The model railway hobby is mourning one of its true greats after model building master Allan Downes lost his battle with cancer on August 2. Allan's modelling techniques inspired generations in the *Railway Modeller* and, since 2001, in *Model Rail*.

It was a real privilege to work with Allan. He was a true gent, a friendly and welcoming host and fun to be around. But his stocky stature, slicked-back hair and gruff London accent always meant that he resembled, to me, a retired boxer – or possibly one-time gangster muscle – rather than someone who would talk passionately about brick papers or Scalelink window frames!

Allan's true genius, I felt, was in his ability to see modelling potential in everyday objects. Who else but Allan could look at a bottle-top and see a clock face? His other great skill was to combine very simple techniques to produce hugely complex buildings. I was astonished to find that his way to make mock Tudor buildings was to overlay black card shapes onto white.

Despite his own status in the hobby, Allan was quick to praise the work of others (he was a particular fan of Chris Nevard). And yet, I'd be gently chided that I hadn't given him enough space or cut too much from his copy (sorry Allan but *Model Rail* is a family publication!) and that his ego needed more massaging!

We'll miss Allan and our condolences go to his family. Turn to page 6 for our tribute to the man and his work.

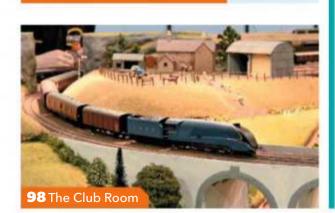












Opening the box The latest happenings from the world of model railways

Allan Downes with his trusty Fender Stratocaster - and the model buildings that have inspired generations of modellers. **CHRIS NEVARD**

was fascinated by Allan's model-making from the days when he first started submitting to *Model Railway Constructor*, back in Steve Stratten's time in the 1970s. In those days, he created stonework using fire-clay cement. Later came the magnificent cathedral, its rose window made from the lid of a margarine tub. Like most great artists, Allan had his ups and downs and would disappear from the scene – sometimes for several years – then pop up again with something sensational.

Allan approached me when I was editor of *Model Rail* as he wanted to show off some of his latest offerings. To give it a nice rural feel, I called the series 'The Downes Way'. I went to his home on to or three occasions, and recall being squashed inside the door of his garage workshop while I held up a huge white backscene behind his model of Scunthorpe Steelworks. The inside of the garage was a dull grey-brown colour from floor to ceiling where Allan had expended countless cans of red oxide and grey primer to get the effects he wanted. You could taste the fumes in the air!

Much of the steelworks was made from recycled odds and ends, yet it looked exactly right. A few minutes later I managed to knock a fine whitemetal horse and cart off the front of his layout. It didn't stop him giving me a number of his buildings to sell for charity. I still have one or two of them, awaiting a suitable opportunity to sell them for a sensible price.

I couldn't resist buying his Tintagel Post Office, which is the only model I have in my sitting room. He gave me a massive wooden industrial structure – a North American sawmill – but the one Downes structure I've never owned was one of his cottages, much as I would have liked to.

Allan's modelling was quirky. He never finished bits that you wouldn't easily see. Tintagel Post Office, for instance, has no slates on the back part of its roof.

There was one subject on which we never agreed. He never put any interior detail in any of his models and I tried to convince him that the addition of some simple curtains inside the

windows would make a big difference. I never succeeded. Perhaps he felt it would slow him down, and it was the speed at which he worked that gave his creations their character.

He had a stroke some years ago, and it seemed that would be the end of his model-making but, amazingly, aged 80, he made a comeback and his recent models, including those black and white half-timbered structures from Chester and Ludlow, are surely some of his best.

Allan was one of a kind. Artistic, creative, eccentric - certainly. I was told that he was banned from York racecourse after he drove his Land Rover across it to make a hasty exit.

For many years, he's been known to us all at *Model Rail* simply as 'Downesy'. Successive editors, and photographer Chris Nevard, were invited to his home to see his latest creations.

He was always welcoming, jovial and friendly, and when it was time for us to go home, he would pick up his guitar and fill the house with *Apache*, sounding for all the world like Hank Marvin.

Sincere condolences to his wife and family.

a standard for us all to try and achieve. I have great memories of sitting alongside him at an exhibition in Wigan, listening to his superb tales. He kept us in stitches. Lovely man, great modeller.

Allan collected me from Scunthorpe station in a 4.2I Mercedes-Benz. I had to share the front seat with

a load of planed wood ("these are for the chimneys I am making"). He loved the car, and demonstrated its handling through some flowing 'S' bends!

He was happy to pass on all the lessons that he had learned and was always keen to learn from others. He wanted me to teach him the secrets of planting static grass. The best tip I could give him was to switch the applicator on!

No encounter with Allan was ever anything less than memorable. Not so much

a modeller as a magician, he'd create stunning models in the time it would take most of us to figure out how to open the box.

He was at the centre of some of my favourite (but unhealthiest) days working on *Model Rail*. One of my favourite memories is being trapped in the back of his garage-cum-workshop for hours on a sweltering summer day, holding up a giant piece of white polystyrene as a reflector while Martyn Barnwell photographed one of Allan's masterpieces and Allan liberally sprayed all sorts of (possibly toxic) materials around on his next project.

Madder than a wasp trapped under a pint glass, he was also great company, full of energy and always ready with a joke or a story. Captivating, multi-talented and truly inspirational, he will be much missed.

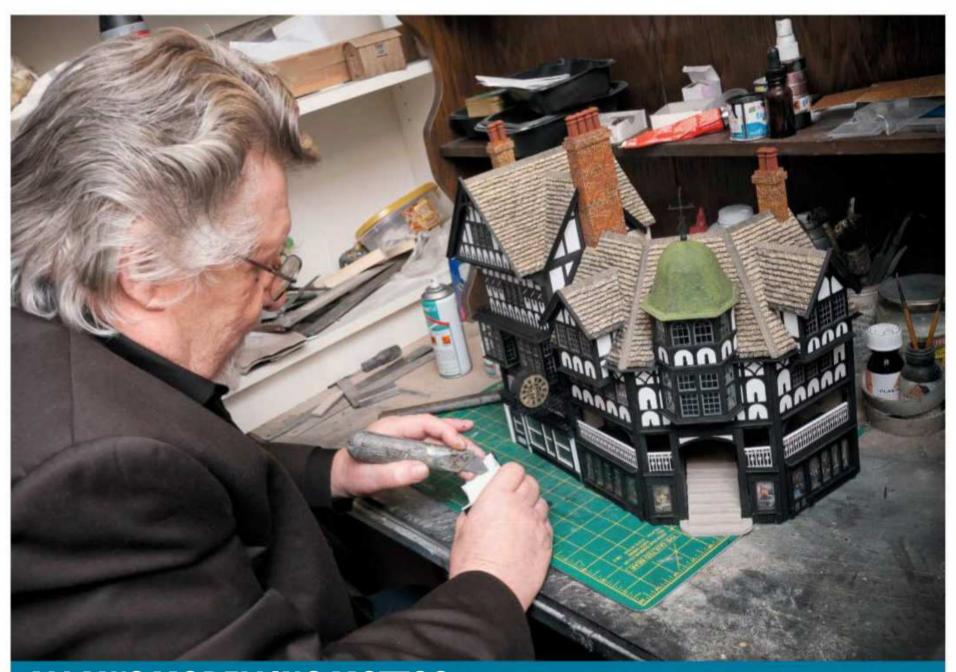

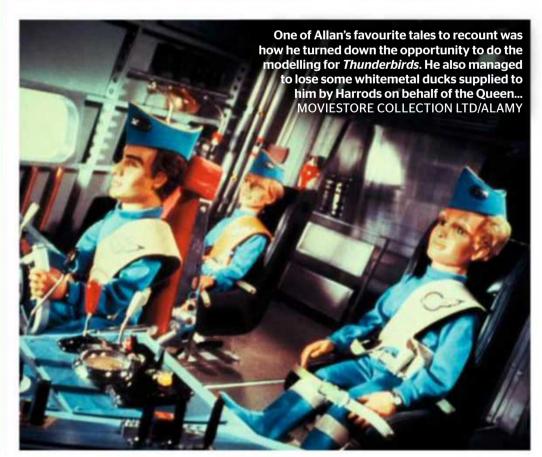

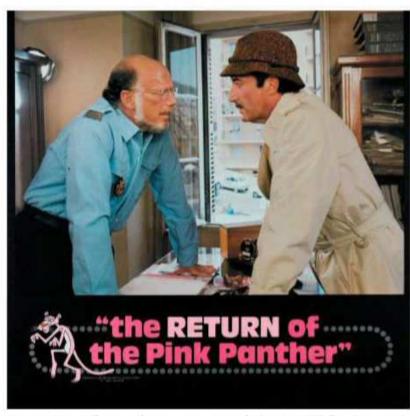


ALLAN'S MODELLING MOTTOS

- 1. Keep it simple.
- 2. Don't model what you can't see.
- 3. Do whatever it takes if it's going to take ten windows, give it ten windows and not nine!
- 4. Measure twice, cut once.
- 5. Always work to the nearest millimetre, not the nearest ½-mil.
- 6. Always use the architectural 'rule of thirds'.

7. Always ensure consistency throughout so that nothing on the layout catches the eye - either because it's better than everything else - or because it's worse!

A day with Allan was always a joy, for he was such great company. He

very much shattered the stereotypical image of solitary, socially challenged railway modellers - especially when he cranked up the volume on his Fender Strat!

Even though I'd visit every few months, Allan would have built a huge number of new buildings in that time, and quite often layouts too. His techniques might be speedy, but the finished products never looked rushed.

Using layers of PVA glue to replicate water was one of the first techniques I learned from Allan - gone were the days of messing about with smelly yacht varnish. Allan's use of Halfords primers for speedy weathering has rubbed off on me too.

I have a humble signal box that Allan gave me on one of my first visits. It lives on my mantelpiece and it's the only model that's ever been allowed to take up a permanent position in the living room - it's that good!

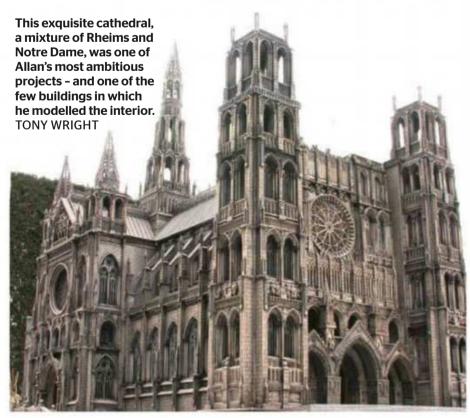


GEORGE DENT

Allan's work was one of the main draws for me when I became a Model Rail reader in 1999.

His models and dioramas really blew my mind. Some stand-out examples include a huge steelworks and a lovely rendition of Dartmouth. I certainly learned a few tricks from him over the years.

One could never call him a 'rivet counter', but he always managed to capture the quintessential character - the essence - of a place or building without being overly obsessive. As a modeller, I know how difficult that is to pull off, yet Allan made it all look so easy.

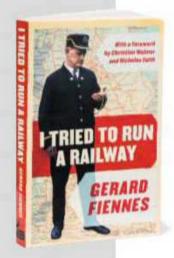

TransPennine Express unveiled its new Mk 5a coaches at Velim test track in the Czech Republic in April... and now the first set has arrived in the UK. TPE has ordered 13 Mk 5a sets, and each one comprises a Trailer First (numbers 11501-11513), two Trailer Standards (12701-12739) and a Driving Trailer Standard (12801-12814). The sets are fixed and traction will be provided by 14 Class 68s (68019-32). Mk 5 Caledonian Sleepers, also built by CAF in Spain, are in the UK and undergoing testing. TPE

TransPennine Express plans to operate Class 68s with Mk 3 coaches for a few months this year until the Mk 5a coaches are ready to enter service. Crew training trips offer the opportunity to model some colourful trains, such as this one which ran between Wavertree Junction and Crewe Carriage Sidings on May 24. The train comprised two Class 68s in DRS blue, three Mk 3s from Virgin's 'Pretendolino' set and a Mk 3 from Greater Anglia. **TERRY EYRES**

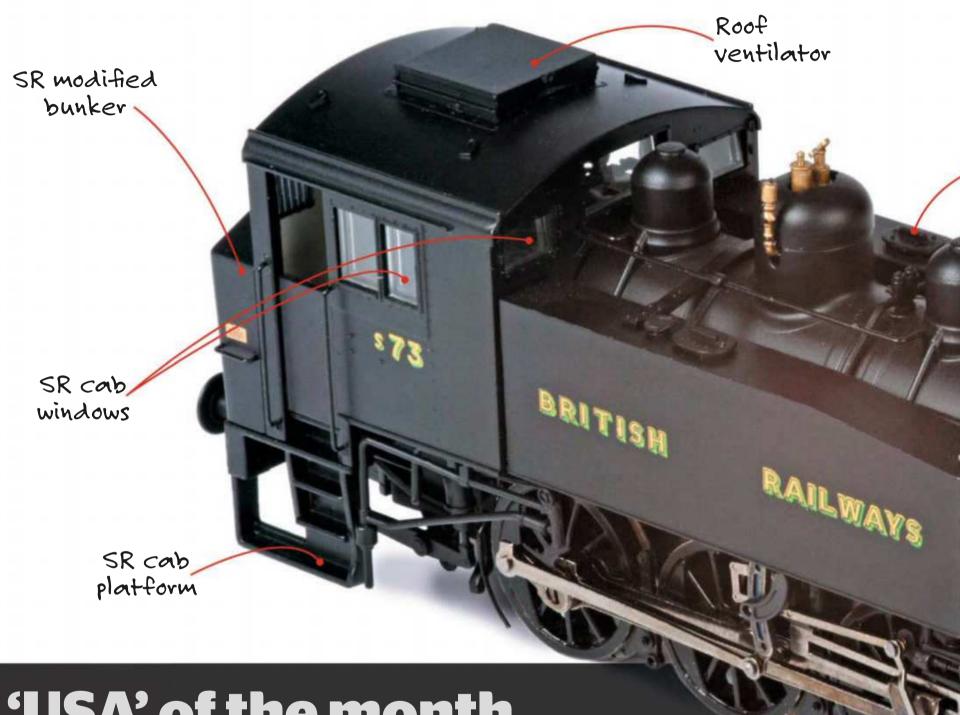

Model Rail's 'USA'

Exclusive Rail Model Rail's MR-111 'USA' O-6-OT No. S73, produced exclusively by Bachmann, is a beautiful representation of the real thing and a worthy addition to your collection.



'USA' of the month

MR-111 'USA' O-6-OT No. S73 **British Railways unlined black**

This short-lived colour scheme bridges the gap between the post-war Southern Railway and the early days of British Railways. Southern Railway No. 73 retained its number but with an 'S' prefix to denote 'Southern Region'. Bulleid 'sunshine' green and yellow lettering was applied only to the tank sides, and spelt out 'British Railways' rather than simply 'Southern'.

The colour scheme was replaced by its new number, 30073, and BR's 'cycling lion' emblem in 1951.

No. 30073 would become one of the most popular 'USAs'. It was the first of the class to undergo alteration in March 1948 when it was fitted with a modified bunker and regulator 'to the requirement of the Docks and Marine Department'. It remained at Southampton until June 1963 when it was transferred to

Eastleigh before being withdrawn in January 1967 and sold to Cashmore's of Newport. It was also the most popular locomotive of the fleet to take part in special workings, participating in eight between 1960-66.

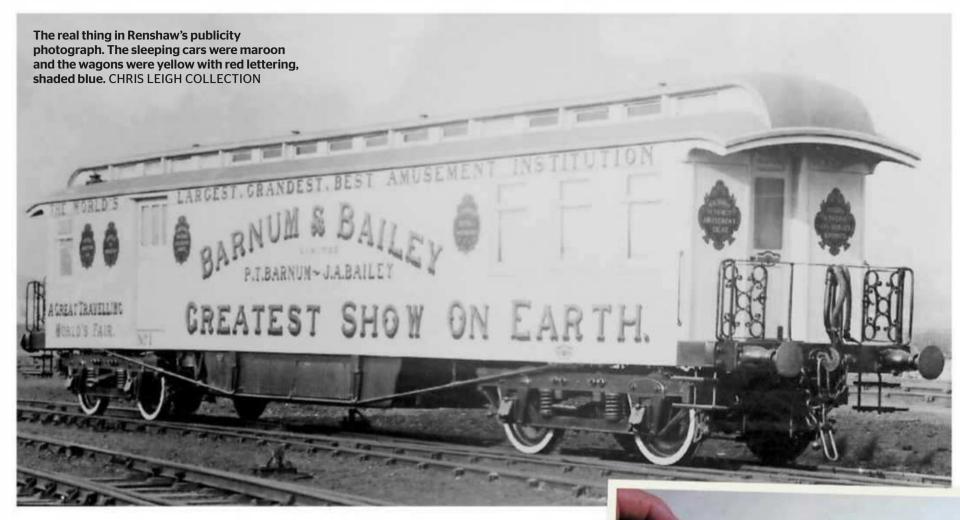

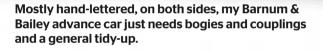

According to Chris...



His grandchildren call him 'Granddad Trains' and he's been a dedicated railway modeller since the 1960s but, despite popular legend, **Chris Leigh** doesn't remember when dinosaurs roamed the Earth!



ust before he went off for a holiday week in France, my son and I got into a conversation about movies. As usual, I was bemoaning the fact that, despite there being around 75 channels on Freeview – and one or two of them with signals actually strong enough to penetrate the digital wilderness that is East Northamptonshire – I could seldom find anything worth watching. I mentioned scrolling through new additions to the iTunes list and he asked if I wanted to borrow *The Greatest Showman*, which he had on DVD.

This is a modern Hollywood musical based around the story of Phineas Taylor Barnum (1810-1891). Barnum was, of course, one half of Barnum & Bailey, whose 'Greatest Show on Earth' was a massive circus with a three-ring big top which toured by train around the turn of the 19th century.

The European tour required new rolling stock and W.R. Renshaw of Stoke-on-Trent built the four trains totalling more than 60 bogie vehicles. In order to accommodate the huge horse-drawn wagons, the 30-plus flatcars were longer than any then running in the UK, and for ease of loading from ground level they ran on very small wheelsets, cast in Germany.

There were also bogie stock cars for the horses, a camel car and three huge elephant cars.

The circus tour of the UK was a logistical masterpiece. At each town the show began with an afternoon parade through the streets followed by a huge display of outside stalls, sideshows and caged animals. As the evening performance took place inside the big top, the outdoor show was dismantled and moved to the railway yard where it was loaded and the trains dispatched to the next location.

Even as the crowds departed the site, the big top came down and was loaded onto the horse-drawn wagons and taken to the railway yard. From there, the last two trains, including the eight sleeping cars of staff and performers, departed for the next town where, after an early morning arrival, the whole procedure was repeated.

Despite its 'political incorrectness', the GSoE has long fascinated me. I once stumbled across photographs of the British train without knowing what it was. The research to identify and understand what I was looking at was utterly enthralling.

After the GSoE returned to the USA, many of the railway vehicles were used by Buffalo Bill's Wild West, which toured the UK around 1905 and was owned by Bailey. After that, the trains were split up and sold. Many went to the Alexandra (Newport) Docks & Railway, where the elephant wagons became transit vehicles for grain storage and several sleeping cars became trailers for the railway's railmotors. Rescued at the behest of preservationist D.M. Rouse, one of these coaches, which had become a bungalow in Devon, is now stored as part of the Welsh Museum collection.

The GSoE had one vehicle which travelled on its own, and that was the advance car. It ran several days ahead of the show so that its staff could provide all the advance publicity.

The meticulous operation by both the circus and the numerous pre-Grouping railways which moved the train became legendary. The show never missed a performance, despite the British weather and the fact that it toured some surprisingly small towns, often up to 150 miles apart.

Way back in the 1980s, I began to build some of the cars. Only the body of the advance car survives as a reminder of the days when the prospect of carrying out the lettering by hand did not deter me.

Perhaps I should finish it off?

Paul Tudor on why 'old' doesn't necessarily mean 'hopeless'.

f you were to ask my supportive but long-suffering wife to list two of my traits, I suspect she'd say that 1) I'm a hoarder and 2) if there's a bargain bin somewhere then I've probably got my head in it.

Suffice to say, these aspects of my personality – let's not call them flaws – have carried over into my modelling life, with the majority of my rolling stock having been found cheaply, hoarded and turned into usable and charismatic items through inexpensive and enjoyable processes.

Take the Tri-ang Fowler 'Jinty' for example. First released in 1955 and in production – in one form or another – for 20 years, there are still thousands of them around, albeit in less than perfect condition. As a younger modeller wanting to improve his skillset, the humble 'Jinty' was a godsend to me and, with the easy availability of etched and resin aftermarket items, the basic model can be easily improved.

As produced, the 'Jinty' features moulded horrors such as coal and hand rails, numbers, and even lining. There are no bufferbeam details and the ugly mounting to the rear chassis is an eyesore. All of these can be altered or carefully removed with a razor saw and scalpel, and new items attached – the change can be incredible.

