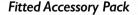

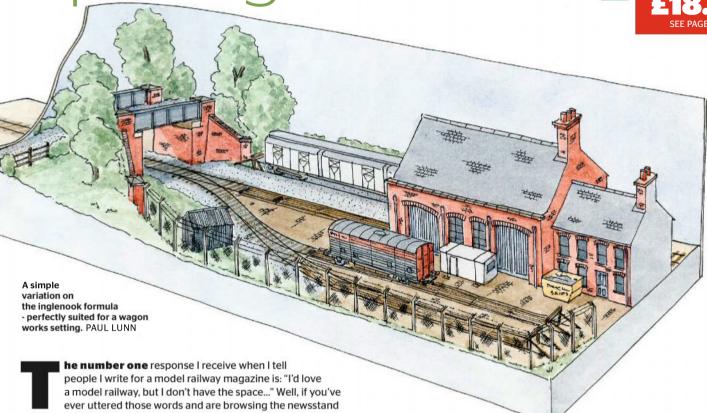

right now - STOP! This might just be the issue of Model Rail for you.

Seasoned modellers will know that little layouts - or 'micro layouts' as they're often called - account for a sizeable chunk of today's exhibition circuit, and it's easy to see why. Small layouts are easy to transport, quick to set up, and require precious little space when stored in the club room or at home.

Sure, small scenic sections often require compromise, but as long as you're willing to forgo that prototypical-length container train, there's no reason why you won't find plenty to whet both your operational and modelling appetites.

In this issue, we'll be paying particular attention to 'inglenook' layouts, from planning, building, and even operating layouts based on Alan Wright's famous trackplan.

It really does amaze me how a combination of two points and three sidings can produce not only endless hours of play, but limitless scenic possibilities, too.

Micro layouts come in many guises, with modellers tackling all manner of themes, and in multiple gauges. From tiny narrow gauge quarries, to engine shed dioramas, and even small sections of main line, we're witnessing increasing creativity across the hobby - and that can only be a good thing.

Your imagination really is the only limiting factor when building a micro

layout, but if you do require a little inspiration to kick-start those creative juices Paul Lunn is at hand with eight inglenook-based ideas in this month's Masterplan, while Brian Rolley delves into the inglenook trackplan's history and discusses his own inglenook inspired layout, 'Rosamund Street Sidings'.

In addition, George Dent spices up Dapol's 'O' gauge '08' and a Hornby RailRoad 0-4-0, two shunters that are perfect for compact scenic sections.

There's also no reason why you can't incorporate an inglenook trackplan into a bigger build, but if you're a tailchasing stalwart, you'll still find plenty of interest in the form of this month's latest releases. including Dapol's excellent '122', DJModels' Class 71, and Hatton's long-awaited 'Warwell'. Plus, our usual hoard of jaw-dropping layouts.

So, before you delve into the August edition of Model Rail, I'll leave you with one final thought: all of us have to deal with space restrictions at some point during our model-making journey, but if there's one thing that space can't restrict, it's imagination!

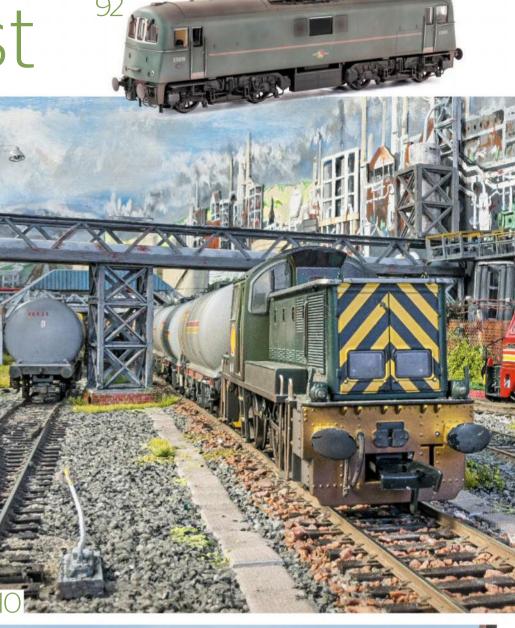

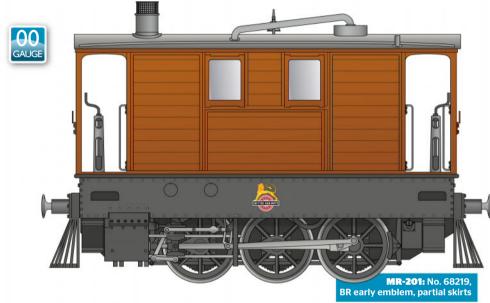

odel Rail is pleased to announce that the order book for our forthcoming 'OO' gauge LNER 'J70' O-6-OT is now open. Rapido Trains' engineers were due to finalise the CAD drawings shortly after this issue closed for press, but we can confirm that the model will have the following specification and detail options:

- Coreless motor
- Provision for sound
- Tension lock couplers in NEM pockets
- Sprung buffers, with two types of buffer shank where applicable
- Bufferbeam safety chains, where applicable
- Full sideplates, without sideplates and

with cowcatchers only

- Two different styles of central lamp iron
- Two different nose end door catch styles
- Replacement cowcatchers with no coupling aperture
- Separate etch for two and three-bolt end mounting plates
- Choice of opened and closed end doors, to be fitted by the modeller

Full retail price for the 'J70' will be £127.50. However, Model Rail subscribers will be able to take advantage of our 10% discount and can obtain the model for £114.75. Each livery/guise will be limited to 500 pieces.

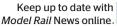
#### DCC's diesel duo

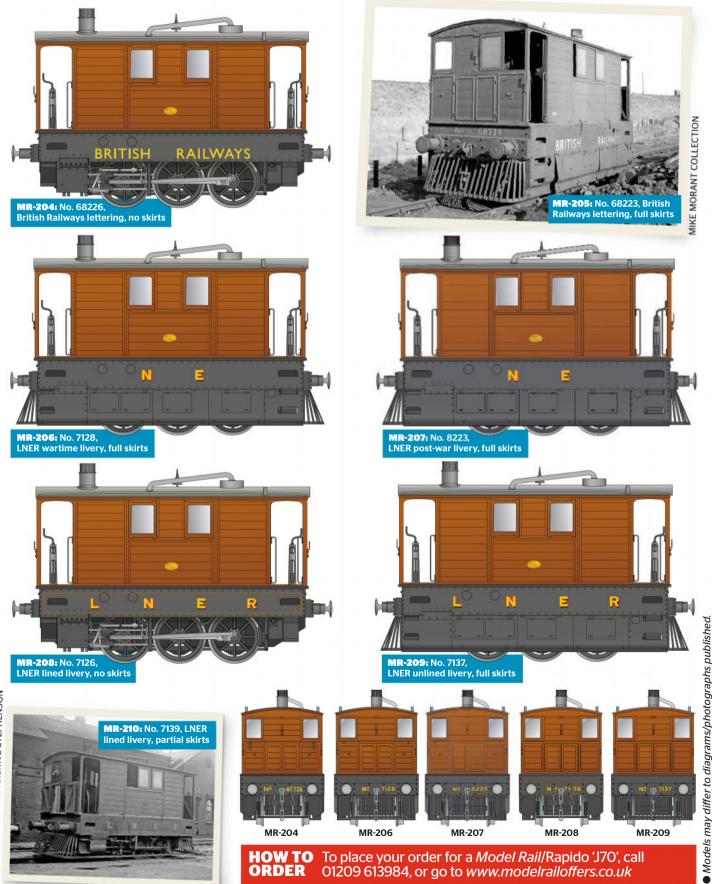

# FERRY VANS ARE AWAITING ORDERS



evolution Trains has unveiled its next 'N' gauge ready-to-run wagon project: the Cargowaggon 'twin' ferry vans, built by Duewag between 1986-1991 for cross-Channel freight traffic.

Due to their flexibility, the permanently coupled four-wheel 'twin' vehicles have been used to carry mineral water, newsprint, bagged clay or cement, whisky, cider, petfood and numerous other goods to and from destinations as widespread as Cornwall, the Highlands, North and South Wales and destinations in Southern France and Germany. They can operate in blocks, or in smaller numbers in mixed 'Enterprise' trains.

Three liveries are planned - original Cargowaggon,
Perrier water, plus revised Cargowaggon and revised Cargowaggon
with a working flashing tail lamp. Guide price is £38 for each
twin, £108 for a triple-pack of twins and £40 for the single set of
twins with battery-operated flashing tail lamp. Once Revolution
has adequate interest in the model, it will begin work on CAD
design and tooling. If demand is strong enough from
'OO' gauge modellers, Revolution would consider producing
a 'OO' gauge version.

#### **OXFORD LAUNCHES NEW RESIN RANGE**

Oxford Rail's range of 'OO' gauge locomotive and rolling stock has been joined by a complementary brand - Oxford Structures. As the name suggests, Oxford Structures will offer resin 'OO' gauge buildings, and it made its debut with 14 new models - and promises of more to follow.

'At the Station' comprises a station building, signal box, goods shed, locomotive shed and water tower, in GWR style. They're joined by straight platform, platform ramp and island platform sections (offered in twin-packs). 'Town & Country' features non-railway buildings. The first batch contains a church, inn, cottage, bungalow and two shops (a newsagent and a butcher).

Prices have yet to be confirmed. However, it is planned that the first items will be available later this year.

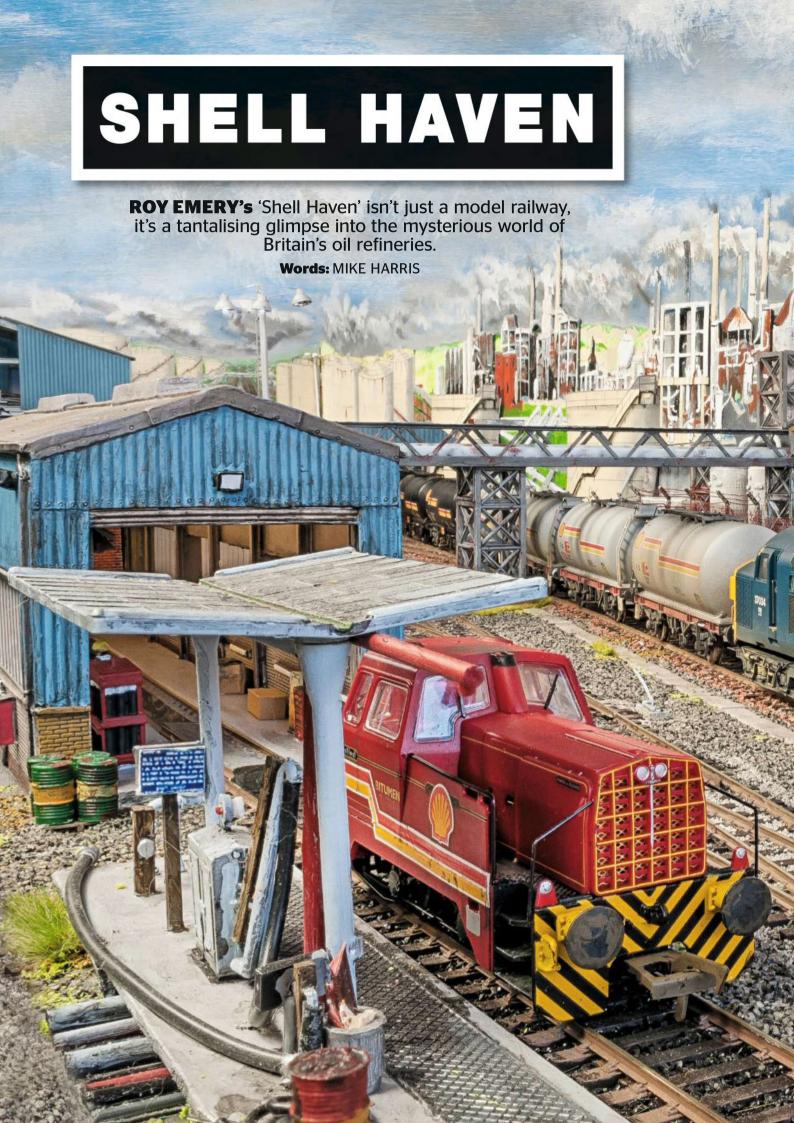

f you're lucky enough to visit a working refinery, you'll soon discover that mobile phones and cameras are strictly prohibited.
Unsurprisingly, that makes prototypical photography very hard to come by.

Roy Emery has always been fascinated by the mysterious world of the refinery, and always wanted to model one, but the lack of images was always a stumbling block.

However, after Shell Haven oil refinery, in the Thames estuary, closed in December 1999, Roy managed to acquire enough photographs to embark on a realistic prototype build in 4mm:1ft.

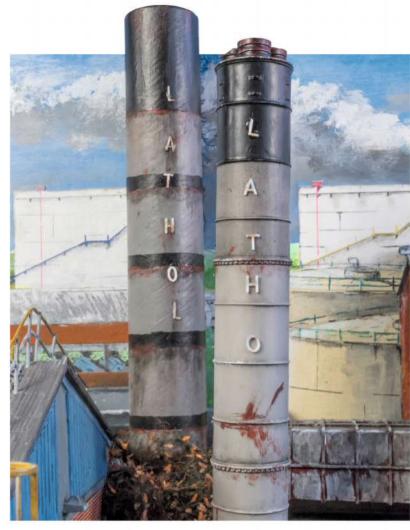
The scenic section is only 9ft by 18in, so it's a compromise on a big scale. "The prototype is huge," says Roy. "That's why I've only recreated the rail loading area, which is where all rail operations were concentrated after 1983 - before that date, the railway was spread throughout the refinery."

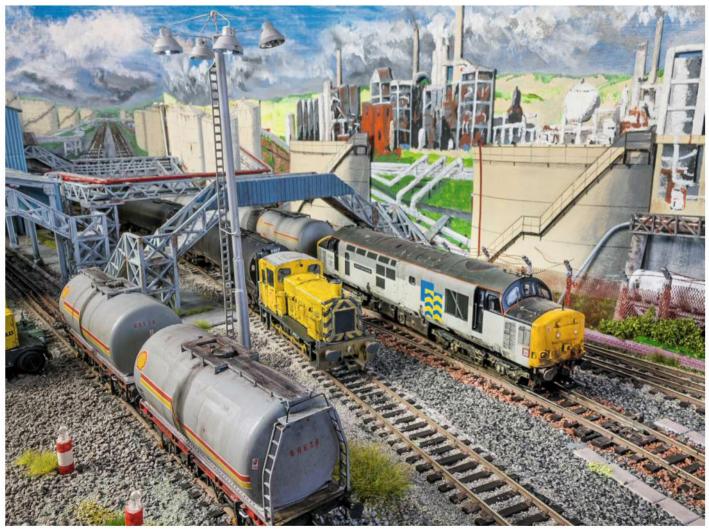
#### MIX AND MATCH

Roy freely admits that 'Shell Haven' isn't entirely accurate. And yet, his ability to identify suitable areas of compromise, while at the same time introducing authentic-looking freelance elements, is an art form in itself.

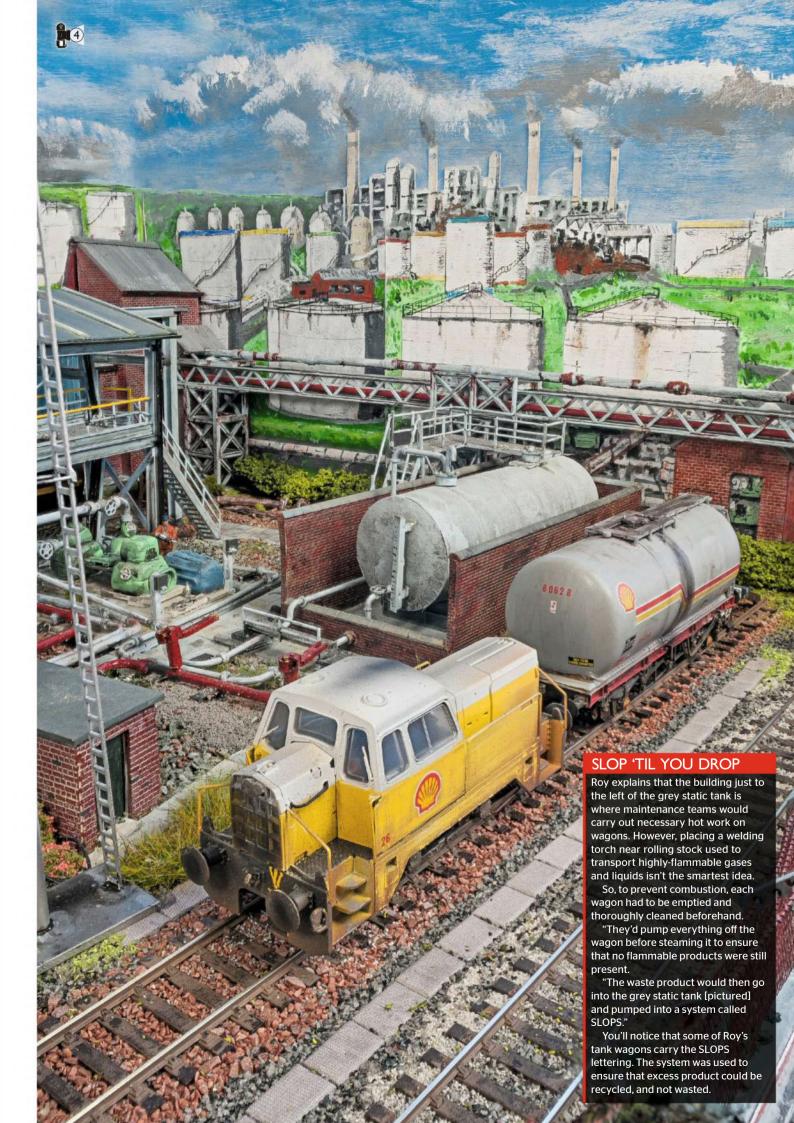

Each detail combines to create a highly authentic working refinery, despite Roy's use of modeller's licence.

For example, the large corrugated building in the foreground was used to load tank wagons, but it's only half the size of the prototype.

"The rail loading

area had two loading gantries, but I had to design it to fit - it's basically semi-relief," he says.

The inclusion of such details, even if compromised, has afforded Roy plenty of operating potential. True to the prototype, Roy's train of tank wagons can pass through the loading gantry to simulate the transfer of oil (see panel: 'Winch by Winch').

#### **FOCUS ON FUN**

Two additions that are not prototypical are the bitumen-loading gantry and unloading crane. Roy explains

the significance of running a bitumen train: "Bitumen trains were not loaded at Shell Haven during the time period of my layout (1983 to 1993). They were loaded at the neighbouring refinery (on which Roy's bitumenloading gantry is based). "But, to make the layout more interesting to operate,

I introduced a bitumen train."

Operation is aided by a central line that is recognisable due to its uniquely-coloured ballast. "BR trains of empty wagons were restricted to certain areas," says Roy. "The terracotta ballast emphasises where the trains can go."

#### SHELL SHUNT

Stock largely consists of tank wagons and Shell-branded shunters. Roy owns two Hornby Sentinel 4wDHs, which have been finished in Shell colours and professionally weathered.

"They're fairly close to what was there," says Roy. "Although, on the real ones, the exhausts would go through a water tank to prevent sparks." •

#### ON THE MONET

'Shell Haven's' standout feature is arguably its backscene. The strong colours and rough outline of Roy's hand-painted background is not unlike a Claude Monet impressionist painting. But, it very nearly didn't exist at all.

"I have lots of photographs of the surrounding area, so I printed them out as a large panorama," says Roy. However, he wasn't happy with the result.

"I started to paint it myself," he continues. "The sky was painted directly onto the plywood base, but the details were painted onto canvas using artist's acrylics. I used acrylic paint because it dries hard and wears better."

The final touch was to layer building cut-outs over the backscene and onto spacers to provide a semi three-dimensional relief.

But Roy still isn't convinced: "I didn't leave enough space between the cutouts and the backscene, so the relief didn't really work how I wanted it to. But people mention the backscene a lot at exhibitions, and I think that's because it's a little bit different."

#### WINCH BY WINCH

In reality, oil trains would be pulled through the loading gantry via a winching system. But that's a tall order for anybody working in 4mm...

"I couldn't find a way to represent it on the layout," admits Roy. "I've modelled it so that the winch is out of service - that's how I get away with it!"

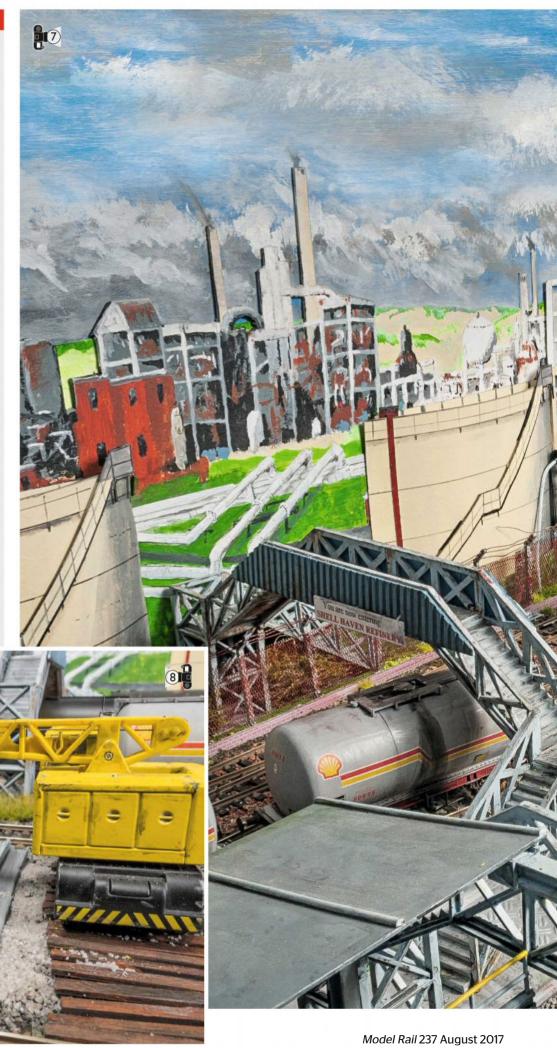
Roy has surrounded the winch with maintenance workers and a crane, to emphasise that it's not operational. It's an ingenious idea, and a valid, prototypical reason for the need to shunt into the loading gantry.

