Vol. 5B: GLOUCESTER to SWINDON and BRANCHES

Part 2: STROUD TO SWINDON Neil Parkhouse



The second and concluding part of our journey from Gloucester Central to Swindon. Having reached Stroud in Part 1, we first complete our study of that station before heading off up the valley towards Brimscombe and Chalford. These were two very different stations, opened over fifty years apart, one designed by Brunel and the other to a then standard GWR design, both of which were closed on the same day in 1964 when local passenger services were withdrawn. Much of this service was provided by the auto trains running to and from Gloucester, which served the valley for sixty years until bus and private car ownership brought about their demise. However, BR having given notice originally in 1962 about ending the service, its last years of operation were well photographed and all of the intermediate halts are illustrated here, along with numerous scenic views of the autos scurrying up and down the valley. Interspersed with the auto workings were a very varied range of other trains, from London expresses to heavy freights, most of which required banking up the fearsome climb to Sapperton Tunnel and the summit of the line. Banking engines were usually stationed at Brimscombe, where a shed was provided from broad gauge days, but assisting locomotives for heavy expresses requiring piloting waited at Stroud, attaching to the front of the train when the stop was made there. Our period covers from the late 1950s to the mid 1970s, through the last years of steam on BR(WR) and the early diesel-hydraulic era. Again the locomotive variety is impressive: 'Castles', 'Halls' and 'Granges', '9Fs' and '8Fs', 'Prairies', pannier tanks and '14XX' 0-4-2Ts, along with 'Westerns', 'Hymeks' and 'Teddy Bears'. And railbuses! Once we reach Kemble we take time out to travel the branches to Tetbury and Cirencester, on which the railbuses reigned supreme for the final six years, stopping at all of the halts and studying the infrastructure of both terminii. And then, we complete the last leg to Swindon, crossing into Wiltshire and tarrying a while at the delightful Brunellian station at Minety, before arriving at our destination, past the engine shed which lay alongside the line from Gloucester. And everything on this gorgeously scenic journey, especially the lovely mostly long lost stations -Stroud and Kemble alone remain - are as usual illustrated in glorious colour, from spring greens to autumn golds, and Swindon green to Rail blue! Welcome from the Editor



N gauge in the spotlight

ith the internal proportions of modern housing seemingly ever-decreasing, finding suitable spaces for model railways within the home is something of a growing problem, if that's not a contradiction in terms.

Therefore, whilst 4mm/00 gauge remains – by some considerable margin – the most popular scale/gauge combination for those who model British outline subjects, smaller disciplines such as 2mm/N gauge or TT:120 are likely to have an increasing appeal to those who find themselves with limited domestic space at their disposal.

In this issue we shine the spotlight firmly on N gauge and explore the opportunities that this scale presents. We begin overleaf with the subject of our 'Railway of the Month', Barton Road (pictured) by Benn Pollard. This atmospheric depiction of an urban Western Region junction, the scenic part of which measures just 13' on its longest side, embodies many of the space-saving advantages that modelling in 1:148 scale can provide. Indeed, there are many modellers who could

accommodate a layout of this size at home, but not perhaps if the same scheme was to be realised in OO, featuring as it does large express locomotive types hauling scale length main line passenger rakes; a complex arrangement of trackwork with multiple running lines, numerous loops and high capacity goods sidings; and swathes of scenic detailing on both sides of the railway boundary.

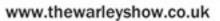
Barton Road also showcases the extensive commercial support that exists for N gauge: all the trackwork is by Peco, many of the buildings are from kits, whilst the majority of locomotives and rolling stock are ready-to-run products. The news and reviews pages that we publish each month in RM are testament to the continuing support for the scale (see p748 for details of an all-new Class 90 that has been developed by Bachmann, for example). With this healthy stream of product releases from a wide array of manufacturers, N gauge represents just as viable a proposition for someone starting out in the hobby as 00.

It is with the newcomer in mind that we present in this issue the first in a series of articles

showing, step-by-step, how an N gauge layout can be constructed. Using mainly proprietary items for the baseboards, track, buildings and scenery, Chris Ford's model measures just 7' x 1' (including fiddle yard) and demonstrates further the potential that modelling in the smaller scale can offer.

For readers wishing to study Chris' completed project at close quarters, the layout is due to form part of the Peco stand at this year's Warley

show, which will be taking place at the NEC in Birmingham on 26 & 27 November. There will be nine other N gauge layouts in action at the event, which is set to feature in excess of 70 layouts in total, from Z gauge through to Gauge 1 (and larger) covering British and overseas prototypes. It promises to be an event that will have something for everyone, whatever their modelling preferences and interests. Advance tickets are now on sale via the event website:

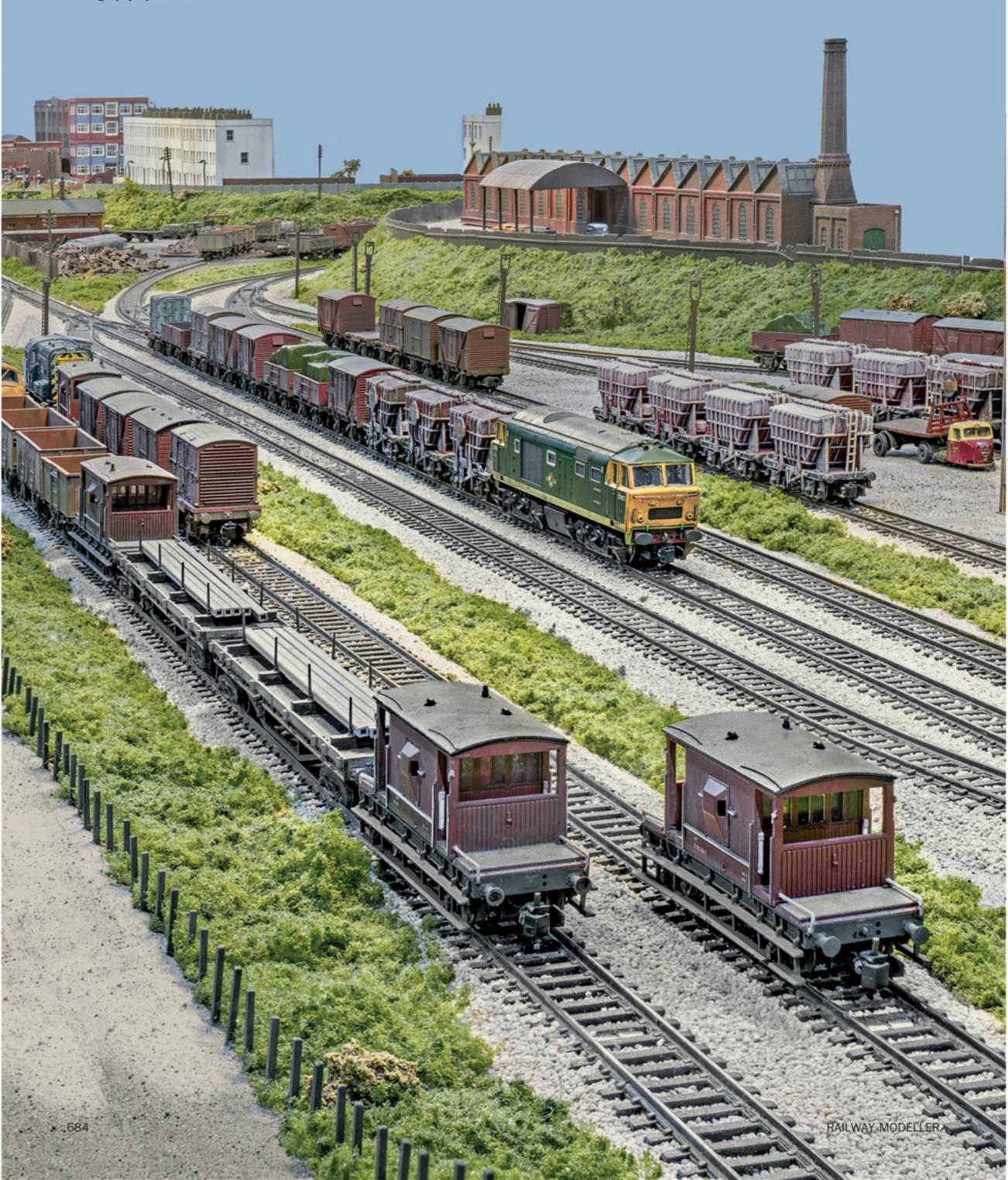

Barton Road

Memories of train journeys to the West Country during childhood inspired **BENN POLLARD** to create this gritty urban scene, which is set firmly in the pre-TOPS BR blue era and has an unorthodox T-shape footprint.

have always found myself drawn to gritty urban scenes, rather than the idyllic countryside vistas, so it was somewhat inevitable that I would opt for a layout with an inner city setting. Holidays spent visiting family on the south Devon coast when I was growing up prompted my interest in the Western Region; the journeys by train from my home town of Stockport to the West Country were full of interest, especially when passing through the industrial areas of Stoke, Wolverhampton, Birmingham and Bristol.

Of particular interest to me was the Lawrence Hill area of Bristol, where the trackbed of the former Midland route to Mangotsfield, Bath Green Park and Gloucester passes overhead. I didn't fancy the idea of trying to recreate Lawrence Hill station, as I didn't think that would be achievable in the space I had available, so I opted for a fictitious plan based between the station and Dr Day's Bridge Junction, just over a quarter of a mile away. This allowed me to make use of the idea of a line

joining the GWR route in a triangular junction, off the Midland route from Mangotsfield.

When I initially started planning Barton Road, it was with the aim of it being a challenge; a project where I could progress my skills further as a modeller and improve on my first exhibition layout. Moreover, I wanted to try and create something which really took advantage of modelling in N gauge, running full-length trains against a realistic backdrop.

After looking through many books, researching the railway operations in the area, including the Midland and MR/GWR Joint routes, I was able to confirm that this would be a very suitable area for me to base my project. This was helped by the fact that the Western Region line curved and passed through a shallow cutting, giving me plenty of options for creating interesting surroundings. I made a visit to the area to take reference pictures for general modelling inspiration and as an aid to scratch-building some appropriate buildings. I also took some

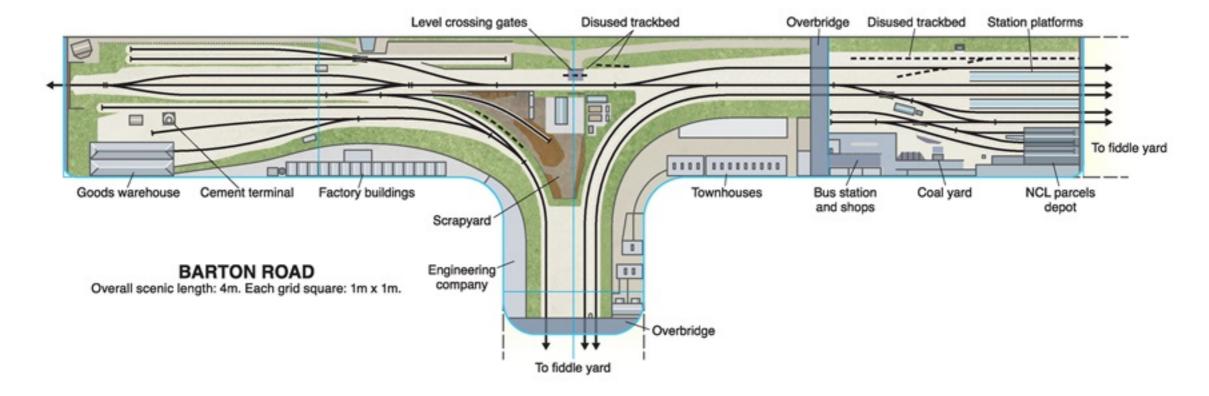

The position of the lifted crossover is marked by the sleepers that have been left in situ.





reference photos of road overbridges for the scenic breaks, as well as what remained of the various goods facilities around the docks, to complement the historical photos I had collated from books and the internet.

A rationalised plan

I wanted to create a layout that would be manageable in both setup and operation for two people, whilst still being interesting and entertaining enough to operate over a full weekend at a show. I also wanted to create a track plan that broke away from the familiar end-to-end or circular concepts, and after sketching out a few potential ideas, I decided upon an amalgamation of the two, built to a 'T' shape with two fiddle yards. The curved main line allows through running trains, whilst the goods yards, handling facilities and dock branch provide plenty of shunting opportunities and give passing trains a reason to stop and drop off or pick up wagons.

Track rationalisation is a key feature of the layout, and direct access to or from the sidings via the east side of the triangle is no longer possible as the connecting junction from the main line has been removed. This line now only heads down towards the docks (off scene) and provides a headshunt to reverse wagons for the goods warehouse and cement terminal. Goods trains from the Midlands and South Wales must now reverse to access the sidings, using the goods loop behind Barton Road station, something which adds a bit more operational interest.

Solid construction

The 'first sod was cut' with a trip to the local timber merchants and the purchase of some 3" x 1" pine for the box frames, and a couple of 8" x 4" sheets of high quality 9mm marine ply cut to size for the tops. I cannot recommend enough the amount of time and hassle saved by buying good quality, warp-free timber, and having it cut to size. This method of box-frame construction, with two central braces spaced evenly between the ends, creates a very strong, lightweight board that is easy to handle. Before assembling, holes were cut in the centre braces for wiring to pass through. Having baseboards which are rigid and lightweight enables them to be bolted together in pairs crate-style for safe transit, using end-boards and 6mm bolts, washers and wing nuts. This system also permits the pairs of

boards to be stacked in the back of a car or van without the risk of damage.

The length of the layout's scenic section (the top part of the 'T') comprised three boards initially, each measuring 1m in length. This was subsequently extended with the addition of a fourth 1m board featuring the station, NCL parcels depot and local coal yard. This additional board was actually planned from the outset of the project, which made 'blending' the extension into the existing layout much simpler, whilst giving the impression it had always been part of the layout.

I opted for the 'trough', or 'cassette' fiddle yard design to reduce the amount of space required for the fiddle yards. These are made from 10mm aluminium angle screwed into 9mm MDF strips.

To the trains...

Early on in the project, the decision was made to fix the layout time period to 1969-1972, firmly in the pre-TOPS era. This was influenced by a combination of factors; a dusty, musty, yet wonderfully nostalgic pile of mid-1970s Bradford Barton books I have in my library; the railway interests of my friend, enthusiast, and fellow modeller Rob Pickford; plus the availability of enough suitable ready-to-run locomotives and rolling stock to give a flavour of the variety of traffic, and liveries found in the area in the chosen time period.

I find the BR pre-TOPS period fascinating for its variety and modelling potential. With a few exceptions, most of the post-steam British Rail network was still rooted in the Victorian era, with twin-axle, short wheelbase wagons and semaphore signals. It was only the steam engines which had disappeared, and it's easy to forget now that it

took a very long time for the modern, 'airline style' image of the 1965 British Rail rebranding to reach across the whole network.

Services

Trains from all points of the compass passed through Bristol; InterCity and local passenger services, postal and newspaper trains, as well as an endless variety of goods workings including West Country milk traffic, oil, vans, and cement, plus coal, steel and iron ore from South Wales. An engineers' siding has been provided at the front of the layout to hold the obligatory assortment of departmental wagons.

Hydraulics dominate the Western Region trains, but the appearance of diesel-electric classes was just as common at the time depicted; English Electric Type 3s

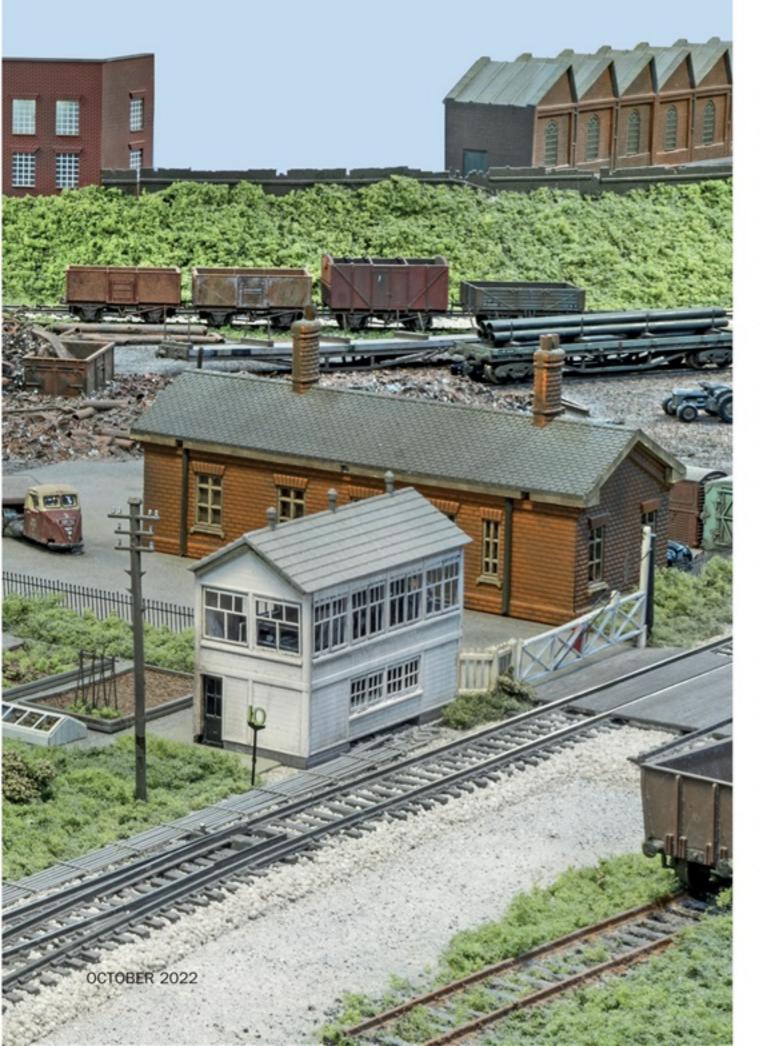

(Class 37s) from South Wales, 'Peaks' and Brush Type 4s (Class 47s) from the Midlands and the North. In addition there are Brush Type 2s (Class 31s) and, slightly later, the odd Sulzer Type 2 (Class 25) moving in to replace the North British Type 2 diesel-hydraulics (Class 22s) and 'Warships'. Occasionally there might be a BRCW Type 3 (Class 33) seen working in from the Southern. Suitable DMUs for the Western Region are sadly lacking in N gauge, beyond the Dapol Pressed Steel (Class 121) and Gloucester RC&W (Class 122) diesel railcars, so the use of a Metro-Cammell two-car (Class 101) DMU on the layout is a bit of a stretch for the era modelled, but it's there for variety!

Keeping things running

Reliability is very important – there's nothing more frustrating than taking a layout to an exhibition and having to contend with temperamental running. We are asked regularly at shows about how we achieve such realistic running in N gauge: in short, a lot of effort goes into making sure the layout runs smoothly and that everything works as it should. This ensures a much more enjoyable experience for the viewers and operators alike.

At exhibitions, the track is wiped over at the start of the day with strips of card, rather than a rubber or any chemicals. Card is abrasive enough to remove dirt but doesn't leave a film on the railhead or any debris behind. Wheels of all motorised models are also cleaned daily at shows using a Minitrix or Gaugemaster wheel brush.

The layout is run using DCC via a Lenz LH100 set, and all locos and units are fitted with Zimo decoders which provide excellent performance for most N gauge models straight from the box. Several of the locos have been fitted with Zimo sound decoders which have a brake function, and this makes operation much more realistic – especially when it comes to shunting. With the volume set at an appropriate level to allow for the background noise of exhibitions, the use of sugar cube speakers gives the emitted sounds a surprising amount of projection and clarity, whilst also providing the layout with further realism and atmosphere.

When buying a new powered model, I always ask to test it and see it running in the shop before purchase. If it runs smoothly at all speeds straight from the box,

especially slowly, I can be confident that the model should prove to be a good performer in service on the layout! If buying at an exhibition, I usually ask if I can test it on a layout nearby. I also find that keeping loco pick-ups clean and mechanisms lubricated correctly also make a big difference as time goes on.

Magnetic couplings

Hands-free shunting using the excellent Dapol 'Easi-Shunt' magnetic couplers is a key operating feature of Barton Road, with permanent 3mm x 3mm rare-earth magnets placed in between the sleepers at strategic locations. The couplings have been fitted to all locos, coaches and wagons, and vehicles have been grouped into rakes of twos, threes and fours. Each of these sets have had a small amount of drag added to one of the axles; this stops wagons moving or rolling away when being coupled or uncoupled. Furthermore, this resistance keeps the couplings under tension when the wagons are being hauled, which means the rakes can pass over magnets without any instances of accidental uncoupling.

The unkempt 1970s

One thing is clear from looking at any picture of the era; nothing was clean, and neither is anything on *Barton Road*. All my weathering of the stock has been undertaken with brushes. I usually start by giving the

underframe and wheel faces a coat of Phoenix Precision ref.P960 Frame Dirt; this is an enamel paint and gives a nice matt finish. Continuing with the same paint, together with a dab of white spirit on the brush before application, I give the vehicle sides, ends and roof a wash over with a soft, wide, flat brush, ensuring that the brush strokes are in straight lines and in the same direction.

Different effects were achieved by brushing downwards (cleaner) or upwards (dirtier) on the bodysides, and depending on the type of vehicle, details were picked out with a fine brush using slightly different shades. For example, rust on metal strapping, streaks running down from details such as grilles, hinges, door bumps, roof vents and the corners of window frames all of which add individuality to vehicles. A cotton bud can also be used to wipe areas clean such as around running numbers or near door handles, to create a bit of extra realism and variety.

Working in a well-ventilated room, I find it's best to leave items to dry for at least 24 hours. I then use a glass fibre brush to refine further the application of grime, whilst a finishing touch is adding small amounts of black paint on the buffer heads to simulate grease patches.

Signals and crossing gates

One of the more challenging, but ultimately rewarding features of the layout was the construction of the fully operational semaphore signalling and level crossing gates. Both features make the layout much more entertaining to operate as all trains must be correctly signalled by the operator, and this can often provide a legitimate reason to stop trains on the layout when there are conflicting paths. The signals were made by adapting Dapol signals, which were cut up and rearranged with the bracket and shunt signal ring etches from Model Signal Engineering.

The level crossing gates were made by joining together two pairs of parts from the ref.234 Ratio crossing gates kit to make one pair of full, road-width gates. Both are operated by GF Controls servo units which add a realistic bounce to the movement of the arms and the gates,

The scrapyard

A triangle is an unusual space to fill on a layout, especially when it's surrounded by running lines, so a scrapyard provided an ideal subject to occupy this area. The scrapyard is situated on what was once the produce sidings, where goods bound for market were unloaded; with that traffic having been transferred to road, the scrap dealer moved in and claimed the site along with the old brick offices!

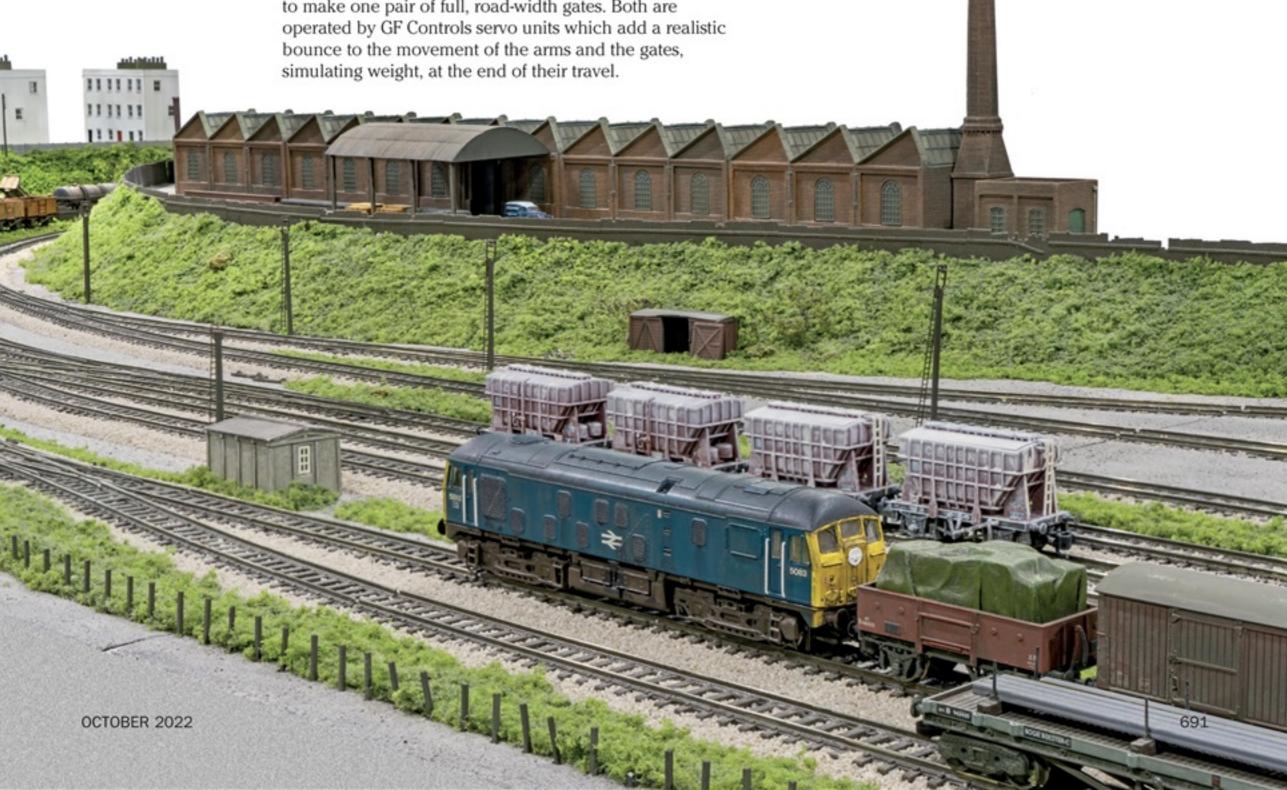
The scrap is made from all sorts of rubbish which I had lying around: old kit sprues, plasticard off-cuts, old wagon bodies, wheels, bridge girder parts, guitar strings, wire, steel scourers, straws, aluminium swarf - and even an aluminium buffet platter which I cut up into squares and dotted about the place!

Scope for further details

As with any model railway Barton Road is not really finished and there are always alterations and improvements to be made when time permits. Whilst I've drawn the line at any further extensions (it would become unmanageable with just two operators and wouldn't fit in the van) there is still plenty of detail to be added, such as lineside clutter and people to the pavements and platforms to complete the urban scene.

