As a confirmed Class 37 fan, the prospect of four more of the all-new high-specification 'Tractors' in various British Rail liveries was music to my ears. 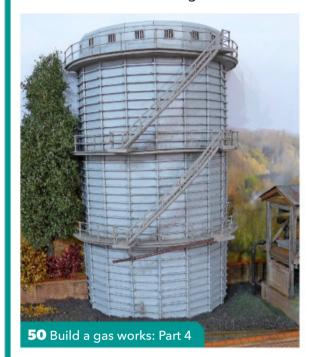

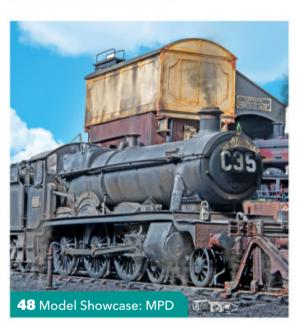

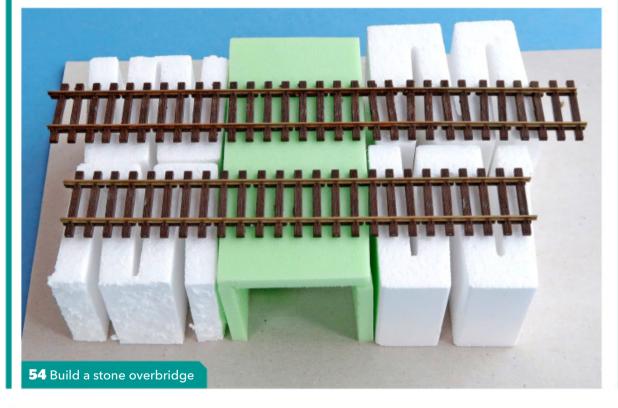

The latest happenings from the world of model railways



e're delighted to announce that a fourth batch of *Model Rail*'s exclusive 'OO' gauge LNER Sentinels is about to enter production.

Once again, we've teamed up with Dapol to create four new versions of the 'Y1' and 'Y3' 4wVBT, depicting the humble locomotives across their LNER and BR careers. Each version will be strictly limited to 250 pieces, and we've worked hard to keep the price as low as possible, despite the various challenges facing the hobby industry at the moment.

Production should be getting under way imminently, and we hope to open the order book as soon as we have a clear idea of when the models are due to arrive in the UK. As usual, the models will only be available from *Model Rail* and subscribers can claim their 10% discount.

Indeed, with more exclusive models on the horizon, now's a great time to take out a *Model Rail* subscription - see page 26 for full details.

Factfile: The Class 'Y1'/'Y3' Sentinels

Featuring a centrally mounted, vertical boiler, the 'Y1' and 'Y3' locomotives employed a chain drive system, similar to the arrangement installed on the steam road lorries produced from the early 1900s by Sentinel Ltd

Each of the 'Big Four' railway companies experimented with the Sentinel 'Central Engine' locomotive, as the chain drive system reduced stress on the rails, lending the locomotives to branch lines, light railways, dockyards and other locations where the track and infrastructure was not of a high standard.

However, it was the London & North Eastern Railway (LNER) that became the largest user, with an initial batch of Sentinels ordered in the mid-1920s, which were classified as 'Y1'. A further order followed, for locomotives with a 'double gear' arrangement, which were classified as 'Y3'.

Used primarily for shunting work, Sentinels could also be seen working light freight turns on railway backwaters, such as the Derwent Valley Light Railway. Most of the Sentinels in British Railways' fleet were withdrawn in the 1950s, but a number survived in Departmental use into the 1960s.

CLASS 37 QUARTET REVEALED

hile Bachmann
Europe caused a
stir in late July
with the
appearance of an all-new,
high-specification 'OO' Class 37,
many of us were left wondering
what other versions would
follow 'large logo' blue 37430
Cwmbran. During the company's
Autumn 2022 British Railway
Announcements, four more '37s'
were revealed, encompassing
some of British Rail's most
popular liveries.

Across the four new models, there's a variety of detail differences, illustrating the breadth of the Bachmann Branchline tooling suite.
Split-headcode '37/0' 37034 wears plain BR Rail blue and sports original buffer cowlings, while 37043 Loch Lomond also represents a 'split box' Class 37/0, but with cutaway bufferbeams

and car-style headlamps.
Bedecked in 'large logo' BR blue,
complete with Eastfield depot's
large Scotty dog emblems, *Loch Lomond* is bound to be popular
with 'Tractor' enthusiasts.

A pair of refurbished '37/4s' is represented by 37401 *Mary Queen of Scots* in InterCity 'Main line' livery, plus Railfreight Metals sector 37423 *Sir Murray Morrison*, which is fitted with twin fuel tanks.

All of the '37s' are available in DCC-ready, DCC sound and DCC sound deluxe format, the latter boasting working roof fans and tinted windscreen effect.

FIRST-GENERATION DMUs RETURN

The perennially popular Class 101 diesel multiple unit returns to Bachmann's Branchline range this autumn, in two-car formation and presented in BR blue and grey livery (with Chester-Manchester destination blinds). They're available as both

Bachmann's refurbished BR Mk 2F Driving Brake Second Open (DBSO) proved a real hit with modern image modellers after the initial releases earlier this year. Two further livery options are to enter the Branchline range imminently, with the Network Rail yellow version a welcome arrival for anyone who models NR test trains.

ALL-NEW CLASS 90 FROM FARISH

After a few lean years, in terms of new 'N' gauge tooling announcements, Bachmann Europe revealed that an all-new Class 90 is to be added to the Graham Farish range. With Bachmann's 'OO' Class 90 proving to be a landmark model in many respects, there had been plenty of lobbying by 'N' gauge modellers for a 2mm scale version.

Five versions are to appear, with a trio of BR-era liveries complemented by two privatisation schemes. The new models will feature a coreless motor, all-wheel power collection and drive, Next18 DCC interface, pre-fitted speaker and directional lights. Production models will be on display on the Farish stand at The International N Gauge Show, on September 10-11 (www.ngaugeshow.co.uk).

STOP PRESS!

Just before we closed for press, we received a bumper crop of 'OO' gauge review models from Bachmann, featuring the all-new Class 37, a pair of Bulleid coaches and a SECR 'Dance Hall' brake van.



THE ELECTRIC LIGHT ORCHESTRA!

The Class 92 is a dual-voltage electric locomotive capable of running on 25kV AC from overhead lines via pantograph, or 750V DC from a third rail. It was designed specifically for operation through the Channel Tunnel between Britain and France. Since then, they have spread their wings, operating across the electrified sections of the national network and even to Eastern Europe.

We are producing a range of these elegant locomotives in OO/4mm scale, spanning the locomotives' lifespan to date, including the latest Caledonian Sleeper colour scheme, for which are also manufacturing the new Caledonian Mk5 Coaches.

Models will feature dual motorised pantographs, a wealth of separate detail, running on a heavy die-cast metal chassis, powerbank capacitors, with availability in both DC/DCC Ready and DCC Sound Fitted formats, the latter including a twin speaker set up including an EM1 style 'Accurathrash' speaker, and ESU Loksound 5 digital decoder.

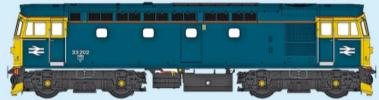
HELJAN UPDATES - IN COLOUR

Heljan's NBL diesel electric Bo-Bo 10800 has reached the livery artwork stage, revealing the four different versions that will be offered, including a

weathered version of the black/ silver scheme. Tooling is well under way, with production expected to begin before the end of the year.

A new run of Heljan's 'Slim Jim' Class 33/2 is also in progress and a large raft of BR-era livery options has been revealed. Ranging from green with a variety of warning panel styles, through Rail blue to Sectorisation schemes, there should be something to appeal to all BR Southern Region fans. Delivery is expected around February.









BACHMANN HTA RETURNS



Modellers of the modern freight scene will be buoyed by the return of Bachmann Branchliine's Thrall-built HTA high-capacity hopper. Two new versions have been produced, both with DB Schenker branding, but with a choice of a weathered ex-EWS maroon finish or a pristine DB red version. **Price:** £63.95 (£69.95 weathered)





'4F' REVAMPED

The Farish Midland Railway '4F' 0-6-0 has been upgraded to include a Next18 DCC decoder socket and pre-fitted speaker. Three new versions are being offered initially, each coupled to Fowler tenders, catering for LMS

and BR eras, including a factory-weathered BR black option. Only DCC-ready models have been announced so far, but sound-fitted models are in the pipeline.

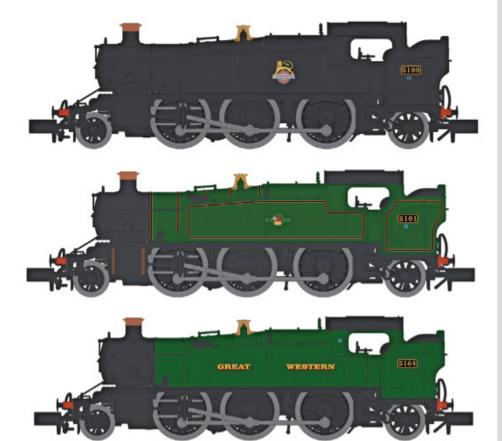
'LARGE PRAIRIE' NEXT FROM SONIC

Following the success of its LNER 'J50' and GWR '56XX', Sonic Models' next RTR 'N' gauge model will portray the GWR '51XX/61XX' 2-6-2T. Known as 'Large Prairies', they were employed by the Great Western and British Railways on suburban and branch line passenger traffic, as well as the odd local freight service.

Sonic is promising a high detail and technical specification, including a 6-pin DCC decoder interface, coreless motor, all-wheel power collection and NEM coupler pockets. A range of GWR and BR liveries are planned, and models can be pre-ordered now, exclusively via Rails of Sheffield, for just a £30 deposit.

RAPIDO'S 'E1' UNDER STARTER'S ORDERS

Initially slated as a Model Rail Exclusive model, Rapido Trains UK is taking forward the project to recreate the LBSCR 'E1' O-6-OT, and you can order your model now.

Rapido is to produce 14 different 'E1s', covering the prototype's long careers, from the pre-Grouping era to the days of Southern and BR ownership. Those examples that worked on the Isle of Wight between 1932-1960 will also be covered. Accordingly, lots of different tooling options are being developed and DCC-ready and DCC sound-fitted versions will be available.

LINE SOCIETIES LIAISON GROUP

As well as groups who focus on the history of particular railway companies, the Line Societies Liaison Group also welcomes organisations whose interests are more geographical than company-specific, or that study specific aspects of British railway history. A common feature of all these organisations is that among their membership there are many people who are also interested in railway modelling.

The group holds regular virtual meetings and has an active email discussion forum. Through these channels, the Liaison Group aims to promote the sharing of best practice in areas such as meetings, archives, ideas for membership engagement, and the sharing of resources.

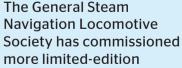

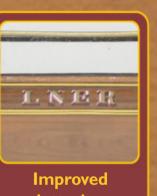

NEW 'BOXES' FROM C-RAIL FOR 'N' AND '00'

Intermodal not only represents one of the UK's most important rail-borne cargoes, but it's also one of the most colourful. Indeed, at the recent DEMU Showcase event, it was interesting to see how engaged younger enthusiasts were by the sight of container trains on the various layouts. Accordingly, one of the most colourful trader's displays was that of C-Rail Intermodal, which specialises in the production of authentic containers in both 'N' and 'OO'.

A variety of new container liveries have recently been





added to the C-Rail range for both scales, and we were given a handful of each to assess. In 'N' gauge, ten new livery options are now available across the range of 20ft and 40ft dry containers, with original and modern corrugation patterns to suit the various colour schemes. The yellow/red BR Freightliner scheme is ideal for 1980s container trains, while the vivid pink Ocean Network Express (ONE) livery offers an up-to-date example. Door locking bars are

moulded integrally, but they're painted so neatly that they look like separate parts.

In 'OO', the modern 40ft High Cube (9ft 6in tall) insulated container, or 'reefer', is presented in various contemporary liveries, including P&O pale green and ONE white with pink lettering. The refrigeration gear is neatly moulded at one end while, at the opposite end, the door locking bars are formed from separate components for greater definition.

Painting and printing is excellent across the board and the base of each container can be unclipped to access the interior if desired, providing a useful means of adding extra ballast to intermodal wagons. Both the 'N' and 'OO' containers sat well on a range of different wagon types from various manufacturers.

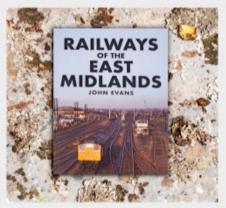

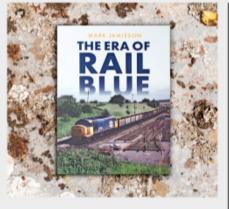
A selection of titles that have kept Model Rail's editor occupied recently.

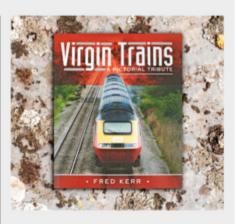

Although aimed at radio control model enthusiasts, the tool has plenty of potential for general modelling tasks. Supplied with flat and round profile iron heads, these can be unscrewed and replaced with the supplied brass and nylon

heads to suit a variety of striking and shaping tasks.

The flat iron head is perfect for driving home track pins and small nails, with the 12mm

diameter head fitting easily between the rails on 'OO' track. The brass and nylon heads are great for shaping soft materials, such as brass, copper and tin.

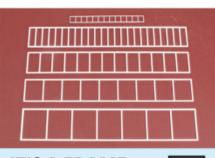

Covid blues and bolts

While trying to shake off a bad dose of the dreaded Covid-19 virus, George Dent has been working on a large-scale truck kit - and was reminded of a range of detailing products recommended by a Model Rail contributor.

espite trying my best to avoid catching it, I finally succumbed to the virus that has dominated everyone's lives for the past two years. After a week confined in a rural Rutland hotel room, feeling too ill to face the 4+hour drive back to Northumberland, I was so glad to finally get home. It took a while before I could focus enough to undertake anything requiring any kind of concentration, but a couple of Peco 'TT:120' building kits provided an enjoyable return to practical modelling (see page 96).

However, when I'm not feeling my best, I prefer to work on non-railway subjects, so I managed to put a few hours into a 1:24 scale truck kit that I've had on the go for a few months. I'm a big fan of 1970s and 1980s European trucks and my latest project is a Volvo F16 tractor unit, based on an Italeri plastic kit. I'm adding tons of extra detail, most of which is scratchbuilt, but I also have a few etched metal upgrade kits from a variety of specialist suppliers.

These large-scale kits demand countless hours of work, but I have made some tangible progress recently. The chassis frames have been kitted-out with various air lines and valves, electrical cables and

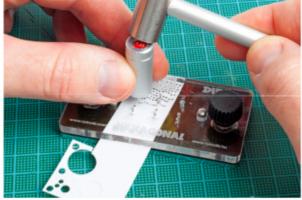

hundreds of individual nuts and bolts, all created from sheet styrene and a set of punch and dye tools from RP Toolz (www. rptoolz.com).

While these nuts, washers and bolt heads look great, punching them out and installing them can be a slow process. Subsequently, I recalled a range of products employed by Model Rail contributor Richard Simpson, during construction of his impressive gasworks (MR302). Meng Model produce sheets of injection moulded plastic nuts and bolts, in a variety of sizes, ostensibly for 1:35 scale modelling. However, they're also suitable for many other scales, including 'OO' and 'O' gauge, and are ideal for adding extra relief to all manner of lineside structures.

A handful of different packs were ordered, and I've begun to experiment with them. I love the fact that plain hexagonal bolts are offered, along with washers, nuts and



Many of the chassis parts have been upgraded with nuts and bolts, individually punched from sheet styrene.



The wheel hubs required a whole new set of studs, washers and hexagonal bolts to be punched and installed. These resin tyres are replacements for the kit's basic rubber parts.

The most difficult element is cutting the details cleanly away from the plastic base but, with a fresh blade, the job can be a quick one. I wish I'd remembered the Meng Model packs sooner, as it would probably have saved me a lot of tap, tap, tapping with those punches!



air and hydraulic hoses and valves, as well as electrical cable.





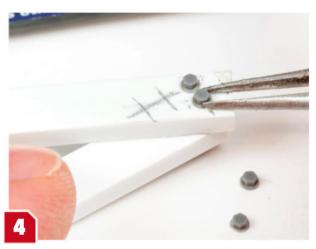
A variety of moulded plastic nuts and bolts are available in the Meng Model range. Despite being branded for 1:35 scale, they're much more versatile and a range of different sizes are on offer, with hundreds of parts in each pack.



The nuts and bolts need to be cut away from the plastic base very carefully. Use a fresh scalpel blade and keep your fingers out of the way. Cut slowly and gently to avoid the parts from pinging off into the ether.



Rub the bolt or nut lightly over a flat file or sanding pad to ensure the base is flat and smooth. This will help create a stronger and neater glue bond.



Mark out the position of each bolt head with a pencil, place in position and then, if fixing to a plastic surface, add a small amount of liquid poly cement. Cyanoacrylate can be used if bonding to other materials.



Now add the tail end of the bolts, with washers and nuts, aligning them carefully to tally with the bolt heads on the other side of the joint.



Once primed and painted, the details can be highlighted with dry-brushing. The result is fantastic and the potential for canopies, industrial buildings, large-scale vehicles and many other uses can be appreciated.

lifting the hefty diesel off the rails for safe storage indoors.

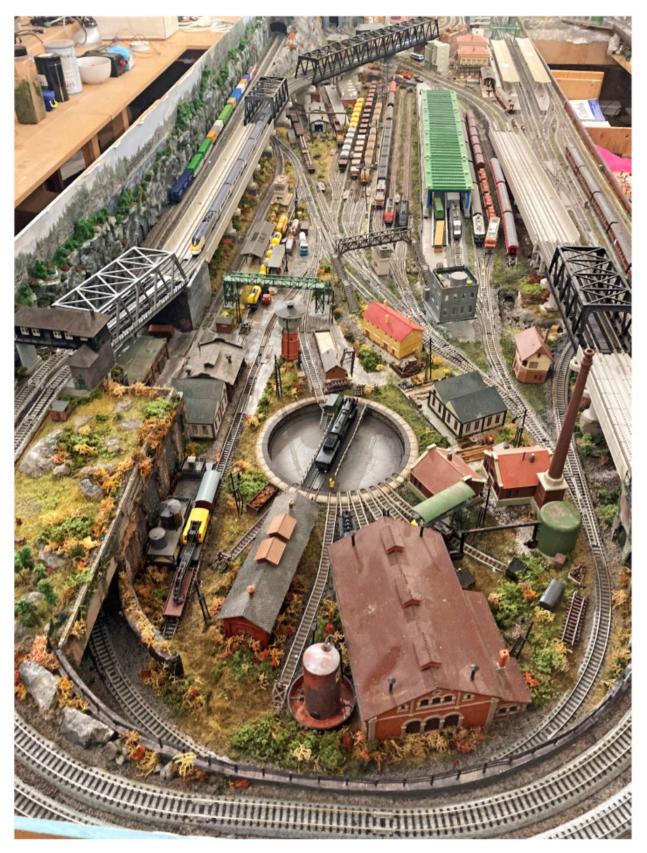

Inside track with Ben Ando

Ben Ando is the founder of Revolution Trains and a regular contributor to Model Rail. e all know that the cost of living is going up, driven largely by soaring energy prices. So should model companies respond by cutting the prices and specifications of their models?

