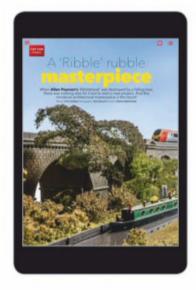

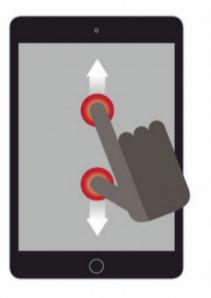

I always describe a model railway as a threedimensional painting. We really ought to consider ourselves as artists as, like Constable, we recreate inspirational scenes but in plastic and wood, rather than oils or watercolours.

The best artists – and I use the term to

include actors, film-makers and musicians – always have distinctive 'tells'. Painting experts will be able to identify a painter just from the use of tones and textures, or even brush strokes. And the same can be true of model railway builders.

If anyone has created a unique modelling style it's Chris Nevard. He's given rise to the adjective 'Nevardesque'.

Chris' techniques for success are deceptively simple but still require an artistic eye that not everyone has (I certainly don't). So, in this special issue, we've challenged Chris to build a layout using off-the-shelf parts – Peco Code 100 sectional track, resin buildings and suchlike. As you'll see on p28, how Chris blends these items together is truly inspirational.

Even if you don't like laying your own track or scratchbuilding, you too can now build a Nevardesque layout. Learning Chris' secrets will enable you to hone your own skills. I can't wait to put Chris' ideas into practice on my own projects.

ACCURASCALE HAS ITALL CONTAINED!

ccurascale has announced the launch of its next 'OO' gauge UK-outline model, the PFO12A PFA four-wheeled container flat. The CAD design is complete and the tooling is almost finalised.

Accurascale's model of this versatile wagon will have a die-cast chassis for weight, with separate sprung buffers and provision made for easy conversion to 'EM' and 'P4'. Multiple configurations will also be available, enabling modellers to depict the diversity of the service. Plenty of different container bodies will be available in multi-packs.

Cawoods Coal wagons will be catered for, as will the bright orange British Fuels containers. Two different gypsum containers in two different liveries will also be offered for British Gypsum traffic, and there will be two packs of DRS flats carrying low-level radioactive waste vessels and a separate pack of empty DRS flats which are used as barrier vehicles.

These will all come in packs of

three wagons, with different identities and multiple packs available, allowing appropriate rakes to be built. The price for each pack is £69.95 and is available direct from Accurascale. Pre-ordering is now open with a delivery date of July 2019. These diminutive flats entered service in 1986 on the Cawoods Coal containerised trains, which ran from collieries across England and Wales to ports in the North West for onward shipment to Ireland. In the early 1990s some of these wagons were allocated to British Fuels and ran to various destinations between the North of England and Scotland. The PFAs continued in service after privatisation, carrying domestic coal traffic, but were also used to carry special gypsum containers for British Gypsum, and are still in service today, carrying low-level nuclear waste for DRS.

















NEW FROM BACHMAN

Bachmann Europe revealed several new models in its Members Lounge, an exclusive area for Bachmann Collectors Club members at the London Festival of Railway Modelling, held at Alexandra Palace on March 23/24. These include the Branchline '94XX', the Branchline Midland 1532 ('1P') and the Graham Farish refurbished Class 31, all of which are at the engineering prototype stage, and a narrow gauge 'Quarry Hunslet', which is at the 3D-print stage of production.

Also announced at the exhibition was a new Collectors Club limited edition model, the 'OO' gauge Class 57 57307 Lady Penelope in DRS 'Cable Thieves: We're Watching You' livery. This model can be pre-ordered by club members now.

The 'N' gauge Class 08 Diesel Shunter as No. 878 Basra in Longmoor Military Railway livery is now available to members. The model (below) is priced at £109.95 and just 504 have been produced, each supplied with a certificate of authenticity. For further details visit www.bachmann-collectors club.co.uk

CAVALEX ANNOUNCES NEW '91' AND Mk 4s

avalex Models hasn't rested on its laurels now that its first ready-to-run wagon is in stock... it's announced one new locomotive, a range of coaches and two new wagons, and each will be available in both 'OO' and 'N' gauges.

Star billing goes to an all-new Class 91 electric and a range of Mk 4 coaches, to comprise Standard, First, Buffet and Driving Van

As for the wagons, CAD design work is nearly complete on the new TEA tank. Cavalex is to produce the TEA built at Standard Wagon works with Gloucester GPS25 bogies for Total Oil in the late 1980s. Two batches were built (numbers 85930-944 and 85960-974) and they're still in service, although four have been converted to KBA barrier wagons for moving London Underground S-Stock to and from Derby. Last but not least is the PHA bogie hopper built for Bardon Hill Quarries. WH Davis built 50 wagons in two distinct batches (30 in 1986-88 and a further 20 in 1990).

According to Chris...

His grandchildren call him 'Granddad Trains' and he's been a dedicated railway modeller since the 1960s but, despite popular legend, **Chris Leigh** doesn't remember when dinosaurs roamed the Earth!



hen you work with an editor for any length of time, he'll know exactly what topics excite you. Richard Foster certainly does

- that's why I'm writing this at home on a Saturday evening!

He asked me to write a Masterclass about the farewell bash for the GWR 'Castle' 4-6-0s on May 9 1964. If the following sounds familiar, you've watched James Cameron's *Titanic* too many times.*

It's been 55 years, yet I can still remember it as if it were yesterday...

It was the culmination of some weeks of excitement, eavesdropping on conversations and chatting with my colleague David Percival, and *Model Railway Constructor* Editor Alan Williams. I'd been with *MRC* as the office junior for less than six months. Much of my time was spent as a messenger boy between the Shepperton office, to which we had just moved, and the Fleet Street office of *Modern Transport*, which Ian Allan had recently taken over. So I missed a lot of office 'chat'.

Even so, it was clear, early in 1964, that something big was being planned. The foyer on the ground floor of Terminal House at Shepperton was partly given over to a new travel agency which one of Mr Allan's friends, H.T.S. 'Trevor' Bailey was running. 'Trevor', a leading light in the Festiniog Railway Society and an avid railway enthusiast, was the



contact between Ian Allan Ltd and British Railways. He organized and ran the railtours and depot visits for the Ian Allan

Locospotters Club which, at its height, had over 300,000 members.

Trevor was also a very nice gentleman, who was always on the lookout for helpers on the railtours. He couldn't ask magazine editors to traipse up and down the train selling magazines. He could, however, invite the office junior to do so, and that is how I (aged 17) and my 14-year-old brother, Roger, came to be on 'The Great Western' Paddington-Plymouth high-speed run on May 9 1964.

We were both armed with our Kodak Brownie 44A cameras, mine loaded with colour film and Roger's with black and white. Once the train left Paddington, we had no chance to use our cameras, however. Based in the leading brake van, behind the tender of 4079, we worked our way up and down the seven coaches with armfuls of IA publications.

The story of that epic day is told in Masterclass on p54, but here I just want to try and give a glimpse of the atmosphere on board and the rollercoaster of emotions we rode that day. I've long thought it was interesting that the route shown on the tickets was 'via Lavington', a very minor station, and it was at Lavington that disaster struck. Here, we ground to a halt, No. 4079's grate having been melted by the heat of the fire.

The rest of the down run really passed by in a blur. I tried to go forward at Westbury to see the engine change but there was such a throng on the platform that I soon abandoned the idea. I was successful at Taunton for the next engine change, when No. 7025 Sudeley Castle took over. I enjoyed the run along the Teignmouth sea wall and over the South

Devon banks from the comfort of a seat (and with a full lunch). Several of the Western Region top brass relinquished their seats so that staff without allocations could sit and have lunch. Cold meat and salad with new potatoes has been a favourite ever since.

At Plymouth, several of us elected to take a ride across to Saltash, over the Royal Albert Bridge. Disappointingly it was by DMU.

Travelling from Plymouth back to Bristol with No. 7029 *Clun Castle* was the undoubted high spot of the day. What's more, we had done as much selling as we could and we were now able to enjoy the ride, sharing a droplight window with two or three others. 'Exhilarating' is the best description. Laira driver Harry Roach knew exactly how to get the best out of 'Clun' and putting one's head

out of the window in order to take pictures

was painful. I managed just one.

Some of the atmosphere was lost after 5054 took over at Bristol. On the train an arrogant bunch were shooting a documentary, *The Steaming Ton*, for BBC2. It was no longer 'our' train and to top it all they fudged the claimed 'ton', despite the fact that 5054 reached no higher than the low 90s. Black smoke betrayed problems on the footplate and it proved impossible to maintain full boiler pressure.

That was disappointing, but nothing could diminish the elation at having been part of that day. Sadly, for Trevor, the subsequent accusations by some – that it had all been a put-up job and that the change of engines at Westbury and Taunton was all planned – were deeply hurtful. Nevertheless, a year later he had a restored No. 4079 at Paddington for an IA railtour to Worcester and Swindon. But that, as they say, is another story.

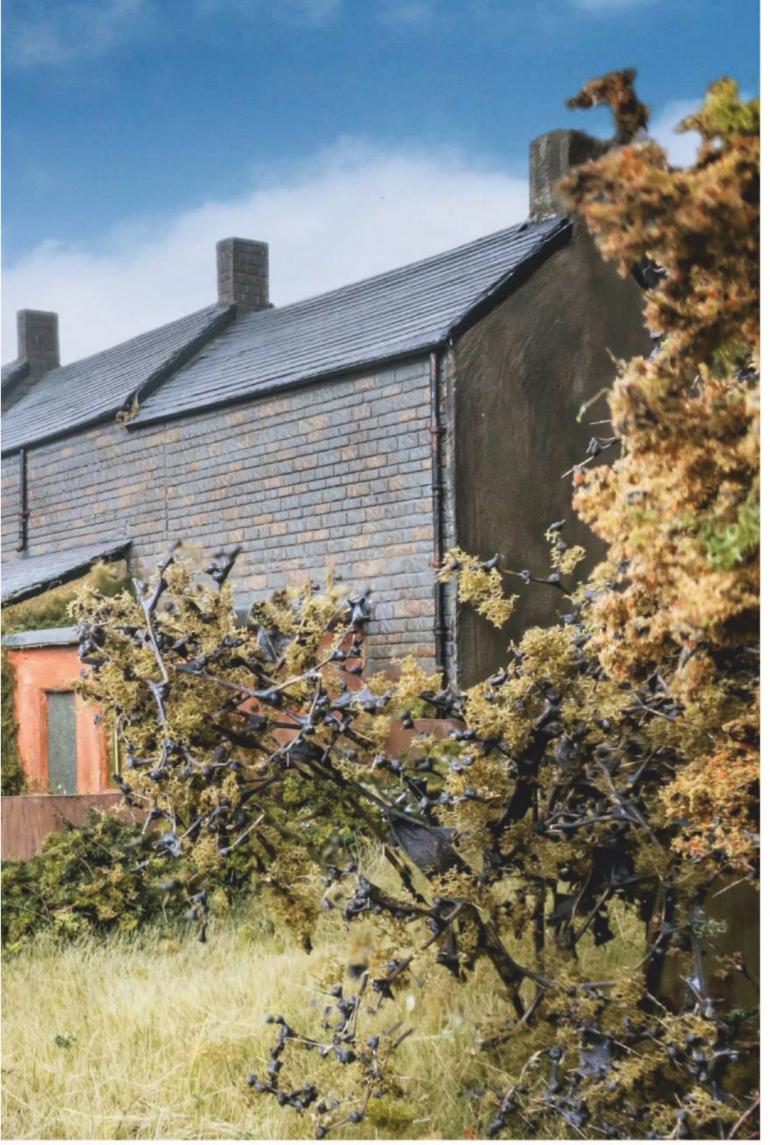




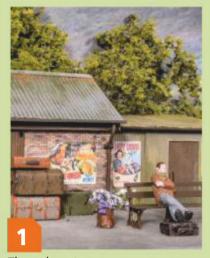

Phil's layout is based around his childhood in the 1950s. There's no working from photographs here though – he's recreated the scene from memory.

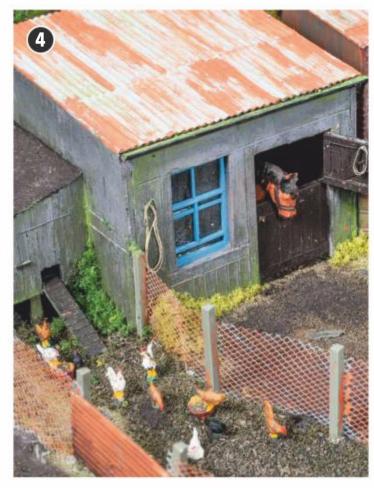
"The street is a replica of the one I lived on as a child, with an Anderson shelter left over from the war turned into a café, something I have portrayed on 'Pen Y Bryn'. As per the prototype, the backs of the houses have no windows and each has different



What makes this layout great?

It's been worked on for a quarter of a century, so it's no surprise that 'Pen Y Bryn' is highly polished. The atmosphere is perfect and you really feel as though you are one of the pit workers as the long rakes of wagons pass by.

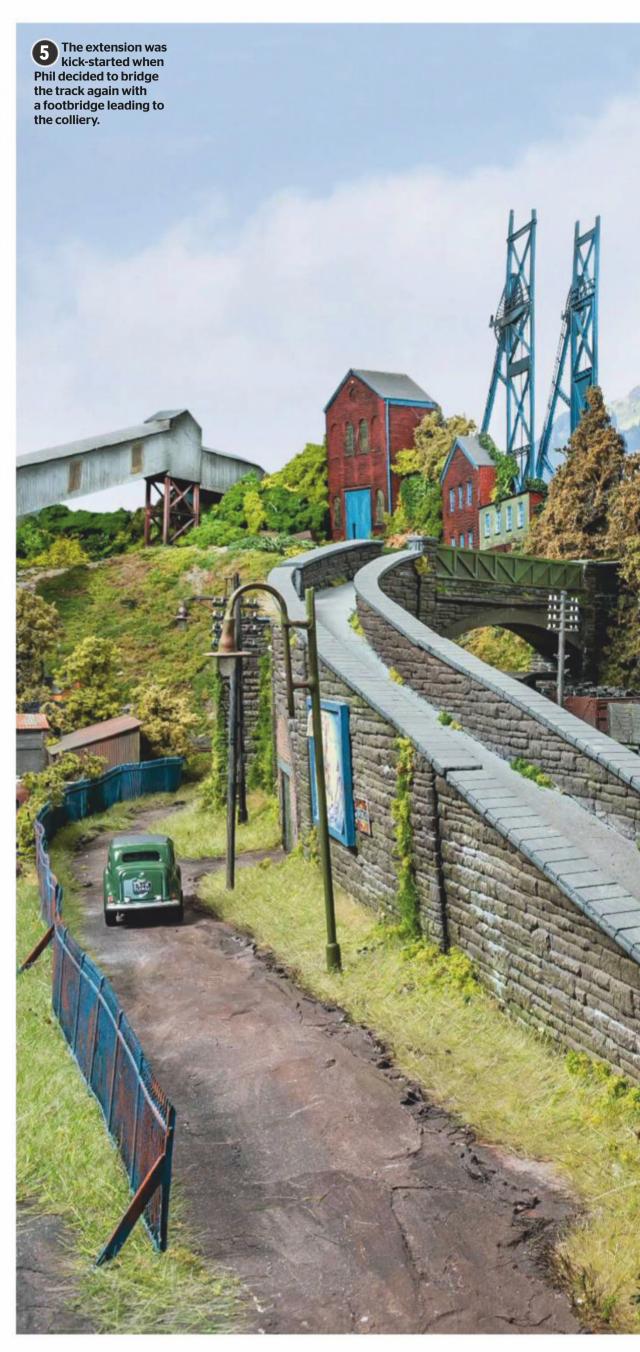




coloured doors and window frames. They were pit houses, so their design was as simple as possible and designed to make maximise use of the available space. The stairs, for example, were curved in the corner of a room so as not to take away from the downstairs living area. The result was that if a new bed was delivered, the front window would have to be removed to get it in!"

Scratchbuilt from Wills stone sheet and Polyfilla, the houses are the dominant feature of this extension but the intricate detail outside them is really what brings the area to life. Phil has accurately depicted the pavement, complete with a stopcock outside each house and drains running across the pavement, so that water leaving the

At one end of the street there are some derelict cars and a smallholding, while at the other end there's an abandoned lorry and a large pile of rubbish. This took Phil a long time to model but was one of his favourite parts of the whole build.

"A lot of fiddly, intricate work has gone into each car. I've used jeweller's saws and a very small drill to remove the bonnet and headlights, and to open the doors, boot and sunroof, but they are very easy tools to break. Fortunately I've been using them for years so I managed to carry out the work without mishap. Once the parts were removed, it was just a case of stripping the paint, making it look rusty and adding dents. This was done with a drill on the roof to replicate the effect of children jumping on the truck's cab. The large pile of

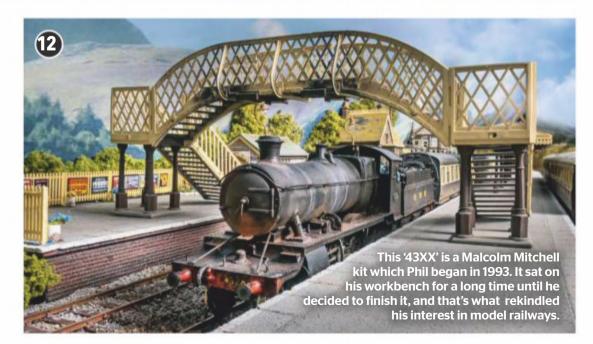


rubbish is just a random assortment of bits and pieces from my spares box."

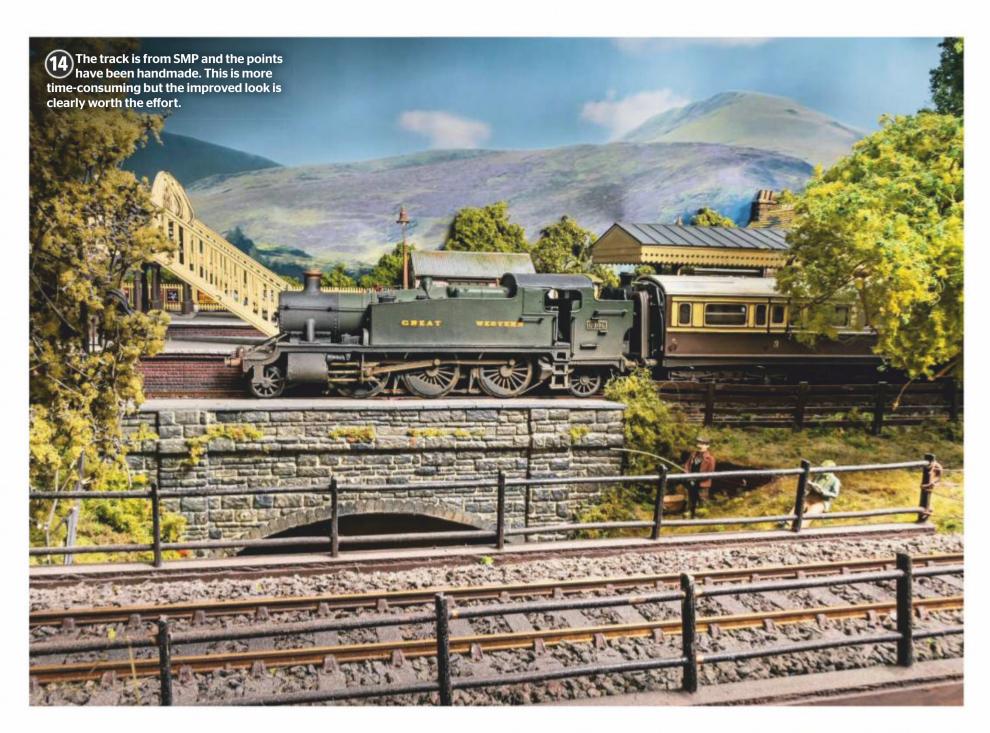
A PINCH OF SALT

It isn't just the right-hand side that has been given a makeover. The passenger station is also new and the platform has been renovated, including some rather interesting flowers...

"I couldn't find anything to make the flowers look right. The 'OO' gauge ones could easily look at home on an 'O' gauge layout, and the same with 'N' gauge for 'OO', but I didn't like these. After struggling to find anything suitable I decided to make my own using salt. After bashing it into a powder I added dyes of different colours and waited for it to dry. The dye makes it go a bit clumpy, so I bashed it down again and sprinkled the coloured salt inside the hanging baskets and the







tubs on the platform. I used a similar technique with the lineside flowers, cutting off individual bristles from a paintbrush before dipping them into diluted PVA and then the dye."

WHERE THERE'S MUCK...

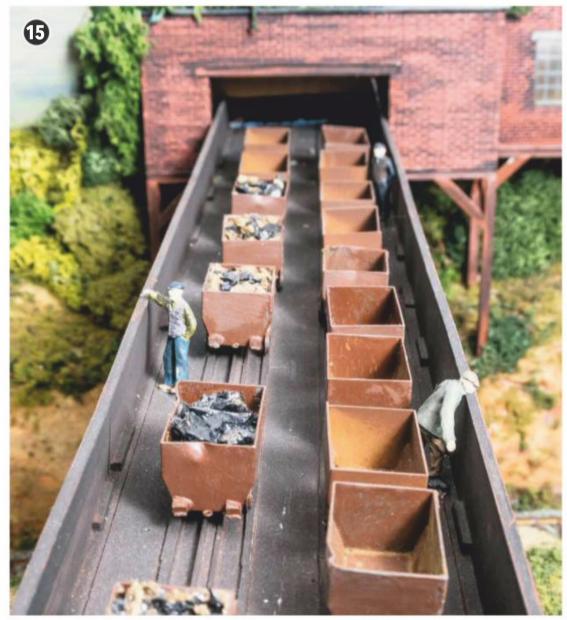
Having once worked as a painter at Ogilvie and Oakdale collieries, getting the right mining town atmosphere wasn't difficult for Phil, and working there allowed him to make some very accurate trams.

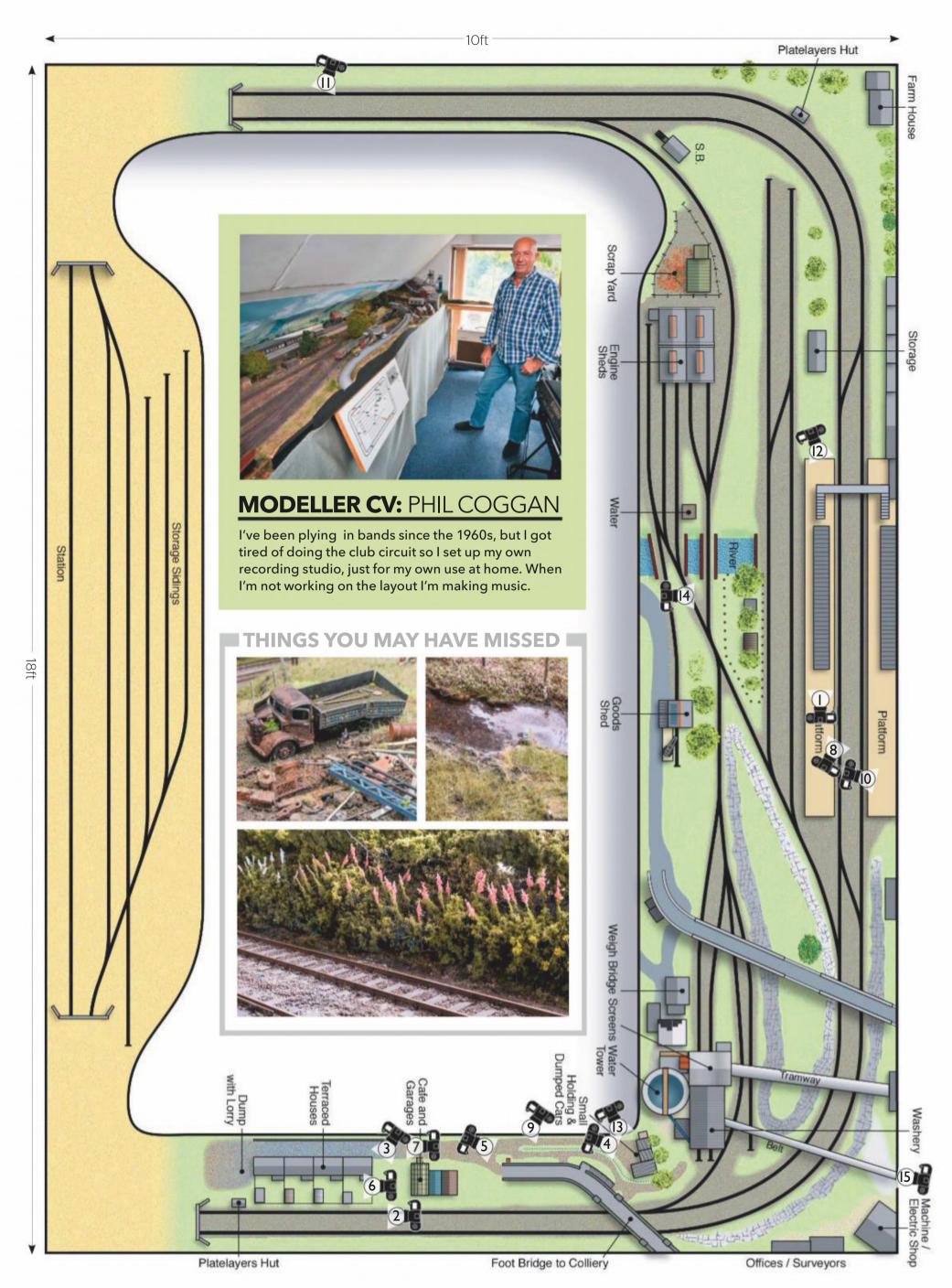
"I took the opportunity to measure them while I was working at the collieries and gave the measurements to my brother who drew plans and found a company that etched them in sheet brass. There are around 30 on the layout, with more than 20 of those on the tramway. Each one had to be soldered together – I could only do a few at a time before it got tedious!"

