

I'm almost ashamed to admit it, but it was the death of railwayman Dick Hardy back in February 2018 that prompted me to finally read his autobiography *Steam in the Blood*. I'm not sure why it hadn't occurred to me to do so before, but seeing so many reminders

of his long and illustrious railway career – particularly as he was a former M&GN man for a time – meant that I wanted to know more about him.

It's heartily recommended, and for several reasons. You get an insight into post-war Doncaster works (Hardy was a premium apprentice and was befriended by Edward Thompson) and what life was like in busy Eastern and Southern Region sheds and depots. But it's not just a read for steam buffs. Even fans of diesel traction will get something from Steam in the Blood.

What struck me most was just how unprepared BR was for dieselisation. Hardy, in charge of Stratford at the time, recalls how he fought to maintain diesels in the filthy conditions of the steam shed until the new diesel depot was ready. He had no diesel fitters and had to rely on a steam fitter who tinkered with electronics in his spare time to train a band of specialists to keep these new machines running!

If you've never read it, you should add it to your wishlist – it's a fascinating insight into a time of great change on the railway.







# HORNBY RETURNS TO TO HORNBY LMS 'PRINCESS ROYAL' A

hree steam locomotives; one industrial diesel; four ranges of coaches and two new wagons - that's how Hornby's Marketing & Development Manager Simon Kohler has marked his return.

Hornby's 2019 range kick-starts the return to a wider range of products and accessories, complemented by a return to its spiritual Margate home.

Mr Kohler told Model Rail: "When I returned to Hornby much had changed. There was a new building and new systems but a model railway range that didn't seem to have any particular direction.

"Like an oil tanker, these things cannot change [direction] straight away, and it will take a year or two to work through some of the decisions made by the previous teams. In many respects, there was little I could do with the 2018 range, but for 2019 I was able to bring some clarity and direction."

The standout feature for the 2019 range is an all-new LMS 'Princess Royal'. Sir William Stanier's pioneering 'Pacific' of 1933 should receive the same treatment as the 'Princess Coronation' (see p104).

Hornby's design team visited the Princess Royal Class Locomotive Trust's HQ at Midland Railway - Butterley in 2018 to study preserved No. 6201 Princess Elizabeth (the other preserved 'Princess', No. 46203 Princess Margaret Rose, is also based there).

Following the success of its Peckett 0-4-OST and Sentinel diesel shunter, Hornby is to offer two new industrials. Calls for a six-coupled industrial steam locomotive have been answered by the Peckett 'B2' O-6-OST. The Bristol locomotive builder introduced this design circa 1914.

The Ruston & Hornsby '48DS' 4wDM was one of the smallest and cheapest standard gauge locomotives money could buy. The design originated in a locomotive built for Heinz in 1936 and they continued in production until the 1960s. Owing to the model's short wheelbase, it will come with a 'Conflat' wagon fitted with

additional pick-ups, although you may find that your Ruston will navigate your points on its own without any difficulty.

Hornby will go head-to-head with Dapol and Bachmann with two items in its 2019 range. Hornby is to replace the old Airfix GWR 'Large Prairie' with an all-new version that, like Dapol's under-development model (MR244), will cover '5101' and '61XX' variants of Collett's 1929 2-6-2T.

The launch of an all-new Mk 2f is an even more surprising development. Hornby will only produce First Open, Brake Second Open and Tourist Second Open Mk 2fs but the models will be nearly £20 cheaper than Bachmann's new model (MR254).

However, two further range of coaches will complement new models from other manufacturers. Hornby is to develop an all-new Mk 3 but with the plug doors now fitted to ScotRail, CrossCountry and GWR HSTs, whereas Oxford Rail is only offering slam-door Mk 3s.


Hornby's new 59ft Bulleid coaches should complement the 63ft type currently being developed by Bachmann. Hornby's new models comprise **Corridor Composite and Corridor Brake Thirds to Diagrams 2121** and 2316, introduced in 1945/46.

The final new coach range follows Hornby's familiar pattern of offering 'top link' coaches, before filling in the gaps with some non-gangway types. New for 2019 are the GWR 57ft Diagram 98 Brake Third of 1925 and 57ft Dia. E131 Brake Composite of 1927.

Hornby's elderly LMS 20t brake van, an ex-Airfix model, is to be replaced by an all-new version.

Finally, Hornby's extensive range of Southern Region models will be joined by an LSWR brake van. It will produce the 20t brake van (Diagram 1543) designed by Surrey Warner in 1915. These 75 vehicles were originally rated at 20t but were upgraded to 24t by the Southern Railway.



#### THOMAS OUT, HARRY IN

Thomas the Tank Engine has been a staple of the Hornby range since 1985 - but no longer. Hornby has decided not to renew its Thomas licence.

So what will fill the hole left for younger modellers? Step forward Harry Potter!

Hornby has a licence deal with Warner Brothers which will enable it to produce a range of railway and die-cast vehicles for it and its DC Comics film franchises. The first new product is a Harry Potter Hogwarts Express train set, featuring No. 5972 Hogwarts Castle and four Mk 1 coaches in Hogwarts Railway livery. The 'Hall' 4-6-0 will be sound-fitted.

Hornby's Skaledale Goathland buildings will return, as the North Yorkshire Moors railway station doubled as Hogsmeade station. It will be joined by a representation of Platform 9¾, that clips into Hornby's plastic platform sections.

#### OFF THE RAILS

One of Simon Kohler's ambitions is to resurrect Hornby's ability to offer everything you need to build a model railway. Therefore, the 2019 range



includes the welcome return of SkaleScenics and SkaleAutos.

There are some 72 new items in the 2019 SkaleScenics range, including ballast, trees and scatter material. SkaleAutos gets a more modest start, with nine new 1:76 scale road vehicles. Highlights include a Ferguson TE20 tractor, a Fowler ploughing engine, a BMC Mini and a blue Ford Anglia 105E.

Hornby has also developed an all-new analogue controller, while its Select DCC system receives an upgrade, to increase CV programming



and short circuit protection. Coupled with the RailMaster software, this will allow an unlimited number of locomotives to be programmed into your database, and offers the ability to control your layout using your smartphone and voice commands. There's a new six-pin DCC decoder (R7150, £25.99) and 11 new TTS sound decoders.

#### RailRoad highlights

Several old favourites return for 2019, albeit in Hornby's budget RailRoad range. The old Lima HST power car will be offered in original blue and yellow livery. They will be joined by the old Tri-ang GWR Dean 'Single' and GWR 'razor edge' railcar and a pair of Class 47s in EWS 'Royal' livery. The 'J83' O-6-OT also makes its return to the range in LNER, having previously only been available in the 'Mixed Freight' digital train set. Other RailRoad stars include Crosti '9F' No. 92028 in weathered BR black, Bagnall O-4-0DH in pseudo BR green livery and Hornby's old non-gangwayed clerestory coaches that date from 1961.

#### ■ 149th Barry scrapper returns to steam!

The Bury Standard 4
Group has completed the 33-year restoration of '4MT' 2-6-4T No. 80097 at the East Lancashire Railway. It was due to enter ELR service before the end of 2018. More significantly, No. 80097 is the 149th Barry restoration to be completed, out of 213 locomotives purchased from Woodham Bros' South Wales scrapyard.

At the time of writing, WR 'Modified Hall' No. 6989 Wightwick Hall was due to be the 150th Barry locomotive to return to steam. MIKE WETTON

Exclusive Rail Model Rail's MR-111 'USA' O-6-OT No. s73, produced exclusively by Bachmann, is a beautiful representation of the real thing and a worthy addition to your collection.



#### MR-111 'USA' O-6-OT No. s73 British Railways unlined black

This short-lived colour scheme bridges the gap between the post-war Southern Railway and the early days of British Railways. Southern Railway No. 73 retained its

number, but with an 's' prefix to denote 'Southern

Region'. Bulleid 'sunshine' green and yellow lettering was applied only to the tank sides, and spelt out 'British Railways' rather than simply 'Southern'. The colour scheme was replaced by its new number, 30073, and BR's 'cycling lion' emblem in 1951.

No. 30073 would become one of the most popular 'USAs'. It was the first of the class to be altered in March 1948 when it was fitted with a modified bunker and regulator "to the requirement of the Docks and Marine Department". It remained at Southampton until June 1963, when it was transferred to Eastleigh before being withdrawn in January 1967 and sold to Cashmore's of Newport. It was also the most popular locomotive of the fleet to take part in special workings, participating in eight between 1960-66.

# 'USA' 0-6-0Ts are here!

#### MR-104A 'USA' 0-6-0T No. 30064, in BR lined green

Built at the Vulcan Ironworks in 1943 as USA Transportation Corps No. 1959, it was in service with SR in June 1947 where it became No. 64. It spent much of its life in and around Southampton docks.

At nationalisation, it became
No. 30064 but remained
on the south coast, apart
from a brief spell at
the Meldon Quarry
in Okehampton
to the west of
Exeter, when it was

needed to cover for repairs to No. 30062. Although No. 30064 remained there idle for the duration, the quarry closed soon after and it was returned to Eastleigh. Despite being noted as dilapidated, and withdrawn in October 1962, it was repainted in green in February 1964, together with No. 30073, and it became a popular choice for railtours in the late 1960s.

It was withdrawn on the last day of Southern Region steam, on July 9 1967. It is now part of the collection at the



## According to Chris...

His grandchildren call him 'Granddad Trains' and he's been a dedicated railway modeller since the 1960s but, despite popular legend, **Chris Leigh** doesn't remember when dinosaurs roamed the Earth!

ack in early November I took the Cornish harbour layout, 'Polwyddelan', that I built for a series of *Model Rail* articles, to High Wycombe Model Railway Society's Wycrail exhibition. The one-day show, in the atrium, hall and gymnasium of a large secondary school, included 30 layouts, as well as the customary trade support.

'Polwyddelan' was not intended as an exhibition layout and it has certain shortcomings in terms of shape, operational interest and presentation. So it was a real surprise – and immensely satisfying – to be placed third in the judging of layouts. I hadn't even been aware there was to be a competition!

Competitive modelling has enjoyed something of a revival recently, thanks to Channel 5's *The Great Model Railway Challenge*, but for me it highlighted just how this facet of the hobby has declined. During my time on *Model Railway Constructor* in the 1980s, and a decade later on *Model Rail*, I was asked, from time to time, to judge modelling competitions. Sometimes it was scratchbuilt or kit-built items in showcases, other times it was layouts at shows.

I recall enlisting my wife's eagle eyes to help me judge layouts at Colchester one year, and it was a regular duty for *Model Rail* staff to judge modern image exhibits at Model Rail Scotland in Glasgow. In general, however, modelling competitions seem to have fallen out of favour.

Perhaps 'Challenge', already contemplating a second series, will bring a revival. Hopefully, too, it will have attracted younger people into the hobby. It's in the same mould as *The Great British Bake Off,* and that certainly has broad appeal. My granddaughter (aged 12) is an avid baker, and lists Mary Berry as one of her heroes!

So what of the first series of 'Challenge'? There was much that was good, and on the basis that any publicity is good publicity, a prime-time Friday evening slot has to be good. For me, Friday evening was not ideal. It meant that I missed an episode because I was setting up at Wycrail, and a Remembrance event on the evening of the finale. I'd seen enough, however, to convince me that, with a few tweaks for subsequent series, 'Challenge' will be good for the hobby.

One always fears that popular TV will only serve to reinforce stereotypes and, sadly, that is true in some respects. There was an irritating 'voice-off' that told the teams how much time they had left, and two presenters whose sole purpose seems to be to reel off countless puerile puns.

The judges, on the other hand, bring gravitas and understanding of the skills and problems involved.

But the teams are not just competing against each other, they are also competing against the clock, and here the hurried nature of the modelling really shows. It was notable that time and again, the teams commented that they could have done a better job if they had more time. Nevertheless, they deserve credit for their willingness to put their efforts under public scrutiny.

This is a hobby where the length of time taken to make something is one of its most significant strengths. At the top of the modelling scale we talk, with admiration, of how long a Pendon cottage took to build. In this hobby, 'five years in the making' is a seal of quality, not a criticism. Modelling against the clock in front of a TV camera turns the reason for being a railway modeller on its head. Now we have to get used to the idea that 'it only took a couple of hours, it works and it just about looks OK' is also a plaudit.

If the show proves to be successful, perhaps we'll see some more documentary-style programmes looking at our hobby from that other perspective. If that happens, 'Challenge' might just have been the right programme at the right time.

## **Modelling Lives**

Tales from the world of professional model-makers.



Paul Gosden loves modelling the modern railway and his interests have recently led to commissions from Freightliner.

spend a lot of my time photographing freight trains and this interest in the contemporary railway scene led me to build 'Chadwick Junction' (MR212). Once this layout was complete, I took a short break from modelling while I waited for a fresh burst of inspiration to strike.

Google Earth is a great resource for railway modellers and, after viewing various freight terminals and depots from the online 'eye in the sky'. Freightliner's Midland Road depot in Leeds grabbed my attention, so much so that I soon resolved to build a new layout based on this location.

Thinking that I had nothing to lose, I contacted Freightliner's head office explaining my intentions and was fortunate to receive an invitation to the depot for an extensive, personal tour. This was a real privilege, as very few visitors are permitted to visit Freightliner's depots. After being kitted out in regulation clothing and undergoing a safety briefing, I was escorted around the site and allowed to take plenty of photographs and note the key dimensions of the main buildings.

Over the following year, my new layout began to take shape, featuring many aspects of Midland Road. Unsurprisingly, I had to restrict the length of the 400ft-long depot building to fit within the available space, but it was completed in early 2018 and I decided to christen it 'Ledleigh Depot'.

With another layout completed and with an urge to do something a little different,

I opted to build a portable diorama. Freightliner's recently opened Crewe Basford Hall depot seemed like an attractive proposition, so I dropped my Freightliner contacts a line to raise the possibility of another site visit. To my delight, they graciously agreed and an escorted visit was arranged to the Cheshire depot.

This time I wanted to build a more exact replica of the real depot so more detailed photographs were taken, especially as I envisioned building the depot with a removable roof that would reveal a fully detailed interior. Being a newly built structure, copies of the site plans were made available by Freightliner and this made the scaling down of the dimensions

to 'OO' much easier. I must emphasise how lucky, and grateful, I was to be so well accommodated by the busy Freightliner staff who gave up their time to show me around the facilities and answer all my questions.

My rendition of Basford Hall fitted onto a 5ft by 3ft baseboard, with all depot and office buildings being built from double-thickness mounting board with embossed plastic planking. The shell of the building was constructed first, before adding the internal girders using Plastruct styrene section.



