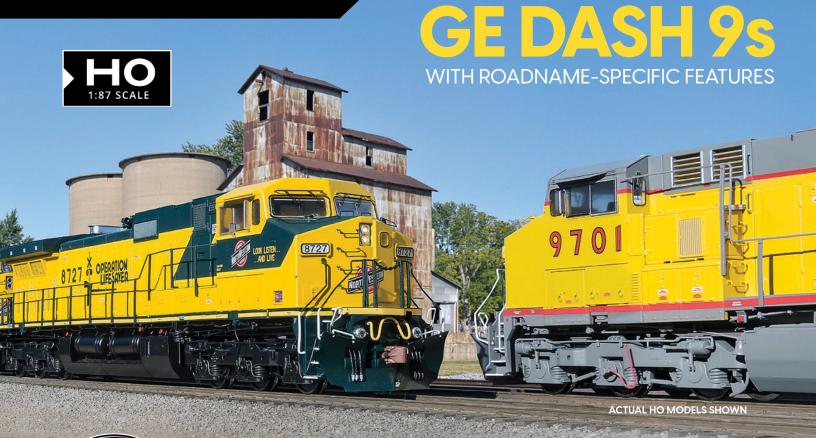

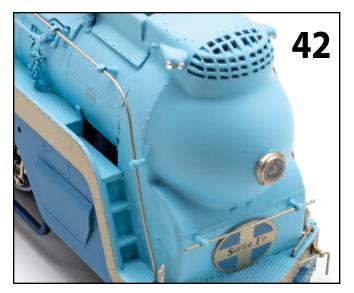

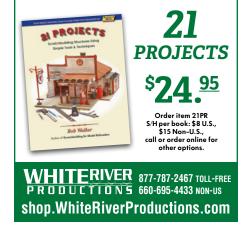

# AVAILABLE SOON SUPERDOME PASSENGER CARS

In the early 1950's, Pullman developed a new "full-length" dome design for the Milwaukee Road. It featured an 80-foot long dome level seating 68, almost triple that of the Vista Dome. Unlike Vista Dome seats, these seats reclined a bit. Ten of these new "Super Domes" arrived on Milwakee Road property in late 1952 from Pullman. Chosen via an employee naming contest, B.H. Perlick won by suggesting the name "Super Domes". Rejected suggestions included "Master Dome", "Ultra Dome", and "Panorama Dome".

In 1964, the Canadian National purchased six Super Domes from the Milwaukee Road. The CN called them "Sceneramic" cars and placed them in service on the Super Continental. VIA Rail inherited all six and used them into the early 1980s. They were then sold off to private owners. Amtrak leased, and then bought, the Milwaukee Road's four remaining Super Domes. The cars were on many routes including the San Francisco Zephyr and Coast Starlight. Amtrak sold all four in the late 1970s. They acquired three cars from Tour Alaska in 1990 and operated them through 1995. The North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) acquired former No. 53 in 1996 and used it on the Piedmont before selling it in 2005.

initial releases and he stated the hill to climb for the path toward this edition. Another positive communicator is ScaleTrains' Shane Wilson. He recently appeared with a video update wishing Happy Holidays, while surrounded by open boxed HO-scale SD38-2 models. His news was the unfortunate situation of striking the majority of roads in the first release (see page 00) and having them produced again for better quality. No one desires to be in that place, but doing so and getting out ahead of rumors and unconfirmed reports is necessary in today's market. Thanks for making this publication part of your hobby communications.

### THINGS WE'RE DOING

Regular contributor Randall Pratt works in the entertainment production industry, doing lighting and sound for live productions across the country. He has spent the last few months working for Rail Event Productions with Producer Mike May, a fellow White River Productions contributor, to build "The Polar Express Train Ride" (raileventsinc.com/polar-expresstrain-ride) Randall leads the stage lighting team as its Production Electrician, installing lighting in the train cars and on the platforms to create a magical trip to the North Pole based on the classic holiday story The Polar Express by Chris Van Allsburg. It's a fully interactive experience complete with Christmas lights, dancing stewards, hot chocolate, the hobo, Santa, and the first gift of Christmas: a silver bell. The preparation process started in August with the first shows opening in late October and performing through the holiday season. Randall travels to all the locations to lead the build of the show and then hands the show off to the local team to operate for the season. If you are close to one of the locations where you can catch a ride, you just have to answer one question: Are you coming?

"The Polar Express Train Ride" is a fully produced hour-long musical train ride and found in four locations during

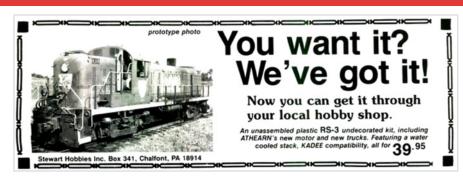
Bob Kenderdine shared news via email of the passing of Steve Stewart of Stewart Hobbies...

Steve Stewart, president of Stewart Hobbies, passed away on November 21, 2022. He was preceded in death by his wife, Theresa (Terry), in 2002 who served as Vice President of the hobby company.

Stewart Hobbies was incorporated on February 13, 1984, and manufactured HO-scale locomotives and freight cars for more than 20 years before selling its molds, dies, and inventory to Bowser Manufacturing.

Stewart's initial offering was an RS-3 kit, consisting of a plastic shell and metal frame that was designed to use Athearn parts. It was unveiled at the Dayton, Ohio, trade show, where Atlas and Model Die Casting/Roundhouse also announced HO-scale RS-3 models.

Innovative ideas allowed the com-



pany to survive the initial competition. Stewart expanded sales of his RS-3 by being the first company to offer different production phases, and did so in support of this Alco diesel switcher. Stewart was one of the first HO model locomotive manufacturers to use gray molded plastic for undecorated models (instead of black) for ease of painting, and also promoted the mass marketing of multiple road numbers for each paint scheme. The line's FT locomotive was among the first HO-scale models to use an LED as a headlight instead of an incandescent bulb.

In addition to his initial RS-3 offerings, Stewart's other HO-scale diesel

locomotives included: Alco's C-628 and C-630; Baldwin's AS-16, AS-616, RS-12, VO-660, VO1000, DS-4-4-1000, S-8, and S-12; Electro-Motive's FT, F3, F7, and F9; General Electric's U25B. HO freight cars produced by Stewart Hobbies included a 70-ton 3-bay hopper (with 12, 13, and 14 side panels), a 70-ton offset side 3-bay hopper, and 50-ton 2-bay fishbelly hoppers, along with a Pennsy G39-class ore car.

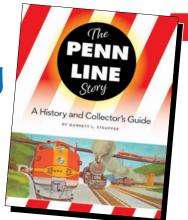

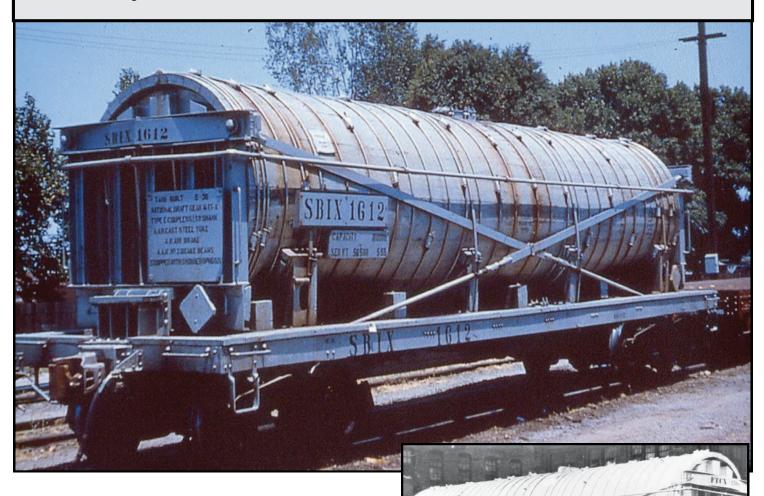

# Atlas announces all-new N-scale SD45 model will join Master Series



N - Atlas will add an Electro-Motive Division (EMD) SD45 diesel locomotive N-scale model to its collection of motive power options in the hobby company's Master Series. The first production is planned to ship in early 2024. The 1:160 reproduction will provide enthusiasts with a fully assembled example of this popular mid-1960s, six-axle diesel locomotive. EMD raised the horsepower stakes (from 3,000 to 3,600) with this flared-radiator revved up catalog option that joined the line in 1966. By the 1971 close of production, more than 1,000 examples were working for U.S. railroads.

As with other Master Series releases, this all-new N-scale SD45 will come in Gold edition with onboard Digital Command Control (DCC) and SoundTraxx Tsunami audio. Atlas' Silver edition SD45 will be sound ready with a factory-installed speaker as part of the mechanism design, and a plug available on the circuit board for easy decoder install for future conversion to DCC operation, if desired. The model will include directional golden-white LED lighting, blackened metal wheels,

and magnetic knuckle couplers. Details on road-specific features for this release indicate Southern Pacific releases will come with the road's familiar light package on the nose and the wide L-shaped windshield section. Norfolk & Western SD45s in this group will feature high short hoods with two road numbers (1730 and 1757) decorated for the early 1970s "NW" livery, and will include the road's Bicentennial 1776 special paint as an offering. Rio Grande SD45 illustrations show a nose headlight (though possibly not an exact match to prototype). Air horn style and placement appears to follow railroad practice, with Erie Lackawanna models sporting the low-mounted horns on the angled side of the cab roof. Other road names in the first production include a range of eras, from Pennsylvania Railroad (late 1960s) to 1970s Burlington Northern, on to secondhand owner Susquehanna represented by bright yellow with black ex-BN SD45s that operated beginning in the mid-1980s.