The winch might be a key feature of the prototype, but Roy has worked out a clever solution that doesn't impact upon the authentic feel of the layout.

To explain just how complicated creating a working winch in 4mm would be, Roy outlines the winching process.

"The train would be winched through the loading gantry. You'll notice flaps - almost like miniature drawbridges - in the loading gantry. These allow personnel to access each wagon, open the desired loading hatch and make sure it's empty.

"The train would then be winched through to another part of the building, where a worker would identify what product needed to go into what wagon, via a computer system. A lance would then attach to the desired wagon and automatically load. Once the loading process is complete, a worker would access the wagon once again and shut the loading hatch."

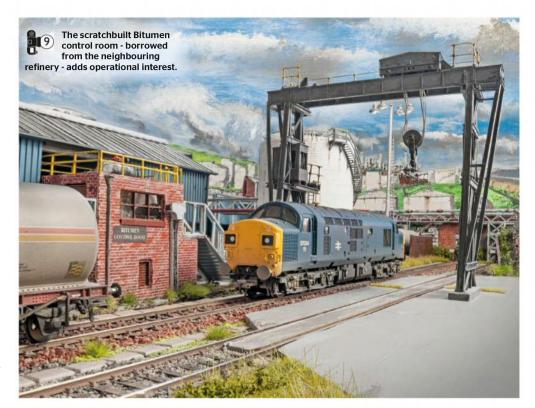
#### **REFINED REFINERY**

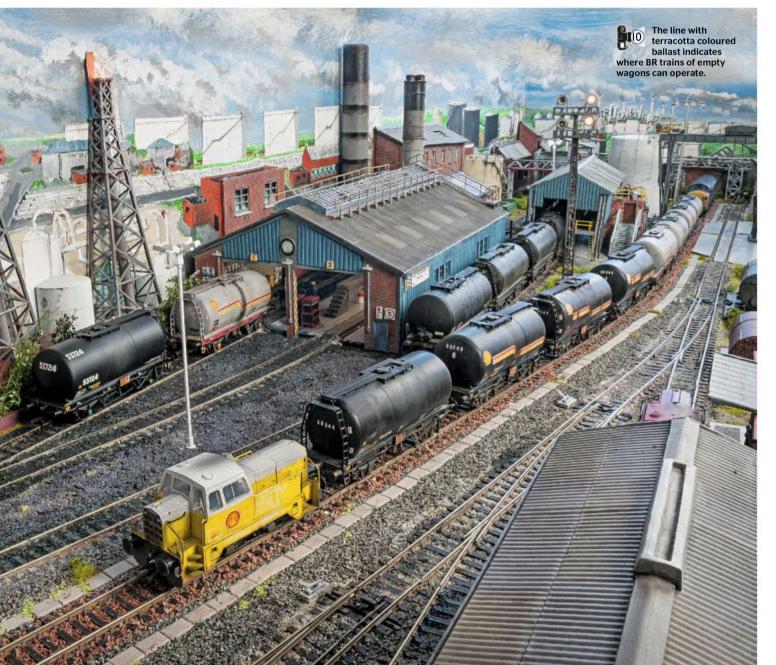
'Shell Haven' stands out among other industrial layouts because of its distinctive and visually appealing backscene. But it isn't just a pretty model: it's a rare insight into an area of the railway we seldom see.

The very fact that Roy has had to work with relatively few sources only makes his achievement all the more impressive.

He's managed to faithfully recreate a prototype location, while adding his own freelance twist. Yet, remarkably, the layout retains a deep sense of authenticity throughout.

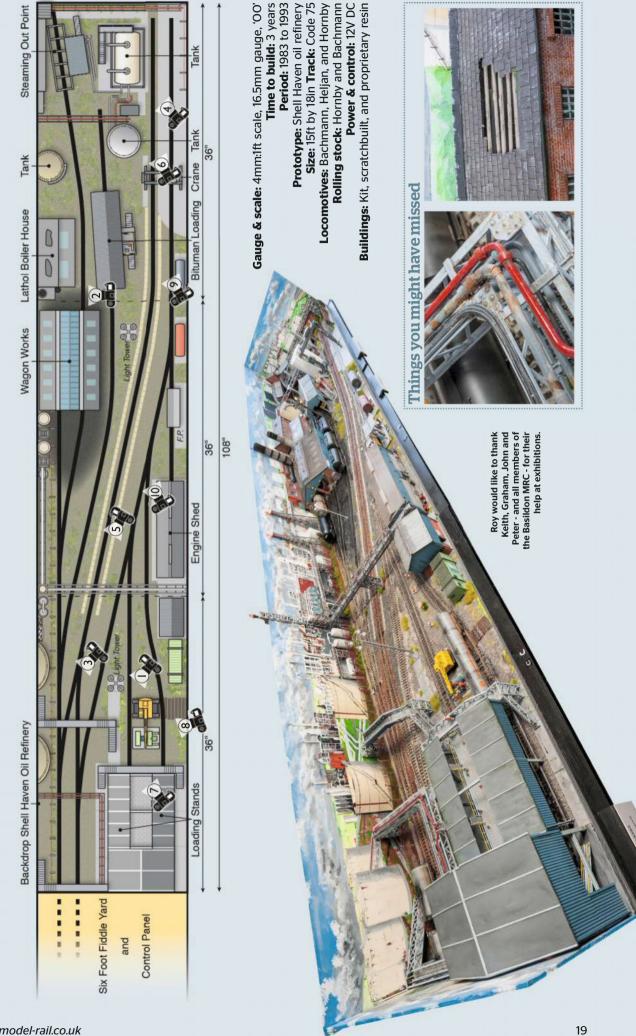
So often we talk of freelance or prototype layouts, but 'Shell Haven' really is a combination of the two. So, the next time you pass up modelling a prototype due to limited sources, take a leaf out of Roy's book. Creativity doesn't have to limit authenticity.

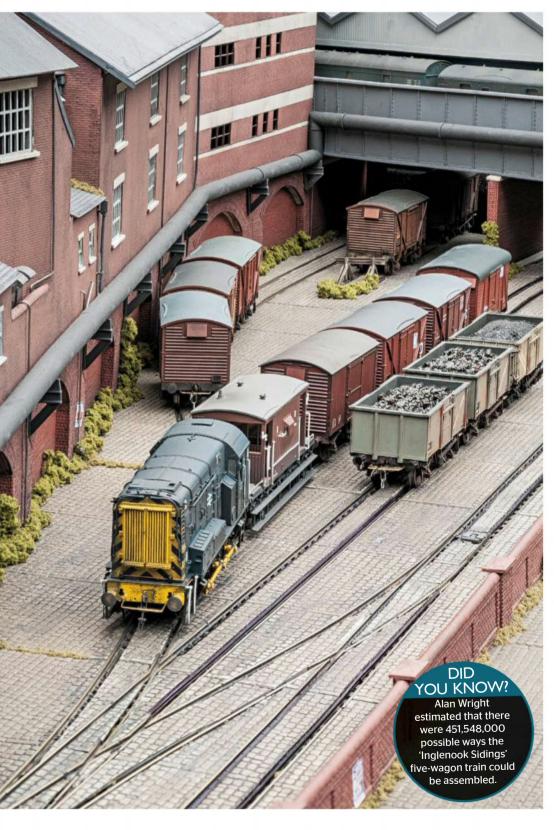

# BUILD SMALL, PLAY BIG

**BRIAN ROLLEY** discusses how an inglenook-inspired track plan can maximise operation on the tiniest of layouts, and delves into the famed shunting puzzle's history.



'inglenook' is little more than a small layout. But, delve into its construction and you'll find a cleverly conceived track plan that packs almost limitless operational potential onto a baseboard the size of a bookshelf.

In fact, inglenook layouts are so compact, a 4mm:1ft scale modeller can get by with eight wagons, two first radius points and a single shunting locomotive.

The inglenook shunting puzzle can be traced back to an article by A.R. Walkley, published in the June 1926 edition of *Model Railway News*, in which he described his folding portable 'HO' scale model railway, which measured 6ft by 11in.

The layout incorporated a goods yard comprising three sidings - a headshunt and short siding serving an engine shed. For almost 40 years, Walkley's concept was forgotten. But, in the mid-1960s, a layout with a similar track plan appeared at a Manchester Model Railway Society Christmas dinner, where it sparked interest among the guests as a shunting puzzle.

The now commonly used term 'inglenook' first featured in the December 1982 edition of *Model Railways*, where Alan Wright described his small three-siding shunting layout as 'Inglenook Sidings'.

#### **INGLENOOK ANATOMY**

An inglenook track plan comprises just two points, three sidings, and a headshunt. The layout can be measured in regards to SLU, a railway term meaning Standard Length Unit - the length over buffers of a standard 12 ton van, or 21ft.

The headshunt should be long enough to accommodate the shunting locomotive and three SLUs. Two of the sidings are long enough to hold three SLUs. Finally, the longest siding should hold five SLUs.

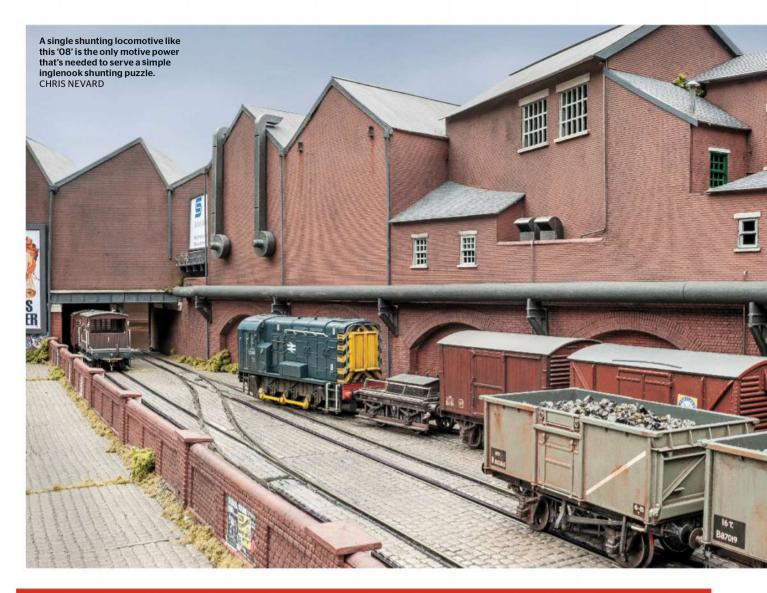
This provides 11 possible places for wagons to stand and the puzzle should be operated using eight wagons and a single shunting locomotive.

#### **GAME ON**

Alan Wright enhanced the operating potential of 'Inglenook Sidings' in the form of a game. He assigned each wagon a tiddlywink.

To begin, five tiddlywinks were drawn at random from a pot and laid out. The order in which the tiddlywinks were drawn dictated the order in which the corresponding five wagons were to be made up into a train on the longest siding.

Once the train of five wagons had been shunted into the correct order, the game was completed; the tiddlywinks could be returned to the pot and the game restarted.



#### 'ROSAMUND STREET SIDINGS'

My layout, 'Rosamund Street Sidings' ('RSS') (MR233 and MR235), was designed to fit in a space of 5ft 8in by 1ft 5in.

Under normal circumstances, a 'OO' layout with such a small footprint would be restricted in terms of operational capabilities - a means of maintaining interest was needed.

Over the years I'd seen any number of 'Inglenook Sidings'-inspired layouts on the exhibition circuit and in the modelling press.

Generally, these layouts depicted a rural setting, but I'd always thought it unlikely that such a small, rural railway would be as busy as many of these layouts portrayed.

To that end I decided that 'RSS' would suit an urban setting, surrounded by industrial buildings, which would better justify continual railway activity.

Viewed from the front, you can see that 'RSS' is composed of six roads which comprise:

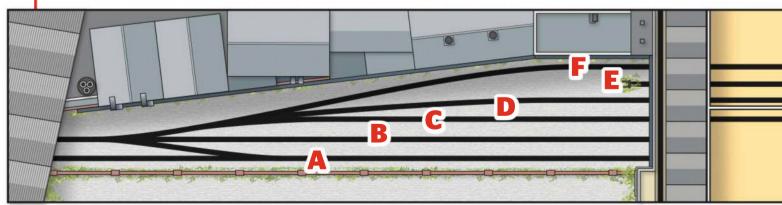
- (A) Loop road
- (B) Through road
- (C) Exchange road
- (D) No. 1 road
- (E) No. 2 road\*
- (F) No. 3 road

\* The dead end of a siding, accessed off-stage - installed to make the layout appear busier than it actually is.

'RSS' is slightly larger and contains more sidings than a traditional inglenook track plan, but the standard inglenook framework can be found in roads D and F (three SLU) and C (five SLU).

Using a card system (page 74) trains of five wagons are marshalled into the Exchange road (C), from where I imagine that the train departs for other locations on the BR network.

#### PLAY THE GAME

I always intended to exhibit 'RSS', and felt that an advance on Alan Wright's tiddlywink game would provide additional operation for myself, while illustrating the workings of the inglenook system to those watching the layout.

I decided on a card game, where each wagon in use would be identified via an individual card, including both a photograph and number.

#### **RULES OF ENGAGEMENT**

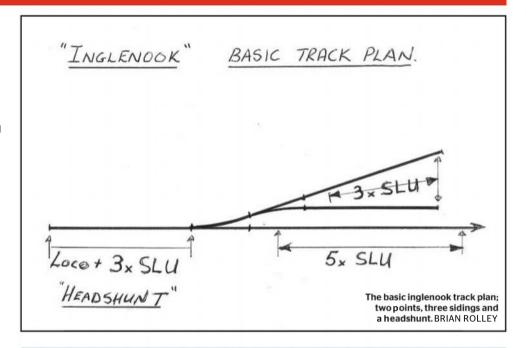
Now for the interesting part - using the card system to operate the shunting puzzle.

At the start of an operating session, the eight wagons are ordered as desired, with three in road F, three in road D, and two in road C.

The eight wagon cards are then shuffled and five cards drawn at random. The yard pilot must now shunt each wagon into road C (the Exchange road), in the order that the cards were drawn.

Once the train is formed and the wagons are arranged in the correct order, the game is complete. The cards can now be shuffled again and the process repeated.

For an even greater challenge, you might want to note down the number of manoeuvres required and how long each game takes, attempting to beat your score in subsequent games.



#### **ROLLING STOCK**

The rolling stock found on 'RSS' is largely traditional, including 16 ton mineral wagons and 12 ton vans - some of the most common types seen on the network during my chosen era (late 1960s to early 1970s).

A few 'jokers' are included in order to break up the monotony, as well as add operational difficulty due to increased lengths. Such examples include a 'Weltrol', a 'Lowmac', a couple of brake vans, and an ex-GWR shunter's truck.





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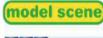


















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# INGLENOCKS MORE THAN A HANDFUL OF SIDINGS?

They may be compact in size, but that doesn't mean inglenook layouts need to be short on ambition too, says **PAUL A. LUNN**.

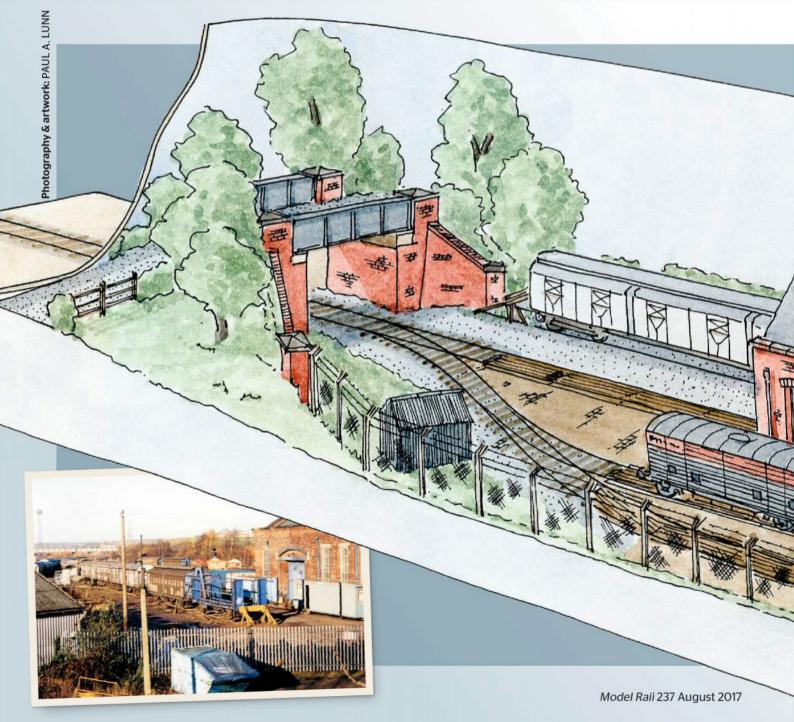
shunting layout concept is a railway modelling cornerstone. It has been replicated and modified many times, and continues to find favour as part of the model railway planner's armoury of solutions. The reason is simple:

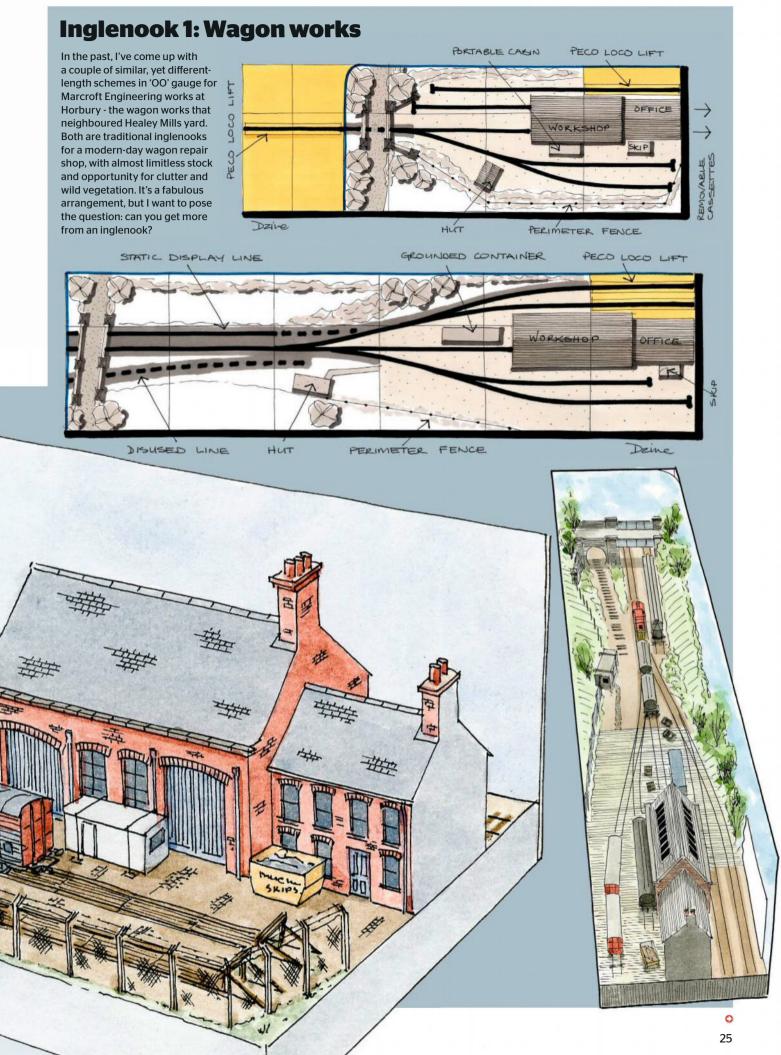
it's quick to build and interesting to operate.

There is, however, much debate about what actually constitutes an inglenook. Are you one of those people who is highly specific about the number and length of sidings, how many points are used and the size of the baseboard? Or are you more

flamboyant, perhaps adding a run-round loop or additional sidings?

I don't propose to go into that debate here. What I've done is far more exciting: provide you with eight inglenook ideas based on various prototype locations, but the same common track plan.





#### **Inglenook 2: Scottish branch terminus**

The first design combines features from both Loch Tay and Killin stations on the classic and much-missed branch line in Scotland. Unlike most inglenooks, it features a passenger service with dedicated headshunt.

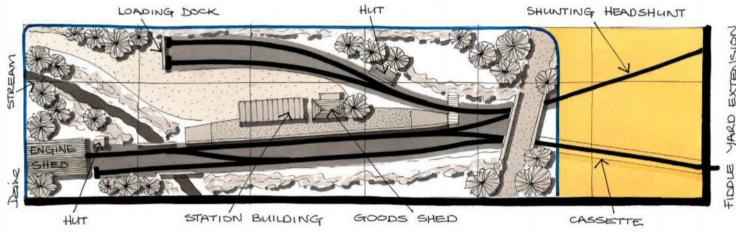
Passenger trains on the Killin branch usually comprised a solitary Brake Third coach, although some trains were mixed. Goods trains were quite short too, making the branch ideal for an inglenook. Caledonian Railway O-4-4Ts were the main motive power, until they were replaced by BR '4MT' 2-6-4Ts shortly before the line closed in 1965. A Mk 1 Full Brake was used to transport flowers and bulbs in the appropriate season, and there was a panelled coach - acting as section hut and tool store - for permanent way staff.

In a narrow linear space, I've tried to get away from everything running parallel to the baseboard edge.

Operationally, there are three tracks to shunt (two in the yard and one against the platform face), interspersed with passenger trains, and locomotives running round and going on and off-shed. Note that I've provided a combined locomotive and coach cassette for turning trains off-stage.

