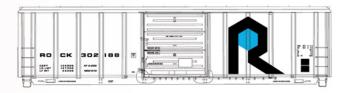

The Shay locomotive was the most widely used geared steam locomotive. The locomotives were built to the patents of Ephraim Shay, who has been credited with the popularization of the concept of a geared steam locomotive. Although the design of Ephraim Shay's early locomotives differed from later ones, there is a clear line of development that joins all Shays. In 1884, they delivered the first 3-cylinder (Class B) Shay.

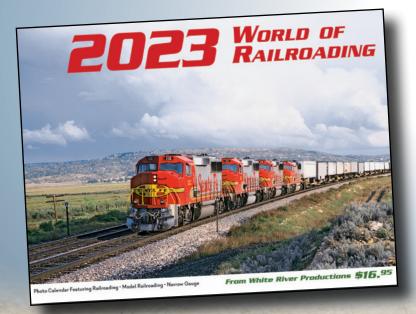

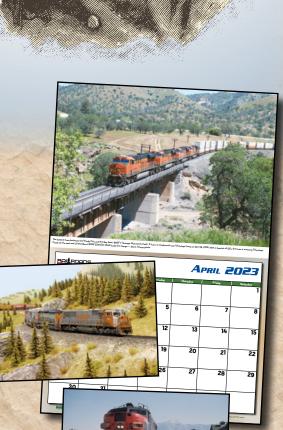

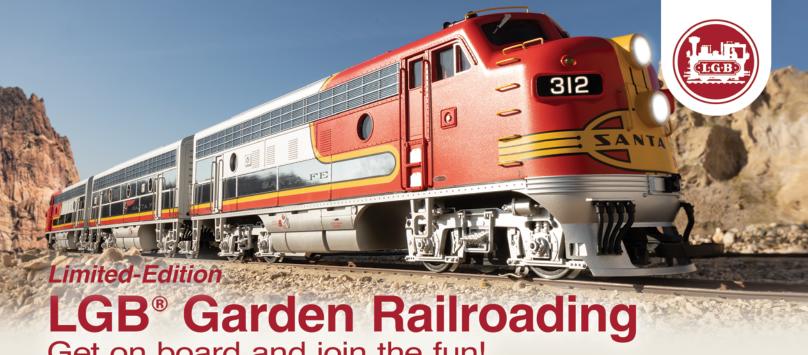

# LGB's G-scale "Christmas Express" set to roll for this holiday season



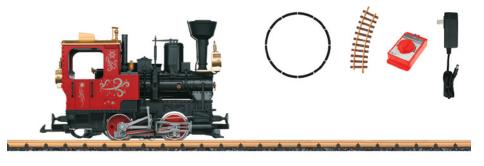
**G** — Be sure your Christmas decorating is complete this year, and includes a holiday-themed train circling your tree.

#### Arrowhead Models delivers HO-scale 4600



**HO** – Arrowhead Models shows no signs of hitting a "sophomore slump" with the hobby company's second HO-scale freight car release. The coming American Car & Foundry 4600-cubic-foot-capacity Centerflow was on display at the recent St. Louis Railroad Prototype Modelers Meet (stlrpm.com) and attracted plenty of positive attention. Arrowhead Models' Blaine Hadfield noted this yellow Chicago & North Western (CNW) example was a preproduction model; the paint application was deemed heavy and would see improvement in the regular release offerings, and the running board supports would be yellow (matching the car body) on standard production cars.

Currently, Arrowhead Models shows three road numbers (180006, 180059, and 180122) coming for this yellow CNW three-bay covered hopper car model (which reproduces a 1977-built series of cars). This intricately detailed HO offering retails for \$64.95. Additional road names, including mid-1970s blue "The Rock," will follow this CNW debut for Arrowhead Models' all-new ACF 4600 Centerflow hopper car replica.

#### Fox Valley Models' Trinity RD-4 coal hoppers returning in N scale from ScaleTrains

N -ScaleTrains announces a new production of Trinity RD-4 coal hoppers for N scale under the Fox Valley Models name. ScaleTrains plans give road names BNSF, Trinity Leasing, Chicago & North Western, Union Pacific, and Norfolk Southern shown with illustrations on the right. The hopper releases will come in as many as two dozen road numbers for select decorations. This rapiddischarge aluminum hopper was introduced in the mid-1990s on North American rails. The fully assembled model will come with removable coal load, metal wheels, and body-mounted operating knuckle couplers. ScaleTrains is selling this hopper for \$22.99 and expects to ship this run in March 2023.

# New group of Bachmann HO GP7s will deliver soon

HO — Bachmann's GP7 diesel locomotive model will be shipping before the end of 2022 with four new road names. This fully assembled release reproduces Electro-Motive Division's landmark first-generation Geep built between 1949 and 1954 with more than 2,700 GP7s going into service at the time... many would see decades of service.

This release presents a mix of GP7 prototypes covering a range of years. The pictures show early examples and are subject to revisions and changes.

Bachmann's Amtrak 760 (69101) wears silver with black maintenance-of-way attire, and is an interesting addition to the hobby company's GP7 roster. It is also a useful locomotive to have on your roster to switch passenger trains at major terminals or handle work train duties. This release will add a 1960s blue with yellow Chesapeake & Ohio 5735 (69102). When launched in 1976, Conrail inherited a wide range of locomotives from its participating railroads, including many first-generation Geeps. Bachmann's Conrail 5605 (69103) shows a blue repaint of a GP7 that first worked for New York Central. Santa Fe was another road that bought many early Geeps. Bachmann will offer the road's 1960s "bookends" decoration with blue body, yellow ends and sill, and large billboard lettering for its Santa Fe 2686 (69104).

This HO-scale plastic GP7 model includes accurately decorated flexible handrails, wire coupler cut lever on pilots, separate air horn, and detailed tanks between its four-axle trucks. The standard DC release comes with an 8-pin socket for conversion to Digital Command Control, directional lighting, and knuckle couplers.

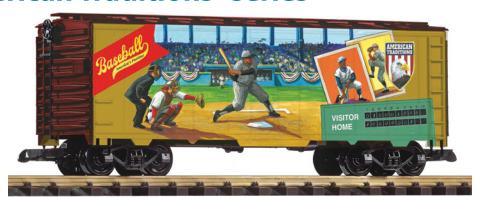

# Athearn Genesis HO-scale SDP40F will return with several looks

HO — Athearn is working on a new production of its Genesis-series SDP40F diesel locomotive model. This six-axle passenger unit was built by Electro-Motive Division (EMD) for Amtrak in the mid-1970s. The SDP40F fleet, built in two phases (early with pointed nose and late with flat nose), served Amtrak for a brief period. Many returned to EMD and were used to make F40PHRs for the passenger service. Of the surviving SDP40Fs, Santa Fe acquired a portion of the fleet in a trade with Amtrak in the 1980s.

In this release planned for September 2023 delivery, Amtrak will be included with Phase II decorated examples (with early production pointed nose) in multiple road numbers (526, 537, and 611). Features on these Amtrak SDP40Fs will include oscillating headlight and functioning emergency light between illuminated number boards, working truck lights and illumiated classification lights (some of these lighting features only work under DCC operation), see-through intake grilles, MU hoses, and more. Among the three road numbers, Athearn's Amtrak 611 will come with low-profile fans, air filter, and horns as it had for Eastern service with clearance concerns. Unique features on the other two SDP40Fs will include an ATS shoe mounted to the truck on Amtrak 526 and icicle breakers on the roof of Amtrak 537.

Santa Fe's ex-Amtrak SDP40Fs saw several modifications during their time in freight service. Athearn plans to reproduce in HO two early Santa Fe prototypes with front handrails and vertical pilot steps added. This pilot step modification was reverted back to non-use and closed (until a major change brought notches cut into the sides of the nose for better crew access and safety). The four road numbers coming for Santa Fe include 5253, 5256, 5260, and 5264. The lighting features found on Amtrak SDP40F will be duplicated (except for the red emergency light) and an amber

safety beacon will appear on the cab roof. Additional details on these Santa Fe models will include antenna on raised platform, air conditioner, and accurate air horn (all in forward position over the cab).

The uncommon blue-and-white EMD testbed 268 (an ex-Amtrak unit) will be produced. This prototype was one of a few SDP40Fs retained by the builder and used for testing and evaluation.

Two "Legendary Liveries" offer-

ings will show an alternative timeline with BNSF and Southern Railway. Had BNSF employed its ex-Santa Fe SDP40Fs in executive train service, Athearn's BNSF 6975 and 6977 will show the dark green and cream livery worn by F-units in the 1990s that worked these special operations. Southern Railway was an Amtrak holdout in 1971 and continued to operate passenger trains until 1979. Had Southern found need to replace the E- and F-units used to operate

its Southern Crescent, what might the road have purchased? Athearn will follow this path and serve up Southern Railway 7701 and 7707 decked out in the road's famous and attractive passenger livery.

This new production of HO-scale Genesis SDP40F diesel locomotive models will come in standard DC (MSRP: \$239.99) and in versions equipped with DCC and SoundTraxx Tsunami 2 electronics (MSRP: \$339.99). Athearn anticipates shipping this collection of releases during September 2023.