The Silver SD45s list for \$169.95, while DCC-sound Gold SD45 carry a \$279.99 retail price. Undecorated low-nose and high-nose SD45s will be offered in this run.

# Roka Prototype Models debuts with Safe-Pak in HO scale





HO — Roka Prototype Models is a new name in the hobby and has its first release available as 2023 begins. The offering is a highly detailed replica of an innovative 1970s fully enclosed auto rack railroad car – the Safe-Pak. The first Safe-Pak production went to work in the mid-1970s with many North American Class 1 railroads owning and operating examples. These cars served into the late 1990s transporting finished vehicles.

Featuring a newly developed process, Roka Prototype Models' Safe-Pak will include authentic-looking, seethrough body side panels made of plastic (avoiding challenges of fit and warpage encountered when this type of detail is attempted in metal). The model is arriving in the U.S. in January and those who reserved examples from Roka Prototype Models' website will be among the first to receive this interesting prototype turned into a high-quality HO-scale offering. The ready-to-run Safe-Pak will ride on metal wheels and comes with metal knuckle couplers. Road names include Canadian Pacific, CSX (Seaboard System logo), Florida East Coast, Norfolk & Western (black "NW" scheme and brown "Norfolk and Western" lettering scheme), Santa Fe (Indian Red and late-era Mineral Red with "Q" logo markings), Seaboard Coast Line, Seaboard System, and Western Pacific. There are multiple body style variants included in this

selection of road names with bi- and tri-level, low- and high-roof, and end doors featuring clam shell or tri-fold design (all presented accurately with respect to road names and liveries). There are multiple road numbers for the announced road names and body styles on this \$109.95 release.

Model Railroad News reported in May 2022's edition that American Limited would be bringing a Safe-Pak auto carrier to the HO market, this model is that project and it will be the first offering from this new company owned by Robert Stears (formerly of American Limited/San Juan Models).

## Kato's much-anticipated N-scale Big Boy is official with spring delivery announced

N - Kato's Alco 4-8-8-4 steam locomotive, best known by its "Big Boy" nickname, will be a reality in the near future for the company's N-scale collection. The project has been in development at Kato for some time, with hobbyists eager for official release information. The first offering will replicate Union Pacific 4014 in modern (post-2021) excursion appearance. The standard DC model (126-4014) carries a \$399 suggested retail price and will possess dual coreless motors with brass flywheels, and weights placed throughout the body (including the cylinder area) to provide balanced distribution for a smooth ride and strong pulling power. Kato's assembled Big Boy steam locomotive will include a tinted LED headlight, oil tender, graphite colored firebox, silver cylinder head and piston covers, builder's plate, gold details on the boiler, and more. The locomotive will navigate 11-inch radius curves and its articulated drivers will each pick up power from the railheads, as will the tender's wheels. Kato expects to ship its DC-version Big Boy during May, with DCC models (126-4014-DCC) and DCC-sound (126-4014-S) following in July. SoundTraxx electronics are listed for Kato's DCC-sound model.

# Roco adds Conrail rotary snow blower and more in HO



**HO** – Roco Trains' Beilhack rotary snow blower arrives with Conrail decoration for a new release (72804). This amazing model (see the review of a BNSF version in your July 2020 Model Railroad News) includes Digital Command Control for use on North American DC-style rails. The unit includes LED lighting, sound output, and an array of animated functions including spinning blades, and the ability to raise and lower the plow and turn the entire unit on its chassis by 180 degrees. The powered unit comes assembled and includes many separately applied details. This model is available from several North American hobby dealers, including TrainWorld (trainworld.com).

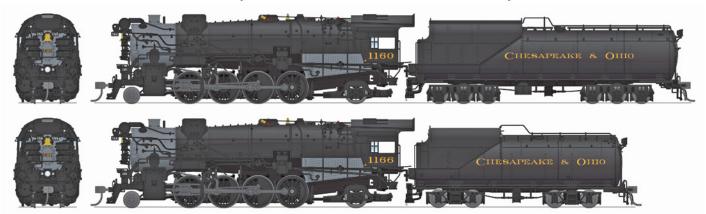

## **Spring will bring C&O K-2 Mikado** from Broadway Limited as Brass-Hybrid in HO



**HO** – March is the target delivery date for a new Broadway Limited Imports Brass-Hybrid series steam locomotive. This addition will replicate Chesapeake & Ohio's (C&O) K-2 class Mikado 2-8-2 steam locomotive. Alco-Richmond built C&O's K-1, K-2, and K-3 classes of Mikado-type motive power. The K-2s, which went to work in the 1920s, possessed a booster enhancing the prototype's tractive effort by 10 percent versus K-3 siblings. They were

considered Light Mikado and were common and popular C&O power for two decades operating freight and occasionally passenger trains. Broadway Limited's HO-scale K-2 Mikado (MSRP: \$899.99) will reproduce the protoype's appearance from the 1940s, with large Elesco feedwater heater and flying air pumps up front on the boiler face. The Vanderbilt-style tender matched up to these C&O Mikado steam locomotives included 12,000 gallons (12-VC) tenders

later upped to 16,000 gallons (16-VC) examples (the release will include both tender sizes). The smaller tender Mikado releases will include C&O's 1166, 1182, and 1194; large tenders accompany C&O 1160, 1168, 1177, 1196, and 1202. Painted and unlettered Brass-Hybrid Mikados will be offered for both tender sizes, while a brass finish release will come with the large tender.

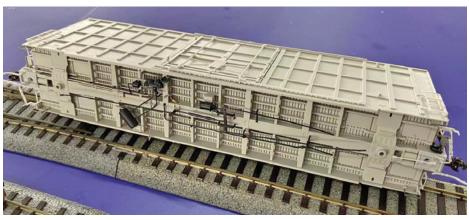

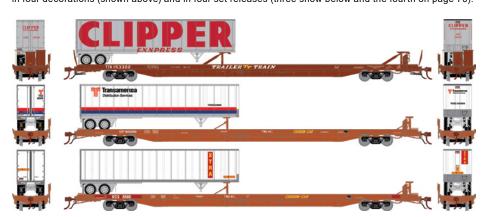

O – Though the company announced some time ago that much of its tooling assets sold (like its HO- and S-scale line to ScaleTrains and select O items to Atlas), MTH Electric Trains continues to deliver new products. 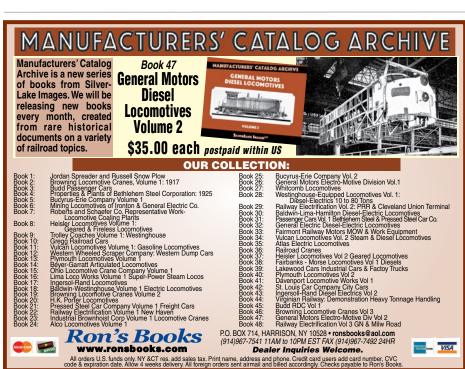

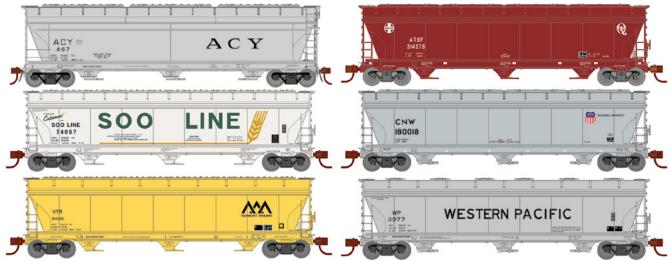








# New production coming for Athearn 4600 Covered Hopper in HO and N



**HO & N** – Athearn plans another production of its American Car & Foundry 4,600-cubic-foot-capacity CenterFlow model for early 2024 delivery. This covered hopper is a three-bay version and Athearn's tooling provides variation for three body styles. The manufacturer's illustrations (shown above) appear to show its Akron, Canton & Youngstown (gray hopper on top left with black ACY) as an early version (high-mounted brake wheel and horizontal side stiffener), while the other road names (Santa Fe, Soo Line, Union Pacific, Vermont Railway, and Western Pacific) share the model's post-1971 design elements of low-mounted brake details and double side stiffeners running across the upper sides of the hopper bay exterior. The release will offer two road numbers for ACY and Vermont Railway, while the other coming road names will have two individual road numbers and a three-pack set. The three road numbers in the set are different than numbers in the single model offerings allowing for a total of five unique road numbers for Santa Fe, Soo Line, Union Pacific (with CNW reporting marks), and Western Pacific. The retail for HO Genesis single cars is \$64.99 and \$164.99 for three-packs (a discount of \$29.98 versus the individual car's retail price); N-scale models list for \$39.99 with three-packs retailing for \$99.99.

