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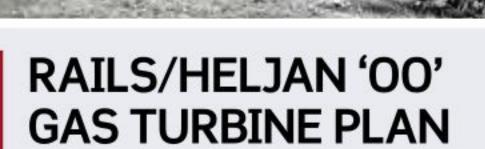

From the editor

VER SINCE I WAS A YOUNG BOY IN THE late 1940s, Christmas Day has always reminded me of train sets – primarily Hornby O-gauge tinplate – and to find myself writing about the subject of railway modelling 70 years later is something I would never have predicted in the wildest of dreams.

The amazing thing is that, despite the massive strides forward in accuracy, detail and sophistication in all scales that modellers enjoy today (see part one of Nigel Burkin's 'Top model choices from 2019' feature on pages 20-21), tinplate trains like the simple wind-up Hornby and its two stumpy carriages that I woke up to, wide-eyed, in 1949 have never lost their appeal, and the well-used, carefully stored or simply forgotten about remnants from that golden age remain eagerly sought-after at toy fairs and swapmeets all over the country to this day.

Wherever I have found tinplate train layouts at model railway exhibitions, the attention they have received often equals or even exceeds that of even the most sophisticated high-tech displays of this modern age.

Of course simple nostalgia, whether it be for early childhood in general or the real-life railways we might have known in particular, is the driving force behind so much of this, which is why I have chosen Trevor Mitchell's painting 'Grandad's Attic' for our December cover this year.

I introduced readers to this painting when I tucked it away somewhere inside the second issue of *RMM* that I became responsible for about 18 months ago, but I'm sure many of you will not have seen it before.

Fuelled by his own fond memories of Hornby Dublo trains, lineside accessories and Dinky Toys, the painting was a complete 'one-off' for Trevor, who for much of the time concentrates on rural and agricultural paintings, among other subjects.

What I loved about it from the moment I first saw it in his Bradford studio was the simple message of family togetherness, along with the portrayal of how railway modelling can so easily span the generations. From the accuracy of the Hornby Dublo and Dinky Toy boxes, the model trains, the distinctive track and lineside accessories, it is obvious how much research Trevor put into this picture of pure happiness.

Seeing how much I was taken by 'Grandad's Attic' during that visit of almost eight years ago – at around the time I was just starting to build my very first oo-scale model railway layout, 'Slagdyke', as a so-called 'retirement hobby' – Trevor kindly took out print 19 of a limited-edition of 250 and scribbled on it the words: "Good luck with the layout, Pete!"

The painting itself, which was first commissioned as the subject of a Gibson's jigsaw puzzle, shows Grandad, whose face is crinkled into a beaming smile, with his right hand on the controller as his grandson holds a Hornby Dublo model of an N2 0-6-2 tank locomotive. Colourful tinplate accessories abound as an LMS 'Duchess' Pacific draws into the station close to the engine shed where LNER A4 Pacific No. 7 Sir Nigel Gresley (renumbered as such from No. 4497 in 1947, the year before nationalisation) sits on the turntable.

There's simply so much going on, from the blue model aeroplane hanging from the attic roof to the tunnel, with its lovely landscaping; the station buildings and platforms, one of them boasting a newspaper kiosk; the water column and

signalbox; the Dinky Toy taxis and Morris Minor Post Office van by the station entrance and so much more.

On the far wall can be seen carriage compartment paintings and other railway memorabilia including Southern Railway warning signs, builders' plates, lamps, wagon plates and a railway map of the South West. In true jigsaw style, every corner is crammed with interest – even beneath the bench on the left are carefully bound lengths of three-rail track, level-crossing gates and more Dinky and Hornby Dublo boxes.

The joy of railway modelling remains the same whichever generation we come from, or whichever aspect of railways appeals to us. Some of the keenest and most able modellers of today are creating modern-image layouts that simply take the breath away, utilising every amazing advance of the modern modelling age. Not only are the models themselves more accurate than they have ever been, but we also have DCC, ever-more-sophisticated lighting and signalling, and every surrounding sound imaginable, not to mention those of the trains themselves.

I hope 'Grandad's Attic' lifts you in spirit whichever generation you belong to, and wish you all a happy and peaceful Christmas.



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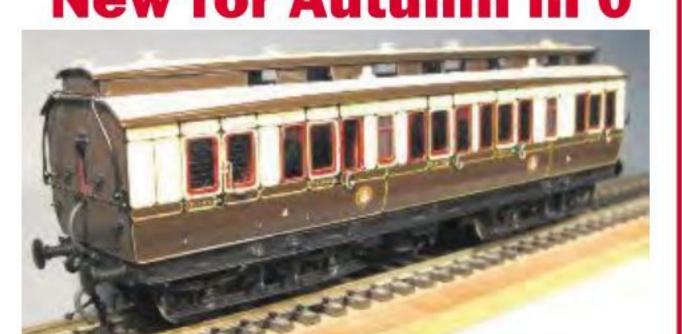
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Special-edition 00 van from Bagnall Locomotive Group

The Bagnall Locomotive Group has commissioned a special-edition oo-scale van lettered 'To work between Buxton & Longsight M&E stores' from Dapol, who have done such an excellent reproduction job that it even includes the gaps in the stencilling.

All proceeds from the new models, which cost £15 each plus £3.50 p&p for up to four, and are in a limited edition of 180, will go towards completion of the overhaul of Bagnall 'Austerity' No. 2746 *The Duke* at Wirksworth.

They can be ordered from Bagnall Locomotive Group, 13 Trenchard Drive, Buxton 5K17 9JY. Presumably the real-life van delivered parts to stores between Longsight and the depot at Buxton, but it hadn't seen main line use for many years after the Buxton depot closed in 1997, marooning it in the derelict shed.

It was only when the shed was finally demolished in 2016, requiring the creation of temporary road access, that the Bagnall Locomotive Group arranged to buy and remove it.

By then it was probably the last of its type left on the national network, and it is now under restoration at Wirksworth, on the Ecclesbourne Valley Railway, including the lettering from a careful tracing of the original.

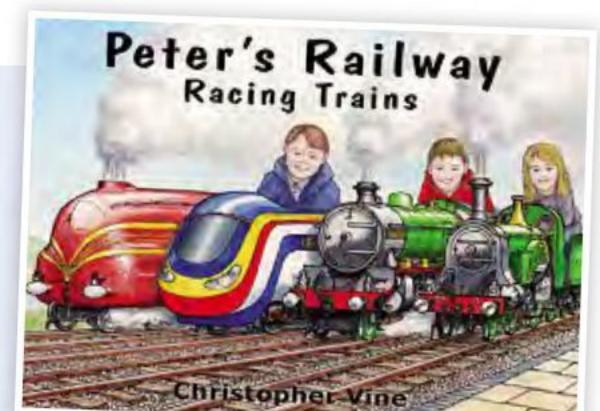
This is the handsome N-gauge Falk Salt wagon, whose complex lettering also includes "In cartons, salt only, non-pool" and "Salt Union Ltd".

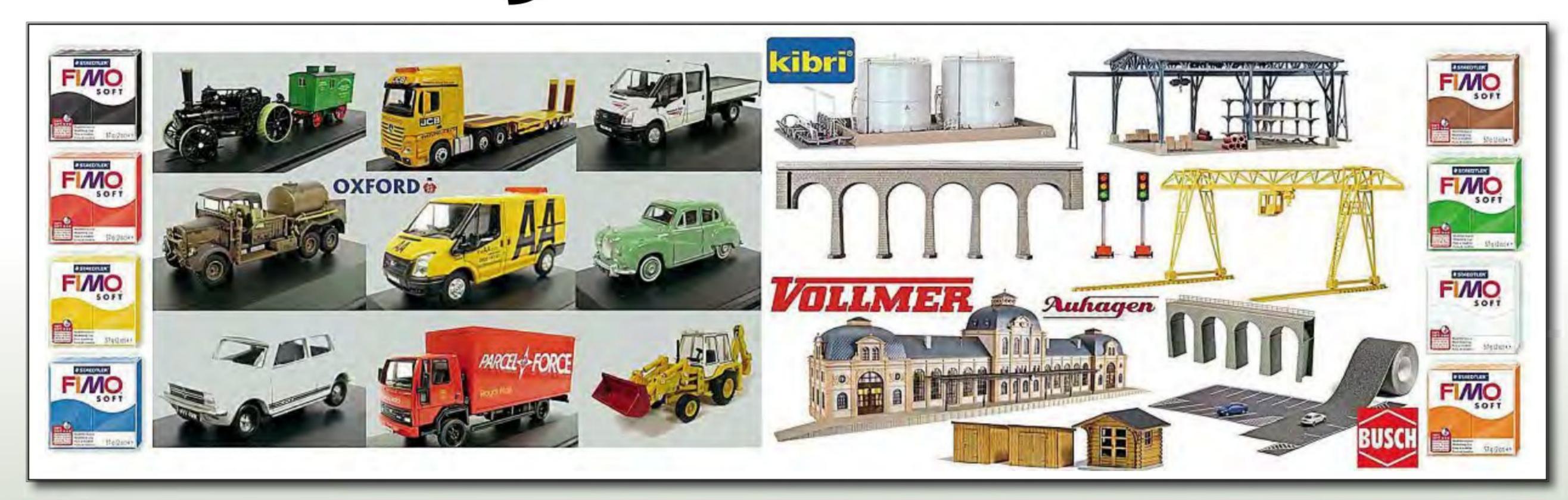

By customer demand – six-wheel Full Brakes for Hatton's 'Project Genesis'

Buoyed up by the initial reaction and feedback from customers about its 'Project Genesis' to produce a wide range of oo-scale pre-Grouping four and sixwheel coaches, Hatton's of Widnes has announced: "Through five evolving designs, we are now happy that we have addressed all of the feedback received, and are confident that the products will be the most realistic we can make."

The 2D drawings will now be turned into 3D CAD files that will show all the details that Hatton's is putting into these coaches. This will take a couple of months and the firm will keep readers informed as the project develops.

One of the most requested features was the addition to the range of Full Brake coaches, and these are now available to pre-order in a wide range of liveries.

Full Brakes were vital when the four and six-wheel coaches ran, for two reasons: many passengers took copious amounts of luggage with them, and such vehicles also allowed the transport of time-sensitive goods such as newspapers or milk.

As the vehicles were replaced in passenger service, many Full Brakes found new leases of life with railway engineers as tool or storage vans – and one even lasted into the 1980s!

Consequently, two batches of six-wheel Full Brakes have been announced by Hatton's, and all can be ordered at a cost of £30 unlit and £36 lit.

Batch 1: H4-6FB-101, GWR chocolate and cream; H4-6FB-201, GNR lined teak; H4-6FB-301, LNWR livery; H4-6FB-401, SECR livery; H4-6FB-501, LMS crimson lake; H4-6FB-601, LNER pre-war brown; H4-6FB-701, SR olive

green; H4-6FB-901A, full brake tool van in BR breakdown train + red.

Batch 2: H4-6FB-1001, GER chocolate brown; H4-6FB-1101, L&YR brown and umber; H4-6FB-1201, MR crimson lake; H4-6FB-1301, LSWR brown and umber; H4-6FB-1401, BR crimson; H4-6FB-1501, NCB blue; H4-6FB-801, GCR French grey and brown; H4-6FB-901B, BR black; H4-6FB-901C, BR olive green.

Requested more than any other was a livery that had not been included in the initial plan – that of the London Brighton & South Coast Railway – so a varied selection of four and six-wheel vehicles in LBSCR umber has now been added to Batch 2 to pre-order and run with the new 'Terriers' or any other LBSCR locomotives available.

H4-46 Pack-1601, pack of four coaches (4вт, 6сь, 4Т and 6вт in ьвск umber) costs £110 unlit, £135 lit.

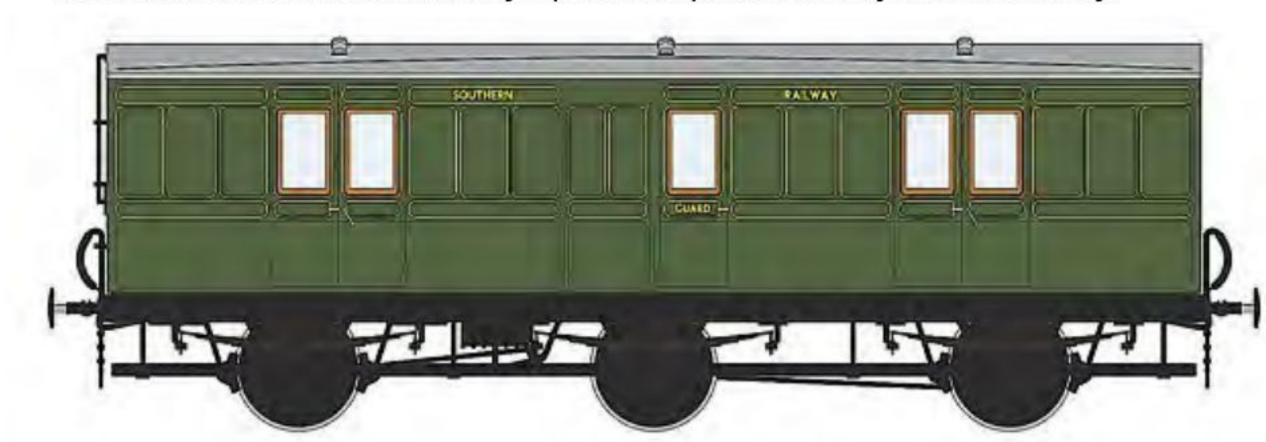
The rest, at the normal price of £30 unlit and £36 lit, are H4-4BT-1601A, four-wheel Brake Third; H4-4BT-1601B, four-wheel Brake Third; H4-4C13-1601, four-wheel Composite (First/Third); H4-4F-1601, four-wheel First; H4-4T-1601A, four-wheel Third; H4-6BT-1601B, four-wheel Brake Third; H4-6BT-1601B, six-wheel Brake Third; H4-6CL-1601, six-wheel Composite Lavatory (First/Third); H4-6F-1601, six-wheel First; H4-6T-1601A, six-wheel Third; H4-6F-1601, six-wheel Third; H4-6F-1601, six-wheel Third; H4-6F-1601, six-wheel Full Brake.

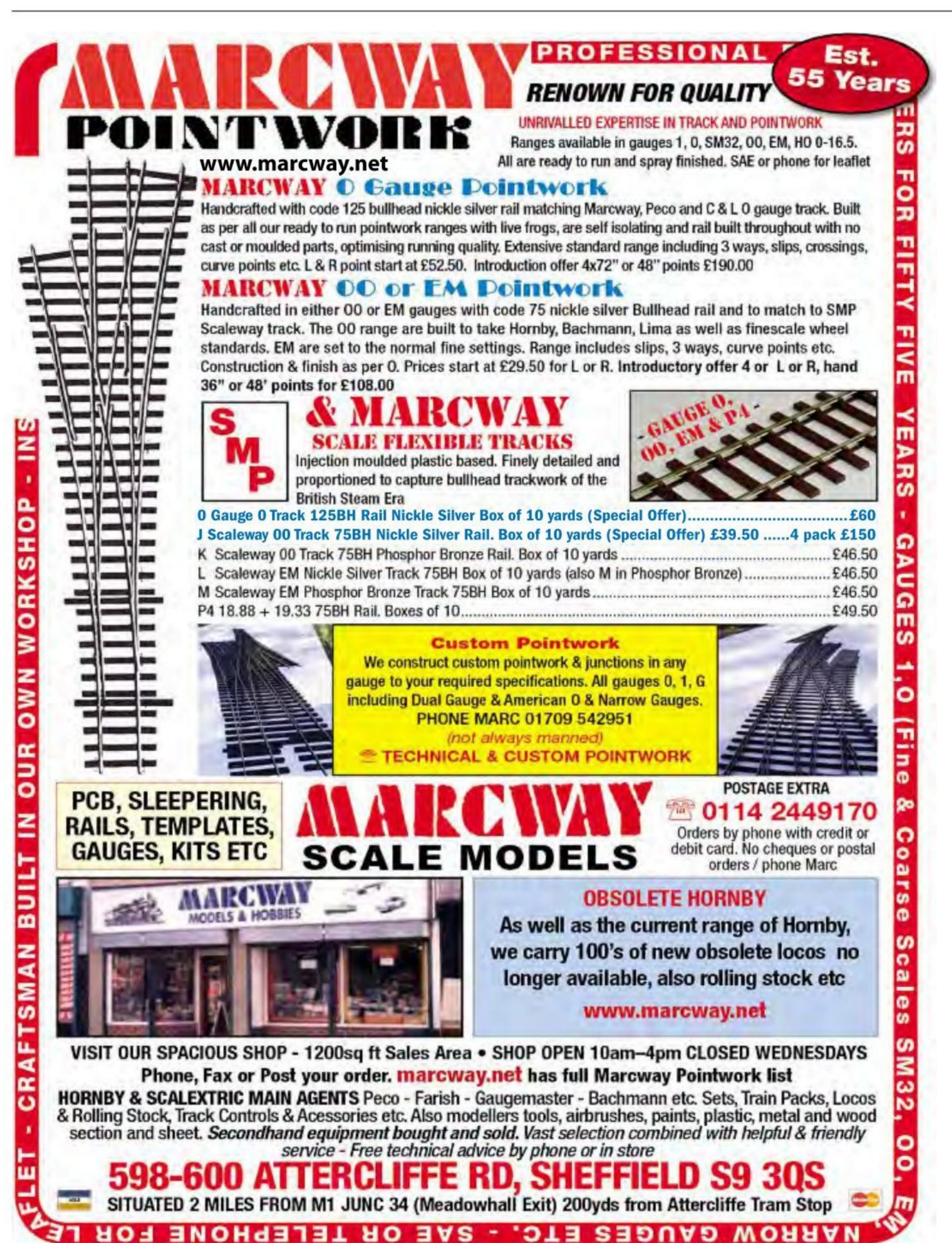

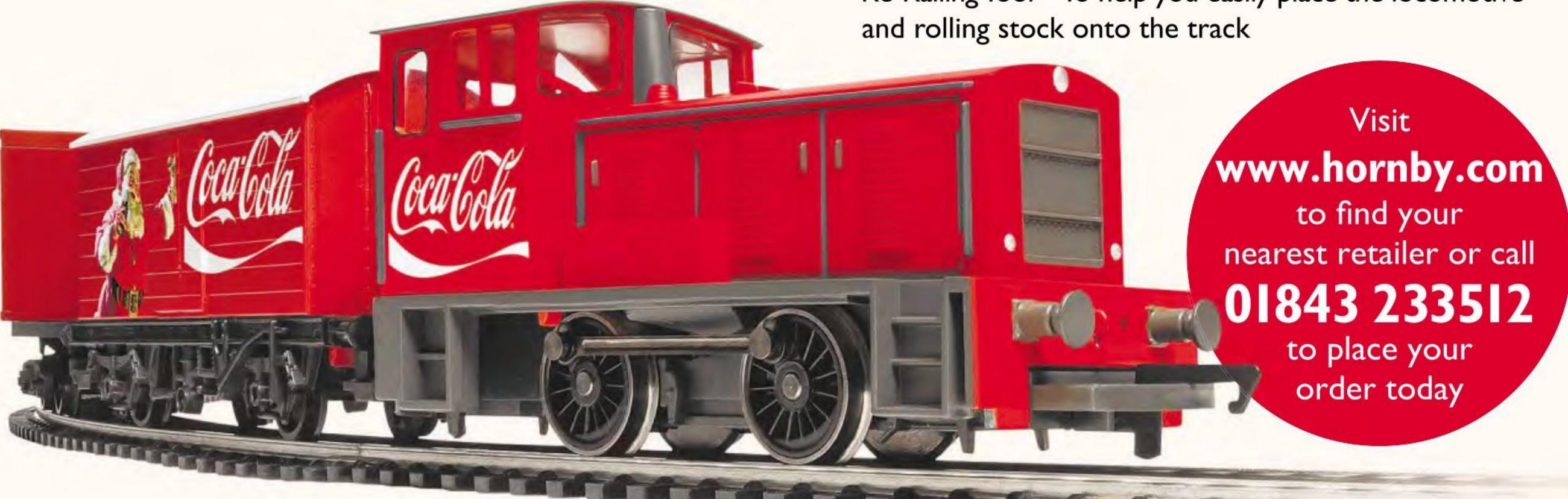

Collett GWR main line stock

Hornby's popular 00-gauge Collett bow-ended corridor stock makes a welcome return finished in classic GWR livery, writes Nigel Burkin.

