A highlight of this



Talking of the modern day, you won't be able to miss the fact that the beginning of 2022 has been dominated by the arrival of a new collection of freight wagons for 'OO'. In this issue's reviews we inspect Revolution Trains' new IWA holdall vans, Cavalex Models' BLA steel coil carrier and Accurascale's new collection of HYA and IIA bogie wagons, all of which are new incentives to model more recent railway operations.

ORNBY'S all-new'OO' gauge BR Standard'9F' 2-10-0 is progressing with Engineering
Prototype (EP) samples arriving with the manufacturer in late 2021 for inspection.

Hornby has held a close association with the '9F' since the early 1970s when it first appeared in the Tri-ang Hornby range. It was duly upgraded in the late 1980s and again in the late 1990s, before a new generation locomotive-drive model appeared as part of the company's RailRoad range from 2008.

In 2021, the manufacturer revealed plans to produce an allnew 'OO' gauge model of the '9F' which is set to feature a die-cast metal body, locomotive drive, five-pole skew-wound motor and a wealth of separately applied detailing including smokebox door dart, lamp irons, smoke deflectors, steps, brake rodding, wire handrails, sprung metal


buffers and ATC/AWS equipment, together with detailed cab interior and a selection of five all-new tenders - BR1B, BR1C, BR1F, BR1G and BR1K.

Since the initial launch, Hornby has subsequently enhanced the specification with the addition of a flickering firebox effect and inclusion of a 21-pin Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder socket, in line with many of the company's new 2022 releases.

Three versions of the all-new '9F' are set to appear later this year as 92167 in BR black with early crests and BR1K tender (R3986), 92194 in BR black with late crests and BR1F tender (R3987) and 92220 Evening Star in BR lined green with late crests and BR1G tender (R3988).

Hornby has also revised its pricing since the initial announcements, with prices now set at £252.99 each. Delivery is currently anticipated this summer.

Accurascale reveals DECORATED 'MANORS'



HE first factory decorated samples of Accurascale's in-development 'OO' gauge model of the Great Western Railway 'Manor' 4-6-0s have been revealed.

Amongst the initial samples received for inspection are examples in GWR and BR liveries, with further models including Key Publishing's exclusive edition of 7802 *Bradley Manor*, due shortly.



Each model is set to feature a highly detailed and decorated cab interior.

Areas already identified for improvement include the colour of the copper chimney, firebox coal, tender coal load, addition of factory fitted etched nameplates, further polishing of the die-cast body to remove seam remnants, adjustment of the locomotive number size, orientation of lamp brackets, modification of the front coupling so that it can be stowed on the hook and minor livery amendments.

Further livery samples are due imminently, as well as video of the locomotives running with the new custom DCC sound project created for the Accurascale model.



The Association of Model Railway Societies in Scotland (AMRSS) – organiser of the annual Model Rail Scotland exhibition – has commissioned an exclusive limited edition model of Revolution Trains' newly-tooled 'N' gauge Class 320 three-car Electric Multiple Unit (EMU), as 320306 Model Rail Scotland in Strathclyde Passenger Transport (SPT) carmine and cream.

Named at Glasgow Central station in February 1997, 320306 was the first item of British main line rolling stock to be named after a model railway exhibition, launching SPT's new colour scheme in the process. It retained the distinctive nameplates until refurbishment in 2011.

Revolution Trains' '320s' are set to feature a low-profile

coreless motor, Next18 Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder socket, directional head and tail lights, inter-vehicle power transfer couplers, detailed interiors, switchable cab lighting, illuminated destination blinds, interior saloon lighting and poseable realistic pantograph. Etched nameplates will also be included with 320306 for those wishing to upgrade the factory printed versions.

Priced at £295 per three-car set, they will be available to purchase at Model Rail Scotland on February 25-27 from the AMRSS limited edition sales stand at the show (while stocks last). Just 150 packs will be available.

Caroline gains colour



First EP for Revolution's Class 59

EVOLUTION TRAINS has taken delivery of the first Engineering Prototype (EP) samples of its newly-tooled 'N' gauge Class 59 diesel (HM172).

Introduced in the mid-1980s, these General Motors-built machines became the first privately-owned main line diesel locomotives to operate on BR. Three sub-classes were built: Class 59/0 for Foster Yeoman, Class 59/1 for ARC and Class 59/2 for National Power.

Revolution Trains' tooling is set to include two types of bogie and exhaust, original and revised lighting arrangements as well as single and double-handled doors to enable most detail combinations throughout the Class 59s' existence to be modelled.

Liveries planned include original and revised Foster Yeoman (59/0), ARC (59/1), Aggregates Industries (59/0), Hanson (59/1), EWS (59/2), DB Schenker (59/2) and presentday Freightliner (59/2). A National Power first and last twin-pack containing 59201 and 59206 in



the distinctive colour scheme is also planned. Finally, two exclusive editions of 59003 in GB Railfreight Europorte and present-day GB Railfreight liveries are also planned for Rails of Sheffield.

Following assessment and testing,

further improvements will be made to the tooling.

Early-bird prices for standard releases are set at £124.95 DCC ready and £219.95 DCC soundfitted, while the Rails of Sheffield exclusive editions are priced at £159.95 each, DCC ready. The National Power first and last twin-pack is priced at £300, DCC ready. Release is anticipated during the final quarter of 2022.

EVOLUTION TRAINS has received the first decorated samples of the eagerly-awaited 'OO' gauge BR Southern Region General Manager's saloon for assessment (HM158).

Converted in the late 1960s from a Class 203 6B Hastings gauge buffet car, TDB975025 was utilised for meetings, route inspections and conveying VIPs. It was fitted with driver's controls so could be propelled or hauled by locomotives and was also compatible with many of the Southern Region's Electric Multiple Units.

Since privatisation, the saloon has been overhauled and modified several times for Railtrack/Network Rail use. Latterly named *Caroline*, it is still regularly seen across the rail network on inspection trips and route refreshers.

The first 'OO' gauge models to arrive for inspection include TDB975025 in original BR blue and grey condition, together with the later modified (present-day) BR Southern Region General Manager's saloon TDB975025 in original BR blue and grey. Final production models in this colour scheme will feature a brown chassis.

version as *Caroline* in Network Rail Brunswick green with revised light arrangements at each end. A third version is also set to be produced in Network SouthEast livery. Each model will feature eraspecific detailing, together with detailed interiors, third-rail shoe gear, accurate headcode details, solebar step lighting, flicker-free interior illumination, directional lighting and 21-pin Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder socket.

Following a few amendments to the appearance and finish, production is expected to get under way soon. Priced at £149 each, pre-orders are being accepted until the end of January.

EIRSTLOOK Class 313 P'EP'

EVELOPMENT WORK on Revolution Trains' all-new 'N' gauge Class 313 Electric Multiple Unit (HM149) is progressing well with the first Engineering Prototype (EP) sample arriving in early January.

Developed from BR's early 1970s experimental Prototype Electro-Pneumatic (PEP) Electric Multiple Units (EMUs), the three-car Class 313s were versatile units as they featured both pantographs (AC) and third-rail shoe gear (DC) for power collection. They were originally introduced on BR's Great Northern inner-suburban services and some remain in use today with





Revolution Trains' all-new Class 313/314s will also feature fully detailed underframes and inter-vehicle power transfer couplings.

Southern Railway on its Coastway routes along the South Coast, some 45 years later.

In addition to the dual-voltage Class 313 EMUs, Revolution Trains (RT) is also planning to produce 'N' gauge models of the outwardly similar overhead AC Class 314 three-car units which have operated within Scotland.

RT's new Class 313/314s will feature detailed interiors.


Model Rail Scotland Scotland's premier model railway exhibition returns to 2022 PREVIEW Scotland's premier model railway exhibition returns to

the Scottish Event Campus in Glasgow on February

25 to 27. Hornby Magazine previews this highlight in the model railway calendar.

OLLOWING its hiatus in 2021, the Association of Model Railway Societies in Scotland's (AMRSS) annual three-day model railway show -Model Rail Scotland – is back on the weekend of February 25-27. More than 40 layouts are due to appear in Hall 3 of the Scottish Event Campus (SEC) in Glasgow later this month and, as in previous years, the event is set to feature plenty of Scottish content.



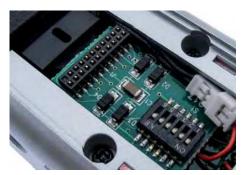



OUTHPOOL was originally going to be a loft layout but when I decided to start Grimy Times Weathering, I needed a workshop as well which changed its location in the house overnight.

The decision was made to convert the garage and make it integral to the house, so it was centrally heated and most importantly had easy access to the kettle. By sheer coincidence the space I had in the loft was virtually identical to what I had in the converted garage. I realised that with a bit more planning my business and model railway could be combined in the same room.

This decided the design and construction style for the layout as all my business working space would have to be incorporated under the railway. The layout's overall dimensions are 14ft x 10ft and it took a lot of planning to fit all I wanted to within these constraints.

I set out to achieve a main line layout with a terminus and lot of operating potential and feel that I have managed to achieve this. It has taken about six years planning and construction to get it to the position it is at now, but has been very enjoyable and rewarding in doing so.

The baseboards are 11mm plywood with frame construction laid on top of bespoke shelving cabinets and units made from 18mm plywood with a built-in spray booth vented outside.

One side of the layout is on two levels to accommodate a hidden storage vard which was laid first with a full belt and braces approach to wiring due to the limited access to it. Live frog points were used throughout with multiple track feeds. This was tested and tested over a few months before I started on the main layout.

The fiddle yard is a huge reverse loop with multiple storage roads (16 full trains can be accommodated) and I wanted this feature for hands free operation in the storage yard and the illusion that trains were coming and going to and from different destinations.



All points in the hidden yard are controlled within one panel, but the points on the scenic section are hand operated as I did not want a lot of point motor wiring impeding the working space below.

I used Peco code 100 track throughout my layout with bonded dead points on the scenic section which has given me very reliable running.

The layout is roughly based in the North West of England with the name Southpool being an amalgamation of Southport where I was born and Liverpool.


Most of my stock is London Midland Region from the early 1960s period, but lots of other stock can be seen due to my interest in prototype diesels and the fact that like most people I have too much stock! The trains are a mixture of Bachmann, Hornby, Heljan and a few kit built locomotives (including a Caprotti 'Black Five'), some renumbered.


The biggest issue I have with some of my stock is its unweathered state, as owning a weathering company I find this embarrassing, but there are never enough hours in the day and customers' stock has to take priority over my own as that pays the bills. However, since taking the big decision to take on a model railway shop and move my business away from home, extra space and capacity has given me a chance to get the odd model of my own done.

A lot of the buildings on the layout were professionally built for a previous layout >>>

and in my planning of Southpool I had to fit these into a much smaller space than previously while retaining a main line feel. Apart from these buildings there are a lot of ready to plant resin structures which have been further detailed as well as a number of modified kits.

TOURING SOUTHPOOL

On leaving the tunnel portal from the storage yard, we enter a stone-faced cutting before going under a twin track girder bridge which carries the Southpool avoiding line (this is just a cosmetic feature) We then pass the imposing Baines Brewery on the left-hand side

which serves to hide the heating boiler. This part of the layout is fully removable to access the boiler for servicing.

The next feature to see on the left-hand side is the 'new' diesel depot. On the right-hand side you will pass Southpool North Junction signalbox and the entrance to Southpool North locomotive depot which is predominantly used for freight engines. I always liked the idea of Crewe North and South sheds but have reversed mine with regards to passenger and freight motive power. You will always find an interesting variety of locomotives on both steam sheds. Also before the shed is a large set of allotments backing onto the railway.

As we continue past Southpool North shed, on the right-hand side we pass some exchange sidings while the left-hand side is dwarfed by an ex-LMS goods warehouse and factories. The large gas works is next to be passed on the left just before the junction for Southpool station.

On the right can be viewed the coaling and ash plants and the turntable serving North and South sheds which is a modified Heljan turntable. More factories go past on the left until we pass Southpool station signalbox, a unique structure with its flat wartime roof.

If we take the junction into the terminus side of the station, we pass the parcels





depot on the left with a busy street scene elevated in the background. Entering the station, we are soon under the huge scratchbuilt overall roof and come to the end of the line at the hydraulic buffers. If we don't diverge into the terminus, we pass into the through part of the station passing Southpool South shed on the right before going under the overall roof.

At the end of the overall roof, we get a very short bit of daylight before disappearing into tunnels which take


the railway under Southpool town.
Overlooking the station are large
tenement buildings and council-built
flats with balconies which are modified
Skytrex mouldings.


Southpool is a busy town and many details abound within its streets. Outside the station building is a market square which leads to shop-filled streets and the Tunnel Top public house. Also overlooking the cenotaph in the middle of the market is the Station Hotel, a large

scratchbuilt building in plastic.


Looking away from the station we see St Basil's church named after my dog which is a heavily modified Kibri kit and St Basil's Church of England primary school next to it. A remembrance service is taking place at the cenotaph, while the Tunnel Top pub receives a delivery which would probably be drunk during the wake of the funeral taking place at St Basil's. There are also a lot of shopping and everyday activities taking place.











RUNNING SOUTHPOOL

The layout is DCC controlled with quite a few sound fitted locomotives which give a totally different feel to the layout, however having more than a few in sound together can soon become too much. I use the Gaugemaster Prodigy Advance which has been very reliable system to use.

Southpool has four main running lines which if the mood takes you can just be used to watch trains passing until your heart is content. The way the layout was designed to be operated allows for a number of different movements. A train can either leave the exchange sidings or station terminus and traverse the scenic part of the layout before disappearing into the tunnel leading to the fiddle yard. It can


do a few laps of the layout if you so wish.