Nobody likes bad news, and most of us prefer to see our glasses as half-full, rather than half-empty.

So it is not surprising that on social media and elsewhere many are critical of the 'scaremongers' warning of an upcoming cost of living crisis.

Nevertheless, anyone with even a small interest in the news will know that the war in Ukraine, and resultant tensions with Russia, are having an impact on the price of energy, and for that we are all going to have to pay.

The recent launch of a new range of locomotives with a starting RRP of nearly £250 has resulted in much wailing on web forums that 'high prices' are not sustainable.

Some believe that as modellers seek to cut back on their discretionary spending, high-quality premium models, with prices to match, will sit unbought on the shelves.

This invariably leads to the question: 'Why don't manufacturers produce more basic versions of their models at lower prices?'

In fairness lower specification models *are* available – for example, the Hornby RailRoad range – where the more basic models of yesteryear are given a new lease of life.

This works because the original models were more basic, with fewer separately fitted details or working features, and the plastic mould tools are long since paid for.

And, of course, those on a budget can always look at the second-hand market or online auction sites to acquire cheaper models.

But for new models the economics just don't work. In what is an increasingly competitive market the reality is that nobody wants to get into a race to the bottom in terms of either quality or price.

And once you decide to spend the money on developing a premium model, then trying to make the moulds work for a more basic version is not only a distraction but will also add cost to the project and probably create more problems than it solves.



Bachmann Branchline's all-new '37' offers the highest level of detail and technical specification currently available.

For example: if your 'main range' bodyshell has holes for separately fitted handrails and photo-etched grilles, you will require another tool with these details moulded in; funding this would immediately offset any saving in labour costs by not having to fit the separate items.

Even if you decide it is still worth proceeding, when it comes to assembly your 'basic' model will still require its own production line with different protocols and systems – and all this effort to sell models at a lower price than the main range!

Finally, and purely from a professional pride perspective, nobody wants to be seen as the 'Netto' of model trains.

Revolution works really hard to ensure our models feature the most refined detailing, accurate variations and best paint and lettering finish we can achieve and I have no doubt that our rival manufacturers are equally passionate about producing the very best models they can too.

Over a cold beer in the pub the idea of two ranges – premium and economy – can seem like a winner. But faced with the cold reality of producing scale models for a knowledgeable and demanding market, without a vast store of heritage tooling to draw on, it quickly runs out of steam!

Contemplating modelling a more contemporary era than usual, **Ed Purcell** looked to his local area for inspiration to create this exhibition-going masterpiece.



'N' GAUGE LAYOUT **GRAVELLY OAK**



'N' GAUGE LAYOUT GRAVELLY OAK

here are few things in the model railway world better than the hustle and bustle of a busy exhibition hall, with modellers showing off all their years of hard work, and visitors getting inspiration left, right and centre. One of the biggest shows in the United Kingdom is The International N Gauge Show (TINGS) and every year we preview one of the layouts you'll be able to see at the exhibition. This year we shine the spotlight on Ed Purcell's 'Gravelly Oak', a modern image branch line terminus on the Black Country/Shropshire border.

"I decided when it came to building this layout that I wanted to try something closer to the present day than I had done in the past," explains Ed, "and my club wanted a greater selection of small layouts to take to exhibitions. With so many branch lines in my local area around Birmingham it wasn't difficult to get inspiration, but I immediately ran into my first problem, which was deciding on a track plan. With a pile of buildings and a mind not used to thinking about dead ends for passenger trains, getting everything to fit without getting in the way of the railway proved to be a challenge. Eventually I managed it, with a layout totalling 6ft 9in by 1ft 3in that I intended to store in the attic, but after falling down the stairs trying to get it up there, a new home was quickly found in the form of the garden shed which worked well in the long run."

Storing 'Gravelly Oak' in the shed meant that it

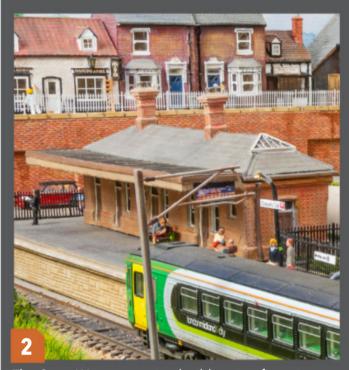

required protection, so Ed built a frontage, roof and sides to the layout, almost entirely boxing it in. Not only does this help to keep the dust and spiders away, but also provides some much-needed structural rigidity.

ROCK AND ROLL

"It looks as though you're viewing the layout inside a fish tank. In fact, many viewers have put their hands out as they thought there was a pane of glass at the front! The frontage frames the layout nicely, allows me to run LED strip lights along the top and hide the fiddleyard behind the nameplate. Since the backscene continues around the three viewable sides all the way to the blind spot, it does a great job of making 'Gravelly Oak' appear to be part of a much larger world since you can't see the edge."

Scenically, the first feature you notice is the rock formations which surround two sides of the scene, further helping to frame it but also reinforcing the presence of the aggregate quarry in the right-hand corner. Making realistic looking rocks isn't the easiest thing to do in railway modelling, and Ed went through numerous stages to get his looking right.

"The first job is to go and look at real rocks or at pictures of real rocks because they're nothing like many depictions on models. I used Woodland Scenics rubber moulds to create large areas but broke them up and reassembled them into smaller rocks. I then crinkled some tin foil so that the surface is quite rough and poured plaster onto it. Once you break the tin foil off it gives you some variation and, before it's fully set, attack it with a screwdriver or chisel to make it look more jagged. You can then glue them all together but it's important not to get glue onto the visible surface because when you paint it the glue will show up. The paint soaks into the plaster so you will need a few layers to get it looking right. Adding some white spirit to the paint makes it soak in nicely."







Staying with the quarry, the modified Walthers kit is Ed's favourite part of the layout, as making those alterations and seeing the hard work he has put into it blend so seamlessly into the rest of the scene gives him a great sense of satisfaction.

"As it's a continental model it needed some alterations to make it appear more British, but I wanted to keep them to a minimum as much as possible. Previous builds have had almost everything on them scratchbuilt, but at 'Gravelly Oak' I wanted to show what can be achieved with off-the-shelf products, specifically resin models from Hornby and Bachmann. There is a stigma held by some modellers that if you use these products you're not doing 'real' modelling, but what I've shown is that you can still make an exhibition standard layout with them. It's a similar story with the locomotives and stock which have been lightly weathered but that's it. This is the first layout I've built which is DCC-operated and I quickly learned that the line about only using two wires is complete nonsense! I use an NCE PowerCab for the locomotives but the points are switched by hand with a switch behind the layout and a SEEP point motor. Frog switching is done automatically when the point is thrown and the signals also work but aren't dictated by the movement of trains."

VARNISHING TRICK

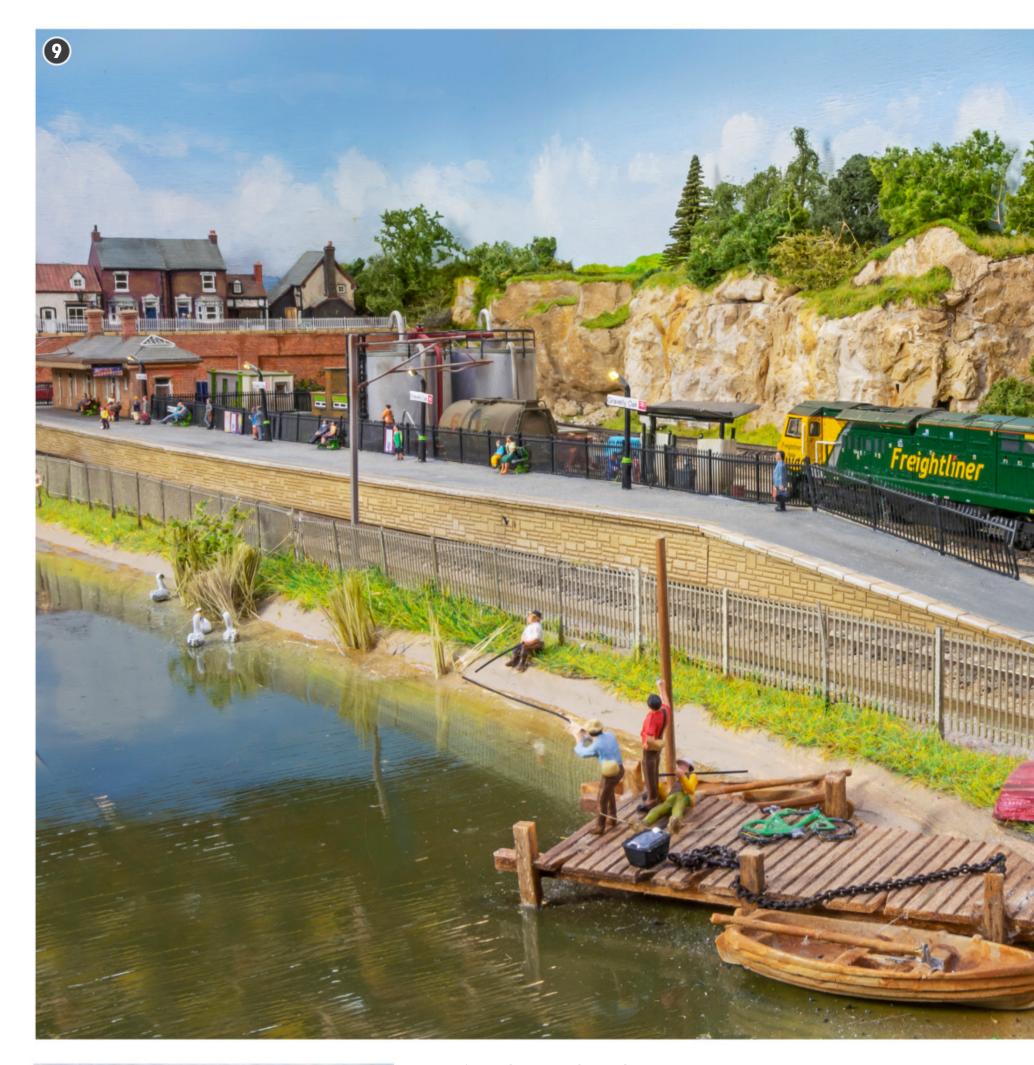
At the front of the layout, and doing the most to trick your eye into believing the layout is part of a wider world, is the water at the edge of the lake. By far the longest section of the layout to build, the water alone took Ed three weeks to complete.

"First you have to make sure that the surface is completely flat and then you can prime and paint the surface varying shades, getting lighter as you head towards the shallower sections to help maintain the

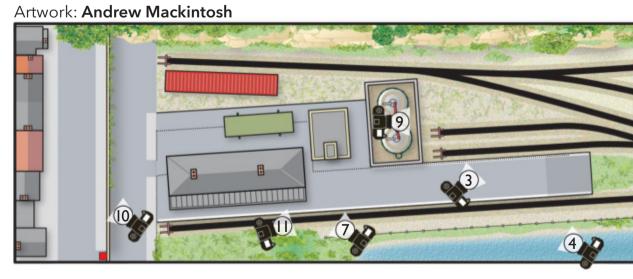

perception of depth. Once that is ready you can add the varnish, and I have found the seven layers are about right, but you have to make sure each layer has completely dried before you add the next one and that can take several days. If you don't wait long enough between layers you end up with the varnish ruckling between the layers and it spoils the look. Also, when the varnish is very thin at the edge, the meniscus can start to creep up the sides and you have to just touch up the paint to make it less visible. I had the advantage of only modelling a small amount of water so the decision was made for me, but I'm a strong believer in only creating still water, as trying to make waves look realistic is very difficult, particularly in 'N' gauge."

With so many things to admire and so many things to look at on 'Gravelly Oak', you'll definitely want to seek it out at TINGS. 'N' gauge suits modern image so well as trains get longer all the time, and although this is a small branch line terminus it might just provide you with the inspiration to make something bigger in a small scale. M

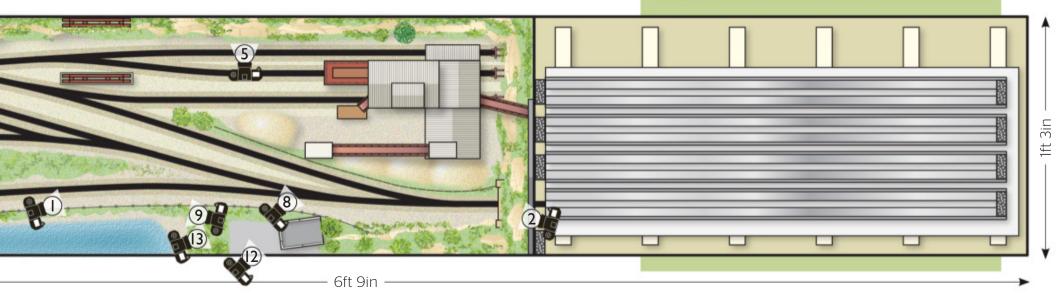

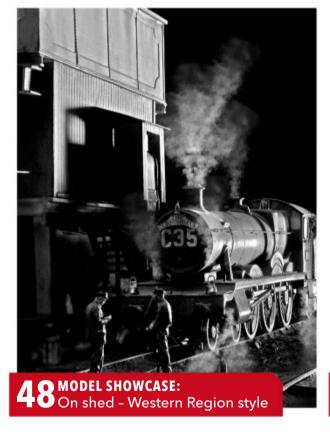

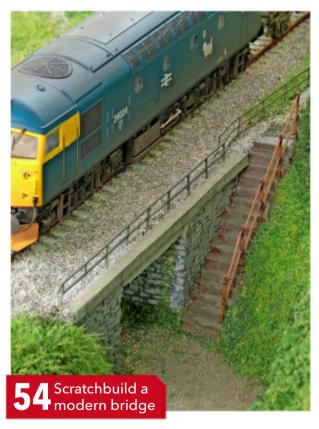

Inspired by one of this month's layouts, George Dent whiled away a few evenings by titivating a Model Rail exclusive LNER 'J70' locomotive.

sn't it funny how quickly you start taking things for granted? Model Rail's exclusive 'OO' gauge rendition of the famous LNER 'J70' 0-6-0T, was first released in 2019 and, since then, I've had a couple of examples in a display cabinet beside my desk.

While I've enjoyed looking at them, I'd forgotten just how lovely they are when you take a much closer look (although obviously I'm a little biased!). After recently dismantling a model in order to impart a comprehensive weathering job, it was great to be reminded of what a gem this little tram locomotive is.

What gave me the impetus to tweak a 'J70'? It was reading about Alan Price's lovely 'Outwell Village' layout, which features in this issue (see page 64). I'd seen this layout in the flesh at an exhibition some time ago, well before we commissioned our 'J70s' from Rapido Trains. Despite knowing relatively little about the Wisbech & Upwell Tramway at the time, it really caught my imagination, so

I was intrigued to learn more about how Alan's layout came into existence.

Although I've weathered a 'J70' before. that was a rushed job and was partly achieved with the help of an airbrush and without any form of dismantling. While I'm pleased with how that BR-liveried model turned out, I did have to 'muck up' the windows slightly to disguise the fact that much of the interior remained pristine.

This time around, however, I decided to be a bit more thorough. On the flipside, I took the decision to keep the actual weathering techniques and materials as simple as possible - so no airbrushes have been harmed in during this project...

Just a handful of acrylic paint shades and two pots of dry pigments were employed.

I used LifeColor water-based acrylics, as they're easy to work with and, although they dry rapidly, they do give a few minutes of working time to allow for manipulation. That said, a bit of prior practice with these paints on a scrap surface is heartily recommended before tackling a prized locomotive.

Enamel paints would be eminently suitable for this work, but the smell, need for even smellier thinners and long drying times are serious points against them. But they do avoid the need to work swiftly. That said, there's no need to worry with LifeColor acrylics, as they can be removed easily with Tamiya's acrylic thinners, if things go wrong.

Now that the model has a suitably lived-in appearance, both inside and out, I've also posed many of the side and end windows

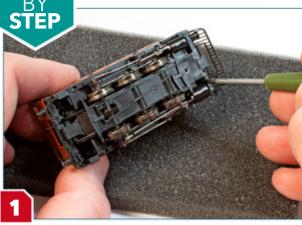

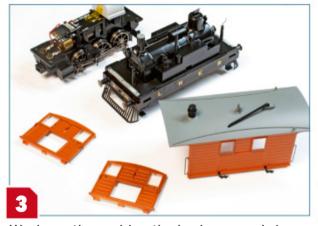
DISMANTLING AND WEATHERING



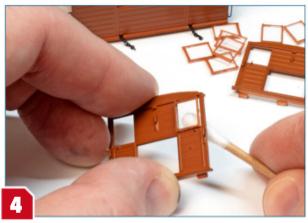
The 'J70' comes with a comprehensive instruction booklet, showing how to dismantle the model to access the DCC socket, but I also needed to get inside the bodyshell. Begin by removing the four screws at each corner of the chassis.



Put the chassis to one side and gently prise the body away with a very thin flat screwdriver or scrap of sheet brass. There's a hidden clip in the centre of each body - gently opening up the sides will release them. Take care not to damage the paintwork.



Work gently, pushing the body upwards in small increments until it comes free. This will also release the separate cab ends. Now you can appreciate the fully rendered boiler, smokebox and various controls fitted to the interior.



The glazing panels can be pushed out gently using a cotton bud. This avoids the need to mask the glazing, if re-fitting the original parts. I wanted to pose the windows open and these moulded parts are too thick to sit on the outside.

Having mixed up a generic shade of grime, using the three paints, it was brushed over one panel of the body at a time. Immediately, most of the paint was wiped away with cotton swabs in vertical strokes.

Most of the weathering was done with a trio of water-based acrylic paints from LifeColor, Weathered Black, Matt Black and Rotbraun (red-brown), plus a few soft-bristled brushes,



Virtually all paint was removed, leaving pigment within plank seams and window frames. The swab's vertical strokes result in faint streaking effects. Deposits were left around the lower and upper edges. Repeat the process across the whole body.

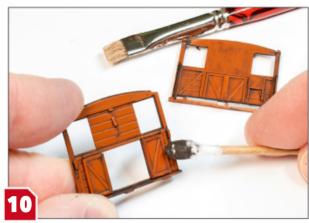

I'm glad that I've had a second attempt at working on a 'J70' and it has been satisfying to approach the project differently to my first attempt. I do so hate repetition!

The same technique was used on the interior, with heavier deposits retained, again manipulated with vertical strokes on the sides and lateral strokes on the roof. If unhappy with the appearance, dip the swab in acrylic thinners, remove and start again.



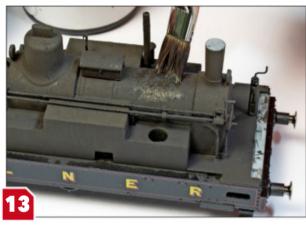
The internal and external faces of the cab ends were treated in the same way. The moulded detail relief becomes much more visible after this weathering treatment, and you can remove as much or as little of the weathering shade as you like.



The pre-painted etched replacement window frames were also weathered at this stage. Again, a 'grime' mix was brushed on and most of it wiped away, treating both faces and the edges of each frame.