OLLETT'S BOW-ENDED CORRIDOR stock became a standard for the Great Western Railway after 1925, when large numbers of the coaches were built at Swindon works at the rate, sometimes, of one coach every two to three days.

Construction consisted of steel panelling fitted over an oak wood frame mounted on a strong steel underframe, a design that would not meet the crash-worthiness requirements of the modern railway but was considered modern compared to the ageing 'toplight' stock! Collett introduced bow ends to shorten the length of gangways, making transfer from one coach to another more comfortable for passengers.

Bow ends continued to feature in the design of British coaching stock, including Mks.2, 3 and 4. Only in recent times have flat ends made a return with some modern designs.

The underframe was fitted with 7ft wheelbase single bolster bogies and external trussing. Vacuum brake equipment and dynamo were fitted to the underframe alongside the appropriate rodding to reach the brake blocks on the bogies. Buck-eye couplings were also catered for in the design, making Charles Collett's bow-ended 57ft coaches both clean in appearance and among the most modern coaches to operate on the GWR, becoming the defacto standard design.

It was so successful that many Collett coaches survived to see service with BR as late as the 1950s and 1960s, with some being allocated to departmental use long after they were withdrawn from main line service. It is the retention of Collett coaches for departmental use that enabled preservationists to secure them, even though interiors had been extensively altered.

Hornby has an excellent article on its website detailing how it researched and developed the models with the assistance of the Didcot Railway Centre and other organisations. The result is a fine-looking collection of models which includes Corridor Brake Third stock in both 'left-hand' and 'right hand' (LH and RH) formats. A Corridor Third and two Corridor Composite, both LH and RH, coaches are included in the current batch of models, which are neatly dressed in GWR chocolate and cream livery with white roofs and black ends.

They impress as soon as they are removed from the box, sharing the same high level of specification as the recently released Collett bow-ended suburban coaches.

Coach body

Looking along the roofs and sides of the four review samples kindly submitted by Hornby for our critical appraisal, the

injection-moulded plastic body shells are perfectly straight, with no signs of bowing along the rain gutter line or imperfections in the roofs. The sides are consistently modelled with the slight tumblehome at the base of the body, while the bow ends are also accurately represented and nicely fitted out with separate end gangways.

The slightly recessed windows of the type are fitted with clean and clear flush glazing. Window openings match the shape and size of the full-sized coaches compared with photographs and drawings. The window arrangement is correct for the LH and RH versions of the coaches, with a good view of the compartments and corridors visible though them.

Moulded detail is refined and subtle, yet clearly visible, including foot steps on the ends, roof seams, door hinges and lines, destination board brackets and toilet water tank hatches.

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December 2019 WHAT'S IN THE SHOPS

Underframe

There isn't a great deal of detail fitted to the underframe of the main line stock models considering the level of detail applied elsewhere. Some of the brake linkages are not modelled, but the vacuum cylinders, cross-rodding and V-hangers are neatly applied alongside battery boxes and a dynamo. Headstocks, solebars and the floor itself are produced as a one-piece moulding and are equipped with the external truss rods and long footboards along the solebars. It is all neatly assembled and shows no sign of distortion. On the ends are sprung buffers with metal heads and coupling hooks.

Bogies, couplings and wheels

Lovely reproductions of the short 7ft single bolster wheelbase bogies have been fitted to this model, and were chosen for the stock because they reduced wheel and flange wear yet performed well with a good ride.

Each bogie is a multiple-layered model in its own right, with a good level of moulded detail in the bogie frames including rivet, suspension springs, hangers and axle box detail. They feature a multiple-layer construction consisting of a number of components including tiny details such as the footsteps, spring planks, suspension springs themselves and brake shoes which are moulded in alignment with the wheels.

The wheels are composed of metal fitted to 26mm-long pinpoint axles and are of the correct diameter and pattern. They are fully concentric and run in inside bearings holes, producing free-rolling coaches with no sign of wobble either on the bogie pivots or the wheels themselves. Couplings are of the standard tensionlock type fitted to NEM coupling pockets mounted in kinematic coupling cams which are mounted and neatly concealed at the ends of the underframe. There's a curved slot in the leading spacer of the bogies to accommodate the coupling cam mechanism, and in the box Hornby provides alternative continental-style couplings that could be used on the inside of a rake of coaches.

While the supplied tension lock couplings result in a wide gap between the gangways, use of alternative NEM-compliant couplings will close the gap up to a more realistic level. There is very little slack in the cams, allowing the coaches to negotiate second-radius curves with the cams working as they should to avoid buffer and gangway lock.

Livery and finish

All four review models were beautifully and consistently finished with level lining, correct width cream bands down the sides of the coach and a pleasing semi-satin finish which is consistently applied.

Colours appear to be accurate and match colour references and some GWR paint colours well. Small painted details include brass applied to the individually moulded and fitted commode handles, door handles and red to the frames of droplight windows fitted to each door.

Printed detail is clear and sharp, including the classic GWR logo which in itself has several different colours. Gold lining, GWR legends and the class labels applied to each door are neatly printed, too. The coaches match perfectly when coupled together in a short rake with linear details such as rain gutters and the solebar foot steps lining up well when the stock is viewed down the length on a piece of straight and level track.

Construction quality of the models is excellent, with the numerous small details being attached firmly, including the separate roof ventilators, always slightly vulnerable compared to other models. All details are coloured with the same consistent paint colours and level of finish, and particularly noteworthy in terms of finish, quality and durability are the bogies which, despite being composed of so many small components, are very strong and showed no signs of shedding details, including the tiny foot step details, during handling in the studio.

Hornby undoubtedly carries the gold standard for coaching stock models thanks to its recently developed and tooled steam-era models which are always well detailed, finished and assembled. The Collett bow-ended corridor coaches are as good as one could desire for less than £50 per coach, which compares well with many wagon models that can touch similar prices yet are finished with less complex liveries and considerably fewer components applied to them.

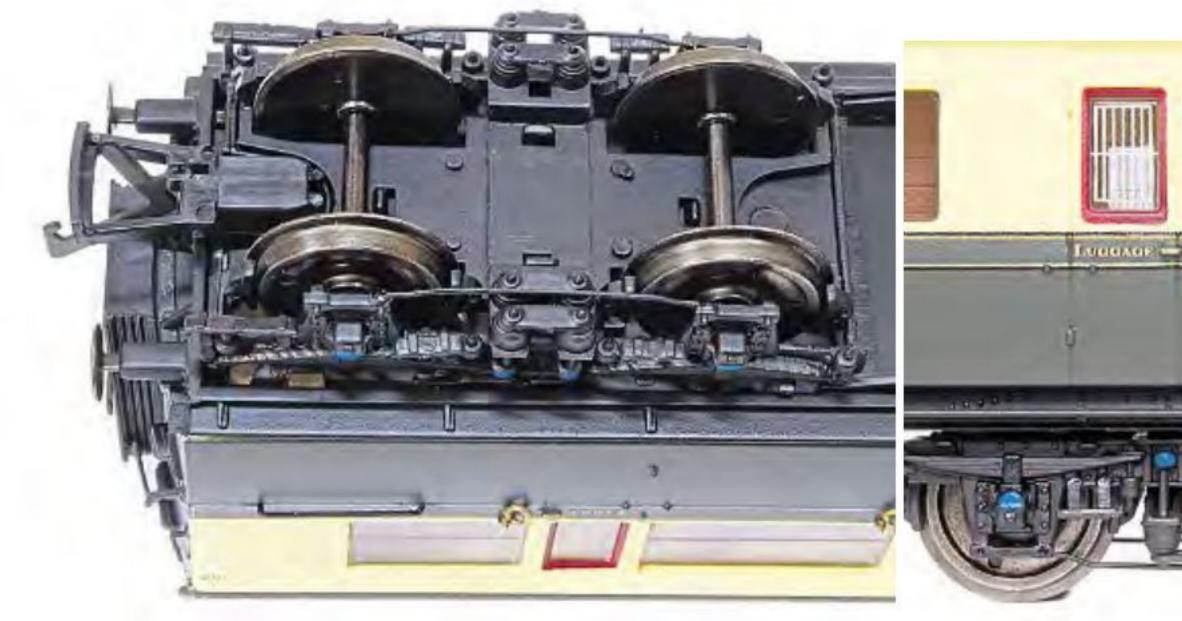

What's the shops

'The New Century Bar'

Nigel Burkin takes a look at Hornby's Pullman Standard 'K-Type' car that has returned to the range in the form of a bar car.

ULLMAN STANDARD 'K-TYPE' CARS were built in the mid 1920s (1923-1927) by various builders and were popular with the travelling public, remaining in traffic until the 1960s. These were superseded by the all-steel type from around 1928, a type also available from Hornby as a range of different vehicles alongside different Standard K-Type cars.

The pre-1928 standard cars were built with timber bodies mounted on steel underframes, a feature which is apparent in the planked lower body sides of the model. 'The New Century Bar' car (R4904) is the latest to be added to the Hornby range of coaching stock, modelled to a high standard and adorned with the flamboyant legend applied to the bar/pantry side of the vehicle. It features a detailed interior and some fine livery lining and printing.

Hornby's 00-gauge Pullman cars, including the later K-Type all-steel cars, are well regarded by modellers, so how does this impressive-looking vehicle measure up?

Body shell

From the roof profile to the recessed doors at the end of the coach body, Hornby has captured the character of the Standard K-Type Pullman bar car well. Tooling is subtle, with detail at the ends and along the lower body side quite refined in detail. The roof has the correct dome shape at the ends and some subtle tooling for seams and panels. Small details applied

to it include the torpedo vents and catering ventilator cowls.

In the sides are correctly shaped windows fitted with slightly and authentically recessed glazing which is well applied and as clear as is possible in plastic. They provide a good view of the tables and seating alongside a long bar counter which is finished in red with a white top and fitted with bar rails.

Passenger doors at the ends would open inwards and are correctly recessed with oval windows sporting a fine moulded frame and clear glazing. Vestibule glazing in the ends is also well modelled, alongside the lavatory compartment windows with their styled framing. Added details include correctly profiled commode handles and hand rails, gangways and water tank filler pipes.

Underframe and bogies

The position of Hornby as arguably the best coachbuilder in 00 gauge is reinforced by the modelling of its K-Type Pullman cars. This is emphasised not only by the quality of the bodywork but also the underframe and bogie details. The coach floor is fitted out with fine trussing which has no sign of moulding marks or flash on it. Other fine details include the vacuum brake cylinders and dynamo detail.

Good models of the Pullman 10ft bogies are fitted, of the correct pattern and finely produced in injection-moulded plastic. There is depth to the bogies, which are refined, including rivet and spring

detail. Axlebox covers have a high degree of crispness alongside the spring plank and secondary suspension detail. Brake shoes align with the metal wheels which collect current for the interior lighting through contacts with the axles.

At the ends of the coach are welldisguised close coupling cams, NEM coupling pockets and sprung metalheaded buffers. Both cams and buffers are lightly sprung and will allow close coupling on second radius curves when used with the appropriate swallow tail couplings. Alternatives are supplied in the box alongside information on the lighting system.

Interior detailing

Look through each window to see a white table fitted with a table lamp which is illuminated with a warm glow using the coach lighting system. When track power is removed, the lights glow for a second or two longer before going out through the use of a capacitor, effectively preventing light flicker when current is temporarily interrupted.

On the corridor side of the coach, a glimpse past the curtains reveals a red bar counter with bar handles and background too. Overall, the model is beautifully appointed internally, with the impression of white tablecloths. All that's needed to complete the scene are passengers and table settings.

Livery and finish

Comparing the model with photographs of full-sized Pullman cars of the era, the cream panels are a little out in colour, perhaps not being creamy enough in shade. The shade of umber applied to the ends and lower body sides is good, being

deep and rich. The roof is finished in a mid-grey colour, and like all of the other livery colours, is evenly finished with a slight sheen.

The quality of printing is excellent, with the Pullman logo well represented alongside small details such as the Pullman name above the windows and 'The New Century Bar' legends printed over the lower body planking on the corridor side.

Lining around the passenger doors, along the sides and along the rain gutter is pin sharp and of consistent width. The model is remarkably attractive and has the presence of the full-sized vehicles, enhanced by the detailed interior and small fittings, which are all correctly coloured.

It will be popular and likely to sell out in the same manner as Hornby's highly acclaimed all-steel K-Type cars.

Rails enters the Jet Age!

Three OO-scale model versions of the 1949 Brown Boveri gas-turbine locomotive No. 18000 are under development by Rails of Sheffield and Heljan, and should be ready to buy at the end of 2020.

press with this issue, and in celebration of the 70th anniversary of the building of the unique Brown Boveri gas-turbine prototype No. 18000 in 1949, Rails of Sheffield and Heljan have announced the development of a museum-quality 00-gauge model of the locomotive, which worked on the Western Region of British Railways and was nicknamed, perhaps predictably, 'Kerosene Castle'.

Due for release at the end of 2020, the low production run models have been priced at £199.99 with pre-orders available from www.railsofsheffield.com for a deposit of £30.

Design work was completed over the summer, and tooling is now well underway on what should be a highly-popular model of this famous experimental locomotive. The model has been developed with the assistance of the National Railway Museum using original documentation from Brown Boveri and BR Western Region, including works drawings dating from the late 1940s.

Differences between the locomotive as built and as modified during the 1950s have been incorporated into the tooling to ensure absolute accuracy for each livery and period. Roof, cab front and grille details will vary between the BR black and

BR green versions.

First tooling samples are expected to be ready in early 2020, followed by decorated samples in mid-year and then production.

Three variants will be produced – BR gloss black with silver trim (1949-56), BR lined green with orange/black waistband lining and early BR crest (1956-57) and the same with late BR crest (1957-60).

Specification will include a 21-pin DCC socket with easy access; room to easily install a speaker for DCC sound; directional LED lighting; a heavy die-cast metal chassis with central motor and flywheels for powerful performance; separately-fitted hand rails and sand pipes; spoked wheels; etched grilles; sprung buffers and flush glazing.

An optional Western Region-style train reporting number frame and numerals will also be included in the package to allow modellers to add this distinctive wr feature to the front of the locomotive.

History

Although diesel power was beginning to prove itself as a viable alternative to steam traction before the Second World War, no single-unit locomotive of the time could match the power of large main line steam locomotives.

Rather than developing its own diesels, the Great Western Railway looked to gas-turbine power, ordering a 2500hp

prototype locomotive from Swiss company Brown Boveri in 1946.

Delays in construction, and foreign currency shortages, meant that the locomotive was not delivered until after nationalisation, so it was the fledgling British Railways that inherited the project from the GWR.

After tests on the Swiss Federal Railways network in late 1949, No. 18000 was hauled across Europe and arrived in the UK on the Harwich train ferry in February 1950.

Running on six-axle bogies with four traction motors arranged as an AIA-AIA, the II5-ton gas-turbine locomotive had a maximum speed of 90mph, and for low-speed shunting and light-engine moves, an auxiliary diesel engine was fitted – particularly useful in and around London

Paddington, where the noise and fumes of the main engine brought complaints from passengers and residents alike.

Although No. 18000 experienced many problems and failures in service, in its day it was capable of meeting the was expectations. As well as undertaking test runs, it was used on revenue-earning trains between Paddington, Bristol and the West of England, but a combination of heavy fuel consumption, poor reliability and a lack of suitable operations to achieve the necessary efficiency led eventually to the locomotive being set aside after long periods out of traffic.

No. 18000 was eventually withdrawn in 1960 and stored at Swindon Works until 1964, when it was acquired by the International Union of Railways (UIC) and modified for wheel/rail interface

experiments in Switzerland and Austria. No longer gas turbine-powered, it became a hauled vehicle, working with various types of electric locomotives.

By 1975 it was on display outside the Mechanical Engineering test building of the UIC's Arsenal Test Centre in Vienna, where it remained until the early 1990s.

Because so many British enthusiasts recognised No. 18000's significance, however, it returned to the UK in 1994 sponsored by BR's Railfreight Distribution sector, and went to Sheffield's Tinsley depot for external restoration.

Since then this tenacious survivor, now largely empty inside, has been resident at Crewe Heritage Centre, Barrow Hill and Didcot Railway Centre, where it is currently on display, now owned by the Pete Waterman Trust.