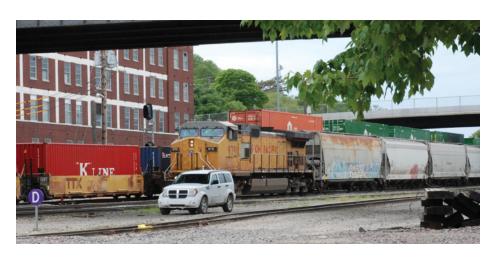

The fully assembled HO model will include a first-time inclusion of operating ditch lights. The releases will come sound-ready with preinstalled speakers provided in the mechanism and wired into the electronics; this will allow for easy conversion to Digital Command Control (DCC) and audio output by simply dropping in your own DCC-sound decoder in place of the dummy plug (21-pin connection) on the circuit board.

The road names coming in this release will include BNSF (Heritage II and ex-Santa Fe SuperFleet redand-silver with BNSF lettering on the long hood), Canadian National, Australia's Hamersley Iron, Southern Pacific (as-delivered 1994 late-era

"Bloody Nose" scheme with flying road name on the long hood), and Union Pacific (ex-Chicago & North Western units as they looked in Armour Yellow following the early 2000s revision to yellow reflective frame striping). Each road name will be offered with two road numbers (a slight change from Athearn's usual practice).

The assembled HO-scale C44-9W diesel locomotive model carries a \$169.99 suggested retail price, and as noted is DCC-ready with 21-pin socket and equipped with pre-installed speakers. The models will be fitted with steerable Hi-ad truck sideframes (depending on prototype use), road-name specific air horn, plow, grilles, and antennas. Additional details will include sunshades, frame-mounted bell, separate exhaust stack and brake wheel, sand filler, and more. The tank will be a 5,000-gallon version. The lighting (including first-time ditch light feature) will be LED powered and directional. The drive will be flywheel-equipped powering all axles with all-wheel electrical pickup.

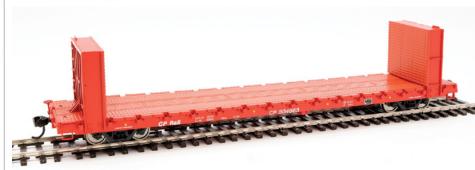

## Go Big in the Backyard

### LGB's Santa Fe F-units in G scale

ne would be hard pressed to identify a more iconic scheme in American railroading's last 90 years than Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe's (ATSF) Warbonnet scheme – designed by General Motors' Leland Knickerbocker for the sleek, early diesel E1As; the scheme's basic design lasted through to the mid-1990s and the BNSF merger. After converting to blue-and-yellow freight version in 1972 and then brought back by Mike

Haverty around 1990 for the series of Superfleet units, this is beyond doubt a classic. LGB's beautiful Electro-Motive Division (EMD) F7 diesel locomotives (A- and B-units) are back with an updated rendition of Santa Fe's Warbonnet scheme, complete with plated sides to simulate the stainless panels found on the prototypes.

LGB has offered its G-scale F7s in a variety of schemes, the first of them originally released in the late 1990s, but this updated Warbonnet may be the most handsome yet. They are upgraded under the hood as well, with with Digital Command Control (DCC) and digital sound enhancements that are compatible with analog operation, using LGB's familiar sound activation magnets or your compatible DCC system of choice.

#### The Prototype

Santa Fe had its own class and roster nomenclature, with F7s making up its 300 class, and divided into A-B-B-A

sets. The A-units were designated L or C, while B-units were labeled A and B. Confused yet? The passenger-geared, steam generator-equipped F-units could be found in all configurations from A-B pairs up to large combinations of eight or more units (depending on the route and train size), across Santa Fe's system from Illinois to California. The F-units were Santa Fe's mainstay passenger power until the FP45s, U28Cs, and U30CGs came along in the late 1960s.

Three different F7As were numbered 312L from May 1950 through December 1974, and at least two were rebuilt in Santa Fe's CF-7 program at the road's Cleburne, Texas, shops. Santa Fe also had multiple F7Bs that carried road number 312B, and they labored for the road until either becoming an

RCE (Radio Controlled Engine) car or traded in to EMD in the early 1970s on SD45-2s. With this information above, LGB's 312L and 312B set is good for a wide span of Santa Fe's golden era of passenger service prior to the formation of Amtrak, or in later years working freight service. LGB also offers another A-unit, Santa Fe 314L (20583).

#### **Running Giant F-units**

I tested LGB's F7A 312L in analog (non-digital) operation, as I don't have an appropriate DCC system that would work for this G-scale application — and it was still very impressive. Having been previously acquainted with LGB's sound-equipped units through the years, their use of a dual-mode decoder to power the analog sound function, while going full DCC is a departure from past practice with this release. I don't have enough G-scale rolling stock to quantify the extraordinary pulling power LGB cites in the release on these locomotives, but I found they pulled anything I was able to couple up to the units. Two motors (one in each truck) provide ample tractive effort, when coupled with the A-unit's 9.2-pound weight; the third axle has a traction tire on one wheel to enhance pulling power. Electrical pickup is through seven of the model's eight wheels, and two slides per truck also contribute.

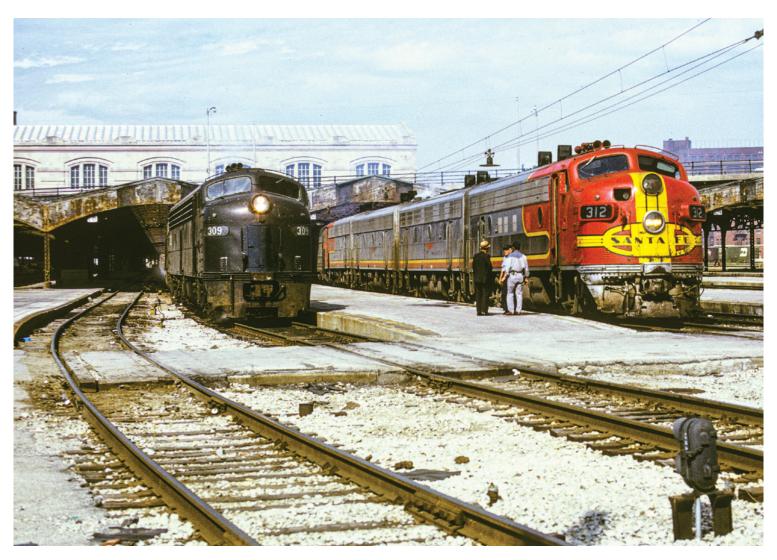
A pair of sound activation magnets came with F7A 312L; when placed left or right, they were only good for producing three rings of the bell, or one short blast of the horn. One directional sound jumper cable to the B-unit was also included - this brings unpowered F7B 312B to life, when plugged into the door on LGB's F7A. Gently increasing voltage to the unit will start the class lights, number boards, headlight, and sound startup, while the model remains stationary. The classic EMD 567 prime mover sounds have a sufficient amount of bass when coming

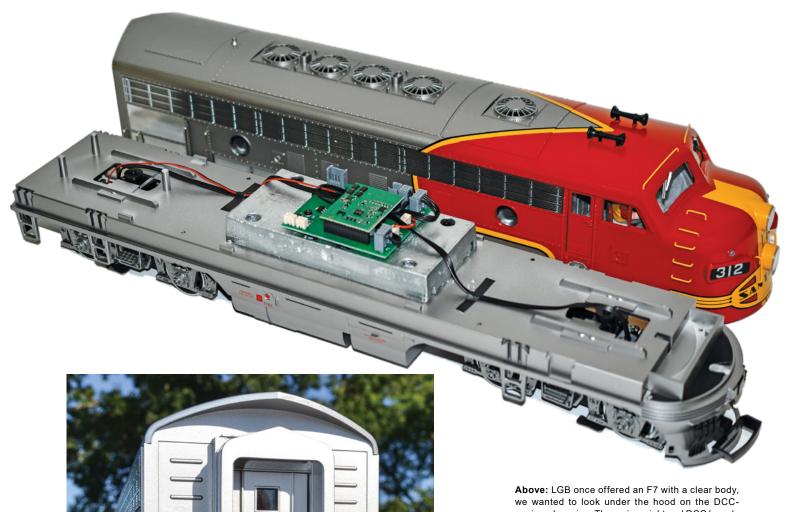

equipped version. The main weight and DCC boards are in the center, with the wiring to each truck/motor block.

from both units... it's astounding to hear and enjoy! The upper headlight of the unit is also dark, when operated in analog (slide switch positions 1 or 2 didn't change anything), but the DCC function table lists a Gyralight feature for this upper position light.

The units are equipped with LGB's hook-and-loop style couplers, allowing them to operate on curves down to R1 4-foot diameter — and the front

pilot of the A-unit has a kinetic mount to allow for better swing, when operated with longer rolling stock. Extra hooks are included, if you desire to double hook your locomotives together, and LGB also offers knuckle couplers (sold separately) that can be added if modelers desire. The units come in LGB's standard dark red boxes with white foam top and bottom inner nests to safely keep them stowed when not in use.

