hat was once a dusty barren quad at MC Weiler Primary School in Alexandra, Johannesburg, has been converted into a vibrant library and learning facility for young scholars and community members living in the area.

In 2010, Architects of Justice (AOJ), the team behind the design and construction of the project, were approached by the MAL Foundation and asked to create a multimedia centre as part of a creative outreach initiative. Two years later the SEED (Supplementary Extended Education Device) library was unveiled.

Mike Rassmann, one of three partners at AOJ, explains that the brief was to 'produce a functional, cost-effective and playful space where children could go to read, work and interact with one another'.

Budget constraints forced the team to get creative and come up with a plan to use recycled shipping containers. The result is this dynamic space, which (last year) won an award from the Gauteng Institute for Architecture (GIFA).

'The obvious thing to do is to stack the shipping containers directly on top of each other but after playing around with some ideas we decided the best option was to place them at 90-degrees to one another,' says Mike.

The placement of the containers meant they could provide a covered entrance to the library directly off the school corridor and fit a swing underneath the shaded area. 'When designing it, we had four things in mind – colour, shape, light and the children, of course – so we knew it had to look exciting,' says Mike.

The multicoloured lower level of the facility, which is located in the school's courtyard between the classroom blocks and the administration buildings, houses all the books. It also boasts a large bay window with a comfortable seating area overlooking a raised platform on the outside that doubles up as a stage for school assemblies.

A cherry red staircase leads to the reading and study area on the top floor, which has a view over the township. This space features wooden pub benches and a handful of beanbags on the deck outside.





The ground surrounding the library is finished off with synthetic grass, allowing learners to sit during assembly – a far cry from its former state.

On some evenings the SEED library is opened up to the public living in Alexandra and used for a number of school socials and community events. On occasion it's also tranformed into an art gallery for local exhibitions.

Kuba Granicki, another partner at AOJ, explains that they're happy with the impact the library has made on the children. 'We wanted it to encourage them to read and inspire them to spend time in it', he says. 'In a world where we are competing with a myriad multimedia, it's important that reading stands out and this centre certainly does its bit to boost that.' △ Architects Of Justice, O11-974-9584, architectsofjustice.com

road above Bantry Bay you might not think twice were you to pass by without knowing it was there. Probably Cape Town's most exclusive lodgings for those especially privacy-hungry visitors to the city, the ones who get driven about in cars with tinted windows, Ellerman House's relatively plain exterior (no gilded gates and lollipop-hedge fringed driveway here) offers few clues as to the always fabulous, elegantly restrained luxury to be found on the other side.

For many months, hulking cranes and scaffolding have hinted at further additions to the original Cape Edwardian property (built in 1906), which was joined a decade ago by a separate, devastatingly modern villa and then five years later by a private contemporary art gallery. In typical low-key fashion, the rubble was removed and the last of the finishing touches made before Ellerman House Villa Two opened its doors last December, already booked out for the summer.

More than just another grand villa with the usual lavish flourishes, this new property stands apart for the intriguing, symbolically charged, and perfectly executed architectural, design and art elements that have been so masterfully interwoven here. What makes an immediate impression is its context within


the site – a beautiful 100-year-old terraced garden, punctuated with rotund granite boulders, and a knockout ocean vista.

Michael Dennett of Cape Town firm DV8 Architects looked to these natural aspects when approaching the concept of the building. 'My starting point was to design an architectural garden,' he says, referencing the Japanese ideogram katei - which interlinks the symbols of home and garden - as an influencing factor. Rock excavated from the site was used to clad the lower level of the three-storey structure, with timber cladding on the next levels referencing the tree line and the overhang of the top portion reminiscent of the shade-giving property of a canopy of trees. From inside the villa, the views are of the sea or a vertical garden cleverly grown on an otherwise obstructing wall of the other villa.


But it's the interior spaces, done in collaboration with eminent artists and design names, including Trevyn and Julian McGowan of Southern Guild and Source, which have you stopped in your tracks.

Most arresting of all is the glass-enclosed wine gallery – a vast, sculptural wine rack made from carbon fibre, holding up to 1500 bottles, and, in the words of Ellerman House owner Paul Harris, 'a work of art'. World-renowned industrial

designer Brian Steinhobel took his inspiration from the helix shape of a corkscrew, yet the spiral form repeated in further design details in the villa reveals a more esoteric interpretation – from DNA to the association with the spiral in metaphysics and nature.

It's no less apparent than in local sculptor Angus Taylor's floors on the ground level, where thick blocks of polished granite have been inlaid with copper strips as well as a sequence of dots that recreates the Fibonacci series or golden spiral, also known as the divine proportion. The form is echoed in Cape Town blacksmith Conrad Hicks' amazingly organic staircase, forged out of stainless steel, which leads to the bedrooms and living areas on the upper levels.

These sorts of details abound, from Angus' rammed-earth, or 'terroir' wall, made up of soil from local wine farms and contained in labelled copper frames, to his monolithic stone bar and the hematite-mirrored wall behind it. Descend 13 stone steps and you find yourself in a subterranean champagne cellar (stocked exclusively with Dom Perignon), which features a two-ton hunk of chalk extracted from France's Champagne region as a table of sorts (see *HL* August 2013). It's high art on a quite sublime level. □ ellerman.co.za; dv8architects.com


The children's bedrooms are as artfully styled as the rest of the house. When asked about the best thing in hers Molly answers, 'Everything!'

rom humble beginnings as a store in
the Cape Town city centre some seven
years back, furniture design brand
Casamento's exquisite, handcrafted sofas
and armchairs are now finding pride of
place in fashionable homes in Australia.

Eve Collett and business partner
Henri du Rand operated from a studio in
Kommetjie, later moving their Bree Street
store to a space at the Old Biscuit Mill, and,
most recently, relocated the showroom and
workshop to the Woodstock Foundry.

'I was fixing up old 1950s furniture and wanted to make it more interesting,' Eve says of Casamento's early days. 'There was a demand for certain shapes that we weren't able to find second hand, so we started manufacturing new.' The furniture is available in 12 shapes that vary from love seats to armchairs and is crafted from natural, raw and recycled fibres.

That top Sydney furniture and interior design retailer Macleay on Manning, which stocks an extensive range of highend international designs, has chosen a selection of Casamento pieces to sell marks an exciting new direction for the brand. The store is renowned for finding special, unusual items that aren't available everywhere, and as such the South African brand's 'handcraft, embroidery and creative finishings' befit the benchmark.







One of Nicholas Hlobo's installations, although I don't know where I'd put it! New artists you've got your eye on? The work of Blessing Ngobeni is quite interesting. I'm keen to see his development over the next few years. Which one artwork do you regret not buying? I can't think of any. If I really like (and can afford) it then I'll buy it. Who is currently seriously big on the local art scene? People are taking a real interest in Mohau Modisakeng. His work is so strong - it's causing a stir in the art world. What one artist's work should our readers buy right now? That's difficult to say. There are so many interesting artists on the


market. I'd suggest people buy something they love. You can't go wrong even if the artist's market value goes down, you'll still have an artwork that you think is beautiful. Which local artists are doing well on the international market at the moment? Mary Sibande, Zanele Muholi and Kemang Wa Lehulere. Who is your favourite contemporary local artist? I'd have to say Wim Botha. His work is consistently good. And a great South African master? I really love Ernest Mancoba's sculptures. What's your favourite piece of art in your own home? A quietly beautiful work entitled 'Happy Mushy Feet', which Diane Victor made as a birthday gift for me. The combination of etching and embossing in the work is lovely.