On the mechanical side, the 'Jinty' uses the supremely reliable X.O4 motor which is easy to maintain and strip down, as is the basic Tri-ang chassis, which was used on all of that firm's 0-6-0 models, lasting well into Hornby days. Virtually every mechanical part is easily interchangeable, so if anything goes wrong it's often just a few minutes' work to repair. In fact, that's one of the great aspects of pretty much the entire Tri-ang range.

It's worth bearing in mind that early
Tri-ang models had solid wheels; fully spoked
ones weren't introduced until years later.
These will need replacing. Early production
examples are also made with plastic which is
very susceptible to warping, so look carefully
for distorted bodyshells.

I've mentioned Tri-ang, as its products are the most basic in many cases, although that's not always true. Its rolling stock, such as the BR Mk 1 Sleeping Car and four-wheel horsebox are lovely. There are other manufacturers out there though, and items by Airfix, Hornby, Lima and Mainline can now be found for bargain prices.

I like Mainline's detailed bodies, and it's telling that Bachmann took over many of the moulds and added improved chassis. The weak point with Mainline is the running gear, and if you can find the equivalent Bachmann chassis cheaply you can have a lot of fun. Mainline bodies need a lot less work in most cases and, for those wanting an affordable parallel-boiler 'Scot', 'Peak' or 'J72', I would say look no further.

So, why do I put myself through this? It's a challenge to see what can be made from the proverbial sow's ear, and it's helped me hone my modelling skills no end.

Mainly, though, it's the pleasure of seeing a once-loved item being cared for again, often after many years. I'm sure I could buy the latest release

years. I'm sure I could buy the latest releas from Hornby, Dapol or Bachmann, but I wouldn't enjoy them half as much.

MODELLER'S CV

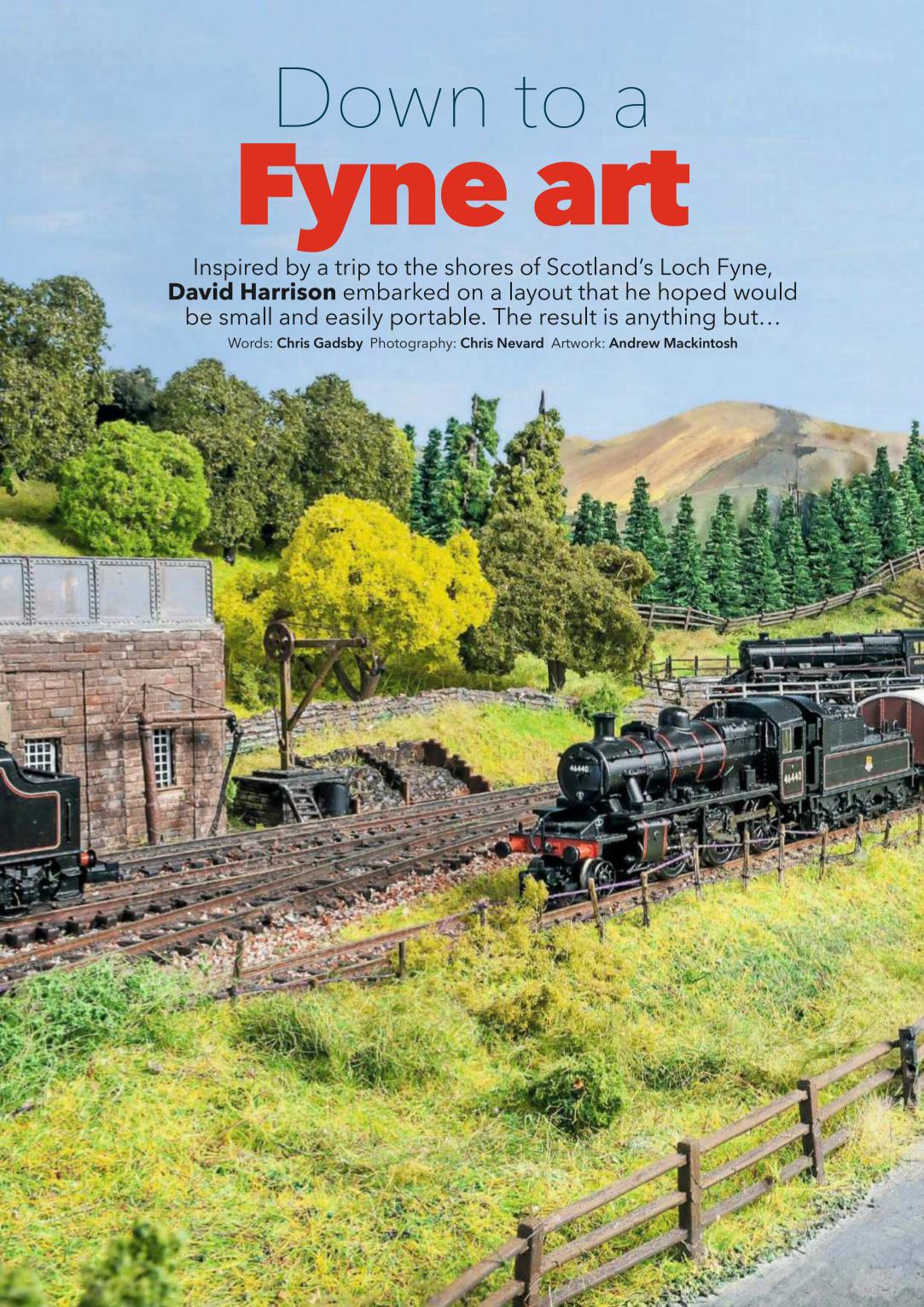

ave you suffered from this? You build a layout, start exhibiting it, and then you see something that inspires you so much that you want to rip it up and build something else?

Inspiration came to David Harrison on a visit to Inveraray, the beautiful little town on the shore of Loch Fyne. The handsome white buildings stand some way away from the water's edge – it almost looks as though there is enough room there for

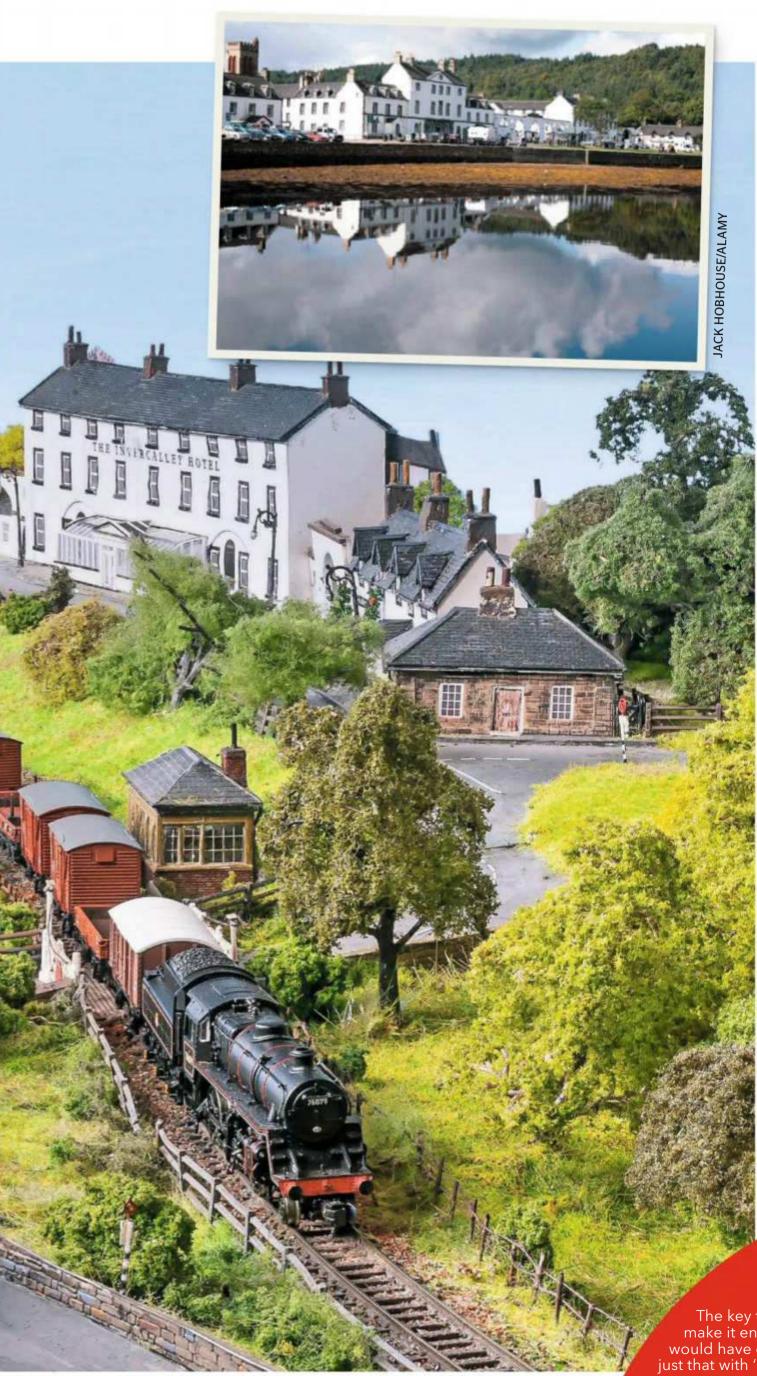
a small branch line terminus... just like one in Ian Futers' *Scottish Layout Projects* book.

The desire to give Inveraray a railway drove David to build 'Invercalley' while still exhibiting his other layout.

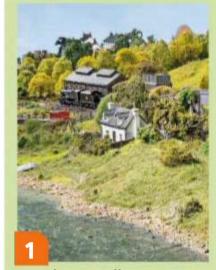
"Once I saw the plan for the layout in Ian's book, that really set me going," admits David.

"I adapted the layout slightly to include a runround loop and sidings, and changed the name so that, even though it was based on Inveraray,

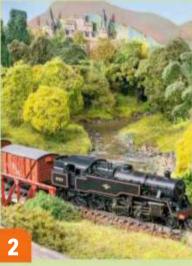

David has also included Inveraray's stunning castle, albeit in low relief.

What makes this layout great?

The key to a fictional layout is to make it entirely plausible that a line would have existed there. David has done just that with 'Invercalley'.



I wouldn't be tied down to the specific location."

The layout's name was derived from several sources, including a dog he once owned called Calley, and the fact that he supports Inverness Caledonian Thistle football team.

BEST LAID PLANS...

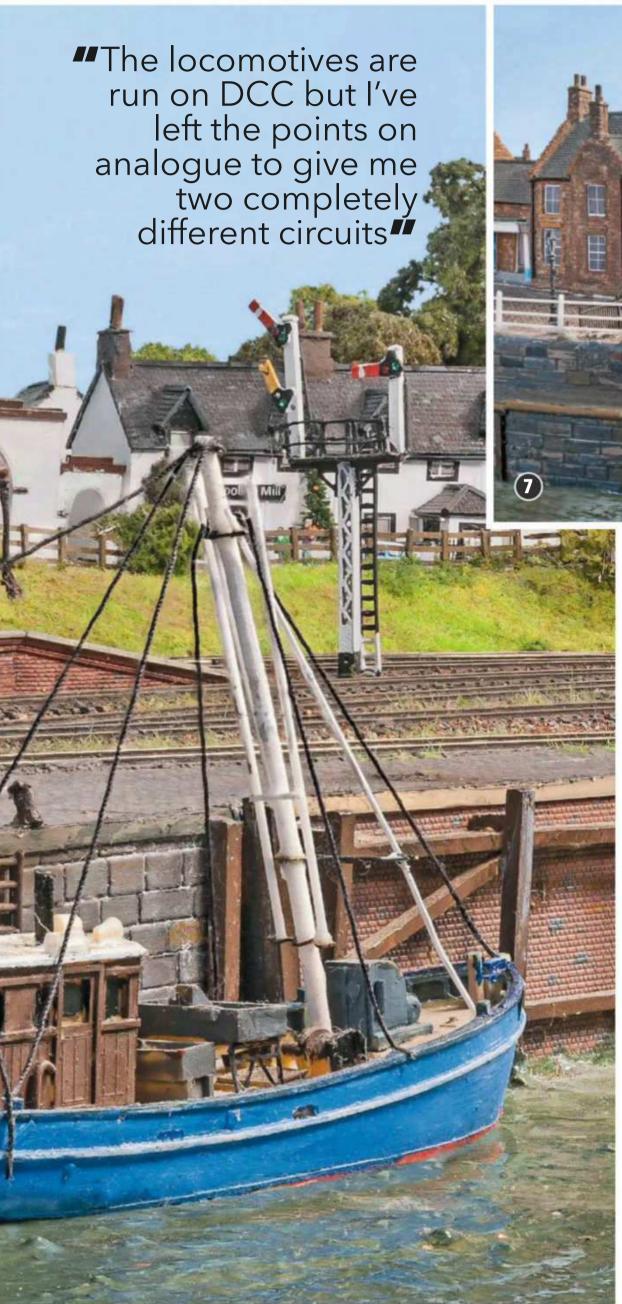
Despite the nearest railway to Inveraray being the West Highland Railway, 'Invercalley' depicts a fictitious Caledonian branch from the Callendar & Oban line. David envisioned a much smaller layout than he ended up with.

He explained: "The plan was to make a layout that wouldn't need three people to load into a van. The scenic section is 15ft by 2ft, with the fiddleyard branching off at 90° on the right-hand side to make an L-shape. This is about 4ft long, making the whole layout 6ft long on that side.

"The original layout was only 9ft long. Then I added another baseboard inspired by the locomotive shed at Kyle of Lochalsh. That brought 'Invercalley' up to the length it is now."

DUAL OPERATION

'Invercalley' allowed David to dip his toe in the waters of DCC. Trains are controlled by digital, but the point motor wiring uses 12V analogue wiring for ease of familiarity.

"I'd never built a DCC layout," David explains, "but was keen to keep up with technology and wanted to give it a go. One of the best things about it is that I can have two locomotives on the same track and bring them up to one another. I use two Gaugemaster Prodigy controllers, so that one operator can be performing manoeuvres in the sidings while the other is running the main line.

"I tried several different DCC controllers and, in the end, decided on the Prodigy because I found it the simplest to use. With it being an end-to-end layout I don't have the luxury of being able to leave a model running round and round, so having two operators keeps the interest levels up when it's at exhibitions."

The layout took just over two years to build. Among its most striking features are the waters of Loch Fyne and the large hill on the right-hand side.

"The water has a base of 3mm plywood coated with Artex, which is creamier than normal plaster," says David. "Once I'd pasted it on I used a small paintbrush to stipple it and make the waves.

"The good thing with Artex is that it doesn't sink once its been manipulated, so the waves held. I could then paint it with acrylic paints and apply a coat of varnish every day for a week. The result is effective and the water is quite reflective when the light is on it, adding to the realism.

If making the water sounds rather straightforward, the hill proved more problematic.

"The main hill is made from corrugated cardboard which I shaped until I had the contours I wanted. This took a few attempts to get right – >

I kept making it too large and it dominated the scene.

"When I'd got a hill shape that I was happy with, I covered the formers with plaster bandage, which doesn't take too long to dry. Putting plaster on the top of the bandage adds to the strength of the structure. I then painted it and covered it in scatter material. I don't have a machine to apply my static grass, so I coated the hillside in PVA glue before sprinkling the grass onto it.

"An old toothbrush was used to manipulate and tease up the grass. The rocks in the hills are just scribed into the plaster using a flathead screwdriver."

FACT MEETS FICTION

The buildings on David's layout are all based on those found along Front Street (the A83) at Inveraray. They have been scratchbuilt using a cardboard carcass with a printed exterior, with details such as drainpipes added to make it more three-dimensional.

David took photographs of the real buildings square-on, and paced them out (much to the bewilderment of tourists!) so that he could convert them into feet and inches and then scale them down to the correct size for 'Invercalley'.

The tiles and chimneypots are Ratio 'N' gauge products, and the architecture and stonework of the

station is based on that found at Dalmally. It wouldn't normally fit in with the rest of the architecture at Inveraray, which wouldn't have stones in that style, but David has blended them into his layout well and they don't look out of place. He incorporated castellation into the roof of the station to further add to the Scottish 'feel' of the layout.

Several areas of the layout took several attempts to get right. David laid the track before the platform before deciding that the platform looked too wide, so he took it all up again and relaid the track. David remodelled some of the buildings three times!

David admits that he really enjoys all the research that goes into building a layout like this and gets satisfaction from people recognising the location. He even met one person who didn't realise that the line never actually existed!

HOW TO

BUY PRE-OWNED MODELS

Chris Leigh rummages through his thoughts on how to bag a bargain and dodge a disaster when buying second-hand.

ailway modelling is such an expensive hobby!"

"Prices just keep going up!"
All too often you hear the prophets of doom and gloom extolling the virtues of railway modelling while putting off newcomers by telling them they'll need to spend a fortune in the pursuit of this hobby. In truth, all hobbies can be as expensive as you make them, but railway modelling can also be affordable and enjoyable on a budget.

So, let's start by making the pursuit of bargains and inexpensive models part of the enjoyment of the hobby. Let's ignore the boasts of "I just bought this. It's top of the range, and it cost me a king's ransom," and make our own boast: "I just bought this, it's really good. It does everything I need and it only cost a few quid."

WHAT?

Let's begin by looking at the things we'll need to make a start in railway modelling. I will assume that you are going to want to build a layout. It may be permanent or portable and in a spare room, shed, garage or loft.

For any sort of layout, you're going to need a baseboard and there's really little chance of escaping the costs involved in buying suitable materials. A durable baseboard, whether permanent or portable, really needs to be

made of timber and plywood or MDF. Your local DIY superstore will be the easiest place to find these, although they may or may not be the cheapest source. Regardless of what you're paying, make sure that the timber is straight and that the board materials are not warped. A small 'OO' gauge layout or a larger setup in 'N' gauge can be built on a standard flush internal door. B&Q sells them for £24 which, if you value your time, may be cheaper than buying the materials and building your own baseboard.

'OO' gauge has the biggest choice in model railways. It's in that gauge where you'll find most of the bargains and second-hand items

and, for that reason, that's the gauge I recommend. If you need to work in 'N' gauge due to space constraints, you'll have a lot less choice in pre-owned models, while second-hand 'O' gauge items are automatically assumed to be worth a fortune. Second-hand 'O' gauge is a minefield of overpricing, largely due to the shortage (until recently) of keenly priced ready-to-run models, and the belief that anything that has been kit-built or scratchbuilt must be priceless.

So, if your primary requirement is a good choice of used models at affordable prices, you need to be looking at 'OO'.

Having chosen your gauge, you will

need track. Like your baseboard, your track is crucial to the running of your trains and your enjoyment of the hobby. For this reason I would recommend that you avoid second-hand flexible track. Flexible track may well have been cut to length or to suit curves, and the soft nature of its sleeper base means that it is easily

damaged when lifted from its original installation. Track pins will have caused sleepers to break and rails may well have been pulled from their tiny fastenings on the sleepers. In addition, depending on where it has been used, exposure to extremes of temperature may have made the sleeper base brittle.

Second-hand sectional track is a better bet. This comes in rigid pieces so check that you have enough for your needs, that the available curved pieces are all the same radius, that it is undamaged and that the fishplates (rail joiners) are present on opposite rails, one at each end.

When buying second-hand points (turnouts) check that the fishplates are present,

that the blades move easily and that both are attached to the operating bar. In all cases, look for track that is clean. The rails need to be shiny. Avoid track that has residues of glue and track ballast.

As far as controllers are concerned, whether or not you buy second-hand really depends on how comfortable you feel about buying second-hand mains electrical products in general. I would not

do so, but a browse through eBay showed half a dozen modern analogue DC controllers that I might consider.

Know what I would not recomm

I would not recommend older equipment such as the grey-cased H&M range because these are unsuitable for use with many of the modern locomotive motors. Old Hornby-Dublo (Meccano) controllers will now be some 60 years old. Would you even consider using any other electrical appliance that old?

So, where should we shop for second-hand equipment? It is worth browsing eBay in order to see what's on offer and the prices people are asking. Use it for initial research, rather than for buying. You need to know exactly what you are looking for and have a rough idea of what you should expect to pay for it. Remember that some eBay sellers may be getting rid of a late relative's models and have no idea what they are dealing with. Equally, ignore headings that include words like 'rare' and 'highly collectable'. Unscrupulous dealers will use these as excuses to place absurd

starting or 'buy it now' prices, deliberately designed to catch the unwary. The adage with eBay is 'if in any doubt, don't.' Be aware, too, that several large reputable model railway stores put items on eBay, so look for the name/location of the seller.

Out of curiosity, I rechecked the availability of the Hornby-Dublo suburban station (featured on page 62). There were three examples, one of which was complete and still boxed and had a starting bid of just £5, while another, with at least one missing window, had a 'Buy it now' price of £69.95. Caveat emptor!

