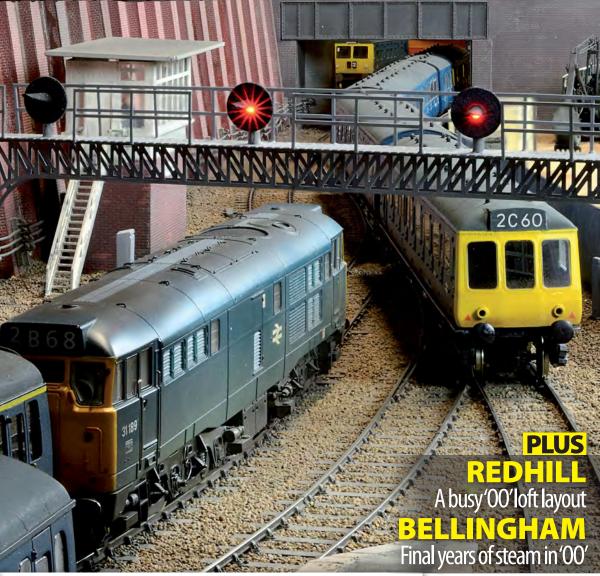

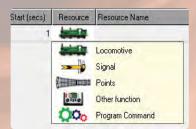

RailMaster Revealed - Programming

In last month's article we looked at the first part in a two-part series on programming within the Hornby RailMaster software. Following a look at an overview of programming and the capabilities of the software, in this article we shall be looking in more detail at some aspects of programming and things to bear in mind when automating your layout.

This month's article is rather technical and we shall now look at the various resources on your layout that you can automate from within RailMaster.



RailMaster's programming interface works on the WYSI WYG principle. That is, What You See Is What You Get. This means that you do not have to search for things. For example, when you click on the resource column, a list of available

resources is shown in graphical and text format, as can be seen to the right. You can see that you are able to select locos, signals, points and other things for control. The first three are straightforward and allow you to control everything on your layout. The last two, "Other function" and "Program Command" contain some sophisticated functions that we will see later.

If you select a loco to control, you will notice that all of the locos on your roster are listed. This is convenient and saves you having to find a loco's DCC ID and enter it. Once you have selected a loco, if you list your locos again later in the creation of your program, the ones you have used will be listed at the top, saving time searching through the list. The same applies when selecting signals and points. If, in the future, you want to swap out a particular loco from within your program for another one, you can do this very easily using a single menu option.

activities, including special custom acceleration and deceleration commands and the control of every sound and light function, by name, for a given loco.

The same principle applies to signals, allowing you to set both semaphore and colour light signals through all available sequences. The key thing is that you do not need to know any DCC IDs for resources on your layout. Nor do you need to refer to crib sheets of loco functions and what their numbers do.

When you have selected your desired loco to control, you will see on the next column all of the things you can do with that loco. This list includes all motion

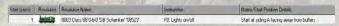

# The Most Straightforward PC Model Railway Control System

RailMaster brings this all together to make life as easy as possible. Now that we have seen how you can select a loco, for example, this is what a typical entry on the programming screen may look like.



In the above example, one second into the program (this could of course be zero) loco 3, a class 08 will turn its lights on. You will notice in the notes column is an aid memoir to remind us to place the loco in siding A to start, facing away from the buffers. The programming system is quite smart as it will check for possible errors such as turning a latching function on but not turning it off again and will warn you.

# Other resources

We have seen how you can list all locos, points and signals on your layout and select them for control, but of you have additional items, such as a DCC-enabled turntable, these can be listed using the "Other function" icon. If you do not have any turntables or such on your layout, the "Other function" list will be empty.

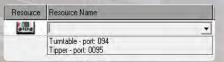

If you do have a turntable or Hornby motorised tipper or conveyor, these will be listed as in the example shown. As a turntable may be a common installation, we have selected it so that you can see the various options available. In this case, an old Hornby turntable has been made workable for DCC using a

standard loco decoder, such as Hornby's R8249. In a later article we shall look at how you can turn the Hornby manual turntable into a DCC-enabled one, which can be controlled nicely by RailMaster with the press of a single button. You can see from the list that RailMaster can automate the turning of the turntable bed through eight different positions, both clockwise and anticlockwise.

### Program command

The final part of programming we shall look at is the Program Command option, which allows quite a few sophisticated additional things to be done. Several commands allow you to activate or deactivate the entire Loco Detection system, or just individual sensors. We shall look at these in more detail in a later article dedicated to the Loco Detection system.

Using the Chain program command, you are able to insert another program from your hard drive into the current program at a selected time position. This can be useful for injecting a small routine, such as a shunting operation, into an existing program. This can achieve while sophisticated automation results.

An interesting feature is the Clock chimes function. Turning this on allows you to direct the recorded sound of the chiming of an old English country church clock every quarter hour to either the left or right speaker. It is actually quite charming and follows your RailMaster clock time.

Inserting an "End program" command into a program will stop execution at that point and can be useful for testing.

The "Message" function allows you to display a message on the screen for a number of seconds at various points in your program. This can be useful at things like exhibitions, to show visitors what a program is currently doing. You can also

programmatically move your track plan around as though you were dragging it with your finger or mouse using the "Move plan" function. You can also enlarge and reduce your track plan in and out using various Zoom commands.

The "Play sound" command is particularly useful as it allows you, within a program, to play a WMV or MP3 sound file. Hundreds of sounds are included with RailMaster including many station announcements in both a male and female voice, which can be directed to the left or right speaker (in effect at two stations) as well as ambient sounds such as a burning house, plane flying overhead and even a train crash - perish the thought. You can also record or download your own sounds and play them back within programs.

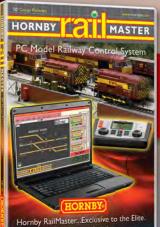
There are also several things you can do with RailMaster's clock, such as run it at a particular scale speed in accordance with the scale you are using and you can also set it to a desired start time within programs.

Finally, if you want to have a program, or part of it repeat, you can achieve this with the Repeat...End Repeat commands.

In the example shown, a loco "The Hundred of Hoo" has its sound turned on, then it moves forward to shunting speed, reverses and then stops. This part is contained within a Repea...End Repeat structure that runs two times, before moving on to the last command to turn the loco's sound off again.

As you can see, RailMaster has quite a powerful, yet comparatively easy-to-understand programming system, where nothing is hidden from you. It can take a little while to get to grips with programming and it certainly requires some trial-and-error, but once grasped, it brings a new level of enjoyment to a layout, watching things happen all on their own. It is definitely worth the investment in time.

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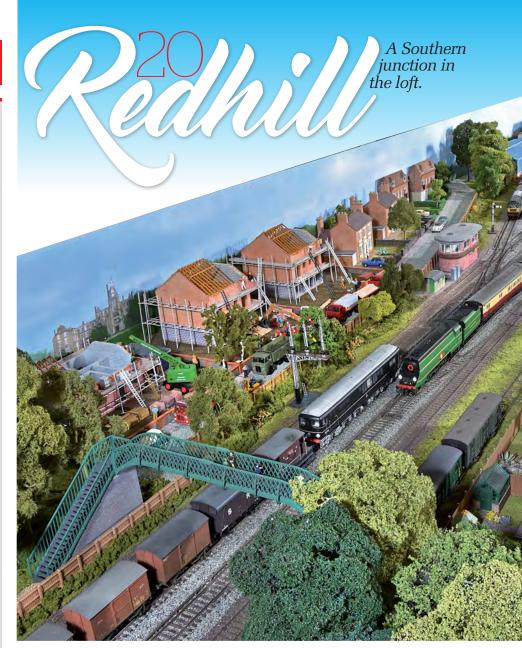

LMS Stanier 'Princess Royal' 4-6-2. The samples are currently being inspected and are subject to revisions before production. The first release, due in winter 2019/2020, will cover three locomotives. Their identities are 6201 *Princess Elizabeth* in LMS lined crimson (Cat No. R3709), 46206 Princess Marie Louise in BR lined blue with early crests (R3711) and 46207 Princess Arthur of Connaught in BR lined

The eagerly anticipated Hornby'OO' gauge model of the tiny Ruston 48DS four-wheel diesel-mechanical (4wDM) shunter is expected to arrive this autumn. The first model scheduled for release is 458957 in John Dewar & Sons red and white (Cat No. R3705).

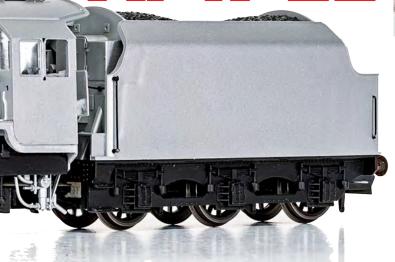
Each 48DS is supplied with a Conflat match truck which can be connected to the locomotive to provide extra pick-ups. The engine has a compact motor and a 4-pin DCC decoder socket allowing it to be retrofitted with a decoder for digital operation.

Four versions are due for release this autumn with 458957 due to be joined by 269595 in Ruston and Hornsby lined green (R3704), Army 802 in War Department green (R3706) and *Queen Anne* in Longmorn Distillery brown and cream (R3707).



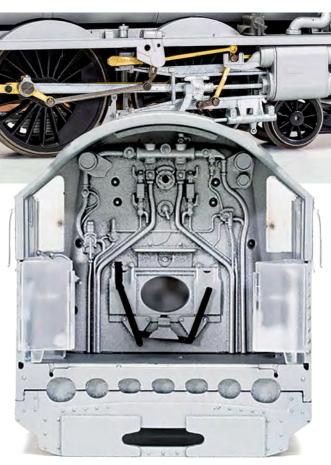

LATEST PROGRESS

HE LATEST development samples have been revealed by Bachmann for 'OO' and 'N' gauge together with new delivery timescales for products including the steam crane, Class 158/159, Class 24/1 and more.

Bachmann has also revealed the first engineering samples of its new models of the Direct Rail Services Class 20/3 for 'OO' and the Class 319 four-car EMU for 'N'.

The latest 'OO' schedule sees the Worsdell 'J72' 0-6-0T arrive during October (see Reviews) to be followed by the steam crane in December. The Class 24/1 is due in January 2020 to be followed by the Class 117, Class 121 and Class 158/159 in the first half of the new year. The GWR '94XX' 0-6-0PT and Midland '1F' 0-4-4T are due in summer 2020 while the Class 20/3 is expected to be in the shops by the end of 2020.

The 'OO' Class 117, 121, 158 and 159 have all now reached the

Rails of Sheffield has announced six additional 'Terriers' for release on its new and exclusive 'OO' gauge model of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway 0-6-0T.

The 'Terrier' is being produced for Rails of Sheffield by Dapol. The specification includes a die-cast chassis and running plate, firebox flicker, die-cast wheels, a sprung centre driving wheel, a five-pole motor, DCC sound compatibility and a Next18 decoder socket. It will also cater for original 'A1' and later'A1X' variants.

Delivery of the first batch is expected from late October with the original six models now set to be joined by the following new additions: LBSCR'A1'0-6-0T 40 *Brighton* in LBSCR Stroudley Improved Engine Green (4S-



010-007), WCPR'A1X'4 in WCPR lined green (4S-010-008), LBSCR 'A1'643 in LBSCR lined umber (4S-010-009), GWR'A1X'6 in GWR green (4S-010-010), Isle of Wight 'A1X'W9 Fishbourne in Southern

Railway lined olive green (4S-010-011) and Ex-Isle of Wight 'A1X' 32650 in BR lined black with early crests (4S-010-012).

Prices are set at £110 for DCC ready versions, £140 for DCC fitted

models and £239 for DCC sound fitted models. The latter will use recordings taken from 32678 at the Kent and East Sussex Railway.

# 'N' gauge Class 321 breaks cover

Revolution Trains has received the first engineering sample of its new 'N' gauge model of the Class 321 four-car AC overhead electric unit.

The model features detail differences between the driving cars, a posable pantograph with an etched metal head, working head and tail lights, illuminated destination blinds and interior lighting. Power couplings are provided between cars to allow a single DCC decoder to power the full train.

The Class 321 will be joined by the three-car ScotRail operated Class 320 which uses the same driving cars either side of the power car.

decorated sample stage. Bachmann has confirmed that all four units will have a low-level drive system allowing virtually full-depth interior detail, a single decoder socket to power the full train and twin motors (one in each driving car) for the Class 117, 158 and 159. A speaker will also be factory fitted in each driving car while the sound equipped Class 159 will use a Zimo 21-pin decoder to control its motor, lights and audio functions.

For 'N' gauge the Class 319 is the highlight of the latest product samples. It features directional and interior lighting, four-pin power couplings between the cars to allow a single Next18 decoder to power the full train as well as a

Also shown for 'N' gauge were decorated samples of the Thompson corridor carriages, modelling LNER faux teak and BR carmine and cream liveried vehicles together with decorated samples of the BR Mk 2Fs. 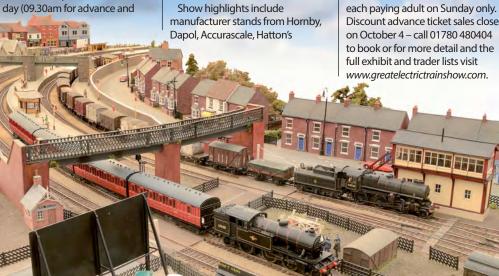

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EVOLUTION Trains has revealed five new projects at the recent International N Gauge Show headlined by a proposal for the Class 313 and 314 three-car Electric Multiple Units (EMUs). The unit project is joined by the announcement of four new wagons for the scale.

The Class 313/314 units will be Revolution's third ready-to-run EMU project for'N' gauge following the Class 390 Pendolino and the currently in development model of the Class 321 four-car EMU (see separate story). Revolution will model both the dual-voltage Class 313 (Great Eastern and Southern regions) and the overhead AC Class 314 (Scottish Region).

Proposed liveries include BR blue and grey, Network SouthEast, Silverlink, First, Southern and Network Rail yellow. The final livery selection will be announced when Revolution opens the order book for the units.

With the success of its 35ton Class B oil tankers, Revolution is planning a model of the Class A petrol tankers which use the same chassis but with a longer barrel used to transport the lighter form of fuel. The 1950s built tankers will be offered in Esso, Mobil and Staveley Chemicals liveries. Revolution is also proposing use of the same chassis to model the MTV/Zander stone and departmental wagons for 'N' gauge together with a further run of Class B tankers.

For modern era modellers the VTG-operated FWA 'Ecofret' short-wheelbase container flat twin and triple sets have been earmarked for development in 'N' gauge. These wagons are designed to carry 40ft or pairs of 20ft containers on each platform and they are currently in service with DB Cargo, Freightliner and GBRf. The models will have a metal spine with moulded deck and spigot detail. CAD drawing work has been completed and Revolution expects to open the order book soon.

Completing its round of new releases is the addition of the IWA Holdall and Timber carriers for 'N'gauge. These were previously announced for 'OO' (HM148). Full details were to be confirmed as *Hornby Magazine* closed for press.

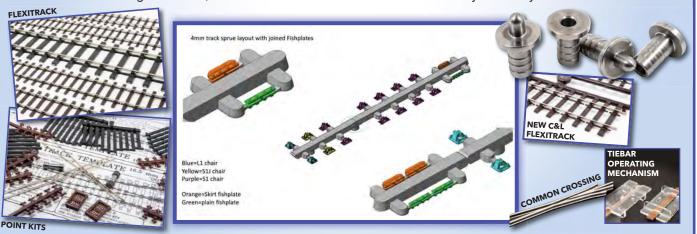

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# PFA WAGONS IN 1:76.2/00 SCALE AVAILABLE TO ORDER NOW



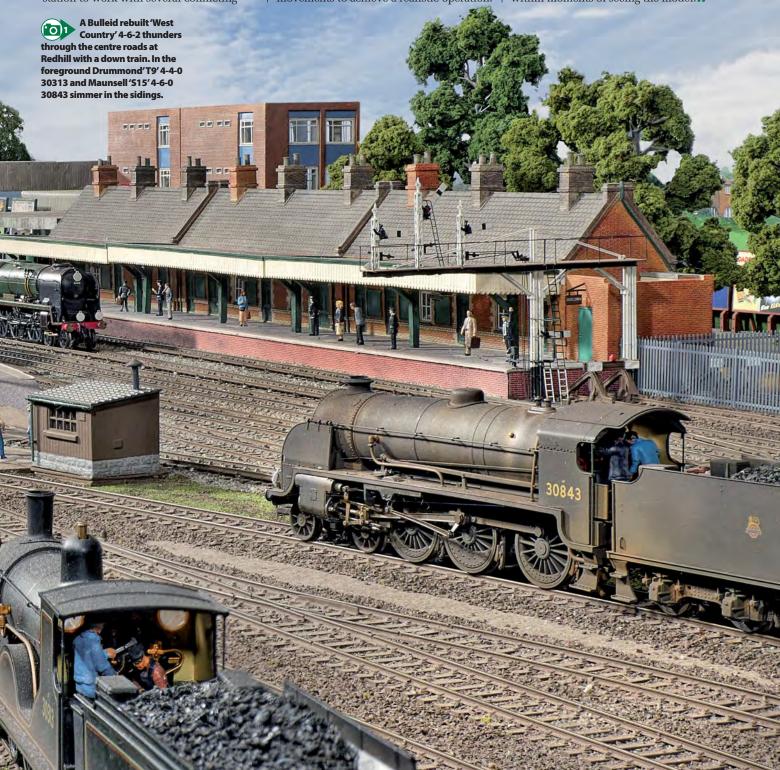
S A REGULAR commuter on the Southern Region of British Rail from Redhill to London Victoria over three decades until 2000, I have always had a great interest in the workings at Redhill station. Redhill was initially opened as Red Hill and Reigate Road in 1841 with various name changes until it was renamed Redhill in 1929. Two companies operated out of the station: the South Eastern & Chatham Railway (SECR) and the London Brighton & South Coast Railway (LBSCR). There was always a great conflict between these two companies, so the LBSCR decided to avoid the town entirely by building a bypass route through disused sand quarries and two new tunnels. This route became known as the 'Quarry Line'.