So what's next for 'Pen Y Bryn'? Phil is already contemplating the potential scenic options on the other side of the layout, which include plans for a small dock. As for the fiddleyard, that's likely to stay as it is for now.

"There's one simple but large problem with the fiddleyard and that is access. I have two mixing desks in the way ('Pen Y Bryn' shares the space with Phil's recording studio), so it's really difficult to reach the back of it. I enjoy doing the scenery more than operating the trains though, so nothing has been run for about a year now."

Even though there's nothing moving, 'Pen Y Bryn' contains plenty of interesting detail, from the intricate details on the platform to the simple yet characterful houses of the pit workers. It may be fictitious, but the impression it makes is very real.

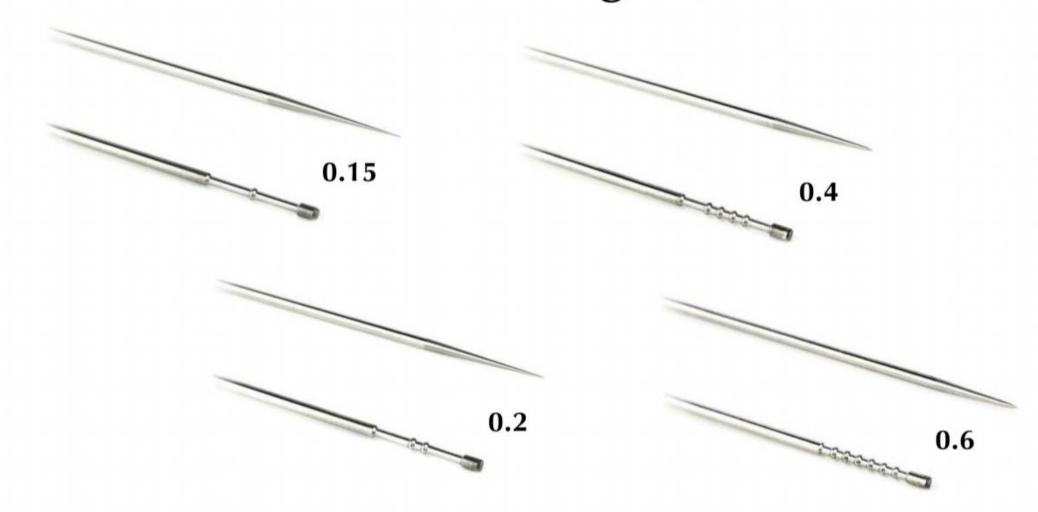

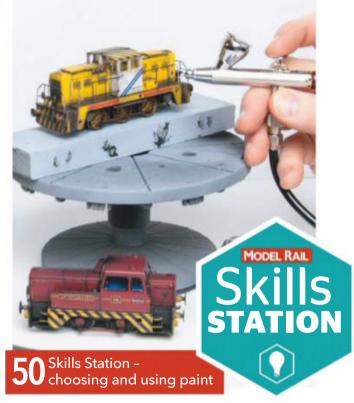

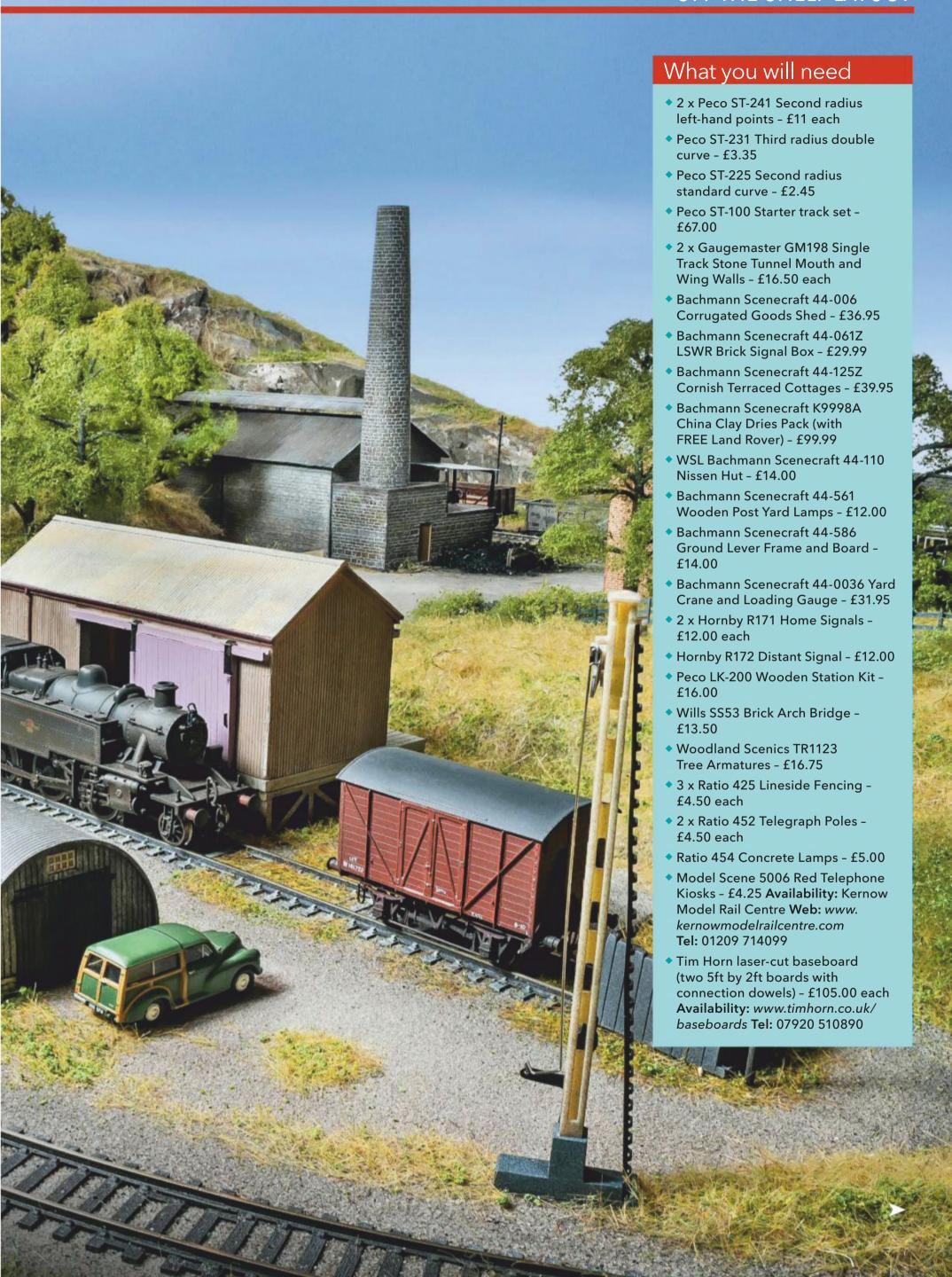

BASEBOARDS AND TRACK

No matter the size of your layout you will need a baseboard. A good baseboard is essential for a good layout. It forms the foundations for your track and, if it's not right, your layout will be plagued by Apply the ballast poor running and derailments. after spraying the It used to be that a trip to the track to provide timber merchants was the only a better contrast option, but if you aren't between ballast and confident with your woodworking skills this could be the first stumbling block. Thankfully, several companies now produce laser-cut baseboards to bespoke

sizes. All the modeller has to do is screw them together and add some glue to secure the joints. I've used plenty of

Tim Horn baseboards in the past and this project is no different. I bought two 5ft by 2ft laser-cut baseboards. They weren't cheap, with each one costing £105, but they are very easy to put together and, crucially for this project, fast. I also got some connection

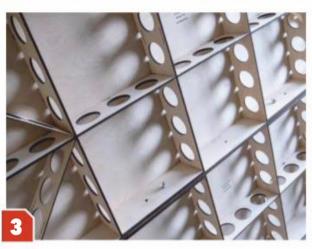
dowels with the boards so that I could put the two together to make an overall baseboard of 5ft by 4ft.



The Tim Horn baseboard comes in many parts! The supporting crossbeams have holes in them, partly to reduce the weight but also to give you somewhere to thread wires through when the board is assembled.



It is a good idea to keep a damp cloth handy while building to wipe away any excess glue. Use weights and other objects to keep the join solid and keep the beams square to the baseboard top.



Extra pieces of wood are supplied for the panels that will have the connecting dowels on them. This provides support, and I used clamps to ensure a sound join. With the boards connected it looks a bit like a cheese grater!



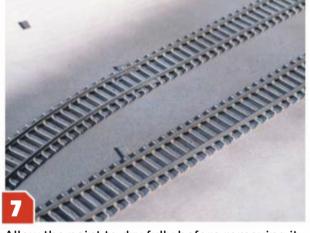
Lay your track onto the baseboard and test it BEFORE you glue anything down - you don't want a curve to be too sharp and cause derailments. I also roughly positioned some of the buildings to get an idea of the layout.



I used EverBuild industrial grade cyanoacrylate to fix the track. It has a setting time of between 5 and 15 seconds, and wetting the wood will speed up the setting time. Spread it under the sleepers and leave to dry.



Cover the whole track bed with Halfords grey primer and then with camouflage paint. Do this before ballasting, otherwise your ballast and sleepers will be the same colour. Doing them seperately gives a much better overall look.



Allow the paint to dry fully before removing it from the tops of the rails. If it is still slightly wet you may get small clumps of it bonding together as you clean the rails. Once the track is clean, test it before you add the ballast.



Sand was used instead of ballast and you can see the difference in colour between that and the sleepers. The wood will be covered to hide the grain, but it does make it easier to see where the ballast finishes when it's a different colour.



Smother the track and ballast with surgical spirit, then diluted PVA. The spirit helps the PVA to soak through and it dries clear. Knowing that this was going to be moved and it could get knocked, I made sure it was firmly in place.



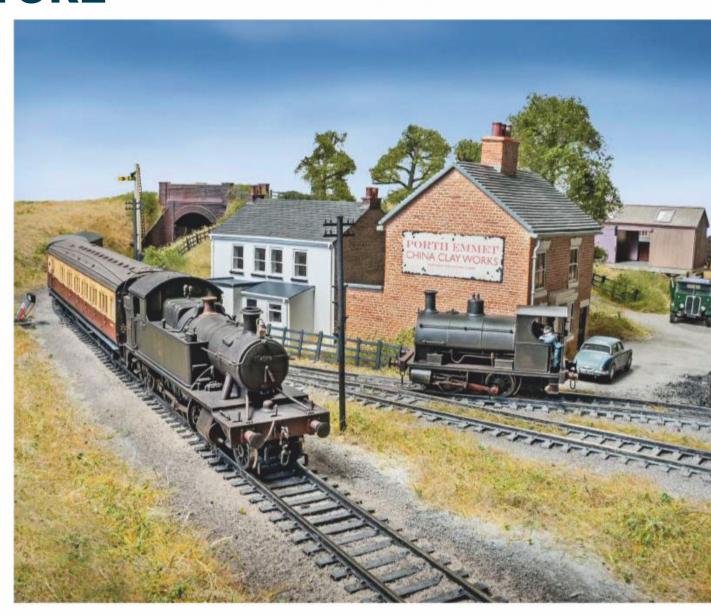
Use a jigsaw to cut the fascia panels for any hillsides. These will provide a surface to which the landscape former can be glued and can also be painted for a better finish. I used light grey, applied with a roller, to get an even finish.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Obviously, model railways are built in a different way to the real thing. When building a model, the track laying comes first, as I have done with this layout. However, in real life the buildings and roads come first and the railway is fitted in afterwards. The town might then grow around the station, but it is always worth planning ahead and considering the space you have available. A common mistake is to fill your baseboard with track and only have space for one or two buildings, the result being that your layout looks as though a major station has tiny a hamlet around it.

I opted for a small goods yard and a single platform, with roads exiting the scene at strategic points to create the impression of a flow of traffic. There are only six buildings at 'Porth Emmet' (seven if you include the Nissen hut), which is more than enough to populate the layout without overcrowding it. In keeping with the theme of this project, I took off-the-shelf products and modified them to suit my needs.

The feature of the layout is Bachmann Scenecraft's China Clay Dries Pack (which comes with a free model Land Rover). The clay dries was to be just off-centre in the middle of the baseboard and was placed straight on the layout 'as is'. However, the station building, road bridge and signal box received further treatment.





The Peco wooden station is a good kit but, as it says on the box, it combines laser-cut parts and injection mouldings. They are mass-produced so they're all the same, but there are simple ways of adding some individuality.



A coat of paint goes a long way to altering the appearance. Here I've painted the windows and the wood using Halfords spray paint and filler primer and added era-specific posters which are supplied, but you could print your own.



I contacted Kernow Model Rail Centre, which came up with the layout name of 'Porth Emmet'. With this decided, I made a number of signs in Photoshop in the appropriate Southern livery for use at the station and on the signal box.



Glue the signs onto some plastic card and trim with a sharp knife and a steel rule. Plastiweld soaks through the paper and melts the plastic without disrupting the ink. This can then be fixed to the signal box with a suitable adhesive.



The sign helps bring the signal box to life. Sticking tufts of grass to the base of the box will hide the gap between the bottom of it and the landscape, planting it onto the layout more effectively.



Sometimes even the most simple of tools will produce a great effect. From normal viewing distance the dots created on the china clay dries sign make it look as though part of it has come off when exposed to the elements.

LANDSCAPING



Everyone wants their layout to look good, but it's easy to forget that before you can start applying grass and flowers everywhere you need to carefully think about the lay of the land. As we know, railways have to be on the flat or, at most, on a very slight incline, so the landscape was altered to accommodate for this. It was raised, lowered, bridged over and tunnelled through. You need to replicate this on your model railway, and for that you will need something to shape it. There are many materials available, such as rolled-up newspaper and a lattice former, but I prefer carving the landscape from foam insulation, especially when creating sheer rock faces, as I am doing here. Insulation foam's 'crumbly' nature gives a great jagged edge finish. It is important to work in a well-ventilated era and to wear a face mask when working with foam.





Always start with the biggest pieces and work your way down. Position bridges and tunnels first so that you carve out the right shape. Crucially, don't forget to make a hole through which the trains can pass!



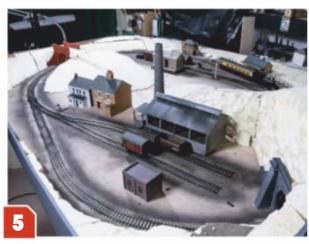
If you're featuring a long tunnel, make sure you leave an access point - if something is going to de-rail it's sure to do so at the least accessible point. Weighting down the foam while the glue sets will also be beneficial.



To create layers of rock faces cut the foam into slices and then lay them on top of each other imperfectly. An old bread knife is ideal for this job. Be rough with your slicing - you want to create the impression of 'natural' imperfection.



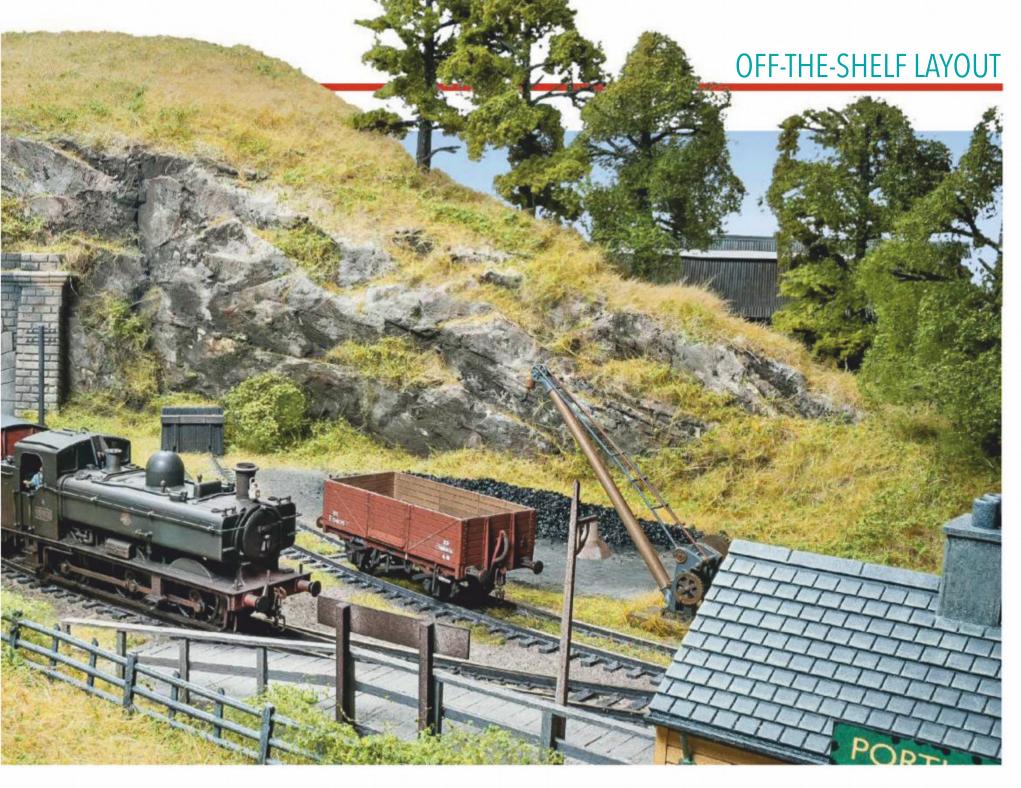
You can use real rocks on the ground to simulate rock that has fallen off the cliff face, or stuck back on to make the face more uneven. Before you alue things down, check that your trains will have enough clearance.



Continue shaping the foam all around your layout, adding it wherever you want something that isn't flat. Make it as shallow or as dramatic as you like but be careful not to make anything that will make your layout implausible.



With the base landscape in place it's time to add strength and provide a surface to attach your scenery to. I used Mod Roc which, when fixed to the foam, will set rock hard and provide a solid structure for your scenery.





Before applying the Mod Roc, flatten out any areas that need smoothing using plaster and a knife. By smooth areas, I mean places such as platforms, walkways and roads, which shouldn't feature any car-sized potholes!



Place small sheets of the Mod Roc over the foam and brush on diluted PVA. Make sure you overlap the sheets to ensure you cover the whole area. Leave it overnight to set fully before proceeding with the rest of the build.



This is an overview of the layout with all of the Mod Roc in place. Note how areas of bare rock face have been left as foam because I want to paint straight onto the rough surface without it being smoothed.



With the Mod Roc set I could begin painting. The rock face was given an initial coat of dark grey matt paint to stop any of the light yellow showing through. The foam will absorb some of the paint and prevent it from dripping.



The ground in the same region will be the same type, be it clay, granite etc, so it's a good idea to cover the whole layout in the same shade, just in case you change your mind about covering an area, so it doesn't look incongruous.



To create highlights in the rocks, and to avoid them all being a uniform colour, I used a Crown tester pot of 'toasted almond' shade alongside a mix of browns, lightly brushed into areas of interest and angles to simulate erosion.

SCENERY

This section covers laying ground cover and making trees, which will be necessary for almost any layout build.

Effective scenery often makes the difference between a good layout and a great layout. Creating a realistic scene requires as much thought as laying your track. Fail to plan properly and you'll end up with trees that look out of place, and roads that make unnaturally sharp turns to circumnavigate obstacles. Use a pen and write onto the layout where you plan everything to go to make sure that it is viable. Remember that any mark you make will be covered by the scenery in the end anyway.



I'm going to start with the rock face around the tunnel. The council can't get up here to maintain it, so the grass grows wild and long. To cover large areas quickly, use hanging basket liner that you can cut with scissors to shape.





Use PVA to glue the hanging basket liner in place but don't just glue it randomly. Look at photographs and you will notice that more grass grows on flat surfaces than vertical ones. Time taken here will result in a much better look.



The liner was bought from my local garden centre although, as you can see, it is only designed to fit a basket with a 16in diameter. If you have a large layout or a country scene, as I do, you may well need more than one bag!



An old toothbrush flicked with a thumb will spread PVA on for the static grass. These varying lengths will reduce the uniform appearance and provide a great surface area to which the scatter will stick.



I used a Noch static grass machine to add some fibres here and there to give an undulating effect. The glue will dry clear and the tips of the fibres will hold firm. It's nearly time to add scatter material.



Here all the desired areas have been covered in the liner to give the impression of wild grass. In this country scene these areas wouldn't have received much maintenance. The knotted and messy nature of the liner makes it ideal for this.



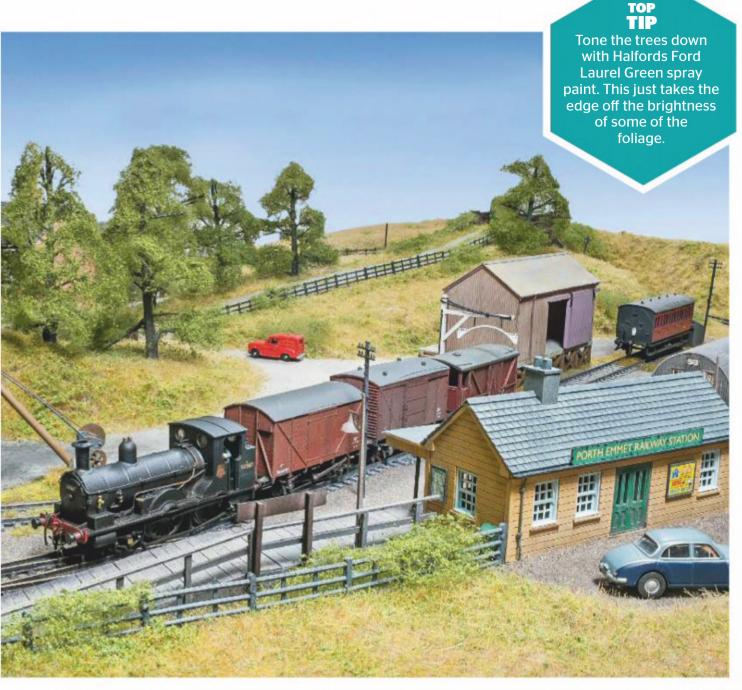
Using grass around the base of buildings will 'plant' the fibres much more effectively, and eliminate the gap between the building and the ground. Use different methods, as it will look strange if every building has a 'grass skirt'!



In this image you can see the difference between the various shades. This emulates the small wild bushes that you find beside rural lines. Place blobs of PVA glue down first to help the scatter material to stick.



With the grass laid you can begin to add the scatter material. Again, I used a range of different shades to add variation to the layout. Using a variety of colours will make it look more realistic.







With the ground cover completed I could begin on the trees. These are Woodland Scenics armatures which are delivered flat but can be bent into a 3D shape. Set them up using a 'production line' process to speed things up.



Cut the bases off the sprues. These won't be used as they are far too big and unprototypical, I much prefer to make a hole and stick the trunk straight into the ground. Don't throw the bases away though, they will be useful in a moment.



Glue the bases to a piece of scrap wood and push the trunk into the base. This means you can work without picking them up and getting glue on your fingers. Use a paintbrush to apply it, focusing on the top sides of the branches.



I used a mix of Woodland Scenics foliage and polyfibre on the trees so that they wouldn't all look the same. The fibre is more diaphanous once you've teased it out so bear this in mind if you're using trees as a view-blocker.



Once the initial coating of foliage was on I added more PVA and used scatter material to fill the gaps. This blended the trees into the scenery because it makes sense that some of the ground cover is leaves that have fallen from trees.



You can do this in one of two ways: sprinkle the scatter onto the tree or dip the tree into a bag of scatter. Both will work the same way but you will have more control if you sprinkle it on yourself. The downside is that it takes longer.

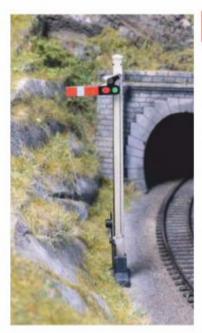

FINAL TOUCHES

With the scenery in place it's time for the fun bit - turning your layout into a realistic miniature scene by adding all the finishing touches. Take a look around the railway near you (from a safe distance!). There are probably lineside poles, disused sleepers and rubbish lying about. If you are modelling a relatively modern scene then signal wiring and cable trunking will be everywhere. Point rodding will be present as well. Where there are signal cables there will also be signals, and getting the right level of detail is key. As with everything, it is easy to overdo things. If you are unsure, fix your accessories in place with some Deluxe Materials Tacky Wax - that way you can remove them if necessary.



I bought some Hornby signals for 'Porth Emmet'. The Hornby signals were ready to place once I'd toned down the white. I took them apart to cut some of the base away as it is a bit too thick at the bottom.



When you are placing your signals ensure that you have taken into account any overhang from trains or coaches. I sat this Hornby signal way back from the side of the track so it wouldn't foul any passing trains. Signal cabling could be added if you wished.