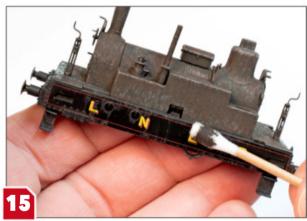
To give the interior a convincing appearance of a hard-working steam locomotive, a tiny amount of dry pigment was added to the acrylic paint mix. I used Darkstar Dark Earth pigment and the thick coating was brushed over the entire area.



Once the initial coating had dried, a further application of the same paint mix followed, but applied with a stippling action. The addition of the dry pigment creates a textured finish and the stippling avoids pronounced brush marks.



When the textured coating had dried fully, lighter shades were dry-brushed over the surface (Slate Grey and Rust Dark Shadow). With just a trace of the paint left on the bristles, the flat brush deposits just enough colour to add highlights.



The areas of lined black livery were weathered in a similar manner to the bodyshell, leaving behind streaks of grime in key areas. These will dry to a matt finish, contrasting nicely with the glossy livery beneath.



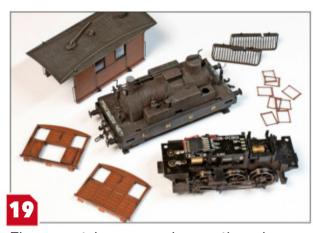
A slightly different mix was created for the roof, with a dash of the dry pigment added to give texture. Once this textured base coat had dried, more dry-brushing followed to add streaking effects (working only laterally) and to highlight the various details.



After cleaning the surfaces of the chassis with swabs dipped in the Tamiya acrylic thinners (the alcohol-based thinner is good for de-greasing), the textured paint mix was brushed carefully around the frames, cylinders, wheels and motion.



It may take a couple of coats to build up the desired amount of texture and opacity, but the paints dry quickly, so re-coating after around 10 minutes is possible. When satisfied, clean the wheel rims and inner faces with a swab and Tamiya thinners.



The cowcatchers were also weathered, using the same textured paint mix, to ensure consistency with the rest of the chassis. The treated parts can now be left to dry thoroughly overnight.



To add a suitably dusty sheen to certain parts of the interior, a mix of dry pigments were applied with a dry, flat brush. Darkstar's Dark Earth shade was mixed with a little Grimy Black from the MIG range. The cab floors and inner ends were the main recipients.

IMPROVING THE VIEW

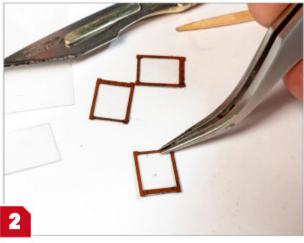
To ensure that the weathered cab interior would be visible, I chose to pose most of the side and end windows in the open position. To do this, the original moulded plastic

glazing panels can be replaced and every Model Rail/Rapido 'J70' model comes with a set of pre-painted, etched metal window frames.

A look at prototype images reveals that the 'J70s' often ran with the front and side windows slid open, either partially or fully, so its a worthwhile modification.



A sheet of thin clear plastic glazing is required, so I used some left-over packaging from a Parkside wagon kit (see page 58). The etched frames were used as a guide for the pane. A bead of adhesive was applied to the frame.



The frame was then placed onto the clear plastic pane. Using the minimum of adhesive ensures a neat bond. Any excess glue can be wiped away with a moistened cocktail stick.

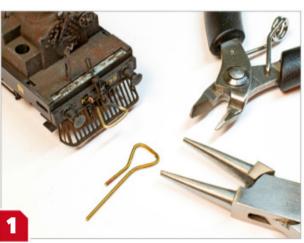

The windows can be added now or after the model has been reassembled. Glue 'n' Glaze adhesive was employed again, applied with a cocktail stick before the panels were carefully positioned.

DOWN TO THE WIRE

My 'J70' will be working with rolling stock equipped with tension lock couplings, but I attempted to improve the locomotive's appearance and shape replacement coupling loops from 1.0mm diameter stiff brass wire. This is an approach I've used a lot in the past, offering a much more discreet alternative to regular tension locks.



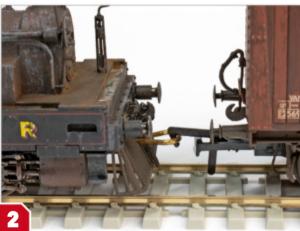
The 1.0mm thick wire was shaped with pliers, using the tension locks as a guide to length, width and shape. Shaping the tails so that they're 'sprung' will allow them to sit in the NEM pockets without glue during alignment trials.



With the full cowcatchers clipped into the bufferbeams (not glued yet), the wire couplers were pushed through the slats into the NEM pockets. The shape and size of the loops was then tested with rolling stock.

terms of the choice of wire. It needs to be thick and stiff enough to retain its shape while hauling and pushing.

Once the ideal shape, size and height has been ascertained, the wire can be secured into the NEM pocket with epoxy or thick cyanoacrylate glue. After painting and weathering, the loops blend into the 'J70's chassis effectively.



After epoxy glue had been smeared inside the NEM pocket with a cocktail stick, the cowcatcher was secured with cyanoacrylate glue. The wire coupler was then pushed back into the pocket and adjusted carefully.



The height and positioning of the loop was checked before a blob of Blu Tack held it securely while the epoxy cured. I used a fast-setting formula, but I'd recommend a 10min or 20min version to allow time for fine-tuning.



The process was repeated for the coupling loop at the opposite end. When the glue was cured, the wire loops were painted with the weathering acrylic mix so that the new parts blended into their surroundings.

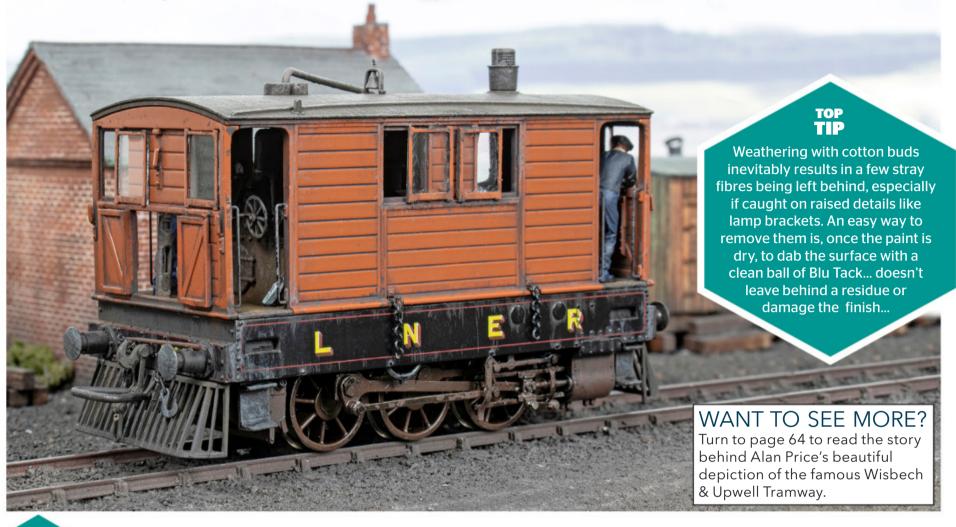


ADDING EXTRA DETAIL

Along with cosmetic couplings, alternative cowcatchers (with or without slots for NEM couplers) and a suite of etched shed and maker's plates, the 'J70' offers a comprehensive overall package. Therefore, the

only extras that I've added to the mix are a footplate crew pack from Modelu, which includes a 3D-printed driver and fireman, plus a range of tools and equipment to enhance the cabs.

Although the Modelu pack is aimed at a Peckett industrial steam locomotive, the figures suit the 'J70' perfectly, especially the leaning driver, whose folded arms rest comfortably on the front window frame.





The Modelu figures were tacked to scraps of wood with cyanoacrylate, to aid painting. The smaller parts were placed on strips of upturned, low-tack masking tape, so that they can be removed easily once painting is complete.



With the cab ends re-fitted to the chassis, the footplate crew could be installed. The driver's pose, although not originally designed for a 'J70', is a perfect fit into the opened front window.



Details such as the bucket of spanners and oil can were also fixed into the cab interior before the bodyshell was replaced. If you end up with any traces of excess adhesive, brush dry pigment onto the floor to hide it.



Cosmetic screw couplings and side chains come supplied with the *Model Rail* 'J70' model and they look great once installed. The Modelu crew pack also includes a shunting pole and this was secured to the bufferbeam.



With the interior detailing complete, the bodyshell can be re-fitted. Ensure the side chains are clear of the chassis before pushing the body into place, aligning the cab ends into their slots in the roof.



The final task was to install an oil lamp to one of the brackets. The lamp is from the Modelu crew kit and even features a slot in the base to allow it to fit onto the bracket.

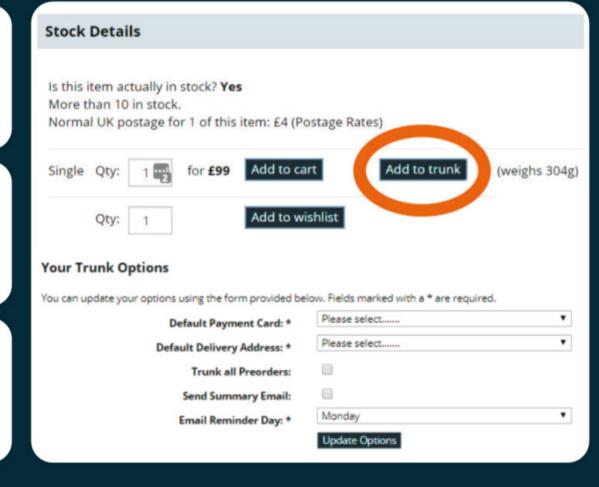

MODEL SHOWCASE



ON SHED - WESTERN REGION STYLE

Jack Boskett explains how he created this atmospheric steam shed scene, with a little help from his friends...



s my collection of 7mm scale locomotives expanded, I began to think of how I could best show them off, especially as they have been detailed and weathered. Shiny wood plinths or display cabinets are all well and good, but I wanted something a little more atmospheric.

Measuring 43in by 19in, this 'O' gauge diorama features scratchbuilt buildings by Martin Fay. The combined water and coaling tower, yard office and other

structures are rendered in plastic card, clad with Slater's embossed plastic sheets, with plenty of styrene girders, strip and section employed too. My friend Stephen, Martin's son, took care of the painting and weathering of the structures, plus the scenic work, including the realistic grimy groundwork - and what a great job he did.

To suit my model collection, the shed scene depicts a typical former Great Western locomotive depot, as it would have appeared in the late 1950s and 1960s, hence the level of grime covering the surroundings and locomotives.

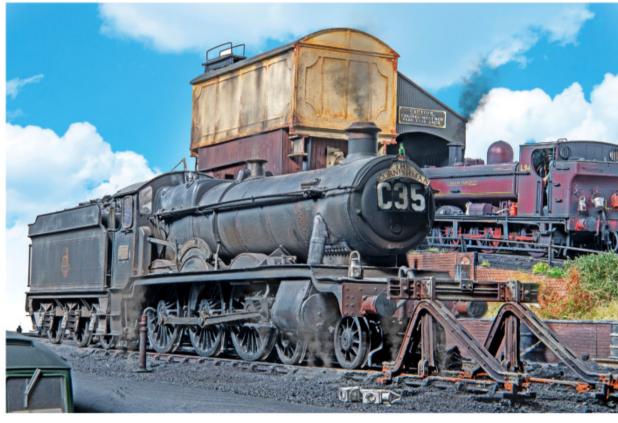
I added smaller details, such as the various name and numberplates, which have been removed by the shed crew and unceremoniously dumped in bins or laid against the walls. These would be worth a pretty penny today. The various plates were all 3D-printed.

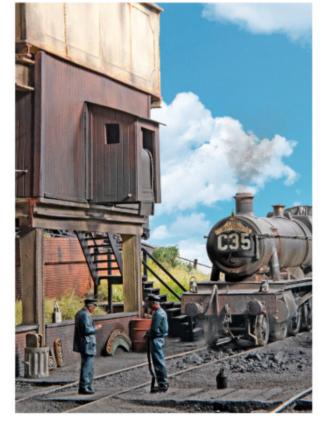
Spare locomotive parts, such as buffers, oil lamps and headboards, were obtained from Peco and Fox Transfers, while the

figures are from the well-known Modelu range (www.modelu3d.co.uk), which are also 3D-printed.

The locomotives are a mix of kit-built and ready-to-run models. The GWR 'Hall' 4-6-0, No. 5913 *Rushton Hall* was built from an Oakville kit, while the GWR Pannier tanks and '14XX' are from Dapol's 'O' gauge RTR range. The Brush Type 4, D1662 *Isambard Kingdom Brunel*, is one of Heljan's recently updated versions of the ubiquitous Class 47.

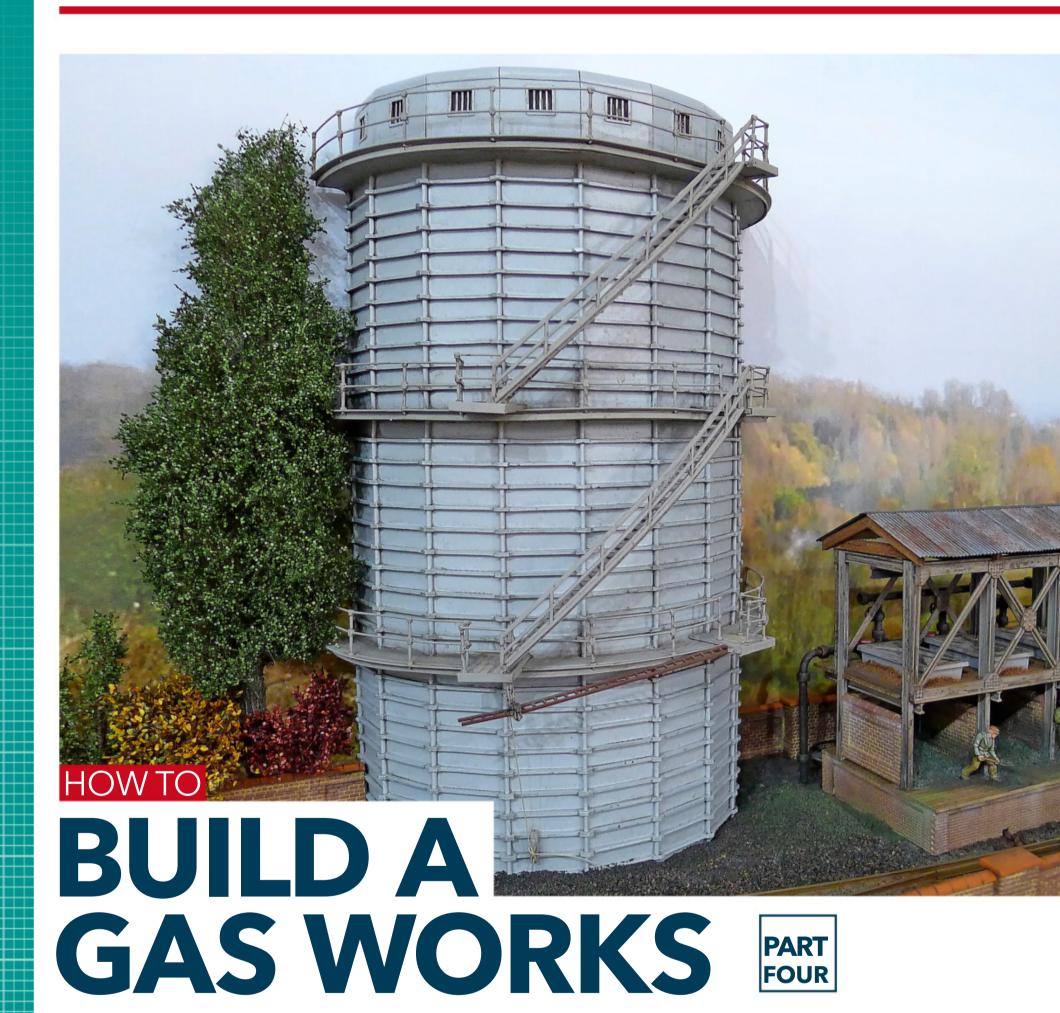
TIPS FROM THE DAY JOB

I photograph scenes on the real railway and, as well as covering the contemporary scene, I also enjoy recreating real life steam-era scenes at various preserved railways. For example, Didcot Railway Centre's original GWR engine shed allows me to be creative, using the authentic grime and grease that covers the surrounding ground.

Using basic backlighting techniques that I would usually use on a photoshoot with a full-size steam locomotive, I implemented

the same rules here in my living room while photographing the 'O' gauge diorama. Thanks to the working yard lamps, some very atmospheric nocturnal scenes could be created.

And just to add to the authenticity, I shot these images while the diorama was standing atop a bespoke coffee table which incorporates an original chimney from LMS No. 6201 *Princess Elizabeth*, which I've mounted on casters and finished with a round glass top.



As he nears the end of his mission to recreate a typical Victorian gas works, Richard Simpson upgrades a Bachmann low-relief gas holder.

n previous instalments, we have looked at how I adapted a laser-cut kit of a lineside warehouse into a retort house, I've hacked some fuel tank kits around to create a set of process tanks and I've scratchbuilt a purifier unit. Thus, we have taken care of the various gas-making processes, leaving us with a need for a storage tank, so the gas can be safely retained before it heads off to the customers.

The gas holder - or gasometer - will also serve another vital purpose. A wooden newel post from a staircase is set into the wall, slap-bang in the middle of my backscene. A tall gas holder would provide a perfect means of



hiding that wooden post. Indeed, it was seeing Bachmann's Scenecraft resin low-relief gas holder that gave me the original impetus to build this gas works complex.

My entire gas works model was constructed away from the layout as a self-contained module. This made it easier to build and join the various elements in comfort and made it easier to drop the model into place once complete. The module's base had to be cut carefully to fit within the available space and to provide clearance around the newel post.

The post inevitably dictated the position of the gas holder, so the other buildings and structures would have to fit around it accordingly. The gas holder, being hollow, simply required a square section removing from the base to enable it to sit neatly around the post. Once most of the gas works buildings were complete, I could then turn my attention to the gas holder and consider what could be done to improve it.

POSSIBLE IMPROVEMENTS

Bachmann's Scenecraft low-relief gas holder provides a reasonable representation of a water-sealed type of storage tank, although it

There are plenty of ready-to-plant structures available, providing a sound base for adding detail improvements or modifications to create something more bespoke. Check out what resin and kit items might be available, as they may help you reach your goals that little bit more easily.



The idea behind the entire project was to find a way of hiding the staircase newel post. A low-relief gas holder, from Bachmann Scenecraft, turned out to be ideal, leading me to create a gas works complex.

The Bachmann gasometer is not currently in production, but you can pick them up from online auction sites, shows or swap meets. Prices vary but, if you're planning an upgrade job, it doesn't need to be immaculate.





MATERIALS

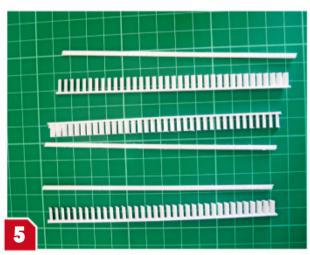
- Bachmann Scenecraft 44-211 low-relief gasometer
- Ratio pack 144, handrail stanchions set
- Evergreen plastic rod 0.5mm diameter.
- Evergreen angle beam strip

Close inspection reveals that the ladders, walkways, landings and handrails are rather chunky and they also lack the uniformity of the prototype - there is plenty of scope for improvement in these areas.