Having my photographs close to hand on my iPad helped massively while constructing the interior. I also scaled down my photographs of storage cabinets, vending machines and other internal fixtures and mounted them onto mounting board for greater realism. While the roof structure was made to fit as tight as possible to the walls, it could be lifted away to reveal the detailed interior which was illuminated with LED strip lighting powered by 9V batteries.

Partway through the build, Freightliner got in touch to ask if I could bring my

diorama to Crewe for the launch of their new corporate identity. Directors from Genesee & Wyoming (Freightliner's parent company) would be attending, along with the newly repainted Class 66 66413. Aided by copies of the artwork for Freightliner's new logos and

signage, the completed diorama moved back to Crewe and is now on permanent display in the Basford Hall boardroom.

The folks at Freightliner then commissioned me to build a similar diorama for display at Midland Road depot, which provided a new challenge. I'd need to replicate the entire depot structure, so 'N' gauge was the only option and everything would have to be built from scratch.

My first attempt at the depot failed as the long girders proved too flimsy, leading to a sagging roof. In the end I built it in sections and then joined it all together. This structure has a fixed roof but the depot and all subsidiary units are illuminated.

I soon discovered that Google Earth didn't have an up-to-date aerial view but, once again, Freightliner came to the rescue and sent me a new photograph taken from a drone. This was perfect as I could now see everything I needed to complete the model. It won't be long before I'll be travelling up the M1 to install this model in the Midland Road board room.



#### 'ABERAYON'S' HISTORY BY DR PAUL GLOVER

I've been modelling for over 60 years, and I have collected models that reflect my interests, including all sorts of transport subjects: planes, ships, automobiles and particularly 7mm:1ft scale trains, concentrating mainly on England's post-Grouping period.

The GWR stock suits the 'Aberayon' section of the layout and the equivalent LMS stock reflects my time in the coal industry and its operations in and around the Leicestershire collieries, which I remember clearly first-hand. At that stage of my working life all the interconnecting main lines in this area were operated by the LMS, so the layout shows my version of typical day-to-day operations as they used to be.

I acquired Kevin Wilson's 7mm scale fiddleyard-to-terminus exhibition layout 'Aberayon' in the early 1990s. I had the idea of incorporating it into my 37ft by 12ft loft which accepts an operating height of 2ft 9in and allows for a 5ft radius main line loop.


It is easier to keep the layout in the loft. For me, operating in a shed or outbuilding would be more difficult (and colder in the winter).

This adoption of 'Aberayon' allowed Kevin some much-needed space to begin work on his new project which was eventually to become 'Bucks Hill'.

Many people have lent a hand – including Kevin Wilson, the late Carl Legg, Adrian Newsom (electrics), Mike Morris, Dave Merrill (signals), the late Richard Chown and latterly and, most prominently, Paul Bambrick (upgrades and landscape work). Peter Sylvester, Simon Hill and Martyn Welch have also made substantial contributions.

#### ALONG THE ROUTE BY DR PAUL GLOVER

'Aberayon' is a small coastal terminus station with two platforms and a typical goods yard opposite for local coal the siding below.


I find it quite easy to shunt both yards prototypically, separating and sorting the wagons in between the passenger timings. From behind the shed, the single branch line enters a short cutting to emerge into an open section of Exmoor-type scenery, and the line then enters the 10ft-diameter return curve, crossing the stone viaduct over the small valley of the Ayon and further into some more open countryside.

In the foreground, as the line completes its return loop, the much larger locomotive sheds at 'Chilton' come into view, their purpose being to provide serviced and turned locomotives for some of the larger passenger services to 'Aberayon' but, more importantly, for suitable motive power for the colliery sidings opposite 'Chilton' station. This small single-platform station incorporates buildings by the late Carl Legg.

The layout does look purely Great Western, certainly a long way from Charnwood Forest Junction and my old stamping ground in Leicestershire. The workings in the LMS mode use both ex-Midland and LNWR vehicles. The narrow gauge and colliery lines are based on workings observed in my early trainspotting days.


Right: Paul's layout sits on 9mm plywood, strengthened to support heavy 'O' gauge locomotives.

Below: 'Aberayon and Chilton' is not really a layout of any particular place or time but many features and cameos around the layout are reminiscent of the 1930s and 1940s.










#### DAY-TO-DAY RUNNING

'Aberayon' provides opportunities for mineral traffic, general goods, parcels and passengers on the basis of what comes down must also go up! The size of the loft dictates what can and cannot be done, and to work the layout as realistically as possible requires almost 100 movements for a prototypical day and it takes me almost a month to complete.

The object of my layout is to provide day-to-day running of trains from either the LMS or Great Western to diagrams which I can operate single-handed.

The points and signals are interlocked and visible on the two illuminated control panels. The locomotive studs are much larger than necessary and the LMS and GWR fleets alternate quarterly.


My LMS locomotives depict most of the classes that worked in and around Coalville in the late 1930s and early 1940s. They are complemented by three industrials of South Leicester colliery. At some time or other most have been either built or improved by Nigel Smith. Some have been worked almost daily for over 20 years.


"The layout was converted to DCC sound in 2016, making operations both more demanding and enjoyable. I operate it using Digitrax, as that's the same system Kevin uses, so I can always call on him if I get stuck! I was surprised that I encountered fewer problems than I had expected and it was only these worries that held the conversion back for some years."

• Remnants of the layout are still in Paul's widow's loft and are for sale. All of the locomotives and rolling stock have been sold – only the baseboards, buildings and scenery remain. 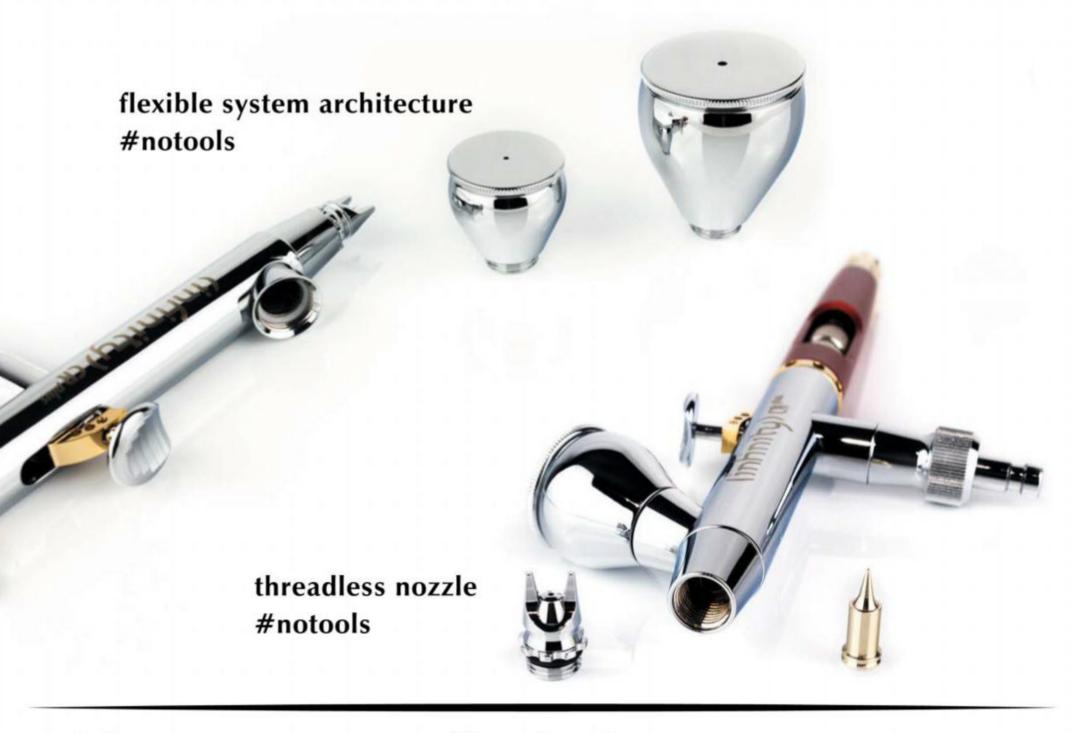

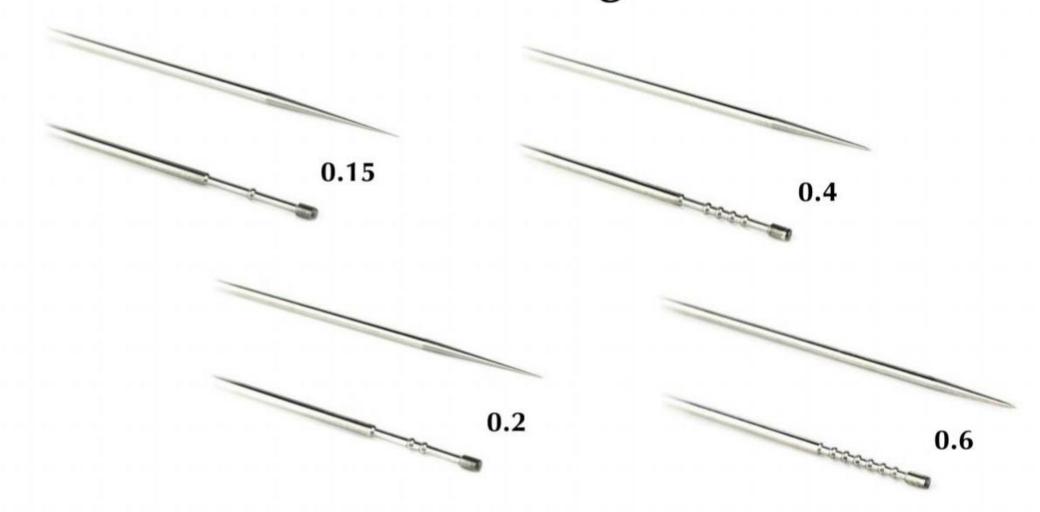



#### MICRO LAYOUT 1

# 'WINDMILL SIDINGS'



The layout features some wonderful buildings which I bought second-hand. I don't know who made them, but I believe they were once on a layout that has since been dismantled. They really were crying out to be included in a railway scene. With the imminent arrival of Model Rail's 'J70', a partial street railway would be an ideal scenario. I also had a Dapol windmill left over from a previous project. Cue an East Anglian byway...

mall model railways are a great way to test out ideas or practise those all-important skills without having to commit to a large layout. Another benefit is that they're perfect if you don't have the space, or don't have a lot of time to dedicate to the hobby.

I like small layouts because I have so many ideas flying around in my head, and they allow me to try them out on a small project and in a short period of time but still achieve a high level of detail. One of the ideas behind this project - and, indeed this issue of Model Rail - was to create a series of modules all occupying the same footprint.

This is known in modelling circles as a 'Free-Mo', although true 'Free-Mos' have strict rules - more information can be found here www.free-mo.org


Our interpretation was very much homegrown and not to be confused with true 'Free-Mo'. I designed my module around a couple of my layouts I have that linked together. Being first off the mark, I suggested that the other members of the Model Rail team followed suit.

Starting on page 40, you can see what Peter, Richard, Chris Leigh and Chris Gadsby came up with. In the meantime, this is how I built mine...












As far as the track plan is concerned, what happens in between the exit point was entirely up to each builder. With a selection of existing buildings, I did a full-size mock-up to see what would work for me and I ended up with a single siding and a headshunt.



Rather than messing around with plaster and string to make the section of tramway, I made the flangeway from C&L Finescale Code 75 rail and copper-clad sleepers. A roller gauge (from the likes of DCCconcepts) makes this a doddle.



Because the sleepers will be hidden beneath the road surface, they can be widely spaced. As a rule of thumb, one sleeper per inch will be fine. Remember to file the insulating gap through the copper surface before adding the road surface.



I like to lay my track onto 5mm foamboard. Mark where the track is going to go, paying close attention to the pointwork and where the point motors will go. Cut a hole through the foam and then drill through the baseboard.



Paint the track prior to ballasting (I used Halfords aerosols). Sieve some sand through a tea strainer onto the layout. Use a soft paintbrush and tap the rail tops to tamp it into place.



I wanted roads with cobbles/setts. Rather than use embossed plastic, I favour DAS modelling clay, pushed into place with fingers and spread with a butter knife. Applying a little PVA glue can help the clay adhere to a smooth surface.



Now for the clever bit. Dismantle a ballpoint pen. Take the outer sleeve and press it repeatedly into the clay to form tiny cobbles or setts. Unless it's really warm, the clay takes a fair time to set. I tend to work on one 6in-square area at a time.



The level crossing timbers were made from coffee stirrers. The approach roads were made from DAS clay, which will cure faster in warmer weather. Thinner clay tends to cure faster too.



Spread the clay around the running rails of the inlaid track. Make sure the rail tops are slightly proud of the clay surface, as this will make cleaning the track a lot simpler and reduce the chances of models scuffing the clay.



Use the clay to smooth the transition between ballast and landscape. Spread teaspoon-sized lumps of clay over the edge of the ballast with your fingers and pack it into place with a stiff paintbrush.



The clay has been primed with a blend of Halfords matt black, grey and red primers. The buildings are masked off behind sheets of paper. Beware of inhaling toxic fumes - working outside is advised.



Dry-brush on some lighter colours (pale grey and beige works well). A thin wash of diluted matt black interior matt emulsion with a dash of liquid soap can be applied if you require further definition.



#### What's that shed?


If a building isn't an perfect fit for what you're modelling, don't dismiss it. I found this Bachmann Scenecraft colliery wash house in my cupboard and immediately recognised its potential for 'Windmill Sidings'. I removed the front wall, added some doors from another

resin building and made a new roof from plastic sheet.

Et voilà! A rail-served shed that just needs a coat of paint.

make no apologies for modelling the Wisbech & Upwell Tramway, for this Fenland setting is the perfect subject for a micro layout.

You might think the flat Fen landscape is boring, but there's much to recommend it. The wide, open sky actually means that you can achieve a sense of 'space', even on a baseboard as small as 3ft by 1ft.

That landscape is broken up by a decent amount of water. Like Chris Leigh, I firmly believe that every layout should have a water feature. The Fens are kept well drained by dykes and ditches that crisscross the landscape, but the W&U also shadows the canal, dating from the 1790s, which would be superseded by the railway.

What I really like about the W&U are the little wayside goods yards. There were no platforms, no large buildings - often they didn't even have fences.

Combine these three factors and you've got the perfect recipe for a wonderful little model railway.

#### Make a canal

Every water feature needs to be blended into the surrounding landscape. You'll need fine scatters and sands to create the banks for your lake, river or, as in this case, canal. Static grass covers a multitude of sins, so I've used it here.


