UA714 is virtually interchangeable with Humbrol's No 62 Matt Leather. This kind of close-quarters work is only possible with a quality airbrush – at least when done freehand, as here.

While the more orangey blend was in the colour cup, I added some basic rust discolouration to the tender tops. The differences between the two designs are readily apparent in this view.

7



When covering large areas, the strident tones of rust-coloured paint are best knocked back using an overlay of a darker colour, in this case Burned Black (UA736).

8



The smokebox is the hottest part of the boiler and the paintwork invariably exhibits a much warmer tone than the rest of the locomotive. I mixed a suitable shade from Burned Black (UA736) and Wood – Warm Base Coat (UA714) and airbrushed it on, using a card as a makeshift mask. Even though the weathering process is barely under way, the immaculate red buffer beams are starting to look a bit unreal.

9



That's soon dealt with! In the North East they had their own version of buffer beam red, which was more of a buffer beam black. Be sure to weather the underside of the buffers, by the way – on far too many models (including some of my own) spraying from above leaves bright red patches where the weathering paint can't reach!

I treated the running plates on both 'Q6s' to a blend of Lifecolor Sleeper Grime (UA721) and Worn Black (UA736). This harmonises perfectly with the LifeColor weathering shades I used earlier.



11

Real-life weathering doesn't look airbrush-smooth – it has all kinds of random marks and patterns, recreated here on the cab sides by dabbing with a piece of kitchen roll dipped in thinners.

Once the tender sides have been lightly misted with similar blends of colour, the two locomotives are starting to look the part. At this point I usually put down my airbrush and go over to hand finishing. This is also the stage at which weathering with acrylic paint largely gives way to enamels.

STEP BY STEP WEATHERING 'Q6S' TO CREATE DETAIL DIFFERENCES

The boiler of a steam locomotive quickly becomes encrusted with a rich deposit of sooty ash which is gradually washed down its sides until the whole boiler is covered in it. Engine Grime from AK-Interactive (AK082) is a great starting point. Brush it on liberally but try to keep it from spattering on to adjacent areas such as the running plate. Use a broad, flat brush for this work.

To recreate the characteristic fine streaking, gently stroke the Engine Grime down the boiler and at the same time try and remove as much of it as possible using a flat brush – a clean, newish one this time – lightly moistened with white spirit.

15



Pictures of the real 63429 show what appear to be rubbing marks on the bottom of the boiler – possibly from fitters' shoulders as they work on the inside motion while kneeling on the running plate. I recreated this effect by stabbing away at the nearly-dry Engine Grime with a stiff, cut-down brush.

16



The outcome is a subtle, understated exercise in texture that exactly mirrors the prototype. Nothing on a locomotive wants to be too extreme.

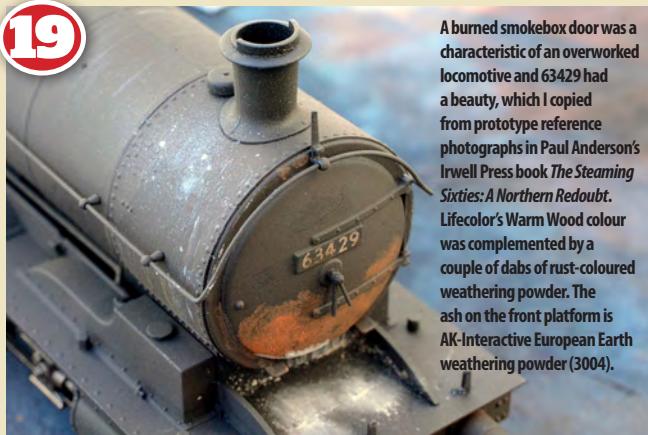


The next stage was to add a second level of streaking. I got this under way with MIG Ammo's Rainmarks Effects (208), a thin creamy-beige colour applied with a fine brush. Obviously it's not meant to look like this on the finished locomotive.



I've put on a further airbrushed coat of Burned Black to tone down the Rainmarks and blend them in with the existing layers of boiler weathering. So small is the amount of paint used, you can carry on this process of paint/tone down paint/tone down almost indefinitely until you have the effect you want.

A burned smokebox door was a characteristic of an overworked locomotive and 63429 had a beauty, which I copied from prototype reference photographs in Paul Anderson's Irwell Press book *The Steaming Sixties: A Northern Redoubt*. Lifecolor's Warm Wood colour was complemented by a couple of dabs of rust-coloured weathering powder. The ash on the front platform is AK-Interactive European Earth weathering powder (3004).

20



I hand-painted the mysterious graphics on the leading sandbox, while the curious white spatters below the chimney (pigeon droppings?) were airbrushed on at very low pressure. The streaks were represented by dragging Humbrol Satin Black (85) over a patch of rust-coloured weathering powder. All these highly individualised effects were faithfully copied from a good close-up photograph.

21



A single, solitary dribble has run down from one of 63443's washout plugs. Otherwise, this particular 'Q6' is in reasonably good condition for a hard-working mineral engine. Note the scuff marks on the running plate (European Earth again) as well as the oil on the motion, from AK-Interactive Fuel Stains (AK025). Alan Whitehouse's reference photographs came in very useful here.

The two 'Q6's' side by side, showing the very different patterns of discolouration, rust and weathering. The boiler on the right-hand locomotive (63443) is significantly blacker and shinier than that on 63429.

The variations between the two locomotives aren't vast – they wouldn't be on two locomotives working in the same area on the same kind of heavy mineral traffic – but are sufficient to differentiate between the two.

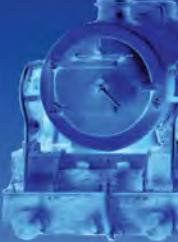

It's a similar story at the back end – similarities and differences. One engine clean-ish, the other not so. The 'early' crest didn't disappear as soon as the later version came out in 1956, and the two could be seen side by side.

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Dressing **LOCH DHU**

During the construction of the distillery buildings, **NIGEL BURKIN** completes the exchange siding scene of the 'OO' gauge Loch Dhu Distillery micro-layout by detailing the scenery.

LARGE IN SIZE and scope for such a small layout, the distillery buildings were always going to be time consuming to complete for the Loch Dhu project.

As light relief from styrene card structure modelling, I made progress on the exchange siding scene located on the opposite side of my double-sided compact layout design.

The scene needed to be dressed with a smattering of details and scenery items that had been prepared on the workbench. The aim was to create the impression of a run-down railway prior to full closure which was slowly becoming overgrown and unkempt. Such a location could not afford to be over-detailed.

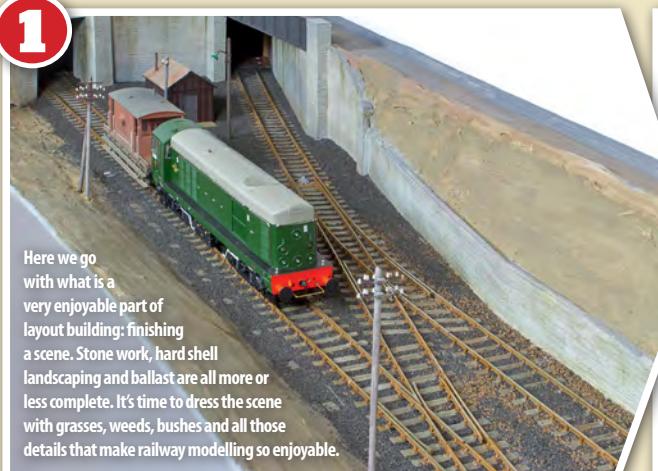
Whilst every detail applied to a micro-layout has to work hard for the space allocated to it this does not mean that a scene such as this should be crammed with details. Neutral space still has an important role to play and that has been the aim in this project - not to overuse any area of space around the railway.



STEP BY STEP LAYOUT DRESSING AND SCENERY DETAIL

Here we go with what is a very enjoyable part of layout building: finishing a scene. Stone work, hard shell landscaping and ballast are all more or less complete. It's time to dress the scene with grasses, weeds, bushes and all those details that make railway modelling so enjoyable.

Knowing that I had to install point rodding, one side of the main track was left clear of ballast.



The process of adding ground cover, trees, shrubs and scenic details to a layout is often called 'dressing the layout' because, in a similar manner to set dressers in the film industry, that is exactly what you will be doing to finish the scene.

THE PROCESS

So, how was the scene completed once hard shell landscaping, structure modelling and track ballasting was complete? I am always keen to progress a layout in a given order of work to avoid damaging previously applied scenery and details. It is a great idea to scribble down a list of tasks that need to be completed and order them before reaching for the scenery glue. For example, I did not install or paint the point rodding until all of the static grass work was complete and excess grass fibres removed from the layout. There's the danger of crushing grass down during the fitting of such details. However, it is preferable to fit some detail after grass application than before – because removing stray grass fibres from fine scenic details is not that easy!

The last thing you wish to see is hints of white plaster hard shell peeking through your ground cover. It is always advisable to paint it with a pigment which will soak into the surface. I usually use Woodland Scenics C1229 Earth Undercoat pigment which is diluted equally with water and applied in several coats. It is sufficient to cover the white plaster completely, allowing the first shot of static grass to be applied.

Static grass is one of those new modelling technologies (I say new, but the idea has bounced around for years) which has supplanted ground foam for ground cover. Apply it in layers starting with short grasses, usually green in colour and work up to a second and even a third thin layer of dead-coloured grasses.

The first shot I applied was made over a coating of craft glue called 'Mod Podge', diluted »

sufficiently to apply with a brush, but with a consistency that would not run off the steeply inclined embankment to the rear of the scene. It consisted of short green fibres of either 2mm or 4.5mm length over which bushes, bracken and light applications of longer dried grasses will be applied. The late summer season means that many wild flowers will have gone to seed long ago – don't be tempted, when modelling September, to throw flowers around too much.

On the permanent way, the base layer of ground cover required to represent weeds encroaching over the cess is Woodland Scenics fine turf. This was covered with a fine layer of Early Fall and Short Hay grasses by Mini-Natur, mixed in the static grass applicator.

WEEDS AND SHORT GRASSES

Weeds are represented by the odd spot of ground foam whilst short grasses were introduced to the permanent way, particularly the siding, using static grass tufts prepared earlier at the workbench. The method I use to make my own grass tufts was described in an earlier edition of *Hornby Magazine* using a metal plate, Mod Podge glue and my Nnoch applicator. I made so many at the time that there was sufficient for this project after using them on two scenic dioramas.

To use the clumps, I simply placed a spot of glue on a dish and dipped the bottom of each clump in it before applying to the desired spot on the layout. Tweezers are very useful in these instances.

BUSHES

Very effective bushes can be made with three materials: Woodland Scenics Poly Fibre, fine turf and dilute craft glue such as Mod Podge. The glue is prepared by mixing it with water

so it is thinned sufficiently to be applied through a hand pump spray. Poly fibre is torn into small pieces and sprayed with dilute glue until it is soaked but not flattened.

Lightly sprinkle fine turf ground foam such as Woodland Scenics T44 green grass over the Poly Fibre until it is covered throughout with a thin layer of leaves. Place to one side to dry. Mix and match foliage colours to suit your season and the desired texture. For example, with the late summer season, some 'bushes' were coated with olive-coloured Nnoch leaves to show the start of leaves beginning to turn colour with autumn approaching.

The bushes were further cut and torn apart before being applied to the layout with white craft glue. They were applied over the first shot of static grass and the edges blended in with a small quantity of coarse turf and longer static grass. The foliage on the bushes can be carefully topped up if some has been lost during planting. The final touch was to dry brush a hint of orange and yellow acrylic paint on to some of the foliage to suggest the start of autumn colours and leaf fall.

A signature plant I wished to represent on the layout is the all-invasive bracken, a successful fern which loves to inhabit the acidic soils of northern Scotland (as well as many other places in the UK). Whilst Scottish estates go to a great deal of trouble to eliminate bracken, I wish to do the opposite and plant some groups of it on the layout. Etched brass bracken (Scale Link) won't spread like the real thing, so I am pretty confident of keeping it under control!

The etched bracken frond sheet by Scale Link is very nicely modelled and can be used in a variety of ways. I chose to cut each stem of fronds from the etch, bend them to shape and paint using Tamiya olive green followed

up with a light green by Vallejo. Once dry, they were planted in a group on the embankment using neat craft glue – not an easy task as the etched fronds are not flexible and frequently caught each other. Patience soon sees the bracken in place ready for a final colour touch using yellow red rust colours to show it starting to die back with the approach of autumn.

Spare bracken fronds left over on the etched sheet can be used to create the »

Brass tube was inserted in the hard shell landscape to accommodate removable telegraph poles which would get in the way of layout photography if left in place.

The telegraph pole located on top of the overbridge is also fitted to brass tube to allow its removal for photography and repairs.

Final colouring of stone bridge walls and abutments was completed using dry brushing techniques together with tan coloured acrylic paint.

Water staining and algae has also left its mark on the structure. Brushing with Tamiya Olive Green (XF-58) acrylic paint is very effective at creating algae trails.

Prior to the first shot of static grass, the track was protected from glue and stray grass fibres. Masking tape applied to retaining walls and the track usually does the trick.

Pieces of cardboard are effective at preventing glue and scenery material from becoming glued in areas where they are not wanted.

With protective coverings in place, the static grass can be shot onto the layout using either a static bottle applicator or a more sophisticated electric method such as a faithful Nohc applicator.

Static grass is applied to a diluted layer of white glue or craft glue such as 'Mod Podge'.

The first shot of 4.5mm tall Mini Natur grass fibres is now complete in this view. It is given a further spray of diluted scenery glue to seal it in place before the second layer is applied.

It was during a photographic session that I noted the abutment of one of the bridges was out of true. This was removed before further progress was made on ground cover and adjusted. It turns out that the inner bridge wall was also out of true.

more rosette shape of different fern species, painted light green over grey primer and planted under trees and in shady corners.

It's then back to static grasses and separate grass fibre products from Woodland Scenics (FG171 natural straw field grass) to create the longer, dried out grass stalks that grow above the base layer of grass. Use them to blend in the edges of bushes and to grow amongst the bracken fronds too.

SCENIC DETAILS

Finally, with all of the scenic elements in place and the excess vacuumed or brushed away, the time for the scenic details has arrived. I glued the bothy in place, adding some of the detritus of railway operations around it including oil drums, track tools and various other bits and bobs. I raked around in my spares box to find

useful items which were prepared and painted at the workbench before being added to the layout. Also fitted at this stage were the telegraph poles, painted figures, ground frame and a few other small details. Keep an eye on such details while glue is setting – figures have a nasty habit of leaning over just at the critical moment when your back is turned!

Take photographs of the layout at each stage of construction. I naturally do this when planning to write up a project for my blog or the magazine anyway, but have found it a useful technique to check progress on any given scene. One of the images taken after completing the hard shell landscaping revealed that the overbridge concealing the main line's exit to the staging area was out of true (see image 2) – something I had not previously noticed. When you come across something which really jars like

that, be prepared to rework the area and as soon as possible, before continuing with the project.

There's no loss of kudos in doing so; the review of your work as you make progress down your to do list is a great technique. Mobile phone cameras make this process so much easier too.

WHERE NEXT?

As far as the Loch Dhu Distillery project is concerned, I have numerous structures to complete for the distillery scene which is opposite the exchange siding scene featured here. One challenge is to make up the large number of wooden casks found in the typical distillery yard and in some of the open wagons of the time. Another is to create the stone colours and black fungus staining typical of distillery structures too. Not all distilleries were pristine ready for visiting tourists!

Bushes were made up of Woodland Scenics Poly Fibre covered with green turf scatter or Noch leaves secured with scenic glue or hair spray.

Scale Link foliage etchings were used to create the ever-present bracken which thrives in the mild damp climate of the Scottish Highlands.

Individual stalks of bracken are created by cutting each frond set from the etch and bending it to shape. Once painted and planted, quite thick areas of bracken growth can be created.



16

Pulling the scenic details together after assembly and painting at the workbench. They include figures, foliage features, oil drums, telegraph line poles and tools.



17

Having corrected the bridge walls, the dirt track on the top can be treated to a growth of short grasses and some weeds courtesy of the static grass applicator.

Bushes and bracken are applied to the embankment to the rear of the scene. The post and pole fence marks the edge of the local road.



19

The track where locomotives stand for any period of time is weathered with a variety of shades of black but not pure black – that would be too stark. The paint is applied using dry brushing using an old paintbrush.