All in, the 312L and 312B nicely carry on the tradition that Knickerbocker and Santa Fe kept alive through the years. California State Railroad Museum (californiarailroad. museum) in Sacramento, Calif., has preserved 347C and 347B — which didn't become a CF7s. This release from LGB embodies the quality and robustness that have become hallmarks of their models. MRN

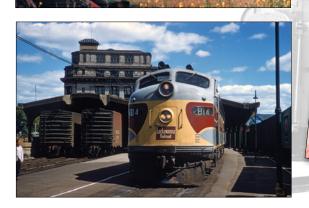


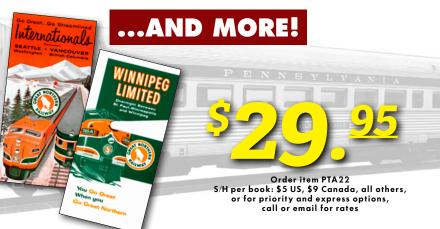

## **Excessive Heights for a Boxcar**

### **Tangent Scale Models FMC Gunderson 6089 in HO**

his latest release from Tangent Scale Models is indeed a great boxcar model, and while other similar excess-height freight cars like this FMC/Gunderson prototype have or do exist in HO, it's impressive to see this level of quality for this 50-foot double plug-door boxcar. The model made its debut at the St. Louis Railroad Prototype Modelers Meet in late July 2022 and by the close of the first day of the event, I discovered the Rio Grande, Southern Pacific, and I believe the run's Cotton Belt replicas brought to the show had sold out. I quickly bought

two Rio Grande examples (one for my collection and one for my dad).

The trio of road names you see on display – Cotton Belt (SSW), Denver & Rio Grande Western (D&RGW), and Southern Pacific (SP) – are the only owners for this Gunderson Brothers (later succeeded by FMC) prototype. The excess-height car was manufactured in 1968 and 1969 with a bit more than 1,000 entering service for the mentioned roads. The 6,089-cubic-footcapacity boxcar was intended for paper and appliance hauling, those products being among its most common cargo. The fleet of 70-ton boxcars roamed across North America into the 2000s.

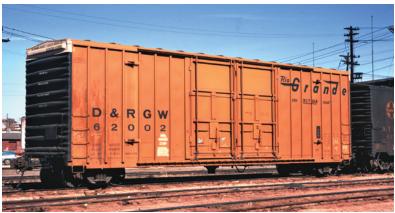

Tangent Scale Models covers several eras with the releases in this first production. The Action Orange D&RGW and SP example with yellow door are as-delivered looks from the late 1960s, while the somewhat simplified Cotton

Belt decoration shows a mid-1980s repaint. Not shown here but included in the production is a blue Golden West Service release that provides a mid-1990s and later look. Each of the four road names includes a dozen road





Cotton Belt B-70-42 sample and pinched the left stirrup step inward a bit. This is easily remedied and I show it as a warning to take care with these finely detailed replicas. This paint job has clean lines separating the brown sides from the metal roof; compare this with the overspray appearance given Tangent's Southern Pacific and Rio Grande roofli-

numbers (check Tangent Scale Models online or inquire with one of the manufacturer's dealers for stock availability). The replica weighs in at an even five ounces. The car rides on newly tooled Barber S-2 Birdsboro Foundry roller bearing trucks (with spinning caps) on 33-inch metal wheels. Tangent includes a bag with replacement bearing caps should the need arise. The model includes extended or cushion couplers fitted with Kadee's metal scale-head knuckles.

I've operated my trio of these boxcar replicas for a week on my test track with no issues. I was pleasantly surprised by this boxcar selection and always happy to have a new Tangent Scale Models replica to add to my collection. MRN

In compiling product news, I frequently see releases for models from companies beyond my North American home base. HO scale is a standard the world over and many offerings can catch my attention. Australian railroading is a subject that grabs my attention with regularity,

and some of the equipment used is very similar to, if not the same as, North American versions (see page 26 and the news of Athearn's C44-9Ws in Hamersley Iron as an example). Conversely, you'll discover some very alien looking equipment in use too.

Auscision Models is an Australian hobby company that I follow, and I've been frequently tempted by their HO locomotive model releases. When fellow hobbyist Shawn Hoppert mentioned he imported Auscision Models' HO-scale Tangara set, I asked if I could borrow it and share a review in Model Railroad News. I enjoyed running the set and discovering what this company's products are like.

#### Commuting with Tangara

This shovelnose bi-level train looks like something you'd see in a movie or TV show as a futuristic rail travel option. In reality, the A. Goninan & Co.-built Tangara equipment (also known as T sets) has been serving in Sydney, Australia, passenger runs since the late 1980s.

My reference states the T-sets (numbered below 100) are suburban use and G-sets (numbered above 100) made longer-distance runs, but have merged over the years. Production concluded on these standard gauge, electric rail units in 1995.

A four-car set appears to be the minimum consist and more than 450 cars (a mix of driving and non-driving cars) made up the fleet. The four-car Tangara set includes a pair of outer cars (drivers with shovelnose face, one pantograph at the back end, and controls for operation) and a pair of non-driving cars or coaches running between the end units.



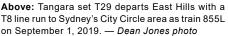


#### Auscision's Tangara

This four-unit Tangara suburban set comes packaged in a large attractive display box. The four models are securely packed in a two-piece clear plastic inner casing that is surrounded by a thin foam lining. The models are largely made of plastic components with multi-part shells consisting of the base (which includes the skirting over the trucks and up to approximately the thin yellow sill stripe), upper body with separately applied tinted window sections, and separate end diaphragms that have some give-and-take in their design to allow them fit closely together and not inhibit operation around curves. The detailed pantograph on the roof of the driver cars is metal, as are handrails

on the driver car models. Though they don't look it (the prototype stands only a bit more than 14 feet over the rails), these cars all include bi-level seating. Aucision Models provides interior sections for all four cars. The driver car includes control interior detail and painted crew figures.

The HO-scale models are standard DC with provision for conversion to Digital Command Control with a 21-pin socket included on the circuit board of the powered driver car. LED lighting features include a range of functions for the end driver cars. The single powered driver car had ample ability to smoothly pull or push this four-car set around my test track. I measured a top speed of just below 70 mph under standard

DC operation. I was tempted to open the powered unit and wanted to share views of it; however, the instructions warning of the challenge involved and confirmation from a YouTube video showing the disassembly made me shelve this portion of my evaluation, as this model was not mine and on loan. The pantographs are delicate, but I was able to manually raise and lower them without damage. The cars snap together with plastic connector tabs. The assembly of the set was easy, though the force necessary to pull the units apart made me unsure of how durable this design would be with heavy usage. The fit and finish was very good, with decoration adding to these already well-detailed HO reproductions of this interesting prototype. This set was produced in China for Auscision Models.





#### Conclusion

This is my first experience with an Auscision Models release and I was excited to have the opportunity. After this experience, I think I will take the plunge and buy a locomotive for my collection. Special thanks to Shawn Hoppert for the loan. Shawn models a modern HO Milwaukee Road... I have no idea if this Tangara will be in service on his railroad or was just bought for fun. The set costs around \$450 and buyers can purchase direct from Auscision Models online and have items shipped to North America. If you're unfamiliar with Australian railroading, there's much to get excited about and models available. MRN

## Marking a Quarter Century

### BNSF anniversary GEVOs from ScaleTrains in HO scale

The year 2020 marked the 25th anniversary of 1995's Burlington Northern-Santa Fe merger, commemorated by the road with 10 locomotives in a special variation of BNSF's paint scheme. ScaleTrains was quick to bring these locomotives to HO scale, announcing production of all 10 road numbers in September 2020.

#### The Prototype

To commemorate its anniversary, BNSF contracted to have 10 General Electric (GE) ES44AC "Evolution Series" GEVO locomotives labeled with heritage heralds at Mid-America Car in Kansas City, Mo., and RELCO in Albina, Iowa. The first locomotive, BNSF 5828, was unveiled in August 2020 and the last was in service during November 2020. These 10 roster members received a variation of BNSF's current "Heritage III" livery with addi-

tions. Not only was "25th Anniversary" added below the BNSF "swoosh" logo, but heralds for the eight predecessor roads are located on the side of the hood. These eight railroads are Santa Fe, Burlington Northern, and six of the seven railroads that merged to form Burlington Northern: Chicago, Burlington, & Quincy; Great Northern; Northern Pacific; Frisco; Colorado & Southern; and Spokane, Portland, & Seattle. The absent road is Fort Worth & Denver, a Burlington subsidiary, though fellow subsidiary Colorado & Southern was included.

BNSF's choice of units from its GE ES44AC fleet for these anniversary locomotives was likely an easy one, as the roster includes roughly 700 examples. The locomotives selected to be painted are earlier production GEVOs, with build dates from 2005 through 2007, presumably because these older units were already being cycled through for fresh paint and overhauls.

Rumors among the railfan community when these locomotives were announced by BNSF indicated that more traditional heritage units for each predecessor road had been planned, but the "sticker units" were a compromise due to high employee furloughs and the COVID pandemic. According to his November 2020 article, "Designing BNSF's Anniversary Units" appearing in *Railfan & Railroad* magazine, Stephen

Priest states the railroad contacted him about the concept and "stressed cost and timelines for the project were of the utmost importance." BNSF's 25th anniversary locomotives are very much a successor to Burlington Northern's two "Pacific Pride" units (GP38 2075 and GP38-2 2085). These two Geeps received a similar treatment, featuring heralds of predecessor railroads added to the hood doors of the standard Cascade Green paint schemes.

#### The Model

When conducting research for these models, ScaleTrains discovered the collection of anniversary GEVO locomotives had many detail variations among them because they were produced at different times. As a result, ScaleTrains tooled many unit-specific detail variations to make these models worthy of the brand's Rivet Counter label. Our model is BNSF 5869 (GE serial number 56717 from order 1900), an ES44AC built in January 2006. The prototype locomotive was delivered in the then-new Heritage III paint scheme which was well-faded by the time it received the anniversary repaint.