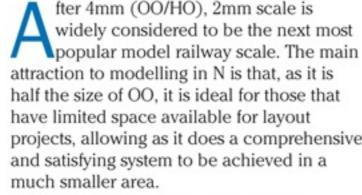

Making a start in N

CHRIS FORD presents the first in a short series of articles showing how a simple but highly atmospheric urban N gauge layout can be constructed in just 7' x 1'. Intended to encourage those who are looking to embark on their own modelling journey in the smaller scale, Chris begins the project this month by building the baseboards and laying the track.

In addition, there is an amazing range of both rolling stock and scenic accessories available. Although the range is a little smaller than what is available in OO gauge it is still possible to construct a very satisfactory layout using almost entirely off-the-shelf commercial items – making N gauge a viable option for new entrants to the hobby.

Those working in N are also supported by the N Gauge Society, which was founded in 1967 to promote modelling in 2mm scale and offer advice and guidance for modellers (see panel on page 695). The society also produces a large number of items specifically for sale to members. Therefore, those with a long-term interest in N gauge modelling will definitely find membership of this organisation beneficial.

For those wishing to learn more about N gauge modelling, the Peco Modellers' Library title Your Guide to N Gauge Railway Modelling (ref.PM-204) provides an ideal overview of the subject. Copies are obtainable from Peco stockists.

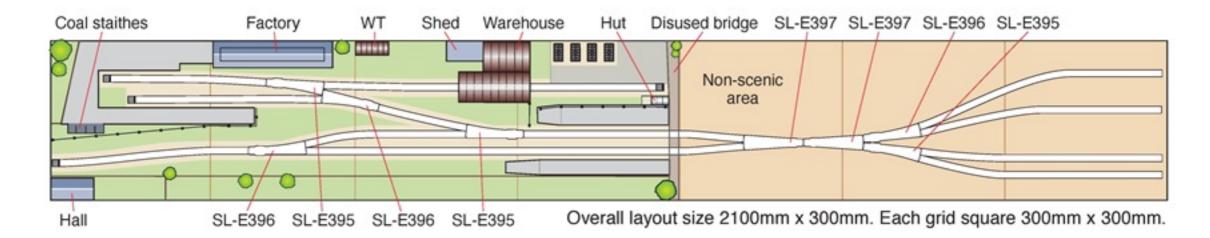

Establishing a track plan

When embarking on this project to build a compact N gauge layout, it seemed logical to use the items of rolling stock that were readily available to me, i.e. the Western Region items from the previous N gauge layout that I was involved with (*Unnycoombe*, see RAILWAY MODELLER April 2011).

When it came to considering options for a suitable theme, I remembered a favourite layout from some 20 years ago – albeit in a different gauge and scale. This was Nigel Bowyer's EM gauge Elm Park; it was slightly different to the run-of-the-mill branch line termini models of the time in that there was very little station platform visible.

A few basic sketches proved that this

scheme could be replicated with a scenic area of 1,200 x 300mm for N gauge with little in the way of alteration. I am quite casual about copying other layouts; there aren't many truly 'new' ideas and I felt that this proven concept would work well for the N gauge beginner or the modeller shifting to the scale from another.

The scenic section has just four points but it provides more than enough operational interest for a one-person layout, either for home use or as a small exhibition piece.

Prototype inspiration

Next I needed to derive a plausible backstory to link my collection of Western Region stock with the *Elm Park* concept. The GWR didn't have too many branches in the London area, but there was one leading to Brentford Dock. This wasn't hugely successful in passenger terms as the line came in from the west – and not east from Paddington. Therefore I supposed that it was instead routed from the east and ran through cuttings rather than on embankments.

By the period portrayed (the 1960s) it is imagined that the route had been truncated, and is now terminating at a small former passing station with coal and oil depot facilities. The name *Half Acre* is taken from a street north of Brentford Dock where it may have been sited. There then is the why, now for the how...



The White Rose baseboards come securely packed in flat-pack kit form, although there is a pre-built service available. All fittings are included to suit the customer's specification. Illustrated are the parts that form the 900mm fiddle yard board, which comes with 10mm ply top, ends and side pieces, and 9mm stretchers to support the middle of the board. The latter come with push-out hole pieces to allow for under-board wiring runs. The joins are all of a 'tab and slot' arrangement.



The edges of the boards have tiny tags where the pieces are removed from the main sheet – in much the same way as moulded plastic kit parts are fixed to a sprue. These look harmless, but can interfere with the fit of the parts, so filing these off before starting is a few minutes well spent. In some cases, I may also run the file over the leading edge of the tabs so that they slide into their respective slots without catching.



The stretchers and ends can be added to one side. I tend to start in the middle and work outwards. The tabs and slots are very accurate, but it's worth checking with a carpenter's square as you go. The whole board can be put together inside 20 minutes, but I prefer to let the glue go off at this point and come back and fit the other side piece later.



The second side piece can be added.
Usually this will drop into place and just needs a light strike with the heel of the hand to seat it in place. Again, the glue can be left for a while and then any slight protrusions can be taken off with a file; these may only be 0.5mm or so, but you'll be glad you did it at this stage rather than attempting it when adding the backboards or fascia boards later on.



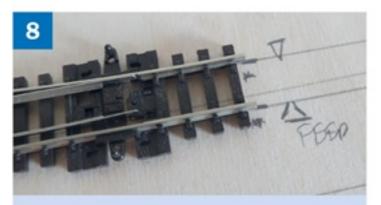
The top can now be attached onto the frame. I usually get a collection of large hardback books and pile them on top while the glue goes off to ensure a flat surface. In this case I just wanted a solid-topped board, but it would be easy enough to profile this top board to just the shape of the track areas before fitting if a more open frame arrangement was required.



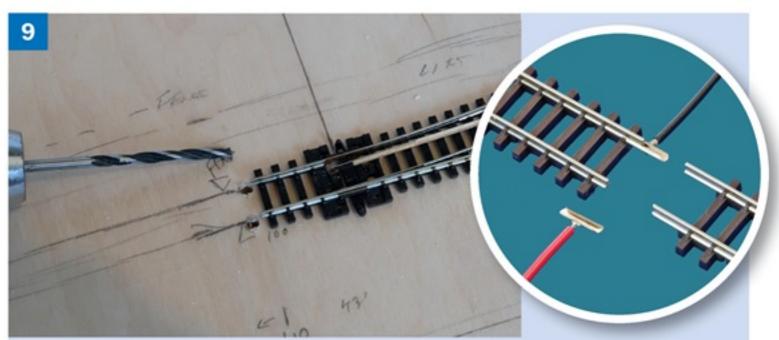
With the main board assembled, points and items of stock could then be placed on top and moved around to establish the optimum positions. Although the track plan was finalised on paper with Peco downloadable templates beforehand, using real items in this way enables the three-dimensional model to be better visualised, with any adjustments made as necessary.



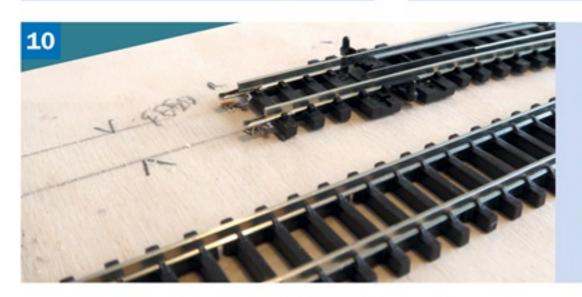
The capacity of the long headshunt (ostensibly the truncated remains of the running line that formerly ran through to the docks) was checked using items of stock. Two long bogie coaches and a Bo-Bo diesel were deemed to be the longest combination that could need to be accommodated.



Tracklaying could now begin in earnest and after marking the rail routes in pencil, the positions of the feed wires could be added. The layout has been wired for traditional 12V dc analogue control, but wiring for DCC would follow a similar process. If a means of remote point tiebar operation is to be used then provision would need to be considered at this stage of the build: on the scenic part of Half Acre the point tiebars are connected via a wire-in-tube arrangement to slide switches mounted along the rear of the layout.



3mm holes were drilled through the baseboard surface to accept the feed wires. These holes were positioned to align with rail breaks so that the wires could be soldered directly to the undersides of rail joiners. An alternative option is to use Peco ref.PL-82 rail joiners, which are supplied with dropper wires pre-attached (see inset).



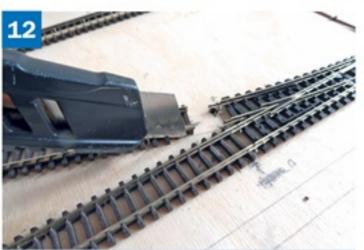
The dropper wires can then be fed through the holes (usually from the top) and the joiners slid onto the ends of the rails. The points should be fixed to the board using pins inserted through holes provided in the plastic sleeper base.



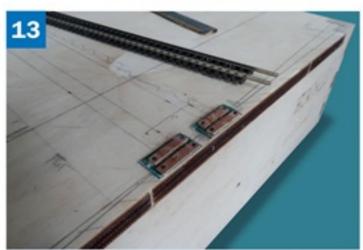


When trimming sections of flexible plain track to the required length, the rail is marked with a pencil, clamped in a vice and cut with a hacksaw. Dedicated rail cutters (right) will do this job with more speed but the rail ends may require more cleaning up with a file afterwards.





Where converging sections of plain track are connected to the frog end of a point (as here), the sleeper ends will need trimming to suit. On each section of plain track, the chairs will need removing from the end sleeper to allow for the rail joiners.



Where track crosses the baseboards, an arrangement of securing the rail ends firmly to the board edges is required. Here lengths of copper-clad sleeper strip (available from C&L Finescale) have been fixed in place with all-purpose adhesive and pinned for extra strength. The rail ends are then soldered to the copper.

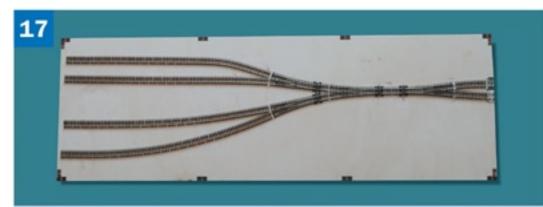
However, in this case it was possible to wire the whole layout 'live' and just rely on the point setting to isolate the closed routes, so I simply connected the three layout feeds together via a terminal block as pictured. Two wires can then be run from this to the controller for layout operation.



The MDF backscene parts were cut to size and attached to the layout using the glue supplied. Then, once the track had been fully tested, some weathering was applied using a combination of red oxide and brown aerosols. This was undertaken outdoors and and with a mask worn. Note the use of newspaper to protect the backscene from overspray.

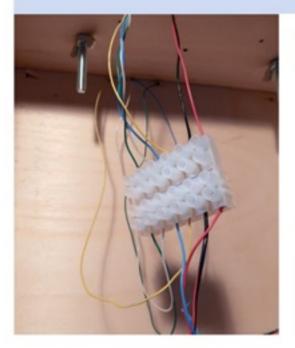


A view of the completed trackwork on the scenic board. Note the blocks of scrap timber (glued and screwed in place) to support the end board which could not be fitted to the vertical part of the baseboard. The fascia boards were left off while the scenic work continued.



The fiddle yard board was created in much the same manner as described above, with the two layout boards joined together using a pair of long bolts with washers and wing nuts. It should be noted that a double-slip could be used instead of the toe-to-toe points employed here if desired. All point tiebars in the fiddle yard are operated manually for simplicity, but a means of remote operation using Peco point motors could be employed if preferred.

To electrically connect the scenic board with the fiddle yard, a plug-together terminal block was used, as illustrated here. Although slightly crude, this arrangement provides a straightforward means of enabling the two boards to be separated when the layout is being stored, or for transport to an exhibition.

Garrigill

Inspired by the late Mike Sharman's early railway modelling, **BOB HETHERINGTON** adopted P4 standards and built this stunning depiction of a might-have-been Stockton & Darlington Railway junction set just after the S&DR was absorbed into the North Eastern Railway.

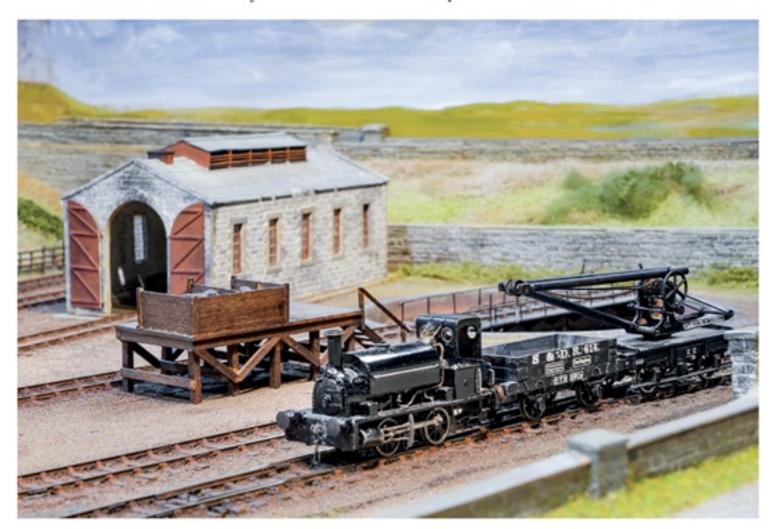

y real interest in modelling started in the 1960s when I bought the GEM kits for an LNWR Watford tank and three LNWR four-wheeled coaches. I built them for a possible layout in a spare bedroom.

At about that time articles by the Model

Railway Study Group were being published on Protofour Standards and I was immediately smitten by what could be achieved. As an additional influence, some amazing articles penned by Mike Sharman were published in which he described his An express hauled by No.161 Lowther, built by R Stephenson Ltd. The leading vehicle is a first class smoking saloon with second class compartments at each end for the servants. A first class carriage and a brake second make up the train. An express of this period did not have third class accommodation.



early period locomotive models, especially his model of the Stockton & Darlington Railway engine *Raby*. All this was what I had been waiting for and I decided that I would build a Stockton & Darlington Railway layout set in the latter half of the 19th century.

I began by searching *The British Steam*Locomotive 1825-1925 by E L Ahrons for a suitable prototype and came across a drawing of William Bouch's long-boilered 0-6-0 No.217. As I was visiting Scarborough frequently for my work at that time, I called in on the noted expert of all matters NER, Ken Hoole, who told me I could find a full set of drawings of No.217 in a copy of Engineer Magazine of 1868.

The engine shed is a copy of that at Middleton-in-Teesdale and is complete with a turntable and coaling facility. The mobile crane was built by Cowans Sheldon in the 1850s; the under-runner is an old S&DR merchandise wagon. The engine is a High Level kit of a Black Hawthorn 0-4-0T.

Also, the pioneering P4 manufacturing firm of the day – Studiolith – produced the correct wheels for No.217 and I was away!

Over the next 16 years I built No.217 and No.58 Woodlands, and constructed the baseboards and track for a model of Middleton-in-Teesdale station, though this ended up in a skip, apart from a scratch-built turntable and a single baseboard. On moving to a new home, I commenced Garrigill and everything you see developed from there.

A might-have-been junction station

Garrigill is a small moorland village, and the station would have been well away from its dwellings and inhabitants. In the 19th century the locals would have been involved mainly in hill farming and lead mining, so there would have been a requirement for the supply of coal, lime, pit props and general goods. The station thus features a single platform with booking office, a goods shed, coal drops and a locomotive depot with

engine shed and turntable.

The layout is set in the late 1860s, just after the Stockton & Darlington Railway had been taken over by the North Eastern Railway, but while it was still operating as a separate entity run by a committee.

The specific location is the site of an imaginary junction of two railways: the Wearhead Extension Railway and the Cumberland & Cleveland Junction Railway (see panel below).

Creating a plausible fictional station

Many modellers create fictional lines, often based on railway routes that were proposed and surveyed, but which never reached fruition or perhaps were only partially completed. Two such lines which prompted Bob's *Garrigill* were the Wearhead Extension Railway and the Cumberland and Cleveland Junction Railway.

However, we need firstly to track back to the year 1845 when the Weardale Extension Railway opened connecting the Wear and Derwent Railway (formerly the Stanhope and Tyne Railway) at Waskerley with the Bishop Auckland & Weardale Railway at Crook.

Although the line provided a direct route between Crook and Stanhope, it only served quarries and a smelting mill at Stanhope itself – no permanent passenger facilities were provided. Moreover, the route involved various inclines, notably at Sunniside, and on the slopes to the north of the industries

at Stanhope. Perhaps more significantly, in 1845, the Wear Valley Railway was authorised and a line was opened two years later that ran from Wear Valley Junction (to the south of Crook) as far as Frosterley.

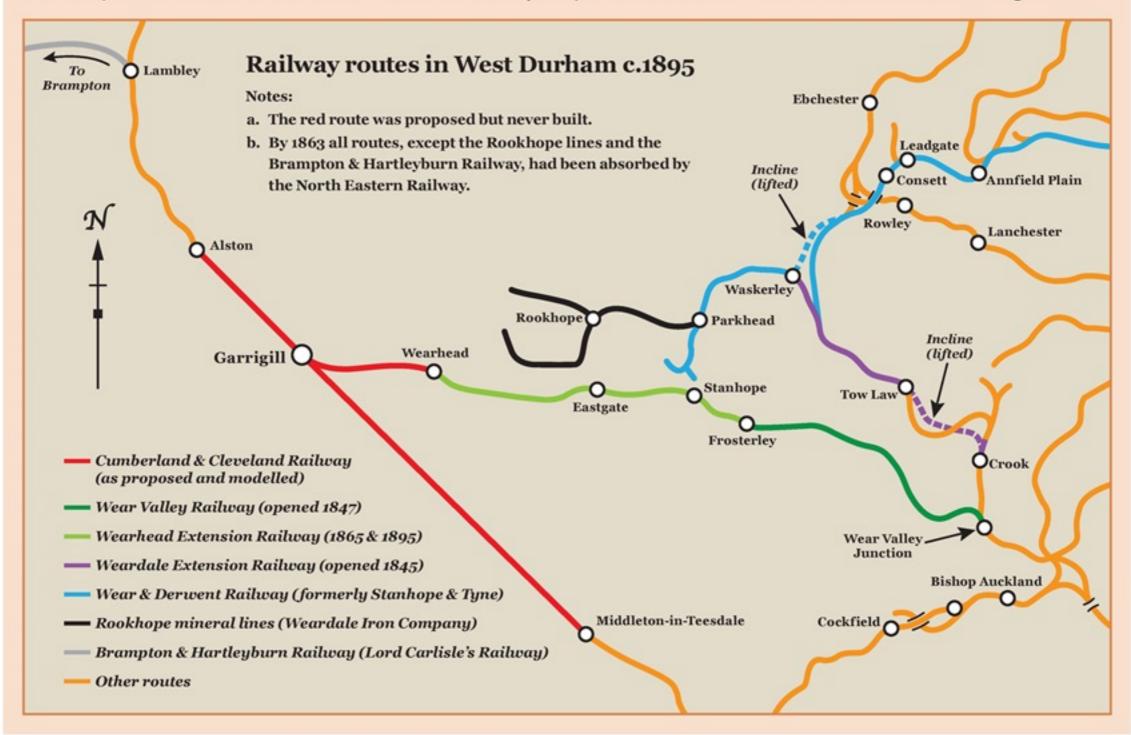
This was in effect part of other much grander schemes which aimed to link the Bishop Auckland & Weardale Railway to the Newcastle & Carlisle Railway at Milton near Brampton. Any such line would undoubtably have passed through Garrigill.

In the event the railway along the Wear Valley was only extended in stages, firstly through to Stanhope, where a permanent station and goods facilities were built to the south of the town in 1862. It is interesting to note that no connection between the mineral lines to the north of Stanhope and this new station was ever built.

Eventually though, the Wearhead Extension Railway completed the line from Stanhope through to Wearhead, which became the line's eventual terminus, and thus rails never reached Garrigill or Milton. Nor was this accomplished until 1895, by which time the Stockton & Darlington Railway had been absorbed by the North Eastern Railway.

Nevertheless, with a few twists to the above historical chronology, Wearhead provided Bob with a plausible destination for one of the routes out from *Garrigill*.

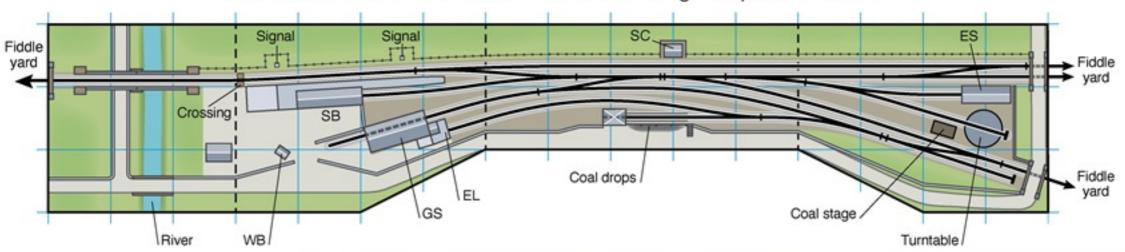
The other route which he incorporated into his scheme was that proposed by the Cumberland & Cleveland Junction Railway in 1872. This would have run from the market town of Alston southwards over the watershed between the Tyne and Tees rivers to connect with the existing NER terminus at Middleton-in-Teesdale. Nothing came of this proposal either, but again it provided Bob with his plausible reason for the second route out from Garrigill.

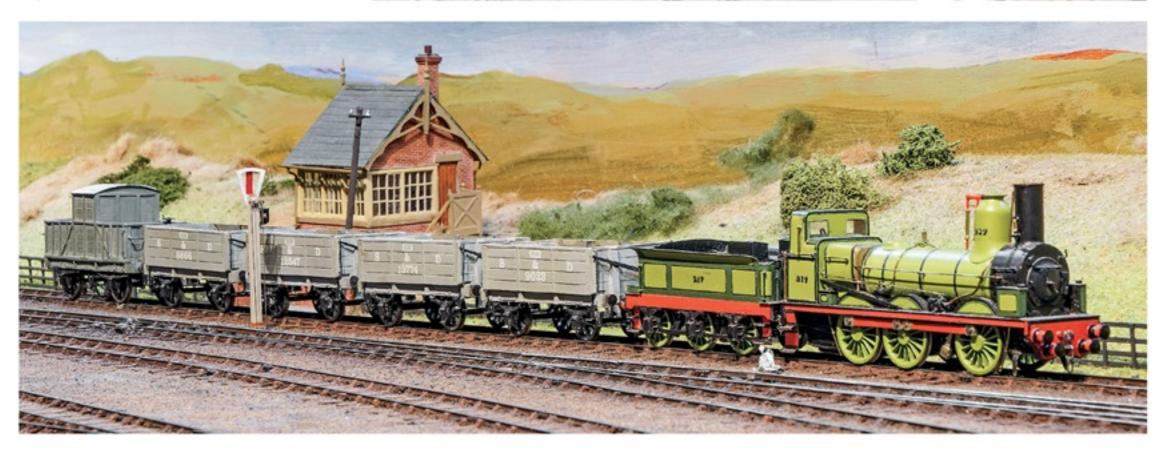

Mineral engine No.145 Panther was built for the opening of the Stainmore line with an enclosed cab because of the weather over the Pennines. Apparently, the drivers did not like them as they felt too enclosed! The train is made up of covered corn wagons and an open wagon of sacks. The covered wagons were built in the 1840s with dumb buffers.

Mineral engine No.217 hauls a rake of P5 type hopper wagons. The locomotive was a long-boilered design by William Bouch that incorporated his latest innovations, including steam brakes on the rear two sets of driving wheels operated by a cylinder on the footplate that pressed steel bands on the tyres, and a sleeved funnel to preheat boiler water. The brake van had previously been used on passenger trains.





Tank engine No.197 Kildale with a train of Lord Carlisle's Railway chauldron wagons lettered for his agent TK (Thompson of Kirkhouses). The engine was designed to be a banker on the Marske zig-zag incline near Saltburn. The signal box is one of the earliest of the S&DR and was classified C1 by the NER.

Coal and lime drops, typical of the period to allow the use of hopper wagons. The closed shed over the last two cells is for the lime used on the fields, which would be spoilt if wetted.

The latter would have continued north to join the Alston branch of the former Newcastle & Carlisle Railway. The advantage of this is that while most of the stock I have built (or am building) is of S&DR prototypes, I can legitimately include some stock from Lord Carlisle's Brampton & Hartleyburn Railway which connected to the Alston branch at Lambley (see map).

Scratch-built locomotives

The layout has been constructed over the last 18 years, although the construction of the locomotives, which is my main love, commenced in 1971. These are scratch-built, mostly from original drawings, except for a High Level Black Hawthorn. Carriages are

The goods shed and crane. The shed is from the original drawings of Kirkby Stephen goods shed; I obtained these from Euston in the 1970s and reversed the design to fit.

A view of the station. The building was copied from Rowley station (now rebuilt at Beamish Museum) but was reversed end for end. It was common for the S&DR to have one platform only for both directions of travel.

from etched brass, produced from the works drawings from the National Railway Museum and etched by Bill Bedford.

The P5 mineral wagons and chauldrons are built from kits from John Elliott's Chilton Iron Works and are unfortunately no longer available. Other goods stock is mainly scratch-built including an early Cowans Sheldon hand-operated mobile crane and under-runner. A drawing of this crane featured in the journal of the North Eastern Railway Association a few years ago.

