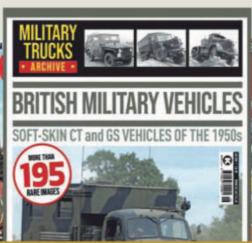

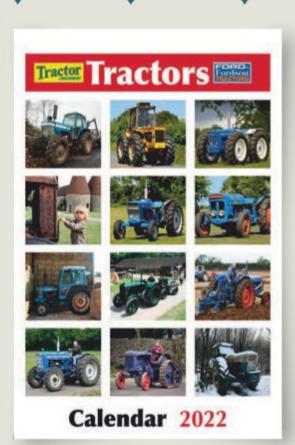

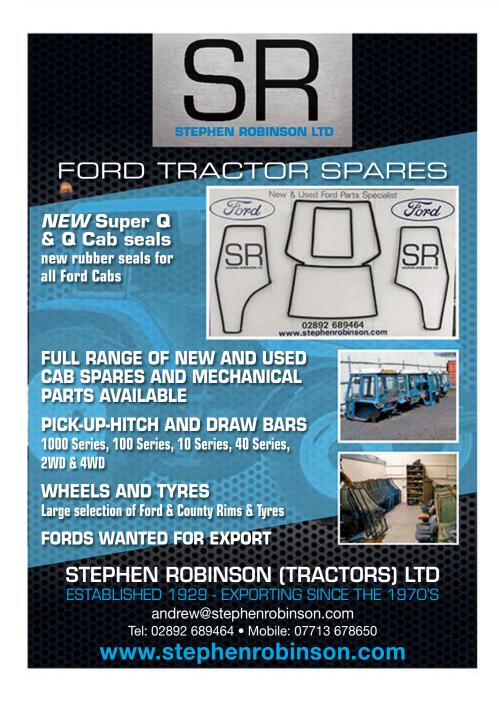

hose of you reading this who are old enough to remember 1977 will appreciate just how long ago it truly was. Some momentous events took place that year, including the Queen's Silver Jubilee celebrations, the release of the first Star Wars film, Concord's first commercial flight and the death of Elvis Presley.

It was a significant time for Ford

tractors, too. The company had just launched the important 700 Series; a range of tractors that was to prove significant not only because of their physical presence and stylish looks, but also because it brought with it the arrival of the first, Ford-produced four-wheeldrive models.

It's almost impossible to believe that such a modern-looking tractor was toiling in UK fields nearly 45 years ago 77

Seeing the photographs of Edwin Palmer's very original, 1978 9700 4WD model included here, it's almost impossible to believe that such a modern-looking tractor was toiling in UK fields nearly 45 years ago. That's getting on for half a century; my, how time flies!

Big and brawny

The 700 Series was the bigger, brawnier replacement for the 600 Series, and launched Ford into a new and successful era in which tractors became more powerful, more comfortable to use

and a good deal more productive. One of the most noticeable styling cues of the new range was the distinctive, wrap-around radiator grille panel. This fronted a much higher bonnet line, and saw the headlights repositioned back onto the sides of the nosecone. The new models were bigger in virtually every dimension than the 600 Series range they replaced, which looked weedy by comparison.

To cap it all off, the new tractors got a super-luxurious version of Ford's excellent Q cab, which boasted a completely flat floor and comfortably positioned gear levers set to the right of the driver's seat. Under the bonnet the range-topping 9700 got a tweaked

version of the six-cylinder, 6.6-litre diesel engine used in the 8000, that was turbocharged and saw power output peak at an impressive 153hp.

The 700 Series models were impressive performers in regular, two-wheel-drive form but, factor in the extra traction delivered by 4WD, and you had a formidable workhorse. But the arrival of Ford's factory-fitted four-wheel-drive option wasn't welcomed by all. It triggered the beginning of the end for independent conversion specialists like County and Roadless; companies that had built their businesses on the enhanced performance delivered by the Ford skid unit-based machines they produced.



Despite its size, the 9700 is a very easy machine to manage and handle. It drives well and all-round visibility is good thanks to plenty of glass and a lofty driving position.

Important decision

But, from the moment Ford decided to produce its own 4WD tractor models, the rug was pulled from beneath the feet of the independents, who were then simply unable to compete with the might of Ford's component purchasing power and production scale. For the 9700's front axle (and that used on the 8700), Ford opted for a German-build ZF unit

that utilised a side-mounted drive shaft. The four-cylinder-engined models lower down the range didn't get the 4WD treatment from Ford in the UK, but other markets were offered the 7700 with a Schindler front axle.

Edwin Palmer bought his 9700 in 2019; it's the largest tractor he's ever owned and it's fair to say he's a big fan. "I bought it at a farm sale," he told me,

"although I'd actually gone to the auction because I was interested in a Ford 7810 Jubilee that was being sold. But I spotted the 9700 tucked away in the corner of one of the sheds and, once I'd confirmed that it was being included in the sale, we stuck a battery on it and got it running. That's when I changed tack completely.

"As it turned out, the 7810 wasn't a particularly good example (rusty cab and badly worn interior), and it sold for about the same as I eventually paid for the 9700, which was £18,500. That was a little more than I was expecting but, all things considered, I think that it was money well spent. I've had several people approach me about buying it





What's it like?

The objective of this sort of 'spotlight' feature is to get a practical feel for what a specific tractor is like to own and, in the case of the 9700, Edwin has little but praise for the machine. "Overall, I think it's a very good tractor; well built and designed and, as far as I'm concerned, reliable. Admittedly, I think I was lucky with finding one in this condition. It's a one-farm example and I bought it with just over 7,000 hours on the clock," he explained. "It was obviously well cared for during its working life and didn't get used for any of the mucky, farm jobs.



Instrumentation is rudimentary by modern standards, but it does the job and all still works reliably in this case.

"I was also told that it was always stored under cover, which obviously accounts for its good condition today. There's next to no corrosion to be seen, with the two exceptions being a small strip of rust immediately beneath the bottom windscreen rubber, on the nearside, and some surface corrosion on the inside of the rear wheel rims.