When it is time to reappear it starts its journey back to the terminus/exchange sidings. On arrival, a new locomotive will couple up to the rear of the train ready for the next departure upon which the then released locomotive will make its way to the sheds for servicing. This gives a continual rotation of my locomotives.

With the layout being DCC controlled, it is much easier to carry out other movements on the layout without all the associated wiring and switching I had to have on my previous analogue layout.

In the planning and construction I would have struggled without the help of Richard Williams in the design and construction stage, Peter Leyland for his expertise and skill in creating some of the buildings the overall roof was a joint venture for both of us and I am sure Peter will never do another one like that. Allan Stephenson from Sankey Scenics has provided superb signage which really brings the layout to life as well as some really nice touches with bespoke shop signs and personalised details like station benches and newspaper kiosks as well as soldering a lot of the track feeds in the fiddle yard.

By the time you read this, Southpool will be in the process of being dismantled to make way for my next project but everything will be recycled onto another layout I am building. HM



Gently FADINGAM FADINGS FAD

You can almost taste the tobacco smoke and touch the threadbare upholstery as **TIM SHACKLETON** evokes the unique character of carriage stock from a bygone age.



N THE STEAM ERA, the stock used on secondary passenger workings was often older and a great deal dingier than the coaches on faster and more prestigious trains. Inside, amid old-fashioned wood veneers and linoleum, there was an all-pervasive aura of stale tobacco smoke and musty upholstery.

In BR days such trains provided a haven for life-expired stock dating back to the 1930s and even earlier, and it was one of life's great pleasures to be able to secure an empty compartment and breathe in the atmosphere that had been built up over many years of front-line service. You didn't get this on the smart green open-plan DMUs that were steadily taking over such duties and I for one really

appreciated the shabby, fly-blown qualities of the ancient régime.

To offer a balanced view, coaching stock has always been cleaner externally than some modellers seem to imagine, but a great deal grubbier than is often presented. Roofs, ends and underframes are invariably as dirty as freight stock but bodysides have always been frequently cleaned – initially with a mop and bucket, later in mechanical washing plants – and this helps define the character of any passenger train.

Stock used on local services spent a lot of downtime being cosseted in carriage sidings and bay platforms but long-distance workings could pick up quite a coating of external grime,

especially in bad weather. On the whole, though, passengers (and station staff) were more concerned with seeing the interiors were clean and litterfree, the lavatories worked and the buffet was well-stocked. Dirty windows, however, were a frequent complaint and carriage heating, in my experience, could be a bit hit and miss.

How do we capture the seedy aura with which elderly stock was invested? It's all so different to the shiny, slightly plasticky designer look so fashionable with passenger trains these days, and essentially we suggest it through a considered weathering treatment, digital technology not yet being able to replicate the distinctive and uniquely elusive odours of a

bygone era.

I thought I should show the processes of material decay developing over time and to do this I've chosen to model Maunsell coaches of three distinct periods – pre-war, early 1950s and late 1950s/early 1960s. By seeing the same type of vehicle handled in different ways and in a variety of conditions, I'm hoping you might be tempted to think of trying something similar for your own carriage fleet. Restraint, as ever, is the key - don't go mad with the rust powders and caked-on grime, but rather let the character of your rolling stock emerge slowly through a careful and sympathetic evocation of faded paint, ingrained dirt and workaday reality. HM



STEP BY STEP CREATING FADED PAINT EFFECTS



I loved working on Maunsell stock in pre-war Southern livery - one of my favourite modelling projects of recent years. These darker shades of green tend to blacken still further with exposure to the elements so I had to think carefully about how to replicate this effect.



I created a suitable dark enamel wash made up of Humbrol Matt Leather (62) and Metalcote Gunmetal (27004). Having let the mix down with white spirit, I brushed the wash on and then took as much as possible off using cotton buds soaked in white spirit, deliberately letting the dirt collect in corners exactly as it does on the prototype.



I've emphasised door furniture and seam lines with a slightly thicker and darker mix of the same colours, which also has the effect of tarnishing the over-bright brasswork. I quite liked the random scuff above the veehanger, so I left it where it was.



Underframe brown is important to counterbalance the olive-green bodywork - but I've maybe been over-enthusiastic with the battery box, so I can either tone this down with some black powder or simply airbrush the brightness away.





coaches tend to be a bit featureless but from this angle you can see there's quite a bit of subtle relief detail on a Maunsell coach side which weathering has helped to bring out. On the out-of-thebox model you might struggle to see these things.

Moving on to the early BR era, the detailing is still fantastic on this Hornby model but the shade of cream on the BR-liveried Maunsell coaches is far too yellow to my eyes. Even for a clean coach, it needs knocking back. You can do this with the coach still in its plastic sleeve.



I'm mixing something closer to the shade I want from Revell enamels. I'm not aiming to repaint the coach, rather to add a tint to the existing colour. The left-hand bowl of my improvised mixing palette . contains white spirit.



With the paint let down to something like 20% of its original consistency, I'm gently flooding it on to the coach side with a wide, soft brush, being careful to avoid the windows. As ever, the less you put on the less you'll need to take off.



Add-and-remove painting is a standard weathering technique. With another big brush dipped in clean white spirit I'm now taking as much as I can off the bodysides. Always brush downwards, just as rainwater would wash the sides.



Already you can see how our creamy enamel wash has made a big difference, collecting in the microscopic dimples and craters in the original paint finish. Keep brushing away until satisfied.



Coach roofs always darkened to a sooty grey-black in the steam era. While avoiding handling the still-wet paint on the coach sides, you can flip the model on to its wheels and then airbrush the roof using a piece of card to avoid overspray. As usual we have various combinations of Tamiya Red Brown (XF64) and Flat Black (XF1).



Allow a good 24 hours for the paint to thoroughly harden and then invert the coach – now removed from its packaging – in a foam cradle so you can airbrush the underframe. There are plenty of 'frame dirt' paints available from the trade but I've always preferred to mix my own using enamels or acrylics as the mood takes me.



I try to avoid the wheels when spraying to minimise cleaning up. I prefer to paint them by hand, again using my brown underframe colour.

STEP BY STEP CREATING FADED PAINT EFFECTS



What I've done here is to dab tiny quantities of very thin browny-black enamel on to the door hinges and other details, so it flashes by capillary action along the door seams. If you smudge it or get too much on – as has happened around the centre door handle and grab iron – you can easily wash it off again with white spirit.



Using the same dab-on/dab-off technique you can build up bodyside dirt in out-of-the-way areas that would evade the carriage cleaner's mop and bucket. Here you can see corrosion starting to develop around the top of the doors, as rust bubbles through the ageing paintwork.



Keep going along both sides of the coach and remember not to overdo anything. Even when using pigment that's as thin as this, putting more paint on is a lot easier than taking it off, especially once it's started to harden.



Now the faded, discoloured effect is starting to show through. Sometimes white spirit can leave a chalky deposit - if there's just a hint of it then it suggests chemical residues from the washing process, and can be incorporated into the overall weathering effect.

And this is the outcome – a very tired-looking Maunsell brake composite in urgent need of a visit to Eastleigh paint shop and a refreshing coat of SR green! Once that's been applied, the cycle will start all over again.



These are all the paintbrushes I used on this particular project. This collection covered everything from broad flat brushes for applying washes to tiny detail brushes for adding small quantities of paint to specific areas. Sources include Humbrol and Daler Rowney.






Coach ends pick up dirt blown up from the track. This can be airbrushed using the usual track colour and then enhanced using suitable weathering powders – in this case, Dark Mud (P033) and Track Brown (P414) from the MIG range.



Final touches - carriage footboards are made of treated timber but they're pretty much the same colour as the rest of the underframe. I like to highlight worn areas beneath the doors, in this case using **Panzer Grey** (PO38) from MIG.

WORKING DESTINATION SCREENS

Modern electronics are opening up new possibilities for miniature displays.

MIKE LOMAX explains how he installed a working LED matrix screen into a 'OO' scale double-decker bus.

background being in IT and always tinkering with gadgets and gizmos I recently turned my hand to Arduino development boards, LED screens and the programming that makes them work.

Over the past years I've spent a fair amount of time looking at how technology can be integrated into the model world to bring more realism to models. It is a complex subject, so this feature is more of an overview to introduce it.


Recently, my earlier collections of model buses came to light

TOOLS

- » Multitool drill (cutting disc, sanding wheel and 2mm grinding ball)
- » Craft knife and cutting board
- »Soldering iron
- » Insulation tape

after a sort out. This gave me an idea to look at a project I'd been working on to see if I could get a working LED Matrix Screen into a 1:76 scale double decker bus to suit positioning on a 'OO' gauge model railway. It turns out that you can. I'm using Arduino microcontroller boards and associated software





which allow creation of unique electronic projects based around standard components which are available off-the-shelf. The microcontrollers can be managed by software on a computer with the code generated then being uploaded to the microcontroller board. You can connect different types of device to the microcontroller boards including the OLED screen used in this project.

I spent some time researching what kind of details would normally be displayed on the 1:1 counterpart. What I found was that in general use it would comprise a route number, final destination and stops along the route. I also looked at special boards such as School Service, Special, Airport and similar screens and researched how I could recreate everything from the 1:1 equivalent.

I decided to design all of my destination boards by hand. This process involves using a drawing program on a computer to individually draw (pixel by pixel) a 128 pixel x 32 pixel image. Though it is time consuming, the result is a highly customised image which can be displayed on the LED matrix board once it has been installed in the model.

The end result was displayed at this year's Great Electric Train Show

on Mike Buick's Oak Road layout. Two of the buses were placed strategically at either end and they received great feedback.

Once completed, the bus can have its destination blind reconfigured as many times as you like once you understand how the software works. In addition while connected to a computer or USB charger, the internal battery will charge, and once unplugged the bus will run for up to eight hours.

I'd like to pass on my thanks to Mike Buick, Matt Hill and Paul Coley, all of whom have helped along the way. Without their help and the continual good feedback I've had from customers I wouldn't have made it this far. I've been able to develop and build something unique to the world of model railways and model bus community. Other models with these development boards installed will include functioning headlights and indicators as well as changeable messages on the screen, all controlled by a Bluetooth link, so there is plenty of future development on the table too.

The following step by step guide shows how I did my screen install.






LED matrix screen. From the front you'll need to use a cutting disc to remove the bulkhead with the printed destination board. From the rear you'll need to enlarge the centre hole with a grinding tool - be sure not to go too far up or down.




With a 2mm grinding wheel (the golf ball shaped one supplied with most mini drill kits), you need to cut a groove down each side where the LED matrix screen will slot into. This is required to minimise pinching on the cable coming out of the side of the screen.







There are a number of electronic components to install inside the bus consisting of a 3.7v 500mAh LIPO battery (top), a Trinket MO development board to allow connection of the various components (centre left), a LIPO Backpack which charges the battery and automatically switches between USB and battery power (centre right), a **SPDT Mini Power Switch to allow** the system to be switched off (lower centre right) and finally the 128x32 OLED screen to provide the custom display at the front of

the bus (bottom).





The chassis needs two holes creating: one for the pushbutton (4mm diameter) and a larger rectangle for the on/off switch (4mm x 12mm). At this stage you can also install the **Development Board which** provides the power links from the USB socket to the screen and the Backpack (mounted vertically). The Backpack controls power to and from the battery. The development board is fixed to the chassis using superglue. Wiring instructions are downloadable from https:// learn.adafruit.com



the 32AWG wire to the screen (about 200mm lengths). I use red, black, green and yellow wires. Take a photograph of the wiring and then wrap the exposed connections with some insulation tape. Slide the screen into the arooves cut earlier in the process.






Reassembly can now begin. With Northcord models you place the roof liner in at the top first, and then the top deck glazing to hold it in place. This is followed by the seating unit for the upper deck. The lower deck roof can also be placed in the body with a hole cut into it to accommodate the battery for the destination board.



All the wiring can now be cut to length and soldered to the development board at the rear of the lower deck. The chassis can be placed back under the body using the front and rear bumpers to secure it in place. The rear bumper now slots into the USB socket on the development board.




The Palbrick Wagon dates back to the mid 1950's, seeking to replace the ancient brick wagons used by LNER.

Originally medium goods wagons converted to carry pallets of bricks, the Palbrick featured 3 different variations for different sizes of pallets. Palbrick A could carry 13 tons, whereas B and C could carry 16 tons.

Across all of the roughly 1400 Palbrick wagons that were made, all of them had some changes or variations to them that differed from the standard templates.

By the 1960's, most of the had fallen out of use and converted into other types of wagons. Some converted into match wagons, others into shellcase wagons. Now, very few exist across the UK.

Parkense Par

With a brief to create a layout set in the dying days of steam in the Forest of Dean in 'OO' gauge, **DAN EVASON** explores how a workable track plan was created – and how the permanent way was laid in the first of a two part series on this layouts construction.



ARKEND NORTH started with an idea from many years ago of a layout loosely based on the Forest of Dean. The aim was to capture the essence of the area, with industrial buildings surrounded by trees and shrubs.

There would be a small station and goods yard and the layout would be set towards the end of the steam era. Its future owner John Philips was also very specific that he wanted the whole layout to look run-down and decrepit as if it was days away from being razed to the ground. It would be called Parkend North, a take on the name of Parkend on the preserved Dean Forest Railway, and by calling the layout Parkend North it gave me licence to build this layout as John wished, and not have to go down a

strictly prototypical route.
Planning and the design

took a while working through revisions to the trackplan using Anyrail software to reach a final arrangement. I opted for Peco Code 75 track – not the ideal finescale bullhead range because of its limited product range and limited availability during the build.

