Big Bud

Big Equipment Co., of Montana, has announced that it has partnered with Rome Agricultural and Construction Equipment, of Georgia, to build a new HD Big Bud tractor – to be released in March at the CONEXPO-CON/AGG event in Las Vegas.

The new tractor will feature a Caterpillar C-18 engine capable of 640-750hp, a Caterpillar TA22 HD 18-speed powershift transmission, Caterpillar 988 HD axles and a 1.5in-thick frame, bringing the tractor's weight to 70,000lb (31,751kg).

There will be various wheel/tyre options, including Titan LSW 1100/45R 46 super single tyres. The LSW is a Low Sidewall Tyre, featuring a larger rim diameter and smaller sidewall.

Middle East expansion

Euro Auctions Group, operator of auction sites for industrial plant, construction equipment and agricultural machinery in the United Kingdom, Germany, Spain, Australia, Middle East, and the USA, has expanded its global operation with the establishment of the largest auction house in the United Arab Emirates.

The new facility extends to more than 43,000 square metres, with facilities for handling all aspects associated with the sale of industrial plant, construction, and agricultural machinery, from transportation to minor repairs.

Pink Dexta

nna Griffiths, from Edinburgh, has restored a Fordson Dexta and painted it pink to raise awareness for Dementia UK. She has been fundraising for the last year and reached almost £500, but would like to reach £1,000 by the end of 2023.

Having worked in a care home during the Covid-19 lockdowns, that specialised in end-of-life care and dementia cases, Anna's attention was drawn to the plight of people suffering from this debilitating condition. According to the Dementia UK website: "Dementia is an umbrella term for a range of progressive conditions that affect the brain. Each type of dementia stops a person's brain cells (neurones) working properly in specific areas, affecting their ability to remember, think and speak.

"Doctors typically use the word 'dementia' to describe common symptoms – such as memory loss, confusion, and problems with speech and understanding – that get worse over time.

"Dementia can affect a person at any age, but it's more common in people over the age of 65."

UK agricultural tractor registrations

DETAILS FROM THE
AGRICULTURAL ENGINEERS
ASSOCIATION reveal that the
number of UK tractor
registrations in 2022 was
11,580 machines – a four per
cent year-on-year decrease.

The average power of all agricultural tractors registered in the UK in 2022 was 168.4hp, which was slightly higher than the previous year (166.3hp) but was below the record high reached in 2020 (171.0hp), when the market was disrupted by Covid-19.

There are signs that the long-term upward trend in tractor powers has slowed in recent years, although the widespread

disruptions since the onset of the pandemic may be having an effect.

Looking at individual power bands, the main decline in registrations was for machines below 140hp, for which 13 per cent fewer tractors were recorded in 2022 than in the previous year. Above 140hp, registrations increased, compared with 2021, although there was a decline for the largest machines, those over 260hp, which account for a little over six per cent of total registrations.

Registrations declined in most English regions, except for the Home Counties (including London), Yorkshire and the Humber and West Midlands. The three regions with the highest number of registrations – the South-West, East of England and North-West – all recorded year-on-year declines between 2021 and 2022, though, while the sharpest fall was in the South-East.

Scotland and Wales also saw lower registrations in the latest year but there slightly more machines recorded in Northern Ireland than in the previous year. The latter was a result of a big increase in the final quarter of the year, a period during which UK-wide registrations were more than five per cent higher than in the equivalent period of 2021, reversing the trend seen earlier in the year.

Methane-powered tractor supported by Eminox

pioneering project, which will see the creation of the world's first 'fugitive liquid', methane-powered, off-road, heavy-duty tractor, is to be supported with an Eminox emissions reduction solution.

The £15.6m project led by CNH Industrial, Eminox, along with other consortium members Bennamann Ltd. and European Thermodynamics Ltd., forms part of the £73m Advanced Propulsion Centre (APC) UK funding, which has been award to five different automotive projects to develop clean transport technology.

"This is a truly innovative project, and we are delighted to be part of the team that will develop a pioneering and game changing, net-zero alternative for the agricultural sector," said Stefano Tumolo, Sales and Marketing Director, Eminox. "The heavy-duty agricultural vehicle will harness the potential of methane, produced by livestock, and utilise it as a renewable fuel solution."

One of five projects funded by APC, it is expected that the combined projects will save the CO_2 equivalent emissions of nearly one million cars over their lifetimes.

A mass-produced RARITY!

Jonathan Whitlam locates a fine example of Ford's 5600.

he Ford Motor Company built its reputation on mass producing vehicles; be it cars, trucks, vans, or tractors. This meant that even vehicles that did not sell in as vast quantities as the more popular models were still constructed in large numbers. Therefore, finding a Ford tractor, for example, that is not as common as the rest is perhaps not as easy as with some other manufacturers' products.

In 1975 Ford was forced to launch a new range of models, to replace its main 37-98hp series of tractors, without their biggest new feature yet ready to go into production. The result was what Ford called the 7A1 range – and every single model in that range is rarer than the later versions produced from the middle of 1976. One of the least common models from this whole range was the 68hp 5600.

SUPERB EXAMPLE

To find an original example of the first version of the 5600 is not an easy task, but thankfully collector Jonathan Putterill, from near Holbeach in Lincolnshire, owns a particularly nice example that also gets to flex its muscles regularly, doing work around the family smallholding and at working events.

Jonathan has owned his 5600 for nearly 15 years and bought it from Westlake Plough Parts, after going to collect some parts and seeing it for sale in the yard. Jonathan knew this was a rather unusual machine and so did a deal there and

then and bought the tractor for £5,000, which was considered quite a price back then – but seems quite reasonable today!

Jonathan is not sure of the details of the 5600's history, except for the fact that it was a Lincolnshire-registered tractor from new in 1976 and had worked on a farm not far away for a time, complete with a heavy-duty loader. A sticker inside the cab seems to indicate it may have been once owned by Eastern Electricity. Whatever its history, one thing is for sure, it had not done a great deal of work and had been looked after. It is in very original condition with only the usual pieces of wear and tear here and there, which you would expect for a nearly 50-year old machine.

It is also a deluxe version of the 5600, featuring the full Fieco safety cab and Dual Power transmission, as well as a set of wheel weights that appear to have been new with the tractor. Since owning it, Jonathan has only had to fit a hydraulic pump in the back end, except for regular maintenance of course. He also fitted a genuine Ford toolbox too.

So why is this tractor any different from thousands of other Ford tractors produced around this time? Well, to answer that we need to dig a bit into the history of the Ford tractor in the mid-1970s.

BEHIND SCHEDULE

After Ford introduced the successful 6X range in 1964, and then improved it with the updated Ford Force (6Y) range in 1968, it was the introduction of safety cabs during 1970 that caused the most significant change to the Ford tractor line.

To comply with the new legislation that decreed that new tractors had to be supplied with a rollover protective structure, Ford had to finally offer a cab as a complete package with its tractors.

Previously, various weather cabs had been available for fitting to tractors by dealers and then Ford standardised on a smart design of weather cab built by Weathershield to be fitted to its 1000 Series range. This cab comprised a metal frame with lots of canvas, and although basic it was certainly preferable to not having any protection from the elements. Now Ford had to come up with something much better, and much safer.

It turned to its industrial division, based in Copenhagen, called the Ford Industrial Equipment Company – more often known by the acronym 'FIECO' (usually referred to as Fieco), which designed the safety cab. The result was aesthetically pleasing and matched the design of the Ford Force range very well.

During 1970, Ford tractors began to emerge from the Basildon factory complete with the new safety cabs, the smaller three-cylinder models having a flexible cab roof, while the larger models had a rigid roof. The doors, although not large, allowed for reasonable access to and from the cab and the side windows were openable. A rear windscreen with fully enclosed bottom section was also offered as a deluxe version of the cab, the

fully equipped versions usually being reserved for the 5000 and 7000 models.

The new look of these tractors with their cabs soon became an iconic sight throughout the 1970s. The cab was ideal for the purpose it was designed for – protecting the operator in the case of a rollover accident. It was also pretty good at protecting the operator from the elements and in inclement conditions kept the wind and rain out extremely well. In warmer conditions it did tend to become something of a hot box, but this could be alleviated by the removal of both doors, therefore providing plenty of ventilation.

A downside of the cab was the noise and vibration it produced. This was inevitable, as the cab was mounted straight onto the machine and therefore all the vibration from the engine and transmission was passed on directly to the metal frame and then amplified by the box-like structure, making the noise at the driver's ear very loud indeed! Many that drove these tractors in their heyday are now partially deaf because of this!

This was not a problem that was exclusive to the Ford cabs – far from it! All the various safety cabs produced by tractor manufacturers and independent producers were all causing the same issue, and this is what led to the second piece of legislation regarding tractor cabs: that of reducing the noise at the driver's ear within the cab itself.

It was decided that, at least in the UK, tractor manufacturers would have to supply new tractors with an approved quiet cab, that was also a safety cab, by the middle of 1976. This was quite a tall order, as it would entail designing cabs from scratch to meet the new requirements, such was the low level of noise that was being requested by the legislators.

This led to a lot of research and development by Ford, as well as the other manufacturers. Ford quickly decided to design a brand-new cab that could be married up to the tractor chassis, but isolated from it, therefore reducing noise and vibration. Designed from a clean sheet of paper, what would become known as the Ford 'Q' cab (or 'bubble' cab as it was called by many – due to its curved lines) was a superb answer to the problems presented by the new regulations. It was not cheap though, and worse still, it was soon behind schedule.

Ford had redesigned its range slightly to make use of the new quiet cab upgrades and the 7A range was almost ready to go in 1975 when it had been expected that the new 'Q' cabs would also begin production. Sadly, the latter was not to be, as problems with the design in final testing led to the 'Q' cab being delayed until the following year.

Undeterred, Ford went ahead with the launch of its new tractor range, replacing

all the models in the main three- and four-cylinder line-up with new versions – although they all still used the old Fieco safety cab – albeit in deluxe form.

This was called the 7A1 range by Ford, but quickly became known as the 600 Series by virtually everyone else!

7A1 RANGE

Replacing the very successful Force range was quite a daunting task, but Ford successfully made the transition, and indeed sales increased with the introduction of the new models. The three-cylinder line-up consisted of the 2600, 3600, 4100 and 4600, while the four-cylinder tractors were the 5600, 6600 and 7600. The new model numbers broadly followed those of the older tractors they were replacing: the 2600 replacing the 2000, 3600 the 3000, 4600 the 4000 and so on.

The 4100 was a new model, as could be seen by the different number sequence, but the 5000 was replaced by two models: the 5600 and 6600. Technically, the 6600 was really the successor to the 5000 in that it was the

largest four-cylinder model not to be fitted with a turbocharger.

This made the 68hp 5600 something of an odd one out and indeed most purchasers opted to go for the 78hp 6600 or the smaller 62hp 4600, seeing the 5600 as somewhat irrelevant. Not everyone did, as this size of four-cylinder tractor was seen as ideal by some farmers and was therefore chosen by them, often when the farms were small enough that this would be their 'big' tractor. For them it was certainly large enough to meet their requirements.

Despite this, the 4600 and 6600 remained the most popular choices throughout the short production life of the 7A1 models, and indeed continued to be so after the introduction of the new 7A2 range in 1976.

The 5600 was a very competent tractor, with its 3.6-litre engine being unstressed from a 68hp power rating. It is really the 5600 that is the spiritual successor to the 5000 when it comes to its power output and overall specification.

Just as with the 5000, the 5600 was offered with a choice of two

transmissions: the standard eight-speed gearbox or the Dual Power 16-speed option, the latter giving a high and low split in each of the main ratios that was changeable on the move by means of a small lever mounted on the dashboard.

Inside the Fieco cab, any driver of a 5000 would find everything familiar, with the same dashboard being used as before and mostly the same layout of controls. The driving 'feel' of the 5600 was very similar indeed to that of the erstwhile 5000 in every respect.

Externally the tractor looked the same too, but brand-new decals along both sides of the bonnet made them look very different. The radiator itself, with the inset front headlights at the bottom and the 'FORD' name at the top, were, on the face of it, the same as before, but the grille was now a single piece from top to bottom instead of the two-piece design used on the Force tractors.

All this certainly made the 5600 appear different to its predecessor and the whole 600 Series received the same bonnet treatment, giving them a family look, just as with the Force range

before them. The farming public got its first look at the new range at the Royal Smithfield Show in December 1975, and orders flooded in almost immediately.

SHORT LIFE

The 7A1 range was only intended to have a limited life, and in due course the 7A2 range, complete with new 'Q' cab, duly arrived in May 1976. The Fieco cab was finally discontinued, after six years gracing Ford tractors. The new 7A2 range was the same as the 7A1, except for the 'Q' cab, which also required new curved rear mudguards that were part of the cab design.

The new tractors were immediately successful, even despite the extra cost that the new cab added to the initial purchase price. The same size 'Q' cab was fitted to every model from the 2600 up to the 7600 and soon the bigger 6700, 7700, 8700 and 9700 – the larger tractors having the cab mounted above the

transmission, rather than straddling it. Keeping the same size cab kept costs down and allowed Ford to get maximum revenue back on its significant investment. This did lead to the smaller three-cylinder tractors having quite a high stature that could cause issues when they needed to work in low buildings and, from 1977, a low-profile Lambourn cab became an official option.

The overlap period between the 7A1 and 7A2 range must have been interesting, as once the deadline arrived all tractors sold had to be fitted with the new 'Q' cab to meet the legal requirements. Ford must have been putting the whole weight of its mass production into the 7A1 range, but one wonders if numbers decreased in the lead up to the new legislation in 1976, especially in the last few months leading up to it.

I expect there were some good deals to be had at Ford dealerships around the country as the end of May 1976 approached!

The new 7A2 5600, complete with 'Q' cab, was then sold for the rest of the 1970s and up to 1981, when it was replaced by the 5610 model and continued to be produced right through the Force II version in 1985 and Generation III in 1989.

THE RARE 5600 7A1

The launch of 7A1 at the Smithfield Show in December 1975 saw the introduction of a tractor range that would only be produced in its original form until May 1976. That is, at best, just five months!

Of course, Ford was a master of mass production and would have built a great number of the new models during that five-month period, let alone probably a month of run up to the launch date. Nevertheless, the fact that the production time of the 7A1 tractors with the Fieco cab was so limited means that these are certainly much rarer beasts than the 7A2 tractors with the 'Q 'cab, or Lambourn cab option introduced in 1977.

Even the best-selling 4600 and 6600 models must be limited in numbers when it comes to the quantity of these versions of the model built, and even fewer must still survive in the UK following the mass exporting of such machines over the last three decades.

Jonathan Putterill's 5600 is a late example of the 7A1 range and, as such, is not as common as the later 7A2 type. As the model did not sell as well as many of the others in the range, the 5600 in this early form is quite a rarity, although Jonathan classes it as one of his favourites amidst a large collection of Ford and Fordson tractors and he certainly doesn't consider selling it anytime soon! That's probably a good idea, as where would you find another original example of this calibre?

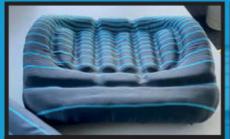

Malvern magic!

Tractor World Spring returns on 11-12 March at the Three Counties Showground. Here's what you can expect to see at the event.