Beyond Killin, the line extended to Loch Tay, but this stretch was only retained in order to access the small engine shed. '4MT' No. 80093 dwarfs the structure on August 4 1965. JOHN GOSS





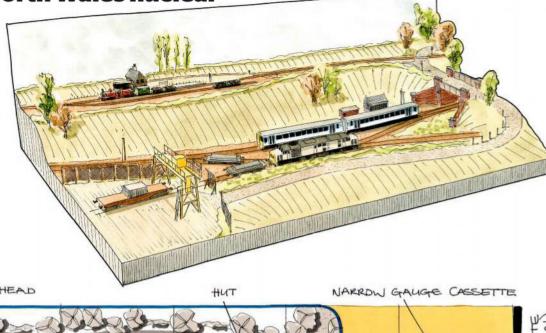


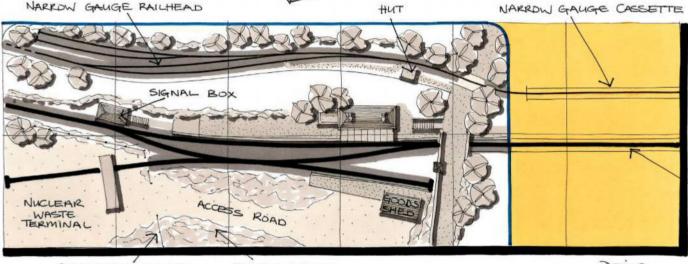

**Inglenook 3: North Wales nuclear** 

I've amalgamated several North Wales prototypes, for maximum operation. For standard gauge, there's a nuclear waste terminal and a separate loading bay for gunpowder or other relevant freight. There's also a station for passengers visiting a temporary, off-stage, narrowgauge terminus. An inglenook shunting arrangement has been provided to the rear (unusually for narrow gauge) as part of a renewal scheme, circumnavigating the original route which was subsequently flooded by regional water authority development... so much for the back story!

### **Inglenook 4: Brewery**

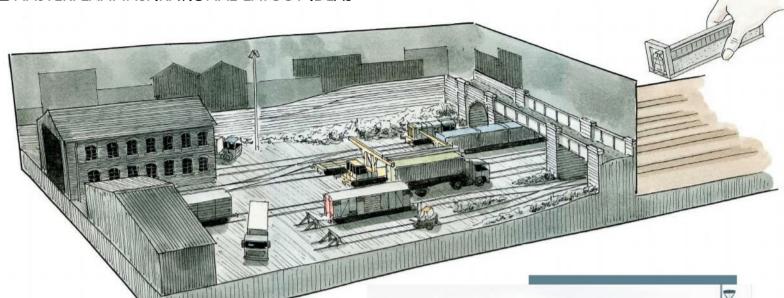
This interchangeable brewery scene is part of my friend Peter Salmon's much larger home-based layout and yet, in itself, is an inglenook. With several sidings to shunt, including one primarily for locomotive use, it differs from previous shelf examples; sidings curve noticeably away from the main line run-round loop, making it ideally suited to a corner location.

The most significant failing of inglenooks, for me, is that everything tends to run parallel to the baseboard

edge. This is typical of train sets, rather than model railways. In guiding Peter I've tried to ensure that the building arrangement is more organic, with varied ground levels, too. There's a naturally occurring, not forced, perspective from front to back, largely because corners have sufficient depth for such representation.

Please note that the annotations on the plan refer to Metcalfe kit descriptions. Very few structures came from their brewery kit and the one that did was heavily modified.

#### Inglenook 5: Intermodal depot

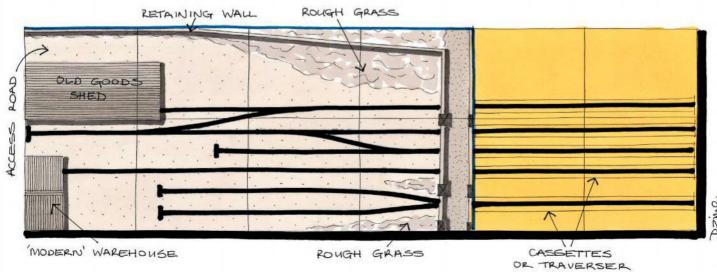
This minimum-space, upgraded old railway yard provides a wonderful opportunity to contrast an atmospheric period scene with modern stock. It's inspired by the work of lain Rice and encompasses the last section of a line, between the overbridge and warehouses. While in reality we're only going to see the first couple of wagons of any train, we can imagine it to be much longer.

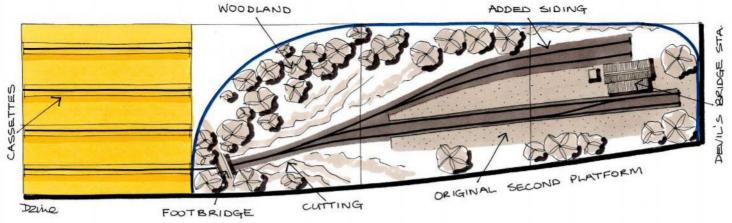


An ideal short intermodal working, photographed at Derby on September 25 2011. The train comprised two FTA container flats, with a pair of VGA vans on each end - a featherweight load for 66004. I've seen shorter trains than this, even down to one or two wagons.

The plan is a dual inglenook made up of three foreground sidings for one set and three partial loops, to the rear, for the other. Both share cassettes for gaining access from one line to another.

Something based solely on container traffic might pale into operational indifference over time. I've gone to Dewsbury Railway Street and Selby yards for additional inspiration - fresh fruit from Spain, and flowers, probably from Holland, respectively.





#### **Inglenook 6: Vale of Rheidol**

It's often easy to refine a scheme or indeed to improve upon reality. The Vale of Rheidol Railway's terminus at Devil's Bridge is in a beautiful location, but has a very basic and limited track plan.

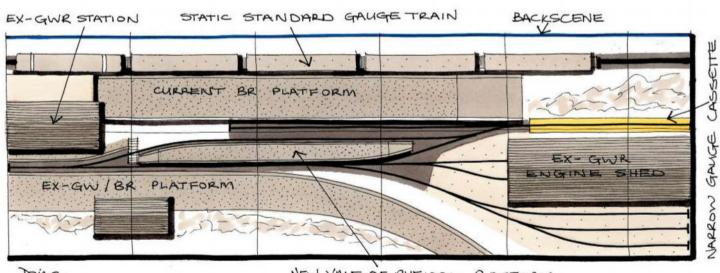
In upgrading to inglenook status, I'd add at least one, possibly two, extra sidings, for engineer's trains (in modern times) or logging (if you're prepared to set the clock back to the early 1900s). The track and facilities have changed over the years, so research is required if you want period accuracy.

Its Aberystwyth terminus differs considerably. I've manipulated the track plan to accommodate inglenook sidings in front of the ex-GWR locomotive shed and a run-round loop within the station environs, and to hide the narrow gauge line to Devil's Bridge behind the locomotive shed in order to disguise a non-scenic cassette.

A particularly pleasing feature is a standard gauge, static train used as a view blocker to the rear of the layout. Again, it's about visual contrast, and can easily be changed as the fancy takes you. For example, I'd use a Class 40 and Mk 1s.

#### **Inglenook 7: Military dockside**

I suspect that most inglenooks are built for fun and comprise a few sidings thrown together for almost endless shunting possibilities. There's absolutely nothing wrong with that.

But I wonder how many people consider the possibility of an inglenook as a fully fledged layout in its own right; well-researched, perhaps following a particular prototype, intensively detailed and compositionally stunning?

This scheme is based on Liverpool docks and set during the Second World War. At that time, the docks covered 500 acres and boasted 29 miles of quays capable of accommodating any ship afloat. It played a vital role in the Battle of the Atlantic, the North African invasion and the invasion of Europe.

During that period 4.7 million soldiers, including 1.2 million Americans, passed through the docks. A staggering 75.15 million tons of cargo was imported, including 73,782 aeroplanes. Among these were Republic P-47 Thunderbolts and North American P-51 Mustangs, as well as Lockheed Hudsons and even Horsa

Around 660,000 tons of cargo comprised tanks, vehicles and spare parts. Sherman tanks, Buffalo tracked landing vehicles (LVT-1s) and DUKWs were all imported, before being loaded straight on to railway wagons for onwards distribution. But it wasn't all one-way traffic: a number

of British Matilda II tanks were sent to the Soviet Union.

Of particular interest would have been the arrival of USA Transportation Corps 'S160' 2-8-0s and 'S100' 0-6-0Ts which, although landed across the Mersey at Birkenhead, could be worth including. You might need to rethink the design to cater for the YOU KNOW? discrepancy between

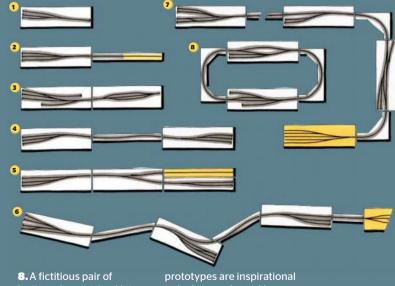


#### TAKE IT A STAGE FURTHER

Having built an inglenook, that doesn't mean that you can't develop it further. Why not expand it when circumstances permit? Here are a few ideas to illustrate potential inglenook development:

- **1.** Basic inglenook of around 4-6ft long by 1-2ft wide.
- **2.** Basic inglenook with an added scenic/part non-scenic headshunt.
- **3.** Pair of inglenooks, end-to-end. A coal disposal point, such as British Oak, with exchange sidings would be ideal.
- **4.** Pair of fictitious inglenooks, sharing a common central headshunt for added, two-operator complexity.

- **5.** Pair of different-sized inglenooks with a reversing junction. Liskeard (fiddleyard) to Moorswater China Clay, with reversal to Looe, would be a useful prototypical example.
- **6.** Perhaps the most ambitious option: an organic arrangement, for a large room or exhibition hall. Angled boards allow us to follow a 'twisting-turning' prototype route, like the Wisbech & Upwell Tramway. **7.** A series of in-line
- 7. A series of in-line inglenooks, in L- or U-shaped format, to fit a particular room. Inspired by the Clayton West Branch, West Yorkshire.



**8.** A fictitious pair of inglenooks contrived into a traditional oval. Please note, suggested

prototypes are inspirationa only. Areas coloured in mustard yellow represent non-scenic sections.



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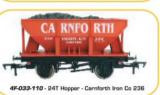
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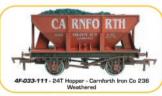












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# **MOLINNIS**

**NICK DIBBEN** resisted the urge to add too much detail. The result is a contemporary Cornish layout that appears much bigger than the modest space it occupies.

efrain from jumping ahead to the track plan for a moment, and estimate just how big you think 'Molinnis' really is.

Before you do so, bear in mind that Nick Dibben's contemporary Cornish layout contains the following: the outskirts of a town, a large factory, a section of main line, part of a housing estate, clumps of forest, a seemingly vast expanse of countryside (including a river) and a branch line flanked by a disused china clay dries.

That's a lot of stuff to fit on a large layout, but at 8ft by 3ft (including fiddleyard) 'Molinnis' isn't particularly big, even if it's built in 1:148 scale.

But Nick's modelling genius doesn't stop there. Not only has he managed to cram a lot on to his baseboard, he's managed to create a real sense of space too.

What I referred to earlier as a vast expanse of countryside isn't actually that vast, but study a close-up photograph and it looks positively huge! The question is, how on earth did Nick do it?

#### EASY ON THE GOODS

"I think it's partly because I haven't gone over the top with the detail," explains Nick. "There isn't as much detail as perhaps you think there is."

The result is plenty of space in which to allow the layout to breathe: nothing feels crammed in, or like it shouldn't be there in the first place.

Many of the details are also suggestive: a row of housing and a main road signal the outskirts of a town, and a cul-de-sac of eight modest houses is all that's needed to convey a larger estate - imagined off-scene.

Nick cites depth as a key reason for the wealth of space, too. "There isn't a lot of track, but the scenic section is quite deep - the best part of 2ft in places," he reveals.

#### FLAT? FORGET IT

Although the track is flat, the rest of the baseboard isn't. "The area at the front is lowered by around 10mm," says Nick. "The river itself is lowered by a further 10mm, and at the back it rises up again - by about 20mm to 30mm. I used sheets of 8mm-thick polystyrene, which I found easy to contour without too much carving and hacking."

'Molinnis' is a freelance layout, but is still heavily based on the Cornish main line and Newquay branch. Nick explains why: "I took the operation of the line - local services, through trains and a little freight, which makes it a believable situation. Then you can be creative.

"The layout started life as Bugle station, but I imagined that there was another station on the line. Molinnis is a real Hamlet near Bugle, so that provided plenty of inspiration.

"You could assume that the platform is the other side of the backscene, just off the layout. I decided I wanted a passing loop, a junction for the branch line, and a siding for a factory. I then had to spend time figuring out how I could fit all of these elements on to the baseboard."

#### MADE FROM CHINA

The china clay dries are based on the China Clay Country Park museum, near St Austell. Nick took photographs •

#### **ROAD WORKS**

The road was downloaded from www.scalescenes.com and printed using a home computer. Nick weathered the road surface, although only a light coating was needed as the downloadable texture comes already weathered.

Nick used a simple method to hide any joins: "The road surfaces are slightly different widths, so I disguised joins by using a differentcoloured strip to represent freshly laid asphalt."

during a visit to help him scratchbuild the model.

"I used Scalescenes textured paper for the stonework," he reveals. "The chimney [see below] was originally a piece of plastic piping, but it didn't look right. I wanted it to taper, so a friend of mine turned a new one for me on a lathe."

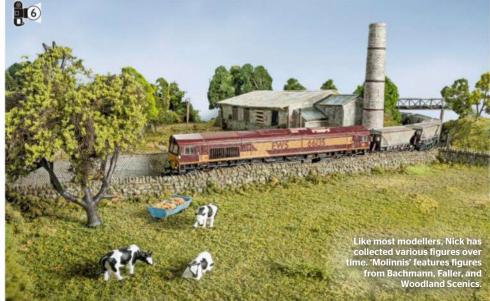
# TONAL VARIATION

Nick ballasts his track after he's crafted the scenery. He believes this approach creates a more effective join between the two.

"I spray the track a grimy brown colour before applying the ballast," he explains. The ballasting process is similar to his method of applying ground cover.

Nick continues: "It's a mixture. I'll use Woodland Scenics fine ballast, but vary the colours. It's a cocktail of browns, greys and blacks. The main line and branch line sport slightly different mixes, with the branch line being a bit darker to represent older ballast."





Behind the factory, Nick has even recreated the settling ponds, where the clay is placed prior to drying. Next to the dries is a pipe and girder arrangement, which has been kit-bashed to partially hide the scenic break.

#### STICK TO YOUR ROOTS

Nick is clear about where 'Molinnis' is based. Using the infrastructure and motive power present on the Cornish main line and Newquay branch as inspiration, he's freed up time to focus on tailoring the track plan and

scenery to his own modelling and operational needs.

Time spent refining the track plan and carefully crafting the scenery is evident in what might just be an almost perfect composition. A wealth of scenic elements combine to make 'Molinnis' an extremely interesting layout to view, and clever uses of space allow the model to breathe and seem larger than it really is.

### **GROUND FORCE**

Nick's use of scatter to form ground cover is particularly effective. "I mix about ten different types of scatter material," he explains. "I'll use scatter from a variety of manufacturers and of different sizes, grades and colours, too.

"I mix up a large batch in a sealed plastic bag, which I'll shake before use. I always make sure I've got some of the mixture left over, which I use for repairs. I'll also modify the mix here and there by adding more of a certain colour or grade to vary the mix - ground cover is never completely even."

'Molinnis' is home to a staggering amount of trees, and Nick makes it

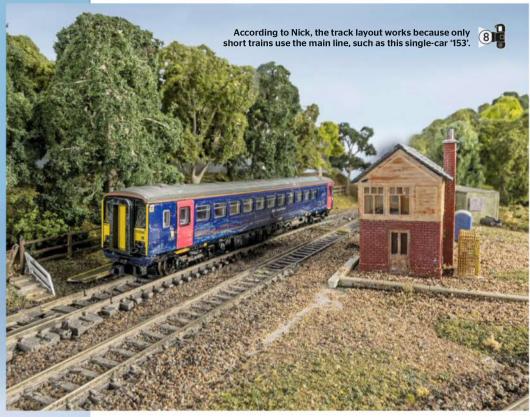




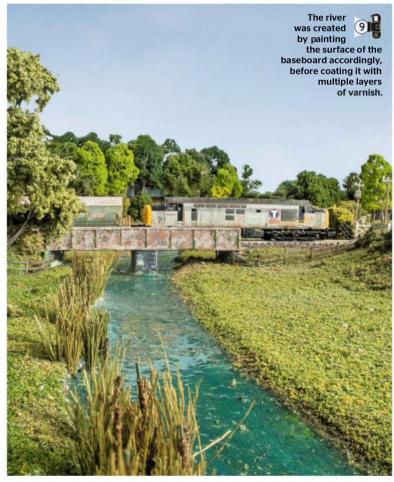
abundantly clear he was never going to scratchbuild them all. "The trees at the back are from The Model Tree Shop. There's about 100 trees, so I decided I wasn't going to scratchbuild all of those," he laughs.

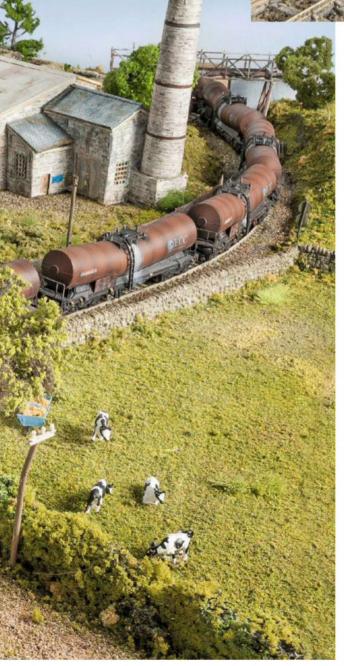
Nick has made sure to clump trees closely together in order to simulate the thick density of many British forests.

Some of the trees in the foreground are built from various commercial tree armatures, and others from sea moss. Nick uses various scatter materials to represent leaves, with fine scatter reserved for sea moss trees and thicker clumps of flock for larger armatures.

# HOW TO: CREATE ULTRA-REA

## Peco's new bullhead track gave fresh impetus to **CHRIS NEVARD's** stalled Forest of Dean project.

ne of the biggest pitfalls in model railway construction is poor planning. All too often, potentially great layouts fail because things were not thought through properly at the outset.

I'd like to think that, with experience, this becomes less of an issue. Sadly, though, not in my case! Even after four decades of messing about with model trains, my embryonic 'Forest of Dean' project has fallen foul of the same trap.

As the previous instalments (MR221/226) have shown, I'd reached the stage of installing track and hand-built pointwork onto a set of baseboards from Tim Horn's excellent range of laser-cut plywood kits. However, I then struggled to visualise how the completed layout would look. Lack of modelling time has also been a factor. Basically, the layout was becoming a chore rather than fun.

### **BREAKING TRADITION**

A brief diversion into building a tiny layout ('Brew Street', MR229/230) restored my modelling mojo. Slapping down a few lengths of Peco track and turnouts proved a fun, liberating and time-saving experience, compared to my usual preference for hand-built track.

I was thrilled by the recent release of Peco's new bullhead track. Offering an interesting alternative to the excellent C&L and SMP ranges, its main advantage is its 100% compatibility with the existing Peco Code 75 system of track and points.

One thing I've learned over the years is the importance of using techniques suited to the amount of available hobby time. Comfortably juggling modelling between the day job and other interests

is vital: if the fun element goes, what's the point? This is why I think so many layout projects flounder.

Having confined my hand-built trackwork to safe storage, a box of Peco's bullhead rail was purchased and work gathered momentum once again. I prefer to lay my track onto a foamboard base, rather than direct onto the baseboard. This allows me to build up the track remotely, before gluing it to the baseboards. Fortunately, I had yet to secure the track module, so a change of heart was easy.

#### **FULL STEAM AHEAD**

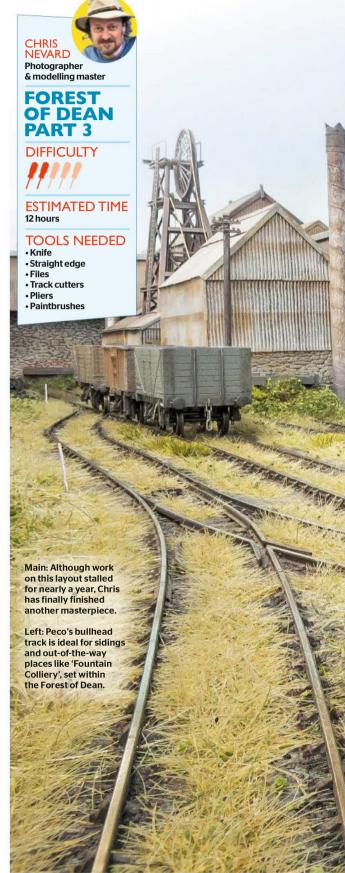
After downloading full-size track and point templates from Peco's website, they were printed off and a modified track plan devised. I'd already built most of the buildings for the layout, so they were also placed on the baseboards to gauge clearances and create a workable composition. This 3D planning is far more effective than working on paper alone.

