

supply center or book depot to buy a copy to accompany your *Log & Timber Home Living* collection, we are sending it directly to you as part of your subscription.



# floor plan magic

The road to home-design success isn't lined with gold; it's built with sturdy logs and timbers. But first, you need a plan.



### floor plan magic

orothy said it best: "There's no place like home." Now, more than ever, people realize the importance and impact our homes have on our physical and emotional well being. But the perfect home isn't going to fall from the sky, and, often, it's not found simply by looking at countless real estate listings. You design and build it yourself.

The prospect of building a custom log or timber home is incredibly satisfying because it gives you the opportunity to construct a house perfectly suited to the way you and your family live — and surround yourself with the natural beauty of wood in the process.


But before you can build it, you need to design it; and before you can design it, you have to give some careful consideration to a host of factors, such as: the way you live now and how your lifestyle may evolve; the number of people who currently reside there and who may move out/in down the line; what you love about your current home and what you can't wait to change.

The best thing about creating a custom log or timber home is that all of these factors not only can be considered but also addressed. There's a temptation to jump right in and draw up the floor plan — put the kitchen here, situate the bedrooms there ... however, it's wise to make some major decisions about form and function before you start to label spaces. Instead of "rooms," think of your future log or timber home in terms of "activity zones" that reflect they way you live.

There are four primary activity zones: living/eating, working, sleeping and storage/ garage. The size of these zones, and their proximity to each other, will be dictated by your wants and needs, as well as convenience and practicality. For instance, you may want to oversize your garage to accommodate extra storage for things like lawn mowers, jet skis or holiday decorations. You may want to locate this garage in close proximity to the living/eating zone so that it's easy to unload groceries OR you may want to detach it from the house altogether so that starting a car engine in the wee hours of the morning won't wake others in the house. The decision is all yours.

So while you are examining the floor plans in this special issue of **Log & Timber Home Living**, don't just look at them in terms of square feet, number of beds and baths or one level versus two — evaluate them based on how their layouts (their zones) could work for you as they are, as well as what you would change. With thoughtful planning, a little courage and a whole lot of heart, you will be well on your way down the yellow brick road to floor plan perfection — no wizard required.






#### KNOW YOUR DESIGN RIGHTS

When you're ready to purchase a floor plan from a log or timber home company or designer, be aware that you won't own the actual plan - just a one-time right to build the home. This is an important piece of the process to understand, because it protects both the company and you from copyright infringement. Deciding on a plan from one company and "shopping" it around to others is a big faux pas. A reputable log or timber home producer will never knowingly use a copyrighted plan from another company. If you do plan to build or alter an existing floor plan from a designer other than your own, be sure to get permission from the plan's originator.

To protect yourself from copyright violations, keep the following tips in mind:

- Under U.S. copyright law, a floor plan is protected the moment it's created, regardless of whether or not the creator has registered the plan with the U.S. Copyright Office.
- Copyright applies to the interior layout of a home as well as the elevations and exterior design.
- When you buy floor plans and construction documents, you are actually buying a one-time license to build that house.
- Copyright law also protects derivations of the original plan. You cannot change a wall or roofline and consider it your own plan.

# let's get cozy

8 easy ways to make your home feel welcoming and comfortable.

### let's get cozy

e all strive for it — that perfect blend of coziness and elbow room. So what does the "cozy" concept mean to you? Is it a steaming mug of coffee savored from a tiny porch on a brisk morning? Is it enjoying a good book in front of a crackling fire in an expansive great room? Maybe it's the comfort found in having a sense of order and efficiency in your home. Only you can decide how much house will be the perfect amount.

The concept of a cozy environment may be relative, but proper scale is essential to create comfort. Oversized, open spaces can be overwhelming and stressful just as much as a cramped space can feel claustrophobic.

Once you pin down the square footage that fits, there are a lot of fantastic ways to make it feel like home. We've assembled eight of our favorite ideas to keep in mind while you peruse floor plans.

Keep the Hearth at the Heart. Open floor plans are a great use of space, but to keep them warm and welcoming, nothing beats a central hearth. Fireplaces are a log and timber home staple. Not only do they add instant ambiance, they're they an excellent source of supplemental heat. Just be sure your firebox and ventilation are in good working order.

Vary Your Ceiling Heights. Log and timber home floor plans can feel quite dramatic, and soaring ceilings are often part of the appeal. But when you're trying to create a cozy cottage, that grandeur may seem a little much. Lowering the ceiling — at least

in some areas — is an easy solution. One good candidate is the kitchen, especially since vaulted ceilings can make it difficult to install cabinetry, lighting and vents.

