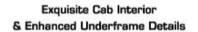

It has been another interesting month in the world of model railways, with more new models announced from various manufacturers, plus the tallying up of all the votes in Model Rail's Model of the Year Awards for 2021.

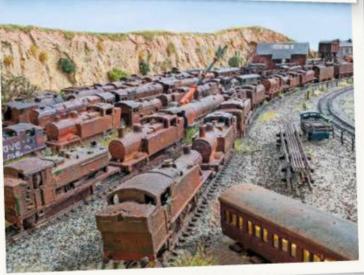
While you can read the full breakdown of results on pages 6-7, I'd like to pass on my congratulations to the various winners and my thanks for all who took the time to vote.

After a second place in 2020, Accurascale managed to reach the Number One spot in both 'OO' gauge and overall manufacturer categories, while sister company Irish Railway Models scooped second prize in the 'OO' diesel outline category, which is a splendid achievement.

KR Models' GT3's win is a shot in the arm for producers of niche prototypes, while the LNWR 'Precedent' produced by Bachmann, Rails of Sheffield and Locomotion Models is, in my view, a worthy winner of the 'OO' steam category. And is anyone surprised that Bachmann's 'OO9' double Fairlie came out on top?! Revolution Trains scooped 'N' gauge Manufacturer of the Year for a second consecutive year, as did Dapol in the 'O' gauge voting, so well done to both camps.

As the awards are based on models reviewed in *Model Rail* over the previous year, I wonder if Hornby would've fared better if they hadn't cut off supply of review samples early last year, leaving us to try and obtain examples by our own means. Like many readers who have been in touch recently, we haven't always been able to get hold of certain new models. The Margate company has taken exception to our honest





reviews in the past, so it wasn't a complete surprise, but disappointing nonetheless.

On a different tack, apologies are due to Gilly North, whose excellent scrapyard diorama (above) graced the cover of last month's issue. Appearing initially in MR236 (July 2017), Gilly's scene inspired some of last month's Workbench content, but I forgot to give her credit in this column. Sorry Gilly!

BACHMANN'S SPRING 2022 ANNOUNCEMENTS

n common with other manufacturers, Bachmann Europe has had to deal with all manner of global manufacturing and distribution challenges. However, the team from Barwell still managed to announce 12 newly tooled models throughout 2021 and those products which have yet to reach the shelves are not too far off. Indeed, Bachmann's website now has revised delivery dates for each of the models revealed in last winter's announcements.

Another issue arising from the current global situation is rising costs. Bachmann's Richard Proudman revealed that the costs of some raw materials had risen by more than 50%, while shipping costs had risen by an incredible 500% during 2021 alone. While

Bachmann - and its parent company Kader - have managed to absorb these costs thus far, inevitably that can't continue indefinitely. The good news is that there will not be a blanket price rise across all Bachmann products. Those that will rise, will do so by 8%, effective from March 12022. However, that doesn't include the new models announced here, and full details can be found on Bachmann's website.

Richard also described how Bachmann's dedicated spares website has been developed, following its launch last year. Providing a vital resource for modellers, the site also now includes a comprehensive range of downloadable service sheets. Web: www.bachmann.co.uk www.bachmann-spares.co.uk

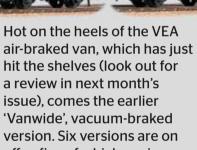

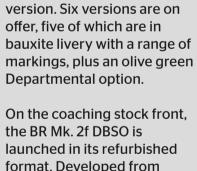

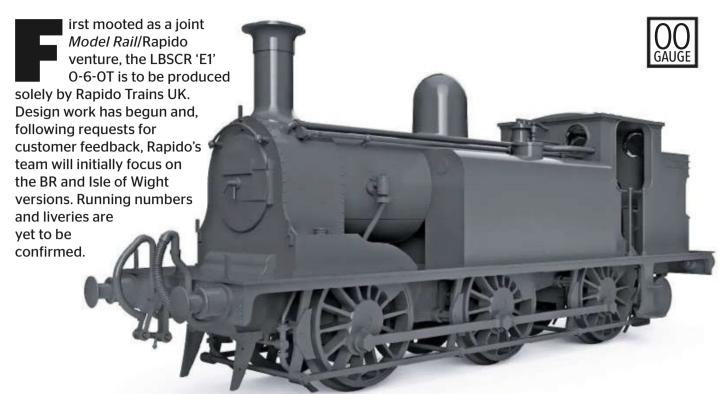

NEW GWR TOPLIGHT COACHES FROM DAPOL

Dapol will please many modellers of the GWR and BR(W) with these new suburban carriages, which provide a perfect load for the recently released '61XX' 2-6-2T. Built in the early 1920s as close-coupled six-carriage sets, the bodies were built to allow them to negotiate the restricted loading gauge of the Metropolitan Underground tunnels.

Six full sets were built for commuter services into London although, following the Second World War, they were dispersed to other areas. Withdrawals began in the mid-1950s, with three individual carriages being converted into workmen's coaches for colliery workers in South Wales, two of which were eventually preserved.

Dapol is to produce Third, Composite and Brake Third vehicles and will feature a full array of fine exterior and interior detail fittings, such as metal door handles, wire handrails, interior lighting and working directional tail lamps. Sprung metal buffers will be installed, and kinematic close-coupler units will be

> provided, with NEM pockets. There will also be provision for DCC installation, and the carriage roofs have been designed



to allow easy access to the interior.

Currently at the engineering prototype stage, livery artwork was being created at the time of writing, with delivery of the first releases anticipated towards the end of the year. Various BR and

GWR livery schemes will be offered and enough individual coaches will eventually be produced to allow all six of the six-car formations to be recreated.

IRISH MAGNESITE WAGONS FROM IRM



The latest addition to Irish Railway Models' rolling stock fleet is a covered hopper, designed specifically for conveying magnesite from **Ballinacourty in County** Waterford to Tivoli, just east of Cork city. Magnesite is an important mineral used in a range of industrial products, such as heat-resistant bricks for blast furnaces. Besides operating on their regular route, these wagons also appeared in Limerick for exams and general repairs at Córus lompair Éireann's

wagon workshops. Regularly hauled by Metro-Vick 'A' Class diesels (also available from IRM), the wagons were in use from the late 1960s until the closure of the works in the early 1980s.

CIÉ's modular approach to wagon building has allowed IRM to capitalise on its existing ballast and gypsum hoppers (MR296), the chassis of which was also employed on the magnesite hoppers. Having tooled up a new body, complete with loading hatches and discharge chutes,

the models also feature etched metal walkways and ladders. Furthermore, the existing chassis tooling has also been enhanced, allowing improvements to be made to the brake gear and allowing the correct style of axleboxes to be portrayed.

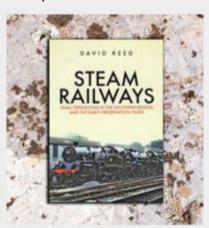

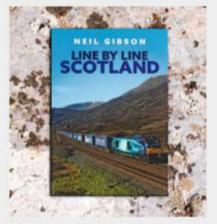

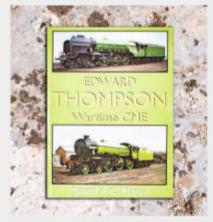

Perfect for handling and shaping fine parts and materials, these pliers feature tiny jaws that, when fully closed, retain a 0.1mm gap between them. This allows fine etched metal parts or other delicate material to be held securely without cutting through it. The jaws are shaped to present a fine working edge, allowing sharp folds to be made in strip or sheet metal, much more effectively than with regular pliers. Already, I've found them to be ideal for shaping smaller etched kit and locomotive detail parts such as lamp irons. A welcome addition is the leather storage pouch, which helps protect those delicate jaws from damage while stored in a toolbox.

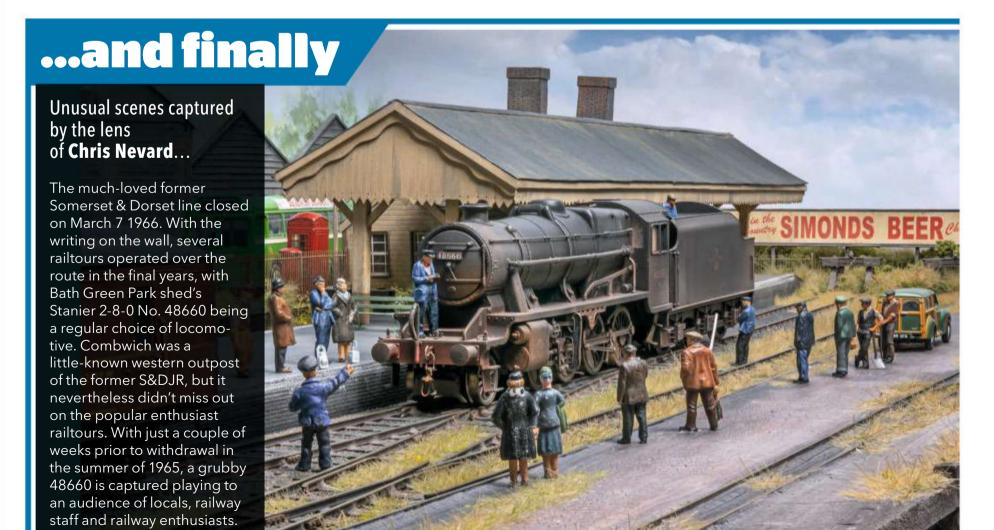

Staff Show & Tell Shed diorama take 2

With no time to work on his main layout project this month, **George Dent** concentrated on finishing off a new diorama.

hile taking photographs of some 'OO' gauge models recently, I became aware that my choice of diorama backdrops was rather limited. A couple of years ago, my old workshop was chock-full of backdrops, big and small, urban and rural, in a variety of scales. Alas, moving across the country, with time in rental properties in between permanent abodes, meant most of them had to go.

As usual, I try and salvage and retain as much as possible when breaking up layouts and dioramas, so I did have a few boxes with buildings and scenic accessories, waiting for a second life. Now that the dust has settled, I've decided to start amassing a new collection of photo backdrops.

The first to be created is this modest steam locomotive shed scene, which can serve as a sleepy branch line facility or possibly as part of an industrial railway network. Featuring three sidings, the centre of which is the shed road, there's also a small coaling stage and water tower to complete the scene.

Based closely on a similar diorama from the past - an old favourite in fact - I took the opportunity to make a few improvements to the original plan. Most notable is the stepped track formation, with the centre and rear lines being raised incrementally in relation to the foreground track. The height difference between the front and rear tracks is only about 12mm, but it has made a big difference to the composition, especially when the

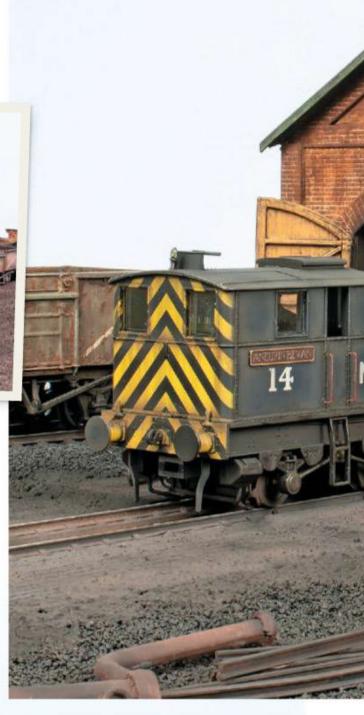
Above: George's original diorama, built about ten years ago. The water tower proved intrusive, while the tracks were bunched together too tightly for effective photography.

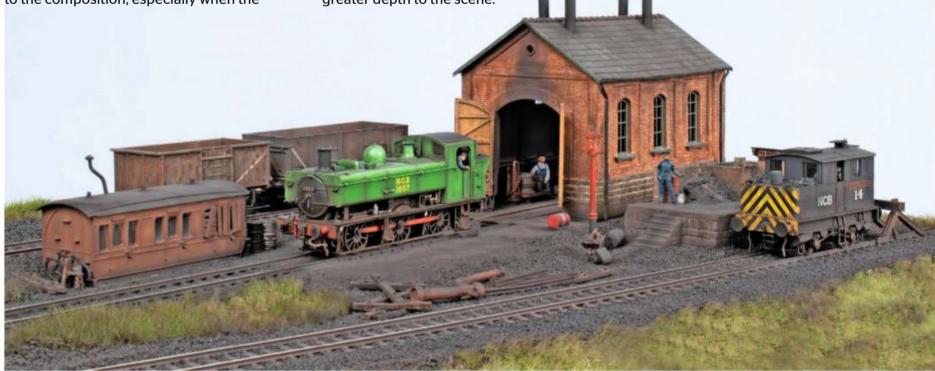
Right: Having learnt from previous experience, I decided to raise the tracks incrementally, from front to rear. It's barely perceptible, but it makes for a more pleasant composition.

scene is viewed side-on, from ground level.

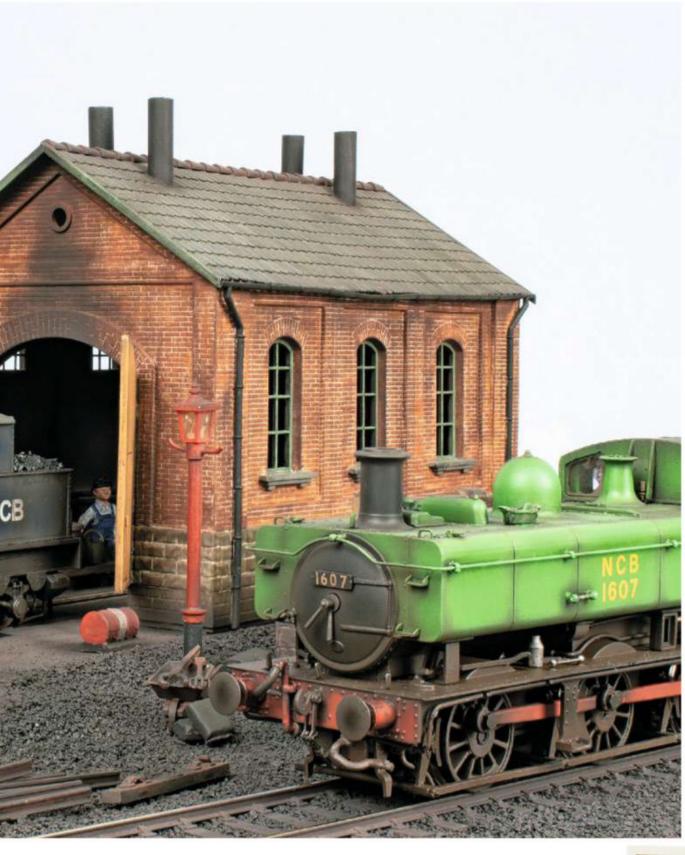
While the shed building and coaling stage survive from my original scene, I switched to a less obtrusive water tower, which has been sited away from the shed and a grounded coach body is a new addition, providing staff accommodation.

Over the past two issues, readers have had a sneak peak of this diorama, in partially finished form. The scene is now complete and ready to serve. The lack of a fixed backdrop allows shots to be captured from any angle, and there's also the possibility of posing a range of buildings in the background to add greater depth to the scene.

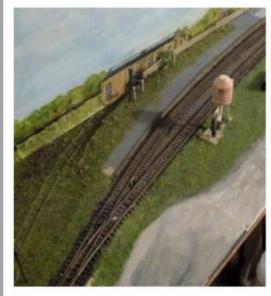

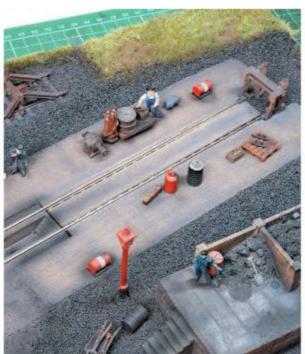
I think I've probably always been scared of applying static grass. After all, our team includes the world's No. 1 'grass master' in the shape of Peter Marriott. What's more, Peter has done scenic work on a couple of my layouts, so I've tended to feel that I can't match his work.

Anyway, after a bout of what ace carriage builder Steve Banks would have called 'modeller's block', I finally decided that I couldn't look at the detail-less white plaster patch in the middle of my 'N' gauge Staines West layout any longer.

So I built the water tank, installed the grounded 'toad' body and made up the remains of the cattle dock. Then all I had to do was paint it and add glue and static grass. I used Woodland Scenics static grass applicator and adhesive, with Peco's 2mm grass fibres and, hey presto, I've mastered static grass at last! There's still some detailing to do and bushes to add.

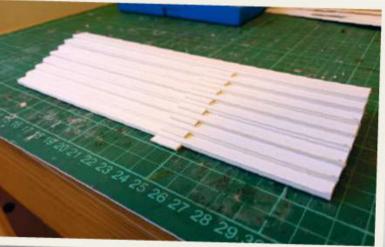

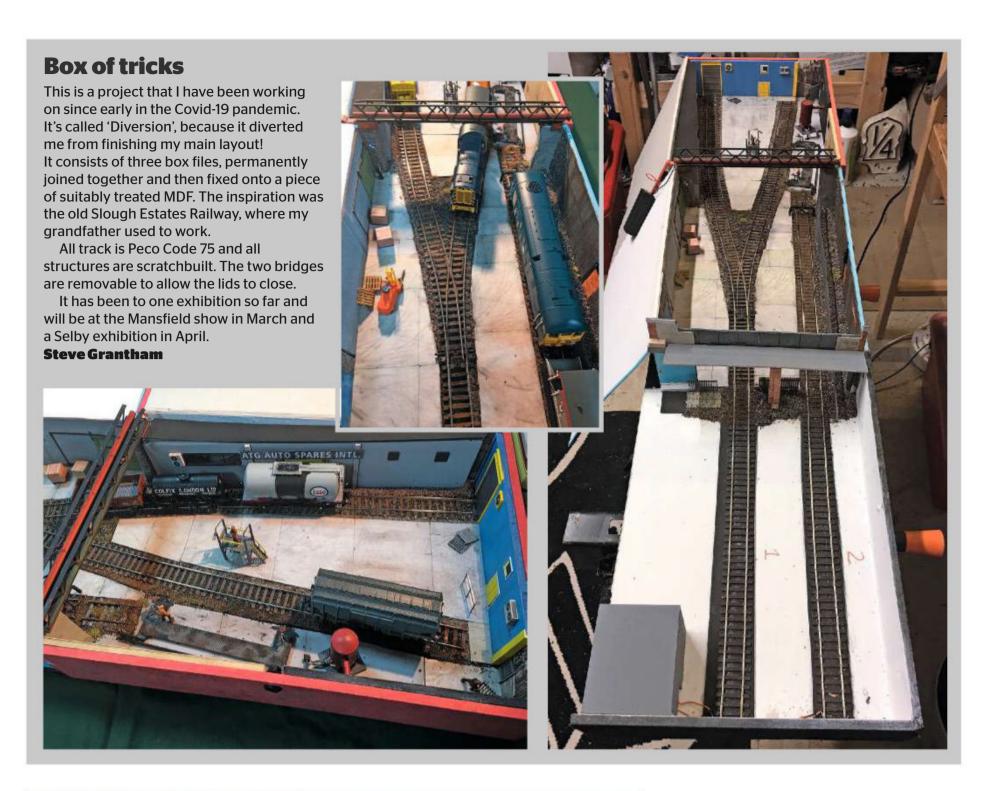

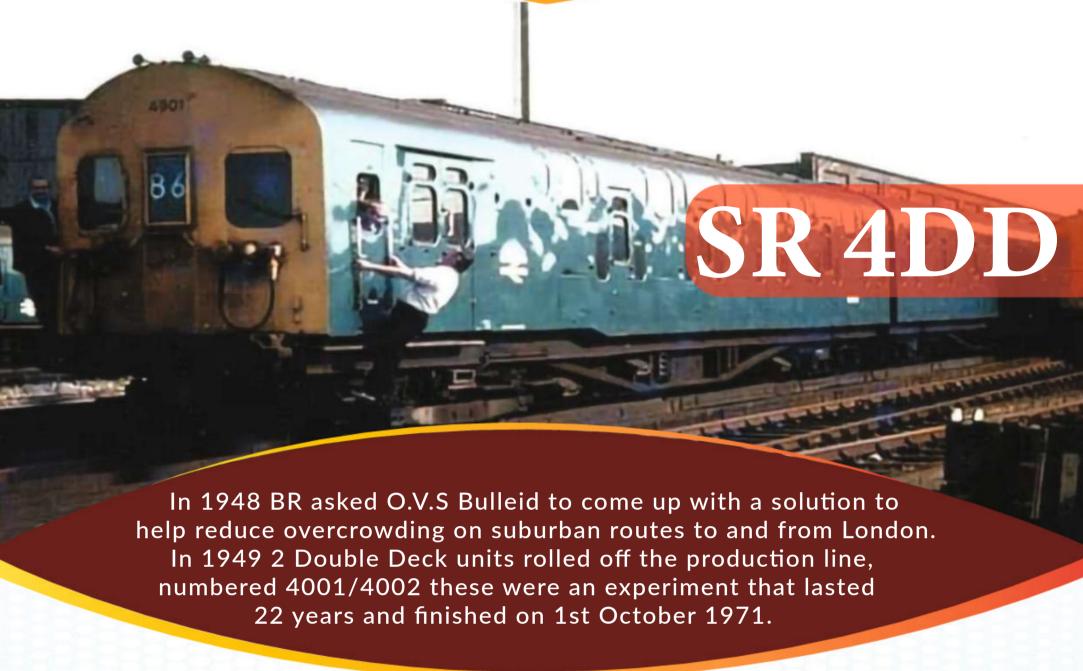

Inside track with Ben Ando

Ben Ando is the founder of Revolution Trains and a regular contributor to Model Rail. ave you ever found yourself unable to decide between two models of the same train in two different liveries?

