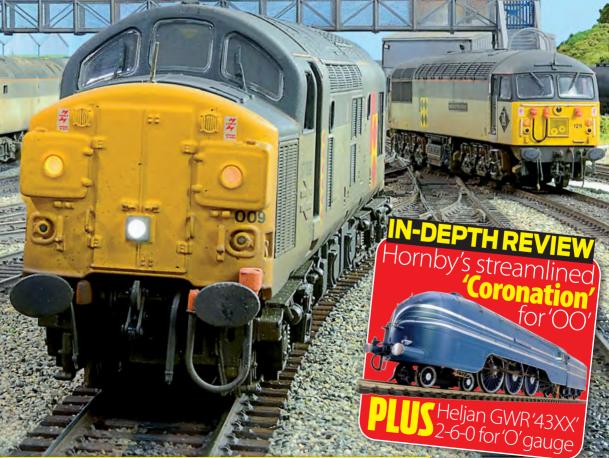

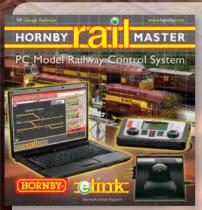

In the lead-up to Christmas many railway modellers will be purchasing a Hornby Elite and RailMaster, or the RailMaster/eLink pack or even an eLink enabled train set such as the Western Master. Whilst it is simple to install and configure RailMaster on a Windows computer as long as the instructions are followed, some may come a cropper if this is not done correctly and it can lead to frustration.

Installing from the RailMaster CD or via Internet download

If you purchased an eLink-enabled train set, such as the Western Master, Western Express or Majestic or if you purchased the RailMaster and eLink pack then you will have been supplied with a CD containing the RailMaster software and also an activation key. If you are looking to use RailMaster with an Elite or do not have a CD-Rom drive in your computer, you can download the latest installation from www.rail-master.com/rm_setup.exe and install that way. In fact, this is probably the best thing to do in any event as the rm_setup.exe file always contains the very latest version of RailMaster. RailMaster will run on all versions of Windows from XP to 10, including 32-bit and 64-bt variants.

To install from a supplied RailMaster CD just pop it into your computer's CD-Rom drive. If you are prompted by Windows to open, browse, run etc. just browse to the CD. You can also use Windows Explorer or My Computer to do this. You should find a setup.exe or rm_setup.exe file in the root folder of the CD.

You may not see the ".exe" extension on the file, just "setup" or "rm_setup" if your Windows system hides file extensions.

You will, however, see the word "Application" to the right of the program.

When you have located the file just right-click on it and select "Run as administrator". You may need to enter your Windows Administrator ID and password to proceed. You can then just run through the installation, acknowledging each screen and clicking on "Next" until the installation is completed.



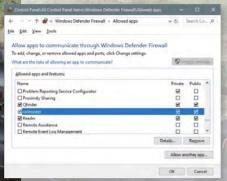
When finished you should see several new icons on your Windows Desktop, including RailMaster, some PDF manuals and a knowledge-base.

You are now almost ready to run RailMaster for the first time, but before doing so you should just ensure that the program has the relevant permissions to run. Right-click on the RailMaster icon, select "Properties" from the menu and then click on the Compatibility tab. Ensure the box "Run as administrator" has a tick in it. This will ensure problem-free running on Windows. For completeness, also enable Windows 7 compatibility.

Excluding from antivirus and firewall software

In most cases problems associated with activating RailMaster or submitting an upgrade order from within the software are caused by either antivirus software or your Windows firewall blocking RailMaster's communications.



It is therefore important that RailMaster is added as a full exclusion to your antivirus software and also to your Windows firewall.

Every antivirus package has its own way of adding a program as an exclusion so you will need to see the Help information for your particular program.

You should also find a

PDF guide on your Windows Desktop called Internet Security. This was installed with RailMaster and is a useful guide to adding the program as a full exclusion for several popular AV packages. Bear in mind, though, that AV programs are updated regularly and so the instructions in the guide may not match your program precisely. One AV program, which seems to be the bain of some people's lives, is McAfee. This is because it has an additional function called NetGuard and, although you may think you have added a program as an exception to McAfee, if you forget to disable NetGuard it will continue blocking.

After adding RailMaster as a full exclusion to your antivirus program, you should then go into the Windows Firewall (from the Control Panel or Windows Search facility) and ensure that RailMaster has been added as an exclusion for both Public and Private networks as in the figure above. When you run RailMaster for the first time, most often Windows will pop up a message asking if you would like to exclude RailMaster in the Windows Firewall. If you clicked on Public and Private networks here and then closed the window, checking the Firewall should just confirm that RailMaster is already unblocked. If it is not there, or just Public or Private has a ticked in it then click the "Change Settings" button and either "Allow another app.." and navigate to the C:\Program files (x86)\RailMaster folder and add RailMaster.exe or just tick both Private and Public checkboxes and save if the program is already listed.

Attaching your DCC controller

RailMaster will work with the Hornby Elite, eLink and Select DCC controllers. The Elite and eLink both have a USB port built in to them, however, to use the Select you need to purchase the new Hornby Select-a-Link USB interface cable.

In all three cases, installation of the controller is automated by Windows when you connect the USB cable and power up the controller. Windows uses its own USB port serial driver for all Hornby DCC controllers and will download it from Microsoft's own update servers. You should allow this process to completely finish.

In some cases, if this process is interrupted, perhaps by a poor Internet connection, or it did not work correctly, you should uninstall the driver and start again. To do this you will need to go in to the Windows Control Panel and open the Device Manager. The Device



Manager lists all hardware in your computer and there should be an entry called something like "LPT and Com Ports". If you expand this entry you may see an entry relating to your DCC controller with a yellow warning triangle. If this is the case you should right-click on the entry, select Uninstall (ensure you have also ticked "Delete the driver", if present) then allow Windows to uninstall the driver. After that, just disconnecting your DCC controller's USB cable, waiting a few seconds, then reconnecting it should allow Windows to download and install the driver correctly.

When Windows has installed the USB port serial driver for your DCC controller you should open the driver entry from the Windows Device Manager, select Properties and go into the port settings to make a note of the Com Port assigned by Windows. Whilst in there ensure the Bits per Second speed is set to 115200. Knowing the Com Port, you can close down the Device Manager, start RailMaster and go into Settings and enter the Com Port number. Always use the same USB port to connect your DCC controller otherwise Windows may assign a different Com Port number. When you then shut down and restart RailMaster it should start up normally and within a few seconds you will be able to use it to perform the next step, setting up your track plan and locomotives. These will will the subjects of the next RailMaster Revealed articles.

Procedure for starting up each time

When running RailMaster every time, ensure your DCC controller is connected to the same USB port every time, or you will have problems and will need to change the Com Port settings. Generally, you should switch on your computer and let it start up. You then power-up your DCC controller and let Windows connect to it. You may hear a sound associated with this. When the DCC controller has been powered up, start RailMaster and it will communicate with the controller and be ready for use in a few seconds.

Following the above instructions carefully will ensure trouble-free operation of RailMaster and your layout.

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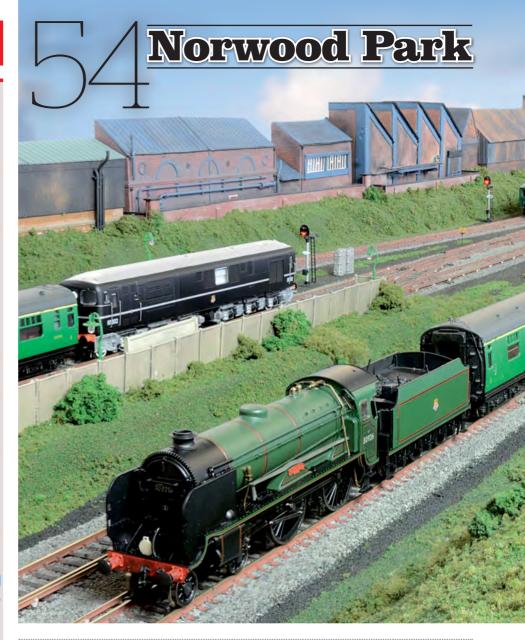

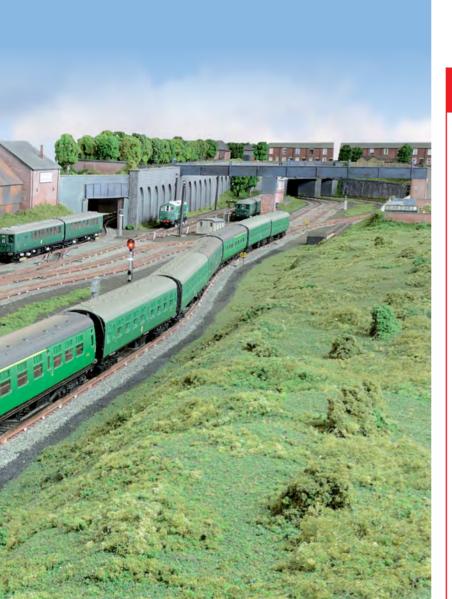

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3 new steam Hornby announces new

Prairie' 2-6-2T has already reached the engineering sample stage. It is being released as both '5101' and '61XX' class locomotives with release expected in the summer. ONDON MIDLAND and Scottish (LMS), Great Western Railway (GWR) and industrial locomotives are heading Hornby's new version will allow Hornby to model almost all variants of the Stanier 'OO' gauge steam line-up in its exciting new 2019 catalogue. 'Princess' fleet except for 6200 in Top of the billing are brand-new original condition and 6202 in its models of the LMS Stanier 'Princess experimental 'Turbomotive' form. (DCC) decoder socket in the tender

Royal'4-6-2, GWR'5101'/'61XX' 2-6-2T and the Peckett 'B2' 0-6-0ST.

The 'Princess Royal' - introduced by Stanier as the LMS' first 'Pacific' in 1933 and totalling 12 locomotives - has been part of the Hornby portfolio since the days of Tri-ang. The first version was released in 1950 before being replaced in 1984 and most recently in 2001. The new 2019

The initial range consists of 6201 Princess Elizabeth in LMS lined crimson (Cat No. R3709), 46206 Princess Marie Louise in BR lined blue with early crests (R3711) and 46207 Princess Arthur of Connaught in BR lined maroon with late crests (R3713). All will feature a locomotive drive mechanism, detail differences, an 8-pin Digital Command Control

and space for a 28mm round speaker. In addition to DCC ready versions (without a decoder for analogue operation), Hornby is also releasing the 'Princess Royals' with a factory fitted Hornby decoder.

At the catalogue launch Hornby showed a stereo 3D printed sample of the new 'Princess' illustrating progress so far in its

development. Release is expected in November 2019 with prices set £189.99 for DCC ready versions and £204.99 for DCC fitted models.

The GWR 2-6-2T will cover the 'Large Prairie' family including the '5101' and more powerful '61XX' classes. It will replace the long standing ex-Airfix/Dapol model of the Collett designed '5101' 2-6-2T.



locomotives Princess, 'Prairie' and Peckett

140'5101s' were built between 1929 and 1949 together with 70'61XXs' which had a higher pressure boiler and other internal modifications for use on London Paddington commuter trains.

The new'Prairie' will allow for GWR and BR period locomotives as well as featuring an 8-pin DCC decoder socket and NEM coupling pockets with small tension lock couplings. A choice of DCC ready and DCC fitted models will be offered with prices set at £139.99 and £159.99 respectively. Release is anticipated in summer 2019.

Four versions are planned for release in the first year of the new 'Large Prairie' covering 4154 in GWR lined green livery (R3719), 6110 in Great Western green (R3721), 6145 in BR black with early crests (R3723) and 4160 in BR lined green with late crests (R3725).

The Peckett 'B2' 0-6-0ST models a small class of 40 locomotives built in small batches between 1905 and 1931. It follows on from the compact Peckett 'W4' 0-4-0ST released in December 2016 and at the time of the catalogue launch had already reached the decorated sample stage. Release is expected in the second quarter of 2019 with prices set at £109.99 for DCC ready models and £129.99 for DCC fitted versions. The 'B2' is to have a 6-pin decoder socket and also features a detailed cab interior, turned metal wheels, NEM coupling pockets and all wheel pick-up.

Three versions are planned for the first year covering Sherwood Colliery lined green liveried No. 4 (works no. 1678) *Sherwood* (R3693), Associated Portland Cement dark green liveried 1378 *Westminster* (R3694) and National Coal Board blue livered 1455 (R3695).

In addition to the range of brandnew items Hornby is producing 26 further steam locomotives in 2019 using its extensive catalogue. These include two new versions of the new'Lord Nelson' 4-6-0 in BR lined green, a wartime black liveried first series Bulleid air-smoothed 'Merchant Navy' 4-6-2, a return for the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway 'Pug' 0-4-0ST, the ever popular 46232 *Duchess of Montrose* in BR lined green, an ROD liveried 'J36' 0-6-0 plus BR blue liveried

models of 'A3' 60103 Flying Scotsman and 'A4' 60022 Mallard. Unique BR purple 'A4' 60028 Walter K Whigham is also being released in 2019.

Special editions include a model of Gresley 'A3' 4-6-2 4472 Flying Scotsman with double tender and gold motion (R3738) to celebrate 50 years since its tour of the United States of America and the start of a new collection titled one:one modelling locomotives which are currently stored at Locomotive Storage's new facility in the former Hornby Margate factory. First in the new series are models of Greslev 'A4' 4-6-2 4464 Bittern in LNER garter blue with twin tenders and recent arrival Stanier 'Black Five' 4-6-0 45379 in BR lined black with late crests.

offered with a choice of open and enclosed cabs with four versions due for release in the first tranche. These cover Ruston and Hornsby green, John Dewar red and white, Queen Anne Whisky brown and cream and War Department green. Each will have a 6-pin decoder socket and to aid operation across points the 48DS will be supplied with a Conflat 'match truck' with additional pickups. This can be disconnected

from the locomotive if required.

In traditional style Hornby's diesel and electric range is to benefit from a number of new releases during the year including seven new Class 66s in some of the classes most popular liveries priced at £74.99 each, two new versions of the 2018 released Class 87, new liveries for the Class 92, a 2-HIL (2-HAL Driving Motor Brake Second and 2-BIL Driving Lavatory Composite) in BR Southern Region green, unique Northern Rail/Royal Air Force liveried Class 156 156480, an LNER Azuma in the East Coast operators new colours and more.

More Twin Track Sounds

Hornby's popular collection of standalone Twin Track Sound (TTS) digital sound decoders is set to expand this year with 11 new locomotive types added.

Amongst the new audio projects planned is a LMS 'Princess Royal' 4-6-2 TTS decoder, together with SR 'Merchant Navy' 4-6-2 (rebuilt), LMS 'Black Five' 4-6-0, LNER 'B12' 4-6-0, 'J36' 0-6-0, 'Q6' 0-8-0, 'P2' 2-8-2 and BR 'Britannia' 4-6-2 steam projects. New diesel projects include

BR Class 08 shunter, Class 50 Co-Co and Class 43 High Speed Train Valenta TTS decoders, the latter offered as a twin-pack.

Hornby's TTS decoders feature Back EMF and come with either a 28mm diameter or 40mm x 20mm 80hm speaker attached, depending on the application. The prices are starting at £41.99 for single decoders and £69.99 for the HST Valenta twin pack.

RAILROAD 2019

New to Hornby's RailRoad range this year are ten locomotives, five carriages and a breakdown crane.

Steam locomotives include two industrial 0-4-0Ts and Hornby's Caledonian 'Pug' 0-4-0ST, while the GWR 'Dean Single' 4-2-2 reappears as 3031 *Achilles* in Great Western lined green (Cat No. R3759). Also amongst the steam highlights is BR Crosti-boiler '9F' 2-10-0 92028 in weathered BR black (R3756).

New diesel additions include Class 47/7s 47798 *Prince William* (R3757) and 47799 *Prince Henry* (R3758) in EWS Royal Train livery together with Class 43 High Speed Train Power Cars (R3608), each utilising Hornby's re-engineered former Lima tooling.

Rolling stock includes former Tri-ang Hornby Clerestory coaches (R4913/R4914) in GWR chocolate and cream, a pack of three LMS 'Coronation Scot' Stanier carriages (R4906) in lined blue, based on Hornby's older tooling and a red breakdown crane (R6881), again utilising former Lima tooling.

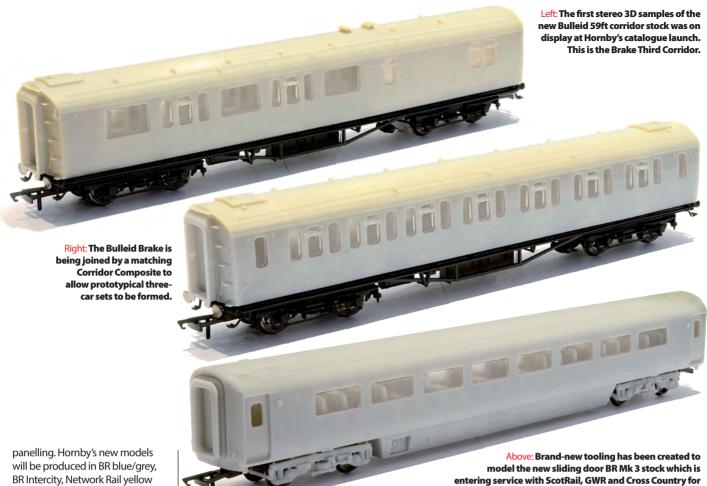

For modellers of the Southern scene, Hornby is producing all-new **Bulleid 59ft Corridor Composite** (CK) and Brake Corridor Third (BTK) carriages. The prototypes entered service in the mid-1940s and were usually formed into three-car sets with two BTKs sandwiching a CK. Given there were more BTKs required than CKs, Hornby is planning four BTKs and two CKs in SR malachite green with Southern lettering and an equal amount in BR (SR) green too. Twelve models are planned in total, with detail differences incorporated - early 3D-printed examples at Hornby's 2019 range launch displayed flush and panel sided BTKs, for example. Priced at £47.99 each, they are expected to be released during April/May 2019.