Single-story bedrooms are smart, too, because what should be cozier than the spot where you sleep?

Make Your Entryway Welcoming. It's the first thing guests see when they walk through the front door, and while a soaring two-story foyer is dramatic, it also can feel overpowering in a log cabin or timber cottage. Create a bit of suspense and allow your home to unfold slowly by looking to floor plans that feature a distinct, small-scale foyer.

Allow Your Home to Tell a Story.

The natural warmth of exposed logs and timbers automatically imparts a cozy feeling to a house, but you can take that ambiance a step further





by incorporating reclaimed materials in the mix. It could be as decorative as adding vintage doors or antique hardwood flooring, or you could source timbers from old railroad trestles and repurpose them in a more structural way. Whatever you choose, learn the provenance of the pieces so you can share their story with guests when they ask (and they will).


Let the Light Shine. Sunshine is nature's little pick-me-up, so infusing your home with natural light will make a small space feel bright and cheery. It's especially important to consider this fact if your home has a walk-out basement, where you'll want to introduce as much sunlight as possible. If it's feasible, opt for 9-foot ceilings in the lower level, which should allow for oversized 8-foot-tall windows. This extra height can make a huge difference in the livability and enjoyment of your home.

Establish a Light Mood. The sun may be the ideal light source, but once it sets, it's vital to have properly layered illumination in a log or timber home. Ambient (general) light can come from above in the form of inconspicuous recessed lights or a dramatic chandelier. Dimmer switches will let you adjust the level of light to create a specific mood. Both ambient and directed task light are essential in the kitchen for safety, and accent lighting (sconces, spotlights or even colored LEDs) add the drama.


Create Nooks and Crannies. After you establish the overall layout of your house, identify places where you could add a nook for a breakfast table, a reading chair or game area. Special spaces like these not only carve out spots for relaxation or casual entertaining, they take a small home's design from adequate to exceptional.

Where do you find them? Look for what design experts call "dead-end" spaces, like the end of a hallway or a corner of a great room. Then define these spaces by infusing them with architectural details that set them apart.

Keep it Small ... But not too Small. The "tiny home" concept seems to have had its day. While the desire for smaller homes continues, buyers have realized that they have to be realistic in terms of size — especially in a full-time residence - and if a home is too small, it will feel cramped, not cozy. While reviewing small-scale floor plans, take care to ensure the spaces are livable. Look for ways you can devote space for items like an office, media room or home library. Personalized spaces like these are what convert a plan from a house to a home.







# 4 Small Home Must Haves

Jonathan Orpin, founder and owner of New Energy Works, a timber frame and design firm with locations in New York and Oregon, is a champion of smart design, no matter its size. He believes there are several elements you should squeeze into every home, regardless of square footage.

Open living area. "In our designs, we include a combined kitchen/living/ dining area we call 'the commons,'" Jonathan says. By combining these important spaces in a central location, it becomes flexible space suitable for a variety of uses — a feature particularly important in a smaller home.

Pantry. No one has ever regretted having an abundance of storage, and the kitchen is one room that requires its fair share. "I always plan a pantry," explains Jonathan. "It's a cheap form of storage that saves a lot of room."

Walk-in closets. Many people think that large walk-in closets are a place to slash square footage in a small-scale home, but Jonathan disagrees. "We always include walk-ins, complete with drawers, shoe racks, shelves, etc.," he says. A built-in space like this not only maximizes the floor space in a bedroom, it can reduce the amount of costly furniture you need to buy.

Mudroom/mechanical room. "Even when there's not a lot of square footage to spare, I like to include a mudroom or mechanical room," he says. "Big or small, this type of dedicated space keeps everything organized and accessible."

# flex your floor plan muscle

If you want your home to get even better over time, these 6 tips lead to a floor plan that won't require cosmetic surgery to age gracefully.

### flex your floor plan muscle

f you plan to own a log or timber home, chances are you also intend for this to be your *last* house ... your "forever" home. This kind of commitment to your abode emphasizes the importance of having an adaptable design — one that will continue to serve you well as your needs change. Some floor plans offer "flex rooms" that can be used for everything from a guest room to an office to a yoga studio, but why not make your entire log or timber home plan flexible? Here's how:

Ignore Labels. It's common practice to identify each room within a floor plan, and while this may help to avoid confusion, it also may restrict how you perceive the spaces. Of course, some areas, like the kitchen or a bathroom, are obvious, but the ways in which you utilize those other spaces is really up to you. Is it a garage or a pottery studio? A guest bedroom or a meditation area? A basement or a wine cellar? They are your spaces — YOU define them. Your needs will likely evolve over time, so narrowing your focus now could prevent you from seeing all the possibilities.