Several of the major model railway retailers now have large second-hand departments. Let's not beat about the bush. A lot of 'baby boomer' generation modellers (I am of that generation) are reaching the end of their lives and their model railway collections are being sold off. Stores such as Hatton's and Rails of Sheffield have recognised that such collections often contain lots of highly re-saleable items and they have a constantly changing inventory of pre-owned equipment. A check of their websites is the best way to find out what's available at any given time. If it's what you want, go for it. Some of these models come and go very quickly. It's likely to be in good condition

and boxed but may not be at bargain basement prices. These guys are experts and they know the value of what they are selling. The model railway exhibition

'season' starts soon, having taken the annual summer break. Shows are often a good place to look for bargains but you do need to do your homework first. Know what you are looking for and how much you should expect to pay for it. Several years ago, I needed coaches for my 'O' gauge 'Railway Children' layout. Second-hand 'O' gauge can be a minefield as it is mainly kit-built and scratchbuilt models and they vary widely in how well they've been built and finished. I found a couple of clerestories - Midland, I think - but I had no idea of their origin. They looked OK and were complete and I seem to recall I paid around £50 each, which made me hesitate at the time, but was actually quite a bargain.

buffet car. Always check that what's in the box is what you

want. Don't rely on

the label.

Most of the second-hand stalls at shows are either the club's own sales stand or a part-time dealer – an amateur who travels from one exhibition and swapmeet to the next. Again, it's a case of being sure of what you're looking for and being discerning about what you buy. If the models look clean and well presented that's a good start. If they look like they've been hauled from pillar to post in the same tray for months, they are best avoided. They may well have been in a poor state to start with and repeated handling won't have improved them.

Club sales stalls can be a source of some good buys. They are usually supporting club funds by selling members' unwanted models or perhaps disposing of models on behalf of a member's widow. Most such models will have been well cared for and may even be in their original boxes. Watch out for 'improvements',

though. These could be replacement couplings or even wheelsets. Rolling stock might, for instance, have been converted from 'OO' to 'EM' gauge by changing wheelsets, or it may have had three-link couplings fitted in place of tension locks. Such things can usually be reversed but doing so will add to the cost.

WATCH OUT!

So, are there specific things to watch out for and certain models to avoid? In short, yes. I cannot overemphasise the need to do your homework. Don't just buy something because it's cheap. Decide what you want and go looking for it. Use your model shop and the big name online model shops first, and then go to eBay. You may find a choice or you may have to decide whether the one example that's available is at a price you are willing to pay. I recently went searching for Bachmann's Scenecraft 'Waggon & Horses' pub. I found one, second-hand. It was in Australia and the price and shipping cost was far more than I was willing to pay.

The first requirement with a locomotive is that it should work. Some traders will make sure that the model is in working order and will clean and lubricate it. Others won't. Check the underside of locomotives for fluff, dirt and excessive lubrication. Over-oiled locomotives won't work. Examine the wheel treads for wear and avoid anything on which the plating on the wheels has worn away.

If you are buying from a high street retailer, have a member of staff test-run the locomotive. This is not usually possible at shows or swapmeets. A locomotive which is offered in its original box will usually have been better cared for than one which is unboxed.

The wheels are often a clue to the age of the model. Tri-ang locomotives had sintered iron wheels. They are a dark grey colour and are

very thick, with deep flanges. Tri-ang became Tri-ang Hornby in the early 1960s, so these models will be approaching 60 years old. Enough said.

Even after the move to plated wheels with a finer profile, Tri-ang Hornby and the 1970s arrival, Lima, continued to produce its models with very deep wheel flanges. Lima used brass wheels which, like the sintered iron versions, were prone to collecting dirt, impairing the performance.

In the intervening years, most of the prototype locomotives modelled by Lima have been covered by other manufacturers with more up-to-date models which are generally better in almost every respect. Modellers have upgraded their collections with the newer models and the older ones have been sold off second-hand. The result is that the second-hand market is awash with these older models, which means there are some good bargains to be had.

The Class 52 'Western' diesel-hydraulic is quite a good case study as there have been 'OO' models by Lima, Hornby, Heljan and Dapol. I sold a Lima Class 52 'Western' last year, fitted with Ultrascale wheelsets, for little more than I had paid for the wheelsets themselves. This is because the Class 52 has been covered by Hornby and Heljan, and even more recently with what is, perhaps, the definitive Class 52, by Dapol. So, if you want a bargain basement Class 52 and are willing to overlook the discrepancies in the Lima model, you should be able to find one for £20-£30 on eBay, (£30-£40 on Hatton's/Rails of Sheffield). The Hornby model seems to command £30-40 second-hand and the Heljan around £80.

Similarly with steam outline locomotives, you need to have done your homework. Taking as an example the ever-popular Gresley 'A4' 4-6-2, we can trace 'OO' gauge models back to Hornby-Dublo's three-rail *Sir Nigel Gresley*, first produced in the 1930s and reissued as *Silver King* in the 1950s. The present Hornby organisation has issued two substantially different versions of the 'A4', the earlier version having the drive mechanism in the tender and, more recently, much more detailed versions that have the mechanism up front, where it belongs.

Many thousands of tender-driven models were produced, including 'A4s', Stanier 'Pacifics' and SR 'Schools' class 4-4-0s, and all have been superseded by more detailed loco-drive versions. Whether or not you choose a loco-drive model or are content with a tender-drive version is your choice, but there's no doubt that the older, tender-drive model should be much cheaper than its more modern counterpart.

ROLLING STOCK

We're all keen to have something for our locomotives to haul, and if there are hundreds of used locomotives to choose from there will be thousands of coaches and wagons. You may find a selection of boxed coaching stock, but boxed wagons are less likely.

My local store certainly had a reasonable choice of boxed coaches in good condition, although it is always worth checking that the

Here's a five-point action plan for bargain hunting.

- **1** Know exactly what you are looking for. Do your homework with regard to the specific item. Aim to know more than the seller.
- **2** Have a budget with an upper spending limit.
- **3** Look for a well presented, boxed example.
- **4** Don't be tempted by descriptions that include the words 'rare' and 'collectible'.
- **5** Try established retailers such as your local model shop or Hatton's and Rails of Sheffield first, before going to eBay or stalls at shows.

box label and the contents match. As with the tender-drive locomotives, so there are two versions of Pullman cars by Hornby, the more recent ones having LED table lamps and much better detailing than the earlier versions.

On the subject of Pullman cars, Graham Farish made some plastic-bodied models of matchboard-sided Pullmans in the 1950s. These models still crop up frequently in second-hand sales but I've yet to see one on which the plastic body has not suffered irreparable distortion due to the unstable nature of the plastic used. Sadly, these are only fit for the bin.

There are, too, older and newer versions of the Hornby BR Mk 1 coaches. In general, the size of the tension-lock couplers and the finesse of the underframe detail are the best clues. The newer Mk 1s have small tension-locks clipped into NEM pockets, while the older vehicles have the large, old-style couplers attached to the bogie.

When we come to wagons, dealers tend to have so many of these that they will be in a bargain bin. My local store seals them in individual plastic bags, which is good way of preventing damage. Many will be old Hornby and Lima wagons but, as George shows on

page 54, you can make these sow's ears into silk purses with a little work. Just avoid those with the really large tension lock couplers, really thick wheelsets and open-ended axleboxes. You can find better.

SETTING THE SCENE

In the days of plastic and card building kits, many of the models simply did not survive to be resold. Attempts to remove them from the scenery resulted in so much damage that they were only fit for the bin. However, the advent of much more durable resin structures in the Hornby Skaledale and Bachmannn Scenecraft ranges has created a second-hand market for buildings, particularly in 'OO' and 'N' gauges.

Most of these are likely to be unboxed examples and you will need to check that chimneys and other vulnerable details are present or, if they are damaged, that they are repairable.

£10 UPGRADES

George Dent offers five ways to improve ready-to-run locomotives and coaching stock that won't break the bank.

1 - ETCHED NAMEPLATES

One of the simplest upgrades for locomotives is to install etched metal nameplates (and numberplates, where appropriate). Printed names can be impressively rendered, but they lack that distinctive relief of the real thing.

Etched nameplates are available from a range of suppliers, including Fox Transfers and Shawplan. According to the prototype, they may consist of single or multiple layers, such as when it features coats of arms, crests or logos.

Sometimes etched nameplates are provided with RTR models as an alternative to the printed versions and may consist of two or more layers. If sourced separately, check that the correct colour is chosen to suit the model's livery.



Cut the nameplate free from the fret carefully with a set of sharp metal snips, then dress the edges smooth with a needle file. I prefer to use Glue 'n' Glaze adhesive, applied sparingly with a cocktail stick.



Leave the glue to turn tacky over a few minutes before placing the nameplate into position. A strip of masking tape can act as a guide. Any excess glue can be wiped away with a damp swab.

2 - POPULATE THE INTERIOR

Unless stabled in a depot or siding, locomotives, coaching stock and multiple units need staff and passenger figures to be installed.



As well as adding a bunch of Aidan Campbell figures, the cabs of this Hornby Class 56 have also been adorned with newspapers and other detritus from a set of lorry interior details (www.tencommandmentsmodels.co.uk).

Plenty of suitable figures are available in unpainted or fully finished form to suit most scales, although they may need a little 'surgery' in order to fit within the cabs of certain models.



Passengers are often a glaring omission from inside coaching stock and multiple units. Seated passengers may need their legs trimming before installation. Use epoxy or cyano glue for a strong bond.



Leave the figures to cure overnight before reassembling the model. Fire irons and tools add a final touch to steam locomotives.

Springside Models offers suitable packs and the tools can be painted before fixing in position.

3 - FITTING GANGWAYS

Working gangway connections work to eliminate the unsightly gaps between carriages and multiple unit cars. Self-assembly kits are available in the ranges of MJT, Comet, York Modelmaking and others, most being tailored to fit specific types of vehicle.

Most are easy to assemble and install, making use of simple materials, with laser-cut versions being the most straightforward. The concertina style of paper bellows has a gentle sprung action, allowing the vehicles to move and sway around the tracks without hindrance.

This pack of laser-cut paper gangways are from the York Modelmaking range. The elements are simply folded and interlaced before the plastic overlays are added and the units fixed to the model in place of the original mouldings.



The sprung paper gangways are great for improving the appearance of coaching stock and multiple units, especially this Hornby (ex-Lima) Class 101 DMU set.

4 - FRONT-END IMPROVEMENTS

Moulded smokebox door handles and chimneys of an incorrect profile often spoil the 'face' of a steam locomotive, but they can be readily replaced with turned or cast metal alternatives. Buffers are also a key element of

a locomotive's outline, with 'weedy', undersize units detracting from a model's authenticity. Again, replacements are freely available in sprung or solid format, while adding the requisite array of brake and control pipes and hoses to the bufferbeams adds greater realism. Furthermore, cosmetic screw or three-link couplings add the final touch.



Cut away moulded smokebox door handles with a sharp scalpel, removing a small amount of plastic at a time. Dress the surface flat with fine abrasives, taking care not to damage other details.



Drill a suitable mounting hole for the brass boss and secure with cyano glue. The twin arms can then be slid onto the spindle and glued in position. When dry, snip away the excess material and file flat.





Unless the chimney can be snapped away from the boiler, cut away the bulk with end-cutters, then pare away the rest of the waste material with a knife and files until the surface is flush and smooth.



Fix the new chimney in place with epoxy adhesive, which allows time for fine-tuning and removal of any excess (with a damp swab) before the glue hardens. Leave overnight to cure fully.



Ready-to-run buffers are also often ripe for an upgrade. Again, use a set of end-cutters to remove most of the original buffer shanks, following with a sharp blade and files to flatten the surface.



Drill or open out mounting holes to a suitable diameter to allow the new buffers to fit snugly into the headstocks. After test-fitting, secure the buffers with cyano or epoxy glue.



While cosmetic scale couplings can simply be glued into a suitable slot, working couplings require space behind the bufferbeam for the spring and split pin to be fitted.

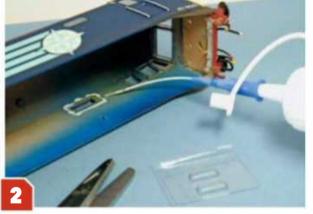


Scale couplings make a massive difference to the front aspect of a steam, diesel or electric locomotive. A variety of couplings is available in ready-assembled or kit form from Smiths.





The individual panes are cut out with scissors, leaving a small tab around the edges. Test-fit without glue first, filing the inside of the aperture slightly if required until a snug fit is achieved.



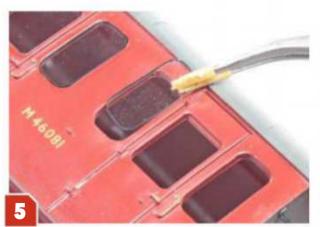
Glue 'n' Glaze is the ideal adhesive: run a thin bead around the opening and wait until it turns tacky before fixing the window pane. For best results, fit a small number of panels at a time and allow the glue to dry before continuing.



South Eastern Finecast's flush glazing can greatly improve the appearance of older models, such as this Lima Class 47, especially when combined with other detail enhancements.



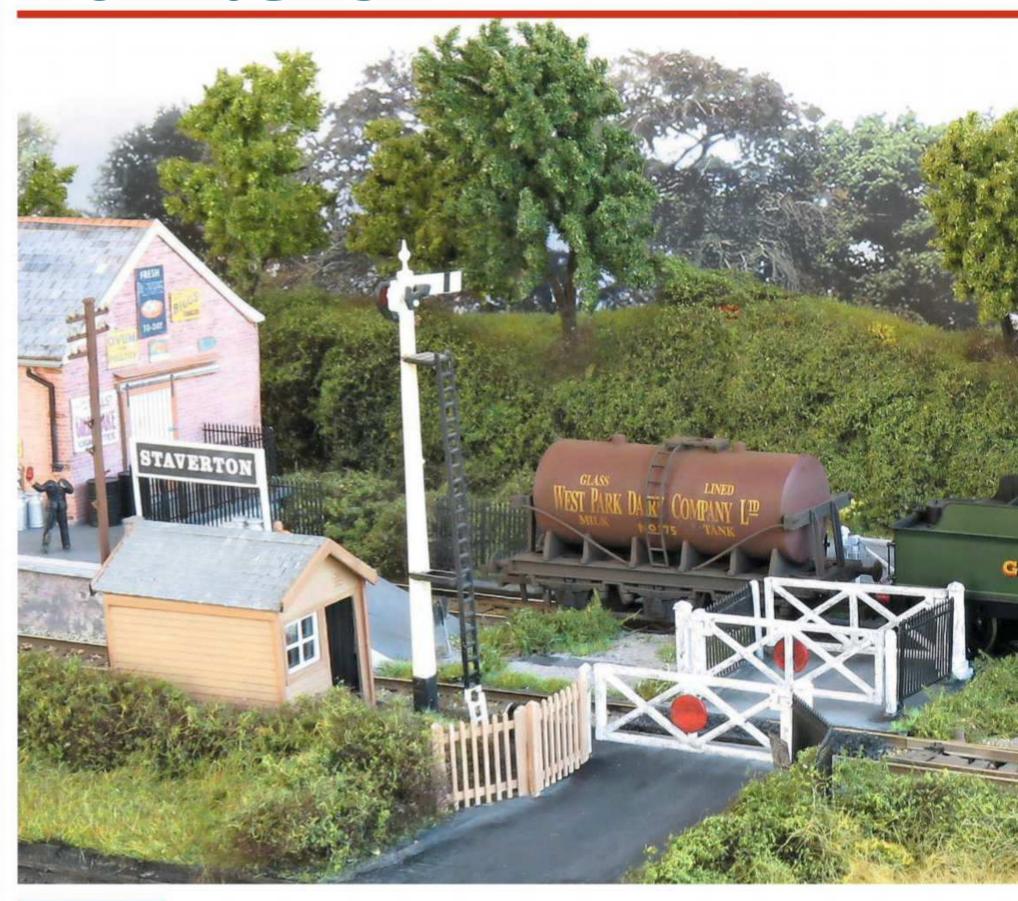
With Shawplan's packs of laser-cut flush glazing, each panel has to be freed from the sprue with a sharp knife and the edges touched in with black permanent marker pen.



Each panel is fitted from the outside of the model. A snug, friction fit usually occurs, thanks to the precise production. Secure with clear acrylic varnish, applied with a fine brush.



Adding laser-cut glazing transforms any model, especially stock like this Bachmann Mk1 suburban carriage. Even 'high-spec' locomotives benefit from the laser glazing treatment.



HOW TO

BUILD A LAYOUT F

Peter Marriott sets himself the challenge of building an entire layout for the less than the cost of just one Heljan locomotive.

wo hundred pounds: I couldn't believe it when I saw that the full retail price of Heljan's GWR '47XX' was just five pence shy of £200. I knew that prices of new models were on the increase but I didn't realise quite how much.

There are some modellers who wouldn't bat an eyelid at buying a '47XX'. For others, however, it's a huge sum to commit to a hobby.

I decided to see if it was possible to build a layout for £199.95, the full retail price of a '47XX'. Some may still baulk at spending this much but I wanted to know if I could build a layout for the cost of buying one locomotive. After all, when you consider that a pair of Hornby short radius points will set you back £23.98, £200 doesn't seem so much after all!

This budget does limit the size of a project. I wanted to build a real working railway rather than a diorama and decided that this would give me the opportunity to finally model Staverton, the beautiful little wayside station on the South Devon Railway.

I've always loved this little station, particularly the single-storey station

building, signal box and level crossings set amid gorgeous Devon countryside, with the old mill nearby. The best bit is that the station now plays host to both steam and diesel trains.

The entire project was spread over three weeks, working, on average, 1½ hours a day. The total cost comes in under my budget. But bear in mind that I've included tools and accessory costs in this total. I had quite a lot of this material already in stock, so I reckon that if you take all that off, I wasn't far off half the price of the 2-8-0!

PROJECT 1: BASEBOARD

I cheated a bit with the baseboard. I already had a 4ft by 13in board in stock but I realised that not everyone has this luxury, so I popped into my local hardware store. My investigations revealed that a 4ft by 13in sheet of 9mm plywood would cost just under £10. Rounding this up means that we start the project with an even £10 running total.

PROJECT 2: TRACK

I did consider buying second-hand track but, again, it wouldn't have been very scientific, given that second-hand prices fluctuate. Shopping around, I decided that rather than buying Peco or Hornby track, I'd go with Bachmann Code 100 instead. It fits the same radii and lengths (the product codes are strangely familiar) as other sectional track manufacturers but it's quite a bit cheaper, especially if you buy from Hatton's.

Here's what I needed: 36-600 Straight x 1 @ £1.20 36-601 Double straight x 4 @ £1.90 36-610 Short straight x 1 @ £1 36-872 Left-hand point x 2 @ £8.46

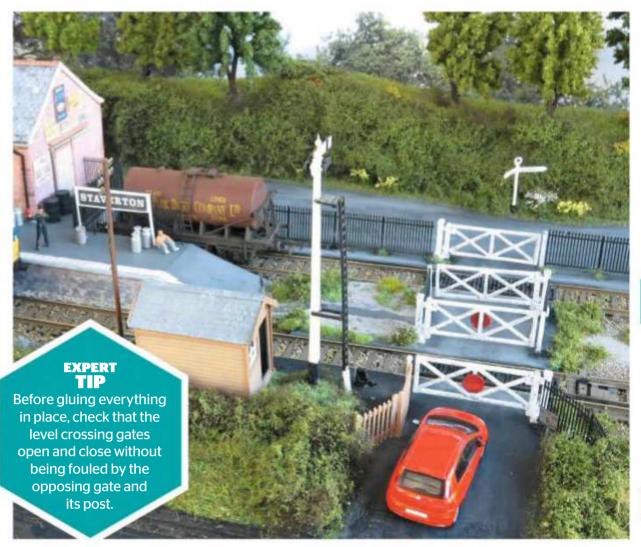

PROJECT 3: MAKING THE LEVEL CROSSING

One of Staverton's most distinctive features is the level crossing. There are actually two sets of gates - one protects the main line, the other the bay platform. I used Peco's trusty LK-50 kit, cutting the gates in half.

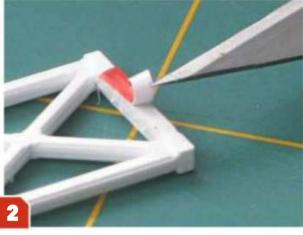

Mark where you want your road to go. Fix two layers of mounting card to the road area, bringing the road level up to the tops of the rails. Paint with Woodland Scenics Asphalt Paving.



Remove the lamps and the red warning discs with a sharp blade. Use a sanding stick to 'thin' some of the parts of the gates because the plastic is a bit too chunky.



I cut each gate in half to create a length more akin to Staverton's twin level crossing gates. I made new warning discs from off-cuts of plastic sprue, painted with Humbrol red paint.



The Peco level crossing kit comes with posts and fence panels. The shortened gates will still clip onto the posts. Complement the Peco fence with GWR spear fencing (see p51).



Cut holes into the mounting card with a sharp blade to accept the base of the gate posts. Secure with a little PVA.



Fill the 'four foot' with Osborn's Models' hard foam cobbles. Cut a suitably sized strip with a sharp blade and glue with PVA.



After the crossing was in position, I lightly painted it with diluted India Ink to reduce its bright white plastic appearance.