Both are attractive; both appropriate to your interest – but you can't afford two? And, unable to decide, do you eventually buy something else?

Welcome to the curse of too much choice! And if choosing between two similar but different models can be hard for the consumer, selecting which to offer can be equally difficult for the manufacturer.

In the six years we have been running Revolution Trains, my co-director Mike Hale and I have discovered the perverse truth: that offering too much choice can actually reduce sales.

It sounds crazy doesn't it? So let me give you an example. A while ago we launched a scheme to crowd-fund an 'N' gauge model of the Class 321 electric units. These long-lived trains were among the Mk 3 derived units built by BREL in York during the late 1980s and early 1990s.

The four-car 321s operated on the WCML, the ECML, on the Great Eastern main line and across the north of England.

In addition, the three-car Class 320 variant operated on a variety of lowland suburban routes in Scotland.

Long service lives and lots of liveries – a sure-fire winner! Or so we thought...

The 321 was one of our earliest offerings, and in our innocence we thought that rather than choosing two or three liveries it would be a great idea to offer every possible livery and let our customers decide which made the cut with their pre-orders.

So we listed nearly every operator scheme the 321s had ever carried – from BR Network SouthEast to the short-lived but eye-catching ONE livery – and waited for the orders to roll in.

Except they didn't. Well, some did but many didn't.

BR Network SouthEast and London Midland generated plenty of interest. Enough to justify additional running numbers. Clearly the WCML and NSE enjoy a loyal and committed following.



But the other liveries? Not so much!

Despite lots of people telling us we "ought to do them in 'X' livery – I'd buy several" we found most were getting nowhere near the minimum numbers needed to be viable, and where we'd offered alternatives for the same region neither was selling!

Speaking to customers at shows and online slowly

revealed the counter-intuitive answer: where customers were offered a single livery they just bought it. But offer two or more schemes they wanted and there was a tendency to become so paralysed with indecision that they ordered neither and chose something completely different.

This made perfect sense to them, but for Revolution, trying to operate a pre-order system to gauge demand, it was no help at all.

After much head-scratching we realised a cull was needed. But this created a new problem: the small number who had ordered these models felt, understandably, let down.

But guess what? Orders for those liveries remaining became healthier and most crept over the minimum number threshold.

Reducing choice made the decision simpler and the orders came in.

So, the lesson is that choice is something we might think we want, but in reality many of us like the manufacturer to make those awkward decisions and leave us with fewer options that will then tend to select themselves.

Or at least, that's how I choose to see it...

RAPIDO TRAINS) UP



According to Chris...

...two manufacturers releasing models of the same thing never works out well for anyone. ell, nobody could ever say that Hornby's announcement of its 2022 railway range passed unnoticed or without a bit of controversy. For those who aren't in touch with social media and the world of the internet – and I know there are some of you – it is worth explaining how this annual event now works.

Once, it was launched to the press at a pre-**Christmas** hospitality event. Since the advent of model railway forums, Facebook pages and the like, it has been difficult for Hornby to notify the model railway media, of all types, without someone having an unfair advantage according to how their deadline fell.

This was overcome by an embargo, a requirement that all the details were kept under wraps until a given date. This year, the embargo date was January 10, although members of the professional media, paper and on-line, had taken part in the full presentation a month previously.

It was no surprise, therefore, that in the meantime, someone (not anyone from *Model Rail*, I hasten to add) had leaked the news of Hornby's *Titfield Thunderbolt* film-inspired train pack to Rapido Trains UK. Rapido had revealed (on April 1 2021) that they had an **exclusive** contract to produce models of the Titfield 'stars' including *Thunderbolt* (Liverpool & Manchester Railway 0-4-2 *Lion*) the W&U carriage, old Dan's carriage and Pearce & Crump's bus, as they appear in the movie.

So, in the run-up to Hornby's 10.30am, January 10, public revelation of its 2022 range, Rapido announced that it would make a statement about Titfield at 7.30am on January 10. Not to be outdone, Hornby pulled its range announcement forward to 7am. I hesitate to suggest that things were descending into farce because farce doesn't leave one with a nasty taste.

I did not take part in the December Hornby press conference, which took place online. I had no preview, either, of the Rapido statement, although I could guess roughly what it was going say. Early versions of Rapido's YouTube announcement did include the words 'Titfield statement' but this was quickly removed. Presumably Rapido recognised that the mass of online postings surmising that they were going to duplicate something important to Hornby, such as an HST, was more fun than just watching people muse, or not, about Titfield.

Now that the dust is settling, what's the score? Well, in essence, its just another pointless duplication of the same prototype in two ranges. It has happened several times before. With steam locomotives though, curiously, it has tended to be with lesser classes. I understand duplicated 'A4s' and it is surprising that there is not more duplication of the '8P' classes.

In fact most duplications have been of lesser subjects. The problem is that, where '8P' 4-6-2s might sell in sufficient quantities to give two manufacturers a return on investment, it's unlikely that less popular classes will. It is hard to imagine either party made much from the duplicated BR Standard '4MT' 4-6-0s. Hardly a 'must have' locomotive for most modellers.

When we come to diesel locomotives, duplication in 'OO' ranges is almost endemic, especially now that new manufacturers have entered the market to deliberately duplicate popular types on a 'mine's going to be better than yours' promise. At present we have to wait and see.

So, returning to Titfield, what exactly is the problem? After all, it's a duplication according to one commentator of 'something in an old movie in which nobody under 85 is interested.' That's nonsense, of course, and more an opportunity to inject some offensive ageism into the comments than anything constructive.

The staff of *Steam Railway* and *Model Rail* don't fit that age demographic, and yet there were occasions when (in the days when we sat together in an office) four or five of us would launch into *Titfield Thunderbolt*, each playing a part and recounting the script, word for word!

I have long found it fascinating that the writer T.E.B. Clarke recognised stereotypes like the railway enthusiast vicar at a time when the likes of the Revs Boston and Awdry had yet to really make their mark. Ten years later, in the Beeching era, I wonder how many lines might have been saved from closure if the man from the local council had made a bit more effort?

So long as I get my model of *Thunderbolt* in 'OO' (I already have one in Gauge 1) do I really care who produces it? Well, yes.

"When I do something, I like to do a proper job," says Seth after spending all night building the bar in the carriage. I'm sure that both models will be a proper job, but under the rules of intellectual property and exclusive contracts, only the Rapido model can actually carry the *Thunderbolt* name.

I had my pre-order in with Rapido long before I heard any suggestion that there might be an alternative, and I won't be changing my mind. This will not be the first time I've made my thoughts known about duplication and how it nearly always means that neither organisation 'wins', at least in terms of making a return on their investment. However, in the past it's usually been a case of accidental duplication. Not this time.

● NOTE: As we closed for press, Hornby had removed the 'Trains on Film' range from its website, although no official announcement had yet been made.

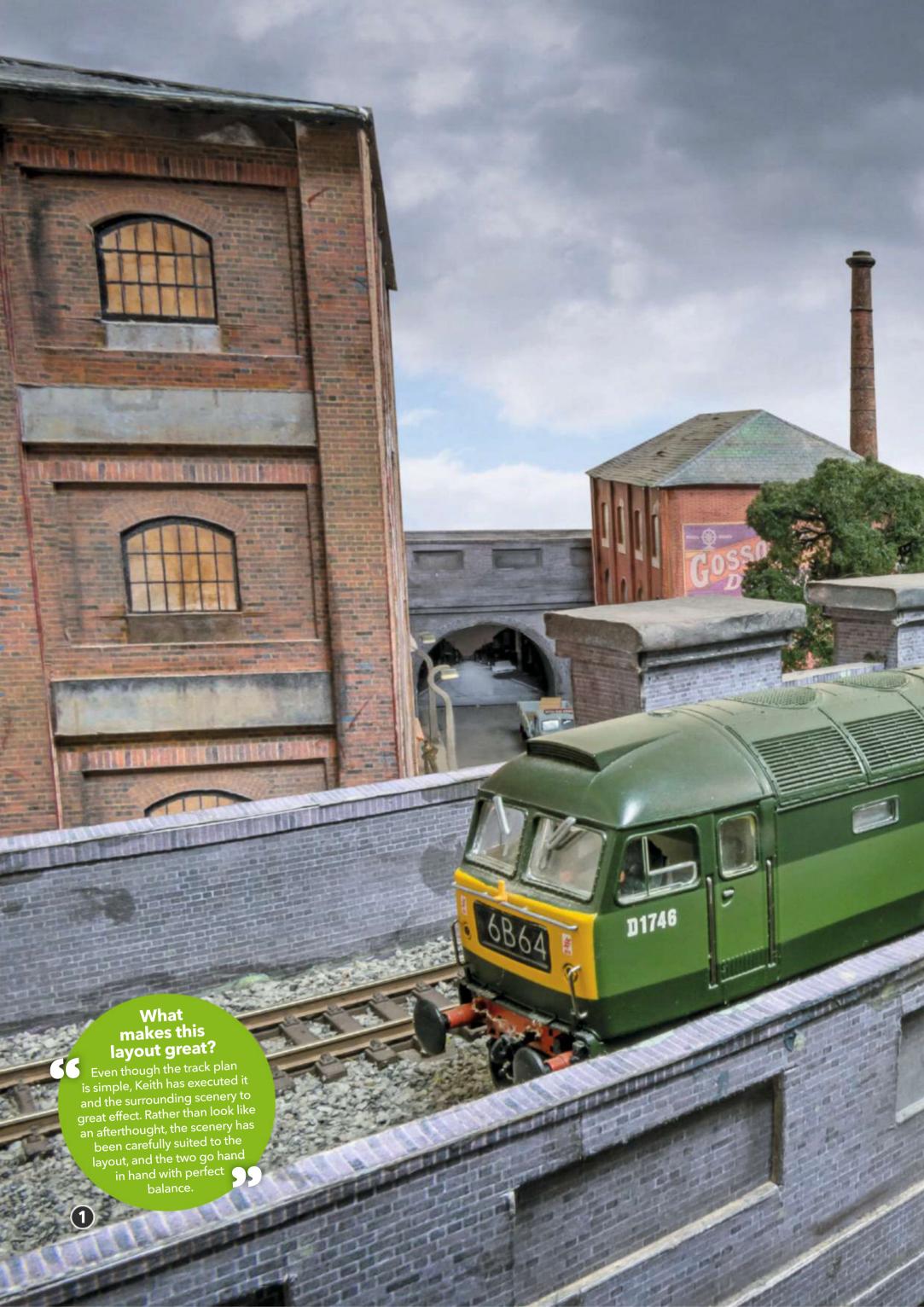

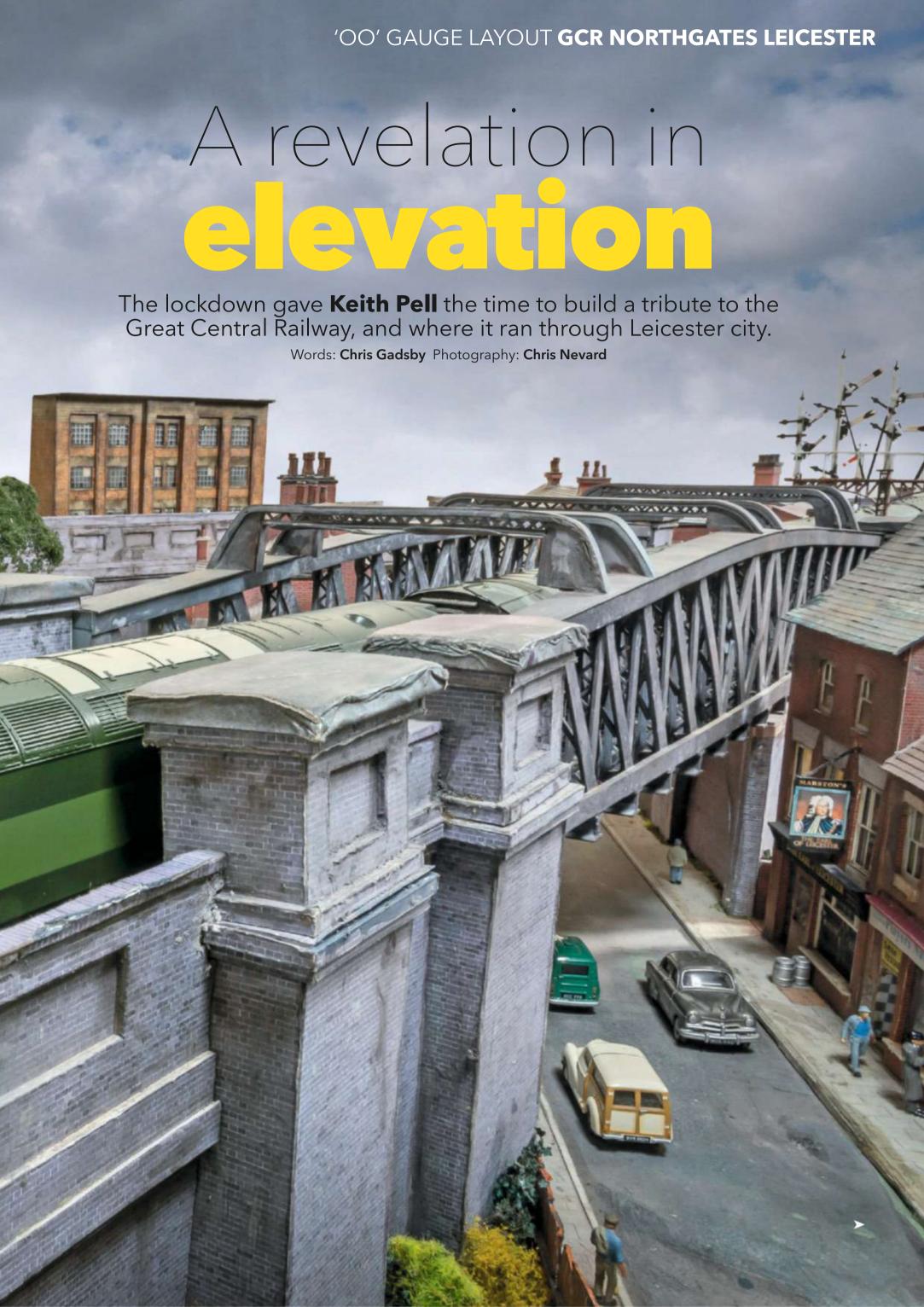

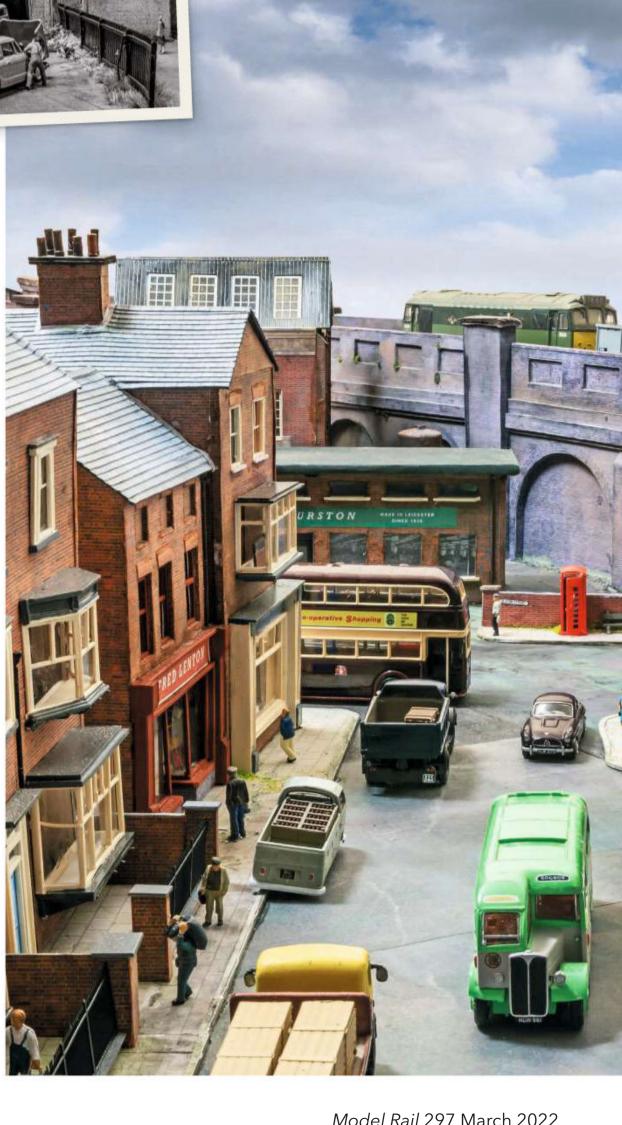
'OO' GAUGE LAYOUT GCR NORTHGATES LEICESTER



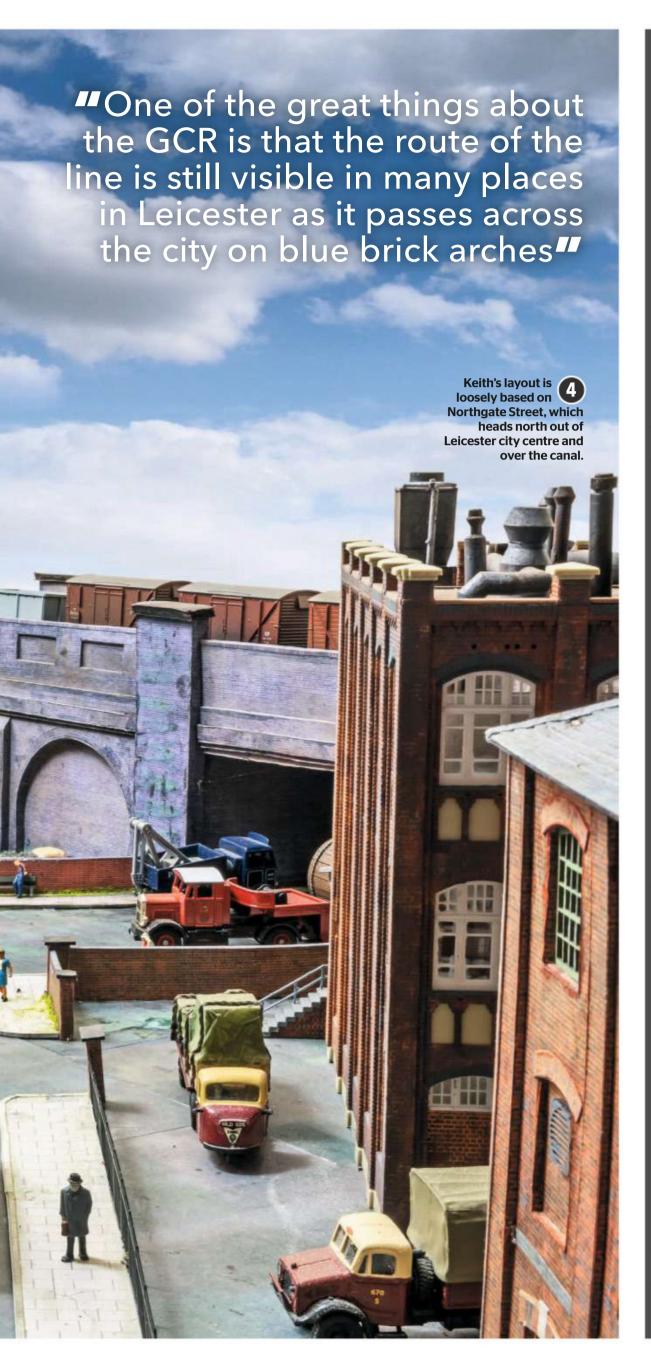
e are sure many of us would love the idea of having a life-sized railway at the bottom of the garden, and sitting outside and watching trains go past. But having had Cardiff Central station underneath my 13th-floor window for a year at university, I can tell you that a train a minute with the occasional horrendous flange squeal gets old fast, not to mention the 2.30am rail-grinding (thank you very much, Network Rail). It would be far nicer to be in Keith Pell's situation, with the Great Central Railway (GCR) passing at the bottom of the garden. With a wide variety of locomotives and stock, as well as lots of visiting motive power, there's plenty of inspiration for a GCR layout, which is exactly what Keith has created.

"Just recently *Tornado* visited the railway, which was great to watch, but we've also had 'Deltics' and all sorts in recent times so there's plenty to get the creative juices flowing. One of the great things about the GCR is that the route of the line is still visible in many places in Leicester as it passed across the city on blue brick arches, many of which are still standing. I first saw them in a book called *Main Line Lament* which is no longer in print but then, as Leicester is only a couple of miles down the road from me, it was easy to research them and take photographs so that I could make accurate replicas – 72 of them, in fact."