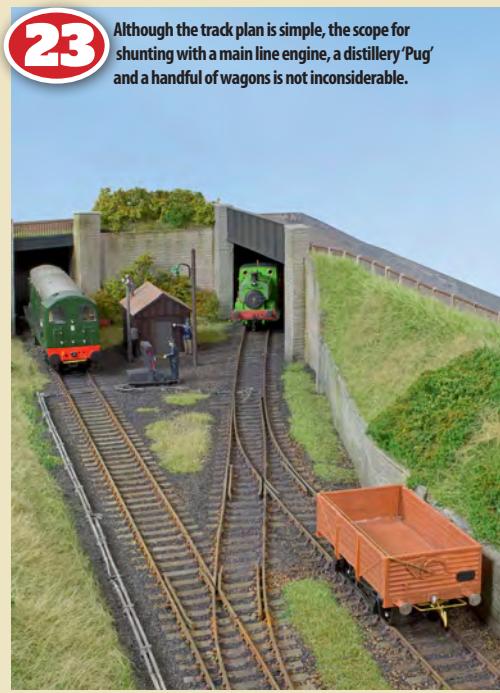

The layout is modelled in September when trees are beginning to turn for autumn and bracken is taking on an edge of yellows and rust colours. I used rust colours by Life Color to dry brush foliage and leaves to change the colours to a more early autumn appearance.

The cinder ballast is shaded with light greys and tan colours to take away its stark appearance.

Although the track plan is simple, the scope for shunting with a main line engine, a distillery 'Pug' and a handful of wagons is not inconsiderable.

Note how some leaves on the bushes are turning orange and yellow whilst the remaining green leaves have taken on a tinge of olive colour. The autumn colours are rust shades dry brushed on to the foliage.

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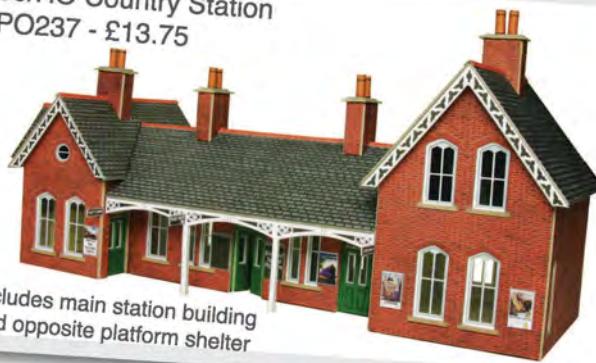
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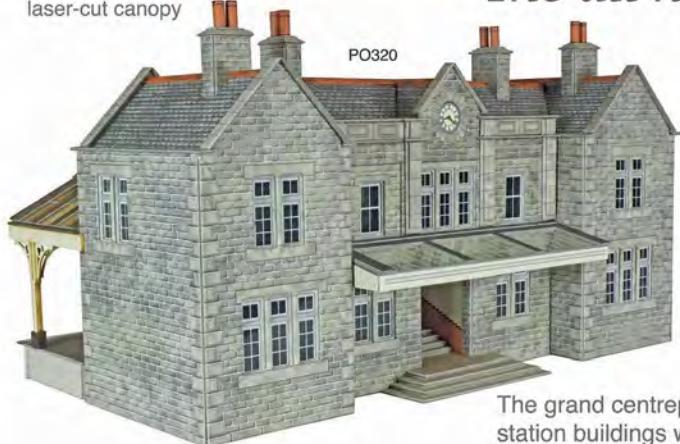
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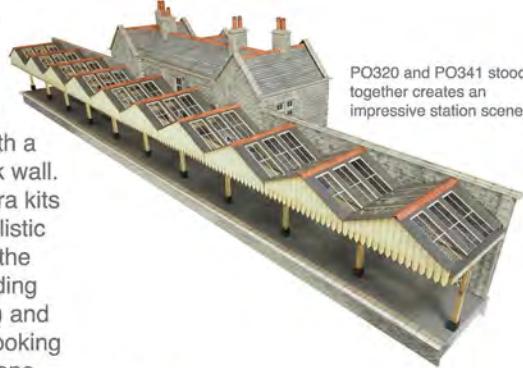
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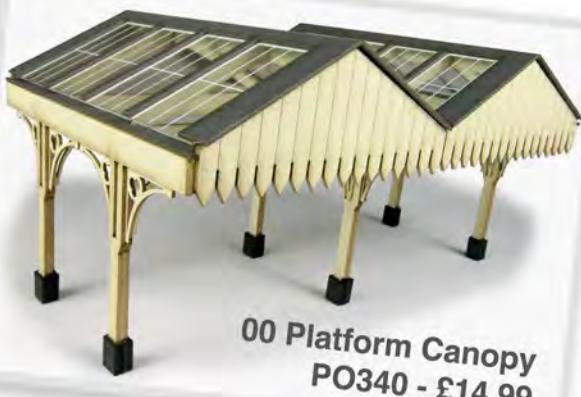
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There's a prototype for everything

I WANT YOU TO KNOW HOW USEFUL AND interesting I find your periodic articles on train formations in the BR era.

When you have covered every type of traffic, may I suggest that you consider publishing the series as a standalone paperback publication, please? I am sure that having such a volume will address many arguments about

prototypical operation among modellers!

I sometimes run a green era Diesel Multiple Unit (DMU) with a cattle wagon or fruit van carrying produce from local market gardens on the tail end. When doing so, I am usually challenged by other rail enthusiasts and modellers on the legitimacy of such a train formation.

The prototype for that formation was the late afternoon all-stations stopper, our school train, from Kingswear to Exeter in Devon. In

both steam and DMU days in the late 1950s and early 1960s that train regularly had a van on the back conveying local produce to market. I well remember sitting in the rear seats of the then brand new DMU watching the van bounce along behind us along the sea wall between Teignmouth, where I attended school, and Dawlish where I lived. I've also seen a photograph of one of the single car parcels railcars in green livery with 'speed whiskers' leaving Paddington in the 1960s with a maroon BR Mk 1 full brake in tow. I guess that there were more parcels that day (pre-Christmas?) than the DMU alone could handle!

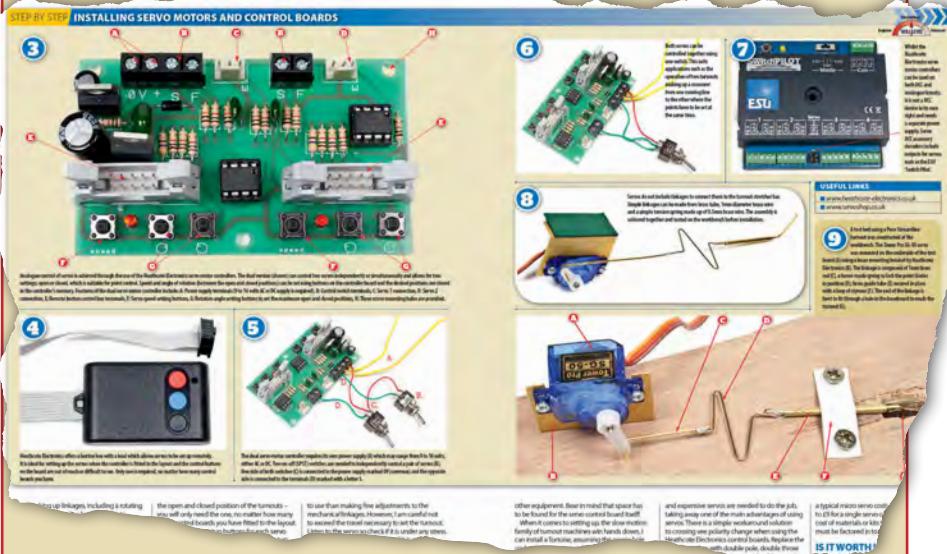
MODELLERS ARE NOT MONEY PITS!

MERG offers support for servos



I am an advocate of using servos for model railway applications, and was pleased to read HM113's feature about the control of points using servos.

However, contrary to what the article suggests I have found that even micro servos provide more than enough torque to operate one or more micro-switches in addition to move point blades.

The Model Electronic Railway Group (MERG) has published information about servo use. It has developed kits and controllers

for everyday use with model railways. For example, there are MERG servo controller kits and kits to adapt servos mechanically for different applications. You can use servos not just for points operation but also signals and, for example, working level-crossing gates. The MERG servo mounting cradles are designed also to accommodate up to four microswitches operated as the servo performs its task.

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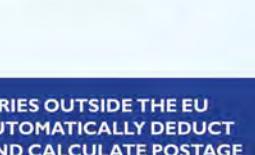

*With a long history of 'OO' gauge exhibition layouts, Barnhill Model Railway Club decided to look to a larger scale for its latest project. **EDDIE MICHEL** reveals the story of this fascinating 'O' gauge exhibition layout set in Bristol around the time of nationalisation.*

BACK IN 2010 as a group of modellers we were still very much into producing our 'OO' gauge railways and Kingsfield, our large 'OO' exhibition layout (HM30) was still very much on the exhibition circuit (and still is). We have been producing 'OO' gauge layouts since Barnhill MRC evolved in the early eighties and the only deviation was an 'N' gauge exhibition layout called Chipbury. However, a couple of members in the group had quite fancied the move up into the larger scales for some time, so we felt the time was now right to have a go.

As with all things you have to start somewhere and we thought if we were to do this, it would be best if we started building/

collecting stock first before even entertaining building a layout. I am a keen Great Western Railway (GWR) follower and decided that I would like to build stock from the latter end of the GWR period and Phil, another club member, was slightly more interested in early BR Western Region steam. So a plan evolved that we would try to concentrate on items from the period 1947 to 1950.

Stock building started in earnest and within a few years we had produced quite a few items that we could run. In 2013 it was felt that we might now be able to progress towards a layout, so I put together some plans for a new 'O' gauge layout. As always the location would be fictitious but would try to be prototypical of the period/location.

The first design that we started was

much larger than Kingsbury and it soon became apparent that we would not be able to build this as our clubroom was mainly my conservatory during the winter months and a gazebo in the garden during the spring and summer. Sometimes we »

were fortunate and had an extension to the 'clubroom' in the form of another gazebo.

The eventual design we decided on was to have a country station just bordering on the edge of the suburbs of Bristol. So our fictitious plan was for a single track branch line with a passing loop, a bay platform (to serve a second route), a few sidings, a small engine shed and something we always try to include into a layout - some water. This was to be the canal that runs for 20ft along the front of the layout.

To enhance the appearance of the layout we laid the track so that it flows with gentle curves as if following the lie of the land.



The single station platform was made on a slight curve to allow the track to move from the rear towards the front of the boards. The size of the layout is 45ft x 3ft wide and is constructed on eight 5ft x 3ft baseboards with two small end sections. As this was an exhibition end-to-end layout we decided early on that we did not want to waste any public viewing space at the front, so the scenery runs the whole length of the board except for the two small end sections. These small end sections actually support the pivots for the traverser.

CONSTRUCTION

Building started in late 2013 with the boards being constructed from 4in deep side battens, cross-members and MDF tops, which can be heavy but are very robust. The layout is supported with the same legs as used for our previous layouts. All

the track on the layout is Peco and the live frog points are powered by Tortoise point motors. The track is laid on cork with the track pins inserted through a hole drilled through the chair bolt hole, so no fixings are visible. Dropper wires were then added for all the electrical connections. The track was then ballasted by Brian who has had the thankless task of ballasting all our layouts, but as usual he did a great job.

The layout is analogue and power to the track is supplied by a Morley twin controller that has the additional facility of being able to add handheld plug in units. This is then mounted in a purpose built panel with an aluminium top section which has the track diagram and all the relevant switches and buttons to operate the layout. Light Emitting Diodes on the panel identify point position and live track sections for ease of operation. Wiring on the layout is conventional with isolated sections, although each board can be plugged into the panel independently to test, which made building a lot easier.

Dingham couplings are used on the rolling stock. They are operated by an electro-magnet under the track, and buttons are mounted on the panel for the operator at various locations on the layout.

The storage yards at each end are 8ft long pivoted traversers which can hold a three or four-coach train depending on the locomotive hauling it. They are hidden from view to the public by large scenery sections and have six roads on each so quite a few different trains can be set up at the start of a show. Originally, when the layout first appeared in April 2015, the storage yard was operated by using removable cartridges. However, it became apparent that these were really awkward to move due to train lengths and took longer to set up for each train. There was also the fear that when moving them someone may drop one which could be rather expensive. »

STRUCTURES

Buildings on the layout are a mixture of scratchbuilt and kit bashed. The main station building and canopy is made from Skytrex parts, and has been modified to resemble a typical GWR station. The main goods shed was built by Phil from our own plan and is an MDF structure with beamed roof, plasticard covering on the walls and individual tile and planking strips. A small canopy is fitted to the front and there is a crane mounted inside. A large Skytrex crane also complements the goods shed on the end of the platform.

The engine shed is a Skytrex kit but has a scratchbuilt water tower mounted over the small office at the rear of the shed. Phil,

who built this, had many wonderful hours putting the rivets on the water tank, which he enjoyed immensely as they were stuck on strips supplied by Archer which mostly stuck to his fingers at every opportunity. Brian stepped up to the challenge of building and painting all the low relief Skytrex houses and shops. The shops are yet to be fitted out inside, but they already complement the layout greatly. There are also other various buildings and a bottle kiln with its associated outbuildings.

Scenery on the layout was done with a view that the countryside was obviously there first, so we have a nice gentle sweep to the land as if the railway sits between two higher land masses. The foundations of the

scenery are polystyrene blocks, shaped and then covered in plaster soaked cloths with added brown poster paint. Once set all the scenery sections were covered in various types of flocks. Once dry a layer of different static grasses was added. This gives volume and a nice base below the longer grass. Bushes were constructed from rubberised horse hair teased out and covered in flocks and then pinned and glued in place. The trees on the layout are actually from another 'O' gauge layout and are on loan to us from Ian Atkinson, who is one of our members and lives just outside Blackpool. We will eventually have our own but these are very nice and finish the countryside scene well.

The canal dominates the front of the

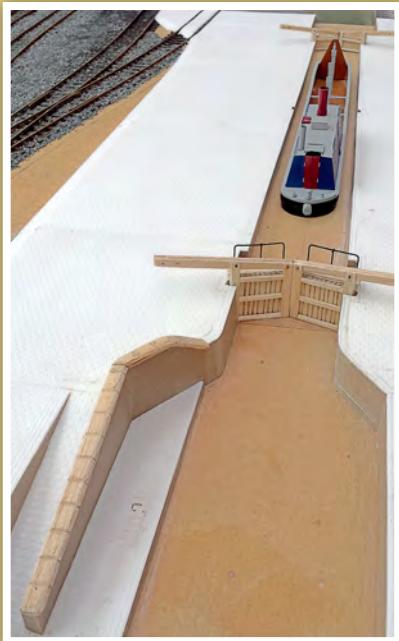
layout with its lock. The design was taken from one of our local locks in Bristol, so is true to the area. The water in the canal is a mixture of various Humbrol paints mixed to get that still water canal colour. Some other colours were added whilst the paint was still wet to add depth and movement. Once dried a final coat of gloss marine varnish gave it that feel of real water. A couple of cranes are mounted on the canal side for unloading with various loads scattered about between the trackside and the canal side. Two canal boats were constructed by Brian from Skytrex kits.

Signalling on the layout has only been added this year and had its first appearance on the layout at the 2016 Bristol model

railway exhibition. The signalling diagram was completed first, then designs done for the signals. All the signals are built from brass, with various SME and Scale Signal Supply parts. They are on their own brass bases with servo motors underneath. These then plug into the layout and are controlled by a lever frame mounted on the panel with power fed through Heathcote electronics servo controllers. The signals were all made detachable from the layout as previous experience has shown that they can become easily damaged and are very difficult to fix. The whole signalling system can also operate independently from the layout so can be used for different layouts in the future. »

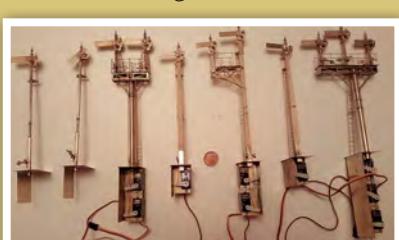

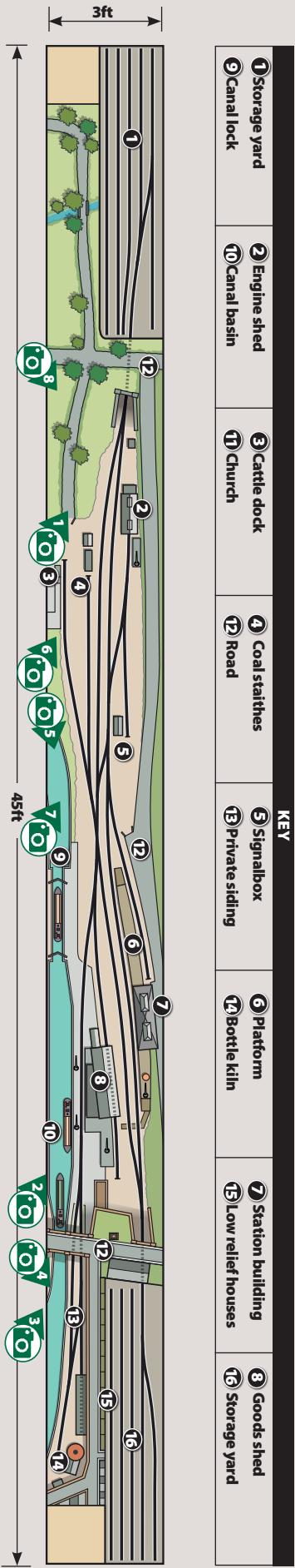

ROLLING STOCK

Stock on the layout is a mix of GWR, very early British Railways and London Midland & Scottish Railway (LMS) liveried classes. A few lines had joint running over different sections and we thought that it would give us more scope to the trains we run. Fortunately, Ian is an LMS man and has numerous amounts of suitable 'O' gauge stock so it was great that we can have that mix. I aim to base my collection of Great Western engines from around the Bristol area. Two locomotives that operate on the layout are 6876 *Kingsland Grange* and 7801 *Anthony Manor* (supplied by FineScaleBrass). Both of these locomotives were Bristol engines in 1948, so they fit our fictitious location and the type of line well.