PROJECT 4: THE PLATFORM

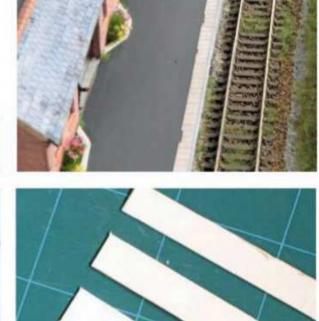
Taking a cost-conscious approach forces you to think about all aspects of layout construction. For example, I'd never considered how much it costs to build a platform. Before, I might have splashed out on Bachmann resin pieces or Peco kits. But they cost a lot of money.

I decided to make my own platforms, using a piece of mounting card that I bought from my local Hobbycraft. The first job is to decide how long and how deep your platform is going to be. The final length is usually a compromise between what you'd like and what your layout size will permit!

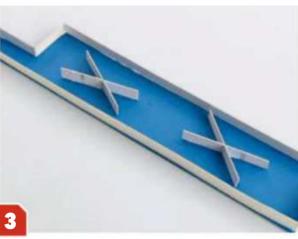




Cut out the platform shape using a cutting mat, a steel rule and sharp craft knife. Use a fresh blade and made the cuts slowly. Use fine sandpaper to smooth the edges of the cut cardboard.



Use a carriage to test the correct height, and remember that passengers usually step up to the train. Cut strips of card to that height and also to the length of the platform, angling the ends.



Cut more strips to platform height. These will become the internal supports, to give the structure strength. Use Woodland Scenics Scenic Glue to assemble the components.



I used a sheet of Scalescenes Coursed Rubble to make the platform wall. Cut to shape with a fresh blade and fix it to the mount card with Pritt Stick.



To make the white line on the platform edge, I used Woodland Scenics Earth Colours white and some Gaugemaster masking tape.



As the goods shed opens out onto the platform, mark its footprint on the platform surface. Then, with another fresh blade, remove this card and slot the goods shed in place.

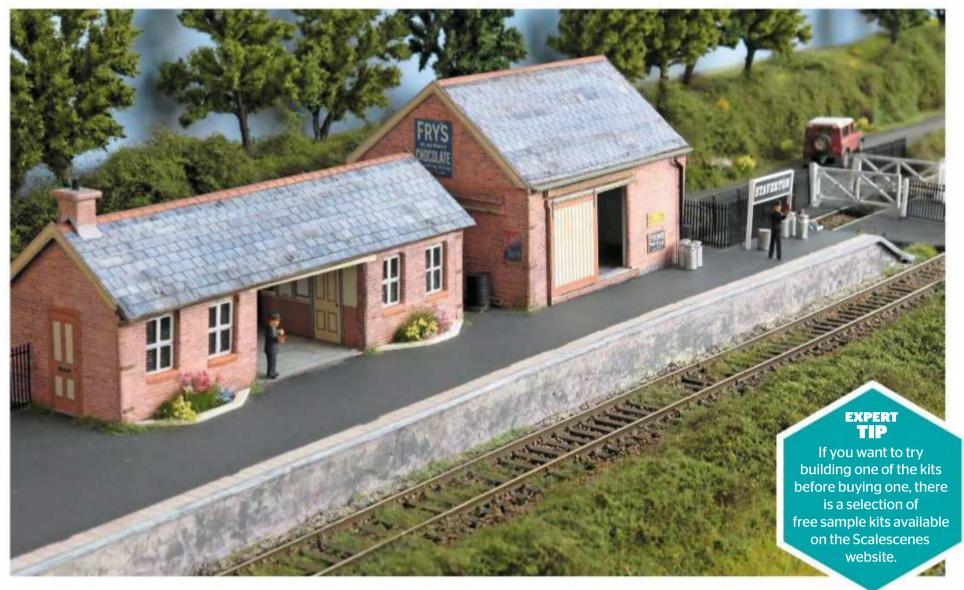

Now you can paint your platform surface. The real platform has an asphalt and coping stone surface, so I painted mine using Woodland Scenics Earth Colors.



The Scalescenes sheet contained coping stones. Cut them out, reduce the size of some, and fix in place with Pritt Stick.

Buildings for layouts can be an unexpected source of layout building costs. You won't get a lot of change from £20 for an average plastic kit, while most resin ready-to-plant buildings are in the £50-£100 bracket. Superquick's trusty card kits are arguably the cheapest kits around, but they look a little dated today. So what's the solution?

Downloadable kits.

Scalescenes has become one of the most familiar names in this field and its range is not only extensive but really good looking. The beauty of such a kit is that you're not paying for the materials -

you just pay for the download.

The cost comes, of course, in sourcing suitable backing card on which to mount the components, not to mention

printer paper and ink. But you will save money if you need more than one building, because once you've bought a kit you can use it as many times as you want.

Kit R003b is an absolute bargain - you get both the station and the goods shed for £4.99. I reckon that the additional cost of mounting card, paper and ink would probably push this up to £7. But how else can you get a station and goods shed for £7?

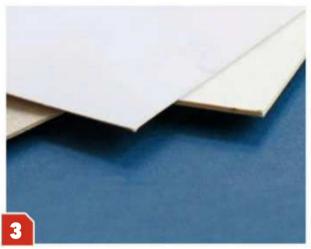




What your download includes. Before you print the sheets, clean the nozzles on your printer and switch it to 'best quality' print setting.



I assembled my tool kit before starting work, including a number of different coloured pencils for touching up cut cardboard edges. Keep plenty of fresh blades near by - you'll need them.



Staverton's buildings required three thicknesses of card. I bought a sheet of mounting card from an art shop but recycled a cereal box and a business card for the rest.



An aerosol of artist's matt varnish will protect printed sheets from sticky fingers and adhesives. Lightly coat all the sheets immediately after printing.



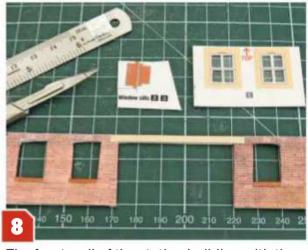
The end walls of the goods shed showing the overlapping pieces to blend the end wall in with the front and rear walls.



To show the effect of the coloured pencil, look directly under the roof. The right-hand side looks a lot better than the left!



The windows on the station building took a little time to make because of the various layers of thin cardboard and clear plastic sheet behind them all.



The front wall of the station building with the window frames, nearly ready to glued into position. Elements such as the window sills are fiddly but definitely worth adding.



Internal walls are required to strengthen the model and on this model the internal walls are visible. The roof took around 30 minutes to make, adding the strips of cut tiles one by one.

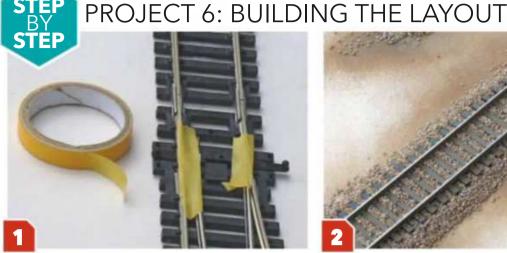


The roof is made by laying strips of cut paper on top of each other. It takes a little time but it looks a lot better than simply fixing the sheet of tiles to the cardboard.

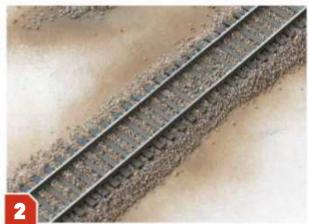


When I visited the line a few years ago I took pictures of the goods shed and tried to reproduce where the enamel signs had been on the real thing.

Pin or glue the track to your baseboard. Protect the point blades with masking tape before giving the track a thorough coat of Humbrol Dark Brown 29 aerosol. Give the track a good clean with a track-cleaning block.



Spread Woodland Scenics WB72 onto the track using a Proses ballast spreader. Lightly brush it into place before fixing it with a 50/50 mix of water, PVA glue (and a drop of washing-up liquid).



The roads were made from two layers of mounting cardboard. Towards the rear of the layout a piece of Celotex home insulation foam has been shaped using a Woodlands Scenics Foam Knife to form an embankment.



Glue the foam to the layout and hold it in place with foam nails until it dries. Cut small pieces of plaster cloth and dunk them in water. Lay them onto the layout, overlapping each piece. Allow to dry and paint with brown artist's acrylic.



Apply a coat of PVA over anywhere that's going to be grass. Use a large, wide paintbrush to accelerate the process. With the PVA still wet, sprinkle on a selection of basic green scatters. Leave to dry.



Tease out some Woodland Scenics Poly Fiber. Prepare about a dozen pieces at a time, then spread some glue and cover one large area at a time, rather than doing it bit by bit. When dry, spray with hairspray and sprinkle on scatters.



Mix some Woodland Scenics White Earth and

Asphalt and paint the road surfaces. Now

position the platform and station buildings.

To add height and colour variation to the land I added clumps of static grasses in a variety of colours and heights. I used Gaugemaster static grass glue and a small electrostatic applicator from WW Scenics.



I used one packet of spring trees by Gaugemaster. These are easy to add to any layout - simply form a hole in the foam landscape and push the trunk in. Dry-brush the trunks light grey to highlight texture variations.



I used an old packet of Hornby Skale Scenics fine grey ballast to make the cess. Add a few weeds alongside the track - grass tufts and strips are available from a number of manufacturers and are easy to install.





This part of Devon is known for its primroses. I made my own by sprinkling some yellow scatter onto some grass tufts. Plant them into blobs of PVA with tweezers. They're a little bright but they add a splash of colour.



Disguise the gap between building and platform with a flowerbed. Create them from pieces of cut card. After brushing some PVA glue onto the base, I pushed an assortment of flowering grass tufts into the adhesive.



All the fences were made from a pack of Bachmann Scenecraft spear fencing. Drill mounting holes with a small drill bit in a pin vice. Fix with PVA. The milk churns and oil barrels are also from Scenecraft.



The signal is a Ratio GWR Home signal kit. These kits are relatively easy to build if you follow the instructions. Mine is non-working. The GWR lamp hut is a Hornby Skaledale resin model.

PROJECT 7: THE SIGNAL BOX

Wills is an ideal source of good looking plastic kits at reasonable prices. Its Ground Level Signal Box kit (SS29) is clearly based on Staverton, and at just over a fiver it was ideal for this project. The kit isn't identical to Staverton - key differences include the type of door and the timber panelling, but it still offers a quick and easy way to roughly represent this distinctive South Devon structure.

This is one of the easiest plastic kits you'll ever build. Assemble the four walls around the floor section. When the glue's dry, paint the interior grey, along with the lower part of the levers.



Cut the clear plastic glazing to fit the window frames. Use a pin-point applicator to apply the poly cement so that you don't smear it onto the glazing.



Paint the roof using the same grey paint. Then dry-brush on a little white to bring some relief to the detail, followed by some matt varnish.



Paint the Osborn's signal box plate using RailMatch GWR light and dark stone enamels. When dry, fix the 'box nameplate using Woodland Scenics glue.

Scrimp and save

'Scrapbox', 'bits box', 'spares box' whatever you call it, having a stash of leftover bits and bobs will save you money. If you buy a pack of grass tufts, for example, you may have some left over after a project. Don't throw those leftovers away - keep them for another time.

My scrapbox saved me quite a bit of money on this project. I had all the tools and materials in stock, including quite a large sheet of mount card.

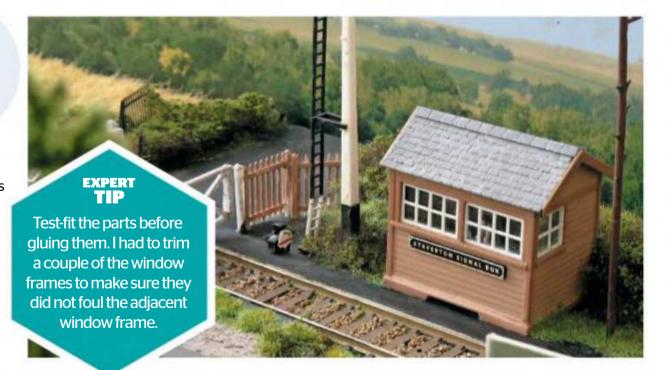
But be realistic and resist the urge to keep hold of everything (you must have uttered the words 'that'll come in useful one day' at some point!). Save everything and you'll soon end up drowning in a sea of modelling material you'll never use.





Paint the signalman's face and hands using a flesh colour and glue him into position. Paint the lever handles in suitable colours. then glue on the roof.

UPGRADE OLD WAGONS

lived rather frugally as a newly married twenty-something and had to make do with cheap modelling projects. Older, second-hand models offered much potential, especially in the days when decent preowned rolling stock could be obtained for just a few pounds.

While the preowned market has boomed in recent years, prices, like those of new models, have risen too but there are still bargains to be found. Furthermore, if you choose carefully, there are many models dating back to the 1970s and 1980s that can still hold their own against contemporary, 'high-spec' products.

A pair of typical examples are featured here, namely the Lima 12t box van and an Airfix seven-plank open wagon. Introduced in the late 1970s, the Airfix model has remained available for decades, under the Mainline, Hornby and Dapol brands, with only minor improvements to the wheels and couplings over the years.

Current issue models remain fairly cheap

in comparison to more modern ready-to-run four-wheel wagons, but older examples can be found for even less. With a new set of wheels, couplings and a quick dose of weathering, it looks very much at home on a modern layout.

I've had a soft spot for the Lima van since I was a kid. I had one in my first train set, but with its striking red livery and Typhoo Tea logo it wasn't exactly realistic.

Indeed, the Italian firm went through a phase of branding general goods wagons with household names, including Homepride flour, Stork margarine, Michelin tyres and St Ivel milk. Hornby did a similar thing (the tank wagon that looked like a Duracell battery was a particular favourite).

Having bought a handful of Lima box vans back in the late 1990s, I combined them with superior underframes and wheels from Parkside Dundas and Romford, respectively. The improvement was pretty amazing, taking what was essentially a toy and transforming it into a more 'serious' model.

As with much of Lima's output, the vans featured some finely moulded detail on the plastic bodyshells, but the bombproof underframes and enormous wheel flanges were a real drawback. Tricky to modify, the tough, rubbery plastic chassis was best discarded, with Parkside's chassis kits remaining a very economical upgrade option.

Repeating the upgrade more recently, the cost of the Lima vans hasn't increased much, in relative terms, with good boxed examples available for around a tenner. As we're only interested in the bodyshell, it's worth looking out for less pristine examples at lower prices.

Taking into account the economy of scale involved in buying paints and transfers to treat at least a dozen similar wagons, the entire upgrade of this Lima van project came to about £20, including the cost of the donor model.

Considering the quality of the finished model, I think this is excellent value. Plus it was great fun and brought back some very happy memories...

New wheels and couplings bring this 1970s Airfix wagon up to modern standards. A replacement chassis would add even more realism.

This 1970s-vintage Airfix seven-plank open boasts a well rendered bodyshell, a decent underframe and low-profile tension lock couplings. The plastic wheels, with large flanges, are ripe for renewal, however.



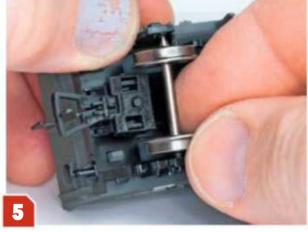
Compared to the superior wheels from Dapol (centre) and Romford (right), the Airfix wheels (left) show their 40-year-old heritage. Turned metal wheels make for smoother, quieter running.



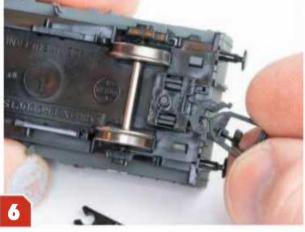
I chose a set of Dapol spoked wheels as replacements. They should make for a simple swap but, if the axles appear too tight within the frames, a special reaming tool is available from DCCconcepts (www.dccconcepts.com).



If the axle bearing holes do need fettling, place the reamer tool between the frames (as you would with the wheels) and rotate in a clockwise direction. The cutting faces remove waste plastic effectively.



Test-fit the new axles regularly to check for a nice, snug fit, ensuring that the wheels can rotate freely. The axles should not be too sloppy or the wagon will run poorly.



While the original couplings weren't bad, I swapped them for modern Hornby versions (R8099) to ensure compatibility with new stock. The old ones were simply unplugged and the new versions slotted into place.



With the addition of new wheels and couplings (a ten-minute job), the Airfix wagon already looks much more acceptable. A weathering job will improve matters even more though!



A few coats of enamel weathering washes, a little work with an airbrush and renumbering with a fine paintbrush brings the ex-LMS wagon into the 1950s BR era and enhances the detail of the body moulding.

STEP PROJECT 2

Lima's 12t box van also dates from the 1970s and, like many products from the Italian manufacturer, there were some really good points about the model. However, the large wheels and chunky underframe let it down.



Parkside plastic wagon chassis kits (now in the Peco range) offer a cheap and easy replacement for RTR stock. NEM coupling pockets are also available and a new set of wheels and brass bearings complete the job.



The Lima underframe is released from the body by levering the small tabs at each corner with a small screwdriver. A small steel weight is then revealed, which can be reused.



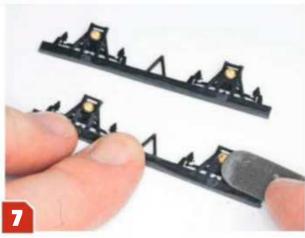
Cut and file away all projections from the underside of the floor to provide a flat, clean surface onto which the new chassis frames can be assembled. Be sure not to damage the bodyside framing that extends below floor level.



The roof is released by pressing the two vent sections in each end, these acting as retaining tabs. The steel weight can then be fixed inside the bodyshell with epoxy adhesive. Leave overnight to cure.



Begin by adding one of the Parkside bufferbeams to the end of the wagon floor, ensuring that it sits square and true, just a fraction behind the outer face of the end. This will act as a reference point for the side frames.



The brass 'top hat' bearings are pressed into the holes in the side frames. A friction fit should be sufficient, with no need for glue. If the bearings feel a little loose, add a tiny drop of cyano glue.



Dress the upper edges of the frames with a flat file to remove any flash. Check with a set square to ensure that the upper edges are square and true, as the frames need to be set up correctly in relation to the wagon floor.



Fix one side frame to the wagon floor, ensuring that it stands vertically and parallel to the edge of the bodyside. A strong poly cement is recommended, such as Mr Cement from Mr Hobby (www.albionhobbies.com).



Place the wheels in position and the other side frame, checking that the axles are concentric and that they can turn freely before applying the adhesive. Again, keep checking the alignment before the cement cures.



Another way of checking for correct alignment is to place the wagon on a sheet of glass. All four wheels should be in contact with the surface and they should rotate freely. Leave the wagon upturned while the cement cures.



After adding the other bufferbeam and the separate bufferheads, the brake gear can be installed. Make sure that the brake blocks are in line with the wheels, and that they have adequate clearance.



With the roof refitted (and secured with poly cement), the incorrect flat ventilator hoods can be instated with plastic card. Allow to harden overnight before tidying up the corners with a needle file.



The NEM brackets needed shimming with layers of plastic card to get them to the correct height. Double-sided tape was employed as a temporary adhesive while adjusting the positioning.



Test the coupling height with other items of rolling stock to ensure reliable operation. The mounts can also be mounted slightly inboard to reduce the amount of protrusion.



For durability, I replaced the Parkside kit's plastic brake cross shaft and actuating arm with thin wire, threaded through small holes drilled in the 'V' hangers and secured with cyano glue.



After an overnight rest for the solvent fumes to evaporate, the wagon could be cleaned up and primed. I'm a big fan of Mr Hobby's Mr Surfacer aerosol-based primers, as they leave a lovely smooth finish.



After painting, the wagon was numbered with waterslide decals, plus self-adhesive printed wagon posters. The latter were distressed slightly before fixing in place.

The refined Parkside underframe, weathered finish and authentic wagon poster and markings, creates an impressive - and economical - model.

SCENIC UPGRADES

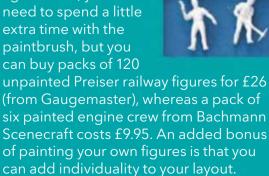
Master of the scene **Peter Marriott's** round-up of time and money-saving shortcuts.

TOTAL SCENIC SAVING: **£72.88!**

eople say that our hobby is becoming expensive, but there are ways to keep costs down. I tried to think about a few ways in which I'd managed to reduce my outlay when making scenery over the years, and here's what I came up with.

1 BUY UNPAINTED

All layouts need miniature people and wildlife, but you can save money here by buying unpainted figures. Yes, you'll need to spend a little extra time with the paintbrush, but you

2 GRAB A STARTER KIT

You can often save money with a starter set, rather than buying all the items individually. Take Peco's 'N' gauge Starter Set: it has an RRP of £61.00, yet it contains track and accessories worth £81.05. Numerous organisations offer scenic starter sets to help you create good looking scenery. These are particularly useful for techniques that you haven't yet mastered, such as static grass. Gaugemaster's GM196 (£9.95, www.gaugemaster.com) includes a 30g bag of static grass, puffer bottle and glue – which costs less than buying the parts separately. And if you get on with it, you can invest your money in more expensive static grass equipment.

3 BUY GLUE IN BULK

PVA glue is one of the staple tools of scenery making. Branded PVA, such as Unibond, can

PVA, such as Unibond, can be quite expensive (B&Q offers 0.25l for £4.86) but Hobbycraft has 1l for just £3. For our purposes, budget own-brand glue is just as good.

