This month in Hornby Magazine we are beginning a new series of articles on the Hornby RailMaster computer control system for model railways and how to get the most from it.



There is no doubt that model railway control has come a long way since the days of basic 12V analogue rheostat controllers and banks of switches used to isolate track sections. The revolution in Digital Command Control (DCC) really started in the late 1970s with the introduction of the Zero 1 controller by Hornby.

This revolutionary system allowed you to have a chip in each loco and address them individually on the same length of track, with no isolation sections and banks of switches needed. This was a revelation, but perhaps a little too advanced for its time.

Today, we have digital control systems which allow an unprecedented level of control over locomotives, their light and sound functions, points, signals turntables and all sorts of other accessories and they have a lot in common with the old Zero I system.

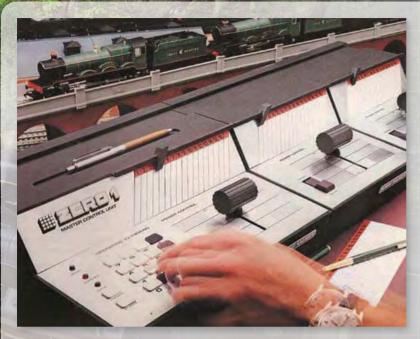
Essentially, a digital signal is always being sent to the track over the power line and packets of data are constantly being transmitted to all locos and accessories on the layout. A particular loco, point or signal decoder will receive a unique packet destined for it and operate accordingly. This makes building and wiring a layout so much simpler than with analogue control. As we have seen Hornby was the first manufacturer of model railways in the UK to bring digital control to users in the 1970s and was also the first to bring computer control with the introduction of RailMaster for Windows in 2011.

This software package is the most popular of its kind in the UK and more and more railway modellers are now exploring the use of computers to operate their layouts. DCC is now the first choice for most new railway modellers compared with analogue control.

There are several software packages out there, so RailMaster is not unique, and most DCC controllers have an interface connection allowing a computer to be connected. RailMaster, however, has been designed to work specifically with Hornby's three DCC controllers (an interface for their Select controller is slated to be available in 2019).

Over the next months, RailMaster Revealed will look at every aspect of computer control for model railways, and in particular RailMaster, from optimising a layout for computer control to designing track plans and creating programs for layout automation. We will also be inviting modellers to contact us so that we can highlight particular areas of interest in future articles. Indeed, RailMaster has one of the largest and most vibrant forums on Hornby.com with users helping each other out and providing information to each other to leverage the power of this software. This is now a firm part of railway modelling in the 21st century.

The Most Straightforward PC Model Railway Control System



RailMaster and programs like it are the most sophisticated thing that railway modellers are likely to encounter and many are still scared of this technology, thinking that you have to be a computer genius in order to use them. The same was initially thought of DCC in general with sophisticated controllers from Hornby, Bachmann, Lenz, NCE, Digitrax and others putting many off.

The sheer sophistication of today's DCC controllers, loco decoders, accessory decoders and so on, ironically, make the use of computer-based software a necessity and makes model railway control much easier, shielding you from the complexities of the system and having to remember lots of address numbers for locos, their functions, points, signals and so on.

Let's take for example, the operation of a signal on port address 1024 that we want to set to green. On the Hornby Elite DCC controller, for example (all DCC controllers work in pretty-much the same way), you need to press the Acc button, then type in I 0 2 4 then press one of the control knobs. This is quite a palaver when you are operating several locos and points/signals. Frankly, it takes away the enjoyment of controlling AND watching your model railway operate.

On RailMaster you simply touch the signal (either using a mouse or your finger on a touch-screen) and the signal changes, both on your layout and on your computer screen. This is the way it should be.

Extend that logic to all signals, points loco throttles and light/sound functions and you can now spend a fraction of your time fiddling with knobs and buttons and instead enjoy watching your trains go by.

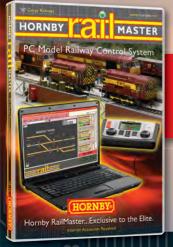
Analogue users are used to just flicking a switch on a board or pulling a lever to operate points and signals and now DCC users can do pretty-much the same by touching a point or signal on a MIMIC diagram, much like those that have been in use in real signal boxes since the 1950s.

Ultimately, computer control of model railways, with or without touch-screen or physical hand-held controllers, will be the norm in the future. Other model railway manufacturers are taking up the challenge of providing computer control software for modellers. It is a very expensive and time-consuming challenge but it is undoubtedly the way of the future.

There is no doubt that setting up your locos and track plan on a computer control software package is more daunting than doing so on a DCC controller but then, this avoids you having to remember any DCC addresses in future whereas on a DCC controller you will always need to refer to crib sheets for your locos, points, signals

In the coming months we will delve into the RailMaster software and see how to set up your track plans, locos and even look at using Voice Control and phone and tablet apps to control your layout. We will also look at new developments such as the Select DCC controller interface and much-awaited Loco Detection system.

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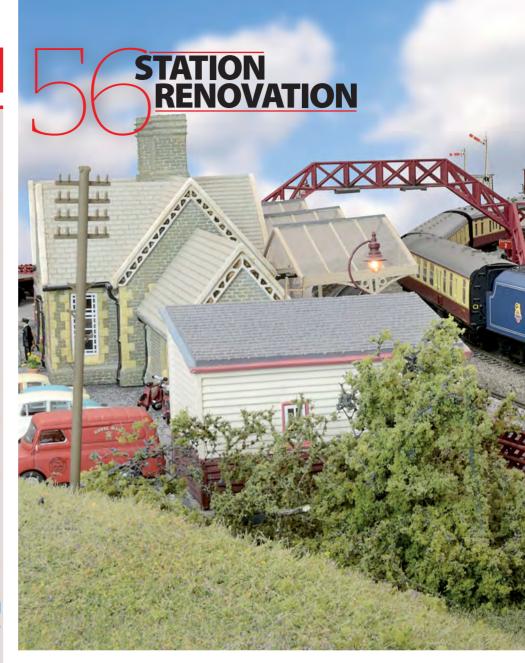

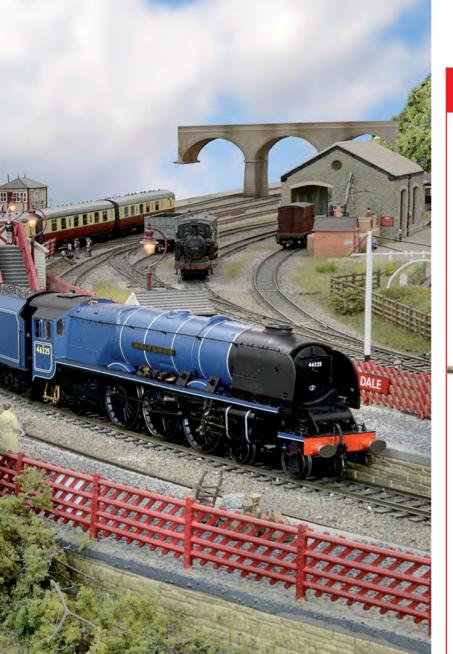

NOVEMBER passed in a flash with the build up to the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition and now we have entered the countdown to the launch of Hornby's 2019 catalogue in January.

This period of the year is the best for railway modellers. New announcements come thick and fast and I can't be the only one who has been able to add to my future shopping list in recent weeks.

The Warley show offered no less than five new locomotive model announcements across 'OO', 'O', 'N' and 'OO9' while the week preceeding the show also saw Hatton's Model Railways and Rails of Sheffield announce new ready-to-run projects in 'OO' and 'N'. You can read about all of these new projects in Update this issue, but there was one which really caught our eye - Accurascale's first 'OO' readyto-run locomotive, the Class 55 'Deltic'.

Accurascale has made an impressive

start in model railway circles with its high quality rolling stock models. Moreover it has a strong track record with its delivery timescales and we are eager to see it achieve the same with a locomotive.

The specification for the new 'Deltic' is impressive to say the least - almost as bold as the list of 17 locomotives which are planned for the first batch.

However, this issue has another star performer - Hornby's highly anticipated new 'OO' gauge model of the Maunsell 'Lord Nelson' 4-6-0. We were fortunate to get our hands on a production sample of this new Southern Railway express locomotive modelling 851 Sir Francis Drake in original condition carrying Southern Railway olive green.

This model has taken a little longer than expected to make it to the shops, but we can firmly say that the wait has been well worth it. Our sample of Sir Francis Drake was stunning in all respects and its performance was second to none as we put it through its paces on the Hornby Magazine office test track. You can read our full review on pages 74-77 and the 'Lord Nelson' class history on pages 78-81.

Naturally there is much to look forward to in this issue. We've brought together three inspirational model railways from three different eras, developed four step by step guides on subjects as diverse as basic locomotive detailing, scratch building, station renovations and digital sound as well as putting 10 different track rubbers to the test to find the best. Add to that the latest model reviews and an exclusive competition with Hornby and there is something for everyone in this issue.

Hornby shows DECORATED PRINC

HE FINAL DECORATED samples of Hornby's streamlined Stanier 'Princess Coronation' 4-6-2 have been received. The first of the all-new 'OO' gauge models was expected to arrive during December as Hornby Magazine

closed for press with the remaining models following in early 2019.

Three versions are being produced modelling 6229 *Duchess of Hamilton* and 6244 *King George VI* in LMS

lined crimson (Cat Nos. R3677 and R3639) together with 6221 *Queen Elizabeth* in LMS Caledonian lined blue (R3623). Prices are set at £189.99 per locomotive. The new model features a five pole motor, 8-pin DCC decoder socket, space for 28mm round speaker in the tender and a completely new tooling for the

4-6-2 at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition alongside the

4-6-2. Both are being produced by Heljan exclusively for Hatton's with release anticipated in 2019.

The latest full sample of the 'A4' was fully operational and in use on Hatton's test track during the Warley show. It is currently being evaluated for further amendments before progressing to the decoration stage.

Hatton's 'A3' and 'A4' models are priced at £750 with seven versions of the 'A3' and nine of the 'A4' planned for production.

Hatton's goes for 'Garratt' in 'N'

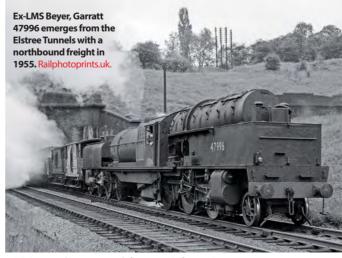
Hatton's Model Railways has revealed that it is working on an 'N' gauge model of the highly sought after LMS Beyer, Garratt 2-6-0+0-6-2 for release in 2020.

These imposing articulated locomotives were designed to replace double heading on coal trains between the Midland coalfields and London while saving on the costs of fuel, crews and maintenance. In total 33 were built for the LMS by Beyer, Peacock in Manchester with the first entering service in 1927. The last was withdrawn in 1958 after introduction of the BR'9F' 2-10-0s.

Hatton's new'N' gauge model will cost £199 and is to incorporate a five-pole motor, Next18 Digital

Command Control decoder socket, a die-cast chassis, detailed cab and NEM coupling pockets. It will only model locomotives after conversion to feature rocking bunkers with a choice of LMS, British Railways and BR early crest black liveries planned.

Eight versions are planned for release modelling 4994 and 7983 in LMS black (Cat Nos. H2-BG-001 and H2-BG-002), 47967 in British Railways lettered black (H2-BG-003), 47972 in BR black with LMS lettering and block-style numbers (H2-BG-004), 47995 in BR black with cab side numbers and plain tanks (H2-BG-005) plus 47996, 47981 and 47992 in BR black with early crests (H2-BG-006, H2-BG-007 and H2-BG-008).

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Bachmann reveals... 'N' GAUGE STANIER'8F' DMK2FEPSAMPLES



IRST engineering prototype (EP) samples of Bachmann's Graham Farish 'N' gauge Stanier'8F'2-8-0 and BR Mk 2f carriages were displayed on the manufacturer's stand at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition.

The '8F' sample displayed separately fitted detail parts including metal buffers, handrails, safety valves, fine metal coupling rods, valve gear and a snowplough, while the specification also calls for a Next18 DCC decoder socket and coreless motor.

Three models are planned as Stanier'8F'8035 in LMS black (Cat No. 372-161), 48608 in BR black with early crests (372-162) and 48773 in BR black with late crests and factoryfitted digital sound (372-163DS). Bachmann's 'N' gauge BR Mk 2f carriages follow their 'OO' gauge counterparts with five variants being tooled as Tourist Open Standards (TSO), Open Firsts (FO), Restaurant First Buffets (RFB), Brake Open Standards (BSO) and Driving Brake Open Standards (DBSO). Liveries include BR blue/

grey and InterCity colours for the TSO, FO, BSO and RFBs, while the DBSOs will be available in BR blue/ grey and ScotRail colour schemes.

Prices are set at £42.95 each for the TSO, FO, BSO and RFBs and £44.95 for the DBSOs. A delivery date has yet to be confirmed.

Bachmann'159' breaks cover



Bachmann displayed the latest engineering sample of its forthcoming 'OO' gauge Class 159 three-car Diesel Multiple Unit (DMU) at the Warley show. This

new model will incorporate a low profile mechanism, factory-fitted speakers, illuminated destination blinds, interior lighting, 21-pin DCC decoder socket and more.

Initially available as 159013 in BR Network SouthEast livery (Cat No. 31-520), prices are set at £309.95 per three-car unit. A delivery date has yet to be announced.

JNA-T bogie box wagons next for 'OO' from Revolution Trains

Revolution Trains has revealed its next'OO' gauge wagon project - MMA/JNA-T box wagons.

Since their introduction in 2016, these large bogie box wagons have become a regular sight across the country, with more than 500 examples in use on aggregates traffic including sand, stone and spoil. Liveries include DB Cargo, Ermewa/Tarmac, GBRf, Mendip Rail and VTG.

Revolution Trains' new 'OO' gauge model will replicate the prototypes catering for all four configurations with nine or 11 vertical strengthening ribs and with or without bodyside doors. The model's specification also includes a detailed underframe, RP25 wheels, bogies that can be easily converted to 'EM' or 'P4' standards, as well as variations between buffers, brake gear and end panels. End-of-train versions of the wagons will also be



working flashing tail lamp.

Three liveries are planned through Revolution Trains including MMA wagons in DB red with nine pillars and side door (OO-EAL-001A-D), JNA-T wagons in Ermewa grey with nine pillars and no side door (OO-EAL-002A-D), together with JNA-T wagons in Ermewa grey with Tarmac branding (OO-EAL-003A-D). In addition, Kernow Model Rail Centre is offering the JNA-T wagon with 11 pillars and no side door in VTG silver with Mendip Rail branding (OO-EAL-005A-D) and GBRf blue wagons with 11 pillars

and side door (OO-EAL-006A-D). A four-pack of JNA-T wagons in both liveries will also be available.

Revolution Trains models are priced at £41 each (with early-bird prices set at £37.50 each), while Kernow Model Rail Centre's models are priced at £49.99 each for standard models, £57.99 with working tail lamps and £199.99 for the four packs. Delivery is anticipated during the second quarter of 2019.

Revolution Trains unveils first 'N' gauge steam locomotive

Revolution Trains (RT) is to release its first 'N' gauge steam locomotive following the announcement of a Great Western Railway (GWR) '56XX' 0-6-2T at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition in November.

Designed by Collett, 200 of the 0-6-2Ts were built between 1924 and 1928, originally intended for use in South Wales although they were utilised throughout GWR territory. They remained in service with BR Western Region until withdrawal in 1965.

Revolution Trains' '56XX' 0-6-2T will be produced in conjunction with Sonic Models, which developed the new 'N' gauge VEA



box van and is not being crowdfunded. The '56XX' will be made available through model shops.

The specification includes original or later style driving wheel balance weights, Swindon or Armstrong safety valves, detailed cab interior, a coreless motor, 6-pin DCC decoder

socket, NEM coupling pockets and more. Liveries will include GWR green, BR green and BR black.

Priced at £90 each, delivery is expected towards the end of 2019.

Revolution Trains showed the latest and final engineering sample for its crowd-funded 'N' gauge Class 92 during the Warley show. The model is now moving to the decoration stage of the development process with release anticipated in 2019. Prices start from £135 with the order book due to close in the fourth quarter of 2018.

■ The EM Gauge Society (EMGS) has commissioned Peco to manufacture a new range of ready-to-lay 'EM' gauge wooden sleeper bullhead track. Utilising code 75 rail, the range will initially comprise 914mm lengths of plain flexible track together with B6 geometry left and right-hand turnouts. Sleeper length and spacing will be prototypical, while turnouts will feature live frogs and solid metal blades.

Available exclusively to members of the EMGS, prices are set at £5 per yard for plain track and £27 for turnouts with delivery of the former anticipated during December 2018 and the latter in Spring 2019.

IHREE new locomotives across three gauges were announced by Helian for the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition at the end of November.

Headlining the new announcements is an all-new 'OO' gauge model of the Class 86/0 Bo-Bo overhead electric in original condition alongside the Class 17 'Clayton' Bo-Bo diesel for 'O' gauge and Lynton and Barnstaple Railway Baldwin 2-4-2T for 'OO9' narrow gauge.

The Class 86/0 follows on from the manufacturer's 2010 released model of the later refurbished locomotives. It is to be retooled to model the fleet in as-built condition and will have a 21-pin decoder socket together with original pattern bogies and underframe equipment. CAD work is reported to be complete and the first engineering samples are expected with Heljan in early 2019.

Proposed liveries including BR electric blue with and without yellow panels, BR blue with white cab roof, standard BR blue and a weathered BR blue model. Delivery is expected in late 2019 with pricing to be confirmed.

In the larger scale, Heljan's new model of the Class 17 Bo-Bo twin-engine diesel for 'O' gauge

is expected to be released in late 2019 as well. The specification calls for twin motor bogies, LED lighting functions, etched grilles, DCC sound compatibility and provision for an ESU smoke unit.

Design work on the 7mm scale Class 17 is complete and the first engineering sample is expected to arrive in early 2019. Four liveries are planned covering BR green with small yellow warning

panels, BR green with full yellow ends, BR blue – all unnumbered - together with D8607 in BR green with small yellow warning panels and a weathered finish.

Completing its Warley trio is Baldwin 2-4-2T Lyn - Heljan's second Lynton and Barnstaple Railway tank engine for 'OO9'. It will model Lvn in a number of liveries including works black without numbers, L&B dark green and two versions of Southern Railway Maunsell green. Release is expected in 2020.

Heljan also updated delivery

timescales for its projects. In 'OO9'/'OO' next to arrive are the Manning Wardle L&B 2-6-2Ts in December/January followed by the latest batch of Class 33/0s in January and the next Class 35'Hymeks'in February. The second batch of Class 07s are due to arrive in March 2019. Heljan also confirmed that the 'OO' GWR AEC railcar is expected in 2020 while the Class 25/3 is in tooling.