Diesel and electric era modellers will benefit this year with the introduction of a range of BR Mk 2f carriages covering First Open, Tourist Open Standard and Brake Open Standard coaches in a wide selection of liveries ranging from BR blue and grey to the latest ScotRail liveried examples. Introduced in the early 1970s, BR's Mk 2f carriages featured full air-conditioning and made more use of plastic interior

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CONTROLLER MAKEOVER

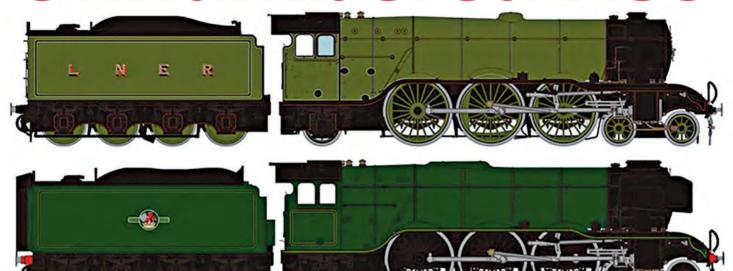

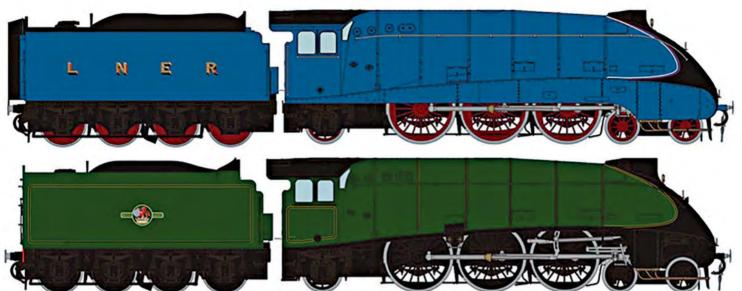

Y NAME IS STEVE Smith. I'm 53 and welcome to my very first exhibition layout build - Thornley TMD. Set in the late 1980s and early 1990s, Thornley is a fictional place based around Yorkshire and covers the BR blue era up to the subsectored grey liveries that once could be seen around the country in abundance.

I've been fascinated by railways since I was a small boy, with my father being an ex-signalman. When I was younger he would often take me over to Taplow station on the Western Region to watch the trains and the love affair with railways began. Later on in my childhood I would create a model railway that went around the outside of my bedroom and I remember having to crawl under the boards when opening the door.

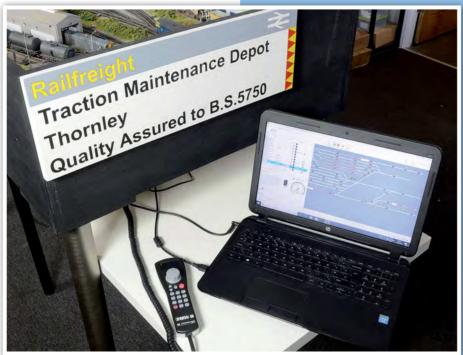
Does that sound familiar to anyone?

That was more than 35 years ago and it wasn't until 2014 that I would get my reintroduction to model railways. I saw an advert for a model railway exhibition down the road in Taunton, Somerset, and thought I'd go and have a look. Wow - how the industry had changed. The models were more detailed and some had sound too. This for me was amazing. The quality of the layouts was simply stunning and it was then that I decided to venture back into model railways followed by an impulse purchase of a Bachmann Class 66 in Colas livery as it modelled locomotives that passed through Bridgwater in Somerset where I lived.

I had no layout, so initially I had to admire the Class 66 from its box. A lucky find on Facebook brought me to a dedicated group for model railways, which I started browsing. Here I found everything and the memories of being a railway enthusiast in the 1990s came flooding back. I saw lots of models from that era and so I decided that was going to be the period that I would model. I sold the Class 66 and started collecting motive power appropriate to my chosen era.

Around the same time I commissioned a small diesel depot layout to be built. It measured 7ft x 2ft 6in and fitted neatly against the wall in my home office. A few months later I made the trip north to collect Thornley TMD which was a three-road, three locomotive deep maintenance depot and service shed with a small oil terminal. I spent many a month enjoying the layout and added to it, but I wanted more. The decision was made to build my own layout something I hadn't done for more than 35 years - but it would be radically different to that bedroom railway I once had. >>>

NEW DESIGNS

I live in a modern three-storey town house. In the loft there were rafters everywhere so that ruled out that space for a railway. The next choice was to use the garage or build a shed in the garden, of which the latter was the more favourable option. After much research and deciding on the maximum size I could accommodate in the garden I purchased a 4m x 3m log cabin as a kit. Four weeks later hundreds of pieces of wood arrived to be stored in the garage prior to me assembling them into the structure they were designed for.

The cabin took me two months to complete in my spare time and days off. This included everything from the initial build to adding insulation in both the floor and ceiling, plaster boarding the roof, adding LED lighting and electric power, undercoating the timber and final top coating in two-tone Railfreight grey which was supplied by my local Dulux decorator by scanning a Heljan Class 47.

In May 2016 the cabin was ready to have a layout built into it. My commission layout, Thornley TMD, had now been sold and the new layout was to use the same name which is derived from my two favourite depots – Thorn(aby) and (Tins)ley. The new layout was to focus heavily on a diesel depot scene again with a yard and oil terminal as before, though much bigger, and this time there would be space for a running line around the cabin which I planned would feature a viaduct and storage yard.

The focus for the first 18 months would be to concentrate on completing the depot and yard scenes. The framework for the top level was simply 2in x 1in battens with 9mm plywood on top and foam insulation glued to the plywood to provide some sound-proofing. This area was made up of three baseboards each measuring 4ft x 2ft 4in giving a total 12ft length for the depot.

of code 100 track. Plus, as I was running modern locomotives I didn't need to worry about the rail depth as modern models have finer flanges. I painstakingly painted every single sleeper on the layout and inner and outer sides of the rails. I may be mad, but I was extremely pleased with how the finished result came out. I used products from the MIG paints range including track primer, wood primer and track wash.

The ballast used on the layout is real ballast from the Mendip quarries and this was supplied, like the majority of the items on Thornley, by James Hudson at DCC Train Automation. The traditional 50/50 mix of PVA glue and water was used to glue the loose ballast in place.

Each board of Thornley has distinctive features. Board one is home to the large diesel depot. It is a seven-road design with enough space to accommodate three locomotives on each line plus there is a lifting shed behind to accommodate another two locomotives. All eight roads have Peco inspection pits fitted and each one was fully illuminated with LEDs too. In total there were 108 LEDs in the inspection pits, and they look great when switched on.

The base of the diesel depot was built from 2mm MDF cut to accommodate the pits and then the whole area was covered in tile grout to form the concrete base under the building. I used grey grout to give the appearance of concrete and weathered it further with powders.

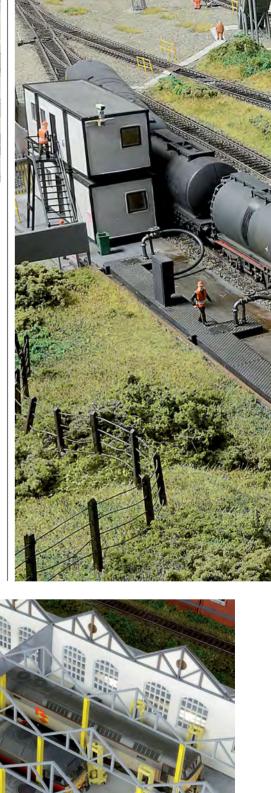
The main diesel depot building is made from plywood and MDF using a laser cutter and has been produced by James at DCC Train Automation. The windows were all cut separately, painted and installed. The roof supports are laser cut too and the beams and girders were all painted yellow.

The second board houses the remainder of the diesel depot access lines and also a six road yard which bears a slight resemblance to the far yard at Tinsley. The backscene is highlighted by a long row of Skytrex cast resin warehouse fronts. These were painted with Halfords Red Oxide primer to give the colour of bricks followed by dry brushing with orange paint to highlight sections of brick. The window areas were painted black prior to the window frames being picked out with a white pen. Once dry the warehouses were given a coat of matt varnish and then weathered with powders for a dirty finish.

However, the main focal point of board two is the impressive footbridge which spans the yard and gives access for the crew to reach the depot and oil terminal. The footbridge was a commission built by Robert Sanderson (RS Modelmaking) and he did an outstanding job.

The third board offers access to the yard together with a headshunt which allows locomotives to come out of the depot and also a run-round loop for locomotives arriving with fuel tankers for the oil terminal. The terminal itself has a single road that can accommodate up to seven tankers. The fuel line kits are from Knightwing while the large fuel storage tanks at the end of the layout are by Piko.

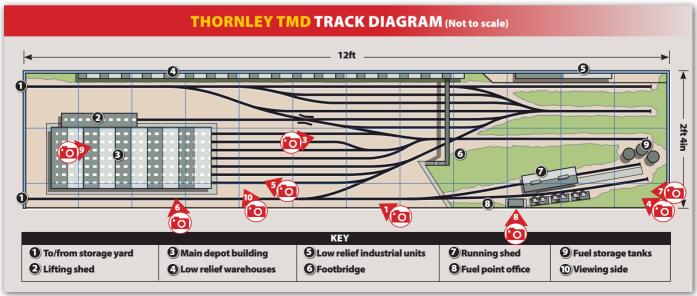
Inside the depot the pits are illuminated with LEDs. A Class 47 has just been towed inside by a Class 08 for engine repairs.

The backscene on board three includes four small industrial buildings with a small access path before the security fencing to the railway. Scenery here is a mixture of Woodland Scenics products and the wooden fencing at the front of the terminal is from Model Railway Scenery.

ITRAIN CONTROL

All the points have servos fitted for operation and once installed these were tested - they were so quiet compared to SEEP motors that I was originally going to use. The servos are connected to a VPEB OC32 control board which allows operation either by hand held control in accessory mode or via computer control which was the way I wanted to go. To this end I had iTrain software installed on my laptop.

The layout has been wired for Digital Command Control (DCC) operation and for computer control with five feedback modules installed underneath. This gives more than 80 block detection sections that can be controlled via iTrain software on my computer. The layout was designed in the software to match as closely as possible and every section of block track measured to allow locomotives to stop in the right sections.

The software will allow multiple locomotives to run at once, something that I couldn't do with a single handheld controller, but I also wanted to have the option to manually drive locomotives or have them run under computer control. iTrain allows this and it really brings the layout to life as I can control one locomotive

myself while the computer moves other engines around the scene. Of course, if you just want to operate the layout manually it can be done this way. To make all this functionality possible there are a lot of wires underneath the layout – not easy for someone who is colour blind!

ROLLING STOCK

The layout can hold around 60 locomotives – something that you could have seen back then at a busy depot on a weekend with locomotives stabled or undergoing maintenance. The stock for Thornley includes five Bachmann Class 08s,

a Hornby Class 09, three Bachmann Class 20s, four Class 37s – three from Bachmann, one by ViTrains – a grand total of 28 Class 47s from Heljan and Bachmann, four Hornby Class 56s, a Heljan Class 58 and five Hornby Class 60s.

Around half a dozen have been fitted with sound decoders to give some added atmosphere to the layout, but I have found that having too many sound equipped locomotives running at one time in a depot scene gets overpowering. With that in mind I made the decision not to invest in further sound locomotives, but to have all the fleet professionally weathered.

My favourite locomotive on Thornley is Heljan Class 47 47120 Osprey in BR 'Large Logo' blue. It holds a great memory for me as this locomotive was my penultimate Class 47 that I needed to clear the class when I was a 'spotter' all those years ago.

At the time 47120 was allocated to Inverness and, living in Berkshire at the time, I decided to take a railway holiday to Scotland to try and see the locomotive. I remember visiting Inverness depot and asking the foreman if there was a chance of me looking around the depot. He kindly agreed and took me around with the hope that 47120 was on shed. It was nowhere to be seen and as I was leaving I asked the foreman if he knew where it was. He looked it up on TOPS for me and I remember him coming back to me chuckling. I was hoping that he was going to tell me that it was due into Inverness later, but no, 47120 had worked south and was currently at Southampton Freightliner Terminal!

I did eventually get to see 47120 at Old Oak Common of all places and I have fond memories of seeing it at Tinsley after its transfer south. I had the Heljan model professionally weathered and its Tinsley unofficial name *Osprey* added to replicate the photograph I took of it inside Tinsley depot just weeks before it was withdrawn.

CHANGING TIMES

The scenery at the front of board three has changed dramatically as I made the decision to abandon the running loop, viaduct and storage yard and to sell Thornley. This was to allow me to venture into 'O' gauge so the first half of 2018 focused on dismantling the layout and reframing

it with 18mm plywood to allow it to be taken to exhibitions with a new owner.

The layout has been at DCC Train Automation where they have as good as rebuilt its structure with new framing, rewiring in places, repositioning of the footbridge and the addition of more scenery. I wish now that I had built it like this in the beginning, but we learn as we progress.

It has been an exciting two years building Thornley and for a first time build on this scale I'm very pleased with how it turned out. In fact, it is better than I had hoped. I have learnt a lot during the build and have to thank James at DCC Train

Automation for his assistance and plethora of knowledge when it comes to DCC and I'm already looking forward to him helping me again with construction of Project Zero – my new 'O' gauge diesel depot that will be started in the coming months.

Thornley TMD has now been sold and will be heading north to be enjoyed by its new owners and I hope that they extend the layout with a storage yard to bring it out on the exhibition circuit in the future. My next layout, Project Zero, will be built for exhibition use from the get-go and I look forward to that day when it goes on the circuit to be enjoyed by the public.



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Double Heading

TREVOR JONES looks at why double-heading is used and reveals some combinations that can be used on your layout.

ACK IN MYTRAIN SPOTTING days copping a 'double header' was always a delight and that sense of excitement stayed with me and carried forward into my modelling. I regularly double-head trains on my hilly garden layout but at exhibitions examples of doubleheading are rarely seen. From time to time questions come in to Hornby Magazine asking how to double-head and when and why the railway companies did it, so we thought it was high time we looked into the subject to offer a better insight into this appealing type of train operation.

In Victorian times the development of the steam locomotive had not kept up with the loads imposed on them and as demand to move passengers and freight grew many trains had to be double-headed to cope with the loads. A more complicated reason for double heading was a restriction on axle loading. Many routes had strict axle weight limits which meant that larger more powerful locomotives were banned from using certain lines. The only option here with a heavy train was to use two lighter locomotives to provide the power necessary to move the train.

One of the most exciting forms of double-heading came on routes with extreme gradients such as the formidable Devon Banks between Exeter and Plymouth or the torturous climb to Shap on the West Coast Main Line. Here the heaviest trains needed assistance which may have been in the form of bankers (a locomotive added at the rear of the train to assist on gradients) or simply by adding another locomotive to the front when the train weight exceeded a particular locomotive's permitted load. Sometimes in these cases it was to ensure that the train

could keep up to a tight schedule. In other instances a second locomotive may be added en route to assist an underperforming locomotive or to return a partially failed one to its home depot. There were also seasonal reasons for double heading. Balancing motive

power requirements for holiday traffic and seasonable freight when perishable crops had to be moved it was often necessary to return locomotives to home depots or for other depots to borrow locomotives rather than feed light engine movements into



a cramped timetable. In these situations locomotives would often double-head a service train simply to get a second engine in position at another depot for additional services.

There were also times when there was a shortage of suitable motive power for heavy trains and which result in double-headed workings while special trains and railtours have often been the source of this type of working.

REGIONAL COMBINATIONS

So where could double-heading be seen? Well, almost anywhere, and the further back in time the more frequent it was. If we examine the period from 1948 until the end of steam there were particular locations where many passenger trains were double-headed daily. On the Western, the South Devon Banks between Exeter and Plymouth saw combinations including all GWR named classes and many BR Standard classes. The main train engine - usually a 'Castle' or 'King' - could be joined by a range of different designs such as 'Moguls', 'Manors', 'Halls' or even North British Type 2 hydraulics. In fact even the 'Warship' Type 4 hydraulics have been used to pilot heavy steam hauled expresses at holiday times.

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The Somerset & Dorset (S&D) line was famous for its combinations of Midland Railway, London Midland & Scottish Railway, Southern Railway and British Railways classes, double-heading inter-regional trains, local trains and freight services. This variety made the S&D a fantastic place to observe double-headed workings as combinations could be as strange as a Fowler '7F' 2-8-0 piloting a Bulleid air-smoothed 'Light Pacific', a Fowler '2P' 4-4-0 working with a'4F'0-6-0 or a BR'4MT'2-6-0 piloting a Southern 'Pacific'. The possibilities were near endless.

The Southern Region westwards from Exeter had trains which split to different destinations and so departed and arrived at Exeter with up to three locomotives at the head and three Bulleid 'Light Pacifics' have been noted. In the South Eastern section certain trains to Kent were always doubleheaded including the 'Night Ferry'; for years this consisted of two 'L1' 4-4-0s but 'E1s' and 'Light Pacifics' took their share and many unusual combinations could be seen on freight, empty stock workings, holiday and special traffic.