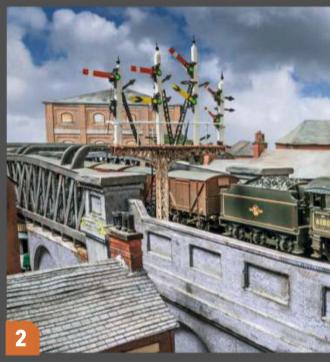

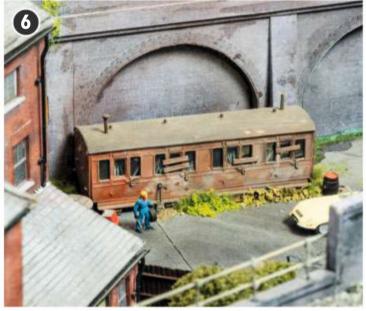


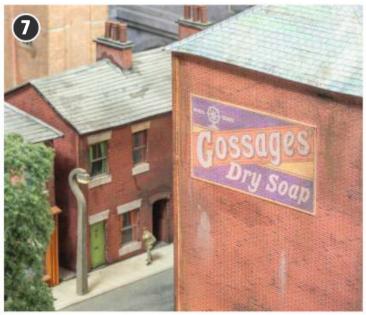


Keith elected to model the GCR above the city exactly like the prototype, but the prospect of spending an hour to make a single arch was discouraging at times. However, he bit the bullet and, with the unexpected luxury of time thanks to the lockdown, he used Scalescenes blue brick arches and adapted them to suit the GCR.

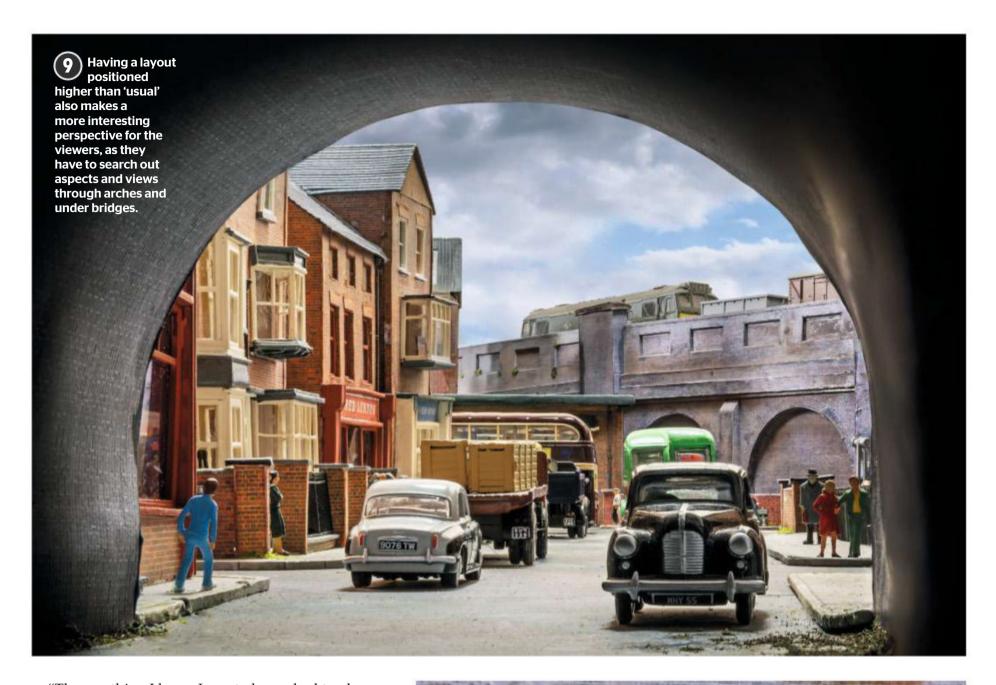
"As we were all stuck in our houses with nothing else to do I was able to make some good progress after suspending work on the layout owing to a heart attack. It took about five years to build but three of those were spent on planning, as space was incredibly tight and I had to get a bit inventive with the shape."

We've seen layouts of all shapes and sizes in the pages of *Model Rail* but only a few have been 'bone-shaped'. After much deliberation, Keith realised this was the only way of getting the layout he wanted.







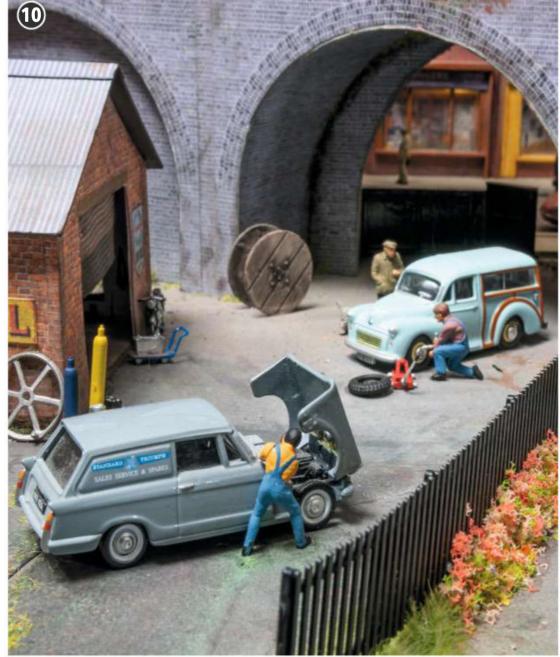


"The one thing I knew I wanted was dual track running, but that left me with a dilemma as I needed almost four feet to make the turn. This would have taken up too much space in the garage if I'd have left it as a U-turn so I had to continue the bend and make it narrower in the middle so that I could reach across for access and still have room in the rest of the garage. At its widest point, 'GCR Northgates Leicester' is 43 inches wide and 29 inches at its narrowest. I've also raised it to about 50 inches above floor height, as the space underneath is needed to store the usual garage items of 'stuff that will come in useful one day'."

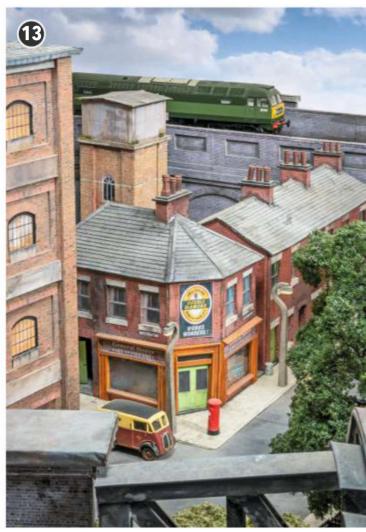
Plenty of that stuff did come in useful when building 'GCR Northgates Leicester', as plenty of spare bits from kits accumulated over the years went into the scratchbuilt buildings of the East Midlands' most populous city.

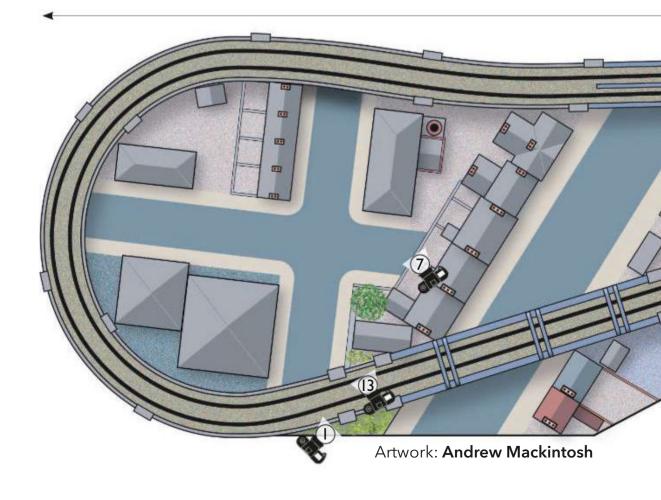


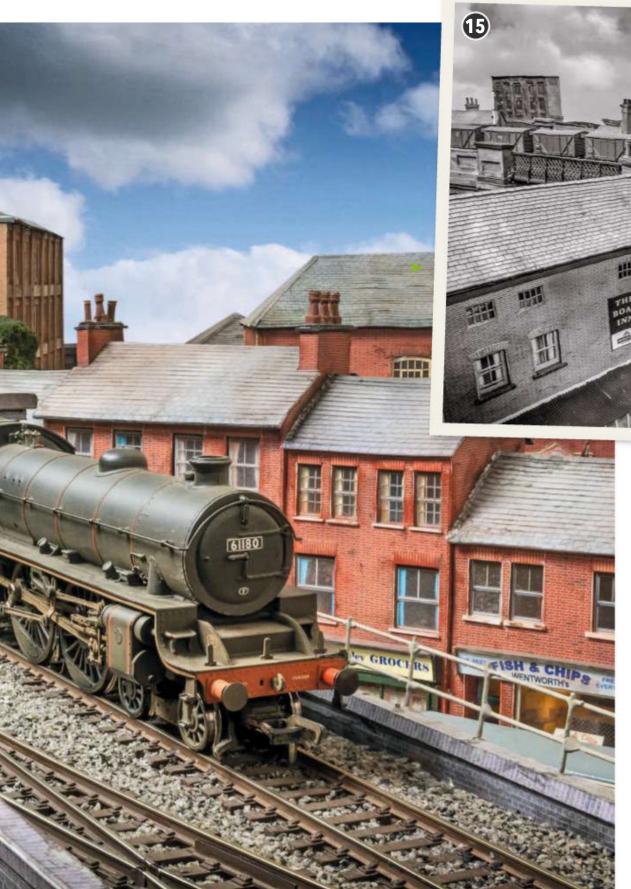
"I wanted to capture the feeling of being in the city and looking up at the railway, and wanted to build something unique that the people who remember the area would recall from looking at the model. Naturally, that means a lot of the buildings have had to be scratchbuilt. Choosing to scratchbuild a real location requires a lot of research, which takes time, and sometimes reference material is not easily available. My local records office was very helpful when it came to finding sources. Scratchbuilding certainly gets you looking at buildings more carefully than people usually do. I drew out the structures from photos of the buildings that I wanted to build, printed out the plans and stuck them onto Scalescenes or Metcalfe paper. The windows and doors are a combination of kitbashing, some pre-bought and printed on film. The shop signs and other graphics are also from kits or produced using basic software and by referencing actual locations."

Although Keith hasn't stuck hard and fast to Northgate Street in Leicester, he's done his best to model the buildings and the canal as they were at the time.

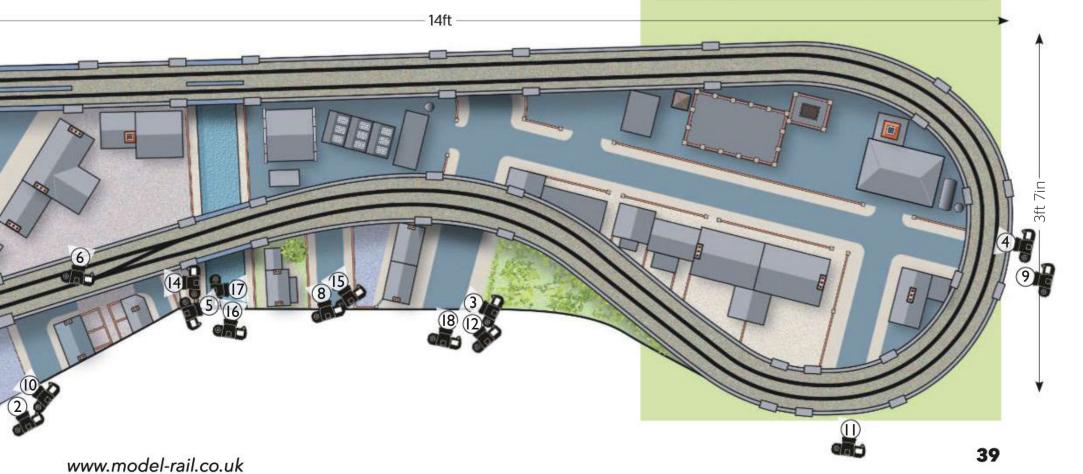

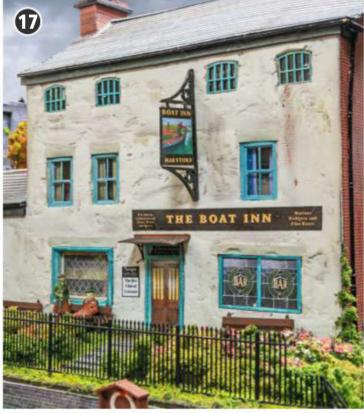

storage sidings, I can just sit back and watch trains go round for hours at a time."

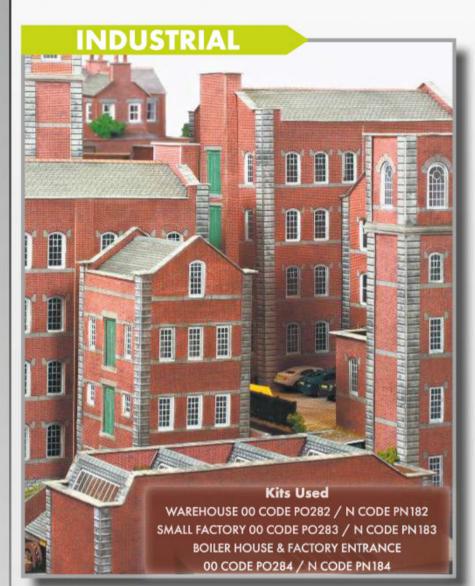

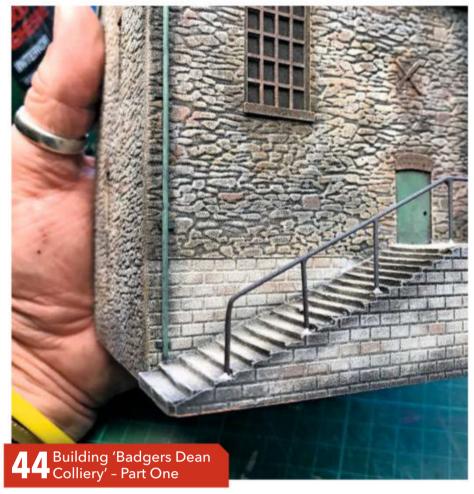

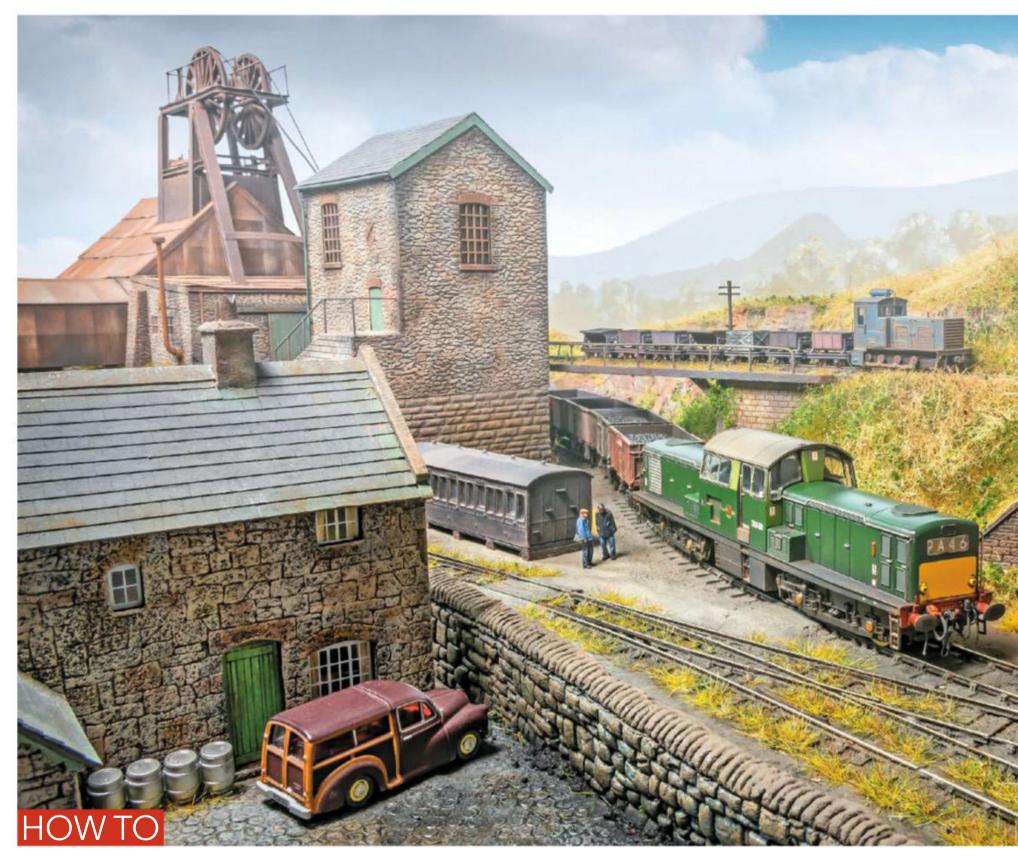

BUILD BADGERS DEAN COLLIERY PART ONE

Chris Nevard has been busy creating a tasty slice of the South Wales Valleys on his latest layout commission. In the first of a series of features, Chris explains how he created the key colliery buildings.

ne of the fun things about model railways is that they're never finished. There's always something more to do, whether it's a simple refresh of an individual scene or the installation of superior buildings or, perhaps, an electrical upgrade. Sometimes, however, it could be a whole new layout extension.

Regular readers may recall a Workbench feature about the construction of a small harbour which appeared in MR277 (Summer 2020). The layout at the heart of that feature was 'Neath Riverside', a layout I built with a distinct South Wales theme. The customer for whom I'd built the layout had subsequently managed to expand his railway room, and this meant that 'Neath Riverside' could be

extended into an 'L' shape, as opposed to a linear end-to-end arrangement. Various ideas were considered but, being South Wales, it didn't take long to realise that the extension would have to be based around a colliery!

We'll look at the baseboards, track and scenery in a later instalment but, first, I wanted to create some appropriate buildings for the colliery...

DERELICT CORNISH ENGINE

③ 8 hours | //////

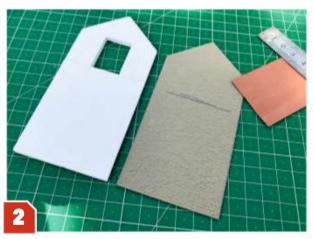
These distinctive beam engine houses originated in Cornwall, but they could also be found all over the world. The design dates back at least 200 years and they would be used primarily for pumping water out of mines. In later years they'd be replaced with more modern pumps. The engine inside and beam would then be removed, and the open apertures occasionally bricked up, with the building possibly being put to other uses.

My design here is a freelance arrangement, with inspiration taken from images of various buildings found online.

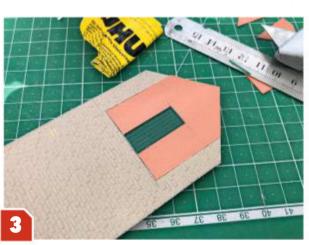




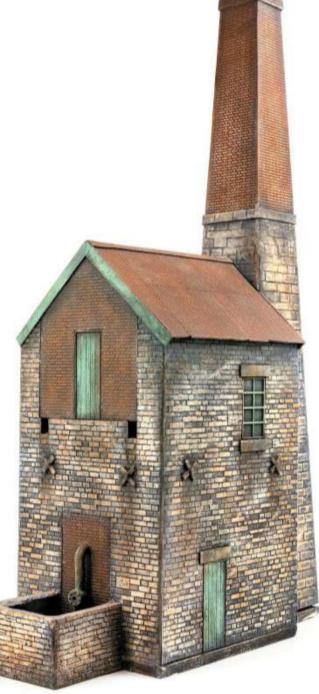
The inner shell was formed from sheets of 5mm foamboard, with the main apertures cut out with a knife. The foamboard is easy to cut, but a fresh blade produces far cleaner edges, especially when working on a cutting mat.



The foamboard inner walls were used as templates to cut the textured outer layers, for which dressed stone-patterned embossed plastic sheet (Slaters) was employed. Again, a sharp knife is essential for neat cuts.



The outer veneers of embossed plastic card were applied with UHU contact adhesive. As well as stone textures, panels of brick-effect plastic card were also applied here and there to suggest recent structural modifications.





The plastic card overlays were cut over-size to allow for trimming back later. The four sides were then assembled (using UHU) and held in place with masking tape until set. Foamboard brackets added strength to the internal corners.

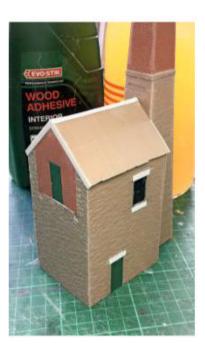

Once the main structure was complete, the outer corners could be tidied up with a file and abrasives before the roof was fabricated from corrugated plastic card. This was scored lightly to mimic panels and uneven edges.



The chimney was formed in the same way as the buildings, using a foamboard core and plastic card veneers. Chimneys could be round or square in cross section and the combination of stone and brick sections was typical.



Any gaps between the parts were filled with putty, which was sanded when fully cured. After adding details such as lintels, sills, doors, windows and barge boards, plus reinforcing brackets, the structure was ready for painting.



To provide a suitable base, I started with a misting of Halfords matt black aerosol-based paint. I worked outdoors on a still, clear day, although it's still important to wear a facemask to protect yourself from the fumes.



When the paint had cured, I dry-brushed the walls light grey. A stiff brush is best, dipped into the paint before wiping most of it off onto tissue. What little paint remains on the bristles is then deposited onto the textured surfaces.



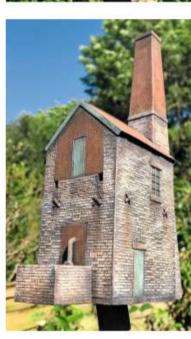
The process was repeated using various shades. In this case, a lighter stone/grey shade followed the mid-grey of the initial coat, followed by beige. I often use household emulsion tester pots for this kind of work.