In 'O' gauge the GWR '43XX' 2-6-0 is due to be released in January 2019 followed by the Class 37/4s in February 2019. The Class 50 is on target for August/September

2019 to be followed by the Class 03 in the autumn. The Class 117, 121 and 122 are all currently expected in late 2019/early 2020 while the new versions of the Class 33 are expected around the same time. The new Class 47s for 'O' are due in late 2019 while the GWR AEC railcar and Class 56 are both anticipated in 2020.

Heljan also released its first British outline catalogue for several years at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition.

Rails of Sheffield plans NER Autocar

Rails of Sheffield is working in association with Heljan to develop a ready-to-run'OO' gauge model of the pioneering North Eastern Railway (NER) petrol-electric Autocars which were built in 1903.

Two were built to a design by Vincent Raven and were the world's first passenger carrying railway vehicles to use an internal combustion engine. The two Autocars, 3170-3171, saw service between West Hartlepool and Hartlepool, Scarborough and Filey and latterly on the Selby to Cawood branch in Yorkshire and were withdrawn in 1930 and 1931.

The body of 3170 was converted to a holiday home but was found by carriage restoration specialist Stephen Middleton in the early 2000s. He bought the body in 2003 and it has since been restored over the last 15 years returning to full working order in October 2018

Rails new 'OO' gauge model is available to pre-order with the full price set at £199.95.

In a press release Rails of Sheffield stated: "Our 'OO' gauge models celebrate these historic vehicles. They will feature fine detail and a host of features for the collector and operator to enjoy."

The NER Autocar models are being designed and manufactured by Heljan with full support from Stephen Middleton and the 1903 Electric Autocar Trust. Three versions are planned modelling 3170 in NER red and cream (Cat No. RL3171), 3171 in NER red and cream (RL3172) and 3170 in LNER brown (RL3173). Release is anticipated in 2020.

ALL-NEW/ DELTIC/

CCURASCALE revealed its first British outline locomotive for 'OO' gauge at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition on the weekend of November 24/25 2018 at the NEC in Birmingham – the English Electric Class 55 'Deltic'.

The legendary fleet of 'Deltics', so called for their twin Deltic engines, were built by English Electric between 1961 and 1962 and were the most powerful single-unit

diesel locomotives in the world at the time developing 3,300hp and capable of sustained 100mph running. They served the East Coast Main Line until 1978 while the last were withdrawn from passenger service in December 1981.

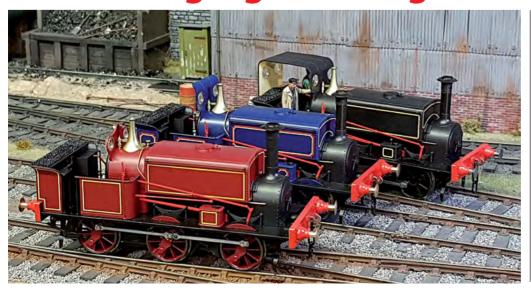
The 'Deltic' is Accurascale's first ready-to-run locomotive for the British market and it has been created with the support of the Deltic Preservation Society (DPS) at Barrow Hill. Both D9009 Alycidon and D9015 Tulyar were surveyed for the model in Spring 2018 and CAD design work is now complete with tooling underway. Release is planned for the fourth quarter of 2019 covering 17 different locomotives in a combination of BR green, BR blue and preservation era liveries. In addition, Accurascale has worked with German sound decoder manufacturer ESU and the DPS to create new sound recordings



for its Class 55 using 55019 Royal Highland Fusilier at the Spa Valley Railway. All locomotives will come with Shawplan nameplates and regimental crests included in the detailing packs where appropriate.

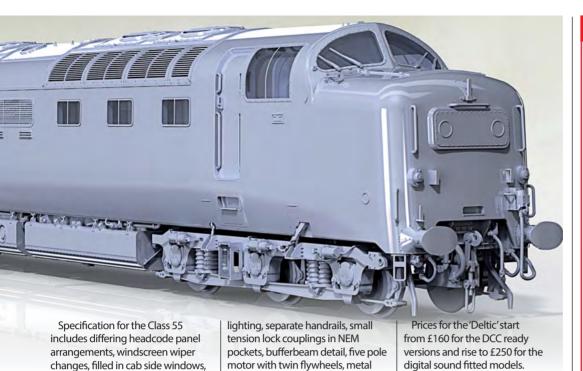

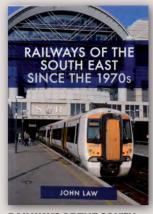

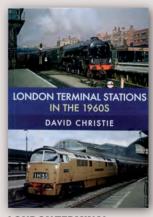

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Studes

Starting from a small Southern Region layout, CHRIS BONE explains how he developed and expanded his project to recreate the atmosphere of Devon and Cornwall's railways in the 1950s and 1960s in 'OO' and 'OO9' gauges.

N 2010 I demolished a Southern Region layout that had ceased to satisfy. I spent the next 12 months in thought and decided to start again by building a small layout that would enable me to experiment with finer track standards, up to date scenery techniques and potentially Digital Command Control (DCC). This layout was the catalyst that has, seven years later, become St Judes – a four-part sectional layout with a West Country flavour

named in remembrance of my late wife.

The line travels offstage from Exeter passing St Judes Harbour and St Judes Road before terminating at St Judes Bay. A narrow gauge line also terminates there. It once headed further into the hills but economics brought partial closure, conveniently leaving space for the Southern to install a turntable for its new Bulleid 'Pacifics'.

The main line influence is very much 1950s/1960s inspired whilst the narrow gauge is more open to interpretation, but

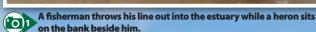
the whole satisfies me and reminds me of the part of England where I lay in my pram the year that the Southern Railway became the Southern Region of British Railways.

ST JUDES ROAD

This is the section that became the catalyst for the whole layout. It comprises two 4ft x 1ft sections, essentially MDF boxes that allow scenery to be formed above and below track level. A single track line exits a tunnel, crosses a viaduct then an

occupation bridge and passes St Judes Road signalbox where the track doubles before disappearing under a road bridge.

The track is SMP Scaleway and the points are Marcway operated by a Tortoise motor, all glued to cork sheet which in turn is glued to the MDF trackbed. Real granite ballast completes the picture.

The scenery is formed from plaster bandage over metal mesh and finished with acrylic paint, static grasses, sea moss, rubberised horsehair and suchlike. The structures are from Peco, Wills, Ratio and Kernow Model Rail Centre, all of which are weathered and blended into the surroundings. The signal is a Ratio kit built onto an old Hornby Dublo signal base, but it will soon be replaced by one of the excellent Dapol items and when available, a junction signal will be added from the same source.

Details include waterfowl in and around the stream below the viaduct, an MGA on the bridge over the stream – MGs being my other hobby – the signalman's free range hens and a Grey Cars OB coach en-route to Buckfast Abbey.

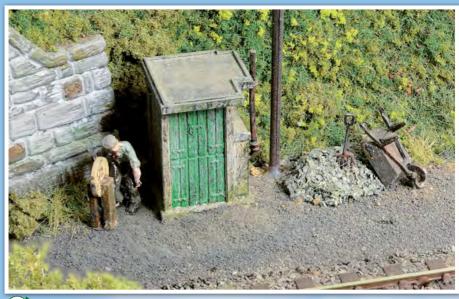


ST JUDES BAY

Fast-forward to the autumn of 2014 and a decision to ditch the cassettes, build a traverser yard for the tunnel end of the layout and a terminus at the other end. I had just 7ft length available and I did not want to alter the double track end of the St Judes Road section in any way. I also wanted to ensure that the layout remained transportable in sections should relocation be necessary in the future. Some creative thinking was needed.

I had seen a modular narrow gauge layout at exhibitions. I forget the name, but the layout was built up in sections, each built by individuals yet fully interchangeable. The beauty of the idea to my eyes was that trains passed through varying landscapes of around 4ft long, each of which gave the impression of standing by the lineside, so I decided that the new section, St Judes Bay, would scenically be a separate, yet complementary section with a North Cornwall feel to it.

The elements I wanted in the available space included a platform long enough to accommodate a 'West Country' 4-6-2 plus three coaches, a goods yard, engine shed and a siding to serve a Scenecraft warehouse bought at the Warley show some years earlier. The left-hand end would need to align with the double



The lineside features a number of cameo scenes including this fogman's hut and ballast pile.

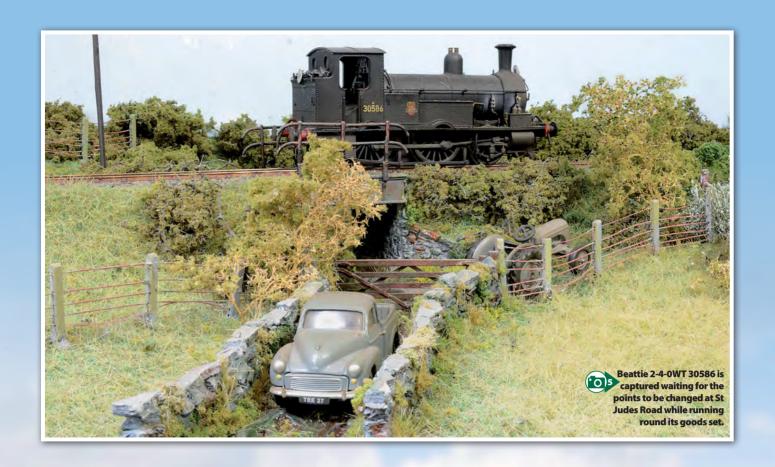
track section of St Judes Road.

To achieve all this, space was gained by aligning the platform road across the diagonal and the goods yard would be tiny, but the overall 'feel' seemed right so I built the baseboard and laid the track in the autumn of 2014 using

similar principles to St Judes Road. The only real constructional difference was the use of a 2in x 1in framework to support a 6mm plywood base.

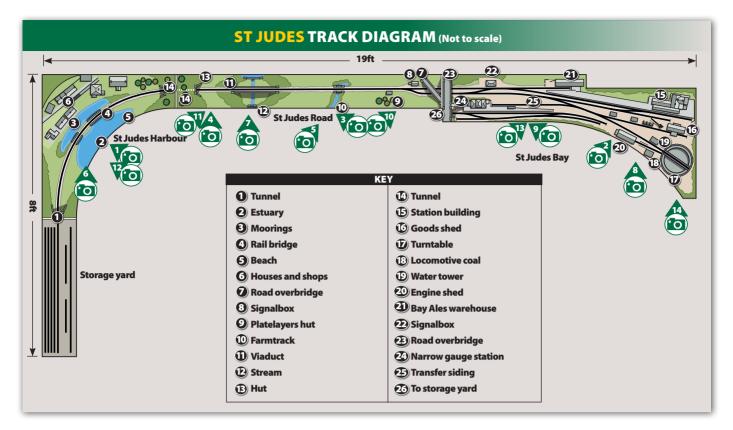
I chose Gaugemaster Prodigy Advance for the DCC operation of locomotives, points and signals. The ability to have >>>











several locomotives in the station area without the need for section switches was, and remains, an eye-opener to me.

North Cornwall style station buildings and goods shed were essential. Mine are constructed from card kits, but unfortunately, I have no record of the supplier's name but I have an idea that trading has ceased in recent years.

The basic scenic work was completed by the summer of 2015. Details include the Kernow Model Rail Centre signalbox, working platform lamps, London & South Western Railway style buffer stops from Mike's Models and custom station name signs. The warehouse is the headquarters of Bay Ales, seabirds abound, a few figures suggest activity and Ivo Peter's Bentley has migrated from the Somerset and Dorset.

This section, together with the construction of the traverser storage yard (using ideas from Richard Bardsley's book on the subject) totally transformed the play value of St Judes and made stock handling so much safer too. The only thing missing was the ability to turn tender locomotives, but more of that later.

ST JUDES HARBOUR

I have long admired the area around Cockwood Harbour where the old Great Western main line runs alongside the west shore of the Exe estuary. In the autumn of 2015 I visited by ferry from Exmouth to Torcross followed by the short walk to the pub at Cockwood for lunch. I concluded that I still had space in my railway room to model a representation of this waterside location if the storage yard was relocated further around my L-shaped room adjacent to my workbench. Once again this was to be a separate scenic section. It was to be located in the corner of the room, linking the tunnel end of St Judes Road »

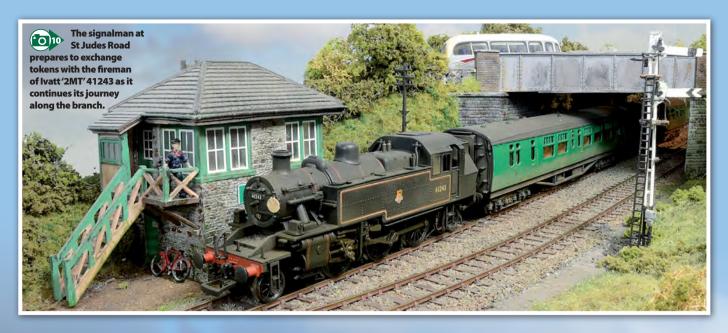

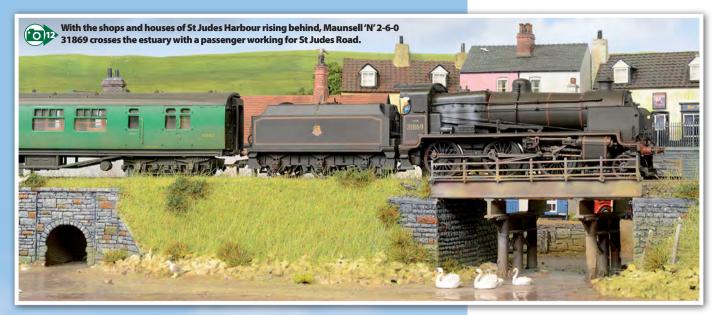
Below: On the narrow gauge line the 0-8-0T brings a rake of Peco Lynton and Barnstaple Railway carriages into the platform at the end of its journey.



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to the relocated off-scene staging yard.

Now this really is where the separate sections deceive the eye. The water level at St Judes Harbour is significantly higher than the stream below the viaduct. But because viewers only take in the sections, the improbability of the situation is not noticed.

St Judes Harbour is a fairly simple section. An open framework of 2in x 1in supports a raised trackbed on a nominally 2ft radius curve. A steel bridge and a culvert over the water mimic similar structures at Cockwood, as does the embankment. The representation of moorings is formed from moulded stonework, small sections of wood and fine chain from a necklace which yielded a lot of chain for a bargain price.

The cottages and other structures that sit behind the harbour are resin buildings that I have modified and toned down. Details on this section include lots of seabirds, The Otter pub – serving Bay Ales of course – a young man with his lady friend alongside an MG TD. By the Autumn 2016 I thought I'd expanded the layout as much as space permitted, but lateral thinking was to intervene once more.

NARROW GAUGE

In autumn 2017 I decided I could modify St Judes Bay to accommodate a turntable. I also reckoned that my interest in narrow gauge — especially the Lynton & Barnstaple (L&B) — could be catered for if I increased the width of each section by a few inches.

A new point was inserted into the existing trackwork to lead to a turntable which in turn would have a line off it to allow the engine shed to be relocated.

A narrow gauge line would be laid on the widened baseboard, passing under an L&B based bridge before entering a small station with a loop and locomotive servicing facility.

Having wondered what to do with the old engine shed line, I realised that this could become a transfer siding adjacent to the narrow gauge platform. To achieve this I laid the narrow gauge formation 20mm higher than the standard gauge line, filling the divide with a platform surface.

The narrow gauge lines and points are





Peco, glued and ballasted as per the main lines. This time I used Cobalt IP Digital point motors - they are so easy to wire and programme, as are the Dapol/Train-Tech signal modules. Whilst on the subject of electronics I should mention that the main line turntable is from Peco, motorised with a kit from Locomotech.

Scenically the extension is gently blended into the pre-existing areas of St Judes Bay. The station building is the delightful Scenecraft model based on Woody Bay and Lynton on the L&B. I've weathered the building and replaced the chimney pots with more authentic items from Narrow Planet. The bridge mentioned earlier is an excellent resin casting, one of many similar items available on eBay suitable for modelling Lynton and Barnstaple Railway narrow gauge structures.

ROLLING STOCK

I've been collecting Southern Railway/ Southern Region locomotives, coaches and wagons for around 20 years, many of which are in display cases in my railway room.

Classes of locomotive in use on the layout were converted to DCC, mostly by myself and some with sound, and currently include a 'West Country' 4-6-2, 'N' 2-6-0, 'T9' 4-4-0, 'O2' 0-4-4T, 'M7' 0-4-4T, BR '2MT' and '3MT' 2-6-2Ts, Adams 'Radial' 4-4-2T, '0298' 2-4-0WT, Class 22 diesel, '14XX' 0-4-2T, 'Small Prairie' 2-6-2T and a S&D '7F' 2-8-0 which looks great on the viaduct.

The tiny yet powerful narrow gauge locomotive is a Minitrains 0-8-0T converted to DCC and fitted with working British style lamps by myself – a rather fiddly task to say the least! I

used etched plates from Narrow Planet to name her after my partner Elaine – who has also become a fan of the L&B.

On pre-order are a Bachmann 'Mogul' together with narrow gauge locomotives from Bachmann and Heljan – the bug has bitten!

All stock is lightly weathered by me and maintenance is aided by the inclusion of rolling road and programming tracks on the storage yard board.

Like many other modellers I derive much pleasure from the construction and detailing of the layout. What started as an 8ft long track across a viaduct has become an interesting layout to operate — and will become more so once the narrow gauge is extended around to the main storage yard. I'm 70 now and I will hopefully continue to enjoy the layout (and my MG) for many years to come.



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HE RAILWAYS of the 1990s were
a colourful place and a number of
unique colour schemes were applied
to locomotives including a trio of
Class 90 overhead electrics in association with
a Freight Connection exhibition at the National
Exhibition Centre in Birmingham in 1992.

Class 90s 90128, 90129 and 90130 were specially repainted in the colours of the Belgian State Railways (SNCB), German Railways (DB) and French Railways (SNCF) respectively to take part in a special film which was used in the event. All three were named Freight Connection in their respective languages and continued in service into the early 2000s carrying these unique liveries.

For our new West Coast Main Line (WCML) theme layout (HM138/HM Yearbook No. 11) we wanted to add a couple of Class 90s to the roster, but the Bachmann model is a few months away and no model of the northern section of the WCML can be without these 1989 introduced Bo-Bo electrics. The layout's

debut at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition in November meant we really needed at least one Hornby Class 90 in service.

