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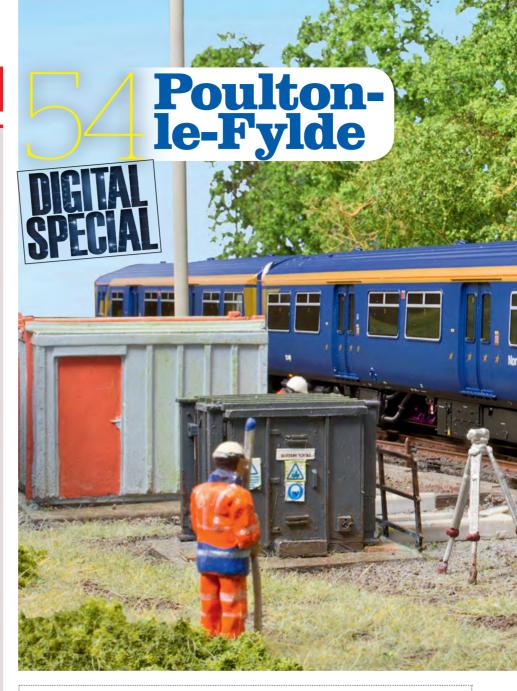
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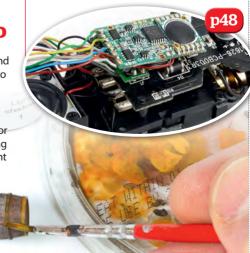

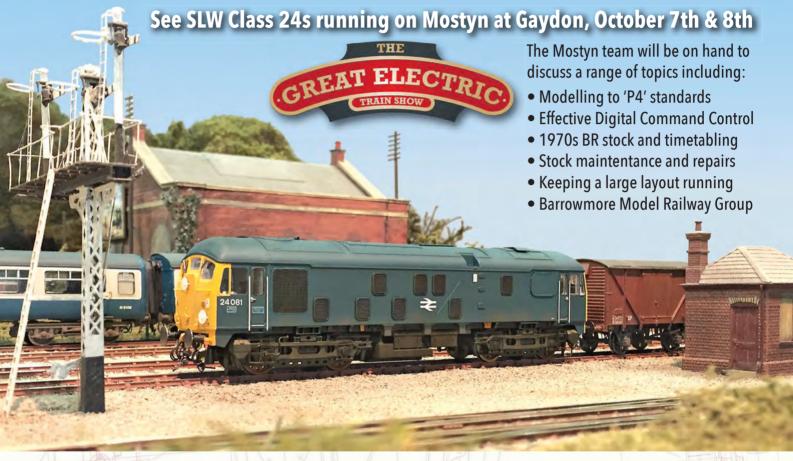

DIGITAL CONTROL has revolutionised the way I build a model railway. At the same time it has simplified the process while also introducing a whole new level of potential which, admittedly

at times, isn't always as straightforward as it might seem at first.

I've never looked back though and for me it suits my desire to gain even more enjoyment from the hobby. Getting into digital sound was a temptation too great to resist and with our recent move to use a combination of computer control for points and more conventional digital handsets for locomotive control I've technically gone back to a system which is more in line with analogue cab control. The results speak for themselves and we'll be proudly displaying our most complex digital layout in a few weeks' time at the Great Electric Train Show on October 7/8 (see Preview on pages 30-33).

In this issue we are focused on digital control first and foremost. We're taking a closer look at using Hornby's new solo Twin Track Sound decoders in its own locomotive models as well as others while also assessing control systems in the £200-£500 price bracket. For now though, we need to concentrate on finishing off Twelve Trees Junction for its return at the Great Electric Train Show. It made its debut at this show three years ago and now, after more than two years off the show circuit, we are relaunching it again at this year's event.

You can read more about its development in our online blogs this month. For now though we hope you enjoy this feature packed issue.

REVEALED IN COLOUR

ORNBY has received the first colour sample of its GWR green Class 800 Intercity Express Programme (IEP) unit finished as 800004.

The train pack, containing a full fivecar set, models a bi-mode diesel and electric set which is set to enter service on the Great Western Main Line from London Paddington during late 2017. The five-car pack is fitted with 8-pin decoder sockets in the two driving cars to control the exterior lighting and motor functions. One motor powers the full train. The 800 also has interior lighting.

The Class 800 has been developed by Hornby with the full support of Hitachi and is currently expected to be released in January 2018 (Cat No. R3514). The price for the five-car train is £374.99 and in total it is just over 5ft in length.

'Royal Scots' to return in October

Hornby's LMS rebuilt'Royal Scot' 4-6-0 is set to return in October with three new models touching down with its stockists. The model was first released in 2007 and is being reintroduced as part of the 2017 range.

The return of the 'Scot' includes updating of the decoder position so that the 8-pin socket is now in the tender rather than the boiler. As is now standard for Hornby tender engines, the drawbar

will be permanently fitted with screws together with a four-wire plug in connector to link the two components of the model.

Due for release in October is 6108 *Seaforth Highlander* in LMS lined black – a special edition for Hornby's 2017' Final Day Collection' to mark the end of the 'Big Four' in December 1947 (R3517). This will be followed in November by 6126 Royal Army Service Corps in LMS plain black (R3518) and like 6108 it will be released without smoke deflectors and coupled to a riveted tender.

The third of the trio is 46165 *The Ranger* in BR lined green with late crests, smoke deflectors and a welded tender (R3558). All three are priced at £169.99 each.





'Standard Four' approved

Hornby's new model of the BR '4MT'4-6-0 has been approved with arrival with UK stockists expected during November. The two locomotives selected for the re-introduction of the '4MT' are 75008 in BR lined green with late crests (Cat No. R3547) and 75053 in BR lined black with early crests

(R3548). The model of 75008 will be the first Hornby '4MT' 4-6-0 to be released in BR lined green. Prices are set at £169.99 with each model being equipped with an 8-pin DCC decoder socket.

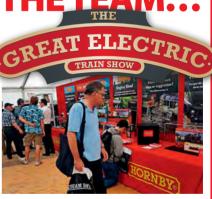

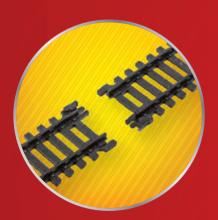

The Cobalt-SS uses a stepper motor and has been designed to operate with analogue and digital control. It can be operated with switches in both cases or, with DCC, through a command from a handset. The motors have been designed for 'plug and play' operation with pre-wired plugs and

sockets while extension cables are also available. Cobalt-SS does not require soldering for installation.

The control board includes all the abilities associated with DCC Concepts' standard Cobalt iP stall motors including feedback to panel lights, frog switching,

direction swap for the motor, adjustable throw length and more.

Automatic crossing

Train-Tech has produced an illuminated and sound equipped level crossing kit for 'OO' and 'N' gauge based around the Peco Automatic Half Barrier (AHB) crossing. The kit has been designed with digital operation in mind, but can also be operated via DC power, a conventional switch or through automation with a track sensor.

The kit contains the Peco AHB crossing components together with replacement lighting units, a speaker and suitable single core wire for connecting the components to the required power supply. Train-Tech recommends a DCC track power supply or a smooth 9-16v DC power supply for safe operation.

The heads are designed to replace the original Peco mouldings and require

a single 10mm diameter hole to be drilled in the baseboard for installation. The two lighting heads can be connected to work together and for DCC operation they can be programmed with Train-Tech's one-touch button for quick accessory addressing. The duration of the lights and sounds can also be adjusted.

The AHB light and sound kit costs £25 for a single head (Cat No. LC10) and £45 for a twin head kit (LC10P) and a full guide for its installation will be included in a future issue.

The operation of analogue and digital locomotives on the same layout is now possible with a train control system called Dinamo by VPEB. The system operates with computer control software including iTrain, Rocrail, Windigipet and Train Controller using a PC or laptop.

The Dinamo starter kit consists of an RMU interface to the computer, a TM44 module to control four blocks which detects the train in up to four sections per block and an OC32NG module to operate all

accessories such as points, signals, servos, lights, effects and more.

Advantages of the Dinamo system include no need to fit decoders to all locomotives, short circuit protection block to block, 2 amps power per block, fully expandable and multiple analogue and digital locomotives can work on the same layout.

Priced at £340 for the starter pack and further modules are available to expand the system.

Hatton's reveals... SOUTHERN'P'AND INDUSTRIAL BARCLAY

HE SOUTH EASTERN & CHATHAM RAILWAY (SECR) 'P' 0-6-0T and the industrial Andrew Barclay 0-4-0ST have been revealed as new 'OO' gauge ready-to-run products to be produced exclusively by Hatton's Model Railways.

Both new products are due to be released across December 2017 and January 2018 with the SECR 'P' being first on the list. There will be 12 versions each of the 'P' and the Barclay with prices set at £99 per locomotive. Pre-orders can be placed now at www.hattons.co.uk.

The SECR'P'0-6-0T was introduced in 1909 to a Wainwright design with the initial batch consisting of just two locomotives. It was followed in 1910 by a further batch of six with detail differences from the first including an increase in size of the side tanks and cab. The last were withdrawn in 1961 and four have been preserved with three at the Bluebell Railway and one at the Kent and East Sussex Railway - all of which have played a part



socket in the tanks and space for a speaker for sound installation. blackened wheels, separately fitted handrails, NEM pockets with small

tension lock couplings, a five-pole motor, fully detailed and painted cab interior, turned brass details, all wheel pick-up and a detailing pack including etched headcode discs, headlamps and oil can.

Variations in the tooling will cater for early and late build locomotives, lubricators on the smokebox where appropriate, BR numberplate on the smokebox, two types of buffers, cab window guards, smokebox rivets and different rear steam heat pipes.

An extensive list of liveries has been selected for the 'P' - see Table 1 – covering SECR, Southern Railway, British Railways, industrial and preservation era schemes.

Delivery of the 'Ps' is expected across December 2017 and January 2018 with Hatton's showing a fully working engineering prototype at its product launch in August with a second prototype and colour samples in production as Hornby Magazine closed for press.

The Andrew Barclay 0-4-0ST is one of the most common industrial locomotives, with the first being introduced in the 1880s. They served industry into the early 1980s with more than 25 being preserved at various sites around the country.

The Hatton's model will be

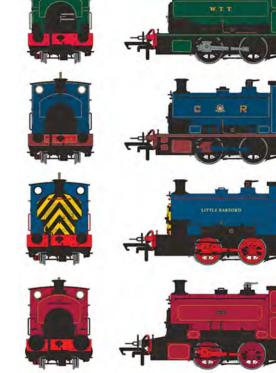

available as both 14in and 16in 0-4-0STs incorporating detail differences between the two. These will include two cab front windows, four rear cab windows, BR numberplate on the smokebox where appropriate, two buffer shanks and buffers, tank steps, lubricators, different front and springs and different saddle tank heights. The 16in version will also include the additional frame strengthening ahead of the smokebox.

The specification includes a similar level to that of the 'P' with a 6-pin DCC decoder socket provided in the tanks, separately fitted handrails, NEM coupling pockets with small tension lock couplings, a five-pole motor, fully detailed cab and weights within the boiler for maximum adhesion.

Livery variants include BR and GWR schemes modelling preserved locomotives, industrial greens, Caledonian blue and National Coal Board colours – see Table 2. The engineering sample was on display at the launch of the Andrew Barclay, which is currently being revised prior to production of a second sample and colour layouts. It is set to follow the 'P' with arrival expected at the end of January 2018.

Hatton's has received decorated samples of its first exclusive 'O' gauge ready-to-run goods wagon – the 1942-introduced 'Warwell'.

The 'O' gauge model is following in the footsteps of its 'OO' gauge counterpart (HM122) and will be available in a selection of liveries from introduction to the present day. The tooling caters for detail differences including both diamond frame



and Gloucester GPS bogies.

Ten versions are being produced with liveries including GWR,

LMS and LNER lettered War Department grey, BR grey and BR bauxite, engineer's yellow and, with Gloucester GPS bogies, three versions covering 1970s, 1990s and 2000s Ministry of Defence colour schemes.

Priced at £85 each, these new wagons are expected to be released in the first quarter of 2018 and come with turned metal wheels and working screw couplings.

Kernow to produce 'TURBOT' BALLAST WAGON

ERNOW MODEL RAIL Centre (KMRC) is producing a ready-torun 'OO' gauge YCV 'Turbot' bogie ballast wagon. Converted from Bogie Bolster E wagons in the 1980s, almost 1,000'Turbot' wagons were built at BR's workshops at Shildon,

Swindon and Doncaster for use on civil engineers' trains. They were fitted with a low-sided body, dropside doors and angled fixed ends and have been used to carry ballast, spoil, equipment and even sea-defence boulders during their careers. Most Turbots were withdrawn by the mid-2000s.

KMRC's model will incorporate a detailed body and underframe, three-hole metal wheels and short tension lock NEM couplings. They will be available in asbuilt condition in pristine civil engineers "Dutch' grey and yellow as YCV 'Turbots' together with EWS livery which also had a later

modification with extra handrails fitted. Four versions in each colour scheme will be available.

Priced at £29.99 each, a pre-order saving of £20 on a pack of four in either style is also available.

Western slant for new KMRC Limited Editions



Kernow Model Rail Centre (KMRC) unveiled details of four new 'OO' gauge exclusive limited edition models at the Old Oak Common Open Day on September 2, including a Diesel Multiple Unit (DMU), two locomotives and a trio of Mk 3a sleeper carriages.

Each model shares a Western influence with Bachmann's Class 150/2 DMU 150 216 in First

Great Western purple (Cat No. 32-935X), Class 47/7 47701 *Old Oak Common* in pristine revised Network SouthEast livery (31-657Z) and 47306 *The Sapper* in weathered Railfreight Distribution colours (32-816Z) amongst the new announcements. 512 of each will be available. Both Class 47s have Old Oak Common connections, as 47701 was named



at the depot open day in 1991 while nine years later 47306 *The Sapper* was selected to appear at the depot open day in 2000.

KMRC has also secured its first Hornby exclusive with a GWR'Night Riviera' sleeper train pack (R4868) containing three BR Mk 3a sleeper vehicles as 10590, 10601 and 10612 in GWR green. Only 250'Night Riviera' packs will be produced. Prices start from £159.99 (DCC ready) for the Class 47s, while the Class 150/2 DMU is priced at £189.95 (DCC ready), with delivery due in December. The GWR 'Night Riviera' sleeper pack is set at £89.99, with delivery anticipated in mid-2018.

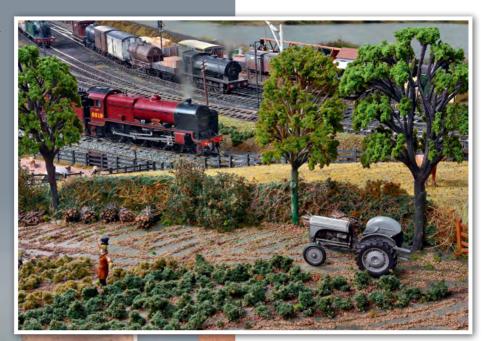

Chelmsford and District MRC set out to create a layout on which they could let members' rolling stock run freely. ROGER JOCELYN introduces St Michael's Bridge – a continuous run layout in 'O' gauge.

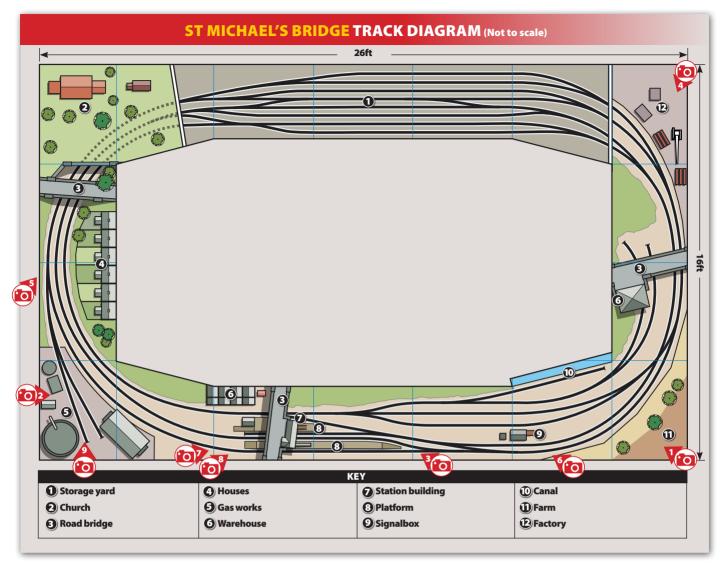
INDING space to build an 'O' gauge layout can be a challenge and especially a continuous run layout. Even to accommodate second radius set track curves in the scale demands a minimum layout width of 8ft. However, for clubs those problems aren't so difficult to conquer and the Chelmsford and District Model Railway Club's 'O' gauge group are fortunate to have an ample size clubroom in which to work.

St Michael's Bridge is a new layout from the 'O' gauge group of the Chelmsford and District MRC and came into being when the previous layout, Stoke Bishop, became run down and needed updating. During its career it has attended numerous exhibitions and it had become tired, but rather than revive it we decided to start from scratch and build a brand new layout.

Construction of St Michael's Bridge started in 2010 and it is 26ft x 16ft offering a continuous run more than 80ft in length for our growing roster of 'O' gauge locomotives and rolling stock. Its primary purpose has been to offer a railway on which the group's stock can run unhindered by the constraints of a terminus layout - and with ample opportunity to run reasonable length trains too. As such it consists primarily of a double track main line with goods operations too. Scenery has been built up on three sides and there is an eight track storage yard at the rear of the layout. It has not been modelled on any particular >>>

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location or region so as to accommodate members' preferences in locomotives and rolling stock which range from the 1940s pre-nationalisation era through to the 1960s steam to diesel transition.

MAIN LINE SCENE

The baseboards were built in 4ft x 3ft sections with the corner sections being bigger and odd shapes. They are all made from 3in x 1in timber topped with 9mm plywood and sit on adjustable legs.

Plain track is Peco with 80% of the pointwork scratch built to fit the track plan. All the points are controlled by Tortoise point motors. The track is laid on foam strip and ballasted in the well tried method of granite chippings set into place with diluted PVA wood glue. The track plan was built around a complex junction which was donated by a group member – this determined the rest of the track formations through the station and yards.

The layout depicts a through station with up and down main lines surrounding an island platform together with a bay platform and an independent bidirectional goods line which gives access to the goods yard and warehouse.

There is a narrow gauge railway which runs along the back of the station to serve a small jetty where barges load and unload. In one corner there is a gasworks, which was researched and skilfully constructed by club members. The gasometer rises and falls by an electric motor, also built by a group member, which received the runners up award for the structure in the scenic category at Guidex in 2016. On the opposite corner there is a church - a

favourite view amongst the team and a building which really towers above the scenery in 'O' gauge - with a wedding party outside being blessed by the vicar. Bell sounds have been added to the scratch built church to give it a more realistic effect alongside digital sound locomotives running on the layout.



The station has three platform faces – an island for the main lines and a separate platform for the bay. A Class 108 waits for a clear road as a 'J94' 0-6-0ST crosses onto the main with a short goods.

The wiring of the layout allows for operation with a choice of analogue and digital control systems.

When in analogue mode it is operated with Morley controllers while the changeover to digital sees a Gaugemaster Prodigy wireless system connected to the layout giving the team total flexibility over their driving positions. The layout can only be operated with one control system at a time and it takes approximately five minutes to change from one to the other involving disconnection of one and connection of the other and switching of all section switches to the on position for digital operation. This allows maximum flexibility for the group's stock to be run as some build for digital operation and others purely for analogue.

There are two power districts on St Michael's Bridge - one for the storage yard and the other for the station and goods yard side of layout. This is to ensure that running one area would not affect the other should a problem arise and it helps to maintain smooth operation of the layout both at home and away.