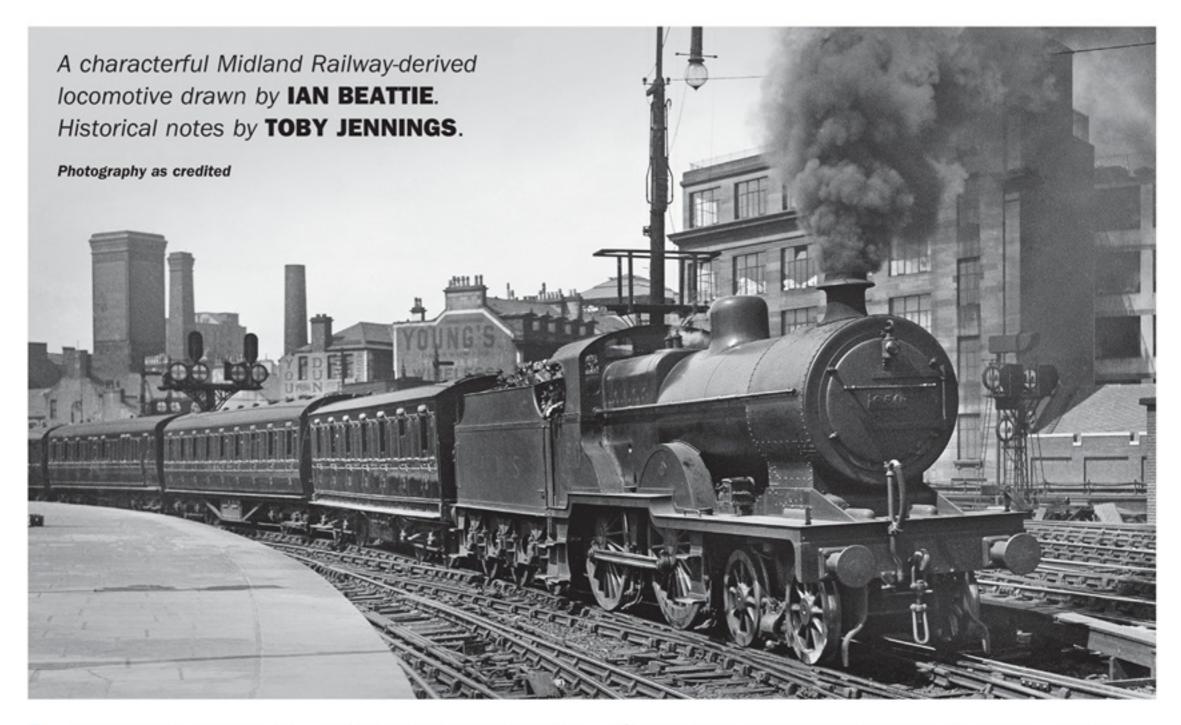

LMS Class 2P 4-4-0



ike many locomotives of Midland Railway descent, the London Midland & Scottish Railway 2Ps are a class that divides opinion. On the one hand, they can be seen as outdated relics of a bygone age; underpowered 4-4-0s with a throttled front end, built at a time when most railways had moved on to six-coupled machines, and thus keeping alive the Midland's practice of using two small locomotives where one bigger engine would do the job.

Yet perhaps this does the 2Ps a disservice? A class of locomotives that successfully worked two of the most demanding railway systems in the country for more than 30 years, were genuinely adored by the footplate crews on at least one of those railways, and proved very economical in the process, cannot have been a complete disaster.

Victorian roots

The 2Ps can trace their ancestry

back to a Johnson design of 1884

- the 1667 class 4-4-0s, numbered 1667-1676, with 7' driving wheels, boiler pressure of 140psi and Joy valve gear. The latter proved unsuccessful, and the class was replaced between 1896 and 1901 by what were effectively new locomotives, with new boilers, frames, piston valves and motion, and given the same numbers. They were renumbered 483-492 in 1907, becoming the 483 class.

During 1912/13, the 483s were rebuilt yet again with superheated boilers; though classified as rebuilds for accountancy purposes, they probably only reused the wheels and some small parts from the original engines. With Belpaire fireboxes and the distinctive stepped running plate over the driving wheels, the rebuilt 483s

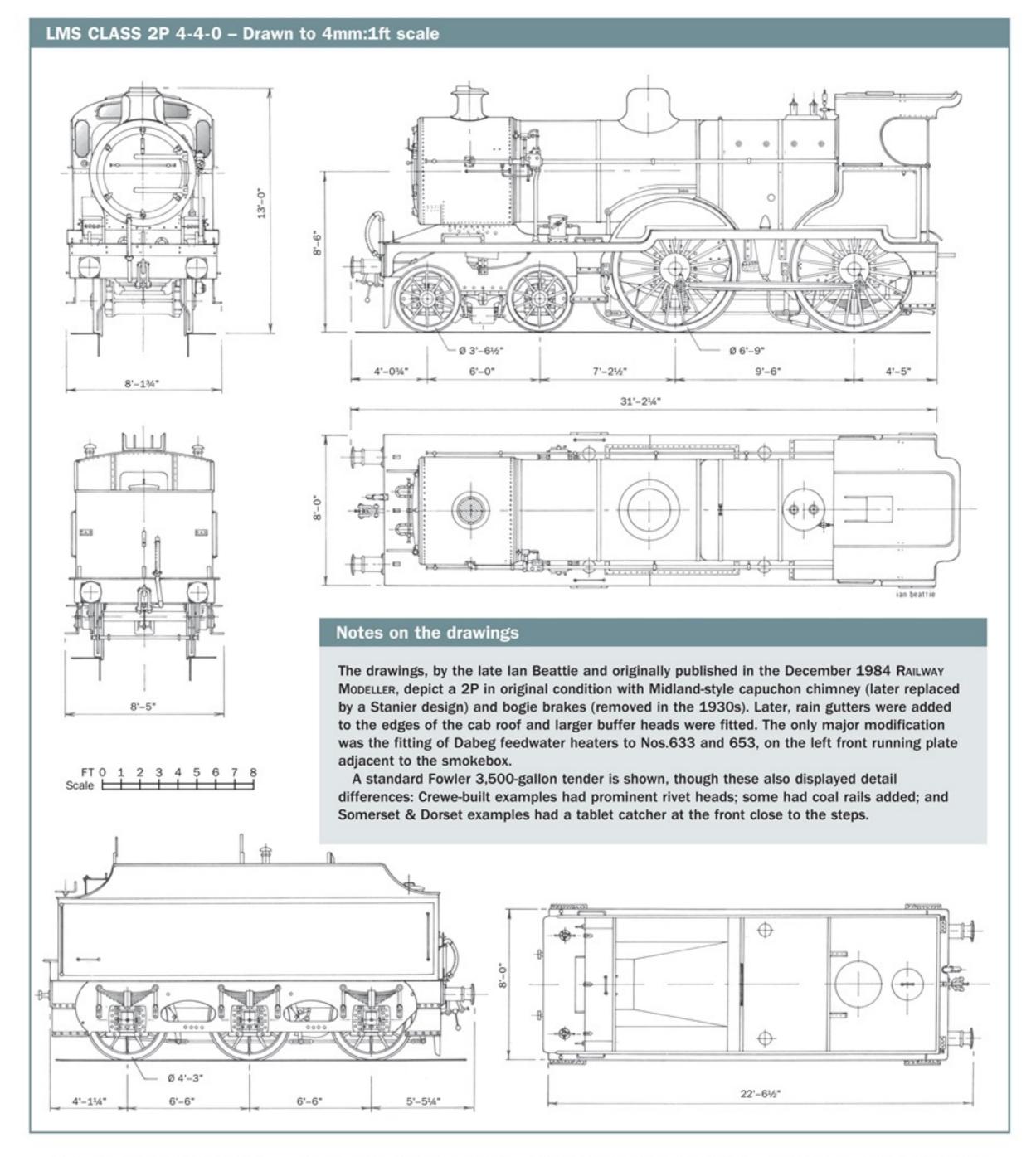

established the familiar outline that would continue right through to the LMS-built 2Ps, and many other Midland 4-4-0 classes would also be rebuilt with the same boiler to bring them into line with the 483 class. The last of these Midland Class 2Ps would remain in service until 1962, the same year that the LMS-built examples

were rendered extinct.

With Sir Henry Fowler – the Midland's Chief Mechanical Engineer from 1910 to 1922 – occupying the same post in the LMS from 1925 onwards, and James Anderson, the new company's first Motive Power Superintendent, also being a former Midland man, the MR





'small engine' policy continued, most notably in the continued building of 4F 0-6-0s. When the need arose for new, lightweight locomotives for secondary passenger duties, the 483 class was likewise chosen for further construction.

Introduced in 1928, the LMS 2Ps were very similar to their predecessors, with only minor changes such as reducing the driving wheel diameter from 7' to 6' 9" and increasing the boiler pressure from 160 to 180psi.

A total of 138 were built up to

1932, most at Derby but with two batches from Crewe, and including three – Nos.575/6/80 – turned out from Derby in 1929 to replace the first engines with those numbers, which had been sent to the Somerset & Dorset Joint Railway the previous year

as its Nos.44-46. The LMS took the SDJR's locomotives back into stock in 1930, with this trio becoming Nos.633-635 – but the class would remain closely associated with the S&D for three more decades, becoming the staple pilot engines assisting

larger machines such as LMS and BR Standard 5MT 4-6-0s, and Bulleid Pacifics, over the steep gradients of the Mendip Hills.

Capable performers

With their relatively large driving wheels, the 2Ps might seem at first glance to be unsuitable for such work, and their outdated cylinder design with short-travel valves did nothing to help their performance. On the Somerset & Dorset, however, they did prove to be very sure-footed as pilots, and within their limitations, they were very capable machines, competently working lightweight stopping passenger trains in most parts of the LMS network. Examples were allocated at various times to sheds including Barrow, Workington, Buxton, Burton, Accrington, Goole, Rhyl and Northampton, to name just a few widespread locations.

One of the first places they made their mark was on the former Glasgow & South Western Railway network, with over half of the class being allocated there from new. The G&SW enginemen took to them immediately, finding them spirited, freerunning, powerful enough for the steeply graded lines and often heavy traffic to Stranraer, and frugal on coal and water.

Before the war, the class found similar work in England, being used on Leeds-Heysham boat trains loading up to nine coaches, and single-handedly taking the then six-coach 'Pines Express' over the S&D - neither a mean feat for a Class 2 engine - but perhaps the classic image of the 2Ps will always be as pilots to larger LMS engines like 5MTs and Jubilees. As well as the S&D, they carried out such duties on the G&SW (assisting expresses out of Glasgow St Enoch), the Midland Main Line, and even on the West Coast Main Line.

For all their inherent faults, then, they did what was asked of them well enough – and the LMS, always a cost-conscious railway, found them to have the lowest average repair costs of any passenger class in the 1930s.

First to be scrapped were Nos.591 and 639, written off after

they collided virtually head-on at Port Eglinton Junction, Glasgow, on 6 September 1934.

BR withdrawals commenced in 1954 and accelerated from 1959 onwards, with many of the last examples being found on the S&D and G&SW routes that they had served so well. The final survivor No.40670. was withdrawn from Ardrossan shed in November 1962; sadly, the standard gauge preservation movement was still in its infancy at this time, and none were saved. A proposal was put forward in the late 1990s for a new-build project, but did not attract enough support, so today we can only enjoy this characteristic LMS design in model form.

Model 2Ps

First to produce a ready-to-run 2P was Hornby, which released an OO gauge model in 1973. Having been converted from the old Triang tooling for the very similar looking Maunsell L1 4-4-0, its smokebox, chimney and front framing were all incorrect for the 2P, and it only lasted in the catalogue for two years.

A much better 2P model would eventually enter the Hornby range, though rather like its prototype, it had a somewhat complex ancestry. Barely had it appeared in late 1984 under Palitoy's Mainline brand (being reviewed in the December RAILWAY MODELLER of that year) than some of the stock and assets of Mainline were sold to Dapol in 1985. The 2Ps had arrived so late that some were released only in polystyrene trays, which were inserted into Dapol boxes.

The tender-driven model was initially produced as No.635 in LMS lined black and No.40568 in BR lined black; over the next two decades, Dapol added Nos.40567 and 40569 in BR black and No.45 in SDJR Prussian blue. All of these were authentic, but No.563 in LMS maroon was more of a 'might-have-been' – because the introduction of the real 2Ps in 1928 had come just after the LMS switched to black livery for all but express passenger engines.

The tools for the 2P were among the Dapol items sold on to Hornby in 1996, and the model was reintroduced in the latter's range three years later, with further numbers in LMS and BR black, and SDJR blue, having been produced since. More recently, it has received a muchneeded upgrade with a motor in the locomotive.

The Mainline/Dapol 2P had been an excellent model for its day, and it says much for the quality of the body moulding that it can still look good alongside today's R-T-R items – especially with a little extra detailing and weathering, as Callum Willcox shows on page 736.

For N gauge modellers, a 2P is available from Union Mills Models (tel. 01624 852896) in BR black and LMS red; a 3mm scale etched brass kit was produced by John Maidment; while in O gauge, Gladiator Models offers a kit (www.gladiatormodels.com – tel. 01332 510346).

he London & South Western Railway abandoned progress of a route westwards to Exeter from London via Southampton on reaching Dorchester, favouring the more direct central route via Salisbury and Yeovil. This became known as the West of England Main Line and left several significant and rapidly developing centres of population, commerce, and military locations without straightforward rail access: a situation which persists to this day.

The Marshwood Vale line

Axminster and north for the GWR towards

To redress this gap in the rail network, I have supposed that Bridport and nearby West Bay, some 15 miles west of Dorchester, had developed sufficiently to attract LSWR rails. Connection to its main line near Axminster was tantalisingly close but funds tight.

The Great Western Railway, which had arrived earlier, was keen to find a way to run freight more easily between Exeter and the ports of Weymouth and West Bay as well as to limit the scope of LSWR expansion plans. However, the two rival companies agreed to jointly develop a 17-mile, mostly single track, route from Bridport which divided towards its western end, south for

Chard Junction. By taking responsibility for much of the track and infrastructure the GWR was able to exercise a measure of control and secure its goal of limited freight running rights to Exeter over the LSWR main line, as well as making use of its Chard branch for through trains to Taunton.

Things ultimately proved more beneficial to the LSWR, attracting

military and naval traffic from bases around the south coast as well as significant passenger and parcels carriage plus freight for Southampton. The principal station was Beaminster with lesser sites at Broadwindsor, Marshwood and Hawkchurch.

Developing the concept

I am a 'returning' modeller – my teenage layout in the early 1970s having been forsaken in favour of motorcycles. The old bikes remain but I always kept an eye on the railway scene and acquired a few items of OO gauge rolling stock for 'later on'.

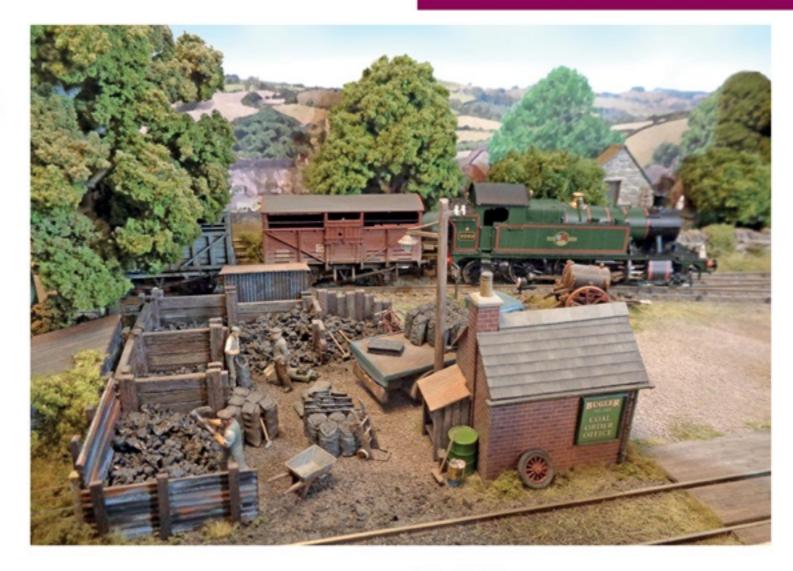
That moment arrived a few years ago, though things didn't start with this rationale; rather, an article covering Geoff Forster's wonderfully characterful rail-served dairy, an extension to his equally charming *Penhydd* (RM November 2012). I was inspired to build my own version, the *West Dorset Dairy*. This was intended to be a low-relief shelf diorama but became a fully formed factory as the joys of scratch-building and kit-bashing were revealed. A house move allowed more space and so the concept evolved with the dairy as the focus, both visually and for rail activity.

I have a preference for branch lines with their quirky, often overgrown and comfortably neglected air. Secondary lines can offer much the same characteristics, so Broadwindsor fitted the bill nicely.

This would be my first layout build for decades, and an attractive aspect of a joint route was the excuse to feature both WR and SR trains. Although I could only squeeze in a 2m scenic length, this did mean that I would at least stand a good chance of completing the project – with less danger of suffering defeat from being over-ambitious. This was going to be as much a large diorama as a small layout.

Objectives

The aim with Broadwindsor was to create, effectively, a three-dimensional painting, capturing the character of a busy rural line and related industries in the period 1955-1961. It had to accommodate both through passenger services and the local Axminster and Chard shuttles as well as a variety of freight, including military traffic. Shunting would be a main activity, both for the dairy complex, agricultural products and to service off-scene MOD and quarry sites. This would justify the inclusion of shed facilities for a shunter. The station needed to be modest and compact with a single curved platform and typically fascinating collection of secondary structures. A goods facility, loading dock, livestock pens, yard crane and the ubiquitous coal merchant were required. Scenically it was to be a summer landscape with plenty of trees, some mild elevation to



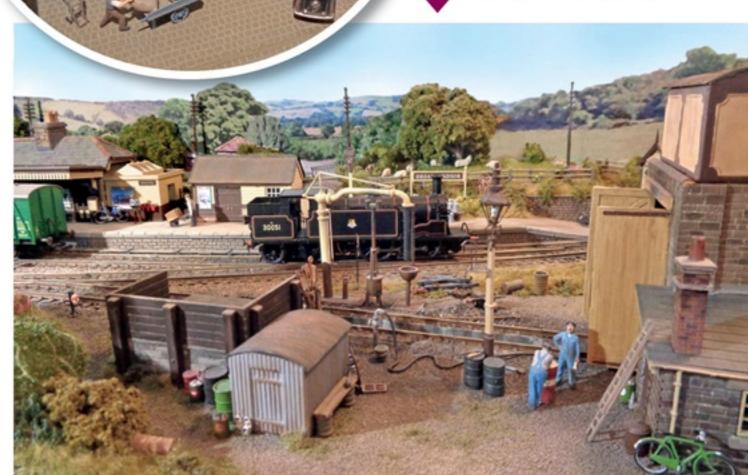
the surrounding terrain and an overall sense that the railway – a little neglected post-war and its livelier days fading – had been around for some time and was by now picturesquely aligned with nature, that is, a little overgrown in places. All this in a scale 167 yards and needing to appear natural, and not overcrowded. Quite a tall order!

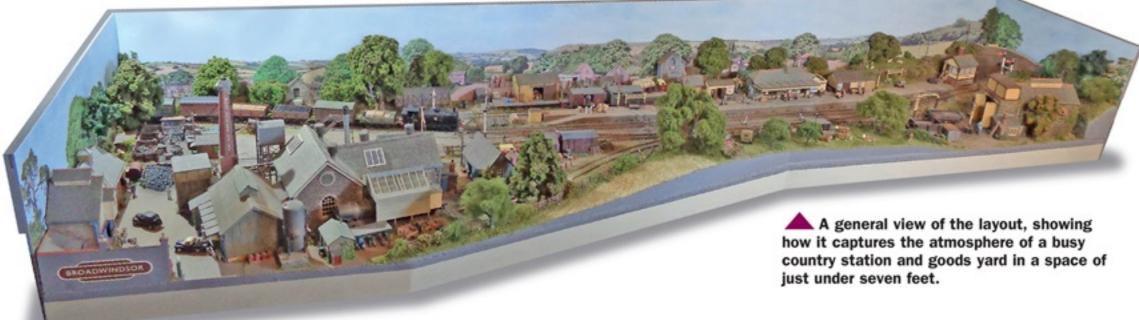
The build

The baseboard is a single sheet of 12mm ply braced with batten and surfaced entirely with cork sheet, all supported by snugly fitting trestles. The left end is 600mm wide to include the dairy complex and goods yard. This narrows to 400mm at the other end for the station and loco shed areas. The location of structures determined the track plan, and I wanted at least some effect of curvature. I found the best way to achieve this was by running the line in/out to the rear of the baseboard but I realised the plan also meant tight curves. As the format dictates sedate

The shed area is fully detailed with just the right amount of clutter. Drummond M7 0-4-4T No.30051 starts its run-round manoeuvre before making the return journey.



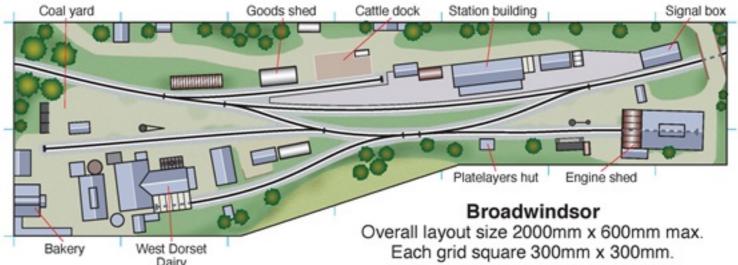


train speeds this doesn't present an issue, but there's not much opportunity for long radius points. Care was taken to ensure the track, which is a mix of Peco Setrack and Streamline, was firmly located and level. As ever, the project was constrained by budget and a little 'techno-fear'; my experience still being rooted in the late 1960s! Electrical feed wiring was installed during track laying together with provision for point motors. The next job will be to fit Peco Twistlock units.

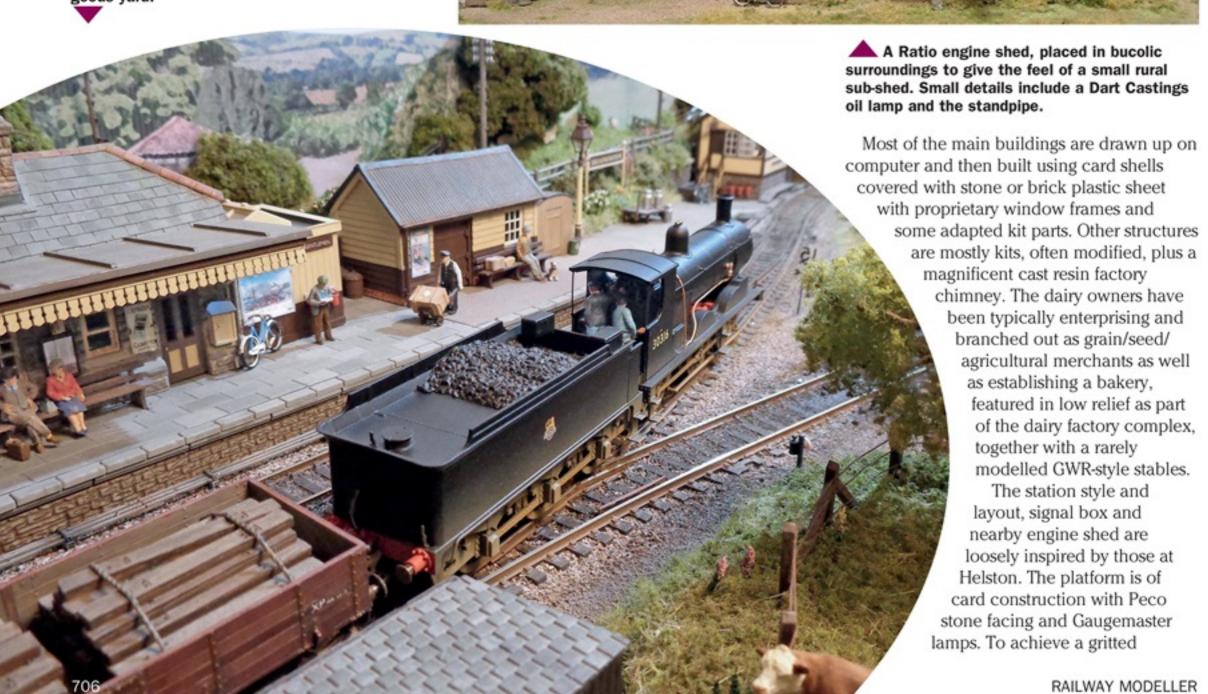
Structures

Infrastructure is generally as compact as possible whilst retaining a believable sense of proportion. This helps greatly for creating a sense of space, though clearances are often tight, and the goods yard is about as small as it gets.

platform surface but avoid passengers apparently standing on gravel the size of track ballast, I used fine grade sandpaper off a roll. Care was taken to ensure both ramps merge neatly with the ground and the platform curve is smooth. The shed (Ratio) features an ornate oil lamp (Dart Castings), inspection pit, standpipe, fire irons and general detritus.

Landscape

Raised areas were constructed separately using card lattice frameworks covered with plaster bandage, then finished scenically before fixing in position and detailing. Trees are a mixture, some proprietary with enhanced foliage, whilst others are scratch-built using wire armatures or, for the central oak, hazel twigs arranged to form mighty boughs! Fields use static grass, but the rough stuff is dyed teddy bear fur enhanced with scatter and wildflowers.

The backscene was created on computer from a mass of individual images, which were printed onto A3 sheets and then mounted on the backboard. This produced a pleasing result that is evocative of the region being modelled – but I may just paint backscenes by hand in future.

I decided to go for an industrious and sensitively detailed look with a number of cameo scenes scattered around. Everything was weathered into the landscape, with nature making mild incursions, and care taken to achieve an even, slightly muted tone



with colouring. Together, this gives the layout a harmonious appearance.

Rolling stock

Locos, wagons, and carriages are from the usual R-T-R sources – much being acquired second-hand online – augmented by kit-built items. Weathering has commenced; wagons first and I will investigate coupling options, though tight curves sadly rule out close-coupled stock. Most locos have crews as they look a little odd without. By ignoring the Western Region colours and swapping vehicles, the layout can also operate in prewar guise using GWR and Southern stock.

Conclusions

Broadwindsor is finished scenically but far from complete. There's much to do on the technical side and fiddle yards to construct, turned 90° forwards to the main board. The layout has, so far, exceeded my hopes and I can immerse myself happily in the period atmosphere, even when nothing much is happening, which seemed to typify rural railways when I was a child. Moving to a smaller room is due but may offer better space for the fiddle yards. We shall see.

Passenger trains for Dentdale – 5

Recreating the 'Bonnyface' local

IAN NUTTALL describes one of the local passenger trains that runs on his 4mm scale Settle & Carlisle-themed layout, this formation depicting a regular Hellifield-Hawes service that passed through Dent.



ust north of Dent is Garsdale, the other side of Rise Hill Tunnel. It is the junction for the branch line to Hawes and then down through beautiful Wensleydale to Leyburn before joining the East Coast Main Line at Northallerton. Garsdale is the only station between Dent and Kirkby Stephen and, being in a particularly sparsely populated area, only exists because of its junction status. It could be a lonely outpost, yet one full of character and featured, sadly, as the scene on Christmas Eve 1910 of one of the country's worst railway disasters. 12 people were killed and the dire words, "I've wrecked the Scotch Express" were uttered by the signalman responsible when he realised that he had forgotten about the two light

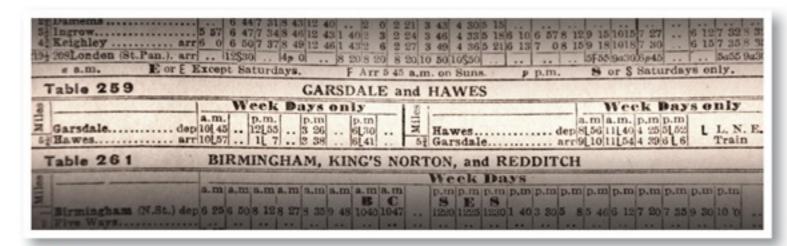
This is my most frequently used pairing of loco and stock for my 'Bonnyface' train. No.1205, along with No.1206, was allocated new to Hellifield in 1946, specifically to work this service, taking over the mantle from Fowler tanks Nos.21 and 64. The Midland van, inserted between the loco and first coach, is there for practical reasons; when the 'Bonnyface' set has finished its trip, I need to reverse it into the hidden storage sidings, and this combination prevents buffer lock. engines waiting on the Down main line.

