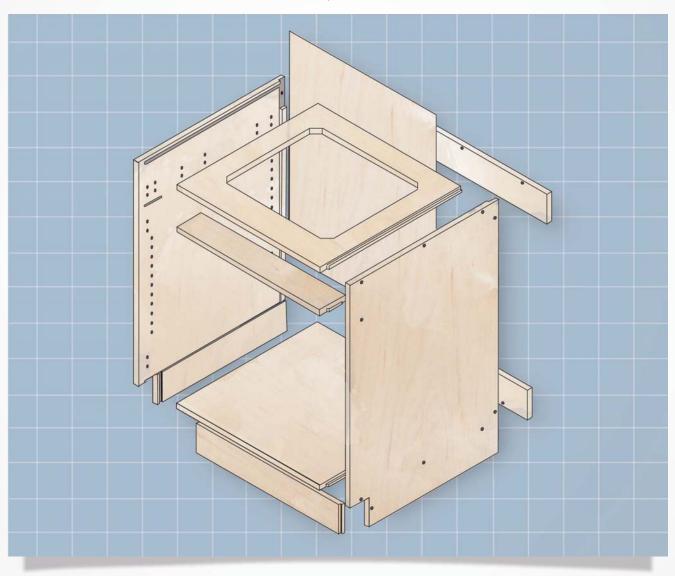

Big Guys Now Do Custom

Like Detroit's auto makers, big cabinet manufacturers are back, fully retooled to produce tailored cabinet designs, answering the consumer expectation of individualized cabinetry orders, with most shopping originating online.

At KBIS 2014 these cabinet manufacturing giants showed the designers in attendance how they manufacture from automated order intake, speed turnaround, build in LED lighting, and size cabinets in 1/4-inch increments to fill the space "just so."

They also have advanced their outreach to the end consumer, coaching dealers on building their local web presence, and upgrading dramatically door and cabinet showroom presentations.

How can custom cabinet shops compete with that?

Design Within Reach

Smaller shops do have access to most of the same hardware and lighting components that the big firms do. But small shops have to stay in touch with the novel looks that are taking cabinetry from "heirloom design" to contemporary fashion statement.

At the KBIS 2014 Kitchen & Bath Industry Show, LED lighting (even at toe kicks), hardware to organize cabinet and drawer interiors, large capacity drawers, and reclaimed woods, and complex multistage finishes were among the top trends. It's a lot less dusty since we got a new dust collection system hooked up to all of our new equipment through a State of Illinois grant. Quite a project! - Erin

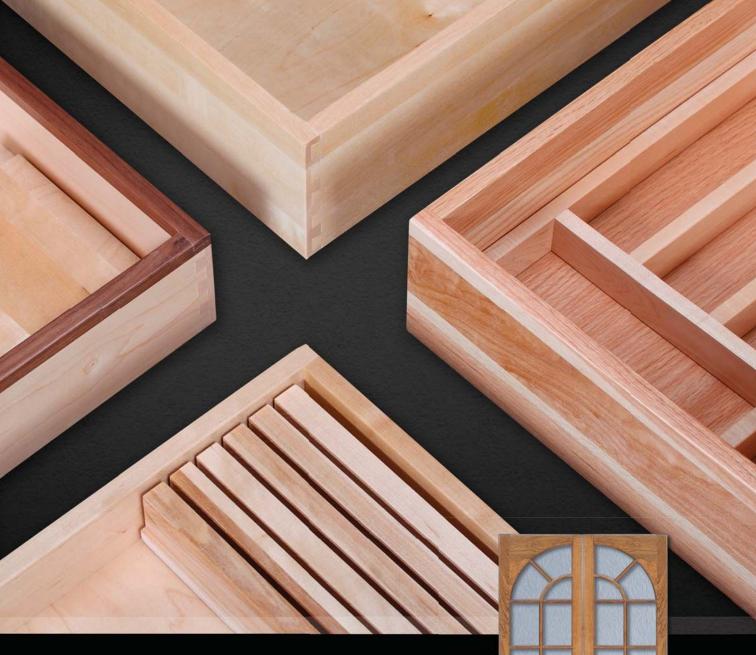
Some wood is just not going to dry straight, Scott Wunder blogs, recalling his start in cutting his own lumber. "Certain species always dry wonky: Flatsawn sycamore, elm, cottonwood and sweetgum," which twisted under pressure.

What type of mill do you use and how long have you been in the business... How did you get started? I have always been interested in milling logs into lumber but have not made a plunge. – Todd Hall, Grand Prairie, TX

Currently I use a Timberking bandsaw mill (for logs up to 30") and a Lucas mill with the chainsaw slabber for the big ones. I started 20 years ago with an Alaskan chainsaw mill and have owned a couple other mills in between. I long for a Hurdle automatic circle mill to dice up the lower-grade logs as fast as humanly possible. As far as I can tell, there will always be another mill I want. I say start out small. If you like it, can handle it physically, can find enough logs and love doing it, you can always buy a bigger mill. It is just cool to cut open a log, no matter how you do it. - Scott Wunder

High-tech Hot Air **Sharp Edge Advantage**

New hot air edgebanders give seamless, durable joints, and make a strong case to upgrade from traditional glue lines.

High-tech hot air edgebanding was shown last year at international woodworking shows, including the AWFS Fair in Las Vegas. If you have followed the storyline of laser edgebanders – a regular edgebanding machine that uses a laser to weld pre-glued edgeband material to panels – hot air edgebanding is the next chapter in the quest for quality and productivity.

A big problem with conventional edgeband is the visible glue joint, which collects dirt, and since it is open, allows the glue underneath to reactivate and loosen. Hot air edgebanders, which use the same specialized edgeband as laser edgebanders, avoid that. Hot air edgeband withstands exposure to heat, steam and moisture better than conventional edgeband — though laser edgeband performs even better.

Stiles compared these two "zero glue line" edgebanding approaches side by side, demonstrating Rehau banding on Brandt and Homag edgebanders. Stiles Homag laserTec edgebanding system uses laser beam energy to activate the glue and fuse it to the panel edge. Laser edgbanding runs faster, but carries a

significant price tag: \$300,000 plus the cost of the edgebanding ma-

chine. airTec edgebanding, a \$45,000 upcharge on both Brandt and Homag models, is more compact and less expensive.

An early adopter of hot air edgbanding was Closet America, Lanham, MD. The home storage systems designer and manufacturer is the first U.S. company to place the Biesse Roxyl AirForce hot air edgebanding system in its production line.

The hot air edgebander emits a forceful stream of hot, compressed air through a slot nozzle, directed onto a reactive layer of specialized Rehau edgeband material activating the adhesive that bonds the banding to the panel edge. (See story in this issue's *Closets* section.)

Imagining Wood Finishes

Cabinet dealer showrooms, a major theme at the KBIS 2014, got a new tool, as exhibitor Planit Canada, showed the Vortek Experience, a 3D virtual presentation of cabinetry, paneling and flooring design which can change species, colors and textures.

Vortek projects an interactive, full-scale kitchen project in stereo 3D, like a movie theatre. This allows clients to do endless "what if's" with cabinetry designs. Importantly, it can show a mix of colors, textures, door styles and materials affects.

Using hand gestures, viewers update drawers, doors, colors, corbels, and other room elements. They can even access a library of elements from your cabinet design application.