Each of the 10 models has unit-specific details, which mainly differ in the

doors and vents on the hood, horn type, and cab roof antenna arrangement. All the many fine details modelers have come to expect from ScaleTrains' Rivet Counter line are present here, including numerous separately applied detail parts, see-through grilles, and rotating roller bearings on the trucks.

The paint and printing on this model are very well done. While early BNSF models from ScaleTrains had a BNSF orange that some considered to be too red, this issue has long been solved. The orange used on this model is a great match to the prototype, as are the other colors. Pad printed details, such as the heralds on the hood, are all color-accurate to prototype photos and are crisp and legible. The only discrepancy that is evident is the black "anti-glare" on the cab nose, which

appears to extend too far to the edge of the nose compared to prototype photos.

Our example is factory-equipped with an ESU LokSound V5 decoder, dual "sugar cube" speakers, and an ESU PowerPack, featuring two capacitors, to provide consistent operation over spotty areas of track. A DCC-ready model was also produced for those who still run DC layouts or prefer to install a different decoder. It should be noted that, like some other modern DCC-ready models, an ESU decoder must be used to fully utilize the model's numerous lighting functions. In addition to the usual headlights and ditch lights, this model also features lighted number boards and operating front, rear, and side walkway lights. While some other road names of ScaleTrains' ES44 include ground lights, they are absent on the BNSF models as

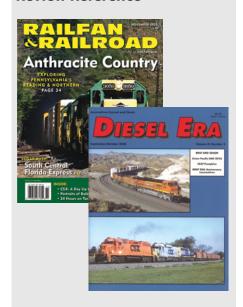
the prototype BNSF ES44ACs also lack them.

#### **Conclusion**

ScaleTrains has done an excellent job of recreating these striking locomotives, providing a great model to add a little flavor to any HO-scale modern BNSF roster or locomotive collection. While the first run of these models sold out quickly after they arrived in Spring 2022, ScaleTrains has already announced a second batch due for delivery in early 2023; if you missed out initially, you have another chance to get one.

## Veteran Covered Wagons Athearn Genesis F7s in HO scale

hen Athearn first introduced its Genesis-series F-units (based on Highliner's multipart plastic shell), these remarkable HO reproductions of Electro-Motive Division's (EMD) bulldog-nose firstgeneration diesel prototypes seemed stunning... and they were; however, I look now at the intricately detailed late-era subjects routinely produced using this base tooling and they are in another league.

Two new Genesis F7A releases that will be arriving as you receive this edition of Model Railroad News well

represent this even higher level of detail being achieved. Both F7s on display feature repainting of their covered wagon skins. The shared late-era details include added grab irons on the nose, MU connectors, and sections of skirting over the tanks removed. In addition to those common elements, each includes road-specific horn, antenna, and other details that likely came some years after delivery (F7 production ran from early 1949 to late 1953).

Norfolk & Western (N&W) 3725 was Wabash's 725 (originally 1189) and was not an EMD-built F7A but came from General Motors Diesel in Canada. Wabash operated between Detroit, Mich., and Buffalo, N.Y., via a line that ran through Ontario in Canada. Canadian-built power (mostly F-units) was part of this system. For more on this interesting collection of N&W F-units, see Diesel Era's 2021 second quarter edition feature "Norfolk & Western's 1970s F-unit Survivors." As you'll see in that feature, when N&W assumed control of Wabash in 1964, the fleet of F-units (N&W's first as they transitioned to diesels later than most roads and did so with Geeps versus F-units) received minimal relettering and repainting and the only standard was there was no standard approach to how N&W's image seemed to be applied. Athearn's effort does a respectable job with both its decoration and detail. The gray upper color was left over from Wabash's as-delivered livery that included blue and white below the gray. N&W's yellow "hamburger" herald and sans serif road name are present in a fairly complete version (see the image on the facing page below of N&W 3671 and its more spartan lettering appearance). This N&W F7A is simply loaded with details. Every time I glance at this model, I catch something new that I've missed. On the cab roof note the vent located beside the air horn, while behind the skate-type antenna is an oil cooler piping system. The model sports the smooth passenger-style pilot that Wabash bought with hoses and grab

Above and Below: About the only detail that I am ready to nitpick on this N&W F7A may be the winterization hatch. I believe these GMD F-units featured a more boxy or squared covering on their back radiator fan. Otherwise, from its passenger-style pilot to its deskirted sides and up to its oil cooler piping on the roof this is an amazing rendition of an uncommon late-era F7. Be sure to see the other N&W F7s in this run, as virtually no two are lettered or painted the same way.





Missouri Pacific (MP) 916 is another late-era F7 delight from Athearn Genesis. This again shows an F-unit working in the later years of its career with simplified livery and detail/ feature modifications. The small "TP" located next to the red buzz saw Missouri Pacific Lines herald denotes this unit is a member of Texas & Pacific's (T&P) roster (a subsidiary of MP). Texas & Pacific F7s first arrived in a splendid light blue and gray (as did MP units of the early diesel era). This model's prototype was originally Texas & Pacific 1566 (delivered in August 1951), later renumbered 916 (and retired in 1973). You'll find Texas & Pacific's roster included in Kevin EuDaly's Missouri Pacific Diesel Power (1994, White River Productions). Just as Pevler Blue dipped many Wabash units, Jenks Blue was the hue of choice to dip MP and T&P power in the 1960s. Athearn's rendition of Jenks Blue looks accurate to my eyes and brings back memories of Missouri Pacific. You'll note the repainting

The grilles on the sides of this F7A are separate etched-metal sections and as you can see fit snugly and look great. Imagine drilling out a plastic F7 body shell to install all those grab irons and lift rings... with this well-appointed release these details are already in place.

process literally seems have been a dip in a vat of blue, as the truck sideframes and tanks also wear the color. Eye-catching details on this MP/T&P F7A release include spark arrestors capping the twin exhaust stacks on the roof, a large all-forward bell air horn cluster, and nail-type antenna on the roof. The front and rear include coupler cut levers (in Jenks Blue), air hoses, and a train line hose. Like the N&W F7 reviewed, an MU receptacle resides on the front somewhat spoiling the famous look of this EMD nose profile but providing an important option necessary for running these veteran F-units in multiple unit consists (you'll note the location differs on the nose between these two roads, as per prototype). This MP/T&P F7 includes elaborate windshield access additions with a foot ledge above the lead truck on the fireman's side and grab irons up both sides of the nose. The truck sideframes on Athearn's MP/T&P F-unit include a mix of slope, box, and Hyatt roller bearing, while Hyatt roller bearings



are present on all axles of the N&W sample. The cab area is excellent with green interior section, black and silver framing of the windows with cab shade and wind deflector/review mirror details included.

This pair, early samples on loan to MRN following the St. Louis RPM, would have been show stoppers not that many years ago... today they are standard Genesis issue and incredible

models. This release, shipping in late September 2022, also includes Bessemer & Lake Erie, Erie Lackawanna (EL), and Western Maryland, in addition to N&W and MP/T&P. The release includes individual A-units (EL releases include a single F7B) and sets offered with F7A/F7B or pairs of F7As. Check Athearn's website or your hobby dealer for complete information and pricing. MRN

## Most Wheels for the Money Broadway Limited Paragon 4 Centipede in HO scale

roadway Limited Imports' (BLI) Baldwin DR-12-8-1500/2 diesel locomotive, better known to most as a "Centipede" for obvious reasons, is an incredible beast matching well its unique prototype. This 3,000-hp offering was introduced not long after the end of World War II with production concluding in mid-1948. Pennsylvania Railroad owned the larg-

est Centipede fleet (24 examples) with Seaboard Air Line tied with Nacionales de Mexico each operating 14. The other pair was intended to become Union Pacific (UP) 998-999, but the deal fell apart and those Centipedes became the blue with white Baldwin demonstrator pair (6000 A-B).

Broadway Limited announced Union Pacific for a Centipede release some years ago and I eagerly awaited them, but they didn't make that production. I was very happy to see UP back on the list for this recent release and

again reserved a pair (from New York's TrainWorld). Was this fantasy pair worth the wait? Yes! I have an early Paragon 2 run decorated for the blue demo pair and this UP pair is an excellent addition.

The paint and decoration is top-notch with all colors looking authentic. The red striping and lettering is well done and the shield herald with wings on the nose looks great... even on this babyface Baldwin mug! I shared an image of these Centipedes when they arrived and had a friend comment that poor Baldwin couldn't get this style nose right. Yes, this snout lacks the sleek appearance of Electro-Motive E- or

F-units or the powerful stocky profile of Alco's PA or FA, but it is still a classic early diesel look.

Broadway Limited provides two bags of user-applied parts with this release, including color-matched gray stirrup steps. Additionally, you can remove the knuckle coupler from the ends of these Centipedes and install a drawbar connection. An illustrated guide walks you through the drawbar project.

The pair operate fine and despite their length can navigate curves as tight as 22-inch radius. The front and rear pilots swing in a toy train fashion (though they are not far from the design of Baldwin's prototype). While the plastic body shell and various separate details are painted, I noted the truck sideframes are molded in a gray plastic (if you're after a more authentic appearance, a flat finish or dusting coat would tone down the plastic appearance).