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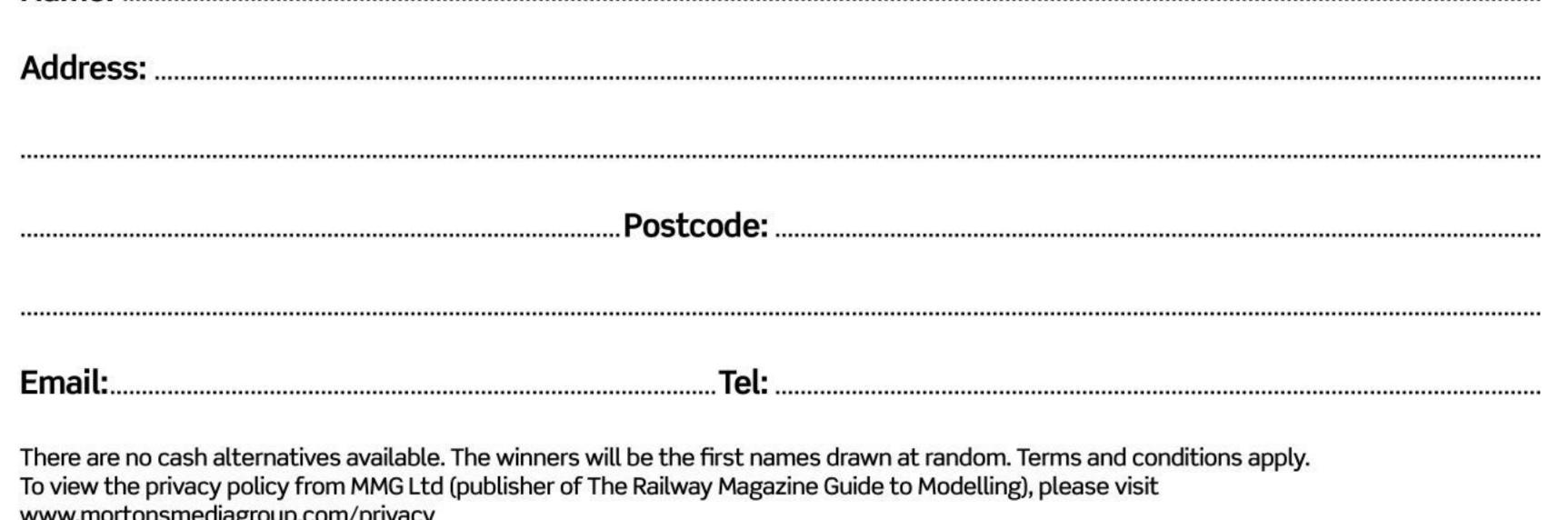

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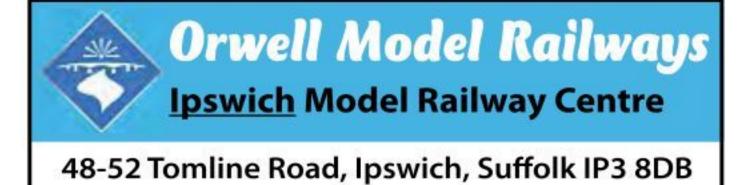
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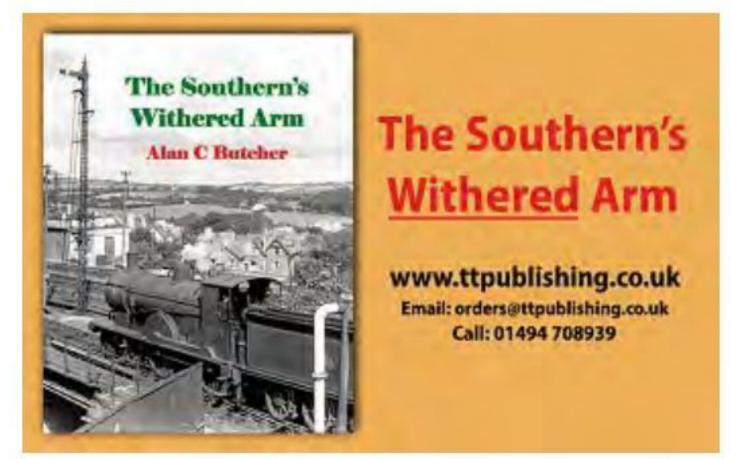
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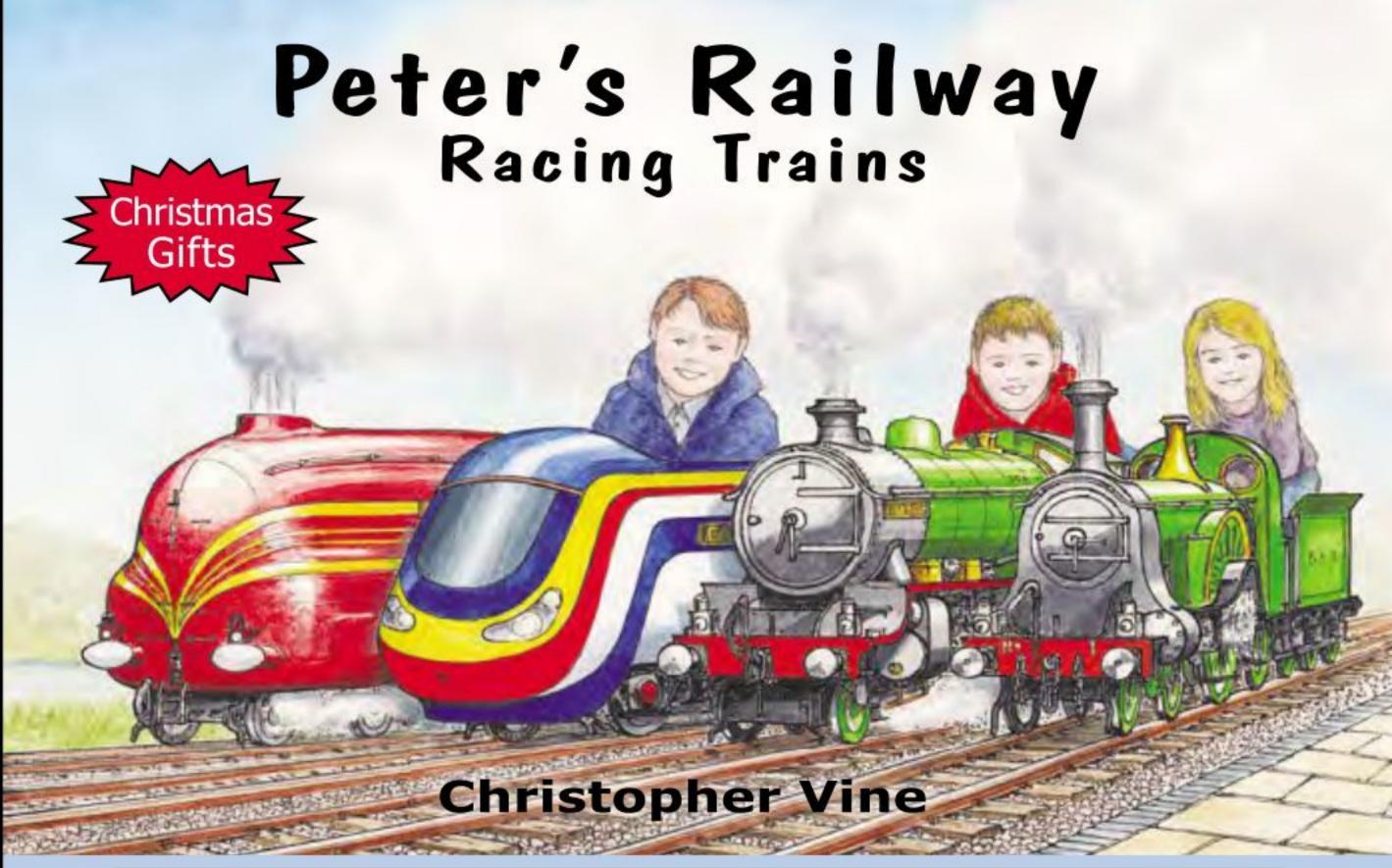
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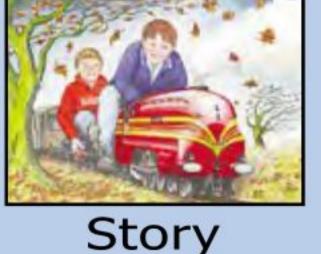
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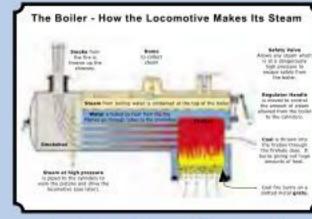
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Looking forward to old coaches

I was delighted to hear that Hatton's are proposing 'generic' models of late 19th century four and six-wheel coaches. I have made many scratch-built models for this period, but with the increasing number of ready-to-run models of locomotives from this period, welcome the arrival of ready-to-run coaches to go with them, even though they will not be 100% correct for each railway.

There are two points in the models that were illustrated that don't look right for any railway.

The wide panel shown adjacent to the left-hand end of both the four and six-wheel coaches indicates that the end compartment is wider on one side than the other. This is particularly odd on the six-wheel coach, where the partition between the compartments is right up to the edge of the window. This was just not normal practice

for any carriage builder. The second feature is the provision of brakes on the centre axle of the six-wheel coach. Six-wheel coaches generally had side play on the centre axle, which was generally unbraked. Leaving the brakes off will also make it easier for modelling.

Hopefully these two sillies will be rectified before design is progressed into tooling, and I look forward to seeing the models. Both of those shown fit well into my requirements. Peter Swift,

Maintenance trolley restored at Severn Valley Railway

In Memories of the East Kent Light Railway by Peter Harding (ISBN 978-0-9523458-2-X) are four photographs of 13hp BR maintenance trolley No. 7, powered by a 1300cc JAP petrol engine, that were taken in 1951. A very similar trolley dating from 1934 was restored at the Severn Valley Railway (see http://www.highleystation.co.uk/ wickham.htm).

Although the friction drive allowed forward and reverse running, the vehicle is effectively single-ended, having one wooden end with windows and canvas side curtains.

The East Kent was in a very open and windswept part of the county and running open-end first on anything other than a summer's day would have been extremely disagreeable.

A small, dismantleable turntable is part of the kit carried on board which would allow for the trolley to be turned for the return journey.

The rails were stowed on one footboard beside the longitudinal seat and the pivot and stretcher assembly carried on hooks across the open end.

The lack of built-in stowage suggests that the turntable was not

intended to be taken on the trolley, and this might be a local adaptation.

One photograph shows the trolley being put away on its turntable with the right-angle track into the shed butting up to the running line. Emma Keir,

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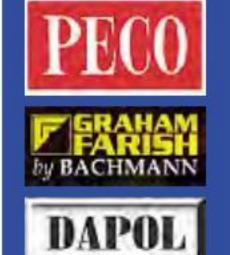

"In 2010, with a global recession, the education market started to become particularly tough, so for the first time in my career I had to think about diversifying the business so that we could keep everyone employed. As model

railways had always been a hobby, and my father-in-law was also keen, we thought we would put a modest range together and launched it at the Alexandra Palace Exhibition in March 2012."

Since then, Train-Tech has built up the range to well over 200 products, variations of which have now won three Innovation of the Year awards, the most recent earlier this year for the 'Smart Screen' animated message board.

One glance through Train-Tech's outstandingly well-detailed, full-colour catalogue of model railway products will have all but the most deeply committed technophobes licking their lips in anticipation of what they could do for their own layouts.

Fitting Train-Tech's 00/ноscale automatic colour-light signalling, with an infra-red sensor built into every signal to detect any train and thus rule out the need for circuit boards, is as simple as ABC. By simply clipping or wiring the signal into your track for fully automated two, three or four-aspect signalling, you can mimic today's main-line signalling to your heart's content – and better still, they can be powered from both analogue DC and digital DCC.

The catalogue doesn't just list the very wide range of signalling equipment, including an sc3 dual Dapol semaphore signal DCC controller designed specifically to control one or two Dapol N or oo-scale semaphore

signals, but also explains in great detail how they work and how to fit them, along with the code number and price for every single item.

Easy-to-fit DCC point controllers allow the control of points and uncouplers at

a touch. All the modeller has to do is connect two wires to nearby DCC rails while screw terminals connect three wires to any standard point motor (Peco, Hornby etc.). Once again, the process is explained in detail.

Apart from colour-light

signalling, Train-Tech's development of other lifelike lighting effects has been rapid, the latest sensation being the miniaturised smart screens for stations, motorways and roadsides, trains and coaches which have become a part of

everyday life – and of course you can fully customise your own screen messages. The small modules have everything built inside, so the modeller needs only connect two wires to DC or DCC power to make them come alive.

Train-Tech's Smart Lights lighting effects, embracing everything from the blue flashing lights of emergency vehicles to bright white arcwelding flashes (followed by a slowly dimming red glow from the weld cooling down), can be used to make a layout really come to life.

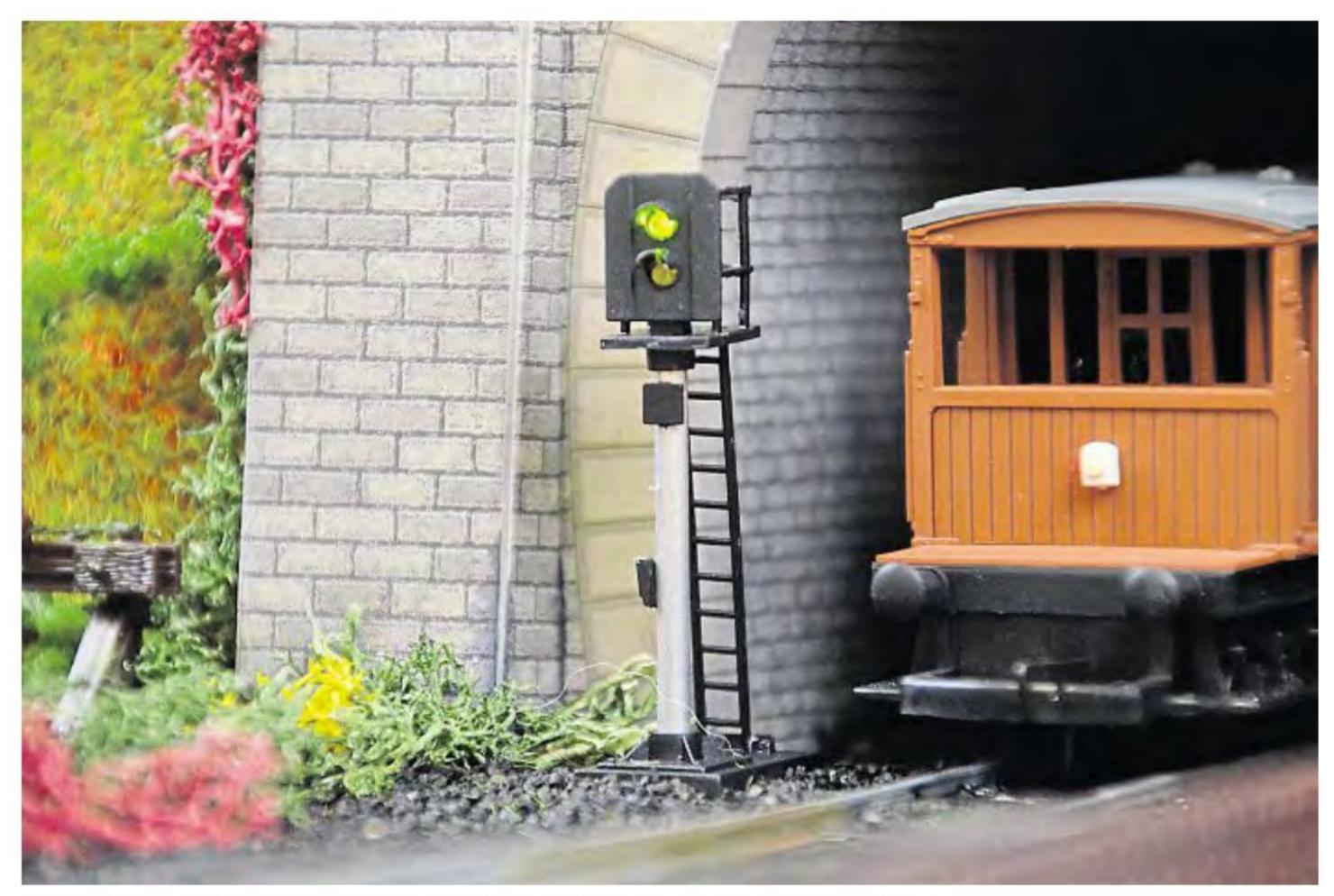

They really let the imagination rip, and the catalogue even tells how modellers can make a barbecue by taking one of the small metal casings that hold rubbers at the bottom of pencils, filling the case with cotton wool and mounting a fire effect Smart Light at the top!

Traffic lights, barrier crossing lights, home and shop lighting and even random lighting that turns on and off to simulate the similar activity in various rooms of houses and other buildings are also available.

Train-Tech's AL automatic lighting effects for trains involve the fitting of a tiny module to brake van, carriage and locomotive models. No switch is involved, because the modules incorporate a motion sensor that detects train movement and turns on the lighting automatically.

Various effects, from constant lighting for coaches and headlights to modern flashing tail-lights and flickering flame effects for steam locomotive fireboxes or oil lantern tail lights (which flicker more as the train bumps over the track) make the experience so much more realistic.

After the ever-changing signalling, smart screens, emergency vehicle and other lighting effects, the application of sound will complete the picture of absolute reality. Sound Track is Train-Tech's easy-to-use portable sound recorder that enables modellers to record their own sounds, take them home and replay them automatically on their layouts.