By choice points are switch controlled via a separate 12v DC supply - we felt that having them separate reduced the complexity of the layout. One set of controls for running locomotives, whether DC or DCC, and a separate DC supply for point changes. This means we only have to change the controllers for running DC or DCC not for point control as well.

The layout is fully signalled too with colour lights on the main lines and semaphores on the goods line. All of the signals have been built by club members and the colour lights on the main line are automatically controlled by the trains running around the layout and change from red to yellow to green in sequence after the passing of a train.

This sequence is controlled by Heathcote Electronics automatic control units. The semaphores are controlled by servos >>>

which give a realistic bounce when returning to danger. We decided not to have the signals control the locomotives, which means that the driver of each train must be vigilant at all times, especially when using DCC as there are at least two locomotives operating on each of the up and down lines at a time.

STOCK AND OPERATION

As mentioned the rolling stock used on the layout is owned by club members and all four regions and different eras are represented. Most of the digital equipped locomotives are sound fitted.

On running nights a good variety of trains can be seen including a Fowler 'Patriot' 4-6-0 hauling a rake of LMS carriages, an LNER 'J20' 0-6-0 with a goods train, a Southern Railway 'T9' 4-4-0 at the head of a rake of Bulleid stock and a 'Warship' diesel-hydraulic with BR Mk 1s. Locomotive sources include Tower Models, Connoisseur Kits, Mercian Models, Easybuild and others.

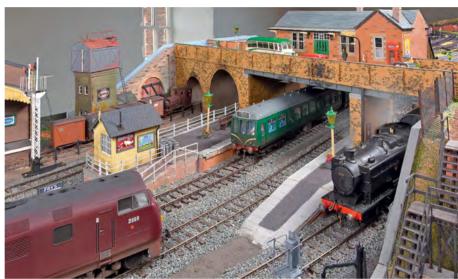
The increasing range of ready-to-run products also appears on the layout which have widened the market reach for 'O' gauge, although some products can be a bit expensive. However, you have to weigh-up your time and skills to build a kit against having a ready-to-run model. Of course where special coaches or rolling stock are required then kits and sometimes scratch building are the only way to get exactly what you want.

The rolling stock fleet is made up of Parkside, Peco, Slaters for the wagon fleet along with Ian Kirk carriages to name but a few. In addition there are ready-to-run items from Heljan, Lionheart, Tower Brass and Dapol.

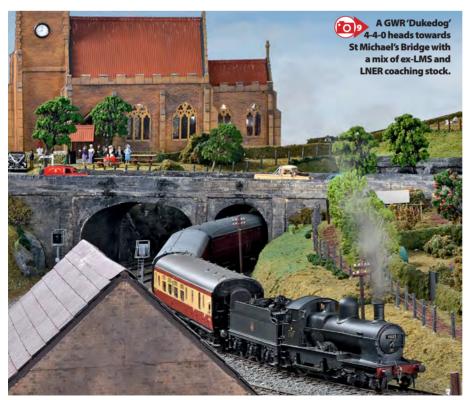
During a running session trains leave the storage yard and complete two or three circuits of the layout before returning

to the yard to allow another train to do the same. Freights, on the other hand, leave the yard and proceed to the goods line arriving in the yard prior to running round the train and shunting wagons.

ON SHOW

St Michael's Bridge was exhibited at Guildex Telford last year and was a big success as it was a special exhibition to mark the 60th anniversary of the Gauge O Guild. This year it will be at the Chelmsford exhibition in October adding a fourth outing to the layout's public appearances. It has also seen visitors to the Chelmsford club with other clubs bringing their stock to stretch their legs on its 80ft running line.

All in all the layout has been enjoyable to build and operate and hopefully will continue to be so. As the layout is quite large to transport, dismantle and erect and, as club members are not getting any younger, we are planning to build a smaller more manageable layout to take to exhibitions in the future too. Baseboards have been donated by a club member for this purpose, so watch this space for the finished layout...

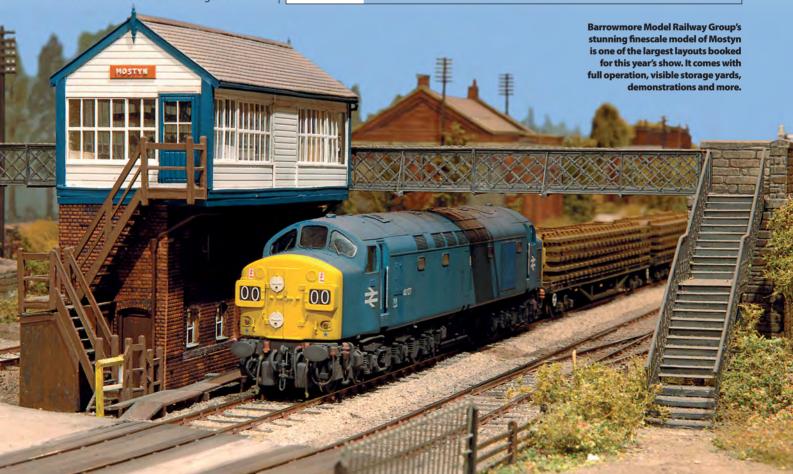

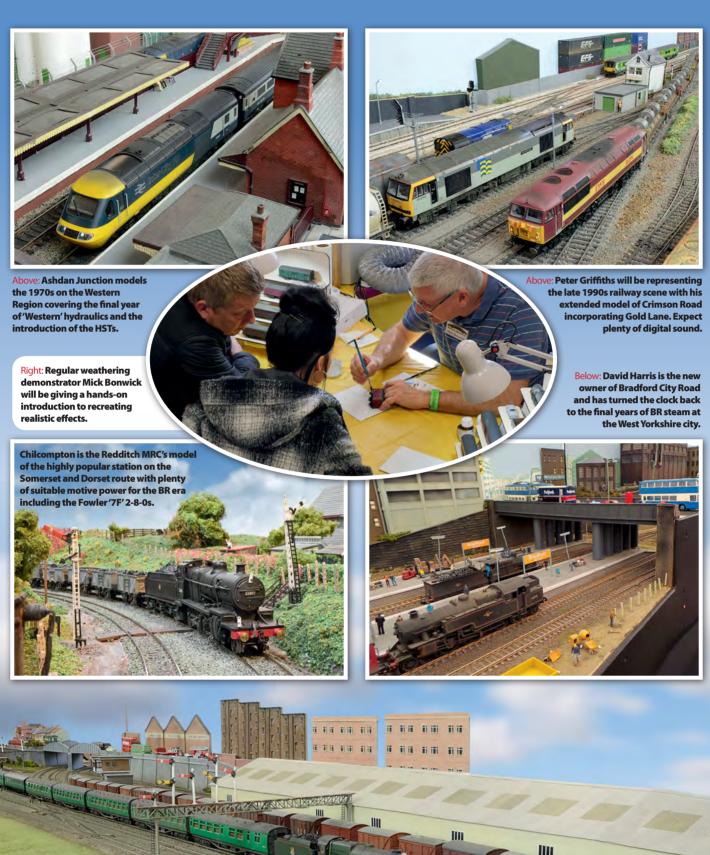

Mid-range Choosi minefies some in the tect of capa COMMAN

IGITAL COMMAND CONTROL (DCC) systems come in all shapes and sizes from easy-to-use handsets to advanced fully integrated consoles, with specifications and prices to match. Having previously reviewed a selection of digital starter systems in our last Digital Special (HM107), this issue we look at an assortment of mid-range DCC hardware priced between £200-£500.

Given the potential outlay, it is important to think about the power supply and the capabilities of the system you are after and whether you want a traditional manual style controller or something a little more contemporary, such as a system employing wi-fi wireless technology, for example.

Some systems offer computer-based control with the potential for automated routines

too. Such is the market today, if you want to mix a little automation with manual control, there will be a system that can do this for you, and you can choose from controllers with push button and rotary dial controls to touch screen multi-menu systems. Look to the future, too, as the controllers do represent quite an investment. Is it future-proof? Some command stations now include a Universal Serial Bus (USB) computer interface to enable the system's firmware to be updated/upgraded.

Another factor to consider is ease of use, as there is nothing more frustrating than struggling to get the system to connect or remembering certain programming routines and 'which button does what'. If setting up a Local Area Network (LAN) is not your forte, there will be

needs and capabilities. Conversely, there are systems available to control your layout utilising mobile applications (app) on a smartphone or tablet device. These are exciting times.

Some DCC systems act mainly as controllers with limited roster ability, while others will allow you to create a database of locomotives, including photographs of your models as well

36-504RC Bachmann Dynamis Ultima

Bachmann's Dynamis Ultima DCC system launched in 2015 with improved infra-red (IR) connectivity, Universal Serial Bus (USB) link and RailComPlus capability, while earlier this year the package was re-issued bundled with an evaluation copy of the manufacturer's newly-developed RailController DCC computer software (HM119).

As a combined system, it offers a 3amp power supply, full Configuration Variable (CV) programming and computer interface which elevates this system above what has gone before. It comes with a database of pre-profiled Bachmann and Graham Farish models, with accompanying photographs, together with the ability to load your own locomotives and images. Short and long locomotive addresses (1-9999) are supported, although individual CV values are only programmable through the supplied wireless IR handset as the RailController software cannot currently read/write these.

Each pre-loaded locomotive has been speed profiled with scale realistic top speeds, while the profiling routine also



enables you to calibrate your own additions to the system too. Universal and advanced consisting is also a simple process to set up by just clicking and dragging locomotives into a consisting box on-screen. If they feature different top speeds, both locomotives are regulated to the lower of the two maximums, while route setting is also possible, with the system

able to control up to 100 accessory addresses. Schematic track diagrams incorporating accessory addresses can also be developed.

Track voltage is adjustable, making it suitable for 'N' through to 'G' scale applications, while RailComPlus enabled locomotive decoders can communicate with the system.

Whilst RailController has been developed to

as developing schematic track diagrams and much more. If you have multiple turnouts on your layout, route setting may also be a consideration, so check that the system that interests you supports this and will cater for the quantity of turnouts you wish to operate.

AMIS

As with any significant purchase, it is always good advice to try before you buy, to ensure the system is right for your needs. Speak with

layout operators and demonstrators at model railway exhibitions, visit your nearest model shop or one of the specialist DCC retailers and check out manufacturers' websites for system-specific manuals that you can download to aid the decision-making process.

With systems available from Bachmann, Digitrax, ESU, Gaugemaster, Hornby, Lenz, NCE, ROCO,

Sig-naTrak, ZIMO, ZTC and more, it has not been possible to include every product available. However, the following control systems offer a snapshot of those that have caught our eye with a range of control options including wireless, wi-fi, infra-red and computer console operation.

+ RailController

enhance Dynamis Ultima's capabilities, the base station can also be operated with the supplied joystick wireless handset too. Up to four handsets can be used at the same time. This is particularly useful if you make use of RailController's programming routines, as you can set up automated sequences whilst also operating other locomotives manually. There appears to be no limit to the number of locomotives that can be stored within RailController's locomotive roster although the wireless handsets now only retain a roster of 30 locomotives and offer access to 20 locomotive decoder functions (plus F0 head/

tail lights), while the on-screen locomotive throttles display up to 15 function keys by default, with a further five functions accessible by clicking through to another page. Four on-screen throttles can be displayed at a time.

As supplied, the RailController software is an evaluation version but the full licence can be purchased from Bachmann retailers or online through the software.

At just shy of £350 for the combined Dynamis Ultima system and fully-licenced RailController software, it represents a considerable investment, but is easy to use and effectively offers two DCC control methods in one, offering computer control and freedom of movement around the layout utilising its wireless handsets.

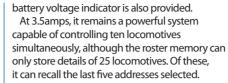

Gaugemaster's Prodigy Wireless starter pack offers its popular Prodigy Advance² DCC control system in true wireless format, utilising a plug-in wireless receiver for the base station unit.

Similar in appearance to its standard controller, the Wireless Walkaround version of the handset is supplied with four rechargeable AAA batteries which enable the system to operate over a wide area. As with previous handsets, it features a backlit screen display, push button selection and retains a socket to allow it to be tethered to the base station with the supplied cable, if required, which also doubles as the means to recharge the handset's batteries. A useful



Locomotives can be controlled by standard rotary control dial or by selecting the incremental speed step buttons, while advanced/universal consisting and route setting are also supported. In fact, the route setting routine is particularly useful in that you can throw or close the selected route in quick succession by toggling the 1 or 2 keys on the handset, subject to a maximum of 31 routes, each with up to eight accessories. Signals are also easily controlled from the handset.

CV programming is a little more involved as you toggle between the menus, but can be used to programme on the main line (POM) or programming track. It

also supports two and four-digit locomotive addresses (0-9999), advanced and universal consisting, control of up to 29 locomotive decoder functions (although only F0-F12 will be displayed on screen) and provides a useful crib sheet printed on the rear of the handset.

In terms of connectivity, the base unit features outputs to the main track and programming track, together with three sockets at the front for tethered connections. System expansion allows

for up to 32 cab handsets to be connected



to the Prodigy Wireless system. On test, our example proved reliable at up to 40ft from the layout within the *Hornby Magazine* office, and the instructions suggest up to 100ft range is possible.

Gaugemaster's Prodigy Advance² is the control system of choice for use with *Hornby Magazine's* exhibition layouts and at £479.95 the Prodigy Wireless starter pack is at the upper end of the price bracket for its specification, offering a highly capable and impressive wireless DCC system which enables freedom of movement and the ability to add more handsets for multiple operator use.

55040 Piko Smartbox Digital Starter Set



German manufacturer Piko's Smartbox Digital Starter system employs mobile telephone technology at the heart of its make-up.

Comprising a 2.5amp output base station and separate wireless throttle handset, the latter has the appearance and feel of a modern smartphone, combined with a large motor driven control dial on top. Also included are a power adaptor, USB to mini-USB cable, lanyard and comprehensive instruction manual.

Powered by the Android 4 operating system, connectivity is configured through touch screen menu settings within the handset to link with the separate base station. First appearances can be deceptive as its small footprint masks an impressive capability. As the system relies on a wi-fi connection, the manufacturer recommends that only one smart box is utilised per room, although up to 32 controllers can be connected to the one box.

Featuring adjustable track voltage, the system has full CV read and write functionality, with on-screen 'bit' selectors for calculating CV values, supports 28 locomotive decoder functions (plus F0 head/tail lights) and is RailComPlus enabled too. CV programming can be carried out on the main line (POM) or a programming track.

Central to the system is the wireless throttle handset with 3.5in TFT full colour touch

screen, which also features four separate customisable function buttons – two on each side of the device – for assigning specific tasks. Screen resolution is good, with slick navigation between menu settings and rosters, which can be personalised to your needs.

Up to four locomotives are supported per consist, while the internal database will store details of 16,384 locomotives and 1,024 accessory addresses. Speed control can be set through an on-screen slider or by turning the motor-driven rotary control dial. When operating multiple locomotives, the system remembers the speed of each locomotive and the control dial moves accordingly to its last known setting as each active address is selected.

A USB interface aids computer updates, provides a charging point for the handset and enables the use of third-party DCC control software. It also features an ECoSlink connection for linking to other similarly compatible systems such as ESU's ECoS Command Centre, as the handsets are virtually identical.

At £425, this is a well specified system with a high-quality feel to it and plenty of data storage, although you will need to remember to charge the handset.

Introduced in 2012, Roco's Z21 digital control centre is sleek in appearance, with its gloss black exterior accommodating an accomplished 3amp system which has been designed to utilise smartphone and tablet technology.

The Z21 package includes the base station, wi-fi LAN router, power supplies and LAN cable together with a basic instruction manual and does offer quick plug and play set-up. Our example was up and running in under ten minutes, having connected to the system's network and configured the downloadable mobile app, which is available for Apple and Android devices. Further set-up instructions can be found at www.z21.co.uk and it can also be connected to a PC and configured for use with third-party DCC software control systems too.

Roco's Z21 supports 28 functions (plus F0 head/tail lights) and the on-screen keypad

and as you add locomotives to the roster, you can also take a photograph from the device and import directly to the roster card. Once in the system, you can choose to activate the locomotive

or leave it inactive until a future session, which determines whether it appears on the ribbon feed in the throttle control screen. Consists are also relatively straightforward to configure and the Z21 uses a time elapse equation to match locomotives ahead of consisting. Layout track plans can also be photographed and overlaid with pre-loaded track components to create a digital plan, while route settings can also be configured.

The Z21 offers impressive connectivity with LAN, CAN-Bus, feedback, B-Bus, L-Bus, R-Bus, Sniffer Bus and three X-Bus sockets, as well as programming track and main track ports. It is

devices can be linked comfortably, although more than 250 connections are possible. If you'd prefer to retain an element of traditional control, a Roco multiMAUS control handset can also be connected.

For added novelty, the Z21 includes the ability to download driver cab apps to your mobile device which put you in the cab of a full-size locomotive. These can be selected from the controller app and appear with active control handles, although they take a little getting used to. The cabs are of Continental steam, diesel and electric outline, but certainly add a new dimension to operating locomotives and multiple units in miniature.

Taking it another step further, the Z21 can also be linked to Roco's range of video enabled locomotives which can relay real-time footage of your layout to your mobile device, overlaid by the driver cab 'skins'. At £359.95, this really is a superb piece of kit, combining functionality, connectivity, and ease of use with sheer entertainment - plus, it also looks the part too.

A relatively new name to digital control systems, Sig-naTrak's ACE 2 digital control system offers some serious competition to the established manufacturers. Two versions are available in 3.5amp and 5amp formats and, interestingly, the price difference between the two is just £12.

Cased within a rectangular silver and black box, the ACE 2 aims to simplify the setup, programming and operating processes through a series of touch-screen modes, utilising coloured buttons along the bottom of the screen. Power features include an emergency stop button which can stop a specific train or all locomotives (but system power remains 'on') and a power 'off' button which cuts power to everything.

Clearly thought has been given to the end user with a number of useful features such as the ability to read and write CVs on the same screen, a useful on-screen CV29 slide button calculator and the ability to display locomotive control with full access to all 29 decoder function buttons – no more scrolling through multiple screens when operating DCC sound-fitted locomotives. Locomotive control can be performed by incremental speed steps or by slider control.

As well as operating multiple locomotives from the on-screen controllers, you can also add basic manual rotary controllers which feature limited functionality (f0-f4), and require DCC addresses allocating to them by the main command centre before they can be used. Whilst this undoubtedly keeps the costs down, it also offers additional flexibility as these hand-held controllers can be unplugged from the main system and moved elsewhere on a layout without interrupting

Set to 128 speed steps by default, the ACE 2 also supports 14 and 28 speed steps and has capacity to store 127 locomotives (address 1-9999) and up to 85 accessories (address 1-2044) within the system's memory. Data is saved in a roster and it supports Operations (POM) and Service Modes (programming track). A useful on-screen total power draw indicator is also included showing the current

readout of all accessories and locomotives.

Consisting is clear-cut with on-screen sliders to select direction and function characteristics for each locomotive. Up to six locomotives/multiple units can be grouped in a single consist.

Point control can be a slower process and currently the system doesn't provide route setting, but at just £192 for the 3.5amp system and £204 for the 5amp system plus the cost

of separate handsets (£29 each), this really is a remarkable system which belies its price point. It is fully NMRA compliant and has been designed to keep things simple while its built-in USB interface provides for firmware upgrades. Looking to the future, route setting and PC control are planned together

WAYS OF... MODELLING INTERMODAL TRAFFIC

'OO' and 'N' gauge modellers have never had it so good when it comes to running container trains. **TIM SHACKLETON** looks at how you can make the most of what the trade has to offer.