We are fortunate to have a number of locomotives that are available to run and can vary what is used to haul the train. All coaching stock and wagons are from the

pre-nationalisation era. Some are built by members and some bought, for instance Western Wagon Works supplied some of the Great Western Railway coaches.

When we run the layout we do not run to any form of timetable, but we try to run trains that were prototypical for the period and entertain the public. It can be difficult having something running all the time with a single line, but someone can operate the yard independently accepting, shunting and forming up trains to keep things busy. As the name on the station suggests, you change at Kingsbury for Rogersfield, and this also provides us with small branch trains for the bay platform. Rogersfield is another fictitious small harbour layout to be built in the future and will hopefully connect with Kingsbury, so watch this space.

As with many layouts there are always bits still to be added or sometimes finished. The signalbox still needs its lever frame

and point rodding, more people need to be added, shops need interiors and so on, but I think that is the great thing about our hobby - you can always find something more you can do and, as in everyday life, things change.

This has been a great experience for us moving up from 'OO' as it has furthered our modelling skills and most of us currently have an 'O' gauge project on the go now too. We hope that this furthers the cause in what is a great scale to work in. Thanks also goes to you the modellers out there for your interest and we hope to see you at a show sometime soon.

HORNBY'S LNER 'B12' debut

The Great Eastern section has gained great momentum in ready-to-run locomotives over the past two years – and the latest arrival is Hornby's spectacular 'OO' gauge model of the 'B12/3' 4-6-0. **MIKE WILD** takes an exclusive first look at the soon to be released production model.

THE GREAT EASTERN RAILWAY (GER) was hardly the largest company of the pre-grouping period. Operating out of London Liverpool Street to locations in Suffolk and Norfolk including Ipswich, Harwich, Norwich and the North Norfolk coast, it later became part of the London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) before becoming part of British Railway's Eastern Region in 1948.

The GER, like all pre-grouping railway companies, had its own works and developed motive power specific to its requirements and a range of quality machines were turned out from its Stratford Works including the 'S69' 4-6-0 which later became the 'B12' under the LNER for grouping of the railways in 1923. You can read more on the story of the 'B12' in Reality Check on pages 66-69.

The Great Eastern's motive power has seldom been chosen for ready-to-run products, not least because of its limited operational sphere. But, on a more positive note, the tables have been turned as the new Hornby 'B12/3' 4-6-0 is the third locomotive class from the region to be released as a brand-new item by the Kent based manufacturer

in two years. It joins the Worsdell 'J15' 0-6-0 (HM93) and the Holden 'D16/3' 4-4-0 (HM101) which arrived through Hornby in 2015.

THE MODEL

Hornby revealed that it would be producing the 'B12' as a new item for 2016 at

the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition in November 2015. This class has a longstanding

history with the company as the first version was produced in the 1960s. Through various revisions that model survived until around 2012 when its last iteration came through in the 'East Anglian' train set. Long in the tooth it certainly was, but now – with modern





manufacturing techniques and the latest in chassis design – Hornby had a chance to make the 'B12' shine again in its extensive range.

Docking during November, 12 months after announcement, are three versions covering 8572 in LNER lined apple green, 61580 in BR lined black with late crests and, the subject of our review, 61533 in BR lined black with early crests.

Fortunately Hornby has been able to enlist the support of the North Norfolk Railway's locomotive department for production of this new model. This heritage railway is home to the sole-surviving 'B12' 61572 which, at the end of October, was making a rare visit away from home to the Bluebell Railway in Sussex. Using 61572, the Hornby team has been able

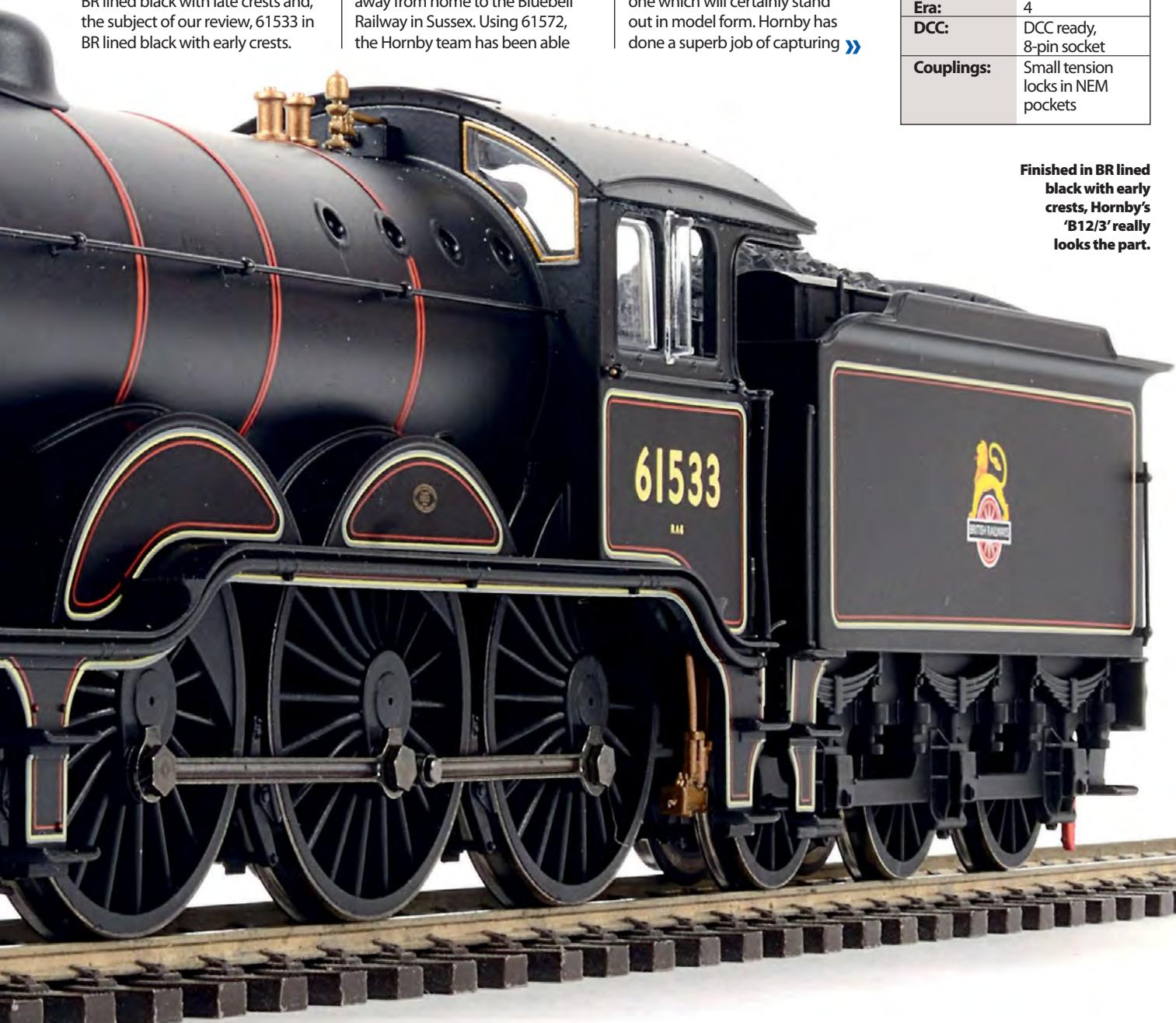
to ensure that all the principal dimensions are accurate while using archive sources to further enhance their abilities to produce a detailed model of this class.

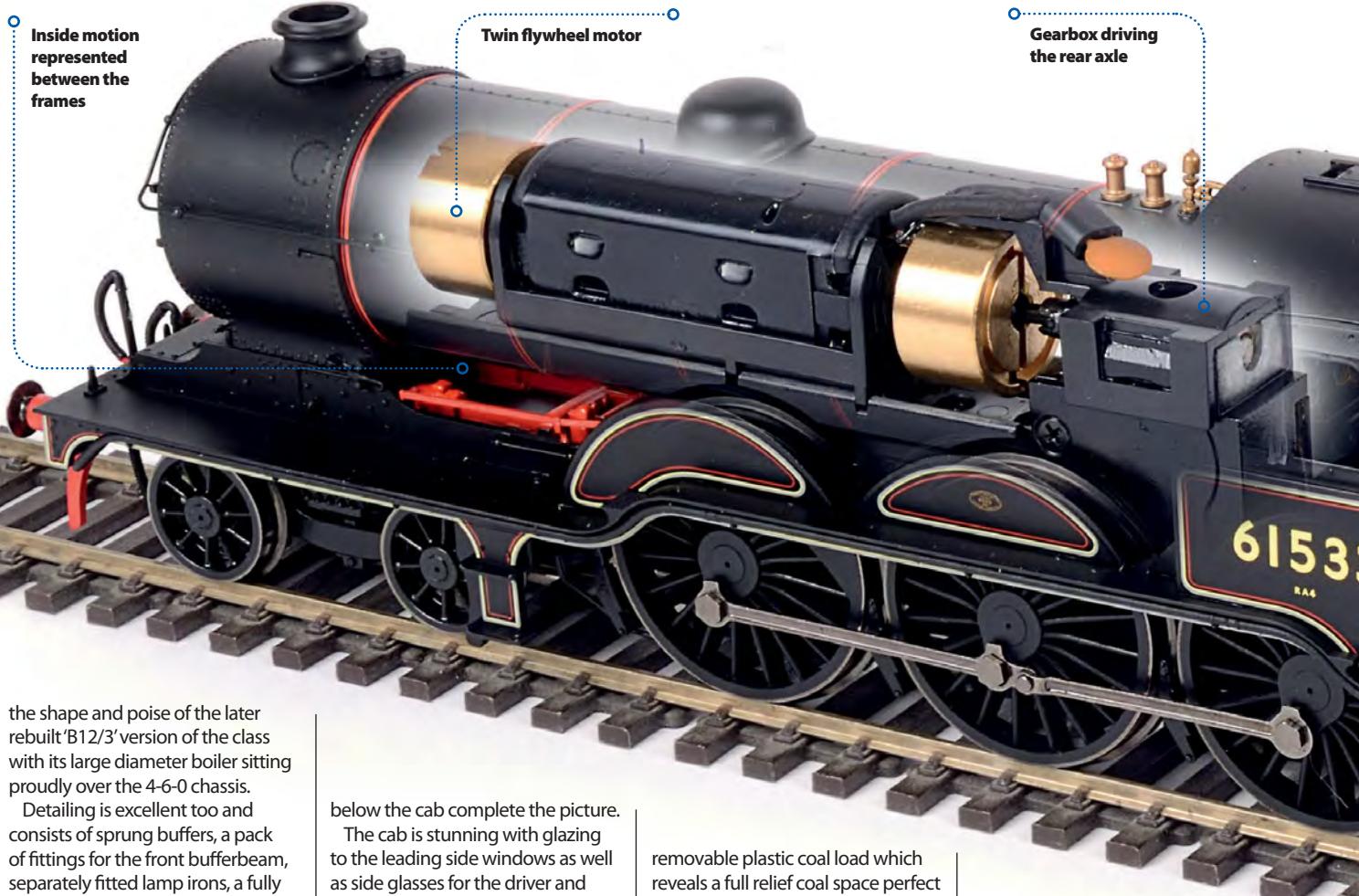
The 'B12s' inside cylinder format on a 4-6-0 was a rare design on British main line locomotives, but one which will certainly stand out in model form. Hornby has done a superb job of capturing »

the shape and poise of the later rebuilt 'B12/3' version of the class with its large diameter boiler sitting proudly over the 4-6-0 chassis.

Detailing is excellent too and consists of sprung buffers, a pack of fittings for the front bufferbeam, separately fitted lamp irons, a fully detailed smokebox door, separate handrails throughout and much more. Look below the boiler and you will see representation of the inside motion while the driver's side has a neatly moulded reversing rod together with an excellent air pump too – a feature that the 'B12' wouldn't be right without. The braking system is modelled in full with rigging supplied separately for customer installation. Sandpipes, finely moulded spoked wheels with the correct flare to the central bosses and neat injector pipework

below the cab complete the picture.

The cab is stunning with glazing to the leading side windows as well as side glasses for the driver and fireman. Inside, the spacious cab is fully detailed with backhead detail and reflects the real locomotive down to a tee; a crew is all that is needed to finish this area.

Completing the ensemble is a standard Great Eastern Railway tender. These short wheelbase vehicles aided the real locomotives in being able to fit onto short GER turntables. Hornby is well versed at this design as similar styles have been produced for the GER 'B17' 4-6-0s and 'D16' 4-4-0s from the manufacturer. It includes a

removable plastic coal load which reveals a full relief coal space perfect for adding a real crushed coal load into. At the back are water fillers each side while you will also find a fire iron tunnel (with superbly fine supports) to one side and a pair of toolboxes at the front.

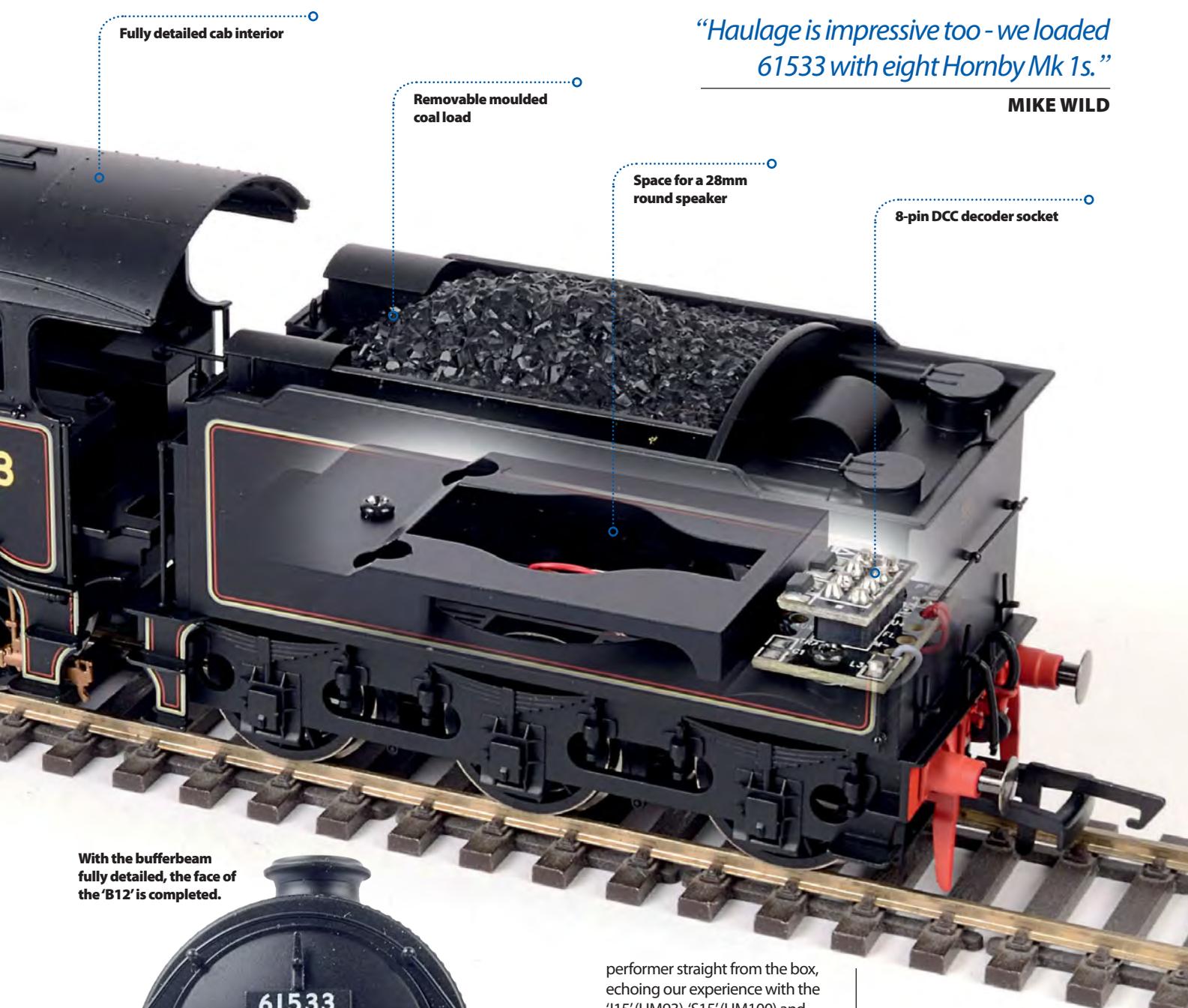
Decoration of our BR lined black sample of Ipswich (32B) allocated 61533 was excellent. Highlights include full tri-colour BR mixed traffic lining, perfectly printed cabside and smokebox numbers, and excellent builders plates, boiler lining and large BR early period crests on the tender.