With a fluid design and competitive pricing, expect the Hyundai ix35 to be a common sight on South African roads

he compact sport-utility vehicle market is relatively new. At least, it is new to you and me, who don't really want to buy the ugly mud bashers that first introduced mini SUVs in the 1980s.

Nowadays, these vehicles look to strike a happy compromise between the luxury and spaciousness of a classic SUV, with smaller sizes and smaller budgets. Priced at the sedan level, they offer something more to someone who has a family and an outdoor lifestyle. The average South African, then.

For 2014, the South Korean manufacturer gave the Hyundai ix35 a facelift and modified the user interface to reflect a rapidly changing industry. The new cosmetics, not to mention user experience inside, are noticeable improvements.

I drove the 2.0 litre diesel manual.

Producing a useful 130kW and 383Nm of torque, the engine focuses on frugality in fuel consumption and emissions. The diesel is sharp and responsive enough.

It also comes in a 2.0 litre petrol variant that offers manual and automatic transmissions. This is no track-day roarer, so I would opt for the auto gearbox.

Making a less expensive big vehicle does show up in some of the ix35's performance aspects, such as a slight pitch and roll when turning sharply and a bit of wind noise at high speeds. But it shows how good the overall car is for me to be so picky. Alterations to the ix35 are apparent in its design language – it now features heated, electric and retractable side mirrors, and fog lamps in the front grille that point low for improved visibility. The front and rear lamps have been reimagined, with running lights up front and a new shape to the LEDs in the back. New 17-inch alloy wheels come standard, and 18-inch ones are included in the Executive and Elite packages.

Other new details include steering wheel adjustable response at the push of a button (tighter and more immediate response for quicker driving), and a touch-screen interface with all the usual toys, including USB. A rear-view camera for reversing this deceptively wide car is a wise addition.

For a car built on prudence, it is well apportioned, drives pleasantly and could carry all the members of Coldplay, most of their equipment and a dog. Hyundai laughs at the idea that compact has to be dull. \(\sigma\) hyundai.co.za




LOCAL PROBLEM, LOCAL SOLUTION

Kenyan-born tech visionary Juliana Rotich believes in coming up with 'local solutions to local problems'. She's co-founded Ushahidi, open-source software for collecting and mapping information, and iHub, a Nairobibased collective tech space she sees evolving into 'a Pan-African network of technology and ideas'. But perhaps a more tangible result of her philosophy of 'doing what you can with what you have and where you are' is BRCK, a hi-tech solution to problems of maintaining vital internet connectivity in Africa. Its design considers the unique circumstances of parts of the continent, where power, or dust, might be an issue, and the result is a sturdy 'reinvention of the modem, a kind of backup generator for the internet'. In Africa, she says, 'investment in technology, people and creative networks is important'. Her in-joke, she says, is 'if it works in Africa, it will work anywhere!' And it does. ushahidi.com



His Nigerian heritage informs the outlook of Ije Nwokorie, head of UK-based brand consultancy Wolff Olins (behind such brand exercises as London 2012, Skype and Orange). 'You have to be creative in Africa to survive,' he notes, 'there are lots of messy problems to negotiate.' What's important to him is getting into the places where brands exist: 'Brands live in this real space.' His innovative thinking extends beyond the corporate world to inventions that use 'new creative ways to help solve problems', namely Little Sun, 'a work of art that works in real life'. Launched at Tate Modern, but with applications that make it a necessity specifically in impoverished rural areas, this functional, but beautiful, solar lamp provides five hours of 'sunlight' and runs for three years before needing battery replacement. wolffolins.com





DESIGNING A FUTURE URBAN AFRICA

Ivory Coast architect Issa Diabaté laments a lack

of vision in urban
planning, specifically in his
country's former capital, Abidjan. 'As a
consequence there's an inability to control
and monitor urban space,' he says. His
firm Koffi & Diabaté Architectes hopes
to rehabilitate a polluted lagoon to create
a thriving new district – but he fears
'this might take an African architect
of tomorrow'. As such he's established
Abidjan's first school of architecture and
the creation of 'a curriculum whereby
young architects will be trained to deal
with the local context'. koffi-diabate.com

THOMAS HEATHERWICK

The breathtaking work of London-based Heatherwick Studio and its principal, Thomas Heatherwick, runs the gamut of architecture, urban design and infrastructure, and sculpture, with projects such as the UK Pavilion at the 2010 Shanghai World Expo, the Millennium Seed Bank and the memorable Cauldron for the 2012 Olympics capturing the world's attention. While the Cauldron's 200 copper petals merging to become a single flame had everyone in its thrall, other designs have had a more direct effect - specifically commuters on London's famous red, doubledecker buses, which 50 years on have been given a dignified, 'human-friendly' update by Heatherwick. 'Our passion is public...there is nothing more public than infrastructure,' he says, noting that the sign of a successful city is 'that rich people take public transport'. heatherwick.com

ZEITZ MOCAA

Among Heatherwick Studio's latest projects is a massive architectural intervention to transform the historic Grain Silo Complex at Cape Town's V&A Waterfront into a cutting-edge space to house the Zeitz Museum of Contemporary Art Africa (Zeitz MOCAA), scheduled for completion in 2016. Occupying nine floors and comprising 80 galleries, a rooftop sculpture garden, generous spaces for performance, education, storage, shopping and café areas, it will also make for a thrilling architectural feature in the city. Heatherwick's brief is to celebrate the heritage building's character while reimagining it for the purposes of a contemporary art gallery, and his resultant vision already has us dazzled. ▷

SCHOLTEN & BAIJINGS

If vibrant colour, rich detail, texture, layers and transparency inform the body of work by lauded Dutch design studio Scholten & Baijings then the duo's deconstructed MINI Colour One concept car for BMW – 'unpeeled like an onion to discover its fundamentals' – is both the antithesis and a vision into their 'atelier way of working'. 'It's a process that stimulates more questions than answers,' says Stefan Scholten who, with partner Carole Baijings established the studio in 2000. Designing always 'with the public in mind', their aim is to create products with a personal touch that 'will contribute something unique'. And while they might work like artists, 'functionality is as important as beauty', Stephan says. scholtenbaijings.com

With phones a big cause of e-waste, his product (in development via open collaboration with Motorola) is one way to help reduce it. davehakkens.nl

DJ STOUT

A sense of who you are and where you're from is essential, according to DJ Stout, the Austin, Texas partner at Pentagram, the world's largest independent design consultancy. 'You can get lost trying to be global,' says the Stetson-sporting Lone Star cowboy. Pentagram might be a global company, yet its 19 partners 'are all influenced by the places they are from'. That sense of place and identity shows in his own strong, soulful work, from restaurant branding to book design notably the Pentagram Papers 42: Cowboy Poetry (pictured above), a masterpiece of iconic images and design. pentagram.com