Because rooms are shown in full scale and 3D, the customer gets a stronger sense of the finished project. The Vortek Experience system, developed by Arcane Technologies, takes up 50 square feet in a showroom. It can also be taken to local home design shows, and has an integrated web viewing component that can be embedded in your existing website.

Online versions track consumer behaviors via Googleanalytics, and calculate costs (components, options, selected materials). See it in use at woodworkingnetwork.com/video



Real Stone Veneer

Applying a paper-thin stone surface onto a wood panel was once thought impossible, but Richter USA has developed the methods used to create a real stone veneer that woodworkers, furniture makers and cabinet makers can process with its Stone-Veneer product line.

Richter says the Stone-Veneer is made from sheets of real Indian slate rock. Because of the different geographical locations of the quarries the company uses, it is able to offer different colorations of the slate used for the Stone-Veneer.

The Stone-Veneer product line is described by Richter as light, flexible and ultra-thin. Because of the natural 3D surface of real stone, the actual thickness of the Stone-Veneer sheets range from 1mm to 3.5mm. The Stone-Veneer can be cut with standard saw equipment and is appropriate for residential and commercial applications, including floors.

Sizing Stone Veneer

In regards to size, Stone-Veneer sheets fall into two categories: raw and trimmed. With raw, the Stone-Veneer is processed from slabs of slate rock that are not perfectly square and with overall dimensions not exact, but close to the standard size of 24' x 48" plus/minus 0.2". The slate slab is processed as is and the sheets are the same dimension as the stone slab. All raw Stone-Veneer colors come in 24" x 48", with certain colors available in larger sizes.

Trimmed are processed Stone-Veneer panels cut perfectly square and trimmed to a consistent size. The standard trimmed size is 23.62" x 47.24". Other exact trimmed sizes are 23.6" x 23.6" and 23.6" x 11.8". Some trimmed colors are also available in larger sizes.

The same raw and trimmed sizes also apply to Quartzite as they do to the Stone-Veneer. Sandstone, Sahara comes in a raw size of 24" x 48" and in trimmed sizes of 23.6" x 47.24", 23.6" x 23.6". 23.6" x 11.8" and 49.2" x 104.3", with additional sizes available as options. NanoStone is available in only one size, 24" x 48".

Richter says there are four groups within the

Richter's Stone-Veneer product line allows for the application of a thin stone surface onto wood panels.



Stone-Veneer product line:

• Stone-Veneer - Available with three backers: GRP (Glass Reinforced Polyester) which is standard, and Fleece, and Peel & Stick, which are options. Stone-Veneer is available in seven colors.

- Quartzite Available with the same three backers as Stone-Veneer. Quartzite is available in four colors: Copper, Jerra Green, Ocean Green and Silver Shine.
- · Sandstone, Sahara Sandstone is approximately 90% pure quartz. Once mined, the sand is bonded vertically with thermoplastic binders onto large sheets of textile fleece. The color variances of the sand are from white quartz to dark brown, and occur naturally. It is applied to a fabric mesh-structure, allowing for great flexibility. The backing also allows threedimensional forming with heat.
- NanoStone NanoStone is natural Stone-Veneer without the GRP backing, instead bound together with a water-jet impregnated and tightened fleece backing. An optional backing is an added natural fiber (100% recycled leather). NanoStone is available in six

colors: Autumn, Autumn White, Autumn Rustic, Multi Color, Terra Red, Black Slate and Black Line.

The average cost of Stone-Veneer is approximately \$7.20 per square foot. Although initial material costs do not attain a savings, other factors such as weight, time, and installation costs show a substantially reduced cost when using Stone-

Veneer in place of slate tiles.

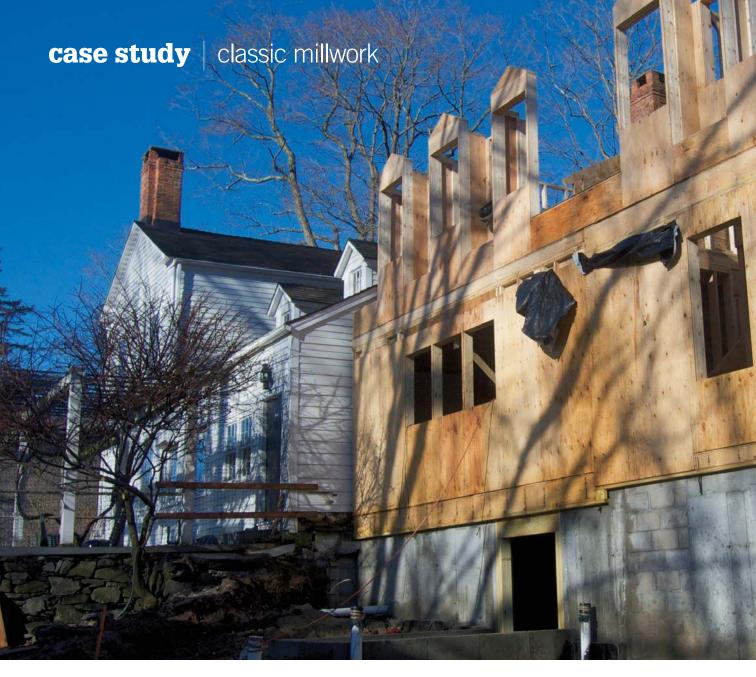

New Old House Millwork

Connor Homes classic construction and JS Benson Woodworking's fine millwork

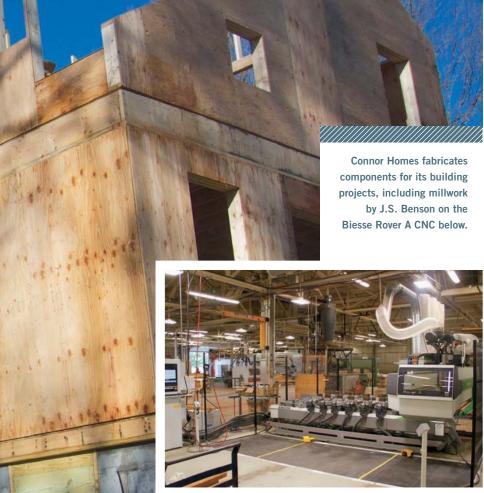

onnor Homes, a specialist in vintage-style home building and restoration – including period windows, doors, moulding, millwork and cabinetry – will soon have a starring role in a new television show. The Middlebury, VT firm is already assisting musician (and Rock & Roll Hall of Fame inductee) Daryl Hall as he expresses his talents as a builder and designer. A television production – "Da-

ryl's Restoration Over-Hall," produced by Wolfson Entertainment and Boy Wonder Productions – will debut on DIY Network in May 2014, with a total of eight episodes.

DIY Network contacted Hall on learning of his interest in vintage architecture. The musician has restored a number of homes, including an 18th century farmhouse in New York where his musical program "Live from Daryl's House" is recorded.

"Daryl's Restoration Over-Hall" will follow the ongoing renovation of a late Georgian house from the 1780s located in Sherman, CT. Hall plans to revive the one-bedroom house, originally built by a widowed sea captain, into a new family home, melding a historically accurate restoration with the mandates of modernity and small town building codes. DIY Network's cameras will follow Hall's progress on a weekly basis.