Hawes was where the Midland line from Garsdale met the North Eastern Railway branch from Northallerton head-on; Hawes was officially Hawes Joint. Thus, the train services along Wensleydale were divided, unequally, between the two companies. In my 1939 LMS passenger timetable, five return trips a day are listed from Hawes to Garsdale (09:16, 10:23, 13:26, 16:00 and 18:40) and with no intermediate stations, each journey took 11 minutes. The first trip of the day was noted as being Tuesdays Only; no doubt it was market day in Hawes.

Checking the times

Comparing these times with my 1946 timetable, I noted that the Tuesdays Only train had disappeared, and all but the 15:26 from Garsdale, and its 16:25 return, have an 'L' next to the times. This is to signify that that the loco and coaches were from LNER

stock. These three trains originated from Northallerton and stopped at all stations on the Wensleydale branch. The one service without the 'L', and therefore pertinent to my needs, ran through Dent. In fact, it was the daily return Hellifield-Hawes service, given in the 1946 timetable as leaving Hellifield at 14:20, returning there at 17:23. In both the 1939 and 1946 timetables the northbound train seems to start from Bradford at 12:52, travelling via Leeds, although the southbound service terminated at Hellifield.

The 'Bonnyface' local

This Hellifield-Hawes service was, for years, referred to by locals, in endearing terms, as

'Bonnyface' – or was it 'Boniface'? I am swayed towards the former as the correct spelling, so used because of the timing of the train; the 16:25 departure from Hawes would carry the local school children back to either Garsdale or Dent, whilst it also signalled the end of the working day, thus bringing a smile to people's faces - hence 'Bonnyface'. David Jenkinson, authority on the S&C, was non-committal but he did offer sagacious advice on the train itself. Hellifield shed (code 20G) had various Class 2 or Class 3 engines available which were suitable for the daily service to Hawes and back. Until 1946 Fowler 2-6-2Ts Nos.21 and 64 were frequent performers, whilst I have a photo of Midland

2P 4-4-0 No.470 on the train at Hawes, just after WWII. When the Ivatt Class 2 2-6-2Ts appeared in 1946 Hellifield was given two of the first, Nos.1205 and 1206, to supersede the more elderly Fowler versions.

The elements of the train were standard, with a pair of non-corridor Brake Thirds flanking a 57' non-corridor Composite.

David Jenkinson's book shows No.183 heading three coaches of LNWR origin, whilst standard LMS-built coaches appear in other pictures. I also have a photograph, dated 19 September 1953, with No.40184 on a three-coach Bradford-Hawes service, verifying evidence I found in my 1939 and 1946 timetables showing that one of the coaches is a corridor Brake Third. I confess that my own formation is not 100% accurate as one of my Brake Thirds is in fact a non-corridor Third.

Should you wish to replicate one of the LNER services from Northallerton to Garsdale then be aware that they didn't venture beyond Garsdale; however, the locos were turned on Garsdale's fabled stockaded turntable. The LNER used either G5 0-4-4Ts, D20 4-4-0s or J21 0-6-0s on these trains which were made up of a basic two-coach formation, although this was doubled on the last day of service, 24 April 1954. I do have photographic evidence of the train with an added cattle van or milk tank as extra vehicles.

LMS non-corridor Third

This is my 'rogue' coach, as it really should be a non-corridor Brake Third. However, it does mean I have been able to incorporate my third, and final, set of the exquisite Malcolm Binns fully lined, etched Comet coach sides; these I have overlaid onto a Mainline donor coach, and provided etched and cast extra underframe details to up the game and keep the whole vehicle somewhere near the standard of the sides. The result is so pleasing I have forgiven myself for my Third/Brake Third indiscretion.



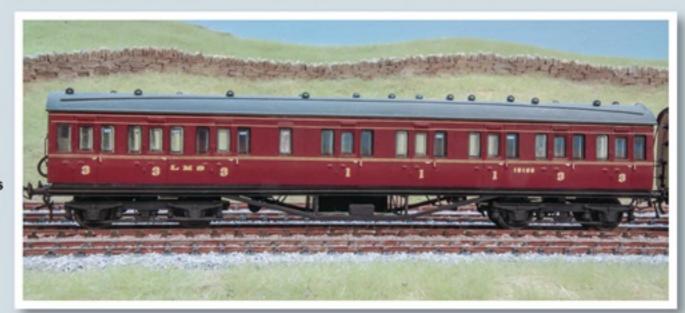
LMS non-corridor Lavatory Composite

This is the Dapol model of the LMS Period II 57' non-Corridor Lavatory Composite built in 1930 to D1736; mine is No.19185. The coach came in a bag as a kit of parts, very similar to those offered years ago by Tri-ang/Hornby. My first attempt to paint it using a Precision Paints LMS Dull

Crimson aerosol was an unmitigated disaster as the paint spattered in mini globules. I had to resort to immediate drastic use of kitchen towel and white spirit so I could start afresh. My second attempt with a new can was a success.

Before inserting the glazing, I painted the inner edges of the window frames matt black. Although undoubtedly time-consuming, it is worth it, for it diminishes the prismatic effect of the plastic used for the glass and enhances the flush glazing aspect.

Comet etched and cast parts were added below decks to match the level of finish on the other coaches. HMRS lining and transfers provided the LMS simple lining finish, whilst door handles were etchings (Roxey or Comet) and handrails were 0.33mm fine brass wire.



LMS non-corridor Brake Third

I admit, this is an indulgence. It is a BSL kit built by D C Lawrence and is a present to myself. At the time, over 40 years ago, I could only afford one, so chose a coach that could form a train on its own. I do have a photo of ex-MR 1P 0-4-4T No.1340 with but a single vehicle, identical to mine, on a motor-fitted service at Ambergate in 1934. Many 57' non-Corridor Brake Thirds were converted to motor-fitted in the 1930s. Also of interest, if the end of the motor-fitted coach was labelled to show its status, it read 'Pull-Push' as opposed to the expected 'Push-Pull'.



LMS Ivatt Class 2 2-6-2T



There are several possibilities for locos which are suitable, appropriate, and available to be in charge of the 'Bonnyface' local. I'll start with the present incumbent. This is the Bachmann Ivatt Class 2 2-6-2T. I have selected No.1205, although I do have another stored to turn out as No.1206, the other of the Hellifield shed pair, at some time in the future. It is a very rare occasion (I can't recall the last) when it is simply a matter of opening the box and putting the loco on the track; perhaps I have made a rod for my own back, but I am not complaining, for I seem to thrive on my approach. This model is the original Bachmann offering; thus it required several tweaks to render it fit for service. I believe I counted 14, the most glaring omission being the slide bar bracket. Fortunately, this is available from 247 Developments, whilst less obvious refinements include the LMS builder's plate on the front frame extensions, and the 20G shed plate on the smokebox door. If you acquire the latest Bachmann issue you will be spared many of my refinements, but I hope you will still be encouraged to personalise your engine. Mine does run sweetly and reliably and can be left to trundle around my Dentdale circuit for hours.

LMS Fowler Class 3P 2-6-2T

Although appearing after the introduction of the proven, reliable Fowler Class 4P 2-6-4Ts, the Class 3P 2-6-2T equivalents never really performed to expectations, being under-boilered and with an outdated front-end layout. Perhaps this was the reason for their demotion to the relatively mundane, humdrum life of hauling the Hellifield-Hawes service once a day – hardly an arduous task.

My K's kit is turned out as No.21, the last of the first batch built at Derby Works in 1930. I have also, in stock, another of these kits with the aim of creating No.64, its sister loco at Hellifield shed; another task for the future.

Credit for No.21 must go to friend, and fellow LMS modeller, Martin Hudson of the Butcombe Junction Group, who built the kit in return for four wagons constructed by me. I completed it with the painting, numbering, and weathering. Of the several locos I have at my disposal to be in charge of the 'Bonnyface' service, this is certainly the most powerful as it is equally at ease with one of my long parcels trains.



Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway 2-4-2T

An ex-L&Y 2-4-2T may seem, at first glance, a surprise possibility for the 'Bonnyface' motive power, yet it is a feasible, viable option. This is for two reasons. Firstly, several were based at Hellifield shed during my 1937-47 era and, secondly, I have a photo of my chosen engine, No.10899, one of the Hellifield examples, on the stockaded turntable at Garsdale in 1939. There is every chance it is being turned in readiness for its return trip from Hawes, which had no turntable, to Hellifield.

Thanks to Bachmann you can buy one of these ready-to-run, although the tooling covers the non-Belpaire boilered version. I have gone down the kit-building route via my trading deal with Martin Hudson, so mine is the longer-bunkered type, originally from Craftsman, although now marketed by London Road Models. It is paired with a Mashima motor and a 40:1 gearbox.



Midland Railway 2P 4-4-0



Whilst a tank loco was perfectly adequate for the relatively short journey from Hellifield to Hawes, tender engines did feature and the Midland 2P 4-4-0 trio of Nos.470-2 were based at Hellifield for several years, so could easily be pressed into service on the 'Bonnyface'.

I am reasonably, though not absolutely, certain that No.472 is an etched brass Maygib kit with Romford drivers, Gibson bogie and tender wheels, and the usual Mashima motor/40:1 gearbox. Its haulage powers are, as expected for a 4-4-0, not overly impressive, but it does run smoothly and handles the 'Bonnyface' service comfortably.

Midland Railway and LMS 2P 4-4-0s

Here is another pair of possible options, although their individual pedigrees are different. No.470, the first of the Hellifield trio, was scratch-built by friend Ron Smith for his own S&C layout in the 1970s. What a shame that it never appeared in the model press, for it was inspirational. After his untimely demise Ron's widow, Dorothy, bequeathed it to me. For its day it was advanced because its four driving wheels were mounted in a pivoting sub-chassis, thus improving its smoothness of ride and haulage capabilities. Despite not being the heaviest of my 4-4-0s it is the strongest, which is testimony to its well-engineered design. In the Houghton and Foster book on the S&C, published in 1947, there is a photo, taken in Hawes station in 1946, of No.470 on the 'Bonnyface' service.

No.576 is a slightly less obvious candidate as it was based at Leeds Holbeck shed (20A) and is the only LMS-built 2P I can find allocated to an S&C shed in my timescale. This is from a Millholme kit, and is whitemetal, yet I struggled to balance the loco to achieve a reasonable degree of pulling power. However, it runs smoothly, and it was a bargain costing less than £30.00 including Romford wheels, Mashima motor and gearbox.

his 15" gauge light railway layout idea came about whilst I was visiting the Kingston Lacy estate gardens near Wimborne, Dorset.

It's now a National Trust property and as I wandered around the grounds, the thought of a Sir Arthur P Heywood-style estate line set against the backdrop of the house grew in my mind's eye: the Kingston Lacy estate railway would be like the Shillingstone Light Railway that was built by Sir Thomas Salt in the 1950s and would make for a small, compact, and lightweight tabletop layout.

As usual with my layouts, this one was first hastily sketched out on the back of an envelope, then properly worked out and drawn to scale later. I employed traditional methods for this, using a trammel bar and pencil to make sure that all the buildings, scenery and track would fit within the limited space of 4' x 20" that I had available.

I began with the baseboard construction, this being to a ply open-frame design. It is the fourth layout built so far to use the method, which is a versatile, simple, and lightweight technique to give the profile of the hills and allow lots of space underneath for wiring and other mechanisms.

This locomotive is based on the Fairbourne Railway's Lynton & Barnstaple-style Manning Wardle, but in a lighter green livery.

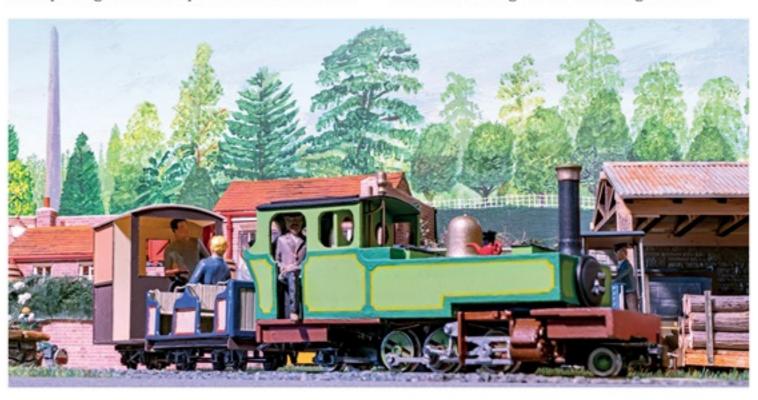
The opportunity to recycle an old O9 diorama was also part of my reason for making this layout. Many years ago I created a simple 7mm scale scene to act as a shunting piece for a few 9mm gauge locomotives; this became the shed area on the layout with the new track alignment planned around it.

For ease of operation and reliability a simple oval track plan with passing loop and sidings was chosen; Peco N gauge flexible track was used for the most part as the length and spacing of the sleepers is close to that of A Groudle Glen Bagnall 0-4-2T Pingu heads a rake of assorted open coaches. The country house is featured on the backscene in 2D.

Heywood-style permanent way. A minimum radius of 8" was adopted, with Peco points used together with two scratch-built items; these being a Y-point on the scenic section and one of the loop points in the fiddle yard.

Estate railway atmosphere

The walled garden buildings are copies of the sheds and greenhouse designs in the



kitchen garden at Kingston Lacy, which adds to the Edwardian estate theme. The sheds were constructed using a card frame covered in brick paper with plastic doors and windows and fitted with flickering LED lighting (to simulate candles and oil lamps). The greenhouse and loco shed were both from laser-cut kits of parts produced for me by Nikki Wilkes, these structures only being assembled the day before the layout's first exhibition! Fortunately, these went together very quickly, with the former looking the part once potted plants, tropical shrubs, and gardening tools were added.

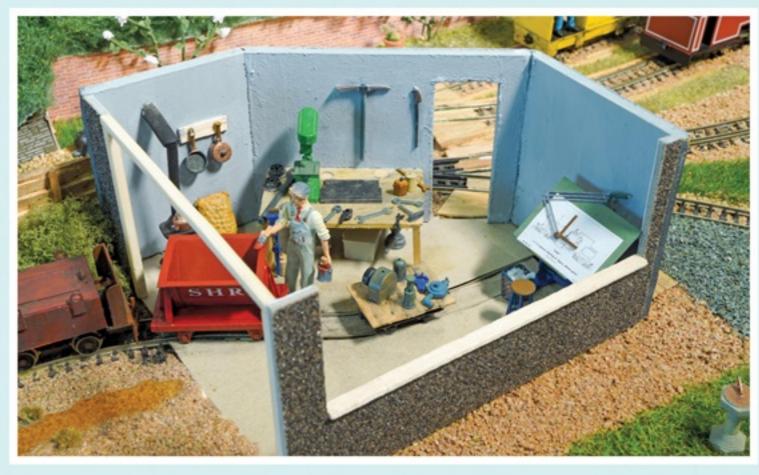
The main workshop building (with a part cut-away exterior) was assembled from an MDF frame wrapped in coarse emery paper, this replicating the finish of the Marley pre-fabricated concrete garage kits of the 1950s and 1960s. The interior is fitted out with a Severn Models etch for a drawing board, a Unit Models resin cast pot-belly stove and various tools.

With a large number of plant pots needed to complete the layout, I made a simple three-part aluminium die tool to assist me with moulding pots from air-drying clay; this worked well after some fettling, with around 50 pots made in total.

A grotto-style archway was created where the track exits the scenic section at the lefthand end, whilst at the right-hand end a wooden footbridge was used (similar to those used at Mottisfont and Sheffield Park gardens).

Electrifying the duck

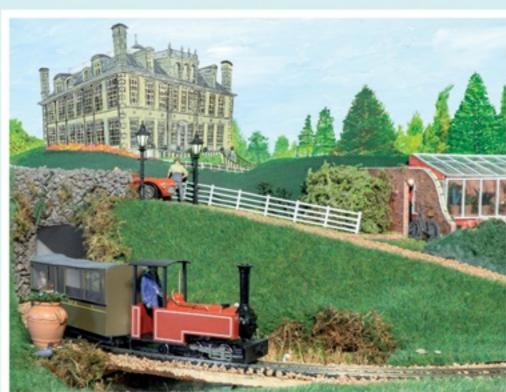
The 12V dc analogue controller for the layout was made using a pulse width modulating circuit board obtained from MFA/Como

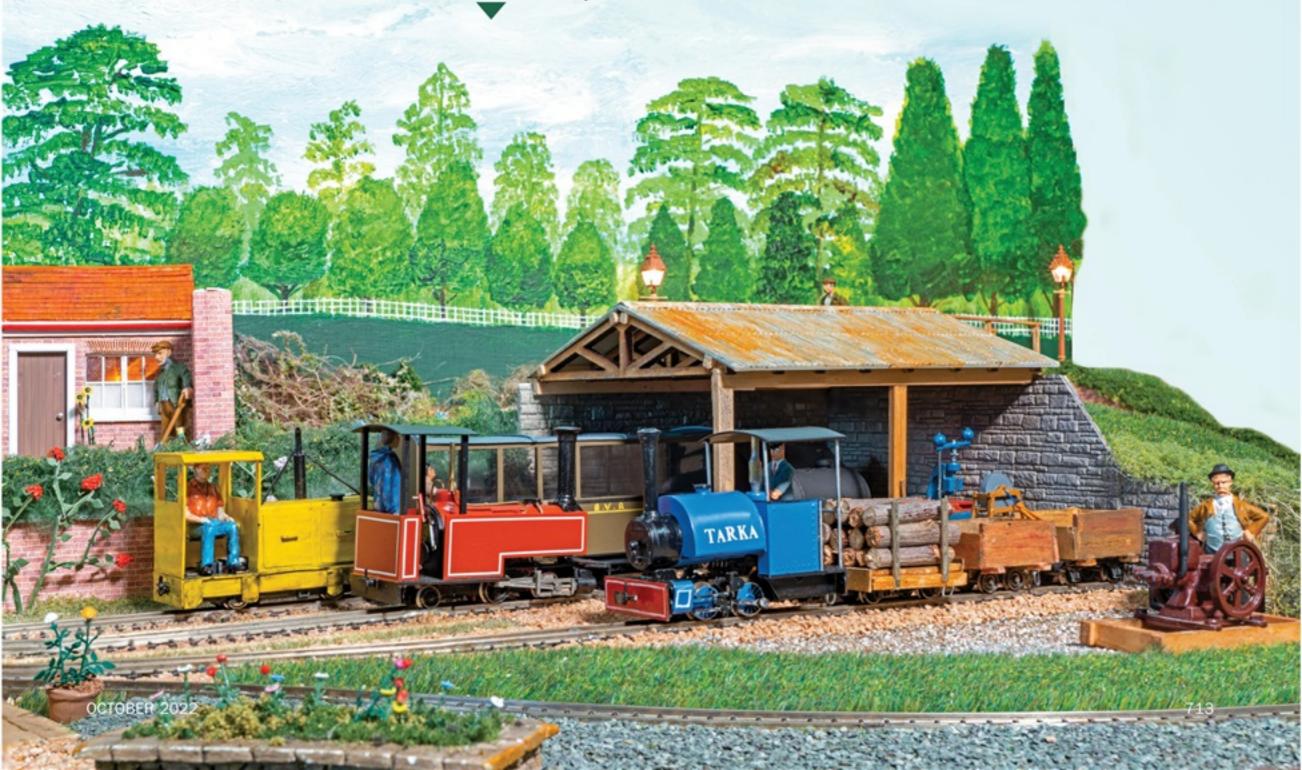


An outer layer of coarse emery paper gives the workshop the look of a concrete pre-fabricated structure. The interior is detailed with suitable tools.

The depot area showing a cross-section of motive power, including Tarka – a Sipat class design using a Bachmann Porter chassis with a body from brass, aluminium and plastic.



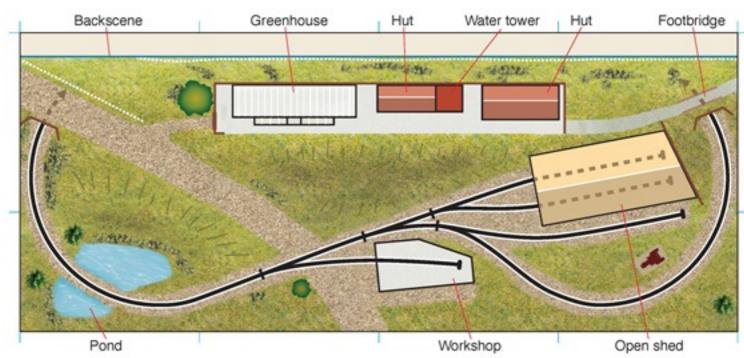


Drills, with directional switching and indication lighting, all mounted inside an old mustard tin to use as a handset. The 12V dc supply also powers the lighting, and the motor for the animated duck that is a feature of the pond; this is driven by a sealed motor and gearbox unit that drives an arm with a magnet on it, via a belt and pulley, which pulls along a whitemetal casting of a mallard (Duncan Models). A steel track pin was embedded near the front of the casting to encourage the duck to keep facing forwards! A nylon pad on the underside allows it to slide smoothly across the surface of the mirror which forms the pond.

The lights on the layout are a combination of Gaugemaster and modified Kytes wall-mounted and free-standing products. All use warm white LEDs with resistors fitted. Although marketed as 4mm scale lights, they are very large and don't look out of place.

Locomotives

The rolling stock used on the layout started out as a collection of items left over from a

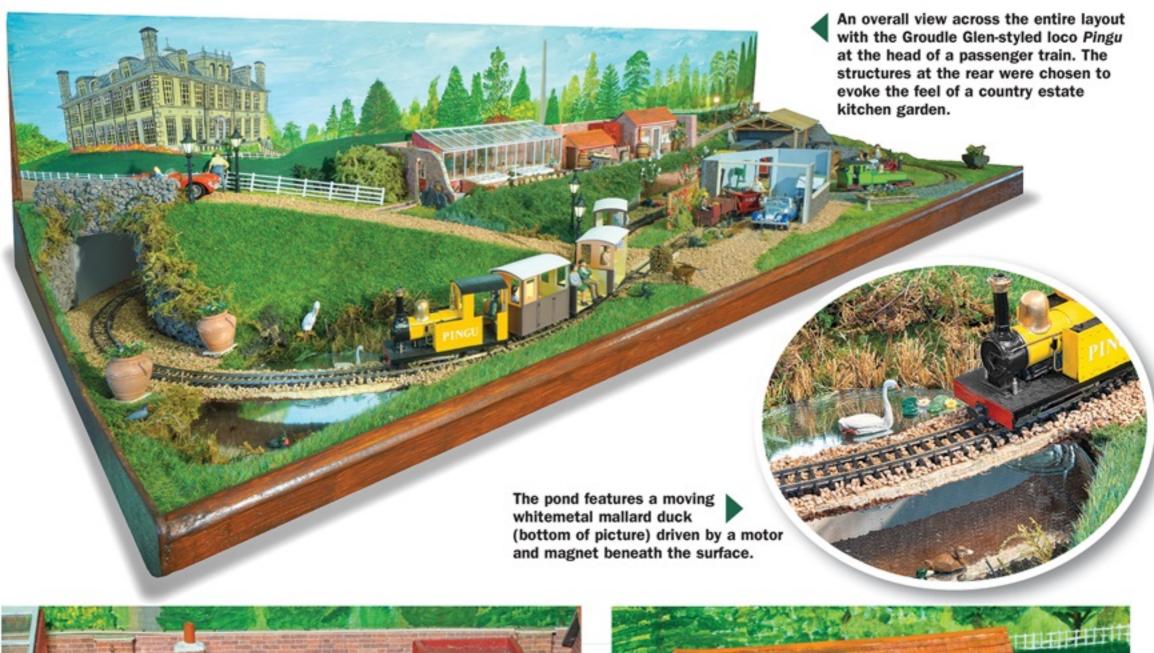


Overall layout size 4' x 1' 8". Each grid square = 1' x 1'.

previous mine-themed layout, so was more industrial rather than horticultural. Some vehicles were usable, but I set about making some more appropriate rolling stock.

The first of 17 locos built so far was based on *Polar Bear* of the Groudle Glen Railway using an old Arnold chassis as a basis, with new motor, a few modifications and a mostly plasticard body and whitemetal fittings. It has proved to be one of the best and most reliable locos.

Carrying on with the Groudle locos, I built another Bagnall based on an E class side tank design that was exported to New

The greenhouse and loco shed were created from sets of laser-cut parts produced by Nikki Wilkes; they were assembled only the day before the first exhibition to avoid showing an unfinished layout!

Zealand, of which a replica was built and is now running at the revived Groudle Glen. This model is built on a Fleischmann tank loco chassis with carrying wheel added, and again with mostly plastic bodywork and aluminium fittings made on my lathe.

The third Bagnall is based on a Sipat class locomotive, of which a replica built by North Bay Engineering also now runs on the Groudle line. The model was created using an old Bachmann Trains (US) Porter type chassis with a body formed of brass, aluminium and plastic.

With all these Groudle-inspired locos, a certain bit of freelance interpretation has been used; in reality the Sipats could be made to 18" gauge but the others were nominally 2' gauge designs. Accordingly, for my next batch of locomotives, I looked for more suitable miniature railway prototypes: the Fairbourne Miniature Railway has a Lynton & Barnstaple Manning Wardle-based locomotive built by D Curwen, but with the rebuilt cab style as per the condition of the actual prototypes in Southern Railway days. To make my model a bit different, it sports the original cab design and has been finished in a lighter green livery. It is a modified Chivers Finelines kit with new

larger fittings and cab, sat atop a Lilliput U class chassis.