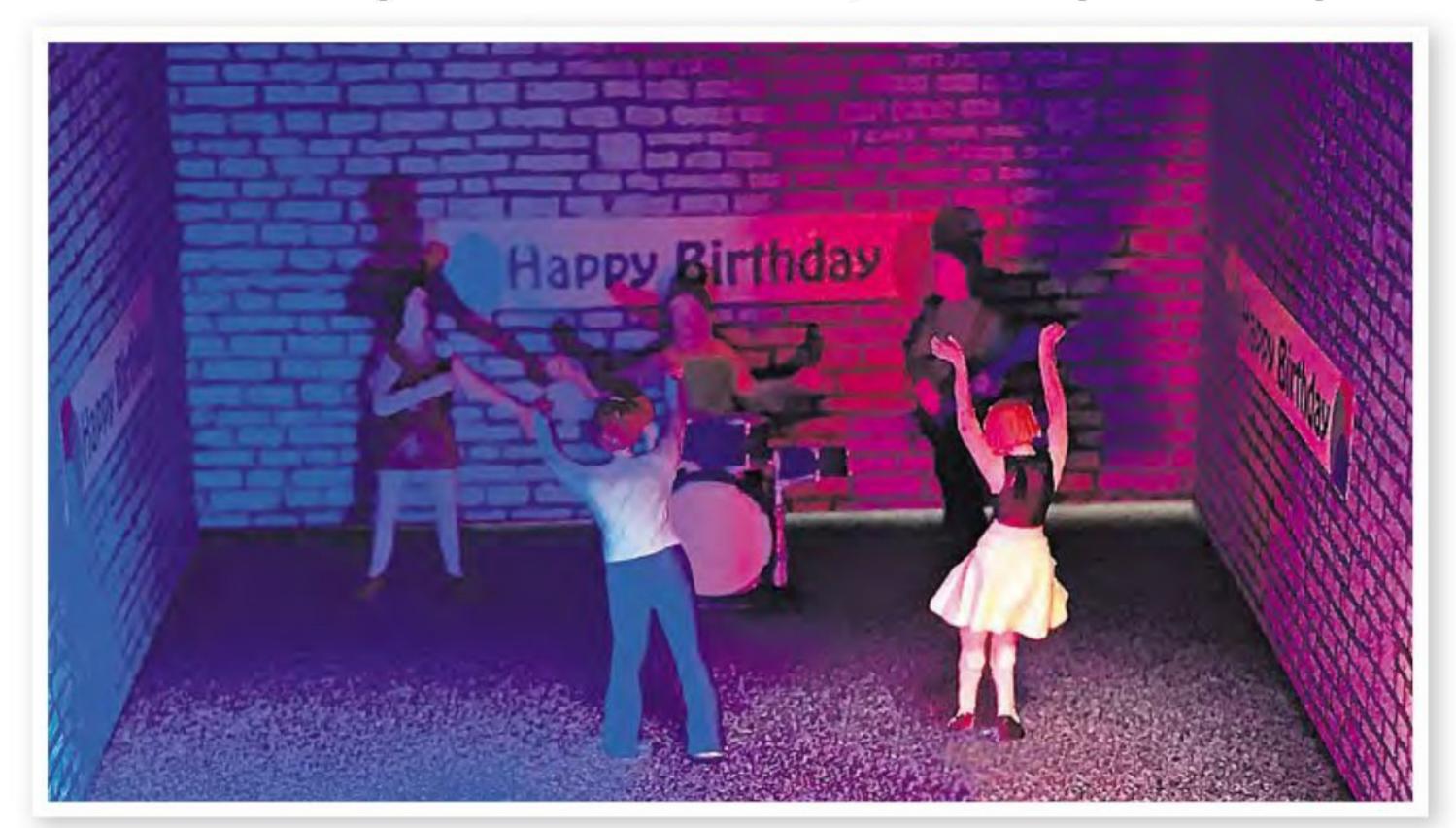

Hornby re-releases the Mk.1 GUV

The former 00-gauge Lima Mk.1 General Utility Van (GUV), which became part of the Hornby range when it acquired the Lima business in late 2004, has reappeared decorated in BR maroon. **Nigel Burkin** takes a look.

HE LATEST LIVERY TO BE APPLIED to the former Lima 'oo' gauge guv model by Hornby is lined BR maroon with the number W86468 (R4936) providing an early-condition version of the model. It remains very much the same as when produced by Lima, except that the livery finishes are now generally better researched and applied.

Despite its age, the model remains highly regarded, and even today offers a great deal of modelling opportunities including detailing, repainting projects and some conversions.

Body shell

The construction of the body shell is the same, with a removable roof with integrally moulded and undersize roof shell vents. The body moulding

is finely detailed with fine side grille detail below the window line and crisp double-leaf door details including the external hinges, door stops and handles. End loading door detail is also well represented with neatly moulded strapping and bolt head detailing.

By today's standards, the level of detail applied to the body shell moulding is good, and helps the model capture the character of the slab-sided Mk.1 guvs well.

Glazing is not flush with the sides as would be seen on the full-sized GUVs. Safety bars are moulded on the reverse side of the windows which can be fitted with hand-made glazing and wire window bars. Fortunately, the window frames are moulded as part of the body and not the glazing inserts, making a re-glaze project relatively simple to complete.

Underframe and bogies

A separate floor is clipped into the body shell, which has a very neatly moulded set of trussing fitted to it. Underframe detail includes vacuum brake cylinders, separate dynamo moulding of the correct pattern, brake wheels and battery boxes. The detail is correct for an 'as built' GUV and matches the early condition livery well.

Bogies are Lima's interpretation of B1 bogies, and have retained the large tension lock couplings, being moulded as part of the bogie frames. No NEM coupling pockets have been fitted to the model, yet there is room behind the headstocks for a close coupling mechanism such as the Kean system.

Hornby has fitted undersize threehole disc wheels which would have to be replaced with 14mm coach disc wheels to be correct – B1 bogies would have been fitted with larger coach disc wheels. They have 25mm long axles to fit the narrower bogie frames, making conversion to closer-to-scale gauges difficult unless the bogies are replaced with etched frames.

Livery and finishing

A nice dull shade of BR maroon is applied to the body shell, with pin-sharp lining above and below the window line which is opaque and of a consistent width. Lettering of the data panel is also accurately researched and nicely printed, the lettering being legible. The roof is finished in the correct grey shade for BR maroon livery, and small details including door handles are picked out in unpainted metal.

The former Lima guv is not a bad model by today's standards except for the bogies. It remains a good source of conversion and repainting material for experienced modellers and the slightly narrow bogies are fine for operation on an 00-gauge layout. The oversize couplings do detract from the model's overall appearance, and while some modellers might consider the £36.99 price tag a little steep for an unaltered model from the Lima range, retailer discounting should bring the price down to a more reasonable level.

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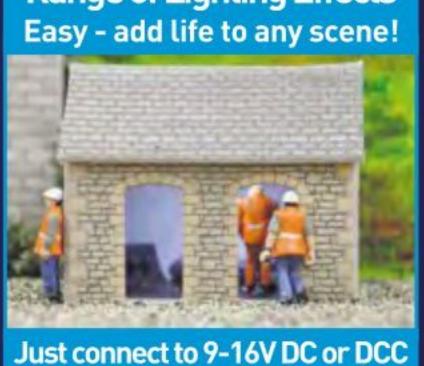

Model review of the year

Top model choices from 2019

Making a choice from the diverse range of models released during 2019, all of which were produced to a high standard, is not an easy task, but **Nigel Burkin** rises to the challenge to make his own top picks for 2019. We begin with the steam locomotive models, followed by diesel, electric, rolling stock and a rail head treatment train in the January issue.

are being challenged by the rise of small and emerging manufacturers which are also raising standards in accuracy and technical innovation.

During 2019 they grew alongside more traditional manufacturers, with some interesting releases arriving in the shops or being made available through dedicated channels.

Accurascale and Irish Railway Models successfully introduced the concept of runner packs for 00-gauge wagon models with packs of two, three and five models being made the norm, all with individual running numbers and bespoke markings in some cases.

Cavalex showed what can be done with care and enthusiasm with the release of its Redland hopper wagons, the second release of which is imminent.

O gauge continues to grow in popularity, and manufacturer support is keeping pace, with Dapol and Heljan producing some exemplary models at attractive prices. From exquisite steam locomotives to rolling stock, both companies have models in the 2019 top picks.

As we went to press, Dapol released its O-scale lower quadrant signals which would be included in the cut for 2019 for layout accessories (see page 45).

Technological developments are also being advanced, with ever-moresophisticated electronics being built into models for lighting effects, digital sound and control. The Bachmann oo-gauge Class 90 stands out, with its dedicated decoder for operation of the pantograph and advanced locomotive lighting. Dapol's N-gauge Class 50 has electronics for advanced lighting effects when fitted with the appropriate NEXT18 decoder.

Its Version 2 00-gauge Class 73 also featured more advanced lighting circuitry for cab and running lights, exploring what can be done with multiple-pole plug and play decoders and circuit board switching.

Rolling stock is increasing steadily in price, with a single 00-gauge coach priced between £35 and £75 and wagons typically £30 to £55 each, which could be a factor in pushing some modellers towards O gauge when the cost of the O-gauge Dapol haa wagon came in at £55 and its new 9ft wheelbase salt wagons were priced at £50, with other models based on the same underframe being attractively priced.

Hornby has been one of the most prolific manufacturers in 2019, with a host of new coaches for GWR and BR modellers including the Collett GWR main line stock reviewed in this issue alongside the Maunsell suburban coaches and BR Mk.2f stock.

Its 2019 release programme is far from complete, but the delightful Peckett B2 0-6-ost locomotive arrived in time to make the cut.

Most of the diesel and electric model releases for 2019 consisted of reissues

of the Class 31, HST and Class 60 locomotives, and Hornby won a lot of friends by producing some interesting versions of the Class 66 in various liveries using the former Lima tooling as a basis for the budget models.

Its TTS digital sound package was included in these models and many others, including a DB Schenker Class 60, at competitive prices.

There is no doubt that wallets and payment cards took a little beating this year. The following is the final cut of models that have done much to enrich the hobby and inspire layouts and dioramas.

Some of the models represent progress made in the hobby, while others are included for the simple pleasure they have given.

Here are some of my top steam locomotive choices for the year.

Heljan O-gauge 43XX

In O gauge, the Heljan GWR/BR 43xx class 2-6-0 finished in lined BR green livery romps in with its amazing likeness to the full-sized locomotives.

A masterpiece in injection-moulded plastic, it is detailed to a very high standard including cab backhead and a wealth of detail on the engine itself, and photographing it was a real pleasure. When its £779 price tag is considered for the level of detail and fine running, it is good value for money and difficult to have one built for that price.



One of the more useful accessories is the KPF-Zeller rolling road that was used to test the superb Heljan O-gauge 43XX 2-6-0 locomotive.

Its features include:

- Finely tooled body shell assembly with subtle detail for rivets and boiler bands.
- A detail-rich moulding for the tender.
 Tender fitted with brake rodding and water chute detail.
- Sprung plastic buffers.
- Separately applied wire hand rails and hand rail knobs.
- Five-pole motor with brass flywheel.Designed to accept an ESU Loksound
- L4.0 digital sound decoder.Illuminated firebox with fire glow.
- Illuminated firebox with fire glow.
 Detailed cab with separately fitted
- pipes and controls to the backhead.
- Cab interior details painted with appropriate colours.
- Adjustable sprung screw link couplings and coupling guards.
- Separate footplate to tender fall plate.
- Separately moulded number plate.Separate whistle and safety valve detail.

- Brake details fitted in line with the driving wheels.
- Length: 410mm over the buffers.
- Weight fully assembled including tender: 1540g.

Hornby 'Princess Coronation' Pacifics

Hornby is particularly good at large main line steam locomotives, and its 'defrocked' LMS 'Duchesses' made a good impression on the team at *RMM*. The two review models are a great representation of what the company is capable of.

Both models, blue-liveried BR
No. 46225 Duchess of Gloucester (R3682)
and LMS lined black No. 6241 City of
Edinburgh (R3681), were featured this
year and are reissued models following
the successful introduction of the
model in 2017, which included a new
mechanism which performed well.





Hornby's main line steam locomotive models continue to impress, and its 'defrocked' 'Duchess' Pacifics issued this year will have been welcome additions to LMS/BR transition and BR eras. The brand new 'Princess Royal' locomotives were still to be released at the time of writing.



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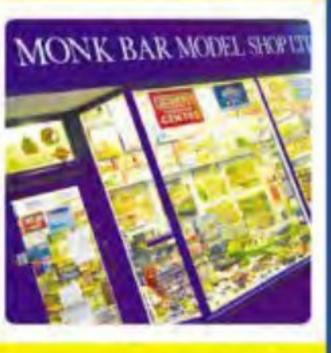


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Model finishing included a great deal of detail painting alongside a host of separate detailing parts which enhances the well-proportioned body and tender of both models.

Hornby Peckett B2 0-6-0ST locomotive

The beauty of industrial shunting engines is that most modellers can find an excuse to own at least one. Hornby has been clever with its choice of liveries, too, with the green Westminster perfect for some refinishing and customisation for freelanced industrial railways.

So far, two models have been issued for review, including a model of the locomotive that worked at Ryhope Colliery. Superbly detailed, including some lovely cab fittings and a smooth running mechanism, the Pecketts are well on their way to selling out in many shops at the time of writing.

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Solutions, not problems

Ian Lamb ponders the future of our railway modelling hobby, and visits Model Railway Solutions of Poole, Dorset, while nearing completion of his walking and cycling exploration of what remains of the former Somerset & Dorset line.

an enquiry by a young man at the London Festival of Railway Modelling who wanted to take up the hobby that I realised how difficult it sometimes can be to always give a positive answer.

Railway modelling is such a vast subject that it's virtually impossible to give a 'one system suits all' approach, and in this instance I managed to whittle down our conversation to the key elements outlined by the enquirer, who now lives in London but spent his childhood fascinated by Indian railways.

With the help of immediate fellow MRC members, I managed to convince him that, being locally based, he should spend time at Keen House talking to as many enthusiasts as possible, viewing various layouts for variety, and take as many trips as he could on preserved lines to experience the ideal atmosphere for his intended layout before making his first model purchase.

Then I suddenly realised that this approach was a major part of *RMM*'s philosophy.

In it together

We're all in this together, and unless everyone's needs are met, whether as groups or individuals, we cannot expect the hobby to continue and prosper. Face-to-face contact, along with regular shared experience, can only be achieved locally, so relevant retailers must be on hand.

By coincidence, I was completing a five-year project exploring on foot and by bicycle what remains of the former Somerset & Dorset Railway from Bath to Bournemouth. I had only the section from Blandford Forum to do, so sought the support of long-standing railway friend Dave Coasby, who now lives in the area. Through his links with the Wimbourne Railway Society and retailer Model Railway Solutions of Poole, I have managed not only to complete my railway venture, but also see at how all model railway aspirations can be so easily achieved when all sources are truly linked in a common purpose – and long may it continue!

Exhibition layouts

Two modelling friends – Steve Knight and Martin Forder – established Model Railway Solutions in 2010 to operate the specialist machinery required for producing their flat-pack baseboard kits.

The current, much larger premises on the edge of Bournemouth was located almost two years ago, enabling them to provide full model railway services, and they are well known on the exhibition circuit with layouts 'Horfield', 'New Kensal Green' and location for 'Bournemouth West' featuring the southern terminus of the S&D line.

Expansion of the premises has resulted in Jamie (Steve's son) joining the staff, along with Nick Prior. Truly a 'one-stop shop', additionally offering its own products including locally- sourced

back-to-back gauges, self-adhesive cork underlay cut to shape for all popular track and point geometry, electrical items and tools.

Collections are purchased, and a part-exchange service is available, along with the sale of pre-owned items. Mail order, weathering, respraying, DCC decoder fitting and sound installation services are also available. A fully-functioning website with real-time stock control enables those outside the area to order with confidence.

Strong links exist with both Poole and Wimbourne model railway clubs, including a five-year sponsorship of the Poole exhibition.

Steve concluded: "Our goal is to provide a quality environment in

which products are well displayed and where customers can receive the advice they so often require. Why not call by if you're in the area and see what we can offer. We have free parking outside the door, and the kettle is usually on!"

Wimbourne Railway Society has a membership of around 100 of all ages, coming from all occupations and backgrounds, and do their best to have fun. On most club nights you can join the argument about which engines are the best, use the test track, read a book from the society's library or just relax. There is also a video and DVD hire section.

The society tries to be as inclusive as possible, and ladies and younger members are always welcome. Juniors under 18 also have free access to

the clubroom and meetings when accompanied by an adult. Any prospective member is encouraged to visit Wimbourne for up to three times before deciding whether or not to join.

Thursdays are for speakers, presentations or simply to run your new locomotive on the multi-gauge test track while chatting with other members about anything that takes your fancy.

Tuesday evenings are for modellers to work on the Wimbourne Model Railway Society's layouts or maybe preparing for an exhibition. You can put your skills to work or even learn new ones by working alongside more experienced modellers, and 'Wimbourne's' colour-coded control system is quite something!

As shown in Sturminster Newton – and plenty of other places throughout Britain - it is good to record a moment in time in the landscape.

Whether or not your interest is in exploring old railways, walking, taking a nostalgic trip into the past or developing your modelling skills, a local club and supporting model shop are essential for success. Here in sunny Dorset they have it all. Much of the former S&D Railway track is there to be walked or cycled on, and heritage experiences at Midsomer Norton and Shillingstone are also worth a visit.

Vast knowledge

The Wimbourne Model Railway Society has vast modelling knowledge, and Poole's Model Railway Solutions will provide you with the proverbial 'needle to an anchor' as far as model railways are concerned. What more could you want?

I'll certainly make at least one more trip to

complete my walk/cycle to the one-time terminal station at Bournemouth West.

Alas, most of the route is now simply impossible due to urbanisation, and in some instances it's difficult to locate any trace of where the railway once ran. Bath Green Park may well be just be a car park, but at least the primary infrastructure of the former S&D northern terminus is magnificently preserved. As far as 'Bournemouth West' is concerned, there may no longer be any physical site to seek, but no doubt many past images exist.

Thanks to superb modellers like Roger Sunderland, Dave Bayman and friends, a very accurate and stunning exhibition layout has been created which was seen at 'The Great Electric Train Show' in October. When I walk my way through today's Bournemouth to complete my project, these craftsmen have ensured that a one-time scene will never be forgotten.