PERFORMANCE

The 'B12' uses the latest generation of mechanism from Hornby which first appeared with the astoundingly good running 'J15' 0-6-0 in 2015. This consists of a five pole motor with twin brass flywheels set in the boiler driving the rear axle through a cardan shaft and worm via a gearbox. The result is a mechanism which boasts supremely smooth operation and plenty of power.

Our sample of 61533 was a perfect

performer straight from the box, echoing our experience with the 'J15' (HM93), 'S15' (HM100) and 'J50' (HM104) which all employed the same style drive system. After running in it settled down even further to become virtually silent and comfortably operated through a range of pointwork.

Haulage is impressive too - we loaded 61533 with eight Hornby Mk 1 coaches, an ample load for this size of 4-6-0 which it handled with absolute ease. In fact, even running it with a rake of eight Hornby Pullmans, which have more rolling resistance and therefore a greater trailing weight, the 'B12' showed no signs of slipping on level track.

For those intent on converting the 'B12' to Digital Command Control operation, an 8-pin decoder socket is provided in the tender together with a compact space designed to accept a 28mm round speaker. This combination will make digital and sound fitting straightforward, but due to the

limited size of the tender interior, careful positioning of components and wiring will be necessary.

OVERALL

The introduction of the 'B12' is great news for Great Eastern section modellers, but it shouldn't be forgotten that these engines strayed away from their native routes too. Appearances on the East Coast Main Line were frequent in the 1950s.

Having spent plenty of time around the preserved example at the North Norfolk Railway, the 'B12' is high on my personal hit list of locomotives to own and Hornby has done a sterling job of recreating this attractive class in model form. Alongside the 'J15' 0-6-0 and 'D16' 4-4-0 the 'B12' is a perfect addition for Great Eastern layouts. As a strong performer with good looks and exquisite detail, we couldn't ask for more, could we?

The LNER's elegant 'B12'

*At the turn of the 20th century, many British railways developed more powerful passenger locomotives, and amongst the most elegant were the Great Eastern Railway's long-lived 'B12' 4-6-0s, as **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** describes.*

THROUGHOUT the Victorian era the 4-4-0 had proved to be the most popular design for express passenger work, but by the turn of the century any further increase in power for this type was hampered by the need to keep within the loading gauge and permissible axle weights allowed by the civil engineer.

One solution was to add more axles while keeping to the basic design of the existing engines and one company that took this course was the Great Eastern Railway (GER) which developed its excellent 'Claud Hamilton' 4-4-0 into a 4-6-0, known as the 'S69', later to become the London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) 'B12'.

Design work started in 1908 under the guidance of F.V. Russell, who was then in charge of locomotive design at Stratford Works, but construction of the first example did not take place for three years due to pressure of other work. The new 'S69s' were equipped with the largest boiler that could be squeezed into the loading gauge, and this required the driving wheels to be reduced in size from the 7ft of the 'Claud Hamilton' to 6ft 6in while the cylinders were increased in size to 20in x 28in. The new locomotive was also designed with a very short wheelbase which assisted with route availability, this feature being enhanced by the fitting of bearings with 1 1/2in side play on the rear axles, a feature that was incorporated from new from the fourth engine onwards and then retrofitted to the first three engines. They were also distinctive in being the only 4-6-0s with inside cylinders on the main line.

Unusually for locomotives of this period a roomy cab with two side windows was provided and this had a generous roof between engine and tender which tended to make the class look much bigger than it actually was. A pleasing appearance was also enhanced by the decorative valances over the driving wheels which were originally picked out with ornamental brass beading.

AN INSTANT SUCCESS

From the outset, the new engines proved very successful and further batches were ordered over following years. Stratford Works built 70 examples between 1911 and 1920 with a further 20 built under contract by Beardmore and Co of Glasgow in 1920-1921 due to a lack of capacity at the GER's works. A final batch of 10 was added in 1928 when the LNER found itself short of motive power and decided to commission locomotives from Beyer, Peacock and Co of Manchester. These differed slightly from the originals in that they were equipped with Lentz valve gear, the decorative framing over the driving wheels was omitted and the side play feature of the rear driving axle was not fitted.

When new the 'B12s', as they later became, were put to work on the Great Eastern's prestige services between London, Colchester and Norwich and they also hauled boat trains to Parkeston Quay. They remained on these duties for some years »

until replaced and supplemented by still larger locomotives in the early 1920s.

After the grouping the LNER was anxious to try locomotives from one region against others and so the 'B12s' were trialled on the Leeds to Doncaster route but it was felt that they were not suitable and so they were returned to the GE section. In 1926 tests took place with 8526 on the former Great North of Scotland lines and it was found that the locomotive was an ideal replacement for the elderly 4-4-0s that had monopolised services there for many years.

Consequently, in 1931 when new 'Sandringham' 4-6-0s arrived on the GE section, a number of 'B12s' were transferred to Scotland where they found work on Aberdeen to Elgin services, initially on goods and fish trains but later also on passenger duties. During the summer season some were loaned to Eastfield shed for use on excursion trains to Oban and while they were in the lowlands they were tried on some expresses, but were found lacking and subsequently returned to the north of Scotland.

WARTIME STALWARTS

The 'B12s' continued their express and secondary work until the Second World War at which point they were allocated to heavier wartime trains with some success. One feature of their design which was to prove particularly useful was that they were fitted with train air brakes and the conflict saw several allocated to American ambulance trains as a result. These trains travelled all over the south east, taking the 'B12s' to many areas where they had not been seen before.

At this time loads of 500tons or more were common but the locomotives earned a reputation as good performers under difficult circumstances. Following the conflict all returned to their home territory but the arrival of more modern locomotives such as the Thompson 'B1' 4-6-0s saw most English-based 'B12s' allocated to Stratford where they were mainly used on semi-fast Southend trains.

A steady decline followed as more new motive power became available with the first withdrawal, 8534, taking place in June 1945 and with the class seeing out

its days on services between Norwich and Cromer. At nationalisation in 1948, 72 of the original 80 survived to pass into British Railways ownership and these were renumbered 61500–61580. This numbering followed the intended 1945 LNER scheme but not all locomotives had received these numbers so some went directly from their 1924 guise to their BR identity.

Withdrawals continued, and all were gone by the end of 1961. The final example was 61572 which was retained as something of a celebrity engine and was often used on Yarmouth to March parcels trains as well as railtours in its final years. It was withdrawn in 1961 and has since been preserved at the North Norfolk Railway.

UPGRADES AND CHANGES

As with many other types of locomotives the 'B12s' were extensively modified during their lifetimes with the most obvious changes relating to the use of a larger boiler and the removal of the ornamental valances.

One of the first modifications came in 1926 when the LNER used the class for experimental work with feedwater heating and to this end 8509 was fitted with Worthington-Simpson apparatus on the left hand running plate while no fewer than 50 of the class were fitted with the ungainly French ACFI feed water heating apparatus between 1927 and 1937. This involved a small tank and pipework perched on the boiler top between the chimney and the dome but was not very successful, any savings in fuel being offset by increased maintenance costs.

In the same year 8516 was fitted with Lentz oscillating poppet valve gear, being only the second such installation in the country at that time, and this resulted in an improvement in performance and economy. 8525 was similarly fitted in 1928 and Lentz valve gear was then specified for the 1928-built Beyer Peacock batch from new. However, subsequently major problems with the cam boxes, which were integral to the cylinders, caused Lentz-equipped locomotives to be rebuilt from 1931 onwards with new long travel valves instead.

This final batch of locomotives also incorporated other modifications; these included an extended smokebox and

alterations to the boiler causing a reduction in the heating surface. The ornate valances were omitted from this batch and the water scoop was worked by hand, rather than by air as on the earlier engines.

In 1932 8579 emerged from Stratford fitted with a larger boiler of 5ft 6in diameter and with a redesigned front end. The new boiler was similar to that fitted to the 'Sandringham' class and had a Gresley round topped firebox. There were also modifications to the valve gear and new long travel valves were fitted. This became the standard for all rebuilds and was known as the 'B12/3' and its adoption saw the disappearance of the ACFI apparatus and the Lentz valve gear from the class.

The rebuilt 'B12/3s' were heavier than the original machines and unsuited to work in Scotland and so, in 1943, the LNER embarked on a different modification to produce the 'B12/4'. In this variant a more modern boiler of 5ft 1in diameter was used in which the barrel was rolled from a single plate and the tubes were arranged differently, cutting down on weight. These locomotives were around six tons lighter than the 'B12/3s'.

All the 'B12s' were equipped with the same type of tender but those working on the Midland and Great Northern and Great North of Scotland sections were fitted with tablet changing apparatus. Some of the Scottish allocation were given tenders from 'B17s' in their later years, as the 'B17s' had been provided with bigger tenders.

'WANDERING 1500'

Following main line service lasting for half a century only one of the 'B12s' made it into preservation. Following its period as a celebrity engine and mascot at Norwich 61572 was bought by the M&GN Joint Railway Society and in 1963 embarked on the 260-mile 'Wandering 1500' railtour. It then went into storage before being taken to the North Norfolk Railway at Sheringham, along with 'J15' 65462. By then the locomotive was in poor condition. In 1977 an appeal for its restoration was commenced

but the work was plagued with problems, so much so that the locomotive was shipped out to Kloster Mansfeld near Leipzig where a traditional steam era workshop was still in existence. Unfortunately a change of management at that plant resulted in a dispute, by which time the locomotive was in pieces, and this meant that work was not completed until December 1994.

The sole-remaining 'B12' finally re-entered service in 1995 and commenced an illustrious career on the North Norfolk

Railway, where it is the line's flagship engine. It has carried a number of liveries during this time, including LNER apple green, unlined black and BR lined black. It was rebuilt once more over five years between 2007-2012, but with much more success than the first time and since that time the locomotive has appeared at the 'Steam on the Met' event and has made guest appearances at many other premier heritage lines in the UK.

Considering that the 'B12s' design was

so constricted by outside factors such as available turntable length, restricted axle loading and overall size the class turned out to be highly successful. They proved themselves quite capable of working not just in their native East Anglia, but in the more severe terrain of the north of Scotland too. It is a testament to their design that only eight of the class failed to make it into British Railways ownership and that today one survives to haul trains on one of our heritage railways. [Hm](#)

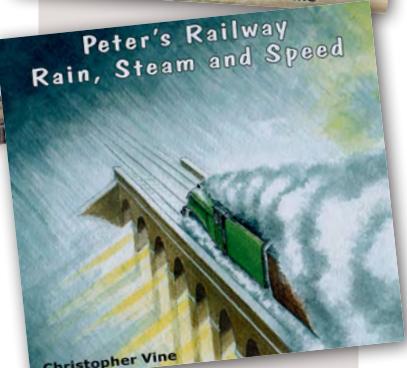
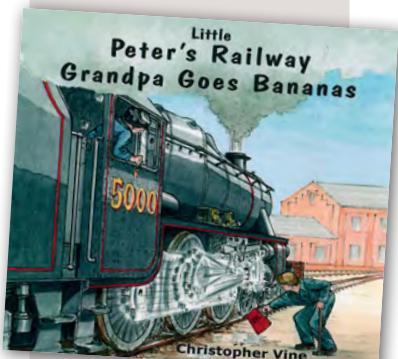

and feature detail differences between vehicles, including new tooling options for the Worthington liveried model with its roof-mounted walkway along one side and hopper discharge



handles on both sides of the wagon underframe. Other detail differences between models include axlebox arrangements and buffer shank styles. Decoration includes an impressive weathered BR bauxite finish for one which consists of rust patches, data panels and a dusting of weathered brown paint. Meanwhile, the Worthington example has

a fresh allover grey body colour accented by Worthington script and legible Chas Roberts of Wakefield Ltd builder's plates.

Finely moulded ladders, turned metal three-hole wheels and small tension lock couplings in NEM pockets complete these accomplished wagons. (MC)

Wickham Trolley is a tiny **MARVEL**

The Wickham trolley might not be a first choice as a ready-to-run model, but Bachmann has created a beautiful model all the same. **MARK CHIVERS** runs the rule over this miniature Type 27 variant.

TMAY HAVE BEEN A LONG time in development but Bachmann's 'OO' gauge model of the diminutive Wickham railway trolley is here.

The first examples were built in the 1940s and more than 600 trolley cars were built by D. Wickham and Co. Ltd. They were used primarily for transporting engineering staff and materials to and from engineering possessions. Whilst there were many versions manufactured over the years, Bachmann's new model is based on the prevalent Type 27 variant, as operated on BR metals.

to think that this model is also motorised. As suitable space within the personnel carrier is effectively non-existent, Bachmann's engineers have developed a small motorised mechanism housed within a permanently coupled trailer which features

an ample ballast load, disguising the inner workings below.

Given its size, close inspection reveals an impressive level of detail for such a small model with glazed cab windows, grabrails, handrails, running boards, bench seats, wooden plank-effect

flooring, moulded headlamps and realistic rolled-up side curtain detail. Look closer and you'll discover foot pedal controls, engine cover, handbrake lever and even a gearstick. Underneath, exquisitely moulded brake shoes sit in line with the minute wheels

THE MODEL

For review we received two examples in BR maroon and BR engineers yellow, both based on 1950s prototypes. A third model in BR engineers yellow with 'wasp stripes' (Cat No. 32-993) is also available.

On removal from its packaging you are instantly struck by this model's tiny size in comparison to most 'OO' gauge models. Of course, this is as it should be but it's even more amazing

while fine (and delicate) plastic bumper bars sit across each end.

Finished as B30W in BR maroon and TR23 in BR engineer's yellow, decoration is up to the high standards we've come to expect from Bachmann together with crisply printed lettering, numbers and neatly applied legible builder's plates. Non-working headlights are picked out in silver while the trolley roof and trailing ballast load are painted grey.

PERFORMANCE

Naturally we were eager to see how this tiny model would run and it was set to work on *Hornby Magazine's* office test layout immediately. As we hoped its performance was exemplary with our review samples running smoothly and quietly through a series of track configurations without issue.

With such a small wheelbase, pick-ups are through-wired from the trolley to the trailer to help electrical continuity while a pair of traction tyres is fitted to the front driving wheels on the trailer to aid adhesion. Tipping the scales at just 32g, our review samples showed no signs of slippage while on test, but that low weight does mean that clean track and clean wheels are essential for



continuous electrical contact. A separate pack containing two spare traction tyres is also included.

One area of compromise, if you can call it that, is the lack of Digital Command Control (DCC) provision on this model, it being suitable for analogue control only. Not only that, Bachmann recommends within the instructions that it should not be operated as an analogue model on DCC systems which allow this type of operation, due to the nature

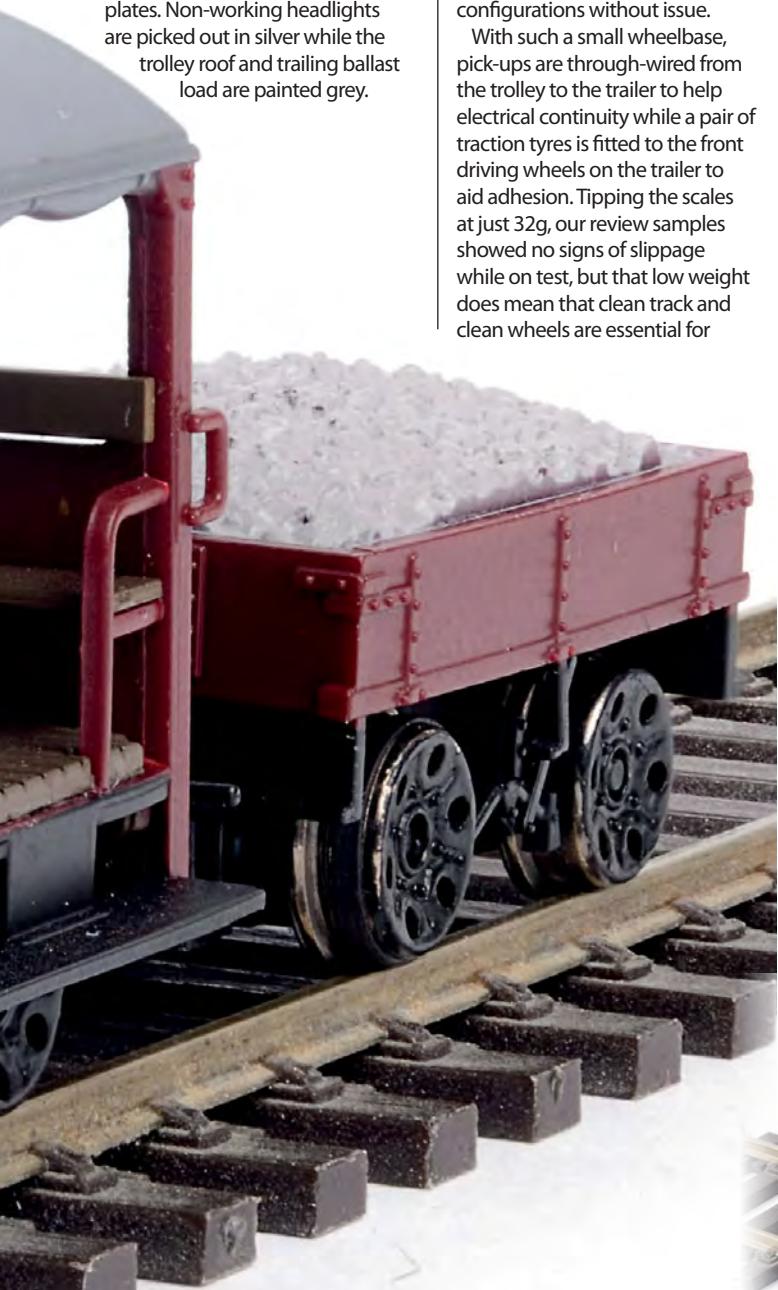
of the motor used; it being fitted with Bachmann's coreless motor. Whilst understandable with space at such a premium, adding DCC to this model is an area we intend to return to in a future issue of *Hornby Magazine*.