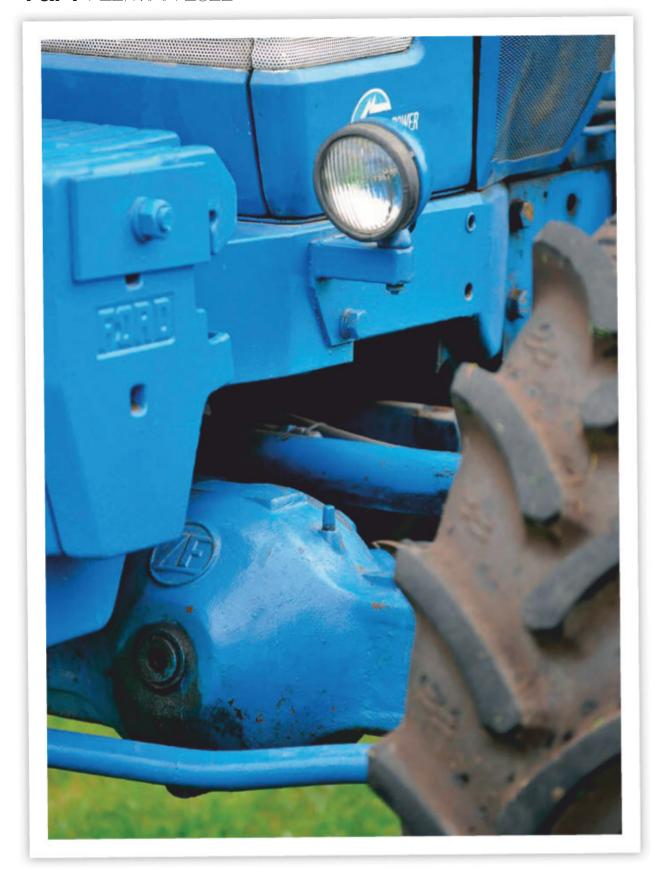
"Finding a good one of these for sale nowadays is difficult," Edwin added. "Although I came across this one purely by chance, I'd known I wanted one for a while, so had been searching the magazine classifieds for a good while. Most that I came across were in very

rough condition, presumably because they'd endured long working lives."

Because the 9700 was both the range-topper and a very accomplished performer, most got worked very hard. Their inherent reliability worked against them as the years passed, with successive owners being tempted into minimal maintenance and servicing simply because the tractor just kept on running. Inevitably, as many fell down the pecking order with time, plenty finished up on livestock farms. Edwin said they are very good 'PTO tractors', so were ideally suited to running slurry machines. Once you reach that stage, of

course, the overall condition only tends to go in one direction.

A real pleasure

"So far I've found the 9700 to be a real pleasure to run and own," Edwin continued. The relative simplicity of its engineering is a big factor; it comes from the pre-electronics age, which is a real advantage, as far as I'm concerned. Just about the only electronic systems on it are the lights and the windscreen wiper, so there's next to nothing to go wrong! I'm not a fan of the complicated, modern electronic management systems used on newer tractors.

"While everything usually works well enough when the machines are brand new, by the time the third or fourth owners gets hold of them – and once water, dirt and hard work have started to take their toll on wiring, connectors and electronic control units – it becomes a very different story. Niggling, irritating faults can be common and are nearly always time-consuming and expensive to put right. There's also the fact that relatively minor electronic problems can be sufficient to disable the whole tractor, which, of course, is the last thing that any hard-pressed farmer wants."

So I asked Edwin if he thought the 9700 had any serious shortcomings,

Nobody could believe how well the 43-year-old 9700 was pulling against such a modern machine

and his response was characteristically upbeat. "The only weak point, in my view, relates to the rear linkage control, where bushes and the torsion bar do become worn, leading to excessive play and an increasing loss of implement control. The best way to check for that is simply to wiggle both link arms to see how much play there is at their pivot points – it's there on mine, but I'm not that bothered as it's not in regular use. The whole lot can be replaced quite simply, but it'll cost about £600 in parts to do it.

Other issues?

Elsewhere on the tractor, problems have been few and far between. "I've had no issues with the back axle," Edwin told me, "although I did make a point of changing all the fluids when I bought the tractor. The six-cylinder, turbocharged engine has been excellent so far, and hasn't missed a beat. It always starts on the button and doesn't smoke too much. Obviously, there's a bit when starting from cold, and when the engine's being worked hard, but they all do that. Once it's fully up to temperature and operating normally, the exhaust is clear.

"Fundamentally it's a good engine that's both reliable and durable. Turbos can fail, of course, but they can on any



application, so I don't believe that's a specific worry on this engine. If you run it considerately, and keep up to date with regular servicing and maintenance - especially oil and filter changes - then I see no reason why the turbo should give any premature trouble.

"Also, lots of people don't pay proper attention to the coolant level, which is a needless and basic mistake to make. Whatever tractor you've got, if you don't manage the basics well, then the engine will never deliver its best over the long term.

"The brakes work very efficiently, considering the size and weight of the tractor, and have never given me any sort of operational problem. The only issue that did occur was a fluid leak resulting from a corroded metal brake pipe. A small hole developed in the section under the brake fluid reservoir, which sits under the bonnet, just in front of the cab. I think the problem had been initiated by some chafeing, which had then promoted the rusting, causing the hole. But it was simple enough to replace that section of pipe, and the problem was cured."

Access issues

Working room around the engine can be enhanced by removing the pair of side panels, which are bolted into place. However, Edwin leaves these in situ as much as possible, simply to avoid the risk of accidentally chipping the tractor's original paint. Other engine work has included the fitting of a new fuel lift pump (because the original was leaking), and a new starter motor.

"The transmission works very well,

too," he continued. "This is a Dual-Power model, and the system is operated by a floor-mounted pedal in the cab, which still works faultlessly. There haven't been any problems with the ZF front axle, although I did make a point of changing the oil as soon as I got the tractor, using the drain and fill plugs located in the offside front wheel hub centre."

Edwin added: "As with my other tractors. I'm keen to maintain this one in its working clothes, so have no plans to do any painting. In my view, tractors are working, utility vehicles so the way they look should reflect that. I'm certainly not a fan of shiny, two-pack paint finishes, and none of my tractors will ever get 'tarted-up' in that way!

Maintaining the 9700 in presentable

condition means that I'll never be dissuaded from using it, which is good. I plan to continue taking part in road runs and occasional ploughing. I was at an event recently and, while in the ploughing demonstration field, happened to fall in alongside a modern JCB that was pulling a six-furrow Overum. I was using a sevenfurrow Gregoire Besson plough, and there was literally nothing between us. Nobody could believe how well the 43-year-old 9700 was pulling against such a modern machine, or the fact that it was tackling the work with such ease. It was pulling with no apparent effort at all; the engine just sat at 1,800rpm and away we went at a steady 4mph. I think it was a brilliant testament to the quality of this tractor, its engine and overall design."

A GOOD CRAIC!