The one thing that you'll notice about a watery location is the abundance of plant life on the banks. And there is a huge choice of appropriate products in model form.

There are essentially two ways to go about it. You could opt for something like Busch's moulded water lilies and reeds, but these are plastic and you will need to tone down that plasticky finish.

The alternative is miniature plants made from laser-cut paper. They're strong yet delicate and they don't have a shiny finish, but here's the downside - the cut edges are white, which is not very realistic! Suitable sources of laser-cut water plants are manufactured by Gaugemaster, Model Scene, Noch, Polak and Walters.

The various plants come on a backing sheet for you to carefully cut out using the tip of a sharp craft knife. There are just a few connecting points on the backing sheet, so it's a quick process.

Because the plants are packaged flat they may need to be teased into an upright position with your fingers or a pair of tweezers. All of these products can be fixed to the landscape with PVA glue, contact adhesive or hot glue.





To make the canal bed, cut away part of the 5mm foamboard sub-base. This is easy to cut and shape with a sharp craft knife, but you might find that some areas are glued rather too well to the baseboard below.



I used Woodland Scenics Water Undercoat Olive Drab acrylic paints to colour the canal's base. Looking at the picture, I should have spent more time removing those traces of stubborn foamboard.



You must ensure that the sides of a water feature are fully sealed before pouring in the fluid - it'll leak everywhere if you don't. I've found that Gorilla tape (available in most hardware stores) is most effective for this.



After the paint had dried I wiped the area with a damp cloth to remove any dust. I use Noch Modellwasser because it has given me excellent results. Apply fluid to a maximum depth of 2mm. Mine was nowhere near this thick.



Use a wooden coffee stirrer to drag the freshly poured water fluid to the sides of the canal and burst any bubbles. Leave each layer for a day to dry. Apply further thin layers and leave to dry to achieve your required depth.



When the Noch fluid is dry, stipple Woodland Scenics Water Ripples gel onto the top of the dried water fluid with a paintbrush. Take your time - I wanted to create the effect of a light breeze ruffling the canal's surface.





This is how the Water Ripples gel looked after drying for 18 hours. The water in the canal was about 1.5mm deep and it took four days to get to this stage because of the drying times of the two types of fluids used.

I also wanted to use several Noch water lilies (14140). These plants are made from laser-cut card but other plants are available, such as Busch's moulded plastic models. Noch's plants don't require any paint, and they're really dainty!

## 'REDBRIDGE UNDERGROUND'

Chris Gadsby goes under and over to make his micro project stand out from the crowd.

nlike some of my colleagues at *Model Rail*, I had no inspirational memories of gallivanting around some idyllic branch line in my youth, so I elected to model what I do know well - the London Underground.

I've always loved the Tube, and when I realised that my ideas to build a micro layout with a sporting theme could fall into the trap of just modelling a straight piece of track next


to a big green field, I decided to make mine stand out by heading underground.

So how *could* I make it stand out? Make it the biggest! I couldn't make the layout longer or wider than anybody else's, so I decided to make it taller, and model both the Underground and the landscape above it - which would also double my workload.

Kingsway Models was my first port of call because of its excellent Underground

station kits. I made a list of all the kits that they produce, acquired the axonometrics of the stations from Transport for London and slowly whittled the list down to one.

#### How to build a card kit



The track entry and exit points were pre-set, so I had to have a station with a central platform with a line either side or central tracks with a platform either side. Looking at Kingsway Models' kits and the axonometrics of the stations I eliminated those that were unsuitable, and Redbridge Underground station was the last remaining option (and by pure coincidence, one of the biggest). It's a perfect station to model as the station building is almost a foot square and only 18 steps take you down to platform level, so I could show both levels without the micro layout becoming too unwieldy. I've made plenty of card kits before, and was looking forward to getting stuck in.






The tower is the first part to be constructed, after which it can be set aside. Cutting out its main brick structure can be awkward, but it will add ten inches to the height of what is already a double-layer micro layout. Excellent!



For the thin pieces of card, scissors or a sharp craft knife are sufficient. Alternative roundels are supplied with 'Underground' rather than 'London Transport'. I was working against the clock, so I left these for later.



Push down hard on a steel-edged ruler to get a straight line for cutting out the windows. Accuracy is key here, otherwise your windows will be off-centre. Take things slowly to avoid moving the ruler and place it against the printed windows to judge the position is right.



The tower front with windows in is the first thick card piece you will encounter. Be careful when cutting through this as the printed top layer can tear and spoil the look of the model. Here one edge is a bit messy, but it won't be visible.



Fix the windows to the back of the tower shaft. Card glue will work perfectly well here. I opted for UHU as it gave me a small amount of leeway to turn the part over and make sure the windows are perfectly lined up before it set hard. Fold the sides around the edges.




The top of the roof is the next bit to be added in place and this provides some structural integrity. Place it on a flat surface and glue along the sides of the card before holding it in place while the glue sets. It will be a little wobbly until the roof is added to stabilise it.




strut provides a small but albeit necessary support to the top of the roof. There is another one on the other side. These will serve a dual purpose later as somewhere for the braces to sit. It's at this point that the structure begins to support itself.


This tower side



Four braces are supplied to provide strength to the corners of the tower. After fitting them I was confident enough to leave it and know that it wouldn't collapse. Add in the roof and pillars to complete the tower section.



Work can now begin on the booking hall. Redbridge Underground station was designed by renowned Tube designer Charles Holden and is Grade II-listed. In model form, his large, circular design is recreated by joining the two halves together with the main roof joiner.



You will need plenty of glue and patience to attach the corner walls, as they need to be held in place until the glue has cured. Getting the exact position right is crucial with this section, as any mistakes will affect future steps.



I made my own shop fronts instead of using the ones supplied. I decided to include a shop that is no more and has been covered with a security shutter. I printed them out and fixed them to the supplied shop front pieces.

# USE BLACK SHOE UPWA



#### SLOUGH VS DIDCOT

The essential feature of the GWR type of coaler is a raised track on a man-made embankment, sometimes with quite a gradient, which enabled wagons of coal to be shunted up to the 'delivery level'. At Didcot, this raised track passes through the brick structure. At Slough it passed behind the structure, but with an awning over the unloading bay.

While the Slough coaler had two separate coaling bays, of different designs, the two at Didcot are close together to enable quicker coaling of a single tender. Otherwise, both depots had the same coaling and watering provision. Didcot's structure is larger and supports a much bigger tank.

I had always assumed that Didcot was the more spacious of the two sheds, but a quick check reveals that their early 1960s allocations were virtually the same but Slough actually had one more locomotive (48) than Didcot.





I began by checking that the loose parts of the coaling stage would actually fit on the Tim Horn 3ft by 1ft plywood baseboard. The standard track position, 113mm from the front edge, had already been set.



A rough test followed, with some 2in insulation to support the elevated track, and a second siding added at the front of the board. On this will stand withdrawn '14XX' O-4-2T No. 1448.



A covering of 5mm foam board was specified. This is useful for marking out. I marked the position of the track and the coaler, and a 12mm by 270mm rectangle for the ash pit, which I cut out with a craft knife and drilled...



...lots of holes through the plywood. These holes make it easier to cut through the baseboard with a razor saw. I carefully neatened off the rectangle's edges with a sharp Stanley knife.



I found an old battery-powered circuit that flashes four tiny bulbs to produce a flickering fire effect and installed it under tissue paper in the pit. Scale Model Scenery also produces a bonfire kit, a modern equivalent, for £4.99.



The pit is a one-piece fold-up 'box' made from thin card with tabs on the top edges, which enable it to be glued in place. Balsawood steps, RailMatch Concrete acrylic paint and ash sprinkled on wet PVA complete the job.



I used a generous coating of RailMatch aerosol Sleeper Grime on and around the track. In order to keep the paint spray off the building behind it, I used a large piece of card to create a shield.



Woodland Scenics' Earth Undercoat was used on all the areas of the layout which were to be grassed. Diluted PVA glue and static grass were then applied, but I thought that this initial effort was 'too green'.



I removed much of the first static grass I'd laid with a stiff brush and reapplied a more brown and straw-coloured mix. Poly fibre and Woodland Scenics' scatters were then added and fixed in place with hairspray.



I filled an egg cup full of ash from the grate in my sitting room and removed the largest bits. I have also used an artificial 'ash' which I think came from Green Scene, but the label is too faded to read.



Areas around the track and the ash pit were given a light application of diluted PVA and the ash was applied with an old tea strainer - a vital component in my scenic toolkit for many years!



Next came the weathering process, using a variety of powders and liquids, mostly from Humbrol. I wanted a rusty look for the edges of the tank panels and practised on the back of the tank.



I used two shades of Humbrol Weathering Powder, starting with Rust, which is a lightish shade. I actually prefer the darker look of the Iron Oxide powder, though, for the edges of the panels.



The corrugated roof had been painted matt black before I applied the Rust and Iron Oxide weathering powders. Brushing upwards causes the powder to concentrate where the corrugated sheets overlap.



I used Humbrol Smoke weathering powder on the wood structure to represent coal dust. Don't put smoke marks above the arches, though, as locomotives could not pass under them.



Humbrol Gloss Oil Stain Wash Enamel was used in places on the track where excess oil might be spilled. Some lazy drivers would be pretty careless when using an oilcan to lubricate the engine ( termed 'oiling round').




A small piece of house coal, placed in a sandwich bag and pulverised into little bits with a small hammer, provides enough real coal for the wagon, and for 'spillage', too, in carefully placed heaps.



Dapol's BR 16-ton mineral wagon is the old Airfix kit and it's still a great little model, nearly 60 years on. The working door is a real bonus for this scene. I added a part-load of crushed coal, set in place with PVA glue.



I made up the little coal tub with 20thou styrene sheet. The figure came from my spares box - possibly Langley or Malvern Models - and I just removed his coal sack.



The coal chute can actually be made to move, but I decided to fix it in place as it is rather delicate. Once installed and painted black, the figure and the coal tub were glued in place.

# 'CALVERT TIP'

Fascinated by its history, MR's editor Richard Foster felt compelled to model this derelict GCR London Extension before it's lost forever under

the multi-billion-pound HS2 project.

here's something wonderfully intriguing about trying to visualise a derelict location in its heyday. One place that has consistently grabbed my attention is Calvert station, or rather what remains of it.

This station was part of the Great Central Railway's London Extension. The 'Master Cutler' would flash through here, as would the elegant designs of locomotive maestro J.G. Robinson.

Today, Calvert is where London's rubbish goes. Daily trains use the remaining stub of the Extension to dump tons of rubbish into the old clay pits. It's an inglorious end to one of Britain's grandest railways.

I was lucky enough to pass through Calvert on a railtour in May 2018 (behind two Class 20s no less). You could clearly see the remains of the typical GC station arrangement poking through the weeds.

The platform was still there, now home to a veritable forest of shrubs and small trees, but the station buildings had long been demolished.

Calvert gave me that little tingle of excitement I always get when I stumble across a disused railway. Except that, in this case, the railway was still there!

The idea of Class 66s picking their way through the undergrowth was one I simply couldn't shake off...

#### Achieving the look of disrepair and neglect...

This scene was a quite straightforward to compose. I had to cheat a little, though, to incorporate the island platform – only one track aligns with the 113mm specification. The two key features are the road bridge and the loading crane.

Regarding the bridge, photographs from www.disused-stations.org.uk revealed a brick arch over the platform, with the spans over the railway appearing to be girders with brick parapets. I made the arch by removing a chunk from a Wills SS13 Brick Arch Bridge kit, to narrow the arch to fit the platform. I decided to use Wills SS57 Vari-Girder Bridge Walls kits for the spans over the track, to provide a visual contrast to the brick arch.

The nearest item I could find that looked like the loading crane was Ratio's Overhead Traversing Crane (546). I think it's actually based on the nuclear flask loading crane at Trawsfynydd in North Wales but it looked like it would suit my mini Calvert nicely.

Why did I not bring you step-by-step guides to one or either of these builds? Because, quite frankly, they were not up to MR's standards.

I'm no expert but I'm a pretty confident plastic kit builder. Unfortunately, Ratio and Wills kits are a world away from Airfix. The



instructions are somewhat vague, leaving you guessing about how to assemble parts - or, in fact, what parts to use where.

Don't, as I did, expect the Brick Arch Build kit to come with the underside of the arch: you need to work out how to do that yourself! I scored some thin, embossed plastic brick sheet to get something akin to an arch, using a lot of cyano glue and filler. It wasn't pretty.

I knew the look I wanted. The platform had to be covered with weeds. The embankments were to be covered in thick foliage, reflecting the lack of lineside maintenance since the line closed as a through-route. Weeds need to sprout from the between the rails.

The problem was, I've never done any scenic modelling before. Where do you start? What do you need to buy?


There was only one solution: pop over to Peter Marriott's for a scenic masterclass. I apologise for bringing you more techniques on using grasses and weeds but, unless you've done it before, there's a lot for the first-timer to learn.



The starting point: the track was ballasted with Woodland Scenics' Buff Ballast, while foam under the plaster bandage formed the embankment on the right. The platform is formed with thin card on Peco's plastic platform edging.



I pushed DAS clay into the ballast shoulders to blend it into the surroundings. I also used clay to create the lorry loading area, painting it, when dry, in an off-white emulsion. The track was sprayed with RailMatch Sleeper Grime.



Peter's first job was to get rid of the whiteness. He painted all the non-track and platform areas with Woodland Scenics' Hunter Green and Olive Drab Earth colours. It went on well with a 2in paintbrush and quickly dried.



Poly fibre is the quickest way to add bulk to your landscape. Peter used a blend of Woodlands Scenics' Poly Fiber and a similar material from US firm Micro-Mark. Tease it with your fingers until it's gossamer-thin.



Dribble Woodland Scenics Static-Tac onto the area you want to cover and then spread it about with an old paintbrush. Ensure that the whole area is covered with a thickish layer of this easy-to-spread adhesive.



Press the Poly Fiber into the adhesive until the whole area is covered. 'Knife' your hand along it, as in a karate chop motion, to ensure that all the fibre sticks to the baseboard. Don't worry about any excess glue.



Peter keeps his scatters in small, plastic containers, mixing different colours and thicknesses. Take a big pinch and sprinkle it onto the poly fibre. You'll need a surprisingly large amount to ensure good coverage.



My first time using static grass was easier than expected, although you do need to work quite quickly here. Squeeze on a few dollops of Static-Tac and spread it about with your paintbrush.



Having already filled your applicator (here, a Woodland Scenics Static King) with scatter grass in a blend of colours before applying the glue, attach the lead (the 'foot' of the Static King goes in the glue) and switch it on.