On the Midland Railway, in the south many trains from St Pancras were double headed for their hilly routes to the north, partly because of the Midland's 'small engine policy' which meant that it had a larger fleet of smaller locomotives. '2P' and 'Compound' 4-4-0s, 'Black Fives' and 'Jubilees' were involved, but two '4F' 0-6-0s have been seen on boat trains to Tilbury Docks. At Euston at the weekends and at holiday times one could guarantee to see at least a couple in a day's spotting, usually involving 'Black Fives', 'Patriots' and 'Jubilees' but BR Standard types were not unknown. In Lancashire and Yorkshire and

northwards, LMS and London and North Eastern Railway doubleheaders were regular sights.

On the Eastern Region only rarely was a double header seen at its London termini but in East Anglia and in the north many combinations of locomotives could be seen. In East Anglia classes regularly involved were 'E4' 2-4-0, 'J15' 0-6-0, 'D16' 4-4-0, 'B12' 4-6-0 and 'B1' 4-6-0. In Scotland, where many lines had weight restrictions and were hilly, examples of all

types of locomotive combinations were a daily occurrences. Branch lines were not exempt, as public boarding schools often had special traffic at the beginning and end of the term. The pupils arrived and departed by a double-headed train, as did the movement of the regiments from military installations. There was also the seasonal perishable traffic and numerous specials as steam approached its finality that transferred these minor branches.)



The Somerset and Dorset Railway between Bath and Evercreech Junction was a hotspot for double-headed workings because of its challenging gradients. Plus, with its joint operation between the Midland and Southern the variety of combinations was second to none. On August 15 1959 Fowler '7F' 2-8-0 53808 and BR'5MT' 4-6-0 73051 pass Midford with the 10.28am Manchester-Bournemouth West. Hugh Ballantyne/Railphotoprints.uk.

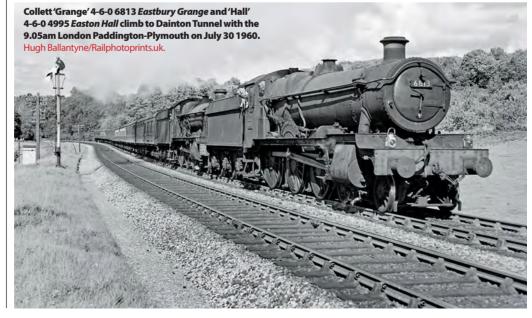


UNUSUAL COMBINATIONS

There were many common pairings such as multiples of the same class on the Midland Region, but even the unthinkable isn't as impossible as you might think. These are just a handful of examples of the more unusual combinations which have been seen and recorded in the steam era:

- SR 'M7' 0-4-4T and LNER' V2' 2-6-2 from Basingstoke to Waterloo with the 'Bournemouth Belle'.
- LNER'B1'4-6-0 and 'L1'2-6-4T on a suburban train from King's Cross.
- SR'E4'0-6-2T and BR'4MT'2-6-4T on a permanent way train from Groombridge to Three Bridges.
- LNER'K3' 2-6-0 and BR'Britannia' 4-6-2 between Ely and Soham on the 'North Country Continental'.
- GWR'61XX'2-6-2T and BR'Britannia' on the 'Capitals United Express'.
- SR'H'0-4-4T and 'C'0-6-0 on a two-coach Allhallows to Gravesend train.
- LNER'D11'4-4-0 and LMS Ivatt '2MT'2-6-2T on a Manchester Central to Northwich stopping train.
- SR'T9' 4-4-0, 'West Country'
 4-6-2 and 'N' 2-6-0 on an Exeter Central to Ilfracombe train.
- LNER'A8'4-6-2T and 'A1'4-6-2 on a Newcastle to Liverpool parcels train this service was regularly double-headed with all sorts of combinations.
- LNER'A1'4-6-2 and Class 21 diesel from Preston to Glasgow.
- LNER'A4' 4-6-2 with a Class 21 diesel on an Aberdeen fish train.
- A BR Standard '5MT' 4-6-0 piloting a Class 85 on a Liverpool-Euston Express.
- BRCW Class 33 and 'Black Five' from Hereford to Paddington.

DOUBLE HEADING ON YOUR LAYOUT

The type of layout you have will dictate on how you operate double-headed trains. With analogue control similar gearing and mechanisms are preferable which is often simple to achieve when you wish to pair locomotives of the same class. When running double-headers with different classes some testing will be necessary to establish whether they are suitable to run together - if one runs considerably faster than the other at the same voltage then it could put additional strain on the mechanisms of both.

n the mechanisms of both. We then need to think about how to form these double-headers. On a layout with a storage yard you could prepare trains off-scene with pairs of locomotives where required by simply coupling them together, but if you want to simulate the addition of a second engine to a train at stations or depot then we need to plan for it with strategically placed isolating sections with automatic un-couplers – the latter to allow locomotives to be uncoupled. This allows individual locomotives to shunt on and off a train at a location where it needs to have an assisting locomotive added. If the whole journey requires double-heading it is likely the >>>

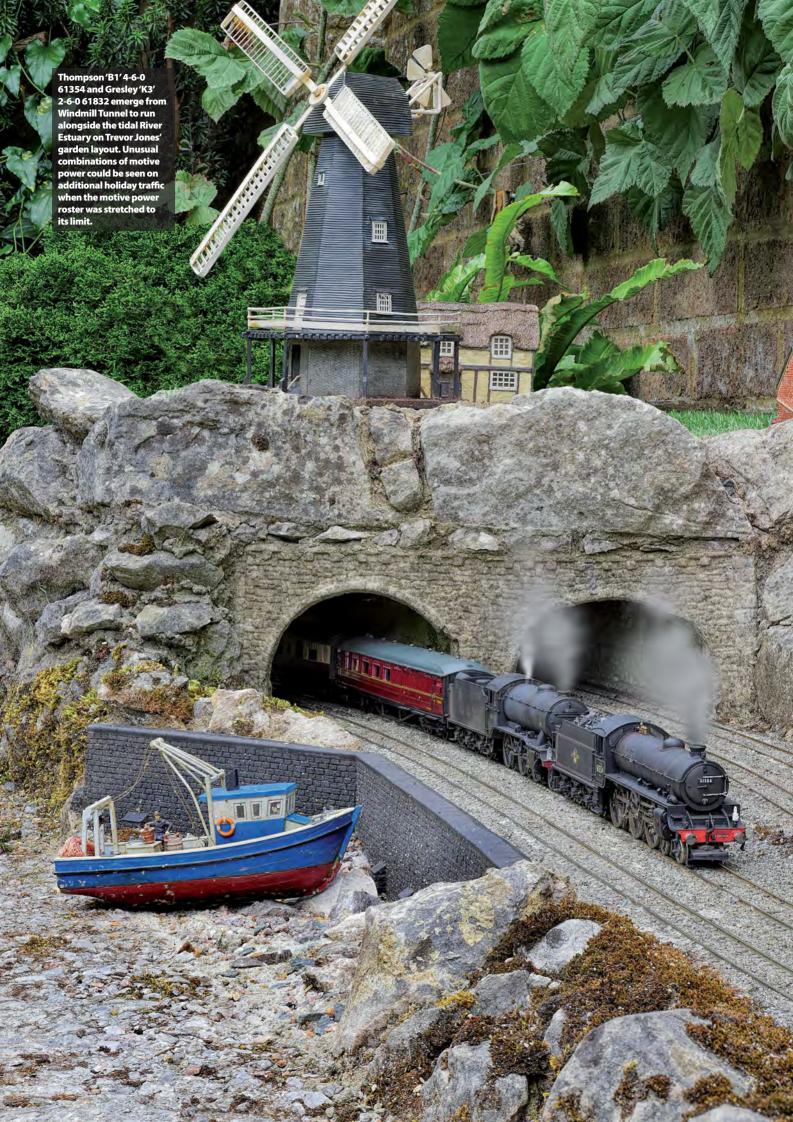

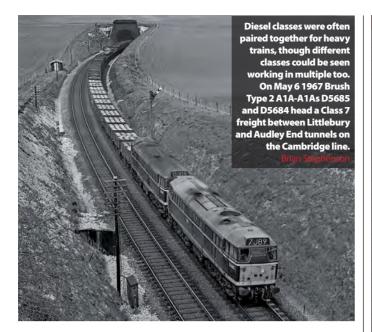

two engines will come from the depot already coupled together.

On digital layouts there are two straightforward ways to operate double-headed trains. The simplest is to give the two locomotives the same DCC address. The alternative is to use Consisting, a protocol which the vast majority of digital controllers have built in, which means that locomotives can be combined under a single consist address which is different to the original decoder address.

This can be created and abandoned as required so that locomotive combinations can be changed as needed allowing great flexibility over double-headed formations. An added bonus of DCC for double-heading is that no section switches are needed just drive the second locomotive to the train, couple it up and give the pair a consist address. As different control systems use different methods for consisting we recommend reviewing the controller's instruction manual to learn the full range of its capabilities for consisting.

ENDLESS POSSIBILITIES

The potential for double-headed workings is huge with a great variety of locomotive combinations taking place through the steam era and the transition to diesel traction. Even today double-heading can be seen on the national network, though it is perhaps less common now than it was in the past. While this feature has concentrated on the steam era, we will come back to the subject of double-heading in a future issue to look at the post steam era in more detail and review the types of locomotives that could be seen working together.

The accompanying tables show double-headed combinations by region and locomotive class. Where the locomotive is from a different BR region it is indicated so that no confusion arises where locomotive types from different regions are known by the same name or class. And we hope to see more double-headed workings on model railways in the future as they are as appealing in model form as they are on the real railway.

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BUILDING ROADS

Using Woodland Scenics Road System products and a Wills Modern level crossing, **MIKE WILD** shows how we added a realistic road scene to West Coast Cement.



OODLAND SCENICS' range of modelling products is a mine of potential. We've been regular users of its ground cover and foliage products, but until now we hadn't used its Road System range. However, the desire to introduce a realistic road scene as part of our new West Coast Cement'OO' gauge exhibition layout prompted us to make good use of these products.

The plan was to introduce a level crossing across the double track main lines and single track cement works branch. The level crossing uses the recently introduced Wills Modern Level Crossing Kit, an extra set of roadbed components and the additional Palisade Fencing and Gates pack. The standard kit (SSM318) contains enough roadbed for a double track route plus static lights, signposts, anti-trespass boards, an equipment room, CCTV cameras and straight lengths of palisade fencing. We added the extra roadbed kit (SSM319) to build a matching road crossing over the cement works line as well as using the fencing and gates pack to allow the compound around the equipment room to be more realistic.

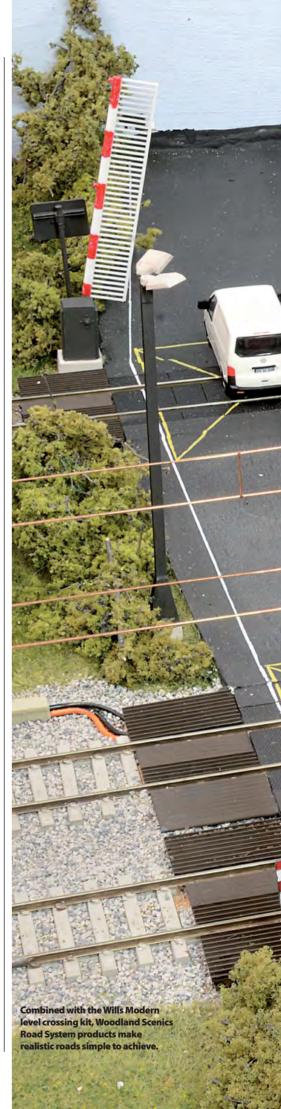
Use of the Wills kit established the width of the road and having used cork sheet under the track we extended it to cover the entire road area - firstly so that it kept the plastic roadbed sections at the right height and secondly to assist in building up the depth of the road.

The Woodland Scenics Road System products are very simple to use. The Paving Tape is ideal for creating neat edges to roads – it can be used to make pavements too – while the Smooth-It casting plaster is straightforward to mix, pour and smooth, just as it says on the packaging. Finishing off the plaster road was a case of turning to the Woodland Scenics range again to make use of its Asphalt paint and road striping pens for markings around the level crossing.

Completion of the scene came by installing all the now painted components from the level crossing kit as well as replacement of the lights at the front of the layout with Train Tech's working level crossing lights with sound. We featured these previously on Topley Dale, as a full installation guide in HM125, and they took a matter of minutes to add to this new scene and connect to the DCC power bus.

Creating this road scene took just four evenings to allow for drying times between each coat of plaster and paint. The result is an instantly attractive scene which has the added advantage of lights and sound.

The step by step guide details the full process involved in creating this new scene.





STEP BY STEP

MAKING ROADS WITH WOODLAND SCENICS PRODUCTS



The road project for West Coast Cement adds a level crossing scene. The first step was to cut the Wills Modern Road Bed sections from the original kit and add a second set around the third track at the rear. Cork sheet has been glued to the baseboard where the road will go to raise its base level up.



Getting a straight edge for a road is made simple with **Woodland Scenics** Paving Tape. This foam tape can be laid along the edge of the road area and built up in layers should a greater depth be required. It also comes with a rectangle of plastic for use in spreading Woodland Scenics' Smooth-It plaster.



We added Paving Tape at each edge of the road surface. To reach the required height for the level crossing three strips were added on top of each other on both sides of the road.



To prevent plaster from getting on to the detailed plastic road bed sections of the level crossing, we added Tamiya 18mm masking tape on each side before moving on to the next stage.



Using a plastic cup we measured out one part plaster to two parts of water and then mixed the two together in a mixing bowl to prepare it for application to the layout. Once mixed it has around 15 minutes working time before it begins to set.



application gave good coverage. After spooning the plaster into place between the paving tape, we used a sheet of plasticard to level it off against the tape edging. This highlighted a few rough areas that we needed to come back to once it had set fully.



We made up a second smaller batch 24 hours later and used this to fill in the worst of the dips and holes from the original application. Once satisfied that the road surface was good enough, the paving tape was removed from each side.

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To finish off the road surface we sanded it lightly with medium grade sandpaper. This took away any imperfections and left us with a smooth road ready for paint.



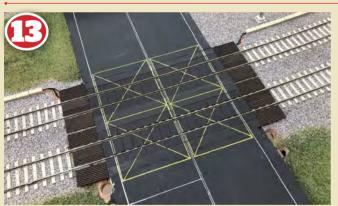

The roadbed sections of the Wills level crossing kit were painted Matt Black using Lifecolor acrylic LCO2. The anti-trespass boards were painted with Frame Dirt (UA719) to represent treated wood.

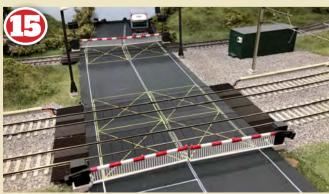


Road markings were added using Woodland Scenics Road Striping Pens. We started with the white outer and central markings, all applied using a steel ruler and the pen.



To add a little more detail across the railway, yellow box junction markings were added across each running line using the yellow Road Striping Pen.





The final additions were the crossing gates which fit into 10mm diameter holes in the baseboard. These had previously been painted as per the instructions and were joined by the signs, lights, CCTV camera and equipment room from the main Modern Level Crossing kit.



The Train-Tech working crossing lights were the final part of the jigsaw to be added. 10mm diameter holes were drilled through the baseboard to accommodate them and they were then connected to the DCC power bus under the layout to bring them into service. For a full installation guide to Train-Tech's crossing lights, see HM125.

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Blue'Deltic'

TIM SHACKLETON loves 'Deltics' but didn't think much of the blue-liveried version when it first appeared. He shows how to upgrade a 'OO' gauge version using painting techinques alone.

TTHE RISK OF SOUNDING smug, I wasn't in the least bit taken aback when Accurascale announced its 4mm scale model of an English Electric 'Deltic'. In fact, I'd been expecting it, and had even placed bets with my friends. From a commercial viewpoint a highend 'Deltic' had long seemed an obvious choice and my only surprise was that no other manufacturer had taken up the challenge.

I was considerably more startled when, on a visit to Gateshead depot in November 1966, I was suddenly confronted by D9002 King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry in blue. It had only been released from the paint shop a fortnight earlier and, standing beside green-liveried D9005 The Prince of Wales's Own Regiment of Yorkshire, I thought it looked awful. The crude break between the blue bodywork and

the all-yellow nose exaggerated its height and made it look slow and static, while the absence of the lime-green 'cheat lines' along the bodysides made 'KOYLI' appear much shorter and stubbier than its neighbour, a carthorse rather than a thoroughbred.

At some point in the ensuing half-century I decided that blue 'Deltics', while still not quite the ticket in 12in:1ft terms, made very good models. In great part this was encouraged by my admiration for 'EM' gauge modeller Kier Hardy, whose award-winning exhibition layouts Wibdenshaw and Hornsey Broadway feature a healthy population of the 3,300hp beasts. The defining moment for me came when Bob Bage put one of his blue 'Deltics' through its paces for me and showed what its custom Steve Brammer/Earthmover/ Legomanbiffo sound system could

do. When my hearing returned, I was well and truly converted.

The 'Deltics' were in a state of flux throughout their 20-year lives and this model is a conscious effort to portray a dual-braked *King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry* as it looked between December 1968 – when the 'D' prefix to the number was removed – and May 1971 when nose-end electric train heating equipment was fitted. For the relevant information I am indebted to my friend John Jennison whose work on recording

the minutiae of 'Deltics' (and many other classes, steam and diesel) verges on the heroic.