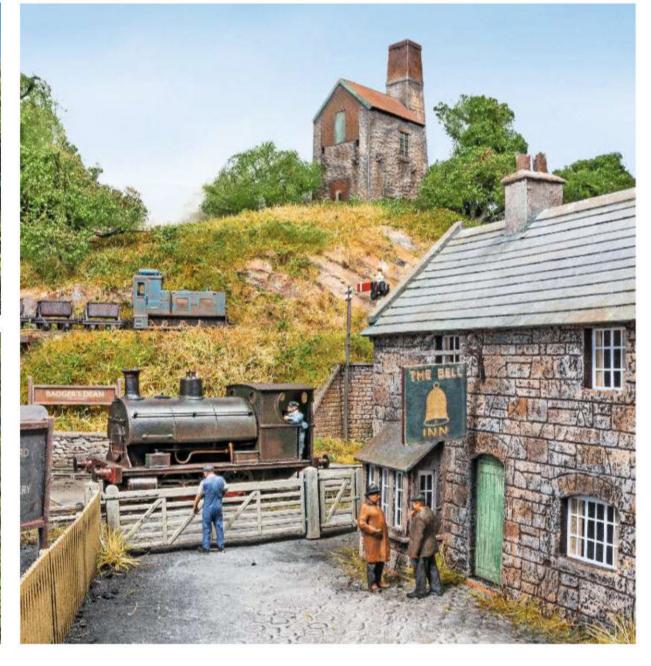


Brown shades followed, on the stonework and the brick sections. Remember to keep wiping away most of the paint onto the tissue and work gradually. It's easier to put more paint on than to take it off!



Reddish shades completed the brick sections. With the masonry complete, the roof panels were painted rusty red and the doors and woodwork was given a base coat of green, followed by a thin wash of diluted beige.

PIT HEAD BUILDINGS

🔇 18 hours | /////

The basis of the pit head winding tower is Bachmann Scenecraft's Hampton Heath Colliery pit head (ref. 44-025). It's a solid, albeit basic construction, but it provides an ideal starting point. Sadly, the model isn't in the current range, but you might be able to source one on eBay and via second-hand model dealers. Generally, ready-made buildings such as this tend to be manufactured in quite short runs, so always snap up any buildings you think could be useful in future.



While my model is purely a freelance affair, I did use Google's image search tool and various mining books to gain inspiration, focusing on smaller collieries. Research showed that the pit head structure would sit inside a larger building, its size being based on what space I had. Again, foamboard was employed to form the basic inner shell, being glued together with UHU and clamped with masking tape while the adhesive set.



The pit head and winding house are above the railway sidings, and a piece of insulation foam was just the right height - just a little taller than the biggest locomotive. Note the locomotive box used as a mock-up for the loading screen!



Dry-brushing followed, using various browns, creams, greys and matt black, following the same process as the derelict Cornish Engine house, using interior matt emulsion paints, plus a few matt enamel paints.





The structure's inner shell was then clad in embossed plastic sheet: stone effect for the main building and corrugated panels for the roof - again, UHU is ideal. The small windows are spares from a kit.



As with the engine house, the painting stage began with aerosol paints. In this instance, a blend of Halfords matt black, red oxide and grey primers provided a suitably mucky base for further paints.





A neat trick to give the impression of layered corrugated iron sheets is to make use of a piece of card as a stencil mask. This allows a discernible edge to be created. These techniques take a little practice, but you can soon perfect them.

ENGINE WINDING HOUSE

3 9 hours

A winding house, as the name suggests, houses the winding engine to lift and lower miners up and down the pit shaft, plus lifting freshly hewn coal to the surface.



Using books and the internet for inspiration, I started with a foamboard box. I had some spare windows from a Scale Model Scenery kit, which turned out to be perfect (www.scalemodelscenery.co.uk).



Checking the position of the winding house in relation to the pit head. A paint brush stands in for a winding cable to help place the opening for it in the side of the building. As ever, Bertie the hound is helping!



After adding the laser-cut roof tile strips, priming and dry-brushed painting followed, using the same techniques as already described.





To create the steps, strips of mounting card were cut to a uniform width and laminated together. I aligned the depth of the stair treads by eye as, on such an old building, they're unlikely to be perfectly uniform.



A little DAS clay helps to fill any gaps in the walls and steps and tidy things up. Excess clay can be cleaned up with a damp brush and the mortar courses reinstated with the edge of a cocktail stick. Allow the clay to dry fully.

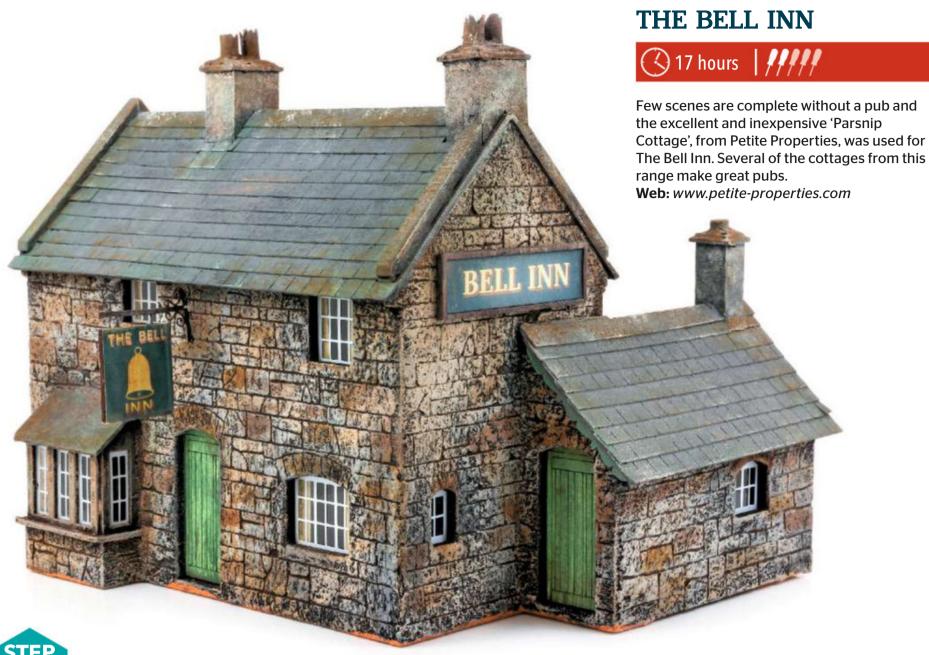


A railing was soldered together from some brass wire. Note the occasional stones picked out in contrasting shades to add a little variation. No need to be too tidy - we don't want that painting-by-numbers look.

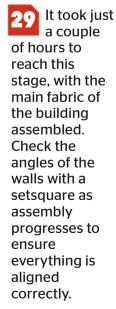
The Petite Properties kit provides everything you need to form the main structure, apart from glue, paint... and time! The walls and chimney stacks are rendered as laser-cut MDF components which fit together neatly.



Following the instructions, the building is easy to assemble, using cyanoacrylate adhesive. PVA works just as well, but it takes a lot longer to dry, so you'll need masking tape to hold things together while the glue sets.



Smaller detail parts are also laser-cut, this time from fibre board. I used cyano glue for the whole assembly, allowing the build to progress rapidly. Ensure adequate ventilation, as things can get rather smelly!







Scale Model Scenery's laser-cut roof slate strips were fixed to the roof panels, applied in overlapping layers, working from the gutter line upwards. Petite Properties can also supply slate and roof tile strips.





As a change from textured plastic card overlays, I used plaster as a basis for the stone effect. After mixing the dry plaster with a little water, it was spread over the MDF shell with an old knife, as if buttering toast.



When fully dry, the plaster was given a quick coat of primer. Priming isn't essential, but it does allow the scribing process to be seen more clearly, especially when a vibrant shade is applied, such as red.

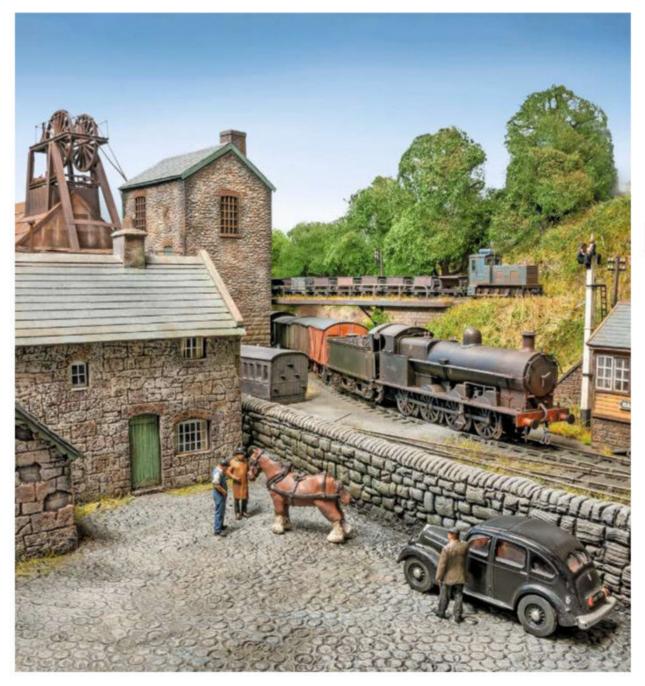


A small nail in a mini-drill chuck made a good scribing tool. You don't need to be too tidy, and if the odd bit of plaster breaks away from the MDF, that might even enhance the rustic look.



With scribing complete, give the surface a light brush with an old toothbrush to remove all debris. Dry-brushed painting can then progress, which brings the building to life.







I found 'The Bell Inn' signs after a quick Google image search and, after resizing on the computer, they were was printed out and installed, using Pritt Stick as an adhesive.

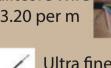

SCRATCHBUILD IN'N' GAUGE

Grahame Hedges recreates the rear façade of a real building, using a novel approach to scratchbuilt construction.

his is a short article about the construction of a model building called Telephone House, based on the real structure in London Bridge Street, SE1, near to London Bridge station. The feature wall, the one that will face the front of my layout and be viewable, is the rear of the actual building with the decorative façade facing away onto London Bridge Street.

The building has changed over the years, particularly the roof, as well as occupancy and use (it is now a hotel), and my aim was to try and base it on its 1970s/1980s incarnation. Having found an aerial photo online, it could be seen that the roof was originally a peak pitched one, rather than the mansard (see panel right) type it later



became, and there was a deep recess towards the right-hand end that had later been filled in.

As is often necessary, there is some compression and simplification in my model design. The length is reduced by leaving out some of the columns of windows. This helps ensure it will fit with the other buildings and structures on my model without overpowering them and making the layout longer than can be accommodated.

My preferred technique for building structures is to first construct a carcass

Jargon Buster

A mansard type roof is often characterised by twin pitches on each side, with a steeper lower section, often punctuated with dormer windows.

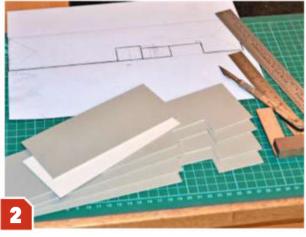

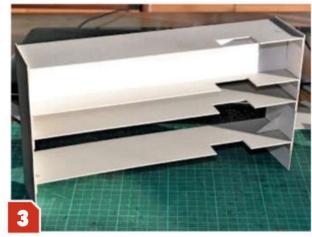




My research led me to a useful aerial view of Telephone House in the period in which I was aiming to recreate it ('70/'80s), showing that the roof was originally a peaked design, rather than the mansard type it gained in recent times.



A rough scale plan and elevation was drawn up, including a degree of compression and simplification. Then the main floors (one is not necessary for every level) and flank walls to form the carcass were cut from mountboard.



Strips of card were added to the inside of the ends for the floors to sit on and the structure was glued together. Further internal walls will be added to provide more rigidity and prevent viewers being able to see through the building.

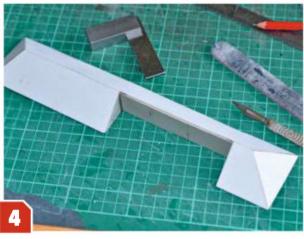

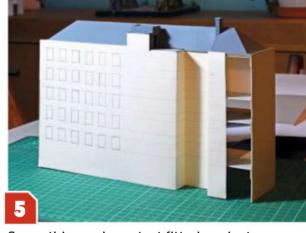

consisting of the internal floors and walls, usually from mount-board card, and then hang the outer walls onto that. This is probably the reverse of how others usually make model buildings (by constructing the outer shell and then fitting supports inside that skin) but it does mean that the internal carcass helps to make the model a relatively strong and square structure. And it does mean you are not jiggling around trying to retro-fit internal walls and floors into a restricted space, or having to add windows in a confined space.

Additionally, the external walls can be finished and detailed while they are flat on the workbench before being fitted in place. However, you do need to make sure that the various floors and internal walls of the carcass are accurately aligned and square so that the outer walls will sit flush and true. With the building being part of a terraced row, the end/flank walls are plain and thus could be incorporated as part of the carcass.



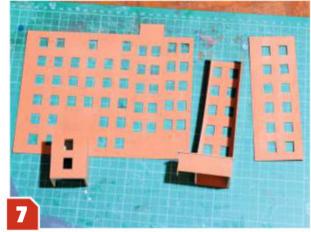
The roof was made from card as a separate assembly. There is a flat floor with angled pieces glued on and the sloping surfaces, from card, glued over to form a tent-shaped structure. Further relief will be added to this.



Spare thin card was test-fitted against the carcass to finalise window positions and check the size and fit of the external walls.



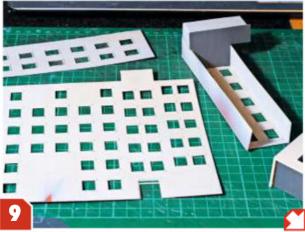
The external walls were cut from embossed Plastikard and the window apertures cut out. Here some are being test-fitted in place, not glued, and some additional card internal walls that have been added can be seen.



The main rear walls have been cut and all the windows cut out to form four sub-assemblies. Two are plain flat walls and two more complex sub-assemblies that include lean-to structures built from Plastikard covered card inners.



The wall panels can now be detailed while flat on the workbench. Here the windowsills have been added, cut from suitable sized styrene strip, while lintels and a door frame need to be made and added.



Once the details were added to the panels while flat, the four wall sub-assemblies were given a coat of grey primer from a Halfords aerosol can. This helps to see where any corrections and any changes need to be made.

The primed wall panels were test-fitted and held in place temporarily with small pieces of tape to check fit. It can be seen that the main left end wall panel still needs cutting back to fit neatly.



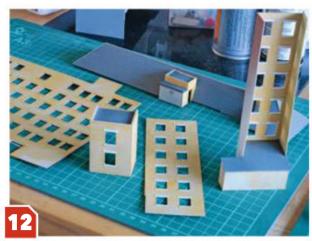
A little basic weathering, just some grubbingup of the brickwork with a 6B pencil rubbed over with a finger which helps highlight the bricks against the mortar courses, has been added and a start made on the window glazing.



Further work on the roof sub-assembly was done. Here, Redutex tiling, a self-adhesive relief texture, has been added and the ridge tiles made and added from Plastikard strip. Some basic painting has also been undertaken.



The windows are formed from Scene-Setters glazing grids with the frames thickened up with a Posca paint pen. Then they were cut out with a suitable margin and glued in place to the back of the wall panels.



Some colour has been added to the walls the finish of the bricks on the real building is a pale yellow - and details like the lean-to roofs, sills and lintels have been picked out by brush painting.



With the wall panels just about complete, a start was made on glueing them in place. With the front side facing away and invisible when viewing the layout, a plain single card wall with rudimentary details painted on was used.

Always up for a modelling challenge, Peter Marriott set himself the task of building a bridge from scratch using foam sheets... and he's glad that he did!

oam pieces and Styrofoam are useful materials for modelmaking, especially when forming scenic contours or the basic structure of buildings. Hard foam is particularly easy to work with, not least because it cuts quickly, and its lightweight nature is perfect for portable layouts. Cutting is made easier if you have the right tools, such as a hot wire foam cutter or special long-bladed foam knife, both of which create very little mess.

I recently decided to have a go at recreating a typical modern concrete rail overbridge from 6mm thick hard foam sheet. It had occurred to me that the rough texture of the foam would be good for representing concrete, with the



help of a little paint of course!

The various parts were cut with a Woodland Scenics Foam Knife (which sports an effective 50mm long blade), after which the edges were smoothed with fine abrasive sheets. Once all of the pieces were shaped, I turned my attention to fixing them in place using Woodland Scenics Foam Tack Glue which dries more quickly than regular PVA-type glues, although I felt it best to leave everything overnight to dry fully.

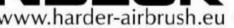
Various coats of paint were brushed, followed by various weathering washes to

create the look of a structure that had been in situ for about a decade. The finishing touches came courtesy of a set of railings, taken from a Faller plastic kit.

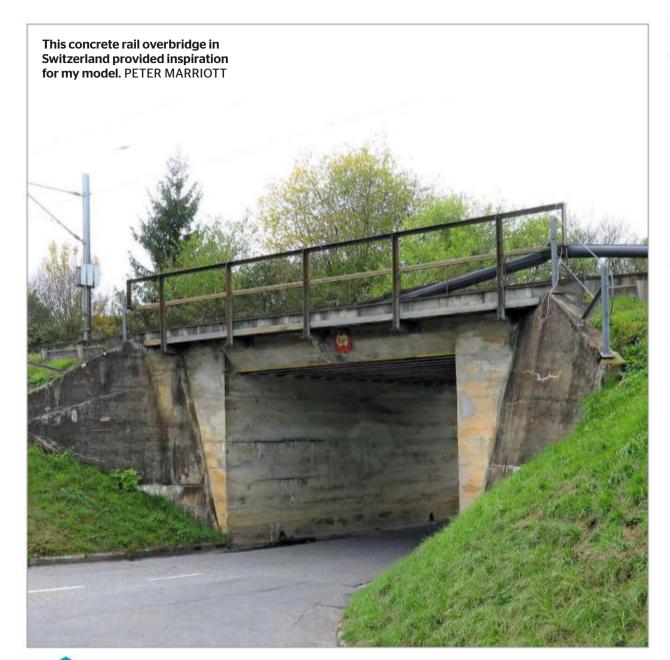
The finished bridge has proven to be strong enough to withstand the weight of passing trains (even heavy, modern locomotives!) and, equally importantly, I think it looks good. There's a real sense of satisfaction from building anything from scratch, especially key structures such as bridges. Aside from the other materials and the Faller railings, the cost of the foam came to less than £3, so it proved to be a great value endeavour too. It's something I'm certainly tempted to do again in future.

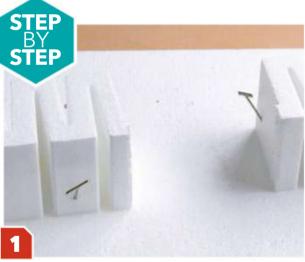

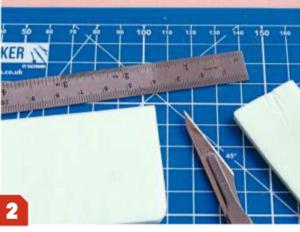

I raised the track bed above the baseboard level by using a Woodland Scenics 2in Riser that was fixed to the baseboard using Foam Tack Glue and held in place using Foam Nails while the adhesive dried.



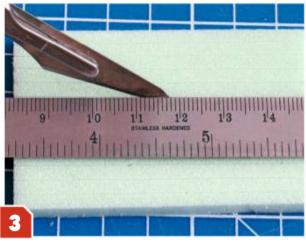
In an attempt to make some of the residual timber plank lines look a bit more random, I etched a few ragged lines into the supporting walls with a small screwdriver.



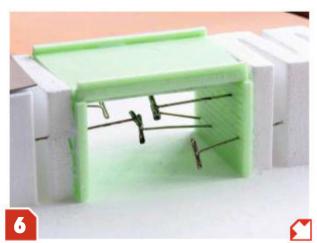
I used some light green foam sheet I had in stock, but Woodland Scenics pack C1177 of assorted foam sheets includes similar material. The foam sheet was cut with a Swann-Morton knife and a steel ruler.



The base of the bridge was cut to fit snugly in the gap between the Woodland Scenics risers. Two thin parallel strips were fixed to the outer edges to provide strength and to take the railings later on.



Based on my observations of real concrete structures there would be left-over lines and imperfections where planking had held the wet concrete in place. To represent these I carved faint lines into the walls of the bridge.



The side walls were glued to the ends of the riser sections using Foam Tack Glue, with Woodland Scenics Foam Nails employed to hold everything in place while the adhesive cured. The holes would be filled later.

Having removed the bridge span, the road could then be painted more easily. I mixed two Woodland Scenics Earth Colours, black and white, to produce the desired shade of grey, although this is just an undercoat.



The angled supporting wing walls were then cut from the same foam sheet, before fixing in place with Foam Tack Glue and retaining with pins.



The bridge walls and span were painted with a lighter, 'concrete' shade of acrylic paint, from the Woodland Scenics range. Two coats were required.



With the base layers of paint complete, the surrounding landform could then be assembled from plaster cloth and Shaper Sheet, both by Woodland Scenics. The bridge span had yet to be glued into position.



To fill the gaps and finesse the shape of the landform, I employed Woodland Scenics Foam Putty. This material is easy to apply using a wooden ice cream stick or other flat implement.



The landscape was then treated to various Woodland Scenics Undercoat paints, creating a variety of green and earth brown tones.