4 CHEAP FIX

How do you fix foliage on top of trees and hedges? Dedicated scenic spray glues can cost over £5 for a small bottle (£5.86 for a bottle of WS Scene-arama). Extra-hold hairspray does the job just as well. Go for supermarket own brands but choose the unscented variety.

5 THINK IN LAYERS



In terms of quality, scenic scatters have come on in leaps and bounds in recent years, but prices have gone up accordingly. However, by thinking of your scenery in terms of layers, you can save yourself a few pennies. Use a cheap, sawdust-based scatter for the base layer and then use - sparingly more expensive products on top to add detail. Alternatively, use a sawdust scatter towards the rear of a layout or beneath the trees in a wood, where it won't be immediately visible. Javis' Countryside Scenics Rough Pasture costs just £1.39 (www.modelscenerysupplies.co.uk) while a bag of Woodland Scenics Fine Earth Turf costs £3.40 (www.modelrailwaysdirect.co.uk).

6 'SALVAGE' SCENERY

A walk in your local woods or park will usually reveal a good selection of natural products that are perfect for scenery



construction, from soil to twigs. The latter are perfect for wagon loads: you can put together a log load for an OTA wagon for free, saving you the cost of a resin version (Hornby's R9701 has an RRP of £8.25). Just don't take lichen!

MOULD YOUR OWN

You can cast and shape rocks and cliff faces using dedicated products from the likes of Woodland Scenics and Noch. But go for a DIY plaster and you can save quite a bit of money. For example, Noch's Profi Casting Compound retails at £14.00 from Gaugemaster, but you can buy a 1.8kg box of Polyfilla from Amazon for just £6.64.

8 SAVE ON SAND

Sand is a really undervalued modelling material. I use it as a ground cover (sprinkled on wet PVA glue), whereas Chris Nevard likes to use it as track ballast. You can source it for free from a beach or you can order a 22kg bag from Amazon for just £13.39 - enough to ballast every layout you'll ever build!



9 MATCHPOT LUCK



Paint is one of those materials that we all need but, again, look beyond the hobby brands and you can find some good savings. For example, take the match pots of emulsion from DIY stores. B&Q sells a 0.05l pot of paint for 85p; compare that to Woodland Scenics' paint, which Goblin Gaming has on sale for £9.75 (www.goblingaming.co.uk). Match pots are available in every conceivable colour too!

Scenic saving: £8.90

10 FOAM ALTERNATIVES

Hard foam is an ideal material for making a miniature landscape. It's light, yet tough enough to form the foundation for the scenery. Woodland Scenics produces a range of foam pieces from which to make a layout, but it can cost over £20. As an alternative, save the expanded polystyrene in which appliances such as washing machines come packed, or head to your local B&Q and pick up some insulation board for as little as £2.29 per pack.

FOUR GREAT MONEY-SAVING TIPS

1 Don't throw away old trees just because they look a little tired. Fundamen-



tally sound trees and foliage can be rejuvenated with some Woodland Scenics Poly Fiber and foam scatter, fixed in place with hairspray.

2 Save scatters and ballasts that haven't stuck to the layout. Use a soft, wide paint brush to gather the excess into a

pile or - and this is probably more efficient - use a hand-held vacuum cleaner with a dedicated bag.

3 Use paintbrushes that are no longer suitable for painting to apply glue instead. Brushes you thought were dead will soon find a new lease of life!

Always check what you have before you buy more of something. I always tend to buy too much of a product, squirrel it away 'for future use'... and then end up buying more of the same thing after forgetting about the first lot I'd bought!

RECYCLING FREEBIES!

Most of us throw away packaging without a second thought. But even what we put in the recycling bin can be used to save money in our modelling. Cereal packets are a good source of thin card for scratchbuilding, and plastic pots can be used for mixing paint and plaster or holding paint cleaners. Need some coarse brown scatter? Keep used tea bags and leave them to dry!





Rubberised horsehair is used in upholstery but, like hanging basket liner material, it's a very traditional way of making hedges, foliage and patches of weeds. Although modern 'dedicated' products, such as Woodland Scenics Fine Foliage, or Poly Fiber, have arrived on the market, rubberised horsehair is still a very good alternative and, what's more, it's cheap and easy to use.

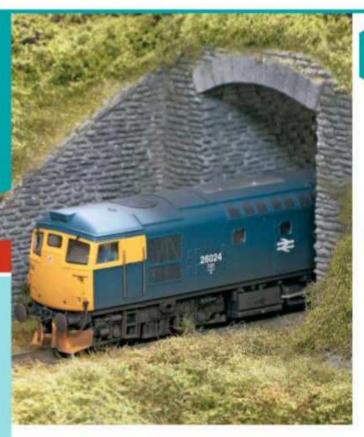

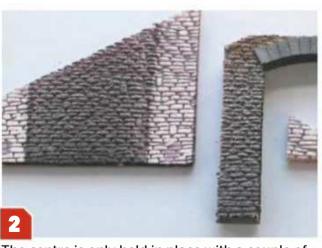


A quick browse of Gaugemaster's website reveals a multitude of 'OO' gauge tunnel portals. Aside from the very dated vac-formed Peco offering, I struggled to find any for under the £10 mark.

My spares box is quite extensive and in it I found a foam retaining wall from Czech company Merkur. I used a 10cm length to make my own tunnel portal. You can buy a 50cm length of Merkur retaining wall, with arches, from Sherwood Models Online for just £8.99 - but you can make more than one tunnel from it.



The Merkur foam retaining wall. Use a self-healing cutting board, sharp blade and steel rule to cut the wall section down to one 'aperture'. Remove the centre section.



The centre is only held in place with a couple of drops of glue. Cut the centre section to form the new wing walls.

Spread a bead of PVA adhesive along the line of where the hedge is to go, then push the trimmed horsehair piece into place.



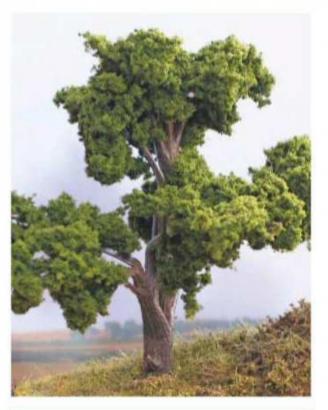
Either coat the horsehair with more PVA or give it a coat of hairspray before sprinkling on some suitably coloured flocks and scatters.

Project 3 Make cut-price trees

You can spend a fortune on trees - but you don't always have to. I bought a Woodland Scenics TR1101 pack, from which I made 36 trees of different sizes. I started a production line that enabled me to turn out a finished tree approximately every five minutes... and I reckon that each one ended up costing around 50p!



What you get: Woodland Scenics Realistic Tree Kit TR1101 contains 36 plastic armatures and three packs of foliage. You will need paint and some Hob-e-Tac adhesive.

Use plaster cloth to blend the tunnel portal into the new landscape. Dampen small pieces of cloth and lay them on top of each other. Leave to dry.



Give the portal a coat of grey acrylic paint. Then use Deluxe Materials Create & Shape to fill any small gaps between the wall and the portal. Blend in with greenery.



Cut off the plastic base with a sharp blade. It's unrealistic, so bin it. Bend and twist the tree armatures between your fingers into a realistic, three-dimensional shape. It takes just a minute per tree to do this.



Ensure that all of the glue is coated in foliage and shake off the excess material. Squeeze the foliage between your fingers to fix it to the adhesive. If there are any bare branches, brush a little more Hob-e-Tac onto them.



Brush on a little Hob-e-Tac and leave for about 15 minutes until the adhesive is clear and tacky. Fix together any pieces to be joined. Once the adhesive is clear, dip the deciduous tree armatures into the mixed foliage.



Wait 15 minutes for the glue to go tacky and then push the foliage onto the adhesive again. When you're happy with how the tree looks, spray the entire tree with Woodland Scenics Cement or hairspray to fix it in place.



HOW TO

RESTORE A HORNB

Chris Leigh transforms a childhood favourite that's in desperate need of renovation.

t last! It may have taken me 60 years but I've finally got my hands on the Hornby-Dublo plastic suburban station kit. It's tempted me ever since I saw the 1959 Dublo catalogue, but now they're rather rare and a mint one can change hands for £300 and upwards. I found mine for £50 but, as you might imagine, it's less than mint!

All the Dublo plastic models suffer from the fact that, as screw-together kits, the doors and windows were separate parts and they

tend to be missing from second-hand examples. Replacements are easy enough to make from styrene sheet and strip, so the odd missing component need not be a deterrent.

Mine had a hairline crack (about an inch long) in the roof but it was easily fixed with some EMA Plastic Weld. It was also lacking a couple of windows and one door. Any missing nuts and bolts can be replaced with suitably sized alternatives from a DIY store such as B&Q.

For £50, I've got a station that's comparable in price to a contemporary resin model. Finishing touches include posters and signs from Scalescenes SO7 BR corporate image era (Scalescenes.com) but the buildings would suit the earlier post-war period, too.



The station is screwed together. Loosening the screws enables the walls to be removed, making spray-painting easier. The walls are also attached to the platform with screws. Set all screws, nuts and washers aside for re-use.



It is likely that the model will have been stored for a long time and will need a wash to remove dirt and finger marks. I scrubbed all the larger parts, rinsed them and left them to dry.

DID YOU KNOW?

The white platform edge was a wartime black-out measure which has continued ever since. The lining was supposed to stop within 1ft of the top of the ramps so that passengers did not alight onto the ramp by mistake.

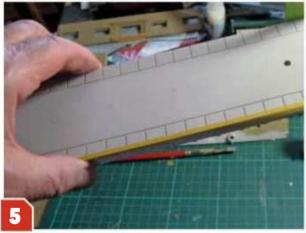

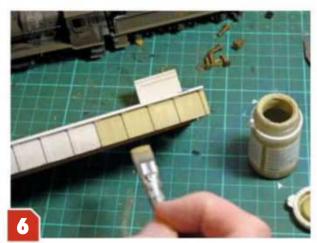
I also had an island platform, which is of a clip-fit construction. I started by spraying the roof of the island platform shelter and the main building with dark grey primer.



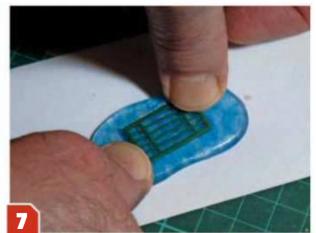
I sprayed the platform sections with white primer. When it was dry I masked a 3mm wide strip along the platform edge. This strip should not extend more than a few millimetres down the slopes.



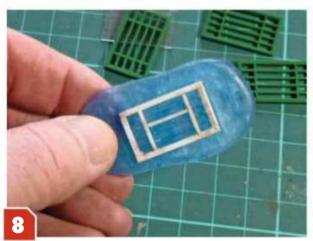
With the platform edge and the fence panels masked off, I sprayed the platform surface with grey primer and then misted it with white primer and matt black to create an asphalt effect.



I used RailMatch acrylic concrete colour for all the vertical surfaces, the platform front and walls, applying it with a broad, flat brush and keeping the brush strokes vertical. Two coats were needed over the white primer.



I used Blue Stuff (www.greenstuffworld.com) to help make a new window frame. Heat the Blue Stuff in a mug of water for 3½ minutes in a microwave and press the window into it.



Sadly, my cast windows were too fragile. However, I used the mould as a jig in which to build window frames out of styrene strip. I simplified the glazing bars, which I think improves the realism.





HOW TO

MODEL TYNESIDE ELECTRICS

Ken Newton creates an NER electric unit from old Hornby Mk 1s.

y native Tyneside had, from 1904 until 1967, a 600V DC third-rail suburban network, much of which now forms part of the Tyne & Wear Metro system, albeit now energised to 1,500V DC via overhead lines.

Bachmann's excellent '2-EPB' EMU (and Class 419 'MLV') allows the prospective Tyneside electric modeller to recreate the South Shields branch between 1955 and 1963, when these new units replaced the vintage North Eastern Railway stock. For the Northern Coast loop and Riverside branch, it's a different matter. These lines had, from 1937, a fleet of four different types of Metro-Cammell articulated EMUs.

I fancied modelling the northern loop of the Tyneside system by building three twin-car units. A pair of Type B



Metro-Cammell 1937/8 articulated twin coach units (E29114E/E29314E and E29126E/E29326E) would be complemented by a Type A unit (E29105E/E29305E). There are no suitable kits available so I had to source something suitable.

Hornby's older range of BR Mk 1s seemed the most viable option, so I bought seven of them second-hand. A set of scale drawings was produced, based on prototype information and photographs, which helped in the creation of templates to ease the cutting and shaping of window and door apertures.

Hornby's X6575 self-contained motor bogie, from the '2-BIL'/'2-HAL' EMUs,

provided the perfect traction option, being available separately for around £30, complete with bogie frames and power collector shoe.

I decided to motorise the Type B EMUs only, as the motor bogie could be hidden inside the luggage area. The Type A unit is unpowered, but it does feature power collection to work the lighting circuitry, and it can be coupled to a powered twin set to form a four-car unit.

I think that my articulated twin set EMUs, although not 100% exact in detail and scale, complement the Bachmann '2-EPB' and 'MLV' nicely and help to recreate the Tyneside of my youth. My models will certainly remain in service until a more accurate kit or, perhaps, a ready-to-run model is produced.







Factfile: Metro-Cammell articulated twin-car EMUs

After the original 1904 NER stock was renovated in the mid-1930s, these vehicles moved to the newly electrified South Tyneside suburban line through Gateshead and Tyne Dock. New stock was thus ordered for the lines to the north of the Tyne, with 64 twin-car sets being ordered from Metro-Cammell.

Four different vehicle types were constructed, Types A, B, C and D (see panel), with just one vehicle in each twin-set featuring a motor bogie. The central bogie

was of the Gresley pattern, while the outer units were of the pre-grouping Fox type. Only one vehicle in each twin unit featured a motor bogie, the other being a trailer.

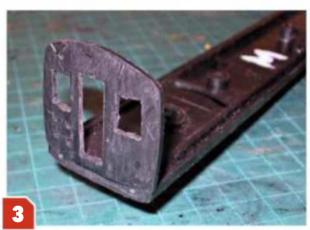
All coaches featured bucket seats and manually operated sliding doors (with double-width doors in the guard's compartment) and each end was adorned by a four-light route indicator matrix. They remained in traffic until the end of third rail electric services in the North East, in June 1967.

I found that Hornby's older Mk 1 coaches (that date back to Tri-ang days) offered a suitable base for the Metro-Cammell EMU vehicles. A batch of seven coaches was purchased second-hand and dismantled.



The coach ends had the moulded detail filed away before the template was used to mark out the locations for each aperture. After drilling and cutting away the waste, I used files to take care of the final shaping.



A thick plastic template was created as a guide for cutting the window and door apertures in the outer ends of each vehicle, as well as the locations for the four headcode lamps.



Hornby's X6575 power bogie is a smoothrunning, self-contained unit and comes complete with side frames, collector shoe mouldings and a top-mounting clip.

The Mk 1 chassis were shortened to 228mm in length. This gives a scale 57ft, which is 1ft 3in oversized, but allows for the existing bogie mounting holes to be retained.



The section of the carriage underframe that was cut out to house the motor bogie was refitted, using scraps of plastic as mounting brackets. The Hornby bogie simply clips into the existing mounting hole.



The Hornby Mk 1 bogies were modified, with Bachmann DMU couplings installed. The trailing bogies were adapted to electrical collection using copper-clad strip and brass wire.



To act as bogie pivot points, scrap plastic kit sprues were filed to a round profile and drilled to allow cables to pass through. The plastic shaft was then tapped to take a mounting nut and washer.

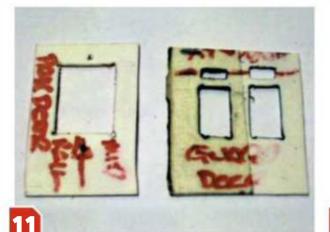


The centre articulated bogie was sourced from a Bachmann Thompson coach, modified with scrap plastic sheet and rod to form a pair of dowels, shaped to enable a loose fit into the chassis' bogie mounting holes.

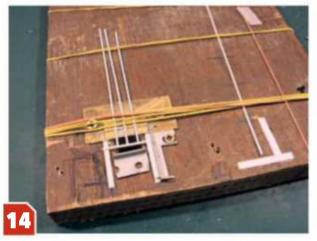


Using my sketch plans, the coach sides were marked out and cut to reflect the new window layout. Additional vertical window pillars were formed from Evergreen 1mm by 2mm and 1mm by 4mm styrene strip.





More templates were created to assist with the cutting of passenger and guard's compartment doors. Templates help to achieve more consistent results when multiple identical parts are required.



To replicate the top windows, a simple jig was improvised from brass and plastic - on a plywood base - to allow 1mm by 1mm plastic strip to be bonded quickly and accurately.



12 The new doors were cut from 1mm thick styrene sheet, using the templates as a guide. The final shaping was effected with needle files. Evergreen 1mm by 2mm styrene strip formed

the central glazing bar of the passenger door.



of each window opening, they were glued into position.





Seating was made out of sections of the Hornby Mk 1 interior mouldings, with extra partitions made out of plastic card. The interiors were then painted in appropriate colours.



Thicker sheet plastic is used to form the inner carriage ends, with extra layers added behind the central gangway door apertures. Fix with Plastic Weld cement and leave overnight before tidying up the corner joints.



Plastic Weld poly cement was used to join the plastic body sections together, creating a sturdy construction. The same adhesive also allowed the coach sides to be bonded securely to the chassis.



After a thorough test run to iron out any mechanical or electrical issues, the bodyshells and roofs were primed and painted. RailMatch BR Multiple Unit Green (later version) was applied via an aerosol can.

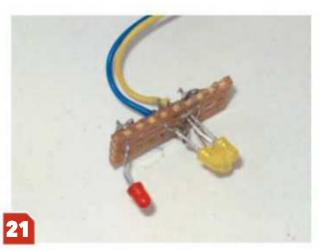

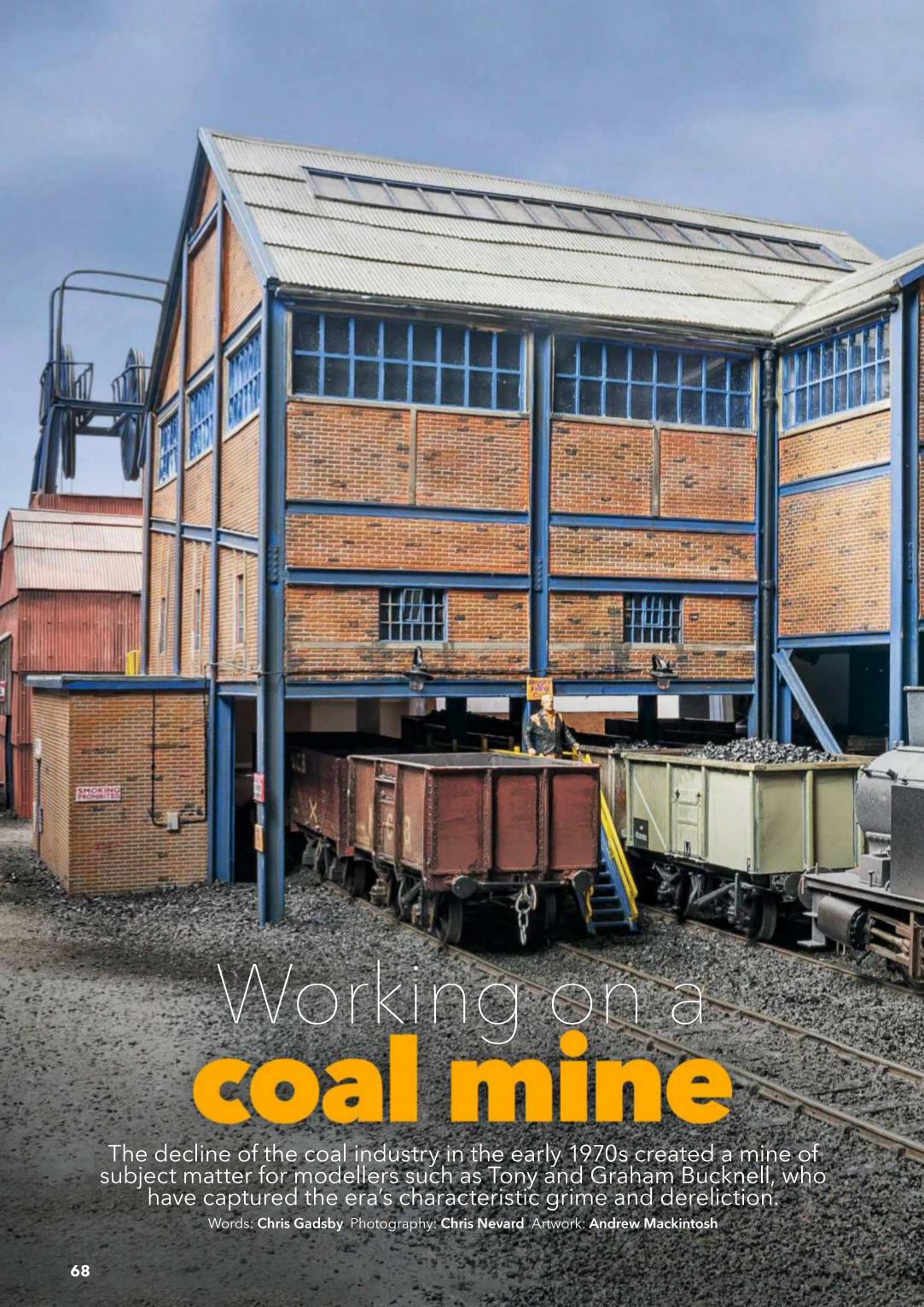
Clear plastic glazing was installed before HMRS Pressfix transfers were applied, using masking tape as a guide. Note the wires from the inner end that transmit power from the trailing bogie to the motor and lighting circuit.