IR-BRAKED CONTAINER TRAINS have been a feature of the UK railway scene for more than half a century. The original Freightliner operation – then part of British Rail – began running what were called 'liner trains' in the final years of the steam era. Unlike earlier experiments such as the 'Condor', they looked much like the intermodal trains of today – and Triang/Hornby were quick to rush a suitable bogie container wagon into production.

Unfortunately, in modelling terms that's where things stayed for the best part of four decades. It's only in the last ten years or so that we've had much choice in terms of having scale wagons and containers available in 4mm and 2mm scales. Quite a few kits have appeared in the meantime but – other than Colin Craig's exquisite (and exquisitely complicated) FFA/FGA – they've tended to cover the less common

types and some, quite frankly, have verged on the nightmarish in terms of buildability.

Today all that's changed. Having offered well over a hundred different designs and liveries in 'OO' and 'N', C-Rail Intermodal has cornered the market for containers. Half a dozen different types of container wagons are now available over the counter in 'OO' gauge from manufacturers such as Bachmann, Hornby, Dapol and Realtrack. Bachmann is also developing the iconic FFA/ FGA – the wagon that started it all – and Dapol has also recently released the low-bodied IDA type. In 'N' gauge, with fewer manufacturers, the choice is more limited but even then the options are still surprisingly wide and new wagon types are promised from C-Rail and Revolution Trains. If you care about realistic operation, the challenge now is less to do with getting any kind of plausible-looking intermodal train together and more about getting the right containers

on the right wagons in the right combination behind the right locomotive. You can't just hitch any old selection of intermodals behind a spare Class 47 or 66 and send it off to Felixstowe or Southampton – well you can, but that's not what my kind of prototype-based modelling is about.

In this piece I want to look at making best use of the wagons and containers that are available ready to run. We'll look at who owns them, how they operate, the formations they run in and what they're loaded with. Our primary focus is on deep-sea containers and those used on international rail routes although there are other containerised traffic flows carrying, for instance, domestic refuse, limestone and even coal.

For the last 50 years, container trains have added a welcome splash of colour and variety to rail operations and once you get interested in them, they can become dangerously addictive.



SECTION 1: CONTAINER TRAINS

THE HUMBLE BOX

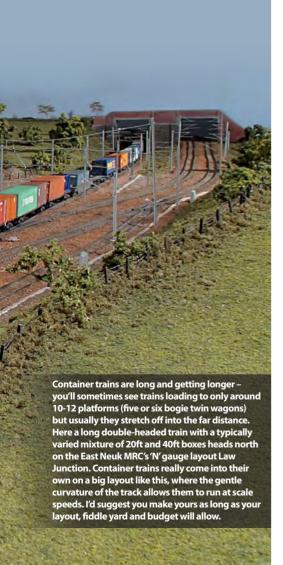
Containers in all their infinite variety are at the root of all intermodal modelling. I'm as fascinated by them as by the wagons that carry them and the locomotives that haul them. All the major manufacturers have had a go at modelling containers - some with more success and attention to detail than others – but for me the best by far are those from C-Rail Intermodal, which to date has produced getting on for 80 different designs in 'OO' gauge as well as transfers for a great many more. The subtle variations of body styles and the crisp and accurate rendition of the liveries puts them in a class of their own. These are 20ft boxes from the days when Freightliner was a British Rail operation.

But even these wonderful models can be improved by careful weathering. My inspiration is always the real thing – deepsea containers weather differently to those that mostly travel by road transport, and



an hour or two studying them from a safe position behind the lineside fence can reap rich rewards. In most cases the once-bright colours need toning down to reflect the effect over time of sun, rain and sea water – I replicate this by a gentle overall misting of a pale pinkish-beige filter (ComArt Light

Dust acrylic for choice). A spot of rust around the anchor points, a few dings and scrapes along the bodysides, the odd bit of patchpainting and you should be just about done – but with any container train, whatever shipping lines are involved, don't forget to include a few newish-looking boxes!





Other than DRS's Stobart, Tesco and Asda 'shopping trolley' trains formed of IKA and IDA megafrets, intermodals made up exclusively of the same type of wagon are very unusual – I'm not saying it never happens, but you're far more likely to see a miscellany of various types of rolling stock. Nor will you ever see trains with a mix of different operators' stock – Freightliner and GBRf in the same train, for instance.

Ownership issues aside, sets appear to be entirely random in formation, rather than being grouped according to type. For authenticity, you need to be aware of which companies operate what type of wagon. In terms of what's available from the trade for the different operators, the choice is a good one but it's much wider in 4mm than in 2mm.

EWS/DBC – FFA/FGA (Bachmann – due 2017),

Today's container workings are tightly timed and as predictable as the passenger services with which they share the tracks. 66542 powers out of Felixstowe at the start of its journey with 470S, the weekdays-only 11.10am to Trafford Park on April 11 2017. After being recessed at Ipswich and Crewe Basford Hall, the 1,200-tonne train will reach its destination some ten hours later, having travelled over the North London line and then up the West Coast Main Line. The maximum permitted line speed for this train is 75mph.



Nothing if not predictable. The first air-braked container trains of the modern era relied on Class 47s and

later they were joined by pairs of Class 37s. These locomotives, by then well over 30 years old, were still the basis of Freightliner operations as we entered the privatisation era but were soon swept aside, to be replaced first by the newly re-engined Class 57s and then by the supremely reliable products of General Motors and General Electric.

These days, the Class 66 is universal among all operators although Freightliner use Class 70s on some services, as well as Class 90s and the venerable Class 86s on electrified lines. DRS will often schedule a Class 68 for one of its intermodal workings. For the short time it was in the intermodal business (2006-2009) Fastline Freight employed three Class 56s painted a striking grey and black livery with diagonal flashes. Its small Class 66 fleet was used exclusively on coal traffic and they only appeared – and then very briefly – in intermodal service after being sold to DRS. They



were quickly repainted in DRS corporate blue.
Other classes have appeared from time to time, either in special circumstances or in an emergency. In the 1990s the powerful BR-owned Class 56s were regularly used on the steeply-

graded Felixstowe branch but the longer and heavier trains of the modern era need serious muscle and these days your traction options are limited. Apart from some minor detail variations, only the liveries vary nowadays.

Bachmann's FIA/IFA intermodal twin was the first high-quality, highly detailed container wagon released in 4mm scale and was subsequently followed by an 'N' gauge version from Graham Farish. If your tastes run to large-scale garden railways, there's even a Gauge 1 version from

Bachmann's associate company Aristocraft. In some ways it was a strange choice - never very numerous, the FIA was developed in the early 1990s for Railfreight Distribution and was generally employed on dedicated Channel Tunnel services. In the privatisation

era they've been used exclusively by EWS but since DB Schenker took over, many have been taken out of service, while others find use as translator/barrier vehicles. IFA wagons are European-registered versions of the same thing that are occasionally seen in this country.

These wagons have only a 50ft platform so, since the UIC standard box is either 20ft or 40ft long, their payload is limited - most intermodal wagons have 60ft of usable deck space. Bachmann has issued various versions, some with 45ft containers and others with 20ft boxes. The real thing is generally seen carrying 40ft containers mounted centrally. The FIA's bright green livery looked attractive at first but was quickly overlaid by a thick coat of grime.

HE UBIQU



The KFA is very much the default-setting lease-fleet container wagon of the last 30 years. They were built in large numbers and

are used in intermodal traffic by all the major operators apart from GBRf – Fastline used them to supplement its small fleet of FEA/B

container twins. They run as single wagons and can be seen in all parts of the country, tucked in among intermodal stock of all kinds.

Launched in 2010 and recently reissued, Hornby's model is, in my view, the very best 4mm scale container wagon that's ever been released in this country – let's hope the forthcoming 'N' gauge version from Revolution Trains is as good! Absolutely nothing needs doing to it other than applying the universal coat of grime - the only blue showing should be where the data panels have been rubbed clean. There are many different types of container wagons but since they're all universally filthy - most will never have been repainted and still less cleaned since the day they entered service - you'll need great consistency in the way you weather them. A clean one is rare!



These wagons – I suggest you start saving now for the forthcoming Bachmann model! - were a staple of container operations from the very start and they only passed out of front-line service around 2004. Freightliner, not surprisingly, was the main employer, going right back to when the operation was first set

up by British Rail, though EWS had some in pre-DBS days. Some were still in BR blue right to the end. The wagons ran in sets of up to five, always with two outer FGA wagons with buffers and conventional drawgear at one end.

Hornby brought out an 'OO' gauge model almost as soon as the real thing appeared and it's still in production under the RailRoad banner. It's only vaguely accurate, unfortunately - it's the right length but it sits much too high on its bogies, and the open latticework construction of the real thing has been compromised and beefed up in a bid produce a plastic model that will resist warping. Graham Farish offers something more refined in 'N' gauge but once again only the inner wagon is available.

However, all this will soon change when Bachmann brings out both an inner (FFA) wagon without buffers and the essential FGA outer wagon with a full set of drawgear. Anticipating what Barwell will do, I built a five-car set of FFA/ FGAs by merging Hornby wagons with S Kits detailing parts. The key features are the new buffer beams on the outer wagons, the bogies lowered on their mountings and fitted with scale wheels from Alan Gibson, container mountings and air tanks. They're still only an approximation of the real thing but to me they pass muster.

IKA LOWLINER (4mm, 2mm)

Since their introduction in 2001 this wagon type has become pretty ubiquitous – along with the KFA, it's a rare container train that doesn't include a few examples. They run in pairs and have low-slung bodywork to enable them to carry 9ft and 9ft 6in tall high-cube containers on routes from which they'd otherwise be barred. Nevertheless, they're often loaded with standard 8ft 6in containers. As with the FIA, whose dimensions are surprisingly similar, the platform is 50ft long and the containers are always loaded centrally. If the cargo is two 20ft boxes, then these will be spaced out symmetrically but normal practice is to load them singly, one per wagon.

Dapol's model (an 'N' gauge version first, followed by the 'OO' model) was heavily criticized in some quarters when it first appeared – unfairly, in my view. The vibrant blue livery takes some getting used to but these wagons are always indescribably filthy, with the blue only showing through where data panels have been rubbed clean. If you want to practice weathering, this is an ideal opportunity! The model's major failing is the way the ends of the bodywork are fixed to the bogies to enable the wagon to run round



a dinner plate. Rectifying this calls for some simple but aggressive surgery. Remove the bogies and cut through the blue plastic flush with the sideframes. Thin down the bodywork sections you've just removed and, having packed them with 20thou styrene strip, glue them to the main body. You'll need to round off the outer ends of the bogies so they won't foul the bodywork. To touch up the blue paintwork, use Revell No. 50 Light Blue let down with white.



The majority of intermodal wagons are leased and carry a nondescript livery but both Freightliner and GBRf operate substantial fleets carrying their own branding. One of the most familiar types is the FEA/B which is available from Dapol in both 4mm and 2mm scales – and a splendid model it is too. GBRf and Freightliner FEA/Bs have been offered while the now-obsolete Fastline wagons in their striking grey and yellow livery were offered some years ago as a limited edition.

These wagons are produced in limited batches and once they're gone, they're gone. My advice is always to buy as soon as they're released – you may not get a second chance. On the other hand, the pre-owned market is usually pretty healthy for intermodal wagons. Keep an eye on internet auction sites, local model shops, swapmeets and the second-hand stands at shows, it shouldn't take long to acquire what you want.

LOWLINE

The global adoption of ISO standard containers revolutionised international freight transport. Container widths and lengths are fixed but

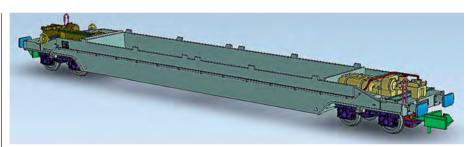
the height has varied - early ISO containers were 8ft or 8ft 6in tall, but later 9ft and 9ft 6in tall high-cube boxes came in. Increased

clearances along major routes allowed BR and its successors to use conventional platforms to carry 8ft 6in boxes but for the taller boxes, new and lower wagons were required.

Realtrack Models offers an excellent model of the Romanian-built FLA twin wagon, which was introduced in 2004. A development of an earlier five-wagon design, they operate in pairs on Freightliner services to and from Southampton. Felixstowe, Trafford Park and other key hubs. Depending on what traffic is available they can be seen carrying all kinds and sizes of container, and not just the high-cubes for which they were designed. They are invariably seen in the company of other wagon types operated by Freightliner, such as the KFA, FEA/B and KTA.

These wagons, owned originally by Tiphook but now operated by GE Rail Services, are another attempt to

deal with the problem of transporting high-cube containers within Britain's limited loading gauge. The load - one 40ft box or two 20-footers - is carried on an open lattice framework slung low between the bogies, with the solid sides giving the wagon much of its structural strength. The wagons entered service in 1997 and, like all container wagons, have probably never been cleaned in their lives although traces of their Tiphook blue livery can be glimpsed where data panels have been wiped over. Recoded from



KQA to KTA around 2004 when their ownership changed, Freightliner is the only user of this type. In 2010 Dapol brought out an excellent 4mm scale reproduction of this unusual wagon type. Custom-weathered versions have been sold by

both Hatton's and Kernow - the bodysides look great but the 'pocket' lacks the characteristic scrape marks that are a standard feature of the real thing. The upcoming 'N' gauge model from C-Rail Intermodal is well advanced.

of'lightly weathered simply doesn't exist for intermodal wagons - they're

either brand new or absolutely filthy, as these before and after shots show. A gentle overall misting doesn't look very plausible!

With their unvarying (but subtly varied) livery of all-over brownish grey, weathering container wagons is a great way to practice your skills. I

almost always apply a first coat of LifeColor's Frame Dirt (UA719) acrylic to which I'll then create a second mix by adding a generous measure of Burned Black (UA736) and blending them together with an airbrush. Spray the wagon from all angles, not just above, otherwise you'll see the original

livery showing through

is much as you might do with enamel paint only we're applying the same figures to acrylics. Don't expect to do it all in one hit - a series of light coats is better, while thick paint will only clog your airbrush. Remember also to stir the paint for a good two minutes beforehand – a battery-powered paint stirrer is the best way to do this. If you follow these four simple tips – stir the paint well, give it a good dose of thinners, blend it all together and spray a series of thin coats at around 30psi - then your airbrush will

where you don't want it. Although I get on fine with them, many modellers seem to struggle with acrylics the answer is to dilute the paint more than you might imagine, around 60% paint to 40% thinners, and to spray at a higher pressure (say 30psi) than is normally recommended. This, of course, be far less prone to blockages with acrylic paint.

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GOING SPECIAL

Hornby's Twin Track Sound (TTS) decoders have created a wallet-friendly introduction to the world of digital sound, but until now they have only been available inside a locomotive. **MIKE WILD** selects a group of new solo diesel TTS decoders and shows how to get the very best from them.

HE OLD PROVERB that you get what you pay for is often true, but every now and then a product comes along which bucks that trend and stands out by offering true value for money. Hornby's Twin Track Sound (TTS) decoders, which made their debut in the 2015 catalogue, are a fantastic introduction to the world of digital sound – and more importantly they won't break the bank.

Digital sound can be an expensive pursuit with most high-end decoders having a price tag of around £100 and upwards including a speaker. There are other lower cost options in the Econami range produced by Soundtraxx and distributed by Gaugemaster (HM118 and HM120) as well as the LokSound Select decoders.

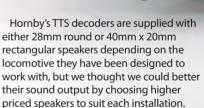
The TTS decoders have been designed by Hornby and offer a wide range of programming options as well as a number of features on the diesel decoders which make them a worthy choice alongside higher priced items. Initially they have only been available in a locomotive – usually adding around £25 to the price - but the arrival of the TTS decoders as separate items is opening up new possibilities for further developing a sound fitted fleet while keeping an eye on price. The solo decoders are priced at £39.99 at full retail price – by far the most wallet friendly sound decoder currently available. This is excellent value for money, especially the diesel versions which include manual

notching and superb sound reproduction as well as the full custom setting of sound outputs through Configuration Variables (CVs).

For this feature, we are concentrating on the diesel sound decoders in the TTS range. All are delivered with 8-pin plugs wired to an 8-pin harness and this makes them straightforward to connect to Hornby's own products as well as a range of others including Bachmann, Heljan and ViTrains locomotives fitted with the 8-pin socket. There aren't many Bachmann models with 8-pin sockets on the diesel front, but if you are the owner of an early Class 37 then it is well worth considering this option. Similarly, TTS decoders can be used in Heljan Class 47s, ViTrains Class 37 and 47 models - while at a stretch, Heljan's model of BRCW prototype D0260 Lion can be equipped with the Class 47 sound file as a means to introducing sound to this Sulzer powered locomotive which was closely related in terms of engines to the Brush Class 47.

A sound decoder is only ever as good as the speaker it is connected to and this is something I have learnt to my benefit over a number of years of installing decoders into ready-to-run locomotives. The resulting improvement in sound quality by choosing a high-quality speaker can be nothing short of exceptional, bringing clarity to the sounds as well as revealing many hidden details which couldn't be heard previously.

The first step in our process was to install the decoders in a couple of locomotives to see how they sounded straight from the box. All were good, but on some locomotives - notably the Class 47 and Class 60 – some of the more subtle sounds were muffled or impossible to hear with the factory speaker. With this in mind, we made a quick shopping trip to Digitrains to amass a handful of Zimo's high quality cube speakers, including several in the new 3D printed sound enclosures to assess whether we could make them better. The simple answer was "yes" - and in this guide we'll show how we went about installing these decoders - none took more than ten minutes once the speaker had been chosen - in a group of Hornby, Bachmann and ViTrains locomotives.

TWIN TRACK SOUND



STEP BY STEP INSTALLING HORNBY TTS DECODERS



The solo Twin Track Sound (TTS) decoders are supplied with a speaker pre-attached as well as a full manual and suggestions for their installation. The first decoder we are going to work with is the Class 31.





With the body removed, the internal space is shown. The decoder socket is positioned to the left on the main printed circuit board, but the prime position . for a speaker is currently taken up by the roof fan mechanism.





Removing the roof fan opens up a perfect position for a speaker. All that is required to take it out is the release of four small crosshead screws and cutting of the drive band.

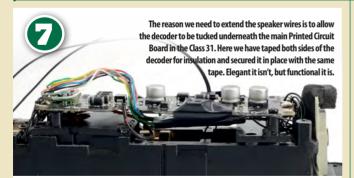


Using the decoder as supplied, the 40mm x 20mm speaker is a comfortable fit in the space available, but we think we can gain an improved sound output





Replacing the speaker is a simple task, but is complicated slightly by the need to extend the speaker wires from the decoder for this installation. You have two choices: cut the red and black wires from the speaker as close to the chamber as possible to leave the maximum length of lead for connecting to the new speaker and then extend these with suitable decoder speaker cable and insulate the joins before connecting the new ends to the speaker. Alternatively, as here, if you are confident with a soldering iron you can detach the original speaker wires from the decoder and then add your own cut to length.



Using electrical solder and a quick action, solder the new speaker wires to the new speaker. This is a Zimo LS40x22x09 (40mm x 22mm x 9mm) speaker which has bus wires on each side making for a very simple means of attaching the new cables from the decoder. The body can now be refitted and the locomotive tested and addressed.



Moving onto the Class 37, here we are using an early Bachmann model in BR green. It doesn't have lighting fitted and with the body off there is only limited space available for a speaker inside the locomotive.



The only space which is available is to roof mount the speaker underneath the fan grille. This does mean sealing the front and rear of the speaker fully and mounting the decoder board to the roof to ensure everything will fit inside. We had already removed the fan moulding from this model prior to starting the sound installation.