To anyone who, like me, has struggled with the ill-informed and misleading captions in many pictorial albums, his *Book of the Deltics* (Irwell Press, 2008) is an object lesson in accuracy and the protocols of historical research. Everything you ever wanted to know about 'Deltics' is in this book and if you're planning a detailing/upgrade project, you could have no finer starting point.

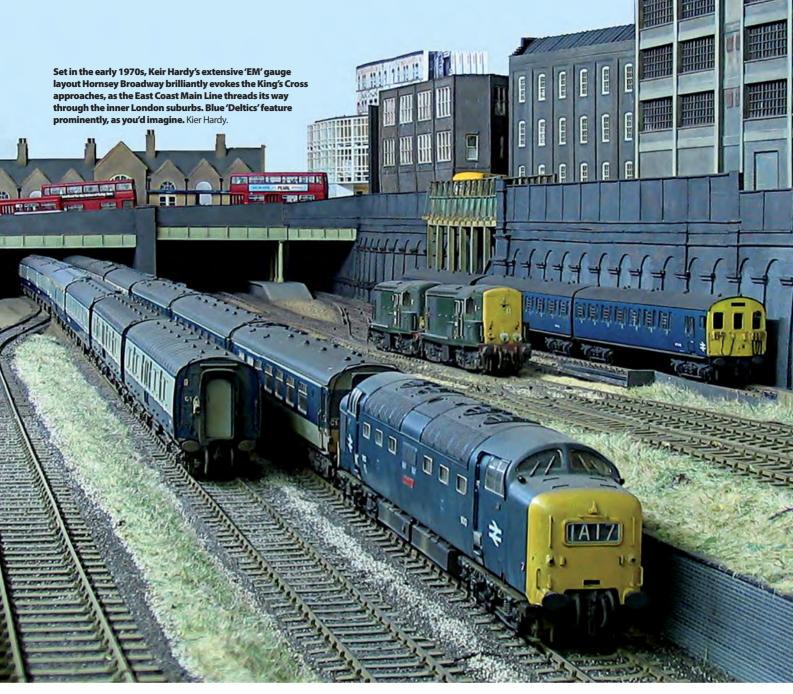

On the prototype, the practice of painting the axlebox covers yellow (to indicate what type of lubricant should be used) ceased around 1969 at the same time as the locomotives started to lose their 'D' prefix numbers.

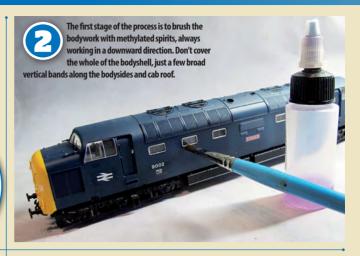

but not yet renamed. There's much you can do to improve the details but, with the Accurascale model on the horizon, I declined the opportunity and focused instead on the weathering. Like most blue diesels, the 'Deltics' soon began to show considerable discoloration of the bodywork, roof panels and front end. Although each locomotive in the class seemed to weather differently, a common feature was a pronounced lightening and dulling of the original colour.

If you want to change the identity of your model, do so before you start adding weathering colours to the factory finish.

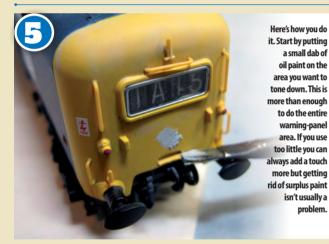




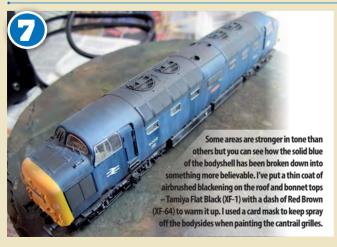
This leaves a distinct patchiness on the bodysides that will form the initial layer of my weathering treatment. You can use airbrush cleaner or acrylic thinner to achieve the same effect – I've had good results with Tamiya thinner – although different makes work differently and others not at all. Stronger solutions might attack the factory finish so I suggest you experiment first on the inside of the bodyshell.



Prototypical weathering and fading builds up sequentially and unevenly – a gentle streaking effect is very common. Over the top of the initial meths-induced discoloration I'm going to use artists' oils — in this case, Light Grey Highlights (AK500) from the AK-Interactive range – let down with white spirit. If you first squeeze the paint out on to thick card, much of the oil carrier will be absorbed and the paint will dry much faster.



Using a flat brush dipped in white spirit, I'm softening the paint dabs and at the same time coaxing then into diffused streaks. Using the right from This is a quarterbrush for the task inch brush - if you want an important step in a gentler and eathering. Flat brushes more even effect. like this are ideal for use something adding stains. larger.

Using the oil fade method, renegade patches can be corrected at almost any stage before the paint is fully dry, which can and does take several days. Here I've used a dab of white spirit to get rid of some blotchy patches that didn't please me.





The underframes of the 'Deltics' weathered no differently from any other diesel – a mixture of road dirt, brake block dust and oil spillages. Having already toned the bogies down with the roof mix I applied earlier, I'm now airbrushing a fine mist of Tamiya Red Brown (XP-64) around the relevant areas. On some 'Deltics' this spread over the bodysides but on others – probably those that passed regularly through washing plants – it was far less obvious.

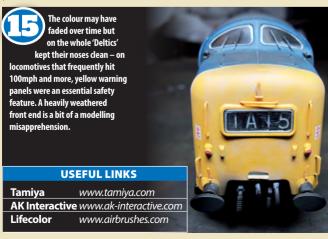




Some oil discoloration is more of a haze, at other times it forms dearly defined streaks, especially around the fuel tank area. It won't always be the same colour either, although I've yet to find a convincing way of reproducing the iridescence of spilled fuel oil.









Real weathering builds up in layers over time. Each application represents a different chapter in the locomotive's passage through time, the elements and its working environment. There's a reason behind everything but at the same time the result displays a subtle and very pleasing randomness.



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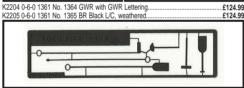

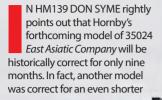

period, only three months.

21C159 in malachite green, lettered Southern and yet to be named Sir Archibald Sinclair was available in a 'Devon Belle' train pack in its late 1947 condition. This locomotive entered traffic

in April 1947 with the original cab design but received a modified 'V' cab in December that year. In February 1948 it received an S prefix to its number.

Hornby has also produced the later numbered and named version of the locomotive, but it would be very pleasing (though asking a lot) if the 'West Country' class 'Pacific' tooling could be altered to the original cab version.

The 'V' cab did not appear until July 1947 and so, if you wish to have a truly Southern Railway model of a 'Light Pacific' as it was from January 1945 to then and (for many) well into BR days, it is not possible.

However, an inaccurate version (21C101 Exeter which did not receive its 'V' cab until a works visit in November 1954) preserved 21C123 Blackmore livery with the 'V' cab which it

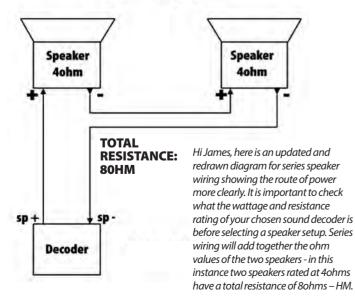

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Moryood Parks

The expanding range of Southern Region 'OO' gauge locomotives and multiple units prompted the Grimsby Town Railway Modellers to build this busy junction layout. **PETER BRACKENBURY** tells the story of Norwood Park.

ORWOOD PARK is the latest 'OO' gauge layout constructed and owned by Peter Brackenbury, Albert Haigh and David Sharp.
Not too dissimilar to those layouts conceived on the back of beer mats, Norwood Park came about following a (very) casual discussion

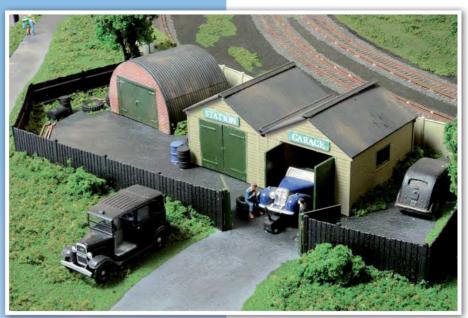
one afternoon during one of our weekly train watching sessions at Brocklesby station. We had all hinted in the past that given our interest in all things BR Southern Region (SR) that we would like to build a Southern Region layout at some point but other layouts such as Yarborough (HM16) and Appleton Junction (HM126) were built in the meantime.

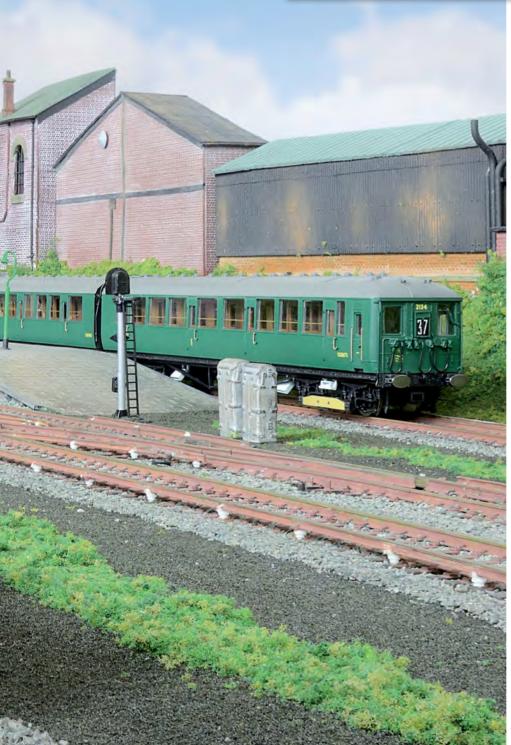
However, the introduction of a range of superb Southern Railway and British Railways Southern Region steam, diesel and electric locomotives by Bachmann, Hornby, Dapol and Heljan plus the increasing number of Electric Multiple Units (EMU) was the subject of the aforementioned discussion which led to the suggestion: "Do you fancy

building a Southern Region layout?"

Following the decision to build the layout, the next part of the discussion focused on the usual problem of what, when and where the layout would be based. Several ideas, such as a small main line country station with a connecting branch (like Wareham) were mooted but to make the most of the locomotives and rolling stock that were being produced or in the manufacturers' pipelines, a station in the south London suburbs was agreed upon.

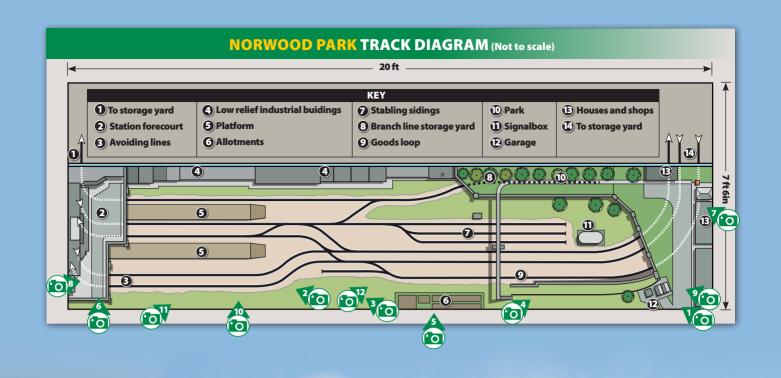
Rather than try and base the model on a particular location a fictitious setting was thought more preferable. Given that there seemed to be very few BR (SR) layouts on the exhibition circuit (particularly in the north of England) a through main line with suburban platforms was decided upon with a branch leading off to give a little more operational interest. The name Norwood Park was chosen, not to imply any specific location, but more to give the suggestion of a South London setting.

The station, at the left-hand side of the layout, features three platforms - two for stopping suburban services and one for the branch trains. There are also two through fast lines for non-stop trains. Beyond the station a three-road stabling point allows EMUs to be rested between the peak rush-hour service requirements.

Whilst probably not satisfying the purists, the layout is set on a line served by trains of the Central and South Western divisions in the early 1960s allowing us scope to run the greatest range of trains we can. A mix of express and suburban passenger trains dominate whilst a sprinkling of freight and parcels traffic breaks the predomination of Southern Region green.

CONSTRUCTION

The layout measures 20ft x 7ft 6in and incorporates a central operating well. It was constructed using traditional tried and $trusted\ methods-nothing\ revolutionary.$ The baseboards are topped with 9mm plywood supported and strengthened by softwood frames. There are ten boards in total: four scenic boards at the front each measuring 5ft x 2ft 6in; at the back>>>

The track is all Peco code 100 with live frog points throughout. We have used code 100 on all of our previous layouts without any problems and we find it stands up well to the rigours of exhibition use. Once painted and ballasted (using very fine 'N' gauge ballast) the overscale appearance is reduced and is quite acceptable to our eyes. In fact, on several occasions in the past on other layouts, exhibition visitors have asked

whether or not the track is code 75 fine scale.

The points, all large radius on the scenic part of the layout, are operated by way of stud and probe – the layout being analogue controlled throughout. We saw no real benefit in changing to Digital Command Control given the level of extra expense that would have entailed.

Being based in Southern Region electric territory, the third-rail had to be incorporated. For this we used Peco code 60 rail and conductor rail chairs. Fitting the third-rail was a time consuming but wholly satisfying activity.

A couple of trips down to places like East Croydon and Clapham Junction enabled us to photograph third-rail installation, particularly around pointwork, in order that what we modelled was reasonably accurate and based on prototypical practice. When completed it lifted the layout to a different level even before the scenery was completed. The only problem we have had so far is that one or two locomotives and wagons needed very slight remedial work to stop steps or bogie parts from catching the third-rail on pointwork, since it is very slightly higher than the running rail.



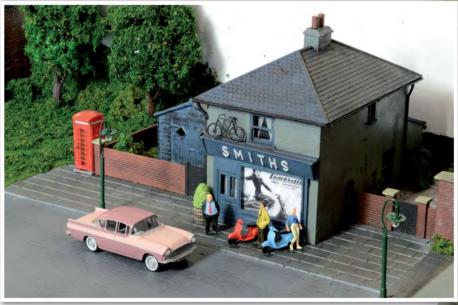

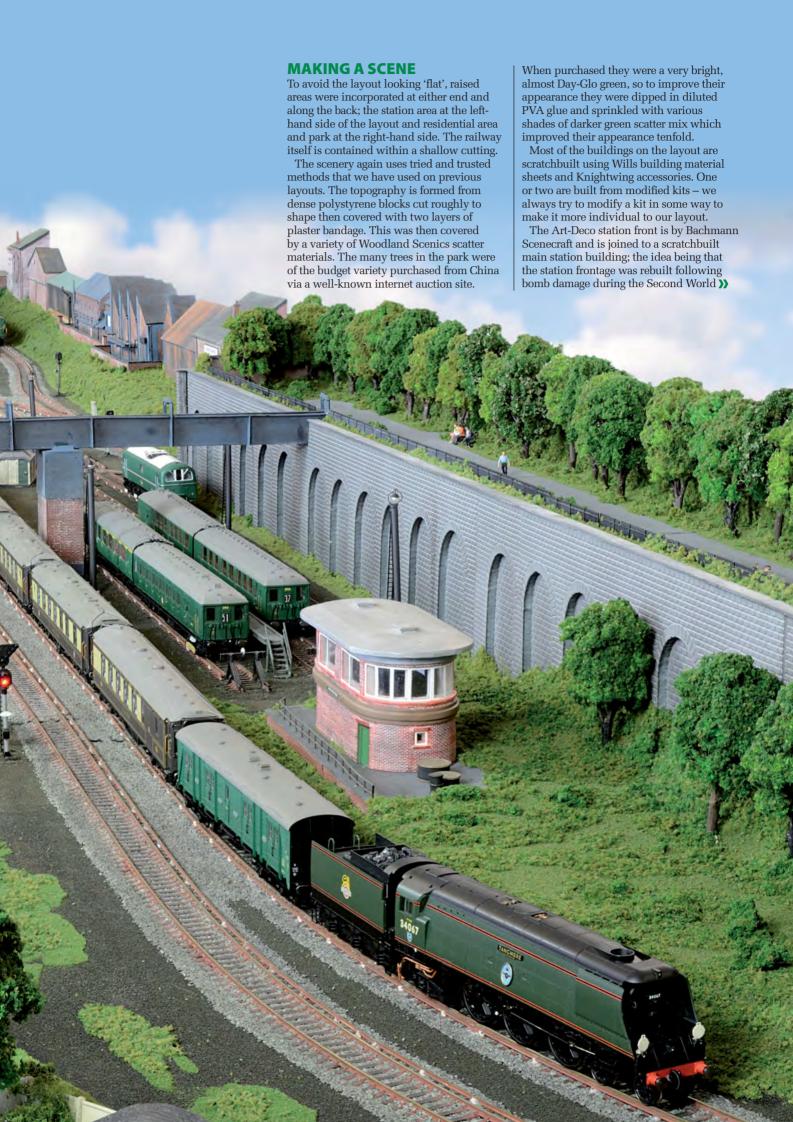

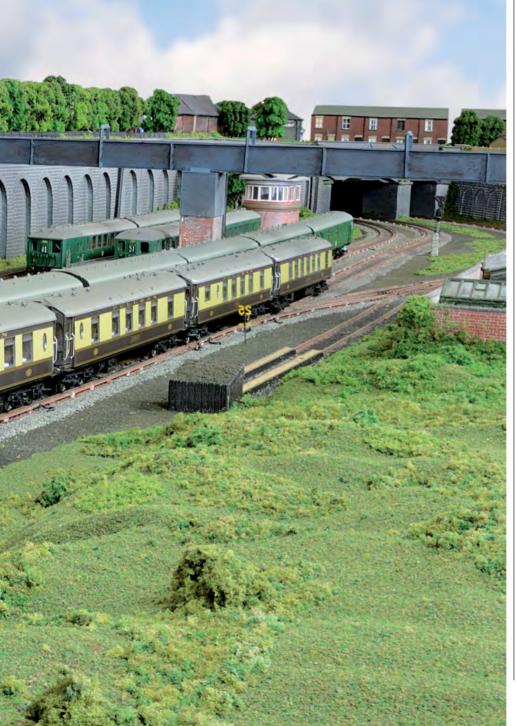

War. The signalbox is also from Bachmann and although difficult to see, it does contain a panel with the correct track layout on it!