A chance purchase of a second-hand model of 90128 *Vrachtverbinding* in SNCB blue and yellow – a model I long wanted to add to my collection – started me thinking about the possibilities of improving a few points of detail while also giving it a new lease of life. This included a chassis swap with a more recent DCC ready Hornby Class 90 to make adding a decoder for operation on West Coast Cement simpler.

The chassis swap was as simple as you could

hope for – undo the central screw, unclip the body, disconnect the wires from the pantograph and then reverse the process with the addition of a Hatton's DCR-8-pin harness decoder to take control of the motor. A running session or two later and we had the model running as we wanted it to, but it lacked finesse at the front end, especially with the split in the lower valance, while the pantograph also left a little to be desired as it was somewhat over-engineered for our needs.

There are some high quality detailing kits available for the Hornby Class 90, but we weren't looking for a wholesale reworking of the model – more a simple project which could be achieved in a short timescale on a low budget and without the need for major repainting.

Step forward Mark Chivers and his research skills which pointed us towards Pegasus Designs' page on the Shapeways 3D printing website. This designer has created a number of detail parts for the Hornby Class 90 including front valances for freight and passenger locomotives – the latter with rubbing plates which could be used to enhance the latest Hornby RailRoad Class 90 using the same methods outlined here. These would be perfect for replacing the factory design. They also offer buffers, air pipes, an underframe section and a dummy pantograph for those who want to go further.

We opted just to use the freight locomotive front fairing for this project as we discovered that Hornby's pantograph for the Class 92 – available as a spare part – to be a direct replacement for the original metal Class 90 design while we used a spare set of air pipes and dummy screw coupling from a Hornby Class 56 accessory pack to finish off the bufferbeam. At the rear of the locomotive it was a simple case of cutting off the lower fairings and then replacing them with sections of 2mm thick plasticard cut and filed to shape to allow the coupling full movement.

The finishing touches were a light weathering of the underframe and roof using Lifecolor Frame Dirt for the lower areas and Lifecolor Liquid Pigments Smoke and remover for the roof to tone down the factory finish, though we noted that the real locomotive was generally kept in clean external condition.

The finished model of 90128 will never better what the new Bachmann Class 90 for 'OO' gauge has to offer, but for less than £15 we've been able to inject new life into this near 30-year-old model of the West Coast Main Line workhorse,

STEP BY STEP

UPGRADING A HORNBY CLASS 90 FOR '00' GAUGE







Four plastic lugs then hold the body and chassis together which dip in underneath the cab doors. Ease the body away from the chassis on each side until the lugs disengage and then lift the body dear taking care not to snag the internal wiring.







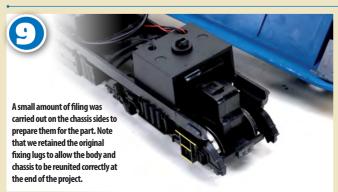
Brutal it might look, but we used side cutters to chop away the front section of the chassis. This stops any unwanted dust or debris resulting from other cutting methods from entering the mechanism. Plus it was very quick!







The bogie moulding was then tidied up with a craft knife and a file once the sideframes had been removed from the motor bogie – they just unclip and dip back into place.





We then test fitted the new front valance under the cab front and refitted the chassis to check that we could still refit and remove it with the new part in position.







Lifecolor Matt Black (LCO2) applied to both sides of the new valance blends it in to the original chassis colour.





To finish off the valance, air pipes and a dummy screw coupling from a Hornby Class 56 accessory pack were glued in place in the provided holes. Handily these parts are pre-painted too.



TIP

Keep the spare pipes and couplings from locomotive accessory packs as there will be always be a future use for them. This Class 90 benefitted from a set of spare Class 56 air pipes on the bufferbeam.



Now we could move on to the pantograph.

Three circular dips secure the original metal pantograph in place. These are difficult to remove – we used a combination of a small flat blade screwdriver and a pair of small sharp scissors to bend them up and then cut one side so that the dips would fall off.



Once the clips are off, the original pantograph can be pushed off from the inside then carefully pulled away. Don't be tempted to lever it off from above as you are likely to damage the plastic body.

The new pantograph was then glued in position just below the height of the catenary wires – from experience we know that plastic pantographs don't take well to running against catenary wires.

The finishing touch – Shawplan etched metal Vrachtverbinding nameplates for each side of the locomotive fixed in place with a tiny amount of super glue.



Clean track is essential when operating a model railway, and without it comes the frustration of poor operation.

MARK CHIVERS

surveys a range of readily available track rubbers in our latest Hornby Magazine Equipment Guide and highlights our pick. IRTY OR TARNISHED rails can lead to poor electrical contact between the track and locomotive, which can result in stuttering or jerky movements on a layout. As with the full-size railway (albeit for different reasons), to overcome this a regular regime of track maintenance is necessary which involves cleaning all the rails. There are many methods for cleaning the track from liquids to track cleaning wagons and the long-standing track rubber.

Track rubbers remain an effective option when planning to clean the rails as they are quick to use and available in



many shapes and forms, from simple eraser-style examples to larger rubber compound blocks designed to provide just the right amount of resistance to aid the cleaning and polishing process.

When cleaning the rails, you should be aiming to polish them, not scratch them. Some track cleaning methods can be more abrasive than others, so it is important not to damage the railhead unnecessarily otherwise it may attract more dirt (or even rust in the case of steel rails) and be less reliable in the longer term. Some track rubbers will also inevitably leave a residue on the rails which will need to

be wiped away before running can commence. This can be done by wiping a small piece of cloth on the end of a finger along the rails, being careful not to dislodge small lineside details in the process. The extent of the residue depends on the formulation of the track rubber – some simply degrade quicker than others.

The following selection of track rubber products is certainly not exhaustive, but aims to offer a cross-section of what's available for 'N', 'OO9', 'OO' and 'O' gauge use, from basic track rubbers to an extensive track cleaning kit with different grade track rubbers and polishing heads.



Bachmann Modelmaker track cleaner block



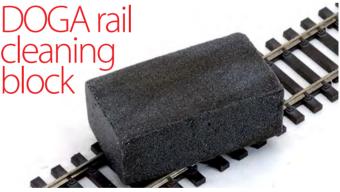
Bachmann's recently introduced Modelmaker range of modelling tools includes this 80mm x 49mm x 20mm rubberised track cleaning block (Cat No. MM012).

Dark grey in colour and odourless, its formulation includes fine particles of grit making it feel a little grainy to the touch. Given its size, the block should last for quite some time, although our tests showed that it did tend to shed small fragments which ended up

between the sleepers during the cleaning process. This was more evident if you apply a little more pressure on the rubber to polish up any discolouration on the rails. In terms of overall cleaning though, it proved effective and any fragments that were shed didn't appear to stick to the rails.

Bachmann's Modelmaker track cleaning block is up to the job and it made light work of clearing our rail heads.

Amongst the Double O Gauge Association's (DOGA) range of modelling tools is this 44mm x 27.5mm x 20mm track cleaning block.

Available from the DOGA online and at its demonstration stand at exhibitions, this grey rubberised gritty block aims to de-grease and polish the rails with minimum residue.

During the test, our sample

cleaned and polished the rail heads quickly and effortlessly, with just a few fragments from the block evident between the rails. A gentle rub of the block between finger and thumb also resulted in some granular residue being deposited in the hand.

As with similar products, the rubber had a faint odour, but it proved capable of cleaning the rails and costs just £4.80.

This simple to use track cleaning rubber (Cat No. R8087) has been in Hornby's range for some time now and differs from its rivals in that it is rhomboid in shape, which adds to its ease of use when cleaning rails as it can simply be skewed at an angle without accidentally coming into contact with the sleepers or lineside details.

Finished in light grey and measuring 52mm x 25mm x 5mm, Hornby's track rubber closely resembles a standard pencil eraser, but its formulation results in a firmer shape and less potential fragmentation.

During our tests, this track rubber appeared to leave very little residue on the rails or sleepers after a cleaning regime and polished the rails well.

It's not too abrasive, and while particles were evident when rubbing the block between finger and thumb, this was markedly less than some other brands. In terms of any odour, this particular track rubber has a faint smell to it, akin to a normal eraser. Hornby's track rubber has been the rail cleaner of choice for *Hornby* Magazine's exhibition layout use, demonstrating excellent cleaning abilities with little in the way of residue left behind.

DCC Concepts Jumbo track cleaner

DCC Concepts' range of modelling tools includes this large 77mm x 49mm x 20mm track rubber (Cat No. DCT-TBT).

Formulated from a pure rubber compound with aluminium oxide, it is a rusty brown colour and given its size is suitable for 'N', 'OO9', 'OO', 'O' and more. It sits comfortably in the hand and the manufacturer suggests the rubber compound can even be washed if required.

During our tests, DCC Concepts' track cleaner proved exemplary in terms of polishing up the rails. Dirty and discoloured rails were quickly transformed, and we even tried it on a section of outdoor 'O' gauge track which it polished up following just a few gentle wipes over the rails.

Interestingly, the soft, flexible nature of the compound on our sample resulted in some degradation of the rubber block, especially during rigorous track cleaning and some of the residue did appear to stick to the rails, requiring a wipe over with a cloth to remove any particles. It also seemed to lose its shape quicker than some other examples, with



grooves from the rails appearing on our example after a short period.

That said, this is an excellent track cleaner with impressive rail head polishing credentials (even outdoors) and given its size, is also suited to larger scale track cleaning too.

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Fleischmann track rubber

Fleischmann's range of model railway products includes this dark grey track rubber block (Cat No. 6595), measuring 50mm x 39mm x 20mm.

Initially this product felt quite gritty to the touch and demonstrated a tendency to crumble quite easily - the plastic packaging on our sample featured some fine loose particles even before it was opened. Further

tests suggested that it will crumble between fingers quite easily, although the residue didn't appear to stick to the rail heads. However, it was noticeable that when holding the block, the fine grit gathered in

the hand. Our sample of this track rubber also had a faint odour to it.

Again, the cleaning ability of the Fleischmann track cleaning block was good, and it did what it set out to do, with bright rail heads resulting from a few passes.

Certainly effective, but given the price there are better value options available.







Gaugemaster's extensive range of model railway accessories and tools includes this 48mm x 25mm x 18mm track rubber (Cat No. GM26), together with a larger 70mm x 55mm x 20mm (GM27) version.

This particular track cleaner comes as a rubberised block formulated with grit particles and certainly felt slightly gritty to the touch.

During our tests, Gaugemaster's track rubber polished up the rails quickly although some particles did come away from

the block while in use, including some larger fragments. Some of these particles also appeared to stick to the rails, necessitating a quick wipe over with a cloth to complete the cleaning process. Our standard sized sample also crumbled slightly when rubbed between finger and thumb.

Overall, this track rubber proved odourless and has good cleaning abilities, but our sample did appear to fragment more than some other examples.

Peco's distinctive blue track rubber (Cat No. PL-41) has been a popular choice for many modellers through the years and remains a firm favourite amongst the wide variety of track rubbers now available.

Supplied in a clear plastic box, the 51mm x 25mm x 11mm rail cleaner is made from a specially formulated blue rubberised material impregnated with fine grit to aid the rail cleaning process. To the touch, this product feels more rubbery than gritty and its composition is firm and didn't crumble.

Our sample was put to the test on a discoloured length of rail and quickly polished up the rails without too much pressure needing to be exerted on the rubber. Close inspection revealed a small amount of residue on the sleepers following the clean-up, but these didn't appear to stick to the rails. As with other similar rail cleaners, a quick wipe over the rails with a cloth is all that is required to ensure any debris is removed.

Peco's rail cleaner should last for a long time before wearing away.

Rub Away abrasive rubber cleaning block

Whilst this is not specifically aimed at railway modellers, this Rub Away rubber cleaning block (Cat No. #100) appeared on our radar during an internet search for potential products to include within this Equipment Guide so we thought we would give it a go for its price point alone.

Measuring 65mm x 21mm x 8mm, the blue rubber block is lightweight, flexible, gritty and felt quite abrasive. Appearing much more like a normal eraser, this product

also had a noticeable odour too During our test, the rubber block maintained its integrity with much less residue evident than some other products we trialled. Also, whilst rubbing the cleaning block between thumb and forefinger did create slight disintegration, though less than some others in our test.

Overall, it cleaned the rails well, but its more abrasive nature also scratched the rail heads in places.

Woodland Scenics'Tidy Track system of modelling accessories and tools includes this handy Rail Pal track cleaner (Cat No. TT4575).

Rail Pal is a flexible double-sided track cleaning block, which has been designed to remove stubborn rail deposits such as overspill of paint or glue, as well as the more usual rail dirt and discolouration.

Measuring 80mm x 30mm x 5mm, Rail Pal is formed from a rubberised compound impregnated with fine grit which helps clean the rails. One side is dark grey and intended for removing heavier deposits, while the other is light grey and suitable for regular cleaning tasks. The manufacturer also claims that the darker side can smooth rough spots on rails.

During our tests the track rubber remained intact throughout and showed little sign of wear. Our won't crumble and when it does eventually begin to wear, the worn section can be cut away. Dirt can also be washed away from the smooth surfaces, while there appeared to be very little odour to the compound. It also made swift work of cleaning

More of a track cleaning kit rather than a specific track rubber, Woodland Scenics' Rail Tracker (Cat No. TT4550) follows the same principles in that there is a selection of rubberised track maintenance pads, together with sets of cleaning pads and finishing pads to remove any debris left by the initial cleaning process.

Handily, the kit also comes with a manoeuvrable handle enabling the track rubber to be used in hard to access areas and reduces potential damage to lineside scenic details.

The rail head section of the tool holds two pads at a time which can be fixed in position or left to swivel. Each of the rescue and maintenance rubber pads are double-sided with

one side grooved to enable the tool to follow the rails, while the other is smooth, and are a push-fit onto the rail tracker tool. The grooved pads are designed for 'OO' and 'N' gauge track – to change the gauge you simply rotate the pad through 90°. The tool can be connected to the handle for easier cleaning or held between finger and thumb and used in the traditional way.

The dark grey rescue pads are designed for cleaning heavy

deposits from the rails, while the light grey rubber pads are intended for routine cleaning – similar to the Rail Pal. Two further sets of felt pads are also supplied – dark coloured examples for use with the supplied cleaning solution to help clean-up any remaining residue and dust, while the white felt pads are for drying the rails and giving the final wipe over.

During our tests, Rail Tracker proved a capable and effective tool, with very little residue evident on the rails following the initial clean. A very useful kit providing a complete track cleaning solution.

IN STYRENE

OODS WAGONS ARE surprisingly easy to build from scratch using nothing more sophisticated than styrene sheet and strip – especially if you take advantage of the

many different types of plastic underframe kit which are available. Most freight stock is basically a box on wheels, sometimes with a roof, sometimes without. Making the bodyshell generally involves cutting out a series of matching rectangular shapes using a sharp blade and a straight edge and then joining them

together. Vehicles with plain (plywood or steel) sides and ends are fairly simple, while scribing plank lines isn't exactly hi-tech modelling.

Many of the details – strapping, reinforcements, operating gear – can be made from pre-cut styrene strip or rod of the required thickness.

Very few specialist tools are involved. For the most part you can get by with much the same toolkit you'd use to build an Airfix Spitfire, and it won't cost you more than a few pounds in total. To fix things together I use ordinary solvents readily available from model shops and online suppliers. The only skills required are a steady hand, care, attention to detail and of course patience.

- what's involved, what to use and how to go about it. Using ordinary hand tools and simple techniques, it may be easier than you might think.

BUILDING

So why do I scratch build items of rolling stock? Mostly it's because I've been doing it for well over 50 years and I thoroughly enjoy it. More prosaically, it's because – even now – there are many wagon types that aren't and maybe never will be offered in ready-to-run or kit form. Paradoxically, the amount of published information on goods stock that's now available is at an all-time high, which greatly simplifies the research aspect. Some of the vehicles I've made by hand have subsequently become available over the counter – an agonisingly complicated set of Covhops comes to mind, along with various obscure 16ton minerals – but

even a scratchbuilding enthusiast like myself isn't going to attempt something as challenging as a full rake of 15 JJA Autoballasters when the exquisite Bachmann version is available.

For this article I chose two different types of BR 12ton Palbrick wagon – two Palbrick As and three Palbrick Cs – as a demonstration of how it's done. You might like to compare the methods and materials used with the Palbrick B built from an etched kit that I described in HM135. Hopefully you'll realise that, even with wagons far more complicated than these, the essential skills of scratchbuilding in styrene aren't at all difficult to acquire.

This is the basic toolkit I use for scratch building projects. The soft brush is there to get rid of all the shavings and tiny offcuts of styrene that inevitably accumulate as work progresses. I have some lovely needle files for sheet metal but with plastic I prefer to use cheap disposable emery boards.





different strip sizes in stock too. The ones I use most (US imperial sizes) are 0.010 x 0.100 and 0.010 x 0.080 strip, 0.040 and 0.060 square and 0.040 rod. Evergreen is my brand of choice which is readily available from UK model retailers.



These are the solvents I use when working with styrene. Humbrol Liquid Poly is pretty aggressive and I use it primarily for heavy-duty structural work, where I want parts to stick together and stay stuck. Be careful it basically welds the parts together and will really mess up a surface if you accidentally spill some. Limonene is gentler but still very strong and I use it for smaller components. It has a useful delayed-action quality, starting to take effect after ten seconds or so which gives you time to make adjustments before a permanent hond is made.





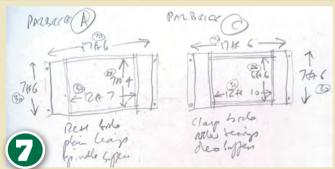


The guillotine-like 'Chopper' by North West Short Lines uses safety-razor blades and is very good for cutting consistent lengths of styrene strip up to 30 thou thick. The guides help with positioning and also enable you to cut at various angles - 30°, 45°, 60° and 90°. It's one of the few tools I own that's specifically geared towards model making with styrene.

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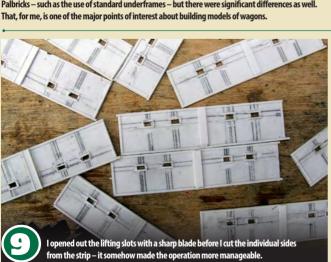


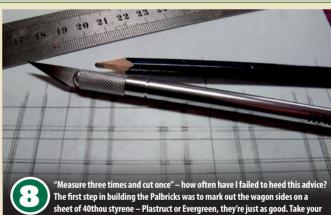




A reliable scale drawing or dimensioned sketch is essential to check measurements. To get the basic facts I used information in *An Illustrated History of BR Wagons* and combined this with what I'd learned from building Ian Macdonald's etched kit of a Palbrick B. There were many common features among the Palbricks – such as the use of standard underframes – but there were significant differences as well.