Be Our Guest. Providing comfortable accommodations for the occasional overnight visitor is always a good idea, but nothing says it has to take up valuable square footage in your home. Consider adding an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) on your property. Most ADUs are separate, small buildings that provide a living area, bedroom, bath and, often, a kitchenette, giving your guests the option for complete autonomy. This kind of space also can provide a save haven for an aging parent, a private place for kids returning from college or supplementary rental income, if needed, all while increasing your property value.

Universal Needs. Whether you opt for a stock floor plan, a modified design or create your home from scratch, be sure to consider your needs both now and in the future.

Fewer stairs and hallways, wider doorways, convenient room placement and ample light (both natural and artificial) are essential elements of a house that will continue to fulfill your daily needs.

Masterful Design. In a two-story plan, a second-level master feels like a private retreat, but someday climbing the stairs to go to bed every night may be anything but dreamy. One option: put a master suite on each level — one for now and one for later. Another idea is to install a residential elevator or, if that's not currently in the budget, stack closets on top of each other to convert to an elevator shaft down the line.

Less is More. The open plans common to log and timber homes are the very essence of flexible design, since they adapt to accommodate a host of activities in a single space. If you are more accustomed to a compartmentalized house, you may think you need more square footage than you really need in a log or timber home. Remember that interior walls and hallways don't create real living space. Once removed, you'll find a smaller footprint may do just fine.

But More is Never Enough. ... when it comes to storage, that is. From kids toys to off-season wardrobes to seasonal decor, inventory of all the stuff you need to stash and how often you need to access it. While evaluating plans, keep a keen eye out for unused or under-utilized spaces that could solve your storage needs. Look vertically as well as horizontally, like dead zones beneath eaves or air space that hovers above your cars in the garage. They can give you the storage you need at minimal cost.

### 4 Design Choices You Won't Regret

How do you know which design decisions are best for your log or timber home and which are best to pass up? We share four faithful design decisions that won't steer you wrong.

Kitchen. To get a kitchen that performs to your expectations, you have to rethink what you think you already know about designing this very important space. Where once the concept of the kitchen triangle (the proximity and location of the stove, sink and refrigerator) reigned supreme, there's a new configuration on the scene: zone design. Think of your kitchen in terms of functions, like baking, food prep, serving and cleaning, as well as how many people will be working in the kitchen at one time. You may find you need two sinks, a cooktop that's separate from a pair of wall ovens and a small under-counter fridge in the island detached from the main refrigerator. Don't forget space for people to gather together while you cook.


Entryway. While in some cases, log and timber home entryways have become more grand, you'll want to ensure that this first-impression space is warm and welcoming. As a gauge, designers suggest a minimum of 2 to 4 percent of the total square footage of the house. To avoid feeling cramped, guests each need 3 feet of space to remove coats, so consider the average number of people who will enter your home at one time, and be sure to have a closet or coat rack to keep their items off the floor.

Master Bath. Aside from the kitchen, a master bath is one of the most expensive rooms in the house. Even so, it's one space where it can be less costly to "over design" now than to expand or retrofit later on. This includes planning for future needs. Incorporate 3-foot-wide doorways, a curbless shower or wet room, floating vanities that would allow for a chair to slide beneath and resilient, low-maintenance materials like quartz counters and porcelain tile.

Loft. If there's a better log or timber home feature, we don't know of it. They don't cost much to build but they add incredible value and provide endless possibilities in a flexible floor plan, serving a range of needs from offices and exercise rooms to kids' lounges and guest bedrooms, making a loft a smart investment.

# floor plan finishing touches

For a design that will make your heart skip a beat, use these 11 tips to finalize your floor plan.

## floor plan finishing touches

f you're like most people who want to have a log or timber home of your own, you will dedicate a great deal of thought, time and energy into the way you want your floor plan to flow. You've jotted down your "must-haves," your "nice-to-haves" and perhaps even your "someday-maybes" on your wish list. But have you thought of everything?

Before finalizing your floor plan, tweak the layout with these 11 smart design solutions and watch your log or timber home go from good to great.

Enclose a Porch. Sheltered exterior spaces allow you to enjoy the great outdoors — even in less-than-perfect weather. A simple screen will help keep summer bugs at bay, but a sunroom will extend your outdoor enjoyment far beyond fair-weather months. Consider a hybrid option where you can swap out glass panels for screens when the temperature permits.

Let the Sunshine in. In four-season climates, a south-facing home will take advantage of passive solar gain, reducing your heating bill. A window wall will not only help you take advantage of this free heat source, it will afford dramatic views and give your exterior a major dose of character.