Finalising the track plan took a few weeks to achieve as John and I wanted the layout to look as believable as possible but be fun to operate. With the latter in mind, John wanted to use his ADM indexing turntable which is based around the Peco 70ft turntable kit - a little large for the end of a rural branch line, but a fixture which really added an element of operational value to the plan. This caused a little headache during the planning process to ensure that it would fit into the design due to its sheer size. We both settled on a track plan that worked and felt right for the initial brief.

GROWTH SPURT

Originally, Parkend North was going to be 5ft long, but John then decided to relocate it allowing a 3ft 6in extension. We also decided to add an off-scene 2ft 6in custom turntable as a storage yard to supply trains to the scenic section.

The baseboards were designed and built using high grade 9mm plywood, cut to shape then glued and screwed together. The large

turntable again posed a problem as it came to me set in its own prebuilt 2ft square baseboard. I had to design the main boards to go from 18in wide at one end then flare out to the width of the turntable at the other.

Although control is analogue, I wired the layout in a Digital Command Control-friendly format to give John the option to switch in the future. To overcome running analogue models on an essentially DCC layout, I fitted isolating switches to the sidings allowing John to have multiple locomotives on the layout. I also fitted DCC Concepts Cobalt point motors for ease and reliability, with a 9V rather than 12V power supply to keep them running correctly. For the controller, John opted for a handheld Gaugemaster unit.

TRACK & ELECTRICS

With the 'enabling works' completed, I started laying the track, modifying the points to improve reliability by feeding the frogs and bonding the stock and switch rails followed by adding droppers to all sections of track and connecting them to the power bus under the layout rather than relying on fishplates to conduct power.


For the track underlay, I use
A2-sized foamboard sheets
bought from Hobbycraft. They
were attached to the baseboard

ballast shoulder. They can also be cut away to create the illusion of depth of drains and other details. I then gave the whole layout a quick coat of grey paint to help with the basic ground cover of the ballast later.


The Peco code 75 flat bottom rail plain track and points were laid out next using a combination of large radius curved and medium radius straight points to make the Anyrail design come to life. After wiring, this was thoroughly

tested before moving on to the next stage which would add weathering and ballast to the railway.

To start weathering the railway, I use an airbrush as I find it gives a convincing misty dirt effect to the

sleepers and rails. Firstly, I gave the whole track a coat of Tamiya Hull Red, then Tamiya Flat Earth and run the airbrush down the centre and edges of the sleepers. Using a selection of rust weathering powders and small flat paintbrush,

I started placing the track loose to get a feel of how the end result might look. Once happy, I started cutting the track to the correct lengths and then added dropper wires by soldering them to each section of track to guarantee maximum connectivity and reliability.

I picked out the rail chairs one by one. This is probably the fiddliest part of the process, but really worth it for the end result. Once the chairs were picked out, I used a cream acrylic to dry brush the sleepers, helping to highlight the

grain effect in the Peco track. Finally it was time for ballasting. There are plenty of great ranges on the market but I use something I discovered on a family walk -

river silt, which I dry and sieve. Once dry, I find this has a realistic scale and colour to it. Laying the ballast down can be done in a few ways with fancy tools or in my case, a humble teaspoon.

Working a section at a time around the layout in manageable lengths, I spread a spoon of the

ballast down the centre of the track. I then use my finger and drag the ballast up and down the line filling the gaps between the sleepers. After the centre is done, it's time to turn your attention to the shoulders, either by running >>>


STEP BY STEP BUILDING PARKEND NORTH IN '00' GAUGE

I temporarily used an off-cut of foamboard to mount the switches in until I built the fascia front for the layout which is where the final control panel will be mounted.



With the electrics complete and tested the next job is to start weathering the track, initially using an airbrush and Tamiya Hull Red (XF-9). Next, using a cream acrylic paint, the sleepers were dry brushed to bring out the grain of the sleepers and the detail of the chairs.

the teaspoon full of ballast down them or using the overspill from the centre. I tend to use a large flat brush to dress the ballast. Once happy, I used the time honoured 50:50 PVA/water mixture with a spot of detergent. I pre-wetted the dry ballast with water using a pump action spray bottle which helps keep the ballast in place when you're applying the glue. Once the ballast was dry, I used

Once the ballast was dry, I used some Tamiya Nato Black applied lightly with an airbrush in the centre of the 'four foot' to give that oily grimy look, more where locomotives would stand such as station areas.

A top tip we can recommend here is to clean and test your track between every stage as removing multiple layers of glue and paint can lead to a challenging running session. So the build ran as follows: lay track, test it; weather track, clean it, test it; ballast track, clean it, test it and finally weather the ballast, clean the track and test

Ballasting can then begin. Rather than commercial products, I used river silt sourced locally for this project. It takes a little time to sieve the material, but it does look good at the end of the process. Spreading the ballast starts at the centre of the track and once it has been brushed into place a 50:50 mixture of PVA is applied after wetting the ballast with a water mister. Before going any further on the scenics, it is vital to test all track and electrics to make sure they work.

it again. It's an ideal recipe to avoid frustration at the end of the weathering and ballasting phase.

SET DRESSING

By now Parkend North was an operational layout with weathered

and ballasted track which was ready to move on to the next stage of scenic development. However, before that an important job needed to be carried out: testing. This is one of the most enjoyable parts of a model railway build as

it provides the chance to run your trains, test out the track formation and perfect its running which can be more difficult to do once you have a fully scenic layout on your hands.

In the next instalment of this two-

part series, I will explain how the scenery and buildings were made to bring Parkend North to life and offer a realistic setting in which John can enjoy his collection of Great Western Railway locomotives and rolling stock.

Howbrooke

Given a challenge to create a present day layout for his club, **RICHARD SMITH** and friends built this appealing snapshot of the sights and colours of the modern day railway in 'OO' gauge.



HILE OUR CLUB
(Sheffield Model
Railway Enthusiasts)
had a large tail-chaser
in 'OO' gauge already
called Somewhere
Anywhere, new members joining the

Anywhere, new members joining the club wanting to run their stock meant the current layout very soon filled and while it served its purpose it soon reached capacity.

A group of club members including myself decided another layout was needed, and we would adopt a generic storage yard approach. This means that all components are built to a common standard and scenic areas are dropped in and out of the same off-scene storage yard depending on what we want to run. As this new project was to be an exhibition layout/series of layouts, they could be exhibited based on what exhibition managers wanted at their shows allowing different eras or scenes to be selected.

We chose to stick with 'OO' gauge as

most of the club members had some stock already and while some including myself model in other scales and gauges, 'OO' is the most common amongst members as well as being the most recognised scale 

a time period in which we didn't have anything on the roster. So a challenge was joked about asking if I could build a new layout for the March 2020 show, it was August 2019 at the time.

To enable the changing of scenic sections, we had already purchased a number of laser cut modular baseboard kits from Grainge and Hodder Ltd, a first for all of us involved in the project. While the initial board took some time to make, experience reduced that time in each successive board. For the storage yard we used three 1,200mm x 600mm standard modules and eight 45-degree corner modules. Four of the corner modules were joined to reduce the number of boards from eight to four which helped with track laying and reduced the wiring across baseboard joints.

The storage yard layout had already been decided on and the track was mostly laid using Peco code 100 wooden sleeper flexible track and Streamline points. By the time my challenge had been issued, all that was left for me to do was design and build the scenic section. For this I used the three already constructed 1,200mm x 400mm standard module boards. Track was again Peco code 100, but this time plain track was concrete sleeper with points having wooden sleepers. I added timber bought from my local DIY store for the backscene boards.

The scenic section had mostly been built (without the layout lighting) in isolation from the storage yard, and the two sections were brought together and tested partway through the build. The main issue encountered was a short circuit when the main line crossovers were opened, this was down to wiring the scenic and storage yard sections separately. To overcome the short circuits, I have to work to certain restrictions when running to avoid them and surprisingly, this adds to the interest of operating the layout.

I managed to complete the scenic section to a point ready to exhibit in seven months. Sadly by the time the layout was ready at the start of March 2020, Covid had struck and there was uncertainty around holding exhibitions. As with almost everything else, we were unable to hold our exhibition and the club rooms were closed. Layout lighting was finally added once we could get back into the club rooms and consists of three Wickes kitchen cabinet tube lights.

THE LAYOUT

At this stage I would like to point out that my layout Howbrooke is not a real

place, nor is it based on the history of a particular line or any 'what if' scenarios for proposed extensions. Instead it is a combination of ideas and inspirations taken from various sources and combined to try and represent as closely as I could a modern railway scene. I know traditional layout planning says you should build the baseboards to fit your layout plan, but as the boards were already built I had to work the other way round.

Luckily I already had some ideas. Howbrooke is a real place between Sheffield and Barnsley. Fellow modeller Steve Saxby who is a member of the Neepsend Model Railway Club (also in Sheffield) built a layout with the same name some years ago. I saw Steve's version of Howbrooke at one of our club exhibitions and it stuck with me. A discussion with Steve about the layout and if he was open to me purchasing it confirmed it was still in storage and Steve kindly gifted it to me to renovate. Sadly the layout was beyond my skills to bring back to life after years in storage. So instead the track plan, some of the scenic ideas and layout name formed some of the inspiration for my new scenic section including the high level station, stone retaining wall and pedestrian ramp.

The idea for the remaining track formation required to fit the baseboard footprint was adapted from a layout plan in a layout planning book. This was combined with the original layout to complete a larger track formation which now made up the full track plan for the three scenic boards I had. It also appeared to be a mirror image of the track formation from the old layout.





left now was to fill the two larger gaps which eventually formed the industrial areas

The baseboards had been covered with cork across all the top areas to help deaden sound while the 45 degree boards only had cork under where the track would go. Once the track had been laid, the scenic section was treated to a coat of rust and sleeper grime to tone down the sides. I also painted all the copper clad sleepers used to reinforce the baseboard track joins and any track pins with Humbrol enamel concrete colour to hide them and blend them with the Peco concrete sleepered track. Before ballasting, trackside components were installed such as relay boxes, cable trunking, point motor heaters, TPWS grids and AWS ramps, as well as some plastic coated metal rod painted orange to represent the tubing for cabling







to pass under the tracks. These are kits or components from various sources such as Knightwing, Wills and Peco. Another club member, Alex Roughsedge, designed and 3D printed the ground signals.

Before ballasting, the platforms were installed using Metcalfe kits to speed up construction, and the main retaining walls and bridge supports were installed using stone and brick sheets from the same source. The retaining walls and bridges were then topped with either brick walls or Vari Girder bridge components from the Wills range. Once all these main areas were complete, ballasting was undertaken using Greescenes modern ballast mix secured with the usual PVA water mix after the ballast was dampened with water and washing up liquid to aid the flow. Attention then turned to the green areas before working on structures above the walls and bridges.

Scenery was built up using polystyrene shaped with a heated carver. Once the basic shape was in place, it was all covered with plaster bandage before being painted earth brown. Onto this I glued Woodland Scenics fine mixed scatter, which once dry was covered with mixed autumn and summer 2mm static grasses. Finally on top of this I then used various thicknesses of turfs to vary the texture before adding coloured scatters to represent wild flowers. Trees were added which are a mix of some conifer and deciduous types and covered with turf mixes to represent the foliage on them. All these products were from the Woodland Scenics range.

BUILDINGS

Structures on the layout are relatively simple. Starting from left to right as you view the layout from the front, the warehouse forming part of the rail served industrial area is from the Wills Modern range of kits built as per the instructions and weathered as required. Signs were

added from a sheet which came with a magazine, while the details were from Alex 3D printing them or spares club member Matthew Rose had. Matthew also provided some of the vehicles and forklift trucks used around the layout. Security fencing around the layout is also from the Wills Modern range of kits.

Next is the footbridge which covers one of the baseboard joints and accesses the housing. This is scratchbuilt from plastic components and Vari Girder pieces. The row of terraced houses and the takeaway were built from scratchbuilt shells which were detailed by Matthew before being installed on the layout. The last two stone terraces were built and provided by Brian Wheeliker as he wanted to see how they built up from Metcalfe kits.

The next main structure and focal point of the layout is the station building. Built above the tracks, it helps hide the final baseboard joint on the scenic section. This and the road section were built by club member David Jane. David wanted to build a modern station and what he created far surpassed any expectations I had. The station area consists of the road bed and pavements, a lift shaft and glass surrounds as well as the stairs leading onto platforms $\boldsymbol{2}$ and $\boldsymbol{3}$ from the building. I then added the bollards, flower beds, street lights and platform items, all either kits or ready made from Wills, Bachmann Scenecraft, Knightwing and Heljan. The shelters and benches are from Heljan's modern station kit which is no longer available. Graham also supplied the platform lights which sit as dual sets on platforms 2 and 3. The final addition to the platforms were the signals which are modified Knightwing kits and are also dummies.

The final area on the layout is the older warehouse/mill structure which is built from one of the newer Metcalfe kits.

This was put on a large concrete apron which is just the base cork painted in a >>>

textured paint. The portable buildings and containers are built from kits and detailed, as is the modern warehouse, but this time the security fence has gates to provide Network Rail access to the tracks. This area is the second most popular and probably most unusual as it is not often modelled. The area draws a lot of interest due to the scratchbuilt Network Rail trolleys and bags of material for track renewal works. This is another creation from Matthew based on various scenes he has witnessed working as a signaller for Network Rail. The portable trackside building is an old Hornby Skaledale model and the generator is a 3D print Matthew found.