Factfile - concrete bridges

While the Victorians were partial to ornate brick, dressed stone or iron bridges (or a combination of all three!), concrete has been employed on UK railway structures since around 1865, during construction of the District Line in West London. However, its widespread use began in earnest during the inter-war and post-war years, thanks to the material's cheapness and convenience. Concrete technology had also improved

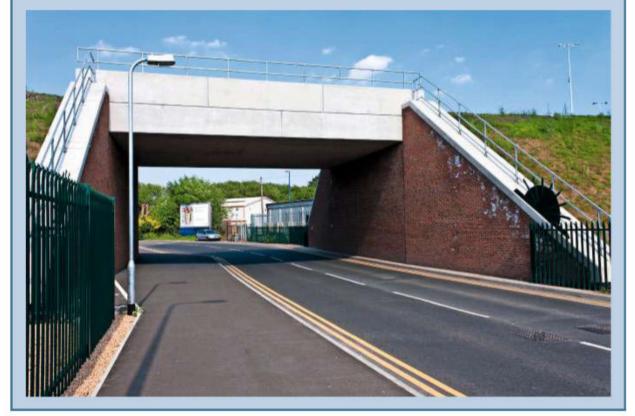

considerably by then, especially with the growth of pre-stressed concrete, which began to supersede the use of steel-reinforced concrete for bridge arches and spans.

Although concrete supporting and wing walls are likely to be employed these days, masonry retaining walls can still be found, often modified from existing structures (where a life-expired iron or steel bridge span has been replaced with a concrete span). This rail overbridge, spanning Cow Lane in Reading, was rebuilt during 2011. ALAMY



sheet, cut to match the contours of the road and retaining walls. I only treated one side of the road, to suit the semi-rural location. A fresh blade was used to ensure clean, accurate cuts.





The concrete walls were given a thin wash of MIG earth acrylic paint, diluted with water. The paint was applied with a wide brush and allowed to seep into the lines on the supporting walls and around the base of the bridge.

The final finish for the road surface came from a couple of coats of Noch's asphalt paint, applied with a wide paintbrush. This paint dries to a nice matt finish. The bridge span could now be fixed in place and the track laid.



To improve the appearance of the side supports I cut three 'Vs' in them along each side. I also cut a square of foam to fit into the corner of each side of the top of the bridge support to hide gaps at the top of the retaining wall.

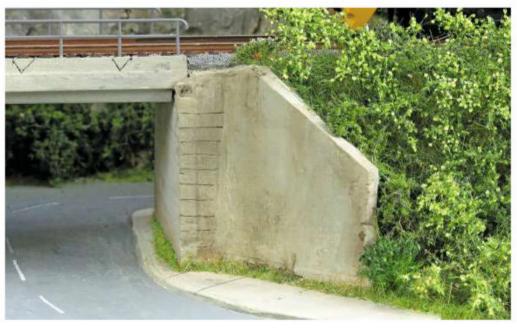


To represent the safety fencing on each side of the bridge I used Faller plastic fencing (kit ref. 180403). I left just half of the locating pins on the base of the fence - it does not need all of them to be mounted securely.



Mounting holes for the railings were formed with a pin. Small blobs of PVA glue were then applied to the railings before pushing into place. After checking they were upright, they were left to dry.









pring is the favourite season for many of us, with milder temperatures warming the earth and changing the drab winter landscape into one of vibrant colour. Early spring flowers such as daffodils, crocuses and snowdrops add colour to roadsides, linesides, gardens and wooded areas. Snowdrops are the first to appear, usually from late January, and provide hope for those of us eager to see tha back of winter.

Recently, I have been experimenting with adding snowdrops, or indeed any small flowering plants to a layout. As with any addition to a layout a bit of research is important to get a realistic result. In this instance, with snowdrops there are three

features to capture: dark green leaves, low height and small clumps of flowers.

The simplest way is to use tufts of dark green grass then add white coloured flock to the tips of the grass fibres. Grass tufts are available from Gaugemaster, Model Tree Shop, Noch and other sources and it's simply a matter of cutting the tufts to the required size. Alternatively, plain dark green tufts can be used, cutting and shaping them to size then adding the flower effect by carefully painting a blob of white on the top of some of the grass fibres.

If you prefer to go down the homemade route, grass tufts are easy to make using an electrostatic grass planting tool, PVA glue, greaseproof paper, static grass fibres and white-coloured scatter material.

The process of making these plants for a diorama involved a bit of trial and error as the pictures will demonstrate, but I learned a lot along the way! The prototype picture I was working from (above) as I worked through this 'test and see' project showed that the snowdrops had pushed their way up through dead leaves.

The tools I needed to make snowdrops were only basic tools that every modeller will have. They were a small pair of scissors, a small paintbrush, white acrylic paint, white scatter material and white glue.



My first task was to make some mid green grass tufts as the basis for my experiments. I used Woodland Scenics medium green but the tufts were too large for individual clumps so I trimmed them with a small pair of scissors.



To create the look of fallen leaves I used dead oak leaves by MBR, retailed in the UK by A&H Models of Brackley. Not only would this make the scene look more realistic but also hide where the tuft met the landscape.



The tufts were easy to cut in half to make them more suitable for snowdrops. A small pair of scissors will do the job without any problems. I used an old pair of nail scissors which made light work of the tufts.



My first thought was simply to paint the ends of the tufts white for the flowers. Here, five tufts have been painted with a little white acrylic. I came to the conclusion it might look okay for 'N' scale but not in 'OO' scale.



Here is a comparison between tufts with scatter material (top) and tufts that are painted (bottom). In my view the ones at the top looked a lot better.

The first batch of snowdrops had just been painted white on the tips and I was unhappy with the results. They looked just what they were - green grass tufts with white paint on them! The flower heads were too small.



I sprinkled some tiny pieces of brown foam around the base of the painted snowdrops but this still did not create the scene I wanted to make. I needed to make the leaves look more prominent and the plants more realistic.



In an attempt to make the scene more realistic I tried sprinkling on a few dead oak leaves by MBR on the ground and I was pleased with the results. I had started to make some progress towards reflecting the scene.



To create the flower effect I used a pack of foam pieces from 4D Modelshop called Tex White and Green Blossom L28. After adding a little PVA glue to the tufts, a little foam was sprinkled onto the plants.



The combination of the white paint and foam pieces looked much better, but the plants were still a little tall for my liking. I pushed them down with my finger, rather than trying to prune them any further with scissors.



I squashed the plants down to about 30% of their original height, which greatly improved their appearance. Thankfully, all of the white foam scatter material remained fixed to the plants.

HOW TO

TAKE THE STING OUT OF 'WASP' STRIPES



I'm building a kit of a small industrial diesel locomotive and need to apply black and yellow chevron stripes to the ends. What's the best way of doing this?

Dave Burrows, Coventry

George says: I'm hesitant to claim which is the 'best way' of painting the distinctive 'wasp' stripes, as there are several possible approaches, each of which can be effective. In virtually all cases, applying the yellow paint first is essential, with the black stripes added on top. The stripes can be applied with waterslide decals, paint, or they can be drawn on with a fine ink pen. Whichever method is chosen, the level of difficulty is often dictated by the complexity of the model's surfaces.



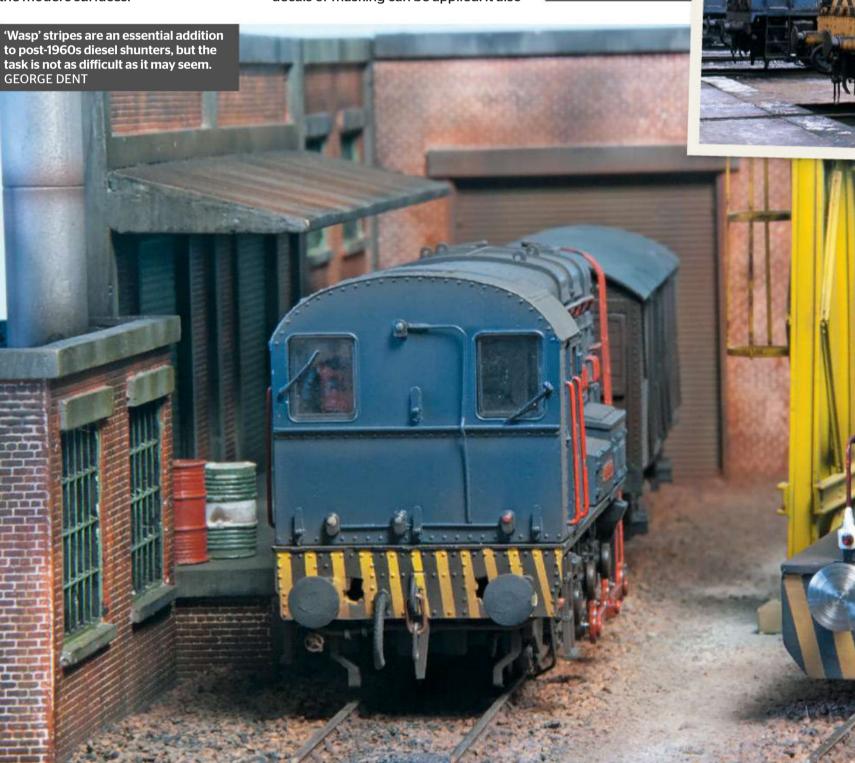
Working on a kit-built locomotive offers several advantages, as the cab ends and bufferbeams can be treated to the 'wasp' stripes before raised detail fittings are installed, such as buffers, coupling hooks, lamp brackets and handrails. This provides a flatter, unencumbered surface onto which the decals or masking can be applied. It also

allows the stripes to be marked out more accurately, leading to a neater finish and, once the work is complete, the extra fittings can be installed and touched in with paint as necessary.

I haven't tried 'wasp' stripe decals myself (they usually involve just the black elements which can be cut to the desired length), but they're available in various sizes from the likes of Fox Transfers (www.fox-transfers.co.uk). My preferred method is to employ an ink pen to render the edges of the stripes, before filling in the gaps with black paint. A simple homemade template can be created to speed up the marking-out process and ensure consistent results,

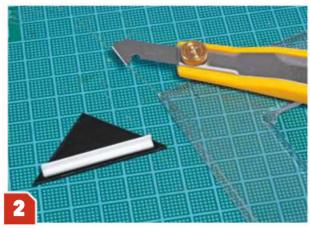
while any unevenness in sheen is later cured with a coat of clear gloss varnish.

The presence of raised details, such as lamps, brackets, handrails or conduit can impede the application of 'wasp' stripes, so it helps if these can be temporarily removed or installed later.
COLOUR RAIL





After a white primer coat, the yellow paint is applied to the ends. Yellow is a tricky colour to apply and is best applied over several light coats. Where possible, omit raised fittings like buffers, coupling hooks or handrails for now.



In order to ensure the 'wasp' stripes are applied at a consistent angle, I created this simple template from plastic sheet, cut to form an isosceles triangle (with two equal sides and a 90° angle at the apex). A length of angle strip acts as a guide.



With the angle strip held against the underside of the bufferbeam, the template can slide from side to side, allowing the lines to be drawn at consistent angles. After measuring the gaps between lines, a fine pencil is used initially.



The chevron-style stripes meet in the centre of the bufferbeam, so accurate measuring and marking-out is essential. After double-checking that the pencil-drawn lines look

correct, they can be redrawn with a fine,

permanent ink pen.



Allow the ink to dry in between rendering each line, to avoid smudges. I like to mark where the black paint is to go with a dot, to avoid any confusion. The paint can be applied by hand with a fine brush, and either acrylic or enamel paint is suitable.



Allow the black paint to dry fully before gently rubbing away any traces of pencil marks with an eraser or a cotton swab dampened with water. The 'wasp' panels can then be masked while the rest of the locomotive is painted.



When painting is complete and the masking removed, the buffers and other missing parts can be installed and touched in with paint as necessary. A coat of gloss varnish will unify the finish and provide a good base for any decals.





An alternative approach is to mask the yellow ends with thin strips of masking tape or film. Accurate alignment is essential, so a similar guide template can be created to help mark out the position of each stripe with a pencil.



The black stripes can then be painted by hand or, preferably, by airbrush with the paint applied over several light coats. Working with buffers and other details already installed is possible, but it does make the job more complicated and time-consuming.



KNOW YOUR... LIVERIES

PART 6: Early days on the Western region

Paul Chancellor casts an eye over the livery variations that could be found on the newly nationalised Western Region of British Railways.

ith British Railways inheriting a wide range of locomotive liveries from the previous 'Big Four' companies, it would take some time before a standardised set of colour schemes could be implemented. In the interim, as we have seen in previous instalments (MR292/MR295), new numbers and British Railways lettering were applied onto the original paint scheme in most instances.

Compared to locomotives hailing from the former LMS, LNER and Southern Railways, the situation with ex-GWR traction was far less complex. Indeed, thanks to the GWR's use of cast numberplates, it made sense for BR to retain the original running numbers. What was needed, however, was the addition of British Railways branding alongside the fitting of smokebox numberplates, plus BR shed code plates. Not all were applied at the same time, so creating an accurate model of a specific locomotive within a narrow timeframe can be something of a challenge.

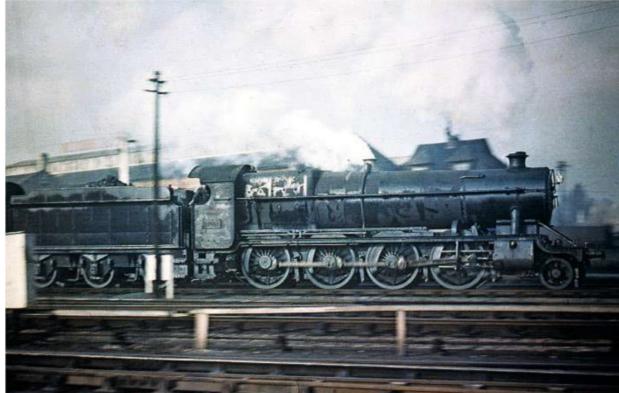

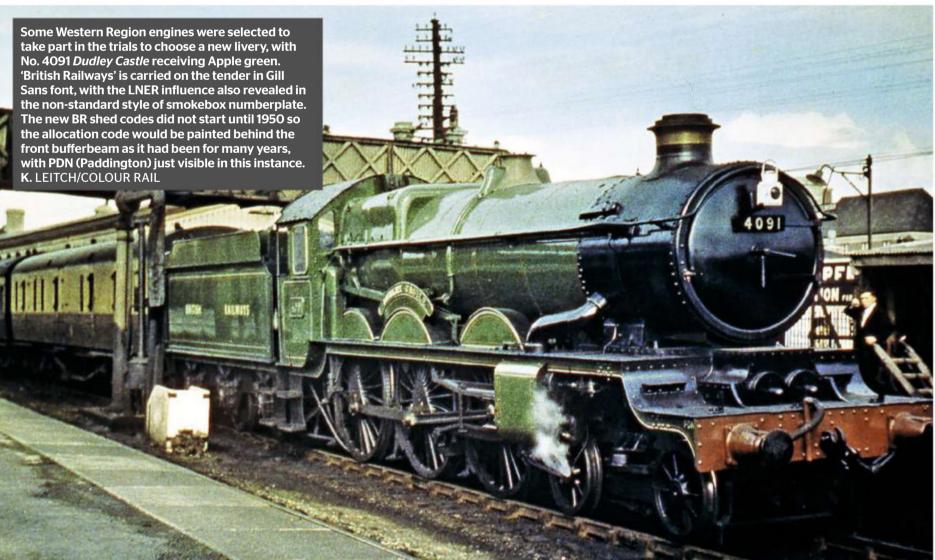

A BACKSCENE TO BE BELIEVED

For years I have been a loyal customer and user of Brian Sherriff's railway backscenes in both 'OO' and 'O' gauge and, to be honest, they have served me well. Because they look hand-drawn and painted, it's easy to make your handmade scenery join up with it.

However, a while ago I bought a photographic backscene from ID Backscenes
Premium Range, for a job, but didn't
end up using it. And, remembering
I had it, I thought it might work for an
upgrade on some storage sidings
I have running around the outside walls
of the railway room.

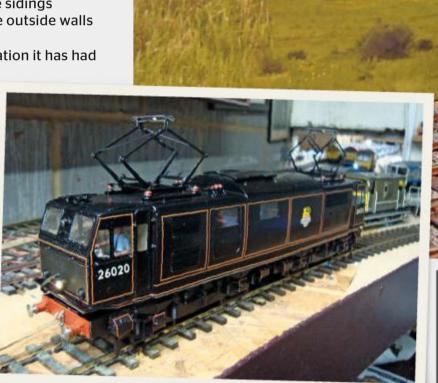
Well, what a transformation it has had

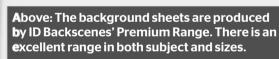
on my sidings! It looked so good that I even took down a wall-mounted display case to open up more space so I could fit the backscene in. Furthermore, I now have a handy area where I can photograph models, too. I was so impressed with the results that I bought a second backscene, with a different scene, so I could transform even more of the storage sidings.

The 9ft long sheets are 15in tall and are self-adhesive, with a large range of subjects from which to choose – absolutely brilliant. The range of backscenes is available from model shops and Amazon.

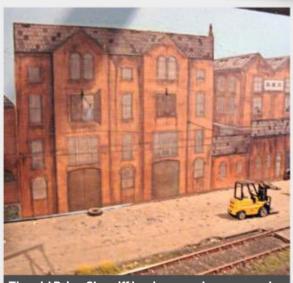
How to do the job properly: the sheet should be first applied to a piece of ply or hardboard but, as I said, these were storage sidings placed right up to the wall without any space to accommodate an intermediate sheet of wood. I therefore stuck the backscene straight onto the wall, which is why I have ripples in the 'sky'! Well, you do get lumpy clouds!

Because it was applied to a wall, I did apply some extra spray adhesive to the outer edges of the sheet to make sure it remained fixed.





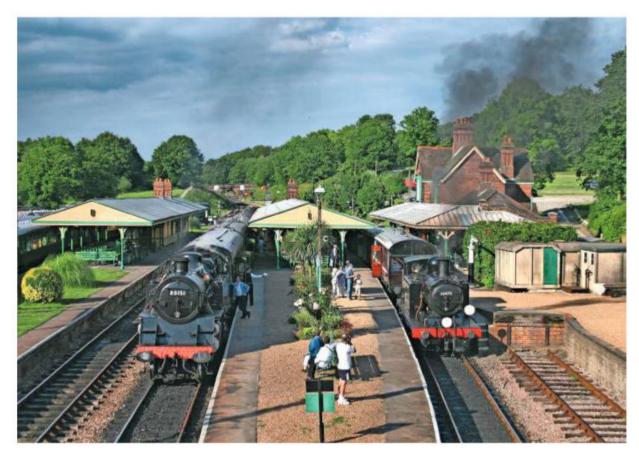
Left: The area before the Eureka moment - what a difference. A railway is never finished; there is always something new coming along.

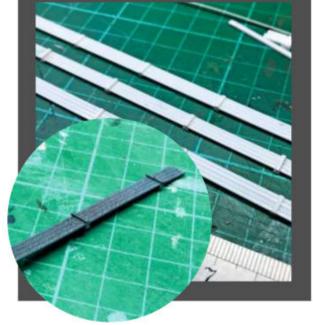

Chris Nevard says: There are a couple of injection-moulded plastic kits in the Wills range (SS89/90 - see your local Peco stockist), which also include lots of brackets and cranks. An alternative is to make your own, which I did recently, using scraps of plastic sheet and strip. It proved to be a very quick process and, once painted and weathered, it really looked the part.



MODERN BUFFERSTOPS



I need a set of plate steel-type stop blocks for my 'P4' modern-day diesel depot. Does anybody offer them in kit form?

George says: PH Designs offers a superb etched metal kit for this contemporary type of buffer stop, with options available for 'OO', 'P4' and 'EM' gauges. An essential feature of the post-1990s railway scene, these 'stops' can

be seen anywhere from depot sidings to terminus platforms.

The kit is optimised for construction by soldering, although glue could be substituted if necessary. Some of the parts

> are very small and require careful shaping before fixing in place, however the kit is not too difficult a proposition. Full instructions are supplied, complete with clear exploded diagrams and

all parts slot together easily. Another vital point to consider is that an



all-metal stop block poses a short circuit risk, so be sure to mount the blocks on a separate stretch of track, leaving an isolating gap between the rails just in front of the structure.

BASEBOARD BASICS



I'm new to railway modelling and would like to build a portable 'O' gauge layout. I intend to build a softwood timber framework,

but I'm a little confused as to whether I should use plywood, MDF, or chipboard for the baseboard top.

George says: Medium Density Fibreboard (MDF) is easy to cut and shape and, when used as a baseboard top, is fairly resilient. However, it can be sensitive to moisture and dampness, so choosing a water-resistant grade is recommended. Like MDF, chipboard is also

made up of compacted wood fibres, bound together with adhesive and often faced with a thin plastic-coated outer layer. Chipboard is stronger than MDF but it can be heavy. Special screws are needed to fasten MDF or chipboard.