Redhill has always been a complicated station to work with several conflicting

routes converging from Tonbridge from the east and Guildford from the west. To complicate matters, there are only three platform faces and of these only two are available to deal with all the train movements from the diverging lines. There is also a regular and constant flow of traffic on the Brighton Main Line needing to stop at Redhill. Ever since opening, railwaymen have found this junction very demanding, especially during heavy use on the east-west line due to traffic having to reverse in the station. Further, there are extensive sidings, a large engine shed, turntable and maintenance facilities. Overall, a complicated setup.

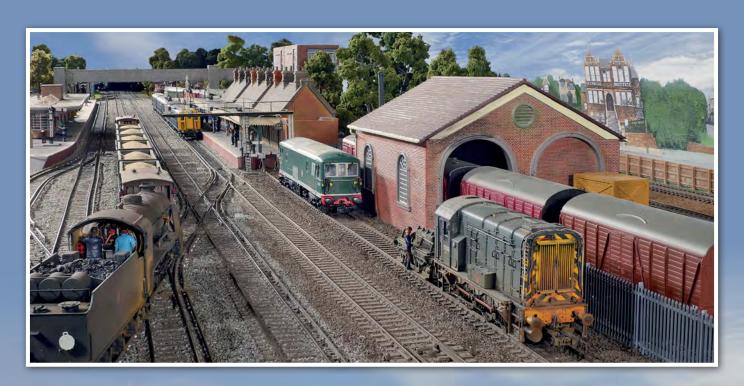
This situation still exists today, although only this year a new platform was opened on a disused siding. All this makes for an exciting model railway with a great deal of operating potential with demanding train movements to achieve a realistic operation.

The layout is based permanently in the loft of my house and the scenic area measures 28ft x 4ft at its fullest. It is a circular system with the possibility to work end-to-end if required. There are two storage yards, one for the main Brighton line based on a curve at the end of the layout (adding a further 6ft to its length) and one for the branch lines based on the far side of the plan. The era which I have chosen to model is the Southern Region of British Railways in the 1950s and early 1960s before the end of steam. Even so, I do run trains and liveries outside this period if the mood takes me. This layout can best be described as giving a flavour of the area rather than being a precisely accurate model - although the track layout at the station and the surrounding junction is quite accurate. One visitor was able to recognise it as Redhill within moments of seeing the model.

I used Gaugemaster medium grade ballast glued in place with a 50/50 mixture of PVA wood glue and water. I rather like the Gaugemaster ballast as it has a mix of tones in the stones and looks very realistic. The ballast in the sidings was further painted all over with Track Dirt to give a look of age and poor maintenance. Where engines stand in the station and Diesel Multiple Units (DMUs) wait, the ballast is painted an oily black colour. The engine shed roads are naturally covered in coal dust and dirt and only the railheads are left clean.

# **DIGITAL CONTROL**

The layout is DCC controlled using the ESU Ecos system. This is an excellent system and gives the user a significant number of different functions. All the locomotives are sound fitted either with ESU Loksound or Zimo decoders. Audio profiles come from a variety of suppliers, each with their good and bad points. There is no doubt that the sounds are improving all the time, particularly for steam locomotives. The early sound chips had no coasting feature which is now becoming much more commonplace.

I elected to keep the point and signal control under a conventional analogue system with a stud and probe arrangement for the points and push-buttons for signals. This avoids having to remember a multitude of DCC accessory addresses as well as those for locomotives. The control panels (there are three) have LEDs fitted to show the direction of the points. Without this feature it would be impossible to work the layout. I am using Peco solenoid point motors fitted with frog polarity and microswitches which work well, but the microswitches can be a little temperamental at times.

All the semaphore signals are operational. The simple upper quadrant signals are motorised Dapol products, but the complicated bracket signals are exquisitely custom made by Tony Gee using servo motors. These have been produced for me to match the trackwork at the complicated >>>

junction and to protect the routes leading to the junction turnouts. They are not interlocked with the points as I like to be able to set them independently according to the needs at the time. They are worked from the control panel using push-buttons placed in proper positions. One always must be very alert to ensure the signals are set correctly according to the planned movement and that the train does not pass the signal at danger.

## **BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES**

Apart from the engine shed, which is kitbuilt, all the buildings are ready-to-use from the proprietary makers. These aren't exact copies of the prototype buildings, but they offer a compelling appearance, particularly when viewed from typical distances. At the Brighton end of the layout, the ground rises to conceal the fact that although it looks as if the branch lines disappear in different directions, they converge into the storage yard on the far side of the layout.

The raised ground is made from papiermâché covered with Woodland Scenics grass cover with plenty of trees and bushes. Trees come from several suppliers, but some of the best are from Ceynix. There is a small town on the raised level with a church and several cameos, including a wedding. At the London side of the layout, the scenic area is marked from the storage yard by a footbridge spanning two main lines and two sidings. The footbridge is a heavily modified Hornby model which has been extended to span the tracks.

Extensive use has been made of readymade houses on this side of the station with many different cameos of activity in the various gardens. The station itself is well-populated with figures from the leading suppliers. I have mounted the characters on thin clear plastic so they can be moved around without damaging the platform surfaces with glue. The platforms themselves are formed from MDF cut to shape and covered on the sides and surface with Metcalfe papers and self-adhesive stone with white line edging papers. I decided that the length of the platforms should accommodate a locomotive and seven coaches as an acceptable compromise with regards to getting the right appearance for mainline train operation.

### **ROLLING STOCK**

The rolling stock is all from the main suppliers except for two Electric Multiple Units (EMU) - a 4-COR unit and a 2-BIL and 2-HAL combined unit which have been made from kits by professional builders. Since EMUs dominate this layout, most of the ready-to-run trains are available to run. The most notable is the Golden Age 'Brighton Belle' unit, which is a lovely model and runs very well. There is also a 'Thumper' four-car unit, with very realistic sound which plies between Redhill, Tonbridge and Guildford.

Steam traction is provided by a wide range of locomotives which would have run on these lines. Redhill was a major shed (75B) and had several locomotive classes allocated to it. It also handled many locomotives from



other sheds which terminated at Redhill. For instance, a GWR 'Manor' with chocolate and cream coaches arrived from Reading on the Guildford line. This terminated at Redhill, uncoupled, moved to the turntable, possibly re-coaled and returned to the station ready for the return journey.

Another interloper which is available on the layout, and could often be seen at holiday times, was a Stanier 'Black Five' 4-6-0 with LMS/BR coaches travelling from the Midlands to Brighton. This makes a change to all the regular Southern locomotives. As all the engines are fitted with sound, it can be quite overpowering when several are running at busy times.

Most of the trains, particularly the passenger trains, are made up of fixed rakes which are housed in the storage yards ready to take their turn. However, freight stock is shunted in the sidings, especially in those alongside the Tonbridge line.

All the locomotives have been detailed to some extent with some having been weathered, particularly the freight engines. All are fitted with a crew and have had real coal added to replace the plastic coal loads which come as supplied. I have kept the small tension lock couplings between locomotive and train but removed the tension hook at the front on most engines apart from those locomotives which need to work in reverse.

A full set of detail parts have been fitted on the front buffer beams, particularly scale coupling hooks. To reduce the distance between coaches, I have used Kadee couplings. All coaches have been provided with flexible corridor connections supplied by Modeller's Mecca so that no gaps show between vehicles. This offers a real improvement in appearance.

# **FIRST PROJECT**

Although I have been interested in model railways since a boy, this is the first layout I have been able to build, made possible since taking early retirement. Previously due to a shortage of space, time, finance

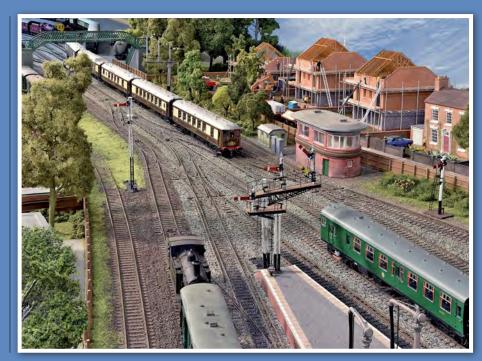

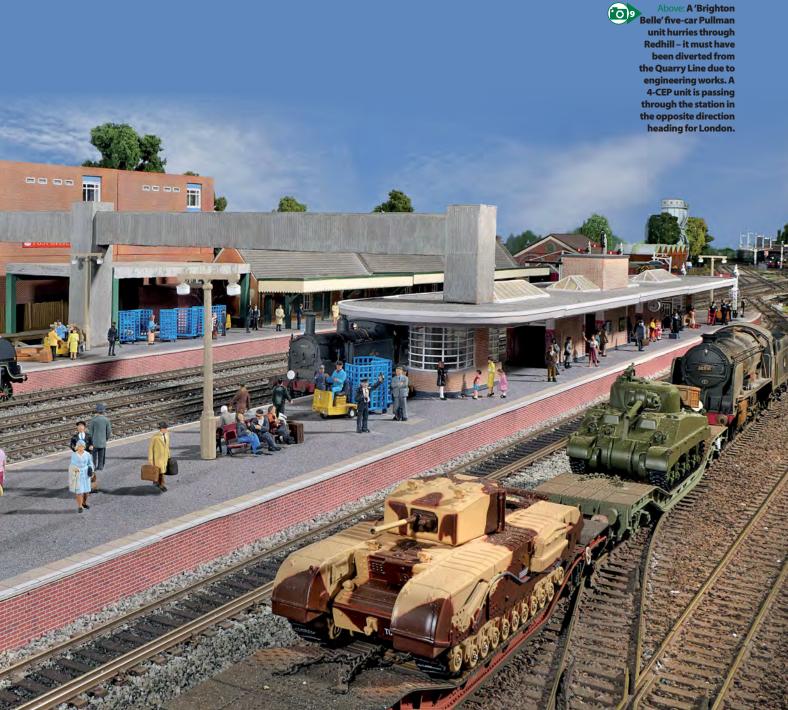
and family commitments, it had proved impossible to make a start. I did at one time take an interest in 'EM' gauge which I considered to be a very satisfactory way of achieving a near scale gauge, but I felt it was a step too far when building a large complicated layout like Redhill.

I have enjoyed building Redhill, which has given me a real interest in retirement and which has taken the best part of ten years to complete. It has been a great project, and I have enjoyed visiting many model railway exhibitions and meeting various knowledgeable people along the way.

Finally, I must thank the following people and businesses who have helped, either directly or indirectly, in building the layout: Chris Peters for his expertise in fitting sound decoders in many of my locomotives. Allen Etheridge for his skill in track laying and wiring. Tony Gee for building the exquisite bracket signals, Old Barn Model Craftsmen for drawing out the original track plan and Morris Models for general help, advice and supplies.

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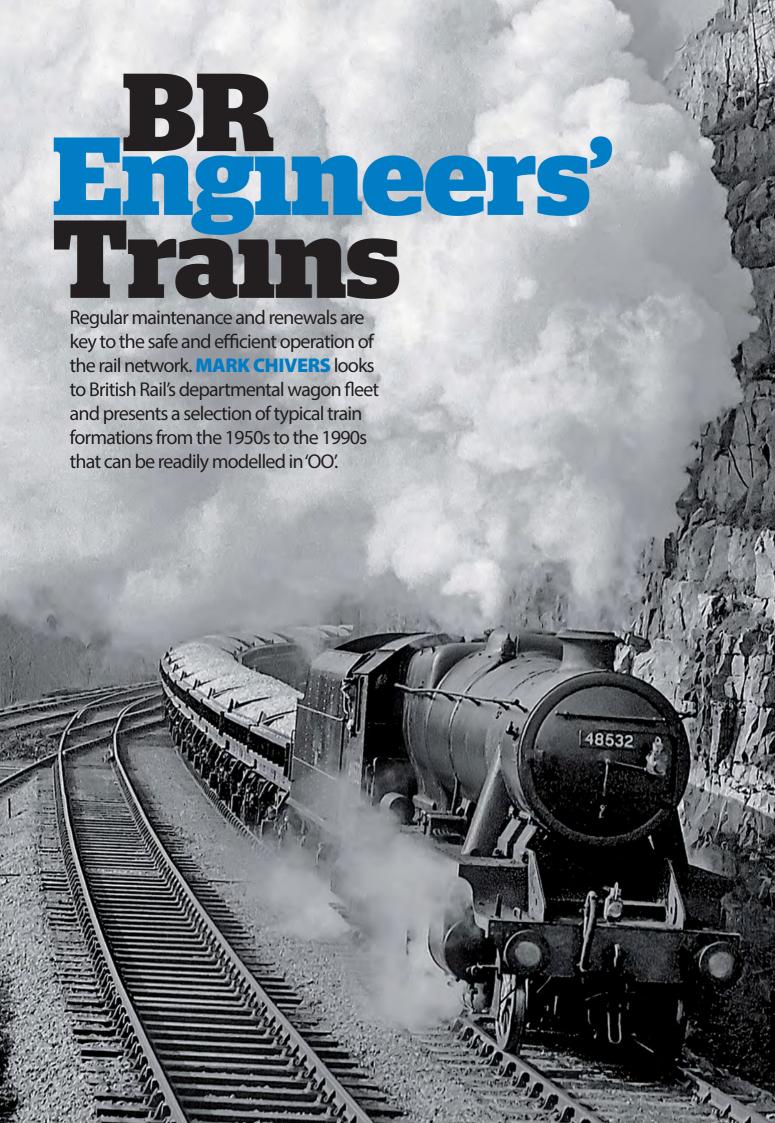
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# TRAIN FORMATIONS



HROUGH the years, dedicated teams of maintenance staff and engineers have helped keep the railway running with regular checks of the permanent way, signalling and telecommunications equipment, repairing and replacing as necessary. Whilst there were some new builds, a good proportion of these departmental vehicles were hand-me-downs from redundant revenue stock with some receiving a new lick of paint, while many were rebuilt or converted to make them more suitable for their new roles. Each of the subsequent wagon types also received a distinctive 'fishkind' moniker as a means of helping staff identify the many different vehicles employed.

BR operated a wide variety of train types for the transportation of ballast, rails, sleepers, track panels, signalling, structures and other materials. Equally important was providing a means to carry redundant equipment away following a line possession and even, at times, recovery of track and infrastructure following line closures.

During the week, a well-versed operation would ensure empty ballast wagons were transported to regional quarries, replenished and returned to their respective yards ahead of their next turn of duty, usually at the weekend. While this was taking place, other departmental stock would be marshalled in accordance with the next job's requirements, sometimes resulting in an eclectic mix of wagons. In addition to the traditional wagon fleet, BR's strategic breakdown cranes were also occasionally called upon to supplement the civil engineering department's smaller cranes at worksites for lifting larger structures into place.

From a modelling perspective, Bachmann, Dapol, Heljan and Hornby offer a good selection of suitable 'OO' gauge motive power together with an impressive line-up of rolling stock ranging from ballast hoppers to bogie bolsters and spoil wagons to ballast ploughs. Smaller manufacturers have also rallied to the departmental cause with the likes of Flangeway Models' ZJV'Mermaid' side-tipping ballast wagons and Kernow Model Rail Centre's YCV 'Turbot' bogie ballast wagons and ZAA 'Pike' open wagons. Exclusive

collaborations through traditional channels have resulted in The Model Centre's (TMC) Bachmann-produced ZDO/ZVO'Winkle' barrier wagons and Cheltenham Model Centre's recently released ZDV pipe and ZGV Tube wagons resplendent in the Satlink colour scheme adopted by BR's Signal and Telecommunications (S&T) department.