The ledge along one side of the footstep strips was cut away on a modeller's circular table saw. While this may seem like a luxury tool, it's invaluable for creating neat straight cuts and ensuring the detached ledges can be used later.



The first job was to remove the over-scale bits and pieces. Most of them broke away under light pressure, but take care not to damage the walkways. When all this was stripped off, the edges of the walkways were smoothed.

The landings were cut from model boat wooden decking. Careful measuring ensured that the ladders would fit in place with the steps horizontal, so the angle of the stairways had to be determined before glueing



could be argued that it is a little undersize for 4mm scale. Being a relatively modest gas works, as could have been found supplying a small industrial area, the proportions of the tank serve the purpose well. Furthermore, it features suitable structural detailing and ventilation louvres around the top.

What stood out for me, however, was the rather chunky walkways, handrails and stairways. While the overall impression might be acceptable from a few feet away, the deficiencies in the detailing become apparent when up close. So, what could be done to improve the ladders, walkways and handrails?

Several possibilities were pondered. For the

stairways, off-the-shelf components are available from various sources, but few seemed to be able to cope with the curve of the tank. I even toyed with the idea of scratchbuilding but decided that would be a very lengthy process. As with the other sections of the gas works, the model boat world came to the rescue with some plastic moulded ship's companionways. These were made in polystyrene and were significantly neater than the original items and considerably more in scale. The challenge was to then work out how to get them to form the curve of the gas holder as they were fairly rigid. However, after removing one of the sides using a modeller's circular table saw, the ladder

instantly became extremely flexible.
Incidentally, the circular saw ensured a
consistent and accurate cut without
deformation of the steps and left a beautifully
neat and square edge, which helped to form
reliable glue bonds.

Once the issue with the stairways was resolved, the remaining necessary bits and pieces were sourced. The landings were made from wooden decking section, the handrails from Ratio stanchions (fitted with plastic rail rather than the supplied wire). Plenty of Evergreen plastic angle was used to form the staging framework and a painting and weathering job blended everything together.

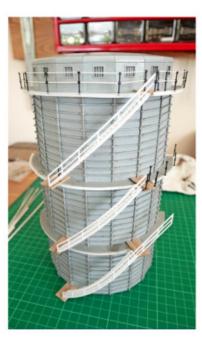
With the platforms secured, the steps could be added. They were cut to keep the treads horizontal and also ensure the curve followed the profile of the gasometer. Again, these were glued in place with ероху.



When the glue on the steps had set thoroughly, the outer edges could be replaced. The edges cut away earlier were re-fitted, secured with liquid poly cement while being clamped in place with tweezers and pegs.



The Ratio stanchions were installed into pre-drilled holes. Evergreen 0.5mm styrene rod was threaded through the stanchions and secured with liquid poly. The stairway handrails were cut to meet the adjacent stanchions.





The upper two walkways and ladders are now complete. Already, the structure looks much more convincing. After a test fit, I realised the lower steps would have to be removed, as they would stand too close to the track.

To protect the attractive factory finish, the main structure was masked with low-tack tape before a coat of acrylic grey was applied from an aerosol. The primer had to be sprayed from many different angles to ensure even coverage.



With the mask removed, there was a pleasing variation in texture and colour between the original paint and the new parts. A pivoting ladder replaced the lower stairway, which came from a model boat fittings supplier.



The ladder was fitted. This allowed the ladder to swing into a location below the adjacent platform where it would be secured by tying the rope up on a cleat.





Weathering was kept to a minimum to avoid making the tank too dirty and unrealistic. The entire unit was painted with a brown weathering wash, while the platforms and ladders received a darker shade.



The lower ladder was also given a wash and dry pigment to tone down the brown paint. The platforms were enhanced by rubbing the paint away in high traffic areas using abrasive paper, allowing the wooden planking to show through.





The newel post was carefully trimmed by a few inches, leaving sufficient strength for the mounting screw in the wall. The base of the hollow gasometer simply needed cutting to fit around the post (this was done before the new details were installed). The edges will eventually be hidden by trees to blend it in.



The gasometer is seen here on the gas works module, prior to fitting to the layout. The base will be located by small wooden battens glued around the edge to keep the Gasometer held up against the back scene.

BUILD A STONE RAIL OVERBRIDGE

Peter Marriott trials double-track bridge building using foam sheet.

oam pieces and Styrofoam are good materials for making scenery and the basis of structures on a model railway, including buildings, retaining walls, bridges and other features. I used it as the basis for building a 'folly' in issue 302. After completing the 'folly' I decided to try the same process on a railway-related structure. Using hard foam is easy, because it cuts quickly if you have the right tools such as the Woodland Scenics Hot Wire Foam Cutter or Foam Knife which both create very little mess. The Foam Knife is very useful because the blade is 5cm long which is a lot longer than normal craft knives, allowing you to cut thicker foam easily.

I decided to have a go at building a masonry rail overbridge and it's supporting



walls from 4 mm light green hard foam sheet purchased in Europe a few years ago. I based this project on a bridge I found on a section of main line in Switzerland, but the style of the structure is not so very different to modern bridges found within the UK.

The finished bridge was strong enough, looks good and I had the satisfaction of not taking it straight out of its packaging or buying a kit. It seems to me to be a good way of assembling a bespoke scenic feature and, for the bridge itself, the materials cost less than £5. Which makes me think I might be using similar materials and techniques again!

Woodland scenics sub terrain system

The Woodland Scenics Sub Terrain System is an extensive range of pieces that are manufactured from polystyrene. It includes raised track bed pieces that are flexible, flat boards, Profile Boards for around the sides of a layout and incline pieces for taking the track to a different level. These components are light in weight and can be used to fit specific height and incline requirements.

It is really important to study the prototype before beginning a build. My subject is a section of Swiss main line, but there are plenty of British examples too. Note the 'wings' of the tunnel (which feature heavier weathering than the stonework under the bridge span), the various types of fencing and the gravel track.



I shaped two old paintbrushes, a shorter squarer one for the main stonework and one with a longer shape that I could use for the base stones. Gently push the open end of the paintbrush along the piece of hard foam in rows. It might seem to be a tedious task but it is quite therapeutic!



A two inch Woodland Scenics Riser raises the track bed off the baseboard so that I could accommodate the rail overbridge. Before committing I made a mock-up of the bridge which showed me that two sections of riser were needed because it's a double-track line.



The farm track under the bridge has a slope leading up to the rear. I replicated this from cut-down pieces of foam that would later be covered with plaster cloth. The base for the track bed was also made from a piece of foam.



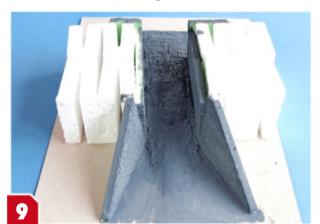
I detailed the process of creating stonework in foam in my Folly article in MR302, so I'll only outline it here. Use a pair of pliers to firstly remove all of the bristles from an old paintbrush, then to shape the end of the brush into a rectangular shape like a stone.



I pushed the stone indentations on the foam sheet then cut the pieces of the walls from the main sheet using a steel ruler and Swann-Morton knife over a self-sealing cutting mat. The foam cuts very easily. I had these foam sheets in stock but I could have used Woodland Scenics Assorted Foam Sheets C1177 instead.



I assembled the bridge as a separate unit to be installed on the layout when finished. I used a piece of thin cardboard for the sub-baseboard and Foam Tack Glue to fix the pieces together, holding the pieces together with foam nails as the glue dried.



The base of the track was covered with plaster cloth and then left to dry before the first coat of paint was applied on the stonework. The first layer of acrylic paint was applied with a wide paintbrush to cover all the stonework gaps.

Once the Foam Tack Glue had dried I removed the foam nails and filled in the small holes left with Deluxe Materials Create and Shape, being careful not to fill in the surrounding grooves between the stonework.



The farm track was brushed with Scenic Glue followed by fine sand from Noch. This was sprinkled over the wet glue and left to dry for several hours. Once dry, the excess sand was shaken off to reuse.

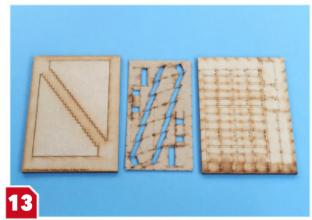

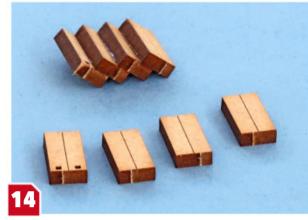
After adding a few static grass fibres, the bridge is starting to look more like the real thing. I planted a layer of light green 2mm fibres first, then overplanted some 4mm medium green fibres in some places for variation.



Once I was happy I put the risers in place and began to incorporate the bridge into the scene. The embankments were built up using plaster cloth laid across the top of the track bed.



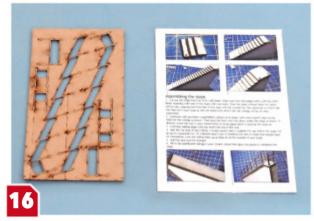
To make the steps I used the Scale Model Scenery quayside steps LK291-00, using fewer than half of the components in the kit. I found that by gently pressing the pieces they came out of the backing sheet quick easily.



These are the individual steps. Each step has a line for positioning it correctly. Every fourth step has a hole in it to take the base pin of the handrail. At the top of the picture this is what the assembled steps look like.



I found it easier to assemble batches of four together and once the adhesive had dried I put a dab of white glue under each of the steps and fixed them to the base template. After all of the steps were added I positioned the unit next to the wall and installed plaster cloth around it.



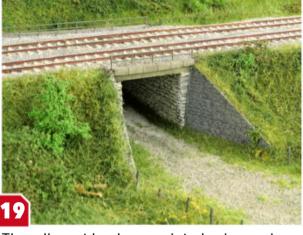
The handrails were lightly painted brown with acrylic paints before removal from the backing sheet. I put a small blob of white glue on the base of the supporting pins and removed the excess with a paintbrush, fitting them in the holes in the steps.

Here, the steps and handrails are in position. The other fences were plastic railings by Faller 180403 and etched railings by 4D Modelshop. I cut the Faller iron railing fence off its sprues using sprue cutters and left just half of the locating pins on the base of the fences - not all of them need to be used.

I needed to make some capping sections so went back to the foam sheet. After the capping pieces were painted with concrete acrylic paint Faller railings were added with small holes carefully drilled into the top of the capping using a pin vice.



The adjacent land was painted using various Woodland Scenics Undercoats, green and earth. Layers of scenic materials were then added including static grass fibres to produce a textured and overgrown look to the embankment.

This is the entire scene once individual plants, bushes and colour textures had been added. Having a tractor on the farm track adds to the 'real world' appearance of the scene and gives another point of interest away from the track.

HOW TO

CREATE A UNIQUE SET OF BUFFERSTOPS



In the June issue of *Model Rail* (MR300), George created a bufferstop from a grounded gunpowder van. He wrote that he'd been unable to find photographic proof that these existed in reality – surely this could never have happened, as they would not

offer proper protection compared to a 'real' set of stop blocks. Ray Hoffmann, by email

George says: The responses to my suggestion of utilising a grounded van as a bufferstop have been fascinating. A few readers insisted such a thing was unthinkable and, as I wrote at the time, I'd been unable to find any archive images to prove that they did really exist at Machynlleth goods yard in steam days.

However, David Watson advised that a suitable image could be found on the rear cover of a HMRS book, *All about GWR Iron Minks*, by J. Lewis, M. Lloyd, R. Metcalf and N. Miller (published in 1980). I managed to order a copy online via Abe Books and, just after it arrived, Chris Barrett emailed a link to another useful image on The Transport Library website, which is reproduced below.

While the images proved that the ex-GWR van bufferstops did exist at Machynlleth, they also showed that



I'd made an error in my original choice of wagon type. Instead of a gunpowder van, the wagons in question were GWR Iron Minks, of a type built in the early 1900s. What really grabbed my attention was the addition of fully equipped headstocks, with buffers and even drawhooks, mounted on the ends of the van bodies. Lengths of flat-bottom rail are also visible beneath the vans, and I wonder if they formed part of the anchoring system.

Now that I had reference images to hand, a second attempt was made at recreating the scene in miniature. Despite its ubiquity, the GWR Iron Mink has not been available in true RTR format in 'OO', although Rapido

Trains UK is currently developing a wide range of variants. Cutting a pair of these wagons up would probably be a shame and, besides, I didn't want to wait. Therefore, a pair of Parkside plastic kits was obtained, and these proved simple to modify and assemble. They're still not exactly right, as they feature a different pattern of side doors, but they're close enough for my needs.

For the headstocks and buffers, I found a Bachmann wagon chassis in my spares box, recovered from a china clay open which had received a superior kit-built underframe. The two bufferbeams were carefully cut free and the rear face filed flat and smooth. Buffers were already installed, but a pair of drawhooks was required. A set of whitemetal hooks from Lanarkshire Models Supplies was employed (who also offer suitable buffers if required), fixed into slots drilled and cut into the bufferbeams after installation to the van bodies.

At around £10 per bufferstop, they're maybe a little indulgent, but they certainly make for an interesting scenic addition, and I had great fun building and installing them on my new goods yard diorama. They would certainly create some lively discussion if installed on an exhibition layout!

Funnily enough, I recently remembered where I'd originally learnt about Machynlleth's unique bufferstops. They were mentioned in a very brief article in Railway Modeller, although I've no idea which issue. I'm guessing it was from the late 1970s or early 1980s, as I'd been given a job-lot of issues from that period by a friend some years back. I do recall cutting out the image of the iron mink bufferstops, with an eye on recreating the scene, but it must have been misplaced. I'm just glad that it wasn't a figment of my imagination after all!

With thanks to all of the readers who took the time to get in touch on this subject.

The Parkside Iron Mink kit is a close match for the prototypes at Machynlleth and the plastic parts are easy to modify before assembly. With a stout blade, the suspension and brake gear was cut away below the solebar.



The lower faces of the solebars could then be flattened and smoothed with a flat file and sanding sticks. As the van bodies will sit atop the rails, the lower edges will be visible, so it's worth taking the time to get them right.



The bodies were assembled as per the instructions, but the floor was installed upside down (to avoid the need to cut away the raised fittings). Check the corners are square before applying the liquid poly cement from inside.



The roof was secured and clamped, and the bodies left to cure fully. To discern the correct height for the headstocks, the bodies were placed onto a length of track and the buffer height of rolling stock marked onto the end.



The depth of the headstocks was measured and marked in relation to the buffer height centre line and sections cut out of the ribs with a scalpel. The headstocks were cut from a scrap wagon chassis.



The bufferbeams were tacked into position with a tiny amount of poly cement and quickly checked against rolling stock. Any adjustments could then be made.



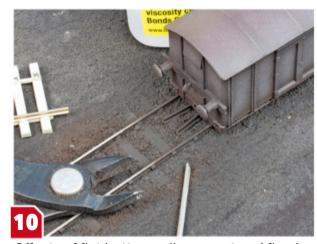
Once happy with the alignment, the bufferbeams were secured with a full application of liquid poly cement and allowed to cure.



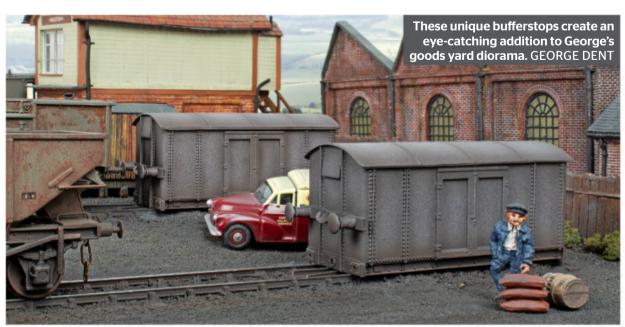
The slots for the drawhooks were formed by drilling three holes in a vertical line in the centre of the bufferbeam. The holes were then cut into slots with the tip of a scalpel. The hooks were secured with cyanoacrylate.



To meet the deadline for this issue, I painted the van bodies quickly with a variety of aerosol primers. A full coat of black was followed by misted coats of brown, grey and red oxide. Finesse was added with an airbrush later.



Offcuts of flat-bottom rail were cut and fixed to the top of the sleepers on my yard sidings. These were also painted and weathered before the vans were fixed in position, glued to the rail heads with cyanoacrylate.





KNOW YOUR... LIVERIES

PART 11B: Class 56 in the privatisation era

Paul Chancellor concludes his two-part history of the Class 56 diesel locomotives, by considering some of the schemes carried during their post-British Rail careers.

ith the Government set on privatising the railways, the Railways Act of 1993 split BR's freight operations into three franchises: Transrail, Loadhaul and Mainline Freight, with BR's former Railfreight locomotive fleet being divided among them.

The 135-strong fleet of Class 56s was split between Transrail and Loadhaul, although they all ended up under the same operator once again when English, Welsh & Scottish (EWS) bought all three of the franchises in 1995, initially monopolising the freight sector. However, EWS chiefs were not impressed by most of BR's aging - and unreliable - locomotives, purchasing 250 Class 66s from GM/EMD to replace them.

Withdrawals of '56s' began in the 1990s, with the surviving locomotives axed in March 2004. Some went to work on the Continent, but the majority were consigned to years in store until EWS' successor, DB Schenker (now DB Cargo) disposed of them for scrap or further use with other operators.

Those chosen for a new lease of life have been refurbished and have carried a colourful range of liveries, for operators including Fastline Freight, DCR, UKRL and Colas. In more recent years, GBRf acquired a number of '56s', albeit for re-engineering with an entirely new traction package. This project is still ongoing, with the modified locomotives emerging as Class 69.

The career of the Class 56 could be described as chequered, but the remaining locomotives still have plenty to offer, not least in terms of colour schemes to be replicated in miniature!

Rail liveries, such as the engineers' 'Dutch' scheme seen above. Unlike Loadhaul and Mainline, Transrail stuck with the existing colour schemes, simply applying its 'Big T' logo and lettering. 56047 models this arrangement at Eastleigh in 1997. COLOUR RAIL

While Loadhaul developed a striking new livery, which proved popular with enthusiasts (and model manufacturers), it also applied its logo atop existing BR liveries as an interim measure. The full scheme is seen on 56039, fresh from the paint shop at Doncaster in July 1994. D. PYE/COLOUR RAIL



The Transrail logo looked much more at home on former Railfreight sector locomotives, as seen on Romanian-built 56010 at Margam in May 1997. COLOUR RAIL

In 2004, EWS withdrew the whole of its remaining fleet of Class 56s. Overseas work beckoned for some '56s', however, with a small fleet being refurbished and repainted before being loaned to Fertis. 56032 stands ready for dispatch in 2005. COLOUR RAIL

Engineering contractor Jarvis launched a short-lived freight operation, Fastline, leading to the acquisition and refurbishment of three '56s' in 2005. Renumbered in the '56/3' series, they were painted in a stylish grey and black livery. The company also bought six new Class 66s, but the operation lasted just five years before Jarvis entered administration. 56302 (ex 56124) is seen running through Barnetby in 2007. COLOUR RAIL







A venture destined to fail was Devon & Cornwall Railways (DCR) owned by British American Railway Services (BARS). Former Fastline 56303 (formerly 56125) was initially acquired by Fragonset before being bought by BARS in 2011. This simple dark green scheme was employed, with large DCR logos. COLOUR RAIL

Notes from the Workshop DAVE LOWERY'S TOP TIPS

n my experience of building kits - etched brass kits in particular - you plough through the main construction with reasonable care and endeavour, ending up with something approaching 80% complete. And then there are those final small pieces that, if left off, wouldn't really spoil the model too much. But, at the same time, you would know that you really should have taken the time and effort to finish it off properly.