That, for me, is one of the major points of interest about building models of wagons.

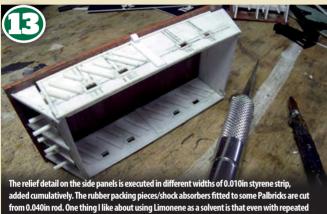

The basic bodyshells, minimally detailed at this stage. A Palbrick is a simple four-sided box apart from the triangular pieces that buttress the ends. The base is from a Parkside Models 10ft wagon chassis kit.

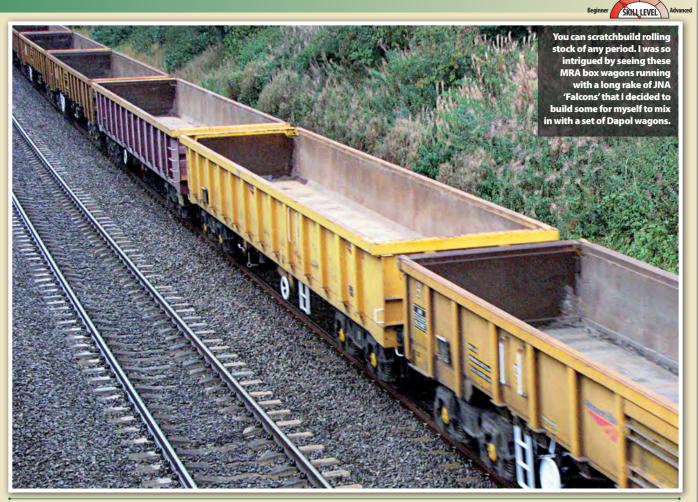
Turning to the underframe, for which I'm using Red Panda and Parkside/Peco kits: there's nothing more important than making sure the sideframes are square and true. I fix one sideframe first and allow it to set thoroughly, allowing at least 12 hours for this key stage. Sometimes it may be a plan to have them inclined slightly inwards but they should never splay outwards.







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Blue Island State of the later at the state

N HM138 there was a most interesting feature, *British Railways' Blue Period*. The author highlights the unusual experimental livery on Bulleid 'Merchant Navy' 4-6-2 35024 *East Asiatic Company*.

He describes the date of application of the purple-blue livery as February 1949, when it emerged from Eastleigh with three horizontal red stripes. There is additional information, as it also had blue wheels and no black splash skirt. This did not meet approval and the locomotive was back in the Works on March 2 1949 when the red lines were replaced by just two black and white horizontal lines, which became standard for the

rest of the blue-painted class. In late April 1949 it re-entered Eastleigh for the wheels and skirt to be painted black. (A.J. Fry, Bulleid Power, the Merchant Navy Class). However, Fry also claims that the blue was 'standard blue' from the outset and therefore not purple-blue.

However, D.L. Bradley in Locomotives of the Southern Railway, agrees with the feature in HM138, stating that the standard blue was not applied to 35024 until October 1950 but agrees with the Fry dates otherwise; the original yellow cabside numbers were painted a straw colour during the March 1949 repaint. Clearly, the paint colours and dates for this



locomotive are a bit of a minefield. The feature also says that only two 'Merchants' didn't receive blue, but my references show that three weren't painted blue. It also appears that 35024 only had standard blue with black/white lining, from

October 1950 to June 1951. It is a shame that Hornby will make a model that will only be historically correct for just nine months -35027 *Port Line*, for example, was blue for three and a half years.

HEADBOARD ENHANCEMENTS

I am enclosing a photograph of my recent purchases - no, not the engines but the headboards. I don't usually put add-ons to my locomotives other than those supplied by the manufacturers but decided this would be the exception and purchased the two Fox Transfers' examples shown.

It was then only a matter of deciding which locomotives to choose but decided to follow Fox Transfers suggestion to use a small piece of Blu-Tack initially and they do look good, even if I say so myself.

The engines I have initially decided upon are included in two of Hornby's train packs. The engine on the right carrying the 'Brave Soldier' headboard

is Gresley 'B17/4' 4-6-0 61664 Liverpool from one of Hornby's Great British train packs and the one on the left is Stanier 'Black Five' 4-6-0 44932 from my West Coast Railways Pullman train pack.

When I was reading the sales list from Fox Transfers I found that the, the 'Lakes Express' headboard - one of the two types available - was used on the Euston-Windermere-Workington route and as Workington is where I live now I have ordered two. The train pack came with three coaches, but I was able to purchase Hornby's R4455 West Coast Coach pack a year or so later and can have two 'Lakes Expresses'.

Whether or not these locomotives ran on this route I don't know



and apologise to the purists out there. I have always run my trains for my own pleasure and that of my children and grandchildren. I mix rolling stock and locomotives from not only the 'Big Four' but also America and Europe.

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Greetland 'box in close up

Imagine my surprise when I picked up my magazine and saw Greetland signalbox on the cover. I knew the structure well and although the kit is only based on it, recognised it right away. These photographs of the real thing were taken on a maintenance visit during its final months. By then the 'box was only opened once a month and although it was in quite a remote location it had been visited by graffiti vandals.

In the first picture you can see there is a door below the stairs which was the toilet. There is some lighting conduit leading to lights over each door which could easily be made from brass wire.

In the second photograph the door under the signalbox is open but you can see there are hazard



signs showing which safety gear must be worn whilst in there, as the room contains electrical equipment batteries and low headroom, another detail that can easily be added to give that finishing touch to a fine model.

The track at the far end of the signalbox led into a small oil depot



which had regular deliveries. It was after they ceased due to them changing to road transport that the building became redundant. Today there is a regular passenger service past the site between Halifax and Brighouse.

More information on running lines

The answer given to Ed Young (HM138) is only true for the lines out of Paddington as far as Foxhall Junction, just west of Didcot. They were known as the Main and Relief Lines rather than Fast and Slow. This was a Great Western Railway tradition continued by the BR Western Region, and also used by some other railway companies.

West of Foxhall Junction the main lines were in the centre, with Down and Up Goods Running Loops running adjacent to their respective main lines as far as Steventon, where the Goods loops ended/started. At Wantage Road station there was the commencement of relief lines running adjacent to their respective main lines until west of Challow, when it reverted to just the main lines again. There were loops at various points from there to Swindon.

This complex arrangement of tracks is described in some detail by Adrian Vaughan's books Signalman's Twilight and The Heart of the Great Western for those who want further information.

Other railway companies chose to pair lines according to their circumstances - for example,

the Midland Railway's London Extension built 150 years ago only had one pair of lines to start with due to financial constraints. In the 1890s when traffic had grown and they could afford to extend to four tracks they did so; the original pair of lines became the 'Passenger' lines north of St Albans City station and the 'Fast' lines from thereon into London. The new lines were the 'Slow' lines south from St Albans to cater both for freight and commuter services, and the 'Goods' lines north of St Albans. Various changes took place over the years, but it wasn't until 1960 (when Diesel Multiple Units were introduced) that the goods lines north of Harpenden became the existing 'Slow' lines all the way to and from Bedford.

The East Coast Main Line went in for lines paired by direction as this allowed easier merging and separation of local, goods and express services each side of the two-track Welwyn viaduct in Hertfordshire.

So, if modelling a location (even an imaginary one) on an actual railway it pays to have a look at the history of the line around the area.

FROG SWITCHING WORKS

I read your article on frog switching with interest as I've experienced loss of power due to poor contact of the moving rail against the stock rail. I have found that by using Autofrog or Hex Frog Juicers all I have had to do is connect a dropper to the frog, and that's it - no modifications and a very simple upgrade to existing points. If you completely modify the

point, which of course works, you lose the electrical protection if you run a train against a point set the wrong way as the train will now carry on and derail - my way the train just stops.

I laid my points with a dropper ready for any problems and I'm up to about 41 points so would not like to lift them.

WESTERN TRACK TERMINOLOGY

In partial response to Ed Young's query in the December 2018 Issue of *Hornby Magazine* entitled 'Which tracks are Up and Down?' I would like to offer the following.

The Western Region does not have 'fast' and 'slow' lines, instead it has 'Main' and 'Relief' lines respectively. In fact, as one Great Western Railway (GWR) expert put it to me, GWR relief lines can't be termed 'slow' as trains still run quite fast on them. Today's top speed is 100mph on the Reliefs in some areas, with the Mains having a maximum speed of 125mph in most areas.

As pointed out in HM138, these lines were paired, so if you were stood on a four-track section near

London looking towards Bristol, the lines read from left to right as Down Main, Up Main, Down Relief and Up Relief. Freight traffic generally uses the relief lines, although fast freights or those running in quieter periods may run on the main lines. Of course, this doesn't stop you having goods loops or separate goods lines.

Also what might be of interest is that the Up direction is where trains are travelling towards the zero milepost, whilst Down direction is where trains are travelling away from the zero milepost. This applies to all regions and not just the Western.

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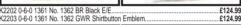
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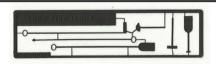

SIATON RENOVATION

TATIONS are often the focal point of our layouts and whether you already have one or are in the early stages of building a new scene, we are here to help you make it the best it can be. We have covered platform construction in the past, so in this feature we are going to focus on the details that

Getting these details right is more difficult – too little and it will look empty, too much and it will be overpopulated. Fortunately, when it comes to sourcing detail items there is an extensive array of parts, signs and more available.

can transform bare stations into an

environment with realism and life.

Most of the layouts that we have built for the magazine feature a station of one sort or another ranging in size from the original single platform of Shortley Bridge through Twelve Trees Junction's four-platform design to the large terminus of Grosvenor Square, but the one that was in the

greatest need of attention was our office test track Topley Dale.

The layout has been going through a redevelopment during 2018, though of late other projects have taken centre stage. That has meant the station scene on Topley Dale hasn't been looking its best. It has gathered dust from construction of other layouts and details which were once integral to its appearance have been lifted for use elsewhere. During the layout's transfer to its new location a few items had got damaged too – mainly fences and a loose smoke deflector on the footbridge.

All this got us thinking about stations and how we could go about giving ours a fresh lease of life. We'd seen products in the Scale Model Scenery, Sankey Scenics, Bachmann Scenecraft and Hornby Skaledale ranges which fitted the bill as well as digging out detail products from Dart Castings which we had previously painted and detailed for use on our exhibition layouts.

Topley Dale's station is quite modest with just two platform faces, a small forecourt and a parcels bay. It had all the basics – station buildings, footbridge, parcels office, store, waiting rooms, fencing and lighting – but it looked tired. We've stayed with its London Midland Region theme, though most of the methods and products we have used here could be used on other regions while Sankey

Over time, details such as fences get knocked and damaged – even on a permanent layout. This section of Ratio Midland fence was damaged by a visit from a 12in:1ft cat but was easily restored to its original condition using Plastic Magic and superglue – the latter being used to fix the posts back to the platform surface. We also reattached one of the smoke deflectors to the underside of the footbridge and refitted the loose fencing along the rear of platform 2.

Left: A handful of passengers go about their business as 'WD' 2-8-0 90448 plods through with a long rake of empty 16ton mineral wagons. It is as easy to over populate as under populate a platform. Add passengers a few at a time then stand back to see how the scene works as a whole.

ADD BENCHES

Another simple but essential part of any railway station is the humble bench. These readymade items are from the Hornby Skaledale range, but there are plenty of choices including region-specific items from Dart Castings. Modern benches are also available from Bachmann's Scenecraft range for those modelling more recent railway scenes. It's worth thinking about the position of benches too. We've kept ours around the centre of the platforms where passengers would wait while the outer ends have been left bare of benches.



CREATE CAMEOS

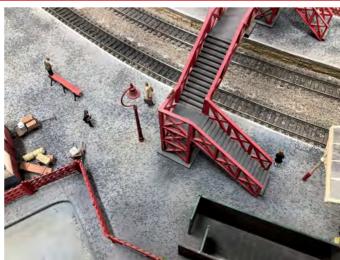




Pockets of detail make a station more realistic. Parcels and packages have been grouped together outside one of the buildings in the company of a selection of barrows while on the opposite platform milk churns and a truck have been grouped ready for arrival of the next stopping train.

INTRODUCE PEOPLE

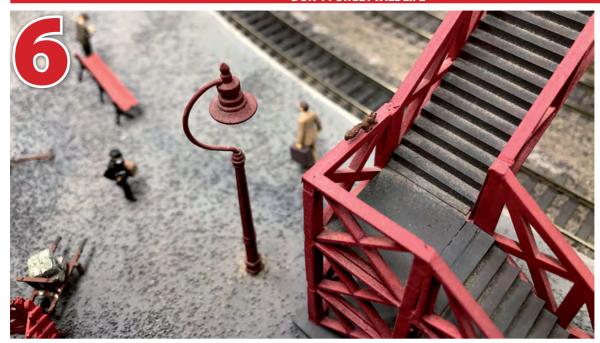




Passengers and staff are essential for a realistic station scene, but it is easy to go over the top. We selected three packs of Bachmann Scenecraft figures in total – but we didn't use them all. On the station you will now find half a dozen standing passengers, three trainspotters and four station staff. If you wanted to go for the ultimate in detail, ModelU and Hardy's Hobbies offer superb 3D printed figures which can be custom painted for a unique collection of miniature citizens and railway staff.

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DON'T FORGET WILDLIFE

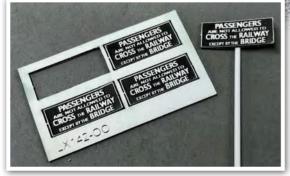


It's a tiny detail, but the red squirrel is one which has always gone down well on previous Hornby Magazine layouts. This tiny white metal casting is by Dart Castings and it has been painted to model the outgoing red squirrels of the 1960s. Other options for wildlife around the station include birds on the station roof or perhaps a fox snooping round for its next meal. In fact, if you are looking for wildlife for any lineside scene Dart Castings website is well worth visiting for its variety of cast metal animals and birds.

ADD SIGNAGE

Railway and station signage makes a huge difference to a station. We've used Scale Model Scenery's superb laser engraved signs for the end of the platforms to remind passengers to cross the line by the footbridge while the station nameboards, platforms numbers and period adverts are all from Sankey Scenics. Sankey offers custom station sheets with your own station name printed on them together with a tremendous range of other details including way out signs, platform numbers, notices and much more.









CREATE A BARROW CROSSING



Topley Dale station jigsaw was a barrow crossing. We'd planned to add one long ago and already had a pair of Ratio barrow crossing kits to hand to make it with. We used two in its construction to make up the additional panels required and also cut sections in half to fit in with the staggered platform ends. It was fixed in place with contact adhesive and painted with **Lifecolor Wood Warm Dark** Shade (UA713) to give it a

treated wood finish.

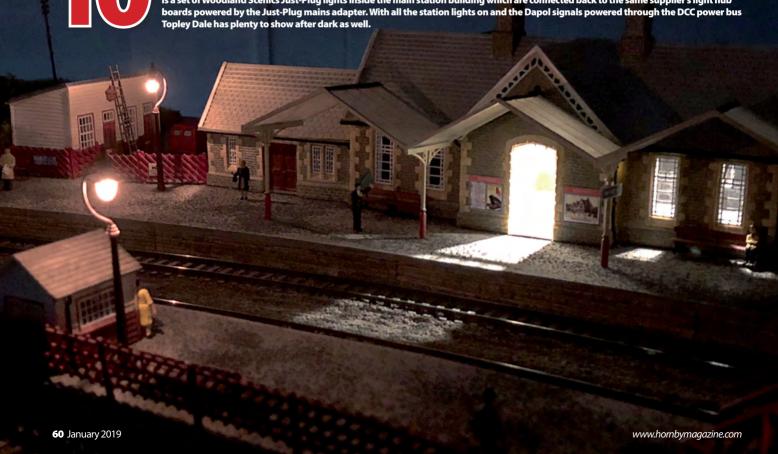
DRESS THE FORECOURT
Just as important as the platforms is the forecourt. This area was barren on Topley Dale, but has benefitted from the return of a selection of road vehicles as well as a set of potted plants outside the front of the building. The road vehicles here are from Oxford Diecast and Classix and all have been matt varnished to tone down their factory finish for a more realistic finish within the railway scene.

ILLUMINATION

The finishing touch for Topley Dale is reconnection of its lights. Two systems are in use on this station – DCC Concepts swan neck lamps, now produced exclusively for Gaugemaster, light up the platforms and are wired to a DCC Concepts 9v DC power supply. Second to this is a set of Woodland Scenics Just-Plug lights inside the main station building which are connected back to the same supplier's light hub boards powered by the Just-Plug mains adapter. With all the station lights on and the Dapol signals powered through the DCC power bus Topley Dale has plenty to show after dark as well.



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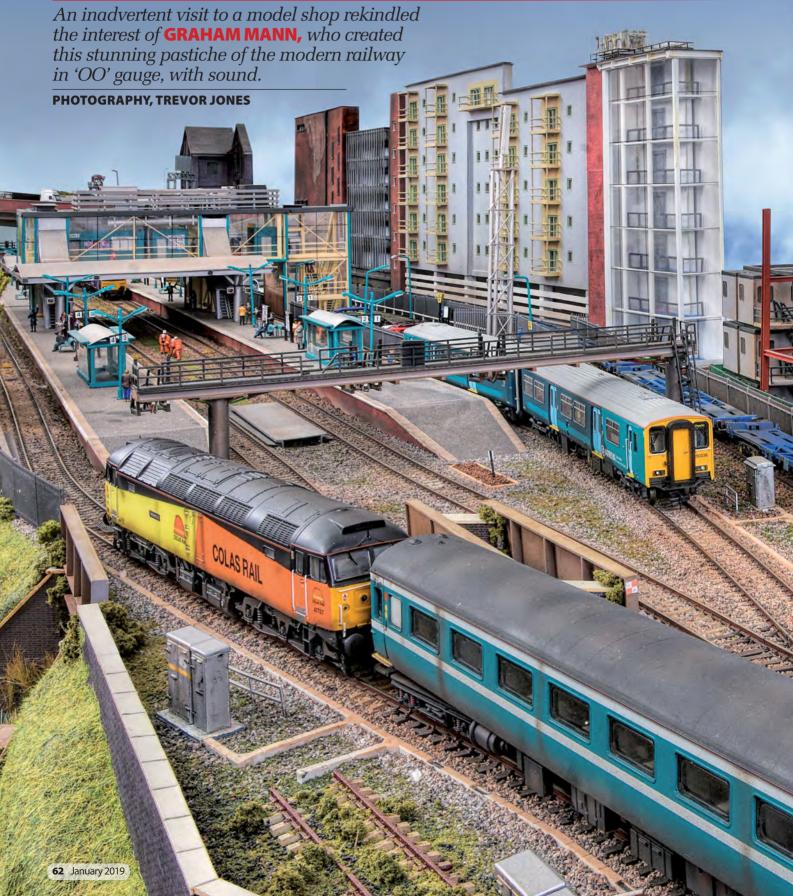

stayed on the back burner for a couple of months until one Saturday afternoon when my wife announced it would be a nice idea go to the Pump House down in Cardiff. Well, I can quickly browse antiques and had pretty much covered the whole place when I saw a small door with the words Lord and Butler emblazoned above it. Entering this Aladdin's cave, here were the familiar names of Hornby and Peco along with a couple of brands I had never heard of such as Bachmann and Dapol.