The Arthur Heywood Effie employs the gearbox and wheels from a Fleischmann chassis, together with a Tomytec motor, new wheel centres, rods and cylinders, machined aluminium chimney and machined brass tube for a boiler. The rest of the bodywork is plasticard with brass wire handrails. It is painted in an approximation of the Duffield Bank Light Railway livery.

I have made quite a few models based on internal combustion and battery-powered prototypes, including (to list just a few) the Lister railcar unit Whippit Quick from the Fairbourne Miniature Railway, the Romney Hythe & Dymchurch 'scooter' inspection trolley, a Horwich works Ruston and an Alan Keef Ltd mining diesel.

Passenger and goods stock

Coaching stock-wise there is a mix, with vehicles as used on the North Ings Farm Museum 2' gauge railway forming one rake, and Bassett-Lowke and Heywood-style carriages forming the other. The models are mostly scratch-built, apart from the Minimum Gauge Models Bassett-Lowke open coach kit. All are plasticard bodies on a mix of Peco wagon chassis, Graham Farish bogies and kit-built underframes.

Most of the wagons are scratch-built, based on Heywood prototypes including the Duffield bank pram wagon and Eaton Hall The interior of the greenhouse is detailed with potted plants, tropical shrubs and gardening tools.

bogie brake van. In addition there are some mining wagons, mostly constructed on Peco 9' wheelbase wagon chassis.

Despite having all this stock available, I do have plans to build yet more locomotives! These are set to include a Curwen-designed ex-Fairbourne Miniature Railway 0-6-0 diesel, the Lappa Valley Railway's Exmoor-built 0-4-2 Ruby, and the Kirklees Light Railway's Heisler locomotive Owl. Plenty to keep me busy...



21st Century Penrith

he railway came to the Cumberland town of Penrith in 1846 with the opening of the Lancaster & Carlisle Railway. It was engineered by Joseph Locke who routed the tracks through the Lune Gorge and over a summit on the Shap Fells so as to avoid the expense of tunnelling. The outcome of his decision resulted in a stiff gradient of 1 in 75 for northbound trains which, for the most part of the line's history, necessitated the provision of banking assistance from Tebay. Once over the brow of the climb, the bankers would drop off and the trains would coast on a gentler gradient through Clifton and Lowther station and towards Penrith.

The station structures at Penrith were designed by a prominent London architect of the day, Sir William Tite, who was also responsible for other stations along the line. His original structures survive today with some matching extensions in similar style, although the buildings on the island platform, which also includes the bay for the former Cockermouth, Keswick & Penrith Railway branch, were a later addition.

Banking activities ceased after the end of steam and by the late 1960s brand new EE Type 4s (Class 50s) took over doubleheading many services until the inauguration



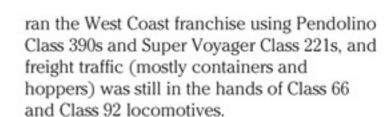
of Crewe-Glasgow 25kV electrification in 1974 and the deployment of new Class 87s.

Much of the passenger station and track formation as originally set out still remains in use today, but the former goods yard on the Up side and the locomotive shed on the Down side are long gone. Hence, the layout suggestion opposite takes the station in its modern guise as its inspiration, with three platform faces and the remnants of the Down sidings (leading to the former locomotive shed) still in situ.

Designed for N gauge models, the scenic section of the scheme occupies a baseboard area of 16' x 2' 3" and assumes a similar area for the off-stage sidings.

The accompanying photographs were taken in 2009 and 2011 when Virgin Trains

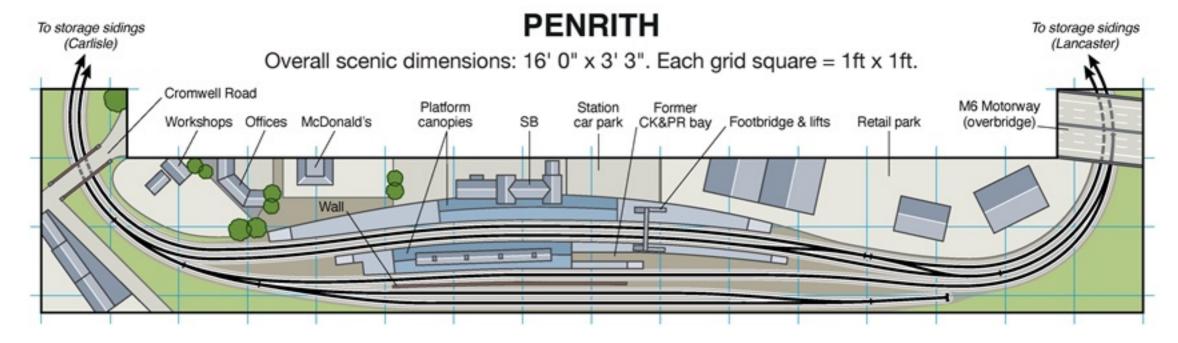

The bang-up-to-date modeller will need to operate passenger trains in the Avanti West Coast and TransPennine Express liveries, with Direct Rail Services-liveried Class 88s on freight, along with occasional Class 90s. Buildings for Calstock Riverside

CHRIS PEACOCK set the scene for his latest project in 0-16.5 depicting the East Cornwall Mineral Railway in the September issue. This month he explains how he got to grips with the construction of the layout, starting, somewhat unconventionally, by making the buildings first. Photography by Steve Flint

omething that I have noted over the years is that an awful lot of model railway projects seem to fall by the wayside because their builders become disillusioned by the amount of work still left to do and are unable to see an end to it all. To avoid this, I took the opposite way out and made all the buildings first. This way at

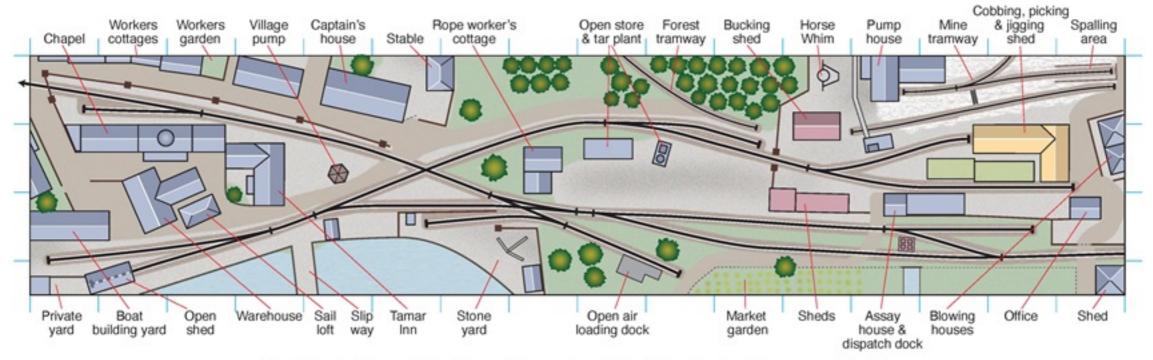
baseboards sitting in my workshop for a year or so while I undertook other tasks.

Vernacular buildings

Buildings often say a lot about the area in which they are located. Each region of Britain has its own style of building, often dictated by the type of material that was available locally to build them. In the

being a browner shade compared to the grey granite found closer to Dartmoor. Indeed, the geology of the whole area is complex, but suffice to say the Killas was a lot easier to

work than the harder granite, and most (but not all) buildings were built with this.

Surprisingly, there are 62 structures on the layout of some form or other, and a large spreadsheet was required to keep tabs on them all. Of those structures, 45 of them are actual buildings and are there to tell the story; but to tell that story, the majority had to be detailed both inside and out.

MDF sub-structures

In the past I have used various methods to make buildings ranging from plasticard to 6mm plywood, via foam board and everything else in between. Each method has its advantages and disadvantages. The amount of plasticard required would have bankrupted me; the plywood method, although ideal, was exceedingly heavy; and I found the foam board melted with the way I

do things. Therefore I chose to use 3mm MDF sheet instead.

In making each building, the external walls were first marked up and windows/doors etc were then cut out while the wall was in the flat. The walls were next covered with painted Slater's embossed Plastikard (usually sheet ref.0420 Stone Courses Grey Large) and then glued together to form a basic 3D shell.

Each building was also given internal floors and walls. One of the reasons why I provided internal walls was because I hadn't previously used such thin MDF, and I was concerned that the material could warp should it get damp. The other reason was of course that I needed a means of supporting the internal detail. In many cases internal rafters were supplied, which although they now cannot be seen, did provide for extra strength to ensure the roof stayed to the correct shape.

Detailing

Once everything was square and dry, doors and windows could then be fixed in place, followed by those fancy details, lights etc. In order to give the correct colour for internal lighting balance, I have used grain of wheat lamps, powered at a lower voltage which causes them to glow with a reddish colour; remember this is still the candlelight era.

Once the internal detailing had been

The copper workings. Employment at the copper works in the early days involved manual labour and it was mainly carried out by women who would spend the working day breaking, moving, and shovelling the mined rocks in order to obtain from them as much sought-after copper ore as they could. 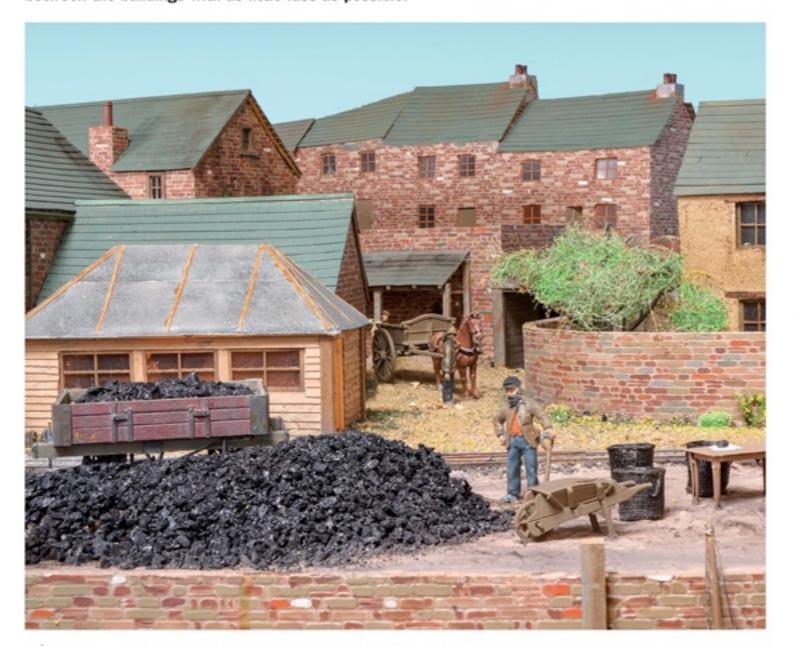

There is little lineside fencing on the layout, the railway gently ambling between the buildings with as little fuss as possible.



The lime kiln stands in the middle of the village (behind the horse and cart) and throws out dust and fumes in vast quantities. Health, hygiene and localised pollution were rarely considered in Victorian times. Most of the buildings on the layout are formed from a substructure of 3mm MDF sheet covered with Slater's embossed Plastikard.



The inside of the public bar is just about as welcoming as you could wish and would be very acceptable today. The inclusion of rafters goes beyond the lengths that many modellers might aspire to, unless you know otherwise?

finished, it was then and only then that I could complete each building with the addition of chimneys and roofs. I know some people may consider it a waste of time and resources to add all the internal details, but such details are so much fun to fit and although often not seen directly, they do add a lot to the finished result.

The village

The village of Calstock is centred on the Tamar Inn which is still there and does a good meal. Although I have had to cut the model down in size to fit, the bar area has been fully detailed. The small Methodist (Wesleyan of course) tin chapel may be found to counteract all the drunkenness that the pub caused!

There is also the whole gamut of workshops, sail lofts and warehouses that may be found at any port to service the vessels which come and go. These are detailed internally to some degree – those at the front to a geater extent.

In addition there is the oddity of having a lime kiln slap bang the middle of the village with its preponderance to throw out pollution and dust in vast quantities; it is in fact next door to the village butcher's shop, which not only supplies meat but also provides some very run-down accommodation behind to rent. I shudder to think of the hygiene levels. This building appears at the top of the hill on the port side of the bridge that crosses the railway line. On the other side of that bridge, we find down an unmade lane the rough houses of the workers. Just remember that four or more (often large) families would be accommodated in each of those houses. Next door is the other village shop (and chandler), the whole reminding us of the poor state of living that those people would have endured.

In complete contrast, the last house modelled in the village is the Captain's



Every village would be centred around a source of water. At Calstock the well/pump has been sited adjacent to the pub in the crook of the two railway lines. The coaches are built using kits from the Peco 0-16.5 range.

House complete with, believe it or not, a chandelier in the hallway. He also has a fully detailed stable in his yard. Finally, to round off the tour, the last structure which would normally be found in every conurbation is the village pump and well.

Rope workers

To the right as we enter open countryside, other small and perhaps undesirable industries appear. It is here that we find the rope works and its workers' cottages. Rope workers were notoriously underpaid, and the work was often done by the younger children. The condition of the two cottages reflects this. BUILDINGS FOR CALSTOCK - 0-16.5

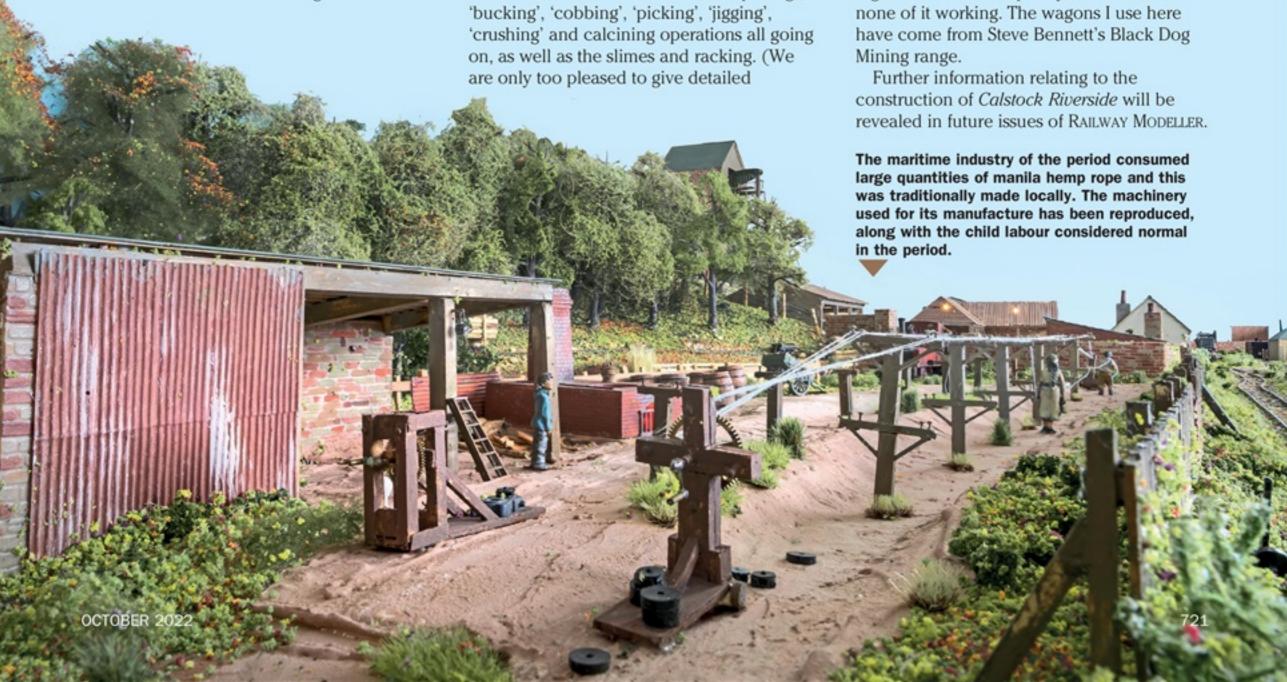
Although I had previously rebuilt the ropework display at the North Devon Maritime Museum, a lot more research was required to ensure that this one was also correct.

It is over the wall from the rope works that the source of all the wealth enjoyed by some - usually the financiers - exists, namely the copper workings. Work here in the early days was predominantly manual and was mainly done by women. Starting work often at the age of seven these girls would spend all day breaking, moving, and shovelling the mined rocks to obtain the much sought-after copper ore. The mine has been quite well researched and thus we have the 'spalling', 'bucking', 'cobbing', 'picking', 'jigging', 'crushing' and calcining operations all going on, as well as the slimes and racking. (We are only too pleased to give detailed

explanations to those observing the model at shows.) All buildings are based on various prototypes from around Cornwall, although only the smaller examples were considered especially in the case of the engine house.

An internal 2' gauge hand-operated tramway connects various parts of the mine together. This line is purely cosmetic, with none of it working. The wagons I use here have come from Steve Bennett's Black Dog

Railway viaduct models can be challenging to build in the smaller scales, but if, like **JOHN BOYSON**, you want to include them in a large scale garden line, then the project becomes a grand feat of engineering, as he now explains.

y own railway modelling interests are focused on the larger scales, both indoors and outside. The garden however is on a series of gradients and different levels, and, as such, requires some sections of the railway to span large gaps in the terrain. Hence the emphasis outside is on viaducts, and my selection of suitable prototype structures are to be found in Scotland: in particular on the West Highland Railway.

The WHR will need no introduction to readers since it has been well covered over the years. However, I approached this project from a different angle and faced up to a few challenges. Firstly, I live about as far away from the WHR as it is possible to be, in New Zealand in fact, where a big obstacle is the supply of suitable modelling materials for the larger scales. Furthermore, the products and materials need to be suitable for use in an outdoor environment and able to combat the elements. Therefore hardware and landscaping stores, as well as industrial metal suppliers, proved very useful as I have to consider the effects of the sun and ultraviolet light, rot and rust.

The completed model of Glenfinnan Viaduct measures 12m in length and is of cast concrete construction – just like the real thing!

Specific modelling supply needs are generally met through internet purchasing, either in NZ where possible, or overseas as a matter of necessity.

A big help in terms of our isolation down under has been the Gauge One Model Railway Association (G1MRA) which is an organisation with a global reach dedicated to all things that run on 45mm gauge track.

New Zealand has its own subgroup within the organisation which also circulates its own newsletter containing more local information. G1MRA represents a broad church of interests including what might be called G scale. Its philosophy is; if it runs on 45mm gauge track, G1MRA membership is welcomed, and in that respect, whilst I model in 1:32 scale, I also have a hankering for larger scale narrow gauge live steam, commonly referred to as G scale. Thus my garden structures also have to be capable of taking that size stock as well as 1:32 standard gauge models.

Researching prototypes

The West Highland Railway is well endowed with viaducts along its 150-mile length from Craigendoran Junction to Mallaig. There are 26 of them with three or more spans. 19 of them lie on the main line between Craigendoran Junction and Fort William, with a further seven on the Mallaig Extension.

Generally, the style of each group is distinct, with steel plate and lattice girders being the norm on the main line section, whilst concrete arch structures dominate on the extension (see photo 1).

There are two exceptions to this rule; Craigenarden Viaduct on the shores of Loch Lomond is a masonry-clad concrete arch structure, whilst the Lochy Viaduct at the start of the Mallaig Extension, being originally a part of the earlier built Banavie Branch, is a four-span lattice girder structure.

I have incorporated seven viaducts into the outdoor railway

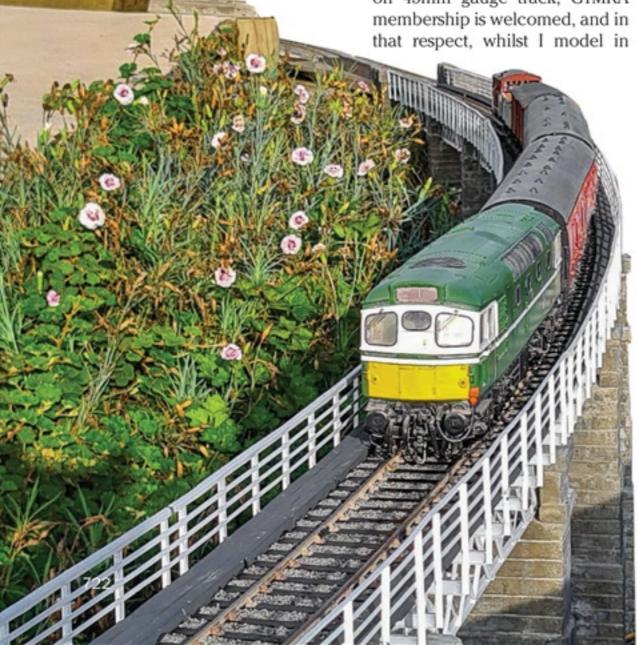
I am currently building, but did not have room for Rannoch viaduct (the longest on the main line) or Auch viaduct (the northern one on the Horseshoe Curve near Tyndrum). Over many years I have visited, photographed and researched them all on various trips back to the UK.

Construction of the lattice girder viaducts

Initially I prepared a scale drawing of each viaduct from dimensions worked out from the available information. For the girders, a schedule of parts was created. This showed the length, width and cross-section of each component and total number required. The material used for the girders was 0.5mm gauge half hard brass sheet which I obtained from non-ferrous metal suppliers in NZ. The supplier firstly cut them down into two 1.8m by 0.45m sections which allowed me to transport them easily, and also to fit into the 3-in-1 cutter/ roller and folding machine that I possess (photo 2).

I appreciate that not every modeller will have access to one of these and may choose to source brass strip, L-section and I-section from suppliers of brass section in Europe or elsewhere.

Using the machine, flat sections were simply cut to size; L-sections were cut out as flats and then folded in a vice. Tees and I-sections were cut out as flat strips to the required length and

soldered together to form the shape. Copper wire was used to form diagonal bracing for some of the smaller sections such as within compression braces on some of the more significant spans. Each span was then built up by soldering all the various sections together (photo 3). It is a long and careful process but the finished girders have sufficient inherent strength to support both Gauge 1 and G scale stock.

The piers

These were formed from mortar which was cast in simple wooden moulds. The stone finish was

achieved by removing the mould from around the mortar one day after casting and roughing up and scoring the stone shapes into the surface (photo 4) whilst the mortar was still 'green' (i.e. not fully cured). The plain concrete finish on the remaining viaduct piers was created by plastering the cast piers with a neat cement and water mix which was sanded down to a smooth finish. Several coats were needed to get a completely smooth finish. Grooves were scored into the surface using hacksaw blades about a week after the last coat had been applied.

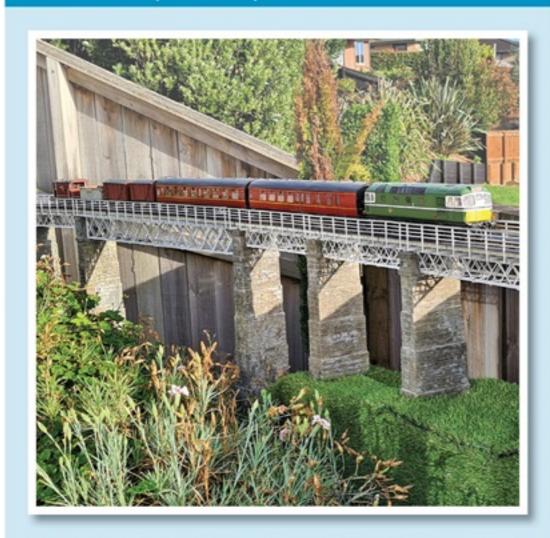


Auchtertyre Viaduct

This viaduct is the baby brother of Glen Falloch. The prototype piers are formed of rough dressed stone. The model provides an access point under the railway with a lowered walkway underneath the main span to avoid ducking. It is seen here with my G scale live steam Double Fairlie 0-4-4-0T crossing the central span.



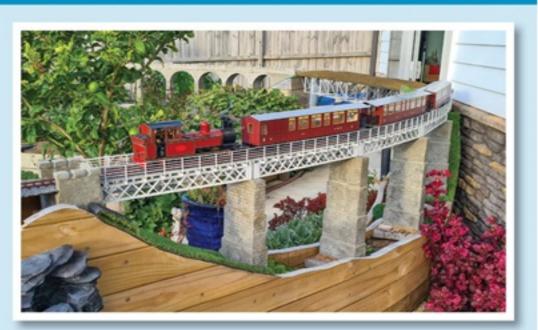
Glen Falloch (Dubh Eas) Viaduct



This viaduct is one of the largest on the West Highland Railway and is certainly the tallest by a considerable margin. The main span of the prototype is 117' and it sits 144' above the burn it crosses (the Dubh Eas). The overall length is 478' which, at 1:32 scale, translates to a model length of just over 4.5m. It is curved with a radius of 8m which is more or less to scale. The piers are formed of concrete.

The model has been used to take the line over the lowest point on the garden, which has a cross fall of some 2m. There were approximately 2,000 brass sections to cut and solder up to form the spans. The tallest pier of the model is approximately 960mm high and the viaduct height to ground level is about 1.2m at the lowest point. This is somewhat less than the prototype when scaled up.

Gleann Viaduct (south Horseshoe Curve viaduct)



This viaduct is the smaller of the two structures that cross side glens on the well-known Horseshoe Curve on the line. To support this model, a garden box has been constructed to follow the profile of the ground surface of the prototype. This was filled with topsoil and has been planted out so as to allow the garden to blend with the railway a little more.

Another G scale train - this time a Leek & Manifold Railway passenger service - ambles across the span.

Tulloch Viaduct



This viaduct is representative of the many smaller viaducts that proliferate on the main line to Fort William. It has two plate girder side spans and a central lattice girder main span. Again it has been blended into the garden although an underpass is needed to allow the footpath to pass over the line; currently it is just a stepover slot. The Leek & Manifold Railway train is pictured traversing the viaduct.

Constructing the arched viaducts

As mentioned at the beginning of this article, three of the route's arched viaducts have been incorporated into the layout; Craigenarden Viaduct on the main line to Fort William, and Glenfinnan and Borrodale Viaducts on the branch to Mallaig.

These were constructed using cast mortar, in much the same manner as the piers for the girder viaducts described above. The Craigenarden and Glenfinnan piers were cast separately, with the arches being cast over the top of them once in place, so structurally, the piers and arches are independent of each other.

The pillars

Photo 5 shows a production line of piers for my model of Glenfinnan Viaduct being cast and finished. From left to right; the timber mould used for casting has just been filled (This mould started out as a full height and width mould for the largest king piers. It was then gradually cut down in size to cast the remaining smaller piers in turn; the next three piers are the raw castings curing; the next five are in the process of being plastered; and finally on the floor to the right are four completed piers. The two king piers, Nos.8 & 13 are at the back and each weigh 44kg!