This is the most wheels you're likely to ever get for the price on a locomotive model (this pair carries a \$599.99 suggested retail price). There are more Centipedes crawling your way; watch for a review of BLI's NdeM and Seaboard offerings with a view of the Paragon 4 innards in a future MRN. MRN





## A new Hopper emerges out of the Shadows Trenton Works 5250 from Prairie Shadows in HO

surprise for your MRN editors at the recent 2022 St. Louis Railroad Prototype Modelers Meet (stlrpm.com) was finding early samples on display from Prairie Shadows Model Railway Co. for its coming HO-scale three-bay centerflow hopper car model. The company has offered special run rolling stock before in HO and N. For example, InterMountain Railway produced its HO-scale 4750 hopper in road names that were exclusive to Prairie Shadows (as this issue went to press Prairie Shadows showed stock on some road numbers from this release). This centerflow covered hopper represents new tooling and is not an existing model from another maker with special decoration.

Built by Trenton Works in Nova

Scotia, Canada, in the mid-1990s, this covered hopper resembles the look made standard by American Car & Foundry in the mid-1960s for its centerflow series (in fact, there is a 5250 in ACF's catalog that predates this model's prototype by 30 years). The fleet of more than 1,000 Trenton Works 5250s raised the cubic foot capacity by 500 beyond the average of Canadian grain hauling hoppers when new in 1995. Canadian National owned a large fleet, you also found these hoppers lettered

for Saskatchewan Wheat Pool (this is the scheme patched on this review's Norfolk Southern model). As happens, these 5250s moved on to secondary owners, which include the mentioned U.S. Class 1 Norfolk Southern, and several others.

This is a fine effort by Prairie Shadows Model Railway Co. and I hope we see more from them. The company's website shows an N-scale cylindrical hopper planned to follow this HO 5250. This review's model is Prairie Shadows' "Version 5" example... that's right, five body variations are coming in this release with accurate outlet gates (Holden, Hylar, or Toggle-Lock), three brake styles (Ajax, Ellcon National, or Universal), and one of two truck sideframes (Barber S2 Sway or S2 Straight Back) will be included on this release. The model weighs 5.6 ounces and couplers mated up fine with a Kadee height gauge. I want to thank Rob Gruber of Prairie Shadows for allowing Model Railroad News to have this preview look at this interesting HO centerflow model. I'm planning to purchase a Canadian National example when the run arrives later this year. Visit Prairie Shadows online for more information. MRN



## Thundering Thru The Rockies Broadway Limited Paragon 4 N-scale SD70ACe

f all six of the mid-2000s Union Pacific (UP) heritage scheme SD70ACe diesel locomotives, 1989 in its inspired Rio Grande livery was always a favorite. And I've had a strange habit of running into it randomly over the years — a 2008 visit to Pueblo, Colo. — it was there, same for another 2011 visit. My attraction to this engine stems from what first got me interested in railroading – a video that my parents bought during a 1981

trip to the Durango & Silverton from when the engines were still lettered Rio Grande, and a book that had a side elevation of a K-36 steam locomotive with the flying Rio Grande lettering on the tender. I guess it's only natural that this particular affinity for Rio Grande was passed on to my son Jax — in 2016 the 1989 showed up often on Union Pacific's Jefferson City Subdivision through Pacific, Mo. — and was even set out for a weekend of display in

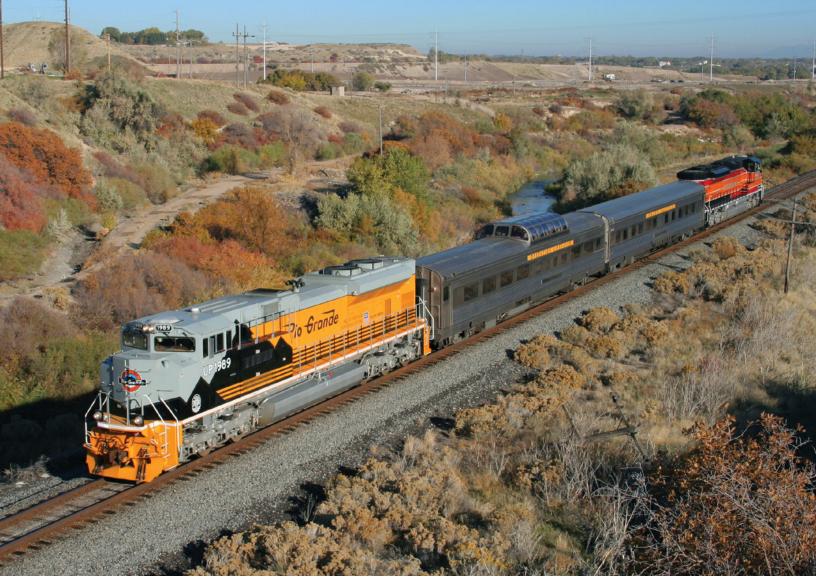
September of that year for a community event. Sadly, UP has since disconnected the house track, so no more visiting Heritage units for us.

#### The Prototype

I wrote about this SD70ACe in my review of Broadway Limited Imports' (BLI) previous Paragon 3 model in MODEL RAILROAD NEWS' May 2020 edition, so I'll summarize the prototype and UP fleet information here. As the next step in Electro-Motive Division's (EMD) SD70 Series, the ACe was the embodiment of lessons learned from SD80, SD90, and SD90/43MAC platforms, which had limited success with few buyers. The goal was to create

a locomotive equally suited for unit train, manifest, or intermodal service. This versatility appeals to many users, who have deployed locomotives in a host of services, and even at the head of special passenger or business trains since 2004. A total of 2,091 of the six-axle, 4,300-hp SD70Ace were constructed by EMD through 2015, with Progress Rail assuming later production. While successful at Tier 2 emission levels, the failure of the EMD 16-cylinder 710-G3-2 stroke prime mover to meet the EPA's Tier 4 emissions regulations ended production, and there is now a SD70ACe-T4 compliant model offered by Progress Rail.

Union Pacific was the second railroad to purchase SD70ACe locomotives (CSX was the first) and owned the largest number of them (just shy of 700 units), including the first

with just shy of 700 units, including the first to be preserved – UP 4141 at the George H.W. Bush Presidential Library and Museum in Texas, after it led the late president's funeral train in December 2018. Union Pacific 1989 was built in August 2006, from order 20056723 (serial/frame number 20056723-98) as part of a large order of SD70ACes and was intended to have been road number 8521. It was sent to the Horicon, Wis., paint facilities of Wisconsin & Southern where it was painted and then wrapped for a reveal in Denver, Colo., in June 2006. It was

released for service and has been seen all over UP's system, including as the helper on the Denver Post's "Chevenne Frontier Days" rodeo special behind steam locomotive 844 in 2016, and more recently behind Big Boy 4014 and SD70M 4015 in 2021. After many years of use, the original paint on the fleet of heritage units was getting worn and weathered, and Union Pacific sent them to National Railway & Equipment in Mt. Vernon, Ill., for repainting in 2017. The need for cosmetic attention was especially evident with UP 1989, as it was sporting a dark gray plow for most of 2016.

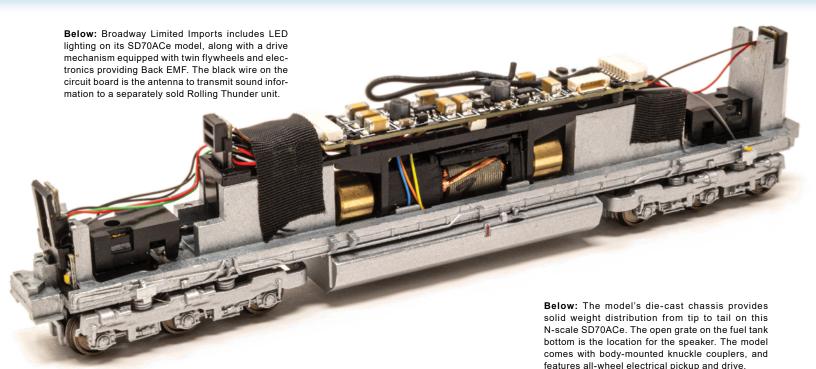
#### The Model - Paragon 4 Upgrade

The biggest change from Broadway Limited Imports with this run is under the hood — with an upgraded Paragon 4 dual-mode sound and Digital Command Control (DCC) decoder installed on all units. Broadway Limited Imports' well-proportioned and hefty N-scale

SD70ACe model, introduced in 2019, remains sharp looking. An oversized, friction-fit jewel case with foam safely ensconces the model, with dense foam planks behind the handrails to help keep their shape, and a non-stick sheet of clear plastic keeping the details from hanging up on the foam.

Appropriately placed warning labels around the engine are legible under magnification, and the correct K5LLA horn is placed with four bells forward and one to the rear - providing the distinctive horn that Nathan developed for these units. Separately applied MU hoses and coupler cut levers enhance the pilots, and sunshades and the light gray GPS and Qualcomm transmitters on the cab roof are well done. Couplers are a Micro-Trains compatible magnetic knuckle coupler, and the height was found to be satisfactory on this sample.

The color selection on UP 1989 looks spot on when compared to my recollection and clean photos of the

unit — and the Grande Gold really pops against the shell gray and black found elsewhere on the unit, and then tied together with the silver trucks and underbody. The overall matte finish looks good and is ready to operate in clean condition or provides a good base for weathering. Advertised with a die-cast chassis, precision drive train, and integral decoder with back EMF (electromotive force) for enhanced low speed performance, the 1:160 reproduction tips the scales at 3.6 ounces. Our SD70ACe was at home with 25 cars on our undulating Kato Unitrack test loop, and also performed well with 40 cars on a T-Trak layout. All cars were weighted within tolerance of NMRA specifications and had metal wheelsets. All six wheelsets of the unit passed the NMRA Mark IV standards gauge for flange placement.