So one thing led to another and it wasn't long before I had taken over the back bedroom with a tail-chaser all laid out on an 8ft x 4ft baseboard, just like the one I had as a kid. Hornby track and points were laid on foam underlay, then pulled up in favour of Peco track with ballasted underlay, scenery was added, two-and-a-half circuits of the board were dropped to two with a passing loop, and buildings popped up, only to be demolished in favour of scratchbuilt structures. This carried on for about 10 years or so, a constant re-building and remodelling exercise, giving me a chance

to improve my modelling skills and try out new ideas I had seen at various shows.

FIRST INVITE

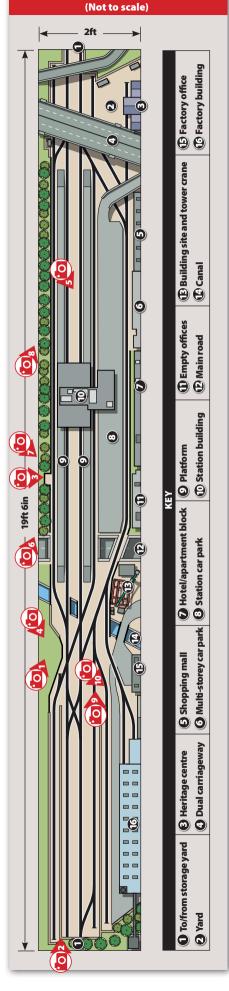
Roll on to November 2011 when, bumping into some of the lads from the Pontypridd Model Railway Club at the annual Warley show, I casually announced that I was going to build an exhibition style layout and it was going to have Digital Command Control (DCC) sound. "Well, we know our exhibition manager is always on the lookout for new layouts," they said in unison, and so Sunday morning it was up to the local DIY shop with a timber list and sizes to make three boards - two scenic and one for the storage yard, plus trestles to stand them on.

Once the two basic 6ft 6in x 2ft boards were completed, it was time to mark out the lay of the land. So, using the plan I had in my head, it was time to set about them with the jigsaw, router and various other power tools. Upon completion I had a road and canal under the station throat, a largish hole which was to be the

subterranean level of a new build office block and a dive-under into a tunnel mouth at the other end of the layout. Next came the track. Using Peco templates, it was just a matter of making sure none of the pointwork ended up over the joints of the boards, though the diamond crossing did end up at the point where the track levels changed which caused a few minor problems, solved by lifting the track and getting out the electric sander. Next, the sides of the rails were painted a rust colour (note to self – don't bother with the sides that the public can't see at shows!) and the track was ballasted and weathered.

Next on the agenda I wanted buildings. Some would be based on existing structures, others would be a complete fabrication based on structures I had worked on - and in fact in some cases still do. The factory started out being modelled in mount board, then plastic card corrugated sheet was cut into scale sheets and stuck on one piece at a time - laborious, but I'm pleased with the result. Next came the building site. At first it featured about >>>

three portable buildings, but knowing building sites, this wasn't big enough for the team of architects, quantity surveyors and site managers that a site like this would require, so there is now a stack of seven that have been shoehorned onto the site, one of the only structures not scratchbuilt. Next came the tower crane. This I knew had to look like it is of modular construction and I think it works quite well: it has the look that it could be dismantled and taken away on a fleet of flatbed lorries to another site.

Next came the station. I wanted something modern and decided it had to be mainly glass sitting upon a steel structure. I wanted lifts, I wanted stairs, I wanted a concourse, I wanted a building that an architect sitting in his office would be proud of, but most of all I wanted a station building that is totally inefficient, costing a fortune to keep cool in summer and warm in winter, a building incapable of dealing with the sheer number of people it was built to serve, especially during rush hour, and bearing

in mind this is billed as a Parkway, even the car park is way too small - at best it is able to handle 20-odd cars. Lastly there is the office block and hotel/apartment block - sadly both have yet to feel a step in them - did someone mention a recession?

FIRST ADVENTURE

Well, the 'OO' gauge Forest Gate Parkway did manage to appear at the Pontypridd show in April 2012 with a scenic section 13ft x 2ft plus a 6ft 6in storage yard. This was my first ever show where I would be behind the back boards and not stood in front and I was quite impressed with the reception it received considering the derailments, near collisions and wrong line working, all down to the operator of course.

One thing that did stand out was that it needed lighting. This was achieved using readily available LED strips fixed to the rear of a pelmet running the full length of the layout. Next came a Velcro-attached 'skirt' made from black cloth hiding the stock >>>







boxes and so on. I wasn't satisfied with that so I decided to remodel the storage yard with a 180° curve on another 6ft 6in board, placing the yard behind the operators. In this configuration it appeared at Newport, Cheltenham, Thornbury and then back to Pontypridd in 2017 and again 2018.

Still not satisfied, I decided to extend the scenic section by another 6ft 6in. This meant I could extend the station platforms by another 2ft 6in, complete the bi-directional avoiding line around the back of the station and install another junction leaving the railway to pass under a busy dual carriageway then disappearing off scene via a cutting. By adding a similar non-scenic curve this end and extending the existing storage yard I can now run near full-length trains from one end to the other. These include various Diesel Multiple Units, a couple of full length High Speed Trains, container traffic, a rake of HTA coal hoppers (hauled by double-headed Class 66s), various steel trains and a particular favourite is a mix of unbranded Anglia and Virgin Mk 2s as charter stock which can be headed by almost anything provided it's diesel.

MODERN VARIETY

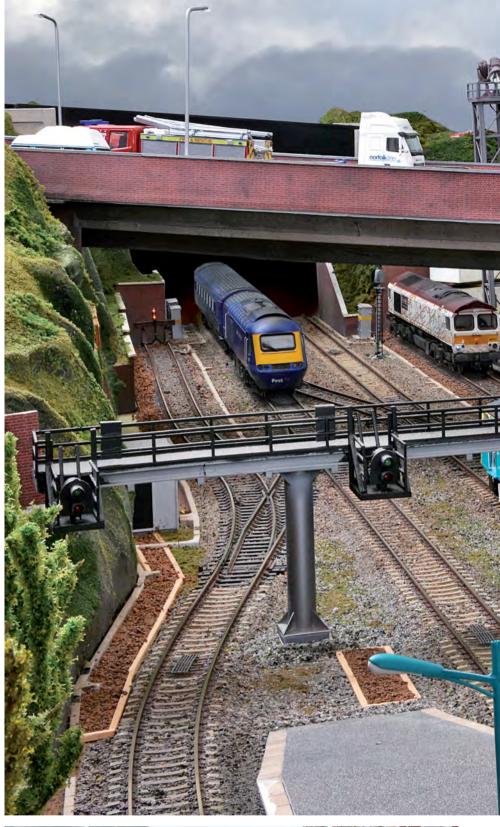
As you can see in the photographs, I like to run a wide variety of modern day stock with an even wider variety of liveries! New stock is announced by the various train operating companies almost on a monthly basis and they seem to be able to repaint or vinyl wrap their entire fleets every couple of years, and that keeps the model manufacturers and us modellers on our toes. The current roster leans towards the Great Western Main Line and with the 2018 release of the Class 800 by Hornby and the complimentary Class 43 HSTs in the same GWR green colour scheme the latest liveries are being modelled at Forest Gate Parkway.

It's all rather different from work - I am an industrial abseiler and my team and I spend our time up close and personal with some of the most iconic structures whether it be the 330m long railway viaduct in Kidderminster, abseiling off the masts of the Second Severn crossing, climbing the towers of Cardiff's Principality Stadium or putting right an architect's dream that hasn't quite lived up to its billing. It's a job that when you're stood on the roofs of some of the tallest buildings and structures in the country really does give you a sense of scale which really helps when it comes to modelling the present day in 4mm scale.

So what next? Perhaps another scenic section, an extension to the storage yard or perhaps something new: there's a third-rail layout I've built that's already had one outing. Who knows – but that's one of the many joys of railway modelling.

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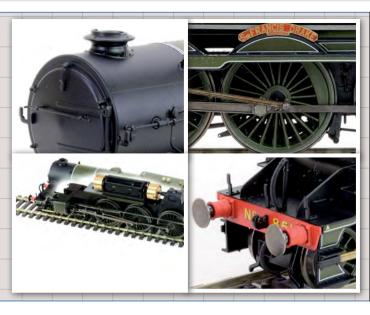

and 1929 and they continued to serve the Southern Railway and Region until the last was withdrawn in 1962. Initially they were focused on continental boat train traffic from London to Dover and Folkestone though they were later found working to Southampton Docks on the Western Section of the Southern too.

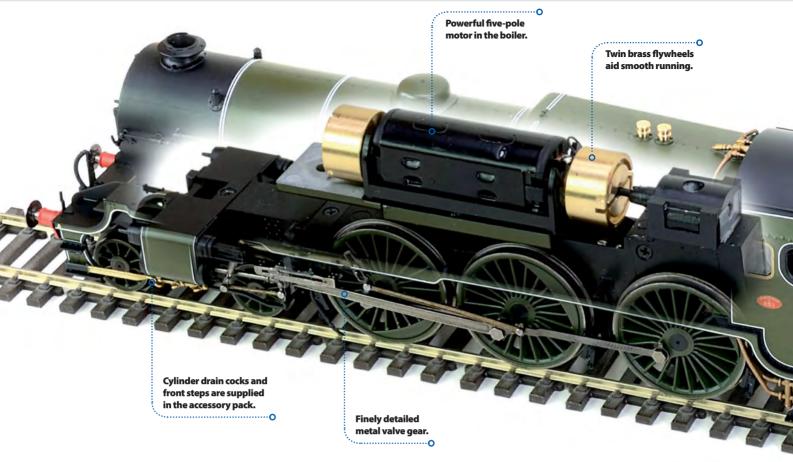
Just one survives in preservation today, 30850 *Lord Nelson*, which is owned by the National Collection. It is currently at the Mid-Hants Railway awaiting an overhaul following expiry of its boiler certificate in 2015.

THE MODEL

Hornby is offering three versions of the 'Lord Nelson' in its first list of releases. These cover 851 *Sir Francis Drake* in Southern Railway olive green without smoke deflectors (Cat No. R3634), 30863 *Lord Rodney* in BR lined green with early crests (R3635) and 30850 *Lord Nelson* in BR green with late crests and Twin Track Sound (R3603TTS). Prices are set at £169.99 for the DCC ready versions while the Twin Track Sound (TTS) fitted version costs £194.99.

For review we had the opportunity to inspect the model of 851 Sir Francis Drake. Its Southern Railway olive green base colour is neatly finished with white-blackwhite lining on the boiler bands as well as white lining around the cab, frames and tender body. The nameplates are impressively printed with a metallic effect to the brass frame while pipework, safety valves and ejectors are all correctly coloured too. The tender carries cream Southern E851 lettering and numbers while close inspection reveals builder's plates on the cabside and tender back. >>



The model itself is superbly detailed throughout. At the front and rear you will find sprung metal buffers while an accessory pack includes all the parts you need to bring the front end to life including steps and pipes as well as brake rigging to fit underneath the model and more. The steps can only be fitted if the locomotive is to negotiate third radius or larger curves, as otherwise they interfere with operation

of the front bogie wheels.

Moving along the locomotive, Hornby has done an excellent job of modelling the big 4-6-0 with its large diameter boiler, high shouldered firebox and squat dome and chimney. Its length is accurate for the prototype while the underframe features correct 6ft 7in diameter driving wheels and 3ft 1in pony wheels.

The cab interior is fully detailed right down to the copper pipework

on the backhead, representation of numbers on the gauges, the screw reverser and more. The side and front windows are also flush glazed.

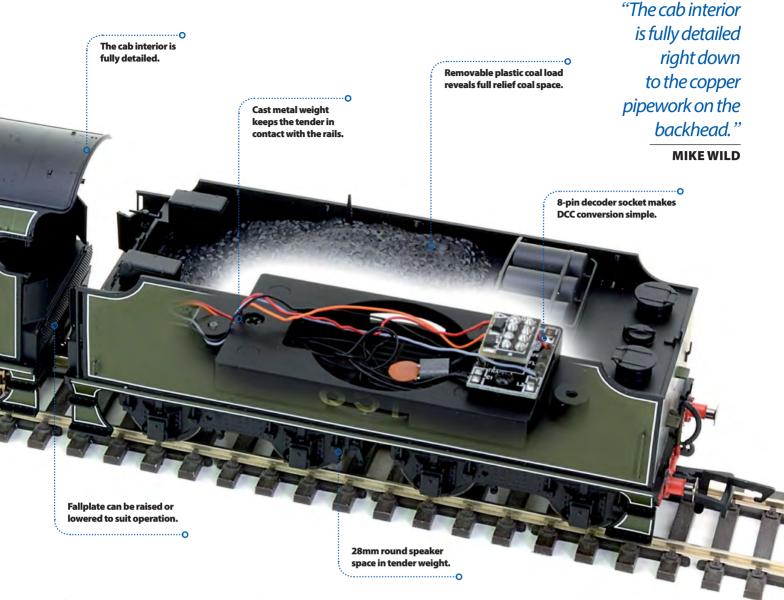
Two types of tender have been produced with the 'Nelson'. 851 is paired with a straight sided Maunsell bogie tender – first seen from Hornby with the Maunsell 'S15' 4-6-0 in 2015 (HM100) – while the two BR liveried versions are both paired with the 'Lord Nelson' specific Maunsell bogie

tenders which had higher sides. A removable plastic coal load is positioned on top of the full relief coal space in the case of 851.

PERFORMANCE

Placing the 'Nelson' on the track we were instantly impressed. Its performance was smooth and silent immediately and without any hesitation. We subjected it to running in for 45 minutes at a medium speed in each direction





before loading it up with a rake of seven carriages to begin load testing. Throughout all of this its operation was flawless and ultimately we had a rake of 10 Maunsell carriages coupled behind the locomotive.

This impressive performance is aided by its twin flywheel motor arrangement which makes good use of the length of the boiler. Drive is transmitted to the rear axle through a short cardan shaft and gearbox – a mechanism very similar to that employed in the Maunsell'S15'4-6-0 by Hornby.

In common with other recent Hornby steam locomotives, the locomotive and tender are coupled by a metal drawbar. This is held in place by two slotted screws which can be removed if required to separate the two. A four-wire harness also runs underneath the drawbar to connect the pick-up and motor connections back to the 8-pin decoder socket in the tender.

Alongside the 8-pin socket is provision for a 28mm round speaker to be installed on the

base of the tender chassis, making this a simple model to upgrade to both digital control and sound should you wish to.

OVERALL

It may have taken a little longer than we expected for the 'Lord Nelson' to arrive but we can firmly say that the wait has been well worth it. The first, R3634 and R3635, are due to arrive during December with the TTS version as 30850 following in the New Year.

Hornby has done an excellent job of recreating these fine 4-6-0s in 'OO' gauge to the high standard that we have now come to expect. 851 in original Southern Railway colours is a great looking locomotive, but we have to say that we are looking forward to the BR versions with smoke deflectors even more. A great new addition to Hornby's stunning collection of Southern motive power which is sure to be well received. (MW)

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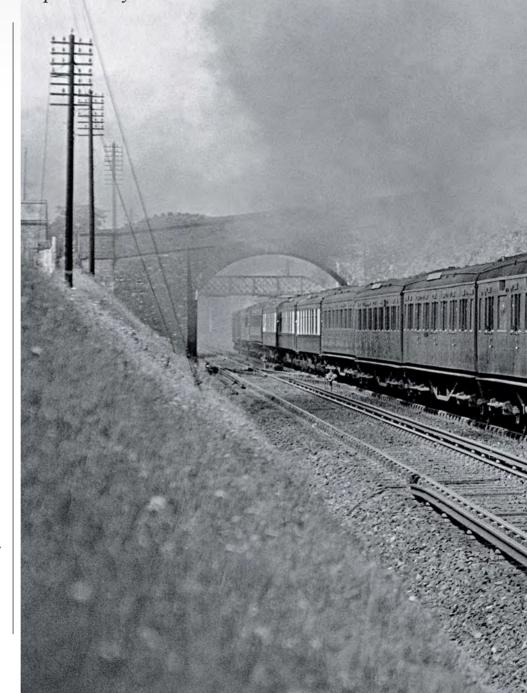
During the 1920s the Southern Railway identified a requirement for a powerful yet fast locomotive for use on its continental boat train services. This lead to development of the 'Lord Nelson' class, a design that perhaps never really lived up to its full potential. **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** takes up the story.

N THE THIRD DECADE OF THE 20th century Britain was a country undergoing a vast amount of change. The horrors of the First World War were beginning to recede into the past, the years of austerity were over and there was a new optimism amongst the young. The country's rigid class society was beginning to break down and the middle if not the working classes had more wealth than ever before.