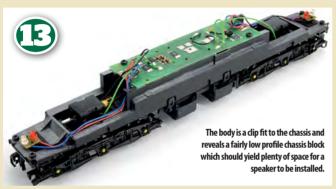


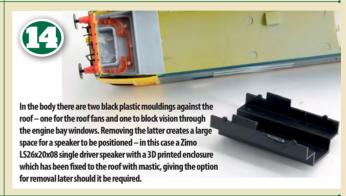


Here the original 28mm round speaker has been used - partly for its economic use of space, and partly because with the available space this particular design provided the best sound output for the TTS Class 37 sound. The decoder has been taped to the roof with insulating tape and the body can now be refitted to the chassis and the locomotive addressed ready for service. Simple.



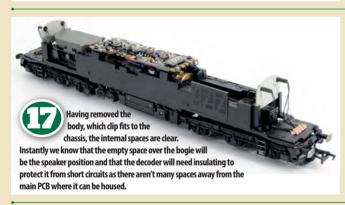






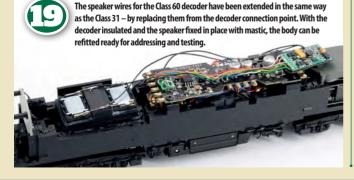












The four completed locomotives are all ready for service. The upgraded speakers make a tremendous difference to the sound quality, improving the tone of horns and bringing out detail sounds which otherwise couldn't be heard. Once addressed, we adjusted the CV values for the different sound outputs to tailor each locomotive to our liking before sending them out into service.

More DCC detail is needed



round speaker needed to be just 20mm diameter (and not the more likely 28mm or even 23mm).

Also, the DCC sound chip needing to be 21MTC is fine and Ben points out that it needs five functions to cater for the lighting. Had Dapol wired for the cab lights to use one function and set them for forward/reverse as per the external lights (F0), the other could have been used for

the internal coach lights. This wouldn't be a problem, except that the ESU Loksound 21MTC only gives the same choice as the non-21MTC. You have to purchase a separate adapter board to activate and power Aux upwards!

It would be advantageous to know these things from the outset, having waited three or four weeks for the model to arrive here in Australia. It is disappointing to find out one needs to order other bits and wait another month for their arrival.

The Fylde coastline has always been, in my view, an exciting and unique location with its own atmosphere and charm. I originally looked at the busy terminus station of Blackpool North but space would be the limiting factor for me and it proved too big to even attempt a reasonable representation. Looking elsewhere for inspiration, I used Google Maps to track the Fylde coast lines back inland and came across Poulton-le-Fylde, a little station full of character. Further research on the station and a visit in June 2011 to further understand the geography and layout of the station confirmed that this was the location I would like to model.

Poulton-le-Fylde features a single island platform station, once one of the longest in the UK, although now has been somewhat shortened to reflect the reduced needs of modern passenger stock. The station is managed by Northern Rail and features the prominent blue, purple and white branding and logos. The elevated booking office is situated on Breck Road bridge, an interesting feature in itself, with stairs leading down onto the platforms. The island platform is part covered by a fantastic original iron canopy which also contains the red brick waiting rooms and stores. The road overbridge forms the centre of the layout with the station platform, canopy and buildings to the right-hand side.

To the left of Breck Road is Poulton Junction, now mothballed and only serving the left-hand fork towards Layton and Blackpool North. Regular trains from Manchester (Piccadilly, Victoria and the)

Airport), York and Liverpool Lime Street run through Preston to Blackpool North. Longer distance Virgin Trains services also frequent the line with trains from Euston to Blackpool. Until 1970 the right-hand fork of Poulton Junction facilitated passenger and freight services to Fleetwood and until 1999 freight services to the former ICI plant at Burn Naze Halt. The remaining sections of the Fleetwood branch are currently being restored by the Poulton & Wyre Railway Society which hopes to be able to run trains once again on the branch between Poulton-le-Fylde and Fleetwood.

Substantial changes have taken place to Poulton-le-Fylde junction since I decided to model the layout including electrification of the line and alterations to the junction and road bridge. This conveniently locks the layout in a time period between 2000 and 2010. For operational interest of the layout I decided to reinstate the passenger and freight services to Fleetwood.

CONSTRUCTION

Naturally, the significant difference between a stay at home layout and an exhibition layout is transportability. The design of an exhibition layout has to be such that it can easily be transported, assembled and dismantled without the risk of damage or breakages. Poulton-le-Fylde has been built as a 20ft end to end layout split into four sections - two central scenic boards and two fiddle yards. With each board approximately 5ft long, it allows us to transport the layout either in a van or a couple of cars depending on the distance to the exhibition.

Construction of the baseboards is very

conventional with softwood frames and MDF tops which provides a fairly light but solid frame. The backscenes are permanently attached to provide protection to the scenic section in front of them. Each board has its own set of hinged legs which fold under for transport. Adjustable metal feet are fitted to accommodate the variances in exhibition floors (and the run on the concrete floor in the garage in which it was built). Alignment is provided by pattern makers dowels and latched catches to lock the boards together. I would recommend using the larger screwed in alignment

dowels rather than the smaller bullet type as they seem to perform better over time.

Off scene storage yards are an essential part of any layout to provide storage of trains off scene – but for exhibition layouts, particular attention has to be paid to the design to ensure trains can be efficiently moved on and off scene. For Poulton-le-Fylde I have opted for two types. The junction end features a dual double track sector plate yard to serve both the Blackpool North and Fleetwood lines. Each sector plate features three 4ft long storage lines, with each being able to connect to both >>>

the up and down tracks of the relevant branch of the junction. Although it took time and patience to get all tracks perfectly aligned during construction, it has proved a reliable and practical solution.

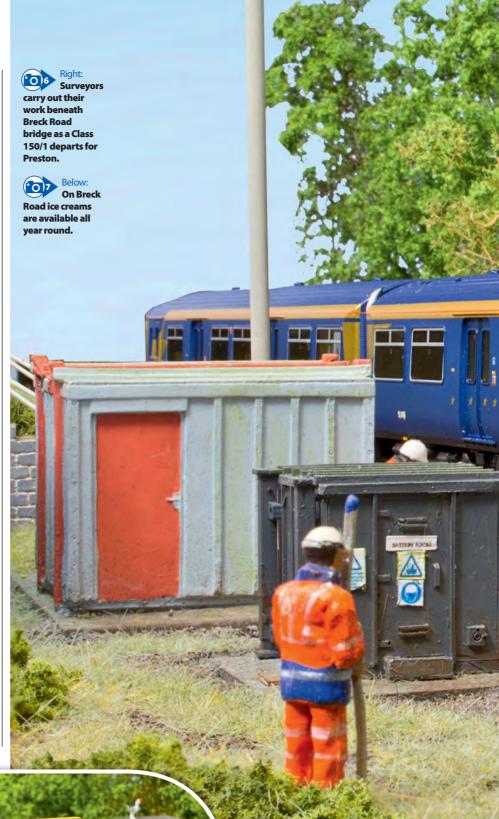
In contrast to the relatively complex construction of the sector plate fiddle yards, the station end of the layout features a simple cassette design. The separation of the tracks as they entered the off scene area due to the island platform meant that a sector plate or turntable couldn't be accommodated in the space available. Cassettes are 4ft long with electrical continuity and track alignment achieved through the use of brass rodding protruding from the ends of each cassette which plugs into the adjoining socket in the edge of the baseboard.

Layout lighting is a key feature to the overall finish of an exhibition layout that is often overlooked. All too often you see a great layout let down by the absence of lighting or the use of sporadic spot lighting creating unwanted shadowing and dark spots. Lighting should be balanced along the entire length of the exhibit and used to lift the appearance of a layout and bring out the colours in the scene.

On Poulton-le-Fylde, I have used T5 fluorescent tubes with diffusers which run the entire length of the scenic section of the layout. I have also replaced the supplied tubes with daylight variants to provide a nicer balanced light. Using tubes instead of spotlights ensures that the shadows are on the whole eliminated. I also found it effective to install the lighting at as early a stage as possible in the layout's construction. This enables painting and finishing of the model to be done under the true lighting conditions leading to a more realistic finish.

TRACK AND SIGNALS

All track on the layout is Peco Code 75, chosen for its more realistic appearance yet retaining the ease of installation and laying. Concrete flexible track has been used on the running lines with the points and crossings having wooden sleepers to reflect the real location at the time of modelling. Live frog points have been used



to ensure seamless running due to the slow speeds that trains would be travelling in and around the station. Ballast is 'N' gauge granite ballast. I often find that the size of ballast can determine how successful the overall appearance of the finished trackwork looks with many of the 'OO' scale ballast products on sale appearing overscale. The track has been coloured using paints from the Railmatch range.

A distinct feature of the location is that it continues to operate using traditional semaphore signals. The signal on the layout has been constructed using a Ratio kit and operates using two tortoise motors to provide the movement of the arms. SMD

LEDs have been fitted into the signal lamps and positioned so they shine through the coloured lenses of the aspect. Micro wire provides power to the LEDs and is fed up inside the structure of the signal.

Point rodding and signal wires have been installed on the layout to reflect the current setup of the junction and to add extra interest and realism to the lineside areas. Components come from the Model Signal Engineering range. Outside the signalbox, the cranks and pulleys can be seen connecting the main rodding and wiring runs with the shorter connections to the signalbox itself.

The signalbox is a scratchbuilt structure

based on the current refurbished example at Poulton Junction. The model features a fully detailed interior created from a white metal kit including levers, instruments, chairs, desk and other items. On the desk can be found the signalman's favourite railway magazines and newspapers. The signalbox also serves as a scenic break hiding the entrance into the fiddle yards at the junction end.

SCENERY

It was my intention to not just model the layout but to try and portray some of the atmosphere of the location through the scenics used on the layout. With such a simple track design, the detailing on the layout had to be such that the viewer's interest was retained between train movements and atmosphere was created.

also exploited as the structure is used as the lighting column return, reducing the volume of wires to conceal. The numerous truss elements are assembled from angled plastic strip members, each fitted onto the existing brass structure to create the roof profile of the canopy. Lighting is provided through the use of SMD LEDs mounted to the truss members.

The waiting rooms under the canopy are also scratchbuilt. I have attempted to replicate the exterior of the real structure as accurately as possible including appropriate signage, posters and flower displays. Modellers' license has however been used for the detailed interiors of the building. The toilets have been kitted out with miniature cubicles, sinks, copper plumbing and mirrors, the waiting room with seating, posters and people.

It was important to me for the exhibition audience to be able to place the layout on the UK map even without knowing Poulton-le-Fylde itself. With Blackpool football club reaching the headlines with their promotion and following relegations and Fleetwood Town going strong, I decided to model the travelling football fans waiting on the platform to go to the match. The football supporter figures are castings from Langley Models, and have been hand painted into the appropriate team colours. Figures have been positioned to provide some amusement to the viewer. Other hints have been included for the non-football fans including advertising of various Blackpool attractions within the station area.

Cameo scenes can add great interest to a layout, and this is especially true of smaller layouts which heavily rely on the detail for interest. Breck Road overbridge features a hive of activity including a road maintenance team predominantly made up of components from the Ten Commandments range including dumper,

cement mixer and road roller. A little market scene has been set up to represent a typical weekend market that you might see in the town. The stalls and produce come from Langley and have been assembled and painted. The presence of animals always adds life to a layout. Due to proximity to the sea, a seagull is never far away from Poultonle-Fylde. I again have used the Langley Models packs to represent the animal population including seagulls, rabbits, foxes, dogs and squirrels. Engineers working under the bridge undertaking some surveying are my small reference back to my profession.

CONTROL AND OPERATION

The layout is operated by Digital Command Control (DCC) using my very reliable NCE Powercab. The system is connected to a laptop and router running JMRI which enables the operating team to also control the layout from their mobile phones using the Train Controller app or equivalent. This gives flexibility on operating positions and no tangled cables. Tortoise point motors have been used to operate the points and signals, which are in turn connected to an accessory decoder allowing full digital control of all elements of the layout.

The location of Poulton-le-Fylde means that traffic is predominantly passenger orientated with a fleet of appropriately liveried Class 150/1 and Class 158s taking the strain. Added to these are a Virgin 'Voyager' set to represent a through working, a charter train often hauled by a pair of Direct Rail Services Class 37s and a Realtrack Models Class 144 and Hornby Class 153s. Freight traffic isn't exempt from the layout as it sees engineers trains hauled by Class 66s intersecting the intensive passenger operation.

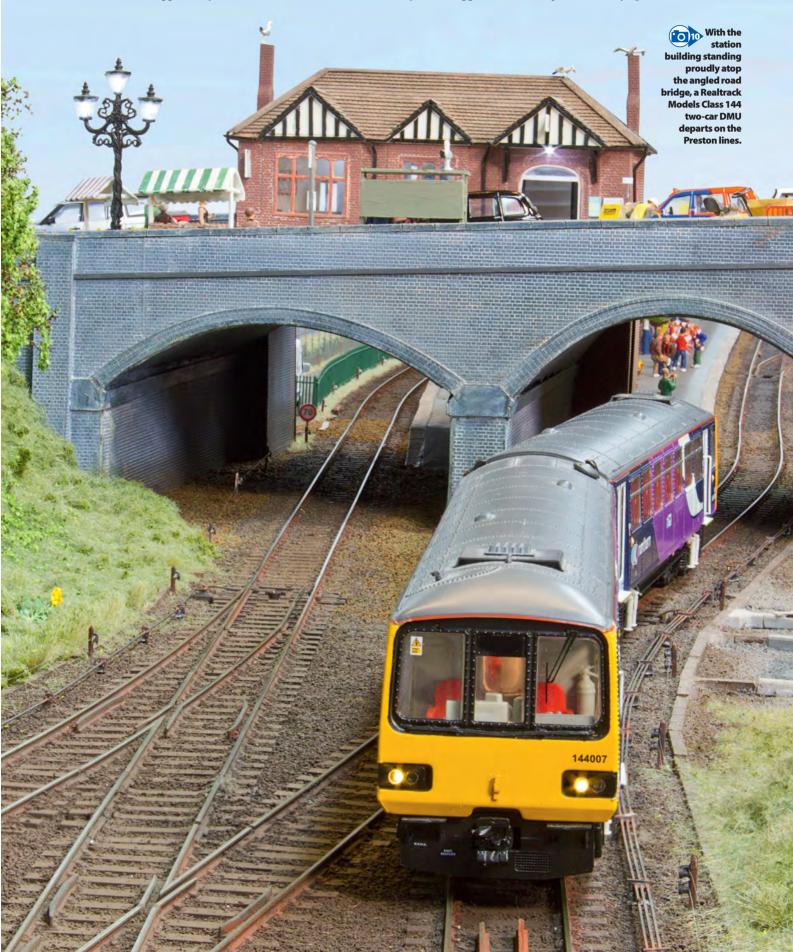
REFLECTIONS

He has been advised to turn off all locomotives while operating one, but when he operates one locomotive another similar one wakes up and moves at the same speed. Do you know what would cause this to happen?

Mark Chivers replies: From what you have described this should be a simple problem to resolve as it sounds like both locomotives have the same address assigned to their decoders – the chips inside the models which take instruction from the controller.

To set locomotive addresses with the EZ-Command controller you need to remove all other locomotives from the track (apart from the one you want to address), run the locomotive you want to change and then stop it by holding the stop button on the handset. Keep the stop button pressed until the LED power light flashes. Now press the address button (from 1-10 listed on the handset) that you want to assign the locomotive to and the locomotive will move and the LED flash slowly. Press stop again and now the address should be logged to that locomotive only. Take it for a test run and note which address you have assigned to the model repeating the process for all others.





I have about 15 DCC locomotives that I think need cleaning and I'm not sure how to do it. They are primarily steam locomotives and I was hoping you might be able to direct me to some information.

Mike Wild replies: Cleaning locomotives is no different for digital control than it is for analogue. Wheels need dirt removing and any fluff and dirt build-up around the axles and pick-ups needs taking out too. Our recommendation for wheels is Gaugemaster's GM60 Wheel Cleaning Brush. This stands on top of the running

rails to take power which is fed into the brass brushes on top. Hold your locomotive on top and its wheels will rotate when under power – driven as you would on track through your DCC handset – and the dirt will be scrubbed away by the brushes. If there is fluff around the pick-ups, this can be removed with tweezers or for stubborn dirt deposits on pick-ups, Deluxe Materials Track Magic electrical cleaner is highly useful and versatile too (we've even used it to clean contacts on car electrics!). It's a simple process which will offer quick results and an instant improvement in locomotive performance.

Grosvenor Square uses both the Gaugemaster Prodigy and Hornby RailMaster/Elite DCC control system. The trains are driven by the Prodigy while points and signals are operated through RailMaster on a separate power bus.



Mike Wild replies: Grosvenor Square uses both the Gaugemaster Prodigy system and Hornby's RailMaster computer control software in conjunction with the Hornby Elite controller - and in fact, it has two Elites connected to the layout which are in turn connected to two separate computers.

To simplify the layout's operation, the Gaugemaster Prodigy is purely responsible for controlling train movements on the track - no other controller is connected to the rails as this would cause an electrical meltdown. The two Elite controllers are connected to separate areas purely for point control with one dedicated to the scenic area and the other to the storage vard.

In a home operating situation, the pair of Elites would be overkill - only one would be needed - but to operate the layout successfully at shows we found it easier to make use of spare equipment we had to create an extra operating position.

So, what's the downside? Buying two digital control systems is expensive and you need to take care over the wiring to ensure that each controller is only connected to a specific function on the layout. On the upside, it means we could use full Digital Command Control (DCC) for the points and the mimic diagrams on RailMaster took no more than 20 minutes to draw – I challenge anyone to build a control panel quicker! – and we can still retain the multiple driving requirement of a large layout with the Prodigy handsets connected to the track elements.

This system has been so successful for us on Grosvenor Square that we wish we had thought of the solution sooner and it will also be rolled out on Twelve Trees Junction when that returns to the exhibition circuit at the Great Electric Train Show on October 7/8.

CONTROL

Turntable polarity

If you want to install a fully functional turntable on a DCC sound layout, how do you keep power going to the track on the turntable at all times, even when it's moving?

The ADM Turntables indexing drive system keeps the turntable deck permanently live with a polarity sensor meaning that digital sound locomotives retain constant audio.

Mike Wild replies: The simplest way to resolve this problem with a turntable is to use a reverse module – these are essentially short-circuit detectors which react quicker than your controller can recognise a short.

In an instant, they resolve the polarity of the two rails meaning that, in the case of a turntable, as the locomotive runs from the main line onto the turntable deck the polarity is instantly changed by the reverse module hidden below the baseboard.

Most DCC equipment manufacturers produce such a device and we have used the Gaugemaster DCC40 reverse module successfully on Grosvenor Square with one of its abilities being listed as turntable operation.

To install one all you need to do is connect the output wires to the turntable deck and the input wires to your DCC track power - its that straightforward.

As an alternative, we would recommend looking at the ADM Turntables website as they offer fully built index drive turntables custom made for digital operation with a live deck as well as the option to programme exactly where the 'table stops. See HM106 for more on these devices.

DECODED

Point addressing

I've got a two-track crossover, requiring four points. I want to operate them all together, either both lines in parallel or crossing over. Can I wire them up together with one switch/ address?