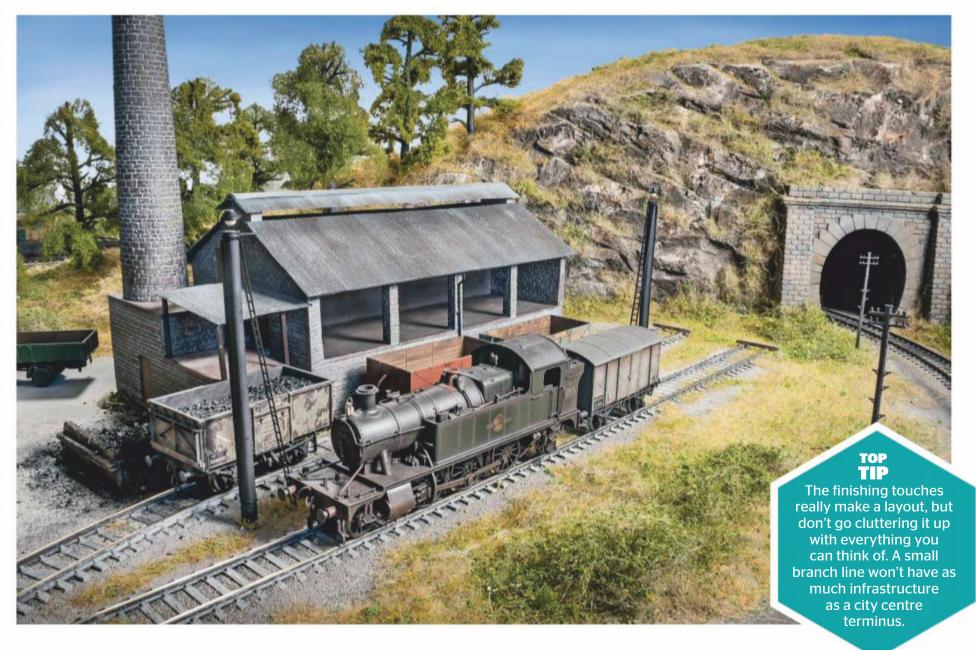
A coal heap was made using a DAS clay base. Use a cocktail stick to make holes in the clay, which will speed up the drying time. Make the mound quite smooth and paint it black to prevent any red from showing through.



Add the real coal to the clay and use plenty of diluted PVA to make the bond. It will dry clear so any that does show through will become invisible later. It is better to add too much than have coal fall away while the layout is in transit.



I cut a few of the cross-members off the telegraph pole, as the poles alongside a small branch line such as this wouldn't need to convey many wires. Make sure it's far enough back from the track to avoid any collisions.

HOW TO

MODEL A GARDEN

The weather might preclude any real horticulture, but that's no excuse for neglecting the miniature gardens that surround your carefully modelled buildings, says Chris Leigh.

suspect that most modellers (and that includes me) put most of their detailing efforts into modelling the aspect of railway that appeals to them the most. I like modelling buildings, so I spend a lot of time and effort on them, but much of that effort is lost when I plonk them on a green square that passes for a garden.

The sheer number of miniature shrubs, vegetables and even larger varieties of 'border' plants has led me to rethink my garden modelling policy. I'm glad I did, because this garden project has been great fun and has attracted a lot of positive comments from those who are not the least bit interested in the trains!

This project was prompted by the pair of Dapol cottages that I 'thatched' last summer (MR251). To complete them, I needed to provide them with proper gardens.

I have collected many packs of model plants from various local retailers over several months. But the real starting point was to consider the type of garden and era that I wanted to model. Gardens have evolved, and those of the 1930s were very different to those you see today.

My family garden in the 1960s featured a coal bunker and a shed full of garden tools, a lawnmower and some bicycles. In those pre-tumble dryer days, almost every garden had a washing line.

most of us have wheelie bins, which are usually kept near the front of the house. All these little details are important observations when portraying a particular timeframe.

We had a paved area but I don't recall it ever being called a 'patio'. It had originally been a conservatory of sorts, with a lot of cracked glass (which was blamed on the effects of a nearby rail-mounted Second World War anti-aircraft gun). Eventually it was demolished, leaving just the floor, and this became the 'patio.'

Post-war gardens would probably include a vegetable patch, whereas almost the entire garden would probably have been given over to food production before the war, including the rearing of chickens or pigs.

At least one man on our road had a pigeon loft, and another kept chickens. I had the regular job of taking bags of potato peelings and the like for the chickens, and running the gauntlet of a guard dog. The trick was to deliver the soggy brown paper bag before the bottom dropped out of it!



Since the 1960s the garden's role has subtly changed. They are treated much more as extensions of the house, with patios, gas barbecues and even outdoor heaters. The swing suspended from a tree branch has been replaced by all manner of colourful play equipment, the trampoline being one of the more obvious. Growing food has enjoyed a resurgence recently as a way of avoiding commercial growing chemicals.

My model has a pair of cottages with front and back gardens to complete, so I've chosen to model one in 1960s style and the other as a present-day garden.

Patios were rare, and a bench seat might well be the only item of garden furniture. The dustbin was galvanised metal, kept to the rear of the property, and the 'dustmen'





Hard landscaping - installing paths and walls - must be done first. I found some illustrations of brick paving on the internet, copied them, reduced them to scale and printed them out.



An alternative would have been brick paper or a print-out from Scalescenes. I cut the necessary path-sized strips and sprayed the back with Spraymount adhesive before setting them in place.



The 'modern' cottage garden has a block-paved car parking space. Most older properties don't have a garage, so parking space is often taken from the garden.



I intend to carry out most of the garden work before fixing the cottages in place to make access easier, but that means I need to know and to clearly mark their precise positions.

The right size

The secret with off-the-shelf garden For instance, I used 'HO' pot plants on my 'O' gauge 'Railway Children' layout. They look just right in the garden of Mr Perks' cottage, but I feel that they would look too large on a 'OO' gauge layout. For this 'OO' cottage garden

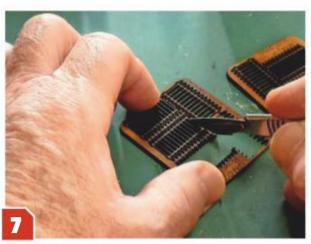

The garden base is 5mm foamboard, which makes all the later work much easier than working direct onto plywood. I began by marking the locations of lawns, flowerbeds and other details.



Here's where the foamboard comes in useful. I cut the hole for the pond, leaning the blade so that the edges of the hole would slope. The bigger the pond, the more of the foam base you'll need to 'dig out'.



The front fence was the first detail to install. I used a laser-cut picket fence from Scenic Route Models. The tiny tags which hold the pieces in the frame need to be cut with a sharp craft knife.



I made picket fence posts from balsa, gluing them to holes in the foam. The gap represents a missing gate (I had nothing suitable in stock) and gates often go missing.



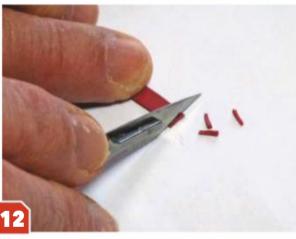
I used 2mm thick mount board to create the raised lawns and flower beds. A blue, blendable colouring pencil is extremely useful for marking out. Chamfer the edges with a sharp blade.



I mixed a tiny amount of Woodland Scenics carving plaster to line the pond. In such a tiny space, it was easiest to apply the plaster with my finger, leaving the top edge clear.



Once dry, the plaster was painted with dark grey acrylic and some white PVA glue was added. Small amounts of Woodland Scenics coarse turf (dark green) were applied to the wet glue to represent pond weed.



To make the koi carp, I cut slightly tapered strips from a red rubber band. Place several 'fish' on or among the weeds. Fix them with glue if the layout is to be moved. Use brown bands for different types of fish.



I cut a piece of 5thou clear plastic to fit over the pond. The underside was sprayed with hairspray and several more fish were attached to it. It was then glued in place with the fish on the underside.



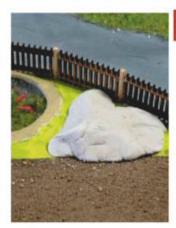
A piece of 2mm mounting card was cut with a pond-sized hole and crazy-paving slabs were scribed round it and painted in a stone colour. It was then glued in place to complete the pond.



Using artists' acrylics, I mixed yellow and cerulean blue to create a suitable base colour for the lawn areas. I would normally use brown under the grass but I wanted these lawns to look very green.



The flowerbeds and vegetable patch were painted with dark brown artists' acrylic, and then given a coat of diluted PVA. While that was still wet I scattered on some Treemendus Scenics earth powder.



To me, a pond and a rockery belong together. A garden railway makes them even better! A ball of Milliput putty, shaped to fit the available space, was installed next. A few spots of PVA glue will help to fix it in place.



I dug out some scraps of sandstone left over from another project. I put a couple of small pieces in a polythene sandwich bag and pulverised them with a lump hammer. This was the result.



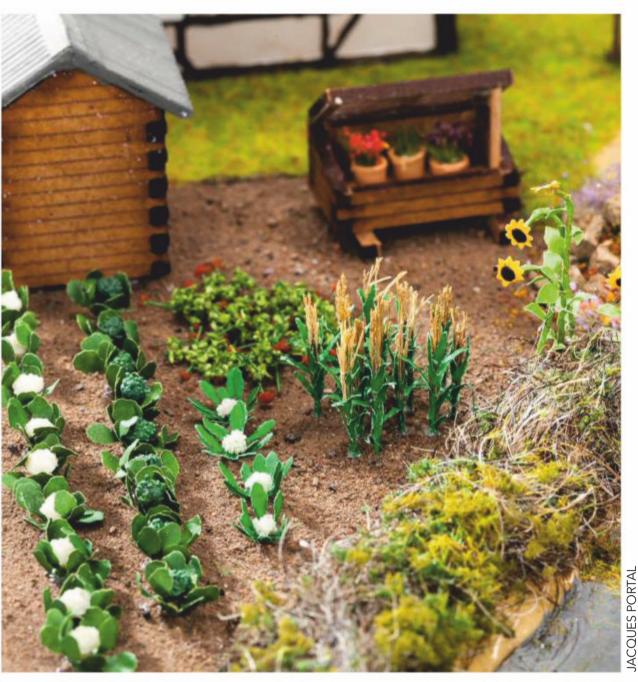
I painted the mound earth brown, then applied white PVA glue and added selected pieces of the crushed sandstone, building from the bottom upwards, choosing stone pieces to suit and leaving gaps for plants.



Rock plants were added from small pieces of Woodland Scenics flowering foliage and some coloured scatters. A quick blast of hairspray ensured everything would stay in place.



TP's cauliflowers come with a long pin section which is simply glued into a hole in the ground. This was one advantage of using the 5mm foamboard - making holes in it was far easier.





The Scenic Route Models shed roof looked too thick, so I replaced it with two pieces of Wills corrugated iron with the edges chamfered. I used folded paper for the ridge capping and assembled it with Velo-Set PVA.



Using a 1/32 in drill in a pin chuck to make the holes, I planted the 'N' gauge strawberries together in a clump. Having once grown strawberries, I know how rapidly they spread!



I used a small piece of balsa strip to prop open the top of the cold frame. Inside, I placed some pot plants from Gaugemaster. Note how the two wood strips lift the cold frame just off the ground.



The pool, slide, sandbox and scooter are from a Preiser kit, which also includes see-saws but no trampoline. The children playing on a skateboard and a spacehopper are also from Preiser. Wheelie bins are from Bachmann.

MPROVE RESIN BUILDINGS

Ready-made resin buildings can save modellers a lot of time, but they lack individuality. Peter Marriott shows you ten ways to detail them for extra realism and a distinctive look.

eady-assembled buildings made from poly resin are real time-savers. A relatively recent development in the hobby, they do not require painting or assembly. No longer is it necessary to build everything from scratch, or from kits.

The only downside is that these buildings roll off a production line, which means that

you'll often see many others just like them. But modellers are accustomed to renumbering ready-to-run locomotives and stock to personalise and improve models. Why not do the same with buildings?

Let's take a look at some of the ways we can enhance the realism of ready-to-plant buildings and add our own touch of individuality.

What you will need

TOOLS

- White glue
- Selection of paintbrushes
- Hobby saw
- Acrylic and enamel paints

1 'PLANT' YOUR BUILDINGS

Take a look up and down your street. How many houses do you see with big gaps between the bottom of the wall and the ground? I can't imagine there'll be many...

To make your model buildings look as though they are built on miniature foundations, simply run a bead of white glue around the base of the building. Push the building into the glue and then sprinkle scatter, such as Woodland Scenics Fine Turf, around the lower edge of the building. Once the glue has dried, the gap will have gone.

3 WEATHER YOUR WINDOWS

As I was writing this article, I realised that my own windows were absolutely filthy. Often, unless you're actively looking for it, you don't realise how the rain and sun will leave glass covered in dried rain marks. And that's before we factor in spiders filling the window frame corners with cobwebs!

You can add weathering effects to your windows by lightly rubbing them with abrasive papers. Or, if you smear a little plastic cement on them, they'll go cloudy.



If you're modelling a particularly derelict structure, don't forget to add a few broken windows. This is another easy modification as you can just use the tip of a sharp craft knife to break the clear plastic. You can leave the windows broken, or you could model a temporary repair with a piece of thin card to simulate boarding up with plywood.

What do you need? Abrasive paper, plastic cement or sharp scalpel blade. How long will it take? Less than five minutes per window.



4 CHANGE SOME COLOURS

You only need to glance round B&Q - or even cast your eye over magazine racks in the newsagents - to see how big the home improvement/DIY industry is. We're regularly bombarded with adverts encouraging us to repaint parts of our homes... so why not do it in miniature?

If you are using a row of dwellings of the same type, just painting the doors different colours will make a huge visual difference. You may need a couple of coats of paint to colour the original paint and for this it is best to use a micro-brush or a fine paintbrush.

Cost: A few pence-worth of acrylic paint, and maybe a little matt varnish.

What do you need? Tins of Humbrol or Revell enamels - available from your local model shop.

How long will it take? 30 minutes per building.



2 ADD CURTAINS

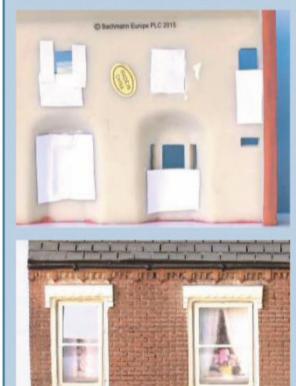
You always assume that windows are nothing more than clear panes of glass - and that's how they're mainly portrayed in model form. But, again, it's actually worth taking a look at the houses along your street. Most windows feature either fabric or net curtains (or even blinds). Models with big, clear panes of glass look less authentic in comparison.

Adding curtains is a really simple way to improve a model building. You can have some curtains completely drawn, some partially drawn, others with nets and so on.

There are various ways to make them. They're included in some plastic kits (I'm thinking of Kibri in particular), whereas Metcalfe offers a downloadable PDF that you can print out. The simplest option is to use cut-up pieces of coloured paper. I make net curtains from thin tissue paper. You can either use a dab of white glue on the inside of the building or sticky tape to fix the curtains in place.

5 GIVE IT AN IDENTITY

"Our houses will have numbers instead of names," bemoans Squire Chesterford in The Titfield Thunderbolt. But while the idea of a house number is a scary foretaste of the modern world in rural 1950s England, very few miniature buildings come with any form of identification.

Every home has a name or number and the way numbering schemes developed is a subject worth reading about. In the meantime, you can add a number using the plastic characters available from Slater's.

6 WEATHER THEM

You only have to look at how pale lime and sandstone buildings turn black to see the effects of weathering in 1:1 scale. There are just as many weathering techniques - and products - for buildings as there are for trains.

Weathering is easy to do with weathering chalks or dyes. Alternatively, dry-brushing with acrylic paints works well too. Weathering can also be undertaken with an airbrush or charcoal or chalk pastels. Watercolours are another cheap and cheerful way to weather these buildings.

As with all weathering techniques, slowly work up the paint or pigments you're using to depict dirt - don't use too much at the same time. It's easy to add more weathering but not as easy to take it off!

One other advantage of weathering is that it removes that unrealistic shine from the resin. It might be that you want a heavily weathered building. Alternatively, you could do as I have done here and use

a little white acrylic to

mimic a leaking gutter. What do you need? A selection of weathering powders, chalks or paints. Revell's pack of six weathering pigments costs just £9.99 (ideal for roofs) while you can buy tubs

of white acrylic, such as the one being used here, for under a fiver.

How long will it take? Depends on how much weathering is being done. Allow an hour per building.

7 ADD SIGNS

Depending upon the era to be modelled you could use the end wall of a building for a poster board or a hoarding. There are myriad organisations making such signs. Check out Tiny Signs' range (www.gaugemaster. com or https://bit.ly/2TFQT7w). Alternatively you can print your own from Scalescenes (www.scalescenes. com). One nifty source of detail are the faded 'ghost signs' waterslide decals from the aptly named Ghost-Signs (www.ghost-signs.com).

The posters or hoardings can be fixed to a piece of cardboard or plastic card to represent the frame. Use a glue stick to the paper sign to the card - I now find that this is easier than using PVA glue and is the best way to avoid any ripples in the finished printed poster or sign. What do you need? Browse the web to find the right signs for your building. How long will it take? Under ten minutes per sign.



8 LIGHT IT UP!

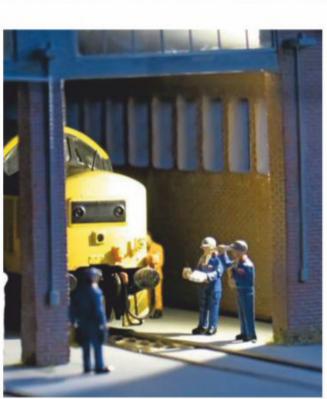
It's never been easier to add lights to your buildings. 9 DON'T FORGET PLANTS

How you portray a building will make a difference to how it looks. Any miniature house will need a miniature garden, and whether that garden is a blossoming wildlife haven worthy of Alan Titchmarsh's attention or just a concrete pad for storing

a caravan will be up to you. But you don't need a big garden space in which to model plants. You can add miniature ivy climbing up walls, or you could make your own window boxes.

Simply use small pieces of cut timber or thick cardboard to represent the box, then paint it with acrylic paint. Use

coarse foam pieces pushed into a few drops of white glue to represent the plants and add coloured scatters to represent the flowers.

Many people like to grow plants in pots. Gaugemaster and Noch offer huge ranges of miniature plant pots.

What do you need? See Chris Leigh's Workbench feature on garden detailing on page 38.

How long will it take?

From a few minutes to a few hours, depending on the size of garden being modelled.



Some resin buildings require assembly, or come with additional detailing parts, such as extra walls. Sometimes the fit between parts won't be good, but that's easy to fix: use needle files or abrasive paper to remove paint and any raised surfaces to ensure a snug fit.

10 GET CUTTING

SAFETY FIRST! If you're cutting resin remember to wear a face mask, and wash your hands and tools thoroughly afterwards. Resin dust should NEVER be inhaled or ingested!

A resin building is like any other off-the-shelf product - if you don't

like it, you can change it.

Modifications can be simple. I wanted to reduce the height of the chimney on this Scenecraft station building and it was easy to achieve with a hobby razor saw. Chris Leigh, on the other hand, wanted to open the interior on this

Scenecraft waiting shelter and, again, he made light work of it with a saw.

Don't let the size and shape of a proprietary resin building limit your imagination. Chris Nevard created this colliery winding house using a Scenecraft model. He didn't like the brick finish, so he clad it in embossed stone plastic card and fitted corrugated iron sheets to the roof. And rather than use this Bachmann colliery headframe straight from the box, he added extra plastic 'H' section girders, some wooden planks and





How to build GOTHIC

Master builder **Clive Hardwick** explains why modelling Gothic architecture needn't become your arch enemy...

rchitectural styles have ebbed and flowed throughout the ages, from the ornate to the simple – and then back to the ornate again. Some styles are easy to model, but the more ornate the greater the challenge. Gothic architecture is probably the most challenging of them all.

The Gothic style emerged during the Middle Ages and was particularly favoured for clerical buildings, particularly cathedrals. It returned to favour again from the 1740s. Now called neo-Gothic, or 'Gothic Revival', it became particularly prevalent in the Victorian period.

I can't believe that it's been 11 years since the first structures from my Northampton townscape appeared in *Model Rail*. I've faced numerous challenges in my desire to model my hometown, but the neo-Gothic Guildhall was always going to be the ultimate test.

The Guildhall is the jewel in the town's architectural crown and I have long wanted to make a model of it. I was going to make a start on it in 2012 but I had to put this on hold when the entire frontage was covered in tarpaulins for several months for restoration work.

This was actually a blessing in disguise. Technological advances in recent years have provided solutions for overcoming my two biggest hurdles – how to tackle the heavily ornate Gothic archwork and how to model the series of eight statues between the first floor windows.

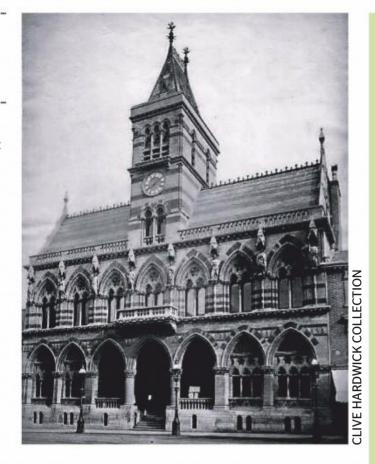
As with all my models, the Guildhall's base material is styrene (sheet and profile) with some whitemetal and brass etch fret embellishment. I painted it with enamels and weathered appropriately. But let's worry more about adding those Gothic Revival touches...



Factfile: Northampton Guildhall

The Guildhall was designed by Edward Godwin and built between 1861-1864 in the popular Gothic Revival style of the period. Today, it's Grade II* listed.

The façade was originally symmetrical with a central bell tower. A later extension to the west, designed by Matthew Holding in 1892, was rendered sympathetically in a matching style but the symmetry was lost. I have chosen to model just the 1864 building to save time, space and my sanity!



CREATE GOTHIC ARCHES

Getting the arches right was crucial to the whole project.

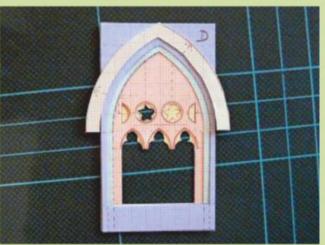
I started by breaking the arch detail down into a series of layers, which I drew on to graph paper. I transferred these drawings to card and assembled the layers to ensure they would give the effect I was after. The ground floor windows, for example, comprise five separate layers of varying thicknesses. With the need to cut depths of up to 3mm and the sheer quantity of parts, I realized that this approach wouldn't work.

Here's where technology offered a helping hand: I sent my drawings to laser-cutting specialist York Modelmaking. Not only does the firm offer a range of useful building parts, it is happy to undertake bespoke work and at very reasonable prices!

The components were laser-cut to my specifications, thus ensuring that each window was identical. The components were then sandwiched together to form the basic structure of each arch, after which super-detailing could commence.

CREATE GOTHIC STATUES

The Guildhall is decorated with statues of the kings, queens and saints of particular relevance to the town. I really wanted to capture the essence of each, both in terms of appearance and pose. But again, the question was 'how'?

I first tried to cut and splice commercially available figures, but I wasn't satisfied with the results. The project hit the buffers for a while, until I came across Alan Buttler from Modelu...

Modelu, as Model Rail explored last issue, can print bespoke figures from full-size body scanning. So I visited his Shrewsbury studio armed with various items of medieval apparel. Together with some digital images of swords, shields and crowns, Alan created eight versions

I painted, weathered and fixed them in place under individual canopies. Technology to the rescue!

MODEL FOLIAGE MASONRY

Many period buildings, particularly in the Gothic Revival style, are festooned with intricate decorated stonework, a favourite being 'swags' of foliage. How is it possible to model the flowing, floral shape of carved stone in 1:76 scale?

My solution? Miniature chain, as used extensively in model boat building.

I found a suitably sized chain (in this case 1mm, 2mm and 3mm brass chains) and, when working around the inside of the arches, anchored one end with a pin though a small drilled hole. I ran cyanoacrylate gel along the inside of the arch and then stretched the chain away from the anchor point and into the gel.

There is similar decorative 'foliage' around the tops of the columns. Here, I glued the chain centrally, a couple of links at a time, and let gravity drop the rest of the chain into the gel.

COLUMN SWAGS

I embedded the chain into thick cyanoacrylate gel which partly 'filled the gaps', then I added a couple of generous coats of paint on top, further disguising the links.

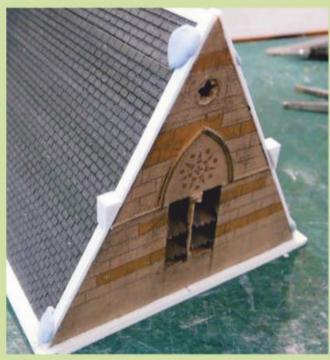
Only a few links of chain were used to represent the swags of foliage at the top of the columns. The cyano gel filled the gaps in the links.



HOW TO: MAKE PATTERNED STONEWORK

Your computer and printer can help with creating decorative stone, such as this pattern on the side of the clock tower. I drew an approximate pattern (using Photoshop Elements) then I painted some printer paper with my chosen shade of stone colour. After a bit of trial and error, I managed to get the design to print over my painted paper. All I needed to do then was to cut it out and fix it to the gable ends.







HOW TO: MAKE STAINED GLASS WINDOWS I designed my stained glass windows using Microsoft Excel. You can adjust the

I designed my stained glass windows using Microsoft Excel. You can adjust the sizes of the panels and, if you click on the 'Inset' tab, there's an option to create different shapes. Once complete, adjust the size for your chosen scale and print it on to clear acetate (you can buy packs of it from Amazon for under £10). Cut out and fix behind your door or window.