THE TRAINS

The rolling stock, multiple units and locomotives used on the layout are all from the usual mainstream manufacturers as well as Realtrack for the Class 144/156 units, and the BBA steel wagons are from Cavalex. Its stone hopper wagons and Accurascale's forthcoming models are eagerly awaited.

Some of the multiple units are special runs done by Rainbow Railways to represent the new liveries, and I also had a couple commissioned specifically. I like modelling the current railway scene due to the liveries adopted by the train and freight operating companies which I feel makes today's railway scene look very colourful. The Cavalex BBA wagons are some of the best I have seen for a long time and have to be one of my favourites due to the quality of them which surpasses some of the offerings from the main manufacturers.

For the time being the layout is primarily operated on traditional analogue control although provision has been made for DCC operation. My main focus is on building stock up where I can before fitting digital

equipment and weathering the models.

The layout is operated in a set pattern with the storage yard stacked with trains and run out in order. There is no sequence to the movements yet as there hasn't really been time to develop a proper operating rationale, although certain items are limited to where they can go on the layout. For example, the smaller units are only allowed in the bay or up the branch and the steel train is the only freight that can run onto the industrial estate.

It is the lack of operating sequence which is one of the main challenges with the layout at the moment, and trying to get the stock allocation right for the size of the storage yard and what length trains look best running through the short and narrow scenic section. I appreciate this may seem odd to some readers but having read a lot of starter articles on layout building I have the term 'layout

composition' constantly drumming in my head. A full-length High Speed Train or 20 plus block rake of wagons is a little out of place on the layout. Getting the best use out of the fiddle yard is also a learning process.

I really enjoyed building Howbrooke and while in my head I had an overall plan of what I wanted I had to keep taking a step back from the layout at each stage of the build to make sure it was going the way I had planned. I feel I have managed to capture the impression of the modern railway, although I will admit all my stock is far too clean so weathering is something I will have to take the plunge with sooner rather than later.

While I believe I have achieved what I set out to do with Howbrooke, I find myself still looking at the

lineside of the railway when passing or on a train and see the things I have missed. There is now a lot more to add to the next layout such as the drainage runs along the line or the power cables to the signals and so on. The modern railway seems to have a lot more secondary items than I was used to modelling while helping the club members' steam and early diesel era layouts.

My fleet is being built up so I can eventually model the line that runs in the bottom of the valley near my family home in Sheffield, the route from Sheffield to Barnsley and Doncaster. Some of the formations I am looking to represent run into the old Tinsley Yard site (now the Sheffield International Rail Freight Terminal) so a little licence will be used when I do eventually build it. There are also plans to build a freight only layout based on this site, especially as





comparatively rare but Hornby has long produced the Caley 'Pug' 0-4-0ST (often known as 'Smokey Joe') as well as the Caledonian Railway '123' 4-2-2 which started life with Tri-ang. However, modern day models have been thin on the ground.

The Caledonian '812' – a distinctly Scottish machine – was commissioned by Rails of Sheffield in February 2019 with Bachmann selected as the manufacturer to produce this exciting addition to its limited edition portfolio. It models the class of 79 locomotives in a choice of original Caledonian Railway lined blue as 828, LMS black as 17566, BR black with late crests as 57566, weathered BR black with early crests as 57565 and in preserved Caledonian

Railway lined blue as 828.
The all-new model has been produced with the support of the Caledonian Railway 828
Trust and the Strathspey Railway at Aviemore in Scotland which is currently home to the solesurviving example of this Victorian era 0-6-0.

THE MODEL


For review we had the opportunity to inspect three different versions of the Rails '812' – 828 in original Caledonian Railway lined blue (Cat No. 35-280Z), 17566 in LMS black which you can also win in our latest competition as detailed on pages 10-11 (35-281Z) and 57565 in BR black with a weathered finish (35-282Z). All versions of

the '812' are available DCC ready with a Next18 decoder socket and factory fitted 15mm x 11mm cube speaker or DCC sound fitted from the factory with an ESU LokSound V5 chip installed. The prices are £179.95 DCC ready and £279.95 DCC sound fitted (£199.95 and £299.95 respectively for the Caledonian blue examples). The external details of these

0-6-0s are superb and capture the charming looks of the prototypes well. The high pitched boiler reveals motion detail below while there are also correctly formed splashers over the driving wheels, separately fitted lamp irons, separately fitted handrails and correct chimney and dome arrangements. Importantly there is lots of fine detail on these

locomotives including door hinges, rivet patterns, boiler bands and more. It all adds up to a comprehensively detailed model. While there are many standard components between the models there are also detailed differences including the safety valve type between the Caledonian and later LMS/BR period locomotives, smokebox door dart, buffer beam



pipe options and also locomotives with and without air brake pumps. There are also two different tender bodies with 57565 being paired with a tender which has an additional panel along the lower third of the tank.

When it comes to decoration Rails has the benefit of Bachmann's expertise in this area. Each has been well researched and prepared, particularly the Caledonian blue version which is quite simply stunning. Highlights of this include outstanding lining on the buffer beam, buffer shanks, boiler, frame, cabside, cab front and tender plus silvered buffers and the internal motion picked out in red which stands out against the blue and maroon base colours.

The other two sample locomotives may have more basic liveries, but they have still been done well. The LMS black version has consistent paint application and is enhanced with red buffer beams and valve gear while the

lettering and numbers are superb. The weathered version offers a typical all over grime finish which is pleasing to the eye, but lacks some of the detail you would get with a custom finish. However, it could easily be enhanced with a little work at home.

Al three locomotives have a fully detailed and painted cab interior right down to the gauge faces making it ripe for addition of a crew on the open backed footplate.

PERFORMANCE

The Caledonian '812s' have a coreless motor for propulsion which drives the centre driving axle. We tested the models with both analogue and digital control which affirmed the value for slow speed control available with the latter with digital providing a more refined start and stop than analogue.

Throughout the speed range our samples ran smoothly and quietly and also handled an eight coach

rake of Hornby BR Mk 1 carriages comfortably on our level test track. Points and crossings were also negotiated faultlessly with the locomotives offering a consistent back-to-back measurement.

For digital users there is a Next18 decoder socket positioned inside the locomotive in the firebox area which is simple to access with the removal of two body fixing screws – one at the front, one at the rear. There is also a factory fitted 15mm x 11mm cube speaker in the firebox area in all models to provide simple plug and play sound upgrades. In addition there is a firebox glow which operates permanently with analogue and can be controlled through function buttons on DCC.

The sound fitted sample provided a good set of sounds, though they were a little quiet for our tastes due in part to the depth of the baffle to the speaker and the main exhaust sounded a little thin. Nevertheless, all the sounds were complementary to each other in volume with excellent whistles, coal shovelling sounds (which also operate the firebox glow), active brakes on F2, heavy and light load simulations with the exhaust sound, injector, handbrake, guard's whistle and driver response and more. It's a very enjoyable locomotive to operate, even at its lower volume.






The Caledonian 5

Functional and workmanlike goods engines were very much a feature of the late Victorian railway scene, but few matched the beauty and level of performance of the Caledonian Railway's '812' 0-6-0s, a real maid of all work, as **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** explains.

Like many locomotives of its period it employed a medium-sized boiler working at a modest pressure, in this case 150psi, and relatively small cylinders and had a limited power output as a result. Notwithstanding that, it was generally well laid out for the time and was reliable and economical.

In 1895 John Farquharson McIntosh was appointed Locomotive Superintendent of the Caledonian Railway. He had risen through the ranks, starting work on the footplate in 1860 but changing careers seven years later after losing a hand in an accident. Before this promotion, he was Locomotive Inspector for the company

and had also served as a shedmaster and chief inspector. As might have been expected given his employment history, he did not immediately make any major changes to the company's locomotive fleet, but he knew many of the engines then employed would soon need replacing with something rather better.



INCREMENTAL CHANGES

His early work focussed on improving existing designs, and he turned out the smaller '709' 0-6-0 and the '19' and '439' class 0-4-4Ts as well as several other types, all of which contained minor improvements over the originals. However, in 1896 he produced the first of his famous 'Dunalastair' 4-4-0s, which although based on an earlier Drummond engine were fitted with a huge boiler working at 160psi which was also fitted with additional tubes allowing it to be a prodigious raiser of steam. These engines eliminated the need to double-head many express services and became greatly influential in steam engine design practice, with elements of the 'Dunalastair' being adopted by many other railways.

Three years later, he began to apply the same principles to the design of goods engines and work began to upgrade the '294' class by fitting it with a 'Dunalastair' style boiler and by increasing the size of the cylinders. The new goods engine, which became the '812' class, also used the improved cab from its passenger cousin, although this was six inches shorter than that previously used.

As the design was considered to be a development of an existing one and the requirement for locomotives was urgent, the company placed an order for production straight off the drawing board. Such was the need that some had to be built by outside contractors, with Neilson

Reid supplying 20, Sharp Stewart 15 and Dubs and Co a further 15. The balance of 46 were built at St Rollox Works in two batches, and in total 79 engines were constructed in only two years. Neilson Reid was contracted to supply four engines a month, while Sharp Stewart was to build no less than eight, such was the hurry.

There were very few differences between the batches, however the first 17 were fitted with Westinghouse train air brake equipment and train heating pipes as the original intention had been that the locomotives would be designated as mixed traffic.

In service the class proved itself worthy of this designation and was easily capable of running at 55mph, meaning that throughout their lives they would turn up on excursion trains, while some were also used to work the Clyde Coast boat trains. Most of the class was used on the intended goods traffic, and they were seen all over the Caledonian system.

Later, in 1908-1909, another batch of 17 locomotives was built to the same basic specification, although there were minor differences to the cab, the frames were strengthened and laminated springs were substituted on the driving axle for the earlier coil springs. These were designated '652' class. Of interest is that the Belgian State Railways copied the '812' design, producing three classes of basically similar engines between 1899 and 1914.





INTO SERVICE

Initial passenger duties included boat trains to Gourock and Wemyss Bay from Glasgow Central, with this work lasting until about 1906, while some also worked passenger turns around Perth and Dundee. Most of the others were employed on medium to long distance goods trains with the class predominant on coal trains originating from the Lanarkshire coalfields. Some engines were also employed on fast fish trains and this led to examples being equipped with vacuum ejectors and through pipes to enable them to work fitted goods trains.

As built, the first 17 Westinghouse-fitted engines were turned out in Caledonian blue livery, while the rest of the class was lined black, but following the grouping of 1923 all engines were painted unlined black and remained so for the rest of their lives. The air brake equipment was removed in LMS days and instead some engines were fitted with vacuum brakes, while there were minor changes in appearance with the original safety valves being replaced, some receiving a flatter dome and others being fitted with an LMS-pattern boiler. As built all had 3,000 gallon six-wheel tenders but during the 1940s some were given 3,570 gallon versions from scrapped 4-4-0s, with the originals being cascaded to older '294' class engines.

There was very little change in the work performed by the '812s' under the Caledonian Railway but following the 1923 Grouping and later nationalisation, these engines began to operate in a wider area, with many being used on the Glasgow and South Western section as well as the Highland lines, but the class could be found in many locations in Scotland prior to their eventual withdrawal.



DECLINE AND SALVATION

The class remained intact until 1946 when 17598 and 17610 were taken out of service and they were joined by 17567 the following year, although this had been damaged in an accident at Leith and was not repaired.

The remaining 76 survived into British Railways ownership and were renumbered by replacing the 17XXX series numbers with 57XXX identities, with gaps where locomotives had been withdrawn.

There were three more withdrawals in 1947 and two more in 1949 with only a handful more until 1959 when five more were taken out of service. The biggest number withdrawn in any one year was 27 in 1962 and the class was rendered extinct in 1963 when the last 10 were laid aside. By this time every engine in the class had achieved more than one million


miles in service with the largest mileage recorded being of first-built 812, which had amassed 1,574,248 miles.

Fortunately the Caledonian Railway Trust identified the '812' as one of the classes that should be preserved and it was successful in obtaining 57566, the former 828 of the Caledonian Railway, when it was withdrawn from Ardrossan

shed in August 1963.

The locomotive was initially stored but in 1966 it was taken to Cowlairs works where it was brought up to display condition and then was moved to the former Glasgow Museum of Transport, where it was on show for 14 years. In 1980, it was extracted from the museum and moved to the Strathspey Railway in Aviemore where work started to return it to working order, with this being achieved in 1992. Since then and carrying Caledonian Railway blue livery, it has been a regular performer at the Strathspey and has also visited a



number of other preserved railways for gala appearances.

In 2022 the locomotive is undergoing a ten-year overhaul, its boiler ticket having expired in 2021, but it is hoped that this will not be a prolonged affair and that this locomotive will be soon back hauling tourist trains once again in Scotland.

The '812' class was a classic Victorian

goods engine, being powerful and free running, and its basic layout paved the way for many other designs that followed it. We are fortunate that there is one example of this famous class for us to see today, and that we have, at last, a model of this locomotive to enjoy almost 60 years since the last real one was in main line service.



Bachmann renews its CLASS 20

The Class 20 was one of the first main line production diesel locomotives when it entered service in 1957 and now Bachmann has gone back to the drawing board to offer a present day version of this long-standing workhorse for 'OO'. **MIKE WILD** takes a closer look.

However, it has now been 16 years since Bachmann paid full attention to its Class 20 which was in need of a refresh to meet modern standards and expectations. The 2004 version had received 8-pin

and then 21-pin decoder socket upgrades as well as provision for a speaker, but there was no lighting and the body tooling left scope for Bachmann to introduce the latest

Bachmann's Spring 2021 British Model Railway Announcements revealed the manufacturer's plans to release an all-new version of the original Class 20/0 in both disc headcode and centre headcode formats. It's been a little longer in coming than anticipated at its announcement, mainly due to global events, but all three versions are now here and ready for inspection – our sample being D8015 in original BR green livery

(Cat No. 35-351). The green example is being joined by 20057 in BR blue (35-355) and 20227 in Railfreight red stripe grey (35-357). All three are available DCC ready and DCC sound fitted.