#ANOTHERLIGHTUP

An arresting testimony to the power of collaboration, and the use of design and art as an 'active agent for change', is this project undertaken by the Design Indaba Trust, artist Faith47 and local design team Thingking. At first appearance it is merely a magnificent mural occupying the wall of a building on a prominent Cape Town freeway. By night, it is illuminated by an intricate pattern of lights every time a donation is made to what is in fact a crowd-funded community engagement project, which aims to fund the installation of a street light system into the informal settlement of Monwabisi Park, Khayelitsha, through the organisation VPUU (Violence Prevention through Urban Upgrading). anotherlightup.com

MARCELLO SERPA

brand is a global phenomenon in good part due to its positioning by celebrated São Paolo art director Marcello Serpa (it was his first client). In an illustrious career, Serpa (now partner/creative director at AlmapBBDO) cites his most important learnings as simplicity – the art of reducing something potentially complex to a single thought – and unpredictability. EXPERIMENTAL JETSET

They're inspired by the No Wave postpunk subculture, bands like Sonic Youth and The Jam, and films such as Stanley Kubrick's A Clockwork Orange and Antonioni's Blow-up, not to mention anarchist movements from the 1960s... This Amsterdam-based graphic design trio - Marieke Stolk, Erwin Brinkers and Danny van den Dungen - are themselves self-branded 'radicalists', with a penchant for inverted typography, 'turning language into objects', and using 'something negative in order to create something positive'. A 'contrarian' mind-set has certainly had the opposite effect in their brilliant body of work, from art installations to the bold new graphic identity for New York's Whitney Museum, a testimony to their love of 'the nervous angular energy of No Wave' and the 'fractious movement' of zigzags. experimentaljetset.nl >



JAKE BARTON

For Jake Barton, principal of New York-based media design studio Local Projects, good work begins when you 'aim for magic'. And it shows in the notable projects he's worked on, including for the Cleveland Museum of Art, where the museum experience was extended into an elaborate, interactive digital space. What makes a project such as this really work is a process of collaborative story telling that provokes a 'profound emotional response' in users. Barton's approach of 'telling an amazing story' and 'connecting with people' is at the heart of the media experience the firm has created for the 9/11 Memorial and Museum. localprojects.net

NAOTO FUKASAWA

A quick survey of Japanese industrial designer Naoto Fukasawa's extensive body of work reveals why he's considered among the most influential names in the industry. From iconic furniture pieces for B&B Italia, Magis and Artemide to mobile phones and an array of brilliant products for Muji, Fukasawa's deceptively simple designs are such a success owing to their human-centric nature – a process of 'observing what happens naturally around you' and 'the relationship between human life and the environment'.

Award-winning New York-based graphic designer Stefan Sagmeister's litany of clients ranges from the likes of HBO, the Guggenheim Museum and IDEO to bands such as the Rolling Stones. His company, Sagmeister & Walsh, works on brand identities, advertisements, web design, film and so much more, and yet this prolific creative also puts out art exhibitions of his own, such as his bold, extroverted, multi-media *Happy Show*, which has travelled the world. 

SET IN SYLVAN SURROUNDS, THIS MODERN FAMILY HOME IN PRETORIA EAST IS A RESPITE FROM CITY LIFE

Approaching this Pretoria house by way of a steep drive that brings you up into a leafy canopy you're quickly made aware of your surroundings. Even more so as you cross the long, narrow walkway that soars above a landscaped slope, leading you to the front door. Like a scene from a modern-day Swiss Family Robinson, it's an utterly contemporary home built into the woods on the outskirts of the city.

While many homeowners might begin a new build by conceptualising from the inside out, Quintin and Michelle Wiehahn looked to the outside first, working out how they might live among the trees on their site. 'We pointed out our favourite ones and set those aside as non-negotiable, meaning that the house had to be built around them,' Michelle explains. What they started with was not an architectural plan at all, but a land surveyor's drawing detailing every one of the trees on the property, including the common hook thorn, white stinkwood and gwarrie. When they stumbled across the plot by chance, the couple was under the spell of its elevation and sylvan backdrop. 'The day we viewed the site it was like an overgrown forest,' recalls Quintin, explaining that they had always longed to live either where there were trees or a view.

Architect couple Thomas and Sureen
Gouws have created a home that is both
modern and completely at ease in its
surrounds, and which achieves the ideal
of enhancing its owners quality of life.

Enormous glass doors slide away into the walls, exposing the interior and pulling the outdoors in.

A large, central courtyard with a lawn and swimming pool forms the core of the U-shaped structure, not only inverting the focus of the home inward instead of out, but also turning the family's attention to the sybaritic side of life, namely lounging, leisure and respite. And who could deny that being surrounded by copses of soaring trees aids in the route to relaxation?

The two barn-like structures – a private north wing and a more public south wing – connect by way of a light-flooded passage, flanked by scenes of greenery on either side. 'When we're down here entertaining and Hailey, our 17-month-old daughter, is up in her room, it's quiet for her,' says Michelle, adding that while Hailey whips around the house on her little bike, they can see her from all angles. When they're not having dinner beneath an endless night sky you'll just as likely find the family enjoying a braai in their boma, followed by drinks in the adjacent cellar.

A reduction of lines lends a Zen-like calm while the furniture they've sourced introduces natural form and texture, bringing a dose of warmth and balance to the scene. The building's clean-cut design has also created a blank canvas for a collection of artworks, which include pieces by South African artists such as Lionel Smit, Norman Catherine and Angus Taylor.


'It was quite challenging planning the house like a puzzle around the trees,' says Thomas, 'but we only had to take one or two of the non-negotiables out in the end.' Most striking of all is the White Stinkwood, which has been enveloped into the couple's spacious outdoor shower area. From the comfort of their bed, they have a clear view of this, the largest stinkwood on the property, and many more like it through the vast sliding doors directly in front of them.


A home with a deep connection to nature, it straddles the line between contemporary living and down-to-earth comfort, harnessing a sense of escapism. 'When I'm driving home along the road at night and the street lights become fewer, it really feels like I'm out of town – I've always loved that,' Quintin remarks. \(\to\$\text{Thomas Gouws}\)





My most treasured piece of furniture is the sofa in the lounge - it's just so comfortable - and the old ironwood table in the wine cellar, which adds so much character to the room (Quintin). There's always lots of fruit and something to braai in our fridge (Michelle). The standing lamp in our study with a damask lampshade and hanging crystals was my worst impulse buy (Michelle). The soundtrack to our perfect weekend is Cat Empire, Two Door Cinema Club and Fun Lovin' Criminals during the day, and Ray LaMontagne, Neil Young and Eddie Vedder at night (Quintin) I have everything from jazz to rock and roll on my iPod (Quintin).





ELEMENT OF SURPRISE

WITH ITS COOL JUXTAPOSITION OF CULTURAL STYLE, THIS STELLENBOSCH ABODE IS AN UNEXPECTED TREASURE

here's a house in the oldest suburb in the second-oldest town in South Africa, set back from a quiet broad street, and approached by a paved pathway across a generous stretch of well-tended lawn. It's on the banks of the Eerste River and it's at least 80 years old. How much more authentically Stellenbosch, home to several centuries of history and establishment, can you get?