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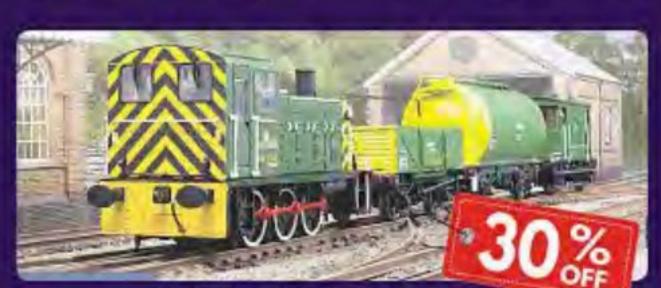
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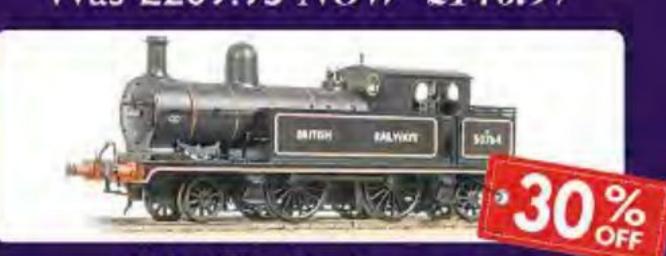
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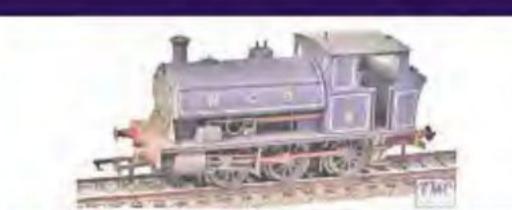

Constructing a road bridge adds interest and height

NE END OF MY GREAT EASTERN loco shed layout features a long road bridge comprising a short girder section and a long lattice structure. The bridge spans the single line leading to the shed, with the track dropping below the baseboard directly beneath it.

An engine climbs the incline to the shed, adding to the interest. Construction involved lowering that section of the baseboard by using a jig saw, and it will provide quite a challenge when the layout is in operation.

Invertrain supplied the girder sides, and Skytrex the lattice bridge. The lattice sides

did require a bit of work removing flash, which happens with many resin models these days, but once this had been done, the bridge certainly looked the part.

For lightness, the rest of the bridge structure was made from balsa, clad with Slater's dressed stone and duly painted. I constructed the entire bridge to the width of the lattice structure, adding pavements on each side and so somewhat narrowing it. The scene was enhanced by a couple of 1930s-era Oxford model cars, various figures and a little of the horse manure that was omnipresent back then.

I was a little out on the 90% angle of the sides supporting the girder bridge, so had to hide my mistake (we all make them!) by using dark green foliage to represent ivy on the uprights, and fortunately this is not really noticeable. I confess that the girder bridge aperture is a little narrow, but it fits nicely into the 2ft x 5ft baseboard. I also incorporated a lot of greenery in front of the bridge, located beside a church. Two tracks sit on the baseboard below

the latticed structure. One is the single track running line, and the other leads up to the coaling point. There was also enough room for a road leading to the small coal yard, consisting of a point and siding, adjacent to the running line, and adding the line allows a small goods or local passenger train to be featured for yet more interest.

I put the running track at the front of the layout, allowing the use of an

extra baseboard if required, but for the moment I'll just stick to the shed!

Since Pete's visit to take the photos, more detail has been added in many areas. The track is now ballasted, with the running line using Woodland coarse stone

ballast and the rest using smokebox char. No wiring has yet been done, and I still have to add track colour and paint the rails, so there's still plenty to do!

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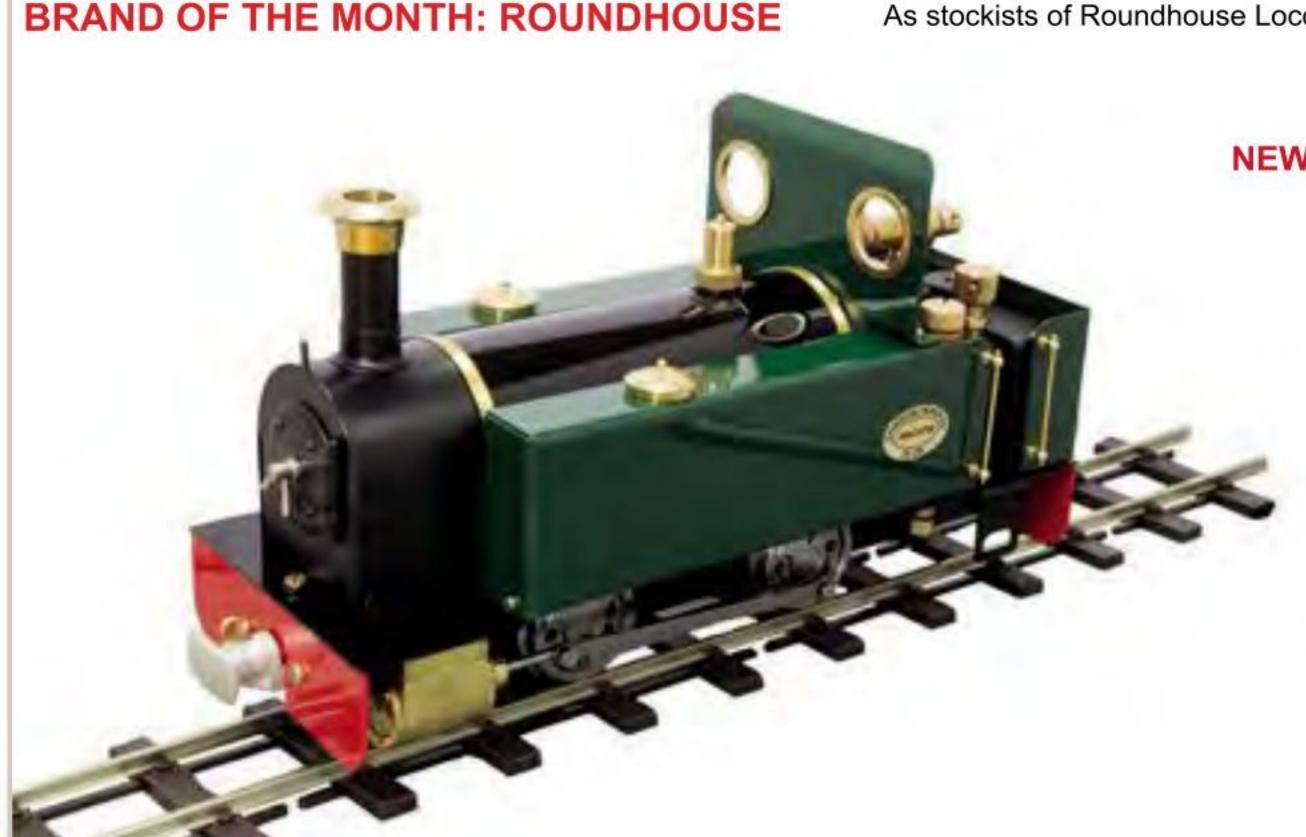
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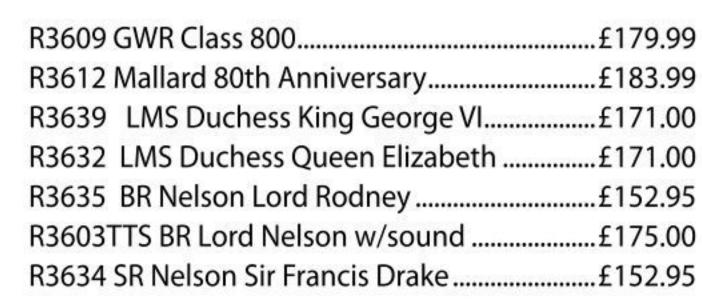














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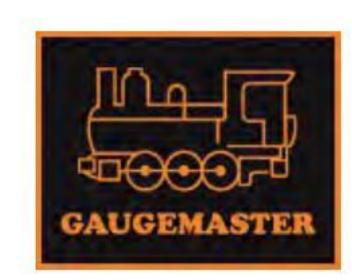
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Busy weekend for Caistor Model Railway Show

Dedicated to the memory of Ian Coo, whose passing was the first of a club member in almost 25 years, the Caistor Model Railway Show on October 26-27 turned out to be one of the busiest in recent years

HE TOWN HALL VENUE WAS PACKED from the moment the doors opened, and by Sunday afternoon even the food in the kitchen, where members had been serving up bacon rolls, hot drinks and other snacks without a break, almost ran out!

Traders including Booklaw, Caistor Loco and Elaine's Trains had a great weekend, and Grimsby-born railway author Paul King was there to sign his books about The Railways of North East Lincolnshire (see Book Reviews on page 31).

Visitors found a carefully chosen variety of layouts large and small, in various gauges, including Hull Miniature Railway Society's oo-scale 'Driffield', a time capsule in which the area around the East Yorkshire market town's railway station has been faithfully re-created to depict the steam/diesel crossover period - and one of the operators, Arthur, was celebrating his 91st birthday!

From Ian Johnson's P4-gauge 'Tredethy Wharf', inspired by the former goodsonly Wenfordbridge branch of the Bodmin & Wadebridge Railway, to Hull Model Railway Club's 009-gauge 'High Stamley' (Paul Windle), depicting a branch line in its final days of operation from Stamley station to a quarry in the hills above, there was something for every visitor to ponder over.

Different again was Sleaford Model Railway Club's oo-scale 'Operation Bolero' (Eddie King), based around a small goods yard at a secret Midlands location where wagons and other military equipment was being loaded in preparation for the D-Day landings, and much thought had also gone into Martin Lichfield's O-scale 'Crompton Road Stabling Point', based somewhere in the north of England in the Rail Blue period, with locomotives laying over and refuelling in preparation for their next duties.

Another great layout for modern traction fans was the N-scale 'Millfield Yard' (Pauline McKenna), set around London in the period between 1990 and privatisation, with a dazzling selection of freight loco liveries at the lower level and an upper level allowing mainly third-rail passenger operation.

Based loosely on the present-day Colton Junction, to the south-west of York where the East Coast Main Line meets that between York and Leeds, the oo-scale 'Appleton Junction' (Pete Brackenbury) supposes that mining subsidence has meant the junction being moved to Appleton. The 1957-63 era in which the layout is set allows an interesting mix of steam and diesel motive power.



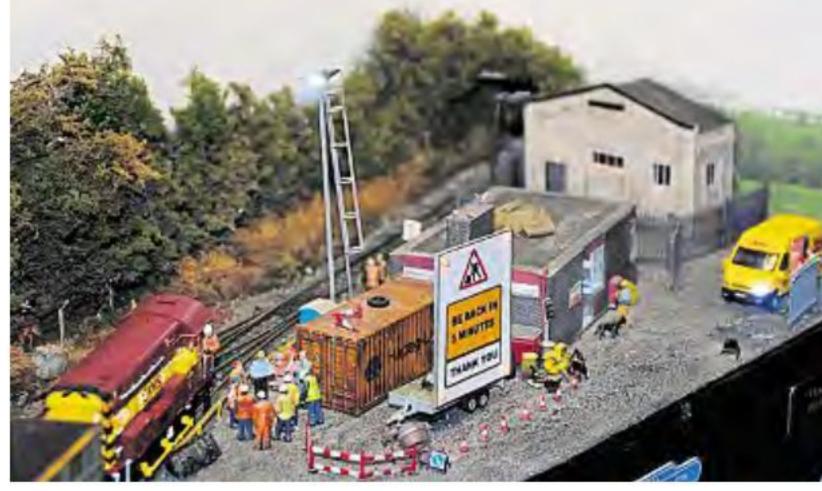

Set around Breydon Water and the surrounding marshes, the oo-scale 'Breydon', an imaginary small community branch line leaving the main Great Yarmouth line between Breydon Junction and Berney Arms station, was exhibited by Kenneth Bannister.

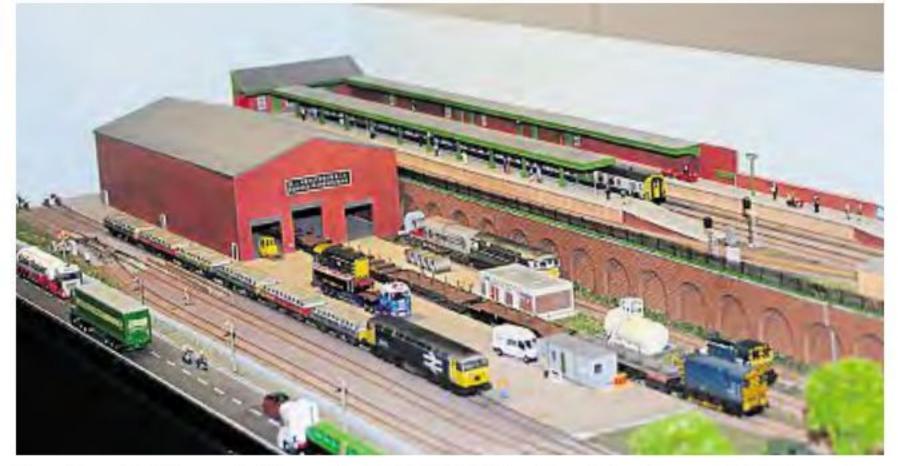
Much interest was shown in Shaun Holland's 'Entering the Yard', again in 00 scale, a micro layout set in modern times and showing just how much can be fitted into a really small space. Visitors were asked to identify as many animals and other objects as possible

among the scenic dioramas.

In 7mm narrow gauge, the end-to-end 'Mill Lane' layout (Dave Holmes) was based on what might have been the North Holderness Light Railway, with scenic features including a goods and coal yard and an abandoned quarry branch.



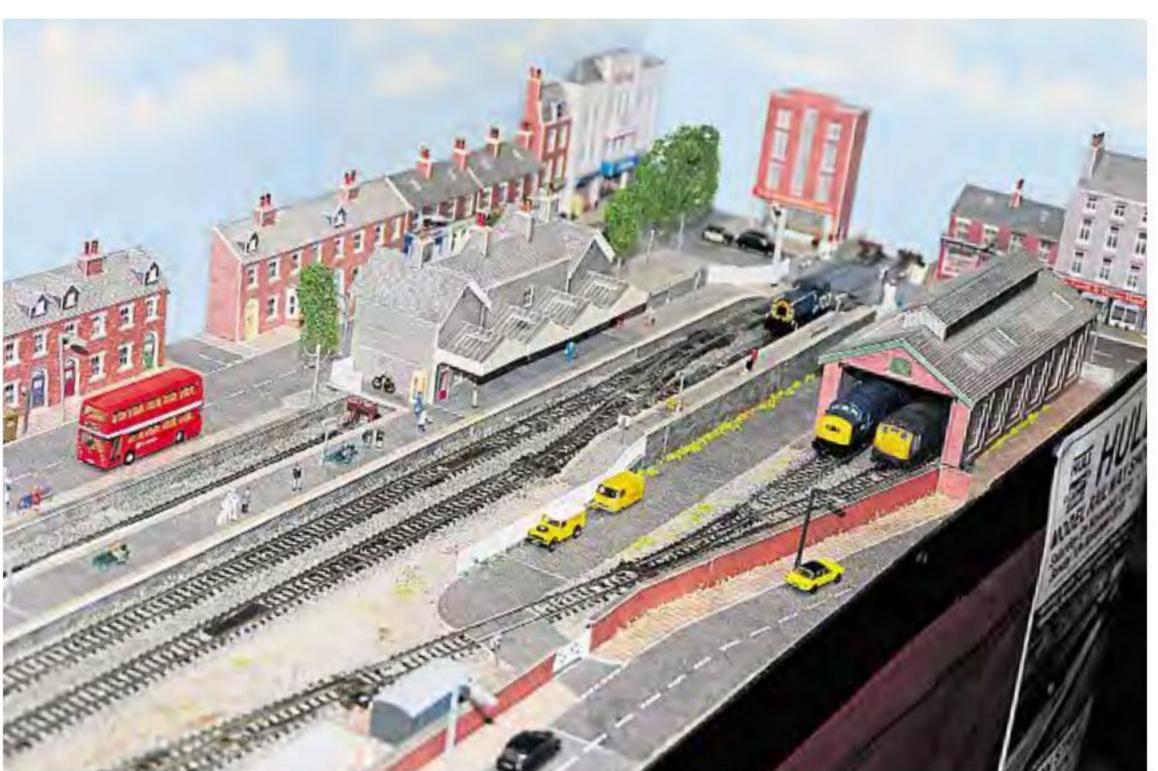

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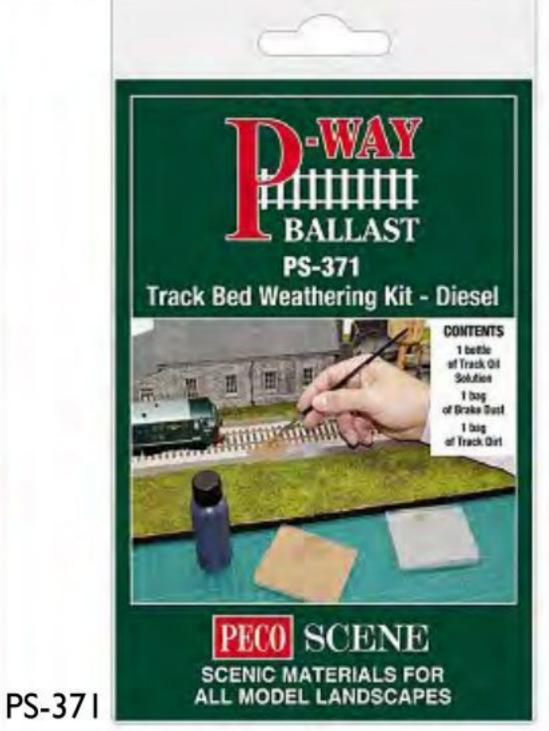
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Book reviews

Land of the lost

Pete Kelly reviews two outstanding books by Paul King looking at the history of the railways of North East Lincolnshire.

Since moving to rural Lincolnshire 18 years ago, I have had more than enough time to lament the virtual elimination of the once-intricate web of railways that once linked towns, villages and holiday resorts throughout the county.

While many of the beautiful Great Northern Railway station buildings remain intact, the lines they once served have long disappeared, axed without mercy following the publication of Dr Richard Beeching's 1963 report 'The Reshaping of British Railways' - but to put everything into perspective, many such closures in the county had occurred years before anyone even knew who Dr Beeching was!

I'd been meaning to review Paul King's two A4-sized glossy paperbacks The Railways of North East Lincolnshire, Part 1 The Engine Sheds and their Allocations, and Part Two The Stations – for some time, but when I realised he was doing book signing sessions at October's Caistorail Model Railway Show in Caistor, I could put off buying them no more.