"The purpose of my new show is to restore an antique New England house, showing how it can be done in an authentic manner, keeping the original elements and making it consistent with the modern world," said Hall. "I also want to feature the important community of craftspeople, who are expert in authentic restoration."

The approach to what Hall wants to accomplish with his new program meshes

well with Connor Home's processes.

"A reverence for and an appreciation of historic architecture is at the cornerstone of what drives our company," says Connor Homes' CEO David Auth. "Efficient and innovative application of state-of-theart woodworking technology allows us to replicate craftsmanship from the past and make it available to all."

Part of the Connor Homes philosophy

The Concept of "New-Old"

Buyers are regaining an appreciation of older home styles, with Neoclassic and Craftsman exteriors, but interiors adapted to contemporary preferences: open plan rooms, spacious kitchens as a family-centered room, and generous closets. Connor Homes is among builders skillful at translating traditional looks to contemporary lifestyles.

Certain buyers, like Daryl Hall, are willing to invest in period restorations, with updates adding modern features that ease the burden of upkeep, while preserving the classic feel of an original period home.

Connor Homes says a "New Old House" captures the essence of historic architecture "so we can have the charm and warmth embodied in that architecture, but take advantage of all the amenities of a new home." Connor's New Old Homes cross a wide spectrum of historic styles, so manufacturing millwork and moulding (at its J.S. Benson woodworking unit) that is specific to each project is done internally, using state-of-the-art technology and hand craftsmanship.

revolves around its unique approach to the "New Old Home" movement (see sidebar), an attempt to capture the essence of historic architecture in a new home, with contemporary interior layouts and modern amenities, combining the charm and warmth of yesterday's architecture with current technological advances and conveniences.

"Connor Homes was approached by the

original architect, who asked if we would consult on historic architectural detailing and provide a material package for the project," says Auth.

"Our contribution to the restoration of Daryl's 1787 house includes design and manufacturing of historically accurate millwork and architectural details for the original house as well as a large, period authentic addition. In addition, through our

J.S. Benson Woodworking division, we are providing true divided light windows manufactured using chestnut reclaimed from an 1840's farm house."

Auth says the design and some of the reclaimed lumber they are using for the renovation actually came from Hall. Connor Homes pre-engineers and builds components at its 118,000 square foot facility in Middlebury, VT, using two Biesse CNCs for cutting millwork, then prepackages the house and assembles it at the site.

Referred to as component building, the process also includes pre-assembling sections of wall and elements such as entrances, cornices, returns, and rake overhangs that can easily be erected on site. However, the company says that some things are still best done at the site, such as roofing, siding, installation of doors and windows and certain trims and mouldings.

"Our company has been designing and building homes with authentic, historic architectural detailing for over 40 years, so the first advantage we bring to the table is institutional expertise," Auth says. "Coupled with high technology manufacturing, we are able to accurately reproduce by machine what used to be laboriously done by hand. The end result is sophisticated architecture made more affordable."

It is not always easy staying true to the original design and materials of a vintage home while using more current machinery and tools. The process can requires adapting to a specific set of circumstances.

"We don't let the machinery drive the design," says Auth. "It's just the opposite. If using a machine to realize efficiency compromises design, the design would stay, the machinery would go. Even in this age of robotic millwork, we still use hand tools like chisels and scrapers, sanding blocks and hand planes to enable us to do a faithful reproduction of historical elements."

Auth says that Hall's project contains some of the typical challenges of an old house that has seen a series of renovations over the years. One of the initial issues was to determine what period of the several represented by the previous renovations should be the predominant driver in the current restoration.

"The original house was a Georgian/Federal amalgamation, with later Greek Revival elements added," says Auth. "In the end, after discussions with Daryl, it was determined that the Georgian/Federal elements would take precedence in the new addition and that existing moldings and paneling would be copied as they were originally executed."

Restoration Resources

According to Hall, there is a "legacy of unique antique architecture here in America. Unfortunately, in many cases, they have been let go, demolished, or altered inconsistently to their original character." Auth thinks that the series may bring more attention to these vintage homes, and in so doing, save more of them.

"Historic architecture has and continues to hold a place of reverence and respect with a large and appreciative crowd of admirers," Auth says. "Many assume the required resources and expertise no longer exist to execute the restoration of exquisite architectural details from the past. This se-

ries will hopefully make others aware that, first and foremost, there are dedicated and knowledgeable followers of historic architecture like Daryl Hall who recognize the artistic and academic value in restoring homes from another century. In addition, the series will reinforce that there are resources that are not only knowledgeable, but also innovative in their use of modern

technology to address the restoration and replication of an art form that was primarily accomplished using hand tools and long hours of human labor."

Getting Started with CNC Routers

Woodworking firms have taken a variety of approaches to finding their first CNC.

By Bill Esler

KC Woodwork & Fixture added its first CNC router in January 2014, a Multicam 5000 with extended gantry and a 12-tool rotary automated tool changer – among numerous other options. Producing projects mostly for commercial customers, the six-employee Tulsa, OK, firm was at work simultaneously on projects for a library, school, and a church when we talked.

"It's much more efficient and timesaving," says shop manager Kyle King, just returned to his shop from an installation site when we spoke. "Our productivity has gone up, and we will show a tremendous profit for it."

For a first-time buyer of CNCs, a deal takes lots of research, education, and guidance from suppliers and peers. The path isn't always straightforward, and it can be long.

"It's a process that has been going on for 10 years," says King. "And sure, the cost is a big investment. But it's definitely something that was needed. I wish we would have done it 10 years ago."

King and his father vetted a number of suppliers, doing all their analysis right in the shop through a series of sales presentations.

"The reason we chose Multicam is because they were out of Dallas $-3\frac{1}{2}$ hours means we could get parts the next day."

Another first-time CNC buyer was DODOcase, which sells millions of dollars worth of bamboo iPad and smartphone cases, precision routed on CNC machines at its San Francisco production operation. Co-founder Patrick Buckley began in 2009 leasing CNC time at the local TechShop. As the iPad took off, orders flooded in, so he bought a CNC.

"We first bought a used Scm Routech for a killer deal," Buckley says. "It was actually a smaller machine. We found we needed more capacity and also wanted a back up, so we got a second larger router." This was a more automated Scm Pratix. "For ease of maintenance and technical support, we wanted to stay with the Scm line of machines. The [larger] size of the Pratix machine lowered the machining time per piece by amortizing the tool change times over a larger number of finished parts."

Cambridge Patterns, which builds models

and prototypes from wood and other materials, was experiencing problems hiring enough skilled employees. They knew they needed to become less reliant on manual labor. So Cambridge added an AXYZ 5012 CNC router about a year ago, customized with a larger work area and higher gantry to add capacity.

"We've increased our output in certain areas of our product line by 10%," says Ian Goodhand, owner, who says the CNC "also provided us with an increased customer base in certain markets which were not possible prior to the purchase of the machine."

Software First?

In 2004 furniture maker Lucien Casartelli began taking classes in software applications, which gave him the skill to operate a Komo 4-axis CNC router.

As his software skills developed, Casartelli added a Thermwood 5-axis CNC router.

Paul Downs Cabinetmakers also added a Thermwood CNC at its Bridgeport, PA operation. Downs will keynote the Cabinets & Closets Expo 2014 April 9-11 in Somerset, NJ.