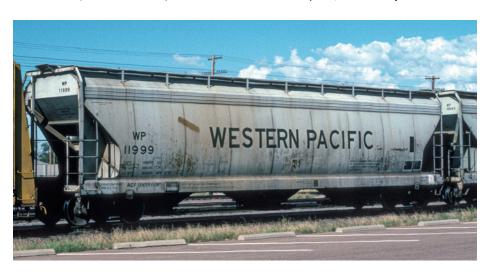

You will also find later era repaints (Canadian Pacific with MILW reporting marks, The Milwaukee Road, and Union Pacific with WP reporting marks) and an interesting patched Missouri Pacific offering. The model is expected to ship to hobbyists this spring, with several road names covering appearances for this PC&F boxcar from its mid-1970s arrival on the North American railroading scene to contemporary looks. 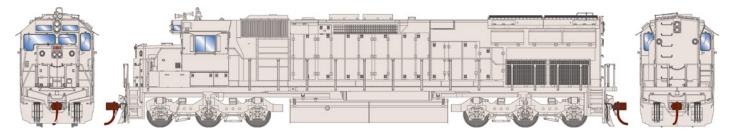

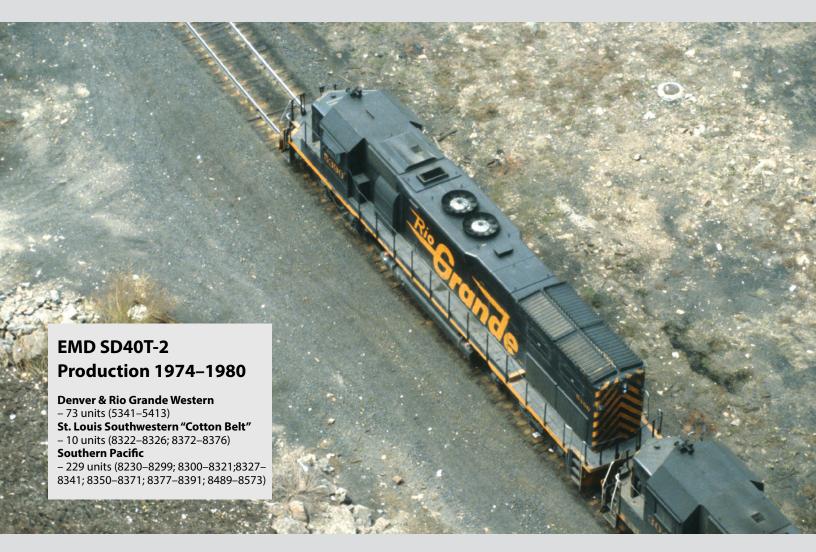

# **Beautiful Brass Goose**

## Broadway Limited's Santa Fe "Blue Goose"



4-6-4 Blue Goose steam locomotive with DCC, sound, and smoke

roadway Limited Imports' (BLI) is not the first HO rendition of Santa Fe's famous "Blue Goose" steam locomotive, but it is the newest and one of the best to date. This Brass-Hybrid 4-6-4 steam locomotive replica was produced during spring 2022 (this review sample is stamped August, 8, 2022 on its inner packaging, which is a neat inclusion for modelers and especially collectors) and it's a combination of brass, plastic, and other components. This is a reproduction of a one-of-a-kind locomotive, though BLI covers various looks for Santa Fe 3460 across its service life (1939 into the early 1950s). The run also presents

an unlettered brass finish Blue Goose (with as-delivered detail). There is also a trio of models BLI produced exclusively for two hobby dealers (Factory Direct Hobbies and TrainWorld) that I share information and views of at the conclusion of this review.

For those not wanting to have to make one goose fit various eras of operation, you'll find BLI covered no less than five versions (as-delivered with two lettering presentations on this edition's tender), early 1939, 1941, 1950, and 1951–1953 versions. The major spotting feature demarcation line is between the pair of as-delivered Blue Goose models and the other offerings, with those two

as-delivered models featuring wider skirting or shrouding covering the lead cylinder above the pilot trucks on the locomotive. The other versions (early 1939 through 1951-1953 models) lack this wider covering but receive a black smoke lifter extension not found on as-delivered replicas.

## The \$15,000 Streamline Package

According to Joseph A. Strapac in his Santa Fe Steam Compendium, Volume Two: Modern Locomotives, "Historians agree that the American steam locomotive reached its design zenith around 1937." This was the time when Santa Fe's 3460-class came into being.

Bought from Baldwin Locomotive Works, Santa Fe's order for six 4-6-4s (3460-3465) cost more than \$150,000 each, with the last to arrive (3460) coming with streamlined shrouding costing the road \$15,028 more than the standard setup of the other five 3460-class members. Similar to New York Central's 4-6-4-design Hudsontype, Santa Fe's 4-6-4s delivered in this 3460-class rank as both most powerful and largest of this wheel arrangement. Assignments for these locomotives included three hauling Santa Fe's Fast Mail service and the other pair of regular body 4-6-4s covering the Chief between Chicago and Kansas City. When the Blue Goose came at the beginning of 1939, the 3460-class reportedly moved to Chief runs between Chicago and La Junta, Colo. First operating at a top speed of 80 mph, this rule was revised to 90 mph east of Kansas City and 100 mph west of Kansas City to the southern Colorado town of La Junta. As diesels began taking priority assignments, this group of 4-6-4s bumped down to second section duty on Fast Mail trips, and pulled trains like Santa Fe's Antelope, California Limited, Grand Canyon Limited, and Scout. The Antelope (between Kansas City and Oklahoma City) appears to be the last regular passenger job for this class. As of the beginning of 1953, most found their new job was standing still in storage lines at Kansas City's Argentine Yard. A reprieve, thanks to special Boy Scout trains, put the group

back to work in mid-1953 with the last reported revenue run coming in late 1953, in a combined steam/diesel consist pulling the Ranger between Newton and Emporia in southern Kansas. Santa Fe's 3460 Blue Goose was brought back to life in early 1954 one last time for a cameo role in a publicity film marking the dieselization of the railroad. After its time under steam again and before movie cameras, 3460 was back in the storage line and not known to be fired again. Santa Fe's 3463 was spared from a sale of the 3460-class to a Kansas City-area scrapper in 1956. The Blue Goose 3460 along with 3461, 3462, 3464, and 3465 were cut up, while 3463 moved west for display in Topeka, Kan. The bulk of my research into the prototype was performed examining the mentioned Joseph A. Strapac Santa Fe Steam Compendium, Volume Two: Modern Locomotives published by the Santa Fe Railway Historical & Modeling Society (sfrhms.org) and reviewed in this edition of Model Railroad News. I also found S. Kip Farrington's 1972 book, The Santa Fe's Big Three: The Story of the World's Greatest Locomotives (David McKay Co., Inc.), a good reference; as is Lloyd Stagner's "Blue Goose and Kin" article included in the June 1985 edition of *Trains* magazine.

### **Blue Goose in Brass**

The appeal of a brass replica to a modeler is well-known, and is even more alluring to the ardent collector of all things HO scale. I certainly lean more toward collecting than serious operating but find Broadway Limited's Brass-Hybrid series speaks to both operators and collectors. A downside to many older, vintage brass pieces, especially steam locomotive efforts, was their less than appealing performance that could quickly spoil the love that their intricate and beautiful exteriors had kindled with their owner. Here's where a "best of both worlds" situation shows its strength in this series of BLI offerings. You receive an awesome brass replica and it rides on a reliable mechanism. Another benefit is the asking price. I would expect a traditional brass Blue Goose imported today to cost a minimum of two to three times the \$899.99 retail BLI places on this combination Brass-Hybrid HO release.

For this release, BLI provides a solid-performing mechanism (located over the drivers) with rubber traction tires covering the tread of the rear drivers for enhanced pulling power. The lighting is LED equipped and illumination begins with the headlight and continues down the boiler with the number boards lit (two per side, and separately controllable under digital operation). The cab interior includes lighting and the rear cab roof has a light (as did the prototype). The tender's back end includes a single red light mounted above the roofline. As part of BLI's recent Paragon 4 electronics enhancements, you'll discover the guide and a single sheet function





one-of-a-kind roster member. The dark blue wider upswept shrouding covering the cylinders and residing over the lead trucks near the front of the boiler is an as-delivered feature. Broadway Limited's model includes two lettering styles for this original appearance (with and without the white 3460 number on the tender sides), plus examples with less skirting and other changes providing model railroading enthusiasts with Blue Goose reproductions based on 1939, 1941, 1950, and 1951-1953 prototypical setup.

key listing have some variation in what they say each does. In addition, Paragon 4 provides a standard and professional mode that can make select functions and/or features perform a bit differently depending on the model selected. I also found found F18 controls the bright white light over the back of the locomotive cab and F20 will toggle on/off the red light on the tender, but neither of these lights functions in a traditional directional operation style. The only light feature I can find semi-lacking is the tiny classification lights on the top front of the boiler. These lights are represented

by jewels (which look fine), but some may feel with all the attention afforded the rest of the release's lights that this is a missed opportunity... though certainly not a big deal. The sound effects include more than whistle, bell, and chug-chug audio. Take the time to read over the included listing sheet and you'll be rewarded with sounds for multiple toots of the whistle automatically strung together and played by pressing F13; F24 reproduces a long-sounding whistle; and F22 toggles through whistle styles. Additional sound output includes station sounds (F14), yard radio chatter

(F15), maintenance crew chatter (F16), and more. The sound quality (emitted from two large round speakers aimed downward and sending sound out through grates in the tender floor) was good. This model includes a smoke unit and its delivery of oil-based smoke effect was the usual from BLI, and fine for those who appreciate it. I like that Broadway Limited includes smoke as an option (now on both HO steam and select diesel locomotive releases). You have two easy methods for control of smoke output. A function key (under Digital Command Control use) allows you to toggle smoke on and off. In

The forward pair of axles collects track power from the fireman's side; the rear tender's outer axles pull in current from the engineer's side of the model. BLI's recently revised excellent-design plastic coupler pocket is screw-mounted to the rear of the tender. Note there are two round speakers located in the tender center outputting through the floor.