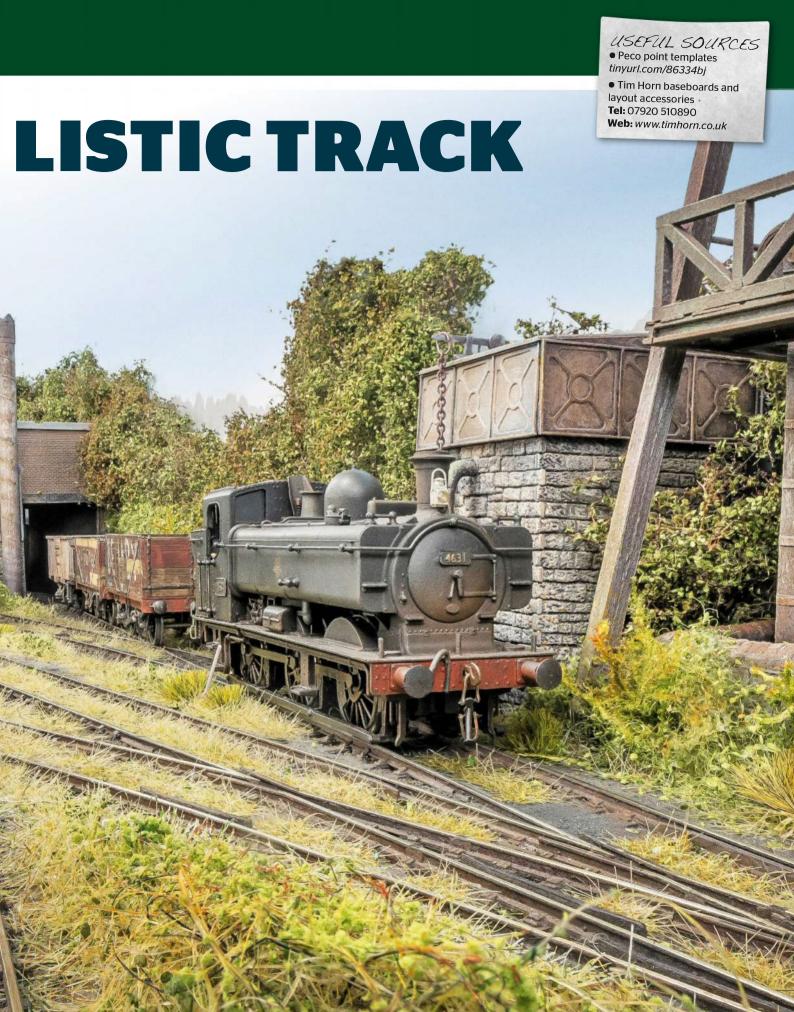
The premise of 'Fountain Colliery' is a re-creation of a small, fictional colliery, deep within the Forest of Dean. Gloucestershire. Set in the post-war vears, the production of coal continues. but the long-term future is bleak. Accordingly, the track and infrastructure has a somewhat melancholic air.

By the time you read this, the layout will have attended its first exhibition - the Warminster Finescale Show. Booking the appearance for mid-June was another way of motivating myself to get the layout finished.

An important lesson has been learned with this layout: keep it simple and keep it fun! M







## HOW TO DO IT: LAY BULLHEAD TRACK



Some of the key buildings had already been constructed, so I had fun arranging Peco paper templates and trying out different scenarios over a fortnight... until my better half decided she wanted the dining room table back!



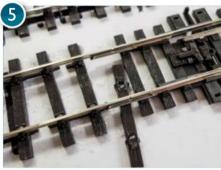
I cut a foamboard base on which to lay the track; it can be glued to the baseboard later. This makes track laying and wiring much easier, especially when working with a diorama/layout-in-a-box type of baseboard.



Once I'd settled on a track plan, the templates were fixed to the foamboard using a Pritt glue stick. It's important to double-check for clearances with rolling stock and buildings before any track is cut or joined.



Thankfully, Peco's new bullhead rail track is fully compatible with the same brand's range of finescale 'OO' turnouts, using standard Code 75 fishplates, making for rapid, easy progress.



With the fishplate rail joiners installed, a gap will remain between the sleepers of the track and the turnout. Popping in a spare sleeper, with the plastic chairs cut away, solves this problem.



To join lengths of Peco bullhead rail, use Peco's delicate new joiners (SL-114) for a realistic effect. No need to modify the sleepers, and the joiners resemble the bolted fishplates of the prototype.



Track sections and points were laid out on the baseboard to check the rail joints were tight, and adequate room was allowed for the buildings and scenic features. A 'dry' run is important, before the track is fixed in place.



The track assembly was then transferred to the foamboard sub-base and, after soldering power feeds, it was fixed with fast-drying cyanoacrylate glue. Work outside or in a well-ventilated room as the glue fumes are noxious.



When the glue has fully cured, the foamboard track base can be fixed to the baseboard with PVA glue. Drill holes for power feeds and point motors (if desired) beforehand. Ensure that the foam base is flat and level as the PVA dries.



After wiring and testing, a light layer of Halfords matt black aerosol paint is misted over the track, followed by a hint of red and grey primers. This 'tastes' track colour before ballasting. Clean railheads and switch blades.



Sprinkle and spread ballast over the track, then dribble diluted PVA (50/50, with a dash of washing-up liquid) over it to secure everything in place. Use a loaded brush to touch the top of the rail, allowing glue to flow into the ballast.

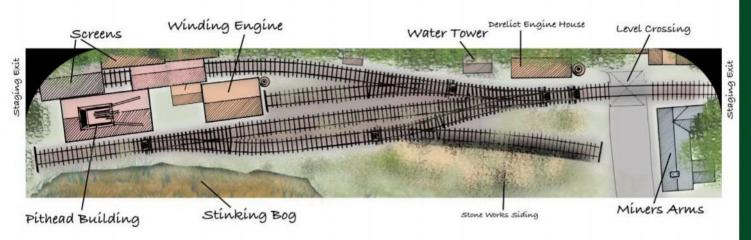


Leave for a day or two to set, then scrape any stray ballast off the rail sides, sleeper tops and from around the point blades. If you're portraying a main line scenario, this might be where you want to leave things.

### LAYOUT PLANS

Layout dimensions (excluding fiddleyards): length 130cm, width 30cm







So, how do I create that smooth fine ballast effect seen in sidings and yards? Well, my method is simple - if a little time-consuming. First, smear DAS modelling clay (Fimo is good too) over the ballast with your fingers...



...then use a damp, stiff brush to manipulate the clay, with a smaller brush and a little water to wash away excess from rail chairs. Underlying ballast must be thoroughly dry and, preferably, an exterior grade of PVA glue employed.

### **GROTTY GROUNDWORK**

Tester pots of matt emulsion are great for scenic work, with moody shades being ideal for portraying grotty industrial scenes. I tend to begin with a darker colour around the track, before gradually blending paler colours further away from the rails. A little water helps to blend the shades - experimenting on a scrap surface is recommended.

If you make a mistake, just let what you've done dry before starting over again. Be prepared to go over areas a few times until you achieve the desired effect.

There's no point suggesting specific paint colours, as the names tend to change with prevailing fashions. Try to avoid anything too dark, though. How the ground appears in real life, compared to how it looks from a scale of 100 feet away, is very different.

The final job is to paint the sides of the rails. A chocolate or dark leather shade works better than stock 'rust' colours, which can be too orange for old, rusty rails. Rather than paint a solid colour, I employ dry-brushing for a subtle effect, wiping most of the paint off the brush before wiping it over the rails.

Finally, pale grey shades are drybrushed over the dark sleepers, helping to pick out the surface relief, especially of the simulated wood grain. Don't forget to keep the railheads and point blades clean.



## **OVERGROWN TRACK**

To suit the period and location, I wanted the track on this layout to be overgrown with weeds. Great results were achieved with static grass, grass tufts and a little scatter, secured with small, random blobs of PVA applied with a small brush. Autumn and

winter grass shades are preferred, producing a convincing late summer, bleached look.

After 12 hours, the glue will dry clear and extra grass clumps, from War World Scenics (www.war-world.co.uk) can be added, along with a little traditional scatter here and there

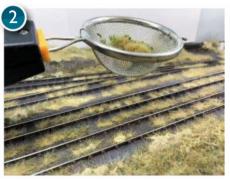
for variety. When happy, a light misting with cheap hairspray will hold everything in place.

Before running trains, you'll need to remove any stray fibres from the railheads, point frogs and blades.

## HOW TO DO IT: CREATE OVERGROWN TRACK



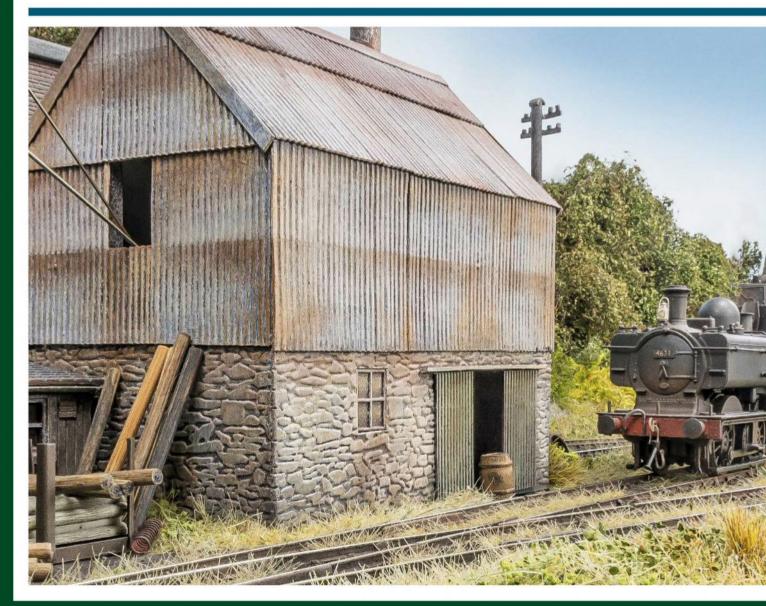
I tried to keep the glue away from the rail sides, and lightly diluting the PVA proved beneficial (around 80% glue to 20% water). It's not an exact science, so have a go yourself and see what works best.

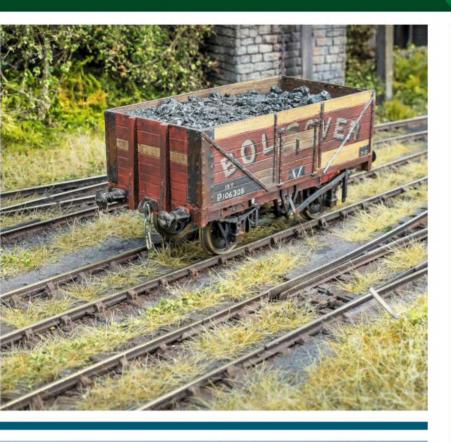


While the glue is wet, apply 6mm-long grass fibres over the track (if working in 'N' gauge, try 2mm fibres) with your chosen static grass applicator. Any type of static grass tool will work, including a simple puffer bottle.



Before the glue fully sets, run a vacuum cleaner over the track (keeping the nozzle a few inches away from the surface) to remove any stray fibres. This also helps the grass to stand upright, but take care to avoid removing it entirely!

apol's first foray into 'O' gauge diesels, the BR Class 08, turned out to be a wonderful model, offering an affordable route into larger scale modelling that has inspired many to consider dabbling in 7mm:1ft scale.

While the overall level of accuracy and realism is impressive, the choice of the earlier style body - with large bonnet door hinges - limits its application, especially to modellers of the late BR and privatisation scenes.

Dapol has yet to announce plans for a re-tooled '08', so I'd been pondering the possibility of modifying the existing bodyshell to represent one of the longer-lived 'Gronks'.

After settling on a suitable prototype, research revealed that the model would The modified bonnet doors and hinge detail have created a much more authentic rendition of a late 1980s BR 'Gronk'.

need a few detail tweaks in order to portray the real 08434. As well as cutting away the bonnet door hinges, one of the louvred equipment boxes must also be removed from the running plate, meaning that the missing door sections would have to be filled in.

### **OUICK STRIP-DOWN**

The conversion work didn't prove overly challenging, helped by the ease with which the model can be stripped down to its component parts. A handful of screws hold the main sections together, while smaller fittings and cab glazing are retained with a strange gum-type adhesive. While it offers a strong bond, the parts are readily pulled apart and the 'gum' simply wiped away, leaving no residue. This was a real boon, so full marks to Dapol!

As well as the door alterations, a few other minor detail tweaks were necessary. Many Class 08s had the number of headlamps reduced from four to two, while my particular model also needed the radiator access ladders removing. A set of wipers was also added to the cab windows, scratchbuilt from fine copper wire.

There are other potential detail upgrades for the more determined modeller, not least the addition of bonnet top lifting lugs. I'd toyed with the idea of adding these, but decided

# HOW TO DO IT: UPGRADE DAPOL'S '08'



Dapol's Class 08 is simple to dismantle, following the supplied instructions. Begin by removing the two small screws affixing the body to the chassis. Keep the screws in a safe place.





The bonnet and cab is then freed from the metal running plate by removing two further screws. The glue bond needs to be gently broken, peeling the bonnet away from the running plate.



If your prototype warrants it, pull away the equipment box from the bonnet side. Remove the handrails and push out the glazing. The radiator access ladders and cab doors are held in place by small wire pins.



Remove unwanted numbers and emblems with fine sanding sticks. As I planned to repaint the model, it didn't matter that the black plastic was revealed through the livery. Take care not to remove the fine detail.



not to, probably for the same reason that Dapol left them off in the first place. Given that the bonnet top is designed to unclip to allow access to the interior, any fine detail additions are at risk of damage.

Thanks to some natty decals from Railtec, my rendition of 08434 depicts the humble 'Gronk' in the last years of its life, adorned with the unofficial name 'Midland', courtesy of Tinsley shed staff. With its shabby blue paintwork and weathered finish, my Dapol '08' now looks much more appropriate for the 1980s-era layout that I've been dreaming up... M

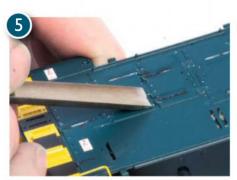

Carefully pare away the moulded door hinges, removing a little material at a time. A shallow wood carving gouge (No. 4 sweep) proved particularly effective. A flat blade brings the risk of 'digging in' and creating a recess.



Finish the flattening work with successively fine grades of abrasive pads. The Flex-i-File range offered by Albion Alloys is particularly useful (www.albionhobbies.com). Avoid



15thou' (0.4mm) plastic card made up the missing door sections, secured with cyano glue. When dry, the gaps were filled with putty. Missing door hinges were added from 0.9mm brass wire and plastic strip.



light units must be removed from the cab and nose ends, along with the cable conduit. Pull away the lights and fill the apertures with plastic strip and putty.



After thorough cleaning to remove debris and grease, a white primer coat was built up over the modified areas of bonnet and cabs. Preserve the wasp stripes on the nose and cab ends with masking tape.



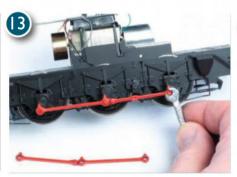
To recreate a typical faded look, RailMatch 207 Rail Blue was mixed with a drop of 412 Weathered Black and airbrushed into recesses and around panels. Next came Faded Rail Blue (451), concentrated in the centre of panels.



Allow the filler to cure before flattening the surface with abrasives or a sharpened mini screwdriver blade. Check your prototype to see if any lamp brackets were removed or repositioned.



Unadulterated RailMatch Rail Blue followed, misted carefully over the model to blend the lighter and darker shades together. The effect can look a little harsh at this stage, but do not fear!



The red coupling rods need to be repainted and it's much easier to treat these away from the model. Gently unscrew the crankpins with a small spanner and keep them in a safe place.



After degreasing the rods, they were primed and painted yellow, along with the modified cab ends. Yellow is an awkward colour to apply and is best built up over several light coats.



Careful prototype study can reveal interesting quirks worthy of replication. A damaged overhead warning symbol has been joined by a later equivalent.

The black elements of the wasp stripes were re-established with careful hand-brushing. Perfection wasn't essential, as subsequent weathering would disguise any discrepancies.



Re-fit the handrails, re-drilling the mounting holes if necessary (in case they're clogged with paint). Add any extra handrails if your prototype demands it, touching in the paintwork by hand.



After several clear gloss coats, the Railtec waterslide decals were applied. Micro Set, applied to the surface before the decals, aids adhesion. Leave overnight to dry before sealing with satin varnish.

A mixture of LifeColor UA701 Dark Rust, UA722 Roof Dirt and UA723 Weathered Black was applied to small areas of the bodywork, then mostly wiped away, aided by Liquid Pigments Remover.



A little LifeColor PG101 Dark Earth dry pigment was mixed with the same paints and stippled onto the chassis with a flat brush, working the medium into all of the nooks and crannies.



The hand-applied weathering was then refined with an airbrush, loaded with a mix of Tamiya acrylics: XF79 Linoleum Deck Brown, ZF24 Dark Grey and XF1 Flat Black. Work around the recesses and body panels.



The airbrush also refines the chassis frames. Add a little more black to the mix to create shading around the raised detail and a more brownish tint around the brake gear.



The connecting rods and parts of the chassis were treated to oily streaks, courtesy of LifeColor's Grease Effect paints (UA262 Dirty Grease and UA263 Grease. These dry to an oily, glossy sheen.



Before reassembly, be sure to clean the wheels thoroughly. A liquid cleaner, such as Track Magic from Deluxe Materials, will shift dried paint. Remember to clean the inner faces upon which the wiper pick-ups bear.



The opportunity was taken to enhance the cab interior with weathering washes and dry pigments. Dry-brushing also helped to pick out the various details. A driver in a suitably grubby uniform completes the picture.



After re-glazing and assembly, blend in any areas of the weathered finish with the airbrush, for a seamless transition from the chassis to body. We don't want it to be obvious that the parts have been treated separately.



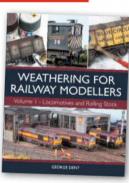
Finally, a set of windscreen wipers had to be fabricated. I used black-coated 28gauge copper jewellery-making wire, bent to shape and secured with a dab of PVA glue within drilled mounting holes.

# FIT KADEE COUPLERS

Not a fan of tension locks, **CHRIS LEIGH** explores the possibilities of this US coupling system to bring realistic, hands-free shunting to 'Polwyddelan'.

ouplings have always been an issue for me. I grew up with the Hornby-Dublo/Peco Simplex coupler which was OK when it was made of metal. Though it was prone to uncouple unexpectedly, you could easily adjust it with a pair of pliers.

When Hornby-Dublo started using plastic versions, however, these were more prone to uncoupling and impossible to adjust. Worse still, with the switch to the massive Tri-ang tension lock coupling, it was only marginally improved when both Bachmann and Hornby opted to reduce the size of the tension lock.

However, the current tension lock, in almost universal use on British outline models, is far from satisfactory, in my view. It consists of a plastic loop to which a vertically pivoting pressed metal hook is attached. The coupler may be clip-fitted into an NEM pocket on more recent models, but on older toolings it may be attached with a self-tapping screw or even moulded as part of the chassis or bogie. In theory, this should operate correctly with the smaller version, but in practice it doesn't.

In my experience, the metal hook of the modern tension lock is usually loose on the pivot and frequently falls off, rendering the coupling useless. As I write, I have one such hook lying on my desk. I've no idea where it has come from - probably a review sample.

Uncoupling requires the use of a ramp arrangement to lift the hooks, but on my layout I found that the standard Peco ramp fouled the low-hanging gear covers of my
Bachmann diesels. I considered
home-made ramps using clear acetate,
with a lever arrangement to raise and
lower it, but realised that I don't have the
mechanical skills to make something
that would actually work.

Of course, the traditional British full-size coupling, a hook and three large chain links, is coupled and uncoupled by hand. In model form it's impossible to automate. On my 'Black Dog Halt' layout, I used scale three-link and screw couplings because I wanted authentic appearance. It was also a largely straight layout so there was no problem with buffer-locking on curves.

Trying to couple three links, at arm's length, while leaning over the backscene, proved near impossible. The resultant fiddling and cursing, in front of •



## **HOW TO DO IT: CHANGE COUPLINGS**



On most modern ready-to-run wagons, the tension lock coupler is fitted in a pivoted NEM coupler pocket. The coupler simply unclips by pulling it out.



The Kadee No. 18 is the mid-length of the three versions designed to fit in an NEM pocket. There are four couplers in each packet and it is worth having packs of each of the three sizes available.



I've fitted this box van with the mid-length coupling, which will look good for a vacuum-braked train with wagons closely coupled, but might be too short for sharper curves.



The mid-length coupling on this 'Toad' brake van is likely to be too short, allowing buffer faces to come into contact on curves and cause derailments. A No. 19 will be a better choice.



It was disappointing to find that the Bachmann china clay wagon does not have NEM pockets but a larger tension lock, held in place with a self-tapping screw.



For these wagons I used the 'standard' Kadee coupler as supplied for the US market. There are different versions for every eventuality, but Nos. 23 and 28 should be a good start.



The standard Kadee coupler is assembled from four parts - the coupler, a phosphor-bronze spring and a two-part plastic box, called the draft gear box. A brush of liquid poly cement will ensure the draft gear box remains assembled.



The Bachmann 'clay hoods' don't have NEM pockets, so the tension lock must be removed by simply unscrewing it. I used the screw and mounting spigot to attach a standard Kadee.



Kadee produces a neat little coupler height gauge which fits over the rails and has a coupler pre-installed at the correct height. A quick check showed that my wagon coupling was far too low.



Mounting the coupler direct to the wagon floor would bring it to the right height and it would look better, too. I sawed off the three mounting spigots with a razor saw. Be careful of your fingers!



The remaining stumps of the spigots were filed off. I rested the wagon on an old paintbrush to avoid damaging the rather fragile buffers. The factory weathering was quite thorough!



I drilled out the mounting hole and used the same self-tapping screw to mount the coupler to the floor. The screw protrudes inside the wagon, but these vehicles are to be sheeted over, so it won't be seen.



Another check against the height gauge shows that the coupler is now mounted at the correct height. Draft gear box couplers can be glued in place, but a screw fixing is more dependable.



A check of the bogie against the coupler height gauge shows that a Kadee fitted on top of the coupler mounting plate will be at the right height. The locating pin can be cut off.