Turn the device over and, from a height of about 2in, shake it over the glue. When you're finished, tip the layout on its end (if possible) over a large sheet of card to allow excess material to fall off; keep it for another time.



For detailing areas, put some static grass fibres into a puffer bottle (Gaugemaster's, for example). Dot a dollop of glue in areas you want to detail, then spread it around with your trusty old paintbrush.



Shake the Gaugemaster Puffer Bottle to give the fibres 'charge'. Remove the cap and, from about 2in above the layout, squeeze the bottle to force the fibres out. Remove excess fibres (by shaking off or vacuuming) and allow to dry.




I was amazed at how quickly you can develop really good-looking scenery! Give the fibre a good spray with some extra-hold hairspray - you'll be able see the droplets on the fibre, which will tell you that you've used enough.





Woodland Scenics' Accent Shaker is perfect for sprinkling on different coloured scatters to add some tonal variety to the landscape – just sprinkle them over wet hairspray. Then, spray again and add a different colour.

# BUILD A LAYOUT IN A BOX FILE

**George Dent** assembles a Scalescenes kit designed to fill, and flat-pack in, a tiny space.

he micro-layout-in-a-box formula has increased in popularity recently, offering plenty of modelling potential within a convenient, self-contained footprint. If, like me, you've contemplated dabbling in this concept, an ideal one-stop package is now available from Scalescenes.

This layout-in-a-box kit is designed to fit in a A4/foolscap box file (H370 by W245 by D75mm), with all structures provided, along with a backscene and cutting jigs to help adapt the box's framework. Box files do vary in size, depending on the maker, but the layout design factors in generous amounts of variation on the length, width and height of the box file.

The industrial theme is well suited to a minimum-space project, allowing a handful of short-wheelbase wagons to be shunted around by equally modest steam or diesel locomotives.

The various brick, concrete and steel-clad buildings suggest anything from a factory, brewery or engineering works to a colliery or mineral loading facility. The building styles are suited to any period from the 1950s onwards.

#### DOWNLOAD ONLY

As with all Scalescenes kits, this package is only available to purchase online, in the form of a downloadable file. You can print it off as many times as required, which allows for endless customisation or multiple attempts. Plus, if you make a mistake at any point all you need to do is reprint the necessary parts and try again.

Detailed, illustrated instructions are provided as a separate electronic file and are easy to follow. Virtually everything is supplied but you will need to source a box file, standard printer paper and sheets of light, medium and heavy card with which to laminate the various parts. A decent colour inkjet printer is essential and, due to the size of the kit (nearly 40 pages), a fresh ink cartridge may be required.

You'll need to provide the track and points, but a few suggested track plans are offered in the kit's instructions. A simple fiddleyard can be formed from a sheet of plywood, in the form of sidings, traverser or a cassette system.

Parts are included to set the tracks into the 'concrete' groundwork, or they can be laid on the printed surface and ballasted. I opted for the latter approach, although the main groundfloor building and its loading platform should be assembled first and test-fitted to ensure clearance for rolling stock before fixing the track in position.

Interior detail is provided for some of the buildings, giving the tiny scene a deceptive amount of depth. By adding items of clutter, such as stacked goods and strategically placed figures or machinery, the effect can be even more convincing.

Only a handful of windows and a variety of

printed options are provided, although much depends on the abilities of your home printer. My cheap inkjet printer cannot cope with clear acetate sheets, so I printed the opaque versions onto regular paper, which look fine at first glance. However, the interior detail is hidden.

Instead, screen-printed clear glazing can be obtained separately from Scalescenes. Alternatively, etched brass window frames to suit the kit's apertures are available from Brassmasters (www.brassmasters.co.uk).

#### STICKY ISSUES

Choosing the correct glue is essential, with most runny, dilute PVA-type adhesives best avoided for much of the assembly work. The ink on the printed sheets is liable to smudge if water-based glues are used in quantity. 'Dry' adhesives, such as Pritt Stick and spray mount,



You'll need a box file with a sturdy framework. Most are formed from thin MDF sides with a fibreboard front and back. The sprung clip, lid fastener and rivets need to be removed with pliers.



Carefully read through the instructions before printing out the kit, as not all of the pages may be required. There's no need for fancy, expensive paper - I used standard-quality printer paper.



Some of the printed sheets must be laminated with card. Three thicknesses are required, so you'll need artist's mounting board (heavy grade; 1,400 micron), plus 480gsm (medium) and 160gsm (light). See p58 for a handy pack.



Choice of glue is important. Pritt Stick is perfect for laminating the printed sheets to the card, while a fast-setting aliphatic resin-based liquid glue will considerably speed up assembly.



The first job is to cut slots in the side and end of the box file using the printed templates provided in the kit. Use a set square to ensure that the cut lines are perpendicular to the base.



Make the vertical cuts with a tenon saw, taking care as the tool nears the bottom as there may be hidden staples. Use a stout knife to make the horizontal cut along the base and tidy the edges with sandpaper.

are ideal for laminating the printed sheets to the card backing. Use the latter with care as the aerosol-based glue can be harmful if inhaled.

For instances when a liquid glue is needed, such as overlaying the printed cover layers onto card or joining the wall sections together, a fast-setting aliphatic resin-based formula is recommended. Roket Card Glue, from Deluxe Materials, is a prime example and its near-instant curing time allows for rapid progress, whereas traditional PVAs require an hour or two of careful clamping before the parts can be handled. A set of pinpoint applicator tips is also recommended, allowing greater precision when applying the glue and reducing the potential for messy, sticky, spillages or staining of the card components.

Thick PVA adhesive still has its uses, however. Bonding the bulky structures to the box file base demands a viscous glue that can deal with any slight gaps between the mating surfaces, while also allowing

for easy repositioning before curing.

As for ballasting the track, employing thinned (with water) PVA or similarly dilute adhesives to fix the scatter material risked bubbling the printed paper backing material. Mixing the glue with a mild alcohol instead of water is an option, using a mild isopropyl alcohol, but I adopted one of the late Alan Downes' tricks: super-thin cyanoacrylate.

The thin cyano penetrates the scatter material and cures almost instantly, allowing the job to be completed in a matter of minutes. However, this is not something to undertake lightly, as the noxious fumes can be overpowering unless the work is done outdoors. Only a few inches of track should be treated at a time as the curing solvent generates a surprising amount of heat, and when working on paper and card this can be a little disconcerting!

#### **VERDICT**

Aside from the track, clutter, figures and a length of plastic handrail, everything you see within the scenic area was provided in the Scalescenes kit. At just under a tenner, this is a great value package, although the cost of paper, card and an ink cartridge for your printer must also be factored in.

There's a high level of ingenuity in the kit's design and the various structures go together easily and logically, creating surprisingly sturdy and realistic models. The printed textures look very convincing, especially some of the weathered touches such as the rusty pipes and stained concrete. And the arrangement of the



The printed structures are convincing, with plenty of detail relief. The pipework and gutters are particularly attractive.

structures presents an attractive and cohesive micro layout.

Along with track laying and wiring and creating a simple cassette fiddleyard, assembling the entire layout took just a few days. While the cutting out of the many different card and paper layers proved laborious, overall it was an enjoyable and rewarding experience. In fact, it's the perfect undertaking for dark winter evenings and, when it's complete, the tiny layout offers a surprising amount of operational interest.



Scalescenes recommends that you lay a bed of cork sheet to the base before you apply the printed ground covering sheets. A thin covering of PVA, left to turn tacky, will secure the paper sheets to the cork.



I opted to lay loose ballast, employing pre-weathered material from the Geoscenics range. To protect the paper from blistering, I fixed the ballast with thin, penetrating cyano glue.



With the track in place, the rails could be painted in a red/brown acrylic by hand, then weathering powders brushed over the sleepers and ballast. Clean the rails with a track rubber and vacuum away any loose debris.



The printed components are best laminated to the required grade of card with a Pritt Stick, which offers an instant bond with less risk of ripples or bubbles. Smooth the paper down with your hands, or weigh it down with books.



Cut out the components as they're needed in the assembly sequence. Use only a sharp, stout blade and a steel rule, working atop a cutting mat. Replace the blade as soon as it begins to dull.



When laminating the outer cover sheets onto the card, run a thin bead of glue around the edges of the card and across the middle. The pinpoint applicator is essential to regulate the flow of the glue.



Place the printed cover layer over the card base, carefully aligning the edges before pressing down firmly and smoothing the surface to avoid the formation of bubbles or ripples.



After a few moments, flip the component over and run a fine bead of glue along the overlapping paper cover layer, near the edge of the card. Again, just a small amount of adhesive is required.



Fold the overlapping section of paper over, running your finger across the edge to ensure a tight, neat fit over the card. Smooth the paper outwards to disperse the adhesive and wipe away any excess with a tissue.



Treat any exposed edges with a suitable colour felt-tip pen or acrylic paint. The Scalescenes kit has been designed to minimise such edges, with many of the cover layers wrapping around the card backing.




The kit provides a sheet of windows that can be printed onto clear film. Alternatively, you can use the opaque versions that are usefully included to print onto standard paper instead - whichever you prefer.



The instructions for the assembly of the buildings are easy to follow. A set square is essential for ensuring that the walls are joined at the correct angle. The various layers combine to produce a very sturdy structure.




Most of the elements are straightforward, box-like structures. Some, however, are a little more complex, such as the hopper and conveyor, where the structures are formed by an interlocking framework.



The scenic area is compact but the structures are arranged to be viewer-friendly, providing an effective scenic break for the fiddleyard exit.



The ground-floor buildings are fixed into the box file, while the upper storeys slot temporarily (but securely) in place, allowing the layout to be folded away for storage when not in use.



# BUILD A MICRO LAYOUT IN 'N'

How do you build small without compromising on functionality? **Chris Nevard** takes 'compact' to the next level with what he calls a 'nano' layout.

et me introduce the smallest model railway I've ever built. Its scenic footprint is just 14in by 4in, so it certainly falls into the 'micro layout' genre - it might even qualify as a 'nano layout'.

Remember the layout 'Great Coles Wood Halt' (MR246) that I was commissioned to build? That was designed to fit inside a typical plastic storage box. But storage boxes come in all shapes and sizes, and the one I had to fill was roughly 14in by 4in - to me it looked like a very large loaf tin!

The owner supplied a pair of baseboards on which the track had already been laid. My brief was to create 'something Great



Western' to fit on to one board (with the other acting as a fiddleyard).

Micro layouts tend to be a compromise from a design point of view, but for me that's half the fun - trying to create something believable in such a small space. Another challenge, especially as it will be viewed close up, is to make a scene that looks bigger than it really is.

This build took 36 hours in total, spread over about three weeks. From an operational point of view, and due to space restrictions,

there was no room for a run-round loop, so I imagine that the loop is off-stage to the right.

I haven't done a great deal of work in 'N' gauge, so this was an opportunity to get hands-on with some of the well-known building kits. Also, working in such a small scale really sharpened up my act. With the camera – and my eyes – getting a lot closer to the modelling, any tiny blemishes are far more prominent than with bigger scales, especially when scrutinising any photographs.

Anyway, here's how I built - and how you can build - a working model railway in the smallest possible space.



To create a scene that appears larger than it is, I made a box and attached it to the baseboard frame. The height was limited by the 5in-deep crate. The fiddleyard wont fit any more, but I didn't want to compromise on the depth.




I like to prepare platforms early in the build I made this one from two pieces of 5mm foamboard covered with thick card. Edging stones were scribed with a scalpel. Embossed stone-effect plastic card was using for the sides.



When dry, give the platform a coat of Halfords grey primer. Mist on red primer and matt black. Work in a well-ventilated space. The trick with black and red is to mist them on from a distance.



Lay some masking tape on the platform surface and stipple on a stone-coloured matt emulsion to give the coping stones a different colour. You could always dry-brush on a little stone colour too.



Don't be afraid to modify kits to suit your purpose. Ratio's 'N' gauge GWR station building was perfect for this project, but I reduced its depth, making it more like a low-relief building. Note the etched details – fiddly but worth it.



Paint the building just like the platform – use aerosols to create a stone effect. Stonework and wood areas were later dry-brushed with stone and cream – I used matt enamel. Paint doors and windows separately and add them after.



You can find bargain model buildings at shows. These terraced houses would benefit from a little work. Dornaplas, Hornby Lyddle End, Shire Lane Crafts or Peedie Models sell suitable terraced house kits.



The platform is now temporarily in place to check how it fits. To add a little extra height to surrounding landscape, especially where the level crossing will be, mounting board has been layered up to the required height.




Paint the track prior to ballasting. In this case, I used the Halfords grey, red and black to colour the track. The platform was then permanently fixed using PVA glue and a few weights. Note the curve, so it will to fit next to the backscene.



Sieve some sand through a tea strainer onto the layout. Sand is easier than granite chippings because its grains roll into place around the track more easily. Use a soft paintbrush and tap the rail tops to tamp it into place.



Dilute PVA glue to the consistency of full fat milk. A little surgical spirit also helps the PVA to sink in and accelerates the drying process. Use a syringe to dribble it on to the track. Add a little washing-up liquid to the mix to help it flow.



To make the timber planks on the level crossing, I sliced some coffee stirrers using a sharp craft knife. Glue with PVA. Ensure that the rail tops are just proud of the surrounding road, to make cleaning the track easier.



Coat where the road and yard are going with neat PVA and then press on some DAS clay. Push it firmly into place. Stab a hard paintbrush into the surface to help flatten it and give it a little texture. A roller will help you here.



Once dry, the DAS can be sanded for a smooth surface. With the clay still soft, I temporarily pressed the buildings into position to eliminate gaps. When removing them, watch out for clay sticking to the bottom of the buildings.



Using a mid-grey matt emulsion, I painted the road surface. A thin wash of beige added further colouring. Modellers often portray asphalt areas as dark grey or black, but it's actually quite pale – unless it's been raining.



Some older models are still viable, and are usually quite cheap. I used Peco's level crossing gates. Before fixing them into place, make sure they open and close and that the gates meet properly. Glue the houses into place with PVA.



Fine static grass and coloured tufts will hide gaps and fill ugly spaces. Pouring some fibres onto wet glue will work just fine but vacuum away the excess to help them stand upright. The 'OO' gauge sunflowers are from Noch.



I scratchbuilt the loading dock using the same technique as the platform. To maximise the length of usable track, I made platformmounted bufferstops from chopped-up coffee stirrers and brick-embossed plastic card




I shot the image for the all-important backscene using the panorama mode on my smartphone, then lightened the image on my computer. It's important for a backscene to recede, rather than dominate the layout.