12V yellow and red LEDs represent the head and tail lamps. The diodes were installed in opposite polarities, so that the appropriate head and tail lights illuminate, according to the direction in which the train is running.



Destination blinds were printed using 8pt Arial (Narrow) typeface. The sheet was covered in wide Sellotape before the individual destinations were cut out and fixed to the outside of the cab ends.

outh Yorkshire. Durham and Northumberland. South Wales. Those are probably the first places that would spring to mind when we're asked to think about the British coal industry.

But Scotland had a huge coalfield, stretching from Ayrshire in the west right the up to the Fife Coast in the east. It formed a large and important part of the National Coal Board empire and yet, in 1958, the NCB announced that 36 of its pits would close. Twenty of these were in Scotland. That was just the start of even greater downward spiral.

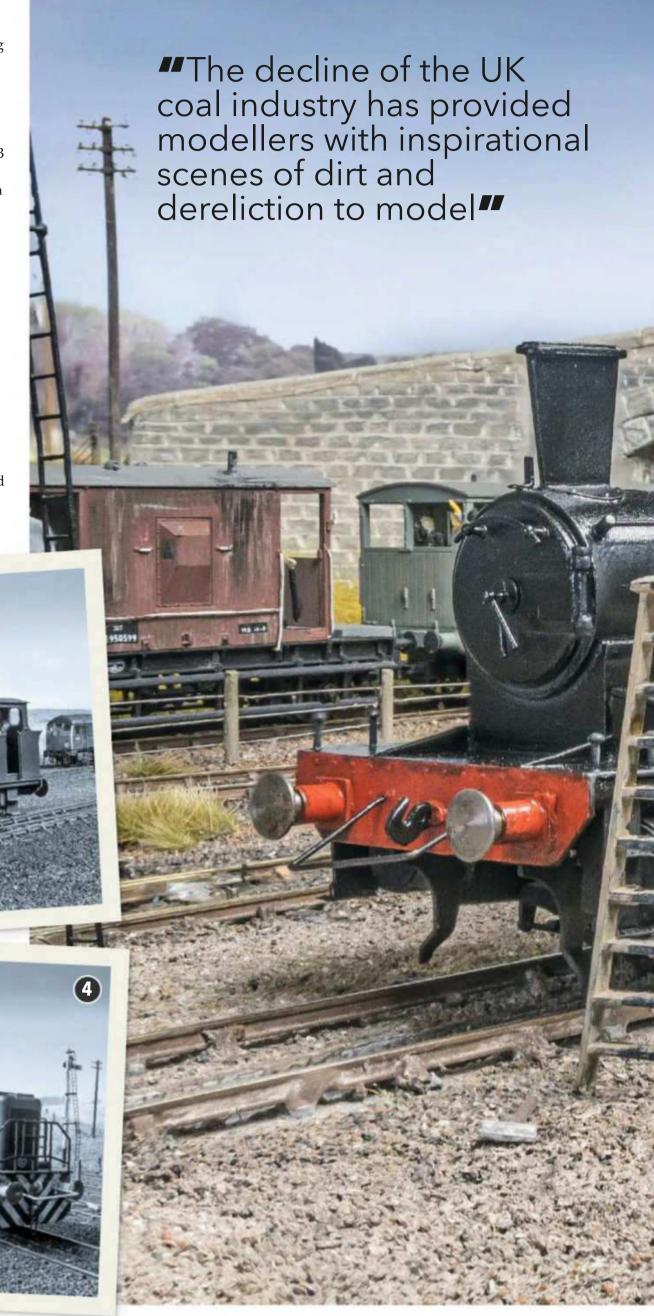
DISHING THE DIRT

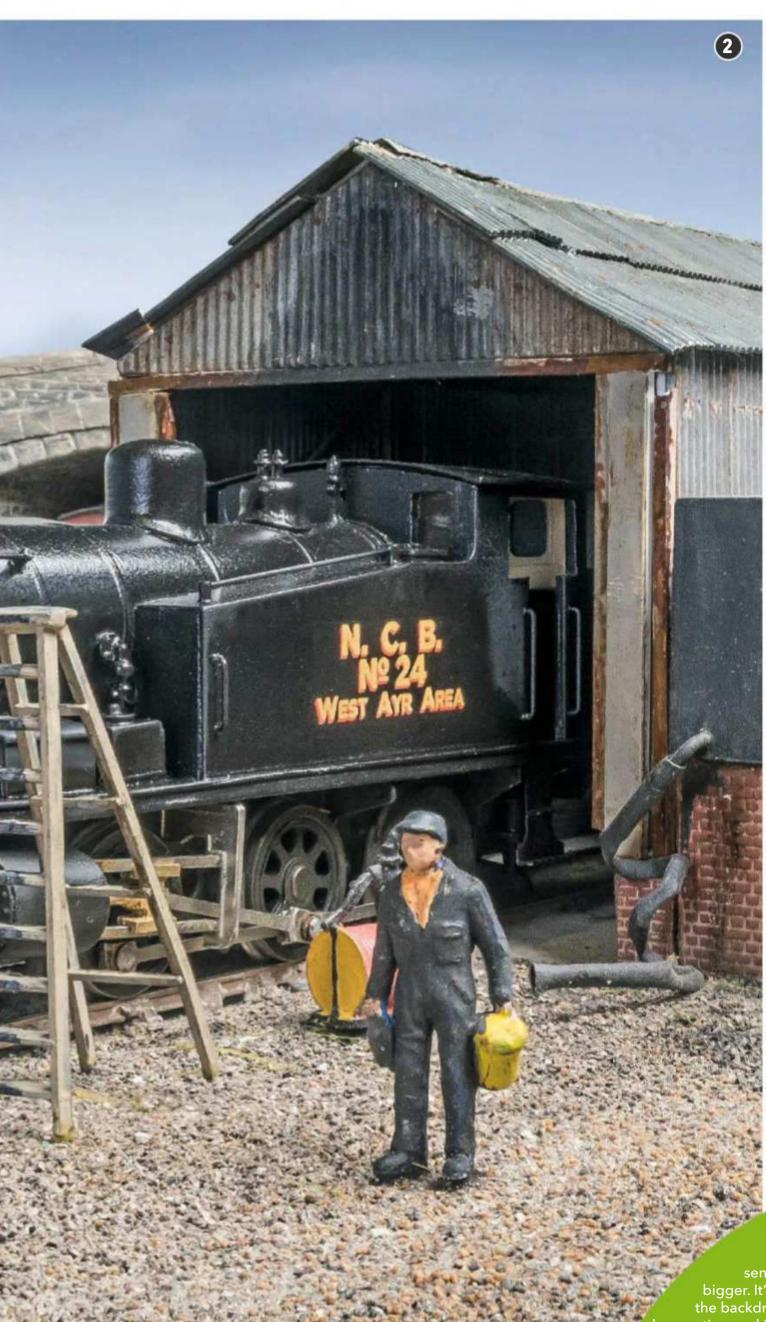
The decline of the UK coal industry has provided modellers with inspirational scenes of dirt and dereliction to model. These scenes of decay are complemented by the fact that NCB steam outlasted steam on BR. That led to intriguing scenes of run-down steam engines rubbing shoulders with green and blue diesels.

This fascinating period in British industrial history caught the imagination of father and son modelling team Tony and Graham Bucknell.

"In creating my previous layouts and helping with other Rochdale MRG layouts, including my dad's layout 'Eskmuir' [MR201], I realised I wanted to build something with an industrial theme," says Graham.

This new project would also give Graham the opportunity to explore the world of





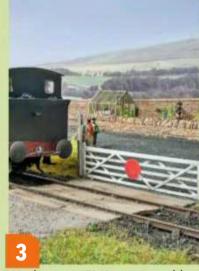

What makes this layout great?

It's a small layout but you get the sense that it is part of something much bigger. It's easy to imagine the hills that form the backdrop continuing for miles, with a lone locomotive working its way through the countryside.

18mm gauge 'EM' –a challenge he took with relish.

Graham says: "With encouragement and support from both the Rochdale MRG and Risborough & District MRC, I launched myself into 'EM' gauge with 'Kirkmellington'."

A change in personal circumstances meant that the project had to be mothballed for a few years, but work re-started with help from Graham's dad Tony. 'Kirkmellington' is now on the exhibition circuit, showing audiences around the country what life was like in a 1960s Scottish coal mine.

'Kirkmellington' represents a small Ayrshire colliery. NCB internal rail systems would always connect with BR somewhere and 'Kirkmellington' is no exception. Its railway connects to a single track branch from the Glasgow

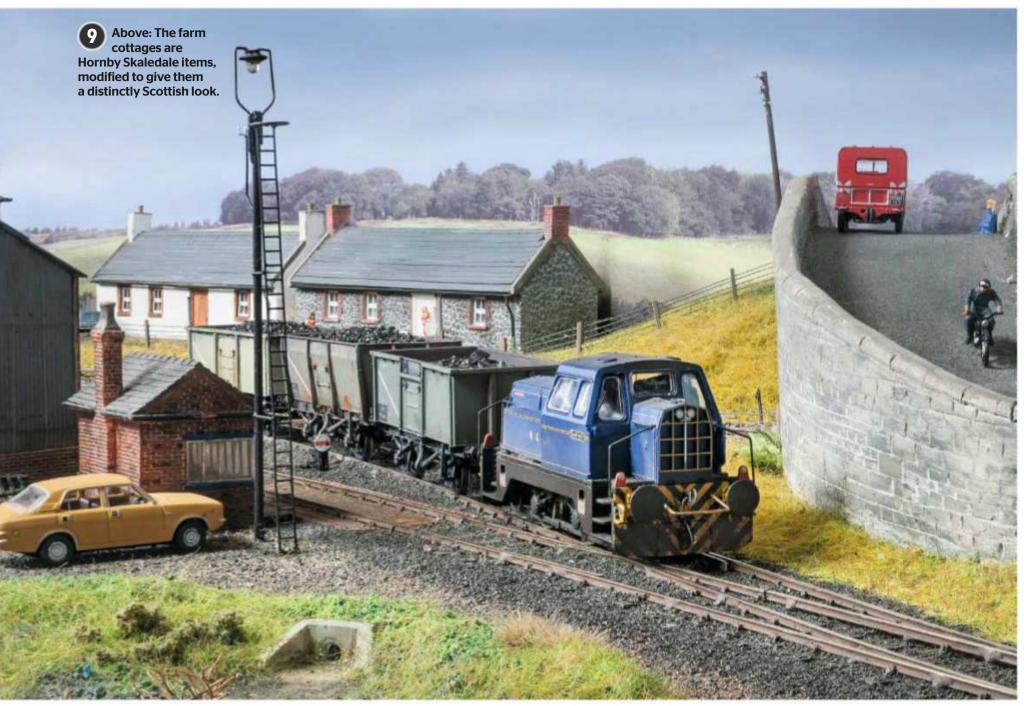
& South Western Railway's Carlisle-Kilmarnock main line.

"We wanted it to fit inside a family car," says Graham, "and the track plan we eventually settled on was the best compromise, given the space available to us. To maintain operational interest we added a through branch line and three exchange sidings to the colliery, with a headshunt that leads to the internal NCB network."

One of the challenges with modelling in 'EM' is the track. Graham and Tony used SMP Scaleway flexitrack with hand-built points. It was, Graham recalls, a fairly painless process.

"Careful checking of gauge and level at an early stage meant we only had to make minor adjustments later in the process, and the layout is pretty reliable."

COMPACT COLLIERIES

'Kirkmellington' is set in the 1969-1973 period, which allows Graham and Tony to model the intriguing mix of NCB steam and diesel alongside BR diesels. NCB wagons at this period were just as fascinating, as modern steel-bodied wagons worked alongside vehicles of a considerably older vintage!

Out on the main line, coal traffic from the Ayrshire pits was in the hands of BR Type 1s and Type 2s. Graham and Tony use ready-to-run models but, as they've modelled in 'EM', these models require new wheels to be fitted.

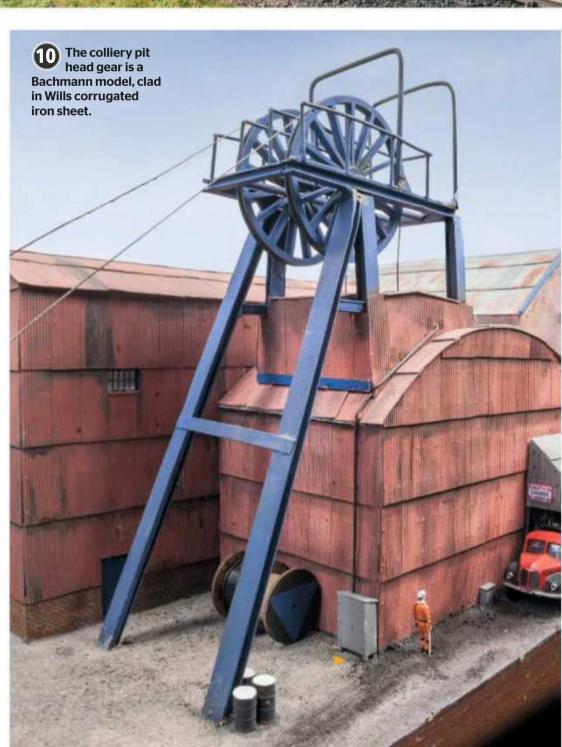
"Most have been converted using Ultrascale wheelsets," Graham says. "The quality of the basic models does allow us to re-gauge the factory-fitted wheelsets and achieve reliable operation.

"All of the locomotives are renumbered, detailed and weathered to match prototype photographs. They are all fitted with Loksound V4 or Zimo sound decoders."

CUSTOM-BUILT

The biggest challenge when it comes to modelling a colliery is creating believable buildings. Both Bachmann and Hornby offered colliery buildings when they launched their Scenecraft and Skaledale ranges respectively. These arguably better suited small, rural collieries rather than the huge industrial installations in key coal fields.

Graham and Tony cleverly combined Bachmann resin items with scratchbuilt structures, built using inspiration and guidance from archive photographs and drawings in Rob Johnson's Modelling Aspects of the Coal Industry.



The loading screens were built from SE Finecast styrene sheet laminated together to form rigid panels and Plastruct girders. They are fitted with custom laser-cut windows from York Modelmaking with some opening windows from TrueTexture. Each building is hand-painted with acrylics and weathered. The winding house is a Bachmann model and the chimney is from Walthers.

"'Kirkmellington' is set in GSWR territory, so we needed some signature buildings," Graham says. "The signalbox was the most obvious way of 'placing' the layout. After much research and a trip to Ayrshire, we settled on Holywood, as it's small and distinctive. Construction was done using South Eastern Finecast embossed plastic sheets, with brass sections for the walkway brackets. An interior detailing kit has been added for those with good eyesight."

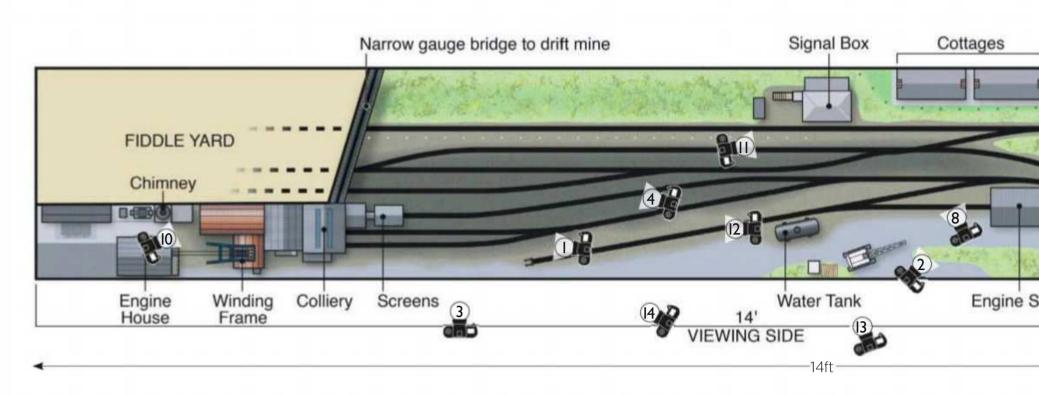
Graham and Tony have thoroughly enjoyed their first foray into finescale modelling and have every right to be pleased with the result.

"It's given us a host of new skills and ideas," Graham says. "We have been lucky to have the support and camaraderie of the Rochdale MRG and the Risborough & District MRC. They showed us that it's possible to create a finescale model that both looks good and runs reliably."

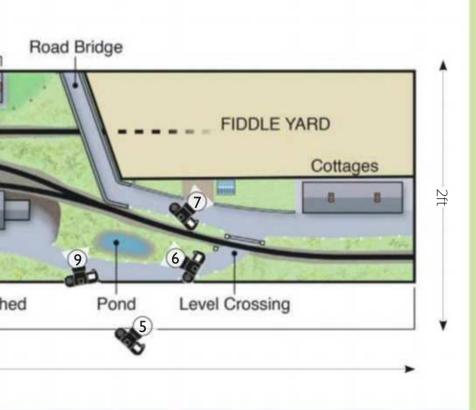

HOW CAN I MODEL MERSEY EMUs?

My 'OO' layout is set in the Chester area, circa 1990, and I'd love to incorporate part of the Merseyrail third-rail network. Are there any decent kits for the Class 507/508 EMUs?

George says: I'd also like to model part of the Mersey electrified lines but have been discouraged thus far by the lack of suitable models, in kit or RTR form.

The once-infamous MTK range boasted a fairly decent kit for the Class 507/508, rendered in etched and cast metal, but this is not currently available from the range's new owners, No Nonsense Kits. Un-built examples do surface at shows and on internet auction sites from time to time, though.

The other option for 'OO' is a resin-cast kit from Ayjay Models. Like other EMU kits in this range, the castings are a little rough and ready, with lots of remedial work necessary in order to achieve a high-quality model. Indeed, the amount of potential labour makes one wonder whether scratchbuilding would be a more productive and economical choice.

I may have seen 3D-printed bodyshells for the '507s' and '508s' on offer a while back, but a recent trawl around the web has drawn a blank.

It's a great shame that there aren't more options available, especially as the Merseyrail units share many similarities with other BR-built EMU types, that would be of interest to modellers of more southerly locations.

Incidentally, there have been a couple of good kits for the Class 502s, the predecessors of the '507s' and '508s', with ETraction Kits' offering being the most recent.



WHEN ARE STAY ALIVE DECODERS WORTH FITTING?

I've started to build a 4mm finescale layout with DCC in mind, but I'm unsure of the benefits of Stay Alive decoders on a very small fiddleyard-to-terminus layout. Will there be enough power stored in the five-metre run to make it worthwhile fitting such capacitors?

George says: Digital decoders, with a Stay Alive facility, work by storing up power from the tracks without impairing the performance of the locomotive. This reserve of energy is called upon whenever the power to the decoder is interrupted, most commonly when a locomotive stalls over point and crossing frogs, baseboard joints or areas of dirty track. As soon as the power flow is restored, the Stay Alive capacitors recharge themselves ready for the next interruption.

The size of the layout is not such an issue as, with DCC control, all of the rails are energised at all times, so the Stay Alive circuitry should remain fully charged until such time as the 'emergency supply' is required.

A Stay Alive facility is especially useful for short-wheelbase locomotives which, even with finescale, live frog points, can struggle with consistent power collection. An uninterrupted power supply is

even more essential when digital sound is involved. Even the slightest hiccup in the power flow can create havoc with the sound output.



WHERE ARE THE CATTLE GRIDS?



Despite many layouts featuring rural and farming scenes, I've rarely seen any cattle grids installed. Are miniature versions

available, or is it a case of scratchbuilding?

George says: Cattle - or stock - grids are thought to have originated in the USA. They're intended to replace gates where a road or track crosses a fenced or walled boundary of grazing land. The use of cattle grids only proliferated in the UK from the 1950s onwards, as rural road networks were belatedly developed.

Irish railway specialist Studio Scale Models offers an excellent 4mm scale etched metal cattle grid. Priced at €3.00 each, they're great value and really look the part. They can be easily trimmed, if desired, using a sharp pair of scissors or metal snips.

The simplest option is to lay the grid directly onto the road surface. However, there should be a shallow void beneath the grid to discourage errant animals

from walking across the boundary.

Cutting a recess slightly smaller than the grid makes for greater realism and, as I often employ DAS clay for road building, it's easy to cut out a suitable rectangle before the clay dries out. The waste is then peeled away and reused elsewhere.