As you enter the house, beneath its pitched 1920s roof, you'd be forgiven for expecting a traditional *voorkamer*, perhaps, or a long passageway, off which various small, low-ceilinged rooms might lead. Instead a large, cool, exotic interior opens up to greet you – dark-grey walled, with high ceilings and a seamless expanse of screeded flooring – punctuated by *objets*, striking furnishings, and modern and antique artworks. A collector lives here.

Michele Corner, born in Stellenbosch, has returned here via several countries' worth of travel, amassing foreign experiences, a banker husband and, now, two children. The gloss of life in Belgium, Hong Kong and more recently London never lost its appeal, but a few years ago, needing a more settled environment in which to raise their daughters, they made a big decision. 'We'd bought the house a while ago, largely as a rental investment,' she explains, 'but when we thought about it, it suddenly made sense for us to live here ourselves.' Good schools (a bike ride away), the sunshine and the sports, plus the proximity of Michele's parents in the town, combined to spur a major transformation of the property into the new family home.

Cognisant of the house's 1920s heritage, and wanting to retain as much of its authentic structure as possible, Michele commissioned local architect Rick Stander to modernise it while staying respectful of its 'shell'. The main changes, apart from one addition – the porch entrance – took place inside.

The original rooms were small and dark, so many of the interior walls were demolished; windows were enlarged; the high ceilings revealed. The 'spine' of the house – long and narrow – was opened up and is now one expansive living-dining area, extending back towards the partially open kitchen-scullery at the rear. 'The hardest part of the renovations was living in London and doing them "remotely", but luckily I could leave my very capable father in charge,' she says.











Private spaces lead off this central area: the master bedroom, with open-plan bathroom, and a bedroom each for daughters Izzy (15) and Beth (17). There's also a TV/family room (with adjoining bathroom), and, up a flight of stairs, a compact guest suite.

Throughout, sleek, hi-tech appliances sit easily amid a collection reflecting a glorious collision of Portuguese, Chinese and French culture – sourced in the markets of Macau, Cambodia, Belgium...

It's the exterior of the house, however, that recalls the traditional South African home – with a long pool, complete with red-bricked surround ('so Seventies'); a deep shaded stoep; and an established garden in which an ancient, prolifically bearing lemon tree has pride of place. Indoor-outdoor flow – so suited to the local climate – is assured, thanks to a giant wall of glass doors flanking the living area.

It looks and feels complete, but Michele – who loves tweaking as much as travelling – still has plans for this house. 'Often I'll wake up,' she admits, 'and rearrange everything. It's a work-in-progress, really.'

'It's not a massive house,' she notes, 'but it lives well.' And so it does, in its own, highly individual and quietly dramatic way. \(\therefore\)

here's something about Durban's

houses, which happily swing either way:

a contemporary look and feel.

Both in the retail industry and with a passion for design, Anthony and Taryn Smith had their hearts set on finding a home in Morningside, spending weekends scouring the property pages or crisscrossing the suburb to look at show houses. Until this one. 'Gargoyle water feature, cementitious paint, mondo grass around pavers, oversized pots, the whole Tuscan vibe,' Anthony grimaces. But for the Smiths, whose work has entailed extensive travel, beyond Tuscany lay opportunities to introduce their brand of influences from New York, London and Hong Kong. They also fell for the house's open-plan interior, its close proximity to everything and its promise of a family lifestyle. 'We overstretched ourselves completely,' shrugs Anthony. 'Still...'

The initial alterations had two key drivers, Tuscan elimination and practical family needs, such as installing a pool net. 'I had to raise the pool to fit a net, so it needed decking. Ditto with the columns – once I'd boxed them in, it made sense to build the outside bar-come-lounging area. That's the story of this house, no master plan, one thing always led to another,' says Anthony.

The plan was always about creating space to fit the lifestyle of the couple and their sons Hayden (18 months) and Blake (five) – and an outdoor one at that. 'Nothing beats coming home after work, pulling off the pool net, lighting a braai, and being with the kids. That's our joy,' Anthony explains.

His work in the clothing industry has taken him across the globe where he's been exposed to inspiring design. 'I always liked that whole New York bungalow look, burnt wood cladding, east-coast style, loads of black and Scandinavian furniture,' he says. It's this feel the couple aimed to achieve in their home – although, says Anthony, Taryn balked at an entirely black interior: 'She convinced me to go "bovine", but I did manage to paint a few sections black.' The Oregon wooden floors, too, went black, but without losing the high and low notes of the wood grain.

Inside the property, the garden walls are matt black. The variegated greens and sculptural shapes of plants are skilfully curated by Anthony as a strong, striking foreground to the dark receding backdrop. ▶








From the house looking out, there's a deliberate sense of the forest indoors, the wood, the green, the black, the play of light and dark. And by night, the uplighters throw organic shadows onto the wall.


Anthony's an avid gardener, something he takes way beyond a love of growing plants. It's also about design. Everything is handpicked for its colouring, its form, its habits, indoors and out. Big leaf plants hang in the kitchen, trail off furniture, and sit on shelves ('A little Seventies kind of thing,' he grins).

A warm counterpoint to the black walls and floors, wood of all kinds is a constant throughout the house. Anthony is a collector at heart and has amassed a serious assortment of wooden servers and chairs. In addition, the house is filled with finds from second-hand shops and markets, quirky collectables from their travels, original paintings and posters, and sentimental family pieces − items that epitomise timeless design rather than what's trending. 'We also love colour,' says Anthony. 'The bold black backdrop allows all these colours to jump out at you.' And they do. □








ANTHONY & TARYN'S HOME TRUTHS

rrol Solomon knows a thing or two about style. A career as head of store design and visual merchandising has seen this Capetonian develop a highly individual aesthetic, honed by years of international travel and experience – a prerequisite for a person whose job requires an appreciative eye for all things attractive and interesting.

So it's no surprise, then, that when there's a gap in his travels and people-filled schedule, he likes to hang his jacket in this tastefully serene house on Cape Town's Atlantic Seaboard.


He bought the house, in the quiet upper avenues of Fresnaye, some eight years ago as a 'fixer-upper', and set about doing extensive renovations on a limited budget, adding a custom-designed kitchen, bedroom, bathroom and garage, and selecting the decor.

It wasn't Errol's first makeover home (and it won't be his last, he laughs): the influences on his personal style are everchanging and he therefore loves nothing better than to buy a property and make it his own. With this house, he wanted, simply, to make a refuge that also felt like a holiday home for

himself and his partner, Louis. To this end, he has created a sense of abundant space and uncluttered flow. The entire ground floor is devoted to open-plan relaxed living: from the kitchen and dining area to the two inter-leading lounges. Ideal for entertaining and all-season comfort, one lounge has a fireplace for the cold winter months; the other seems to extend almost into the swimming pool outside.

Every window or glass door is framed by foliage – a palm tree, a giant shrub – or offers a glimpse of water. The soothing, largely white palette is accented by gentle splashes of colour in all the right places: on Oriental carpets, scatter cushions and arresting contemporary artworks.