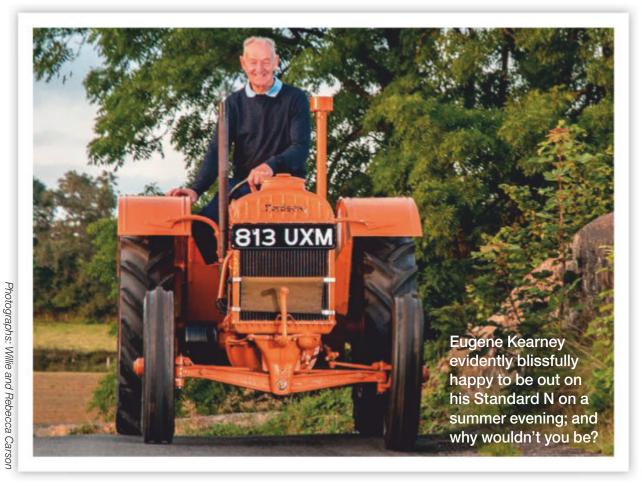
Willie Carson recalls a beautiful summer's evening spent in the Co Antrim countryside with a fine group of Standard N enthusiasts

eoffrey Mark explained to me how we came to be standing by a bridge over the Cloughwater River, in Co. Antrim, Northern Ireland, on a beautiful Monday evening back in August.

"I'd been thinking about a wee road run for the local Fordson Standards," he told me. "The idea had been in my head for a couple of years, but I'd never done anything about it until Bertie Johnston asked me to call over to see if I could help him and his grandson

"As it turned out, the mag timing needed some adjustment and, once we'd sorted that out, the conversation came around to the subject of a tractor run. Bertie has a good-sized yard, so it made sense to meet up at his place, then take in a wee run around the square, about five or six miles; plenty long enough given that the tractors would all be well over 70 years old!"

Geoffrey invited the Fordson Standard owners in the area and, on the night, nine tractors assembled in Bertie's yard. George Fulton made a stylish entrance with his N on a trailer, towed behind his pre-war Austin 20, while a Ford Model T and a Morris Cowley arrived to see them off, adding to the occasion.

Ewan led the small procession down the lane and around the narrow roads. The

pace was set to match the tractor with the standard, field-speed gearbox, which caused a problem for Geoffrey's machine. "My Fordson doesn't like to run at part throttle," he told me, "so it soon began to oil the plugs. Eventually, it stopped but, after it had cooled down, I tried it on petrol and it fired up again."

The only interloper among the Standard Ns was John McKibbin's E27N 'Upright Major'. However, halfway along the route, this tractor ground to a halt due to fuel starvation. But it didn't take long for the blockage to be located and dealt with, after which he was on his way once more. Geoffrey summed up these minor inconveniences: "If it all went to plan, sure we'd have nothing to talk about when we're old men!"

Back at the yard, Mrs Johnston was waiting with mugs of tea and some homebaked shortbread; a real treat with which to end a perfect summer evening's craic. ■

Crawler correction

However, I should add in passing that the yellow crawler shown on p46 that Gary was using was not a Cooper County Conversion, as stated, but one of only six of this type built by County at its Fleet factory, in Hampshire, during the early 1960s. These models were only made to special order.

They were powered by a 93hp Ford 590E industrial engine, which had an uprated cooling system and enlarged air intake. The six-cylinder CD50s have a

heavy-duty transmission plus a heavy-duty, three-point hydraulic linkage and drawbar. All this makes the model what's effectively a tracked version of the County Super-Six FWD.

According to County's records, Gary's tractor (Serial No. 363798), was delivered to Bennetts of Baldock, on April 2nd, 1964.

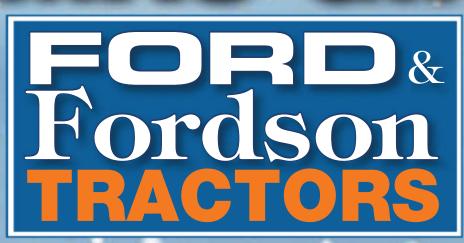

Michael Fisher reports from Northumberland, on his experiences at this year's British National Ploughing Championships

he 2021 British National
Ploughing Championship
took place over the weekend
of October 9th-10th, in the
stunning Northumberland countryside at
Mindrum Mill.

I was competing on Sunday in the Classic Reversible Class with a Ransomes TS81 coupled to my Ford 2600 tractor. My good friend, Darren Easter, was also taking part that day, with his Ford 3000 and Ransomes TS86 combination, in the Ford & Fordson Association Class. Darren and his brother, Tim – both from South Yorkshire – are very well known on the match ploughing circuit.

Local club

Darren, Tim and I are all members of the Barugh & District Ploughing Association (pronounced locally as 'bark'!), and have been ever since we were first recruited

in 2000. Our chairman is multiple world, European and British ploughing champion, John Hill, who Darren cites as his ploughing hero.

I competed in my first ploughing match in 1998; it was at Barugh & District's annual event held at Woolley, near Wakefield. Darren's first match was at a Pennine Tractor Club working weekend, held near Ackworth, for which he used a Ransomes MG6 crawler and TS42 plough.

Saturday at this year's Nationals ended up being wet, and several of the plots were unfortunately troubled with stones that caused a fair amount of problems for the ploughmen. However,

on Sunday the weather was lovely, with glorious sunshine floodlighting Northumberland's wonderfully mountainous landscape to great effect. This was also the day that Darren and I were competing.

All the tractors and ploughs were parked at their allotted numbers in the marshalling yard, ready for the parade to the plots before ploughing was due to start at 10am. Once at the plots, any surplus straw was cleared, poles were erected and final adjustments to the ploughs were made.

A tough challenge

As I began my first run, it quickly became clear that I'd got a challenging plot; I could hear the plough protesting as it battled with the stony ground. It wasn't the best start I've ever made, and the plot didn't get any better; I eventually ended up with a cracked

disc bracket and also pulled the rear frog slightly out of shape, due to the stones. That, in turn, caused my ploughing to be uneven and, sadly, I only finished 5th in the Classic Reversible Class.

Darren, on the other hand, coped a lot better in the Ford & Fordson Association class. Everything fell into place for him; no stones but still a

FOUR OF A KIND!

Chris Graham meets Jonathan Playfoot and his quartet of giant, Muir-Hill tractors

onathan Playfoot is living the tractor enthusiast's dream!
From boyhood, he had an unquenchable interest in virtually anything that relied on an engine and, such was his love of tractors that he decided that driving one was what he wanted to do for a living. However, his father had other ideas and – quite rightly, as it turned out – encouraged the young Jonathan down an

alternative career path.