Hornby's 75ton breakdown crane and a growing collection of re-liveried Breakdown Train Unit (BTU) support vehicles from Bachmann, Dapol and Hornby, may also come in useful. Looking to the future, Bachmann is currently developing a 'OO' gauge 45ton Ransomes and Rapier steam crane in Southern Railway black, Great Western Railway black and BR red, while Hatton's exclusive 'OO' gauge YBO 12ton Plasser and Theurer General Purpose Crane will enable more prototypical formations to be created. This type of crane often appeared within engineering train formations at worksites. Another project on the move again is Flangeway Models' 'Salmon' bogie track panel wagon for 'OO' (see Update).

In terms of other specialist equipment, Bachmann offers a motorised Plasser and Theurer OWB10 track machine with crane and 07-16 track tamping machine within its 'OO' gauge range, although strictly speaking these are to 'HO' scale. Further 'HO' scale ready-to-run track machines are also available in the Viessmann range, which includes a fully functioning Plasser and Theurer 09-3X track tamping machine. A motorised ready-to-run 'OO' gauge 07-16 track tamper is also available through Britannia Pacific Models.

While the selection of readyto-run departmental wagons available for the period is impressive, there are also a few prototypes that are only offered as kits, including a good selection through Cambrian Models such as 40ton 'Walrus' and 50ton 'Whale' bogie ballast hoppers, 'Sturgeon' bogie rail/sleeper wagons, YSA 'Salmon' bogie flat wagons, ZEV 'Catfish' ballast hoppers and more. Make Your Mark Models manufactures 'OO' gauge kits of Plasser and Theurer's 12ton GPC and 12.5ton twin-jib cranes.

The following selection of mainly civil engineers' train formations offers a glimpse of operations between the 1950s and late 1990s, with seemingly limitless permutations given the diversity of the wagon fleet and motive power from this period.

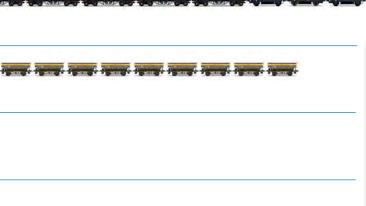

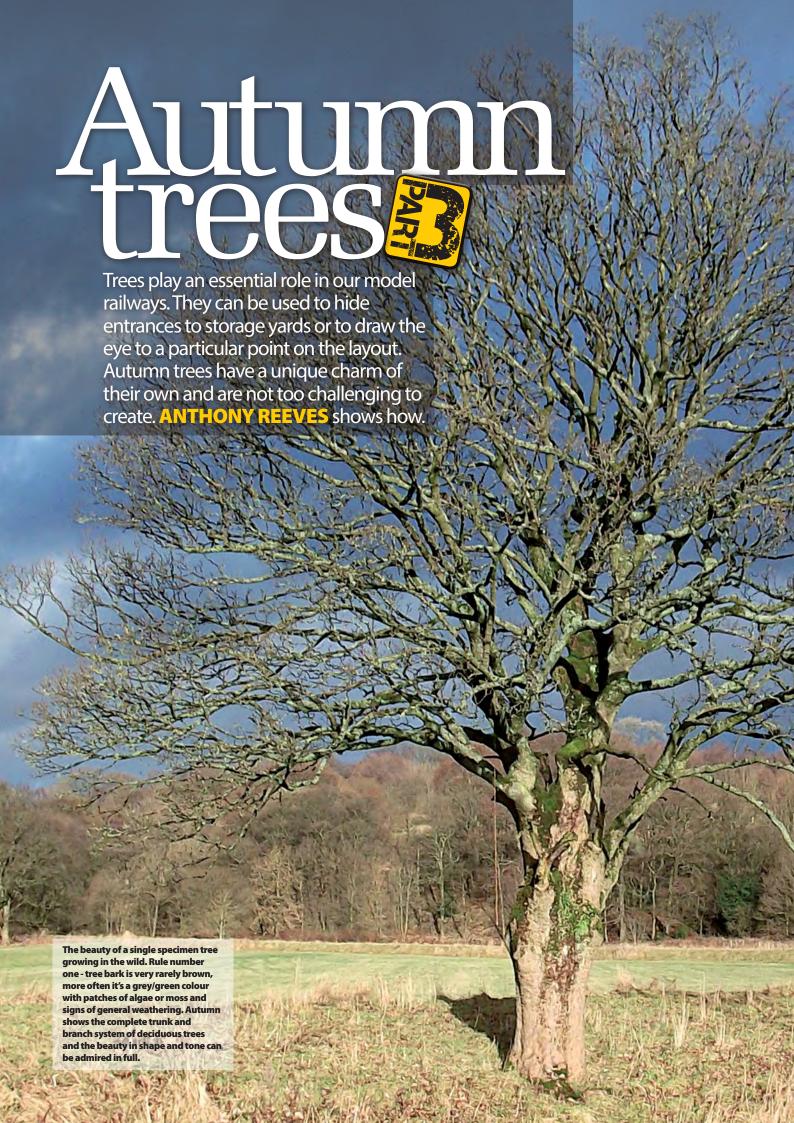

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#### MAKING THE ARMATURE

Start by pulling a few of the wires from the bunch and wrap a short length of masking tape around the end of them. This creates a planting pin which holds the tree steady and upright in the landscape. The very ends of the remaining wires can be bent outwards and twisted to create a root system if required. Next, take one of the wires and tightly wind it around the trunk, wind it up the trunk to the point where you want to start the first bough, then taking around 15 wires, bend them away from the trunk. This is the start of the first bough. To make the bough, take a single cable and wind it tightly around the 15 wires. At around 30mm away from the trunk, take five wires and bend them away from the bough.

Using the same method twist these wires around each other, creating a small horizontal side branch. Take another wire and repeat the process on the opposite side of the bough using fewer wires. Take another wire and wind this around the bough and create a branch on the same side as the first one again using fewer wires to make each side branch thinner than the previous one. Once all the cables have been used to create the first bough, take another single wire and wind it around the trunk up to the point where you want the second bough to be positioned - to make a nicely balanced looking tree, it is best to position the second bough on the opposite side of the trunk as the first one - although of course in nature trees can grow with randomly placed branches.

Repeat the first step but use fewer wires, so the bough is slightly thinner than the first, again pulling the wires nice and tight. When this bough and side branches are complete, take another single wire and wind it up the trunk, this time making a bough and branch system to the rear of the trunk then working up the trunk make one to the front, then to the same side as the first one until all the wires have been used up. You will have a wire armature which is wider at the base with boughs which get progressively narrower the further up the tree they are. Trim all the long excess wires off using wire cutters.

The next step is to take masking tape and wrap it tightly around the trunk and the boughs. Bear in mind the scale of the tree to avoid making the trunk too wide. The boughs and side branches can be shaped by hand to give them a natural look. The single wires are crimped with fine nosed pliers or by using your thumbnail to provide them with a realistic-looking growth pattern to the canopy.

#### **ADDING BARK**

The next step and the one which transforms the wire armature into a more realistic looking tree is to add the bark. For this I am using Treemendus bark powder. Put a small amount of the powder into a container and add a few drops of diluted PVA glue, mixing it with a stirrer to form a thick paste to a consistency that can be applied to the tree with a paintbrush. The mix can be slightly thinned with the diluted PVA for the more delicate branches and slightly thickened up with more powder for the trunk and thicker boughs. Hold the base of the tree and start by applying the bark to the top of the tree, working down towards the roots as you go. Once the whole armature has been covered, it should be left for 24 hours to dry completely.

Some autumn/winter trees can be added to the layout like this and look great once weathered, but as this tree is to have a canopy of autumnal foliage, it is essential to add some finer branch material.

#### **CREATING A CANOPY**

Take a plait of 'Canopy', or block of rubberised horsehair, and pull it apart into an open structure. Spray the canopy/horsehair with a suitable coloured aerosol (optional) and leave to dry. When it has dried place it onto the tree - there is no need to glue it on during this step. Spray the whole tree with hairspray and lightly sprinkle over the scatter. Once you are happy with the coverage, spray the entire tree with diluted PVA from a bottle with an atomiser. This will hold the scatter to the branches and the branches to the tree. Set aside to dry.

#### **REFINING THE TREE**

Before the trees are added to the landscape, their shape and general appearance will be improved.

To refine the canopy, take sharp scissors and trim off any overly long fibres that stick out from the tree.

Also trim any fibres which form a loop. Small shrubs and bushes can be made from the offcuts of wire following the same method.

The Silver Birch trees are made following the same principle but using fewer wires. The armatures are covered with bark and painted to resemble the prototype tree. I use white matt emulsion paint with a tiny spot of yellow added to tone it down. For Silver Birch, synthetic hair is used to make the very fine pendulous branches. Autumn yellow scatter is applied in the same way as the large tree to resemble yellow autumn leaves.

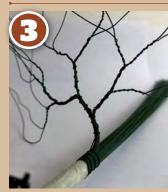
The trees are now ready to plant in the autumn diorama allowing us to progress to the final stages of scenic detail.

#### STEP BY STEP MAKING WIRE ARMATURE TREES





A single wire is wrapped around the 'trunk' to hold it together. This wire should be pulled tightly, which creates a solid tree armature. Where the first bough appears on the tree may depend on whether the tree is being designed to hide a feature on the layout or to draw the eye to something on the layout. Either way, pull around 15 wires away from the main bunch of wires.



To create a branch system, take one of the wires and twist it around the wires pulled away from the main trunk. Choose a point where you want the first side branch to appear and bend a few wires to the side. Twist these wires to create side branches. When all the wires have been used, take another wire, twist it around the bough and create another side branch on the opposite side of the bough. This procedure is continued until all the wires for the first bough have been used.



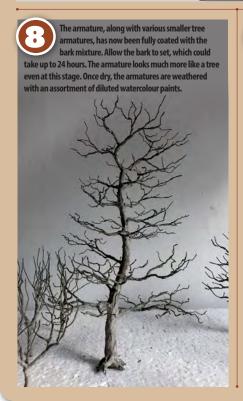
Using the same method as the last step, move further up the tree and bend some wires out to create the second bough. Here the second bough has been positioned on the opposite side of the trunk to the first. Move up the tree using the same method. It is worth noting that tree branches get thinner the further up the tree they are so as you move up the trunk use fewer wires for the boughs. All the wires have now been used up.

















### TOOLS

- » Wire cutters
- » Paintbrushes

Silver Birch trees are very recognisable due to their shape and bark colour. They have slender trunks which display characteristic markings. They also add contrast to the other trees on our layouts.

#### **WHAT WE USED**

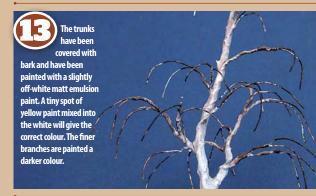
- 0.38mm diameter soft metal wire
- Masking tape
- Treemendus Bark Powder
- Diluted PVA glue
- Synthetic or rubberised Horsehair
- Watercolour paints
- Hairspray
- Scenic scatters



To fix the scatter to the tree, the canopy is liberally sprayed with hairspray. While the hairspray is still wet, scatter is lightly sprinkled over the tree. Any scatter sticking to the trunk or bough areas can be brushed off using a stiff-bristled brush. The whole tree is now sprayed with diluted PVA glue using an atomiser bottle. The glue not only holds the scatter to the fine branches, it also holds the fine branches to the wire armature. Note the openness of the canopy in this dose-up image.













The canopy, which comes in the form of a plait, is pulled to form long pendulous branches which are then attached to the PVA on the armature. Once all the branches have been covered, the canopy is sprayed with hairspray and the scatter is applied. A light spraying of diluted PVA will hold the scatter in place permanently.

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# TIM SHACKLETON explores ways of

modelling freight stock minus loads – a common feature of the real railway, but not always depicted convincingly on our layouts. The key, as ever, is observation.

S a change from reading articles about modelling wagon loads, here's one on empties. Every layout owner likes to see wagons earning their keep, but buying ready-made loads can work out expensive if you have a long train to fill. Creating convincing loads is often an area where modellers stumble - from lumps of coal the size of boulders to consignments of 'scrap metal' looking suspiciously like plastic kit leftovers. Modelling empties ought, by definition, to be considerably easier - or so you'd think.

A long train of empty bogie bolsters, mineral wagons or aggregate hoppers can look good on a layout - so why don't we see more of them? When you think about it, pretty well all bulk hauls by rail - coal, steel, aggregates, oil, chemicals - are one-way loadings, while mixed freights usually contain a variable balance of empty and loaded vehicles. The ideal compromise is to run trains made up exclusively of vans or tank wagons - no one can tell from the outside whether they're full or empty.

Peter Denny had a novel solution on his famous Buckingham

branch. On the long coal train that made its way around the layout each day, dropping off wagons along the way, each vehicle had a removable body that could be swapped for an empty version. At the start of the next operating day, these would then be collected up and marshalled into a long train of empties that made its way back to the Nottinghamshire collieries served by the Great Central. Once the train reached the rotary storage yard that represented the rest of the world, the whole cycle would be repeated, and loaded wagon bodies substituted for empties.

Not everyone has Peter Denny's inventiveness, so in this piece I'll show you some of the things I've learned over the years about modelling empty wagons. It's mostly to do with weathering in one form or another - capturing the look of unpainted wood or rusted steel, recreating the ghostly traces of previous loads and above all learning to look hard at your prototype and copying what you see as closely as you can. If you study the pictures, you'll see how the imaginative use of weathering materials can make a massive difference to the trains you run on your layout.



# 20 HOR DESTRUCTION

### **MODELLING EMPTY WAGONS**



A close-up of the kind of effects you might want to copy. This 12ton coal wagon shows heavily bleached and stained wood together with the marks of extended use with loose loads in all weathers and over many years. Coal merchants are famously thrifty, and wagons such as this would be carefully swept out after unloading. You wouldn't see the empties making their way back to the colliery with highly saleable lumps of coal scattered over the wagon floor.



It's been a long time since these North Eastern Railway woodenbodied hoppers last carried a load of coal, but exposure to the elements over many years has created a distinctive patina – note the well-rusted bolt heads. Different types of wood weather differently but variations on a silvery grey-brown will generally do the trick.





Three sets of acrylic paints from the Lifecolor range – I find them incredibly useful in this type of work because they capture the elusive qualities of bare wood. You needn't always take too much notice of what it says on the tin, by the way – suitably blended, some of the 'weathered wood' shades do equally well for rust effects.



Manufacturers don't always help in our quest for realism – open wagons are usually plain brown inside and the interior detail is equally unconvincing.



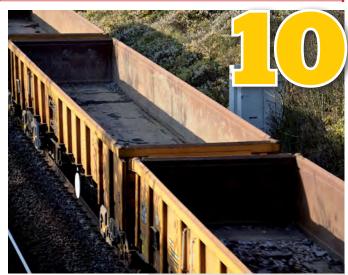


Along with the yellow wheel chocks carefully stowed away, the addition of some prototypical oil leaks brings the Carflats to life, suggesting these are working wagons standing idle between jobs. These tiny details can make all the difference.





I've been weathering 16ton mineral wagons for more than 50 years and I'm still not convinced I've got it entirely right. The ones seen here – in terms of my collection, this is just the tip of the iceberg – have been painted by a variety of methods but the important thing to note, inside and out, is the consistency. No two are alike and yet the variations aren't enormous.

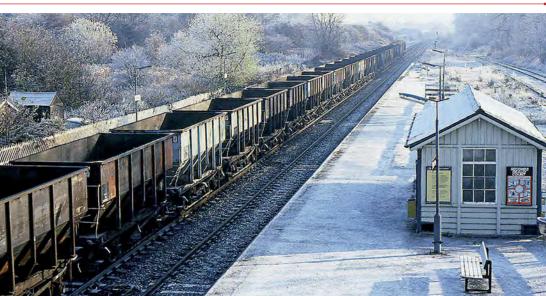




The interiors of these JNA 'Falcon' ballast wagons display a fairly uniform coating of rust with an obvious 'tide mark' to show where the load has been. Note the scattered remnants of previous ballast consignments, common with loose loads.

Apologies for the low quality, but this is as good a guide as I've yet seen to the interior condition of the familiar BR 16ton mineral wagon. There's not a lot of colour variation between the three on view here, but I'm immediately struck by the randomness of the marks of use.

What colour should you paint the interiors of steel-bodied coal wagons? These 24.5ton HUO hoppers on their way back to Gedling Colliery in Nottinghamshire suggest a well-blended mixture of rust and coal dust.



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Ballast hoppers weather in much the same way as open boxes, but with unmistakable evidence of how the loads have slid down the body during unloading.