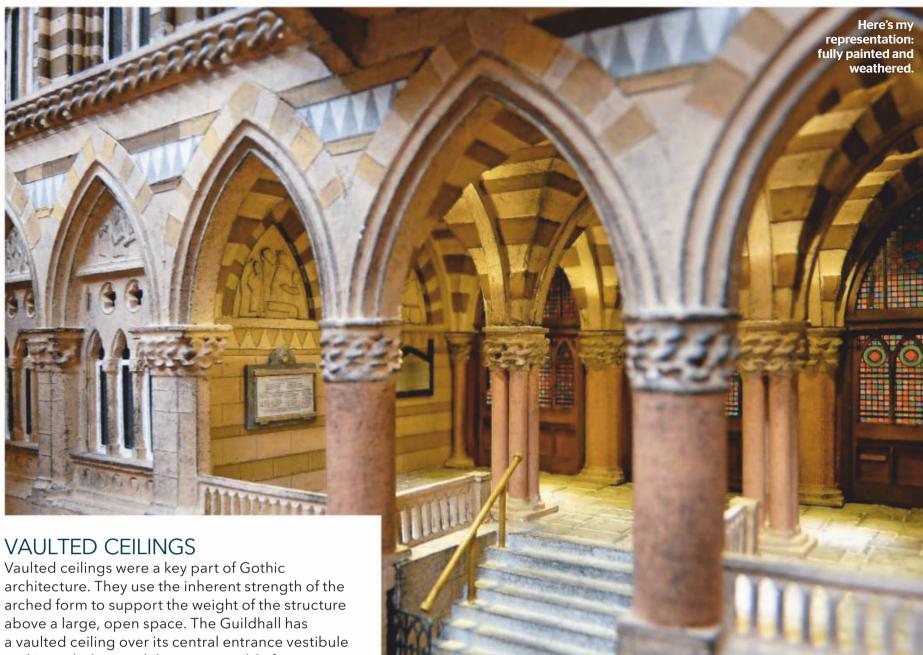

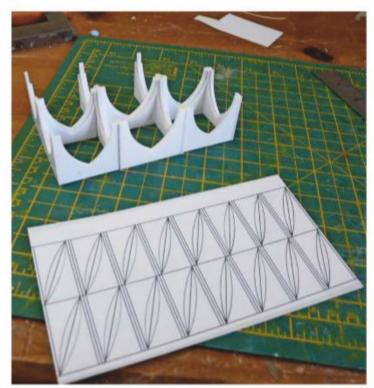

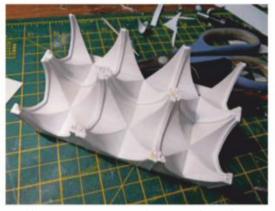
I started with a lattice of inter-connected arches, made from styrene, arranged into a 'box' shape. For the roof sections, I drew out a series of triangles with the hypotenuse sufficiently concave to enable the mating parts to butt up to one another. If you've got a vaulted ceiling that you'd like to try modelling, just be aware that it took some trial and error to get it right - hopefully, the accompanying pictures show that it is possible!



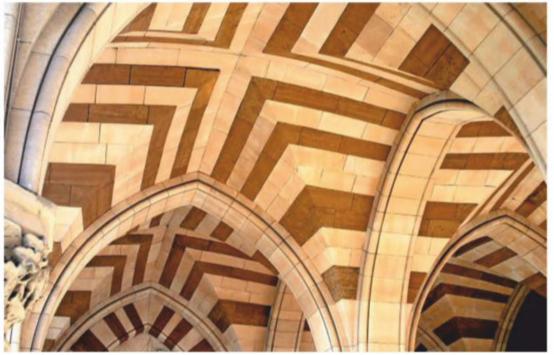

THE ESSENTIAL GUIDE TO

Pt 3: Paints

Choosing the best paints makes airbrushing easier, while thinning them to the right consistency forms the essence of successful paint spraying. George Dent shares his tips for getting the paint preparation right first time.

PAINT PREPARATION

Getting the paint thinned to the correct viscosity is one of the key elements of airbrushing. Indeed, it's probably the most challenging aspect for newcomers. However, getting this right from the start will make for

much smoother progress. Firstly, let's take a look at the two most popular types of hobby paint: enamels and acrylics.



ACRYLICS

PROS

- ◆ Water or alcohol-based and generally non-toxic.
- ◆ Fast drying: 30 mins to 2 hours.
- ◆ Clean up with water while wet.
- ◆ Resistant to water, oils or chemical solvents when dry.

CONS

- ◆ Must be built up in thin layers.
- ◆ Tricky to remove once dry.
- ◆ Prone to clogging airbrushes unless the tool is flushed out at regular intervals



ENAMELS

PROS

- ◆ Superior and hard-wearing finish.
- ◆ Good adhesion and flow characteristics.
- ◆ Remain workable for longer.
- ◆ Resistant to water, oils or chemical solvents when dry.
- Remove with white spirit up to an hour after application.

CONS

- ◆ Slow drying: 6-12 hours for matt, up to several days for gloss paints.
- ◆ Oil or solvent based: toxic, highly flammable and some may contain lead.



SHAKEN OR STIRRED?

When jars of paint are left standing, the solid pigments will quickly settle at the bottom. Therefore, all paints must be shaken or stirred before decanting, thinning and spraying. Reading the label will reveal what method is best, with acrylics usually requiring both, while enamels are best stirred only. Once mixed and thinned, you'll have to stir or shake the paint regularly to prevent settlement.

Use a dedicated paint stirring tool, as offered by Expo Tools and Tamiya. Their paddle-shaped tips are far more effective for dispersing pigment than a screwdriver and also help when gauging the thickness of the paint.

THINNING

To avoid any compatibility problems, it's often best to employ the same brand of paint and thinners. Through trial and error, you'll probably find a few brands of thinner that work well with other brands of paint but, when starting out, it's best to err on the side of caution.

Virtually all hobby paints require thinning before spraying. Some, such as Com-Art and Vallejo Air acrylics, or Alcad2 enamels, come pre-thinned. However, once they've been used a few times such paints tend to thicken. I've found it best not to concentrate on specific ratios of paint and thinners, as performance differs wildly by brand,

batch, shelf life, storage conditions and ambient temperature. It's much better to gain an appreciation of the desired consistency to suit the airbrush; in this way, any type of paint or varnish can be thinned with a greater chance of success.

Be sure to choose the right type of thinners to match your paint, studying the information on the label and heeding any safety warnings. With solvents, always avoid contact with skin and eyes.

tiny nozzle in a fine, even mist. If the liquid is too thick, it will 'spatter' or clog up the tool. If it's too thin, there's a risk that it will create puddles on the model's surface.

There's scope for a little leeway either side of the optimum viscosity, as upping the air pressure will allow slightly thicker paint to flow, while a lower pressure will afford more control over thinner paint. We'll look at how the air pressure affects the flow of paint in the next instalment of Skills Station.



COMPATIBILITY

While they can't be inter-mixed when wet, enamels can sit atop acrylic paints - and vice versa - just as long as the previous layer is completely dry. Allow enamels at least 24 hours and acrylics 12 hours to cure before re-coating with another formula. If in doubt, test on a scrap model first.



STRAINING

All paints are prone to the formation of solid particles, especially if the jar has been opened and closed a few times. These lumps are unlikely to be softened during thinning and will clog the airbrush's tiny aperture, resulting in uneven paint flow.

To reduce the risk of this happening, it's good practice to filter or strain paint before thinning. Pouring the paint through a paper filter is recommended, although a fine-meshed tea strainer can also be effective. Choose one with metal gauze so that it can be cleaned more readily with solvents.



HOW TO: THIN PAINT FOR SPRAYING



After stirring and/or shaking, decant the desired amount of paint into a clean glass jar. It takes a bit of practice to gauge how much paint will be needed for a particular project.



Using a pipette or syringe, add a few drops of thinner and stir gently. We're aiming for the liquid to take on a consistency akin to skimmed milk.



If the paint is slow to run off the end of the stirring tool, or falls in thick stringy columns, then it's too thick and needs a few more drops of thinner and a further stirring.



Continue thinning and stirring until the paint falls from the stirrer in small, self-contained blobs. The shiny metal of the stirrer should be visible along the top edge.



If all of the paint pours off the spatula, leaving hardly any traces behind, then it's too thin. The paint can still be used, but the air pressure will have to be turned down significantly, as will be explained next month!

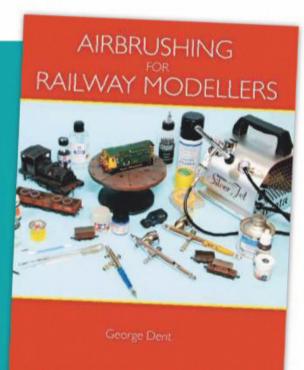

AFTER THINNING...

Once the paint has been thinned, it needs to be sprayed promptly. The increased volume of liquid solvent means that pigment will begin to settle quite quickly unless the glass jar is shaken or stirred at regular intervals. In

average ambient temperatures (for the UK), I find that thinned acrylics will last up to an hour or so, while enamels may remain workable for a couple of hours, provided that the jar's lid is fitted tightly.

After that, the paint will degrade considerably and will have to be discarded responsibly. Therefore, it pays to judge the amount of paint required for a specific task in order to reduce waste - this is something that becomes easier with experience.

Looking at locomotive history in detail

Masterclass: May 9 1964

Who better to give a masterclass on a famous day in steam locomotive history than our own eyewitness, Chris Leigh?

ay 9 1964 was the 60th anniversary of the oft-disputed 102.3mph speed record set by No. 3440 City of *Truro* on Wellington bank in

Somerset with a special mail train. It was fortunate that the anniversary fell on a Saturday as that enabled the Western Region to hold a special event.

The Western Region's 'Kings' had passed into history in 1962 without much ceremony, and there were senior WR people who were determined that the 'Castle' 4-6-0s, seeing out their last months on the Paddington-Worcester-Hereford services, would not go the same way.

I'm not sure how Ian Allan Ltd came to be quickly learned involved, but 'IA' himself and several of the management had close wooden seat ends links with senior BR of a Mk 1 Open people, and the Ian Allan Locospotters Club was one of the major promoters of special trains. So, in the spring of 1964, plans were being made for a final fling with the 'Castles' on a high-speed run from Paddington to Plymouth and back.

The outbound train would take the 'Berks & Hants' line to Plymouth and return via Bristol. A speed limit at Wellington precluded a repeat of *City of Truro's* exploits on Wellington Bank, so it was proposed that 100mph should be the aim near Little Somerford, on the 'Badminton cut-off', the 'racing stretch' built in 1903.

The train was marketed as an Ian Allan Railtour but seems to have sold out with little advance publicity. There were around 340 seats but not all were available for sale. Western Region top brass and senior Ian Allan people were there in abundance. Cecil J. Allen was there to time the running and there were others, too, in less official capacities.

My colleagues were all present: Alan Williams (editor, Model Railway Constructor), Geoffrey Kichenside (editor, Railway World) David Percival (assistant editor, MRC) and A.B. 'Uncle Mac' MacLeod. I was there to sell books and magazines and had negotiated a ticket for my younger brother Roger to help. Though we had tickets (Nos. 342/3 on a 340-seat train), we did not have seats, and

so we rode in the guard's van, sitting on packages of books, as did most of the 'staff'.

PREPARATION

The Western Region had carried out an exceptional amount of planning and preparation and this was also a last hurrah of Western independence before it was submerged by Marylebone Road (the BR HQ).

Throughout that spring, the ten most recently 'shopped' of the remaining 'Castles' were put through their paces on the Worcester expresses under the watchful eye of Senior

Inspectors Jack Hancock and Bill

Andress. They were tested for high-speed running and for high maxima down

> Honeybourne bank. No fewer than eight locomotives were required to cover the special train duty; three to work the various stages of the journey and the remaining five on standby,

strategically placed along the route in case they were needed. Jack Hancock decided that

No. 5054 Earl of Ducie was most capable of achieving the 'ton'. It was a surprising choice as this was a single-chimney 'Castle' with two-row superheater and hydrostatic lubrication. Newer 'Castles' with four-row superheaters were available and one of these, No. 7029 Clun Castle, was selected for the difficult section over the South Devon banks on the return journey.

Reputation, however, meant a great deal to railwaymen steeped in steam, and the single-chimney '50XX' series 'Castles' had a reputation for being the fastest of their breed. Curiously, given that it was chosen for a difficult section of the journey, No. 7029 Clun Castle had a reputation as a 'weak' locomotive.

ON THE DAY

One clear memory is the sight of crowds on the platform as we entered Paddington station. Hawksworth '94XX' 0-6-0PT No. 8433 brought the empty stock into Platform 2. Soon afterwards, No. 4079 Pendennis Castle backed onto the train.

The 'Castle' had been well cleaned and prepared with a tender full of the best Ogilvy steam coal, which had a reputation for

burning with intense heat. Four men were on the footplate, Inspector Andress, Driver Alf Perfect, and Firemen Doug Godden

From the outset, the start was brisk and we accelerated quickly past Ealing Broadway and down through my old trainspotting haunt at Iver. I was despatched to move up and down the train with armfuls of magazines to sell, almost without respite. Once we turned onto 'Berks & Hants' – I knew it as the 'West of England line' – at Reading, the route's curvaceous nature became apparent as Roger and I were bounced back and fourth across the aisle, our load of magazines making it difficult to hold on to anything. My thighs quickly learned how hard the wooden seat ends of a Mk 1 Open Second are!

When we got our first break, Roger and I were able to get our bearings as the train



swept through Savernake Low Level station at around 90mph. That original Berks & Hants Extension Railway station, basking in the sun, immediately intrigued us. We would have to return and study it – and we did.

We found a gathering of WR 'brass' and senior IA figures in the leading brake van. One of the WR guys had noticed that the red-hot material streaming past his window was molten metal and not embers from the fire. 'Pendennis' was clearly in trouble, but the footplate crew were unaware of what was happening beneath them.

You couldn't send the driver a text in those days, so how could we stop the train? It was feared that pulling the communication cord

would cause such severe braking that it might cause further damage to No. 4079's overheated rear axle and we would be stuck, disabled.

The guard had the answer. He stopped the train by gently applying his brake valve. We stopped near Lavington and drew forward to the intermediate block signal, where the signal phone was used to request a change of locomotive – at Westbury. The nearest standby 'Castle' was at Taunton.

Westbury's small shed could only provide modified 'Hall' 4-6-0 No. 6999 Capel Dewi Hall. It had a low fire and less than half a tenderfull of what I called 'nuts' or, what firemen called, 'Easter Eggs'. They were like large barbecue briquettes and made of coal dust bound together with cement. They were probably cheap, but they certainly did not burn very well.

That the 'Hall' did remarkably well on its run to Taunton was entirely down to the crew and, particularly, the firemen. We reached 86mph before the handover to No. 7025 *Sudeley Castle*, Taunton's standby 'Castle'.

WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE

No. 7025 was, apparently, the eighth of the eight chosen 'Castles'. It was Murphy's law that it fell to this 'Castle' to save the day and to get the special to Plymouth without further problems.

Again, the Old Oak crew did their stuff and at least, this time, they had a locomotive that was prepared and ready for them. I resumed my seat on the packages in the leading van.

Diesels were prone to 'overreact' when their AWS contact shoe came into contact with water troughs. With dieselisation well advanced, many troughs had either been emptied or had their water levels reduced.

Provision had been made for Exminster troughs to be refilled so that we wouldn't have to stop for water. However, we didn't find out

until water surged through the leading gangway and across the floor of the van, engulfing several packets of books and magazines as it went! No. 7025 was the last WR locomotive to take water by this means as the troughs were emptied again the following week.

Lunch had been served and several of the top brass stood aside so that those of us without allocated seats could have a sit-down meal. It was my first ever meal on a train.

Even in Open Seconds, lunch on a train had a certain 'style' and with Starcross and the Dawlish seafront zipping past the window it began to seem like the day might be rescued. Indeed it was, with No. 7025 having turned in a splendid performance.

Our arrival at Plymouth was late, of course, but No. 7025 had taken only 51 seconds more than the booked time from passing Taunton to Plymouth and it had done so from a standing start.

At Plymouth, passengers could take an organized boat trip around the docks for just



3s 6d (17.5p) but a small group of us chose to ride across to Saltash instead, just so that we could go over Brunel's fabulous bridge. I'd never seen it before.

Meanwhile, at Laira depot, Inspector Harold Cooke had been giving attention to No. 7029 *Clun Castle*. I believe that, upon hearing of the problem with No. 4079, he'd emptied No. 7029's tender and refilled it with a different blend of coal.

He and Laira driver Harry Roach knew a thing or two about 'Castles' and, in particular, how to prepare and handle 'Clun'. After oiling round, he gave the handle on the mechanical lubricator 80 or 90 turns to really prime the system.

We were treated to an epic run to Bristol Temple Meads and even from our place in what was now the rear brake van, seven coaches back, we could hear No. 7029 at work. Our job was done for the day and we set out to get one or two 'window shots', despite the speed, and to enjoy the rest of that magic day.

No. 7029 Clun Castle had reeled off the 75.6 miles in 62 minutes 19 seconds, setting a new record for Plymouth-Bristol with steam. Despite my huge admiration for the Tyseley team and their work with 'Castles' I was saddened that they chose to break 'Clun's' record with No. 5043 Earl of Mount Edgcumbe, and particularly that they did so on the anniversary of 'our' epic run. Some records should stand for all time.

BRISTOL FASHION

At Bristol, No. 7029 and the Laira crew handed over to Inspector Andress, a Bath Road crew and Worcester's pride and joy, No. 5054 Earl of Ducie. Sadly, the anticipated 'ton' at Little Somerford eluded driver Frank Higby, despite some very fast running.

Moving about the train was almost impossible because a TV crew had boarded at Bristol and their bulky equipment blocked the gangways.

Even so, it was not difficult to see that No. 5054 was frequently trailing some very black smoke, an indication that the firemen were struggling to maintain boiler pressure. Indeed, the inspector's log showed that at no time was the boiler at full pressure and against that background the maximum of 94mph at Little Somerford was a creditable performance.

Swindon was the place to be on May 9

1964. Not only was immaculate 'Castle'

the Ian Allan special, but 'Duchess'

GRAND FINALE

I find Paddington a magical place in the evening, and at night, and May 9 1964 was the first time I experienced it. Just a year later I would be back, on August 8 1965, with a gleaming and restored No. 4079, now in private hands on an Ian Allan railtour to Worcester and Swindon.

'Pendennis' hauled a farewell railtour from Paddington on November 20 and 'Clun' hauled what was the last steam-hauled train from Brunel's famous station on November 27. After that, Paddington was diesel-only and the 'Castles' took over at Banbury or Didcot.

I enjoyed a couple of 'Castle' runs with No. 7029 on Ffestiniog and Talyllyn RPS specials, and the 'Birkenhead Flier' and 'Zulu' on which we had both 4079 and 7029.

One of my most memorable trips from Paddington was with a Class 47 (instead of the hoped-for Class 50) for a once-in-a-lifetime ride on the Down Travelling Post Office to Bristol. There was one consolation about the Class 47 – it was 47500 Great Western! M

'The Great Western' comprised seven BR Mk 1 coaches (totalling 295 tons) arranged as follows: Brake Second Open, Second Open, Second Open, Kitchen Car, Second Open, Second Open, Brake Second Open.

I've found it impossible to research the actual vehicle numbers 55 years later, and those who were photographing and filming were only interested in the locomotives. However, my quest has thrown up an interesting query.

The Kitchen Car is glimpsed several times in movie footage and the window arrangement clearly identifies it as a Diagram 701 or 702 vehicle. Ten RKs were fitted with anthracite stoves and Nos. 80007-80008 were allocated to the Western Region. They didn't last long, as the propane-fuelled version became more popular. Though the coaches were what we would now call Tourist Open Seconds with 2+2 seating, they were 'dressed up' with white table cloths for meal service.

I will replicate both the 'dressed up' interior and create a Kitchen Car in a future issue.



'Castle' selection

Ten 'Castles' were initially selected for May 9 1964 but, in due course, Nos. 5091 Cleeve Abbey and 5096 Bridgwater Castle were eliminated. Here's where the five standby 'Castles' were positioned:

'CASTLES' IN 1964

A. Smeddle is not a prominent name in the story of Great Western steam but, together with Sam Ell and his team, he got the best from Western

Region steam power in the difficult post-war days. Smeddle, as the Western Region's chief mechanical and electrical engineer, oversaw the increase in superheating and the installation of double-chimneys to 'Kings' and 'Castles' as the Collett 4-6-0s struggled to maintain pre-war running standards in the face of poor coal and increasing age.

1958 was a watershed year. The introduction of the first diesel-hydraulics signalled the end of the 'Kings' as top link power. But the 'Castles' would go from strength to strength. Three-row superheaters were superseded by four-row versions. Double-chimneys started to appear. When No. 4090 *Dorchester Castle* emerged from Swindon in May 1958 with a double-chimney AND a four-row superheater, it became a 'Castle GTi'. The 'Kings' went in 1962 and great inroads were being made into the 'Castle' fleet. Smeddle took the attitude that the remaining 'Castles' should be fitted with every modern

convenience, including mechanical lubricators and self-cleaning smokeboxes, as well as double-chimneys and four-row superheaters. He had the backing of all the great and good at Paddington, who were anxious to maintain the high standards of the GWR. That was until Stanley Raymond arrived as Western Region general manager in January 1962.

Raymond wanted the Western to become the first region to abolish steam. Smeddle retired after a few months of intense conflict (he died shortly afterwards). The 'Castles' were no longer safe and some were withdrawn just months after receiving new chimneys.

1964 was really the last full year of 'Castle' action. It dawned with just 48 in active service. There was a real mixture of versions. The bulk, not surprisingly, were post-war '5098s', built between May 1946 and August 1950, but there were still a good number of '5013s' and even original '4073s' from the 1920s.

Some celebrity 'Castles' had slipped through the net: former streamliner No. 5005 *Manorbier Castle* had gone in February 1960, while 'Cheltenham Flyer' favourite No. 5006 *Tregenna Castle* followed in May 1962. Happily,

pioneer No. 4073 *Caerphilly Castle* was safely ensconced in the Science Museum.

But a look through the list of 'Castles' that made it as far as 1964 reveals some surprises. Dear old No. 4079 *Pendennis Castle* was still in the same condition as when it had taught Nigel Gresley a few lessons in locomotive design in 1925. There was *Windsor Castle*, the GWR's 'Royal engine', which King George V drove in 1924 (plus *Bristol Castle* with which it had swapped guises). There was *Launceston Castle* that took the West Coast Main Line by storm in 1926 and proved to LMS management that they ought to sort out their top link express power.

STAR TURN

Even more surprising were Nos. 5085, 5089 and 5091. The GWR had rebuilt 'Stars' Nos. 4063-72 as 'Castles' between 1937 and 1940 but, unlike other 'Star' rebuilds, had renumbered them in the 'Castle' sequence.

The 48 'Castles' that made it into 1964 were split between the usual haunts, such as Old Oak Common, Bristol, the Midlands and South Wales (see Table 1). But there were subtle differences – Bristol St Philip's Marsh shed rather than Bath Road; Oxley shed rather than Wolverhampton Stafford Road; Cardiff East Dock rather than Swansea Landore, and the days of Collett 4-6-0s at Plymouth Laira or Newton Abbot were long gone.

Table 2 reveals how the fleet was further curtailed during 1964. By the start of 1965, there were just 11 left. The Birmingham/ West Midlands area lost its 'Castles' in February 1965. Oxley withdrew No. 7011 Banbury Castle on February 9, followed by Nos. 7019 Fowey Castle, 7023 Penrice Castle and 7024 Powis Castle on February 10 and, finally, No. 5063 Earl Baldwin later in the month. Tyseley's No. 7013 Bristol Castle and 7014 Caerhays Castle had both gone during the week commencing February 6.

Gloucester Horton Road became the unlikely outpost for final 'Castle' operations. Nos. 5042 Winchester Castle, 7022 Hereford Castle and 7034 Ince Castle managed to hang on until June. The honour of the last 'Castle' in BR service fell to No. 7029 Clun Castle, which was rather ironic as it had been withdrawn in 1964 and resurrected. Of its many special workings in 1965, it hauled the last steam-hauled train out of the GWR's famous Paddington station on November 27 1965.

Clun Castle was withdrawn on December 31 1965, but that didn't prevent it working the 5pm Gloucester-Cheltenham on January 1 1966. Meanwhile, John Trounson and John Southern's fund-raising scheme to save it was floundering. Preservation powerhouse Pat Whitehouse and colleague John Evans stepped in and bought No. 7029 on January 10 1966.

Remarkably, 55 years after May 9 1964, two of the stars of that day are due to return to the main line. *Clun Castle* hauled its first main line train on February 28 while *Pendennis Castle* is nearing the end of an extensive overhaul and is expected to steam again later this year.

Going once, going twice

Two 'Castles' were withdrawn in 1964... and then returned to traffic. Old Oak Common withdrew both Nos. 7008 Swansea Castle and 7029 Clun Castle in the week ending September 5 - but both were back on its books again by the 12th of that month. The reprieves were just temporary, for Old Oak had washed its hands of both 'Castles' by September 26. Swansea Castle had been withdrawn but 'Clun' had been passed on to Gloucester Horton Road. Had it been withdrawn along with No. 7008, preservation history would have been very different.