MASSEY-HARRIS-FERGUSON

There'll be plenty of opportunities to chat and swap tips at the regional and national club stands, and it is here that you'll find the focus for the show's two special themes – the first of which celebrates 70 years since the formation of Massey-Harris-Ferguson, in 1953. This would become Massey-Ferguson Ltd., when the simplification of the company name was sanctioned at a meeting on 20 March 1958.

Massey-Harris-Ferguson, as the name suggests, had its roots in companies established by three individuals – Daniel Massey, Alanson Harris, and Henry George 'Harry' Ferguson.

Massey founded his agricultural implement business in Ontario, Canada, in 1847, after experiencing the drudgery of farming. He realised that mass

production of horse-drawn implements would improve the efficiency of agriculture and set about establishing a facility that would see his company build thousands of machines to suit various jobs around the farm.

Meanwhile, Alanson Harris had established a steam-powered sawmill, with an adjacent workshop, and with his son, John, began to produce simple and reliable equipment for farmers. John also travelled with the grain harvest from Texas to Canada, listening to and learning from the experiences of farmers along the way. This resulted in the Brantford self-tying binder.

In 1891, the Massey Manufacturing Company and A Harris & Son merged to create Massey-Harris Company Ltd. This streamlined the offering of both companies and cut production and distribution costs. The savings were passed on to the farmers, rather than making a considerable profit, and this meant that Massey-Harris equipment was within the reach of farmers around the world.

Like Massey, Harry Ferguson had experienced the hardships of farming first hand and wanted to improve things for labourers and landowners. An Irish engineer and inventor, Ferguson had also been given the opportunity to try the early tractors and he was not impressed by their shortcomings.

He realised that he could use the soil being turned over by the plough to his advantage by transferring the weight to the tractor for better grip. The result, as we all appreciate, was the Ferguson System – a method of making the tractor and implement become one and revolutionising farming. Farmers were able to increase productivity and efficiency while using tractors that were lighter, and significantly more agile than those that had gone before.

After failed partnerships with David Brown and Ford, Ferguson merged his business with Massey-Harris in 1953.

NEW PERFORMANCE

The second theme at this year's show marks 60 years since the launch of Fordson's New Performance range of tractors.

The Ford Motor Company had established the Ford Tractor Division in 1962 in a bid to create a worldwide range of tractors that would be produced at three factories – one in North America and two in Europe – and the first phase of the process was to agree on a new image and livery that would tie global production together prior to the launch of the entirely new range of tractors.

Ford's American-built tractors took on a new, blue and grey livery in the summer of '62 and the tractors built at Dagenham for the American market were also finished in the new colour scheme.

It would be the following year before the look of Fordson tractors for the UK and remaining markets was altered to match their American counterparts. The launch of the Fordson New Performance range (Dexta, Super Dexta, and Super Major), in 1963, would see the familiar orange wheels give way to grey, along with the mudguards, grille, and headlights.

The New Performance Dexta was the same as the outgoing version, save for the colour scheme, while the Super Dexta was now a 44.5bhp model. The Super Major saw the most changes, with 53.7bhp now on tap, castings strengthened to accommodate the power increase, and new gear ratios and a revised crown wheel and pinion to create the ultimate version of a tractor that had evolved since the introduction of the E1A Major in 1951.

These three models, as well as conversions based on them, will be celebrated by Blue Force and the Ford & Fordson Association, as well as private exhibitors.

OTHER ATTRACTIONS

Adding to all the event favourites that visitors love, Sunday sees the return of the popular Classic Commercials Drive-In Day. Completely free to enter and with no need to pre-book, exhibitors can simply turn up with their classic commercial before 9.30am for a warm welcome.

helps people struggling with everyday bills (such as food, utilities, and clothing) in these hard economic times. The second charity was Project ESPWA, which supports many projects across the globe. This year it is heavily involved in delivering food, clothes, and hospital supplies to war-torn Ukraine. The total raised was the fantastic sum of €41,033.

The Hoey family would like to thank the volunteers that helped over the two days with marshalling duties and looking after the collection. The event ran well, and it was considerably easier to manage following the changes that had been implemented. It also led to a more enjoyable experience for those attending.

The main collection is now displayed in three large buildings that are linked by walkways. This allowed attendees to move from one building to the other without going outside. The first building contained the Ford, County, Roadless, and New Holland tractors. The enlarged space meant these tractors were housed under one roof and allowed more space between the machines displayed. This meant it was easier to view the tractors, making the experience more enjoyable.

From here you could then walk into a new building dedicated to John Deere tractors and machinery. Heading outside and across the yard enabled visitors to take in more buildings housing marques such as International Harvester, Leyland, Nuffield, Zetor, David Brown and Track Marshall, as well as more Ford, Massey Ferguson, and John Deere tractors. There was also a building containing silage harvesters, balers, and other classic agricultural equipment.



It was also possible for visitors to view the modern working fleet used on the farm as part of Country Crest.

This is truly a wonderful collection, with something of interest for everyone. It is also good to know that a lot of these tractors and machines are used at working events – they are not simply for show!

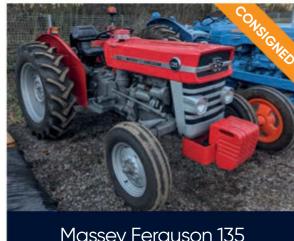

STAR LETTER

MF 1200

Dear T&M,

I read with great interest your recent article in the January edition of T&M on 50 years of the MF 1200. There is no doubt about it that this tractor was a great advancement in tractor design and, coupled to the right implement, it was an excellent performer for many different tasks.

Chris Clack, one of the demonstrators of the tractor, gives an interesting insight into his experiences while giving the various demonstrations. One demonstration that I remember taking place was

on a hill farm just outside of Moffat, in Dumfries & Galloway, on the A708 road to Selkirk.

The farm was called Sailfoot, and the hill was being ploughed so that it could be planted with trees. I was not at the actual demonstration myself, but one of my friends was in attendance and there were crawler tractors on site ploughing - an International BTD-8 and a Fiat 70C.

Both these tractors had wide track pads suitable for soft ground and were pulling Clark of Parkgate trailing forestry ploughs. One of the ploughs was unhitched from a crawler and 1200. Unfortunately, the 1200

attached to the Massey Ferguson could not operate in these

conditions, so the demonstration was not a success.

The balance of the plough was wrong for a wheeled tractor and the wrong wheel configuration for the type of ground being ploughed made the 1200 tractor unable to work in these conditions. In forestry cultivation, there is no substitute for tracked tractors.

Despite this very minute shortcoming, I do realise that the Massey Ferguson 1200, and its subsequent successors, were excellent performers with the correct implements, as I said before.

In all the years I have worked in forestry I have never seen a 1200 being used for forestry ploughing or fitted with winches for timber extraction. However, several have been converted with a bolster chassis and timber crane to be used as timber forwarders, with limited success.

There was a gentleman called Stanley Stobrinski, who lived in Pathhead in East Lothian, who carried out this conversion. He initially built a timber trailer with a crane and the trailer also had a land drive axle geared to suit a Massey Ferguson 165 tractor. This was a very successful creation.

I bought the trailer about 36 years ago and I have used it with Massey Ferguson tractors, a SAME Saturno 80, and currently a Lamborghini 854. I had to change the gearing to suit each different tractor, but I have carried a lot of timber with this trailer.

After Stan built the trailer, he then started to build the bolster bodies for the MF 1200. He split the tractor at the swivel pin and extended the wheelbase using the bolster body as a chassis. I am not sure how many he converted, but they were very successful. So that is another purpose that the MF 1200 was used for.

I hope you find my comments interesting, and I thank you for taking the time to read them.

SL: I have seen one of the 1200 conversions that you refer to, but not in action! I am aware that MF converted the 390 for forestry work, with a reversible seat for using a timber crane or winch, but I am not sure how successful this was. Perhaps someone can shed light on this subject.

Registrations

Dear T&M,

I write regarding the correspondence featured in the December 2022 issue of T&M. Just because a tractor has no registration plate does not mean it has not been registered. Some tractors that I have been asked to register under a new number have later proved to be already registered with the DVLA.

Over the years, many number plates have fallen off in the field and many others have been removed to dispose of a tractor at a machinery sale 'without documents'. Others, of course, have probably been removed

to sell a tractor that has been stolen, especially if the serial number is also 'missing'.

If somebody calls (01454 313305) or e-mails (jim@ weylode.com) me and says that they have a tractor that has 'never been registered', before they spend money on an agerelated number, if appropriate, I can recommend trying the DVLA or county archives with a letter of support. Sometimes that has been enough to make the difference and produce the original registration.

Worriers may be pleased to know that with more than 4,000 tractor registrations

done, only one has proved to be stolen so far! I have been doing tractor registrations since 1990, so I know the subject, and have noted that from the position of an individual clerk at DVLA, it is sometimes easier to reject an

application than to find out the truth of the matter.

Shuttle launch

Scott Lambert, with the help of former Massey Ferguson engineers Tony Reeve and John Barton, explains the impact that MF's shuttle transmission had on the market.

Product

Performance



iven my passion for IH and Case IH tractors, my experience with MF models is surprisingly varied. Aside from the 35X, 100 Series and 500 Series models I remember well from my younger years, some of the fondest memories I have are of models fitted with a shuttle transmission.

The 352 and 362 spring to mind, but the 390T also conjures recollections of simpler days. I liked the 12/12 shuttle best, with its chunky lever on the left of dash, and single, floor-mounted gear lever, but I am aware that not all were fans of this system.

Tractors such as these were the successors to the 600 Series, with its 12 forward, four reverse 'Synchro-12' and Multi-Power transmissions, as well as the 200 Series' eight-speed 'box and early 300 Series models featuring similar powertrains. Good as they were, something better was needed if Massey Ferguson was going to remain competitive.

Queue the development of a robust shuttle transmission design to suit tractors of varying power outputs for all types of applications, and queue Tony Reeve – who you may remember from his pioneering work with the Massey Ferguson 1200.

Our story of the shuttle transmission begins in 1980, with what Tony cites as the start of the gradual demise of the Coventry-based MF Engineering Division. Tony was the

He oversaw 84 staff, of which there were four managers and 25 professional engineers. Departments were the Engineering Laboratory (paints, lubricants metallurgy, and adhesives), Rig Test (designing, building maintaining and running test rigs), Field Test (the circular bump test track and all field trials, mostly on local farmers' land), and the Test Specification Group (gathering usage information and instrumented data, and formulating test specifications to be used by development Engineers and, later, Quality Control to confirm design acceptance and monitor production).

"Production volumes had started to reduce, as sales became weaker and redundancies were rumoured," Tony told T&M. "I went to Gordon Snook's office one Friday afternoon to report on a problem. I had been waiting for him to return from a meeting at Banner Lane. I knocked and went in to be greeted by, "Don't worry me with work, I've just been fired!"

"Taken aback, I retreated after a few condolences and wishes for the future, with him wishing us luck too. As it turned out, didn't we need it? A couple of weeks later, our new Director of Engineering (DoE), who shall remain anonymous, arrived and met we senior managers as a start to finding his feet."

As it turned out, this gentleman had been a manager elsewhere within Massey Ferguson, before his product line ceased production, so MF's Managing Director, Harry Hebden, had to find him another job.

"It turned out that he was the most vindictive bully ever put in charge of something he knew nothing about," Tony explained. "He had little proper engineering knowledge and ruled by holding meetings of qualified engineers about any

notes to hassle us/them at frequent occasions on tiny details of progress."

Tony continued: "From 1982 onwards we suffered regular redundancies, which the new DoE loved to handle himself. In 1985, a secretary had to go from a Senior Manager's office. A colleague had pleaded that it should not be his, so my secretary was made redundant instead.

"The company was operating under LIFO (last in, first out) rules and despite this, my long-serving lady, who was quick and accurate, and the only one who knew and managed the Test Specifications and development reports system, had to go. She was a great loss to most of the division.

"With my support she took the company to an Industrial Relations Tribunal and after the DoE had suffered a very uncomfortable afternoon in court, she won a useful financial settlement. He then set about humiliating and downgrading me, with all his cunning. I ended up with a small team looking at advanced projects for a year or so.

"Fortunately, in the team were two excellent engineers: John Barton, who joined a few years earlier from Triumph Engineering Co. Ltd., famous for its motorcycles, and Roger Weyman, who had joined MF as a graduate engineer a few years earlier.

"The two of them, John particularly, had experience of synchromesh design for gearboxes and were rightly sceptical of the competitors, like Leyland, who had introduced synchromesh gear change as a feature in 1978," said Tony. "We well knew that synchromesh systems employed on a dairy-based small tractor, that was regularly used for loader work, would be problematic.

"Synchromesh cones do not have the energy capacity to handle the energy dissipation levels required for anything but the most careful of shuttle-type activity. We therefore explored the possibility of designing full shuttle versions of MF's existing gearboxes, employing wet clutches to effect changes in direction.

"These, being oil immersed, would have ample energy dissipation capability for all the Banner Lane tractor range. The two engineers and a couple of draughtsmen produced feasible design schemes to encourage more work."

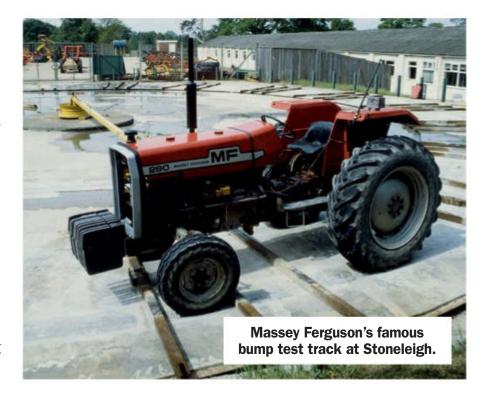
It was at this stage that Harry Hebden issued an order to all subordinate directors to stop work and expenditure on any new projects. He was struggling for income and, in a bid to reduce expenditure to the minimum, set about clamping down on unnecessary outgoings.

"The market decline in Banner Lane tractors was partly led by the need for higher horsepower tractors, but equally by the lack of innovative development of the existing lines," Tony explained. "The early '80s was a profitable time, but instead of ploughing some of it back into the bread and butter lines, top management decided to develop a big range of industrial machines, to market through existing dealers, to take on giants like Caterpillar and Komatsu. They did it badly, and failed."

The DoE jumped at the chance to stop the work of Tony and his team, despite their protests regarding the important competitive advantage that they had in prospect.

"I knew we had a winner, so I rang my marketing contact, Eric Frederiksen, and told him about our design and that it had been stopped," Tony said. "He was appalled and went to his boss, who in turn went to Hebden, who gave the DoE orders to

re-instate it forthwith and apply whatever resources the completion of the design and development might require.

"At this point it is worth emphasising the importance of qualified engineering management being kept in the loop of market trends and needs, so that the best chance of engineering innovation exists. Contact and respect between Marketing, Product Planning and Engineering was sketchy at MF. The shuttle transmission was nearly a missed opportunity.

"The DoE rewarded me by removing me from leading the team and putting me, ignominiously, on a drawing board in the middle of the office. I had already found that no one elsewhere wanted a 50-year old Chief Engineer, so when an opportunity to sell engineering software and train users cropped up, I accepted, and it kept me gainfully employed until retirement.

"The DoE lasted a very short time after I left, retiring to Scotland and leaving the team I had left behind to keep up the good work, and enabling MF's tractors to remain an attractive proposition well into the 1990s."