The subtlest way to recreate a well-rusted interior is by using weathering powders over airbrushed paint. Use a broad brush to flick the powder on in tiny quantities with a downward motion.

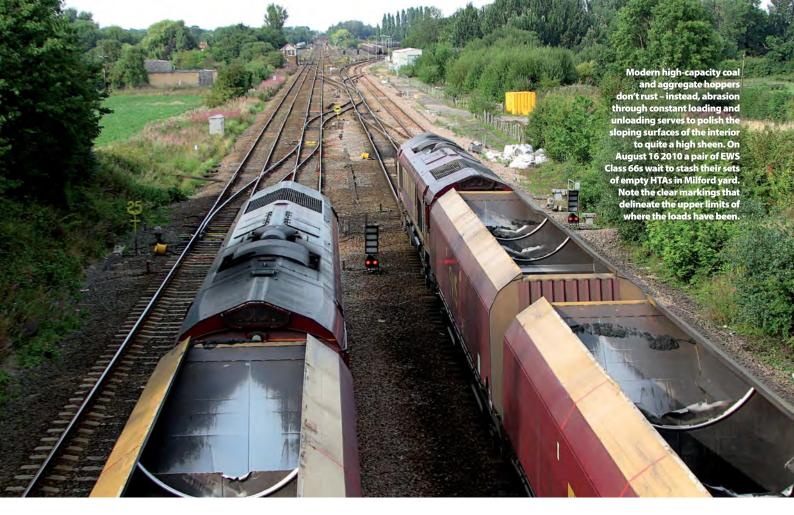


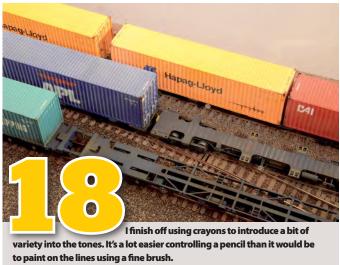
Whatever kind of aggregate or mineral the wagon is carrying, you'll find some fine residues usually gather in the bottom of the hopper after unloading. Again, a light dusting of weathering powder brushed into the visible seams and panel lines will yield the best results. Avoid huge lumps of coal or ballast.



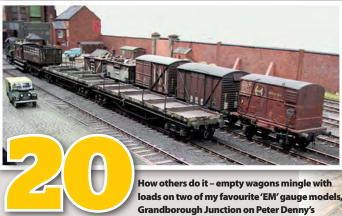
Models of modern intermodal wagons are so exquisitely detailed that it's almost a shame to load them with containers. If you prefer to run them empty, they need to be distressed. These lateral scrape marks from the ribs under the containers are a common weathering feature.







Empty means empty. There's a value to whatever load a wagon is carrying and the leftovers – coal, scrap metal, minerals – don't go to waste. With merchandise traffic, however, you'll often find ropes and packing materials discarded on the wagon floor. This is modelled using detritus from my workbench, scattered at random.



Buckingham branch and Peter Johnson's Canada Road. Pretty convincing, eh? In both cases, these are sorting sidings where, in what amounts to an openair storage yard, wagons are marshalled into formation before despatch.

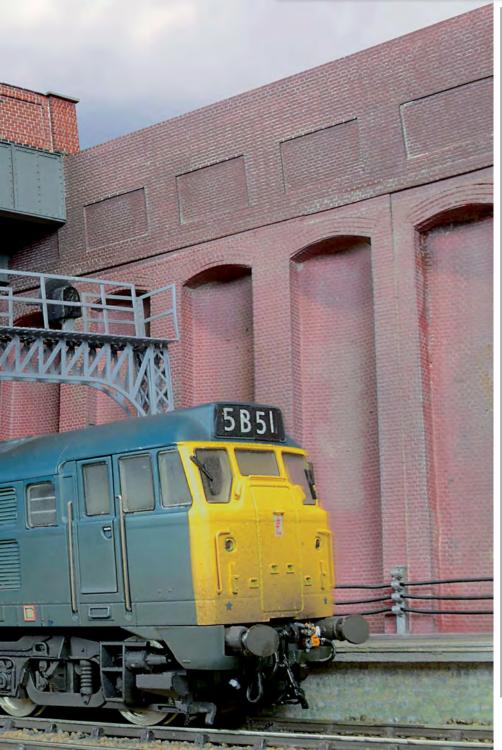
How do you pay suitable tribute to a railway modelling legend? **TOM CUNNINGTON** of the Model Railway Club reveals how he drew inspiration from a classic layout by a famous member Cyril Freezer from the 1950s in 'EM' gauge.



started our interest in model railways as children with one or more of the track plan books - as inspiration for how to make something more operationally integrating out of the 6ft x 4ft baseboard than a couple of tail-chasing loops. Further through the books were some of the ideas we could only dream of - layouts the size of garages that were way beyond the means of pocket money and monthly allowances, let alone parental planning permission!

In a couple of those books were some smaller 'end to end' ideas, and the one that always caught my eye was Minories - as designed by the late Cyril Freezer back in 1957 - a long-time Model Railway Club member. The concept was to show that a busy terminus station could be modelled in a limited space using proprietary set track available at the time.





The resulting model is an imagined extension of the Moorgate 'Widened Lines' further into the City of London to a three platform terminus. The period is the late 1960s and early 1970s, before electrification of the suburban lines from King's Cross and St Pancras, with a heavily peaked service conveying commuters between Hertford, Hatfield and Luton and the City. Whilst the tight curves and steep inclines of the tunnels around King's Cross limited the length of coaches and length of trains to something we could model reasonably realistically in a small space, there was sufficient variety of motive power around to make it interesting to model. It allowed us to keep many of Cyril's original ideas – the layout in a cutting with retaining walls providing the back-scene and a bridge to cover the baseboard joint.

#### **A COMMEMORATION**

To mark the 50th anniversary, in late 2006 a group of MRC members looking for a new project thought they would try to recreate the plan as closely as possible, but to aim for a high standard using modern modelling techniques including hand-built turnouts. Most of the group were already interested or modelling in 'EM' (4mm:1ft scale models running on 18mm gauge track), so one of the few changes to the original plan was to move away from 'OO' gauge. We had some discussion about what period and area to model, and we quickly narrowed it down to two choices - either locomotive-hauled 'Met' stock (close to the original inspiration of Liverpool Street), or the City 'Widened Lines'. At the time the range of readily available stock for both was limited, but the cost of kits for the 'Met' stock was higher and there was slightly more stock available that could be adapted for the widened lines.

Minories is the road between Tower Hill and Aldgate stations right in the heart of the City of London. Our assumption is that an additional railway line made it into the area – an extension of the 'Widened Lines' from Moorgate to get to the eastern side of the City. In this world we also assumed provision was made for a possible future extension beyond ""

Minories further east onto the London Tilbury & Southend routes and the docks.

Fast forward 90 years, and imagine a small run-down passenger terminus in the heart of the City, with a diesel train service, concentrated in the peaks, from and to a range of destinations on the Great Northern (GN) and Midland main lines. Core services on the GN line would have been Mk 1 suburban coaches hauled by Class 31s, with lesser used services operated with Cravens Class 105s in multiple, whilst the Midlands service would have run with Class 127 or 116 Diesel Multiple Units (DMUs). With a bit of stretching of the imagination, other classes based locally are assumed to have been fitted with the trip-cocks necessary to run through Moorgate – and Class 23s are regularly used.

#### **BUILDING MINORIES**

Our layout is built in 'EM' gauge, and our main compromise over the original plan has been to slightly lengthen the points to give more generous curves making the scenic area about a foot longer and 2in wider than Cyril envisaged. This allows locomotive and four-coach train formations – a small reduction from the real thing before the platforms were lengthened at Moorgate to allow six-coach trains after the 'Quad Arts' were replaced.

It was always designed to be portable and exhibited at exhibitions. After checking it would fit in the back of my car at the time, we built two identical 4ft x 1ft scenic boards. These consist of 18mm birch plywood for the ends and a central cross piece, 6mm plywood for the top, front and backscenes and 9mm square softwood along the 6mm plywood joints to give better rigidity. The materials were cut with care, then PVA glued and held together with clamps to check alignment before using a nail gun to add extra strength and hold them whilst the glue dried.

The original storage yard is a six-road traverser, slightly longer than a locomotive and four coaches. With a shorter than ideal lead in, this made the board 5ft long, about the maximum size and weight for

one person to carry safely and just the right length for a car roof-box. The moving table is a plywood sandwich, mounted on three heavy duty filing cabinet sliders on an 18mm plywood skeleton. The tracks are located using heavily modified brass door bolts turned down on a friend's lathe so they were a good fit inside some brass tube that was soldered into the original casings.

#### **TRACK**

The original plan was designed around the very limited number of ready-to-run points available in the 1950s. By the time you read this, the EM Gauge Society should have its flexible track as well as B6 ready to lay points available which means that building a Minories layout in 'EM' gauge is now far more straightforward.

There was no option when we started the project, so the six turnouts (actually A5.5 points – which means a slightly shorter switch section and 1:5.5 angle at the common crossing to balance length, radius and reliability) were drawn up in *Templot* and built on a separate piece of 6mm MDF. The printout was stuck down firmly on the

MDF, followed by the sleepers. I used C&L Finescale components, but following a bad experience with expansion distorting rails with just plastic chairs in which the rails can move in the heat of some busy exhibitions, I now build track with a number of soldered copper-clad sleepers to provide a firmer 'box' structure. I think that provides a good balance between reliability and aesthetics.

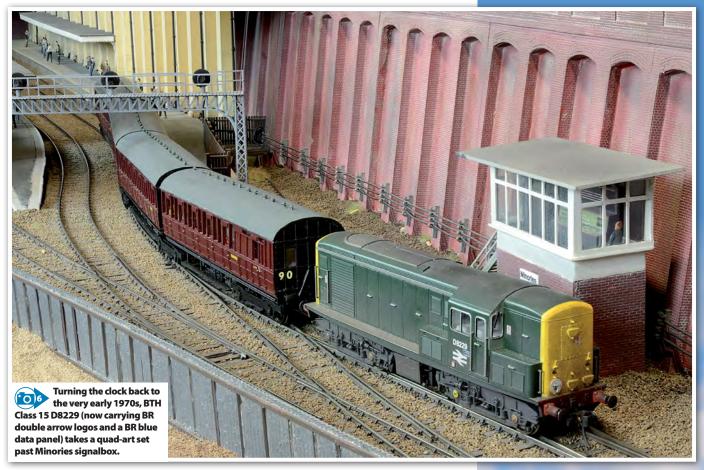
Building the junction as a single unit meant I could use longer pieces of rail to get smooth curves and check the alignment throughout from all angles. Cuts for insulation breaks were only put in later. The switch rails are operated with Tortoise motors using Exactoscale adaptor plates. The switch rails with their silver-soldered droppers (as advised in the Exactoscale instructions) to the subsurface tie bars were fitted after the whole MDF assembly was fixed to the plywood baseboard surface. Although I was dubious about how long they would last, since building I have only had to repair them around half a dozen times - almost always in the middle of an exhibition which adds an extra dimension for visitors as engineers take possession and the soldering iron comes out.

The plain line is flexible track, and prior to laying it on more MDF glued to the ply, I installed Kadee electromagnetic uncouplers in the board flush with the top surface. I also installed brass screws for rail end protectors and filed them to a rectangular profile to have a contact area the width of the rail so they aren't visible unless you really look for them. The track was glued with a small amount of PVA and, when it had dried, soldered to the end protectors before being cut.

The layout is wired for DC, so after checking it worked electrically, I spray painted the track with some general mucky brown colours and rails with a mixture of rust and black, then installed the platforms before ballasting. The ballast was painstakingly tapped and brushed to the right position, then lightly sprayed with water from a plant mister with some washing up liquid, before even more painstakingly using a pipette to very gently.







flood the ballast with a 50/50 PVA water mix, with some extra washing up liquid. When it had all set, I cleaned off the rail tops and made sure the switch rails still moved.

The retaining wall was originally made of two layers of 3mm hardboard, the front one with the recesses cut out and then Scalescenes brick-paper glued down. This was effective and lasted for about five years but I wanted more depth - and to reflect the difference between the station and the cutting. The 'new' retaining walls are resin castings based on the retaining walls at and near Barbican station. There are two types of wall - a light brick for the station itself with vertical fronts and a slope to the recesses, and those elsewhere with almost vertical recesses and sloping pillars. With a whole series of pictures - and some measurements and brick counting on site - I made masters from brick styrene sheets of two and four recesses wide respectively, and from moulds cast up the sections that are glued together to form the wall.

I've assumed that the original overall roof was war damaged, so the platforms have 'temporary' canopies made from steel girders and a felt and baton roof. This is made from brass section for the structure, with Wills sections for the roof and laser cut wood for the valance. These provide shelter for the waiting passengers who are mostly cheap plastic mouldings from eBay repainted to reflect city type suits from the 1970s and fixed in place using a short piece of wire drilled and glued into a foot and the platform. A few of the more prominent people are better quality (and much more expensive) models. The cleared site on the right of the layout is a

precursor to the coming redevelopment of the area, in which I imagine a Moorgate style overbuild of the station and approach lines which means the station is being allowed to get even more run down. The station building is two Kibri kits modified to better represent some of the characteristics of Great Northern Railway station architecture with British style roof, canopy and windows. The footbridge has its origins in an Alan Gibson kit. Beyond the station the Minories Hotel is a modified US kit.

The signal gantry is an etched brass kit, and the heads are tri-colour LED searchlights from the Signalist. This type of signal was chosen on the assumption that re-signalling used left over parts from either the Great Eastern or North London Line schemes.

The layout took this form for its first 10 years – but in the last couple of years, we've assumed that the line did connect through onto the 'LTS' and the layout has grown to allow for the through running of non-passenger services to and from London's Docks and Tilbury – with a circular storage yard.

#### **ROLLING STOCK**

Within the last 15 years, there has been a huge development in ready-to-run stock that would be suitable for Minories. Most of the locomotives now used are off the shelf with new 'EM' gauge wheels (a mixture of Ultrascale and Black Beetle), Kadee couplings and new numbers and headcodes suitable for the period. Although Class 31s dominated the last few years of locomotive-hauled trains, I have extended the period and assumed a few of the other early diesel classes based at Finsbury Park,



which were used on suburban services after the end of steam, remained into the blue era. These came in especially useful when several of the Class 31 fleet suffered from chassis rot and took a while to be replaced. A Silver Fox Class 23 kit and modified Lima Class 26 have been replaced by some of the Heljan versions.

The four Class 105 DMUs are DC Kits with Black Beetle motor bogies and can run individually or in pairs. The Class 116 and 127 units for the Midland services are 'cut and shut' Lima DMUs.

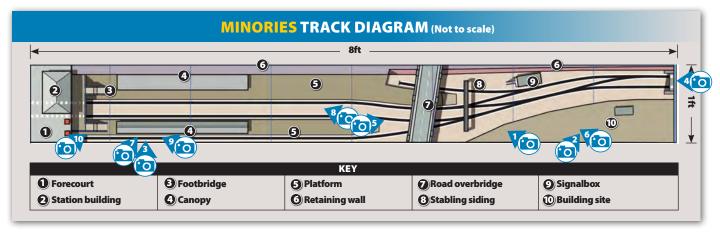
The GN suburban services were the last outpost of the non-corridor 57ft Mk 1 coaches. The 'inner' sets were initially made up of Second and Brake Second coaches, which are the types Bachmann makes. At the time they were only available in maroon, but luckily a shop was selling broken-up sets and I got a bag full of coaches at a good price. As well as repainting them into blue, I lowered the moulded ridges on the roofs. Because they are an old model, the sides are fairly thick with very



deep set glazing strips so, before painting and ultimately fitting South Eastern flush glazing, I also took a little bit of plastic off the interior rim of the window openings to allow the glazing to sit flush inside.

The coaches have specific markings on the ends and as nobody made these as transfers, I commissioned them from 4D models. The windows have the appropriate No Smoking and Ladies compartment >>> Passenger wait for the next arrivals at Minories.





labels, and the people inside are cheap ones from China (like the passengers on the platform). The wheels are a mixture of EMGS, Black Beetle and more recently DCC concepts nickel silver inside the original bogies, and they are fitted with Kadees - originally No. 34 due to the tight clearance between the end of the bogie and the buffer beam, but as the springs go I'm replacing them with the Whisker variety.

The outer suburban rake consists of Composite Lavatory Open (CLO) and Second Lavatory Open (SLO) as well as a Brake Second. The CLO is only available as an etched side from Bill Bedford so I made the rake from his side kits combined with Comet chassis, roof, ends, bogies and details. I was a bit wary of soldering the level of detail and the first one took some time. But the other three were much quicker to build as confidence in my own abilities grew.