Don't forget to include a gate adjacent to the grid for the use of pedestrians, especially on public highways. These gates often have to be wide enough to accommodate horse traffic too.

Tip of the month

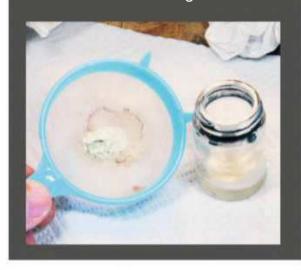
Simple, reusable paint filters

Jars of enamel and acrylic paints, once they've been opened and closed a few times, are prone to the formation of crusty deposits around the rims. These impurities are likely to clog an airbrush or create a lumpy finish when applying by hand.



Paint filters are available but, due to their disposable nature, they can be expensive. A cheaper alternative is provided by a small tea strainer.

After shaking and/or stirring the paint, pour it through the strainer into a separate mixing jar. Any film or solid deposits will be intercepted by the gauze, which can be cleaned and reused many times. Metal strainers with a fine mesh are the best as they can withstand being cleaned with solvents. An old pair of tights can also be effective as a straining medium.

<u>Technique of the month</u>

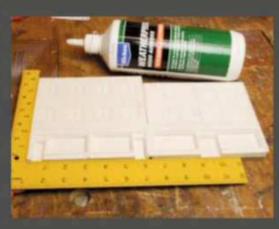
Joining plaster-cast buildings

George says: I'm a big fan of plastercast buildings and scenic accessories, as they're easy to work with, especially in terms of painting and weathering. They also remind me of the great fun I had as a kid with packs of Linka moulds (anyone remember them?).

However, joining sections of buildings, especially low-relief structures, often results in large, uneven gaps. These are simple to remedy with DIY filler. Instead of fixing low-relief buildings direct to the backscene, I prefer to fix them to sheets of MDF or plywood, which makes them easier to remove in future.



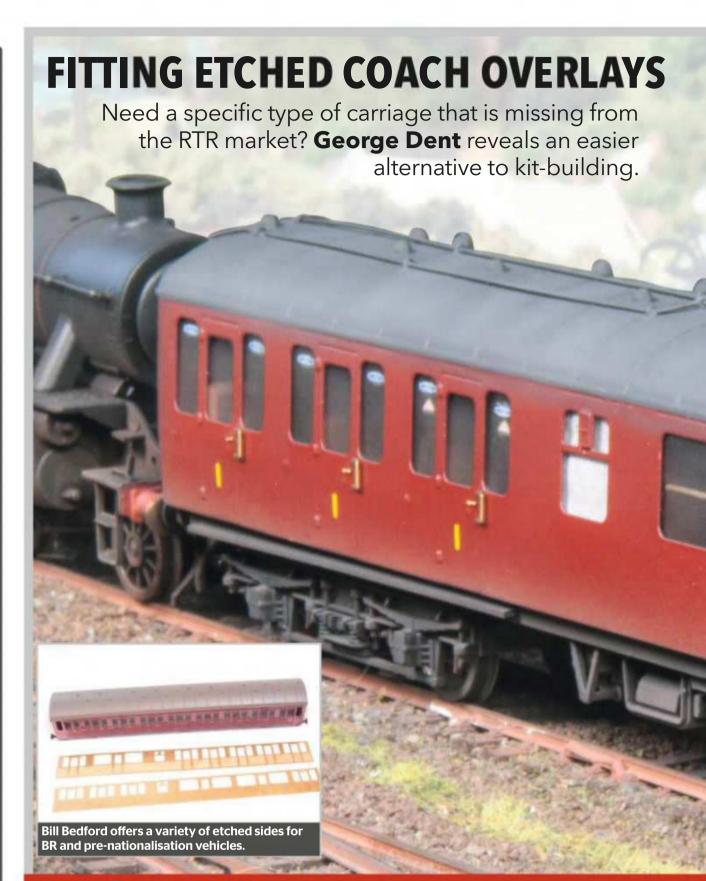
An offcut of MDF has been measured against the various sections of low-relief buildings. It was then cut so that it sits just within the outer edges, thus being invisible from the front.



Fix the plaster building sections to the backing material with PVA glue. Use a set square to ensure that everything is properly aligned - don't rely on the edges of the castings to be straight and true.



Once the glue has cured, fill gaps with household filler. When this has also dried, tidy up with sandpaper and re-scribe the mortar courses with a nail.





Begin by flattening the outer faces of each side, removing all raised projections such as handrails, hinges and door handles. A broad file will do the job, followed by wide sanding sticks to leave a flat, smooth surface.



Use a stout knife and straightedge, or a cutting disc in a mini drill, to cut slots in each side, using the overlays as a guide as to how much of the plastic needs to be removed. Tidy the cut edges with files and abrasives.

While the choice of RTR coaching stock, especially in 'OO' gauge, is better than ever, there are still 'gaps' to be filled. Specific types of catering cars are a good example, especially within the BR Mk 1 range.

A number of important pre-nationalisation designs also remain missing from mainstream product ranges.

In some cases, the elusive vehicles may have been built in small numbers - hence why RTR makers have steered clear - yet they may be integral to the accurate re-creation of key passenger services to suit your layout's era and location.

Kit-building is a possible solution, but not everyone fancies the idea of constructing a carriage from the ground up. Indeed, the assembly of many coach kits demands a certain degree of skill, not least with a soldering iron.

The other option is to employ etched brass overlays atop an existing RTR model. There are plenty of overlays to choose from, with the likes of Comet, MJT, Bill Bedford and Hurst Models offering all sorts of options to suit pre-Grouping, 'Big Four' and nationalisation eras. There are even some packs that cater for modern-day prototypes, such as the various Network Rail test train vehicles.

Illustrated here is a BR Mk 1 non-gangwayed lavatory composite coach, based on

a Bachmann model. The etched brass overlays are from the Bill Bedford range and installation is a straightforward affair. Flattening the model's sides of all raised detail is essential, followed by cutting long slots to give clearance for the new window apertures, as well as allowing space into which the new glazing material - clear plastic sheet - can be fixed.

Forming the curved profile on the new sides is aided by half-etched grooves on the inside face. Fixing is best achieved with epoxy adhesive and plenty of clamps (wooden clothes pegs will suffice).

Once the sides are in place, smaller details can be installed, such as hinges and door handles. Roof vents may need rearranging, as will the interior, with plenty of suitable components available from Bill Bedford, Comet and Dart Castings

The etched metal overlays will likely require the formation of a curved profile. Lie the parts face down on layers of tissue paper and, with a metal rod, gently roll over the inner face until the metal begins to curve.



Test-fit the overlays until the correct profile is achieved. When you're happy, apply epoxy glue and clamp one overlay in place, checking for accurate alignment. Set aside to cure fully for 24 hours.



Fix the other side and, when that too is dry, tidy up the surface with abrasives. A light coat of grey primer reveals where filler is required. Affix small details, like hinges, with clear acrylic varnish.

ADDING REAL COAL TO POWERED TENDERS

l'm detailing an old tenderdrive Hornby 'A3' and want to add a load of real coal chippings to the bunker. But the moulded coal is rendered so full that adding more on top is likely to put the model 'out of gauge'! Any ideas? Jon Maguire, by e-mail

George says: On many 'OO' gauge tender-driven steam locomotives, the coal is moulded in such a way as to allow maximum clearance for the mechanism within. Altering this is not easy and it's often impossible to render much in the way of interior detail to the bunker.

However, we can lower the level of the coal slightly by cutting out the moulded rendition and adding a false floor just below the surface. A sheet of plastic card will suffice and it may have to be shaped slightly to clear the top of the motor, especially for Hornby models featuring the bulky Ringfield mechanism.

Care is needed when cutting out the moulded 'coal', using a drill to remove most of the waste. Work well away from the edge of the tender and, after cutting away the bulk of unwanted plastic, files can be employed to work back towards the edges for a safer and neater job.

Fettle a sheet of plastic card (30 thou's hould be strong enough) to give a nice snug fit inside the tender opening and check that there's still enough room for the motor. Strips of tape will hold the plastic in position while the body is placed back onto the chassis.

If the fit is too tight, remove the plastic and, after dipping it in hot water, form it into a slightly curved profile to give a few precious millimetres of clearance, as required. Once the plastic has cooled it should retain its new profile.

Re-fit the plastic and re-check the amount of clearance, repeating the process until you're happy. Remember to leave at least a few millimetres between the plastic and the motor to avoid any issues of distortion as the motor heats up during operation.

Even after adding a plastic 'floor', onto which the real coal chippings will be laid, it's best to add the coal - and the adhesive - before the tender body is re-fitted to the chassis. The last thing we want is watery glue seeping through any gaps onto the motor, electrics and gears. Allow a week for the glue to harden completely before reassembly.

Having spread the real coal chippings over the false bunker floor, dilute PVA glue can be applied via a syringe and pinpoint applicator. Masking tape prevents stains on the pristine bodywork.





Remove the tender body from the chassis and, with a sharp 3mm drill bit, cut a series of holes around the perimeter. Work inboard of the edges to avoid damaging the bodywork. A hand drill is preferable to a power drill.



A stout knife will remove the bulk of the waste before files and abrasives are used to work the plastic back to the edges of the bunker. A curved file is also needed to suit the front profile on this 'A4' tender.



Having test-fitted a plastic card fillet, ensuring adequate clearance for the mechanism, it can be bonded to the interior with a strong glue, such as Slater's Mek-Pak.



As the coal chippings will have to be spread thinly over the false bunker floor, it pays to paint the plastic black to prevent it being visible between the chippings.



MORE TROUBLE WITH BUBBLE WRAP

Nick Richardson says: In MR249, George Dent described how bubble wrap had damaged the paintwork of a carriage that had been carefully packed away. I've had similar issues, albeit not with plastic models, but with lithographed tinplate.

Over the past 25 years, I've been amassing a collection of pre-war American Lionel, Marx and American Flyer 'O' gauge tinplate and I had always thought it funny that they always came wrapped in old newspaper, even those shipped from the US. At first I thought that it was a cost-saving measure but there was more to it than economy.

There is one Lionel Service Station in the UK - Tennent's Trains of Halesowen - and although John Tennent has sold the business he is still a source of good advice. It seems that the gas inside the bubble wrap has a tendency to 'leach' out over time.

Unfortunately, a Lionel tinplate 'Babe Ruth' boxcar from the 1930s, that had been stored in bubble wrap, suffered a similar fate to George's models, with a series of round 'spots' left across both sides of the

lithographed finish. In fact, it was so bad that it's probably beyond redemption, which was a real pity as it was one of the first items I bought. Once I realised that bubble wrap was the culprit, I went to my local stationery store and bought a pack of acid-free tissue paper. Wherever possible, all of my tinplate items are now wrapped in this tissue paper, followed by a sheet or two of old newspaper and then, if needed, bubble wrap.

The items have always been well packed, as my professional career meant that I moved around a great deal; this approach seems to have worked.

My 'OO' RTR and kit-built stock is all stored in plastic boxes using bubble wrap. Indeed, my friend Steve Jones ('Sydney Gardens', 'Seend' and 'Chilcompton') has successfully stored all of his stock in bubble wrap for many years without any ill effects.

This, perhaps, confirms George's assertion that the problem of surface damage by bubble wrap is linked to the use of certain types of lacquers/clear coats employed during the painting of RTR and kit-built stock.

Tool of the month

Draw white lines with ease

We often resort to waterslide decals when adding white stripes and other markings to freight wagons, however these can often appear too 'perfect', especially on weathered and distressed vehicles.

Painting the stripes by hand is possible but demands a very fine brush and a steady hand.

An easier option is to use a white ink pen, either freehand or against a straightedge. A gel-type pen is best, as the ink is opaque enough to show up on dark surfaces and thick enough not to run or smudge easily.

These pens are also handy for picking out smaller details on rolling stock, such as brake handles and handrails, saving the hassle of using a paintbrush. Finer tipped pens can also be used for adding numbers and other markings, especially on large-scale models.

DON'T FORGET TO INSPECT YOUR ELECTRICS

Chris Leigh says: It's popular to deride health and safety, but complacency can be dangerous. Where mains electricity is concerned, prevention is much better than cure

Our railway rooms or workshops may have a number of electrical appliances, apart from the transformer/controller for the layout itself. We may also have a work light or two, perhaps a fan heater and a soldering iron. Such devices require a power outlet and it's very easy to fall into the habit of adding another multi-way plug or extension lead.

Once such things are installed under a layout they tend to be forgotten about. If this sounds like your railway room, it's worth having an inspection now and then, just to check that nothing has deteriorated over time. If you've had your layout for 20

years it may well be that some of your electric cables are 20 years old.

The plug and cable in this picture (right) were part of an extension lead providing power to a PA system and electric piano in a local church. Nobody could remember when it was installed, how long it had been there or when it had last been checked. It has clearly been overheating and the insulation has melted, or is completely missing. It was dangerous to anyone who touched it and presented a fire risk. Fortunately, for much of the week, the power was switched off at a master switch.

In this hobby we think nothing of using controllers that we've owned for decades. We have layouts that have taken many years to build and the electrics may have been fine when they were installed. Time may have taken its toll and we may have sockets



and plugs which are not easily accessible. These are the ones where a problem such as my melted cable can go undetected for a long time.

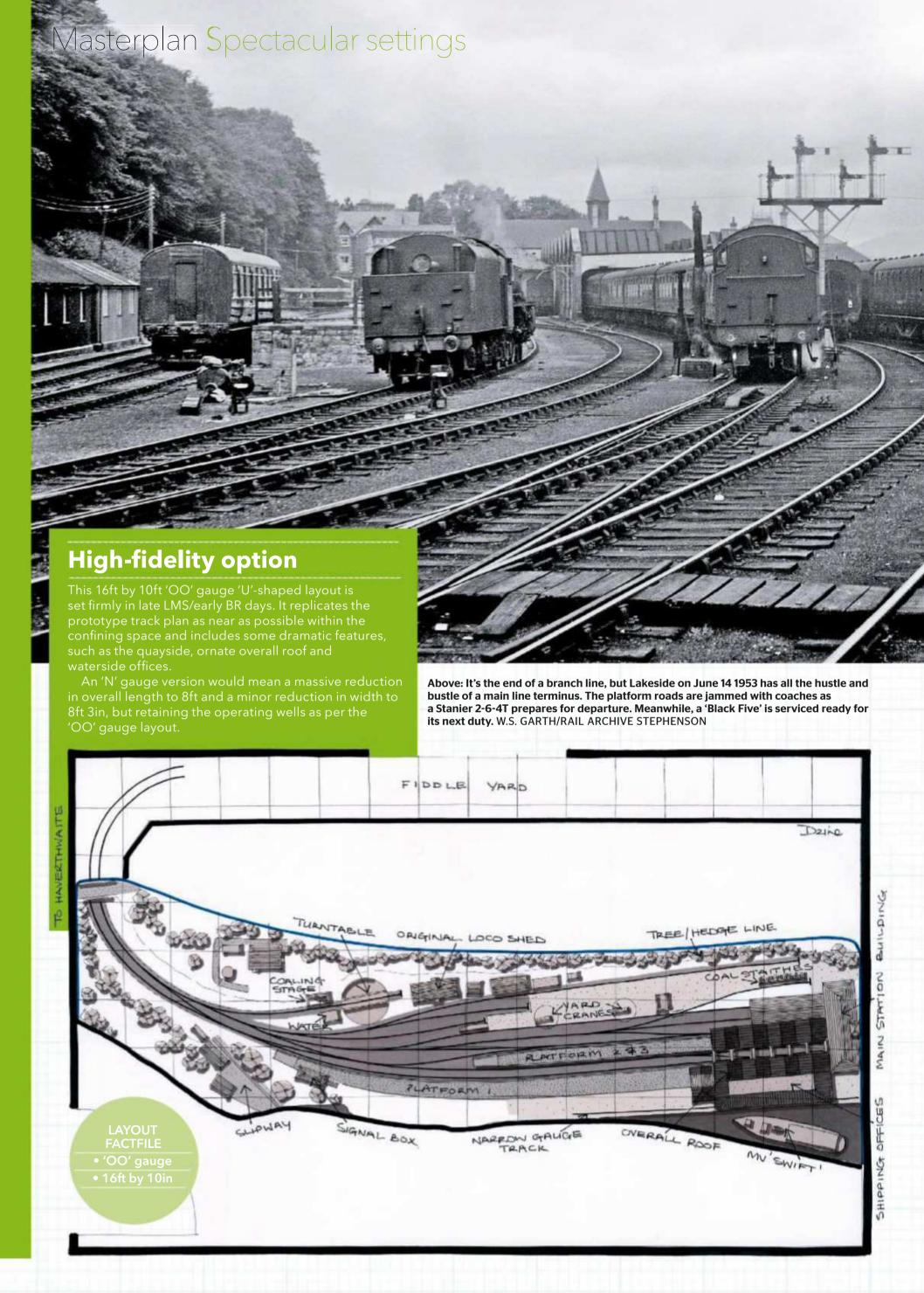
Carry out a check and, if in doubt about any appliance or cable, replace it.

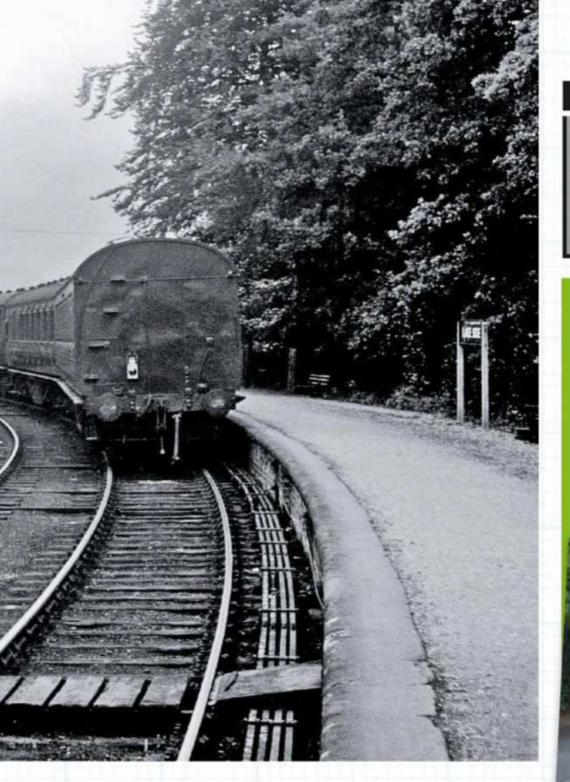

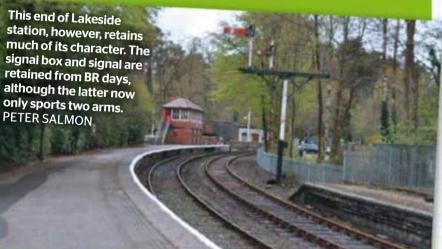

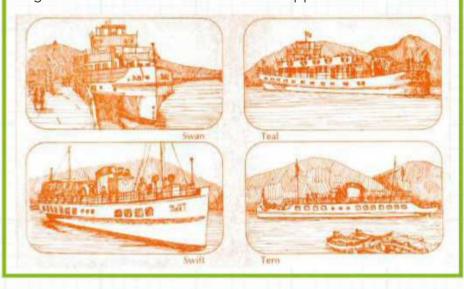

achmann has taken a lot of flak from militant keyboard warriors for the length of time that it's taken to develop certain models. While Bachmann isn't entirely blameless for this situation, it does tie in with its new design ethos - like pouring a pint of Guinness, it takes time to achieve perfection!

The elegant London & Brighton & South Coast Railway 'H2' 4-4-2 has been five years in the making. It's been tantalisingly close for what seems like ages. Last summer, its arrival was postponed as some tooling tweaks were still required - proof that Bachmann wants to ensure that a model is as good as it can be before it's released to the public.

We received 'H2' No. 32424 Beachy Head for review. This was arguably the most famous of the six 'H2s', for it outlasted its siblings by two years and is one of those missed opportunities for preservation. Happily, that wrong is being righted as a replica is nearing completion at the Bluebell Railway.

Beachy Head was a railtour favourite and looked particularly

splendid in BR lined black. It's this familiar livery that our sample carries and it does indeed look, well, splendid.

The paint and printing is to Bachmann's usual high standard. A pair of etched plates is supplied in the box, but the printed ones are so beautifully printed that it seems a shame to cover them up. Impressive stuff!

FOOTPLATE FINESSE

It seems strange to start the review with the footplate but the 'H2' has a feature that we've never seen before: a fully hinged deflector plate that protects the driver when the firehole door is open. The finish here is good too, with lots of subtle brass and copper paintwork and all the fittings appear to be where they should. The finishing touch is a hinged metal fallplate.

Taking a step back from Beachy Head reveals what an excellent model it is. Bachmann's design team nailed that intriguing blend of Great Northern and LBSCR styling. The shape and proportions look right and compare well to prototype photographs (published drawings are a little scarce). Even the unprototypical bend in the connecting rod, which draws the eye on the GNR 'Atlantic' (MR210), isn't as noticeable here.

The die-cast metal running plate gives the 'H2' plenty of weight. The trailing truck frames are die-cast too but, between them, the fully flanged trailing axle, mounted on a pivot, has plenty of play – see opposite to see how it worked on our test track.