You can remove the pilot truck by taking out the single screw securing it to the locomotive; on top of the pilot truck you'll see a small opening on a forward corner. The speed recorder detail hangs from this opening and is held by the provided screw. The detail mounts over the outside lead axle as shown. The early version Blue Goose with additional coverage of its skirting or shrouding in this location is likely the challenge for this in operation around tight curves. It is easily added or removed, if you wish to see about its use on your pike.





Above and Below: The locomotive includes a traction tire on its back driver and the two drivers ahead of it pick up power. The fireman's side driver wheels (on top in the view below) collect electricity from their side of the track and the other side of those lead driver wheels are a source for power on the engineer's side. The lead and trailing locomotive trucks are dummies and non-conductive. The mentioned concern on pickup relates to the number of conductive wheels (you could possibly wire the tender's center axles for pickup if your trackwork or experience makes this an issue). BLI did include its Go Pack keep-alive capacitor; however, it appears to be in line in such a way that under challenging conditions there is an occasional flicker of the LED lighting or less than smooth operation of the synchronized smoke.





addition, you'll find a slider switch located under the cab and over the trailing locomotive truck that can be positioned on or off. I evaluated this sample's performance with a Digitrax (digitrax.com) Zephyr Plus DCC unit and loop of Kato (katousa.com) Unitrack with 24-inch radius curves and Bachmann (bachmanntrains.com) E-Z Track with 18-inch radius curves. This model was a smooth runner from its pass around the test track and onward. I set the drawbar between locomotive and tender in its minimum distance position for the 24-inch curve running, and widened the distance to the slightly longer drawbar distance for testing on the 18-inch curves. In both situations this model did fine, with no derailments or challenges across the pilot and cab idler trucks, drivers, and six-axle tender wheels (any of which can cause behavioral issues on other and older steam locomotive

offerings). The low-end performance, while smooth, measured down to only about 2 mph. My understanding is that those who have installed a different decoder have had success getting slower speeds from BLI's mechanisms. The manufacturer did recently host an online survey asking what options were important and what features buyers would like to see; it's my understanding that a DCC-ready alternative was a frequently requested addition for the company's line. The data from the survey was still being acquired when I discussed this topic with BLI's Ken Silvestri before a recent livestream event with TrainWorld TV (youtube.com/@TrainWorldTV) and no decisions were yet formulated. The

wheels and coupler height checked out fine and I found the pulling power was very good (see the included By-The-Numbers section).

The paint finish (three shades of blue from top to bottom, along with aluminum accents) was great on this sample. MRN's review Blue Goose is an as-delivered version with the tender showing both Santa Fe's name and the 3460 road number. Comparing the model to various prototype pictures, I like the representation of the round nose and curved shroud casing. The only areas that came up slightly short were the model's whistle detail on the locomotive, labeling of the builder's plate on the forward boiler sides, and the air intake section before the smoke-

stack. The whistle seemed a tad thin on definition, and maybe something different beyond solid gold paint would enhance its look. The round builder's plate is pad printed and I think a raised, separate piece would do this item better service. Finally, the grate pattern of the air intake seemed a bit thick on my sample; this could be due to paint adding thickness to this fine set of openings. Otherwise, this locomotive is a beauty and delight to operate. The boiler and tender detail and well-executed, with loads of rivets to count and many separate details. The wire railings (factory-installed on both

locomotive and tender models) were uniform in appearance all around this HO-scale steam locomotive with no odd bends or uneven alignment.

I noted this was not HO's first Blue Goose. Check out my "From The Archive" column in this edition for a brief survey of past attempts that include AHM's plastic Blue Goose of the 1970s made by Rivarossi and several brass imports of this famous streamlined 4-6-4 steam locomotive.

The model comes in Broadway Limited's newer, white packaging. The locomotive and tender are nestled in a clear plastic shell with separate clear side sections, and all slide into a clear frame housing. The inner casing fits into a white cardboard tray with a cutout section for the user guide; all of this slides into a protective outer white cardboard sleeve. This is another impressive addition to Broadway Limited's Brass-Hybrid series. Watch for coverage of BLI's Brass-Hybrid Texas & Pacific 2-10-4 in the near future in MODEL RAILROAD News. See page 21 in this edition for news of BLI's Chesapeake & Ohio K-2 Mikado project, another Brass-Hybird steam locomotive due in the near future. MRN

## **Wild Geese**

Broadway Limited Imports has covered several, if not all, Santa Fe prototype looks with its HOscale Brass-Hybrid series Blue Goose releases. There are more geese roaming for collectors to hunt down. Utilizing the later version body (forward skirting on locomotive removed and smoke lifter applied to the stack), BLI produced two Black Goose offerings sold exclusively through Factory Direct Hobbies (factorydirecthobbies. com) and a Baltimore & Ohio "Royal Blue" release only available from TrainWorld (trainworld.com). All three are limited production; check with the noted hobby dealers for stock.

Factory Direct Hobbies' pair of Black Goose releases include one version (7357) with stainlesssteel trim and red background Santa Fe herald on the nose (this model is shown above on the right). The other Factory Direct Hobbies exclusive release (shown on the center right), also a fantasy paint scheme (7358), gives you a possible future repaint in Santa Fe's basic steam locomotive look of the early 1950s, with large railroad name and road number present on the tender sides (matching the appearance of non-streamlined 3460-class roster members). This all-black 4-6-4 retains its Blue Goose-style Santa Fe herald, but presents it in the same muted appearance with black background and silver finish circle-cross. For those arguing plausibility, I find this all-black rendition something that could have happened if a complete repainting was ordered in the early 1950s. Both Factory Direct Hobbies special Black Goose models carry Santa Fe road

New York's TrainWorld model goes in a completely different direction for its exclusive Brass-Hybrid 4-6-4 offering based on Broadway Limited Imports' Santa Fe Blue Goose tooling. This model (7359) is decorated for Baltimore & Ohio's (B&O) 5301 streamlined 4-6-2 locomotive that was one of four P-7 "President" class roster members (5301-5304 and making up the P-7d sub class) in this scheme and a similar streamlined shroud that pulled the road's Cincinnatian service. This train originally operated between Baltimore, Md., and Cincinnati, Ohio, beginning 1947. B&O revised its Cincinnatian in 1950 to a daytime journey connecting Detroit, Mich., with its namesake city.







## **Iconic Illinois Central Caboose**

## **Tangent Scale Models' Centralia Wide-Vision**

Tangent Scale Models adds another caboose to its collection of HO-scale replicas with the arrival of Illinois Central's (IC) Centralia Shops steel-body, wide-vision example. This offering joins the previously released Baltimore & Ohio and New York Central bay window caboose reproductions in Tangent's line. Like those way cars, this wide-vision caboose offers a wealth of separate details on a hyperaccurate multi-piece plastic body that comes with interior, and LED lighting effects.

## Centralia Goes Wide

IC's southern Illinois Centralia Shops worked on many interesting projects for the railroad. The facility built older caboose fleets (such as the side-door prototype replicated in HO many years ago by the Centralia Shops hobby brand) and revisited the way car with the wide-vision concept in the 1960s. The initial effort was a group of 50 all-steel cabooses with an overhanging cupola mounted near the center of the body's roofline. This design served in an outsourced group of 50 more examples assembled by freight car builder Darby Corporation in 1968. The caboose fleet Tangent Scale Models selected for its HO replica is the group of 200 constructed by Centralia Shops between 1970 and 1972. These early 1970s wide-vision cabooses continued the road's shop design of a riveted

body like the initial 1966 group (the Darby collection featured welded side panels). The 100 cabooses assembled in 1970 can be spotted by their Stanraymade reverse-diagonal roof pattern; the 1972 group of 100 more received Pullman-Standard roof panels with that builder's trademark "bow-tie" appearance. Both groups built in the 1970s came on roller bearing trucks (the 1966 set rolled on friction trucks).

This sizable roster of wide-vision cabooses journeyed behind trains on IC rails and later Illinois Central Gulf across the expanded system. As the corporation diversified in the 1970s, it seemed to outgrow its railroad origins and, in a downsizing program of the 1980s, the ICG system formerly spanning more than a dozen Midwestern states began shrinking. The sale of lines created several new regional railroads,



like the short-lived Chicago, Missouri & Western (CMNW); the more successful MidSouth (which now resides as part of Kansas City Southern's system, as do portions of what once was CMNW's route). Both CMNW and MidSouth are represented in Tangent Scale Models' first release, as both roads obtained not only track but equipment from Illinois Central during their 1980s startups. Examples of these Centralia-built wide-vision cabooses continue to soldier on with Canadian National (successor to the late 1980s downsized system that brought back its original IC name), with "wet noodles" appearing on Oxide Red repainted roster members that continue in service in the 21 century use.

## **Tangent's Knockout Caboose**

This caboose is one I literally grew up seeing. My Illinois hometown became a dot on the new ICG map in 1972 and I was six years old when I began seeing these long cabooses rolling behind trains on a regular basis. Even though I was familiar with these cars, I must admit that as I removed the first sample from its sturdy two-piece cardboard box, and pulled the wrapped caboose replica from its secure resting place of inner foam, I was disappointed to notice the end ladders (on both ends no less) looked bent outward a portion of the way up their path to the caboose roof. I pulled the next sample

and found the same situation. When I unpackaged a third and confirmed this again, I stopped went for prototype images. Indeed, Tangent's model is hyper-accurate and these roof access ladders do have an outward angle... how did I not notice this before and over all these years?! This is a great thing about a well-executed replica; it should have the owner questioning fine and not-so-fine details, and discovering the miniature rendition is on the mark!