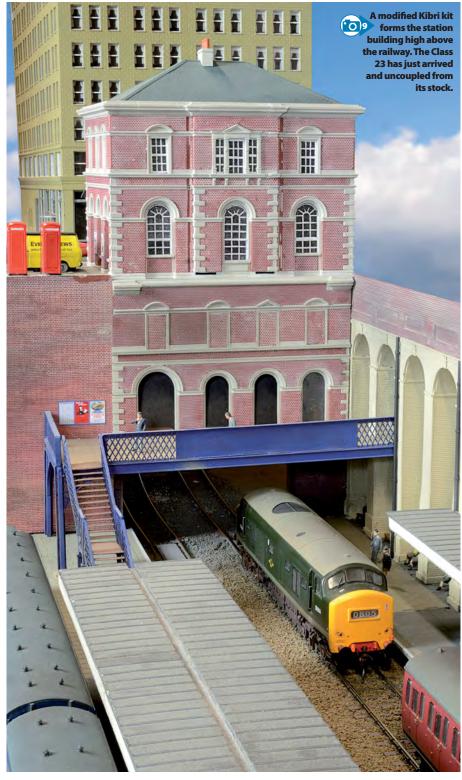
Freight stock is growing and includes trains that might have run to and from the docks – including new cars from Dagenham, freight liners and minerals as well as the odd parcel train moving across London.

#### **RUNNING THE TRAINS**

Operation reflects an intensive peak hour service, with a series of locomotive-hauled sets arriving and departing from the two longer platforms, with associated light engine moves to run around. The DMU services use the shorter bay platform. There is no formal schedule, but the cycle of trains leads to a rhythm that then transitions to a freight sequence representing the inter-peak, before the peak passenger service resumes.

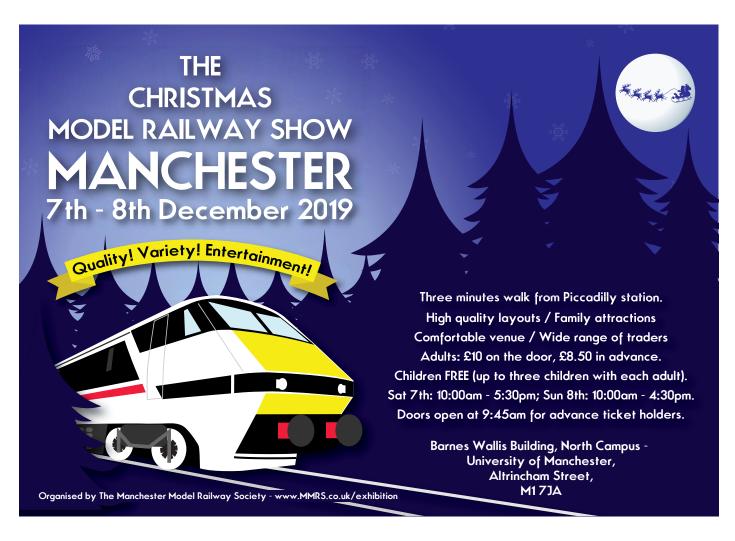
I and the team have had a great deal of pleasure building and operating what is a small and simple design – and we would never have thought that we would still be getting invitations to exhibitions over a decade after we started. With the advent of ready to lay 'EM' gauge track and easy conversion of most modern rolling stock (and of course a ready-to-run Class 26), modelling in 'EM' gauge is much more straightforward than ever and is well worth considering as it does look more realistic.

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# The English Electric Class 50 is the latest locomotive to be produced in 'N' gauge by Dapol. MIKE WILD reviews this feature-rich new arrival.

OWERFUL and popular the long-standing English Electric Class 50 diesel-electric has long been wanted as a modernday model for 'N' gauge. The '50', or 'Hoover' in enthusiast parlance, was first produced for the scale by Graham Farish, but current moulding techniques have left that version behind.

Dapol rose to the challenge when it began work on a brand new version in 2013. Times changed and the project took a back seat, but in 2017 Dapol confirmed that the 'Hoover' was back on the drawing board for production and release. Two years later and the first full batch touched down in September

offering a tantalising new choice of motive power for 'N' gauge.

The Class 50s were built by English Electric at its Vulcan Foundry plant with the first rolling off the production line in September 1967. The full fleet of 50 was completed within 14 months of the first and they entered service on the northern section of the West Coast Main Line working passenger and freight turns. Numbered D400-D449, they were turned out in the then-new BR corporate blue livery with full yellow ends.

They had a 2,700hp English Electric 16CSVT engine and owed much of their internal design to prototype DP2. Externally BR's Design Panel was in charge of their appearance as well as the internal layout of the engine room. From the early 1970s, the fleet began to be transferred south to the Western Region to take over from diesel-hydraulics on express services. However, availability reduced and the decision was taken to overhaul all of the class. This took place at Doncaster Works between 1980 and 1983 and also saw the fleet progressively turned out in BR 'large logo' blue livery.

Throughout their service on the Western Region, the Class 50s gained popularity and also reached cult status by the early 1990s when withdrawals were gathering pace. The last was withdrawn in 1994 but, happily, 18 have been saved for preservation. Even more remarkable is that seven of the preserved examples have been restored for mainline operation. The class has since been seen at the head of service trains as well as working freights while GB Railfreight has recently repainted 50007 *Hercules* and 50049 *Defiance* into its house colours for use on spot-hire and charter train work.

#### **THE MODEL**

The Class 50 has been a popular subject for ready-to-run products in 'N,'OO' and 'O' gauge and Dapol's new release is the first of two brand-new models to be released this year. Heljan is set to deliver its

'N' gauge has needed a new '50' and this all-new version is an attractive package and the second of Dapol's latest generation 'N' gauge models. It features a Next18 decoder, five-pole motor and all-wheel drive, directional lighting and cab lighting. There are also switches for DC users to turn the tail lights off and full DCC operation of the head, tail and cab lights when fitted with a decoder. Add to that fine profile metal wheels, flush glazing and a myriad of separately attached parts and there is much to appreciate before we even put this locomotive on the track.

The bodyshell is a single-piece moulding with the addition of

glazing panels, part relief cab interiors and essential little details such as handrails, and multiple working jumpers. Dapol has also catered for early and late locomotives in its tooling suite. Our review sample of D406 in original BR blue has plates over the multiple working cable positions and an inset panel on the roof.

From the factory the model comes with Rapido couplings fitted into NEM pockets at each end together with a full set of short pipework. The latter allows the couplings to be retained while the bufferbeam is populated and Dapol also includes a set of full-length bufferbeam pipes for those who wish to replace the coupling entirely. The steps to each





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the locomotive at low speeds but states that a running-in period or pre-oiling aren't required.

We were impressed by the performance of the mechanism which we found to be highly responsive to speed changes as well as offering flicker-free lighting through its all-wheel pick-up chassis.

Our load tests were limited by the size of our current test track for 'N' gauge, but our sample showed that an eight-coach rake of present-day Bachmann Mk 1s was no match for its capabilities, both in starting and continuous running.

The Class 50 has a Next18 decoder socket provided on the chassis for simple conversion to digital operation while space is also provided for a 15mm x 11mm cube type speaker at one end of the chassis. This also makes potential upgrades straightforward, though Dapol is also offering DCC fitted and DCC sound fitted versions fully prepared by its team.

Analogue users can take control of lighting options via the four switches on top of the chassis.

The body is easy to remove to access these switches which control taillights and cablights. A fifth switch is used in conjunction with DCC for independent operation of the taillights.

#### **OVERALL**

The Class 50 is an overdue new release for 'N' gauge and the arrival of this new version follows the high

standards set by Dapol's Class 68 in 2018 (HM131). Its functionality, detail and performance are all top-notch and from what we have seen it has gone down extremely well with 'N' gauge modellers. And so it should – this is a superb addition to the Dapol catalogue and one which we think could bring new interest to the scale. Excellent and available now. (MW)

ERNOW Model Rail Centre (KMRC) has taken delivery of its latest exclusive 'OO' gauge model – the PRA two-axle China Clay wagon.

Converted by the Standard Wagon Company in Heywood in 1983, the prototypes utilised underframes recovered from Associated Portland Cement Manufacturers (APCM) PVV bagged cement vans with new bodywork and canvas sheeted covers. Fourteen of these distinctive vehicles were converted for china clay use for service on long distance workings between the West Country and Scotland. One service was Ponts Mill to Corpach paper mill on the West Highland Line.

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Our review samples include one early-liveried model, RLS6308, and a late-liveried example, RLS6316. Both are modelled to the same specification, the main difference being the overall decoration with the early example carrying an allover grey finish. The later example features a black underframe.

Detailing is very good with plenty of separately fitted parts including finely moulded ladders, handrails, etched metal walkways and platforms, handbrake levers, underframe cylinders, brake rigging and pipework. The body is neatly moulded with five bodyside ribs, while the roof area is particularly effective with its eye-catching red canvas sheeting, roller and elastic securing cleats.

Decoration is excellent, with both samples displaying a high-quality evenly applied paint finish with crisply printed lettering, TOPS panels and labels. The overall finish on the early examples is particularly good as it also highlights some of the underframe elements that are not quite so noticeable on the later period model. With four vehicles offered in each colour scheme, the opportunity to vary the placement of lettering and labels between them also adds extra variety to a rake.

The PRAs are fitted with cranked tension lock couplings in NEM pockets, so you may need to make adjustments if planning on using alternative couplings. Turned metal wheels are fitted.

The hobby is enjoying an upsurge in 'OO' wagon projects right now and this is another impressive example that is sure to prove popular with modellers of the 1980s rail scene. (MC)

#### New C&L Finescale Track Panels



C&L Finescale's extensive range of track components is bolstered with the addition of two new 4mm scale track bases.

Available in branch line and main line formats, the new track base is neatly moulded in scale 30ft sections with correct sleeper width and spacing - two sections make up a 60ft track panel.

Our review samples were neatly moulded in brown plastic with realistic wood grain to the sleepers and good definition to the rail chairs and securing bolts. The track base is available on its own for self-assembly (Cat No. 4FT22AB/4FT22AM) or offered pre-assembled with C&L Finescale code 75 HiNi nickel silver bullhead rail in metre lengths (4FT222A).

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LLIS CLARK TRAINS has become an important name in ready-to-run 'O' gauge, especially following the announcement of its LMS Stanier 'Black Five' 4-6-0 and LNER Thompson carriages in August (HM148). However, right now its new Darstaed-produced collection of BR Mk 1 57ft non-corridor carriages are in the limelight.

The collection was announced in 2018 following on from the launch of its BR Mk 1 corridor

set out to produce new bogies and correct the ride height from the corridor stock for the new short suburbans and it has also moved forward with the level of detail, both inside and out.

The 1954-introduced 57ft suburban carriages feature a diecast chassis, etched metal sides with separately fitted handles and grabrails, full interior detail and a plastic moulded roof. The bogies are compensated and include turned metal wheels as

wheelsets to power the interior lighting. The full collection consists of the Brake Second, Second Open, Second, Composite, Composite Lavatory Open and Second Lavatory Open. Four liveries are being offered covering BR crimson, BR maroon without lining, BR lined maroon and BR blue.

For review we had the opportunity to inspect a Brake Second (BS) and Second (S) in the earliest BR crimson livery. This is suitable for the steam era as well as the earliest period of diesel haulage.

out with clean application of the crimson base colour while the ends were correctly finished in black. The only printed detail from the factory is 'Emergency Lighting Point' on the solebar, as a sheet of transfers is included with each coach to allow it to be numbered to customer tastes.

The body shape looks spot on while features such as the carriage end handrails, full length footstep and emergency brake conduits are all present. On the roofs you will find neatly moulded ribs as well as roof vents and periscopes on the BS. The underframes are



similarly superbly detailed with full relief battery boxes, V-hangers, dynamo and brake rods running to each bogie. Also worth noting is that a switch is included on the pick-up bogie to allow the interior lights to be turned off. The lighting works with analogue and digital control systems without the requirement of a decoder.

The interior is fully detailed on each coach. This includes patterned and shaped seats, pictures and mirrors on compartment walls as well as etched metal luggage nets above each bench. Instructions are provided for removal of the roof for access, but because of the screw locations it isn't quite as

straightforward as we would have expected to take the roof off.

On the track our two samples ran smoothly through a combination of Peco bullhead track including straight and curved points as well as a double slip. They will also negotiate second radius Peco set track curves. The icing on the cake are the working screw link couplings, sprung buffers and a working taillamp on the Brake Second to bring up the rear of the train.

Ellis Clark Trains and Darstaed have done an excellent job in creating these new models of the BR Mk 1 suburban stock. Their first British outline finescale models of the Mk 1 corridor carriages were good but these are a significant step up from those in all respects. With the comprehensive choice of vehicle types, 'O' gauge modellers will now be able to replicate a range of BR era suburban trains including the Great Northern line workings which saw Class 31s at the head of mixed colour rakes. Excellent and available now. (MW)



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## Sonic VEA Van

ONIC Models has delivered its debut 'N' gauge model with the arrival of the VEA box van.

Working closely with Revolution Trains, Sonic Models is the first Chinese manufacturer to produce and issue products direct to the British market and was created by a former Kader/ Bachmann design engineer.

VEA vans were developed for use on munitions trains for the Ministry of Defence (MOD) in the late 1970s when it became apparent that BR's new air-braked long wheelbase vehicles were not suited to the sharp track curvature at some MOD depots. As a result, a programme of air braked conversions took place on former 1960s-era Vanwides. They could be seen in block train and mixed Speedlink formations, as well as trip workings to and from MOD depots, remaining in service into the early 1990s when withdrawals began to take place. Some were retained for departmental use, while a large number enjoyed further work as internal user vehicles with the MOD. See feature in HM146 for more on the VEA story.

Sonic Models' new 'N' gauge VEA van is offered in three colour schemes with five differently numbered examples in BR maroon (Cat No. NVEA-001A-E), five in BR Railfreight grey and red (NVEA-002A-E) and three in BR Railfreight Distribution dark grey and yellow (NVEA-005A-C).

Our review samples were finished as 230011 in BR maroon, 230117 in BR Railfreight red and grey and 230142 in Railfreight Distribution colours. Each features a neatly moulded body with separately fitted white painted door handles, impressive rivet, strapping and door detail, door runners, corrugated ends, roof and an outstanding underframe. Turn the model upside down and there is a full complement of brake rigging, pipework and cylinders! Brake blocks are in line with the turned

metal three-hole wheels, while leaf spring detail, roller bearing axle boxes and handbrake levers are also neatly moulded. Blackened metal buffers complete the detailing, while close-set Rapido couplings in NEM pockets result in close coupling between vehicles. A separate detailing pack containing cosmetic screw-link couplings and air pipes is also included, together with a printed diagram.

This is a stunning entry for Sonic Models with a level of finesse that we have come to expect in the scale and certainly bodes well for the manufacturer's future plans. (MC)

It is 21-years since the first Class 66 heavy freight diesel-electric was completed by Electro-Motive Division of General Motors in 1998. Since then 455 have been built for the British market and they have become the most common freight locomotive on the British railway network.

GB Railfreight is a major user of the Class 66 for its freight contracts and has developed a reputation for painting its locomotive in unique colour schemes. One of the most eye-catching of recent times is 66789 British Rail 1948-1997, which



carries a GBRf branded version of BR'large logo' blue and yellow.

Gaugemaster has selected this stand out locomotive for the first of its Gaugemaster Collection of 'N' gauge models. It is available across its retailer network too, as well as direct from Gaugemaster. The model uses the Dapol Class 66

tooling as its basis which features a five-pole motor, directional lighting, all-wheel drive as well as a Next18 decoder socket.

Decoration is excellent with crisp application of all body colours as well as the BR logos and 66789 number over the tricky ribbed side panels. Other highlights include flush glazing, an etched metal roof grille, NEM coupling pockets and an accessory pack containing replacement close couplings.

Gaugemaster's choice of 66789 will be a well-received addition for 'N' gauge which is already selling fast through its retailers. Perfect for contemporary layouts. (MW)

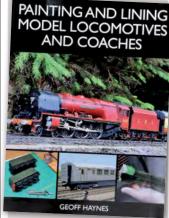

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# Bachmann's all-new

The Worsdell 'J72'
0-6-0T was built by
three different railway
companies over five
decades. Bachmann
has created a brand
new 'OO' gauge version of the

leaves its previous veteran
model in the dust. MIKE WILD
puts the all-new 'J72' to the test.

HE WORSDELL 'J72' 0-6-0T has a fascinating history. The first were built by the North Eastern Railway in 1898 to be followed by batches built under LNER and BR direction. The last were completed in 1951. In total 113 'J72s' were built with only small modifications along the way.