'Castles' - what's the difference?

Swindon Works built 156 'Castles' between August 1923 and August 1950, and created a further 16 by rebuilding 15 'Stars' and GWR 4-6-2 *The Great Bear*.

These 172 locomotives were split into three distinct versions:

- '4073'; Nos. 111, 4000/09/16/32/37, 4073-5012; built 1923-1927: Original condition, two-row superheater, fluted centre cylinder casing and mixture of 3,500 and 4,000gal tender.
- '5013'; Nos. 5013-5096; built 1932-1939; Modified boiler with increased water space around the firebox, reduced grate (from 30.3sq ft to 29.4sq ft), and fewer small tubes, square centre cylinder casing. From No. 5023, all were built with the Swindon-modified Zeiss optical frame alignment equipment.
- '5098'; Nos. 5098/99, 7000-7037; built 1946-1950: Built new with three-row superheaters and, from No. 7000 onwards, had mechanical lubricators. From No. 7000 onwards came new with Hawksworth welded tenders.

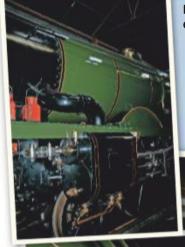




Double-chimneys were fitted to Nos. 7018 and 5043 in 1956; they'd be fitted to 67 'Castles' up to December 1961.

HOW TO

ADD MAY 9 1964 DECORATIONS

astle' No. 4079 Pendennis Castle was already wearing its full complement of front end 'decoration', headboards and train reporting numbers, when it backed into Paddington on May 9 1964 to take 'The Great Western' special to Plymouth. Those decorations are described on the opposite page.

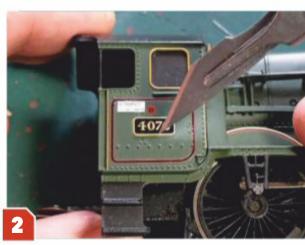
I already had models of both Nos. 4079 and 7029. The latter had been renamed and renumbered at some time in the past and is one of the most recent Hornby 'Castle' toolings. No. 4079 is one of the earlier

Hornby 'Castles' and is as supplied. I decided to add May 9 1964 details to both of them. I've never been that bothered by No. 5054, the third of the trio on that day, nor with the stand-in No. 7025. A model of No. 6999, on the other hand, would be nice to have but Bachmann's modified 'Hall' is seriously flawed, and it would take a lot of work to put it right.

Besides, having two 'Castles' to deal with was more than enough. I wanted both to be dressed up as they were on that day 55 years ago, clearly working locomotives but cleaned and prepared to a high standard.



There's no doubt that a set of etched name and numberplates really smartens up any ready-to-run GWR locomotive. The Fox Transfers set included everything for 4079, with the splasher lining transfers sold separately.



The printed plates are accurately sized, so the etched numberplates fit over them perfectly. A spot of Glue 'n' Glaze or Velo-Set PVA on the cabside and the plate can be positioned with the point of a scalpel.



The driver's nameplate was a must! I set up A I PERFECT in 2pt Avenir font and OLD OAK COMMON below it in 1pt and was pretty impressed at the legibility produced by my HP inkjet printer at home.



The trickiest problem was the main cast GWR headboard. I had no suitable photographs of the real thing. Eventually I found a similar garter crest on the internet.



The side elements from the London and Bristol coats of arms were photographed from a GWR carriage transfer and printed at the appropriate size. They were then mounted on paper and the green background was painted around them.



One nameplate on 4079 was moulded as part of the reversing lever. I cut off the two sections of the lever and refitted them to the locomotive before attaching the new nameplate.



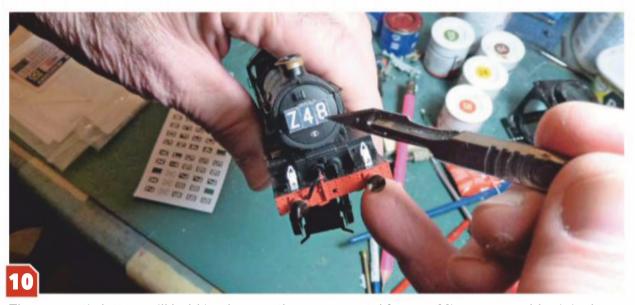
The Fox nameplates are pre-painted. I just added the separate lining transfer to the splasher panel before gluing the plate in place with a bead of Glue 'n' Glaze along the bottom edge.



The train reporting number for No. 4079 was enlarged from a photograph of the real thing. This was retouched with a black pen to sharpen the edges and then scanned and reduced to scale size.



On No. 7029 I used a Precision Labels frame and printed characters. The metal frame is glued over the smokebox door handle and the characters are cut from a sheet with a thin magnetic backing.



The magnetic letters will hold in place on the newer metal frames. Mine was an old original frame, so the characters are held in place with a tiny spot of PVA glue.

Decorations

When No. 4079 backed onto 'The Great Western' it carried three boards on the front but none was a conventional train nameboard.

On the top lamp iron was a cast and elaborately painted GWR coat-of-arms, provided by the Western Region.
Bolted to the smokebox door handles was the train reporting bracket, carrying the code 'Z48'. Below that, on the centre lamp iron above the bufferbeam, was the 'lan Allan Railtour' headboard.

A driver's nameplate was fitted on the cabside, the only time I ever saw these used. It was said that drivers did not normally use them as they did not wish passengers to be able to identify them in letters of complaint!

The coaches had cant rail carriage boards with 'The Great Western' on one board and 'Paddington to Plymouth' on the other. They were white on maroon to match the coaches. However, of the seven coaches, only one BSO carried coaching stock roundels. This coach also had a silver-grey roof, indicating it had been to the paint shop more recently than the rest of the set.

Western Region train reporting numbers (generally known as headcodes) are available from Precision Labels and Fox Transfers. The latter firm claims that its numbers are in the 'correct font' but on the special train at least two different typefaces were seen, the characters on No. 4079's Old Oak Common boards were much more bold than those from Laira and Bath Road.

With the unplanned change at Westbury, things went awry with the headboards. None were transferred from 'Pendennis' to Capel Dewi Hall. Instead, someone found the 'Festiniog Railway Special' headboard which was used on the annual Paddington-Porthmadog special for the society's annual meeting. This was a piece of painted hardboard normally attached to the Ian Allan Railtour headboard when in use. It had presumably been stashed in the brake van and someone must have decided to use it, jamming it between No. 6999's lamp iron and handrail. It was a miracle that it stayed in place on the 'Hall' at speed!

No. 7025 received the Great Western and Ian Allan Railtour decorations, but not the train reporting numbers, presumably because these took time to attach to the smoke box door dart and time was pressing with a ate-running train. Nos. 7029 and 5054 both carried the full complement of front e**nd** decoration, each depot supplying its own 'Z48'.

DETAIL A 'HALL'

Dave Lowery takes one of Bachmann's modified 'Halls', adds a Brassmasters detailing kit and gives it a new paint job for its historic journey.

he main problem with the 'Modified Hall' from Bachmann was that the firm didn't re-model the front of the locomotive - the biggest modification the prototype had! Thankfully, the Brassmasters detailing kit solves this problem and oh, what a lovely little project this was! It was simple to do, involved enough modelling to feel

worthwhile, but wasn't such a big job that I feared I'd ruin the model. With all the manufacturers producing such excellently detailed models today, and taking into account their high prices, not many modellers are going to start hacking them about to add the odd chimney or alternative details.

The difference between taking a model

out of the box and building a kit is large, so I applaud Brassmasters - this project really bridges a gap.

I should add, at this point, that Bachmann's 'Modified Hall' comes with the older Collett 4,000gal tender, not the Hawksworth welded version to which No. 6999 was coupled at the time of the May 9 1964 special.



This is the subject of the project, a Bachmann GWR 'Modified Hall' 4-6-0, to which I'm adding the detailing kit and a set of Fox Transfers for the alternative name and numberplates.



The instructions supplied with the Brassmasters kit are extensive and they do a really good job of explaining each step, including the dismantling of the model locomotive. Make sure you keep all the screws somewhere safe!



One of the issues with the Bachmann model is the front. Using a craft knife, remove the various parts pertaining to the smokebox saddle and front footplate detail to prepare them for replacement.

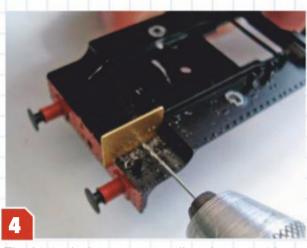

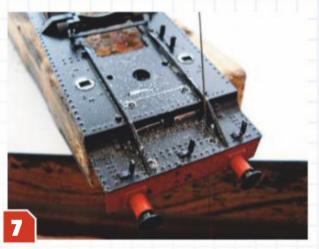

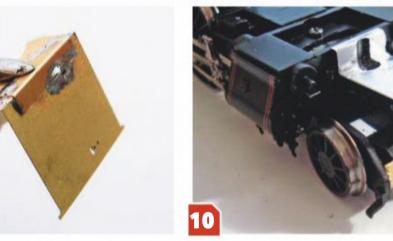

The kit includes some excellent brass guides that allow you to mark off areas to be cut and removed. Here, lifting holes are being drilled into the front frames.



Threading the piercing saw blade through the hole allows you to cut the centre piece of the footplate out. I have drilled four holes and cut a line from one hole to the next with the piercing saw.



To accommodate the lower footplate, the chassis needs to be cut and filed. Again, a template is provided. Cut out with a hacksaw and file to the final line.

The outer parts of the footplate are also cut out and the two etches rolled over the round handle of a file. Take your time and get the fit exactly right before gluing in place. Also, before gluing in place, add the lamp bracket.



Under the footplate are the front frame extensions and bufferbeam brackets that fit behind the buffers. All of this also bulks up the strength in the collective parts.



The kit includes brass overlays that cover the smokebox saddle. To fettle them into place properly, run a file along the front of the footplate to get all three parts aligned.

have to admit to being a bit of a Harry Potter fan and eagerly bought Hornby's first run of ex-Dapol 'Castles' in Hogwarts Railways red in 2001. Hornby continued to produce Hogwarts 'Castles' until 2006, but this has been superseded by its excellent 'Hall' in 2015 – which I also bought, using it to create an authentic *Hogwarts Castle*.

Faced with an unloved red 'Castle',
I decided to turn it into a very tatty No. 5055
Earl of Eldon, as I had seen it in 1964 at
Reading General. If you fancy making a really
tatty 'Castle', the old Airfix/Dapol 'Castles'
can be found for less than £40 on eBay.

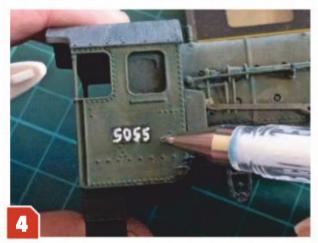
The 'Castle' could be restored to its rightful BR condition with a coat of Halfords grey primer, followed by airbrushing with RailMatch BR locomotive green. Some simple masking saved the black smokebox.



I had also masked the lining with thin strips of masking tape, thus saving the job of having to apply lining transfers. The model is going to be heavily weathered, so much of the line will be hardly seen.



The running plate and smokebox were retouched with Revell matt black and the bufferbeam received a coat of matt white before I applied matt red.



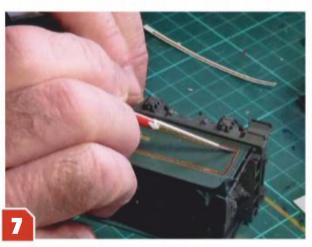
Using my photograph as a guide, I applied the 'whitewash' cabside number with a fine white lining pen bought from the local stationery shop.



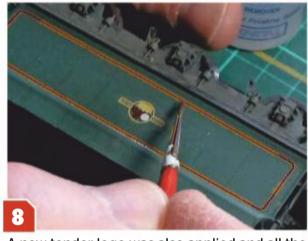
My best ever weathering job was an old Mainline '53XX' 2-6-0, so I used this as a guide. However, instead of the old staple of dirty turps, I used Tamiya weathering powders.



I mixed some murky light and dark greys and a brown from Humbrol acrylics and dry-brushed the boiler and cab with a broad, flat brush, from which most of the paint had been wiped off.



The tender lining had been lost during the repainting, so once the tender had been airbrushed in the BR green I applied new orange/black/orange lining transfers from Fox Transfers.



A new tender logo was also applied and all the transfers were fixed with Micro-Set decal setting solution. This seals the decals in place, which is important when weathering is being applied on top of them.



Throughout the task I kept referring to my photograph of No. 5055. I had made a large print so it would be easier to use and I wasn't risking damage to the original print.



Deluxe Materials Perfect Plastic Putty was used to fill the two small headboard holes in the smokebox door. These had been missed earlier and had to be retouched and weathered over.



The final step was to add some rust patches using Humbrol matt acrylics mixed to suitable 'rust' shades. Again, the photograph was used as a guide to the where the rust patches should be.

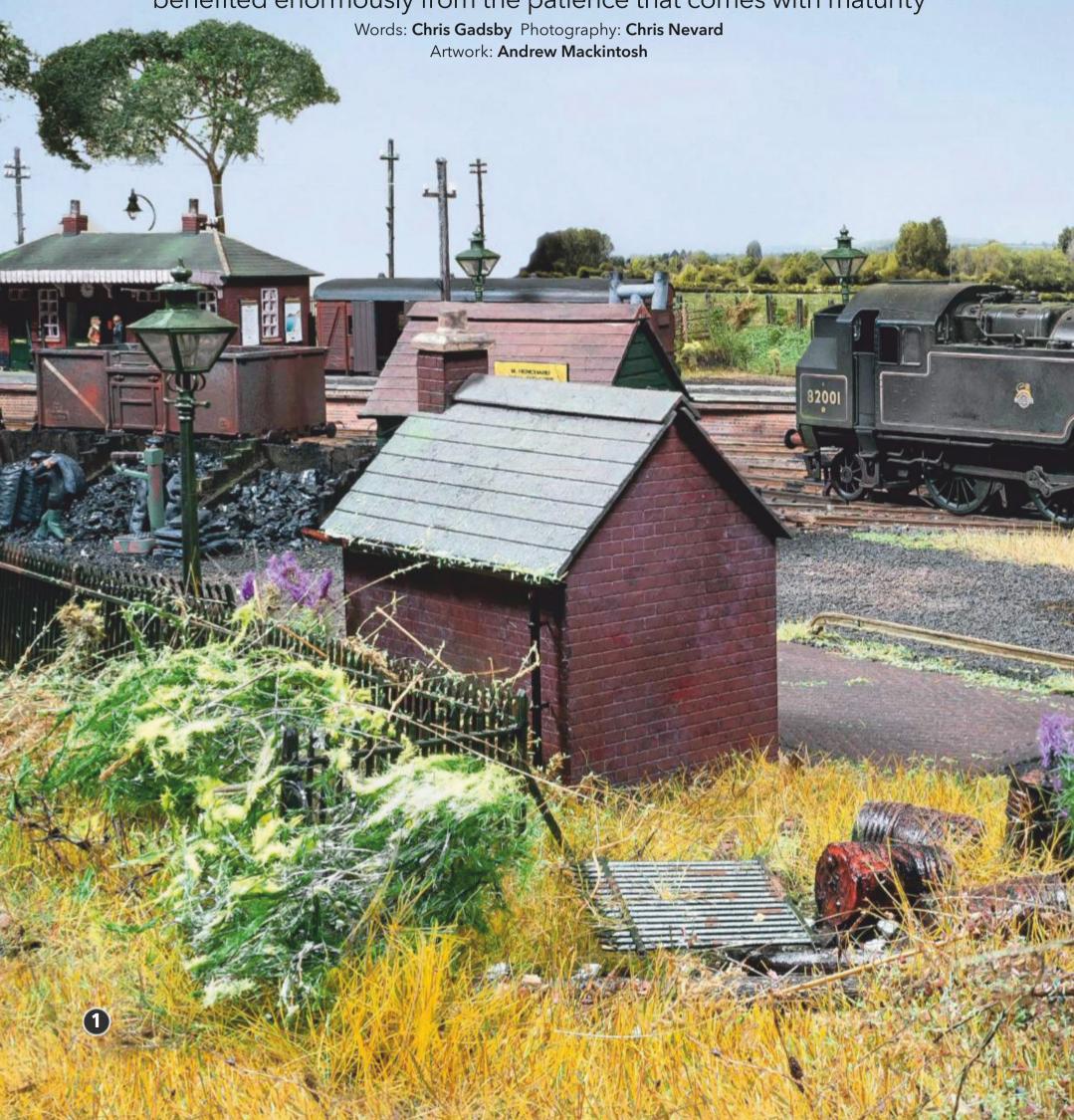

Post-Beeching fantasy

Born-again modeller **Paul Kirkup** has picked up a hobby he once enjoyed as a 15-year-old. And while he last modelled 40 years ago, his layout has benefited enormously from the patience that comes with maturity

hen Dr Beeching announced the cuts that would be made to the British railway network in 1963, the general consensus was one of anger and outrage from the many thousands of people whose local railways were about to be closed.

But what the Beeching cuts did do is present a host of opportunities to railway modellers, who suddenly had a multitude of 'what if' and fictitious scenarios at their disposal.

One of these fictitious scenarios is 'Weydon Priors', an ex-GWR line brought to life by Paul Kirkup on his 6ft 6in by 2ft layout, which rests upon an ironing board.

"I've created an elaborate backstory for it," says Paul, "in which the GWR built the line through a region where they didn't particularly want to build, but by doing so they kept the LSWR from encroaching on 'their turf'. When it became clear that the line was far from viable it was cut back, making 'Weydon Priors' a terminus, and it was then transferred to the Southern region at nationalisation, which made much more sense geographically."

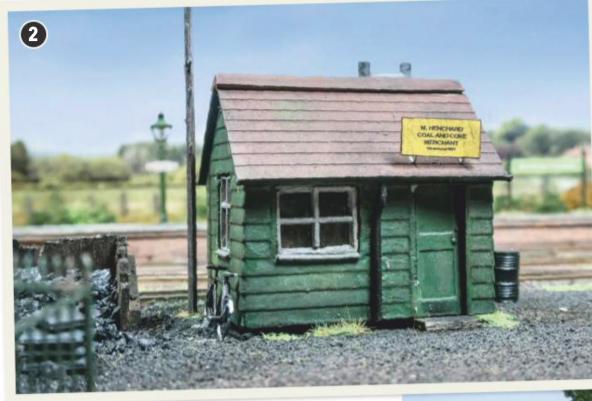
The layout is set in the early 1960s, but remnants of the Great Western Railway remain in the form of a Metcalfe signal box, which Paul chose as it was the only one he could find with the stairs facing in the direction that suited his layout. Other buildings at 'Weydon Priors' include a Scalescenes goods shed and an Airfix station kit that Paul had owned for some time. This was one of the reasons he stayed

with 'OO' gauge, rather than dropping down to 'N' gauge, which would have been much more manageable, given the space available.

BACK ON BOARD

"After being away from the hobby for 40 years, and having last modelled at the age of 15, I wanted to make sure I was definitely back 'into' modelling before I bought a lot of new products. All of the models from my childhood were still in the attic, so the outlay for the layout was quite small. This is also why 'Weydon Priors' is based where it is."

Paul viewed a couple of small layouts on ironing boards at model railway exhibitions and progress began on his version when he acquired one from his local recycling group.

"With the board set up I could begin work on board two, the baseboard. It's 12mm plywood with a 2in by 1in frame underneath as support. The track is Peco Code 100 Streamline, but because they don't make Electrofrog diamond crossings in Code 100 Streamline I had to buy a Code 75 diamond crossing and build it up to the same level, with packing underneath the rail."

'Weydon Priors' took two years to build, despite Paul's original six-month plan. But, most importantly, he achieved his goal of improving his modelling skills.

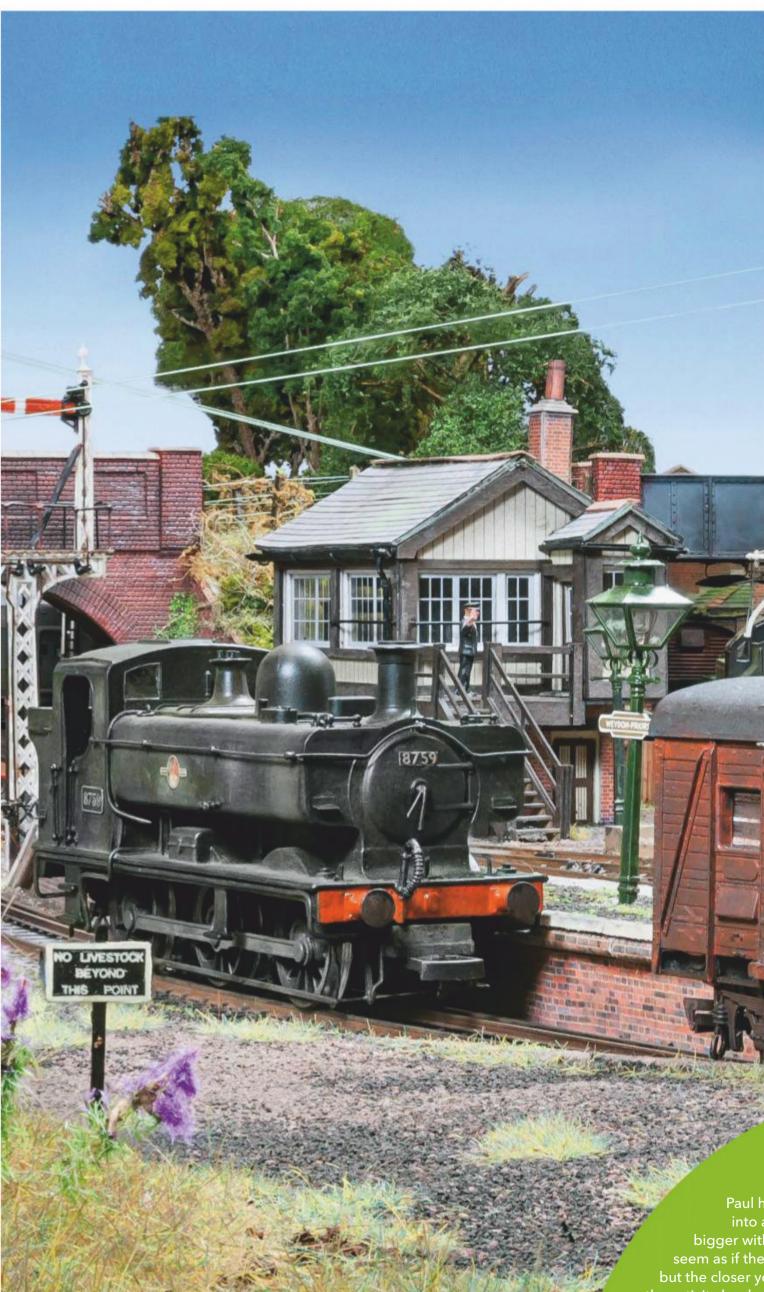
"As everyone knows, the products and techniques available have improved dramatically in the last ten years, let alone the last 40. I wanted to see if I was a better modeller now than I was then and, with a more mature mindset and considerably more patience, I think my modelling has really progressed."

Despite a more measured temperament, things did go wrong during the construction. Paul's fiddleyard is a traverser sector plate and it was only when manoeuvring a locomotive onto it that an error came to light.

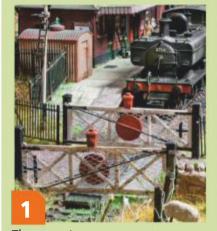
"It wasn't long enough! The locomotive got to the end of the track and the back half of the final coach was still on the scenic section of the layout, so I had to build a fold-out extension to allow the trains to leave. Another mistake was with the Ratio signals. I decided that I wanted them to be operational with a cord pulley system but didn't decide on this until they were installed; I had to drill holes and feed the

What makes this layout great?

Paul has fitted a lot of operating potential into a small layout and then made it look bigger with the smaller scale backscene. It can seem as if there is hardly anything going on at all, but the closer you look the more you'll observe that the activity has been skilfully and realistically blended into the layout.

cord through afterwards. This, however, wasn't so much an error as an inconvenience!"

REAL DEAL

Often the most realistic looking scenery is made from the very item it's meant to represent. For example, the tenders are loaded with real coal, and the logging trains are carrying sticks of real wood. Paul's trees were sourced from a variety of locations, but his walks alongside the local golf course became his prime hunting ground for suitably shaped twigs.

"Between the golf course and my own back garden I found all the materials I needed. Most were just twigs lying on the ground, but I also used hydrangea heads. Each has been given a coating of flock.

"As well as modelling the trees, my reborn modelling interest motivated me to try using static grass, but with this I wanted to be a little bit different. Plenty of layouts feature luscious green grass and perfect blue skies, but I wanted to depict late September or early October, when the trees and the grass are just starting to change into the reds and oranges of autumn.