Mark Chivers replies: Each point will require a separate point motor to operate the blades, but you then have two choices. If you have a high-powered accessory decoder such as DCC Concepts' ADS8FX (for solenoids) or AD8FX (for stall motors) you can wire two points into a single output. However, for the very best operation we would recommend giving each point motor its own accessory decoder but then setting the addresses to match. Some



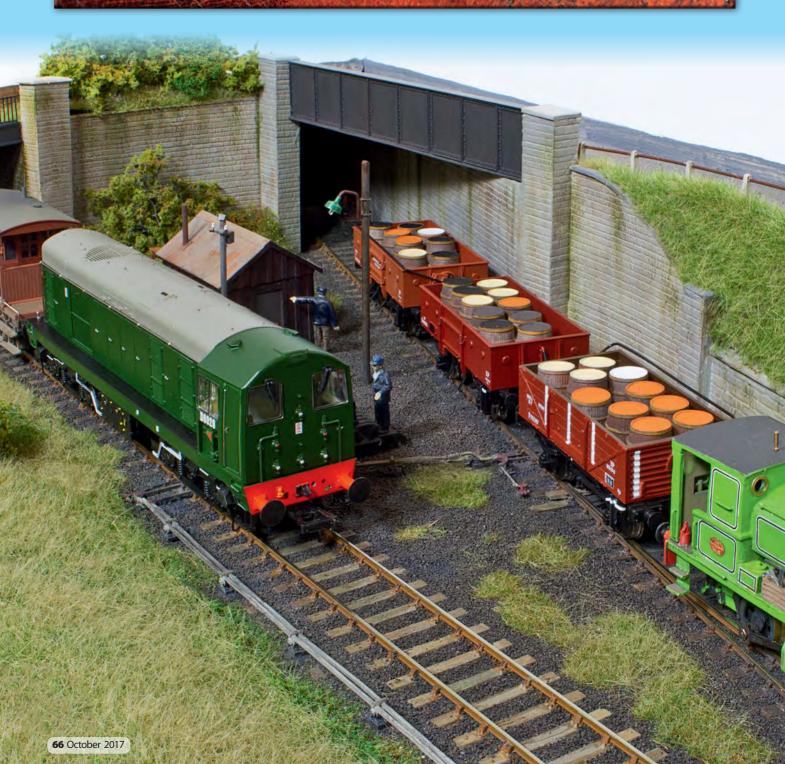
of the more sophisticated accessory decoders allow for polarity changing through address changes if you find points are throwing in opposite directions whereas others will rely on physically swapping the wires over. In short, if you have two points you want to change at the same time, give them an accessory decoder each with the same address.

The natural colours of wood are becoming more attainable in model form through the introduction of an extensive range of paint shades. **NIGEL BURKIN** uses whisky casks to demonstrate his methods for modelling realistic wood shades.



EPLICATING THE COLOURS and tones of wood can be a challenging prospect in model form, but with simple techniques and the right choice of colours it can be a rewarding process. For this project we are turning the spotlight on a group of 'wooden' casks for the Loch Dhu Distillery layout which all need to be painted in suitable wood colours. The techniques explained here are applicable to any 'wooden' models from wagon decks to fence posts and can be varied through colour choice to represent different types of timber.

Casks are linked closely to the railways and indeed, much freight was transported in casks, loaded into open wagons or vans in the steam era. Whisky casks were transported in a similar manner when rail served numerous distilleries throughout Scotland. Although I am modelling (as closely as possible) casks for the

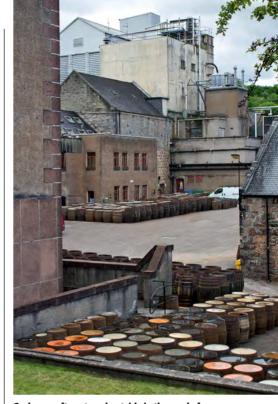
production, the techniques described in this article can be applied to casks for a variety of other industries including brewing and china clay. The casks used for this project were sourced from Skytrex Model Railways

output of Loch Dhu Distillery's spirit and whisky

sourced from Skytrex Model Railways (skytrexmodelrailways.com) which produces a useful range of cast resin models. Some of the cask mouldings came as a cluster of 36 stacked casks with a representation of the wooden racks separating them – perfect for a warehouse interior or casks stored in the yard. Packs of casks in clusters of four and five together with single casks are also available. I ended up with more than 100 casks in various forms by taking advantage of the bulk pack offers available on the Skytrex website.

Moulded from resin, the casks needed some cleaning and finishing to prepare them for painting. Moulding flash was carefully cleaned from the base and tops of each cask using fine wet and dry paper. The base of each cask was smoothed off and levelled by rubbing across wet and dry paper soaked in water to catch the dust. The casks were washed in warm soapy water to remove any traces of sanding dust and release oils from the moulding process.

To make the handling of each cask easier, I drilled a 2mm diameter hole in the base of each cask (or cluster) and inserted a cocktail stick. Once each cask was painted, it was left to dry supported on the cocktail stick which was pushed into a piece of foam.



Casks are often stored outside in the yard of a distillery until they are needed leading to changes in the colour, weathering and staining too. This view is of Tamdhu Distillery, adjacent to Tamdhu station on the former Speyside line.

RECREATING WOOD

I wished to recreate the brown/grey and sometimes blackened appearance of whisky casks rather than the more weathered grey appearance of casks being used to transport other goods. As casks are stored in a bonded warehouse for long periods of time, they can become lighter in appearance – almost grey with dust! However, the steel hoops always seem to rust stain the exterior of the staves in some places.

Key to creating interesting paint effects is to use a variety of colours, applied over base coats to build up a wide variety of tones using photographs as a guide. I looked no further than the superb water-based acrylic paint colour packs produced by LifeColor including the 'Weathered Wood' pack. Not all of the six paint colours supplied in the pack would be used for the cask painting exercise - I started off by painting a colour card to see exactly how each shade appeared on a white background. Using the card as a guide, I selected warm wood dark shade (UA713) as the first coat of paint to be applied using an airbrush (Sparmax MAX-4 airbrush). Some clusters were painted with several coats for a dense colour whilst others were given slightly less paint coverage to allow some of the underlying grey of the cask moulding to strike through.

Lifecolor acrylic paint is very durable and coats the resin castings with a good scratch-resistant covering which is fine enough for all of the moulded detail to be clearly seen. It dries very quickly too, allowing the second treatment to be applied: a touch of warm wood base colour (UA714) to certain casks to represent less worn staves. This was followed up with a very thin wash

of dirty black (UA731) from the Lifecolor 'Black Rubber Shades & Co.' pack. If you are pushing the time envelope, thin the paint with water to avoid reactivating the first coats of paint. Leave the model for at least half a day to dry between applications when using Lifecolor thinners.

TONING

Having completed the base coat of wood colour, I commenced the weathering process by blackening the wood in most places with a varied mix of warm wood dark shade and worn black (UA734) to represent the mix of charring and the black mould that can gather on casks used in whisky production. Some casks were treated with a dry brush application of wood cold base colour (UA717) to lighten some of the staves both before the application of charring and afterwards too. Some casks were left relatively untreated.

Once I was happy with my collection of blackened, weathered and stained casks, I added a touch of colour from the Lifecolor 'Rust and Dust' pack to highlight the steel hoop detail. The final task after touching up was to paint the top of each cask with an identifying colour. Casks containing spirit have to be carefully identified with full details of the distillery, distillation year and a unique identification number. This is usually stencilled on the top of the cask on a painted background. Part of the identification of casks filled with spirit is to paint them various colours and I have observed blue, cream, white, black and orange as colours used on cask tops. Identification is particularly important for those warehouses storing the production of several distilleries.



STEP BY STEP PAINTING WOODEN CASKS





Cast resin casks from the Skytrex'00' gauge range were found to be as close as I could find in reasonable numbers to represent hogshead casks used in the malt whisky industry. They will be used as wagon loads and to populate the distillery yard, but before that they all need painting.



Lifecolor acrylic paints were chosen to finish the casks in a mixture of weathered grey, brown and blackened colours using the 'Weathered Wood' pack. The fast drying time of acrylic paint shortened the project time considerably and with a great looking



The dusters of casks together with some of the singles needed some preparation before paint. Casting flash (what little there was of it) was shaved away and the base of the cask dusters smoothed flat.



The best way to level the base of resin details is to gently rub it on wet and dry paper in a smooth circular motion.



ever, I strongly urge the use of water and protective gloves when undertaking the preparation of any resin models. The dust is trapped in the water where it is safe – otherwise do this job outside and wear a dust mask.



Having cleaned the castings, each one was mounted on a cocktail stick to make handling easier when coated with wet paint. This is a good tip for painting any small object - either glue it directly onto a strip of wood or fix it to some form of handle as here.



When choosing paint colours, it helps to make up colour index cards to compare shades of paint sets you may be unfamiliar with



A basecoat of wood warm dark shade (UA713) and wood warm base (UA714) was sprayed on to the cleaned casks in varying depths of paint to create variation in the base colour.



A little mixing of some wood shades was used to add further base colour to some of the casks representing rust staining of



On the left is a cluster of casks treated with just a thin coat of base colour to allow some grey to strike through. The cluster on the left has been treated to a wash of dirty black to start highlighting some detail. The latter finish could be used on casks being used for commodities other than spirits.



Dry brushing of light grey colours on the wood can be used to represent the bleaching of some of the wood staves. Follow up with a thin wash of dirty black.



Cask hoops made of steel or iron will rust and also stain the adjacent wood. Rusting effects were applied using colours from the Lifecolor 'Rust and Dust' pack.



The casks were weathered down with thin washes of dirty black, worn black and vood warm dark shade and finished with a coat of paint applied to the top ready for stencilling with details of the contents - usually the year of production, the distillery name and an identification number.

Realtrack delivers its **SUPER SPRINTER**

The Class 156 two-car DMUs had a big impact when they were built in the late 1980s - and now Realtrack Models has produced a 21st century standard model for 'OO' gauge. **MIKE WILD** takes a closer look at this highly specified unit.



T'S HARD TO
IMAGINE a world
where Diesel
Multiple Units
(DMUs) didn't make
up the majority of
medium and long
distance workings,
as today almost
all major services
are handled by one
form of fixed train
formation or another.

However, 30 years ago, British Rail still relied heavily on locomotives and carriages while the multiple units it did have were, on the whole, old, tired and ready for retirement or major overhauls. The
1980s had seen new
swathes of DMUs
arrive on the scene
with the 'Pacer' units
of Class 141-144
coming in the first
half of the decade
alongside the Class
150/1 and 150/2
units, all of which
operated on stopping
services. In 1987 the
first of the Class 156 units

made their debut following the placing of an order with Metro-Cammell for 114 two-car medium distance DMUs two years earlier.

With their single sliding doors at each end of the long 75ft vehicles, they featured a spacious interior and were soon seen working in many areas of the country, from Norfolk to Scotland. They have continued to serve through BR's ownership and into privatisation and the full fleet of 114 units remains in service today, 30 years since the first made its maiden voyage on the BR network on November 10 1987.

The underframe has separate parts throughout and provision for a sepeaker too.



THE MODEL

Such a long lived design has been the subject of ready-to-run models in the past including Dapol's product for 'N' gauge, released in the late 2000s, and the Lima 'OO' gauge version which was released in the early 1990s and – until now – has been the only choice to model this numerous class. Latterly the Lima Class 156 has been produced by Hornby.

However, all that is history as Realtrack Models has delivered an outstanding model of the Class 156 for 'OO' with a specification which ticks many options – and especially on the digital front too. For review we had the opportunity to test an analogue version of 156445 in ScotRail Saltire livery – a scheme most suited to the period from 2008 onwards.

There are more livery choices coming too including First ScotRail, East Midlands Trains and original 'Super Sprinter' schemes, but each is limited in numbers with our sample of 156445 being restricted to just 200 pieces.

So what do you get? Realtrack's specification includes twin motors – one in each carriage – correctly detailed Driving Motor Second (DMS) and Driving Motor Second Lavatory (DMSL), full interior detail with a completely hidden mechanism, fitted toilet, driving cab detail, directional lighting (and operating door lights on DCC), a fully detailed underframe,

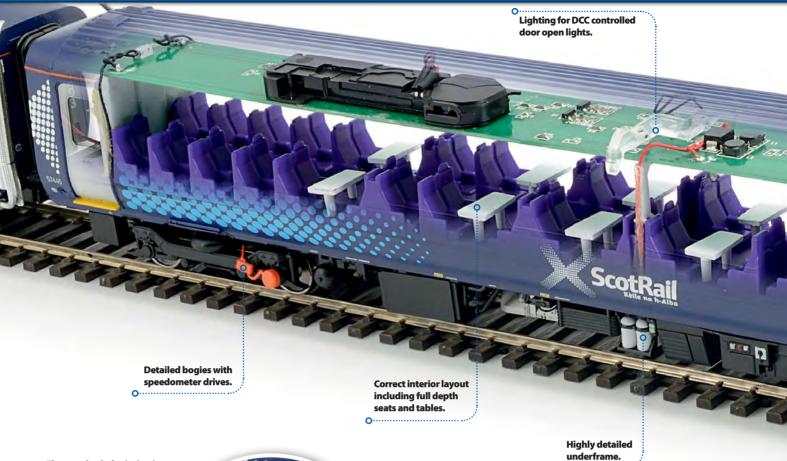
more separately fitted parts than you could imagine and unique destinations on each production run. This model has Glasgow Queen St and Fort William destinations.

For a model which includes such an amazing level of separately fitted parts, our sample felt very well built indeed. Nothing was loose and everything was just as it should be. The cab fronts model the units superbly including the light clusters, handrails and supremely fine windscreen wipers while the bodysides reflect the style of the prototypes to a tee. This includes

stainless steel coloured window frames, recessed doors and handrails to the outer doors. Add to this finely produced exhausts on the inner ends and close coupling which brings the centre gangways within 3mm of each other and it's an impressive picture.

model we've seen to date. There is even space for a speaker built into the front 'box' on each vehicle while the drivetrain is entirely hidden from view. Topping off the detail elements is a pack of separate parts – such as snowploughs and bufferbeam fittings – to

complete each end of the unit. These neatly fit around the factory fitted outer tension lock couplings retaining the models ability to work in multiple with snowploughs.

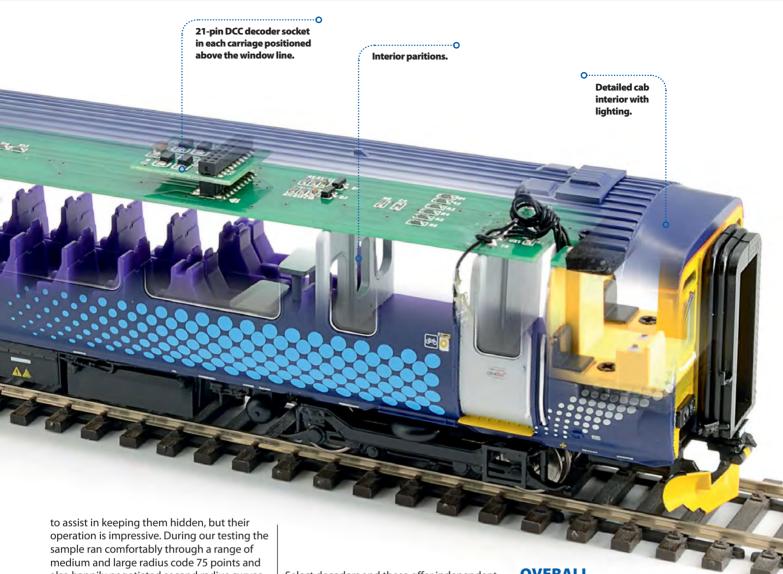
Just like the detailing, the decoration on this complex ScotRail colour scheme is nothing short of

exemplary and not just in the big details either. There are so many small aspects to appreciate from the vehicle numbers to the door buttons, Abellio logos on the doors, cycles, ScotRail branding and even warning labels on the underframe equipment.

PERFORMANCE

Straight from the box, the 156 operated smoothly and faultlessly throughout the speed range offering beautiful speed control as well as flicker free interior and exterior lighting. The motors, both five-pole units, have 'micro gears'





also happily negotiated second radius curves. The 156 is fitted with two 21-pin DCC decoder sockets - one in each vehicle with the socket mounted out of sight in the roofline. For straight DCC operations (non-sound) Realtrack suggests ESU LokPilot V4.0 decoders with 21-pin plugs (Cat No. 54615). Realtrack Models offers a digital

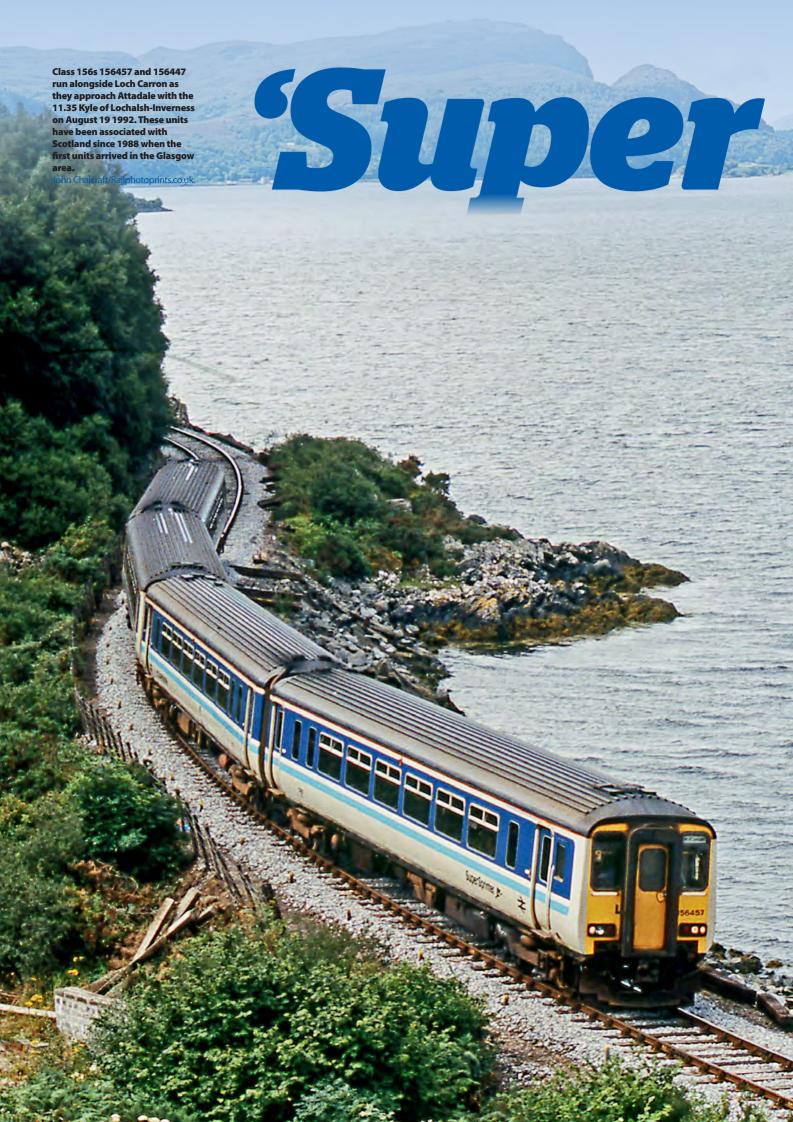
sound fitted option using a pair of LokSound

Select decoders and these offer independent control of the door opening lights, interior lights, directional head and tail lights as well as programmable announcements for different destinations. We've yet to see these features in operation, but the specification is tempting. If you want to add your own choice of sound decoder, the speaker spaces will hold a 23mm round speaker.

OVERALL

Having put the new Realtrack Class 156 through its paces both in appearance and performance, this truly lives up to the 'Super Sprinter' name. From its packaging to its operation and presentation, this is an example of how a second generation Diesel Multiple Unit should be produced as a ready-to-run model in 'OO'. An excellent follow-up to the Class 143/144. (MW)

Amongst the most successful second-generation diesel multiple units ever built is the Class 156, a unit that has proved to be a fitting swansong for the famous Midlands train manufacturer Metro-Cammell for the last 30 years, as **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** explains.