He trained as a plasterer and ran a very successful business doing that for 16 years, after which back problems forced a change. It was at this point that he decided to join the family firm, East Sussex-based Playfoot Engineering. The company, which is based in rural Bodiam, specialises in the design and fabrication of just about anything that's made of metal plus onsite maintenance

and welding. So, whether you want structural girders for a new warehouse, the tubular frame for a dining room table or a new alternator bracket for a classic tractor, Jonathan's your man!

A clear passion

Take a stroll around Playfoot
Engineering's rambling, multi-level yard
and Jonathan's love of all things enginerelated soon becomes apparent.
Apart from the three Muir-Hills that are
impossible to miss, my guided tour also
revealed a varied assortment of other
tractors, a complex piece of mining

I decided to take the plunge, and that's how I ended up with four of these amazing machines!

equipment that was in for a service, a bright orange Austin 7, a stack of glass fibre Elva sportscar bodyshells (the Elva factory was in nearby Bexhill) plus more fascinating parts and components at every turn!

So, I was interested to find out how it all started for Jonathan, and what was at the root of his fascination with tractors? "I've had a keen interest in tractors of all sorts for as long as I can remember," he told me, "but, although I worked on farms at various times when I was a child, my family had no direct link with farming.

Early experience

"I got my first tractor back in the late 1980s, and it was a Zetor Crystal 8011. I had a lot of experience with these Czech-built machines – especially the Crystal – when I was younger, so have retained a soft spot for them ever since. The Muir-Hills didn't arrive until 2014 and, to be honest, my association with these machines all started from a chance encounter.

"I didn't have a specific interest in the make, but was obviously aware of the brand. I knew they were big, powerful machines, which made them appealing. We do some machining work for a local farmer called John Lister, over in Staplecross, and I've known him for many years. It was while visiting him one day, that he happened to show me a pair of his Muir-Hill tractors; a 1971 101 and a 1973 121.

"They were tucked away in a shed, and I remember being struck by the sheer scale of them both; they certainly made a big impression on me. What's

more, I also spotted another couple of 121s parked out in the yard - 1975 and 1976 Series 2 models – one of which was still being regularly used for grass topping on the farm.

"As I left, I mentioned to John that if ever he thought he might want to sell either of them, I'd be very interested in buying one. That's a remark that I often trot out to people if I spot something interesting during a site visit and, to be honest, I didn't think much more about it after that."

Incoming call

"Then, two weeks later, I got a call from John who wanted to know if I was serious about buying a Muir-Hill and when, on the spur of the moment I told him that I was, he invited me back to pick the one I wanted. Both models were very much in their working clothes, but were complete and standard, although the 101 had been fitted with a reduction 'box at some point during its working life – I think it had been used for

specialist drainage work, or pulling out tree stumps on the farm.

"After some thought, I opted for the 121, only because it was slightly newer and more my era. Then John explained that both machines had been driven into the shed 25 years earlier, parked and then not touched since. However, he promised that he'd be able to get the 121 running for me before he delivered it, which was good enough for me. Normally, with a 'barn find', it falls on the buyer to get the engine running (if possible) and then arrange to transport it off the site. In this case, though, John was happy to tackle this for me, and then deliver the tractor to me as part of the deal, which was brilliant.

"Then, a week or so later, I heard from John again, with the news that the 121 was running and movable, but that he had another question for me. He'd had a word with his son and now wanted to know if I'd like to buy the 101 as well? Well, my immediate reaction was that I shouldn't even have committed to the 121, let alone be considering another

one on top! So, I told John that it was time for a consultation with Yvonne.

"Fortunately, Yvonne fully appreciates my fascination with mechanical things. In fact, she's just as enthusiastic about driving and using old tractors as I am, and it didn't take us long to decide that owning 'his and her's Muir-Hills would be fun. So, we said 'yes to the 101, as well!"

Five weeks later there was another call from John. "This time he wanted to know if I fancied taking the other two 121s off his hands," Jonathan explained. "My instinctive reaction was to say no, but I also knew how irritating it is to miss an opportunity then spend the years afterwards ruing that decision. So, I decided to take the plunge, and that's how I ended up with four of these amazing machines!

Delivery day!

John was as good as his word and delivered the 1973 121 and the 101 to Jonathan's yard on the back of a low-loader. Both were able to start and reverse off the trailer under their own steam, although the brakes certainly weren't up to much, which made things interesting. He then went and picked up the second, two-tractor load; the 1975 121 now called *Daffny* because of its 180hp Daf lorry engine and very wide, tera tyres, and the 1976 121. We even had to cut a tree down along our drive so that Daffny would fit through.

"The two latest models arrived with a whole host of spare parts, including several wheels and many front weights, and, once everything was unloaded, even my extensive yard was starting to look a bit crowded! But it was great to have them all with me, and to know that

all four had been used on the same, East Sussex farm for many years.

All that took place nearly seven years ago, so I was interested to find out

more about what had happened to the Muir-Hill quartet since. It turns out there have been a few developments. "All four run," Jonathan told me, "but only two of them are currently road-legal – the 1973 121 that I use regularly at shows and on local road runs, and the cabless 1971 101 that's Yvonne's tractor, which she calls *Russell*.

"However, we had a problem with

"However, we had a problem with the engine fitted in the 1976 121, which developed a problem with its fuel lift pump. Yvonne was driving it and, unbeknown to her, the pump failed and dumped a load of diesel into the sump. This got circulated around the engine and caused some quite serious internal damage before she realised what was happening. That tractor is awaiting an engine rebuild, although it still runs and can be moved about the yard, if needs be.

"That happened a week before our local Rural Pastimes show in 2014, at which the tractor was scheduled to make an appearance. So, we spent our evenings for the following five days working late into the night to bring the roadworthy 1973 121 up to scratch, so that it could take the 1976 121's place at the show. This involved fitting another radiator plus brake slave and master cylinders, and swapping some wheels around.

"The 1973 121 had to be fitted with a replacement, low-hours, Ford 2715 engine, which I got out of a generator. Yvonne's 101 is currently in bits because one of the shafts in the reduction box

has worn its splines. We were alerted to this by the noise it was making and, once stripped, the wear-related damage was clear to see – the cast, female part of the spline has simply been stripped of its teeth.

"The main gearbox will be rebuilt and, because the tractor is already in four pieces, I'm going to take the opportunity of cleaning, prepping and then painting it. We're also getting the 1975 180hp 121 ready for our local, Boxing Day tractor run, with the work needed centring on the radiator, brakes, lights and tyres.