John Barton was Transmission Project Manager at this time, working continuously on product improvements. "Before I go into further detail, it is important for anyone to make sense of these discussions that I give a brief background of the MF Engineering Department and the Banner Lane factory capability," he said.

"The Coventry Engineering Department had, over many years, been developed to have a leading role inside Massey Ferguson worldwide, and an influencer on industry tractor standards.





"The Rig Test department had superb capability, of which some of the major ones were clutch testing (where the MF test had become the tractor industry standard), several synchro rigs to suit different applications, transmission endurance test machines that were fully torque variable (computer controlled), and chassis torsion and bending rigs. All these rigs had 24-hour running capability and, if required, seven-day running.

"Massey Ferguson had invested heavily in field data recording, to have knowledge on how the tractor usage varied through different parts of the world, and this formed the basis of all our transmission reliability calculations," John explained. "We were blessed with a small department of gear stress and calculation engineers who could use this information to give very realistic tractor reliability figures.

"These engineers were very unusual, in that they also had their

shortened. I do not know any other automotive industry where a small team had both capabilities.

"The Banner Lane factory had been given an incredible investment in the 1950s that made the major chassis castings machined on a transfer line, where castings were loaded onto one end and came off the other end fully finished. This was extremely cost effective and helped the manufacture of more than 3.3 million tractors from Coventry, with many more fully machined cases sent to CKD factories around the world."

John continued: "This made any modifications difficult, but still achievable with the help of excellent production engineers and great, knowledgeable guys who maintained the lines. The actual cases could change in appearance and strength, as long as the jig location points remained unchanged, and this proved very important in maintaining the low-cost 200 Series, and yet have the option of improved strength castings, as long as the fundamental machining was the same.

"The factory was very well equipped to produce hobbed and shaved gears, and various heat treatment options. This made in-house production extremely cost effective and it was very important for total costs that we used these facilities to a maximum.

"The design team was a mix of older, experienced designers and young, recently qualified graduate engineers. This proved to be a winning combination over the next 20 years. The reason that I mention this is that a successful introduction of any new product is a team effort of all departments, and a large number of employees has to be involved."

Box-fresh classics!

Farmer and photographer Kim Parks shares slides from demonstrations that he attended in the latter half of the '70s.

im Parks, farmer, and photographer, was often away from his family farm in Rotherfield, East Sussex, as he photographed tractors working in the area during the 1970s. He also visited several events, such as the local Crowborough and District Ploughing Match, and, occasionally, travelled further afield.

This is evidenced by the time he photographed brand-new tractors on demonstration at the 1977 British National Ploughing Championships, held near Maidstone in Kent, and it is

these, as well as those seen at

smaller ploughing matches, that make for an excellent time travel experience!

Throughout this time Kim was still using his original Kodak Instamatic camera, which used a film cartridge from which prints were made when sent away for processing. However, when he got to the late 1970s, he was increasingly having the film developed as slides rather than prints.

The photographs seen here were processed as slides accidentally, but Kim was glad that this happened, even though he didn't own a projector until sometime afterwards. From 1998 he started to do talks on wildlife

photography, which he began to put a lot of emphasis on during the 1980s, and slides made it much easier to present his talks.

He now regularly presents his farming photographs in talks in his local area, as well as his wildlife photography, both of which he still actively pursues, although now with digital cameras and a projector.

Next time we enter the 1980s and Kim gets busy branching out from the family farm and becomes an agricultural contractor in his own right. He still found the time to take some pictures of both his and other people's tractors and machinery at work though, and we shall all get to enjoy these in the next chapter of our look through his camera lens.



Our first stop is to the Crowborough and District Ploughing Match that, in 1975, was held at Warren Farm at Eridge in East Sussex. One of the main tractors to grab Kim's attention was a Massey Ferguson 1200 from local dealership E O Culverwell, which was being worked with an MF four-furrow reversible plough. The 1200 had been launched at the end of 1971 and began to arrive on farms during 1972, although it was a rare sight around Kim's area, as it was a large, articulated tractor that was much bigger than the Ford 5000 and MF 165 machines that tended to dominate. This was the first time that Kim had seen one of these tractors in action and it stood out enough to make a good impression on him. Interestingly, much later he would run a Massey Ferguson 1200 in his own contracting business.







Leaving the ploughing match, we stay in 1975, but earlier in the year when first-cut silage is being made in Kim's part of East Sussex. At Mark Cross, Kim managed to photograph contractor Kim Tuson, from Buxted, chopping and collecting grass for silage with a brand-new Ford 7000 and Claas Jaguar 60 forage harvester.

The 7000 replaced a Massey Ferguson 1080 and note that the contractor shortened the height of the air cleaner bowl stalk, as he did not like the normal tall item that the 7000 came with, because it impaired his forward vision. The MF 165 on the trailer was probably that of another contractor that often helped Kim out at busy times.

The location is a farm next door to that run by the principle of Plumpton Agricultural College, a Mr Nicholls who had a large dairy herd and bought in grass from various local farms to provide enough fodder to last the winter months.

"I really thought the 7000 was an impressive tractor. Having seen the first one to be exhibited at Smithfield in 1971, I was already a fan of this model and with wheel weights fitted all-round this example most certainly looked the part. The contractor, however, was never a fan of it and thought that the Massey Ferguson 1080 that preceded it was a much better machine!" said Kim.

We now move on to October 1977 and the British National Ploughing Championships that were held that year in Lingfield in Surrey. It turned out to be a beautiful day and Kim, who had travelled to the event along with members of his family, wished that he had taken more photographs than he did, but it was expensive to buy the film and then get it developed. Kim had only ever seen one Belarus before and so soon took a picture of this four-wheel drive example, complete with lots of front weights and a three-furrow reversible plough. Belarus tractors were represented in the UK at the time by UMO Belarus, which took over distribution the year prior.





Staying at Mark Cross we find that later in the year the same contractor is busy getting in second-cut silage. The Ford 7000 is back along with the Claas Jaguar 60, although the chopper has now gained an additive tank, mounted next to the spout, that could be used to add liquid to the grass to improve the quality of the silage as it fermented in the clamp.

A David Brown 995 is on carting duties on this occasion with a trailer that has very high silage sides added. Contractor Kim Tuson did not keep the Ford 7000 very long and it was soon replaced with a John Deere 3130 after only a couple of years.

With the warm, sunny weather, the operator of this SAME Tiger 100 has both doors wide open for extra ventilation. The tractor was powered by a SAME five-cylinder engine that produced 100hp and is seen here teamed with a conventional plough. It was probably being demonstrated by SAME (UK) Ltd. and would have been a brand-new demonstrator, hence the fresh look of this machine as it glints in the autumn sunshine.

SAME was only just making inroads into the UK market and was achieving some success, due to its air-cooled engines and factory-fitted four-wheel drive, but this was the very first occasion on which Kim saw one of these Italian tractors at work.







Another new marque for Kim to experience for the first time was Deutz. These German tractors were also beginning to make themselves felt in the British market by the late 1970s, with both two- and four-wheel drive machines. Since 1974, Watveare Overseas Ltd., based in the West Country, had been selling the Deutz brand in the UK and was having some success with the 06 range that appeared in 1975 and it is this range that these two tractors at Lingfield hail from. Once again, these tractors were probably being demonstrated by the importer at the ploughing championships.

County tractors were well represented at Lingfield in 1977, with this four-cylinder tractor busy with a Parmiter cultivator. This was the first time that Kim saw a County at work, and he was very impressed by the mighty, equal-size wheel tractors.



The largest County was the 1454, based on the Ford 9600, and Kim was very impressed by this huge tractor, complete with Dowdeswell five-furrow plough. The weather might have been fine and dry, but you can see from the tractor's tyres that the ground itself was wet and sticky in places.

Kim says: "I found the big County tractors exciting machines, but four-wheel drive was still only just finding favour in our part of East Sussex, and many of the established farmers would say that if you need a four-wheel drive tractor then you should not be on the land in the first place! The youngsters loved the new machines, but the old guard could not understand why you would ever need a tractor so big!"



In 1977 the County 1164 was replaced by the 1174 and from this angle it is hard to tell if this is the earlier or later model. We are leaning towards the 1174. which would mean that this was probably one of the first demonstrators of this type. As can be seen by the lack of registration plates, these tractors were probably all brought to the event by County Commercial Cars and were company-owned demonstration units. Kim says that he really enjoyed this era, as the big events, such as the National Ploughing Championships, were a working **Smithfield Show with all the** major manufacturers demonstrating their latest products. "It seemed as though there were more brand-new demonstrators ploughing than there were competitors!" says Kim, rather ironically.



For our last look at the National Ploughing
Championships in Surrey, in 1977, we turn to a Roadless
118, one of the main competitors to the County
tractors, but still based on Ford models.
The 114hp 118 was introduced in 1976 and then in
1977 was fitted with a new Lambourn cab complete
with flat floor, as seen on this brand-new example, with
these improved models becoming known as the J Series.
No doubt the Roadless Traction demonstrator driver was
keen to regale prospective customers with the details of
the new, more luxurious cabin!



Moving to the Crowborough and District Ploughing Match once again, but this time in 1977 at Renby Farm at Eridge, in East Sussex, we encounter another Italian-built tractor. Although we cannot tell the exact model, this is one of the new Fiat 80 Series tractors that began to appear in the late 1970s and would become quite popular in the early 1980s, albeit wearing a newer and more impressive cab than this early example. Fiat was another early producer of factory-fitted four-wheel drive and when Kim got the chance to drive this very tractor, complete with Lemken reversible plough, it was the first four-wheel drive tractor he had ever driven. It was being demonstrated at Eridge by the Fiat dealership Tetts, based at Maidstone in Kent. Kim said: "I really liked the roomy cab, and I found the four-wheel drive to be awesome after only being used to the two-wheel drive Ford 6600 tractors back at home."



Our final two images take us back to 1978 and the Crowborough and District Ploughing Match once again, this time held at Lamberhurst in East Sussex. The tractor that caught Kim's eye the most was the new Ford 8100 that dealer Sussex Tractors had on its plot, complete with a Dowdeswell four-furrow plough.

The 8100 had only just been introduced in July of 1978, so this would have been one of its first appearances in the area and, although a Ford tractor, it was built by County at its base in Fleet, Hampshire. Powered by a six-cylinder 115hp Ford engine, the 8100 was something of an oddball that carved itself a niche over the coming years, particularly with those who used trailed forage harvesters and other power-sapping, PTO-driven equipment.

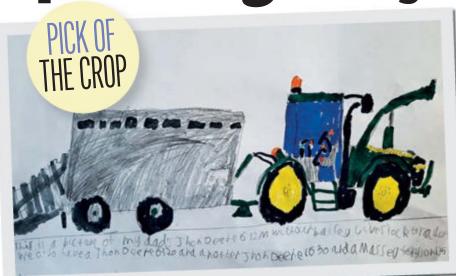
Kim thought that this was a big tractor when he saw it working and it made quite an impression on him, as it was like the farm's Ford 6600 tractors but taller and more powerful. Kim's family farm had always run Fordson and Ford tractors, but they did not actually deal with Sussex Tractors for their machinery, instead going to Testers of Edenbridge following on from his grandfather dealing with this branch when it had been part of Stormont Engineering. The dealership was also famous for making the Fordson KFD narrow conversions.

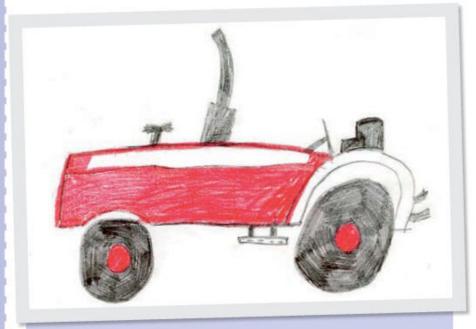

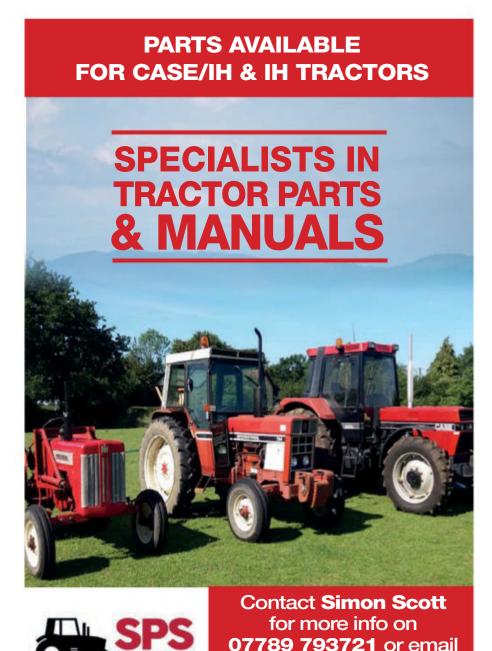

aulage contractor Mark
Lerigo, from Newark in
Nottinghamshire, has had a
passion for International
tractors all of his life has
recently rebuilt a 1986 Case
IH 1455XL to prize-winning standard.
It's set to be one of the stars at Tractor
World Spring, on 11-12 March.

Having driven an International 1455XL in the late '80s, Mark knew when he started collecting IH machines that he needed to have one. After looking around for a while and noting that the price of these Neuss-built tractors was going up and up, he

concluded that he needed to get in there before it was too late.

He came across an example at J A Swinbank, Stockton-on-Tees, in September 2019, with 11,000 hours on the clock. It had originated in Spain and was a 1986 example, in the Case IH colour scheme that was adopted when Tenneco merged the J I Case and International Harvester brands in 1985.

It was established that HMRC had been told that the tractor had arrived in Britain using the Notification of Vehicle Arrivals (NOVA) service – which is an important step when buying a tractor that has been imported, particularly when purchasing

at auction. It was registered with DVLA and was shown in its working clothes at Tractor World Spring in 2020.

Mark had originally intended to make it mechanically sound with work to the parking brake and to tidy it up with principal work to the cracked nose cone and the leaking roof, but with Covid-19 hitting soon after the event took place, that was all to change.

REBUILD, OR REPAIR?

Having entered the workshop, and with the help of respected mechanic Peter Rutherford, the so-called 'light repairs' were undertaken, starting with the parking brake. Subsequent investigation revealed that there were leaking seals, worn bearings, and the service brakes needed a complete overhaul too.

Each of the four wheels had been water ballasted and this, Mark and Peter concluded, had stressed the drivetrain considerably. It was decided that there was nothing for it, but to totally rebuild the rear axle, but this would ultimately lead to the whole tractor getting 'the full works', which has certainly paid dividends.

Like all these things, it's not been a cheap project, but on the other hand a ▶

good, restored example is now worth £35,000-plus.

Attention then turned to the hydraulic system, as the left-hand lift arm had been welded to the rocker shaft, as the splines were completely worn away. A good, second-hand top cover, with the bits required, was purchased from Contratec in The Netherlands, along with a control valve that was found to be leaking due to being worn. The PTO was leaking, but the shaft was okay and so a new seal solved the problem.

Also at the rear, a brand-new pick-up hitch, from Dromone Engineering in the Republic of Ireland, went on to complete the look and enhance the usability of the tractor. It all looks superb.