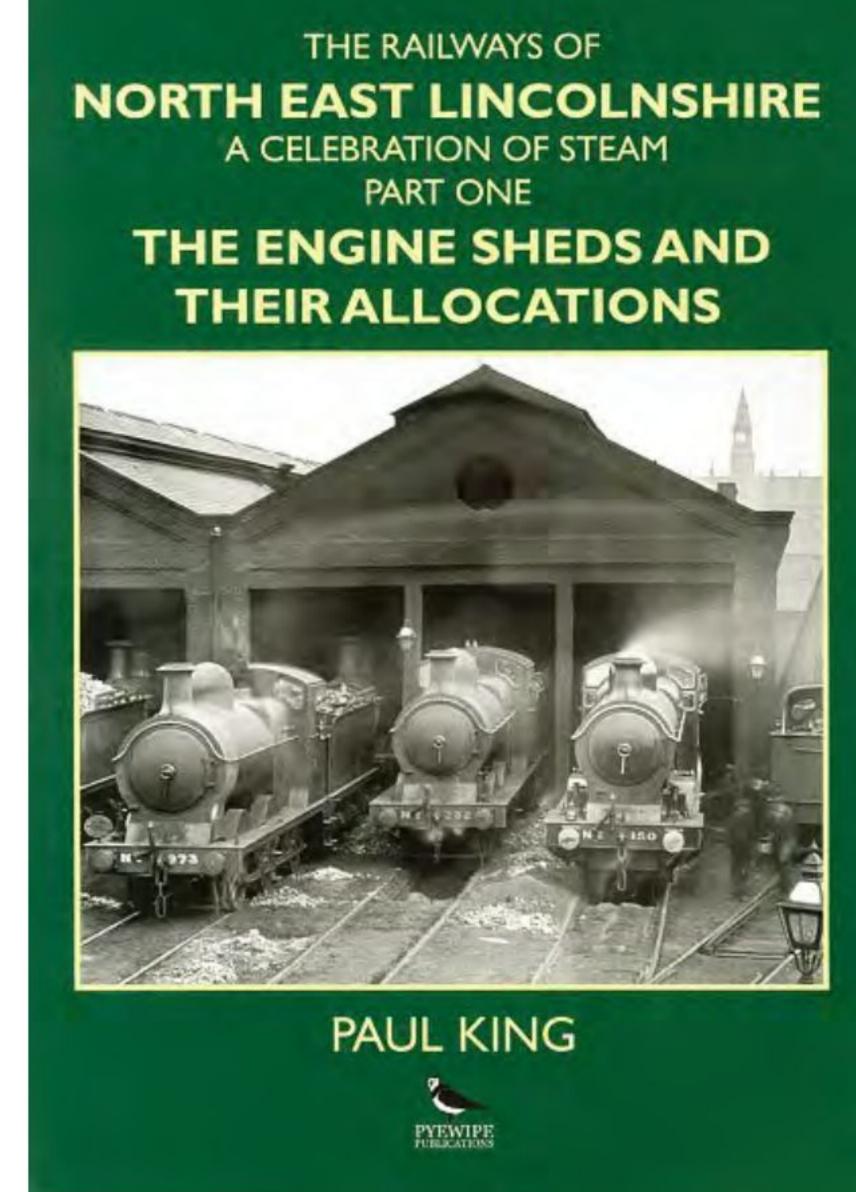
Printed on thick, high-gloss pages, both 112-page titles are richly illustrated with black and white photographs taking readers back to the times when holiday-making crowds poured from trains arriving at Mablethorpe or Cleethorpes from Nottingham,

and many other places, and when express fish trains and the humble pickup goods were everyday sights.

Many of the places I drive through, such as Louth, Alford, Mablethorpe, Woodhall Spa, Spilsby, New Bolingbroke, Wragby and Horncastle, have had no railway links for at least half a century, yet Lincolnshire's rural roads are among the most dangerous in the country. That's progress, I suppose!

Wherever I look, the roots of old station buildings and large cleared areas that were once goods yards are still clearly identifiable, but from the allimportant modelling point of view, Paul King's immaculately researched titles showing them just as they used to be are invaluable.

If I wanted to model, say, the station at Willoughby, where GNR C12 Atlantic tanks once handled the local passenger trains to Louth via Mablethorpe, a superb succession of photos rolls back the curtain of time and everything becomes crystal clear, from the main canopied platform building and the much smaller one on the other side, the diverging Mablethorpe loop, the latticegirder footbridge and even the well-kept station gardens. Not only that, but the author has also amassed a collection of old timetables, along with details of many rail excursions, that are invaluable in understanding the rail traffic flows of the day.



and even A5 4-6-2Ts – and if you think that's interesting, Immingham (which has been expertly modelled at the town's civic centre) was one of the biggest and most desirable sheds to visit in the county, with a huge allocation of locomotives of every conceivable type and antiquity – all faithfully listed, of course.

The book about stations includes a seven-page timeline of significant dates in the history of North East Lincolnshire railways, listing all the openings and closures along the way.

Yes, the East Coast Main Line still runs through Lincolnshire, and there are still a few main stations left, but on the whole the second biggest county in England has

become a vast emptiness as far as railways are concerned – and don't forget that Paul King's two books (with a third one about docks, trams, ferries, excursions and freight still to come) cover only one area of the county.

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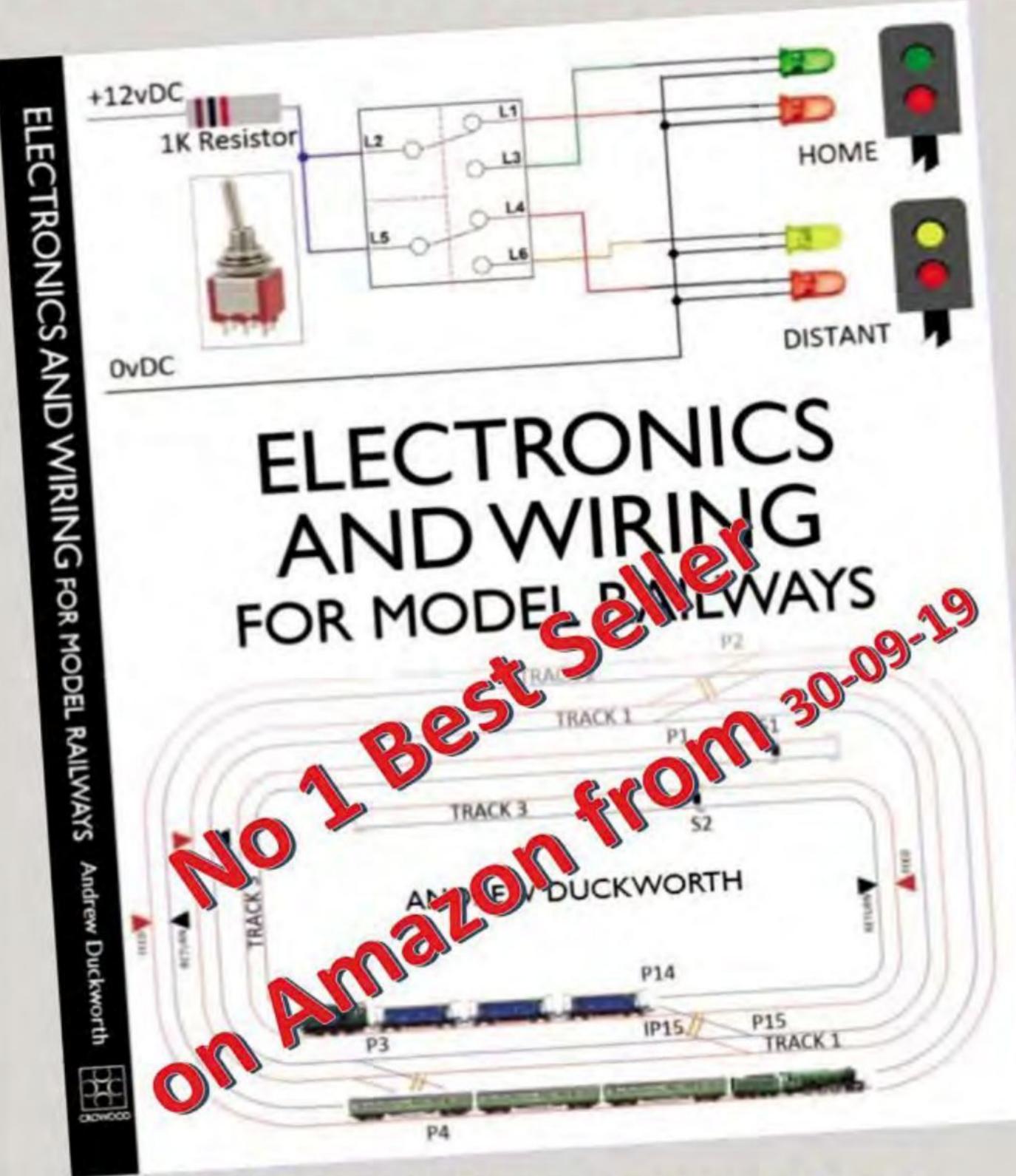
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Painting basics part 2: airbrushes

With so many different airbrushes available, which type is best for railway modelling? **Nigel Burkin** investigates.

yet to a certain degree, each is designed to do a specific job. They have different features, different ways of accepting colour medium, and deliver subtly different results depending on needle and nozzle sizes. So how do you choose an airbrush for railway modelling applications?

For modellers, repainting locomotives and rolling stock is the primary reason for owning an airbrush, followed by the need to apply weathering techniques and painting small details on a layout. Which airbrush suits this purpose? There's no single answer to that question because everyone has a different approach to painting and weathering which demands slightly different things from an airbrush.

My personal preference is for mid-to higherend dual-action airbrushes with gravity feed and internal paint to air atomisation. However, choices are personal and not everyone would find my painting station set-up ideal. Some modellers achieve great things from budget airbrushes, and might find the simplicity of external mix airbrushes better than more refined internal mix types.

There are other factors also to consider, some of which are determined by the paints we use in model railway applications.

Making choices

You have to decide what you need from an airbrush (or two if applications vary a great deal). The most important is your level of experience. High-end airbrushes might be too much for a newcomer to model railway painting, yet provide fine spray patterns suitable for N-gauge modelling, fine weathering and detail painting in larger scales. On the other hand, some entry-level airbrushes cope well

with the coarser paints we regularly use, so I'll start with exactly that question.

1. Which type of paints will you need to spray? Primarily, railway modellers use acrylic and enamelbased paints which are relatively coarse compared to artist inks and other media. This precludes airbrushes with very fine needle assemblies. The smaller the needle and nozzle diameter, the finer the spray pattern. However, do you really need a fine spray pattern from needle and nozzle assemblies smaller than 0.35mm? They can be awkward to clean of solvent-based paints and require particular care.

2. What is your budget? Bear in mind you might need a compressor, moisture trap and some safety equipment when allocating scarce funds to setting up a spraying station!

3. Desired performance is an important factor. Most quality airbrushes can spray down to a fine line with practice, including entry-level ones. The Iwata Revolution series is an excellent entry-level airbrush which can spray very fine lines and also works well with detail painting. On the flip-side, a higher-end airbrush might provide more control over an entry-level one for fine painting effects. Furthermore, the level of control is determined by whether the airbrush is single-action or dual-action. This might be a factor when deciding what you want to paint — be it weathering, fine detail or broad stroke repaints of larger models.

4. What are you planning to paint? This comes down to whether you plan to undertake full repaints of ready-to-run models; are involved in kit-building work; plan to do fine weathering work; or wish to complete simple refinishing projects. The choice of airbrush and its needle and nozzle assembly will be a factor in achieving the desired spray pattern and coverage rates for those applications.

5. How good is your air supply? Depending on how much you have spent on a compressor, how

powerful it is and whether it has an airreceiving tank, check specifications to see if your choice of airbrush works well at low air pressures.

Airbrushes are also designed for particular applications and skill levels. Experience also has a part to play to achieve the best from them. It's hard to teach someone to spray paint – all one can do is demonstrate use of the equipment and, as in photography, practice will do the rest. So what features should be considered when selecting an airbrush beyond the tip and needle size?

Internal or external mix?

The paint is mixed with the air supply and atomised within the body of the airbrush at the tip but within the cap of the airbrush, providing a very fine level of spray and finer spray patterns that can be brought down to a fine line.

In comparison, external-mix airbrushes do not mix the paint and air within the body. The air flows over the spray tip to atomise paint outside the body of the airbrush. Both types have different applications. Experienced modellers usually prefer internal mix because it delivers a finer spray pattern and provides better control over paint flow.

Single-action airbrush basics

Having made the link between needle and nozzle size and spray pattern, the next consideration is the generic airbrush type. Single-action hobby airbrushes are generally cheaper than dual-action airbrushes and may be supplied with larger needle and nozzle assemblies, being used for more generic spray painting.

Control of air and paint flow are independent of each other. Paint flow is pre-set using a screw fitted at the end

of the airbrush handle which adjusts the position of the needle. The air flow is started by pressing on the trigger but that is all the control one has during painting. To reduce or increase paint flow, spraying must cease to allow the needle position to be adjusted. They are useful airbrushes for long spraying bouts using a single colour applied over a large area. Some modellers also have difficulty with dual-action triggers making this type a better option.

Dual-action airbrush basics

In this type of airbrush, the control of air and paint flow is done together using the trigger. It is pressed to start airflow and then pulled back to withdraw the needle from the nozzle to increase paint flow gradually from nothing to full flow. While the trigger action takes practice for newcomers to get used to, it provides a greater range of control which is particularly useful for weathering and fine painting technique.

The clear benefit of dual-action airbrushes is the greater control over paint flow which can be adjusted instantly

during painting to vary the spray pattern, particularly helpful when applying weathering effects. It also reduces splatter through build-up of paint at the tip.

Gravity-feed airbrush

Gravity feed refers to airbrushes equipped with a paint cup moulded integrally on top of the airbrush where the paint flows downwards into the paint chamber itself before flowing to the tip where the air flow atomises it for spraying. It is by far the most convenient type for modelling.

Paint cups can vary in size depending on the airbrush, and some, like the Neo model, have interchangeable cups for different quantities of paint. Lids are supplied with gravity-feed airbrushes fitted with cups to prevent spillage. Those with what appears to be a slot in the top of the airbrush body, called a fluid cavity, are not suitable for model railway applications, being designed to handle tiny quantities of colour medium such as inks.

Side-feed

Designed to accept cups or bottles fitted



Another excellent entry-level airbrush used in the author's studio is the dualaction Sparmax MAX4 which is a gravityfeed airbrush with internal mix and a preset handle for limiting paint flow. It has a 0.4mm nozzle and needle assembly which delivers some fine spraying patterns.



Here is another look at the high-performance Hi-Line HP-BH model which could be the second airbrush to buy for the studio to undertake fine line weathering and detail painting. N-gauge modellers will find it useful for spraying small areas with precision. It has a 0.3mm needle and nozzle diameter.



Iwata's Revolution range has a couple of excellent dual-action mid-range airbrushes which perform well for broad stroke repainting of models and also fine line work. It is an excellent starting point for newcomers to spray painting, with its 0.5mm needle and nozzle assembly more than capable of handling the heavier paints used in railway modelling.



Dual-action airbrushes offer more control over paint and air flow than single-action ones. They are characterised in having both paint and air control through the trigger. Press for air, pull back for paint flow.



Key to the performance of an airbrush is the needle and nozzle size within the airbrush cap. For most work, nothing smaller than 0.3 to 0.35mm is required, so check airbrush specifications carefully.



There is barely a model in this scene at the throat of the staging yard on the author's layout that has not been spray-painted with one colour or another, even if it is just one or two colours for refinishing or a complete re-spray as was applied to the Dapol Class 73s in the foreground.

to the side of the airbrush, these provide a different range of handling positions over a top-cup-down gravity-feed type. Line of sight along the top of the airbrush is clear of a moulded cup, which can be important for fine artistic work, but while they are perfectly good designs, they are generally avoided by railway modellers.

Bottom suction-feed

A paint jar or bottle is clipped into the bottom of a bottom suction-feed airbrush with a tube leading to the bottom of the jar to siphon the paint up and into the body of the airbrush – perfect for larger spraying jobs where a sizeable quantity of prepared paint is required.

Larger-scale modellers will find the larger paint capacity ideal for covering large areas on S and O-gauge models without having to constantly stop and top up paint cups. The jars and lids take a little more cleaning than a moulded paint cup, but spillage is less likely to occur.

Pre-set handle

In a sense, dual-action airbrushes fitted with a pre-set handle are a hybrid between single and dual-action airbrush designs.

This cut-away handle reveals the chucking nut that secures the needle.

This slot allows the needle to be pulled back to quickly clear colour and to assist with cleaning.

A screw is fitted at the end of the handle which pre-sets the flow rate by limiting how far back the needle can be pulled with the trigger. If you find you have a tendency to apply too much paint or struggle to control the pull-back action on the trigger, a pre-set handle is a very useful feature.

Cut-away handle

A feature of higher-end airbrushes is the cut-away handle fitted to dual-action airbrushes providing access to the needle securing nut. It allows you to pull the needle back further than is possible with the trigger to clear the airbrush of colour and makes cleaning easier too. It saves removing the handle to reach the securing nut.