Hitting the DCC test track, it was easy to reprogram the engines away from the 03 default setting and to the

respective cab numbers. Broadway Limited includes a small information sheet in the case, but also includes instructions to download a more thorough PDF instruction sheet. A quick test on DC confirmed that while it does indeed work fine after the address change, DCC is where it's at with these factory-equipped Paragon 4 locomotives.

In DCC mode, the startup sequence includes ballast crunching, a door closing, priming of the engine, and start-up. The horn and bell volume were adequate at the factory settings for our tastes. Throttle response was sluggish at first but improved over time as the unit ran. Current pickup seems enhanced on this SD70ACe compared to past BLI products I've had, perhaps due to improved pickup, truck suspension design, and better decoder capacitor "keep alive" technology and utilization. I ran this Paragon 4 unit side by side with a previously

released Paragon 3 SD70ACe and the performance was comparable enough that no exception was taken, and they behaved fine together when consisted.

BLI cites a few Paragon 4 upgrade benefits on its website, and they were readily apparent in UP 1989 - improved capacitance is the biggest aid in the performance of the locomotive, up to three times the ability of a Paragon 3 through different hardware on the board. Sound-equipped engines require stable continuity or adequate capacitance to navigate any power distribution issues in trackwork, and this additional capacity is helpful! Switcher and Pro Mode lighting allow for additional fidelity of these functions, where applicable, on BLI's Paragon 4 units, granting enhanced slow speed operation and independent operation of auxiliary lighting features. In the past, to attain better performance out of older version Paragon releases, I used an extended break-in period to clean and reduce the chemical blackening residue off the tread of the wheels, and added a small amount of No-Ox to each wheelset journal to enhance pickup capability and overall performance - this negated any previous issues those units had with dead spots. I'm happy to report that this same level of effort is not required with any of the Paragon 4 units. For users of BLI's "Rolling Thunder" sound amplification system, these units also have a wireless antenna, required to transmit signal to the receiver. The headlight and ditch light brightness issue I cited with the previous release of Paragon 3 units is also better this time around; perhaps the light tube placement was enhanced.

The class of 2022 from BLI with Paragon 4 DCC-sound offers standard livery BNSF; Norfolk Southern (NS); Quebec, North Shore & Labrador; and Union Pacific with two road numbers per road name. Special paint SD70ACe offerings include UP heritage Chicago & North Western, Missouri-Kansas-Texas, Missouri Pacific, Rio Grande, Southern Pacific, and Western Pacific. NS heritage collectors will find Delaware, Lackawanna & Western and Wabash in this release, and Canadian National's recent Grand Trunk Western heritage is included by BLI. Montana Rail Link's Veterans Tribute and Essential Workers

Tribute are available; UP's "Powered By Our People" and "Spirit of the Union Pacific" are included in the release, and the KCS Veterans Day Salute unit is back. As these P3 and P4 releases have landed close together, be aware of stock numbering when searching for these models, the 2022- issued Paragon 4 SD70ACe models appear to share 7000-series stock numbering (7020 through 7041). MRN

## Diners East, West, and Canadian Centralia Car Shops from InterMountain Railway

recent delivery from Inter-Mountain Railway Co. is a new production of N-scale dining car models marketed under the Centralia Car Shops (CCS) brand. The road name variety is wide and there are multiple styles to the car sides (window placement and door access point). This review will share a trio of examples covering both ends of the U.S. and Canada. The focal point of many roads' passenger service was their dining car – and Centralia Car Shops' recent release of Eastern- and Western-plan dining cars covers what was the last great re-equipping that many flagship trains received in the postwar years, prior to the end of private service and the formation of Amtrak.

The Eastern-plan car is based on a New York Central (NYC) series-440 built both by Pullman-Standard and Budd that possessed 48 seats and the unique half-vestibule on the dining room end. For dining cars in the late 1940s and early 1950s, 36 to 48 seats in any combination of table or booth seating were common, and many carriers adjusted interiors of their cars with regional themes to better complement routes and cuisine offerings. On longer-distance, multiple-night Western trains, more pantry and kitchen space were necessary because of the duration of the trip, which is apparent in the Southern Pacific (SP) plan, on which the Western-plan car model was based. Additionally, underbody skirting was a fad for a while, but fell to the wayside when it impaired

access to undercarriage maintenance items or caused a clearance concern (looking at you NYC with third rail for electrics and tight curves).

NYC 446 was part of lot 7547, built by Pullman in 1948 to plan 2188 and was one of seven cars. The 446 was retired in June 1966; I found no disposition reference, so I am presuming it was scrapped. Sister car 444 was sold to Ringling Bros. & Barnum and Bailey Circus, while 442 and 445 were listed as being sold to Edwards, a railcar brokerage firm, and 445 ended up in service on Mexico's NdeM in the 1970s. This model follows this NYC prototype and looks stunning in two-tone gray with silver trim.

Canadian National (CN) 1346 was built in 1954 by Pullman-Standard as a 32-seat diner-lounge; the 1337–1350 series cars were later reconfigured to 40-seat dining room capacity. The kitchen appliances were a combina-

tion of electric and pressed wood fired, later retrofitted for propane once safety canisters were found to be suitable for use under the car. These cars were built late enough in the passenger service game that CN was able to institute features that would attract and retain customers enjoying tasty cuisine while traveling through beautiful scenery - the roast prime rib of beef was a CN signature entree. This car, aside from not having full skirts, makes a very reasonable stand-in for this series in CN's later light gray and black scheme.

Southern Pacific 10206 was built in 1949 and originally named "Golden Chalice" for use on the jointly operated (with Rock Island) Golden State train from Chicago to Los Angeles. It would have originally been delivered in the bright orange and silver Golden State scheme before getting SP's later general service "tomato stripe" scheme. Sister car "Golden Trencher" has been restored and is on display at the Mendota Depot Museum in Mendota, Ill., in Golden State colors. These SP dining cars lasted into service with Amtrak.

On to the details, Centralia Car Shops' fine line of models is based around the American Limited core kit that initially allowed modelers to have end sheets, roof, and underbody on which a variety of unique sides could be affixed; this approach lends itself to having multiple varieties of a car with regionally correct attributes. The Eastern dining cars don't have full skirts, while the Western dining cars have a steam vapor air conditioning access hatch on the roof, along with different kitchen exhausts and vents for each respective style. The





assembled models come packaged in a clear plastic nest that slides inside a durable cardboard box.

The window details are most apparent on the CN car, where the aluminum thermopane window frames are highlighted in silver against the black stripe on the window band area, and all three cars have a strip of shade material visible in the top of the windows. The interior of the cars is molded in a neutral beige color, which can be painted in the interior color scheme if additional detailing is desired — highlighting white tabletops and darker chairs would really make these pop thanks to the factory-installed interior lighting. CCS offers these cars with battery-powered interior lighting, and a magnetic wand is included to operate the reed switch at the "A" or non-vestibule end of the cars. Two of the three samples lit without issue, while one appeared to have a failed battery. CCS offers detailed instructions for changing out the battery if your car is not lighting up.

The cars roll on Micro Trains 1017 inside swing hanger trucks with InterMountain Railway's 36-inch fine-profile metal wheelsets (all passed the NMRA Mark IV gauge). Coupler height was acceptable on all three models, and they tip the scale at 1.6 ounces each. There is an adjustment slide and screw on each truck and coupler box that allows for optimal settings based on your layout curvature and to make use of the operating diaphragms on the end of each car (this feature is based on the American Limited kit design). Separately applied wire grab irons are found on the roof for car cleaners, ladders, car corners, end sheets, service, and vestibule doors, as well as etched steps on the Eastern car. Underbody details are more visible on the Eastern version, but are also present on the skirted Western car, and include propane bottle and battery boxes, water tank, amplidyne for DC electrical supply, air conditioning, air brakes, and reservoir tanks, as well as other mechanical refrigeration and storage boxes.

This is the road's general service appearance (labeled Sunset Limited by the manufacturer) with a silver finish all over the body and thin red "tomato stripe" running across the sides above the windows. There are three more SP offerings, which include an Overland two-tone gray, City of San Franciscol Union Pacific pool Armour Yellow and gray, and Golden State red and silver. InterMountain Railway Co. distributes these \$59.95 Centralia Car Shops dining car models.