This wide-vision caboose checked fine when compared to plans for IC's real example. Though at a glance this caboose might seem like a wide-vision International Car Co. or other make, you quickly appreciate IC's longer design... these were long cabooses. The model feels hefty and weighs in at five ounces. Its coupler height is fine and it includes extended cushion design for the coupler pocket. The plastic body includes clear window inserts, which you can peer into and see the multi-color interior detail. A magnet wand is provided and with this tool you can toggle end and interior lighting on/off (a great feature). The work on the three samples I examined

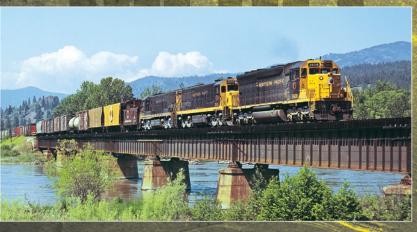
was even and excellent across them all. The model comes with a bag of color signal paddles (these fit on the ends of the car sides, look for them in prototype pictures). In addition to orange Illinois Central dress with "Main Line of Mid-America" slogan on its sides and the 1974 ICG shared in this review, the run covers the spartan looks ICG adopted by the late 1970s. There is a 1978 simplified ICG and a very late 1987 ICG with white background herald. Tangent covers the years after portions of ICG's system were downsized with a gray new-image Illinois Central release; Chicago, Missouri & Western; and MidSouth offerings. Those with an interest in more contemporary times

will find two Oxide Red caboose offerings lettered for Canadian National (accurate for 2005 and 2007 and later appearances). Assembled and orange painted replicas are offered for both roof styles in this production. Those wanting a craftsman-level build will find Tangent Scale Models includes undecorated kits in this release.

This caboose was on my bucket list, as an Overland Models' brass replica... I'm thrilled to see this prototype join the Tangent Scale Models catalog, thus bumping it from my brass wish list. These caboose replicas are available direct from Tangent and from members of its dealer network. MEN

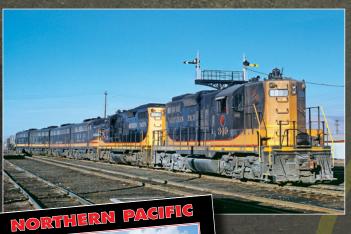

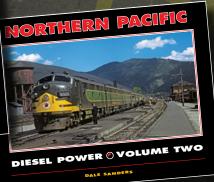

# Check Out the Checkerboard

**Green Bay & Western C-424 from Atlas**

tlas' HO-scale Alco C-424 is one of a half-dozen diesel locomotive options in the manufacturer's stable of Classic Series offerings; others include the similar C-425 and Alco RS-3, RSD-4/5, and RS-11, as well as Electro-Motive Division's (EMD) GP7. These toolings all have a basis in the Atlas line prior to its contemporary era and branding (which dates to the start of the 2000s, more or less). Though these plastic

shell locomotives have some years on them, they migrated from their original manufacturer and have benefited from internal and external enhancements and innovations over the years under this current Classic branding.

This review shares an example from what appears to be the ninth release from Atlas (again under Classic branding) for this HO-scale four-axle Alco C-424 diesel locomotive model. This run came in Silver (standard DC setup with 21-pin socket for conversion to Digital Command Control) and Gold editions. This review's model is a Gold example with onboard DCC decoder

and audio output using ESU-made electronics. This Green Bay & Western (GBW) C-424 shows a later era and simplified look for the road's red livery. Atlas provides two road numbers (320 and 322) for the Phase I edition of this four-axle Alco diesel, with GBW 312 and 313 included in this C-424 run with Phase II body. This same scheme was offered by Atlas for a Phase III version C-424 carrying road number 314, released around 2010. The early phase (angled rear number boards are a main spotting feature) was previously produced by Atlas in this same GBW dress in 2005 with road numbers

319 and 321 offered, along with an unnumbered GBW C-424. The early and more elaborate GBW scheme with a gray band running around the unit about midway up its sides was in Atlas' first Classic Series C-424 production in 2002 with road numbers 312 and 313 (and an unnumbered release). This regional railroad was an Alco-lover paradise with S- and RS-series power, FA-1 cab units, the uncommon RS-27, six-axle RSD-15s, and Century-series offerings (C-420,

C-424, and C-430). The road bought four Alco C-424s beginning in 1963 (GBW 311) and concluding with GBW 314 in 1965... so how can Atlas' GBW 320 be prototypically correct? GBW also purchased secondhand C-424s, including a pair that began its career on Erie Lackawanna (2412 and 2415); GBW 320 was EL's 2412. The other Atlas road number, GBW 322, was Reading's 5204, then Conrail 2493, before going red and joining Green Bay & Western's roster.



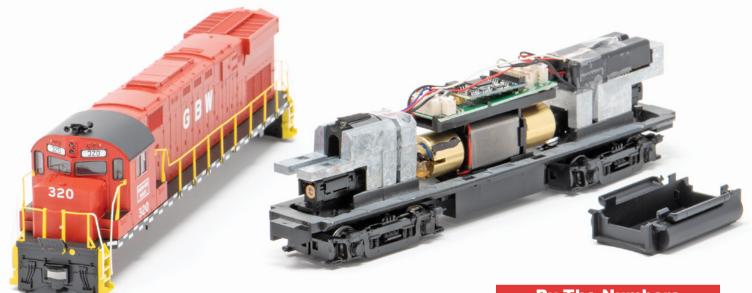
From the flawed 1970 attempt by AHM with its HO-scale C-424 (see "Collector Consist" from September 2019's Railroad Model Craftsman for more on that effort), I've always been a fan of the angled rear number boards on this early phase body C-424; they are neat-looking and a variation on the usual style common on other Alco long-hood ends. This representation of GBW 320 follows Alco's early production look, including the angled rear number boards, for its C-424 (190 examples were built between 1963 and 1967). The plastic body is made up of several sections, with pilots and walkways residing on the die-cast metal chassis. The nose, cab, and long hood snap into the walkway base. Flexible handrails surround the walkways with separate drop steps on the upper lip of the pilot centers. The pilot detail includes hoses and a multi-unit or MU receptacle cover (highlighted in yellow on this release), as well as a downturned wire coupler cut lever. Open hose keepers sit along the lower outer corners of the pilot faces. I mentioned wire coupler cut levers; in addition to those you'll find wire grab irons on the

nose and back end of the unit. The air horn on the cab roof is similar to the prototypes in style and placement. The decoration (though a basic scheme in most respects) is eye-catching thanks to the well-executed checkerboard pattern running along the sill. Take a look at my measurements on the model's performance (By-The-Numbers shown on the right) and you'll agree this is a solid operator. For those who desire more detail, this C-424 could receive lift rings and other details, along with some weathering, to dress it up for an even more impressive appearance. MRN

't's appropriate that this edition of Model Railroad News, featuring ■ Santa Fe's Blue Goose on its cover, would also have a Warbonnet livery early diesel locomotive model to share. With respect to their age (both built in 1937 and 1938), the 4-6-4 Blue Goose may have more in common with this Electro-Motive Corporation E1 diesel than it does with many of its fellow steam locomotives. Both roster members saw introduction around the same time, had priority passenger assignments and experienced fairly brief careers. While many railroads ran passenger trains with A-1-A arrangement locomotives, Santa Fe found its E-units lacking tractive ability. As a result, the road became an F-unit kingdom for pulling passenger and freight trains during the years of World War II and after. Santa Fe rostered all E1s (eight A-units and three B-units), which saw rebuilding at

around the same time (early 1950s) the Blue Goose's 3460-class was sidelined. The E1s became E8m rebuilds (generally looking much like a stock E8 and lacking the super sleek nose and other attributes). This E1 pair from Broadway Limited Imports (BLI) follows the appearance of Santa Fe's locomotives. The manufacturer offers Baltimore & Ohio and Gulf, Mobile & Ohio models (based on the very similar EA) as good-looking stand-ins. This run comes with BLI's Paragon 4 electronics, with the set's A-unit powered and the trailing B-unit a rare non-powered locomotive model.

Performance was fine on this pair and the lighting is excellent (especially those small classification-like lights between the windshield and cab side windows). Paint and lettering was very good and I find it fun that BLI offers two versions of Santa Fe's famous red. On the sound output, I've seen comments on improving it with the addition of a baffle behind the speaker. This is an interesting and easy project that I plan to pursue, and hear for myself if it enhances the sound quality. With the arrival of BLI's Blue Goose, these E1s are even more attractive to own. MRN

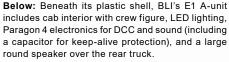

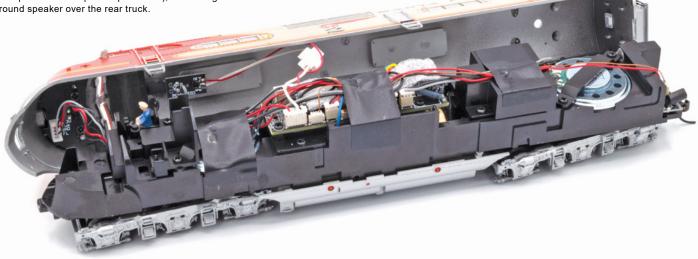

'althers' HO-scale bulkhead flatcar is a recent addition to the company's Mainline series. These examples are from the 2022 release and another production is due soon. The manufacturer states it based its HO reproduction on a Pullman-Standard 60-foot flatcar with bulkhead extensions added to the deck in the late 1960s. This is a 70-ton freight car and this model includes 33-inch metal wheels mounted in plastic roller bearing truck sideframes. The bodymounted couplers are Walthers' Proto MAX metal examples. Both the trucks and couplers are secured by screws to the underside of the car. This is a good-looking bulkhead flatcar given its

mostly molded-on tooling design. The bulkheads (standing 8 feet, 6 inches) are the most detailed region of the release and include separate panels on the interior facing replicating the flatcar deck appearance. The exterior side of the bulkhead sections includes separate and finely molded ladders and other details. The outer edges of the flatcar deck include open pockets ready for tie-down cabling, if you create a load requiring this type of security. The assembled bulkhead with no load weighs 3.1 ounces. The distance between the bulkheads provides for 48 scale feet that can house a variety of loads. Walthers promotes its Chooch cast-resin pulpwood load (214-7264, MSRP: \$14.98) as an option and there

is a recently released Walthers Scene-Master pipe load (reviewed on pages 80-81) that is easy to build and fits this freight car. The coupler height checked out okay when mated to a Kadee (kadee.com) Coupler Height Gauge. The car performed fine with no issues (I ran it empty and with an assembled pipe load) and all wheels passed inspection for being in gauge. This is another solid entry in this mid-level series of Walthers Mainline offerings. Multiple road numbers are available for this production and the second run. With roots in the 1960s, yet possessing a contemporary look, this freight car will be at home in a range of eras. MRN