My local printers applied the panorama image onto sticky-backed plastic. I also had them add matt laminate. Next, I stuck it onto some art card. A fine, smooth cloth like a duster or clean handkerchief helps here. Work slowly.



The sticky-backed plastic, bonded to the card, is strong enough to support itself. After a few dry runs and cutting a hole to allow trains to exit, the backscene was glued in place with PVA, I added pieces of card to keep the corners tidy.



The running-in board was created in a photo editing package. Gill Sans is the best typeface. To print the sign, I usually drop the resulting file into Microsoft Word (or Pages for Mac users), inserting the image in lots of different sizes.



The final stage is the most enjoyable – adding all the details like piles of coal, loading gauge, benches, a telephone box and telegraph poles. The Ratio and Peco ranges are useful here. The signal is a GWR Home or Distant Lower Quadrant Kit from Ratio.

Looking at locomotives in detail

#### Class 28

**Richard Foster** examines a locomotive that had the power but, ultimately, enjoyed little of the glory.

The

Metrovick

Type 2 'Co-Bo'

ambitious

he last survivors were gathered in – or more correctly banished to – the north-west. They eked out their last days around Carnforth during the summer of 1968 and had all gone by the end of the year.

Sorry... we're not talking about 'Black Fives'. Fifty years ago, BR disposed of what was

arguably the most ambitious of all the 'Pilot Scheme' diesels. But the

'Pilot Scheme' diesels. But the Metropolitan-Vickers Type 2 'Co-Bo' was as flawed as it was ambitious. It's often referred to by its TOPS classification – Class 28 even though they'd all been withdrawn from active service five years before BR's new computer planning and operating system was introduced. They might have all been withdrawn, but one was still lurking about on the national network to act as a reminder for what might have been.

The design was almost perfect in theory. Let's compare it to Brush's Type 2, which would later become Class 31. The Crossley V8 diesel engine was a two-stroke and developed 50,000lb of tractive effort. The Mirrlees JVS12T V12 engine of the Brush design could only produce 42,800lb.

Brush's machine weighed 104 tons and that weight was carried on two six-axle bogies, but the middle axle was not powered.

Metrovick's new design would weigh just 97 tons and that weight would be borne on five axles, all powered.

#### ATTRACTIVE PROPOSITION

Really, what could be better than a powerful diesel engine (with fewer moving parts) that could develop a higher tractive effort than others in the same power band?

It was the bogie arrangement that grabbed the attention. Both had heavy Commonwealth castings, but it was the pairing of a two-axle ('Bo') and three-axle ('Co') bogies that made the '28s' unique. Quite why this arrangement was chosen has been lost in the mists of time.

Contemporary literature focused mainly on the promise of efficient power that Crossley's two-stroke diesel would bring. It has been suggested that the '28' concept began life as a 'Bo-Bo', but the addition of a three-axle bogie helped spread the weight. Whatever the reason, BR gave
Metropolitan-Vickers and Crossley its
blessing, presumably in order to be able to test
two and four-stroke diesel engines against
each other. Twenty were ordered, as part of
a 'Pilot Scheme' to build 174 diesels, from the
likes of English Electric, North British, British
Thomson-Houston, Brush, and its own works
at Derby and Swindon.

The 20 'Co-Bos' were built at
Metropolitan Vicker's Bowesfield
factory. Crossley supplied the
engines with electrical gear
coming from General Electric
Company and Brush. The

Company and Brush. The first, D5700, was accepted into traffic in July 1958 and went to Derby shed.

D5700 was a handsome enough looking machine. Its 56ft 7in long body featured one large grille and several

louvred panels, with slab-nosed cabs at each end. The three-screen arrangement was reminiscent of English Electric's Type 4 but the outer windows wrapped around to the cabside.

Things began to go wrong almost immediately.

The class was officially allocated to Derby shed and locomotives were rotated, six at a time, to Cricklewood to work BR's premier freight service. 'Condor' was an overnight London-Glasgow container service. It emerged in the wake of the Suez Crisis of

1956, when rising fuel costs pushed freight back onto the railway, and it would often be loaded to 550 tons.

Two 'Co-Bos' were diagrammed to work 'Condor' north, do some work from Glasgow (heading as far as Stirling and Perth) and work a sleeper south again. However, such mileage put a strain on the Crossley engines and local duties were soon replaced by spending more time in depots to keep them in tip-top condition for 'Condor'.

Derby's allocation was kept busy on the Midland Main Line from St Pancras to Manchester via Matlock. Again, weaknesses in the Crossley engines were revealed and less taxing duties soon beckoned.

D5719, the last of the 20 locomotives,





entered service in October 1959; by January/ February 1961, the whole class was in store.

Engine failures had been traced to the crankcase, while excessive vibrations caused the curved screens to fall out. Who should pay for the repairs? Once BR and Metropolitan-Vickers had worked things out, all 20 locomotives moved to Metropolitan-Vickers' Manchester factory for new crankcases and modified, flat-fronted windscreens.

Despite Metrovick and Crossley's desperation to prove that their design was a good 'un, BR declined to order any more. The class re-entered service from Barrow (11A), apparently banished to

local duties on the Cumbrian Coast Lines.

Brush's Type 2, with its Mirrlees engine, wasn't a huge success either. D5677 was fitted with an English Electric 12SVT engine (a de-rated version of that fitted to the Class 37) and it was a huge success.

Could this also save the Metrovick Type 2? BR thought so at first, but by 1966 plans to fit EE engines to 20 locomotives had been scrapped.


#### **ACHILLES WHEELS**

The 'Co-Bo's' other Achilles heel was its weight. Yes, it weighed less than a Brush Type 2 but Brush's design spread the weight across six axles; Metrovick's design spread the weight across just five. As the axle load increased, route availability decreased. 'Co-Bos' were classified RA8; all other Type 2s were RA5 or RA6.

Were they considered as embarrassing as the lingering fleet of steam locomotives? It appeared so. In December 1967, D5700/03/04/09/10/13 were withdrawn from Carlisle Upperby. At the same time, BR closed its steam depots north of Carnforth. D5718 followed in April 1968 and D5715 went in May.

Normal steam services ended on August 4 1968 and, by the end of September, the remaining 'Co-Bos' had followed their steam-powered cousins to the scrapyard. All except D5705. Right: Although well known for their use on the 'Condor' freight services, Metrovick Type 2s cut their teeth on the Midland Main Line from London St Pancras to Manchester. #### **SOLE SURVIVOR**

D5705 had apparently been fitted with another version of the modified crankcase, which may have cured the engine's biggest issue. It was reliable enough for it to be transferred to BR's Research Department, where it became S15705.

Its Departmental duties were short-lived for it was out of use by 1972, but again it managed to dodge the axe. It was transferred to the Western Region to heat carriages at Swansea, where it became TDB968006.

South Wales was only a temporary home

for D5705 but it helped this unique locomotive to survive into preservation. It moved to Bristol Bath Road in September 1977, and then ended up at Swindon.

Things had changed since 1968. Interest in diesels had grown by the late 1970s and the fact that D5705 had survived was too good to ignore. Funds were raised to secure its future and, in 1986, the sorry remains of D5705 left Swindon for Matlock.


Some restoration took place at Peak Rail but, in 1997, it moved to the East Lancashire Railway where restoration could start in earnest. Now under the wing of the group restoring that other unique survivor, Class 15 D8233, the restoration team has made good progress, but it will be several years before D5705 hauls a train again.

# 'Co-Bo' DETAILS

Many 'Pilot Scheme' diesels were lost forever as BR slimmed down its fleet in the late 1960s and early 1970s but, miraculously, one Metrovick 'Co-Bo' survived for future generations to enjoy. **Pip Dunn** studied preserved D5705 at Crewe Works in September 2005.

#### HOW TO

## **IMPROVE** YOUR 'Co-Bo'

It might not be one of BR's most attractive diesel classes, but George Dent finds a way of adding a little finesse to the Heljan model.

aving an instinctive sympathy for the underdog, I've always been drawn to the ungainly looks and the generally grubby outlook of the Metrovick 'Co-Bo'.

Hatton's decision to produce a high-quality 'OO' gauge model of the 'Co-Bo', in partnership with Heljan, was a welcome development. The model is impressive in terms of detail specification, even if the prototype could never be described as attractive.

Indeed, with the model featuring a wealth of detail, there's little in the way of upgrade work required. Instead, I decided to focus on adding a few extra detail touches to the finish, especially in terms of replacing the BR logos, which are rather lacklustre.

A change of identity was also desired, along with the addition of the orange-red coupling code symbols to the front ends, which place this 'Co-Bo' firmly in the later 1960s period.

#### **GETTING INSIDE**

A little patience is required to separate the bodyshell from the chassis. It's a clip-on fit, but it's extremely tight and the delicate underframe detail fittings are easily damaged, so a careful approach is essential.

The supplied instructions recommend inserting a pair of credit cards or thin plastic shims between the body and chassis at one end, thus releasing the locating clips. However, I found it more effective to treat both ends to the shim treatment at the same



time, before gently wiggling the body free. The only safe way to hold the underframe during this process is by the battery boxes, which are screwed to the metal chassis block.

Once the body has been lifted away, the cab interiors can be prised free, ready for painting and the addition of footplate crew. To avoid the hassle of masking the glazing during weathering, the clear plastic was gently pushed out and stored safely until it was re-fitted later.

#### SOMETHING DIFFERENT

For the weathering stage, I decided to employ oil paints from the Abteilung 502 range for the initial steps. The aim was to create a slightly faded, washed-out appearance to the green livery by creating grey and buff-coloured wash shades. The oils were also harnessed to add a base layer of 'grime' to the bodyshell, with the pigment concentrated in the various recesses, especially on the cab fronts.

The point of this approach was to ensure that plenty of 'dirt' was deposited into those areas where an airbrush struggles to reach with any degree of subtlety. A few hours spent on this preparatory work would make the airbrushing stage far quicker and simpler.



Was it a success? I'm certainly happy with the finished model, but the 'fading' stage didn't quite produce the effects that I'd envisioned, with the washed-out appearance being too subtle and partly obscured by the brown 'dirt' washes.

Furthermore, the use of oils offered little advantage over regular enamel or acrylic-based weathering washes. In fact, the oils took much longer to dry (a couple of days), so there was no benefit in terms of convenience. That said, the oils are more versatile than washes, allowing fully opaque or - with the addition of thinners - translucent finishes to be created.

My finished 'Co-Bo' may still be saddled with the prototype's dreary profile, but the improved quality of the overall finish and a convincing weathering job have created a much more authentic scale replica.





Removing the bodyshell from the chassis is simple, but the model needs to be handled carefully (see main text). The cab interiors can be pulled away and the glazing unseated by pushing from the outside with a cotton bud.



Heljan's printed BR crests are disappointing and lack opacity. They can be removed by rubbing with a swab dipped in a small amount of T-Cut automotive finish restorer. Rub gently, in a circular motion.



The logos will eventually fade away and the surface can be buffed smooth with dry swabs. The cabside numbers can be removed in the same way. Leave overnight for the solvent to evaporate.



The model will benefit from a thorough clean and de-grease with a weak formula of isopropyl alcohol. This formula is designed for cleaning fingernails before painting, so it's safe for use on plastics and skin!



Once the model is completely dry it can be treated to an overall coating of clear gloss varnish, applied by aerosol or airbrush. This will provide a suitable base for the new transfers to adhere to.



A superb set of BR crests, from the Fox Transfers range of waterslide decals, was applied along with a superior set of overhead line warning labels, plus coupling symbols for the cab fronts. Decal setting solution improves adhesion.



A strip of masking tape acts as an alignment guide for the cabside numerals. Replica Railways' rub-down decals are excellent, although it's important to ensure that the digits are equally spaced.



Waterslide decals should be left overnight to dry before sealing with a further coat of varnish. I used gloss as it helps disguise any decal carrier film and provides the best surface for the weathering process.



Tube-based oil paints can be used neat or diluted to any viscosity using appropriate thinners. Squeeze out a small amount of paint onto a scrap of card - the porous material absorbs the excess oil from the paint.



I began by applying a matrix of tiny blobs of neat white and buff oils to a small section of the bodyside (about a square inch). After dipping a brush in thinners, the oils were 'washed' down the side in vertical strokes.



Most of the oil paint was wiped away with a swab, again using only vertical strokes to leave subtle, translucent streaks to suggest a washedout appearance. The process was repeated along both sides and ends of the bodyshell.



After leaving to dry for a few days, a dilute mix of dark and mid-brown oils was created to act as an overall weathering wash. Apply by brush to small areas, working it into any recesses, before wiping away the excess with swabs.



The dilute brown wash can be applied in layers (allowing each to dry in turn), or in a thicker viscosity, to concentrate thicker deposits into key areas, especially within seams and the headcode disc mounts on the cab fronts.



The headcode discs were treated separately, secured to a strip of upturned masking tape. The same thinned brown oil shades were brushed on and the excess was wiped away with swabs.



The roof was treated to a similar wash coat, but with a darker mix of brown and black oils. Lots of pigment was retained within the delicate seams and around the various raised fixtures. Use only lateral strokes with the swabs.



The basic cab interiors were improved with acrylic paints and the grubby brown oil weathering shades. The controls were picked out with the tip of a graphite pencil before a suitable footplate crew was installed.



The oil paints needed a few days to dry completely before the final weathering touches were applied by airbrush. Tamiya acrylics were mixed and thinned before being sprayed over the bodyshell.



A mix of browns was misted along the lower edges of the body sides and ends, adding a softer edge to the initial oil wash layers. Some gentle vertical streaks were also created, especially along the body sides.



A similar mix of brown shades was sprayed over the underframe, with a little dark grey added to create shading in key areas. The wheels were cleaned with a swab dipped in track cleaning fluid.



A darker mix of Tamiya acrylics, with Dark Grey and a little Flat Black mixed with the brown, was applied to the roof. More concentrated, darker shading was worked around the exhaust outlets.



To avoid an overly flat finish, LifeColor Grease Effect paint was brushed around the axleboxes, fuel and oil drain points and other areas from which oil and grease might collect or emanate.



After re-fitting the glazing and cab interiors (fixed with Deluxe Materials' Glue 'n' Glaze), the bodyshell was clipped back onto the chassis before the finishing touch was added: a little dry pigment to mimic dust on the brake shoes.

# MODEL A PUSH-PULL BR/LMR TRAIN IN '00'



How can I reproduce a typical 1950s-era steam-hauled push-pull train for the North of England (ex-LMS territory), without resorting to expensive metal kits?