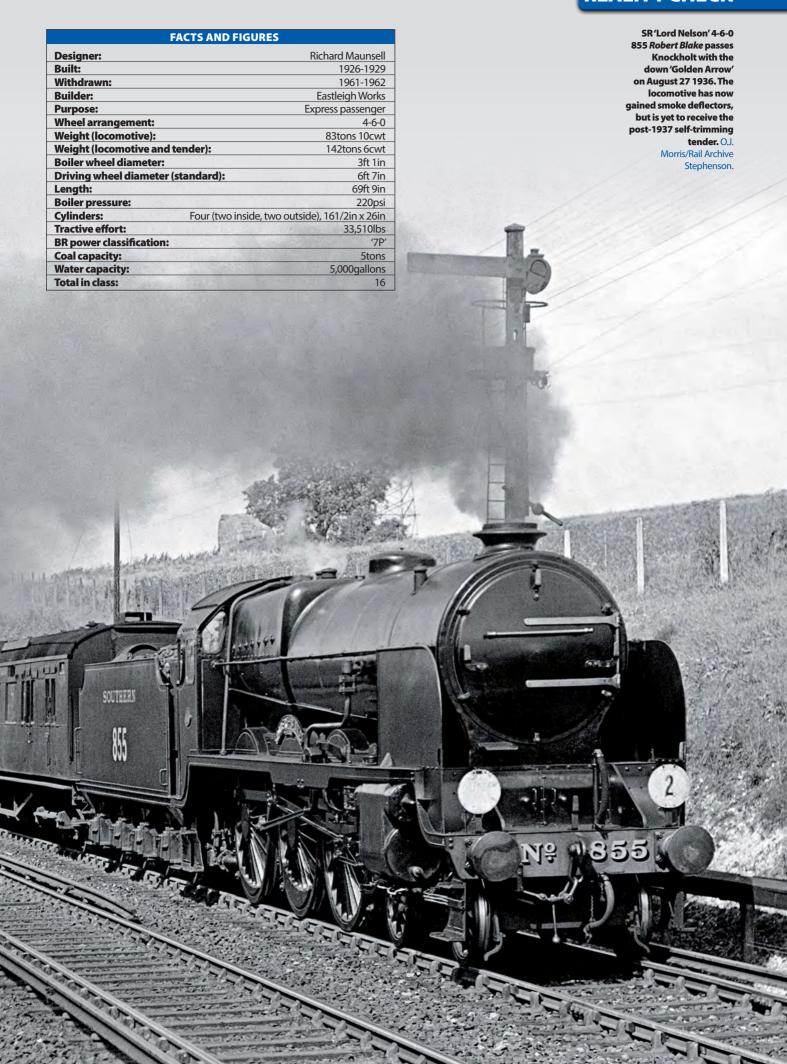
One result of these changes was that more people had both the time and the cash to travel overseas and this led to an increase in traffic on routes which served ports, particularly in the south. This increase in business had been noted by the Southern Railway's traffic department with the result that the company's boat trains were becoming longer and heavier. This resulted in a request to the locomotive department for a machine that could haul a 500ton train at an average speed of no less than 55mph while at the same time having the acceleration to enable it to keep up with the company's Electric Multiple Units (EMUs).

The company's Chief Mechanical Engineer, Richard Maunsell, realised that his existing two-cylinder 'King Arthurs' which, while capable machines, weren't going to be up to the job and he set about designing a locomotive that was to have many innovative features and became the prototype for the 'Lord Nelson' class.

The new design retained the 4-6-0 wheel arrangement used on earlier Southern designs, but this new locomotive was to push the envelope as far as possible in order to gain extra power, with a massive boiler being planned which would feed four cylinders with steam generated by a very large Belpaire firebox. A novel feature was the intended setting of the cranks which were arranged so the locomotive would be powered eight times a revolution instead of the usual four, which would, it was hoped)

help the engine be more sure-footed. With such a huge locomotive great care had to be taken to keep the overall weight within the tolerances specified by the civil engineer and this led to a number of components being made up from lightweight materials while others which would normally have been cast were instead machined up to remove excess metal. Even the frames were made as light as possible by the simple expedient of having holes cut in them. The resulting engine came out at only one ton heavier than the company's 'N15' 4-6-0s, despite an increase of tractive effort of almost a third.

Emerging from Eastleigh works in August 1926 and numbered E850, the prototype was named *Lord Nelson* and in trials proved to be capable of what its designer had intended. However a coal strike and a reliance on imported and inferior quality coal interfered with the trials and it wasn't until April 1927 that the locomotive was able to demonstrate its ability when it achieved an average speed of 55.5mph on a run of 83.2 miles from London Waterloo to Salisbury with a train of 16 coaches, weighing in at 521tons.

MOST POWERFUL 4-6-0

What the trials did prove was that with an indicated drawbar effort of 33,510lbs the Southern Railway could claim that it had the most powerful locomotive in the country, something which the directors of the Great Western Railway could not countenance for long, with the title being snatched back by the first of the mighty Collett 'Kings' later that year.

With evaluation completed Maunsell was able to authorise a production batch of 'Lord Nelsons' and as a result 15 further engines were built to an almost identical design, except for a few tweaks to the front end arrangement and the removal of a few of the weight-saving features that were considered unnecessary. These were completed between May 1928 and November 1929 with allocation split between Stewart's Lane and Nine Elms sheds.

In service the 'Nelsons' did not prove to be as free steaming as hoped and demanded more skill from their crews than a 'King Arthur' but they were capable of exceptional performances when required. Unfortunately by the time they were all in service the economy was on a downturn again and the heavy trains for which they were designed never materialised. They were, however, regularly loaded to 450tons when working trains such as the 'Atlantic Coast Express' and the 'Night Ferry' which used French-built sleeping cars and have been recorded as averaging speeds of up to 59mph when engaged on such duties. Other prestige duties worked by the 'Nelsons' included the 'Golden Arrow' and the 'Bournemouth Belle'.

When built, the 'Lord Nelsons' were painted in Maunsell's olive green livery and from 1938 after Bulleid had taken over at the Southern their livery was changed to malachite green, and this was in turn replaced with black during the Second World War. After the war there was a reversion to Southern green, and then after nationalisation the fleet was painted BR lined locomotive green.

UNUSUAL CHANGES

During their lives several of the class were subject to one-off modifications. In 1929 859 *Lord Hood* appeared with driving wheels four inches smaller than normal in an attempt to see if greater haulage power could be obtained without sacrificing speed. The locomotive retained these wheels throughout its life but the experiment was not tried on other 'Nelsons'. The next-

numbered engine 860 Lord Hawke was equipped with a boiler 10in longer than any of the others and again this experiment was not repeated, although the boiler did appear on other engines throughout its life. In 1933 865 Sir John Hawkins was fitted with conventional cranks and from then on could always be identified from standard engines as it emitted four beats per revolution instead of eight. Again, this modification was retained but not repeated on any other engine. A double Kylechap chimney was fitted to 862 Lord Collingwood in 1934 and four years later 865 was fitted with a different type at about the same time that the rest of the class was being equipped with the Lemaitre blastpipe, with the first to be equipped being 863 Lord Rodney. 857 Lord Howe then received a boiler with a round-topped firebox which again remained a one off. Smoke deflectors were fitted to the last of the class during building and quickly added to the others while new self-trimming high-sided tenders were adopted from 1937 onwards.

The 'Lord Nelsons' should have been replaced by Bulleid's new 'Pacific' designs but due to their well-documented shortcomings a total changeover wasn't possible until the Bulleid engines had been rebuilt into a more conventional form. It was therefore 1961 before the big 4-6-0s began to be stepped down from Top Link work and, as they were suitable for very little else, withdrawals began with 30858 Lord Duncan in August that year. By the following October the whole class had gone with 30861 Lord Anson and 30862 Lord Collingwood being the final survivors. By this time all of the class had gravitated to Eastleigh shed from which they were withdrawn.

After a career lasting for 36 years and over 1.3m miles' service prototype engine

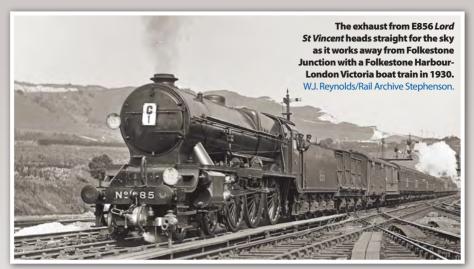

Lord Nelson was selected for retention as part of the National Collection in 1962. It then spent the next 15 years in store at the Pullman works in Brighton before moving to Carnforth where it was restored to working order for use on charter trains. It was then sidelined for a number of years until overhauled at Eastleigh by the Eastleigh Railway Preservation Society, partly using funds provided by the National Heritage Lottery Fund. At this point it received air brake equipment to improve its usefulness and after a further spell of main line use it was then based at Ropley on the Mid-Hants Railway where it has remained to see regular heritage use until expiry of its boiler certificate in 2015.

Although the 'Lord Nelsons' gained a reputation for poor steaming and lacklustre performance many of these issues were vastly improved later in their life by alterations to the draughting, and particularly to the exhaust arrangements. They were popular with the enginemen who managed to master the peculiar art of fuelling their long fireboxes but hated by those who did not and they were much loved in the depots where they proved to be reliable and relatively light on maintenance. It is regrettable that changing circumstances prevented them being worked to full capacity, and therefore prevented us knowing just how well they might have performed. Etm

MIKE WILD inspects the latest Hornby Stanier 'Duchess' 4-6-2s for 'OO' gauge.

ORNBY'S new version of the Stanier 'Duchess' 4-6-2 first touched down in October 2017 (HM125) offering models of one of the last pair of Ivatt locomotives 46256 Sir William Stanier FRS alongside standard Stanier versions as 6234 Duchess of Abercorn and 46235 City of Birmingham with Twin Track Sound.

Now Hornby is showing off even more of the tooling suite for these popular 'Pacifics' with the arrival of 'semi-streamlined' 6241 City of Edinburgh in LMS lined black (Cat No. R3681) and 46225 Duchess of Gloucester in the striking British Railways express passenger blue (R3682) - see HM138 for more on BR blue steam locomotives. 'Duchesses' in this form came about during the process of removing the original streamlined casing from 6220-6229 and 6235-6248. The slope topped smokeboxes, which were used to clear the front casing on streamlined locomotives, were retained initially

giving these 'defrocked' locomotives a distinctive appearance.

De-streamlining began in April 1946 with 6235 City of Birmingham while 6243 City of Lancaster was the last to lose its streamlined casing in May 1949. The sloping smokeboxes were still to be seen on some of the 'Duchess' class until 1958 by which time all had received new standard smokeboxes during works overhauls. However, the former streamlined locomotives still stood out for their split platform front end.

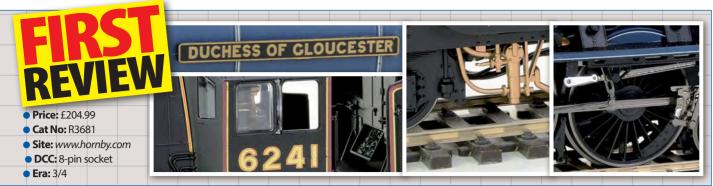
The subjects of these first issues with a sloped smokebox on the new tooling model are 6241 *Duchess of Edinburgh* and 46225 *Duchess of Gloucester*. 6241 was built at Crewe and entered traffic in April 1940 in streamlined form. Its casing was removed in February 1947 at Camden – the shed where it spent most of its working career. It was ultimately withdrawn in September 1964 after two periods in storage before later being scrapped. 46225 was completed in May 1938 and



lost its casing in March 1947. Its allocations included Camden, Crewe North, Holyhead and Polmadie.

Both models are immaculately turned out with satin paint finish while the lining on each of our samples was impeccably applied.

Helian first released its Mk 1 carriages for 'O' gauge in 2010 (HM35) offering models of the Tourist Second Open (TSO), Second Corridor (SK), First Corridor (FK), Restaurant Miniature Buffet (RMB) and Brake Second Corridor (BSK). This new issue focuses on the most popular liveries – BR Western Region chocolate and cream, BR maroon and BR blue and grey - covering the sought after TSO, RMB, BSK and Gangway Brake (BG). Just 75 of each vehicle are being produced and not all of the three liveries are available on each carriage design. Chocolate and cream is being offered on the TSO, BSK and BG, BR maroon on the TSO, BSK and RMB and BR blue and grey on the TSO and FK.

For review we had the opportunity to inspect TSOs in BR maroon and BR blue and grey.



Headlines worth noting include that the maroon versions will have black ends – previous issues have had the less common maroon ends – while the No Smoking labels have been corrected on this batch.

The livery of each of our samples was applied to Heljan's usual high standard with crisp edges between colours, neatly printed lining on the maroon version plus fine lettering on the solebar and ends.

These vehicles are delivered without numbers allowing the purchaser to customise them to suit particular regions or formations.

The return of the Heljan Mk 1s is good news for those looking to expand their existing rakes and these popular liveries are bound to fly off the shelves. The new lower price is attractive too and we can't see these being available for long. (MW)

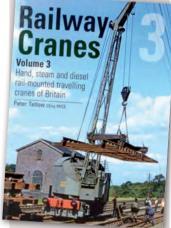
Unit Models has added a new 'O' gauge sleeper-built buffer stop to its range of 3D-printed model railway accessories.

Measuring 54mm x 54mm x 40mm, this one-piece 3D printed buffer stop features neatly moulded brown painted sleepers with differing heights for added variety. The buffer stop itself comprises a single horizontal sleeper with two further sections of sleeper painted white to highlight the stop itself.

A mix of ballast in different shades has been glued in place to the centre, together with a small amount of green flock material to simulate weeds growing through. Ideal for goods yards or a station







HIS latest book on the subject of railway cranes by Peter Tatlow looks at rail-mounted hand, steam and diesel travelling cranes used by engineers and other railway departments on Britain's railways covering the 'Big Four' through British Rail and the privatisation era.

It focuses on standard gauge cranes, as well as single jib cranes that feature full running gear.

Wooden jib and steel jib hand cranes, steam cranes, diesel strut jib cranes, diesel-hydraulic telescopic-jib cranes and more are covered in some detail with diagrams, tables, department and allocation information, together with a diverse collection of photographs.

Mechanical details of specific cranes are covered as are liveries, crane manufacturers and specifications while a good deal of images show the cranes in action in permanent way yards, on location at remodelling works or even in the midst of a mishap!

Previous volumes have been well received, and to that end you may find that so as not to repeat elements, there are references back to these earlier works. It is another superb reference work with plenty of interest to modellers, especially with forthcoming 'OO' gauge models expected in due course from Bachmann and Hatton's Originals. (MC)

EVOLUTION TRAINS (RT) has delivered its first 'OO' gauge crowd-funded model following the arrival of its contemporary TEA 100tonne bogie tank wagons.

Built in batches by Greenbrier
Europe from 2006 onwards,
these high-capacity tanks can be
found operating on petroleum/
petrochemical traffic to and from
rail-connected refineries, with a
multitude of liveries including VTG
(VTG Rail UK leasing), EWS (DB Cargo
UK) and Greenergy colour schemes.
They mainly run in long block train
formations, however there are
workings which see fewer than half a
dozen wagons in tow – occasionally

down to a single vehicle, as well as operating with older generation TEA bogie tank wagons.

Following the success of its crowd-funding scheme to produce the TEA tank wagons in 'N' gauge, RT unveiled plans to scale-up the model to 'OO' in 2015 (HM103), with added details and differences between prototypes incorporated. Variants offered include five single models in VTG red (Cat No. RN001), VTG grey (RN003), VTG blue (RN005), Freightliner green (RN007) and EWS grey (RN008), together with five triple packs in VTG red (RN002), VTG grey (RN004), VTG Enviro blue (RN006), EWS grey (RN009) and Greenergy (RN010) colour schemes.







Manufactured on behalf of RT by Rapido Trains of Canada, our review sample represented TEA 88115 in VTG red, the first of a batch of wagons built in 2006. Straight from the box, you get the sense of something special, the model displaying a crisply moulded tank barrel with fine panel lines together with neatly rounded barrel ends, tank cradle, bufferbeam fairings and filler hatches. Closer inspection reveals separately applied etched metal walkways, plastic ladders, bogie handbrake wheels, buffers, lamp irons, underframe discharge

Revolution's Cargowaggon 'Twins'

Recent arrivals from Revolution Trains are these crowd-funded 'N' gauge IZA Cargowaggon 'twins'. Built in Germany in the mid-1980s, these Cargowaggon twin vans were formed of a pair of semipermanently coupled twin axle box vans and utilised for transporting goods across Britain and Europe. 100 twin-sets were built initially, with further builds in 1989 and 1991, initially travelling to and from Britain via the Dover-Calais train ferry and subsequently through the Channel Tunnel. Initially coded Habbffis under the Continental UIC classifications, they were later recoded Hfirrs 3 – as well as carrying TOPS code IZA in the UK.

Four IZA twin-sets have been produced in original Cargowaggon livery (Cat No. NIZA-2101), original Cargowaggon livery with flashing tail lamp (NIZA-2102), Perrier water livery (NIZA-2103) and revised Cargowaggon livery (NIZA-2104). In addition, two triple packs of original Cargowaggon (NIZA-2301) and revised Cargowaggon (NIZA-2301) liveried models are also available. For review we received IZA/Habbffis 279 4 01-0 in original Cargowaggon livery and IZA/Hfirrs 292 9 07-5 in revised Cargowaggon livery.

This newly crowd-funded 'N' gauge model features a neatly moulded bodyshell which captures the distinctive bodyside ribs and door detail well, together with a separate clip-fit chassis. Further detailing

equipment and more. Such is the attention to detail that differences between prototypes have been included – our model had plain ladders (while some other variants include anti-climb panels) and two single discharge valves on each side - alternative discharge details are incorporated on some other models.

Decoration is superb throughout, our sample featuring a highquality uniform application of VTG red with blue logos and plenty of small printed details such as Hazchem signs (denoting the wagon's use on Murco traffic), vehicle data panels, TOPS panels, earthing point labelling and even running number repeaters along the roofline. Lifting points are also neatly picked out in yellow. We did spot that a small amount of paint had rubbed off one of the ladders on one side during handling.

Underneath, as with the prototypes, underframe detail is sparse, but certainly looks the part with well-defined bogies, fine brake

gear and discharge equipment.
Free-running metal wheels add
to the weighted feel of the model,
while small tension lock couplings
are factory-fitted in NEM coupling
pockets. A small pack containing air
pipes and a spare pair of handbrake
wheels is also included together
with a decal sheet containing
alternative running numbers and
VTG logos for further customisation.
Whilst these models were

primarily made-to-order through

retailers have also secured stock for general sale – C&M Models of Carlisle, Colletts Models in Exmouth, Kernow Model Rail Centre of Camborne and Trains4U in Peterborough. Given they are of a modern-day prototype which runs in long block trains, but could also appear in short formations too, be quick as they are sure to prove popular. (MC)



includes separately fitted metal handrails, brake gear and associated pipework, handbrake wheels and exquisitely fine footsteps and rungs mounted below the bufferbeam.

As supplied, each model comes with two factory-fitted inner couplings clip-fitted within the NEM coupler pockets – one per van (enabling one coupling to be removed and retained as a spare) - while the outer couplings

are standard Rapido style examples in NEM pockets. As these vehicles might otherwise be quite lightweight, each features a metal weight secured to the chassis by a small screw. This can be accessed by gently pulling the clip-fit body away from the chassis.