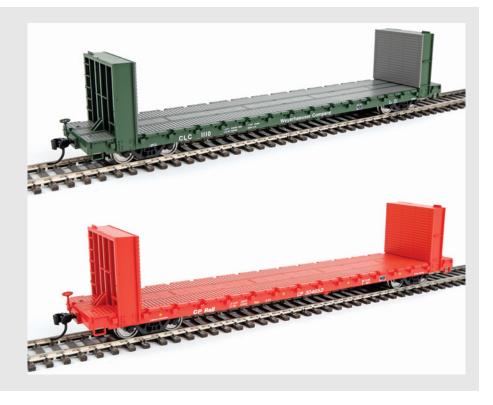

Four road numbers (MSRP: \$34.98 each) will be available for each of these fully assembled HO freight car reproductions.



# **Classic Covered Hopper**

Micro-Trains Lines' all-new PS-2 two-bay

icro-Trains Line (MTL) has been teasing this newly tooled Pullman-Standard (PS-2) two-bay hopper car model for a while now. I'm happy to report it

is here, and it was worth the wait. Designed by the famous rail car builder in the mid-1950s, this hopper was ideal for dense bulk commodities that needed easier loading and unloading than was possible through a boxcar door. With its 2,003-cubic-foot-capacity and weight limit of 70 tons, this PS-2 freight car had company in a larger three-bay variety and other two-bay cars from competing builder American Car & Foundry, and others.

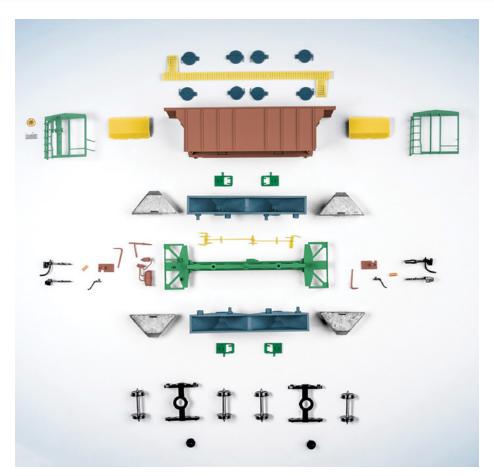
Great Northern (GN) 71470 was built in Butler, Pa., in April 1958 as part of an order of 100 two-bay covered hoppers from Pullman-Standard. These hoppers were delivered on American Steel Foundry's (ASF) "Ride Control" Above: This is a next generation level effort by Micro-Trains with excellent 33-inch metal wheels, body-mounted knuckle couplers in narrow-design draft gear, and inclusion of end details (coupler cut lever and hoses). The cut lever fits into the opening on the side of the stirrup step. The decoration is razor-sharp with lettering present on the ends and bays.

trucks, designed for use with then-new all-purpose roller bearings — no plain journals here. Thoroughly modern cars that embodied the latest in industry technology (all-welded construction, improved draft gear, and new trucks), they were utilized to provide the best service possible to shippers along GN's route and beyond. A wide variety of commodities could have been handled through the eight round roof hatches and four discharge chutes — although

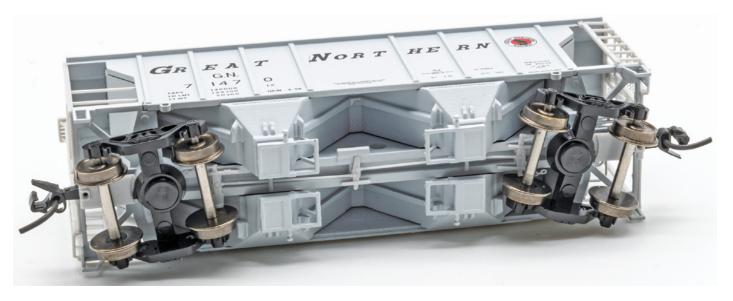
based on the car's gray color and cubic capacity, it was likely an aggregate material.

Micro-Trains did its homework on this project - just look at the exploded view (shown on the right) of all the components. Featuring body-mounted couplers with a narrow draft pocket and the manufacturer's all-new fine-profile 33-inch metal wheels, this release raises the bar on the company's capabilities and is on par with MTL's recent National Steel Car 60-foot high-cube boxcar model. It's also worth noting that the ASF 70-ton Ride Control truck is newly tooled, and I look forward to this truck being utilized elsewhere on MTL's transition era rolling stock. Included for the modeler to install are a pair of end hoses and coupler cut levers, molded in the same color as the body. The air brake details inside the B-end cage of the car are finely rendered, as are both end cages. The handbrake wheel and the associated rigging located in the center sill of the car. While the roof hatches don't open, the roofwalk features see-through grating, and the handbrake ledge is an etched-metal section that resembles the galvanized look of the prototype.

Right and Below: The model weighs 0.6 ounces and coupler height measured well within desired tolerance level. All wheels were in gauge on these newly created 33-inch examples possessing finer or more narrow tread. The new plastic ASF 70-ton roller truck sideframes and the metal wheels not only look tremendous, they make for a wonderfully performing miniature. Included with this offering, Micro-Trains provides end details (shown on the right), which include hoses (black sprues) and coupler cut levers (gray sprues).









Paint application and graphics are stellar - as expected from Micro-Trains. The gray of the body is opaque and has a matte appearance, and the black lettering is crisp and legible under magnification (or with really good eyes). The GN herald featuring "Rocky the Goat" has the only color (outside of gray) on the car - red on a white background with black graphics. Coupler height was fine out of the box, as was the weight at 0.6 ounces — and the car rolls as freely as any other MTL release. I understand that some N scalers are not exactly fond of metal wheelsets and body-mounted couplers, but they are two attributes that are very high up on my list, and I anxiously await future releases of this car from Micro-Trains. The insert label mentions that this car was in service up to the 2000s in maintenance-of-way use; perhaps MTL will adapt the roof and outlets for use in ballast service. The higher asking price of this release reflects the care and process necessary to develop and bring to market a fine

example of a popular hopper car, and one that is also produced domestically and on an ongoing basis. Micro-Trains has set the bar in N-scale rolling stock for the last several decades, and now they have raised it yet again!

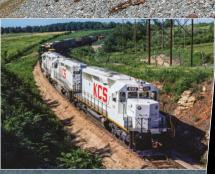

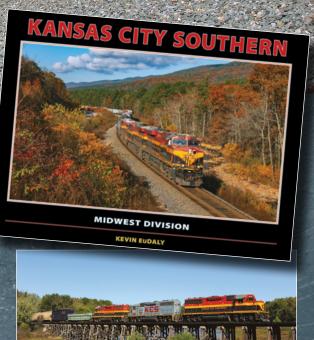

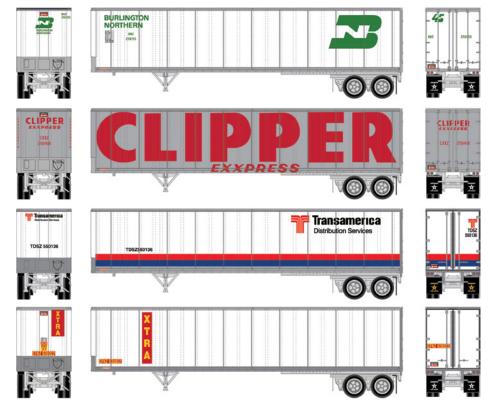

## Fruehauf Z-van trailer comes to N scale from Athearn with returning release in HO

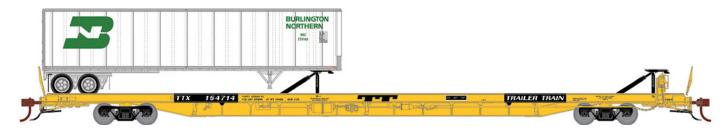
HO & N — Athearn announces a newly tooled Fruehauf Z-van trailer for the hobby company's collection of N-scale intermodal offerings. This 45-foot trailer (previously available from Athearn in HO) will return in 2024 in both HO and N with four road names: Burlington Northern, Clipper, Transamerica, and Xtra Lease (each will come with two road numbers in the release). The four road names cover eras from the 1970s to 1990s.

Details on this trailer will include separate landing gear crank and mud flaps, as well as positionable bogies. Athearn states two body styles (smooth-side and rib-side) and two door styles (two- and four-latch) will be created for this offering. The all-new N-scale trailer model carries a \$31.99 suggested retail price. The returning HO version lists for \$39.99. Trailer models in both scales are due to arrive at the beginning of 2024 (along with set releases for Athearn's F89-F TOFC flatcar with this Z-van trailer in HO and N).