"For the ground cover I've used tea leaves and coffee granules to give the place an overall gritty and unkempt feel. This theme continues with the overgrown loading dock, my favourite part of the layout, giving the whole area an





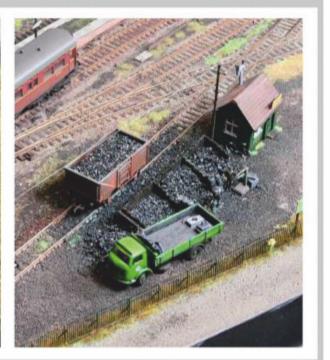

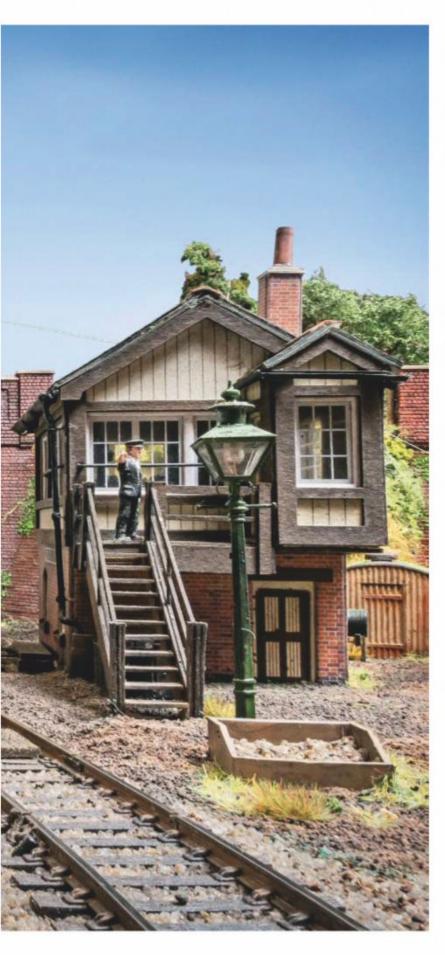

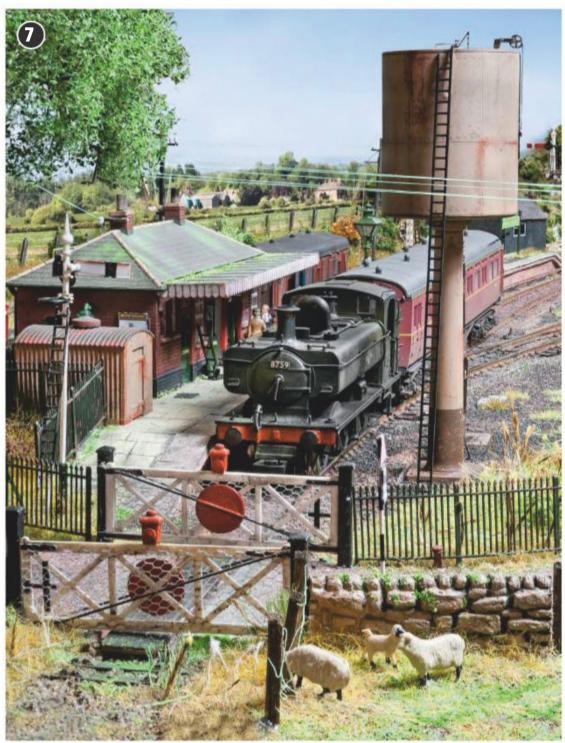

unloved feel. I made the brambles using my daughter's hair (with her permission!) cut into short lengths and scattered over grass coated with hairspray, then sprayed again and scatter material sprinkled on to it."

FEELING OF DEPTH

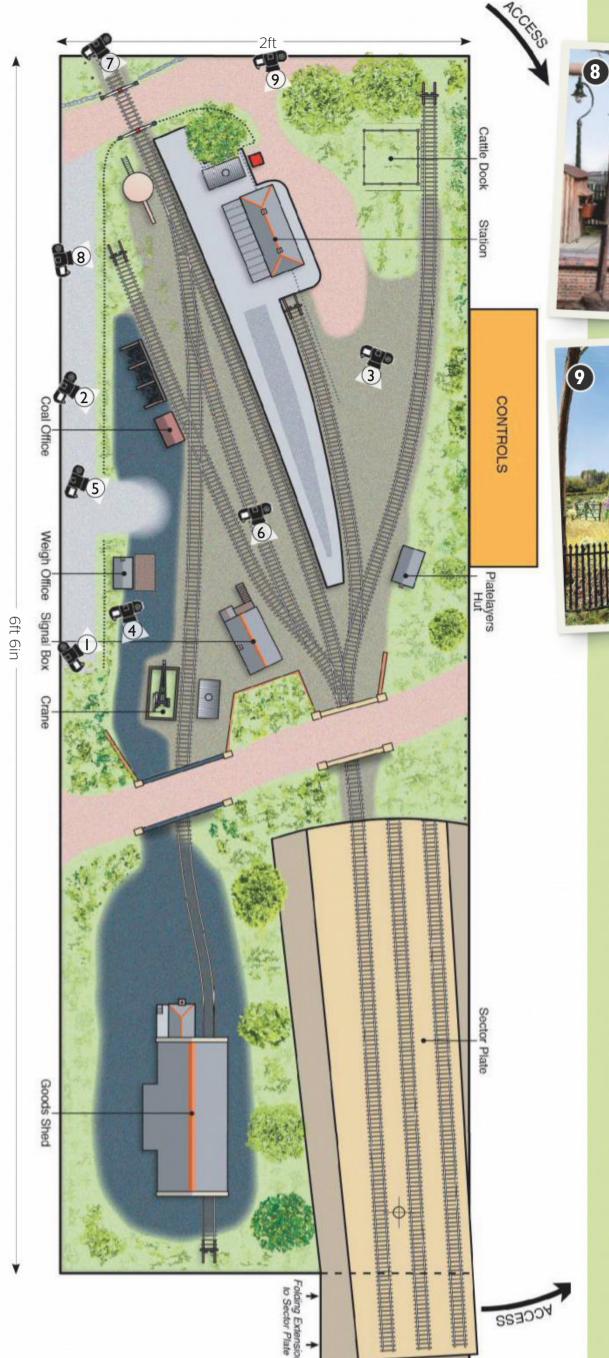
Paul has also used perspective to good effect at 'Weydon Priors'. With a layout this narrow, it was important to work hard to create the impression of a three-dimensional world, rather than a flat earth which finishes at the edge of the baseboard. Cunningly, he's used an 'N' gauge backscene as opposed to a 'OO' backscene as this makes the printed houses appear to be further away than they would with the 'OO' equivalent.

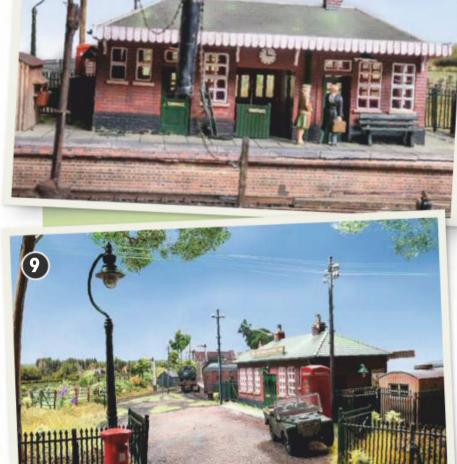
"I've also put a slight embankment at the back to hide the join between the backscene and the baseboard for a better blend between the two and to make it seem less obvious that the three-dimensional world has suddenly become two-dimensional."

When presented with a blank canvas it's easy to fall into the trap of filling it with track here and trees there – before you know it there's a train carving its way through a path in an Amazonian rainforest. Sometimes less is more and an important trick here is knowing when to stop. Paul has managed it, and had it not been for Beeching's cuts, 'Weydon Priors' would not exist – and Paul's hydrangeas would still be in full bloom.

WHEN THINGS GO WRONG



I've sprayed a plastic model with varnish that has reacted with the paint and caused it to blister. Is there any way I can resolve it, or have I just written it off? Bob Collins, by e-mail

Chris Leigh says: I put this question to our painting expert, George Dent, and he told me that there's no easy way to put it right, short of stripping the paint and starting again.

He recommended Phoenix Precision Paints' PQ18 SuperStrip, a reusable liquid paint stripper that is safe for use on virtually all plastics and metal surfaces.

The SuperStrip fluid is offered in various quantities, but I opted for the smallest (125ml) bottle. This stuff isn't cheap, but George says that it's possible to recover the fluid after use

(it can be filtered through an old tea strainer) and poured back into the bottle ready for the next stripping job. In fact, George tells me that he's been using the same bottle of SuperStrip for about ten years!

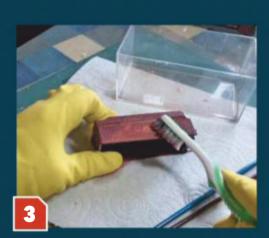
As with all paint strippers, it's vital to follow all of the safety precautions listed on the bottle and to avoid contact with the skin - and especially your eyes. Wear suitable protective clothing and eye protection and strip the model of any loose fittings and clear glazing before applying the SuperStrip - the fluid will attack clear plastic and weaken bonds made with cyano glue.



I tried cutting back the damaged paint with a fibreglass pencil, but it wasn't very successful. The SuperStrip is reusable and is available in a variety of quantities, from 125ml to 1 litre.



Only a few basic tools are required, including a couple of old paintbrushes and a toothbrush, plus a plastic container (an Oxford Diecast lid) in which to pour the paint-stripping fluid.



I started with the tender, immersing one side in the container of liquid for a few moments and then scrubbing it with the toothbrush. This process was repeated numerous times on both sides and the back.



I wore rubber gloves throughout and worked on a layer of highly absorbent kitchen tissue. Cotton buds and cocktail sticks proved useful for stubborn areas and for getting into corners.



The moment we all dread: Chris' choice of varnish reacted adversely with the underlying paint, causing the surface to blister. When this happens, it's best to allow it to dry fully before stripping back to bare

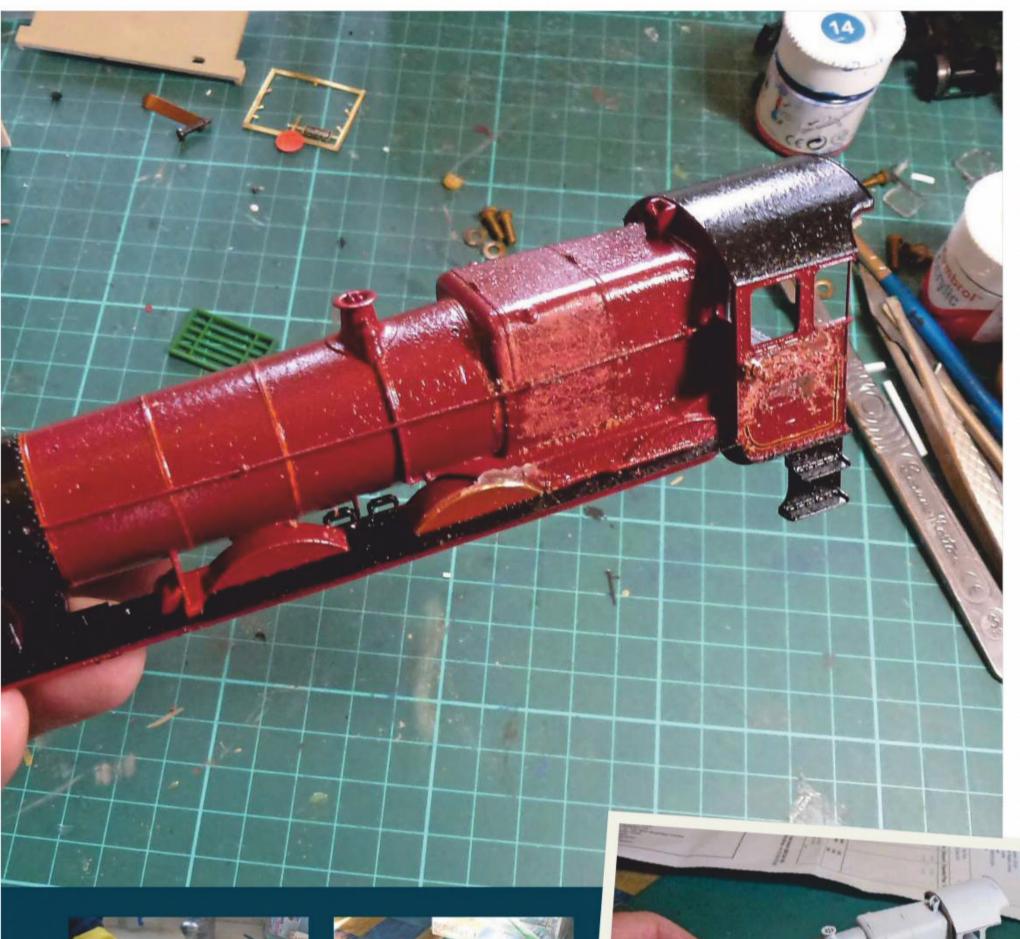
The original Hornby tampo printing seemed particularly stubborn but could be removed with the aid of the cocktail stick. The job cannot be hurried, so take your time. Inevitably, it's messy work.

Once I was satisfied that all of the damaged paintwork had been dissolved, I drained off as much of the stripper as possible, then washed the bodyshells in clean, lukewarm water without soap or detergent.



Once the body had dried, it looked awful. But, despite appearances, the paint was gone and the plastic mouldings were smooth once more. I allowed it 24 hours to dry thoroughly.

A light coat of Halfords white primer, from an aerosol can, revealed areas which needed further attention, such as a little paint residue on the steps which will have to be dealt with.

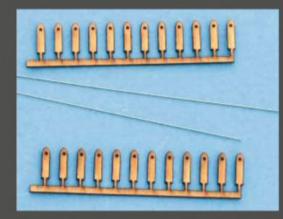
To remove the risk of blistering paint, employ the same brands and formula of paints and varnish throughout a project, unless you're sure that different types are compatible.

Technique of the month Fencing quick fix

A lack of fences on a layout makes it look incomplete. Happily, there is a good selection of fences available in the popular scales from a number of manufacturers, including Ancorton, Bachmann, Faller, Gaugemaster, Osborn Models, Wills and Ratio.

I recently added some single-pole fencing to a 'OO' layout and, because 5mm foam had been laid onto the baseboard top, it made the task of fixing the posts a lot easier than I'd anticipated. In fact, it removed the need to drill holes through the finished scenery and into the timber baseboard material. (PM)



This single-pole fencing pack is from the Ancorton Models range. The wooden fence posts are laser-cut and need to be carefully cut from the sprue with a sharp knife over a cutting board.



I painted the posts before cutting them free. When dry, the supplied wire was threaded through the holes. A scrap of card was cut to the required length, which helped get the posts spaced equally.



I used the craft knife to cut a small slot in the baseboard foam to take the fence posts. After painting, the texture of the posts resembles that of concrete.



AIRBRUSHING FOR 'O' GAUGE

I've enjoyed Model Rail's Skills Station articles on airbrushing, although I was hoping for a list of recommended airbrushes and compressors. I work in 'O' gauge, so what set-up would George recommend? Alan White, by e-mail

George says: I'm glad to hear that you've been enjoying our new Skills Station feature. Alas, we didn't have space to include my personal product recommendations.

I only work in 7mm scale occasionally, but when I do, my preference is usually for an Iwata Revolution CR airbrush, which sports a 0.5mm nozzle. This tool will make easy work of the initial livery coats and more general weathering work. If the model is especially large, such as a tender steam locomotive or Co-Co diesel, I'll probably choose a pistolgripped airbrush - such as my Iwata Revolution TR-2 - for the more repetitive livery work, to cut down on 'finger fatigue'!

For more exacting weathering work, or for touching in the smaller details of a locomotive or rolling stock subject, I invariably reach for my Iwata HP-CH (0.3mm nozzle), as it allows

for greater precision and can be employed close up to the surface.

As for a compressor, my two current favourites are a Sparmax TC-610H and an Iwata Smart Jet Pro. Both are well-suited to the demands of working on 'O' gauge models, although the Sparmax unit's 2.5-litre air reservoir gives it a slight edge, allowing the motor to run only when it needs to top up the tank.

CHOOSING ACRYLIC METALLIC PAINTS



What acrylic metallic paints do your experts recommend? Geoff Edgecombe, Formby

George says: Darkstar's 'Molten Metal' acrylics are among the best for general use. Suitable for brush or airbrush application, they can be thinned with water or Darkstar's own thinners. When dry, the finish can be polished to produce realistic burnished effects. The range has recently been expanded, so there are plenty of useful shades to choose from.

HOW DO I INSTALL TEMPORARY SIGNS TO BUILDINGS?



Is there a way of swapping the signs on my layout so that I can run trains from different eras?

Saul Davies, by e-mail

Peter says: Blu Tack is a viable option for mounting signs, and it gives you the option of easy removal. However, this material tends to lose its 'stickiness' after a while and needs to be re-kneaded to reactivate the adhesive. It also tends to be rather bulky.

In contrast, Deluxe Materials'
Tacky Wax provides modellers with an ideal temporary adhesive for signs, figures and many other applications. The wax can be placed on the rear of the signs with a knife point or cocktail stick and it offers a good level of adhesion. What's more, it can be removed easily without leaving unsightly stains or residues.

I've used it on a number of layouts, allowing me to switch between British Rail and privatisation eras, or simply to change the nature of industrial buildings or depots, allowing me to run different types of wagons.

HOW DO I CREATE A REALISTIC LOAD OF TIMBER PIT PROPS?

Does anybody produce a realistic set of pit prop wagon loads for 'OO' gauge wagons? Or do you have any tips for making my own - preferably something that won't take too long!

Bob Bridger, by e-mail

George says: Although not branded as a pit prop load, Ten Commandments offers a useful cast plaster wagon load (ref. W103) that simply requires painting and weathering before dropping into a standard four-wheel planked open wagon. The logs are loaded length-wise, in two piles, with the timber measuring a scale 8ft or so, which is probably on the large side for mine props.

However, in many cases pit props were stacked vertically into railway wagons and an economical option is to create your own loads from wooden barbecue skewers.

Available in large packs from supermarkets for a bargain price, the wood can be trimmed to length with a set of garden pruners.

I created a simple pit prop load for a 'OO9' wagon a few years back, fixing the wood onto a bed of PVA glue. Alas, it was only after fixing the props in place that I realised that I should have treated them to a coat of dark wood dye beforehand! Next time, I'll brush each skewer with dye before cutting it into short lengths, touching in the exposed ends later.

HOW DO I INSTALL LASER-CUT GLAZING?



I recently bought a few packs of Shawplan's laser-cut glazing but I'm not sure of the best way to fit it.

What's the best glue to use? David Murrey, by e-mail

George says: I'm a big fan of Shawplan's laser-cut glazing packs. Many of my diesel locomotives and coaches have been greatly enhanced by the addition of the new windows, giving them a much more prototypical look.

The glazing requires a little care when cutting from the plastic fret, with a pair of tiny 'tangs' holding them in position. These need to be cut with a sharp scalpel blade and, after test-fitting, it may be necessary to fettle the corners slightly with a needle file.

Be aware that the glazing is cut with the edges chamfered slightly, although you may need the aid of a magnifier to discern this. The angled contour allows the individual panes to fit snugly into the apertures.

When you're happy that the window sits perfectly in the opening, it can be secured. Avoid using any form of glue - even those advertised for use with glazing - as they're too thick. Instead, a gloss acrylic varnish will suffice.

Perhaps the best medium is a new product from Deluxe Materials, called Looks Like Glass. Very similar to the old - and legendary - formula of Johnson's Klear floor polish, Looks Like Glass is thin enough to permeate the tiny gap around each window pane.

For neat results, apply the fluid over the whole window with a good quality paintbrush, both inside and out, to provide a very secure bond. This will also provide a resilient coating to prevent scratches in future.

The fluid dries quickly - in two to three hours - to a crystal clear finish. It won't yellow with age, and brushes can be cleaned with soapy water. Looks Like Glass can also be used as a clear gloss varnish coat on any type of paintwork (enamel or acrylic), applied by hand or airbrush. You can thin it with water, if required, but it's thin enough to be airbrushed straight from the bottle.

After removing the original glazing and ensuring that each aperture is free of any burrs or debris, cut each laser-cut window from the fret gently, using a sharp, pointed blade, taking care not to scratch the plastic



When you're sure that the individual window fits perfectly, it can be pushed gently into position. A cotton bud is useful, as it won't damage the plastic.



The glazing is formed with a chamfer to the edges, allowing for a snug, friction fit. Check that each pane is oriented correctly and check the fit. Fettle with a needle file if necessary.



Dip a brush into Looks Like Glass and cover the entire glazing pane, allowing the fluid to run into the gap around the edges. When dry, repeat the application to the inside.



GLAZING FOR SCALESCENES KITS



I loved the Scalescenes box file layout that featured in MR257. Like George, my printer can't deal with printing

onto clear plastic. Is there an alternative source for the windows?
Brian Davids, Woking

George says: Scalescenes kits come complete with a choice of windows, which can be printed onto clear film (if your domestic printer allows it) or onto regular paper. I originally opted for the latter, as they looked suitably grimy and opaque, which suited the industrial nature of this tiny layout.

However, it's a shame that the interior detail isn't visible and the layout would look

even better with the addition of some low-voltage interior lighting. Therefore, clear glazing would be a real boon.

Luckily, John at Scalescenes generously sent me a raft of samples of his Scale Glaze, which is designed to complement the amazing array of downloadable building kits in the Scalescenes range.

Screen-printed onto flexible clear acetate, the windows come in many shapes and sizes, with domestic, commercial and industrial patterns. There's also a printed paper template to aid scratchbuilders using Scalescenes' sheets of general brick or stonework.

Tool of the month

Budget metal folding tool

A number of brands offer slight variations on the 'Hold and Fold' principle, including Avonside Works (available from Eileen's Emporium). RP Toolz's versions, however, offer a cheaper option ideally suited to occasional use or for smaller parts and more pliable materials.

Designed primarily for aircraft and military modellers, the clamping prongs aren't as versatile as those on more expensive tools, but they're fine for forming basic shapes in thin etched brass or nickel silver.

The 80mm version shown here is ideal for shaping small etched brass or nickel silver detailing and kit components and will sit comfortably into a typical modeller's toolbox.

Those who need to fold larger metal parts, such as wagon or coach sides and locomotive frames, will require something a little larger and sturdier, however.

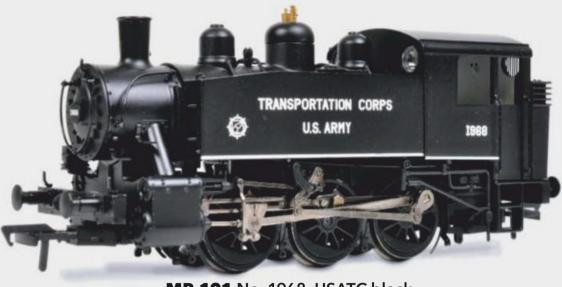

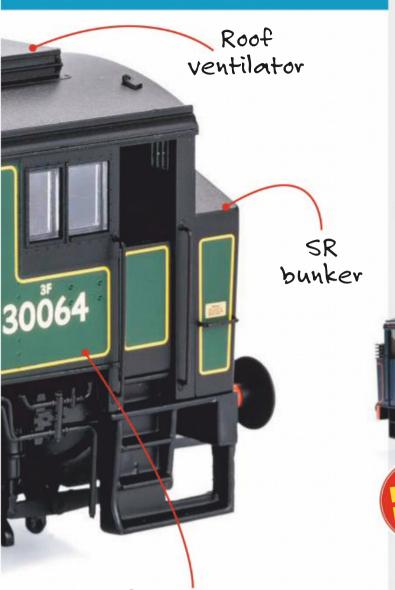

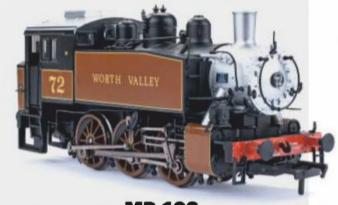

ormat planning' was a concept
I introduced last issue as a way to think
about how the baseboard arrangement
– end-to-end, 'L' or 'U'-shaped or

format – and you'll be able to maximise space and create a realistic landscape through which your trains can run.

I make no apologies for continuing with the 'format planning' theme again this month, mainly because it enables me to explore some Scottish railways that we couldn't get in last time!

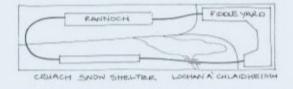


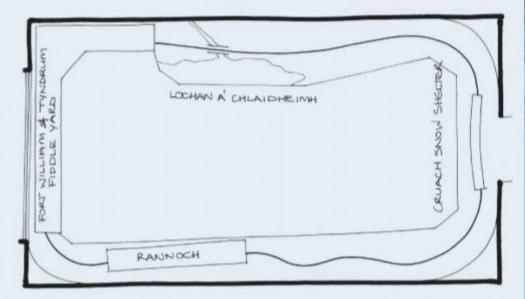
The Rannoch area has an almost eerie, remote and wild appearance. We're so adept at modelling sunny days but seldom stray into other seasons. I can't help but feel that anyone who can recreate this atmosphere on a layout will cause something of a stir.

RANNOCH MOOR

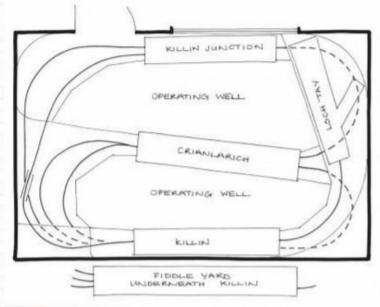
There's often more than one formatting solution to any layout design, and this diagram perfectly illustrates the point. The larger oval scheme with central operating well suits 'OO' gauge, whereas the long, narrow version would be better in 'N' or even 'Z' gauge. Despite the differences in shape and the amount of space they take up, they both feature the same locations: Rannoch station, Cruach snow shed and Loch A' Chlaidheimh.