The smooth, handsome lines mean that there's not a great detail of separately fitted detail to comment on, but what's there is excellently rendered. When you have to sink to the level of criticising the lack of mating flanges on the smokebox end of the driver's side steam pipe, you know that you have a very good model on your hands!

Rivet detail is impressive throughout. Those around the smokebox are good but it's the ribs on the cab roof that really catch the eye. It's worth looking at the line of rivets around the tender tank too - they're just as good.

MINOR NIGGLES

The only visual niggle concerns the all-important 'face'. The shape, proportions and 'dish' of the smokebox door are spot on but the effect is spoilt by the lamp irons, as they sit a little too close to the handrail. Due to the tolerances involved with working with parts of this size, it's difficult to see how this could be avoided.

Performance

'Atlantics' can be somewhat light on their feet but there were no issues with *Beachy Head* on our test track. No. 32424 romped away with 13 Hornby and Bachmann bogie coaches straight from the box. It even managed a credible three bogies coaches over our 1-in-30 gradient.

The trailing truck arrangement worked perfectly through second, third and fourth radius curves and tight Hornby pointwork, even at speed.

As is typical with all recent Bachmann Branchline models, the three-pole motor was smooth and quiet throughout the speed range.

Fuss-free performance – what more could you want?

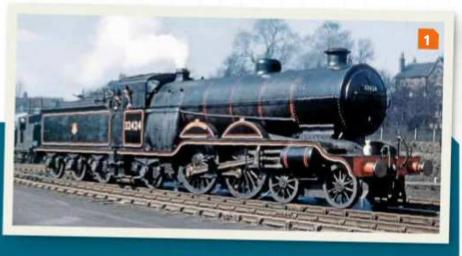

Factfile: No. 32424 Beachy Head

So urgent was the need for new express locomotives upon his appointment as LBSCR Locomotive, Carriage & Wagon Superintendent that Douglas Marsh made arrangements with his previous employer, Henry Ivatt of the Great Northern Railway, to send a set of 'C1' 4-4-2 drawings to Kitsons of Leeds. The result were five 'H1' 4-4-2s of 1905. They weren't exact copies of the GNR 'C1s' - they were a bit longer, had larger cylinders, a high-pressure boiler and screw reverser.

Marsh was taken ill in 1911 and, when faced with a need for more express locomotives, his assistant Lawson Billinton ordered more 4-4-2s. The six new locomotives, built at Brighton, became the 'H2'. There were key detail



differences, such as the shaped smokebox saddle and a running plate that didn't undulate over the cylinders and driving wheels.

The six 'H2s' were unnamed until 1925 when the Southern Railway's publicity department insisted that all 11 4-4-2s carry names of well known South Coast landmarks. No. 424 became *Beachy Head*, having received Southern olive green in September 1924.

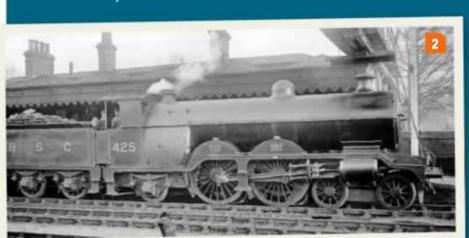
Beachy Head was based at Newhaven at nationalisation. It moved to Eastbourne during that summer and was at Brighton in early 1949. All the 'H1s' had been withdrawn by the end of 1951, while 'H2' No. 32423
The Needles had gone two years previously. Nos. 32421 South Foreland, 32425 Trevose Head and 32426 St. Alban's Head were

all withdrawn during 1956.

Beachy Head, meanwhile, was employed on duties to Bournemouth until it was laid aside on February 24 1957. It was steamed again on June 18 and, surprisingly, was kept going after it suffered damage to its cylinders. It was back on Bournemouth duties again until stored again at the end of 1957.

It's impossible to imagine on today's railway, but the Railway Correspondence & Travel Society requested Beachy Head for use on its 'Sussex Coast Limited' railtour on April 13 1958. The 4-4-2 was retained and then steamed in early April for trials. Declared fit, it worked the special from London Victoria to Newhaven Harbour. It was then withdrawn in May 1958 and had been cut up at Eastleigh Works by the month's end.

Had the Bluebell Railway opened a few years earlier, it might have been able to save Beachy Head. The next best option was to build a new one. Work started on a replica in 2000 using an old GNR 'Atlantic' boiler found on a farm in Essex and a redundant LBSCR tender chassis. 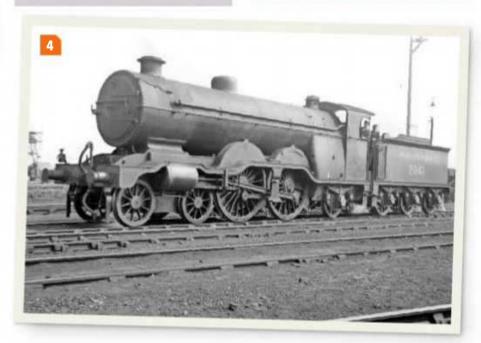

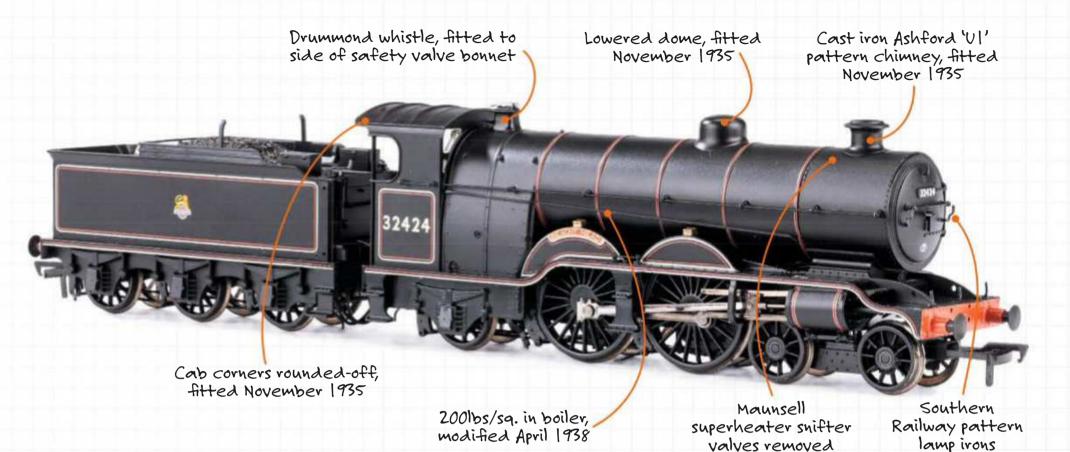

The other slight issue concerns the way the handrails are fixed to the boiler and smokebox. There is a very small gap around the base of each handrail knob when there was no such gap on the real locomotive. Again, it seems churlish to point it out but, from certain angles, it is quite noticeable.

These very minor niggles should in no way detract from what is a truly excellent model. It looks like an 'H2' from every angle - from the prototypically tiny gap between the driving wheels to the protruding washout plugs.

Full credit to Bachmann the 'H2' really has been worth the wait and is heartily recommended.

Bring on the 'H1'! (RF)

used to have an old Airfix '14XX' when I was a kid and it ran like an absolute pig. It might never have been one of Airfix's best models to look at. but Collett's classic branch line 0-4-2T is one of the GWR's most famous designs and, as a GWR enthusiast, I had to have one.

Its dismal performance always meant that I was intrigued to compare it to one produced by Hornby. The body was the same but the mechanism had been 'breathed on'. It's now 2018 and I've finally got my hands on a Hornby '14XX'. Does it finally lay the ghost of my old Airfix one to rest? Er...

Hornby first produced the '14XX' in 1997 after it had bought the tools from Dapol the previous year. It's been in and out of the range ever since. Its return for 2018 is a bit of a paradox: it was a surprising return and yet not that surprising at the same time.

Surprising, because this is a model that dates back to the 1960s and its looks are somewhat compromised in places; not surprising because Hatton's has brought out an all-new version (MR233), so it makes sense for Hornby to offer one in its budget RailRoad range.

No. 1424 arrived in the Model Rail office in its RailRoad box. It carries BR lined green but, as a RailRoad model, there are some omissions and simplifications, so there's no black in the lining on the tank sides and the green extends onto the cab roof as far as the gutters. Happily, Hornby has painted the chimney top and not

left it as shiny metal. Commendably, the numerals on the smokebox numberplate are the right weight and size.

Visually, the '14XX' is just as dated as I remember. I've always felt that the smokebox door looks like something Samuel Johnson might have penned for the Midland Railway. There's a solid block under the boiler, and the less said about the cab spectacles the better.

There's a huge amount of moulded detail, as one would expect from a model of this age. The turned metal buffers are a neat touch but they only go so far to compensate for the poorly fitting cab roof and hints of flash on some of the mouldings.

If you're familiar with this old model then you pretty much know what you're getting. But how has over 20 years of Hornby ownership affected its performance?

Hornby has been known to

tweak the chassis on older models, installing DCC sockets and suchlike. But there are no such modifications here. There's no DCC socket, nor NEM pockets.

Applying power on our sample resulted in a most horrific whining noise but it settled down after a few minutes running-in. Haulage power turned out to be prodigious, no doubt helped by a pair of traction tyres (remember them?). No. 1424 managed 13 Hornby and Bachmann bogie coaches on level track and even managed to pull seven coaches over our 1-in-30 gradient, which is a superb achievement.

The biggest issue, I feel, with the RailRoad '14XX' is its price. Hornby's Smokey Joe has a retail

price of £40.99 and if the '14XX' sold for this, that would make good value. But it doesn't - you'll only get 1p change from £60.

If you're buying a model for fingers not suitable for the fine detail on contemporary models, the '14XX' is ideal. But if you're buying it because it's cheap, I'd really urge you to fork out the extra £39 for one of Hatton's models. The latter is far superior in every way and, at just £99, it really offers fantastic value.

Surely it's finally time to let the old '14XX' shuffle off this mortal coil? (RF)

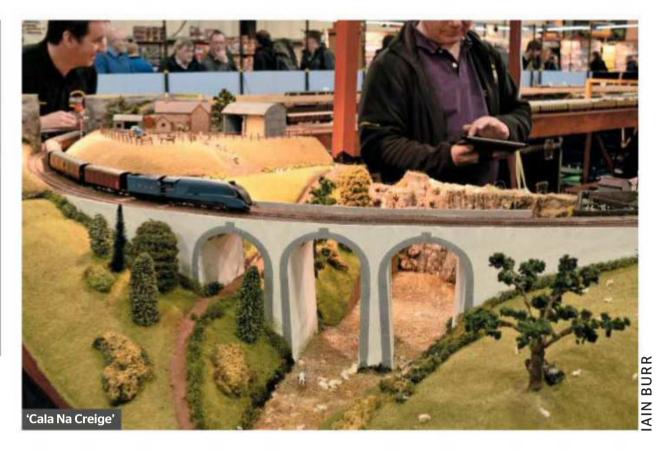
he Aberdeen Model Railway Club was formed in 1971, with the constitutionally stated objective that 'the club shall promote and foster interest in modelling railways'.

We do that by meeting every Wednesday evening, and by inviting all members to contribute to the layout being built - we try to have at least one layout under construction in the club rooms at all times, with the philosophy that people learn best by doing!

If a member has a question on any aspect of model railways, there will always be someone willing to offer help and advice. The offer to our members is to come along to the club and practise the skills they need to complete their personal layouts, by helping to build a club layout which is generally bigger than most members can accommodate at home.

Alternatively, members can bring their personal projects into the club rooms and make use of the club's tools and facilities. This gives the club access to a range of layouts which can be taken to our own exhibitions - and others.

Our premises are located on the Ferryhill Railway Heritage Trust site, near the centre of



Aberdeen. As the club is a member of the Association of Model Railway Societies in Scotland (AMRSS), the Model Rail Scotland Exhibition in Glasgow, held over the last full weekend in February each year, is a major event in our calendar, as is our own exhibition on the last weekend in October.

When the club was formed, the majority of members were 'O' gauge modellers. That demographic has changed over the years, and Aberdeen MRC now reflects the demographic of the hobby as a whole in the UK – approximately 80% of our club members are 'OO' gauge modellers, and of them about 80% model the steam/diesel transition era. So I would like to encourage modellers with different interests to get involved with the club – any small group of modellers can propose a layout idea to the committee to access club funding and resources.

When we were approached by Knickerbockerglory Productions at the

beginning of 2018 about a TV programme around the idea "The Great British Bake-Off meets Model Railways", we were initially sceptical. But given our constitutional objective, we felt that we had to participate, and so we entered a team into the competition. The experience proved to be enthralling, exhausting and exhilarating, and has changed the way I approach my own modelling. I hope you all watch The Great Model Railway Challenge on Channel 5 this autumn and enjoy it as much as we did. Look out for a number of "as seen on TV" layouts, coming soon to an exhibition near you!

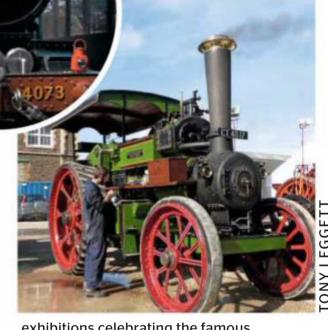

Stock drawer

Dave Turner, by e-mail

I read George Dent's article on storing rolling stock with interest and thought I'd share a solution I use on my layout. I have quite a lot of stock and a big fiddleyard. I wanted a way to store stock that would make it quick and easy to find and select items while keeping them safe from damage – and clean.

I bought a second-hand architect's wooden chest on eBay some years ago. It has eight drawers and each will take 34 coaches, or about 100 wagons. The drawers are lined with thin foam, corrugated to form a row of 17 compartments and stuck down with glue. The whole thing fits nicely under the fiddleyard.

It works really well if you store all the stock items out of their boxes, but if you prefer you can load the drawers with boxed items and not use the foam. The drawer units are not cheap, but given the value of what is in them I think it is worth the money. The big advantage, if you have a lot of stock, is you can scan the drawers very quickly to find what you want.

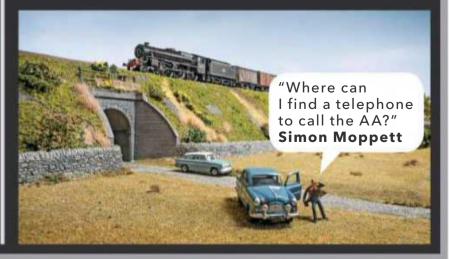

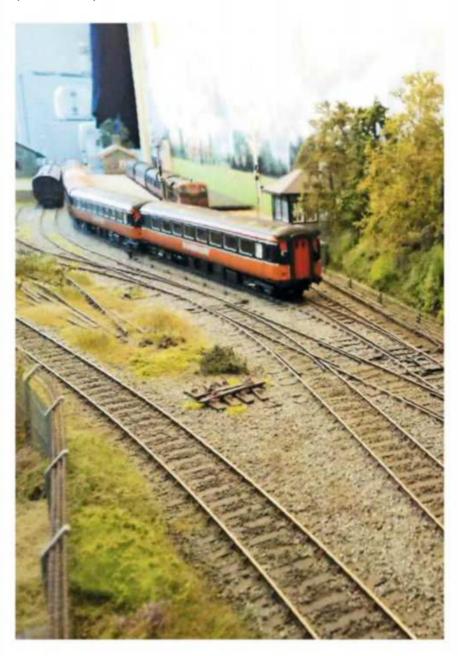

Blue 'Bury'

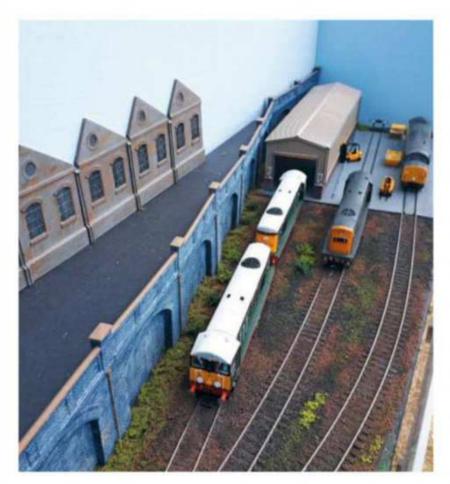

Streamlined technique

After five months' work I have nearly completed my Graeme King conversion kit of the streamlined 'P2' No. 2003 Lord President.

Modelling it has required a lot of patience and practice to get right. It does have a few mistakes, but with kits and conversions that's something to be expected.

However, for my first attempt I think it has come out really well.

To build it, I used the following donor models:

- 1: An old 'A4' which I used as a donor for both the 'P2' and another project the 'W1'.
- 2: A Hornby RailRoad 'P2' model -

all that remains of that is the body, cylinder block, and tender!

3: A spare 'P2' body which a friend gave me.

4: A spare LNER Apple green Flying Scotsman tender, from which I used the frames for the locomotive and the body for the 'W1'.

5: The Graeme King 'P2' kit. The great thing about this kit is that all the profit goes to the new-build 2007 LNER 'P2' *Prince of Wales*.

I am now modelling the LNER 'Hush-Hush' No. 10000 in the form it was in after Sir Nigel Gresley rebuilt it as a streamliner.

Present your case

If there's a locomotive that you think needs to be offered ready-to-run, here's the place to voice your opinion...

Locomotive: Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway 'A' 0-6-0

Gauge: '00'

Proposed by: P.J. Boyde, Cheshire

What is it?

Between 1889 and 1918, the Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway built 468 of these 0-6-0s to J.F. Aspinall's design. The boiler was pressed to a rating of 180lb/sq in and the 18in by 26in cylinders were linked to 5ft 1in diameter driving wheels by Joy valve gear to produce a tractive effort of 21,170lb. Originally classified 'A', they were later reclassified '27'. A simple yet efficient design, the last was not withdrawn until 1962.

That's the factual stuff dealt with. I had the pleasure of spending a day behind No. 1300 at the East Lancashire Railway a few years ago. As BR No. 52322, this beautiful black locomotive hauled the rake of coaches I was in with ease. It ran like the metaphorical sewing machine and seemed to have ample power to



spare. To my mind, this locomotive is special and a timeless beauty.

What would make it viable?

Humble goods designs have become the 'in' thing in 'OO' gauge recently, with the most recent announcements being Hornby's 'J36' and the Rails of Sheffield/Bachmann '812'. Bachmann has had great success with another Lancashire & Yorkshire design - the Aspinall 2-4-2T - so it would be in prime position to do the 'A'.

Not only is the 'A' a comparatively simple locomotive, you have a choice of three classic liveries: LYR black with its handsome double red lining, plain LMS black and, of course, BR black.

As well as producing the '27', a manufacturer could, for a bit of variation, also produce the '28' class. They were designed by George Hughes and were the larger cousins of the '27s', with Belpaire fireboxes, superheating, a slightly longer frame and larger cylinders. The LYR built 20 new ones and created 63 by rebuilding '27s'.

Can I see a real one?

The sole survivor is No. 1300, owned by Andy Booth. Its time is shared between the Ribble Steam Railway and the East Lancashire Railway, and it often visits other preserved railways too.

This may not be the most inspiring photograph in the world but given Chris Leigh's comments about childhood memories last issue (MR251), I thought it was worth sharing.

This long-forgotten photograph of the Nene Valley Railway's Wansford headquarters, which I discovered in a box during an office tidy, is undated but must have been taken in the mid-1980s. This is how I remember the NVR at the time. It's funny how something small can dredge up long-forgotten memories...

I began to remember small details, such as waiting under the dual carriageway bridge at Orton Mere as the locomotive ran-round, and I remembered that two 'Deltics' 55022 and 55016) were based there.

I had vague recollections of a small, low white fence that, a quick trawl on the internet revealed, once separated the shed area from the running lines and has since been replaced by a platform.

But my strongest memory was of seeing pioneer BR '7MT' No. 70000 *Britannia*, tucked away at the back of



a siding looking, as my dad described, "a bit sad". Pictures of *Britannia*'s 1980s spell at the NVR always seem to show it in sparkling condition, but that's not what I remember - and this picture confirmed my memories!

Happily, things have changed in the last 30 years. Both *Britannia* and *Gordon Highlander* are now owned by millionaire locomotive collector

Jeremy Hosking, and Wansford yard now looks much smarter, with more covered accommodation and a large workshop.

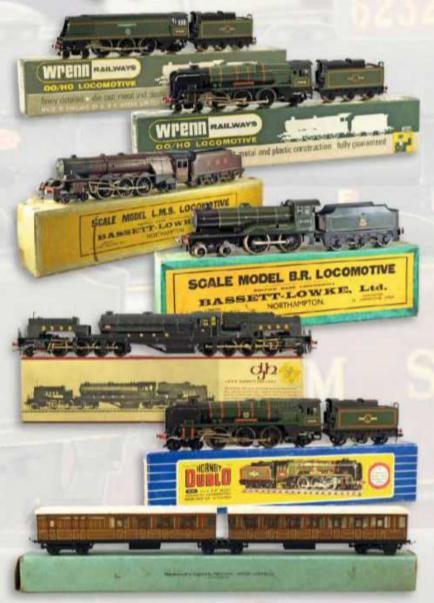