OVERALL

So, has the wait for the Wickham Trolley been worth it? Absolutely!

This is a stunning example of something a little different which is sure to grace many layouts. The fact that it runs as well as it looks, too, sets it in good stead for further detailing projects populated with engineers on the way to their next possession of line inspection.

FOR ITS LATEST OUTING, Bachmann's 'OO' gauge BR Class 101 two-car Diesel Multiple Unit (DMU) carries BR Network SouthEast (NSE) livery, but making this model really stand out are the addition of digital sound and a collection of passengers too.

Announced as part of its 2016 range, this is the first of Bachmann's 'OO' models to feature seated passengers and it represents a Cambridge area unit from the late 1980s. Comprising Driving Trailer Composite with Lavatory (DTCL) 54068 and Driving Motor Brake Second (DMBS) 51444,

the unit carries Cambridge and Royston destination blinds. Each vehicle is populated with a dozen neatly painted seated passengers, some of which can be seen reading newspapers. These figures are particularly effective in disguising the Digital Command Control (DCC) sound and speaker

installation within the DMBS. Application of the vibrant NSE colour scheme is up to Bachmann's usual high standards with silver-painted buffers, black roof and red bufferbeams adding the finishing touches.

Performance was smooth and quiet throughout, but what

Bachmann's well-regarded 'OO' gauge Class 416 2-EPB Electric Multiple Unit (EMU) forms the centrepiece to this striking BR Network SouthEast (NSE) 30th Anniversary train pack.

Launched in June 1986, British Rail's NSE business sector set about improving the quality and perception of passenger services in London and the South East (HM109).

Bachmann's eye-catching pack contains 2-EPB 6414 in late 1980s condition together with resin Scenecraft art deco low-relief suburban station building and two platform sections.

Whilst NSE livery has adorned Bachmann's 2-EPB previously (on a Bachmann Collectors Club limited

edition), this latest version comes without cab front headlights and has detail differences such as white grabrails and NSE lozenges on each cab front together with a black roof. The unit is DCC ready with a single 21-pin decoder required to power the train on digital layouts.

Bachmann's art deco low relief station appears in NSE white and red with appropriate signage while the platform sections are weathered brown.

Delve deeper beneath the polystyrene packaging and there's also a limited-edition certificate, set of five NSE themed postcard



prints, a reproduction Network Card and NSE plastic ticket wallet. Both the packaging and postcards feature artwork created by the late Edward Pond, who designed the

distinctive prints that appeared within NSE's rolling stock and on publicity material - a neat touch.

A colourful and well thought out package. (MC)

really brings this model to life is its DCC sound capability which completes the 'bells and whistles' feel. Featuring a six-function ESU LokSound V4.0 decoder, it offers an impressive suite of sounds as well as directional and interior illumination which are controlled by Function

0 - interior lights can also be turned on/off manually using the switch on the underframe.

Engine startup (F1) is impressive and features the distinctive revving sound of the engines at start-up. A manual start for each engine is also offered. F2 and F3 control the two-tone

warning horns. Other sounds include air build-up, door slams, brake application sounds, engine coasting and a useful 'right away' sequence including guard's whistle, driver's buzzer and warning horn. An automatic uncoupling cycle (F15) which sees the model shunt forward

briefly and then back - ideal if you have the capability for auto-uncoupling - is also included.

With so much detail and functionality at your fingertips, Bachmann have delivered a stunning model which not only looks good, it also runs well and sounds great too. (MC)

New from Bachmann is this 'OO' gauge BR Mk 1 Restaurant Miniature Buffet (RMB) in BR Network SouthEast (NSE) livery. A small number of these vehicles

carried the vibrant colour scheme for use on West Anglia locomotive-hauled services from London Liverpool Street to Cambridge and King's Lynn in the late 1980s.

Bearing the hallmarks of previous releases and finished as BR Mk 1 RMB 1865, application of the blue, white, red and grey livery is crisp and matches the prototype well - even its revised

coach number position on one side has been replicated.

Although the prototype had a limited sphere of operation in this livery, it is sure to prove popular amongst modellers of the Network SouthEast era. (MC)



BLACK LABEL Gresley 'A4'

EXCLUSIVE FIRST REVIEW

Dapol is set to release one of its boldest new models this winter. **MIKE WILD** takes an exclusive and detailed look at the finish and capabilities of the stunning Black Label Gresley 'A4' 4-6-2 for 'OO' gauge.



THE READY-TO-RUN market is incredibly competitive today. New locomotives are regular rather than rare events and over the past decade standards of detail and performance have continued to rise. We've seen an increase in digital sound from the factory; most recently the abilities of that system have been pushed further bringing features which were once the preserve of aftermarket decoders to the masses.

Enter Dapol and its revolutionary concept for a new model of the Gresley 'A4' 4-6-2 for 'OO' gauge. Nothing special? Just another 'A4'. Surely we don't need another one? Well, by the time you have found out what this model can do, your shopping list is likely to be one model longer.

The concept was revealed at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition in November 2015 where a subtle announcement through a poster and first sample gave a taste of what was to come. The specification included a

die-cast body, powerful motor, fine detail throughout and digital compatibility, but digging deeper showed that Dapol had much more to offer than just 'another' 'A4'.

Also on the list for the inaugural Black Label product were factory fitted sound, a lightweight chassis design which would make way for a fan driven smoke generator and facility to offer working headlamps and firebox flicker.

THE MODEL

This first batch of Black Label 'A4s' models Sir Nigel Gresley's famous streamlined 'Pacifacs' as they were in and around 1936, shortly after their introduction in 1935. That means original condition with valances and a choice of non-corridor and corridor tenders in

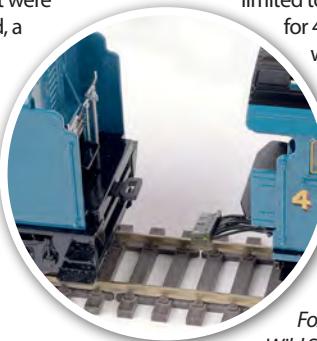
London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) garter blue, LNER silver and LNER lined apple green.

In total six different locomotives are being produced with each limited to 320 units, except for 4468 *Mallard* which will be limited to 400 pieces. *Mallard* is also the only version with a double chimney. The other five identities chosen are 2510 *Quicksilver* and 2512 *Silver Fox* in silver, 4467 *Wild Swan* and 4464 *Bittern* in garter blue plus 4482 *Golden Eagle* in apple green. All the garter blue models are coupled to non-corridor tenders, while 2510 and 2512 are paired with 1935 streamlined corridor tenders. 4482 comes with a 1928 corridor tender modified to operate with the 'A4s'.

The external appearance of the Dapol 'A4's is impressive with the die-cast body giving a true metallic feel that a steam locomotive should have. This is helped by the gloss finish (although Dapol has informed us that the gloss effect will be reduced on the production models) which further accentuates the quality of the moulding which has been produced for these models.

Details include sprung buffers, a fully detailed bufferbeam, a metal framed front bogie, separately fitted handrails plus individually installed lamp irons and whistle. Importantly, considering the smoke generator, the chimney – like the body – is die-cast too making it resistant to continuous use.

Below the body the brake rigging, wheels and motion are superbly finished with polished rims around the red centre wheels on our sample of *Mallard*. The tender underframe is equally well detailed both above and below the frames.

The gloss finish on 4468 *Mallard* looks superb. This is the only double chimney version.



Just as we would expect with a high-end production like this, the cab interior is fully detailed with backhead pipework, gauges and crew seats all superbly done. Added to this an open firebox door – to allow the flicker light to shine through – and this area is right up there with the best. All it needs is a driver and fireman to complete it.

With this model, you also get etched metal nameplates, an optional weather sheet to fit between the cab roof and tender, a real coal load and the choice of either floating Cartazzi rear pony truck for operation or a fixed version for display or wide radius curves.

PERFORMANCE

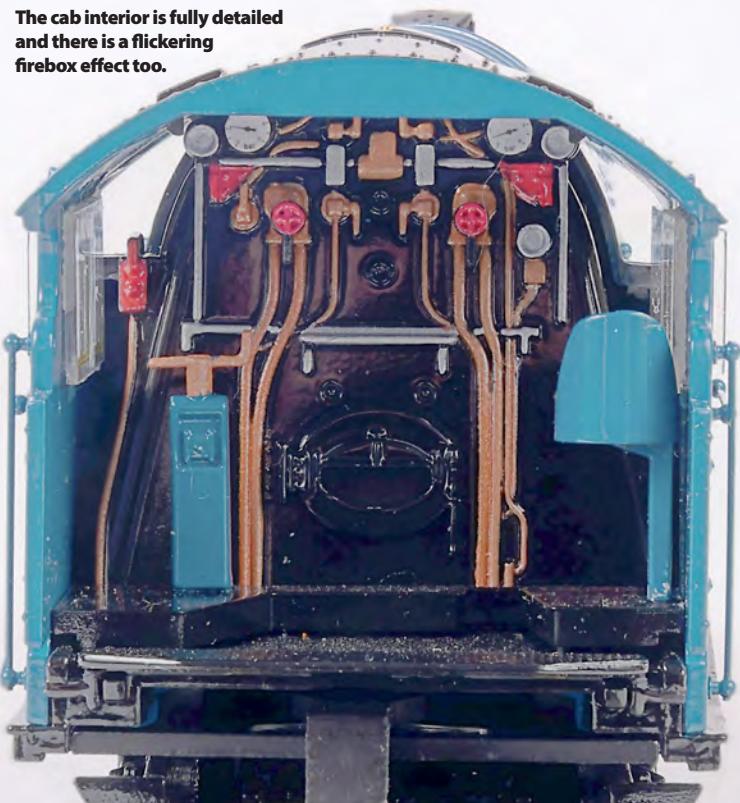
The external appearance of this 'A4' is just a part of the story as Dapol has really gone beyond what is normally expected for its Black Label range when it comes to performance. All versions are sound

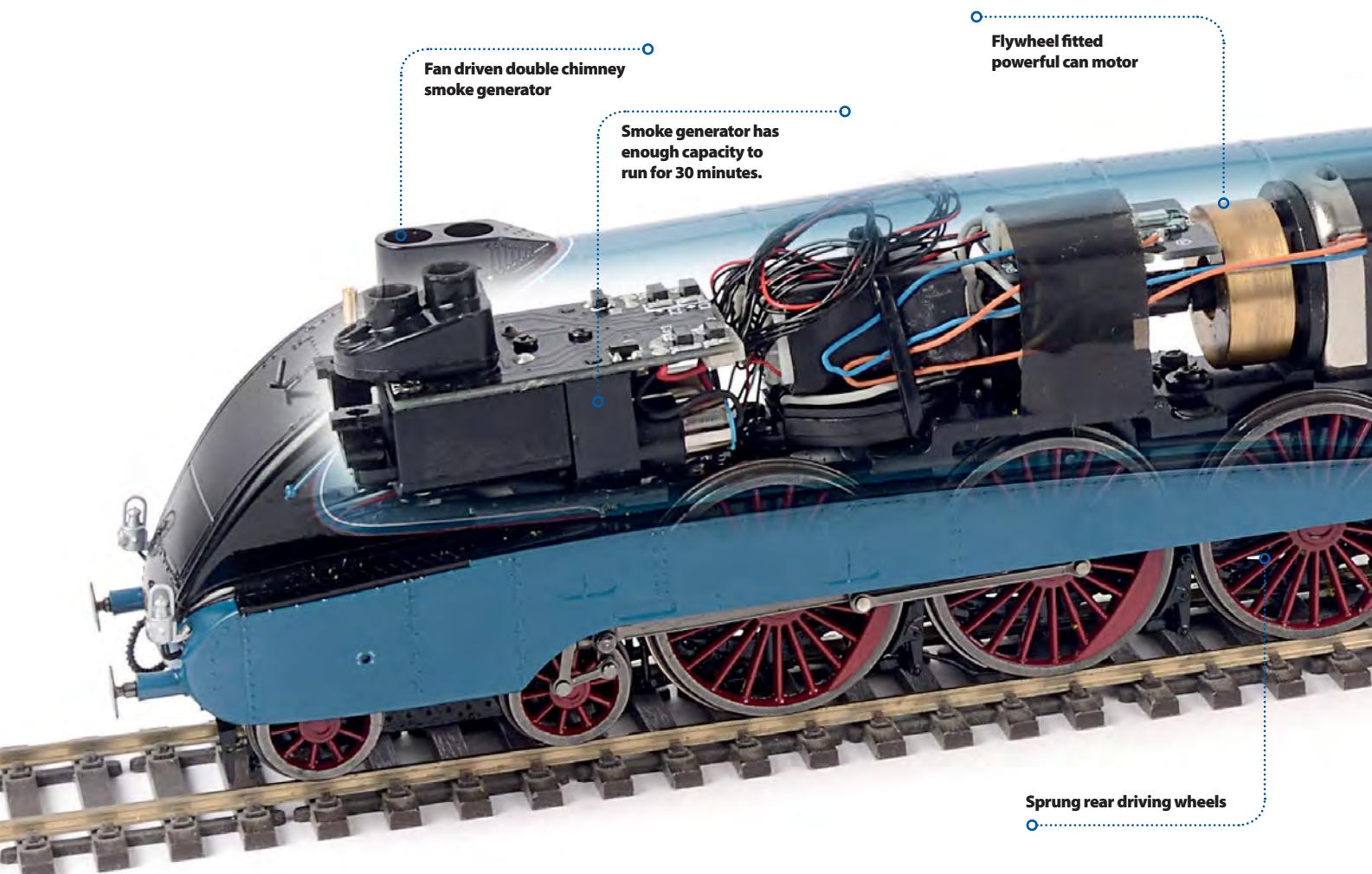
fitted and there is no conventional Digital Command Control (DCC) ready version without a decoder. Don't be despondent though – this is an excellent step forward in our view as it shows the progression of digital in model railways. And for those operating on DC, it will still operate and give you basic sound and smoke generator operation too.

The sound files have been recorded from preserved 'A4' 4464 *Bittern* – and very good they sound too. The speaker system chosen is strong and gives a rounded sound – not too harsh and not muffled either through a combination of speakers in the locomotive and tender while the exhaust beat is synchronised with the wheel revolutions. Better still at slow speeds the synchronisation with the smoke generator is clear too. Impressive.

The decoder is NMRA compliant and includes standard CV settings »

The cab interior is fully detailed and there is a flickering firebox effect too.





for the motor control which we tweaked to get the best out of the coasting sounds for our particular style of driving. This involved changing CV4 to 125 which gives a sufficiently long deceleration time to allow coasting sounds to be effective. Like all sound fitted locomotives, getting used to its abilities takes a little time, but that is more than worth it.

A range of functions are built into the decoder – 20 in total – including a number of whistles, coal shovelling – which also turns on the firebox flicker LED, safety valves lifting, lamp control and a selection of speech from the driver giving instructions to the fireman.

The fan driven smoke generator gives an excellent flow of smoke and can be turned off and on digitally using Function 7. In addition there is the option to control this through a switch underneath the locomotive for analogue layouts. The generator has a large capacity – enough for 30 minutes running from full to

empty – and smoke emits from both exhausts on the double chimney locomotives. This all adds greatly to the 'play' value of the Black Label model.