Such was the case with a brass kit for the Freightliner FLA 'low-liner' intermodal wagon, which has a lot of in-fills to the outriggers. Two such parts which fit into the centre ends of the wagon needed to be fitted.

I made sure the part was the correct shape for the hole it would fit into, before soldering a piece of brass rod to it so I could offer it into place. Only when alignment was perfect was the part soldered properly.

Because the main body is layered, there is a lot of brass involved. Therefore, to solder the parts into place requires a lot of heat.

When the soldering iron was offered to the job, it could only produce small tacking blobs of solder, rather than flooding the joint evenly. This was purely down to the volume of brass, which was effectively sucking the heat out of the iron's tip.

Clearly, a more effective source of heat was required, which is where my Proxxon mini blow torch comes into its own. After adding flux to the surface and applying heat, those tacking blobs of solder applied with the iron are re-melted. The flux encourages the molten solder to flow freely into the joints. Furthermore, the tack-soldered bond holding the aforementioned brass rod



Where there are plates soldered over the main body, an uneven film of solder is likely to have built up around the edges. This can be flattened using an end miller in a power drill or a flat file.

support was also melted, allowing the rod to be removed at the same time... a good result all round!

Once all the brass work is complete and the model washed in soapy water and allowed to thoroughly dry, it is time to remove excess solder after filling any gaps. For this job, I use milling tools to fit into my power hand drill.

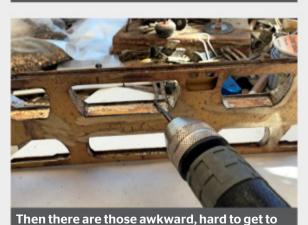
I used an end miller to remove solder



Over the years, I have collected plenty of metal weights from older 'OO' diesel locomotives.
They make for excellent clamping tools, holding parts securely during soldering.



The part was tack-soldered in place, and then coated in flux. Using a small blow torch, the solder will be re-melted and will flow easily into the joints, while the supporting rod will drop off. Be sure to work on a heat-resistant surface!



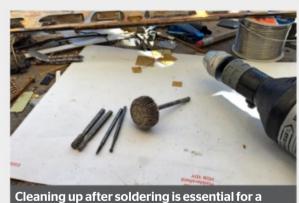
areas such as within these inner channels of the wagon body frame. For this, I used a small ball burr tool that cleaned the worst of the excess solder away.

from the ends of the brass plates, flapper wheel sanders to remove solder on flat surfaces and small ball burrs to get into awkward areas to remove surface solder.

Once the model has been thoroughly cleaned, whitemetal castings and/or 3D-printed parts can be added. More cleaning will follow, before primer is applied and we'll be ready to start painting.



Some of the parts on this FLA wagon kit were difficult to hold in position while soldering, so I soldered a piece of brass rod to the part, which was then used to hold it in position.



good paint job. Always wash in water and detergent to remove traces of flux. Mechanical cleaning can follow. A variety of sanding drums, milling bits and a mini drill can do the job quickly.



Finally, for the flat surfaces of the wagon body plating, a good old flapper abrasive wheel in the mini drill did the trick. Make sure you hold it square to the job, so the solder is removed evenly.

HOW TO

IMPROVE RESIN PAVEMENTS

Q

I recently bought some Bachmann Scenecraft 'OO' gauge pavement sections but, when I opened the packet,

I realised that they were overly thick, at around 4mm. That makes them a scale 1ft tall above the road surface, so pedestrians will need to be rather agile to cross the road! Do you have any ideas about how I can make them look more realistic?

Peter says: The guys at Bachmann Europe inform me that the depth of the pavement sections are the minimum that can be achieved with the resin casting process, without the risk of warping or breakage. However, after a bit of experimentation, I've come up with a few options to minimise the height, or the perception of excess height.

Firstly, the road surface can be raised by cutting and laying strips of card or mounting board, with the resin pavement sections fixed direct to the baseboard. Most mounting board is 1.5mm or 2mm thick, so that would reduce the scale height of the pavement to a more respectable 6in.

Off-cuts of the same card could also be



fixed on the other side of the pavement, to give buildings and structures a bit of a 'leg-up'. You may need to add a couple of layers of card to get the buildings flush with the top of the pavement.

A simpler and quicker option is to paint the road surface directly onto the baseboard, while also painting half-way up the edge of the pavement's kerbstones. I tried this approach and, from most angles, the eye is fooled into thinking

that the kerb is not as tall as it actually is.

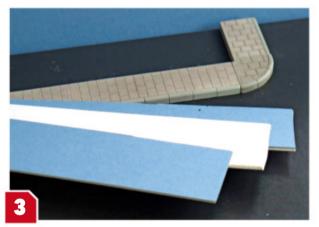
Another useful tip to improve the fit of the pavement sections is to rub the ends with an abrasive pad to ensure the mating faces are flat and square. Always wear a mask when sanding, filing or cutting resin, as the dust can be harmful. When glueing the pavement to the surface, put a dab of PVA glue on the ends, which will partially fill any remaining gaps. Wipe away any excess from the surface with a damp swab.



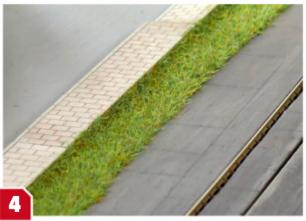
Bachmann Scenecraft paving is available as straight sections (with and without drop kerbs) and corner pieces (ref. 44-563 and 44-564). They're available from all Bachmann retailers.



Use a razor saw to cut the sections to the required length, tidying up the edges with sanding sticks or a flat file. Be sure to wear a mask and vacuum away the dust immediately, then wash your hands.



Mounting card is a good way of building up land behind the pavement to support buildings. It can also be used to form the road, thus reducing the pavement height, but cutting and shaping pieces of card will take time.



If buildings are not going to be installed against the pavement edge, static grass and/ or scatter material will fill any gaps and create a seamless transition from the paving to the adjacent land.



To paint the road surface, I used WW Scenics Black Peat Wet Mud, which is a nice thick acrylic paint. I used a flat paintbrush and just a single coat was necessary.



The paint was also applied to the lower half of the kerb edge, to disguise the height of the resin paving sections. This offered a very quick solution and the visual effect is pretty convincing.



Norfolk bunch

He may have modelled a relatively obscure village, but Alan Price's largely scratchbuilt layout gets far more recognition than you might imagine.

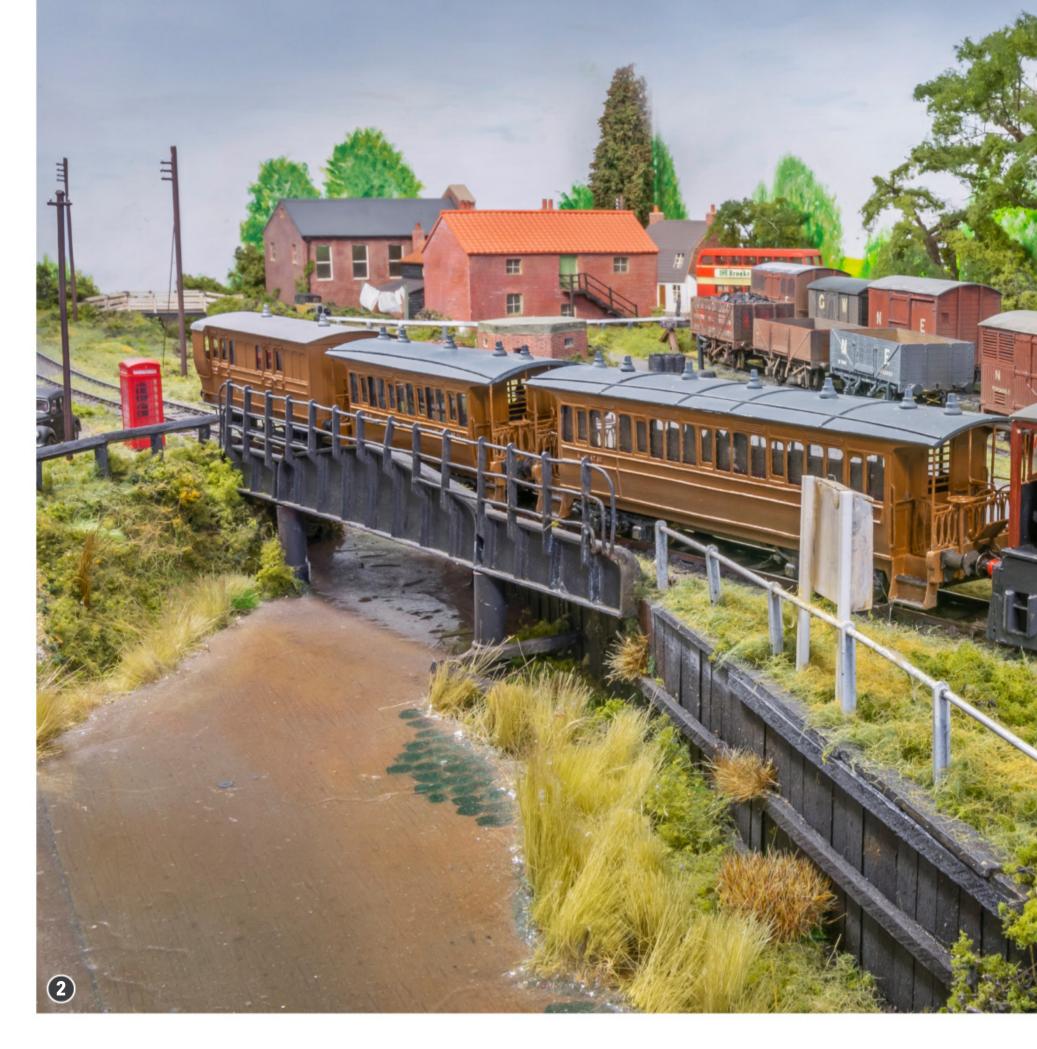

'OO' GAUGE LAYOUT **OUTWELL VILLAGE**

e have a question for you. What do you think is the most easily recognised section of railway in the United Kingdom? By a section of railway, we don't mean a station with its grand infrastructure but a part of the line that's out in the open. Your mind may jump to places such as Glenfinnan Viaduct, but if you aren't familiar with the Harry Potter film franchise then that could easily pass you by. Alan Price thinks he has found the answer with his 'OO' gauge exhibition layout though, as he says somebody always recognises it when he's out and about. 'Outwell Village' is so named because, unsurprisingly, it's based in Outwell on the Wisbech & Upwell tramway with its distinctive 'J70' tram engines.

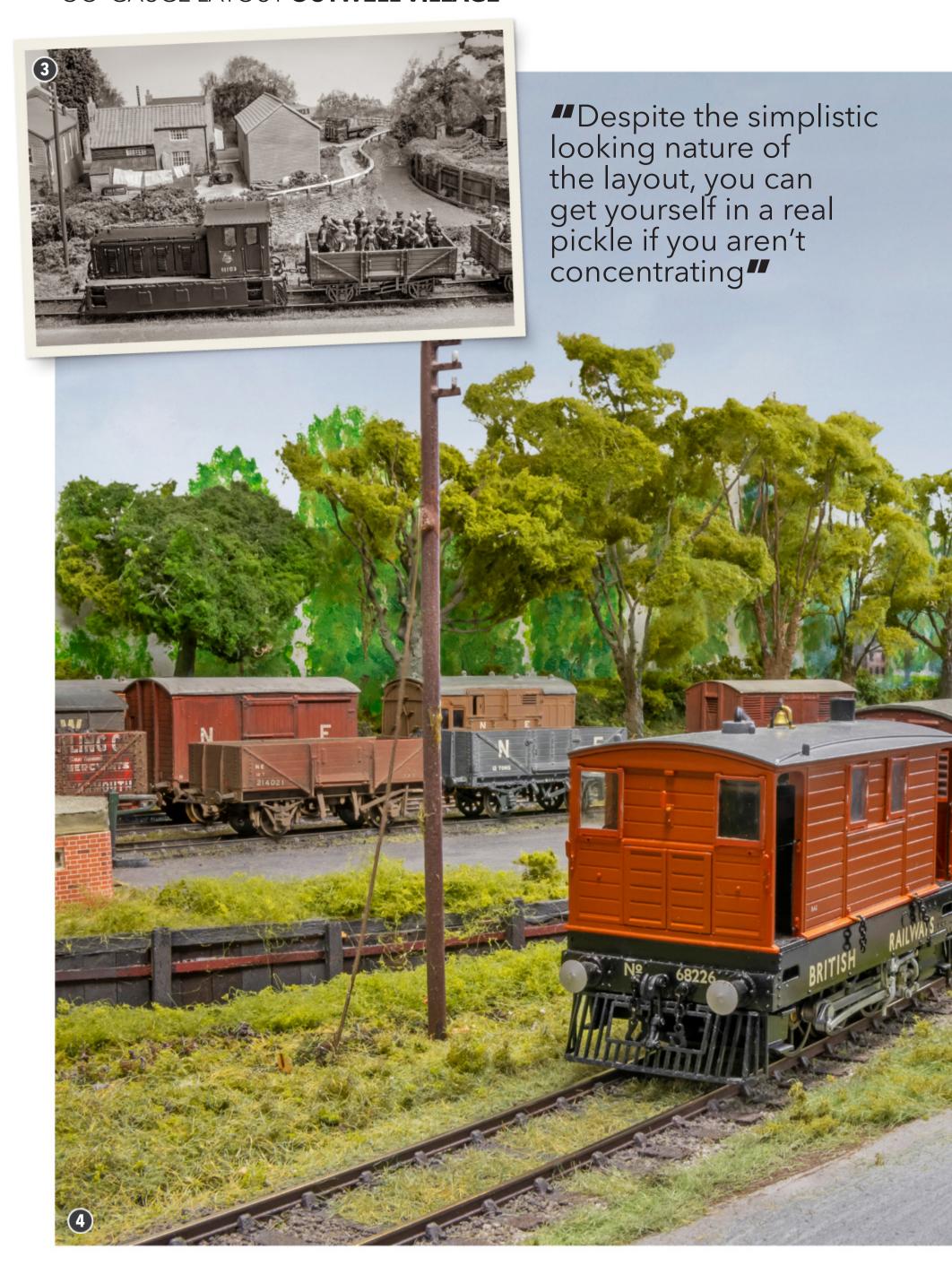
"There's no other layout on the exhibition circuit like it," claims Alan, who has been building and exhibiting 'Outwell Village' for almost 20 years. "We first started the build in 2001 when my friend Neil Rushby and I were both members of the York Model Railway Club. Deciding that, between us, we wanted to build a new exhibition layout, we immediately encountered our first problem. I like the steam era and Neil likes diesels, but after finding the tramway in some books from a charity shop we discovered that if we set it in the 1945-1965 era we could satisfy both of our desires by running steam and diesel on the same line. This was made even easier by the fact that I had enough stock to run both LNER and BR eras. When Neil left the club to live in Wales





things we like The trees are made from multi-strand wire coated with Artex and covered with flock. There are two layers of water, the original varnish and the new Woodland Scenics EasyPour Health and safety officers would never allow this sort of thing today!

'Outwell Village' came entirely into my hands, and in the following years after I joined the East Riding Finescale Group in Hull, they have helped me to upgrade the layout, while Neil Ripley from the group painted the backscene."

As it was built with exhibitions in mind, Alan has had to continually think not just about what the layout looks like, but how it will be transported and operated over the course of a show.

"The total size is 16ft by 2ft but this splits into four sections with the middle two being scenic and each end having a 4ft fiddleyard comprising several storage roads and a turntable, so that I can always have models facing the right way. Despite the simplistic looking nature of the layout, you can get yourself in a real pickle if you aren't concentrating throughout, as things can easily end up in the wrong place when operating, so it really keeps me on my toes during the weekend."

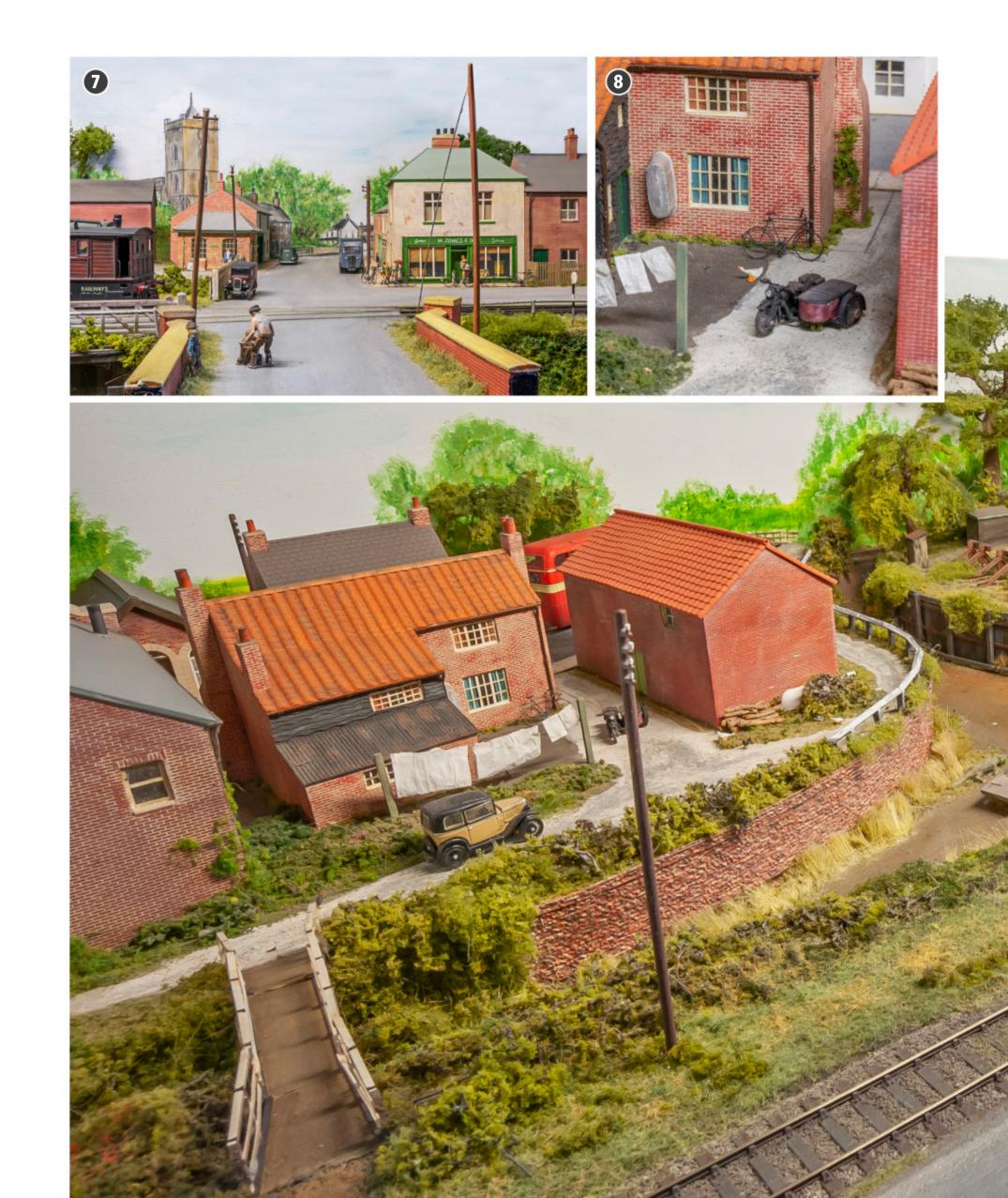
Modelling a small Norfolk village has, inevitably, forced Alan to scratchbuild all of his buildings to make them authentic. Not content with just that though, he's taken it one step further, making his track and locomotives from scratch as well.