In model form this characterful tank engine has been a signature part of the Bachmann catalogue. It was one of the locomotives which launched the Bachmann Branchline range in 1990, but in recent years this original tooling has been showing its age. The split-chassis design and heavier mouldings of the 1990s don't now meet modellers' expectations. In 2015 Bachmann planned a new DCC ready chassis with a Next18 socket while retaining the original body. Three years on the plan changed and instead Bachmann decided that the way forward for the 'J72' was to create a brand new model from the ground up and that is what you see here.

The tooling is much more comprehensive than ever before, as it can cater for original North Eastern Railway 'E1s' (the original classification for the 0-6-0T), as well as the LNER and BR built 'J72s'. Four versions are being produced initially, modelling 'J72s' 2313 in LNER lined black (Cat No. 31-060), 68733 in BR black with early crests (31-061), 68696 in BR black with late crests (31-062) and 'E1' 2173 in NER lined green (31-063).

#### **THE MODEL**

Reality Check on pages 80-81 has more on the history of the 'E1'/'J72' 0-6-0T, so here we will concentrate on the Bachmann model. Our sample models 68696 in BR black which comes in the manufacturer's standard half-length packaging consisting of a cardboard outer with a plastic blister inside to hold the model securely during transit.

Inside is the 0-6-0T together with an accessory pack and a full set of instructions for operation of the model, dismantling and its digital features. The accessory pack includes lamps which slot onto the lamp irons as well as cab doors (these are tricky to fit), steam pipes and neat three link couplings.

The BR black livery of 68696 is simple and cleanly applied but there

are plenty of details to appreciate. These include printing of the class on the front bufferbeam, a finely replicated 51L Thornaby shedcode, locomotive numbers, silver and red colouring of the inside valve gear mouldings, and superbly reproduced BR crest (which Bachmann tells us has seven different colours printed in it) and a fabulously detailed cab interior.

This area features a wood coloured floor together with a lever reverser, regulator, backhead fittings and gauges – all of which are picked out in suitable colours. By comparison, the original model had no cab interior – just a large metal chassis block filling this important area.

The specification for the new 'J72' contains sprung metal buffers, small tension lock couplings in

NEM pockets, a Next18 decoder socket, firebox flicker, fine profile metal wheels and a coreless motor driving the centre axle.

Standing the new 'J72' alongside its predecessor, the advances in model development are clear to see. Both look like their intended real life counterpart, but the new version does it with much more refinement and detail. For starters, the chimney is a

radical improvement while this version also has a full set of lamp irons (the original had none!), separately fitted handrails, neatly produced boiler pipework, detail below the boiler between the brake parts. Glazing to the cab is supremely fine while a cast metal coal load finishes off the bunker. It's an excellent depiction

tasked with everything from a branch line passenger train to yard shunting or station pilot duties.

#### **PERFORMANCE**

As always, we started our performance testing by running the model in as advised in the instruction sheet. The sheet also notes that the new 'J72' is designed to operate on a minimum of second radius curves.

Straight from the box our sample ran silently throughout the speed range with its coreless motor providing smooth running through all speed changes. The model also ran perfectly through a range of code 75 finescale trackwork including large and medium radius points as well as diamond crossings.

Load testing started with a 15-wagon train which we later increased to 35 wagons - a load it still handed with ease, even with the full weight of the train around a curve. This should prove to be plenty for all situations the 'J72' is

socket and a factory fitted 15mm x 11mm cube speaker positioned underneath the main Printed Circuit Board. This makes the model a one step process to change to DCC fitted or DCC sound operation. In addition, the model features a twin LED firebox flicker which can be controlled with two function outputs on a DCC decoder. Details are included in the instruction sheet while analogue users will find the firebox glow increases with speed.

#### **OVERALL**

Bachmann's new 'J72' is a radical improvement over the previous generation in all respects. The body detail, chassis performance and DCC connectivity add up to a winning combination. Moreover, if you are planning on adding a decoder it is simple to remove the chassis from the body.

The turnaround for this model has been much quicker than other products with just over 18 months having elapsed since it was announced in the 2018 catalogue. This is great to see - and having seen recent progress on Bachmann's other in-development 'OO' and 'N' gauge models (see

Update) the 'J72' is just the tip of the iceberg for a wave of new product releases. Watch this space.

This compact tank engine will find favour with LNER and BR era modellers alike and as *Hornby Magazine* closed for press the full production batch was expected to arrive in the UK during October. An excellent and useful model which is sure to be a popular addition to the Bachmann range. (MW)

# Vorsdel's 1132

Introduced in the Victorian era, the North Eastern Railway's pretty little 'J72s' were so good they continued to be produced into the BR era. **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** explains the story of this class of 113 locomotives.

N THE FINAL YEARS of the 19th century, the North Eastern Railway (NER) was one of the richest in the country. It had built its good fortunes on the transport of goods and particularly minerals. Its extensive operating area covered most of the country between York and Scotland and out to the east coast. The company's operation had a huge thirst for goods engines, with many of them employed on short freight workings or in working one of their hundreds of railway yards. As was normal practice at the time most of these were of the 0-6-0 wheel arrangement, with many being tank engines, which were used almost exclusively on the lighter work.

When Wilson Worsdell succeeded his brother as Locomotive Superintendent of the NER in 1890, the company was producing the 'E' 0-6-0. It was a four year old and capable design which led to its continued production. Wilson Worsdell, however, preferred goods engines to have driving wheels of around 4ft diameter, about 6in less than those used on the 'Es' and as a result he developed a modified design which would become the 'E1' and later better-known as the 'J72' under the London North Eastern Railway classification system.

Apart from the smaller driving wheels, the improved engines were fitted with larger cylinders of 17in diameter instead of 16in which had a 24in stroke instead of 22in. This gave them improved haulage capabilities but they were otherwise very similar to the earlier locomotives,

particularly with regards to the boiler, which was more or less identical. All had steam brakes and no provision for train braking and a total of 20 were completed at Darlington works in 1898 and 1899.

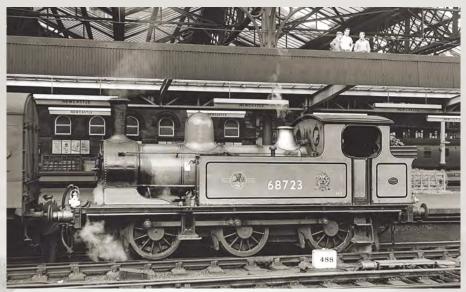
The first of the class were allocated to Hull, West Hartlepool, York and Heaton with solitary examples sent to Tyne Dock, Stockton and Darlington. All were employed in general shunting work, with some trip freights and they proved to be very successful.

#### **FOLLOWING BATCHES**

Some 15 years then elapsed before any more 'E1s' were built by which time Worsdell had been succeeded by Vincent Raven. Raven was a great innovator - he introduced electric traction to the North Eastern Railway – but he also didn't abandon ideas which had already been proved to work. As a result, he ordered construction of a further 20 'E1s' equipped with slightly heavier frames, longer coal bunkers and some changes to bring them into line with current engineering practice of the period. These all went to sheds in County Durham including eight to West Hartlepool, four to Sunderland, four to Borough Gardens at Gateshead, two to Tyne Dock and one each to Darlington and Shildon.

A third batch followed in 1920 to a broadly similar specification because the NER was suffering from a shortage of materials caused by the aftermath of the First World War. Raven actually wanted to build some larger engines, but could not get the materials be

needed and therefore, to keep Darlington Works fully employed, he elected to build more 'E1s' instead. Ten engines were built in this batch with five of them being sent to Middlesbrough and the remainder being used to bolster existing allocations.

Shortly afterwards, an order was placed with Armstrong Whitworth and Company for a further 25 'E1s', with delivery to take place by February 1921, but these were delayed and did not actually make an appearance until April to October 1922. The following year the railways were grouped into the 'Big Four' and all the 'E1s' passed to the London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) which reclassified them as 'J72s' – 'J' being used to designate locomotives with an 0-6-0 wheel arrangement.

The LNER recognised the soundness of the Worsdell design and ordered a batch of ten which were, surprisingly, built at Doncaster Works in 1925. Of this batch three went to Neville Hill in Leeds, two to Hull Dairycoates, one to Alexandra Dock and the other four were in traditional North Eastern territory at Sunderland, York and Ferryhill.

Throughout this time there were few changes to the design, although the Ramsbottom safety valves were replaced by Ross 'pop' type, the smokebox door latching arrangements were updated and there were variations to the buffer beams, couplings and to the buffers themselves. In time some of these variations were applied to earlier engines, while some later-built locomotives acquired parts from earlier builds during overhauls.

The 'J72s' could be seen all over the North Eastern Region as well as further afield. On August 30 1956 BR built 'J72' 69006 passes Middlesbrough station with a transfer working consisting of steel flats and bolster wagons. J.F. Davies/Rail Archive Stephenson.



#### **BEATING THE ODDS**

Another 38 'J72s' should have been built in 1930-1931 but these were cancelled when the Gresley 'J50' 0-6-0T was selected as the LNER's standard shunting engine. At this time the 'J72' was to have been run down with examples being withdrawn as new boilers became due, but all were still active in 1946 when another change in policy saw this idea abandoned. In a surprising about turn, an order was then placed for more of the North Eastern designed 'J72s', but these were then deferred and did not see the light of day for another three years.

When British Railways was formed in 1948 none of the class had been withdrawn, and all remained at their traditional duties. Most were still employed within the former North Eastern area. Six locomotives were sent to Scotland in 1932-1934 while others were located at Doncaster and Bidston, where they were used on Birkenhead Docks. One was also allocated to Neasden for five years from 1935 and eventually the class was to serve in sheds from all seven constituent companies that

had made up the LNER – an incredible achievement for a humble tank engine.

Under British Railways, 28 further 'J72s' were constructed, with some minor differences to those that had gone before. Twin handles were fitted on the smokebox door, group standard buffers and drawgear were used and steam sanding was fitted on the leading axle with the sandboxes being located below the running plate instead of in the cab.

In addition, the final eight had vacuum ejectors fitted enabling them to work with empty stock trains, this modification had first appeared on 1720 and 2313 in 1937 and between December 1947 and October 1948 a further 13 examples had been so fitted, with three more joining them in 1950. In this form the 'J72' became very popular as a station and carriage shed pilot, but in all cases three-link couplings were retained, limiting them to non-passenger workings. More conversions followed with the necessary equipment being taken from withdrawn 'J71s' and 'J77s' until in the end



As diesel shunters began to make an appearance on the Eastern and North Eastern Regions, some of the 'J72s' were reallocated with places such as Ardsley, Goole, Selby, Normanton and Thornaby being given their first allocation. Others, however, were being used on much more prestigious work including a pair of Gateshead engines that were used as pilots at Newcastle Central station. One of these 8680 had appeared in full LNER lined green in May 1947, acquiring a BR emblem to go with it two years later. Utlimately it was outshopped in BR lined black. 68723/68736 were painted in North Eastern lined green livery in 1960 for pilot duties at York and Newcastle with both then being allocated to Newcastle until withdrawal. The rest of the fleet were always black, although Doncaster engines were lined out in red when built, this feature not lasting for long. Numbers were usually carried on the tank sides, though those allocated to Scotland had them repositioned on the bunkers.

#### **RUNNING DOWN**

Withdrawals started in June 1958 as more diesel shunters became available with the whole class being taken out of service within three years, despite many of them being only 12 or 13 years old. The final two were 69005 and 69023 from the British Railways built batch. Both were taken into departmental stock at which point they became 58 and 59 allocated to North Blyth as wagon de-icing units. Later they were sent to Gateshead for steam cleaning duties before being laid up and placed in store, initially at Heaton and ultimately at Tyne Dock, before being withdrawn.

Although 58 was scrapped in January 1968, 59 had a bit more luck as it was sold to a Mr R. Ainsworth who painted it in North Eastern Railway livery and named it

Joem, which was an amalgamation of his parent's names. The locomotive arrived at the Keighlev and Worth Vallev Railway in 1969, and later moved to the Derwent Valley Light Railway at York, before being placed in store at the National Railway Museum. In 1983 it was purchased by the North Eastern Locomotive Preservation Group (NELPG) and was moved to the North Yorkshire Moors Railway before undergoing an overhaul which saw it finished in its British Railways 'station pilot' colour scheme. Further service at the NYMR followed and the locomotive also visited many other heritage railways during this time. A full overhaul took place between 2005 and 2010 after which the locomotive became a regular performer on the Wensleydale Railway. Currently it is now out of service with boiler issues, and has returned to NELPG's works at Darlington for long-term restoration.

The 'J72' was a remarkable engine which was, despite its diminutive size, capable of hard work in difficult service conditions. Many examples stayed at the same shed for most of their lives, others acquired 'celebrity' status and the class could be found scattered far and wide on both the LNER and the British Railways systems. That examples were still being built 53 years after the first took to the rails says wonders for the soundness of the original proposal, but the 'J72' was also aesthetically pleasing, which is perhaps why the design has proved so popular for both enthusiasts and modellers over the last few decades.

Shunting and station pilot duties were the most common use for the 'J72s'. BR built J72 0-6-0T 69016 stands at York with inspection saloon M45037M in 1960. Gordon Hepburn/Rail Archive Stephenson.

OUND can be an expensive addition for large 'O' gauge locomotives. The twin motors and their associated current draw rule out 'OO' 8-pin and 21-pin decoders because they would have a very short lifespan before their demise – and that includes Hornby's budget focused Twin Track Sound (TTS) decoders – meaning that specific large scale high power chips are required instead.

The TTS family of diesel sound decoders have been well received in 'OO' gauge with their quality recordings and manual driving control options. We've installed them in a large number of 'OO' gauge locomotives since their introduction, but always with a speaker upgrade to make the most of the audio file on board. However, until recently I hadn't considered using them with 'O' gauge locomotives as it seemed unachievable.

A chance conversation with Steven Thompson of Dubmill Sidings (HM78) got me thinking about how I could overcome the costs of sound for 'O' gauge by using a Twin Track Sound decoder. He had been working on a dummy Class 20 for his layout to which he had added a Hornby Twin Track Sound (TTS) decoder. It worked without a motor load against it to operate the sound. This got me thinking

about how it could be done in a powered locomotive, as Steven's project had clearly shown that it didn't need the motor connections using – important for 'O' gauge, as the current draw of Heljan 'O' gauge motors would be too much for this 'OO' designated chip.

The method I developed goes against the grain of what is normally accepted for sound installations. Every project I've carried out until now has used one decoder to provide motor, light and sound control. In this project I've used two decoders – a Lenz Gold Maxi eight-function high power decoder

and a Hornby TTS 8-pin decoder. The Lenz chip provides power and control for the motors, lights and roof fan while the TTS chip only serves to provide the audio track. The two decoders do not interact - they just share the same power supply from the track feeds. It is also important that only the red and black track feed wires on the TTS decoder are connected to the locomotive – all of the other wires are redundant in this project as it is literally being used as a sound chip. The great advantage of this

be done as a complete job in one go or the sound decoder can be retrofitted later to spread the cost and work involved. All in, including speaker, TTS and Lenz decoder, it has cost a few pounds over £100. An all singing, all dancing 'O' gauge sound decoder alone will set you back between £140

and £180 – though they do have excellent functionality and sound capabilities beyond the TTS chip.

To test the theory of the twin decoder setup, I retro-fitted a TTS Class 31 chip into a Heljan 'O' gauge '31' that I had already converted to DCC and left both decoders with the same address. It worked perfectly,

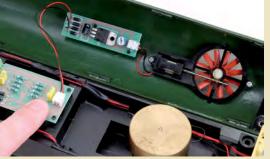
Sound for '0' gauge can be expensive, but with the combination of a Lenz Gold Maxi decoder to control the motors and lighting functions together with a Hornby Twin Track Sound '00' gauge decoder (for sound only) it comes in at a similar price to high-end '00' gauge sound decoders.



The starting point is removal of the body. Four crosshead screws secure the body and chassis together. Turn each bogie to the side to see the screws and then remove them with a suitable crosshead screwdriver. Keep the screws safe for reassembly.



motors with brass flywheels, a central Printed Circuit Board (PCB) and a powered roof fan. All of the wiring is with red and black cables, no matter what its purpose.



Our next step is to disconnect the roof fan so that the body can be set aside. Unplug the micro plug from the socket on the PCB.



On the right is the Lenz Gold Maxi decoder. This powerful eight-function decoder can support a continuous motor load of 3amps and a peak of 5amps – plenty for this twin motor Class 40. Its dimensions are 70mm x 29mm which means it will comfortably fit across the top of the well, like the original PCB.



This dose-up of the Lenz decoder shows the function output connectors on the left of the image, controlled by F1-F6 on a DCC handset (bottom to top). The decoder also allows for a stay alive to be connnected.