CRIANLARICH TO KILLIN

This stretch of the former Callander & Oban line features two important junctions. To the east is Killin Junction, where the branch to Killin and Loch Tay diverged. To the west is Crianlarich, where the West Highland crossed the C&O. A landslip forced the closure of the C&O between Crianlarich and Callander; trains to Oban have used the West Highland since 1965.



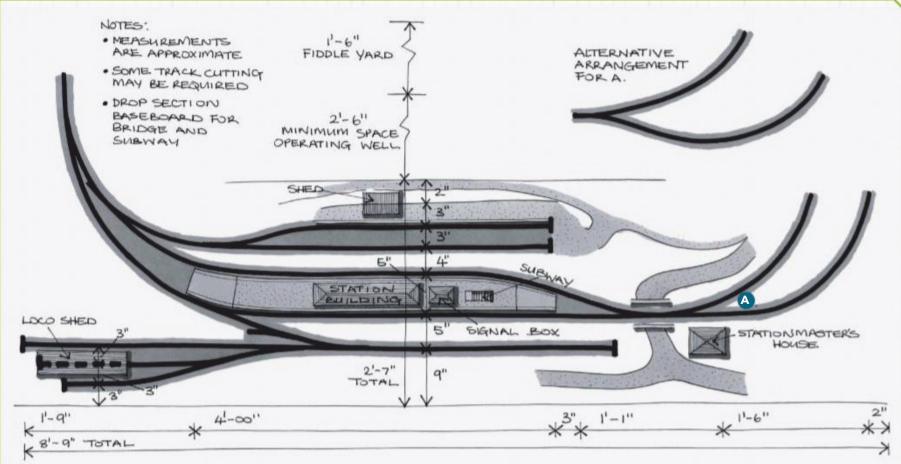
This complex plan includes both a figure-of-eight and an out-and-back branch line. It requires three levels: a fiddleyard and the Crianlarich circuit on the lowest level, Killin Junction about 2in higher, at mid-level with grades down to Crianlarich at one end and a fiddleyard at the other. The Loch Tay branch rises up another 4in or so to pass over tracks (top left corner), creating a 6in clearance for Killin station over the fiddleyard, then on to Loch Tay, including its pier siding, along the bottom wall.



'Black Fives' Nos. 44996 and 44908 have their tanks replenished at Crianlarich Upper in the 1950s with a train bound for Glasgow. This shed still survives but the station is now just called Crianlarich. The link to the former Callander & Oban line is to the left of the image. RAIL ONLINE

Once you've identified the format for a layout, the next most important step is to make a rough calculation of the length and width you'll need to accommodate your desired plan, or determine whether it can be tailored to fit what space you have. When working with rigid geometry track, such as Peco Setrack, I map out the dimensions, as shown here for a standalone

version of Crianlarich station, at around 8ft 9in long and 6ft 7in wide, which includes an operating well and a fiddleyard. A little extra length and we might be able to accommodate alternative arrangement **A**, and with the careful use of view-blocking trees between both tracks you'll get an improved appearance of each one diverging in a different direction, like the prototype.

KYLE OF LOCHALSH TO DINGWALL

The line from Dingwall to Kyle of Lochalsh is one of Britain's remotest - it's why staff at Inverness depot raided the local motor factories for spotlights to mount on the front of their Class 26s and 27s!

Remote it might be, but it's one of Scotland's great railway journeys, and the stretch along the shores of Loch Carron, around Plockton, is a jewel in the railway's crown.

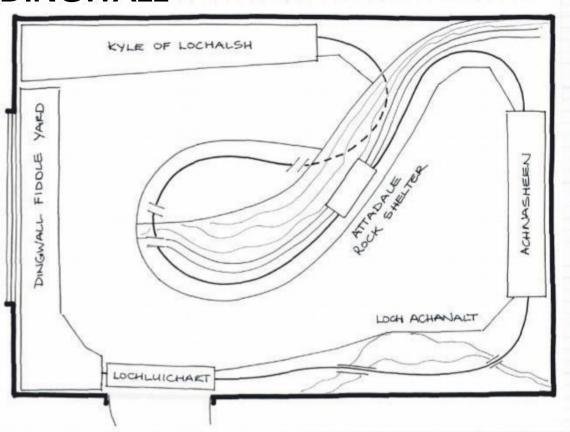

I've chosen an end-to-end format for the Kyle Line but it's not the sort of end-to-end you'd see at an exhibition. I've gone for a room-filler with an island peninsula, which will suit either 'N' or 'OO' gauges, and I've also been able to include Kyle of Lochalsh station, Attadale rock shelter, Achnasheen station, Loch Achanalt, and the wonderfully remote-looking Lochluichart Halt.

HIGHLAND MAIN LINE

The story of how the Highland Railway's main line from Stanley Junction near Perth in the south to Thurso in the north was built is a long and convoluted one, including such players as the Perth & Dunkeld and Inverness & Perth Junction railways. H.A. Vallance's *The Highland Railway* is highly recommended for those who wish to learn more. Its construction may have been complex, but it has two outstanding sections: the beauty of the Killiecrankie Pass and the slogs to Druimuachdar and Slochd, the former claiming the title for the highest point on the national network.

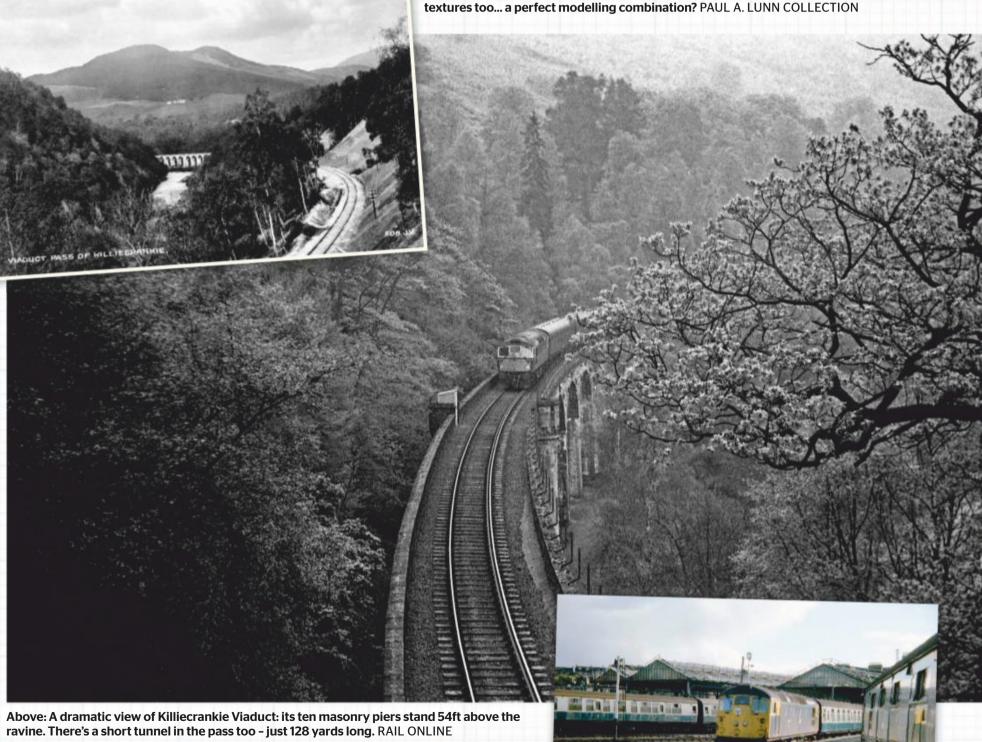

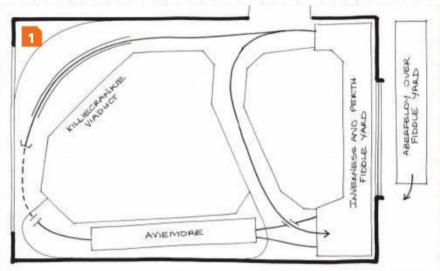

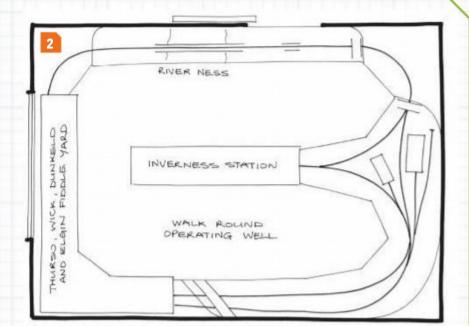


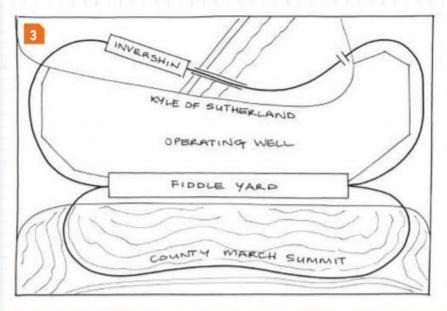

HIGHLAND TRACKPLANS



- **1** This format plan is almost certainly 'N' gauge. It combines a scenic run with Killiecrankie Viaduct as the main feature, and Aviemore station and junction, which provide substantial operational interest, contrasted by part of the Aberfeldy branch, with a terminus over a shared fiddleyard below.
- 2 Inverness station and depot sit at the point of a triangle, with lines north and south at the other points. Good access all round has been achieved by stopping the station platform board short of the fiddleyard, ideally with a minimum 2ft 6in gap.
- **3** A massively long run with numerous prototype features to choose from. Clearly you can't have it all, so I've chosen two contrasting favourites, County March Summit, on the Sutherland/Caithness boundary and Invershin, north of Bonar Bridge, where the railway follows the Kyle of Sutherland. I'd recommend 'N' gauge and focus on scenic grandeur and the ability to watch trains pass through each of the two settings.

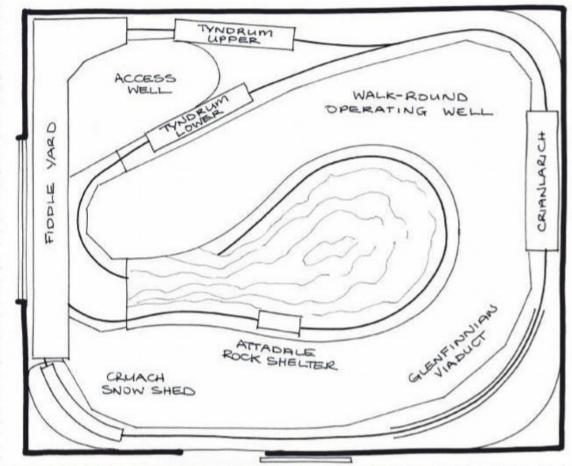

FICTIONAL FORMAT PLANNING

Inspired by some of the best bits of North West Scotland, I've used a round-the-room and central peninsula format to provide an opportunity for the largest number of personally preferred features; two Tyndrums (Upper and Lower Stations), Crianlarich Station with nearby Junction and timber sidings, Glenfinnan Viaduct, Attadale rock shelter and three substantial scenic runs. Of the three, at least one, on the peninsula, would look a lot like County March Summit, that between Glenfinnan Viaduct and fiddleyard as Rannoch moorland with Cruach Snow Shed masking the exit to the fiddleyard. I would have liked to include Banavie bridge, but it's important to know when to stop trying to squeeze more into the limited space you have!

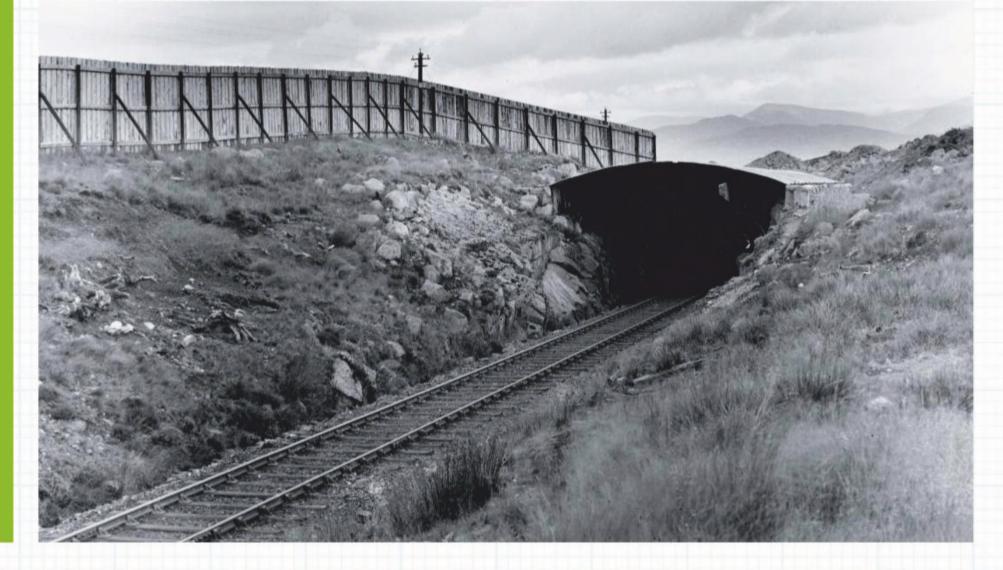

he D600 'Warships' have long enjoyed a level of popularity that's disproportionate to their contribution to the story of UK diesel traction. Perhaps the same is true of any small, short-lived class. Certainly, justice has never been done to the class in model form. In the past I had kits by both Q Kits and Genesis. Neither would pass muster these days!

Then, in 2010, Kernow MRC announced that it had commissioned an exclusive 'OO' gauge ready-to-run model. Despite the project transferring twice, to different manufacturers, it made little headway. Part of the problem was that there was nothing to scan in order to start the process. In due

course, a large-scale model was produced and made available for scanning and Kernow's project started to move forward.

However, just a year ago Kernow brought the project under direct control, dealing one-to-one with the Chinese factory. Now I have my third D600 'Warship' model in 50 years and, at last, one that's worthy of the name.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

Model Rail received both blue and green examples for review and I had D601 Ark Royal on order, enabling some extended test-running, as well as fitting of all the detail parts. The model comes well packed in a stout two-piece cardboard box, lined with foam.



There's a sturdy vacuum-formed 'iceberg' unit which holds the locomotive, and there's a separate small packet of detail parts. The robust packaging is necessary because this is one big, heavy beast of a locomotive – it weighs in



at a whopping 468g (1lb 1/20z).

D601 comes with a very neatly etched and fully coloured 'Cornish Riviera Express' headboard, as carried by these locomotives when they became the first diesels to work the premier Western

> Those who don't like to fit detail parts may be deterred by the extent of end fittings which need to be added. Bufferbeam cables and hoses are easily fitted into their appropriate holes, following the supplied illustration. These parts are fine and need handling with tweezers. A spot of Glue 'n' Glaze on the pin will keep them in place. Coupling hooks and screw links come as two separate parts, and there are bogie steps, open or closed headcode discs, and a centre

I conferred with Mike Romans. who worked on the WR at the time these locomotives were in seemed to be some 'indecision' regarding the lamp iron locations, the initial delivery having three lower ones in line. made for fitting the steam-era frames for the train reporting to those early examples which 'Royal Duchy' with headboards attached. Subsequently, the centre lamp iron was moved higher and the headboard, if carried at all, was, it seems, usually lop-sided. A hole for the centre lamp iron is provided in the uppermost position. If you want to fit the headboard in its more normal location, you'll need to drill a hole lower down. The headboard then covers the existing hole.

The body is held in place by four clips on the body sides. Simply levering the sides outwards releases the clips and enables the body to be removed, though it remains attached to the chassis by the two hanks of lighting wires. Those

Region express in 1958. In fact it comes with four identical boards! Quite why the pack contains four is not known, as Kernow did not actually order any!

Kernow is offering examples with early or late-style grilles and also with either the original disc headcodes or the later four-character headcode boxes. The latter, an obvious afterthought, were a rather unsightly attachment to the nose ends of the locomotives.

The metal chassis has plastic detail fittings, including the fuel tanks. A pair of tiny switches under the tank enable the cab light and tail lights to be switched off. Otherwise, when running on analogue control, both are illuminated, together with the headcode boxes or discs.

The plastic moulded bodyshell effectively captures the shape and character of the real thing, which is a significant achievement given that there are no surviving examples to scan and that the real thing had some subtle curves and scarcely a straight line to be seen. In particular, the nose ends look just right with their two prominent oval horn mountings. They may not have been beautiful but the D600s weren't ugly either. They had 'character', which is abundant in this model.

The recessed wire handrails adjacent to the cab doors are well done, and there are two offset etched fan grilles on the roof, with fan detail visible beneath them.

The glazing is all flush and the cab windscreens have separately fitted wipers. Separate lamp irons are factory-fitted, but on the disc headcode versions the open and closed discs are left to be fitted by the modeller.

TRUE BLUE?

The blue version of D602, based no doubt on my friend Keith Jaggers' photograph, has pre-fitted headcodes (1C75 and 5C53). Buffers are blackened metal and sprung, and the nameplates are pre-fitted etchings. Both the blue and the BR green are, to my eye, a little dark when compared to the shades used by other manufacturers, but not enough to detract. In fact, it may just be that a rather more matt finish has been used. Also, it is important to realise that D602 was painted in the Chromatic blue used initially by Swindon in its airless spraying equipment, which resulted in a slightly different finish from regular Rail blue.

Details which really catch the eye are the very fine riveted window frames, picked out in silver colour, and the clear, flush glazing which gives a good view into the detailed cab interior. The latter means that a driver will need to be fitted. Two versions with the original-style louvres are being produced and four with the later grilles. This detail only relates to the bank of three upper grilles adjacent to the cab doors. Originally the

Factfile: North British 'Warship'

Despite the popular myth that the Western Region just wanted to be different, its choice of diesel-hydraulic traction, rather than diesel-electric, was both carefully considered and forward-thinking. Under pressure to modernise and to increase speed and efficiency, the WR believed that the fitting of automatic continuous brakes to most wagons was the single most significant measure towards speeding up and rejuvenating the railway.

It would enable the speeding up of slow trains, reducing the rift between the fastest and slowest. It would also mean that a higher power-to-weight ratio in locomotives would enable trains to be accelerated more quickly, while excessive weight in locomotives wouldn't be needed to stop loose-coupled freights. The WR recognised that the diesel-hydraulic locomotive fitted perfectly with the scheme.

However, the British Transport Commission had limited experience of diesel-electrics with heavy, slow-running engines and no experience at all of diesel-hydraulics.

As the Western Region insisted that some of the proposed Type 4 (2,000hp) diesels should be hydraulics, so the BTC insisted that they should be of heavyweight construction for direct comparison with its 2,000hp dieselelectrics. However, none of its proposed diesel-electric behemoths was yet in service. The D600s weighed in at

117 tons 8cwt compared to 133 tons for the English Electric, and 138 tons for the BR/Sulzer diesel-electrics.

An order for a small number of medium-sized diesel-hydraulics had been given to North British Locomotive Co. in Glasgow. These would be the first of the 'D63XX' (later Class 22) locomotives. There followed an order for five 2,000hp locomotives running on two six-wheel bogies. As NBL engineers were unable to design a pivotless six-wheel bogie, the middle axle of each had to be unpowered, giving an A1A-A1A wheel arrangement.

The locomotives were to be named after Royal Navy warships, and the first,

No. D600 Active, appeared in 1958 ahead of the dieselelectric equivalents from English Electric and BR/Sulzer. D600 was thus the first Type 4 diesel to enter traffic. It and D601 Ark Royal had MAN engines and Voith transmissions made in Germany, but the remainder of the class, D602 Bulldog, D603 Conquest and D604 Cossack used equipment made under licence by NBL.

On its inaugural run from Paddington to Bristol and back No. D600 suffered an engine failure but was able to return home on one engine. All five D600s were based at Plymouth Laira and were quickly put to work on the premier Paddington-Penzance express, the 'Cornish Riviera'.

However, even before the end of 1958, the Western Region had taken delivery of D800, the first of its 78 ton, 2,000hp diesel-hydraulics built at Swindon and based on the German V200 design, and named it after the region's General Manager Sir Brian Robertson. Now it had the lightweight diesel-hydraulics with quick-running diesel engines that it had originally wanted.

The five D600s, all based at Plymouth Laira, were now destined to spend the rest of their short working careers between Plymouth and Penzance, seldom getting even as far east as Exeter. Nos. D601/2/4 were temporarily allocated to Landore (Swansea) in August 1967 to cover for

English Electric Type 3s which had gone to the Eastern Region.

All were withdrawn at the end of 1967, and though D601 lay at Woodham's scrapyard for more than a decade, it was eventually cut up, although as Britain's first Type 4 to enter traffic it warranted a place in the National Railway Museum.





Liveries

Despite their small number and short working careers, the D600 'Warships' did offer some variety in details and livery, and Kernow has opted to offer no fewer than six versions as follows:

D600 *Active*. Rail blue with full yellow ends, headcode boxes and later-style grilles.

D601 *Ark Royal*. BR green with disc headcodes and original-style louvres.

D602 *Bulldog*. Green with small yellow panel, headcode boxes and later-style grilles.

D603 *Conquest.* Green with small yellow panel, headcode discs, and later grilles.

D604 *Cossack*. Original green, no yellow panel, headcode discs and later-style grilles.

D602 *Bulldog*. Chromatic blue with small yellow panel, headcode boxes and later-style grilles.

The body can be disconnected from the chassis by releasing six tiny plugs on the main circuit board. Adjacent to this board is a 58mm by 23mm recess with clips to take a speaker for DCC sound. A 21-pin decoder socket is provided on the adjacent PCB.

The bogies are assembled from plastic mouldings, the sideframes having extremely deep and crisp

detail, reflecting the heavyweight construction of the real thing.
Self-centring NEM pockets are fitted to both bogies, the small tension-lock couplings being included in the pack of detail parts.

The wheels are a real work of art because these NBL Type 4s, and the smaller Type 2s, had spoked wheels. These have been nicely reproduced in blackened metal, the centre wheelsets correctly being of smaller diameter.

GOOD RUNNER

I tested two examples on the Model Rail test track and a third at home. All operated smoothly and

quietly straight from the box and with good slow-running characteristics. On the test track I hung a mixture of 14 Bachmann and Hornby coaches on the drawbar: D602 walked them up the 1-in-60 gradient without hesitation and with no trace of slip. It only came to a stand when the weight of the coaches was stretched around the very tight curve and the last half-dozen were still on the slope. It was also notable that, although intended for Radius 2 curves and larger, it passed over several small radius points without incident.

Without doubt, good things are worth waiting for and this is a model which scores highly in every respect. Sadly, its 'steam era' credentials may work against it in the 'modern traction' market, but there are still enough of us with fond memories of the diesel-hydraulic west to make this a winner for Kernow. (CJL)

he new Hornby 'Terrier' 0-6-0T is somewhat controversial, thanks mainly to a TV programme in which it was portrayed as a 'spoiler' for an already-announced rival product. Hornby's model is the first to reach the market, leading some to suggest that it has been rushed. Does the speed of its production indicate a compromise in quality, or was it already at an advanced stage, and the contrived contretemps with a competitor seen as a way to obtain primetime TV coverage?

We shall never know, but certainly there are a couple of issues with the Hornby 'Terrier' which detract from this otherwise keenly priced and cute little model. It is, of course, not the first time a 'Terrier' has appeared in the Hornby catalogue. The 'A1X' tooling acquired from Dapol many years ago has been in and out of the Hornby range ever since, but it was certainly due for the 21st-century re-tooling in evidence here.

The first examples to reach the shops were the 'A1X' models in BR lined black, but that was not the

version I wanted. I went shopping
– a little reluctantly – for a review
model as I did not want a BR
example. I was just about to part
with my cash when the shop
assistant at Trains4U remarked
that "some blue ones have just
come in the mail."

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

On opening the box it is immediately apparent that this is a petite and exquisite little locomotive and its pedigree - from the same stable as the Peckett O-4-OST - is obvious. The 'face' has a certain rustic charm

with its long 'droopy' handrail, very fine separate smokebox door handles and separately fitted 'brassed' lubricator pots. The elegantly tapered chimney has a neatly shaped coppered cap. Correctly, there's just one separately fitted lamp iron front and back on this Kent & East Sussex Railway version.

The 'A1' had combined splasher/sandboxes and elegant wing plates and these are commendably thin. The whistle and the Salter safety valves behind the dome are really very fine. The tank sides

feature the correct number of bolt heads for the cladding, and the fine black handrail has knobs at the correct angle.

There are one or two issues, however, which for me are not deal-breakers but if you are seeking the perfect 'A1' they might just put you off. Firstly, the buffers which are correctly shaped and have turned and blackened metal heads (not sprung) should be recessed into the running plate, and they are mounted flush to the bufferbeam. More obviously, from the top-down viewpoint, the tank tops should be recessed below the curved cladding. This latter feature is obvious from normal viewing angles and certainly detracts from the overall good looks of this little model.

On the plus side, the cab interior detail of this little locomotive is exquisite. The cab door handrails are very fine and the detail of the boiler backhead and controls looks top notch. It is a pity that it can only be glimpsed through the small openings. One almost wishes for an open-cab 'Terrier' but there never was one!

On the bunker the top coal rail is open and the rest infilled. There's the classic Stroudley toolbox and the rear spectacles have protective grilles though, apparently, *Rolvenden* did not have such a luxury.

PRETTY IN BLUE

As usual it's the quality of the finish which is Hornby's icing on the cake. The KESR colour scheme with red lining on a mid-blue background was not an example of good design but Hornby has really made an excellent job of a difficult subject. The red lining is extensive and incredibly fine and the KESR logo and painted *Rolvenden* name appear exactly as they do in photographs. As with many of the Stephens locomotives, it carries no number.