CONTINUOUS RUNNING

For exhibition purposes a constant movement of trains is made – we have always firmly believed that is what the majority of exhibition visitors wish to see. As the layout is purely for exhibition





display holding the visitors' attention was an important factor in designing and running the layout from the outset.

Express services are mainly locomotive-hauled, usually by Bullied 'Pacifics', although other types including diesels and electrics are also used. 4-CEP and 5-BEL electric units also feature on expresses. Intermediate or stopping passenger trains can similarly use a range of different locomotives such as 'Schools' 4-4-0s or a BR Standard '4MT' or '5MT' 4-6-0. Suburban trains are mainly operated by a selection of the excellent EMUs now available including 2-BIL, 2-HAL and 2-EPB.

Freight and parcels traffic is hauled by a variety of steam, diesel and electric locomotives including 'S15' 4-6-0, 'N' 2-6-0, BR '4MT' 4-6-0, Class 33 Bo-Bos and Class 73 electro-diesels. Occasionally locomotives from the other 'Big Four' companies can be seen on a cross-London freight service.

Many of the locomotives have received slight weathering and had dummy screw couplings, pipework, real coal in the tender and SR route indicator discs added for greater realism.

ACHIEVING OUR AIMS

From the outset our aim was to model a Southern Region South London location that could be identified as such and entertained the viewing public. From the very complimentary comments made by visitors and fellow exhibitors during the layout's first two outings to the Caistor (Lincolnshire) exhibition in 2017 and The Great Electric Train Show at Milton Keynes (2018) we are happy that we have achieved that on both counts in some way.

Whilst it is often said that a layout is never finished, we are happy with what we have achieved and we don't foresee any great changes being made. One end of the storage yard was redesigned following the Caistor exhibition with the aim of giving us more storage capacity and ease of operation. Having received several exhibition invitations for the future (including Derby and Warley) only cleaning and general maintenance will be required - but, you never know: changes could happen.





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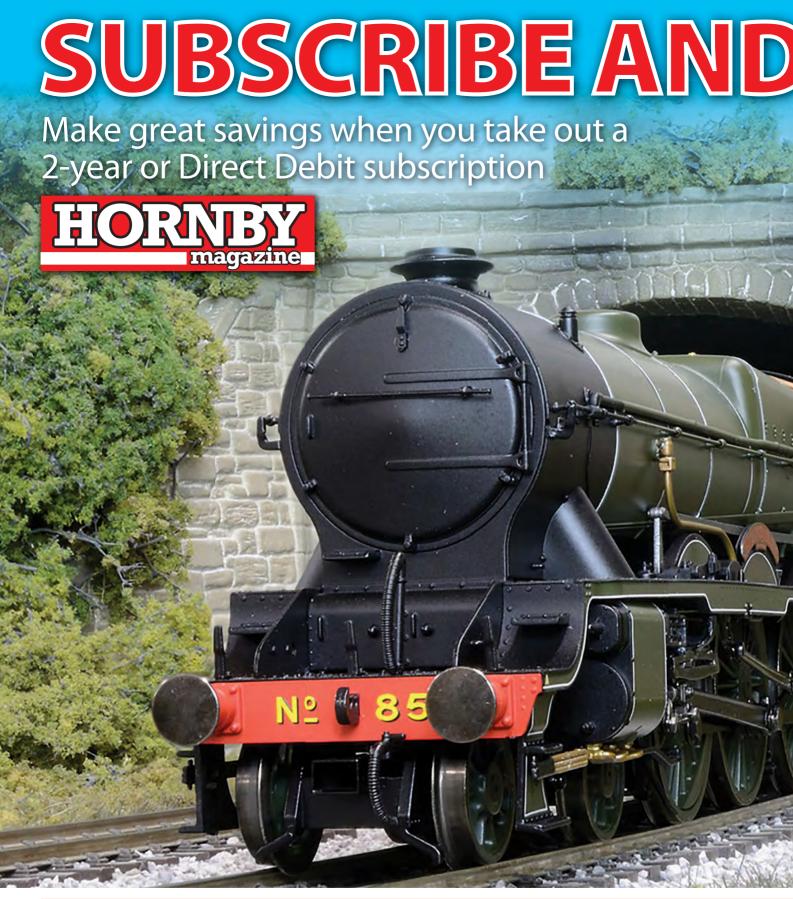

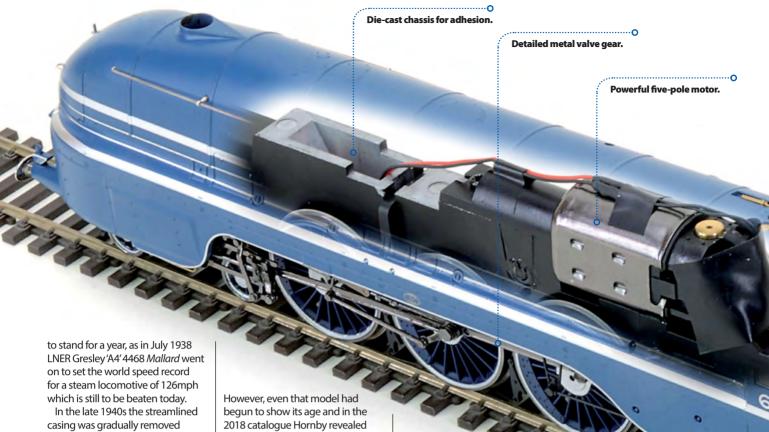

from the 'Coronations' starting with 6235 City of Birmingham in 1946. Just one survived carrying the casing into BR ownership - 46243 City of Lancaster - which had its streamlining removed in 1949. From this point forward the class continued in daily service on the West Coast Main Line until the last were withdrawn in 1964. Three survived into preservation with 6233 Duchess of Sutherland currently active on the main line, 46235 City of Birmingham on static display in the Birmingham Science Museum and 6229 Duchess of Hamilton returned to streamlined condition for display in the Railway Museum, York, alongside streamlined Gresley 'A4' 4468 Mallard.

THE MODEL

Hornby has a long association with the streamlined Stanier 'Princess Coronations'. Its first 'OO' gauge model was released in 1970 and it wasn't until 2001 that it was replaced by an upgraded version. However, even that model had begun to show its age and in the 2018 catalogue Hornby revealed that it would be producing a brand-new version of the iconic locomotives for 'OO' gauge.

Hornby is producing three versions in its initial batch and the first was due for release in December to be followed by the others in the early part of 2019. These cover 6229 Duchess of Hamilton (Cat No. R3677) and 6244 King George VI (R3639) in LMS lined crimson together with our review sample 6221 Oueen Elizabeth in LMS lined Caledonian blue (R3623). All three use an identical chassis arrangement to that produced for the 2017-released conventional 'Princess Coronations' (HM125), but with a brand-new locomotive and tender body on top.

Our sample of 6221 was immaculately turned out in the smart Caledonian blue with silver lining. The lining was crisp throughout and finished off with raised plastic *Queen Elizabeth* nameplates, printed cabside numbers and silver handrails and buffers. The wheels are finished to

the same specification with silver coloured centres, blue spokes and silver lining around the inside wheel edge on all wheels.

The model itself is a superb rendition of the streamlined locomotives which is accurate in its length when the tender drawbar is in its short position and has the correct wheelbase. The shaping of the casing is excellent and carries off the look of the prototype very well indeed with its subtle curves, raised chimney, inset safety valves and whistle. The cab roof features opening vents while the interior is fully detailed with pipework, gauges, regulator and a screw reverser.

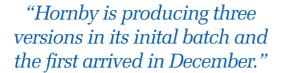
The tender is similarly well done and models the original streamlined design with extended fairings at the rear. These conceal the water tank filling points while the coal space at the top of the tender is fitted with

a removable plastic coal load from the factory. This is simple to remove and reveals a fully detailed coal space including the steam operated coal pusher designed to assist crews in reaching fuel from the rear of the tender while on the move.

Beneath the frames the high level of detail continues with each model equipped with neatly produced metal valve gear, brake shoes, sand pipes, brake rigging (from the accessory pack) and even a water scoop on the tender chassis. The accessory pack also includes an optional front pony truck with full size wheels – the smaller diameter wheels of the factory fitted truck are suited to the second and third radius curves of many model railways.

PERFORMANCE

Having already experienced several samples of Hornby's latest generation 'Princess Coronation' chassis we had high expectations for the streamlined version. And we weren't disappointed.

It uses an identical mechanism with a five-pole motor mounted at the rear of the locomotive driving the centre axle of the locomotive. This is connected to the tender via a four-wire harness and connector which joins the track pick-ups from the locomotive to the decoder socket and in return the decoder socket to the motor.

The 'Pacific' has an 8-pin decoder socket fitted in the tender while the chassis has been designed to host a 28mm round speaker underneath the metal weight. This is in line with Hornby's standard steam locomotive tender design ethos and fits with the speakers supplied with

its steam outline Twin Track Sound (TTS) decoders. The TTS decoder for the 'Princess Coronation' is due to be released in January 2019 (R8117), though it can also be operated with any other brand of motor decoder or sound decoder available with an 8-pin plug. For more on installing sound in Hornby's 'Princess Coronations' see pages 90-94.

Our performance tests were carried out with analogue control. Straight from the box our sample of 6221 performed smoothly and quietly throughout the speed range without any hesitation. Following running in for 30 minutes in each direction we subjected it to load testing raising the train weight to 12 Hornby carriages which it handled with absolute ease.

OVERALL

The streamlined 'Princess
Coronation' 4-6-2s were stunning
locomotives which delivered
immense power for the West
Coast Main Line's fastest trains.
Hornby has done an excellent job
in creating this all-new model of
the streamlined locomotives and
they will sit perfectly alongside
the LMS liveried versions of the
conventional locomotives released
in 2017 (HM125) and 2018 (HM138).

The performance of these 'Pacifics' is just as good as their appearance and we are sure that

these will be popular additions to the Hornby range. From a BR modeller's perspective it would be nice to see 46243 *City of Lancaster* produced in streamlined condition – the only one of the class to remain in this form and carry a British Railways number – but for LMS modellers these are an absolute must have addition. Excellent and available now. (MW)

RAKE VANS are an essential part of every steam goods train and they continued to be used throughout the 1960s and 1970s at the rear of unfitted freight trains across the country. Hornby began developing a new series of brake vans in its 2017 range with the Great Western Railway 'Toad' four-wheel van and its promised 2018 range model of the London and North Eastern Railway (LNER)

'Toad' vans has now arrived. More are on the way too and you can read about its new Southern and Midland brake van models for 'OO' gauge in Update this issue.

The first LNER 'Toad' brake vans were introduced in 1924 and classified 'Toad B'. They took the best features from designs by the Great Northern and North Eastern railways to produce a new group standard design for the LNER riding on

Hornby's 'OO' gauge Class 67 gains Colas Rail Freight's brightly-coloured orange, yellow and black colour scheme for its latest outing as 67027 *Charlotte*.

Colas Rail Freight acquired two Class 67 Bo-Bo diesels from DB Cargo UK in 2017, with 67023 and 67027 outshopped in the company's striking livery. Named *Stella* and *Charlotte* respectively, they are regulars on Network Rail test trains and Railhead Treatment Trains.

As with previous releases, the model features a die-cast metal chassis, moulded plastic bodyshell, etched metal grilles, sprung metal buffers, separately fitted windscreen wipers, cab front jumper cables and more. However, it's the decoration that makes this model special in its eye-catching orange, yellow and black which certainly looks the part, although we did notice a minor masking issue on our review sample between the angled black and orange colour separation to one side. That said, Colas Rail logos and branding appeared crisp as did the overhead line electrification warning signs, cab front coupler instructions and small labelling along the solebar.

The model also includes directional head and tail lighting, which can be alternated between day and night modes, while the cast metal fuel tank also doubles as a speaker enclosure for those wishing to add digital sound (HM137) utilising the 8-pin Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder socket. (MC)



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a 9ft wheelbase steel chassis with a wooden body on top.

In total 710'Toad B' vans were built over a five year period then in 1930 a new diagram number, 064, was introduced which was classified 'Toad E'. This revised brake van design had a steel ducket and metal instead of wooden end posts. 901'Toad E' vans were built between 1930 and 1935. The last of the two designs were withdrawn in the 1960s.

Hornby has released four versions of its new LNER 'Toad' covering LNER bauxite (Cat No. R6833/A) and BR grey liveries (R6834/A). The LNER models are based on the 'Toad B' design while the BR versions are later 'Toad E' vans, as shown by our review sample E178614 (R6834A).

All the vans feature turned metal three hole disc wheels, static metal buffers, small tension lock couplings in NEM pockets and a full set of separately fitted handrails. We did notice that the coupling pockets had a tendency to droop on our sample, but this didn't cause any issues once the van was coupled up to the rear of a train.

Highlights of this short wheelbase brake van include roof vents, neatly moulded and strong side steps, glazing to the interior windows and ducket, excellent livery reproduction – even down to the builder's plate on the solebar – plus factory fitted lamp irons on the end posts and lamps on each side at one end of the van.

All in all this is a brilliant new addition to the Hornby wagon portfolio which will give Eastern Region modellers a new choice of goods brake van to bring up the rear of freight trains. It really looks the part at the end of a long rake of 16ton mineral wagons and is a great follow up to the GWR 'Toad' of 2017. Excellent and available now. (MW)

Underframes are neatly moulded with equipment boxes and air-conditioning fans, while factory-fitted small cranked tension lock couplings feature in NEM coupling pockets.

OO Works impresses with Irish GSWR'101'0-6-0

OO Works' latest 'OO' gauge Irish outline locomotive, the Great Southern & Western Railway (GSWR) '101' (J15) 0-6-0 is now available.

Introduced in the late 1860s, the '101s' were primarily intended for goods traffic, although they were also utilised on passenger duties too.

Initially painted in GSWR lined olive green, the locomotives were subsequently repainted black with orange lining from the early 1900s before the company's allover-grey was adopted. The class remained in regular use into the 1960s. Two have been preserved.

Our review sample of the new OO Works 4mm scale model represents a round-top firebox example in post-1945 condition, with painted cabside numbers. It features all-metal construction together with a coreless motor. Detailing includes separately fitted smokebox door dart and handle, boiler pipework, chimney,



handrails, whistle, safety valve, lamp irons, sprung buffers and more.

Application of the all over grey satin paint finish is good, as are the red bufferbeams. Our sample was partially finished as 195 as an example, but models will be supplied unnumbered with a sheet of transfers for you to model a choice of locomotives 109, 132, 162 or 195. OO Works is also offering the model in black.

The 0-6-0 is suitable for analogue control, but there is no onboard interface for a Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder.

While OO Works"101' may not have all the 'bells and whistles' we've come to expect from new ready-to-run models from bigger suppliers, the manufacturer has produced a model of a long-lasting prototype which is sure to prove popular with Irish modellers. (MC)

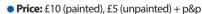

As well as amplifying what has gone before, WDLR Companion draws heavily on newly discovered archive material that has been buried for more than a century - an official report on the military railways of the Western Front, and a paper detailing proposals to expand and improve the railborne movement of supplies.

As well as a fresh selection of photographs and other material - all beautifully reproduced – the Companion includes no fewer than 56 scale drawings that will be of great interest to modellers. If you've caught the narrow-gauge bug through Bachmann's WDLR Baldwin and related rolling stock, or are just fascinated by military railways generally, these splendid books provide plenty of inspirational material drawn directly from the prototype. Heljan's Great Western The second 'O' gauge steam locomotive from the Heljan stable is due to arrive in January. MIKE WILD inspects this enticing new model of the Great Western Railway '43XX' 2-6-0.

HOOSING a prototype to model is always a challenge, but in 'O' gauge the past year has definitely been the year of the Great Western Railway (GWR) with release of Dapol and Minerva 'Pannier' tanks (HM131/HM125 respectively), Heljan's impressive '61XX'2-6-2T (HM137) and now the Churchward '43XX'2-6-0.

This is Helian's first ready-to-run tender locomotive for 'O' gauge, but following on from the high standards set by the 'Prairie' we had been looking forward to seeing the end result. It models the 1911-introduced Churchward 2-6-0, specifically locomotives 4321-4399 and 5300-5383. These locomotives were built at Swindon Works between 1913 and 1920 with the elongated splasher on the right-hand side to accommodate a pump. Reality Check has the full story on the class and the variations which were built.

THE MODEL

Heljan has produced two base versions covering GWR period locomotives and a later version modelling the class after 1948. For review we had the opportunity to inspect a sample of BR black liveried 5378 which is a later period locomotive with outside steam pipes, smokebox lamp bracket, parallel buffers and a lower profile safety valve bonnet. The other addition is a BR style numberplate and a BR period 87F (Llanelly) shedplate at the bottom of the

smokebox door. During its BR career 5378 was allocated to Cardiff Canton at nationalisation in 1948 before a move to Llanelly in the early 1950s. Later it spent time allocated to Oxley and Tyseley sheds before withdrawal in September 1959.