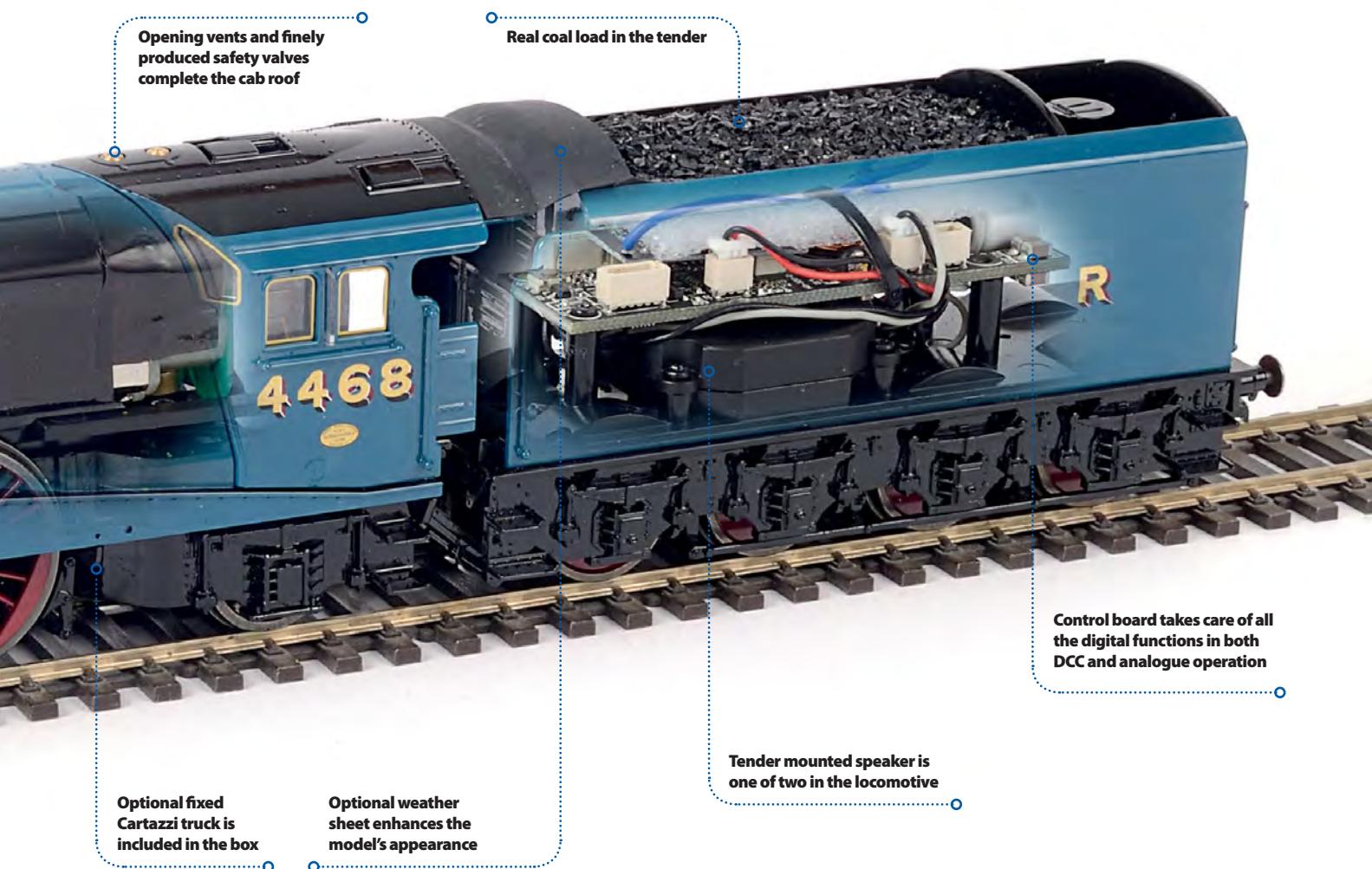
Actual running qualities are excellent. The motor is as near silent as possible and, should you wish to increase the model's haulage capacity even further, a replacement set of rear driving wheels is included in the box with traction tyres fitted. These have been included to

allow the Black Label model to haul heavy brass carriages as well as conventional plastic bodied ready-to-run models.

Our tests were carried out with standard wheels fitted and our sample had no issue at all in handling a 10-coach train of Hornby Pullman carriages. It also ran smoothly through all the pointwork on our office test track aided in part by the fact that the rear driving axle is sprung.

This standard of performance is echoed in analogue mode





where the 'A4' still provides acceleration and coasting sounds together with full operation of the smoke generator.

One point to be aware of with this model is that because it is so feature intensive it draws a lot more current than most conventional models – especially with the smoke generator on. Dapol has measured up to a 1.2amp current draw from its 'A4' during tests, so some digital systems might be reaching their upper limit with more than one of these locomotives in service. With a 4amp system we had no trouble though.

OVERALL

The Black Label 'A4' is a stunning model and an exciting adventure for Dapol. Its credentials as a DCC sound fitted only model make it a bold statement and one that shows Dapol's support for the ever-increasing popularity of this sector. The added feature of smoke propels this into a new league which takes us a step closer to realism in miniature. Driving one of these locomotives is absolutely enthralling, and a massive step closer to getting the 'feel' of the real thing in miniature. We've had plenty of experience with smoke generators through the

locomotives we have converted for *Hornby Magazine's* exhibition layouts, but none can run for anywhere near the 30 minutes of this 'A4' without a top up.

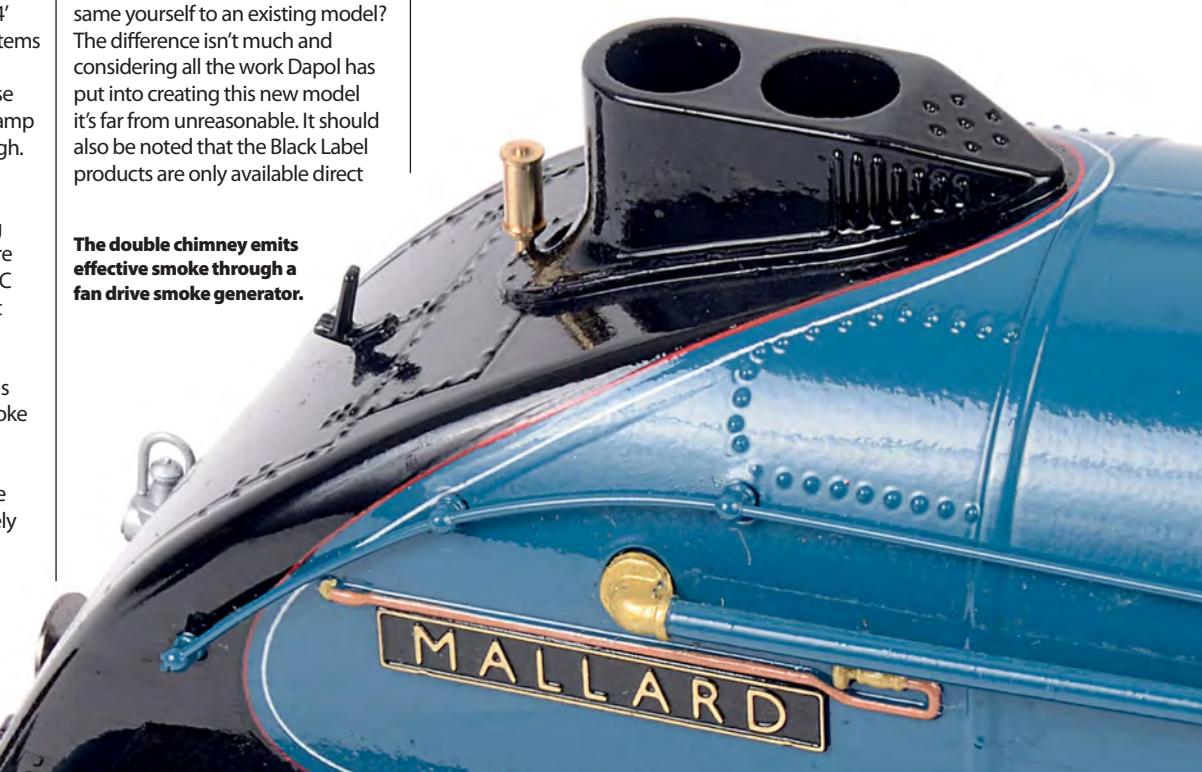
So now the big question – how much does it cost? The price tag for this model is £399.95 which might seem high, but first consider this: how much would it cost to do the same yourself to an existing model? The difference isn't much and considering all the work Dapol has put into creating this new model it's far from unreasonable. It should also be noted that the Black Label products are only available direct

and expressions of interest are still being taken by contacting Dapol. Gresley's 'A4' 4-6-2s were sublime examples of 1930s engineering and the golden era of rail travel. Dapol's model revives that era and gives us a brand new and enticing model of a class which brought even more glamour to the East Coast Main Line. This is a stunning new addition

to the range of ready-to-run 'OO' gauge locomotives and, for our personal taste, we hope it leads onto a BR era version in the future too.

Just like the prototype it is based on, this is a ground-breaking product that is set to have a profound influence on future generations of models. Absolutely superb.

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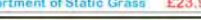


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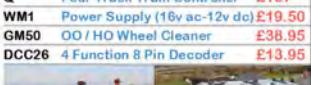

Digital diesels

for 'N'

Sound in 'N' gauge has traditionally been a tricky installation – but are things changing? **PAUL CHETTER** assesses how easy it is in Graham Farish Class 24 and 66 models.



Opportunities for installing sound in 'N' gauge are on the increase and Hornby Magazine's Barrenthorpe demonstrated a number of locomotives at the Great Electric Train Show. Here a newly fitted out Graham Farish Class 66 leads a cement train under a bridge at Barrenthorpe.

THE ASPIRATIONS OF 'N' GAUGE modellers for Digital Command Control (DCC) sound are being seriously addressed. This is through a combination of willingness from manufacturers to allow for adequate space at the product development stage and by decoder manufacturers in creating small format but fully featured sound decoders. One result of these trends is the comfortable relationship between Graham Farish Class 66 and Class 24 locomotives and Zimo's 2016 introduced MX649N sound decoder. This decoder is amongst the smallest sound version on the market measuring just 23mm x 9mm and only 4mm deep.

Though not close enough to be regarded as a 'plug and play' solution, installing Zimo sound in these locomotives is a relatively straightforward affair requiring only minimal modification to one cab interior and the ability to solder wires to a speaker in each case.

In both models, the body can be lifted clear of the chassis after the lower body sides have been gently prised outwards to release the retaining lugs. This reveals that a 6-pin decoder socket is provided on the main Printed Circuit Board (PCB) and that there is sufficient length and depth of clear space to accommodate an MX649N direct 6-pin decoder. Both offer roomy cabs which have adequate dimensions to accept an 8mm x 12mm cube speaker if

the cab inner mouldings are removed.

On close inspection of the Class 66 it becomes apparent that complete removal of this moulding would seriously disrupt the manufacturer's arrangements for external lighting at that end. The light sources are inboard, the light being transmitted via clear plastic light pathways which are part of the cab floor, and retaining points on each side hold both the cab and the lighting PCB in place. This is the major difference between the installations as the Class 24 cab interior moulding causes no problem for the lighting provision.

Careful measurement of the Class 66 moulding reveals that if the seats and other protrusions rising from the cab floor are removed or reduced in height the cube speaker can be fitted with the remaining portion of the cab moulding in place, retaining the light transmitting and component fixing functions in full.

The cab moulding can be unclipped and removed from the chassis to allow work to be undertaken away from the chassis and other components. Use a miniature file or a cutting disc in a mini-drill to remove the required amount of material, checking the fit of the speaker regularly. I also made a notch at cantrail level in each side of the cab rear bulkhead to allow speaker wires to pass from the decoder to the speaker. With these wires trimmed to length and soldered to the speaker, the decoder can be plugged in and the body refitted to the chassis to complete the installation.

The Class 24 is one of the most straightforward and the quickest sound installations I have completed in any gauge. Separate the body from the chassis and remove the cab moulding from the roof fan end. It simply pulls out - there's no adhesive used.

Extract the 6-pin blanking plug and tidy any errant wiring to create as much space as possible. Cover exposed or potentially exposed metal with insulating tape. The purple speaker wires can then be trimmed to length and soldered to an 8mm x 12mm cube speaker, which tucks under the free end of the decoder. They can be fixed together with Blu Tack or similar before plugging in the decoder. Be careful that the speaker does not distort the lighting contacts on the chassis. It only remains to replace the body to complete the task.

The decoders for each model were loaded with the relevant versions of my custom 'ActiveDrive' sound projects, available as usual from Digitrains, for Zimo decoders. These projects have all the regular features, such as working brakes, dynamic inertia, heavy train/light engine modes, coasting key and 'power boost key' which are available for the larger scales, but optimised for 'N' gauge models too.

The result is a pair of 'N' gauge locomotives which now have the drivability and sound package which was once only available to larger scales. And the situation is only set to improve as Bachmann's new Graham Farish 'Castle' 4-6-0 and Class 40 for 'N' gauge are being designed with sound in mind from the start including provision for installing a 'sugar cube' speaker and a Next18 socket to connect the decoder.

'N' gauge and sound have a bright future. 



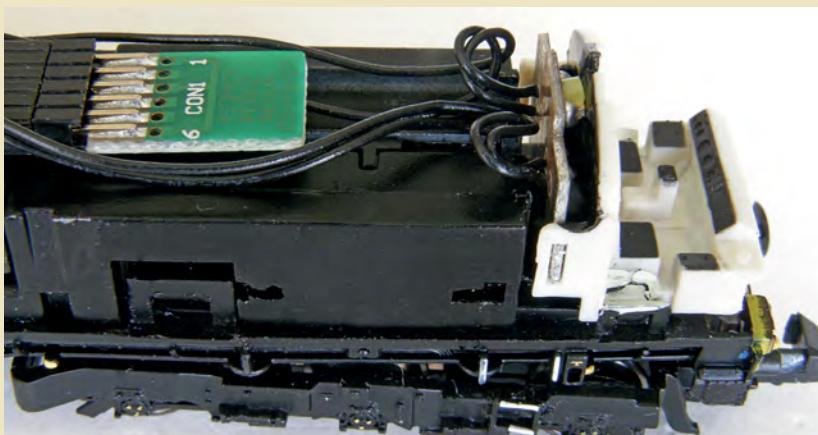

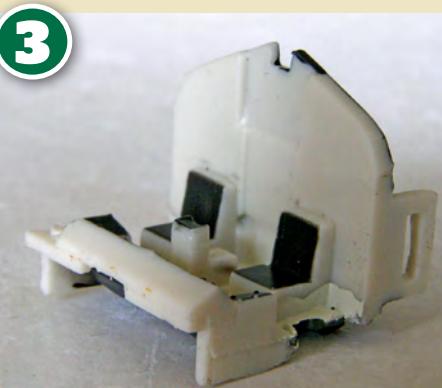

1 The cutaway picture shows that there is sufficient space for a suitable sized decoder but not a great deal of room above the chassis in the 'hidden' portion of the long Class 66 body. The large cab could potentially accommodate a small cube speaker.



2 After the body has been removed, by gently prising its lower edges outwards to release the fastening lugs and sliding it upwards, the general arrangements can be seen. The blanking plug shown was replaced with a direct 6-pin Zimo MX649N sound decoder which fits neatly in the space provided.



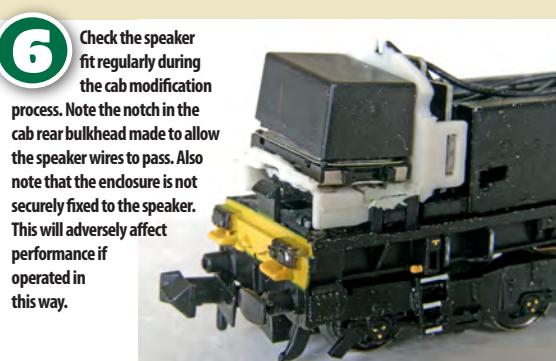
3 The inner cab moulding includes light paths for external lamps and the clips hold it and the lighting PCB in place, so it must be retained, albeit in a slightly modified form.



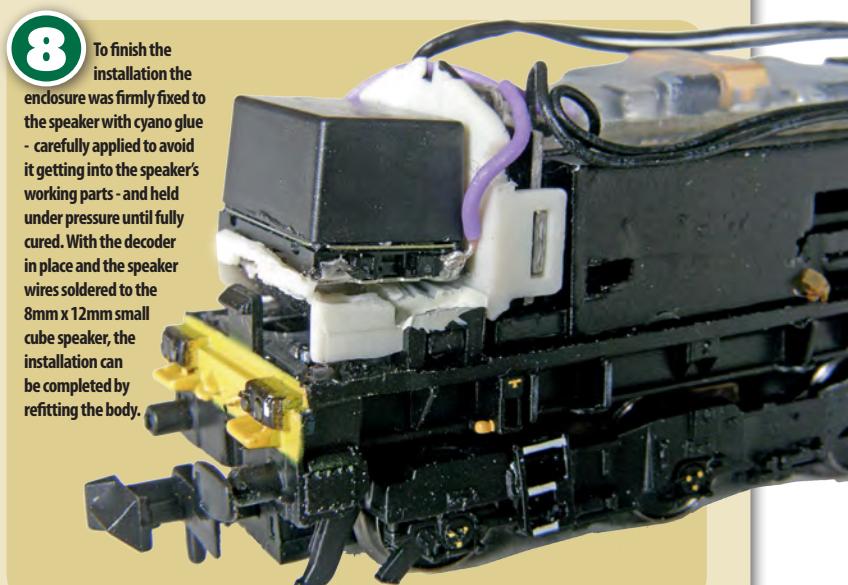
4 The seats, driving desk and console protrude into the space required for the speaker, but the clear plastic light pathways are part of the lower section.