Keep airbrushes safe during painting

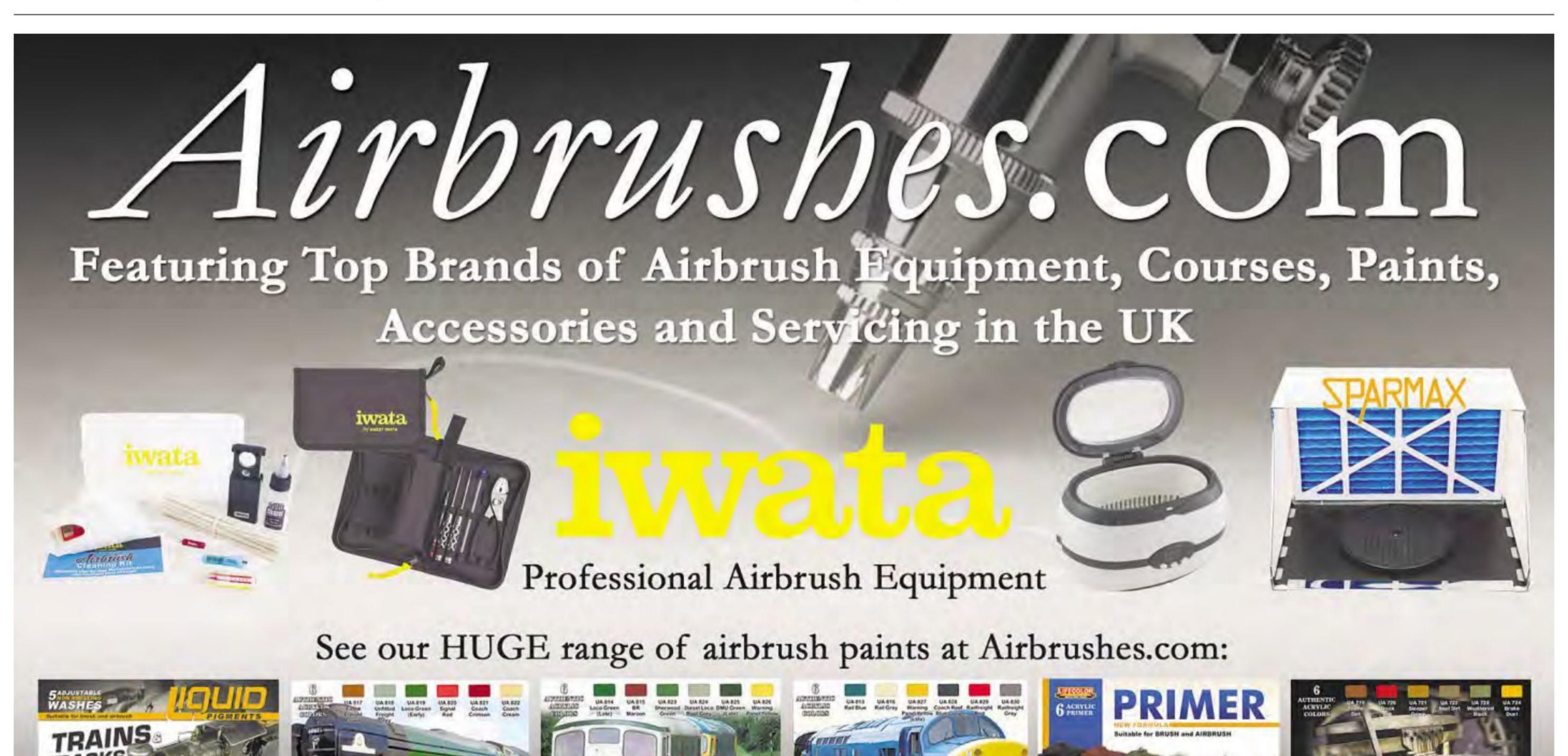
Don't forget to buy an airbrush stand or dock when setting up a spraying station. This simple device provides a safe place to stow airbrushes during painting sessions so that they are not damaged or don't topple over, causing spillage from the paint cup. You can buy a stand that will hold more than one airbrush if you're doing complex

layered weathering effects. Also consider using a spray-out pot as both an airbrush dock and a convenient way of clearing the remnants of paint from an airbrush before cleaning, rinsing with solvent and recharging with a different paint colour.

Next month

The featured airbrushes that are used regularly in the author's studio provide a

good range of spray patterns for a range of applications. The nozzle and needle assemblies range from 0.5mm to 0.3mm, providing excellent coverage for mass spraying through to detailing in N gauge. Nothing finer is required. In the next episode of this series, the use and care of an airbrush is explained together with common painting mistakes and how to avoid them.

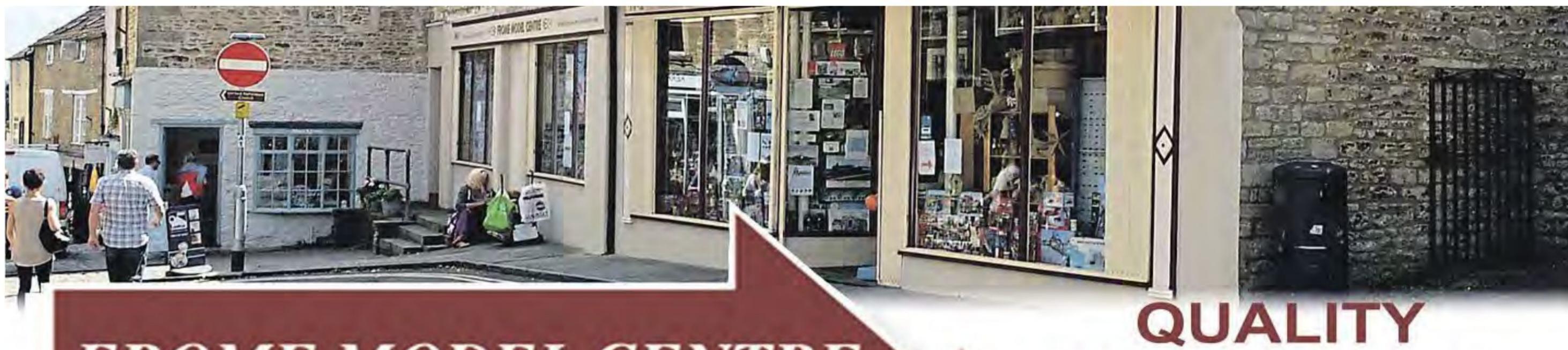
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GB Railfreight Class 92

Hornby updates its 00-gauge Class 92 with a new livery as GBRf No. 92043, writes **Nigel Burkin**.

Hornby range for many years, for it developed its own model after introduction of the 46-strong class between 1993 and 1996. It also acquired the tooling for the Lima model that was regarded as the better of the two by modellers despite its poor drive.

Today, it appears to be the original Hornby model that is released on a regular basis, the most recent version being that of No. 92043, finished in GBRf orange and blue livery with simple GB Railfreight logos on the cab sides (R3741) and no name plate or tunnel rings.



A single self-contained drive bogie fitted with a five-pole skew wound motor is fitted at one end of the model.



Post-2016 GBRf livery has been applied to the Hornby Class 92 for the 2019 catalogue. DB Cargo Romania and Caledonian Sleeper versions are also part of the Hornby catalogue for this year.

Hornby also added No. 92023 (R3740) finished in Caledonian Sleeper teal and No. 91 53 0 472 001-3 as operated by DB Cargo in Romania (R3742F) to its 2019 range. The firm has also released a Class 92 in GBRf Europorte livery with the red embellishments to the livery in the past as No. 92032 (R3135).

The full-size No. 92043 was one of nine locomotives owned by SNCF that were sold to the Europorte business. It came into GBRf ownership through the acquisition of First GB Railfreight in 2010. Europorte divested itself of the business in 2016, around the time that the real No. 92043 was repainted in the classic blue and orange GBRf scheme.

Many members of the GBRf Class 92 fleet carried the Europorte logo, and it seems that the repainting date of No. 92043 post-dates the acquisition of the business by EQT Partners.

The model

The livery places the model in the late 2016 to present-day time frame during which it would be used to haul intermodal and other revenue freight trains for the GBRf business. Class 92s are also used on Caledonian Sleeper services, with the first service in April 2015 being hauled by a Caledonian Sleeper teal-liveried No. 92018. However GBRf blue and orange-liveried locomotives have also been used with the featured No. 92043, being documented with CAF Mk.5 stock on the lowland sleeper in June 2019.

Its body shell is a single-piece moulding including the cab side hand rails and the single hand rail on the cab front. Grilles are well tooled, as is the shape of the cab front and the curved corners. It is fitted throughout with flush glazing, two plastic pantographs with springs, separate air horns and insulator detail on the roof.

A basic unpainted cab interior moulding is seen clearly through the flush-glazed cab windows which are also fitted with separate windscreen wipers. The running light covers are generally a good fit, but could be improved when detailing the model.

Underframe and bogies

The underframe is a single-piece moulding with fairly basic detail, and incorporates the buffer beams, which have some moulded detail and separate plastic buffers of the correct shape. No air pipes or coupling details are supplied with the model. Bogie mouldings are also single-piece toolings with thick side frames.

Detail relief is pretty good, with some well-defined spring detail and gaps where there should be gaps between the frame members and the springs. Sand box and bogie foot step detail are all present, the single-piece moulding







making this area of the model quite durable, yet perfect for some simple detailing. Shoe beams are fitted as separate details, clipped firmly in place.

Wheels and couplings

Wheels are composed of metal and have fairly coarse flanges, not quite being to RP25-110 standards. They were found to be fully concentric during testing, and traction in such a light (by today's standards) locomotive is assisted by two traction tyres on the single drive bogie. Coupling boxes are moulded as part of the bogie frames and not fitted to close-coupling mechanisms. Hornby's standard small tension lock couplings are fitted to the coupling pockets, which are mounted at the correct height.

Drive and electronics

A single self-contained drive bogie with a five-pole skew wound motor is fitted to one end of the model, which proved smooth and controllable during tests. A moderate top speed was noted, and it emitted little noise. As the model was run, the mechanism became quieter.

The bogie is clipped into the underframe moulding with wiring linking it to the small circuit board fitted at the opposite end of the model. There is an eightpin DCC socket installed alongside headlights which illuminate all of the lighting positions. Current collection is through all 12 wheels using conventional phosphor-bronze wiper contacts which bear on the rear of the wheels.

Overall

Livery finish is nicely done, with the details matching the full-size locomotive well. The livery is correct for a locomotive painted in late 2016, adorned with simple GB Railfreight logos on the cab sides, and no red in the curved element of the livery where it meets the orange cab sides.

It is a basic model compared to many diesel and electric locomotives in the Hornby range, particularly the relatively new Class 87.

Nonetheless, it is a useful one for detailing and priced according to its specification. Its body shape is good enough for most modellers, and flush glazing and other small details give it a degree of finesse in places. The level of detail and contemporary livery, together with the technical improvements to the electrics, drive and couplings, keeps the Hornby Class 92 reasonably up to date.

GB Railleight

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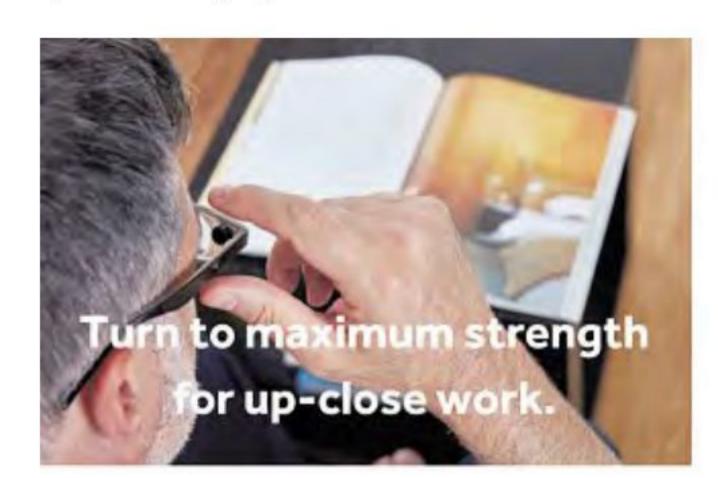


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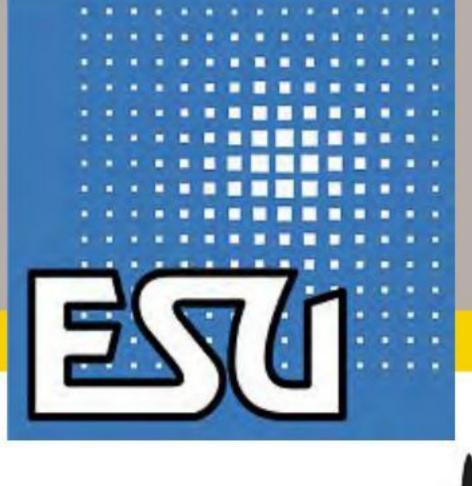


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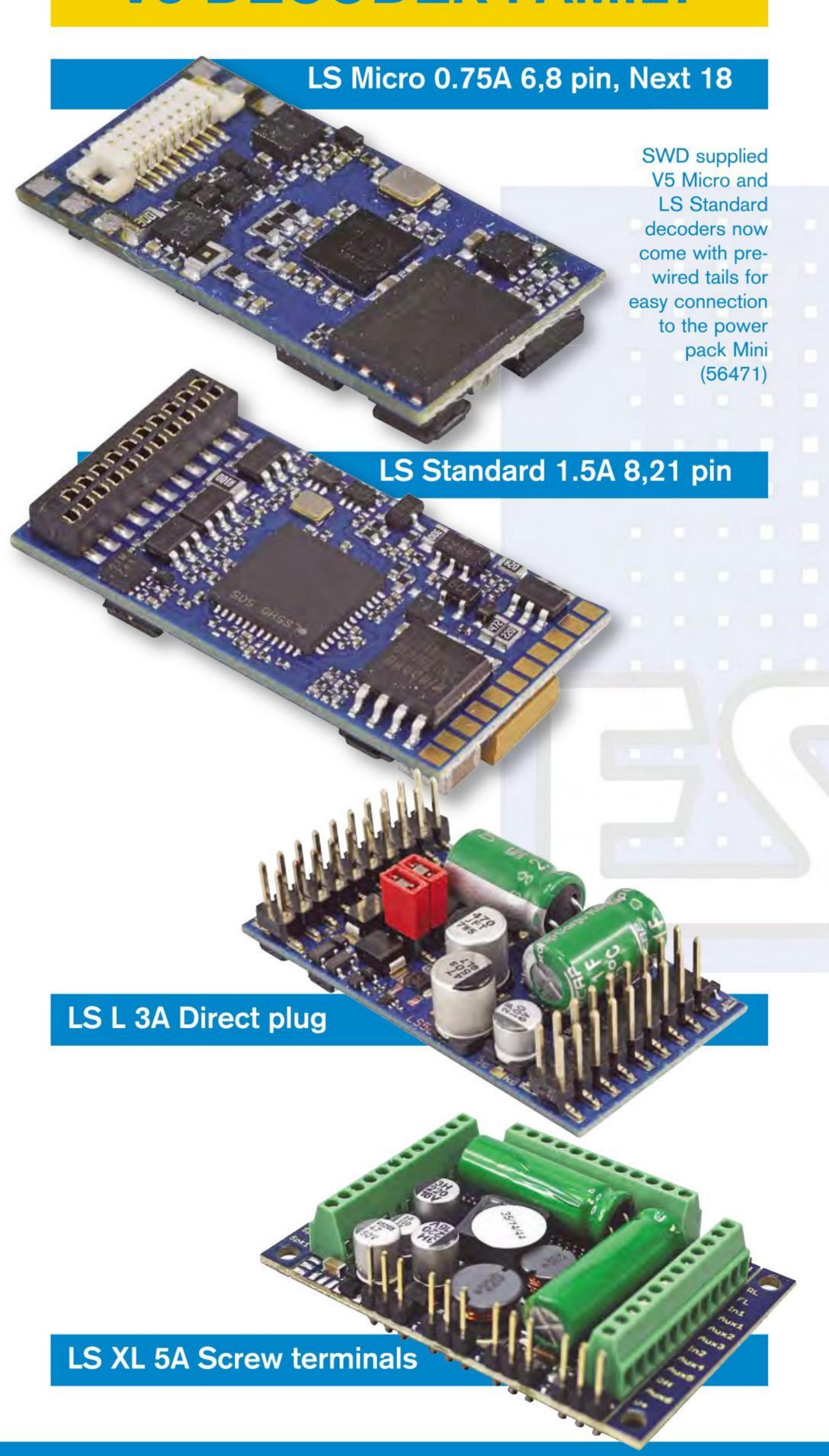




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Modelling made easy

A micro-layout diorama baseboard in 30 minutes flat!

RMM puts together a sturdy and easily assembled laser-cut kit from Scale Model Scenery.

F YOU'VE EVER FANCIED BECOMING A model railway exhibitor, there are two basic ways of going about it − creating, as part of a dedicated team, a very large layout that can be broken into sections for transport and assembly, or going it alone with a small portable diorama.



The Scale Model Scenery diorama baseboard costs just £38.49, and can be assembled within half an hour.

Many shows take place in comparatively small village halls and similar premises where there might be room for just four or five large layouts, but where several tabletop dioramas (that can be handled by one or two people and transported easily in the boot of a car) can always be squeezed in to add to the showgoers' interest.

Scale Model Scenery, renowned for an imaginative and seemingly endless stream of small laser-cut model railway accessories, has come up with a lovely micro-layout diorama baseboard (BBOI7) measuring IIIOmm long, 300mm high and 225mm deep. It would form an ideal basis for a richly detailed layout, especially in N scale, that could be stowed in a Christmas tree storage box with handles at each end of the kind readily available at a modest price from outlets such as Argos.

RMM's Lynsey Young sent for the Scale Model Scenery kit as a starting point for her intended Harry Potter diorama. It comes as two sections,

which can be bolted together beneath the plinth using the spacers, M5 nut,

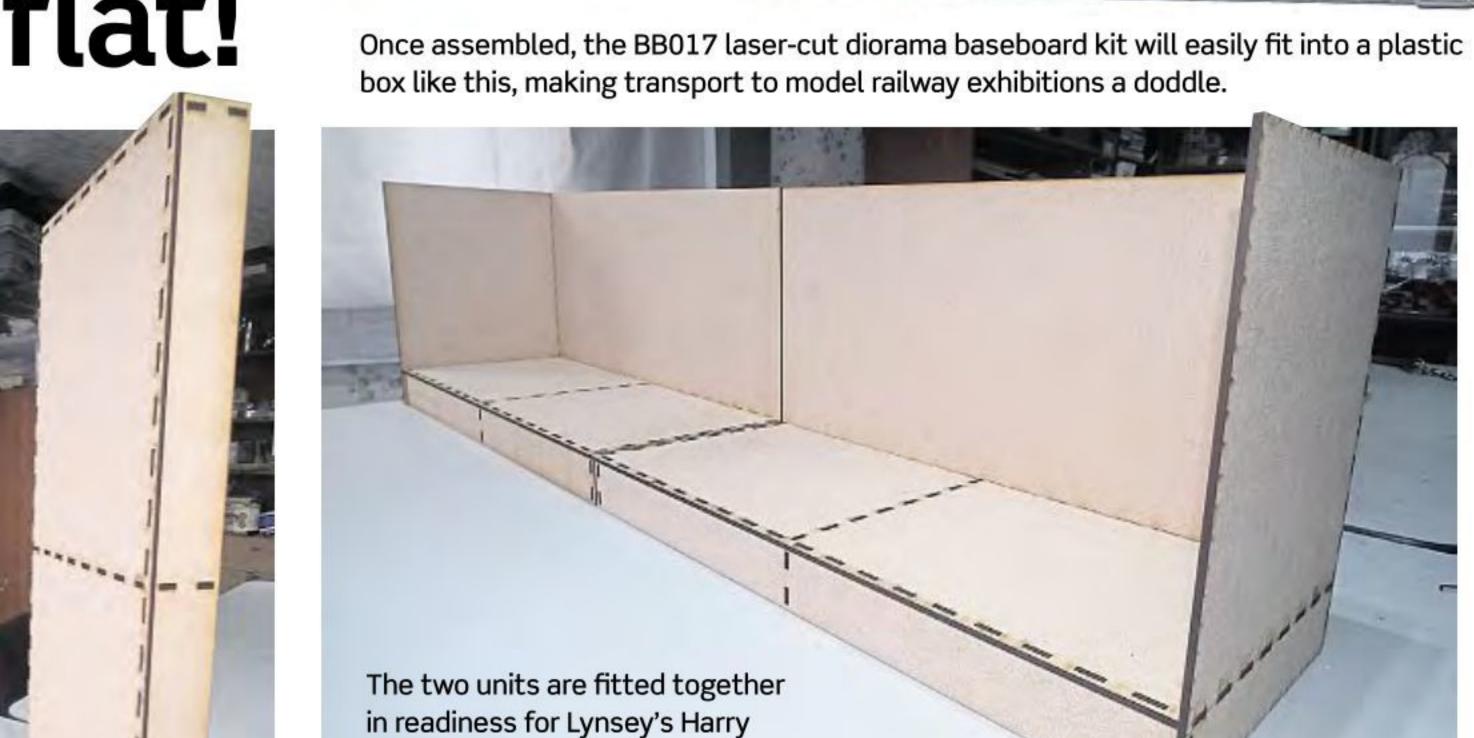


One of the ends is attached.

bolt and washers provided with each, to create a long, smooth model display area of 1102mm long, 250mm high and 221mm deep.