"When I started, getting track off the shelf to fit my plan was very difficult and building it by hand was just cheaper, so I've used Code 75 SMP products to make the track and points. Most of the locomotives are kits and

there is the odd ready-to-run model, but a few have been created out of brass on the bottom half with Black Beetle motors providing the power. As all the weight is at the bottom, I could simply use plastic card for the top half. They didn't take as long to make as you might think – one can be done in a couple of days if you put your mind to it, and working from the drawings by Iain Rice in an article written a long time ago made life even easier. All I had to do was follow the instructions."

As with the vast majority of modellers who are trying to recreate a real building, Alan had to do a

lot of research before beginning the construction, which involved the usual task of counting bricks.

"I used the classic technique of knowing how high the door is and counting the number of bricks to get the total height of the building. Fortunately for me, some of the buildings are still there today, so there were plenty of photographs for me to work from. I always make a mock-up out of card first to check that everything is going to fit the way I want it before building them from plastic card and embossed plastic sheets to give the exterior texture. When you go through the whole layout you realise just how much plastic card there is at 'Outwell Village', as both the rail crossing bridge and the

sunken boat are made out of it."

We often speak about the difficulties modellers face when creating their layouts, be it with building sturdy baseboards, plucking up the courage to do wiring or getting the scenery to look just right. Sometimes, the thought of doing it is so off-putting that the layout never gets off the ground, or other modellers are drafted in to help out. Alan decided though that for his first personal layout he would tackle everything head-on and, as long as he did enough planning and research beforehand, believed everything would go as desired.

"I feel as though I can turn my hand to everything, so when things got a bit tough I simply took a step back and considered how they would have solved the same problem in real life. The materials aren't the same, of course, but the order in which things get built and added to the scene invariably will be. I followed that mindset throughout and it seemed to work for me."

It has been Alan's intention, since 'Outwell Village' was finished, to exhibit it an average of four times a year. Of course, the past few years have meant it hasn't been on the circuit as much as he would have liked, but Alan is already booked up to 2023. You'll be able to next see it in action at the Aldershot show in October, and with it being so recognisable you should have no problems picking it out in the exhibition hall.

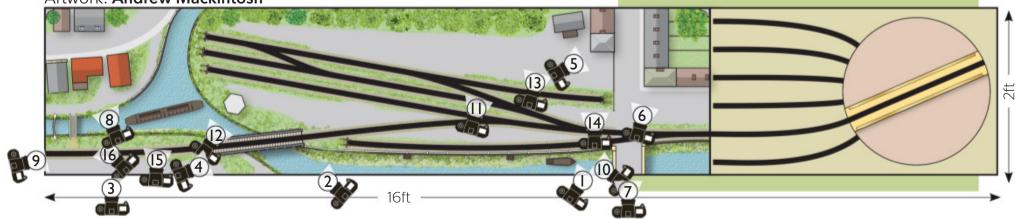

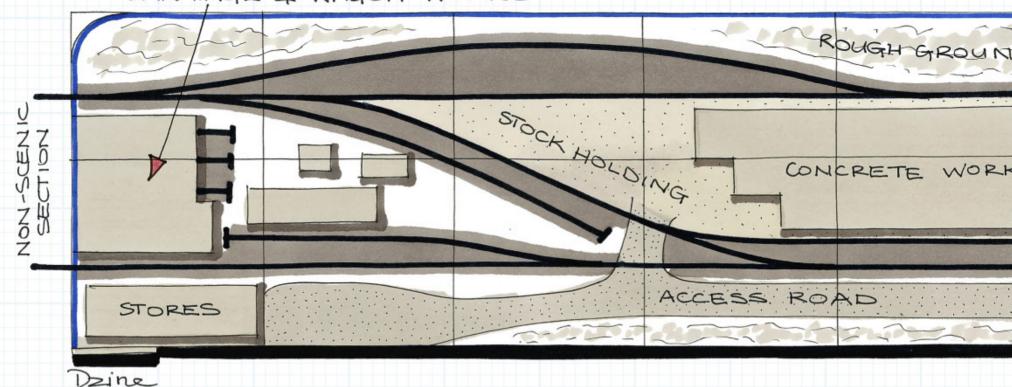

CONCRETE

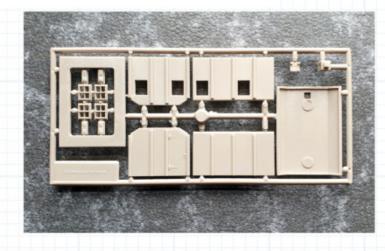
CONSTRUCTION

Paul A. Lunn explores the many uses for this versatile material on the network, and the works that produced it.

hile many drool over grand buildings on the network, I've always loved a solitary lineside hut framed within the countryside. Depending on style and material, they say so much about a railway company; whether it be the corrugations of the Great Western Railway or concrete, the preferred material of choice of the Southern Railway. The latter, a particular favourite, can be excellently portrayed with Ratio's plastic kit No. 518. Always on the lookout for new ideas, particularly layout designs that are rarely, modelled, I wonder how many of us have considered a concrete works, such as Exmouth Junction. It closed in 1963 and work then transferred to Taunton concrete works until 1995. so there's plenty of scope for including one, no matter your modelling period. See elsewhere in the article for this and other examples.

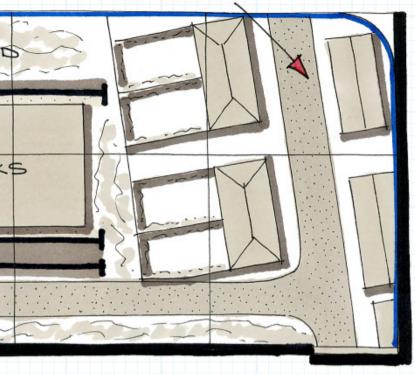
Ratio's No. 518 plastic kit is an ideal source that can be cut into relevant components. In real life, the panels are held in reinforced 'H' section 'posts' (like modern concrete garden fence posts) and you can see these moulded on as thick ribs on all four sides. When cut apart, you might want to put a

shallow cut in both sides or, alternatively, use a relevant Plastruct 'I' section. The wooden doors could be stacked on pallets or similar, same for the metal windows, chimney sections and complete roof. You could also show some huts in different degrees of construction. Let's take a look now at a whole variety of huts, starting with a couple of entry-level makeovers, following with a prototype gallery and ending by revisiting more concrete works.

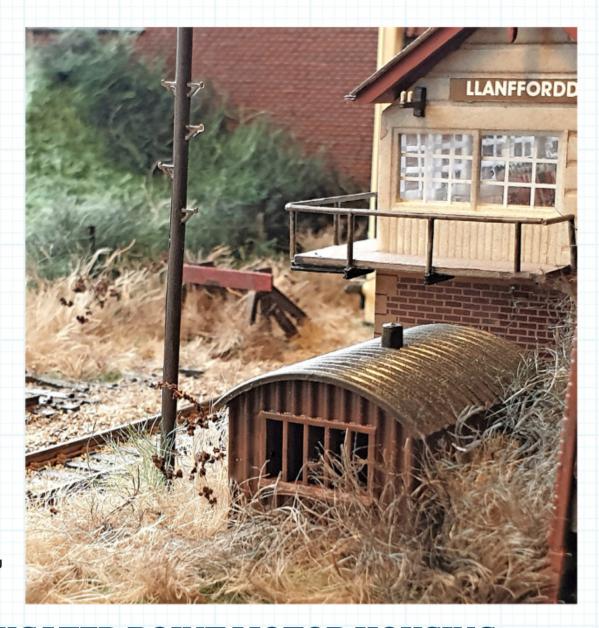




MOUNT PLEASANT ROAD



The SR/BR Concrete Works at Exmouth Junction fits perfectly, for 'OO' gauge, in a 7ft by 1ft 8in board, together with an additional short non-scenic section left. If you're tight on space you can reduce the scenic to approximately 5ft 8in long by omitting Mount Pleasant Road, the houses and gardens that back onto the right-hand end of the works.



BUILD HORNBY'S CORRUGATED POINT MOTOR HOUSING

I chose Hornby's R8015 for my 'Bargain Shunt' layout because it's a proportionately well-sized structure overall, though individual corrugated 'ribs' are grossly over-scale, even if representing larger ribbed asbestos sheet. Reducing the slightly vibrant colour scheme and setting it in an area of overgrown weeds doesn't resolve the problem entirely, but it certainly helps distract the eye.

Step 1: Start by separating the base from the hut and removing the point operating arm. I painted the base in an acrylic cream, Hobby Color FS335310, and after a long drying time, stippled with a thinned down Humbrol Dark Brown Wash, for a dated concrete look.





Step 2: The dark brown makes a huge difference and you can clearly see the contrast between the original cream plastic colour and the deeper effect of Humbrol's Wash. You may want to do a couple of layers, so make sure you allow adequate drying time between.

Step 3: Build up the vegetation slowly and start at the lowest level first. Note how I've almost encased parts of the hut in a swathe of tall autumnal weeds, particularly around the rear where access for maintenance is almost non-existent.



TRI-ANG/HORNBY PLATELAYERS' HUTS

These models have considerable history, originating with Hornby-Dublo and appearing in the Tri-ang catalogue as R84 (R84/1, R84/2 and R84/3) after the takeover, and more recently as part of Trackside Accessory Pack R574. When looking at entry-level models I always assess what can be improved. These are fabulous examples - fine and proportionately pleasing. In considering a makeover, never be afraid to be demanding in your assessment. There are shortcomings, but all are easy to deal with. So, here's the list; no hole in the chimney top, the chimney stack is plain with no hint of brickwork, the windows are a little small and frameless and, most noticeably, are two bulges, one above the window on the larger hut and one below the end window on the smaller one. There are mould releasing slopes on either side of the doors on both models, but these are not so noticeable if you re-shape and have the doors open. That said, only improve those things that can be seen and remember – some inappropriate features can be hidden rather than cut out.





Begin by removing any mould lines on the chimney stack by lightly sanding. Create a gap wide enough to fit Metcalfe brick paper, between the chimney wall and roof, using a razor saw. Take great care when sawing so as to not mark the main walls. Clean the gap and sand the chimney side wall with wet and dry paper.







Carefully cut out the door, ready for refitting but in an open position. Don't worry if the door doesn't come out cleanly, as using a file, you'll then clean and square up both the door frame and the door itself. Keep the door safely on one side until ready for re-setting.



You can see clearly here just how much material is lost when you saw a door out of an opening. Note how I've also increased window height and tested out my potential window sill. To make it fit, use microstrip to re-pack outer edges, raise the ground level at the base, trim and sand where necessary.



This is how the hut looks with everything back in place and looking more inviting with the door open. Normally, at this point, I'd continue with the makeover, but I'm particularly keen to finish the smaller hut for my layout and it will give time for the glue to set on the larger version.



SMALL HUT

When positioned on my layout, you won't be able to see the doorway, so I don't need to make any improvements on this side of the building.

Other than this, I started with the same stages as the larger hut and then continued as follows.

Step 1: Ream out the window aperture using a flat file. Here's a little trick to file the upper window edge by 'hanging' the chimney over the side of a piece of thick MDF or similar board. It protects the chimney and gives support to the pressure from filing. You can see the full reamed-out and squared-up window here, together with the first piece of brick sheeting glued in place with neat PVA.

Step 2: Now add guttering. I used Ratio No. 538. On the left-hand side, I've added a corner section made up of two pieces and mitred at 45° where they join. The assembly was then glued, using cyanoacrylate, to the underside of the roof at the rear. A further straight section was then added to the right-hand side.

Step 3: I had an old pack of Ratio oil barrels lying around in my spares jar. These are made up of two identical halves to be glued together. I drilled out a deeper-than-required hole so I could push the downpipe further in than required and pull it back out to meet the guttering underside. Then you can glue it in place.

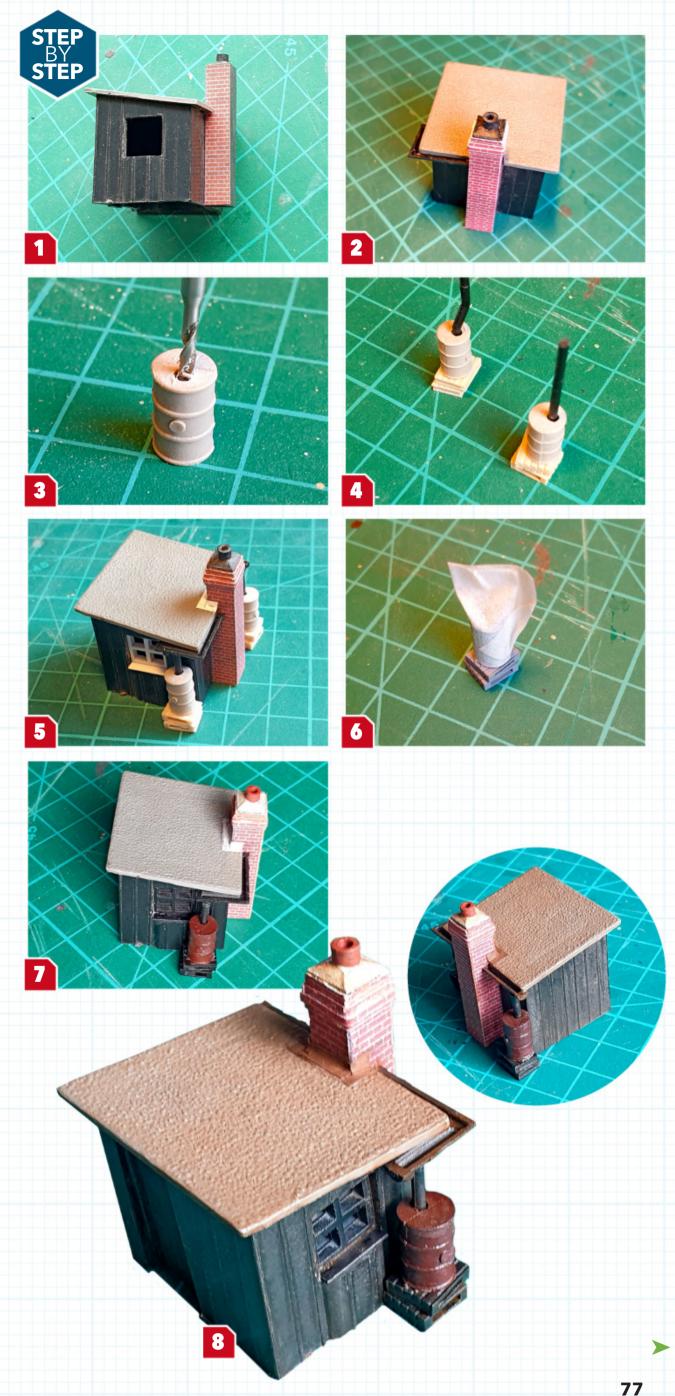
Step 4: I cut two pallets into smaller squares, a little larger than the barrel base, and stacked them to create a base for the barrel. I was also trying out straight and angled pipes to see which would look best.

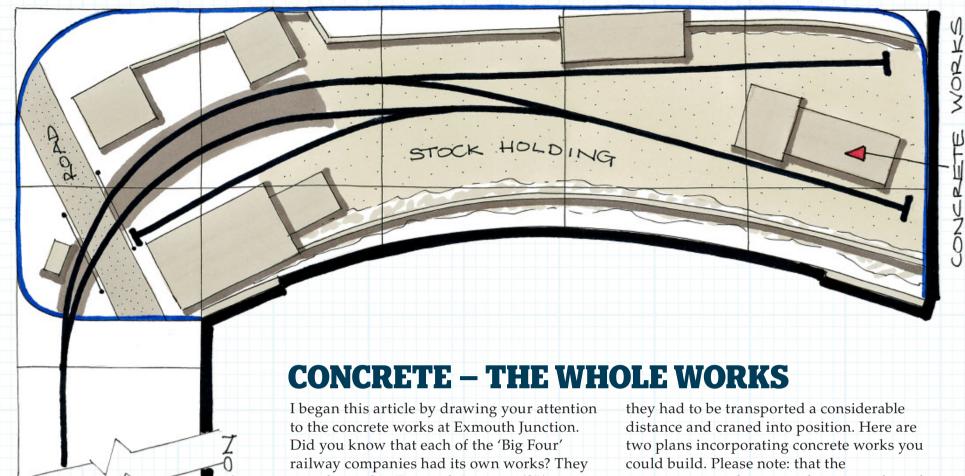
Step 5: I've always thought the lack of flashing around chimneys and the like, especially on the most visible of roofs, is a most noticeable failing and, while fiddly, it's not that difficult to undertake. I made a template from scrap paper. In this way you can make it again until you get the perfect fit. At this point, it's worth checking that everything looks OK and fits well together. It's now time to get on with some serious painting.

Step 6: Mask out the barrels using ordinary decorator's masking tape, but take care to be really accurate. Spray with Halfords Acrylic Silk Black and remove the tape when dry.

Step 7: Here's the raw colour without weathering - note how I've painted the barrels an acrylic 'reddish' brown, from Kobra HP 940. I sprayed a little bit into a container and painted it on with a good quality fine brush.

Step 8: Weathering was undertaken using Humbrol Dark Brown Wash, very thinned down with white spirit, working with light coats all the time. If you're not sure, practise on paper or inside the hut, where it can't be seen. All that remains before fitting onto my layout is a concrete or sleeper base, but that's another story!





I began this article by drawing your attention to the concrete works at Exmouth Junction. Did you know that each of the 'Big Four' railway companies had its own works? They were located at Exmouth Junction (SR), Taunton (GWR), LMS Newton Heath and York (LNER). They were all responsible for prefabricated and cast in situ products, made from reinforced concrete, and despite the SR taking the lead, in the early 1900s, there was much scepticism about its use, even up to the 1950s. The advantages of prefabricated concrete are that it's quick to produce, durable and relatively cheap. However, reinforcement can easily fail when water ingress causes rusting, expansion and cracking, especially on lampposts or other 'thin' items. Although convenient to build in great numbers, often

they had to be transported a considerable distance and craned into position. Here are two plans incorporating concrete works you could build. Please note: that the accompanying plans are schematic only and while track arrangements and principal structures are quite accurate, albeit made to fit within a particular baseboard size, much else is either fictional or repositioned for viewblocking or improved composition.