'Art and colour are two of my passions,' says Errol. 'I choose what goes into the house very carefully, because everything needs to "fit"!' A tour of his home quickly confirms that he and Louis are indeed meticulous curators. There are Babylonstoren olive-oil jars in the kitchen, ceramic figurines watching over the computer in the study, and French-influenced 'soap-taps' in the bathrooms. Every detail is either purposeful and beautiful – or both.





In addition to being the place where he can indulge his foodie hobby, the kitchen is one of his favourite spots 'because it has a semi-industrial feel, yet there's a measure of modernity to it,' he says. It represents a collaboration typical of Errol, who co-opts talented friends and colleagues wherever possible – in this case, designer Piers Mansfield-Scadden. Its functionality is enhanced by distinctly glamorous touches, such as the marble-topped wooden table, the glossy splashback and the sleek, handle-free cupboards. Varied textures provide dramatic interest: marble, a chalk-board, pot taps and brass runners combine in a sort of 'Conran meets café society' style – just begging guests to feel right at home.

By contrast, the upper storey, reached by an ash-wood staircase, is a more private, intimate space, accommodating three en-suite bedrooms. The main bedroom en suite is separated from the bathroom by a low wall, the other two are enclosed by glass and Californian shutters. There's also a study and Errol's massive, 'dream' walk-in wardrobe. Here, too, the contemporary and the timeless combine: the rooms are carefully

and spaciously designed, with sleek mod cons co-existing alongside shutters, louvres and linen curtains. Each room has a view of water – either the Atlantic Ocean in the distance or, from one of the balconies, the pool below.

Essentially a contemporary South African home, it also whispers of foreign lands. Since travel is such an integral part of Errol's job, he and Louis revisit the same favourite markets and stores overseas to source the next batch of *objets* to grace the interiors.

This is a lovely home in every respect – tranquil yet charming and characterful. Until he embarks on his next property challenge, it's everything he wants. \triangle

t's the space that grabs your attention first. With its roomy open-plan flow, raised outdoor deck and penthouse-like second floor, it's hard to believe that you're in the heart of suburban Parkhurst. Thanks to a clever redesign by architect Joe van Rooyen of JVR Architects and Interiors, this Johannesburg home feels more like a capacious Camps Bay party pad – all that's missing is the ocean and a mountain or two in the distance.

The main living areas are just a stone's throw from a greenery-softened furnished deck – accessed via tall glass doors that flood the interior with light. In early summer the deck is a jasmine-scented sanctuary for alfresco dinners, in winter a sheltered, sunny location for the couple's legendary braais. 'We love the house to be full of friends and family,' says owner Nina Morris Lee. 'The house lends itself to gatherings, yet guests staying over have their own private, secluded space.'

Roomy enough for two seating areas, a dining room and the kitchen, the ground floor also houses Nina's study and two guest bedrooms. 'Interior-wise it evolved quite naturally,' she says. 'Both Cindy and I grew up in homes with a great deal of expression

- spaces that said, "Someone lives here, someone's given it some thought." Cindy, a director of television commercials, is drawn to straight lines and minimalism, while Nina prefers 'more of everything'. 'It's been a great collaboration and we've managed to combine things in a way that happens to work.'

Born in Finland, Nina came to South Africa with her parents in 1970. 'My father was a great entrepreneur, and for a while he had a shop on Parkhurst's 4th Avenue selling Finnish glassware and furniture. It would have been in huge demand today,' she says. While Nina admires Scandinavian design, she'd rather live with a few key pieces than be surrounded by this pared-down aesthetic. 'Cindy's style is far more suited to that sparse neutrality,' she says, 'whereas I'm a tragic sentimentalist with a tendency to collect things. I've been told on several occasions to tone it down!'

With effortless flair, the couple have mixed vintage, modern and classic pieces. Art plays an important role, with paintings by Fatima Fernandes and Walter Battiss and photographs by Oliver Nurock. The result is quirky and colourful, comfortable and inviting – the kind of home where you can kick off your shoes amid the easy-going glamour.





One of Nina's favourite things is the pair of 1950s armchairs that belonged to her parents – the original upholstery now back in fashion. Then there's Cindy's life-size paper leopard that she's had 'forever,' and a retro standing lamp with bright orange shades that was bought in the United States. 'We both love colour,' says Nina, 'and we enjoy juxtaposing different eras and styles.'

Upstairs, occupying the entire top floor is a luxurious bedroom suite. The palette here is tranquil, a celebration of textures and subtlety. 'This area was all about creating a feeling of space, and strong colour didn't seem right,' says Nina. 'We wanted a sense of quiet – it really is a place for reflection at the end of a busy day.'


Over weekends, the deck is the only place to be. 'We love cooking and entertaining, and right now I'm completely Yotam Ottolenghi bedondered,' says Nina, referring to the renowned Israeli-born chef. 'His Middle Eastern inspired recipes are insanely delicious!'




ou're met with one exciting juxtaposition after another when visiting Greyton Lodge in the quaint and arty leiwater village of Greyton in the Western Cape, nestled comfortably in the panoramic splendour of the Overberg mountain range. Full of contrasts, this recently restored country retreat couples the charismatic charm of old worldliness with current, edgy design.

When new owners the Bloem family took over the heritage building two years ago, they closed its doors to perform a full internal face-lift. 'It had to be fresh, inviting and iconic,' explains son Hendre Bloem, the designer behind the lodge's new incarnation. 'It had to give a sense of nostalgia – a feeling of recognising some detail and elements, yet seeing it used in a new way.'

A case in point is the archetypal Cape vernacular architecture, which creates a strong historical presence, skilfully complemented by a tasteful, laser-cut wooden sign, introducing a modern twist to the exterior.

The lodge comprises 15 guest suites.

Among these are the Garden rooms, which have been completely restored, while the Manor rooms retain facets of the original character. Once a farm house (the swimming pool is a converted sheep dip) and later part of the Greyton police station, the Manor House, which was built in 1930, still has its authentic high ceilings and Oregon pine floors. In the passage, Hendre has created an eye-catching installation using umbrellas, which guests have been known to attempt to nick on rainy days -



there are, of course, more available for this purpose at reception.

Eclectic works by local artist Sarah Pratt embellish the foyer in soft hues of china blue and white. Hand-painted light bulbs strung from the ceiling depict scenes of the Dutch arriving in the Cape, and create a warm, welcoming atmosphere. The communal lounge is a textural, sensory space, making use of raw brick and wood, leather, paper, brass and glass, while still exuding a minimalist, contemporary feel. Hendre describes the decor as 'chic South African design'. 'Textures, materials and colours play a vital role in my work, making bold statements in some instances while being subliminal in others,' he says.

A sprawling lawn speckled with a variety of fruit trees sets the scene for the perfect sundowner, or guests can gather at the antique timber bar, which offers a topnotch wine list. From the lodge, it's an easy walk to several dining spots in the village, which your hosts will helpfully pre-book.