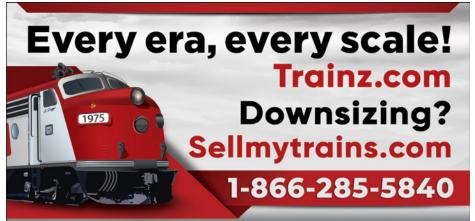

In addition to the trailer body and

axle placement options, Sylvan Scale Models offers an era-correct Thermo King refrigeration unit (shown in blue on the front of the Eastern-style trailer pictured above on the left).

# Endless Intermodal Options from Jacksonville Terminal Company

Hor many years, N-scale modelers who wanted an intermodal train have had a limited selection of trailers and containers to choose from. Most of these early truck and trailer models I'm referencing were basic in construction and detail level, and they carried logos of companies popular from the mid- to late 20th century. Now 22 years into a new century, logos we see on trains going by have changed... the equipment has changed, and modelers of all ages have been pining for accurate models of the containers and names they are seeing trackside.

Thanks to the work of Jackson Terminal Company (JTC), the availability of current, notable, and highly detailed shipping container models in N scale is massively improved. In this review, I'll briefly touch on containers typically seen on today's trains and take a look at Jackson Terminal Company offerings that make these consists come alive for N scale.

Double-stack trains are seen in several different flavors in North America. For modeling purposes, I find three basic categories that these types of trains generally fit: international, domestic freight, and domestic priority. International consists will typically have a mix

of 40- and 20-foot containers riding in shorter 40- and 48-foot well cars. The containers will be painted for a mix of international shipping companies and customers, and some have distinctive special schemes. Some great examples of these are SeaLand, Maersk, Hapag-Lloyd, and Ocean Network Express (ONE). A train with domestic freight will be mostly 53-footers with a mix of containers owned by railroads, leasing companies, and domestic shipping companies...think EMP, Florida East Coast, UMAX, and HubGroup. A domestic priority train will be carrying things like mail, perishables, and other high-priority goods. It may also be a

dedicated service for a single customer. Because of the specific customers, it is common to see these trains filled with blocks of containers from United Parcel Service, United States Postal Service, or Fedex, and dedicated carriers like Schneider, JB Hunt, and COFC.

Among its recent releases, Jacksonville Terminal Company has expanded its line of containers to cover a wide range of prototypes. From early era intermodal lines like Maersk, American President Lines (APL), and SeaLand, up to the most modern EMP, UMAX, ONE, and others, JTC containers can fill your ports, trucks, and well cars in a variety of eras. Not only does JTC offer the well-known names I listed, they also have a good selection of more generic containers to fill out a train. Shipping companies like DART, XTRA, and GVC tend to have less conspicuous paint schemes but are still a key part of filling out a good-looking container train.

It's no secret that modelers love to snag a model of a locomotive or car in a special or one-off paint scheme. JTC has answered the call with several special paint schemes. Included in Model Railbrack News' samples for this review were a number of great schemes. Maersk's rainbow-color Pride scheme, holiday themes with Santa and his sleigh, and a 4th of July "Celebrate Freedom" livery are all available. But the fun doesn't stop there! Also available are several containers for other uses such as CAT generators, hazardous materials storage, and many military schemes.

Not only is JTC producing the



containers that modelers of modern era trains are looking for, but they are also producing them on a level that will impress any detail-oriented enthusiast. No detail seems overlooked by the company, with all sides of these containers made to match prototype. Generic waffle or smooth sides and a single door and roof style just won't do for many of today's modelers and JTC delivers! They have made more than 12 different body styles, each with details specific to the prototype modeled.

The sides of containers are typically one of the most seen parts of the model. JTC has not only excellently pad printed the large graphics on the models, but has also included many if not all of the other smaller details that make each container unique. Container reporting marks, dimensional data, capacities, and conspicuity/safety marks are all present and legible. Highly noticeable are prototype-specific details such as paint patches, faded paint, and even the finest details such as corner cast-

ings (take a look at the green EMP container) painted in a prototypical color so they can be more easily seen.

Three-dimensional details are not lacking. Hazard placards, logo boards, marking panels, vents, and attached signage are all present on these models. Great examples of these exterior features are seen on the 20-foot CAT generator containers, and the hazardous materials storage containers.

The ends of containers are also conspicuous to modelers and the camera. These are among the features that really make JTC's containers stand out from other offerings. The locking mechanisms and door patterns are all specific to the prototype and all parts that would be three

dimensional on the prototype are also three dimensional on these models. Included are details like weather sealing around doors, logos that are underneath the locking mechanisms, and the dense dimensional data.

Roofs can often be overlooked as part of a model; thankfully, JTC doesn't think they should be. Each container has the correct roof with not just the correct profile but the proper detailing as well. Containers that are open topped have a decent representation of tarps in several different colors. The tarps are the only part of these models that is easily called out as definitely being a model when photographed. Fine fabric details like tarps are one of the most difficult things to make look photo realistic. JTC's rendition of this feature is a solid effort that certainly does better than many other attempts.

Another sticking point for many modelers is attaching containers to other containers in a double-stack configuration or keeping them from sliding off trailer chassis or flatcars. JTC has included the two most common attachment methods used in N scale. The first is Inter-Box Connecting (IBC) pins. These were common on many older container models; however, they can sometimes be way out of scale on

these now-vintage toolings and show up as eyesores in pictures. JTC has made sure to still offer IBC connections and has kept them to scale, so that they also look great. On the more hidden but very functional side of things, three magnets on the bottom of the containers (40-foot and larger, fewer magnets on 20-footers) and a metal plate in the roof of the container provide a very stable magnetic attachment for these containers and they work very nicely with other brands that have a similar design, like Kato's N-scale well cars and containers.

Now that I've discussed many important attributes included on JTC containers, there is always a need for equipment to haul them. Also available

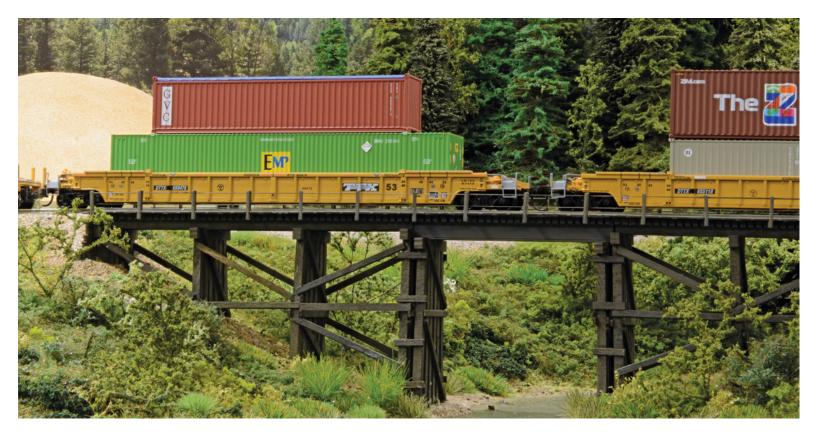


from JTC, and in comparable detail, are a number of different container chassis and a newer style intermodal well car model. JTC's N-scale trailer chassis include IBC connections and metal plates built in, to securely hold any of the matching length containers. The chassis are just as detailed, with proper hubs, simulated brake hardware, taillights, and markings. The company's N-scale National Steel Car (NSC) 17-post well car replica features die-cast construction of the main body, which gives those magnets in the containers something to hold on to and allows for better operations. This is a balance of features that many modelers have griped about for years with earlier well

car models that were either too light, so they derailed, or too heavy so they looked oversized and a long train was unfeasible due to the weight of the cars. JTC's N-scale well cars include holes for the IBC connection pins, making placement of 20- and 40-foot containers in the longer wells much easier and more stable. These cars make a great addition to a modern fleet of well cars. To my knowledge, they have not been offered before in N scale and are commonly seen mixed in with many other styles of well cars (that are available from other manufacturers) in prototypical consists.

For the modern modeler pursuing N scale, JTC containers and other products are a perfect addition to an intermodal consist or container depot. The details included on the models make them standouts for casual viewing on a layout and centerpieces for model railroad photos. JTC makes having a detailed model layout easier than ever and is pioneering the quality of non-train items (like its controlled entry kiosk, chassis, and other releases) in N scale. MRN



# An Easy Pipe Load New Walthers SceneMaster kit

Tasy to assemble and designed to fit the company's Mainline-series ↓HO-scale Pullman-Standard 60-foot bulkhead flatcar (reviewed on pages 60-61 in this edition of MODEL RAILROAD NEWS, this SceneMaster pipe load kit from Walthers is a release to consider for your railroad.

I believe this pipe load is a new release from Walthers. The kit comes bagged with a cardboard topper designed for pegboard mounting in a hobby shop... when I don't know how an accessory release like this is packaged, I am unsure of where to look for it in a store or at a train show. This packaging is large, as it houses one long plastic sprue with all the kit's 45-foot

pipe sections molded in black plastic. The other sprue is molded in tan plastic and includes the cross brace sections and stakes for installation into the pockets lining the outside of a flatcar. A small sheet comes with this kit containing a diagram and description of the assembly process.