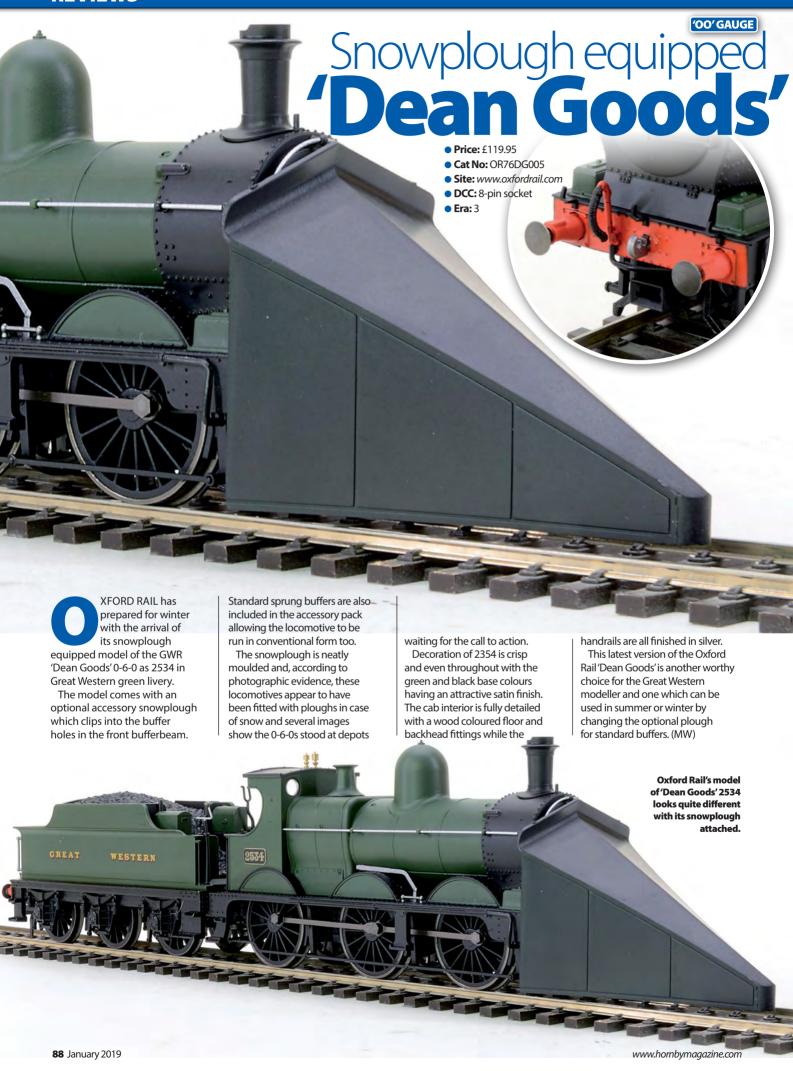
Decoration is up to the high standard we've come to expect from RT, with an evenly-applied aluminium and blue colour scheme to each vehicle, along with a metallic grey roof. Printed detail is equally impressive with yellow and blue Cargowaggon bodyside branding and crisply printed small details and tiny lettering throughout – the original livery carrying Danzas branding and train ferry anchor signage, while the revised livery also features CT (Channel Tunnel) lettering, bodyside warning labels, plus train ferry hook and loop securing points picked out in yellow.

Underframe detailing is also very good with neatly rendered axleboxes and separately applied brake gear underneath, while freerunning metal wheels are fitted. As an added bonus, an end-of-train version of the IZA is also available with flashing tail light (NIZA-2102), utilising a battery and small switch underneath the model.

Whilst these wagons were predominantly crowd-funded, like the 'OO'TEA a few retailers are also stocking the models for those who may have missed the original order deadline. See www. revolutiontrains.com for more details.

A very useful model of a long-lasting prototype which remains in service today. (MC)

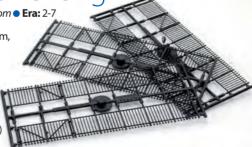

Gaugemaster's plastic frets include six sections of straight fencing 90mm long and 23mm tall, three single gates measuring 15mm x 23mm and three double gates which are 37mm long and 23mm tall. Once cut from the sprue this fencing can be installed immediately at a station scene. (MW)

Unit Models has created a selection of 'OO9' narrow gauge wagon loads designed for Bachmann's Hudson 'D' narrow gauge bogie open wagons.

Manufactured from resin, the loads are available singly (Cat No. OO-157) and in pairs (OO-156), while they are also available with steel inserts (OO-157M/OO-156M respectively). These steel inserts enable the loads to be removed from the wagon using a magnet. Supplied undecorated, they can be painted using acrylic or enamel paints (as illustrated), which also enhances the moulded detail. (MC)

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LARGESCALE

Using a Zimo decoder and Surface Mounted LEDs, MIKE WILD sets out to give Heljan's latest 'O' gauge diesel a suite of individually controlled lighting functions as well as a full set of sounds.

NSTALLING DIGITAL SOUND decoders is always rewarding, no matter what the scale. For this issue's project we selected Heljan's latest 'O' gauge ready-to-run diesel locomotive – the Class 25/3 (HM138) – as the basis, though the basic principles can be applied to the majority of this manufacturer's twin motor diesel locomotives.

The idea was to show how sound can be installed while also enhancing the model's functionality to include separate control of the head and tail lights, cab lights, roof fan and the addition of lighting behind the control desk to simulate the light of dials in the cab. Making this type of lighting configuration change is tricky in a 'OO' gauge locomotive due to its size, but with an 'O' gauge model there is more space available to accommodate the additional circuit and components that we need to use.

Separating the head and tail lights is a great way of introducing more realism to operation of a locomotive. On the real railway locomotives would only have tail lights illuminated when running light, so in most model circumstances when a locomotive is coupled to a train there should be no rear lights switched on.

Ready-to-run models generally overlook this important lighting standard, but by using Function Outputs (FO) 1 and 2 from the MX696KS decoder board for the tail lights we can make it so that pressing F0 on the controller only lights the headcode panels and the addition of pressing F21 lights the tail lights. Due to the way the sound project has been designed on the ZS25ASL Active Drive file we are using from Digitrains, F21 is directional so long as the control wires (purple and green) are connected the right way around >>>

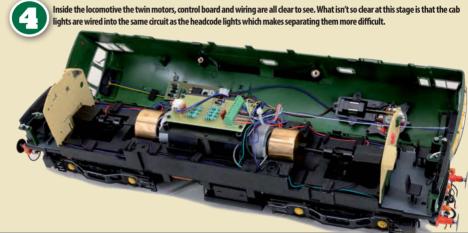

in the terminals for FO1 and FO2. Heljan's wiring for the Class 25 cab interior lights means that they are switched as standard by F0 on a DCC handset. This is because they are mounted on the rear of the headcode lighting circuit board which makes them difficult to separate. To 'turn off' the original cab lights on our model we blanked off the Light Emitting Diodes (LEDs) with Black Tack (high strength semi-permanent adhesive with similar properties to Blu Tack) and then added our own Surface Mounted LEDs (SMDs) from Kytes Lights. These require a resistor to be added to the black lead which is in turn connected back to the common positive feed on the decoder circuit board while the white wire from the SMD is connected back to the relevant FO terminal on the decoder baseplate. In this case FO3 and FO4 are used for the cab lights which, again, alternate with the direction of travel using button F22 to turn them on and off

Another revision to the wiring was to make the roof fan switchable on its own. Through the assistance of Digitrains and the sound project author Paul Chetter we were able to remap the button which controls

FO5 so that on pressing F15 on our handset, the fan would run at the same time as the fan noise being played from the decoder.

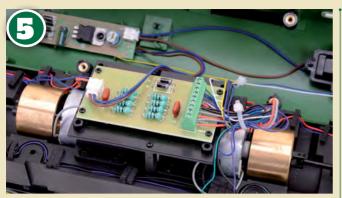
We could have left the project there, but we had one more use for SMDs in the Class 25 – cab control desk lighting. This was a little trickier to install due to the space available, but we were able to drill holes through the control desk to allow light to pass through and position an SMD on the front bulkhead behind the desk. The rear of the cab desk and the gauge apertures were then painted white and the rear was sealed to stop light escaping using a piece of white plasticard to reflect more of the light back through the gauges. Connections for this were made to the headlight terminals on the

decoder baseplate so that the gauge lights came on with the headcode lights. The black wires from each end were joined to a resistor and, in turn, to the common positive feed entering the tail light circuit boards at each end to avoid another pair of wires running the length of the locomotive.

Building up the operational functions of the Class 25 has been a

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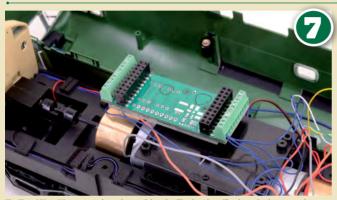




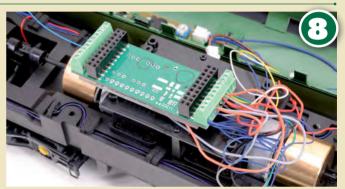
A central circuit board takes care of power distribution from the pick-ups to the motors, lights and roof fan. To change the 25 to work with DCC, this circuit board needs to be removed and replaced by a decoder - the Zimo MX696KS in this case.



The wiring is colour coded in the Class 25. Blue are common positive feeds for the lighting functions, red and black are track connections, orange and grey are motor feeds while yellow, purple, green and white are all light functions. Undo them carefully and keep track of which is which.



The Zimo MX696KS comes as a baseplate and decoder. The decoder will only work when correctly aligned with the pen marks on the baseplate. All wiring connections are made to the baseplate – here we have started by adding the blue common positive wires for the lighting functions.



The orange wire from motor one and the grey wire from motor two need to be joined together and connected to the motor right connection on the baseplate while the grey wire from motor one and orange wire from motor two need to be connected to the motor left terminal. This ensures that both motors run in the same direction. The red and black track pick-up wires have also been connected here.

DIAGRAM 2Speaker wiring in series

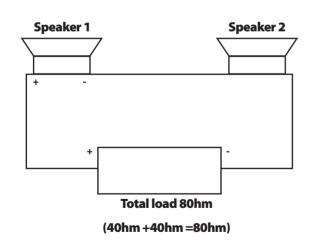


Diagram 2 – Series speaker wiring

challenging but rewarding project which has been finished off with the addition of a ModelU 3D printed diesel locomotive driver (Cat No. 1105) for the No. 1 end cab and a set of cabside numbers made up from Fox Transfers individual letters and numbers for 7mm scale (sheet FRH7005). The result is a fully functioning locomotive with high value lighting and a brilliant sound output too.

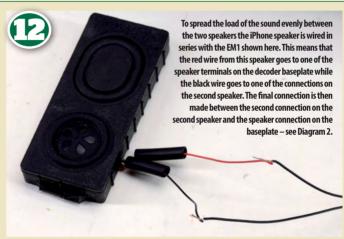
The capacitor wires are trimmed to length and the blue is then connected to the capacitor positive terminal and the black wire to the ground on the same side of the baseplate.



Following a test fit of the body, we found that the decoder was too tall to stand on the original PCB stand in the centre of the locomotive. To provide a stable base for the decoder and one of the speakers we built a 55mm long, 15mm tall and 44mm wide plasticard platform using layers of 1.5mm plasticard to support the new internal fittings.



The final position of the decoder board saw it straddle the flywheel of motor two. It is fixed in place with high adhesive Black Tack. Behind, the capacitor pack is fixed to the rear of the cab bulkhead while the first of the two speakers — an iPhone speaker from Roads and Rails — has also been positioned on the rear platform.

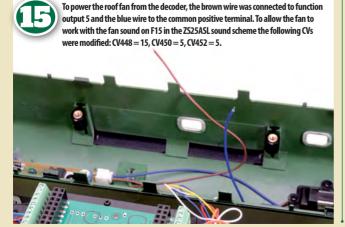


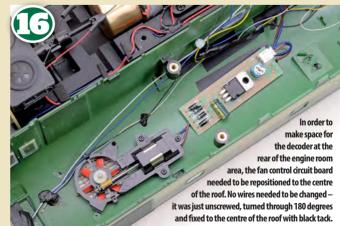


To spread the sound along the length of the locomotive the larger of the two speakers was positioned on a second platform at the front of the locomotive. By cutting off the end wings of the speaker moulding, it fitted in across the width of the Class 25 chassis.



Cab lights were next on the agenda. First the original cab lights on the back of the headcode panels had to be blacked out using black tack. Next an SMD was fixed to the roof of the cab with a resistor added to the black positive wire. The positive wire was then connected back to the common positive terminal on the decoder baseplate while the white wire was connected to function output 3 for the leading cab. The process was repeated for the rear cab light with the white wire connected to function output 4.





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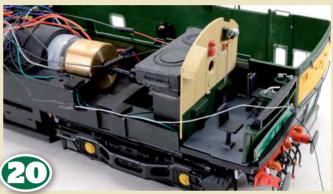


To add lights behind the cab desk instruments, the black upper section was carefully removed from the front bulkhead using a craft knife to lever it off its factory glue.





A 1mm hole was drilled through the bulkhead to allow the wires from an SMD to be fed through. The SMD was secured in place with superglue.



The white control wire from the SMD was then extended with a length of decoder wire with heatshrink insulation to protect the connection. It was then joined to the Front Lights connection on the MX696 baseplate so that the desk lights would come on with the headcode panel lights.



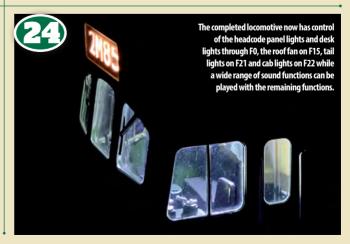
The black wire from the SMD was then connected to a 1.2k Ohm resistor which in turn was soldered to the blue common positive connection on the tail light panel below. This saved running another wire along the length of the locomotive to the decoder, but requires careful soldering.



To provide reflection for the SMD under the black cab desk, the internal faces were painted white and a section of 1mm thick plasticard was cut to shape to fit at the back.



To ensure the light was leak free, black insulation tape was placed over the back of the control desk and filled at the open end with black tack. The resistor and electrical connections for the positive wire below have also been covered with insulation tape.

N 1999 Chelmsford and District MRC 'N' gauge modellers were discussing what they disliked about layouts they had seen at recent exhibitions. End-to-end, round and round, limited rolling stock, inactivity and a lack of communication between operators all played a part, so when we started planning our new layout, we wanted it to be different and entertaining for all.

We discussed different track levels, introducing an element of mystery, keeping something on the move at all times, tunnels, gradients and reversing loops all with the intent of creating a visually entertaining and active layout for exhibition operation. A fictitious landscape was selected so that we could run rolling stock from a variety of regions and periods with the timeframe set to cover the mid-1930s through to the end of steam in the final years of the 1960s. This

suited the majority of our rolling stock.

Melbury came about after the sale of our club's previous 'N' gauge layout. We found that owing to space available at the club that we were limited to a maximum of 12ft x 3ft 4in and, to complicate a new design

further, the baseboards would have to be small enough to fit into two car boots for transport.

Eventually it was decided to have four baseboards, each 3ft 4in long and 2ft 8in wide. Two of

these were joined end to end and the others were placed at either end at right angles so that the overall length of the layout fitted that important 12ft x 3ft 4in footprint. Turning of the end boards was found to be necessary to accommodate the curves at each end which in addition provide enough space for the

gradients from one level to the next.

Ultimately we ended up with three levels. The storage yard at the rear was situated at baseboard level and consisted of six sidings which feed the second level at the front where the station is

reached via a 1-in-40 gradient. At either end of the platform is a crossover to the main line which takes trains up to the third level which is the viaduct that hides the storage yard behind and

below. It is now possible to run a train from the storage yard to the top level and allow it to run until such time as it was required to be returned to either the middle level or the storage yard.

Two reversing loops were built at baseboard level and connected to the storage yard. This made it possible >>>



for a train to traverse the layout in a clockwise direction and eventually return running anticlockwise and then go back to a clockwise direction through a series of circuits. At the lower level a small goods yard diverges from one of the reversing loops.

3D DESIGN

The baseboards were built at home by one of the members who had a fully equipped workshop. Each board was made of 3in x 1in planed softwood for the edges with two additional cross braces of 2in x 1in timber for strengthening. The position of these had to be adjusted to avoid any point motors which were to be attached beneath the 9mm Medium Density Fibreboard (MDF) baseboard surface.

The trackplan was designed on a computer and after several adjustments a copy was printed out and then cut up and converted into a three-dimensional

plan. This enabled us to find other possible problems which had not been thought of initially.

Before track laying commenced, the track bases for the middle

and upper levels were built. The curves at each end were laid out on a piece of hardboard and then cut. It was decided that the gradient for each curve would not be more than 1-in-40 and preliminary supports were put under the hardboard template to see if this would work. The supports were cut from strips of 2in x 1in timber and increased in height by about 2mm for each support along the length of the incline. A length of Peco flexible track was then laid on the hardboard template and power supplied to see if we had achieved our original objective.

Surprisingly with some very minor adjustments we had solved our original fears with the gradients and our locomotives were able to handle the train lengths that we wanted to run. Although hardboard is not generally considered as a suitable baseboard material it was found that when it is secured to wooden risers spaced around 50mm apart, track pins could be driven through the hardboard and into the uprights so that the track was held securely.

The bases for the flat areas in the centre of the layout were made from MDF like the main baseboard. Finally the curves and the centre of the third level were made in a similar fashion and when all were firmly in place a start was made on laying the track.

The track is Peco flexible track delivered in yard lengths and coupled to medium radius live frog points from the code 80 range. Wiring was carried out on

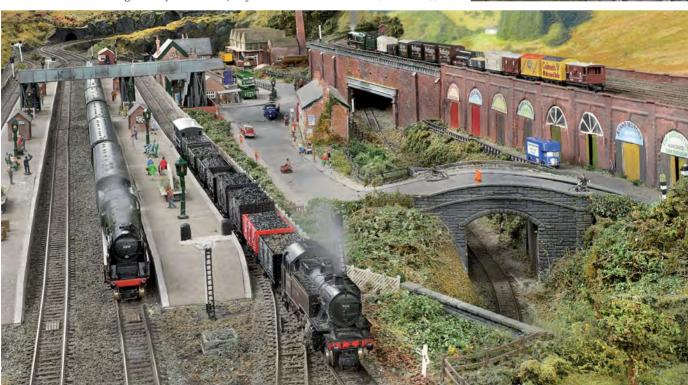
each section as it became available by Tony Clarke while the two reversing loops were laid and crossed each other on the lower level via a hand-made junction

controlled by a rotary switch so that only one line is powered at any time.

This crossover is hidden under the farm end of the station and the level above carries four tracks – the centre two going to the upper level and the outer two joining with the lower level storage yard.