The E-Zmate coupler fits the Kadee draft gear box and has its own built-in centring springs, so the Kadee spring is not needed. The long shank on this coupler protrudes far enough for the Mk 3 coach.

an audience, was acutely embarrassing.

There are other couplings which have been devised by modellers to overcome some of the problems. I have no desire to manufacture my own couplings and I dislike the wire-across-the-buffers arrangement, which ruins the look of locomotives and stock.

An alternative is the miniature buck-eye made by Kadee. It employs a simple uncoupling arrangement which uses a magnet mounted between the running rails.

The biggest problem with Kadee couplings has been that ingenuity was sometimes required in order to mount them in the correct position on cars that were not designed to accept them, and which still had the remnants of a much more cumbersome coupler in place. Over time, Kadee produced more and more versions of the same coupler, designed to be



On Hornby Mk 3 coaches, the tension lock couplers are clip-fitted to the bogies. The bogie simply unclips from the coach and the coupler and its retaining plate can then be unclipped.



I only had one length of Kadee coupler available to fit a draft gear box, and this was not long enough for the Mk 3 coach. Fortunately, I had long shank Bachmann E-Zmate couplers available.



A medium-length coupler in the NEM pocket of the Class 57 works well with the long-shank E-Zmate coupler in a Kadee draft gear box mounted on the bogie of the Mk 3 coach.

mounted in different ways. The uncouplers, too, were developed to include electro-magnetic operation and hidden magnets, alongside the original concept. Of particular interest to me were Nos. 17, 18, and 19 couplers, because these have the 'swallow tail' to enable their use as direct replacements in the European NEM coupler pockets.

I began to wonder if Kadee couplings would suit my needs on 'Polwyddelan'. I've seen them used successfully on British-outline models, but I had always discounted them on the grounds that they did not look very British, and that buffers (which are absent from US equipment) might interfere with their operation.

As I reached the point where the coupling issue on 'Polwyddelan' needed to be resolved, I noticed some Kadee items on sale in my local model shop, Trains4U in Peterborough.

#### **COUPLING STYLES**

The traditional British coupling consists of three hoops of chain and a hook on each item of rolling stock. There were variations, such as a screw coupling where a bar and thread allowed the coupling chain to be tightened.

Buck-eye 'knuckle' couplers are very North American to British eyes, but there is historical precedent for using them on British layouts: Nigel Gresley fitted buck-eyes to his 'A4s' and main line coaches, whereas they're also used on rakes of Mk 1-Mk 4 coaches, as well as many new types of freight vehicle.

An afternoon spent with a screwdriver and a razor saw was sufficient to change the couplings on all the stock I need for 'Polwyddelan'. Only two trains, a passenger train of BR Mk 3 coaches and a china clay train, will actually have locomotive changes, and these will be simple sequences designed to demonstrate DCC control. Only the couplings on the ends of the rakes will be changed, tension locks being retained within each train. The relevant locomotives will have Kadee couplers on both ends.

Kadee buck-eyes don't look remotely like British three-link couplings, but nor do tension locks. I think the Kadee items look marginally less obtrusive than tension locks, but that may be because I've become accustomed to them on all my Canadian stock. The great advantage of vehicles fitted with NEM pockets, however, is that you can give Kadee couplings a try and, if you don't like them, you can simply re-fit the tension locks.

Initially, I equipped a locomotive and one clay wagon, and installed one uncoupler. It worked first time, and that convinced me I had done the right thing.

Start by equipping yourself with one pack each of Kadee Nos. 17, 18 and 19. These are the three different lengths available to fit NEM pockets. You can use trial and error to find the best length for each particular item of stock.

## HOW TO DO IT: INSTALL THE UNCOUPLER



Kadee produces several different uncouplers for different types of installation. There's even one that you can hide underneath the sleepers. No. 312 is the simplest to install.



The No. 312 is simply a magnetic strip. The pack contains two strips, which was all I needed, one for my platform road and one for the siding. I rested this one in position while I was deciding exactly where it should go.



I used a sharp point to mark the position on the sleepers and then cut them away with a razor saw. Because the track is mounted on thick Woodland Scenics underlay, cutting was an easy process.



The magnet was temporarily positioned in the slot once the debris of sleepers and ballast had been removed. It needs to sit just above rail level - the instructions say 1/64 in - but 'just above' will do.



I found that a little packing was necessary, in the shape of a piece of 30thou plastic sheet. It was glued in place and the magnet - chamfered edges downwards - was glued on top. Believe it or not, this was the first test, with nothing adjusted. The 'USA' propelled the wagons over the uncoupler and then backed away, leaving them to be collected by the Class 25.



The Class 25 has NEM pockets so the coupler change was a straightforward swap. In order to couple to the wagons, they must be propelled off the uncoupler. They will remain coupled provided they are not stopped over the uncoupler.



The uncoupler in the station platform road is positioned to allow a Class 57 and Mk 3 coaches to be uncoupled. Otherwise, it works in exactly the same way. Coupler 'droop' may require the drop-arms to be adjusted from time to time.



# KADEES - WHERE TO BUY THEM?

They might be made in the USA, but there's a wide number of stockists in the UK. Mine came from Trains4U in Peterborough, but a quick Google search revealed Gaugemaster, Express Models, Sherwood Models, DC Kits and Hatton's as stockists, among others.



# HOW TO ... BUILD AN INGLENOOK' LAYOUT

**PETER MARRIOTT** recycles old materials to make a layout that's big on play value yet small on space requirements and quick to build.

ot another small layout from that bloke Marriott, I hear you cry. Sorry, but it's true. I had a couple of reasons for building this one: firstly, I wanted to recycle a baseboard; secondly, I wanted somewhere to run my new NCB '57XX' O-6-OPT.

l accept that these are pretty unusual reasons for making a new layout, and

they must seem even more so when I admit that I bought the NCB '57XX' on a whim. I missed out when it was

a ModelZone limited edition, but then I saw one on Hatton's website, so bought it. The baseboard was one that I built years ago. I'd removed most of the scenery from it and had planned to take it to the tip, before realising what a waste that would be.

It gave me the opportunity to try something that I'd always wanted to: the 'inglenook' concept. I could build a shunting puzzle layout with just two points on it, while having a play around with a few products I had in stock and had not yet found a home for.

The name of 'Rowley Goods' was inspired by my former West Midlands stamping ground of Rowley Regis. The layout would not resemble that double-track suburban line in any way, other than it plays host to GWR motive power. Currently in the hands of the London Midland franchise, Rowley Regis station has always looked a bit run-down to me.

My inglenook design has three sidings: one is used to store a diesel railcar for passenger shuttles, while the other two are used for a small goods yard. The operational potential is the absolute minimum that anybody would want, but by the same token I wanted to prove that you can build a layout with some 'play value' in a small space.

You may raise your eyebrows at some of the choices I've made - such as using foam ballast underlay - but I also wanted to prove that you could make a layout with play value in a small space really quickly.

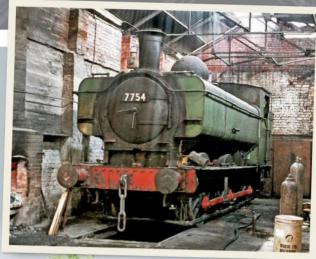

## Factfile: No. 7754

The locomotive that kickstarted the 'Rowley Goods' inglenook project was GWR '57XX' O-6-OPT No. 7754, which was sold by BR to the National Coal Board in 1959. It started work at Talywain Colliery but was transferred to Mountain Ash in 1970, where it worked until it failed in 1975. As the last GWR locomotive in revenue-earning service, it was acquired by the National Museum of Wales and placed on loan with the Llangollen Railway. It is currently under overhaul.

ModelZone commissioned a limited run of 500 Bachmann '57XX' as NCB No. 7754 in 2010. I missed it the first time around, but subsequently found one second-hand. Pictured here is No. 7754 shunting wagons at 'Rowley Goods'.

#### TRACK AND BALLAST

I normally favour finescale track, which makes a big visual difference to a layout. However, because this is a quick and economical project, I reused some Peco Streamline Code 100.

The quickest way to improve Code 100 is to weather it by giving the whole thing a blast with Humbrol acrylic aerosol. It takes two minutes, is really effective, and easy to remove from the rail heads. I accept that foam ballast underlay is unrealistic, but I feel justified in this case as I'll probably reuse the baseboard again in the future. With that in mind, it's easier to remove the foam than it is to chip away at glued ballast grains.



### HOW TO DO IT: BUILD AN INGLENOOK



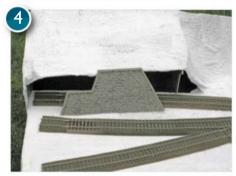
This baseboard has already been used for two previous layouts. It's actually one of the best I've ever built, but the timber for the frame is a little too large, which makes it rather heavy. I decided to keep the hard foam Woodland Scenics Riser.



I needed to provide a foundation for the goods yard, so I used more Woodland Scenics Risers. Cut the risers with a foam cutter or knife, butt the pieces against each other and then use foam tack glue to fix them in place. Hold with foam nails until the glue clears.



With the foam landscape in place, I covered the whole layout with plaster cloth. I cut up small pieces, dunked them in water, and laid them in position, slightly overlapping. Then I laid out the track complete with foam underlay (see panel, left).



A framework of 3mm mounting cardboard was the basis for this storage tunnel, with several layers of plaster cloth on top of the cardboard. In this shot, a piece of ER-Decor retaining wall is positioned to see what its effect would look like.



The first step is to apply a base colour, By doing so, if the subsequent scenery is knocked, you won't see white coming through from underneath. Lused areen Humbrol aerosol for the scenic areas and a grey colour for the goods yard.



It's been quite a long time since I last used foam underlay. I set myself the challenge of making it look as realistic as possible by weathering it with some Humbrol 93 Desert Yellow.



After cleaning the railheads with a track rubber, I started to assemble layers of static grass to create weed-infested track. Apply drops of PVA glue and use short fibres so that they don't get snagged by your rolling stock.



The tunnel roof and side were made from 2mm mounting card. After painting with green aerosol, I applied a base layer of static grass. The ER-Decor retaining wall was glued in place.



The top and side of the tunnel was covered with Woodland Scenics Poly Fiber, fixed in place with PVA. By adding Poly Fiber on to the top of the wall, a good blend with the landscape was possible. The join is not that apparent!



To blend the retaining wall still further into the surrounding landscape, I carefully teased out some Woodland Scenics Poly Fiber and fixed a selection of fine scatter material to it using extra-hold hairspray.



By using Poly Fiber both on the top of the hillside and on the removable side of the tunnel, the join on the top of the hillside has been hidden. A Hornby Class 153 DMU emerges from the storage siding beneath the trees.



To cut the ER-Decor retaining walls, a steel ruler, a self-sealing cutting board and a sharp craft knife are needed. Multiple passes of the knife are required before the excess piece can be 'snapped' off.



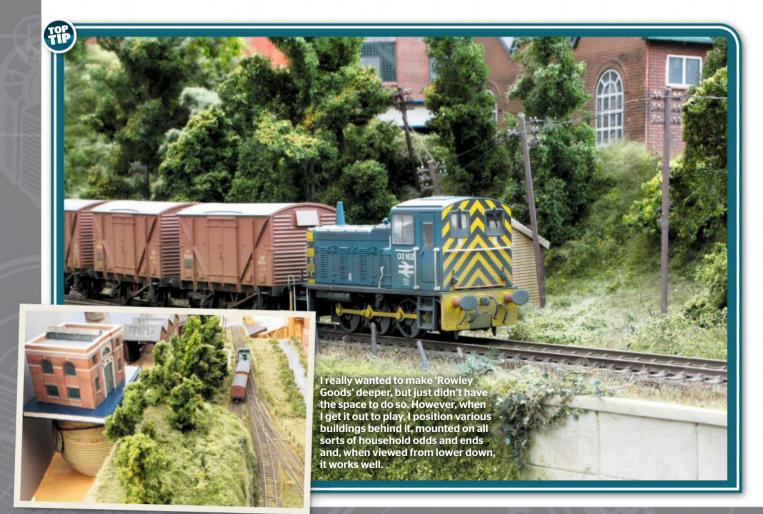
A section of concrete-effect retaining wall is positioned alongside the road. PVA glue was used to fix the wall to the foam landscape and Woodland Scenics Foam Nails (T pins) were used to hold the wall upright as the glue dried.



Once the PVA glue had completely dried, I then used a combination of Woodland Scenics foliage mats or Heki Blätterflor to blend the concrete-effect retaining wall into the landscape around it.



Weathering is an optional next stage: dyes, chalks and dry-brushed acrylic paints are just some of the products that can be used for this. If the layout is in an urban environment, you might want to add some graffiti.





As a base colour to the white plaster cloth Lused Humbrol green acrylic spray paint. Once this was dry, I added a layer of green sawdust-based scatter material on top of a covering of PVA glue to add a little depth to the base scenics.



I wanted to portray a late summer landscape. The first layer of static grass was made from bright green 4.5mm fibres. I half filled an FMR electrostatic applicator with 6mm late summer fibres and applied them to wet PVA.



To add the illusion of thick undergrowth on the banks and the top of the tunnel I spread out more PVA and then teased out Woodland Scenics Poly Fiber thinly over the wet glue and pressed it in lightly.



Once the Poly Fiber was firmly stuck to the landscape, I sprayed it with extra-hold unscented hairspray before immediately sprinkling on very fine, light green scatter to represent leaves. The spray holds it in place.



I use acrylic paint to hide Heki's shiny plastic tree trunks. Look at real trees to see if the trunk needs to be painted grey or shades of brown. Only the trunks will be visible, so you don't need to worry about the rest of the tree.



I chose a shade of green that was a little darker than the foliage. I dabbed a little on to the underside of the branches, as well as on to the foliage itself. This will create the impression of shade.



Spread a little PVA adhesive or spray a little unscented extra-hold hairspray over the foliage. Sprinkle on a slightly lighter shade of coarse or fine scatter, or some Noch I aub or Treemendus scatter, to represent individual



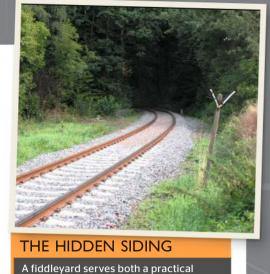
The road on an incline to the small goods yard was mainly made from mounting card. Once the road was given its first coat of paint (Woodland Scenics Road Colour) I could see that it was still too rough to be realistic.



I used some fine Tamiya glass paper to smooth the surface and then repainted it. When I was happy with the road surface, and the paint had dried, I turned my attention to the verges. The first job was to apply some PVA.



road verges to make them blend into the landscape. There was no need to add any other markings because it's only a single-track access road to the small goods yard.



purpose (you have a space in which to swap trains around) and a symbolic purpose (your trains leave the layout and go somewhere else, in the wider world).

This layout was so small (110cm by 40cm) that I didn't have room for a fiddleyard. However, I wanted somewhere to represent the 'rest of the world' - somewhere to hide my railcar so that it looks as though it has embarked on a journey somewhere.

I decided to create a hidden tunnel from one of the sidings. Inspiration came from Germany. At Emmelshausen, in the Rhine Valley, a single track line leaves the terminus and curves its way through tall and overhanging trees that are so densely packed they made a virtual tunnel. I thought that something similar would work here.



# Worland and the second



I am still not sure why, but once the surrounding landscape was completed I noticed various 'potholes' in the road surface which I needed to remedy. That's where Woodland Scenics Flex Paste comes in handy.



The white Flex Paste is quite easy to work with, and is lightweight. I pushed the paste into the dents in the road surface with a damp spatula, then smoothed the surface with a damp wooden stick.



There are just two small buildings on the layout. The smallest is a laser-cut timber hut from BEST (Bollinger Edgerly Scale Trains) of USA. You can order from www.besttrains.com. The other is a weathered Hornby Skaledale lamp hut.

# **Bufferstop**

All sidings need some form of protection to prevent railway vehicles from rolling off the end. The most common are bufferstops, triangular-shaped devices often made from curved and bent rails, although a sleeper chained to the rails is commonly used as a low-budget alternative. Other options include stockades made from sleepers, infilled with earth and rubble.

Bufferstops are seen all over the railway network and are a finishing touch to all sidings. There is a huge range of suitable products, in all scales.

Again, the nature of the project meant that I went with the simplest option - Peco's SL-40 rail-built bufferstop. If I'd had more time, I'd have gone with something a little more elaborate, perhaps featuring an illuminated stop light, such as those available from DCC Supplies, Train-Tech and others.

# A rail-built bufferstop opposite the passenger platforms at Northampton station.

## **HOW TO DO IT:** FIT A PECO BUFFERSTOP



Here are the three pieces of the Peco rail-built bufferstop. Remove any flash with a sharp blade or sanding sticks. You might want to reduce the excessive length of the locating pins. This can easily be done with a sharp craft knife.



To assemble the stop, push the locating pins through the beam and secure with some poly cement. It can be fixed to the rails using a few blobs of PVA, contact adhesive or instant adhesive (cyanoacrylate).



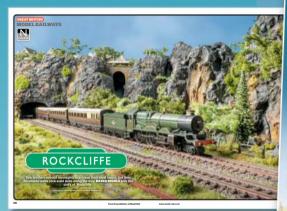
The Peco kit is rather glossy, and therefore slightly unrealistic for my requirements. To make it more in keeping, I toned down the finish with acrylics, followed by dry-brushing and weathering chalks.



The finishing touches are to apply weeds around the base and to pick out where the buffers would make contact - as well as the oil lamp - in white.

# CONVERTAHORNBY Q-4-0 TO DCC

Can you tame Hornby's wild train set 0-4-0s - and add working lights too? **GEORGE DENT** finds out.

t's a sign of the times that buying new 'OO' diesel locomotives for pocket money prices has become a distinctly retro experience. But there are still bargains to be found: I managed to get hold of this Hornby 'O6' for a smidgeon under £20 from Hatton's - that's what I paid for a new Lima Class 33 in 1986, having saved my 50p-a-week allowance for months.

OK, so you might not get a great deal for your £20 nowadays (you didn't in the 1980s either), but budget models certainly offer plenty of potential for detail upgrades and repaints.

But what about DCC conversion? Few locomotives in this price bracket come DCC ready and, with such a small subject, there's not a great deal of room inside for the digital goodies that we've become used to.

Happily, with macro-sized decoders, going digital is easier than you may think, and adding a 'Stay Alive' unit can drastically improve the running characteristics of the basic mechanism.

### **DIGITAL UPLIFT**

The Hornby Class 06 shares a similar chassis and mechanism with a number of steam-outline 0-4-0s, such as the Caledonian 'Pug' ('Smokey Joe') of train set fame. Therefore, the following project applies equally well to any of these models, although the closed cab of a diesel provides more room to conceal a decoder.

The '06' is fairly primitive on a number of levels, both internally and externally. Some cosmetic detailing and a weathered finish would greatly improve its appearance, but here we'll concentrate mostly on the model's innards.

Smooth, slow-speed running is

essential for shunting locomotives. Anyone with any experience with these models will know that 'smooth' and 'slow' are not part of their vocabulary. Converting to DCC, however, offers the potential for superior control.

I'm not usually keen on hard-wiring DCC decoders into older models, preferring to install a decoder socket, as found on DCC ready RTR products. If anything should go wrong with the decoder in future, or if I wish to upgrade, I can effect a swap without recourse to a soldering iron.

As only one of my layouts is DCC-operated, I like having the simple option of reverting to analogue control, too. By removing the decoder and inserting a blanking plug (again, as offered with DCC ready models), the locomotives can run on my analogue layouts.

Luckily, I have a few spare eight-pin decoder sockets in stock, salvaged

mostly from Hornby models that have been upgraded in the past (I never throw anything away!). In this case, the socket comes from a Class 121 'Bubble Car' chassis and was complete with a pair of mounting screws.

### **DECODER CHOICE**

As only an occasional DCC dabbler, I'm not *au fait* with the great number of decoders currently on the market. However, I knew that I needed something small that would slot into ③

The use of flux when making solder joints is recommended. It allows the bonds to be made quicker and more effectively. Use a non-corrosive formula, such as a No Clean Flux Pen from DCC Supplies (01905 621 999, www.dccsupplies.com).

# HOW TO DO IT: CONVERT A HORNBY 0-4-0 TO DCC



As well as a DCCconcepts Zen decoder and Stay Alive module, I needed an eight-pin decoder socket. Luckily, I had one spare, taken from a Hornby Class 121 chassis.



After test-running the new model on analogue control, the body was removed. Two tabs need freeing under the footplate to release the cab. The bonnet section then simply lifts away.



If removing the motor, gently release the spring clamp, but be careful not to distort the wire or break the plastic brackets. I managed to effect the conversion without having to remove the motor.



De-solder the wires and suppression capacitor assembly, which is no longer required for DCC operation. Note that one motor terminal has a red dot, so we'll treat that as the 'positive' input.



New power cables can be soldered to the motor terminals. For easy identification, I used red wire for the positive terminal and black for the negative. Use a drop of no-clean flux for a quick solder joint.



The power cables need to be soldered to the eight-pin socket, extending if necessary. The motor wires then follow (see Wiring Guide). Write the pin numbers onto the underside of the socket to avoid confusion.