FRONT AXLE

It was found that the splines on the prop-shaft to the front axle were worn and so the assembly was sent away to MJC Engineering, in Leicester, for a full overhaul and balance. At the same time, new brake pads were fitted to the overhauled prop-shaft brake caliper.

Attention moved to the front axle, which was taken off and stripped down to receive new bearings throughout, along with work to the off-side half-shaft – which needed to be rebuilt in the spline area.

The centre pivot in the front axle tombstone had been machined before, and the standard bushes would no longer fit. A set of oversized bushes was obtained and fitted with a new pivot pin, before the tombstone went back on.

ENGINE

It was time to turn to the engine and cooling system. On went a new water pump, as a matter of course, and the radiator turned out to be blocked. A re-core of the original, along with a re-core for the oil cooler, set Mark's





mind at rest in this department, while the air conditioning system got a full overhaul too.

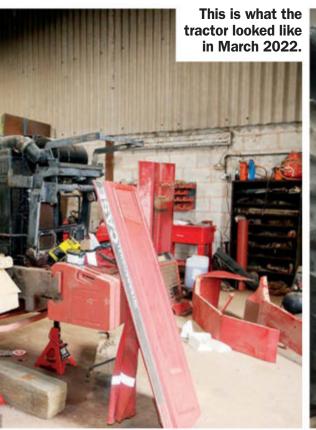
The turbocharger, a key ingredient in the success of the DT-402 engine, was sent away for reconditioning and at the same time the rest of the engine was stripped to find that number three cylinder was very oily with a worn bore. The liners, pistons and rings were replaced along with genuine components sourced from Tractorparts.co.uk Ltd.

Luckily, the crankshaft was found to be in good order, which saved money, but no chances were taken on the cylinder head and fuel injection system. The head was skimmed, new valve seats were cut, and new valves and springs were fitted. The Bosch fuel pump and injectors were overhauled by P Atkins Fuel Injection Ltd., of Mansfield, and a new oil pump, seals and gaskets concluded the work on the engine.

After the reassembly of the engine, it was run up and thoroughly tested before

any painting was undertaken, to check for problems and oil/fuel leaks.

Interestingly, Mark's tractor does not feature the famous 'Turbo Clutch' that these Case IH 55 Series tractors were noted for, and so a new, dry disc assembly was all that was required. The transmission itself received a new input bearing and seal, along with needle roller bearings for the main drive and PTO shafts.

The rest of the 20 forward, nine reverse gearbox was in excellent order and as a road test prior to the overhaul had revealed no problems or nasty noises, it was left alone.

After that, Mark turned to the painting of the chassis and other components.

FINISH

The tractor was carefully rubbed down using disc pads of various resistance, with the major parts covered up while working in other areas to avoid dust contamination. As for the panels, they were carefully grit blasted to remove the rust and old paint before etch primer was applied, followed by primer filler that was flattened off between coats, and three top coats. Where required, pins and linkages were zinc coated to provide the finishing touches.

Anyone that has restored a tractor with a 'Q' cab will tell you that this is probably the most time-consuming and frustrating part of any rebuild, and this tractor was no exception.

After the paint had dried, the cab received new glass, as the scratches on the original pieces were deep in places, and work could begin on the interior. The lower half of the cab interior on Mark's tractor is finished in grey, while the top half is finished in tan.

The first tractors finished in the Case IH red and black livery, known as the transition models, retained the International tan-coloured cab interior, but Mark's 'facelift' model has a combination of the earlier and latter cab cladding, which he opted to retain. It is thought that this tractor is an early example of the 'third generation' 1455XL.

A new, 'old style' Grammer seat was fitted, as the frame had broken on the original one.

With the panels all painted, adding the correct decals, and fitting them to the tractor was relatively easy.

The wheels had been grit blasted and refurbished as required, with new Goodyear Optitrac tyres going on, supplied by Tanvic Tyres at Newark. The tread pattern looks good, and the sizes

are appropriate – with 420/85 R28s on the front and 520/85 R38s on the rear.

FIRST TIME OUT

Time was getting on, and the tractor was booked to be exhibited on the Case IH Club UK stand at the Great Dorset Steam Fair.

On Tuesday 23 August, the mudguards went on and after a drive around the yard, the tractor was on the low-loader and heading towards Dorset the following day.

The hard work was worth it, as Mark's tractor took the award for 'Best International' at the show, and this was followed by 'Best Tractor at Show', on 24 September at the excellent Southwell Ploughing Match.

It was also exhibited at the Moss Valley Group's Shireoaks Autumn Get Together and at the Newark Vintage Tractor & Heritage Show in November, where it was sadly overlooked by the judges.

As for 2023, the tractor is set to be on the *Tractor & Machinery* stand at Tractor World Spring on 11-12 March, Tractor Fest at Newby Hall 10-11 June, and Cromford Steam Rally on 5-6 August.

It's an excellent restoration of a very desirable classic, and now that it's complete Mark will be turning his attention to his original International 634, which appeared at Tractor World Spring 2022, and is now undergoing an engine rebuild after crankshaft woes.

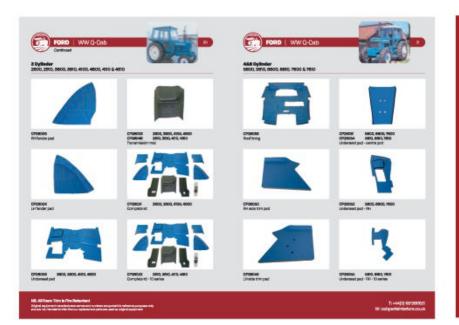

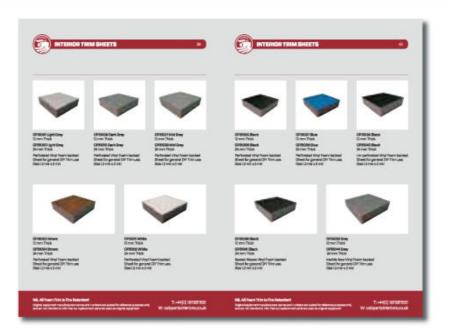

LAMBORGHINI TRACTORS

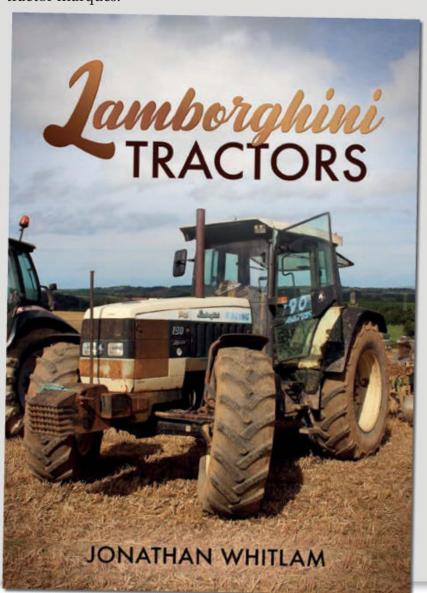

&M contributor Jonathan Whitlam has produced another book in the series to complement those already published on David Brown, Ford, IH, John Deere, Leyland, and Massey Ferguson tractors, as well as more generic titles about combine harvesters and Tractor Legends.

His latest book, *Lamborghini Tractors*, covers the history and development of tractors built by the famous sportscar manufacturer, as well as those built by SDF under the same name.

Lamborghini tractors have always stood out from the crowd – because of their specification, and bold styling, and it is the latter that is particularly interesting to see develop over the years, as the book progresses chronologically.

Jonathan has incorporated numerous unpublished photographs of early Lamborghini tractors and has also delved into the archives to find images that enhance the story of this striking brand, producing a complete and concise account of one of the world's most interesting tractor marques.





nyone with a passion for detail will be aware of the significance of The British Rubber Co., as it is a one-stop shop for anyone looking for the right tyres to suit their tractor. The company previously developed a great working relationship with Goodyear, bringing back 'heritage' tread patterns of

numerous sizes, and has now seen a fruitful relationship with another tyre company enable something else to be brought to market.

Trelleborg is a famous name in the world of off-road tyres, with distinctive tread patterns and eye-catching sidewalls, and it is these features that led the proprietor of The British Rubber Co., Tom Card, to develop a product that should appeal to anyone that works in or enjoys the great outdoors.

Formerly an asset manager, based in Hong Kong, Tom is used to brokering deals and looking for ways to diversify, and it was a realisation that he could combine the core element of his business with a product that has become as much of a fashion statement as a practical garment, the humble Wellington boot, that saw this project take off.

These new wellies, designed by Tom himself, are aimed squarely at the farming community, but should appeal to anyone looking for a rugged, yet stylish boot. They are available in both khaki and black, feature a four-millimetre neoprene lining, and have a self-cleaning lip on the sole. The soles are made using Trelleborg ProgressiveTraction tread and bear an uncanny resemblance to that used on modern tractor tyres.

T&M editor Scott Lambert has been trying a pair for the past couple of months and is impressed by the quality and comfort the wellies provide. "As a high-end product, retailing at well over £100, I was expecting great things, and was not left disappointed," he explained. "Like my steel-toe boots, I've tried cheap, mid-range, and expensive wellies over the years and have settled on a pair of Le Chameau Vierzonord – for several reasons. Comfort is a big factor, but warmth and the ability to drive easily whilst wearing them are two other points that matter to me, and so I was keen to see how The British Rubber Co.'s wellies stacked up.

"First impressions were that they appeared to be heavier than the Vierzonords and it transpires that I wasn't wrong. Placing them on the scales revealed that they are a little more than 11 per cent heavier than my current wellies, but this really isn't noticeable when they're on.

"The grip is fantastic, they're warm, easy to get on and off, I can drive a car in them without hitting two pedals at once, and they look good too. I'm impressed!"

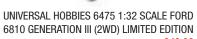

Delving into The enjoye we



The Deutz-Fahr DX 3, DX 4, and DX 6 tractors enjoyed a small, but loyal, following in their heyday. We look at them and what they can offer you.

eutz-Fahr's DX range of tractors remains a mystery to many – numerous models that are perhaps admired, but not fully understood. At the time of their production, some suggest that their build quality was on a par with that of Fendt, but we'll let you judge that for yourselves!

Launched in 1978, with the span of tractors covering 80-200hp, the DX range replaced the big '06' models and initially comprised the DX 85, DX 90, and DX 110, but would go on to encompass models from 80-200hp.

These remained in production until 1983, when the DX 4 and DX 6 ranges were introduced, followed by the launch of DX 3 at the Smithfield Show the following year.

First impressions would suggest that the nomenclature of each range was dictated by the number of cylinders, but this was not the case. Although true of DX 4 and DX 6, DX 3 featured both three- and four-cylinder-engined tractors.

The aim of this profile is to provide an overview of what you can expect from these tractors – particularly as the

general specification differed across the three sub-ranges. For example, DX 3 was the first to be fitted with the StarCab, while DX 4 and DX 6 featured the old-style MasterCab until after 1985. In this instance, we will not be including details of the DX 7 and DX 8 tractors.

Helping us on our journey through the various ranges and features – beginning with the engines – is Alan Petrie, who worked for Cheshire-based Bruera Agricultural Services Ltd. from 1977-92, where he gained vast experience of the Deutz-Fahr 06, 07/7C, DX 3, DX 4, and DX 6 ranges.



ENGINES

Deutz is a name synonymous with engines, as well as agricultural equipment, and by the time DX 3, DX 4, and DX 6 tractors were leaving the production lines, the company had built more than four million air-cooled engines, making it the largest producer of air-cooled diesel engines in the world.

Knowing the engines' traits, Deutz-Fahr appreciated the advantages of powering its tractors with air-cooled powerplants, and it was beneficial that they had built up a reputation for reliability and economy.

One of their strong points was the ability to warm up faster than water-cooled units – passing the dew point in a shorter space of time and therefore reducing cylinder wall corrosion and lengthening the amount of time between oil changes.

Amongst the fundamental principles of engine design is successful cooling and this is not easy without the use of water/coolant. Deutz's approach worked well and incorporated several strategies to ensure that it was effective, including splash cooling of the underside of the piston crown and continuously injecting oil into the crown itself to ensure effective cooling. The type of strategy used depended on the size of the engine and whether it was turbocharged or naturally aspirated.

To save fuel and reduce wear, the larger models featured a thermostatically-controlled cooling blower. This ensured that it was only operating at peak capacity when absolutely necessary. A valve in the exhaust manifold controlled the flow of oil to the blower's hydraulic coupling, thereby ensuring temperature-sensitive control of the blower speed. This, Deutz

claimed, resulted in up to eight per cent less fuel use per year.

With many parts, such as cylinder heads, barrels, and valves, interchangeable, costs could be kept low, and it was likely that any parts required for an overhaul would be readily available. Plus, the lack of a radiator, water pump and associated hoses eliminated a traditional cooling system as a possible source of breakdown.

The four-cylinder DX 3 tractors used the F4L 912 and F4L 913 engines and it was these that were by far the most popular

models in the range. Alan Petrie was very complimentary about these units but was keen to point out that they have certain quirks that you should be aware of, as well as passing on some helpful tips that he learned through years of working on them.

"These engines are strong and reliable if the operator takes care to ensure the cooling fins are regularly cleaned, especially in the summer months when dry grass and chaff can accumulate around the back of the rear cylinder (referred to as cylinder no.1 by Deutz, as the company numbered the cylinders from the flywheel end). Any debris can be cleared easily by using either a powerful airline or a power washer."

Horror stories about air-cooled engines that have been allowed to overheat do the rounds from time to time, and so we were keen to get an expert opinion. Is a Deutz engine that's overheated never the same again?

"If engines have been overheated, due to poor maintenance practices, or if the fan belt has failed, they will slowly 'tighten up' before finally stopping, as the pistons seize in the cylinder bores," Alan explained.

"Usually, after a cooling-off period, the engine will simply restart and you would not notice anything detrimental, other than a slightly increased vapour plume out of the crankcase breather tube!

"However, a give-away sign that the engine has previously been overheated is a loud 'pop' as the engine fires up from cold. This noise comes from leakage between the cylinder head, the fire ring (a sort of 'head gasket'), and the top of the cylinder barrel," continued Alan. "This 'pop' will not be heard

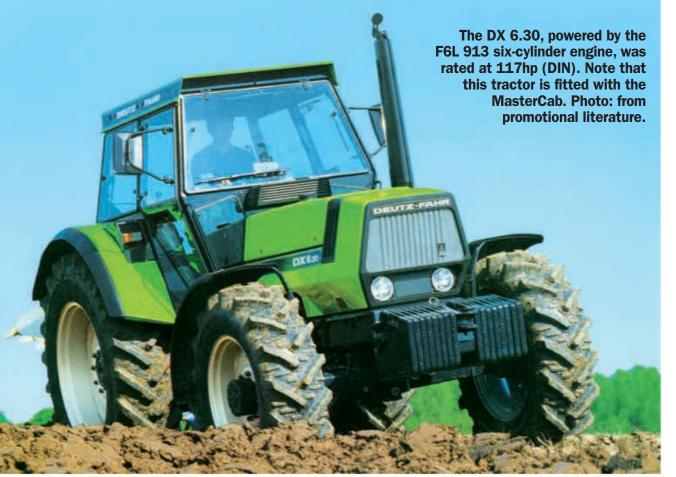
when the engine is up to working temperature, so it is essential to always start the engine from cold if thinking of buying an air-cooled Deutz.