David DiRanna opened a custm woodworking business, DiMac Designs, as a second career. "While our offerings were very well received, I found the cabinetmaking process a bit tedious and repetitive," DiRanna says. Then he won a bid from a local school district for 195 classroom white boards. DiRanna produced them, and an order followed for 450 more.

"Business was booming, but creating the product was rather cumbersome since I still had to cut each piece manually using a template," DiRanna says. "It was clear we needed to tap into CNC technology." About two years ago, DiRanna added a Laguna Tools Swift model CNC. He says the reduction in labor and waste justified the machine within five months.

Redbook Help

How do you choose your CNC? The Red Book Best Practices Guide, published (like *CWB*) by Woodworking Network, gathered input from several manufacturers, based on questions put to them. Stiles Machinery notes: "The most common question we previously heard was, 'Do I buy a pod and rail machining center or a flat table router?' Now we are most commonly asked: 'Do I buy a pod and rail CNC machine, a flat table router or a vertical machining center?'

From Board Hooks to CNC Woodshop

Surfboards and their close cousins, paddle, skate and snowboards, are often works of art as well as platforms for a ride. Board owners enjoy displaying their boards as well as riding them. John Perone saw the opportunity, and launched **onthewallracks. com** producing clear acrylic wall racks to save floor space and protect the boards they hold, as well as display them. Perone subcontracted them originally, but supply was inconsistent. So he added a Laguna Tools SmartShop I CNC router for his San Juan Capistrano, CA, shop.

"People liked what I had done and started asking for the racks," Perone says. Working out of his home shop, "I had a lot of people cutting plastic for me," he said. "But the clutter turned my house into a factory. So I turned to CNC machining and outsourced a supplier.

"That worked for a while. But I wanted the control that my own shop would give me. So I moved into a 1,000-square-foot facility and started looking for a CNC router."

Perone says he researched about a dozen different manufacturers. "I asked every company where I could see one of their routers in operation. That cut my list of prospects down quickly. Some companies expected me to buy from them sight unseen."

Since he lived near Laguna Tools' Irvine, CA, showroom, Perone drove over for a live demonstration. He was able to run several samples of his products. The demonstration, and availability of a nearby training facility, "is what finally convinced me," Perone says.

Handy way to **Slice Into Woodwork**

Fein's oscillating Multi-Master is a versatile tool, taking on many types of work, with tool-free, quick change accessories.

By Bill Esler



Cutting and shaping wood extends well beyond the benchtop and shop floor for cabinetmakers and interior woodworkers. Oscillating tools have been catching on, switching from roles as quickly as you can change accessories.

MultiMaster is FEIN Power Tools' entry in this category. It can function as a rasper, circular saw, sander and oscillating saw –among other functions – in both its corded and cordless versions. FEIN says the high-torque motor in its cordless version performs the same as its corded version, the model FM250Q. Both versions feature electronic controls.

FEIN says the eight-point QuickIn tool mount on its MultiMaster provides superior torque transfer to accessories, and takes six seconds to change accessories, without tools – meaning you won't lose the chuck key.

The corded came out in an economically priced starter package, in a nylon bag instead of FEIN's traditional hard plastic case, and a set of basic accessories rather than the usual complete set.

It does have an E-cut universal saw blade

for metal and wood, a rigid scraper blade, and a sanding attachment with four sanding pads. This MultiMaster corded with Softgrip handle is priced around \$199.

The MultiMaster Cordless is powered by 8 lithium-ion cells, with a capacity indicator for monitoring of individual cells.

FEIN launched a series of cordless portable tools last year, taking advantage of the latest in brushless motors, including four, 2-speed, 1/2" cordless hammer drills it says can drill masonry, yet are supple enough to make high-quality holes in metal and wood. All the batteries in the cordless line can go from depleted to fully charged in 30 minutes.

Self-tapping Cabinet Screws

SPAX says its newest self-tapping screws are well suited to interior woodwork, providing a secure, aesthetically pleasing installation of fine cabinetry and other fine carpentry.

German-engineered cabinet screws (they are manufactured in the U.S.) have a large, lowprofile head design that provides an increased load bearing area. The Multihead countersinks the head flush into the wood, also acting as a brake to prevent stripping when used in attaching metal hardware. The Spax system employs a T-STAR Plus drive (a driver cone is included in the screw packages). Spax says this promotes exceptional bit engagement, especially for overhead work. Spax's patented 4CUT Point requires no predrilling, with a square end that divides wood fibers to prevent splitting.

SPAX offers numerous other screws, including MDF screws specifically designed to prevent splitting in Medium Density Fiberboard) and hardwoods, also without pre-drilling. SPAX says these are also very effective for attaching lightweight, high-density polyure-thane trim. A clean look is achieved from a trim head design, with cutting ribs under the head that allow flush or countersunk installation for a clean look, the company says. **spax.us**

Meet Celebrity Custom Woodworker

Azure Furniture owner Corbin Clay makes his second straight appearance at the Cabinets & Closets Conference & Expo.

elebrity custom woodworker Corbin Clay has gained fame in the industry since winning Kettle One and GQ Magazine's Gentleman's Call award in 2013. Featured in the Wall Street Journal and in the publications of Woodworking Network, Clay also has been a top draw at major woodworking industry shows including AWFS and Cabinets and Closets Expo.

Visitors to the 2014 Cabinets & Closets Expo April 9-11 at the Garden City Convention Center in Somerset, NJ, can once again meet Clay, who will be demonstrating joinery techniques. His visit is sponsored by Festool, and he will appear in the Eveready Hardware booth.

Making the Best of the Blues

Launched in 2009, Clay's Denver-based company, Azure Furniture, creates custom furniture from beetle killed pine wood, which has a blue tinge. He sells this furniture in an online store, with pieces ranging from \$309 for an end table to \$1,199 for a dining table. He also sells cabinets, bookcases and media storage furniture, and exterior siding of blue pine.

In the heart of the area devastated by the Mountain Pine Beetle infestation, Clav can buy approximately 5,000 board feet of lumber per month that has been milled to his exact specifications.

He says 100 percent of the beetle-kill pine used in his production is Coloradosourced, mostly from the surrounding Summit and Grand counties.

Clay takes the milled lumber, and after verifying proper moisture content, mills selectively glued-up blanks that are 8 feet long. His line of furniture is all built based upon a 96" module.

Wood finishes and powder coating are both formaldehyde-free. Low-VOC coatings are allowed to completely off-gas before shipping. Laminates are developed

from recycled paper, and applied to surfaces with Greenguard certified adhesives.

Clay's innovative approach and media savvy also lead to his opening a pop-up retail store in a downtown Denver, CO, mall last year.

Azure's team built pine-beetle furniture on site for retail sale. Festool helped sponsor the project in which Clay built a 12' x 12' pergola at the "Garden Block" (16th St., between Curtis and Champa). It remains in place as a public installation.

Several wood products were available for under \$100. The company sold coasters, cutting boards, a bicycle shelf, and furnishings from its mountain pine beetle killed lumber designs.

All of the furniture was made live using his Festool Domino XL.

Eveready Hardware Still Going at 80

Meet the Long Island City (Queens), NY, company as it celebrates its 8th decade during the 2014 Cabinets & Closets Expo.

veready Hardware will celebrate its 80th anniversary in grand style with its biggest display ever at the 2014 Cabinets & Closets Expo, April 10-11 in Somerset, NJ.