Plywood is stronger and generally more expensive than MDF or chipboard, being made up of thin layers of real hardwoods. Each layer has its grain running at right angles to each other, to improve strength and resistance to warping. External grades are recommended owing to their greater stability, especially in damp or humid

environments such as a shed,

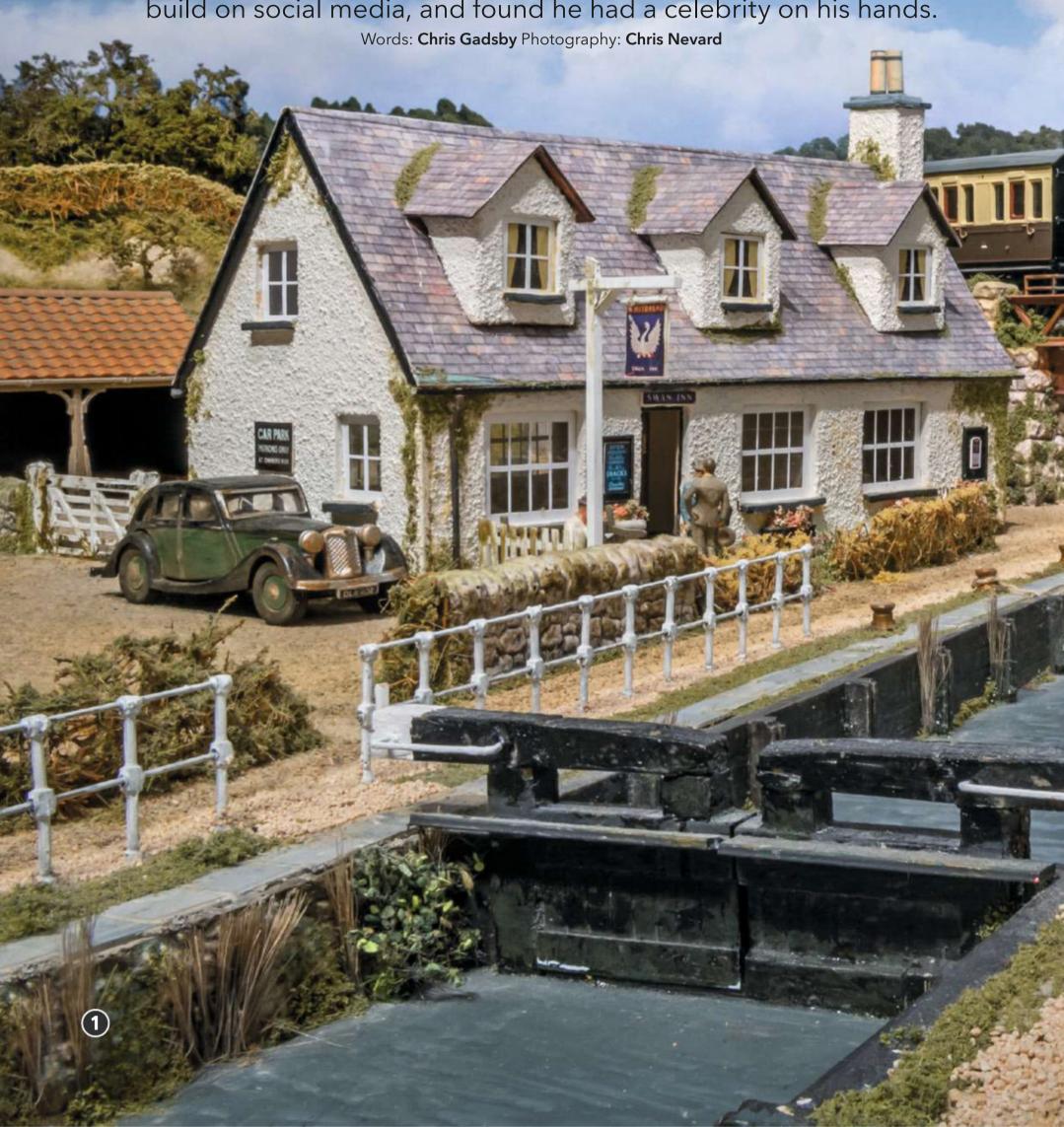
attic or basement.

For a portable layout, plywood would offer greater strength and resilience, especially when combined with a timber framing arrangement. If the boards are likely to be moved around or stacked, you'll need materials that can withstand it. The weight of 'O' gauge locomotives and stock can be substantial, even on a small layout, so the board will need to be able to support them.

NOTE: when cutting or sanding any of these materials. hazardous dust is created, so wear a facemask. When buying sheets of plywood, always take the time to choose each board carefully, rejecting any twisted, stained or damaged sheets.

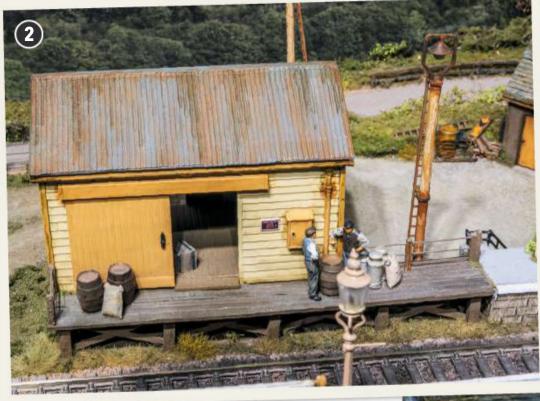

'OO' GAUGE LAYOUT OWLEY



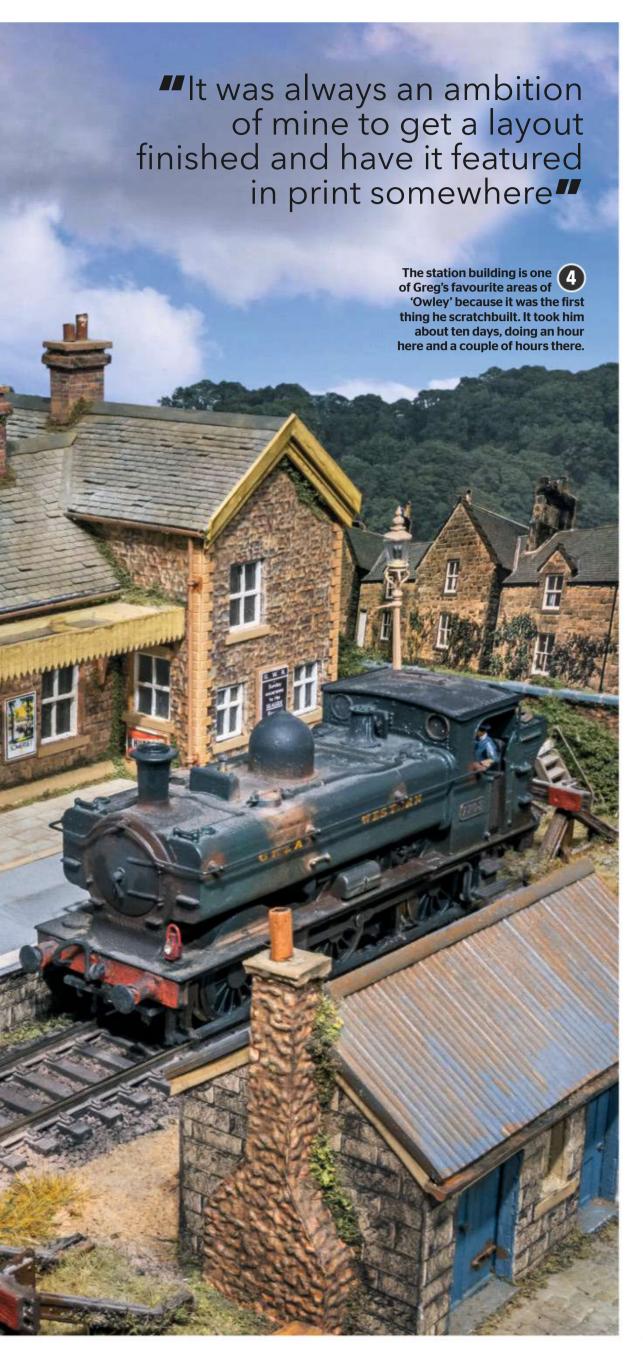
he world has changed significantly over the course of the last 25 years and, perhaps, none more so than in the area of technology. This has, naturally, had an effect on almost every aspect of our lives, including the modelling hobby, with models and scenery extensively more detailed and lifelike than they were in 1997. We've seen this change over the lifetime of the magazine and the methods we use to bring you your copy of Model Rail every four weeks has also changed. This isn't just about how we put the magazine together, but also about how we source the content. There are now more ways than ever to showcase your work, with social media having such prominence and some modellers achieving an almost celebrity status through posting their work online. With more than 600 followers on his layout's Instagram page, social media is how we came across Greg Brown and his 'OO' gauge Great Western Railway layout 'Owley'.

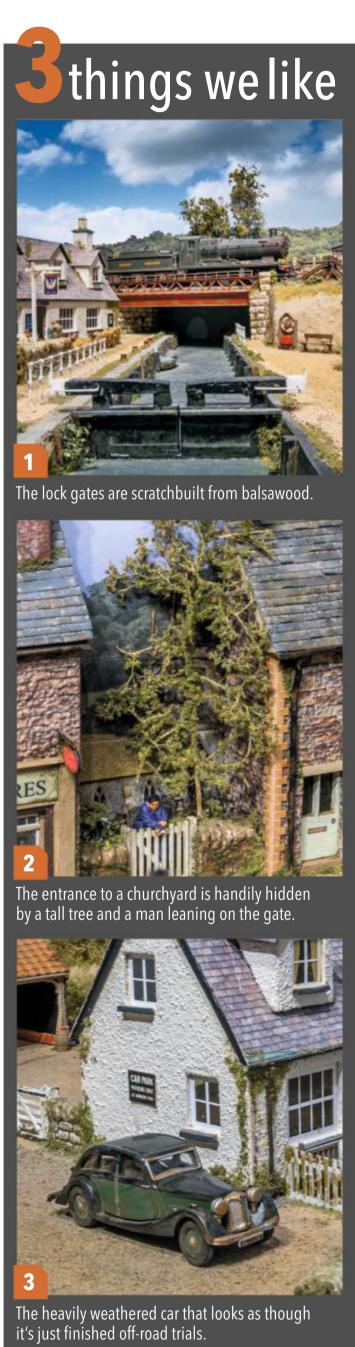
"I started the account when I was about halfway through the build in 2018, not expecting it to gain as many followers as it has now. It was always my ambition to get a layout finished and have it featured in print somewhere as, similarly to some other modellers, my previous efforts rarely got past having track on the bare baseboard as I played trains.

"This layout started when I moved from London to North Yorkshire and downsized to a cottage after my early retirement in 2015. Lack of space or a house move had always thwarted previous layout builds, but this time I was determined to finish one. As space is tight I'm limited to a small box room and have virtually filled it with the layout and my workbench. At 8ft by 2ft with a 2ft run-off in an











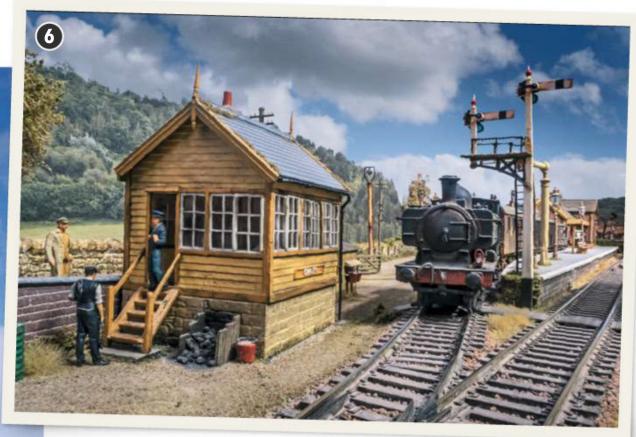
The scenery is constructed in the time-honoured fashion of chopping polystyrene blocks with a carving knife and covering them with static grass and various textures.

'L' shape I was forced into a terminus layout and began planning in early 2016 with the intention of starting the build that summer."

Planning didn't take long and Greg soon had his two 4ft by 2ft baseboards ready to host his Great Western layout. As is becoming common, progress only really started when everything else in the world stopped.

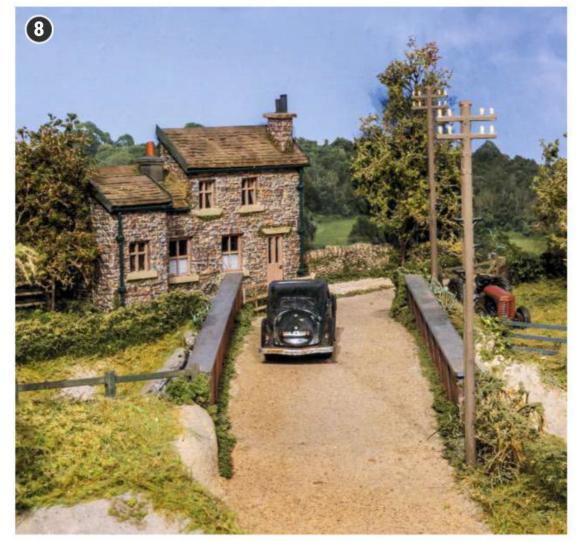
"It started slowly until the pandemic began and we

were forced to stay at home. If it had happened 20 years ago I would probably still have been stuck – the internet wasn't as prominent as it is today. I thought I'd use the time to have a go at scratchbuilding as I'd never tried it before, instead opting for kits. Modelling a fictitious branch line somewhere between Newton Abbot and Exeter gave me the freedom for a bit of modeller's licence and although I wanted the layout to be as realistic









as possible I'm certainly no rivet counter. Fortunately, the Great Western Railway has been photographed so extensively that I had plenty of images to work from, plus the Ratio kit that was originally on the layout."

Traditional scratchbuilding methods were employed at 'Owley', with Greg using 1.5mm mountboard to create the foundations of his pub and station building, wrapping in the relevant

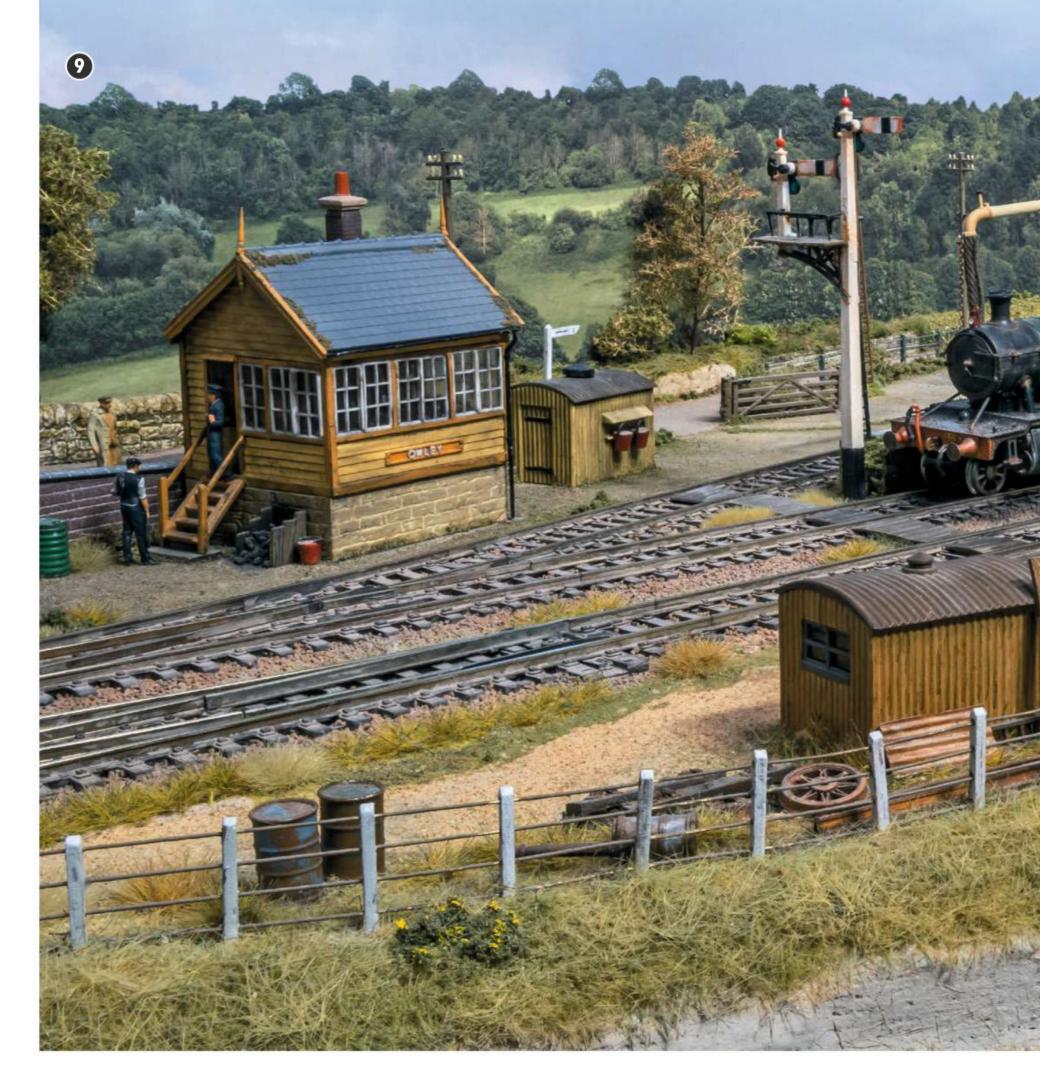
paper where applicable on the station building. The pub walls took a bit more thought to get the desired effect.

"I just had to include a canal-side pub as I wanted to get as much scenery onto the layout as possible without it going over the top. Many of those buildings feature lovely textured walls and I spent a while thinking about the best way of replicating that. I concluded that the texture would have to be quite small and opted for a PVA and Polyfilla sand mix pasted over the card foundations."

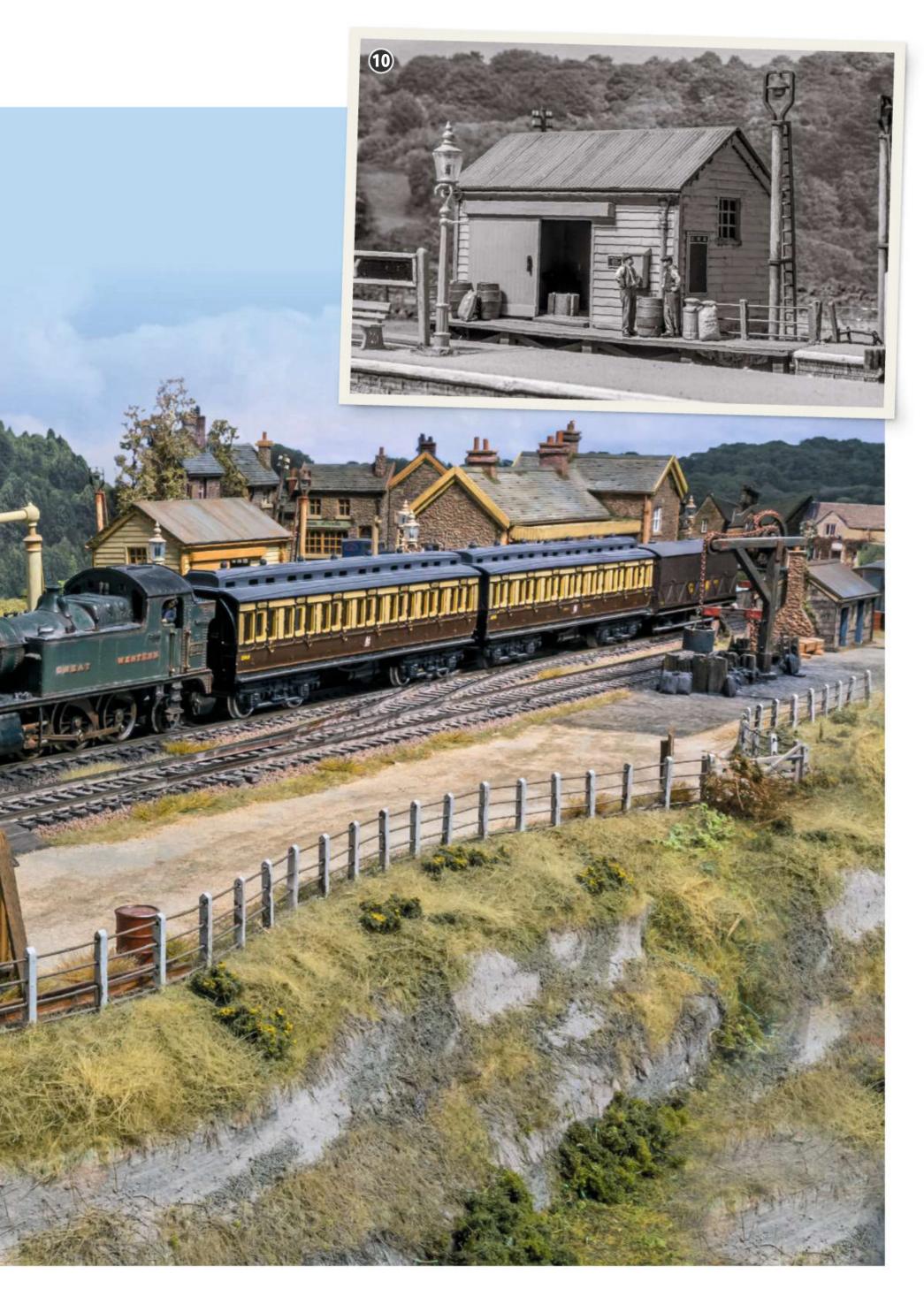
WORD ON THE WIRE

There are very few people within the hobby that will say they enjoy every part of it. For a lot of people, Greg included, the challenge of wiring is enough to put off building for some time. Greg admits that underneath the MDF things aren't as neat as they could be, but everything works.