First though a little history. The first of the English Electric built locomotives were completed to a Pilot Scheme order in 1957 and in total 228 were completed by EE at Vulcan Foundry and by Robert Stephenson Hawthorn. D8000-D8128 were built with folding headcode discs while D8129-D8327 were built from new

with four-character headcode boxes giving two distinctive front end layouts to the Class 20/0. In service the 1,000hp Type 1s were generally used for freight work, but their single cab and low power soon found them being used in pairs nose to nose in multiple which allowed them to haul heavier trains with better vision for crews. In the BR blue era they were synonymous with merry-go-round coal trains formed of

recent times they have continued

as in preservation on a variety of duties including nuclear trains, stock movements, stone trains and more.


THE MODEL

Bachmann's all-new Class 20/0 builds on the success of its late 2020 released DRS Class 20/3 (HM164) – an eagerly awaited model of a sub-class which had never been tackled in ready-to-run form before. However, the only common parts are the mechanism as electronics are different to work with the different lighting pattern of the Class 20/0 while the body tooling correctly reflects

the original locomotives and the differences from the overhauled Class 20/3s.

Presentation of our BR green liveried sample was nothing short of excellent. The green, grey and black base colours were all neatly applied with neat edges while highlights include classic red bufferbeams, silver painted bufferheads and shanks, neatly printed BR crests and cabside numbers plus pipework picked out in white on the bogies.

Inside the cab interior is superbly detailed, right down to the handles on the electrical cabinets above the control desk, while both driving

positions have a full complement of gauges and handles with a painted finish over the moulded parts. Cab lighting is also fitted as standard and, correctly for a 1960s period locomotive, this has a soft yellow colour to it to represent incandescent bulbs.

Detailing of the locomotive continues to the same high standard with correct shaped window apertures for the original locomotives, raised cab roof vents and horn grilles moulded at the top. The plastic windscreen wipers are a little heavy for our liking when compared with the rest of the model, but the good work continues on the lower cab front where you will find separately fitted handrails, sockets to push in headcode discs from the accessory pack and a full set of six working lamps too – four headcode lamps

with a warm yellow glow and two red tail lights.

The bodyside 'cupboard' doors are all modelled correctly together with the engine roof grilles while the roof features finely moulded exhaust ports together with hatch detail and an etched metal grille over the roof fan. At the nose end one side has a ladder to the roof, as per the Pilot Scheme locomotives, while there are also separately fitted metal handrails, lamp irons on the nose end and grab handles above the steps at each side.

PERFORMANCE

Having enjoyed both testing and running examples of the new Bachmann Class 20/3 we were looking forward to and expecting high performance from the new Class 20/0 since it shares the same mechanism. Happily our sample did not disappoint – quite the opposite – as straight from the box

D8015 ran smoothly and quietly in both directions on both a rolling road and on Peco code 75 track.

The chassis proved capable of negotiating a range of pointwork including medium and large radius straight points as well as curved points, diamond crossings and a three-way. Haulage capacity was ample with our sample Class 20 hauling a 30 wagon four-wheel goods comfortably and being equally at home with a set of eight Mk 1 carriages in tow.

The electrical specification makes the Class 20 a simple project to convert to sound as there is a factory fitted 15mm x 11mm cube speaker and a PLUX22 decoder socket meaning that all you need is a sound decoder of your choice to make the upgrade. The speaker isn't quite as powerful as we would like, but there are choices on the market to upgrade it for better sound output should you wish.


The lighting installed operated consistently on analogue control on receiving power and looks

superb passing through the headcode discs once they are installed. In addition, for analogue modellers there is the option to configure the lights manually using the bank of hidden switches in the removable air tank moulding at the centre of the underframe.

OVERALL

The Class 20 is one of the alltime classics of the diesel era. Its single cab design makes it stand out from the crowd and while it might not have the glamour of a 'Deltic' or 'Western', it is an essential locomotive which can be used in many main line and branch line situations.

Bachmann's decision to go back to the drawing board with these English Electric Type 1s is excellent news and serves up a highly detailed well thought out locomotive which builds on the new Sulzer Type 2 (Class 24) from HM170 and the Brush Type 4 (Class 47) from HM174.

ORNBY'S Hitachi Class 800/2 has finally landed in LNER'Azuma' livery. First announced in the Hornby 2019 range with an expected release date of July 2019, despite the delays, it looks set to be a welcome arrival for many modern image modellers.

The train pack from Hornby (Cat No. R3762) contains a power car, trailer car and an additional three coaches forming a prototypical five-car set modelling 800201 and comprising PDTRBF 815201, MS 812201, MS 813201, MC 814201 and PDTS 811201.

The real thing was built in 2018 by Hitachi at its factories in Kasado, Japan, and Newton Aycliffe. It entered revenue-earning service that year after time on the UK rail network on test in an unbranded livery. The five car 800/2 units boast an impressive 2,250 horsepower and a maximum speed of 125mph under diesel power via their three 750HP MTU 12V 1600 R80L engines. They, along with the nine-car Class 800/1 trains were part of the Intercity Express Programme (IEP) fleet and built to replace the ageing Class 43s and 91s services on the East Coast Main Line.

and the model doesn't disappoint. Other details include separately fitted windscreen wipers, directional LED lighting, disc brakes fitted to the wheels plus fine moulded detail on the roofs, bogies and bodyside mouldings.

One of the power cars is fitted with a centre mounted motor with drive shafts to both bogies. Power and trailer cars are DCC ready and will require an 8-pin DCC decoder each while the trailer car will need CV changes as detailed in the instructions with the model.

The pantographs are poseable, if a little delicate. Once in position Hornby has paid particular attention to passenger lighting with each window having its own LED to offer an equal soft yellow light being emitted from each window.

Admittedly there are some small areas of compromise. The roof fans are moulded (not that you'd tell without looking at the right angle) and the thin plastic around the gaps on the cab doors do suffer from light bleed which could be fixed with a little black paint added to the inside.

of an imitation Dellner coupling behind the nose cone in a NEM pocket with the option to swap it for standard tension locks, Kadee or magnetic coupling, allowing you to join multiple Class 800 sets together. This socket is fixed, however, so careful selection of couplings will be required for tighter radius track.

The coaches sit closely together which has fast become the coach version of sprung buffers on locomotives. The power and driving cars are simple to add

a DCC decoder or DCC sound with space being provided in the underframes behind three accessible screws.

Since first being announced in 2019, the Class 800/2 has had a price increase and now costs £477.99. So, is the model worth it? It is a detailed, well thought through model of a train which on the East Coast Main Line has

proved popular with passengers. With Hornby's forthcoming Class 91, it offers the chance to model the ECML's most recent transition era alongside that and High Speed Trains as well as the present-day scene. steam era. In the 1970s BR started building new bogie steel wagons for the movement of strip and coil loads including a fleet of more than 500 BBA flat wagons.

Ashford Works built these wagons between 1973 and 1981, but demand for dedicated steel coil transport saw 250 of the fleet modified in 1994-1995 to feature coil boxes which saw them recoded as BLA. The BLA is being offered in original black with red cradles and BR brown in the main production run while an exclusive edition for KMS Railtech sees the wagon offered in EWS maroon and gold. Rails of Sheffield also has another pair of exclusive BLA models, this time in original black and red with Railfreight logos and a unique numbered plain brown wagon.

edition which has all the hallmarks of the BLA following conversion from BBA flats. The ends are gone together with the deck floor which is replaced by the trio of coil boxes positioned along the length of the wagon. These accurately represent the real vehicles and impressively the Cavalex chassis detail can now be seen in full, as the BLA reveals all the pipework and framing underneath.


The detail on these wagons really is exquisite with full brake pipe runs in the chassis, correct frame shaping and wonderfully detailed bogies which go so far that they

model the disc brakes on both sides of each wheel as well as the calipers around them. Exceptional. The turned metal wheels run freely on their pinpoint axles while the die-cast construction of the chassis gives them a nicely balanced

Sprung buffers are fitted at all four corners – one was a little loose on our sample, but an easy fix - while the accessory pack includes a full set of buffer beam details which can be used where suitable. Small

Accurascale's OPPER

Coal, biomass and aggregates hoppers from the HYA and **IIA** wagons fleets are arriving from Accurascale in February offering a new choice of modern freight wagon. **MIKE WILD** explores their value.

E love a block train of matching wagons and the modern railway has bulk trains by the bucket load. Not only do long rakes of wagons look good on the real railway, when they are turned into models they can also look spectacular snaking through a miniature landscape. In these new models of the HYA and IIA bogie hoppers, Accurascale has really brought the potential of the block train to the fore.

Since the arrival of its first HUO hopper wagons in 2019 it has continued to raise the bar in detail and printing while also offering collections of wagons to recreate real trains like the PTA tippler family, JSA steel wagons, PFA container flats and, more recently, the 21ton mineral wagons (HM175).


Brand new and on our review desk this month is an impressive collection of HYA and IIA high capacity bogie hoppers modelling the original full length HYA/IIA coal wagons, cut down HYA aggregates

unpainted steel bodied wagons were completed in 2007 with 368 built over the next four years by IRS in Romania and WH Davis in the UK. They were originally designed for coal traffic with GB Railfreight and then Fastline Freight - the latter's wagons having since passed

HYA/IIA wagons could only be part-loaded, which lead to leasing company VTG ordering rebuilds by removing the centre bay of the hoppers. The first was completed in February 2016 and almost half of the fleet, using the Romanian built wagons, has now been rebuilt into shortened form for service with wagon leasing companies VTG, Touax and Nacco.

The shortened HYAs are now hauled by Class 66/7s from GBRf on aggregate traffic from Bardon Hill, Coton Hill and Grain for Aggregate Industries, for Cemex from Peak Forest and for Tarmac from Arcow and Rylstone.

THE MODELS

Even though the oldest HYA wagons are only 15 years old, they have led an eventful life through modifications, rebranding and rebuilding, and Accurascale is modelling all three of the main build types for these wagons.

Each vehicle type is being offered in a twin pack of individually numbered vehicles. There are seven HYA/IIA coal wagon packs, four IIA biomass wagon packs and seven cut-down HYA aggregate

collection of wagons showcasing all the livery options available on the vehicles. The HYA/IIA coal wagon is being released with GBRf, Fastline and Touax branding and the liveries have an astonishing level of detail to replicate one of the most distinctive features of these wagons - their weld lines. In total there are more than 150. separate tampo prints on each side of each of the full length HYA/ IIA wagons to replicate the colour scheme. This goes from the weld lines to the logos, TOPS codes, data panels, warning labels and hopper labelling. Incredibly, there are 25 separate prints on each bogie, such is the attention to detail.

Detail extends well beyond printed matter though as Accurascale has replicated the external, internal and underframe parts of these wagons superbly including full depth hopper bays, separately fitted conduits, handles, brake wheels, lamp irons and hopper mechanism parts.

The bodyshell replicates the real vehicles superbly while the low track force TF25 bogies are neatly and accurately moulded too.

The biomass IIAs build on the detail of the coal wagons and four packs are offered in matching GBRf livery with individual numbers. They are the same full length as the coal wagons, measuring 241mm over buffers, but there are differences, the most obvious of which is the cover panel. More subtle is the change of the end rib pattern as these vehicles have fewer ribs in the end panels as per the prototypes.

Like the coal wagons, the IIAs are superbly finished with printed detail and model the unpainted steel finish of the real wagons superbly with extensive tampo printing of the weld lines, markings, logos and more.

Moving on to the cut-down HYAs, Accurascale's attention to detail

continues. This time they have the correct base colour for the leasing company with the VTG and Touax versions having black lower bodies and grey painted uppers while the Nacco examples show an altogether more rudimentary conversion – which we rather like – with the original weld lines still showing together with part of the GBRf lettering remaining from the original full length wagons. Livery choices cover VTG/Tarmac, Touax/Cemex and Nacco.

Like the full length open coal wagons, the cut-down HYAs have full depth hopper bays, though only two this time, plus a fully detailed underframe and bogies to match the standard of the coal versions. In addition, the joining lines from the cutting process are

was cut at a different place to the chassis and upper edges.

While each wagon type has significant differences, there are standard components too. All ride on turned metal wheelsets while there are NEM coupling pockets on body mounted kinematic mounts at each end fitted with small tension lock couplings as standard. Sprung buffers are also fitted at all four corners while every pack

comes with a full set of buffer beam parts in the accessory pack.

To add a finishing touch a working end of train lamp is factory fitted on Pack One of each vehicle type and colour scheme so you can add a proper finish to a block train of these wagons. It is powered from a pair of LR41 batteries (not included) and can be turned on and off with a magnetic switch.

OVERALL

Accurascale's new HYA/IIA wagons are a fantastic addition to its range and one which modern era modellers will find hard to resist. The details of the bodies and the exceptional level of printed finish makes these amongst the best we have seen for review – plus there is the opportunity to purchase a full rake of wagons, even down

to a working tail lamp - all with individual numbers which is excellent news.

The £74.95 price tag on each twin pack offers good value for what you get and we can see these being deservedly popular additions. Now all we need to do is build up our GBRf Class 60 and 66 fleet to haul them. (MW)

APOL'S long-awaited 'O' gauge BR 12ton Vanwide ventilated box van is finally here, adding a new wagon to the manufacturer's portfolio.