The Queens, NY-based distributor has actually existed longer. Michael Taylor and his son Jonathan start their company's timeline in 1934 when Michael's father. Maurice Taylor, who sold caning to furniture manufacturers, teamed up with Dorothy Salinger, top salesperson for a manufacturer of furniture hardware.

By selling each other's products, they greatly expanded their sales. With the Great Depression in full swing, Salinger was paid in company stock in lieu of a paycheck. Before long she had amassed enough stock to buy the entire company. In 1934, she incorporated it as Eveready Hardware.

Jonathan Taylor notes that the original stock certificates incorrectly titled the company Ever Ready Hardware, Mfg., Co., Inc. "This is a common mispronunciation of our actual company name, which still occurs and is a running joke inside of the office to this day," he says.

In 1935, Salinger and Taylor took their partnership to a higher level by getting

married. While Dorothy retired to raise the couple's two children, business steadily improved as the Great Depression drew to a close. Originally occupying four floors of the original 1883 Gretsch Building in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, Eveready Hardware employed 188 men to primarily make furniture hardware. During World War II, the company was contracted by the U.S. government to make parts for bombs, walkie-talkies and all service medals.

"As a kid, my dad had more medals then General Eisenhower," Jonathan Taylor laughs.

Michael Taylor joined his father in the business after graduating from college in 1962. Soon after, the company switched from making hardware to becoming a direct importer and distributor. He transitioned from sales to running the company in the 1970s. "It was during this pre-computer time that (my dad) brought new ideas in purchasing, expanding Eveready's lines and becoming more efficient in managing the company," Jonathan Taylor says.

By the end of the 1980s, Eveready was fully computerized and Michael's wife Diane, lent her business skills to help update employee policies and hire new staff to

keep up with the growing business.

Celebrating 53 years in the business, Michael Taylor takes great pride in owning an independent distributorship that has weathered many storms over the years.

While Michael is still very active in the business, his son, Jonathan has taken over day-to-day responsibilities, while senior vice-president Richie DeMarco, handles sales. Jonathan has been working on and off in the business since he was 5. becoming full time six years after studying engineering and technology. One of his passions is keeping the company's software technology ahead of the pack.

"Like my Father before me, we Eveready men start in the business early and really grow to love what we do," he says. "I consider myself extremely lucky to be able to have a working relationship with him that not many people get to experience...Stepping out of his incredibly large and dense shadow has always been my goal. With his daily help and expertise in training me to take over for him, that goal is becoming more achievable every day. I've only just began what I hope to be at least a fifty year journey with Eveready, and the best is yet to come, and I have him to thank for it."

Hot Edging for Closet Solutions

Controlling the process from end-to-end, including manufacturing, was one of the factors that lead Lanham, MD-based Closet America, a home storage and organizational systems designer and manufacturer, to be the first company in the U.S. to place the Biesse AirForce hot air edgebanding system in its production line.

Skip LaBella, Closet America president, said his company initially started out as a dealer. But his wholesaler couldn't deliver product fast enough.

"We were not in a position to control our own fate," LaBella says. "We wanted a high-quality product and features that no one had." They tried a second manufacturer, but that company couldn't provide Closet America with product that matched its exacting specifications. So they decided to bring all the manufacturing in-house.

In 2009, LaBella says they purchased a host of equipment, including a beam saw, two CNC routers and additional equipment for their 6,000-square-foot shop. Their decision to invest in the hot air edgebanding system is a continuation of its commitment to producing the highest-quality product with the highest-quality equipment, LaBella adds.

The AirForce is among the new generation hot air edgebanders from several major manufacturers that were a highlight of woodworking shows last year. Biesse's AirForce also picked up an AWFS 2013 Visionary Award.

The hot air edgebander emits a forceful stream of hot, compressed air through a slot nozzle, directed onto a reactive layer of edgeband material, activating an adhesive that bonds the banding to the panel edge.

The end product results in an invisible glue line (similar to more costly laser edgebanding, but the machinery is priced more affordably).

Closet America added the Biesse Roxyl model edgebander fitted with the AirForce system to its production line after purchasing it at the 2013 AWFS Fair in Las Vegas. It also contracted with Rehau to provide the specialized LaserEdge edgeband.

"In our efforts to provide our customers with a high-quality custom closet product, we were excited to invest in the Biesse AirForce system," LaBella says. "This investment is one more way that we continue to surpass our customers' expectations."

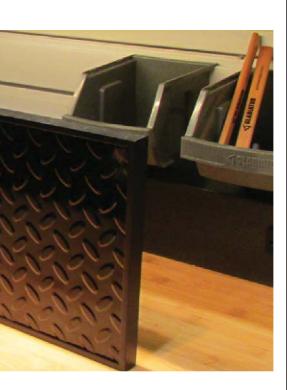

"We were trying to get a modern look in there and still make it seem like it fit in the garage and make it look nice and presentable," he adds.

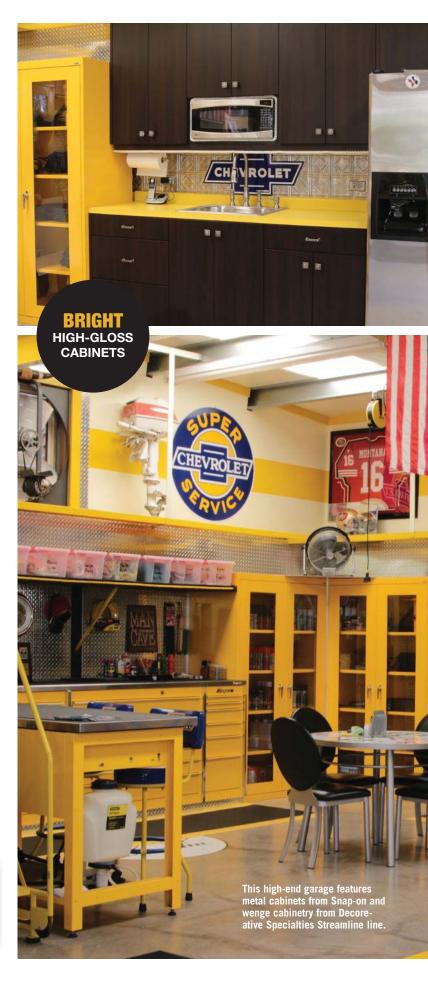
Although Oncken mainly focused on the kitchenette area, the company also helped install the Snap-on metal cabinets, a mechanic's mainstay.

case study paul downs cabinetmakers



Back Bench Leadership

After moving from bench work to managing, Paul Downs, cabinetmaker, started to grow.

By Matt Schumake

fter six years of running Paul Downs Cabinetmakers from the workbench, owner Paul Downs realized he needed to change his strategy. He decided the best use of his time would be to stop building woodworking projects himself, relying instead on his shop craftsmen. He shifted his own focus to designing, selling, marketing and advertising his custom furniture-building company.

While his team kept the wood-

working machines running, Downs put his attention on working from his office. The strategy has paid off. Since that time, Paul Downs Cabinetmakers has outgrown four different woodshops. Currently, he and his 18 craftsmen operate at a 33,000 square-foot wood production plant in Bridgeport, PA.

Project workflow begins in the office, where Downs and his engineers meet with clients and de-

velop designs. From that point, the engineering team creates a digital model using SketchUp and CAD. They create programs to cut individual components on a CNC router, and then send the project to the floor. The craftsmen work in teams, with each member taking on a specific role.