Colin Boocock says: On the Famous Trains model railway, at Markeaton Park in Derby, our 'OO' gauge model of Chinley station represents the 1950s/1960s era, before the station was rationalised by British Rail. Thus, the short bay platform at the east (Up) end of the station is an important feature.

We had been working diesel multiple units in and out of the bay to supplement the variety of trains that call or pass through the other platforms on the four main line tracks. Much as we may like DMUs, particularly the old BRCW units, we wanted a steam-hauled push-pull train alternating with a DMU to increase the interest for visitors.

At the time (2014), there was a distinct lack of suitable motive power and rolling stock for these local services. A push-pull-fitted Ivatt 2-6-2T or LYR 2-4-2T would have been ideal, along with a two-coach LMS push-pull set of carriages.

However, in the Famous Trains shop, I found a group of Dapol plastic kits for LMS suburban non-corridor coaches. I also bagged a bargain-priced, second-hand Bachmann Ivatt 2-6-2T that, conveniently, was fitted with vacuum push-pull equipment on both sides of the smokebox, together with the altered steam pipes that went with it on the real locomotives.

The Bachmann 2-6-2T came numbered as 41221 which, in 1959, was allocated to Longsight depot in Manchester - not so far from Chinley to be unreasonable - so there was no need to change its identity. All that was

needed was the addition of a headlamp at the top of the smokebox door to denote a stopping passenger train. A light weathering job was also employed, dirtying it a little with a mix of black and khaki acrylic paint.

Freshly motivated, I set about putting together the two Dapol carriage kits. One was a Second Class compartment coach and the other a Second Class brake van. Before putting them together, I painted the compartment wall interiors a light grey to vary the dark red interiors, and did the same for the guard's van area, which would soon include the driver's position.

The main surgery involved drilling holes in the driving end (the guard's van end on the kit) where the corners of the three front windows would be, and cutting the window apertures.

Clear plastic was cut to shape and glued in place behind the front windows. All four carriage ends needed painting matt black because that was the BR style up to 1965-66, when a few coaches received maroon ends.

A potential problem was how to replicate the rather prominent sun visors that the LMS or BR had fitted above the three front windows, when the railway converted these existing suburban carriages for their push-pull role.

My fellow trustee Peter Swift heard me discuss this on one of our working days at Famous Trains and quickly came up with a short strip of triangular section plastic rod that was ideal. All I had to do was cut it into three lengths, glue the pieces in place

above the end windows, and paint them black.

I then applied a semi-matt varnish over the whole of the vehicle sides and ends to secure the lining transfers and even out any differences in sheen.

Assembling the rest of the vehicles was a doddle, with the body, chassis and bogies simply clipping together. I assembled the couplings as per the instructions, and here lay the only problem.

At Famous Trains, we prefer our passenger carriages close-coupled, with our main lines featuring 5ft radius curves to facilitate this.

The Dapol standard hook-and-bar couplings set the coaches too far apart, so the couplings were modified slightly (see panel) and we're now much happier with the result.

Bachmann is currently working on a Midland Johnson O-4-4T. Until it's available, you'll have to make do with either its '2MT' 2-6-2T or its pretty, if light-footed, Lancashire & Yorkshire 2-4-2T. After all, a small number of these Aspinall locomotives did find themselves allocated to Midland Division sheds.







A trio of windows was cut into one end of the brake van to create the driving vehicle, along with a set of small, triangular sun visors over each aperture. ## **CLOSING THE GAP**



To shorten the gap between cars, I cut the tails from both couplings on the non-driving coach. The hooks were also removed and the shortened couplings glued to the underside of the bogie with cyano adhesive. Thin plastic strips were fixed to the front of the coupling bars to reduce the amount of fore-and-aft play in the hooks of the other car and locomotive.

The train then coupled tightly

together, although a first test run in push mode was disastrous.

The couplings were too tight and, as a result, the non-driving coach would push the rear bogie of the driving coach off the track when negotiating the points. Therefore, I repositioned both coupling bars on the non-driving coach outwards by a couple of millimetres, testing the train on the layout and making minor adjustments until reliable operation was achieved.

## Technique of the month

## **Drill accurate holes in plastic**

Drilling is one of those fundamental modelling processes where a little preparation can be highly beneficial, especially where accuracy is important. Even the sharpest drill bits have a tendency to wander off target, especially when working on smooth materials such as plastic.

After measuring and marking out the location of a hole, use a finetipped scriber or centre punch tool to form a small depression. This gives the drill bit a more positive location and allows it to 'bite' into the material more effectively.

Drilling with a small hand-held pin vice is recommended over powered mini drills as the latter inevitably cause overheating - and melting - of the plastic, which can have disastrous results.



An embroidery needle mounted in a pin vice makes for a handy scribing and centre punch tool, being pressed into the material to mark the exact location of the hole to be drilled.



Choose the correct size of drill bit for the hole. To be sure, measure the diameter with a set of calipers before mounting it securely into the pin vice.



Place the drill bit into the punched depression and, while exerting light pressure, rotate the drill clockwise. It's important to use only sharp bits as blunt tools may damage the material.



## **EASY TEAK EFFECTS FOR COACHES**

Q

I'm building a couple of 4mm scale etched brass LNER coach kits but I'm dreading the painting stage. Have you any tips for

recreating the varnished teak finish? Martin Murphy, by e-mail

**George says:** Recreating distinctive wood grain effects on teak coaching stock isn't easy. I've seen a number of different approaches to this task over the years, trying out a few of them for myself, with varying levels of success.

Dry-brushing has proved to be my favoured method, applying a 'base' colour to the model via an airbrush or aerosol in the first instance. When this has dried, a small flat brush is then employed to dry-brush the 'grain' lightly over the surface. It takes quite a while – and plenty of practice – to get the effect right, and extra ornamentation – such as knots – can be added with a finer brush.

It's a laborious process and it's vital to pay attention to the direction of the wood grain on each separate panel, following prototype images as closely as possible.

A much quicker alternative is to use waterslide wood grain decals, as offered by



Uschi Van Der Rosten (distributed in the UK by Albion Hobbies). Primarily designed for aircraft models, a choice of timber styles and scales is available and the decal sheets can simply be cut to fit each panel.

For best results, apply the transfers onto a surface prepared with a pale wood-coloured undercoat followed by a high-gloss varnish coat. Once the decals are in place, seal with another clear gloss coat before touching in the beading and applying any lining, logos and numbers, as necessary. Another clear varnish layer will seal everything in place. **Web:** www.albionhobbies.com

## QUICK FIX: TIMBER FOOT CROSSINGS FOR 'N'

I want to add a foot crossing to my 'N' gauge layout, but the material in plastic kits seems to be too thick for my ballasted track.

George says: Many kits are designed for use before the track is ballasted. Realistic results can be achieved by using thin wood veneer, which will sit above the ballast and sleepers of Peco Code 55 track. Ensure that the wood grain runs parallel to the rails and cut into thin strips to mimic separate planks. Secure with contact adhesive. Small packs of veneer are available from craft and DIY stores.

## **CHOOSE ECO-FRIENDLY COTTON BUDS**



I was watching the *Model*Rail's The Weathering Expert
DVD recently and noticed
that George used cotton buds

for many tasks. Does he have a favoured brand?

**George says:** Cotton buds are great for all manner of rolling stock weathering tasks, including cleaning wheels, re-numbering and manipulating weathering washes.

However, I've been feeling guilty about the amount of waste that I produce, despite trying to recycle and reduce consumption of solvent-based paints and thinners in favour of water-based alternatives.

Plastic waste has been in the news a lot recently, so I was happy to see that cotton bud makers have been moving to paper,



rather than plastic, stems - thus making them more environmentally friendly. The buds found in Morrisons stores have proven to be very effective, as well as economical, with the stems proving sturdy enough to cope with the rigours of weathering without distorting too readily.




## Easy gauging for OO' platforms

#### PROTOTYPE QUESTION OF THE MONTH


Can the MR team suggest a likely location for a large 'OO' layout? I want something modern (post-BR), with overhead wires but plenty of surviving traditional infrastructure. I live in the USA, so on-site research isn't easy!

**George says:** There are plenty of locations to choose from, although I've recently been thinking about how Stockport would make a great layout subject. Located just south of Manchester on the West Coast Main Line, the former London & North Western Railway station stands immediately adjacent to a massive brick viaduct.

Despite a substantial upgrade in the early 2000s, its six platforms are still operated by a pair of Victorian signal boxes. Both 'boxes – and two more just south of the station – were scheduled for decommissioning, yet problems with the new signalling equipment gave all four a reprieve.

Stockport station itself is a mix of old brick-built buildings and a modern glass and steel façade, while the immediate environs also feature a contrast in architectural styles and periods. There's plenty of passenger and freight variety too. What's more, if you were to fly into Manchester Airport, you'd cruise directly over the station during the final approach!

## **HOW TO BLANK OFF WINDOW APERTURES**

l'm trying to model a HST barrier vehicle and, instead of buying the Hurst Models brass kit to convert a Lima carriage, is there a way of filling the windows and smoothing them over? Lee Martin, by e-mail

**George says:** Model fillers differ in terms of suitability, so choosing the right type for the job is important. For large apertures such as windows, any filler will require something to cling to and the inside of the window frame will not be enough.

Therefore, it's always advisable to fix a piece of plastic card to the inside of the bodyshell first. Be aware that the re-fitting of any moulded glazing units may be affected by this new piece of plastic, so they'll need to be modified accordingly.

Most modelling fillers tend to shrink slightly during the curing process, so don't be tempted to try and spread the material flush with the surface on the first attempt. Instead, build it up proud of the model and leave for around 24 hours to set completely.

Milliput Superfine two-part epoxy putty is one of the most reliable fillers available. It sets rock-hard (if mixed correctly) and can be worked to an ultra-smooth finish, using a little water to help manipulate the putty into position.

A file and abrasive paper can be used to work the cured filler flush with the model's surface. When rubbing down with wet-and-dry paper (or sanding pads) begin with a coarse grade and work up to a very fine grit (such as 10,000 grade) in order to polish the surface to match the surrounding smooth plastic. Use plenty of clean water as a lubricant for the abrasives and clean the model thoroughly before priming and painting.

Don't be disheartened if the primer coat shows up some minor imperfections - simply add a little more putty, perhaps using a fast-setting, light-duty formula as sold by Tamiya, Squadron and Revell. Allow the surface to harden once again before rubbing down and re-priming. It may take a couple of tries to get a perfect finish, but this hard work will be rewarded.

## What you will need

#### **MATERIALS**

- Milliput epoxy putty, Squadron White Putty, liquid poly cement, plastic card
- Availability: Scale Model Shop www.scalemodelshop.co.uk

#### **TOOLS**

 Spreader, various grades of fine abrasives





Remove any glazing before cutting a plastic card blank just larger than the aperture. Fix with liquid poly cement or epoxy adhesive and clamp with a clothes peg.



Leave it overnight, then mix the two-part filler and spread it into the aperture with wet fingers. Leave the putty standing proud of the surface and allow to cure for 24 hours.



Begin flattening the putty with a broad file, taking care not to inhale the fine dust.
Switch to successive grades of abrasives to achieve a flush and smooth finish.



Any small imperfections that appear before or after priming can be remedied with a fast-setting filler, such as Squadron's White Putty. When dry, rub down carefully.



## FREE STICKY AIRBRUSH TRIGGERS



The trigger on my new airbrush feels stiff and makes my finger ache after only a few minutes of operation. Is the tool faulty?

**George says:** A degree of stiffness in the mechanism of a new airbrush is not uncommon, although it seldom occurs on good-quality tools. On typical dual-action airbrushes, a spring is located behind the trigger and this is duly compressed as the paint flow is increased.

The tension in the spring can be eased simply by unscrewing the assembly - there should be a knurled section just in front of the needle clamping collett. Just a half-turn is often sufficient to reduce the spring tension significantly. There should be no detrimental effect on the airbrush's performance, although an overly slack trigger can make the paint flow harder to control.

Stiffness can also be alleviated by the addition of a special lubricant to the trigger itself and the air valve located below. Iwata airbrushes come with small tubes of lubricant (also available separately) and a small drop

aimed at the base of the trigger at regular intervals can be helpful. It's also important to lubricate the needle regularly, as any friction within the needle packing seals will transfer to the trigger. Again, just a small drop of the lubricant is needed, applied near the tip of the needle. When pushed gently back into the tool, the needle will spread the lubricant through the airbrush's interior. Iwata's lubricant is silicone-free and will not interfere with paints, while Vaseline petroleum jelly is a viable alternative, if used sparingly.

Adopting a regular cleaning and lubricating routine should keep your airbrush in tip-top condition.



## Tool of the month


Safely cut delicate etched metal parts from frets with this simple tool...

From the USA comes this simple but very effective modelling aid, designed to help with the safe cutting of fine etched metal components from their frets. It's vital not to distort etched parts such as nameplates and detail fittings as it's difficult to re-flatten them. Cutting from the fret with a set of sharp metal shears is often preferred but, when dealing with smaller parts, this isn't always possible.




Instead, thick sheets of black acrylic are provided, with a clear clamping tool to hold the parts securely. This also provides a cutting guide for the knife to rest against as the cut is made. The pressure is absorbed by the base, without risk of the brass component distorting.




Ireland, in County Cork, and flows into the North Atlantic. There's a small town at the head of the bay that once boasted attractive period buildings, in front of a mountainous backdrop to the south-west. 
Today, a large car park dominates one bank of the bay. This was once the terminus of the Cork, Bandon & South Coast Railway. This main line emerged from the city of Cork heading south-west along the coast to Bandon. From here, the line to Bantry opened in July 1881.


One of the goods sidings extended beyond the station limits to the 100-yard pier. The loop terminated in a headshunt alongside a platform and small shelter with a Bantry Pier running-in board.

formed in 1924 by the merger of the Great Southern & Western Railway, the Midland Great Western Railway and the CBSCR. It became the Great Southern Railways Company a year later when the Dublin & South Eastern Railway joined the party. GSRC essentially ran all the railways within what was then called the Irish Free State; only the GNR (I) remained independent as it operated the rail connection to Northern Ireland.

GSRC suffered from financial issues and closure of the CBSCR was threatened in the 1930s. It survived to become part of the Republic of Ireland's nationalised CIÉ in 1944 but, despite dieselisation in the late 1950s, closure came on March 31 1961. Railcars 2641 and 2660 formed the last train, the 6.00pm Cork-Bantry. The railcars then returned to Cork, almost empty, except for a party of journalists.