General thoughts

Although Jonathan stumbled upon his four Muir-Hills by chance, he was well aware of the Manchester then Gloucester-based manufacturer, and has a particular childhood memory of the

big, yellow machines. "I can remember a local driver – Tom Thomas – who helped out at Southover Contractors when I was growing up. That company ran a couple of Muir-Hills and a County and, although I never got the chance to drive any of them, I do recall taking photographs of the 121s as they worked." Clearly, then, the Muir-Hill seeds were sown in Jonathan's brain at an early age!

Now, with the benefit of plenty of Muir-Hill ownership experience, Jonathan is well placed to comment on the marque, generally. "The way the market is at the moment, there's no doubt that County tractors are at the top of the desirability tree," he told me. "They're just incredibly sought-after at the moment and prices have gone through the roof.

"However, I consider that, in pure engineering terms, the Muir-Hill is a superior machine. It's my impression that a lot more thought was put into the design of models like the 101 and 121, than was the case with County

equivalents. For example, the Muir-Hill's drop box, which allows for a center drive to the front axle, delivers a genuine, practical advantage. A Muir-Hill's turning circle is much tighter than that offered by the County alternative, and I think that that additional maneuverability is a really useful benefit out in the real world."

Marketing triumph

"Nevertheless, for whatever reason, County grabbed the high ground in marketing terms, built a strong reputation and has been top of the tree ever since. It's now regarded as the Rolls-Royce of the four-wheel-drive conversions, and that position seems to be set in stone. I'm sure that the close link with Ford did much to help establish a good image early on, even though Muir-Hill used Ford skid units, as well.

"I'm not sure how many Muir-Hills were made altogether, but know that production began in 1966, with the 101 model. The 121 followed a few years

later, and was upgraded to the Series 3 in about 1976. There was also the 110/111 model, which was powered by a Perkins diesel engine. The company introduced the 161 in 1969 and 171 in 1975, which were powered by Perkins V8s but, by this stage, I don't think that the tractors were built around Ford skid units. Although the V8 models certainly delivered a lot of horsepower, they were a bit of a 'bitsa' in terms of the components used.

"A decent number of Muir-Hills were built, but nothing approaching the number that left the County factory in Fleet. However, the name lives on as the company was bought by Lloyd Loaders – I think in the 1990s – and, although no tractors are produced anymore, the company does still sell Muir-Hill parts from its base in Halifax. What's more, we now make some parts for them to sell, as we have the skills and machinery here to batch-produce components in limited numbers."

Original appearance

I find it refreshing that Jonathan isn't obsessed with bringing his tractors back to Concours-like condition. In fact, he's more than happy to drive and use them in their working clothes. "I have no problem with taking them to shows and events in their unrestored condition," he

explained, "as I think that their current appearance reflects what they are; tractors that are about 50 years old and that have worked hard during that time.

"While I'm sure that I'll eventually get around to smartening them up, I certainly won't be undertaking nut and bolt-type, two-pack paint restorations. Tractors are utility vehicles that were designed to do a job of work in a tough environment, and I see little point in restoring them to a condition that's better than they ever were when new.

"When the lockdown hit last year, I thought that it would provide an ideal opportunity to really crack on with some renovation work on the Muir-Hills, so rushed out and bought all the primer, undercoat and Muir-Hill yellow topcoat that I would need to paint them. As it turned out, though, I'd furloughed several members of staff and, because the orders then started flooding in, I found myself busier than ever, and had no time to do anything with the tractors!

"However, I'm determined to make progress with them, and have all the work needed mapped out in my mind. We have a CNC plasma cutting machine in the workshop, so creating the panels I'll need to restore the cabs isn't a problem. It's simply a case of finding the spare time needed to get things moving. The trouble is, I've got plenty of other tractor-related projects on the go so, as always, it's a matter of juggling priorities. In the meantime, I'm delighted that I bought all four of these brilliant machines when I had the chance and am convinced that I did the right thing."



All the cabs on Jonathan's Muir-Hills are in need of serious work. Fortunately, his company possesses a CNC plasma cutting machine, which should make short work of cutting out the panel sections needed to replace the corroded areas.

SUPER DEXTA ENGINE SWAP!



One solution to a tired old Dexta motor is to replace it with a 'short engine', which consists of a new block that's supplied with a new crankshaft, pistons, liners and bearings all already fitted.

Is your Super Dexta suffering with a tired or damaged engine? Ben Philips offers hints and tips on rectifying the problem with a new, 'short engine'

and-blasting is a brilliant technique for highlighting problems. Surfaces are stripped bare to reveal whatever defects are present, but were previously hidden from view by layers of paint and grime. When I had Tony Chambers' Fordson Super Dexta sand-blasted before I painted it, I had a look at the Perkins engine block. Being familiar with these blocks, I know where they crack and, sure enough, I could see one.

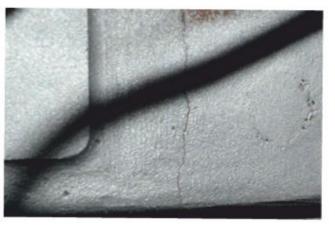
The crack wasn't very wide or long, but it had probably been caused

by the action of frost. I concluded this because the damage was close to a water jacket and, in addition, the cylinder head was obviously new (it was still painted in black).

If there's only one thing you do after reading this article, it should be to go and check the antifreeze concentration in your tractor's cooling system. Testers can be bought easily and cheaply, and anyone can dip a radiator.

Typical block damage

Normally, cracks of this sort run horizontally, somewhere behind

the injector pump but, in this case, the one I found was vertical. As it wasn't long since the tractor had been sand-blasted, and the engine still had some water in the block, moisture was still weeping from the crack. Obviously, having a crack in an engine is never good news, and there are a few options to choose between when it comes to putting it right.

After talking through what I'd found

with Tony, he told me that he needed a day or so to decide what to do. So, in the meantime I sprayed the whole lot in red oxide then waited for further instructions. When I heard back, he'd decided to buy a new 'short' engine, consisting of a new block, with a new crankshaft, pistons, liners and bearings all fitted.

There were quite a few items that needed to be carried over from the old engine so, while I was waiting for the new engine to arrive, I began stripping the components I needed off the original unit. The first job was to remove the injectors that, together with the Simms injector pump, were to be sent for overhaul at Dieselec, in Ditton Priors. Whichever engine I'm rebuilding, I always make a point of getting these important, fuel-delivery components professionally overhauled by a specialist that I know I can trust.