THE WORKS

Two screws in the underside hold the body in place and once these are released the body lifts off. The wheels are blackened metal with blue plastic centres and capture the look of the real thing. Hornby has tooled both the original wooden brake blocks and the later cast-iron version. *Rolvenden* has the early pattern, linked by very slim brake rods. Delicate plastic sandpipes pass behind the brake shoes.

Disappointingly, the effect of the slender nature of the brake

rods and the delicacy of the correctly jointed fish belly coupling rods is spoiled by oversized hexagon-headed crankpins. These look nothing like the round heads of the real thing and are larger than the coupling rod bosses. Indeed, the ones in the illustration on the box lid are smaller than those fitted to the actual model!

A totally enclosed motor, mounted above the bottom segment of the boiler, drives the rear axle through a worm and gearbox. For DCC users there is an >



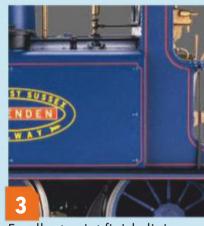

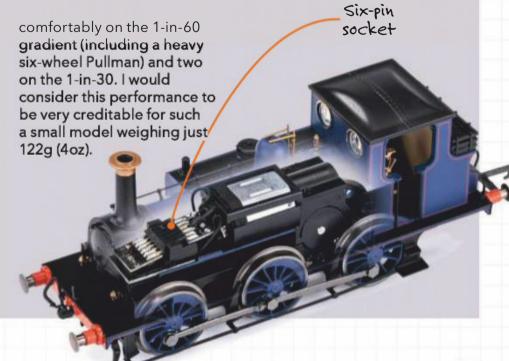

Performance

On test, both at home and on the *Model Rail* test track, the model performed smoothly throughout the speed range with good slow-running characteristics. I had five coaches behind it on the flat at home and it handled these effortlessly. On the test track it operated smoothly through Hornby pointwork but was prone to derailing on the first radius points. Its specifications state a minimum of second radius, so this was no surprise.

It managed three coaches

easily accessible six-pin decoder socket at the front of the chassis, but there is no obvious provision for sound installation. Phosphorbronze wiper pick-ups bear on the backs of all six wheels. In short, the chassis is a neat, modern interpretation of a largely traditional 0-6-0 chassis.

STOP PRESS

As this review was being written, a sample of the 'A1X', as BR

No. 32655, was received for review. Such are the changes from 'A1' to 'A1X' that this model is largely from a completely different set of tools. Among the changes correctly reflected in the model are the lengthened smokebox and sandboxes moved to below the running plate.

The chimney and dome are the same, but the firebox top features the clack valves and additional pipework associated with the Westinghouse brake, for which the pump is mounted on the cab side. On our sample, however, the front of the pipe had not been located into the smokebox, and a poorly fitted middle lamp iron pinged into oblivion when I tried to correct it. Other variations include the tall LBSCR lamp irons, cast-iron pattern brake blocks and fully plated-in bunker coal rails.

Both models have the

one-piece rear spectacle plate, a late repair that is correct for No. 32655 but not for *Rolvenden*.

In today's market an O-6-OT for well under £100 is something of a bargain. Rushed or not, Hornby's 'Terrier' is most welcome as it brings the company's latest modelling standards to a locomotive which has been a popular model since it was launched by

Factfile: 'A1/A1X' 0-6-0T

When William Stroudley came to the London, Brighton & South Coast Railway as chief mechanical engineer in 1870 he found a railway with a hopelessly over-stretched suburban service in South London. Lines with lightweight permanent way, frequent stops and short, steep gradients were operated by a motley assortment of locomotives and were carrying traffic way beyond the levels for which they were built.

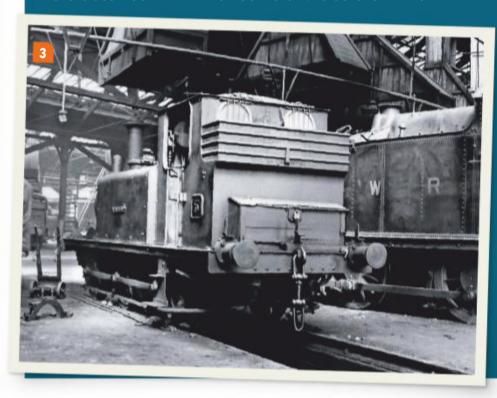
Stroudley's solution was to introduce lightweight trains worked by 0-6-0Ts based on the solitary locomotive of that wheel arrangement which he had designed for his previous employer, the Highland Railway.

The first six entered traffic in the final months of 1872. They packed impressive performance for their size and were soon known by the nickname 'Rooters' or 'Terriers'.

Some details were changed before the second batch was completed in 1874 and a further 44 were added in the period up to 1880. No. 40 *Brighton*, delivered in 1878, was specially prepared for exhibition in Paris, where it was awarded a Gold Medal. On its return, Brighton Works staff added an inscription to the tank sides.

Towards the end of the 19th century upgrades to the system began to render the 'Terriers' redundant on suburban work. Some were transferred elsewhere as shunters and pilots, and others were sold. Several were acquired by contractors building the GWR/GC Joint line between Northolt and High Wycombe and others went to the Admiralty, to the Isle of Wight and to Colonel Stephens' light railway empire. Eleven unsold examples were broken up in the early years of the 20th century. Twenty others were converted for push-pull working.

In 1911 survivors began to receive new boilers under L.B. Billinton and these, with extended smokeboxes, were classified 'A1X'. Even some of the sold-off 'A1s'

subsequently received the new boilers. Several survived on the Isle of Wight to enter service with BR and others were required to operate the Hayling Island branch over the timber Langstone Viaduct.

No fewer than ten examples survive in preservation. No. 82 *Boxhill*, preserved at the National Railway Museum, is the only example to have survived throughout as an 'A1'. Two others, No. 54 *Waddon* (at the Montreal Railway Museum, Delson, Quebec) and No. 72 *Fenchurch* (Bluebell Railway) have been restored to 'A1' appearance. No. 71 *Wapping* was completed in September 1872 and withdrawn in January 1905. It was sold to the Rother Valley Railway (KESR) where it became No. 5 *Rolvenden*, eventually being withdrawn again around 1932/3 and scrapped after providing spares for No. 3 *Bodiam*, which survives in preservation on the KESR as BR No. 32670.

the original Dapol organisation. While the detail compromises will undoubtedly deter some purchasers, others will welcome a model of this calibre at such a keen price. I shall be curious to see if any more tooling variants such as enlarged bunkers appear in due course, or whether the more esoteric detail differences are left for the competitor to cover. (CJL)

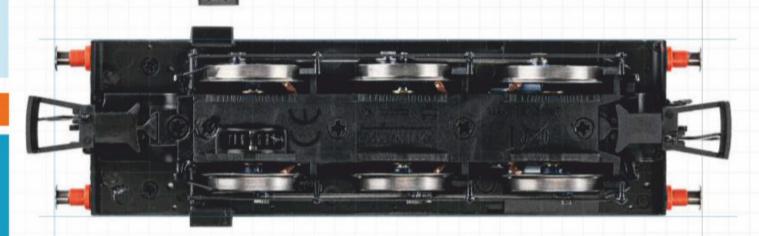

hen they were introduced in 1985, British Rail's 'Pacer' units - comprising bus bodies fitted to a four-wheel chassis derived from air-braked freight stock - were a stopgap measure, intended to give 20 years of service before being replaced.

Only now, 34 years later, is the end in sight for these railbuses which, while largely unloved and uncelebrated, have given steadfast and unfussy service on numerous routes in the North of England, the South West and South Wales.

There were several different classes of 'Pacer'. The Class 142 vehicles, as modelled by Dapol, are the most numerous and 96 sets were built using widened Leyland National bus bodies by Leyland and BREL (British Rail Engineering Limited) in Workington between 1985 and 1987.

In the privatisation era the units have been in service with numerous operators: in the first tranche of releases Dapol is offering sets in Regional Railways, Tyne & Wear PTE, Arriva Trains Wales, Northern Spirit and Northern liveries, with both DC and DCC versions available.

Their rigid, two-axle chassis, without secondary suspension, means that in service they have become known for lively riding and nicknamed 'nodding donkeys', while their long wheelbase can lead to intrusive flange-squeal on curved track,



making them unpopular with the travelling public.

Because they do not comply with current disability access regulations, all 'Pacer' trains are



scheduled for withdrawal by the end of 2019.

Dapol's model version is nicely packaged in the model firm's familiar clear plastic jewel case

with a dark grey foam insert that holds things securely. Indeed, its grip is so tight that to remove the model from the box it's essential to lift the entire insert out, and then gently release the two vehicles.

Under observation the model clearly captures the character and look of the 'Pacer' - the familiar bus body with its many fine rivets and roof air conditioning packs is nicely moulded. Dapol is offering versions with both the original ten-rib and later three-rib roofs. However, it is readily apparent that the proportions of the side are not quite right; the windows

are too shallow and

the two rows of rivets below are too high. Also, the angled cut-in at the base of the body is too flat.

It may be that these are compromises forced on Dapol by a desire to incorporate a low-profile motor chassis, however after such a long development period it does seem a pity that these issues - which were

identified and fed back to Dapol long before production - could not be corrected.

The face of the model is reasonable but would be improved if the (working) head/ tail light clusters were slightly more pronounced. The roof radio pods on 142065, the unit depicted, should be slightly offset. The livery application is very neat; our review sample was in the now-obsolete Northern livery of purple, blue and white and this has been well applied, with the finer markings present including cycle area stickers printed on the glazing.

has working representations of the prototype's BSI couplings. These are compatible with each other and with the same couplers on Dapol's well-regarded Class 156 and 153 units, meaning they can run in multiple, as they sometimes do on the network. The inner coupling is also interesting and enables track power to be shared between vehicles. Some care is required in aligning two pairs of prongs which click together and incorporate pairs of brass tabs which bear on each other. With pick-ups on all eight wheels this

should ensure the unit is sure-footed over pointwork, and under test this arrangement appeared to be very effective.

CONCERTINA MOVEMENT

Before coupling, the bellows gangways can be extended; they are able to concertina and ensure that no daylight is visible between the cars during operation. The powered vehicle has a motor with flywheels fitted below window height, and both axles are driven. Performance under DC - particularly when coupled to its sister trailer - was

very smooth and consistent throughout the power range and the model comes with a Next18 decoder socket.

The large glazed area means that a prominent red wire inside is very visible; toning this down with black marker or covering it with black insulation tape would improve the model's appearance.

With an RRP of £135, but on sale for around £115-£120, as a complete 'train in a box' it represents good value against some more recent models. The Dapol Class 142 'Pacer' has taken eight years to reach the shops.

Like the prototype, it may not be perfect but it is a decent train-on-a-budget and is sure to be popular. For anyone modelling the last 35 years, these humdrum 'nodding donkeys' were no less a part of the picture than the more glamorous express racehorses. (BA)

he debut 'OO' gauge offering from Cavalex Models has arrived, in the form of the PGA aggregates hopper. A sizeable fleet of these handsome, air-braked wagons was assembled, to a variety of designs, throughout the 1970s and 1980s. Of all the various designs, Cavalex has chosen the PGO12A version, built over several batches by the Standard Wagon Company of Heywood, Lancashire, for Redland Aggregates between 1978-86. With a payload capacity of 28t,

the wagons were designed primarily to boost the rail-borne output from Mountsorrel quarry in Leicestershire. Initially outshopped in Redland's fetching pale green livery with red logos and details, the hoppers were later painted in the less imaginative white of LaFarge Aggregates, following the latter's takeover of Redland in the 1990s.

As well as carrying
Leicestershire stone,
examples of this type of PGA were
also employed on flows from the
Derbyshire quarries around

Buxton. The move to higher capacity bogie hoppers in recent years means the four-wheel PGAs have been gradually phased out, although a small number are still in use.

HEAVY DUTY HOPPER

Packaged in an attractive foam-lined card box, the distinctive outline of the prototype has been captured and all key dimensions have been scaled accurately. A die-cast metal chassis provides ample 'ballast' and the underframe detail – suspension units, hopper chutes, brake gear – is exquisite.

Pivoting NEM coupler pockets are fitted, with standard slimline tension locks installed. The Oleo heavy duty buffers and brake handles are some of the model's highlights and the hopper, with its associated framework, has

been reproduced faithfully.

Both the Redland and LaFarge
liveries have been applied to

a high standard and there's no unsightly join between the hopper and chassis, with the bodywork following the prototype in passing through the open frames. The end walkways and handrails

are rendered in a flexible plastic which can withstand gentle handling, although care is needed not to distort them.

Late BR and privatisation era modellers have been spoilt with some superb recent 'OO' wagons and these hoppers are certainly up there with the best. Offering great value, they're just the thing for running behind a variety of BR diesels, especially the Hornby Class 56.

Due to the popularity of this first batch of models, a second production run has just been announced, offering a greater variety of livery options. Furthermore, an 'N' gauge version is also currently under development, with pre-orders still being taken (see www.cavalexmodels.com for more details).

ituated in the south-east of Ireland, Wexford Model Railway Club was founded in 1978, though it had existed unofficially for several years before that. It caters for all ages and interests, and has recently added a large,

high-quality 'O' gauge layout to its collection, reflecting the growing interest in the 'senior scale' both in the club and railway modelling in general.

The club is one of only three organised clubs in the Republic of Ireland and the only one outside Dublin. It has been growing strongly over recent years and now boasts a membership of almost 50 people. This



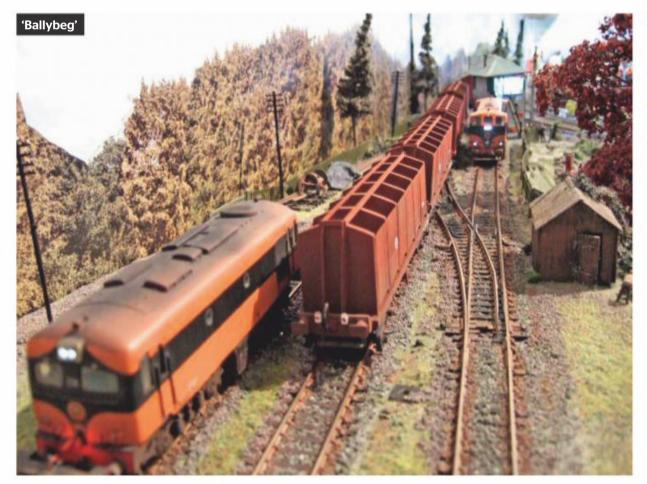
means that there's plenty of expertise, knowhow and knowledge to go around for all the club's members.

The club spent many years meeting in an old church, but in recent years it has built a custom clubhouse on the ground of St Joseph's Community Centre in central Wexford. This year, after some renovations, we now have a new test track that supports 'N', 'OO' (Code 75 and 100) and 'O', as well as a dedicated meeting area with memorabilia displays and tea and coffee facilities. The club has an extensive library of books, pictures, DVDs, and magazines, primarily focusing on Irish railway topics.

The club runs regular educational events covering diverse topics such as signalling, electrics and 3D-printing, as well as organising outings both locally and abroad to locations of railway interest. Our main exhibition is held over the Easter weekend every year in a large hall adjacent to the club which is going from strength to strength. It's our ambition for this to be the premier model railway-orientated exhibition in the country.

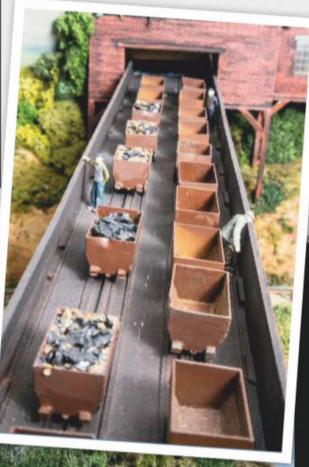
The North Eastern Railway prototypes were ignored by major manufacturers until the Hornby 'Q6'. Anyone wishing to model that region had hitherto been forced to scratchbuild or construct one of the many excellent kits available. The thing about the Worsdell family of locomotives - and continued by Raven is that they were solid and reliable and lasted from the NER through the LNER and into late BR steam. There is a family resemblance in respect of cabs and boilers. I refer particularly to the (LNER class) 'G5', 'D20', ('J26') 'J27', 'Q6', 'Q7', 'B16/1'. In my layout based on Leeds New I have built all but the 'Q7' and I am on my fourth 'B16'.

I tried to garner interest in the 'D2O' at the Bachmann stand at York. These locomotives started life as front line express engines in 1899 and were part of a family of handsome 4-4-0 locomotives, one of which is preserved at Locomotion, Shildon. They were gradually cascaded down to local services, ending their lives in the Leeds/Selby and Alnwick area in late BR, and they would cover a very large range of eras.

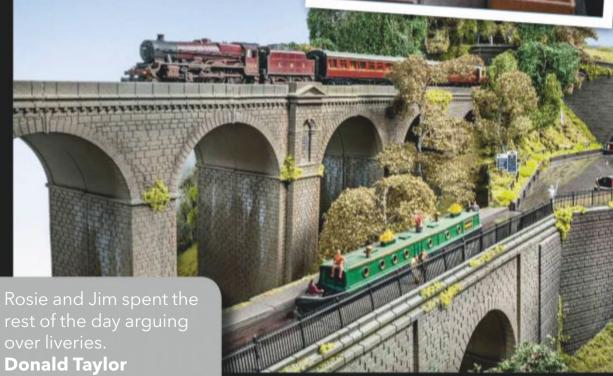

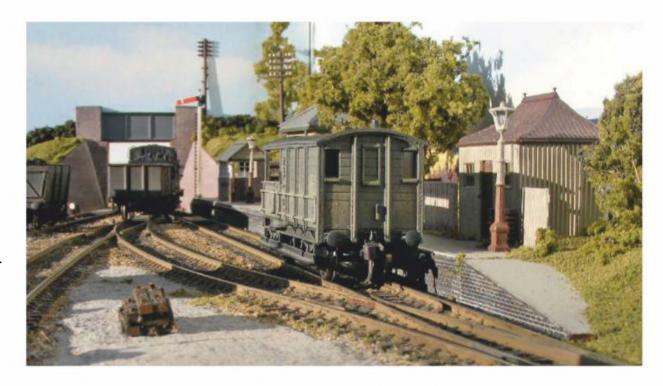

Lightweight micro

David Jones

This is my layout, 'North Leigh'. It's a micro-design measuring 4ft by 11in with a 2in by 3.5in fiddleyard extension. It is built with a lightweight softwood frame and MDF board as it is regularly moved between storage and the dining table. North Leigh is at the end of a short branch north-west of Oxford, in the late 1950s. It is designed to easily become a through station on a proposed line that was to extend beyond Witney to Burford and finally Cheltenham, but which was never built. Architectural style and operation are, therefore, heavily influenced by the Witney & East Gloucestershire Railway (W&EGR). There are no locomotive facilities modelled, as these conveniently lie just out of sight beyond the bridge.



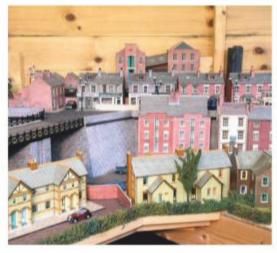
Layout's on another level

My layout is located in a small 7ft by 5ft garden shed, and it is not based on any known location. Although mostly steam-hauled, I also like to run a few diesel locomotives on it.

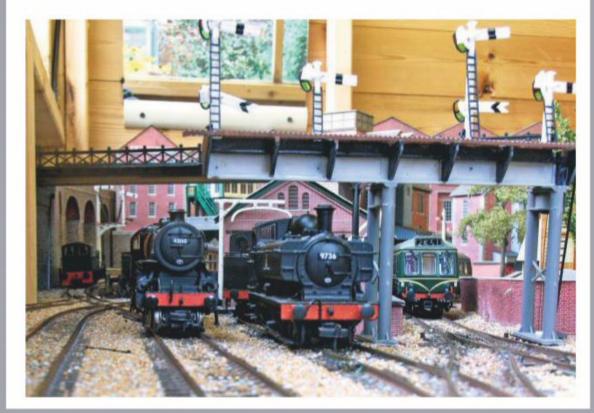
Space is at a real premium within such a small footprint, but there is an upper level that is reached by a branch line which normally runs backwards and forwards via a timer with a delay. This is normally serviced by a Bachmann '08' or a '03' diesel shunter which push a couple of wagons up the incline. There is a factory and a gas works. The workers travel by a tram service along a much-modified Hornby suspension bridge, which is now supported on four brick piers.

There is also a tramway at low level



which runs from the station and past the shops along to the small housing estate by the entrance to the goods yard.

Both trams run at the same time controlled via another delay timer.



Tribute in trams

'Tinniswood' is named after the late and great comedy writer Peter Tinniswood, whose various books, TV shows and radio programmes have given me much pleasure over the years.

Three trams are in operation at any one time and they run to a sequence. Two are initially positioned at the town terminus and one in the fiddleyard. The first leaves the terminus and travels for a short distance before slowing to a halt outside the cinema.

After a short wait (which can be varied, as required), it continues up the slope to cross the branch line by a bridge and enters the vacant fiddleyard road. The fiddleyard points change as they are cleared, the tram coming to a halt in an end section protected by a diode to prevent overrun.

After another (variable) pause the other tram leaves the fiddleyard and performs this sequence in the opposite direction.

Present your case

If there's a locomotive that you think needs to be offered ready-to-run, here's the place to voice your opinion...

Locomotive: Brown-Boveri gas turbine locomotive No. 18000

Gauge: '00'

Proposed by: Chris Leigh

What is it?

All of the 'Big Four' looked to move away from steam for main line services after the Second World War. The LNER had made some progress with 1,500V DC electrification, and the LMS and the Southern, in co-operation with English Electric, were both testing the water with diesel-electrics. The GWR, however, had no experience with either, so following a fact-finding mission to Europe, F.W. Hawksworth looked to the possibility of the gas turbine (the 'jet' engine) as a means of generating power for electric traction motors.

The GWR placed an order with leading specialists Brown-Boveri in Winterthur, Switzerland, for a main line gas turbine locomotive. The result, not delivered until after nationalisation in 1949, was No. 18000, a gleaming black and silver locomotive of 2,500hp. In theory the single locomotive was as powerful as a 'King' and more powerful

than the LMS and SR's diesel-electrics.

In practice it was capable of exceptional performance, but all too often it had to be run at less than full power, resulting in a build-up of ash which damaged the turbines. Also, the engine lacked a heat-resistant lining that would allow high temperatures to be sustained in the heat exchanger for long periods.

No. 18000 performed on expresses to Bristol and to the West of England before its withdrawal and sale for use in Austria.

What would make it viable

No. 18000 may have been a one-off and ultimately unsuccessful but it has an appeal which goes way beyond its actual achievement. It was much-featured in BR publicity at the time and was part of the GWR modernisation that was dubbed 'the last look forward.' Working among the 'Kings' and 'Castles' in the heyday of WR named expresses, it was unofficially named 'Kerosene Castle' and the fact that it is accorded a home in that temple of GWR steam, the Great Western Society at Didcot, shows how well regarded it is.

Alongside 'OO' models of the Wath electrics (Heljan) the SR diesel-electrics (Kernow MRC) and the LMS 'twins' (Bachmann) No. 18000 would fill the gap for post-war modern motive power among WR modellers. And just imagine how good a DCC sound-equipped version would be!

Can I see the real one?

Repatriated in the 1990s, No. 18000 initially went to Tinsley Depot for cosmetic restoration before moving to Crewe for display. Though it is now only a shell and has received much modification, it is now on display at Didcot Railway Centre.

'Duchess' - extra

It's a myth that manufacturers send products to the model railway press that have been especially 'breathed on', to get them into tip-top condition in order to garner a favourable review. It's simply not the case and this was proved when we reviewed Hornby's streamlined 'Duchess' in the March 2019 issue (MR258).

It's a fact of life that in any production run, whatever the product, there will always be the odd duff one. The 'Duchess' that Hornby sent to us was clearly faulty as it displayed some alarming riding characteristics on both our test track and Chris Leigh's home layout.

Rather than taint a review based on one faulty model, we contacted Hornby who promised to send out a replacement No. 6221 *Queen Elizabeth*. Sadly, this didn't arrive in time for MR258's press deadline but landed a few weeks later.

We're pleased to report that this model had no such difficulties. It comfortably coped with the points on our test track at high speed.

Chris Leigh gave it a run on his layout and claimed it was one of the best ready-to-run models he's ever used.

Based on that, we don't hesitate to give the streamlined 'Duchess' 10 out of 10 for performance. (RF)

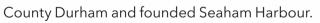

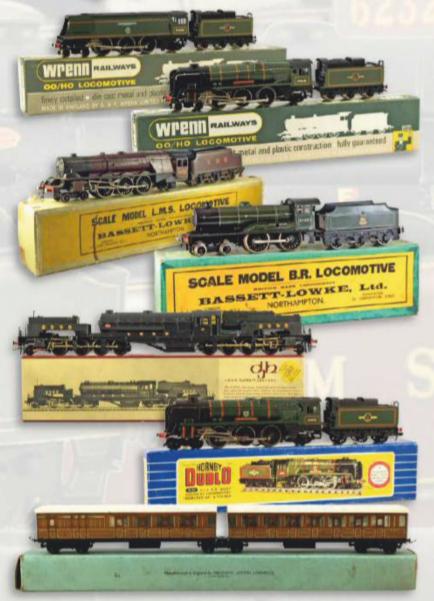