5 These moulded details should be removed, approximately to the level shown. The base of the cab moulding needs to be retained as delivered.



6 Check the speaker fit regularly during the cab modification process. Note the notch in the cab rear bulkhead made to allow the speaker wires to pass. Also note that the enclosure is not securely fixed to the speaker. This will adversely affect performance if operated in this way.

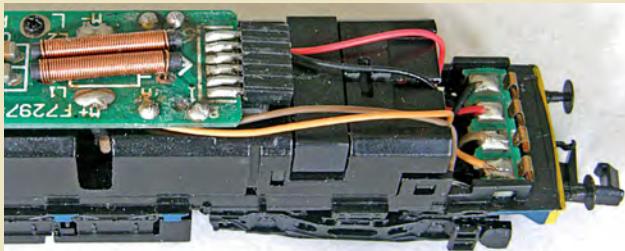


7 The MX649N decoder was prepared by cutting the purple speaker wires to length, and the six direct pins trimmed by a couple of millimetres for a close fit in the DCC socket.

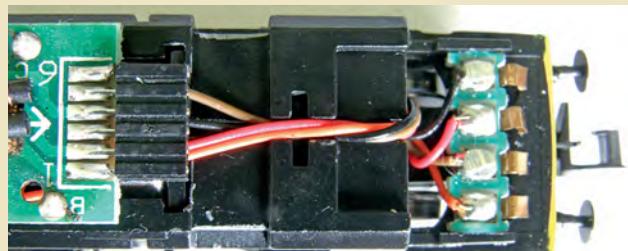
8 To finish the installation the enclosure was firmly fixed to the speaker with cyano glue - carefully applied to avoid it getting into the speaker's working parts - and held under pressure until fully cured. With the decoder in place and the speaker wires soldered to the 8mm x 12mm small cube speaker, the installation can be completed by refitting the body.

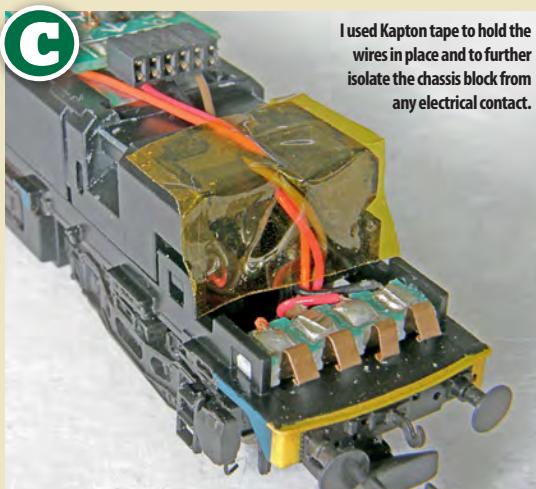

A Turning to the Class 24, the body is removed in the same way as the Class 66. With the body removed and blanking plug extracted from the DCC socket, the lighting circuit wires can be seen to compromise the space allocated to the decoder.



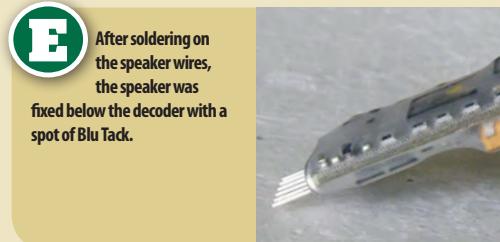
B I twisted these wires together and teased them into the gap between the chassis halves, being careful not to damage their insulation.



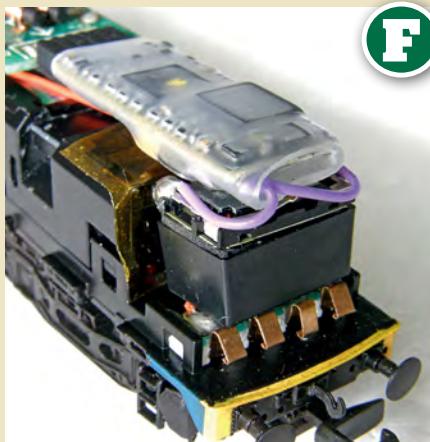
I used Kapton tape to hold the wires in place and to further isolate the chassis block from any electrical contact.



I prepared the decoder by trimming 2-3mm off the ends of the six connecting pins and cutting the speaker wires to the required length.



E After soldering on the speaker wires, the speaker was fixed below the decoder with a spot of Blu Tack.



The decoder was plugged into the DCC socket and the inverted speaker positioned behind the springy metal lighting contacts.



Though not essential, I covered the end of the decoder and the purple wires with matt black paint to help disguise their presence when operating.



When the body is refitted, the presence of the speaker is not at all obvious at normal viewing angles and distances.



As a further aid to disguising the installation, the model is set up to run 'No. 2 end forwards' with the coupling at the speaker (rear) end of the model.

Outon Road

BRUCE DUNCAN from Stenhousemuir in central Scotland is a long-time stalwart of Bonnybridge Model Railway Club and, as such, has been involved in the building and operation of the club's many fine exhibition layouts.

Like his club members, he always had the wish to have a home layout to which he could have access at any time. However, Bruce faced the problem encountered by so many other modellers - a lack of space. The only option open to him was to use the attic, but that in itself presented another problem. As he would wish to exhibit the layout, the baseboards would have to be small enough to fit through the attic hatch and light enough to carry up and down the ladder.

While still contemplating his next move, Bruce was browsing through model railway forums online when he came across an interesting layout advertised for sale. Outon Road was a compact modern image layout, clearly built to a high standard. Crucially, the small, lightweight baseboards could be manoeuvred easily in and out of his attic.

Whilst Bruce, with his undoubted abilities and experience, could easily have built a compact exhibition layout, he saw Outon Road as an opportunity to have a superb ready-made layout which met all of his criteria and give him an ideal testbed for his ever expanding fleet of sound fitted diesels. And so, in 2013, with the purchase completed, Outon Road moved from Chesterfield to Scotland.

MICRO CHALLENGE

Outon Road was built in 2010 by Cavan Millard of Chesterfield. His idea to build a compact layout, based on the area around Carlisle, coincided with the 2010 Micro Layout Challenge on a forum to complete an operational layout within the constraints of a maximum size of 2,010 square inches. Outon Road falls well within that limit.

The two 4ft x 18in scenic baseboards »

are built with a 6mm plywood top on a softwood frame and the raised track level has been built up with insulation foam. The track is Peco Code 75 on which a number of sleepers have been removed with the remaining ones spaced out to create a more realistic appearance.

The plan consists of a single track through line feeding a single platform station. To make things interesting there are sidings in front of this allowing all manner of engineering stock to be displayed and shunted during an operating session. The main running line passes through road bridges at each end of the scenic section allowing through operations to take place. There is also the suggestion of a passing loop at the left hand end of the scenic area, although only the points next to the station have been modelled with the storage yard providing 'off scene' arrangements to complete the loop. This type of subterfuge is a great way of maximising the operational potential of a compact layout.

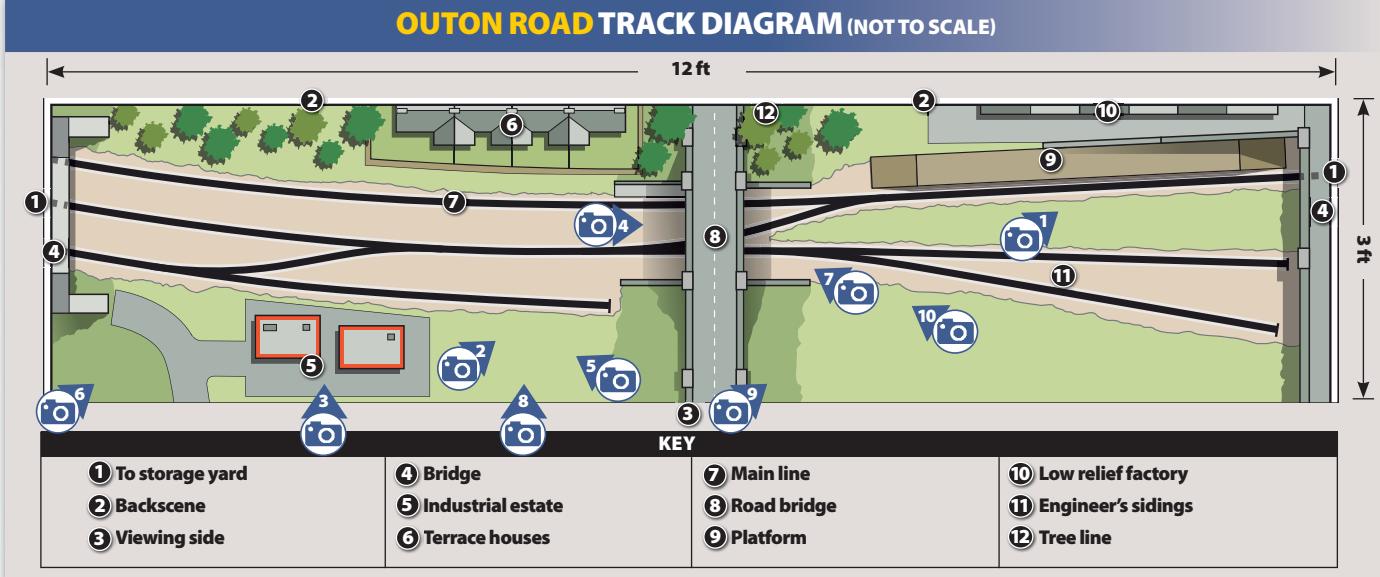
The points have been built from C&L components and are operated by servo motors. Track ballasting has been carried out with a selection of 'N' gauge ballast from Green Scene, set in place with the traditional method of diluted PVA glue.

The layout has full operational signalling. Most of the working colour lights are from the Berko range, but the feather is scratchbuilt. Illumination of the signals is by grain of wheat bulbs which do not display the harshness of LEDs.

LOW PROFILE

For the buildings, Cav made expert use of low relief structures for the rear of the layout creating a perceived depth with part width buildings. For their construction he departed from his usual favoured material, embossed plastic sheet. For speed, he decided to use cardboard for the retaining walls and most of the buildings, finishing them with Scalescenes brick papers. Being thoroughly satisfied with the results, it is a method which he would happily use again. The main bridge also features Scalescenes products. The bridge kit has been altered »

and combined with the retaining wall kit to raise the bridge height to allow for the potential of overhead wires.

The factory behind Outon Road station has a core of 5mm foamboard which again is finished with Scalescenes brick paper. The factory drainpipes were assembled from the plastic tubing stems of cotton buds. The same foamboard has been used for the station platform, and Photoshop was used to create a custom finish for the platform top surface, on which sits the station shelter produced from etched brass. The station lamps are scratchbuilt, as is the fencing around the industrial units. Modified Metcalfe kits have been arranged to create the row of cottages. The careful weathering ensures that they are not instantly recognisable as off the shelf products.

Ground cover is a combination of hanging basket liner and static grass. The culvert features foamboard covered with DAS modelling clay to represent concrete while the water in the stream is clear nail varnish. Rocks and stones have been produced from pieces of insulation foam which were given a coat of matt black paint, followed by further coats of varying shades of brown and beige. Natural bristles from a nail brush form the reeds.

THE DETAILS

Close inspection of Outon Road reveals a host of fine detail to enhance the sense of reality. The overgrown sidings draw the eye immediately, but look for the floral gems which seem perfectly at home in the cracked concrete around the station. Discarded oil drums, bits of random machinery, old gas bottles, a rusty relic of a Volkswagen and traffic cones which have attracted the attention of the local drunks all add credibility to the overall scene. There is even a tyre swing in one of the large trees.

Completing the picture is a considerable collection of figures. These are mostly from Preiser and Bachmann and have the »

advantage of freedom of movement. They all have pins inserted into one leg. These pins fit into holes on the layout, virtually invisible to the onlooker, allowing the figures to be regularly moved to alternative positions to create a variety of scenes.

When Bruce took possession of Outon Road, the layout featured catenary and overhead wires, but it was not long before this suffered some damage. As Bruce had already considered the catenary to be obtrusive, he took the step of removing them altogether. Outon Road could keep its Cumbrian heritage by simply moving the location from close to Carlisle to somewhere along the Cumbrian Coast. This change in traction type sees an

entirely diesel based fleet operate on Bruce's version of Outon Road. The roster includes numerous Class 153 Diesel Multiple Units in appropriate north western liveries plus a charter rake of Mk 2s repainted in Direct Rail Services (DRS) colours. The majority of the stock is freight and permanent way orientated and being a modern scene there is a variety of bright colour schemes to admire including DRS blue, Colas orange and yellow, EWS maroon and gold and even a Northern Belle liveried Class 47.

DIGITAL TAKE OVER

Bruce has no regrets over his decision to purchase a ready built layout. Outon

Road has certainly met his expectations. Controlled by a Gaugemaster Prodigy Advance Digital Command Control system, it has considerable operator interest and is ideal for testing the locomotives as and when they are fitted with sound from South West Digital, Olivia's Trains or Zimo.

Only two improvements are planned: extension of the storage yards and replacement of the point servos with the Tortoise motors to suit Bruce's personal tastes.

Under Bruce's ownership, Outon Road has already appeared at Model Rail Scotland and the Perth and Ayr exhibitions. Hopefully it will soon be seen south of the Border. [HM](#)

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LEEDS HOLBECK SHED

*During the transition era locomotive sheds were often a delightful blend of the old and the new, few more so than Leeds (Holbeck), a location that was on the 'must do' list of every 1960s enthusiast, as **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** remembers.*

NO TRAIN SPOTTERS' proudly proclaimed the faded sign that faced anyone at the entrance to Holbeck Shed. You couldn't miss it. It was right in front of your face as you turned into a little pedestrian alleyway. That alleyway must have been designed by the same bloke who worked out the defences of medieval castles, because it was the only way in. It had two right angle turns and there was no cover as you came out of the entrance at the other end, just near the shed office. The only things missing were arrow slits and a place where the shed foreman could pour hot tar down on your head as you attempted to enter.

Nevertheless attempt to enter we, and countless other enthusiasts, did. Usually we failed but once or twice we did get permission to have a look round, but only if someone in authority was with us. Others, I am told, gained entry by scrambling through cast iron window frames at the rear of the shed, but we were never that brave. Shed foremen were ferocious people at the best of times and it seems that the most grumpy of them were at Leeds Holbeck.

Despite all the aggravation this shed was one that you just had to get around. Not only did it contain many of the latest diesels but it was also one of the last bastions of steam, and sometimes tucked away in dark corners there were very rare 'cops' to be had of the kind that you just couldn't get elsewhere. The problem was that there was very little that you could see from the road outside.

A large brick wall separated railway property from the rather insalubrious surrounding area and there was no convenient high ground from which the site could be viewed, except for a railway bridge that rather annoyingly wasn't at the right angle for number collecting. Inside this brick wall the real treasures could be found in a massive Victorian roundhouse equipped with two turntables which might once upon a time have been made of brick but which looked as though it was »

now constructed from solid soot deposits. Getting numbers in there was difficult because the only illumination came from rooflights, which long ago had become encrusted with dirt. Fortunately some assistance was given during daylight hours by the light that poured through holes in the roof, providing shafts of light that then reflected on the puddles of water which prevailed on the uneven shed floor.

The roundhouse seemed mainly to contain steam engines but on a couple of visits there were diesels in there, but as befits the way that British Railways was run at that time they were just as dirty as the steamers. These were, however, the smaller Type

2s rather than the top-link machines.

The bigger diesels were lined up outside on parallel roads and they used to congregate alongside and in front of a building that had been converted from a repair shop into a three-road diesel shed which was parallel with the boundary wall. For some reason shed tours used to be terminated before we got to the diesels and numbers had to be got from a distance - perhaps the old steam men at the depot were ashamed of them?