The injectors often need a gentle prise to encourage them out, and I find that either a flat-headed screwdriver or, as in this case, a ball-joint separator, generally prove ideal at this stage. Various oil and fuel pipes needed to be removed from the old engine; the one that runs up from the block and into the back of the cylinder head (just above the starter motor) mustn't be overlooked.

A look inside

Removing the rocker cover gave me the first opportunity to look inside the old engine and, as far as I could tell, the top end looked OK. Yes, it was certainly black with oil but, as previously mentioned, the cylinder head was newer than the block. Tony confirmed to me that it had been replaced due to the engine being frost-damaged and, obviously, the block had been caught at the same time. There are four nuts that hold the rocker shaft in place, and there's an important oil pipe union at the rear that needs to be saved and transferred to the new engine.

I got an even better view of the engine's internals once I'd lifted off the cylinder head and, sure enough, it was clear that a thorough overhaul was very much needed. I could see that the bores were quite badly glazed and, although I've seen worse, these weren't great. Knowing that the new engine had the pistons and crank already fitted, I didn't have to spend time removing

trying to lift the rocker shaft clear, I remembered to remove this oil feed union; it's the other end of the 'hidden' pipe that I mentioned earlier.



This hose will almost certainly restrict the cylinder head as it's lifted clear, so it's best to remove it first.



Knowing that the engine needed to be removed, I first stripped off most of what I could from the block, starting with this oil filter.

the old components, so my attention turned to the bottom of the engine.

The sumps on these engines are solidly made and relatively heavy, so using a jack to lower it clear is always a sensible move. Sitting below the

top level of the sump is the oil pump and, although I wasn't going to need the old pump, I did require the two pipes that connect to it. One of these is fitted with a round gauze that sits deep in the sump to draw oil out, while the other one runs from the pump to carry the oil into the engine block. I like to extract both of these before I remove the engine, so there's no risk of either getting damaged – they are vulnerable without the sump in place.

Moving to the front

At the front of the engine, the timing case was another component that would be needed on the new motor so, although the gears already have scribe marks around the edge, I like to add my own marks to be doubly safe. I use dabs of different coloured paint, which ensures easy and speedy reassembly. The biggest centre gear now had three different coloured dots

spaced around its circumference, corresponding to the crank at the bottom, the diesel pump on the right and the camshaft at the top. This centre gear has a tab washer and a centre bolt that need to be undone before the gear can be slid off its boss.

Removing all the gears revealed the collection of bolts that secure the timing case to the block. As you can imagine, these are always pretty oily, so a decent clean-up is necessary. By this stage, with most of the components I needed already removed, the engine block was starting to look rather small, and it was time to remove the block from the tractor.

Having a decent engine crane is essential for this job, but I'd also recommend the use of an engine leveller. This is a clever piece of kit that ensures that the engine is safely balanced before the main lift begins, and the engine starts being prised

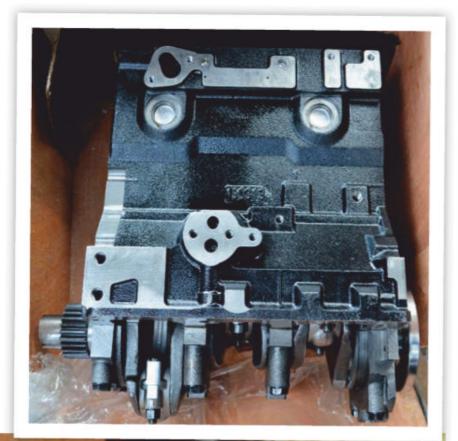
off the input shaft. With the unit free, balanced and suspended by the crane in mid-air, it could be lowered safely down onto a pallet, and the clutch assembly was revealed. Judging by wear levels showing on the toggle adjustment bolts, a new one was going to be another welcomed addition.

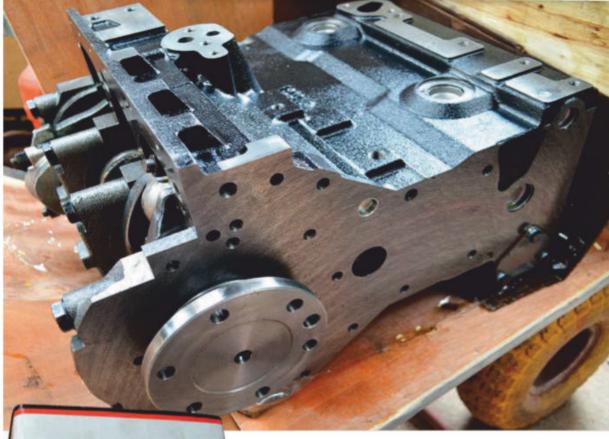
By this stage the new, short motor had arrived, which was well packaged and could be built up fairly comprehensively before being hoisted back into its new home. When buying one of these short motors, you'll also need a new cylinder head stud kit, plus a few more items to make reassembly as easy as possible. In this case, these included a rear crank seal and housing, an oil pressure sensor, some oil pipe union right-angles and a crankshaft key.

Having sourced these extra components, I was ready to crack-on with the rebuild, which the photo sequence here illustrates. ■

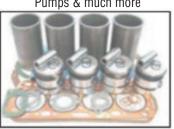

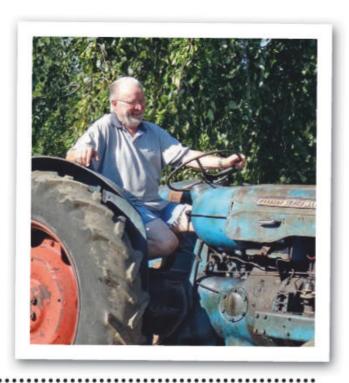

TRACTOR BUYER BEWARE!

Buying a tractor is usually fairly straightforward, as long as you know what to look for or, if you don't, you take a pal with you who does. The decision of whether to buy or walk away usually boils down to, condition, asking price and, to use an old auctioneer's expression, 'If it fills the eye'. But not in every case.

Registering a tractor that has a number plate but no V5C, should be reasonably painless. First, look on the DVLA website to see if there's a record for it and, if you find one, complete a V62 form and submit it with £25. Simple?

Apparently not for the owner of a very nice looking 4610, who took this route; but it didn't end well. Caveat emptor, that well-known Latin phrase meaning 'Let the buyer beware', suddenly took on a very sinister twist. Produced below are three extracts from the DVLA's response to his application:

- According to our records, an insurance company has notified us that it's been 'accident damaged', and classed as either category A or B. This means that the vehicle is only suitable for scrap or spare parts. It must not be driven on the road again.
- The vehicle should have gone to an Authorised Treatment Facility (AFT) and been destroyed, not sold to you.