Like the '61XX' 2-6-2T when received the '43XX' is bereft of its front pony truck – this is supplied

separately in the box for fitting by the customer following removal of the locomotive from its wooden packing piece. Also included in the accessory pack is a pair of moulded plastic cabside numbers for optional addition. Alternatively you could choose to add a pair of etched metal cabside numbers such as those produced to order by Narrow Planet.

The model sizes up well alongside prototype photographs of the class. Its outside steam pipes and short safety valve bonnet follow true to the real locomotives in the 1950s while its smokebox sits neatly in the saddle above the frames. The smokebox numberplate has fine supports behind it











replicating the real locomotives in detail while you will also find a separately fitted smokebox door dart, correct GWR pattern lamp irons, separate handrails and a fully appointed bufferbeam with a vacuum brake pipe and working screw link coupling.

Moving along the locomotive, the running plate is full of detail including rivet patterns, boiler supports, lubricator boxes, reversing rod and more. The cab is as well finished inside and looks just like the real thing. Better still it has a glowing firebox which increases its intensity when running on analogue with speed. It can be controlled by a function button under Digital Command Control (DCC) with the wiring going back to Aux 1 on the decoder connection board in the tender.

rigging underneath as well as lamp irons, brake pipe and screw link coupling at the rear.

The locomotive and tender are joined together by a metal drawbar while electrical connections for the motor and firebox glow pass underneath to a four-wire connector which is simple to release should you wish to detach the tender from the locomotive during

bufferbeams, small early crests on the tender and a fully decorated cab interior. Even the weather sheet has been picked out in a different colour against the cab roof.

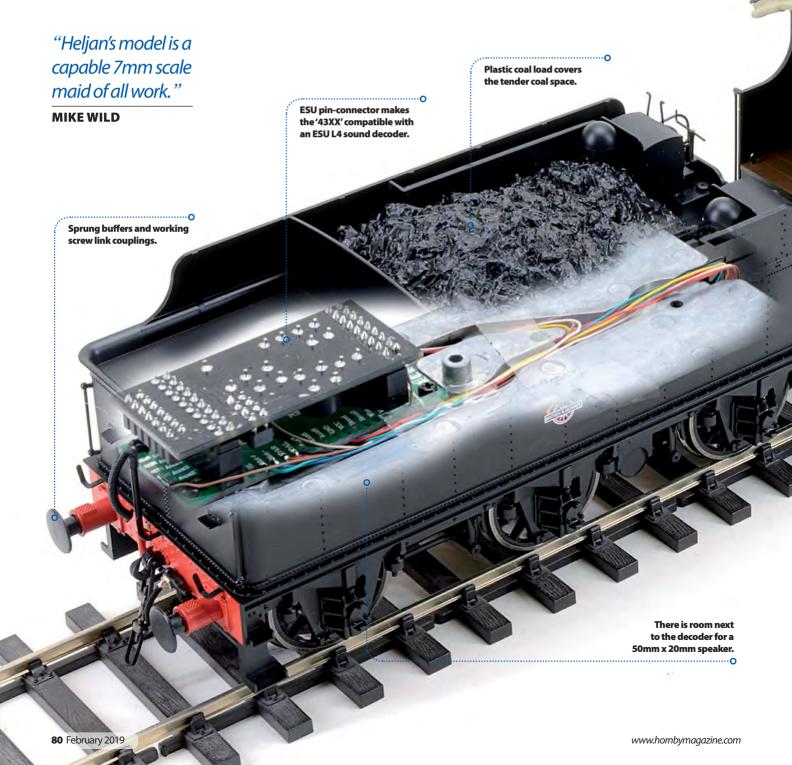
PERFORMANCE

The 'Moguls' were tasked with a range of duties ranging from secondary passenger traffic through parcels to goods work and Heljan's model is a capable 7mm scale maid of all work. It ran well during our tests and proved capable of handling a five-coach rake of Heljan Mk 1 stock and a 25 wagon goods on separate occasions.

We did find that our sample required perfectly clean track for its best performance partly due to it only having electrical pick-ups on the tender wheels - the locomotive wheels having none. The light weight of the tender meant that we had to keep everything in perfect condition, but with clean wheels and rails its operation was faultless. Personally, I would rather have seen all wheel pick-up, though this shouldn't be too difficult to add to the 2-6-0 as there is plenty of space beneath the locomotive chassis and space to run wires back to the tender.

Like the '61XX' 2-6-2T (HM137) the '43XX' is equipped with an ESU pinconnector adapter (Cat No. 51959) which makes it DCC sound ready for use exclusively with a LokSound V4.0 L4 decoder. However, there are currently no non-sound decoders available to fit this pin arrangement and similarly other brands will not fit the ESU pin-connector.

If you have an allegiance to another brand or don't want to go down the sound route you will need to hardwire your choice of decoder in place of the factory fitted board.

For those planning on a sound installation, Heljan has provided a 23mm round speaker position, pre-wired, in the chassis of the 2-6-0, but there is actually plenty of space inside the tender too with potential for a 55mm x 20mm speaker to be positioned alongside the decoder on top of the metal weight. Access to the tender interior is straightforward

with a pair of crosshead screws located centrally along the length of the tender chassis.

OVERALL

With its choice of GWR and BR period locomotives, Churchward charm and impressive level of detail, the new '43XX'2-6-0 is another excellent addition to the Heljan 'O' gauge range. It would have benefitted from all-wheel pick-up but, nevertheless, it still has a strong and smooth running motor which we have enjoyed

running on our test track on freight, parcels and passenger stock. We were impressed by its haulage capabilities which will suit the vast majority of 'O' gauge layouts big and small.

We hope that both of Heljan's forays in the world of 'O' gauge steam locomotives go down well as there are many more options available for the future in this sector – in fact, the list is near endless and with the current growth in this scale it seems highly likely that more will be coming in the future including Hatton's' Heljanproduced Gresley 'A3' and 'A4' 4-6-2s. Right now the GWR' 43XX' is

and Minerva and is sure to be well received. (MW)

The Churchward CTULS?

Although many steam locomotives were designed for both passenger and freight traffic, few had the success of the Great Western's '43XX' class, a design that was to be the company's maid of all work for more than half a century. **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** explains all.

N STEAM DAYS, wherever you went on the Great Western Railway (GWR) system, you were sure to come across one of the useful and powerful '43XX' 2-6-0s. At home on anything from a pick-up freight to a fast passenger train, these free running machines were liked by railwaymen and maintenance staff alike. Whether it was a lengthy goods train carrying produce from the docks of Southampton to the west or a wandering secondary passenger working between Barnstaple and Taunton, these engines could be relied on to get the job done, efficiently and without fuss.

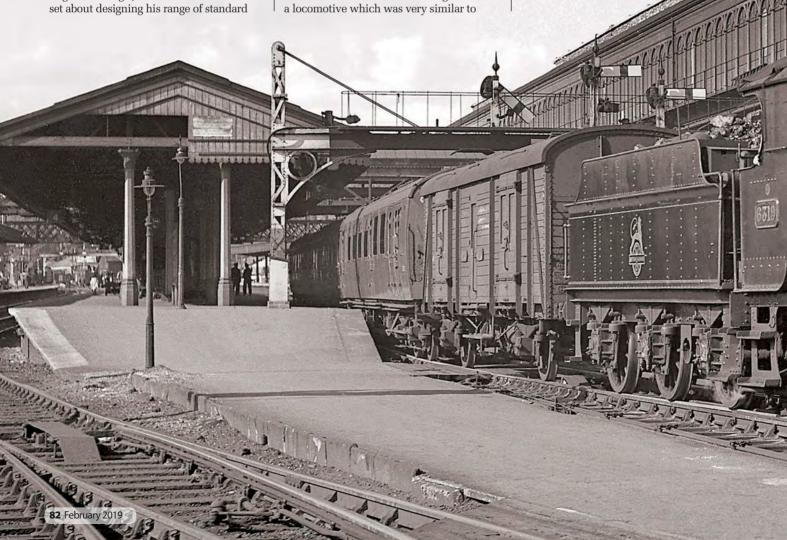
When the GWR's Chief Mechanical Engineer George Jackson Churchward set about designing his range of standard engines in the early years of the 20th century, one of his tasks was to develop a machine suitable for medium to light mixed traffic which would also have a high level of route availability. At this time the inside cylinder 0-6-0 was favoured for such work but in opting for a 'Mogul' Churchward was influenced by one of his prodigies, Harry Holcroft. Holcroft had recently visited the United States of America, where he had seen what could be achieved by locomotives with the 2-6-0 wheel arrangement.

On reading Holcroft's report, Churchward requested that an outside cylinder 2-6-0 be drawn up for the GWR fleet which should have 5ft 8in wheels and use the standard No 4 boiler. What emerged was a locomotive which was very similar to

the '3150' 2-6-2Ts equipped with a tender, and which used so many standard parts that very few new drawings were required to enable it to go into production. Twenty locomotives, numbered 4301-4320, were built as a pilot batch at Swindon in 1911 and were to prove to be an immediate success.

MASS PRODUCTION

With the success of the pilot engines the way was clear for mass production, which started two years later and continued until 1932 with no fewer than 15 different batches being built. As might be expected with >>>

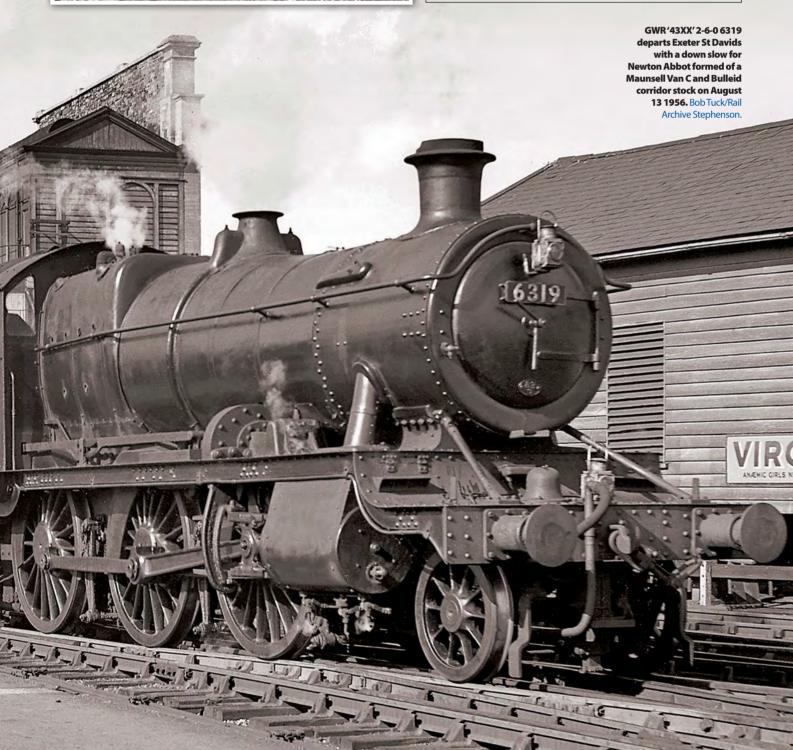

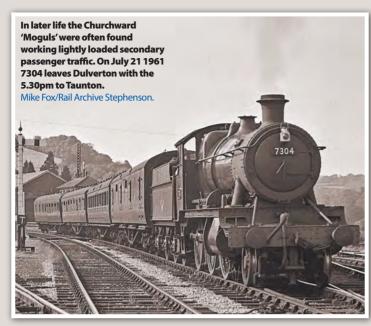

a class which eventually numbered 342 examples, there were many variants - in fact there were no fewer than 12 different diagrams covering variations, with some locomotives being to one diagram at one rebuild and another at the next.

All locomotives after the first batch had their length increased by 9in to give better access to pipework and increase the size of the cab but the cab itself was amended on the final batch and fitted with side windows. Although all were fitted with the No. 4 boiler, there were seven distinct variations of this, with different numbers of tubes and internal arrangements. Engines of the 4300 and the 5300 series had the right-hand centre splasher elongated to accommodate a pump while the 7300 and 9300 series had the running plate extended under the smokebox to house

this feature. The final engines also had screw reversing gear instead of lever.

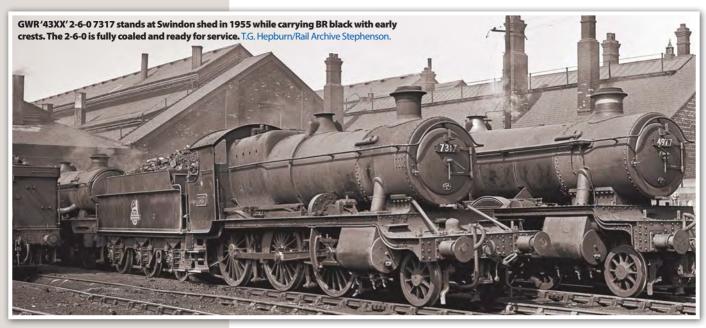
In 1927 and 1928 in an effort to counter the effects of flange wear on the leading coupled wheels, particularly in locomotives working in Devon and Cornwall, the weight distribution of 65 locomotives was altered with these locomotives renumbered in the 8300 series, but retaining the final two digits of their running numbers. This was done by adding extra weights at the front end. The result of this was that these were heavier than before and were restricted to red routes instead of blue. A more visible difference was that the final engines built had revised cylinders with outside steam pipes and in 1928 work commenced to similarly equip the rest of the fleet. In the event over the next 30 years only 163 received this modification.

As well as the major variations there were

a host of more minor differences. Automatic Train Control equipment was fitted to seven locomotives in 1928 and rolled out across the fleet in the following years, while some engines also received automatic tablet catchers. Two engines, 6332 and 6336, were fitted for a short time with Westinghouse air brake equipment while 6320 was temporarily converted for oil burning.

The majority of this class was built at Swindon but rather unusually, due to pressure of work, an order was placed in 1921 with Robert Stephenson and Co of Newcastle for the construction of 50 locomotives. The first 35 were built between April 1921 and January 1922 but the remaining 15 were assembled at Swindon using parts manufactured by Stephenson's with these being completed between November 1921 and January 1922.





ALLOCATIONS

In service the '83XX' and '93XX' batches with their heavier front ends could mainly be found in Devon and Cornwall but odd ones were also to be found at Wolverhampton, Bristol and Newport. Standard locomotives were allocated to London, Neath, Worcester, Wolverhampton and the West of England divisions and, after the Second World War when other routes were upgraded, some were allocated to Central Wales, Chester and Wrexham as well. Eleven examples, 5319-5326 and 5328-5330, were borrowed by the army during the First World War and operated in France.

Although the '43XX' was a very successful design, 100 locomotives were taken out of service between 1936 and 1939 so that their wheels and motion

could be used in the construction of 'new' 'Grange' and 'Manor' engines. Of these, 88 were from the 4300 series and the final 12 were from the renumbered 8300s. This was to have been the first stage of a process that would have seen all the 'Moguls' replaced with 4-6-0s but in the event the process was interrupted by the outbreak of the Second World War and was never completed.

Apart from the engines selected for parts donation, only one other failed to make British Railways ownership and that was the ill-fated 6315 which was damaged on September 7 1944. It ran into a huge hole in an embankment at Trevor near Llangollen, North Wales, caused by the collapse of the nearby Ellesmere Canal wall. Although repaired the 'Mogul' was withdrawn the following year.

BR SERVICE

In the 1950s the 'Moguls' continued to be widely allocated and were most frequently seen on short distance freight and local passenger workings but were beginning to lose some of their work to the new BR Standards or to former LMS designs. This was seen particularly in parts of Wales where some routes had been transferred to the London Midland Region. However, only 31 were taken out of service in the first nine years of state ownership, starting with 4365 and 4386 in 1949, meaning that 210 were still in service in 1957.

In this period the largest number was allocated to Wolverhampton which had 53 examples, while London had 45, Bristol 40 and the rest were allocated to Newport, Neath, Newton Abbot, Birkenhead and Worcester covering South Wales, Devon and the Midlands.

During this period the '93XX' series had the heavy cast weights which had been added to improve weight distribution removed and became standard engines with the numbers 7322-7341.

Some future for these locomotives must have been planned in the late 1950s as 15 new boilers were built at Swindon for 'Moguls' and these were equipped with three-row superheaters. Even so withdrawals began to accelerate with the result that the whole class was to be extinct by November 1964. The final examples were 6364, 6367 and 6395 together with 7318, 7320 and 7327.

Two '43XXs' were to last into preservation. A remarkable survivor has been 5322 which was one of the engines which saw active service in France during the First World War. Demobbed in 1919, it went back into normal GWR service, ending its days at Pontypool Road depot in April 1964.

Sent to the famous Woodham's Brothers Yard in Barry, it was to become the first GWR engine to be saved for preservation from there, being towed to Caerphilly in 1969, and restored to working order in the open. The engine was moved to Didcot in 1973 but was not steamed after 1975, remaining as a static exhibit until 2008 and being used until 2014, when it was taken out of service with boiler problems.

The second preserved locomotive, 7325 - which was the former 9303 of the final batch - was also withdrawn from Pontypool Road depot but this time in July 1963. This reached the Severn Valley Railway via Barry Scrapyard in August 1975 and made its preservation depot almost two decades later in 1992. The engine was last steamed in August 2000 and overhaul to working order is currently planned.

There is also a rather unusual third similar locomotive in preservation, although this is not an original '43XX' but a rebuild of a '5101' 2-6-2T tank engine which carries the number 9351 and which works at the West Somerset Railway. This has a smaller boiler but is otherwise similar to the '43XX' class.