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except that I realised there was a need to disconnect the TTS decoder to allow separate programming of it and the Lenz chip. I also felt I could enhance the sound output with a different speaker. A couple of CV amendments aside, it was a perfect success and added sound quickly and easily to an already operational digital locomotive.

The Class 40 for this step by step guide has been started from nothing. Like all Heljan 'O' gauge locomotives it requires removal of the main Printed Circuit Board to allow the addition of a motor decoder. The complication here is that all the wiring inside is red and black on the 40, so there is no option but to work through the cables carefully to establish their purpose before connecting them to the new decoder. The pick up and motor wires are relatively easy to identify while I soon realised that the two halves of the locomotive are a mirror image for the lighting cables. Looking at it side on, the left hand side has the headlight wires nearest and the taillight cables furthest away while the right hand end is the opposite way around.

To bring both the decoders into service requires a group of CVs to be adjusted (see panel, right) on both decoders and does also require the selective loss of three sound functions (by turning their volume to zero) on the TTS decoder. These allow for independent control of the tail lights and roof fan. However, that is a small price to pay considering there are 24 sound functions in the Class 40 scheme.

The final scheme has independent control of the headlights and taillights, separate control of the roof fan plus a wide range of sound functions to bring the Class 40 to life (see panel). If you wanted, you could use the auxiliary output on the TTS decoder, using the blue common positive and green negative control wires from the 8-pin decoder, to control cab interior lights on F25.

The following step by step guide shows how we installed both the Lenz Gold Maxi and Hornby TTS decoders into the Class 40. Actually adding the TTS decoder is quite straightforward, as it only involves connecting two wires to the pick ups - the hard part is the locomotive light wiring.

#### **CV CHANGES**

• To match the sound performance of the TTS decoder with the driving characteristics for the Lenz Gold Maxi requires a set of Configuration Variable (CV) changes. These were carried out independently on the two decoders using a programming track. We reassigned the function controls for the taillights on the Lenz decoder to fit the sound scheme.

#### On the Lenz Gold Maxi decoder we made the following adjustments:

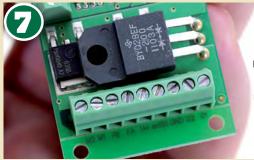

To make way for the roof fan (F4) and taillight (F10/F11) functions we needed to turn the volume down on three sound profiles within the TTS scheme so that they don't provide an inaccurate dual function. We selected F4 (brakes), F10 (compressor) and F11 (door slam) as we knew they were unlikely to be used.

#### The following CVs were changed on the TTS decoder to turn the volume off on those functions:

By reducing F4, F10 and F11 volumes to zero they won't play when the functions are selected, but with the amendments to the Lenz decoder above it will now operate those three functions for the fan (F4) and taillights (F10/F11). All remaining sound functions are retained on the TTS decoder. See separate panel for our function list for the Class 40.



At the other end of the decoder are the connections for the track, motor, common positive feeds and head and tail lights. G1 and G2 are track pick ups, U+ is common positive, FA and FB are front and rear headlights while M1 and M2 are the motor connections.



The main components that we will install are a Roads and Rails male and female pre-wired micro plug, the Lenz Gold Maxi decoder (large green board) and the Hornby Twin Track Sound chip with Class 40 sounds. The supplied 28mm round 80hm speaker will be replaced with the 40mm x 28mm speaker shown.

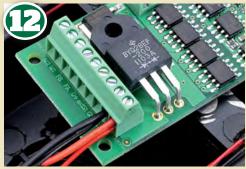
The central PCB is secured to the metal chassis block with four crosshead screws. Remove these and the PCB reveals the well underneath which is intended as a speaker housing.



Next, all of the wires were released from the original PCB. Normally we work progressively through the wires, but in this case our only option to work out what did what was to undo them all. The mounts for the PCB have been removed to allow us to test a selection of speakers, but it is not necessary to cut them off.







The track feeds (along with the micro plug) were then connected to the G1 and G2 (track feed) terminals on the Lenz Gold chip. The TTS decoder does not interact with the Lenz chip - it simply shares the same power source. This method of connecting the TTS decoder to the track feeds avoids another wiring joint.

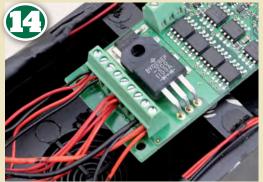

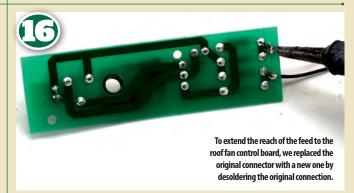
Next we traced the motor connections from each end of the locomotive, joined them together (note the red wire from the leading motor joins with the black wire from the trailing bogie and vice versa for the second connection). Having completed this first stage of wiring, we took the locomotive to the test track to ensure that the direction of travel was correct. If it isn't, reverse the motor connections on the decoder.

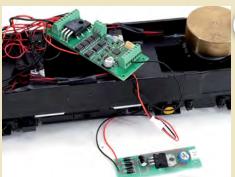


Having established the track and motor connections, our next task is to collect the common positive feeds for the lights and roof fan. These are all the remaining red wires which are twisted together and then connected to the U+common positive terminal on the Lenz decoder.



The headlight connections on the Lenz Gold Maxi decoder are on the same side as the motor and track feeds, marked FA (front) and FB (rear). The two single black wires are the headlight negative control wires — these are dual function as they operate the cab desk lights as well. This completes wiring of this end of the decoder.

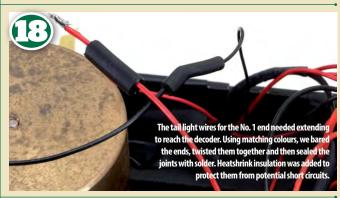




new connection on with the wires connected the same way round (red to P1, black to P2) and then plugged this into the other half of the micro plug which had its red lead connected to the U+ common positive feed and its black wire to the FF output. This output is controlled by F4 on a DCC

handset.

The negative control wires for the taillights were then connected to the decoder. The No. 2 end lights are fitted into the FE terminal and the No. 1 end lights go into the FD terminal. We will reassign their function numbers using CV settings (see panel) at the end of the project to fit in with our function scheme.

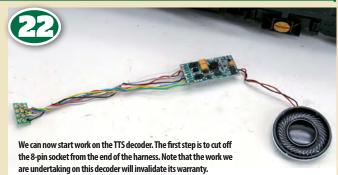


The Lenz Gold Maxi decoder is now fully wired and ready to set in position on top of the chassis. There are a lot of wires connected to the decoder – we adjusted some of the connections at this end to ensure no bare wire was showing outside of the terminal block.

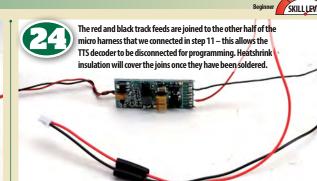


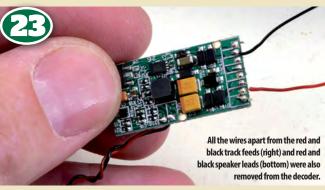
The Lenz motor and lighting decoder sits comfortably across the top of the chassis well. It has been held in place with Black Tack and the top edges of the well have been been covered with insulation tape to stop short circuits.





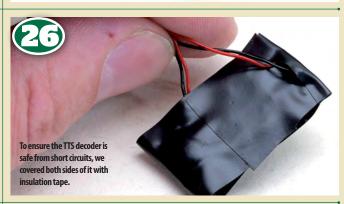
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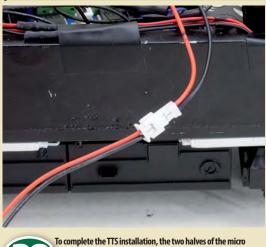
Next, the original 28mm round speaker is cut from the end of the TTS decoder speaker wires. In all our sound installations with TTS chips we have found that replacing the speaker makes a big difference to the audio quality. These chips require an 80hm resistance speaker and Hornby recommends using the original wires from the decoder to connect the new speaker.







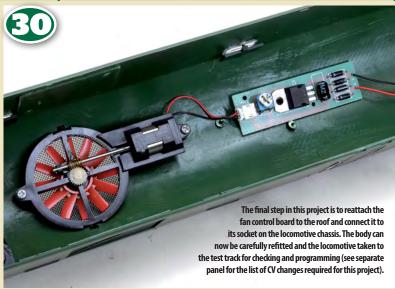
To maximise the performance of the speaker we built a rear baffle out of plasticard, strengthened at the base with rod. The side walls are 25mm deep while the length and width matches that of the speaker. We then positioned the speaker box on the flat surface on the die-cast chassis with the speaker facing upwards. This assists in creating a richer sound as the speaker locomotive body enhances the speaker's sound output. The holes on the corners have been blocked with Black Tack.



plug and socket (which connect to the locomotive's pick ups) are

joined together making the model ready to test. We can now

disconnect the TTS decoder at any time for programming.



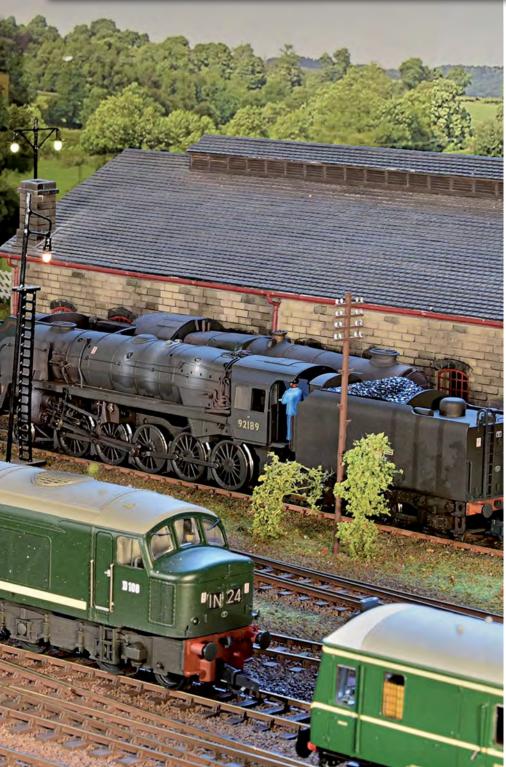

## DANIEL REITMANN from Germany selected the final years of BR steam for his attractive home-based 'OQ' gauge layout. Here he reveals its story and how he recreated the British railway system in mainland Europe.

IVING near Dresden in the Saxony region of south-east Germany I'm surrounded by incredible scenery and stunning railways. Nearby are an array of 750mm gauge narrow gauge steam lines including that from Radebeul to Radeberg which still provides daily steam operation as well as the likes of the Cranzahl line on the border of the Czech Republic. Germany is also well-known for its Plandampf events, where steam locomotives take over scheduled services, but even with this rich vein of steam and railway operation on the doorstep, I still find myself drawn to the railways of Britain.

My fascination is with the final years of steam on the London Midland Region covering the period when the first of the new diesels were arriving to take over from the old form of traction.

The majority of my locomotive fleet draws from that period and area using a combination of Bachmann, Dapol, Hornby and Heljan products to model the changing scene on BR in the 1960s. The roster includes ex-LMS Fowler '4F' 0-6-0s, Stanier 'Black Five' 4-6-0s, '8F' 2-8-0s, a Fowler 'Patriot' 4-6-0, a BR '9F' 2-10-0 plus a handful of off-region types such as a GWR 'County' 4-6-0 and LNER 'B12' 4-6-0. Diesels in service include a Class 08 shunter and Class 45 'Peak' - from Hornby and Bachmann respectively - together with a Dapol Class 122 in matching original BR green livery with its early exhausts.

All of the locomotives are DCC controlled using Lenz decoders which are operated by an ESU main command station. Some of the mechanisms have been rebuilt with coreless motors and modified gearing to reduce their speed and >>

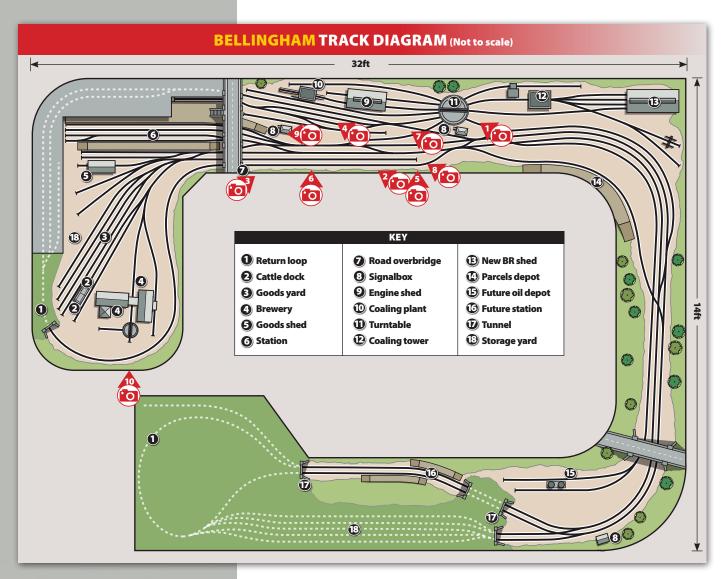


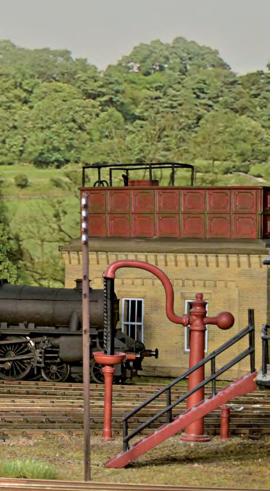

enhance smooth running capabilities.

The locomotive fleet hauls a range of passenger and goods trains formed of Bachmann and Hornby ready-to-run stock with the maximum train length being nine coaches.

#### **THE LAYOUT**

Bellingham is made up of 13 modules, some of which are built to the FREMO-standard – Friendship of European Railway Modellers. This specification was created to define a standard for modular layout construction in 1981 and sets the height (1.3m above the ground) together with the width. The length can be varied to suit specific design requirements.

All the modules are built from wood and are height adjustable. At one end of the layout is a terminus station with two platforms which takes inspiration from Bath Green Park. It can accommodate a maximum train length of nine carriages. This area is still being developed and will ultimately have a goods yard behind together with a reception siding for a malthouse.

After the station, the mainline passes in front of a pair of motive power depots – one small and one large – before progressing past a goods yard and postal sidings. The next section is a long double track mainline running

as a loop with an off-scene storage yard to house trains not out running. Later this will be joined by a branch line with a small station and a coal mine set above the mainline storage sidings.

For the time being only the small motive power depot and its associated mainline running section are complete scenically with the next phase of development being the goods yard, large locomotive shed and industrial setting. At present it can run up to five trains and three or four shunting movements at the same time using the ESU DCC system.

#### **MAKING A SCENE**

The first scenic section has been developed using readily available buildings and components. The track is bullhead rail from C&L Finescale together with some of the new Peco bullhead track to expand the layout. Some of the points have been handbuilt by John Jones with turnout control being accomplished with analogue toggle switches. All of the points have frog switches for absolute reliability. All of the track on the first section has been ballasted and weathered to give it a realistic appearance.

The completed motive power depot uses a combination of prefabricated buildings from the Bachmann Scenecraft and Hornby Skaledale collections. >> Highlights include the North Eastern Railway style two-road engine shed which was produced exclusively for TMC, the LMS style signalbox from Skaledale, a Bachmann coaling plant and a separate Skaledale water tower. Another highlight of the depot area is the turntable. This is the Fleischmann model which has been set into the baseboard, weathered, equipped with a new gearbox and motor, detailed and set up to suit the track positions of the depot.

Around the yard, detail is gradually being added, though you will already be able to see working lamps, water cranes and telegraph poles. More will come as I develop the scenery on the layout, but this depot is already proving to be a valuable area to display my increasing fleet of British outline locomotives and rolling stock.

#### **THE FUTURE**

Bellingham is very much a work in progress, but one which I am enjoying greatly – especially as it models my favourite period and area of the British Railway network. As time allows I will keep developing the layout, but I hope you enjoy this first visit to my small slice of England.

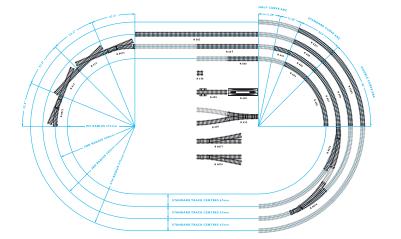
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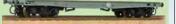

Trains withdrawn from the national network are usually destined for a one-way trip to the scrapyard, but for a lucky few a further life awaits as a result of reengineering. **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** explains all in the concluding part of our Railway Realism trilogy on stock changes on today's railway.