Breakfast is a definite highlight, and choices vary from a continental spread to a fluffy farm scramble, served in the stylish dining area. The staff are warm, personable and willing to go the extra mile to cater for your requirements with impeccable attention to detail. The merging of old and new design, a prime location and excellent service leave you wanting for nothing more while at Greyton Lodge... except another night's stay. WHAT? The Porter Estate Produce
Market, nestled between Tokai forest and
Table Mountain National Park, runs on
Saturday mornings (weather permitting)
from 9am to 1pm. With an emphasis on
natural and organic fare, expect plenty
of home-grown and home-made goods
for sale. The market was founded by the
owners of Cape Town restaurants Societi
Bistro and Jonkershuis, and has a strong
focus on youth upliftment, being on the
grounds of the Chrysalis Academy, a
project that provides skills for previously
disadvantaged teenagers.

WHO? This spot takes kid friendly to the next level. Think face painting, play areas, toy car racing, pony rides and stained glass tile workshops. Parents can have a leisurely browse with their youngsters in full view. Foodies will be there to snap up those sweet carrots pulled from the patch that very morning. Dogs on leads are welcome too. Watch out for the odd baboon, though... WHAT TO EXPECT Strolling through beautiful outdoor scenery and foraging under ancient oak trees make this market the epitome of friendly familiarity. With a warm farm feel, stalls selling gooey cheeses, biltong, nuts and the freshest

fruit and vegetables are scattered under weathered overhangs. Home-made lemonade, aromatic curries, samoosas, farmhouse breakfasts and pancakes are just a few of the options that lead to snack indecision. Handmade soaps, lotions and crafts give a comforting 'church fête' feel, with the overall laid-back vibe making a change from the hustle and bustle of trendier city markets. DON'T LEAVE WITHOUT... A sneaky stall called 'Dew of the Sun' sports a collection of carnivorous plants! Tropical Pitchers, Venus flytraps and other fascinating flora are available, and the stall is an exciting surprise among the crocheted curios and boxes of prehistoric VHS cassettes that abound. On the food side, try to go during mushroom season to pick up some Pine Ring, Cep and Porcini mushrooms for a winter risotto.

X-FACTOR Perhaps Porter Estate
Produce Market's greatest pull is its
unpretentiousness. Put on your old faithful
jeans, scrape up your hair and head out for
a day of fun with some little people and the
furry kids, too. □





Hoping for a career in a creative field, he decided to enrol in a six-month cookery course, following which he won an apprenticeship at an award-winning restaurant, Mooloolaba, in South East Queensland. By then he had been bitten properly by the culinary bug and left for London to work at The Ritz hotel, before returning to home soil. Now head chef at Singita Castelton lodge he is at the helm of his own team. He admits that life as a chef is 'hard work, long hours and hot' but he loves it - 'especially using sharp knives', he says. singita.com

What tastes remind you of childhood? Candy floss, my folks' cooking and pizza. What's always in your pantry? Hoisin sauce, verjuice, cashew nuts and sushi rice.

If you were a drink what would it be?

Brewers&Union Steph Weiss beer. Crisp, refreshing and smooth. What's for supper? It's braai night for me! Whole beef sirloin marinated for a week in grain mustard, honey and lemon juice, served with braai broodtjies and a grilled baby marrow, watercress, olive and feta salad. Current favourite restaurants? Cape Town's The Test Kitchen, The Woodlands Eatery and Bukhara.. What's on your kitchen wish list? A herb, fruit and vegetable garden. Culinary vice? The pastry kitchen. I just want to eat sweet things when I'm in there and my staff hate it! Your most used recipe book? My oldest book is Le Répertoire de la Cuisine by Louis Saulnier and E. Brunet, 1981; Quay: Food Inspired by Nature by Peter Gilmore; and Beyond Essence: New Recipes from Le Champignon Sauvage by David Everitt-Matthias also rock. I use them to

get creative and inspired rather than copy recipes because that's what separates each chef from the next. Your ultimate breakfast is... a croissant filled with scrambled egg, chorizo sausage, tomato, rocket and grated Parmesan. I won't eat... sheep's eyes. Weirdest thing you've ever eaten? Fried grasshoppers. I was working in the Kruger Park where it is a local delicacy, served with chilli sauce. It kind of tastes like crispy prawns, if you can get your head around what you're eating. What's your signature dish? Pan-fried cob with shaved asparagus salad, mushroom tortellini, baby artichoke and verjuice beurre blanc. Marmite - love it or hate it? Love it, but it burns the roof of my mouth. Absolute food weakness? Chocolate. Secret talent? Drawing, when I have time. I've been drawing a pencil sketch of a Euphorbia plant, which is indigenous to Mpumalanga.△







SWEETCORN PANNA COTTA

1 cup fresh mealie kernels, cooked and cut off the cob

3T milk

4t orange juice, freshly squeezed

2t gelatine

200ml fresh cream

4T white sugar

1t vanilla extract

1t orange zest

Combine the mealie kernels with the milk and blend to make a smooth purée. Strain and set aside. Pour the orange juice into a small bowl and sprinkle the gelatine on top, allowing it to bloom. Place the bowl in a bain marie of boiling water for about five minutes, stirring until the gelatine has melted.

Combine the cream, sugar and vanilla together in a small saucepan and bring to the boil. Add the mealie purée and stir through, followed by the orange zest. Add the gelatine and stir well. Pour the mixture into dariole moulds and refrigerate for one to two hours, until set. Carefully unmould the panna cottas onto serving plates and garnish with an edible flower. Serve immediately. PORK AND CABBAGE DUMPLINGS WITH MIRIN DIPPING SAUCE

500g pork mince

1/3 cup Chinese cabbage, very finely

chopped

1/3 cup chopped spring onions

1T grated ginger

1 garlic clove, crushed

3T soy sauce

1T mirin (or dry sherry)

1 egg

pinch of tōgarashi

or chilli flakes

1t sesame oil

40 round gyoza wrappers

(10cm diameter)

small bowl of water

vegetable oil for frying

for the dipping sauce

1/3 cup rice vinegar

½ cup soy sauce

½t ginger

1t sesame oil

Combine the pork mince with the cabbage, spring onions, ginger, garlic, soy, mirin, egg, tōgarashi and sesame oil in a bowl and mix well. Working one at a time to prevent the wrappers from drying out, place about a teaspoon of filling in the centre of each wrapper. Brush a little water around the edges of the wrapper and fold the pastry over the filling, pressing the edges together tightly to seal, pleating the edges as you go.

Heat a little vegetable oil in a large frying pan and, when hot, add a few of the dumplings to the pan with the pleats facing upwards. Fry for about three minutes, until the bottoms are golden brown and crisp. Turn each dumpling on its side and fry for a further minute. If you prefer a pot-sticker style dumpling you can serve them as is.

Alternatively, for a steamed version, add about half a cup of water to the pan and cover with a tight fitting lid. Allow the dumplings to steam for about eight minutes, until puckered and tender.

To make the dipping sauce, combine all the ingredients in a small bowl and serve with the hot dumplings.