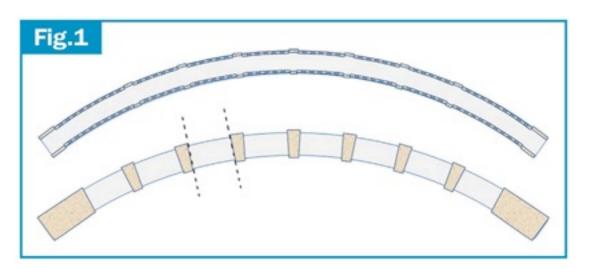
The arches

These too were cast, and to reinforce them a 2mm perforated stainless steel sheet was inserted down each side, across the top of the deck and around the arch. These were cut to size using the plywood formwork for the arches as a template. The reinforcing continues up into what will be the parapets to provide much needed tensile strength around the crown of each arch.

The stainless steel reinforcing sheets came in 1.2m x 2.4m

sheets and were cut to the required shape with a hand-held angle grinder. It took many cutting discs, accompanied by lots of noise and flying sparks, to complete the cutting out for the Glenfinnan Viaduct model alone.

However the benefit is that the material is immensely strong in tension and rust resistant.

One point to note is that the width of the piers on the curved viaducts taper outwards towards the outer face of the structure. This is to ensure that the arches retain the same width from the inner face to the outer face as seen in Fig.1.

To add to the complexities, the piers of both viaducts are battered (i.e. the pier faces are not vertical, being built with slightly inward receding slopes as they rise to their full height). On Craigenarden Viaduct all four faces of each pier are battered, whereas only the inner faces are battered on Glenfinnan's piers.

The arches for Craigenarden and Borrodale viaducts were cast as single structural units, whilst at 12m long, Glenfinnan's arches had to be cast as six separate units, as shown in photos 6, 7 and 8.

The parapets were cast last and the decorative castellated finish on Craigenarden and Borrodale viaducts was created using polystyrene inserts in the gaps. Once the casting had set, these were simply and gently sawn out. Note that the stainless steel reinforcing sides extend up into the parapets to provide additional strength to what would otherwise be vulnerable and delicate elements.



This shows the prepared mould and reinforcing for Borrodale Viaduct with the cut out and folded perforated sheet in place. The sheets were held off the underside of the mould by the white rods resting across the top of the mould. They were also held in place by spacer blocks and strips keeping them away from the mould sides and in line with the parapets into which they extend.



The mould for casting the arches on the Glenfinnan structure is in place and levelled up, being supported by the temporary staging between the piers. Notice that the piers are lined and levelled up using treated timber offcuts as foundations. Once the position of each pier was deemed satisfactory, the gap under the base was filled with an outdoor builder's glue applied with a caulking gun, with more timber offcuts to completely fill it. All the foundations were eventually covered with the garden landscaping, which followed once the viaduct was finished.



An overhead view of the casting. The amount of mortar needed to fill the mould dictated the use of the wheelbarrow for mixing and transportation. Typically three and a half barrow loads were needed to fill each of the six stages. The blocks and strips of timber holding the reinforcing sheets apart were gradually lifted up as the mould was filled. This was done evenly in layers to prevent unequal distribution of the load whilst casting was underway.

Finishes

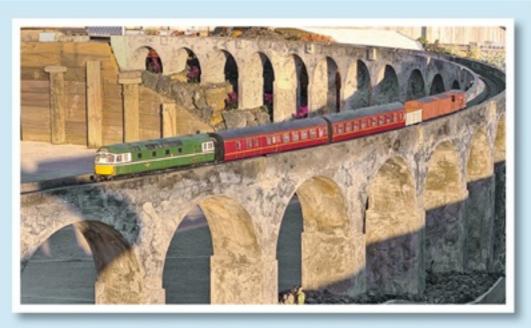
The stone finish on Craigenarden Viaduct was created by roughing up and scoring the stones into the surface one day after casting whilst the mortar was still 'green' as seen in photo 9.

The concrete finish on the other viaducts was achieved once again by plastering the mortar with a neat cement and water mix that was sanded down to a smooth finish.

Happy place

The construction of the viaducts has taken over two years in total, it being one of the first jobs to be done to form the outside circuits. With the onset of the lockdowns the projects gave me a valuable sanctuary and the garden and workshop became my happy place. Not being able to travel, especially overseas as we had done previously, also gave more time to focus on the railway.

Glenfinnan Viaduct



Glenfinnan Viaduct with a mixed train posed on the deck. The real Glenfinnan Viaduct is so well known it hardly requires an introduction. My model scales out at 12m in length.

Craigenarden Viaduct



The real viaduct is the only arched viaduct on the main line and lies immediately beside Loch Lomond. As this was in a publicly visible location the local landowner, who clearly had influence, quite reasonably insisted that the viaduct should be sympathetic to the location. The radius of the model was tightened down to 3m to fit its intended location over a raised vegetable garden and has a concrete ground beam to support it. A short pick-up goods is pictured crossing the span.

Borrodale Viaduct



Possibly one of the more interesting structures from an engineering perspective since it is regarded as the forerunner of the modern concrete bridge with single long spans.

Its main span is an astonishing (for unreinforced concrete) 127' for a rise of just 23'.

Like Craigenarden, Borrodale Viaduct is also highly ornamental with stone finishes and castellated parapets. The model is nearly 2m long and spans a second underpass to provide unimpeded access to all parts of the garden.

It was made in the workshop and then moved into place and, as it weighs about 100kg, getting it into position is a story in itself! It's supported by two platforms each mounted on two 100mm x 100mm timber posts. These in turn are bolted securely onto the underpass retaining walls.

Talking Points

Topical issues from the world of model railways

When the going gets tough

Faced with eviction from their clubrooms and a loss of income from exhibitions, the members of Bodmin & District Model Railway Club were left with little to celebrate as the organisation approached its 30th anniversary year. However, the pursuing of some innovative fundraising opportunities facilitated a change in fortunes, as club chairman Steve Willis explains...

e're all familiar with the saying 'when the going gets tough, the tough get going' and over the past couple of years all of us have experienced some tough times. Without wishing to sound overly dramatic, life at Bodmin & District Model Railway Club has had its moments too, what with the impositions of Government lockdowns, the uncertainty surrounding the staging of public exhibitions – and the sudden loss of our premises! I am delighted to report, however, that we have been able to navigate our way through each of these challenges and our members are now able to proceed with plans in what is the club's 30th anniversary year.

In light of the positive outcomes we have experienced, what follows is a summary of events that have taken place over the last few years, which we feel may be of interest to other clubs and societies that find themselves facing similar situations.

The search for a new home

We had occupied our previous premises for many years until in October 2019 we were given just eight weeks notice to vacate. In all fairness, we were offered alternative accommodation but this proved to be completely unsuitable for anything other than storage. We therefore had no choice but to search for a new home before the time ran out – no pressure then! By putting our requirements into numerous property search websites, we received details on various places, most of which were way beyond our means. However, just before Christmas, one particular property caught our eye and a visit was duly arranged.

The building was a former factory with various offices and warehouse space and we would be one of the first tenants to take up residence. Having sorted out the legal aspects such as the lease, we geared ourselves for 'the big move'. A certain virus, however had other ideas and we soon found ourselves in the first lockdown. We had paid our rent but could do nothing further – complete frustration! With time on our hands, we used the opportunity to seek out some useful funding, raising money initially to pay for the rental of a large van ready for when we could undertake the move, together with a large quantity of carpet tiles as the space we had leased had a concrete floor - not ideal for the comfort of our members!

Finally, in August 2020, we were all packed up and ready to go.

freshly carpeted clubroom. Pride of place was given to our large OO gauge exhibition layout Old Elms Road, which readers will have seen in the March 2019 issue of RAILWAY MODELLER.

Exhibition cancellations

The pandemic threw some difficult circumstances in the way of those clubs that either exhibit layouts or, like ourselves, hold annual shows. We usually stage our show every October but the global health crisis meant that we were obliged to cancel both our 2020 and 2021 exhibitions. We realised very quickly that this would have significant financial implications for the club: we had always used our membership subscriptions to pay for our clubroom rental with the proceeds of our exhibitions funding work on our layouts.

It had been our intention to build a replacement for Old Elms Road once we were installed in our new clubroom but this was now thrown into doubt with the lack of sufficient funds. Fortunately, however, we were able to tap into local sources of funding.

Advice for exploring funding options

First and foremost, for any club wishing to access funding from whatever source, is the need to have a constitution. Without this, funders will not even contemplate your application. They will also



require your club to have a properly elected committee comprising a minimum of chairman, treasurer and secretary. Nowadays, a valid safeguarding policy and appointed safeguarding officer also need to be in place to satisfy an increasing number of funders. So, what options did we explore when we went looking for funds?

We started by contacting our local council as we were aware of a community chest fund which gives small amounts, up to say £300, to local groups. An approach to either a local councillor or the council itself should set you on the right track. The application form itself is straightforward enough and does not contain 'trick' questions – but it is important to answer them as fully as possible and to submit them together with a properly costed quotation. With the smaller funds, try not to request unrealistic sums; from our experience I would suggest a figure of £150-£200 would be deemed acceptable – and remember you can always submit another request the following financial year.

A very useful online publication we perused is the Rural Funding Digest (see www.rsnonline.org.uk), which lists the many organisations who fund various schemes from small groups up to whole communities. A word of caution here, however. Unless you are a very large club with many members, some of these funders, including the well-known National Lottery-based funds, will not necessarily be interested in assisting small groups whose impact in the wider community would be minimal. These funders like to see their money helping large numbers of people. Therefore take the time to read the application criteria carefully as this will save both you and them time – there's nothing quite as demoralising as a rejection letter!

Through this approach we were introduced to a very useful and lucrative 'umbrella' organisation which administers several funds on behalf of different (and diverse) companies such as in our case, china clay mining and solar farms. These funders generally support larger claims in the region of £1,000-£3,000, but again their application forms are straightforward and the administrators are very friendly and more than helpful – so don't be put off contacting them should you have any queries; remember that they are there to help you.

Funding from unlikely sources

You may also be lucky to have a community trust in your area, the aim of which is to source and distribute funds from various organisations to deserving causes (which can include model railway clubs). In our case, the new club premises is located in a village adjacent to which is a waste incinerator plant. Planning permission for this plant was granted to the company on the understanding that a proportion of its profits would be distributed (through the community trust) to the surrounding villages. Having completed a straightforward

questionnaire, we were recently awarded £3,000 from this source of funding. The kind people in the trust even contacted us afterwards to see if we would like to apply for some more!

Key to all applications, however, is having a clear idea of how the funds are to be used. Requesting money for some vague, poorly researched and costed plan will inevitably result in a rejection letter. Referring to our own requests, we knew exactly how the funds were to be used. For example, we needed ventilation fans with their own electrical supply; quotations were duly sourced and our application was looked on favourably. Knowing we needed excellent woodworking tools for our new layout, again a wish list was created, followed by detailed costings and further funding came our way. To date, since moving into our new premises, we have raised more than £8,000, which has paid for a variety of items including carpet tiles, electrical fittings, tools and timber as well as funding in reserve for the construction of our new layout.

Security for the future

This year sees our club celebrate its 30th anniversary and a new layout has provided us with an ideal project to embark upon as we mark this milestone. Since moving to our new clubrooms, we have been successful in attracting a number of new members and this new project has also proven to be invaluable in giving these new members a goal and putting their skills to good use. Without giving too much away, our plan is to construct a layout with interchangeable front scenic sections. Not only will this give us the opportunity to ring the changes with regard to era and location, but we will also be able to offer different options to exhibition organisers.

All being well, we plan to recommence the staging of our annual exhibition in October 2023 and in due course we hope that our new layout will grace the pages of RAILWAY MODELLER. In the meantime, we wish all our fellow model railway clubs and societies across the hobby the very best of luck with their own fundraising initiatives.

Through the Railway Room Door

Kenningham

DICK YEO takes us for a tour around his recently completed 'retirement' layout, which is set in former Great Eastern Railway territory and modelled in 4mm scale. Photography by the author

'he origins of my model of a 'typical' ex-Great Eastern branch line in EM gauge can be traced back to an exhibition held at Westminster Central Hall, which I attended way back in 1990. However, despite purchasing sufficient track parts to get myself started in EM gauge (following a lifetime modelling in OO) as well as applying for membership of the EM Gauge Society at the same time, much of the ten years that followed

confidence with working in this finer scale.

It was only once I had retired from fulltime work at the turn of the millennium that my thoughts turned to actively making a start on Kenningham. Having by this point amassed a significant amount of suitable rolling stock - some completed but the majority still in kit form - plans for the layout were finalised and construction commenced.

A change of format

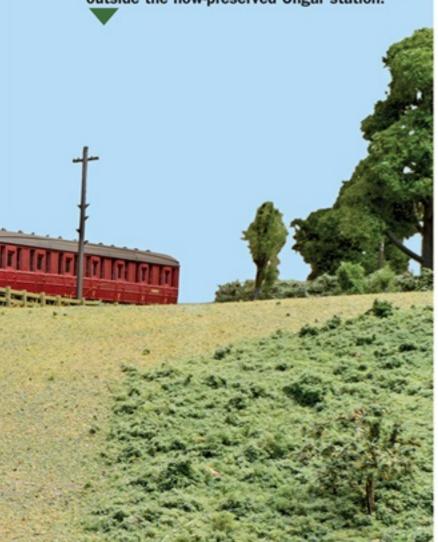
The foundations for the layout are of traditional construction, although two were built with open framework to accommodate a deep cutting, an embankment and viaduct, with all the vacant spaces filled with polystyrene foam, suitably shaped to form the rolling countryside.

The layout was originally designed to be a with a total length of around eight metres.

in this format where there is sufficient space, four additional boards were constructed to enable the layout to be split, and made into a U-shape, so that it would fit into my current railway room. This extended the length of the layout to something approaching 12 metres, with basic scenery added to the additional boards to blend them in with the rest of the layout.

The layout itself has been based on two main areas in East Anglia. Firstly, the line between Wickham Market, on the East Suffolk line, and the terminus at Framlingham, some six and a half miles distant; and the Epping-Ongar line, part of which is now a preserved railway. Some other features on the layout have also been poached from the former Mildenhall and Thaxted branches.

A challenging track plan

The track layout at Framlingham was my preferred choice as a basis for the layout; this location did not have a platform run-round facility and I liked the extra challenge this presented when it came to the operation of the layout.

The basic construction methods for the trackwork are all very traditional, and have been covered many times before in magazines; suffice to say that the majority of the plain track is ready-made, while all pointwork is hand-built, to suit the various locations including the fiddle yard.

Setting the time period

I do not run the layout to any form of timetable. I just run trains, based on what information I have been able to glean from various publications covering the railways of East Anglia, these showing the wide variety

of services that ran during the 1950s. I have endeavoured to build as much appropriate rolling stock and as many locomotive classes as possible to cover myriad scenarios within the scope of the layout - although I am fully aware that some of the operations that I run would never have happened on a branch line such as this. All my stock carries British Railways liveries that are representative of the 1950s period modelled.

A journey along the line

Let us take a journey along the line in one of the push-pull sets that were in regular use on the Epping-Ongar line (propelled by one of the ageing F5 class 2-4-2T locomotives) until London Transport tube trains took over late in 1957. We start our journey by emerging

into a steep-sided green valley, where the train slows, ready to stop to pick up a lone passenger from the isolated halt at Pensons Green. This halt has been based on Worlington Golf Links Halt on the Mildenhall branch, where one of the quirkier aspects of steps used by the train guard to assist our train are not equipped with steps, and the platform is effectively at ground level!

we can see to the left a very attractive church on top of the hill, surrounded by trees, which is based on St Andrews church at Greenstedjuxta-Ongar - probably better known as the oldest surviving wooden church in the world with Saxon connections.

the stop is the provision of a set of substantial passengers on or off the train; the coaches on As the train slows for Pensons Green Halt,

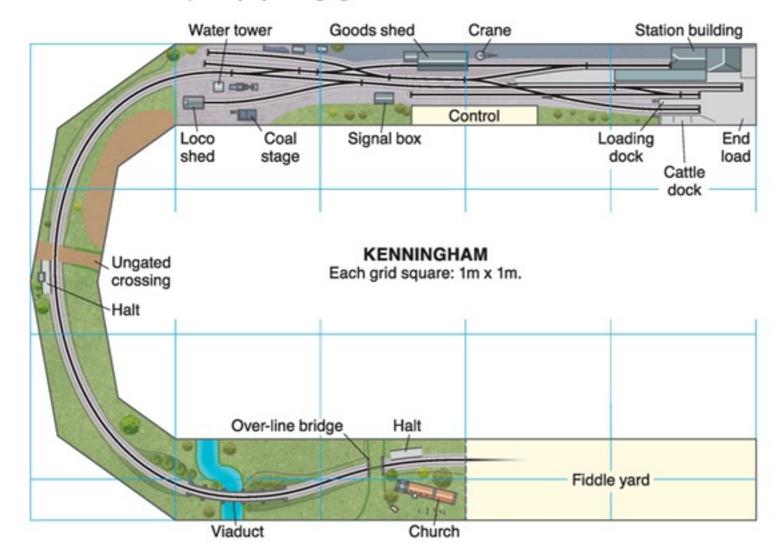
Stratford-built Hill J68 0-6-0T No.68663 eases its two-coach train into the station passing the engine shed which is based on three sites at Thaxted, Aldeburgh and Saffron Walden. Don't miss the rotating head ground signal level with the locomotive bufferbeam.

We start away from the isolated halt, under the overbridge, based on the one that existed at Burwell on the Mildenhall branch, and past the tall fixed distant signal, again based on one that existed near Fordham Junction on the Mildenhall branch. From here, the countryside opens out to reveal a field of ripening corn, complete with the customary red poppies growing amongst it. The Fordson tractor and haycart stand ready to assist with the gathering of the harvest when it starts.

The lands falls away down to the Cripsey Brook, which is spanned by Five Arches viaduct. This structure is modelled on the one that still exists just outside Ongar station and, although the original is virtually straight, the model is curved to fit the space available on the layout.

The train now enters a long right-hand curve, almost turning back on itself, and sweeps through flat and open countryside and past another small wayside stopping point - Molehill Lane. The waiting room and the halt are modelled on Mill Road Halt on the Elsenham to Thaxted branch. The name has been derived from the small village of Molehill Green, close to the Elsenham and Thaxted line.

After this, our train begins to straighten up and slow for the outer home signal on the approach to Kenningham station. On this occasion, the left-hand signal arm has cleared, meaning that our train is being routed onto the loop line, as the main line is in use. Despite slowing, the train lurches as it negotiates the crossover, before passing the engine shed, water tower and coaling



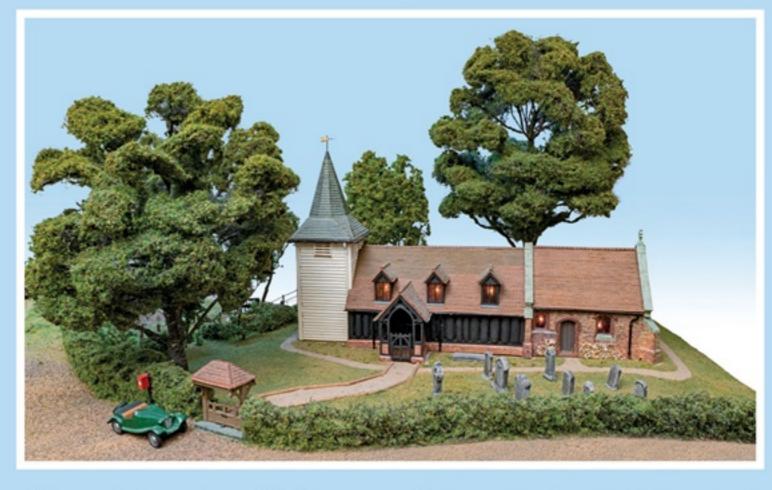
facilities in turn on the right (based on Thaxted, Aldeburgh and Saffron Walden respectively). On the left is the coal yard, which is full of different types of coal and coke wagons, followed by the rather imposing goods shed, based on Ongar, with the train then slowing to a gentle stop in the bay platform.

In the station yard, there are a number of elderly six-wheel vans standing ready to be loaded with fresh produce including milk churns for the London markets.

Kenningham station boasts a long Great Eastern-style canopy, which is more than capable of keeping all of its passengers protected from the worst of any Suffolk weather. It was based on the one that still exists at Snaresbrook station on the London Underground Central Line, and this has been coupled to an 1865-style station building, which was built using measurements taken at Blake Hall station when it was still part of the London Underground.

The reason for the re-routing of our train becomes clear when we see No.62546 Claud Hamilton standing close to the signal box on the main line, ready to couple up to three

> excursion coaches. These had been brought into Kenningham earlier that morning by an Ipswich-based B12/3, which is simmering at the stops in the platform, waiting to be released to enable its return to Ipswich before the excursion leaves. The train will be



will be coupled to coaches arriving from Lowestoft and then taken onwards to London by something a little more powerful. It will be dark by the time the excursion gets back. In the meantime, Kenningham will settle down to its usual timetable of lightly used passenger services and mixed trains during the day.

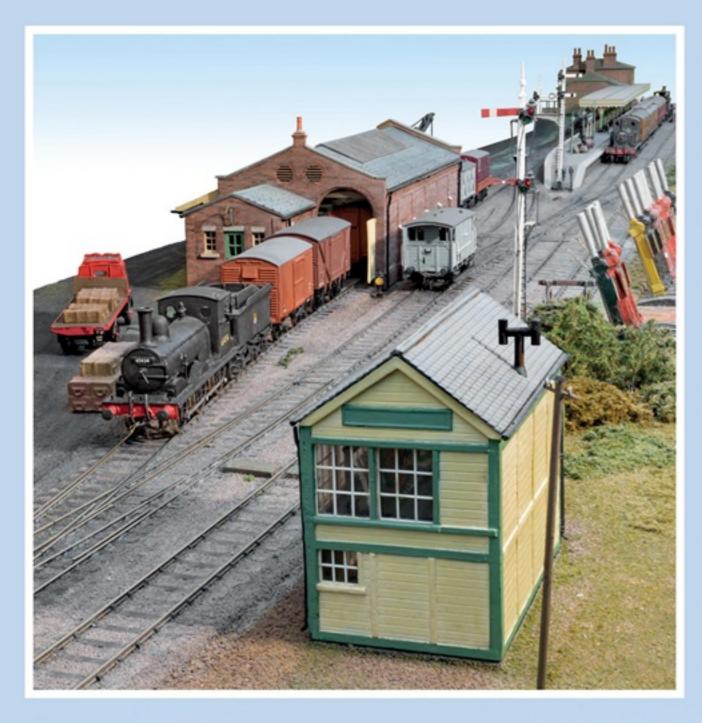
Traditional control

Every layout I have built to date has been equipped for 12V dc analogue control, and this layout is no different. It is operated with four controllers: one serves the main line, main station platform and loco shed, and which can be switched in to control the

the whole of the main line to the station. Being a branch line, most of the operation is on a one engine in steam basis, but the goods yard can, when needed, be operated independently using the second controller, which enables simultaneous locomotive movements.

The fiddle yard is a three-road ladder arrangement, with two of the three roads having points situated near to the departure end that lead to loco storage sidings, thereby three roads have insulated sections at their outer ends, these serving to prevent trains from being inadvertently driven off the end of the baseboard. However, each of these insulated sections can be energised with a push button, whilst there are also magnets to All points in the fiddle yard are fitted with Tortoise slow action point motors.

Manual signal and point operation

When I decided to build this layout, I wanted to operate it in the same way as the majority of the full size railway in the 1950s – that is to say with manually operated points and signals, using traditional lever frames. The only things missing are the signal box telegraph instruments, and all the associated bell codes!

All points and signals, including rotating head ground signals, are linked to three Sprat & Winkle lever frames using 1.6mm brass rod and nylon angle cranks.

Microswitches are fitted – operated by the linkages – where needed, to change point frog polarity.

Electrically, all signals perform the function they are indicating, so if a train tries to pass a signal at danger, it is automatically stopped. This is achieved by installing a microswitch that is wired to a short length of track immediately prior to the signal, which energises the rails only when the signal is cleared.

There are also a small number of relays on the layout that are also operated by microswitches linked to the lever frame linkages; these provide additional switching facilities to ensure most areas of the layout are 'operator proof' and should not allow conflicting movements to occur.

As can be appreciated, a significant amount of wiring has been needed, but by keeping it neat and tidy, colour coded, and accompanied by a clear wiring diagram, I have, so far, had no problems.

Great Eastern support

To conclude, I would like to say a very big thank you to the EM Gauge Society for the help and encouragement I have been given over the years, and my thanks to those manufacturers, traders and suppliers who have managed to keep the Great Eastern Railway on the map.

THIS MONTH • Expanding from a OO gauge train set • New life for an old model

A start in the hobby

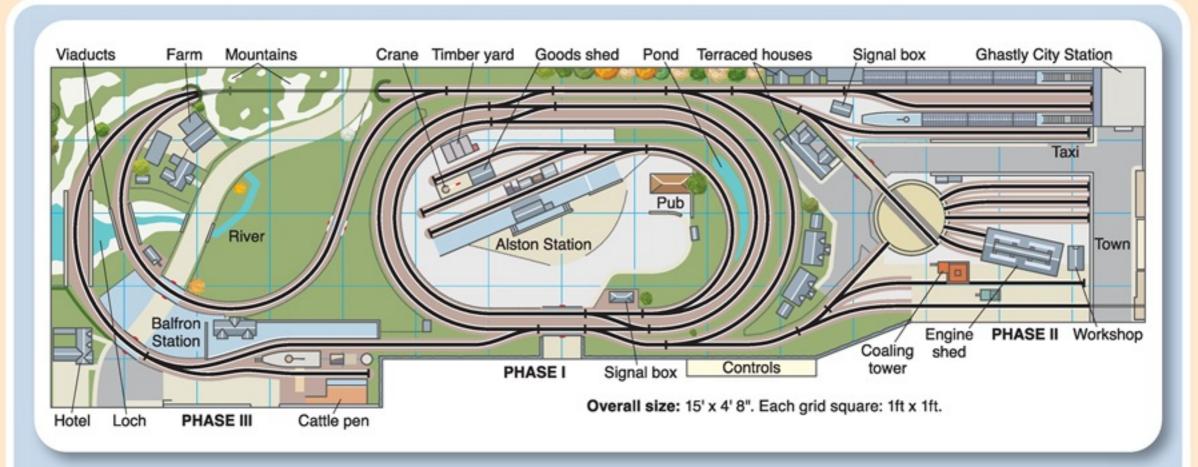
The gift of a train set from his wife led **TERRY ALLEN** to develop a fulfilling and absorbing interest in railway modelling, the result of which is this intensive OO gauge system. Here he describes how he overcame some of the challenges he faced as a newcomer to the hobby.

can recall quite clearly how my primary school in Hounslow was situated alongside one of the former London & South Western Railway's suburban lines; we couldn't see the trains, but boy could we hear them, especially in the summertime with the classroom windows open!