## Stock for your layout

There's nothing available ready-to-run for the late 1950s/1960s period, but Silver Fox (www.silverfoxmodels.co.uk) offers kits of the AEC/Park Royal 2600 class DMUs and the Metrovick 'C' class 'Bo-Bos' introduced in the 1950s. Studio Scale Models (www.studio-scale-models.com) produces kits of the steam locomotives most closely associated with this, such as the eight 'Bandon Tank' 4-6-0Ts built by Beyer Peacock between 1906 and 1920. Worsley Works offers kits and components for scratch-building Great Southern & Western Railway six-wheel coaches and CIÉ Park Royal two-car sets.

## **Bray Head and Daly station**

There's nothing more dramatic than a railway perched high on a cliff or ledge, swirling waters at the foot, and trains plunging in and out of tunnels and blasting through the headlands. The Aberglaslyn Pass in North Wales, the East Coast Main Line in Northumberland and Shakespeare Cliff in Kent are impressive examples. But they're not as spectacular as the section of former Dublin & South Eastern Railway main line south from Bray towards Wicklow.

If there's something familiar about this railway, it's because it's like a more extreme version of the South Devon main line around Dawlish. That's no surprise when you consider that Isambard Kingdom Brunel was the engineer. This line was a link in the GWR's chain to promote Anglo-Irish traffic via Fishguard and Rosslare. It opened through to Wicklow in 1855 and, after several name changes and amalgamations, became the Dublin & South Eastern Railway in 1906 and would, via the Great Southern Railways, become part of CIÉ in 1944.

The line to Wicklow via Bray is still open, which means you can enjoy its scenic delights today.







# Heljan '43XX' 2-6-0

s there anything more painful for the British to do than admit that Americans do something better?

You'd think that it's the last thing that the ultra-conservative Great Western Railway would ever do, but you'd be wrong. For a start, there was nothing conservative about GWR locomotive development before the First World War. Swindon built the country's most innovative locomotives and it was decades before its competitors caught up. Chief engineer George Jackson Churchward happily borrowed ideas from other countries -France and the US in particular - and married them to his own forward-thinking concepts.

The GWR's '43XX' 2-6-0 typified this philosophy. US railroads had locomotives designed to haul both freight and passenger trains. The 2-6-0 was also a popular wheel arrangement. At this time, Britain's locomotive fleet was divided between 'passenger' and 'mineral'. Most mineral locomotives were 0-6-0s.

## **ENDURING DESIGN**

The '43XX' was Britain's purpose-designed mixed-traffic locomotive, providing the foundations for the likes of the 'Black Five' and 'B1'. For engineers such as Gresley, Maunsell, Stanier, H.G. Ivatt and George Hughes, the 'Mogul' was the wheel arrangement of choice for

a mid-sized locomotive.

Although not universally liked by crews, the '43XX' that had everything: power for freight, a turn of speed for passenger trains and good looks. They served the GWR from the Edwardian era right the way through to the 'Swinging Sixties'.

Heljan could have brought 'O' gauge Great Western modellers 'Kings', 'Castles' or even 'Halls' and 'Granges'. Instead, it's gone for this unsung hero – and what a cracking job it has done.

Some models look right straight from the box and this is one of them. The shape and proportions appear to be spot on, and Heljan's design team has done a splendid job of capturing the 'face'.

Our review sample - No. 4375 in GWR unlined green - looks right from every angle. The cab, the tender, the area around the motion bracket - it's all convincing. Highlights include the covers over the washout plugs, the hinged metal fallplate (complete with chequerplate) and the rolled-up weather sheet. The cab is excellent, with lots of backplate detail. In fact, you can't help but look for the steam atomiser coil in the cab roof (it's about the only thing that's missing!).

Automatic Train Control was fitted to seven '43XXs' in 1928, with the rest of the class

receiving it from 1930. This was about the same time as the cab porthole windows were removed. Photographic evidence is thin on the ground, but if No. 4375 had this combination, it would have been for a very short period. Other than that, Heljan has done its homework well, as this class was an absolute minefield of detail differences.

There are a couple of questionable areas. The way that the top tender lamp iron fixes to



the tender doesn't look right and there are two prominent mould seams along the shoulders of the boiler, which detract a little from the finish.

#### RUB OF THE GREEN


The finish matches the high standards set elsewhere. This was the GWR's wartime austerity livery, which lacked the bright embellishments you'd expect to find. The shade of green looks right and the Great Western >

## Pertormance

Testing the Heljan '43XX' had a fairly inauspicious start. No. 4375 stuttered and stalled its way round Dave Lowery's layout, barely able to move itself let alone a train.

With every mass-produced machine, you'll always find the odd duff one and it even happens to Heljan - a manufacturer with a reputation for the quality of its mechanisms. A swift call to Heljan resulted in the delivery of


a second '43XX' to prove that No. 4375's behaviour was an aberration. As expected, the second '43' ran superbly.

It dismissed the Peco points and tight curves on Dave's layout with consummate ease and made light work of its load of five Darstaed Mk 1s.

We've no reason to suspect that the first No. 4375 model is typical. The performance of the second model is exactly to the standard that we've come to expect from a Heljan 'O' gauge model. However, it's always best to try your model before you buy - just in case.

1: No. 4375 was nearing the end of its days when it was photographed at Stourbridge shed on December 29 1957. It was withdrawn on January 6 1958. Although fitted with outside steam pipes, it has the original pattern motion bar cross frame and driver's side centre splasher. K.C.H. FAIREY/COLOUR RAIL

2: No. 8390 at Old Oak Common on August 10 1935. You can see the heavy casting behind the bufferbeam. This was introduced in 1927 as a way of improving riding characteristics on tightly curved branches. Sixty-five '53XXs' were so treated, gaining corresponding numbers in the '83XX' series. The castings were removed from some and the locomotives reverted to their '53XX' numbers. No. 8390 was built as No. 5390 but it never got its old number back – it was withdrawn as No. 8390 in 1937. COLOUR RAIL

3: Just to confuse matters, Nos. 9300-9319 were built with the heavy casting behind the front bufferbeam. When they were removed, the '93XXs' were renumbered in the '73XX' series, but following on from No. 7321. No. 7325, preserved at the Severn Valley Railway, was built as No. 9303 in February 1932. GEOFF LEE







## Factfile: GWR '43XX' 2-6-0 Harold Holcroft, Churchward's right-hand man,

9in longer cab fitted to No. 4321

Harold Holcroft, Churchward's right-hand man, persuaded his boss that the GWR needed a mixed-traffic 2-6-0, based on what he'd seen on a visit to North America in 1909. It is claimed that the '43XX' was designed with only 11 all-new drawings - all the others were taken from other GWR locomotives.

The following locomotives were built:

- ◆ Nos. 4301-20, 1911. These had 'Saint' cabs.
- ♦ Nos. 4321-99, 4300, 5300-5319, 1913-1917.
  All locomotives from No. 4321 onwards were 9in longer, with 'County' 4-4-0 cabs.
- ◆ Nos. 5320-5383, 1917-1920. All locomotives from No. 5320 onwards were built with the pony truck fulcrum further forward. Previous locomotives were later altered.
- ♦ Nos. 5384-5389, 1920. All locomotives from No. 5384 onwards were built with a revised, more heavy duty motion bar cross frame.
- ♦ Nos. 5390-6341, 1920/21. All locomotives from No. 5390 onwards were built with a revised splasher to clear the reversing lever.
- ◆ Nos. 6370-99, 7300-7304, 1921/22. Batch built by Robert Stephenson & Co.
- ◆ No. 7305-7319, 1921/22. Built at Swindon using parts supplied by Robert Stephenson & Co.
- ♦ Nos. 6342-61, 1923.
- ◆ Nos. 7320/21, 6362-6369, 1925. Built new with outside steampipes. No. 4327 was fitted with new cylinders with outside steampipes in 1928, and many others followed.
- ◆ Nos. 9300-9319, 1932. Built with 6½in-longer frames, Collett cab, different damper arrangement and the boiler pitch raised.

The '43XXs' were true maids of all work, and there would be very few parts of the GWR system that didn't play host to them at some point. Nos. 5319-26 and 5328-32 even went new to France during the First World War. Withdrawals started in 1936, when 85 were taken out of service, up to 1939, and their motion and wheels incorporated into the new 'Manors' and 'Granges'. However, large-scale scrapping didn't start until 1958, although the last were not condemned until 1964. No. 5322 is preserved at Didcot and No. 7325 is displayed at the Severn Valley Railway.

The cabside numberplates are printed plastic mouldings but they really are excellent, being the right combination of 'brass' and black, and topped off with a fine red line. If only those on Heljan's 'OO' gauge '47XX' were up to the same standard!

This is Heljan's second 'O' gauge GWR locomotive. The 'Large Prairie' (MR254) looked just as good but it had one vital flaw - accessing the DCC socket was an absolute nightmare.

Happily, the '43XX' is much better in this regard. The ESU decoder interface (the model is designed to take the LokSound V4.0 decoder) is located in the tender and all you need to do is remove six screws to release the body. Sound aficionados will find a speaker under the locomotive (and not the tender, as described in the instructions).

However, the '43XX' does feel a little fragile in places, particularly around the cab and tender handrails. The ATC conduit along the running plate edge feels particularly vulnerable. You'll really need some kind of secure cradle to hold the '43', for it's not just accessing the decoder socket that requires it to be turned upside-down, you'll need to do this to unscrew it from its wooden plinth (the tender vacuum pipe came off doing this) and again to fix the pony truck. The ATC shoe is another likely candidate for falling off.

Heljan has consistently proven that it can do diesels in 'O' gauge. The '43XX' is proof that it can do steam too. We await further Heljan 'O' gauge steam models with interest. (*RF*)

#### **REVIEW VERDICT**

PROS. Shape, attention to detail, finish.
CONS. A few minor niggles, otherwise nothing of note.







# Revolution Trains TEA tank wagons

evolution Trains released an 'N' gauge model of the Greenbrier TEA tank wagon in 2016 (see MR228) and, thanks to its success, the prospect of a 4mm:1ft

scale version was offered. As Revolution Trains operates on a crowd-funding basis, it wasn't long before the order book was closed and the production process began. While this great new model is, in some ways, a scaled-up version of the 2mm scale model, a number of extra details have been added to the larger version, arguably making it one of the best modern 'OO' gauge readyto-run wagons on

the market.
Greenbrier's 100t
TEA bogie tankers
entered service in the
early 2000s, owned by wagonleasing company VTG. They have
worked for a range of UK freight
operators over the years, most
notably EWS and, subsequently,
DB Cargo. Employed for the
transit of oil-based commodities,
they have worked across the
country on flows between
refineries and terminals and
are still in use today.

LIVERY VARIETY

These exquisite models have been manufactured

for Revolution by Rapido Trains. There are a variety of liveries on offer and the models

feature a number of

detail differences
across the various
batches, in terms
of the tank filling
hatches, walkways
and discharge
apparatus. The
standard of finish is

very high, with our two livery samples featuring crisply printed logos and labels, with even the tiniest being legible under a magnifier.

The profile of the barrel and underframes appears to be spot on, with plenty of fine detail for the modeller to enjoy. The etched walkways are sublime, as are the complex bogie frames. The underslung discharge pipes and brake gear are also impressive, with plenty of prototypical plumbing installed.

Tension lock couplings slot

into pivoting NEM sockets fixed to the bogie frames, while the sturdy, business-like buffers really look the part, despite not being sprung. Brake hoses are provided to fit into holes in the bufferbeams, along with a spare set of brake handwheels. Also provided is a small sheet of waterslide transfers, featuring VTG logos, alternative TOPS number panels and a variety of safety instruction panels.

### HARD TO FIND FAULT

There's very little to criticise here, with the price offering fantastic value for money in today's bespoke RTR market. Models are available individually or in packs of

three. However, as most of the models were pre-ordered before production began, only a small quantity remain for sale via Revolution Trains' official retailers (see www.revolutiontrains.com for further details).

One negative issue that is worth mentioning is the fact that most of the vertical barrel supports have been installed out-of-true on both of our review samples. These are securely bonded, so rectifying the fit may be tricky, leading to some necessary touching-up of the paintwork. That aside, this is another superb offering from Revolution Trains. Grab them while you can! (GD)

t's almost churlish to criticise but there's a certain 'sameness' to the current British main line steam scene. Essentially, all you've got to choose from are Eastern Region 4-6-2s or LMS 4-6-0s. But there is one place to go if you fancy something a bit different.

That place is, of course, Ireland. The Railway Preservation Society of Ireland has four main line-registered steam locomotives, which is a superb achievement. Sadly, the 'ticket' of one of its most charismatic 'main liners' - GSWR '101' O-6-0 No. 186 - expired in 2014. That's right, there was an 1879 steam locomotive running on the main line in the British Isles in the 21st century.

The '101' was the most numerous class of locomotive ever built for use in Ireland. They were designed by Great Southern & Western Railway engineer A. MacDonnell, and were a development of John Ramsbottom's 'DX' O-6-0 built for the London & North Western Railway. They were built between 1866 and 1903, with the bulk being completed at Inchicore Works, with Beyer Peacock and Sharp Stewart contributing 20 between them.

The GSWR became part of Great Southern Railways in 1925 and CIÉ in 1945. GSR reclassified the '101s' as 'J15' and CIÉ withdrew the final survivors from stock in 1966, where they'd acted as a strategic reserve after normal steam services finished in 1962.

#### FOR THE REPUBLIC

OO Works has dabbled in the world of Irish steam before, with the GNR(I) 'U' 4-4-0 (MR227) and 'UG' 0-6-0. However, the GNR(I) operated cross-border services; the '101' is OO Works' first steam locomotive purely for the Republic.

The first thing that strikes you about the new model is that it's grey. The GSR and CIÉ painted



every part of the locomotive grey, even the smokebox and chimney. Only the red bufferbeams brought any flash of colour to the monotone grey.

Our sample depicts No. 131 in CIÉ condition. Cast cabside numberplates were replaced by large painted numerals and the 'flying snail' emblem appeared on the tender in light green.

OO Works' model portrays the class with saturated boiler and round-topped firebox. Those familiar with No. 186 will note that it has the later, superheated boiler and Belpaire firebox. It also ran with the larger, high-sided tender with inside springs. Happily, the RPSI's second '101', No. 184, is in the same condition as modelled by OO Works.

The model closely matches photographs of the real thing. It has that Victorian look, with a tall, slender chimney, bulbous dome and open cab. The narrow tender, with outside springs, complements the locomotive's antiquated look.

No. 131's 'face' is very convincing, with the right dish to the smokebox door that's complemented by the dog clips and handwheel. The cylinder ends are neatly produced, with lots of crisp rivet detail. However, the gap between it and the

underside of the smokebox does detract from the overall appearance.