A tractor that officially no longer exists; any tractor buyer's worst nightmare!

You should take the vehicle to your nearest AFT for them to destroy it legitimately.

The prime reason for legislation regarding insurance 'write-offs' is to keep unroadworthy vehicles off the road, by preventing what the press often described as 'cut and shut' repairs re-entering service. However, one may question if this should be rigorously applied to tractors. The owner subsequently discovered that the tractor had been fire-damaged but, as it both looked and drove well, he wondered if he could legitimise its use, despite the DVLA's letter?

I contacted Ian Edmunds, DVLA liaison manager for the FBHVC, for some guidance and, as usual, received a quick and very comprehensive reply, the bones of which were that short of the insurance company concerned being prepared to revise its assessment – which he thought unlikely – there was little chance of the DVLA changing its position. I passed this on to the owner and, I think that the whole episode should provide a salutary lesson to us all.

plus the Princes' Pool Ferry Power Major.

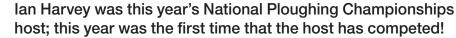

UPDATE FROM CANADA

I always look forward to lan's contributions, and know many of you do, too. I was particularly interested in the crop insurance aspects he mentioned last time as, for the average UK arable farmer that option – at a sensible cost – has never been available here, to the best of my knowledge. On the other hand, we don't suffer from the weather extremes that Canadian farmers like lan have to deal with. Anyway, here's some more fascinating insight from lan.

Yes, in a year of turmoil weatherwise, we're fortunate to have the government's backing in a limited form through our Crop Insurance programme. Essentially, it's based on an individual farmer's production history, which is individually indexed over a minimum of seven years. Thereafter, one can elect coverage from 60 to 80%

of your established yield histories.

During one's phase-in period, up to the seven-year benchmark, Township Area averages are used, with an increasing emphasis on the producer's production numbers as the years pass. To all intents and purposes, the programme is selfpolicing in that premium discounts or penalties apply based on claims history.

With today's land, machinery and building costs, all financial institutions demand that farmers are enrolled to protect their (banks!) interests. The main insurer here is partly subsidised by both our provincial and federal governments, as I mentioned previously. More seasoned producers sometimes opt for private insurers, but coverage through this avenue is limited to hailstorms without a production shortfall otherwise.

During the years between 2009 and

2014, I worked as a crop insurance assessor in addition to running the farm, which I thoroughly enjoyed; apart from the final year when an increasing emphasis was placed on modern technology with a diminishing level of good, old-fashioned common sense approach (sound familiar?). I'm sure I'm right in saying that, here in Canada, we're certainly nowhere close to the European level of agricultural subsidies, or what's offered in the USA, for that matter. I know at one point several vears ago, some 80% of the total EU budget was directed towards agriculture which, over time, may have been reduced. Here, our token government support is for a limited amount of last-resort lending, plus some insurance programmes - that's as far as it goes in Canada. Anyway, just another tit-bit for your interest!

THE NEWARK SHOW

The Newark Vintage Tractor & Heritage Show returned to the calendar on November 13th-14th and, this time, I was liaising with the showground and directing the FFA's contribution.

What a spectacular weekend it was to be back at the Newark show, with visitors and exhibitors from all around the UK in attendance. Our club was asked to exhibit in the Feature Marquee, with the carry-over of the E27N anniversary, the Ford and Fordson derivatives as well as the 50 years of the Ford 7000 celebration.

Our members certainly did the club proud with the variety of machines they provided; everything from beautifully original, 'working clothes' exhibits all the way to pristine, Concours d'elegance

examples. The model range on show was amazing, with everything from a 1933 Fordson N to a New Holland T7 guaranteeing something for everyone's interest. Outside the marquee, there was a tiny Ford 1210 parked next to a massive Ford FW60 (complete with a 10-furrow reversible plough).

An 'industrial section' included a New Holland Tele Handler, Fordson Major cranes and winches, a Whitlock digger and a rare, 1940 Muir-Hill dumper.
Commercials were represented by a restored Ford D Series lorry, a Ford

Cargo living van and two very rare County 4WD Transit conversions. One member even turned up with a trailer that had been converted to a people carrier for road runs, with proper, coach-type seats and seat belts, opening sides and a paint job that matched the Dexta towing it!

Looking back on both days, I think I can safely say that we've never been so busy. At times we struggled to keep the hot water flowing for the refreshments. Up to four people were needed at times to staff the merchandise stand, and the



membership table was also extremely busy, with many renewals taken and 41 new members joining the club.

I always enjoy taking time to look closely at other people's tractors, just to see what unusual and interesting details I can spot. A few things that caught my eye this time included the power steering set-up on David Thomas's E27N, with the oil pump being driven by the dynamo; not original, but it certainly looked it.

I also noticed that Arthur Musk had an extra lever on the left of his E27N's rear axle casing, which turned out to be the Darlington 'diff lock engagement lever; a very rare attachment. John Haywood had carried out a few modifications to his E27N, including the fitting of a Ford Powerstar engine plus different parts from, I thought, 58 other machines! But a very professional job, nonetheless.

If you drive a double-clutch Dexta, the pedal operation can be awkward to operate but, on Paul Thundercliffe's example, he's made and fitted a much more driver-friendly pedal arrangement.

The yellow, Fordson Major crane tractor had been built by old Ford dealer, Friskneys of Lincolnshire, for duties around its yard. New Holland dealer, Burdens, had supported us with a New Holland T4, a T6, a T7 and a Tele Handler; all of which certainly illustrated how far tractors have progressed. Incidentally, the enormous FW60 mentioned earlier isn't

NEWARK IS BACK!

t was good to be back at the Newark Vintage Tractor & Heritage Show November 13th-14th) which, as always, was organised by the Newark & Nottinghamshire Agricultural Society.

There was a new, bright and fresh look to this show since we were here last in 2019: we all knew it would not be quite as big as in previous years owing the covid situation, but the final product was just excellent.

Gone was the line of 'dreaded' feature marquees, which were not very welcoming, and uninspiring, damp and normally very cold. In their place was the sale area on the Saturday and on Sunday the tractor autojumble. It worked so much better with just one feature marquee where Ford and Fordson, David Brown and The Ferguson Club were placed inside, with a fine Fordson-related display outside, with lots of work by James Hardstaff and others making it a very attractive area to visit.