"The methods we have developed are very collaborative," Downs says.

Down's facility is home to a Thermwood

Cabinetshop 45 CNC router, a Martin T-72 sliding table saw, a Timesaver 36" wide-belt sander, a radial-arm saw, several tablesaws and multi-routers, and approximately 600 clamps. His tables are sought out by companies across the U.S., and he has also shipped abroad to Germany and Dubai.

With such a large workspace, the team has been able to specialize in both residential dining tables and corporate conference

tables. The boardroom tables are crafted with solid woods including cherry, maple, walnut, oak, and ash. Downs also uses specialty cuts in veneers such as quilted maple, quartersawn oak, curly walnut, and macassar ebony.

A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, Downs majored in design and structural engineering. After college, he began working in construction, and occasionally daydreamed with one of his co-workers on the idea of building furniture for a living.

"By good fortune, I was able to make it happen," he says.

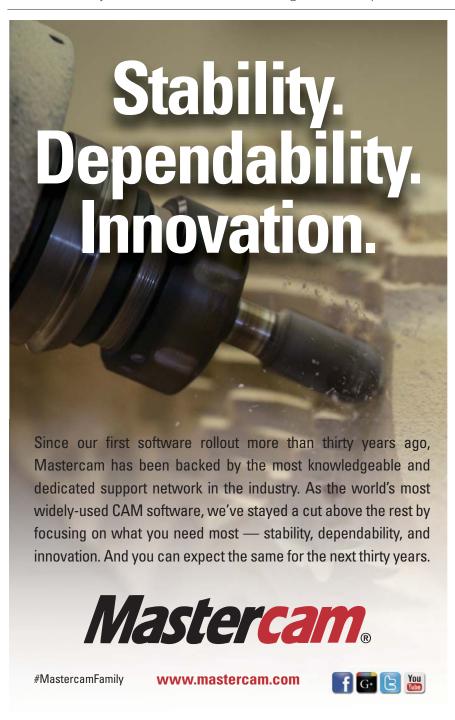
Downs is also the author of a regular blog series at *The New York Times*, "You're the Boss," and summarized some of his approach in an entry, "Remembering Why I Got Into Business." Returning to the bench after sitting at his computer for two decades, he recalled what initially drew him to woodworking back in 1986:

"The nature of woodworking is pleasurable. It's a nice mix of challenging thought and physical labor. The results of each minute of work are clearly visible as you transform raw materials into finished product, step by step. I think this explains why many of my workers have stayed with me for so long. Considering the alternatives, making furniture is a great way to spend your day. If a reasonable wage accompanies the job, there is little incentive to jump ship."

MACASSAR EBONY

A Touch of Drama

By Jo-Ann Kaiser

ith a heartwood that is dark brown to black interspersed with contrasting bands of yellow to golden brown, Macassar ebony yields a bold look by offsetting the darkest of the dark woods with a variety of color.

However, good looks are sometimes Macassar ebony's strongest suit. The wood, while very hard, dense and heavy, can be extremely brittle at its heart.

The wood is rare in veneer form because the trees usually are not tall. Defects aside, Macassar ebony is a prized wood. Its uses include high-end cabinetry, inlay work, musical instruments, billiard cues and other specialty items like jewelry boxes and walking sticks. Its sapwood, which is not brittle, is used to make tool handles.

The trees are native to the Celebes Islands, which are also called the Sulawesi Islands of the East Indies. It is also found in Maluku and Borneo, known as the Greater Sunda Islands of Indonesia.

The name Macassar is most likely from the famous Macassar seaport on the islands. Some retailers have used the term Macassar ebony for any ebony that has a high contrast of light

and dark streaks, although most people today limit the term to the species Diospyros celebica.

Challenges and Rewards

Most forms of ebony offer challenges to users due to the innate hardness of the material. Early on, the wood was sliced for veneer and glued to oak or pine, which was not only cheaper but easier to work. The process of veneering was common in France, where woodworkers were credited with perfecting early veneering techniques with ebony for furniture and cabinetry. In France, cabinetmaking was called "ebenisterie" and the French name for a cabinetmaker is "ebeniste."

Ebonizing, a common woodworking term, refers to the staining and treatment of lighter-colored woods to produce the look of ebony. "There was a time when Victorian interior decorators would ebonize everything from chair frames to door cases, but the method continues today, in a more perfect form, in the finishing of the cases of grand pianos," the Encyclopedia of Wood notes.

As a carving and turning wood, Macassar ebony is a favorite. It is durable, has a fine, even texture and finishes well.



Diospyros celebica or Diospyros macassar of the Family Ebenaceae. The rough translation of Diospyros is "fruit of the gods."

COMMON NAMES

Macassar ebony, Indian ebony, marble wood, coromandel, calamander wood, tendu, temru, tunki, timbruni.

HEIGHT/WEIGHT

Average height is 50 feet. Average weight is 68 pounds per cubic foot with a specific gravity of 1.09.

PROPERTIES

Macassar ebony can be difficult to work with hand or machine tools if the material is brittle. Hardness of the wood contributes to blunting of cutting edges. Pre-boring is recommended for nailing. Wood can be difficult to glue, but has a natural luster and finishes extremely well. Timber can be difficult to dry, with slow, careful drying recommended to avoid checking. Experts recommend kiln schedule of T3-C2 for 4/4 stock and T3-C1 for 8/4 stock. Wood should be stored covered to avoid sun damage. Wood has small movement in service.

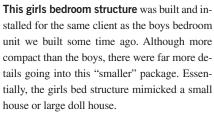

Creating Stairs for **Doll House Bedroom**

The most difficult aspect of building this girl's bedroom unit was creating the staircase.

Both projects were similar in that they consisted of a lower bed, sitting on a platform with drawers underneath, and an upper bed, sitting on a platform directly above the lower bed.

The most difficult aspect of this particular project was the staircase. It was made up of seven cabinet boxes, one for each tread, all stacked atop one another, screwed together, and fit in between the outer wall of the "house" and the

sheetrock wall of the actual house. We started by connecting the bottom four stair treads together, adding the two applied panels, and sliding the entire assembly into place. After we leveled and plumbed the stairs, we permanently attached them to the torsion box wall on the left, and to the framework of the house on the right, thereby locking everything securely into place.

We were then able to install the final three stair treads in much the same way. The last step was not a physical box, but rather just a stringer, making up the difference in height left over after all the steps were stacked up and installed. This gave us a bit of breathing room during the install. Rather than connecting eight stair treads together into one large assembly, trying to



muscle them into place, and achieve the exact height of the upper floor, we assembled in stages and built into the design a little breathing room.

Next, we installed the stair faces, the first five of which were drawers operated with pushto-open ball-bearing slides, the end panel on the right side of the staircase, and a railing to keep the kids from falling off the side. The final product turned out awesome in our opinion, and more importantly, the customer agreed! See the whole project at woodworkingnetwork.com/blogs

How to Dress a Widebelt Sander Drum

Scott Wunder couldn't find videos on how to dress a widebelt sander drum, so he decided to make his own.

By Scott Wunder

Dressing the drum on a widebelt sander starts when a flat board covered with sandpaper is sent through the machine (with the sanding belt removed) and sands the rubber drum smooth. It starts with a new 36-grit sanding belt and a piece of 1/2" thick MDF with radiused leading edges. The width of the MDF is determined by the throat opening of the machine and the widest piece that will fit.