A PROUD HISTORY

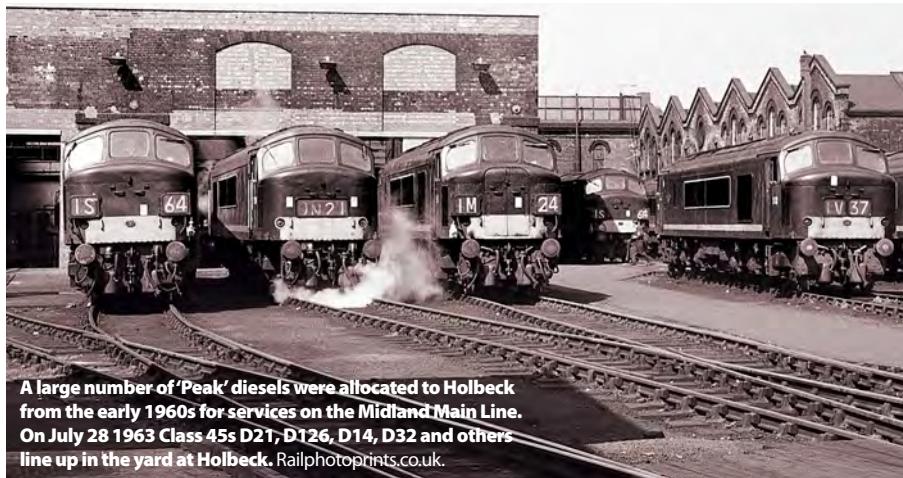
Leeds Holbeck Shed was a creation of the Midland Railway and was opened on May

9 1868 to replace a 16-road roundhouse which had served Leeds Wellington station since the company had arrived in the city in 1846. This shed was immediately to the south of the station and the site was wanted for expansion, in particular for the approach lines for the adjacent Leeds (New) station which was being built by the London & North Western Railway (LNWR).

Consequently a completely new site was obtained around a mile away on the line towards Normanton and a much larger roundhouse erected. In its very early days the shed provided traction not only for the Midland's expresses running south from Leeds but also for its network of local and suburban passenger services. Not surprisingly it also had a great deal of freight work, particularly to and from the many collieries which had been established on the coalfields around Leeds and towards Wakefield.

A STAGING POST

With the opening of the Settle-Carlisle route in 1876 Holbeck became a very important shed as it was then situated at the halfway point for trains travelling from Scotland to London and, as Leeds was a location where the train had to change direction, it was customary for engines to be changed there too. Those coming up from Scotland would visit Holbeck for servicing while the shed had its own allocation of





express locomotives to work the route.

The shed enjoyed steady expansion throughout the 19th century and provided considerable employment. By this time the city had a number of other major sheds. The North Eastern Railway had Neville Hill, the Great Northern had Copley Hill and the London & North Western had Farnley Junction. There were also smaller sheds at Ardsley and Stourton.

As a major shed on the Midland Railway, Holbeck - as might have been expected - was allocated some of the best traction available. As befit the Midland's 'small engine' policy the shed was home to several classes of 4-4-0s, including the compounds, and it had examples of the standard 0-6-0 freight engines and 0-4-4T passenger classes. After the 1923 grouping the shed became home to a more varied selection and in 1933, for example, it still had its Midland Railway 4-4-0s but was by then hosting former LNWR 'Claughton' 4-6-0s, the more modern 'Patriots' and mixed traffic designs such as the 'Crab' 2-6-0.

In later London Midland & Scottish Railway (LMS) days, Stanier's 'Jubilee' and 'Royal Scots' had taken over the prestige work while the shed had 'Black Fives', 'Crabs' and British Railways '5MT' 4-6-0s for mixed traffic duties. However, even as late as 1955, there were still four compound and two '2P' 4-4-0s on the books, as well as a few 'Jinty' 0-6-0Ts. By

this time the freight work had mainly gone over to LMS 2-8-0s but there were still some LMS 0-6-0 tender engines about. Improvements around this time included the erection of a massive standard No. 1 concrete coaling tower that could hold around 300tons of coal and which dwarfed most of the other buildings on the site.

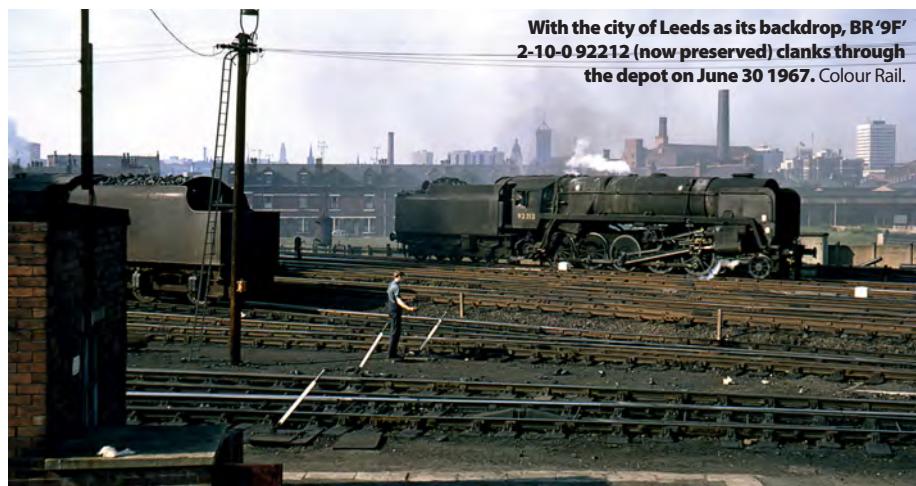
Those seeking numbers at this site could also hope to see other 'foreign' engines. British Railways '9F' 2-10-0s were frequent visitors from the Midlands and 'Britannia' class 'Pacifics' began to appear in the late 1950s. As a sign of things to come the depot pilot became a Class 03 Drewry shunter, with D2271 occupying the position for many years.

There were interesting changes in 1960 when the shed received a number of Gresley's famous 'A3' 4-6-2s which had been displaced from the East Coast Main Line and which were then allocated to Holbeck to work trains between London and Scotland via the Settle-Carlisle. These included 60070 *Gladiateur*, 60080 *Dick Turpin* and 60088 *Book Law*. At around this time the shed was also allocated 'Britannias' of its own, including 70044 *Earl Haigh* and 70054 *Dornoch Firth*.

THE DECLINE BEGINS

Throughout the late 1950s Holbeck had been losing its local passenger work to Manningham-based Diesel Multiple Units and in the process had lost some of its 2-6-2 and 2-6-4Ts but the depot itself had remained unchanged. However in 1962 British Railways began rolling out its 'Peak' diesels on the Midland Main Line and it was announced that a large number would be allocated to Holbeck.

The former No. 1 and No. 2 machine shops were converted into a diesel shed and eventually 120 diesels were allocated to the site. Most of these were 'Peaks' of both Class 45 and 46 but there were also a large number of British Railways Type 2s (mainly Class 25s) and also some Class 31s from Brush. The shed then had a few wonderful years when it housed large numbers of both steam and diesel locomotives but during which it lost first of all its express steam allocation and then the more mundane mixed-traffic locomotives. The last steam engine was transferred away from the shed on October 2 1967, less than a year from the end of steam traction.



A NEW LEASE OF LIFE

Unlike many other depots though Holbeck didn't die with the end of steam. Its 'Peaks' and Type 2s were soon bolstered by a fresh allocation of Brush Class 47s and Class 08 shunters as well as some English Electric Class 37s. To make room for these the roundhouse building was demolished in 1970 and some more plain tracks put in while the coaling tower made way for a diesel fuelling point. The depot remained very busy during the 1970s and the early 1980s but much of the freight work had by this time gone to newer depots such as Healey Mills and Knottingley while changing traffic patterns meant that demand for traction was not as heavy as it had once been, in particular for the Settle-Carlisle which was at that time being run down and was slated for closure.

In April 1986 the remaining crews were transferred to Leeds station and 47425 was named *Holbeck* in recognition of this event. From this point onwards Holbeck became a fuelling point but was often used for storage and stabling. The maintenance facility remained open, too, and in 1987 25912 achieved fame when Holbeck adopted it as a training locomotive and turned it out in two-tone green, numbered D7672 and named *Tamworth Castle*.

Locomotives continued to be stabled at Holbeck but in recent years the site has found more use as a base for permanent way machines, but it has also housed stored multiple units. Today there are far fewer buildings than there once were and the depot is largely underused but now a new future beckons, for the area is due to be revamped as a stabling point for multiple units, a move that will see brand new CAF trains mixing with 30-year old 'Sprinters'.

Holbeck was one of those sheds that had a very special atmosphere and at which you could always be sure to see an interesting and varied selection of traction. Those brought up on the antiseptic world of steam preservation can only dream of depots of this size but would recoil with horror at the poor working conditions and general decay of the railways of the late steam era.

Having said that, I doubt that there is anyone out there who wouldn't relish the chance to have a go at that elusive corridor with that 'No Trainspotters' sign and in the process to witness the memorable sights that once were Holbeck shed, 55A.

Barrenthorpe makes its DEBUT

With one last big push in the run up to the Great Electric Train Show, Barrenthorpe was completed just in time to make its debut.

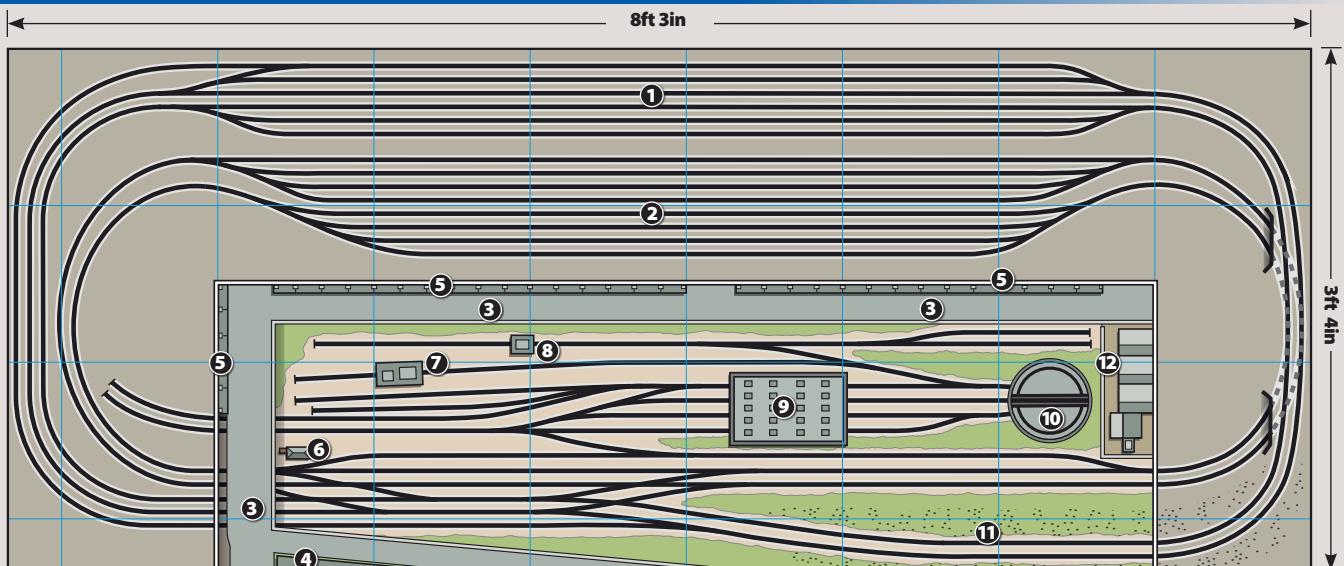

T MADE IT – JUST. It was Thursday afternoon when everything finally came together to allow Barrenthorpe to be packed up and loaded into the van ready to take part in the following weekend's Great Electric Train Show on October 8/9. This 'N' gauge layout has had a long gestation as it was originally started back in the spring of 2012. Then it was just an 8ft x 2ft layout with a double track main line and depot, but the final version is much more enthralling and, happily, it provided great entertainment for operators and visitors alike during its debut show appearance. In fact, we were delighted with its performance. The first couple of hours saw the main lines used in isolation as we ensured that everything ran smoothly. A couple of points needed cleaning and there was some mismatched stock, but once these teething issues (common on all exhibition layouts) had been overcome, we started to use more of the layout's capability.

The goods loops were introduced next, although a little extra cleaning was needed here, followed by the crossovers until we had the full main line scheme operating just the way we wanted it to. There is something quite magical about watching one of the long freights weave from one line to the other through the crossovers – and all controlled beautifully through the DCC Concepts Alpha system panel that we built for HM111.

Using this panel in full service at an exhibition really showed its value for a digital layout, but also showed a shortcoming in my own build style. It should have been bigger to make it easier for new operators to come along to the layout and take over. That said, at least it made it interesting for the team when they stepped in to run the layout and with experience of exhibition situations we now plan to build Alpha panels for the next project too. »

FINISHING UP

Reaching the exhibition debut took a lot of work as outlined in HM113's Staff Projects section, but it was all thoroughly worthwhile. Even after we had closed HM113 for press, more work was done to make it even better.

First a set of shelves was built to go over the running lines behind the road bridge end backscene. These were useful for storing stock, tools and cleaning materials, but also provided a dark area for trains to disappear into as they left the scenic section. Fascia panels around all four sides really enhanced the layout's presentation too and we plan on following the standard laid down by Barrenthorpe for future layouts too – no bare wood in the storage yard for our layouts. The choice of 3mm MDF for the fascia panels also helped reduce the overall weight of the layout. One final task which we squeezed in was »

adding point motors to the depot area. I had always wanted to bring this area into working order again – or at least part of it – but didn't expect to be able to fit in the work required.

Happily a couple of hours came up which were used to add eight new point motors to the depot allowing full control of the entire layout from the Alpha panel. There are a couple of points which weren't done at the back of the depot, but these have been turned into overgrown stock sidings during the scenic treatment.

SOUND INTRODUCTION

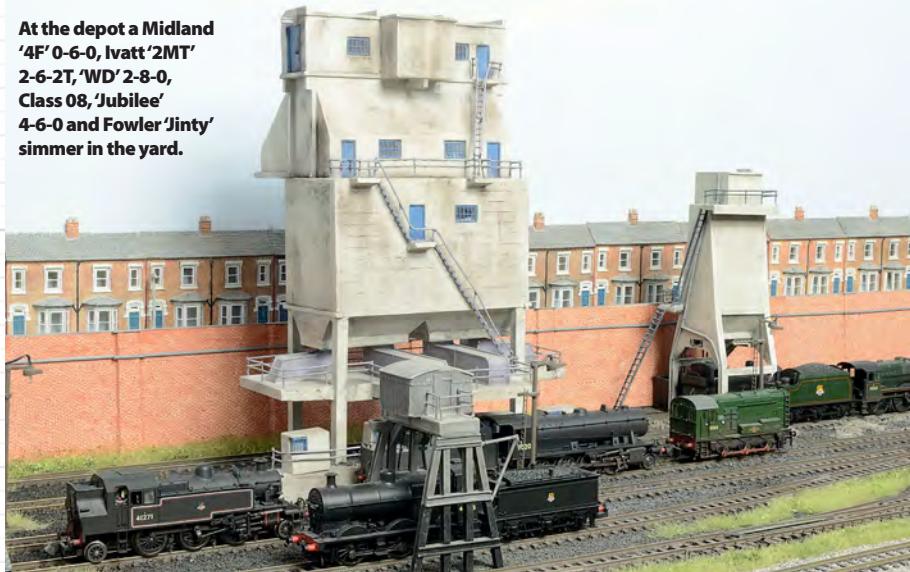
We've started to see the potential of digital sound in 'N' gauge over the past few months. The arrival of Bachmann's Class 108 with factory sound (HM112) raised this further in our plans so we took the plunge and introduced a handful of locomotives to Barrenthorpe's roster.

On the list for the first show with sound were a pair of Class 20s, a Class 24, a Class 37 and a Class 108 which had the decoder from the Bachmann sample transplanted into a BR green unit for the weekend. We also took along the Graham Farish 'Merchant Navy' from HM102 to operate on the layout and, even though it was 'off-region', it went down a treat.

All were fitted with Zimo MX649 decoders with the majority using the tiny but mighty 8mm cube speaker from the same manufacturer. The volume was suitably tamed on all models to reflect their actual size and it was pleasing to see how many visitors were surprised and impressed by the sound quality of the models.

We were pleased with the performance

of all of them and, as you might expect, have plans to add more sound decoders to the fleet in the coming months including more steam sound too.

NEXT STEPS

No layout is ever complete and that is certainly true for Barrenthorpe. It is now back in its usual spot in the *Hornby Magazine* office serving its purpose as a test track while also being used to test and prepare the 1980s period rolling stock which will be going out with West Riding Power to the Spalding Model Railway Exhibition on the weekend of November 12/13.

There is more planned though. Modifications

to the depot trackplan are still on the to do list to enhance the way that area operates, while we are also considering adding some subtle weathering to the new retaining walls as well as the track formation. Not too much though – the fresh and clean look of the layout works well for us and particularly for photography.

Then of course there is a huge list of locomotives which need weathering, detailing and fettling to really push the layout forward, but that will be an ongoing process. We plan to take Barrenthorpe out on the road again in 2017 and as soon as we know when and where we will let you know through the Staff Project pages. [Hornby](#)