This now Scottish-based, originalstyle Ford 7000 went on to take the 7000 award at the Newark show.

The George Stephenson Exhibition Hall featured the 25th anniversary of the Fordson 500, which was a great event at which 1,002 Ford and Fordson tractors gathered, back in 1996, in Newark. That, unsurprisingly, was the greatest number of these tractors ever seen together in preservation times.

The winners in the Fordson 500 section were the green-painted, 1938, Dan Bartle, steel-wheeled N, with patched block, plus Michael Hart's 1956 Fordson Diesel E1A Major; both presented in working style.

However, the outstanding tractor in the hall for me (although I don't think it attended the Fordson 500), was spotted on the NVTEC Notts Group's stand, looking magnificent. It came from great Fordson collector, Paul Marsden, from Derbyshire, and was a 1938 Standard N and period trailer. The tractor had come

via Scotland and, out of the 25 people I unofficially polled about their favourite machine, it beat the rest by far.

Other winners in the building included Dan Stephenson's 1973 County 1164 (the JHM Automotive Concours D'Elegance winner) and Fraser Reid's 1969 Ford Force 5000 Salene-axled machine (Best under 25-year-old prize).

Unfortunately, the Browns sale didn't really excite me overall, although one lot – a Fordson E1A Major – did catch my eye. The story goes that after the manager at JT Friskney of Horncastle had refused a staff request for a new mobile crane, they went ahead and built one in-house. They converted a worn out E1A into a crane that went on to clock up 404 hours in that role. This was the machine being sold here and, by the look of it, it was still in its works condition. It went on to sell for a very good £3,000.

There was some great machinery to be found in the Feature Marque,

which was rather dark in places. The winners here included David Yates' 1948 Fordson E27N for '75 Years of Fordson E27N', Ciaran Dreelan's 1975 Ford 7000 for '50 Years of Ford 7000', and Peter Bainbridge's 1968 County 754, which won the Yarwood-Hardstaff 'Best Fordson Derivative' cup. The Ford & Fordson Association's stand did excellent business, selling plenty of merchandise, including bookazines and 2022 calendars, and adding plenty of new members.

There were other interesting Ford and Fordson tractors to be seen dotted around the sight, but not many of the later classics, which was a shame.

FORDS DOMINATE AT CHEFFINS COLLECTIVE

heffins offered just over 180 tractors at its final 'Vintage Collective' of 2021, which took place on October 23rd at Sutton, in Cambridgeshire. The weather was dry and reasonably warm and nearly half of the tractors being sold came from the 'blue' family.

All the County stock did well, as you would expect these days, and two of the lots had been imported from the USA. The 1977 County 4600-Four didn't excite buyers in the flesh as much as it had in the catalogue; it didn't have a cab or roll bar (as it should, officially) and this was reflected in its final selling price of £7,200.

Other notable Countys to sell included a 1965 County Super-Six (import) in original style that made £17,000 (+ VAT), a 1964 Super-Six (imported and in bits) which sold for £6,800 and a 1981 FC 100FC in restoration condition that moved on for £4,800.

Among the Fords being offered, some of the 10 Series machines really performed well, the nicest of which was a 1984 2910 two-wheel-drive with

129 County Super-6 was a UK import and went on to change hands at £17,000 + VAT.

LP cab. Originally supplied by Curtis & Horn, it was in lovely, original condition, and made £9,000 (+ VAT). But the best price was paid for a 1986 Ford 6610 two-wheel-drive Series II, with Super Q

cab and only 991 hours on the clock. It looked as though some respray work had been undertaken and this machine sold for a thumping £22,500 (+ VAT).

couple of record sale prices achieved for a 1984 2910 2WD LP Curtis & Horn, which made £9,000 (+ VAT), a 1986 Ford 6610 2WD Series II with Super Q cab and only 991 hours on the clock, that sold for £22,500 (+

VAT), plus a decent-looking, 1991 Ford 8210 Series III 4WD with Super Q cab and 3,819 hours (Danish import) on which the hammer fell at £15,500 (+ VAT).

There was a decent selection of Fordsons sold on the day, with the favourite for many being the 1955 Diesel Major with its wooden Duncan cab. This tractor, in good, original condition, sold for £6,600. Driven away with lots of blue smoke billowing from its Perkins P6 engine, was a 1949 E27N Major that went for £7,500, while a Lambourn-cabbed version of the same model, complete with a Ransomes Robin plough failed to sell after the bidding stalled at £8,000. It was a similar story for a very original E1A Major petrol/paraffin, for which the highest bid was an unsuccessful £5,000.

The star of the show for Roadless

enthusiasts was a very carefully restored, 1963 6/4, that had been new to JG Phillips of Wiltshire and spent much of its working life in forestry work. This tractor which, for some reason, carries a 1968 registration,

sold for a record-breaking £40,000, despite its polished injection pipes and CAV pump, which weren't to everyone's taste. The restoration was obviously very fastidious and perhaps over the top for some.

Other Roadless notables in the sale included a part-restored, 1969 Ploughmaster 75 that made £10,800, a 1971 Ploughmaster 95 that moved on for £15,000 and a 1979 980 4WD that sold for £18,500.

The online aspect of this sale, which concluded on October 25th, saw some stunning, original implements being offered. I particularly liked the Fordson Dexta Ransomes-Ford 1012 two-furrow mounted hydraulic discs, that sold for £3,400. There was also a two-furrow reversible from the same family – a 1016 model with YL183 boards - that had last been used at the 2008 National Ploughing Championships, which made £4,100.

Other Ransomes sellers included a three-furrow for £480, a TS91 fivefurrow for £850, a Ransomes-Ford Robin 1013 with YL183 bodies for £850 and a five-furrow for £850.

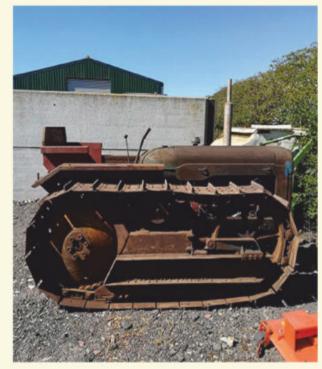

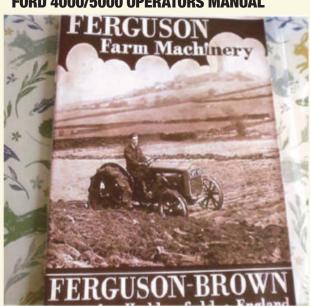