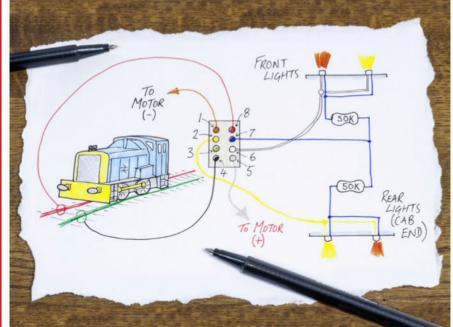
### WIRING GUIDE

#### Eight-pin decoder socket connections...

- Pin No. 1: To motor (negative terminal)
- Pin No. 2: Rear lights (negative polarity)
- Pin No. 3: Not used
- Pin No. 4: Track power input (negative)
- Pin No. 5: To motor (positive/red terminal)
- Pin No. 6: Front lights (negative polarity)
- Pin No. 7: Lights (common positive polarity)
- Pin No. 8: Track power input (positive)



If adding working oil lamps, trim away the moulded lamp brackets from the cab end before drilling small holes for the wires to pass through. Secure the lamps with thick cyano glue, applied with a cocktail stick





At the front end, the lamps can sit on the footplate, with the thin wires passing under the bonnet, eliminating the need to drill holes. Identify the long and short lamp leads and tape in place for now.

an eight-pin socket. Due to the '06's' short wheelbase, I also wanted a 'Stay Alive' facility to help the model cope with point frogs, crossings and baseboard joints with less risk of stalling.

I plumped for a Zen ZN8H four-function decoder from DCCconcepts. Described as 'Ultra-small' and supplied with a wired eight-pin plug and a 'Stay Alive' capacitor module, it ticked all of the boxes as far as my needs were concerned.

Another advantage of digital control is the ability to add working lights, which would help bring this model to life. The prototype employed small sealed light units, similar to those on a Class 08, but Hornby rendered them on the cab end only.

Traditional oil lamps were still occasionally employed on BR diesel shunters into the 1970s, so I opted for a set of working lamps, again from DCCconcepts. The protocol for shunting engines, constantly moving backwards and forwards, was to have both a white and red oil lamp displayed at each end, so I needed a pack of each.

The lamps come pre-wired but, as they're polarity-sensitive, we must be careful to connect them properly (the longer lead is the positive). A variety of resistors is provided, allowing the user to tailor the intensity of light emitted. As oil lamps give off only a modest amount of light, I plumped for the 50K resistors, fitting one to the positive lead of each pair of lamps.

Despite being a small locomotive, there's actually a fair bit of room within the empty cab, plus a little space above the motor in the raised section of bonnet. That said, great care was needed to bundle up the cables as neatly and safely as possible.

#### **SMOOTH OPERATOR**

After installing the decoder, I was a little perplexed by the model running backwards instead of forwards, but this was quickly solved by reversing the cables to the motor.

Apart from this minor hitch, my methodical approach was rewarded with an otherwise successful test run. It may have taken the best part of two working days to achieve the conversion, with the headlamps proving the fiddliest aspect, but it was time well spent.

The difference in performance has been marked, with even my basic Bachmann EZ Command DCC setup allowing the 'O6' to run smoothly at slow speeds. The working lamps bring an extra degree of realism too. I really ought to get around to detailing and weathering the locomotive now...

Heat shrink tubing is essential to cover any exposed contacts or wire joints, especially the motor terminals. Shrink the tubing with the outer edges of the hot soldering iron tip.



At each end, solder the positive (longer) and negative cables from the pairs of lamps to a small circuit board, incorporating a 50K resistor to the positive polarity to create a suitable level of illumination.



Drill two holes in the metal chassis (protect the motor and gears with masking tape), and screw the socket in place. Short spacers were cut from plastic tube, while insulation tape offers further protection from short circuits.



With the decoder slotted into the socket, test-run the motor on a DCC track to ensure correct operation. Note that the lamps at the cab end have yet to be soldered to the mini circuit board.



Make the solder connections for the cab front lamps and cover the mini circuit board with insulating tape. Carefully arrange the cabling and decoder to allow the cab to slot back onto the frames.



The positive and negative polarity cables for the lamps are then soldered to the appropriate terminals on the eight-pin socket. Check that blobs of solder don't bridge the gaps between each terminal.



The cables should be arranged as neatly and safely as possible, checking for clearance under the bonnet and cab. The blue and black cables from the DCC decoder and Stay Alive unit need connecting and insulating.



After an initial test fitting, I found it helpful to trim away the tabs on the inner cab face to allow more space for the cables. This will not be visible once the cab is re-fitted.



Test again on the DCC track, ensuring that the locomotive runs properly and that the lights function correctly. If there are any issues, check for a short circuit or loose connection.

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# HOW TO... DEVISE YOUR OWN SHUNTING GAME

**MIKE HARRIS** follows in the footsteps of Alan Wright and finds out why thinking of your layout as a game could have you playing trains for hours.

ant to increase the operating potential of your shunting layout without extending the baseboard or laying more track? Then perhaps it's time you devised your own shunting game.

The godfather of the inglenook layout, Alan Wright, assigned each of his wagons a different coloured tiddlywink. He would place the tiddlywinks in a pot and draw five at random. The order in which he drew each tiddlywink would determine the order, and indeed wagons, that would make up the train he needed to shunt (see page 22 to find out how to play an inglenook shunting game).

The problem is, tiddlywinks are hard to come by, unless sourced from the internet. But I've found an altogether tastier solution - sweets.

You can use whatever takes your fancy, but a combination of ielly beans and Smarties provide enough colours to cover a typical eight-wagon inglenook layout. And guess what? You get to eat them afterwards!

#### ON THE CARDS

However, many modellers have taken to using dedicated cards in place of tiddlywinks, which can range from a simple wagon number written on a piece of paper to a photograph of the wagon in question, or even a detailed trading card (see panel: 'Wagon Card').

But why go to the trouble of devising a shunting game in the first place? Well, using chance to determine what train you need to shunt introduces a competitive element to your layout's operation.

If you introduce a timer - or simply count each manoeuvre - you'll find yourself attempting to better your score with each game. Suddenly, your shunting has an objective, and that makes operating your layout highly

You can even bring a friend or two

into the mix, as you try to better each other's scores, or simply work together to solve the most challenging of shuntina puzzles.



#### CARD SHARP

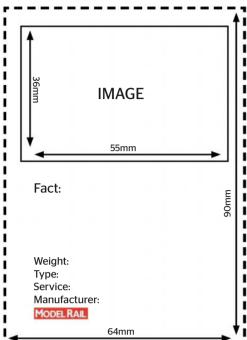
Shunting games needn't be limited in scope, and are certainly not limited to inglenook-inspired layouts. I'm confident you could apply a shunting game to virtually any layout, so long as it has a couple of sidings.

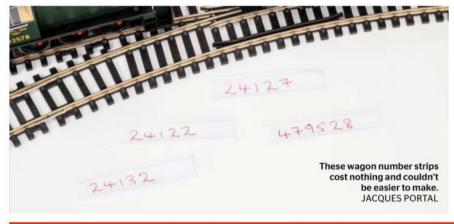
In fact, there's even room to expand upon Alan Wright's tiddlywink game, by introducing both locomotive cards and situational cards (see panel: 'Situation Card' on page 76).

I have designed my own inglenook cards, using popular trading card games as inspiration. As such, I've added additional prototypical facts that guest operators or audiences at exhibitions may find of interest.

64mm by 90mm is a suitable card size, and I would suggest using rigid, quality card stock. You could even laminate your inglenook cards to protect them from the inevitable bends and creases.







Wagon cards are all you need to play a conventional inglenook game and will make up the bulk of your deck - should you wish to use inglenook cards.

The illustration (above, left) is a concept I came up with using industry standard design software Adobe InDesign. However, not every modeller will have access to InDesign, so I've provided an inglenook template (above) which you can scan into your computer and edit digitally, or simply photocopy and handwrite/glue your own information directly on top.

The image (left) illustrates inglenook cards in their simplest form - strips of paper containing the desired wagon number.

#### **LOCOMOTIVE CARD**



If you've got more than one shunting locomotive to play with, you might want to consider creating special locomotive inglenook cards, too. You'd simply draw a locomotive card at the beginning of each game (as you would wagons) and use it to perform the shunting manoeuvres.

This system would be particularly effective if your layout has an engine shed or fiddleyard large enough to house two

or more locomotives, so you could move the desired shunter on-scene, without using the 'hand of God'.

If you're making your own inglenook cards, why not be creative? I've decided to add a wasp stripe border to my Class 60 card (right), to differentiate it from my steam-era 'USA' tank card (left). You could have great fun dressing up cards to represent various eras or regions.



## Workbench

#### SITUATION CARD



Back in MR224, Paul Lunn suggested the idea of using situations within a model railway game. My situations take the form of a card which describes a random event that could befall a driver in reality.

The example I have created (left) is nothing more complicated than a broken down locomotive. However, it adds lots of interest to the game by forcing the player to draw a locomotive card - or use an already designated locomotive - to shunt the 'faulty' vehicle back into the engine shed, or a designated repair zone.

If you find it difficult to run two locomotives simultaneously, you could send out a repair crew (at the cost of a set number of manoeuvres) before continuing to shunt the necessary wagons once again.

The possibility for interesting and varied situations is endless, so be creative and devise your own situation cards and the necessary means for players to overcome them.

As for when to draw a situation card, you could choose to draw one after a set number of manoeuvres, or you could leave things entirely to chance and roll a dice at the beginning of every (or every other) manoeuvre. Roll a six, for example, and you're forced to draw a situation card.

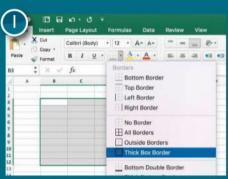
Situations don't have to be all negative. Perhaps you could create cards that allow you to ignore a manoeuvre or two, or allow for a second locomotive (should it prove helpful) to share shunting duties.

#### HOW TO DO IT: MAKE INGLENOOK CARDS USING EXCEL

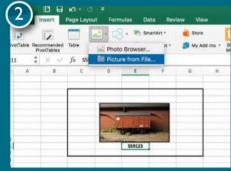
Brian Rolley has devised an extremely simple and quick method of creating digital inglenook cards for his inglenook inspired layout 'Rosamund Street Sidings' (see page 20).

The advantage of designing and saving inglenook cards on your computer is that you can quickly make new cards and can always print off more in the likely event that your existing deck gets lost or damaged.

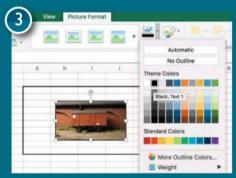
Brian has rather ingenously created his inglenook cards using Microsoft Excel. By following five simple steps, you can make your own digital inglenook cards, which you can then print and reuse indefinitely.



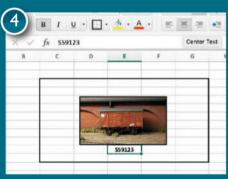
Begin by opening a fresh Microsoft Excel document. Highlight a border of cells - 5 by 10. Then select the border dropdown menu and click Thick Box Border.



Import your desired image by selecting the insert panel and selecting the picture dropdown menu before clicking on Picture from File. Simply select the image you want to use and place/resize accordingly.



Click on your image and select the Picture Format panel. Now select the outline dropdown menu and select a suitable colour for the image border.



Select the central cell just below your image and input your wagon's number. Select the Bold button to increase the weight of the type and make it easier to see.



Once you're finished you can create more inglenook cards before printing your designs on sturdy card, cutting them out, and laminating them if desired.

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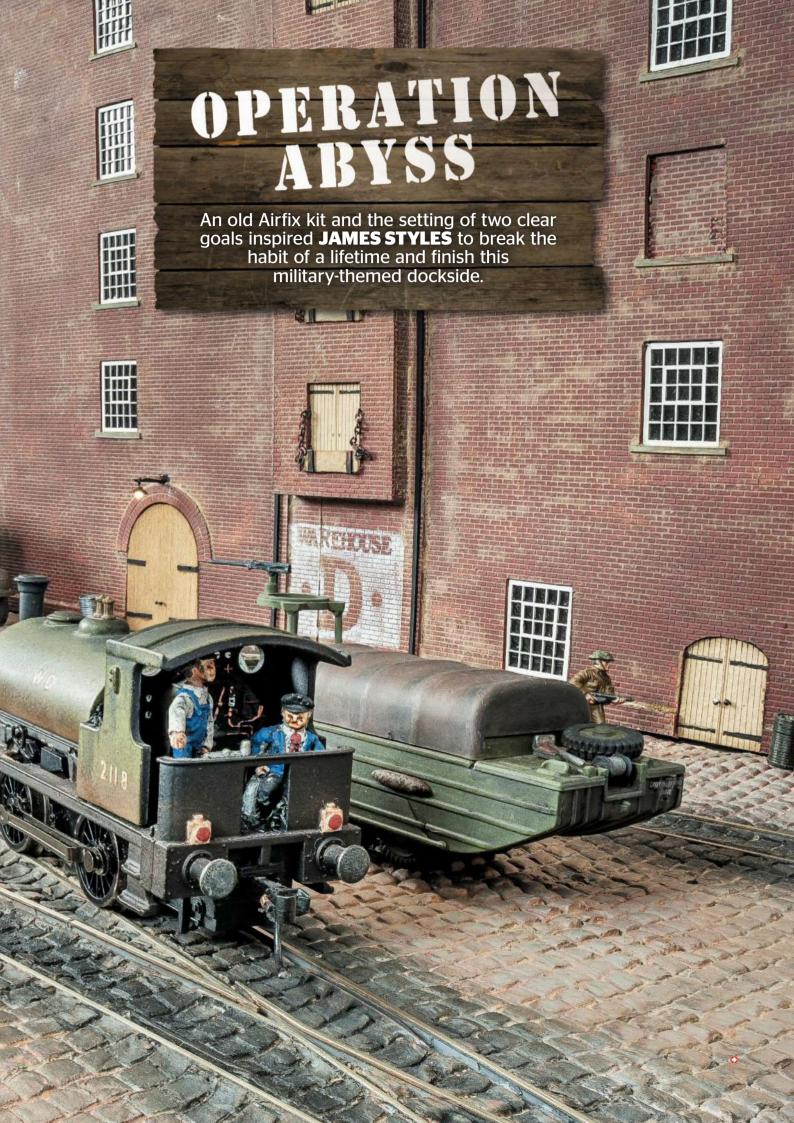


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#### **LAYOUT** OPERATION ABYSS

ere at Model Rail, we believe nothing can evoke that childlike sense of nostalgia quite like a model railway. But toy soldiers certainly come close.

And there's no shortage of these or boats, tanks and War Department rolling stock - on James Styles' 'Operation Abyss', a layout that would surely delight every schoolboy in the country.

Indeed, it's childhood memories of train sets past that fuel James' passion today: "We had a large layout in a spare room at home, when I was a child. The memory has stayed with me," he says.

But despite this lifelong love for model making, 'Operation Abyss' is James' first completed layout. "I've started many," he explains, "but this is the only layout I've actually ever finished!"

So where did James find the motivation to stick with 'Operation Abyss'? He recalls: "I set myself two goals: to exhibit the layout and to get it featured in *Model Rail*."

James has fulfilled both objectives, having already exhibited 'Operation Abyss' at two exhibitions and, of course, it has now been immortalised in print.

#### **SHIPSHAPE**

When visiting the layout my eye was immediately drawn to the Vosper Motor Torpedo Boat that sits dockside.

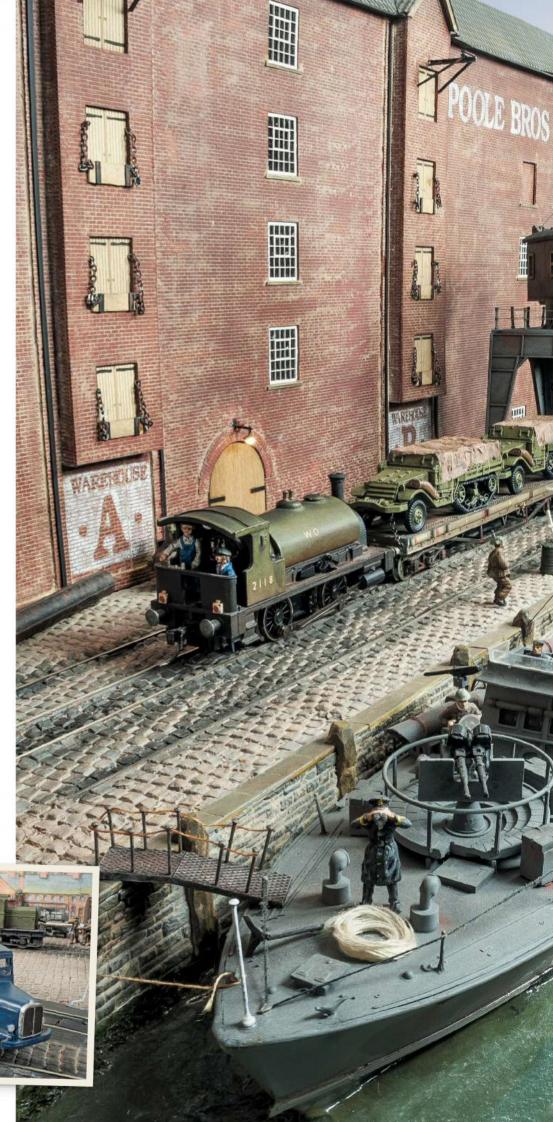
James explains its significance: "The Torpedo Boat started the whole layout. My mother and father bought me the Airfix kit and the layout was built around it."

The layout also includes an X-Craft midget submarine, which is an ode to James' grandfather: "My grandfather was in the Royal Navy during the Second World War," he explains.

"He served on an X-Craft, which had a crew of just two. He's the last surviving crew member, and finished his naval career as a Destroyer Commander.

"I couldn't source a kit in the UK, so I ended up ordering a resin kit from Pavla Models - imported from Eastern Europe.

"The midget submarine was 🔾













#### QUAY TECHNIQUES

The dockside is made from embossed stonework plastic card. Balsa wood stakes have been glued in between at regular intervals and then filed to appear battered and worn.

The water is made from multiple coats of PVA glue, following an unsuccessful attempt at using a specialist modelling product.

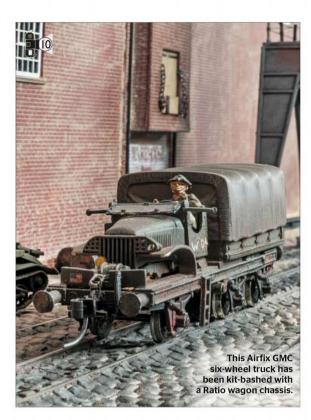
"I didn't seal the area properly," says James. "My garage floor now looks like it's covered in water!"

James used 35 coats of PVA glue, and brushed coloured streaks onto the cured surface after every five coats. This built up variations in tone for a realistic representation of murky dockside water.









originally painted dark grey, because that's what it looked like in the prototype photographs I had. But when I showed it to my grandfather, he told me that the X-Craft was spot on, but should be painted black, so I repainted and weathered it accordingly."

James is no stranger to painting:
"I enjoy painting large resin military
figures. Merging my love of model
railways and figure painting seemed
like a natural progression." This has led
to some fantastic cameos, making for
a suitably bustling wartime dock.

The somewhat niche subject matter has made it difficult for James to source ready-to-run items, so he's spent his time modifying existing stock or building from scratch.

"I have a passion for scratchbuilding and kit-bashing," he says. Indeed, several LMS flat bogie and well wagons have been modified for military service.

An Airfix GMC six-wheel truck has been turned into an item of stock, thanks to a Ratio wagon chassis and a motor bogie. James has even added several personal touches: "I put my wife's name on the bonnet, since army vehicles were often personalised.

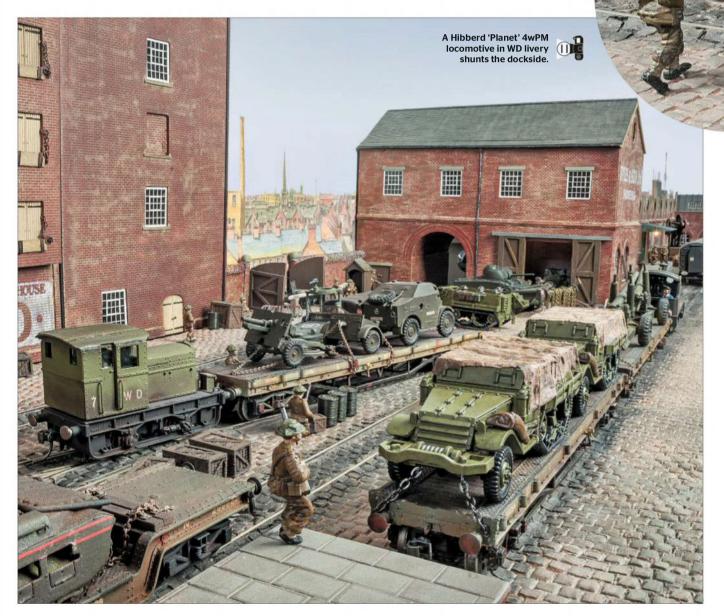
"The number on the side is my collar number, too, as I'm a police officer. Silly little things like that allow me to identify with the layout - it was a really fun build."

#### **COBBLED TOGETHER**

The dock is covered in setts, which have been painstakingly scratchbuilt. James explains the process: "I'll scour the Internet for anything that inspires me and with regards to this layout, I paid particular attention to prototype photographs of docks.

"Originally I was going to recreate circular cobbles, but found that most docksides have rectangular granite setts. I considered using embossed plastic card, but this looked too regimented."
Instead he scribed clay.

become too hard to work with."

#### **BUILD FOR VICTORY**

The buildings are all scratchbuilt, apart from a modified low-relief Skytrex kit. "The brickwork is embossed plastic card," says James. "I never use paper-based card, because the layout is stored in my garage, and I worry about warping due to fluctuations in temperature."

The main block of factory buildings adds height and variety to the flat

"I look at real architecture and work out how I can mimic it in 4mm," says James. "The ghost sign was made using a vinyl cutter. I cut out the lettering and then used the backing sheet as a stencil with which to drybrush each letter."

The window frames are laser-cut wood from an eBay seller called Lcut Creative. James explains: "They sell window frames of all shapes. They're a really good price, too."

Other neat structural details include O chain.