HE CLASS 156 IS ONE of today's UK railway workhorses. On lines from the far north of Scotland through the Midlands and to the extremes of the coast of East Anglia these adaptable and reliable units work every day providing tightly-timetabled semi-fast services. Although they are now three decades old, there is no sign that these reliable Diesel Multiple Units (DMUs) are to be set aside - indeed many are being upgraded at the moment to comply with the latest legislation and are likely to be with us for many more years to come. Their builders, Metro-Cammell of Birmingham, had had a long history in the production of diesel multiple units. It was the first private manufacturer to build DMUs for British Railways even before the Modernisation Plan was announced. and went on to build 760 first generation vehicles most of which had a very long life with the last remaining in service until 2004. By 1960 orders for such units had dried up but the company continued to add to its expertise with work for export with the result that when, in the mid-1980s, British Rail was looking at upgrading its fleet once more it was natural that Metro-Cammell should be invited to build a prototype for evaluation.

What emerged was a very stylish allaluminium design which was known as the Class 151 and this went head-tohead with British Rail's own Class 150. Unfortunately for Metro-Cammell, its train was much delayed in production and



by the time it appeared the BR product had become the favoured unit for further production, with the two Class 151 prototypes destined to have a very short life, being in service for only four years.

For a while it looked as though the famous Midlands manufacturer was going to lose out in the replacement programme but this was not to be so, as a couple of years later British Rail issued a tender for an upgraded 'Super Sprinter' unit that could be used on semi-fast and express services and which was to a higher specification than the Class 150. These units were to have vehicles 23 metres long (75ft) and would have doors at each end, rather than at third distance, to enable better draught-proofing for the saloons and were also to have much more luxurious interiors, including seating bays fitted with tables.

COMPETING DESIGNS

Two manufacturers tendered against the specification, Leyland/BREL submitted a design which used components from the National bus factory in Workington while Metro-Cammell put in an alternative based on a welded all-steel bodyshell.

Both designs looked very similar largely because the parameters had been closely set out by BR and both used the cab design of the Class 150 to save acceptance issues with the unions. Also carried on from the Class 150 was the use of a Cummins 285hp engine married with Voith hydraulic transmission.

This time Metro-Cammell was luckier and was awarded a contract to build the bulk of BR's requirements, obtaining an order for 228 vehicles, made up into 114 two-car sets, while rival Levland got a smaller share with a contract for 35 two-car sets - the Class 155s. Construction was very swift for the 156s, largely because production of the bodyshells was subcontracted out with 118 coming from Procor at Horbury, 60 from WH Davies of Mansfield and the remainder from Standard Wagon of Stockport. Once at Metro-Cammell's Washwood Heath plant, mechanical and electrical work was carried out by the firm itself but with the interior fitout also being subcontracted out.

on to Norwich Crown Point depot where further testing took place. A further 28 units were delivered before the May 1988 timetable changes which saw the class introduced on revamped services between Norwich and Birmingham in the process displacing Class 31s and hauled stock. A second batch was allocated to Scotland. These units were used on former intercity services between Glasgow, Stranraer and Carlisle with later deliveries being allocated to Inverness where they were deployed on the West Highland lines, being first seen there in January 1989. Attention then turned to re-equipping the north of England with Class 156s being sent to Heaton depot in Newcastle, mainly for east-west and TransPennine services, and to Neville Hill in Leeds where they were used to replace locomotives on the Settle-Carlisle route. There was a slight blip in

the intended allocations when some of the Scottish units had to be diverted for a brief period to South Wales following difficulties with the door mechanisms on the Leylandbuilt Class 155s but all units returned to their intended areas within a year. Construction was completed by September 1989 with the first 100 units appearing in Provincial 'Super Sprinter' livery and the final 14, intended for services around Glasgow, turned out in Strathclyde PTE orange. During the build period, there were one or two noteworthy special workings. 156404 appeared at the Severn Valley Railway for a diesel gala in early May 1988 while 156502 had a much more exciting excursion when it went to a railway exhibition in Utrecht during July 1989, making its way to and from Holland under its own power and crossing the

Channel by means of a train ferry. Although the Class 156s were relatively new units it wasn't long before some were cascaded to alternative duties, due to the delivery of even more modern Class 158s, which commenced in 1990. The following May, Derby Etches Park began a long association with the class when it received six from the original batch from East Anglia, a number that was later made up to 20, it was also one of this batch, 156405, that was to be the first to accumulate one million miles in service, a feat that was achieved only five years after it first entered traffic. So heavily was the class used in this period that by 1995 it had become necessary to refurbish them, with 156450 being the first to receive its upgrades.

SPLIT FLEETS

By 1994 British Rail was being restructured ready for privatisation and the Class 156s were split between train leasing companies Angel and Porterbrook, though without much in the way of changes of allocation. The Scottish examples were leased by National Express, later passing to First ScotRail and then Abellio ScotRail some years later. Two different liveries were followed by the new Saltire scheme in due course. Those units that had originally been intended for Strathclyde PTE services lost their orange liveries in favour of carmine and cream but just recently have also been rebranded in Saltire blue.

East Anglia lost its original allocation for a while but in early 2005 the type returned to Crown Point depot when now defunct operator One swapped some for a number of Class 150s. These nine are

now operated by Abellio Greater Anglia on secondary services but are scheduled to be replaced with new trains in 2020.

The type has operated continuously in the North of England for the whole of their history with First North Western, Arriva Trains North and the various guises of Northern Rail all using them. Today the class is allocated to Allerton depot in Merseyside and Heaton near Newcastle and is more commonly seen in the North East and North West, rather than in Yorkshire and Humberside. Despite the passage of time, these units are ideal for the inter-urban routes of the north and further examples are due to be transferred there from other areas, particularly Scotland, once new units begin to arrive.

Units operating in the East Midlands have also seen various liveries, including Provincial Express, Central Trains and East Midlands Trains and they continue their core work of working medium-distance services on routes emanating from Derby and Birmingham and travelling as far afield as Hereford, Skegness, and Lincoln. The class also travelled as far as the Welsh coast during Central Trains days.

Although many new trains are now on order, the Class 156 fleet has been identified as one of those which will be retained as new rolling stock arrives. Consequently, a programme of refitting is under way which has seen them modified so that they will be fully-compliant with new disabled-access regulations which will become mandatory from 2020. Units have been fitted with wheelchair-accessible toilets, improved grabrails and audio and visual information systems, making them suitable for long-term continued use.

A COMPLETE FLEET

Although several of the Class 156s have been involved in accidents during their careers their great strength has ensured that none have yet been written off.

However, 156478 did have a narrow escape in December 2014 when it ran into floodwater in Scotland and was deemed not worthy of repair. Train repairer Brodie of Kilmarnock then purchased the unit and repaired it at its own expense, bringing it back to working order once again and, once completed, leasing it back to ScotRail.

The Class 156 is undoubtedly one of the great success stories of the 1980s and has proved much more durable than other DMUs of the era, particularly the Class 150, which is proving to be suffering more from the effects of corrosion than is its Birmingham-built cousin. Although they have already got almost 30 years service under their belt, it seems highly likely that they could go on to see as much as half a century of use, matching if not bettering the record set by Metro-Cammell's other great DMU product, the Class 101.

Hornby has released a further variation of its Southern Region Class 71 (original SR designation 'HA') electric, featuring a later version of BR green without the red waistband. The omission of that attractive detail leaves the 'HA'looking plain, although the off-white roof panels and windscreen surrounds bring relief to this mid-1960s colour scheme.

Class 71 fans will be pleased to see this livery variation which opens up more scope to expand their fleet. Hornby's model scores high marks for the cab shape and internal detail, and is also able to collect current from overhead wires. The mechanism is superb with the Class 71 more than capable of handling a 10 coach train. It also comes with a full set of valances to fill the void in the ends when tension lock couplings aren't used and a neatly detailed body.

E5018 entered traffic in April 1960 at Stewarts Lane depot in Battersea. Transferred to Ashford Chart Leacon in August 1966, in December 1968 it was renumbered E5003 following the conversion of ten 'HAs'

in 1973 and was withdrawn in 1976.
This is the first of two new Class 71s coming from Hornby this year and E5018 is due to be joined by E5005 in BR blue with full yellow ends (Cat No. R3569) during October. (BJ)

USEFUL vehicle missing from the 'OO' gauge Mk 1 fleet, until now, is the much-requested Brake Second Open (BSO). However, thanks to Hornby we can now model a broader range of BR era trains more accurately with BSOs in 1960s BR maroon and 1970s/1980s blue/grey. These new carriages are set to arrive with Hornby stockists during October and it will be the first time that Hornby's new range of Mk 1 stock has been released

in BR blue and grey colours.
Reviewed here is blue/
grey W9353, one of the
1959/1960 batch of BSOs
built by Gloucester RCW
and delivered to the Western
Region. In December 1976,
W9353 transferred to the
Scottish Region, eventually
becoming departmental ADB977161
and was scrapped in August 1984.

Riding on 90mph Mk 1 bogies, it would have been relegated to slower secondary duties in the 1970s, although the vehicle end data shows it to have been retrofitted with electric train heating (ETH) and dual vacuum/air brakes unlike much of the BSO fleet.

Like Hornby's other recently-tooled Mk 1s, the BSO captures the classic shape and

look of the BR standard design, although some of the end handrails are moulded rather than separate fittings.

There are numerous positive points about the Hornby Mk 1 BSO, not least its versatility and potential for conversion into a Scottish Region BSO(T) micro-buffet as well as its

neatly detailed sides and underframe, and the recommended price is

currently just a few pence above that for Bachmann's Mk 1 stock, although the latter are now coming up to two decades in production.

Aspects such as the fixed NEM coupling pockets and moulded handrails betray the model's origins in the Hornby Railroad range. On the plus side, the extra investment does

buy you more detailed decoration

– in this case neatly executed – and metal
wheels with free-running pinpoint axles.

Also landing soon is a matching Hornby Mk 1 Tourist Second Open (TSO) decorated as W5025 (R4776). This is the first separately available Hornby Mk 1 on the company's impressive new Commonwealth bogies, as fitted to many vehicles from the early-1960s to improve ride quality and increase top speed to 100mph. (BJ)

'Final Day' limited edition LNER'A3'

To mark the end of the 'Big Four' railways in 1947, Hornby is releasing four limited edition locomotives in the final liveries of the LMS, LNER, GWR and SR – the first, 21C168 Kenley, arrived in June (HM121).

The LNER representative, and due to be in the shops during October, is Gresley 'A3' 108 *Gay Crusader* in the company's famous lined apple green with post-war unshaded Gill Sans lettering and numerals. Delivered as 'A1' 1477, the locomotive was rebuilt as an 'A3' in December 1942/January 1943 and renumbered 108 under Thompson's 1946 scheme. On the final day of the LNER, December 31 1947, it was allocated to King's Cross' Top Shed' in London for service on the East Coast Main Line.

In this condition the model has a single chimney, 'banjo' dome and eight-wheel coal rail tender as well as a highly detailed cab interior. A supremely elegant machine, the 'A3' looks

particularly fine in this version of LNER green, and the livery has been well applied. My only quibble, and it is a small one at normal viewing distances, is that the printing of the Gill Sans lettering and numerals isn't dense enough to entirely eliminate the green underneath. However, the black and white lining is crisp throughout, as is the fine red lining below the running plate.

The model is DCC ready and has interchangeable NEM couplings, an adjustable tender coupling bar and optional flanged wheels for the Cartazzi trailing truck. Just 500 of these models have been produced, and with a large band of LNER 'Pacific' collectors out there they are likely to sell out quickly – and rightly so. (BJ)

The first of Bachmann's eagerly awaited 'Birdcage' carriages have arrived. **BEN JONES** inspects these new carriages which are opening up new possibilities for the Southern Region.



VER THE LAST couple of years, we've seen an increasing number of ready-to-run pre-Grouping steam locomotives in 'OO' gauge, but relatively little rolling stock of similar vintage for them to haul.

However, Bachmann is at last venturing into the realm of pre-Grouping carriages, in the form of South Eastern & Chatham Railway (SECR) 60ft 1in 'Birdcage' stock. While there were various designs and lengths of SECR stock in the 'Birdcage' group (which refers to the raised, glazed end guard's lookout on the brake vehicle rather than any avian connection), Bachmann has chosen the long-lived 60ft type dating from the 1910s. Some of these vehicles survived until the late-1950s, seeing out their career in rural backwaters and helping out at busier times such as summer Saturdays and during the Kentish hop picking season.

Three different coaches have been produced consisting of a Diagram 159 Brake Third Lavatory

a Diagram 158 Brake Third (BT). To modern eyes, the BT and CL have an unusual semi-corridor interior design allowing some, but by no means all, passengers access to the two toilets. CL 554685, built by the Metropolitan Amalgamated Carriage & Wagon Co. and delivered to the SECR in November 1913 also has a rather luxurious First Class saloon with loose armchairs, denoted by the larger off-centre windows. BT 53428S is a more conventional design with eight separate compartments. The trio of BR crimson coaches reviewed here is designed to be used together to form three-car set 595.

The immediate impression is that these are something quite different and a bit special. The wooden bodies with raised beading are beautifully detailed and festooned with separate



components, including roof vents, door grab handles, wire handrails, lamp brackets, step boards and brake hoses. Under the floor there are also finely modelled turnbuckle underframe trusses, neatly modelled bogies, vacuum brake equipment and battery boxes on the two brakes. One quality touch is the painting of the wheel faces in matt black, which looks so much better than shiny blackened metal.

The carriage ends are particularly fine, helped by the addition of the yellow set number on the outer ends of the two brakes. The raised 'birdcage' lookout is also well modelled and a novel period feature likely to convince many modellers to find use for these coaches. Detailed, unsprung buffers are fitted and there's a considerable gap between vehicles if the factory fitted tension lock couplings are retained. The NEM pockets will allow closer couplings of your choice to be fitted, especially if you enjoy the luxury of large radius curves.

The BR crimson coaches of set 595 are first to arrive, but will soon be joined by vehicles in SECR'dark lake' for the pre-1923 period and Southern Railway olive green for the 1923-1947 period. The decoration and printing of our samples was exemplary, although period photographs of these (and other) BR crimson coaches show a much more vivid red than the dark shade used by Bachmann. This could be due to the vagaries of colour reproduction on old film, but the difference is too marked to pass without comment.

The difficulties of designing and massproducing accurate ready-to-run models of such vehicles should not be underestimated: pre-Grouping companies often built carriages in small batches for specific routes or trains with ornate decoration and designs, and various So, while some may be disappointed at having to wait four years for Bachmann to release the 'Birdcage' stock (it was first announced in 2013), this project has been somewhat more demanding than many the company has tackled over the years. This, coupled with the complexity of the detail, may also partly explain the higher than usual cost of these coaches, which have a recommended retail price of £59.95. While costlier than more conventional off-the-shelf coaches, when compared to buying, building and painting kits to the same standard they look like a bargain. Although there is lots of external detail, the models feel solidly built and have a reassuring 'swoosh' as they roll along the track.

Happily, the timing of their release will also coincide with Hornby's SECR'H', which is an ideal companion, and the recent announcement of a Wainwright'P' Class 0-6-0T by Hatton's. Other suitable locomotives include Bachmann's 'C'0-6-0 and Maunsell'N' 2-6-0 while BR '4MT'2-6-4Ts have been seen hauling these vehicles too. We hope to see more South Eastern division locomotives released over the coming years adding further to the modelling of this interesting railway scene. (BJ)

railways. They were initially shedded at Plymouth Millbay in Devon and worked on Millbay Docks and the Sutton Harbour branch. Some were employed in Cornwall from St Blazey shed until 1928 while during their career examples were allocated to Newton Abbot, Taunton, Swindon and, briefly, on the Weymouth Harbour tramway.

The last was withdrawn in 1962 and 1363 at Didcot is the only surviving example.
KMRC is also supporting its restoration with £5 from each model of 1363 (Cat No. K2203) being donated to the project.

THE MODEL

This version of the '1361' has been produced for Kernow by DJ Models and follows a similar format to the Beattie '0298' 2-4-0WT and Adams '02' 0-4-4T in that it has a removable smokebox door with magnets which hides the 6-pin decoder socket, a coreless motor, full geared drive chassis and pre-fitted wires through to the coal bunker to accommodate installation of a small 'sugar cube' type speaker beneath the moulded coal load.

For review we had an exclusive opportunity to look over the very first production samples of GWR green liveried 1364 (K2204) and BR black with early crests liveried 1362

(K2202). The full shipment was

expected to depart from the factory in China to the Cornish retailer as this issue closed for press giving an expected arrival date of October.

Like previous models by Kernow the level of separately fitted parts is quite outstanding on the '1361'. From traditional details such as handrails and lamp irons, there is also separately fitted smokebox dart, chimney, whistles, ejector pipework, fire iron hooks, cab window guards, sprung buffers, cab interior fittings, sandpipes, brake rigging and motion brackets. Plus a detailing pack is supplied with each locomotive containing bufferbeam parts together with an etched sheet of black colour fire irons. Another neat addition are GWR pattern lamps which even have a slot to slide over the lamp irons.

As a package the model is very well appointed and the standard of finish on our samples was very pleasing too. The main colours of both of our samples were smoothly and evenly applied while the cabside numberplates have raised letters finished in brass colour which really set the model off. The reversing lever is picked out in red too while the cab interior is fully painted. Incidentally, access to the cab is achieved by the same route to installing a speaker – the coal load is removed to allow the cab roof to be unclipped. It takes a little force to do this, but it is simple. Removing the



PERFORMANCE

On the track both of our samples ran smoothly and quietly straight from the box on analogue control and following running in as recommended in the instructions they improved further. The coreless motor in these models is well suited to their size and the gearing gives them a realistic operational speed at all levels. From this point of view they will be perfect for shunting offering superb slow speed running through live frog points. In terms of capacity we loaded each of the '1361s' with a 15 wagon goods train formed of a mixture of open and closed wagons which they handled with ease in all our tests on a level layout.

Digital operation is catered for with a 6-pin decoder socket mounted in the smokebox. This is covered by the smokebox door which clips into place with small magnets. Decoder choice will need to be made carefully though as, naturally with a locomotive of this size, space is at a premium. Using anything but a small motor only decoder, such as a sound decoder, will most likely require hardwiring to make best use of the space in the smokebox.

On the up side, wires for a speaker have been provided and these are curled into the bunker below the coal load. An enclosure is included which will cater for a 15mm x 10mm 'sugar cube' type speaker, but this will require its rear baffle removing in most cases in order to fit in the compact bunker. Nevertheless, sound provision has been considered and provided in the type of locomotive where more often than not this would be ignored altogether.

OVERALL

Kernow has delivered a top quality model of the GWR '1361' 0-6-0ST and standing it side by side with its counterpart from Heljan there is a clear winner from the two. Kernow's leads the way for this small class of five locomotives in looks, performance and digital provision and has certainly been worth the wait. The unique details for each locomotive also push it to another level and follow the impressive finishing of the Adams' O2' 0-4-4Ts.

This is a fantastic addition to Kernow's range of Cornish theme models and we are eager to see its next release touch down in the *Hornby Magazine* office for review. (MW)

OLDEN VALLEY HOBBIES' (GVH) Oxford Rail-produced Yorkshire Engine Co'Janus' 0-6-0 is now out in the shops, but landing in late September are the promised sound fitted models. GVH gave Hornby Magazine exclusive access to a production sound version for full inspection. We won't go into detail on the exterior and looks of the 'Janus', as we covered that in our first review in HM122, with this example being the same as that in National Coal Board blue representing a preserved locomotive at the Churnet Valley Railway.

The soundtrack is what makes this model stand out and with its twin engine setup and hydraulic transmission, the 'Janus' makes a good noise too. Recreating that in model form isn't always straightforward, but by working with Legomanbiffo, this LokSound equipped locomotive does sound the part from start-up which includes separate starting of the twin engines. The sounds have been recorded from a preserved locomotive at Scunthorpe Steelworks with the support of the Appleby and Frodingham Railway Preservation Society.