He said: "The repair is fairly straightforward. The cylinder heads should be removed, and they can be skimmed in a lathe to return to flatness. It is important to measure the piston-to-cylinder head clearance during rebuild, to restore the correct 'bump' clearance, which should be 1.0-1.2mm, and this is achieved by fitting thin (0.2mm and 0.5mm) shims under the base of the cylinder barrel.

"The measurement is made by placing a piece of solder wire across the piston crown and bolting the head and new fire ring into place before rotating the engine by hand over top dead centre to squash the solder," Alan explained.

"Then, remove the cylinder head and measure the thickness of the squashed solder and subtract 1.1mm (that is the best bump clearance for good cold starting and smooth running with no diesel knock). The result of the sum will be the required thickness of shims required to be fitted under the cylinder barrel.

"The variation of shim sizes means you can fit single or multiple shims to obtain the clearance required: 0.2mm, 0.4mm (two 0.2mm shims) 0.5mm, 0.6mm (three 0.2mm shims), 0.7mm (one 0.2mm plus 0.5mm), etc."

Some engines are more susceptible to oil leaks than others, and in the case of these Deutz units on the DX 3 range, oil leaks often occur from the pushrod tube seals, or the rocker cover gaskets. "If noticed, they should be attended to quickly," Alan told *T&M*. "This will prevent debris, blown through by the cooling fan, sticking to the oil and rapidly clogging the cooling fins on the cylinder heads or the cylinder barrels."

BALANCERS

These four-cylinder engines have internally mounted balance shafts on the base of the crankcase, and it is not unheard of for the support castings for these shafts to break. This can occur if the engine has been allowed to overspeed, by letting it run away downhill under load, or if the injection pump flight speed screw has been tampered with. This usually happens when an over-zealous owner or operator wants to increase the engine revolutions to enable a higher top speed!

Alan told *T&M* that you can usually tell if the casting has failed if there's a 'chatter' from the front of the engine, as the gears are no longer correctly in mesh. "It does not usually end in catastrophic failure, but it should be attended to sooner rather than later," he explained. "A good, tried-and-tested 'bodge' is to drop the sump and remove the balancer shafts, gears, and housings, and after tapping out the oil feed hole for them, in the base of the block, fit a suitably sized bolt and copper washer to block the oil feed.

"Then, clean off the sealant – there was no gasket from new – apply some new RTV-type sealant, replace the sump, fill up with correct grade oil, and fit a new filter, and the engine will be fine.

It'll be a little coarser than before, but it takes a trained ear to hear the difference!"

Crankshafts and bearings are bulletproof, provided there's a reasonable maintenance history, and if looked after will easily do tens of thousands of hours without failure.

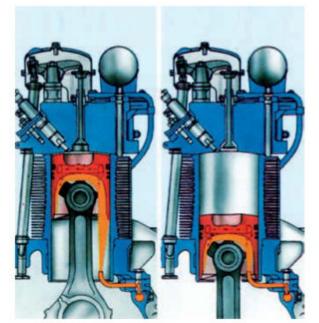
Crankshaft seals are reliable and trouble free (unless baler twine has got wrapped round the crank pulley), but it's worth noting that if you're trying to remove the front pulley retaining bolt, it has a left-handed thread and is very tight!

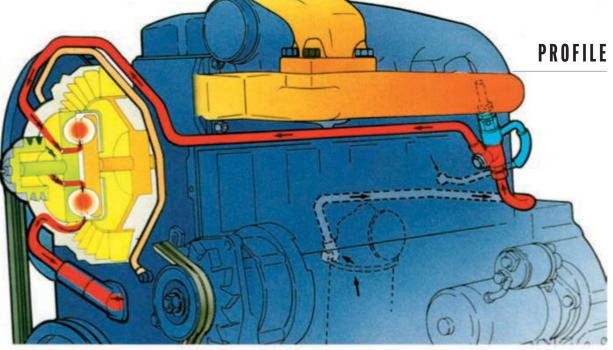
In terms of maintenance, Alan recommends taking your time and taking care not to be heavy handed. It's perhaps a cliché to say that things should be done 'by the book', but if you do things the right way you will be rewarded with an engine that is reliable and delivers on demand.

"Caution should be taken when adjusting the valve clearances, as it is easy to over-tighten the rocker cover retaining bolt and crack the aluminium cover," Alan pointed out. "It is essential to replace the rocker cover gasket and nylon washer on the securing bolt to prevent leaks, and a thin smear of silicone gasket sealant is always a good idea.

"Each rocker arm has small oil feed jet screw on it to dribble oil along a channel in the rocker arm, to lubricate the top of the valves and the rocker pad (the bit where you measure the valve clearances). These jets are adjustable, by loosening the lock nut and turning the jet screw with a flat-bladed screwdriver.

"Screw in for less flow and out for more flow. The correct flow is small drips every 10 seconds or so, and it should not be squirting out at all. If they are open too much, the rocker chamber can fill

with oil, and this then goes down the valve guides into the inlet and exhaust ports of the cylinder heads. A tell-tale sign of this is black oil around the manifold-to-cylinder head joints. It also leads to high oil consumption, as the engine digests the excess oil and burns it in the combustion process."

DX4&DX6

As for the DX 4 and DX 6 tractors, the points regarding the DX 3 engines apply, but there are points to note that are model specific. DX 4 used both naturally aspirated and turbocharged engines, with the F4L 912 powering the DX 4.10 and the F4L 913 used for the DX 4.30. The DX 4.50 and DX 4.70 both used the BF4L 913 – a turbocharged version of the engine used in the DX 4.30.

The DX 6.05 and DX 6.10 featured the F6L 912 engine, the DX 6.30 used the F6L 913, and the DX 6.50 was powered by the BF6L 913. There were changes made to piston, piston ring and injection pumps, with the DX 6.50 having the addition of a boost control system on the Bosch inline fuel pump.

The difference between 912 series and 913 series engines is piston diameter and stroke – to give larger cubic capacity on the 913 series. The 'B' in the engine designation indicates a turbocharger was fitted, which also meant a larger-capacity engine oil pump and larger nozzle size on the under-piston cooling nozzles. All had a thermostatically-controlled cooling fan clutch, and oil heating for the cab.

One of the main points to note on the engine in the DX 4 and DX 6 tractors is

the thermostatically-controlled cooling fan. This had an oil clutch built into it that was like a miniature torque converter, or fluid flywheel.

Alan explains the theory behind it: "The thermostat was mounted in the rear of the exhaust manifold, and it was the expansion of the core of the thermostat in relation to exhaust gas temperature, which in turn was an indication of engine load, that moved a small spool valve to increase or decrease the amount of oil flow to the fan clutch. The hotter the exhaust temperature, the more oil went to the clutch.

"The advantage of this system was it only gave the engine the cooling air flow it needed for the work it was doing. So, on a cold winter's day on light duties, the clutch may not engage at all, but on a hot summer's day, flat out driving a power harrow or a forage harvester, the exhaust temperature would be high, and the fan fully engaged.

"It was promoted as a fuel-saving device and Deutz was very focused on selling that attribute of its engines in the 1980s and '90s, with the 'Save diesel. Drive Deutz." sales strapline.

"There was a simple override that us service boys found for the rare times when the customer wanted full cooling on lower engine loads," Alan explained. "Feeder wagons in dusty cattle sheds was probably the best example in Cheshire!

"On the side of the thermostat is a small, 10mm-head bolt with a copper washer beneath its head. If this bolt was removed, the copper washer taken off and the bolt refitted, it had the effect of opening the spool valve inside the thermostat to its fully open position, resulting in full fan engagement. We simply threaded the copper washer onto the tractor ignition key ring for safe keeping, so it could be reinstalled later if required!"

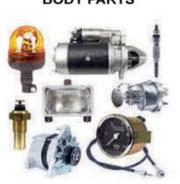

The fourth part of this series sees Andrew Hall looking at the hydraulic system fitted to Nuffield Universal tractors.

y the late 1940s, tractors such as the Ferguson TE-20 range, the Fordson Major E27N, and David Brown Cropmaster were well established machines and included built-in hydraulic lift systems.

As previously covered in *T&M*, the Ferguson System incorporated automatic draft control, which controlled the working depth of soil-engaging implements without the need for depth wheels, whilst the likes of the Fordson Major and David Brown, although able to utilise a three-point linkage, were restricted by the Ferguson patents and had to rely upon depth wheels to control their implements.

THE NUFFIELD TRACTOR

Development of the Nuffield tractor began in the early post-war days of 1945 and was designed and produced by the Morris Motor Company of Cowley, which at the time was headed by William Morris, who had been knighted in the 1920s, made a Baron in 1934 and gained the title of Viscount Nuffield (later Lord Nuffield) of Nuffield in Oxfordshire.

Two prominent names in agricultural engineering were recruited by the Nuffield Organisation to facilitate the development – Claude Culpin, well known for his books on agricultural machinery, and Dr. Henry Merritt, a skilled engineer in the design of gearbox manufacture.



The Nuffield Universal tractor was introduced in late 1948 and featured a hydraulic lift and category two three-point linkage as an option, which remained unchanged until modified to incorporate draft control in 1961 on the 342 and 460 models.

By the middle of 1948, the first Nuffield tractors began to roll off the production line, and in a similar manner to the Fordson Major, accessories such as the hydraulic lift weren't immediately available, but could be retrospectively fitted to existing tractors once more readily available.

The hydraulic units were self-contained and bolted directly onto the rear axle housing of the tractor. The units consisted of a cast iron housing, which contained the gear-type hydraulic pump, control valve block and internal lift cylinder. The pump was driven via the power take-off shaft, which needed to be engaged to operate the pump – a situation that wasn't addressed until the Nuffield had been in production for some years!

SIMPLE CONTROLS

The PTO/hydraulic engagement lever is located low down on the rear left-hand side of the hydraulic unit, and has three positions: neutral, PTO and hydraulics. To operate the hydraulics the lever is placed into the hydraulic position, hence the need for the PTO to be engaged.

Once engaged, the operation of the hydraulics is controlled by two levers at the top of the unit to the right-hand side of the driver's seat. The main lever has a round knob and controls the three-point linkage and a ½-inch BSP external services port situated on the left side of the tractor, near to the top link bracket.

The second lever has a square knob and controls a separate ½-inch BSP external port to the right-hand side of

the top link bracket. Each lever has three positions: low, neutral and lift.

Depending upon what implement is in use, the levers can be used independently of each other or together. To raise a mounted implement the main lever is lifted fully until the implement is at the desired height, when the lever is placed into the neutral position. If an implement is fully raised, the lever will automatically return to the neutral position.

The operation of the second lever is similar when operating external remote cylinders, such as tipping trailers. The second lever is the preferred method of controlling external services, whilst the external service port, operated by the main (linkage) lever, works simultaneously with the linkage, so the link arms rise and fall in this mode!

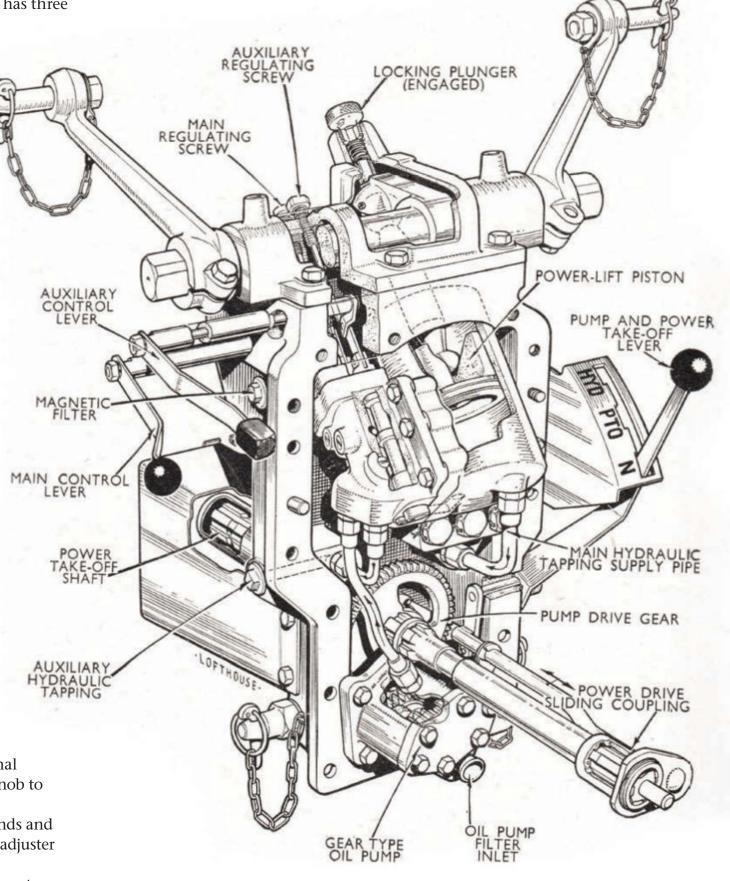
LOWERING RATE

The speed at which a mounted implement drops, and the rate at which oil returns from a remote cylinder, can be adjusted by means of two screw adjusters on the top of the hydraulic unit. The adjuster for the main lever has a round knob, whilst the external services adjuster has a square knob to assist in identifying them. The maximum drop rate is 1½ seconds and can be altered by turning each adjuster in or out as required.

When new, the two external ports were identified using a black-painted square adjacent to the right-hand external port and a round circle near to the left-hand port to correspond with the aforementioned round and square knobs on the levers! However, over the years where paint has weathered, or tractors have been repainted, many have been obliterated.

THREE-POINT LINKAGE

The linkage of Nuffield tractors is category two, as the tractors were in the heavier market than the smaller Fergusons and David Brown Cropmasters of the time, but it was a simple lift/lower system able to be held



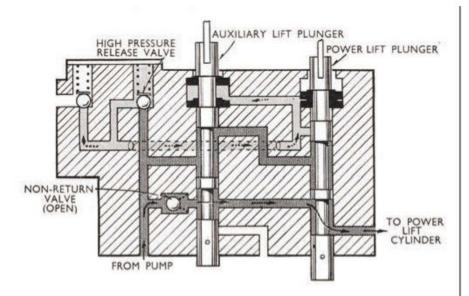

at any desired height. Depth of soilengaging implements was achieved using depth wheels on the implements, whilst adjustments for levelling an implement were carried out using a screw levelling box on the right-hand linkage drop arm.

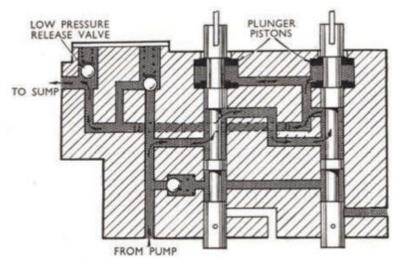
Adjustable stays were fitted each side of the link arms to suit the job in hand, and could be locked to prevent lateral sway, or allowed to slide and let an implement follow its own line of draft, such as a plough. A lift lock is incorporated in the top cover of the hydraulic system to enable implements to be locked in the raised position when being transported between fields!