Right: The Sherman Crab was fitted with a mine flail. James replaced the plastic flails on his Airfix kit (02320) with carefully-cut







## HOW TO DO IT: SCRATCHBUILD SANDBAGS



Use an old piece of wood as a flat base to create a guide. Then draw two horizontal lines (5mm apart) and then another two parallel lines (8mm apart). Divide the latter at 10mm intervals.



Roll a small lump of DAS clay into a sausage that fits snugly between the 5mm guidelines. Now place the sausage on to the 8mm guidelines and evenly push it down so that it spreads to fit.



Press a thin piece of metal (upturned scalpel blade will do) into the clay at 10mm intervals - using the guide for reference. I tend not to cut all the way through when representing a long line of sandbags, for ease and stability.



Frequently brush the clay with water to prevent it from hardening. Repeat step three and build a wall to your desired height. Cut through the clay to create individual sandbags, and place where necessary.



Position the sandbags on your layout while they are still moist so that you can curve and position them accordingly. Once satisfied, leave to dry fully.



Finally, paint and weather your sandbags. Although originally straw coloured, sandbags would often darken when exposed to rain or mud - something you may wish to reflect.

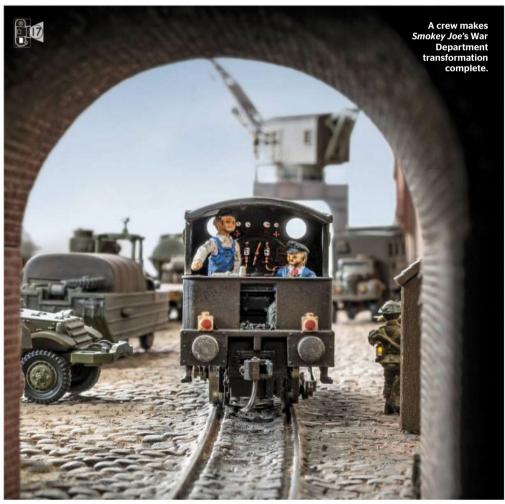
#### MISSION DEBRIEF

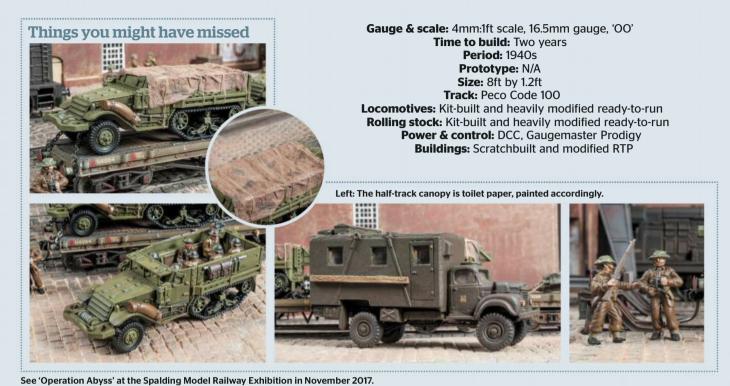

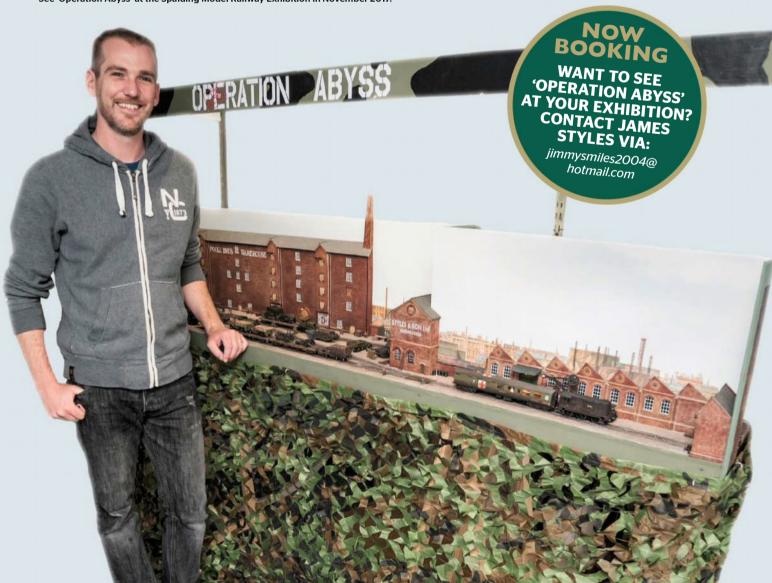

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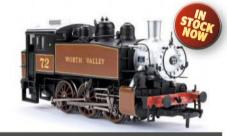

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At nationalisation, the new No. 30065 was at work at Southampton docks until October 1962, when it joined classmate No. 30070 on departmental duties at Ashford works. Both were painted green, lined in yellow, and both were named - No. 30070 becoming DS238 Wainwright (after the SECR locomotive engineer) whereas No. 30065 was christened DS237 Maunsell (after the Southern Railway's first Chief Mechanical Engineer).

The pair remained in traffic until July 9 1967, but they weren't sold until March 1968. En route to Barry scrapyard in South Wales, they got as far as Tonbridge before they began to run 'hot', and were left there until the August, when they were re-sold to the Kent & East Sussex Railway.

Maunsell was withdrawn from service at the KESR in early 2017, and now requires a full overhaul. Meanwhile, Wainwright should re-enter service this year, albeit painted in full Longmoor Military Railway livery.

## **JMODELS** CLASS 71



It came out after Hornby's version, but is DJModels' Class 71 the last word on the subject? **CHRIS LEIGH** finds out.

in ready-to-run models is well known, and duplication is generally a financial disappointment to the manufacturers involved. In the case of the 'OO' gauge Class 71, both Hornby and DJModels announced their models simultaneously and neither drew back from the brink.

At the time of the announcement. the Hornby model must have been at an advanced stage, for it reached the market in September 2016 and was reviewed in MR226. The gestation period of the DJ Models Class 71 has been somewhat longer, and was subscribed by pre-orders under a crowdfunding arrangement. This means that the bulk of the production run is pre-sold, with only

the limited editions from Hatton's ('Golden Arrow') and Kernow Model Rail Centre (weathered) likely to be available to those who did not pre-order.

Enough of the politics: the DJM Class 71 is now reaching its customers and we've been loaned an example of each of Kernow's three weathered examples. I chose E5002 in the later BR unlined locomotive green to examine in depth. Kernow is also offering an original green version and a Rail blue example. I might have chosen the latter, as I made pilgrimages to see the final 'Golden Arrow' and the 'Night Ferry', both with Rail blue Class 71s in charge. However, both those prestige passenger trains had pristine locomotives and, to be honest, I don't ever recall seeing Class 71s in

quite the filthy state depicted by the Kernow weathered models.

Nevertheless, lots of modellers seem to approve.

#### SIX OF ONE...

Inevitably, this review is going to draw comparisons. My first impression of the DJM was that it is remarkably similar to the Hornby model. That, of course, is

how it should be. Apart from subtle differences in interpretation of detail, both models should look the same. That they do is testament to the accuracy of both manufacturers.

The DJM model is spot-on, dimensionally, and captures the character of the real thing extremely well. Side by side, however, there are subtle differences in the shape. The DJM model has a slightly 'furrowedbrow' look, the windscreen pillars

has the correct flat-section but as separate plastic fittings.

The windscreen glazing on the Hornby model is clearer and lacks the prismatic effect, but the headcode arrangement on the DJM model is far better than Hornby's stickers. The DJM model includes a selection of headcodes printed on a strip of clear material which can be inserted through a slit to sit behind the glazing and in front of the light source. Headcodes can, in theory, be changed without removing the body but it's a fiddly process.

DJM's pantograph is plastic and can be posed in up or down positions, although few modellers are likely to need to raise it. I was pleased to find that it is a little more robust than Hornby's metal offering, and doesn't self-destruct like the Hornby one.

Both models have sprung buffers, but those on the DJM model have much stiffer springs than Hornby. DJM includes the third rail pick-up shoes in the bag of detail parts to be added by the modeller, together with alternative front skirt sections without the coupler aperture.

As built, the Class 71s had no rainstrips, as correctly depicted by Hornby's early green versions. These were soon added. however, to reduce water ingress in grilles and cabside windows. DJM's Class 71 has the rainstrips on all versions. and this is one detail which looks a little heavy-handed. Hornby has the small vents on the cab corner posts but these were added later and were not present when the locomotives were new. So both manufacturers have limited their tooling variations but in different ways.

Turning to the bogies, those of the Hornby model are 30mm wide, while DJM's are 32mm. This small amount of extra width is used to good advantage, and the bogie sideframes are one of the DJM model's best features. What's more, the mass of complex detail, cables, springs and O















wiring, superbly depicted as it is, shows up even better thanks to the weathering job which may be a bit excessive elsewhere. It is difficult to tell which of these details is a separate fitting but the sandboxes, with their curved pipes, are particularly good, though modellers looking to convert it to 'EM/P4' might be disappointed as they are set to 'OO' gauge.

#### **SOUND DECISION**

I'm not likely to try fitting DCC sound to my Hornby model, as I've read that

there's little room to do so. Here, the DJM model is a clear leader, having been designed to accept a speaker and sound decoder with ease. While the DJM '71' has its side window blacked out to hide electronics, Hornby has a representation of the booster (used to carry the locomotive over gaps in the conductor rail) detail instead, although this equipment was not actually visible through the window.

As to colour, it is impossible to judge the accuracy of the green on the DJM

sample due to the weathering. I think Hornby got the shade pretty much spot on, but the satin-matt finish would have benefitted from being more glossy.

Hornby's model has a white roof. which seems unlikely to have lasted beyond the official photographs, while, under the weathering, DJM's roof is a more typical grey. In fairness, there's little to choose between these two models in any respect. Even price-wise there's not a lot to differentiate between the two models, unless you are lucky enough to find a heavily discounted Hornby model. Hatton's has green and blue versions of the DJM model with etched 'Golden Arrow' insignia (Dave Jones had a set of my old 'Golden Arrow' etches for reference) at £139.95. Locomotion Models has a limited edition E5001 by Hornby at £159.95. You pays your money and takes your choice, as they say.

#### PERFORMANCE

DJM uses coreless motors and the model cannot, therefore, be used with 'feedback'-type controllers or with high frequency track cleaners without risk of serious overheating. On test, the Class 71 proved to be impressive. smooth and quiet straight from the box. Two small switches on the underside allow analogue users to switch off cab lights and marker lights independently, while DCC users have full control of lighting functions through the controller. I have seen some adverse comment about the top speed and haulage capacity of the Class 71 model. My initial impressions did not concur, so I re-tested the model.

I understand it is possible for DCC users to adjust the top speed by changing a CV or two, but I was testing an analogue model, as supplied. Its top speed is arguably a little slower than that of the prototype, but since few of us have layouts on which we can thrash a model at a scale 90mph, I don't find this in any way restrictive.

With 13 bogie coaches on the drawbar, the Class 71 climbed the

the attention paid to making it easy to fit DCC sound. The Hornby model I reviewed was pristine, whereas the DJM is heavily weathered, making it difficult to compare the quality of finish and accuracy of the base colours. However, the fact that the DJM has no missing wipers, and a pantograph which does not self-destruct at every touch, nudges it just ahead of the Hornby model in my view.

1-in-60 gradient on our test track effortlessly, but the very difficult 1-in-30 proved too much. However, with the load reduced to eight bogie coaches, the Class 71 restarted the train from a stand on the 1-in-30, which is no mean feat. It is very responsive to the controller throughout the speed range.

There is very limited vertical movement in the bogies, so it is not tolerant of poor trackwork, or pointwork of anything sharper than second radius.

#### CONCLUSIONS

DJM's Class 71 is a fine model and despite the delay in delivering the product, those who crowdfunded the enterprise should be very pleased. The crowdfunding is a limiting factor, however, as it may be a frustration to those who did not subscribe to the crowdfunding and are now unable to obtain the version that they want. As to which one is best, well, there really is little between them.

On the ratings, the DJM leads by just 2%, and that is due mainly to the comprehensive lighting system and

#### FIRST REVIEW

## L CLASS 122

n the 1950s, the Western Region sought to replace its aging fleet of GWR diesel railcars with a similar number of modern single-units, with the potential for expansion to two-car units by the attachment of an unpowered Driving Trailer Second.

Using the standard twin-engined 64ft 6in underframe and Derbydesigned 'high density' body, Gloucester RC&W built 20 cars in 1958. These were divided between the London and Birmingham Divisions for branch line use, and to supplement or replace out-of-service cars in threecar units.

The Gloucester cars (Class 122 under TOPS) were delivered in the early light green shade, with cream lining and 'whiskers'. They carried a twocharacter roller-blind headcode panel below the centre windscreen, and a destination display in the roof dome.

In 1960, another 16 similar vehicles were delivered by Pressed Steel. These had a number of detail

differences from the earlier cars, including a four-character headcode panel in the roof dome and the destination box moved to the centre windscreen. They were delivered in the much darker lined green livery which had become the norm by 1960. Later classified '121', these cars were all allocated to the London Division, allowing the Gloucester cars to be drafted to the west of England and the West Midlands.

The last two Pressed Steel cars were withdrawn by Chiltern Railways on May 19 2017 after 57 year's service, the longest of any BR-era trains. Eight Class 121s and the same number of Class 122s have been preserved. while the two Chiltern cars and one remaining route-learner are likely to pass into preservation. Some of the preserved vehicles have been used as Sandite cars, or part of the Severn Tunnel rescue train, and have been extensively modified from their original condition.

The Pressed Steel version was offered in the Lima range and then re-issued by Hornby with an improved and DCC ready chassis. More recently, models of both classes were announced by Dapol following its excellent 'N' gauge versions. Kernow MRC had also announced Class 121 and 117 models but withdrew when Bachmann entered the fray with an announcement of the same models. First to emerge from all this feverish activity with actual plastic and metal is Dapol with its Gloucester Class 122 models.

I was privileged to see some early livery samples, and to be involved with Dapol's Joel Bright and Andy Forty in discussions about the shades of green with an array of shade cards, and I've now had the opportunity to review two: W55000 as delivered new to the Western Region in lined light green with 'speed whiskers' and SC55007 with yellow warning panels. This unit was transferred to Hamilton as the Scottish

Region withdrew the last of its fourwheel railbuses

Dapol is providing modellers with a high-specification 'bubble car' to 21st century standards, following the company's now established standard of providing for full function DCC operation, straightforward sound installation, or regular analogue operation with directional lights. It's a far cry from what those of us who appreciate DMUs are used to, with only Bachmann's 59ft underframe models (not much use to Western Region modellers) or the Hornby Lima revival to satisfy our modelling requirements. I'm happy to think that I've pressed South Eastern Finecast Flushglaze into Lima windows for the last time!

#### FIRST IMPRESSIONS

On opening Dapol's handsome packaging - a stout card box lined with foam rubber - the model is contained in the customary vacuum-formed, clear plastic pack.

The colour is immediately apparent. Having seen the early livery samples, this time it's right. Below the solebar it's a step change from what we're used to, with the engines, exhaust pipes and all other equipment accurately modelled and picked out in colour silver, green and orange. The bogies. too, are accurately detailed, with

roller-bearing axlebox covers and a full complement of driver and guard's steps already fitted.

All solebar steps are also present and correct. Turn it upside down, and the final drives and Cardan shafts are also modelled, though the latter stop short of the bogies for reasons of clearance on curves.

Curiously, one obvious feature which is not correct is the painting of the axlebox covers in silver. They should, like all roller-bearing axleboxes at the time, be painted yellow, with a horizontal red stripe. It's easy enough to correct with a spot of paint and a small brush. The steps could also benefit from a brush of brown paint,

unless you are planning to weather the whole chassis.

The 'face' and character of the real thing has been well captured, with the two-character

headcode panel and the

distinctive exhaust pipes on one end, which meet above the destination box and discharge through a central outlet. On the real thing, the exhaust gases quickly corroded the right-angled corner and the pipes were soon cut back to discharge separately. This is reflected on Dapol's versions in later condition

The model carries white roof domes, reflecting the 'as new' condition. These quickly discoloured to cream but would be easy to repaint if you want a unit in a more workaday state.

#### **DEVIL IN THE DETAIL**

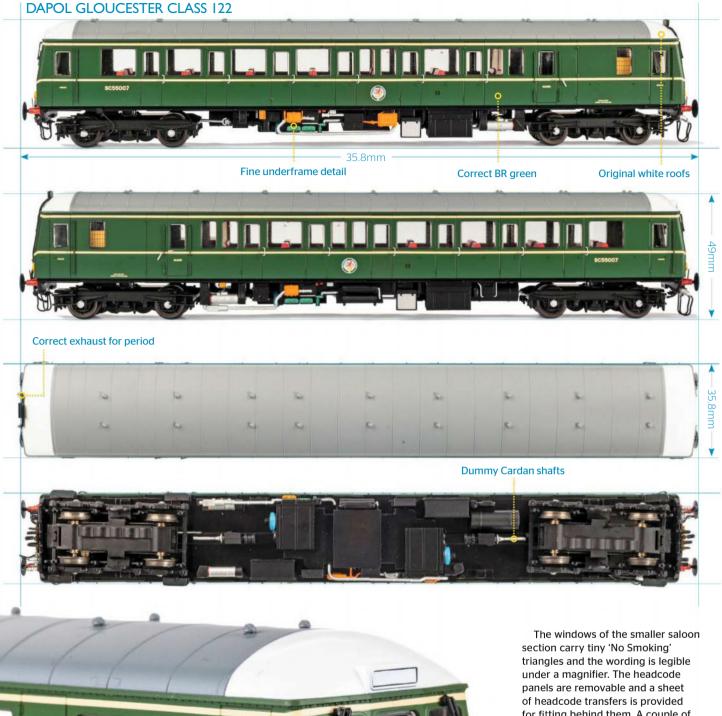
As a fan of 'bubble cars' since I first saw W55021 at Staines West in 1962, I pay a lot of attention to the minor details on Class 121/122 models. I was more familiar with 121s, however, and it's easy to be misled into thinking the two classes were identical apart from the ends. They weren't.

For instance, the quard's doors were inward-opening. On the '121' there is a distinctive cut-out below the door. On the '122' there is no cut-out and the lower edge of the body is straight. Dapol has this correct on the '122'. I await the '121' with interest.

Both types were notorious for rattling droplights which shuddered in unison with the engines. Dapol's model is flush-glazed and has the slim silver-coloured latch by which the droplight was lowered, and which contributed to the cacophony. The window in the guard's van has a mesh grille printed on the inside and behind that, a cream-coloured box is intended to hide the speaker housing if sound is fitted. It could easily be painted black to further disguise it. O

section carry tiny 'No Smoking' triangles and the wording is legible under a magnifier. The headcode panels are removable and a sheet of headcode transfers is provided for fitting behind them. A couple of spare headcode panels are included in the detail pack. There is also a sheet of destination blinds covering the West Midlands, Worcester and Bristol areas, as well as South Wales and Scotland. Curiously, there are no London area destinations, nor any of the West Country branches such as St Ives, Kingsbridge and Brixham on which Class 122s almost monopolised services.

Handrails, including the flat-section handrail/drainpipe adjacent to the drivers' doors, are separate fittings but door and grab handles are part of the body moulding. These are tiny and it's difficult to tell that they are 'fixed'.

An impressive array of separately fitted end details include the pantograph windshield wipers, lamp

irons and all the bufferbeam pipes and cables. the latter included in a bag of details to be fitted by the modeller.

Bogiemounted tension-lock couplers in NEM pockets might prevent the fitting of some buffer beam details, but those who don't plan to tow anything with their unit can fit the details and take off the couplers. The body is a simple clip-fit to the chassis.

Buffers are the large, round-headed type, in blackened metal and sprung. The round pattern was certainly standard on the '122s', but the '121s' could have oval or the flat-edged 'cut' type. Indeed I recall seeing one of each on the same end of one Pressed Steel car!

#### UNDER THE FLOOR

Previous ready-to-run DMU models in 'OO' have had a motor bogie drive with the mechanism hidden, as much as possible, in the guard's compartment. Even the comparatively recent Bachmann DMUs have featured an above-floor motor concealed with varying degrees of success. We're still waiting for a true underfloor mechanism but Dapol's arrangement takes current technology as far as it can while still featuring one good-sized, centrally placed motor. The motor lies on its side, flanked either end by a substantial brass flywheel from which a Cardan shaft to each bogie drives a brass worm and nylon gears on both bogies. A gear train within the bogie transfers drives between the outer and inner axles of both bogies, giving the railcar eight-wheel drive.

A circuit board running the entire length of the floor provides for the cab. marker and headcode lighting, while another inside the roof carries the LED interior lights. The chassis design is impressive, the PCB being mounted on the die-cast underframe. There are switches for the front and rear cab lights and the interior lights.

Within the guard's van area, a black box-shaped cover, clearly marked 'DCC', unclips to provide access to the 21-pin decoder socket. A mounting for a 20mm diameter speaker is fitted immediately above the bogie at this end of the chassis, so DCC sound installation should be a walk in the park.

The drive system is as low-profile as it can be while retaining a decentsized motor and well-modelled underframe detail. so there has to be a compromise somewhere. That compromise is confined to the interior where the 'floor' is virtually level with the seat squabs. From many viewing angles it's not noticed, but it will certainly affect the fitting of passengers.

The interior moulding is in cream plastic with the seats picked out in dark red. The raised floor could be disquised a little by painting it in a darker colour, which would also be more prototypical.

It should be stressed that the internal compromise only affects the two passenger saloons. The cabs have well-detailed control desks, with drivers' seats but -as might be expected - no driver.

To extract the cab, the interior lighting strip must first be removed as the contacts run up the

rear of the cab bulkhead, resulting in the centre part of the bulkhead being solid rather than glazed.

#### ON THE PULL

My abiding memory of these railcars is the gently, sideways-rolling ride and the clickety-clack of the wheels on jointed rails. Though the model doesn't roll from side to side on its suspension, it's quiet and smooth enough in operation to allow the sound of the rail joints to be enjoyed to the full. In fact, I'd go so far as to say you will need to replicate track joints on your layout to get the best out of it.