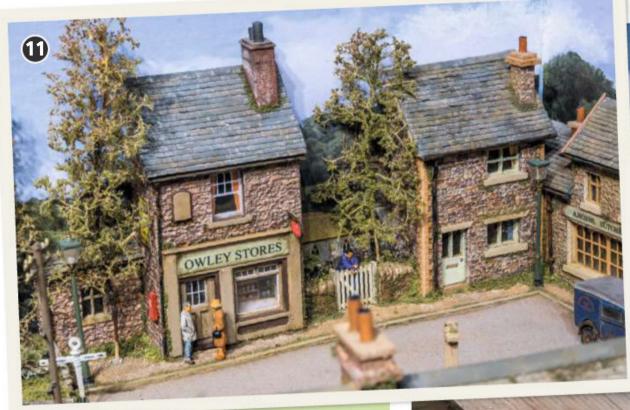
"It's safe to say it wouldn't get signed off as a professional job and the number of washing lines and spaghetti junction-esque areas under there is a bit frightening. The points are operated with SEEP motors, which adds to the cabling, and

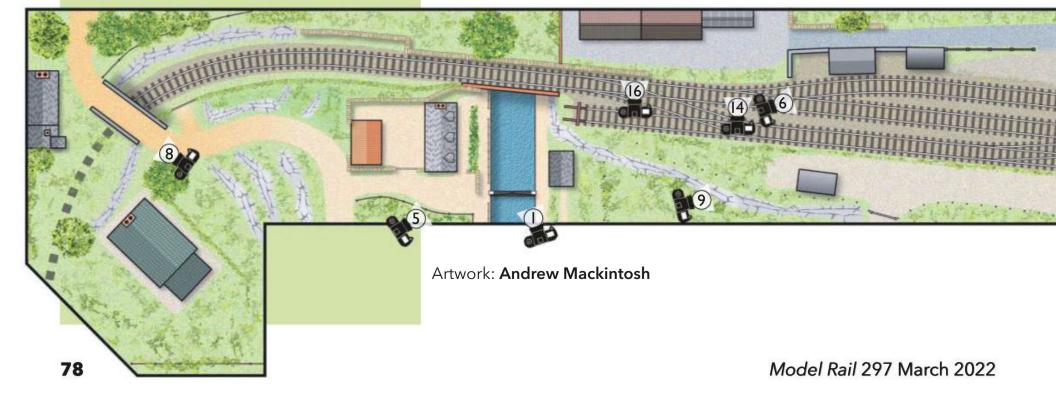

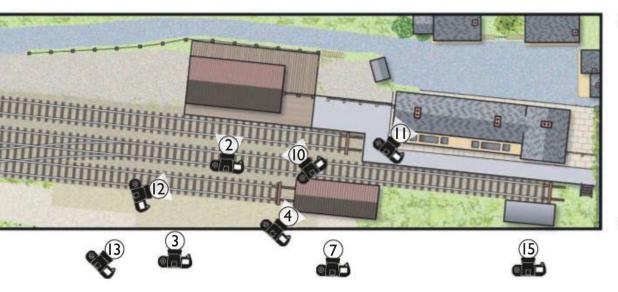

As the saying goes, 'if it ain't broke don't fix it'."

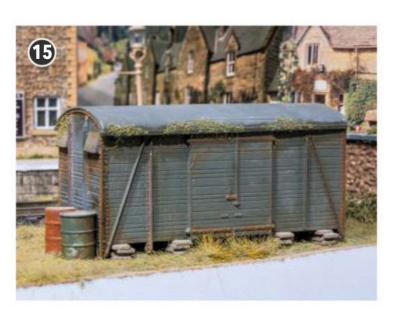
With the scenery complete Greg could begin thinking about adding the figures to 'Owley', often one of the most enjoyable aspects of layout building as interesting and sometimes humorous scenes can be created with figures in all manner of positions and poses. In much the same way as real life, however, the 24 figures that call 'Owley' home move around on a daily basis, so long as Greg has inspiration for his next photograph.

"If everything was static I'd very quickly run out of angles and models to upload to Instagram, so instead I hold them in place with a low-tack adhesive that I can then just lift off afterwards. That being said, there are scenes such as the ones at the dairy and the pub that I particularly like and make regular appearances online. The figures were mostly painted for me by Chris Clark and they're so good that I want to use them as much as possible. The hardest thing after having the account for almost four years now is thinking of new scenes to post!"

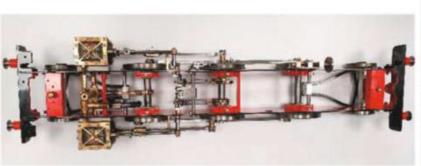

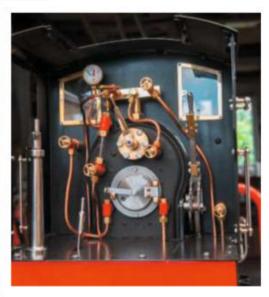

Masterplan Offbeat Routes - Part 1

Track plans to get you thinking in three dimensions

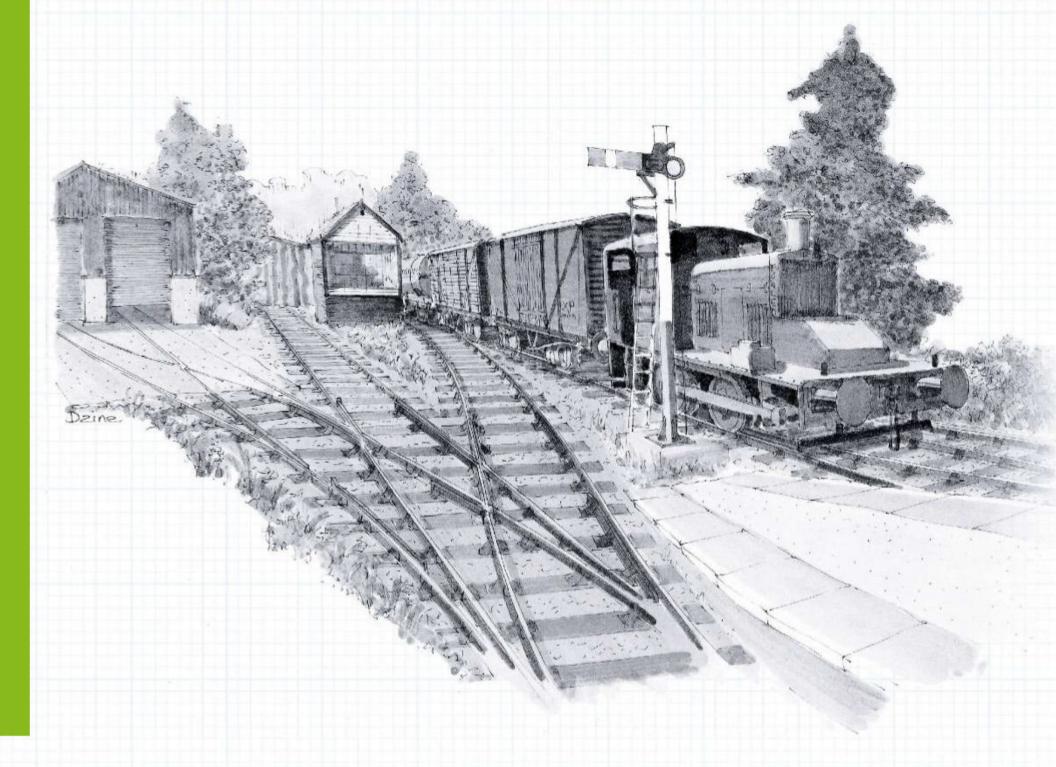
AIMING for the light

Not everyone is drawn to mainstream railway subjects, with more offbeat systems providing plenty of modelling potential. In this first instalment of a two-part feature, **Paul A. Lunn** goes off the beaten track to examine a trio of light rail systems.

ight railways, minor routes and tramways have always fascinated me. In recent years there's been an everincreasing range of more unusual locomotives and stock from ready-to-run manufacturers, making it the best of times to consider such schemes. There's no reason to concentrate on the 'olden days' either, as

contemporary prototypes can also provide plenty of inspiration.

In this first instalment, we'll consider the Derwent Valley Light Railway, the narrow gauge Ashover Light Railway and the Sheffield Supertram system. Next month, we'll study the Leek and Manifold Valley Light Railway, the Van Railway in mid-Wales and the Docklands Light Railway.

DERWENT VALLEY LIGHT RAILWAY

Freight demonstration trains are a popular feature on the preserved Derwent Valley Light Railway (DVLR), which is now part of the Yorkshire Museum of Farming at Murton, just to the east of York. Thanks to the archivist Jonathan Stockwell, we're able to use part of the museum's excellent photograph collection, which has helped me produce a slightly unusual track plan portraying the DVLR as it was in steam and early diesel days.

Rather than focus on the DVLR's stations, which were all very similar in appearance, my aim was to feature some of the principal industrial locations. In some cases, these were part of a station yard, and freight operations will offer increased operational

value. I've arranged them in sequential order and within a reasonable space for 'OO'. Bearing this in mind, the accompanying track plan commences scenically with a cement terminal at Osbaldwick, Murton Lane wagon repair works siding, Sledmere Siding, Wheldrake Yard and, finally, the Government's Forward Filling Depot No. 5 near Cottingwith.

If you have space, you could add semi-scenic sidings (in a fiddleyard capacity) on the left-hand end. More advanced modellers, perhaps with additional space, could interpret my Setrack design using flexible track for a more organic feel. There's also the potential to convert the left-hand end into a through-fiddleyard.

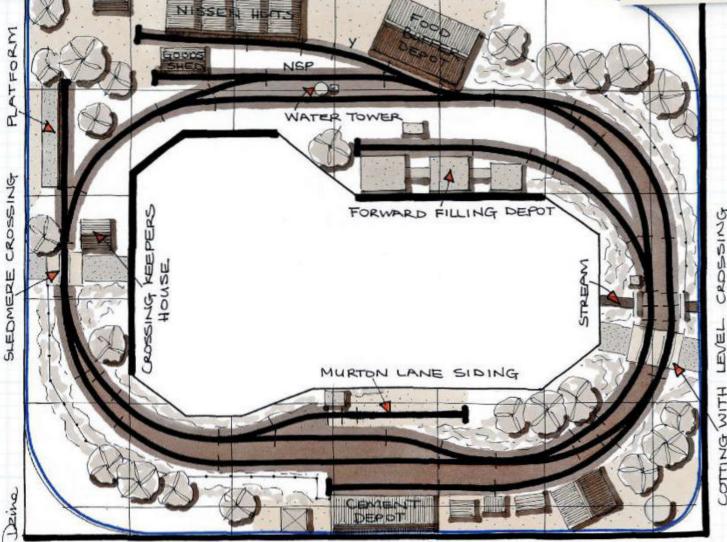
If you really must have a station then Wheldrake would be the most logical step. The station building has been relocated to - and preserved at - the DVLR's Murton site.

MOTIVE POWER

Through the war years and up to the end of steam operation (1961), the DVLR hired various steam locomotives from the NER/LNER and BR, including 'J21/24/25' 0-6-0s, Ivatt 2-6-0s, plus Class 03/4 diesels from the 1960s.

In 1969, the DVLR purchased a trio of Drewry diesel shunters - D2245/98, with D2329 acquired for spare parts.

FACTFILE - DVLR

The DVLR was initially opened from Cliff Common (on the NER's Selby-Driffield line) to Wheldrake in 1912 for goods traffic only. A year later, the whole line through to Layerthorpe (York) was open, where the privately owned railway established its headquarters. Passenger services ran from 1913 until withdrawal in 1926 and the route traversed mostly flat farmland, with numerous minor industries and agricultural customers en route. However, the variety of freight increased dramatically during the Second World War, with an RAF airfield established at Elvington, close to the line.

Closure came piecemeal: Wheldrake to Cliff Common in 1965, Elvington to Wheldrake in 1968, Dunnington to Elvington in 1972 and the final section from Layerthorpe to Dunnington in 1981. The line escaped the 1922 Grouping and nationalisation in 1948, remaining a private concern throughout its history, operating mostly with hired-in motive power.

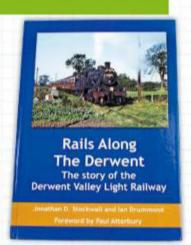

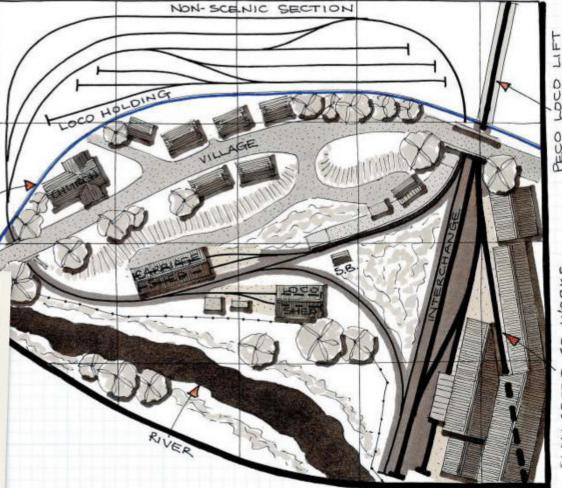

ASHOVER LIGHT RAILWAY

I've been assisting friend and modeller James Goucher for some time with a 'OO9' layout design, inspired by the Ashover Light Railway and, of course, the recent availability of principal stock from Bachmann Narrow Gauge was hard to resist! The accompanying plan is an adaptation of one of four rough ideas submitted to James, which takes inspiration from the triangular junctions at Clay Cross and Ashover. It also has the additional benefit of a small section of standard gauge line and interchange sidings.

As a complete alternative to James' design, I worked up this plan for a large room-filling layout. I've shown both ends of the line in some detail but left other sections for modellers to choose their own preferred locations. There are multiple gradients on the line:

A to B narrow gauge up to a spoil tip

C to D standard gauge down to the spoil tip

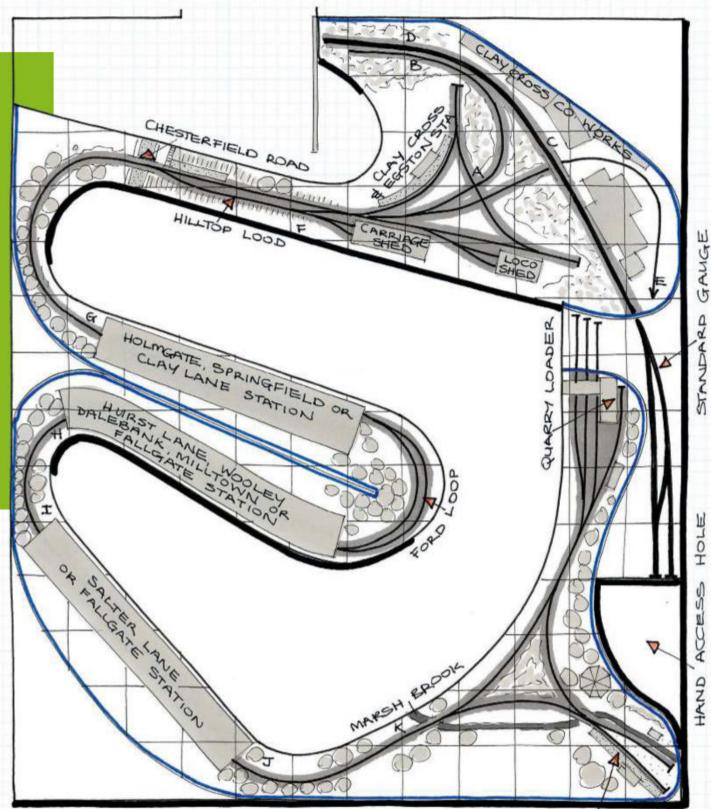
non-scenic sidings under baseboard at **K**, for removing wagon loads

The first gradient on the branch itself is from **F** to **G**, followed by **H** to **I** and then **J** to **K**. Please note: I have used

two Atlas 'N' gauge 90° crossings on one side of the Clay Cross triangle.

FACTFILE - ASHOVER LIGHT RAILWAY

Opened in 1925 and closed in 1950, the main commodity transported over the route was ballast from the Butts quarry. Passenger services were suspended in 1931 and only reinstated for summer traffic over the next five years, with all passenger services ceasing in 1936. Normally there were seven, usually mixed, trains on weekdays, eight on Saturdays and four on Sundays.

- Six WD 4-6-0 pannier tanks, built by Baldwin, named *Peggy, Bridget, Joan, Guy, Hummie* and *Georgie. Peggy* lasted until 1950 ('OO9' model available from Bachmann Narrow Gauge).
- Dick Kerr four-wheel petrol-electric tractor, *Amos*, converted from a WD loco.
- Hibbard 4wDM Planet.
- Ransome Rapier 4wDM.
- Muir-Hill Fordson petrol rail tractor to replace steam locomotives during the freight-only period.
- Four passenger bogie coaches, built by Gloucester Wagon Co. (forthcoming Bachmann Narrow Gauge model). Coaches Nos. 1 and 2 are preserved at the Lincolnshire Coast Light Railway, No. 4 is at **the** Golden Valley Light Railway and No. 3 was scrapped.
- Eight open-sided bogie coaches.
- Up to 59 open-bogie freight wagons (Bachmann Narrow Gauge).







JAMES GOUCHER

SHEFFIELD SUPERTRAM

In terms of off-the-shelf 'OO' gauge models, modern trams are not easy to come by. However, there are potential solutions. Sheffield's Class 399 City Link trams are available as 3D-printed bodyshell 'kits' from the Shapeways web portal, produced by TT Trams (www.shapeways.com). Offered in 'N', 'TT', 'HO' and 'OO' gauge, the customer needs to arrange a suitably powered chassis and, at over £200 for a 'OO' three-car bodyshell, each tram would be a significant investment, even before factoring in the cost of an articulated chassis and drive unit (see www.themodeltramshop.com).

Alternatively, there are various ready-to-run modern trams in 'HO' in the ranges of some Continental manufacturers and these are amply described at www.tramwayinfo.com. I mention European trams owing to their generic style and, indeed, Sheffield's trams were built in mainland Europe. Painting a suitable Supertram livery is all that would be required, though you could also add anglicising detail if desired.

While part way to a solution, there is a problem in that all are made to 'HO' scale, which might not please some 'OO' gauge modellers. In terms of track planning, there are six possible solutions: 1. Ignore the difference. 2. Keep the 'OO' tracks in the foreground and 'HO' scale items to the rear, thus forcing perspective. 3. Where both are close together, increase the height of the 'HO' track slightly to reduce the height difference. 4. Make sure both gauges run at separate times. 5. Model a tram-only section.

6. Model in 'HO' only. If you can accept the limitations it's worth looking at the following 'HO' products: Leopold Halling (include Blackpool Bombardier Articulated Flexity tram, Variobahn Graz Articulated unit, DT8.10 2 car Stuttgart tram and much more at www. shop.ferro-tram.

com), Siku Bombardier Articulated tram (it's an excellent push-along toy with a useful body shape, but the pantograph is overscale).



FACTFILE - SHEFFIELD SUPERTRAM

Tram Trains use part of the original Sheffield Supertram route from the cathedral, past Nunnery Depot, towards Meadowhall and then on what was a little-used heavy rail route to a new tram-only station at Rotherham Parkgate. Operation commenced 2018. Seven articulated tram trains were built, in Spain, by Vossloh, designated Class 399. These three-car units are able to run on tramway systems as well as parts of the national rail network. Rotherham Central is a shared station; Sheffield Supertram and Northern trains run mainly to Sheffield, Wakefield, Leeds and York.

ROUTE DESCRIBED

Although part of a much longer route, I've concentrated on the section that kicks back to Booth's Scrapyard, then on under Centenary Way, Main Street and into Rotherham Central. Beyond Central station, the line continues under Bridge Street, Centenary Way (again) and Greasborough Road, before curving through a heavily wooded area towards Rotherham Parkgate Station, with Liberty Steel in the distance beyond.

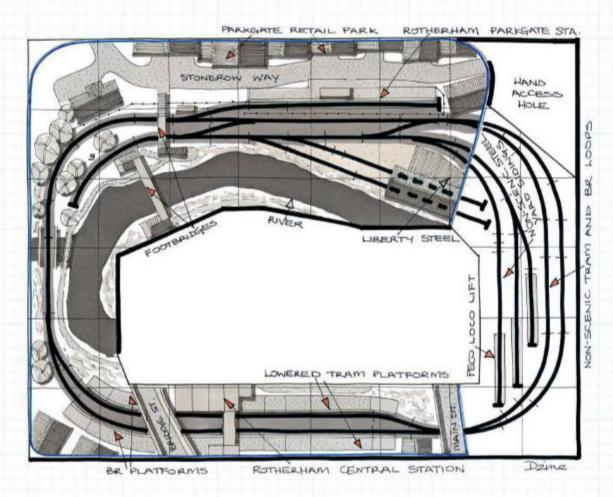

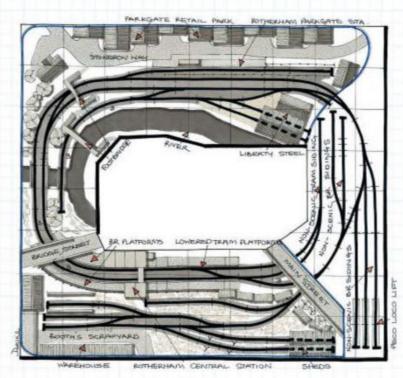
PLANS

While the plans vary considerably in size and layout, there is similarity in overall design. Please note I've used artistic licence with compression, position and orientation on all plans. Check with Google Maps and you'll see what I've done!