The sound file has clearly been well put together and features four levels of engine power by the time you reach speed step 105. However, as delivered, for our taste the model ran too fast so we adjusted the maximum speed and mid-speed to make it respond how we wanted it to. This had the effect of reducing the maximum speed to a more realistic level and allowing full use of the power bands available on the decoder. Our final settings were CV5=70 and CV6=20. We also adjusted the deceleration extending CV4 to 120. This is the beauty of digital command control - every locomotive can be adjusted to suit particular driving styles or layout requirements.

There is more to this decoder too as it uses ESU's new Drive Lock function. This holds the speed of the locomotive and allows the engine sound to be ramped up and down on the throttle. It takes some getting used to - and it would be better allocated in the single digit range of functions rather than at F15 – but it works well and allows the effect of a locomotive working hard at the head of a train or going up grade to be replicated.

In total, there are 14 sound functions on the decoder including excellent horns – F2 is

With 4mm scale British narrow gauge seemingly about to take off, this starter set from Roco could offer a very reasonably priced route into the subject. Containing a neat little Henschel 0-6-0T industrial steam locomotive, four four-wheel log carriers (with logs), a circuit of 'HOe'/'OO9' 9mm gauge track and a DC controller for just over £100, it represents excellent value for money.

The locomotive is typical of small industrials exported all over the world to work on forestry, quarry and sugar cane railways, for example, as well as internal factory systems. Roco's model features a sturdy die-cast metal body, 6-pin DCC decoder socket in the cab, standard 'HOe' hook and loop couplers and smooth, reliable performance thanks to the heavy die-cast chassis. Our sample ran well even on quickly laid, uneven track, just like the prototype. The wagons are simple but effective and a wide range of additional vehicles is available from Roco, Minitrains and many other suppliers.

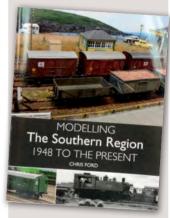

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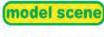

F THE ONLY CHANGE you make to your Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder is to give it a new address, you are almost certainly not getting the optimal performance from your models. This is because decoder manufacturers generally do not know to which model any particular decoder will be fitted. To allow for this, they are supplied with factory settings designed to operate the majority of motor types reasonably well under a wide range of conditions.

Each motor and model combination will have its own characteristics, even between those from the same production batches. How different they may be from each other will depend upon the model types and the tolerances allowed.

Configuration Variables, or CVs for short, are the method by which 'preferences' can be stored in a decoder's memory. These preferences tell the decoder how and what to do. This is the way in which the operation can be specifically tailored not only to the model, but also to the layout on which it is to run and the operator's driving style.

CV changes are fully reversible, so if you try something which doesn't work out as planned just change it back. Don't be afraid to experiment - there's everything to be gained and nothing to lose. If it all goes

wrong, use the decoder's reset command (often CV8 = 8 but check the manual for your particular decoder type) but remember that this will also reset the address to '3'.

There are a large number of CVs possible. Some, a surprisingly small number, are mandatory for all decoders. Others are optional, but if the manufacturer includes them, there are specified ways in which they should work. Even more have no defined use so each manufacturer may use them for their own proprietary needs. Generally speaking, top quality decoders will have more scope for optimisation through a greater range of CVs, but please note that top quality is available at budget prices.

I use Zimo decoders exclusively. All of the features highlighted in the following tips are available with Zimo decoders. Which of them apply to other manufacturers will be specific to that brand or decoder type.

For this reason, many of the tips do not include lists of CVs and specific values, but are intended to point out what may be possible and how this might be achieved. Your decoder's manual will give such information specifically designed for that decoder type. Even adjustments in the basic CVs (commonly called 'programming') can produce worthwhile outcomes, which leads nicely onto the first of our 20 Top Tips.

All new decoders must be supplied with the address set at '3'. Though strictly if the decoder is supplied already fitted to a model, the seller may set a different address, in practice all manufacturers will also use '3'.

To be able to independently operate more than one locomotive concurrently on the same track each model must have a unique address. Operators can assign any of a large range of numbers to achieve this, normally between 1 and 9999, though there are decoders with restricted ranges.

It will be beneficial in the longer term to have a numbering system in place which can be added to easily and which allows operators to quickly identify a particular model's address without needing a photographic memory. Using 1, 2, 3, 4 and so on might seem OK when you have only four locomotives, but when that goes up to a dozen or so, and some are infrequently operated, it might turn out to be unreliable.

All real locomotives have a unique number which is usually visible. Many experienced DCC users will base their system around these running numbers or TOPS classification or a combination of these since there will always be a visible clue. If you apply your chosen addressing scheme consistently, it will always be possible to deduce the address.

MODIFY THE SPEED CURVE

If supported by your decoder, the value in CV6 (always used in conjunction with CV5) will determine the power available at half-throttle. In some circumstances, a linear curve will be most useful. In this case the value in CV6 should be half of the value in CV5.

If you would like finer control at low speeds, however, this can be achieved with a CV6 value less than one half of CV5. Experimentation will allow you to optimise this ratio for your own needs, but a good starting point is CV6 = 1/3 of CV5.

The graph shows that when the throttle is

halfway towards the maximum, the road speed of the model is only 1/3 of the maximum. This means that at lower speeds a large movement of the throttle control is required to vary the road speed, resulting in finer control.

Although the graph suggests a sharp change at the midpoint, in reality good quality decoders interpret this as the centre of a curve rather than a single fixed point and smooth out the transition automatically.



DIGITAL CONTROL

COMPENSATING FOR WORN COMPONENTS

If there is any wear, slack tolerance or excessive end-float in your model's drivetrain, this will often manifest in jumpy starts after a change in direction. This is because the first part of the motor's acceleration occurs whilst the slack is being taken up. By the time the driving wheels can be turned, the motor is spinning. The sudden engagement of the transmission with the spinning motor causes the model to start with a jolt; like letting the clutch out too quickly in your car.

Zimo decoders use CV146. Activation causes the motor to turn at minimum speed initially (per CV2) for the duration specified by the value in CV146. This gives time for the slack to be taken up before normal acceleration begins. The value is determined by observation, effectively increasing the value until the jolt start is eliminated. This feature only operates after a direction change.

AVOID RUNAWAYS

Decoders are often supplied set up to allow them to operate on analogue as well. If through poor or dirty track or degraded DCC signal the decoder decides it is not on DCC powered track it will switch to DC operation. Since DCC track is always at full power, this commonly results in the model accelerating to full speed and running out of control until it derails or hits something. If you only operate on DCC, it can make sense to remove this potential problem at source.

CV29 is often referred to as a Configuration Register, since it stores preferences for several different features each controlled by a separate value. To enable DC operation, the value '4' is added to the other separate values in CV29. To disable DC operation without affecting any other feature controlled by CV29, the value '4' must be deducted from the existing total.

It is essential, therefore to read (and note) the value stored in CV29 before making this change.



TEMPORARY POWER SUPPLY

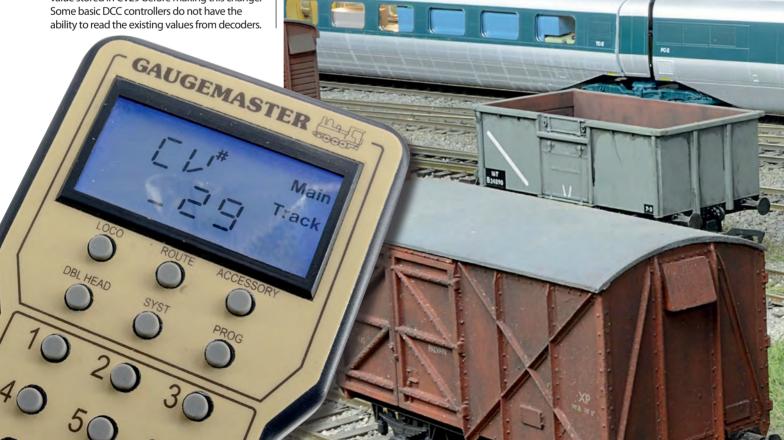
Whilst well laid track properly maintained and cleaned is to be strived for, DCC has the ability to mitigate the impact of poor electrical supply by storing power in external capacitors for use when the track power is temporarily unavailable due, for instance, to electrically isolated sections or dirty track.

While most decoders will be able to be converted to allow this if you are prepared to solder to delicate decoder components. some are designed with external storage in mind, having proprietary 'stay alive' or 'keep alive' add-on packs whilst some Zimo decoders have onboard capacitor management circuitry to which inexpensive standard capacitors can be connected.

SPEED TRIMMING

Some models, otherwise in good mechanical condition, have a tendency to run more quickly in one direction than another. The impact of this can vary from minor inconvenience in single locomotive operation to disaster when part of a 'consist', a common name for trains with more than one locomotive. If your decoder supports this feature, it is

possible to adjust the power supplied to the motor when turning in one direction relative to that in the reverse direction. Useful to produce similar speeds in either direction (for a given throttle position), this fine tuning is called Trimming. CV66 is responsible for Forward Trim, CV95 for Reverse Trim on Zimo decoders. The higher the value, the more the voltage is increased in the respective directions of travel.



INERTIA AND MOMENTUM

With lower mass, a light engine will accelerate and decelerate more responsively than a heavy train. In model form, it is possible to automatically simulate the effects of mass by regulating the increase and decrease in power available to the motor over time. CV3 regulates the rate of acceleration to simulate the effects of inertia. The higher the value, the lower the rate of acceleration and the heavier the train will appear to be.

CV4 controls the rate of deceleration to simulate the effects of momentum. The higher the value, the lower the rate of deceleration and the heavier the train will appear to be. Even values of below 10 in these CVs will smooth out speed changes, thereby reducing oversensitivity to changes in the throttle position without unduly affecting controllability.

Larger values will have a greater effect; in CV4 this can be used to create realistic coasting effects but can result in very large stopping distances. Values over 75 are probably best left to either very experienced 'drivers' or for those decoders equipped with working brake features - see 20.

BANKING

Heavy trains climbing long steep gradients often required the temporary assistance of another locomotive. This is called banking. It can take many forms with the banking locomotive coupled or uncoupled.

A common method was for the banking engine to buffer up to the rear of the train without coupling. The banker would then take some of the load by pushing as the train's locomotive pulled from the front.

When the lead locomotive was able to

manage the train unaided, the banker would reduce speed, drifting off the rear allowing the train to continue its journey. The banker would return to the start position to await the next train requiring assistance.

Banking in this way is a special form of consisting which is difficult to achieve with analogue control but very straightforward for DCC. Each locomotive has a separate address, so may be controlled independently. Separate throttles or a dual throttle DCC controller offers the most convenient way to bank in this way - a single throttle can be used with practise.

ADD SPECIAL EFFECTS

A widely available facility is using the decoder's processing power to add a variety of effects to Function Outputs (FOs). By varying the frequency, intensity and duration of power available to the respective outputs, LEDs may be flashed randomly or to a fixed pattern, the output of smoke units can be varied to suit different running status, though effects can be applied in one direction only. For example, using a diesel locomotive,

Function Mapping (16) will allow you to assign each light type to a separate F key, but so far the control you have is limited to ON or OFF at full brightness. This may be fine for the high intensity lamp but it is not satisfactory for the others and you will have assigned up to eight F keys to lighting functions. Here are some possible improvements to simulation and convenience.

If your decoder allows the setting of a particular FO to operate in one direction only, use this feature so that at the No.1 end all 'white' lamps illuminate only when travelling forwards and the tail lamps only when travelling in reverse. At the No. 2 end, set the white

lamps to illuminate only when travelling in reverse and the tail lamps when in forward.

Map similar lamps from each end to the same F key. For example, assign the two FOs which control the cab lights to F key 8, or both tail lamp FOs to F key 10. This will result in half the number of F keys used. A single key determines if the tail lamps are on or off, and the direction of travel determines at which end the lights are illuminated.

Maybe you would like to have cab lights automatically switch off when the locomotive moves and back on when stationary? Or the high intensity lamp to automatically dip or turn off completely when the model comes to rest and back on when the locomotive pulls away? Setting these preferences if available on your decoder can save a lot of button pushing.

Until recent times, UK locomotive lighting was of very low intensity using filament bulbs. The brilliance and instant response of LEDs does not correctly simulate these lamps. High quality decoders will have the ability to reduce their intensity to the realistic dim glow, and some will also allow a 'soft' on and off option too.

SET A REALISTIC TOP SPEED Many decoders support CV5 which sets the maximum speed of a locomotive. Reducing the value in CV5 will reduce the power available to the motor at full throttle. This is very useful in limiting the maximum scale speed of each model to be similar to that of the real thing.

LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS

As all DCC track has full voltage during operating sessions, any locomotive lighting may also be illuminated constantly. Using the decoder's FOs and ability to receive instructions from DCC controllers, individual or individual pairs of lights may also be switched on or off remotely. LEDs produce light with low power consumption and with little heat. These features, plus the very small physical sizes available, makes them ideal for model lights. You can add LEDs to your models either using pre-wired kits or as individual units following the fitting guides featured in Hornby Magazine from time to time.

The number of FOs must match or exceed the number of lights you wish to separately control, so decide what you wish to achieve, calculate the



number of FOs required then take this into account when selecting your decoder.

As an example, a model diesel locomotive is equipped with white marker lamps and red tail lamps at each end. By wiring the white lamps at one end with the red lamps at the other, they can be operated with two FOs.

But what if you wish to run with marker and tail lamps illuminated during light engine movements but without the tail lamps when the locomotive is hauling vehicles, as on the real railways? The link from each red pair to the opposing white lamps must be severed and separate power circuits provided. This means that four FOs are now required.

Developing this theme, consider a model diesel locomotive equipped with a cab light, white marker lamps, red tail lamps and a high intensity lamp at each end.

To provide full independent control will require four FOs for each end, giving a total of eight FOs overall.

UNDERSTAND YOUR DECODER

Arguably, 'Read the decoder manual' should have been first in this list, but no one wants to be told that. The features in this series of tips can help you to perfect your models' performance, but not all decoders offer the full range.

DOUBLE-HEADING

Operating multiple locomotives as one 'Consisted' power unit is common practice on real railways. The major drawback in simulating this on a model railway is that individual models react differently to a given throttle input. Poor running and even derailments can occur where the performance of motorised units are not well matched.

I have explained how, by setting preferences, we are able to determine how our models behave. You can use these techniques to closely match the starting, acceleration, road speed and deceleration characteristics of all motive power in a consisted train to ensure stable running.

OPTIMISE MOTOR CONTROL

Adjusting CVs 1 to 6, if supported, will be sufficient in most cases to achieve exhibition quality operations. For 'stubborn' models, particular motor types or ultimate finesse other motor controls are available with more fully featured decoders. CV9 can be used to modify the Pulse Width Modulation (PWM) duty cycles. This and the related CV56 Back Electro-Motive Force (BEMF) control can be tweaked in a number of ways to optimise smooth, quiet operations.

Special settings will be available to meet the requirements of the new breed of coreless motors which are becoming more popular of late. A full description of the changes to make is beyond the scope of this article, but if your decoder supports these CVs, it will be covered in the appropriate manual.

SMOOTH STARTING

The transition between a stationary locomotive and one which is beginning to move can be too abrupt. Decoders are able to smooth this out by setting a target starting voltage with CV2. The optimal value can be determined by observation. Begin with CV2 = 1 and set your throttle to speed step 1. If the model does not move, try CV2 = 2 and so on until smooth starting is achieved. Aim for the lowest value in CV2 which provides reliable smooth take off at speed step 1.

FUNCTION OUTPUTS

Virtually all DCC locomotive (or mobile) decoders also have physical connections to supply power to on-board features such as lighting and smoke units. These are Function Outputs (FOs) also known as AUXs and the number available varies by brand and decoder type. Any electrical item you wish to be able to switch on and off independently will need to connect to a separate AUX. 'Normal', 'full power' and 'open collector' are different terms for the same thing and are the most common types. The positive lead from each item to be powered will be connected to the Common Positive terminal of the decoder and the negative to one of the AUX connections. To safeguard LEDs by restricting the available current, a series resistor may be required too to ensure that it doesn't receive too much power from the decoder.

COACH LIGHTING

It's easy to think of DCC only in terms of locomotives but Function-only decoders, or the Function portion of locomotive decoders can also be used to great effect in coaches where overhead, table, vestibule, kitchen and even lavatory lighting can be individually controlled, moving or stationary.

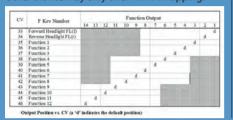
See HM86 where a sound decoder was used to provide both visual and sound effects, in a Hornby 12-wheel restaurant car.

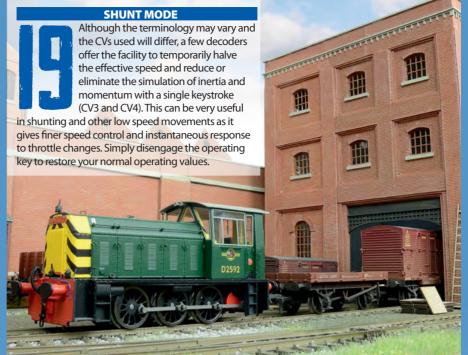


FUNCTION MAPPING

The basic NMRA function mapping may not always be appropriate. You may wish different F keys to operate your FOs or it may be a sound decoder typically having sounds assigned to the lower numbered keys.

Whilst the physical connections (FOs) remain, their operating F keys can be changed in the decoder's software by assigning some or all to different F Keys in a process called Mapping. ESU decoders have a wide range of possibilities with their Indexed pages. Zimo decoder software has, in addition to the basic NMRA methodology, five or six different special and more convenient ways to remap functions. Other brands may only offer NMRA mapping.





UPDATE FIRMWARE

Decoders consist broadly of an array of physical components assembled according to the manufacturer's design and software which interprets the DCC signals from the controller in order to provide the required outcomes. Similarly, DCC controllers have hardware and software elements to

provide both power and control signals. This type of software is often called 'Firmware' as it is an essential part of the

operational requirements, is normally provided exclusively by the manufacturer and often cannot be altered by users.

Many DCC controllers and most decoders are supplied on this basis. What you buy is what you get, offering no opportunity for improvement other than to replace them with new.

A few manufacturers supply 'future-proofed' DCC controllers or decoders or both. In these cases, the operational firmware can be updated to incorporate improved algorithms, bug fixes and, most exciting of all, new features.

The way in which this is achieved varies. A common way to update DCC controllers is to return the unit to the manufacturer or their agents for a factory upgrade. This is usually achieved by installing new hardware with

upgraded/updated firmware already installed. In some cases the equipment is designed so that the firmware can be updated by users. Improved firmware is developed by the manufacturer and distributed electronically. This is usually provided as a no cost download which is loaded to the controller or decoder. The recipient device instantly becomes the equivalent of the manufacturer's current model.

I would like to dispel the myth that this is an unimportant luxury feature only available in high cost equipment, so let me give you a couple of recent examples.

The Hornby Select DCC controller was launched as a no-frills budget DCC controller. With a limited power output, very restricted ability to programme decoders, and access to only 9 F keys many users quickly tired of the constraints and inconvenient menu structure. For a modest fee and return to Hornby, the latest firmware V1.5 can be installed. Whilst some operational constraints remain, the transformation is amazing within the limits of the original hardware. Access to all 29 F keys and a much improved menu structure make the unit far more versatile and convenient to operate. Plug in a 4A power supply and it will match the output of units costing three times as much.

Secondly, a high value in CV4 produces realistic

coasting but massively increases stopping distances. If the effect of this high figure could be temporarily and conveniently removed, it would be possible to have realistic coasting and short stopping distance when required.