OII & FILTERS

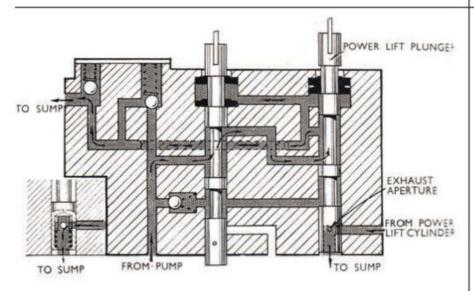
Originally SAE-90 oil was recommended, and the hydraulic system shares the same oil as the gearbox and rear axle. The oil level is checked using the dipstick adjacent to the gear lever on the transmission housing. With the arrival of more modern universal tractor oils,



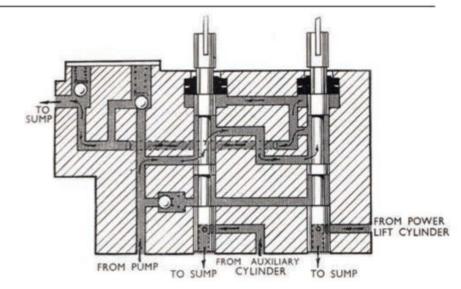

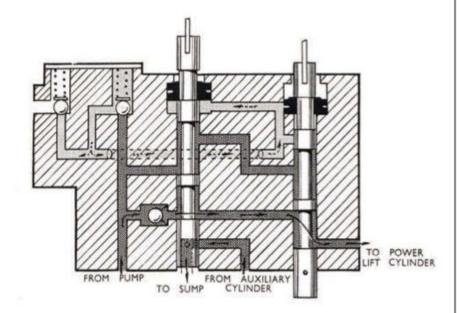

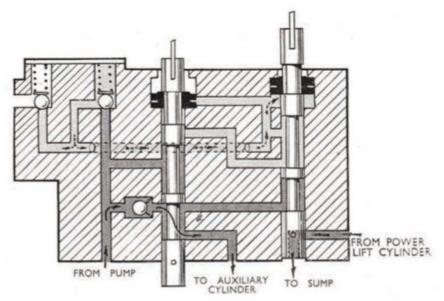

the original SAE-90 can be replaced by universal oil with no issues.

Early Nuffield hydraulic systems up to 1955 operated at 1,000psi, after which they were upgraded to 2,000psi, allowing for heavier and more demanding conditions! Early tractors can be upgraded to 2,000psi by changing the pump and pressure relief valve to suit.

IMPLEMENTS

Ferguson set the trend for matched implements to suit its tractors and the other manufacturers followed suit.

The Ford Motor Company manufactured ploughs for a time and worked in conjunction with Ransomes, Sims and Jefferies and approved other implements for use with its tractors. David Brown also built its own implements and approved implements from other manufacturers too.

The Nuffield Organisation chose not to manufacture its own implements but worked in conjunction with other manufacturers to provide a comprehensive range of matched implements.

Going strong!

t was good to be back in Norfolk for the largest Boxing Day tractor road run, which started at The Angel Inn, Larling, not far from Attleborough and Thetford, and held in glorious weather, says Peter Love.

I had not been at the event since 2018, when Gavin and Jack Stammers

took over from former National High Cut Champion Shaun Garrod and family, who ran the event for several years and were present in 2022. The creators of the event, David Boggia and David Kidd, were also enjoying the atmosphere as the crowds and tractors packed in beside the booking area opposite The Angel Inn, which was serving breakfast to those that had arrived early for the run, which totalled more than 20 miles.

When this event started in 2003, it was, according to the two Davids, basically the domain of vintage and classic tractors – amounting to an

average of 120 participants. Today, like so many of the winter charity road runs, the event has changed, and older tractors are no longer as prevalent.

Approximately 60 preservation machines and around 130 modern farm tractors took part this time, but it was great to see, and my congratulations go to the organisers.

The charity chosen to benefit from the funds raised was YANA (You Are Not Alone), which does much for mental health in the East Anglian countryside and it was wonderful to see this event supporting such a good cause. The cost of entry on the day was £20, which included a plaque for attending.

Despite so many entries, the organisers had it all together as the run was on its way at 10.10am, with the older machines leading the pack, led by a 1965 Ford 3000 and John Deere 1030, as well as some interesting Fordson E1A conversions. Then came an MF 135, two lovely original Nuffields, including

Malcom Stammers' recent purchase with Lambourn cab.

There was so much to see, including two- and four-wheel drive Ford 7810s – one of which was a Silver Jubilee model – as well as a pink Ferguson TE-D 20! A John Deere 3040 with vintage caravan was an interesting combination, but other JDs that stood out included a two-wheel drive 2040S, four-wheel drive 4220, and an original 2650.

Everyone waved from their cabs, creating a great atmosphere, and made up for the awful weather that this event suffered last year. The magnificent selection of MB-tracs gets better each time I attend, and this time it was the 1100 that I liked best, but a restored 1000 dressed for the occasion looked a treat too.

The organisers made sure there was a good gap between each batch of tractors as more classics went by, including a Massey Ferguson 675 and a 3000 Series model. There were several trailers behind the older stuff, seating people with lots of

layers on – as even with the sun out it was approximately four degrees above freezing by the time the action had started.

As for the modern stuff, there were plenty of Mannheim-built John Deeres, with partners in the passenger seats, but the thing that surprised me the most was the number of JCB Fastracs taking part. More than 25 were in attendance, with the 4220 the most popular model.

There were plenty of New Holland, Claas, Massey Ferguson, and Fendt models, as well as a few McCormicks, but there was also a smattering of Unimogs and Valtras. Deutz-Fahr was represented by several classic and modern tractors and perhaps one of the most interesting of them all was a rare Intrac 6.30 turbo. A few Case IH models were present, but it was an International 454 with trailer that I liked best – from an earlier era, of course!

It was certainly a wonderful Boxing Day treat to be present and the event went on to raise £4,600. \blacksquare

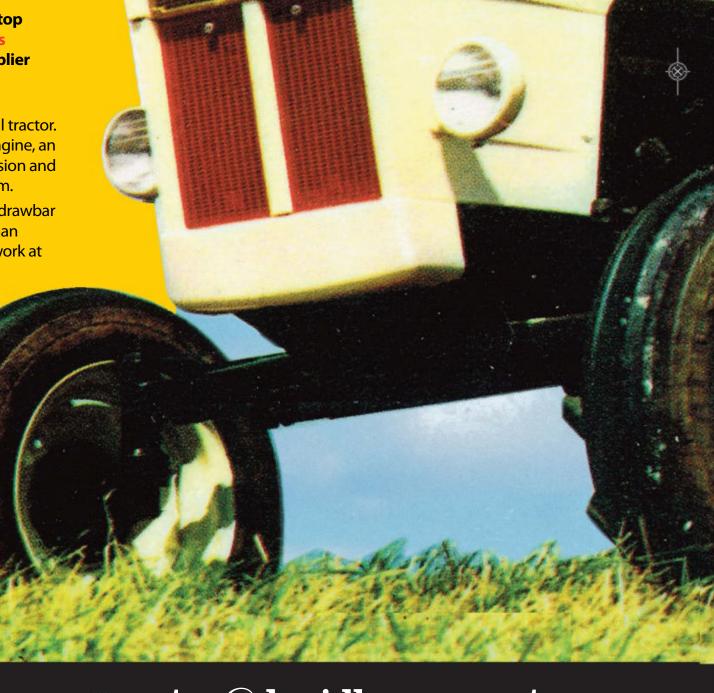

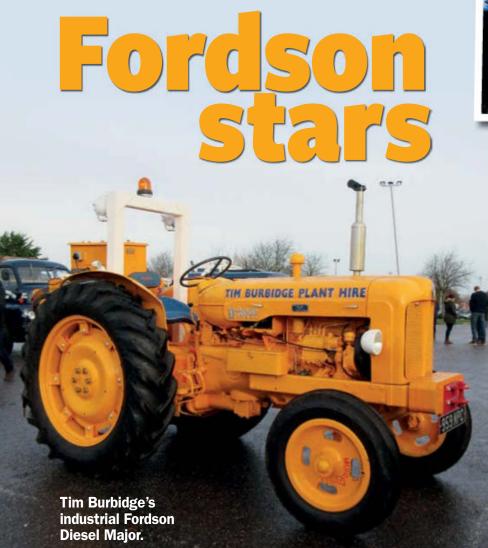

omerset Traction Engine Club held its traditional New Year's Day Road Run at the Sedgemoor Livestock Market, near Bridgwater, writes Joseph Lewis. Tractor stars spanned a newly-restored, industrial Fordson Diesel Major, originally supplied by Thyers of Huntspill, and Fordson Diesel Major V8 conversion – both from the Tim Burbidge stable – to a 1984 John Deere 2140 owned by Jamie Day from Westonsuper-Mare.

Jamie acquired the 2140 from Wells, Somerset, where the previous owner used the tractor on a dump trailer. Jamie now puts the four-wheel drive model to good use, pulling the carnival float for Bridgwater-based Griffins Carnival Club.

Massey Ferguson entries ranged from a 65 MkII, 165, and 390T, to what was the largest tractor on the day, an 8480 owned by David Grabham, from Taunton.

The £5 parking charge for non-exhibiting vehicles is given to local charities.

had now completed Tim Edwards'
Massey Ferguson 135 MkIII, and it
was good being able to drive it outside
to see it in the daylight for the first
time. Even though it was narrow, it
wasn't too tricky to get on – as that
extra section in the gearbox lengthened
the area between the dash and the seat
enough to easily swing my leg over.

I had originally advised that this tractor should be put back to its narrowest setting, which now it was complete I was pleased I had. Viewing it from the front I couldn't believe how narrow it was. The front was largely the same as is its British counterpart, with the most visual change being the adoption of an all-black grille.

Attached to the side of the nose were sidelight/indicator combinations made by Auteroche, as the ones I took off weren't good enough to put back on. I searched on the Internet for some new ones, and, to my amazement, they were

still available. Despite these being for sale in France, Spain, and various other European countries, I still found it difficult to obtain them, as the messages I had sent weren't answered.

One evening I was sat by the TV and decided to trawl through the Bepco online catalogue under the section of sidelights. To my amazement I found the rear ones I wanted, but there was no sign of the front ones. All was not lost, however, as they stocked the lenses for the fronts.

I soon worked out that I could probably cannibalise some rear ones and fit the front lenses. This worked well, with only a partition in the units having to be removed. The brackets these mounted onto were finished in Flint Grey, as that's what they were when I took them off.

As tractors have evolved over the years, so has safety, and one area that had been concentrated on was around the fan and

fan belt. This area, involving moving parts, was deemed dangerous, and while there had been a guard over this area since the MF 35 days, it was more substantial on the 135 MkIII. Now both sides had been covered and the one over the dynamo was longer, there was now virtually no chance of accidentally getting your fingers trimmed on the fan.

The Perkins AD3.152 was in good order, but I replaced the water and fuel lift pumps, as well as the front crank oil seal. It also had a complete oil and filter change, and I chose the genuine Perkins filters, as they should be good quality, and being visible would also look good.

Reference material

Another item that looked good on the side of the engine was the downswept exhaust silencer. This fitted on the standard manifold and dropped down neatly behind the injector pump, with a bracket securing it to the bell housing.

WORKSHOP

I managed to find an original picture on the Internet of this model, which told me that it should be painted in silver. I bought a can of heat-resistant spray paint and did the silencer and manifold, which looked just how I wanted it to.

The bonnet top had seen a lot of welding and I was pleased with the results, but I was even more pleased with the decals. These had been made by Titch Sanders at Machinery Decals and were a great copy of what was on originally. On this French-built model the battery cover had the air pre-cleaner 'mushroom' sticking out the top, and as this section of tinwork had been renewed, I had to cut a round hole in it.

The pre-cleaner was original and had been carefully welded back together, as it

was rotten and in two pieces. An MF 35 steering column rubber boot just fitted tightly around it to seal the hole and make it look neat.

Another area that looked neat was the dash, with all its original gauges fitted. These were made by Jaeger and featured the MF triple triangle badge on each gauge. These were in great condition, and I was really pleased that they could reused.

This tractor was made in 1979, which is relatively new for me, and had also been looked after during its working life. This meant most of the parts were in quite good condition and I was relieved that the fenders fell into this category. Those used would have been tricky to replace, and while I did have to do some welding and filling, they were

salvageable. Attached to each mudguard was a bracket for the lights and reflectors, and these were both obtained from Bepco.

The three-point linkage looked stronger than the size of tractor demanded. As there is no room for check chains, instead there are some ingenious adjustable brackets that prevent the lower link arms rubbing against the tyres.

When Tim brought me his MF 135 MkIII to restore, he wanted it done for the Newport Show, in Shropshire, which was in July. This was his local show, and he knew the guy that organised the tractor display. On a blisteringly hot day, Tim exhibited the tractor alongside his MF 35 and Fordson Major, and it was pleasing for me as all three had been through my workshop for restorations!



Narrow tread

From this angle I was really pleased that I had set the tractor to its narrowest tread width.



Sidelights

The sidelight and indicator combinations were 'very' French and made by Auteroche.



Safety first

Compared to earlier MF models, there is more protection around the fan and fan belt – which gives a good indication of the tractor's age.



Pulley guard

The safety features also include the dynamo on the right-hand side of the tractor.



Downswept exhaust

5 I love this neat little downswept exhaust silencer, which I finished in silver, heat-resistant paint.



Decals

I was really pleased with the bonnet, especially these decals that were made by Titch Sanders at Machinery Decals.

On this French-built model, the air pre-cleaner sticks up through the battery cover.



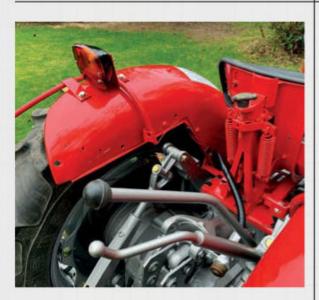
Original gauges

Experts' advice

These pages are here to help readers solve their technical problems. Our pictures are only for illustration, unless indicated otherwise, and are not the tractors being written about.

Massey Ferguson 135

have recently replaced my old Massey Ferguson 35 with a 135 to undertake paddock maintenance. The tractor is in good overall condition, having received fresh paint, and engine wise it starts and runs well.

I am, however, experiencing a strange, intermittent knocking noise from the hydraulic system. When the hydraulic lever is lowered the noise disappears but returns when the lever is raised fully, and an attached implement reaches its maximum height.

I'm wondering if there is something loose within the hydraulic system causing the noise. If the team at *T&M* can help, it would be most appreciated. *Roger Blackstone*, *via e-mail*

The noise you mention could be caused by one or two reasons. Firstly, if you compare your 135 hydraulic control quadrant with the

previous 35 quadrants you will see some differences in the options displayed. At the top of the main operational lever there is a 'transport' position where implements are at their maximum travel height. Beyond this is a 'constant pumping' section.

If an implement is raised through the transport section into the constant pumping section it causes the pressure relief valve to blow, as the oil is under full pressure. This causes the pump to knock, and the lever shouldn't be left in this position for long periods. It may be that you are entering constant pumping inadvertently. When raising implements, ensure you don't lift beyond the transport position.

It may also be that the system is out of adjustment and the lift reaches constant pumping before the quadrant passes the transport section. This would require adjustments to the quadrant linkage to correct the issue!



Another cause could be that one, or both hydraulic pump-locating dowels has broken, allowing the pump to float and knock against the transmission casing, but is less likely to be the cause, as the pump would knock continuously, and in your case it's only when the implement is fully raised.