The building of this replica using parts from other engines underlines the usefulness even today of Churchward's methods of using standard parts in various combinations to provide different classes of locomotive. That this should have been done to create an additional example of the '43XX' speaks volumes for how good the original concept was in providing a useful go-anywhere mixed traffic engine.

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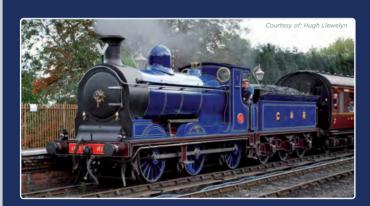
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GENERATION GAME

The Stanier 'Duchess' 4-6-2s have been in the news in 'OO' gauge recently with new arrivals in both non-streamlined and streamlined form. **MIKE WILD** investigates installing digital sound in Hornby's models of these outstanding 'Pacifics'.

DIGITAL CONTROL

HE'DUCHESS' – or 'Princess Coronation' if you prefer – is one of the all-time greats. Said by some to be how a locomotive should look, these giant express locomotives used every inch of the loading gauge to deliver raw power to accelerate heavy trains from London to Glasgow via the challenging gradients of Shap and Beattock as well as running at speed on the southern section of the West Coast Main Line.

The first of the class was introduced in 1937 with a streamlined casing as modelled by Hornby's very latest model (see pages 66-69), while the 2017-introduced non-streamlined model captures the 'Duchess' in its purest form to the highest standard we have seen yet.

Hornby has been producing models of Stanier's finest express locomotive since the 1939 introduction of the famous Hornby Dublo model and many versions have come and gone over the years. The first model of the streamlined locomotives came from Hornby in 1970.

The previous generation was the first to be equipped with a Digital Command Control decoder socket, initially in the locomotive though since 2011 the 8-pin socket has been located in the tender together with space for a 28mm round speaker. This version of the non-streamlined Stanier 'Pacific' was last released in 2014 as 46233 Duchess of Sutherland in preservation era BR lined green, but the latest generation of 'Duchess' models uses a near identical internal arrangement in the tender for the decoder socket and speaker. In fact the only differences on the new version are that the full relief coal space takes up some of the space inside the tender body while there are now two screws at the front of the tender chassis to hold the body in place.

For this sound installation guide we are showing how we upgraded a model of 46256 Sir William A Stanier FRS with a Zimo MX645R decoder and a 40mm x 22mm twin driver Zimo speaker. Interestingly, the same method can be used for all Hornby 'Duchess' models released since 2011 with a tender mounted decoder socket. Plus, as the new streamlined version shares the same chassis arrangement as 46256, the guide is applicable to the brand new model. It will be slightly easier in the 2011-2014 non-streamlined models as you will be able to keep the tender weight in place as the full depth of the coal space isn't modelled on that generation.

The Zimo MX645R decoder for this project has been loaded with Digitrains' ZS003A sound file which includes active brakes on F2 – reduce the locomotive speed, then dab F2 on and off to simulate real vacuum brakes bringing the train to a stop. It's an enthralling driving experience alongside the heavy/light exhaust settings, numerous whistles and ancillary functions built into the sound file.

The step by step guide explains what we did to bring new life to 46256 and you can watch the finished result on the *Hornby Magazine* website in January too. Read on to learn more.





To make working on the model simpler, we find it helpful to separate the locomotive and tender. The 'Princess Coronation' models all have Hornby's standard arrangement of a drawbar fixed with slotted screws at both ends and a four-wire plug to join the two halves electrically.



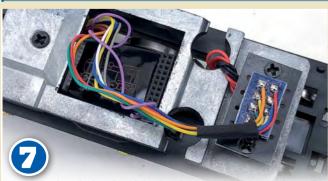
On the latest versions, both streamlined and non-streamlined, the tender body is secured to its chassis at the front by two crosshead screws. On the 2011-2014 models only a single screw is included here. Release these with a crosshead jewellers or modelling screwdriver first.



tender can then be separated.

Lift the tender body up with an arcing motion to release the rear plastic lugs which secure the tender body at the rear, the same on all versions from 2011 onwards, and you have full access to the decoder socket and speaker location.





An 8-pin decoder can be plugged straight into the socket without modification while the speaker well in the tender weight can be used to house the decoder. Here we have installed a Gaugemaster DCC29 21 and 8-pin decoder using the 8-pin connection. If that is far as you want to go you can now replace the tender body and reconnect the locomotive ready to put it into service.



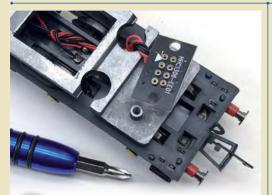
To create the ultimate 'Princess Coronation' we are going to add sound using a Zimo decoder loaded with Digitrains' Z5003A sound file, a capacitor for 'stay alive' and a Zimo LS 40mm x 22mm x 9mm twin driver 3D printed speaker.

From left is the 2014 model of 46233 *Duchess of Sutherland*, the 2017 model of 46256 *Sir William A Stanier FRS* and the 2018 model of 6221 *Queen Elizabeth*, all of which have a tender mounted 8-pin decoder socket and space for a 28mm round speaker as standard. By removing the metal weight from the tender on the latest versions - not necessary on 46233 - there is ample space for a larger 40mm x 22mm speaker as shown in the step by step guide.





To begin this sound installation, we need to remove the tender weight to make space for the speaker. Start by releasing the screws holding the decoder socket in place.





Then release the two crosshead screws which hold the metal tender weight in place and remove the weight.

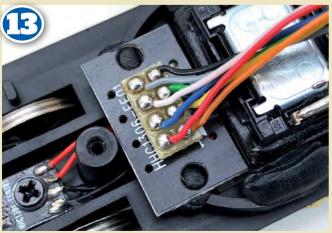


Having removed the weight, we have much more space available to create a better sounding 'Princess Coronation'. To add weight back into the tender chassis, Deluxe Materials Liquid Gravity has been used to fill the void in the chassis, being careful to avoid the solder points for the tender pick-ups. It is secured in place with a sparing application of diluted PVA glue.

To make way for all the new components, we relocated the decoder socket to the front of the tender, just behind the front support for the tender weight. The 40mm x 22mm speaker is then fixed behind – both held in place with Black Tack — with the decoder socket wires concealed beneath the speaker.



The decoder plug can now be connected to the socket, aligning the orange wire with Pin 1 on the socket.



The purple speaker wires are shortened to around 50% of their supplied length and then soldered to the connections on top of the speaker.

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to provide stay alive capacity, neiping to keep the locomotive moving and the sound on over small spots of dirt, means connecting a supplied capacitor to the blue and grey leads coming from the rear of the MX645R decoder. Solder them to the legs of the capacitor ensuring that the grey wire is connected to the negative side (short leg).



To protect the capacitor, the new soldered joints are covered with heatshrink tubing. This was put over the blue and grey wires before soldering them to the capacitor legs then shrunk with the side of a soldering iron.



The decoder and capacitor were mounted to the roof of the tender body with Black Tack before it was refitted, taking care to ensure that none of the wires were snagged on reassembly.



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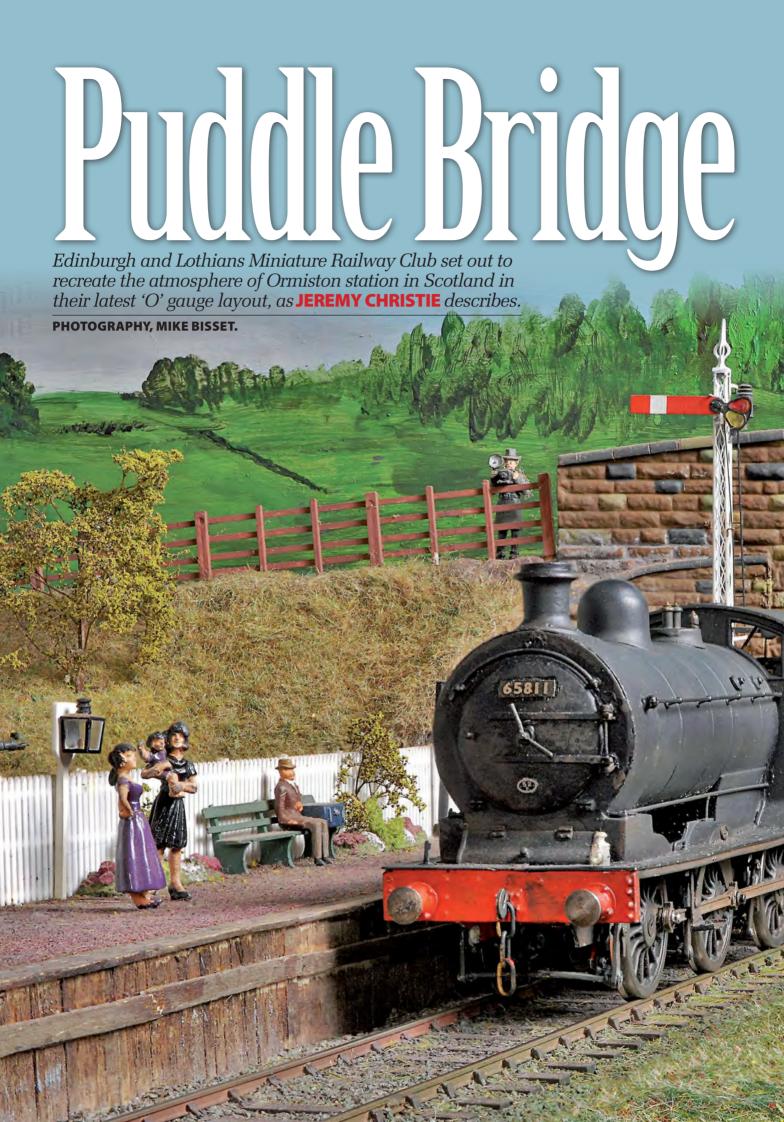

UDDLE BRIDGE is based on Ormiston, a station on the former Macmerry branch in East Lothian, Scotland. The branch opened in 1868 and from 1901 Ormiston was the junction for the Gifford and Garvald Light Railway, which never reached Garvald only being built as far as Gifford. The passenger services ended in 1933, but the line remained open for goods and to serve a number of collieries. The Macmerry line closed beyond Ormiston in 1960 and in 1965 the whole line closed.

For a number of years Ormiston Station Colliery stood adjacent to the station and whilst in reality it closed around 1905, we have allowed it to survive into the British Railways era. Ordnance Survey maps show that there was a narrow gauge tramway connecting to Cockum Colliery and this is represented by a short 'O16.5' gauge line at the back of the layout.

Most trains on the branch comprised coal traffic from the various collieries with the loaded trains heading towards Edinburgh (the left-hand end of the layout as viewed from the front). To make for more interesting operation we have overlooked the ending of the passenger service and some pick-up goods trains also run.

Because the model is not an exact representation of Ormiston the layout was named Puddle Bridge which is the name of the road bridge that crosses the railway at Ormiston.

BASEBOARDS AND TRACK

Construction of the baseboards could best be described as traditional, though using plywood rather than timber. The scenic baseboards are supported on two frames which are assembled first and the baseboards are then laid on top. The two storage yards, each of which has two boards, are attached 'piggyback' to the main boards and have their own legs.

The scenery is built from polystyrene blocks cut and sanded to shape. This sub-structure is covered with layers of plasterer's scrim painted over with thin >>>

plaster; effectively home-made Modroc. The scenic cover was fabricated from felt carpet underlay or hanging basket liner as detailed in Barry Norman's Landscape Modelling. This involved bleaching and dying the underlay then gluing small wads of it to the scenery and finally pulling off the excess to form grass clumps. Recently some renovations have been undertaken using static grass techniques. The trees were made from twisted wire covered with plaster and Woodland Scenics foliage, though these are now showing their age and consideration is being given to replacing them.

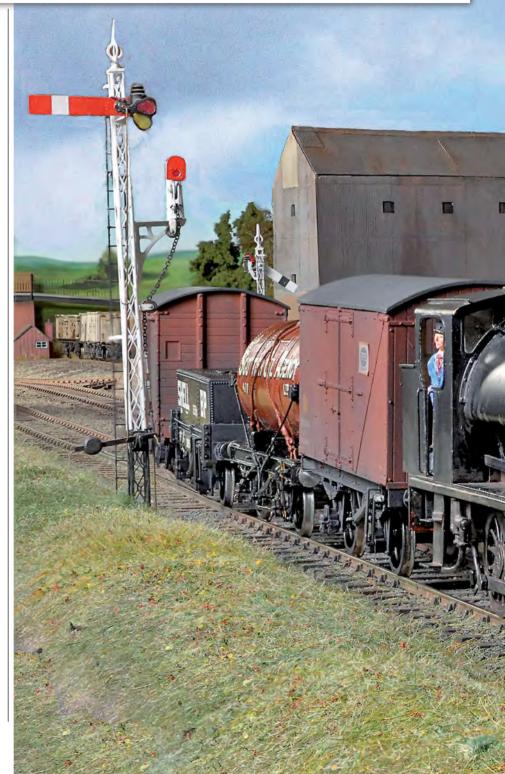
All the plain track is Peco laid on a cork sub-base. The points are built from Marcway kits and are of PCB soldered construction. Only after all the track was laid was it realised the tandem points in the colliery were of a smaller radius than some of the main line locomotives could traverse. Unfortunately, there was not room to increase their size so while the four-wheel industrial locomotives and coal wagons can cope with them any visiting main line engines have to be carefully chosen.

The points are driven by Fulgurex point motors. These have the power to move the points, but it was necessary to strengthen the drive linkages between the motor and the point, especially on the tandem points which have quite short, stiff blades.

The track is ballasted with granite on the main line and 'coal dust' or ash ballast in the colliery. This is secured using the traditional method of laying the ballast dry and running in watered down PVA adhesive.

SIGNALLING

Like almost all our layouts Puddle Bridge has working signals. The signals and the points are all interlocked; the wiring being designed by a former signal engineer. The signals are of North British Railway lower quadrant pattern built from Model Signal Engineering parts with a few scratchbuilt pieces. Operation is by memory wire which has the property of reducing in length when heated by passing a current through it and is returned to its original length by a tension spring when the current is turned off. While this method of operation was popular when the layout was built, we have had a number of problems with it. The main one is that as the wire cannot be soldered - the fixings have to be crimped and considerable problems have been encountered with these slipping. The wire is very sensitive to ambient temperature

and on cold evenings at the club the signals may not operate at all - or conversely in hot exhibition halls they may take some time to return to danger. Replacing the memory wire with servos or point motors has been considered, but not carried out because it would involve extensive wiring alterations to maintain the interlocking.

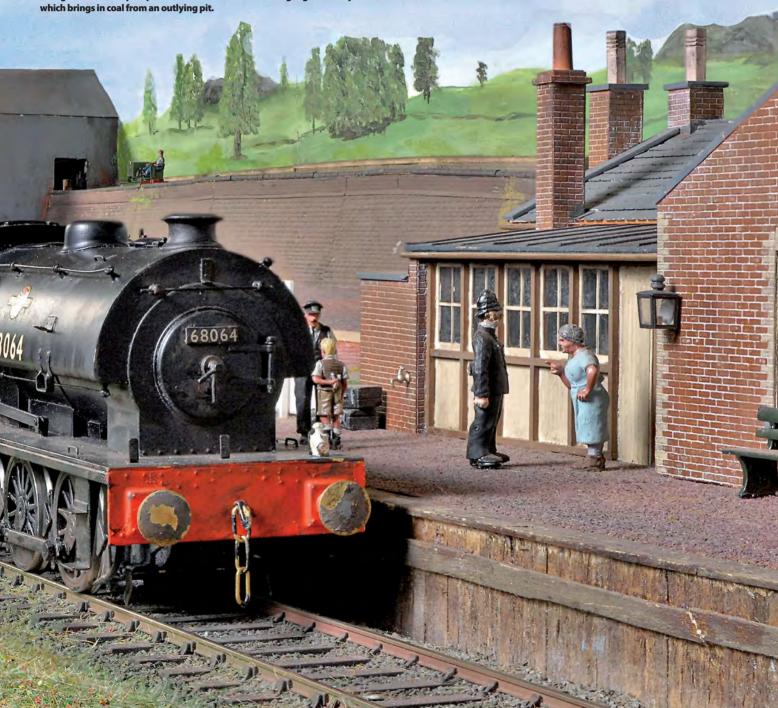
BUILDINGS

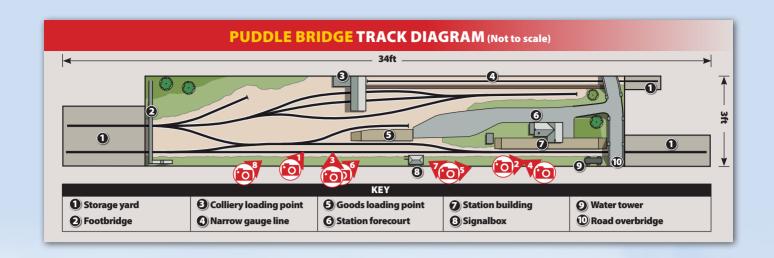
With the exception of one lineside hut, all the buildings are scratchbuilt. The station building and signalbox are based on drawings in the Oakwood Press book on the Haddington, Gifford and Macmerry branches. The station building is a model of Ormiston, but the signalbox is modelled on the next 'box down the line, 'Bog Siding', because we could not obtain a drawing of the Ormiston structure. However, photographs show the two sturctures were

very similar. Owing to a lack of information the colliery buildings are freelance but based on photographs in the books *Mining the Lothians* and *Fife – The Mining Kingdom*.