MAKES ABOUT 40 DUMPLINGS

TOFU AND SHIMEJI MUSHROOM STIR-FRY WITH PAK CHOI

300g tofu rice flour for dusting pinch of salt vegetable oil for frying

1T sesame oil

150g shimeji mushrooms, trimmed

150g baby pak choi (or baby spinach)
1 spring onion, chopped

2T oyster sauce

2T soy sauce

2t caster sugar

pepper to taste

1T sesame seeds

red rice to serve (or brown rice)

Daub the tofu with paper towel and cut into cubes (about 2,5cm). Season the rice flour with the salt and dust the tofu cubes, coating all sides. Heat the vegetable oil in a large frying pan or wok, and lightly fry until golden brown on all sides. Remove from the pan and set aside on paper towel to drain. Add the sesame oil, followed by the mushrooms, pak choi and spring onion. Stir-fry until the mushrooms are cooked through and the pak choi is tender but still bright green.

To make the oyster sauce dressing, mix the oyster and soy sauces together with the caster sugar and pepper to taste. Sprinkle the sesame seeds over the stir-fry and pour the dressing over the dish. Serve with red rice. **SERVES 4**

HOT AND SOUR PRAWN BROTH

3T rice vinegar (or white wine vinegar)
750ml chicken or vegetable stock
500ml water

300g peeled prawns

1/2T fish sauce

1T soy sauce

1T demerara sugar

fresh lime juice to taste

1 thumb-sized piece of ginger, finely sliced

1 red chilli, finely chopped,

3 spring onions, chopped 250g vermicelli

large handful fresh coriander

Place the vinegar, stock and water in a large saucepan and bring to the boil. Immediately reduce the heat to a gentle simmer and add the prawns, simmering until just cooked through. Remove with a slotted spoon and set aside.

Add the fish and soy sauces, demerara sugar and lime juice to the cooking liquid, adjusting the seasoning according to your taste – add soy sauce for a saltier broth or lime juice for a more sour flavour.

Add the ginger and chilli, and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to a simmer and cook for about 15 minutes. Add the spring onions and vermicelli about five minutes before serving. Return the prawns to the soup and garnish with fresh coriander.

SERVES 4

MANGO AND SAFFRON BRÛLÉE WITH NO-CHURN COCONUT ICE CREAM

4 eggs, separated
100g caster sugar
300ml cream
300ml coconut cream solids
75g coconut flakes, lightly toasted
for the mango and saffron brûlée
2 cups cream
pinch of saffron
3 egg yolks
¼ cup caster sugar
¼ cup mango purée

caster sugar for dusting

To make the coconut ice cream, whisk the egg whites until stiff peaks form. Gradually add the caster sugar, whisking until the mixture is glossy and smooth like meringue. In a separate bowl, whisk the cream and coconut cream solids together until soft peaks form. Gently fold in the egg yolks and toasted coconut flakes, then carefully fold into the meringue mixture. Pour into a loaf tin, cover tightly with clingfilm and freeze overnight until solid.

Preheat the oven to 180°C. To make the mango brûlée combine the cream and saffron in a small saucepan and scald the mixture, then remove from the heat.

In a separate bowl, whisk the egg yolks and caster sugar together until thick and double its volume. Add the mango purée and beat it into the mixture, then gently fold in the scalded cream mixture. Divide the mixture between four oven-proof ramekins and place them in a roasting tray. Fill the tray with boiling water so that it reaches half way up the sides of the ramekins. Bake for about 35 to 40 minutes, until the mixture is firm with a slight wobble. Remove from the oven and from the *bain-marie*, and allow the custards to cool to room temperature, then refrigerate to cool completely.

When ready to serve, lightly dust the top of each custard with enough caster sugar to coat it in an even layer. Brûlée the tops of each custard using a blowtorch, until golden brown and crisp. Serve with a scoop of coconut ice cream.

All were suitably delighted when led to the kitchen, where they were seated at a long oak table with a perfect view of the chefs at work on dishes such as tuna carpaccio with smoked brinjal purée, pan-fried monkfish with a tomato and calamari sauce, blue marinated beef sirloin, and Very Berry Verrine – all artfully plated and superbly matched by the Veuve bubblies. The fun, interactive dinner was the ultimate setting for a night of inspired design thinking and sharing.





It's late on a Saturday, and this magical green lung in the heart of urban Berea in Durban is packed with upbeat visitors. The photographer is spoilt for backdrops: brightly coloured cannas line the pathway, a formal sunken garden is newly planted with annuals, and 'golden oldies' or heritage trees dot the 15 hectare space like gnarled old friends. Next to the dam there's a kitchen tea on the go – complete with silver teapots and perfectly iced cupcakes.


The Durban Botanic Gardens (DBG) has its history rooted in agriculture. It started out in 1849 as an experimental food station, evolving into an unprecedented plants from the sub tropics. The first jacaranda brought from Argentina to South Africa was planted here in 1885, as were plants with economic potential, such as cinnamon and sugar cane. As botanic gardens go, this is the oldest surviving one of its kind on the African continent, and it's right on our eastern seaboard, squeezed between two busy roads and the Durban University of Technology.


While the Victorian age championed the acquisition of new species, this botanic garden has remained refreshingly relevant. 'One of our most exciting challenges DBG curator Martin Clement. 'What originated as a formal, ornamental display has become a lot more playful, and it re-looks traditional garden styles and uses. We have a strong focus on plant conservation, and are constantly seeking creative ways to promote education.

Our permaculture classes, for instance, provide pupils with the skills to create food gardens at home and at school. At the same time our visitors can enjoy a time of solitude, wander through the spectacular orchid collection or spend a fantastic few hours at one of our musical concerts.'

As plant royalty goes, the DBG's cycad collection is a noteworthy attraction. The most iconic (and threatened) of these is *Encephalartos woodii*, which was collected in the Ngoye forest in northern KwaZulu-Natal in 1895. 'It's estimated to be several hundred years old,' says senior horticulturist Janet Gates, 'and as far as we know was the last one found growing in the wild.'

LEISURE GARDEN





The palm collection is another drawing card, and these graceful wind-blown exotics represent the global band of tropics from Cuba to Indonesia. Bromeliads, a relative of the pineapple, also feature strongly, but if anything's going to take your breath away, it's likely to be the trees.

'What we've got is a giant of a subtropical arboretum,' says Martin Clement, referring to the grand scale of many of the trees. More than 80 heritage trees abound, a good many of which are over a century old. Take the vast ilala palm, which was brought here in the 1870s. Countless other far-flung transactions resulted in a Candle tree from Panama, a hog plum from Queensland, Bitter ash from the West Indies, and fragrant frangipanis in a whole host of different colours. 'The tree collection makes the garden,' says Janet, 'and gives it that remarkable ambience. Throughout the year there are different trees in flower, and of course there are plenty of local heroes such as our buffalo thorn - it's one of the last remaining trees from the original bush that covered the site.'