The board components fit snugly to each other by pushing square teeth into matching slots, and to ensure no mistakes have been made, dry-fitting is advised before gluing.

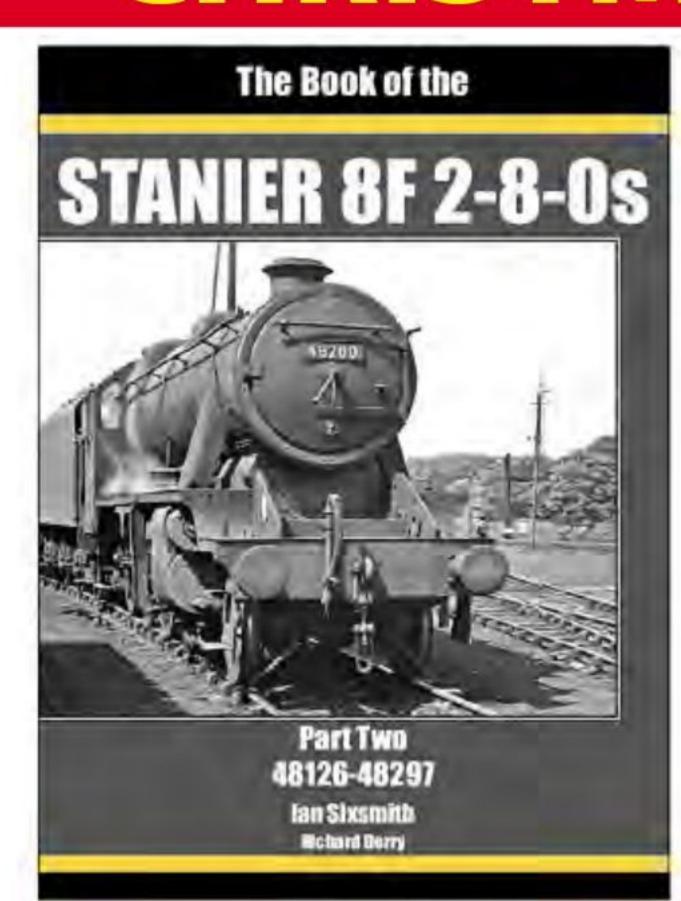
Potter diorama.

With the built-up diorama baseboard fitting snugly inside the plastic transport box, Lynsey looks well pleased with the result.

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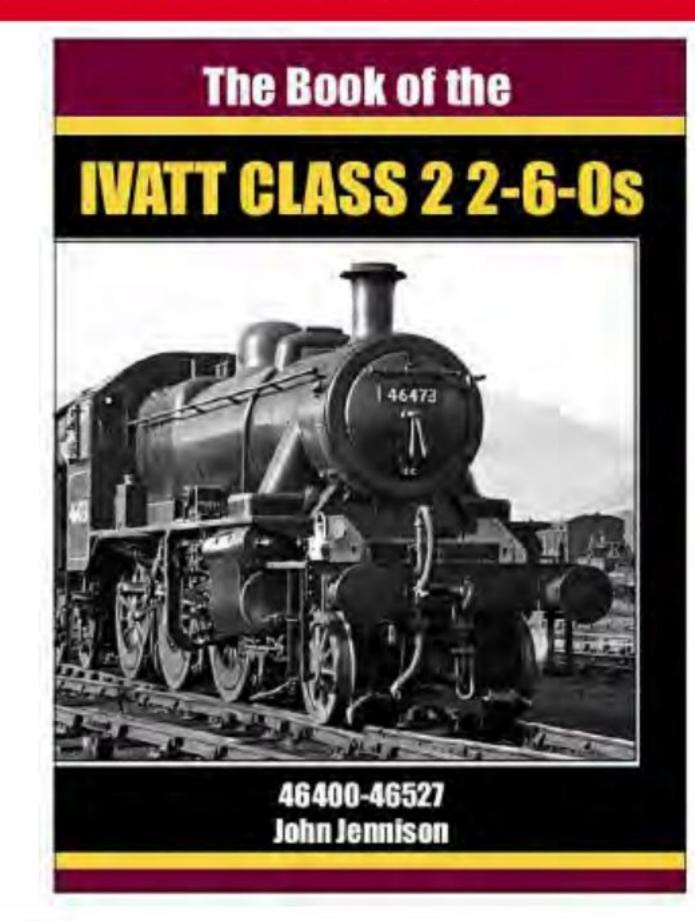
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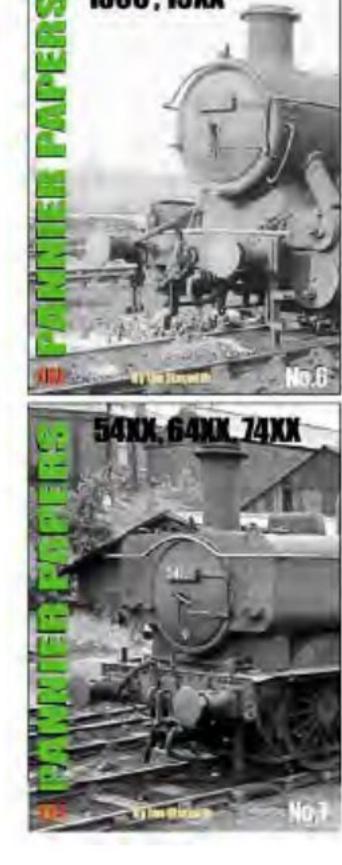
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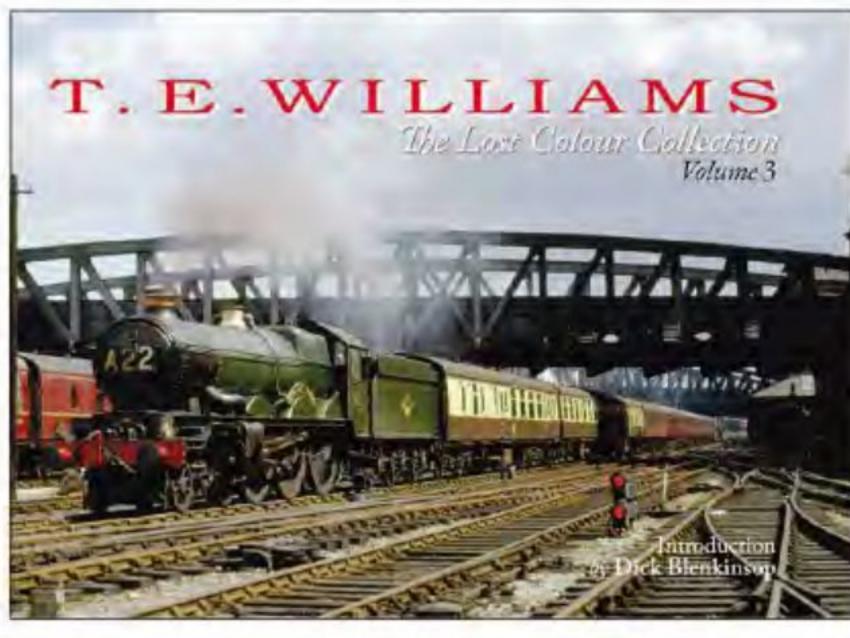
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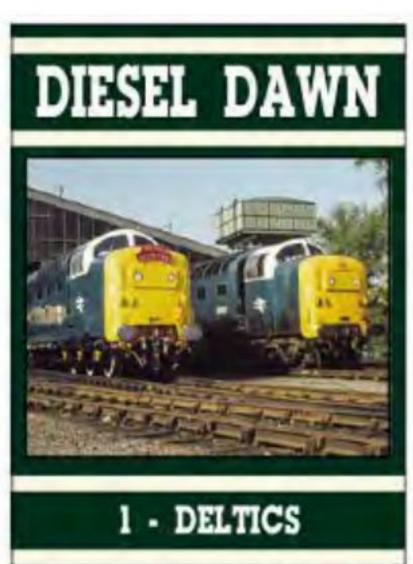


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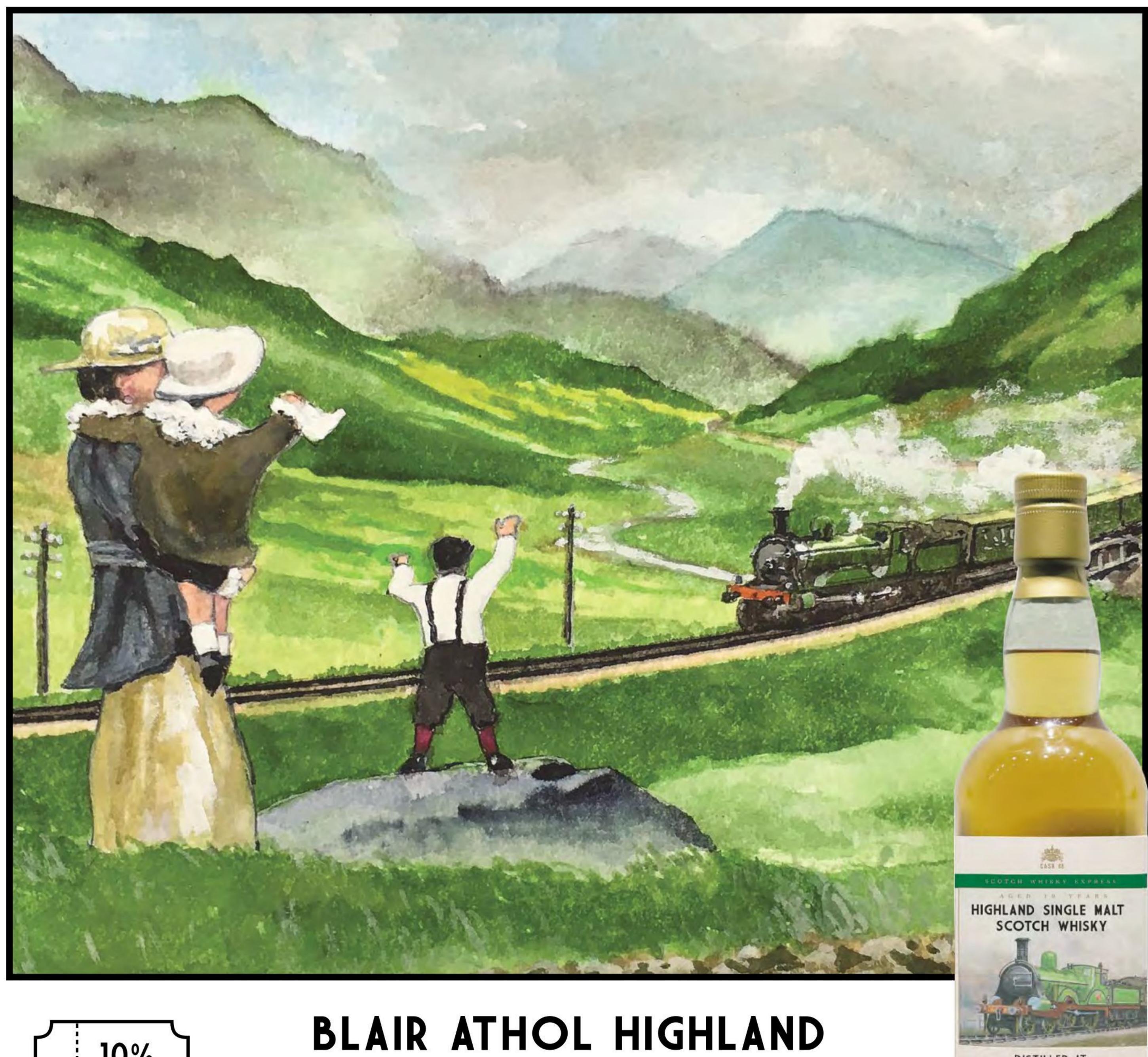


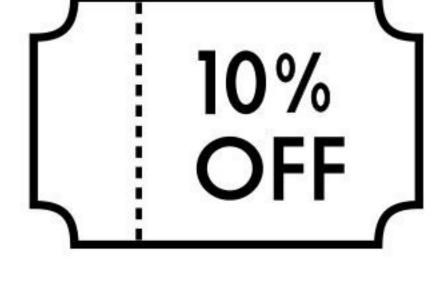

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New 0241 touch controller from Protocab

Model railway control equipment is becoming more sophisticated all the time, and the 0241 Touch Controller from Acc + Ess Protocab, the second hand-held and wire-free controller from the firm, builds on the wellregarded 0201 direct controller with a range of new functions and added capacity.

The 0241 provides the option of a 25mm rotary control knob (0241R) or a 75mm slider control (0241S); a 3.5in full-colour touch screen for management functions and output of key performance information; support to store details of up to 128 locomotives, each easily selected through the touch screen from a descriptive menu; and an improved radio frequency (RF) component.

The 0201 controller's reliability of reception and control is not only retained, but also further improved, on the 0241, and the combination of a physical control and detailed touch screen means that the user does not have to look at the screen when driving the Protocab-fitted locomotive other than to view battery load, charge, speed and so on.

The 'free running' provided on the 0201 direct controller is much simpler to set up on the 0241, and when used with the new 0554 and 0505 locomotive control units, the battery on the locomotive is switched on through the touch screen on the 0241,removing the need for a loco switch on the LCU.

Capacity in the 0241's internal battery is shown on most screens by a coloured bar and, optionally, showing the percentage of charge in the battery. The charge in the battery attached to the 0554 or 0505 LCU is now shown on the main menu and drive screen of the selected locomotive both during operation and charging, again with a coloured bar and optional percentage.

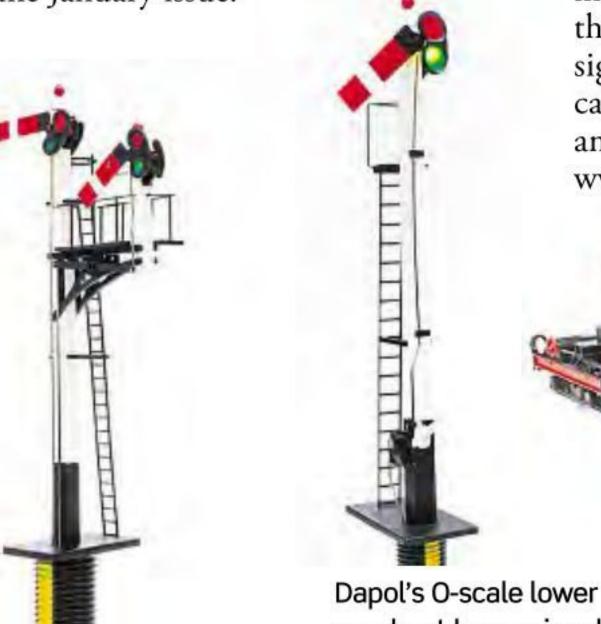

in the January issue.

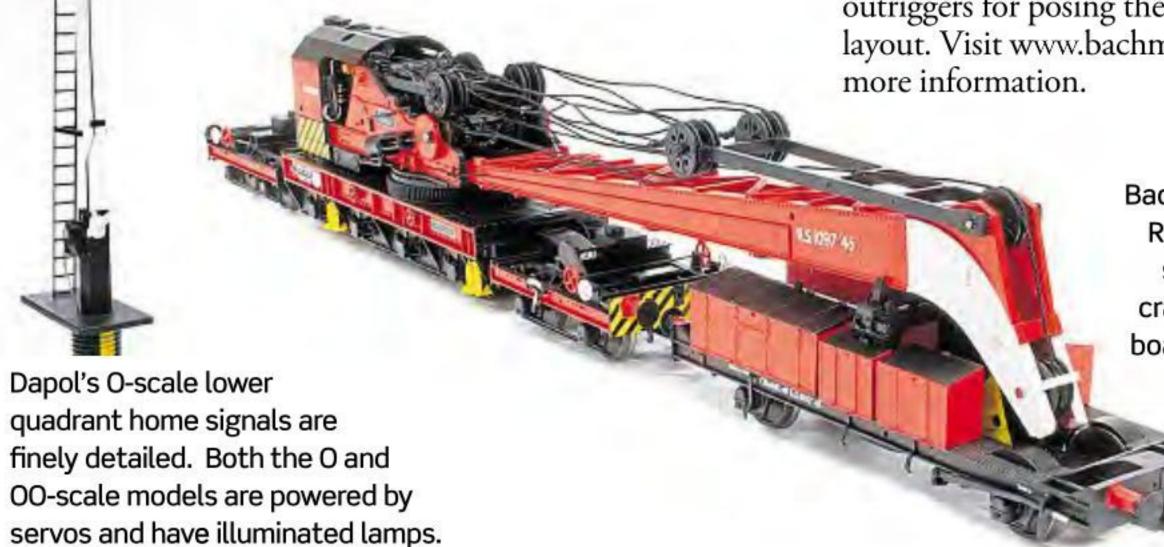


This is the new 00-scale gauge lower quadrant junction signal from Dapol.