Fast forward 60-odd years and to a shopping trip with my wife Sue. On impulse she bought me a most wonderful early The gift that started it all! The Hornby Flying Scotsman train set generated the germ of an idea that led to the layout's construction, proving that whatever the age, receiving a train set will soon develop into a long-term pastime.





birthday present – a Hornby OO gauge Flying Scotsman train set. Upon taking the locomotive out of the box, I became fascinated by the wonderful level of detail that the model exhibited. I was hooked!

The literature included with the train set included suggestions for expanding the basic loop of track. I soon returned to the model shop to acquire these items, together with a second loco (a J50 0-6-0T), some goods wagons and as many model railway magazines as I could find...

Analogue or digital?

Having identified the garage as a suitable space to set up my fast-growing model railway collection, Sue and I spent the next few weeks lining out the room and adding insulation. We also spent much time reading through the magazines, where we kept coming across references to 'analogue and DCC'. Unsure what these terms referred to at first, I was fortunate to receive advice from one of the members of Preston & District Model Railway Society, who persuaded me that DCC was easier to wire and would be the way to go.

Having completed the new railway room, I made a 6' x 4' baseboard using 3" x 1" timber for the frame and 3/8" ply for the top. I then bolted 4" x 2" legs on each corner. I drew out the track plan, based largely upon a scheme suggested in the aforementioned train set literature, but with a few additions. It essentially took the form of a twin-oval with a set of sidings in the middle.

Creating the scenery

I next scratch-built the station platform, using Metcalfe Models tarmac printed sheet for the platform surface and Wills stone for the faces.

The goods platform was made from polystyrene with Wills cladding, but I covered the surface in wooden coffee stirrers. Wills kits were also used for the water tower, coal yard hut, goods yard hut, crane, timber yard and bus shelter. The Bush Inn was a readyfinished item from Oxford Rail, whilst the signal box was built from a Ratio kit. I used a Peco Manyways kit for the station building.

The basic 6' x 4' system was coming

together nicely. I bought a Gaugemaster
Prodigy Express to control the trains digitally,
but decided to stick to analogue methods for
operating the points (Peco motors with
passing contact switches).



Although the trains are controlled using DCC, the points are powered using a traditional arrangement via Peco passing contact switches mounted in a switch module unit.



Expanding the original system

I quite liked my little model railway but was unhappy that the existing station could only accommodate a two-coach train – I needed a bigger layout!

Accordingly, the second phase of the layout's construction saw an extra board added (to the right-hand end as you look at the plan) measuring 4' 6" long with a width of 4' reducing to 3' 6". I then embarked upon the scratch-building of a large terminus station in plywood with much use of Wills cladding, Metcalfe Models paving and various offcuts of plastic pipe. I named the station Ghastly City.

Whilst I was developing this new part of the layout, I decided, in my innocence, not to have a fiddle yard but to instead create a locomotive yard with a Heljan turntable located adjacent to the terminus station. By installing uncoupling units on each of the three platform lines, I could uncouple the carriages from the locomotives on terminating trains and attach a new loco to the other end, which could then depart with the carriages to leave the original loco to return to the yard for servicing. However, it was only later that I realised a reversing loop was needed so that returning trains could run into the station loco first. I also needed more capacity with my DCC system and so replaced my Prodigy Express with a Prodigy Advance.

Further expansion

The third phase of construction took the form of an additional 4' 6" x 4' 8" board added to the left-hand end, which provided sufficient space to introduce the reversing loops needed to operate the terminus as I wanted.

I decided that this might be a good opportunity to try my hand at landscaping and set out to include a farm, a mountain with a tunnel, a viaduct and at least one waterfall. I had some 100mm foam left over so I decided to use layers of this to build my mountain. I discovered, purely by chance, that if you put polystyrene foam through a bandsaw at an angle you can get a very effective and realistic rock strata effect. If you then bond the layers together so that the direction of the lines alternate, it works even better.

However, I experienced a problem trying to accommodate the viaduct: there simply wasn't enough room on the layout to raise the track to the height required for the viaduct, so the only way around this was to drop the level of the baseboard down and create a valley, enabling the track to be kept on the level. I made what was essentially a three-sided box, which I fitted to the underside of the baseboard with the open side orientated

along the left-hand end of the layout.

My first attempt at creating the mountain ended up far too big, but I corrected this by cutting bits off gradually until, eventually, I had a very nice 'mole hill' that did the job.

I then cut out the outline of the valley into the surface of the baseboard, having first measured the length and height of the viaduct and bridge that I wanted to fit. The sides of the valleys were lined with expanded polystyrene, whilst the viaduct, bridge and culvert were created using Wills plastic kits.

The Bush Inn is a ready-to-plant structure which has been bedded into the surrounding ground and detailed. The lights – a key feature of the layout – are supplied by Kytes Lights.

All buildings on the new section were made from Metcalfe Models card kits, whilst the cattle dock was from the Ratio kit. Trackwork on this board is Peco code 100, in difference to the Hornby sectional track which was used on the previous parts of the layout.

The pursuit of knowledge

It was unfortunate that I became interested in this new and fascinating hobby at a time when all the shops were closed during the first period of Government lockdown; to have been able to visit a shop or exhibition would have made the learning curve so much easier. Furthermore, the only way for me to try something out was to buy it, without the benefit of being able to look at it first.

I did also find that there were occasions when manufacturers provided technical information with their products that assumed the customer had a level of knowledge beyond that of a complete novice; this is ok if you are able to visit someone face to face and ask

questions, but given the limitations at that time, this did prove frustrating.

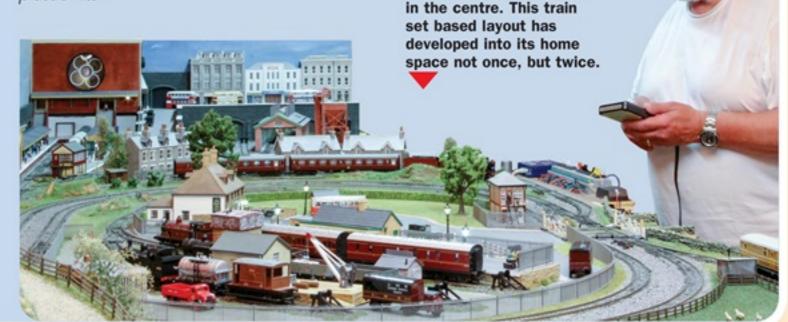
Having said that, I want to say thank you for all the patient help and support I received from the people that I did have dealings with during the project. I am not able to name them all, but they include the staff at Digitrains in Lincoln, Hatton's in Widnes, Homby, Cheltenham Model Centre, and Jo at Kytes Lights.

I very much admire the fine layouts featured in the pages of this magazine.
I hope that my humble 'make it up as you go along' first

A new life for an old model

To complement this month's Scale Drawings feature on pages 701-703, **CALLUM WILLCOX** describes how he revitalised and enhanced a venerable ready-to-run Fowler 2P 4-4-0 in OO. The finished model is destined to perform pilot duties on the author's under-construction Somerset & Dorset layout.

n 1984 Mainline released its ready-to-run OO gauge model of the LMS Class 2P 4-4-0. That was nearly 40 years ago but, perhaps surprisingly, this is one model that has still to be supplanted by all-new tooling. Despite its age, the 2P has stood the test of time rather well and was still available until quite recently as part of the Hornby range, albeit with the more recent versions under

this branding sporting an upgraded locomotive drive mechanism.

Tender-driven models from the likes of Mainline, Dapol and Hornby can be picked up for relatively modest prices on the second-hand market, with the subject of this project being one such model; No.40569 in BR black of c.1990 vintage.

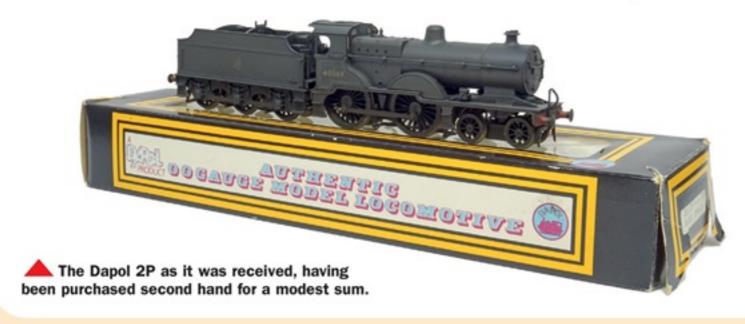
Purchased weathered and paired with a

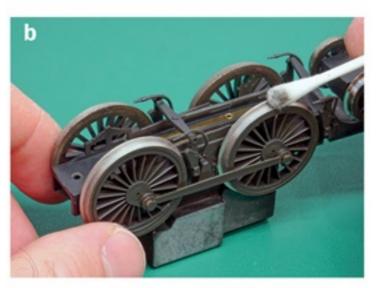
Bachmann Fowler 3,500-gallon tender (in place of the model's motorised original) the 2P was unpowered, thereby providing the ideal basis for a free-rolling pilot locomotive on my 12V dc analogue system. Reference for the project was obtained by studying photographs of the real No.40569 during its service on the Somerset & Dorset route.

Enhancements undertaken on the model illustrated here included the fitting of lamp brackets, painting of the cab details, adding a footplate crew and a load of real crushed coal, to name a few. The work required only the minimum of modelling tools and materials, and was completed over the course of just a couple of evenings.



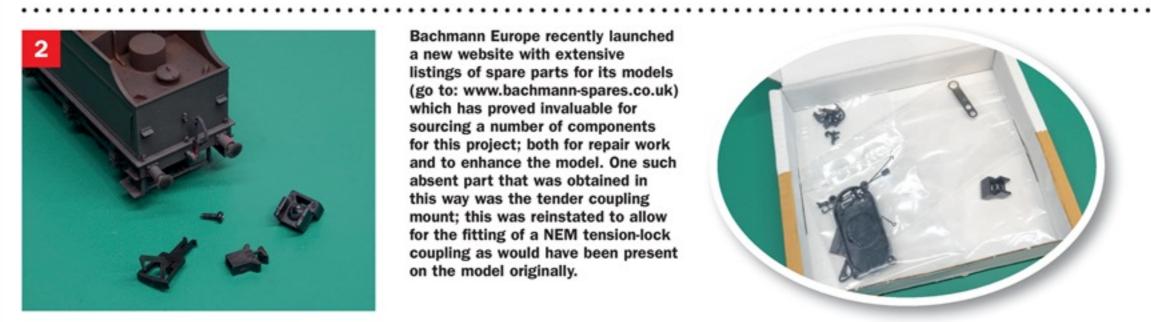
Detailing a Dapol 2P 4-4-0





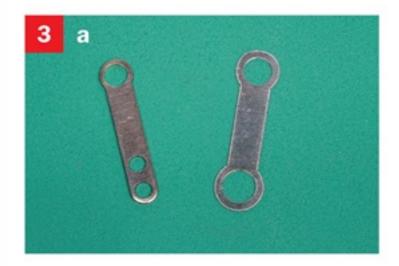


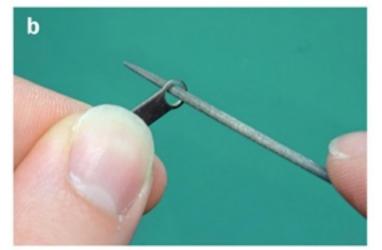
The model was first given a quick clean, with the locomotive and tender dusted using a soft brush to remove any dust deposits that had accumulated whilst it was on static display (a). Overspray from the weathering completed by the previous owner was removed from the wheel treads using a cotton bud moistened with isopropyl alcohol (b). Finally, each axle was lubricated with a small amount of oil to ensure the model was free-rolling (c).

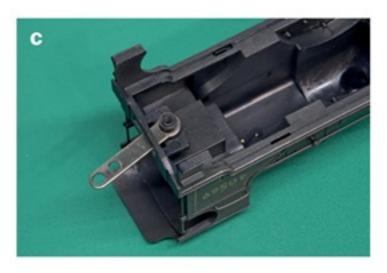


Bachmann Europe recently launched a new website with extensive listings of spare parts for its models (go to: www.bachmann-spares.co.uk) which has proved invaluable for sourcing a number of components for this project; both for repair work and to enhance the model. One such absent part that was obtained in this way was the tender coupling mount; this was reinstated to allow for the fitting of a NEM tension-lock coupling as would have been present on the model originally.









The drawbar fitted to the locomotive was intended for connecting to the original Mainline motor-equipped tender; this was unsuitable for the supplied Bachmann tender due to the excessive size difference between the respective drawbar connecting pins (a). Therefore a Bachmann BR Standard 4MT drawbar was obtained as a suitable replacement, the opening at the locomotive end only requiring some minor fettling with a round-headed modelling file (b). This provides a strong and sturdy connection when the model is being propelled, as well as giving the option for close-coupling (c).



The cab backhead is surprisingly well furnished, but the detail is somewhat lost due to it being fully moulded in black plastic. These fittings were picked out carefully in appropriate colours using various enamels from the Humbrol range, starting with the upper portion of the cab sides/roof which were painted cream. The floor was dry-brushed a wood brown; once dry the surface was scored with a Swann-Morton blade to simulate wooden planking.



The Bachmann Fowler 4F accessory pack (once again obtained via the new Bachmann spares website) contains a number of useful detailing components, including screw-link couplings, cab doors and fireman's tools. The front screwlink proved to be a straightforward swap (inset), fitting into the recess present for the original hook. The cab doors required some minor modification to accommodate the raised footplate; these were then fixed into position using contact adhesive.

Suitable footplate crew figures were sourced from Modelu: (ref.1095) Loco crew using regulator (right hand) and (ref.1096) Loco crew leaning (looking left). The unpainted figures were first fixed to a scrap piece of styrene (to assist with painting) before being primed with a grey aerosol. Suitable colours from the Citadel acrylics range were then used to paint each crew member, followed by a light wash of Reikland Fleshshade™ to bring out the details. After removal from the temporary styrene base, the figures were positioned on the footplate.





As with many locomotives allocated to the Somerset & Dorset route, No.40569 was equipped with a Whitaker tablet exchange apparatus – mounted on the left side of the tender. This was replicated using a modified tablet catcher from a Bachmann 7F, with the catcher head re-attached in a horizontal position (a). Using pictures of the prototype for reference, a locating hole was drilled carefully (b), before mounting the assembly to the tender side (c).





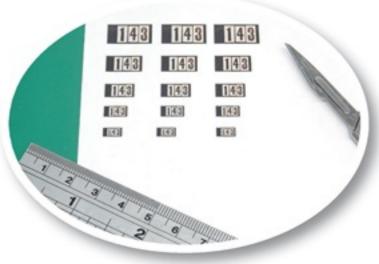


The trio of lamp brackets above the front bufferbeam are not present on the Dapol model, so etched brass examples were sourced from Silver Tay Models. Once formed to shape, the brackets were fixed in place once again using impact contact adhesive – positioned in accordance with prototype photos. Once cured, these were painted and weathered to match the rest of the loco.



enable them to be fitted directly onto the lamp brackets. Each lamp was sprayed black, before fitting the self-adhesive clear lenses in place.





Whilst on piloting duty, it was not uncommon for the lead loco to be adorned with the train reporting number, which would often take the form of a makeshift-looking item. A '143' reporting number was created by splicing and scaling down archive pictures of Somerset & Dorset prototypes. Once assembled, this was printed onto paper in a number of different scales, with the one that was judged to be closest in size then cut out and mounted to thin card – with the edges touched in with black paint. This was mounted to the centre lamp bracket using black-tac.



The moulded plastic coal load was covered with various grades of real crushed coal and weathering powders. A light dusting of rust and coal dust was applied to areas around the water filler, along with Citadel Nuln Oil to simulate overspill. A few lumps of coal were also placed across the tender top to simulate spillages from the coal space.

Comment Observations and opinions on railway modelling

Building in bulk

e're all familiar with the idea of buying in bulk, whether it's groceries or other household essentials. Nowadays we can buy in bulk with our model railway purchases as well, with entire rakes of ready-to-run wagons and coaches available, sometimes in special packs. But have you ever tried actually building things in bulk, such as the humble plastic wagon kit?

Many of us will have experience of constructing such kits, but even for the most common types - such as mineral and open merchandise wagons - there may only be one or two examples on our layouts. Contrast this with the real railway which really did build in bulk; the late Don Rowland's book British Railways Wagons is subtitled 'The First Half Million' – and that's a big clue. Basic open wagons and vans were built by all the pre-Grouping and Big Four railway companies and then British Railways, in huge quantities. Even a cursory look at the lot numbers will reveal that, up to the 1960s, the ubiquitous BR 16-ton mineral wagon was built by the thousand - so many in fact that they had to be split between different works and outside contractors.

The 16-tonner was redolent of the older types of four-wheeled, low-capacity wagons that proliferated across the entire steam era network, these vehicles having been built in large numbers and often without continuous braking. This is in total contrast to the modern railway, which is much-changed from the steam era; moving freight nowadays is achieved in bulk; fewer wagons are built, but they are of a much higher capacity.

With the vast array of ready-to-run products that are available to today's modellers, you might wonder why anyone would consider resorting to kits at all, especially for a long train of the same wagon type? The reality is that factory-finished perfection comes at a price, so if you do want a lot of one particular prototype, kit-building can offer ... if like me, you a substantial saving in financial enjoy putting things outlay, albeit at the cost of your time. Though if, like me, you together, it's a

enjoy putting things together, pleasure not a pain ... it's a pleasure not a pain. Who needs instant gratification when you can enjoy the process of undertaking such a project?

My latest N gauge wagon-building project is a rake of 15 four-wheel wagons to carry Cawoods coal containers. Of course, I could have taken the easy route in a quantity of the forthcoming ready-to-run models that are being developed, but I had in fact already made a start on the first five, so I decided to carry on and bought another 10 of the C-Rail kits to complete my rake.

This is not a difficult kit, but you need to take your time to ensure a smooth-running chassis; a challenge for one kit never mind 15. Then there's the number of parts. There are 31 per wagon, a further five for the container, then painting and all the decals to apply. Some of the construction is rather repetitive, such as the eight tiny brackets per wagon, or the set of two brake shoes that need to be applied to each wheel; that's eight brake shoes per wagon, 120 for the overall project!

Therefore, my advice would be that bulk building can be done, but it's a marathon, not a sprint. Some of the modelling works better as a single task, such as removing the parts from sprues and cleaning up the major parts (floor, sides, and ends), then assembling these parts into the basic wagon. Other tasks are better undertaken in small doses, such as the brake shoe assemblies; I

> worked on one or two wagons per night, and then spent the rest of the time doing totally different modelling projects, rather than trying to complete all the brakes on all the wagons in one go.

Progress to date has seen 15 wagons constructed with associated containers. ready for the paint shop, which will then need decals and weathering. They've come a long way since I first took the parts out of the packaging, and there's still a long way to go. Yet it shows that building in bulk is a perfectly viable approach to modelmaking, as long as you organise the various tasks appropriately and take your time.

After all, this is supposed to be fun, and the sense of achievement in the end is worth all the hard work.

'Met No.1' model marks town's Metropolitan heritage

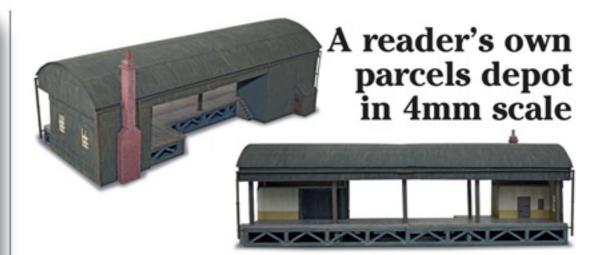

'Elizabethan' was heading south – not north!

The wonderful photograph of No.60024 Kingfisher in the letters pages of the September issue does, in fact, show the Up 'Elizabethan', not the Down as stated incorrectly in the caption. The Down lay-by at Markham Summit (visible on the left of the photo) confirms this, as does the presence of the Thompson BG coupled behind the locomotive, which was always marshalled at the south end of the set.

Furthermore, the year the photo was taken must be 1961, not 1960: No.60024 only hauled the train once during 1960, on Friday 2 September and it was the Up service. The presence of electric warning flashes confirms the date of the photo to be 1961, as these markings were fitted to the A4s in 1961, though not to the majority of the



class until 1963: No.60011 never received them - except on its tender!

With regard to Mr Burdon's comments in his letter; the hairdressing salon was in the earlier 'Flying Scotsman', whilst the Ladies' Retiring Room was in the First Corridor vehicle, not in the Buffet, which was removed from the train in 1958.

An engineer's approach to measuring model performance

I was interested to read the review of the Hornby BR Class 91 Bo-Bo in the July issue, which stated that the model hauled 16 Pullman cars around the Pecorama loft layout. As an engineer I prefer to use a more quantitative measurement of powered model performance.

My collection of OO gauge locomotive models includes several of the same type (mainly Gresley A1/A3 and A4 Pacifics) but of different makes and vintages, and to compare their absolute and relative performance I measure the tractive effort and power consumption.

To do this, the model is placed on a test track and attached to a spring balance (these can be bought for a few pounds and the one I use measures up to 100g/one Newton). I increase the output from the speed controller until wheel slip just starts to occur and

measure the tractive force and the supply voltage and current.

These measurements yield some interesting results. For example, with an old Bachmann split-chassis A4, wheel slip occurs at 10V/500mA (5 Watts) and a tractive effort of 0.5N, whilst with a Chinese-made Hornby A4 wheel slip occurs at 6V/280mA (1.68 Watts) and a tractive effort of 0.6N.

Perhaps surprisingly, an old Tri-ang Hornby A3 with an X-series motor was found to perform almost as well as the Bachmann A4 (0.45N) while consuming only 3W.

I also find these measurements useful for fault finding; for example, checking whether Ringfield magnets are becoming weak in Hornby tender-drive locos, or if traction tyres are becoming worn (which isn't always obvious by visual inspection alone).

Make do and mend – are we losing this traditional approach to railway modelling?

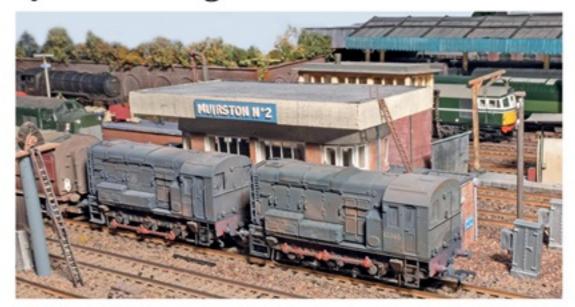
I would like to add my concurrence to Josh Williams' Comment piece (Back to basics?) in the August issue and also to the authors of the letters published in response in the September edition.

When I started building layouts in the 1970s I remember making fuel storage tanks from a cardboard pepper pot and a drum of headache tablets! In short, I used to 'make do and mend', as did many other railway modellers of that generation, including the great Peter Denny.

Looking back, my efforts were naive to say the least, but the satisfaction was huge – far greater than with a 'buy and plant' straight from the box approach, which I just couldn't afford in those days anyway.

I still make vacuum pipes from single core wire by nipping the PVC sheath with pliers to get the 'ridges', before bending them into shape and painting; not exactly rocket science, but it works and you'd never tell when looking at the models from a few feet away.

Some time ago I had a pair of Bachmann 08 diesel shunter models; one that ran well and one that didn't. Therefore, I decided to through-wire them to run in tandem as a permanent

pair. However, I found them quite challenging to dismantle, even with a diagram to follow. I persevered and the finished models could be seen in the November 2021 issue on my Muirston Junction layout (pictured).

My point is that many of us in the hobby derive great satisfaction from getting non-runners moving again, or customising models by making our own parts, which is at odds with the assumption that all modellers want technological 'wonder trains'.

Some of us like to take them to bits and learn how they work, and it would be nice if manufacturers bore that in mind; we represent a sizeable chunk of the market.

As a final thought, many years ago Tri-ang/Hornby used to supply locomotives in kit form with a complimentary screwdriver so that you could assemble them yourself. Maybe something for the current R-T-R manufacturers to consider?

Collett Manor 4-6-0

New from Dapol in 00



In our May 2020 issue we reported on the plans of Dapol to produce OO gauge models of the GWR/BR(W) Collett '7800' Manor from all-new tooling, the first stocks of which have recently been delivered to retailers.

Seven versions have been produced, each of which are available DCC ready, DCC fitted or DCC sound-fitted; these comprise No.7800 Torquay Manor in green with GWR 'shirtbutton' roundel (ref.4S-001-001); No.7814 Fringford Manor in green with GWR tender lettering (ref.4S-001-002); No.7807 Compton Manor in green with 'G-crest-W' lettering on the tender (ref.4S-001-003); No.7823 Hook Norton Manor in BR lined black with early emblems (ref.4S-001-004); No.7819 Hinton Manor in BR unlined black with the larger early emblems (ref.4S-001-005); No.7810 Draycott Manor in BR lined green with small early emblems (ref.4S-001-006); and No.7827 Lydham Manor in BR lined green with late crests (ref.4S-001-007).

In addition, an eighth version has been produced as No.7820 Dinmore Manor in BR lined black livery with early emblems. This has been produced exclusively for the Gloucestershire Warwickshire Railway, and is available to purchase from the Toddington station shop, with contributions from the sale of each model going to the GWSR and Dinmore Manor Locomotive Ltd, owners of the preserved No.7820.

Our sample in detail

For review we received a sample of No.7823 Hook Norton Manor, which was one of the second batch of the series constructed by British Railways in 1950 at Swindon Works, and allocated when new to Chester West on 31 December 1950. In 1951 it moved to Banbury, subsequently transferring to St Blazey in December 1955; Truro in January 1956, briefly spending time at Neath (Court Sart) during June/July, before returning to Truro; Machynlleth in April 1956, and finally to Tyseley in November 1962. Withdrawal came on 25 July 1964, with the locomotive broken up Cashmore's, Great Bridge, some three months later.