The constant pumping section is only usually entered to lift the linkage beyond transport position to enable the carrying hooks (or tee-bar catch) of a pick-up hitch to be released prior to lowering the hook. It is also used to override the internal hydraulics to provide a constant flow of oil to implements using external hydraulic services, such as spool valves where the oil flows back to the transmission housing when not required!

Ferguson TE-F20



I took up an offer of a Ferguson TE-F 20 that has been standing idle for many years. A new battery was fitted, and the oil, water and fuel levels checked before attempting to start it. After a lot of cranking the engine fired up and was very smoky and appears to be firing on only three cylinders.

Before I begin stripping it to investigate, can you give me some pointers that suggest what may be wrong with the engine please?

If the tractor has been standing with the engine in one position for any time, it could be misfiring due to a faulty valve seat, where a valve has been open, and the seat corroded.

Removal of all the fuel injectors and a compression test would reveal which cylinder has the faulty valve. If all cylinders have good, even compression, it may be a blocked fuel injector.

These can be tested on a pop tester, whilst removed, and remedied accordingly.

Another reason could be a seized plunger in the inline injection pump. To test this, remove all four injector pipes from the engine, ensure a good clean fuel supply and crank the engine over on full throttle whilst observing the output from each of the pump outlets.

If one proves to be faulty, you'll need to have the pump stripped and rebuilt by a specialist!

David Brown 880

My old David Brown 880 needs some cosmetic restoration, but before embarking on preparing and repainting the tractor I need to sort out some oil leaks.

One area where it's leaking is from the offside rear axle hub, and oil is running down onto the rear wheel.

Can I replace the seal without removing the unit, or does it have to come off to do the job?

The other question is what grade of oil should go into the axle unit? I've used universal oil in the gearbox.

Ben Wright, Essex

It's always a good idea to cure any oil leaks before undertaking any fresh paintwork on a tractor, as any leaks after finishing the work will spoil the new

paintwork and leave the tractor looking a mess!

Oil leaks from the final drive units of DB tractors isn't uncommon. It may, however, be worth checking the breather, which is a drilled bolt in the upper part of the cover plate on the rear of the unit. The drilling allows the units to breath and prevents pressure build-up, which forces oil through the seals. These sometimes block with dirt and are easily cleaned.

Also, don't overlook the greasing of the outer hub bearing. The application of grease through the hub grease point also assists in sealing the seal, so it's well worth trying these jobs before removing and dismantling the final drive unit to replace the seal.

You say it's the right-hand final drive unit leaking, and if you remove it, you must engage the differential lock



pedal before withdrawing the unit to prevent the internal components from slipping

out of line whilst the unit is removed! The correct oil grade for the units is SAE-140.

John Deere 2020

My 1970 John Deere 2020 has developed an oil leak from under the rear axle area and is leaving a pool of oil wherever it is parked up. I'm not sure where the oil is leaking from and would appreciate some advice on the matter, as either a friend or I will be attempting to sort it out at first opportunity. Thanking you.

Your oil leak is likely to be coming from failed oil seals on the torsion shaft that carries the lower link arms. The John Deere 2020 features lower link sensing for controlling the working depth of soilengaging implements, rather

than top link sensing used by Massey Ferguson and other manufacturers.

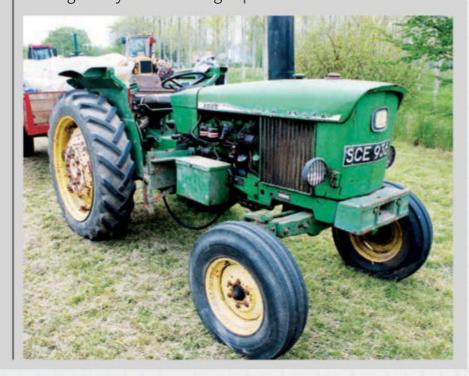
Draft forces of an operating implement act on the shaft and signals are sent to the hydraulic control valve to adjust the working depth, and such a system follows ground undulations more accurately than top link sensing.

The possibility is that the shaft and bushes are worn and it's a good idea to replace the shaft, bushes, and seals as a kit. You need to drain the transmission oil and remove the lower link arms. The shaft can then be knocked out of the transmission housing, allowing the bushes to be pulled from the housing.

The easiest way to pull the bushes is to remove the seals and insert a puller with the legs

outwards into the seal grooves. A slide hammer can then be used to impact the bushes out.

Reassembly is the reverse of the dismantling, making sure no dirt enters the transmission housing while you are working. If the original shaft is in good order and you choose to refit it, make sure you de-burr the areas around the lynch pin holes to prevent any burrs tearing the new oil seals as the shaft is inserted!

Fordson E27N revisited





are in the thick of one of the coldest spells for a while, and the temperatures have not been very inviting for anybody wishing to work on projects such as this! Unfortunately, cover for my tractors is limited and so opportunities to work have been non-existent recently.

One job I have been able to accomplish is the sorting out of the drum brake covers. Back in the late summer I worked on the brakes, which were relined back in 2016 and the final adjustment to the brake cables was done in the late summer, before I refit the footplates, as access was easier with them removed.

During the production of the E27N there were various revisions to parts, and one of these was the way in which the brake covers are attached to the brake back plates. Early tractors have three lugs welded onto each back plate, with three

Later models have the back plates drilled and tapped 5/16 UNC, whilst the covers have four slots in them to facilitate alignment. This design continued into the production of the later E1A Majors, until disc brakes arrived on Super Majors.

WIRED ON

Way back in the 1980s, when I first bought the tractor, the brakes were stuck on, due to the tractor having stood in a wood for many years on a saw bench, and they took some freeing off before I could tow the tractor home. The brake covers had been wired onto the back plates at some point previously, and as the setscrews were missing, I continued to wire them in place!

This time, having gone to the lengths I have, to sort the tractor I intend to put it back to original. One of the brake

covers was too far gone to repair, leaving me with only one with the lugs to work with. Some time ago I struck lucky when I acquired some brake covers from a Fordson E1A Major, so I decided to repair the original and to make and fit some lugs onto one of the E1A covers.

I selected the best of the covers to use, and the first job was to remove all the existing paint to enable me to assess the condition of them. Both covers have some pitting due to rust, with the original a bit like a lace curtain, but repairable.

NEW LUGS

The E1A cover has slots to attach it to the back plate, so these needed to be welded up and ground smooth, and three lugs made up, to the same pattern as the ones on the original, to be attached.

WORKSHOP

I measured the gauge of the steel used on the covers, which is 14 SWG (2mm), and selected a piece of similar steel to make the lugs. Using the lugs on the original cover as a template, by drawing round them, I marked out three fresh lugs on the new steel, allowing for the attachment tabs, which were to be folded 90 degrees as per the originals!

The attachment holes were also marked out, centre punched and drilled, before cutting the lugs out. A thin cutting disc was used in the mini grinder to cut them out of the steel plate, and the edges then tidied up. Each lug was then bent to form the attachment tabs in the vice, using a suitable hammer to create a tight, 90-degree fold.

Some slots were then cut along the tabs to allow them to bend to the radius of the cover and to sit snuggly in place before welding them on.

TRIAL FIT

The E1A Major cover was fitted to the left-hand brake of the tractor and positioned correctly, in order to mark out the positions of the lugs when welded on. Three arrows were drawn to mark their positions and each lug in turn was clamped into place before permanent attachment using the MIG welder.

Once all three lugs were attached, the cover was refitted to the tractor to ensure the lugs aligned correctly.

FURTHER REPAIRS

As previously mentioned, the original cover was like a lace curtain and in need of repair. A section was cut out where it was damaged most and a fresh piece of steel welded in. Other holes in the cover were dealt with at the same time and it proved to be rather difficult to complete, due to the thin nature of the steel, but after some care I managed to fix them all.

The slots in the E1A cover were also dealt with in the same manner. At this stage I need to grind the repairs of the original cover smooth and to refinish the paint on the covers. Some filler will be necessary to achieve a good finish, due to the pitting, which I'll show in the next issue!



Brakes adjusted

The brakes were adjusted back in the summer, having been re-lined in 2016, and now required the covers to be fitted.



Spare cover

A cover from a Fordson E1A Major was acquired to replace an original beyond repair. It's seen alongside the original cover with the lugs attached.



Paint removal

Paint has been removed from the original cover, whilst the replacement has been painted grey inside at some time in the past.



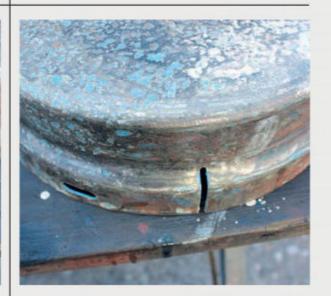
Flap wheel

A flap wheel was used to remove the paint from the outside of each of the covers, to enable me to assess their condition before repairing them.



Lace curtain

The original cover is like a lace curtain, so will require some repair before I'm satisfied with it.



Filler

After removing the paint there was evidence of some previous filler used on the replacement cover to smooth out the pitting.



New lugs

A piece of 14 SWG steel was selected and marked out to make three lugs to attach to the E1A cover by drawing around the lugs of the original cover.



Finished lugs

The lugs after cutting and fettling with the mini grinder. The holes were drilled before the lugs were cut out, as it was easier to support the work!



Trial fit

The E1A cover was trial fitted and the positions of the lugs marked with a black pen to accurately attach the new lugs.



Slots

Slots were cut into the attachment tabs to allow them to bend and follow the radius of the cover when welded into place.



Clamped

Each lug in turn was clamped into place, prior to MIG welding to the cover. The same gauge of steel was used for the lugs as that of the cover.



All done

All three of the lugs are now fitted and the redundant slots in the cover were welded up and ground smooth.



Original cover

Work on the original cover began with cutting out the badly corroded area ready to...



Repair patch

... weld in a repair patch, which will now need grinding to tidy it up, along with the other holes, which have also been dealt with.

Governor inspection

When the governor on Andrew Hall's Ferguson TE-D 20 played around, it was time to investigate.

've owned my '52 Ferguson TE-D 20 for quite a few years now, and it's been used for many jobs along the way, including making many appearances at local ploughing matches. 2022 was a good year for me regarding ploughing, as I was happy with my results and, moreover, particularly pleased with my ploughing using a 10-inch, two-furrow plough.

Overall, the tractor runs very well and purrs away nicely with its original engine, but whilst on the way to my first ploughing match of this year the engine began to run faster than usual, and after climbing a hill and then descending the other side, the engine shut down after closing the throttle lever and wouldn't rev up again when back on the level.

A quick pull into a layby and a fiddle with the throttle linkage soon brought the engine speed back up, but after this it continued to behave badly. Despite its behaviour on the way to the match the engine ran smoothly enough to plough at low revs and continued satisfactorily throughout the remaining matches.

An observation of the throttle/ governor linkage whilst revving the engine and slowing it down showed no movement of the linkage where it enters the timing cover, so I suspected a jammed weight assembly and possibly the mushroom that bears on the linkage arm inside the cover.

New parts

To access the governor weights, the timing cover must be removed, which involves draining and removing the



radiator, the front axle, cooling fan and dynamo. I decided to replace the front crankshaft oil seal, and of course the timing cover gasket whilst the cover was removed, as I believe the oil seal is the original and has been weeping slightly for a while!

The first task was to remove the bonnet, which is held by the sliding bonnet stay and the two shouldered bolts either side of the radiator support. Next was the disconnection and removal of the battery, which will go on charge during the job.

The radiator was drained by removing the lower connection of the bottom hose and the old coolant discarded, as it's been in the engine for a long time. The radiator was then removed, providing better access to the front of the engine.

Supporting the tractor

A hydraulic bottle jack was used under the engine sump to lift and support the tractor. A piece of wood was used above the jack to spread the load and protect the engine sump whilst under load, and two axle stands and a bar used as a 'belt and braces' safety measure.

Attention then turned to the radius arm fixings either side of the clutch housing. The footrests were slackened and withdrawn enough to allow the



Off with the bonnet

The first task was to remove the bonnet, which is secured by the sliding stay and two shouldered bolts at the base of the radiator support.



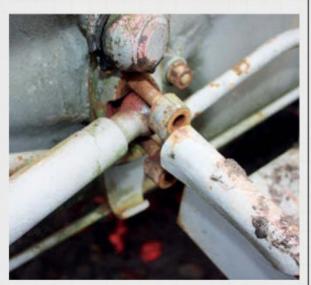
Coolant drained

I slackened the hose clip on the bottom hose to drain the coolant, which will be replaced with fresh, as it hasn't been changed for a while.



Splitting steering joints

A joint splitter was used to separate the ball joints at the front end of the drag links, which were then folded backwards out of the way.



Radius arms

Then it was the turn of the radius arm joints either side of the clutch housing. The footplates were eased outwards to allow the footrests to clear.



Radiator stay

Next was the removal of the radiator stay, the top hose and the radiator, before removing the front axle assembly.



Wedges

Two wedges were inserted to prevent the axle tilting whilst off the tractor, followed by removal of the attachment bolts and axle assembly.



Cooling fan

The fan blades and pulley hub were removed to improve access to the timing cover, for cleaning and removal purposes.



Initial scrape

Much of the grime was scraped off before using some...



Degreasing solvent

... degreasing solvent to completely clean the area around the front of the engine.

WORKSHOP



All looks well

At first sight all looks well. I had suspected the governor weights may be jammed or the mushroom that bears on the linkage.



Fully outwards

The governor weights were moved fully outwards and are completely free to move with no baulking up.



Fully inwards

1 I then pushed them inwards fully, again with no problems, so the problem may be elsewhere.



Oil seal replacement

A large socket was used to gently tap out the old oil seal whilst supporting the cover on a firm, flat surface.



further cleaning with some degreasing solvent made a better job of it, as I didn't want any dirt entering the engine whilst the cover was removed. The cover bolts were the next target, and after their char

removal the cover was gently tapped and prised away from the engine.

axle had been released from the front of the engine. A ball joint splitter was used to split the front ball joints of the steering drag.

radius arms to come out once the front

the front ball joints of the steering drag links, the axle was blocked with wedges to prevent it tipping, and once the four 5/8 UNF setscrews and two smaller ½-inch bolts were removed, the axle was wheeled forward out of the way.

Fan & dynamo

To improve access further, both the cooling fan and dynamo were removed, as the whole front end of the engine required cleaning before removing the timing cover. An initial scrape took much of the grime and debris off, but

Clean condition

The engine is in remarkably clean condition, with no sludge in the timing cover or around the timing chain, and the governor weights and mushroom are also in good, unworn condition. All the weights moved in and out as required and the mushroom was free to move to and fro, so there was nothing obviously wrong in this area.

However, it wasn't a waste of time, as I had the new oil seal to fit. The timing cover is cast aluminium and essentially fragile, so care was required in the changing of the seal. The seal must be pressed into the cover to remove it, so the cover was placed on a firm level surface and a snug-fitting ¾-drive socket used to carefully tap it out.

The area around was wiped clean before tapping the new seal into place. Gentle tapping was needed to insert the new seal until it bottomed out in its groove. Reassembly was the reverse of the dismantling process, but there are some further tasks to cover along the way, so look out for the next issue of T&M to see more progress.

SALES REVIEWS

Michigan sale

Aumann Auctions held the Ken Gill disposal sale at Albion, Michigan, concluding on Monday 14 November. It was a sale that featured tractors from the 1930-60s in various conditions and reflected models of this fruit area in their day.