As the light wanes, the bridal party makes their way to the solar-powered visitors' centre where they'll hold their reception. Garden visitors head homewards, picnic blankets and umbrellas trailing in their wake. 'This garden has a deep significance for families, researchers, students and tourists,' says Martin. 'It means so many different things to different people, and its ongoing connection to our urban society is invaluable.' \(\textcap{\textcap{durbanbotanicgardens.org.za}\)

The Durban Botanic Gardens Trust is an independent fundraising body working closely with the city. 'Our goal is to help maintain the standards of excellence of this remarkable institution,' says chairman Ivor Daniel. 'The trust ensures that all funds raised are allocated in the most beneficial ways, whether in education, specialist plant propagation or public entertainment.' The Old Mutual Music at the Lake is one such event, and Mango Groove will perform a Mother's Day concert on 11 May (bookings via webtickets.co.za). Winter is a good time to visit the herbarium, with the orchids in bloom between April and October.

In the wild heart of Zambia, two high-end bush camps offer the chance to experience an unexpected and unforgettable adventure

hat is it that you most want to see?' asked Matt.
'Crocodiles,' I replied.

His was a fairly mandatory question for the safari-goer and everyone has their preference

- the Big Five most likely a common response. Mine was not the expected answer, but it wasn't a lie – I'd seen crocs in the wild before, but their aloof nature was one I was drawn to – and Matt didn't look disappointed. Being a guide in a game park is a vocation for him. And while crocs are as common as they come in South Luangwa's game park, he is still in awe of them.

Just a half hour earlier we'd landed at Royal Airstrip in Zambia to experience our bordering country's abundant wildlife before the wet season took charge. By the time we arrived at Chongwe House we'd seen a herd of elephant, baboons and a few one-day-old unstable baby buck. The first of the rains had come a few days before we arrived, bringing with it new life. Yet the trip to the camp told a different story: a landscape desiccated, with chalk trees extending their branches to the sky, as if praying for reprieve. Soon the earth would welcome nonstop rainfall that, seeping into its cracks and filling barren riverbeds, would overflow and force most of the camps in the area to close. Until then, though, the animals would continue to lumber under the cruel sun, hides like beaten leather sagging from their skeletal frames.

'A Pel's fishing owl,' answered a travelling companion in response to Matt's question as we drove through the park to Chongwe House on Lake Zambezi. Matt's eyes lit up. This is one of the top regions to spot this owl, he informed us. The Pel's is a rare sight, but just last night the group he had taken on a drive had seen it. Our odds were good. I didn't mind the odds – I'd never heard of it.

Just one of the many lodgings belonging to Norman Carr Safaris, Chongwe House is situated on the banks of the toponymous river, and offers a range of accommodation options besides the four-bedroomed property that stood before us. No ordinary structure, its organic, African-homestead form and Gaudi-like design are reminiscent of an elaborate anthill. Inside is almost indistinguishable from out. This is made all the more apparent by the elephants that browse the trees around the build, grazing the thatched roof as they crash past, the baboons that are known to steal inside through the open spaces where you'd expect windows or doors, and the frogs that greet you in your basin and toilet - I barely suppressed a shriek when I discovered one under my napkin at breakfast, but you shouldn't be a wimp when you're on safari.

Nor should you hope to while away the morning when there's safari-ing to be done. A prompt Matt stood waiting on the porch at 5am as I stomped down the stairs vexed by the early wake-up call, which had come from the honks, grunts and puffs of the hippo pods in the Chongwe, rather than my iPhone's Marimba. Before we'd even started sailing up the tributary I had already spotted three crocs catching a spot of sun on the river bank - Matt's job was half done and I was awake. He chatted excitedly about the Pel's fishing owl as we crossed into the rippling water of the Lower Zambezi. After hopping into the 4×4 on one of the river banks, Matt put his keen tracking skills to the test and steered the vehicle, wildly searching for a pride of lions that had been seen in the area the day before, and that elusive owl. And we weren't the only ones. While a congress of baboons had settled in a section of the vast, dusty landscape, one member patrolled atop an anthill, keeping watch for predators. Three hours later, with no pride or Pel's in sight and a visibly disappointed Matt we needed to turn back it was time for tea.

On safari in Zambia meals are frequent, flavourful and – following jam-packed game viewing, canoeing trips down Chongwe, fishing in the Zambezi, and G&Ts at the private pool – welcome. After a day of adventure in the unrelenting heat, sleep came easy even with the ubiquitous hippo harrumphs and mosquito whines.

A river full of hungry hippos separated our dusty jeep from our next camp. Crossing the water proved to be a stealth mission: a careful avoidance of its wallowing guardians, whom I had no desire to stir. As we approached the site, small tents rapidly became more grand and exquisite than I could possibly have imagined, trepidation was replaced by an overwhelming sense of comfort - I was home. This place exudes understated style: a pared-back palette of off white, copper and grey are complemented by the virtually invisible steel architecture, mahogany pieces, colonial furnishings and lighting, thatch work, and canvas tenting that abounds.

Chinzombo, situated on the Luangwa river, is one of the original camp sites in the valley. This exclusive collection of six villas was created by Joburg architects Silvio Rech, Lesley Carsens and Jack Frenkel, a team known for their contemporary bush aesthetic. The trio's preference for using local craftsmanship and natural materials is evident in their designs. A melange of nature's simple perfection and the architects' astute sense of style, the space

is charged with the wild beauty of Zambia, yet it remains sleek, modern and ultra luxurious. 'A real challenge was to get the essence of hiding in plain sight. Essentially it's a pristine environment with an interior that's soft and accommodating. You notice the nature outside more than you notice the building itself,' Silvio later explained.


Each of the villas is a statement in glamorous safari living, seen in subtle touches such as the gentle ombre curtain drops that separate the bathroom from the bed and living area; the bathtub, which calls for long soaks while you take in the bush vistas; the private pool and outdoor sofa, perfect spots to enjoy a G&T and a good read; and copper pendant lights for when starlight fails.

If I wasn't already somnolent from the complete relaxation that the camp offers, the glorious massage provided by the spa in the comfort of my villa was enough to send me into a deep slumber. In fact, I mightn't have gotten out of bed at all had it not been for the distinctive (and remarkably loud) cry of the Pel's fishing owl in the middle of the night, seemingly perched in a tree somewhere close to my villa. That morning I rose with a new goal – to find that damn bird.

The good-humoured and well-informed guides at all of the camps in the Norman Carr stable are eager to help you find your own bushveld grail. Perhaps the best way to experience this is during a walking safari. Pioneered by Norman Carr in 1968, the walks don't provide the action that you'd experience on a game drive, focusing instead on the small details: dung patterns, insect discoveries, plant names and landscape changes, all while keeping a look out for large animals that may sneak up behind you.


We caught up with a pack of wild dogs, two leopards and a puff adder on our last evening drive in Zambia. Hope for the Pel's faded more with each kilometre passed. It's strange how quickly darkness takes over in the wild, and as we came up to the river bank where we'd cross the river to the camp for the last time, I could feel my eyes fluttering closed. Just as I was about to nod off, the vehicle sprung into action again. John, our guide, had heard something. Just then I heard it too. The cry of a Pel's.

We found it perched high in a tree. Under the stars this solitary owl's ginger feathers seemed to glow, highlighting our prized spotting, and through binoculars I reflected on the find, something that felt more special and personal than any leopard in a tree, and a fitting end to a trip full of discovery and adventure. Thunder clapped in the distance, the Pel's gave a last haunting hoot, before swooping off the scene, alone once again.