Almost 2,000 Vanwides were built at British Railways' Works in Derby and Wolverton in the early 1960s. They were constructed from plywood and corrugated metal and featured flush sliding doors, offering an impressive 9ft wide loading space.

In the late 1970s, 550 were refurbished with air brakes, improved suspension and roller bearing axle boxes for use on BR's Speedlink and Ministry of Defence (MOD) services, their short wheelbase proving particularly useful at some military establishments where sharp curvatures and limited clearances precluded the use of longer, more modern vehicles

Most were withdrawn from revenue service by the mid-1990s,






although some gained further employment as internal user wagons at MoD bases while a few were saved for preservation.

Dapol first revealed its intention to produce 'O' gauge models of these ubiquitous wagons in 2012 and after a lengthy period of development, the wait is finally over.

For review, we received examples

brown or VEAs in Railfreight red and grey.

Straight from the box, each of our samples tipped the scales at 138g and appear outwardly similar, with a neatly moulded bodyshell and removable grey roof allied to a 10ft wheelbase chassis. They also feature separately fitted bodyside metal grab handles, lamp irons and sprung metal buffers. Much of the remaining detail is moulded such as door chains, locking bars (with padlocks!), bodyside bracing, door runners and impressive corrugated

ends with vents.

However, it is underneath where many of the detail differences appear with the Vanwide featuring vacuum brake equipment, vacuum pipes and original spring suspension and axle boxes, while the VEA features more extensive air brake equipment underneath with neatly moulded cylinders and pipework, together with revised suspension, roller bearing axle boxes and buffer beam air pipes.

Decoration to our review samples was excellent with an evenly-

applied BR freight brown paint finish, grey roof and crisp, legible labelling and numbering, including realistic-looking stencilled VMV TOPS code to the Vanwide and neatly applied Railfreight lettering to the VEA bodyside capturing the realistic appearance either side of the moulded locking bar.

The well-appointed compensated chassis is fitted with metal three-hole disc wheels and brass bearings, together with brake shoes in line with the wheels and separate handbrake levers. Close

inspection of the buffer beam reveals Instanter style couplings on the Vanwide, while the VEA van features screw couplings. When coupled together the Instanter couplings provided commendably close coupling, while the screw type on our sample offered just a touch more slack between vehicles.

They may have been almost a decade in the making, but the wait has certainly been worth it and these latest additions to the Dapol 'O' gauge roster are sure to prove popular. (MC)

ODERN ERA FREIGHT modellers are being treated to some exciting new releases at the moment and Revolution Trains has a series of new vehicles in progress including the Ecofret two and three wagon container flats, IPA car carriers and – arriving at the very end of December – the IWA Sfins2 holdall vans.

These impressive bogie ferry vans were introduced in 1987 with 160 being built by the Waggon Union for operation by Cargowaggon GMbH and Norsk Hydro on the British railway network. They are classified IWA under the BR TOPS coding system and Sfins2 in the UIC international code system. Their use included fertiliser traffic from Immingham to the Midlands, Scotland and South Wales for Norsk Hydro while the Cargowaggon vehicles were used for block trains of steel, bottled water and newsprint. They could also be found in mixed formations.

Today the Sfins2 holdall vans are still in service in two formats.
Those still in original condition are used for aluminium trains from


Ditton Foundry near Warrington to Nievenheim in Germany while 30 have been converted into timber carriers by removing the hoods. Interestingly the hoods on the real vehicles can be raised and slid over each other by using the end hand wheels.

For review we had the opportunity to inspect a pair of Cargowaggon liveried IWA vans. In total there are five twin packs available – two in Cargowaggon branded silver, two in Norsk Hydro branded silver and a final unbranded set. In addition there

are four twin packs of timber wagons available, all priced at £95.50 per pair.

Revolution Trains has delivered these wagons in a smartly presented flip top box with line drawings of the IWA on the outside together with information and pictures of the wagons in service on the inside. A plastic blister pack holds the two wagons firmly in place inside a foam frame while underneath is an instruction sheet with prototype notes plus a pack of optional brake pipes.

Standard features cover turned





metal free running wheels, kinematic close coupling mechanisms at each end supporting NEM coupling pockets at the correct height and standard small tension couplings.

Each wagon features unique

running numbers while the standard of decoration across these vans is excellent. Like all internationally registered freight wagons the data panels are complex and Revolution has done an excellent job of

gathering the information and creating the artwork for them. The Cargowaggon branding is also superbly reproduced while the base colours match that of the prototypes superbly.

The moulding of the wagons is also very well done with attention to the details of the shape of the van body and underframe plus separately fitted brake pipes as individual components under the floor. Even the handbrake wheels have a full width bar between them which links to the braking mechanism. These are big wagons

too, measuring 271mm over huffers

As a manufacturer which started out in 'N' gauge it is pleasing to see Revolution Trains show its capabilities in 'OO' gauge too. Having seen the IWA wagons we are eagerly looking forward to its next freight stock releases in the coming months.

The IWA is a great choice and will be equally at home in block formations as it will in mixed trains making these excellent additions which will suit a wide variety of layouts. (MW)

3D SLUDGE GULPER AND CHERRY PICKERS



EST HILL WAGON Works' range of 3D-printed scenic accessories includes an impressive range of depot and engineers' equipment including these detailed access platforms and a drainage vacuum tank – or sludge gulper!

As we have come to expect from

modern printing techniques, these items are neatly formed with a good amount of detail. The 'cherry pickers' feature fine handrails, representation of the extending sections, a ladder and wheels – even the control handle is modelled. However, the handrails on our review samples did display slight warping once the supports

had been removed.

The sludge gulper was utilised to clear any residue from drains that had built up at depots following the cleaning of diesel locomotives. It could also be used at other sites where drains needed clearing and could be transported by open wagon. Detailing to our sample was very good with nicely captured

pipework, boom, tank and small parts.

Supplied as a twin-pack, the 'cherry pickers' measure 28mm x 30mm x 12.5mm, while the drainage vacuum tank is offered singly and measures 53mm x 32mm x 17mm.

Well detailed items which are sure to add extra character to traction maintenance depot scenes. (MC)

Scale Model Scenery's extensive range of laser-cut kits and accessories includes these useful packs of weathered roof slates and terracotta tiles.

Both packs contains one A4 pre-coloured and weathered laser-cut sheet of tiles, ready to cut out and secure in place on buildings. Each sheet features 25 280mm strips of tiles or slates, plus three 280mm strips of ridge examples. Look closer and you'll notice that the main tiles and slates are pre-cut while the ridge versions are pre-scored. Extra-

wide items are also included at the ends of the main strips.

Detailing is very good with a realistic appearance, capturing the general build-up of algae, moss and the like. To remove from the fine card fret, simply cut through the tiny securing tabs which hold each strip in place, then cut to the length required.

Given most model buildings are viewed from above, these sheets should add an extra layer of realism for that finishing touch to the most visible part of a structure. (MC)








RITISH RAIL'S OPERATIONS IN northern Britain through the late 1970s and early 1980s are the focus of this recent book from Amberley Publishing, with plenty of BR blue diesel and electric traction on view.

The volume opens with an introduction from the author comparing today's infrastructure with that of the past. Images take us on a journey from Liverpool Lime Street and along the Trans-Pennine route to York via Manchester, Sheffield and Leeds. Further locations covered include Keighley, Skipton, Blackburn, Preston, Carlisle and onwards to Scotland, via the West Coast Main Line.

Once north of the border, there are views of typically Scottish BR blue traction including classes 20, 26, 27 and 37, with routes covered extending to Mallaig, Kyle of Lochalsh, Wick and Thurso.

Throughout, there is a good mix of passenger and freight featured, together with light engine and on-shed shots too. A veritable feast of BR blue traction is featured including classes 08, 20, 25, 26, 27, 31, 37, 40, 45, 46, 47, 55 and 56 – while electric locomotives include classes 81, 83, 85, 86 and 87. A handful of DMUs are also featured.

Whilst liveries are primarily plain blue, there are a few anomalies including a Class 37 with wraparound yellow ends – a taster of what was to develop into a later widespread colour scheme.

Reproduction is generally very good with predominantly colour images throughout there are a few black and white photographs for added variety. An enjoyable reminder of BR's once prevalent corporate image. (MC)

HIS RECENT PICTURE VOLUME from Key Books focuses on British Rail's popular English Electric Type 3s in later years.
Amazingly, some 60 years since they were first introduced, examples of these everyday workhorses still ply Network Rail metals today, in a raft of colourful liveries.

The author has split the book into chapters covering their use on typical passenger and freight duties, railtours, test trains, heritage lines and even a small section on inspection saloon duties.

As you might expect, there is plenty of variety throughout the book, including a few 1980s shots of BR large logo blue, Railfreight 'red stripe' and Railfreight Sector examples, 1990s images of 'Dutch', Regional Railways and InterCity Mainline schemes, as well as the emerging Loadhaul, Mainline and Transrail branded freight colour schemes.

However, it is the later era liveries that dominate - from EWS maroon and gold to the ornate Rail Operations Group (ROG) livery providing plenty of research material for modellers wishing to replicate some of the various colour schemes carried over the years (as well as the formations), from ex-Works condition through to positively 'distressed'.

Image reproduction is excellent throughout with crisp, clear detail, while captions are well-written and informative with dates, train working details and more.

From typical day-to-day duties in the West Highlands to head-turning runs along the Weymouth Quay tramway, Network Rail test train operation and even hauling a pair of Bulleid 'Pacifics', plus 'M7' 0-4-4T, 'Queen Mary' brake van and a BR Mk 1 support carriage through the New Forest, there is much to enjoy in this volume. Subsequently dubbed 'Wessex Electrics', the author has compiled a super collection of images of the 24 class members in operation through the years.






The final section of the book features a selection of locomotive-hauled movements on crew training, overhaul and storage moves.

F YOU HAVE EVER WONDERED HOW a steam locomotive works, then this book should provide the necessary insight. In this updated edition, Dominic Wells guides the reader through the basics of a steam locomotive before opening out into specifics covering the principles of water management, boiler fittings and combustion, as well as outlining the various types of steam locomotives, wheel configurations, cylinders, valve gear and much more.

Further topics cover coal and oil firing, gauge glasses, control valves, the lubrication of moving parts, inspections, preparation and lighting up – even the different shapes of firebox are explained. As you might imagine, the controls, driving techniques and braking are explained, with air brake and vacuum brake systems outlined in detail.

Rounding off the book, disposal duties are covered while a useful fault finding guide is also included, explaining some of the more common issues and how to remedy them.

If after reading through you are inspired to get involved with full size locomotives, there is also a chapter explaining how to do just that and the options available to you.

Whether you are interested in driving the real thing or just looking to understand the main principles, this beautifully illustrated book will provide all the elements necessary leading to a greater understanding of steam locomotives and their operation, through diagrams, crisply reproduced photographs and easy-to-follow text.

One thing's for sure, you are bound to adopt new driving techniques for your model locomotives having read this book.

OR MODELLERS LOOKING TO ADD electronic enhancements to a layout or diorama, this recent publication from Brimal Components should fit the bill. It is packed with more than 50 projects ranging from wiring Light Emitting Diodes (LEDs) and switches to more complex setups covering automatic reverse loops, occupancy detectors and control panels. Each project is accompanied with easy-to-follow text, wiring diagrams and a list of the required parts.

Topics are arranged alphabetically within the index and display the relevant project number alongside. Typical tasks such as wiring point motors, double-slip crossings, live frog turnouts, reverse polarity switches, isolated sections, colour light signals and capacitor discharge units are amongst those included.

Eye-catching projects such as creating pedestrian crossings or working level crossing lights are also covered, as are electrical 'arc' flashes, welding simulators and working ground signals.

Slightly more complex tasks include installing a bus bar for digital layouts, creating anticollision crossovers, train position indicators, points position indicators, control panel wiring, automatic signals and automatic shuttle timers.

An essential aspect of these projects is wiring, and its constituent parts are explained as are the various types of wire available, current ratings, what they are suited to and the various connectors and power distribution boards available to modellers.

Whilst some of the diagrams within the guide may initially seem quite complex, the majority of projects are fairly straightforward to follow and should provide plenty of inspiration for modellers of all abilities to have a go. (MC)

HILE THERE HAS BEEN MUCH change to the rail freight scene in Scotland, there is still plenty to be positive about and this latest picture album from Key Books helps reflect this.

More than 160 photographs have been included to illustrate 40 years of change to freight operations in Scotland, with many previously unpublished images.

The book is split into six chapters covering specific areas including the main lines from Carlisle, Ayrshire, Glasgow and the Central Belt, West Highland Lines, Fife and Clackmannanshire, Stirling to Aberdeen and Inverness and beyond.

Each chapter is filled with a selection of black and white and colour photographs depicting examples of freight train operation through the years from traditional pick-up goods in the North Highlands in the early 1980s to block cement trains which still run to this day.

Freight covered includes aluminium, bottled water, cement, china clay slurry, carbon dioxide, coal, containers, grain, lime, molasses, munitions, oil, paper reels, pipes, potatoes, steel and more.

Reproduction is excellent with clear images on quality paper, while captions are well-written with details of the location, train and date.

For modellers, there is plenty to gain from its pages such as the train formations, some of which were quite short and ideal for those with limited space layouts. Track layouts may also provide inspiration for modellers wishing to recreate a prototypical location.

Another superb collection of images covering rail freight operations throughout Scotland from the 1980s to the present day. (MC)



Y INTEREST in all things Southern electric, and particularly its multiple units, made Hornby's 2010 announcement of the Class 423 4-VEP four-car unit an appealing prospect. The first entered service in 1967 when Southern Region steam hauled services were coming to an end while the last wasn't withdrawn until 2005. In total 194 four-car units were built to the design which offered a combination of open and

With the prospect of a new and upgraded 4-VEP from Hornby in 2022, **MIKE WILD** looked back at the first versions to introduce digital sound while also improving the front gangways.