Each level of consists of 10 pipes that are molded as a single layer. They are similar, but you'll find one has mounting holes on just one side. This is the bottom or base layer. It is on the sprue opposite the end with the Walthers name part number tab. The other pipe layers include holes on their top and bottom enabling connection to the cross brace sections. The assembled pipe load stacks seven layers with six cross brace sections (with posts on both sides) sandwiching between. The top layer of pipes receives a cross brace section with posts only on its underside, providing a smooth board surface appearance on the load. The job is easy with a successful finish, when you set aside the couple of part variants and organize the repeated pieces.

Above: The completed pipe load measures 45 feet long and stands a bit less than 10 feet tall. The pipes come molded in black, and cross brace sections and stakes for the car's side pockets are molded in tan. With a bit of paint or dull cote, an authentic look is easy to attain with this release.

For this kit build I added no paint to the black and tan pieces to show the reader what it looks like direct from the package. I used a pair of sprue cutters, a sharp hobby knife, sanding file, and super glue adhesive and completed the project over a workspace mat. The pipe layers are attached by no less than 18 connections to the sprue and/or the next layer and this is where the majority of the busy work comes into this build. The cross braces and stakes for the flatcar pocket have connections to their sprue at each end and nipping these free from the sprue goes quickly. With a very small amount of adhesive applied to each post on the cross braces and gently pressing them into the pipe layer, you simply repeat this process until you are out of these components. The pipe layers are thick and amply sturdy

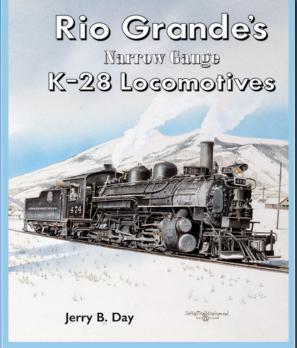
that I encountered no challenges from warping that might make a solid-looking load difficult. Walthers promotes this pipe load for use with its Mainline-series 60-foot bulkhead flatcar, but you will find that this kit could find use beyond this mentioned freight car. I pulled an example of the recent Walthers Mainline HO-scale 53-foot Railgon gondola. You can see how you could easily modify the build to include fewer layers and the shorter load would fit fine in this open gon model. A freight car is not necessary for this load's use, as these pipes come from somewhere and go someplace in the real world, and you can recreate these locations and scenes with this offering.

The build was easy. If I can do it, you can do it better. Try one of these Walthers SceneMaster pipe loads and see what you make of it and where you place it on your railroad. MRN







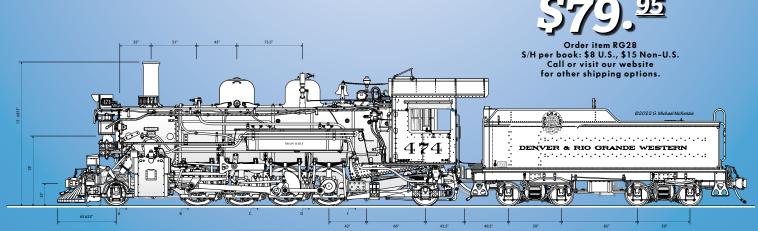

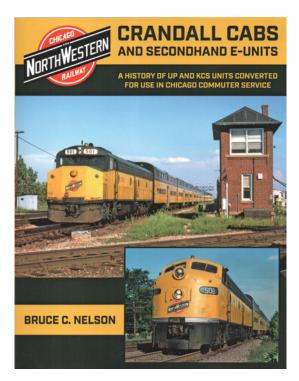

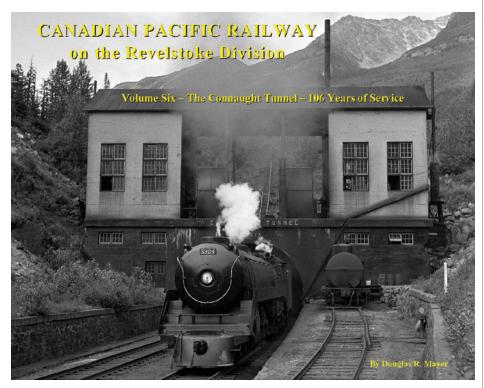

# Santa Fe Steam Compendium on CD-ROM

Strapac's two volume Santa Fe Steam Compendium are handy and easily accessible reference tools for the rail historian and/or model train enthusiast with a passion for steam operated by Santa Fe. The road's progress with steam locomotives begins with Strapac's first volume, subtitled Early Locomotives, with chapters devoted to the road's formative years with ancestral and subsidiary systems included. Eight chapters follow the opening information in the first volume and cover Santa Fe's

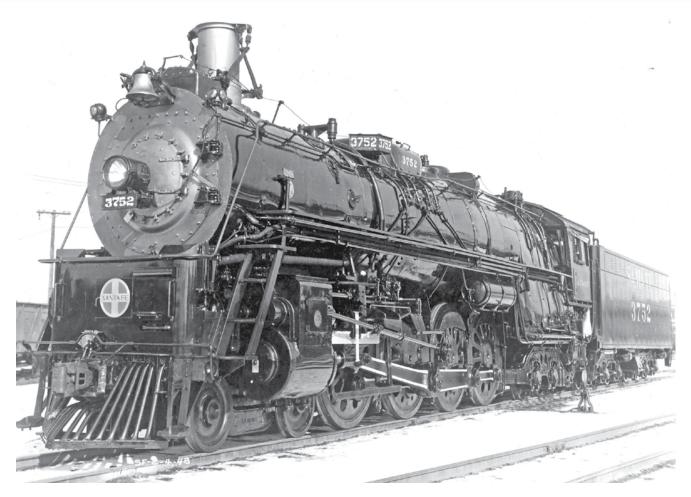

Eight-Wheeler 4-4-0, Ten-Wheeler 4-6-0, Mogul 2-6-0, 2-8-0, 4-8-0, 0-4-0 and Tank Switchers, and 0-6-0 and 0-8-0 Switchers. The second book, subtitled Modern Locomotives, opens with a brief introduction and proceeds into early 20th century roster members with a dozen chapters each focused on a specific type or types of locomotives: Atlantic 4-4-2, Prairie 2-6-2, Pacific 4-6-2, Heavy Pacific 4-6-4, Mikado 2-8-2, Heavy Mikado 2-8-4, Mountain 4-8-2, Heavy Mountain 4-8-4, Decapod 2-10-0, Santa Fe 2-10-2, 2-10-4, and a combined presentation for Mallet and Articulated locomotives.

For this review, I obtained the digital (CD-ROM) version of *Santa Fe Steam Compendium, Volume Two*. While I feel comfortable in my knowledge of Santa Fe diesel locomotives, steam locomotives require a time investment. However, I appreciate them

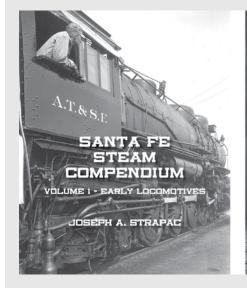


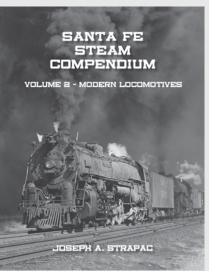

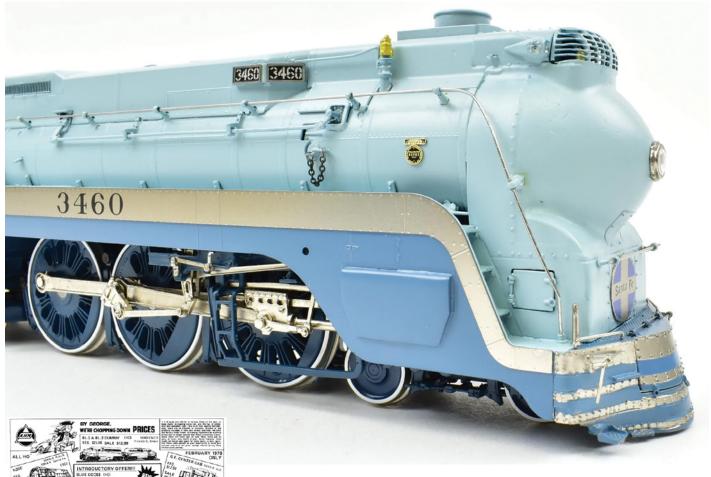
and have a desire to understand and know more about the subject. That in mind, I was a bit concerned that the information would be challenging for the steam-challenged reader... I was pleased to find that Strapac (as he does in all his works I've encountered) writes with authority and accessibility. This volume was an enjoyable trip through this portion of the road's steam locomotive history. All images are black & white and I found the quality of the digital version to be excellent, with clean views free of pixelation or "mosquito fuzz" that can degrade images compressed for presentation in this style release. You can buy either digital volume for \$40 or add the pair to your library for \$75. Visit the society's excellent website to find out about membership, enjoy online reference to Santa Fe, and order this or other titles. MRN

The Santa Fe Railway Historical and Modeling Society (sfrhms.org) is an excellent example of this type of preservation organization. The group's publications cover their namesake railroad with the color quarterly The Warbonnet magazine and numerous books, including Joseph A. The only plastic HO rendition came in early 1976 from Rivarossi and was marketed in North America by Associated Hobby Manufacturers (a vintage February 1976 ad appears on the left and shows

a \$49.99 introductory offer deal) I paid a good bit more for my example, which I'll share and discuss in this mentioned HO COLLECTOR article. Other attempts at Santa Fe 3460 are several brass replicas. Tenshodo's effort (shown below) distributed by Pacific Fast Mail may be the first. A Boo-Rim Preccision handcrafted brass HO Blue Goose came in 2012 (the most recent before Broadway Limited Imports' effort reviewed in this edition) and was an Iron Horse Models/Precision Scale Co., Inc. release (shown above).