HE IDEA OF MAKING something useful out of something surplus or worn out isn't exactly new. The Great Western Railway was a master at rebuilding redundant engines - for instance, the 'Dukedog' 4-4-0 was constructed using the boiler of a 'Duke' amalgamated with the frames of a 'Bulldog' while the London Midland & Scottish Railway produced its first 'Patriots' as rebuilds of 'Claughtons'. However, following nationalisation the practice largely died out, but today it is making a big comeback, with several re-engineered or rebuilt designs now being in service on our railways and with more to follow.

In the late 1990s most locomotives in service in the UK were more than three decades old. Reliability was poor, fuel consumption high and designs outdated. Some companies had begun to replace their worn-out traction with brand-new American locomotives, but for others this huge investment was just not possible. Another solution had to be found.

One of these companies was Freightliner which, looking for an alternative plan, worked with Brush Engineering at Loughborough to create an updated locomotive using a second-hand bodyshell. This was based on the Class 47 and was to become the Class 57. This project saw the original locomotive stripped down to just its bodyshell, which was then fitted with a reconditioned V12 EMD diesel engine and a reconditioned alternator to produce a virtually new locomotive. The greatest advantage of this project was that it cost roughly a third of a new machine. Six locomotives formed the first batch, with a further six being added the following year, and these became 57001-57012. Further orders were planned but in the event the company changed over to the purchase of new Class 66s and its '57s' duly passed to Direct Rail Services and West Coast Railways.

#### FTH '57'

In 2000 Porterbrook placed an order for a Class 57, but this time fitted with train heating equipment, and this became 57601. It was initially used by Great

#### **RAILWAY REALISM**

Western Railway and four production engines followed. These were slightly different to the prototype 57601, which was returned to Brush, while 57602-57605 became the solid traction for the GWR's 'Night Riviera' sleeper services. 57601 later passed to West Coast Railways.

The final batch of Class 57s came in 2002 when a further 16 Class 47s were rebuilt for use by Virgin Trains as rescue engines, becoming 57301-316. These had electric train heating and could be easily identified as they had huge retractable Dellner couplers so they could couple up to Pendolino EMUs. The sub-class were all named after characters from the famous *Thunderbirds* TV series but was disbanded around 2008 then passing to other operators such as Colas and Arriva Trains Wales. The Class 57/3s are currently with DRS, Rail Operations Group and West Coast Railways.

Although a limited number of locomotives were converted from Class 47s to Class 57s the principle proved very satisfactory and was considered again when a mid-power locomotive was required by GB Railfreight and Network Rail in the early 2000s. This time the 'donor' selected was the Class 73 electro-diesel, a design originating from the early 1960s. It was unusual in being able to work on either electric or diesel power. In diesel mode, however, the power was provided by an out-of-date English Electric engine which was nominally provided 600hp, but which in reality provided somewhat less. Fine for pulling a train out of a tight spot at low speed but not much good for the main line.

#### **REVISED 'EDS'**

In 2013 two locomotives were taken to RVEL in Derby where they were rebuilt as Class 73/9s. This involved fitting a pair of Cummins 750hp diesel engines, which despite their increased power were much smaller and lighter than the original English Electric version. The result was a much more powerful locomotive with good route availability. The rebuilds became 73951-73952 and are used by Network Rail.

The same year Brush took on a similar challenge at its factory in Loughborough when it fitted similar locomotives with a single MTU 1,600hp V8 engine, again gutting the bodyshell and refitting it completely. Numbered 73961-73965, the first batch have entered service with GB Railfreight in the south of England while the second batch 73966-73971 have rather spectacularly found employment in the

north of Scotland, where they are used to power the overnight trains for Caledonian Sleeper. Although this conversion seems now to be settling down there have been many technical issues which have delayed a full introduction to service, with some spectacular failures being reported, sometimes in isolated parts of the country.

A third, and final, rebuilding of surplus locomotives is the current project to rework a number of Class 56s into a new Class 69 by fitting them with EMD power units. Announced in June last year, this scheme will see 16 conversions carried out by Progress Rail, involving the removal of the existing Ruston-Paxman engine and its replacement by an EMD 12-cylinder equivalent. It will have a much lower emissions output, as well as being more economical to operate. Electronic controls to the latest standards will be fitted while electrical components such as compressors and blower motors will also be replaced by more modern versions, but the conversions will retain the existing bogies and underframes as well as the braking systems.

Work is currently ongoing on this project and a number of Class 56s have already been stripped down to bare bodyshells. The first conversion, which is expected to be numbered 69001, should be taking to the rails some time next spring if all goes according to plan, with the fleet being destined for use by GB Railfreight.

#### **UNIT REBUILDS**

Although the majority of interest in rebuilds and conversions naturally falls on locomotives there are also a couple of interesting developments in the multiple unit field, with two distinct projects on the go at the moment, these being the Vivarail project to provide new trains using redundant London Underground stock and the Brush project to repurpose the Class 319 EMUs so that they can be used on non-electrified lines.

Perhaps the most bizarre of these proposals has been that of a small independent company based at Long Marston called Vivarail. In November 2014 this company announced it had purchased around 300 redundant London Underground D78 surface stock carriages with the intention of converting them for heavy rail use and offering them for service on a cost-effective basis. One prototype was created by completely stripping the existing carriages and making them self-propelled by fitting underslung Ford 3.2 litre engines and electric generators. Numbered 230001, this three-car train retains its original traction gear and has undergone a great deal of testing. A second unit, 230002, is powered purely by batteries and has again undergone testing.

Subsequently West Midlands Trains has taken three of the class to use on the Marston Vale line, these being 230003-230005, all of which are of the diesel-electric type while Transport for Wales has five more on order for working its Wrexham to Bidston and Conwy Valley services. However, the large volume of orders which was hoped for when the project was launched has so far failed to materialise, mainly due to operators such as Northern opting for new stock instead of remanufactured.

Most recently Island Line has ordered a fleet of five two-car units from Vivarail to become Class 484 and replace the existing Class 483 units on the Isle of Wight. They will operate from the third-rail and are expected to arrive for testing in 2020.

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The final reengineering project which is under way at the moment is not perhaps as thorough as that which has been carried out during the Class 57, Class 69 and 73 rebuilds, but is very interesting nevertheless. The scheme, which again involves Brush at Loughborough, has involved taking 39 redundant Class 319 Electric Multiple Units and converting them so that they have become bi-mode trains, with the ability to run in both diesel and electric form. The scheme arose because of the large number of relatively new EMUs that have become surplus in the south due to the delivery of new trains, and the lack of electrified infrastructure anywhere else on which

to run them. This arose because many of the electrification schemes planned never came to fruition or are late in delivery, and as a result there has been a surplus of EMUs but a shortage of DMUs, particularly as the 'Pacers' are being withdrawn.

The conversion involves fitting a pair of MAN six-cylinder diesel engines under what had been up to then a Driving Trailer, with two powered cars being provided per set. Alternators are then used to feed the existing traction system, in effect then providing a train similar to a Class 150 but which can also operate on overhead electric wires when required. Live testing began in November 2018, after several months'

delay, but none have yet seen service, despite a promised introduction date of May last year. Northern is to take many of the conversions, with others being promised for Great Western Railway, Transport for Wales and the Rail Operations Group, which sees a potential for the idea for conveying parcels.

Although the traditional saying is that you can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear, the success of some of these reengineering projects shows that perhaps there are occasions when life-expired trains can have their working lives extended, and in the process make the railway a much more interesting place for the observer and modeller alike.



## STAFF PROJECTS

## Barrenthorpe's

EEPING our hand in with all the major scales is a big ask for a small team, but while we have prioritised our 'OO' and 'O' gauge projects of late, we haven't forgotten the potential of 'N' gauge. Since the beginning of the year we've had our compact 'N' gauge mainline and shed scene, Barrenthorpe, planned in for two exhibitions in November this year. With those shows fast approaching, we have started preparing the layout and its stock for those events.

Like all of our exhibition layouts, Barrenthorpe has been in storage for some time. It was initially located in the workshop, but with a limited number of new'N' gauge models coming in for review we found it was just gathering dust. With the requirement of more space to build West Coast Cement last autumn, we decided to place it into storage until such time that we required its services again.

Happily it is a straightforward layout to assemble. The full 8ft 3in x 3ft 4in design is built on two baseboards and physically setting it up takes a matter of minutes. Another 15 minutes sees the control panel and base station connected, and technically we are ready to run trains. What takes the time though, is cleaning the track and loading up the stock. Barrenthorpe has 45 points (in 8ft x 3ft!), a four-track mainline, a 14-track storage yard and a shed area capable

of hosting around 30 locomotives. That's a lot of railheads to clean and points to inspect. Every single point is powered too, so even just testing point motor operation takes a little while.

We recently inspected the layout while unloading from the Hornby Visitor Centre Open Weekend in August (HM148), so we know that everything is in good order and ready to go. The only repairs required from a visual inspection are reseating of the end backscene panel which has come adrift and reattachment of an accessory decoder.

With that in mind I've started working through the rolling stock for the layout. There are several sound fitted models, most of which

share decoders with stock for West Riding Power. That means I need to transfer sound decoders back into a pair of Class 20s, a Class 24, 37 and 108. We will undoubtedly have a Graham Farish Class 40 running (most likely with Zimo sound) together with a Great Western interloper in the shape of a 'Castle' 4-6-0. For the rest of the fleet, it will be a case of bringing each drawer of stock up to the office

and methodically working through cleaning and testing over the course of a few evenings.

We are all looking forward to running Barrenthorpe Shed again this autumn and it will be making its first appearance of the year at the Spalding Model Railway Exhibition on November 2/3 at Springfields Event Centre. Its second outing will be as part (we have something special planned) of our display at the Warley National Model Railway Exhibition on November 23/24. You'll have to wait until the next issue to find out what we are doing at the Warley show, but we are sure you will like what we have planned.

The autumn is a busy period for the *Hornby Magazine* layout roster and as well as

# MODELJOURNEY

Hornby Magazine's Assistant Editor MARK CHIVERS reveals his model railway journey from Tri-ang's Big Big Train to the present day.

THINK MY FASCINATION with railways harks back to when I was a toddler, visiting Guildford station with my dad to watch the trains pass. I also vaguely recollect a trip on a veteran BR Southern Region Electric Multiple Unit (EMU) at the time, which helped plant the seed that has remained with me forever.

I was the tender age of three when I received my first ever train set - Tri-ang's Big Big Train and it seemed huge at the time. Mind you, it was 'O' gauge and there was a battery-operated Type 3 'Hymek' diesel-hydraulic, 0-4-0T shunter, some BR Mk 2 carriages and wagons, plus lots of bright red plastic track consisting of straights, curves and points - certainly enough for me to run a circuit from the living room, into the kitchen and back again. It was robust and my fingers soon got to grips with the basic switches on the locomotives, resulting in hours of fun. I absolutely loved it! And interestingly, it appears to have had such an influence on me that half a century later I'm collecting items again for my grandson.

My next train set developed out of frustration with a Scalextric slot car set due to the fact the cars kept coming off the track (my fault) and my feet got caught in the wires (again, my fault). What did we replace it with? A Hornby Railways train set. What did it contain? Another 'Hymek' and some Mk 2 carriages – albeit in 'OO'. Hours were then spent poring over Tri-ang and Hornby track plan books with a view to building a layout. A large continuous

loop layout was discounted, and my dad and I opted for an L-shaped scheme in my bedroom instead. This of course grew into a U-shaped layout, much to my mum's amusement.

Childhood summer holidays were spent on BR's Southern Region (again much to my mum's amusement) as we would enjoy family days out using a runabout rover ticket to the likes of Bournemouth. I was a big fan of the 4-TC and 4-REP EMUs that ran to the seaside town and the buffet stewards were adept at making a great cup of chicken soup. The art was making it back to the front

coach of the 4-TC between Woking and Basingstoke without



scalding other passengers.

One day a model shop opened in our village as part of the post office. From this I discovered a local model railway club and soon got involved in club projects at junior level. My first parttime job was helping out in the model shop after school and at weekends, and in due course I also took on organising the club's annual model railway exhibition.

A career in broadcasting took me around the country for many years but my growing model railway collection was never far away. A chance encounter in the late 1990s resulted in me taking on a 'OO' gauge Scottish Region exhibition layout which focused my collecting habits on BR's Scottish Region in the 1980s and 1990s. Since then, my collection has veered somewhat, such that I also now collect BR Southern Region and a fair few modern-era models as well as dipping my toe back into the Scottish Region.

Since joining Hornby Magazine six years ago, I've gained something of a reputation for not being able to attend an exhibition or visit a model shop without making a purchase. Having looked back on some of my summer exploits, I think they might have a point! Him

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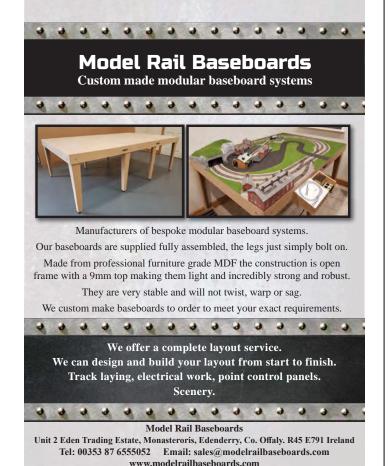






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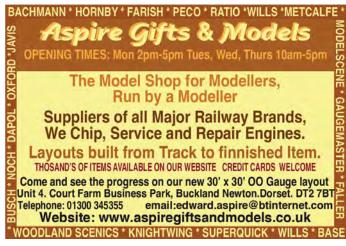






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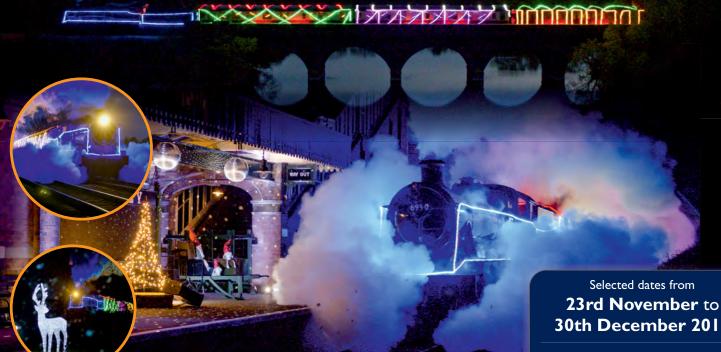
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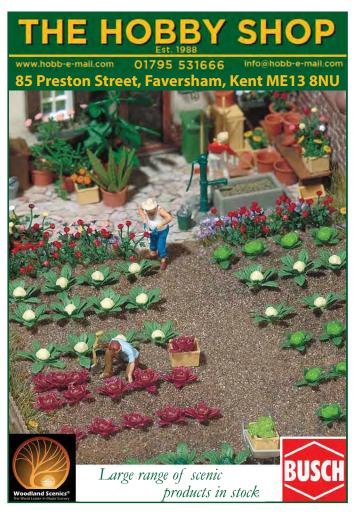


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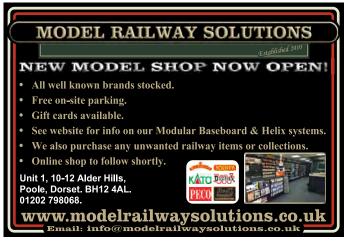
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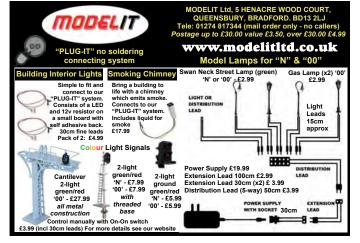














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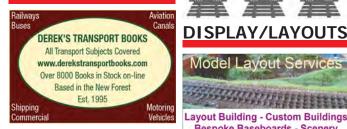
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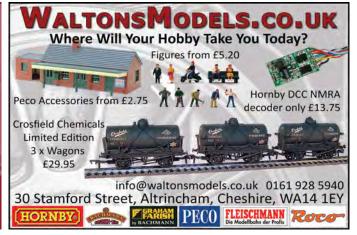
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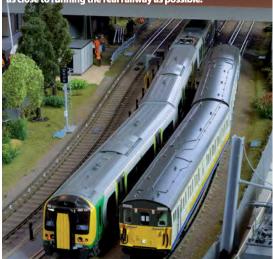
# **CHILCOMPTONTUNNEL**

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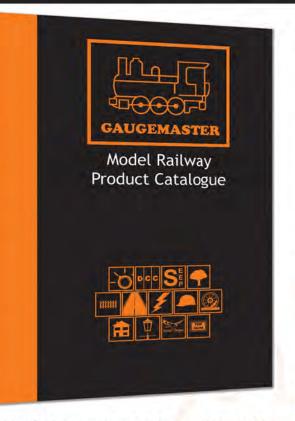






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