With its enhanced front end, new airhorns and sound installation, this first production run Hornby 4-VEP looks the part running through Twelve Trees Junction.



compartment seating, multiple doors for quick unloading and boarding at stations and a maximum design speed of 90mph to allow them to make quick progress between stations. They were designed for semi-fast work and the first were employed on the London Waterloo-Bournemouth corridor.

In model form the idea of a 4-VEP ready-to-run seemed unthinkable until the arrival of Hornby's 2010 catalogue which held the promise of these instantly recognisable

units. However, the first issue of the 4-VEP had its faults including the position of the cab front vestibule door which was inset too far into the gangway as well as missing the windows from the internal compartment side in the driving cars. However, the 4-VEP had the potential to play an important part in the late 1960s period Electric Multiple Unit (EMU) roster for our Southern Region exhibition layout Twelve Trees Junction so we fancied the opportunity to upgrade it

to feature digital sound while improving the front end layout.

The sound decoder chosen for this model is an ESU LokSound chip loaded with Legomanbiffo's sound profile for the Class 423 4-VEP – the same sound profile is available for the most recent LokSound V5 chip. It came paired with a standard 40mm x 20mm speaker - with our project decoder being an earlier V4 chip - which we upgraded to a more capable bass enhanced design.

The actual sound installation is straightforward once you have removed the body. There is space in the guard's compartment for the speaker and decoder which plugs into an 8-pin socket in the roof. Hornby's new batch of 2022 4-VEPs (HM176) will have a 21-pin decoder socket instead as well as new tooling for the cab fronts, so this installation guide relates to the first and second production runs of the 4-VEP which have seen the unit released in BR blue with full yellow ends as 7756 (Cat No. R2946), as 3588 in Network SouthEast colours (R2947) - both 2011 releases - and as 7830 in BR blue and grey livery (R3143) which arrived in 2015.

Externally there are a number of areas which could be improved on the 4-VEP including the cab window apertures, but we decided to focus on the 'big one' - the gangway door position. The Hornby gangway is a clip in plastic moulding which makes it a two-second job to remove. We considered using MJT whitemetal castings in place of the original plastic part which are available from Dart Castings, but then found that the spare door panels included in the Kernow Model Rail Centre 4-TC units are a perfect fit. Granted, vou need a KMRC 4-TC to be able to make the change in this way, but chances are if you have a 4-VEP you will have been tempted by the 4-TC

Having found the route forward

to improve the gangway I also decided to backdate the model to represent the first of the class which had small yellow warning panels with the BR blue colour scheme. This involved removing the glazing unit, adding a Roof Dirt base colour to the yellow front end and then airbrushing it with Lifecolor Rail Blue for the finished look. A coat of Humbrol Clear brought the colour to a near perfect match to the original Hornby finish.

As a finishing touch whitemetal air horns were added on top of each cab while unit numbers were applied from a spare sheet of coach numbers – the advantage of a spares box - to bring our early 4-VEP project to completion.

With the sound decoder installed and external improvements to the cab front our Class 423 is an enjoyable model to operate - the classic SR EMU air compressor sound is wonderfully nostalgic which has run reliably at exhibitions on Twelve Trees Junction several times and we are looking forward to the day when we can take our Southern Region layout out on







On removing the body take care as a multipin harness connects the unit lighting and roof mounted decoder socket to the chassis.



We had already fitted a standard 8-pin motor control decoder to this unit. This needs to be removed prior to installation of the sound decoder.



The sound decoder for this project is an ESU LokSound chip from Legomanbiffo supplied by DC Kits. The sound profile for the Class 423 is now available on the latest generation V5 decoders. We upgraded the speaker with our decoder to a 2watt 58mm x 22mm type (upper right).






There is space for the speaker in the luggage compartment with the decoder positioned underneath the speaker. The 8-pin plug connects to the socket in the roof. This completes the sound installation, although we did discover that the luggage rack above the speaker needed to be removed to allow the body to fit back onto the chassis.

The first port of call to replace the gangway on the 4-VEP was to trial an MJT whitemetal casting from Dart Castings. This comes as part of a kit of parts for a 4-CIG/4-BIG/4-VEP front end. However, while this would create the right look, it did increase the amount of painting required and mean that the window would need moving forward.



By chance we found that the spare gangway doors from the Kernow Model Rail Centre 4-TC units fitted perfectly inside the 4-VEP gangway frame and brought the door forward to the correct position.



STEP BY STEP INSTALLING SOUND IN A HORNBY 8-PIN 4-VEP UNIT





Humphrey Road SIDINGS

What if nationalisation had never happened? That's what **NORMAN AND MEG RAVEN** set out to explore in their 1950s Southern Railway goods scene in 'OO' gauge with a distinctly chilly feel.

AYOUTS come about for a variety of reasons and acquire names based on different inspirations. This one stemmed from mulling over my collection of 'OO' gauge Southern Railway models.

Along with the railway stock was a small collection of Petite Properties' 1:76 (4mm:1ft) scale buildings. My wife, Meg is an avid dolls house collector and maker and we have a fair collection of Petite Properties buildings and accessories. This is mainly in 1:48 scale, but while Meg was spending the kids' inheritance, I bought the odd railway building.

Putting these models and the building collections together inspired the notion of a small Southern Railway goods yard, but with a slight twist. It is named after Meg's car, Humphrey, which unfortunately failed its MoT just as I started the layout build. We find that naming mechanical things generates a kind of mechanical empathy which makes them work better.

A British layout is a bit of a departure for us as we normally build overseas layouts ranging from Japanese 'N' and 'Z' through German and Bavarian 'N', Bavarian and Prussian 'HO', American 'HO', American 'On30' and German 'O' gauges. I confess to being a serial layout builder! I admire the dedication of those who can concentrate on one company or era, but my butterfly mind mitigates against this, resulting in a plethora of locations and scales.

The layout depicts a small goods yard set 'somewhere in SR territory', possibly West Sussex - but readers may have their own views on where it could be.

I had pottered away during the various lockdowns getting towards completion of the layout. I didn't have much spare time as I was quite busy as an HGV driver and in turn a key worker. In all, the layout took around five weeks to build. However, fate then dealt me a clip round the earhole in the form of an invitation to the Great Electric Train Show in October. I had possibly thought of an invite for 2022 maybe but there it was – 2021! This meant

a spurt of work to weather the stock and fit sound to the locomotives. I claim no credit for this latter task as my son Simon did all of it.


The Great Electric Train Show was the layout's first outing and it seemed to be generally well received. It was great to get back to something approaching a normal exhibition and to see both new people and those whom we hadn't encountered for a couple of years.


DARE TO BE DIFFERENT


I mentioned earlier a slight twist to the plot. We always try to offer something a bit different for exhibition managers. The most obvious difference here is that it's a snow scene. The second element is that while the layout is obviously SR it's set in the 1950s as though nationalisation had not taken place and the 'Big Four' carried on. No political statement is being made: this was simply an opportunity to have something a little out of the ordinary and to give a slightly different aspect to the 'what if..' concept. In my world I also postulate that private owner wagons are still around quite simply because I like them.

I have always tried, not always successfully, to build smaller layouts which Meg and I can set up and take down easily. To that end, this one measures around 10ft x 1ft 6in and comprises two scenic boards and a turntable storage yard. The scenic boards are laser cut canopy style boards from Grainge and Hodder made from 5.5mm plywood and this style is now my accepted standard. The canopy boards give a theatrical style setting to the layout where you look into rather than down on the scene. The boards form a composite unit where the backscene and 'roof' are integral. This makes storage, transport and setting up much easier and means that I'm spared the embarrassment of forgetting things like the bolts for the lighting gantry!

Alignment of the boards is by brass pattern makers dowels glued into holes already cut in the end frames. The boards are secured by M6 bolts and nuts. A leg








system is available but I make my own which are inserted into pockets in the boards. The board height is set at 4ft 4in. Lighting is by six strips of 12V LEDs stuck to the board roof. I get these and the power units from Layouts4U. I use cool white to get the correct ambience for the snow scene.

TRACK

Trackwork is Peco code 75. Once the track is painted and ballasted it looks acceptable despite the gauge and sleeper spacing discrepancies as the track is made for 'HO' scale. Points are medium radius powered by the new Peco twist lock motors which are nice and easy to install. Frog polarity is changed by frog juicers, in this case a mix of Tam Valley and Gaugemaster. Track is coloured by spraying a mix of sleeper grime from Precision Paints and Halfords grey and red oxide primers.

Ballasting uses chinchilla dust obtained

from the pet shop. This is a very fine, sandy material which domesticated chinchillas use to clean their fur. The bag cost me £5 and so far has ballasted three layouts and I reckon there's enough for about another ten, so good value for money. The ballast is prevented from dropping off the boards by judicious application of Woodland Scenics scenic cement. This is more expensive than the usual PVA mix, but I find it effective and easy to use.

POWER AND CONTROL

Digital Command Control (DCC) is used for Humphrey Road Sidings, like almost all of our other exhibition layouts, and is in the capable hands of our ESU ECoS unit. This system is relatively easy to configure and represents good value for us as it is used across all of our models. The unit is linked to an Edimax router which enables us to run trains, switch points and accessories using smartphones

and tablets through an app called Touchcab. We've been using this for over ten years and while other similar and increasingly sophisticated systems are available, Touchcab still does an effective job for us.

FIRST AIL

CLASSES

Because of the closed back nature of the canopy boards, we operate from the front. We find this makes it easier to interact with the public since the layout is not sensed as a barrier and selected individuals can be handed the phone or tablet to have a go at operating. At a basic level, youngsters can push the button to blow the whistle or horn.

SCENERY

As mentioned, the main buildings are from the Petite Properties range of laser cut kits. For the older industrial buildings I embarked on a process of laying individual bricks. This has caused the family and friends to conclude that I have finally gone over the edge!

The bricks are the old fashioned computer chads from when machines were operated on a punch card system. I obtain bags of these from Bob Dawson - an excellent architectural model maker whom we encounter at various shows.


would give any self-respecting brick layer a fit, but they look good from normal viewing distances. Most of the buildings are assembled in accordance with the instructions but some alteration goes on to give a different aspect.

The Nissen hut and platelayers' hut are Bachmann Scenecraft resin buildings and the various grounded coach and van bodies are Ratio kits. All of these were plundered from a now scrapped 'EM' gauge layout, Brucklay. Recycling is a feature of most of our layouts.


The natural scenery makes extensive use of Woodland Scenics items, mainly clump foliage and foliage clusters. This is all held down with hot glue. Trees are mainly from sea moss with a light sprinkling of green ground foam to indicate a late winter setting.

THE WHITE STUFF

We are always asked how we do the snow. I should admit straight away that while I love modelling snow scenes, I hate the









real stuff. The layout's scenery is done as normal and white acrylic paint is applied where I feel snow would naturally fall and accumulate.

The effect I go for is a relatively light snowfall so elements of the scenery continue to show rather than a complete blizzard obscuring everything. At this stage the snow effect is a little flat so I apply onto the wet paint a snow mix which catches the light. This is Woodland Scenics snow, bulked out with talcum powder and enhanced with very fine glitter dust. The latter can be obtained from craft shops or more recently the make-up counter.

Cheap hairspray keeps the snow mix attached to trees and bushes. Obtaining this results in some funny looks when this old, bald guy hoves into view asking for cans of hairspray and glitter makeup! It's a tried and tested method which I've used on previous snow layouts before the current off-the-shelf snow materials became available.

BACKSCENE

The backscene is made to convey the impression that the yard nestles in a tree lined valley. It is hand painted by myself using common old household paint and cheap acrylics applied by 1in and 2in brushes. The secret is not to over detail the scene although that's sometimes difficult to resist.

Working quickly can help and once the basic sky was set out (about 10 minutes) the distant hills and closer trees took about 45 minutes. Leave it for a day or two to see if you still like it and then resist the urge to dabble! The few buildings on the backscene are copied from old card kits and the newspaper property pages then cut out and stuck on. The important thing is to get the perspective right and ensure that the colours do not dominate.

STOCK

Stock is a mix from the usual stables and includes a Bachmann 'C' 0-6-0 and 'E4'

0-6-2T together with an EFE Rail Hunslet 'Austerity' 0-6-0ST alongside a Hornby 'M7' 0-4-4T and 'Q1' 0-6-0. Mainly I buy what takes mine and Meg's fancy and sometimes what Simon spots and brings to my attention so that my wallet can be further depleted. Strict adherents to prototype should look away now.

All locomotives are sound fitted and the layout has ambient sound such as birdsong.

One advantage of the 'what if..' approach is that the limits on vehicle types are set much further out so long as some passing relevance to company and era is maintained. All stock is weathered to different degrees using acrylic paint applied by brush and appropriately coloured eye make-up.

OPERATION

The track plan incorporates a run-round loop and sidings so basic operation is trains arriving, shunting and departing. I fancy making up a schedule of train moves although Meg will need some persuading as she favours, shall we say, a more relaxed interpretation.

All stock is fitted with Kadee magnetic couplers giving (on a good day!) hands free operation.

Once uncoupled, the free wagons can be left or propelled to the desired location. The couplers then centre again, ready for coupling up.

AT THE END

That then is a quick skim over the layout. If you see us at any exhibition please come and chat. If any exhibition managers are interested we'll travel anywhere people cry out for entertaining layouts.