NARROW GAUGE

GWR's Taunton concrete works, commenced early 1900s and closed in 1995, though it was privatised afterwards. Raw materials largely came from Stoneycombe Quarry.

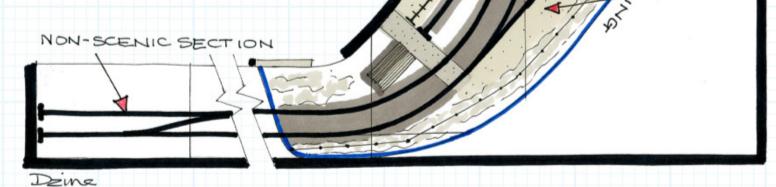
COMMODITIES/PRODUCTS

Most concrete works made some or all of the following; fence posts, platelayers and general huts, sectional buildings, fog huts, bridge sections, platform edging, footbridges, notice boards and posts, mileposts, gradient posts, loading gauges, gate posts, stiles, grit bins, water troughs and lampposts etc. Most items, especially for 'OO' gauge, are available from a variety of manufacturers.

NON-SCENIC

Operationally, you'll have raw materials; cement, aggregates, reinforcing bars/mesh, timber and framing for shuttering inbound, and finished products outbound.

LNER's York Central concrete depot. Opened in 1928, there was a post-war modernisation, and the works were still operational until the late 1980s. Much of the raw materials came from LNER's Hulands Quarry, near Barnard Castle.

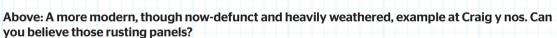
INSPIRATION



Above: Pwllheli Station seems to have a surfeit of GWR-type corrugated huts in various sizes, some with curved roofs, others flat. These are still in current use and appear to be reasonably well looked after as they are useful storage units. Note all the other equipment in setting the scene, particularly oil drums.

Right: It's going to take quite a bit of work to replicate the weathering on this example at Ryde St John's Road but it would be well worth the effort. It looks like a replacement roof, which appears to be rotting to the rear.





Above left: This is one of the longest concrete huts I've seen, based near Poppleton station, on the outskirts of York. Despite its size, it's a very repetitive structure and easy to replicate with boarded-up windows. Note what looks like concrete roof panels too.

Below: Here's a larger example of the standard type gabled roofed, brick-built, weighbridge at Cobra Works, Wakefield. There's a whole range of original features, most noticeable are stone bollards protecting both front corners and then there are all the modern add-ons; Halogen lights, traffic lights, a security camera, a high-level platform and much more.



Above: The weighbridge at Guiseley Station is a quality structure in its stonework and ornate corbelled top. Of course, you see it here long after its original use and it is probably now a store. It's also a typical example of what to do with a window hole when you don't want to mess with adding a frame – just block it up. Note how the far window arch has been filled in with stone, plus the 'over-scale' chimney and weed growth on three visible corners.







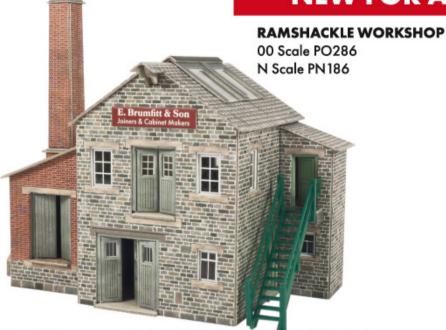

here can be few more remarkable survival and preservation stories than that of NER Electric Autocar No. 3170. Even in the annals of master carriage restorer Stephen Middleton it has to be pretty exceptional. I have long been an admirer of Stephen's work with the restoration of ancient rolling stock, since I first encountered it while working on Railway World back in the 1980s. Yet, remarkably, I had never seen any of his carriages 'in the flesh' until I attended the annual Warley MRC exhibition at the NEC in 2019.

That year, the exhibition centrepiece was NER Electric Autocar No. 3170 and I was instantly captivated. Primitive railway equipment has always fascinated me, particularly the internal combustion-engined type.

The announcement that Rails of Sheffield had commissioned Heljan to produce a ready-to-run NER Autocar in 'OO' was very appealing, but I never actually got around to ordering one. Only when George mentioned reviewing one did I finally 'get my act together'. Rails has issued the model in NER red and white and in LNER 'teak'. It was no contest as far as I was concerned, I wanted the red and white version.

I believe that the version numbered as the restored 3170 has sold out, but I wasn't too worried about the number, I just did not want the 'teak' version.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

Like the Rails/Heljan GWR gas turbine, the Autocar comes in standard Heljan packaging but with the box and lid finished in Rails' distinctive and classy dark green. There's a folded instruction sheet with information and drawings of the real thing and the usual instructions about running-in the model and lubricating it. It is also good to see the minimum radius

(438mm, second radius) clearly stated, as this was an issue with the gas turbine.

As a matter of house-style on *Model Rail* we don't treat railway equipment as 'female'. We don't call locomotives 'she', for instance. However, I'm sorry but there's only one way to describe the model Autocar. It is quite simply, 'cute'. For a start, its scale

53ft 6in overall length is some 50mm shorter than a 'bubble car'. Indeed, for those wanting a minimum space layout that is set in earlier times, the NER Autocar is probably your perfect passenger train. Add a Bachmann 'J72' O-6-OT for the freight traffic and you're set.

One of the first things I noticed is the fitting of tension-lock

couplings. I've grown to dislike these intensely in recent years and unless you plan to build the autocoach, which can be operated with the real Autocar, couplings are redundant. Fortunately, they are fitted in NEM pockets, so they can be removed and the dummy coupling mouldings supplied in the detail bag can be fitted instead.

BODY AND DETAIL

The body is a one-piece plastic moulding on which the detail emphasises that initial 'petite and pretty' impression. The lower sides and ends have vertical match-boarding, interrupted only by the doors with their beading around the edge. There are two sets of double doors at the front, one to the cab and engine area and the other giving access to the passenger vestibule. A single door at the rear gives passenger access to the saloon, and the rear cab is reached through a door in the bulkhead. Passengers at this end

could see through the glazed bulkhead much as they could, years later, in many a DMU.

The ends of the Autocar feature large amounts of glazing and on the model this reveals some fascinating glimpses of the well-detailed interior. However, the glazing does have the familiar 'prismatic' effect around the edges, that afflicts so many models with moulded flush glazing. I do not find it particularly bothersome on this model.

The fine detailing extends to separately fitted door and commode handles, as well as ten large torpedo roof vents. Atop the clerestory are two separately fitted pipework runs which, I presume, were the cooling system for the engine and I suspect I should call them radiators. And while we are on the clerestory, it is worth noting that the clerestory glazing is printed with etched glass decoration.

Each end of the model carries

three oil lamps which stand out from the body on separately fitted brackets. The manufacturer has resisted the temptation to make these working lights as it would undoubtedly have compromised their scale appearance. As it is, they look a treat!

Looking inside the body through the large windows, there is a full complement of interior detail and there's no sign that the mechanism compromises the floor depth. Indeed, there's a full complement of the reversible tram-type seats with their backs seemingly left in random locations by the last passengers, some forward, some back, some in bays of four.

Both cabs have interior detail, albeit that the controls in the real thing were pretty basic, the driver standing as he would in a tram. The engine and mechanical section is also detailed, with the large green casings for the engine, flywheel and dynamo.





Smooth, quiet performance.

CHASSIS AND DRIVE

The model, like the real thing, is driven on the leading bogie. Electrical pick-up is through phosphor bronze dummy frames inside the plastic bogie sideframes, thus avoiding the friction of wiper pick-ups on the wheels. With current collection through all eight wheels, the running is smooth, with no tendency to stall. The slimline coreless motor is installed in the chassis, below the leading end of the passenger saloon and it drives both axles of the leading bogie through a shaft drive and bogie-mounted gears.

The two bogies correctly feature different styles of wheel, the non-powered bogie having Mansell disc wheels with the wooden centres well represented.

Factfile: NER Autocar

The importance of the NER petrol-electric Autocar cannot be overstated. It was the forerunner of modern traction, though arguably not the ubiquitous diesel-mechanical DMU but the diesel-electric system commonly seen in locomotives and some of the more recent multiple units. Around the turn of the 19th Century, electric tramway technology had reached the point where street tramways were drawing substantial amounts of short-distance local traffic away from the main line railways. The economy

of the electric tramway was an attractive proposition for branch lines and lightly used services, but not if it involved expensive fixed

infrastructure to supply power.

The answer lay in a vehicle which could generate its own power supply. The North Eastern Railway came up with the first viable vehicle, the Electric Autocar, in 1903. The 53ft 6in long (over body) vehicle had a driving cab at each end and a Napier petrol engine driving a flywheel which, in turn, powered a Westinghouse dynamo, producing electricity at 550V for the bogie-mounted traction motors. Two vehicles were built, numbered 3170 and 3171. They had reversible tram-type seats for 48 passengers, a vestibule area and an open engine bay above the powered bogie. The end with the engine, power bogie and larger cab was the 'front' of the

The Napier engine quickly proved unsatisfactory and in 1904 was replaced by a 92hp Wolseley flat-four engine.
A small dynamo, driven by a belt from

car. There was a smaller cab at the rear.

the flywheel, provided charge for accumulators which enabled electric starting of the engine, carriage lighting and starting current for the main dynamo.

The railcars worked between Hartlepool and West Hartlepool, where they completed the journey in half the time of the parallel tram service, before moving to North Yorkshire for the rest of their careers, working Scarborough-Filey shuttles and around Harrogate and Selby. No. 3171 was withdrawn in May 1930 and No. 3170 in April 1931. However, the body of No. 3170 was grounded as a holiday home near Kirbymoorside in North Yorkshire for 70 years before being acquired by noted carriage restorer Stephen Middleton in 2003.

Between 2011-18 the Autocar was restored and fitted with a recycled GNR underframe and a Cummins diesel engine to comply with modern regulations. It now operates at the Embsay & Bolton Abbey Steam Railway.

Coreless motors should not be used with old controllers, those with 'feedback', or on layouts fitted with high-frequency (Relco-type) track cleaners. The instructions make no mention of this, so perhaps Heljan now considers that coreless motors have been around long enough for everyone to know.

A Next18 DCC decoder socket is fitted to the top of the light bar. This can be accessed by simply unclipping the body. The instructions state that the interior lights can be switched off, in analog mode, by using a magnetic 'wand'. No wand came with my sample, and attempts to switch the lights with a Rapido

wand achieved no result. I must assume, therefore, that this feature was dropped but that the instructions did not get changed.

DCC users can switch the interior lights on and off with function 0.

PAINT AND PRINT

It was the red and white paint finish of the real thing which I found particularly attractive and the model replicates this beautifully. The finish is quite matt and it is set off with wood finish droplights and very fine red and black 'cheat-lines' below the windows. These are probably the finest lines I've seen on a ready-to-run model, and to have negotiated them over the door details without smudging is quite a feat.



PERFORMANCE

On test on my layout with a Gaugemaster analogue controller, the Autocar was smooth and almost silent running forwards. However, in reverse (with the unpowered bogie leading) it had an obvious problem, was slipping and unable to move itself. A quick check revealed that the outer



wheelset on the unpowered bogie was out of gauge, the wheels having not been fully closed up on the plastic sleeve. The wheel back-to-back on that axle was a little over 15mm. It was a simple enough job to extract the wheelset from the bogie and gently squeeze the wheels to the correct 14.5mm back-to-back. The Autocar then operated very nicely in both directions.

It was so quiet that I found myself wishing for digital sound to play with but, in practice, that can become very wearing very quickly. I ran the Autocar on my Peco Code 83 track and through points down to medium radius and it took everything in its stride. Finally, as some modellers will doubtless wish to run it with the trailer coach that sometimes operates with the real thing at Embsay, I put a Hornby Bulleid coach behind it just to see how it handled a small load. It passed the test with flying colours.

CONCLUSIONS

The NER Autocar is a fine piece of work by Heljan on behalf of Rails. It has tremendous appeal as the passenger vehicle for a micro layout. Maybe that's the next thing I need to build. (CJL)

ike the proverbial bus, you wait an age for a successor to Bachmann's GWR '78XX', and two new 'Manors' are due to arrive within months of each other. Based on the Mainline tooling, Bachmann's 'Manor' was by no means a bad model, but its origins in the early 1980s and its non-DCC friendly split chassis does not lend it to today's RTR market.

With both Accurascale and Dapol working on 'modern spec' '78XXs', the first to hit the rails is Dapol's effort. The folks from Chirk have certainly served Western steam fans well in the past two years, thanks to the '43XX' 2-6-0 (MR283) and 'Large Prairie' (MR295).

Under assessment here is No. 7827 Lydham Manor in BR lined green, plus No. 7820 Dinmore Manor in BR mixed traffic lined black. The real No. 7827 spent its BR career working from Chester, Oswestry, Machynlleth and Shrewsbury sheds, so it's an ideal choice for anyone with an

interest in the former Cambrian lines (which is why I bought this model for myself!). No. 7820 also worked in Mid-Wales in BR days, with interludes in South Wales and Cornwall. It's worth noting that Dapol will be making a donation from the proceeds of every *Dinmore Manor* model towards the upkeep of the preserved prototype.

HOW DOES IT LOOK?

First impressions are favourable, with the character of Collett's handsome locomotives captured well. The finish will be discussed in detail shortly, but the presentation of the models is very impressive. The tapered boiler, cab, smokebox and tender profiles all look convincing to my eye, and there's plenty of fine detail to enjoy.

The die-cast running plate is adorned with rivet heads and lamp brackets, while the reversing rod, wire handrails, steam pipes, whistles and smokebox

door handle are neatly fitted. There's also a pleasing rendition of the inside motion visible between the frames and the cab interior is superb, with pipes, valves and gauges all carefully painted and installed. A slight blemish is the longitudinal mould seams along the upper quadrants of the boiler and smokebox, which are more prominent on the green locomotive.

Below the running plate, sprung buffers are installed, although they have a slightly upward pitch. The blackened metal wheel rims and spokes are finely crafted, the

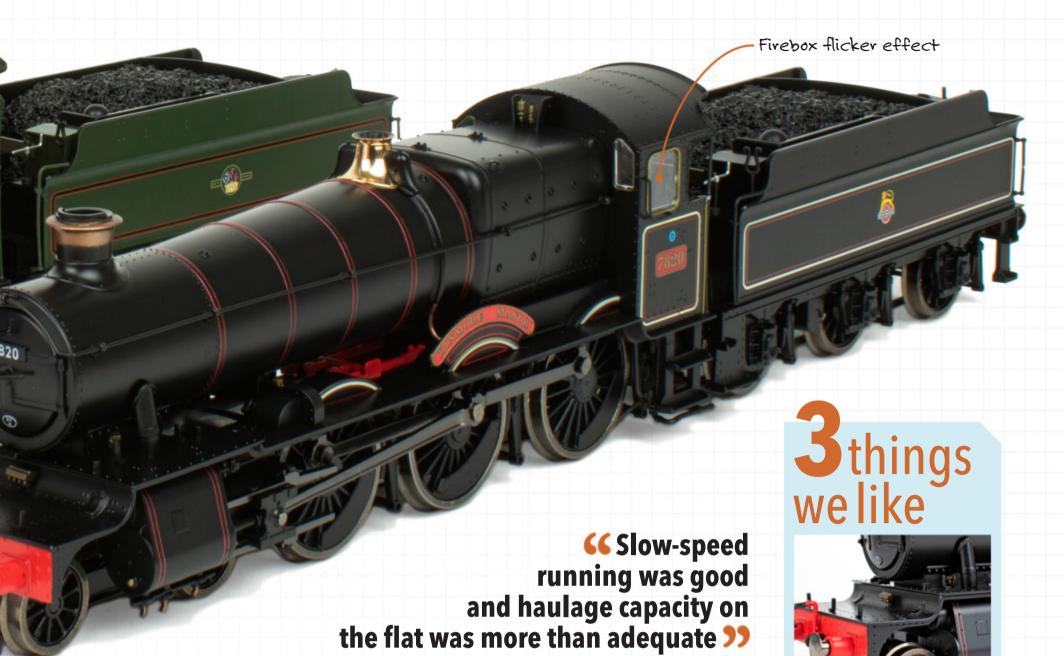
brake and sanding gear is present and the cylinders are moulded in full relief, with the leading bogie able to rotate freely thanks to an innovative cam arrangement. The connecting rods look great, but the plastic crossheads are a little disappointing.

The tender is an attractive model, with excellent chassis detail, including water scoop and brake gear. Again, the wheels are refined and the bodyshell is equally well





produced. I particularly liked the painted plank of wood across the coal space aperture. Indeed, the shape of the moulded coal load is credible, although it's easy to remove, if desired.

Perhaps as a cost-saving measure, the tender handrails are plastic, rather than wire, (ditto the rear cab handrails). In the main, these look fine, but those mounted on the rear corners of the tender were bowed and showed signs of flash. An effective kinematic NEM pocket is installed on the tender's rear coupling.

The paintwork is virtually flawless in terms of application and sheen, across both samples. The lining and printed elements can't be faulted, with thin polished brass beading picked

out exquisitely on the splashers and cab window frames. The cabside nameplates are superb, while etched replacements are also provided.

The finish on the brass safety valve bonnet confirms the pristine nature of the models, although the copper chimney cap is a little lacklustre in comparison, with fuzzy colour separation.

MECHANICAL MATTERS

Power is collected from all three coupled axles, plus the three tender axles, and transferred via the push-fit loco-tender coupling, with no unsightly cables or fiddly plug and socket. Unusually, wiper pick-ups bear onto the top edge of the tender wheel flanges, causing a degree of resistance to their rotation.

The coupled axles run in separate brass bearings, with power collected via wipers bearing on the inside faces of the wheels. The centre axle is sprung to help cope with uneven track and power from Dapol's standard motor is transferred to the rear driving wheel via a gearbox. A flywheel is installed and there's plenty of mass within the metal chassis to ensure adhesion, helped further by the die-cast running plate.

As with previous Dapol steam-outline models, the DCC interface is accessed via the smokebox, with a handy tool provided to prise the door off and extract the circuit board. A Next18 decoder socket is provided, with space for a sugar cube speaker on the underside of the PCB.

Factfile: GWR 'Manor' 4-6-0

GWR chief mechanical engineer Charles Collett had spent much of the 1930s creating the 'Hall' and 'Grange' class 4-6-0s, as part of a drive to replace a few hundred Churchward '43XX' 'Moguls'. The new locomotives proved successful, yet they were too heavy for certain GWR routes and a lightweight 4-6-0 was needed to replace the surviving 'Moguls'.

Swindon's appetite for recycling was such that parts from the redundant '43XXs' were reused, including the driving wheels and motion. A new lightweight tapered

boiler was specified and, when complete, the new 'Manor' class 4-6-0s were over five tons lighter than a 'Grange'.

Introduced from 1938, 20 locomotives (7800-7819) were initially constructed, and they were given blue circle route availability markings. The original plan was to create 100 'Manors', but the outbreak of war forced a change of plan. Whereas the 'Halls' and

'Granges' proved highly successful, the performance of the 'Manors was initially disappointing. However, various modifications carried out in the early years of the nationalised railway proved transformative. Furthermore, BR authorised a further ten 'Manors' to be built at Swindon in 1950.

The 'Manors' became closely associated with passenger and freight work on various routes, especially the former Midland & South Western Junction and Cambrian lines, while they could also be found working in Cornwall, South Wales and the West Midlands.