Add Window Drama. While we're on the subject, there's no rule that says all your windows have to be the same size, shape or style. A transom over a standard-size window will give it additional height for very little cost. A casement window above a kitchen sink will be easier to operate than one that's hung. Grouping round, half-round or triangular windows together can create a piece of functional art.

Keep the Bedroom Cozy. The master bedroom is the most intimate space in your house, so avoid soaring ceilings and the urge toward excessive oversizing. By all means, incorporate a soothing, spa-like bath and a walk-in closet or two, but save the drama for the great room.

Create Ample Clearance. If your staircase is situated in a front entryway, it should be located far enough from the front door so there's a minimum of 5 to 8 feet of clearance when the door is open. Without enough space, a large group of arriving or departing guests may feel wedged into the foyer. Even smaller clusters of people may find they don't have enough room to remove coats comfortably.

Consolidate Dining. All too often, people dedicate too many spaces in their homes to eating, and most of the time, these rooms go unused. Instead of a formal dining room, a breakfast nook and an island bar, consolidate your mealtime options into one comfortable space.

Don't Skimp on Storage. Closets are crucial. Even secondary bedrooms should have between 6 and 7 feet of closet space — not just for clothes, but for stowing items you don't use everyday but access often. Pantries are another essential. If you have the real estate, a walk-in is ideal, but in smaller kitchens, a floor-to-ceiling cabinet pantry can do the trick. Most log and timber homes have vaulted ceilings in the great room and other public areas, but in spaces with concealed-rafter systems, add a little attic space. A garage is another area ripe for an elevated storage spot.

Think Outside the Box — Literally. Decks and covered porches can add hundreds of square feet of living space at far less cost than the rooms inside. Balconies off of bed-

rooms create an intimate area to enjoy the outdoors and enhance your log or timber home's exterior appeal.

Expand the Laundry Beyond the Wash. There was a time when planning a space to do laundry meant nothing more than ensuring the proper water, electrical and vent connections were in place. Today, laundry rooms are log and timber home heroes, often put on display almost as frequently as kitchens — and why not? They, too, come complete with gorgeous cabinetry, exquisite countertops and high-end appliances. Make sure yours is fully functional with storage (there's that word again) that can stash shoes, backpacks, gardening supplies ... the works.

Play with Fire. Fireplaces are a log and timber home staple. It would almost feel wrong not to have one. But let's face it — they don't come cheap — so be smart when positioning your fireplace. Locate it in harmony with your view, not in competition with it. Also, consider a double- or multi-sided hearth to you can enjoy the crackle of a fire from several rooms at once. A two-sided unit also can bridge the indoor/outdoor gap between a great room and a sunroom, providing warm ambiance to both spaces with one price tag.

Plan Ahead. Once you think your plan is all set, take a step back and think about how it will look to you 10 to 20 years down the line. Will it still work? If you're approaching your retirement years, perhaps you should plan for a day when stairs will become a challenge and design a first floor master suite or elevator. If you currently have young children, plan for the teen years by devising space where they can have some privacy (and you can have some sanity). With forethought during the design phase, you can create a home that will evolve with you.



### Floor Plan Problem Solvers

In log and timber home design, there are a few characteristics that appeal to their future owners more than those who are into conventional housing styles. Soaring ceilings, tons of glass and a web of exposed trusses are features you see in the majority of log and timber structures, and as spectacular as they are, they can present some challenges. These practical solutions will help you avoid potential pitfalls.

### Window Walls

Challenge: While this dramatic feature enables you to open your home up to a magnificent view during the day, at night, with the lights on inside, it can become a humongous, dark mirror.

**Fix:** Incorporate lighting into your landscape. A well-lit path, uplighting playing off the trees and spotlights illuminating architectural features, you will provide a visible nighttime focal point.

### Vaulted Ceilings

Challenge: It's tempting to create dramatic soaring spaces in a log or timber home, but two-story-tall walls can feel uncomfortable if the floor area of the room is much smaller than its volume.

**Fix:** A strategically placed loft or catwalk will visually lower the space to more comfortable levels without losing any of the grandeur of the vaulted ceiling.

### Exposed Trusses

Challenge: Exposed rafters, beams and trusses are a big draw and a primary reason why people fall in love with log and timber homes in the first place. But too many trusses or a web of posts and beams can be more of a distraction than an enhancement.

Fix: To create visual harmony, trusses should be aligned with the natural flow and room divisions. This will allow you to "define" spaces within an open-concept plan without inserting actual walls.