The fit and finish of our sample was not quite up to OO Works' usual standards. Ours had a distinct bow to the edges of the running plate and the brake rigging was warped. That said, it's always worth remembering that these are limited edition, hand-made collectables and shouldn't be judged against mass-produced models from Chinese factories.

#### SOLID SPECIMEN

No. 131 is metal throughout, with only the lower handrails made from plastic. Everything feels nicely chunky and solid. You feel confident handling the model as nothing feels as though it will fall off if you breathe on it! There are no mod cons, such as a DCC socket or NEM coupler pockets.

There is space for a decoder to be installed but it has to be hard-wired onto the chassis. However, narrow tension lock couplings are fitted.

No. 131 performed well on our test track. OO Works' new MO5 coreless motor is mounted at 45° inside the firebox. It drives the rear axle via a worm drive and it provides plenty of power, despite being a little growly straight from the box. You need to treat a OO Works model a little differently to mass-produced models, by thoroughly running it in before attaching a heavy train. Our sample quietened down considerably after running in (in both directions) and it handled a rake of nine Bachmann and Hornby bogie coaches with ease.

Aside from a few rough edges, the little '101' is a cracker. One day, Irish Railway Models or Murphy Models might decide to bring us

an all-singing, all-dancing '101'.
We might, hopefully, also see
No. 186 back on the Irish main line
in the not-too-distant future.

But until that time, OO Works' lovely little model keeps the spirit of these handsome Victorian O-6-Os alive. (RF)

# Olivia's Trains/Heljan liquefied gas tanks

he British Oxygen Company's small fleet of 100t tank wagons made for an eye-catching addition to the BR freight scene of the 1970s and 1980s. Running in block trains or as part of Speedlink services, they were a common sight during my teenage 'spotting' days.

Employed to move liquefied gases - predominantly oxygen or nitrogen - from BOC's plants at Middlesbrough and Widnes to various locations around the UK, they could be seen behind a wide range of BR diesel traction, especially Classes 37, 40, 45 and 47. Long-haul services would often be handed over to electric traction, such as Classes 81, 85 or 86, as well as the Class 76 'Bo+Bos' when heading across the Pennines via Woodhead.

My particular memories are of tatty blue '25s' or '40s' moving short rakes of these tankers past Fiddlers Ferry, en route from Tanhouse Lane (Widnes) to Arpley Junction (Warrington), where they would be marshalled into

Speedlink services via the WCML.

In contrast to other contemporary, high-capacity tank wagons, BOC's wagons lacked ladders, walkways and filling hatches on the tank barrels. Instead, loading and discharging of the liquid gases was achieved at ground level, with a large box containing the necessary valves slung between the frames. Unloading was often achieved in goods yards and sidings without the need for special equipment, other than purpose-built road vehicles that would deliver the products to the end user.

## FREIGHT VARIETY

Lasting well into the 1990s, these wagons form an attractive and important modelling subject, hitherto overlooked by RTR manufacturers. Now, thanks to Olivia's Trains and Heljan, 'OO' modellers can now add a little extra variety to their BR-era freight stock.

A raft of livery and detail options is being offered, portraying the vehicles across their entire working careers, from

the early pre-TOPS 1970s period up to their rather drab, unbranded appearance in the late 1990s. The changes to the BOC corporate identity and evolving safety and operating instructions have also been well-observed and there's even the option of a faded mustard yellow horizontal band a distinctive feature of many of the prototypes.

Constructed in 1970 by renowned wagon builder Charles Roberts, these wagons were fitted with air brakes from new. Brake reservoir tanks were carried between the frames, to one side of the discharge equipment box. Some were also fitted with cryogenic equipment at the other end of the frames.

Heljan has replicated these features admirably, where appropriate, and there's also a choice of bogies: either the original Gloucester Mk 1V or the later streamlined GPS units.





Accordingly, the arrangement of brake discs varies across the two types, with the correct layout observed on each model. Both types of bogie are also available separately, being a useful resource for kit-bashers and scratchbuilders, at £16.00 per pair.

With all models, a small bag of detail fittings provides a replacement set of brake handwheels and handrails, brake hoses, drawhooks and a fetching set of decorative Instanter couplings. An alternative set of buffers is also provided, allowing modellers to choose between the early oval style and the more modern clipped rectangular pattern.

Available separately is a sheet of high-quality waterslide transfers (£6.00) to allow for renumbering the wagons, with 24 different sets provided along

with liquid oxygen and liquid nitrogen legends and other, smaller markings.

#### **VERDICT**

The overall profile, dimensions and array of details are accurate and impressively presented, justifying the 'premium' price tag attached to these specially produced models. The level of finish is also high and they certainly make for an appealing sight on a late BR-era layout. The fact that they were often seen in short formations or mixed with other air-braked stock, means that modellers can feel justified in treating themselves to one or two examples.

Olivia's Trains also offers a range of customising options, including weathering, renumbering and even the installation of working tail lamps! *(GD)*

To complement the tank wagons, Olivia's Trains has also commissioned a limited run of Bachmann's VAA four-wheel box van, decorated as a dedicated BOC barrier wagon. These wagons (and others) were initially required to run with the loaded tanks, as the liquefied gases were deemed a hazardous cargo. While the model is attractively turned out, Bachmann's shade of red appears a little



dark when compared to prototype images. Two versions are offered, with an identical livery and different running numbers.

The use of barrier wagons was abandoned during the mid-1980s, so these models are aimed at fans of the 1970s era. At nearly £60 each, modellers will have to be committed to authentic operating practices in order to invest in a pair.

ornby's re-tool of the famous LMS 'Princess Coronation' enabled it to portray variations previously impossible with the existing (2002) tooling. The final two 'Duchesses', built to H.G. Ivatt's specifications, arguably became the most mouth-watering prospects, overshadowing another important stage in the life of

Britain's most powerful express passenger locomotive.

The streamlined 'Duchesses' may have caught the eye and grabbed news headlines, but the 'bathtub' casing was a nightmare to work with. It made access to the motion and sandboxes difficult for shed staff and footplate crew and, worse

still, it became a rust trap. The difficulties faced during wartime sealed the casing's fate.

No. 6235 City of Birmingham emerged from the works in the spring of 1946 without streamlining. All its streamlined classmates followed and No. 46243 City of Lancaster became the last in May 1949.

You could instantly tell a de-streamlined 'Duchess' from a non-streamlined one: the front of the smokebox sloped downwards, a legacy of the old streamlined shape. Enthusiasts nicknamed the de-streamlined locomotives 'Semis'.

Two new Hornby 'Semis' arrived in the *Model Rail* 





office within days of each other: No. 6241 *City of Edinburgh* in 1946 LMS black and No. 46225 *Duchess of Gloucester* in BR blue.

Both are very impressive models and match the high standards set by non-streamlined No. 6231 *Duchess of Atholl* in our review in January 2018. There's no point in going over the same ground so, instead, we'll focus on the differences the 'Semis' bring.

The most obvious starting place is the smokebox. Hornby's design team have done an excellent job in capturing the distinctive shape and the model's slightly squashed face is very convincing.

There were other 'tells' to identify a de-streamlined 'Duchess'. There was no drop frame between the front platform and the running plate. This was the 'utility' front end.

The tenders were also distinctive, with wings that extended beyond the rear plate.

There were two filler lids too, and a ladder, and Hornby has got this correct, along with the utility front end. However, the angled brackets to the tender wings should be beefier.

#### BRIGHT AND STYLISH

No. 46225 looks resplendent in BR's blue livery, which it carried between August 1950 and January 1955. Colour images of this period are rare but the shade of blue on this model looks right, and the lining and other printing is beautifully applied.

You might assume that the LMS black livery, introduced in 1946 as an austerity measure, could be rather drab. But when you see it in the flesh, you don't realise how much maroon is in it and, when combined with the straw and maroon letters and numbers, how bright and stylish it is. Admirably, Hornby's No. 6241 gives a taste of this.

It carried this livery from February 1947, until repainted in an experimental dark blue scheme by BR in May 1948. Again, photographs of this period are comparatively rare and there are no images of No. 6241 in John Jennison's A Detailed History of the Stanier Pacifics (RCTS).

Footholds were fitted to the smoke deflectors between 1946 and 1948, and it's likely that No. 6241 had them when in LMS black. What it wouldn't have had, however, were the larger cab spectacles as modelled.

The streamlined 'Duchesses' had smaller spectacles than their non-streamlined sisters and these were retained when the casings were removed. The larger-style spectacles, Jennison says, were fitted to the class between 1950 and 1952.

The 'Duchesses' were some of the most imposing-looking

steam locomotives built for Britain. Hornby's model really captures that look, and this pair of 'Semis' adds an excellent new string to an already impressive bow. *(RF)*

## **The Guest Chairman**

Trevor Edmead of Ilford & West Essex Model Railway Club outlines the club's activities - which include running live steam models.

Society: The Ilford & West Essex Model Railway Club Established: 1930
Location: Adjacent to Chadwell Heath railway station, Romford, Essex Chairman: Trevor Edmead

he Ilford & West Essex Model
Railway Club can trace its origins
back to 1930 when a young
gentleman by the name of Ronnie
Riddle advertised for like-minded railway

modellers to attend a meeting in Ilford. The response was encouraging, and the seeds of the Ilford & District Model Railway Club were sown. In February 1935 the West Essex Model Railway Club (which had formed three years earlier) and the Ilford & District MRC were amalgamated to form Ilford & West Essex Model Railway Club. We are currently the fourth oldest model

railway club in the UK.

After the end of the Second World War



the club established its headquarters in Romford, before moving to our present site. This is adjacent to Chadwell Heath railway station and we have been here since 1955. We have a dedicated club room with a kitchen, library (containing over 7,000 books and items of reference) and a workshop mainly used for the 7½in gauge members.

The club is organised into five sections: 'HO', 'N', 'O', 'OO' and our 7¼in gauge railway with live steam locomotives. We have our own annual exhibition, titled 'West Essex Modelrail', and this is normally held over the last weekend in April; our next exhibition is to be held over the weekend of April 27/28

2019 at St Edward's Academy in Romford. In addition, we have an annual 'Showcase' event, held in October, to show the local communities what we are all about.

On the first Sunday of each month, between April and September, we hold open days at our headquarters where we run our live steam 7¼in gauge railway which is fully track circuited and has operational signals controlled from two signal boxes. In addition, we also operate the section layouts within the club room where possible. Our main 7¼in gauge locomotive is called 'Excalibur' and is based on a Urie 'N15' class 'King Arthur' locomotive.

The club has section meetings on Tuesday evenings ('N' and 'OO'), Wednesday evenings ('HO' North American image), Friday evenings ('O') and Wednesday and Sunday mornings (7¼in).

In 2020 we will be celebrating our 90th anniversary and are planning for our 63rd 'West Essex Modelrail' exhibition, which we hope will prove to be a spectacular event.

## **Contain yourself**

Simon Moppett

I found your review of the Bachmann FFA/FGA Freightliner flats (MR255) extremely interesting.

In the early 1970s, my first train set was the Hornby Freightmaster with the addition of the Freightliner bogie wagon. It was OK for its time and after a while I found out they ran in sets of five, but it was only recently that I came to realise that the sets only had buffers and couplings on the outer ends!

Although Beeching realised that road transport was taking away wagon-load rail traffic, and did a better job of door-to-door deliveries, road haulage was very different in those days. There weren't as many 40-foot articulated

lorries, and a lot of long-distance haulage was done with multi-axle rigids. This is why there were so many 20-foot Freightliner containers, as trains were expected to be used for long distance, while lorries did the collection and delivery. The 60-foot wagons were ideal for this.

But container usage was driven more by worldwide shipping practice, and the increasing use of 40-foot containers arriving at our ports had grown – along with the size of the ships serving them. Now it is not unusual to stand at Banbury station and watch our negative balance of trade heading north in nothing but 40-foot containers on 60-foot wagons.



## The wetter the better



## Present your case

If there's a locomotive that you think needs to be offered ready-to-run, here's the place to voice your opinion...

Locomotive: Tyne & Wear Metro Unit

**Gauge:** '00'

Proposed by: Neil Crombie, Wirral

#### What is it?

The Tyne & Wear Metro is an oft-overlooked system, despite the fact that it moves 37 million people a year on its near-50 miles of track. It's Britain's second largest metro system, combining very historic parts of the railway with new stretches of line. What London Overground achieved in the 21st century, Tyneside Passenger Transport Authority did in the 1970s!

It's hard to believe that the Metro is 38 years old (the first part opened in August 1980) and yet its distinctive trains have only appeared in 'OO' gauge in the form of an old Dave Alexander kit. They were built by Metropolitan Cammell but based on a German design. Prototypes 4001 and 4002 were delivered in 1975, with 4003-4090 following between 1978 and 1981. They're still in service, having been modified and refurbished a few times since. How many other train fleets can claim the same?



#### What would make it viable?

I believe these units would be a popular and viable model as they're unusual and different to every other multiple unit previously offered.

The original units have been in service for nearly 40 years and are suitable for layouts set in the 1980s up to the present day. A number of liveries are available, from the original Tyne & Wear scheme up to the present day livery.

The units are not confined to the Tyne & Wear Metro system, they also run on Network Rail lines (they're Class 994 on TOPS) to enable the extension of the system to Sunderland. Also, in the 1980s, British Rail ran freight services on part of the Tyne & Wear Metro network and this could widen the scope for potential layouts. There are many models that can be operated alongside these units.

#### Can I see a real one?

All 90 two-car sets still survive, although at the time of writing only 88 are in service. They've been fully refurbished and you can see them operating every day of the week, all over the Sunderland and Newcastle area. You've still got a bit of time to enjoy them too, as they're not planned for replacement until 2024.

What is Britain's most spectacular railway journey? I'd like to chuck my tuppence worth into the mix by suggesting the Welsh Highland Railway.

I'd always shied away from travelling on the WHR. It's not a cheap day out and, having driven from Caernarvon to Porthmadog many times, I always felt that I'd seen the area from the car - and that I'd rather travel on the Ffestiniog instead.

But a rather wet week in North Wales in October presented the opportunity to tick the WHR off the list. I'm so glad I did because it's just spectacular.

I hadn't realized just how much of Snowdonia you see from the train that you'd miss by car. The visual treats are almost endless: the steep rock cuttings at Nantmor, the Aberglaslyn Pass, the horseshoe curves around Beddgelert... and that's before you get to the foothills of Snowdon between Rhyd Ddu and Waunfawr. Factor in a short stretch of street running and a flat-crossing over