The one they all wanted was a Massey-Harris 44 Diesel Hi-Clear Special, no. 53468A, said to be one of two survivors. In older restored condition it sold for a huge £44,544. Massey-Harris prices have not been very exciting recently, but this one turned that around.

Next up was the 44 O (orchard), no. 801072, that featured on the cover of a C H Wendel Massey-Harris book decades ago. Looking reasonably clean it sold for £16,533. The second oldest tractor in the



The big one in the Ken Gill sale was this Massey-Harris 44D Special hi-crop at £44,544.

sale was a Massey-Harris GP 15-22 with the earlier Hercules side-valve engine. In running condition, but needing work, it was moved on at £11,533. As for the oldest, a Wallis 20-30 in older restored condition, just £2,613 was paid for it.

Massey Fergusons were Ken's first love and an Oliver-built 1958 MF 97 with the GM 3-71 engine, an older restoration, sold for £13,363. An amazing 'dusty' MF 98 LPG four-wheel drive, with a cab fitted, made much less at £4,540.

This area always sees some 'lesser known' tractors that roamed this area in the late '30s and '40s turn up. The Empire 88, no. 5577, which looks more like a Jeep than a tractor, and does use a Willys engine, sold for £3,383. This company went bust in 1950 and its stock was bought by Jabez Love, who was based in Michigan, and this example more than likely came from this stock.

Ford 5000 hi-clear

Aumann Auctions held a very interesting sale at Perry, Georgia, at the beginning of December, containing 180 tractors.

The stars were in the first day of the auction, which featured restored John Deere row-crop models, with full lift implements, from the 1950s. It started with a 330S at £8,499, a 330U at £10,903, a 420V at £13,908, and a 320 at £11,761. In the larger line, an LPG-powered 60, the subject of a stunning restoration, sold for £13,135.

A pair of rare Ford 5000 hi-clears was included too – one of which had been restored and left outside, giving it flat and faded paintwork. It was in running order and sold for £7,125, while the

rough example with wrong bonnet reached £3,176.

This is an area of the USA where many of the older tractors were scrapped following the two WW2 scrap drives but, thankfully, on the second day of the sale

there was a raft of well restored 1920-30s IH Farmall W series row-crop tractors on offer. Sadly, they sold for less than £1,000 on average.

Interesting to see was a Leader tractor, in restored condition, that sold for £1,365.

SALES REVIEWS

A R Wilson sale part two

In late December, Cheffins launched the second of the online A R Wilson Agricultural Ltd. sales, which concluded on Friday 6 January. It featured 17 crawlers and one wheeled tractor (Allis-Chalmers A) of various sizes.

Perhaps the most significant crawlers offered were the two International TD-35 petrol-start diesel models. Although they were preservation imports, it's said that 45 of these crawlers came to the UK in the 1930s. Both examples need a full rebuild and raised £3,000 between them.

The sale opened with a nearly finished Caterpillar Ten – a model introduced in 1928 to replace the 2-Ton. Just under 5,000 were made of this 'baby' Caterpillar, which features a 2.3-litre, side-valve engine. The tractor had been painted and just needed the finishing touches. It changed hands at £2,300.

Next was a Caterpillar Thirty sprayed in Hi-Way Yellow, so presumably it's a late example. This type of crawler was part of the C L Best outstanding line of crawler designs and was ahead of the similar Holt opposition when introduced in 1921. This lot saw the hammer fall at £3,000, with the radiator looking to need a new core.

An untouched Caterpillar RD-4 looked an early example. The model was made between 1936-38 and was the diesel version of the gas-powered R4 Thirty. This early, imported example was complete and sold for just £1,000.



Selling very well indeed was the Allis-Chalmers A at £5,600.

Next up was a Twenty – another model that had its roots in the C L Best dynasty, with a 4.5-litre, overhead-valve engine which produced 29hp. This was an early example and went on to sell for £900. There was another example that sold for similar money.

A popular model in the UK is the Caterpillar D6 9U model, when good examples come along. The 8U (60in gauge) and 9U (74in gauge) came along in 1947 and featured the new six-cylinder D318 65dbhp engine and the model lasted until the late 1950s. This imported, 1949 example looked the ticket and featured hydraulics and made top crawler money at £5,200.

As for the 1940 Caterpillar D8 1H, it was very straight and had great potential, particularly at £3,600.

Many of the Caterpillar parts were cheap, but there is a limited market. There was VAT on all the prices quoted here.

What conclusion can one reach from these sales? Well, preservation of tracked equipment is not so hot as it was 10 years ago. At one time there was great fanaticism for Caterpillar preservation in the UK, but it looks to have gone now, not helped by the fact you need a low-loader to move them about.

The last of the A R Wilson Agricultural Ltd. sales to be staged by Cheffins, starts with spares on 19 May and the crème de la crème is being offered on Saturday 20 May.

he prices are based on tractors sold at sales, on the Internet, privately and in some overseas markets too. Naturally, prices change as time progresses and it's not always an upward trend, but you will get a good indication of what's going on with the current market by referring to our guide. Here are a few pointers on buying a tractor to help you.

If you are looking for a tractor to buy for restoration, or work, there's a vast choice. However, if you are looking for something specific, do weigh up your options first, particularly if you have a limited budget.

If it's a popular model, then it's not always to your advantage to go for the first one you see. Whatever is wrong with the tractor, make sure you have a good idea of how much it will cost to repair, and so on.

Buying a restored tractor can be the best option for some people, but do your research properly and if you are buying at a sale, talk to the vendor if you can. For example, the tractor has a shiny coat of paint, but ask him what rust prevention primer he used underneath it, was the tractor sand-blasted or wire-wheeled down? If the vendor is worth his salt he will have pictures of the restoration and be able back up the information he gives you.

Find out what you can. Take a friend or associate with you who, perhaps, has a better idea of what is what and, if there's a preview to the sale, go and try the tractor out for yourself. Make sure beforehand exactly what you will have to pay after the hammer has dropped: does the lot have VAT? What's the buyer's commission? And so on.

Buying online at a sale can save you travelling, but you really don't know what you're getting. Yes, you can see the pictures of the tractor and the live action, but you aren't properly seeing it for yourself. If you cannot attend, get a trusted friend or associate, who might be at the sale, to look at the tractor for you, then bid online.

An associate got talked into buying a Continental tractor (made in Germany) via an Internet advertisement and was told it had a transmission problem. He asked about obtaining parts and was told they were easy to get.

Well that might be true in Germany, but my associate doesn't speak German. In addition, specific items are very expensive for these tractors. He also wants to use the tractor, particularly for road runs, but he has now discovered that it's not very fast on the road (18kph) – not a very happy outcome really.

Some people love the adventure of tracking down the spares and all that it entails – the challenges, the travel involved, the people you meet along the way – it all adds to life's experiences.

For the person in question, however, that wasn't the plan. Think hard about what you are intending to purchase.

If buying an imported tractor – especially from North America – make sure you see a rear view of the machine before purchase. On a number of occasions it has come to light that the tractor featured damaged mudguards through containerisation. If the vendor does not want to send a rear picture, then there could be a good reason. This especially applies to veteran tractors.

WHAT OUR CODING SYSTEM MEANS

We have laid out the guide in six bands and a more detailed explanation of these is set out below. However, please note that in our sale review pages we sometimes use a double number code, for example 2.4. This would mean, needs work (2) and is an older restoration (4).

Band 1

A tractor that normally isn't running, but can be restored.

Rand 2

A tractor that is running and needs some work.

Band 3

The critical one, it's for original-type tractors – tractors that are essentially very straight and original, have good tinwork, have in most cases not been re-sprayed during their working lives, run well and normally have low hours. There can be exceptions to the rule, but original-type tractors in most cases command higher prices and in some cases it's more than a good restored tractor.

Band 4

This represents an older restored tractor that normally runs with a little recommissioning, but perhaps hasn't been looked at for a while.

Band 5

A restored tractor that does everything it should and looks good with average paintwork.

Band 6

The ultimate. These are concours tractors that have been gone right through and are finished to perfection, but not customised.

The last word

In each issue our Editor-at-large, Peter Love, takes a look at what has been going on in the world concerned with heritage preservation.

ollowing on from my comments in February's Last word column, regarding the Science Museum, I have since received correspondence from Jack Kirby, Associate Director of Collections Services, Science Museum Group. His e-mail read as follows:

"I am writing to you from the Science Museum Group to provide more information on our plans for the National Collections Centre in Wroughton, Swindon, Wiltshire, and more contexts to the recent sale of tractors, both of which featured in an article published in *Tractor* & *Machinery* magazine.

"The Science Museum Group Collection contains 47 tractors, many of which are of national or international significance. Our records show that when the Group purchased tractors from Frank Smith in 1982, there was an intention to identify which should remain in the collection at a future date. We retain 35 of these tractors.

"In the early 2000s the Group worked closely with the Rural Museums Network, taking stock of the Distributed National Collection of tractors in museums across the UK, which identified machines of technical and social significance. By 2018 the Science Museum Group had embarked on a review of the 7.3 million items in its collection, examining their significance in light of curatorial research.

"This ongoing review provides the opportunity to ensure the collection is sustainable and can be enjoyed by future generations. It has highlighted areas for future collecting and identifying a small number of objects that are no longer appropriate for the collection and could be best utilised elsewhere.

"As part of the review, our curators identified four tractors which told very similar stories to other tractors in the collection and were considered to be of lower significance given the breadth of the Group's collection and collections around the UK. Following a rigorous

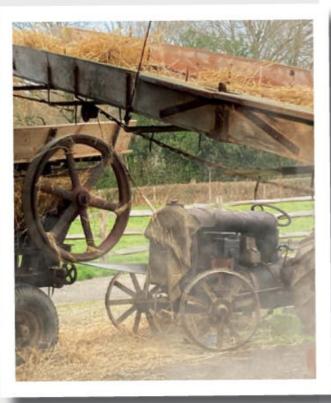
internal process, the decision was taken by the Group's Board of Trustees to advertise these four vehicles for transfer to another museum. No offers were forthcoming and so the tractors were sold at auction, with the sale proceeds reinvested in the collection in line with Arts Council England guidance.

"As mentioned, I also wish to provide some clarification around our plans for the National Collections Centre in Wroughton, Wiltshire. The Science Museum Group is in the middle of an ambitious project to move 300,000 historic objects into a new collection management facility at the site. This will enable public access to much of the collection from 2024 through regular public tours, school and research visits, ensuring these historic objects continue to inspire future generations.

"The new facility provides the stable environmental conditions needed for the long-term preservation and care of the Science Museum Group Collection. At 90m wide and 300m long, the facility is equivalent in size to 600 double decker buses. It features a spacious storage hall containing 30,000 metres of shelving and huge open space which house the collection, conservation laboratories, research areas and a photography studio.

"The complex process to study, record, photograph, digitise and pack the 300,000 objects has been under way for several years, with the first objects arriving in their new home in summer 2021. Thousands of objects already housed at the National Collections Centre – including an inert Polaris missile, a revolutionary Leyland Titan double decker bus and a record-breaking balloon gondola used to study the stratosphere – will also move into the facility.

"The new facility will enable the Science Museum Group to better store, conserve, research and photograph our unique collection, while also improving the process of displaying items in our five national museums and increasing the number of items loaned to UK and

international institutions. The public can already discover more of the Science Museum Group Collection than ever before thanks to our rapid digitisation efforts. Almost 200,000 historic objects can be seen in our online collection, with hundreds of new object photographs published online each month."

It is great to hear from the Science Museum about its plans and I look forward to the time when the new facility at the Wroughton site will be open to the public.

I was out and about at various points over the festive period and had the pleasure of seeing the High Weald Steam Working Weekend gang threshing near Uckfield, East Sussex. Driving a Fisher Humphries baler was William and Dave Mansi's early Fordson F – a very genuine, original tractor running on trembler coils. It was good to see this venerable machine in action, which must have been the oldest tractor working over the Christmas period.

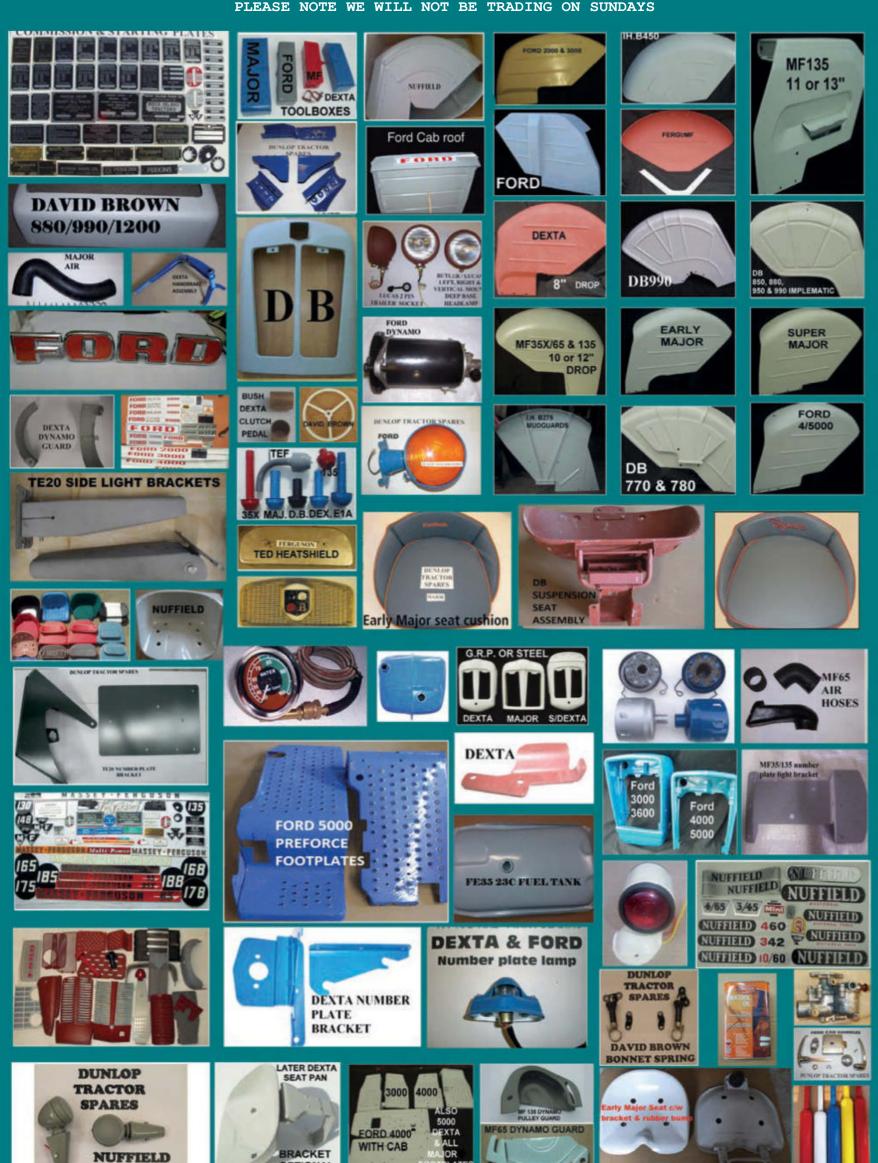