The basic shells are constructed from laminated mounting board. When complete these were painted with varnish to dampproof them and then embossed plastic sheet was added. This was fixed using Evostik and it was found essential that this was applied to both surfaces and allowed to dry before sticking them together to avoid solvent attacking the plastic sheet. The embossed sheet was then finished by painting and shading as required. Windows were from 3mm clear acrylic sheet. In the case of the signalbox, this was used for the basic structure of the front of the upper storey. Using a thick material prevented warping which could have been a problem if thinner glazing was used.

Hunslet 'J94' 0-6-0ST 68064 leaves the loop with a short freight for Macmerry. The locomotive is a Bachmann Brassworks model and the wagons are an assortment of Slaters and Parkside kits. Just visible in the background is a Simplex petrol locomotive on the narrow gauge tramway

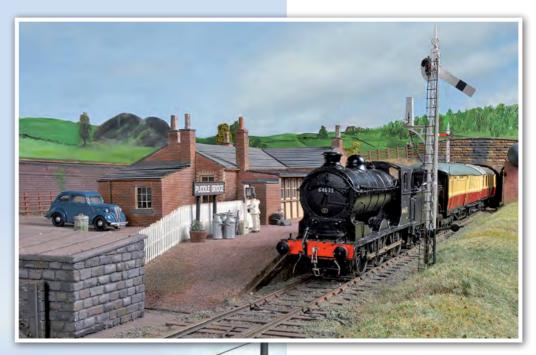

ROLLING STOCK

All the locomotives and rolling stock are owned by club members. Models of the North British Railway classes that would have been seen on the Macmerry branch line up until closure are available from various kit manufacturers, but we have to run a few 'foreigners' to get sufficient locomotives to operate the layout. Prime motive power including a Worsdell 'J27' 0-6-0, Reid 'J37' 0-6-0, Hunslet 'J94' 0-6-0ST, Worsdell 'J72' 0-6-0T – all kit built – plus a Dapol ready-to-run Fowler '3F' 0-6-0T.

For the colliery 'Pugs', a model of an engine by Andrew Barclay or Neilson 0-4-0ST is normally used. Until recently most of the locomotives were kit built, but lately examples of the latest ready to run models have appeared on the layout too.

Puddle Bridge only has space for one passenger train and this consists of either a pair of Skytrex Mk 1 non corridor coaches or London and North Eastern Railway corridor stock built from Ian Kirk components. The wagon stock is mostly kit built, mainly from Parkside or Slater's kits.

OPERATION

Control is by conventional DC cab control using hand held controllers by various manufacturers. The two main controllers are special 'O' gauge units which can deliver a higher current, but experience has shown that the controllers we use for 'OO' gauge are suitable if the locomotive is fitted with a modern motor.

There are four control positions - one at each storage yard, one for shunting the colliery and one for shunting the arriving and departing coal trains, the latter operator also acting as signalman for the layout.

On the main line, each storage yard operator drives the train approaching him. The yard operators also make up goods trains from a pool of wagons and while this means the stock is handled a lot it does give variety to the train formations. The 'Edinburgh' yard operator is also responsible for emptying the loaded >>>

coal wagons arriving from the colliery. The coal from the wagons is tipped into a container which is passed back to the colliery shunter for loading into a rake of empty wagons at the colliery screens.

Empty coal trains for the colliery arrive into the loop. The locomotive runs around via the main line then draws the empty train back into the colliery headshunt. After dropping the brake van into its siding the wagons are moved onto the reception road where they are picked up by the colliery shunting engine. The released train engine then picks up the loaded train and collects the brake van from its siding before drawing back into the colliery headshunt. It then reverses direction and propels the loaded train back out to the loop before reversing direction again and leaving towards Edinburgh.

Meanwhile, the colliery engine shunts the empty coal wagons under the screens where they are loaded. Until recently the loading was carried out by scooping 'coal' into a hopper directly above the wagon. This was an awkward arrangement as it was necessary to reach the scoop inside the building to fill the hopper where the structure of the building made it difficult for the operators to see what they were doing, resulting in a considerable amount of coal missing the hopper. This arrangement is now being rebuilt to use a chute from a hopper mounted on the backscene. The parts for this new system are being computer designed and laser cut by one of the club members; a first for the club.

The narrow gauge line is run by a preset controller - all the operator needs to do is change over a switch and the train runs to the opposite end where it is stopped by a diode, however it tends to get forgotten about so we are investigating fitting an automatic shuttle unit.

So there you have it – a lovingly recreated slice of Lothian nostalgia and of an industry now virtually forgotten. We hope Puddle Bridge helps to bring it back to life for viewers.

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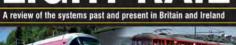
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A REVIEW OF THE SYSTEMS PAST AND PRESENT IN BRITAIN AND IRELAND

The Light Rail systems in Great Britain and Ireland are often the forgotten public transport systems, but have played a major part in the movement of people for both work and leisure for many years - ranging from the pioneering days of electric propulsion on the Volk's Electric Railway in Brighton to modern specialist tram systems in some of the major towns and cities.

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Crossing the line

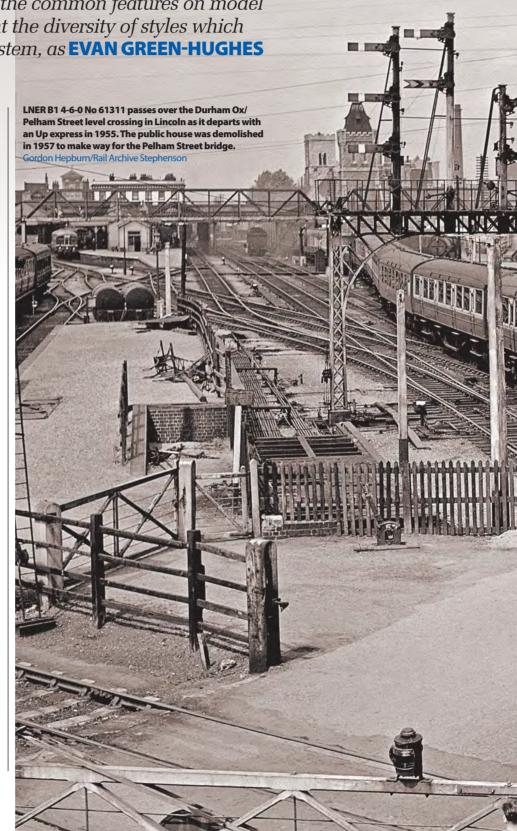
Level crossings are one of the common features on model railways, but few represent the diversity of styles which existed on the national system, as **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** discovered.

HEN BRITAIN'S railways were under construction, mostly in the 19th century, their lines stretched for many thousands of miles and as they did so they cut through many acres of private land and bisected any roads, canals and rivers that happened to be in their path.

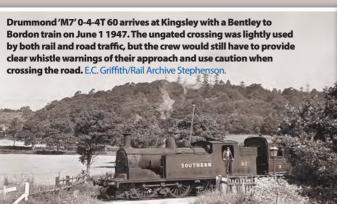
Each of these obstacles had to be crossed and provision was made for those who were already occupying or using them. This was a process that caused many arguments during and after the legislative process to build the railway. Where the topography was suitable, existing rights of way could be accommodated by running them either over or under the railway. This was accomplished by providing bridges which would vary in character from those which could carry 'only the normal traffic of the area' (later defined as less than three tons) to those which were built to full highway standards. Bridges provided in this way were paid for by the railway's promoters and were for many years maintained by the railway itself, although in recent years responsibility for them has largely passed to the local authorities.

However, it was a different case where the land surrounding the railway was largely flat, and in this case railway companies usually provided a level crossing. It is not known where the first railway/road crossing was provided, but it was likely on one of the horse-drawn wagonways which at one time criss-crossed the country and which were provided to bring minerals from quarries or mines down to dock, river or canal from where they could be shipped away. Such wagonways were very crude with arrangements for road crossings being nothing more than a pair of gates across the track which were largely provided to stop animals wandering off the road, rather than to stop traffic from coming into contact with trains.

The same principle was adopted when railways proper began to be built, even >>>

when the volume of rail traffic was expected to be much higher than before, and even major roads such as the Great North Road were crossed on the level with nothing more than a pair of gates to keep rail and road users apart.

At first there was no uniformity in the way that highway crossings were provided and there were, as a result, many accidents. This led to legislation which required railway promoters to provide gated crossings from 1839 onwards. Interestingly the new law required that the gates should be closed across the road at all times, and were only to be opened when road traffic required to pass by. Even at this early stage this proved to be impractical and so three years later the rules were amended to provide for the gates being closed against the railway unless there was a train coming.

CROSSING CONTROL

It soon became the practice to locate a signalbox or gate cabin next to a level crossing so that the crossing could be protected by signals and this led to the development of mechanical apparatus that enabled the signalman to open and close the gates from inside the box, often with the aid of a large wheel which would be capable of working all four gates at once. However such features were not universal and many crossings were manually worked until recent times.

Such crossings had to be provided where the railway crossed a public road but there were many instances where new lines divided a property in two, leaving a landowner with fields either side of the line. To cope with this situation a different type of level crossing was provided, called an accommodation crossing. Although these were also provided with gates either side, the crossing itself was often no more than a few sleepers bolted down in the middle of the track and the width was around the same as the gate to an average field. In this type of crossing the user is required to open and close the gates and it is their responsibility to ensure that no trains are coming. Gates must open outwards, so that they do not obstruct the track, and there must be signs at each entrance to the railway instructing the user as to the correct procedure to be adopted when crossing.

A similar arrangement was adopted where a private road crossed the railway, perhaps to access farms or private land and often serving a number of properties. In such cases the gates were always set across the road and the user had to get out of their vehicle or dismount their horse, opening and closing the gates as they went through. This type of crossing was known as an occupation crossing, with most being accessed by unmade tracks but with some being provided on surfaced roads. Signage on each side of the crossing was to the same standard as was provided for the accommodation crossing.

Where public footpaths crossed the railway the principle of fencing off the railway from surrounding land was again followed and a gate or stile was provided

each side of the track, but where a path was heavily used sometimes a bridge or underpass was provided instead. Many path crossings have been replaced over the years due to the number of fatalities that have occurred to their users, while many others have been closed.

INCREASING TRAFFIC

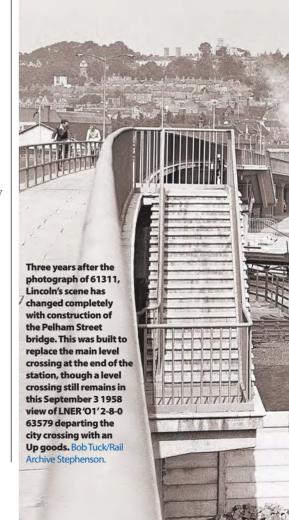
Although these arrangements sufficed for almost a century, the increasing level of road traffic caused many changes to be made, particularly from the 1930s onwards. In this period many of our trunk roads were upgraded to enable higher speeds and this resulted in many crossings being by-passed by new sections of carriageway which were usually carried over the line by a bridge and approached by substantial earth works. A very good example of this exists at Wansford in Cambridgeshire, adjacent to what is now the preserved Nene Valley Railway, where the original A1 road can be seen crossing the railway line by a gated level crossing controlled by a signalbox but where today's nearby main road has been elevated and taken across the line at a higher level.

By the 1950s there were still almost 10,000 level crossings in use, the majority of which required the attendance of railway staff throughout the hours that trains were running. Providing this number of staff was a very expensive exercise and so ways were sought to reduce this cost. As part of a scheme to modernise British Railways, officials undertook a visit to Europe in 1955 where automated barrier crossings were already in use and this resulted in the first such UK installation at Spath near Uttoxeter in 1961. Initially such crossings had two barriers but two years later the 'half barrier' type came into use.

Since then the barrier crossing has become the most common type in use, but the signs and lights which accompany it have changed as the years have gone on. The familiar lighting was at first provided without the amber light but this was added after a number of accidents involving slow-moving vehicles. The half barrier

type has now almost passed into history as it was found that motorists were driving round the lowered barriers, with the consequent risk of accident, but this type was very common during the BR blue era.

Crossings which are remote from signalboxes now have CCTV coverage which is often accommodated on tall masts erected each side of the railway, and most now have telephones provided so that people driving slow vehicles can contact a signaller to advise of their intention to cross. A further refinement in some areas is a crossing that is worked by



the traincrew, with the driver pressing a plunger to activate the barriers. These are more commonly found where the level crossing is adjacent to a station platform.

On more lightly-used lines a new type of crossing has been introduced which is known as the Open Crossing. For this type of installation no barriers or gates are installed at all, but the road is marked with Give Way signs, which are also provided on poles on the approach to the railway. Train drivers approaching such crossings are met with a sign which looks like a St Andrew's cross followed by a combined speed restriction/whistle board at which point they are expected to stop if the crossing is obstructed. Due to the inherent dangers of such an installation some have now been fitted with lights, but even this doesn't seem to prevent motorists driving across without stopping and thus becoming involved in accidents.

ELIMINATION

As traffic continues to increase there is a drive to eliminate as many level crossings as possible but there are still around 6,000 in use at the current time. Where it has been found impossible to remove a crossing altogether there is a drive to improve safety by providing additional facilities and this has now spread to accommodation and occupation crossings many of which are being fitted with gate locks, miniature signals or even automatic or manual barriers. Many footpath crossings are being replaced with footbridges while

lesser-used footpaths are being stopped up and where possible re-routed.

Although level crossings today represent the single most likely cause of accident on our railways it seems as though we will still see many of them in use for the foreseeable future. Automated crossings will continue to rise in number and the amount of 'hardware' surrounding even small rural crossings is likely to continue to rise. Crossings such as the 'POGO' in which barriers at occupation crossings are raised by the user and which have already been involved in at least one accident are

likely to have just as short a lifespan as the half-barrier but can be used to help place a layout in a distinct period of history.

The subject of level crossings is a complicated one - but if modelling an installation it's worth getting the detail of signs, road markings and barriers or gates correct, and making the detail right for the era in which your layout is set. As can be seen, not all crossings are of the four-gate variety which we usually model!

Wiring up the dep

The break from layout construction didn't last long. MIKE WILD saw the opportunity to finish off wiring up the depot section of the 'O' gauge test track and couldn't resist.

TWAS GREY AND DREARY outside and I had a couple of hours to spare, so being the way I am I saw the opportunity to make the depot section of the 'O' gauge test track fully operational.

After a long battle with a lack of ideas, I finally completed the track in this area in July (HM134), but at the time only the first siding nearest to the

main line was powered. This particular siding can be powered by analogue or digital control, but the rest of the depot will be solely connected to the digital system with double insulated rail joiners ensuring that the two power sources can never meet.

So, what needed doing? The simple answer is eight power feeds and four 10mm holes for point

With the main section of the depot now wired up and live with digital control,

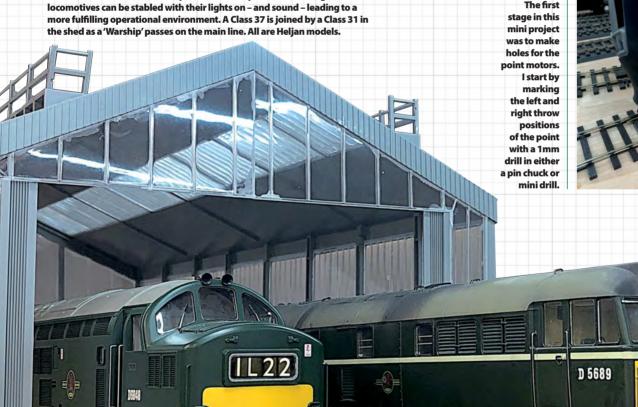
motors. Putting the power feeds in was the simple part (once I'd moved the boxes from under the layout!), but then they needed routing back to the main Digital Command Control (DCC) feed so that the tracks could become live.

As with our 'OO' gauge layouts 7/0.2 (seven strands of 0.2mm diameter wire) multi-core equipment wire was used for

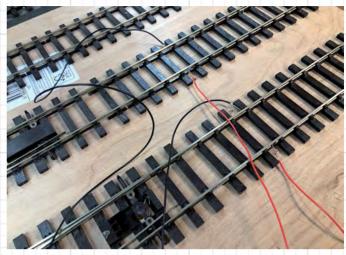

area powered by DCC so that it avoids the need for section switching and allows a number of locomotives to be stabled in the depot when not in use. However, as the layout is also regularly used for analogue model testing too I wanted to ensure that it had the flexibility to stable an analogue locomotive as well, hence the single siding with the option for both types of control. When in DCC mode it is a simple case of changing the points against the route into the analogue operated siding (if an analogue locomotive is stabled there) so that power goes the right way and doesn't cause problems. Simple but effective.

During the wiring up process, all four of the points were lifted again to allow holes to be drilled for the future addition of point motors. This is best done at an early stage as it means I can come back and add point motors later, but also that I can start developing ground cover and scenery in this area when time allows.

As I have said before, the 'O' gauge test track is very much an 'as and when' project. It has no deadline which makes a refreshing change and in the fullness of time it will end up as a fully scenic layout.

The next big job on the list for the 'O' gauge is replacement of two of the baseboards to make way for the storage yard for the garden railway that I mentioned in HM139. That though is another story...

One small job that has needed doing is an infill strip between these two boards. The gap is caused by the leg supporting the 'OO' gauge layout above. Ideally I'd like to remove the leg altogether – I just need to work out how without destabilising the boards above.