Our sample proved to be thoroughly impressive on the test track. Although the real cars were only intended to haul a Driving Trailer Second as a tail-load, or possibly a single van, the Scottish Region turned a couple into parcels cars and they might well have worked with a limited tail-load of a couple of vans.

There seemed, therefore, little point in testing the haulage capacity of the model. However, the test train I had used for the DJM Class 71 (see page 88) was still on the track, so why not give it a try? I have to say that the Dapol Class 122 will have no trouble hauling a dummy three-car DMU, should you wish. In fact, it took nine coaches up the 1-in-30 without missing a beat!

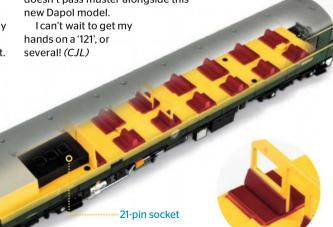

I would fit a driver and a few passengers, weather the underframe and paint the floor, but even the best of my Lima conversions doesn't pass muster alongside this new Dapol model.

#### MADE TO FIT

However, when loaded onto 'Warflats', the Shermans were too tall to pass under many of the bridges and tunnels on Britain's railways. The solution was a flat wagon with a sunken 'well' between the bogies, which gave rise to its nickname.

The 'Warwell' first appeared in 1942, and it proved so popular that it continued to operate after the Second World War - and is still in use today.

As such, Hatton's 'Warwells' aren't limited to military-themed layouts. The versatile wagons were adapted for general freight use with steel/rail carrier and bolster deck variants, and these also feature in the Hatton's 'Warwell' range.

Our review samples include BR grey, GWR allocated WD and Ministry of Defence olive liveries. Each member of the trio looks impressive but, in my view, it's the MoD 2000s olive version (MODA95536) that steals the show.

This particular wagon is covered in yellow and white printed details, which might just be some of the crispest I've seen - much of which I could read without a magnifying aid!

Although extremely similar, there are small detail differences across our trio of test subjects. MODA95536 sports GPS bogies (with two handbrake wheels on each), while the earlier MS.1 and M360333 sport diamond frame bogies (each with only two handbrake wheels, positioned at both alternative ends and on alternative side frames).



The buffers are different shapes depending on era, too.

The general shape of the 'Warwell' is suitably accurate, but I did notice slivers of daylight between the side frames and the deck - however you'd be very unlikely to notice this when it's running on a layout.

#### **HEAVY METAL**

Without sufficient weight, flat wagons are prone to skipping across rails, but the sheer heft of our review samples forced them to adhere to the Model Rail test track and run smoothly throughout.

The underframe detail is exquisite too, but I had wondered if the end jacks would catch on the couplers as the wagons navigated tight curves. My fear was unfounded - each























'Warwell' navigated even first radius curves with ease on our test track.

One area that may prompt discussion is that catches for chain links are moulded details.

#### CHAIN REACTION

Some may find it a shame that separately fitted chain links aren't included, but if you plan on modelling your 'Warwell' with a permanent load you'd have to cut the chain to length and graft it onto the load anyway.

Besides, later 'Warwells' sported straps, which would be extremely difficult to replicate in 4mm:1ft scale, especially as you'd require different configurations for different loads. To that end, Hatton's decision to omit such detail is justified.

We've seen Hatton's attractive navy and white colour scheme and logos on a box before, but it is worth quickly mentioning the packaging. Each 'Warwell' sits snugly inside, but not so tightly that you risk damage when repeatedly removing and replacing the model.

I must praise Hatton's for a packaging system that's kind to both model and modeller other manufacturers take note!

Hatton's 'Warwell' is a quality model, made all the more impressive as the company's first solo effort. And, at under £40, this is a sizeable wagon with some outstanding features. If this is the shape of things to come from Hatton's, I'm very excited indeed. (MH)

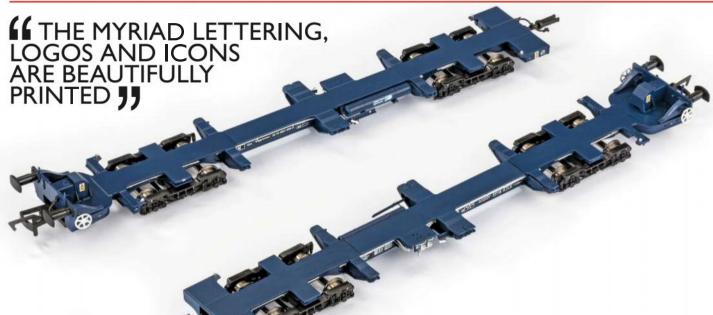

he shipping container has revolutionised the global logistics industry and enables goods to be smoothly transferred from ship to road to rail. But the recent adoption of 9ft 6in tall containers threatened to interrupt the smooth flow of containers - that extra foot over the traditional 8ft 6in container meant that they were too tall for Britain's rail network, and they either had to be conveved in special low-height wagons, or go by road.

Wagon builder W.H. Davies developed a solution: the 'Super Low' container flat (coded IDA under TOPS). This vehicle, which operates in fixed pairs, enables 9ft 6in containers to be carried across virtually the whole of the rail network at 75mph.

Dapol announced that it would produce the 'Super Low' container flats when it unveiled its plans to produce the Class 68 in late 2013. The '68' arrived earlier this year, and now the wagons have landed, too.

First impressions are very good although, being container wagons, there's not a lot to look at! The DRS blue is well finished and the myriad lettering, logos and icons are beautifully printed. You can even read DRS' telephone and fax numbers on the side, albeit under a magnifier. Only the IDA expert is likely to note that some bits of pipework are supposed to be yellow.

Despite their skeletal looks, these wagons are weighty and have central die-cast spines. The additional plastic details are neatly rendered and particularly fine in places.

#### BLAME IT ON THE BOGIE

The Standard Car Truck Company bogies, the secret weapon that allowed W.H. Davies to produce the IDA, are also well finished. The wheels are tiny - just 7.5mm diameter. The

Looks **Build quality Features** Decoration Value for money **RATING 87%**  only visual detractor here is that the axles are more visible on the model than in reality; the reason is because the central spine looks a bit slimmer in order to enable the bogies to pivot freely. With that in mind, you can forgive this slight discrepancy.

There are NEM coupling pockets at each end. They're on a sprung cam arrangement, but the spring is perhaps a little on the stiff side and it meant that the IDA kept uncoupling on our test track.

The wagons are joined by a coupling bar that clips into the NEM pockets. There are moulded representations of the brake pipes, which is a neat touch. You will need to remove one of the coupling bars before you couple the 'twins' together.

The 'Super Lows' performed well on our test track and negotiated first radius curves and pointwork with ease, even at high speed. Aside from the occasional unwarranted uncoupling, performance was top notch.



The only other niggle that we found with our sample was the odd broken part, including one of the bufferheads. That aside, there's nothing much else to complain about.

In fact, it seems churlish to criticise these wagons when you consider that you can get a pair of highly detailed, well finished bogie wagons for less than £45. There is, of course, less material involved in their construction, but that still makes them excellent value. Well done Dapol. (RF)

Minor detail issues

etropolitan Cammell, the Birmingham-based rolling stock builder. drafted an

unconventional design for a sidetipping ballast wagon in 1930. A small batch was subsequently purchased by the GWR (Nos. 100001-100060) and, later, by British Railways,

Over 600 wagons were built for BR between 1952-61, and gained the 'Mermaid' moniker. The initial batch (BR diagram 1/573), was virtually identical to the GWR wagons and numbered DB989000-989088. The more numerous diagram 1/574 version (DB989089-989638) was upgraded to incorporate vacuum brakes and heavy duty hydraulic buffers.

With a gross weight of 14 tons, the ballast load was carried within a steel body that pivoted to either side of the chassis. The shallow side doors were hinged in such a way that the flow of ballast could be regulated. Chain clamps were provided to secure the wagon frames to the rails during tipping and, accordingly, ballast could only be discharged when stationary.

The GW and early BR unfitted wagons were largely confined to the Western Region, while the vacuum-fitted fleet was dispersed across all BR regions. Lasting until the early 1990s, they eventually gained a TOPS code of ZJV.

With plenty of livery choices (GW/ BR black, Indian Red, olive green and 'Dutch' grey/yellow) and long careers. it's a surprise that we've not enjoyed mass-market RTR models of the 'Mermaid' in the popular scales. In 'OO', Flangeway has produced a limited run model, while this new offering from DJModels is the first version to appear in 'N' gauge.

Both BR and GWR versions are available and it's a pair of the latter that we have received for review, numbered DW100048/50), albeit finished in early BR livery. The simple markings have been applied to a high standard, with overhead line warning icons at each end.

#### **QUALITY MOULDING**

The quality of moulding is universally high, with the distinctive open-framed chassis correctly reproduced. A full array of brake gear is provided, including cross shafts, yokes and safety loops, along with a vacuum cylinder. However, given that the GWR's 'Mermaid' fleet was not vacuum brake-fitted, this excellent detail is only relevant to later BR batches. Presumably, this single chassis option across the range helps to keep the price at a reasonable level.

The chassis sports a lovely set of hydraulic buffers (also erroneous for GWR wagons) but, on our samples,

a few of these were loose and required re-fixing with a drop of glue. Door tipping equipment has been faithfully captured, with chains and door brackets formed of separate mouldings at each end. A rendition of the track clamps has also been included, while lamp brackets and coupling hooks adorn the bufferbeams. Virtually all key dimensions appear to be scaled correctly, although the wheelbase appears to be a couple of millimetres too long, working out as a scale 13ft instead of 12ft.

Removable, realistic ballast loads are supplied and these feature a small metal weight hidden beneath, bringing the wagon's weight to a respectable 8g. Of note is the ability to remove the ballast load with a magnet.

Rapido-style couplings are mounted into NEM pockets, with a set of lower profile alternative couplers supplied. The couplings feature pivoting mounts that permit plenty of sideways, as well as fore and aft, movement. When coupled together, the gap between each 'Mermaid' is excessive (8-11mm), although it does allow the wagons to cope with tight radii curves.

Under test, the wagons ran freely and reliably. The coupling mounts can easily be knocked out of the frames unless handled carefully. This will lead to derailments, so a quick visual check is recommended before placing the wagons onto the tracks.

Aside from the detail issues. particular should prove popular with modellers across a wide range of eras and regions. (GD)

olding a model locomotive securely during maintenance or modification work is important, especially where delicate (and expensive!) items are concerned. This new adjustable cradle from Proses can be tailored to suit virtually any single-unit locomotive in any scale from 'N' to 'O'.

Rendered in tough plastic, the cradle consists of two free-standing uprights, each with a trio of foam-padded retaining clamps, linked by a 290mm metal rod (maximum width between each base is 250mm). Small wing-nuts allow the clamps to grip the model on each side as well as underneath (supporting the locomotive's roof when upturned). Interchangeable clamps are provided for models in 'N' and 'OO', and longer arms

are supplied to cope with the larger dimensions of 'O' gauge models.

A small hand wheel slots over the connecting rod and, when turned, a set of gears rotates the two clamps in unison. When set at the desired angle, the model can be locked in

position, freeing up both hands to work on the locomotive.

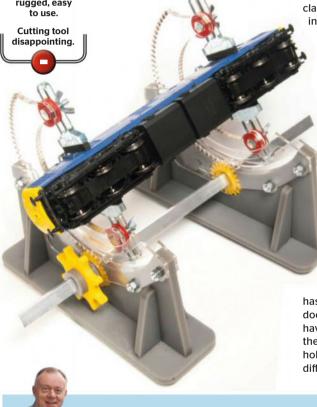
With plenty of scope for adjustment, to cope with models short or long, fat or thin, the fact remains that the twin uprights are not fixed to a single base (nor are any mounting holes provided). Once a locomotive

has been clamped into the device it does remain fairly stable, but I'd have preferred the option to mount the bases to the worktop. Drilling holes in the plastic bases will not be difficult, however.



Another essential modelling aid is a pack of four magnetic corner clamps. The 42mm by 42mm plastic L-shaped devices feature powerful magnets and are good for use with wood, card and plastic components. Placed on the inner and outer faces of right-angled joints, the two parts of each clamp 'snap' together positively, holding the parts securely while glue is applied. Handy cut-outs on the inner faces leave the bonding area clear.

The TC-105 timber and rod cutter is a guillotine-type device that allows for the quick cutting of plastic or wood material. Adjustable fences are

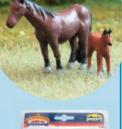

provided, presenting the stock to the pivoting blade at the desired angle. Cuts can be made from 30° to 90° and a standard Stanley-style knife blade is employed, which can be readily replaced.

Mounted on a 220mm by 160mm plastic base, a set of screws and holes are provided for fixing to a workbench. Indeed, this is highly recommended as it greatly improves performance and accuracy,

preventing the base from flexing during cutting.

In use, I struggled to obtain squarely cut edges in wood or plastic more than a couple of millimetres thick. The twin-bevel blade inevitably

wanders away from the vertical once it begins its cut and a singleedged blade (similar to a chisel) would be far more effective. For the rapid cutting of thin material, at variety of angles, the tool is effective. However, at over £50, I was expecting a higher level of performance.

Apart from the cutting tool, these devices have proved to be dependable, versatile and effective. They're not the cheapest, but the high-quality, sturdy materials should provide years of reliable service. (GD)

Michael Foster's name has long been known to train collectors and he's been putting his efforts into a multi-volume account of the much lesser manufacturers of British model trains Michael's books are lavishly illustrated. Most MR readers will never have seen first-hand many of the models illustrated, and many will be surprised at how crude some of them are. Other modellers will thrill to see the spotlight shining on such a large and neglected segment of the hobby.

Bassett Lowke and Hornby tend to be the pre-war names most people recognise, but there were many others, such as Marx, Chad Valley (latterly a Woolworths-owned brand), Brimtoy and Betal (apparently a pun on Beat All!).

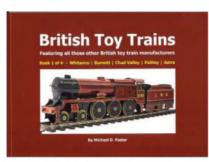
The modelling may have been crude but the market wanted to be up to the minute. So, for anyone looking for a full account of Gresley's 'A4s' or Stanier's 'Coronations', there are pages of coverage. There's even a Marx 'Coronation' in military livery.

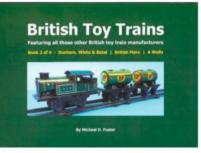
Other forms of traction were in their infancy, but the Union Pacific was pioneering diesel inter-city train sets in the 1930s, and British firms like Marx in Dudley, or Wells, were making them. Much of the steam was going out of this market as British Railways came on the scene, but Chad Valley managed a full selection of BR tinplate items.

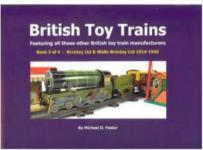
#### ON THE TIN

It wasn't just just rolling stock. These manufacturers often went to town with a full selection of tin-printed accessories, such as signal boxes.

What makes these books special is the wealth of real gems that Michael has unearthed. Did you know that Palitoy offered a plastic 'S' scale range, decades







before Mainline 'OO' models appeared on the scene? That's right, it produced two locomotives, an LNER 'A3' and a GWR '61XX'.

The timeframe in which the volumes are being released means that 'update' information gets published in the next volume because these are stories hitherto uncovered and there's much to discover. Book 4 is scheduled for May 2018 and will cover Brimtoy 1945-1990, Mettoy and more. (Robert Forsythe)

tarting something new? It's probably best to start with something small... That's what Irish Railway Models (IRM) has done.

IRM has become only the second organisation to produce bespoke, ready-to-run 'OO' gauge Irish outline models, but whereas Murphy Models has gone for locomotives and coaches, the newcomer has focused on the world of wagons. It has made a flurry of announcements in the past year or so, and the first fruits of its labours are now on show.

The first subject to be tackled is the quirky four-wheel ballast hopper. IRM provides, within the handsome green card box, a hugely comprehensive factsheet that gives chapter and verse about these wagons. To summarise, the first of

these purpose-built ballast hoppers were introduced to CIÉ in 1972, followed by a further batch in 1974; some were also built for dolomite and mineral/ gypsum traffic. Withdrawals started in early 2001, before larnròd Éireann's new Autoballasters

These 20t wagons have a rather distinctive look, with the underframe protruding some way from the low-slung body at both ends. IRM has

condemned the last of them in 2013.

captured this slightly awkward but not unattractive look well, with lots of fine plastic components. Given the exposed nature of the underframe. the model looks as though it might be slightly flimsy, but it's actually very sturdy.

The draw and brake gear are nicely rendered, as are the suspension units and the bearing detail on the axle ends. Under the heaped, grey ballast load the only slight on the model's looks - is a detailed hopper interior. The load is removable but the fit is tight, and you'll need something like a scalpel blade to wiggle it free.

Metal wheels to 16.5mm gauge with pinpoint axles are

> provided, but IRM has designed the model so that 21mm gauge wheelsets (accurate for Ireland's 5ft 3in gauge) can be fitted.

The bufferheads are moulded plastic and the finish is perhaps

a little crude. However, that negative point is offset by a positive one; the tension lock units are finished in the body colour, which helps to hide them when running. The couplers are held in fixed NEM pockets, but the lack of a pivot didn't

seem to hamper the wagons when running through tight radius curves and pointwork.

> With most infrastructure wagons, there's not a lot you can do

> > with the livery - and these hoppers are no exception. The bauxite finish is well executed, and what highlights there are - the number and data panels - are all excellent. One particularly pleasing feature is the barely visible

number on 24132, which has been painted over and replaced by a new-style stencil.

IRM has offered three packs of three wagons, all with different individual numbers. At €117.02 (just over £98 at the time of writing), they could be considered expensive (£32.66 each, compared to £28.95 for a Bachmann 'Covhop' for example), but this is a niche - dare we say, exclusive - product and therefore warrants the price tag. Plus, IRM has helpfully included a special code within the packaging, offering you money off its forthcoming Tara Mines bogie ore hopper, which is a nice touch.

Overall, these little wagons are an impressive debut. They're a must for all modern image Irish modellers and we await further models with interest. (RF)

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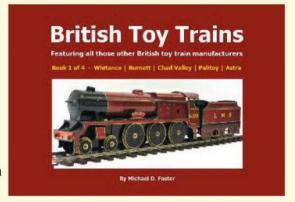

# **Inspired - again!**

For me, it always seems that as one project approaches its end, the next comes into my mind. I didn't go actively seeking inspiration as work on my Cornish harbour layout, 'Polwyddelan', drew to a close, but I think events have conspired to do just that.

First, on a recent visit to Staines, I went walkabout on the common land known as Staines Moor, seeking any remnants of the Staines West branch, which was lifted some 36 years ago. A few weeks later and I was back down in the Home Counties, at Aylesbury, to take a last ride on a Class 121 railcar before the last two were withdrawn from service.

The link is that the first Class 121 that I ever saw was at Staines West. Thereafter, I used them frequently whenever I went trainspotting at Iver and on any other occasion when the branch to West Drayton offered a viable alternative to the Southern Region EMU to London or Reading.

I've always told would-be layout builders to visit their chosen location for inspiration, even if they know that there's little left to see. What I found at Staines was a completely changed scene from what I remembered. The open landscape that I used to see from the train has largely disappeared.

True, the moor is still there, though nibbled away by gravel extraction. To the west, in the direction of what was Yeoveney Farm, is now the M25 motorway and the Datchet reservoir. A little further north, Poyle Halt lies under Junction 14 of the motorway.

To the east, the scene is much as it was, but the trees and undergrowth on the trackbed restrict the view. Once, the silence was broken by the passing overhead of a Boeing 377 Stratocruiser or a Vickers Viscount. Now the constant roar of the motorway scarcely gives way to the new 'quiet' jets departing from Heathrow every few seconds.

For a short distance there's a trackbed footpath along the embankment that led down to Yeoveney Halt, and it's easy enough to spot the raised ground where the 1941-built spur linked the branch to the Southern Railway. As this was never officially lifted, there are even bits of rail and the odd sleeper still to be seen in the bushes. But this was once open ground and now there are trees and thick undergrowth which have changed the character completely. It sent me scuttling back to my collection of photographs, and what had begun as the germ of an idea started to evolve into a project. Events took their conspiracy a stage further when my daughter's house purchase completed and she took her belongings out of my spare room. I guess you can see where this is heading...

In May 2016 Backscene, I mentioned the Dapol Class 121 railcar that had tempted me to dabble in 'N' gauge once more. I've now got a Farish '64XX' and an autocoach. I know it should be a '54XX' for the Staines branch, but it's close enough. Now I just need the revised GWR railcar with the DCC-ready chassis, but perhaps I can build the layout before it arrives.



## A primitive Class 121

I've said before that my interest in the Pressed Steel railcars began back in the 1960s. Browsing my files (all my photographs and drawings are kept in boxes and plastic crates) for background to review Dapol's Class 122, I came across a photograph of my first Class 121 model. It had Plastikard sides and ends, a Kitmaster roof and motor bogie, and K's bogie sideframes. The latter were the only components available for a DMU, without scratch-building.

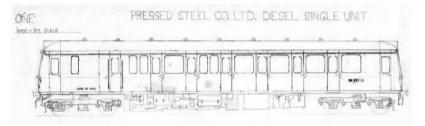
What proved to be even more interesting is the drawing which I worked from. It was probably drawn while I was still at school, and it certainly used everything that I had learned in technical drawing class with Mr Osborne. He used to call me 'Tramlines Leigh' as I frequently drew double lines when my ruler slipped, and he knew of my railway interest. I've now no idea if I obtained any proper dimensions, or if so, how I did it. The railcar used to stand at the terminus for a while, so I might well have run a ruler over some basic details.

My second attempt at modelling a Class 121 was an MTK kit, but that's another story! Maybe it can be told sometime soon.