The length of the MDF is based on the width of the sandpaper minus 2". The minus 2" is so the paper can completely cover the two radiused edges.

The new sanding belt that is applied to the MDF runs at a 90° angle or perpendicular to the way it normally runs. Doing this allows the MDF to be a little wider than the drum and to be sure the drum gets completely sanded on each pass. The key is to have a wide, flat, consistent-thickness sanding block to send through the machine. After the MDF and sandpaper are cut, apply the sandpaper to the MDF with spray adhesive (I used 3M Super 77) and trim everything flush.

I was instructed on how to use a high feed speed, low grit and very shallow cuts since the rubber could just melt instead of being sanded. It didn't take long. In all, I only sent the MDF sandpaper block through 10 times to remove the 1/16″ deep grooves.

Now, I use the drum all the time and never use the platen. I consistently and confidently

take off 1/16" or more per pass with the 36 grit and 1/64" with the 100 grit.

Frequently Asked Questions CNC Machining

Wood Products queried machinery manufacturers regarding frequently asked questions on using CNCs.

By Karen Koenig

Machinery manufacturers submitted FAQs and answers on purchasing CNC machining centers for producing furniture, cabinetry, millwork and much more.

Q: With all of the CNC routers available, what makes one different from another?

A: CNC routers, for the most part, are built with a lot of similarities when it comes to the mechanics. They all use motors to drive the different axes, steel/aluminum for the construction and have some sort of spindle/router to machine the parts. Most companies considering a router for the first time do not realize that the vast majority of their cost will not be running the router, but instead, will be in a myriad of details required to run the router. Preparation, programming, hold down, procedures, sorting, scrap, assembly and error handling are the main cost areas. – submitted by Thermwood

Q: What should I look for in a machine?

A: First, you need to thoroughly examine and prioritize your requirements in a machine. The questions you need to ask yourself are "how important to me is precision, finish, productivity, tool life and price?" Raising and addressing these questions will help narrow the field. The price question should be addressed last; it will pretty much answer itself once the other questions are addressed. – submitted by KOMO Machine Inc.

Q: What software should I buy?

A: When you look at quality machines you will have enough software on board to allow you just about any design you can imagine. Don't jump in with both feet and buy costly software packages without being comfortable with the machine. Once you have run the machine you can make a more educated decision on the extra



software you might need. Any good machine manufacturer would have contact with the different software companies and most of the time incorporating that software into the use of the machine is not a problem at all. – *submitted by*

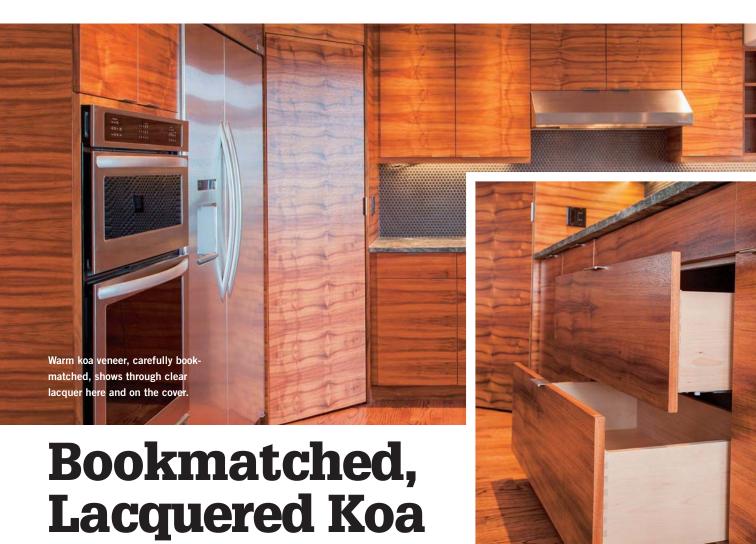








editors choice koa cabinetry



BKI Woodworks' Design Portfolio winner.

n honorable mention in the 2013 Design Portfolio contest: Kitchen/Bath Cabinets category, this beautiful, highend kitchen created by Boulder, CO-based BKI Woodworks highlights the appeal and warmth of koa wood.

The koa tree is found only in Hawaii. The wood has historically been used to build canoe hulls, furniture, cabinetry, and ukuleles. It has a nice color range from a honey yellow to the rich brown you see here.

The beauty of the color and figuring of koa wood stands out in any room, whether it's a single art object or a full kitchen of koa cabinets. In this kitchen, BKI bookmatched and endmatched the koa with the grain running

horizontally and finished it with a clear lacquer allowing the character of the wood to stand out on its own.

Materials used in this project included horizontal grain bookmatched and endmatched veneers glued with matching solid wood edgebanding. A veneer press, edgebander, and sliding table saw are among the equipment used in manufacturing the kitchen cabinetry.

CRAFTING THE DESIGN

Started in 1979, BKI is one of the longest operating professional cabinetry and woodshops in the Boulder area. BKI manufactures commercial and residential custom cabinetry in contemporary, modern, transi-

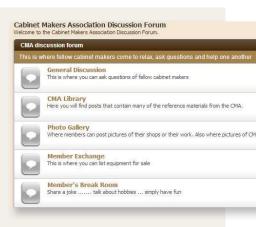

CMA Forums: Secret Sources

CMA Forums deliver helpful advice. reliable and unvarnished equipment and supplies reviews, and secret sources for those unusual or infrequently ordered items.

The CMA Forums differ from other woodworking discussion boards in that they are open only to members. This keeps anonymous contributors from trashing competitor's equipment with unwarranted bad reviews, or hyping their own goods and services.

The Forum is particularly helpful for finding resources for things like curved cabinet glass, exotic veneers, or specialty substrates that may not be sourced on a regular basis.

A scan of recent CMA Forum discussions finds a hunt for plastic sheets by member Matt, with a response a few hours later from Ed suggesting a particular acrylic supplier, and asking others' experiences.

CMA Forums also allow posting of completed projects or work in progress, with questions posed on technique or design reviews. Discussions on handling smudges with wood fillers, door cope/stick set, shoe shelf spacing, side mount slide techniques and latches suggest their practical nature.

needed to pass the test is contained in the curriculum sessions. It also requires a commitment from enrollees to attend a minimum four hours per year of CMA continuing education units (CEUs) after they first enroll.

"When we looked at the industry, we saw a gaping hole," said Dave Grulke, the CMA's Executive Director. "While there are other professional educational and standards programs available that address design, technique, construction standards and a smattering of other areas, there was nothing that seemed to address the entire business of running a successful custom woodworking or cabinet shop. That's where CMA's Professional Certifications differ."

The CMA's Professional Certification certifies the individual, not the business or the products they make, and provides the knowledge needed to own and operate an ethical, sustainable and profitable woodworking business. It addresses the entire business and includes the all important customer's perspective in the program.