The first plan (right) is intended primarily for 'HO', with a standard oval using Peco Setrack and a non-scenic section. Stations are for tram use only and I have added part of Liberty Steel, moving its real location nearer to Rotherham Parkgate Station and spinning it 180°. A deviation off the River Don provides us with one of the more outstanding scenic features. To complement the RTR 'HO' trams, the Liberty Steel site could be operated by an anglicised version of the following Continental 'HO' locomotives: Class 199 0-6-0 diesel (Roco), 0-4-0 locomotives (Piko) and DHG 0-6-0 diesel (Märklin). There's also plenty of contemporary rolling stock available in 'HO' from Roco, Märklin and Fleischmann.

For main line locomotives, I'd be looking at Vossloh 2000 Series diesels, (Märklin), plus Mehano and Trix products. There are also various iterations of the familiar EMD Class 66 in 'HO', with Märklin's product being especially impressive. A repaint into a UK livery - or a bit of imagination - would justify their presence.









This is a more sophisticated 'OO' gauge version and, while shown using Peco Setrack, it could easily be replicated with flexible track in a slightly larger space. Rotherham Central has shared use with 'OO' 3D-printed trams and ex-BR multiple units, especially Class 150 (Bachmann Branchline). There's further operational and scenic value by including Booth's Scrapyard.

Adding Booth's scrapyard provides added operational interest and scenic enjoyment.

'3' for third radius NSP - non-standard piece of track

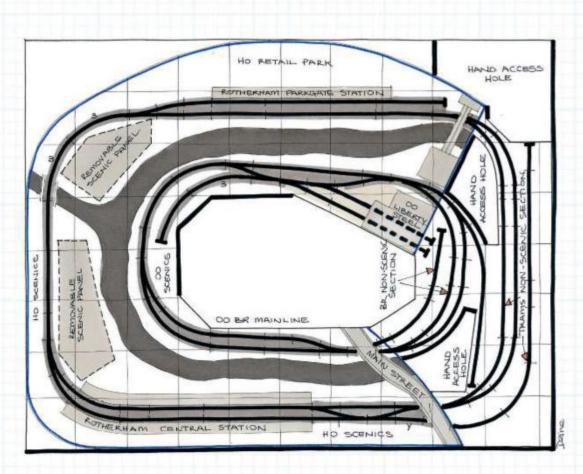
In a fictitious and complex twin-scale arrangement (right), viewed at or near eye-level, we have two ovals. The inner circuit is 'OO' and represents the national network, plus part of Liberty Steel's sidings. The outer tracks are for 'HO' trams only, with both scales having their own non-scenic sidings.

The river adds a great scenic feature and, unlike buildings, its scale is immaterial, providing a useful 'bridge' between the 'OO' and 'HO' sections. While the plan uses Peco Setrack, a little more space would allow use of flexible track, especially on the longer runs.

KIBRI KITS

Various Kibri kits, static or motorised, would be relevant for any 'HO' tram layout: KI, KI16062 Road/rail Unimog and low-sided wagon with drums of overhead line, KI16082 Catenary maintenance vehicle, KI16100 Track maintenance vehicle and KI16266 Low-sided wagon with catenary system mounting unit.

he release of an all-new, enhanced Class 86 last year was a welcome move by Heljan. The first raft of models concentrated on the popular AC electric locomotives in their original condition, and we reviewed a trio of samples in MR288. Now, however, we have an example of the refurbished '86', commonly referred to as a Class 86/4.

We don't have space to get into the nitty gritty of the various sub-classes here but, in short, British Rail had deemed the ride quality of the as-built locomotives to be inferior and undertook a programme of upgrading the suspension and installing low track-force wheels. Work began in the early 1970s and various other technical

modifications followed over the years, some of which led to further changes in appearance.

Heljan's latest models will please modellers of the post-1980s BR and privatisation eras, with a choice of nine different models on offer. Liveries include the original Intercity Executive scheme, two versions of Railfreight Distribution livery, RES red and BR's 1980s take on 'heritage' light blue. For the post-privatisation era, we have a choice of original and 'Powerhaul' iterations of Freightliner's green/yellow house colours, plus the stylish contemporary Caledonian

before that 86034/E3187), the locomotive was renumbered into the '86/6' sub-class in April 1990, following isolation of the train heating equipment and reduction of the top speed to 75mph. The model shares much of the features as the '86/0', so this review will concentrate on the new and modified fittings.

The biggest difference naturally lies in the bogie frames and suspension, with the Flexicoil arrangement depicted



with impressive fidelity. As well as the sets of large coil springs (moulded integrally with the bodyshell), there are also vertical and horizontal dampers, picked out in grey paint. The cab footsteps are also of the correct, revised pattern and the wheels are fitted with plastic inserts that depict the SAB low track-force units admirably.

The cab doors now feature twin handles, as opposed to single handles on the '86/0', and the plated-over headcode panels sport twin marker lights. There's also a high-intensity lamp added to each end, along with revised handrails. Multiple working and TDM jumper cables and sockets complete the prototypically cluttered look of the cab fronts, the former being separate plastic mouldings, while the thinner TDM cables are moulded as part of the shell and picked out - very neatly - with paint.



An improvement over the '86/O' model's specification is a fully painted cab interior, visible through the windscreens and side windows. The glazing is to a generally high standard, with just a few areas of excess adhesive visible here and there.

In terms of finish, the livery shades look convincing and are applied well, although there are some rough areas along one side. The opacity of the Railfreight sub-sector logos is lacking somewhat and a similar issue afflicts the yellow headcode panels, while the printed nameplates would benefit from etched replacements. A nice touch, however, is the flash of bright steel on the buffer shanks.

Performance under test conditions was exemplary, especially after the obligatory running-in period, with smooth, quiet running and oodles of pulling power on tap. Those modellers lucky enough to model full-size

main line trains will have plenty of fun with the '86'! It's worth noting that the packaging has also been upgraded, with the welcome addition of a sturdier, foam-lined box which is a big improvement over the flimsy carton employed on the '86/0s'.

Factfile: Refurbished Class 86/4

A hundred locomotives were built to the AL6 design (later Class 86), with manufacturing split between Vulcan Foundry and Doncaster Works. Deliveries began in 1965 and the locomotives were destined for the newly electrified West Coast Main Line. Proving to be the biggest AC electric locomotive class, the '86' can also boast longevity along with its many other attributes, with the final examples retired from regular frontline service by Freightliner in 2021.

The use of axle-hung traction motors, rather than frame-mounted units, offered improved performance but design errors led to rough riding and track damage, leading BR to implement a refurbishment programme from 1970. Flexicoil suspension units were installed and, later, the use of low track-force wheels also greatly improved matters and the class was split into various sub-classes according to the nature of modification works and whether

the locomotives were intended for passenger or freight duties.

Refurbished '86s' hauled all manner of services on the WCML for decades, with a batch moving to the Great Eastern main line following electrification in the 1980s. Remaining in passenger use into the mid-2000s, freightallocated examples soldiered on until more recently, especially with Freightliner, while several '86s' have also been exported for use in Eastern Europe.

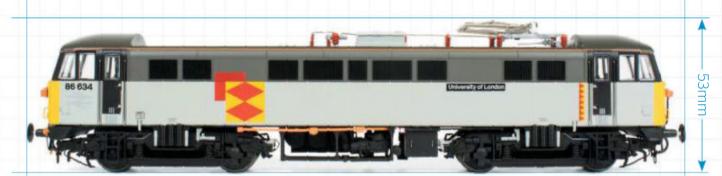
The user manual is also much improved, with more in the way of prototype information, clearer parts diagrams and maintenance instructions - well done Heljan!

As with the '86/0', this is a definite improvement over Heljan's 2010 release, both in terms of looks and specification. Aside from the few minor blemishes in the finish, this is a

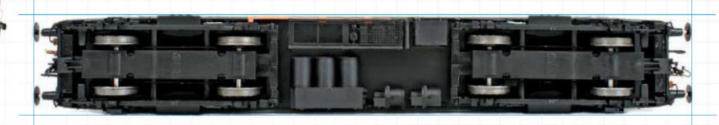

Masterpiece Models Class 52 'Western'

hen Michael Brooks established Masterpiece Models in 2007, the company's purpose was to produce ready-to-run 7mm scale models of the highest possible standard. The first offering was a GWR 'Castle' 4-6-0 and, such was the positive response from modellers, that other premier steam classes followed, including GWR 'Kings', LMS 'Coronations' and 'Duchesses', plus Bulleid 'Pacifics' and the BR 'Britannia' class.

Following Michael Brooks' retirement in 2015, the business was taken over by Scale-Seven group chairman John

Borkowski, but the company's aim has remained consistent, which has been borne out by the latest project - the BR Class 52 'Western'.

Marking Masterpiece Models' first foray into diesel outline traction, great efforts have been made to ensure that these models reflect the distinct character of the prototype. Indeed, the 'Westerns' have long been ranked as one of the most cherished of British diesel locomotive designs, while also providing a stern challenge for a number of manufacturers in the past.

With the National Railway Museum's General Arrangement Works Drawings unavailable, the team from Masterpiece Models arranged to have the preserved D1015 Western Courier laser scanned, with assistance from the Diesel Traction Group at Kidderminster. However, with the cab front and roof a notoriously difficult element to reproduce, the results of the 3D scan alone were not enough.

With the help of Bob Tiller (whose layout featured in MR291), access was granted to D1010 Western Campaigner at Williton on the West Somerset Railway. Bob kindly provided scaffolding around the outside of the cab and the exact dimensions and shape of the windscreens, surrounds



and roof overhang were traced onto large sheets of paper. Armed with this priceless extra information, the project could progress with a greater degree of



accuracy. While they had access, the team also recorded the minutiae of the fuel tank pipework, valves and myriad other components, many of which are hidden from view in most instances but are present on the model regardless.

Before we go any further, I should point out that this is not a review in our usual sense, as this is not exactly a mass-market offering. Instead, we offer the following content by way of a showcase for these exquisite, hand-built models that are an investment purchase for the most discerning of enthusiasts. At over £3,000 each, they need to be built to an incredibly high standard of quality and fidelity, as anything less would not be acceptable to the market - high stakes indeed!

ARTISAN WORKMANSHIP

Rendered largely in brass, these models have been hand-assembled by a leading modelmaker in South Korea that boasts extensive experience in miniature re-creations of diesel traction. Models have been created covering the entire class

THE ULTIMATE 'WESTERN' - DAVE LOWERY'S VIEW

My love of these beautifully ugly machines goes back to my time at Slough college when the two-hour lecture, after lunch break, was on carbon chemistry - yuk! Slough station was a much bigger draw and so I ended up spending two-and-a-half superb, hydraulic-packed hours on the platform during day release term time.

The superb 'Western' diesels, along with 'Warships' and 'Hymeks', were my regular companions during lunch breaks. Surprisingly, I failed ONC chemistry; but what memories I now have are priceless and I've never used chemistry in my life anyway! I 'copped' the entire class many times over and when I hear one in preservation, it brings back such brilliant memories.

We have featured Masterpiece Models' steam locomotive models in *Model Rail* in the past and the standard of detail is truly remarkable. Now, it is a myth among steam modellers that 'diesels are only boxes on wheels' so I was very interested when John Borkowski took the decision to go ahead and produce a model of the 'Western'. The level of detail and the sheer presence of the model are simply stunning.

Over the years, I have built a number of 'Westerns' from various kits, and I have just one Heljan RTR model. All of them have different faults, little bits that aren't quite right and so on. But then you come to the Masterpiece Models version, which is just right. I love the sliding windows and opening doors and half expect the driver to wave!

Fully DCC, straight from the box, the first radiator fan starts to turn as motor No. 1 fires up. Then, the second fan starts as Maybach No. 2 bursts into life. And it runs like an absolute dream. Impressed? You bet!

Factfile: Class 52 'Westerns'

During British Railway's Modernisation Plan of the 1950s, both diesel-electric and diesel-hydraulic traction packages were under consideration. The management of the Western Region chose to pursue the latter power arrangement, having been impressed by contemporary locomotives in West Germany.

Arguments in favour of hydraulic transmissions included weight savings, reduced wear on the permanent way and better route availability. There was also a perception that maintenance would be more straightforward, especially for a workforce familiar with steam traction.

First to appear were the D600 'Warships', followed by the four-axle D800 versions. The 'Westerns' arose from a need for a more powerful, six-axle locomotive, capable of hauling both express passenger services and heavy freight. In 1959, an order was placed for

74 locomotives, each equipped with a pair of Maybach high-speed diesel engines and Voith transmission. Construction was to be split between Swindon and Crewe Works, with delivery commencing in 1961.

Arguably one of the best looking of BR's diesel

locomotive designs, the 'Westerns' also proved to be very capable performers, especially once a number of initial teething troubles were ironed out. However, when BR decided to phase out non-standard traction types, with all diesel-hydraulics classed as such, the days of the 'Westerns' were numbered. Withdrawals began in 1973 and the class – and the hydraulics as a whole – had been eliminated by 1977.

Happily, seven examples have been preserved, including D1023 Western Fusilier, which forms part of the National Collection.

wherever appropriate. The paintwork is top notch, with a deep lustre and razor-sharp colour separation, and the glazing is absolutely flawless.

INSIDE STORY

Powered by a single, aerospace quality, coreless motor, the drive is transferred to all six axles via precision gears. With DCC sound pre-installed, each model is fine-tuned before delivery to the customer (there's also the option of DC-optimised performance) and the power package has been designed to offer optimum smoothness and impressive haulage capacity.

Separate motors power the two

roof-mounted cooling fans, which can be controlled independently via DCC – so you can mimic running the locomotive with one of its Maybach engines shut down! Although the majority of models are being built to 'O' gauge specification, a small number are also being offered to Scale Seven standards.

The disc wheels, whose faces are exposed owing to the unusual design of the 'Western's' bogie frames, have been specially machined to replicate the correct profile and, when the model is upturned, the base of the fuel tanks, battery boxes and all the associated plumbing, is represented in full.

Visible through the engine room windows and beautifully rendered louvres is a convincing representation of the twin diesel engines, cooling system, steam heat boiler and access walkways. The cab interiors feature the distinctive, textured sound-proof coating to the bulkhead and the commodious control desks feature a wealth of controls and gauges, complete with dials.

Incredibly, the cab side and engine room windows slide open and switchable interior lighting and opening cab doors allow all of this detail to be appreciated. At one end of each locomotive sits a driver and secondman figure, from the Modelu range, pre-painted

and looking quite at home.

Those of us on the *Model Rail* team lucky enough to see these models in the flesh have certainly been wowed by them. There's no doubt that Masterpiece Models has achieved its aim of producing as close a replica of the Class 52 as possible and, if you have the resources to invest in one of these beauties, we're sure that you'll be very happy with it! *(GD)*

he move towards palletised freight in the late 1950s led to issues with British Railways' existing general merchandise vans. The pressing need for larger doorways and easier access, for forklift and handoperated pallet trucks led BR to offer the 'Palvan'. This was a plywood-panelled 12t van with large double doors ranged to the extreme left of each side. Access may have been improved, but these hastily designed vans were not a success. However, a much-improved design emerged a few years later, termed the 'Vanwide'.

Maintaining the similar overall dimensions of existing 12t vans, with a 10ft wheelbase and 17ft 6in long body, the 'Vanwides' featured strong, corrugated steel ends and a set of sliding plug doors in the middle of each side. When opened, the doorway revealed a generous 9ft wide aperture that made for easy access during loading/unloading.

Between 1961-62, an impressive 2,000 'Vanwides' were assembled at Wolverton and Derby, each equipped with vacuum brakes, oil axleboxes and heavy-duty buffers. By the

late 1970s, over 500 examples were fully refurbished, with roller bearing axleboxes installed and air brakes replacing the vacuum gear. Employed widely on Speedlink trains across England, Scotland and Wales, the 'Vanwides' - now dubbed VEA under the TOPS system - were especially useful when serving depots and terminals with tight curves and limited clearance, where longer fixed axle and bogie vans could not be accommodated. For this reason, they were especially popular for MoD traffic.

Indeed, by the 1990s, military special trains had become the last call for these wagons and, when this traffic declined, they were withdrawn. A good number survived for internal



use with the MoD, while several are now preserved.

VAN-TASTIC?

Dapol announced its intention to produce an 'O' gauge 'Vanwide' a couple of years ago, which has led to eager anticipation among modern image modellers. With production models appearing in early January, they have certainly proved popular.
Both the original and refurbished specification wagons have been tooled by Dapol, allowing a range of livery and

around 3mm between the buffers, which are longer than more

traditional types. Each wagon weighs around 140g, so there's just enough mass to help keep the wheels on the rails without introducing excess drag. With the roofs simply lifting away, more weight can be installed to the interior if desired.

Other than the close coupling

issue, it's hard to find fault with these wagons. Some livery versions make use of self-coloured plastic to reduce the need for painting and keep costs down, but there are no outward signs of a cost-cutting approach. Indeed, given all the fine detail and excellent build quality, they're very keenly priced. Furthermore, they're a very welcome addition to Dapol's 7mm scale range. (GD)

markings options to be offered, ranging from original freight brown through to Railfreight sector livery.

With a quartet of wagons to assess, it has been interesting to scrutinise the various livery schemes and detail specifications. Across the board, the quality of finish is high, with the various logos and markings printed neatly. The Carlisle Currock fox logos on the Railfreight sector version are a highlight, with a realistic metallic sheen employed.

The moulded detail on the body is impressive, with the corrugated ends and vents, door sliding mechanism and locking bars (complete with padlocks and hasps) all crisply rendered. The four small grab handles on each side make use of fine wire and the extended, sprung buffers look the part, while working scale couplings are provided, with Instanter units correctly fitted to the vacuum-braked versions and screw couplers on the air brakeequipped vans. The appropriate brake hoses are also installed along with separately installed lamp brackets.

Looking at the chassis, again the tooling has been created to a high standard, as the parts are well defined. Both axles are compensated and run within brass bearings for super-smooth performance. The vacuum-fitted version is equipped with a full rendition of the brake gear, with pipes, tank, levers and rods, along with safety loops. Oil axleboxes and original suspension fittings are also well observed. The refurbished versions are even more impressive, with the various reservoir tanks, valves and pipework installed, along with upgraded suspension and roller bearing axleboxes.

A slight concern is the tight clearance when coupling up the vacuum-fitted versions using the Instanter couplings, which leave just a 1mm between the buffers. With the drawhooks and buffers sprung, there is a degree of 'give' and I found that the rake of wagons coped well with the gentle curves on my test track. However, I suspect that they may struggle on layouts with tighter curve radii. In contrast, the screw couplings are slightly longer and afford a gap of

Present your case

If there's a prototype that you think needs to be offered ready-to-run, here's the place to voice your opinion...

Prototype: British Rail/Leyland Class 141 two-car DMU

Gauge: '00'

Proposed by: Simone Barnes, Glossop

What is it?

In the late 1970s, cash-strapped British Rail was faced with a need to replace an aging fleet of first-generation Diesel Multiple Units and had begun experimenting with short, twin-axle chassis originally planned for high-speed freight vehicles. The plan was to combine this chassis with Leyland bus body components (from its successful National single-deck bus design) to produce a lightweight, cheap vehicle for suburban and branchline duties.

Initially, single-car rail vehicles were created, before a two-car unit was trialled, which became the Class 140 and was the forerunner of the famous 'Pacer' family of DMUs which followed. The first production fleet was the Class 141, which were built by BR and Leyland and introduced in 1984. A fleet of 20 two-car sets were constructed and their similarity to the contemporary Leyland buses was obvious. Allocated to Neville Hill depot, the '141s' worked services emanating from Leeds, York and Sheffield, running to destinations including

Harrogate, Huddersfield and Cleethorpes.

Reliability issues plagued the '141s' and their rather cramped interiors didn't prove popular with passengers. However, they continued in service until 1997. Twelve units were exported for use on the Islamic Republic of Iran Railways in 2001/2.

What would make it viable?

The demise of the 'Pacer' family of DMUs in recent years has led to a revival of interest in these humble units, not least as they provided a clear indication of how poorly funded rail transport was in the later BR years, especially away from the Capital. While the chassis differed from the later Class 142/3/4 'Pacers', a common drive train arrangement could be employed across multiple models. So, if anyone does eventually produce a Class 142 model worthy of the 21st Century, perhaps the '141' could be factored into the design at the same time?

There's a choice of liveries: original cream and green, later red/cream 'Metro' livery, plus Serco grey/red for the converted weedkilling unit (141118), dubbed 'Flower'.

Can I see a real one?

Yes, two units survive in preservation, 141108/13. Two further units were also initially preserved, but were scrapped a few years ago.

8 If you could build your dream model, what would it be?

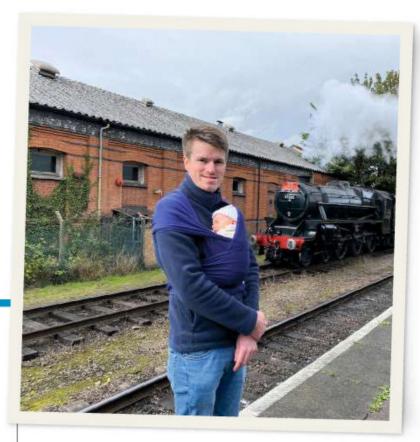
A scale model of another Great Central Railway location,

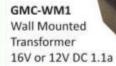