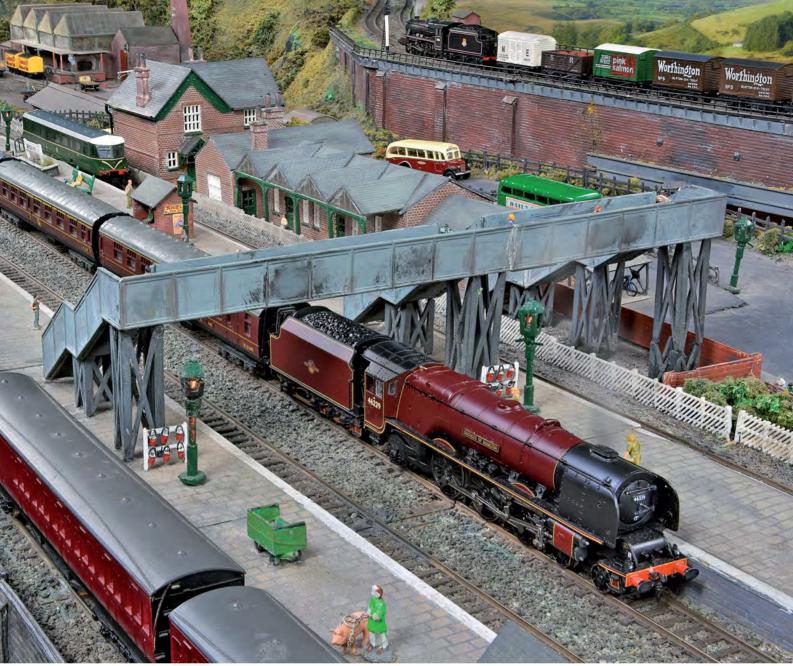
2002 saw completion of the track and electrical work for Melbury and considering the complexity of the track layout – two up mains, two down mains, two reversing loops plus a goods yard – the first engine completed the whole layout with no trouble at all, until we

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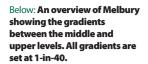




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Below left: The road 05 from Melbury station to the farm takes centre stage as 'WD' 2-8-0 90556 plods past on the upper level with a mixed goods.

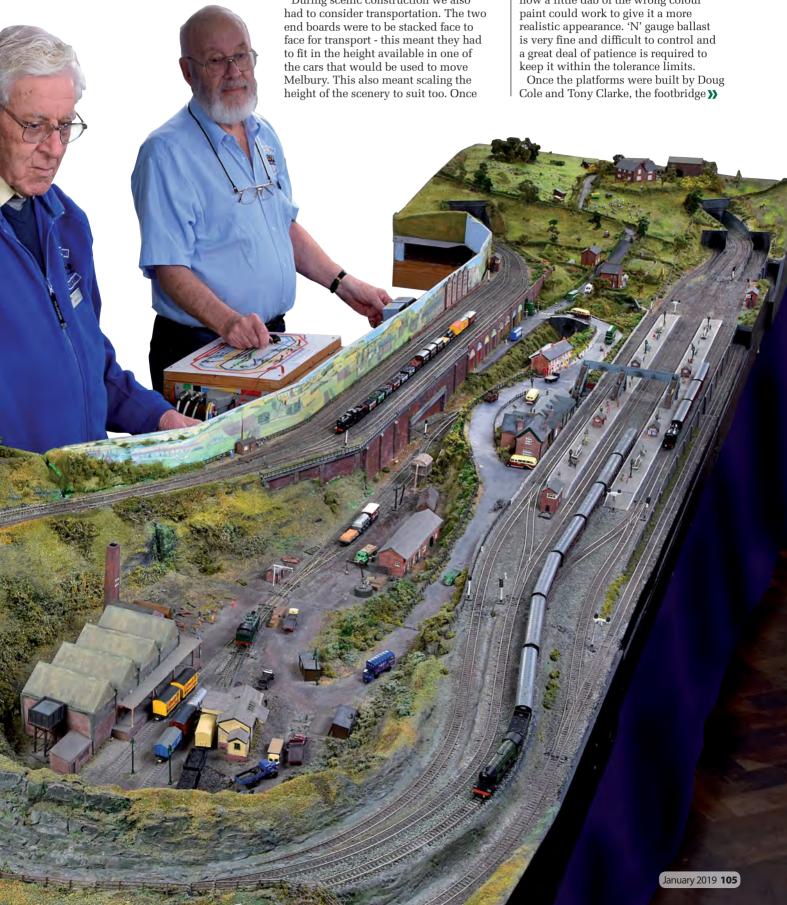
guidance of experienced modellers in the club. It started with measurements for the location of the tunnel mouths, platforms and viaduct while it had already been agreed that the left-hand end would have a rock cutting leading up to the viaduct level and that a farm would be located at the opposite end. The use of tunnels adds to the mystery of the layout as trains can disappear and reappear in different areas as they circulate its various routes.

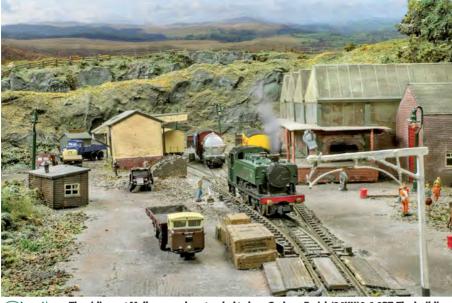
During scenic construction we also

this was agreed, the back boards were attached to the baseboard so we could work out the height and the contours.

Contour boards were cut, placed, altered and adjusted before chicken wire overlaid with plaster bandage was added on top to create the final landform. All the plaster was coloured, so that in the event of chips the plaster wouldn't show as white.

Ballasting took a year to complete and paint and it was quite surprising how a little dab of the wrong colour



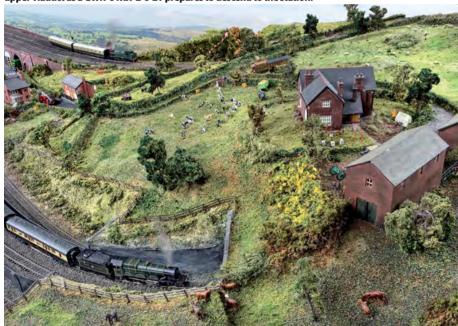

connecting the platforms was made by joining two kits together to create the necessary length and to increase the height of the steps on one side. Up at the farm, work was progressing. All the humps and bumps that were required had appeared and by this time it had been agreed to weather the whole layout to give it a 'lived in' feeling. This meant rough pastures and no pristine buildings. The stables, barn and farmhouse were all heavily weathered and the surrounding countryside was hedged with both trimmed and wild bushes. The fields had at least three types of grass added to give them different textures and colours. Animals and trees appeared together with a young lad flying a kite. Tony marked off the

railway property by becoming our fencing master. This completed our first board. The middle two boards were the next target to layout on towards completion.

HIGHER LEVEL

The viaduct covering the highest level was the biggest learning curve in weathering. It changed many times from plain red brick to various shades of brown, white and black. This has captured a good lifelike brickwork colouring. We also set the backscene back behind the viaduct to add a little depth to this area.

The station buildings arrived next followed by plenty of platform fencing. These were installed together with the Stationmaster's house which also



has a fully detailed garden. The goods yard buildings completed the scene.

The last board was where Doug and Alan learnt how to make rocks using moulds. Paint was added to the plaster which was then allowed to set. Once out of the moulds, the rocks were broken up to avoid repetition and then glued in place around the cutting sides to create a varied appearance. Work progressed on building up the cutting sides and the land beyond leading to trees and even more fencing. The goods yard was also finally completed with the addition of a smoking chimney and working crane.

Throughout Melbury is signalled with colour lights. These were made by Tony using 1.8mm LEDs on top of a 3mm

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diameter copper tube which acts as a common return. Grain of rice bulbs were used for feather indicators where required. Each signal is switched using a switching relay attached to the relevant point motor. A further relay wired to a controller changes the aspect from red to green. There is also a home made traffic light on the layout which lights up in sequence.

Our first exhibition with Melbury was in 2004 at the N Gauge Society Annual General Meeting at St Neots. It was well received by all with many comments about the multi-level designs and how the tunnels meant you never quite knew where the train was going to appear from next. It felt like mission accomplished.



The goods yard is the lowest level of the scenic section and includes a run-round loop. A Fowler '4F' 0-6-0 can be seen in the station above as a '94XX' 0-6-0PT goes about its business in the lower yard.

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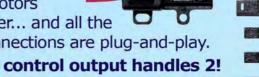

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Brake Brakers Brakers

With the recent arrival of Hornby Magazine's latest batch of exclusive 'OO' gauge diesel brake tenders, **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** explains why these unusual vehicles were built and how they were operated during the 1960s and early 1970s.

E ALL KNOW ABOUT the law of unintended consequences.
This reminds us that whatever the invention we have come up with there is always a consequence arising from it that we have never thought of. This was the case with the introduction of diesel and electric traction on our railways and occurred when the first of the new locomotives were put to work on heavy freights.

Although the Modernisation Plan foresaw that all goods trains would one day run with continuous brakes fitted to every wagon, the reality of the 1950s and 1960s was completely different. Most trains were still made up of unfitted short-wheelbase wagons coupled together with nothing more than a simple three-link coupling and these relied only on the brakes on the engine and a handbrake on the guard's van for both slowing down and stopping.

This system had worked well for more than 100 years and was perfectly adequate in a world where both train weights and speeds were modest. However, the braking effort that could be provided by the locomotive was directly related to how heavy it was, for if there was too little

weight available then its wheels would merely lock up under braking and it would be pushed along by its train. This hadn't been a problem in the days of steam because by their very nature steam locomotives are heavy but what had been overlooked was that the new diesels were much lighter than their displaced counterparts, and they were also much more powerful.

Inevitably problems began to arise with diesel-worked freight trains exhibiting poor braking performance, which in some cases resulted in signals being passed at danger and in some extreme cases in runaways. Investigations into these incidents revealed that the lighter weight of the new traction was insufficient to slow down the heaviest workings, and also that drivers tended to drive the new diesels at greater speeds than they had their steam counterparts.

RAILWAY REALISM

ADDING WEIGHT

The specification for this new tender called for a bogie vehicle with a weight of around 35tons and provided with a body sufficiently low that it could be seen over when placed in front of a locomotive, with this being as short as possible. Brakes were to be provided on all wheels with power for these being provided by two large brake cylinders, one each end of the tender. Three prototypes were ordered from Cowlairs works in Glasgow with at least the first of these being of angular construction, these were initially numbered in the DE North Eastern Region series, but later received normal numbers in the 'B' series used for goods wagons.

As the new brake tenders were an unplanned expense, construction costs were kept to a minimum by the simple expedient of using redundant materials from old coaches which were then being replaced in some numbers by the new BR standard designs. The three prototypes were mounted on surplus Gresley 8ft 6in wheelbase bogies and utilised a simple box construction which was filled with scrap materials. They were intended to be semi-permanently coupled to a locomotive and could be either pulled or pushed, for which purpose they were provided with a full set of lamp brackets so that headcodes could be exhibited.

Trials on the North Eastern Region proved the value of the new tenders and as a result orders were placed for a further 119 with all being completed between 1962 and 1964. The bulk of these were built by BR's own York works using redundant Gresley 8ft 6in bogies . Production tenders had a more rounded shape than the prototype with the top of the tender following generally a similar curve to that used on coach roofs - indeed existing materials that could be reused might have influenced this design change.

The Derbyshire Wagon Company added 51 similar tenders to the fleet while smaller numbers were built by the Central Wagon, Standard Wagon and Marcroft



Wagon Companies, although all these used redundant Stanier 9ft wheelbase bogies, which had come from ex-LMS coaches, except for two which utilised BR Mk 1 bogies. A batch of only six was built by BR's Stratford Works but these differed a great deal from the others in that they were fitted with angular rivetted bodies, having an all-up weight of 37tons, around two tons heavier than the rest of the fleet.

IN SERVICE

The biggest user of brake tenders was the North Eastern Region which employed them extensively on mineral and coal workings. Examples could be seen around West Yorkshire, Teeside and Tyneside where they were often employed on cross Pennine workings. Many examples could be found in the Midlands where they were used on similar workings, particularly originating from Toton but some were also to be found north of the border around Glasgow and Edinburgh. Several were also based at Acton, near London,

at Acton, near London, and these found their way onto the Southern via Kent coal traffic as well as onto the Midland Main Line.

either pushed by their allocated engine or pulled but their maximum speed was limited to 45mph when being propelled, as compared with 60mph when being hauled. Although technically regarded as wagons they were under the sole charge of the locomotive crew and were therefore not regarded as part of the train. Each locomotive normally worked with only one tender but there are photographs which show that occasionally one was used each side of a locomotive, or even two together when being hauled. Three were even noted being used together with a pair of Class 37s on a heavy train of rails passing through South Wales.

Propelling ceased in 1970 following a spate of incidents where train crew miscalculated the length of the tender, causing it to be pushed past a red signal, but by this time more and more trains were being provided with continuous brakes and British Rail was engaged in a massive programme of building new air-braked freight stock. As a result work for the brake tenders diminished and by mid-1973 the requirement for them had vanished completely. After this several were taken into departmental stock where they were found to be of some use on civil engineering trains



and were able to survive into the 1980s, after which they were quietly cut up.

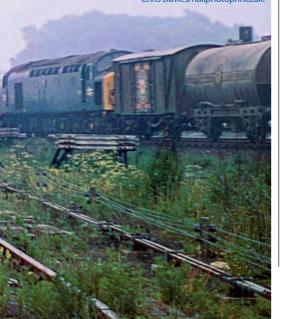
MODERN REPLICA

And there the story might have ended but for a group of enthusiasts at the Great Central Railway which, 30 years after the last brake tender was taken out of service, came up with the idea of building a replica. Recognising that there were few people who saw a brake tender, the group formulated a plan to bring this forgotten part of history back to life once again. Taking a leaf out of the original builder's book the group were able to obtain a badlywasted Mk 1 carriage which they were able to use as a donor vehicle and were also able to trace period drawings and specifications which could be used. The outer sections of the coach underframe and its bogies have been married with a completely new superstructure which has been filled, in time-honoured fashion, with piles of redundant concrete sleepers. The resulting vehicle carries the number B964122 which would have been the next one in the series and was launched into traffic in 2017.

There are many examples of unusual workings involving diesel brake tenders, including them being used by diesels rescuing steam locomotives or in pairs on either side of a locomotive. They have been coupled to everything from Class 20s to electro-diesels and were very commonly used with the early Class 44 'Peaks' and the Class 37s but could often be seen with Class 24s and Class 25s. On the Midland Region they could be seen one each side of a 'Peak' with a lengthy freight train in tow but with smaller engines they were usually used singly. They present a most unusual sight when being propelled, especially when their attendant locomotive is also hauling a train. Etm

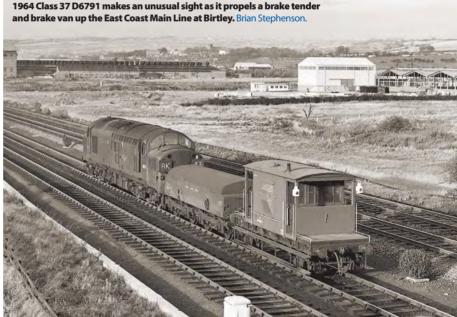

STATT PROJECTS

WAGONS

MIKE WILD has taken a break from exhibition preparations by progressing a quartet of wagon kits for his 'O' gauge collection.



E HAVE A VERY BUSY modelling schedule for the magazine, but I still enjoy working on my own kit building and weathering projects. Lately I've been attempting to clear the decks by finishing off a handful of Parkside Models 'O' gauge wagon kits before I dig into my next rolling stock model in 7mm scale – an lan Kirk Kits Gresley full brake.

Top of the list for completion is a Parkside Models LNER 20ton hopper wagon (Cat No. PS108). I built most of it around four or five months ago but, with one thing and another, it has been sat waiting for the final details and painting to be carried out. In fact, I'd already painted the underframe and body, but I had put off making the handrails which would allow me to add the finishing touches.

Having dug out the materials and tools I needed to make the brass handrails – a job which surprised me by how quickly I had them shaped and fitted. Next, transfers from the sheet supplied with the wagon were applied to put this wagon into full BR unfitted grey livery suitable for the late 1950s and early 1960s.

I'd intended from the start that this wagon

wouldn't go into service until it was fully painted and weathered – I know what I'm like: if a part-complete model makes it onto the track it takes a long time to come back off for paint! With the LNER 20ton hopper I stuck to that and ultimately I brought it up to the standard I wanted using a set of MIG Ammo rust paints for rust patches on the body, Lifecolor Liquid Pigments Smoke Wash to tone down the fresh BR grey body paint and a combination of Lifecolor Frame Dirt followed by Burned Black mixed with Dirty Black for the underframe.

also added to the axlebox covers and buffer heads to finish the wagon off as you see it here.

PRODUCTION LINE

Next in for attention was a Slaters Shock Absorbing open wagon (7060) - a model which I reckon I built at least 18 months ago. It got onto the layout, but then never came back off for painting - until now.

The underframe was decorated with Lifecolor Matt Black, as per the LNER 20ton hopper, while the body has been painted with the same manufacturer's BR bauxite colour. So far the floor has received its first wood colour, but more layers will be applied using Lifecolor wood effect acrylics to build up a realistic finish in this area. This wagon is ongoing as I now need to source and apply transfers to this wagon.

Continuing the wagon theme is another vehicle which has been waiting a long time for paint - a Parkside Models BR 20ton hopper (PS104). Like the Shock Absorbing wagon, this one has been waiting in the wings for paint for guite some time and it will be next onto the workbench while I'm waiting for transfers to arrive for the Shock open. Like the LNER hopper it will be finished in BR grey with a black underframe using Lifecolor paints. I'm also planning to use an alternative method to create the rust patches on the body of this vehicle, though still with the same MIG Ammo paints. Watch this space for a future update.

BRAKE VAN DEVELOPMENT

Also in the final throws of construction is a Slaters LMS 20ton brake van (7053). I started this earlier in the year and it reached the stage of being a runner with all its body built, a fully detailed interior (though there are a couple of items left to paint inside) and all bufferbeam drawgear. However, like the LNER hopper it stalled at the

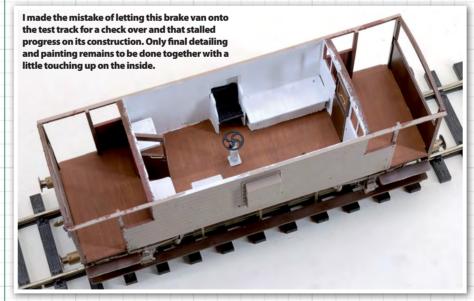

handrail stage, but I'm planning to get this model back on the workbench in the near future so that I can complete the exterior detailing and paint it in BR bauxite to bring up the rear of goods trains.

Modelling in 'O' gauge is proving to be an absorbing pastime (when I have the time) which is being driven by my ambitions to get my new garden railway project ready to operate in 2019 - that's another story that I will come

back to in a future issue. On the rolling stock front more is on the way including the LNER parcels van mentioned earlier and a Parkside Models Pipe wagon to bring more variety to the goods fleet and plans to repaint a Heljan BG into BR lined maroon amongst others. One thing is for sure, 'O' gauge has definitely got me back into building my own models and that can only be a good thing.