Tracy Yarborough, owner of Maple River Woodworks in Coward, SC, and CMA's president, says "The CMA began this process with its own membership in mind. After we began gathering the curriculum, we

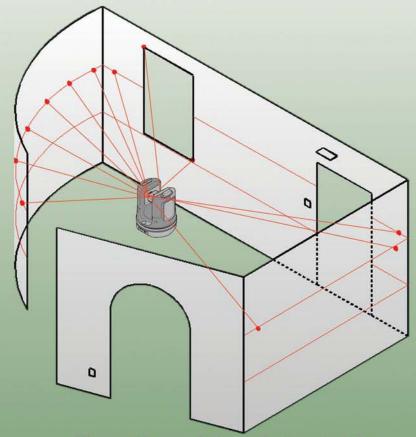

CMA Benchmark

New CMA Survey

Cabinet Makers More Bullish

The CMA's 2014 Benchmark Study delves into what's driving sales growth.

fter the Cabinet Makers Association issued its first two Benchmarking Surveys in 2012 and 2013, the response was overwhelming. The 2014 CMA Benchmarking Survey continues to set the point for future trendlines.

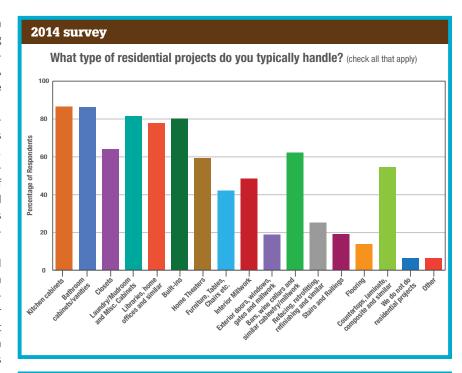
The third CMA Cabinet Industry Benchmarking Survey, fielded to CMA members and non-member cabinet makers in 2013, was intended to document industry practices and provide better understanding of what is driving sales growth for professional woodworkers. More than 700 respondents participated in the survey, with 13.3% being CMA members.

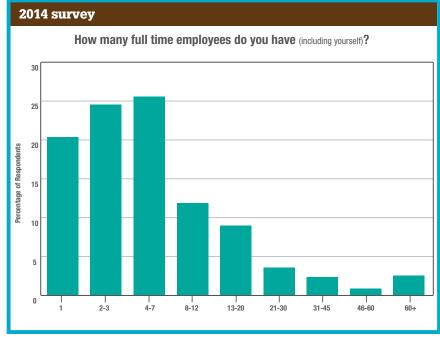
Results show that cabinet makers and custom woodworkers are more bullish on prospects for growth: more than three-quarters (81.7%) report optimism for 2014, and over half (59.3%) of cabinet makers reported higher sales in 2013 than in 2012, including 25.3% who saw a sales increase of over 20%.

Those looking at a glass half-full cite more forward bookings/better pipeline (56.9%), more leads (45.3%), and bigger projects (39.5%) as top reasons for their optimism. Those expecting business declines cited fewer forward bookings/worse pipeline (51.3%) and fewer leads (30.6%) as clouding their outlook.

Who Sells What?

Survey participants were again predominantly from smaller shops, with nearly three-quarters (70.4%) representing shops with revenues of less than \$1 million; and over half (53.5%) working out of 5,000 square feet or less of space. Most (71.3%) employed fewer than eight workers. Most respondents (69.7%) are the owners or senior officers of their companies; have over

15 years experience (76.5%) and founded their businesses (79.3%).

Smaller shops were also more likely to report sales declines in 2013 compared to their larger colleagues, with 13.3% of smaller shops (sales less than \$1M) reporting lower sales last year vs. 10.2% among larger shops (sales greater than \$1M). But both groups had a better year last year than the year before, with larger shops doing slightly better – 71.5% of larger shops reported sales increases, compared to 55.2% of smaller shops.

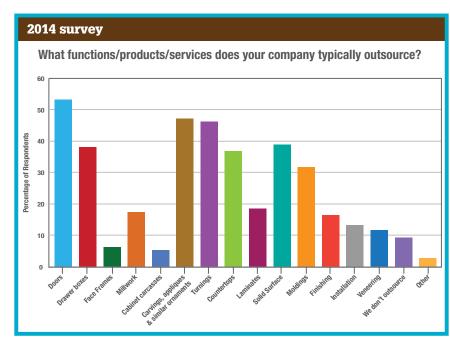
Respondents are as likely as not to have a showroom: just under half (48.2%) reported a dedicated showroom space and most of those (89.3%) place their showroom in the same location as their shop.

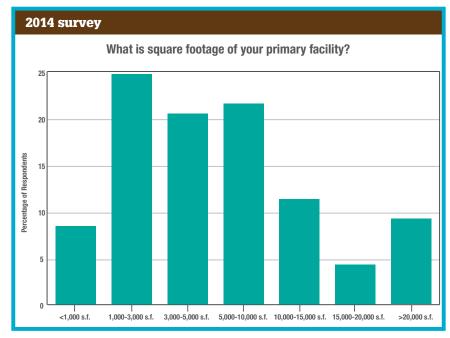
On the residential side, the most common projects were (in order of volume): kitchen cabinets, bathroom cabinets/vanities, laundry/mudroom cabinets, built-ins, and libraries. In commercial work (in order): general cabinetry, reception desks, countertops, interior millwork, medical/professional offices, and store fixtures form the bulk of production activity.

Most (80.4%) shops have no dedicated marketing budget, instead relying on referrals from customers and business associates such as contractors and designers as a source of qualified leads. Other than these types, shop owners mentioned social media, Internet search marketing, print advertising, and exhibiting at tradeshows as top methods of generating business.

Only one in five shops (19.9%) reported having a full or part-time resource dedicated to sales, with 67% of those employing a full-time person (or persons); and the balance split between part-time sales staff (23%) and independent sales reps (10%). Not surprisingly, shops reporting revenues between \$6 million to \$9.9 million accounted for the highest percentage of full-time sales. Those with revenues below \$1 million tend to use part-timers or outside reps.

A correlation existed between those shops with dedicated sales resources and business growth charted in the survey. While over half (59.3%) of all respondents claimed higher sales in 2013, crosstab anal-





ysis reveals 100% of those with full or parttime sales resources saw growth last year.

CNC and Production

Respondents were split on the presence of CNC equipment in their shops: 42.5% with and 57.5% without. Asked how automating with CNC equipment has impacted operations, most respondents (61.6%) selected "We have added significant manufactur-

ing capacity that we routinely use." When asked how CNC impacted the financial side of their business, most respondents said it made them more profitable, with close to half (43.3%) saying they are "much more" profitable; over a third (38.8%) saying they are "a little more" profitable. Nearly four out of five shops (79%) billing over \$1 million report having CNC equipment; compared to just over a quarter (28.8%) of smaller shops.

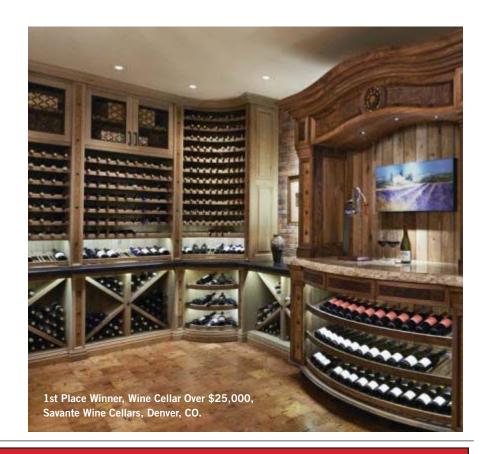

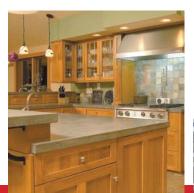