Centralia Car Shops offers these models in a host of roads and various era schemes, often with two names or road numbers where applicable: Amtrak (Phase I), Baltimore & Ohio, Illinois Central, New York Central (20th Century Limited and postwar two-tone gray), Norfolk & Western (Tuscan Red), Pennsylvania Railroad ("Fleet of Modernism" and threestripe livery), and Union Pacific on the Eastern-plan dining car. Rounding out the release on the Western-plan dining car are Amtrak (Phase I), Burlington Northern (Cascade Green with white "hockey stick"), Canadian National, Chicago & North Western, Great Northern (orange and green

scheme and later era "Big Sky Blue"), Northern Pacific, and four different Southern Pacific schemes: Golden State, Overland two-tone gray, Sunset Limited general service silver with tomato stripe, and Union Pacific City of San Francisco pool. Check with your hobby dealer for stock on these N-scale dining car models. I don't think there has ever been a better time to be an N-scale passenger train modeler! MRN

# Low-Slung with Lots of Hatches and Bays Broadway Limited's N-scale H32 Covered Hopper

This interesting prototype first entered Broadway Limited Imports' (BLI) line in HO, and now Pennsylvania (PRR) and Penn Central fans can now enjoy this unique H32-class five-bay hopper car in N scale. It is based on Pennsylvania's 1948-built, 3,068-cubic-foot, plan H32 five-bay car. The model rides on American Steel Foundries "Ride Control" type A-3 trucks, stands only 11 feet 7 inches tall, and has a distinctive profile different from the smaller Pennsy three-bay H30 previously released by Fox Valley Models, and different from about any other hopper car prototype.

A 70-ton rated car, this fleet had various loading instructions for the density of the commodities being handled, which included cement, lime, sand, sodium nitrate, soda ash, and pulverized coal. This hopper car was owned and built by Pennsy with 300 examples in service by the early days of diesels and the end of steam in the 1950s. BLI satisfies the many PRR decorations with several offerings and adds later era Penn Central and Conrail offerings. In addition, there is a range of fantasy paint schemes. The model is sold in pairs only (retailing for \$54.99). This review examines BLI's Penn Central release and a fantasy offering decorated for The Milwaukee Road.

Broadway Limited's Penn Central set has one hopper car model in Jade Green (PC 884591) and one in gray (PC 885554); these are prototypical cars with verifiable photos of fleet members that made it into these schemes. The cars have different styles of lettering and graphics for each livery, and the green car looks stunning with Penn Central spelled out in white and placed high across the hopper sides. These models are correct for later Penn Central era

like Wabash or Norfolk & Western, these H32 hoppers remained in the PRR family. BLI moves beyond the prototypes and offers six railroads and two leaser decorations for its H32 covered hopper model in N scale.

(1970s) and early Conrail based on the 2-69 and 6-72 service dates on the gray and green cars, respectively.

The Milwaukee Road set looks exciting in later era yellow and gray billboard schemes without railroad herald or slogan. Road numbers 98773 (gray) and 98776 (yellow) are presented as fantasy cars (labeled as such by BLI) but make nice stand-in cars in this representation. The dates on these Milwaukee Road hopper cars make them useful in the late 1960s through to the end of the road's existence.

Broadway Limited's model has some fantastic details including etched-metal brakeman platform, roofwalks between the 14 roof hatches, separate and freestanding corner grab irons at the top of







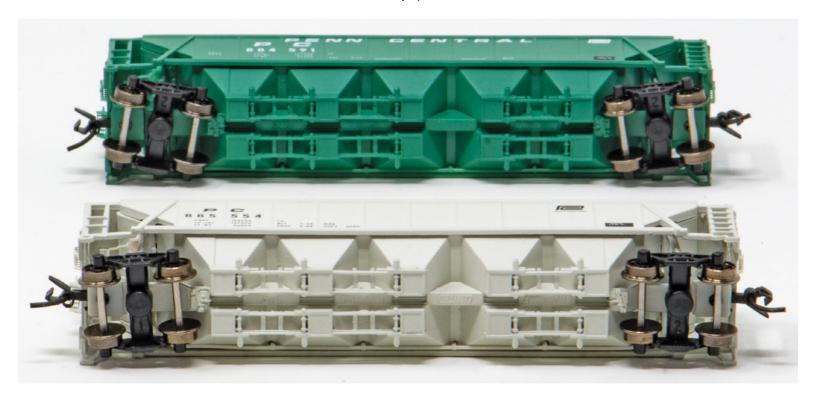
the ladders, free-standing brake pipe, hopper gate details, and the prototypes canted stirrup steps. BLI's mid-profile 33-inch metal wheelsets all passed the NMRA Mark IV gauge, and the models weigh in at .7 ounces each, a smidge light for NMRA specifications for a three-inch car. BLI utilized its own magnetic knuckle coupler for this body-mounted application, and they were spot on with respect to height. These are really neat cars and the fantasy schemes BLI selected are done in a bold and bright manner based on similar hopper cars of each owner or road, yet also have a Lionel or Menard's feel to them (you'll likely know this hopper as well from its Ogauge incarnations that come in many

colorful schemes).

The model is available from Broadway Limited Imports in no less than six different prototypical Pennsylvania Railroad schemes, and single sets decorated for Penn Central and Conrail. This covered hopper is available in fantasy schemes for Atlantic Sugar (with CGLX reporting marks), FMC Chemicals (with SHPX reporting marks), Chesapeake & Ohio, Canadian Pacific, Great Northern, The Milwaukee Road, Santa Fe, and Union Pacific. With the exception of BLI's Pennsy pairs, every two-pack offering presents variety with the same road decorated in different looks (like The Milwaukee Road's set with a yellow and gray hopper car). 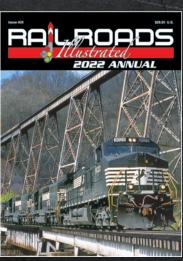

# Innovative and Unique High Cube from Lionel in O-scale

Tull transparency, I'm a big Ford enthusiast. There's not a Thunderbird I don't like (even that early 1980s Fox-platform generation), and don't bring up Lincoln or I'll talk your ear off about wishing I had a Mark V (see my review of Auto World's S-scale replica in this edition), how I'm on the lookout for a good condition Mark LT pickup for railfanning needs, or even justifying the merits of the overdressed Ford Granada that was the infamous Lincoln Versailles. That said, when Lionel announced this one-ofkind high-cube boxcar, I immediately reserved one. My interest in O-gauge is mostly collecting interesting offerings, though I do have a box of Lionel's 3-rail O-gauge roadbed track and I do set this up and run some big toy trains. Lionel's catalogs (thankfully available as digital downloads, so I don't ruin them with drool) are always a treat to page through. As I write this high-cube review, the second volume of 2022's "Big Book" catalog is just out. Be sure

to go to Lionel's website and take a look. I especially recommend checking out the coming O-gauge SD40T-2 "Tunnel Motors" which will include a Western Pacific release... wow!

#### Ford's Big Boxcar

The years after World War II saw a great many changes in North American railroading. The biggest move was the retirement of steam and adoption of diesel locomotives, but equally important was the evolution of and innovation in rolling stock. No longer was it okay for the general service 40-foot sliding door boxcar to haul everything from raw grain to finished automobiles. Specialized freight cars boomed in the 1950s, and the developments refined themselves by the mid/ late 1960s into the freight cars that served out the second half of the 20th century and today.

In an effort to enhance movement of components used in automobile manufacture, Ford Motor Company put out a call for a large freight car that could serve to handle auto parts and the transport containers they planned to use in shipment. The 86-foot high-cube boxcar was the result. In the early 1960s this excess-height giant entered railroading and along with then-new long autoracks changed the way automobile transport was accomplished by railroads.

**Above:** American Car & Foundry was there first, but didn't stay in the game. As sometimes happens, ACF built a prototype high-cube boxcar in conjunction with Ford Motor Company and the railroads represented on this big orange car; however, other freight car builders answered the 1960s call for high cubes and ACF's effort was this ACFX 101 only.

Ford worked with St. Louis-area based American Car & Foundry (ACF) and Wabash, Southern Pacific, and Louisville & Nashville on a prototype 86-foot high cube that was ready for evaluation in 1963. ACFX 101 helped show this plan for a big boxcar was a winner, though ACF didn't go on to build these cars. Other car builders assembled high cubes (in mostly this four-door configuration with a minority selection of eight doors in the mix) in the late 1970s. They remain somewhat common today and can be seen handling shipment of appliances.

#### Lionel's Big Boxcar

If the mention of Lionel or O-gauge conjures up visions of toy trains and reproductions that take some liberties here and there with proportions, you may need to pay more attention to the manufacturer's line. This 86-foot high-cube boxcar model is no "toy train" release. The only area I can flag as not being scale are the wheels and provided coupler (both can be modified to scale by the way). Lionel's high cube reproduces Pullman-Standard's four-door prototype. The exposed

There is a coming Ford boxcar in Lionel's 2022 Big Book Volume II catalog that you can customize with a picture of your own favorite Ford.

posts running along the lower frame are spotting features of this builder's high cubes. The plastic shell measures out accurately and includes separate ladders, end details (including crossover platform), and detailed door rods. The nearly two-foot-long model comes in Lionel's familiar orange box with a two-piece inner tray securing the boxcar. With this model, Lionel supplies deep-flange metal wheels and working kinematic couplers. The coupler design allows the arm to extend around curves and then snug back up in straight sections for optimal appearance and performance. Included in the box, you'll find plastic cushioned draft gear pockets. The underframe has openings ready to accept mounting screws to secure these

replacement coupler pockets to the body. The truck sideframes are excellent looking and scale-proportioned roller bearing examples that will accept scale wheels and axles. Swapping out the deep flanges for scale, and removing the provided talgo-style coupler and installing a scale knuckle in the provided extended draft gear, makes an easy conversion for this fine-looking replica into a scale O operational freight car or great display piece for your mantel or desk. Lionel's paint application was perfect on this sample with even, smooth orange sharing the large canvas with silver on the roof and doors. Though this is not ACF's high cube, the decoration does the job in creating this unique and important piece of railroading history.