The livery of the model is correct for the period from new until 31 October 1951 – with the 84K Chester shedcode squarely dating the locomotive to this 10-month period. Period-specific details include Collett straight buffer shanks, original GWR chimney with capuchon, original boiler, and new style driving wheels.

The construction of the model takes the form of diecast metal for the wheels, chassis and running plate (which is straight and true along its length), with moulded plastic components accounting for the upperworks, cylinders and details. Buffers are metal and sprung, while the plastic moulded coal load is removable.

The model is supplied with all details factory-fitted (including cylinder drain cocks, plus locomotive and tender brake rigging), save for an optional front steam heat pipe and sanding lever fitment which is supplied in an accessory bag; if fitted, the latter must be removed prior to taking off the bodyshell. In addition there is a pair of printed (not etched) metal cabside numberplates, which can be fitted over the printed versions on the cabsides, if desired. A tool for the smokebox door and pull-out PCB is also present, in



addition to a 'clip fit' mount for a 'sugar cube' speaker housing and NEM tension-lock coupling.

Rivet and bolt head detail is well executed; this extends to the cab, running plate, cylinder cladding and counterweights on the centre driving wheels – the bolt head detail around the smokebox saddle is particularly fine. Cab windows are glazed, with the frames neatly picked out in brass. Handrail detail is formed from a mixture



of fine metal wire and plastic; the latter is most evident on the tender, with some flash noted on the rear grabrails.

As per the firm's recent Churchward Mogul and Collett '5101' large Prairie, the centre driving wheels are sprung, as is the bogie assembly; this operates on a cam to enable the model to negotiate second radius curves, allowing for full representations of the cylinder covers without the need for cutouts. Unlike the Mogul and large Prairie, the cylinder crossheads are moulded in a black plastic (those on the aforementioned models being formed from metal); these would perhaps benefit from a spot of silver paint to blend in with the rest of the motion.

The BR mixed traffic lined black livery has a pleasing satin finish, which is applied neatly throughout. The numbers and lettering are also well applied, as are the route availability markings. The valve gear and tyres are presented with a polished metal finish, while the characteristic brass safety valve bonnet is formed from a high shine brass-plated plastic. A representation of the inside motion is present between the frames, and has been picked out in red. The cab is fully furnished with backhead detail and fittings picked out in appropriate colours, extending to the printed dials on the gauges.

Mechanism and performance

The model is equipped with a five-pole skew-wound motor with brass flywheel housed in the front of the boiler/ firebox driving the rear coupled axle, with electrical pick-up from all driving and tender wheels, via wiper pick-ups. The locomotive and tender are connected together with a push-fit coupling that has been designed to provide a reduced gap on straight track, whilst allowing the model to negotiate second radius curves.

Weighting 353g (the tender accounts for 97g of this), on test the model was found to be extremely smooth and quiet in operation, with good slow speed performance. It was able to comfortably haul six Pullman carriages round the Pecorama loft layout, with its 1 in 48 gradients and 3' radius curves.

Body removal is straightforward, requiring the removal of three screws; one located under the smokebox (between the cylinders, accessed through the front of the bogie assembly), and two under the cab – it is worth noting that the PCB must be removed before attempting this along with the vacuum pump (attached to the crosshead on the right-hand side).

Prototype information

The '7800' Manor class was developed as a lighter alternative to Collett's '6800' Grange – achieved following the introduction of the Swindon Standard No.14 boiler – allowing for wider route availability. Like the Grange, the class utilised a number of reconditioned components from withdrawn '4300' Moguls, with the 5' 8" diameter driving wheels and some motion parts incorporated into the design.

The initial batch comprised 20 locomotives (Nos.7800-7829), with the first of the series – No.7800 Torquay Manor – outshopped from Swindon in 1938. A second batch of 10 locomotives (Nos.7820-7829) was authorised by the newly formed Western Region of British Railways post-Nationalisation, and built in 1950. Unlike the first batch, reconditioned parts were not used during construction.

Aided with the blue route availability, the Manors saw widespread operation across the GWR network. Aside from their regular mixed traffic duties, the locomotives could also be found piloting trains over the Devon banks, as well as hauling prestigious workings such as the 'Cambrian Coast Express' – with which the class is often associated.

Examples lasted right up until the end of BR(WR) steam in 1965. Nine of the class have survived into preservation.

Separating the tender body from the chassis requires four screws, one at each corner, to be removed.

A feature which has become a staple for recent steam locomotives from this manufacturer, is the innovative slide-out PCB with 'Next18' interface located inside the smokebox and accessed via the removable door. A 'clip fit' speaker mount for a 'sugar cube' can be found on the underside of the PCB; however, there is also provision for housing a bass reflex speaker inside the tender – factory

sound-fitted models have two speakers as standard. The model is equipped with a flickering firebox glow which operates when power is applied under analogue control; it is understood that this feature is synchronised with sound on factory-fitted DCC sound versions.

The complete trilogy...

The arrival of the Manor thus completes the firm's trilogy of GWR six-coupled locomotive types with 5' 8" diameter driving wheels, which was initiated with the Churchward Mogul (see reviews, RM January 2021) and followed by the Collett large Prairie (reviewed in RM February 2022). Each of these models has in turn demonstrated continued refinement, the Manor proving to be the zenith of this development – as such it is a model that will certainly be hard to beat...

Latest hopper wagon releases from Accurascale



Following hot on the heels of the HAA coal hopper wagons released by Accurascale (see reviews, RM August 2022), the firm has delivered models of the later revised HCA coal hoppers with canopies, together with the CDA china clay hoppers with roofs.

For review we received samples of HCA triple pack ref.ACC2595HCA-EWS1 – containing wagon Nos.351233, 351564 and 350001 in BR unpainted steel with brown cradles; and CDA triple pack ref.ACC2535CDA-DB1 – containing wagon Nos.375002, 375030 (with blue frame) and 375091 in DB (ex-EWS) unpainted steel with maroon cradles. Other packs for these livery schemes are available with different running numbers.

Examining the HCAs first, it was initially proposed for all MGR hoppers to be equipped with canopies from new; however, at the time few colliery screens were high enough to permit their use. Originally classified as HOP 32 AB, the wagons were confusingly coded HAA under TOPS, alongside their non-canopy-fitted counterparts; this was later revised to HCA. Around 150 hoppers of this design entered service – mainly confined to Scotland – working coal flows to Cockenzie and Longannet power station until the late 1990s.

Construction of the models takes the form of diecast metal for the chassis, with injection moulded plastic utilised for the hopper body and underframe details. The models, which are adorned with fine separate plastic and etched metal components, tip the scale at 53g each.

Slimline tension-lock couplers are factory-fitted, mounted within removable pivoting NEM pockets. The supplied accessory pack comprises working scale instanter couplings, yellow air pipes and red air brake pipes – all of which have been fitted here for photography.

The canopy on each model is a separate moulding. The metal sprung buffers are of the Oleo variety, whilst the free-rolling wheelsets (also metal) include representations of the disc brakes and are fitted within brass bearings.

The triple pack of CDAs in DB livery, one of which retains a blue cradle.

Finished in BR brown and silver, the livery – as per the HAAs reviewed previously – is applied to a high standard, with the demarcation between the unpainted steel colour of the hopper bodies and brown of the cradles being sharp and crisp. Of note are the crudely painted over 'B' prefixes on two of the examples, this imitating the practice of removing prefixes from running numbers during the mid-1970s.

Turning now to the CDAs, a total of 124 of these hoppers were constructed new by BREL Doncaster in 1987-8, with a further 15 rebuilt from HAA hoppers in 1989 for use on domestic and longdistance Comish china clay services.

Originally outshopped in the livery scheme of English China Clay (comprising blue cradles with unpainted steel hopper bodies and ECC International branding) the hoppers featured flexible roller covers to help protect their loads from the elements and reduce dust, while a later modification saw the addition of a

non-stick coating applied to the insides of the hopper bodies.

While the scrapping of these vehicles has depleted their numbers in recent years, examples do remain in service with the majority wearing EWS maroon with DB branding; a few retain their original blue cradles and hoods.

Weighing in at 57g each, the models are of similar construction to that of the HCAs, with extensive use of diecast metal, injection moulded plastic and etched metal components. This aside – much like the prototypes – the two wagon types sport numerous detail differences, with the CDA incorporating a different chassis casting (with extra cut-outs) and heavy-duty buffers (which are metal and sprung). Instanter couplings and red air brake pipes are provided for the modeller to fit if desired.

The undersides of the models feature fine renditions of the hopper doors and braking equipment; the latter, as with other members of the MGR family, covers a mix of both disc- and claspbraked systems, with bolted brake discs forming part of the wheel tooling. The brake distributor and air cylinder (mounted above the solebar) are both adomed with fine pipework, which in turn is neatly picked out in yellow and red.

The hopper bodies incorporate the distinctive cut-outs along one side (including ends), and end ventilator boxes which have been separately fitted. The characteristic covers have been captured faithfully and include simulated crease lines in the PVC tarpaulin hoods (which are moulded in solid plastic); the creases are aligned with harness points formed from fine metal wire.

The DB livery scheme has been executed well, with the DB logo and running numbers applied directly over the top of their EWS counterparts – as per the prototypes. Furthermore, one vehicle in the set depicts No.375030, which is one of the hoppers that still retains part of its original blue colour scheme – a detail that has not been overlooked on the model.

Lettering, data panels, and builders plates are crisp and fully legible, while details such as brake handles, door latches and lamp irons are neatly picked out in yellow. All that's missing is a copious application of clay dust...

Accurascale has delivered its allocation of HCA and CDA models to customers who placed pre-orders. However, remaining stocks are available from selected Accurascale



retailers (see the firm's website for a list of stockists).

More HUO hoppers...

Accurascale has released further versions of its OO gauge BR 24.5-ton hopper wagon (TOPS code HUO), examples of which we first reviewed in our August 2018 issue.

The Accurascale model represents the Dia.1/148 (revised) and Dia.1/154 examples constructed at Shildon between 1958 and 1962, which totalled 3,426 wagons. They were used for conveying coal and coke from collieries and coke plants to power stations and ports throughout Great Britain.

The tooling and specification of these latest versions matches those seen previously (including sprung buffers, metal three-hole disc wheelsets and scale instanter couplings), but the samples illustrated here are presented with a new selection of running numbers, not offered previously.

Finished in pre-TOPS condition (i.e. pre-1973), the markings on each model replicate those on particular prototype examples – note the differing positions of the black patches and data panels; the latter finished in a faded grey on one of the examples. Running numbers in our sample triple pack are

B334126N, B333850 and B337135N. Three other pre-TOPS triple packs (each with different sets of running numbers) are also available.

...and more PCAs

Accurascale has also released another tranche of triple packs of its PCA cement hopper wagons (see reviews, RM June 2019 issue).

Nine new triple packs with different running numbers are now available: three packs in original VGT Castle Cement livery, two in VGT Castle Cement 'Building a Better Environment' livery, and four in VGT Castle Cement 'Heidelberg Cement Group' livery.

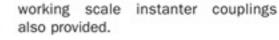
For review we received samples of pack ref.ACC2042CS-W comprising running numbers 74041, 74034 and 10605 in original VGT Castle Cement livery; and pack ref.ACC2040CS-U featuring numbers 10643, 10641 and

CIÉ magnesite wagons from Irish Railway Models

00



Irish Railway Models – the sister company to Accurascale – has delivered stocks of its Córas lompair Éireann magnesite wagons in OO. Plans for these models were first announced in our April 2022 issue.

The wagons were built exclusively to transport magnesite – a mineral used to produce heat-resistant bricks for blast furnaces – from Ballinacourty in County Waterford to Tivoli near Cork.

Rakes formed of anywhere between 12 and 22 hoppers operated between the two sites once a day, and were almost exclusively hauled by A Class locomotives (as released previously by IRM). Traffic remained steady between 1970 and early 1982 whereupon magnesite production was moved to Asia, which resulted in the Ballinacourty facility closing in July that year.

The models benefit from the modular approach CIÉ took in the 1960s and 1970s (utilising a common chassis for a number of its wagon fleet) with the same four-wheel chassis tooling that was first used for the firm's CIÉ ballast



hoppers (see Reviews, RM August 2017). Construction largely takes the form of injection moulded plastic parts with pin-point metal wheelsets. Buffers are plastic and not sprung.

The hopper bodies incorporate separately fitted components formed from metal wire and etched metal – including the fine mesh walkways. This level of detail continues underneath with the brake linkages and vacuum cylinders all represented.

The all-over austere bauxite livery has a pleasing satin finish, with crisp applications of the small printed details, such as the white stencilled lettering and running numbers.

Tension lock couplings are fitted as standard, mounted within fixed NEM pockets under the solebar. Scale instanter couplings are supplied for the modeller to fit if desired.

The magnesite wagons are available direct from IRM as triple packs, with four sets available, each comprising different running numbers.

Bachmann SE&CR 25T 'Dance Hall' brake van

Bachmann Europe Plc has delivered its latest ready-to-run OO gauge item of rolling stock, the South Eastern & Chatham Railway 25-ton 'Dance Hall' brake van. The models were unveiled as part of the manufacturer's latest series of new product announcements, details of which are included in the news pages of this issue.

A total of 60 of these Maunsell/Lynes 25-ton goods brake vans were built between 1918 and 1927. The first 20, built to Diagram 1559, were constructed with 12" channel underframes; the remaining 40

received 15" channel underframes to Diagram 1560. At 24' in length (with a 16' wheelbase), these vans soon earned the nickname 'dance halls', due to their spacious guard's accommodation.

The vehicles had a long service career, with 10 of the later Diagram 1560 rebuilt for departmental use, becoming Diagram 1761 with one of the end balconies incorporated into the van section; all were vacuum-fitted, with some later receiving air pipes, enabling them to remain in service well into the 1980s.

The Bachmann model represents the





first batch of vehicles constructed to Diagram 1559 with 12" channel underframes, of which one example survives – No.11902 – based at the Whitwell and Reepham Station Museum in Norfolk. Four versions have been announced for the initial release, comprising No.11902 in SE&CR grey; No.55462 in pre-1936 Southern Railway brown with red ends; No. S55457 in BR grey and No.DS55466 in BR Departmental olive green.

For review we received a sample of the BR grey version (ref.38-917). The model consists of a plastic injection moulded body and chassis, with various detail fittings fabricated from a combination of plastic and metal. The body grabrails – formed from metal wire – are particularly fine whilst being sturdy to the touch. Lamp irons are separately fitted, with the exception of the one fitted to each balcony end, these instead being part of the body moulding.

The flush glazing within the balcony ends affords a view of the van interior, which features a representation of the stove, handbrake wheel, table and bench seat. Wheelsets are metal and painted black, while buffer heads are turned metal, but not sprung. Overall weight is 50g. Slimline tension-lock

couplings are fitted as standard, mounted in NEM pockets.

The model features a remarkably detailed underframe, including fine representations of the running boards (which are separately fitted) and brake shoes which are in line with the wheel treads. An additional detailing pack is also provided for the user to fit, which includes the brake pull-rods as fitted here for photography.

The livery has been applied to a high standard with a pleasing satin finish to the BR grey; this otherwise plain livery is offset with the roof in dark grey and grabrails neatly picked out in white. Running numbers, tare markings and 'HITHER GREEN SIDINGS' lettering is crisp and clear. The vehicle is also branded 'NOT TO WORK BETWEEN TONBRIDGE & WEST ST LEONARDS VIA BATTLE' – a restriction which was applied to all Diagram 1559 and 1560 vans.

An all-new BR Class 90 electric locomotive in the Graham Farish N gauge range leads the autumn 2022 announcements from Bachmann.

Set to make its debut at the International N Gauge Show at Warwickshire Event Centre on 10/11 September, the model is due for delivery by the end of this year and features a coreless motor, Next18 DCC decoder socket, pre-fitted speaker, directional lights, cab lights in DCC, and a poseable pantograph.

Five liveries will be produced initially, all with a sound-fitted option: 90 005 Financial Times in InterCity 'Swallow' guise (photo 1); 90 037 in Railfreight Distribution grey; 90 019 Penny Black in Res livery; 90 004 City of Glasgow in Virgin red and black; and 90 047 in the latest Freightliner G&W orange.

50th anniversary pack

Following the recent 50th anniversary of Graham Farish N gauge models, a special Collector's Pack has been announced, with the GB Railfreight Class 60 diesel that was named to mark the occasion. As well as the model of 60 002 Graham Farish 50th Anniversary (photo 2) which is also available with sound fitted, each pack contains a commemorative nameplate, pin badge, £35.00 Bachmann Collectors Club voucher and a certificate of authenticity, all in a bespoke wooden box.

The Farish Class 37 will receive

Bachmann shows progress with 009 projects

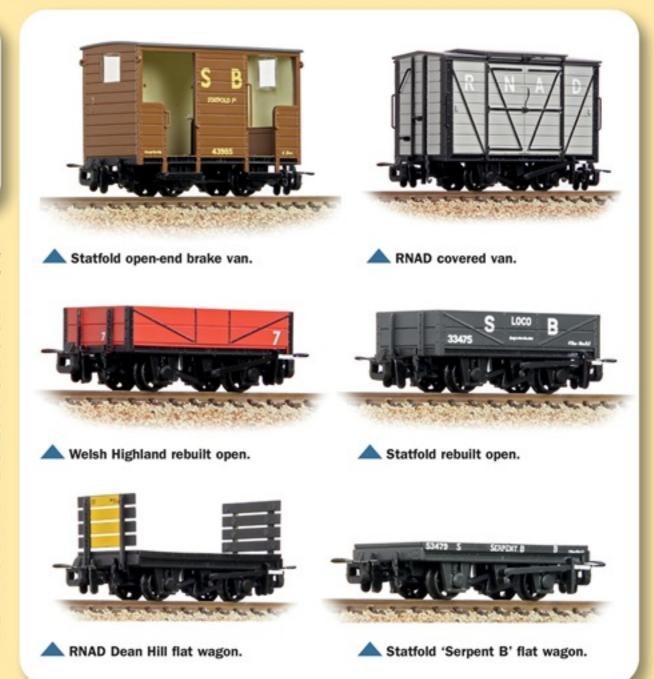

In tandem with the latest set of new model announcements, Bachmann has also provided an update regarding several of its 009 projects that are currently at various stages of development.

Firstly, an engineering prototype has been unveiled of the Gloucester bogie coach. Four of these were constructed for the Ashover Light Railway in 1924 and utilised former War Department wagon bogies. The vehicles operated on the ALR until 1936, whereupon passenger services ceased; two examples subsequently found use on the Lincolnshire Coast Light Railway. A third coach also survives and is located at the Golden Valley Light Railway in Derbyshire. Announced in our March 2019 issue, Bachmann will be releasing two versions: ref.394-025 in ALR crimson and ref.394-026 in LCLR blue & cream.

Secondly, livery samples have been been received for the forthcoming series of rolling stock items based on Royal Naval Armaments Depot prototypes, for which plans were first announced in the March 2019 issue. Eight models are being released, these comprising four distinct types; opens, flats, vans and brake vans. The liveries reflect actual examples in original RNAD condition and as running in private ownership at the Welsh Highland and Statfold Barn railways. Rapido announces 00 gauge Class 04, 0 gauge J70 and Wisbech train packs

Rapido Trains UK has announced its first OO gauge diesel locomotive – a BR Drewry 204hp 0-6-0DM (TOPS Class 04).

The model will feature lights, 'plug and play' DCC interface and a factory-fitted sound speaker, and will cater for detail changes within the class – including different wheel sizes, original and later cab designs with different window sizes, Southern Region examples, and locomotives with side skirts.

Development work is under way, with photographic surveys undertaken on preserved examples, but the project remains at an early stage with liveries and prices still to be confirmed.

O gauge J70

The firm is also planning its first O gauge model, if there is sufficient demand – a Great Eastern Railway Class C53 (LNER class J70) 0-6-0T steam tram locomotive.

An enlarged version of its existing OO gauge J70, it will have extra features, including opening end doors, sliding windows and a more detailed interior. A 21-pin decoder socket and sound speaker will be fitted, and GER, LNER and BR liveries are proposed, with and without side skirts.

Production will go ahead if Rapido receives enough expressions of interest, which can be registered via the firm's website (see below). Prices will be £375.95 for DCC ready locomotives and £475.95 with DCC sound.

Wisbech train packs

The OO gauge J70 forms a key part of another new Rapido product: Wisbech & Upwell Tramway train packs.

Recreating the pre-grouping era on this famous East Anglian line, the packs each consist of a J70 and two of Rapido's forthcoming W&U bogie coaches, Composite No.7 and Third No.8, all in GER liveries. One set will represent the pre-1919 period with the locomotive in coach brown with blue frames and the carriages in brown; the other is in post-1919 liveries, namely a crimson locomotive with grey frames, and maroon coaches. Prices are £269.95 DCC ready and £369.95 with DCC sound.

The order book is now open for the W&U coaches, which are being tooled and expected to arrive next year. As well as the model of No.8, which was developed for the forthcoming *Titfield Thunderbolt* range, Rapido has produced tooling for No.7 – the two vehicles each having a unique roof and body panel layout.

The coaches will be available at £74.95 each in LNER and BR 'teak' liveries, in addition to a model of preserved No.7 in GER livery. If there are sufficient expressions of interest, a fictional BR maroon livery will also be offered – representing how the coaches might have looked if they had survived longer in BR service.

LB&SCR E1 0-6-0T liveries

Rapido has also confirmed its full range of London, Brighton & South Coast Railway E1 0-6-0Ts in OO gauge, which are now available to order.

14 versions will be produced, in LBSCR 'improved engine green', goods green and Marsh umber, Southern Railway black, and BR unlined black with early emblem (each with two names/numbers). Also available are two Isle of Wight examples – No.1 Medina in BR Malachite green and No.3 Ryde in SR black, both with 'sunshine' lettering – together with No.32151 in BR lined black with no emblem, and a locomotive sold into industrial use, Hartley Main Colliery No.30.

The model is ready for tooling and expected to arrive next year, priced at £159.95 for DC locomotives and £259.95 with DCC sound. Full details of the numbers and identities can be found on the firm's website.

New '1500' and Jones Goods guises

Rapido is planning two more in its series of fictional 'might-have-been' liveries, this time on the forthcoming 00 gauge '1500' pannier tank and Jones Goods 4-6-0.

The Hawksworth O-6-OPT (announced in the July issue of RM) will appear in post-war GWR livery as No.1500, to represent how the class would have looked had it been introduced two years earlier, or if Nationalisation had not taken place. The ten '1500s' were in fact constructed under BR auspices in 1949.

Similarly, the Highland Railway Jones Goods will receive BR lined black with the early emblem, to represent how the class might have appeared if it had survived until after Nationalisation. The last example, No.17925, was withdrawn by the LMS in February 1940, so the Rapido model will be numbered 57925, imagining that this locomotive remained in service for a decade or more longer. As these locomotives worked passenger trains as well as freight, the mixed traffic lined black livery is considered appropriate.

The '1500' is confirmed as going ahead, while the Jones Goods will be produced if a minimum of 250 expressions of interest are received; these can be placed on the website.

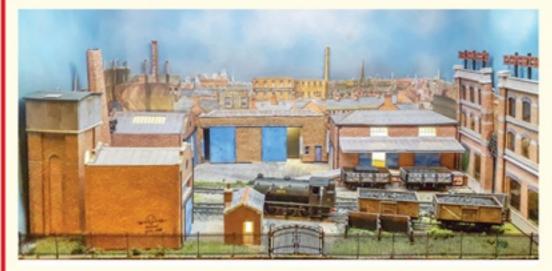

Several of the layouts will be making their first appearance in the south east, and two will be making their exhibition debut: Old Parrock in OO gauge by Paul Rhodes and 2mm finescale Drws-y-Nant by Nigel Ashton. Others have previously featured in RAILWAY MODELLER, including OO gauge Copper Wort & Co. Ltd (RM April 2022), P4 Sandford & Banwell (January 2021) and N gauge Upton Lacey (October 2007). Demonstrators will include Gordon and Maggie Gravett with items from their new project.

Heljan shows off livery artwork for new diesels









North British No.10800 in BR black.

Heljan has unveiled the livery artwork for three forthcoming OO gauge diesel locomotives - the Class 02 shunter, North British prototype No.10800 and the Class 33/2.

Announced in the November 2020 issue of RAILWAY MODELLER, the Class 02 will feature three BR and three industrial guises: D2861 in BR green with wasp stripes and red bufferbeam; D2864 in BR green with wasp stripes and yellow bufferbeam; 02 004 in weathered BR green with no logo; AY1021 in industrial yellow; and Sam in weathered plain green. An exclusive edition for the Gaugemaster collection is Diane in Redland khaki.

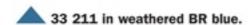
The Danish firm is now awaiting the next set of pre-production samples, which will feature various improvements over the first examples received at the end of 2021. The model is expected to be released in mid-2023, with a suggested retail price of £149.00, and £159.00 for weathered locomotives.

The North British locomotive, which was announced in the April 2022 edition, will be produced in BR black with early crest and silver bogies (one pristine and one weathered); BR black



with early crest and black bogies; and BR green with late crest. Decorated samples are expected to arrive soon, with production due to start before the end of the year.

As reported in the February 2022 issue, the new production run of the narrow-bodied Class 33/2 will include versions with the original exhaust and silencer arrangement from new tooling. Planned numbers and liveries are: D6586 in original BR green; D6594 in weathered original BR green; D6591 in BR green with small yellow panels; D6596 in BR green with full yellow ends; D6590 in BR blue; 33 211 in weathered and faded BR blue; 33 208 in 'Dutch' livery; 33 203 in Railfreight Distribution grey; 33 204 in Railfreight Construction grey; 33 201 in BR General grey; D6593 in BR green with small yellow panel, orange cantrail line

and high-intensity headlight; and BR blue 33 202 with orange cantrail line and high-intensity headlight. Decorated samples are expected soon and the models should arrive in the UK in February 2023.

Assessment of the samples has revealed some areas for improvement, which will be corrected on the production models. The bodyside planking arrangement has already been retooled to give a more accurate representation of the prototype, and the end gangways will be lowered on the production models following feedback and additional research.

Two of the planned liveries - Enparts green and BR maroon - also need to be matched more closely to the correct shades, and a matt finish will be used on the production models to give the look of a wooden-bodied vehicle.

Delivery is anticipated towards the end of this year or in the first quarter of 2023, and the models can be pre-ordered from Accurascale stockists or the firm's website at £54.95 each (the Enparts van is an exclusive model only available direct from Accurascale).