In 2014 Zimo introduced a Brake Key feature for Zimo sound decoders designed to achieve exactly that outcome. It has since become one of Zimo's most highly regarded features.

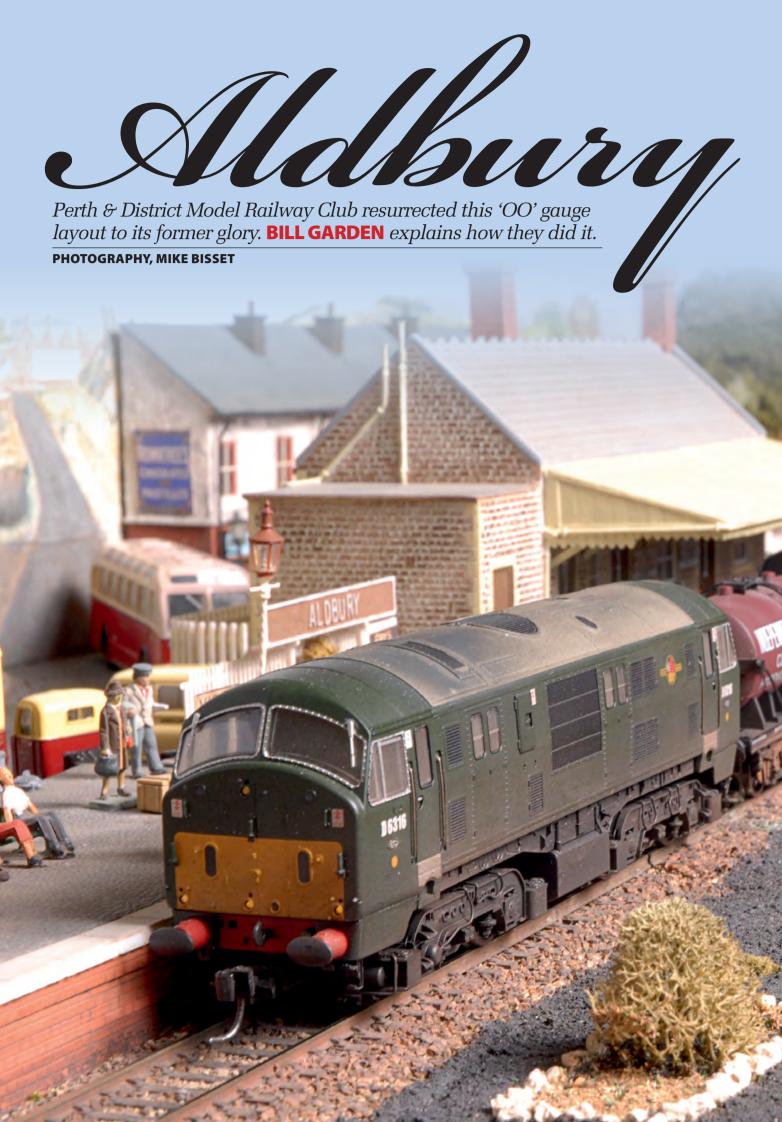
The retarding effect is progressive. The longer the brake key is engaged, the higher the brake force applied. This allows short 'dabs' for minor speed adjustments and longer durations for heavy braking. Furthermore, the effects are fully adjustable by the user so that locomotives can be modelled with very efficient or with poor brakes as desired. The Brake Key feature is now available on all new non-sound decoders with the latest firmware, even the £19 entry level MX600.

Fortunately for owners of older Zimo decoders or those with earlier software versions, all Zimo decoders have user-updateable firmware. The latest version (V37.01) brings a large number of useful improvements, including the Brake Key feature.

This 'new for old' policy can mean that the cost of ownership of upgradeable equipment may be lower in the medium to long term than one-shot budget items.

LDBURY is not a new layout, but in late 2010 it became new to us when after years in storage in a loft it was donated to the club by its owner who did not have the space or ability to set it up and run it.

The layout depicted a West of England village scene in the late-1950s and early-1960s. It had a terminus station with a main and bay platform, single road engine and goods shed - and the track plan offered a loop with tracks leading to both sheds. A village church and low relief houses, shops and offices completed the scene.

The years in storage had taken their toll on many of the buildings and other fixtures so these were all replaced with modern items suited to the location. There was daylight showing underneath the points where the motors had been fitted and although this was not something that we liked, they all worked perfectly so we decided to leave them alone with some subtle camouflage applied to lessen the gaps.

The scenery was faded and patchy so we set to work with copious amounts of Woodland Scenics material and static grass for the country side area. The darker and subtle shades of grass now available on the market made for a better presentation and blended with the existing colours on the layout.

The biggest task for the layout, which was a terminus to storage yard design, was to replace the original traverser which we found to be broken and beyond repair with a turntable. This was discussed and unanimously agreed that it would better aid the flow of traffic as it would save the handling of locomotives when returning trains. Whilst the turntable was under construction we agreed to do a complete rewire to ensure that there were no hidden gremlins in the existing wiring.

When the rewiring was complete for DC operation, trains were run and we gained knowledge of possible operating sequences required for the running of the layout. In the discussions regarding the layout >>>



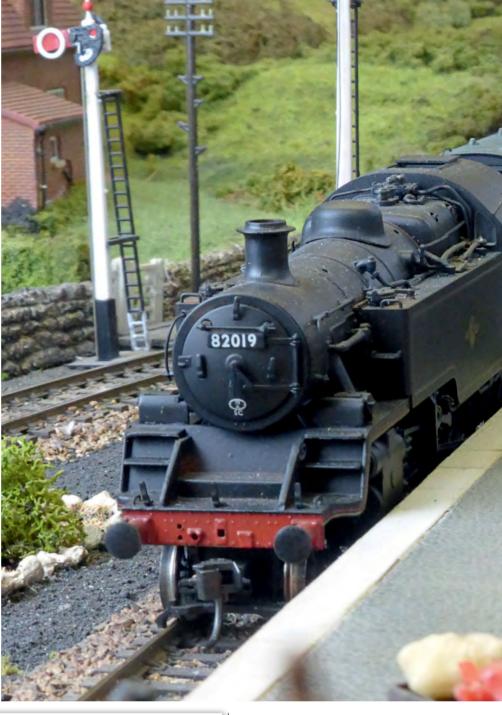
revamp, we also agreed that hands-free operation in train movement and shunting would be desired so all rolling stock should be fitted with Kadee style couplings and magnetic uncouplers were installed at the appropriate places. The existing signals on the layout did work but most were damaged so replacements were to be built and operated via MERG servos.

BACK ON SHOW

As the revamp was nearing completion, we were invited to show a layout at Elgin at Easter 2011 and although the signalling was still incomplete we decided to go anyway to give the layout a good test run. We displayed our then small selection of Western Region locomotives that were suitable for a branch line - but allowed some interlopers from further afield for good measure too. The layout worked well and the public admired it and fellow exhibitors liked it as well. To our surprise, we found ourselves winning best in show - not bad for a second-hand layout built in the last century.

With success on its first showing, the layout was taken to a number of other shows that year and the operators enjoyed running it and received many favourable comments about the way in which a small compact layout had many different cameo scenes. After the last showing for the year, we thought about how we could improve it further. Work still needed to be completed on the signals, but it was decided to replace most of them with new Ratio kits.

At the same time, the decision was made to convert the layout to Digital Command Control (DCC) to allow the use of an ever growing selection of sound fitted locomotives owned by several club members and to upgrade the point operation to DCC with route setting which would eliminate the need for the separate control panel. The majority of the DCC equipped club members use the Digitrax system so it was obvious that this product would be used for operation on Aldbury.



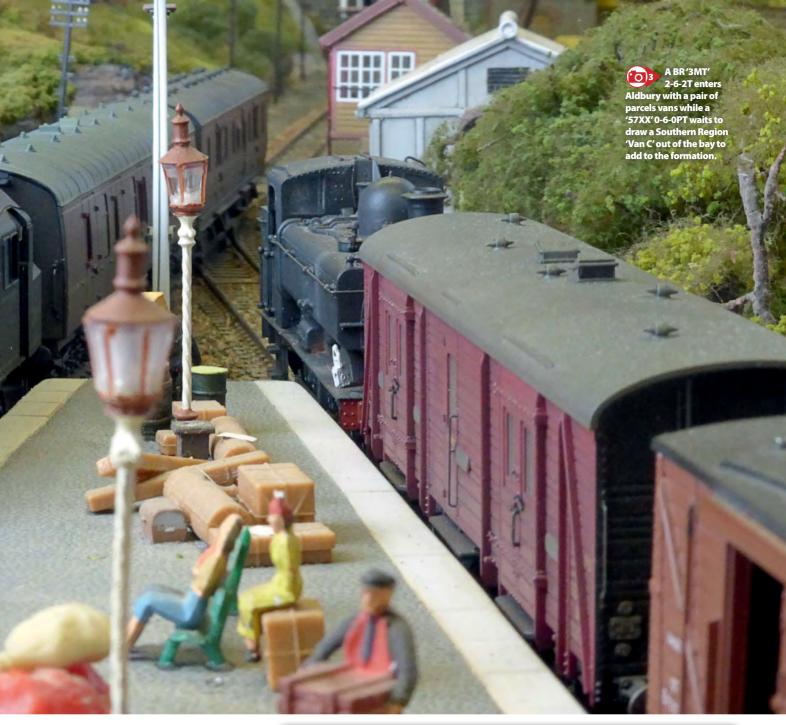

An unusual visitor in the form of an English Electric Type 3 takes centre stage of the passenger service flanked by a '57XX' 0-6-0PT and '4575' 2-6-2T.

Digitrax DS64 point modules were also installed and programmed for route setting and at the same time servos and the new lower quadrant signals were brought into use. A servo was also installed in the engine shed so that the doors could open and close. This adds to the fun and amuses the public and ourselves when the branch locomotive is put to rest at the end of its shift or working day.

The layout requires two operators, one on the scenic area to control the incoming and outgoing trains and one on the train turntable which is used to turn or select the next train. As the signals are operational but not interlocked with the points, they can often be overlooked in the movement of trains. To combat this lack of attention on operational requirements by the operators, a polite instruction was affixed to the control area to remind the operator that it had taken many hours of difficult work to build and motorise the signals and that it would be appreciated if they would kindly utilise them.



OPERATION

Branch line operation would normally see one passenger train every couple of hours or so and a goods train maybe once or twice a day but obviously that would not work at exhibitions so we operate the layout with the public in mind and try to keep things on the move and change the locomotives on a regular basis to give variety. Our little branch line enjoys a busy commuter line style service which would be the envy of most of the current travelling public.

Passenger trains usually consist of suburban coaches and locomotive although the sight of a Diesel Multiple Unit or Railbus on the branch is not unusual as they take their turn of duty from the main line. Freight traffic consists of coal for the merchants with box vans and the occasional loaded open wagons with various types of merchandise for road distribution from the goods shed.

Over the years, we have increased our Western Region locomotive stud so we can now run more appropriate trains but London Midland & Scottish Railway and >>>

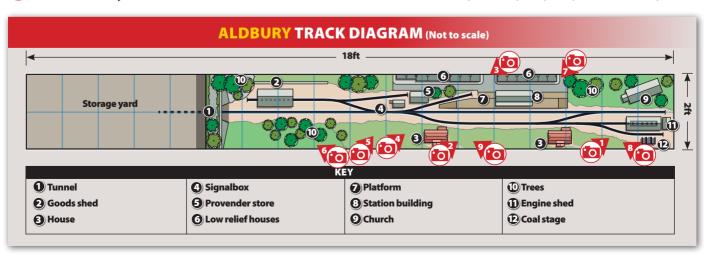

BR Standard types are still common on the layout and the variety is welcomed by both the operators and public alike.

Adding DCC sound to locomotives has made a big change to the atmosphere of the layout at exhibitions as the public like to listen to as well as see the trains in motion. We use Loksound and Zimo decoders with sound from Howes, Digitrains and SWD. Our particular favourites are the 'Prairie' sound by Tony Molyneux and the 'Hymek'

Activedrive by Paul Chetter. Fitting a decoder and speaker into some models presents quite a challenge but often the use of cube speakers lowers the difficulty. Some locomotives are also enhanced with a glowing firebox which always attracts attention and together with some random locomotive sound effects, the public can be drawn into the scene to ask questions.

UPGRADED

Redeveloping the layout has given us a lot of fun and importantly, it has given many of the club members an introduction to DCC operation, route setting, sound, Kadee couplings, static grass and much more.

Of course, we give grateful thanks to the club members who participated in the rebuilding of the layout. However, full credit must be given to the original builders of the layout (one-time members of Leigh MRC) and I'm sure they would never have expected it to be still on the UK exhibition circuit and to still be shown as far north as Elgin and in Northern Ireland at the Bangor show. We like to think that we have put new life into Aldbury and regenerated this small slice of model England with care and affection.

Train SPECA SPECA

Whatever scale trains are, someone has to be in control of them, with the arrangements getting more complex the bigger the train. **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** looks at the world of full-size train control and finds out what the term 'DCC' really means.

VEN IN A SMALL COUNTRY such as Britain, the railway system is very complex. Lines criss-cross each other and on them run trains of differing lengths, travelling to destinations many miles apart and conveying anything from passengers to perishable freight. Each train must have a crew and each must have enough fuel to enable it to complete its journey, the locomotives pulling them must be matched to both the load and the route to be taken, station and operational staff must be made aware of their intended path and arrangements must be made to deal with the train's contents when it eventually arrives at its destination.

Right from the earliest days of the railways, it was realised that some sort of centralised control would be needed to deal with all these matters as otherwise train movements would degenerate into chaos. As a result a system was evolved which, although modified and updated, is still with us today and just like on model railways it has also evolved from the analogue to the digital age.

The first railways tended to be quite short and were operated independently of each other. Each had a headquarters office and each soon established a room in that building which was used to collate all the information regarding not only the running of trains but also the whereabouts of rolling stock, locomotives and crew. Information was received either by hand-written note or by telegraph and the information used was also used to compile invoices, delivery notes and statements for the line's customers. As companies became bigger or amalgamated with each other, the workload increased substantially and eventually the commercial and operating functions became split from each other.

By the time of nationalisation in 1948, control of the railways had become extremely sophisticated, despite a lack of electronic devices such as computers, but it remained something that was always hidden from the public and subsequently received little attention. Because of the volume of work, the control function was >>>

broken down into layers. At the top of the pile was Regional Control, an office manned by some of the most experienced managers the railway possessed. Matters of strategic importance were dealt with at this level, such as major disruptions, derailments or what were termed 'perturbations of service' and this was the office to which any very important decisions were referred.

Below Regional Control was the Divisional Control Office which kept an overall view of a particular geographical area, with some of these areas dating back to the companies of the pre-grouping days and with some others being centred round a large terminus or heavily-worked area. In overall command of the Divisional Control office was the Deputy Chief Controller, also known as the DCC, who would mainly look after passenger movements, while his assistant was responsible for freight.

Further sub-divisions existed within Regional Control with the tracks themselves further divided into smaller parts, called running sections, each of which had a small staff to keep an eye on movements. Alongside these would be a train crew controller, a locomotive and/or rolling stock controller, each of whom would be being fed information from their respective staff and all of whom would record it all faithfully on paper.

JUGGLING RESOURCES

The people who worked in the control offices were experts at juggling resources, whatever the situation they were presented with. For instance, those working in rural areas would have to find paths for seasonal produce trains amongst the usual traffic, while their colleagues at the next desk struggled to find locomotives and rolling stock and a third official would be on the phone trying to persuade locomotive crews to work extra hours or to turn in on their rest day.

In the heavily-industrialised north of England, control would plan for the annual 'Wakes Weeks' holidays by reactivating scores of mothballed coaches and pressing into passenger services almost any available freight locomotive fitted with vacuum brakes that could turn a wheel. Most offices would also have contact with their neighbouring areas to ensure that the weary mill workers got to the seaside as efficiently as possible.

Information flowed into Control on a continuous basis, from signalboxes advising on the progress of trains or reporting out of sequence events and delays, through goods clerks requesting extra wagons to cope with an unexpected surge in demand, included station masters reporting bookings for special trains and also shed masters reporting on

breakdowns and locomotive availability.

To aid this flow, control offices have traditionally been equipped with the latest form of communication devices. The telegraph formed the first reliable such instrument and was soon followed up by the telephone, in many cases manned by specialist operators who would write out a message on a slip of paper and put it in a rack on the wall. The Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway's control room at Manchester Victoria Station had an impressive array of 'candlestick' telephones as well as a huge wall-mounted map of the company's lines which the controllers used to monitor movements.

Just as dramatic as the introduction of the telephone or the telegraph was the introduction in the 1970s of the Total Operations Processing System (TOPS) which for the first time allowed the control room to monitor in real time the locations of all the rolling stock on the system and did away with the necessity to send a porter or a clerk down into a goods yard to physically count wagons or to look for a specific type of truck that had gone missing.

This elementary level of computerisation allowed the railways to streamline their control arrangements and so by the 1980s a large region such as the Eastern (which by then also included the former North Eastern) had only two Regional Control Centres, at York and at Liverpool Street. These were supported by Passenger Operations Centres at Doncaster, Leeds and York,



along with a number of Freight Operations Centres. By this time some of the freight control centres had been reorganised so that they dealt with only one form of traffic - Knottingley dealt with only coal and oil trains - and the Passenger controls did not have any responsibility for locomotives, these being dealt with by Regional Control at York. Rather bizarrely though, Diesel Multiple Units were controlled from Leeds, perhaps because of the location of Neville Hill depot. By this time, thanks to computer screens and much improved communications, control centres were a fraction of their previous size, with Leeds being conveniently tucked away on the sixth floor of a tower block next to the station.

PRIVATE CONTROL

Privatisation from 1994 onwards changed the whole face of railway control because operation of the railway was vested in Railtrack while the provision of trains and crews came under the control of the franchise owner. The new private operators began to operate their own control rooms, which dealt with specific company issues involving their own trains and crews while issues involving routes and track were dealt with separately by Railtrack, later Network Rail. Inevitably this led to failures in communication and a disjointed service as no one office had a total overview as to what was happening.

There were signs that this was changing in 2012 when South West Trains and Network Rail formed an alliance which saw staff from both organisations moved to the same control centre at Waterloo where once again an integrated approach to railway operation was able to take place. This example has since been followed elsewhere.

Today's control rooms bear little

resemblance to those of the steam era. Those working there have many computer screens in front of them, some of which show detailed track plans of the rail network with the locations and identification numbers of the trains superimposed on them. When problems occur the information that the controller needs is near at hand but the old human skills of deciding which trains to run and in what order still hold good today. Controllers maintain contact with outside agencies such as the emergency services and also have to handle unforeseen events such as suicides and equipment failures. In most locations the Network Rail controller also has to maintain contact with the train operators, who will advise if there is a rolling stock issue or a train has to be delayed for fitter's attention. Interestingly, many of our heritage lines

nowadays also have a control room, in much the same way as did the pioneer railways, which handles issues that might arise on their section of track and which oversees the running of trains and sometimes the signalboxes on the line.

Although train control has been largely an unseen aspect of railway operation it has always been regarded by those in the industry as one of the most important parts of the railway. So important, in fact, that in times of war there have been bomb-proof control rooms commissioned as well as special control trains that could operate well out of the way of any conflict. Next time you take a train journey, however short, spare a thought for the controller sitting in his or her office keeping a watch over you and making sure that you get to the end of your journey on time and in safety.

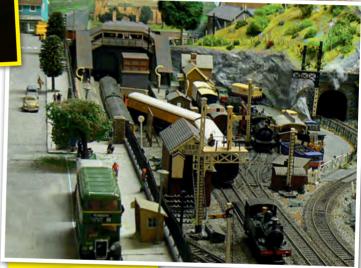