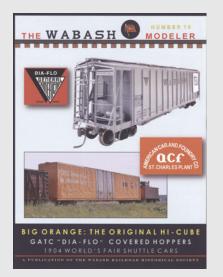

#### Conclusion

If you're like me and dabble in O mostly for the wow factor and to use for display, this is a gem of a release! The model carries a \$99.99 suggested retail price. Lionel's efforts at road names cover these giant auto parts haulers with looks from the 1960s with big heralds and billboard lettering, to contemporary and more conservative decoration (there are also some factoryapplied graffiti offerings). MRN

# Railroading 220 Times Smaller Than Real Size Sampling American Z Line's Z-scale

any model train enthusiasts claim they don't have enough space for a layout. Answering that challenge is the growing world of Z scale... models reproduced 220 times smaller than actual size.

American Z Line is a major force in Z scale and seems to be always releasing something new for its catalog. A

quick glance down the company's website listing for locomotives found around 20 prototypes included with both steam and diesel... and even a diesel hydraulic (Germany's Krauss-Maffei as a brass Z-scale offering) on the roster. From this review's first-generation F-unit to today's ES44AC GEVO, American Z Line covers many bases for motive power. The steam is especially intriguing in this tiny scale... Union Pacific's "Big Boy" 4-8-8-4 steam locomotive and Southern Pacific's AC-12 Cab Forward are among the line's steam. The company's rolling stock is a solid partner to its locomotives, with freight car selections that range from steam/ early diesel era to contemporary autoracks and coil cars. Passenger equipment includes heavyweight and streamlined cars, as well as Amtrak Superliners.

American Z Line supports its line with an online forum that is well organized and easy to access from the hobby company's main website. The forum includes "Knowledge Base"

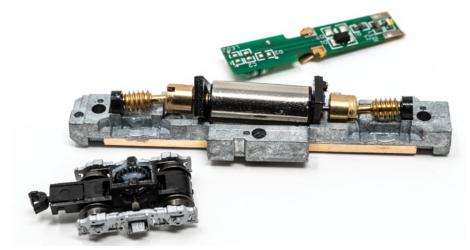

and "Labs" sections that will answer many newcomer questions regarding the line and this scale in general.

My experience and exposure to Z scale is limited and this F7A was the first time I'd really inspected a piece of 1:220 motive power. I could not resist disassembling this model to see its drive and electronics. I did not expect to be overly impressed. I see American Z Line offerings on a regular basis in product announcements provided to Model Railroad News. These all look appealing, but I did not appreciate the quality until I handled this Santa Fe F7A sample and a group of freight cars (which MRN will share in a future edition). The detail is excellent on the plastic F7 body shell and paint and lettering is comparable to better N and HO releases. If space is a concern or the allure of these tiny trains captures your fancy, American Z Line is a company to investigate. Whether to simply collect or to operate (imagine how much Z would fit on a typical 4 x 8 layout), there something to see in tiny Z. MRN

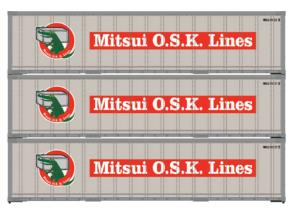

# Make a Mark on Your Pike

# Auto World's 1977 Lincoln Mark V in S scale

Tere's an automobile category that doesn't get enough attention... the personal luxury car. Round 2's Auto World brand recently debuted a new casting that brings Lincoln's impressive Mark V to 1:64 (S scale) and what a welcome addition this sleek replica is for the car enthusiast and lucky S scaler.

For years, these two-door cars were plentiful in the North American market (and on rare occasion four-doors were offered). Every car builder had one or more vehicles to sell in this segment; even American Motors dressed up its Matador for a few years in the 1970s and played in the game. Ford can be credited with helping establish the personal luxury car with its mid-1950s Thunderbird. Ford's Lincoln

and Continental names (which were not always one and the same) set another bar with the Mark series. The first Mark (shown in the background on the advertising image on the facing page) was out ahead of World War II; because of the conflict and the death of Edsel Ford, this concept wouldn't see a second offering until the Mark II in the early 1950s. There is much to the history; a string of Marks followed the Mark II and, confusingly, saw branding with successive numbers, though this was swept aside and forgotten in the late 1960s with the coming of Lincoln's Mark III. From here the generational cycle progressed with Mark IV in the early 1970s, followed by this sharpedged Mark V that served the line from 1977 through 1979. A similar looking, though downsized, Mark VI came in 1980 and the sleek aero styling Mark VII brought some "hot rod" back to Lincoln for the later era Marks that wrapped up around 2000 with the Mark VIII. The retro Thunderbird had a concept Mark X that Lincoln didn't bring to buyers, but three-letter naming took a cue with

This big car came standard (except for California models) with a 400-cubic-inch V8 and the larger 460 V8 was an option. While these engines sound impressive, emissions and economy concerns tamed this power to 179-hp (400 V8) and 208 hp (460 V8).

"MK" leading in the labeling in recent years (MKX, MKZ, and even MKT... though sadly not offered in Deramus Red or Whitman Green with yellow). There was even a Mark LT pickup truck for a few years. Back to the late 1970s and this magnificent Mark V; this was as big as they got with a length just a tad shorter than the four-door Lincoln Continental of these same years. Lincoln lavished these Marks with a special "designer series" with exterior and interior treatments courtesy of famed fashion and style icons like Cartier (who supplied the clocks for all

Lincolns), Gucci, and others. Despite its thirst (10 miles per gallon was doing well and you could carry 26 gallons in its tank), buyers ignored gas concerns and made this series a popular one with more than 80,000 sold in its debut year of 1977 (up from 56,000 copies of 1976's Mark IV); the successor years for this generation remained above 70,000 for 1978 and 1979. This Mark V could be yours in the late 1970s for a bit more than \$10,000... with a well-appointed example pushing \$15,000.

Auto World's die-cast 1:64 Mark V replica comes fully assembled and includes free-rolling rubber tires, plastic interior, and clear plastic window material. The tires include whitewalls riding on turbine-style hubs that are chrome with black center caps.



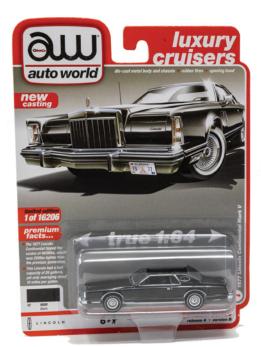




The metal body does an excellent job reproducing this mighty Lincoln with measurements for length and wheelbase matching the prototype well. The hood opens, and the fit is excellent with a very modest gap visible... in fact, I employed a hobby knife to ease in and lift the hood for the picture included with this review and I couldn't get a fingernail in the opening. The paintwork accents bumpers, taillights, turn signals, cornering lamps, body side molding, and more. The Lincoln "star-cross" emblem is present on the opera window, script Continental is on the driver's side headlight cover up front, and expanded out Continental rings the fake spare tire hump on the back. The only missing details I note are rearview mirrors, radio antenna, and hood ornament (though admittedly these would be very fragile even in 1:64). The interior (color matched on these samples) is plastic with seats, dash, and steering wheel. A second Auto World run provides a 1978 (nearly the same car) in black and gold editions. Those fortunate S-scale hobbyists get so many great automobile models! MRN

These Mark V models must not have 460s under their hoods (as that engine came with dual exhaust versus this model's single tailpipe).

# Yellowbonnet turns 50



This edition of Model Railroad News provides reviews on LGB's G-scale and American Z Line's Z-scale F7A decorated for Santa Fe. This famous livery enjoys a 50th anniversary for a variant of its scheme this year. It was during summer 1972 when Santa Fe introduced, or I should more accurately state, reintroduced its Warbonnet livery with a blue with yellow design officially dubbed by the railroad as "Yellowbonnet." With the handing over of its passenger operations in 1971 to Amtrak, Santa Fe's image was officially its blue with yellow (often called "bookends"

livery) and the Warbonnet went largely out of use. Some red-and-silver F-units still carried the colors and passenger F-units saw some curious and unique attempts to trade red and silver for blue and/or yellow. But the look that is arguably railroading's most famous face appeared to be heading toward retirement.

Luckily, the sweeping curves of the Warbonnet design made a comeback in 1972 and remained Santa Fe's dress (in blue with yellow bonnet and large yellow road name) for the rest of the road's independent existence. And in the 1990s, the road's then-president

Mike Haverty, appreciating the value of the look, brought back red and silver for SuperFleet equipment.

I got to debating during this issue's production what HO models were first to replicate the Yellowbonnet. I credit Bachmann (GP40 and U36B shown above) and TYCO (F9A shown below) as arriving first, not long after the 1972 debut of this livery. These releases were uncommon, with red-and-silver Santa Fe locomotive models remaining plentiful from these and other companies. Do you remember your first Yellowbonnet locomotives? MEN

Before the development of the Pullman Standard PS-2, it was common practice to transport granular materials such as feed, cement, and sand in bags stacked inside boxcars. This meant that valuable space was lost, and while the bags could easily be unloaded for smaller customers, the process would be cumbersome for customers requiring bulk deliveries. Pullman Standard changed all this in the late 1940s by providing a car that could be top-loaded, filled to its maximum capacity, and emptied from underneath, effectively revolutionizing bulk transportation. Bachmann's newest two-bay design is based on later examples of this car seen from the 1970s through to the present day, which primarily hauled cement and sand for both revenue customers and in maintenance service.