The final examples were withdrawn in 1966 and, incredibly, nine out of the 30 'Manors' survived into preservation.

There's also space for a bass reflex speaker within the tender.

On the rails, both 'Manors' performed very well, especially after a short running-in period. Slow-speed running was good and haulage capacity on the flat was

more than adequate, although there was a notable dip in power when a gradient was encountered, but a little extra 'juice' from the controller (on analogue) compensated. On my test track, an eight-coach load was handled without any issues and Chris Leigh also reported excellent performance on his layout.

The sprung leading bogie performed well, allowing the locomotive to run effortlessly through second radius curves and short radius points. The flickering firebox effect is great, working well on DC control, but with the potential of synchronising with

sound effects on Dapol's own DCC sound-fitted models (the 'Manors' are also available in DCC-fitted and DCC sound fitted format).

GOOD 'MANORS'?

Attractively packaged, with a comprehensive owner's manual, Dapol's 'Manors' are really rather nice, especially when considering the price. There's not much in the way of extra details in the box, save for the optional numberplates, a vacuum pipe for the front end and a sanding lever to fit below the boiler. A set of fire irons, lamps and cosmetic screw couplings would've finished the

model off nicely, and the jury's out on the shade of BR green, which looks a little pale to my eyes.

These things aside, Dapol has done a great job, building on the success of the '43XX' and 'Large Prairie' and presenting fans of GWR traction with a range of attractive models. (GD)

Dapol 14t anchor-mounted tank wagons

win-axle tank wagons changed little during the early decades of the 20th Century.

However, a vast number of tank wagons were needed to carry aviation fuel during the Second World War, so the Government's Petroleum Board and wagon builder Charles Roberts created an updated design, incorporating a simplified means of securing the tank barrel to the underframe.

The previous method of strapping a barrel within a substantial timber and steel frame was eschewed in favour of a simple anchor mounting. Consisting of a pair of fabricated steel saddles and central anchor plates, the arrangement allowed the chassis to flex over uneven track, thus reducing

the risk of derailments.

Thousands of anchor-mounted tank wagons were constructed from 1944 onwards, for a wide variety of oil companies.
Employing a familiar 17ft 6in chassis and 10ft wheelbase, as seen on pre-war designs, the tank wagons sported a variety of equipment and barrel sizes to suit the needs of particular traffics.

Examples continued in use on the main line into the 1970s, with some even lasting into the following decade. Furthermore, BR purchased numerous tanks from their owners, for use as Departmental fuel oil carriers and waste oil storage. Wagons were also redeployed on mobile weedkilling trains or within the BR Engineers' fleet. Industrial users also purchased surplus wagons, for use in steel works,



collieries and many other facilities, with examples continuing in use up to the 1990s.

Dapol released its first batch of 14t anchor-mounted tank wagons in early August, offered in both Class A and Class B format and with a colourful array of liveries to choose from. We have two models to review, sporting a range of detail differences, although they all share the same die-cast metal, open-framed chassis which is very impressive.

The weight of each wagon is

the first thing that one notices. Tipping the scales at 253g (Class B) and 291g (Class A), these are hefty models and, unsurprisingly, they run extremely well over points and crossings. The pinpoint axles run in brass bearings, thus keeping friction to a minimum.

As with Dapol's previous 7mm scale freight releases, both axles are sprung and the three-hole wheels feature an extremely fine profile. The Morton brake gear looks great, with safety hoops and twin 'V' brackets on each side, while the open frames and

anchor plates really capture the look of the real thing. Sprung metal buffers and working three-link couplings (with sprung drawhooks) complete the chassis package.

The tank barrels are discreetly screwed to the frames and a prototypically smaller barrel is installed on the Gulf Class B wagon (smaller barrels were employed for denser materials). Attention to detail extends to the bottom discharge pipework on the Class B tank, along with a valve on the top of the barrel. Indeed, there is a welcome

variety of filling equipment, ladders and walkway options across Dapol's range of tank wagons, to suit the equipment carried by each prototype.

Quality of decoration is high, with the printed logos and instructions crisply printed and fully legible. Different makers' plates are installed to suit each individual wagon and the Gulf blue tank even features late 1970s style overhead line warning symbols.

These are a great addition to Dapol's expanding 'O' gauge range, portraying an interesting prototype to a high degree of fidelity. They're keenly priced, run well and look fantastic.

What more can we ask for? (GD)

Accurascale CDA china clay hopers

ollowing the recent release of Accurascale's excellent HAA 'merry-goround' (MGR) coal hoppers (MR301), other versions based around the same wagon type are now appearing, including the popular CDA covered china clay hoppers. Although construction of twin-axle MGR hoppers had continued into the 1970s, with a range of covered versions being built for lime and gypsum flows, there was a long

pause before the CDAs were constructed in the late 1980s.

After a trial conversion of an existing MGR hopper, a fleet of 124 CDAs was built from new at Doncaster Works in 1987-8, followed by a small number of rebuilds using spare HAAs. Built to replace the decrepit, timber-bodied and vacuumbraked OOV 'clayhood' open wagons, the CDAs revolutionised the transport of china clay within Devon and Cornwall and were initially treated to blue frames and large English China Clay (ECC) logos on the hopper sides. This

branding didn't last long, however, with English, Welsh and Scottish Railway (EWS) and then DB Cargo applying their house colours and logos to most of the fleet.

Although depleted in recent years, a number of CDAs are still in use and are hauled by DB Class 66s, having previously been in the charge of BR and EWS Class 37s for many years previously.

Accurascale's model features much the same specification as the HAA models reviewed in the July issue, although there are also plenty of extra fittings installed to correctly portray the CDAs. The air brake equipment has been moved to the top of the running frame and the distinctive boxes are faithfully rendered at each end of the hopper, as is the tensioning rod for the hopper cover.

Talking of which, the canvas cover is moulded in plastic, but features a lifelike texture and appearance, complete with securing cords. The small horizontal slots are also present on both ends and one side of the hopper, for extra authenticity. Presented in triple-packs, there's plenty of variety across our three sample wagons, in terms of logos, markings and even in the colour of the canvas cover. The paint finish is top-notch and the St Blazey lizard logos, builders' plates and other small markings are all superb.



Sprung buffers, brake discs on alternate wheels, and kinematic NEM coupler pockets are all features in common with the earlier HAA release, making for a great all-round package. Various packs are on offer, with EWS and DB markings. (GD)

nother derivative of the famous MGR hopper family has also been released by Accurascale, in the shape of the HCA. One of the earlier types of hopper equipped with a canopy, these wagons were designed for use on longer distance coal traffic. The extension to the hopper reduced the amount of coal dust emitted while the loaded train was in motion, as well as offering superior aerodynamics.

The HCAs retained the two smaller lateral internal strengthening beams, whereas other sub-types had these removed and modifications made to the outer hopper framing to compensate. Introduced in the 1970s and continuing in use well into the early 2000s, the HCAs went on to receive Transrail and Mainline brandings during the early days of privatisation, followed by EWS markings.

Accurascale is offering a choice of BR or EWS era HCAs, in



triple-pack format and featuring prototypical detail differences from the HAAs. The most obvious difference is the addition of the canopy, with the correct array of internal strengthening beams present. The three wagons in our sample pack carry discreet pointers to the EWS era, with one

wagon also wearing stencilled Transrail 'Big T' logos.

Again, the array of detail and high-quality finish is apparent, while the extra variety offered by this sub-class is most welcome. Still to come as part of Accurascale's MGR range, are the HBA, HDA and HMA variants. (GD)

uilt in France for wagon leasing firm STS in the early 1980s, these handsome pressure-discharge, covered cement hopper wagons were coded PCA under BR's TOPS system and initially employed by Rugby Cement. Blue Circle Cement also took on a fleet of the same wagons, replacing some of its existing 'Presflo' vehicles. A further batch of hoppers was ordered in 1985, from a different French builder, which also went to work on Rugby Cement flows.

Despite a short period in the early 1990s when the fleet was off lease, the vehicles were eventually put to work on traffic from Castle Cement's Ketton works, in Rutland.

Later, examples also began to work from Castle's Clitheroe

facility and the fleet remains in use today.

Released initially in 2019, this is the first time *Model Rail* has been able to review Accurascale's PCA wagons. The first batch proved to be a

very healthy seller, with this second production run being offered owing to modeller demand. Under test, we have a pack of wagons in original 1990s Castle Cement livery, along with a later iteration, complete with

newer logo and Heidelberg sub-branding. Various triple packs are on offer, allowing a realistic rake to be assembled for pre and post-2000s eras.

The models really capture the distinctive profile of the real



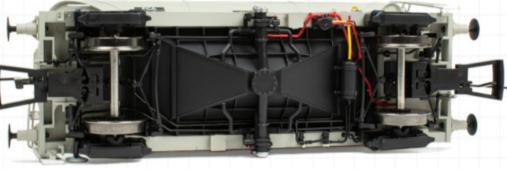


wagons, with the complex lip around the sloping ends particularly convincing. The etched walkway panels atop the barrel are superb, while the top two steps of the ladders also feature fine mesh tread panels. At solebar level, the pressure discharge valves and pipework are nicely rendered, as are the ferry cleats. Sprung buffers are fitted and the brake gear - with associated pipework and reservoir tanks - is also impressive. I particularly like the

way the brake cross shafts have been designed to fit neatly around the NEM coupler pockets.

The pedestal suspension units feature crisply moulded spring and axlebox detail, although the parts were a little loose on a few of our samples, leading to slight stiffness in the axles. Once glued in position more securely, running was flawless.

The two slightly different liveries have been applied to a very high standard, with appropriate BR and post-privatisation style overhead warning

symbols applied to match each version's timescale. As usual, Accurascale includes small detail bags, featuring dummy Instanter couplings and brake hoses.

These wagons will look great with a lightly weathered finish (the real things are usually kept fairly clean) and are perfect for hauling by a range of diesel traction, including Class 37s for the earlier versions, and the ubiquitous EWS/DB Class 66 for the post-2000s, Heidelbergbranded versions, although **GBRf** won the Castle Cement contract in 2018.

At the time of writing, plenty of wagon packs were in stock with Accurascale's chain of stockists and on its website, but they're unlikely to linger on the

shelves for too long. If, like me, you missed out on the PCAs first time around, make sure you get your order in soon! (GD)

Peco 'TT:120' lineside building kits

s mentioned last month, Peco generously sent us a large bundle of new products from its nascent 'TT:120' range and, while we appraised the track, points and accessories in MR303, we can now assess some of the lineside building kits.

Peco's initial raft of 'TT:120' kits includes an attractive station building, complete with canopy, plus a small signal box and a goods shed. All three structures have a distinct GWR character, but they're not too regionspecific and could be readily employed for layouts set in other parts of the UK.

At Model Rail, we always prefer to build a kit before reviewing it, so two of the three kits have been assembled in order to test the fit of parts, the clarity of the instructions and the appearance of the finished structures. Each of the kits primarily feature laser-cut wood components (cut from 1mm thick plywood), plus moulded plastic chimney pots and a generous sheet of clear acetate for the glazing.

The walls are built up in layers with interlocking joints, creating a very sturdy construction.

Doors and window frames are provided as separate parts, providing welcome relief.

The signal box boasts impressive etched brick detail to the base and chimney, along with timber panels to the main cabin. The veranda and stairs are finely rendered, yet resilient, while the bargeboards and finials look great. No interior details are provided and, hopefully, a suitable detailing kit will be offered in future.

The station building features dressed stone detail on the exterior walls, with quoins at the corners, which help to disguise the interlocking joints. The goods shed (ref. LK-12102, £18.95) also depicts a stone-built structure, with corrugated roof panels and



an interior loading platform.

The station canopy brackets and fingerboard fascia are lovely and there's even a rough texture to the lean-to extension roof, plus gutters and downpipes. The main 'slate' roof panels and decorative ridge tiles add extra charm. Again, no interior fittings or walls are provided, but the panelled doors and window frames are excellent.

The proportions of 'TT:120' are modeller-friendly, making these

kits a straightforward prospect. The fiddliest element was the delicate square rings that adorn the chimney stacks, which needed to be cut from the fret very carefully. Some gaps exist in the corner joints of the walls and chimney stacks, but a little filler and careful abrading will take care of them.

I'd recommend painting elements like the windows, doors and station canopy before installation, but it's by no means essential. I would,

however, leave the signal box roof loose pending interior detailing, while the station interior can be accessed from below.

Offering great value and excellent results, these kits are heartily recommended, whether you're planning a 'TT:120' layout now or in future. Indeed, they provided a very enjoyable way of passing a few evenings. (GD)

Model: BR Class 151 DMU

Scale: '00'

Proposed by: Ronald Craggs

What is it?

By the 1980s, British Rail faced a pressing need to replace a huge fleet of aging (and asbestos-riddled) diesel multiple units (DMUs), which had been the saviour of many branch lines during the Beeching era. With fewer train builders active in the UK, and with BR under pressure from a Conservative government to keep costs to a minimum, various budget-friendly options were considered. The infamous 'Pacers' duly emerged, but so too did a slightly more upmarket range of units, which led to the successful 'Sprinter' family of DMUs, which are still in use today.

One of the less well-known prototypes was created by Metro-Cammell and evaluated by BR. The three-car Class 151 featured an aluminium body and a 285hp Cummins diesel engine beneath each car, driving the axles via a unique transmission system.

Non-standard bogies were employed, which gave a smooth ride on modern track, but

didn't fare so well on older, jointed rails.

In competition with BR's own prototype, the Met-Cam '151' came off second best, not least as BR's Class 150 had been derived from an existing electric unit (Class 455), thus incorporating a greater number of 'standard' fittings and equipment. Therefore, Class 151 remained limited to a pair of three-car prototype units. They were, however, used in passenger service between 1985-1989, most notably in the Derby and Midlands areas.

What would make it viable?

Interest in the 1980s British Rail era is at an all-time high, and multiple units offer a modeller-friendly option, especially to those with limited space. Looking quite different to anything else that had operated on BR, before or since, the '151' would offer something unique. There are only two units and a single livery to choose from, so a model would have to be something of a bespoke affair, but if we're getting one-offs like 'GT3' in made-up liveries, why not something that actually ran on BR, and which represented an important moment in Britain's modern railway history?

Can I see a real one?

No. Following withdrawal, both units were stored, pending conversion, before eventually being scrapped at Crewe in 2004.

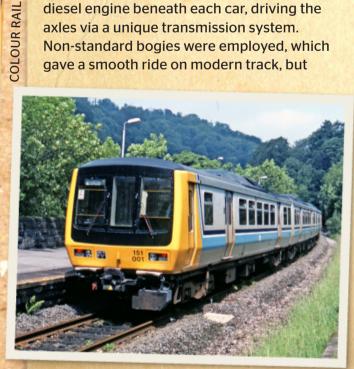

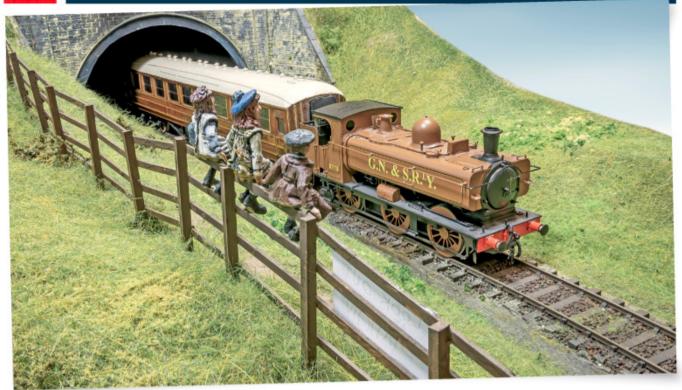

Railway Children - all grown up

The sad news of the death of Bernard Cribbins, Mr Perks in the 1970 movie *The Railway Children*, came just 24 hours after my grandchildren had taken me to see the eagerly awaited sequel, *The Railway Children Return*. It was his stellar performance and Lionel Jeffries' masterful direction, which had made the original movie the perennial classic that it now is.

I would not normally write a film review, but as I have an 'O' gauge layout based on the original movie and I'm known as a big Jenny Agutter fan, I am going to pen a few words.

I will try to avoid 'spoilers' relating to the story itself, which is very much for a 2020s audience rather than the 1970s audience of the original. It is, however, that 1970s audience which is likely to take particular interest in the sequel, so having the only screening at 3pm, as the Odeon, Kettering did, will immediately put the movie at a box office disadvantage.

For that modern audience the story comes forward 39 years from the 1905 setting of the original, to wartime in 1944 and the evacuation of children from the cities to the countryside. Three children from Salford are lodged at the home of grandmother 'Bobbie', Jenny Agutter reprising her role from the original movie. When the children explore the railway yard at Oakworth station they find a deserter from the US Army, sleeping rough in a brake van.

Lets clear the railway authenticity first. Salford station is 'played' by Keighley and the kids depart behind 'Jubilee' *Bahamas*. There are some brief appearances of maroon Mk 1 Phyllis, Bobbie and Peter watch the trains at Oakworth on my 'O' gauge layout, which is currently looking for a new home. CHRIS NEVARD coaches and the 'Jubilee' and '4F' 0-6-0 have very obvious LMS vinyls over their BR logos. An American troop train is headed by a USATC 'S160' 2-8-0. Given the constraints of filming on a single-track preserved railway, the authenticity is as good as it can be.

Continuity from the original movie was more of an issue, as far as I was concerned. The house above the railway at Oxenhope which served as the Three Chimneys in the original was such an important feature and its location was core to the story. It has been modernised since the 1970s, with white UPVC window frames and would, I'm guessing, have been unsuitable for a 1940s setting.

So, although it is not referred to in the script, the family home is now the Brontë Parsonage Museum, which was Dr Forrest's home in the original. Some careful editing suggests the field between the house and the railway as before but the presence of Haworth's distinctive and very 'crowded' churchyard so close to the house is overwhelming. I could not escape the conclusion that 'Bobbie' and family had moved house, into town.

I was pleased to see that there's no walking in the 'four foot' and that trespass is confined to the less obvious intrusions into rolling stock in Oakworth yard. However, that care to avoid conveying wrong impressions to modern audiences is lost in the 'last reel'. To say more would spoil the climax. If you watch it, you'll draw your own conclusions.

To sum up, it's not the worst sequel ever but I don't think I'll be buying the DVD and re-watching it frequently, as I have done with the original.

Wye Valley ramblings

I recently set out to write a feature about the Gloucester-Ross-on-Wye-Hereford line for Steam World. I travelled the line once, shortly before it closed in October 1964, my interest prompted largely by the writings of E.T. Rawlings about his 'OO' layout based on Ross-on-Wye. His articles appeared in early 1960s copies of Model Railway Constructor and, together with similar features by the Iliffe-Stokes husband and wife team about their models of Kingham, they kicked off my interest in modelling rural Western Region lines.

However, I had little reference material about the Wye Valley line so I went shopping and found this wonderful 328-page full colour volume with over 100 pictures of the Gloucester-Hereford line, at a very reasonable £30. There are illustrations of all 11 wayside stations on the route and every one of them is

worth modelling. There were also four tunnels and four crossings of the river Wye in the 30 miles. With GWR 'Prairie' tanks from Hornby, Dapol and Bachmann, 'Moguls' from Dapol and 'Manors' to come