So far, with our various layouts, we've been to the north of Scotland, the far south west of England, the Netherlands and Germany and many points in between. I can be contacted via the Hornby Magazine office — hornbymagazine@keypublishing.com. HM





Deltic² FINALE

London, a Saturday night 40 years ago. Hordes of fans mob the platforms at King's Cross station cheering the star of the day while thousands of cameras record the remarkable scene. The occasion is not, however, the appearance of a Hollywood film star, but the final run of one of the most popular diesels — the 'Deltics'. **EVAN GREEN-HUGHES** looks back to January 1982.

ANUARY 2 is a date which has a great deal of significance to 'Deltic' fans, because it was on that day in 1982 that the very last British Railways passenger run was made by one of their favourite locomotives. These 3,300hp monsters had revolutionised travel on the East Coast Main Line (ECML) during their 20-year service life, by their noisy high-revving two-stroke Napier engines, the unique noise from which had given these locomotives a cult following.

There has probably never before been a diesel locomotive type that has attracted so much adulation and this was borne out by the final run, The 'Deltic Scotsman Farewell', which ran from Edinburgh to London King's Cross and which was hauled by $55022\ Royal\ Scot's\ Grey$, which had once been D9000 - the first-numbered of the class. The train left Edinburgh loaded to the gunwales with enthusiasts and with the £20 tickets reputedly changing hands for more than

double their face value, so scarce had they become. As the train pulled out of Edinburgh Waverley, there was not a window or droplight that did not have at least a large part of an enthusiast hanging out of it, while along the route there were thousands of people who had turned out to give these venerable locomotives a fitting send-off.

In London, at the buffer stops, bemused police officers, much more used to dealing with disobedient football fans, attempted to shoo the crowd away from the locomotive, while those who had travelled took that last picture, obtained a rubbing from the nameplate and in some cases actually kissed and caressed the engine itself.



Railtours in the final year's of the 'Deltics' saw the class travel far off their home East Coast Main Line territory. On March 5 1978 55003 *Meld* passes the unmistakable location of Dawlish with RPPR's 'Deltic Ranger' re-run from London Paddington-Paignton. Railphotoprints.uk.

redeployed onto semi-fast passenger duties between London and York but soon these were also to move over to HSTs. Attempts were made to find other work for the class, and this included use on the Newcastle-Liverpool 'Trans-Pennine' services where they sometimes were used instead of the staple 'Peaks' but they were not as suitable for the tortuous and winding route as they had been for the long straight sections of the ECML and their use on that duty was soon discontinued.

Some work was found in Scotland where 'Deltics' could sometimes turn up on Edinburgh suburban workings substituting for DMUs and the class was also regularly seen as far north as Aberdeen with the final engine to be seen there being 55008 *The Green Howards* on December 28 1981.

ON TOUR

Perhaps the most remarkable use of a 'Deltic', and one which caught many

enthusiasts napping, was the use of 55021 Argyll and Sutherland Highlander on an advertised day excursion from Edinburgh to Oban on Sunday August 2 1981. This saw the locomotive hauling a Glasgow-Edinburgh Mk3 push-pull set complete with Mk 1 miniature buffet car, with tickets priced at a giveaway £5 each! This tour was repeated on August 23 with the same locomotive in charge, which again proved very popular.

Argyll and Sutherland Highlander found itself on a couple of other unusual

workings. On one occasion it was used to haul a Class 03 shunter from Berwick for servicing and on another it was called in to rescue a Class 37-hauled coal train that had failed on the Blyth and Tyne branch. Another unusual duty for a 'Deltic', in this case 55018 Ballymoss, was to haul a Railway Pictorial Publications Railtour (RPPR) from London Paddington to Paignton, which took place on February 19 1978, but which got no further than Bristol Temple Meads due to heavy snow in the West Country. This tour was unusual for



that period in that Mk 1 stock was used. A second attempt on March 5 1978 saw 55003 complete its journey to Paignton at the head of the RPPR 'Deltic Ranger' tour, again hauling Mk 1 coaches.

July the same year was to see 55003 Meld working over the Settle-Carlisle railway with a 'Merrymaker' excursion from Sheffield while 55002 The King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry was active on the West Coast Main Line in October 1979 when it was used for a T&N Railtours Manchester Victoria-Carlisle-Newcastle-York-Manchester excursion. 55015 Tulyar also covered new ground when it reached Lowestoft in September 1978 with a special from King's Cross.

Perhaps the most unusual event that a 'Deltic' took part in during those final years was on May 24 1980 when specially bulled-up 55015 *Tulyar* took part in the Rocket 150 celebrations at Rainhill near Liverpool, passing admiring crowds while hauling electric locomotives 86214 and 26020. The same locomotive also reached Bournemouth on October 17 1981 hauling the 'Wessex Deltic' railtour.

END IN SIGHT

Inevitably the reduced requirement for 'Deltics' meant that not all of them had a long-term future. Within a short time following the arrival of the first HST three of the class were laid up at Doncaster, these being 55001 St Paddy, 55004 Queen's Own Highlander and 55020 Nimbus and all of them had been raided for spares to keep the rest of the 22-strong fleet running. 55004 managed to survive to run again but the other two were condemned in January 1980. 55006 Fife and Forfar Yeomanry went for scrap that summer but again it provided spares to keep the others going, in particular power units which were still being rebuilt at Doncaster while 55012 Crepello went the same way soon after but was able to donate a bogie to 55011 Royal Northumberland Fusiliers,



August 2 1981 caught out some enthusiasts when 55021 *Argyll and Sutherland Highlander* was selected to work the 'West Highlander' from Edinburgh at short notice. which had up to that time been thought to be a scrapper.

There were still 11, half of the original fleet, in service with the end of 1981 only a few days away, despite the fact that the whole class was to have been withdrawn by that October. Most popular amongst these was 55002 The King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry which had been turned out in an approximation of its original two-tone green livery as a prelude to its anticipated transfer to the National Railway Museum at York. It made a number of appearances at depot open days in this guise during the year.

55013 The Black Watch was the first of the survivors to go, and was soon followed by 55010 The King's Own Scottish Borderer, both with multiple mechanical faults that precluded further service.
55016 Gordon Highlander was next and was abandoned at York after developing a mechanical issue. Next to go was 55007 Pinza, which failed on a York-King's Cross working while celebrity 55002 started throwing oil about while working a Liverpool-Newcastle train and was taken off at York and round the corner to the National Railway Museum.

The final day of normal service working was December 31 1981, after which

instructions had been issued that the 'Deltics' should not be used on timetabled trains again. The final day, and the specials that were planned to follow it, were already without their proposed star, which had already retired hurt to the museum in York, and some of the others were not in much better fettle. 55021 Argyll and Sutherland Highlander limped into York on one engine and had to be taken off there and taken to the depot for attention while 55008 The Green Howards didn't even get off Finsbury Park depot as it had flat batteries.

FINAL DAY

And so the final day arrived with the honour of hauling the last service train from King's Cross falling to 55017 *The Durham Light Infantry*, on the 4.03pm London-York, a journey that saw commuters outnumbered by about five to one by enthusiasts and a television crew complete with floodlights turning up to record the occasion. That left only the farewell special return journeys from London to Edinburgh and back to complete in the New Year for which only 55015 *Tulyar* and 55022 *Royal Scots Grey* were available, due to the considerable number of faults that the other survivors had.

After the celebrations were over all the remaining locomotives were towed to Doncaster works where all 15 were placed together on the scrap roads, immediately becoming something of a shrine to 'Deltic' lovers, many of whom visited to pay their last respects, and to take a final photograph.

Fortunately, this was not quite the end as six 'Deltics' were to make it into preservation in various forms including D9000 and 55015 from the final day in 1982. At least four have been active on the main line since on excursions – D9000, D9009, D9016 and D9019 - but we never again saw the mass adulation that the class attracted in its final days.

Now, 40 years on since that remarkable January night and with memories of the 'Deltics' in service distant, we now have the mouth-watering prospect of a new highly-detailed model from Accurascale, which may enable us to capture the flavour of those heady times once again, this time on our model railways, and perhaps someone will one day model some of those most unusual final workings? **HM**

O BE OUITE HONEST I probably have enough Class 37s, but I fancied recreating my youth and trips to the North Wales coast where my dad and I had spent many happy hours riding behind Class 37/4s in the late 1990s. Favourites were naturally the Regional Railways liveried examples - once we saw 37408 Loch Rannoch in its BR'large logo' blue livery too - but we also had a number of trips behind EWS liveried examples including 37415, 37418 and 37421.

A recent trawl of my photographs brought memories flooding back and I remembered that I had an EWS Class 37/4 body in the 'one day I'll do something with that' pile in the workshop. Typically we never travelled behind 37411, the subject of this body, but it did operate on the North Wales coast route in May and June 1999. However, it was better known for service in Scotland and South Wales in the late 1990s and early 2000s period.

The body for 37411 was bereft of a chassis, but I remembered where it had gone – it was underneath a kit built model of unique gas turbine 18000. The arrival of Rails of Sheffield's model of 18000

prompted me to check in on my kit built version from more than a decade ago which used the chassis from the Class 37/4 body and provided a potential answer to reviving the ETH Type 3.

On separating the body and chassis, I discovered that I hadn't been kind in my modifications to the original Bachmann chassis. The plastic frame had been cut, the buffer beams were missing and the bogie side frames had been cut away to make way for the resin mouldings to go with 18000. To make matters worse, the bodyshell for 37411 had been used for airbrushing practice – I'm kicking myself for that now, but we all make mistakes.

COST EFFECTIVE

All that aside, I could see a simple and relatively cost effective project to restore the locomotive to full running order as a Class 37 once more. The chassis still ran well, but was of the older 8-pin socket generation and needed replacement parts while the body was complete and would make a simple de-weathering and re-weathering project.

Armed with an idea, I scurried about the internet looking for the parts I needed for the Class 37 – a pair of bogies, two cab interiors and a new underframe moulding plus a set of bufferbeam pipes. As luck would have it, Bachmann has recently launched a new spare parts website and I found everything I needed there to reassemble the chassis. £35 and a couple of days later, all the parts I had ordered were on my workbench ready for use.

The first step was to strip the remaining part of the underframe moulding from the chassis and the spines of the bogies. This allowed the new underframe to be hooked over the bogies and clipped into place followed by refitting of four small crosshead screws from my spares box to hold it in place. The bogie side frames are a straightforward clip fit and were followed by refitting of the cab interior mouldings which were secured in place with a couple of spots of Deluxe Materials Roket Rapid superglue. So far the project had taken about 10 minutes.

CLEAN AND DIRTY

Next it was the turn of the body. Isopropyl alcohol (IPA) and cotton buds were broken out to start the clean up process for the body, but this naturally took considerably longer than the chassis work. 30 minutes of care and attention took the original mess of airbrushed blacks on the body back to offer a pleasing dirty roof and stained bodysides, leaving the fresh black underframe components standing out like a sore thumb by comparison.

A word of caution with IPA. It is a chemical and needs to be handled carefully plus one of its properties is an ability to remove paint! It needs to be used sparingly otherwise you can rub straight through to the body paint underneath and begin to take that away too. It's a patient process which needs to be done with the minimum quantity of IPA on a cotton bud.


Buffer beam pipes were fitted next and then the body was removed from the chassis once more so that I could work on weathering the underframe. The weathering process started with a light coat of Lifecolor Frame Dirt (UA719) applied through my trusty Iwata Eclipse airbrush to tone down the underframe parts. A further application of Dirty Black (UA731) followed by spots of Dirty Grease Effect (UA262) added on the buffer heads completed the underframe weathering.

37411 was now in a much better state. It had been rebuilt, re-weathered for a realistic finish but was now missing two important ingredients - sound and lighting. As some of the wires had been cut to the nose end lights and the underframe tanks were empty, I now had an opportunity to take this model a little further so its next steps will see it fitted with a new sound decoder and a speaker (or speakers) in the fuel tanks while I also plan on taking full advantage of the cut wiring to make the head, tail and cab lights all operate independently on separate functions.

For now though that is another story, but I'm pleased with the progress so far on 37411. Watch this space for more on this model in Staff Projects. **HM**



STEP BY STEP RESTORING A BACHMANN CLASS 37/4 IN 'OO'












I really had been unkind to this chassis! The original cab interiors had left their mark with spigots still in the holes in the chassis casting. A 2mm drill bit in a pin vice soon removed them.



The new cab interiors were fitted seconds later with a couple of spots of Deluxe Materials Roket Rapid superglue holding them in place.



Buffer beam pipework was added next including additional air pipes and a dummy screw link coupling from my spares box.



This images shows the state of the Class 37 body with heavy paint application on the bonnet sides, splatter on the nose ends and awful weathering on the body. It needs fixing!





Working carefully and with minimum quantities of IPA on a cotton bud, I started pulling back to the black weathering colours on the body. You can see the difference already, but there is still some way to go here.



The effect of the IPA is near instant on the weathering paint, but be careful with this chemical as too much of it or too much abrasion will rub through the original maroon and gold colours too.









aside from the grilles onto which I added a wash of Lifecolor Grey Shadow liquid pigment (LPW35) from the Quick Flesh Shadowing set. The underframe though is much too clean.



One final restoration point was replacement of the missing engine room side window. This was added using Deluxe Materials Glue 'n' Glaze adhesive which dries clear. It was applied using a length of brass rod to put a ring of the adhesive around the edge of the window opening and then drawing it across to join up.



The final step was chassis weathering. This was done with Lifecolor Frame Dirt (UA719) followed by a light coat of Dirty Black (UA731), both applied by airbrush. The buffer heads also gained spots of Lifecolor Dirty Grease Effect (UA262) as a finishing touch. Sound and lighting are the next steps for this Class 37.
